Doubt cast over jet-ski ban plan

PHUKET TOWN: Following Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura's announcement in late December that jet-skis will be phased out in Phuket over a seven-year period, the Phuket Marine Office (PMO) set a January 31 deadline for jet-ski owners to register their machines.

With the expiry of that deadline, the PMO is to begin cracking down on unregistered machines, underage riders and other violations.

But the man responsible for bringing order to the unregulated industry, which has claimed the lives of two foreign tourists in recent months, seems daunted by the task.

Newly-appointed PMO Chief Kritpetch Chaichuay told the Gazette that efforts so far have focused only on registering jet-skis and promoting their safe use. He said that phasing them out completely, as Gov Udomsak has ordered, could harm tourism.

He admitted that he felt it would be impractical to enforce long-ignored regulations requiring tourists who rent jet-skis to have Thai Helmsman Level 2 licenses, a qualification that requires two years' documented proof of experience aboard a Thai-flagged

Although jet-skis are a major cause of complaints from foreigh tourists, he said that getting rid of them entirely could harm tourism in Phuket.

K. Kritpetch, assigned the task of bringing order to an industry that has defied similar attempts in the past, acknowledged that, legally speaking, any tourists caught operating a jet-ski without a Helmsman's 2 license

But he said it would be impractical to enforce such a law because it would mean the overnight demise of the jet-ski rental business in Phuket.

He said, however, that regulations allowing customers under 17 years of age to ride jetstrictly enforced.

K. Kritpetch said that many jet-ski owners had been unable to produce the import and sales documents needed to allow them to register their craft.

"The deadline is January 31," he said. "[As of January 22] we have registered about 30 to

Pian gets green light for election

PHUKET TOWN: The Phuket Election Committee (PEC) has dismissed a complaint against mayoral candidate Pian Keesin, allowing him to stand in the Patong mayoral poll on February 8.

Kittipong Thiengkunagrit, Director of the PEC, told the Gazette on January 23 that the PEC had carefully considered the complaint, lodged four days earlier by rival candidate Songserm Kepsap.

K. Songserm presented the PEC with a copy of a confidential letter from the Interior Ministry's Local Administration Department, ordering K. Pian to pay the government 51,869 baht after K. Pian – who was mayor at the time - allegedly bought garbage trucks for the municipality at above-market prices.

The PEC has ruled that K. Pian can run in the election, however, because he has not been found guilty of corruption while holding public office.

"K. Pian was never dismissed from his duties as mayor because of corruption," explained K. Kittipong. "He has also not been found guilty of benefiting personally from the garbage truck contract."

K. Kittipong pointed out that the Office of the Auditor General may order local authority figures to reimburse the government in cases where they pay inflated prices, but that only the National Counter Corruption Committee (NCCC) may rule on corruption allegations.

K. Pian's case is still under consideration by the NCCC, so the PEC must consider him innocent of the charges until proven guilty, K. Kittipong explained. "I don't know if [the complaint] is a political game," he added.

Victims of fashion

BANGKOK: Protection against the elements for students was once just a plastic rain poncho but recent brawling among scholars of rival vocational schools – which left some innocent bystanders dead – has caused parents to take extra measures to safeguard their children when they step out to study.

The latest brainstorm – unveiled earlier this month on Children's Day – is a range of youngster's protective clothing and accessories from the Bang Rajan Project vigilante group. Caps, vests, shoulder bags and folders are lined with a bullet-proof material capable of withstanding just about all the slings and arrows a Bangkok student could expect on a school bus: knife thrusts, sharpened sticks, projectiles from beun pakka (zip guns) and even shotgun blasts.

Developed with a grant from the National Research Council of Thailand, the lightweight protective gear is reasonably priced at 600 baht for a bag. A vest costs about 1,000 baht.

Gen Songpol Iam-bunyarit, head of Bang Rajan's research team, said the reinforced clothing was a sign that Thai creativity was not inferior to that of foreigners.

The general encouraged parents unable to afford the scholastic combat gear to make sure their children carry thick books, which can also be effective at minimizing the impact of the weapons favored by warring students.

It was not reported if there was any plan to market the innovative garments in Thailand's troubled southern provinces.

The buffalo skin hunter

BANGKOK: A man from Buri Ram province who went on a three-day drinking binge over New Year returned to his job in the capital with a terrible pain in his abdomen – which he apparently tried to cure by operating on himself.

The man, identified as a 32-year-old Sanan Jodrum, did what most low-paid laborers in Bangkok do over the New Year holiday: he boarded a bus and went back to his hometown to see family and friends.

After saying a brief hello to his wife, he joined a *wong lao* (literally, a "whisky circle") with his rural friends, drinking continuously for three days and three nights – without eating.

When he returned to the capital, he suffered from terrible stomach pains. He consulted a doctor who told him it was the result of excessive alcohol intake and lack of food.

The doctor gave him a couple of injections but these did not help. Now that conventional medicine had failed him, K. Sanan became convinced that the cause of his gastrointestinal woes was sorcery.

According to a local superstition, it is possible to curse a person in such a way that an indigestible strip of buffalo hide somehow finds its way into an enemy's stomach, causing great pain followed by agonizing death.

On the morning of January 7, K. Sanan was found dead. Arriving on the scene, investigators found his lifeless body lying face-up in a pool of blood, a single knife wound, apparently self-inflicted, running from the top of his ribcage to just below his navel.

His intestines had burst though the wound. No buffalo hide was recovered.

Envoy seeks one-year visas for Filipinos

PHUKET TOWN: Filipinos who work in Phuket should be able to obtain one-year visas instead of three-month or six-month visas, the new Philippines Ambassador to Thailand, Antonio V Rodriguez, said at the end of his first official visit to the island on January 26.

Making the plea in talks with Vice Governor Niran Kalayanamit, he noted that many entertainers and musicians were among the 300 to 400 Filipinos who work on Phuket.

The group is substantial enough to have formed its own association, he added.

Another issue raised by Mr Rodriguez was the conditions under which Filipino fishermen were hired to work on Taiwanese boats sailing out of Phuket.

"Some of the workers are not paid according to their contracts and their passports are held by their employers," he said.

The ambassador, appointed in September, also asked about bird 'flu and was assured by V/ Gov Niran that Phuket is free of the disease.

40 jet-skis in Patong, but just as many remain unregistered because their owners failed to submit proper import and sales documents. We have registered 24 more at Bang Tao beach and 34 at Karon."

"Owners who fail to meet the deadline and continue to use unregistered jet-skis after January 31 will be fined 10,000 baht each time we catch them," he warned. They would not, however, be sent to jail.

He said officers would distribute brochures at beaches to ensure that everyone was aware of the regulations, adding that Patong would be the primary focus of the enforcement effort.

Other measures were being taken, he said, to protect swimmers and tourists who rent jet-

"We have already zoned swimming areas along beaches, and we will put up signs warning tourists about the potential dangers of jet-skis," he said. "The signs will also list guidelines for their safe operation, such as the need to wear life jackets." He noted that many tourists drive jet-skis recklessly.

K. Kritpetch said all sides need to work together to improve safety and that no single agency could improve the situation on its

"Without a continuous effort, jet-ski operators will just fall back into their old ways," he added.


"Regarding the current plan

that [aims to] put all jet-ski operators out of business in seven years, we will have to review the situation two or three years before that deadline to see if jet-skis are still a major cause of injury and complaints by tourists and a common factor in crime cases.

"If that's the case, the province will probably have to go ahead and ban jet-skis altogether," he said.

Vice-Governor Pongpow Ketthong reiterated that the government was committed to ridding the island of jet-skis within seven years. He told the *Gazette* that regulations would be strictly enforced and that any jet-ski seen being operated by a minor would be seized immediately.

But he also dismissed the idea of enforcing the law requiring the Helmsman 2 license as impractical because the qualification is available only to Thais.

Police seize fake watches in Karon raids

KARON: About 300 fake luxury-brand watches with an estimated retail value of more than 500,000 baht were seized in two "sting" operations in the Karon area on January 23.

Pubate Mingkwan, legal representative in Thailand for a number of well-known brands, joined a team led by Phuket Police Deputy Commander Pol Col Apirak Hongthong as they hit the streets of Karon.

Officers observed from a distance as K. Pubate bought a fake watch from vendor Montha Taiprasert at a stall on Patak Rd. Police then arrested Montha and seized about 200 watches.

Just 15 minutes later on the same road Wiroj Jongwitayapirom, owner of the Nong Mild Watch Shop, was arrested following a similar "sting". About 100 phony watches were seized.

Five held for killing of 15-year-old boy

PHUKET: Five teenagers are being held by police and two more are being sought over the savage execution-style murder of a 15year-old youth on Koh Sireh.

Khajornkiat Tongdeesuk was tied and beaten before being taken, early on January 17, to Naamsai Beach where his killer fired a shotgun into his head.

Police allege that another 15-year-old known as "M" fired the shotgun, apparently in reprisal for a previous attempt by Khajornkiat to shoot him. Those being held are aged 14 to 18 and officers say all have confessed.

Superintendent Pol Col Paween Pongsirin told the Gazette that seven teenagers in a white van first captured "Lek", a friend of Khajornkiat's, and forced him to reveal where Khajornkiat was planning to go that night.

Two teenagers then left the group. Col Paween said, "From 2 am to 3 am, five people in the van cruised around Phuket Town until they spotted the victim. He was on his motorbike with his girlfriend on the back, out riding with five friends who were also on motorbikes.'

The van pursued Khajornkiat to the Sapam Chinese Shrine, in Tambon Koh Kaew on Thepkrasattri Rd. With the van closing, Khajornkiat stopped his motorbike and ran, Col Paween said, but was soon caught. His girlfriend escaped to alert police.

'The gang tied and gagged Khajornkiat," Col Paween said. "They beat him up in the van. Then they stopped the van in Koh Kaew, where 'Ab', one of the gang members, lived."

The other gang members dispersed as Ab and M lifted Khajornkiat onto a motorcycle.

When the motorcycle arrived at Naamsai Beach, Col Paween said, M shot Khajornkiat in the head. Then M and Ab fled.

Police, alerted to the murder, rounded up M and four other members of the gang that same day. Two others, including Ab, are still on the loose. Police believe they still have the gun.

The oldest gang member, 18-year old Wichai "Gain" Saisamut, is being held at Phuket Provincial Prison. The other four gang members, too young to be named, are being held without bail at the Phuket Juvenile Observation and Protection Center.

Meanwhile, in Cherng Talay, a 19-year-old youth sought by police in connection with the shooting of an 18-year-old in the leg on January 21 has surrendered. Thanawuth Yamtong denied involvement in the wounding of Jittisak "Sak" Tamtorpol.

More tales from the dog pound

PHUKET TOWN: The dog pound design that turned out to be a dog's breakfast has been cleaned up, say officials.

Capable of holding 1,000 animals, Phuket's pound will open for business on March 1 at the latest, the Chief of the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO), Sunart Wongchawalit, told the Gazette on January 23.

There was consternation last year when officials discovered that work on the pound, at Bang Kanoon forestry plantation, had begun on the wrong site.

Sorting out the mess is costing more and taking a little longer than anticipated.

"After some parts of the shelter had been finished, it was found to be too small and not built to specification," K. Sunart said. "We had to adjust some parts of the plan, such as [the use of] barbed wire that could not keep the dogs in."

The original budget of 1.6 million baht was increased to 2.8 million to expand the size of the pound to cover four rai.

Local municipalities will take responsibility for rounding up strays and bringing them in. (Estimates of the number of strays on Phuket range up to 13,000.)

"On arrival, the dogs will be separated into females and males, and all will be sterilized. Dogs that are savage or sick will be kept in isolation," he said.

"We will also have a service – like a dog hotel – allowing dog owners to leave pets when they are away from home for an extended period. The owners will have to pay for this service," he said.

"There will also be a training center for dogs to learn the proper behavior for them to be adopted by families.

"Others will be trained to work with police as drug sniffers and for other duties."

ways in many of the world's great cities were little better than sewers, or in some cases, not even that clean. Fish died from factory waste dumped in the water and no one wanted to live nearby because of the stench.

Phuket Town's Klong Bang

Phuket Town's Klong Bang Yai was never treated quite that badly. But the largely man-made waterway, which in its heyday allowed goods to be transported from the coast to the hinterland and rural produce to be taken to the coast, was no longer treated with respect once roads became a faster and more fashionable medium of transport.

Just as many of the world's great waterways have been revitalized, so the klong is now being brought back to life, with a little help from Phuket's friends among the municipal authorities in the US city of Portland, Oregon.

Before long, the people of Phuket will have a say in the future of their waterway. What happens to it will be decided by public vote, says Dr Tasanee Aikwanich, Coordinator of the Bang Yai Canal Scenery Development Project.

The plan doesn't have a specific limit on its budget. Over the next two years, as various ideas are suggested and reviewed, the future of the onceproud waterway will be mapped out with care. Several local authorities and corporate sponsors are already backing the project.

The aims include reducing pollution, making sure the klong water is clean, and dealing with problems caused by flooding. "It's like a jigsaw," Dr Tasanee said. "We haven't specified how the

klong might look yet, but gradually it will come together."

Efforts are being concentrated on the eight kilometers of the 20-kilometer canal that come within the boundary of Phuket Town, with meetings on the fate of the section from Phuket Bay to the Ta Yai Restaurant scheduled for the next few weeks.

Already there's talk of gardens with brightly-lit paths along the banks of the klong to improve the quality of life in Phuket Town.

Old-timers remember when medium-size boats could travel up the klong from the bay right into the heart of Phuket Town – something that is no longer possible because roads have been built across it at levels not far above the waterline.

Locals realized how useful a canal would be about 120 years ago and gradually enlarged the small natural stream to suit their purpose.

How the canal got its name makes an interesting piece of history.

Phuket historian, Ajarn Pranee Sakulpipatana, says that, way back when, senior government officials from Bangkok came south to draw a map of Phuket. They asked the locals, "What is the name of this canal?"

One local, having never had to bother with such details, replied "Bang Yai" – big waterway. The folk from Bangkok, ever happy to accept a quick solution, inquired no further. Big Canal it was, and so it remains.

Phuket must have been remote and very beautiful in those days. The trip from Bangkok took four days by boat and the island must have seemed jungly and unsophisticated, inhabited as it was by Chinese traders and adventurers.

The people who chose to

live along the canal had to be prepared to move during the monsoon season because they knew that floods would drive them out.

"When I was young, I saw big floods," says Ajarn Pranee. "People would drown. After a flood, people would sell small crocodiles in front of the Sanguan pharmacy in Phuket Town. The crocodiles were from the mangroves that grew alongside the klong. Natural resources were rich."

Ajarn Pranee says that some of the Chinese traders settled in Phuket because of its excellent *feng shui* – according to Chinese necromancy, the flow of water from inside and outside across the land indicated a good flow of money, too.

With a wry touch, she adds, "Recently, Phuket hasn't had much luck with rainwater and it would be good if local politicians also managed to improve the flow of the money."


Chaiyuth Pinpradab, of the Phuket Culture Council committee at Rajabhat Institute Phuket, says that the canal had its natural beginning high up in the Kathu hills and grew rapidly on its twisting downward journey to the sea at Saphan Hin.

In the past, tin miners and farmers sometimes diverted water from the klong for their own use, leaving it dry and useless.

But there were also better times when fishing boats could sail to market and ferrymen from Phuket Town could punt vessels upstream to Kathu, picking up and dropping off passengers along the way.


"Restoring it as a waterway will be difficult because of the bridges and the seasonal changes in water level," he says. "But it can be turned into a fine scenic attraction."











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An Italian slice of Phuket

ny Italian who decides to change his life and move to Thailand should understand Thai

'Improving relations is the most important thing between two cultures living together," says Club Italia Phuket President Olinto "Lupo" Barletta.

Phuket and other aspects of life informal, start with discussion on the island. The first meeting was on December 15.

Mr Barletta explained that the meetings, which are open and about the latest news from Italy, followed by an open session in which members raise issues or relate recent experiences. "Most Italians who live here own Italian restaurants, are graphic designers or work in the software industry. We can learn from all our members because everyone has different experiences to share."

While the most popular topics at the meetings are cultural or social issues, local laws are also discussed. "At our last meeting we explained to members the national campaign against drunkdriving. "We need a club where we can inform Italians of the laws. Some people might make mistakes because they do not know what the laws are."

To facilitate better communication between Thais and Italians, Mr Barletta said that the club will soon hold Thai and Italian language courses for members.




For non-Italians, the club also teaches Italian culture, including the nation's long history and famous personages as well as traditional Italian customs and cuisine.

Billionaire PM still cashing in

government he downplayed growing concern over the ballooning wealth of Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra as it was revealed that the worth of his business empire soared to a staggering 425 billion baht last year, nearly 9% of the Thai stock market's total capitalization. The big jump in stock values – from 146 billion baht in 2002 - was a major topic at a recent closed-door discussion among 30 leading academics, social workers and journalists in Chiang Mai.

Vendor crush: The Government Lottery Office rescheduled the distribution of 10 million lottery tickets following a stampede that left two people injured, one of whom needed hospital treatment. The tickets were issued in addition to the regular quota for the February 1 draw. Thousands of vendors lined up before dawn at Rajamangala Stadium, the ticket distribution center in Bangkok, to wait for the doors to open. Vendors rushed through the doors for tickets, distributed on a firstcome-first-served basis.

Sewer tragedy: A two-year-old boy died from injuries resulting from being trapped in a sewer in

Nonthaburi's Bang Bua Thong district. Akkarawit "Beckham" Thanomsaard was found with his head submerged in a sewer after an hour-long search. His heart had already stopped beating by the time he reached a nearby hospital, but medical workers were able to revive him. He died from his injuries a few days later after being in a coma.

The boy's mother said she was busy selling vegetables from her stall when she noticed the toddler was missing. Residents said that this was the second incident of this kind. They blamed local officials for failing to cover sewer openings.

For the birds: Thai soldiers arrested a Burmese man attempting to smuggle 13,000 bottles of the drug ketamine into Thailand. A patrol from the 4th Infantry Division found the drugs on a longtail boat at a pier in the Mae Sot district of Tak province. Two men on the boat jumped off and swam back to Burma, but Thai soldiers managed to arrest one of them when he later returned to Mae Sot. He claimed the drugs had been brought in as a cure for chickens suffering from avian 'flu.

The drug, which goes by the local name ya K, was stored in 16 boxes and had an estimated street value of 13 million baht.

Big teeth: The inventor of dentures fitted to an 80-year-old elephant, allowing it to eat normally, has applied for a patent for the device. Somsak Jitniyom, of the Mount Chayarat Center for Research and Technology Transfer, said the artificial teeth were a big success, allowing cow elephant Morakot to resume eating properly. K.Somsak said his invention was patented in Kanchanaburi province, and that ownership of the patent would be transferred to the Thai Elephant Association.

College costs: Tuition fees at state universities can be expected to increase at least eightfold in two years' time when the government stops subsidizing university level education in favor of offering educational loans for all academic levels. Prof Rangsan Thanapornphan, of Thammasat University's Faculty of Economics, said the government would stop subsidizing tuition fees at state universities once the planned education loan system is in place.

Prof Rangsan, a member of a special government committee charged with drawing up the new education loan framework, said that if the government approved the system, it would become effective in the 2005 academic year.

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he high season finally arrived, but in what seems like the blink of an eye, it has gone again. The late start to the season saw hotels still with vacancies in Christmas week. The Yuletide and New Year holidays

brought hectic full houses, but by the second week of January, hotels and restaurants were again faced with vacancies. One resort reported a drop in occupancy from 100% to 50% in one day in mid-January, without any improvement in room rates since.

Nor have the customers been setting any records for spending. One local businessman called

this the Year of the *Khee Neow* (stingy people). Common stories from restaurants, hotels and tourist businesses attest to the stinginess of this year's average customer.

Beer Chang is the flavor of the season while Heineken and more expensive drinks are shunned. It is not uncommon to see customers buy large bottles of Chang at the local mini-mart to drink in a restaurant, saving them a whopping 15 baht.

One restaurateur pointed out that his sales of wine and cognacs are down 70%. Another restaurant owner priced his New Year dinner at 200 baht after his Christmas dinner saw sluggish sales with it priced at 300 baht. I can't remember when Christmas dinner was considered overpriced at 300 baht.

One veteran restaurant

owner reported that two customers each ordered a Corona imported beer. The price listed on

> the menu was 120 baht, more expensive than the other beers at 60-70 baht.

came the customers refused to pay because they believed the price was 12 baht. You probably can't get a glass of beer in Mexico for that. They refused to pay more than 12 baht for each imported beer.

On average,

most businesses in the area is down about 30% from last season, and the fear is that the best months are behind us. If so, it might be time for a reduction in some of the sky-high rents of properties on the Ao Nang beachfront because nobody

could make a profit while paying the present rates.

Taxing times: One unforeseen consequence of the drop in business is the shortfall in tax revenues it has created. Several businesses have received lessthan-friendly visits from tax officials who accused the owners of not reporting income.

For local businesspeople struggling through another "soft" season, this is a double whammy.



The tax collectors have threatened several businesses with large

fines. One farang business owner was told that he would have to pay a large fine as a penalty for not reporting income from two of his businesses.

If the authorities had taken a few moments to check, they would have realized that both of the businesses in question were closed last year. Even after being told this, the tax man still insisted on imposing the fine.

As a result, the owner may

close his third business rather than pay tax on his non-existent businesses. Somebody up in the hierarchy of the tax division must really be cracking the whip.

CLOSING DOWN SELLOUT

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Mundane matters: One downside to living in Ao Nang has been the need to drive 17 kilometers to Krabi Town to shop for even common items. There is nothing more frustrating than having to drive that distance just to make a simple transaction.

This is changing slowly as businesses are opening in Ao Nang to serve local merchants,

who in turn serve tourists. Several banks have opened local branches, including the Bank of Ayudhya and Siam Commercial Bank. Now even simple businesses, such as photocopy centers, have filled a need and made local merchants' lives easier.

I usually don't get excited about the opening of a photocopy shop, but Green's Copy Center is the delight of the town. Mr Green, who opened Ao Nang's first bar, Green's Bar, years ago, has an excellent full-color copy

His attention to detail and quality equipment have garnered him respect and lots of customers. He is a hard worker, too, staying open late to complete special projects when needed. Ao Nang can do with more businesspeople like Mr Green.

erhaps this season's most welcome visitors have been the Russians who have taken to the abundance of cheap T-shirts, CDs and pleasure.

they just gave us a blank look and smiled and said nothing. And what is this smile supposed to mean?"

"The Thai smile means many things," I said, smiling.

Spot check: I was also at the hospital to have my annual checkup – which included a visit to the new Skin and Rejuvenation Center at Bangkok Phuket Hospital to check for possible skin damage from the sun.



well worth it. You can also get to Nui by long-tail boat from Kata Noi or Nai Harn if you're not up for the walk. Check it out before it's discovered by the masses.

Lunch munch: Kirsten and Mark Kindermann have opened Bagels & Beyond, just beyond Chalong Circle on the road to the pier. Mark grew up in the eastern US and learned to make authentic bagels in culinary school.

"Bagels are the rice of the east coast," said Mark. "We are offering a menu of sesame, garlic or onion bagels, and a variety of cream cheeses."

This welcome addition to Phuket also sells healthy soups, salads and light Mexican *burritos* and *quesadillas* as well as fresh juices and smoothies.

Kirsten also teaches Ashtanga yoga four times a week upstairs at Bagels & Beyond. This is a great place for lunch – the best bagels this side of New York.

Model citizens: I was delighted to hear that the final tally raised for charity from the recent Asian Gallery fashion show was a whopping 650,000 baht.

The money will go to Wachira Hospital, the Red Cross and the Phuket Business Women's Association, and to help fund an orphanage in Phuket, which is much needed.

The generosity of the Phuket community never fails to impress me.

Gone were the many local restaurants and small bars that used to be on the beach under the coconut palms. In the distance, up the hill, we could see

the roofs of the new villas as well as a large crane. Things were certainly changing.

Ten villas have been com-

pleted and we checked into ours. A pair of large glass sliding doors opened onto the patio, which overlooked the whole bay.

We spent the day there, watching day-trippers on the beach – the speedboats to-ing and fro-ing, off on their snorkeling trips to the south.

The sea around Racha is still breathtakingly clear. In the main

bay itself, despite the many boats, you can still see darting shoals of fish and the sandy bottom 10 meters down.

The best time of the day is late afternoon, after the boats leave, when a few lucky people remain to sit and watch the sun go down.

The next day, after a fiveminute walk, we were in Siam Bay, which is as I remembered it – a white beach with a few shack restaurants and bars under the trees. Staff and tourists alike slept or reclined on beach chairs and hammocks: a great place to get away from it all.

A short long-tail trip took us to the south of the island, with Kai, our boat man, laughed as we attempted to put on our snorkeling gear as the boat bobbed wildly in the swell.

The snorkeling on the south side is still some of the best around Phuket – excellent marine life, live coral and an abundance of fish. I look forward to returning to Racha soon.


Where to Stay

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





'Softies have the last laugh with Windows 98

ast week I told you about Microsoft discontinuing paid telephone support for Windows 98, and how the press turned the "nonevent" into another excuse to bash the 'Softies. I say "nonevent" because Microsoft abandoned Windows 98 years ago.

The latest announcement merely ended pay-per-call telephone support. I repeat: when was the last time you called Microsoft, pulled out your credit card and offered to pay for official help on running Windows 98? Gimme a break.

Turnabout being fair play, Microsoft decided at the last minute to continue to provide paid telephone support for Win98, and the press ran ecstatic.

An Associated Press report included this gem: "'While we've done an excellent job communicating our life cycle policy for most of our products, we have found that we could use more time to communicate those guidelines in a handful of smaller markets,' including Kazakhstan, the Ivory Coast and Slovenia, Microsoft spokesman Matt Pilau said."

That report was parroted, verbatim, in major newspapers all over the world. One problem: I've never heard of Matt Pilau. I ran a Google search on his name and came up with nothing. I ran

Microsoft's own search engine on microsoft.com for Pilau but didn't get a single hit. And – get this – *pilau* is the national dish of Kazakhstan. Methinks somebody in Microsoft's PR agency is laughing himself stupid.

Brushing aside the fact that Microsoft's brass don't give a rat's patoutie about Win98 in Kazakhstan, it's easy to see why Microsoft is continuing support for Win98: appearing to "support" Win98/SE/ME amounts to good publicity that costs the company almost nothing. By continuing to "support" Win98 the 'Softies hope to improve their image and reduce the defection rate, not only among Win98 users, but among those who run older systems.

Microsoft isn't playing this tune for the benefit of the folks in Kazakhstan, the Ivory Coast or Slovenia; it's playing it for people in Munich, Israel – and Thailand.

The city of Munich and the country of Israel have both taken official steps to reduce their dependence on Microsoft software. Those who watch Microsoft (either for a living or simply as a bad

habit) are keeping close tabs on how well Munich and Israel fare against the Microsoft machine.

It may be hard to believe, but Thailand was one of the first - and most successful - governments to stand up to the Redmond giant. Thai Information and Communications Technology (ICT) Minister Dr Surapong Seubwonglee and his staff convinced Microsoft to reduce the price of Windows XP and a strippeddown version of Office XP to a level that people could afford, as part of an ICT computer project. It was a stunning achievement.

On a completely different topic, GPRS mobile phone access to the Internet - whereby you plug a mobile phone into your PC - took a turn for the worse this month when DTAC stopped offering its 999 baht always-on unlimited Internet accounts.

DTAC now offers accounts with a 50-megabyte monthly cap. To put the limitation in perspective, NASA's latest – and great photo of the surface of Mars is 13MB. If you download that picture four times, you'd blow your entire monthly allowance.


However, AIS has come forward with an outstanding promotion: mobile phone service plus unlimited GPRS Internet access for 1,200 baht a month. I've heard that the folks at Telewiz, in the basement of Big C, know all about the service and how to set it up.

Be aware that not all GPRS phones are created equal. Some mobile phone manufacturers are gaining a reputation for selling phones that are supposed to connect to the Internet, but don't.

After you buy the phone and open the box, you may discover there's no way to connect the phone to your PC. One reader said that he had to buy a separate, custom cable for his Nokia phone. It cost 3,800 baht and had to be shipped from Bangkok.

This is a classic bait and switch. If you buy a phone and intend to use it to connect to the Internet, open the box and make sure a USB cable is included. If you don't see a USB cable and software in the box, put your money back in your pocket.

African odyssey is Theroux's best

not prolific. He has published 22 novels and eight travel books. Apart from The Mosquito Coast and The O-Zone, his novels are rather slight. But he is a masterful travel writer.

His railway excursions have taken him throughout India and Southeast Asia, Russia and China, North and South America. He has circumnavigated the Mediterranean and paddled a canoe among the islands of the South Pacific.

And now he has written his best travel book, Dark Star Safari: Overland from Cairo to Capetown (Penguin Books, London, 2003, 495pp). Never before has he been so attentive to the

world natural around him or more sympathetic to the people he meets.

This may well be because of the very arduousness of his journey, mostly in battered vehicles on very bad roads, and possibly also because he has mellowed with age.

The former wunderkind of American literature, who published his first novel just a couple years after leaving the Peace Corps, celebrates his 60th birthday at the end of his journey.

Now why is this rich, famous, soon-to-be sexagenarian embarking on a dirty, dangerous and exhausting overland trip from Cairo to Capetown?

In a way, it's a homecoming. In 1963, Paul Theroux joined the Peace Corps and served as a teacher in Malawi, followed by three more years in Uganda.

"All news out of Africa is bad," he opens his account. "It made me want to go there, though not for the horror, the hot spots, the massacre-and-earthquake stories you read in the newspaper; I wanted the pleasure of being in Africa again. Feeling that the place was so large it contained many untold tales and some hope and comedy and sweetness too – feeling that there was more to Africa than misery and terror – I aimed to reinsert myself in the bundu, as we used to call the bush, and to wander the antique hinterland. There I had lived and worked, happily, almost 40 years ago, in the heart of the greenest continent."

Stage one is a breeze: down the Nile on a luxury riverboat. For-

aul Theroux is nothing if tunately, Theroux has not lost his trademark nastiness: "Wealthy people too lazy to read love cruises for the anecdotal history and archeological chitchat that later serve them to one-up their listeners in boasting bouts after they go home. The Nile cruise passenger is someone in the process of becoming a licensed bore."

> But as he comes to the roughest part of his journey, overland through Ethiopia and northern Kenya, he is befriended by a wide assortment of Africans. He warmly admires a couple of Catholic nuns who pick him up.

> "If the stereotype of a missionary is of a strong, dull, smiling person with endless patience

and no libido, possessed by a conversion mania, Sister Alexandra was the opposite: tenacious, certainly, but also temperamental, opinionated, open-minded and passionate. And after I got to know her better, I discovered that she was a gourmet cook."

Theroux vents his greatest spleen on what he calls "the agents of virtue": international aid workers who cruise about in air-conditioned Land Rovers and never pick him up: "They were, in general, oafish self-dramatizing prigs and often, complete bastards."

The high points of his trip are crossing Lake Victoria on a steamer with a jolly crew of Tanzanians and paddling down the Zambezi in a canoe with two African companions: "Protected by Karsten and Wilson, I was the nearest thing on earth to Huckleberry Finn."

The overall message of his book is sombre. Africa everywhere is in headlong decline. He is heartbroken to visit his old school in Malawi and find it in near-ruins. Corruption is rampant, so is Aids. Cities have exploded into crime-ridden slums. Countries have been dragged to ruin by power-mad tyrants – the latest being Zimbabwe.

"The worst of them stole from foreign donors and their own people, like the lowest thieves, who rob the church's poor boxes," he concludes. "The kindest Africans had not changed at all and even after all these years the best of them are bare-assed," he observed.

tourists and entrepreneurs serving the tourism industry. Some problems, such as airport limousines, taxis and tuk-tuks, have already been dealt with. I will next try to bring similar order to the beaches around Phuket.

Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra mentioned problems with the beaches the last time we met, saying that he was aware of some tourists who have returned home with a poor impression of the island.

Many beaches on Phuket seem to suffer from too many services of one kind, or from facilities not really suited to the beach, or from insufficient numbers of basic services such as toilets.

I saw this problem first-hand recently when I visited Nai Harn Beach. In addition to the many beach chairs, someone had set up a company – on the beach – called the Thai Cuisine School.

I also noticed the high number of masseuses at Nai Harn, although tourists appear to appreciate this service and perhaps it does not constitute a problem.

But there are too many sunloungers. One of my ideas is to allow each operator a maximum number of beds. Or I may introduce a policy whereby sunloungers

'have received many complaints from must be stacked away – out of sight – until a customer wants to use one.

> The tambon administration organizations must take greater responsibility for what is done on public land and must enforce regulations more rigorously.

> Another of my plans is to improve public areas at Mai Khao Beach, some of which have suffered encroachment. If the provincial government does not manage development there, further encroachment is likely to take place.

> I have given the chiefs of the Phuket Town, Kathu and Thalang district offices the task of putting the beaches in their respective jurisdictions in order. A careful balance must be met between serving the needs of tourists and providing sufficient work for local people.

> Vice-Governor Pongpow Ketthong and Suksun Siengek, the Chief Administrative Officer of Thalang District Office, are responsible for a pilot project at Surin and Bang Tao beaches. I will report later on this, and on the construction of 11 public toilets at Phuket's beaches.

> One-stop check: I would like to talk again about the planned development at Tah Chat Chai. Officers from the police and

provincial departments will check vehicles for contraband, including drugs, plants and meat, as well as illegal workers.

I expect the construction of this project, which will include a rest area for tourists, to begin at the end of this year.

Slow service: Some THE GOVERNOR'S tourists have reported that the procedure at the Chalong Bay onestop immigration and harbor service for

yachts takes too long. A number of people have claimed that registration took up to 90 minutes. This is too long and I have made it clear to those manning the office that the service must be streamlined.

Sporting chance: Many people have told me that a sports center in the north of the island to serve the Phuket-Phang Nga-Krabi area is a good idea. I have now put my proposal to Santiphab Techavanich,



chief of the Sports Authority of Thailand, and look forward to discussing this matter further with him.

I want to see some real actiontaken soon, such as a study of the area or the drawing-up of plans, and I will push to achieve my goal.

Helping the poor: Finally, more than 6,600 people registered as being poor in the January 5-17 period. Of these, the vast majority – 4,897 said that they did not

own the house they lived in. Debt and having no arable land were next on the list of reasons given by those registering.

This registration scheme lasts until March 31 and I will announce more findings at that date.

PMT is one of more than 150 recognized symptoms of PMS. Most of these are physical rather than psychological, and the effects range from negligible to severe enough to affect everyday activities.

Symptoms of PMS include headaches, irritability, restlessness and insomnia: tenderness in the abdomen and breasts; diarrhea; increased appetite; dizziness; water retention; and fatigue.

And the cause? Some researchers believe that fluctuations in progesterone and estrogen levels are responsible. An-

nce a month, as they other theory links it with sudden changes in the body's level of natural opiates.

Yet another theory – as you've probably guessed, PMS research is big on theory, short on evidence – links vitamin B6 deficiency to the depression and mood swings of PMS. However, it's possible to overdose on B6, so look to taking it in natural forms – nuts, bananas, bread, even Marmite or Vegemite if you can find them on Phuket – rather than relying on supplements.

While there is no cure for Menstrual Syndrome (PMS) that PMS, many women – and not all

of them old wives - have developed their own modern folk remedies. One such remedy proposes eating heaps of carbohydrates in the week before your period.

The theory is that complex carbs help the body dispose of excess progesterone. Pasta

ing everyone how to do things and and other forms of complex carwanting everything done just so. bohydrates may also increase levels of serotonin in the brain, resulting in a calmer mood.

> Chocolate, which contains iron, magnesium and milk, can work wonders. Iron helps with tiredness and irritability, and magnesium can help to regulate moods. Milk contains calcium, and as far back as the 1930s it was noted that blood calcium levels were significantly lower in the week preceding menstruation. So far, calcium is the only supplement to show a positive effect on the symptoms of PMS.

> While chocolate can be a girl's best friend, so too can a glass of wine. Alcohol acts in a

similar fashion to benzodiazapines and barbiturates by enhancing the effects of a neurotransmitter in the brain called GABA (gamma aminobutyric acid). Increased action of GABA has a relaxing effect, as anyone who opts for a vodka martini with lunch knows.

Exercise is frequently cited as a remedy but in this instance what we're dying to mention is sex. It's better for you – and more fun – than aerobics. An orgasm relaxes the abdominal muscles and releases helpful hormones.

Space allows just a cursory glance at PMS, but by way of farewell, consider: homeopathy, especially Rescue Remedy from the Bach Flowers range; pampering yourself at one of Phuket's spas; doing nothing, except curling up to watch a romantic movie; sleeping; and if you have a partner, helping them to understand how you feel.

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What a wild child needs

Sadly, the shocking "execution" of 15-year-old Khajornkiat Tongdeesuk on a deserted beach on Koh Sireh is just the latest in a series of incidents of appalling violence among Phuket's troubled youth.

Police have cracked down on delinquent gangs with some success, particularly in the Saphan Hin area of Phuket Town. But it may be that in addressing the problems of that specific location, the police have simply forced the gangs to move elsewhere.

The mayhem occasionally spills over into the general population but more often – as in the case of Khajornkiat – the most extreme violence is between teenagers pursuing vendettas. A spiral of violence results, in which every act must be answered by a bloodier reprisal.

Police attention, by its nature reactive, seems to make little difference in the long term because of the revolving-door policy of juvenile detention facilities and the inability of the courts to try, as adults, the minors who commit the most heinous crimes. Are there any long-term solutions, or must gang violence be regarded as an inevitable and incurable social ill?

To take this view would be an admission of defeat. No society, especially one which prides itself on the compassionate principles of Buddhism, could ever accept such violent behavior among its children – and at just 15 years of age, Khajornkiat and his alleged assailant are still just that, children.

It's frightening to think that some of today's five-year-olds could emerge as vicious criminials in just 10 years, but that is the sad reality Phuket is facing. As with so many societal problems, the answer lies in good parenting, real educational opportunities and an enlightened governmental attitude to the exuberance and energy of youth.

For better or worse, children receive their moral values – good or bad – from their parents. Schools should also play a vital role in reinforcing positive values. Governments can oppress youth or provide them with opportunities for personal development and growth.

Adult society needs to take more responsibility for its youth, but this will require greater effort. It's often easier for parents to slap wayward children rather than to sit down with them and explain why they have done wrong. Yet in impressionable young minds, this only reinforces the idea of violence as a means of conflict resolution.

For teachers, it is easier to pretend problems are insoluble and should therefore be ignored. For the government, it is simpler to close teenagers' hangouts early, or completely, then pretend that this will cure the underlying problems.

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

Who is responsible for my leaky roof?

I had a villa built on Phuket that was completed in January 2003 at a cost of more than 17 million baht. During the monsoon rains in October, I discovered that the roof leaks.

The tiles do not fit together well and the thin plastic sheet under them allows pockets of water to form when it is windy and rain enters between the tiles.

I have a letter from the project manager stating that the project was developed by a competent professional design and construction team that would provide management, project delivery, quality control and security for my investment.

In my agreement with the construction management company is the wording: "In performing the services, the construction manager shall: exercise reasonable skill, care and diligence, which is to be expected of a com-

petent construction manager, experienced in carrying out work of a similar size, scope and complexity in Thailand; apply its knowledge, ideas, experience and abilities to the execution of the services stated in appendix one."

However, I know that an engineer employed by the construction manager queried the project manager about the use of poor-quality plastic – but no one informed me directly.

I think that, as the villa cost

more than 17 million baht, the roof should at least be waterproof. Who is responsible?

Friedrich "Sam" Fauma, Senior Partner of the International Law Office, replies:

It is difficult to give an exact answer without seeing the contracts between you and the various parties.

Depending on the contracts you have with the parties involved, the constructor may be liable to repair the roof if a guarantee period is given, or the designer may be at fault if the roof design allows leaks.

Most importantly, however, the surveyor who represented you should be responsible if he accepted the building as complete, along with the faulty work, especially if there was a dispute about poor quality materials.

Rules for customizing cars

What are the regulations regarding the customizing of cars? Are there stated limits on modifications to bodywork, suspension, engine and gearbox?

Theerayuth Prasertpol, Chief Land Transport Technician at the Phuket Provincial Transport Office, responds:

Internal modifications, such as to the engine and gearbox, will usually be accepted without any inspection. However, more obvious modifications affecting bodywork, vehicle height and handling require authorization.

You must hire a qualified engineer to make detailed drawings of your modifications and to calculate any risks likely to be caused by the alterations. This plan must be sent to the Department of Land Transport (DLT) in Bangkok for approval.

If the director of the DLT approves your plans, then you may alter your vehicle, but only as detailed in the approval. Unsanctioned modifications are illegal.

You should carry the approval document with you to show to police officers or other officials on demand.

That said, I advise you, for your own safety, not to modify your car at all. The vehicle was engineered to work in a certain way without any modifications.

Why do I have to do my banking in person?

I have a Bangkok Bank account Mayuree Suksomboon, Manat a branch in Bangkok. I work about 1½ hours' drive from the branch, and I work from 6 am-6 pm. The bank is open from 10 am-3:30 pm.

Anything to do with banking requires me to go to this branch. Why is this necessary?

In my home country, New Zealand, getting new ATM cards and other matters can be dealt with over the phone or by mail without going to the bank at all.

ager, Bangkok Bank, Phuket Town Branch, replies:

If it is not convenient for you to come to the bank, you can give written authority to a representative you trust to come on your behalf. Your representative must bring his or her ID card or passport and the written authority, which must include your signature, your account number and a statement of what your representative is empowered to do on your behalf.

Only a few matters must be dealt with in person. For example, to be issued with a new bankbook you must go to the bank where you opened the account because other people cannot provide what we require, such as your original signature.

Another example is having a new PIN number issued for your ATM card. You must contact the branch where your account is held. As a security measure, bank policy prohibits a single branch keeping both the ATM card and the PIN code for that card. We keep them separate for customers' security.

The Thai banking system is different from other countries, but everything we do is according to the rules of the Bank of Thailand in order to ensure that customers' accounts are secure.

Some foreign customers do not understand why Thai banks use such security measures, and they look down us for being inconvenient, but it's for their se-



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Infant bodycare firm targets Phuket

PHUKET: Catherine Arfi, founder of Australian-based company babyworkshop and the booming Aromababy line of infant body care products, was in Phuket last month to investigate local market potential with a view to launching direct sales at first-rate spas on the island.

Mrs Arfi launched baby WORKSHOP nine years ago after discovering a demand in Australia for her self-formulated, allnatural babycare products.

Today, Aromababy products are available from hundreds of retailers in Australia. The company has seen phenomenal expansion in South Korea, where its products are available from 600 retailers. It has an additiona further 50 agents in Hong Kong.

Annual company growth is currently 40%, which Mrs Arfi said is restricted only by manpower.

The move to enter the Thai market in Phuket follows baby WORKSHOP's launch in Singapore through a partner company there that is responsible for product distribution throughout Malaysia and

will be the supplier of Aromababy products for Thailand.

Mrs Arfi told the Gazette that Phuket was chosen because of the many high-quality massage services on the island and its close proximity to Singapore, from where the products will be shipped.

"We're interested in world famous spas, such as at the Banyan Tree and the Kata Spa. There's a range of possibilities and we're open to discussion. I think three or four outlets will be enough for now," she

During her visit, Mrs Arfi also held discussions with Hide-Away Spa, which has a spa at Patong and another at Laguna, as well as a store in Chalong.

Mrs Arfi explained that in addition to selling the 24 Aromababy products, ranging in price from about 300-1,050 baht, she would like agents

to provide babycare services.

"We would like to have a partner that would be responsible for introducing the idea of pregnancy massage, postnatal care and infant massage to the many tourists who come here," she

Looking beyond the baby market, Mrs Arfi said that although her products were originally developed for infants, they are appropriate for anyone and are recommended for pregnant women and for people with highly sensitive skin. "Since the products are 100% pure, they're fine for anybody," she explained.

Mrs Arfi added that she expects the unscented skincare products, including the sunscreen and the after-sun and skin-moisturizing lotions, to be the best-selling lines on Phuket.

"We are aiming for about 5-10% of the local [bodycare] market. We want 5-10% of the upper market."

Mrs Arfi explained that another potential market is health professionals on the island. "There are hospitals in America that use our products, as well as hospitals in Hong Kong and Dubai. Our commitment to that industry and to caring for babies is very strong," she said.

The appeal of Aromababy products outside the infant market has inspired Mrs Arfi to develop a new product range, called Pure Spa. The new range of about 10 products, due to be launched later this year, is targeted at women.

Unravelling the tangle of bonds

onds are one of the most important financial products for the average investor. At the same time, they are one of the least understood. Indeed, most investors have money in bonds but are unaware of it. All pension funds hold bonds as a major asset class.

I wrote an article about bonds recently and several readers asked for more information.

What is a bond? Basically, bonds are fixed-interest securities that pay a fixed rate of interest (usually twice a year) until maturity. Bonds, superficially at least, are very simple financial instruments. A bond comes into being bought and held Long-term interest when an entity, be it a country or large corporation, makes the deci- achieve that aim. sion to borrow money

from the public and corporate low-to-moderate growth with sectors.

The better its credit rating, the lower the interest rate the borrowing entity has to pay for use of this money. Bonds are usually issued for five- to seven-year periods, though governments often issue bonds for 10 years or more.

The price that one can obtain for a bond when sold before maturity is not guaranteed. For example, let us say that an investor buys a seven-year bond, issued by the World Bank, that is paying 5% interest a year.

The investor gets the 5% a year and the World Bank guarantees to repay the capital in full at the end of seven years. Instead of waiting, however, our investor decides to sell the bond after holding it for just one year.

The bond still has six years to run before maturity and will continue to pay 5% interest every year until

then. The law of supply and demand plays a role in determining the market price of the bond but the major determinant of price is the interest rates prevailing in the

> economy at the time of sale.

To digress slightly, central banks determine short-term interest rates, which they use to guide the future of the economy. rates, however, are set by the market.

When an economy is experiencing

rates are likely to be modest. On the other hand, when an economy is growing too rapidly and inflation is rising, long-term interest rates will also rise.

Returning to our example, the price that the seller can obtain for the bond depends on prevailing interest rates.

If, a year later, the market demands that the interest rate paid on World Bank bonds be 6% rather than 5%, then the amount the market will pay for our investor's bond will be lower than its original price.

The market is demanding a return whereas the bond in

fall, the seller will make a capital gain because the market will pay a premium on the bond's previous value.

Such ups and downs occur only in the secondary market. The original face value and maturity value of the bond – and the interest rate stipulated by the issuer – do not change.

Bonds have a variety of uses. For an investor who wants low inflation, long-term interest to invest money without taking a risk, a bond bought and held to maturity will achieve that aim. For a retired person wanting to be guaranteed an exact income for a fixed period, bonds are

> Here are terms commonly used in the bond market:

Coupon: The annual interest rate earned from the bond.

Running yield: The annual interest received as a percentage of the price paid for the bond (as opposed to its face value).

Yield to maturity: Running Yield, plus or minus any capital gain or loss at maturity (due to the difference between face value and the price actually paid for the bond) expressed as an annual percentage. Junk bonds: Bonds in

the market issued by borrowers whose credit ratings have since declined to below "investment grade" (as determined by rating agencies such as

Standard & Poors). Junk bonds offer higher interest rates, but carry a higher risk of the capital not being repaid in full. Zero coupon bonds: Plen-

ty of investors do not want regular interest payments during the life of the bond, preferring instead to look forward to a guaranteed lump sum at maturity.

They buy the bonds at a considerable discount on the face value, but receive full face value at maturity.

The discount is equivalent to the interest that would have been paid over the remaining life of the bond, had it been a conventional bond.

Bond funds: These are generally unit trusts or mutual funds that invest solely in bonds.

Money market funds: Although they normally invest in a range of money market instruments, these funds often incorporate short-dated bonds (bonds that are close to maturity) to enhance returns.



ome deft product placement by Daimler-Chrysler sees Angelina Jolie driving a Jeep Wrangler in her latest movie, Lara Croft Tomb Raider: The Cradle of Life.

The publicity blurb surrounding the film is excruciating. "We view Jeep as a perfect partner in this film because the brand's attributes are a natural fit with the Lara Croft character," it says. Believe that and you'll believe anything.

Lara Croft's unique Wrangler – three were built for the film – boasts a roll cage complete with grab-handles, special front and rear bumpers, a winch and riveted fender flares.

As well as the cinema epic, Jeep has created print and TV ads featuring Jolie in a bid to make some kind of connection, however tenuous.

The first Tomb Raider movie grossed more than US\$47 million in its opening weekend and nearly US\$300 million worldwide, making Jolie a household name.

The Wrangler's popularity is presumably because it combines a degree of off-road ruggedness and superior on-road refinement with the new, extended wheelbase and a strong four-liter power plant.

The motor produces a healthy 190 bhp (142 kW) at 4,600 rpm, but far more impressive is the torque output of 319 Nm at a mere 3,200 rpm. With

permanent fourwheel drive and a four-speed automatic transmission, the Wrangler is both capable and comfortable.

The latest Wrangler Unlimited maintains the legendary 4x4 Jeep capability but now is

> The Ford version was known as the GP (for General Purpose) and this became "Jeep", a name coined by the Washington Daily News in 1941.

> The Jeep name was never used by Ford, however, and it was only after the war that Willys adopted it. The Jeep had a threespeed manual gearbox and permanent four-wheel drive with a two-speed transfer box.

> > Although the manufacturers

claimed a top speed of slightly more than 100 km/h, the ride was so rough it was foolhardy to try to maintain this kind of velocity.

During the war, more than 600,000 Jeeps were made, roughly half by Ford and half by Willys. They were used by the British and Russian armies as well as the Americans and were converted to act as gun-carriers, ambulances as well as transport for

In 1970, Kaiser-Jeep was bought by American Motors (AMC), and in 1978 AMC became a division of Renault. In 1987, Chrysler acquired AMC from Renault, including the Toledo factory where the Wrangler and the Cherokee are still made, although right-hand drive Cherokees are also made in Austria by Steyr-Magna.

The Wrangler, previously called the Jeep Universal, appeared in 1986 and has remained essentially unchanged since.

The Wrangler Unlimited, however, features high-pressure gas shock absorbers, huge 30inch off-road Goodyear tires mounted on special five-spoke aluminum wheels and a heavyduty rear axle for towing.

Airbags are now fitted and air conditioning is standard. There is a quality sound system. Options include side-steps, a leather steering wheel and cruise control.

There is also an innovative sunroof as well as a full top-down arrangement. The new soft-top gives a second open-air option by folding back the top above the driver and front seat passenger to create a wide opening, far larger than any conventional sun

The Wrangler has come a long way in its history, but remains a relatively inexpensive, go-anywhere kind of vehicle. Well worth investigating, even if Angelina Jolie sees fit to drive one.

An unforgettable experience

he home of Mom Luang Tri Devakul, on the headland between Kata and Kata Noi, is perhaps the loveliest estate on the island. This private residence has been open to the public for fine dining, art exhibitions and concerts for a few years, ever since Mom Tri decided to remodel the buildings into an exclusive resort.

"The concept for Mom Tri's Kitchen is wellness," said Adisak "Dan" Pitukrojananont, General Manager of Mom Tri's Villa Royale. "We have a menu of many Thai and international influences but the concept is fresh, healthy, organic food, some of which comes from Mom Tri's garden in Chiang Mai."

K. Dan hands me a lemon grown in Mom Tri's orchard. Not wanting to use local limes and unable to find good-quality lemons, Mom Tri planted an orchard that now supplies his restaurants.

Dusk, just as the sun sets into the Andaman, is a great time to begin dinner here. Billie Holiday – on CD – is suitable mood music.

The appetizer selection includes some of Mom Tri's own recipes. I chose the aubergine roll; a soft eggplant rolled in pine

nuts and apricot chutney, and garnished with feta cheese. A remarkable taste, combining Mediterranean and Asian influences.

Reading the menu is frustrating fun because it's impossible to eat everything that appeals: rock lobster ravioli in herbs and white wine cream sauce; or pangrilled tiger prawns drizzled with spicy lemon grass and mint dressing

Soup-lovers can dip into a chilled mango and cucumber gazpacho, pumpkin soup infused with basil purée, or a Thai *tom kha gai*.

Executive chef Sura Putha, sent by Mom Tri to train in the Alsace, recommended seafood. I chose the rock lobster flambé, with a brandy and curry powder sauce, served with jasmine rice. I particularly enjoyed the subtle pleasure of a light curry mingling with the delicate rock lobster.

I picked soft-shelled crab

and tiger prawn with a garlic and black peppercorn sauce, and panfried vegetables, as my entrée. Although both of my choices were seafood, the tastes and the presentations could not be compared.

The same wine list that has won Mom Tri's Boathouse the Award of Excellence from *Wine Spectator Magazine* since 1995 is available, as well as an interesting choice of organic wines.

The fun cocktail list includes a delicious combination of gin, Campari and Grand Marnier mixed with grapefruit, pineapple and lime juices. Served in a pineapple, it's named the Koh Boo, after Mom Tri's island, which is just off Kata Beach.

The price structure for appetizers, salads, pastas and main courses will not upset any pocket. If you want a memorable dinner and an unforgettable experience, this is the place.

Mom Tri's Kitchen is open daily for dinner 6:30 pm to 11:30 pm. Breakfast is served from 7 am until 10:30 am and a menu of light meals and sandwiches is served all day.

very specialization has a unique vocabulary and wine is no exception. Let's peel away the haziness behind some of the more confusing terms.

Barrel Fermentation, Barrel-**Aged:** Two types of containers are used to ferment grape juice stainless steel and oak. When fermented in a oak barrel, the wine is said to be barrel-fermented. Barrel-aged wine, on the other hand, means the wine was put into a barrel for some time after fermentation. Both barrel fermentation and barrel aging are expensive, but impart complexity to the wine. Be wary of wines that claim to be oak-aged. This does not have the same meaning as barrel-aged.

Botrytis: A specialized fungus that, under ideal conditions, concentrates the sugar in grapes sufficiently to produce dessert wine.

Brut: Any Champagne or other sparkling wine made from chardonnay and pinot noir grapes that is not sweet, but rather is dry.


Estate-bottled: Wine bottled at the winery where it was made. This implies higher quality because the winery retains control over the wine until it is bottled.

Filtration: The process of removing unwanted solids was invented in ancient Egypt, using camel hair to separate the grape skins from the wine. Filtration is more advanced today and generally improves wine, leaving it brilliantly clear and capable of aging with genuine expression of its true character.

Gold Medal or Show Reserve:

Some countries, most notably Australia, place much emphasis on wines that win awards at wine shows. Many people who have faith in these shows fail to inquire of the judges' qualifications, whether they were in agreement,

or how many wines were entered.


Off-dry: If a wine is not dry but is only slightly sweet, then it is said to be Off-dry.

Malolactic Fermentation: Everyone knows yeast ferments grape sugar to make wine but not so many know of a second fermentation that uses bacteria to convert natural malic grape acid to lactic acid, the same acid found in milk and cheese. This second, malolactic fermentation, reduces acidity and gives complexity to wines from cooler climates that otherwise would be too acidic.

Petulant: Not a grumpy wine but one with just the slightest touch of bubbles.

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Construction Update

Katamanda begins phase 2

KATA: Construction of the 40unit Katamanda Village Estate project on 32-rai of headland overlooking Kata and Kata Noi bays is now entering its second phase.

All infrastructure and common-area facilities are operational, and the 15 villas built in the project's first phase are now occupied.

Fifteen more units have been sold and are now under construction and only 10 land plots are still available. Green Property Developments Ltd, which invested more than 1 billion baht in the project, expects the project to be completed in mid-2005.

Villas range in size from two- to five-bedroom units, with total floor space ranging from 278 to 637 square meters. Many units are custom designed to meet owner requirements, and architectural design is described as a "blend of traditional tropical Asian themes with modern facilities and convenience".

Privacy and sea views were primary design factors in the project, which is targeted at expatriates. Prices range between 18.9 and 55.5 million baht, and some units are also available for rent.

KAMALA: Construction and project management firm Clark-freeman Company have begun work on the 45-unit Kamala Hills apartment complex on a five-rai plot in Kamala. The three-phase project, now about 10% complete, will comprise professionally-de-

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s we know, there are amazing plants in Phuket. Some of them are, well, a bit boring - very green, but boring. Others live only to show off.

One of the showiest plants around has to be the *erythrina*, also known as the "sunshine tree" or "coral tree". Thais know it as *thong-lang*.

Its flowers are so showy it seems to be bragging. In terms of self-confidence, it has to be the Muhammad Ali of the plant world – quite talented, and not afraid to let the world know it.

I was on my way back from Nai Harn beach one recent weekend and saw several of these spectacular trees. I stopped to have a closer look. From a distance, the vivid color is very much like the flame tree, but up close the flowers look like giant red tiger claws. In fact, "tiger claw", is another of this tree's many aliases.

Originally from Brazil, the *erythrina* is a genus comprising some 100 trees and shrubs, most with spiny trunks and branches. Some of these produce strikingly beautiful flowers. *Erythrina variegata*, which grows to 15 meters, is the one most commonly seen in Phuket.

The island is definitely in its dry season now, which has

caused the three-part leaves to drop completely – as they do every year.

What saves the tree from looking like a victim of ritual suicide is the incredible blossoms that follow this leaf-shedding habit, just as the new growth starts. The dramatic scarlet coloring is almost surreal in its intensity.

One of the most fascinat-

ing things about this plant is the ability of its flowers to move with the sun's position. Most species of the erythrina show this daily "heliotropic movement" of the leaflets (*helio* equals sun, *tropic* equals orientation). It even has a night orientation.

Not only does this plant boast with its Day-glo colors, it really goes over the top with its acrobatic skills.

Another variation of the *erythrina* has boldly variegated leaves with bright yellow veins running through them. If you're considering putting one in your garden, leave plenty of space — or be prepared for a battle of wills between you and the plant.

A friend once planted one next to his pergola, so that he'd have a bit of extra shade in the

heat of the day. This "bit of shade" turned into an unruly monster. He couldn't stop it growing. Despite hacking huge limbs off regularly, he couldn't subdue its determination to take over his entire garden.

Eventually he decided that the only way he could triumph was to uproot it completely. So he did.

It's now been replaced with a palm tree, which will probably act a little less like a tyrannical dictator next to the pergola.

Why is it that so many plants in this part of the world seem to have it in for us? The *erythrina* is yet another poisonous plant that thrives in the tropics. The seeds of most types of *erythrina* contain alkaloids, so

eating them certainly wouldn't be the brightest idea in the world.

The *erythrina* likes full sun and well-drained soil and blooms best after drought. Quite large cuttings root easily – just lop a sizable branch from the main tree and put it in moist compost. It will wilt a little for a week or two, then will quickly get its act together, resulting in a sturdy young clone of the original.

As *erythrina* produces large amounts of nectar, in some parts of the world it seems that hummingbirds pollinate the spe-

cies. It would be rather good to think that they do that here, too – but I've never seen a humming-bird in Phuket.

Enjoy these scarlet blooms that you see all over Phuket at the moment – because they won't be around for long.


