Three proposals made for Chalong marina

PHUKET CITY: Three proposals have been received by Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura for the construction of a large marina in Chalong Bay, to be financed by a mixture of government and private sector money.

One proposal is from a consortium headed locally by Lifestyle Properties Co Ltd, and the *Gazette* understands that two other concepts have been submitted, one by an Australian consortium and one by a French group.

Lifestyle Properties Co Consultant Ken Abday was close-lipped about his company's proposal. He told the *Gazette*, "Until it gets further along, I don't want to comment. We explained our concept to the Governor, and we'll see where it takes us."

None of the plans has been made public, but the *Gazette* understands that the finished marina will be larger than Phuket's three existing marinas combined,

and the construction will involve huge dredging works and the reclaiming of some 30 rai of land from the sea.

The announcement, made at a meeting on May 31, follows

a previous one, on July 22 last year, that the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) was keen to pursue a joint public-private initiative to develop a new marina to support

Phuket's burgeoning marine industry.

In October last year, Vice-Governor Niran Kalayanamit told the *Gazette* that Ian Davey, Commercial Consultant for the Australian Embassy in Thailand, had been brought in to assist the *OrBorJor* in finding a professional consultant to develop the master plan.

Commenting on the Lifestyle Properties Co submission, Gov Udomsak described the project as "...a win-win situation [that will] benefit the government, the private sector and the public [in Phuket]".

He speculated that the project would cost "...more than 1 billion baht", and that the *OrBor-Jor* would contribute "between 30% and 40% of the total."

He added that the public would be given an opportunity to comment on whichever proposal is selected by both the *OrBorJor* and the central government, although he could not give the time frame for a decision being made.

'Bad land' back on ministerial agenda

PHUKET CITY: Revocation of improperlyissued land title deeds will remain a top government priority in the upper southern provinces of Thailand, the Interior Minister announced at a meeting with provincial officials on May 31.

The meeting, held at the Royal Phuket City Hotel, was chaired by Interior Minister Pol Gen Chidchai Wannasatit who, in his dual role as a Deputy Prime Minister, also serves as Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's right-hand man.

The session, entitled "The fight against


drugs, mafia, poverty and threats to public safety", was attended by some 300 government officers from Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Chumphon, Ranong and Surat Thani, which collectively form the "upper southern" region

In his report on problems facing Phuket, the island's Governor, Udomsak Uswarangkura, said land encroachment issues were at the forefront, largely because the island's migrant workforce had swelled the actual population to about 500,000, nearly double the official population of about 290,000 [as counted by house registration forms].

Most alarming, he reported, was that many encroachment cases involved protected mangrove forests.

Foreigners, too, were involved in encroachment, many living in homes built above the 80-meter limit on construction. More than 200 such homes were constructed on land for which Chanote titles had been issued, he reported. This necessitated a review of existing regulations, he said.

In the fight against those involved in organized crime, referred to as "influential people" in government parlance, the Governor said that people relying on public Continued on page 2

June 23, Rassada: From the three-way intersection at Moo Baan Rassada, along Rassadanusorn Rd past Soi Ta Chine, Soi King Kaew U-thit, Moo Baan Suwannakarn, Moo Baan City Home and Trang Rd to the Phu Yai Baan Rd intersection.

One dies as dive boat sinks near Similans

PHUKET: At least one person was reported dead after a diveboat capsized and sank 40 kilometers off the coast of Phuket on the morning of June 7.

As the *Gazette* went to press, details were still sketchy but it was believed that the 20-meter boat, from Khao Lak-based dive business Bubble Blue, was traveling from Phuket to the Similan Islands when it sank during a storm at around 8 am.

It is thought that there were 13 passengers and five crew on

board at the time. One person on board, a woman tourist named as Sukonthapan Weerawan, is said to have died. It was not known what other casualties there were.

A police boat and a navy boat were sent to the scene after the alert was raised – at 12:50 pm – and Capt Kiatkul Suwan, Commanding Officer of the Naval Air Section, Third Area Command, told the *Gazette* that a helicopter was also sent to the scene.

Capt Kiatkul said the helicopter had been kept on standby until 5:30 pm, but did not pick anyone up, and it then had to be

sent to Cape Panwa, where another boat had sunk.

He added that the Royal Thai Navy vessel *Kamronsin* was put on standby during the day between the Similan and Surin Islands, but returned to Phuket just after 6 pm.

This was the second sinking of a dive boat in waters off the Andaman Coast of Thailand in two months. On April 11, six passengers and seven crew were pulled from the sea at the end of a seven-hour ordeal after the liveaboard dive boat MV Rhapsody sank near the Surin Islands.

Pelé, Cantona to visit island

PHUKET: The island will play host on July 28 to a charity beach soccer match, which will be attended by soccer greats Pelé and Eric Cantona.

The announcement was made by Somsak Thepsuthin, Minister of Sports and Tourism, who visited the island to watch the Phuket round of the ASEM (Asia Europe Meeting) Youth Games at Surakul Stadium.

The exact location of the event was not known as the *Gazette* went to press.


Brazilian Pelé, 64, is feted as one of the greatest players of all time and holds a raft of accolades.

He was Brazil's Minister of Sports from 1995 to 1998, is an honorary Knight of the British Empire and a United Nations Goodwill Ambassador.

Among his less well-known achievements is that, in 1970, both sides in the 1970 civil war in Nigeria held a ceasefire so that they could watch Pelé play an exhibition match in Lagos.

The enigmatic and fiery Frenchman Cantona, 39, who was once captain of Manchester United and of the French national side, will also be in Phuket for the match.

The game in Phuket will be free to spectators.

transport, particularly taxis, needed a greater variety of transport options [in order to break up the various transport syndicates].

Gov Udomsak said this would involve imposing stricter standards on the various existing taxi services, and introducing new ones.

There are currently 75 people on the provincial list of "influential figures", the Governor said, of whom 14 have already been arrested. Another 46 are "under surveillance", while 15 more are described as "potential" mafiosi, he reported.


In the War on Drugs, the Governor reported that the street value of drugs seized in 2004 was about one million baht. In the year to date the figure is 400,000 baht, he said.

Issues of concern reported by the Phang Nga delegation included illegal encroachment of forest land.

Security issues shared by many provinces included the presence of illegal Burmese workers and threats to security in public places, such as airports, shopping centers and piers.

Gen Chidchai said success in dealing with all of these threats rested in improving the flow of information from village level up to provincial level.

By way of example he said, "It doesn't matter if you make a drug arrest and seize a few [pills]; the key is using that information to work your way up to the kingpins."

A low-down, dirty crime

PHUKET CITY: The new garbage cans being distributed throughout the city have proved such a hit with the public that they keep disappearing.

The new blue plastic trashcans, about a meter high, are of such heavy-duty construction that they can be rammed by a vehicle without cracking. Other special design features include high chemical resistance and a unique shape that prevents all but the cleverest of soi dogs from removing garbage from them.

The trouble is, they are so good that people keep stealing them.

Phuket City Deputy Mayor Sornsiri Koopongsakorn, who has been assigned the essential task of ensuring that the receptacles stay in the public domain, said the Municipality first noted the problem not long after the bins were first put on city streets.

"Currently, we are getting calls every week from people asking us to replace bins. In some cases, no sooner do we put a bin down than we get a call asking us to replace it," she said.

Some 500 of the bins were placed throughout the city in locations that did not already have the larger, standard-issue green or yellow garbage bins.

"With such special features, we expected people would try to steal the new bins to use for storing water, or for collecting things or even to sell as scrap," she told the *Gazette*.

"The new bins are definitely more popular with thieves than the old models."

The Municipality was not

able to say just how many of the new containers have been purloined.

But it is a large enough figure to have prompted the Municipality to take a hard line. K. Sornsiri said that the Municipality was prepared to prosecute to the full extent of the law anyone caught stealing one.

Immigration go out to their 'customers'

CHALONG: The Phuket Immigration Office was due to open a new immigration service counter at the Phuket Port Control Center in Chalong on June 7.

The counter will initially be open every Tuesday and Thursday between 9 am and 3 pm. It will be staffed by three Immigration officers.

Phuket Immigration Superintendent Pol Col Witawat Buranasompop told the Gazette he expected that, by the high season, the counter would be open fulltime every day.

He said, "The Chalong counter will be useful for the many residents who live or work in Chalong, Rawai, Nai Harn or Kata-Karon, because it will save them having to go into Phuket City to deal with a variety of immigration matters."

Counter staff will be able to handle applications for short-stay extensions (10-30 days), re-entry permits, extensions of one-year permits to stay and notification - Anongnat Sartpisut of residential address for aliens,

and will be able to advise on other immigration matters.

He added that his office is looking to set up a similar service counter in Cherng Talay, but has yet to find a suitable location.

Col Witawat acknowledged that the mobile immigration service offered in several hotels earlier this year had not been as successful as he had hoped.

"We think some residents were reluctant to use the service because they did not want to have to dress up to go into the hotels where Immigration staff were running counters," he explained.

New public parks planned

PHUKET: The island may soon get three new public parks under the Cabinet's "One Tambon, One Park" initiative.

The Phuket office of the Royal Forestry Department is to ask its national HQ at the Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives for permission to create Pa Bangkanun Park in Tambon Thepkrasattri, Thalang District; Khao Toh Se Park in Tambon Rassada, Muang District, and Khao Panthurat Park in Tambon Koh Kaew, Thalang District.

The first project the Phuket office will submit for approval is the 64-hectare (400-rai) Pa Bangkanun Park, with a budget of 630,000 baht.

Phuket Forestry Office Chief Phoppon Siriluksanapong told the Gazette, "We will send the proposal for the first project to Bangkok soon. We are sure it will be approved and we will start construction during this year.

"If the Ministry goes on to approve Khao Toh Se and Khao Phanthurat, those two parks will be finished within the next two years, and we are looking to create a fourth park in either Patong or Kamala."

Phuket Air hires human error experts

LONDON: Problem-plagued Phuket Air has recruited a British safety-training provider to instill "best practice" throughout every level of its operations.

The deal between Phuket Air and training and development company The Human Factor was announced in London by the founder of The Human Factor, ex-British Royal Air Force pilot George Duncan, and Phuket Air Executive Vice-President Captain Chawanit Chiamcharoenvut.

It is not known how much Phuket Air is paying for the services of Mr Duncan's company.

Since the middle of April, a Phuket Air plane has been prevented from leaving Sharjah airport in the United Arab Emirates after passengers saw fuel pouring from a wing (the company said the wing had been "overfilled" with fuel); a Bangkokbound flight had to return to London after developing hydraulics problems; the airline was banned from flying into the UK and the Netherlands after safety inspectors found "serious" faults on

planes, and a plane was impounded at London's Gatwick airport for non-payment of landing fees.

In addition, the airline canceled its Bangkok-Bali route, claiming that passenger numbers had slumped because the ban on flying from Amsterdam had robbed the Bali service of "feeder" flights.

Mr Duncan outlined The Human Factor's plans for Phuket Air, saying: "A range of programs will be implemented across the supply chain, and across the company, to ensure that best practice in Western European safety and service standards are embedded at all levels and locations."

The Human Factor specializes in reducing human error in "mission-critical" situations, a wide compass that could include anything from an aircraft cockpit to a hospital operating theater.

Sribenja Semmeesook, Communication Consultant of Phuket Air's PR company, Aziam Burson-Marsteller, told the Gazette that the airline hoped that recruiting The Human Factor would make customers more confident about using Phuket Air.

"I think this training will be good for crews, will make passengers more confident, and will enable us to develop our service, similar to other airlines," she

Monk War

NONG KHAI: A dispute over alms collection routes turned violent when three novices from Chansamakee Temple were set upon by an armed gang of monks and novices from a rival temple.

Police were notified of the "Monk War" on the morning of May 29. Arriving on the scene at the Kokmang-ngao community in Tambon Meechai, they found 17-year-old novice Vitthaya Srithep on the ground with slash marks on his forehead; his attackers had already fled the scene.

Vitthaya was rushed to Nong Khai Hospital, where he was treated for his wounds and released. He could not name his attackers during police questioning the following day, but told investigators that they were monks and novices from Koh Sri Thep Temple, about one kilometer away from Chansamakee Temple along the same road.

Vitthaya told police that he had been out collecting alms along his normal route when a group of some 15 to 20 monks appeared, put down their alms bowls, and charged him and two fellow novices. Some of the attacking monks were wearing brass knuckles; others were armed with iron bars.

Police said that the Monk War appeared to result from competition for an alms route in the Kokmang-ngao community, which had long been served by the older Chansamakee Temple of the Theravada sect.

After the Mahayana sect opened the Koh Sri Thep Temple, the resulting competition for adherents – and the alms to be derived therefrom - grew until it finally reached the breaking point. Both sects, it should be noted, hold non-violence as a principal virtue.

Following the investigation Phra Monton Nidtaro, 24, Phra Boonlerd Bongpan, 28, and two novices, all of Koh Sri Thep Temple, were defrocked. They now face assault charges.

Koh Sireh: the next

fter receiving a 300million-baht government budget, Tambon Rassada Administration Organization has set about doubling the current width of the island's ring road from it's current six meters. Someone, it would seem, expects the volume of traffic to increase soon.

Other *OrBorTor* projects in the works on the island, according to OrBorTor Vice-President Chamrat Kittivet, include 16 million baht to constructing a bund to protect the seashore, and landscaping around Sireh Bay.

An additional 30 million baht is earmarked for the development of the "Suriyatape mountain" sunrise viewpoint, which is primarily intended as a tourist attraction, but could also serve as an evacuation point in the event of another tsunami.

"The sunrise is so beautiful here, but at the moment we don't

have any facilities like this for tourists to appreciate it," said K. Cham-

Longerterm plans include building a new pier that would make it easier for tourists arriving by boat to disembark.

With money flowing in, improved access to the mainland, and so many other

projects in the pipeline, Koh Sireh is attracting interest from a number of property developers. In all, there are currently 10 private- sector projects underway – eight residential developments and two resorts - all near the beach.

But first impressions of Koh Sireh are, for many, a disappointment.

The dingy area around the fishing port (sapan pla in Thai), the only road access onto the island, has become notorious for

oh Sireh, just to the east of Phuket City, has remained largely unchanged in recent decades, even while other coastal areas of the island have been completely transformed by property developers and the tourism industry. Apart from a few government buildings, much of the island is still devoted to rubber plantations – and most of its 2,700 residents are involved in the local fishing industry.

But since the replacement of the wooden bridge onto the island with a concrete one in 2002, more and more property developers are turning their eyes to this relatively unspoiled island with breathtaking views of Phang Nga Bay and easy access to Phuket City. The Gazette's Rungtip Hongjakpet, Athiga Jundee and Anongnat Sartpisut take a look at the future of the island.

been so bad that for many years visitors simply turned around and headed back to Phuket City. Would-be visitors have also been advised by OrBorTor to leave the port area off their sight-seeing itineraries – no small thing in a province where promoting tourism seems to creep

into every government project.

Not surprisingly, K. Chamrat wonders whether this reputation will deter property developers from investing more on Kon

Kawee Nganthawee thinks not. A shareholder in the Horisun Ville project on the island, K. Kawee does not see what goes on at the fishing port as a problem.

"It's only a small area of Koh Sireh which is tainted, not the whole island," he said.

"And you can't really see

what the fishing port is like until you actually get inside it.

"Look at Silom Rd in Bangkok. It's one of the most expensive addresses in the city, but to get there from Rama IV Rd you have to go through Klong Toey, the biggest slum in Bangkok.

'But that doesn't mean that Silom is a slum, and it's the same with Koh Sireh and the fishing port."

He continued, "I see myself as something of a pioneer developer. I view it as a challenge to establish a high-end property market here, but I have confidence in this project, because I have known this area since I was a young boy and the dark image doesn't bother me at all," he ex-

EricTomlin, of property managers Lynx Management Group, agrees with K. Kawee that the bad reputation of the port area is not an issue for develop-

He said, "The bad image of Koh Sireh is more in the minds of the local Thais. A lot has changed since the bad old days.

"There is better access because of the bridge, and although it is near the port, because the road has been improved, there is no longer a feeling that you are entering a no-go area," he said.

Although land prices have risen rapidly, land on Koh Sireh remains "good value" and this is



attractive to buyers, said the bullish Mr Tomlin.

He added that another advantage of Koh Sireh is that buyers can live in "quiet countryside" but still have easy access to Phuket City, the bypass road shopping area, the international schools, golf courses and the air-

"Koh Sireh is still a largely unknown place among most foreigners visiting Phuket. There has to be more advertising of the developments now getting underway to raise its profile," he

One of the biggest draws for developers is that – unlike many parts of the province – most of the land comes with clear land titles.

Most of the land is currently given over to agriculture and is owned by local families, who tend to own sizable amounts – in some cases parcels of 100 rai or more.

Many owners are reluctant to divide up their land and instead insist on selling the land in its



if you know where to look, said Khanitha Jarukirati, Project Sales Manager of CB Richard Ellis.

She said, "I have had clients property developers – ask me about Sireh. The island is getting popular. As for small plots of land, if you really keep looking, it is still possible to get a hold of

"Driving around the island, I have seen at least five 'land for sale' signs. They were for plots of eight rai, six rai and four rai; the biggest one was a plot of 114

"As for the price of land,

it's 8 to 10 million baht a rai for beachfront land and 3-5 million baht a rai for land overlooking the sea."

"I notice that most builders seem to be going for the northern part of the island, which has the highest coverage of rubber planta-

"Maybe they don't want to buy in the south, which is a relatively poor area," she continued.

One of the newer players on Sireh is Helge Saatvedt, from Norway,

whose SunRay development is just a few hundred meters south of K. Kawee's Horisun Ville.

Mr Saatvedt said, "I chose this location because I think many people would want a house near Phang Nga Bay. Most of the projects here seem to be offering properties in the higher price brackets, so I have no doubt that there will be demand for my project.

"This part of Sireh is still pretty much given over to nature,

and I think this is a safe location as well as a pleasant one."

One of the biggest developments on Sireh is the Phuket Marina Residence. Project representative Sakaodoun Vadhanabhuti predicts that the image of Sireh will change in the foreseeable future.

There are already several high-end projects here, and I believe people will soon start to see Sireh as being just as valuable as other parts of Phuket, if not more valuable," she said.

"We believe that, in time, the value of land here will rise considerably.

"At present, though, emphasis should be placed on developing facilities here, such as shopping, restaurants and government infrastructure.

"The government has already improved some parts of Sireh, especially around the port. We've seen government improvements on Sireh, especially at the port.

We intend to work closely with the OrBorTor and other agencies to develop Sireh into the next Phuket hot spot."

ew products liven up a room better than a painting, so Phuket homeowners seeking a nice landscape or seascape will be interested to know that there is a cozy art gallery-cum-coffee shop in Phuket City where they can relax, meet the artist personally, and peruse his impressive collection of watercolors, batiks and other art.

Opened about one year ago, Sea-Nam Water Colour Gallery & Coffee Corner, on Thepkrasattri Rd, is run by artist-in-residence Masani "Zone" Mawing who, in addition to being a skilled painter, also brews up a good cup of coffee.

Zone's shop features an eclectic mix of his own work, along with antiques, furniture, wood carvings, old clocks and other curios.

Amid the aroma of freshbrewed blends of coffee from France, Switzerland, Germany and America, available at 25 to 40 baht a cup, Zone told the *Gazette* that his favorite medium is watercolors, thus the shop's name "Sea-nam", which is his English-language transliteration of the Thai word for "watercolor".

"The reason I like water-color is that it allows me to make unique art that works well as stand-alone pieces. Watercolor is more complex than other forms of painting because of the need to incorporate the white of the canvas into the work. My favorites are landscapes, seascapes and other depictions of natural beauty," said the 30-year-old native of Narathiwat Province.

Another reason he now works almost exclusively in wa-

ter colors is that he developed an intolerance to the vapors given off by oil paints, he added – just about every metier has its occupational hazards.

Unlike many artists who paint as a sideline, Zone knew from his earliest years that he would be a professional artist. Even as a young student he submitted paintings in art contests, sometimes winning prizes.

Buying direct from the artist has its advantages. Given their quality, Zone's watercolors are

reasonably priced at 1,500 to 6,000 baht, frame included, and much of the work features Phuket scenery.

The artist also dabbles in batik, creating unique designs that you will seldom see worn by the island's civil servants and airport-based taxi touts.

But despite strong demand, Zone doesn't spend much time doing batik. In fact, he admits that the quality of his work – whether it be in Batik or watercolor – goes down when he is subject to pressure from buyers who want made-to-order work, especially when they give him a deadline to produce it by.

"The quality of my work definitely suffers when I am forced to work," he said bluntly.

Perhaps that trait, common among artists, also explains why he decided to give up his secure job as a full-time art teacher at the Bang Neaw School in order to start his gallery.

A graduate of Phuket Rajabhat University in education,

Zone still teaches at Bang Neaw on a part-time basis and also in a small classroom attached to the gallery. He brings his own dislike for having to work under pressure to his approach in teaching his pupils.

When it comes to producing art, it has to come from the heart, he maintains – nobody can force or even coax it out.

"I always tell parents that I only want to teach kids who are really interested in art. I tell them not to force them to study if they don't want to because that approach is futile.

"For people who do enjoy it, however, art can help develop their concentration and bring a real sense of relaxation and freedom," he said.

Apart from these obvious benefits, Zone also gets satisfaction from knowing that some of his students are learning skills that will someday be useful to them when they enter the workplace.

As for this artist's own livelihood, he told the *Gazette* that he has developed a client base of both Thais and foreigners who appreciate his work and have spread his reputation by word-of-mouth.

But thus far that success hasn't translated into having to hire staff, so Sea-nam is very much a one-man-show.

"Right now I am taking care of both the coffee corner and the gallery by myself, so I am lucky that the customers haven't been turning up all at once," he said.

Disaster early-warning center opens

rime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra officially opened the National Di saster Warning Center in Nonthaburi and expressed satisfaction with a drill that simulated the system's response to a tsunami-producing earthquake.

The government will next draw up legislation to provide a legal basis for the work of the center, which has already been allocated a budget of more than 100 million baht.

If an earthquake capable of generating a tsunami occurs, the center will gather information from the Meteorological Department and seismological stations around the world on its severity, location and the likelihood of a tidal wave.

If a tsunami were considered likely to hit provinces on the Andaman coast, the center would inform senior officials and PM Thaksin before alerting the public via text messages to all mobile phones in the country and live TV and radio broadcasts. Warning towers on the beaches would alert tourists and residents.

Security concerns: A security guard in Rayong said police severely beat him in an attempt to get him to confess his involvement in robbery and murders on May 7 that left six Cambodian workers dead and four others seriously injured.

Urai Srine, 44, was in critical condition in Rayong Hospital with bruises all over his body.

"I cannot walk because police used batons wrapped in cloth to hit both my legs. I was taken from my house in Rayong to Chon Buri. They tried to force me to say that I was involved in the crimes, but I refused," he told reporters.

"After hours of beating me, they took me home, told me to

keep my mouth shut and said that they would pay my medical expenses," he claimed.

Smooth operators: The Tourism and Sports Ministry announced the establishment of the Chinese Tourist Protection Association, with at least 25 of the roughly 80 low-cost tour operators specializing in the inbound Chinese market expected to become members.

The association will establish an around-the-clock center to serve Chinese tourists and will help crack down on so-called "zero dollar tours" that seek to make a profit from commissions paid by restaurants, hotels and souvenir shops, rather than travel expenses.

Money spent by tourists on the packages usually goes back to parent companies abroad, costing Thailand more than 100 billion baht a year, according to government estimates.

Each member of the association will pay a 2-million-baht deposit to the center. If a tourist demands damages for problems caused by a tour operator, the center will pay the tourist and later deduct the amount from the deposit of the operator responsible. Damages will be paid only after an investigation.

Magic potions: The Fund for Boosting Health wants to study the impact of advertisements for "anti-hangover" beverages on drinkers, said agency Director Dr Supreeda Adulyanon.

"Anti-hangover beverages are like other soft drinks available on the market, except that they claim to cure hangovers. This sort of ad will encourage the public to drink more and give them the false impression that drinking to excess is okay," he said, adding that the fund will

appoint a working group to study the effect of limiting advertising spots for these beverages.

There are no authentic studies showing that such tonics are effective in curing hangovers, he said.

Pouring concrete: More than 80 motorists lodged complaints with police when their vehicles were allegedly damaged by debris falling from the Bang Na-Bang Pakong expressway extension project in Bangkok.

The angry motorists accused Vichitbhan Construction Company of negligence for allowing asphalt and cement to rain down on their vehicles as they drove under the project.

The following day the company was fined 1,000 baht and received a police warning. A Vichitbhan Construction representative offered to cover the costs of repairing the vehicles, but some of those who lodged complaints said they were offered as little as 1,000 or 1,500 baht for repairs.

Crossbred controversy: Conservationists accused the National Park, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department of secretly allowing the capture of wild bulls and banteng in the Khao Ang Rue Nai Wildlife Sanctuary in Chachoengsao.

The Zoological Park Organization (ZPO) has reportedly been given a permit to catch six feral bulls at the sanctuary for cross-breeding with domesticated cows, while authorities such as the National Wildlife Committee were kept in the dark. Ten banteng (wua daeng) are also covered by the permit.

"I'm shocked. This is a big issue. You can't secretly implement this plan," said Jarujin Nabhitabhata, head of a research division at the National Science Museum.

Sumeth Kamonnart, Director of the ZPO's technical division, said the programme was aimed at ensuring that the species will not become extinct in the wild.

"We have also set our eyes on cloning," he said.

Lottery swindle: Police in Yasothon sought arrest warrants for a lottery vendor and four accomplices accused of stealing a winning lottery ticket and pocketing the 23-million-baht jackpot on May 16.

Police said the evidence clearly suggested the suspects deliberately defrauded the rightful owner of the ticket, Praiwan Hensamak, when they came to her house shortly after the lottery draw saying they wanted to take the ticket away to "double-check" it.


Lt Col Samniang said the apparent mastermind was Samang Khamthong, the Assistant Director of the Non-Formal Education board in Yasothorn Province.


K. Sam-ang offered K. Praiwan 5 million baht if she agreed to an out-of-court settlement.

"If she doesn't accept, I am ready to go to court and will hire the best lawyer in the country to defend myself. [I] taught the police officers in charge of this case," Sam-ang said.

He said the statute of limitations on such a legal case meant the offense would expire in two years, after which he would be able to withdraw the money, even if his funds were frozen during the trial.

spent on repairing the island's ring road, and installing drains and sewers to prevent flooding during the wet season.

In addition, the Municipality will take over responsibility for several stretches of road that were previously under the control of the Highways Department, including the road from Samui Airport to the Big Buddha temple and also the road from Hin Lad waterfall to Samui Hospital outside Nathon.

It is hoped that the funds will be spent wisely and responsibly in order to bring Samui's roads up to a level that matches the island's status as a major tourist destination.

Tourist police seminar: The Koh Samui Tourist Police recently held an open meeting and seminar at World Resort in Mae Nam.

The seminar focused on how to prevent and react to water accidents and drownings along Samui's coast, and provided training in how to report accidents and crimes.

The number of water-related injuries and fatalities is on the rise around Samui, particularly off the popular beaches such as Chaweng, which has dangerous rip tides at certain times of the year.

The seminar was aimed at people working in hotels, especially those close to the beach, who have first contact with tourists in need of assistance.

The Tourist Police have just 14 officers on the island, and are therefore looking to recruit about 80 volunteers for a special police force aimed at helping visitors feel safer on Koh Samui.

Chinese education: Surat


Thani Governor Vichit Vichaisarn and a representative from the Chinese Embassy opened the first Chinese-language school in Surat Thani on May 9.

The school was established to help Thai people learn and understand more about China's language and culture.

The school is on 15 rai of land, is three stories high and has 24 rooms. Students will be taught in Chinese, English and Thai from kindergarten level up to primary year 6.

romchote Traivate was born into a Royal Thai Air Force family and at tended Saint John's primary school in Bangkok where he first harbored ambitions to be a boy scout.

K. Promchote spent 22 years working at Community Development Centers before moving into sports and recreational development.



ment, and that there is sometimes a lack of support for tourism and sport inside the country.

"When the tsunami happened, it scared smaller businesses away from the area so Phuket needs to try to stimulate the domestic tourist market.

ing about them in magazines but there's nobody covering the normal, local people, so we should spend time with them and in only a short period we can learn many

"That's why I go to stay in local communities, to see what they need if they are to develop well. I encourage children to play sport with me, to show love to their families, to help their

Items range in price from 600 baht to 163,000 baht, but the shop is currently offering a discount of 15% on all sales.



Moby's *Play* and 18, released in 1999 and 2002 respectively, are without doubt masterpieces of their own genre, a genre created by the vegan, non-denominational Christian and vociferous campaigner.

How can he follow those albums? was the question both fans and critics alike asked. With nothing like 1996's *Animal Rights* was surely the answer they all wanted to hear.

Hotel, released earlier this year, is – thankfully – nothing

like Animal Rights nor is it like Play or 18, generally speaking. Moby has broken his own mold, taking fragments from it to forge another unique sound.

Gone are the cranked-up grunge guitars and wall-to-wall

sampled vocals and in their place is an album pared down to tunes and words.

While expressing and revealing the most intimate of thoughts (more easily understood after reading the concept album's sleeve notes) he makes music that soars.

Moby is intrigued by the anonymity of hotel rooms, almost using the sterility of the space used by hundreds of people to

with Andy

sleep in, cry in, bathe in, have sex in, start relationships in and end relationships in as a muse.

Perhaps there is an analogy to be drawn between the public

intimacy of a hotel room and the intimate publicity of his albums; both are intensely private spaces that are – ultimately – open for public use.

Comment from local hotel GMs would be superfluous.

The first single from *Hotel*, *Lift Me Up*, soars both aurally and spiritually. Listen closer, though; the lyrics are about the neo-fundamental-

ism sweeping The US.

He employs a fuzzy electric guitar in the background of the mix, and self-referential touches such as a diva singing into the stratosphere – not unlike Claire Torry's improvised orgasm in Pink Floyd's *Great Gig in the Sky*.

In Hotel's Track 5, Where

You End, Moby echoes We Are All Made Of Stars, one of the biggest hits from Play.

Some things fall apart; some things make you whole he sings, before asking What if the right part of leaving turned out to be wrong?

Laura Dawn takes lead vocals on *Temptation*, a *largo* interpretation of the New Order classic. Played at this pace, and breathed by Ms Dawn, it is emotion laid bare.

With barely time to grab a hanky, Track 8, *Dream About Me* is a duet between Ms Dawn and Moby, with lullaby-style Hammond organ notes playing in the back of the mix. Bleak lyrics have never sounded so sweet:

Babe, dream about me. Lie on the phone to me. Tell me no truth if it hurts bad; there's enough in my life to make me so sad.

Hotel is a glorious album of sweeping instrumental pieces and carefully-observed lyrics. Check it out or check in soon.

Brazilian Ramilson Maia began his musical career as a sales assistant in a Sao Paolo music shop, but selling music was, as he says, "just a conduit to mak-

ing music; it put me in touch with producers and artists."

In 1999, he released his début album, E Musica, which took the burgeoning Brazilian drum 'n' bass scene by storm, helped in no small measure by the in-

volvement of DJs Jason Bralli Adriano Duim and Drumagick.

He released a further two albums in 2001 before pairing up with the svelte Jainina Lima, also Brazilian, and a talented singer, acrobat, composer, choreographer and dancer.

Working under the name of Kaleidoscopio, the duo released their debut, *Tem Que Valer (It must be true)* in 2004 on the legendary IRMA Records label.

The single and opening track is *Você Me Apareceu* (*You Appeared To Me*). It's an infectious blend of spunky lyrics, fast drum 'n' bass and bossa nova. It was an instant and worldwide hit. One version of the tune even topped the Brazilian mobile phone ringtone charts.

The standout track is *Aqui* (*Here*), the penultimate number on this 16-track album.

Beginning with the deepest of basslines, it kicks into a grungy guitar riff similar to T-Rex's

Children of the Revolution before Jainina's crystal-clear voice counterpoints the harsh rock and bass sounds with the lightest of lyrics.

Debut albums are rarely this uplifting, self-assured and worth obtain-

ing; Kaleidoscopio deserve much success.

ntering The Sense Spa in Kata is more like walking into a trendy bar anywhere in the world than into a spa in Thailand.

The walls are distressed ochre, lined by small arch-shaped niches – some containing Buddha figures – the lighting is subdued, the décor is minimalist and the floor is patterned and varnished concrete.

"Thai-style" or "Balinesestyle" it most certainly ain't, well at least not as those adjectives are most commonly understood.

But it is exactly the effect General Manager Nipon Wongvuiwatchai set out to achieve when designing the spa last year.

"I call it modern Oriental style," said K. Nipon. "Everyone who comes here praises the nice relaxing atmosphere. Normally spas are quite plush, but I didn't want this to be plush. I wanted to create something different."


I can understand why customers describe The Sense as relaxing. The Thai massage and reflexology room, with its six curtained beds and its massage chairs, is nightclub-dark but retreat-quiet. A peek through the door is enough to induce narcolepsy in even the most persistent insomniac.

The walk along the corridor to the private treatment rooms conjured up a feeling of walking through an adobe *barrio* in Mexico. Except that, waiting round the corner to get me on a couch in a darkened room, isn't Antonio Banderas in full *Desperado* mode, but my therapist K. Sirirat.

With the help of friendly receptionist K. Nayika I opt for the "Sense of Relaxation" package, with a Swedish massage option and a "milk" bath, and the Classical Sense Spa facial using Rene Guinot products.

After steaming gently for





20 minutes in the glass-fronted sauna in my private bathroom and putting on the funkiest pair of disposable briefs ever – black and stretchy like nylon tights – I am ready for my honey, yoghurt and peanut body scrub.

The subtle lighting, for those who are not entirely comfortable about having their lumps and bumps subjected to close scrutiny, is very merciful; the only recognizably "Thai" decorative feature of the treatment room was the contemporary-style red-and-gold picture of the Buddha on the wall between the two couches.

I rins off the body scrub (applied with perfect pressure – exfoliating but not abrasive) in the "shower", a slender concrete column against the wall with a lip at the top over which the water flowed, before sampling the "ilk bath.

I've never been interested in these baths before (the product of my no-nonsense Northern English upbringing, perhaps?), but I know now what I have been missing.

The bath is roughly T-shaped, with three seats facing into the middle, and it is filled with warm water into which K. Sirirat pours some milky liquid, before scattering the surface with rose petals and flower heads.

It smells good enough to drink ("You didn't, did you?" exclaims a horrified K. Nayika when I tell her this later), but I am content to float and contemplate for a little while, preparing myself for a Swedish massage, using specially blended "Sense" massage oil, and with a one-hour Guinot facial to follow.

K. Nipon used to have a

Thai massage salon, but after having one man too many turn up expecting to have more than just his energy lines released, he decided to move into the spa business.

Ironically, perhaps, around 40% of the The Sense's customers are men, although they usually arrive with a female partner.

The therapists are now trained in-house, although they were originally trained at the Phuket Spa Academy, which also acted as consultant when K. Nipon was setting up the business.

His intention is to offer a quality service – the massage oils, for example, are from a company which supplies five-star resorts – at reasonable prices.

"People come here to relax, open daily 10am – 10pm. so they shouldn't have to worry about the price," he reasons. "The Sense of Relaxation"

Customers are asked to fill in a questionnaire as they leave. "The thing is," says K. Nipon.

"When people are on holiday, they are relaxed, so I'm not sure they expect standards as high as they do at home, so 'good' or 'excellent' isn't enough – we want to keep on improving."

I had a good feeling about The Sense the first time I saw the discreet sign opposite Kata Beach Resort several months ago; my visit confirms that my own sixth sense was right.

Return journey

y last trip to the Phi Phi Islands was in October last year, when I took a leisurely ferry to spend a few relaxing days at the Phi Phi Princess resort.

This time around I took a speedboat for a day trip to assess the situation on the island.

First port of call was Maya Bay, which seemed in better condition than before. There were no ferries, no herds of lifejacketwearing tourists and, with the exception of one local fisherman

and his longtail boat and our own boat, there was no one around to disturb the scene.

The marine life is still there, with shoals of fish schooling around. Maya Bay and the whole of Phi Phi Lei was — thankfully—as

stunning and serene as ever.

After circumnavigating the island, we went on to Tonsai Bay on Phi Phi Don, and our worst fears were realized as our boat swung into the bay.

The main village and buildings were destroyed. The small strip of land between the two major bays – previously full of buildings – is now empty.

Everything has gone, and – sitting on the beach surveying the scene – it is a wonder that anyone could have survived the horror of December 26.

It appears that the authorities are still in two minds as to what to do.

With the need for complete restructuring and development, there is a huge fight brewing over the future of Phi Phi Don, between the government and developers who favor transforming the island into an up-market destination, and locals who want the island to go back to the way it was, more or less.

No decisions have been made, however, and, as a result





of this indecisiveness, the clean up is far from over.

Many locals are, in fact, accusing the authorities of delaying funds, to try to squeeze out the current business owners.

Clearing up and rebuilding is being handled, it seems, only by locals and the scores of backpacker volunteers — in many cases very much against government wishes.

It is thought that more than 1,500 young people have traveled to the island since an ad hoc aid group, Hi Phi Phi, started up at the end of January, with the news spreading by word of mouth and through Internet cafés throughout the travelers' world.

We progressed onward to the east coast of the island, and – amazingly enough – the beaches, bays and resorts were left unscathed.

Our first stop was to one of my favorite resorts, the Phi Phi Island Village, which has a palm tree-lined beach and lovely bungalows. It is one of *the* hideaway places in the south of Thailand.

With so few tourists around, and such attractive rates currently offered, now is an ideal time to visit.

Next stop was the Holiday Inn Resort Phi Phi Island, which is still as lovely as ever. Its rooms are close to the

beach, and the hotel offers typically excellent Holiday Inn service, friendliness and efficiency.

"The tuk-tuk drivers are a pest. We got ripped off – no wonder the driver was so friendly and accommodating – he probably made his daily quota out of us alone!"

The penny drops when the writer twitters on, extolling the virtues of a humble plate of fruit on the beach for "just" 100 baht and a day trip to "Pipi" for a paltry 4,000 baht.

Like the man said, there's one born every minute.

A journalist among tigers

ark Bowden wrote a wonderful book – later made into a film – called *Black Hawk Down* about a military fiasco in Somalia in 1993. Bowden's book was infinitely superior to the film, however, in that he also interviewed the Somali clansmen in the fight and portrayed their perspective on things.

Road Work (Atlantic Monthly Press, New York, 2004, 467pp) subtitled Among Tyrants, Heroes, Rogues, and Beasts is his seventh book. It is a collection of 19 stories written over two decades, first for the Philadelphia Inquirer and later for the Atlantic Monthly, where he is now national correspondent.


He opens with *Tales* of the *Tyrant*, which was the *Atlantic*'s cover story in May 2002. This is a meticulous portrait of the character of Saddam Hussein, composed from dozens of interviews with exiled excolleagues. The tireless legwork and empathetic interviews that characterize this story are typical of the rest.

Just as he had befriended the veterans of the Somali incursion, he is adopted by the Bold Tigers,

a squadron of F-15E pilots and backseat bombardiers ("wizzos" or weapons-systems operators) of the USAF 391st Fighter Squadron who plied their trade in Iraq and Afghanistan. He captures their mystique perfectly:

"Fun' is a word not often applied to warfare. It's unseemly; you aren't supposed to enjoy yourself while killing people. But the high-intensity enthusiasm of the Bold Tigers was unmistakable. They are young (most of them in their twenties), slender, fit, smart, patriotic, highly motivated, exhaustively trained, and crisply able. They are all in love with flight, with riding their sil-





ver bullets to the edges of the sky, peering down at the broad curvature of the earth, feeling the great surge of supersonic engines beneath them. Given the chance to show what they could do, taking a cause that both inspired and excited them, added a tincture of danger to the heady mix. It's no wonder that the pilots and wizzos of the 391st came to feel that this was the time of their lives."

Contrast this with his take on the leftist movers and shakers gathered to greet presidential candidate Al Sharpton at a Washington hotel: "Winnebago-hipped block captains with megaphone voices; tangle-haired young anarchists with tattooed necks and bejeweled noses; grey-stubbled men with thinning ponytails in patched jeans and T-shirts that read IMPEACH BUSH and SOMEWHERE IN TEXAS A VILLAGE IS MISSING ITS IDIOT; big-armed unionists fed up with corporate power; confrontational lesbians, New Age grandmas; militant vegans; ecoguerrillas; international antiglobalists, fierce pacifists – in other

words the Democratic Leadership Council's nightmare ... If anyone could think boldly enough to imagine Al Sharpton in the Oval Office, it was the people in this crowd."

By following Sharpton around the country, and letting him strangle himself with his own deeds and words, Bowden performs a character assassination so lethal that no reader could ever take this "Reverend" liar and charlatan seriously again.

In The Dark Art of Interrogation, Bowden investigates the arrest and subsequent breaking of Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, the suspected mastermind of the World Trade Center bombing. Delving into the delicate issue of torture, he talks to a wide range of Israeli, CIA and

New York City Police interrogators.

His conclusion: "If interrogators step over the line to outright torture, they should be held personally responsible. But no interrogator is ever going to be prosecuted for keeping Khalid Sheikh Mohammed awake, cold, alone, and uncomfortable. Nor should he be."

The book concludes with two long pieces of investigative journalism. In *Mayberry Vice*, Mike White and Rudy Legenza, two young detectives in the little town of Central Falls, Rhode Island, stumble upon a multi-million-dollar Colombian cocaine smuggling ring.

It all starts with a routine bust in a Colombian dance hall: "In the men's room, Mike spied six feet under one of the stall doors. Due to his extensive police training, as he would later say, 'I knew something was amiss."

Finally, *Cops on the Take* is a masterful retelling of a canny and dogged brothel owner's cooperation with an FBI team to bring down a vast network of crooked cops in Philadelphia.

You get the feeling that Mark Bowden, like those young fighter pilots, is having the time of his life.


push us down. As an example of our future if this is allowed to continue unabated, I have one word for you all: Patpong.

Enough hit-and-run tourism

The news that the proposal for a large new marina at Chalong (see page 1) has taken one step closer to becoming reality is encouraging indeed.

So long as environmental factors are taken carefully into consideration, Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura's description of the project as "win-win" looks highly plausible. The marina may even help swing the pendulum back toward the time before mass tourism, when Phuket was a destination that attracted a combination of jetset visitors as well as adventurous backpackers and yachties.

Reports reaching the Gazette indicate that some online travel services are now seeing solid bookings for December onward. In some cases, bookings look better than they did at this time last year.

This, too, is good news. Online services deal almost exclusively with FITs, as they are known – free, independent travelers – and not with tour groups.

Although there are many tour companies that bring tourists to Phuket for longer-than-average stays, there are also many others whose customers pay for everything in their home countries, stay here for a night or two at most, and add nothing to the island's economy apart from near-zero profits for hotels and bus companies.

All too often the success of Phuket as a tourist destination is measured in terms of a single raw number: the number of arrivals. But which is preferable? Five thousand people who come for two days and spend 500 baht a day? Or 50 people who come for two months and spend 2,000 baht a day?

A couple of minutes with a calculator will tell you that the second group of visitors are considerably more valuable, and because there are fewer of them, they place far less of a strain on the island's infrastructure and environment. Also, because they obviously like the place enough to stay a considerable length of time, they are more likely to be sensitive to Phuket's needs.

The government and the Tourism Authority of Thailand should stop being mesmerized by big numbers and concentrate instead on bringing in more long-stay guests to the island, from backpackers and yachties to retirees who want to spend six months or longer on the island.

If the facilities are here, they will come – and the Chalong marina will be a good start. What is needed now is wholehearted legal and bureaucratic support for changes to accommodate longstay tourism, such as by making extensions-of-stay more more easily obtainable for qualified applicants and by catering to the needs of the elderly. Let other countries take the in-out package tourists.



Bad time to collect bar dues

eople in the entertainment business waited for the best part of a year to learn how much an entertainment license would cost them.

In the past, operators of bars up to 100 square meters had to pay 1,000 baht for a permit to sell alcohol. I had expected the fee to rise to 5,000 baht per 100sqm, but it has been set at 10,000 baht - 10 times the old fee.

There are about 300 beer bars in Patong. They didn't all have licenses in the past, and I'm pretty sure not all of them will buy a license now.

It is also worth bearing in mind that the classifications for the new licences are still not clear. The 3(4) Entertainment Venues class has four subcategories -a, b, c and d.

What no one at the Ministry of Interior seems able to tell us yet is whether bars have to pay for separate licenses for each category that applies to them, or pay for just one license.

For example, if a bar occupies more than 301sqm, accord-

ing to the new law, the cost of the license for a bar that size is 50,000 baht. But if the bar could fall into three subcategories of the 3 (4) class – b, c and d, say – does the operator have to buy a separate license for b, c and d – making a total of 150,000 baht? Or just one license at 50,000

I really think the government should allow the province to take a flexible approach to en-

baht?

forcing this law. In practical terms, this would mean allowing the province to let bar owners defer payment.

The beer bars in Patong have lost around 80% of their trade because of the tsunami, and now we are in the "green" season, and I doubt most of them have the money to pay for a li-

If the government insists on collecting the money at this time, it won't find it easy. I wouldn't be at all surprised if, rather than buying a license right now, some operators decide to shut up shop for the low season, and reopen during the high season when they hope to have customers again and the money to pay for a li-

That may not be too bad for the operators – but it is bad for the people who work in the bars, as they will be out of a job, and

as business is so slack at the moment, they have precious little hope of finding another one.

The government says that once someone has bought a license, they need pay only 20% to renew it each year, but I don't see the sense of this. Surely it would be better to spread the cost out a bit – reduce the cost of the initial license and increase the cost of renewal?

I agree that it is good to license venues, and to apply the law equally to all venues, as it makes it easier for the government to control what happens in bars, with regard to illegal drugs, for example.

However, whether the licenses are a good thing or a bad thing, most bar operators in Patong still haven't received official notification about the type of license they need, when they should pay for it, or the deadline for buying one.

At the moment, even those who agree with the law aren't in a position to obey it.

What happened to the free HIV treatment?

A friend of mine is HIV-positive and tried to get the free [government] HIV treatment at Patong Hospital. He was told that the hospital management knew nothing about free HIV treatment and that he would have to pay for it.

As I understand it, since August 1 last year, any person with a Thai social security card can get free HIV treatment at government hospitals. Why not at Patong Hospital?

Ploenpit Pikulthong, Chief **Technical Officer at the Phuket** Social Security Office (PSSO),

In Phuket, the PSSO offers people who are HIV-positive free medication to inhibit the development of AIDS through Mission Hospital Phuket and Wachira Phuket Hospital only.

To get the free medication, any HIV-positive person holding a social security card must obtain from a doctor a letter confirming that he or she has a CD4 count lower than 200.

The doctors at either Mission or Wachira hospitals will then confirm with the PSSO that the patient is entitled to receive the free medicine before prescribing it.

Patong Hospital operates as a sub-section of Wachira Phuket Hospital. Whether Patong Hospital offers the free medication depends on hospital policy.

Nuanpan Maipanich, a nurse in the Aids section at Wachira **Phuket Hospital, replies:**

Wachira Phuket Hospital and Mission Hospital are currently the only hospitals [in Phuket] that issue the free medication under the PPSO project.

We are currently consulting with Patong and Thalang Hospitals so that the free medication can be issued to patients through those hospitals.

Saovanee Ratanadilok Na Phuket, HIV Specialist at the Phuket Provincial Health Office (PPHO), replies:

The PPHO has been offering free HIV medication to Thai nationals only through a project that has been running since 2002.

The free medication is available at the three government hospitals in Phuket: Wachira, Patong and Thalang hospitals.

As long as the patient has a Thai ID card and a letter from a doctor confirming that he or she has a CD4 count lower than 200, the patient can receive free anti-AIDS medication provided by the Ministry of Public Health.

Life in the 'L' lane

Do learner drivers need to display an "L" plate on the car while learning to drive? Also, is there a driving school?

Raweewan Navarug, Director, **Saran Driving School, replies:**

Thai driving schools do not

have to display "L" plates on

their car but we have signs all over our cars that let other drivers know that these are cars being used by learner drivers.

We have driving instructors who can speak English. You can contact us at Tel: 076-248912.

Taksina Boonmueng, of Taksina Driving School, responds:

We have an English-speaking teachers and all our cars have signs saying "Driving Instruction Car" on them.

You can contact us at Tel: 076-224144.

A spokesperson from the Phuket Provincial Transportation Office replies:

In Thailand, there is no requirement for learner drivers to display an "L" plate on the car while driving. This is because no one may drive on the road without a driving licence, even if a license holder is sitting with them. Learners may practice driving only off the public roads.

What's the deal with playing cards?

I and some friends decided to play cards while relaxing near Patong Beach.

After buying some cards – which were bonded and taxed from 7-Eleven, we played for an hour or so before police officers interrupted us and told us: "No. Cannot," and stood over us menacingly until we put the cards away.

We were not gambling as we know that is illegal in Thailand. But if just playing cards is illegal, why are playing cards sold here?

Pol Col Teeraphol Thipjaroen, Superintendent of Kathu Police Station, replies:

Gambling is illegal in Thailand but people can still play cards in public areas, so long as they are not playing for money or property. People may play cards for forfeits, such as taking off their clothes or drinking, that is not a problem, but it is if there is money or property involved.

If a police officer cannot be sure that people are not playing for money or similar, he must stop them playing. If we do not do this, we could end up with locals and tourists gambling all over the place.

Playing cards are sold so widely here because many people use them for telling fortunes, not for gambling.

Tafta tariffs fall.

PHUKET: When the Thailand-Australia Free Trade Agreement (Tafta) came into force on January 1 this year, Thailand eliminated its tariffs on 2,934 imports from Australia. But buyers have yet to benefit from lower prices for some Australian goods, including wine and beer.

On January 1, the 54% tariff on wine was reduced to 40%, and the tariff will be stepped down to zero by 2015. For beer and spirits, Thailand halved its tariff of 60% to 30%, with a zero tariff the target by 2010.

Sean Riley, Senior Trade Commissioner at the Austrade office in Bangkok, in Phuket recently, explained that wine distributors are currently capitalizing on the tariff cut to compensate for years of low profit margins. He added that he expected cheap prices to be passed on to consumers as the tariff on Australian wine is reduced further.

However, one importer of Australian wines and beers told the Gazette that the distributors pocketing the immediate benefits was not the problem. Rather, he said on condition of anonymity, it should be noted that prices of goods in Australia are on the rise.

"As an example, we are currently making only 30 baht more per case [after the tariff cut], but the brewery is about to raise its price to us," he said.

If he does not pass on that price rise, the extra revenue, posttariff-cut, will fall to 15 baht a case, he calculated.

Mr Riley was in Phuket on June 1 to explain the workings of Tafta, which will see tariffs on 94% of imports from Australia reduced to zero by 2010. By 2025 all tariffs on Australian goods will be abolished.

With him was Stephen Gee, Political and Economic Counsellor at the Australian Embassy in Bangkok, who explained the mechanics of the reduced tariffs.

It never hurts to look at prices on the Internet and compare them with your friendly local travel agents offerings.

Many travel agents right here in Phuket get deals that you can't match online.

And if you're booking less than 48 hours in advance (or 24 or 72, depending on the flight), or you don't have a credit card that the site accepts, you probably won't be able to use the Internet to book tickets.

K. Add's recommendations:

If you want to fly from Phuket to Bangkok, check what's

Many people think that Air Asia (www.AirAsia.com) offers the cheapest fares, but that isn't always true, particularly when you figure in the fees, service charges, and the like (which only appear on the screen toward the end of the booking process).

Check Bangkok Airways

(www.bangkokair.com), Nok Air (www.nokair.co.th) and Orient Thai (www.onetwo-go.com) before you press the final button.

Surprisingly, Thai Airways often has the lowest fare to Bangkok, or pretty close to it, when you take the fees into account. The trick is that you have to book through the Thai-language part of the site.

Start at www.thaiair.com. Click Andaman Sun, Sand & Sea on the left. You'll find yourself on a Thai-language-only page. If you click the button at the bottom, Thai Air presents you with the various flights on offer and reverts to English!

For flights to Singapore, K. Add checks with our travel agent. They have deals just as good as those you can find on the Internet, particularly if you need a hotel in addition to the airfare. You can always double-check at www.silkair.com.

Airlines have dropped direct flights from Phuket to Hong Kong, but if you don't mind doglegging through Bangkok, the round-trip fare from Bangkok to Honkers is 2,900 baht on Orient Thai (www.orient-thai.com, for flights outside of Thailand).

Finnair (www.finnair.com) also offers cheap flights. We once got a super-cheap two-for-one deal for business class but the schedule is pretty bad.

Make sure you check Cathay Pacific (www. cathaypacific. com) just in case they run a spe-

For both Singapore and Hong Kong, keep your eye out for combina-

tion flight/hotel packages. If you need a hotel, it's frequently cheaper to book the hotel at the same time as the flight.

K. Add likes to scan the offerings at www.bangkok.com and hotelthailand.com when we go to Bangkok, and www. phuket.com when friends come to visit.

She tried Priceline in the US (www. priceline.com), a site where you bid for your hotel room, not knowing which hotel you will get, but Priceline in the US won't take a bid unless you have a mailing address in the US or Canada.

Then she discovered that Priceline Hong Kong (www. priceline.com.hk) and Priceline Singapore (www.priceline.com. sg) both take Thai mailing addresses, and work just fine.

She recently booked a bunch of hotel rooms for a trip to the US and Canada. They were great rooms in very nice hotels,

the system worked perfectly and it was cheap, cheap, cheap.

The only problem we ever encountered was location: some of the hotels were a bit out of the

Priceline has expanded its offerings. You can still bid for a room (say, offer 2,000 baht a night for a four-star room in Hong Kong), but also use the websites to search for deals on rooms, many of which are quite inviting.

K. Add also checks Accommodation Line, www.accomline.

com, to make sure the amount she bids on Priceline isn't excessive. If you can't get Price-

line to accept your bid, just go ahead and book the room on Accommodation Line.

For rental cars, K. Add checks Orbitz (www.orbitz.com) and looks for the cheapest prices. She then goes to the rental company's website and tries to book there directly. (So if Orbitz says cars in Seattle are cheapest at Alamo, say, she checks the Alamo site, www.alamo.com.) Most of the time it's cheaper to book directly on the rental company's site.

Finding great travel bargains is a lot of hard work. You have to keep good notes, and be willing to try new sites. It also helps to have a fast Internet connection.

In the end, however, you can save an enormous amount of money, minimize hassles, and have a wonderful trip, by playing the booking angles.

reduced tariff on an Australian import, the exporter in Australia must be registered and must obtain a Certificate of Origin (CoO) at the point of shipping.

'The way Tafta is worded, if anyone presents that certificate, the Customs officers have to believe it; they have to take it at face value and grant the preferential rate," he said.

"If you import goods and haven't got a CoO and in the next 12 months you obtain one for those goods, you are entitled to a rebate," he added.

Mr Gee said that the two nations had experienced some problems implementing Tafta in the initial stages, but added that

Mr Gee said that to have a the problems are being worked out. "There have been a couple of problems that we've had to iron out, but on the whole it's working well," he said.

> Mr Gee said that the reduced tariffs were open to anyone importing Australian goods and that although he expected problems to arise from misunderstandings, his staff were willing to help sort these out.

> Although Australia is the first to sign such a comprehensive deal with Thailand, other countries are expected to follow suit, probably starting with the US and Japan.

> Mr Riley said that Austrade was aggressively promoting the benefits of Tafta as he believes

the competitive advantage of Australian imports will be eroded by Thailand signing other FTAs within the coming two years.

In addition, non-tariff benefits under Tafta have also yet to be realized. The Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) website claims that Tafta allows Australian companies that "manufacture goods in Thailand to provide distribution services in relation to those goods without limitation of Australian equity (i.e. up to 100%). The previous limit was 49.9%."

DFAT also says that Thailand "will" permit up to 100% Australian ownership of companies providing certain construction services and that Thailand will permit 100% Australian ownership of companies providing management consulting services through a regional operating headquarters or associated company or branch. The previous limit for both was 49.9%.

Mr Gee strongly advised a thorough reading of Tafta, with particular attention to the document's annexes and footnotes.

For example, under Tafta, Thailand will permit up to 60% Australian ownership of major restaurants or hotels (the previous limit was 49.9%). However, Annex 8 stipulates, "The facility must have a minimum area of 450 square meters. The provider must have a minimum paid-up registered capital of 50 million baht."

Other benefits yet to be fully explained include "provisions on investment protection", greater freedom in transfering funds out of Thailand, and expedited issuing of visas, work permits and permits to stay.

Mr Riley said that Austrade will return to Phuket. "[Before the tsunami] We did not know the extent of the Australian business community in Phuket and the community itself was not well linked," he said.

"We look forward to the Australian business community in Phuket developing and becoming more cohesive," he added.

business. The UK is hardly the exemplar of a bureaucracy-free nation, but the company had simply had enough of trying to operate under French regulations.

The company maintains an office in Paris, and tends to employ French expatriate staff in its British office, finding the business environment much more conducive to running a small company.

One example of this is that, when calculating salaries in the UK, there are two deductions that are required to be passed on to the government. With their employees in Paris, they are required to calculate no fewer than 30 separate deductions for each worker.

Small- and mediumsized businesses are simply not geared to deal with huge piles of government-imposed paperwork, and any government that makes

small businesses climb such huge piles simply does not deserve to be in power.

In business, time is money. The more time a company has to spend satisfying the government, the less time it is able to devote to its primary activities.

Politicians are vastly overrated creatures. The terms "political leaders" and "statesmen" - if they must be used - should be accompanied by a laugh or, preferably, a snort of derision.

In reality, politicians, where democracy exists, are voted into power and thereafter the public pay their salaries.

ket capitalization or employ tens of thousands of people, but without them the world would be in desperate trouble.

In Germany, meanwhile, Chancellor Gerhard Schröder came to power in 1998 promising the German people that he would reduce unemployment.

For the first few years he seemed to think that meant polishing a seat and attending functions with other would-be states-

Unemployment just kept on growing. The German economy, despite having a number of world-class companies, still did not manage to produce the necessary economic miracle.

The Chancellor, belatedly noting this fact, decided to enact long-overdue changes.

To give this august politician his due, if you were to employ him as a gardener he would probably use the lawnmower not only to cut the grass but the flowerbeds as well.

Chancellor Schröder has enacted some changes to German business, but they tended to benefit large German businesses.

He forgot – or never knew – a rather simple but basic fact: two-thirds of jobs in Germany are created by small- and mediumsized companies.

It dosen't take a rocket scientist to realize that this is the sector that requires the greatest attention and assistance.

The term assistance does not mean government handouts - that's the last thing these companies need.

What they do desperately need is less government regulation. One German state in 2003 alone passed 5,000 new laws, many aimed at increasing requirements and restrictions on business.

Fortunately, in late May, Chancellor Schröder's party, the Social Democratic Party of Germany (SPD), was trounced in state elections in North Rhine/

Westphalia, prompting him to call general elections in September this year.

This will almost certainly bring the Christian Democratic Union (CDU) back into power. The CDU will certainly have a more pro-business outlook and surely bring benefits to Germany.

However, before euphoria becomes the order of the day, it is worth mentioning that for the whole of its previous reign, which lasted 16 years, the CDU was led by Chancellor Helmut Kohl – who also liked to be known as a "statesman".

Kohl was not exactly an economic genius; it was under his leadership that unemployment rose to unprecedented levels [when the former East Germany and West Germany were reunified] and the German electorate voted for a change.

However, there is a third choice for German voters: the Free Democrat Party. They actually believe in a free-enterprise system – something as yet untried in Germany.

For parts of the world where democracy is long established, respect for politicians is generally minimal.

In Asia, this reality has still to be achieved.

The butterflies in my stomach as I prepare myself for the humiliation of being trounced sorry, I mean the thrill of enjoying one of life's finer games – are muliplying alarmingly.

Basic things first, such as – without putting too fine a point on it – balls. Bruce Whitehead, one of the pros at Laguna Phuket Golf Club and my mentor, suggests that I start out with three.

However, I aver that three balls will surely be enough to get me around the course. Bruce politely conceals a fit of the giggles before agreeing, adding that I can buy more around the course should my balls go AWOL.

Although we are not playing 18 holes, just the back nine, I am sure this will prove enough of a challenge – for both of us.

The Par 4 Hole 10 is 444 yards, although we are playing from the somewhat easier and shorter 356-yard tee.

I address the ball and prepare to swing. Most of the advice given to me in my lessons has deserted my mind but, what the hell, I have nothing to lose – except my dignity.

nd so, after weeks of lessons, hundreds of swings – some of them that even connected a round

One minute I am inching myself into position and then the next there are cries of "Good shot!" and "Well done!" from Bruce and the caddies. The ball has gone straight and lands on the fairway some 160-odd yards distant.

in the Sky. I whack the ball gain and only come a cropper after a too-short pitch to the green. It takes me three putts to sink the ball, and I complete the hole in six strokes.

Hole 11 looks, after my suc-I offer up a silent "Bugger cess on the 10th, like a doddle. It Something odd happens. me" in thanks to the Great Golfer is only 160 yards, and we are

playing it from the 120-yard tee. Admittedly, there is water before and to the right of the green, as well as two bunkers, but how difficult can it be? I soon find out.

My delightful caddie hands me a 9 iron, but I slice left and end up short, and in a bunker, the pin a tantalizing 35 yards away. It is time for an impromptu lesson; the cunning Bruce has saved the bunker-shot lesson until now.

"Sand wedge," says Bruce. "Actually, I'm not very hungry," I riposte, the joke sadly lost on the caddies.

He suggests that I hit the sand a couple of inches behind the ball. This should be easy, as half of my swings do that anyway.

The ball is in the worst position possible – just under the lip of the bunker and resting on a near-vertical slope. Positioning my feet while maintaining the correct stance is tricky, but I resist the urge to "grip it and rip it" and instead play the ball gently.

The wedge dives in behind and beneath the ball and amid a shower of sand it leaps upward and onward, landing on the green. Two putts and I sink the ball in four shots – one over par.

My game takes on a militaristic air from Hole 12 onward. Left, right, left, right – occasionally landing in the rough, sometimes in a bunker, though never in the water.

Hole 13, a 174-yard Par 3, has some of the best views on the entire course, but even the views

away to the hills do not distract me – well, not too much – and I complete it in five.

I often find myself agreeing with many of the bon mots of Mark Twain, but I disagree with the great man's opinion that golf is "...a good walk spoiled".

It can often be a little too warm in Thailand to take a long walk. Out in the sun this glorious Sunday morning, everything suddenly seems right with the world, especially as Bruce is kind enough to "adjust" the location of the ball for me if it appears a little too hard to play.

The 612-yard – we play from the 498-yard tee - Par 5 Hole 17 is reputedly the longest hole in Thailand. It takes me eight strokes to complete it, but dammit, this is fun.

Playing a demi-round is a lot easier than I thought it would be. I now realize that driving, pitching and putting is much like foreplay; getting it all to come together is the best part, whether one gets one's balls wet or not.

Hole 18 is tackled two strokes over par to complete the round, and the winner? Me, I suppose, because even though it took me more strokes, I am now a golfer.

South Korea scoop ASEM qualifiers

PHUKET CITY: A determined South Korean side dominated play by taking all nine points from their three Group B matches in Phuket and qualifying for the quarterfinals of the Asia-Europe Meeting (ASEM) football competition in Bangkok

Also qualifying for the next round were runners-up Myanmar, who beat last-place finishers Indonesia 3-2 on June 4, the last of three exciting days of play at Surakul Stadium.

The Myanmar-Indonesia game was the first of the two matches on June 4, kicking off at 4 pm. Although desperate to leave Phuket with some face-saving points after going down 1-3 to Sweden and 1-4 to South Korea, the Indonesians got off to a bad start when Myanmar's Soe Thina Aung scored just eight minutes into the match.

Indonesia equalized in the the 63rd minute, but only to see the lads from the Land of 1,000 Pagodas up the ante with another goal 10 minutes later.

Ten minutes after that, Myanmar upped the ante with another goal by Soe Thina Aung to go up 3-1.

With time running out, Indonesia kept it close, scoring at 85 minutes to come to within 3-2, but the Myanmar defense held firm, winning the game and ensuring a place in the quarterfinal – provided that the Koreans

could down the Swedes in the final match of the tournament – or at least hold them to three goals.

Riding a wave of confidence into their final match after easy wins against Myanmar (3-1) and Indonesia (4-1), the South Korea boys found themselves in an odd position – under attack – as Sweden took the play to them from the outset.

Some 26 minutes after the 6 pm kickoff, the Swedes' hard work paid off when Tom Camey put his side 1-0 up. The goal only seemed to work as a wake-up call to the Koreans, who started playing harder despite having a guaranteed spot in the next round. They eventually equalized just before halftime through a goal by Choo Sang Chul.

In the second half it was all Korea, with Oh Se Ryong slotting in his first two goals of the tournament in quick succession at 59 and 62 minutes, respectively. Desperate measures require desperate actions, and by now the Swedes had little choice but to throw caution to the wind.

Oh Se Ryong found the lack of marking to his liking, completing his hat-trick in the 72nd minute and giving the Koreans an unassailable 4-1 lead, much to the satisfaction of the Myanmar players who had stayed on to watch.

In the June 6 quarterfinals in Bangkok, Myanmar were

scheduled to take on Group A winners Thailand, while South Korea were to meet Group A runners-up Slovakia.

Songsak Kitakarnkul, head of the Sports Authority of Thailand's Phuket Office, hailed the games in Phuket as a success, noting that more spectators had turned up to watch matches played here than those held in Bangkok that didn't involve the Thai team.

"This will give Phuket the chance to host more big matches, both on national and international levels, now that we have successfully hosted two world-class soccer competitions," he said, in reference to the Fifa Women's Under 19 World Cup matches here last November.

Sports and Tourism Minister Somsak Thepsuthin, who was on hand for the June 4 matches, said that the tournament, along with other high-profile events such as the visit to the island by Miss Universe 2005 contestants, would help boost tourism in Phuket by showing the world that it is safe to travel here.

"I am satisfied with the work of the organizing teams for this tournament, both here in Phuket and also in Bangkok.

"We didn't allocate a great deal when budgeting this tournament, but the cooperation on all sides has been great," he said.



THE FASCINATION OF BLENDS

ines made from more than one grape variety, vintage or place of origin are known as blended wines. The ability to create a blend that is more than the sum of its parts is one of the most important responsibilities of any winemaker.

The first blended wines were created in the vineyard, so to speak, long before grape varieties were properly identified. Mixed plantings were common in olden times and grapes were indiscriminately harvested together in what came to be known as field blending.

Given that different grape varieties ripen at different times, winemakers today prefer growing different varieties separately and keeping the resultant wines distinct, later blending them only after their character and qualities are fully

The most notable examples of blended wines include Bordeaux, Champagne, southern Rhône Valley, Chianti,

These wines are made from several

different grape varieties in order to create more interesting, complex and harmonious wines than can be achieved with only a single

Blending is mostly a European theory but one finds a notable difference of opinion on the subject in Burgundy and Alsace, where wines are single va-

Outside Europe, blends are created by winemakers either to mimic the European model or to fulfill the whims of market-

ing. Sometimes, blends are accidentally created by the unintended mixing of wines during processing - understandably winemakers don't like to discuss this.

The logic behind blending is to create a finished wine superior to its individual components. There is no doubting ordinary table wines benefit from blending of different components to mask de-

fects while complimenting the collective whole. However, to make an impressive blended wine the individual wines must also be superb. So why bother blending?

The reason is usually economic. In Bordeaux and Champagne, for example, the weather is highly variable and having different varieties that flower and ripen at different times serves as a form of insurance against total loss to frost or

Blending also makes it possible to maintain a

unique style over time. Another motivation for blending is that many successful wineries do not own sufficient vineyard land to meet demand for their wine, and are forced to buy fruit or finished wines from others, whatever the variety. Chances are, hidden economic considerations like these are the real driving considerations behind blending.

Whatever the motivation behind their creation, blended wines are fascinating to explore.

Exotic wines such as California's Caymus Conundrum white wine or Cain Five and Bacio Divino's Italianesque red wines are delightfully perplexing and

The white wines of the Southern Rhône, Italy and Spain, crafted from many uncommon local grape varieties, have long been favorites of mine and are equally fascinating.

Blends take more effort and research to understand than wines named for a single varietal, but the discovery of the unexpected and captivating nuance a skilled winemaker and nature can impart to blended wines more than compensates for the effort.







he oldest automaker you will never have heard of is the Dutch Spyker company. Originally a coachbuilding concern and established at the beginning of last century, Spyker produced, over some 30 years, some fine performance machines.

In 1898, two brothers, Jacobus and Hendrik-Jan Spijker, built their first Mercedes-engined motor car in Amsterdam. In the same year, the Spijkers produced the famous gold royal state coach, which is still in use today.

The company name was changed to Spyker for easier recognition in foreign markets and in 1903 Spyker introduced its advanced 60/80-hp model. It was the first car with a six-cylinder engine as well as permanent fourwheel drive.

Spyker's image was further enhanced when, in 1907, a privately-entered Spyker Tourer came second in the gruelling Peking-to-Paris race.

In the period leading up to World War I, the demand for luxury cars slumped and Spyker began making aircraft. During the war it built around 100 fighter aircraft and 200 aero engines, all to its own designs.

After the war, Spyker resumed car production and made some remarkable machines. Most famous of these was the Spyker C4, which featured a special engine built by famous German engineer Wilhelm Maybach.

The company ceased trading in 1929 but the name was resurrected in the 1990s under the leadership of head designer Maarten de Bruijn and CEO Victor Muller, a lawyer and corporate restructuring specialist.

Working with Cosworth Technology in Britain, Spyker sought and obtained approval from the NHTSA and the EPA, both American auto regulation boards, and will finally be allowed to export its cars as road legal to the US – by far its big-

ker uses, also assisted the tiny company in its quest for recognition Stateside.

Launched this year, the C12 LaTurbie will be the first Spyker to use the powerful six-liter Audi W12 aluminium engine.

Maximum power is an awesome 500bhp (369kW) while the torque output peaks at a massive 600Nm. Top speed is in the region of 325km/h, while the benchmark 0-100kmh time is a mere 3.9 seconds.

Meanwhile, the C8 uses a twin-turbo version of Audi's 4.2Spyder GT2R, will be entered for the Le Mans 24 Hours on June 18, driven by experienced sportscar racers Marc Goossens and Tom Coronel, with Dutchman Donny Crevels taking the third seat. The car has been developed in-house.

This will again be a challenging year for the Spyker Squadron, which intends to make its return to the international endurance racing arena," Mr Muller

'We investigated a number of alternatives for Le Mans 2005 and considered building a prototype for the GTP class. In the end we decided to develop the C8 for a return to the GT class," Mr Muller continued.

The C8 Spyder GT2R will be made available to privateers after the 2005 race, with prices starting at a hefty 325,000 euros [16.3 million baht].

The original road-going C8 Spyder was unveiled at the Birmingham motor show in England in October 2000, winning instant acclaim for its hand-crafted finish and beneath-the-skin technology. The coupé version, the C8 Laviolette, was launched the following year in Amsterdam.

other variants have appeared, in-

cluding a twin-turbo C8 and ultimately the 12-cylinder C12 LaTurbie, which appeared at this year's Geneva motor show.

Deliveries of the C12 will not start until the second half of 2006, and there is already a backlog of 100 orders for these littleknown but much sought-after supercars.

The company is now listed on the Amsterdam Stock Exchange and has appointed 18 dealers worldwide, with California being by far its most important market.

Clearly, the reason behind Phuket's misery and the pitiful occupancy rates is the identifica-

tion of the island with the Asian tsunami, even though most of Phuket's tourism infrastructure was little affected.

We cannot combat cultural obsession with ghosts, or what some see as sensitive issues, or even the fact that some people don't want to have a vacation

in an area where many died.

But clearly, the perception of many travelers, including those in other parts of Thailand,

too badly damaged to visit.

This is undoubtedly a factor in many tour operators opting not to include Phuket in their programs, but there are other fac-

Several people in Pattaya told me that they go on vacation to have a good time, and they don't need to be told to go home to bed at 1 am. These conversations were happening at 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning and everything was humming as usual.

The tourism industry in Phuket needs more help than the phrase "time heals all wounds". Promotions by the tourism authorities, such as the Miss Universe visit, have been helpful but they are clearly not enough.

The major culprits behind

Phuket's perceived destruction - the big television news networks have made little or no effort to repair the massive damage they caused by using Phuket and its comfortable and undamaged facilities to portray the devastation caused by the catastrophe.

These networks could help by first clearly explaining the cause of the tsunami and showing how a similar disaster could happen in many other parts of the world. They should also admit to their deceit in sensationalizing and distorting the actual events at the unnecessary cost of thousands of jobs and businesses.

The fact is that visitors are still coming to Thailand – but not to Phuket. Most of the people that I spoke to simply didn't know that Phuket is no longer a smashed-up mess full of sadness.

It's a pipedream to think that the big networks will admit to their abuse of power, but hopefully, a few happy scandals here may attract their attention.

villa and condominium project in August, with an expected completion date around the middle of 2007.

The Coconut Island Resort project will occupy 35 rai of land on the island's southern headland, just five minutes by speedboat from the Laem Hin jetty on the mainland.

The project will comprise 77 villa and apartment units in "Thai-contemporary" style for residents who wish to combine the quiet atmosphere of island living with easy access to the mainland, which will be accessible by a speedboat shuttle from the project's boathouse pier.

Eugene McCain and Rolf Jansson, Managing Partners of Coconut Island Resort Co, told the Gazette that the 20-berth boathouse, which may eventually be developed into a small marina, is expected to serve as a popular stop-off point for yachtsmen on their way back to the Boat Lagoon and Royal Phuket Marina after exploring Phang Nga Bay.

For those seeking longer stays on the island, there will be 33 villas ranging in size from one to four bedrooms, and from 200 to 300 square meters of living space. Two basic design options will be available - each with a 40-sqm private pool – at prices starting at around 9 million baht.

Apartments will be built in three blocks, all enjoying sea views. The three-story southwest and southeast blocks will house one-bedroom apartments, with four units on each level, for a total of 24 units.

The east block will have 20 one-bedroom apartments (16 two-story units and four singlestory units), with prices starting at 4 million baht.

Mr Jansson described the project interior design scheme as providing "a bright, modern feel" with a minimum of wood in order to ensure ease of maintenance. Floors will be of cool marble or tile, he said.

Apart from two speedboat taxis, facilities and services will include a reception desk, restaurant, tennis court, spa and fitness center and three pools, one of which will be salt water.

management company to oversee day-to-day operations of the property, such as garbage collection, water supply and wastewater treatment.

Water supply will be from two wells with reserve tanks. The developers will also install underground power cables, with initial power initially supplied by an on-site generator.

The developers said they have been in negotiations with the Koh Kaew Tambon Administration Organization and are confident that the project will be hooked up to the provincial power grid well before its open-

The target market for the project comprises foreigners, resident expatriates and Bangkok-based Thais.

don't think that anyone in Phuket would disagree with the claim that we live in Paradise. In my humble opinion, Phuket has to be one of the most paradisaic spots in the world. And I think I've just added a word to the English language.

I chose to live here because I specifically wanted a house near the beach. But how often do I actually dip my toes in the water? Not often enough, all things considered. Then there's the food. Thai food is first-class; rarely will you eat a Thai meal that isn't *aroi maak*. It's also ludicrously inexpensive. So why do we keep on wanting to consume burgers and pizzas?


It's all a little strange. I think it all boils down to the fact that we tend to take what we have here very much for granted. Well I'm certainly guilty of that.

There are so many things that visitors to the island stop and stare at, whipping out their cameras to capture the moment. "It's only an elephant," I've found myself saying to visitors who I've been showing round the island. A daft reaction on my part, considering that elephants aren't an everyday sight in the UK.

When my mum comes over she tends to go a bit mental over the plants. In deepest, darkest Yorkshire, it can take her years to get a tropical plant to flower, and only then if she's managed to keep it alive all that time.

Here, plants are somewhat

more willing to produce the goods, and don't have the suicidal tendencies of their distant cousins in northern England.

One tree that seems to capture the imagination of visitors is one that many of us will pass every day without giving it a second thought – the humble para rubber tree, or *Hevea*

Brasiliensis as it's correctly known. This is perhaps one of the most common trees in southern Thailand, yet very few of us have one in our gardens.

These things are everywhere, just quietly growing in huge plantations all over the island. But they haven't been here that long in comparative terms,

and they have a pretty amazing history.

Brazil provided the world with the rubber tree. In 1876, Henry Wickham, a local planter acting for the British Government, exported a few from the lower Amazon area to London.

The seeds were germinated later that year in London at the Tropical Herbarium in Kew Gardens. From there, some of the resultant seedlings were exported to Ceylon (now called Sri Lanka).

The next year, 22 seedlings were sent from Ceylon to Singapore, where they grew enthusiastically, and the technique of tapping (from the side of the tree) was developed. Before this, the trees had to be felled before the latex could be extracted, which wasn't ideal.

By 1900, most of the techniques and agricultural practices required to establish large plantations had been developed. One important technique used was bud grafting. This is essentially a cloning technique which ensures that genetically identical trees can be produced in unlimited numbers.

Over the next 40 years or so, the British in Malaya (now Malaysia) and the Dutch in Indonesia cleared large areas of rainforest to create rubber plantations.

At the same time, local

farmers saw the opportunities of rubber cultivation, and planted small groves of trees to supplement their own income.

This gave rise to two types of plantations in most rubber-producing countries: the estates, or plantations, and the smallholdings. It's the smallholdings that we see here in Phuket; they produce solid rubber sheets that you'll often see hanging from lines, looking like grubby white towels on a washing line.

All natural rubber originates in the *hevea* tree, and it starts its journey when the tree is tapped, which doesn't usually happen more often than once every couple of days.

A tapper starts the hike around his plantation before dawn. At each tree, he uses a sharp knife to shave off the thinnest possible layer from an intact section of bark.

The cut must be neither too deep, nor too thick, as either will reduce the productive life of the tree. This cut gets the latex flowing, and the tapper leaves a small cup underneath the cut, returning a few hours later to collect the sap. This double round trip usually finishes at about 2 pm.


Surprisingly, the latex that rubber comes from isn't actually made from sap. The sap runs deeper inside the tree, beneath the cambium, which is the slightly harder part of the tree beneath the bark that does all the growing.

Latex runs in the latex ducts which are in a layer immediately outside the cambium. This shows how highly-skilled the tappers really are. If the cambium is cut, then the tree is damaged, because the cambium is where all the growth takes place. Too much damage to the cambium, and the tree stops growing and stops making latex.

Well I've managed to get through a whole article without making one single childish remark about what rubber can be used for. And I've invented a new word. Time for a pizza, I think.
