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Phuket police on high alert

PHUKET: Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has ordered a heightening of security for all government buildings and tourist areas in Phuket following the April 29 killings in Pattani, Yala and Narathiwat, and warnings by a Muslim separatist group that foreigners should stay away from the South and neighboring provinces.

Phuket's Provincial Police Commander, Maj Gen Veerayuth Sittimalic, said "We have seen the trouble in the South and will not be careless when it comes to people's safety." He said that security had already been beefed up at places such as the airport and the oil storage depot on Cape Panwa, and more police had been moved to the night shift.

In addition to extra guards at public places, Gov Udomsak also said that police will be posted at all government offices around the island, and office lights will left on throughout the night. "In the dark, it is easy to have trouble," he explained.

The decision to increase security coincided with a warning issued by the United Front for the Independence of Pattani (Bersatu) to "Dear People of the World" that the violence may spread from the South to other parts of Thailand.

In its warning, delivered to the news agency Agence France Presse (AFP) and reported around the world on April 30, Bersatu said, "Persons who plan to visit Thailand NOW are warned not to travel to Patani Raya Region, (Pattani, Yala, Narathiwat, Satun, Songkhla)

and the neighbour provinces (Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Pattalung)."

The statement concluded starkly, "Pattani people are not responsible for anything that happens to you after this warning."

Bersatu was formed in 1989 to unite the splinter separatist groups in the Thai-Malaysian border area. Leaders from the various terrorist groups, including the Pattani United Liberation Organization (PULO) and the Mujahadeen Pattani, met with the aim of "gathering fighters for Pattani".

The threat to people and interests in areas outside the five predominantly-Muslim provinces in Thailand (Satun, Pattani, Songkhla, Yala and Narathiwat) appears to be the first open dec-

laration of hostile intent toward a wider population, including foreigners.

Whether Bersatu genuinely intends to launch attacks in other parts of Thailand, or whether it is simply using the threat of violence to rattle tourist markets and thereby damage the Thai economy, is unknown.

The warning came after more than 100 people, dismissed by Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra as "teenagers who were given drugs and cash", were killed by Thai security forces in Pattani. At least 30 were killed when police stormed a mosque.

Although some within the ranks of the Thai authorities resolutely deny that the violence was carried out by separatists,

Police team transferred for probe misconduct

THALANG: The entire team of police officers investigating the double murder of Prasert and Thavorn Trairat have been transferred after an internal probe into their conduct by officers from Provincial Police regional headquarters in Surat Thani.

K. Prasert and K. Thavorn, the parents of Thepkrasattri Mayor Prasong Trairat, were gunned down in their shophouse home on May 5 last year.

Pol Col Ronapong Saikaew, Superintendent of Investigation for Provincial Police Region 8, which includes Phuket, told the *Gazette* that the probe was launched after he received complaints from three of the four people charged in the

Col Ronapong said he had received a complaint from Wipa Jantong and her husband Sompong Jantong, who were charged with conspiracy to murder K. Prasert and K. Thavorn. They were later released on bail and are currently on trial.

In their complaint, they appealed for Region 8 police to investigate the police officers involved in the murder investigation.

Suchart Maneesuwan, who had confessed to playing a role in the murder, also filed a complaint against the investigating officers, Col Ronapong said, for breaking one of his ribs.

Suchart admitted identifying the victims for the alleged gunman, whom he identified as Pol Sgt Maj Chalaw Ramduang.

Col Ronapong said that, as a result of the investigation into the complaints, all officers in

Singapore's Straits Times quoted Thailand's Deputy Director of the National Security Command, General Panlop Pinmanee, as saying "It is absolutely certain that they are separatists. They were trained as guerrillas for separatist actions by BRN (the Barisi Revolusi Nasional) and PULO."

Australia was quick to advise its nationals to "exercise caution" during their time in Thailand, particularly in areas frequented by tourists and expatriates.

The travel advisory from the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs stated, "We continue to receive reports that terrorist elements in the region are planning attacks."

Foreign ministries of other countries updated their travel advisories to offer similar warnings, though none so far have mentioned specific tourist resorts by name.

The effect on the tourism industry of the latest incidents and of Bersatu's warning has yet to assessed. However, AFP quoted Napasorn Kakai, the Tourism Authority of Thailand's No 2 official in Phuket, as saying tourism "will be affected if the unrest is not over soon.

"We are concerned that if the unrest continues it will finally affect Phuket and Krabi," she was quoted as saying.

There are serious doubts in many quarters in Phuket about the government's ability to restore peace in the South.

In particular, critics have targeted the national security forces' perceived heavy-handedness and PM Thaksin's apparent continuing belief that he can solve highly complex problems with simplistic "just do it" policies.

Princess to sing in 'To Be No 1' concert

V/Gov Niran said that the Phuket provincial government had earlier organized soccer and bowling tournaments. The winners of those events will receive shields from Her Royal Highness

volved in the double murder investigation had been transferred to other provinces.

"The Phuket officers investigating this case were found to have injured K. Suchart, and to have conducted a dishonest investigation. They have been ordered to move to other provinces," Col Ronapong said.

However, he would not name the officers transferred, or say when the order was issued or where they had been posted to.

"People already know the truth – that a police officer was the real kingpin who hired the gunman," Col Ronapong said.

"The case has now been sent to the courts, so we [Police Region 8] can't be involved in it anymore," he added.

Col Ronapong also confirmed that the alleged gunman, Sgt Maj Chalaw, formerly of the Sikow District Police in Trang, is still being sought by police.

Probe into 'illegal' resort at Nai Harn

NAI HARN: Owners of a resort being built in Nai Harn, near Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club, will likely be ordered to dismantle it by June 10.

The order is expected to be issued after government officers found that no permission had been given for the resort's construction, Vice-Governor Pongpow Ketthong told the *Gazette* on May 3.

V/Gov Pongpow said he had visited the site on April 30 and concluded that the resort - which as yet has no name had been built without the permission of the Rawai Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor). More than 20 bungalows in the resort have already been completed.

"The issue of who owns the land [the resort is being built on] is currently in court," he said, declining to name the parties involved in the court case. "In any case there are no papers for this land, so that means no one can build on it.'

He explained that Rawai *OrBorTor* has already ordered the developer to cease construction and will soon order the demolition of the buildings. If the developer does not dismantle the resort then the OrBorTor itself will do so.

The Chief of the Phuket Provincial

Forestry Office (PPFO), Tongchai Savapong, told the *Gazette* that his officers are checking whether the land belongs to the PPFO or to the Phuket Agricultural Land Reform Office (PALRO – the office responsible for SorPorKor 4-01 titles) and answers are expected within

If the resort is found to have been built on land belonging to the PPFO, the developers will be prosecuted for encroachment, he said.

PALRO Chief Teerawut Tawornpatanapong said, "If we find the land belongs to the PALRO, that means the developer can't build on it because it is earmarked for agricultural use only."

Sang Chanalert, former village headman of Rawai Moo 1, said, "Before, there was just a hut on the land. They erected a long screen around the site to hide it. When I tried to walk into the area some people came and told me to leave.

"Rawai *OrBorTor* told the developer to cease construction on March 26. So how come the construction continued to the point where the resort is almost finished?

"If we can't preserve the forest in Nai Harn, soon there will be none left,' - Gategaeo Phetsawang he added.

Land office murder probe faltering

PHUKET: A year after the assassination of Pongtorn Hiranyaburana – the Deputy Chief of the Phuket Land Office ordered to investigate suspect land titles the trail leading to his killers has apparently gone cold.

Pol Col Ronapong Saikaew, Superintendent of Investigation for Police Region 8, based in Surat Thani, on April 28 told the Gazette, "We still need more time to track down the gunmen and gather more evidence."

K. Pongtorn was shot ex-

of road as he drove home to Surat Thani on April 25, 2003.

Officers believe that his inquiries were on the verge of disclosing the names of the people responsible for doctoring land titles. His honesty was later praised by Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra.

'We don't have the time to track down the suspects, who have now fled to northeastern Thailand," Col Ronapong said, adding that officers believe that four or more people were involved in K. Pongtorn's murder.

"We don't have enough in ecution-style on a lonely stretch terms of witness statements or

material evidence to make a case," he added.

Col Ronapong announced on November 11 last year that officers expected a breakthrough and were closing in on a key person involved in the killing.

But on April 28 he said, "The problem is that we don't have only this case to investigate. Besides this one, there are many others that we have to look into."

Col Ronapong said that he will coordinate with investigating officers and give them another month to follow up on the case. However, he added, "We can't say how long it will take."

One dead, one critical after karaoke microphone row

THALANG: One man was stabbed to death and another remains in a critical condition following an argument over whose turn it was to use the microphone at the Kon Suav (Beautiful People) karaoke bar and restaurant in Cherng Talay around 1 am on

Police arrested the alleged killer, 24-year-old Veerasak Nantasin, from Surat Thani, some three hours later at his home at 24/8 Moo 6 in Cherng Talay. A knife was recovered during the arrest.

The dead man was named as 18-year-old Bundit "Koh" Kulabuth. He died en route to Thalang Hospital from five stab wounds to his back. The other victim, Sanchai "Jek" Benjakarn, 19, remains in the intensive care unit at the hospital.

Pol Lt Col Suwat Kaewprom, Deputy Superintendent of Cherng Talay Police Station, told the Gazette that witnesses in the karaoke reported that an argument broke out between the victims and their alleged attacker over use of the microphone.

"Veerasak confessed he did it because he was drunk," Col Suwat told the Gazette. "He has been charged with one count of murder and one of attempted murder."

New OrBorJor elects chairman and deputies

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Administration Organization OrBorJor has elected Hutt Katanchaleekul as Chairman.

At the inaugural session of the newly-elected body on April 29, Chaivichit Dattvatkanee was elected deputy chairman and Wacharapong Kuawong second deputy chairman. All three are Democrat Party members.

The 24-member body, dominated by its 19 Democrats, was elected in polling on March 14. The election results were approved by the Central Election Committee (CEC) in Bangkok, and officially announced in ters were discussed. Phuket on April 26.

However, the chamber is still without a President. The Gazette understands that the separate election of Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutr as OrBorJor President has been confirmed by the Central Election Committee (CEC) in Bangkok, but that the official paperwork for this confirmation has not yet been sent to Phuket.

Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura therefore presided in her stead at the opening session, held at Phuket Provincial Hall. All members were sworn in before the vote. No policy mat-

PHUKET: The provincial government has announced that it will spend 16.5 million baht on building public restrooms at the most popular tourist beaches on the island.

Tawee Homhuan, an engineer at the Phuket Public Works and Town and Country Planning Office (PWTCPO), told the Gazette, "In each restroom there will a cubicle for handicapped people, three showers and seven toilets and six sinks."

He explained that one facility apiece will be built at Rawai, Nai Harn, Patong, Kamala, Karon, Bang Tao, and Nai Yang beaches, while Kata and Surin beaches will have two each.

"The responsibility for management and maintenance will rest with the local authorities. They will also decide whether users should pay a fee,"

The restrooms are expected to be in use by September 30.

Moodies sign goes up in smoke

K. Banai estimated the damage at about 50,000 baht, plus 20,000 baht loss of earnings on the night. No one was injured.

"The fire started from old wiring in the sign," he said. "We will check all wiring to make sure that this does not happen again."

KHON KAEN: Guns, knives, poison, bombs – and recycled paper. Until now, one of these had nothing in common with the oth-

However, the next gun fanatic T-shirt you see might read, "Guns don't kill people. Recycled paper kills people."

Yes, recycled paper just became a lethal commodity, after a security guard at a recycling business in Khon Kaen was found suffocated under 2,000 tons of recycled paper recently.

Preliminary investigations indicated that the security guard, Sommai Wongsithep, 46, who worked at Khon Kaen Wongpanit Co in Muang District, went to sleep on a stack of paper bundles weighing up to 800kg each, Pol Capt Therttoon Soisukhapapan

Mechanic Prajuap Matpang, 36, who discovered the body, said he and about 10 other employees arrived for work at 8 am and found heaps of paper on

He noticed one of Sommai's legs after two bundles of paper were picked up by a fork-

Sommai's wife, Jomthong Wongsithep, said she went to the factory to look for her husband at 7am after he did not return home as usual at 6:15 am.

"My husband had been working at the recycling plant for a month. "He was a good man and served in the military as a draftee. He was not supposed to have been asleep on duty," she

Dr Thitichai Wiangsimma, of Srinakharin University Hospital, said death occurred six hours before the body was discovered and was caused by suffocation.

huket is an island on the move. The lack of an extensive public transport system, the easy availability of credit to buy cars and motorcycles, along with peer pressure, have caused an explosion in the number of private vehicles on the roads.

The increasing numbers of properties and businesses being built in more remote areas also fuel the need to use a vehicle.

Thepkrasattri Rd (the airport road) permits north-south travel without too many tears, although readers may remember delays and financial tribulations surrounding its construction. However, since work to widen the route through Thalang was completed – itself a chaotic exercise – journeys to and from Sarasin Bridge are now far easier.

But Chalermprakiat Ror IX Rd (the bypass road) – already home to Gems Gallery, the Tesco-Lotus and Big C superstores, and soon to be joined by the Central Festival shopping mall, Index furniture store, and a little further away, Makro - is little more than a two-lane road.

At the right time of day, at the right time of year, it can be a straightforward sprint along this road and past the large and evergrowing number of small-to-medium sized businesses and occasional wat.

But find yourself stuck behind a convoy of road trains advancing through their crawler gears, or worse, between hotrodding minibuses and airport limousines, and it's the road to Hell. Good intentions are few and far between.

Jockeying drivers vie for half a vehicle's length advantage and succeed in turning two lanes into three, four, five or more.

Work due to start on May 7 to widen the bypass road to an official four, and in one section six lanes, should bring some welcome relief.

When completed, the 10-kilometer stretch from the Dara Samut School intersection (close to the Thainaan restaurant) to just north of the Boat Lagoon on Thepkrasattri Rd will, it is hoped,



of Pornthip Seastore on the bypass road, told the Gazette that while she agrees that expansion of the road is good news for Phuket, her business will be affected. "This project is bound to

affect sales and I'll lose customers because it's going to take so long to finish. They just won't

want to stop with construction work just outside of a shop. Or they won't be able to stop."

Another business owner expressing concern was Chan Sim, managing director of Chan's Antiques, which only recently moved to new premises on the bypass road. He estimates that his business will lose around

10% of its customers over the course of the project's construction. The government will not pay compensation for lost business.

But not everyone foresees a problem.

Sakda Prathitkham, Manager of Tour East Company Ltd said that construction work would have little impact upon his business. "My staff go out to visit

customers, rather than the other way round," he said. "We have only a few people coming into the office, so it shouldn't affect us greatly."

This may prove to be an optimistic view of the potential

The difficulties faced by drivers in navigating the road while work is underway have not, so far as the Gazette has been able to ascertain, been consid-

One section where exisiting problems may be exacerbated – once work has been completed – is on the southern side of the Dara Samut School intersection. The anticipated volume of traffic from Central Festival and other routes has led planners to widen this section to six lanes. However, some 100 or so meters toward Chalong, these six lanes will merge into the current haphazard one lane each-way road, forming a bottleneck.

Although blueprints show the merge, whether factors such as typical road behavior have been taken into account could not be expanded upon.

Two heads are better than one

SRISAKET: Villagers in Khukan District are still trying to interpret an unusual event in their village – the birth of a two-headed

The calf was born alive to owner Prasit Sukkrawan on April 4, but died soon afterward.

By the time journalists arrived at K. Prasit's home in Village 3, Tambon Son, they found excited villagers crowding around the lifeless biological oddity, some lighting incense sticks and others praying for the winning numbers in the upcoming lottery draw.

The dead calf, prominently displayed on the front page of the next day's newspaper, had two fully-formed heads coming from a shared neck and was in all other respects a normal calf.

Through the incense smoke billowing inside her barn, 33-



year-old K. Prasit told the press she had had a premonition of the strange birth. The previous night, she explained, she had dreamed that a friend in a nearby village had given birth to a child with two heads, one with curly hair and the other with straight hair.

Upon waking the following morning, she heard her pregnant cow lowing in pain.

A veterinarian was called in to extract the calf, but it took several hours - and a great deal of agony on the cow's part – to extract the calf.

Ruling out the possibility that the two-headed calf could have been just a fluke of nature, K. Prasit said, "I don't know whether this is good luck or bad

"This cow has given birth to three calves. The first was stillborn, the second is still alive, and the third is this two-headed cow."

K. Prasit is sure the twoheaded calf is somehow related to her personal life. She had twin daughters herself, she explained, and hadn't heard from her husband, an itinerant laborer, for more than four months. It all had to be related somehow, she said.

At 72, elderly neighbor Naak Jantharachit probably thought she had seen it all - until now. "I have never seen a twoheaded cow before.

"It is a very odd cow and I believe that this will surely bring good luck. Besides, this village has four pairs of twins, one male and three female.

'My neighbors and I have determined that the winning digits in the next lottery draw will be 52 and 92," she said confidently.

The success or otherwise of their prophecy is not known.

He was unsure whether funding will be granted, but in any case such a project is a long way off; first the bypass road widening must be completed so that its impact can be assessed, and then the overpass would be subject to a survey and a feasibility study before any decision could be made on whether to

No plans seem likely to be made within three years, if at all, for this project to aid the movement of traffic between Phuket City and Patong.

In any case, there must be a major question mark over the capacity of the Kathu-bound section of Wichit Songkram Rd to deal with the larger volume of traffic that would inevitably follow the building of an overpass across the bypass road.

It looks likely that commuters and tourists will have to endure difficulty in finding entrances to and from businesses, avoiding construction vehicles and workers, and the irritation of contra-flow systems, leading to the frustration of driving straight past one's intended destination, and on the wrong side of the road.

Do the companies involved in building these mega-projects

take any responsibility for traffic control? Experience has shown most road users in Phuket that the Big C and Tesco-Lotus superstores, while keen to have as many customers as possible, leave traffic control to good luck and the local government.

Security guards occasionally venture out onto the highway to slow down traffic to allow customers to

depart. In most cases, however, one must look for a gap, or proceed to block the road with the was being considered.

Like Phuket City, Patong has a mega-project in the making. Jungceylon, in the center of town, will, it is hoped, bring tourists and shoppers by the coach- and car-load. Anyone familiar with the roads around Patong during the high season can attest to the fact that it hardly

works now. K. Wanchai has inspected the roads in and around Patong, and his assessment is bleak. "We cannot build more roads through Patong – nor can we widen the existing ones – because there are so many people and businesses there," he said.

do a very good job of supporting the tourism industry in the first place, at least in terms of road building.

"All we can do for Patong is to improve the quality of the roads and do our best to smooth traffic flow. It's too difficult to improve it now."

Just reaching Patong can be a problem. Going "over the hill" is a harrowing business involving near-hairpin bends, first-gear driving, heavy trucks and delays.

Talk of a tunnel through to Patong emerges every so often. In 2001, Sweden's Skanska "The town planners didn't Teknik Co Ltd received 3 million baht to conduct a "pre-feasibility study" of the idea. Three years on, however, Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has scotched the idea of a Patong tunnel, perhaps permanently.

"A tunnel is a fanciful idea. It's not feasible and we will not go ahead with it," Gov Udomsak told the Gazette.

"Instead, I want the Department of State Highways to make the road over the hill less steep. I have sent a paper to them on this matter," he continued.

Making the hills around Patong less hilly may be a Herculean task but Gov Udomsak is positive that it will reduce the number of accidents and allow traffic to flow more smoothly.


K. Wanchai agreed with Gov Udomsak on the cost-tobenefit ratio of a tunnel, although he did not venture an opinion on a scheme to make the roads less steep. More lanes, he said, are planned for the Phuket City-Patong route.

The PPHO will concentrate its efforts on renewing the surface of a number of Phuket's roads, adding more lighting, and beautifying the median strip on Thepkrasattri Rd.

"We aim to have a full 40 kilometers of plants along the road," K. Wanchai said. "We are discussing this project with the [Provincial Administration Organization] now"

The long-term future of Phuket rests on many issues and transport is just one of them. As the economy of Phuket appears to be flourishing with little restraint, and more people prosper, greater numbers of vehicles will appear on the roads.

There is one advantage to this, perhaps: the more traffic jams there are, the more slowly the traffic will move. This "enforced" speed limit may just keep the road accident statistics down.

ften-overlooked Koh Sireh, on the eastern side of Phuket City, is home to several poor communities, including shanty villages of Burmese laborers. For many of them, health care is beyond reach and the conditions they live in promote concern about the spread of disease.

Such concern has resulted in the opening of the Rassada Public Health Care Center in Moo Baan Keha, where World Vision Foundation of Thailand members and Burmese volunteers are working to raise awareness of infectious diseases, with particular focus on HIV/Aids.

Aroonsak Whongjit, the World Vision project coordinator at the center, explained, "It is much more difficult for them to get medical services than it is for Thai people. They are treated as insignificant, and some of them choose not to seek medical treatment, particularly the unregistered foreign workers.

"If they have an infectious disease, this can put the whole community at risk," he said.

More than 10,000 Burmese are currently registered as living in Phuket, said K. Aroonsak, and he expects that number to grow. "More and more Burmese people are working here, both legally and illegally. Most of them are teenagers. Most are single and enjoy sexual intercourse, and could be unknowing carriers of HIV and other serious diseases," he said.

Built on two rai, the center has two diagnosis rooms and a consultation room, but there are no facilities for overnight stays and patients diagnosed as having serious diseases are transferred to

hospitals with better facilities.

"We are just like any ordinary health center. We have to coordinate with the hospitals for immediate assistance in an emergency," said K. Aroonsak.

While two other World Vision staff work with K. Aroonsak at the center, the rest are Burmese volunteers, inluding Dr Maung Maung Soe. "I worked in Burma for seven years but then discovered that Thailand's thousands of Burmese laborers were

living in poverty. So I just wanted to give them something better," he told the *Gazette*.

"I've worked at more than 100 projects [like this] in Thailand, and doing this at least protects Burmese and other people from fatal diseases," he added.

Since the clinic opened on September 30 last year, more than 500 villagers have visited it. A dozen or so have been diagnosed as having HIV or Aids. These patients are given counseling, asked if they want to return home, and receive other care. In some circumstances, patients are given food, medicine and even a place to live.

"For patients with Aids who want to return to their home country, the clinic will contact the Immigration office, help them to complete the necessary paperwork, and help with travel costs," K. Aroonsak said.

Aids sufferers who do not want to go home are cared for by

volunteers. However, budget contraints have forced the clinic to limit the care budget to no more than 2,500 baht a person a month.

Although K. Aroonsak is deeply grateful for the eight million baht in donations from the governments of Japan, Australia, Britain, the US and Hong Kong that made the clinic a reality, he said his main challenge is still a shortage of funds.

Other major obstacles, he said, are a shortage of staff and under-trained volunteers. "All those things are equally significant and we have much more to do," he said.

One of the most economical strategies used by the center is health education, using comic books, video tapes, brochures and posters, most in Burmese language, and volunteers to explain HIV and Aids to villagers. "We also have cheap condoms at just two baht apiece," K. Aroonsak told the *Gazette*.

More volunteers are required to help with the education program, he added. "The most important criterion is the ability to speak Burmese and Thai," he said. Medical experience is not necessary. Volunteers are taught the basic methods of preventing disease from spreading before they teach it to others.

Tourist car ban on Koh Chang

oh Chang is to be ruled off-limits to vehicles from the mainland from 2007, according to the Natural Resources and Environment Ministry.

Environment Minister Plodprasop Suraswadi said the plan would allow only local vehicles to traverse the tourist island in Trat province. He said no more roads would be built on the island under the Koh Chang Development Plan, and the authorities were hoping to encourage people to use boats as their main means of transport.

Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra has floated a plan to develop the island into an international tourist destination on a par with Phuket.

Tourism Minister Sonthaya Kunplome said that about five billion baht would be spent on infrastructure projects on the island, as well as on marketing the island as a tourist attraction.

"We will urgently tackle the problems of garbage and limited water resources there," he said.

K. Sonthaya said the authorities would refrain from building a reservoir on the island, citing environmental concerns.

Land prices on Koh Chang have been increasing, and a rai could now fetch as much as 10 million baht.

Cell division: Mobile phone operator Total Access Communication (DTAC) has called on the government to impose quality-control standards on mobile phone batteries as part of measures to prevent the power cells from exploding.

DTAC is also urging the government to reduce the current 30% import tax on cell phone batteries to encourage consumers to use genuine ones. An industry

source estimated the market value of mobile phone batteries in Thailand at about one billion baht this year. Many consumers unwittingly buy fake, low-quality batteries because they are unable to distinguish them from real ones. They are also attracted by the lower price, he said.

Runway opposition: A survey by the Chiang Mai News found about 80% of people living in Chiang Mai's Mae Hia district oppose the 2.1-billion-baht project to expand Chiang Mai International Airport in their district.

The airport's expansion, set for completion in 2007, will enable the airport to carry 60 flights daily. The newspaper survey is not the only indication of widespread opposition to the plan. A public hearing conducted by Airports of Thailand Plc mirrored the newspaper's results.

To accommodate the airport expansion, 28 privately owned buildings and some local government offices would have to be moved.

A final decision on the plan is expected in about five months.

Green gasoline: A government project to distribute tax-free diesel fuel to fishing boats working 20-40 kilometers offshore is a hit, selling 105.4 million liters of diesel fuel since its inception in April 2000. The project was established to put an end to the offshore sale of fuel smuggled in from neighboring countries.

Somchai Poonsawas, Director of the Customs Department's Marine Enforcement Unit, said current strong sales have resulted from higher demand, a lack of monsoon winds, and a drastic reduction in the smuggling of diesel fuel, known

in Thailand as "green gasoline".

"The green gasoline is of better quality than the illicit product. Moreover it is 3-4 baht a liter cheaper than on the mainland," he said.

Student evaluation: Schools run by the Bangkok Metropolitan Authority (BMA) have been ordered to conduct urine tests on their students when the new semester begins this month, as part of a government plan to keep schools drug-free.

Bangkok Deputy Governor Tharin Sangansermsri, who is also in charge of education, said all 433 BMA schools were each given 5,000 baht to carry out the testing.

"The tests should begin immediately at the beginning of the next semester," she said, adding that the BMA's public health department would also offer technical support for the plan, known as the White School Project.

ICT capital of Isarn: Khon Kaen will launch a pilot information and communications technology (ICT) project in Nam Phong and Nong Song Hong districts as part of its effort to become the ICT capital of the Northeast.

Deputy Governor Kaenpetch Chuangrangsri said the ICT research project would enable rural communities to create ICT databases and develop new skills. Each community would have their own chief information officer, he said.

In conjunction with the Software Industry Promotion Agency, the province will also promote the Isarn Software Park, which has already attracted four software companies. Khon Kaen University will jointly supervise the initial budget for the pilot

project, which is 10 million baht.

Fujian flu shots urged: The Public Health Ministry is urging elderly people and children to be immunized against Fujian 'flu. Dr Somsong Rakpong, director of the Medical Sciences Department, said the World Health Organization had warned that Fujian 'flu was spreading in Southeast Asia.

Dr Somsong said many companies produced vaccines and children less than 12 years old, people with coronary disease, elderly people and those infected with HIV should be vaccinated.

Stick to milk, son: Wutthisit Suebsuwan, better known as "Tem" of the boy band UHT, confessed to drunk-driving and assault charges after being arrested last month.


At first he was sentenced to an 8,000-baht fine and a fourmonth jail term but after he confessed, the court commuted this to a two-month suspended sentence, a 4,000-baht fine and 12 hours of community service.


"Tem" said he was sorry for what he had done, and promised not to lose his temper in the future. He said he might spend his community service clearing an old cemetery.

Exodus causes famine

THE

he end of April. Middleaged tourist couples can occasionally be seen on the streets in Khao Lak, but there is no doubt about it – the season is over.

Some business owners seem to be living in denial, despite the certainty that there are now six months of next-to-nothing ahead. Others, apparently, can hardly wait to get their stuff packed up and go home.

As usual, the restaurants on Bang Niang Beach blew the whistle to end the season first, right in the middle of April while young tourist families with children were still roaming about.

The answer to the question, "Why are you in such a hurry?" will always remain shrouded in mystery, because the beach restaurant owners took the traditional route and fled the scene.

That's not really much of a boost for tourism.

Many visitors enjoy eating lunch and dinner right on the Beach, within the sound of the ocean – something they have dreamed of and worked long and hard hours for in Europe or the States, or Japan or China, for that matter.

After they fought so hard just a couple of months earlier for the right to put up sunchairs and shades on the beach, it seems rather erratic of the Bang Niang beach business people to go home before the tourists do.

Putting up with boredom:

Khao Lak is rich in natural attractions. There's a 12-kilometer stretch of pristine beach, with the diving attractions of the Similan Islands a mere hour away by speedboat, well preserved jungle, beautiful mountains, six beautiful waterfalls within easy reach, lagoons and mangroves – you name it.

But there are still several things missing, man-made things that would allow tourists, especially families, to spend a couple of fun-filled hours after dinner or in the afternoon doing something other than nodding their heads in a live music pub or watching on a big-screen TV as Schumi drives

to victory for the 25,649th time.

Khao Lak people were promised a gym (oops, where are the investors?), a cinema (just removing the signboard announcing it solved this problem) and a big shopping center (the Khao

Lak Center, which actually turned out to be just another row of shophouses) – all dust in the wind.

We almost gave up hope for an innovative Khao Lak attraction when, just like a miracle, out of the blue it appeared ... ta-daaa

... finally Khao Lak got its very first man-made tourist attraction, accessible to rich and poor, big and small: The Khao Lak Jungle Adventure Mini-Golf course.

Yes, miracles do happen. Achim "Kim" Linke, 45, from Germany, has been in Thailand and working in the tourism industry for more than 20 years. Now he has decided to fill in the Khao Lak attraction gap with a beauti-

fully designed mini-golf course.

K n o wing this project was underway brought a smile to the face of each and every Khao Lak resident. This splendid attraction opened at the beginning of April and is on the right-hand side of the road to the Chong

Fah waterfall, just a few hundred meters from Highway 4.

Here, the visitor finds an exotic "ancient" jungle adventure city, built of red *boraan*-style

("antique") clay bricks, amid lush tropical vegetation.

Entering this impressive project is like stepping into an Indiana Jones movie.

Everything, starting right at the entrance with the reception and restaurant, is beautifully laid out and designed.

Arriving guests walk towards an ancient temple wall, dominated by a seated Buddha statue with a waterfall dropping from a height of some four meters. Water courses and plants sit side-by-side with authentically-styled and carefully distressed temple ruins.

Not one resort or hotel in all of Khao Lak comes anywhere near it for design and style.

And we are talking about a mini-golf course here. I was truly impressed. Every mini-golf enthusiast is sure to derive maximum fun from this 18-hole course. Starting off with some

easy mini-greens, the difficulty level steadily increases, though with one or two easier holes interspersed to give room for a soothing break, until the visitors reach Hole 18.

"Here, anyone taking it too seriously will sooner or later start to tear his hair out," says Kim with a knavish smile. "You can easily hit the ball 20 times or more without ever getting it into the right hole."

At the start, a player can choose from eight holes, and it's a bit of a lottery.

Two of the holes scores a hole in one, while the remaining six lead the the ball through tunnels to crazy destinations, including taking it right back to the starting point.

Hole 8 is particularly funny. Here, a realistic crocodile awaits the players with wide-open jaws. If the player manages to hit the ball right into the croc's mouth, he or she will score a hole in one. Anything else leads to disaster. Puddles and broken brick walls abound.

"The philosophy behind this project was to give Khao Lak what it needed so badly – fun after-dinner fun for families with kids," Kim explained. "The fun factor is important for our project and for Khao Lak in general."

Visitors, especially families with kids, will definitely have fun-filled hours for a fee of 250 baht for adults or 150 baht for children. Kids under a meter tall get in free.

The Jungle Adventure Mini-Golf course is illuminated at night to ensure that Khao Lak tourists have a welcome activity option apart from the remaining three or four "hot and sizzling" pubs and bars. The course is open from 12:30 pm to 10 pm.

The mini-golf is a big step forward in helping to increase Khao Lak's popularity among families – and perhaps the first step down the path to catching up with fun-filled destinations such as Phuket and Samui.

I hope every Khao Lak resident appreciates this "gift" as much as I do. Could the season end on a better note?

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he modest buildings and grounds of the Life Home Project are hidden away in Phuket City with no signs or outward evidence of the 40 women and children infected with HIV living within

It's lunchtime when I arrive, my first visit in around a year. A dozen of the smaller children are having what at first seems a peaceful nap after lunch. But the quiet is broken by sudden coughing and wheezing, little lungs racked by respiratory infection.

"In the past year, we've lost six of our family to Aids," Helene Fallon Wood, Life Home Project's fundraising chairperson tells me. "One was a baby.

"Tuberculosis is common in those infected with HIV so we try to give each of our residents as much personal space as possible to prevent the spread of communicable diseases."

While children try to sleep, in the new art room, a number of women are quietly drawing and painting symmetrical designs onto fabric.

These *mandalas* are then made into banners and sold to benefactors such as Patong's Holiday Inn Resort, where they were hung from the ceilings last Christmas.

Kathy Manthei directs the art program at Life Home Project. The program helps the women, usually rejected by their families and friends, to earn an income to pay for their basic needs.

"Almost all of our women have been housewives infected with HIV by their husbands," explained Kathy.

"They have no skills and have not earned a living in the past. With our art projects, they

learn design, drawing, painting, sewing, organizational planning, inventory maintenance and production.

"This allows them to operate and manage their work, thereby giving them potential to earn an income," she continued.

I watch the women work, not unlike women working in factories anywhere in Thailand.

But these women are different. Some have infected sores on their arms and faces, others seem tired. But they all smile when they see me. These women are the lucky ones. They are given medicine and the opportunity to earn money to support their children.

Behind the charming smiles are heartbreaking tales. One of the younger women tells how she was born into a family of six children, all with different fathers. She was sent to live with one of her mother's boyfriends when she was 12.

He raped her and infected her with HIV. Eventually, the boyfriend, her mother and two of her sisters died of Aids. Homeless, this young girl found a place at Life Home Project.

Jose Luis Gay founded the project after teaching local Sea Gypsy children how to sail. The longer he stayed on Phuket, the more he realized the need to help those left behind by the island's soaring prosperity.

"The women are victims from careless husbands who infected them and consequently, their children," Jose said. "Over the past two years, we have inOff the

vited women and children to Life Home Project as they have nowhere else to go.


"In the past year, the government has made anti-retroviral medication available, but that does not save these women from being rejected by their families."

The number of people dying from Aids-related diseases in Western countries is now a fraction of the amount dying at the height of the epidemic. But here in Phuket, I am told, the drugs given to HIV patients are not the latest generation.

These women and children still cannot look forward to a long and healthy life, but will, perhaps, have longer and healthier lives than they would have had without the drugs they receive.


"Life Home Project is indebted to the generosity of the local community, which has supported our programs this past year," added Helene.

"Donations from the British Business Association of Phuket, the Rotary Club of Patong, and the Evason, and last year's fundraising ball at the JW Marriott resent, allowed us to

renovate our main house and buy washing machines and a dishwasher. Dishwashers are important in preventing the spread of TB," she explained.

"But we have outgrown our rented premises. Through this year's ball on May 29, again at the JW Marriott, we hope to raise enough money to buy a piece of land. Our goal is to build a home large enough for all the women and children who need us."

As I prepare to leave Life Home Project, I meet Khun Nui.

She tells me that her mother died of cancer when she was 13. Her father, an alcoholic, blew all the family money on gambling.

Hoping for a better life, she married young to a man who became addicted to heroin and karaoke singers.

Hoping that having children would turn him into a responsible family man, she had several children and supported her family by doing laundry, cleaning the local Chinese shrine, and selling tea and rice soup in the evenings.

Eventually her husband became sick and died. Not long after, she fell ill and ended up living in a cave with others infected with HIV.


"I had nowhere else to go. Then someone told me about Life Home Project and I came to Phuket and now I have food, support and encouragement from Jose, who is like our godfather," said Khun Nui.

"My health is okay, though I have a problem with my eyes. I need an injection into my eye every week in order to slow down the blindness that is part of my HIV condition.

I don't want to be blind. I hold onto my hope and my courage to live."

Khun Nui has written a poem, and has had it translated into English. She hands it to me and smiles.



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
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
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ome of the newer members of our happy little community may not be aware that a giant among discos once stood in Patong. And get this: it was one of the few places that actually had a disco license.





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Brilliant work of demented genius

Ernest Hemingway and H L Mencken considered Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn* as the great American novel. The tradition of an adolescent narrator spinning his tale loosely continued in such disparate novels as J D Salinger's Catcher in the Rye and Harper Lee's To Kill a

This genre has now reach-

ed its apotheosis with DBC Pierre's Vernon God Little (Faber and Faber, London, 2003, 279pp).

This is a dazzling pinwheel of a novel, outsized, profane, farcical, wacky, brutal, poignant, tender, and howlingly funny.

The narrator is a 15-year-old schoolboy from a

small Texas town whose best friend is a "Meskin" boy named Jesus Navarro who one day shoots dead 16 of his high school classmates before turning the rifle on himself.

You know you're in the hands of a demented genius when the novel opens like this:

"It's hot as hell in Martirio, but the papers on the porch are icy with the news ... It tells you normal times just ran howling from town. Probably forever. God knows I tried my best to learn the ways of this world, even had inklings we could be

glorious; but after all that's happened, the inkles ain't easy anymore. I mean - what kind of f-en life is this?"

-en Vernon's favorite word. The novel opens with him in the town jail, being questioned about his friendship with Jesus.

camera teams and tabloid hacks. Pressured on all sides, Vernon dreams of escape over the border to Mexico.

Eulalio (Lally, Lalito) Ledesma is a TV camera repairman who has stolen a minicam and passes himself off as a CNN reporter.

He latches on to Vernon and to Vernon's widowed mom who, like nearly everyone else in this novel, is obese, dim-witted, greedy, self-obsessed, and a slave to the TV tabloids.

Eulalio moves steadily up through a chain of women as he develops himself into a one-man media conglomerate.

Vernon is passed on to a demented shrink named Dr Oliver Goosens and flees from a suspicious rectal examination. Packing up his few belongings for his flight to Mexico, he decides on his CDs of Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings and Hank Williams.

"I kept them because those boys have seen some shit – hell,

> all they sing is about the shit they've seen; you just know they woke up plenty of times on a wooden floor somewhere, with 90 flavors of trouble riding on their ass. The slideguitar understands your trouble. Then all you need is the beer."

He takes a bus down to Hous-

ton to see Taylor Figueroa, a firstyear college girl he idolizes, then makes it across the border to Mexico. Broke, he sells everything he owns in a cantina. Which leads to this scene:

'Don't f-en ask me when the first tequila arrived. Suddenly, later in life, glass-clear skies swim through the open side of the bar, with stars like droplets on a spider's web, and I find myself smoking sweet, ovalshaped cigarettes called Delicados, apparently from my own pack. I'm loaded off my ass. These guys' mustaches are up

where their hair should be, and huge f-ken caves are howling underneath, full of gold and tonsils, just look at them, singing their hearts

out." Meanwhile, a conspiracy of dunces has plastered Vernon's face all over TV, accusing him not only of be-

The town has been taken over ing an accomplice in the massaby an unruly mob of cable news cre but also of 18 other murders while he's been in Mexico. Betrayed by Taylor Figueroa, he winds up on Death Row.

> It is only here, toward the end of the novel, that Vernon returns to the day of the massacre and we learn what had driven Jesus Navarro over the edge.

> The end is a little too pat, just as the arrival of Tom Sawyer spoils the end of Huckleberry Finn. But this novel is a towering achievement.

And I only learned after reading this masterpiece that it won the 2003 Booker Prize. And most deservedly so.

try to refrain from standing on a soapbox and expounding my prejudices in this column because I tend to get wobbly and slip off. Metaphorically and physically.

This week, though, I would like to bend your ear with a few observations about events that may affect Phuket's future in profound ways. Or I may have had too much ma muang and fallen into a columnist's clammy klong.

The Software Industry Promotion Agency (Sipa) kicked off its activities in Phuket with a daylong Software Business Seminar a couple of weeks ago.

The seminar outlined a series of activities and goals which, with a bit of luck and a lot of hard work, could finally make the phrase "Cyber Paradise" more than a cynical sigh.

Let's face it. Phuket doesn't hold legions of university-trained, English-adept computer savants: we'll never be able to compete on that score with, let's say, Bangalore.

Phuket doesn't enjoy 8 Mbps of broadband readily available in every nook and cranny of the island: that's Hong Kong. We don't have the mountains of capital and marketing savvy available in, oh, Singapore.

But Phuket does have one huge advantage over all those places. It can be summarized in a simple question: Given the choice, who the hell would live in Bangalore, Hong Kong or Singapore, when they could live in Phuket?

That's where we have the competition beat cold. Our greatest strength. The one area where Phuket leaves all the other Cyber Centers in the dust.

Sipa, as a government agency, works with the Board of Investment. The BoI's prime task is to bring big

business to Thailand by using corporate tax incentives, providing help


setting up manufacturing sites, reducing import tariff on imported manufacturing equipment, and the like.

Of course, Sipa is interested in bringing traditional BoI-sized corporations to Phuket: an IBM development center, or a Microsoft team (for, say, Xbox games, or Windows Mobile platform support), maybe a J2ME Java mobile application center (Mc-Nealy should spread some of those two billion Microsoft bucks out here where the, uh, Sun shines, eh?).

Landing a big-name software company through mega-BoI incentives would do much to put Phuket on the global software development map.

But in the long term, in my opinion anyway, Phuket stands to benefit the most from cultivating a big bunch of small companies: a thousand points of software entrepreneurial light, if you will.

The largest growth in the software business in Phuket won't come from big companies moving their development and

support efforts to our sunny isles. Rather, the big boom will come from within - small, scrappy, companies with great ideas and little or no capital, ready to try new approaches – the kind of environment that will bring sustainable growth in employment, for foreigners and Thais alike.

But that ain't BoI territory. At least traditionally, BoI has gone after the big fish.

Sipa needs to work with the big companies, sure, but it

> also needs to make the Phuket playing field inviting to lots of smaller companies.

Most surprising: based on what I've seen, Sipa seems to understand this.

The Software Business Seminar addressed many of the issues that face small software startups: quick visas and work permits for techies; "scaling down" BoI requirements and making them more softwarecompany friendly; easy access to high-quality training; help with marketing.

One of the main objectives presented by Sipa: "To attract foreign as well as local software specialists who are Phuket lovers to invest and work in Phuket."

That draws a doublethumbs-up from my direction.

While I'm on the subject, there's an interesting opportunity awaiting Sipa in Phuket – a true litmus test of Sipa's nearterm capabilities.

At this moment, all major high-speed Internet lines carrying data on and off the island go through Bangkok. Many people believe that the perennial slowdowns we see here are due to Bangkok sucking up bandwidth, leaving those of us "upcountry" to fight over the dregs.

Few people realize that the Internet backbone, in fact, runs near Phuket's shores: there's no technical reason for Phuket's bits to run upstream to the congestion in Krung Thep.


We could, at least in theory, tap directly into the Internet backbone and start the island sipping directly from the cyber fire hydrant. There are monumental political hurdles to clear, to be sure.


But I wonder if Sipa will be able to get Phuket linked directly to the backbone?

Time will tell.

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Time to ban Bangla traffic

It's happened before and, in this perilous world, it will probably happen again – the jitters that Phuket suffers when anything related to terrorism happens within a few thousand miles of the island.

This is not to say that the jitters are unjustified. In the aftermath of the destruction of the World Trade Center, local hotheads told the *Gazette* that if the US attacked Afghanistan, local Muslims would target Westerners for retaliation.

After the Bali bombing, the foreign ministries of many countries advised their nationals to avoid or at least be very careful in Phuket, especially in Patong, which was perceived (because of its supposed similarity to Kuta) as the next potential target for Jemaah Islamiyah bombers. In both cases nothing happened.

Now the separatist organization Bersatu has issued a warning that foreigners should stay away from the five southernmost provinces of Thailand and "the neighbour provinces (Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Pattalung)". While there is no explicit threat of violence, there is an implicit one.

So Phuket is once again on high alert. The governor has ordered all government offices to leave the lights on all night, police have been moved to night duty, and security has been beefed up at important places, such as the airport and tourist sites.

Yet again, however, one simple tactic to make potential bombers' jobs more difficult has not been employed: making Soi Bangla pedestrians-only.

Bar owners in Patong were recently asked by police to keep an eye out for motorbikes left unattended, particularly the newer models that have enough space under the seat for storing a crash helmet. This is certainly an sign that the police consider bombs driven into Bangla a genuine threat. Yet the road has not been closed to traffic.

True, the tourist season is winding down, but Soi Bangla at night is still the place with the highest concentration of "soft targets" – people – on the island.

Barring traffic has the added attraction that it would make Soi Bangla a much more pleasant place to frequent. A temporary ban on traffic could easily be turned into a permanent one.

This suggestion has been made time and again, and the only opponents appear to be the tuk-tuk and motorbike taxi drivers who feel they have something to lose if barred from driving along Bangla.

Can this really be the reason the provincial government has not implemented a traffic ban? Are the interests of a small group to be protected at the expense of the potential deaths of hundreds?

Puzzling decisions on home ownership

After reading *Secret of transparency* [*Gazette*, May 1-7], I would like to relate my recent experience.

My wife and I are building a house in Chalong. Following legal advice, my wife owns the land and I have two signed, registered, back-to-back 30-year leases on the land.

Late last year I had plans drawn up using a reputable, wellestablished Thai architect, who currently has many sizable projects on Phuket.

When he submitted the plans for approval by Chalong Tambon Administration Organization [*OrBorTor*], I asked that they be registered in my name as I will own the house.

After several weeks of delay, the *OrBorTor* replied that I could not register the plans in my name because I was not a resident of Thailand. My architect was most surprised. He had just submitted plans on behalf of two other foreigners, in Laguna and Cherng Talay, who had their plans approved and registered in their names without delay or hassle. Neither foreigner had a residence permit.

I was not going to challenge the Chalong *OrBorTor* decision, as this would likely have delayed the plans from being approved at all and could well have caused "technical problems" later on.

But I find it very hard to accept that one government officer has the power to interpret the law as he or she thinks fit. How can it be that a person can do one thing in one district, yet is not allowed to do the same thing in another?

Internet connections – a step back in time

Nearly five months after the government promised fast and cheap Internet connections, the cost of a reasonably fast connection in Phuket is between five and eight times more expensive than in the US or Europe. When will we get these ADSL lines at a reasonable price?

GRIPING AT THE GRASSROOTS

was born in Khok Makham, Rawai's village 2. I had to stop studying at grade seven because my parents had so many children to take care of. Currently, I operate a small beverage stand and beach lounger/umbrella operation at Nai Harn beach. I have been doing this for 10 years. I can make some money doing this, especially in high season when many visitors come to Nai Harn.

Nai Harn was very different 10 years ago. There were far fewer vendors back then. It will be alright, however, as long as they are organized properly, because there are more tourists now than there were in the past.

In the beginning, OrBorTor Rawai had their people look after the trash situation on Nai Harn Beach, which is especially bad during the monsoon season. Local vendors and beach-chair operators pitched in and helped out.

Later, the *OrBorTor* told us they didn't have enough staff to take care of the entire Nai Harn area. But this is our place of business, so if we don't keep it clean, who will?

Our beach guard also keeps an eye out to make sure tourists are safe, and we have assisted the police in catching

Last year, my wife and I saw a pair of suspicious characters and reported them to the police, who were able to apprehend them after they snatched the bag of a foreigner – as we thought they might. We did this because we don't want Nai Harn to become a hangout for criminals.

When I find something wrong in Rawai, I report it to the *OrBorTor*. I expect them to at least listen to our problems, but they don't seem to care about us much. We always get the same answer: that they do Thailand's constitution mandates devolution of power to local bodies, but many government critics feel the present administration is doing just the opposite strengthening Bangkok's already powerful grip over the provinces and denying citizens the right to take part in their own government.

One man who believes that the voice of the common man is being given scant attention, even at the most basic grassroots level of government, is Nai Harn villager Somphot Maneesri.

Feeling his community's needs have been largely ignored by the Tambon Rawai Administration Organization (OrBorTor Rawai), he has initiated his own Orchid Project to undertake small-scale public works projects that he feels the OrBorTor should be responsible for.

But his group's work has received a rather frosty reception from some members of OrBorTor Rawai, an organization he once campaigned for a seat on - but failed to win. Now he is running for the village headman in Rawai village 2.





not have enough staff or budget. So we set up our own group, the Orchid Group, to do such work. There are about 15 of us, all Rawai residents.

Even without much of a budget or manpower we can make a difference, such as when we cleaned soil and debris from the roadside drainage ditch in front of Sawang-Arom temple, which is prone to flooding during the rainy season. We never saw an *OrBorTor* team dealing with that problem, even though the flooding damages the road.

When we asked the *OrBorTor* to fix it, they said they didn't have the budget. I never know how they spend their budget. They don't do what they should do, such as deal with the garbage problem. Many people know this.

The Orchid Group keeps an eye on Rawai. We spruce up public areas on weekends, even though we have no funding. We don't do it just for village 2, but in all of Rawai's villages. We don't discriminate between Buddhist and Muslim, because we are all Thais.

But whenever I suggest to officials that things are not in proper condition they treat me with contempt, as if I am their enemy. With our activities to improve

Rawai, we were seen as too assertive. But I don't think I will be in danger for doing the things that should really be the OrBorTor's responsibility. I am a Rawai native and I see them as my brothers.

Last year I ran for an OrBorTor Rawai seat, but I was not successful. But I introduced myself to the people and I think I got positive feedback.

This year, I will run for Village 2 headman to replace Sin Ponrop, who will retire on August 28.

Our first priority is garbage. The OrBorTor has been unable to deal with this problem. We often found mysterious garbage bags dumped in our village. Later, we found out that they came from houses in Nai Harn that are not served by the *OrBorTor* garbage collectors.

I expect the *OrBorTor* to figure out what the real problems are before doing work on projects that Rawai doesn't need. After they meet, we want to know what they plan to do.

In my experience, the common man is a "nobody" in the eyes of community leaders. When I asked a past village headman to sign a land document, he kept postponing it. Later, I had to go over his head to get it approved, and then he complained that I had done so.

That's why I want to get some authority. The job of headman is to serve the people, listen to their problems and keep them informed.

If I am elected headman, I will continue the activities that our group is doing, but I will be able to serve the community in an official capacity as well.

If I fail, I will continue to work for people with Orchid Group. I just want to keep my home village of Rawai wellmaintained. That's my only concern.

Ex-boss won't pay what he owes

I worked for a well-known property firm in November and early December last year.

While I was there, I paid out-of-pocket to buy some things the company needed. I was told by my ex-boss that I would be reimbursed from the petty cash

I left the company over three months ago and I haven't heard anything about my money from my ex-boss since then.

I have evidence of the purchases in the form of receipts from the shops where the items were bought.

this kind of problem? Now that I am no longer an employee, can I still complain to the Labor Of-

Will I ever get my money back?

Rungsan Imsomphot, Chief of the Phuket Office of Labor Protection and Welfare, replies:

Our office cannot help you because you have already left your job with the company and because you voluntarily agreed to pay for the items while you were there.

That was a personal agreement between yourself and your ex-boss, unrelated to your terms of employment.

However, if you bring the receipt to me I will call your exboss, discuss this issue with him, and try to work out an agreement.

If this fails, however, your only legal recourse is to file civil charges with the Provincial Court.

It will take a long time for the case to be heard and you will need to pay attorney fees. This probably won't be worth it for you if the amount you feel you are owed is small.

'had an important meeting on April nated over a 10-year period. 20 with visiting Australian Ambassador Miles Kupa. We discussed security issues affecting Australian residents of Phuket as well as trade between our two countries.

On the first point, I assured him that Phuket is dedicated to ensuring security, law and and order for all. Our efforts extend to transport on the island and to other provinces, and to a wide range of other places frequented by foreigners, including hotels, hospitals and entertainment

Thus far, the province has been able to provide safety and security for both residents and foreign visitors to a satisfactory level. Security officials also check vehicles coming onto the island at Tah Chat Chai for bombs and other threats to security, and English-language news is broadcast on both radio and TV.

In April we conducted a special training session on rescuing hostages and dealing with other such emergency situations. This session also included the correct way to disseminate information relating to the current troubles in the troubled southern border provinces.

Trade and investment issues were also discussed. This month, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra will travel to Australia to sign the Thai-Australian Free Trade Agreement, which goes into effect as of January 1, 2005.

Under the terms of this agreement, Australia will eliminate tariffs on 83% of Thai exports, including vegetables, fruit, pre-packaged foods, jewelry, small cars, pick-up trucks and many more. Further tariff reductions will follow, with taxes on all Thai exports to Australia being elimi-

Thailand will initially reduce the duty on 50% of Australian imports, with all tariffs on Australian imports eliminated within 20 years.

We discussed ways to increase trade by establishing a greater number of direct air links between Phuket and points in Australia. If we can accomplish this, consumer costs on Australian goods sold in Phuket should

decrease as a result of lower transport costs. This is because, at present, many of the Australian products coming here must be transshipped through Bangkok.

Current trade between Phuket and Australia is 11.6 billion baht a year, with Phuket exporting 9.9 billion baht and importing 1.7 million baht. Phuket's main export to Australia is tin, while imports include sailboats and rubber products.

Australian investment in Phuket for the first quarter of 2004 was over 10 million baht, mostly in the real estate, food and beverage, and import-export sectors.

Phuket's expanding health-tourism industry, which features excellent healthcare facilities and spas, can attract Australian tourists. This growing industry would benefit from increased marketing in Australia, and any government support or assistance for this effort would be beneficial.

I think we should support efforts to increase contacts between potential Thai and Australian investors, especially in industries where each can benefit from the other's expertise, such as the cultured pearl and wine industries. Phuket busi-



from Australian knowhow in quality-control, product development and manufacturing.

Education is another important issue, and the Australian government promotes the education of Thai students in its country.

I would also like to Australian expertise in

aquaculture, and I asked the Ambassador to consider cooperating in establishing a marine science faculty at the Prince of Songkhla University's Phuket Campus.

He replied that there is a university in Queensland that has great expertise in this area, and I am hopeful he will respond to my request to help establish ties between the two institutions.

Long-term approach: After six months as CEO Governor of Phuket, I still cannot point with pride to any single project that has been successfully completed, because all the work I have initiated is part of longterm development goals for the province.

One area that requires such a longterm effort is the island's public water supply. I have tried to improve public water supply by having the Irrigation Department construct the new reservoir [in Thalang]. Not only am I working with them to expand service, but also to upgrade the quality of water provided. Eventually, I would like to see all Phuket residents enjoying potable tap water.

Sanitation is another important longterm goal. I will organize a campaign to

nesses could also benefit make garbage collection the primary goal of all local administrations.

> While the province will lead this effort, funding must come from local administration budgets. Local leaders want the province to buy garbage trucks for them or construct incinerators, but I don't agree with this. I think all residents need to become more conscientious and take more personal responsibility for disposing of the waste they produce.

Each tambon must also have a clearsee Phuket benefit from ly defined garbage collection system and other sanitation standards. Each must distribute plastic bags to all of the villages in its jurisdiction and manage its own budget. We need to conduct this project island-wide in order for Phuket to establish a reputation as a clean province.

> Equally important is the marine environment. We should check all passenger ferries to see how much garbage they take to sea, in order to ensure that all of it is returned to shore for proper disposal. Garbage that is disposed of at sea will simply end up drifting back onto our beaches, making them a mess.

> Tour operators need to take more responsibility in this regard. Phuket's greatest asset is its fine beaches, and tour operators are only killing themselves if steps are not taken to ensure that beaches are kept clean.

> I give each locality freedom in how they maintain clean beaches, but this is one matter that needs to be addressed with the utmost seriousness.

What happens when you run out of blood

lood. We all have it and we all need it, and sometimes we need more of it than we have. Accidents, major operations and other medical conditions can necessitate a blood transfusion.

Reserves are low in most countries, particularly if you have a rare blood group. Thailand, and Phuket, are no exceptions.

The first known transfusion of blood was performed as early as 1667 when Jean-Baptiste Denis transfused two pints of blood from a sheep to a young man. He died, as did many others from these experiments.

When blood is mixed between two human individuals (let alone from a sheep), it can lead to agglutination or clumping. Blood forms clumps, it doesn't flow properly, causing blockages.

Fortunately, in 1909, an Austrian, Karl Landsteiner discovered that people fall into different blood groups. Blood transfusions became much safer and in 1930, he received a Nobel Prize for his earlier discovery. Itonically, Professor Landsteiner died in 1943 of a blood clot.

On Phuket, the Thai Red Cross Society and Wachira Hospital perform blood collection, screening and distribution.



Blood supplies are also stored at each of the major hospitals. The blood bank at Wachira Hospital is staffed by paid and volunteer staff who also run the Phuket Blood Donor Club, an active group of volunteers who meet each month.

Blood can be donated at the blood bank, but there is also a mobile blood collection unit that goes into the community to collect blood from school or hotel staff, or those of other organiza-

Approximately 30% of blood on Phuket is donated from



the mobile blood collection unit. Around 1,000 donors donate blood each month, of which just 10 are foreigners.

Phuket's blood bank is very safe as it adheres to international standards and procedures for screening. Before donating blood, all potential donors must complete a screening questionnaire to eliminate candidates whose blood may not be suitable.

Once donated, all blood is screened for HIV, hepatitis and syphilis, with external quality control maintained by Siriraj Hospital in Bangkok.

So how do we determine which blood type is compatible for us? We all have these little marker things called antigens on the surface of our red blood cells and we all have different ones, except for identical twins.

Within our blood plasma, we also have antibodies. Individuals have different types and combinations of these molecules and your blood group depends on these combinations and, essentially, what you inherited from vour parents.

Because some blood groups are not compatible with others, we use the ABO and Rh classification system to identify donors and recipients, ensuring that a transfusion is successful.

This is done by taking a

sample of your blood and analyzing it in a laboratory. Under the ABO blood typing system, there are four different blood types. A, B, AB or O.

Each of us will fit into one of these four types. Next we look at the Rh factor. If you have it, you are Rh positive. If you do not have it, you are Rh negative.

Thus there are eight possible blood grouping systems, one of which will fit you. A negative or A positive. B negative or B positive and so on.

About 16 % of Westerners are Rh negative but only 0.3% of Thais are. This leaves a shortfall in the amount of Rh negative blood available for transfusions, particularly to the foreign com-

With only 10 foreign donors giving blood each month, and a growing population, this further reduces the availability of Rh negative blood.

Your blood, particularly if it is Rh negative, is urgently needed; the life you save may be your own. Please contact me for details on how to donate blood.

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Putting the fizz into Phuket

PHUKET: Dry Blackthorn cider, one of the most popular alcoholic ciders in the UK, has been launched in Phuket, nearly a year after its Thai debut, in Pattaya.

Apple Honey Co Ltd, the sole Thai distributor for the apple-based drink, made by Matthew Clark Brands Ltd in Bristol, made the soft launch in Phuket in the middle of last month.

Managing Director Selina Lovett explained, "Blackthorn is one of the biggest cider brands in the UK, holding 5%-10% of the total alcoholic beverage market. It's a traditional dry cider with 6% alcohol.

"We already import cider to Pattaya, where our main office has been set up since June last year. We also distribute to Koh Samui, Koh Lanta in Krabi, and Koh Chang," she said. "Now we also want to distribute to Phuket, where we have set up our second office."

Mrs Lovett said that Blackthorn's popularity in the UK makes the brand easily recognizable for tourists and foreign residents in Thailand, the main market, and offers a refreshing alternative to beer and wine.

The introduction of Black-thorn was well-received in Patta-ya, where 105,600 cans were sold from June last year to January, she said. She expects much the same reaction in Phuket. "There are about 60 bars in Phuket that have bought Blackthorn, and that number grows every week," she said, adding that by next high season she expects that number to at least triple.

Although the primary market is initially bars, next to be targeted are restaurants and the major hotels on the island. Look-

ing further down the road, Mrs Lovett said that Apple Honey is also considering making Blackthorn available at major supermarkets on Phuket.

Depending on the location and the clientèle of each outlet, each 440-milliliter can is expected to sell at prices varying from 130 baht and 200 baht.

"Our target is to sell as much as we can this year, but it will take time to gain customers as we have just begun the company," she said.

Mrs Lovett declined to reveal the amount invested in importing the cider, but said, "It's a large investment. We are doing well but we haven't taken any of the profits yet. It's our first year and we are reinvesting any profit in the company."

Scary times ahead for bond-holders

urrency markets be came strongly pro-US dollar after Alan Greenspan, Chairman of the US Federal Reserve (the central bank) gave testimony to Congress in late April.

Nothing that he said was Earth-shattering, but he did point out that the Fed's fear of deflation in the US economy had receded and that, at present, inflationary pressures were benign.

He also noted that the US economy was recovering and that employment statistics were improving.

The last thing that the Fed wishes to do is panic markets. Mr Greenspan's statements were designed to let everyone know that if the data on the US economy continues to be positive, interest rates will rise – but slowly and gradually

The Fed is concerned (without actually saying so) that bond markets will go into panic mode, as they did in 1994.

It is not just a matter of the Fed having to soothe US bond markets. Global bond markets, especially emerging country bond markets, anxiously watch every pronouncement from the Fed and every bit of US economic data that is released.

History shows that on February 24, 1994, there was a world bond market crash.

Everyone has heard of stockmarket crashes; they make headlines. But most of the media – the tabloids in particular – know that if they were to publish headlines stating "Bond markets crash," at least 95% of their readers wouldn't have a clue what the newspaper was on about. (Some would think it had something to do with Agent 007).

Bonds – fixed-interest in-

struments varying in validity from three months to 30 years – have certain economic allies and certain economic enemies.

Their allies are low inflation, deflation, low or negative economic growth and falling short-term interest rates.

If an investor, for example, has bought a 10-year bond yielding a fixed 5% a year, and economic conditions deteriorate so that any new buyer of a similar 10-year bond can earn, say, only 3%, obviously the original investor is sitting pretty in comparison.

An example: US\$100 invested at 5% interest returns

US\$5. But if the rate changes to 3%, it takes an investment of almost US\$167 to achieve the same US\$5 return

The bond that yields 5% is therefore seen as more desirable and thus more valuable than the 3% bond.

The end result is that the original investor can continue to enjoy a better-than-present market income on a guaranteed basis until the investment matures, or can sell the bond for a substantial capital gain.

The reverse is also true. If interest rates on a 10-year bond rise, the original holder of the bond will make a capital loss if he sells the bond. If he does not, he will have to endure belowmarket interest rates.

World bond markets are huge, with a capitalization many times that of stockmarkets. Prob-

ably all members of every pension fund – and almost all insurance policy holders in the world – are investors in bonds, though whether they are aware of this is a different matter.

Alan Greenspan is walking on eggshells with respect to the bond market. If the US economic improvement continues, short-term interest rates will have to rise – and it is the function of a central bank to set the level of short-term interest rates.

The situation is so delicate that if Alan Greenspan broke his normal quietly-worded approach and bluntly said something to the effect of, "Economic growth is

robust and we will have to act to nip inflation in the bud. So interest rates will need to rise this year," the bond market would experience something akin to a heart attack.

In 1994, even though he employed his customary diplomacy, that is what happened. Bond markets were spooked by strong economic growth and rising short-term interest maters.

There was a global sell-off, the effects of which were felt far from America's borders. Indonesia, Hong Kong and even Thailand all felt the sudden chill.

The crash came on February 24, 1994, and it turned into a rolling crash. Investors often believe that when bond markets crash, stockmarkets boom, and vice versa. Sometimes this is true, but not always.

1994 was a good example. The fear in emerging market bond markets spread to stockmarkets. By February 1994, the Thai stockmarket had reached its all-time high as measured by the Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) index, at slightly over 1700. February 24 changed that

and by the time the Asian financial crisis hit Thailand in July 1997, the SET index had fallen back to 1400.

Those with long memories will recall the Mexican economic collapse of December, 1994. Its origins too can be found in the bond market crash that started on February 24 that year.

The biggest danger to investors in bonds, especially medium- to long-dated bonds in emerging markets, is at this stage of the economic cycle. All participants have an element of risk. Fasten your seatbelts.

How to calculate tide highs and lows

couple of readers have asked about tides on Phuket. Basically, tides are due to the gravitational pull of the Moon and Sun. The lunar gravitational effect is about twice that of the Sun and creates high water bulges on opposites sides of the

As the Earth rotates every 24 hours, most places on the Earth's surface will therefore have two high and two low tides each day. These will be approximately six hours apart but because the Moon rotates around the earth in 24.83 hours, they come around 50 minutes later each day.

Tide tables covering Krabi and Phang Nga are available from the Hydrographic Department offices in Bangkok, but often local sailors use the Phuket tide tables published in the Gazette Guide and in the Gazette Online (at www.phuketgazette. net/tides/index.htm).

You will see the times of highs and lows in the tables as

well as the tide range, which is the difference between the height of high water and the low water before or after it.

The depths of the tide are measured above the Chart Datum. This is, broadly, an imaginary plane

placed over the bottom of the sea at a height that clears obstructions at the lowest of low waters.

Theoretically, you should always have at least the depth indicated on the chart, plus the relevant tide height at any place.

Check, too, to see when your chart was produced. In areas of sand or mud banks, like Phang Nga Bay, you will find these often move a bit.

Tide heights and tidal streams, the movement of water (current) due to the tide's rise and fall, can be estimated on the rule of twelfths for each hour of tide:

	Change	Cumulative
1st hour	1/12	1/12
2nd hour	2/12	3/12
3rd hour	3/12	6/12
4th hour	3/12	9/12
5th hour	2/12	11/12
6th hour	1/12	12/12

From this you will see that the tide will rise the most and the current will be strongest in the third and fourth hours of each

Remember that entrances to bays and inlets can cause water to bank up, with marked local ef-

A handy way of estimating the state of tide is to keep an eye on the shore for drying.

If you see wet sand or rocks, the tide should be falling and con-

> versely, if they are dry, you can reckon the tide is rising.

> Tidal stream direction and speed can be estimated by observing the current flow past fixed objects such as buoys or pot markers.

With practice, you'll find these estimations become quite accurate.

This is extremely important here because tide streams of more than 1.5 knots are frequent and, when applied to the vector of a yacht doing 5 knots, the difference between course steered and course over ground can be quite

B38m upgrade for stadium approved

PHUKET CITY: The race is on to repair Surakul Stadium in time for a key inspection in June by officials from Fifa, international soccer's ruling body, who will decide whether Phuket's most important sporting event yet will go ahead.

Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura told the Gazette on April 29 that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra has approved the budget of 38 million baht required to complete the project.

But many improvements need to be made in a very short time if Phuket is to stage matches in the Women's Under-19 World Cup in November. Work is expected to start just as soon as final contracts are signed.

The governor said that the improvements included new seating (the stadium currently has bare concrete terraces), new lighting and spotlights, a better sound system, an electronic scoreboard, a media center and

facilities for live telecasts around the world. The pitch will also have to be relaid.

he RAV4 has been around for a while, and Toyota's little SUV remains one of the most user-friendly and comfortable in its class. It is also now available for the first time with a high pressure, common-rail diesel motor, in addition to the existing gasoline models.

A common-rail diesel is rather like a gasoline injection engine, in that the common rail is maintained at a constant high pressure, with each injector operated electronically by a central processor.

Until recently, diesel engines relied on relatively simple technology, with a low-pressure mechanical injector delivering fuel to a pre-combustion chamber in the cylinder head. While it was quite fuel-efficient, it lacked precision and refinement, generating noise and vibration.

The Toyota common rail system and its computer technology deliver precisely the right amount of fuel at exactly the right time, direct into the center of the combustion chamber. The control this system offers provides greater engine flexibility and improved fuel consumption, not to mention less typical diesel

The two-liter turbodiesel in

the RAV4 develops a modest 116bhp (85kW) at 4,000 rpm, but the torque output is far more impressive with 250 Nm available across a rev range of 1,800 to 3,000rpm.

Mated to a full-time 4WD with

a five-speed manual gearbox, the little SUV is equally at home onor off-road. On-road, the diesel RAV4 is a little sluggish, with the 0-100 kmh time a leisurely 12.1 seconds, while top speed is quoted as 170 kmh. Not exactly a road-burner but a solid, reliable

Toyota introduced the RAV4 in 1994, labeling it as the

"first SUV that offers GTi handling and performance". True enough, it was an off-roader that was more like a sporting hatchback. It rapidly found many followers and even with this new version, more than 30,000 RAV-4s have been sold in Europe in

the first 12 months.

As well as the diesel motor, it is available with a 1.8-liter gasoline engine and two-wheel drive, or a two-liter gas motor and four-wheel drive.

The appeal of the RAV4 is that it is roomy, great fun to drive and offers reasonable performance. Available in either threeor five-door body styles, it also has options to fully customize the interior and the exterior.

Power windows are standard on the five-door, but optional on the smaller car, while a sunroof is optional on both. Power steering is standard, and with the five-door you get luggage compartment illumination.

To change the appearance of either car, color-keyed bumpers can be added.

So can roof rails and a moulded spare wheel cover for the rear. If anything, the threedoor looks better balanced, with the larger five-door appearing over-bodied.

Standard safety features include ABS and EBD (electronic brake-force distribution). The three-door RAV4 has to settle for drum rear brakes; the five-door has discs all round.

Front airbags are standard on both models, with side impact bars in the doors.

Front seat belts are equipped with pre-tensioners and force-limiters, while in the rear, three-point belts are fitted for all occupants, although in the smaller car the centre seat only features

Now that Toyota is offering three different motors and two body styles, expect the vehicle to become even more successful at in Japan and abroad.

Toyota recently moved into the No 2 slot in terms of global auto makers, displacing Ford for the first time.

In Japan, it has nearly one third of the domestic market and it is strongly represented in many other Asian countries.

With the aid of its ambitious Formula One project, based in Germany and with drivers Olivier Panis of France and Cristiano da Matta of Brazil, you can be sure the Japanese giant will not rest until it becomes the undisputed world number one. Look out, GM.

Why do wine prices keep going up?

Q: Food prices seem to be going down but wine keeps getting more expensive. Can you shed some light on this?

A: Yes, wine is becoming more expensive in Thailand. The Thai government is making a concerted effort to collect maximum tax on imported wine, tobacco and auto parts.

It also wants to support Thai fruit and vegetable "wine" by making imported wine more expensive. At the same time, cheap produce from China is flooding into Thailand and driving prices downward.

I find this ironic because most imported wine is bought by foreigners while most of the food is bought (and produced) by Thais.

The most likely outcome is that less tax will be collected from wine as fewer people buy it because of its higher cost. Thai farmers will be left out because they lack the capital and specialized skills needed to produce wine commercially.


So, expect imported quality wine to continue being in short supply and more expensive here than in other Asian nations with lower tax rates.

Q: A visiting friend brought a bottle of Chilean wine made from a grape called "Carmenère" and the wine was fantastic, but I cannot find out anything about this grape. What can you tell me?

A: Carmenère was once common in Bordeaux but is now found almost exclusively in Chile. According to Chilean winemaker friends, carmenère was brought to Chile sometime in the mid-19th century.

Recently, DNA testing has revealed that much of what was thought to be merlot in Chile is actually carmenère. A handful of bright winemakers have begun labeling their merlot wines by the correct name carmenère, one of which you have just discovered.

I remember carmenère

distinguishable from merlot except that the berries are a little larger. The wine's taste is similar to merlot, but not as herbal. Carmenère wine often has a supple texture and is well balanced. In Thailand you can find a good example from Baron Philippe Rothschild, a carmenère sourced from the Rapel Valley near Santiago.

One of my former professors at the University of California Davis, Dr Carole Meredith, recently discovered that some cabernet franc in California is actually carmenère. So, who knows, one day we may also enjoy great carmenère from California.

Q: What is the purpose of that dent in the bottom of most wine bottles?

A: When glass was first used to create wine bottles it was not strong enough to contain Champagne's high pressure. English glassblowers discovered that putting an indentation, called a "punt" at the bottom of the bottle somehow helped make them stronger, and punts soon became the norm on all wine bottles.

Advances in glassmaking have long since made the punt unnecessary but it lives on as a matter of custom.

huket's vibrant restaurant scene has grown beyond the time when the discerning diner had to venture into a five-star resort to find a meal of international character and flavor.

I would even say that in my 10 years of reviewing restaurants on Phuket, menu standards and levels of service at many of the island's better resort restaurants have declined.

Even though there is now a broader selection of food, there has also been a constant turnover of executive chefs and F&B managers who repeatedly change menus, creating confusion for the Thai chefs who constantly have to learn new recipes and styles of presentation. This makes for an inconsistent experience for the guests.

Fortunately, there have also been some imaginative and creative Thai chefs and managers, well trained in international restaurants, who have opened their own dining establishments in the past few years. This is where to find the excitement in dining out on the island.

The latest is Carmen at Surin Beach, near the entrance to the Amanpuri and Chedi resorts.

Carmen, named for the opera by Bizet, has been adopted by the Surin villa jet-set as one of their new places to play. Carmen is like a traditional Italian trattoria, offering a substantial menu of popular Mediterranean foods in a relaxed, informal setting,

decorated with warm earth tones and soft lighting.

Supaireen "Gift" Jitsunoh operated the wellknown and popular restaurant, Po-

modoro, on Sukhumvit Rd in Bangkok before deciding to open her own restaurant in Phuket.

"I have brought my most popular menu from Pomodoro, based on guest comments over the years," she says. "Plus I was able to hire one of the best chefs of Italian cuisine, who was also eager to move out of the city to the beauty of Phuket."

The chef, Prayoon Kleangmee, learned his culinary skills in the kitchens at Caffe di Roma, Matteo, DaLino and Bite, all restaurants popular with Bangkok's more sophisticated diners.

thick cheese crust. I want to try them both but we have to move on to a salad course and I want the traditional Caesar, which is served on a large, broad plate.

"The success of a Caesar salad is in the dressing," he tells me, but I find his fresh lettuce and crispy bacon a nice addition.

At Carmen, Chef Prayoon offers guests a choice of fresh spaghetti, penne, fettuccine, fusilli or farfalle to join with one of his nine sauces, which include all'aglio, olio e peperoncino, spicy dried sausage with garlic,


mussels, clams and calamari in a rich, spicy tomato sauce.

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


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


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know. I'm a little odd. The subject of *The Two Ronnies* came up the other day. For anyone who didn't spend his youth watching too much TV in the '70s, The Two Ronnies was a British comedy series, and it was simply superb.

Everyone has a favorite sketch, but mine is definitely Four Candles. "Four candles, please," says one Ronnie. He's duly given four candles, to which the response is "No, fawk 'andles - 'andles for forks!"

This has to be the most tenuous link to a gardening column in the history of the Gazette, but the golden candle plant is worth it. Otherwise known as the golden shrimp plant, lollipop plant, or lue-ang-khriirii-pun in Thai, it adds a spectacular splash of bright yellow wherever it sits in your garden.

Originally from Peru, it's one of those plants that almost looks too good to be true. Instead of the more traditional green leaves with the odd flower here and there, the golden plant takes the idea of color one step further. It cheats.

It does have the traditional leaf set-up that it shares with many members of the plant kingdom - large, deep green oval leaves with prominent veins – but they're not all green.

Some of them modify themselves to form bright yellow bracts (like the red leaves of the poinsettia, or the colored parts of a bougainvillea) that mimic the appearance of flowers.

They look like candles from

a distance. They almost hide the true flowers, which contain all the mechanisms for fertilization of the plant.

The flowers look like tiny white shrimp, which is where it gets one of its alternative names. The flowers last only a few days, but the yellow bracts can linger on for several weeks, resulting in a continuous display of these impressive vertical candelabras.

Lets face it, fertilization by insect and bird pollinators is the main reason flowers exist, so why shouldn't they cheat and have some of the leaves help them along in this regard?

Golden shrimp plants are perfect for pots on patios and look wonderful in borders for a sweeping splash of yellow. Put them against a dark background and they'll really stand out.

The plant can grow up to about six feet, but to reach that height and still look as if someone cares, it'll need regular, sensible pruning. Prune it by about half a couple of times a year. It may look a bit brutalized at first, but it will bounce back.

These things are sun worshippers, but don't get into the same state as their human counterparts who visit Phuket with the same intention. While the tour-


The golden shrimp's leaves become greener, and the "four candles" you have when you originally bring the plant home from the garden center will quickly multiply. Lots of sun, high humidity and a fair amount of water are all the plant demands. It could have been invented for Phuket.

Another bonus of the golden shrimp plant is how ridiculously easy it is to propagate it. Just cut an eight-to-10-inch stem and strip the lower set of leaves.

Put it in moist potting soil or sand, keeping one to two sets of leaves above the soil line. Place it in the shade initially and it should root really easily, at which time it can be planted outside to enjoy the sun.

The Two Ronnies, Messrs Corbett and Barker, have probably never been to Phuket. They probably never considered the link between gardening implements and a rather impressive tropical flower. But I'd like to think they did.
