Tsunami alert '90pc success'

PHUKET: The National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) tsunami warning on the night of July 24 has been declared a "90% success".

The alert, urging evacuation of the Andaman coast, came after an earthquake measuring 7.3 on the Richter scale struck the Andaman & Nicobar Islands, only 664 kilometers from Phuket.

At 11 pm, Plodprasop Suraswadi, Director of the NDWC in Nonthaburi, near Bangkok, advised that people living in coastal areas should move to higher ground. The earthquake, with its epicenter located about 10 kilometers below the seabed, occurred at 10:42 pm.

K. Plodprasop announced that giant waves were predicted

to hit Karon Beach at 12:12 am and Patong Beach a minute later, followed by Bang Tao Beach, Tah Chat Chai, Thai Muang, Khao Lak, and Koh Lanta.

Boonchai Somchai, Chief of Phuket Provincial Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Office (ODPM) said that Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura ordered local authorities to warn the public of the predicted tsunamis.

"Karon and Patong authorities received orders from the Governor to announce an evacuation of residents at 11 pm, via loudspeaker announcements and by setting off the NDWC sirens in Patong at midnight."

He said that residents of coastal areas moved to safety of their own accord, with some assistance from police.

"The evacuation went according to plan and was about 90% successful. The only problem we encountered was in sending mobile phone alerts upon the first warning. However, the Radio Communication Association was on standby and was able to provide radio and telephone links," K. Boonchai said.

"Nobody was hurt during the evacuation, nor when the tsunami warning was canceled at 1:30 am and residents returned to their homes."

At 2:12 am, K. Plodprasop announced again that the warning had been rescinded, after steps had been taken to ensure that there was no further risk. The public was later informed that although there had been potential for a tsunami, only five small waves were generated.

Hotels see 15pc rise in occupancy

PHUKET: Hotel occupancy rates on the island for July are expected to be up 15% when compared with June, thanks mainly to Tourism Authority of Thailand marketing, Pattanapong Aikwanich, President of the Phuket Tourist Association, predicted on July 18.

"There have been many Thai groups who bought the 'Beach basking, bargain shopping' packages, as well as tourists from Australia, the Middle East, Hong Kong, India and [South] Korea," K. Pattanapong said at a meeting at Provincial Hall.

He added, "True, there are fewer tourists arriving from Germany, Scandinavia and Japan but, [from] the middle of July, Chinese and Taiwanese travelers are expected to come.

"If the tourism situation begins to recover to normal levels, there will be an increase in flights to Phuket." To add weight to K. Pattanapong's statement, many hotels have reported an increase in bookings for August.

K. Pattanapong continued, "Although the current situation in Phuket is better than when compared with the beginning of the year, we need to continue building tourists' confidence."

However, Juthamas Siriwan, Governor of the Tourism Authority of Thailand, took a rather bleaker view of the situation in an interview with Bloomberg News on July 19, saying that Thailand may lose as much as 50 billion baht in tourism revenue as a result of the tsunami.

"At first I thought we would lose 33 billion baht for the whole year, but now I think it may be estimated at more than that," Bloomberg quoted her as saying. "It's around 45 to 50 billion baht in lost tourism revenue."

Italian found dead


PHUKET: The body of an Italian tourist who disappeared while snorkeling at Laem Ka Yai on July 22 was found the following day on the beach at Khao Khad.

National park chosen for tsunami museum

PHUKET CITY: While a number of proposals remain under consideration, plans for the construction of tsunami memorials in various places are moving forward.

Dr Apinan Poshyananda, Director General of the Ministry of Culture's Office of Contemporary Art and Culture, said in a recent meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall that the overall tsunami memorial project will consist of three facets: a museum, a monument and sculptures.

"The government has decided to build a tsunami museum in Phang Nga's Khao Lak-Lamru National Park. Although its design will be determined through an international competition in the months to come, we will lay the foundation stone on December 26," Dr Apinan said.

The cost for development of the as-yet-unnamed museum alone is estimated at 1.5 billion baht. The building will house items collected from tsunami sites, information displays, a list of tsunami victims' names – possibly written in their respective native languages – and souvenir sales outlets.

He explained that the government initially had contemplated a "from-sea-to-land" museum in Khao Lak, extending from the beachfront grounds of the still-closed La Flora Resort up to the police boat, *TorOr 813*, which was washed about a kilometer inland by the tsunami.

But that area is private land, so the planning committee instead selected the national park as the site for the museum. "The price of land is high at present," Dr Apinan explained, "so it is better to construct the museum on government land."

The planning committee visited the park to inspect points with a sea view. The specific site is to be identified by August 15. The area of land required for the museum is not known.

Meanwhile, Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura still hopes that the island may have its own tsunami memorial museum.

"A museum [in Phuket] would be a good focal point for people who come here to honor their loved ones or to understand more about what happened that day," he observed. "We would like to support such a museum project in Phuket, if possible, and Mai Khao has 2,000 rai of government land that could be put to good use in serving the original 'from-seato-land' concept."

Building a museum is just one of a slew of memorial concepts under scrutiny.

The police boat, *TorOr 813*, in Khao Lak, for example, will become an important tsunami monument, and its surroundings home to at least one sculpture.

"A large number of Scandinavians were lost in the area, so we will invite Scandinavians to design a commemorative sculpture near *TorOr 813*. We expect to allocate 8 million baht per [statue] location," said Dr Apinan.

Plans also exist for sculptures to be built on Koh Phi Phi and Phuket, he added. "Kamala, Patong and Mai Khao are possible locations for a sculpture on Phuket." Once sites have been identified, sculpture designs will be determined through international contests.

Meanwhile, the Mai Khao Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) has hired designer Weera Amnuaiporn to build a tsunami memorial on 100 rai near the local cemetery.

The Mai Khao *OrBorTor* may use some of the 400 million baht budget earmarked for this project to develop a public park in the vicinity as well.

"Most people in the area agree with this plan because it would enhance tourism in the region," Sarawut Srisakukam, chairman of the Mai Khao *Or-BorTor*, said. "We are eager to launch our tsunami memorial project with the support of the Phuket provincial government."

Mystery over stabbing in bar

PATONG: Mystery surrounds the identity of a foreigner who was reported stabbed in the Viking bar on Soi Bangla in the early hours of July 20.

Pol Sub-Lt Weerapong Rakkito of Patong Police Station said that someone had called from the bar to report the stabbing. When the police arrived there, they found that the victim had already been taken to Patong Hospital for treatment.

However, when they reached the hospital, they discovered that the man had already discharged himself without receiving treatment or registering.

"We wrote up a report with the information we had," Lt Weerapong said, "but we can do nothing more. We need the victim to come to the police station to make a statement, then we can investigate further."

Limo drivers' protest fends off airport meter taxis

PHUKET CITY: A protest by about 100 airport limousine drivers at Provincial Hall on July 20 successfully delayed the setting up of a taxi counter in the airport terminal.

It also prevented the number of meter taxis serving the airport from being increased from 30 to 70 due to be effected July 25, with the backing of Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura.

"The Phuket Taxi Meter counter is currently 50 meters from the terminal, but the Governor wants it moved to inside the terminal without [taxi drivers] paying for a concession," explained Manod Chusak, who runs the limousine counters at Phuket International Airport (PIA).

"At the same time, he wants taxis to have counters set up at every beach on Phuket," K. Manod added.

He also explained that the Governor had given his support for the number of taxis serving the airport to be increased ultimately to 270.

Weera Kearpanich, Chairman of the Airport Limousine and Business Service Cooperative Ltd, said, "We currently operate four counters at the airport, and this year we are paying more than

1 million baht a month for the concession [for the right to operate a limousine service at the airport]."

K. Manod explained that the concession fee had been increased each year, from 905,267 baht a month in 2003 to 995,794 baht a month in 2004.

On top of the rising fees, K. Manod said, limousine drivers were already suffering from the greatly reduced number of tourists on the island following the tsunami.

"If taxis set up a counter in the terminal, limousine drivers will have even fewer passengers," he said, admitting that tourists prefer to use meter taxis because they are cheaper.

He said that limousine drivers want Gov Udomsak to have the number of taxis serving the airport restricted to the 30 taxis that are currently allowed in.

The protestors disbanded after PIA Deputy General Manager Chan Chiamcharoen said that he would inform the PIA Director immediately of their complaints, and that the moves to improve taxi service would not go ahead until all the affected parties had discussed their problems with the Governor.

Number of 'ya bah' arrests 'increasing'

PHUKET CITY: The number of arrests for possession or use of *ya bah* (methamphetamine) has doubled since April, the Gazette has learned.

Pol Capt Aikanit Danpitaksart of the Phuket City Police told the Gazette that he believes the number of people using the drug is increasing, despite Thailand being in the third phase of the government's "war on drugs".

He said that part of the reason for the increasing usage and trafficking of the drug may be that

dealers no longer fear prison because so many are released on bail by the courts.

"Now we work hard to stop the spread of ya bah, but the number of users and dealers is increasing anyway," he admitted.

Capt Aikanit noted that until recently most ya bah cases in his jurisdiction involved only a few pills, but that now arrests for 100 pills or more. On June 16, 220 pills were seized in two cases, and 180 more were seized in another case on June 22.

Frenchman gets the point

PATTAYA: A French tourist who threw a beer bottle at a bar girl and then slapped her was left in a critical condition when she stabbed him in retaliation.

Police received notification from Pattaya Memorial Hospital at 1 am on July 4 that a tourist had been admitted to the facility with a stab wound to his stomach. He had been rushed to the hospital by Chaipim Duangchan, 35, owner of the aptly-named Ding Dong Beer Bar on Soi Buakao.

At the hospital, officers found Jean François, a 42-yearold French national, with a knife wound to the left side of the abdomen, below the navel. The extent of the wound was such that part of his intestines were protruding from his belly.

A fellow Frenchman, 42year-old Dominic-Marie Philip, accompanied him to the hospital.

K. Chaipim told the officers that she had been holding her birthday party at the bar and the two Frenchmen had come to join



This road used to be called 'Millionaire's Mile', but now they just call it 'Death Row'," lamented a foreign resident of Kamala, surveying piles of rubble and debris strewn along the Kamala beachfront.

The man, who has lived in Kamala for six years and owns a high-profile business on the island, contacted the Gazette out of desperation – hoping that publicizing the situation in Kamala might somehow prompt local authorities there to begin a cleanup.

Speaking under the condition of anonymity, he painted an outlook for the area that will be as bleak as its current landscape if something isn't done soon.

Such clean-up and recovery work as has been done was mostly due to private sector help - including many foreign donations – and by small business owners looking after their own

With the high season just four months away, it's imperative to get Kamala cleaned up - and fast, he said.

"There are no more tourists, but at least some small shops are open. But what the local government hasn't done is clean up public areas or force the owners of damaged buildings and hotels to clean up.

"It's like we are living in a war zone," he added.

He believes tourists will take one look around and say, "I'm out of here - and I am not coming back."

The Kamala Tambon Administration Organization (Or-BorTor) should be doing much more, he stressed.

Speaking with a tone of bewilderment and exasperation in his voice, he asked: "Why not get a team together to clean up the beachfront? There is a big developer who had his office right on the beach, which is totally illegal. The office was washed away, but all the debris from the office is still there - and now he's building on the other side of the road.

"Why not tell the developer to clean it up? It would take only one truck and five men about two days to complete the job," he estimated.

He also wondered where the funds – from both government and donations - had gone.

"I know a hell of a lot of money has been given to Kamala. I donated 100,000 baht myself... The Governor should come here a million baht you could clean up and have a look. Someone like [Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra], a man who says, 'Get this done and get it done now,' would

Seven months after the wave, why is Kamala still like a garbage tip?

More than seven months after the tsunami hit, the clean-up effort in most parts of the island has been so well accomplished that some visitors to the island find it difficult to believe that a tsunami ever hit here. But there is one exception: little has been done to clean up badly-hit parts of Kamala – and local residents wonder why.

The *Gazette* investigates.

probably blow a fuze if he saw what was happening here. He'd explode," he said, trying to control his emotions. "He'd ask: 'After six months what the f*** have you been doing here?"

Failing such intervention, he did not hold out much hope for recovery of tourism in Kamala during the next high season.

"I get very, very upset because Patong is clean and beautiful and Kamala is like a garbage tip. It should be a matter of pride. If you are a Thai citizen you have to look at all the garbage and then ask yourself, 'What is this Or-BorTor doing?' and, 'Why do I

"Is there no one who takes action here? They sit in their office and they do nothing. I don't know if it's the OrBorTor or the [provincial] government, because I don't really know how the government works here.

"It would take so little. With all of Kamala One truck with six guys could clean up all of Kamala in two months," he said.

ments about pride-of-place found resonance with K. Soranan.

"There has been no improvement here. When I drive through Kamala, I look at the state of it and I feel embarrassed to call myself a resident.

"Our *OrBorTor* president never gets out and visits people here. He's worse than all the other presidents we've had here in the past," he opined.

Kamala Village 3 assistant village headman Chaki "Jackie" Somsub, 35, is another critic of the current *OrBorTor*.

He said that he had helped in an effort by villages to clean out drains and canals, and noted that the provincial government had begun work to fix the beach road. But, he said, there had been a lack of effort on the part of the *OrBorTor*.

"The *OrBorTor* didn't even bother to put in any extra budget request after the tsunami – and that's why they don't have any money now. And what funding they do have they use in the wrong ways, not in ways that will help tourism recover," he said.

He added that the problems in Kamala pre-dated the tsunami; the area had long suffered from flooding and blackouts during the rainy season and water shortages in the dry season – despite the fact that much of the tambon sits in a valley surrounded by forested hillsides, a fact that should make it easy to collect and store water.

"We have to do everything by ourselves. The *OrBorTor* should be fixing infrastructure that was damaged by the tsunami, but instead they are doing a road project because the funds for it had already been budgeted and the project suits their own needs," he said.

"On the other hand, the road out to the Kamala Bay Terrace was impassable for four months after the tsunami until property owners in the area paid to have it fixed," he added.

"Kamala *OrBorTor* is always sure to pay a visit whenever a new project is getting underway [and needs *OrBorTor* permission to begin], but when it comes to problems in public ar-

eas, they do nothing.

"Everyone is disappointed with the lack of transparency here. I believe tourists will still come to Kamala to have a look, but they will no longer fall in love with the place like they used to," he said.

The man in the middle of this maelstrom is Kamala *OrBorTor* President Jaran Sararak. He strenuously denied any impropriety and said that the reason that the Kamala recovery was so slow was that the clean-up effort was slated as part of a large Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) project to re-landscape the beachfront.

"The TAT plans to renovate the beachfront by itself, and I heard [last week] that they just got a 60-million-baht budget for the work. If the *OrBorTor* begins renovation work, the TAT will just come in at a later date and do the whole thing all over again. Why should we duplicate our efforts? We should use our budget to do projects that are of the most benefit to the public," he said.

K. Jaran also estimated that some 80% of the businesses that had been operating along the beach before the tsunami – and which now comprise much of the debris in the area – had ille-

gally encroached on public property and that the *OrBorTor* was powerless to force them to clean up.

In some cases, on private land, people had started to rebuild but ran out of money — leaving unsightly foundation pillars and little else. "What can we do?" he asked.

He said that, in fact, the *OrBorTor* had worked to clear out the damage in some areas, but said the beachfront was the TAT's responsibility. Although details of the TAT plan have not yet been made available to the media, K. Jaran believes they will include footpaths and public gardens. The *OrBorTor*, with help from the private sector, had already done some clean-up work in other areas, he said.

The *Gazette* asked K. Jaran about claims that local people were unhappy with the *OrBor-Tor* because it had done nothing after the tsunami – and also about allegations that he lacked vision and was taking "commissions" on projects.

Addressing claims that the *OrBorTor* was sitting on its hands, K. Jaran said the organization had already paid out some 6 million baht in compensation claims to owners of small businesses that were affected by the tsunami.

It had also just received 200 million baht from the Ministry of Interior's Department of Local Administration to make improvements to the main beach road, klongs in the area and the local mosque, he added.

He said the claims probably resulted either from misunderstandings or from infighting among local politicians and government officials that had resulted in a smear campaign being waged against him from some quarters.

"It's simply not true that I have been cheating," he said. "I have done everything according to proper procedures and have all the documentation to prove it."



ing quads, stand-up tricycles and scaled-down road racers, require a four-to-six-hour charge to enable them to run for 12 hours, or around 35 kilometers.

They can hit a maximum speed of around 40kmh via an automatic gearbox, which means that one might be recharging it often. Still, K. Surin

reports that a full charge costs a mere 10 baht.

The single-cylinder, 4-stroke models have a three-liter tank, and, shockingly, a speedometer that goes up to a coffin-beckoning 70mph (113kmh). This potentially insane speed is reached by a four-speed manual gearbox.

The engine red-lines at 14,000rpm, and the wise – and uneasy – rider might be inclined to leave the cellophane on the seat cover in case of fear-induced accidents.

Chrome abounds on the flagship FS-516G, a scaled-down chopper. It features long forks, a rear tire as wide as a Mini's and, inexplicably, a mirror positioned on the rear suspension arm near the tire. To check for small dogs, perhaps?

There is, perhaps, no sensible reason why someone would want one of these pocket rockets. They are impractical, expensive toys, designed for people with more cash than brains.

Time to check the piggy bank and to book a lobotomy; these things have just reached the top of my wishlist.

Majority support decree: survey

large majority of the Thai public, especially those from the three southern border provinces, support the executive decree that gives the Prime Minister absolute power to handle states of emergency, an opinion survey found.

The survey, by Assumption University, found that 86.3% of respondents in Yala, Pattani and Narathiwat supported the decree, while 72.6% of respondents in Bangkok also agreed with it.

The university surveyed 1,035 people in Bangkok and 428 people in the three southern provinces.

Professor Dr Srisak Jamornmarn, head of the university's survey office, said 21.3% of respondents in Bangkok and 10.4% in the three southern provinces disagreed with the decree. The remaining respondents in both groups had no comment.

When asked to choose between human rights and strict law enforcement to achieve peace in the Deep South, 71.5% of the combined groups chose strict law enforcement, 22.1% gave priority to human rights and 6.4% had no comment.

Big business: While plans to export nine elephants to Australia are still receiving criticism, the owner of the country's biggest elephant shelter has come up with another controversial business idea – setting up a farm for the breeding and sale of elephants.

Laithongrian Meepan, owner of the Ayutthaya Elephant Palace and Royal Kraal, said the project would aim to develop the genetic traits of the endangered animals, which are a national symbol. However, he disclosed that the farm would eventually cater for rich people who wanted to buy elephants, with calves selling for around 2 million baht each.

"A pedigree elephant is not an ordinary pet, but an animal to boost the status of the rich," he said.

Spirit houses: The Excise Department presented to the Cabinet three formulae to help balance the need to reduce alcohol consumption against the need to protect the Thai liquor industry.

Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra promised to reform the tax system after learning that alcohol consumption had increased over the past 10 years – in spite of the Excise Department repeatedly raising taxes.

According to one industry analyst, three categories of alcoholic beverages that did not exist 10 years ago have come to dominate the Thai market: economypriced beer; low-priced whisky; and "other spirits" sold for less than 300 baht for a 700ml bottle.

Hockey season: The Buri Ram Municipality Pawnshop was in danger of closing after a flood of residents affected by high oil

prices turned to the service for quick cash, its manager said.

Suwan Saenmai said the continuous oil-price hikes and the subsequent higher living costs had affected many residents from all walks of life. As a result, Suwan said, between 400 and 500 people a day – around double the normal number – were pawning items.

He said the shop had been spending 2 million baht a day and had depleted its 70-million-baht cash reserves, as well as the 2 million baht it had already borrowed from the municipality, a month ago.

The pawnshop will ask the municipal council to allow the business to borrow 15 million baht from banks so that it can stay afloat, he said.

Spreading the wealth: The Cabinet approved raising the daily minimum wage for unskilled workers by between 2 baht and 8 baht.

Government Spokesman Chalermdej Jombunud said Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra also assigned his deputies Chidchai Vanasatidya and Surakiart Sathirathai to draw up measures to improve workers' skills and to consider a quota system for laborers from neighboring countries such as Burma, Laos and Cambodia

In a related story, activist Srisak Thai-aree of the Thai Co-ordinating Committee on Migrant Children announced that the number of Thai-born children of immigrant workers under the age of 15 has grown tenfold to one million in the past 10 years.

Candid camera: Thai Immigration has set up "photographic-information systems" at Bangkok, Phuket and Chiang Mai airports as part of its latest effort to improve security following the deadly bombing at Haad Yai International Airport in early April.

Passengers wearing hats are asked them to remove them and look at the camera on the counter facing them in a process that adds just a few seconds to the immigration process.

The new Personal Identification Secure Comparison and

Evaluation System (PISCES) is part of the effort to achieve international standards in safety and security and was not a response to any particular threat.

The system was designed to check on those entering and leaving the Kingdom and to compare passengers' information efficiently with a blacklist database, an Immigration officer said.

New and improved: The contents of intelligence-boosting gift bags given to babies born at Government hospitals have been improved and 100,000 of the sets will be distributed on July 28.

Previously, 3,000 gift sets were given to parents of newborn

children at Ramathibodi Hospital and some other larger city hospitals in a pilot project by The National Institute for Brain-based Learning.

The bags' contents received mixed reviews from the recipients, some of whom said they posed a health risk to toddlers.

In response to parents' criticisms, the gift bag's rope has been shortened in order to ensure no babies get dangerously entangled in it and small bells have been removed from toys lest babies swallow them. Sharp edges of books have also been softened and rounded.

No protest: Monks who protested a move to allow the maker of Chang Beer to list on the stock exchange violated an order by the Supreme Patriarch, the Director of the National Buddhism Office (NBO), Dr Chaktham Thammasak, has announced.

Dr Chaktham said the Supreme Patriarch issued an order five or six years ago banning monks from engaging in political meetings or protest gatherings.


Although the protest by a coalition of 128 anti-vice groups was carried out in good faith, it was inappropriate for monks to take part in a protest rally, Dr Chaktham said.

"Protesting is not a monastic activity and 95% of Buddhists do not like to see monks do it," he said.


He said NBO officials would talk to the Abbot of Wat Phra Dhammakaya, who allegedly mobilized monks from the provinces to take part in the protest.

The tsunami fighting spirit



'n the unofficial post-tsunami competition between Nang Thong and Bang Niang to become Khao Lak's future prime beach, Bang Niang has achieved yet another victory. Bang Niang's five-meter-wide and 2.75-kilometer long concrete road has been completed at a total cost of nearly 7.6 million baht.

While the completion of a road system might sound small beer to outsiders, for the people of Bang Niang this represents a major breakthrough – they have been waiting for proper roads for five years.

And there is even more good news rolling in. The installation of power lines and transformers is almost complete, heralding the arrival of much needed power for the reconstruction teams who were previously struggling with gasoline-powered generators and other improvised tools.

In the race against time and the elements (Khao Lak has seen a lot of rain lately), it's likely that the following beach resorts in the Bang Niang area will be fully operational by November 2005: Ayara Villas, Toop Thong Guesthouse, Sanuk Bungalows, Bang Niang Beach Resort, Ludda Resort, Dream Beach Villas, Amsterdam Resort, Mukdara Resort, The Beach Resort, Cousin Resort, Raveewan's and La Flora.



All of these resorts were either severely damaged or wiped out by the tsunami, so a big con-

gratulatory slap on the back for a job well done, especially for the smaller players, who had to cough up the funds by themselves because they were not insured.

Also a big thank you to all the past and

present volunteer teams for their efforts to revive Bang Niang Beach.

But when talking to people who merely lost their job or their

A good example of what might be termed as the tsunami fighting spirit is "Lung Joe", the owner of Joe's Steakhouse at Bang Niang Beach.

He is, stone by stone, rebuilding his famous restaurant with his bare hands, supported by a few donors and ex-customers.

Talking to Joe, you will

never hear him complain about his situation or the tsunami. He is convinced that his steakhouse will be up and running before the season starts, even though it is uncertain if he has enough money left to construct the roof.

Cruising along Nang Thong Beach, there are signs of reconstruction and cleaning efforts here and there, yet the "yes, we can do it!" spirit is not quite as apparent

as at Bang Niang Beach.

Here, as at Bang Niang though, it is the smaller players kicking the ball, such as Gerd and Noi Bungalows and Khao Lak Green Beach.

Other Nang Thong resorts stating that they will be operational by November 2005 are: Baan Khao Lak, Khao Lak Seaview Resort, Nang Thong Bay Resort, and the Khao Lak Andaman Beach Resort, which has now joined forces with the Garden Beach Resort.

A rather strange development are the new room-pricing policies of some Nang Thongbased resorts. While it would be wise to wait and see how development goes, and to find out what Khao Lak visitors are willing to spend in the first post-tsunami season, one beach resort is asking for an impudent 2,000 baht for a one-night stay in a standard beach bungalow, which is a price rise of more than 40%.

Time will tell whether future Nang Thong Beach visitors will be put off by this peculiar pricing strategy and move on to other beaches or will accept paying over-the-odds as a kind of postponed tsunami aid.



Thai hip-hop crews are multiplying at the speed of sound with acts such as B-King, Temple Dogz and Vamm breaking ground in Bangkok. But the next big hip-hop act could well be right here, in Phuket.

South Players (formerly South Side Crew) MC'd alongside Thaitanium, Thailand's leading hip-hop group, last December at Phuket Rajabhat University. Since then, they have been on 96.75FM and Bangkok's legendary Fat Radio.

Their debut album, 2P Mix tape Vol. 1 (made when they were still called South Side Crew), is mature and well produced. Old-school beats and Thai/English lyrics may not be revolutionary anymore, but their tone is fresh and their delivery is right on. Along with Thaitanium and Temple Dogz, South Players are making some of Thailand's best hip-hop.

In a musical genre where looks matter, meeting the crew was no disappointment. Fully geared out with graffitied baggies and giant diamond-studded watches, these Thai boys strike a gangsta pose just as good as the "real thing".

South Players, with Freddy V acting as spokesmen, gave **Greg Glachant** insights into their music and the attitudes that form it.

Who are South Players?

There are five core members to our crew. DKY1 is 21 and studying art at Rajabhat. I'm 18 and I just graduated from Dulwich [now the British Curriculum International School]. 2P and I.G. are 14 and go to Chalermprakiet School. Mellowman is the youngest, he's 13, and he

ne s 13, and ne goes to Dulwich, too.

Tell us about your debut album.

2P Mix tape Vol. 1 was released in December 2004. It took us some 40 hours at GT Studio to record it. 2P is our godfather. He came up with the 13,000 baht to do it.

So far, we've sold 50 copies in Bangkok – at DJ Siar

and Chatuchak Market – and 150 copies at Pentagon Skateshop, here, at Ocean Mall.

We're really proud of this album and even though we'd do a few things differently now, we're still the best in Phuket.

What does "mix tape" imply?

The beats on our tracks are all samples from oldschool hip-hop [artists] like Ice-Cube and Fat Jo.

We didn't want people to recognize the beats and go, "Oh listen, it's Jay-Z."

The lyrics are all original, though.

They're ours.

copies in Bangkok – at DJ Siam But Thai culture is pretty

tame, whereas hip-hop is inyour-face.

We're bridging the gap. It's not a problem for us at all. Look at Freddy's T-shirt, DKY1's armband: those are Thai flags. We're proud of being Thai.

You can be Thai and be loud. You know, there's a kind of traditional Thai song where two groups argue. That's just like hip-hop.

How about school and your parents?

Our parents are so proud to hear us on the radio. Our teachers love it. We've even performed at Chalermprakiet school.

We want people to be proud of us. We want people in Bangkok to say, "Hey, Phuket has good hip-hop."

At Chalermprakiet, did you perform your song about being drunk and high?

We shifted the lyrics around a bit for that one. Most people don't understand anyway

But we don't drink or smoke. We just sing that for "gangsta" fun. We're all about fun.

Yes, you're not political, unlike other Thai groups, such as Temple Dogz, who rip into Bush and Thaksin. Even Thaitanium claim they are heir to the 1973 demonstrations.


Temple Dogz are more old-school, like NWA and Public Enemy. We're not into that.

But do you feel you can say anything you want? You do

have one song about the unrest along the Malaysian border and it's critical of the terrorists but not of the government.

We're underground. We can say what we want. DKY1 is Muslim and he thinks things are just going to get worse and worse down there.

We've turned down RS Promotion [Thailand's leading record label].


We want to stay underground. We want to be free and do what we want.

Coldplay reinforce No 1 claim

nly those who have lived in a cave for the past couple of months could have failed to have heard *Speed of Sound*, the first single from *X&Y*, which is the third studio album by Coldplay.

There is no doubting how good the single is – and it is magnificent – but still, critics and fans alike have been wondering if the "curse of the third album" will descend on the band.

It has not. In fact, X&Y is quite simply the best yet by Coldplay, and makes more credible the suggestion that they are the biggest band in the world, usurping U2.

Admittedly, the single *Vertigo* aside, U2's most recent album, *How To Dismantle An Atomic Bomb*, was a damp squib, but that does not detract from Coldplay's new-crowned status as the Kings of Rock.

But X & Y is not an immediate hit; it grows on one, with three or four listenings required before any musical epiphany occurs.

The album begins with the anthem *Square One*. Songwriter, vocalist and pianist Chris Martin writes about love, dreams and

loss in a way that affects the listener.

"From the top of the first page, to the end of the last day. From the start in your own way, you just want somebody listening to what you say. It doesn't matter who you are."

X&Y features large amounts of electronica in the style of Eno, Kraftwerk and late-'70s Bowie. This, when combined with the

guitar-led elements, shows the heritage of 40-years' worth of introspective experimental music the band have soaked up.

Martin's voice is more fragile than the late Ian Curtis's and less earthy than David Gilmour's yet it soars in the same way as the vocalists from, respectively, Joy Division and Pink Floyd.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, both of these bands – in terms of tunes, phrasing and self-absorption – are evident influences on X&Y, particularly on track 5, Talk, which, even on an album of big music, is massive in scale.

"So you don't know where you're going and you wanna talk. And you feel like you're going where you've been before. You tell anyone who'll listen but you feel ignored. Nothing's really making any sense at all, let's talk. Let's talk, let's talk, let's talk."

But X&Y is also full of heart-rending songs such as track 11, Swallowed In The Sea, and track 7, A Message. For example, this line is from A Message: "My song is love, love to the loveless shown, and it goes on; you don't have to be alone."

Alternative rock? Indie rock? Post-Britpop? All of the above, and with soul. No other band in the world comes close.

X&Y, Coldplay. Parlaphone 3112802. 62 minutes, 32 seconds.

When one thinks of catchy melodies and pure guitar pop, the name Jack Johnson inevitably turns up sooner or later, which is surprising given that he never really set out to make music, and was perfectly content making and editing surf films in his native Hawaii.

Johnson had been a professional surfer until an accident forced him to take some time off. He learned to play guitar at age 14, but did not seriously pursue a career in the arts until college years.

His music caught the ear of

Ben Harper's producer/manager JP Plunier, who pushed Johnson to record formal demos, leading to the release of



Brushfire Fairytales in 2001.

He toured for almost two years, then released *On and On*, to critical acclaim, in 2003.

In Between Dreams finds Johnson still crafting laid-back, introspective yet sharp vocals that entrance the listener.

The pace is set with the opening track *Better Together*, in which Johnson's carefree approach to vocals and his crisp, clean acoustic guitar playing announces a distinctive style existing fans know well.

A mesmerizing collection of 13 tracks of poetic *mots justes* served with intriguing guitar pop, ends with *Constellations*, arguably his most melodic and touching song to date:

"And it was just another night with a sunset and a moonrise not too far behind to give us just enough light to lay down underneath the stars. We listened to Papa's translations of the stories across the sky. We drew our own constellations."

Johnson covers a range of topics on *In Between Dreams*, including the ecstasy of new love, the demoralizing effect of watching TV, and being inside on a rainy day.

Those who are new to his music will probably find *In Between Dreams* an enticing introduction to the man's canon of work, while for existing fans it is an instant classic.

Sampling life in the slowest lane

espite the bridge across the Mekong that now links Laos with northern Thailand, very little seems to have changed in decades in Vientiane, Asia's most somnambulant capital. Laden hawkers amble their way past the shops on Samsenta St toward the market. A couple of jeeps cross the intersection, followed by three motorcyclists leisurely puttering their way to work. Look away for a few minutes and you could well miss the morning rush hour in Vientiane.

Besides the bridge, there are two other routes into this intriguing non-metropolis, which is really more of a country village with a scattering of embassies looking embarrassedly out of place.

You can either take a ferry across the deep muddy waters of the Mekong or fly into the peacock blue airport, where the immigration official, unless closely supervised, could well stamp your passport with the wrong year. Either method of entry is a suitably characteristic introduction.

Still dazed from the effects of the Indochina War, the country is a curious relic of bygone Asia where tourists are an oddity but are nevertheless still left to their own devices.


"Sabaidee, sabaidee," carol the children as you walk past. There have not yet been enough tourists to provoke brash demands for candy or money so their greeting remains just that — a courteous welcome to a stranger.

For any foreigner with a knowledge of history, peaceful Laos seems at odds with its past. French colonialism and American bombs – which rained down on the Ho Chi Minh trail during the Vietnam War – both contributed to its current backwardness, yet everywhere is calm.

Stroll toward the center of Vientiane and you can soon find yourself back on its outskirts. The actual city center was a kilometer back, a gaggle of shops and restaurants clustered round a crossroads where four-year-olds were playing on their bikes in the middle of the street.

Elegant Buddhist temples rear up at the end of dusty avenues, rivaled by grotesque war

memorials, one of which was nicknamed The Vertical Runway, as it was built with concrete originally donated by the US and supposed to be for the airport.

In Vientiane, after inspecting the temples and gazing across the Mekong, you can dawdle through the morning market. Chickens, vegetables and electronic goods occupy much of the floor space, while sackfuls of tobacco – and the occasional bag of marijuana – have their own special corner.

Just off the main road a wizened lady sits behind neat stacks of Lao kip, Vietnamese dong and Thai baht. With a couple

of customers an hour, she is doing a thriving trade by local standards

She offers a fraction over the official rate for kip (and you could scarcely have picked a better name for the national currency) in exchange for foreign currency, a profit margin that is scarcely likely to attract entrepreneurs. This is the most visible sign of the Laotian black market.

Elsewhere there are Buddhist retreats to visit, tangy curries to eat, and cycles to hire for short jaunts around the outskirts.

Like the Mekong river which flows alongside the city, Vientiane has meandered along on its own sleepy course. And the main reason to hop across the border is for the simple, unalloyed pleasure of sampling life in the dead slow lane.





Dog volunteers

huket's animals have been in the news this past month both locally and internationally, for reasons both good and not-sogood.

On the good side, at the three-day international conference for animals held in Singapore last month, which was attended by politicians, the media and representatives from organizations around the world, Phuket's Soi Dog Foundation (SDF) and its volunteers received no fewer than four awards.

The foundation itself received the prestigious Elizabeth Lewyt Award, and another one from the Humane Society for its post-tsunami work with animals in the region.

In addition, the late Leone Cosens, who sacrificed her own life trying to assist others during the tsunami, was honored for her years of service to the animals of the island.

A permanent memorial plaque is to be erected in the Nai Harn area where she lived and worked.

Gill Dalley was also honored for her courage and dedication to animal welfare. Gill lost both her lower legs after contracting a rare bacterial infection while retrieving a dog from a flooded

Returning to Phuket from hospital only five days before the tsunami struck, she was nevertheless immediately involved in both the human and animal relief

Hong Kong businessman Paul Bartels has promised to donate 300 kilos of dog food a month for the next year in recognition of Gill's award and he is also providing funds towards the memo-

rial for Leone. Local businessman Paul Moorhouse, chief executive of Layan Gardens, has generously offered to cover any additional costs.

Americans Merritt and Kim Clifton, who edit Animal People newspaper, visited the island immediately after the conference. While here, they toured the island extensively. Using tried and trusted survey methods, they estimated that the island's total dog population is now around 10,000 animals.

A previous census carried out a few years ago put the figure at around 17,000, so it would appear that what many long-term residents have noted is correct: the stray dog population is decreasing as a result of the extensive sterilization programs that has seen several thousand animals desexed over the past few

The Cliftons estimate that, at the current rate of reduction, the stray dog population could be totally under control within three

On the negative side, however, they noted a real shortage of wildlife on the island. Many species, they feel, will never return, though they noted that in the hills, many former coconut plantations were being reclaimed by nature – and it is quite likely that some animals and birds will be able to flourish in such areas as a

what they saw at the SDF clinic, but felt there were major issues at the dog pound. The pound hit the front page of the Gazette again last month. Lack of funding means it will shortly run out of food.

The SDF is monitoring the situation and has been providing additional supplies. The organization is currently in negotiation with Nestlé Purina, who had previously donated large amounts of dog and cat biscuits for post-tsunami relief, in the hope that it can supply food at preferential rates. SDF is also seeking to take over the management of the facility.

SDF has asked me to pass on thanks to a number of Gazette readers who made generous donations of both food and money towards their projects.

It hopes that, with continued support, it will be able to find a long-term solution to the suffering of stray domestic animals living on the island.

From camels to catwalks

alling Waris Dirie the author of Desert Flower (Virago Press, London, 1998, 369pp) is stretching things a bit. She grew up as a nomad in Somalia, was illiterate until age 18 and is still dyslexic. The task of writing obviously fell to her co-author, Catherine Miller.

"Desert Flower" is the meaning of Waris's name and the book chronicles her rise from camel keeper to catwalk model. Her book, unfortunately, is badly written, full of cliches, sentimentality, sloppy descriptions, pious liberal platitudes, as well as strident feminist sermonizing.

Scenes are so clumsily described – like when 13-year-old Waris on the run from home is confronted by a lion that decides not to eat her – that you wonder whether they are true or not. But setting cynicism aside, the story of Waris Dirie is still an extraordinary one.

The reason she ran away from her family was because she refused to marry an old man who was offering five camels for her.

Used only to life in the bush, tending goats, sheep and camels, she bumbled her way to an aunt's house in Mo-

gadishu, barely escaping rape and starvation on the way.

Her mother's side of the family were urbanized and educated and Waris lucked into a job as a maid to an uncle, the Somali ambassador to Great Britain.

At age 18, she contrived to stay on in London after the family returned to Somalia. She lived at a YWCA, worked as a cleaning woman in a McDonald's while attending night school to learn English.

She was discovered by a photographer and was suddenly on the cover of the Pirelli calendar, photographed by the legendary Terence Donovan. The shooting was done in Bath. A scared novice 17-yearold model insisted on sharing Waris's bed. Her name was Naomi Campbell.

Waris went on to become a Bond girl, strut the catwalks of Paris, Milan and New York, and grace the covers of all the major glamor magazines.

Like her fellow countrywoman Iman, wife of David Bowie, Waris has the long


narrow chiseled Somali features that are perfect for a model. Somali women, however, suffer from a painful secret. While male and female circumcision are common in African tribal rites, Somali woman undergo a further ordeal called infibulation in which clitoris and labia are excised

and the opening sewn shut into a tiny hole allowing only for urination and menstruation.

Waris underwent this atrocity when she was six. As soon as she made enough money, she had surgery in London to correct it.

It wasn't until a magazine interview years later that she revealed the mutilation that Somali women undergo to make them "pure". This led to a series of TV talk shows, her own Waris Durie Foundation to combat the practice among African immigrants in the West, and appointment as a UN Goodwill Ambassador to lead the campaign against Female Genital Mutilation (FGM).

Her autobiography, Desert



Flower, was published in 14 languages and Elton John both provided a cover blurb and bought the movie rights. So naturally she followed it up with *Desert Dawn*, about a journey home to see her desperately impoverished family in the failed state of Somalia.

Waris has a suggestion to end Somalia's woes:

"These tribal wars, like the practice of circumcision, are brought about by the ego, selfishness, and aggression of men. I hate to say this, but it's true. Both acts stem from their obsession with their territory – their possessions – and women fall into that category both culturally and legally. Perhaps if we cut off their balls off, my country would become paradise. The men would calm down and be more sensitive to the world. Without that constant surge of testosterone, there'd be no war, no killing, no thieving, no rape. And if we chopped off their private parts, and turned them loose to run around and either bleed to death or survive, maybe they could understand for the first time what they're doing to their women."

Waris Dirie's tale is certainly worth telling, but it grates on the nerves that it's told so badly.

- 3. Has the land been subdivided between family members? Don't assume that because you have seen a title deed that it has not been subdivided.
- 4. Is the land unencumbered?
- Maybe the bank owns it. 5. Has the land been earmarked

- to another property?
- 6. What are the plans for roads and who will build and pay for the roads? If there are few other properties using the same road, you may have to pay for the road yourself.
- 7. Is an adequate electrical supply readily available? (You will have to pay for the connection to your property and if you are a long way from the existing supply this will be expensive. Don't assume that the power supply on a public road will be paid for the government.)
- 8. Is there a good water supply? Not all well water is usable, especially close to the sea.
- 9. What will happen around your property in the future? Development around your land will determine both the value of your property and the quality of your life.

- for access or right of way 10. Is the land above flood level? (Flooding does not necessarily come from a river or the sea. Often it is created by other developments nearby, or by poor or nonexistent planning by local authorities.
 - 11. Has the Land Department set out boundaries as per the title deed? This needs to be checked.
 - 12. Don't accept copies of the title. Get the original and copy it yourself.
 - 13. Don't pay any deposits until all issues are clear.

While all of this may seem obvious to some, these issues have caused much financial loss and grief to many.

In the meantime, if you want to practice your land-buying skills, put out the word around your local community that you are interested and see what happens. Could be educational, even fun.

Adding insult to Kamala's injuries

Most hosts planning to throw a gala event take extra care to ensure that their home is spic-and-span before their guests arrive, pride in appearance being a basic human trait.

But at the "Halal Food Hilal Town" tourism promotion event taking place this weekend, guests are unlikely to be impressed with what they see in Kamala.

The sorry state of the beachfront there has residents up in arms as to why so little has been done by the Tambon Kamala Administration Organization to clean up the mess (see Inside Story, pages 4-5).

To be fair, cleaning up Kamala is a more daunting task than that required in other tsunami-affected tambons in Phuket because the waves came much further inland than elsewhere on the island, damaging a much wider area than, say, Karon.

Still, the clean-up is far from an impossible task. Allegations of malfeasance aside, a big part of the problem in Kamala appears to be government red-tape and failure of different agencies to commu-

In this regard, the Tourism Authority of Thailand deserves much of the blame, as it was the agency charged with coming up with redevelopment plans for both Patong and Kamala.

What these plans will contain – and how much funding the projects will receive – remains a mystery, however.

As this edition went to print, information about the plans had still not been released to the media, the TAT willing only to say that they are still being drawn up in Bangkok.

Having spent hundreds of millions of baht to bring the Miss Universe Project to Thailand this year and hundreds of millions more in advertising its Elite Card on CNN, can't the agency fast-track a few hundred thousand baht to clean up Kamala before the start of the high season? Won't such a clean-up inevitably be part of its redevelopment plan anyway?

One also has to question the purpose of the "Hilal Town" promotion, and the six million baht being spent on it by the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization.

It's common knowledge that European high-season travelers are the bread and butter of the Phuket tourism industry.

As the festival is likely to be of questionable benefit in attracting tourists, wouldn't the 6 million baht for Halal Food, Hilal Town have been better spent on a cleanup of the area rather than in hosting an event that will only add to the amount of garbage there?



ur cooperative has had a contract with Phuket International Airport (PIA) for six years, during which time we have paid about one million baht a month for the exclusive right to vend tickets inside the terminal and pick up fares outside it.

According to the contract, the price of the concession increases 10% each year, so it gets increasingly expensive for us to operate.

Before, the concession contracts lasted three years. But our last contract ended in June and the airport now wants to offer new contracts only on an annual basis. We have been operating there under a verbal agreement during the interim period while we wait for a new contract.

Three years ago, the PIA asked the cooperative to buy new cars in order to create the right image among tourists. According to the contract, we were supposed to provide 150 vehicles in total, but in fact we could only afford 135.

The reason for this is that we couldn't generate enough revenue to pay for them because we have been able to turn a profit only during the high season.

During the low season our goal is simply to keep our members employed, relying on profits made during the high season and tips from passengers to get by.

Our cooperative went over

protest by some 100 members of the Airport ALimousine and Business Service Cooperative successfully held up a plan to allow the Phuket Taxi Meter company to begin running a counter inside the main terminal starting on July 25.

Here Weera Kearpanich, Chairman of the Cooperative, tells the *Gazette* why allowing the metered taxis to sell tickets inside the terminal is unfair.

100 million baht into debt buying the new cars. We have been able to pay off some of this, but we are still 58 million baht in debt and many members have now had to seek bank loans.

When we heard that the provincial authorities had announced a policy of allowing meter taxis to set up a counter in the airport parking lot, about 50 meters from the terminal, we thought that would not be a prob-

We understood that this was the provincial government's policy and knew that the meter taxis were still restricted from picking up fares outside the doors of the terminal; that right is granted to us based on the concession fee we pay.

But when we heard that the meter taxis would be allowed to set up a counter inside the terminal – free-of-charge and in direct competition with the four counters for which we pay a large concession fee – then we knew it would directly affect us.

We understood that in doing this the PIA was following the provincial policy, but why didn't they ask the cooperative first? As a cooperative we pay for the right to operate the limousine service at the airport through our concession fee.

It's unfair if the meter taxis are allowed to operate there without having to pay anything.

I don't know who complained to the Govenor that the meter taxi stand was too far from the terminal, or why he decided to change the policy.

Under the old policy there were no problems beween the limousine and meter-taxi drivers, but if they are allowed to set up right inside the terminal there will be big problems because it's unfair for us to have to pay 1 million baht a month while they are charged only 20 baht per car per

In addition to the concession fee, we also have to pay other expenses such as staff salaries, utilites and a fee to rent the counters. Before, we had to make 300,000 baht in ticket sales daily just to break even.

We were getting 300,000 to 400,000 baht a day before the tsunami, which allowed us to cover

the 1.7 to 1.8 million baht per month we need to pay for the concession fee and other ex-

We weren't making much, but as a cooperative we could at least keep all of our drivers employed - sometimes making a little more on tips.

Since the tsunami, however, the most we have made in daily ticket sales is about half that -170,000 baht – and our expenses are higher than before because of the increase in gasoline prices.

If meter taxis are allowed to operate without a concession charge they will take away 50% of our business and we will not be able to earn a living.

In addition to our request that the meter taxis not be allowed to operate in the terminal, we are also asking for help from the Small and Medium-sized Enterprise Bank to assist us with refinancing by taking over the loans we have with other financial institutions and extending the repayment period from three to five

Phuket Taxi Meter [which is the only meter taxi service allowed to pick up fares at the airport] has asked the PIA for exclusive rights to operate meter taxis at the airport – and without paying a concession for the right.

I would like to know who it is that will derive the benefits from all the ticket sales resulting from this arrangement.

SPREADSHEET WIZARDRY

am often asked to assist individuals and businesses with managing their information. Whether it's a simple mailing list of friends or a massive collection of facts and figures about genetic research, the tools for handling such information are usually spreadsheets and databases.

Each of these tools can be used for either purpose, but there are fundamental differences between the two and, once you understand them, choosing the right one becomes an easy decision.

In this first of a two-part series, I will explore the basics of spreadsheets and their uses. Next week, I'll cover databases.

Back when I first got into spreadsheets, they were a collection of columns and rows (150 of each to be exact) and they were used for basic mathematics. In fact, the average child prodigy could do the math better.

Now, however, spreadsheets have evolved into monstrous collections of 256 columns and 65,536 rows, which can do math, calculus, linear regression and a host of other complex functions.

My first experience with the now extinct Lotus 123 spreadsheet Version 1.0 was to create a tool that could calculate the burning capabilities of various natural gases (called British Thermal Units, or BTUs) and then determine the size of an engine needed to power an electric generator.

The goal was to design an electricity-generating plant that could run on rotting garbage. Needless to say, it worked, and the company sold the technology to a university in the US that later sold it to a major oil company that quickly terminated the research program.



It took me hundreds of hours to figure out how to build this clunky old spreadsheet but the result was a powerful tool that reduced days of manual calculations to mere min-

The following are some basics that will display the potential usefulness of the modern-day version of this tool.

Cells: Spreadsheets are the computer equivalent of very large pieces of graph paper. Each confluence of

a column and a row is called a cell. Each cell is given an address that represents its location on the sheet.

By referring cell, you create formulae and links that can customize sentences, generate graphs and even do ani-

Keep in mind that the main use of spreadsheets is to manipulate numbers and characters. Beyond that, you're probably better off with a database when it comes to sorting and searching information and creating complex reports.

Functions: The other powerful feature of spreadsheets is called "functions". These range from simple formulae to complex datamanagement tools. They enable you to do math, sentence concatenation, look up variables and perform multiple calculations.

For example, suppose you want a simple list of your custom-

> the last date your sales staff contacted them. You also want to see how many days have passed

to the address of any value in any since the last contact date, and display the phrase "MUST CON-TACT" next to those who have not been contacted within the past

> You might begin by making a list of your customers in Column A, one on each row. Next, format Column B as "date", and select the date format you prefer; format Column C so that it is "numeric" with no decimals.

Finally, in Column B (next to each customer's name), enter the last date the customer was contacted. Now the fun begins.

TODAY(): This function allows you to calculate days, months and years and also compare them

In our example, we want

Column C to display the number of days since the last contact. In Column B, next to each "last contact date", enter the following formula: =TODAY()- and then click on the "last contact date", just to the left, and press Enter.

Next, copy and paste this cell to each row of your customer list and Tada! you have a useful tool that displays when each customer was last contacted and the number of days since that date.

What's more, every time you update these dates, the number is automatically recalculated.

IF(): The IF function is very useful when you want to do different things based on the value in a cell. In our example, we want Column D to display "OK" if we have contacted the customer within the last 90 days, and "MUST CON-TACT" if it has been more than 90 days.

In Column D, next to each of the above formula, enter the following:

=IF (click on the TODAY column just to the left and then type <=90, "OK", "MUST CON-TACT") and press Enter.

To finish off, copy and paste this cell to each row of your customer list and you'll have a clear indicator of which customers you should contact.

It all may sound a bit complicated, so click on Help in Microsoft Excel and search for the topics you need assistance

Excel Help is very powerful, and you'll be impressed with the level of detail on each topic.

Phuket airline services picking up

PHUKET: In moves that appear to signal a revival of tourist confidence in Phuket, several airlines have begun boosting their regional services to Phuket or have announced plans to do so soon.

Orient Thai resumed its daily Phuket-Hong Kong-Phuket service on July 15, and has announced that it will operate chartered flights between Phuket and the South Korean cities of Inchon and Busan every Thursday and Sunday, from October 2 to December 5.

Dragonair, which only recently canceled its once-popular direct Phuket-Hong Kong service and closed its office in Phuket, has inked a deal with six Hong Kong travel agencies to fly charters from

Hong Kong. The first is due tomorrow (July 23), with the others being on July 26 and 30, and on August 2, 6 and 9.

Thai Airways International has announced that it will operate an extra two flights a week between Phuket and Inchon from August 10, while China's Xiamen Airlines will launch a charter service to Phuket from August 18.

Suwalai Pinpradab, Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) office in Phuket, said, "It is a good sign for Phuket's tourism. Dragonair will launch its chartered service first. If that is successful, it will probably resume regular flights in the near future."

She described occupancy rates in

Phuket hotels for the remainder of July and for August as "satisfactory". (See also 'Vital Statistics' at foot of this page.)

However, she added that the TAT needed to push for more Thai tourists to come to Phuket in September and Octo-

K. Suwalai also noted that bookings from Europe for November and December are currently down by 40%-50% compared with the same period last year.

However, she added, "We are nearly 100% booked for December 26 to 30 by people who will take part in events commemorating the tsunami in Phuket."

he Japanese economy has been sending out mixed economic data for the past two years. Spurts of economic growth, as measured by gross domestic product (GDP) figures, have been followed a quarter later by weak figures. The tepid economic recovery has been due solely to exports.

However, a trend toward domestic economic expansion appears to be gathering momentum. Unemployment has fallen to 4.4%, and some employers are, for the first time in more than a decade, reporting labor shortages in various skills.

Any improvement in the Japanese economy, one that has domestic demand as such an important part, is very welcome

Japan is the world's secondlargest economy and is also home to the world's second-largest stock market. A resurgent Japan will increase imports and will assist global economic growth.

For investors interested in this market, there is only one realistic route: the use of a mutual fund/offshore fund as the investment vehicle.

There are many to choose from, but I would avoid using one that has as its benchmark the Nikkei Dow 225.

There are 3,700 stocks quoted in Japan, and it is far better to use a fund benchmarked against the TOPIX index which covers 1,500 companies instead of the Nikkei's 225.

In addition, the Nikkei 225 contains only large "cap" stocks many of which are export related. A broader investment theme will

have a domestic bias.

Alternatively, one could invest in a portfolio of individual shares. However, there are two distinct problems with this route.

The first is where to source high quality research on the stocks and second, many good Japanese companies trade at astronomical prices. In most stock markets companies split their shares when prices go too high by offering, for example, a two-for-one, or even a 10-forone deal.

In Japan, companies frequently ignore this route and prices of US\$10,000 (around 410,000 baht) are not uncommon. The reason some companies have large share prices is that they are targeted at the institutional investor rather than the private inves-

For an investor to buy a single share or a small number of shares in such a company would be to buy an "odd lot", which would trade at a discount to the normal price based on a minimum amount of 100 shares.

To accumulate a balanced Japanese portfolio would require a very substantial amount of money.

When recommending investments in Asia, I often suggest the "cocktail" approach, which incorporates a number of coun-

With Japan, this approach falls flat because of the size of the Japanese equity market in relation to those of its neighbors. Fund managers will tend to place about 70% of any Asian fund in Japan just to mirror major global indices.

Do not be discouraged by any worsening Japanese trade data. The Japanese economy will have increased imports due to oil price increases and growing domestic demand. Japan also holds the largest foreign exchange reserves in the world.

In addition, when companies such as Toyota sell cars in the US, they make them in that country. Toyota will open its sixth

lent Japanese companies that factory in the US in 2006 and has announced plans to build a factory in Canada at a cost of C\$ 1.5 billion (about 50 billion baht).

THE NOT-SO-ROUGH GUIDE TO GOLF

With Andy Combe and Bruce Whitehead

Tip 2: The Posture.

It is often said that you can spot a really good golfer simply by watching how they stand to the ball. Understanding how the spine works, or works most effectively, is key to understanding how to play well.

Begin by practicing this posture drill before a mirror: it will help you find the better player within you.

First, stand in an upright position with shoulders back and chest out. Now simply hinge forwards from the hips keeping the back in a straight line. The correct result will reveal the arms hanging down taking away any tension from the hands. Now take your feet to shoulders' width apart and flex your knees slightly, planting your weight on the balls of your feet.

Once in the correct posture, you are enabling your body to rotate by keeping the spine angle constant and your head still. This will produce a good coil of energy, resulting in greater power and a consistent strike.

A bad posture, which is slouched, reveals a curve in the spine and tension in the hands. From this posi-

tion, the rotation of the spine is restricted and a lifting "chopping" action is displayed. This action can also lead to back injuries and increased stress levels.



Is demise of cork screwing up wine?

What is the downside of screwtop wine closures?

From the standpoint of quality, none, although time is needed to see if wines aged in screw-top bottles evolve differently. The big downside is for workers in the cork industry. Forests are now more valuable as potential real estate.

I saw a bottle of Australian wine at a supermarket labeled "vintage 2005". How is this possible if the grapes in France have not even been picked yet? Is it some kind of fraud?

Not at all. In the southern hemisphere grapes ripen in April or May because the seasons are the reverse of those in the northern hemisphere. People tell me that water going down the plughole in a sink swirls in the opposite direction, too. When I was there, everywhre I went the sinks were clogged, so I cannot verify this.

Why are there many brown-col-Why are there so ored wine bottles from Germany? Most other wine bottles I have seen are green, not brown.

German winemakers are nothing if not meticulous in their approach to wine. The color brown gives the most protection from harmful ultraviolet light. Marketers elsewhere have adopted green or clear glass as the preferred color though it offers less protection. German producers simply care more about their wine than its marketing.

Do you know any wine-themed party tricks?

No, though I did manage to impress my college friends once by demonstrating

how to shotgun a beer.

TAT Optimistic About Arrivals

Phuket Gazette, July 1995

Following a recent promotional tour of Northern Europe, the Tourist Authority of Thailand is optimistic about continued growth in tourist arrivals at Phuket.

Ms Euamporn Jirakanwisai, Assistant Director of the TAT's Phuket Office, declared that with the European economy improving, more and more people can afford a long-haul holiday, and Phuket is high on their "wish list". Many tour companies in Europe, she said, are developing tour programs for Phuket and Krabi. Phuket's position will also be helped by problems afflicting some of its competitors. Bali has had outbreaks of dysentery and Guam experienced an earthquake, leading to many tourist cancellations.

Quite apart from Western Europe, new markets in Eastern Europe, South Africa, Russia and Asia are expanding and showing interest in Phuket. The increase in projected arrivals has also been aided by developments in communications technology and transport. Whereas previously it had been necessary to book 1-2 months in advance, it now requires only 1-2 weeks.

Khun Euamporn emphasized that problems of infrastructure had to be solved. With 5 million tourists a year expected in the not-too-distant future, roads were inadequate – and water, electricity and telephones insufficient – to satisfy the demand that will be created.

Moreover, tour companies abroad are very concerned about the rapid pace of development in Phuket, and the impact upon the environment, she said. Particular concern was expressed about the impact on the local people in terms of the ramifications for their culture.

Without proper plans to control these factors, it was envisioned that Phuket could experience an economic explosion, followed by a protracted, and possibly permanent, bust.

Foreign investment'crucial' to island's future prosperity

PHUKET: Foreign investment in Phuket is still booming, according to the latest statistics from the Provincial Commercial Registration Office, which show that 95% of the businesses registered between June 1, 1998, and May 31, registered in the December-May

2000, have foreign capital in them.

This compares with about 65% in the two years up to May 31, 1998.

"If we did not have the foreign investors, I think the economy would be terrible," Veerachai Tuntiwathanavallop, Chief of the Registration Office, told the *Gazette*.

The statistics also suggest that Phuket is rapidly becoming a "Cyber City", despite its poor communications and unreliable power supply, and even though the government's plans to create a "Cyber Port" have yet to get off the ground.

K. Veerachai said that 23 Internet and computer companies

> period, compared with 17 in the same period in 1998-9.

On the decline have been construction and interior design companies, K.

Veerachai said, with some of these businesses closing down.

However, he expects both industries to rebound, thanks to a boom in the property sector, with 42 real estate companies registering between December 1 and May 31, compared with 13 in the same period of 1998-9.

This boom, he added, was led by the continuing low value of the baht against major currencies, creating greater foreign demand for properties in Phuket.

At the end of May this year, there were 5,898 registered businesses in the province. Of these, 3,888 were limited companies, 1,996 were limited partnerships, and 14 were ordinary partner-

Registrations in the six months to May 31 totaled 359. Thirty-nine firms de-registered.

The most popular businesses in Phuket are still overwhelmingly tourism-related, with travel agencies, dive shops, tailors and restaurants leading the registrations table.

The most popular places for setting up business are, in order: Patong, Phuket Town, Kata. Karon and Kamala.

The Haven at the Yacht Haven Marina is my favorite bolthole when I want to get away from it all. Next stop is Phuket City. Here, I select three restaurants.



The atmosphere is a step back in time to – again – more elegant days. Enjoy a Pernod at your leisure before deciding what to eat. The food is exciting, the service refined and courteous. La Gaetana is ideal for a romantic dinner or some "rustic chiv-" – Mascagni's most famous opera was playing the first time I ate there. The supremely talented Gianni may, should you phone up to book, inquire as to your reason for visiting his restaurant then provide a small but sincere surprise. Tel: 076-250523. 

after a few settling vodkas. Ideal for those wishing to come in from the cold, the welcome here is as warm as a winter in Rostov-on-Don is chilly. Portions are Kremlin-sized, and all the dishes serve as perfect antidotes to a hangover. Expect to sing a verse or two of Polyushka Polye, komrad. Tel: 076-344-144.

Next up is the rather divine **Baan** Yin Dee along Muean Ngen Rd, which serves an upmarket mace-



doine of Thai and European food. The roast rabbit is magnificent, the lobster bisque almost beyond compare and the view south to north across Patong Bay is a delight. Unpretentious and oh-soclassy. Tel: 076-294104.

A blast further north to Kamala and, of course, Rockfish along the beach road. Rockfish gives the diner a sublime and memorable experience. The trek round the island continues to Surin and Oriental **Spoon** at Twin Palms Phuket. our trusty glass tumblers just will not do when serving up the nectar of the gods by the pool, and while there is no "proper" type of wine glass as such, there are certain factors to consider when shopping for wine glasses.

There are four "musts" to take into account when selecting a wine glass: price, functionality, aesthetics and durability.

The occasional drinker of ordinary table wine should choose an inexpensive stemmed glass that fits the hand. Buy mediumsized glasses with wide bowls for white wine and larger, possibly tulip-shaped, glasses for red.

The wine afficionado or restaurateur, however, must be prepared to pay for fine stemware that augments the characteristics of the wine. An unadorned glass is best for serious wine-lovers who like an unobstructed view of the wine's "legs" - the way the wine trickles down the glass.

Although most people revel in drinking from crystalware, note that some crystal glasses may release lead into liquid with which they come in contact. Ingesting concentrations above 0.2 parts per million can be a health risk, so keeping a beverage in a crystal decanter for a long time is not advisable.

In terms of functionality, ask yourself whether or not the glass fulfills its role as a well-balanced vessel allowing its contents to shine. Does it have too small a base, making it easy to tip over? Is it too heavy? Is the stem strong and long enough for you to pick up, carry and set down the glass, without touching the bowl, when you drink white wine?



A wine glass should be large enough to allow the drinker to swirl the wine and let its aroma develop, but without being too grandiose.

Durability is particularly important when buying large quantities of glasses or investing in very expensive wine glasses. If you wash your glasses in a dishwasher, durability may be a greater concern than if you wash them by hand.

When buying high-end wine glasses, try to find out if stock is guaranteed in case you have to replace broken glasses in the future.

The Ocean Glass Showroom on the bypass road features moderately-priced break-resistant wine glasses. If you are pressed for time, you can find wine and stemware both under one roof, at the Wine Connection.







STILL HANGING AROUND

am easily distracted. I never used to be, but I do not seem to be able to concentrate on a single thing nowadays. By way of example, a mate and I were driving along one day discussing football and the fact that my team was beaten by his or something similarly inane.

Admittedly, Leeds is going through a bit of a rest period at present, but with a couple of seasons out to pasture, their triumphant return is inevitable. You see, there I go again. This has nothing to do with football – it's about being distracted.

Anyway, we were driving along minding our own business, when suddenly I saw this vision of female beauty in front of us.

One particular aspect of her anatomy was especially magnificent, and this distraction tendency must be highly infectious because the driver of the car – I was a passenger – drove into a ditch.

He blamed me.

This anecdote has absolutely no connection with gardening, unless you count the plants he flattened under his right wheel. The same thing happened last week – I started typing and was led astray by unconnected inanities

Regular readers will perhaps remember my prattlings from a week ago. I rambled on about hanging baskets and the like, but in my very own distrait fashion I failed to mention much about what to actually put in the things.

This week I will put that right, and mention at least a plant or two.

One of my favorite hangingbasket dwellers is a succulent, the portulaca from South America. The thickish sprawling stems grow up to 12.5 centimeters in length and are bedecked with small, fleshy, cylindrical leaves. Several large flowers, up to 2.5cm in diameter, grow at the ends of the stems.


I will get my teeth into portulaca and other succulents in a few weeks, but for now, rest assured that they come in an array of bright colors, and do exactly what anything suspended in mid-air does: dangle, and they do it magnificently.

Anyway, that is probably the whole point of hanging baskets; it does not matter if it is a Gucci pot suspended on a gold chain, half a coconut on plastic string, a purpose-made terracotta pot with holes for the wires, or a plastic drinks bottle with cigarette-burn holes for drainage – whatever it is, it should ideally contain a plant that will grow down rather than skyward.

Well, not always. Mandevilla, a relative of the allamanda (in Thai – *jan ka-jahn fah*), is one of the most voracious climbers around, and requires very little in the way of root sys-

tems. It is also perfect in a hanging basket.

Suspend one of these under a sunny corner, and you can sit

back and watch it grow. No, really, you can. Mandevilla can grow by as much as 5cm a day, and reaches for the sky in the most amazing way.

The tendrils behave a little like a husband after a messy divorce – they seem to want to put as much distance as they can between themselves and their original home in as short a time as possible.

Do not put these where you admire the architecture, as they will take over in no time and engulf what is already there.

As well as being fast growers, they are good-looking plants. At this time of year, they are a sea of green, but in the drier months, yellow, bell-shaped flowers appear daily and gaily all over them.

Again, more on the Mandevilla in the coming weeks.

Back to the danglers. There is another plant that should probably be included in this category, although describing it as a resident of a hanging basket would be pushing it a bit.

Spanish Moss, or Old Man's

Beard, does not live in soil as such – it kind of wraps itself around whatever it can find – usually in an elevated position – and dangles from it.

Spanish Moss is not Spanish, or even a moss. Technically it is a flowering plant that blooms only rarely away from the wild.

The slender, wiry, long, branching stems grow as suspended, bluish-gray streamers and garlands draped from tree branches in the wild. The plant is not parasitic, as is often thought, but attaches itself to trees for support. It's a bromeliad.

It has no roots, but gets what it needs to sustain itself mainly from rainfall and airborne dust.

The stems and leaves are covered with overlapping silver-gray scales, which are important for absorbing water and trapping dust and nutrient particles.

The easiest way to encourage its growth is to create a circular, zig-zag wire frame, and wrap the "moss" around it, allowing the trailing ends to hang in mid-air.

From a distance you would never know that it is not growing out of a pot, but just sitting there quietly getting on with things.

Spray a little water in its direction (preferably in fine-mist form, from an old Windex bottle or something simi-


lar) and it will be fine.


Well, I think I have done rather well this week. After a

Less is more, say Atika developers

aan Yin Dee Boutique Resort has invested approximately 505 million baht in a condominium development that will overlook Patong Bay.

Kieren Madden, Alex Bressers and Hans De Beer, Managing Directors of Atika Villa Phuket, told the Gazette what makes Atika's 51 units on 3.5 rai unique.

"It's modern minimalist. The construction incorporates a lot of glass and bright colors to keep it open and simple," Mr Madden said.

No wires will be visible – electricity and water supplies will be underground. Each unit will have its own water tank with an extra supply of 24 gallons. "We have our own well providing the villa with fresh spring water. We have had it tested and it's 100% pure to drink," Mr Madden

Atika's lean and clean lines offer residents a sense of freedom. "They can relax on the sun deck with a view of the sea, swim in the infinity pool, or enjoy a rooftop barbecue," Mr De Beer said.

Mr Madden explained that the project will be built in three phases. 100 million baht has been invested in Phase I, while Phases II and III will cost 220 million and 180 million baht, respectively.

Phase I will have nine twobedroom units, of two different types. The five Type-A units have living areas on the ground to third floors and bedrooms on the fourth floor. The Type-B units, which are set behind and above Type-A, have bedrooms on the third

The properties will have living space of between 325 and 365 square meters apiece.

"Seven are already sold," Mr Bressers said, "leaving just one unit of each type still available in Phase I." The units remaining are on the market for

between 14.6 million to 18 million baht. Construction starts in August and is expected to be completed in May next year.

Costing 9.5 million to 11 million baht each, the 30 one- and two-bedroom units of Phase II offer living space of between 150 and 180sqm. Construction on this phase is to start in October this year and should be finished in September 2006.

Construction of Phase III will start in September next year and is expected to reach completion in May 2007. At 14.5 million to 18 million baht each, the 12 oneand two-bedroom units will have living space of between 230 and 260sqm.

All of Atika Villa Phuket's units include standard furnishings for the bedrooms, dining room, living room, and kitchen; they also have laundry and storage areas and a parking space. An optional furniture package is offered for an additional 750,000 to 900,000






