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ICEC focus on Koh Maphrao

PHUKET: Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has suggested Koh Maphrao as an alternative location for the proposed Phuket International Convention and Exhibition Center (ICEC), as a way to break a stalemate between the government in Bangkok and local people over where the mega-project should be sited.

Speaking with the *Gazette* at his office, Gov Udomsak said that the island, located about a kilometer off Phuket's east coast and part of Tambon Koh Kaew, would be an appropriate site because most of its 3.2-square-kilometer area is government land.

The Governor said a bridge could be built to provide access to the island. This would afford impressive views from the ICEC. The island might also be suitable for marina development in the future, he added.

"I think a budget of not more than 3 billion baht to build the ICEC at Koh Maphrao would be appropriate. A bridge to the island could be built for about 500 million baht," he said.

The island is inhabited mainly by Muslim villagers and remains largely undeveloped. It was not among the four "final" sites that were put to a public vote in February, 2003.

At that meeting of 262 government officials, leaders of business organizations and members of the public, 226 people voted for a site at Tah Chat Chai in Thalang district. The site at Saphan Hin, favored by the government, received just 19 votes, while a third site, next to Ao Makham, got 17 votes.

Last October, however, the Government seemed poised to go ahead with building the ICEC at Saphan Hin, following a meeting between Deputy Prime Minister Somkid Jatusripitak, Tourism Authority of Thailand Governor Juthamas Siriwan, Gov Udomsak and Dr Prasit Koeysiripong, then President of the Phuket Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*).

The island's political landscape has changed since then, however, with the Democrat Party having taken control of the *OrBor Ior*

Gov Udomsak, who admitted that the project seems to have fallen into a policy limbo, proposed Koh Maphrao as a way to break the deadlock.

"Koh Maphrao would be a good place because it would not involve land reclamation and associated environmental problems. This is just my opinion, but I will present it to the parties involved if we cannot build the ICEC at Saphan Hin," he said.

Entertainment venues still waiting on license fees

PHUKET CITY: Wisut Romin, Deputy Secretary of the Phuket Provincial Administration Office (PPAO), told the *Gazette* on May 14 that he is still waiting for the Ministry of Interior to set the fees for entertainment licenses, despite 50% of renewals having already been granted.

More than 170 licensees in Phuket are waiting to see just how much they will have to pay.

Speculation is rife that licenses – valid from May 12 to December 31 – may cost as much as 50,000 baht apiece.

Entertainment venues fall into six main categories and some venues have had to apply for two or more licenses.

A March 12 deadline was originally set for license renewals but, said K. Wisut, officials have continued to push applications through because of confusion in the entertainment industry over which license, or licenses, to apply for.

He also cited incomplete and erroneous documentation from applicants as another cause of delays.

Meanwhile, a complete moratorium on the granting of new licenses has been imposed in Phuket until the backlog of renewals has been processed.

Some 200 new applicants have little option but to wait an indefinite period for a decision on whether they will get licensed. K. Wisut said that most of these applications have come from Kathu district, which includes Patong.

"As to cost, people should not worry. I don't think that a license will cost more than 50,000 baht," said K. Wisut, adding that he expects the fee to be more like 10,000 or 20,000 baht.

Something Fishy is Happening in Phuket.

Divers retrieve 300m fishing net from reef

PHANG NGA BAY: Phuket Marine Biology Center (PMBC) officers and volunteers from local dive companies worked together on May 14 to retrieve a 300-meter-long fishing net that had become entangled on coral just off Koh Hang.

The net was discovered by a PMBC officer on a regular dive to inspect the condition of the coral. A length of about 10 meters was found entangled with the reef.

Marine biologist Niphon Phongsuwan told the *Gazette* that the net was probably thrown overboard by fishermen, causing damage to coral and endangering sea life in the area.

"It takes five to 10 years to restore areas like this that have good water, but 20-30 years to restore areas in water that is not so clean," he said.

Meanwhile, experts at the PMBC at Cape Panwa have rated the chances of survival of a dugong found injured and stranded at the edge of Klong Pa Khlok on March 5 as high as 80%.

PMBC biologist Kongkiat Kittiwattawong, speaking to the *Gazette* on May 17, said that the young dugong will probably need to spend another 12 months at the

center before she fully recovers. "We must be certain that she will be able to eat without assistance before we release her," he said.

"Her injuries, particularly a large gash on her mouth, are healing very well, although she is still on antibiotic medication. Her weight has increased to 29 kilograms, which is a good sign."

K. Kongkiat speculated that the infant dugong had become separated from her mother before being dashed on rocks and then stranded.

Training offered to foreign tour guides

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has authorized the use of 1.5 million baht from provincial coffers to give 100 hours of foreign-language instruction to tour guides in Phuket.

Foreign nationals are barred from being tour guides because it is a "reserved occupation" for Thais only, but guides adept in Russian, Swedish, Korean, Chinese and German are in short supply.

This has resulted in foreign guides working in Phuket – ostensibly as "interpreters" with Thai "sitting guides" given the task of deflecting uncomfortable questions from police or Immigration officers as to the role of the so-called interpreter.

However, at least one Korean tour guide has been arrested and sources suggest that corruption – as well as illegality – is rife throughout the industry.

Panomphol Thummachartniyom, the President of Phuket Professional Guide Association (PPGA), told the *Gazette* that there are 33 Thai guides in Phuket sufficiently fluent in Korean to serve the market, but that this figure is not enough. The aim of the language course is to produce 200 Korean-speaking Thai guides

However, K. Panomphol was not impressed with this new opportunity for Thai guides. Indeed, he dismissed the Korean market out of hand.

"Korean tourists don't have much effect on the Thai economy because they visit only Koreanowned businesses when they're on holiday here," he said.

Training will take place at a new facility – the Phuket International Language Institute – within the Prince of Songkhla University Phuket Campus, and is due to start next month.

Employment fair to offer 2,000 jobs

PHUKET CITY: About 2,000 jobs will be up for grabs at a mass job fair at the Rajabhat Institute Phuket on May 27 and 28.

The fair, organized by the Phuket Provincial Employment Service Office (ESO), will be open from 9 am to 3 pm.

Penchan Boonhok, an officer at the ESO, told the *Gazette* that many employers will be taking part, including companies setting up at Central Phuket Festival shopping complex and Makro, as well as hotels, shops and private companies from Phuket and other provinces.

She added that applicants may even be offered jobs on the spot as most employers taking part will be conducting interviews at the fair.

Confusion over visas on arrival

BANGKOK: Pol Col Chalermpong Vadhanasukha, the Deputy Superintendent of Immigration Division 3, has verified that foreigners may receive more than three consecutive tourist visas on arrival.

Col Chalermpong clarified the issue after it was raised by a *Gazette* reader who was concerned that such a regulation was about to be enforced. The reader said that he had learned of the regulation through a Thai Immigration Office website.

The reader said he understood that the regulation officially came into effect in 1997 but had seldom been used. It stipulated, he said, that foreigners could not be issued more than three consecutive tourist visas on arrival, and that after the third visa expired, the foreigner had to leave Thailand and would not be allowed to return for 180 days.

Col Chalermpong said, "I have never heard of this regulation. There were no changes to

immigration law or regulations in that year [1997]."

However, Col Chalermpong explained that under a rule issued in 1999, people applying for visas on arrival should expect close scrutiny.

"Real tourists are welcome anytime, but immigration officers will usually consider foreigners holding many consecutive tourist [60-day stay] or transit [30-day stay] visas gained on arrival as suspicious."

He explained that people applying for tourist visas on arrival must prove that they have at least 20,000 baht per person, or 40,000 baht per family, as spending money – each time they enter Thailand.

People applying for transit visas must prove that they have 10,000 baht per person or 20,000 baht per family. "That has been a Ministry of Interior regulation since 1999," he said.

Col Chalermpong criticized "unofficial" websites for answering foreigners' questions with unreliable information. "For ex-

ample, www.thaiimmigration. com, posted by the Nongkhai Provincial Immigration Office, did not answer the foreigner's question with the facts, but instead with misleading information and humor," he said.

"The Immigration Division 3 website [at www.imm3.police. go.th] is the official website where foreigners can find out information and post questions about immigration," he added.

Oddly, there is a link from it to the thaiimmigration.com website, which is registered to Pol Col Sorrapol Payoongveeranoi, Superintendent of Nong Khai Immigration, where the moderator posted a backgrounder on the current confusion:

"Nong Khai Immigration [has] got two different sets of instructions from Headquarters in Bangkok on how the new financial rules are to be executed/interpreted.

"That has given us a kind of delicate situation ... So to keep it simple, let's just say they are both right."

Let them eat seaweed

PHUKET: Patong Municipality isn't sitting idly by as unprecedented amounts of Ulva Reticulata seaweed continue to wash up along its shore.

The municipality is pursuing a two-pronged strategy of collecting the bright-green algae and researching ways to put it to good use, including, possibly, promoting it as food.

The seaweed is the result of hot-season water temperatures and the introduction of nitrogen and phosphorus into Patong Bay from Klong Pakbang, which empties into the bay at the south end of Patong Beach.

The municipality continues to collect the seaweed using boats and nets, as well as by stuffing into plastic bags any seaweed that washes ashore.

Namphet Chatpunyanon, Director of Patong Municipality Environmental Health Office, told the Gazette that the marine algae played an important role in "fixing" both nitrogen and phosphorus, two main constituents of human waste. She expects the algae growth to decrease with the annual reversal of prevailing monsoon winds, which is now

K. Namphet said that because the municipality's wastewater treatment plant was incapable of treating all the wastes generated during the high season, research into the effective use of the algae should be conducted.

K. Namphet said that *Ulva* Reticulata could be an effective fertilizer and does not cause irritation when it comes into contact with human skin.

She said that Prof Karnjapart Liewmanoolong of Kasetsart University, who visited Patong recently, told her the seaweed was also safe to eat.

When asked how tourists has responded to the presence of the algae, she admitted that there had been complaints. But sensing that a change in public perception about the algae was needed, she told the Gazette, "Maybe we'll hold a seaweedeating festival next year."

Gov gets tough on jet-ski ban plan

PHUKET: Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura on May 17 reaffirmed his stand on ridding the island of jet-skis by March 1, 2011, and said that any person who rents out a jet-ski after that time will be pros-

Gov Udomsak said that under the plan, all existing jetski registrations will expire within seven years and no new ones will be issued.

"If [anyone] doesn't believe it and continues to rent out jet-skis [after March 1, 2011] they will see. If there is a fatality, they will be held accountable and prosecuted," said the 59-year-old Governor, who will retire from the public service next year.

"There are 219 jet-skis registered in Phuket, but these will be phased out over seven years. Their owners will need to find new occupations. There are many jobs available for them in Phuket's tourism industry, so there is no reason for them to rely solely on jet-ski rental," he said.

The plan to establish Phuket as a "jet-ski-free" province follows the deaths of two European tourists late last year, one of them a 13-year-old boy.

of the Phuket Marine Office, told the *Gazette* that jet-skis operators are now restricted to five beaches: Patong, Kamala, Kata, Karon and Bang Tao.

He added that the coastline along Patong Bay has been divided into five zones according

- swimming pens with beach access channels for water craft;
- water sports;
- pick-up/drop-off points seagoing tourists;
- small vessel anchorage;
- large vessel anchorage.

The zones will be strictly enforced during the November-April high season, he said.

Other beaches will maintain the current system whereby jet-skis will continue to enjoy the run of the entire beach, apart from where pens have been designated for swimming.

K. Kritpetch added that many jet-ski operators remain unaware of the long-term damage to the country's reputation their industry has caused.

"Marine Police and Royal Thai Police officers, together with district officials, are working together to inform members of Phuket Jet-ski Club of the regulations. We are warning them that any violators will be arrested," he said.

Resort worker washes ashore Kalim Beach

KALIM: The body of Patong Resort restaurant steward Worawut Pholboon, 27, from Srisaket, was found washed ashore at Kalim Beach at about 5 am on May 12. K. Worawut had disappeared under a large wave at Patong Beach the preceding afternoon.

K. Worawut's cousin, Boonchai Boonwan, speaking to the Gazette on the day the body was discovered said, "Phuket Marine Police officers called me at about 5:30 am and told me that K. Worawut's body had been found. I hurried there and took the body to Patong Hospital."

K. Boonchai and friends had maintained a constant vigil throughout the night at Patong Beach since K. Worawut disappeared in rough surf late in the afternoon of May 11, in the hope that his body would be recovered so that it could be cremated in K. Worawut's home province.

However, the condition of the body made that wish impractical. K. Boonchai said. "I will contact a temple in Phuket where the body can be cremated." K. Worawut's parents arrived later that day.

TOT expansion halved by ICT Ministry

PHUKET: The Phuket office of the Telephone Organization of Thailand (TOT) will not get the 100-million-baht budget it needs to carry out its planned network expansion. Instead it will be lucky if it gets about half that amount, the head of the TOT in Phuket told the *Gazette* on May

Late last year Phuket's TOT office requested the budget to increase the number of telephone exchanges on the island from 12 to 37 and to add 19,530 new telephone lines.

But TOT Phuket Chief Pairoj Somsri said that a recent meeting with ICT Ministry officials in Bangkok had been fruitless, and he now expects to get less than half of the requested amount.

The discussions with representatives from the three ICT provinces [the other two are Khon Kaen and Chiang Mai] on May 13 failed to reach a conclu-

"Still, I remain optimistic that we will get 38.8 million baht in 2004 funding to install 19 tele-

phone new exchanges and 8,100 telephone numbers," he said.

He declined to say which parts of the island would get the new exchanges if the funding comes though, for fear of TOT Phuket office losing its local competitive advantage.

Hand over the cash ... or I'll squirt!

BANGKOK: A Swiss man who had his wallet stolen in the City of Angels turned to crime, arming himself with a water pistol and robbing a mini-mart in a desperate attempt to get enough cash to pay for his hotel room.

Police from Tungmahamek Police Station arrested 32-year-old Thomas Asbarcher at noon on May 2. The Swiss man had brandished a water pistol at the Family Mart on Narathiwat Rd, about two kilometers from his room at the Malaysia Hotel on Soi Ngam

The cashier, who must have been horror-stricken at the thought of being squirted with water so long after Songkran, gave in to the man's request and handed over all the cash in the till – all 2,460 baht

But after running off with the loot, Asbarcher was pursued by the hero of this tale, 25-year-old Family Mart employee Vichian Moo-In, of Uttaradit province.

Seeing the farang on the run, a taxi driver and several other passers-by joined in the chase. They eventually caught up with the foreign thief, wrestled the bag containing the money and squirt gun from him, and held him until the police arrived.

While the Swiss pondered his fate at the hands of the Thai legal system, at least he didn't have to worry about how he would pay for that night's accommodation. Jail cells are still free-of-charge in Thailand, even for foreigners.

Crap-puccino, anyone?

THAILAND: Name any addictive drug and you will find users seeking ever-more efficient ways of getting it into their bloodstreams. The latest case is caffeine, the state-sanctioned stimulant found in coffee.

Under the guise of "alternative medicine", caffeine junkies are now taking coffee enemas. They claim that a good dose of java administered directly into the colon can have a detoxifying effect on the liver, to which it is connected through the hemorrhoidal and portal veins.

Once the caffeine hits, bile ducts dilate and expel toxins into the gastrointestinal tract and out of the bug-eyed recipient's system - or so they say.

But detoxification can become a double-edged sword, causing health problems and putting whatever segment of the population that does not already

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have a caffeine habit at risk of picking one up, says one doctor.

Dr Banchob Chunhasawadikul warned that some people enter caffeine detox programs believing they will lose weight. Such people should instead cut down on the amount of junk food they consume, he said.

Dr Banchob also urged patients to avoid reusing disposable enema bags, which could become contaminated with fungi and cause disease.

Coffee enema treatments, if repeated too often, can also cause caffeine addiction leading to insomnia, nervousness and an irregular heartbeat, he said.

It was not reported if Thai energy drinks, which also contain high levels of caffeine, were also becoming popular for colon irrigation procedures.

he product of four years of meetings, negotiations, planning, heated debate and even relocation before its construction was complete, Phuket's first dog pound is expected to open early next month.

The Phuket provincial government first considered the idea after public outcry over the culling of 12 stray dogs at Wat Wichit Sangkharam in July 2000, and a request by monks at Wat Langsarn to "remove" strays from their temple, which also resulted in dogs being put to sleep on temple grounds.

The pound, called Baan Pak Sunak Phuket (Phuket Dog Home), is expected to provide shelter for up to 2,000 of Phuket's stray dogs, which some people have estimated number up to 13,000.

Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) Chief Sunart Wongchawalit explained to the Gazette that the four-rai site comprises a two-rai open-air pen for dogs, with the other two rai occupied by an office, simple accommodation and a veterinary treatment room.

"We will hire four staff, who will live on-site, to watch over and feed the dogs, and a PPLO vet will visit every day and spend a night at the pound," K. Sunart said.

He expects the shelter to reach its 2,000-dog capacity within just two months of opening. "On arrival, dogs will be kept separate from the main group until they become familiar with their new home, and vicious and sick dogs will be kept separate from other dogs at all times," he

"All dogs will be sterilized, given anti-rabies vaccine and be under supervision. Sterilization will help ensure that overcrowding is controlled."

Despite the PPLO's good intentions, however, the shelter has come under fire from several dog help organizations on Phu-

huket's stray dogs have long posed problems on the island so, in response, the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) has built a pound costing 2.8 million baht that is expected to become home to about 2,000 strays.

Yet the two-rai enclosure at Suanpa Bang Kanoon, in Thalang, has sparked controversy over whether the strays will receive proper treatment, as well as a range of other concerns.

is making a big mistake. The plan they currently have is wrong and might cause more suffering to the dogs.

"People will start dumping their dogs and the dogs will fight each other. This will be a huge disaster."

Explaining the need to keep dogs segregated into groups, she said, "Sterilized dogs are a little

less aggressive, but the hierarchy system is still in play. The fighting will continue, with the strongest dogs threatening the weaker ones."

She also pointed out that wounds from fighting would prompt rapid transmission of disease. "Flies will spread disease, and this

K. Sunart, however, defended keeping all dogs in a common area, saying, "Sterilized dogs are much calmer, so there will be less fighting."

While conceding that some fighting might occur, he said, "After the dominant dog has established itself, the weaker ones will follow and become used to each other without any more fighting. If the dominant dog is too aggressive, we will isolate it."

However, well-known dog lover and Dean of the Faculty of Veterinary Science at Mahidol University, Dr Parntep Patanakorn, disagreed. "Sterilized dogs

are not 100% tame. They still fight with each other and there are many reasons why they might fight, such as being crowded into spaces, hunger, illness, the breed of the dog, and so on."

One of the main factors that is expected to contribute to overcrowding is that, unlike at many government-run shelters in the West where dogs are kept for a

will be really horrible," she said. years, so the new ones will replace those dying from old age, he explained. "They can live up to eight years if looked after properly."

Again, Dr Parntep disagreed. "Dogs live for about 15 years. If they are fed properly, they will live perhaps two or three years more than that."

Another factor affecting the turnover of dogs at the pound is people wanting to "deposit" their pet, which will cost about 100 baht per dog. People can adopt a dog, too, for free.

As for unexpected newcomers, to counter people leaving dogs at the shelter K. Sunart

is considering using the law to curb dog dumpers by asking police to fine them the maximum 500-baht penalty.

Another major concern sparking controversy is the feeding of the dogs. K. Sunart has spent 100,000 baht on 3.3 tonnes of dried dog food, but that will be used only when the usual food, leftover scraps from hotels, is depleted.

"We will target about 400 hotels in Phuket to donate leftover food," he explained. "Every tambon administration organization on the island will be delegated the responsibility of getting hotels in its area to donate food to the pound.

"If every hotel on the island donated leftovers on just one day

a year, there would be enough they need clean, fresh food." food," K. Sunart said.

While many hotels on the island have contracts to supply local pig farms with food scraps, getting leftovers from hotels should not be a problem. The Laguna Beach Resort, the Kata Beach Resort and the Pearl Village Hotel, which have such contracts with local pig farms, all confirmed that supplying leftovers would not be a problem, but that the PPLO would have to collect it.

However, while this seems good in theory, Dr Parntep advised, "No pound should give dogs food scraps. If the food is rotten, the dogs will die. We should give dogs 'clean' food. Dogs are like human beings,

As with many animal welfare projects in Thailand, a dearth of funding is a problem, and K. Sunart is concerned. "With the money we have left, the pound cannot be run smoothly," he said gravely, adding that he has applied to the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization for a million baht to fund the pound for a year, which he hopes will be approved very soon.

On the human side of the pound's impact on the island, residents in the nearby village, just 100 meters away, are not impressed with the newest addition to their community.

Jampa Ean-Choun said, "I really disagree with this project and even wonder who we can ask

for justice if dogs escape and run out in front of vehicles.

"Their droppings might stink out the whole area and the barking will be very disturbing," he added.

Villager Prontip Nunpakdee agreed. "The pound should be relocated further away," he said. Other villagers complained that they were not consulted on the decision to locate the pound so close to their homes.

K. Sunart responded, "If I held a public hearing, no one would agree with locating this

project here. So I decided not to hold one, and we built the pound, which is better than nothing happening, because we want to solve the stray dog problem."

What does seems odd is the apparent urge by Phuket authorities to reinvent the wheel when there are plenty

of good examples in Thailand to learn from. The Kanchanaburi Animal Shelter (KAS), built 17 years ago as a refuge for stray cats, dogs and goats, was the country's first and remains Thailand's largest animal shelter.

Explaining how the facility is operated, Pimol-Orn Angsawotai, Manager of the KAS, said, "Before any dog is added to our pound, we determine which breed it is, how old it is and we observe its behavior to see whether it is aggressive or fearful.

"We sterilize all male strays so they will be less aggressive, and keep them separate from the main group for 15 days so they can adapt to their new surroundings. Then we let them join the group most appropriate for them, such as an aggressive or a fearful group, or other puppies or older dogs, and so on.

K. Pimol-Orn explained that the KAS has 15 dog-lovers to care for the dogs, and kennels with cement floors and dirt where the dogs can defecate. "We collect the dried dog dung, which can be used to make methane,"

"Our pound is located far from a community and has 2,500 dogs on 41 rai of land, and all our dogs are happy to be here. Four to five veterinarians come weekly to check the dogs' health, sterilize and vaccinate them," she explained.

"We give dogs one meal of dry dog food a day because it is more convinient than cooked food. We don't give dogs leftovers because they become ill from eating rotten food. If dogs are ill, it costs a lot of money to cure them, so it's not worthwhile.

"We also have a problem with irresponsible people leaving their dogs in front of the pound,

> but this is normal. I think Thai people don't like being held responsible for their behavior.


"To control this problem, the local municipality should campaign seriously. If people don't feed their dogs, the dogs will suffer. If people don't want their dogs to breed, they

must bring their dogs to be sterilised, and they can have their dogs vaccinated.

"I think Phuket can manage this problem because it is an island, and maybe Phuket can be an example for other provinces in how to solve this problem," she added.

"We are funded by dog lovers' donations – there is no government budget for us. We spend 400,000 baht a month. I think Phuket should have fundraisers and promote this project. Phuket is a tourist destination where there are many Thai and foreign tourists. These tourists will surely donate some money to the

"But the pound must be managed properly, and must take care of the dogs. If tourists come to see the pound and are happy to see the dogs, they will surely make donations."





Where art just comes naturally

hen it comes to flowers, many people prefer the real thing. But artificial flowers have many advantages over their natural counterparts—they never need watering, they don't attract insects, and when you return from a long vacation they look just as good as on the day you left, apart from a bit of dust, perhaps.

For a growing number of people, crafting artificial flowers from clay is a relaxing hobby. One such person is 48-year-old Patchara Panichcheewakul, whose passion for artificial flowers has led her to sell them in her Genius Gallery, a new shop in Samkong.

"My friends were very surprised that I had the patience to make artificial flowers, because before I took up this hobby I was quite impetuous.

"I have never been a 'dainty' woman. I used to be a fishmonger and my family owned a fleet of fishing boats, but I had to get out of the business after my husband died," she explained.

"But my work with artificial flowers has made me more relaxed and taught me to concentrate," she said.

The flowers are made from soft clay imported from Japan. She mixes this with a local clay in order to keep costs down.

K. Patchara, originally from Samut Prakan province, opened Genius Gallery two months ago in a shophouse along Hongyok-Utis Rd, near the Thai Rak Thai party offices.

Despite the name, you will not find portraits of Einstein, Issac Newton or Thaksin Shinawatra hanging from the walls of the gallery. What you will find, in addition to artificial flowers, is a bookstore and game room op-

erated by K. Patchara's 20-year-old son, Park.

Asked about the rather unusual assemblage of merchandise, K. Patchara said, "I think books, games and flowers go together because flowers can re-

lease the tension that comes from reading and playing games."

The flowers she sells include roses, lotuses and a wide variety of orchids, including Cattleya and Vanda. Prices, which include an attractive flowerpot,

range from 500 to 3,500 baht – not expensive when one considers that it takes K. Patchara and her friends up to two weeks to craft each display.

The shop also offers courses in making artificial flowers. The sessions are open-ended, with instruction focusing on making one kind of display. Each course is just 300 baht, although students need to pay for materials themselves. If students' work is good enough, K. Patchara allows them to sell their creations at the shop.

K. Patchara first learned how to make artificial flowers from a close friend, and then continued the study through books. She also carefully studies real flowers so that she can reproduce them in exquisite detail.

"If customers see these artificial flowers and they think they are real, that makes me very proud. My goal is to imitate nature as closely as possible," she said.

Although made from clay, her flowers can last years with proper care. They are sensitive to changes in temperature, however. They remain firm in cool temperatures but can lose their shape when subjected to high heat.

They also need to be kept dry, otherwise fungus may grow on them, though if this does happen, the fungus can easily be brushed off, K. Patchara said.

Drowning No 1 killer of Thai kids

rowning is the No 1 cause of death for Thai children, with more than 6,000 youngsters perishing each year, according to statistics released by doctors at Ramathibodi Hospital.

While tykes and toddlers usually drown in bathtubs, buckets of water or ponds at or near their homes, children between five- and nine-years-old often drown while playing around neighborhood bridges and canals with no protective railings.

Asst Prof Dr Adisak Plitpolkarnpim, the chief researcher at the center for the prevention of accidents at Ramathibodi's Pediatric Department, said that studies indicate a nationwide annual average of 6,301 deaths.

An average of 2,481 children between birth and fouryears-old drown, as do 2,644 children aged five- to nine-yearsold, and 1,176 children aged between 10 and 14.

Pet project: The Sports Authority of Thailand plans to invest 472 million baht to build an indoor athletics stadium in Pattaya. The stadium will be built by Sino-Thai Engineering & Construction Plc and should be completed sometime next year, said Tourism and Sports Minister Sontaya Kunplome, a Chon Buri native.

The venue will also form part of the facilities for the First Asian Indoor Games Bangkok 2005, said K. Sontaya, adding that tourism and sport could work in tandem to attract more foreign visitors interested in sports and leisure to the region.

Chiang Mai Police Deputy Commander Col Prasert Chandarapipat said a verification committee was checking who was allowed to live in the forest under a 1998 Cabinet resolution. He said the initial list contained only 176 people, but that number had somehow ballooned to 258.

"We've found that many people on the list are real estate agents and investors," Col Prasert said. Mae Hia Tambon Administration Organization chairman Tanawat Yodjai said famous figures and politicians' wives dominated the list of people claiming a right to land in the forest.

Win-win situation? The Senate has passed the first reading of a bill to set up provincial committees to regulate motorcycle taxi services. The bill, proposed by the Transport Ministry, is the first of its kind for the industry.

In the absence of regulations, motorcyclists form their own taxi service groups, called *win*, and seek protection from local influential people or the police in order to keep operating.

Deputy Transport Minister Nikorn Chamnong said the provincial committees would stop taxi motorcyclists paying protection money to influential people, and added that each motorcycle taxi would be required to have a special license plate. Drivers will also be required to hold insurance policies.

Advance planning: Most of the 18 assistant district chiefs who were recently reassigned from Surat Thani to the strife-torn deep South in the latest reshuffle have taken out life insurance. Some have even bought two policies, sources said.

The 18 will be sent to offices in Yala, Pattani and Narathiwat, where violence escalated at the start of the year. Most of the policies will pay out at least 1 million baht if the holder dies.

Kasidej Thongchu, current

assistant chief of Kanchanadit District, said he took out a 2-million-baht policy with 500-baht monthly premiums after he learned he was being sent to Pattani's Mai Kaen district. He said his wife was eight months pregnant and the policy would be security for her.

Scot free: Pol Maj Gen Phanu Kerdlapphol said the 1.27 million parking tickets issued last year were too many, equating to about one third of all traffic-related tickets in 2003.

"I have learned that some police chiefs have instructed their subordinates to issue at least three tickets a day so that their performance record will look good," said Gen Phanu.


He added that many local police stations have yet to register all ticket records in the computer system, thus allowing those caught parking illegally to go free. Each officer's commission on tickets issued cannot exceed 10,000 baht a month.


Debris deposit: People carrying bottles of water and foam food containers into a national park could soon be made to cough up a cash guarantee, which would be refunded only when they show the packaging to officers as they leave.

Thani Wiriyarattanaporn, Director of the National Park Office, said the measure might be implemented after several other plans failed to prevent park visitors from littering. He said that a study of 148 parks in Thailand found that each visitor produced an average of a kilogram of trash per day.

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



career path from truck driver to make-up artist, with detours along the way as a soccer coach, salesman, marketing manager and bank teller, is an obviously circuitous one.

But for Phuket-born Natsongkit Kongchaiyan, 42, this long and winding road has brought him to a level of contentment where he can, as he puts it, "bring out a person's real strengths while hiding any weaknesses he or she may have".

His interests now are quite different from those of his youth.

One of his first loves was soccer, which he began playing seriously as a student at Ramkamhaeng University.

K. Natsongkit again applied his energies to this new career, but to him, something didn't feel quite right. He felt, he says, "like an outsider".

However, he spent 10 years in banking before taking his life







in another direction, albeit a shortlived one, as marketing manager of Bangkok Phuket Hospital.

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
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Thailand Northern heart and soul

t every traffic light, our ever-friendly taxi driver kept insisting that his friend Kai had the best guesthouse in town close to the night market, great rooms, good breakfasts and the cheapest Singha in town.

Not being a great fan of Singha, and remembering that our friends at the Amari Rincome had offered us a free room, we decided to stick to our original plan.

The Rincome is one of the oldest first-class hotels in Chiang Mai. It offers comfortable rooms, friendly staff and a great pool. It is certainly one of the best hotels in the north. It also makes a great base from which to explore Chiang Mai City and the provinces of the north.

Adrian, my old Irish mate, is still the chef there and produces some of the best Western food around. Wonderful Italian fare in the evenings, and certainly the best value east-meets-west lunch. If passing, pop in for a meal and say hi. He loves a chat over a cold beer!

We pay a visit to the night market – still a fun and bustling place to visit – and traditional Northern handicrafts are easy to find among the piles of fake designer goods.

One great place to relax after the strains of shopping is the terrace of Starbucks. They sell all the usual coffees but the Suriwongse Hotel, on the same terrace, provides the beers. It's a great place to indulge in a little people-watching.

he No 1 computer question I am asked is, "Which Internet connection should I get?" Up until a month ago, there were some pretty easy answers to that question. Now, everything has changed – in no small part due to the efforts of the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology (ICT), and the aftershock of monumental changes in the price of Internet access in Bangkok.

I'm still waiting to see which services deliver on their promises, and which amount to smoke and mirrors, but if you're in the market for a decent Internet connection, there are several good choices right now – and it looks as though there will be many more in the future.

Here are my recommendations, based on the experiences of people I know and trust:

For occasional use from a place that has a regular telephone line, the cheapest choice is still a pre-paid Internet service, those CD-size shrinkwrapped packages that include scratch cards with user IDs and passwords. All of the pre-paid packages run about the same speed: 25 Kbps on the McAfee Speedometer test (promos.mcafee.com/speedometer), with significantly poorer performance in the early evening and on weekends.

Don't use the 1222 telephone number but instead dial the "076" phone number of the Internet service provider (ISP). Go for the cheapest package available.

If you're going to use the Internet for an hour or less a day, get an hourly package. If you'll use it more, try one of the unlimited packages – Shark Byte from JI-Net seems to be the cheapest.

The next step up, GPRS mobile phone access from AIS, is a good choice if you don't mind spending 1,200 baht a month for unlimited access at roughly twice the speed of a standard dial-up land line. AIS service runs about 40 Kbps on the McAfee meter.

You'll need a mobile phone with GPRS capability, a way to connect the phone to your computer, and a telephone account with GPRS capability.

Internet prices go tumbling

The promotion is only good for six months, so plan on switching companies down the road.

Some people still swear by iPSTAR, the satellite service by Shin Satellite. I've heard that the service itself is great – at least, if you use one of the newer dishes – and at 200 Kbps on the McAfee scale, it's about eight times as fast as a dial-up line. (The

speed rating is less accurate if you do a lot of interaction with the computer –

for example, if you play interactive games.)

The big downside with iPSTAR is the billing method. Shin Satellite insists on charging by the bit, so even if you get a 3,000-baht-a-month package, you may end up spending two or more times that much if you do much Web surfing.

Next up the line are the 256K and 512K ADSL packages from various ISPs in conjunction with TOT (Telephone Organization of Thailand) and Thai Telephone & Telegraph (TT&T).

I had a JI-Net 256K ADSL line until a month ago, and I was paying a fortune for it. The prices have plummeted. JI-Net is now offering a 256K ADSL package for 3,000 baht – considerably less than half the price of the old package – which is supposed to include the TOT telephone line charge. (I say "supposed to" because I haven't seen it yet, and I've learned to be a bit, uh, skeptical about such things.)

If the new package works anything like the old one, it'll score about 200 Kbps on the McAfee scale.

By the way, if you order a JI-Net package, be careful to avoid the "DSL-Compax" package, which puts a limit on the amount of data you can download each hour. Also watch out for any DSL package that restricts you to using Thai servers only. It's amazing how many im-

portant Web sites around here aren't based in Thailand.

Remember the TT&T/CAT (Communications Authority of Thailand) package I talked about last week? It's the 2 Mbps ADSL package – eight times as fast as a 256K line – for 1,000 baht a month that meets the ICT Ministry's promise of fast, cheap access for Phuket.

Last Monday, TT&T told me they were withdrawing the offer, prompting

the tirade that appeared here in print last week. Last Thursday, TT&T showed up on my doorstep and installed the service. Go figure.

I ordered the "Premium" 2 Mbps package, which is supposed to deliver superior speeds for 2,860 baht a month, including telephone line charges.

My experiences have been spotty. The line has gone down several times, once for an entire day, but at the time of writing it's been up for three days non-stop. The speed runs all over the map: McAfee rates the connection anywhere from 40 Kbps (the speed of a GPRS mobile phone line) to 120 Kbps (about half the speed of the 256K JI-Net ADSL line), and the speed fluctuates like that at all hours of the day and night.

Not to be outdone, TOT/CAT have a new promotion: 256 Kbps ADSL including Internet service (that is, you don't need an ISP) for 500 baht a month. 512 Kbps costs 600 baht a month – and the prices are good until May 2005.

I will, being a Missourian (figuratively anyway), believe it when I see it. I ordered that package, and will keep you posted.

ROUGH RIDE THROUGH SCANDAL

ow's this for a clumsy title? The World's Greatest Sex and Scandals (Chancellor Press, London, 2001, 567pp) is a

compendium of four earlier books on royal, Hollywood, political and rock 'n' roll scandals. The anonymous authors range from the brilliant to the atrocious but all are unmistakably British.

The book begins with a bang: the Charles and Diana imbroglio. This

chapter includes four pages of transcript from the infamous "Tampax Tape" conversation between Charles and Camilla Parker-Bowles.

The author's rather catty conclusion: "Not only were people appalled at the Tampax exchange, they realized that they could not figure out Prince Charles at all. Here was a man who was married to one of the most beautiful women in the world, who was obviously besotted by a woman who, not to put too fine a point on it, needed ironing."

On we romp through other royal scandals, ending up with Grace Kelly (later Princess Grace of Monaco) who, I was shocked to learn, had slept with Gary Cooper, Clark Gable, Cary Grant, William Holden, David Niven, Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra, Ray Milland, the Shah of Iran, Aly Khan and Oleg Cassini.

She even slept with two minor screenwriters. Talk about degeneracy!

This section on modern royalty, Hollywood stars, is the worst, written in the breathy, hackneyed, "Tinseltown" prose of the 1950s sleaze sheet *Confidential*. With Hollywood, the author has plenty of sleazy material to play with, but it's a shame that he never came across a cliché he couldn't use. Otherwise his narrative tone is insufferably arch:

"Vivien Leigh had a different close-up problem with Clark Gable while making *Gone With the Wind* (1939). Her love scenes with the 'King' were made almost unendurable by the blasts of fetid breath caused by his less than satisfactory dentures. Twenty-five years later, while making *Ship of Fools*, Leigh had an equally distressing close encounter of the vaporous kind with Lee Marvin when she was stiffed by his alcohol-scented attentions."

We're on more solid ground with the author of the political scandals. He competently covers the Profumo scandal, Watergate, Iran-Contra,

Monica Lewinsky, Evita Peron and Imelda Marcos.

He has the greatest fun with Conservative PM John Major's misinterpreted "Back to Basics" campaign. A whole slew of sex scandals suddenly unfurled in the press: a long sor-

did parade of married Conservative MPs caught with other women, men and boys, with one worthy asphyxiating himself while dressed in woman's underwear

Finally we arrive in the land of rock 'n' roll scandals – Elvis, Jimi, Janis, the Stones, Bowie, Boy George, Ozzie Osbourne, Michael Jackson – and in the hands of a brilliant writer who really knows his stuff.

Here he is on the long-lasting, iconic band Pink Floyd: "The compact disc generation bows down in humble deference to the glory of the Floyd, for this band is just as fat, just as disillusioned and, ultimately, just as useless as they are."

A high point of this section, as might be expected, is the chapter on Keith Moon, deranged drummer of The Who, of whom Pete Townshend said in 1970: "The production of our records has got nothing to do with sound. It's got to do with trying to keep Keith Moon on his f—— drum stool."

Our author introduces Keith Moon with these words:

"Now and again, the mighty Gods of sweet serendipity smile on the beleaguered beacons of tabloid journalism and come up with a character so awesomely dangerous and dedicated to the perpetual pursuit of the offensive, the surreal and the illegal that not even the slightest degree of newshounding is necessary. The stories write themselves, arriving at the office in glorious rounded form, with a beginning, middle and end, none of which are especially believable but all of which conspire in a recipe of prime shock-horror.

"Keith Moon was such a character."

And so, on this literate high note, the book goes out.

Down a tunnel full of misery

laying golf, using a computer keyboard, operating a jackhammer, playing the piano, riding a motorcycle, making *somtam*... Spot the connection? You should, as the answer is in the palm of your hands or, more accurately, just between your palm and your wrist.

It's "tardy median palsy" or, to give it its modern moniker, carpal tunnel syndrome (CTS).

CTS affects around one in 100 people – although women, particularly in their 30s to 50s, are five times more likely to de-

velop it than men. The symptoms can all too easily be dismissed as being caused by one of a host of lesser condi-

dic surgeon at Phuket International Hospital, has specialized in the diagnosis and treatment of this condition for more than

He sees about four patients a week suffering from CTS, but believes that this is just the tip of the iceberg.

"Although people are moving away from repetitive, heavy manual work, there seems to be little reduction in the number of cases," says Dr Jiradesh, adding that CTS can be caused by leisure activities just as easily as by heavy labor.

The carpal tunnel, or ligament, os is a fat tube of strong tissue in the wrist through which the tendons of the hand and the median nerve pass. The median nerve serves the thumb, the index and middle fingers, and part of the ring finger.

Anything that reduces the free space in the carpal tunnel, such as fluid or inflammation of the tendon coatings, exerts pressure on the median nerve. It's believed that any repetitive use of the hand tendons can cause the coatings to become inflamed.

Two of the more common symptoms are a "pins-and-needles" sensation or numbness of the hand, often in the middle of the night. Many people dismiss these as caused by something innocuous, such as having lain on one's arm for too long. Indeed, some studies suggest that lying on

one's arm can contribute to CTS. Fractures of the wrist are another potential catalyst for CTS.

More unpleasant symptoms include aching or burning sensations in the hand and in the digits served by the median nerve.

Sufferers find some ously shaking their hands but



> It is a progressive condition and as it invariably worsens, symptoms may become chronic. The hand muscles weaken, making it difficult to grip objects and perform routine actions, such as writing.

> A permanent loss of feeling can occur, and day-to-day life becomes increasingly difficult. People with CTS can appear clumsy or accident-prone.

> Once CTS has been diagnosed, Dr Jiradesh recommends surgery. The operation, called carpal tunnel release, involves cutting the carpal ligament to make more space for the nerves and tendons in the carpal tunnel. The operation takes about 20 minutes.

his cautionary tale concerns a foreign man who went into business in Phuket with his Thai wife. Full of hope for prosperity, he listed her as a shareholder and employee of his fledgling enter-

In an act of revenge, the wife (soon to be ex-wife) went to file criminal charges against her husband for misappropriating her shares in the company. She charged that he did this by filing a "change of shareholders" notice at the Commercial Registration Office that contained a forged signature.

Then the legal battle started. The husband, who was also company director – let's call him Mr A – was forced to take a trip to the local police station. He was charged with misappropriation, which is a criminal offense. Thus charged, he had to request bail and post a consider-

After an initial investigation by the police, the case was forwarded to the prosecutor's office. This meant Mr A was again required to apply for and

But the police could not return his police bond on the same day, as the procedure requires issuing a check of the same it was only in English, not her

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Why the darkness?

The ongoing saga of the siting of Phuket's proposed International Conference and Exhibition Center (ICEC) took another unexpected turn last week when Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura suggested that Koh Maphrao (Coconut Island), off Phuket's east coast, and just north of Phuket City, might be a suitable location for the mega-project.

Gov Udomsak, an unelected official, is to be commended for trying to introduce momentum to a project that has ground to a halt from local opposition to having the ICEC at Saphan Hin, a flat and unremarkable strip of land currently noted for its teenage violence and trash incinerator.

In the government's public opinion poll in February last year, Phuket residents voted overwhelmingly in favor of the proposed Tah Chat Chai site, winning 226 votes compared with just 17 for Saphan Hin.

And rightly so. The idea to have the ICEC at Saphan Hin flies in the face of reason and has long been opposed even by the Phuket City municipality as impractical because it's too distant from hotels and the airport, not to mention the incalculable effect it would have on the city's worsening traffic problem.

For reasons never clearly explained – other than the suggestion that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra had a "vision" when visiting the area a few years ago – the central government would still like to site the project on reclaimed land off Saphan Hin.

The government thus shows itself as inexplicably dismissive of local concerns, leaving many residents suspicious of its motives. Some seem to feel that its decision may be based on nothing more than benefit to the construction companies who ultimately win the huge contracts to build the 3-billion-baht center – and the politicians who approve them.

Others, noting the protracted and deafening silence of the central government's "consultations with the Thai people" about legalizing gambling, feel that a casio in Phuket is a foregone conclusion – and that the siting of the ICEC is inextricably wound up in this.

While the governor's suggestion of an alternative site is a step forward, it also raises concerns over whether the government will be dismissive of yet another, smaller group of local residents' wishes.

Koh Maphrao is home to about 1,000 mostly Muslim villagers, whose families have been living there for generations.

Whether the government is prepared to deal fairly with this minority's rights to occupy the land – in order to build a convention center which many feel we do not need – remains to be seen.

Inform immigration before visa expires

During our holiday, my husband had an accident and required an operation on his back. While in hopsital, we had to change our return flights as he was unable to travel. I did not visit the Immigration Department as they told me that my husband must go in person.

We did visit when he had been discharged, taking his medical certificate detailing his operation with us. They would not look at the certificate and said that he had to pay a 1,000-baht, five-day overstay fine. My husband's visa was then extended for a week — to allow recuperation — at a cost of 1,900 baht.

The Immigration Department were very unhelpful, and made us feel embarrassed and as if my husband's overstay had been deliberate.

Perhaps I was wrong, but I thought that the Immigration Department was there to provide a service to foreigners.

Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen, Deputy Inspector of the provincial Immigration Office, was asked to comment by the Gazette.

He said that there are no exemptions from fines once the overstay has occurred. He said that in Mr Cochrane's case, someone should have contacted Immigration on his behalf while he was in hospital.

However, he said that a person with no one to assist on their behalf may appeal to the main Immigration office in Bangkok on this basis. "They will use their

discretion to decide if the appellant is liable for the fine or not," the officer said.

Tackling the trouble with Rawai

he idea of the PNAC is that if members find government officers in volved in corruption, we will know how to advise villagers what to do about it.

The problems in Rawai, particularly garbage and encroachment, have been going on for eight years, and the OrBorTor still can't solve them. The big problem now is garbage. Rawai is a tourist area and if we let it fill up with rubbish, who will come here?

The *OrBorTor* should come out to meet local people and cooperate with them, not just let villagers and student volunteers keep the place clean.

As for the vendors along Rawai Beach, the OrBorTor put together a plan to move them to a new place prepared especially for them. The OrBorTor said in May last year that they would manage the vendors to bring everything into order.

But they can't do [what they said they would do], and I don't know what the problem is, or why they are still waiting.

There was a similar problem at Nai Harn Beach. We in the PNAC knew that there was a building there belonging to the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*). The building was complete but had sat unused for a long time.

So we got permission [from the OrBorJor] to move the vendors from Nai Harn Beach to that building and to organize them properly.

We collect 10 baht a day from each restaurant and use the money to employ local people to keep the place clean for tourism.

It's the same with the Rawai vendors; they want to obey the Rawai OrBorTor's orders and

move, but the new place still doesn't have electricity or toilets. Before they tell vendors to move, the *OrBorTor* should first be well prepared.

A good administrator could manage this, but it depends on whether the OrBorTor is really interested. Actually, the OrBor-*Tor* has the power to close down the restaurants if it wants to, but the provincial government has a policy that the restaurants should be managed properly instead.

The OrBorTor council should cooperate with villagers to check on the work of the administrative team. But in fact the council and administrative sections are on the same side.

When we file a complaint or forward suggestions from villagers to the council, they are supposed to discuss it in the regular OrBorTor meeting so that the administrative section can explain what they are doing.

But it doesn't happen like that. The council doesn't even put the issue on the agenda for dis-

[The *OrBorTor*] have to know and look into what people want, so that management will be easier. We have forwarded people's opinions to OrBorTor Rawai, but they never discuss these issues in their meetings.

For example, in the old days, OrBorTor Rawai set aside a budget to employ staff to collect garbage along the beach. But where is the budget for this now? When we ask them this question, they tell us that they can't get anyone to work like this.

In the old days, [neighboring] OrBorTor Chalong had a small budget and the management and administration were not good. But the current council manages the tambon very well, even though they still have the same budget.

For example, they can cope with emergency problems like flash floods because they have all the equipment ready.

But OrBorTor Rawai has to ask the provincial government to provide equipment to handle flooding. Communities have asked for administrative power to be devolved to local organizations so they can deal with this sort of problem themselves. So why, when there's a problem, do they still have to ask the provincial government for help?

They can set their own budgets in preparation for things like this. Last year *OrBorTor* Rawai had about 73 million baht of its budget left over. They just keep it in the bank. They don't use it.

After learning about the problems with OrBorTor Rawai, we filed requests with many organizations, in an effort to get the OrBorTor to disclose official information to the public.

The process usually has to be done step-by-step – collecting signatures from villagers to compile a petition, then proposing changes to the *OrBorTor*.

Then, if the *OrBorTor* does nothing, we take the petition to the district office and then eventually to the provincial government.

Another problem [in Rawai] is encroachment on public land. People have complained to us [about two cases involving the same investor building resorts on public land].

We have filed complaints with the Phuket provincial government and they are now waiting for district officers to check, step by step, which is quite a slow process. Some of the officers may be corrupt, too.

In the future this problem [of encroachment] will probably be solved. But I don't think the present OrBorTor administrative team can solve it, also because of corruption.

But if the OrBorTor doesn't order the resort dismantled, we at the PNAC will file a complaint against its officers for not performing their duty.

It looks as though the police will probably arrest only the developer, who is a front man for the real investor.

In fact [to build a case against the investor], it's easy to check from bank accounts if any suspicious transfers of money have been made.

These investors are mostly high-level government officers because normal people wouldn't dare to do something like this.

If there are any OrBorTor officers who are involved in this matter, we will pursue them. We may complain to the Governor and to the National Counter Corruption Commission (NCCC) in

I am a foreigner with a Non-Immigrant O Visa. I am also married to a Thai woman. I would like to get a Thai skipper's certificate for a boat of up to 30 tons displacement.

I don't have a work permit. I just want to cruise around with my boat. Where do I have to go and what do I have to bring?

Kittipong Wasukri of the **Phuket Marine Office replies:**

You must come to the Phuket Marine Office and bring with you the following:

 Your passport and a letter from a consulate or embassy of your home country verifying that the passport is genuine, accurate and valid;

- Three two-inch photos of
- A medical certificate verifying that your are fit to skipper
- If you have it, a certificate to show that you have two years' experience or more as captain of a yacht;
- If you have an existing master's certificate from another country, you should bring it with you for us to look at.

We may be able to issue you with a Thai license without you having to take a test.

You do not need a work permit but we must be sure that you have the relevant knowledge to skipper a boat.

The size of the boat is irrelevant. The license states only the function on a boat that the holder may perform – skipper or engineer for example.

If we decide that you must take a test, you should be aware that although the regulations are already available in English, the information booklet to help prepare for the test is currently available only in Thai.

An English translation is being done and will be completed soon. The price of the booklet is 500 baht.

Examination papers, too, are only in Thai, but you may bring a translator to the exam with you.

The Phuket Marine Office has already received authority from the Marine Department in Bangkok to issue Thai captains' certificates to foreign skippers.

Down in the vault with a secret curry

It wasn't that the Brits invented curry, though it's just possible that they did invent the word. According to Sandeep Pande, Executive Chef at The Green Man, during the time of the Raj it was difficult for English colonists to classify all the various Indian dishes - from vindaloos to massalas – so they just called them all "cur-

"If you ask an Indian in India today what a curry is, he would just stare blankly at you and ask, 'What are you meaning, a curry?" said Sandeep.

What is meant by a curry at The Green Man's Thursday luncheon is a true "colonial curry".

"The main thing with the colonial curry is that we have many different accompaniments," says Sandeep.

These include crushed peanuts, fried garlic slivers, grated coconut, raisins, chopped bananas, chopped tomatoes, chopped onion... and so on.

These particular types of colonial curries are beef, prawn, prawn and egg,

lamb and chicken, the last two alternating on a weekly basis. They are made from old recipes passed down by the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation.

"They are slightly sweeter than the usual curries and not so hot," says Sandeep. "That's the way the memsahibs liked them."



Intrigue, and a wide variety of toppings, have allowed the Green Man's Thursday luncheons to curry favor with island residents.

The man responsible for obtaining these rare recipes for discerning curryloving Phuketians is Chris Hill, a former employee of The Bank (as it was known in Hong Kong), now retired in Phuket.

"We had a curry lunch at The Bank mess every Thursday, not only in Hong Kong but in other parts of the world where I worked," says Chris. "And we would also have curries on Bank junk trips. On Fridays it would be fish, of course."

The story of how Chris managed to obtain these

priceless recipes has become a legend in its own lunchtime. One version has it that the recipes were originally the property of Chinese mandarins involved in the opium

The Bank acquired them in exchange for a large shipment of the deadly drug and had then placed them in a secret vault at The Bank headquarters in London. The vault became exposed when the building was sold to a bingo consortium.

Though of course Chris denies this, it is said that he bribed The Bank's Chief Security Officer to let him have the recipes, which were handwritten on parchment and hidden away inside the tube of an A-sized Montecristo cigar from Havana.

The story here becomes rather complicated because The Bank was apparently not aware that Chris Hill was working for it at the time, and Chris himself was not clear whether or not he was working for - or ever had worked for – The Bank.

Mystery surrounds the transfer of the precious documents from London to the hostelry on the road to Kata, just west of Chalong Circle in Phuket, Thailand, though it is rumored that several people were killed or poisoned

Some of the rare ingredients in the original mandarin curry recipes, which I am not at liberty to reveal, may have caused some untimely deaths. The present proprietor of the above-mentioned hostelry swears that these ingredients have now been completely removed from the menu.

Further details of the Curry Powder Plot may be obtained by attending the weekly Thursday curry luncheon at The Green Man starting at 1 pm.

Special discounts may be arranged for those who wish to carry the luncheon through to Thursday night Quiz Night. For obvious reasons, questions will be limited to such brain-busters as: "What is your name?" and "Where are you?"

PHUKET: Many businesses on the island are optimistic about the effect of the Thailand-Australia Free-Trade Agreement (Tafta), expected to go into effect on January 1 next year.

At that time, Thailand will eliminate tariffs on 49% of its 5,505 listed Australian imports and Australia will do away with tariffs on 83% of its 6,108 committed products.

Steven Roberto, Wine and Beverage Director of Baan Rim Pa Group, explained, "Because taxes in Thailand presently more than triple the cost of imported wine, any reduction in the duty would benefit consumers.

"But the government has non-tariff barriers it could bring into play, and I am already hearing grumbling from importers about subtle and not-so-subtle pressures being put on them not to increase imports in response to the lower duty.

"It is too early to know what the eventual outcome will be. My attitude is one of wait and see."

While noting that import documentation procedures could still be used to deter wine importers, he said the real beneficiaries of the cuts would be wine drinkers who would benefit from greater selection and lower costs.

"This would help strengthen Thailand's reputation as a cosmopolitan holiday destination in Asia," he said.

Phuket's building industry is also set to gain from the tarrif reductions. Thai Bondall's Phuket branch manager, Waleeporn Chinpised, told the *Gazette* that the Tafta agrement would benefit Phuket by reducing the cost of Australian imports, which have a strong position in the construction products market.

"I just went to the Architect 2004 Trade Exhibition in Bangkok and noticed that half of the imported products came from Australia," she said.

Thai Bondall has already enjoyed import tax reductions ranging from 5%-20% earlier this year, she said, adding to the competitiveness of the company's annual imports valued at about

"But it would be great news if the taxes were eliminated altogether," she said. "If taxes are eliminated, the cost of our products would drop about 20-25%.

"With current costs and import tarrifs, we have to sell our products at about double the actual purchase price."

Doubt damages stock market predictions

in both stock markets and foreign exchange markets. In the central bankers who make latter it would be a brave investthe interest rate decisions.

But the Blair government decided that the Bank of England needed an MPC, comprising people from different backgrounds, including a sociologist, to help it decide on interest rates.

Imagine you are about to have a serious surgical procedure. I am sure you would be impressed if a government decided that part of the team operating on you by law included people with no medical knowledge whatsoever.

Returning to stock markets, it will come as a surprise to most readers to know that the Standard & Poors (S&P) 400 and the Russell 2000 indices reached record highs this year.

The S&P 400 is the little brother of the S&P 500 and covers the next 400 companies that are too small to be incorporated in the S&P 500. The Russell 2000 covers 2,000 companies with market capitalization ranging from just under US\$1 billion to around US\$5 billion.

The reason for the small companies' performance is simple. They can react much faster to changing situations than their larger brethren. Most do not have the unwieldy internal bulowing them to be more agile.

Unfortunately, the period of smaller companies outperforming their larger counterparts may be at an end. Small companies, in general, have a history of not performing well when interest rates start to rise. They have another disadvantage when compared with larger companies: when things go wrong they tend to be illiquid.

S&P said in early May that it expects the S&P 500 to be at 1,225 by the end of 2004 - it is currently at 1,098. If S&P is correct, then there will be good gains for the remainder of this year. But not everyone agrees. There are others who still see stock markets falling further.

For stock market observers listening to the predictions of others, it is important to bear in mind what sort of asset manager any spokesperson represents.

For example, if a spokesman for a major investment banking group or asset management group says he is "bullish" about mind that in general such investors make money only on a rising market.

However, a hedge fund manager may say he is "bearish", because hedge funds can make money on both rising and falling markets. Making such a statement promoting a bearish outlook can attract business away from traditionally "long-term only" managers.

I am slightly wary of stock markets at present, but feel they will probably perform better than many expect. When interest rates eventually rise in the US, I believe the downside will be limited, mainly because of relief among those who have been worrying too much about such an in-

In fact, markets may actually gain in response. To return to the medical analogy, if you wait a long time for an operation you may well feel a sense of relief when it is over.

As always, however, markets are most likely to be affected by external factors, such as terrorism, events in Iraq, Saudi Arabia and any further rises in oil prices – as well as anything else that happens. We live in interesting times.

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Breaking away and breaking records

f you like fast women, you will love Savitree "Tuk" Srichore, the current Thai record holder in the women's 200-meter sprint, who is now involved in a project to help young Phuket runners maximize their track and field potential.

Running came naturally to Savitree, a native of Buri Ram province. He father was a middle-distance runner and his oldest daughter, Savitree, set her sights on middle-distance from an early age. She learned early on, however, that her lightning quickness was best suited to shorter sprinting events.

As any successful athlete knows, however, the real inspiration comes from winning. And it didn't take Savitree long to start winning races. She started running at age five, and was collecting medals throughout her primary and secondary school years.

Her success eventually led her from Buri Ram to Bangkok, where she began to compete at national level at the tender age of nine. Under her father's tutelage, she was selected to represent Thailand as part of the Thai national youth team.

In her first international event, at just 10 years of age, she won two gold medals in a regional competition held in Indonesia, one in the long jump and the other in the 200-m dash.


And her international success continued to increase with age. She appeared in five consecutive SouthEast Asian (SEA) Games competitions starting with the 1989 Kuala Lumpur games and ending with the Jakarta games in 1997.

She also made three appearances in the Asian Games and competed in the Olympic Games in Barcelona in 1992 and in Atlanta in 1996, not bad for a girl from one of Thailand's poorest provinces.

In addition to numerous medals in SEA Games competition, she also won two Asian Games silver medals as part of the Thai 4x100-m relay team, first in Beijing in 1990 and again in Hiroshima in 1994. When Bangkok hosted the Asian Games for the first time in 1998, she collected her third Asian

Games medal, a bronze, also as a member of the 4x100-m relay

Despite her best efforts and training for the Olympics, including two months of intensive training in Frankfurt before the Atlanta Olympics, Savitree failed to win any Olympic medals due to the intense competition at the very acme of the sport.

But a collection of over 200 medals, including seven golds from SEA Games competition, is more than enough of a consolation for Savitree, who is now determined to help any Phuket youth with the natural talents and the determination to succeed follow in her fleet footsteps.

When asked about her greatest achievements, she cited breaking the Thai Womens' record for the 200-m dash at Thailand's National Games in Nakhon Sawan several years ago.

"My record-breaking time, 23.7 seconds, still holds today and won me a chance to represent Thailand in Atlanta," she beamed. By comparison, the current world record is 21.34 seconds, set by American Florence Griffith-

Joyner, or "FloJo", at the 1988 Olympics held in Seoul.

Asked about how she dealt with the intense pressure of international track-and-field competition, she said, "If you let surroundings disturb your concentration, you are already halfway to failure," she said.

"For success you need continuous practice, sufficient rest and a proper warm-up to avoid injury. I find meat can affect my digestion and slow down muscle movement, so I always avoid it a for a few days before a competition," she added.

Like every athlete who pushes her body to the limit, Savitree is no stranger to injury, her worst being a torn hamstring that required surgery when she was in her prime at age 23.

Despite this and other nagging injuries, coupled with a lack of training time due to her university studies, Savitree fought back and took three gold medals in the 18th SEA Games in Chiang Mai in 1995.

After years of unparalleled success, Savitree finally quit the Thai national team in 2001.

"Not only did my physical

problems take their toll on me, but I found I was torturing myself for the points I needed to stay on the team," she said. "There is also a lot of gamesmanship among athletes," she said.

With sprinting still the focal point of her life, she began work as a coach and landed a place with the Assumption University in Bangkok after stints with several other schools.

But she has also been involved in a government project to identify and develop the most promising young Thai athletes.

As part of this, she flies to Phuket each month to help the island's sprinters at the request of Eam Thavornvongwongse, the Deputy Chairman of the Phuket Sport Association, who oversees the project

"The project was initiated April 2003 with a remarkable opening ceremony and over 100 Phuket-based youngsters signed up," she said.

But the project has been less than the success she has hoped.

"Nobody really paid attention to this project," she said. "All the supporters who seemed so enthusiastic in the beginning vanished not long afterward," she explained.

Island indolence? Perhaps. Savitree said it was the lack of patience and determination among the teenagers themselves, along with lack of support from some local government agencies, that caused the project to fall far short of its goals.

"Most of my students didn't put in the maximum effort. They were rather lazy when it came to training," she said.

She feels that some parents found it too inconvenient to bring their children to Surakul Stadium, where the sessions were held, and that some teachers felt that emphasis on sports would effect their students' grades.

But like a true champion, Savitree doesn't give up easily. She has pledged to continue the training because there are about 12 young runners who still rely on her

"I have just found one talented 14-year-old boy and will do my best to prepare him to make the national team," she said.

So Savitree still comes to Phuket twice a month, usually on weekends, and keeps in touch with her trainees by email to give them advice and encouragement. After all, if she doesn't do it, who will? Savitree feels the government isn't doing enough to develop a love of sports among Thais

"We really need new equipment, advice in foreign training techniques and real government support," she said.

"With this new generation, we also have problems with public relations. Not many young people are attracted to running," she lamented.

"In other countries, youngsters can develop themselves from a young age at special schools dedicated to training. This is why they have raced so far ahead of us," she explained.

But it isn't just a medal hunt for Savitree, who has benefited so much from running.

"No matter what sport you like, playing it will surely improve your life," she concluded.

The final saw Show Time A narrowly leading Kamala Beach 17-16 at the end of the first quarter. In the second, both teams again managed to keep the scores


close, with Show Time A leading 39-37 before a reversal of fortune.

Re-Discovery

and Rover has launched a thoroughly revamped Discovery, which will be known in the allimportant North American market as the LR3. This is the first serious revamp of the Discovery since its debut in 1989, although it did receive a face-lift in 1994 and another in 1998.

The styling of the new Discovery makes it look like a baby Range Rover, with square, boxy lines and multiple headlamps. Some industry insiders have queried the body strake, which divides the front and rear quarters but not the doors. In addition, and for reasons known only to the Land Rover engineers, there is an asymmetric tailgate. Retained is the two-level roof pioneered on the original Discovery.

Power comes not from the familiar old V8 engine, but from a development of Jaguar's highly efficient V8, enlarged to 4.4 liters and delivering a comfortable 300bhp (220kW) and 425Nm of torque.

There is also a 2.7-liter turbo-diesel engine, built by Ford to a PSA (Peugeot-Citroën) design, which produces 190bhp (149kW) and a massive 440Nm of torque. The V8 is mated to a six-speed automatic transmission as standard, while the V6 diesel has a six-speed manual gearbox,

though the auto box is available as an option.

The Land Rover was created in 1948 when Rover's design chief Maurice Wilks, who had a large farm in North Wales, needed a vehicle

to replace his aging ex-World War 2 Willys Jeep. Wilks and his brother Spencer, the boss of Rover, decided for patriotic reasons to build their own offroad vehicle rather than buying first Land Rover – was unveiled



one from the US.

The Rover car company was going to build a vehicle for the land – hence the Land Rover came into being. Wilks decreed that the vehicle should be "similar to a Jeep,

but more useful to a farmer ... a proper farm machine ... able to drive other things and able to be used as a tractor".

The resultant vehicle – the

at the Amsterdam Motor Show in April 1948. British magazine The Motor gave it a thumbs-up, saying: "In launching this new vehicle the Rover Company has displayed an enterprise which should be well rewarded, and there is no doubt [that] a big market, both at home and abroad, exists for a machine such as the Land Rover."

Since March 2000, Land Rover has been part of Ford's Premier Automotive Group (PAG) - Ford bought the company from BMW for around 110 billion baht. Ford bosses discovered a crumbling company sorely needing investment and updating. Only the paint shop was anything like that of a modern auto plant. Everything else was distinctly archaic - at Land Rover's Solihull base, chassis were still pushed along the production line by hand.

The latest Discovery benefits from the upgrading that had to be carried out at the plant and is a significant improvement on the previous model. It is roomier, with seven seats as an option, the last row folding flat to offer a vast load space.

Adaptive headlamps "see" round corners; a longer wheelbase allows easier access to

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Hello Barbera, goodbye love

t was one of those crisp, sunny autumn days that make you feel full of life. I was certain I could win her heart by the close of the day.

She said my passion for wine was engaging. I thought she might mean I had no other interests so I vowed not to discuss wine and we rode our bikes across San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge.


We were headed for Contra Costa, where the regional parklands would contrast our frequent visits to Napa's wine country. Instead, we found legions of condominiums marching towards the mountains until they could advance no further. I reassured her that the bike pathway would eventually lead us back to nature.

As we rode along ... suddenly, a vineyard! So unexpected, here, surrounded by monotonous townhouses. She looked at me suspiciously. "Did you know about this?" she asked. I protested my innocence as I invited myself over the fence.

"These are Barbera grapevines," I pronounced with confidence. I explained to her that Barbera [bar-BEHR-uh] is common to the Piedmont region of Italy, where it is used to make Barbera d'Asti and Barbera d'Alba.

I showed her how to identify Barbera from the shape of its leaf, and described the wines' berry flavor, crisp acidity, concentrated ruby color, full body and soft tannins. I convinced myself that she shared my enthusiasm and tried not to notice her growing displeasure that our romantic journey was becoming yet another vineyard excursion.

The owner was equally displeased with my unexpected visit and barked for us to move along. "But these are Barbera," I

protested. Recognizing I might have more interest in his grapes than a quick snack, he invited me to have a look around.

His house was an authentic Frank Lloyd Wright, and the vineyard was planted by Italian immigrants at the turn of the century. He had been offered US\$40 million to sell, but said no. I liked him.

He had put together a makeshift winery inside an old barn that sat on one corner of the land. "I sell half the grapes to a winery in Santa Cruz and keep the other half," he told me. Inside, Christmas lights and mannequins decorated the walls. In one corner stood a massive bar that had once graced a saloon in Virginia City, Nevada.

Barbera began to flow and there was smoked salmon. wine-cured salami with cheese. plus crusty bread from a local bakery. The wine's crispness and soft tannins perfectly matched the impromptu picnic. It was magical and the hours

flew by. uncharacteristically quiet on the way home. Last I heard, she produces documentary films somewhere in California.

But I still keep in touch with him. He still has no plans to sell the vineyard and, yes, we both agree that Barbera has more potential than is realized and predict a comeback as Italian wines grow in popularity.

I suppose romance is fleeting, but the wonder of discovering perfect wines and the people who create them



CHERNG TALAY: Plaza del come in sizes from 34 to 40 square Mar, the Sino-Portuguese-style business center at the entrance to Laguna Phuket, which broke ground in March, is due to be completed on November 1.

The two-story development, now 60% complete, comprises 28 units including a fullyequipped conference room and and a supermarket. Professionals, such as architects, financial advisers and attorneys, are expected to take most of the units, half of which have alreday been let. There's a plant in Thailand that is almost as impressive as those skeleton leaves I used to show to my science teacher. This tropical version is the gold-vein plant, or the *sanchezia speciosa*. In Thai it is called *euang-tong*.

Unlike most plants which

are reared for the bountiful flowers and blooms they produce, the gold-vein plant is grown in most gardens purely because of its leaves. They're not that big, about eight centimeters in length, but they're certainly striking.

They consist of a palegreen background, highlighted with bright lemon-colored veins, seemingly sprouting from the center like snakes' ribs. They seem to create almost a kind of stained-glass effect.

It needs nothing except daily watering. Put it in the shade and it will sprout new shoots with glee. Give it full sun and it will beg for more like an over-enthusiastic puppy. Generally speaking, like many other colorfully-leaved plants, the more sun it gets, the more vivid the color of the leaves will be.

Forget its daily water ra-

tion, and it will remind you very quickly, by wilting pathetically and looking generally forlorn. Leave it for a couple of days without water, and you will end up looking at it with feelings of such guilt that the hose will almost spontaneously spring into action.

I was happy with the leaves of the gold-vein plant. They were attractive enough. But it wasn't until it had been in a pot in my garden for a couple of years, hav-

ing doubled in size, that I noticed something as I casually sipped a Chang beer one evening. Small, tubular flowers had appeared.

They're nothing to write home about, I'll admit. In fact they are pretty pathetic compared with many of the other flora in Phuket. But they were flowers.

Sanchezia can grow to a couple of

meters tall, but that can take a while. Frequent trimming is the best way to encourage it to look its best, and the ideal time to cut it back is just after it's flowered. It tends to sprawl a bit, so you can be fairly ruthless.

Few children collect skel-




eton leaves for science class these days. If you've got kids, though, you could save them the effort of tramping trough the woods and just point them in the direction of a *sanchezia speciosa*. Give them the hose while they're there.
