Shock for TRT as Prasit quits

PHUKET TOWN: The outgoing President of the Provincial Administration Organization, (*OrBorJor*), Dr Prasit Koeysiripong, dropped a bombshell at his farewell media appearance on January 30 when he said he would not be standing as a Thai Rak Thai (TRT) candidate in next year's parliamentary elections.

It had been widely anticipated that Dr Prasit would lead the TRT campaign in 2005, when the governing party will be trying to wrest control of Phuket away from the hands of its three current MPs, who are all members of the opposition Democrat Party

Dr Prasit, 48, who first set up the TRT Cooperation Center in Phuket in 1997, said that he would continue to support the party from the sidelines, but would not stand for election.

"In the four years that I have worked for the *OrBorJor*, I have had to take part in 10 meetings or similar functions every day, which is too much at my stage in life," he explained.

"I have had to make sacrifices by sharing my time between the public and my family. Now it's time to give something back to my family."

"I confirm that I shall not stand in any political election," he said at the farewell event, held at the Pearl Hotel in Phuket Town.

He explained that he had at first been persuaded by senior TRT members to stand as MP for Phuket District 2. However, others were keen to see him stand for District 1, which en-

compasses Phuket Town. "But I have always refused to stand for District 1 because there's a candidate for that area already," he added.

Local dentist and long-time TRT party organizer Dr Yada Palimaphan has been tipped to be the party's candidate for District 1 in 2005.

However, the *Gazette* understands that Dr Prasit's departure is prompting a major rethink of TRT strategy in Phuket.

"From now on," Dr Prasit said, "I'd rather concentrate on my own business. It will be bet-

ter not to write about me in terms of political issues, but as an ordinary citizen."

Asked about his specific plans, he said, "I may become a lecturer or launch my own monthly economics magazine."

Two candidates – Samroeng Chaisorn of the *OrBorJor Gao Mai* TRT ("New Step TRT") party and Wisut Santikun of the *OrBorJor Gao Mai Khonbaanrao* ("New Step Our People") party – will compete to take Dr Prasit's place in the *OrBorJor* in elections scheduled for March 14.

Phang Nga avian 'flu outbreak contained

PHANG NGA: Some 70,000 chickens and ducks were swiftly slaughtered after an outbreak of bird 'flu was confirmed on a farm in Takuapa District on January 29.

The Government has since lowered the alert status of Phang Nga from red to yellow, indicating that it believes the cull has stopped the spread of the H5N1 virus.

Pairat Dejsiri, Assistant Chief of Phang Nga Provincial Livestock Office (PNPLO), told the *Gazette* that chickens on a farm in Takuapa had been found to have died from the virus.

However, a five-year-old child who was hospitalized on suspicion of having avian 'flu has since been diagnosed as having conventional pneumonia.

K. Pairat explained that a poultry farmer had found about 20 of his ducks and 15 of his chickens dead. He reported the deaths to the PNPLO and the corpses were taken to the Southern Veterinary Research and Development Center, which confirmed the presence of the virus on January 29.

"We immediately reported this to the governor of the province and we declared Takuapa District a bird 'flu danger zone. All fowl within a radius of five kilometers of the farm were ordered slaughtered."

"We have set up checkpoints to prevent poultry from being moved in or out of the danger zone," he added.

Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura ordered a ban on Continued on Page 3

Fallout from chicken

UDON THANI: As 58-year-old village headman Boonchu Srisingha was leaving his home in tambon Chiang Yuen on the morning of 27 January, he noticed a white plastic bag hanging from the fence surrounding his home. Intrigued, he looked closer and spotted a note attached to it that read, "Please give the contents of this bag to Mongkol Singhamaw, aged 28, of 129 Moo 5."

As the bag was tightly wrapped in electrical wire and appeared to have a fuse, K. Boonchu suspected it wasn't a birthday present. Rather than contact K. Mongkol – a handsome construction worker recently returned from Israel and due to be married in a few days – he called the police.

When Muang district police arrived they were just as puzzled by the bag. They learned from K. Boonchu that K. Mongkol had already been the victim of numerous threats by a jilted ex-lover, and

they had to suspect the worst – a time bomb. A bomb squad from Border Patrol Police Unit 24 was called in.

Word travels quickly in a Thai village, and by the time the experts arrived, a sizable crowd had already gathered to watch.

The team X-rayed the plastic bag, but the results were inconclusive. For safety's sake they had to assume that it was a bomb. Thinking it would be too risky to move, they decided the best course of action was to detonate the bag in a "controlled explosion".

An explosive charge was placed near the plastic bag and set off. The bag's contents – putrefied chicken parts and human excrement – went flying in every direction, splattering the crowd of onlookers. Hopefully the incident will teach them to stand a bit farther back the next time the bomb squad pays a visit.

The two friends, 24-yearold Dumbwrong Rattanajun (not the normal spelling, but phonetically correct and appropriate enough in meaning for this tale) and his friend Sompong Chaowmas, lived side by side in a pair of flats built on the rooftop of a four-story apartment block.

The two, who worked as delivery men for a local whisky supplier, were sitting together on the rooftop getting drunk on the afternoon of January 8.

Not everybody reacts to alcohol the same way. In Dumbwrong's case the demon drink caused him to pick up his buddy K. Sompong, cradle him in his arms like a big baby, and swing him back and forth – all while standing just inches from the knee-high metal railing that marked the border between the rooftop and thin air.

Sensing danger, K. Sompong screamed, "Put me down! Put me down!" But his increasingly panicked entreaties only amused K. Dumbwrong, causing him to swing ever faster and more wildly – until he lost his balance and both men plunged onto an aluminum awning covering the building's entrance.

The pair were critically injured from the impact and were reported as having blood running from their mouths as neighbors rushed them to hospital.



Kamala jewelry thieves net B1m

KAMALA: Jewelry and cash totaling about 1 million baht were stolen from a Kamala house on the night of January 26 while the French owners – a couple in their 60s – were in Patong.

The couple, named by police as Mr and Mrs Gerard Bonnaval, left their home to go to their business in Patong at 7:30 pm and returned about 1 am to find a wooden door at the rear of the property had been forced and 10 pieces of jewelry were missing from a safe deposit box.

Honeymooning tourist drowns

CHALONG: An Indian who was on his honeymoon in Phuket drowned on January 28 while on an outing to Coral Island.

Pol Maj Anek Mongkol of Chalong Police Station named the dead man as Dusmvant Sharma. aged 30. The body was flown back to India the following day.

Illegals top crime stats

PHUKET TOWN: Statistics released by the Phuket Provincial Police for the January 1-25 period revealed that illegal immigration again topped the crime figures, with 211 arrests made.

Other common crimes were gambling (178 arrests) and possession or use of narcotics (60 arrests).

Freeway murder suspect surrenders

PHUKET TOWN: A man who has been sought for more than eight months over a double murder at the Freeway restaurant on Bang Tao beach surrendered to police on January 28.

Police issued an arrest warrant for Suwat Kaewkong soon after the double murder on May 10 last year and alleged that Suwat, who owns another restaurant at Bang Tao, had been involved in a dispute over land with the murder victims, Suwim Noodang and his nephew, Pramote Choochat.

The two were gunned down as they ate supper at the Freeway by three men armed with assault rifles. K. Suwim's wife, Euangporn Tongpet, was shot in the arm but survived.

Suwat went to Phuket Town Police Station about 4 pm on January 28 with his lawyer. He denied any connection with the

killings. He told police that he had been in Malaysia and had not realized that he had been implicated in the murder case.

The Deputy Superintendent of Phuket Town Police Station, Pol Lt Col Samarn Chainarong, told the Gazette that Suwat was now being held at the station. He said two other suspects, whom he did not name, were still at large and urged them to surrender.

Air passengers hit a record 500,000

PHUKET: The latest figures on air passenger arrivals and departures show that Phuket is in the middle of a tourism boom with a record 509,841 visitors coming and going in January.

This is the first time the half-million figure has been exceeded in a single calendar month. The number represents a whopping 23% increase on the figure of 390,109 recorded in January last year.

The number of flights was also up, from 2,609 flights in January 2003 to 2,936 flights this year. Of these, 636 were charter flights – up from 542 the year before.

There were 1,225 domestic

flights carrying 268,079 passengers and 1,711 international flights with 241,762 passengers.

'Most charter flights are coming from Asia, especially Japan, Korea and China, and also from Norway and Sweden," said Lt Cdr Boonchart Prompoon, Director of the Airports Authority of Thailand, Phuket. "Tourism is booming now, with good support from the government."

No figures were available for the average waiting time for tourists in the queues for Immigration counters.

AirAsia launches Phuket service

PHUKET: The first no-frills AirAsia flight from Bangkok to Phuket landed on February 3 with all 148 seats filled.

Thirty passengers aboard the Boeing 737-300 paid just 99 baht apiece for the one-way

all imports of chickens, ducks and eggs into Phuket three days before the Phang Nga outbreak was announced. It is hoped that Phuket, being an island, can keep the disease at bay.

Sunart Wongchawalit, the Chief of the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) told the Gazette that the PPLO was continuing a program of checks on the island's poultry.

"We are doing random checks on every place that has chickens – even the zoo and places where people keep fighting cocks. So far, I can say with

confidence that there is absolutely no sign of bird 'flu on Phuket."

"Our controls are the strictest in Thailand. Even those drivers who have paperwork to show that the chickens they are transporting are free of disease are being turned away [at Tah Chat Chai checkpoint]," he said.

He denied rumors that cases of bird flu had been detected on the island. Examination of birds found dead showed that they had died of poisoning, not the virus, indicating that some inhabitants had been conducting their own informal culls of birds - including a peacock.

K. Sunart said that other provinces have reported similar 'vigilante" killings.

"I believe we have to be very strict in our controls – that's the only way we can be completely safe. The officers working to control the situation must be strict and honest."

He admitted, however, "I am worried that some people may try to smuggle poultry by boat. From Phang Nga it's easy to come in Phuket by sea."

Whether smuggling of poultry would be a profitable venture is doubtful. An ad hoc survey of restaurants by the Gazette revealed that many have taken chicken and duck off the menu after kitchen staff refused to handle poultry. In those restaurants that are still offering poultry, few diners are tempted.

In a PR exercise reminiscent of the recent chicken-andnothing-else dinner eaten by Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra and his Cabinet, K. Sunart also announced that the PPLO is planning a free chicken feast on February 7 at Saphan Hin. The aim of the event is to tempt those now eschewing poultry back into the chicken-chewing camp. The feast will start at 5 pm.





Missing karaoke girl found dead in alley

PHUKET TOWN: Police have yet to determine whether a karaoke girl from Phang Nga whose body was discovered in a downtown alley on January 27 committed suicide by jumping from the car park of a nearby hotel - or whether she was pushed.

The body of 24-year-old Sirijit "Aom" Chuwong was recovered from an inaccessible alley running between the Thavorn Grand Plaza Hotel on Chana Jaroen Rd and Kinnaree Karaoke, where the girl had been employed as a waitress.

Pol Lt Col Chote Chidchai told the Gazette the girl had been dead at least a week before the discovery of the body, which he described as having dyed red hair and a tattoo of a dragon on one thigh.

He said the girl's bra had been pushed up, possibly indicating that she had been sexually assaulted.

Her mobile phone was found next to a retaining wall on the third floor of the hotel car park, above where the corpse was discovered, indicating that she fell from there to her death. One leg was apparently smashed by the impact, he added.

Colleagues at the karaoke bar told investigators that K. Aom had had many problems with her relationship with her boyfriend, Weera Intaranon, 30, was miserable, and often discussed taking her own life.

Col Chote told the Gazette that, as of February 3, many people had been interrogated, but police were still no closer to unraveling the mystery.

He declined to give the names of those who had been questioned, saying that to do so might affect the ongoing investigation. He added that he was still awaiting autopsy results.

olls on February 8 will elect yet another municipal council for Patong. Two parties are vying for votes: the Rak (Love) Patong Party and the Patong Progress Party.

A total of 9,442 people are entitled to vote in the election which, for the first time, will be monitored by the Phuket Election Committee (PEC).

The Rak Patong Party (RPP) brings together the resources of three of the town's best-known figures: two former mayors, Pian Keesin and Surasak Maneesri, and the main spokesman of the entertainment industry, Chairat Sukbal.

Although the RPP has more recognizable faces than its opposition, many voters will be wondering how long it will stand united, given that K. Pian's ejection from power in October 2001 was engineered by K. Surasak, and that K. Chairat went up against both of them in the most recent election, in November 2002.

Many will wonder about the wisdom of voting for a party that includes K. Surasak, who was booted out of the mayor's seat by then-Interior Minister Purachai Piemsomboon and barred from holding a political post by the Constitutional Court after accusations of corruption against him were found to be proven.

K.Pian overcame a bid to have him barred from the election. A case against him for corruption, now before the National Counter Corruption Commission, is still being considered. But for voters, this raises another question: if K. Pian is found to have been corrupt, will this mean another election – the sixth in six years?

Even if he is not, the coalition between K. Pian and K. Surasak looks fragile – the two have fought bitterly and publicly over the past two years. Now they are campaigning together; but how long can the peace last?

Chairat Sukbal, the RPP's secretary, told the *Gazette*, "We are 120% sure we will win this election because the other team has no experience of management or politics.

"Patong belongs to the whole country, not just to the people of Patong. Just because your sister is the local MP doesn't mean you get to be mayor.

"K. Pian has a great deal of experience in politics. He has been a *phu yai baan* [village chief], a *kamnan* [tambon chief] and is also a former mayor of Patong."

The main planks in the RPP's platform are:

Education: "We would like to see schools in Patong teaching every student three languages [Thai, English and one other]. We

also want to teach people how to make products for the One Tambon One Product project. In addition, we want to expand and upgrade the local library."

Tourism and activities:

PARTY TIME

Sangkhae Leelanapaporn reports on the twists and turns leading up to this week's Patong elections, and looks at the two parties' election platforms.

"Patong is a major center for international tourism. We would like to build a proper soccer stadium so that we can invite top soccer teams from around the world to come to practice and relax. This would help to promote tourism in Patong.

"We also want to organize other major events, such as a Phuket International Marathon or world-class windsurfing or jet-ski competitions.

"In the low season, perhaps, we could arrange events such as a jazz festival."

Economics: "The people of Patong are scared to invest in businesses because no one gives them guidance. We will support and encourage them to invest in businesses that will bring income from tourism.

"We would also like to establish links with other municipalities around the world. For example, I could introduce the Mayor to the Lord Mayors of San Francisco or Paris, so that we could form tourism links."

Social, Cultural and Political: "We will align our policy to dovetail with those of the province as a whole and with the policies of Phang Nga and Krabi.

"We have to bring order to Patong Beach by such measures, perhaps, as having tuk-tuk drivers in Patong wear the same color shirts and drive the same color vehicles. The same with the beach guards.

"We would also like to stage regular tourist 'camps' at which foreigners can meet Thai people to learn about the local culture."

Information Technology: "In line with the policy of the national and provincial governments, we also plan an "e-Patong" project to give people access to up-to-date information, to receive suggestions from tourists, or to allow people to pay their taxes online, for example."

Development: "We want to improve town planning and the transport system, particularly for tourists who want to visit Phuket Town. We want to have a public bus service. We also plan to build more public toilets, underground, to serve tour-

ists. Much of this could be built and managed by the private sector."

The Patong Progress Party (PPP) is led by Songserm Kepsap, 46, a Patong native whose younger sister, Chalermlak, is the Democrat MP for Phuket Region 2.

The biggest question in voters' minds is likely to be over the the PPP's lack of hands-on experience in running a town.

This is K. Songserm's first foray into politics; up to now he has worked in the family business. He said he had taken the plunge because people had urged him to end Patong's constant political instability.

His team includes a number of people who gained "backroom" political experience in K. Chelermlak's successful campaigns to be elected Mayor of Patong in 1998 and then, a year later, to become MP.

In its leaflets, the PPP writes that the main reason K. Songserm was standing was that "he cannot accept the behavior of some people in local politics who act like criminals and thwart the efforts of others in trying to develop Patong".

Kamneung Sing'iem, 51, the party's candidate for Deputy Mayor, told the *Gazette* that although few people in the PPP have experience of politics, most have their own businesses and have lived in Patong a long time. They therefore want to see Patong developed and managed better than it has been in recent years.

"K. Songserm never thought about going into politics because the family business was more than enough to keep him busy," he said. "I, too, was never keen to go into politics because I was a government official – a teacher.

"I don't really like politics, but I think it's time for Patong to develop and for that, it must have a good management team."

The PPP's main policies are:
Corruption: "The main policy of the PPP is to crack down on corruption in the town. Corruption stems from individuals, not from organizations. That is why the PPP carefully screens all those who wish to join the party. We want to be a good model for the next generation that will manage Patong, for example by encouraging teamwork through brain-storming. If we win, we plan to stay in power for only one or two [four-year] terms, then step down to allow the

next generation to take over." **High-priority projects:** We want to complete the wastewater system, introduce garbage separation, improve flood-relief and the roads, and build a municipal child care center and a sports arena."

Other infrastructure: "This would in-

clude improving public utilities to international tourism standards. For example: improving footpaths, putting electric cables underground, cleaning up the *klongs* and improving transportation."

Economics: "Our policy aims to bring greater stability and increased income in every occupation."

Social development: "We want to develop human potential, employ foreigners to teach English to





both students and the members of the public, and improve and expand the library so people have good books to read."

Transparency: "We aim to improve the caliber of politicians and to make our management policy completely transparent. People will be able to share their ideas for development. We will work to strengthen the community and give everyone a chance to see and understand the workings of the municipality.'

Honesty: "We will put 100% of our effort into winning. We have canvassed opinion on the current political situation, and most said they could not accept what has been happening.

"Two parties that fought one another constantly are suddenly holding hands for this election. Our question: Why are they doing that?


"Local people know what has happened in the past. Some may still believe that it is a good idea to 'bring all the people with experience together in one team' but I think those will be few in number.

"If we lose this time, we will stay in politics and run again. We will not confront the winners, but we don't believe that they will be able to last the full four-year term."




Songserm Kepsap of the Patong Progress Party.






Sure cure for Mr Sourpuss

huket might be close to paradise when it comes to the quality, variety and price of fruit on offer – and the choice continues to grow.

The latest taste sensation, straight from the Dark Continent, is the tiny fruit with monster



mouthfeel – miracle fruit or, in Thai, *ponlamai mahatsajan*.

Miracle fruit was first introduced to Thailand about 15 years ago by Africa-based Thai food specialist Professor Anon Auetragul, who brought a few samples back to Thailand.

He must have been aware that in a land where people smother pizza in ketchup and dump spoonfuls of sugar into noodle soup, anything that could up the sweetness ante would stand a good chance of success.

Seven years later, local resident Rattana Jiravitianr read a column about its amazing qualities in a Bangkok newspaper.

Her curiosity piqued, K. Rattana went to Bangkok and searched around the Weekend Market for hours before finally locating a few miracle fruit trees to bring back and grow in Phuket.

Now she has the largest miracle fruit garden in Southern Thailand, Suan Namsai, with 10,000 trees under cultivation.

One of the many interesting qualities of this strange fruit is that it can make sour fruits, including limes, taste sweet.

In Ghana, where sugar is scarce, people chew miracle fruit about 30 minutes before a meal to take advantage of its naturally long-lasting sweetness.

This quality has also been noted in the US, where just about every food seems to be laced with fat and refined sugar.

The American Medical Association, which has concluded that the fruit is free of toxins, is now touting miracle fruit as a natural sweetener effective in treating sweet-toothed sufferers of hypertension and obesity.

"I've heard that in America they have a project to plant more than a million miracle fruit trees," K. Rattana told the *Gazette*.


K. Rattana said she now buys her seedlings from a nursery farm in Rayong. They aren't difficult to grow in Phuket, she said, because of similarities between the climate here and the tree's native West Africa. Other large farms in Thailand are in Samut Sakhon and Bangkok.

Young plants need extra care in terms of weeding, lest they be overrun and choked off by more aggressive indigenous flora. Even under the best conditions, it takes a miracle fruit tree, aka *Synsepalum dulcificum Daniell*, about three months to grow just 10 centimeters high, and around eight years to reach their full three meters.

Given their diminutive proportions, miracle fruit are probably the most expensive fruit in Phuket by weight. At Suan Namsai, the normal price is 10 baht each. But because of their incredible taste – they are even more overwhelming than durian – just a few are usually more than enough for most people.

Not all miracle fruit are bought for consumption. "Some people buy them to get the seeds so they can grow their own miracle fruit, but others pick them up and give them away as fun gifts to friends who have never tried them," K. Rattana said.

Virgins to miracle fruit are usually given a single small fruit and told to chew it thoroughly.

Thirty seconds later, they are told to squeeze a fresh lime wedge into their mouth. But rather than turn them into a sourpuss, the lime juice actually tastes sweet.

And the powerful taste of miracle fruit is long-lasting, lingering on the palate for hours.

This ability to mask sour with sweet has not been lost on local wine lovers, some of whom pop a miracle fruit into their mouths before hitting the bottle.

K. Rattana said one regular customer used to spend a lot of his money on expensive imported wine – until he learned that for just 10 baht he could make a bottle of local rotgut taste like a fine European vintage.

One friend even accused him of pouring foreign wine into an empty bottle of Thai wine, opposite the normal practice.

When it comes to buying a miracle fruit tree, size does matter. At Suan Namsai, the smallest seedlings are just 20 baht, while a full-grown fruit-bearing tree can go for as much as 35,000 baht. With prices like that, it's no wonder so many miracle fruit junkies stick to homegrown.

Thaksin's plan delights headmen

iting avian flu and the violence in the South, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra urged *kamnan* – tambon leaders – and village headmen to play a greater role in sounding the alarm over potential problems before they erupt.

Speaking at a seminar, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra expressed support for a plan to scrap elections for *kamnan* and village headmen, much to the delight of his audience. Under existing rules, these local leaders must contest elections. The government plans legislation to appoint *kamnan* and village headmen, as they were in the past.

Thai-in-the-sky: Thai Airways International (THAI) has announced a joint venture in a budget airline with state-run Krung Thai Bank, CP 7-Eleven, Dhipaya Insurance, the Crown Property Bureau and the Government Pension Fund.

THAI president Kanok Abhiradee said the new budget airline – Sky Asia – would start operations in the second quarter, with the national carrier holding a 49% stake.

THAI hopes the new carrier will establish Chiang Mai as a regional aviation hub and help fight competition from Thai AirAsia, which will begin domestic operations this month, as well as other privately-owned domestic carriers.

A public health official received the request and offered them 2,000 baht to help cover their travel expenses. K. Thanawadee said she had asked for legal assistance from the Law Society of Thailand in the case.

Lucky charms: The National Buddhism Bureau said it would monitor newspapers to guard against monks advertising amulets or other items they claim have supernatural powers.

Bureau director Udom Charoen said initial checks found that several monks had advertised in newspapers and on radio that they had amulets or other religious

items that could protect or empower their owners.

Publishers of Buddha amulet journals responded to the proposed crackdown by warning that a blanket ban on the advertising of religious objects could hurt efforts to propagate the faith. The ban, if enacted, would cover print media and radio broadcasting.

From closet to Cabinet: The chief of Thailand's largest gayrights group said Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra should hire gay activists to advise the government on gay and lesbian affairs

Pakorn Pimthon, president of the Bangkok Gay Festival, said homosexuals were widely misunderstood – even though more of them were coming out of the closet.

K. Pakorn said that because PM Thaksin was educated in the United States, he should have the same attitude toward gays as leaders in the West, where gays are better accepted.

It is believed that most of the trash is due to the monthly Full Moon party, when as many as 20,000 revellers get inebriated and spread rubbish along the beach at Haad Rin. All partygoers are being urged to dispose of their vodka bottles, food wraps and rizzla packets in a more responsible way.

Tourism exchange: The Tourist Association of Koh Samui recently announced that it will join forces with its Krabi equivalent to promote travel between the two popular destinations, and to attract new visitors.

President Ruengnam Jaikwang explained that the idea was to link Krabi and the islands in the Andaman with Surat Thani and the islands in the Gulf of Thailand by offering packages at standardized rates. Koh Samui will be promoted as a health and spa destination, while Krabi and the isles in the Andaman will promoted through the Unseen Thailand campaign. Packages for both destinations will begin in April.

The idea should work, as long as representatives in each area resist the urge to add comments like, "but it is a lot more expensive over there" or "Watch out for the snakes" when promoting their competitors.

Fake notes: Ronnarong Sengaim, of the Koh Samui Chamber of Commerce, has confirmed that fake 1,000-baht notes are in circulation on Samui. There have also been several reports of tourists having their cash refused at shops and restaurants.

Real 1,000-baht notes include a woven silver strip and two watermarks depicting HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej. The number "1,000," printed in the top right-hand corner, is embossed. Fake notes, however, are made of flimsy paper and lack these features, usually because they are photocopied.

Banks and stores on Samui are using ultraviolet counterfeit detection devices to combat the fakes. People are advised to examine the contents of their wallets carefully before heading out to buy counterfeit CDs, DVDs, handbags and girlfriends.



Gazette: Why did you become a policeman?

Col Chalit: I was born in Tambon Klong Ray Kong, in Songkhla, which was a rural community where there was little justice

That's why I decided to study law at Ramkhamhaeng University, in Bangkok.

At that time, most southern people were interested in studying law or becoming goverment officials, but no one else in my family, or among my relatives wanted to join the police.

Gazette: Why do you think so many people came to congratulate you on your first day as Superintendent?

Col Chalit: It may be because I have been working at Chalong Police Station for a long time and I know many local people, and maybe they appreciated my promotion.

Another reason I was promoted here is because I know and understand the problems in Chalong so I could continue working without having to take time to learn about the problems in the area

Pol Col Chalit Kaewyarat recently became
Superintendent of Chalong Police Station, taking
over from the Col Sati Malakanond, lately
transferred to Ao Luek Police Station in Krabi.
When Col Chalit arrived at work for his first day as
Superintendent, he was welcomed by about 500
wellwishers – many with flowers – who had
gathered outside the station to congratulate him, an
indication of the local community's thorough
approval of his appointment. His promotion comes
after 20 years' service in Phuket and Phang Nga,
including six as Deputy Superintendent at Chalong.
Here, Sangkhae Leelanapaporn talks with the 45year-old law graduate with a knack for keeping in
touch with the people.

Gazette: What are the most common problems in Chalong?

Col Chalit: The Chalong Police Station is responsible for three tambons: Karon, Rawai and Chalong. These include important tourist areas, such as Laem Promthep, Kata-Karon, Rawai, Ao Chalong and Wat Chalong.

Our main job is to ensure the areas are safe for tourists, both Thai and foreign, and to direct traffic to ease congestion. Everyone who arrives on Phuket visits

Wat Chalong and other Phuket landmarks. We have many VIP guests of the government who come to Phuket, too.

There isn't much crime in our jurisdiction, and most cases involving foreigners are about theft, cheating on land deals or conflict between themselves over business. But in all, there are not many cases involving foreigners.

We have about 130 officers at Chalong Police Station. That is not enough to cover all of the Chalong district, but the Royal

Thai Police will send more officers to help soon.

Gazette: Just before you were promoted to Superintendent, Teema Lakkoh, a 68-year-old woman, was murdered in Rawai. Has any progress been made in the investigation?

Col Chalit: We believe we know who the murderer is and we have applied to the court for an arrest warrant. Chalong does not often have this kind of murder, and the suspected killer in this case has a history of attacking women.

Gazette: How do you believe police officers under your command should perform their duties?

Col Chalit: As with other police officers in Region 8 and the Phuket Provincial Police, our officers should be honorable, full of good qualities and accepted by the people, society and the government.

The image of the police currently is not so good. We are looked down on by society. That's why we have to work toward restoring the good image of the

Col Chalit: I always tell my officers to treat people who come to the police station as a relative in a time of trouble.

I tell them, "Do not treat their problems as work because it is your duty, try to get into the spirit of police

work and treat them as if they are a relative or a best friend."

I also tell my officers not to ignore people's problems. If someone calls the station because of an argument, officers should get to the incident quickly and stop it, because if we don't, they might kill each other.

I always pay attention to small problems, and always tell my staff not to overlook them. If we could stop people arguing we would have no more murders.

Gazette: What do you see as the most important function of a Superintendent?

Col Chalit: I think that a Superintendent has to be down-to-earth, somebody the people can reach and criticize.


Sometimes, as police, we think that we are doing a good job, but local people might not think the same.

There should be two-way communication between police and the local people, and police should not act as if they are 'above' other people.

I'm not the kind of person to stay in my office. I always go out and talk with people and now many people call me on my mobile phone instead of calling [the emergency number] 191.

Gazette: What is your ultimate aim as a police officer?

Col Chalit: I want to see everyone who leaves a police station confident in the knowledge that the police are doing their best to help them. That would be a great feeling.

A melting pot called Melaka

called Malacca and nowadays might as well be called Mixture. It's a quaint hodgepodge of a place, with ranks of modern condominiums looking onto the ruins of forts built by the Portuguese when the city was enjoying its heyday as a trading depot.

In those days, Singapore and Kuala Lumpur hardly made it onto the map. These days, people don't come to Melaka for

business so much as to get away from it.

The town exhibits some sharp contrasts, always flavored with the melange

of races who have taken up residence here. A stroll leads past Chinese and Muslim temples and on to Christian churches.

Old shophouses line the streets. Some are shuttered and barred, some resemble mini-

elaka used to be factories at ground-level, with families living upstairs, others have been converted into trendy cafés and art-and-craft boutiques.

> Limousines driven by chauffeurs pull aside to let a trishaw packed with mothers and tots ease by. A cluster of schoolgirls, heads covered with the traditional Islamic scarf, pose with great hilarity in front of a marble fountain erected in 1904 to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

History, cultures and races mix and mingle here.

Melaka is not short of visitors. They put in an appearance in force around

Bukit St Paul's, a historic hill in the center of town. At Padang Palawan, the more daring can even take a ride in a bullock

St Paul's Church, which gives the hill its name, is desolate

now, unlike the Museum of Enduring Beauty on the lower slopes. Here, beauty is definitely in the eye of the beholder. The museum is gruesomely dedicated to depictions of tattooing, scarification and foot-binding that would not look out of place in any Chamber of Horrors. Melaka rarely passes up the opportunity to surprise.

For all its strange sights,

Melaka's two chief attractions are its river and its food. A 45minute trip from the jetty – just by the Karyaneka Bridge – winds along the muddy brown Sungei Melaka, and through Little Amsterdam, the old Dutch quarter, with its red-roofed godowns.

The journey continues to the docks, which are filled with low-slung Sumatran schooners whose captains still sail without charts or compasses, and on past *kampongs*, where the fishermen work contentedly on their nets just feet from monitor lizards slumbering in the sun.

Much of Melaka's prosperity stemmed from the waves of immigrants from mainland China who started arriving in the 16th century. Many liked the place.

They prospered and took Malay wives, giving rise to a new ethnic group called Straits Chinese, or Peranakans, and producing a new culinary enterprise known as Baba-Nyonya, also a major influence on Phuket cuisine.

Adapting Chinese dishes, by cooking them Malay-style with coconut milk and sour sauces, is Melaka's signature cuisine, typical of the integration







ealth information is confusing. What was harmful may now be beneficial – in moderation – and vice versa. Over the next few weeks, we'll bring you the latest scoops from the worlds of fitness and nutrition – before the researchers change their minds again.

Don't forget, this information is a summary of what's

around. If you are considering changing your diet, you should first seek medical advice, especially if you have an existing condition.

Almonds used to be considered fattening but current research suggests that they may help shed those unwanted kilos. Researchers found

that people eating a diet rich in almonds lost more weight than those on an equivalent non-almond diet.

Other research indicated that systolic blood pressure (the higher figure) was reduced by as much as 11% in almond-eaters. Additional research has shown that people with type-2 diabetes on an almond-rich diet were able to reduce their medication more than the non-almond eaters. Remember, a handful of almonds has a place in a healthy diet. The whole can does not.

Aspirin seems like it has been around forever but it has a place in preventing heart attacks and strokes, and helping people survive them. Anyone with with a family history of cardiovascular disease should perhaps take a

More isn't better when it comes to aspirin; a "baby aspirin" tablet of 81 milligrams is just as effective as the standard adult pill of 325 mg. Speak with your propriate for you. Aspirin may also reduce the risk of of cancer of the colon, esophagus, stomach, rectum and prostate and possibly even Alzheimer's disease.

Broccoli as a cure for cold sores? Researchers have isolated a compound in it that may hold the key to thwarting HSV-1, the oral and genital herpes virus. Broccoli is also rich in isothiocyanates,

A serving of boiled broccoli has as much calcium as a glass of milk; more vitamin C than an orange; and one mediumsized section has more fiber than a slice of wheatbran bread. Broccoli is also one of the

Cinnamon is a spice researchers have long speculated may be helpful in treating diabetes.

Botanicals such as cinnamon can improve the metabolism of glucose and the overall condition of individuals with diabetes - improving cholesterol metabolism, removing artery-damaging free radicals from the blood and improving the function of blood vessels. Onions, garlic, ginseng and flaxseed are thought to have similar effects.

A control group taking three- to six-gram cinnamon tablets saw their cholesterol levels decrease by up to 26% over a 40day period while LDL ("bad") cholesterol levels went down by between 10%-24%. Effects on HDL, so-called "good cholesterol", were minimal.

Coconut oil is one of the healthiest oils you can consume. It is rich in lauric acid - known for its antiviral, antibacterial and antifungal properties - and boosts the immune system. Applied to the skin, it can help prevent wrinkles. Coconut oil can also help you lose weight or maintain an already healthy weight, reduce your risk of heart disease, lower cholesterol, improve diabetes and chronic fatigue.

Sufferers of Crohn's disease, irritable bowel syndrome and other digestive disorders have reported improvements in their conditions through consuming coconut oil.

Caffeine may stimulate the metabolism and lead to burning up more calories through thermogenesis – the production of heat. It may not all be good news. Some studies have shown a greater incidence of blood-pressure spikes and heart-disease-related deaths among coffee drinkers. Caffeine may also interfere with the action of insulin.

Yet research also shows that coffee may actually reduce the risk of developing type 2 diabetes independently of other lifestyle factors such as age and obesity, which tend to increase

Coffee contains many other ingredients that could have beneficial effects in preventing type-2 diabetes, such as potassium, niacin, and magnesium, as well as antioxidants. Don't dramatically increase your coffee intake, especially if you already have a heart condition or diabetes. See your doctor first.

Algae: a rootless population

was exploring along a shoreline recently, looking for tiny critters hiding out in the seaweed – and watching predators stalk them. The algae clinging to the rocks appeared to be a species of Chlorodesmis, one of the many green algae found in Phuket waters.

Algae are non-flowering plants, among the most primitive life forms on the planet. They inhabit fresh and salt water, where they can be found from the surface to the greatest depths to which sunlight can penetrate. Some are even found in damp soil, snow, or growing on ships' hulls.

Algae are classified under a single phylum, which is sub-divided into four: Cyanophyta, or blue-green algae, the Chlorophyta or green algae, the Phaeophyta or brown algae, and the Rhodophyta or red algae. All four kinds are found in Thailand.

Fossil algae date back to the Precambrian period, at least 900 million years ago. Blue-green were the earliest; next came green, then red and finally brown.

Algae come in a huge variety of shapes and sizes, from the microscopic to the giant kelp, which can grow to 60 meters in length. It was in such a kelp bed that I first learned to dive.

Under the correct conditions, algae can grow at impressive rates sometimes even smothering or killing off a coral reef if uncontrolled.

In all algae, food is produced by photosynthesis – the conversion of light into nutrients. Chlorophyll is the driving mechanism, but these photosynthetic pigments vary somewhat among species and six different kinds are known.

Algae differ from most plants in their lack of structure. They have no true roots, stems or leaves. The plant body as a whole is known as a thallus. It consists of a "holdfast" that serves as its roots; a "stipe" that is analogous to a stem, and the blades or "lamina", which resemble leaves and perform the crucial task of photosynthesis.

Among the blue-green algae found in Phuket, three species stand out. Brachytrichia *quoyi* has a hollow thallus, more or less spherical and 1 to 5 cm in diameter. It is blue-green or pale green and grows on rocks in the intertidal zone.

Bright blue *Hormotham*nium solutum is composed of tangled filaments and grows on coral fragments or reef flats, while Symploca hydnoides forms spongy tufts of multiple filaments about 13 cm high, and can live on a variety of shallow water surfaces.

The green algae include Acetabularia major, which has an umbrella-like thallus, cylindrical stipe and a lobed holdfast. It is bright green and grows by attaching itself to rocks and pebbles in shallow water.

Avrainvillea erecta has a fan-shaped thallus on a short stipe. The attachment is by interwoven rhizoids submerged in muddy sand in shallows that are exposed at low tide.

Caulerpa racemosa has a thallus with upright fronds. Bright green, it grows in mangroves and brackish water. It is used as a salad vegetable in the South.

Chlorodesmis hildebrandtii has a cushion-like thallus 4-5 cm high covered with bright green, erect, branched filaments. It grows on coral reefs.

Valonia ventricosa has a spherical thallus 1 to 3 cm in diameter. The cell wall is tough and shiny, dark green to grayish. It is the largest single-celled seaweed. It grows singly or in clusters attached to corals 3 to 4 meters below the sea surface.

There are many brown algae in Thailand. Examples include Padina australis, whose thallus is fan shaped. It grows in tufts10-15 cm high. The lamina are thin with concentric lines on both surfaces. It grows on rocks and shells in intertidal areas.

Rosenvingea intricate has a hollow thallus about 15 cm tall. The top is composed of branches that are successively smaller. It is greenish- or yel-

lowish-brown and is frequently found floating.

Turbinaria ornate has an erect thallus 6 to 13 cm high from which emerge nearly circular blades. It is light or yellowishbrown and grows on rocks and dead coral near living reefs.

Red algae include Acanthophora spicifera. Its thallus is 15 cm tall and loosely branched with branchlets arranged in spiral formations. It comes in a wide range of browns and grows in a variety of intertidal areas and conditions.

Amphiroa zonata forms dense clumps 3-4 cm tall, highly branched with rounded tips. It is pink and grows in subtidal areas often inhabited also by Amphiroa fragilissima, which has a dense clumping thallus with fine semiupright branches. Easily detachable, it is pale pink and grows on muddy sand.

Algae provide food and shelter for fish and invertebrates. In Phuket, several species are eaten, while others are useful in agriculture as fertilizers.

A winning hand

ames McManus has written five novels, none of which I've heard of. But he has scored big with his latest book *Positively Fifth Street* (Farrar, Strauss and Giroux, New York, 2003, 422pp) which is subtitled: *Murderers, Cheetahs, and Binion's World Series of Poker*.

McManus opens with a meticulous nine-page description of a grotesque murder: "A nubile blond squats on her boyfriend's bare chest and he's too stoned to do anything about it. Nipple clamps? No sir, not this

time. Even one would be, like, way generous. Seizing him by the neck with both hands, she raises her shins from the carpet and presses her full dead weight onto his rib cage and solar plexus, forcing more air from his lungs. How's that feel? As she rocks

back and forth, they lock eyes. 'You like that?' she asks, flirty as ever. 'How come?'"

Her name is Sandra Murphy, ex-stripper and, for the past three years, live-in girlfriend of Ted Binion, heir of the Horseshoe Casino, former host of the World Series of Poker. Binion is in handcuffs and a massive amount of drugs has been

forced down his throat by his close friend Rick Tabish, who then proceeds to make love with Sandra Murphy in front of him.

McManus is hired by *Harper's* magazine to cover the murder trial. Instead, he spends his US\$4,500 advance on the entry fee for the World Series of Poker. He feels

fate is calling him to the casino table.

"That a jury should be deliberating charges of first-degree S&M murder against Ted's friend and consort one block away during the final week of the tournament his father invented – well, this is either too much of a muchness, tipping toward the implausible, or it's the shapeliest tragic construction since Aristotle laid down the rules for these things 2,370 years ago."

If you don't know how to play poker, forget about reading this book. McManus is particularly careful to analyze the nuances of the savage variant of poker that the title-seekers play: No Limit Texas Hold 'em. It is a game that has spread far from its Texas saloon origins and Texan champions like Amarillo Slim have been overtaken by Jewish intellectuals, Pakistani computer geeks, Vietnamese and Chinese slickers, and even women.

"The World Series of Poker has evolved from its good-old-boy roots into a stronghold of, yes, functional multiculturalism, proving if nothing else that there is such a thing," Mc-Manus writes.

"Most of the academic

versions, of course, have long since degenerated into monocultural zealotry, diverse as to race or gender but in almost no other respects. The term has even taken a pejorative cast of late, correctly associated with tenured politicians swimming in

schools of resentment, apparently aiming to prove that ideology is indeed a form of brain damage."

I quote that passage at length to show how eloquent McManus can be in his frequent narrative tangents: the history and psychology of poker, the author's childhood, mini-biographies of the chief contend-

ers. These are needed because, as McManus improbably advances to the final table of the World Series of Poker, the suspense becomes unbearable.

A bad early round "feels like my testicles have been lopped off, marinated with high-octane leaded, lit up as flambés

rognons blancs, then stuffed down my throat with a skewer". And faced with a crucial showdown: "Understanding my stupidity better than my brain does, my heart thumps out signals visible, I'm sure, all over my body – fingers, neck, pupils, complexion - of how petrified I am. (More specifically, this is my candyass limbic system, the neurones and hormone-secreting cells just below the putatively thinking portion of my cerebral cortex, all of them whimpering, 'Boo-hoo-hoo-hoo! Me

McManus walks away with US\$247,760, and also gets on the inside track of the murder trial. A triumph all around.

Pigs, a straightjacket and a contortionist

y good friend David Whataburke decided he would renovate and upgrade his apartment in North Pattaya. Employing only the best designers and contractors, he was told the job would be finished to his satisfaction in about six weeks.

Although he was warned that the workers would make an almost never-ending series of mistakes, he found that as each error was corrected, a new one would emerge.

Sadly, it all went awry and Mr Thwaites managed to skewer himself before toppling to his death. Police were more than satisfied with this highly plausible explanation and the case has been closed

In other disturbing news, John Thomas was fined three million baht after an accident involving two motorbikes, a pickup and a truckload of pigs. Mr Thomas had just arrived in Thailand and at Don Muang airport negotiated with a taxi driver to take him to Pattaya. Tired from the long journey from his home at Bilious-On-Sea in Essex, Mr Thomas fell asleep on the back seat of the taxi.

He awoke some time later to a blaring of horns, a screech of brakes and the squeal of pigs. A split second or so later, the taxi in which he was a passenger ceased to exist as a viable form of transport as hefty porkers fell onto, into and in front of it.

been almost smothered by a 300-kilogram squealer that had breathed its last as it came to rest atop the steering wheel, pushing it into the man's more tender nether regions.

Through clenched teeth, the taxi driver claimed he had been driving, albeit under the influence, at a sedate 90kmh when two motorbikes shot past him. After a pickup also raced past him, he decided to increase his speed as he felt his masculinity was somehow being called into question. 

Clean up Phuket's act

The enduring violation of Phuket's natural beauty by the plastic bag is one of the sad mysteries of this island. It is also one of the most persistent threats to Phuket's image as a tropical paradise.

In this Phuket is far from unique. Sailors who have visited the Andaman Islands – about as far as it is possible to get from urban "civilization" – report that in the past five years, the plastic bag has also taken over there, blowing along the white beaches, bobbing in the aquamarine seas and snagging on coral reefs.

In Phuket recently, the Wat Chalong fair ended. The stallholders left behind them – you guessed it – acres of plastic bags and other garbage. Every time a *talad nat* (local market), is held, the site ends up looking like a garbage dump.

Why is it so hard for people to pick up their own waste? Lousy education? Bad upbringing? Poor examples set by those who should know better? A lack of ways to dispose of trash?

It's all of these, and probably more. As with so many of society's ills, there is no "magic bullet" that will fix everything with one shot.

In the 1960s, Britain gained a reputation as the grubbiest country in Europe. It has taken 40 years – two generations – to reverse that opinion. Even now, it is still not the cleanest country, though it has certainly improved.

The "Keep Britain Tidy" campaign – which continues to this day – has been persistent and sweeping in its scope. It has included the provision of hundreds of thousands of trash cans on streets and in public areas of the countryside; long-running ad campaigns on TV and in other media; the involvement of schools; the promotion of recycling; the introduction of laws and local regulations governing garbage and recycling; and the introduction or alteration of taxes aimed at encouraging citizens to think about ways to reduce their output of trash.

Does any of this exist in Phuket? No. True, well-meaning volunteers conduct clean-ups, particularly of beaches. They deserve applause, but their efforts put only the smallest dent in the problem.

The lead, as is the case with so many social and environmental problems, needs to come from government, both local and national. Some attempts have been made by local authorities, but they are rarely sustained. Certainly, there is no sign of anything like the continuing campaign in Britain.

A long-term plan must be drawn up, and drawn up soon, if Phuket is to maintain its international reputation as a delightful place to visit and to live.

guy, inside his own shop, in front of his horrified father, his screaming mother and the customer, who was scared out of his wits at the barbaric scene.

When they had finished, they swore at the young man, who was now curled up on the floor in pain, and left the shop.

As they left, they even dared the family to call the police, as if they knew that the police had no authority over them and were scared of them.

The young man suffered a number of broken fingers. As for the customer, he got into his car quickly and disappeared.

Exposing Word files' dirty secrets

f vou've been around Microsoft Office long enough, you've no doubt developed a good sense of selfpreservation: Office is full of holes, bugs and other things that seem to defy explanation.

One of my favorite topics is how Word documents can contain hidden information that you may not want the world to see. Ask Tony Blair, whose governing team in the UK was shaken not stirred – with revelations gleaned in part from information hidden in a publicly posted Word document.

On January 30 last year, the UK government published a white paper called Iraq – Its Infrastructure Of Concealment, Deception And Intimidation, which was posted as a Word document on Mr Blair's website, www.number-10.gov. uk.

The so-called "dodgy dossier" teemed with plagiarized passages and dubious self-serving enhancements, and buried in

the file was a list of the people who modified the document.

Alastair Campbell, the Director

that time, took the bullet. He resigned, and data hidden inside a Word document was part of his undoing (see the analysis by Richard Smith at www. ComputerBytesMan.com/privacy/blair.htm). You will no doubt read more about the "dodgy dossier" as it continues to dog Mr Blair's political career.

There are hundreds of thou-



sands of Word documents posted on the Internet that contain hidden data – and if you have Word, you can go spelunking inside the documents to see what they contain. Here's how:

First, find a document that

looks juicy. I like to use Google's Advanced Search. Go to google.com and click the button to bring up the

Communications and Strategy at Advanced Search page. Type a topic or the name of a company in the first Find Results box, and choose Microsoft Word (.doc) in the File Format drop-down box. Press Enter, then download any likely looking files.

> To see some of the information hidden in the file, open it with Word and click File | Properties | Custom. If the file was ever attached to an email in Out

look 2002 or 2003, Outlook would have "branded" the file with the sender's name, email address and the subject line of the email.

To see more information buried in the same document, close it, then click File | Open. In the Files of Type box, choose Recover Text From Any File, then navigate to the file and open it.

Down past the lists of font names, near the end, you will probably see a list of all the people who made changes to the document, along with a list of where the document was stored when they changed it.

How embarrassing is this information? Mr Campbell's office certainly was stung; there was enough information in the "dodgy dossier" for one analyst to tell when a copy of the file was spun off for US Secretary of State Colin Powell.

The Associated Press nail-

This document, supposedly from a Mac user who switched to Windows, was written by a Microsoft PR agency hack. The **Associated Press nailed** Microsoft for lying yet again, by tracking down the data "hidden" inside the document.

ed Microsoft for pulling yet another dirty trick (see picture). I caught Microsoft with its corporate trousers about its knees and discovered a dirty document from the camp of Newt Gingrich, the former Speaker of the US House of Representatives.

Microsoft recently posted on its website a program that strips out much – but not all – of the information hidden inside Office XP and Office 2003 files. Unfortunately, Microsoft has reported 14 known bugs with the tool, not including the fact that it has not been tested on Windows 2000, and there's nothing similar available for Office 97 or 2000.

PHUKET TOWN: The Central group has revealed details of its new retail complex for Phuket and has set an opening date -August 12, birthday of HM Queen Sirikit.

Wallaya Chirathivat, Central's Executive Vice-President, told the Gazette that Central Festival Phuket will be biggest shopping center in Phuket and southern Thailand, spread across 30 rai – or 48,000 square meters – at the Thai Naan intersection.

While Central officially rejects the notion of being in competition with other large retailers, the date does give it a five-month headstart on the Jungceylon complex now being built in Patong.

Central will be targeting people "who lead a modern lifestyle and enjoy family life" – both visitors and locals.

"Our customers are middleclass to upper-class, as we have already discovered at other centers," K. Wallaya said.

Sexy investment

ne in the wide range of choices available to investors these days is what is called a "Fund of Funds". This investment structure comes in two formats.

In the first, the management group invests only in its own funds, whether they be mutual funds, offshore funds, unit trusts, or whatever.

In the second, it picks from outside management groups to achieve the desired grouping. This might encompass equities (shares), bonds, or managed funds, varying in risk from cautious to aggressive.

When a fund management group or other entity - for example, a bank, an insurance company or even a research house enters this field, it is usually able to provide good reasons for its approach.

This is especially true when outside funds are being selected. It is then possible to state that the "Fund of Funds" managers are completely unbiased and are able to select the best funds available in every sector.

Some then go on to mention that they enjoy a good relationship with the top fund managers

in every selected area. They can supposedly monitor their performance - and often even know when a fund manager is considering moving to a rival company before the fund manager's own employer is aware of the intended change.

This is because when the fund manager moves, he wants to be able to retain the business he has been getting from the "Fund of Fund" managers.

About three years ago, I had a meeting in Phuket with the Asian Director of one of the better known "Fund of Funds" management groups.

I watched an impressive presentation. I asked the presenter to send me various pieces of information. It seemed that the group was very successful.

After a while, when I had neard nothing from the company, I telephoned the director. He seemed to have completely forgotten about the details I had requested.

Undeterred, I decided to look at the company's website, as well as unbiased data sources. To my disappointment, I found that the company's performance was substandard compared with the performance of individual fund managers.

All the good reasons for using a "Fund of Funds" manager had become a theory that did not translate into real investment performance.



tools that can go wrong in a very big way

One factor did emerge from using a "Fund of Funds" management group – increased costs. As well as charging an initial 5% fee, there was also a 1.5% annual management charge.

Now there is a more modern twist available to the investor - the "Fund of Funds" hedge fund.

Some readers may not know what a "hedge fund" is, so here's an explanation: the genesis of hedge funds lay in the fact that normal "funds" can make a profit only if whatever they invested in continues to rise in value.

When stockmarkets fall,

for example, then the value of the units in a fund also suffer. The laws in most countries allow fund managers to short-sell but only to the extent of covering the value of the portfolio.

This is commonly referred to as "portfolio insurance" and, as with all insurance, there is a premium to be paid. Fund managers who invest in this traditional manner are referred to as "longonly managers".

Obviously, there was demand for a fund that could not only buy in the hope of a rising asset price, but could also profit when prices fell. This situation led to the creation of the hedge fund industry.

It is important for investors to realise that all hedge funds are not created equal.

For example, some hedge funds target only individual equities, indices, bonds, or currencies. Some will encompass all of these, and also venture into such areas as commodities.

The financial instruments commonly used by hedge fund managers are termed "derivatives".

They are often highly complex financial instruments. It is no coincidence that many fund managers in this field have masters' degrees in mathematics.

Sadly, an ability in mathematics is not the only requirement for success as a fund manager; nor is an outstanding knowledge of economics sufficient

Knowledge of economics was the specialty of the two people who were the driving force behind US hedge fund giant, Long Term Capital Management (LTCM).

The two individuals were not only economists; both held Nobel prizes in this field. However, currency markets are often irrational and LTCM was wiped out, losing as much as US\$100 billion (about 4.2 trillion baht).

The Federal Reserve – the US central bank - intervened because of worries about the impact on the country's financial system after such huge losses.

The NTACG swimmers, aged 16-18, trained five hours a day in addition to doing 30 hours of schoolwork via the Internet.


The goal for each of

Doubt over Under-19 Women's World Cup

PHUKET TOWN: Phuket's bid to host qualifying rounds of the FIFA Under-19 Women's World Soccer Championship in November is in doubt because of the cost of improving Surakul Stadium.

A meeting on January 28 of the leaders of the organizations involved failed to come up with a solution to a budget shortfall of 38 million baht.

The President of the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor), Dr Prasit Koeysiripong, said that the Or-BorJor wondered whether Surakul should be overhauled or whether it would be better to build a new stadium.

The cost estimate for the upgrading demanded by the organizers of the competition is 50 million baht but, Dr Prasit said, "We can provide only 12 million

For Surakul to qualify as a venue for the competition, the team changing rooms must be rebuilt, a new pitch must be laid, entrances must be improved, and new lighting and sound systems must be installed.

Pushing for the upgrade to go ahead, Eam Thavornvongwong, president of the Phuket Soccer Association, said the tournament would provide an economic boost for Phuket.

"We are working on rebuilding Surakul, which will take six months to finish [February to September]. This is a very important chance to show we have the capacity to host a world-class tournament," K. Eam said.

He suggested it might be possible to seek contributions from hotel owners to meet the budget shortfall.

Contributing hotels could be recompensed through advertisements that would be seen on TV and in newspapers around the world, he said.

Vice-Governor Winai Buapradit, who chaired the meeting, took a more cautious line. He said that Phuket should not risk its reputation by rushing and making promises that it couldn't keep.

"If [the representatives of the contest organizers] come back and find that what they requested hasn't been done, Phuket will be rejected," he pointed out.

He said it might be wiser to look into the future and focus on building a new stadium in Phuket, in the meantime letting the 2004 Women's Under-19 World Cup go to a venue in Thailand that already has appropriate facilities.

Participants agreed that another meeting would be held, at a date yet to be decided, at which a decision would be made on whether Phuket should withdraw its bid to be one of the hosts of the 2004 competition.

due on the island – is the First Phuket Invitational Cricket Sixes, scheduled for April 1 to 3.

A joint effort between the Asian Cricket Sixes Tour and the Green Man Pub, the competition promises plenty of excitement as "Sixes" is a faster game than traditional 11-a-side cricket.

Sixes matches, by contrast, are limited by the number of runs that may be scored, although most other laws of cricket are followed.

In Sixes, a batsman must retire at 30 runs. However, he may complete all runs possible off

the final shot that takes him to or past the 30.

In other words, if he is on 29, then hits a boundary for four more, the full score of 33 will be recorded. If he is able to run additional runs past 30 off the last ball, those too will also count.

The friendly tournament will be played at the Karon Municipal Stadium while the serious business of socialising will take place at the Green Man.

The full list of teams and invited players has yet to be announced but former Essex County Cricket Club skipper Paul "Pablo" Prichard has been confirmed as a player.

He will also play in a Sixes tournament at the Chiang Mai Gymkhana Club immediately after the Phuket tournament.

Meanwhile, May 29 and 30 have been set as the dates for the Sixth Phuket Rugby 10s, also to be played at the Karon Municipal Stadium.

Up to 24 teams will take part in the event, hosted by the Phuket Vagabonds RFC. The winning team will take the Clive Williamson Memorial Trophy. The Phuket 10s has in the past attracted teams from Asia, Australia and as far away as Britain.



Classics under the hammer

hristie's, long regarded as the world's most influential auction company, will hold one of the most important automotive sales of recent years in Paris next week – the Exceptional Motor Cars and Automobilia sale.


Lots on offer include the last production Bugatti Type 55, finished in the classic yellow and black of this beautiful model. The 1935 Type 55, designed by Jean Bugatti, son of founder Ettore Bugatti, is expected to fetch at least 1.6 million euros (76.8 million baht).

Star of the sale, however, is a rare ex-Vic Elford/Gerard Larrousse Porsche 917K, similar to the Le Mans-winning short-tail 917. The 1969 Porsche is expected to sell for upwards of 1.8 million euros (89.6 million baht).

The 917 was introduced in 1969 as a way for Porsche to take on the might of Ferrari, principally at Le Mans. Powered by a 4.5-liter flat-12 engine that produced 580 bhp (426 kW), it was capable of a staggering 380 km/h.

In 1970, the 917 won every major sportscar race but three, and in 1971 it scooped the lot. In 1972 it was further developed with the addition of a huge turbocharger, chucking out a stupefying 1,000 bhp.

By then, it had a stiffer chassis and superior aerodynamics and in the CanAm sportscar series in North America, it blew the opposition away. So superior was the Porsche in its time that the authorities rewrote the rule

book, effectively barring it from competition.

The Bugatti models, on the other hand, are vintage cars. Ettore Bugatti was born in Milan in 1881. His father was a furniture designer, while one of his brothers, Rembrandt, became a successful sculptor.

But Ettore had a passion for things mechanical and, moving to Alsace in eastern France, he went to work for car-builder the Baron de Dietrich.

was the Porsche in its time that the authorities rewrote the rule authorities rewrote the rule for the baron, including an unusu-

al racing car in which the driver sat behind the rear axle. This was disqualified from the 1903 Paris-Madrid race because, it was argued, the driver could not see where he was going.

The young Italian genius went on to work for Mathis and Deuz, both small producers of motor cars, before establishing his own manufacturing plant at Molsheim in 1909.

The bumper years for Automobiles Bugatti were 1925-30, but in 1932 Bugatti produced the Type 55, similar to the offered lot

at Christie's.

This used a supercharged 2,262 cc engine from the Type 51 Grand Prix car, developing an impressive 160 bhp and giving the car a top speed of 180 km/h.

The body, a sleek two-seater, was designed by Jean Bugatti, who became a significant force in the company in the 1930s. It was Jean who introduced a twin-cam engine to Bugatti and who, until his death in a testing accident in 1939, was responsible for many more automotive innovations.



Christie's has held several motoring-related auctions over the years, but the auction house was established as far back as 1766, long before the motor car was a reality.


James Christie, the founder, made his name when he negotiated the sale of Sir Robert Walpole's art collection to Catherine the Great of Russia in 1778.

Other more recent milestones include the 1970 sale of Velasquez's *Portrait of Juan de Pareja* for a stunning £2.3 million (158 million baht) and the 1990 sale of Van Gogh's *Portrait of Dr Gachet* for US\$82.5 million (3.2 billion baht), the most expensive item ever sold at auction.


At next week's Paris sale, other notable cars on offer are a 1929 Bugatti Type 51; a 1950 Abarth 205, a race-winning sportscar built in Turin; and a 1965 Aston Martin DB5, similar to James Bond's in *Goldfinger*.

The Type 51 is expected to bring around 500,000 euros, (24 million baht), while the Abarth, a rare example of the breed, is expected to fetch a paltry 120,000 euros (5.7 million baht).

Here are three classic Niçoise recipes served up to appreciative diners at La Cabane.

Salade Ni□oise

For 2 people

Ingredients:

100 grams washed mixed salad greens, torn into pieces;

1 hard-boiled egg, quartered;

4 anchovy fillets;

½ tin tuna;

8 black olives;

1 large tomato, sliced;

8 slices of cucumber;

1/4 red bell pepper, sliced thinly;1/4 green bell pepper, sliced thinly;

2 radishes, sliced;

1 celery stalk, finely sliced; 1 onion, thinly sliced.

For the dressing:

1/4 cup olive oil;1/4 cup red wine vinegar;Salt and pepper to taste.

Method:

Lay the salad leaves on a platter with the tuna and anchovies in the center. Put the other ingredients around the fish. Blend the dressing ingredients well and drizzle over the salad.

1 tablespoon olive oil; Salt and pepper; ½ lemon, sliced thinly; 1 tablespoon white wine.

Method:

Parboil the potato, drain well, and place on a sheet of aluminum foil. Place the fish on the potato slices and cover with sliced tomatoes, garlic and herbs. Drizzle the wine and oil over, placing the sliced lemons on top. Season, and form the foil into a "packet". Steam for about 10 minutes.

Beef stew with red wine sauce

For 2 people Ingredients:

300g beef shank, sliced into 3 pieces:

1 large carrot, cut into 4 chunks; 1 cup mushrooms, chopped;

1 clove garlic, crushed;

1 large onion, chopped;

1 tablespoon tomato paste;

3 glasses red wine;

2 tablespoons olive oil.

Method:

Fry the beef with the garlic and onions for about 10 minutes. In a separate pan, reduce the wine slightly then add it to the beef, stirring in the tomato paste. Simmer on a low heat for about 1½ hours, then add two glasses of water with the carrots and mushrooms. Simmer for another 90 minutes before serving with boiled potatoes or steamed rice.

Getting the wrong end of the pineapple

nce upon a time, I visited friends in Bangkok and told them that they should come to Phuket. The reason, I explained, was that there were many people from across the sea who wanted to buy houses on Phuket so they could live happily ever after on a tropical island, with no ice or snow.

I persuaded my friends that we could make some money – and live happily ever after – if we built nice houses for the people across the sea at reasonable prices.

They agreed it was a good idea. As the chief of our company was a very important Thai person with good connections, we thought that everything should go ahead without any problems.

We bought nice land in a convenient area and set about building a road and some houses to sell. Lawyers checked everything to ensure that people had not paid anybody to make a fake certificate for the land title.

Everything was fine. At first.

Then one night, a man came onto our land and planted a crop of pineapples. We told him to take them away but he told us that he had signed a contract with the former owner to grow crops for five years.

He showed us a paper to prove this and the police told us that we couldn't touch the pineapples. We decided that, as we owned the land, we would move the pineapples anyway. The pineapple man came with the police and stopped us.

Off went the expensive lawyers to the court, where the judge was very annoyed because the pineapple man had planted pineapples on other people's land before.

The judge thought that his court had many other more important matters to rule on than the pineapple man and his efforts to



use other people's land to make farms for himself, and so asked the pineapple man how much money he wanted to go away. The pineapple man decided that the pineapples on our land were worth about six times the highest market price recorded in history.

We would not pay this extortionate amount, so we decided to go ahead and remove the pineapples from our land.

The judge didn't care what we did, he just wanted the pineapples out of his courtroom so he could attend to more serious court business. This was important to us as well. Our project had now been held up for six months and was costing us money and time. So the bulldozer headed off to the pineapples and the pineapple man came again with the police, who stopped us again.

The next day, we burned the pineapples and the pineapple man came and smashed some motorcycles belonging to our staff.

The police took the pineapple man to prison but let him go again because they were very bored with him. Eventually, the pineapple man agreed to remove his pineapples and to take no money if we didn't sue him for the money and time we had lost.

It looked as though we were off again. Wrong. The electricity authority was bringing the power lines to our project when they were stopped by a neighbor.

"If you put the power poles on my land, I will sue the company," he said. This was another amazing mystery, until we were told that he had built his wall one meter inside the boundary of his land. If somebody put poles beside the fence, they would be on his land.

"What do you want?" we asked. You know the answer to that, of course. The odd thing was that this neighbor was one of the people from across the sea.

There are many traps for the aspiring land buyer or developer. Beware – even with the solid backing of a reputable company, we still had to deal with serious problems.


There are potential pitfalls for the inexperienced developer or land buyer. We finally sorted it out. If you work hard to get it right, Thailand will protect your rights as well as – or better than – anywhere in the world.


But, as anywhere, if you try to have a go on your own, there will still be somebody or something trying to knock you down or take something from you that they didn't earn.

And I get heartburn from pineapples anyway.







ith the little rain that has fallen on Phuket since the new year, everything that was once green is starting to look a little parched. Most plant life here just accepts the fact that it's going to be dry for a while and quietly sits and mopes – looking a bit depressed, and generally become brown and seemingly thoroughly miserable.

Not so the bougainvillea, known in Thai as *fuang fah*. It happily sneers at its less hardy cousins and is rather proud of its ability to withstand droughts. In fact, it rather enjoys them.

It's one of those plants that performs best when it's a little stressed, a bit like the company accountant. Unlike a company accountant, however, the drier it gets the more vivid its colors become.

When Louis Antoine Bougainville discovered the vine that now bears his name during his round-the-world voyage from 1766 to 1769, it was a botanical highlight of the voyage. Throughout the following years, this distinctive Brazilian beauty has become one of the most popular plants in Southeast Asia.

Now that it's been mixed and matched to produce hundreds of variations, the variations of colors of this plant are amazing, go-

ing from pale green to white, orange, purple and crimson. Some variations even have two colors on one stalk.

Surprisingly, the brightest parts of the bougainvillea aren't flowers at all – they're bracts, or leaves of a different color, clustered together. It does have flowers, but they are fairly pathetic

and insignificant, tiny white tubular things that pale in comparison with the brightly-colored leaves.

There are two types of bougainvillea – those that grow at the speed of a bat out of hell, and those that grow at a more sedate rate. While the latter just quietly get on with it, the bougainvillea Ferraris really go for it. I've got one at home that despite constant pruning is growing so fast that I'm

going to have to put in a cage – literally.

These cages trains plants to grow straight up, then at a certain height allow them to spread out like an umbrella. They look a little strange in the plant's early stages, but later on, when the plant starts cascading down over the umbrella frame's edges, the results are awesome.

Bougainvilleas can grow into

spectacular trees that put your average tree to shame. Some gardeners who are serious about growing bougainvillea trees take a small tree that is near the end of its days and stick a bougainvillea cutting into a nick they make in the end of a severed limb.

After a few weeks of the cutting and the tree being bound together, the cutting will start to grow into its new home. Voila! Plant transplants.


Apart from being quite content not to see a watering can for extended periods, bougainvilleas also accept regular attacks with the pruning shears, and return the compliment with even more color when the limb grows back. Larger cuttings can be planted in the ground and, with a little patience, will start the cycle all over again.

A bougainvillea must be one of the easiest plants in the world to grow – look at the magnificent examples flourishing all over the island. What could be better than a plant that thrives on neglect?
