Topless tourists cause confusion

PHUKET: Anyone aiming for an all-over tan could be fined 500 baht under Section 388 of the Thai Penal Code, which deals with "... shameful acts, ... indecently exposing his or her person, ... or committing other indecent acts".

However, local police officers are reluctant to enforce the law as long as the exposure occurs in public on a crowded beach rather than in a bar, particularly if the person on display happens to be foreign.

Toplessness came under scrutiny when a *Gazette* reader asked if topless sunbathing was legal. The police officer who responded for Issues & Answers referred to Section 388 but added, "We have never charged any tourist like this before because Phuket is a tourist destination."

Maj-General Panya Mamen, National Commander of the Tourist Police, had a different attitude. He told the *Gazette* that officers should enforce laws regardless of where the offense was committed or by whom.

He commented that responsibility for advising tourists and others on this matter should fall to the provincial government.

Provincial Vice-Governor Niran Kalyanamit admitted that this issue had not come up for discussion before but remarked, "If we enforce this law, we will do so fairly. There will be no double standards."

He conceded that enforcing the law might affect tourism but suggested that officers could warn people first before enforcing the law.

"We have a different cul-

ture and laws from foreign countries, and visitors may not know what is illegal here."

V/Gov Niran told the *Gazette* that the matter would be discussed at a forthcoming provincial government meeting and added, "We need to have a public hearing as well."

Some Thai women have been upbraided in recent months for what they are, or are not, wearing. Widely-reported before last year's Songkran festival, for example, was the edict of the then-Culture Minister, Uraiwan Thienthong, telling women to wear a sarong rather than a spaghetti-strap top and shorts.

"We should get rid of some of the unwanted practices of recent years," she said.

The Gazette asked several

Thai women in Patong for their views. Most expressed a positive attitude to going topless – for foreigners, at least.

Maew, 35, from Srisaket, felt that going topless on the beach seemed "natural" and even gave parents – Thai or foreign – the opportunity to explain the difference between cultures.

Ae, 37, who works in a Soi Bangla bar, said, "I wouldn't dare go topless on the beach but it doesn't bother me that foreign women do."

Koy, from Chanthaburi, commented that toplessness now seemed normal in Patong, whether on the beach or in a bar. "There are predominantly Western styles here [in Patong] now and we just get used to it."

Laguna 'confident' over tin mine titles

THALANG: James Batt, Joint Managing Director of Laguna Resorts & Hotels, has hailed as "good news" the announcements by various officials that the land titles for the 13 plots on which the hotel complex is built are legitimate.

Both the Provincial Land Office and the provincial arm of the Committee to Solve Problems of Encroachment on State Land (KorBorRor) have told the Gazette that they consider the titles for the Laguna land, formerly tin mines, were issued legally.

Mr Batt told the paper, "We're confident now that everything seems to be settling down and no further damage will be done to Phuket's economy by these accusations, so hopefully, that will be good news."

The controversy over land deeded to Thai Wah Development, owner of Laguna Phuket, took a big step toward final resolution during a January 7 meeting in which the Phuket Provincial Land Office (PPLO) told the chief investigator of the *KorBor-Ror* in Bangkok, Pol Lt Gen Surin Pikultong, that the title deeds were issued legally.

The finding upholds previous rulings by the Land Office, although the PPLO added that further investigation into other aspects of the case might be needed before the matter could be put to rest.

PPLO Chief Suphot Suwannachote told the *Gazette* that his department concluded that all 13 plots, covering 400 rai, were issued in accordance with government regulations.

Reminder over foreigners' wages

PHUKET: Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen, Deputy Inspector of the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office (PPIO), has reminded foreigners that, starting on July 10, new minimum wage requirements will come into effect for foreigners seeking one-year permits to stay on the basis of holding work permits.

He said the new rates, which will nearly double the minimum wage requirements for oneyear extensions, are intended to further restrict foreign workers to specialized occupations.

Capt Krissarat said that the increases were announced a year in advance in order to give firms employing foreigners a chance to adjust to the change.

Starting July 10, applicants who wish to extend a visa by one year at their local Immigration office will be required to submit a copy of their PorNgoDor1 tax report showing that their monthly income, including benefits and allowances, meets the new minimum wage requirement.

The increases are expected to cause problems for schools employing foreigners. The average salary of a foreign teacher employed by a state school is typically 25,000 to 30,000 baht.

The increases are expected to drive many teachers out of the country and force those who choose to stay to leave the country every 90 days – regardless of their teaching schedules – or be subject to possible arrest, detention and deportation.

The new minimum monthly salaries will be as follows:

- Japanese, American, Canadian, 60,000 baht;
- Europeans and Australians, 50,000 baht;
- Koreans, Taiwanese, Hong Kong Chinese, British National Overseas passport holders, Singaporeans, Malaysians, 45,000 baht;
- Indians, Middle Easterners, mainland Chinese, Indonesians, Filipinos, 35,000 baht:
- Laotians, Burmese, Vietnamese, Cambodian and all Africans, 25,000 baht.

Newspaper journalists get a special deal. They will be eligible for one-year renewals with a monthly income as low as 20,000 baht – even less than that of Burmese fisherman.

Capt Krissarat added that employees of firms that hold contracts with the Thai government might be eligible for exceptions, and advised workers to contact their personnel departments to find out.

"Initially, we consider the deeds valid in terms of the legal procedures through which they were issued," he said.

He refused to give details, however, until after meeting representatives of the provincial KorBorRor, which he expected would take place this month.

K. Suphot said, "This [has been] a big problem, so we need to discuss it further in order to avoid making mistakes.

"The KorBorRor probably needs to consider other [non-procedural] aspects of the case too, such as by examining aerial-photographs.'

The probe followed charges by a self-appointed Senate working group, led by Sen Pricha Pitanon, which complained that the original holder of the concession to mine tin along Bang Tao beach, the late Khoon Wisetnukulkij, failed to return the land to the state at the end of the concession, as required by the law.

Instead, the group charged, the 400 rai of land was improperly issued with deeds, which were upgraded and eventually sold to Singapore-based Thai Wah Development.

Visawa Sasismith, Phuket's Chief Administrative Officer, also told the Gazette that the disputed deeds were not actually on tinmining concession land. He said that, in the past, concessions to mine tin were issued in two separate tranches.

"After the first tranche of concessions expired - but before the second was announced - many people were issued with land documents," he explained.

"Those areas weren't considered to be government or forestry lands at that time."

Many of Phuket's wealthiest families made vast fortunes through property holdings on land that was once mined for tin, leading many critics to believe that Thai Wah has been unfairly singled out because of its foreign ownership.

Thalang District Officer Kanthee Silapa told the *Gazette* that the PPLO needed to explain clearly to the public why it found that the deeds were legal. There was still much confusion, he said.



Mystery over death of Russian girl

CHERNG TALAY: Mystery surrounds the death on January 12 of a 10-year-old Russian girl vacationing with her family at the five-star Dusit Laguna Resort Hotel.

Police said they suspected the girl might have been electrocuted, but a senior Dusit manager rejected this theory, saying the hotel was awaiting the conclusions of forensic experts in Bangkok.

The girl, named by police as Ksenia Drashinskiy, had been swimming in the pool and was found in a collapsed state nearby, witnesses told police.

"We've checked and there's no electrical problem so the swimming pool hasn't been closed," said Chatree Chuensuksinsap, Executive Assistant Manager at the resort.

He said that investigations were proceeding slowly because the girl's parents, who were still at the resort, could not speak English. It was not known whether Ksenia had a medical condition that may have contributed to her death.

Based on the comments of a bystander who touched the girl soon after she had left the water, Pol Maj Siriwat Inyim, Inspector of Investigation at Cherng Talay Police Station, said he believed that an electric shock may have been responsible.

But the resort's K. Chatree said, "I can't offer conclusions because we are waiting for the [Dusit] legal department to come here.

"It happened about 10 am. She [the victim] went out to swim but nobody saw how it happened at the scene so we don't know know the real cause.

"The girl was swimming with other children, who then saw her lying beside the swimming pool. They thought she was kidding. But then people discovered she was unconscious and had a weak pulse. They asked staff to get her to a doctor," K Chatree added.

The girl was initially treated at a nearby clinic and then sent to Thalang Hospital and then to the Bangkok Phuket Hospital. She is thought to have died on the way.

The police investigation began at noon and continued until midnight. Officers returned to the resort the following day to try to speak with the girl's parents and representatives from the Russian Consulate in Bangkok.

Cheaper fares for Bangkok-**Phuket flights**

PHUKET: Thai Airways International (THAI) is offering a limited number of seats on its Phuket-Bangkok route at the low price of 3,400 baht return or 1,700 baht one-way.

The seats are being allocated on a first-come, first-served basis, and are most likely to be awarded to people paying for and collecting their tickets at least 48 hours in advance of a flight. They are neither transferable nor refundable.

Viset Sontichai, Upper-Southern Thailand District Sales Manager for THAI, told the Gazette that the precise number of low-price tickets on each flight varies, but that as many as 30 may be available on any one flight.

The promotion, which ends on March 31, is part of the airline's preparation for the launch of its a low-cost airline on April 1, K. Viset added.

PHUKET: Despite continuing violence in the south of Thailand, the visa officer at the Thai Consulate in Kota Bahru, Malaysia, has insisted that the situation along the border is still calm and that many foreigners continue to arrive each day to renew visas.

Kota Bahru is the Thai consulate closest to Phuket, and one of a few in the region that has consistently issued six-month double-entry non-immigrant B visas, required by people who wish to work in Thaland.

Tour companies offer "visa trips" that involve being away from Thailand for just a few

The southern Thai provinces of Narathiwat, Pattani and Yala have undergone serious violence, mostly attacks on local police, soldiers and schools.

An estimated 60 attackers poured gunfire into a police station in Betong, Yala, on January 7. No one was reported hurt in the 15-minute battle.

Pavinee Yuwaphan, Visa Officer at the Thai Consulate in Kota Bahru, told the Gazette on January 8 that security in Narathiwat and on the border was tight and tourists could feel safe.

"We still have a lot of people coming to see us every day," she said. "I am not worried. We have soldiers on guard around the border area and in each of the problem provinces. Security checks at the Thai border are very strict."

However, she added that

anyone still concerned about security "can go to renew visas [at the Thai consulate] in Penang which is also issuing six-month non-immigrant visas.'

In Penang, however, an official at the Thai consulate said that non-immigrant visas were not automatic. "It depends on the documents the applicant provides," the official said, adding, on the bright side, that one-year non-immigrant B visas were available provided the paperwork

A Penang-based Gazette source with connections in the consulate said that, to his knowledge, the consulate was not issuing six-month visas, but that oneyear multiple-entry B visas could be obtained by anyone holding a current Thai work permit.

Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen, of the Phuket Immigration Office, said, "You can go to any country you wish [in order to get a nonimmigrant visa] but the validity of the visa depends on the discretionary authority of each consulate, which in turn depends on how much authority the consulate is given by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs."

Meanwhile, the tourism industry in Phuket is naturally worried about the effect the violence in the South will have on busi-

Phuket Tourist Association President Pattanapong Aikwanich, told the Gazette that he felt the role of the press was "most important" when it came to covering this sensitive topic.

strongly to provide information to the public about what is happening in the three provinces.

"The government should work with the foreign media, such as CNN, to let them know the real situation. The government should take [the press] to the area and let them to see what is really happening."

Lt Cdr Boonchart Prompoon, Director of the Airports Authority of Thailand, Phuket, said that there are no flights to Phuket from Narathiwat, Yala or Pattani, so there has been no effect on the number of arrivals.

"Anyway," he added, "we continue to be very strict about the security of every flight. We also check runways, and we work closely with local authorities to exchange information."

A source at South Siam Travel Services, who asked not to be named, confirmed that inbound reservations are holding up and that there have not been any cancelations nor, indeed, any worried queries.

"The tour groups are coming here without asking about the circumstance in the three southern provinces," the source said.

Glue sniffers come unstuck

PHUKET TOWN: Seven glue sniffers were arrested early on January 11 when police officers on patrol caught them enjoying their preferred form of substance abuse, inhaling the vapor of rubber-based glue.

A police patrol came across five youngsters sniffing glue in a dark corner on Soi Si Sena at 2 am. The youngsters bolted in different directions, but to no avail.

Just 20 minutes later, the patrol discovered another two glue sniffers by the banks of Klong Bangyai on Rattanakosin 200 Pi Rd.

Like their crosstown counterparts, the two ran off, but were later caught by the officers.

All seven were charged with substance abuse and were held without bail pending court appearances.

Weapons recovered after anonymous tip

KATHU: Police recovered a briefcase full of explosives along a road in Kathu early on January 5 after receiving an anonymous

Near an electricity pole along Phra Phuket Kaew Rd (the Samkong-Kathu road), police found a briefcase containing five M67 fragmentation grenades, two one-kilogram TNT bombs and 191 rounds of assault rifle ammunition. The bombs, grenades and ammunition were wrapped separately in three plastic bags.

any new hotel projects have been confirmed for Phuket. Some are being developed by Thai companies, most notably the 500-room Burasari Hotel included as part of the Jungceylon mega-project in Patong, and the 400-room Central Phuket Resort on 41 rai of beachfront property in Karon, scheduled to open in mid-2007. Confirmed projects that involve international hotel brands include:

They're off

Raffles' first property in Thailand, a 79-room hotel and spa south of Kata Noi in Phuket, scheduled to open by the end of 2006.

Banyan Tree, adding 22 new villas to its current 108 at Laguna Phuket.

Alila Hotels and Resorts, based in Singapore, has an agreement with developers Acqua Phuket to brand Acqua's 78-villa hotel project in Kamala, which is now under construction and scheduled for completion this December. The hillside site covers about 37 rai and offers one- and two-bedroom villas.

Park Plaza Hotels, a division of hotel giant Carlson Hotels Wordwide, is developing a 99-room villa resort on Nakha Yai Island, to open early this year.

Hilton Hotels is rebranding The Phuket Arcadia Beach Resort, Phuket's largest hotel, as a Hilton Hotel property in October this year.

Hilton affiliate Conrad Hotels is investing US\$15 million (about 670 million baht) in the construction of 31 luxury villas and upgrades to the existing 79 rooms at the Panwaburi Resort & Spa, which will be rebranded this year as the Conrad Phuket at Panwa Bay.

Accor Hotels is expanding and upgrading the 77-room Panwa Beach Resort, which it is already being marketed under the brand.

Development executive Brian Deeson said the company was also evaluating and working on a couple of other projects, one a new venture and the other a refurbishment, although both are still being discussed.

"We are most eager to expand our presence in Phuket and certainly will be focusing on the area in 2004," he said.

US-based **Asia Properties** announced in February last year that it had signed a memorandum

of understanding to buy 116 rai of beachfront land along Mai Khao for US\$9.5 million (about 430 million baht) to develop a four-star luxury villa resort to be named the Royal Andaman Beach Resort.

The project's first phase of 150 villas is scheduled to begin in the first quarter of this year. Sources told the *Gazette* that the project was still in the "due diligence" phase of ensuring that all property title deeds were incontestable before proceeding.

Starter's orders

Didier Picquot, Regional Vice President and General Manager, Four Seasons Hotel Bangkok, replied to questions by saying, "We have not as yet secured a site in Phuket. When we do, I will certainly keep you informed."

Kristi Arndt, Director of Public Relations of Carson Hotels Worldwide, which includes the Regent Hotel brand, said, "Phuket is a strategically important leisure destination for [Regent] and we are looking at several opportunities there. However at this time, we do not have a signed deal to develop a Regent hotel in Phuket."

Holding back

Richard Greaves, General Manager of Grand Hyatt Erawan Bangkok, said that rumors that **Hyatt International** was planning a project in Phuket were untrue.

Sisadhi Christopher Reuben, Public Relations Manager at The Oriental in Bangkok, said parent company **Mandarin Hotels** had "no plans or projects to develop a hotel in Phuket".

Julia Record, Director of Corporate Public Relations of **Shangri-La International**, said Shangri-la "has no detailed plan yet to develop a new hotel in Phuket."



ith at least 31,000 hotel rooms in more than 549 establishments,
Phuket's hotel industry is second only to Bali's as a resort destination in Southeast Asia, and is Thailand's second largest hotel

market, after Bangkok.
Remarkably, however, only about 10 international hotel brands operate hotels here. But that seems likely to change fast, with several international chains confirming projects on the island and many more studying the market, seeking out properties to build, develop or manage.

Many industry analysts believe that while the rapid expansion in inexpensive and moderately-priced hotels has led to oversupply in those market segments, there is still potential for development in the five-star hotel sector – as shown by the growing interest of international hotel chains seeking a presence

Robert Hecker, Managing Director of tourism industry consulting firm Horwath Asia Pacific, told the *Gazette* that several potential new projects are in the planning stages.

Though he wouldn't name names – because they have yet to be confirmed – he did say the the new projects could add more than 500 five-star rooms to Phuket over the next three or four years.

Horwath Asia, which released an in-depth market study on the Phuket hotel industry in 2002, believes Phuket is undersupplied with five-star hotels, especially when compared with Bali.

"We would expect Bali to have more, but the gap is considerable – particularly with regard to villa-type hotels. Before the Marriott opened in 2001, the last five-star opening in Phuket was around 1994," Mr Hecker explained.

"We're very optimistic about Phuket, and in fact Phang Nga Bay's whole future," he added.

"There is still more product diversification, access and overall inventory that can be improved. The demand is there to support it. Thailand has huge international goodwill. The destination has longevity right up there with the the Riviera and Hawaii," he said.

Bill Barnett, Managing Director of Phuket-based consultancy C9 Hotelworks, is equally optimistic about the potential for growth in the upper end of the market.

"Phuket remains a very at-

The era of small 'no-name' hotels on Phuket is giving way to a boom in big brands and big developments. **Stephen Fein** reports.

tractive hospitality investment," he said. "It has surpassed Bali as the region's leisure destination because of a favorable political climate, proximity to a major international air hub in Bangkok, and faster door-to-door travel from places such as Hong Kong, Singapore and Kuala Lumpur.

"It has long-haul and shorthaul capacity and a vibrant domestic market that is growing apace with improvements in the Thai economy," he said.

Tourism Authority of Thailand figures for the 2003 January-March quarter reveal that Thais accounted for about onequarter of the hotel rooms in Phuket.

Mr Barnett thinks international hotel chains investing here will do well.

"When it comes to returns on investment, most five-star hotels here attain more that 50% gross operating profit [before fixed and financial charges], which means they enjoy lucrative bottom-line results.

"With less then 10 international brands, there is great potential for growth. These brands will help the destination mature, ensure international markets are being hit, and improve service standards.

"Phuket should be able to see sustained short- and mediumterm growth and remains a safe haven for investment and tourism," he added.

Michael Cowan, another C9 Hotelworks Director, is currently doubling as interim GM at the 318-room Karon Villa, which was bought by LaSalle Investment Management and will be rebranded some time next year, though it has not yet been determined which international operator will be chosen.

"Jones Lang LaSalle Hotels is conducting this exercise with numerous international hotel operators showing interest. We expect the selection to be completed in early 2004," Mr Cowan said.

"The hotel will close in April 2004 for extensive redesign and refurbishment.

This program will deliver a first-class resort. LaSalle is proposing to retain staff during closure and embark on an intense staff training exercise," he added.

Jones Lang LaSalle, which released results of a Investor Sentiment Survey in December, reported that Phuket is the most sought-after market in Asia-Pacific for acquiring existing hotel assets and developing new projects.

Mr Cowan said, "C9 Hotelworks considers Phuket the best hotel resort location in Thailand in the long term. The provinces of Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi will develop into a regional tourist hub, but Phuket will continue to be the central destination.

"Regionally, Phuket is already well-positioned and will continue to improve through increases in direct international airline traffic," he added.

Typically, international brands do not invest in the projects they manage. They are usually hired to manage or "brand" properties that are most often owned locally.

The expansion of international brands therefore depends



Horwath Asia's Mr Hecker explained that, compared with their counterparts in Bali, developers in Phuket have traditionally been less willing to hire international operators.

Instead, they have preferred to build three- or four-star hotels, which are easier to operate effectively without a brand, and to rely on major tour wholesalers for marketing.

But there have been other

obstacles to international chains investing here.

"The availability and price of suitable sites have been the major obstacles to five-star development in Phuket," Mr Hecker said.

"While the Asian financial crisis and the resulting depreciation of the baht helped to reduce land prices and make them more attractive to foreign buyers, it

seems that issues relating to the confirmation of land title deeds continue to limit foreign investment and five-star hotel expansion in Phuket," he added.

With land ownership issues in Thailand problematic at best, and local hotel owners wary of turning control over to foreign managers, one approach used by the Best Western chain has been to brand properties under its name while leaving management in local hands, as it did with the Phuket Ocean Resort in Karon and the newly-opened Best Western Bang Tao Beach Resort and Spa.

With the range of alternatives for local hotel owners to brand themselves increasing. along with strong demand from international hotel chains to get a foot in the door, the upward swing in foreign investment in the Phuket market may be just beginning.


If the trend continues, the presence of international hotel chains could eventually reach a critical mass that would make it an embarrassment for big-name operators not to have their name on a property on the island.

The mystique of 'yang para'

o many Westerners, a rubber plant is something that grows in a tub and sits in an apartment corner, gathering dust on its leaves. The popular indoor plant is just a small part of the story of rubber.

On Phuket, latex from a very different kind of rubber tree – known in Thailand as the *yang para* – flows through the veins of the island's history. Even today, with tourism the local economy's main source of income, rubber remains a major export for the island and Thailand.

There was a time when rubber was seen by all as a miracle product, and while it is now treated as an ordinary component of

everyday items such as tires and gloves, it still retains mystique.

Making tourists and locals more knowledgeable about rubber and the industry that has grown up around it is the main aim of the new Agro Tourism of Phuket Service Center for Crops and Production Resources (SC-CPR).

The title may be a bit of a mouthful but the SCCPR's newly opened premises in Pa Khlok evoke the spirit of the rubber plant, sitting on 144 rai of mostly traditional plantation.

About 10 million baht has been invested in the project, according to Thanatsanee Sawatdirak, Chief of Phuket Agriculture and Cooperatives.

The location, once the office of the Phuket Rubber Exper-

iment Station, has been in the process of change since 2002 and was opened on December 18.

"We have kept many activities that revolve around the rubber tree," K. Thanatsanee said.

Discovery of the rubber plant in tropical Brazil in the 19th century was followed over the next few decades by exploitation of the plant's remarkable latex in plantations across Southeast Asia.

There are 173 varieties of rubber plant, each with different characteristics.

At Pa Khlok, visitors can see the whole process: from the tapping of trees, through the processing of the raw natural material, to the many rubber products that make life today more enjoyable or convenient.

There are delightful added attractions in the shape of 200 species of local plants, including forest orchids, palms, local varieties of fruit, flowers, herbs, trees and vegetables.

To fully absorb the tranquility and beauty of the plantation, visitors have the opportunity to stay in guest houses there for 50 baht a night each. The three guesthouses, with shower and toilet facilities, can each hold up to 10 people.

There are also 30 tents available with sleeping bags. Some tents can hold between four and six people at 100 baht a tent a night while smaller tents hold two or three people at 50 baht a tent a night.

A clean shower-toilet block

serves campers and there's a small restaurant to make campfire cooking unnecessary.

A conference room that can hold about 80 people is available, so the rubber expo is an ideal environment for combining relaxation with work or with school-related activities.

Entrance to the site is free. It is open daily from 8 am to 4 pm. Groups are recommended to book ahead.

50,000 more joined sex trade in '03

he number of sex workers rose by 50,000 last year despite improving economic conditions and the government's war on poverty, according to a report by Chulalongkorn University researcher Dr Nitet Tinnakul.

His work showed that between 1999 and 2002, there were about 2.8 million sex workers in Thailand. Of these, two million were adult females, 20,000 were adult males and 800,000 were boys and girls under the age of 18. The number of sex service outlets was 60,000.

The 2003 survey, based on interviews with sex workers, showed that more Thais are turning to the sex trade to earn a living. He said the increase shows that the government's war against poverty has been ineffective.

War on drunk driving: The government has enacted five roadsafety measures in a bid to prevent a repeat of the road carnage seen during the six-day holiday period, which resulted in at least 612 deaths throughout the country, along with 25,580 injuries and 3.4 billion baht in damages.

The new measures include: strict enforcement of traffic rules; penalties for police who do not enforce the law; empowering highway police to direct traffic on secondary rural roads; designating state employees as role models for road rules and a yearround campaign to raise roadsafety awareness; and detaining drunk motorists overnight pending a court hearing.

Currently, penalties of up to three months in jail and a 20,000baht fine for drunk drivers are seldom imposed because cases rarely reach court, one proponent of the new measures noted.

BOOK BURNING: Students sift through the charred remains of textbooks at **Muang Narathiwat** School, one of 20 public schools torched in the recent violence in Thailand's deep south provinces. At first blamed on bandits, the raids were later attributed to panregional Islamic separatists.

Forest food bank: Funds will be allocated to communities to reforest degraded areas with edible and medicinal plants and create local food banks, says Natural Resources and Environment Minister Prapat Panyachatraksa.

The project, intended to promote self-sufficiency through the use of natural resources, is designed to follow the government's fight against poverty by making rural Thais more self-reliant.

K. Prapat fears that opposition from the National Parks. Wildlife and Plant Variety Protection Department may be a major obstacle to the plan because senior officials in these departments do not believe communities are able to effectively manage natural resources.

Schoolboy hooligans black*listed:* Following the worst-ever spate of violence among students in Bangkok, vocational schools there have submitted lists of delinquents and students prone to commit offenses to Education Minister Adisai Bodharamik, as ordered.

Some 233 students were named on the lists, 163 of them from the area's 29 state vocational schools. Of these schools, eight submitted blank lists, saying they had no students in the two categories on their rolls.

The other 70 students on the blacklist attend private vocational schools. Of the area's 95 such schools, however, only seven submitted names, the rest insisting they did not have any students who brawl.



Starting over: The Permanent Secretary of the Justice Ministry, Somchai Wongsawat, said the ministry will seek "soft loans" for inmates to start businesses after

their release.

K. Somchai said details of

conditions for the loans have yet to be decided, but they would be similar to the soft loans offered to small and medium enterprises (SMEs).

The announcement follows the government's recent decision to cut back its student loan program, limiting it to university students, after it learned that failure of younger students to repay loans was creating a mountain of bad debt.

Justice for all: The Administrative Court is considering waiving court fees for cases involving underprivileged plaintiffs.

Court President Akkrathorn Chularat said existing fees, calculated as 2.5% of the damages involved and not exceeding 200,000 baht, were minimal but still more than many people could afford to pay.

The new rules on court fees are expected to take effect this year, he said.

esort owners and tourists have been outraged by an order from the Khuk Kak Tambon Administration Organization (*Or-BorTor*) barring sunloungers and umbrellas from beaches.

It is great to keep beaches in pristine condition. But it is impossible to promote an area for tourism then ban what a would-be tourist in the depths of winter dreams about and yearns for: a sunchair, an umbrella and a cool drink on the beach.

If the *OrBorTor* suceeds with this ban, Khao Lak would be a rare beach in Thailand, one without sunchairs and shade. I asked tourists what they thought and among the responses were:

"We will not come to Khao Lak anymore if we cannot have a proper chair and sunshade on the beach. We are 65 and 67 years old and not willing to sit on a mat or towel while the sun fries us like chickens, without sunshades," said Michel and Marion Weller of Germany.

Paul Wells, 52, from England, remarked, "This is a completely stupid idea and I can hardly believe that this is true. No sunchairs? Why?

"This is a tourism destination. If the government or *OrBor-Tor* wants to have an empty beach, they should close down all resorts and give the investors their money back.

"If this law is enforced, I'll go to stay in Phuket or Krabi in 2004, but not Khao Lak. I have also thought about investing here and perhaps buying a small house – now I will have to think about that again."

Other responses were similar. I hope that the *OrBorTor* reconsiders before Khao Lak's tourists and investors run away.

Sunlounger ban a hot topic

Gala gift that guests hated:
Hotels and their restaurant man-

Hotels and their restaurant managers had reason to smile over Christmas and New Year, thanks to some special arrangements that angered some guests.

These two special days turned out to be poor days for many restaurants in Khao Lak. All the tourists stayed at the resorts because of overpriced, compulsory Christmas and New Year gala dinners – charged to guests whether they wanted them or not.

A couple from Sweden, were outraged: "We wanted to meet friends at a seafood restaurant to celebrate in private.

"We told the resort management that we didn't want to participate in any gala dinner and that we were not willing to pay for something we did not order and had no use for.

"After a long discussion that went from the front desk to the back office and all the way up to the owner, they agreed to return 50% of the gala dinner fee to us.

"But the whole situation left a sour aftertaste. In the end, we paid 2,800 baht for nothing. Without our complaint, it would have been 5,600 baht. For that money, you can have great dinners for two in a beachside seafood restaurant all week.

"Next time, we will book a small private bungalow. We will enjoy the freedom to come and go when we want and to eat and party where we want.

"We believe that many other guests are thinking the same, but are too frightened or too shy to discuss this issue with the resort management.

"Perhaps they fear it will make them look cheap. But this is not about the money, it is about the principle." **Tourists not buying:** Although this season has been reported by some as the best ever, the reality is different. "The tourists [here] walk around and look, but they won't buy anything – or they buy very small, cheap stuff, perhaps a T-shirt or something equally inexpensive," was the chorus from my street and souvenir vendor research.

Dive shops and tour operators were less united. Some admitted it has been their worst season so far. Others said that even though it has been a slow start, the numbers for the second half of December leave room for

optimism and may buffer the disappointing beginning.

Most restaurant owners said that numbers slowly went up to normal by the end of Decem-

ber. I hesitated to talk to resort managers because they always claim to be fully booked, regardless of the true numbers.

Overseas travel operators may have taken up allotments resulting in full booking sheets – but the many empty rooms, even in the bigger and more exclusive resorts, tell a different tale.

The potential is definitely there for a flourishing tourism market in Khao Lak. People like the area. Many say that they prefer Khao Lak to Phuket, Krabi and Samui.

Plenty of bums, no seats:

Travel magazines and travel operators overseas have been promoting Khao Lak like never before, but visitor numbers have stalled. What's the problem?

One factor is that life is getting tougher in Europe, as reflected by last year's top sales slogan in Germany: "Geiz ist geil!" (stinginess is sexy). If having to count each penny twice is something that sexually stimulates a person, then there will be a baby boom in Germany in 2004.

But there is also the saying, "A good slogan can prevent thinking for more than 50 years."


And this is the one I believe in.

Even though less money in the pockets of Europeans may be part of the problem, limited flight capacity during peak season seems to be doing the most damage. People want to visit Thailand, especially

Khao Lak, but there are not enough birds to carry them here. It seems the airlines are too slow in reacting to supply and demand.

A Germany-based dive travel operator told me that it was very hard to get connecting and direct Phuket flights for December-January and that he had lost a lot of potential bookings because of the unavailability of flights.



More than 20,000 people on Phuket are from the provinces that make up Northern Thailand and Kijja Pongprapas, 54, is the acting chairman of the Phuket Andaman Society of Northern Thais (PASNT), a club that aims to support and befriend Northerners in the south.

Chief Reporter **Sangkhae Leelanapaporn** asked him about himself and the club.

Gazette: Can you tell me a little about your background?

K. Kijja: I was born in Lampang and lived there until I was 20 before moving around the country – Bangkok, Nakhon Ratchasima, Pattaya, Chiang Mai and finally Phuket – as my profession in the hotel business demanded. I've been here for 25 years now and plan to stay here the rest of my life.

I first moved here as part of the management team for the Pansea – now The Chedi – Hotel. I then opened a restaurant called Mai Ruay Mai Lerk and, more recently, a seafood restaurant called "Lobster and Prawn".

But I have now left my businesses in the hands of my family and I spend my time playing golf and painting watercolors – I am also chairman of the Phuket Amateur Watercolor Club and plan to open a gallery.

Gazette: What is the background of the PASNT? Why did you start the club?

K. Kijja: PASNT was set


up four years ago because I kept meeting people with a northern Thai accent and thought that it would be good for us to do more than just say "hello" once in a while.

The association is for Northerners to share their culture, to help one another with problems and to support each other's businesses.

Setting up PASNT has also given us the chance to support the Phuket community. We want to stay here and feel that we should give something back to our adoptive society. We concentrate mainly on raising funds for student scholarships in Phuket.

Gazette: How many Northern Thais do you estimate there are on Phuket, and what are their professions?

K. Kijja: Around 20,000 people from the north of Thailand live on Phuket but PASNT has only 600 members, each of whom pays 50 baht for a permanent membership. Most of the people we know of are employed by private companies or are govern-

These events are not just for northern Thais but for everyone as we would like to promote our culture to as many people as possible. They are a little bit of luxury for us and it is wonderful

Our latest event is Kin Hom *Tom Muan* – essentially meeting, eating and enjoying ourselves and having lots of fun.

Gazette: You obviously love the Northern culture. Have you considered going back there to live?

K. Kijja: I'm happy living in Phuket and don't think that I will leave here, but I do go back to visit my mother in Chiang Mai every year. I also make a special effort to visit an old teacher of mine up there, but I save those journeys for the hot season as I don't like the cool weather up north. The climate in Phuket is very good by comparison.

I like Phuket for other rea-

sons too, especially the people. Phuketians are plain-speaking, smart-looking and sincere - qualities I appreciate.

Gazette: Has the North seen many people travel to Patong to work in prostitution? Can this problem be solved?

K. Kijja: It is a problem, but I'm not sure what can be done about it. Perhaps these people have no other opportunities and have to survive somehow. Society hasn't helped them much and if they do not cause a problem for the wider community, then we are in no position to criticize them.


We would try to help them if they came to the club but they are too embarrassed about their job to join PASNT.

No riddle to the Sphinx's success

ut the words "entertainment" and "Patong" together, and what kind of image do you come up with? Sadly but inevitably, the words sleazy and tawdry usually spring to mind.

The Sphinx isn't like that. Actually, the Sphinx isn't like anything that Phuket has seen. The Sphinx is classy, innovative and refreshing and not the slightest bit sleazy or tawdry.

But then, if like the legendary sphinx

you had the head of a woman and the body of a lion, you'd probably expect to stand out just a little, wouldn't you? And the Sphinx certainly does that – once you've found it.

When people talk about theater-restaurants, they usually mean places that serve up entertainment for an audience who half-watch the show while half-eating what passes for dinner. It's always a far from satisfactory arrangement. People often leave half-entertained and half-fed.

The Sphinx, however, is a restaurant *and* a the-

ater – the restaurant downstairs, and the theater above. But blink as you drive along Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd, and you may miss it.

There is no huge neon sign, no gaudy billboard, just a subtle frontage set well back from the street. As you enter, you begin to wonder, "Am I really still in downtown Patong?"

Inside, the question becomes even more relevant. About 30 million baht has been invested in the bricks and mortar makeover for the project, and it shows.

The restaurant, with room for about 60 diners, has an elegant bar in one corner and is decorated in a manner that reeks of quality. Yet – and it's a very big yet – the

prices have been kept within the 120-130 baht range for the mostly Thai dishes.

It's comparable to any classy restaurant on the island, although there are not too many up to this standard in Patong. However, the real delight for after-darkers comes upstairs, in the theater. For anyone who misses the kind of stage facilities that most big Western cities have, it's a discovery that should make them smile.

The body of the theater slopes down

to a small stage, but you won't find any uncomfortable fold-down wooden seats here.

The choice is between two large, comfortable sofas where the stalls would normally be, or individual lounge chairs a little further back, with plenty of small drinks tables for those glasses of wine or Champagne.

There are two shows each night except Tuesdays, at 8:30 pm and 10:30 pm. And there's more good news: the early and late shows are different, so it's possible to catch the

early one, then go downstairs and eat and come back up for the second show.

This sounds like a big invitation to freeloaders. When I put it to the Sphinx's David Shrubsole that someone could walk in, watch the early show, have a few drinks and a feed somewhere else, then come back and watch the second show for free, he embraced the concept enthusiastically.

"Yes!" he said, "That's fine. There's
no charge for the show. People can enjoy
themselves at no cost and if they want to
come back, that's great, too."

What's more, one of the shows changes every week, so Freddie the Freeloader can keep coming back on a regular

basis. Something for nothing – how's that for good value?

You may think that, at that price, the shows have to be fairly ordinary. Not so. I caught the late show, with the all-male troupe of dancers and mime artists performing an hour's worth of songs from *Cabaret* and *Evita*.

"What good is sitting alone in your room . . . "

There were all sorts of subtle Thai touches and costume changes and an overwhelming enthusiasm that came through in every number. The applause came easily and the hour passed all too fast. It was great fun, with an attentive waiter on hand to replenish drinks at speed.

The cast may have been all male, but Sally Bowles and Eva Peron were believably feminine and there was none of the gay posturing that can be so offputting. It was pure fun for all the family.

Mr Shrubsole, who worked on *Cats* and other big musical productions in Australia before moving to Thailand about 10

years ago, helps generate the energy that keeps the ensemble of 10 at their peak through five hours of rehearsals and two performances most days.

Coming up are shows that bracket tunes from *Miss Saigon*, *Cabaret* and *Chicago*, along with a new *Hooray for Hollywood* tribute to the movies, and a reprise of the Sphinx's popular New Year special, *Top Hat and Tails*.

The potential for intimate live classical music, jazz performances or stand-up comedy will not be lost on anyone who patronizes the Sphinx.

Restaurant manager Songsuwang "Mac" Reoriab and Mr Shrubsole, who is accurately titled Creative Director, deserve a round of applause – twice a night, except on Tuesdays. Even if the place is hard to find.





A card to bring balance to the world

n this imperfect world we live in, a crude dualism pre vails. Every yin has its yang, every night has its day, every up has its down, every east has its west, every dog has its cat, every Tweedledum has his Tweedledee, and every George W Bush has his Saddam Hussein.

Sages tell us that the key to peace and harmony lies in keeping these opposing forces in balance. When the balance is violated, disorder will ensue.

Currently, Thailand is suffering from a gross imbalance. The government is offering the Thailand Elite card to rich foreigners who have a million baht



PowerPoint can be set to deliver a presentation unattended, with video clips, sounds, even your own voice narration. Record your slide show once and distribute it you've become obsolete.



With what PowerPoint can do, who needs you?

have just finished writing a new book. It's hard to de scribe how good it feels to escape that 16-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week agony. It took three months to write, and the publishers of the Dummies series, John Wiley & Sons, will take three more months to edit, lay out, publish and distribute the beast. Not bad for a 480-page book that's crammed with new tips.

In celebration, I figured I'd give you a sneak peek at the Office 2003 Timesaving Techniques For Dummies that the rest of the world won't see until April.

This timesaver involves setting up a PowerPoint slide show to run by itself. It's pretty cool, and I know many folk in Phuket who could use this capability.

No doubt you realize that PowerPoint makes it relatively easy to create slide shows that sizzle and zap. Even if you don't have much to say, PowerPoint can help you say it with panache. You can make individual bullet points whirl, blink or pop into place, accompanied by sounds or color effects.

Last year in this column I explained how to put together a graph that flies up on the screen bar-by-bar. You can even include video clips that launch as the slide comes up – full of sound and fury, possibly signifying something.

Few people realize that you can automate an entire presentation so it runs by itself: you start the presentation, and it goes through all your song and dance without any human intervention. When the presentation's done, PowerPoint starts over again.

You set the slide animations and timing in advance. If you want each bullet point to swerve in, with a five-second delay between appearances, PowerPoint

In broad terms, here's how to do it:

Create your presentation as you normally would and run a rehearsal timing by clicking Slide Show | Rehearse Timings. PowerPoint starts the slide show, and

puts a clock in the upper left corner. Run through the presentation at the same speed that you want it to run by itself – click to bring up bullets, to run video clips, or to do all the things you want the presentation to do.

You can monkey around with the clock if you flub a slide and need to re-set the timing, but it's much easier if you can simply run the presentation all the way through.

When the slide show finishes, PowerPoint asks if you want to save the new timings. If you're happy with the way the rehearsal went, click Yes. That's the key: it sets up the timings that PowerPoint will use to run the slide show automatically.

Finally, you need to tell PowerPoint to run the slideshow unattended. For reasons I've never completely understood, this is called "kiosk mode" in Power-Point, although unattended presentations have plenty of applications outside of stand-alone kiosks. Regardless, to get PowerPoint in an unattended mood, click Slide Show | Set Up Show, check the box marked "Browsed at a Kiosk (Full Screen)", then

It's amazingly easy to use PowerPoint to run customized, continuously looping presentations – and the presentations can include just about any kind of animation or sound, with or without the traditional PowerPoint bullet points.

The "kiosk" can run on a shop counter top, at a trade show, or even projected on a giant screen behind Thai pop star Tata Young at her next concert. Well worth the effort.

Fleshpots and flash spots: spot the difference

In the bars off Soi Bangla, police occasionally poke their heads through doors to ensure that no offending flesh is on display in possible contravention of the Thai Penal Code. Yet on Phuket's beaches, women tourists of all shapes, sizes and ages reveal breasts of all shapes, sizes and ages.

When officials are asked about this apparent double standard, the dodging and weaving is close to comical. Yet Section 388 states, "Whoever does any shameful act in public by indecently exposing his or her person, or by committing any other indecent act, shall be punished with a fine not exceeding 500 baht."

The law, like similar edicts in many countries, does not define "indecent". What it means is that it is up to the authorities to decide – and to make such a charge stick.

The government is plainly against the flashing of breasts, not only in a-go-go bars but even on the catwalks of Bangkok's top fashion houses. Yet when it comes to the beaches of Phuket, most officials seem terrified of banning exposed breasts for fear that the tourists will all run away.

This seems odd when one considers the Middle East state of Dubai. Although not a strict Muslim society, Dubai is definite about its laws on showing too much flesh. Yet Dubai still manages to attract about 3 million tourists a year.

This is not to say that the *Gazette* believes Phuket should follow Dubai's lead, only that the authorities should not use the danger to tourism as an excuse for the confusion in their minds.

The real question is whether bare breasts on beaches are indecent. Invoking the affront to "Thai culture" is spurious. Just 70 or 80 years ago, bare breasts were a common sight in Thai villages. Even today, elderly women can be seen performing their ablutions at the well topless, without the slightest care.

Is the nipple-flashing model any different from the Bangla bar dancer? Both aim to provoke a reaction – but in private. On the other hand, beaches are public places where a visiting preacher and his modestly-clothed family might be offended by the exposure of body parts. The same preacher and his family seem unlikely to pop into Playschool or Bunnies – a-go-go bars are not nearly as public as the beach.

Perhaps it is a case of looking at the motive of the exposer: for a suntan, or as a commercial come-on. Meanwhile, watching the fumblings of the authorities promises to be fine sport. – **The Editor**

Tough school rules cause suffering

No one could dispute that the level of proficiency in English among Thais in Phuket is low, and it clearly hampers the island's development in tourism and information technology.

Last year it appeared that the government was finally going to do something positive about this situation by encouraging schools to employ native-Englishspeakers to teach students.

However, problems began with a very unattractive employment contract from Bangkok that gave schools the opportunity to claim any spare moment of foreign teachers' time at a salary that is low compared with those being offered elsewhere.

Foreign teachers in Thai schools must pay for their own work permits and visa costs. We accept this, albeit with reservations, but are now extremely dismayed to discover that one-year extensions to stay will no longer be issued to us.

This will mean that, unless we can afford to return to the West each year where a one-year multiple-entry visa is more easily obtainable, we will have to make two trips a year to obtain double-entry visas in nearby countries, plus 'visa runs' to extend our permits to stay in between.

All of this will have to be paid out of our own pockets, together with a yet-to-be-confirmed increase in the cost of a work permit.

Many of us are starting to weigh up the options of working in other countries, where our commitment and skills are actively appreciated.

The government should be doing much more to encourage native English-speaking teachers to want to stay and work in Thailand. Currently, they are only demonstrating that we are here on sufferance. Any attempt at reasonable discussion is met with the attitude, "If you don't like it, you can leave."

Jet ski owners do put safety first

n Phuket there are 130 jet ski operators with 170 jet skis. One hundred operators have received stickers after registering with the Phuket Marine Office. The others need to present more paperwork – for example, those who have secondhand jet skis that have incomplete papers.

The Phuket Jet Ski Club covers three areas – Kata-Karon, Patong and Bang Tao. The club was set up in 1998. Before then, each of these areas had its own jet ski club.

Most of the jet skis are at Patong. Our club has organized the provision of floats to separate areas for swimming and for jet skis. We do everything to meet regulations.

There are not only jet ski operators on the beaches but other businesses including longtails, parasailing and tour boats. We all share the areas so they are also elements of the problem - not just the jet skis.

In 1998, we put together a list of 13 problems concerning jet ski operation and proposed discussions with the provincial government to find ways to solve all these problems.

But we received no cooperation from officials. For example, many jet skis have come to the beaches. We asked officials to check whether they were illegal, but they didn't.

The officers also provided no equipment for zoning the specific areas for swimming and jet skis. The club had to buy the

Since 1998, a few serious accidents have occured.

We have managed the zoning while the officers have never cooperated with us. They only talk and have never come to meet us or see what the situation really is.

Patong Municipality in particular has never supported us. They have never understood what we do. We have sent many letters to government organizations asking for cooperation but nothing happens. When there's a problem, they just come by to

The provincial government always proposes something impossible. They don't really know about jet ski problems. They want to enforce a law that only people who have jet ski driving licenses can drive one [with tourists riding as passengers].

It's impossible for everyone who rents a jet ski to have a jet ski driving license. The authorities should look at other problems

Weerachai Tonghom, 45, is President of the Phuket Jet Ski Club, which is facing a ban on jet-skis within seven years following collisions that killed a 13-yearold German boy and a 19-year-old Swede. He puts his arguments in favor of the jet-ski operators.



It's the same as renting motorbikes. There are many road accidents for them to be concerned about - not just jet ski accidents, which happen only very

If people can't drive, we will have someone drive for them. I agree that children should not drive jet skis. The suitable ages for driving should be a topic to consider. I think that those under 16 years old should not be allowed to drive a jet ski.

We are willing to cooperate if officers really want to solve this problem. Our club also controls the number of jet skis in each area. We explain things to people before they rent a jet ski. For example, we tell them about specific areas where they can drive. But some people drive recklessly, which can cause ac-

The Phuket Governor has said that jet skis should be phased out within seven years, but I think there are many other problems that need addressing beside jet skis, including the number of beach chairs, food vendors and beach encroachment by business

Most jet ski operators were once fishermen who became jet ski operators because Phuket was promoted as a tourist destination. They earned 100 baht a day from fishing but they can earn 1,000 baht a day from this tourism busi-

I will stand up for their rights, even though I don't own a jet ski. I want justice for Phuket people who don't work

I grew up here. I know and understand what is happening on the beach. When there are problems, people usually assume that everything is wrong.

Within these seven years [announced by the Governor] we will do our best to comply with any regulations announced. When the seven years are up, and we have done really well, how can they take away our right to work in this business?

How good is bank security against hackers?

When I use an ATM machine, I keep the withdrawal slip that the machine spits out.

Last week, when I was checking off my withdrawal records against my Krung Thai savings book, I noticed that the entire account number is printed on the slip. The same was true of the withdrawal slips from my Siam Commercial Bank account.

I appreciate that banks have safeguards against unauthorized people using this information at the bank counter. But what security is in place to stop a hacker trying to log into an account that has online banking access?

I feel secure, because I destroy my ATM slips. But, judging from the ground around most ATMs, some people should definitely be concerned.

The account number shown on the ATM slip is to confirm that confirm to customers that they the correct account has been ac-

This is evidence that confirms your transaction, and every bank account holder should keep the transaction slip safe.

There is no danger to their accounts at all, however, because every bank operation is backed up by security systems such as the ATM user's PIN code.

As for the imagined hacker, the bank has a strong security system to protect against hacking, even when (using some types of card) people reveal their account number to buy something.

Pongsak Kanghae, Deputy Manager of Krung Thai Bank, Phuket Town, replies:

The full bank account number is printed on the ATM slip to are dealing with the right account.

I have never heard of a hacker accessing an account. Usually when there is a problem of theft from an account it arises from the account holder being careless about his security.

Everyone should be security-conscious. When you have finished using the ATM, keep the slip so that you can verify account transactions – then, if there is a problem you can bring the slips to the bank to check.

Otherwise, you should destroy the slips, not throw them away, as they carry details of your account.

Tackling the misery of period pains

or a few days every month, almost every woman in the world experiences the discomfort of period pains, or dysmenorrhea.

European studies show that 70% of young women regularly take analgesics for dysmenorrhea and at least 50% say that the pain often disrupts their

behind severe period pains, a condition called endometriosis, to be diagnosed.

Endometriosis occurs when some of this lining (endometrium) is found outside your uterus in other areas of the body such as the ovaries or bowel. This bleeds during your period caus-

The pain of periods is caused by contractions of the womb, similar to those of another pain that women suffer – labor.

Mild contractions constantly pass through the muscular wall of the womb, but usually go unnoticed. During menstruation, these contractions are more pronounced than normal (during labor they are stronger yet).

Each contraction causes the womb's blood supply to be tem-

porarily reduced as the blood vessels in the muscle wall are compressed. As the tissues are starved of oxygen, pain-triggering chemicals are released.

At the same time the body is also releasing a hormone called prostaglandin, which induces stronger contrac-

tions, which may directly cause pain in the womb. As the contractions get stronger, so the pain

The aim is to help the womb shed its delicate lining (as a period) allowing a new lining to be grown each month ready for a fertilized egg to implant itself. This is an essential part of female fertility, but pain can result.

The cause of dysmenorrhea should always be investigated but,

as a very rough guide, suffering from severe period pains since menstruation first started means that it's less likely that a particular cause will be found. Even if this is the case, other factors, especially stress, can make the pain more difficult to cope with. Treating these contributory elements may reduce the pain.

There are many exceptions to this guide, and conditions such as endometriosis can sometimes cause severe pain from an early age. Other causes of period pains include fibroids, pelvic inflammatory disease or a narrowing of the cervix.

The best guide to seeking help is when the pain really begins to interfere with your life. The first step is to try some simple treatments to see which works for you.

• Exercise: you may not feel like it but it's a natural way to ease pain. Try gentle walking, swimming or cycling.

• Complementary thera-

pies: try herbal treatments such as evening primrose oil capsules, raspberry leaf tea or mulberry tea (ton mon in Thai) throughout your cycle.

But if neither of these controls the pain, then you should talk to your doctor, who may try one of the following:

• Painkillers: always take them as directed by your doctor. Mefenamic

acid and ibuprofen can be effective, as can aspirin – itself an antiprostaglandin – but which should not be taken in combination with with mefenamic acid.

Take them regularly throughout the day; don't wait for the pain to become unbearable.

• TENS: Transcutaneous Electronic Nerve Stimulation is a technique to control period – and other - pains.

Small electrodes are placed on the skin to stimulate nerves in the pelvic area in a way which reduces pain.

This technique, popular in Europe, is little used so far in Thailand.

• **Hormones**: pescribed progestogens or combined oral contraceptive pills can work extremely well but there may be some cultural problems in their use here.

Women are expected to simply grin and bear menstrual pain. This expectation that dysmenorrhea is normal may explain why it takes - on average eight years for the commonest cause, endometriosis, to

If these measures fail to control the pain or your doctor thinks that endometriosis or other conditions may be a possibility, then more detailed investigations may be recommended.

Ultrasound tests or minor laparoscopy may be used to determine the cause.

Surgery to rebe diagnosed. move the endometrium – although not

generally considered a cure – can bring long-term relief.

The final, most drastic, option for some women who find period pain unbearable is hysterectomy.

Next time, Pre-Menstrual Tension, described by one wit as "experienced by women, suffered by men".

ecently, I have noticed increasing interest in investment in Thailand's improving stock market. The rise in the Thai stock market looks set to continue as a number of factors support this

The most important is continued economic growth. Thailand is likely to show growth of at least 7% for 2004. In addition, low interest rates, subdued inflationary pressures and rising corporate profits are also positive fac-

For the individual investor, Asia is not the easiest region to put money into. It is essential that an investor have in-depth knowledge of the economy and political situation in the country where it may appear attractive to invest.

However, conducting research on individual companies in Asia can be a daunting task, made more difficult by local accounting methods that have little similarity to global norms.

Insider trading is an everyday consideration in many Asian countries and very often there is inadequate supervision by national authorities. China, for example, has only 10 people to su-

Cocktail recipe for safer plays

pervise all the stock exchanges and all companies operating in the country.

The solution to such problems is to use a mutual fund, unit trust or offshore fund. The fund should ideally invest in a number of coun-

tries. This allows the fund managers to partially or completely remove investments from countries in Asia or to concentrate investment in preferred countries.

Using a fund to invest in several countries is known as the "cocktail" approach and certainly reduces risk. It also offers a wider choice of good investments than those available through a singlecountry fund.

Where a fund invests in one country and the fund manager is unhappy about that country, it is standard practice to convert up to 30% of the assets of the fund into cash. It is very unusual to increase the cash component beyond 30% for several reasons. First, the fund manager is not being paid management fees for

having the investment sit in cash. The investor can do that by himself without paying management fees. Second, a fund manager might be wrong; sometimes he is simply too close to the situation and lacks perspective.

Investment funds that cover Asia fall into two major categories: those that include Japan and those that do not. This is a vital factor as all investment funds of reasonable standard are required to choose an index so their performance can be measured. Japan has the largest stock market in Asia – in terms of market capitalization it is the second largest in the world.

Where a fund includes Japan as a possible investment destination, the fund will usually

closely follow the index. Merely because of the Japanese market's size the percentage of the fund invested in Japan will always be high.

However, unlike most of Asia, Japan is not an emerg-

ing market. It is a first-world economy and its growth and stock market performance have been generally poor for more than a decade. Should this continue it will affect investment performance compared with investment funds that exclude Japan. A number of indices offer the choice of including or excluding

Many investment funds that cover Asia do not include India, which is a mistake. The Indian stock market is long-established and the underlying economy is robust with many quality companies in which to invest. It virtually doubled in value in 2003 and economic growth rates for 2004 currently look likely to exceed

At present, Asia appears the most attractive area to invest in as the region is enjoying the fastest economic growth in the

But Asia is not for the fainthearted; investment returns can be spectacular in the good times, but when the party comes to an end there are likely to be some sharp losses in investors' portfo-

Asia still affords good value to investors and it can be reasonably assumed that this will continue for some time. However, it is worth bearing in mind the old adage that an investor has made a profit only when the holdings have been sold and converted to

New cruise line sails into Andaman market

PATONG: Luxurious surroundings and every convenience for a pleasant and relaxing stay are nothing new for holidaymakers in this part of the world, but a flysail-hotel package seems to be something of an innovation.

ADIAcara, a 200-meterlong, 38,600-ton cruise liner, began operations in the Andaman and Gulf of Thailand in November last year and now visits Phuket every fortnight, plowing the seas between here and Laem Chabang in Chon Buri province.

Catering to an almost-exclusively German clientele, AIDAcara will steam the Mediterranean between April and October each year then travel east to allow passengers to escape the European winter.

AIDA is a subsidiary of Seetours, itself under the aegis of the mammoth Carnival Group, which also includes the Cunard and P&O cruise lines.

AIDAcara, launched in 1996 from a Finnish shipyard, has 650 cabins accommodating 1,100 passengers, served by a crew of al-

Raymond Honings, Managing Director of AIDA in Asia, explained, "Around 900 passengers fly to Thailand - Bangkok or Phuket - by charter aircraft every Thursday and board the ship either in Laem Chabang or Phuket.

'Another 100 to 200 begin or end their journey in a Phuket hotel, so it's always around 900 passengers whom we fly in or out each week.

The price for the flight, week-long cruise, and hotel stay of up to a fortnight in a Phuket hotel is around 2,000 Euros (approximately 100,000 baht) but, as Mr Honings explained, the choice of cabin, single-person supplements, and hotel options can affect the price.

Most passengers, he said, prefer resorts such as the JW Marriott, Merlin Beach, Kata Thani or Rydges, with all-in costs obviously higher for the more upmarket resorts.

Mr Honings told the Gazette that most of the customers know about AIDA from the Internet, or from brochures and tour agencies, though only in Germany. About 95% of the passengers are German with most of the remainder coming from neighboring European countries. Cruises are not directly reserved or sold in Thailand.

AIDAcara is not the only liner cruising these waters and the Gazette asked Orachorn Saisritong, local manager of Star Cruises, whether the *AIDAcara* will affect that company's cruise

"I don't think it will as AIDA and Star Cruises cater for different clients," said K. Orachorn. "Most of our passengers come from India, Singapore and China. In fact, it is very rare to see a non-Asian aboard one of our vessels."

K. Orachorn also highlighted a difference in the type of ship operated and said that AIDA opts for luxury fitments and facilities while Star Cruises, while still very comfortable, opts for a larger passenger capacity.

"Some of our ships carry 2,500 or even 2,800 passengers in high season, more than double AIDAcara's capacity," she said.

New ball game for a Phuket winner

PHUKET: Thailand already has a tennis idol in Paradorn "Ball" Srichaphan, and with his success has come greater interest in the game.

It may come as a surprise to some that there is another form of tennis, called "soft tennis." It's run by the Soft Tennis Association of Thailand (STAT) in Bangkok, and there is one Soft Tennis Club on Phuket.

Doing her bit to promote the game in the same way that Paradorn has lifted awareness of the "hard" version is Withita "Tangkwa" Jang-Iam, 18.

Phuket-born K. Tangkwa has already managed to take third place in a soft tennis tournament in the Philippines and made it into the final 16 in the 12th World Soft Tennis Championships in Hiroshima, Japan, early in November. She also came ninth in the world youth rankings.

On January 24 and 25, she will be competing in a tournament in Chiang Rai as a lead-in to a tournament in Phuket on April 3 and 4. Leading players in that competition will qualify for the national finals in Bangkok.

For the uninitiated, K. Tangkwa explained these basic characteristics of soft tennis:

Soft tennis includes singles and doubles. The ball (which is made from rubber) is filled with air and because it is soft, it can be hit extremely hard. This is one of the charming features of this fast-moving yet precise game.

Doubles, in particular, requires a high level of skill and good communication between players. Soft tennis players need not only good technique, but also physical and mental strength to combine effectively with their partners.

Partners alternate the serve

after every two points.

Matches usually consist of either seven games (the first team to win four games wins the match), or nine games (the first team to win five games wins the match).

One game consists of four points but if the score is tied at three points apiece, the game continues until one team is ahead by two points and wins. In the decid-

ing game, however, there are seven points (with deuce at six all).

International rules governing singles were established in 1993. Since then, tournaments have been held at national and international level.

K. Tangkwa began playing seriously two years ago, though she had been practising tennis for up to two hours a day, under her father's tutelage, since she was eight.

In the 12 tournaments she has played since, she has won several first prizes, including one tournament in Bangkok that she still ranks as her best performance.

"I still have to learn more about the game's rules and the various styles. The racket and ball are softer and lighter than normal tennis, which makes control more difficult," Tangkwa said

K. Tangkwa is a first-year medicine student at Chiang Mai University and believes soft tennis is good relaxation.

"I think if I have been practicing hard and my dad says it's okay to join the national team, I will do it," she said.

Nipon Jang-Iam, Tangkwa's father and coach, said, "The future is up to her. If she wants to play professionally, I will support her. She is now ranked ninth in the world and first in Southeast Asia."

Big events coming up this year include an important tournament at Surin in June, the Soft Tennis Masters in Bangkok in August, and the Asian Soft Tennis Titles in Chiang Mai in December, featuring competitors from 17 nations.



Serious S80 shows its age



potted along the Chalong-Karon road shortly after Christmas was one of Volvo's topof-the-range sedans, the luxury

It was an unusual animal to see on the highways and byways of Phuket, as this model is somewhat expensive and is not generally considered to be on a par with an equivalent Mercedes-Benz or BMW.

Launched to the world in 1998 and face-lifted in 2001, the S80 is, however, a car worthy of a closer look, and has scored some success locally as the choice of various high-end hotels for their fleets.

Volvo claimed that the S80 featured the world's first transversely-mounted six-cylinder engine, conveniently (though perhaps justifiably) forgetting the truly awful Austin 18-22/Princess of the mid-'70s which featured a transverse six.

The original S80 came with a 2.9-liter six producing a modest 204bhp (150kW) while five-cylinder models were available in 2.4- and 2.8-liter options borrowed from the smaller S70. A turbocharged six developing 272bhp (200kW) was available and a five-cylinder diesel from Audi powered later models. A

five-cylinder gasoline turbo version with all-wheel-drive is also on the market.

Automatic transmission is standard – four- or five-speed according to engine choice – and features an adaptive shift pattern that recognizes a driver's style and shifts up or down accordingly.

The S80 is built on a lengthened version of the versatile S70 platform, which forms the basis for both the S60 sports sedan and the luxury 4x4 XC90.

Produced at the Torslanda

factory in Sweden, the S80 was Volvo's first challenge to the established luxury makers, but it failed to live up to expectations.

Peter Horbury, who designed much of Volvo's current range including the S80, now heads Ford's Premier Automotive Group (PAG), which comprises Jaguar, Aston Martin, Volvo and Land Rover. His colleague, Henrik Fisker of Aston Martin, was responsible for the recently-launched Aston Martin DB9 (Gazette, November 15, 2003).

In a recent interview, Mr Horbury said, "Certain things are expected of certain marques and you have to maintain that identity."

What people expect from Volvo appears to be solidness and safety. The S80 offers a full raft of safety features, with full-length air curtains, side-impact bags for both driver and front passenger as well as dual front airbags,

three-point seat belts for all five occupants and energy-absorbing materials throughout the passenger compartment.

Additionally, the body consists of a unique safety cell that distributes impact energy evenly through the vehicle to dissipate destructive forces and protect passengers.

The vehicle's structure – including the roof pillars and transverse roof profiles – keeps the passenger compartment intact, absorbing a great deal of the forces if the vehicle starts to roll. The most crucial parts of this protective web are made of high-strength boron steel.

In a side collision, the Volvo Side Impact Protection System (Sips) helps to distribute the energy across a large part of the car's body reducing – in theory – the trauma suffered by the occupants.

Many of the systems and designs incorporated at Volvo

have now been extended to other parts of the PAG empire.

Mr Horbury believes car firms are now more adventurous and sees more niche models and crossovers than in the past.

"Design matures," he says. "I cannot be creative 24 hours a day. But national identity is the strongest identifying point. Ford has been smart by putting all the marques under the Ford Motor Company banner. This has lifted Ford's perceived value by association."

But whether Horbury and his team will attempt a successor to the S80 is another matter.


Volvo is likely to concentrate on its highly successful XC90 and its smaller cars in the future.

The S80, good but not great, has never achieved the success hoped for.

he road between Karon and Patong, high above the sea, offers some wonderful views. One place to enjoy a good meal along this stretch, perhaps while watching the sun set, is the Central Karon Village, Phuket.

The resort has individual bungalows built on verdant jungle cliffs and two restaurants: The Cliff which is just below road level, and The Bayview, situated closer to the sea.

Sixteen years of cooking has made Chef Danai Thotrakan - who has worked at Central Karon Village since it opened in 1999 – a master in the kitchen.

"I'm very keen on fusion food because the possibilities are endless," said Chef Danai.

While The Cliff restaurant features Mediterranean-Asian fusion cuisine, the choice at The Bayview is Thai or international.

"Most guests want to eat Thai dishes while on holiday here and these three dishes are always popular."

He recommends a small, colorful side salad to add vibrancy to these dishes if you are not able to recreate the intricately-carved vegetables.

Deep-fried white snapper with tom yam sauce

One person

Ingredients:

1 whole white snapper fish, weighing about 500 grams; 60 grams chopped mushrooms; 10 grams julienne of lemon grass; 1 kaffir lime leaf, torn into shreds; 2 grams julienne of galangal; 5 grams sweet chili paste; 20 grams fish sauce; 30 grams fresh lime juice; 4 fresh chilies, crushed; 1 teacup of chicken stock; Oil.

Method:

Deep-fry the white snapper until it turns golden brown – about seven minutes – then remove from the heat and drain. Put the remaining ingredients – except the mushrooms and crushed chilies – into a clean pan and heat

until the mixture is simmering. Add the mushrooms and chilies after a few minutes and continue to simmer for another minute or two, before placing the fish on a serving dish. Pour the sauce over.

hy can't flower names be easy to say or remember? A rose is always a rose, a daisy is a daisy, and an orchid is always an orchid. Well actually, sometimes it's not, but that's the point. Flower names are so complicated in this part of the world.

The cream-fruit plant even has two names in Latin – Strophanthus gratus and roupellia grata. A Thai friend of mine, who gives me the name in Thai for many plants, was struggling to provide a simple translation.

The best she could come up with was nang yeng peenang – presumably a reference to the Malaysian island somewhere in the dim and distant history of the plant.

However, the cream-fruit plant is originally from much further afield. Its ancestral home is tropical West Africa, and it was brought to this part of the world by early explorers.

Its glossy, evergreen leaves are thick and leathery, and it bears terminal clusters of waxy, bellshaped, purple and white flowers that resemble begonias but are fragrant at night with the smell of roses.

The smell reminds me of the rather inexpensive perfume that my elementary school teacher used to wear. Not exactly Chanel No. 5, but fragrant enough.

The flowers that follow the deep purple buds that initially appear are certainly an unusual shape. Five petals surround an inch-deep center, with a long pollen-covered stamen in the middle.

The open central part is surrounded by a dozen or so vertical "spikes", in contrast to the delicate petals around them. Even after they're cut, these flowers last several days and are great for floral displays.

The folk-healers of tropical West Africa have found many uses for the plant. They make a rubbing compound from its leaves to reduce fevers; they mash the leaves to treat various skin problems and wounds and make medicines from the leaves to treat

more "unmentionable" problems.

A substance known ouabain can be obtained from the seed of strophanthus – the most common use in its native land was as a source of arrow poison, both for hunting and for warfare. It was

this use that brought the plant to the attention of Western science.

In 1861, the famed explorer and missionary Dr David Livingstone observed native peoples

hunting with a poison that had been made from the seed of a closely-related plant (a vine called strophanthus kombe) and he later reported the substance as an apparent cardiac stimulant. This led to the investigation of many similar species, and strophanthus gratus turned

out to be the most valuable.

Africans who later heard that the British were using the poison from the seeds in a pure state as a medicine concluded that the Brits were indeed mad. They may still be right to this day.

Just before I sat down to write this, I picked a cream-fruit

flower from my garden, and it seemed quite keen to secrete as much sap on my skin as it could.


If you do handle this plant, make sure that you wear gloves, or at least avoid touching the

This plant adores the sun. It will survive in shade,

but the more sunlight it gets, the more flowers it will produce. More flowers also appear when the plant is drier, so it shouldn't be over-watered.

To propagate the creamfruit plant, all you need to do is snip off a fairly woody cutting and stick it in some moist compost. It will take root and grow fairly quickly.

The cream-fruit is a smelly plant that looks good, too. Just be careful if you use it to treat your "unmentionable" problems.



Before you buy, check and check again

PROPERTY

n the past two columns I have detailed the different types of titles to land, buildings and condominiums, and the methods by which a foreigner may acquire ownership or lease rights on these properties.

You may now feel confident to begin the search for your dream home. Please start, by all means, but first pause to consider what you are doing.

While most developers and private vendors are ethical, there

are, as everywhere, a number who are not, and caution must be exercised.

Ask to see an accurate translation of the

front and back of the land or condo title deed. This will show the current owner, any endorsements or liens the property has, its shape, area and orientation, and any borders to public property, such as a road, stream or the ocean.

Use a measuring tape and compass (or a steady pace and the location of the sun) to ascertain if the title accurately represents the offered property. Be sure you are dealing with the rightful owners of the property or their appointed representative.

A highly-publicized though small number of land titles were considered suspect last year and prudence suggests that you have

In the past two columns I a lawyer conduct due diligence have detailed the different on the title's veracity and history.

This is especially important if your intended purchase borders – or apparently stands alone within – government and particularly Forestry Department land. A cautious approach may save tears later.

In the case of a building un-

der construction or land undergoing subdivision, look carefully at the provisions for issuing a title and easement rights. Also, look out for a clause providing for the sale price to be adjusted pro-rata

with the final titled area. There have been instances in which vendors deliberately understated the area of a property.

If the property in question is not adjacent to a public road, it is essential that there is evidence of a registered easement for vehicle access and all utility connections. It has been known for vendors to grant an easement for vehicular access and then later, when the property is developed, refuse to allow the connection of electricity cables until further payments are made.

It may sound obvious, but do read the contract. I am amazed how many people sign first and ask questions later. Unlike many other countries, Thailand has effectively no consumer protection, so *caveat emptor* is the order of the day. If the contract is not in English or a language that you understand, insist on a translation by a competent, independent professional.

If you see a clause which you don't understand, seek professional advice. If you see a patently unsavory clause, such as, "During the period of this contract the Buyer may not take legal action against the Seller" (which, amazingly, more than a few people have signed), stop! Don't overlook the precautions you would take in your home country just because you are in negotiation with a seemingly friendly vendor here.

Remember, some condominiums qualify for 100% foreign ownership but others are restricted to 49% of the units in the block. Be sure that the unit you are buying is covered under this allowance.

There are ways that the rights to the units outside the 49% allowance may be offered. Make sure you understand how this system works and look closely at the total number of units sold.

Be particularly mindful if less than 50% have been sold and management is still in the hands of the developers. With majority votes, a bad manager can be removed by owners, but in a building still majority-owned by the developer, you may be stuck with his choice of manager.

None of the above is intended to warn you off making an investment in property in Thailand. With due diligence you will be able to acquire a trouble-free and secure investment that will bring you great rewards.
