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Property boost: rates skyrocket

PHUKET: Property owners can expect higher land taxes in the new year after the Phuket Treasury Office (PTO) announced an island-wide average increase of 65% in government-appraised land values.

The new rates, which reflect the island's continuing property boom, will be effective from January 1, 2004 to December 31, 2007.

The Bangkok-based Valuation Authority, which is responsible for appraising land values nationwide every four years, reported increases in some areas over 100%.

Kathu district showed an average increase of 127%, while Thalang and Muang districts had increases of about 35%.

Tamrong Tongtan, new chief of the PTO, told the *Gazette* that the new figures reflected trends in Phuket's continuing property boom.

The most expensive land on the island continues to be along Rassada Rd in Phuket Town. Assessed values there were are as high as 80,000 baht per square wah, the same as in the previous valuation.

The greatest recorded increase in Phuket Town was along Pra Phuket Kaew Rd, which runs between Kathu and Samkong. Prices here increased a dramatic 299%, with plots in some areas now going for as much as 50,000 baht/sq wah.

In Kathu District, land valuations along the beach road in Patong increased as much as 300% in some areas. The most expensive plots were valued at 50,000 baht/sq wah compared to 31,000 baht/sq wah previously.



Prices for land along Patong's beach road increased as much as 300% in some areas, with the most expensive plots valued at 50,000 baht per square wah (12,500 baht per square meter).

The lowest assessed prices in this zone are now at 20,000 baht/sq wah, a four-fold average increase over the previous assessment.

Assessed values in Thalang District remain, on average, the lowest on the island. Some areas along the Baan Don-Cherng Talay Rd doubled in value.

Similar increases were recorded along the road from Bang Roang-Ao Por, where land doubled in price from 1,000 baht a square wah to 2,000 baht, on average.

"The new appraisal values are now in line with actual costs," K. Tamrong said.

He added that the increases

would benefit landowners who wanted to use their property as collateral in obtaining loans or, if need be, to post bail with the court.

Nationwide, land valuations, were up by 14.4%, with Southern Thailand leading the way with a 24.1% increase, due in large part to the tourism boom.

The government land valuation differs from a private appraisal because the government does not take into account what the land might be used for. It is designed as a base from which to set taxes and other fees. Mortgage registration fees, however, are based on an agreement between buyer and seller.

Get ready for a big food fight

PHUKET TOWN: The developers of the 1.6 billion baht Central Festival Phuket shopping complex are seeking local restaurateurs to add spice to what they say will be Southern Thailand's largest and most upscale food court.

Food is seen as a key drawcard if, as expected, intense competition develops with existing retailers once the 250-store complex opens in August.

Wallaya Chirathivat, Executive Vice-President for Business Development at Central Retail Corporation, told the *Gazette* that Central wanted local restaurateurs as well as national-brand clients, which include Oishi, KFC, Pizza Hut, Fuji, Zen, S&P and Au Bon Pain.

One well-known local Italian restaurant, Salvatore's, has already reached agreement to operate an outlet. Don Battles, owner of Don's Cafe, told the *Gazette* he is still negotiating and expects to make a decision after a meeting on January 7.

The three-story complex, set to open in August, is under construction on the bypass road near the Wichit-Songkhram Rd intersection.

Customers will be able to mix and match a wide variety of meals, either in a glass-enclosed, air-conditioned dining room with views of tropical gardens or in an outdoor terraced dining area.

K. Wallaya said the pavilion will stay open until 2 am daily and its design has been influenced by popular night entertainment districts in the region, including Shanghai Xintiandi, the Singapore Boat Quay and Lan Kwai Fong in Hong Kong.

Radio first: Tourist numbers are tipped to rise

PHUKET: New airlines, new air routes and more charter flights should increase the number of tourists coming to Phuket this year by about 10%, Lt Cdr Boonchart Prompoon, Director of the Airports Authority of Thailand, Phuket, said on December 24.

He was speaking at the launch of an "All Smiles All the Time" campaign at Phuket International Airport, a promotion aimed at persuading tourists to

return because of their friendly experience on the island and throughout Thailand generally.

'The airport is the place where tourists arrive so we have to improve our services to impress them," Lt Cdr Boonchart

"Our staff will welcome passengers when they arrive at the airport, and it will be the beginning of this scheme."

He said the present number

of 3.6 million passengers was likely to increase by at least 300,000 in 2004.

"It's possible to reach that number because there will be new airlines, including Orient Thai Airlines and AirAsia," he added.

There had also been about 30 chartered flights already during December, he said, and in addition there were new routes being flown to Kuala Lumpur and Sweden.

Rock Hard murder: man held

PATONG: The alleged murderer of a go-go dancer is now in Phuket Provincial Prison, following his December 23 arrest in Bangkok by a team of Kathu Police investigators.

The man, identified as 26year-old Akharadech "James" Phusuwan, was arrested without struggle in his native Bangkok following an investigation led by Pol Maj Chawalit Petchsripia.

Akharadech was wanted for the August 20 stabbing death of 41-year-old Pranee Asari, an employee of the well-known Rock Hard A-Go-Go on Soi Bangla.

Pol Capt Sa-nguan Muanthum, of Kathu Police Station, told the Gazette that Akharadech had confessed to charges of murdering K. Pranee, his ex-girlfriend, after she refused to get back together with him.

Her body was discovered in her rented room by her niece, 22year-old Pachanee Rattabhat. who went to check on her after learning that she had failed to report to work for two nights.

According to police, after stabbing the victim in the stomach, chest and neck on the evening of August 20, Akharadech fled to the capital, where he was finally taken into custody in a rented apartment in Bang Kholaem district.

Police said that they needed four months to have an arrest warrant issued and gather evidence while keeping track of Akharadech's movements. They said he had changed locations many times before finally renting the Bangkok flat.


The case against him has been dismissed and he has now returned to his farm.



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MISSING DIVER CASE

I was not involved, ex-husband tells Kathu officers

KAMALA: The family of missing divemaster Phikun "Nori" Srisaksungnoen traveled to Bangkok on December 22 and filed a missing-person report with the Crime Suppression Division (CSD), which is now investigating the disappearance independently of Kathu Police Station.

K. Nori's mother, 54-yearold Soi Mungpanklang, and her younger sister Thanachat Srisaksungnoen, 23, told CSD officials that the investigation by Kathu Police Station had stalled, and that they had reason to believe K. Nori's was murdered by her German ex-husband.

They fear that he disposed

of her body by feeding it to one of the more than 200 snakes kept on his large hillside estate in Kamala - a claim that her exhusband rejects.

The story has been widely and colorfully published in the Thai press, but police officers confirm that no charges have been laid. They say they have yet to discover meaningful evidence, and that the ex-husband had been cooperating with them in their investigations.

K. Nori, 25, was last seen at about 10 pm on November 29 at a bar in Kamala, where she had been celebrating with friends after a dive. Her family members, who also live in Kamala, said her disappearance was strange because she left behind her car and two children, who are now being cared for by their father.

K. Phikun ended the relationship with her husband about six months ago after 10 years of living together as man and wife in an unregistered marriage which began when K. Nori was just 15 years old.

Apparently the estranged couple continued to live on the same estate even after the marriage ended.

CSD interrogator Pol Capt Direk Chomyong told the *Gazette* that the family was concerned that K. Pikun's estranged husband might have murdered her in a jealous rage because she had taken a new lover. They also feared that he fed her body to a snake, adding that one of his three-meter pythons had gone missing. Capt Direk quoted K. Thanachat as telling him that K. Nori and her ex-husband fought many times because he was jealous when she took a new lover.

They told the CSD that until late on the evening of November 29, neighbors often reported hearing screams coming from the house, but that after that there was only silence, and nobody had seen K Nori since.

Kathu Police Station Superintendent Pol Col Chalit Thinthani told the Gazette that he had not yet been contacted by the CSD. He confirmed that a search of the grounds had turned up one of K. Pikun's shoes, which was stained with blood.

Col Chalit said, "[The husband] keeps more that 200 snakes in his home, but he denies killing his wife. He told us that K. Nori [probably] ran away with her lover. While we were there, he allowed the police to make a search."

Col Chalit said that a check had revealed that all of the snakes were legally registered and were used for educational purposes. He added that Kathu Police will continue to investigate.

"A few days ago somebody told us they saw somebody that looks like K. Nori walking along Patong Beach," he added.

Marcus Etter of Merlin Divers, where K. Nori had worked, described the missing woman as his business partner and told the Gazette that he had still not been contacted by her. He is offering a 50,000-baht reward for her return.

New symbol will

PHUKET TOWN: Projects totalling 70 million baht – including a park, high-tech traffic lights and a new symbolic sculpture - are under construction in Phuket Town, marking the end of an era for retiring Mayor Phummisak Hongsyok.

A 10-rai site on Thalang Rd - once home to the Phuket Provincial Electricity Authority complex – is under development as a multi-use area.

The park will account for six rai with shops taking up another three rai. The new Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) office is expected to occupy the remaining land.

A 15-meter-long statue of a hai laeng (sea dragon) - expected to cost 5.5 million baht is planned for the park entrance.

The announcements of these projects were made at a farerwell press conference on December 24 by K. Pummisak, who was standing down after 23 years in local government.

The park is due to open in time for HM Queen Sirikit's birthday in August and will be named Suan Chalermprakiat 72 Punsa Maharachinee BE 2547 Park.

Speaking of the sculpture, K. Phummisak said, "It will be the new symbol for Phuket Town."

Tin mine probe's final days

PHUKET TOWN: The investigation into land titles covering 17 former tin mines has concluded, with titles relating to 663 rai expected to be revoked, Vice-Governor Pongpow Ketthong told the Gazette on December 24.

V/Gov Pongpow, who presided over the investigation, said that the results will be passed to Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura before New Year's Day, though he added that a time frame for any revocation of land titles has yet to be scheduled.

He said that investigating officers classified each of the 17 suspect tin mines into one of three groups:

• Five titles covering 663 rai

in Kathu, Kamala and Klong Tha Rua mangrove swamp, which V/ Gov Pongpow expects to be re-

• NorSor 3 titles covering 32 rai – parts of which encroach on government land.

• About 300 rai spread around the island.

V/Gov Pongpow did not disclose the location of the land in the last two instances, nor whether revocation of titles for that land is expected.

dly pets tend to be the order of the day but a fisherman in Petchaburi's Cha-am district has created quite a stir in his village by keeping one of nature's slimiest creatures – a bright golden eel around the house.

Word travels quickly in a Thai village and neighbors have been beating a path to K. Chaliew's door hoping to share in the good fortune by making devotional offerings to Jao Si Thong.

Incense sticks pressed between their palms in a wai, they scrutinize the movements of The Golden One as he maneuvers in his undersized enclosure. They hope he will twist his sinuous form into the shapes of the winning numbers in forthcoming lottery draws. Not surprisingly, numbers such as "602" and "698" were among the most popular

Enterprising neighbor and government lottery sales agent

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PETCHABURI: Cute and cud- Noi Khlongkhlaew, 48, was quick to spot the potential and set up a table on the spot, reporting brisk business from villagers eager to place bets immediately.

Ironically, K. Chaliew himself said he had not made a wager as he had given up gambling. He also said he had no plans to sell The Golden One, even though a rice merchant from downtown Cha-am had already come and made him a generous offer.

His only reported plans for The Golden One are to build it a bigger and better tank. He estimated its age as between three and five years old and said it had absolutely no fear of humans.

KILLERS

with time on their side

Some murders in Thailand are followed by a swift arrest. But what happens when the excitement fades and the media – and the police – move on? Last year saw the War on Drugs, with at least 1,300 and possibly more deaths nationwide, and a less-bloody War on Dark Influence.

The Phuket Gazette reporting team looks at the continuing investigations into several high-profile killings on the island.

Pongtorn Hiranyaburana, Deputy Chief of the Phuket Land Office, was shot dead while driving between Krabi and his home in Surat Thani on April 25, 2003. His death came as he investigated lirregularities in land title deeds on Phuket.

THE SUPERINTENDENT of Investigation of Surat Thani Provincial Police Region 8, Pol Col Ronapong Saikaew, was given authority to supervise the investigation of this killing and several others. He told the Gazette, "There will be good news in this case after the New Year. I cannot disclose any further information as it may cause the suspects to flee, jeopardizing the case."

The *Gazette* suggested that the investigation was proceeding slowly, which Col Ronapong acknowledged. But he made the point that the arrest of those who sanctioned the killing, and not just the killers, was of equal importance.

"We take time with these important cases to make sure that we can obtain all the facts to make sure of a conviction," said Col Ronapong.

The Freeway Restaurant murders at Bang Tao Beach on May 17, 2003, left Suwim Noodan, the owner of the restaurant, and his nephew, Pramote Choochat, dead from automatic gunfire. Three gunmen were involved.

A LAND CONFLICT is believed to be the motive behind these murders and although one suspect has been arrested, the other two remain at liberty. One of them evaded police by running up a hill but officers – fearing he was

armed – waited for him at the foot of the hill. How he eluded police remains a mystery.

Three investigating officers were asked for their views on this case and most positive was the Deputy Superintendent of Phuket Town Police Station, Pol Lt Col Samarn Chainarong.

Speaking on December 23, he said, "Call me in a couple of days and we will have arrested those two killers." The Gazette called Col Samarn later that week, but he was unable to confirm further arrests.

Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander, Pol Col Apirak Hongtong, also expressed confidence that the case would soon close but had a slighlty different view of how the situation would develop.

"We were told that one of the two remaining gunmen would give himself up to officers on December 24, but he didn't turn himself in," he said.

Col Ronapong was more cautious in his appraisal but gave additional information on the investigation. "They [the suspected killers] are believed to have fled to Nakhon Sri Thammarat and Phatthalung but you must remember, we have many other cases to work on besides this one."

Police said that the victims' families did not wish to speak to the press, fearing reprisals.

Supachai "Chai" Udomdee, a reporter for Crime magazine, was murdered in his car in Phuket Town on April 17, 2003. He was shot more than 10 times by two gunmen.

THE MOTHER of K. Supachai, Yupin Udomdee, indicated that his death may have been related to the murder of land titles official Pongtorn Hiranyaburana because her son was a land broker.

"Chai's business interests had earned him many hundreds of thousands of baht," she said. "I heard that he had a price on his head of 300,000 baht. Perhaps people were trying to get at his money."

K. Yupin also spoke of Chai's girlfriend, Nual, and said that witnesses reported hearing

her son arguing with K. Nual during a telephone conversation the last time he was seen alive.

"And no one has seen her since he died. She didn't even come to his cremation," K. Yupin added.

K. Yupin has also considered that her son's journalistic career may have been another motive for his murder.

She advised him to leave journalism.

"He knew so much about so many people. Perhaps that was why he was killed.

"Think about it, the man sitting next to my son in the car didn't get shot. If Khun ..." K. Yupin began but stopped mid-sentence, indicating that to say more might endanger her life also.

However, she did say that her son was "a good man with a good heart" and always ready to help his friends. "He never made me sad and was generous with his money to anyone in need, even his foreign friends," she said.

"Reports that say Chai was cheated and then hunted by foreigners are bull****. A Swedish friend of Chai's heard about his murder and came to see me. He was welcome in my home," said K. Yupin.

K. Yupin said that life after Chai's death has not been too difficult in practical terms. She still works as a market vendor, which provides her with a sufficient income, even though she now has responsibility for her three grand-

"I just hope that Chai's will not be one of these murders that the police forget about, where someone gets away with it. I want the killer and those behind it found."

Col Apirak knew, it seems, another side to K. Supachai.

"He [K. Supachai] was not really a reporter but my informant," Col Apirak said. "He was shot over some drug-dealing case or it might have been his own business. I don't really know.

"Mothers never say anything bad about their own children. They don't know if their son or daughter is a drug dealer or user," Col Apirak said.

"Parents only know their children superficially."

Sayan "Maew Bohnam" Somnam and Viboonsak "Ko Kee" Bangniew Pechonchaisith were gunned down in separate incidents on February 9, 2003.

THE MOTIVE for these killings is obvious to at least one officer. "Maew and Ko Kee were involved with drugs and lots of murders this year [2003] and their deaths were 'silence killings," Col Apirak ventured.

"Major dealers were afraid that they would be informed on by the smaller dealers, so they had them executed," he contin-

Col Apirak again expressed confidence that suspects would be arrested "... in the next few

Relatives of K. Sayan and K. Viboonsak were unwilling to talk with the Gazette.

Prasert and Thavorn Trairat, the parents of Thepkrasattri mayor Prasong Trairat, were shot dead at their shophouse in Thalang on May 5.

ONE OF THE PEOPLE first accused of the murder, Suchart Maneesuwan, was "probably a scapegoat," said Col Ronapong, who has also been assigned to oversee this case.

"The suspect produced evidence indicating that he had been beaten by persons unknown to confess to the crime. K. Suchart also claims to have been at a party at the time of the murder concluded.

and has witnesses to prove this," Col Ronapong said.

Another prime suspect, Wichian Pakdeewanich, was found to have been in prison in Songkhla at the time the murder took place.

Both men filed complaints to both the Police Region 8 and the Crime Suppression Division.

Col Ronapong said that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra had taken an interest in this case and ordered officers to complete their investigations soon, and thoroughly.

Other people have been arrested in this case, including Wipa Jantong and her husband Som-

They were released after posting bail of 1.5 million baht each and have denied any involvement, asking that the police investigate on their behalf.

Pol Sgt Maj Chalaw Ngamduang, formerly of Sikow Police district in Trang, is suspected of carrying out the killings while army sergeant Sorapong Yaodam is alleged to have driven a motorcycle to the scene of the crime and identified the victims.

Col Ronapong said, "It's very likely that these two people were involved in the case. After we interrogated Sorapong, he named other people but both of them have alibis for their whereabouts at the time of the murders.

"We believe that Surapong is trying to protect the mastermind behind this crime. This is not an easy case for us to solve," he


Col Apirak does not seem to share his colleague's view that the wrong suspects were arrested, despite one of them being incarcerated at the time.

"Phuket Provincial Court issued the correct arrest warrants. If Col Ronapong has more information then he should let us know."

Sensing an opportunity for a joke, Col Apirak laughed, "We have never been issued with warrants to arrest scapegoats, only suspected criminals.'

Col Apirak claimed that some people had even implicated him in the murders, suggesting that he had hired the killers.

"We will get to the bottom of who organized these murders and why. Important people, with important connections, are involved," he said.

Jutha Na Thakuatoong, owner of a dive shop and tour company, and his driver were shot dead while waiting at lights at the junction of Wichit Songkhram Rd and the bypass road on October 8.

SOME CLUES have been found. Col Ronapong told the Gazette that they have found some clues as to the identity of the gunman but did not wish to disclose any further information as it may jeopardize their investigation.

Hareed "Bangdol" Lanson, owner of the Malaithip Drinking Water Company on Sri Soontorn Rd, was shot on April 9 as he left his office.


KILLERS on motorcycles are hard to catch. Pol Capt Passakorn Sonthikul of Phuket Town Police Station told the Gazette, "We still don't have a suspect or a motive for this murder. Some people say that it was a private disagreement while others suggest it was drugsrelated."

He also said that the only witnesses were children who could not identify the killer.

The family of K. Hareed said that they knew of no business conflicts that could have caused his death.

"We have so little to go on in this case that we could have arrested the killer for another crime and not realized it," admitted Capt Passakorn.









Divers plan to restore the coral reefs

n a first for Thailand, the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) is attempting to regenerate the coral around Mai Thon Island, off Phuket. Years of study and planning led to action this week, with hundreds of concrete pyramids and thousands of marine creatures being placed in the sea.

A coral reef provides a marine ecosystem that sustains a wide variety of aquatic life. There are about 153 square kilometers of coral reef in Thailand, 75 sq km in the Gulf of Thailand and another 78 sq km in the Andaman Sea.

A study in 1999 found that 50% of all Andaman coral beds had been destroyed, either by natural forces or human intervention. But it may not be lost for-

The PMBC (now under the Department of Marine and Coastal Resorces) has been pursuing solutions since 1982. Under the right conditions, coral can be rehabilitated.

Coral researcher Nalinee Thoughtam told the *Gazette* that

testing on degraded coral reef areas northeast of Maiton island, where the coral was destroyed by a great storm in 1986, showed that coral can return, given the right environment.

The area was once alive with staghorn coral.

"At the same time, the fish

that also disappeared with the coral have started coming back," she said. Nine years after the first artificial substrates were placed on the ocean floor as "building blocks," the area developed a cover of coral similar to natural patches of reef in nearby areas.


"Another point of the study is coral transplantation. It includes transplantation of staghorn coral, that has a growth rate of 10 centimeters a year and massive coral, which grows at about 4 cm a year. It's appropriate for degraded areas where substrates and the environment seem to be suitable for coral growth, but no coral 'reanimates' or live coral fragments are present," she said




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Border crunch for gamblers

rime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra ordered that video cameras be installed at border crossings with neighboring countries in an effort to stem the exodus of gamblers during the New Year holiday period.

He warned prospective gamblers that not only might they lose money in the casinos, most of which are found on the Thai-Cambodian border, but that their winnings could be seized when they tried to re-enter the country if they exceeded currency import limits.

The PM also sent a stern warning to immigration officials who allow gamblers to cross the border freely without verifying travel documents. "We will send out undercover officers," he said.

Taxi terror: In an effort to better protect foreign tourists, the government is considering a proposal that would require all Bangkok taxis to have Englishlanguage registration plates and be equipped with global-positioning technology. The changes would make it easier for foreign taxi passengers to report crimes committed against them by drivers and help police to track down perpetrators.

The scheme comes in the wake of two violent attacks on female tourists in the capital and was announced by a deputy government spokesman during a meeting attended by Deputy Prime Minister Chavalit Yong-chaiyudh and representatives from the Transport Ministry and police.

Heavyweight healthcare:

Nursing schools will not include specific weight criteria in their 2004 admission rules following the controversial disqualification of an overweight applicant in 2003.

The Nursing Council of Thailand's President, Tassana Boonthong, said the change was made because most Thais don't consider obesity a disease. The council resolved not to specify a weight ceiling, but instead to appoint a committee to determine whether each applicant met the physical requirements for the profession. She added that applicants could still be turned down if the committee ruled their weight was a hindrance to their studies, train-

ing or ability to treat patients.

School of hard knocks: The Education Ministry is inviting parents to add their definitions of inappropriate behavior by students to its draft list by posting their comments at www.moethaiteen.

Dr Charuayporn Thoranin, Deputy Permanent Secretary, said a panel had already identified 16 acts as improper for students. They include breaking school dress codes, having dyed hair, skipping class, theft, making rude gestures, going out between 10 pm and 4 am, and smoking cigarettes, drinking alcohol or using illicit drugs.

Also listed were: hanging out, gambling, visiting adult entertainment venues or brothels, having sex, carrying weapons, damaging property, brawling, extortion, and intimidation. The final list will serve as a guideline for schools across the country and will be

distributed to students as part of a handbook.

TAT targets 12m tourists in 2004: Having recast Thailand as the "Heart of Asia", the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) is aiming for 12 million tourist arrivals and 384 billion baht in foreign exchange this year.


TAT Governor Juthamas Siriwan said that although the lingering effects of the turmoil in the Middle East, global terrorism and Sars are all expected to put pressure on the sector, the TAT would use hard-sell tactics in its marketing campaign. Eighteen major trade shows are planned. The TAT forecast that 2003 tourist arrivals would total 9.9 million, bringing in 297 billion baht.

Micro-management: The Cabinet approved a strategic plan aimed at guiding the nation toward developing itself in the emerging fields of biotechnology and nanotechnology. PM Thaksin said that while the One Tambon One Product scheme could help the economy in the medium-term, future business and investment would depend heavily on the two new technologies.

The technology will be integrated into various national policies, such as making Thailand the "kitchen of the world" and an Asian health hub.

The government spokesman who made the announcement said that the Thai premier put technologies on the agenda after reading a book entitled, *The Next Big Thing is Really Small*, by Jack Uldrich and Deb Newberry.



As of December 18, Mr Ellyatt holds the world record for the deepest solo scuba dive. He went down to 313 meters, just off the west coast of Phuket.

Now we get to take a dive into his mind.

For 10 years, his passion has been diving. His previous job as a salesman, with his feet on solid ground, didn't seem to trigger as much excitement as exploring the depths of the ocean.

After he became a dive instructor and started doing serious dives, setting a few records along the way, he decided to attempt to dive much deeper.

His last deep-water dive, in February, was ill-fated and left him injured for many months. It certainly slowed him down but it did not stop him.

Mr Ellyatt, now the Technical Instructor Trainer at Scuba Cat, strongly believes that a making a world-record dive is more mental than physical. As he

firmly put it, "You've got to want to do it.'

Conditions may not have been the best on his world-record dive. As Mr Ellyatt recalled, one of the reasons he did not go even deeper was because he was confronted by a two-meter-wide jellyfish. He believed that if the jellyfish had taken a greater interest, it could have caused him deep trouble.

Since his record dive, the media worldwide has had his telephone ringing around the clock. Mr Ellyatt said, "When I do these deep dives, it's mildly entertaining for me."

Well, what about a deeper dive? "I hope not!" he said quickly, adding that he would leave his options open. "I quite enjoy doing them, but I don't want to be a circus performer for free."

Not at all taken with the idea of being the ultimate risk-taker, he said, "I don't mind taking measured risk. The ascent was the only real unknown."

The dive to below 300 meters was quick, taking just 12 minutes. Coming up was the hard part. The ascent took well over six hours and for some people, six hours of solitude would be an unbearably long time.

Mr Ellyatt said that he was so focused on every breath that he took and passed the time thinking of how he would handle another hazardous situation, of the kind he faced in February.

Some people may wonder why he does it. Mr Ellyatt said, "Doing a dive like this successfully will only benefit the sport. There is no competition in diving. The competition is with yourself, so when you fail you either come

out badly injured or dead."

Just as the relatives of mountaineers climbing Everest await news from the summit, so the diver's clan hangs on word of a safe return.

"I have my mom concerned and other people concerned, but I still need to do it," Mr Ellyatt said. "I know that some people don't have to have excitement other than the things that they like, and I like this."

In the past few years, he has decided that he doesn't need too much excitement from diving because, he said, "I'm not invincible. I don't want to live the rest of my life in a wheelchair with diving injuries."

Nevertheless, while he is determined to avoid the "raptures

of the deep," otherwise known as nitrogen narcosis, which is triggered by ascending too fast, he appears to be enraptured by diving.

"Diving is a complete experience and everything has to go right," he said.

"In a marathon run, if you can't go on then you just fall over. But in diving, you only get one shot. It will either work or not."

While he dives solo, he is not alone in his fascination with the deep. Italian divers Stefano Di Cagno and Paolo De Gennaro say they reached 320 meters together in a dive mid-year.

If Mr Ellyatt abandoned diving, he would find an alternative that involved a fair amount of activity. "My outlook in life is

thinking that the future will be how it is," he said.

"I would rather have a more interesting present than plan for the future."

After the near-disastrous dive in February, people were saying it would be madness to try to go deeper. "You can talk yourself into not doing it," he said.


"If a thousand people keep telling you that you're mad or crazy then it eventually starts to slow your confidence in doing it." However, his mind was made up and to go where no man has gone, well, that can be pretty tempting.

But for now, with his feet dry and his head above water, it may be a while before Mark Ellyatt's next world record attempt.


ith Phuket gearing up for Christmas and New Year, it was time to head off ... south this time, to Trang. With the new highway to Phang Nga complete, Trang can be easily reached in less than four hours.

En route we made what we thought would be a short stop at Wat Tam Sua, the hillside Temple just east of Krabi Town. Feeling fit that morning, we decided to explore this magnificent temple.

One hour, four bottles of water and 1,272 steps later, we made it to the small temple and the viewing gallery. Dripping in sweat, hearts pounding, we were rewarded stunning views of the Krabi coastline and the islands beyond, including the Phi Phi Islands.

As we stopped on the way down to wonder at the construction of the temple and the effort it must have taken to etch out all the steps from the rock, we met an old monk slowly going up.

We asked him how he was managing. He smiled, took a little sip of water, and said the first climb in the day was comparatively easy, the second in late af-

ternoon was harder. He also said on special days he made the climb three times. He smiled, waved his hand, and continued his climb.

Shaking our heads, we stumbled downward and set off

with the air conditioning on full blast.

An hour and a half later, we were in Trang. Our first stop was to check in at the new Amari Resort on Changlang Beach,

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Drive south via Krabi on Route 4 or catch an air-conditioned coach from Phuket Town to Trang – they depart every hour until 3 pm. A trip costs 180 baht each way and takes five hours.

about 40 kilometers east of Trang Town. This four-star resort is Amari's newest property.

The beaches here are estuary-style and not the best for swimming, but they are wonderful places to take a stroll and explore, and they are covered in beautiful spiral-shaped shells.

Swaying casuarinas line the shore and keep the whole area cool, with not a tourist in sight. Except for the wind in the trees, it's refreshingly quiet and deserted.

That afternoon we explored further south and visited several other equally deserted beaches: Yao Beach – the ideal place to explore mangroves by boat or canoe; Chao Mai Beach, with its stunning 30-meter cavern at the base of a cliff; and Yong Lin Beach, beside a beautiful pine forest and the best beach in the area for swimming.

Dinner that evening was at a small restaurant at Pak Meng Beach: excellent fresh seafood, fish, mussels and the obligatory bottle of Sangsom, plus soda and Coke. Next morning it was time to visit the nearby islands. Thankfully, the hotel allowed us use of their new speedboat — and we were soon skimming off across the bay to our first stop at Koh Kradan.

This is certainly the most beautiful of all the islands in the area – stunning white beaches and crystal water – so get there fast before the big resorts inevitably arrive. A few small resorts are already there, with simple rooms and basic facilities.


From there it was on to Koh Mook, second-largest island in the Haad Chao Mai National Park.

This island is famous for its *Morakot* (Emerald) Cave. The entrance to the cave is on the west coast, and is low-set and hidden from view.

The tide was dropping and we were given life jackets and dropped off from our boat. Following our guide with more than a little trepidation, we swam through the dark 80-meter tunnel, emerging in a stunning lagoon with a small white beach, surrounded by lush undergrowth and towering cliffs.

A spectacular place and well worth the visit, despite the rather arduous entry and exit ... no sea canoes here.

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





Windows XP's Scanner and Camera Wizard works like a champ. Transferring pictures from a digital camera to a WinXP PC takes just a few seconds - unless you have some other program getting in the way.



Digital pic tricks for your computer

id you get a new digital camera for Christmas? Are you struggling with the one you already have?

In this column I'll show you how to hook up a digital camera to your PC, so you can transfer pictures from camera to hard disk in a New Yawk minute.

The only requirement: you must be using Windows XP. Trying to get a digital camera to talk to Windows 98 is like trying to get Arnold Schwarzenegger to talk to Sean Connery.

Here's how you connect your camera to your PC:

Start by taking the "driver" CD out of the box that your camera came in, and throw it away. You don't need the camera manufacturer's drivers. If your PC came pre-loaded with some fancy imaging software, or if you accidentally installed the camera manufacturer's programs, get rid of all of it (Start | Control Panel | Add or Remove Programs).

Believe it or not, Windows XP handles digital cameras with amazing ease. The camera connection is one of the few parts of WinXP that works right, in every situation I've ever encountered as long as you get rid of the other junk.

transfer pictures, turn off the camera and turn on the computer. Dig the cable that came with the camera out of the camera's box. That's what you need to connect

Next, plug your camera into your computer. The camera should have some sort of cover over an electrical plug (probably a little D-shaped thing). Pop off

Stick one end of the cable that came with your camera into the camera, then plug the other end into one of the USB ports on your computer. (A USB port is rectangular hole in the computer.)

Don't worry. The cables can only go one way, and you can use any USB port.

Finally, turn on your camera. Windows XP almost always brings up a box that asks what you want to do with your pictures.

Click the line that says Copy pictures to a folder on my computer using Microsoft Scanner and Camera Wizard.

In the rare instance that the When you're ready to Scanner and Camera Wizard

doesn't start by itself, click Start | My Pictures and in the upper left corner click Get Pictures from Camera or Scanner.

When the Scanner and Camera Wizard starts, click Next to get things started, then wait for Windows XP to read inside your camera and show you thumbnails of all the pictures you have stored.

You can click on the pictures that show up sideways and rotate them with the rotation buttons. Choose to transfer all of the pictures to your hard drive - camera memory is expensive, hard drives are cheap.

The Wizard lets you specify a name for a group of pictures, so if you say you want to call these pictures My Birthday, Windows automatically names the pictures My Birthday 001.jpg, My Birthday 002.jpg, and so on.

Tell the Wizard which folder you want the pictures to go into, check the box marked "Delete pictures from my device after copying them," click Next a couple of times, and Windows handles the whole thing.

Your files are copied and renamed, with no more trying to figure out what DSCN01703.JPG means, and they're deleted from the camera's memory, so you have room to take more pictures.

When you're done, click Finish, turn off the camera and unplug it. That's all.

Beautiful survivors of bygone days

ou wouldn't know it, but there are some still glorious old homes in Bangkok. Most were razed over decades of savage greed and development, starting in the 1960s.

official urban vandalism was the wholesale destruction of Sathorn Rd in 1976, when the stately trees that lined the canal were cut down and the few remaining mansions razed in favor of glass skyscrapers.

But protected by royal connections or diplomatic immunity or dumb luck, enough mansions have survived to fill a book. Treasured Homes of Thailand (Asia Books, Bangkok, 203, 192 pp) belongs on every

coffee table.

The fluid text is written William Warren, who has lived in Thailand for 43 years and has written as many books.

The gorgeous color photography, surprisingly, is by Manit Sriwanichpoom, who made his

name as a black-and-white documentary photographer in the style of Philip Blenkinsop with whom he mounted several joint exhibitions. His flair for sumptuous, detailed architectural photography shows a whole new direction of his art.

"The houses in this book cover a wide range," writes Warren. "Some are literally palatial, having served as the residences of Thai royalty, while others are comparatively simple but display certain architectural or historic features that make them worthy of recording.

One thing they all have in common, however, is the simple fact that they have survived in the face of considerable economic and social odds and this alone, in the context of modern Thailand and especially of Bangkok, makes them exceptional.'

Two buildings, Suan Pakkad Palace and the home of MR Kukrit Pramoj, were created out of old Thai structures and moved to their present sites.

Of the rest: "The majority were erected in the early decades of the twentieth century, using plans drawn up or inspired by foreign architects living in Thailand at the time, and are similar to those found in neighboring countries colonized by Europeans, though a few display the Thai penchant for blending assorted styles such as Tudor, Gothic, Venetian, and Art Nou-

Eighteen buildings are profiled in this book, with Warren giving the relevant historical and family details. Many have royal connections. Asdang House, of teak panelling and stained glass, was built in 1887 by the seventh of Rama IV King Mongkut's many sons.

Kromprachadandhaburi Palace, built in the late 1920s, with curved walls facing the Chao Phraya River, was a wedding present for the mother of HM Queen Sirikit, born in 1932.

Mahanak Palace was built

for the 17th son of Rama V King Chulalongkorn in 1900 and is in the Western style of the time, with high ceilings and jalousie windows.

One of the few survivors on Sathorn Rd is Plodpai House, built in 1936. The architect was

Chitasan Apaiwongse, who was educated in France and designed the official buildings along Rajadamroen Rd and Democracy Monument. A unique cantilevered staircase is in the Art Nouveau mode.

Some buildings are obscure. I lived near Khao San Rd for five years and never saw the House on Khao San Rd. It was built in 1907 as a wedding present for the director-general of the Fine Arts Department.

His daughter studied under Silpa Bhirasri and painted the ceiling designs of one room, while Silpa Bhirasri himself painted the frescos of the Egyptian Room.

A more familiar landmark is on Wireless Rd: the home of Prince Rangsit Prayurasakdi. Built in Tudor style, the palace is still the family's and contains a great collection of Thai art.

Besides greed, Warren mentions other factors for the extinction of the grand houses. "Despite their size, many of them contained remarkably few rooms, much of the space being devoted to such features as lofty entrance halls and verandas that now, instead of the breezes they once encouraged, were more likely to attract dust and noise from neighboring markets and businesses."

big, bold agenda for the New Year

GUNS: I ordered the provincial police to wipe out guns for the New Year period – particularly in Patong – and any visitors to the island traveling through the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint may still be checked for

Only the Governor and the district chiefs are able to grant permits allowing a person to own anything classed as "assault weapons" – large-caliber handguns and upwards – and I will continue the ban to make the province gun-free.

My proposal for a weapons depository at Tah Chat Chai will probably help because it isn't necessary to bring guns to a tourist destination like Phuket. Anyone found with a weapon will be considered guilty and my simple advice is to leave your gun at home.

I have given responsibility for weapons issues, and the continuing project to improve road safety, to the police and the Phuket Provincial Administration Office (OrBorJor).

JET-SKIS: I have ordered Vice-Governor Pongpow Ketthong to deal with the jet-ski problem and to enforce all appropriate laws strictly, which is not what used to happen.

If possible, we will permit only those people with a license to use a jet-ski, either solo or with a passenger. The driver will now become reponsible for the passenger's life and we will enforce this.

A jet-ski operator's license is valid for seven years and we shall let all current ones expire without renewal,

Subsequent governors of Phuket will also carry on this mea-

We shall also begin inspecting the mechanical condition of jet-skis around the island.

LAND INVESTIGATION: On tin mine concessions, we are checking if the land titles have been issued legally or not. For example, if a land title such as a SorKor 1 or a NorSor 3 was issued before tin mine concessions were granted





for the land in question, it can be issued other kinds of land titles as

But land titles cannot be issued if there wasn't a land title before the tin mine concession for the property was granted.

Land titles also cannot be issued on forest reservation area and public land.

I expect more than 100 parcels of SorPorKor land to have titles revoked once the Land Investigation Team - as ordered by Newin Chid-

chob, Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Cooperatives – completes its investigation and its findings are checked.

The evidence must be clear in all cases. Titles involving so-called "flying SorKor 1" land are also under consideration of this central committee.

Vice-Governor Pongpow is presiding over the committee.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION: I am due to sign an agreement with Deputy Prime Ministers Somkid Jatusripitak and Wissanu Krea-ngam in Bangkok.

This agreement is my pledge to govern according to the strategies proposed to Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra at my appointment and to reach certain goals before September 30 this year.

A committee will grade my efficacy - and project results to September 2004 in the following categories: the "three provinces" - Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi strategy; Phuket-alone schemes; and national policies such as corruption, illegal drugs and poverty.

The committee will also inspect my local management of various government departments including hospitals, the police, land office and social welfare.

My New Year's resolution is to concentrate on these issues.

ome time ago, I wrote an article on the amazing facts about our bodies. It received positive comments, with quite a few people requesting more information.

The length of your foot is also the same as that of your forearm between your wrist and the inside of your elbow. Don't believe me, measure it.



Early bedtime no social cure

In airing his views about Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's plan to close nightclubs earlier, Safari Club owner Chairat Sukbal [See *First Person* on facing page] raises some important points. Among them is that the government hasn't fully considered the effects such a move would have on Thailand's all-important tourism industry. If such a plan were implemented and enforced, no province would suffer more than Phuket.

The vision of Soi Bangla deserted at midnight may seem more like a scene from a Fellini film than a potential reality, but if 2003 taught anything, it is that PM Thaksin is prepared to back his crackdowns with action.

Like most industries, international tourism is demand-driven. Success in this highly competitive market requires a keen understanding of what attracts foreign visitors. Phuket's success has come by allowing market forces to meet the needs of a wide range of tourists, including backpackers, diving enthusiasts, package tourists, yachtsmen, bar flies, golfers and well-heeled visitors who enjoy the finest hotels on the island.

If there is one thread that ties together these diverse groups, it is that they enjoy Phuket's world-famous nightlife. There are dive sites, golf courses and five-star hotels the world over, but the nightlife is one of Thailand's strongest selling points. To curb it would be, as K. Chairat points out, "killing the goose that lays the golden eggs".

Moving the closing time to 1 am would cripple the industry; a 10 pm closing time would probably kill it altogether – and the sales of One Tambon, One Product goods could never make up for the lost jobs and revenue.

The idea that crime, drugs and sexual promiscuity can be reduced by closing nightclubs earlier is similar in its naivety to the approach Bangkok Governor Samak Sundaravej took early last year in dealing with a case of corruption.

When Bangkok city officials were shown on *i*TV accepting bribes from street vendors, Governor Samak did not punish the officials. Rather, he sent a team of workers to rip up the sidewalk where the incident took place. He later told the press, "Don't you get it: no vendors, no bribery?"

Such ham-fisted attempts to cure social ills are not only doomed to fail, they can actually exacerbate the problems they are meant to solve – by sending a clear message to the populace that a quick fix, backed with brute force, is the best approach to solving a complex problem. It is in such a social climate that crime, drug abuse and "influential figures" thrive.

Deck-chair tyrants taking over beaches

Phuket's pristine beaches have become choked over the past six years. Sun umbrella-chair combinations now stretch the entire length of most of the popular beaches. This makes it difficult, if not impossible, to have a beach picnic

My Thai wife and children enjoy going to the eastern end of Nai Harn beach. Only three years ago this beach, had no sun chairs or umbrellas.

One weekend, we parked our car and walked to our favorite spot. The tide was in. As usual, we took our beach mats down to our little picnic spot near the outlet from the reservoir.

We had been there just a few minutes when a man came down and told us we could not set our things in this place because he was about to set up three umbrellas and chairs.

I spoke to him politely, explaining that the beach is public land and should be accessible free of charge, at all times. While we were swimming, he came down and removed our mats and picnic items by roughly throwing them on some nearby rocks. He then proceeded to set up his chairs in their place.

I told him that I would report his actions to the Tourist Police, but he simply laughed and walked away. After we left the beach, we did go to the Tourist Police Office, which, incidentally,

is a long way from Nai Harn.

The police were polite and agreed there was a problem. The Captain instructed two officers to return to Nai Harn Beach where the officers agreed that umbrellas and chairs should not have been set up where they were.

After further discussion, it was agreed that we could set our picnic things in this place at any time we chose.

I tell this story because I feel that the "umbrella creep" we are witnessing needs to be addressed. The beaches of Phuket are in danger of becoming like those in Spain, Italy or Florida.

I would like to see the Tourist Police impose and enforce regulations that restrict deck chair touts and others from setting up businesses on public land. Our matter was finally settled with hand shakes and "wais" all round; but this will do little to address the larger issue.

Social order – a plea for sanity


ome governments have good ideas but just go about them in the wrong way. This government, for example, seems to think that shutting down entertainment venues at 1 am or even at 10 pm will provide an instant solution to misbehavior among the young and improve social order.

I was both fed up and saddened when I heard this proposal. The government only seems interested in finding instant solutions to problems, and does so without first consulting the public or business operators that will be affected. As tourism is Phuket's selling point, we also have to consider what it is that tourists really

This government goes by the slogan khit mai, tham mai [new ideas, new actions] but it increasingly seems that there modus operandi is khit aeng, tham aeng [think and do whatever we want].

Mind you, the government is right to be concerned about drugs and crime and what young people get up to after dark. But will closing entertainment venues earlier provide an instant solution to these vices? Of course not.

Parents should control young people who misbehave, not governments. In a democracy, it is the ultimate responsibility of

parents to control their kids.

If there was a sudden increase in traffic accidents, this government would blame the cars and order them off the roads, rather than re-educating the driv-

As for crime and drugs, it's hard to imagine how anyone could seriously argue that closing entertainment venues earlier is going to solve anything.

Tourism will play a key role in Thailand's future development, yet these kinds of suggestions only undermine this increasingly important industry. Closing entertainment venues earlier and earlier is a classic case of killing the goose that lays the golden egg.

If this government took the trouble to consult people in the entertainment industry before acting, they would quickly get a complete picture of the real situation – along with some practical ideas about how to solve some of the problems.

Perhaps the government should consider zoning entertainment into specific areas, as is done in some other countries. But bringing forward closing times will simply forces people to entertain themselves on the streets, as happens now in Patong after 2 am.

The government just doesn't seem to understand why tourists go on vacation. If I go to Paris, will I only look at the Eiffel Tower, do some daytime shopping and sightseeing? Of course not. I will have some fun at night, too, by seeing how the French enjoy themselves after dark.

Will tourists still want to come to Phuket if they are told by the government that they need to be in their hotel bed by 10 pm each night? No. They will go somewhere else, where the government does not prohibit fun.

Since the government ordered entertainment venues to close at 2 am, our businesses have been suffering. Regular visitors who used to come every year are not coming back. They prefer countries that do not control what they can and cannot do and at what time of day or night.

Closing earlier and earlier also means that more jobs will be lost. Hard-working, law-abiding Thais will find themselves out of work, and no longer able to support their families. Can we go back to growing rubber? I don't think so.

How does this inevitable loss of jobs fit in with the government's proclaimed aim of reducing poverty? Not very well.

What this proposed edict seems to suggest is, "Let the tourists drink on the beaches in the dark." But will earlier closing times actually cut crime, or will people simply gather in less secure or even downright dangerous places?

I believe that most people disagree with this idea. I think if it were put forward in a referendum a large majority would be opposed to it. The government is simply trying to seek simple solutions to complex problems.

It's interesting that Phuket is being promoted as a potential regional business hub to rival Singapore. Tourists from Singapore tell me that in their country entertainment venues are open 24 hours, and that nobody there suggests that crime and delinquency can be solved by closing clubs

Why should Thailand be so different? If the government were to close entertainment venues at 10 pm, I for one would find another industry as fast as possible – because it would be the death of tourism in Phuket.

Helmets not seen on drivers' heads

As of October 1, anyone on Phuket riding a motorcycle, including passengers, must wear a crash helmet. So why are there are still many people on motorcycles not wearing helmets in and around Patong?

Pol Capt Teerawat Liamsuwan, Chief of Traffic Police, Kathu Police Station, replies:

We are very strict about setting up checkpoints at many places in Patong and arresting people breaking traffic laws, especially Thais, and especially for not wearing a helmet. It now seems better in Patong with almost 100% of people wearing helmets in the daytime. During the New Year holiday period we will be more strict on checking for drunk drivers, too.

Can I rent a bike to take the driving test?

I need to take a test to get my motorcycle driver's license but my bike is unregistered and has no inspection sticker. I am trying to get this but have been held up by paperwork as the bike is still in the name of its owner, who lives in another province. Can I still use my unregistered bike for the test? If not, can I take the test on a rented motorcycle?

Chariyut Dumchaom, an officer at the Phuket Provincial Transportation Office, replies:

The officers aren't strict on the documents but they are more concerned about inspecting the bike's roadworthiness to see if it's suitable for a driving test. Examinees can use anyone's motorbike in the test, even a rented one.

My Thai girlfriend started a new the Phuket Labor Protection ber. Her salary is about 5,000 baht replies: a month.

Now her boss says that he will deduct 500 baht each month from her salary to cover her social insurance, and that the total amount deducted monthly might even be 2,000 baht.

If there is a scam, as I believe, who should she contact? She is too shy to ask about this.

I think this happens all the time as many young girls are too afraid of their superiors to ask.

Cheated Rawai

Your girlfriend should first ask her employer to explain the amount being deducted from her salary.

If she still believes that she is being cheated, she can file a complaint with the Phuket Labor Protection and Welfare Office at Tel: 076-211995 or 076-220760.

If, after investigating, officers believe her employer is deducting more than the law specifies, the employer will be charged with cheating. If found guilty, he will be fined up to 100,000 baht, or be jailed for up to six months, or both.

What's the reality of minimum salaries?

I work for a Thai government school under a 30,000-baht-amonth contract. As a Canadian, the minimum wage requirement will rise to 60,000 baht next July. Of course I would love to have my salary doubled, but I don't think the school can afford to do

Will there be an exception to the minimum wage law for teachers, or at least teachers at government schools?

Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen, of the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office, replies:

The 60,000 baht monthly salary refers to the amount of money you need in order to get an extension for a one-year permit to stay.

You may still stay and work in Thailand with your income of 30,000 baht but without a 60,000baht monthly income you will not have the convenience of extending your permit to stay without having to leave the country every 90 days [on 'visa runs'].

Survey shows pickups 'most reliable'

THAILAND: An insight into custruck owners reported fewest owners had not experienced a tomers' perceptions of reliability for new cars – and possibly their buying habits – is provided by a Thai survey published this month.

The 2,200-strong sample taken in the JD Power Asia Pacific Thailand Initial Quality Study involved 32 different vehicles from 11 different marques, all aged two to six months old.

Four main categories of vehicle - pickup truck, saloon, sports utility vehicle (SUV) and MPV – were included in the survey, conducted between January and July last year.

The survey covers 135 potential problems over nine of the vehicles' systems, including features and controls, engine, ride, handling and braking, and transmission.

The study found that pickup

problems, with 241 per 100 vehicles (PP100) – or 2.41 per vehicle - while MPV owners reported 410 PP100. Saloon-car and SUV owners reported 259 and 263 PP100, respectively.

Isuzu's D-Max version of its top-selling Spacecab pickup, launched mid-2002, ranks highest in initial quality, with 193 PP100. The Isuzu D-Max Spark and the Mazda Fighter come respectively second and third.

The Honda Civic ranks highest in initial quality in the midsize saloon car segment for the second consecutive year at 252 PP100. The Civic is followed in the rankings by the Toyota Corolla, Altis and the Honda City.

Sanjay Ralhan, Manager at JD Power Asia Pacific, said that according to the survey, 29% of

problem in the two-to-six month inital phase.

At the other end of the spectrum, he reported that 20% of new-vehicle owners experienced five or more problems in the same period.

The study suggests a strong corollary between brand loyalty and perceived initial quality. Almost half (48%) of owners who did not report a quality problem stated that they would consider buying the same vehicle, or another from the same stable, in the

However, this figure relates only to the 29% of owners who reported no faults - in other words, just 14% overall. The feelings of the remaining 86% are unknown.

Perhaps surprisingly, 27%

of owners who reported five or more faults (20% of the total survey) said that they too would buy the same brand again. Looked at another way, 5% would continue to buy vehicles from the same company even having had negative inital experiences. Again, the opinions of the other 95% were not disclosed.

Thus, overall, only 19% of respondents said that they would consider buying from the same marque again, whether they had reported faults or not.

If this survey is in any way representative of the Thai newvehicle market as a whole, then a huge 81% of potential buyers are perhaps waiting to be enticed by the newest model with the best marketing strategy. Reliability may come low on their list of pri-

Happier new year, but no promises

he global economic outlook for 2004 is positive. Obviously, there are exceptions, but for the major economies, the situation has improved substantially over the past 12 months.

The US economy has improved dramatically throughout 2003. First quarter growth was at an annualized rate of 1.4%, and by the third quarter this had risen to a staggering 8.2%.

No one expects that to be maintained. It would be impossible because at some stage inflationary pressures and shortterm interest rate rises would choke off this phenomena.

However, growth in the US for 2004 could easily reach 4%. The US Federal Reserve, noting that inflationary pressures are largely absent, has in its usual "central bank speak" made it clear that it is not intending to raise short-term interest rates in the immediate future.

As for the decline in the value of the US dollar compared with many other currencies, from an American perspective, this is not a problem. In time, it will help reduce the deficits on the current account and trade.

To most American residents, it is a matter of little, if any, interest. Most Americans will notice the weaker dollar only if they wish to travel to countries with "stronger" currencies or buy something from these countries.

Probably the area of great-

est concern is consumer debt, which is the highest it has ever been at this stage of the economic cycle. US, UK and Australian consumers are carrying the highest debt load. Taking incomes into account, Australian consumers are actually carrying one third more debt

than the average American.

For US investors who place their money in other countries for investment purposes, 2003 has often delivered currency gains in addition to normal investment

British and Euro investors with US assets have found 2003 to be a difficult year, with gains in the US often lost entirely because of currency movements.

UK domestic investors who placed too much of their funds in the FTSE 100 index (the "Footsie") will have noted that 2003 gains have been reasonable but lagged behind other markets.

Footsie investors have also underperformed domestically. The FTSE 250 index has returned almost three times as much as the FTSE 100 index.

This may seem strange, but there are two sound reasons. First, the FTSE 250 index is a "mid-cap" index whereas the FTSE 100 is an abbreviation for a company with a large market capitalization, in other words, a large company. A "mid-cap" is a medium-sized company.

The two reasons for the

domestic underperformance of the Footsie are that of the 100 companies in this index, at least 40 are highly dependent on the fortunes of their US operations. The Sterling's strength against the US dollar has seriously undermined profits from this source.

Second, the Footsie has a much higher percentage of financial stocks, such as banks and building societies, than the FTSE

The UK economy also looks set to deliver reasonable economic growth for 2004 – not as high as in the US but probably in the range of 2.5%-3.5%.

The International Monetary Fund has recently raised two concerns about the British economy. First, it is concerned that government spending is too high.

Second, it is concerned about a residential housing market "crash". Interest rates have started to rise in the UK and, with 92% of mortgages being adjustable, homeowners are already noting the increase. An adjustable-rate mortgage means that every time the central bank raises interest rates, the rate rise is passed on to the homeowner. Over the past few

years, UK house prices have risen at an incredible rate, so any substantial increase in interest rates will cause a lot of pain for many people.


Investors in UK commercial property, outside of office blocks in the city of London, have not see huge price rises and are less likely to feel the pain. This is assuming that they have invested via a commercial property fund.

In the Euro zone, there are still signs of economic growth for 2004 but for most countries it will be under 2%.

Asia, in general, is enjoying good economic growth and for most of the major markets, this will continue into 2004.

All of these predictions are based on the current world situation. Obviously, other unexpected factors can intervene. At this stage, 2004 looks promising.

Flying high, the ultimate pie plate

merican football, with all its bulky gear, may not work so well in Phuket's heat and humidity. A football helmet probably weighs a kilo and the sweat wouldn't make it more bearable. That's why the ultimate alternative is a game of ultimate Frisbee – and the less you wear, the better.

Ultimate Frisbee is not a widely-known sport in Asia but, according to Chris Fisher, an ultimate fan, it is becoming more and more popular in many places, especially North America.

The Frisbee was supposedly invented at Yale University, by students slinging around tins from Mother Frisbie's Pies. They have evolved a long way from there.

A game of ultimate Frisbee is easy to arrange. Ideally, there should be seven people on each of two teams but if your friends are drowsy that day, then five a team works just as well.

The pitch is about the size of an American football field and set up with two end zones for scoring. Players may not run with the Frisbee and have 10 seconds while in possession to throw it to a teammate. If the Frisbee is intercepted or not caught, then possession goes to the opposing team.

"Touchdowns" are scored when a player catches the Frisbee in the opponents' end zone.

Pretty straightforward – and this is a non-contact sport, unlike American football, so injuries should be limited. If you happen to grab an opposition player or have an urge to crush them in a tackle then don't forget that, in this referee-free sport, the other team members may call the fouls.

The first team to score at least 15 goals and go at least two goals clear of the opposing team wins the game.

Playing ultimate Frisbee is great outdoors. Imagine, you can bathe in the sun, develop a ferocious tan and burn calories. You may say that's possible to do in basketball, tennis and other sports, too. But a game of basketball or tennis requires a hoop or net and a court.

huket Badminton Club (PBC) was established in 1962 to bring together local badminton enthusiasts and to establish Phuket as a contender in national tournaments.

Poon Ongsaranakom, locally-born but a member of the then national badminton squad, founded the club 41 years ago but the original objective, to promote enjoyment first and win matches second, hasn't changed with the passing of the years.

But a new generation of players, under the stewardship of president Suthipong Thanpongcharoen and vice-president Kowit Suandee, are guided through the game's finer points with a higher degree of of competitive-

K. Kowit, a veteran player of more than 10 years with the PBC, recently told the *Gazette* of part of this next generation: his daughters. "Patara (14) and Pataraporn (12) started to play badminton when they were nine and eight years old. They have joined another 200 players here, at least 22 of whom are at tournament level."

K. Kowit explained that although all of the players exhibit great enthusiasm for the game, not everyone has the skill to go on to match level.

However, the club boasts two coaches, Somboon Suesakulpaisarn, and Pramote Benjawarangkul, both of whom were in the national youth team and are on hand to aid their fellow club players every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8 pm to 10 pm. Our annual club fees are between 200 and 500 baht a year per player for administration, gym rental and all accessories," he said. "We can't afford professional coaches."

The training and effort is producing results for the club, said K. Kowit, particularly with the rising stars of the new generation. Recent PBC winners include Maneepong Jongjit, 12, who won an in-

dividual male national title in Trang and received his trophy from HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn.

Maneepong was paired with K. Kowit's daughter Patara, then 12, in the 2002 Teacher Council of Thailand (TCT) youth badminton tournament in Bangkok, coming in at a very creditable third.

Speaking with pride, K. Kowit related how Maneepong and Patara achieved second place in the 2003 Mall Merlin Championship Under-14s finals.



he Alfa Romeo 147 has been around for a few years now, but Alfa has injected new spirit into the car with a GTA version. Better performance, bigger brakes and stiffer suspension, plus luxury extras, put the GTA in a different category.

Alfa Romeo created the title GTA in the mid-'60s when it wanted to compete in touring car racing. At the time, drivers such as Jimmy Clark, Sir John Whitmore and Andrea de Adamich were dominating the sport and Alfa wanted to be part of it.

To do so, Alfa Romeo enlisted the help of tuning company Autodelta, headed up by the talented engineer Carlo Chiti, a man who had previously been a designer at Ferrari. Chiti's new model was a development of the Alfa Giulia GT and was christened the GTA.

The GTA won races straight out of the box, and at Monza in 1965 it took the first seven places. The GTA rapidly became the car to beat, surpassing the dominant Lotus Cortinas of the day.


In 1968, Alfa introduced its new GTA 1300 Junior, with the racing version giving 160 bhp (118 kW), a 50% increase in power on the road car.


The GTA's superiority lasted until 1970 when the GTAm was launched, a development of the 1750 GTV but with a 230 bhp, two-liter engine. Dutchman Toine Hezemans won the European Touring Car Championship at the wheel of a GTAm in 1970 and 1971

Alfa Romeo began racing as far back as 1920 and achieved significant Grand Prix victories over the years.

Its drivers have included some of the all-time greats of motor sport.

Juan Manuel Fangio, the legendary Argentine, signed for Alfa Corse when the team began racing again in 1950, the beginning





of the world championship as we know it today. Fangio came second in the title race that year to another Alfa Romeo driver, also a legend, Giuseppe Farina.

But the man regarded by many as the greatest driver of the pre- and post-war periods was Tazio Nuvolari.

Born in 1892, Nuvolari joined Alfa Corse in 1930. He won the Mille Miglia and the Ulster TT, and in 1932 took several Grand Prix victories.

He also won the Le Mans 24-hours race a year later, demonstrating his versatility in all forms of motor racing.

Indeed, Alfa Romeo won Le Mans for four consecutive

years between 1931 and 1934.

So what does all this sporting heritage have to do with the little 147 GTA? Alfa Romeo is still involved in touring car racing in Europe and an Alfa 147 was on pole position for the 2003 Guia race at the Macau Grand Prix, so it is obviously pretty potent.

The 147 GTA retains the standard blunt body, the styling of which you either love or hate, but under the bonnet is a massive – for the size of car – 3.2-liter, 24-valve V6 unit.

Alfa Romeo claims it is the most powerful in its class, with a stun-

ning 250 bhp (184 kW) on tap. A top speed of 246 kmh and a 0-100 kmh time of 6.3 seconds

The suspension geometry and settings have been changed to cope, while the latest vehicle dynamic control system is also a standard fitting.

Larger ventilated discs give better stopping power, complete with four-pot Brembo callipers, while there is a roof spoiler, side skirts and a special deep front spoiler.

Inside the 147 GTA there are sports seats – leather or fabric, as you wish – aluminum pedals, a thick-rimmed leather wheel and leather gearshift knob.

There are dual airbags and front side bags, as well as a full-length air curtain to prevent injury in side impacts. A premium Bose sound system with eight speakers and a sub-woofer is standard.

There are other creature comforts, such as a rain sensor, a mist sensor and, mysteriously, an odor sensor. Quite what the latter does is not explained.

The 147 GTA is an exciting machine and there will probably be very few seen in Thailand, but if you can get your hands on one, you can dream of all those racing victories of days gone by.

It's a little piece of history in a thoroughly modern package.

Talking Porsche in Phuket

atong in early December, a place with beautiful, curvy models lined up along the side of the road. Beauty indeed, but something of the beast there, too.

They were, of course, Porsches. Boxsters, 911s Carreras and 914s in yellow, red, midnight blue and the classic German racing silver.







Two views of Baan Pernja: The project will house workers in Thalang's expanding tourism sector.

PA KHLOK: Good Built Good Company has announced that the first phase of its Baan Pernja residential development is 95% complete and work is now underway on the project's second phase. Baan Pernja, about six kilometers from the Heroines' Monument along Route 4027, is aiming to offer affordable housing for workers in Thalang's expanding tourism sector. Baan Pernja is near the new Mission Hills Golf Course, which is expected to open soon.

Project Manager Kiertichai Keawbumrung told the Gazette that the entire project, which has an entrance near the Phuket Provincial Special Education School, covers 8.5 rai. All homes are single-story bungalows ranging in price from 920,000 baht to 4.3 million baht.

The first phase comprises 28 duplex units and five detached homes ranging in size from 36 to 280 square wah. Work on the second phase, which began last November, is now estimated at about 30% complete. The second phase comprises four detached homes and two duplex units.

PHUKET TOWN: Phuket Boom Property Co is clearing land and grading roads at its Baan Nernkhao Phuket Sea View housing project, which it expects to complete by June this year.

On Ruampattana Rd in Wichit, Baan Nernkhao comprises 13 two-story homes ranging from 52 to 120 sq wah. The development's three-rai hillside location provides a distant sea view. All public utilities will be provided by the

Phuket Boom President Korkiat Limpraphat told the Gazette that total investment is about 40 million baht. Units range in price from 2.95 to 4 million baht. K. 



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he names of some of the plants that thrive in this part of the world are often quite difficult to tie down. You can spend hours going through a book to decide whether a plant's leaves are long enough, or if it has the right number of petals. The usual answer is that it's just another variety of a plant you already know well.

Try to work out the various identities of ti plants, for example, is an art in itself. There are hundreds of them, and you wouldn't know that a vast majority of them were even in the same family.

Some are easily identified simply because they're weird enough to qualify as a member of a particular group. Any flower that you see with zig-zag flowers, growing either skyward or towards the ground, has to be a heliconia, which is the rebellious punk rocker of the plant world. If it could walk into a barber's shop, it would get a Mohawk every time.

There are other plants that have only one persona – no impossible cousins to lead you up the garden path (I've been dying to get that line in for weeks). You look at it, and instantly know what it must be.

A few weeks ago I wrote about the bottle palm, named purely because its trunk looks like,

tails. It doesn't take a genius to work out where I'm going with this – the cat's tail, or chenille plant, is exactly that – a shrubby plant with hundreds of small "cat's tails". It is also known as hang ka-rok in Thai.

The bright red tails, or inflorescences, to use the proper term, are actually comprised of tiny flowers, and can grow as long as 50 centimeters. These flowers appear continually, and it's an ideal plant to use as a border or

hedge. It grows very quickly with little effort.

The only work required on the gardener's part is frequent pruning. A plant will soon start to look a bit straggly before it reaches its full height of five to six feet, but attack it with the secateurs and it will thank you in the long run. Older plants can grow even taller, but as with their human equivalent, they need something to support them.

The chenille plant is quite content in most types of well-drained soils. It grows and flowers best in full sun, with little care other than water needed to maintain the plant once it's established, and only when the soil begins to dry.

The only potential problem is where you put the water. Try to keep the water off the flower spikes if possible because this helps to prevent disease problems.

It's even easy to propagate. A healthy cutting in compost will quickly turn into a clone of its parent.

Attractive as the cat's tails might be, this probably isn't the ideal plant for a children's play area. All parts of the plant are poisonous if ingested.

The names of some plants, you just know. Some you can figure out. The cat's tail really couldn't be called anything else.
