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# Volunteers 'must get right papers'



Even in Kamala (above), the worst-hit locale in Phuket, the emergency phase of the disaster is over, and the government thinks it is time for foreign aid workers to think about going home – or getting work permits.

PHUKET: Foreign aid volunteers assisting in tsunami-related charity work are required to hold work permits, regardless of whether they are being paid for their efforts or not.

Sayan Chuaiyjan, head of the Phuket Provincial Employment Service Office [ESO], told the *Gazette* on February 8 that there could be no exceptions and that his office would begin to enforce the regulations soon – possibly next month.

"There can be no exceptions. Work is work, even if it is for charity," he said.

He urged relief workers to apply for work permits and added that those working for recognized charitable organizations would find them easy to obtain. "They can just present a document certified by the charity organization they work for [proving their need to be here] and we will issue them with work permits, then they will be able to work legally," he said.

He pointed out that any foreigner caught working without a work permit is liable to hefty punishment.

"If our officers, police officers or immigration police learn [of foreign volunteers] who don't have work permits, the maximum penalty is three years in jail, a 30,000 baht fine [or both]," he warned.

"We did not enforce this law too rigidly [in the immediate aftermath of the tsunami], because we knew that everyone wanted to help out.

"But now that the situation

is returning to normal, we will have to start taking it more seriously," he said, adding that enforcement could begin as early as next month.

Phuket Vice-Governor Winai Buapradit, who oversees work permit procedures in the province, agreed with the tough stance that the ESO is taking and said that the law needed to be enforced both in Phuket and throughout Thailand.

"Now that the post-tsunami relief operations are slowing down, [the aid workers] should have work permits to continue working.

"Otherwise, government officials will have no idea what they are actually doing here – and this could result in trouble in the future," he said.

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#### Voters turn their backs on Thai Rak Thai

PHUKET: Despite a massive campaign by Thai Rak Thai (TRT) to convince voters to back the ruling party, and despite surveys showing that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's popularity is at unprecedented levels, Phuket on February 6 reinstalled its two Democrat MPs.

Indeed, Phuket's voters made it plain that they are not ready for TRT MPs, by handing the two Democrats hefty wins.

In District 1 (Phuket City and immediate area) Democrat Suwit Sa-Ngiamkul received nearly twice as many votes as his TRT rival, Dr Sriyada Palimapan.

Initial results show that K. Suwit polled 45,111 votes, as against 23,503 amassed by Dr Sriyada.

A total of 3,002 papers were spoiled, while 2,743 electors marked their papers to show that they did not want to vote for either District 1 candidate.

The turnout was a high 80.49%, with 74,359 of the 92,388 registered voters making their mark.

Turnout in District 2, which covers the rest of Phuket, was slightly lower, at 77.49%, but again the voters handed the Democrats a convincing win, with incumbent Chalermluk Kebsub receiving 43,295 votes compared with 27,222 for TRT candidate Wisut Santikul.

There were 4,360 spoiled ballots, and 4,175 voters indicated that they did not favor either candidate. A total of 79,052 people voted in District 2, from an electorate of 102,153.

Results were still subject to confirmation at time of going to press.



## Murder 'difficult for police to solve'

PHUKET CITY: Police City Police are finding it difficult to solve the murder of elderly businessman Prasert Boonrak, who was found with his throat slashed on the morning of February 3.

K. Prasert's murder was reported to police by his house-keeper, Nanthaporn Ruamcheo, who found him dead in the bedroom of his mansion on Kra Rd in Phuket City just before dawn.

The victim, 73, was the owner of Prasert Pornpanich Home Electronics Center on Ranong Rd, near the Jui Tui Chinese Shrine. Like most wealthy Phuket businessmen, he also had considerable real estate holdings.

K. Prasert's body was found lying naked and face-down next to his bed in a pool of his own blood. His hands and feet had been bound with lengths of red nylon rope and his throat had been slashed from left to right,.

Case investigator Pol Lt Col Somkid Boonrat told the *Gazette* that the apparent murder weapon, a bloody kitchen knife with a one-foot blade, was found lying near K. Prasert's body. There were also traces of blood near the door to the bedroom, which had been ransacked.

K. Prasert's son Rattanapon Boonrak told police that the assailants had made off with a 300gram gold necklace and many small Buddha image amulets that his father had worn around his neck for protection.

Despite the theft, police believe the real motive for the murder may have been revenge and that the robbery was staged in order to confuse investigators.

## TAT blitz 'starting to change perceptions'

PHUKET: Tour operators and journalists from eastern Europe have changed their perceptions of post-tsunami Phuket after seeing the effects of the tsunami for themselves, Suwalai Pinpradab, Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) office in Phuket has told the *Gazette*.

"The journalists have been to Krabi, too," said K. Suwalai. "They were very surprised to see the Phi Phi Islands, and Maya Bay, and said things were very different from

what they had seen on TV at home. They thought the whole of Phuket was destroyed."

Charter flights between Russia and Phuket ended after the tsunami, but, said K. Suwalai, some tourists were now traveling to Phuket via Bangkok.

The TAT Director was speaking after meeting 23 journalists from Russia and Ukraine at the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket on February 3.

She outlined plans for attracting tour-

ists to Phuket from elsewhere in Asia, including the rest of Thailand.

"Well before the next high season we're going to promote Phuket as a destination for Thais, as well as people from China, Hong Kong and Korea," she said.

"We also plan to exploit the meetings, incentives, conferences and exhibitions (MICE) market to bring Thais here during the 'green' season."

# Dr Porntip slams 'autocrats' over Yan Yao closure

PHUKET: Dr Khunying Porntip Rojanasunan has rounded on "the autocrats" she says have forced her to close the mortuary at Wat Yan Yao, Phang Nga, where she and her team had been working to identify victims of the tsunami.

The work has now been transferred to Phuket, to the Thai Tsunami Victim Identification Center (TTVI), headed by Pol Gen Nopadol Soomboonsub.

Dr Porntip told reporters it had not been her decision to close the mortuary – on February 3 – nor did it mean the task of identifying the bodies was by any means over.

"The autocrats have forced me to close the mortuary at Wat Yan Yao. They told me that my forensic task was illegal. So I will fade away, as the law demands," she said.

Dr Porntip said there were still many bodies, believed to be Thai people, in refrigerated containers at Wat Yan Yao, because DNA samples from them have not yet been compared with those of living relatives.

And, she said, "I do not think the TTVI can handle this task, or is equipped to compare DNA from the bodies of Thai people with that of relatives."

Dr Porntip said she had agreed in principle, before the mortuary was closed, that the task of identifying Thai dead should be left to Thai investigators, while foreign forensic teams should identify foreigners.

She added, "At times like this, we should work together, and we should not think about state agencies vying for honor or power.

"We should not leave it up to foreign teams to carry out this task; Thai people should be given the chance to identify Thai bodies."

The renowned forensic scientist was speaking during a night out in Phuket, where she and her team relaxed before leaving for Bangkok.

## Top Unicef official checks on progress

PHUKET: The Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund (Unicef), Carol Bellamy, has been to Phuket and Phang Nga to see what is being done to help children recover from the tsunami.

Unicef officers were sent to Phang Nga and Phuket within a week of the tsunami, said Ms Bellamy, and since then, Unicef has supported Thai government efforts to provide food and water, repair utilities and restore the environment.

"The most important principle for Unicef is to help survivors live well after this disaster, especially the children," she explained on February 4.

In Thailand, Unicef has been working with government departments such as the Ministry of Social Development and Human Security to support and help orphans.


Unicef has a budget of US\$144 million to help people in Asia, but, she said, the bulk of the money would be going to Indonesia, rather than Thailand or Sri Lanka.

She added that she hoped the money, however it is spent, will do more than restore the pretsunami status quo; that it will help improve conditions for children.

#### Linkin Park star visits Bang Tao

PHUKET: Chester Bennington, the lead singer of Californian band Linkin Park, visited Bang Tao beach on February 2 to see for himself the damage caused by the tsunami.

Bennington was in Phuket to record material to be broadcast by MTV in the USA, as part of a global campaign to raise money for tsunami victims.

After lunch at the Banyan Tree, Bennington and his crew headed for Bang Tao, where they spoke with local people caught up in the tsunami.

Bang Tao resident Wandee Kongtap welcomed Bennington's visit, saying she hoped it was a sign that things would soon improve there.

Two days after the tsunami, Linkin Park – who have a large following in Thailand – established Music for Relief, a charity to raise money for tsunami victims, to which the band donated about 4 million baht.

Bennington also took part in an MTV Asia-organised concert in aid of UNICEF on February 3 at Bangkok's Impact Arena. Ronan Keating – who filmed a special acoustic version of *I hope you dance* in Kata – also appeared, along with stars from the US, Europe and Asia.



#### F1 powerboat race postponed

PHUKET: The Formula One powerboat race scheduled to take place next month in Ao Makham has been postponed for a year.

Kata Group Chairman Pamuke Archariyachai told the *Gazette* that a combination of the tsunami and the Cabinet's slowness in approving funds to support the event had forced the decision to postpone until March 2006.

"We had only a short time to make all the arrangements [if the race was going to take place this year]. After Tourism and



Sports Minister Sontaya Kunplome and Varathep Rattanakorn, the Deputy Minister of Finance, came to Phuket in mid-January, we decided to postpone it," K. Pamuke said.

He stressed, however, that the 50-million-baht budget has now been approved for the event to take place next year.



## Phummisak takes Governor to task over tin mine water

PHUKET: Former Phuket City Mayor and tin mine owner Phummisak Hongsyok has dismissed Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura's assertion that he will use the law to force owners of private water resources to share them with the province if there is a water shortage this year.

K. Phummisak, who owns two flooded former tin mines with a total capacity of three million cubic metres, from which come two-thirds of Phuket City's water, stressed on January 31 that his mines, and others like them, were private property, which the Governor did not have the authority to seize.

He said, "The Governor has said he will fill the mines, or fine owners [who don't share water] 5,000 baht.

"The law states that a tin mine owner is allowed to keep only the last tin mine in the tin mine concession and the rest are to be filled in. If not, the mine owner will be fined 5,000 baht per mine.

"How can the Governor prove after 20 years which is the last one? It takes a long time to check that. He should not shoot his mouth off so quickly."

He continued, "The Governor needs to take time to study the law on this matter. He hasn't had the time to learn about how the private sector and local government organizations have helped each other.

"What he said upset me – for more than 30 years, the owners of privately-owned tin mines supplied water free of charge, but while the local authorities are aware of this, the Governor isn't."

K. Phummisak announced last August that, after decades of supplying water free, he would, with effect from May this year, charge the city around 2 baht a cubic meter.

#### Court orders businessman off land

PHUKET: Businessman Charoen Thavornwongwong has been ordered to leave 16 rai of land in Karon's Nakkerd Hills, after the Phuket Appeal Court overturned the Provincial Court's earlier judgment that he could stay on the land.

The Appeal Court said that the Phuket Provincial Land Reform Office (PLRO) had been right to contest the judgment of the lower court, on the grounds that the businessman had no right to occupy the four plots of *SorPorKor* land.

SorPorKor land is state land set aside by the government for allocation to poor people to allow them to grow food and support themselves.

The Appeal Court decided that K. Charoen – whose family owns the Thavorn hotel chain – is neither poor nor a farmer, and therefore ordered him and his associates to vacate the land immediately.

K. Charoen's lawyer, Surachai Korthong, said that his client has filed an appeal with the Supreme Court.

The PLRO has already suc-

ceeded in having three people evicted from *SorPorKor* land. Narong Nopdara and Tossaporn Thepabutr – the husband of Phuket Provincial Administration Organization head Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutr – were last year ordered off other land in the Nakkerd Hills, while tycoon Boonkeng Srisansuchart was evicted from land in the Panturat Hills, along the bypass road.

#### Multi-faith memorial at Bang Niang

KHAO LAK: Buddhist, Muslim and Christian clerics will lead a multi-faith memorial service for victims of the tsunami in Khao Lak on Sunday, February 13.

The service will take place

on Bang Niang Beach, starting at 9 am. Free transport will leave Thalang District Office at 7 am.

#### **Phone fury**

PATTAYA: Four innocent bystanders were injured by ricocheting bullets when a bagman for a Pattaya loan shark opened fire on his mobile phone.

Witnesses to the attempted slaying of the mobile phone said the man, identified only as "Woot", was seen at about 3 am yelling into his mobile phone on the ground floor of Niran Condo on Soi Arunothai.

He then hurled the phone down onto the sidewalk, pulled out a .38 pistol and fired it six times at the offending device.

Bullets bounced off the stone pavement and flew in every direction. At least four people were hit, including two foreigners; all were eventually taken to the Pattaya Memorial Hospital for treatment.

After his attempt to slaughter the phone, Woot allegedly turned round and threatened witnesses before fleeing on a motorcycle.

The threats were apparently effective, for when police arrived most of the bystanders – of which there were many, despite the late hour, but then this was Pattaya – refused to talk.

Police say they know the man's identity, however, and are in the process of locating him to begin criminal proceedings.

The condition of the mobile phone was not reported.

ix weeks after the tsunami, the first Baan Man Kong – government-built "permanent house" – has yet to be built on Phuket. The furthest the building work has got is the installation of the sao eak, or first posts, at Baan Tah Chat Chai and Koh Sireh.

To qualify for one of these so far imaginary homes, is not as easy as one might think. To succeed, an applicant must have lost his or her house in the tsunami; it must have been the householder's registered address; and the house must not have been built illegally on state land.

Anyone who has followed the twists and turns of the government's crackdown on abuse of state land will know what a murky topic this is. Proving that land belongs or does not belong to the state is far from simple, especially when the occupants – as is the case in Kamala – say they have lived in the same place for generations.

Local authority officers – such as those from the Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) – are responsible for verifying that applicants meet these criteria, before asking the Governor for permission to provide a house for them.

Most of the homes have been designed by the Department of Public Works and Town and Country Planning. There are three types, ranging in size from 29 square meters to 43.5sqm. All have tile roofs and walls made of cement sheets attached to a wooden frame.

At Koh Sireh, where 22 houses belonging to sea gypsies were destroyed and 108 were damaged, the ceremony to start the building took place at the beginning of February. V/Adm Chart Navavijit, of the Royal Thai Navy, said the navy would build 24 houses on the site, which is surrounded by mangroves.

He estimated it would take less than 30 days to complete the development, after which it would be handed over to the Governor, for the houses to be allocated to the homeless.

But Rachen Panthakij, the Chief Administration Officer of Rassada *OrBorTor*, believes that

the navy's contribution has come late.

"Within two weeks of the disaster, *OrBorTor* officers were working with students from Phuket Technical College to rebuild wrecked houses for the sea gypsies to live in," he said.

He conceded, though, that the sea gypsies would probably opt for a *Baan Man Kong*. He said, "I think [the Sea Gypsies] would want to live there because these government houses are better than the old houses, which were small and not very stable."

Jirae Pramongkij's house was damaged by the tsunami, and he welcomes the government intervention in building new homes.

"I am afraid that my home isn't as stable as it was before the tsunami hit it, and that it will collapse without warning," he said

He believes many of his neighbors are as apprehensive as he is, and as they are in the same position as him, the fairest way to decide who gets a *Baan Man Kong* is to draw lots.

The village headman of Rassada Moo 4, Karnda Pramongkij, agreed that drawing lots was a good idea, but, she said, it would have to be discussed with government officers first.

"If there are more people wanting to live in government houses than there are houses for them, then we will ask them to draw lots," she said.

At Baan Tah Chat Chai, a total of 36 homes are due to be built for the tsunami homeless.

Some of the developments are less straightforward, though. In Patong, a plan to build 16 homes – mainly for fishermen – is proving controversial.

The homes, consisting of two rooms and a toilet, would be designed and paid for by the ITV television station, which is no problem. What is a problem is that ITV wants to build on a site near Klong Pakbang, where the In addition to killing many residents and tourists, the tsunami which hit Phuket on December 26 also left hundreds of families homeless.

According to government figures, 402 homes on the island were destroyed, mainly in Baan Tah Chat Chai in Thalang, Koh Sireh near Phuket City, Klong Pakbang in Patong, and Kamala.

The government has announced a policy of building homes for the homeless. But at a cost of not more than 100,000 baht per house, and often much less, how practical – and how acceptable – will these be? And given the bureaucracy's legendary slowness, how long will people have to wait?

fishermen lived before the tsunami.

However, the land belongs to the state. Many of the homes swept away by the tsunami were illegal. As a result, Patong Municipality is witholding permission for the development.

Poonsak Naksena, Chief

Administration Officer for Patong Municipality, explained, "The Marine Department is responsible for this land, and the department has not given permission for these homes to be rebuilt, so the people have to wait for the green light from the government."

Despite the on-going crackdown on the illegal occupation of state land, some homes may be allowed, said K. Poonsak, but only if the fishermen can prove they lived there since before

"According to my research, only around two or three houses have been there since before 1992; the rest are illegal," K. Poonsak said. "But the municipality will check each house on a case-by-case basis and send the results to the Marine Department for consideration."

Phuket Marine Office (PMO) Chief Surin Teerakulpisuth said people who had broken the law would not be allowed to return to the land, but his office would do all it could to help those who could prove they had lived there since before the regulations were introduced in 1992.

He could not give permission for any building to start, however, until he received confirmation from Patong Municipality of how many replacement houses could be built there.

In Kamala, people whose beachfront homes, on state land, were destroyed in the tsunami have protested angrily against plans to build replacement homes for them – near the police station. (See also Inside Story, Gazette issue of January 22.)

In a search for a compromise, Phuket Governor Udomsak Usawarangkura has ordered Kamala OrBorTor to ask residents whether they would prefer to receive 30,000 baht to repair their old homes, or be put on a waiting list for a government house.

As the old houses were built illegally on state land, residents

would have no guarantee that they would be allowed to stay once the tsunami damage has been repaired; they would have security of tenure if they opt for a government-built house.

Even so, says Kamala Or-BorTor officer Saravuth Suriyavoharn, 33 people so far have voted for the cash option and only three for the waiting list. He added that he had sent the results of the survey to the Governor and was awaiting his verdict.

For one Kamala resident, being able to return to her own home would be the key to rebuilding her life.

Boon Kwanyean is 63. Her house – near Kamala School – was swept away by the tsunami, as was that of her son. Her daughter and two nephews were killed.

A beach masseuse, K. Boon had lived on the land for more than 40 years, since before the school was built there, a time when the area was little more than a field.

"I want to re-build my house," she said. "That is the important thing. If I cannot rebuild my house, I don't know how I will start my life again."

At present, K. Boon is staying with her sister, who also lives in Kamala. She says she has received little help from the government so far.

She said, "Ordinary farang have helped me more – someone walked in and gave me 2,000 baht in cash," she said. But a Baan Man Kong is one bit of help from the government that K. Boon does not want.

"I'm not used to staying in a place that is not home," she said, sadly, "especially a place as small as [a Baan Man Kong]."

n contrast with the government's so far nonexistent homes for the tsunami homeless, private sector initiatives have moved

In Baan Bang Muang, Phang Nga, for example, survivors of Baan Nam Khem are already living in temporary housing set up by charities, and many more people elsewhere have roofs over their heads, thanks to the swift action of NGOs.

In Phuket, the Bang Tao Project (BTP) should have 20 homes ready for occupation by the end of this month, project organizer Robin Plant told the Gazette.

It will have taken around seven weeks to build the homes - two rows each of 10 houses on a two-rai site near Surin Beach.

The homes, each of 40 square meters, will have concrete-block walls, cement floors and tiled roofs. Each will have a cooking area, mains electricity and water, and a bathroom.

Mr Plant estimates the total cost of each house at around 50,000 baht. He stressed that the properties are not intended to be permanent homes, just somewhere for displaced people –

mainly fishermen whose boats were wrecked in the tsunami to live in while they get their lives back together.

"They are a proud bunch of people, mostly Muslims but with some Buddhists too, and they don't want to be dependent on handouts or [too much] charity,' said Mr Plant.

The BTP is paying experienced local builders to build the

homes. "It makes sense to do it this way," explained Mr Plant. "Fishermen fish, builders build and these guys know how to put a reasonable house up in double-quick time."

A play area is also being

oh Lanta, in Krabi Province, has one of the largest fishing communities in Thailand. For fishermen, their lives are their boats and their boats are their lives, and for many, both boats and lives were shattered by the December tsunami.

The Fisherman's Fund established to help rebuild these communities after the tsunami has invited the Gazette to come along as it delivers two boats to the beleaguered fishermen of Koh Lanta. It is a month to the day since the tsunami hit.

We leave Boat Lagoon at 6 am. It takes around two hours to reach Laem Kruad, on the mainland, where some 10 families make a living building boats.

Bang Lean, who has been building boats for 10 years, says it takes up to 10 days to make a boat. The fund has given this small community enough money to build 22 boats, at a cost of around 50,000 baht apiece.

K. Bang says the price of the wood used to build boats has soared since the tsunami, from 60-90 baht a board-meter to 100 baht. Even so, he and his colleagues are making boats as fast as they can.

Duane Lennie, of the Fishermen's Fund, explains that the government plans to donate boats to the fishermen, but, he notes, "It will take three to six months for the boats to come through. and, for the fishermen, that is too long a time.

"The boats are too expensive for the fishermen. Some of them earned less than 10,000 baht a month before the tsunami, and it costs 40,000 baht [or more] to build one boat, so they can't afford to buy new ones."

Lanta. Everything looks normal, apart from some damage to a pier and to some fishermen's houses. Only two people died here, the locals tell us, and most of the wrecked houses have already been rebuilt.

Some people believe that the mangrove forest around the coast saved the community from suffering more damage, by blunting the rage of the wave.

Before the two boats are launched, a traditional tor mor ceremony is carried out to show respect to Mae Ya Nang, the protector of fishermen. There are two types of ceremony – Chao

At 1 pm, we arrive at Koh Lay (Sea Gypsy) and Muslim. Most of the people in this community are Muslim, so the Islamic version of the ceremony is

> Sabai Sukkawit, the *tor mor* who performs the incantation, is equipped with wood bark, Chongka leaf (a herb that Thai people traditionally use as a shampoo), and cloth in the three colors of the Thai national flag: red for the nation, white for religion and blue for HM the King.

> He explains, "The bow of the boat represents the father, the middle of it represents the child and the stern the mother. So, a new boat being built is like a

child being born.

"This ceremony helps fishermen to sail smoothly and safely. People believe that if Mae Ya Nang possesses the boat, whoever sails in it will be safe."

Some people may be afraid to return to the sea, but Paitoon Rodrak, of Koh Lanta, isn't one of them. "I love being a fisherman," he says. "I'm not afraid of the sea, I live with it."

Like his fellow fishermen, though, K. Paitoon has been unable to work since the tsunami destroyed his boat.

He said, "It's been a nightmare. Nobody saw this coming. It's been very stressful having no

work, and not knowing from one day to the next how we would eat.

"Fortunately, we have had donations of food, and my wife has a laundry service, so I've been able to help her with that, but I haven't done my real job for a month."

Not surprisingly, he is overjoyed to receive a new boat. "I am very, very happy. I sailed two days ago - I sailed five ki-

lometers and got 1,000 baht. Today I sailed 3km and earned 600 baht."

The sea is still rich in shrimp, fish, crab and other seafood. K. Paitoon's best ever day was when he earned 8,000 baht, but his average income before the tsunami was be-

tween 10,000 and 20,000 baht a month.

Currently, 90% of the businesses on Koh Lanta are running normally: tour operators, hoteliers, fishermen – for most, life goes on as normal. They aren't afraid of the sea, and they want tourists, a major source of income for the area, to return.

But K. Paitoon is happy to remain a fisherman. "The next generation may have a better life. They may graduate and get better-paying jobs, but I am proud to be a fisherman, and will do this job for as long as I can," he says.

"I love the sea, but if I have no boat, I have no work and it's difficult to find a reason for staying here. Many of us still need our boats."



## Monks oppose economic zoning

enior monks gathered at the Temple of the Emerald Buddha in Bangkok to oppose a government plan to establish special economic zones around the country.

The monks, along with representatives of several NGOs, said the move was unconstitutional as the zones would be exempted from laws governing national parks, forest reserves, irrigation, labor, the environment and land traditionally reserved for Buddhist temples.

Phrasri Pariyatmoli, deputy rector of Mahachulalongkorn-rajavidyalaya Buddhist University (MCU), said the proposed bill would pave the way for the private sector to intervene for purely commercial purposes, while affected communities would be denied access to legal mechanisms, as the zoning would supersede them.

The monks said a prayer at the temple to ward off bad luck and ill-will from the proponents, the Lower House and Government House.

**Sausage saboteur:** Police in Bangkok's Min Buri district arrested and released on bail a truck-driver who allegedly put straightened paper clips into packets of sausages made by CP Interfoods Thailand.


The suspect, 33-year-old Itthipol Fakkhio, was charged with inserting the paper clips into the sausages with the apparent intention of discrediting the company.

CP filed a complaint with the police, asking officers to investigate who was behind the act after the sausages were returned from a 7-Eleven distribution center.

Two cold-storage workers at the CP Interfoods plant told police they had seen K. Itthipol standing around the storage area from which the seven packets were loaded onto his truck, noting that he had no reason to have been there.

K. Itthipol denied the charge, saying that someone must have been trying to frame him.

**Lemon smashing:** Following the highly-publicized battering of a Honda CRV by an owner dis-

satisfied with Honda's unwillingness to fix its chronic mechanical problems, Royal Thai Air Force Wing Commander Noraset Runpraphan of Uthai Thani staged a similar stunt on his Toyota Sport Cruiser pickup truck

W/Cdr Noraset bashed the windshield and hood of the vehicle with a shovel and threatened to set fire to it in front of a Consumer Protection Board office.

He said that since buying the pickup two years ago he had experienced many problems with its brakes and suspension and alignment.

Toyota originally offered to buy back the vehicle at its sale price of 870,000 baht, but W/Cdr Noraset demanded 1.5 million baht to cover modifications he made to the vehicle.

Toyota said that the pickup's wheel-alignment problem was due to the modifications he had made and refused to buy it back

**Lovely idea:** Buddhist monks should run a Valentine's Day campaign to "open the temples

to compete with hotels" in a bid to teach young people that love has many forms and is not all about sex, said MCU special lecturer Phra Wuttichai Wachiramethee.

The temples could show both youngsters and adults that there are different kinds of love, such as parental love and compassionate love, and not just sexual relationships, he said.

Phra Wuttichai also suggested that temples in Bangkok, especially those in Bang Rak District, where many couples choose to register their marriage on Valentine's Day because the area's name translates as "District of Love", hold Buddhist marriage ceremonies free of charge to bless couples and impart the Lord Buddha's teachings to them.

**Baby abandoned:** A one-yearold boy was found abandoned in Suthat Thepwararam Temple in Bangkok's Phra Nakhon District, police said.

The infant was seen crawling and crying around the temple grounds in the afternoon wearing only a soiled diaper. Police be-

lieve he had been there for several hours.

Lying near the spot where the boy was found was an empty bottle in a plastic bag that contained no papers about his identity. No one witnessed who left the boy there.

The tot was washed and fed and police said he will be sent to the Phya Thai Home for Infants.

**Engines needed:** Artorn Chandavimol, Vice President of the non-profit group Niyom Thai Fund Foundation, said reliance on financial donations would not help fishermen whose vessels were lost or damaged in the tsunami, as the money would just go to their creditors.

He is instead asking for contributions in the form of outboard motors. Engines were needed for more than 100 damaged boats in the worst-hit areas of Phang Nga. As these boats are not officially registered, the owners receive only limited aid from the government, K. Artorn said


**Digital depravity:** German national Ulrich Hans Schmuttermayr, 60, was arrested in Chon Buri on suspicion of shooting video and photos of himself engaged in sexual acts with local boys and girls under 15 years old and selling the material on the Internet.

Maj Gen Panya Mamen, commander of the Tourist Police, said that after receiving tip-offs, officers raided Schmuttermayr's Pattaya apartment and found a digital camcorder, a digital camera, three computers with software for editing digital videos, and VCDs of the man in sex acts with children.

A bankbook showing foreign deposits worth more than 5 million baht was also seized.

Some of the VCDs were being sold in Bangkok's Patpong area, police said, adding that the German had been in Thailand since January 2002.


# Clearing continues as shops still suffer

ell into the second month since the tsunami, the speed with which areas such as Bang Niang and Nang Thong have been cleared of ruins, rubble and wrecked cars is scarcely believable.

Khao Lak has become a hive of activity again. Crowds of construction workers have moved in to begin rebuilding the devastated areas. Huge trucks are bringing load after load of sand to be remodeled into beaches by the army of earthmovers. Elsewhere, crews are filling in the unwanted lagoons that were gouged by the force of the tsunami.

However, with some areas of land – plots of up to two-rai in some cases – simply gone, washed away, it seems like an impossible mission.

**Small start:** Many of the bigger players in Khao Lak's tourism industry – the Mukdara Beach Resort, for example – have been



granted "soft" loans running into hundreds of millions of baht by the Thai banks.

But the smaller operators and family-run resorts have, generally, been left to their own devices; they seem to be of little interest to the banks, which have caught the scent of bigger game.

However, a small group, led by travel writer Richard Doring, is trying get support from banks and investors by bringing the smallest of the small and medium enterprises together to combine forces



This plea for help shows dramatically and movingly how slim the survival chances of Khao Lak businesses are at the moment.

The goal is to rebuild as many bungalows as possible in the shortest possible time to resuscitate Bang Niang Beach, the hardest-hit area.

"Every bungalow counts," said Mr Doring of his quest to find overseas Khao Lak lovers willing to invest in a bungalow-sponsorship program and bring Bang Niang back to life. The bungalows will be built using an eco-friendly construction system.

But a few – mostly local Thai – people have kept away because of ghost stories and unconfirmed "panic yak-yak" spread by other locals who have suddenly become oracles or mediums since the disaster.


Luckily, only a few people buy into the frequent prophecies made and tales told by these wannabe Nostradami.

I have a good friend, a kind Thai woman, who has frequent flashes of future disasters. Much as I like her, surrendering to and believing such tales does nothing but keep you awake all night.

One does not need a seer to know that we are in for hard times this year. Let's hope this hysteria comes to a swift end, as it is impeding the efforts of the survivors who are trying to get Khao Lak back on its f eet again.

Many fans and friends of Khao Lak ask how best they can help the area. The answer is simple: come back!

For them and for everyone else, the much-needed good news is that 26 resorts in Khao Lak are now operational again, five of them right on the beach.

### The Scandinavians are back

Of all the foreign tourist groups in Thailand at the time of the tsunami, the worst-hit were the Scandinavians, of whom thousands were killed or injured, mostly in Khao Lak.

But, as **Dhirarat Boonkongsae**n discovered, that fact has not deterred Scandinavians from coming on vacation to Phuket. Indeed, the first and largest groups to arrive here after the disaster were from the Nordic countries.

homas Hogelient, from Sweden, explains, "We feel really sorry about what happened here, but we know that tourism is the main source of income here, and that's why it was important to come here, for us to do our little bit to help."

Mr Hogelient spoke with the *Gazette* as he relaxed by the pool at the Phuket Orchid Resort with his wife, Ann, his 15-monthold son, Elton, his father and his sister.

The family arrived in Phuket at the beginning of February, having postponed their trip for two weeks on the advice of their tour company.


"Phuket is the same as it was when we came to Karon three years ago," said Mr Hogelient. "The food is good, the people are nice."

He continued, "The media at home was full of news about the tsunami, but we knew Karon would be pretty okay." He and his family intended to spend three weeks in Karon, Kata and Patong.

Jarle Hvitstein, too, had seen the overwhelming media coverage about the tsunami. But he was confident enough about the state of Phuket to bring his wife and daughter here for a two-week holiday. The family arrived on February 4.

"Yes, we have seen the pictures on television, pictures of Sri Lanka and Indonesia, and people think Phuket is the same.

"But I checked the news every day on the Internet, so I'm

not suprised by how Phuket looks now."

Mr Hvitstein booked his family's trip in November and he had seen no reason to cancel after the tsunami. "We're going to stay two weeks," he added, "and our friends arrive next week as well."

The tsunami prompted older tourists Odd Halvorsen and his wife, Ulla-Britt, to reconsider their travel plans but, in the end, they decided not to change them.

"The tour company recommended that we wait until the extent of the damage was clear," said Mr Halvorsen. "And when we called them a few weeks ago, they said it was okay to come here.

"I don't think it is dangerous to be here; it was a disaster, not a war.

"If this was a war zone, we wouldn't dream of coming here, but we know that there won't be a tsunami every week.

"It was very sad for the people caught up in the tsunami, but, having weighed up everything, we decided to come. We've been here before, we know this place and we like it."

He added, "This is my idea of Paradise and my wife and I

would like to stay here for a long time."

Liv Bente Eng wanted to see how Phuket today compared with the last time she visited, six years ago.

"It was hard to look at the pictures because so many things seemed to have been lost, especially at Khao Lak," she said.

"But we still wanted to come here to see for ourselves, and also because we had heard how Thais helped people after the tsunami."

One recent Saturday afternoon, a Novair flight landed at Phuket International Airport.

On board were 203 passengers, the biggest charter group to arrive in Phuket since the tsunami.


Anders Ericsson and his family were on board.

"We've been to Thailand about seven times since 1990," Mr Ericsson told the *Gazette* at the airport.

## An intimidating initiation

Supachai Yuvaboon, the newlyappointed Vice-Governor of Phuket, arrived at Phuket International Airport at 8:30 am on the day before he was due to take up his post. As he traveled from the airport, he contemplated a leisurely lunch in Ao Chalong and a quiet afternoon and evening before starting work the following day. But this was December 26, 2004.

ice-Governor Supachai Yuvaboon recalls of his arrival in Phuket, "Someone told me there had been an earthquake, but I didn't think anything of it."

On the way from the airport to his new home, he stopped off to pay his respects at the Heroines' Monument, then went from there to the Vice-Governor's official residence.

A friend called to say Patong had been hit by a big wave but even then, the magnitude of what had just happened was still not clear.

"It was still very quiet in Phuket City, and even when I saw

lots of people and vehicles at the Governor's office, I just assumed there had been a car crash," said V/Gov Supachai.

"At 11 am, I saw a helicopter and I asked my officer what was going on. He said the Governor was off to inspect Patong, but

I didn't realize just how bad the situation was until the Governor called an emergency meeting for 1 pm."

Although V/Gov Supachai had been to Phuket before, it had been as a tourist, and, consequently, he struggled to follow what was happening during the planning of the rescue effort.

But he had to get to grips with his new task immediately. "My main job was to organize the call center service for both Thai and English languages and to receive donations.

"Few people realized that I was the new Vice-Governor, and when I was introduced to people, many pointed out that I arrived with the tsunami. "If you look at it negatively, then I brought bad luck, but people have said it was lucky I arrived when I did, because I was able to help after the tsunami.

"I learned an awful lot in the days after the tsunami. I learned that, even when they were in trouble, people here didn't want used clothes, either because they didn't like the style or because they felt uncomfort-

able wearing them, which is different from people in the North and Isarn.

"The tsunami showed me how generous people can be, in the way they tried to help by donating things.

"But I also felt very sorry for the people who were in trouble. The tour-

ists who come to Phuket are rich, but at that time, money meant nothing.

"I met a foreign man who was wearing boots, but he wanted some sandals, which he didn't have. I managed to find some for him, and he was able to get rid of his boots.

'The person who impressed me most, I think, was Panomphol Thummachartniyom, President of the Phuket Professional Guide Association, who arranged for

guides who speak all kinds of languages to help the tourists. They worked day and night to help people and organize things."

V/Gov Supachai believes some good can come from the bad of the tsunami, if people look at what they can learn about disaster preparedness.

"For example," he said, "We noticed that when the sea receded, Thai people went down to the beach to collect fish or take pictures, but the sea gypsies headed for the hills.

"Hopefully, this kind of disaster will not happen very often, but we can learn from it. I don't think the situation was handled wrongly, because this was an unprecedented event – tsunami usually happen in the Pacific Ocean, not here."

The tsunami aside, the Vice-Governor has been struck by how different Phuket is from rural Thailand, where he has worked in the past.

"Phuket is a developed

province and people have more money here, but I will adjust," he said. "One thing I should do here, though, is improve my English, because of the amount of interest there is in Phuket from the foreign press."

Already, V/Gov Supachai has become frustrated with the slow pace of Thai bureaucracy, largely caused, he says, by the anti-corruption regulations.

"There are all these rules. Officers can't do anything on their own intitative; they have to go through this whole process step-by-step. I think it would be all right for a CEO governor to have the authority to make certain decisions," he explained.

A graduate of Chiang Mai University's Faculty of Political Science, and the holder of an MBA from Roosevelt University, Chicago, V/Gov Supachai spent 20 years with the Office of Accelerated Rural Development (OARD).

During his time with the

OARD, he carried out inspections, surveys and handled planning in almost every province in Thailand.

"I joined the OARD in 1973 in Bangkok, but I moved to Chanthaburi, Udon Thani, Chachoengsao, Petchaburi then back to Bangkok, all the time working for the OARD," he said.

"My position before I left was as an inspector for the OARD. I met lots of local people as I carried out surveys or explained projects to them, or asked them what help they wanted."

OARD initiatives included research into water resources, road building, developing income-generating projects for people in rural areas and taking electricity to rural communities.

In 2002, K. Supachai was appointed Vice-Governor of Uttaradit, a job he held until he was moved to Phuket.

"Being a government officer is in my blood. My father is Dr Chamnan Yuvaboon, who was the first governor to be assigned to Bangkok, and my older brother is Chanasak Yuvaboon, who was Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) at the Ministry of Interior until he retired last year.


"I would like to retire soon, although I'm not sure when. I want a peaceful life, maybe have my own small business. I'd like to retire before I'm 60, before it's too late to start something new.

"I'm not interested in becoming a politician, because I'm not very good at lying – not that I'm saying that all polititicians are liars, but I prefer to work on the ground with local people.

"It is easier to progress rapidly as a politician, but I don't really think my character is suitable for me to be a politician."

He continued, "I have a daughter, who is 29 years old, and a son, 22. I don't expect them to become government officers; I won't push them, I'll just leave them to find their own ways in their careers.

"That said, I don't think they're that interested in being government officers, having seen their grandfather, uncle and dad do the job already; I think they think they're learned enough from us already," he laughed.














## In a class of its own

This easeful passage starts at Bangkok, with uniformed stewards stowing luggage aboard, dispensing tea, smoothing ruffled feathers and settling passengers into their air-conditioned compartments.

All compartments have an attached bathroom, but while the Standard cabins are pretty much occupied by a double bunk which converts into a sofa by day, the State sleeping cars are considerably roomier, with armchairs and more than enough room to swing a cat. The Presidential suites edge towards – by railway standards - the palatial.

Crisp linen, specially-designed Italian china, monogrammed French silver cutlery and German crystal bedeck the dining cars.

Best of all, at the end of the train, there is an open-air observation car that allows passengers to experience all the sights and sounds and smells of life beside

While passengers knock back their aperitifs, the chefs in the galley labor to create a fourcourse dinner. Fresh ingredients are taken on board at main stations and supplemented by hawkers' wares along the line; the raw material for a feast on wheels.

The evening meal over, passengers converge on the bar, where the liqueurs rock gently in the glasses, the lighting is muted and the talk is rich with references to life in the upper echelons.

Dawn brings a new day and a new horizon, ever changing as the Express "thunders" towards its destination at 80 kilometers an

Outside are the jungles, paddy fields and villages, lush green countryside that trundles by as a continuously-moving

panorama of Asian rural life. Buffalo amble through the scrub,

sauntering schoolchildren laugh and wave, old crones look up from the kitchen step, regarding the train with an air of lost remembrance of their youth.

The E&O bowls through the countryside, leaving the royal resort of Hua Hin in its wake, stopping only briefly at the Malaysian border for a passport check, and again at Butterworth, near Penang.

The scenery changes now,

and gold-domed mosques take the place of temples and individual domestic spirit houses.

In the dead of night, Kuala Lumpur Railway Station is deserted, brightly lit but eerily quiet. Off again into the darkness, the Express whispers past the silent rubber estates until daybreak, when it sweeps through Johor Bahru and across the causeway into the Lion City, Singapore.

As an endnote, here are three little-known railway facts: The completion of Kuala

Lumpur railway station was delayed until 1911 because the roof failed to meet British railway specifications and could not support three feet of snow.

The first railway built in what was then Malaya was made entirely of wood and was eaten by ants.

A pamphlet published in 1928 announced: "The scenery along the line will give travellers a good impression of British Malaya and Siam. The privilege of breaking the journey at various interesting points makes it the more advantageous to travel by rail."

Three quarters of a century later, that's still very true.

## Chaos and cacophony in Calcutta

ndia has always been a feast for the senses, and often a source of sensory overload. This impression was reinforced by a recent visit to Calcutta.

The streets of Calcutta are an ongoing pageant of vehicular chaos. Cars, buses, trams, trucks, taxis, tuk-tuks, bicycles, pedicabs, rickshaws, wagons, carts,

coolies, vendors, pedestrians, and cows joust for precedence in the tumultuous streets. Many years ago I saw a goatherder driving a flock of goats across a major intersection at high noon.

All this commerce is conducted amid

maximum noise. For it is axiomatic that when many people are striving to make themselves heard, it is the loudest voice that will emerge victorious.

Hence the popular misconception that no Calcuttan is capable of speaking below the level of a shout. When everybody else is shouting, it makes sense to shout louder. In the West, the squeaky wheel gets the grease; in India, the loudest voice gets the

So it should come as no surprise that in Calcutta, people drive with their horns. If a driver is not honking his horn, he feels he is not doing his job, and everybody else figures he must be asleep at the wheel.

The drivers of Calcutta would change Descartes' motto "I think, therefore I am" to "I drive, therefore I honk." Sound, after all, is a sign of life; and the drivers of Calcutta are eager to

assure the world that they are very much alive.

The horn conveys a message: "I am coming! Make way for me!" Trucks often have a sign on the back read-"HORN, ing PLEASE." This tells the drivers behind them to sound their horns

if they want to pass.

Remarkably, Indian pedestrians never seem to get angry at being honked at. They actually seem to appreciate it. Maybe they think it shows that somebody is paying attention to them. If so, the drivers of Calcutta are extremely solicitous about reassuring pedestrians of their loving solicitude.

The horn is such an essential element of Indian driving that when an Indian monk visited the US and was shown an American car, the first thing he wanted to



know was where the horn was. When told that Americans rarely sound their horns, except to indicate incipient road rage, he was stunned.

And there are not only horns. Every vehicle has its distinctive noisemaker to announce its presence to the teeming mass-

Bicyclists ring their bells, rickshaw-pullers squeeze their bulb horns, and other vehicles sound an impressive variety of whistles, klaxons, sirens, buzzers, zappers, clackers and whoopwhoop devices.

To the Western ear, the result is cacophony. To the Indian ear, it may well be a symphony, a harmony of felicitously-blended sounds. Where the Westerner perceives chaos, the Indian may perceive order; for order and chaos, after all, are largely in our heads, and to the Indian mind, both are part of the inscrutable play of Maya.

Crossing a Calcutta street can be a frightening experience for a Westerner. You might be run over by a tram, a bus, a truck, or a car; knocked down by a bicycle or a pedicab; trampled by hordes of coolies and pedestrians; or speared by one of the poles used to pull a rickshaw.

But if you're lucky, you might win a high-status death and be run over by an Ambassador.

Of all the vehicles that ply the streets of Calcutta, the Ambassador is king. This is a car, made in India, that is based on the 1948 Morris Oxford from Britain. For years it was the only car on the roads. Now it is gradually being supplanted by a variety of upstart Japanese-style interlopers.

The Ambassador is a symbol of India itself. Stately, grand, and old-fashioned, it conveys an impression of dignity, sturdiness, and stability. It may not be trendy, but it is deep – and as immutable as the Absolute. That 1948 design was good in 1948 and for all eternity.

Flighty Japanese models may come and go, but the Ambassador endures unchanged. If it is ever consigned to the junkpile of history, we will know that the old India herself has begun

To be run over by an Ambassador would be a prestigious death indeed, and certainly much better than being speared by a rickshaw.

## The case for being duly diligent

his month I would like to point out the legal problems that may occur when due diligence is not conducted properly before the purchase of a property.

Mr X, a foreign director of a Thai company, learned through his bank that a piece of land, which included a building, would be for sale through pub-



lic auction because it had become an NPL – a non-performing loan – when the previous owner failed to repay his bank after borrowing the money to buy the property.

Appointing the bank representative as his agent to buy the property at the auction, Mr X was assured that there would be no problems, because the bank would approve the sale at a certain price.

Mr X would pay through his company account with the same bank, in the form of cashier's check to the bank representative buying the property on his behalf.

The auction went well and Mr X's company successfully bid for the property at the price agreed with the bank, with a 25% down payment made immediately after the auction.

All was arranged, and within 14 days, Mr X's company had to make a final payment to the auctioneer which, again, he ar-

ranged through the bank's representative.

Mr X received all the documents necessary to file for change of ownership of the prop-

At the Land Department office, however, his representative was informed that, as a result of a civil case, there was a court order freezing any transfer of ownership of the property.

As a result, the transfer of property ownership to Mr X's company was denied, even though all the necessary documents had been supplied.

Mr X's company now had the problem: He had paid money to the auction house, but his company could not take ownership of

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the property. Mr X consulted a law firm and appointed a lawyer to file a case in court to free the assets from the previous court order and allow transfer of ownership.

and Mr X's application was rejected, on the grounds that the civil case that had caused the transfer to Mr X to be frozen had yet to be re-

This decision was not what Mr X or the bank had expected and, as they could not understand how the court had reached such a decision, an appeal was

solved.

launched to reverse the decision of the court to freeze the prop-

This process had already taken about a year, and by going to appeal, Mr X's company was facing an unlimited wait; there is no limit on the amount of time the Appeals Court may take in deciding a case.

Mr X's company was still unable to take possession of the property and had to wait for the Appeals Court's decision, which took a further eighteen months.

Finally, the order of the first court to freeze the property was reversed and the appeal granted, and Mr X's company was able to register the change of ownership The case went to court of the land and building bought

2½ years before.

Unfortunately, during this period, the Thai government reduced the deduction allowed on corporate tax from 3.3% to only 0.1%.

As a result, Mr X's company paid a great deal more in transfer fees than it would have done had the transfer of ownership gone through 2½ years earlier.

The lesson to be learned from this tale is that it is vital to have a property thoroughly checked before buying it or even committing oneself to buying it, regardless of how reliable your initial information may seem.

## A4 turns a new page

aunched at the Paris Salon last September, the new Audi A4 has been hailed by industry insiders as "the best yet". With more rounded lines yet a squarer stance, it is almost as though the A4 has grown up.

Following the success of the revised A8 and A6, Audi left the A4 to last for a makeover and the result is a stunning sedan that is more than a match for its Mercedes and BMW rivals.

Although only marginally longer than its predecessor, the new car appears to be larger, possibly due to the revamped front end and restyled bumpers.

There are two body styles on offer: the normal four-door sedan and the Avant station wagon, which offers far more luggage space. While the Avant is popular in Europe, the sedan version is likely to be the big seller in Asia.

Although there are a number of engines available for the A4, including a direct-injection 3.2-liter gasoline motor developing a healthy 255bhp (188kW), the most popular choices will always be the two-liter gasoline or diesel motors.

The former, featuring a lightweight aluminum block, produces a respectable 130bhp (96kW), giving a top speed in excess of 210kmh and a benchmark 0-100kmh sprint time of a shade under 10 seconds.

The diesel gives similar performance but benefits from a huge increase in torque: 320Nm compared to a meager 195Nm from the gas engine.

The diesel motor is fitted with a catalytic particulate filter,

which is claimed to be 100% maintenance-free, and all Audi's current engines meet the latest Euro IV emission requirements.

A vast number of options are available for the

new Audi, including double glazing, run-flat tires and a cool box mounted in the glove box.

All models, however, feature individual air-conditioning controls for the driver and front-seat passenger; two-stage front airbags; side bags in the front seatbacks; and full-length air curtains to protect from side impacts.

Also standard is the latestgeneration ESP (electronic stability program), brake assist and electronic-brake distribution. A useful feature is the trapezoidal, aluminum rear suspension, which is both light and space-saving. It does not intrude on trunk space yet gives almost perfect handling

under most conditions.

There are various other options available in different markets. Choices include four-wheel drive, six-speed manual or Tiptronic 'boxes. With the

two-liter power plants and front-wheel drive, a five-speed manual gearbox – or the constantly variable Multitronic auto transmission – is the more likely combination.

Safety is a prime consideration in any modern motor car and the A4 contains a great deal of high-strength steel to absorb crash energy. Although the new model has yet to be tested under the stringent European New Car Assessment Programme (Euro NCAP), the outgoing model scored a four-star rating.

The larger A6, which was tested last year, scored the maximum five stars, and it looks likely that the new A4 will also achieve

a high rating when it is tested later this year.

Audi has turned itself from a rather staid, second-rank luxury car manufacturer into a solid performer within the giant Volkswagen group, Europe's largest auto maker. While the top-of-the range A8 continues to impress and the executive A6 se-

dan is making huge inroads into underdeveloped markets such as mainland China, the A4 is still the mainstay of Audi's production

The latest offering will surely cement Audi's reputation as a builder of fine cars that are a little more interesting to drive than much of the opposition.









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#### Winding up the relief workers

Things are calming down after the tsunami. The dead have been retrieved, the injured have been taken care of and, where necessary, repatriated. The debris has mostly been cleared and reconstruction is well under way.

The work is, of course, far from over. Identification of thousands of corpses will take many months. Long-term help will be needed by those still suffering psychological trauma. The battles between local businesspeople and the government have only just begun. But the whole effort has moved on from frantic rescue to measured reconstruction.

During the initial phases, and still now, thousands of foreign volunteers gave their time unstintingly to the effort, arriving on tourist visas and pitching in wherever they were needed. No one asked whether they had non-immigrant visas or work permits. Their contributions were appreciated for what they were – heartfelt wishes to help people and a country in trouble.

Working alongside them were many who were already living and working in Phuket. They have achieved an astonishing amount of good work, in the early days delivering supplies where and when they were needed, getting homes built and helping fishing communities to get boats so that they could get back to life as normal – or as near normal as is possible after one's village has been smashed.

What was striking was how swiftly such people reacted to the crisis, especially in contrast with the ability of the national bureaucracy to deliver what was needed, where it was needed, and when.

This will, of course, all come to an end. No government would tolerate for long thousands of foreigners working without the correct paperwork, however good their intentions.

Indeed, when asked about the rules on this, the Phuket Provincial Employment Services Office (ESO) told the Gazette that foreign volunteers who come to Thailand to help in tsunami charity work must have work permits, whether they are paid or not – that's the law.

Volunteers without work permits risk a maximum penalty of three years in jail or a 30,000 baht fine – or both, the ESO added.

So far it appears that gratitude to the volunteers has outweighed official rectitude, but already the ESO has stated that it will be applying the law soon, probably from next month.

One can only hope that when this happens, it will be done with great tact. Phuket and neighboring provinces are already struggling to get the tourists back. A heavy-handed campaign to round up and boot out selfless foreign volunteers for contravening labor laws would not help. - The Editor

#### Safety before profit?

It is just five weeks since the tsunami struck, and I still have nightmares about the churning mixture of heavy wooden deckchairs and screaming sunbathers I saw from my apartment overlooking Kata Beach.

It was clear to me that, without those heavy deck chairs, the number of people injured and killed by the tsunami would have been far less.

Thus, I have been following with interest the debate that has been going on over the future of the deck chair business. Should there be plastic mats instead of deck chairs? Should only lightweight plastic deck chairs be allowed? Should there be only one line of deck chairs and gaps between each concession? Should the deck chairs be stacked up every evening?

I was shocked and disheartened to see last night that several hundred deck chairs had been sneaked onto Kata Beach, many of them the heavy wooden type, and that in some places already three rows of these wooden weapons had been laid out.

Has nothing been learned

from the terrible disaster that snuffed out so many lives and destroyed so many families? Human life and safety seem to play second fiddle to the greed of the businesspeople who own all these chairs.

It would seem to me that, at the very least, only lightweight plastic chairs should be allowed. and that these should be stacked up until a tourist wants one, when it would be put out for him. There is no point in destroying the safety and beauty of the beach by laying out unused chairs.

Every evening, without fail, all the chairs should be stacked away. Each deck chair concession would be responsible for keeping the beach in front of it spotlessly clean, and have to have a proper trash bin, which the concessionaire would carry up to the road every evening.

Is the government so weak in the face of business influences that it can learn nothing, change nothing, improve nothing following a disaster that killed more than 5,000 Thais and foreigners?

Is this the message that will encourage tourists to visit here again?

We know that the further inland one is from the shore, the less severe – or non-existent even – the effects of a tsunami will be. It is therefore essential that Phuket should implement effective plans, including physical measures to prevent or limit the

effect of any potential tsunami, for the coastal areas.

Plans have been drawn up to construct sea defenses but construction has not yet started. It will be something of a balancing act – on the one hand making the beaches safe but on the other ensuring that any structures do not detract from the beauty of the beaches, which is what attracts most of Phuket's tourists.

One plan is to build "safety zones" or platforms around 20 meters out to sea. Anyone swimming at the time a tsunami approaches can escape to them.

We should also build sea walls – as well as refuges inland but close to the shore – higher than any potential tsunami – again for people to escape to. Sirens could also be installed along the beaches.

These plans have been submitted to the government for approval and although I can't estimate exactly how long it will take for this to be given, I imagine that it will be within three to six months.

Making any type of radical changes to the shoreline, such as the building of sea walls, will

have to take into account the people who own businesses or homes near the beach. Agreement must be reached with them.

Public hearings about the redevelopment of Patong Beach have been conducted and there are four officially-appointed committees working on different areas of interest: the economy, the environment, communities and buildings.

It is obvious that the effect the tsunami has had – and continues to have – is massive. It is no secret that the economy, which is driven by tourism, is in a parlous state and many people are out of work as a direct result of the low numbers of tourists.

The government is trying to provide immediate, short-termhelp to those now out of work but it must also look to the future and help tourism-related businesses.

Although it is out of my remit to comment on it, something must be done to increase tourists' confidence, thereby encouraging them to return to Phuket.

I know that the Tourism Authority of Thailand and the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) are hard at work promoting to the rest of the world – and Thailand – that Phuket is safe.

And Phuket is safe.

## An official display of ignorance

Please do not put my byline on articles in the *Gazette* about new businesses opening in Phuket. Let me explain why.

Last week a tax officer, Chutaporn Sittikarn, Revenue Officer for Muang Phuket Region 2, visited my parents' house and quizzed my father.

My father is old and is not well, so he stays home most of the time. He doesn't know much about my job. Chutaporn showed him an article, written by me and printed in the newspaper with my byline, about a new shop selling balloons.

"Is the lady in the picture

your daughter?" she asked my father. My dad's eyesight is not good, so he found a photograph of me to show to Chutaporn, from which it should have been clear that I was not the person shown in the newspaper – even the skin color was very different.

Chutaporn, however, believed that it was me who owned the balloon shop, and issued a summons for me to appear at the Revenue Office.

In the summons I was accused of failing to pay tax, even though I have paid tax every month of every one of the seven years I have worked at the *Phuket Gazette*.

On February 2, two days before the deadline in the summons, I went to the Revenue Office. I was told to take a seat at a table with a sign above it stating, in Thai, "Survey and expedite collection of tax from those who have not paid."

I felt embarrassed and angry to be sitting there under that sign, especially when I knew I had done nothing wrong.

Chutaporn showed me the article. "Is this is your balloon shop?" she asked.

I felt so angry at the stupidity of the officers in the Revenue Department, and I let her see my anger.

I told her that maybe the officer who had targeted me didn't understand English or couldn't read. "So why did you have to interview this shop?" she asked. "How are you involved in the balloon business? Do you get income from other sources than your job?"

"I am a reporter," I said. "I have worked for the *Phuket Ga*-

zette as a reporter for seven years. My duty is to interview people and my name is printed there because I wrote this article."

Chutaporn seemed surprised, but made no apology. She said that she had received orders to follow up on this case, and it wasn't her fault.

Perhaps it was not, but at least these people should understand the situation properly before taking action. She herself should have read the article first, and understood the facts.

I wasted more than 1½ hours getting them to understand the facts and filling out a report stating that I was not involved in the the business described in the article; that I worked for the *Phuket Gazette* only; that I didn't know the lady who owned the balloon business before I interviewed her, nor where she was now.

Why do I have to have this headache because the Revenue Office staff don't do their homework?

Why do I have to sit for an hour and a half with a sign over my head implying that I cheat on my taxes?

Why did they have to disturb my family, and even, perhaps, put me on some kind of tax watchlist?

So please, from now on, do not put my name on any story about anything that may be targeted by these ignorant people.

## Getting the message

ver the past month, and especially immediately after the tsunami hit Phuket, email became critical for getting in touch with people and letting them know whether you, friends or other family members were okay or not.

But in the fight against spam, many Internet Service Providers (ISPs) now use filters which, although the intention is good, can mistake a genuine email for spam and stop it from landing in your inbox.

Sure, some spam filters are better than others, but most emails en route to their destinations go through more than one spam filter, and many filters do not let the sender know that the email was deleted.

Some ISPs let users configure filters to their own needs, such as by creating a "white list" – that is, making sure you receive all emails from people listed in your address book. This is one way of making sure you receive emails from particular people.

Conversely, such config-

urable filters allow users to cre- KHUN WOODY'S ate a "black list" of addresses that the users

specifically do not want to receive emails from, say, the vendors of a certain body-enhancement product.

Other options may include being able to turn the filter on or off, adjust the sensitivity, set allowed or forbidden domains or addresses, or change what the filter does with suspected spam, such as delete, tag or ignore it.

However, most ISPs filter your email without user-configurable settings, no options and sometimes even no notice to customers that it's being done.



To ensure you receive urgent emails, check the settings of your ISP's spam filter, such as these options for Yahoo accounts.

Worse still, many ISPs do not manage the filter themselves, instead outsourcing that task to another company that deletes what it deems to be spam and passing the rest on to you.

Why is this worse? Because such ISPs usually dismiss complaints about genuine emails not being delivered, or simply refer

> customers to the company that manages the filter, which in turn will usually refuse

to deal with end users and refer them back to their ISP.

Then there's your own spam filter. It doesn't matter which one you use but it's not enough simply to install it. You have to make sure that the white list is up to date, and that the filter is set to allow emails from people in your contacts list and, perhaps, addresses you've sent to or replied to.

In addition, make sure that the white lists for both your spam filter and your ISP's are the same. If you don't receive an

email, don't assume that it wasn't sent at all. Check with the sender, and keep in mind that it's quite possible the email was sent but was blocked en route.


Regularly check your spam or "Junk Mail" folder, as well as the Deleted Items folder – it's all to easy to delete a message accidentally among all the offers for pills and mortgages.

For those who use a desktop search tool, such as those from Copernic, Google or Microsoft, a handy trick is to include your Deleted Items and Junk Mail folders in the search

It is best to have a totally separate email account with a different ISP as a backup. Any of the web-based email services, such as Hotmail and Yahoo, cost nothing, and provide a place to receive or send messages that are being filtered or otherwise going astray.

If you are missing an email, ask the sender to try again with a CC to your alternate account. If one copy arrives but not the other, you know there's something blocking that message.

## The man who made his own prison

moniker of "Monster" Kody Scott, bestowed upon himself in prison.

Against all odds – he could barely read a comic book when he started prison life – he wrote

Monster (Penguin, New York, 1994, 383 pp) which is subtitled "The Autobiography of an L.A. Gang Member".

Even odder, the book received the imprimatur of the dovenne of literary critics, Michiko Kakutani of the New York Times, who

called it: "A shockingly raw, frightening portrait of gang life in South Central Los Angeles to-

Monster is also narrowminded, repetitive and, despite some very good bits, boring. From the age of 11, in 1975, Monster was a member of his neighborhood gang, part of a baffling mosaic of gangs divided into two rival groups, the Crips – who wore blue – and the Bloods, who wore

He grew up in a tree-lined neighborhood of detached family houses with lawns and gardens.

He had his own stereo and a 12speed bike. And a huge arsenal of handguns and sawed-off shotguns.

I did not bother to count the number of fellow teenagers he claims to have killed in ambushes and drive-by shootings but it's in the 20-30 range, all tit-fortat killings.

"Who fired the first shot? Who knows?! But, too, who cares, when one of theirs is laying in a pool of blood with his brains blown out. This question becomes weightless in the aftermath of a shooting when someone has died. Thus the goal becomes the elimination of the shooter or as many of his comrades as possible. This inevitably leads to war – a full-scale mobilization of as many troops as needed to achieve the desired result: funerals."

Monster's sole ambition is to survive the perpetual gang wars to become an OG (Old Gangsta) with a mythic reputation in his neighborhood.

He graduates from juvenile hall to the major prisons of San Quentin and Soledad by the time he is 19.

As with many criminal memoirs, much of this takes place in jail, because that's where most of his young life is spent.

What is his rationale for the

anyika Shakur is the new constant mayhem? He can't even tell his long-suffering, hard-working Mom.

"I had no adequate answer then for Mom about what was happening to me," he writes. "Actually, I wasn't fully aware of

the gang's gravitational pull. I knew, for instance, that the total lawlessness was alluring, and that the sense of importance, selfworth, and raw power was exciting, stimulating, and intoxicating beyond any other high on this planet. But still

I could not explain what had happened to pull me in so far that nothing outside of my set [gang] mattered."

He does indeed present a lot of shocking violence both on the street and in prison, where the weak are not only subjected to rape but to drinking urine and eating soap.

And you can only admire his courage while he admits his fears. On his first night in an adult prison, for example, the men in the cells along the corridor identify themselves as Bloods and demand to know his gang affiliation.

> Though in mortal fear, he proudly proclaims that he is a Crip.

> The Bloods swear to kill him the next morning. But when he lines up outside his cell the next morning, he is shocked to see smiling friends from his old neighborhood. They'd only been testing his loyalty.

Monster rises high in the

prison hierarchy and undergoes the usual indoctrination into Islam and radical politics, along with big doses of black racist cant and jar-



He emerges as a "revolutionary" and returns to his old neighborhood at the ripe old age of 24, shocked to find that younger gang members have grown rich on the crack trade and are now wielding automatic combat rifles.

He tries to go straight, holding down a job for the first time for the sake of his girlfriend and daughters, but winds up back in prison for another seven-year term for assaulting a neighborhood crack dealer and "confiscating" his van.

Ultimately, it's all too depressing: a life completely fettered by race and neighborhood ties and gang slang. He has no friends outside, never travels anywhere, never reads anything other than radical political tracts. He's made his own prison.



## Insurance payouts offset by policy sales

PHUKET: Insurance companies in Thailand are paying out billions of baht in life and property insurance claims arising from the tsunami, but insurance agents on Phuket are looking forward to a surge in the number of new customers taking out insurance coverage.

Watchara Kasamanont, Chief of Phuket Provincial Insurance Office, said that, in Phuket alone, insurance companies have already paid out more than 500 million baht in compensation.

"Business operators and homeowners who have been affected by the tsunami and have bought insurance policies covering flood or earthquake will definitely receive compensation," he said.

QBE Insurance (Thailand) Co Ltd has paid out the most in compensation for damages from the tsunami, honoring some 190 claims totaling about 1.5 billion baht.

QBE Southern Regional Manager Jamroen Saeton said, "We have paid about 95% of claims. We expect to pay all claims by the end of February."

To offest the huge payouts, K. Jamroen said that he expects a surge in the number of people taking out new insurance coverage. His company last year saw a 20% increase in the number of policies, and this year he expects to improve on that number by more than 50%.

Ayudhaya Insurance Plc's Phuket Branch Manager, Sorawudh Palimapan, told the Gazette that his company is rushing to pay every claim. "So far we have paid 70% of total claims, which amount to 300 million baht," he said.

He added that his company had increased the insurance premium for earthquake and flood damage in "risk" areas from the minimum rate to the maximum rate, but stressed that the premiums for coverage against other kinds of disaster

have remained unchanged from those that become aware of how essential insurance applied before the tsunami.

Surasak Chaiyanupong, Phuket branch manager for New Hampshire Insurance Co Ltd, said that his company has received 182 motor vehicle claims as well as claims relating to 15 private homes, 82 small-to-medium enterprises and 15 hotels.

He, too, expects insurance companies to benefit from a boom in the number of new policies taken out, but added that this boom will depend on how soon the tourism industry recovers - without recovery, business operators will not be able to afford the premiums.

Sawai Petchphan, Assistant Vice-President of Finansa Life Assurance Co Ltd, said that Finansa has paid 20 million baht in life insurance claims since December 28, but that the payouts are already being offset by income from new

is for [recovering from] such a disaster or accident, which can happen at any time.

"Many new customers took out policies in Phuket in January. So far we have received 10 million baht from new customers, compared with 3 million baht in January 2004," he said.

In contrast, Tawee Jitsajja, the Senior Agency Consultant for American International Assurance Co Ltd (Thailand) (AIA), said that the tsunami may have negatively affected AIA's sales figures.

'Our sales figures increased by 8% in January, but if there had been no tsunami, the figures might have increased by more than 10%," he said.

K. Tawee added that American International has not increased its life insurance premiums, and probably will not do so in the near future, because the chances of disaster of a similar scale in the near

reader has asked: 'How can the French franc become part of the Euro without problems yet other currencies, such as the baht, have extreme difficulties with US dollar linkage?"

It is a good question and one to which there are no easy answers.

When a currency is linked to another ("pegged"), it no longer trades freely, although it usually benefits from the association, such as with trade and investment flows.

In addition, if the currency is linked, as it usually is, to the currency of a much larger economic power, it may also give greater acceptability to the smaller "partner".

In the case of the French franc's linkage to the Euro, this came about in a series of steps, including linkage with the forerunner of the Euro, the European currency unit, or ECU.

The initial peg was not tightly fixed and it allowed participating currencies to trade within 3% of the peg.

The central banks of the participating countries had to manage their economies in a similar fashion to their neighbors. This involved keeping inflation at modest levels, money supply under control and short-term interest rates at levels that would keep

the currency within the required

It was relatively simple for France to achieve this because one other requirement for exchange rate stability is that the countries linked should generally follow the same economic cycle.

The core economy of the ECU was Germany, and the French and German economies follow virtually the same economic cycle. This was not the case for the UK, which was in recession when other major economies in the future Eurozone were experiencing growth.

When an economy is in recession, the central bank lowers short-term interest rates to reduce the cost of borrowing to encourage more borrowing, which sows the seeds of economic recovery. But the UK had to keep its interest rate high to maintain Eurozone currency levels, which eventually proved impossible.

France had no such problems and its eventual accession to the Euro was virtually painless.

The baht linkage to the US dollar was completely different. Thailand's economy in the early 1990s was growing at a phenomenal pace, which required capital to

be constantly added to the economy to provide for continuing economic expansion.

Thailand started to run a serious current account deficit in layman's terms, it was living beyond its means. Thai companies noted that, in order to maintain the currency peg with the US dollar, domestic Thai interest rates had to be much higher than their US counterparts. It therefore made more sense to borrow in US dollars than in

Unfortunately, much of this borrowed money did not increase productive capacity in business. There was another, seemingly easier attraction and that was to invest in property – mainly in the Bangkok property market which was booming.

Thailand's private external debt started to soar and its current account deficit reached the equivalent of more than 6% of gross domestic product.

Thailand made matters worse by discouraging private foreign direct investment. Foreigners could buy shares on the Thai stock market and foreign corporations could invest and build factories, but true foreign private investment of a longer duration – such as land purchase - was officially discouraged. It

The result was that Thai companies were steadily increasing their foreign debt, and foreign investment was mostly in the form of "hot money" invested in the country's financial markets.

Hot money is short-term

capital from overseas, with investors looking for speculative gains. Such money is usually divested at the first sign of trouble in the country where it is invested.

There is nothing wrong with hot money and it can even be a major advantage, but it should never be viewed as longterm capital.

Although hedge-fund managers saw and profited rapidly from Thailand's plight, they did not cause the economic collapse; it was going to happen anyway.

What is often conveniently forgotten is that much of the money that was taken out of Thailand in June and July in 1997 was actually *Thai* money.

It was not only foreigners who were savvy enough to see the impending crash.

takes immense pleasure from getting his first tottering steps right.

ne walks around in the sun and fresh air getting exercise, in good company, playing a game that, even if one never excels at it, at least offers the likelihood of improving with every swing or putt made.

And then there are the clothes. Where else can one get away with wearing such fashion crimes as loud tartans (plaid, dear Transatlantic Cousins) and one glove, apart from in Michael Jackson's house, that is?


My golf career begins with Bruce Whitehead, the British PGA Pro at Laguna Phuket Golf Club.

It's early on a Sunday morning and I'm there in my new natty Nike golf shoes, tasteful shorts and polo shirt, and one glove. I feel an utter fraud and doomed to failure.

Bruce immediately puts me at ease with his relaxed manner. It is time for The Arms. It actually feels like a *tai chi* lesson. Stand up straight with feet apart to shoulder width, knees flexed slightly, with the arms hanging naturally.

"Keep your arms straight and bring your hands together," suggests Bruce. I do. "That's it," grins Bruce. "Your arms and hands are in the perfect position to hold a golf club."

I practice this simple maneuver a few more times, grinning at the simplicity of the



movement, before Bruce slots a 9-iron between my hands and we progress to The Grip.

I take hold of the club and Bruce suggests a few changes. I am holding it across my palm at nigh on 90° to my arm, like an ax. I am gripping it with my hands, not, as I should be, with my fingers.

Bruce adjusts my grip, moves the top of the handle to rest on the pad of my palm on the side away from my thumb. The club is now on a diagonal across my palm.

He curls my bottom three fingers around the handle and I notice the small "V"-shape between thumb and forefinger. It's pointing toward my right shoulder, just as it should be.

I interlock my right little finger with my left forefinger. The V-shape between my right thumb and forefinger is also pointing to my right shoulder. The grip is with the fingers, not the palms. Bruce proclaims my grip a success. I feel an upwelling of emotion.

I have my feet shoulder-width apart and the club in my hands. It is time to adopt The Stance. But first, I watch Bruce demonstrate. It looks simple enough.

I catch sight of myself in the reflective door of the teaching room by the driving

range. Bruce makes The Stance look graceful. I, in contrast, make it look disgraceful. Rounded shoulders, backside sticking out, club thrust away from my body like it's a sh\*tty stick.

I try again, under Bruce's guidance. Knees slightly flexed, back, neck and head straight and hinge at the waist until the club touches the ground, my eyes following the club's head all the way down. My weight is distributed evenly between my heels and the balls of my feet.

My stance meets with Bruce's approval and I practice 10 or more times. I am only 30 minutes into the lesson and I feel I've achieved an incredible amount.

It will soon be time for The Back Swing and The Down Swing. Watch this space.

Time for soup before the Other pickles and appetiz- main courses arrived - a heav-

enly fragrant and, thankfully, light solyanka. "This is good for hangovers," Aleks advised. I made a mental note to take some home for the morning.

Solyanka is a light broth fortified by healthy amounts of diced meat and veg - more or less anything – fish or mushrooms, olives, lemon slices and with sour cream poured in just before serving. It's cracking stuff and I proposed a toast to the chef.

My companions followed suit, unsurprisingly. They are good people, extremely warmhearted and there was a definite party atmosphere brewing.

They had reason to celebrate. U Ksenii opened on November 27 last year and – little wonder - closed just a month later. Thankfully, all the staff were unharmed, and when I dined there it had just reopened after repairs. We were all letting our hair down and, in a way, claiming back Patong Beach as the place to do just that.

"You need solid food with

vodka," Irina told me. To the table came moscowskie - steamed dumplings stuffed with pork and topped with sour cream – and bliny – pancakes – stuffed with a rich mixture of meat, onions and spices, topped with, yep, sour


There is nothing nouvelle, fusion or arty-farty about Russian food. It is honest and unpretentious, full of character and ... nobility, just like the people.

Back to Earth for a second as a plateful of barbecued pork ribs came my way. Then it was time for another round of drinks, just to give the meat something to soak up. I began eating the ribs with knife and fork.

Aleks leaned over. "It's better if you use your fingers," she said. Not quite knowing where to look for a moment, I gave a cautious "Oh really?" before deciding that she was refering to the ribs. I managed to make a sizable dent in the pork but was simply too full to eat the whole thing.

It was time for another Stoli, just one, I swear, before I had to say dosvidaniya. I had just enough brain cells left to reflect that the most difficult recipe for any restaurant to perfect is food, booze and company. U Ksenii has and it seems to be right at home in Patong.

seven-rai plot surrounded by trees on the hills above Kamala is in the process of being turned into a development of just seven quality homes.

Construction of the Kamala Orchid Estate started in April 2003, and Managing Di-

rector Michel Lavallée and Project Manager Jacques Lefebvre say they expect to sell all seven homes and complete the development by the end of this year.

The homes are, according to Mr Lefebvre, uncompromisingly Thai in style. "There are other Thai-style villas in Phuket," he explained, "But fortunately for us, most developers have incorporated Balinese elements into their designs, or made the roofs lower, for example. We, though, offer real Thai style.'

The company can also decorate and furnish the homes for

buyers, also in Thai style. Prices start at 23 million baht.

So far, just one property has been completed. Called Baan Chang Thai – after a Thai restaurant Mr Lavallée owns in Canada - it is now being used as a showhome; the other houses will be built as buyers put down their de-

Baan Chang Thai - priced at around 45 million baht – has two stories and features four bedrooms, six bathrooms, a living room, kitchen and dining room, maid's quarters, gymnasium and study. There are also two car parking spaces.

There is a great deal of flexibility in design, though, said Mr Lavallée. Villas can be anything between 640 and 1,085 square meters, depending on what the customer wants.

In addition, although the standard pool is 5m x 11m, the size – and style – can be changed according to the customer's wishes. "We can build the pool on two levels," he said, "So the water flows from the upper pool to the lower before being circulated back up again. That's wonderful."

The development will have its own reserve well water supply, underground power cabling, satellite TV and telephone lines, as well as 24-hour security, a landscaping and gardening service, housekeeping, engineering and maintenance, an administrative and secretarial service, and the use of a private vehicle and chauffeur for residents and their guests.

The developers stress that they expect no problems with either drainage or landslides.

Said Mr Lefebvre, "So far we've invested about 60 to 70 million baht, although, naturally, that will rise as we build the other six villas."

The developers are aiming to sell mainly to residents of Hong Kong, Singapore, Europe and the US.

Mr Lavallée said interest fell after last month's tsunami, but is now picking up again.

Kamala Orchid Estate is on Kamala Soi 10, near Phuket FantaSea. The architect is East West Architects Co Ltd.

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



## The Scrooge approach to Valentine's

have always been a bit cynical about Valentine's Day. Actually, I'm skeptical about just about everything. I do try not to show favoritism in this regard – I treat everything with equal disdain.

Valentine's Day has changed significantly since the halcyon days of my youth. It used to be an excuse for sending an anonymous token of affection to one's secret heart's desire. You never signed the card – that would be too crass.

If you were feeling exceptionally lustful, you might even send a bunch of flowers, but, again, you would never be vulgar enough to sign the accompanying card.

These days it's just another excuse for the manufacturers of overpriced greetings cards to encourage us to buy and send more of them, and for companies such as Interflora to make millions out of expatriates.

They're especially clever about this. I once made the mistake of giving my email address to Interflora. I needed to placate my mother a few days after her birthday, so I bought a giftwrapped pot plant online as a belated birthday present.

They've been bombarding me with emails ever since, especially around February 14.

Why not do something different for your beloved this year?

And what's even better about this idea is that it won't cost you a single *satang*.

There's a plant that thrives in Phuket that would be perfect as a Valentine's Day gift – the main difference is that it's a bit subtler than a Hallmark card bearing the legend "Roses are red, violets are blue..." or some such nonsense.


The hearts-on-a-chain vine is just plain cute. You probably wouldn't even notice it from a distance; all you can see from afar is pink patches among the leaves.

It has a number of alternative names, such as the Mexican creeper, queen's jewels, the coral vine and even *cadena de amor* (Spanish for "chain of love") in its original home of Mexico. Perhaps that's even more apt for this time of the year. Thais know this plant as *phuang chompoo*.

I'm staring at a cutting of *phuang chompoo* right now. I secretly pinched from a neighbor's garden, though I'm sure he won't mind.

The heart-shaped leaves are about eight centimeters long and are matt green. "Hearts on a chain" couldn't be more accurate a name. The racemes of flowers are made from five diminutive petals each shaped like a petite heart.

There are thousands of them on a plant – would this not

be the perfect gift for the love of your life?

But don't uproot it and wrap it in plastic. Plant it instead. All you need to do is exactly what I did – find a decent-sized example and prune off a woody cutting.

Initially, put it in some moist potting compost and wait. In the early days, it will start to wilt a bit and generally whinge. It has every right to, really, as it has to produce completely new

roots where none existed before.

After a few weeks, put it in the ground in well-drained, sandy soil. Keep watering it and wait for the growth spurt that will inevitably follow.

The Mexican creeper is an amazing climber. Allow it to spread out on the ground and it will be content enough, but give it something to cling onto, such as a wire frame or a chain-link fence, and it will launch itself sky-

ward like Chris Bonington on amphetamines.

It does this with a curly tendril at the end of each chain of flowers. The tendril will coil itself around anything it can in an effort to reach new heights.

Some say that it can manage 10 meters of growth in a single year, with proper support (and counseling, too, perhaps?). In the sort of climate we have in Phuket, it will flower year-round.

The only thing you need to watch is the lower regions of the plant, once it's got into the swing of things climbing-wise.

If you don't cut back the top outer parts on a regular basis, you'll find that the lower sections become a bit forgotten, and start to look a little bare. Prune it regularly, and the whole thing will stay a healthy-looking green.

Don't bother with a Valentine's card this year, and, unless you want to be reminded several times a week in your email inbox, don't go for an online flower-delivery order either.


Say it with flowers by all means, but—initially—you'll need to "borrow" them from your neighbor.
