


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Underpasses plan shelved

PHUKET: Two proposed underpasses on the bypass road will not be built in the immediate future, Deputy Prime Minister Suwat Liptapanlop has announced.

During a recent visit to Phuket, DPM Suwat said the proposals for the underpasses – at the Samkong and Darasamut School intersections - will not even be considered until the widening of the bypass road is completed.

The Phuket Provincial Highways Office has pressed for the underpasses, arguing that they will relieve traffic congestion, but DPM Suwat countered that the road widening will solve the problems.

"Road widening will create more space on the road for traffic, and allow more vehicles at a time to pass through the intersections," he explained.

The Office of Transport and Traffic Policy and Planning (OTTPP) estimates that, even so, underpasses will be needed within three years.

DPM Suwat said, "The OTTPP will look this project closely in a couple of years. If there are still problems, the underpass project will be launched immediately."

During a flying visit to Phuket in August, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra rejected the proposals for the underpasses, describing the 800 million baht budget as "too high". He asked sarcastically, "Are they going to be decorated with pearls?"

At his meeting, held on

November 19 at the Pearl Village Hotel at Nai Yang Beach, DPM Suwat addressed another contentious issue, the continuing saga of where Phuket's proposed International Conference and Exhibition Center (ICEC) will be sited.

Little new light was shed on the issue, however. Indeed, if anything, things became murkier.

At the meeting, Santichai Euajongprasit, Vice-Governor of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT), quoting the findings of a study conducted by a consultancy, said that existing land at Saphan Hin was the most

suitable site for the ICEC, with Mai Khao the second choice.

The proposal to reclaim land from the sea off Saphan Hin scored lowest in the report.

Proximity to city-center hotels as well as sea views were the deciding factors in the Saphan Hin proposal coming out

K. Santichai was, however, unable to specify precisely which plot of land in Saphan Hin would end up as the site of the ICEC.

Concern over German's visa-run crash hospital bills

PHUKET CITY: Investigators from the Ranong Town Police Station came to Phuket on November 21 to question German Raoul Alexander Dieter Wildt and two Korean tourists who were injured in the November 12 collision between a water truck and a minibus carrying passengers on a "visa run" to the border near Ranong.

The driver of the water truck was allegedly speeding when he lost control and caused the accident. Mr Wildt, a dive instructor, was the most badly injured. He suffered a crushed leg that required amputation below the knee, a broken rib, spinal injuries and damage to his left arm and hand.


Two Koreans received lesser injuries, one of them requiring 44,000 baht's worth of surgery for a broken nose. This amount was paid out under the statutory insurance coverage on the minibus, said Kotchakorn Rattanaphan, Manager of the Ranong Office of the Andaman Club, which owns the vehicle.

Pol Sub Lt Chatchai Pongsingto, of Ranong Town Police Station, told the Gazette that the officers were still awaiting medical reports from Bangkok Phuket Hospital, where Mr Wildt is being treated, before filing charges.

Mr Wildt, who is uninsured, refused treatment at Ranong Hospital, where he was taken immediately after the crash. He told the Gazette he would have to remain at Bangkok Phuket Hospital at least three more weeks.

Medical fees have already reached 428,000 baht, and there is mounting concern over who will foot the final bill. Friends and colleagues have been raising funds.

Apartments in Patong Tower up for auction

PATONG: Eighty apartments in the tallest building in Phuket, Patong Tower, will come under the auctioneer's hammer on December 12, some 13 years after planning permission for the 32story block just off Thaweewong Rd was first given.

Siripong Chechang, chief of the Public Works Department of Patong Municipality, on November 22 addressed concerns by some potential buyers that the building was constructed ille-

It was pointed out by some residents of Patong that the building is far higher than the limit set in a 1992 ruling by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE), which prohibits buildings more than 12 meters in height within 30m of the hightide mark.

K. Siripong said, however, that Patong Tower does not break the rule because planning approval for it was granted in 1991 – the year before the MNRE's 12-meter regulation came into effect.

and the auction of apartments 13 years later, Benjaporn Panya-Ngarm, customer service supervisor for the new owners, Divine Property and Development Co, said that the property had for years been classed as a non-performing loan, or NPL.

"The original developer borrowed funds from Siam Commercial Bank and some [unnamed] foreign banks, but was unable to repay on schedule and [the Tower] was declared an

"We believe that this is the first auction of its kind in Patong," said K. Panya. "There will be no minimum bid and the auction will be clean," he promised.

rangkura and Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwannasuppana – as well as state agencies including the TAT – had been given the task of finding suitable land at Saphan Hin and had been told to present their findings to him within a month.

The issue was further clouded when the Deputy PM ordered the TAT to investigate sites on state land at Mai Khao Beach, and to look at the possibility of building the ICEC at the pro-

Suwalai Pindrapab, the Director of TAT Region 4, suggested as recently as November 16 that the ICEC could be sited in the planned Chao Fa City.

DPM Suwat said, "The government already has the budget earmarked for the ICEC and if we find suitable land, then the project can begin immediately.

"If the private sector [Chao Fa City] can show why their site is suitable, then the government may consider their proposal at the same time [as the others]."

Gunfight youths charged

PHUKET CITY: Phuket City Police have charged four youths in connection with a gunfight that took place outside Phuket Grocery Co, near Robinson department store in the early hours of October 31.

After a tip-off from an informant, police arrested Natee Srisamut, 20, and Niwat Sae-tan, 19, along with two youths aged 16 and 17.

After searches of the suspects' homes, one .38 pistol, one 11mm pistol, a sawed-off shotgun, a holster and a quantity of ammunition were recovered.

The four are alleged to be members of a gang which became involved in a shootout with a rival gang. They have been charged with firearms offenses and with disturbing the peace.

Police said the 16-year-old had been arrested in August last year on a robbery charge, and also in September this year for possession of illegal drugs, while Niwat had been arrested for drugs possession last year.

Government 'is monitoring early closing'

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has said that the government is monitoring reaction to its controversial early-closing policy for entertainment venues, but that it is still "early days".

Speaking at his regular press conference at the Provincial Hall on November 15, the Governor also stressed that he did not have the power to alter the rules for Phuket.


Despite vociferous protests in Phuket, Gov Udomsak said that the law must be obeyed, but that the government would continue to evaluate its effects.

The law had been in effect only a couple of months, said Gov Udomsak, adding, "For the moment, we in Phuket have to obey the law."

US gives B2m in anti-terror gear to police

PHUKET CITY: As part of its fight against terrorism, the US Department of Defense has donated anti-terrorism equipment worth about 2 million baht to Royal Thai Police Region 8, which includes Phuket.

In a ceremony at Phuket Provincial Police Headquarters on November 17, David Turner, Chief of the US Defense Department's Force Protection Detachment at the US Embassy in Bangkok, presented the equipment to Provincial Police Region 8 Deputy Commissioner Pol Maj Gen Phuvadol Krasae-In.

The donation followed the successful completion in September of a five-day anti-terrorism training course organized by the US Defense Department. Fiftyseven police officers from Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi and Koh Samui completed the course, which was held at the Patong Resort Hotel.

Accepting the donation, Gen Phuvadol said that even though the possibility of terrorist attack in Region 8 is regarded as remote, his officers were not being complacent.

"After the training, the Defense Department donated this equipment so that we could implement more effectively what our officers had learned during the course," he said, adding that it was the first time Region 8 police had had access to such equipment.

The donation included lights and mirrors to check under cars for bombs, hand-held metal detectors, and other equipment designed to thwart terrorists before they can strike.

"The Bali bombing made us aware of the need to prepare ourselves for any situation within our area of control," the general said, as he thanked the Defense Department for its support and vowed to include security aspects as a part of continuing police

Speaking in fluent Thai, Mr Turner said he had been honored to present Provincial Police Region 8 with the equipment, which would help ensure continued security in Phuket and other parts of southern Thailand.

He also said he was looking forward to continued mutual support and cooperation between the US Defense Department and the Royal Thai Police.

December date for travel trade show

PHUKET CITY: All 131 display stands at this year's Phuket and Andaman Travel Trade Show have been booked, according to Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Regional Director Suwalai Pinpradab.

The show is scheduled to take place at the Royal Phuket City Hotel on December 3-5.

On December 3 and 5 the show will be open to the travel industry only, but on December 4, it will be open to the public.

500 pray for peace in the troubled South

PHUKET CITY: About 500 people, including local leaders of the major faiths in Thailand, held a mass session on November 17 to pray for peace to return to the troubled provinces of Yala, Pattani and Narathiwat.

The congregation gathered at Phuket Provincial Hall in support of the government's call for mass prayer, which Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura explained was inspired by HM Queen Sirikit's


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than 1,000 people, including Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra, the Cabinet and leading figures from throughout Thai-

AFTER DEATH DO US PART

BANGKOK: Not knowing what to do after her husband's sudden death, an elderly blind woman stayed with his body in their shed in Rat Burana District.

On the morning of November 22, neighbors and police found 67-year-old Muan Rungruang sleeping and hugging the body of her dead husband, Tieng Boonyong, who had died four days earlier. Their dog Jumbo was curled up alongside his deceased master.

K. Muan said K. Tieng, a stevedore, had looked after her since she lost her first husband. She has been blind since the age of 35, when sulfur splattered into her eyes from a fertilizer bag she was carrying. Her first husband had died in the shed as well.

She later met K. Tieng, who was working in the area.

"He took care of me until his last breath. I loved him so much," she said, adding that K. Tieng had a chronic chest problem and died because they couldn't afford treatment.

"Before he died, he lay down on my lap when I was trying to give him some boiled rice. He got three spoons down before saying he couldn't stand the pain anymore," K. Muan said, adding that K. Tieng finally passed away on her lap.

She cried for help but nobody heard her in this rural area, where residences are far from each other. With nobody coming to her aid, she was forced to stay in the shed with her dead husband until neighbors and police came calling. K. Muan hadn't eaten since K. Tieng died. "All of our nine dogs ran away, except Jumbo," she said.

A social worker offered to take her to a welfare home for the elderly, but she refused. She insisted that she would live out the rest of her days in the shed with her loyal dog.

As K. Tieng's body was brought into the morgue for an autopsy, K. Muen wept, saying that she wanted to cremate him but could not afford it. So police and members of the press pooled their money together to pay for the funeral ceremony.

Stealer's wheel

BANGKOK: Lingerie vendor Dusit Jansorn was taking no chances when he parked his 533,000-baht pickup overnight near his home in Bangkok. He put a lock on the brake and – just to be on the safe side – he removed the steering wheel.

But when 30-year-old K. Dusit returned to his parking place the following morning, there was no sign of his beloved pick-up.

K. Dusit and his girlfriend Orawan Auemkleub, 25, took the now-redundant steering wheel with them when they went to the police station to report the theft.

Police believe the vehicle was stolen by a gang of three thieves who, knowing K. Dusit's routine, had brought along pliers to hold the steering column in place while they drove the pickup to a place were they could attach a new steering wheel.

K. Dusit's said he had worked hard for many years to be able to afford the pickup, and its theft had financially ruined him.

Laboring

Few residents may be aware of this, but one of the reasons Phuket City's streets have been relatively water-free this rainy season is that drains and gutters had been cleared by inmates of Phuket Prison.

The prison regularly supplies work parties of prisoners to carry out public works.

Forget images of penal chain gangs, though: as the *Gazette*'s **Kamol Pirat** and **Sangkhae Leelanapaporn** found out, everyone concerned is keen to highlight the role that such work can play in rehabilitating prisoners and preparing them for life outside prison walls.

he heavy door slams shut, and the prisoner thinks he has seen the last of the outside world for however many years he has been sentenced to.

But prisoners in Phuket may end up seeing life on the outside sooner than expected – if they choose to join one of the work parties Phuket Provincial Prison assembles to perform services to the community, such as cutting trees, clearing drains and cleaning roads.

Seree Udom, who became chief of the 997-inmate prison at the beginning of October, explained, "Prison policy is to work only with and for state agencies; we don't do any work for the private sector."

Bodies such as Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*), Phuket City Municipality and Phuket Provincial Highways Office will approach the prison and ask for prison labor.

If the prison decides to get involved with a project, staff select members for a working party – which has to be done carefully as it will mean allowing the prisoners to leave the confines of the jail.

Said K. Seree, "We choose only prisoners who have been sentenced to two years or less in jail, and they must not have com-

mitted any drugs offences – government policy is not to allow drug dealers and addicts to join prison work parties. Government policy also says that women may not be in work parties.

"To be selected for a work party, a prisoner must have good behavior record, a registered address outside prison and relatives who guarantee that he will not run away.

"And he must want to be in a work party, because no one is forced to join; it is entirely vol-

The prisoners receive compensation for their labor. Sometimes they are paid in cash, sometimes not, but each gets one day deducated from his sentence for every day he spends in a work

If the prison charges a public body for a work party's services, 80% of the money is passed on to prisoners. The remaining 20% is kept by the

prison, to cover expenses such as the cost of transport to the labor site, tools, food and allowances for the wardens who accompany the party.

Prisoners are not allowed to have cash while they are incarcerated, so the money they earn is kept in a special account and handed over to them when they leave jail at the end of their sen-

Members of work parties must wear uniforms that make them easily identifiable if they try

Outside the prison they are accompanied by one warden for every five prisoners, but they are neither chained nor handcuffed.

Their movements are restricted, though. They must stay in the area where they are working; anyone who wants to leave this specific area must first get permission from the wardens.

Not that K. Seree sees there is much cause for concern. He

said, "I don't think the prisoners pose a threat to anyone, because they have no opportunity to commit a crime while they are out."

He admitted, "Yes, prisoners have escaped from work sites in the past, but only a few, and they didn't get very far before the wardens caught them again."

The Gazette talked to one prisoner who has been in a work group, who can be quoted only under the pseudonym "Ae".

Ae said that after being in prison, and away from other people for such a long time, he found it difficult to adjust to being on the "outside", even if it was for only the length of a working day. In addition, he was embarrassed and ashamed to be a prisoner.

He said, "It took me three or four days to adjust to being 'out', but now I am happy.

"After a week, I felt just like anyone else, and now I am proud to help the community by clean-

ing the roads or the klongs or other places. And the wardens let me talk to my relatives if they come to see me, too."

join a work party and had been assigned to one because prison staff were satisfied with his conduct in prison. He could select which jobs he went on.

There are two main benefits of being in a work party, he said. The first is that it cuts the time he will have to spend in jail, and the second is that he is paid for work-

He said, "Being in a work party has changed me because it's taught me about what it's like to be an ordinary person, and to stick at a job.'

While women may not be allowed to join work parties, they are expected to undertake vocational training, such as needlework and making fishing nets, while in jail.

Similarly, male prisoners Ae said he had chosen to are expected to take advantage of

> training in batik making, bamboo and rattan craft. decorative metalwork, welding and carpentry.

> I t e m s made by the prisoners are sold, and after the production costs are deducted, the profits are divided equally between the prisoners and the prison.

Prison chief K. Seree said, "Inmates

can be trained in many occupations while they are in prison. We want to give them skills to allow them to earn a living when they leave here.

'That way, we hope, they will have jobs and a good future and won't feel the need to commit crimes."

ith the boom in the island's spa industry, perhaps it was inevitable: Phuket now has its first full-service spa – for dogs.

Panida Sriaram, Owner of Raksatt Dog Spa & Salon, told the *Gazette* that dogs react to spa therapy and beauty treatments in much the same way that people do. They get a deep sense of relaxation in the spa, followed by a real self-confidence boost in the salon.

Some people might be appalled at the idea of a dog spa, but for many pet owners nothing is too good for the four-legged member of the family. Why, they reason, should the pleasures of spa therapy be limited to humans alone?

The *Gazette* visited the spa recently and saw Beckham, a 1½-year-old poodle, getting his very first spa treatment. First, he was gently immersed in warm bath, the water aromatic with the herbs selected specially for discerning canine tastes.

The massage therapist then gently massaged Beckham and poured warm water over his body. Beckham tried to climb up out of the oak tub at first, but he later calmed down and began to savor the experience of breathing in the combination of Thai and Chinese herbs and rose petals

"The aroma bath comforts the dogs. First-time customers may squirm a bit initially, but before long they are soothed by the aroma and their stress levels fall," said K. Panida.

She explained that orange and lemon are two aromas that dogs seem particularly fond of, and that the herbal bath helps

impart a healthy radiance to the dog's fur and skin.

"Every dog has its own natural, unique body odor. The bath reduces this natural odor somewhat, but our treatments help enhance the natural odor and make the dog more fragrant and the fur softer, silkier – and more huggable," she said.

After the spa, Beckham was removed from the tub for the next

phase of therapy – warm compresses of Thai and Chinese herbs applied by two therapists.

Next was stone therapy. "We press special stones and herbal powder upon the thighs and back," explained K. Panida. "There are eight different kinds of stone, each used to gradually relieve a specific condition.

"This therapy can be used in combination with veterinary

treatment to cure illnesses more efficiently," she added.

K. Panida recommends dogs come in for spa therapy about twice a month, though it depends on whether the dog is in just for relaxation or whether therapy for a specific condition is required, in which case weekly visits are recommended.

Another factor that may be worth considering when sched-

uling a treatment regimen for Fido is the cost. Like most luxuries, spa therapy for dogs does not come cheap: a basic one-hour spa course ranges in price from 800 to 1,200 baht, depending on the size of the dog.

The shop also offers a full grooming service. Raksatt's specialty is "fancy" styling and color highlighting, using a hydrogen formula imported from Japan.

The salon is not solely for cosmetic purposes, however: the dogs can also get a shampoo to help ward off fleas and ticks or chemical treatment for hair which has become damaged and coarse

Owners of dogs with light-colored fur may like to try giving Rover a little more pizzazz by trying out the salon's popular highlighting service. But highlighting doesn't work well on dogs with dark fur, K.Panida said – it just turns them orange.

"Dogs are just like people. They like to be admired and are proud to show off when they know they are looking good. You can see it clearly during dog shows," she said.

Dogs have "bad hair days" too, she explained. Like humans, getting a bad haircut can totally put some dogs off being groomed, especially if someone tries to comb out tangled fur too roughly or accidentally cuts the dog's skin with scissors.

She recommends daily combing for long-haired breeds in order to familiarize the dogs with grooming and keep their coats up to snuff.

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'Cell phones for peace' idea slammed

government campaign led by Deputy Prime Minister Wissanu Krea-Ngam to encourage young people in the Deep South to use cell phones to vote and play games during popular radio and television shows was slammed by southern residents.

DPM Wissanu instructed state-run radio and television networks in the region to create "phone-in programs" to encourage audiences to vote or comment on particular subjects, saying the form of local participation could help defuse the current unrest in the Deep South.

Religious leaders, however, wondered who would actually benefit from the plan.


"I don't know who will make money from the extra phone usage, but the parents of the children will definitely end up paying the bills.

"Why don't they initiate something that will be really useful for our children or make them more knowledgeable?" said religious leader Nimu Makajeh.

Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's family owns the biggest cell-phone operator in the country, Advanced Info Service.

Sin tax structure: Information and Communications Technology (ICT) Minister Surapong Suebwonglee is pushing for a "sin tax" on online gaming similar to those levied on alcohol and tobacco.

Proceeds would be used to prevent and remedy the harmful effects from Internet addiction.

The Excise Department expects a feasibility study for taxing online games to be complete in a few months. The ministry is also seeking Cabinet backing to be given sole authority to regulate online-game providers and Internet cafés.

If it is granted the powers, gamers under 18 would be limited to playing online games to a maximum of three hours a day, while the 10 pm-to-6 am restriction for young players would remain in force to prevent possible addiction, K. Surapong said.

Running on empty: Natural gas reserves in the Gulf of Thailand will run out in 15 years if the Energy Ministry continues to depend on gas as fuel for new power plants, an official at the Energy Policy and Planning Office warned.

Between 2001 and 2015, about 18 power plants with a combined capacity of 13,000 megawatts are expected to come onstream.

If the government does not specify the type of fuel to be used by the new power plants, they

will turn to natural gas because of its lower cost. This will drain the country's reserves to the point where natural gas would eventually need to be imported, the source said.

Last month, Energy Minister Prommin Lertsuridej said that the country's natural gas reserves would last for more than 30 years.

Fair's fair: The Election Commission (EC) has ruled that the government's promotional fair at Impact Arena Muang Thong Thani earlier this month did not violate election laws.

The announcement came after both the Mahachon and Democrat parties filed complaints to the EC alleging that the five-day exhibition, during which free gifts were handed

out, was a ruse by the ruling Thai Rak Thai party to bolster its chances in the upcoming general election.

EC Secretary General Ekkachai Warunprapha said the government had acted within legal parameters in using the national budget to publicize its achievements.

Take the money and run: More than 100 people – including several lottery winners – were evacuated from the Government Lottery Office (GLO) on November 17 following a bomb hoax. Officials evacuated the building after a woman twice called the GLO before noon to say a bomb would go off at 2 pm.

A couple who won a 50-million-baht jackpot showed up to receive their winnings before officials ordered the evacuation. The couple immediately cashed their check and deposited the money at a nearby bank.


A police bomb-disposal team, using three sniffer dogs, scoured the area but found no device. Police are investigating the incident.

Girls at risk: Public Health Minister Sudarat Keyuraphan said 60% – or 42,000 – of the 70,000 Thai youngsters aged between 15 and 24 who are infected with HIV are young women.

The sexual behavior of Thai girls and young women has changed rapidly, with 9% of girls aged 15 to 19 admitting to having had sex. Many young Thais engaged in unprotected pre-marital sex without fully understanding the potential consequences of their actions, she said.

t the end of October leased ambitious plans to reclaim more

the possibility of serious water shortages during the dry season.

The Samui Waterworks Department has therefore signed a 15-year contract with the East Water Co, to buy water from a desalination plant that uses reverse osmosis to produce potable water from sea water. The supply will start flowing in March next year.

The target supply is 2,500 cubic meters a day, at a total daily cost of 114,000 baht, which will probably mean an increase in the cost of water to consumers. Water shortages are a recurrent problem on Samui, and visitors and citizens are continually being

asked to be prudent when using roads. the island supply.

Governor's goals: Surat Thani's new Provincial Governor Vichit Vichaisan recently announced his priorities in dealing with the problems that he feels are of major concern to the province.

The three main issues he plans to address are waste disposal and cleanliness, traffic congestion, and underage drinking and revelry.

He said he will pay special attention to the introduction of recycling, especially with regard to fertilizers, and he will develop a program to improve local driving skills and therefore improve people's safety on local

Gov Vichit said that he also intends to place heavier restrictions on young people, banning them from places intended for adults only, and the authorities will crack down on establishments that allow voungsters to break the law.

He added that most adults in the province are particularly concerned that young local people are forgetting traditional Thai values, such as respect for the family and cultural traditions. He said he hopes to ensure that basic



aishiro Miyayauchi is fluent in Thai; indeed, it is easy to assume he is Thai. And he is, in a way – he was born in Thailand, to Japanese parents who ran a pearl and jewellery business.

His name is a bit of a giveaway, too: "The 'Tai' of my first name means 'Thai'; my parents gave me that name because I was born here," he explained.

After attending Japanese and international schools in Thailand, Mr Miyayauchi studied at Assumption Business Administration College in Bangkok.

He said, "While I was studying at college, I was also working part-time for a tour company in Bangkok. I became a full-time tour guide after I graduated, and worked mainly with Japanese people visiting Thailand.

master in Phuket, and opened my own business here seven years ago."

Diving was second nature to Mr Miyayauchi. He explained, "I'd been used to being underwater since I was very young, because I used to dive with the staff at my father's pearl

farm. That's why I was not afraid of diving, or of being underwa-

In fact, that love of the water is one of the main reasons Mr Miyayauchi has settled in Phuket. He said, "I'm not really bothered whether I live in Bangkok or Phuket, but the thing about Phuket is that I'm close to the sea and can go diving.

"That said, if the traffic in Bangkok wasn't quite so bad, I

"I don't presume to ask anyone to help me protect the sea, but if someone who knows better than me will tell me what I can do to help protect the sea, I will be more than happy to do it."

So says Taishiro Miyayauchi, director of the Marine Project dive shop in Patong. Mr Miyayauchi, the first Japanese PADI Course Director in Thailand, is well known for his attempts to persuade locals and visitors to take more care of the sea around Phuket. He spoke with **Dhirarat Boonkongsaen** about his crusade.

might be tempted to go back there, to be near my parents, who are getting older now."

That love of the sea is also a cause of sadness for Mr Miyayauchi, as he has watched some of Thailand's beaches deteriorate over the years.

He said, "I have been "I also qualified as a dive watching the beaches in Pattaya

and Chonburi become more and more damaged since I was young.

"I have seen unspoiled beaches ruined by rubbish the thrown on the sand and in the sea, and by untreated wastewater being discharged into the sea.

"Now the same thing is happening in Phuket. The first time I came here, about 14 years ago, I saw beautiful beaches and this miraculous underwater world. But it's all so different

"I've decided to speak out about protecting the beaches because someone has to do it and as no one else seems prepared to do it, that someone has to be


The garbage isn't just unattractive, it's also downright dangerous, particularly for marine animals such as sea turtlesm said Mr Miyayauchi. "The turtles see a plastic bag floating in the water and think it's a jellyfish, and as jellyfish are part of the turtles' diet, they'll eat the plastic bag. And chances are, it will kill them.

"Untreated wastewater can be toxic to fish."

As a dive master and the owner of a diving business, he always tells his customers and students to treat the marine environment with respect.

He said, "They are close to the coral, and they should act responsibly towards this natural resource, but even if tourists do damage coral, the harm they do is nothing compared to that caused by anchors dropped by irresponsible crews of fishing boats and pleasure craft.

"We have come across so many yachts where the crew really couldn't care less where they drop anchor; we've even met crews who prefer to stop over a reef because they can hook the anchor into the reef, so there's less chance of the boat floating away in the night, which they say might happen if they don't anchor properly in the

caused an awful lot of damage to the coral.

"Once, when I saw someone doing that, I went to them and tried to make them understand why they shouldn't be doing it. But they didn't listen. Instead, they shouted at us.

"So, later, we dived down and quietly moved their anchor off the coral.

action we have taken, but the boat was out of the jurisdiction of the police, so we had to take care of the situation ourselves.

"If the sea became too polluted for my dive business to continue, I could find other ways of earning a living easily enough, but I still feel someone should be making a fuss about protecting the sea. I'm not even asking "That was the most drastic people to be active in doing anything, just not to do anything that will harm the sea."

There may be hope for the future, though. Said Mr Miyayauchi, "The Thai tourists of today seem to be different; in fact, many Thai people have changed or are changing their ways.

"In the past, we could tell where a boat had stopped because we would find garbage, plastic bags, glass bottles, cans, all

"But recently, people seem to be improving their behaviour and treating the sea with more respect.

"We've just done some work at Koh Racha with a sea conservation group, from Bangkok, of all places. "We're also often

asked to do work with

Phuket Marine Biology Center (PMBC), which sometimes asks us for help if they don't have enough staff to do

some underwater work. "We're happy to help, although we do sometimes ask for money to cover our fuel costs."

Most of Mr Miyayauchi 's paying customers are from Japan, because, he says, Thailand offers diving that is superior to Japan's.

He explained, "The water in Japan is so cold, it's not good for diving, plus there is no beautiful coral to see as there is in Thailand.

"Phuket might not be Australia's Great Barrier Reef, but it's still second-to-none in the world as a diving destination."

He continued, "The Maldives have some very beautiful reefs too, because they are protected by strict laws and everyone cooperates to enforce them, but, that said, I think people's attitudes are far more important than any laws.

"We have laws for road users, but we still have lots of car accidents. Only when people realise that bad driving causes accidents will they stop driving badly. I hope they'll soon have a similar realisation about protecting the sea."



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






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One for the ladies

"There's also orange and pineapple, and these, combined with the Amaretto, mean there is no need to add syrup."

The cocktail is served in



a wine glass, which is appropriate, because, like most fine wines, it is not strongly alcoholic and is best appreciated when sipped slowly rather than knocked back.

And that's exactly what I did, enjoying the warming effect of the alcohol as my taste buds were entertained by the flavor, which was

sweet and sour, yet at the same time refreshingly bitter.

Method:

Put the ingredients in a cocktail shaker with three or four ice cubes and shake until well blended.

Pour into a wine glass and decorate with the pineapple slice, lime and mint leaves, and Maraschino cherry.


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




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Doing the Jakarta Jive

nyone who has seen the movie *The Year of Living Dangerously* — with a slightly wobbly performance by Mel Gibson as the Australian journalist caught up in the final throes of the Sukarno regime — might not count Jakarta among the list of must-sees. More recent events have put the Indonesian capital in the news for all the wrong reasons.

But step into Sailendra at the JW Marriott – which bore the brunt of the car bomb of just over a year ago – and the restaurant is all smiles and clattering cutlery and the heady aroma of openkitchen fusion.

Security has been stepped up, of course, but the boys in the peaked caps deliver a broad grin as they inspect the soft underbelly of your taxi with a mirror.

And everywhere else in the city there's a spirit of renaissance, epitomized by a building mania that seemingly wants to convert every spare square centimeter into yet another shopping center.

Jakartans love nothing more than strolling around a mall, occasionally dipping into the food court but otherwise simply hanging out.

And with the city's traffic mired in *macet*, as gridlocks are termed, every neighborhood needs its own retail romper room. Which is not to say that traditional markets are disappearing – if anything they seem to be enjoying a similar boom.






Two areas that reward extended exploration are Merdeka Square, where Bung (it means "brother", as opposed to "bribe") Sukarno erected a massive monument to independence.

The bauble at the top is supposed to be either solid gold, or coated with gold leaf, or just something shiny.

Ordinary citizens of a cynical frame of mind are wont to say it describes their condition in life – with wealth permanently out of reach. Jakarta's sense of humor remains untarnished, whatever the political situation.

With a new president now much culture-vulturing, remem-

To the east, Bafai Seni Rupa houses fine arts and there's also an interesting display of ceramics.

If all this sounds like too





If you fancy whetting your whistle, the Café Batavia on the north side of the square never closes, and is famed for its international dishes, its photo gallery of Hollywood stars, and the mirrored urinals in the gents' lavatory, though not necessarily in that order.

And if doing the Jakarta Jive gets to be too much – town planning still remains something of an abstract quality – there is always an avenue of escape at the city's biggest amusement park, Taman Impian Jaya, which translates as "Dream Land".

Its rides, parks and lakes are open 24 hours a day – though many attractions close at night – and all for a mere 7,000 rupiah – about 30 baht.





London, 2004, 232pp) Emma Larkin sets out to retrace the footsteps of Eric Arthur Blair, an imperial policeman in Burma from 1922 to 1927, who would later become George Orwell and write of his experiences in the novel Burmese Days.

Although Orwell died in 1950, 12 years before General Ne Win seized power in Burma and led it down the di-

sastrous "Burmese Road to Socialism", his novels Animal Farm and Nineteen Eighty-Four are regarded by Burmese intellectuals as prophetic of their nation's fate – the first two parts of a dark trilogy.

"The towns and cities where Orwell was posted span the geographical heart of the country and, in a sense, it is still possible to experience Burma as Orwell knew it – almost a half century of military

dictatorship has given it the air of a country frozen in time," Larkin writes in her

"But a journey through Orwell's Burma would lead through an even eerier and much more terrifying landscape:

n Secret Histories (John Murray, a real-life Nineteen Eighty-Four where Orwell's nightmare visions are being played out with a gruelling certainty."

> Thus, Larkin journeys through Mandalay, the Irrawaddy Delta, Rangoon, Moulmein and the hill station of Katha, which formed the backdrop to Burmese

> Larkin was uniquely equipped for the task, having mastered the Burmese language at London's School of Oriental and

> > African Studies. Her visits to Burma spanned nearly a decade, during which she spun an ever-denser web of contacts. She combines great sensitivity toward her interview subjects with highly poetic arts of description.

The book's subtitle -Finding George Orwell in a Burmese Teashop – is apt, as Larkin spends a lot of time in the ubiquitous teashops, talking with educated Burmese. In

Mandalay, she is even part of an impromptu Orwell Book Club.

Traveling as a single, Burmesespeaking woman, Larkin meets a wide range of people: students, professors, journalists, booksellers, pastors, engineers, vendors, waiters, retired Anglo-Burmese teachers, the many policemen who are keeping track of her, and even a sinister Burmese army colonel.

In a second-hand bookshop, she meets Kyaw Thein, Off the an elderly poet. "He was one of those courtly old Burmese gentlemen I met from time to time in Burma who spoke a By James Eckardt quaint old-world English and

had an air of sadness that lingered around hats made of palm leaves slid with them like cigarette smoke. Kyaw Thein recited a few of his poems to me there in the dingy upper reaches of the market, within the stench of an overflowing rubbish bin. They were beautiful and simple verses about love and loss and loneliness. 'I can only write love poems,' he said with some embarrassment. 'The censors warned me away from writing about anything else. They told me, "Bawa akyaung m'yah neh" – "Don't write about life."

Orwell once wrote about totalitarianism: "If you want a vision of the future, imagine a boot stamping on a human face – forever." There is a dreary sameness in the stories that Larkin's subjects tell, a constant refrain of futility and despair. But



"Dugout canoes glided along the river," she writes of the Irrawaddy Delta. "Bamboo groves were occasionally revealed, producing patches of luminous green light. A gaggle of people scampered across one open-

Massacres of minorities, forced labor, rampant drug trafficking, political prisons, economic destitution, rigid censorship, the complete ruin of education and medical care – it's all true. But Larkin is struck by the normality of life in Burma, people going about their business, laughing, talking, smoking cheroots, going to the movies.

'What did you expect?" a Burmese friend asks her, "That we would all be sitting around on the pavements crying?"

Nope. As I un derstand it, right now there's only one line between Phuket and Bangkok carrying traffic

for the CAT's HiNet and T-Net services from TT&T - and that line runs at 8 Mbps.

To put this in perspective, realize that anybody in Hong Kong who signs up for ADSL broadband automatically gets an 8-Mbps line. It's installed in days, sometimes hours, almost anywhere in greater Hong Kong, for the equivalent of a few hundred baht.

By comparison, all of Phuket's HiNet and T-Net bandwidth combined – for the entire island matches the bandwidth doled out to a single apartment-dweller in Hong Kong. Koreans get more. Singaporeans get a little less.

That same article says that CAT is planning to boost the connection speed for that line to 155 Mbps, sometime next year. Consider this: if the average apartment block in Hong Kong has 20 units on each floor, the implication is that Phuket's entire HiNet/ T-Net connection will (some day) have about as much bandwidth as one apartment building in Hong Kong.

TT&T and CAT have been selling a 2-Mbps service to consumers in Phuket for the past six months. How can they sell hundreds of 2-Mbps lines here in Phuket, but only connect them to one 8-Mbps line that runs off the

No person I have spoken to knows how many HiNet accounts have been sold in Phuket. I'm not a lawyer, but the whole situation stinks. My HiNet service has bobbed up and down for weeks. Much of the time, my nominal 2-Mbps line delivers only 300 Kbps – 15% of the rated speed. Sometimes I get 500 Kbps; sometimes HiNet simply doesn't work.

It now appears that TT&T and CAT have stopped installing new ADSL lines. I'm also getting rebuffed on all attempts at installing TOT lines, and would venture to guess that TOT is suffering from the same problems.

What can we do about it this ridiculous sitiuation?

If you have HiNet, and it keeps dropping out on you,

I've found that simply unplugging the ADSL modem, waiting 15 seconds, then plugging it back in again will bring the line back, at least occasionally. Other than that, I don't have any good suggestions.

About 16 months ago, prominent Bangkok politicians promised the people of Phuket that they would receive

cheap, reliable ADSL as a "Christmas gift". Although ADSL didn't arrive on the island until long after Christmas 2003, for six months or so Phuket really did have cheap, fast, reliable Internet access. Now we're staring at the Ghost of Christmas Past.

From what I've seen, demand for reliable broadband on the island is almost infinite – if the government can get its act together, the people of Phuket will rapidly absorb every available baud. We haven't even tweaked the nipple of the iceberg.

Most disappointing, from my point of view, is the idea that some people actually believe (as CAT's spokesman asserted) that one 155-Mbps line from Phuket to Bangkok will "make it unnecessary to create a direct link to the Internet from Phuket, as was previously planned."

From what I've seen, demand for reliable broadband on the island is almost infinite – if the government can get its act together, the people of Phuket will rapidly absorb every available baud. We haven't even tweaked the nipple of the iceberg.

As many of you know, an Internet backbone line passes within a few kilometers of Phuket. Patching into the line would require Herculean political effort, but if it were to happen, Phuket would suddenly be on a par with other Asian computer hubs. It'd put us on the cyber map. As long as we're tethered to a wimpy

Bangkok link, we'll all get thirdclass service.

In the meantime, the companies that were competing to bring cheap Internet access have been shoved out of the way. The government's 1,000-baht-amonth offering simply sucked up the entire bottom end of the mar-

Right now, I'm looking at Island Technology's ADSL service, as well as the ones from JI-Net and CS/Loxinfo. None of the options are cheap. But at least



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Up in the capital recently, Stool Pigeon noticed that the closing times were being strictly enforced in two of his old haunts: Nana Entertainment Complex and the dingy but lovable Washington Square area.

The action around Nana has spilled out from the Entertainment Complex right onto Soi Nana, where a number of new beer bars (new to Stool Pigeon anyway) now get going in the late afternoon.

When Stool Pigeon lived in Bangkok, the idea of heading down to Nana before 10 pm was unthinkable, but that was before they had the BTS – and it was also back in the days when most bars would, as a point of honor, stay open all night if just one punter chose to remain.

Although Nana bar owners are complaining about the 1 am closing, commerce in the area seems to have adjusted to accommodate the change: there were far more streetwalkers, touts, food vendors, flower children and time-share hustlers crowding the sidewalks than ever before.

Nana area, where ripoffs and outrageous overcharging tend to predominate. One Internet shop there has the audacity to charge 50 baht for 15 minutes - yet it was packed with foreigners.

When one considers that a good Internet café in Phuket City, like the plush AK Internet in Samkong, charges just 15 baht an hour, the price differential works out at a factor of more than 13:1.

But that's only half the story. The connection speed at AK Internet is also about 10 times faster than its competitor in the capital. Calculating the difference in megabytes/second/ baht (if such a unit exists), the factor would have to be more like 130:1— nothing the Nana shop can justify by having to pay higher rent.

InterNanational: But that's why Nana continues to boom: it has established itself as a central point in Bangkok where naïve foreigners, who either don't know or don't care that they are being ripped off, tend to congregate. Many of Patong's residents would feel right at home there.

The Nana area does have its positive points, though. The Thai word *nana* can be translated as "various" or "different".

In the case of Soi Nana, it is almost certainly an abbreviated form of the word nanachaad, which means "international".

The name is apt. On any given day, there are probably more international "financial transactions" taking place within a one-kilometer radius of the Nana Intersection than there are in the entire American state of Minnesota.

It's all pure foreign income, and it just keeps rolling in – no matter what the government does to try and regulate it.

Slow but steady

ust about everybody I talk to these days knows and understands the importance of a regular fitness program, and many dream of being strong, fit and healthy.

But one of the biggest myths doing the rounds is that one must exercise every day in order for it to be beneficial.

"Keep moving and be active," say the experts. "Daily activity is good for you." Of course

it is, but for some people this appears too much of a daunting task and, consequently, they do no exercise at

So just what should you do?

First of all, let's back up and deal with starting a fitness program.

Unless you have some past experience in fitness and have your own gym equipment, I

recommend you join a fitness club or hire a personal trainer to help get you started.

Just as important is to talk to the club manager, fitness instructor or personal trainer first. Ask what regime will be set for you in order to for you to reach your goals. Yes, you must have some goals - so write them

Twice-weekly fitness pro**gram:** One of the most common mistakes made is when people join a club and jump in way over their heads by training every day – sometimes for several hours a day – for a couple of months. They then giving up because they haven't seen much improvement and because they feel tired.

Giving up is a often a direct result of having undertaken the wrong fitness program. The body cannot take that degree of exercise day in, day out. People miss a day's exercise, then two days, then a week and before you know it, a month has gone. Then they stop altogether.

Good results can be achieved by doing just two 30minute workouts each week. This regime may not get you fit enough for the Olympics but it will make you fitter and leave you feeling good about yourself. More is better – obviously – but twice-weekly exercise works

and it may prompt you to do more when you are ready for it.

A typical twice-weekly program should feature:

•18 minutes of weight training including one or two sets of 12-15 reps of compound exercises - such as squats, deadlifts, lunges and bench presses - to work the major muscle

•12 minutes of cardiovascular exercise such as treadmill, bike, outdoor running, brisk walking or swimming.

Start off with a few minutes rest between the weighttraining sets if you need to. You will notice that as your fitness improves you will need less rest between sets.

You can effect a noticeable change in the exterior of your body in just 30 days, with reduced body fat and increased muscle strength.

There should also be some very positive changes going on inside you. These should include a lower resting heart rate, lower cholesterol, lower blood sugar levels and lower blood pressure – to a name just a few.

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Ignoring markets may be fatal

Phuket's Malaysian rival, Langkawi, opened its 71,400-square-meter Mahsuri International Exhibition Centre (MIEC) next to the island's airport some 15 years ago. Like the proposed Phuket International Convention & Exhibition Center (ICEC), it can host meetings of up to 3,000 people.

But apart from the Langkawi International Maritime and Aerospace Exhibition once every two years, a travel show and a car show, the MIEC has seen very little business – hardly the way to recoup the millions of ringgit the government invested. Had this been a private-sector project, one suspects it would have been mothballed long

The MIEC is perhaps an extreme example, but it does provide an example for those who believe that Phuket only has to build the ICEC to entice hundreds of thousands of people from around the world to line up and book space.

That dream is unlikely to be fulfilled. For a start, Phuket is coming from way behind. It would have to compete with such regional expo giants as Hong Kong and Singapore, which have spent decades building up their clientele and refining their products. Phuket would also face competition from Bangkok, with its well-established expo facilities, not to mention excellent facilities further afield in South Korea, China and particularly in Japan.

All these rivals have well-established supporting infrastructure – local transport, international flights and accommodation. Phuket does not. The roads to the favored sites are small and clogged. The airport cannot accommodate flights by the largest aircraft, so many visitors must come via Bangkok, adding hours to the journey.

The major concentrations of hotels in Phuket are nowhere near the proposed sites. Only one hotel near the Saphan Hin site could be described as being of international standard. The same is true of Mai Khao Beach. The proposed Chao Fa City site has, as yet, no hotels at all. Putting conventioneers up in hotels on the west coast would create a logistical nightmare.

It also has to be realized that the MICE (meetings, incentives, conventions and exhibitions) industry is at least as vulnerable – probably more vulnerable – than the tourism industry. While there will always be tourists who will brave or ignore economic uncertainty, health scares or terrorist threats, conventioneers and exhibitors stay at home in times of uncertainty.

Thus far, all discussion of the ICEC has been about the potential benefits to Phuket, but little has been heard about market research. That's an omission that must be rectified before the project - The Editor goes any further.

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

Police need to smarten up their act

raffic police in Phuket don't care about their duty. They turn up to direct traffic in front of schools in the morning, then they just disappear all day before returning when the schools get out.

Yes, they set up checkpoints [to collect fines], but they don't make a sustained effort at enforcing traffic law, which is their duty.

Senior police don't monitor on-duty traffic police these days. In the past, Superintendents had to make inspections every morning and find ways to solve traffic problems. I think every traffic police box should be monitored by senior police officials.

Ensuring that every driver has a licence is one requirement, but currently many police neglect to do this. It's common for officers to stop motorists, collect a fine, and then send them on their way. Some officers even say it's not their responsibility to keep unlicenced drivers off the roads – that the Transport Office are responsible for this.

But that's not true. Police have a duty to check all vehicles for this and other violations.

The majority of drivers here have little knowlege of traffic law. When issuing fines, police should educate violators as necessary, otherwise they will just keep making the same mis-

In my day, police were able to control traffic to a reasonable degree. I understand that there are a lot more cars on the roads now, but I still think they should be capable of carrying out their duties in this regard. Why shouldn't they? There are more roadsigns in Phuket now than ever before.

Phuket native Pol Lt Col Wijit Sanguansak, 78, retired after 58 years of service in the Royal Thai Police, where he served as an Inspector in Chumphon before finishing his career as Deputy Superintendent in Surat Thani. He is now on the Kusornlatham Foundation committee and also sits on the Governor's advisory committee.

He is now a vocal critic of local police, who he feels are failing in their responsibility to keep local roads safe.

He is also dismayed that the Chalong police have failed to investigate the destruction of a section of wall constructed by the Kusornlatham Foundation around the controversial 'paupers' graveyard' at Friendship Beach.

Also, police aren't sufficiently committed to punishing serious offenders, such as those who flee accident scenes. Police should investigate, pursue and arrest such offenders. They have the responsibility and authority to do this, but they seldom exercise it.

When I was stationed in Chumphon, I once arrested a policeman who ran over someone, killing him. I made the arrest myself, but when I took him in to the station, I was asked by the Superintendent to sign off his release on bail.

But I didn't do it because I didn't think it was right and might affect the investigation. After that, everybody understood that I did things by the book and left me alone.

But here there are seldom any arrests for hit-and-run drivers who kill people, and this just encourages people to flee accident scenes – because they aren't worried about the police.

And when the police do

catch people who cause accidents, they only fine them. It's no wonder there are so many repeat offenders.

The whole thing boils down to the police not being serious about controlling traffic. Last December, I was pulled over for not wearing a seatbelt. I had just pulled out of the Wachira Phuket Hospital parking lot when my mobile rang, so I hadn't buckled

I showed the low-ranking officer my old police ID card, but he gave me a 200 baht ticket anyway. When I got to the Phuket City Police Station they told me I didn't have to pay the fine, but I insisted on doing so just to show

Although I am an adviser to the Governor and have other important connections, I never try to use them in cases like this.

Another bad point of the traffic police is that the careers of officers who issue the most fines are fast-tracked. This creates a temptation [to write out as

many tickets as possible, in the easiest way possible].

Nowadays, the police are setting up more checkpoints than ever and fining traffic violators. They should also take away their licences and keep them until the violator has passed a test on traffic regulations.

When I was a police officer, we had to follow the the regulations closely when issuing fines and produce evidence. Nowadays it seems that everything is left up to the officers' discretion. And nowadays just about every officer has his own private car.

On television, police are always complaining that they don't get enough cooperation from the public. I don't think that's true. Most people are willing to give cooperation to government officers, as long as they get some back.

It's a two way street. If you aren't good and fair to people, how can you expect them to co-

I was assigned to Chum-

phon, Takua Pa and many other places where I didn't know anybody. I was even sent off to deal with communist insurgents, but I never had a problem establishing a rapport with the locals based on good faith.

Nowadays, [the police] are not creating public confidence, but rather resentment and even hatred.

I feel sorry when I go to meetings and the subject of the police is raised. When I say bad things about the police, they ask me "Hey, you were a police officer - why are you always saying bad things about them?" I reply that I am just speaking truthfully and fairly.

I have heard many visitors from Bangkok and other places complain about driving skills in Phuket. They wonder why people don't follow the traffic rules here, passing wherever and whenever they want and failing to stay in their lanes.

The police must get serious about their duty [and crack down on moving violations] here.

The other big problem is police don't bother making out reports for people – because they are too lazy. They only enter the evidence in the daily log "as evidence" [that something hap-

If I went to report something to the police and they refused to make out a full report, I would charge them with dereliction of duty under section 147 of the penal code.

But most people are afraid to charge police, because nowadays you see a lot of stories about police involved in crime and murders to silence witnesses. This is also a big part of the problems in the Deep South.

What should a copy of my passport show?

I was interested and disturbed to read in Issues & Answers in the Phuket Gazette of September 23, 2004, about the need for all visitors to carry their passports, or a copy, with them at all times.

I must confess that I was totally ignorant of this requirement, though I have been travelling to Thailand annually for the last 15 years or so.

I should welcome clarification on the following point:

Is it necessary for the copy of the passport to be made once one is in Thailand, so as to show the immigration stamp and date of entry? Or is it sufficient for a copy to be made outside Thailand, which would of course provide all the other identification details, as well as the visa?

Pol Lt Col Panudej Sookwong, **Superintendent of the Phuket Tourist Police, replies:**

You should get the photocopy of the passport made after you come into Thailand. That way we can check everything – name, nationality, date of entry, expiration date of visa and passport, last destination and so on. If you make the copy before you come to Thailand, we cannot check all this information.

If you are worried about losing your passport, you can leave it in the hotel and have the front office manager or another person in authority sign the photocopy and write his name and position on it to verify it is an accurate copy.

However, the Gazette notes that Honolulu the "photocopy rule" appears

Are the old traditions dying out?

Dear Momma Duck,

Before I came to Thailand three years ago – the first time I had ever visited the country – I tried to learn as much about the culture as I could from books and the Internet.

I don't know whether I misinterpreted the information I found, whether it was simply wrong or just out of date, but there were a number of Thai societal norms reported that I have rarely seen put into practice.

One example was to do with the eating of rice. I recall reading that it was customary to acknowledge the importance of rice by – almost as a way of saying "grace" - eating one spoonful of plain rice before launching into the rest of the meal.

In my time here, in many different settings, in restaurants and in the homes of Thai people all over the country, I have yet to see a single person do this. Is that custom simply "old-fashioned" now?

I also read that both the very young and the very old – but particularly the aged –are venerated in Thai culture. Apart from certain ceremonies carried out at Songkran, I have rarely seen the elderly being given a great deal

them, drivers do not stop for them at pedestrian crossings and they are often left sitting alone in restaurants while their families carry on around them. "Respecting the old" appears to be little more than empty words.

In contrast, during the times that I have enjoyed the company of bargirls for the night, hardly one of them has not, before retiring to bed, bowed and touched her head to the pillow thrice, as, I understand, practicing Buddhists are supposed to. However, the number of Thai girls I have known who did not work in bars never did this.

Isn't it ironic that these "working women", sometimes thought of as pariahs, are in fact keeping alive some of the old traditions, while the "good people" ignore them?

Dear Thomas,

Your observation is quite acute. I feel that during my lifetime there have been many changes in our practices, although the underlying beliefs remain similar. I suppose the activities you describe can be considered part of the "old fashioned way"

In the archaic form of Thai Doors are not held open for language, rice is called *Pra Mae* *Prosop*, which means "Mother Rice", and the ritual you describe was to show respect and think about how much effort and pain it takes for a farmer to grow

Today, we still teach our children about the way to eat rice

but the practice of eating a spoonful of plain rice to start a meal has fallen by the wayside, at least in the urban

Another factor is that most of the new, urbanized generation of Thais have never planted rice - or any other crop – and have probably never even seen farm work firsthand. They simply have no idea about the back-breaking

work of planting and harvesting

In Phuket, active rice fields are disappearing at an alarming rate and I can think of only a couple of places where you can still see rice in the fields.

With this lack of reality for urban Thais to witness, we cannot really blame them for not understanding the importance of rice. When I was young my mother always reminded me to finish the rice that was left on the plate, but the "throw-away" culture has certainly arrived, with little concern about taking only what you can eat. It bothers me

> when I see the amount of food wasted at big weddings in fancy ho-

As for the practice of respecting the elderly, that varies very much from one person to another, but I do agree that it is slowly disappearing.

However, as you have probably noticed, there is a big difference between the respect momma@phuketgazette.netand politeness

> Thais exhibit face-to-face with people they know and their behavior in public with people they don't know.

> All the examples you gave are from the "public" arena where we are often not as polite and respectful as you might see in the cultures of northern Europe or the Americas.

We don't stop for anyone at pedestrian crossings, much less for old people to cross. Indeed, you could easily cause an accident if you happen to stop abruptly at a pedestrian crossing, so make sure that you check your rear-view mirror first.

We're also not very good at queuing, although the idea is catching on in some banks and other places.

However, at home and in family groups and at occasions such as weddings or funerals, you'll see us being very respectful to the elderly

Regarding your comment about the seemingly unusual traditional behavior of bar-girls, the answer is really quite simple they tend to come from poor rural areas where most ritual traditions are still practiced.

Urban Thais tend to regard such practices old-fashioned, and not trendy.

My perspective is that what is in your heart and the way you live is much more important than simply going to the temple regularly, but traditional rituals have an important place in binding a community together.

And yes, I do indeed think that some bar-girls are "good people". They can be as "good" as any other group.

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Building cost hike led by steel shortage

PHUKET: Every first-year economics student knows that the primary cause of inflation – regardless of the commodity involved – is too much money chasing too few goods.

Phuket's current housing boom is a case in point and the same immutable law of inflation is having an effect on the prices of construction materials themselves.

According to Ratree Dubsoke, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Internal Trade Office (PPITO), the prices of many construction materials have risen by at least 5% in the past year.

In some cases, the rise in prices has been spectacular. Steel, particularly reinforcing bar, or rebar, has risen in price by around 38% in Phuket, with a

10-meter length of 12mm rebar that sold for 87 baht last year now selling for 120 baht.

Figures from MEPS (International) Ltd – a UK-based steel industry consultancy company that monitors steel prices and trends – show that the price of rebar worldwide increased by more than 45% in the first four months of this year. The price has since fluctuated but without stabilizing.

Indices for the Asian rebar market echo this, showing an increase of 34% in the year to April, with prices continuing to fluctuate since then.

A recent headline at the MEPS website, www.meps.co. uk, sums up the situation by saying that steel prices are "...unparalleled in recent history".

K. Ratree attributes the rise in the cost of rebar to increases

in the costs of the raw materials required for steel production. There has been a worldwide shortage of coke, necessary to fire the furnaces, and steel producers have passed on their increased costs to consumers.

But demand remains high in almost every market, especially Europe, Asia and the US, and the consumer is paying.

K. Ratree said the PPITO has checked with five steel-products suppliers in Phuket – those known to have supplies in excess of 100 tons of steel – and found that none of them is stockpiling rebar or other building materials in an effort to drive up prices artificially.

There has also been significant increases in the costs of other building basics, including one item commonly used in the Thai market – the 10m x 22cm x

22cm concrete foundation pile.

Prices in 2003 were 1,596 baht per unit, but 2004 has seen the price rise to around 1,703 baht, an increase of around 7%.

Although standard-sized concrete blocks of 39cm x 19cm x 9cm are, at 10 baht apiece, one of the cheaper essentials of most buildings, this price still represents an 11% increase on 2003 prices.

Surprisingly, the price of cement has not increased at anything like the same rate. "Tiger" brand cement, manufactured in Thailand by the Siam Cement Group, still retails at 122 baht for a 50-kilogram bag, the same price as last year, while the company's "Elephant" brand Portland cement sells for 137 baht per 50kg bag, an increase of less than one baht form last year.

The increased prices will

inevitably be passed on to the consumer, pushing up the prices of new homes.

One project manager, Kiertichai Keawbumrung, of the Royal Estate Park housing project, acknowledged the rise in prices of almost all raw materials, including wood, which, he said, had increased by between 30% and 40%.

"These rises have definitely had an impact on the cost of building, and the increased price of each [new] house will be have to be borne by the buyers.

"The government should help the construction industry by stabilizing the prices of, for example, steel and oil. This will help the industry and the consumer," he said.

Whether the government will heed such calls remains to be seen.

Europe will suffer from weak dollar

ast week's article covered, among other things, reasons for the current weakness of the US dollar. It was interesting to note that after that article was written, US Treasury Secretary John Snow came out with a statement on the eve of a 10-day visit to Europe and made the same points.

To recap, the US is not concerned with the rise of the euro against the dollar. The euro zone must do more to stimulate domestic demand by implementing structural reforms, especially to labor laws, as well as reduce taxation, stimulate private initiative and address the pension problem.

These are vital requirements that need to be addressed urgently. One look at the zone's economic growth statistics bears this out. The latest figures for the third quarter of 2004 show that the German economy grew by just 0.1% in the quarter and the Euro zone as a whole by only 0.3%.

Japan has announced its growth for the third quarter and it mirrored Germany, a meager 0.1%. This was well below expectations, but as machinery orders and industrial production figures had also caused disappointment, the lackluster GDP figures were no surprise.

However, while Mr Snow is correct in what he says, that is not the whole story. Certainly, most of the US current account deficit can be explained by low euro zone and Japanese domestic demand. This does not affect exports to the US, but it does affect exports from the US to those economies.

The US has two areas it must address. First: the budget deficit. This was acceptable in 2001 and 2002, and maybe in 2003 when the US economy was in a tight position and govern-

ment spending was a useful stimulus.

However, those days are past and government spending must fall so that the national debt does not spiral out of control. Many people point out that the war in Iraq is an expensive business, but at a projected cost of US\$130 billion for this year alone, it goes nowhere near explaining the massive deficit.

The second problem is social security costs. Mr Snow is correct that euro zone states must deal with the public pension problem. European demographics are frightening – and combining an aging population with a low birth rate and unemployment benefits for an average of 9% of the working age population, it is no wonder that the three largest economies of the zone are running unhealthy budget deficits.

France, for example, is trying to curb its budget deficit by using the proceeds of privatization. However, that is akin to using savings to maintain lifestyle. The long-term solution must be to increase income or reduce expenditure.

Returning to the US social security prob-

lem, the US is seeing its "baby boom" generation approach retirement. The US demographic situation is not as bad as that of most European countries, but it is still serious.

The US Federal Reserve has now released its minutes from its meeting on November 10. These, too, reveal concern about social security and the budget deficit, and this is not for the first time.

The real problem is that both the Republicans and Democrats continually avoid these issues because they do little to gain votes in an election.

At least in the US they have good economic growth, and that brings in government revenue in many ways, including higher corporate tax receipts. That said, the growth is still going to be insufficient to cut the budget deficit to a reasonable level.

In the meantime, the US dollar will continue to suffer.

European finance ministers are now muttering about intervening in currency markets to support the dollar, not because they want to save America, but because they are terrified that export demand could dry up with an expensive euro.

If the US dollar continues its slide against other major currencies, it is likely to fall further than most analysts are currently predicting. This is because markets tend to overreact, and currency markets are no exception.

In addition, many hedge funds and other currency participants are already "short" on the dollar, betting that it will fall further, and will increase their financial commitments if it proves to be a successful strategy. In fact, there may be a role for central bank intervention to boost the value of the dollar if only to create a two-way market and cause some speed bumps to appear on this downhill dollar road.

Aussies dominate Laguna triathlon

The Phuket Hash House Harriers – with swimmer Lee Horwood, cyclist K. Kirkkong and runner K. Annop, were the fastest team in the competition, completing the course in 3:06.12.

Fellow Thai team SGLP II, comprising Torsten Richter, Sukchai Kaotan and Andrew Jessop, came second (3:10.02), while the Phuket Water Taxi team of Bill O'Leary, Pichet Ponglang and Thomass Flindt, with a combined age of 103, finished in third place with a time of 3:21.52.

The first individual from Phuket to complete the course was Priwan Inkaew (3.26.31), who came in 74th overall.

300,000 join in mass aerobics

PHUKET CITY: An astonishing 300,000 people in Phuket took part in mass exercise sessions around the island on November 20 to honor Their Majesties the King and Oueen.

The Chief of Phuket Provincial Health Office, Wanchai Sattyawutthipong, told the Gazette that Phuket came second in terms of turnout out of 30 provinces with populations of 500,000 or less. Samut Sakhon was first.

At Surakul Stadium, Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura and 5,000 students, government officials and others gathered to get some exercise and, immediately afterwards, to mark the opening of the Phuket Games.

The Games are being held to decide which youth teams will compete in 22 different sports in the 21st National Youth Games, to be held at Chaiyaphum from March 20 to 30.

A total of 1,324 athletes

from 14 southern provinces are taking part in the Phuket Games, competing in athletics, badminton, basketball, boxing, bike racing, dancing, golf, handball, Thai boxing, pétanque, rugby, takraw, snooker, soccer, swimming, table tennis, tae kwon do, tennis, volleyball, beach volleyball, shooting and weight lifting.

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itsubishi Motors, along with its Thai subsidiary, Mitsubishi Motors Thailand, is to launch the locally-produced Grandis minivan under the name Space Wagon.

This will be the first time this model is produced outside Japan for the local market and for export.

The high-roofed "people carrier" was introduced by Mitsubishi in 1983. Confusingly, it was known as the Chariot in Japan, the Colt Vista in the United States and the Space Wagon in Europe.

The original Space Wagons had engines ranging from a modest 1.6 liters to 2 liters, but the latest model boasts a 2.4-liter unit producing 165bhp (121kW) with maximum torque of 217Nm.

Driving the front wheels, the power plant is mated to either a five-speed manual or a four-speed automatic transmission with "sports" mode. The shift lever is dash-mounted, so as not to encroach on passenger space.

Seating up to seven in comfort, the Space Wagon is unusual in that there is actually space for everyone – not the case with most of its rivals, in which the third row of seats is generally both near-inaccessible and suitable only for very short journeys.

The 2.4-liter motor features gasoline direct injection (GDI), a system pioneered by Mitsubishi and now licensed to a number of other major manufacturers.

Advantages of the GDI engine are improved power deliv-

ery, reduced emissions and lower fuel consumption.

It took Mitsubishi engineers several years to perfect the ideal combustion chamber and

piston shape to ensure full burn, and they had to try a variety of inlet tract designs before arriving at the optimum length and configuration.

In independent tests the GDI motors were found on average to improve fuel economy by an astonishing 30%. In addition, torque was increased by as much

as 10% and carbon dioxide emissions were reduced by 30%.

All of this seems too good to be true, but Mitsubishi stands by the figures and claims its GDI engines will meet standards as far ahead as 2010.

In terms of safety, the Space Wagon has been criticized by the influential EuroNCAP authorities, doing badly in the frontal impact tests, with the driver's airbag striking the occupant before it was fully deployed.

The latest Space Wagons are equipped with dual front airbags and front seat belt pretensioners.

The car scored well, however, in side impact tests, with the testers noting that "its occupants sit above where a conventional car may strike" and the Space Wagon "came close to scoring a maximum in these tests". It was also rated highly for pedestrian protection.

The Space Wagon is built at Mitsubishi Motors Thailand's plant in Laem Chabang, in Chon Buri, and the company aims to sell 400 vehicles a month in the Kingdom, with the rest of production being exported.

Mitsubishi Motors Thailand's President and CEO, Hisayoshi Kumai, said, "The new vehicle has been developed to meet the demands of a new generation of customers.

"It is the culmination of years of effort by our engineers, who have produced a car that offers emotional design, smart performance and stylish utility."

formance and stylish utility."

He added, "Thailand presently manufactures and exports the Strada and Lancer, and with the addition of the Space Wagon we are planning to begin exports as early as next year."

Obvious rivals to the Mitsubishi are the Honda Stream, (*Gazette* October 23, 2004) and the Ford Focus C-Max, although the latter is considerably more expensive.


The Space Wagon, however, was one of the first in this compact MPV segment and shows no sign of losing its dominant position in the market.

or luxury dining right by the beach, the Gekko Steak & Seafood Lizard Lounge at the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket is a wonderful setting.

Executive Chef Glen Roberts, from Australia, had worked in six other countries over 22 years before arriving at the Sheraton a year ago, but had never worked in Asia.

"I was pleased to have the opportunity to come to the Sheraton because I hadn't been to Asia before," he explains.

"I have worked a lot in Australia, where I prepared food for visiting prime ministers and royalty, including the Queen of England.'

At the Sheraton, Glen recently prepared a meal for Thai Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra and Malaysian Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmed Badawi.

They were doubtless impressed by both the choice available from the eclectic menu and the contemporary style of the restaurant, reflecting the natural beauty of the sea and sand in the background.

Guests can cook their own barbecue from noon until 8 pm every Sunday, for which four different styles of menu are available. Another popular option is the "choose your own salad", where staff bring a wide selection of fresh salad ingredients to the table and guests choose their favorites which are then freshly tossed and served with special dressings.

Naturally, however, there are also items on the menu that require diners to do nothing more than eat. Here's how to make a couple of them.

Lobster and Avocado Tian with Tropical Fruit Chutney For eight peeople

Ingredients:

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800g Phuket lobster; 320g avocado; 160g onion; 240g tomatoes; 240g double cream; 40g finely-chopped garlic; 160ml white wine; oil for frying.

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

Dreams of the Lizard

For the Tropical Fruit Chut-

300g diced papaya; 300g diced pineapple; 200g diced mango; 200g diced red onion; 20g finely-chopped coriander; 6 teapoons lime juice; 3 teaspoons fish sauce;

Salt and pepper to taste.

3 teaspoons sugar;

For the lemon dressing: 15g plain yogurt; 5g chopped coriander; 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice.

To decorate:

2 wonton skins; 30g lettuce; Fresh coriander.

Method:

Make the tropical fruit chutney by combining all the ingredients; leave at room temperature for 30 minutes before serving.

Make the lemon dressing by blending all the ingredients together well.

Poach the lobster, drain well and cut the meat into 1-inch cubes.

Cut the onion, tomatoes and avocado into 1-inch cubes. Mix these with half of the lobster meat

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and the garlic, cream and white wine.

Cut each wonton skin into two triangles and fry in hot oil until golden brown.

Place a small cake mold or other cylindrical object measuring about 3-4 inches in diameter on the plate and lightly press the mixed fruit chutney and lobster into it.

Remove the mold carefully and put the remaining lobster meat on top.

Decorate with the wonton skins, fresh coriander and lettuce leaves, with lemon dressing drizzled on the side.

> Lemongrass Soup with Pistachio Ice Cream For four people

Ingredients:

680g lemongrass soup; 240g pistachio ice cream; 40g mango; 40g strawberries;

40g kiwi fruit;

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8 ice cream wafers;

4 fresh mint leaf; 8 stalks lemongrass.

Rising in the East

CAPE YAMOO: Putting and chipping greens, tennis courts, massage and sauna facilities, and a restaurant and bar are just a few of the amenities that will be available to residents of Grove Gardens on Cape Yamoo, on Phuket's east coast.

Built as a "resort-style" residential development, Grove Gardens is close to both the Boat Lagoon and the Royal Phuket Marina, and all properties offer views of the islands of Phang Nga Bay.

Construction of the 36home development - which comprises 12 two-bedroom apartments, 12 three-bedroom apartments and 12 three/four-bedroom townhomes – begins next month with an expected completion date of April 2006.

The two-bedroom apartments – built in three blocks with two units upstairs and two downstairs – will provide 95 square meters of air-conditioned space comprising a living and dining area, kitchen and bathroom and 12sqm of balcony. Apartments also have common access to a roof terrace.

Lars Ydmark, managing director of developers Lertsat Phuket Co Ltd and property management company Tri-Asia, said that the properties should appeal not only to people looking for a home but also to those looking to invest in the vacation rental market. Tri-Asia will market the

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
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properties as vacation or longterm lets.

Fifteen of the 36 units have been sold off-plan, with demand being strongest for the 5.5-million-baht two-bedroom apartments – seven have been sold so far. The three-bedroom apartments are offered at 9.5 million baht and five sales have already been made. The townhomes three have sold so far - are for sale at 13.5 million baht each.

with Bloomin' Bert

Pride of place on Nai Harn Beach

he Bert belt has had to be loosened in recent times, and by quite a few notches. Some of my so-called friends have even accused me of becoming a bit of a bloater.

I feel that I have a valid excuse – I put it down to my recent change of allegiance from Heineken to Tiger.

The more cynical of those with whom I have been known to quaff the odd polite beer seem unconvinced by this argument, and put my ever-expanding girth down to the sheer volume of the stuff I consume, rather than quality or brand.

Whatever the reason, enough is enough – I finally had to admit that I needed some exercise. So I got off my behind and went over to Nai Harn for a walk along the beach, bound for the source of inspiration of this week's column - Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club.

I was met on arrival by K. Papan, the bell captain, who was keen to show me around the grounds. I was immediately struck by how proud he was of the gardens and everything that surrounded him.

This is a hotel where gardening has been transformed into rooms that all look exactly the

a passion, with the full-time gardening staff of 10 people working flat-out to keep the grounds – and everything else – looking spectacular.

All the hotel's rooms are set into the side of the hill, each with a sea view. Nobody likes hotel

same, and the Yacht Club has overcome this through the liberal use of bougainvillea (fueng faa in Thai). Every balcony has two or three of them, all in full bloom but in different colors.

The variety of colors on the balconies lifts every corner. This has got to be the plant that dominates the hotel – it's everywhere. I'm sure the hotel has every bougainvillea hue that's ever been invented.

As we continued our tour, it became apparent that not a single part of the grounds has been left untouched. They've even put plants on the roofs.

There are heliconias (thammaraksa) by the thousand. Not the quiet, subtle ones, but the vivid, dangling zigzag ones that grab your attention whenever you turn a corner. You can almost hear them snickering.

Even rock walls don't escape. Ferns and other bromeliads have been encouraged to grow in the most unlikely places. There are walls

that you would assume contain nothing of any nutritional value, and yet the gardening staff have been able to convince ferns that survival is actually possible. Indeed, these plants aren't just surviving – they're thriving. They look as though they're enjoying every minute of it.

The trees weren't touched when the hotel was built, with the result that there are now some majestically mature specimens around the grounds. Bromeliads have been introduced to these too, with some incredible ferns and spectacular orchids clinging on in the most natural way possible. These people know what they're doing.

Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club has a rather unique

way to honor its special guests – it buys them a plant, and puts it in the garden with a name plaque. K. Papan told me that some guests who come back year after year always enjoy seeing how "their" plant is doing.

In addition, just about every different species of plant is marked somewhere in the gardens with a plaque giving its name in English. Good idea.

There is one corner that has been devoted to more "useful" plants. Lemon grass, kaffir lime bushes and pandanus all grow with enthusiasm.

Guests are actually encouraged to sample them, and it's not unknown for the kitchen staff to pinch the odd pandanus leaf to wrap food.

There is also an area of aloe vera. Apparently, the hotel staff are quite used to acting as herbal therapists, dispensing cut leaves to those guests who have spent a little too long baking on the beach. A little of the gel from inside the leaves, when rubbed onto the skin, gives instant relief from sunburn.

At night, the gardens come alive in a very different way. Lights have been put inside many of the larger plant pots to amazing effect - fueng faa fully floodlit from the inside out.

I should do this more often. Who knows, I might even lose a little weight in the process. Where's next?
