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Life goes on

PATONG: Just five days after the tsunami hit Patong Beach, astonishing progress had been made with the clean-up of the resort town.

Tourists were back in the water or strolling along the sand, though the view was very different from the clutter that existed before the wave hit. With no beach chairs or umbrellas, one could see along the entire three-kilometer stretch of sand.

A few boats dotted the bright blue sea, flat calm after the massive upheaval on December 26, but gone were the jet-skis and para-sailing speedboats.

It was quieter, too, with no vendors selling soft drinks, no motorbikes, no rental cars and no tuk-tuks to disturb the town's new-found peace. It was almost as though the beach had been sent back in time to 20 years ago.

On the other side of the beach road, however, the damage from the tsunami was all too evident, with huge piles of rubble dotting the landscape.

Workers from Patong Municipality were working alongside employees of local businesses cleaning up the area around their workplaces.



Within days of the disaster, tourists were back on the beach in Patong and elsewhere on the island.

Sadly, many of the trees that were such a feature of the beachfront, offering welcome shade from the sun, were fated to die. Yellowing leaves carpeted the brown grass as too much salt in the ground took its toll.

Panu Maswongsa, Marketing Director of Patong Beach

Resort and Vice-President of Marketing of the Phuket Tourist Association, told the *Gazette* that the occupancy rate of the resort before the tsunami was about 70%, but after the wave hit, all the guests were moved to others hotels. The resort was closed for repairs and renovation.

"The water was about waist-deep and damaged guest rooms, the generator, the swimming pool and the air conditioning, so we will be closed somewhere between a month and three months.

"I believe the damage to Patong overall is about 30% – mostly the businesses next to the beach," K. Panu added.

Deputy Mayor of Patong Municipality Chairat Sukabal said that damage had been estimated at about 3 billion baht, and that it would take two months to restore the area, especially the beachfront.

K. Chairat said, "To repair the public infrastructure, such as fixing the roads, sidewalks and to "re-beautify" the area, we will have to ask for funds from the central government.

He added that whether jetskis and parasail operators, as well as rental vehicle operators and other vendors, will be allowed to ply the beachfront again was also a decision for the central government in Bangkok to make.

"We will hold a public hearing to ask for the opinions of local people about whether beachfront vendors should return," he added.

Kamala clean-up well underway

KAMALA: The small beach community of Kamala, on Phuket's west coast, is picking up the pieces left behind by the December 26 tsunami.

Kamala was the area on Phuket worst hit by the wave. There, it claimed some 65 lives, including nine foreigners, left 50 families homeless and damaged a further 200 homes. By December 31, the beach was mostly clean, but infrastructural damage was readily apparent, with large bites taken out of the beach road by the tsunami

The area behind the road was a scene of devastation. The wooden school vanished when the wave smashed its way across the main road and into the vil-

By December 31, the beach lage beyond. The nearby *wat* was mostly clean, but infraalso severely damaged.

Soldiers, Kamala council workers and local people worked hard to clear up the area, and Sajaphol Thongsom, Chief Administrative Officer of the Kamala Tambon Administration Organization, said that the beach was now clear and that tourists could come to swim and relax.

"A private company has been hired to clear away all debris and ruins by January 10," he said, adding that the tsunami had caused damage of about 1.2 billion baht in Kamala.

"I believe it will take about five years to restore the area [to its previous state]. About 30% of the total area of Kamala was Continued on page 2

damaged," he said. "As for the businesses in Kamala, I believe it will take no longer than two years for them to recover fully."

K. Sajaphol said that most business owners were not deterred from staying in the area, and that most of them wanted to rebuild their businesses.

K. Sajaphol added that Kamala would take advantage of the "ground zero" situation to regulate beach vendors and to keep redevelopment of the beach area under control.

TAT to launch drive to publicize recovery

PHUKET CITY: Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Governor Juthamas Siriwan said on January 3 that any delay in recovering from the December 26 tsunami will cost the country 10 billion baht a month in lost tourism revenue.

As a result, she said, "We are in a hurry to let people abroad know that [any danger from] the tsunami has already passed, and many tourist destinations [that were damaged] are recovering and are expected to be fully operational within a month," she said at Phuket Provincial Hall.

"We have to send out teams to publicize the facts about the damage and our recovery efforts, especially to places such as Sweden."

TAT officials would visit Sweden to offer official condolences for the many Swedish nationals who lost their lives in the disaster, she added.

"On January 24, media and tour agencies from Japan will visit Phuket. They will be among the first groups to arrive. We also have contacted Austrian media and have asked them to visit as well," she said, adding that, with good cooperation from everybody, the Thai tourism industry would recover soon.

The announcement followed some anger brewing in Patong about the depiction of the town by the media. A member of a Marine Security unit sent by the US Embassy in Bangkok to help with the clean-up, echoed those feelings when he said he was not happy with the media, especially TV, for showing only pictures of the damage.

'Many people have been helping to clean up Patong since the first day and many employees are back at work, but the television stations still show pictures of the damage. In fact, everything looks much better now. In Patong only [the beach] road and some hotels were damaged but the beach looks so beautiful.

"Why don't they update their pictures?" he asked.

Phuket Tourist Association President Pattanapong Aikwanich said, "People in other countries do not have the same information as us. They do not know that we are not a dangerous place that no one can visit any more. The number of booking cancelations is rising with this kind of news, which is terrible."

K. Pattanapong said the first priority is to clear up damaged areas so people could visit. He accepted that a lot of damage was done, but added that it could be quickly repaired.

"Karon, for example, suffered little damage, and there are many places in good condition. Even in Patong, there are businesses along the beach road that

are still in good condition, and the hotels are ready for tourists.

"The second priority must be restoring the infrastructure, such as power and water supply, and communications and Internet access systems, which I think will not take long.

"It will take a few months to get everything back to the situation before the disaster. I think most of the business owners who had their businesses totally destroyed can rebuild their businesses by themselves a little," said K. Pattanapong.

"But I think that the government must help them by cooperating with financial institutes and getting them to offer loans to fix damaged businesses."

Dive boss slams 'shameful' report

PHUKET: Dive operator Jeroen Deknatel, owner of Fantasea Divers and the live-aboard boat Ocean Rover, slammed US TV network CBS for a report in its evening news on January 3 that "paints the wrong picture about the true level of coral damage in the Similans."

He complained that negative comments were given undue weight in the news report, and that footage of undamaged reefs, shot after the tsunami, was misused.

"Footage was [used] in a 'before and after' arrangement that was not consistent with the real situation.

"All the beautiful 'before' footage shown by CBS was actually filmed after the tsunami," Mr Deknatel fumed.

"CBS should be ashamed of what they did here," he added.

At the time of going to press the Gazette was unable to get a comment from CBS.





DNA centers set up to help ID victims

PHUKET: The Scientific Crime Detection Division (SCDD) of the Royal Thai Police has set up three centers in Phuket and one in Krabi to facilitate the collection of DNA samples from relatives of missing people in an effort to identify the victims of the tsunami.

Wachira Phuket Hospital, Patong Hospital and Phuket City Hall are the island's sampling centers, while Krabi Meritime Hotel is the mainland center.

A doctor speaking from Krabi, who identified himself only as Dr Ongkarn, said that the procedure was simple, requiring either a mouth swab or a hair sample to be taken from relatives.

"Samples have also been carefully taken from the deceased, and forensic specialists have already begun the process of trying to match up samples," he said.

All samples will be sent to the SCDD headquarters in Bangkok for mapping, matching and storage.

Sompong Boonsri, an officer from Mai Khao Tambon Administration Organization explained that all the bodies currently stored at the Sea Gipsy cemetery at Mai Khao have been tagged with as much idenitfying information as possible and that records will be kept until identification can be made.

Bodies 'will be kept until identified'

PHUKET: Interior Minister Bhokin Bhalakula has stressed that the bodies of foreign victims of the tsunami will not be cremated or buried before they can be identified.

His announcement rescinded an earlier statement by Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura that burials would begin by December 30 at a site in Mai Khao.

Speaking at a press conference at the emergency center at Phuket Provincial Hall on New Year's Eve, K. Bhokin said the bodies of foreigners are now being kept in six cold storage containers at Mai Khao, on the left side of the main highway leading off Phuket, approximately one kilometer be-

yond the Tah Chat Chai police checkpoint.

The Minister said more containers were on the way, as more bodies continue to arrive at the site from Phang Nga.

"Victims' corpses will be stored so that they can be identified and returned to relatives for proper funerary rites, in accordance with their own religious beliefs," he said.

Central Internet resource set up for victim information

PHUKET: A central Internet resource for information on victims of the tsunami has been set up by the Royal Thai Police at www. csiphuket.com.

The police site, "The Official Thai Tsunami Information Center", has Thai, English, Japanese, Chinese, French, German and Spanish versions and contains long lists of people injured or found dead since the tsunami struck Ranong, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Trang and Satun.


There is also a section for posting details of missing people, and a links page listing a large number of other resources on the Internet relating to the disaster.

Pol Col Paween Pongsirin, Superintendent of Phuket City Police Station, said that at least 20 programmers from the Royal Thai Police, along with volunteers, are constantly updating the website from the Information Center at Phuket City Police Station. He explained that people can search not only for names but also for details about the injured and the dead.

"For example, we are including details such as rings on victims' fingers, photos of the deceased and locations where bodies were found."

The site warns that some of the photographs are "horrendous and revolting".

Col Paween added that at least 10 officers are on duty at Phuket Provincial Hall to receive reports from Thais or tourists about lost passports, ID cards or other personal documents.



TAT gets B20m to support tourists

PHUKET: The Government has given the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) permission to spend 20 million baht on supporting tourists in the six provinces affected by the tsunami.

Tourism and Sports Minister Sontaya Kunplome said the money would be used to finance

travel, accommodation, medical treatment and other support for foreign victims of the tsunami.

He added that Thais who had lost relatives are already receiving emergency payments of 10,000 baht each, while those who have been injured are receiving 2,000 baht each.





Khao Lak's terrible aftermath

> Before the tsunami, the road was lined with vegetation along much of its length. Now it affords an open view of devastation stretching kilometers.

A fisherwoman, K. Sawaad, told the Gazette, "I saw the huge wave come more than one kilometer onto the land. It was as high as the casuarina trees that lined the beach." She lost her home and two family members and now has nowhere to live.

In the days following the disaster, dead bodies awaiting removal were lined up in rows under a makeshift marquee, many with their limbs frozen through rigor mortis in grotesque positions. On several, arms and fingers point skyward as if frozen in a final, terrified plea to God – a plea that went unanswered.

The reek of rotting flesh from unrecovered bodies, min-

gling with mud and stagnant pools of seawater, permeated everything.

One of the many volunteer relief workers was Dusit Duangmanee, a teacher at Satree Phang Nga School.

He said local people who survived were still in shock for days after, with many refusing to come down from hillsides out of fear that more giant waves would hit the shoreline.

As the area was cut off from traffic and telecommunications were down following the disaster, rumors spread unchecked among the survivors, he added.

Some feared that a weapons armory in the Royal Thai Navy base in Tab Lamu, just south of Khao Lak, would explode.

Others attributed the waves to the wrath of Mother Nature, saying the disaster was punishment for disregarding the environment during the area's headlong rush to develop as a tourist destination in recent years.

Even among the least superstitious, the idea appears to have some eerie resonance; the devastation was so complete in many areas that it appears never to have been built upon at all.

As news of the devastation

finally began to reach the public days after the event, the rescue effort was brisk, with aid units arriving from all over Thailand and abroad.

But the task ahead of them was overwhelming. Official figures put the confirmed dead at 4,077, with 5,597 injured and 958 still missing.

Rescue worker Tiina Saarikoski of the Finnish Red Cross said some 200 Finns were still missing 10 days after the tsunami, and that a Finnish police team was still trying to identify

"Now we have completed our mission. We have got all the dead and injured Finns back to Finland. Now we are starting another mission, assessing the medical facilities in the area, possibly to help in rebuilding them.

"When I was first here on December 29, it was chaos. But now it is much better organized. The local people have done a great job here ... everything seems to be under control.

"It's nice to come back and see everything working so effectively."

Given the scale of the damage, the long-term prospects for Khao Lak are far less encouraging than for Phuket.

PHUKET: About 500 people gathered at Central Festival Phuket on the outskirts of Phuket City on New Year's Eve, in a somber and emotional candlelit gathering to remember those killed by the December 26 tsunami.


Interior Minister Bhokin Bhalakula, Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura and government officers also attended the memorial gathering.

Each person received a candle and a white rose. Songs, in both Thai and English, were sung to encourage survivors and commemorate those who died.

At midnight the candles were lit and there was a moment of silence for the victims.

In Patong, a couple of dozen people assembled on the beach to light candles. Couples hugged tearfully as they looked out at the sea from which the destruction had thundered in just six days

The numbers might have been greater had it not been for the heavy police and private security presence along nearby roads, with cars being prevented from driving into the area as part of measures to stamp out looting.



"On the first night we reopened there were only a few tourists who came to drink," she

said, "but tonight there are lots

of them.'

Her words were almost drowned out by the racket of firecrackers as bar owners sought to drive out evil spirits.

At midnight, fireworks were let off by a number of hotels along the waterfront in Patong and Kalim. Reflected in the calm sea, their beauty was eerily sad.

Candles lit in a hole dug on Patong Beach in remembrance of the dead are also a reminder of the fragility of life.



13 held for looting Patong businesses

PATONG: Police arrested 13 in it had been swept out onto the people for looting damaged businesses in the Patong area.

Pol Col Teeraphol Thipjaroen, the Superintendent of Kathu Police Station, told the Gazette that since December 26 his and four Burmese for looting.

"People engaged in theft at a time of crisis like this are subject to severe penalties and will not receive bail. They have already appeared in court and are now awaiting further hearings before the judge," Col Teeraphol added.

Under Thai law, anyone found guilty of theft "...by taking advantage of ... distress or calamity, or by taking advantage of public panic" faces imprisonment of up to five years and a fine of up to 10,000 baht.

He noted that the owners of a shop on the beach road had reported that some of the jewelry



he government will appoint Smith Tumsaroch, formerly of the Meteorological Department, to take charge of installing a tsunami warning system, in a bid to prevent a repeat of the catastrophe triggered by the killer waves of December 26, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra said.

K. Smith had been warning about the possibility of giant waves striking Thailand's west coast since 1993, but his warnings fell on deaf ears. Many ridiculed him, some even suggested that he was crazy.

K. Smith is to take the post of Vice-Minister to the Prime Minister's Office and will coordinate with local and foreign seismologists to establish a system suitable for the country, the PM added.

The prime minister pledged full financial support for a tsunami warning center in the Anda-

man Sea, saying his government could afford to spend the 1.2 billion baht needed to establish a system similar to those already in place in Hawaii and Japan.

"Warnings should not be limited to tsunamis and earth-quakes, but [the system should] also offer warnings of other calamities, such as storms and floods," said K. Smith, adding that the system would consist of seismographic buoys off the country's western shoreline.

Collateral damage: Softened soil could trigger landslides and sinkholes in the provinces overrun by the December 26 tsunami, the Mineral Resources Department warned, adding that it had sent geological survey teams to inspect the quake impact on the provinces.

tion abruptly left the Phi Phi islands after police searched them and found looted items on some of them.

Somkiat Kittithornkul, general manager of the Phi Phi Island Cabana Hotel, said some rescue workers were seen taking valuables from dead bodies.

A police search found that some 20 of the workers had valuables looted from the dead.

The looting prompted the provincial administration to deploy police to man the piers on the island and the mainland, in order to search rescue workers leaving the island and to check whether people had disguised themselves as rescue workers before boarding boats to the islands.

Many bodies had no identification cards or documents, mainly because their wallets were missing, said Pol Maj General Sermphan Singthong, Krabi's police chief.

No relief: Thieves stole donated goods from a relief center where the goods were being kept pending distribution to surviving villagers in Khao Lak, said Somkiat Boonprasarn, head of the donation unit operating in Phang Nga province.

K. Somkiat said there was insufficient manpower to prevent the theft of donated goods, adding that most officials were too busy with rescue operations to guard stocks.

DNA analysis: Two 24-hour DNA analysis centers have been set up at Bangkok International Airport and in downtown Bangkok to collect DNA

samples from relatives of those who were killed or went missing in the December 26 tsunami, to allow for match-up and identification.

The services were set up on January 1 and will run for at least a month, said Pol Maj Gen Chuan Vorawanit, head of the Scientific Crime Detection Division.


Thais and foreigners may have their DNA analyzed at the centers, which are located on the arrival floor of Terminal 2 at the airport and at the division's offices on Henri Dunant Rd in Bangkok.

Officials will collect hair strands and tissue samples from inside the mouth, analyze them and compare the results against the DNA taken from bodies believed to be those of relatives. Each analysis will take about two days to complete.





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get warning system

on the island of Koh Phra Thong in Phang Nga expressed concerns about the fate of about 40 rare sambar deer living on the island, where fresh water in natural reservoirs had been turned salty by seawater from the giant waves that swept the province on December 26.

"The deer are becoming thinner and lethargic," Neramit Meepien said. He called on animal lovers to help save the deer He said that only 40 sambar deer lived in his area, co-existing in harmony with locals.

"We have always taken care of them and prevented outsiders from hunting them, but now they're facing death after the giant waves," he said.

State of alert: Despite the agony of Thailand's Andaman coast provinces, armed separatists have been plotting coordinated attacks in the three southernmost provinces to mark the first anniversary of their violent insurgency, intelligence sources

"They have targeted checkpoints and security force bases.

Bomb and arson attacks against schools and government agencies are also planned, the sources added.

The ongoing separatist violence, which has killed more than 500 people, erupted a year ago with an early January raid on an army camp and the torching of 20 government schools.

The intelligence sources said they and their colleagues had called on all relevant agencies to step up their security measures and to be on high alert.

Cracking up: Villagers in Nakhon Sri Thammarat found a huge crater in the ground, which was probably caused by last week's big earthquake in

The crater which is four meters deep and seven meters long, was found by Boonsit Dechthim near his home in Krung Ching district.

Officials from the Department of Mineral Resources inspected the crater and said it was

Salt licked: A village headman They plan to use heavy weapons almost certainly caused by the Indonesian earthquake on December 26 2004 that triggered the tidal wave.

Park damage: The financial damage caused by the tsunami to seven marine national parks off Thailand's eastern coast in the South is estimated at over 200 million baht, according to the Permanent Secretary for the Natural Resources and Environment, Petipong Pungbun Na Ayudhya.

All seven national parks have been closed indefinitely and are facing a lack of drinking water and ecological impacts of the tsunami on local marine life, K. Petipong said.

Sixty-six Thai and foreign tourists were killed in the seven national parks, including Bok Kharanee National Park in Krabi and the Chao Mai Beach in Trang province.

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
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
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

I went to Encore Café, which thankfully is in the second row of shops on the beach front, and evacuated the two staff cleaning the restau-

By the time we locked the front door, the waves had breached the sea wall and I drove the two on my motorbike along the sidewalks.

The wave tomer to the beach on my motor- knocked motorbikes, people, and trees down. I took the staff about two miles away and left them to be picked up by their families. I couldn't return by the same way I had taken to get there, so I took the water is as flat as glass – but a circuitous route to get back to

Lai Thai, which, at 800 meters from the beach, was safe.

I returned to the beach area to make sure that Encore was still standing and secure. By then the first set of waves had passed and the entire beach road was filled with trees, driftwood, pieces of boats and even huge boulders and concrete blocks. Mud and silt, a foot deep, was everywhere.

I then heard a lot of yelling and saw – a mile or so out at sea - the second set of waves approaching. Everyone ran like

The stories of death and destruction caused by the second set of waves are too numerous and grim to recount here, but one must look at the positives and one thing is for sure: The Ao Nang sea wall – built three years ago and roundly criticized at the time for its design and construction quality – saved many lives and prevented even more damage.

The beach immediately north of Ao Nang, Haad Nappora Thara, doesn't have a seawall in place; the foundations were just being laid.

That beach and its buildings were severely damaged, with longtail boats and concrete pilings from the seawall flung across the beach road like toys.

After the initial adrenaline rush finished – about 24 hours after the event – we faced the task of cleaning up and taking care of the injured and homeless.


Ao Nang is the administrative headquarters for Phi Phi Islands, which, by all accounts, were destroyed - Phi Phi Don pretty much cut in two by the tsunami. The death toll, if one can ever be accurately assessed, will be terrifying.

The survivors and corpses are being brought onto Ao Nang Beach to be taken to the hospital, with the evacuation of the latter discreetly taking place at night.

All the schools have been closed to house the homeless, and we are all involved in providing food, clothing and blood to the local hospitals.

Several international relief efforts are in operation, as well as locally-based ones, centered around and for Krabi Hospital. Since many hospitals in Phuket are full, there has been an added burden on the local hospitals

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
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How to cope with

The advice on these pages was provided to the *Gazette* by Carol Marco, a member of the British Embassy team at the emergency center at Phuket Provincial Hall. Although it is naturally rather general in its scope, it will, we hope, be of use to those suffering loss from the tsunami, and to those trying to help them.

Breaking bad news by telephone

ADVICE

Purpose:

To inform next of kin, in a sensitive manner, of a death or serious injury or other bad news and to offer sincere and thoughtful support.

To assign a designated person to support each family. This is an important relationship that may continue for some time

Objectives:

- Give information promptly and clearly;
- Deal sensitively with reactions
 one's own as well as others';
- Anticipate and manage difficulties:
- Offer support and compassion.

Preparation:

- Rehearse the call what to say and how to say it;
- Ensure you have the correct names of the victim and next of kin;
- Gather as much accurate information as possible: time, place,

and what happened, for example;

- Use a quiet place;
- Allow for sufficient time up to half an hour;
- Ensure there will be no interruptions;
- Anticipate emotional reactions, such as anger, distress, silence, denial:
- Anticipate difficult questions;

Follow-up procedures:

- Have contact names and numbers to hand;
- Schedule possible times for follow-up phone call;
- Compile a log sheet;
- Prepare yourself consider your own likely reactions.

The phone call:

Purpose of call:

- To provide information clearly and sensitively;
- To offer support and compassion:
- To handle reactions.

Responses to call:

- No reply: keep trying;
- An answering machine: state your name, that of your organi-

zation, give contact number. Say it is important, but sound calm.

• Someone other than next of kin: Determine relationship. Make every effort to find out how to contact designated next of kin immediately without being alarming.

If this is not possible, leave message as per answering machine. If respondent is not the named next of kin but is close, such as siblings, parent, adult son or daughter, they may press you for information. Use discretion.

The person will quickly sense that there is a serious problem just by the fact of your calling and may attempt to leap to conclusions for which there is no basis.

Breaking the news:

- State your name and that of the organization you represent;
- Ensure that the person you are speaking to is next of kin or an appropriate substitute;
- Say that there has been a disaster and that you have bad newss;
- Ask if there is anyone else there to offer support:

- Give news clearly and concisely, without going into detail;
- Allow time for reaction.
- If respondent becomes silent, stay on the phone for as long as is necessary in order to begin talking again;
- Offer support and sympathy;
- If possible, fill in details by answering their questions;
- Give any further necessary information. Remember that the person is shocked; you can give more information later.
- Give only information that has been confirmed. Do not be pressed into saying more than you are sure of. You can say "We don't know that yet."
- Ensure the person has understood;
- Check again about support. If the respondent is alone, ask whether he or she can phone to other family members or a support network, or offer to do so yourself;
- State what support you can offer and give a contact name and number;
- Say what your initial procedures are:
- Ask if the respondent has any initial instructions or wishes;
- Arrange a time to call back;
- Ensure that this happens, even if there is no further information;
- Say that you will write with all relevant information and contact numbers. Ensure that this is done immediately;
- Log details of the call.

Afterwards:

Review the call with a colleague;

- What did I do well?
- What could I have done better?
- What will I do differently next time?
- How do I feel now?
- Would it help for me to talk to a counselor?



Picking up the pieces after the tsunami may take weeks or months – but coping with the mental effects could take much longer.

- What follow-up action needs to be taken: logging the call; the follow-up calls; the letter detailing contacts;
- Confirm who will do this. Ensure it is done:
- Maintain your relationship with the designated family for an appropriate period of time.

Coping with loss and grief

The shock and pain of loss trigger a range of powerful and frightening emotions.

The death of a parent, partner, child or other close person is the most desperate loss that we may ever have to cope with.

The intensity of our feelings and our ability to cope with this kind of loss will depend on various factors, including our degree of attachment to the person and the circumstances.

Numbness and disbelief are often the immediate reactions to a death.

A newly bereaved person may deny what has happened and continue to behave as if the dead person were still alive, for example, shopping and cooking and making arrangements as usual.

The bereaved may feel guilt, self-reproach and remorse: "If only I'd taken better care of him/her; been a better spouse; been more sympathetic; spent more time with them" and so on.

Feelings of rage and anger can also take the bereaved by surprise: "How could she/he leave me alone? How do they expect me to cope?"

The bereaved can be left with a great sense of insecurity and fear, sometimes expressed in panic attacks. The sense of being lost and alone is very frightening and a great yearning for the loved one can be almost overwhelming.

Many people feel a powerful urge to return to some of the places they knew with their loved ones, almost as if they will find them there.

Feeling the presence of a lost person, dreaming of them, imagining they are still at work or in another room, hearing their voice or sensing their presence is not a sign of madness but a very common experience.

The need to talk over and over the events leading up to the death, as if somehow they could be altered, is also very common.

Many people feel needlessly ashamed of their reactions and are discouraged from honestly expressing their painful thoughts and feelings. The fear of "cracking up" or "giving in" often forces people to deny their true feelings – even to themselves.

Well-meaning friends and relatives, often supportive during the first few weeks or months, soon expect to see the bereaved person "getting over it" and urge them to cheer up.

Fear of upsetting children and other family members can force people to put on a brave face and to submerge their grief. This is always damaging. Unresolved grief or inability to resolve emotional tension can result in stress-related illness.

It is estimated that one-third of those who lose a spouse develop health or emotional problems, including loss of sleep, loss of appetite, headaches and general lassitude and tiredness.

A sort of plateau of hopelessness, characterized by depression and apathy, complete exhaustion and even a wish to die, may come sometime during the first year of bereavement, before even the first glimmer of hope and acceptance begins to dawn.

The four tasks of what Freud termed "grief work" are:

- To truly recognise and accept the loss:
- To mourn the loss, giving expression to the grief;
- To perform the new tasks of life that the loss obliges us to take on;
- To look to a new kind of future.


Progress through grief is not orderly. You may feel stronger on some days and then suffer a return to periods of hopeless tears.

There is no timetable according to which the bereaved person will finish grieving and feel better. The whole process may take months, a year or several years.

The emotions of grief, painful though they are, lead to acceptance and healing.

The purpose of grief is to allow a bereaved person to come gradually to an understanding of what the loved one meant to them and an acceptance of a new and meaningful life.

ormally, this column starts off the year with a sermon as to why you should make a New Year's resolution to begin a weight training program - if you are not already on one.

The list of reasons is extensive indeed, spanning the range of "wellness" (I can't believe I actually used that word), from increased self-confidence all the way to protection from heart disease.

Images from Phuket broadcast around the world of the December 26 tsunami disaster show another important reason to lift weights – being fit can save your life in times of emergency that require strength and endurance for survival.

In one case, video footage captured by a Norwegian man and aired on the BBC caught one victim being swept by the tsunami surge though what appeared to have been the pool area of a hotel in Kamala.

The guy was shown grasping a railing with difficulty but then, using all his strength he somehow managed to pull himself up from the torrent to what appeared to

vived in the end – we can only hope that he did – but if he did manage to survive it was in part because of he had the required level of strength and fitness to save himself.

Other images, of people clinging to trees for dear life, also bear out the need for strength and endurance when your life is on the line. It's no wonder they train military recruits the way they do. But unlike pimple-faced army recruits getting ready for their first tour of duty in Iraq, most of us here in Phuket have to be our own drill sergeants when it comes to getting down to the strenuous business of exercise.

Events like a tsunami are, thankfully, few and far between. But other examples of how strength and fitness can help to minimize injury caused by accidents abound.

Falls from motorcycles result in fewer bone fractures

among those whose bones are strengthened through weight training and proper diet. Lean muscle mass is also the best protection from trauma and protects the inner organs from dangerous

The improved balance and flexibility afforded by weight training and stretching also helps one to move with greater swiftness and agility, thereby giving one heightened ability to stay out of harm's way in the first place.

It's not just in terms of accident prevention that weight training pays big health dividends; it can also help reduce chronic injuries, such as lower back pain that occurs when stabilizing muscles are allowed to atrophy and grow out of balance – for those who have never experienced it, living with lower back pain is like living in hell.

The tsunami has caused untold stress and suffering on Phuket; no doubt many of us have found ourselves having to abandon our fitness routines for some time.

In the aftermath of the tsunami, we at the Gazette found ourselves working furiously in

front of the computer late into the night, chain-smoking and eating junk food, our brains becoming zombified in computer-monitorinduced blotto state. Then, when the end of the day finally came, downing bottle after of bottle of Heineken to wash away the pressure and induce sleep.

The result in my case? Three kilograms of added flab in less than a week – most of which wouldn't exist now if I had just been able to keep up with my one-body-part-per day weight

I did a crash course of all three phases in three days in Hiroshima, staying at a minshuku, one step down from a traditional inn or ryokan.

At first, everything seemed cute. I and the clerk at reception just about managed to communicate: he wrote down the price and I paid him the money. That I had to walk down two floors from my room to the bathroom, in specially provided slippers, was quaint.

So was the room-key with a wooden tag the size of a soup ladle, the television populated by umpteen channels of gabbling, hissing, bowing strangers, the pun-

gent smell of the rush matting floor, my patterned yukarta, a dressing gown that could be worn in the street (or so said the book of regulations in my room), and the gurgling juggernaut that dispensed green tea in the communal dining room.

I slept fully content. As fellow guests – students on a bibulous break - clattered down the corridors late at night I smiled indulgently, remembering my own college days, and slept dreaming of Madame Butterfly and samurai aboard a shinkansen, the ultra-Japanese bullet train.

I woke with a crick in my neck and a pressing need to rid myself of the by-products of several cans of beer, bought from the ubiquitous vending machine in the lobby as a nightcap. Rather than

being able to swing my legs over the side of the bed, I had to lever my entire 90-kilo frame into the vertical with no assistance from the forces of gravity.

Down in the bathroom a list of rules illustrated by smirking little twits devoid of genitals dictated that I had to sit on a tiny stool to shower before actually getting into the bath, and dry myself with a minuscule towel.

I had to climb those damn stairs again and bend down to pick up my clothes. The prospect of green tea for breakfast was a

cultural bridge too far and the dining area had the air of a prison visiting hall. Staying at this noisy, inconvenient, foreign establishment had been an act of madness on my part, I decided.

But by the third day of residence I was starting to find my feet. I rolled up my clothes into a pillow. The green tea juggernaut had a hidden button which dispensed simple hot water that could be added to Nescafé or Earl Grey tea.

I extricated the room key from its cudgel. The shower had a nozzle halfway up the wall, so I booted the stool out of the way and washed myself and then sat in the tub up to my neck in hot water till I tingled.

Rather as the Japanese take English words and adapt them for their own use – transforming hotel into *hoteru*, and making room service into the exotic-sounding cocktail *rum-sabis* – I'd made my minshuku ryok-an-roll. And it was a hell of a lot more interesting than yet another chain hotel. And a damn sight cheaper.

t age 73, John le Carré has just published his 19th novel: *Absolute* Friends (Hodder & Stoughton, London, 2004, 383pp). It is among his very best, right up there with his early Smiley tril-

Le Carré was among the earliest and most passionate opponents of the Iraq War – writing a long and cor-

rosive letter to The Times of London – and that passion shows through in Absolute Friends. It is a grand, sweeping tale that covers 35 years in the friendship of Englishman Ted Mundy and German Sasha, from the heyday of the radical student left in 1969, through the last decade of the

Cold War leading to the fall of the Berlin Wall and onward to the aftermath of the American occupation of Baghdad.

The story is told from the point of view of Ted Mundy, born in Pakistan to a drunken British Army major and an Irish nursemaid on the day in 1947 that Pakistan came into being. While studying German at Oxford, he falls in love with a radical Hungarian named Ilse, who spurns him as having a "completely bourgeois heart" when he proposes marriage, but she puts Mundy on to Sasha, a radical student leader, when he transfers to Kruezberg University in West Berlin in 1969. "We're looking at the oldest America in the book," Dimitri tells Mundy. "Puritan zealots murdering savages in the name of the Lord - how do you get older than that?"

The ending is a shocker. Even more shocking is the media spin that the new American order gives to it. Le Carré's galloping, luminous, impassioned prose, along with his cruel irony, have never been put to better use.





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Looters must be stopped

The tsunami that struck all along Thailand's Andaman coastline brought terror, horror and heroism. Not the cinematic kind of heroism, but the dogged, never-give-in type evinced by volunteers, from those who fed and clothed the bereft to those who carried out the grisly task of retrieving and wrapping the dead.

The vast majority of people, whether victims or helpers, have responded in the best manner possible, helping those less fortunate

But amid the heroism were dark tales of stark, cynical avarice, as opportunistic looters descended on the devastation like so many

Witnesses have told the *Gazette* of gangs in four-wheel-drive trucks driving through the carnage along Patong's shore, stepping over bodies to plunder shops and homes.

Gold shops, naturally, were a prime target. Once one or two people had smashed their way into a shop, others followed, with near-mob scenes developing. There were also reports of Westerners joining in the free-for-all.

In Khao Lak, one particularly disturbing incident was reported to the Gazette: a looter frisking the dead. Flipping open one victim's clothing, he extracted a wallet, took 5,000 baht from it and stowed the money in his pocket, then made a leering wai to the corpse and thanked it for its contribution.

Walking away, he tossed the wallet away. Not only had he stripped the victim of cash and dignity; by throwing away the wallet he had also stripped him of his identity. One more family, probably, may never know what happened to a father, brother or son.

What was particularly chilling in this case was that the looter was an officer in uniform.

At the scenes of most major disasters, one function of the army is to protect people's possessions. Often, orders are given to shoot looters on sight.

In Khao Lak, police have been checking vehicles leaving the area laden with possessions in an attempt to prevent looters carrying away the possessions of others. But no one, it seems, is stopping the looting at source. Urgent action must be taken to do so. Looters, in their unconscionable greed, heap more misery upon the already unimaginable misery of those in the stricken areas.

One senior police officer was quoted in the media as saying that anyone caught looting would be arrested and denied bail. That's not enough. Anyone found looting should, perhaps, be given the courtesy of a warning shot. But those who persist in this vulture-like pursuit should be shot. Dead. - The Editor

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



the government's disaster website, www.disaster.go.th, to load, and I couldn't drill down to individual pages because the connection kept timing out. I couldn't even log on after 6 pm – all the lines were busy.

Representatives from Thailand and several neighboring countries will be meeting soon in Bangkok to discuss some sort of mutual disaster warning system. That step's long overdue, as the Sars debacle amply demonstrated.

But what about Internet access in Phuket? Where's the government's plan to finally give us fast, reliable, always-on Internet service? I'm not talking about the tin-can-and-string approach we're suffering from now. I'm talking about fast, free wireless Internet everywhere on the is-

In terms of disaster preparedness, that has to be at the top of the list. Everyone in Phuket should be able to get on the Internet to get the latest official news, to locate missing friends and relatives, to send and receive email, to get weather reports, and to find information that will quell rumors and save

Accurate information delivered widely and quickly would give people what they need to make good decisions.

Permit me to offer an example. The day after the tsunami hit, I was in Central Festival, trying to buy a mobile phone. About 6 pm, people started leaving in droves, literally running for the exits. Most of the shops shut down. A panic had taken hold.

Why? There was a rumor that another tsunami would hit within an hour, due to a 6.1-magnitude earthquake off Langkawi.

Absolutely preposterous crap. First of all, there was no earthquake off Langkawi, as a quick search on Google or the Earthquake Information Center (neic.usgs.gov) would verify.

Second, an earthquake that measures 6.1 on the Richter scale would shake a few buildings, but it wouldn't cause a tidal wave a fact that could also be verified at the EIC website (The Richter scale is a log scale; a level 6 earthquake is only one-thousandth as powerful as a level 9 earthquake).

Third, it would take much less than an hour for the shock wave to hit here, as a glance at any map would confirm. And so

I'm certain that the people who locked down their shops and fled Central in droves wouldn't be swayed by the facts. Rumors take on a life of their own, and fear rarely succumbs to reason.

But if the facts were readily available, perhaps people would think twice before falling for such incredibly stupid rumors.

San Francisco. Philadelphia. Taipei. Dozens - more likely hundreds – of cities are rolling out plans for free, universal, fast wireless Internet. The politicians in such areas cite emergency preparedness as a big factor in delivering reliable broadband Internet to everyone.

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Stockbrokers expect speedy recovery

PHUKET: Despite the initial shock of the December 26 tsunami on the Thai stock exchange, locally-based stockbrokers are confident that local investment levels will recover within the next quarter.

Arpa Kiewkacha, who chairs Adkinson Securities' Executive Board, said that the Adkinson branch in Patong, which on average manages investment totaling about 300 million baht, had suffered a 5% fall in its total investment level, and said she believed the fall could increase to 10% over the next few months.

However, she said, "Stock market investment will be better after the first three months of 2005. More customers will be investing with us. That's why we set up our second branch [in Phuket]."

K. Arpa said she is confident that the Patong branch will also attract new clients in the coming months.

"We expect to attract new customers in business in Patong, such as hotels and restaurants. Our existing customers at Patong are foreign residents and people who invest through us over the Internet.

"[Currently] only a few of our clients [at the Patong office] own tourism-related businesses, such as entertainment venues and hotels. So we have not been affected that much.

"The tsunami will only delay investment, and we will still have investment from foreign residents and business owners who have not been affected by the tsunami," she added.

"I am not worried about Phuket as the

government is now hurrying to revive the [local economy] to what it was before the tsunami. Phuket is an economically important province, so it should [be helped to] recovery within a few months."

Trinn Pattaranukrom, manager of both the Patong and the Phuket City Adkinson branches, shares a similar outlook, even though he said that after the tsunami hit that the total amount of investment in the stock market from Phuket plummeted by 30%.

"Investment from clients at the Patong branch has slowed down and could possibly stay low until the low season, but tourism should be back at its peak by next high season," he said.

Thitima Dilokpat, Phuket Branch Senior Manager of brokerage National Finance plc (NF), also believes the situation will improve as 2005 unfolds, with more investors placing investment.

In particular, she said she expected NF to improve its market share. "This will depend on our marketing as well," she said. "We are trying to expand our market share and gain new customers, such as [owners of recently established businesses]."

K. Thitima said the major factor determining the level of investment was the performance of national economy. "It has been forecast that this year the gross domestic product (GDP) value will fall. However, stockmarket investment will remain attractive as it will continue to earn more interest than savings in banks," she said.

Thaveechai Harijuntanawong, Phuket Branch Manager of Kim Eng Securities (Thailand) plc, was more cautious with his outlook for the short term. "Just after the tsunami, stock trading in Phuket on the day was stopped and the total trading value of Thai stocks has since gradually decreased," he said.

"The economic situation in 2005 is difficult to predict because the tsunami happened in economically important provinces of Thailand.

"This will effect GDP. It depends on the central government and how soon it moves to effect a recovery."

However, K. Thaveechai remained optimistic long-term. "Although we can't predict the economic situation for 2005, we will keep our 25% of market share in Phuket.

"And if the economy gets back to normal, we may even increase the amount of investment placed with us to 700 million baht or even a billion baht," he said.

he initial reaction of everybody to the recent tsunami was shock. The second reaction was, for most, what can I do to help?

It is extreme situations that often bring out the best in people, and the residents of Phuket, of all nationalities, were no exception.

It has been a terrible tragedy, on a scale that previously was unimaginable.

For the business community, it has quickly become apparent that an assessment of the situation is necessary. This applies not only to business owners but also to employees.

Phuket's economy, as we all know, is based principally on tourism and the effect of what has happened is going to be substantial. How substantial is anybody's guess. Tourism is based on an image. The image has not been destroyed, but it has been damaged.

Television reporting certainly has allowed the world to know what has happened but at times it has descended into sensationalism and unfortunately some outright lies.

For example, statements have been made by staff of television stations that "Phuket is in tatters", "has been totally destroyed", and the like.

One journalist interviewed on CNBC for a related financial newspaper even said that he had written an article on how the pools of water from the tsunami would lead to outbreaks of malaria. This journalist has obviously made a scientific and medical discovery: mosquitoes apparently now breed in saltwater!

This is a subject that has been stressed frequently by all television channels, the threat of

the outbreak of disease. Unfortunately, these statements are made on such a sweeping basis that to viewers it appears that the whole area is about to suffer from life-threatening diseases.

Phuket has had a lot to contend with over the past decade, starting with the 1997 Asian financial crises, the 9/11 tragedy, the Bali bombing, Sars, chicken 'flu and the war in Iraq. The effects of each event faded away and tourist numbers have increased.

This event is somewhat different; tourists will not come in the numbers that Phuket needs to maintain its relative affluence if tourists believe that it is a disaster zone.

What is required is to inform people that Phuket is still a very attractive destination. All the infrastructure is intact. The last earthquake and tsunami of this size occurred in 1833 and there is no health risk except perhaps from overindulgence while on vacation.

How can the population of Phuket contribute to the changing of overseas attitudes in the short term? There is one very simple way. I noted the amount of telephone calls my wife and I received from overseas in addition to email and SMS messages.





These were from relatives, friends and clients in the UK, Canada, Australia, South Africa, Portugal, India, Singapore, Malaysia and Hong Kong.

I suspect that most foreigners received at least as many as we did

Letting people in other countries know that the situation in Phuket is virtually normal is

one effective way of returning the local economy to its former successful state.

The economy and tourism will return to normal in any event, but the more we can speed up the process the better.

I was very pleasantly surprised not only with the

degree of assistance given to tourists in distress by the Thai people and the expat community but also with the excellent organization that so rapidly responded in so many areas.

One English tourist who was on Phi Phi Don when the wave hit said she doubted the UK would have been so well organized in a similar situation. Cer-

tainly, the positive experiences of so many tourists after this event will be related to others and the kindness of the Thai people will not be forgotten.

As for me, I would like to state (with my tongue firmly in my cheek) my willingness to support the beachfront real estate market by buying a few rai. All I ask is that the government will let me register the property in my own name.

Well, I can dream, can't I?

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
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One really good reason for a round of golf in Phuket

Such was the routine on the morning of Sunday, December 26, 2004, or at least it was for those separated from the Andaman Sea by the hills east and north of Patong.

For those unfortunate enough to be caught on or near the beach just a kilometer or two away, and for thousands of miles all the way around the Andaman Sea and Indian Ocean Rim, the scene could not have been more different.

By now, we have all seen the horrific images. Words can't add anything. Those brave souls helping the relief effort will have many more stories to tell; they may never see life the same way again.



We in Phuket have by now had dozens of emails and text messages from family and friends justifiably worried for our lives. The fact is that, had there not been TV and radio, I would not have been any the wiser. Nor would virtually anyone else involved in the island's golf industry, which is mainly inland

In the face of such tragedy the game of golf seems insignificant. How can we talk about golf at a time like this? Yet, golfers were playing in ignorance, making pars and bogeys; caddies were caddying; and workers were cutting the grass and raking the bunkers. People generally went about their daily Sunday business

In the next few days the routine continued. Was it cold hearted? Of course not. Tourists were here and knew little of the unfolding horrors.

What else were they going to do? Too many volunteers running round and mostly speaking the wrong languages would have hindered rather than helped the relief effort. As the days went on, many did what they could; mostly they gave blood at local hospitals.

The world's reaction to the tragedy was an overwhelming desire to help. Yet on the island,

life went on. There were fewer golfers. It was more difficult to get a taxi. Blue Canyon's caddies, many of whom live at the low-lying areas of Nai Yang and Mai Khao Beaches, understandably left golfers holding their own bags. The golfers picked up the bags and carried on. By the 28th the caddies were back at work.

Loch Palm and Phuket Country Club are completely unaffected. From what I hear, Laguna Golf Club (formerly known as Banyan Tree Golf Club), though near the beach, is also completely undamaged. On the more sheltered east side of the island, Mission Hills GC reports zero damage.

The "economic aftershock" has yet to be felt. "Once this group of tourists goes home, it's likely to signal a very quiet period because masses of tourists are canceling their trips and going elsewhere," said Roger Foo, Blue Canyon's Director of Golf, who worries that January onward will be 'very quiet".

Strange, then, that while a huge relief effort deservedly targets the badly hit, the local people on low incomes will be the next most affected group as "tsunami paranoia' sets in and keeps tourists away.

Some foreign governments have issued blanket "stay away" travel advisories. This coveryour-ass-at-all-costs-without-asking-any-questions attitude is not at all helpful.

Phuket has been largely spared the kind of carnage that hit Khao Lak. Here, the bodies have been cleared away. Health hazards are no more apparent than they were on December 25. Indeed, unless one is standing within pitching distance of the beach, one would be none the wiser.

But, of course, images of normality don't get aired on CNN.

Only on te mainland did the tsunami have much of an effect

on the golf industry. Thai Muang Beach Golf Club was closed for a few days, but by December 31 was open as normal.

K. Piak, GM at Thai Muang Beach, stressed that the beautiful Andaman seaside golf course is now completely playable. "We had to clear a lot of debris on the holes nearest the beach, and we had some damage around bridges and lake edges," he said, "But otherwise, we're right back to normal."

Tab Lamu, the Royal Thai Navy's course, in a gorgeous beachside setting, is, however, devastated, with holes 17 and 18 now virtually on the beach. There has been a price to pay for that level of intimacy with the sea.

The toll rises daily. Neither rhyme nor reason can explain why so many innocents have been taken. Nature acts in a random and all-powerful way. In this case the tragedy is beyond understanding.

Are our various gods sending us a message? Are they dissatisfied

with what we are doing to our world and fellow human beings?

If anything positive comes out of this tragedy, we must hope that a climate of peace and understanding will replace the climate of fear propagated by twisted religious and nationalist messages.

The people of the UK and US, Australia and Japan, Thailand and many other countries around the world are reaching deep into their pockets to help. Even desperately poor East Timor gave cash. Their help is from the heart. Politicians, take note.

The best way for foreigners to help the ordinary people of Phuket is to keep coming here. Don't cancel your trip because of misguided warnings from bureaucrats in offices tens of thousands of miles away.

The odds are that all the reasons you had for wanting to holiday in Phuket haven't changed. Why go somewhere else?

earching for a loved one who is missing can be a very difficult, tiring and heart-wrenching process. The International Victim Coordination Center has been set up at Phuket Provincial Hall to give as much information as possible to aid in this process.

What should I do first? Visit the center, at the Phuket Provincial Hall on Narisorn Rd, Phuket City. At the center are lists of patients admitted to all of the hospitals in affected areas. You can also review lists of victims who did not suffer serious injuries and were relocated to hotels or resorts in unaffected areas.

If the person you are looking for is not listed, you should fill out a "Missing Persons Information" sheet. These sheets give you the opportunity to list valuable information for relief workers.

What if I can still find no information? Visit your embassy representatives on the second floor of the main information center. Then visit a DNA collection center (contact details below) and give samples from either the missing relative/friend, or from yourself if you are a blood relative.

If you have some personal items from the missing person (see below), it is important that you keep them carefully as they may provide material for more DNA testing in your home country.

If your relative or friend is missing you may feel the need to search for his or her body. Please understand, however, that the temples where bodies are currently being held are closed to the public due to health risks.

The conditions there and at other collection points are very dangerous, and there is potential for the spread of diseases such as cholera and typhoid.


International forensic teams have said that bodies will not be released to families or relatives without appropriate DNA testing to Interpol or FDI standard, as well as dental record checks. Dental records should be submitted through the proper government channels in your home country

Given the above, it is highly recommended that those with missing relatives or friends return to their countries to help continue the identification process.

Once back home, what should I do next? First, make contact with the appropriate government office. They should be in a position to advise you of the next steps and where information such as DNA samples is being collected.

To help with identification, you are likely to be asked to provide the following belongings from the missing person:

- Items such as toothbrush, underwear, hair or shaver;
- Dental and medical records, particularly if they have had an operation;



SEARCHING FOR A MISSING **PERSON**



The Crisis Center at Phuket Provincial Hall is the place to start your search for a missing person, but eventually the most effective way may be to return to your home country.

- Doctor's or dentist's contact information;
- Photographs or information about jewelry that you know they were wearing.

Collect these items as soon as possible and put each into a sealed plastic bag.

You should also complete a Disaster Victim Identification form, which can be downloaded from www.interpol.int/Public/ DisasterVictim/Forms/ Default.asp

Forensic teams are taking photos of all victims; the focus will be on identifiable marks and items such as operation scars, tattoos and jewelry to help identifi-

They are also taking DNA samples and dental records.

All records will be held in a central agency, the Official Thai Tsunami Information Center OTTIC, which has a website to speed up the identification pro-



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Peugeot starts playing a

Porsche launched its legendary sports car in 1963, it decided to number the car 901. However, a minor – at the time – French automaker claimed to have the monopoly on designations with a zero in the middle and took Porsche to court. Peugeot won and Porsche changed its numbering to the more memorable

Peugeot has never looked back – until now. The French marque has run out of numbers, already having a small car with the 106 designation, and since the new model was not a replacement, but a completely new design, it had to be distinct from the popular little 106 and its (probable) successor, which will be the 107. Clear so far?

So, with impeccable French logic, Peugeot marketing gurus came up with 1007, the designation for its new sliding-door, compact people carrier. But Peugeot was to run into trouble with the holders of the James Bond rights, who claimed a monopoly on anything with 007 in the title.

Peugeot won that little fracas, too. Launched at the Paris Salon in September 2004, the 1007 had already been tested by motoring journalists as far back as June of last year.

It is, says its makers, a "...single compartment car equipped with sliding doors, providing a unique offer to support



the existing classic range'. Flowery stuff, but the 1007 is actually very good. It offers much more space than conventional peoplecarriers and looks rather smart

Designed by famed Italian coachbuilder Pininfarina, the 1007's sliding doors are its major feature. The doors can be opened either electronically or by the interior or exterior handles. While they provide ready access to the front and rear seats, they cannot be opened at speeds above 5kmh, nor when the fuel filler flap is open – simple but effective safety devices.

Another benefit of the sliding doors is that they are little wider than a door mirror, so they can be opened in confined spaces where it sometimes difficult to get in or out of a conventional vehicle. Also, passing traffic does not need to contend with a door suddenly opening in its path.

Other safety features in the 1007 include seven airbags, one of which is attached to the steering column, while there is an alarm to remind rear seat passen-



gers to fasten their seatbelts.

The rear seats fold in a variety of ways to increase luggage space, while the front passenger seatback can be folded flat to provide a mobile office with space for a laptop and paper files.

The 1007 is offered with one of three engines: a 1.4-gasoline motor mated to either a 5speed manual gearbox or the System Porsche Tiptronic transmis-

The Tiptronic system is also available with a 1.6-liter gasoline engine. A third engine option is Peugeot's sophisticated

1.4-liter diesel lump producing 70bhp (50kW) and a substantial amount of torque, peaking at 160Nm at just 2,000 rpm.

Peugeot-Citroën is the world's largest producer of passenger car diesel engines, which consequently tend to be of advanced design.

No performance figures are available as yet but expect the little 1007 to be fairly nippy as well as blessed with good handling, thanks to its light overall weight and "wheel-at-each-corner" design.

A total of 560 million eu-

ros (about 30 billion baht) was invested in the design and development of the 1007, which will be built at Peugeot's Poissy plant in France.

Around 130,000 cars are expected to be produced each year, with the launch on the French market scheduled for early this year and the rest of Europe in the second quarter.

Asian drivers, as usual, will have to wait rather longer to get their hands on this nifty motor.



ust five minutes' walk from Chalong Bay, Sun Palm Village will be a 180 million-baht, 27-rai development of family homes.







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GOD OF FIRE

n Thailand, different belief systems and their deities are so readily accepted that they are almost taken for granted.

And this probably goes some way towards explaining why a plant that's named after a deity is also taken so much for granted. Even though it's one of the more common plants in Phuket, it is perhaps largely ignored.

It is the ixora, or *khem* in Thai. In English it has several epithets: flame of the woods, jungle flame, jungle geranium. It is primarily named, though, af-

ter the Hindu god reputed to have appeared as a pillar of fire — somewhat apt, given the plant's intense appearance.

Tiny, four-petaled flowers, usually bright red, gather at the tips of its branches. Around 60 of these form clusters about the size of half a tennis ball. There are about 150 species of ixora, which are related to the gardenia and coffee plants. The most common is ixora coccinea.

Unlike much of the plant life here, the ixora is actually native to this part of the world. It never stops looking incredibly healthy or blooming; it's a plant that doesn't have off-days. Its evergreen foliage and abundance of bright red to orange blooms make it perfect for hedges and high borders. It's all over Phuket.

It grows just about anywhere, from sand to peat, and can be trimmed into virtually any shape without disturbing its growth or slowing it down.

As a result of cross-breeding, importing and hybridizing, over the past few years, many new ixora hybrids have appeared on the market. Now it's available in white, pink, yellow, orange,

salmon, and rose, as well as the original red.

While ixora coccinea does best in full sun, most of the newer varieties seem to prefer partial shade.


The best way to propagate ixora is by "air-layering" – encouraging roots to grow from the middle of a plant's stem. You do this by removing a very narrow strip of bark from around the branch or stem, about 8 to 12 inches from the tip of the shoot.

Next, tie a bundle of moist

moss or rich coconut husk compost around the stripped area. This should always be moist (usually done by wrapping it in polyethylene film) and the roots of the plant kept fairly dry. New roots will soon sprout enthusiastically from the stripped area into the damp moss.

Then you cut off the new plant below the moss, pot it it or plant it elsewhere, and leave it to its own devices. You now have a new plant for almost zero outlay, and you've made full use of a section of the old plant that you would probably have pruned off anyway. Serious gardening on the cheap.
