# Karon nixes gay festival

PHUKET CITY: Despite Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura having already given his blessing for Asia's largest gay and lesbian festival, the Nation Party, to be held in Phuket, the event may be staged elsewhere because Karon Municipality is worried about the possible consequences of hosting the party.

The news broke on August 11, following a closed-door meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall the day before, between the Governor, the party organizers, Kata-Karon Municipal officers and Tourism Authority of Thailand Phuket Office Director Suwalai Pinpradab.

The Nation Party, organized by the Fridae.com website, is already being promoted as starting on November 4, with nine parties being held over three days and nights.

The event, traditionally held in Singapore, was moved to Phuket after the Singaporean Police denied a license to stage the party on the basis that it was "contrary to the public interest".

The organizers then requested permission to hold events at Karon Stadium from November 4 to 6. Permission was denied, but that decision is now being reconsidered at Gov Udomsak's request.

Thawee Thongcham, Mayor of Kata-Karon, said, "Some [local residents] are worried

about noise, and some say that drunk revelers might have sex on the beach. It could destroy the image of Karon.

"We are worried that we might not be able to control the situation. Karon is a place families visit. We don't have problems involving sex. We don't want teenagers seeing and copying bad behavior."

K. Suwalai told the *Gazette* that Gov Udomsak was firm in his support for the event. However, she said, "The organizers and Karon Municipality need to look at what rules both sides can accept. If both parties fail to agree, the organizers can still arrange to stage this event in another country.

# Tailor touts facing crackdown

KARON (*Kom Chad Luek*): Community leaders in Kata-Karon have issued a warning to the 144 tailor shops in the area that they will crack down on any that continue to use aggressive touting techniques or take advantage of tourists.

Tambon Karon Chairman Winai Chidchiaw said that, at a meeting among village headmen and other community leaders, it was unanimously agreed to monitor the behavior of the shops' staff, who have been warned to end practices that pose a threat to the area's reputation among tourists.

Many of the shops hire foreign nationals, mostly from India and Nepal, he said.

Shops which continue to be sources of complaint will be penalized to the full extent of the law and subject to police investigations that would see any illegal aliens deported immediately, he warned.

K. Winai called for cooperation from the Immigration Police in this regard, as deportation procedures fall under their area of responsibility.

"We're still looking for a solution to the labor problems in the tailor shops, especially as many of them serve merely as fronts which take customer orders, with the actual tailoring done by a third party," he said.

"We have set up neighborhood committees to investigate and find out which shops fall into this category. Once we have an idea of the scale of the problem, we will meet again to decide what should be done," he said.

In addition to the problem of illegal aliens working in the industry, complaints have also been received from Thai workers in the shops that they were being paid less than the minimum wage, he said.

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# Call for entries in animation contest by UN

"We need to discuss details. For example, they would party all day and night. This conflicts with Thai law, so we need to look at whether they will accept closing the event each day at 1 am."



But, she added, "This is a good opportunity for Phuket."

She said that if it does go ahead she expects at least 2,000 people to attend the festival, each spending at least 4,000 baht a day, generating revenue of 24 million baht over three days.

"Most people who attend events like this are not like those who go to full moon parties most of them are upper-class people. But we need to see whether they will accept our rules," she said.

K. Suwalai added that the organizers will come to Phuket at the end of this month to decide finally whether the party will be held in Phuket or not.



# Indonesian haze European travel giants blankets Phuket

PHUKET CITY: As the haze from Sumatra spread across Phuket this week the Provincial Public Health Office (PPHO) announced that those with allergies or respiratory ailments could collect free facemasks from Wachira Phuket Hospital as a minimal form of protection from the smoke particles.

Dr Wanchai Sattayawutthipong, Chief of the PPHO, told the Gazette on August 16 that the average particulate matter reading (PM-10 reading, for particles less than 10 microns in size) in air samples taken over the previous 24 hours was 82.5 micrograms per cubic meters, still well below the  $120\mu g/m^3$ threshold deemed to pose a risk to healthy people.

However, he said the smoke – from out-of-control forest fires on the Indonesian island – could pose a threat to people with allergies and respiratory illnesses.

His office would continue to monitor the situation closely and issue warnings as needed should the situation worsen. He advised people who experience difficulty breathing to:

- Cover their noses and mouths with a damp cloth when going outside;
- Stay away from areas with high smoke concentrations, especially by staying indoors.
- Keep doors and windows shut to keep smoke-laden air out;
- Consult a doctor immediately if experiencing breathing difficulty;
- Avoid smoking cigarettes and drink plenty of water;
  - Avoid strenuous exercise;



The air over Phuket began to darken noticeably on August 15 as smoke drifted north. It had already blanketed Malaysia, bringing smog to cities in that country and protests to Indonesia from the Malaysian govern-

On that day Chumnong Chitpukdee, chief of the Meteorological Department's Southern Meteorological Center (West Coast), confirmed that Sumatra is the source of the haze, which is being carried here across the Strait of Malacca by prevailing southwest monsoon winds.

"The haze made it as far north as Trang yesterday [August 14] and today it reached Phuket,"

PHUKET: Two of the biggest names in European tourism are joining forces with a German airline to launch a new Phuket charter service at the start of the high

Scent to jail

UDON THANI: Busting drug mules can be a dirty business, as police in Udon Thani found out on the afternoon of August 15.

After receiving a tip-off that a drug deal was about to go down at the Jaroernsri Complex shopping center, police led by Provincial Police Deputy Chief Inspector Yanyong Wechsot set up a surveillance unit. It was not long before two men matching the description of the suspects appeared, loitering near the entrance to the MK Suki Restaurant on the first floor. When police moved in to search them, they found 107 purple ya bah (methamphetamine) pills stashed away in the underwear of one of the men, who smelled terribly.

Police identified the hygiene-impaired suspect as Lao national Thawkaew-udon, 27, a resident of Vientiane. He confessed to having smuggled drugs into Thailand from the Lao capital for more than a year, each time disguising the characteristic chemical scent of the contraband with his own body odor, which was formidable given that he had not bathed for more than a month.

He added that he wore the same unlaundered underwear for the entire month, in the hope that the stench would create a force field powerful enough to ward off police who might otherwise search him – and perhaps keep sniffer dogs at bay.

There are no laws against body odor in Thailand – though perhaps there should be - and the Lao was arrested on charges of trafficking a Class 1 narcotic into the country with intent to sell.

It was not reported if he will be forced to take a bath as part of his punishment.

# The waiting

Eight months after the tsunami, residents of Kamala and Patong are still waiting for funds to redevelop the areas damaged landscape and infrastructure.

In January, the government decreed that the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) and the Office of Tourism Development (OTD) take over responsibility for reparations, awarding budgets of 750 million for Patong and 600 million baht for Kamala.

Little by little, however, these budgets have been reduced, to 197.4 million and 96.7 million respectively, and still the project has not started. The Gazette's Anongnat Sartpisut and Ananya Hongsa-ngiam ask why this should be and just when the recovery work will begin in earnest.

n January, Suwat Liptapanlop, at that time a Deputy Prime Minister, was ordered to look into what the tsunami-stricken municipalities of Kamala and Patong needed for recovery.

K. Suwat's brief was to concentrate first on safety measures, including the laying of underground power cables, water supplies and warning systems, then on landscape development along with new walkways, tourist information centers and evacuation signs.

He ordered the TAT and the OTD to find conceptual design companies that could do the job. The sense of urgency was palpable. However, national elections on February 6 created an air of uncertainty that caused the project to stall and budgets to be frozen, then eventually slashed. Nowadays people are asking just where the project has disappeared to.

A TAT officer, who sope with the Gazette on condition of anonymity, explained, "At that time it was not the TAT's job to rebuild Patong and Kamala. Our purpose is to promote, not to construct. But we had orders from the government and we tried to obey them as well as we could."

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He continued, "To understand this affair you must understand the official process. We sent our provisional plan to Plodprasop Suraswadi, coordinator of the six-province recovery project, and at the beginning of March the plan was submitted to the cabinet, which, in turn, approved it.

"While the cabinet considered our proposals, the TAT hatched a 'Terms of Reference' plan and had committees look into improvements [for Patong and

Kamala]. This was all approved by the TAT Governor, Juthamas Siriwan, on March 25.

"Our plan was to set everything up for when the government approved the conception and design budget. We know it is urgent to help people in both areas but is it really *our* fault

that it has taken such a long time to obtain government approval?

"People don't realize just how much effort we put into promoting Phuket, especially Patong. Even if we put a billion baht into attracting people here, do you really think that tourists would return immediately? Frankly, we


don't know if they will come back or not," he said.

He explained that foreigners come to Phuket for the sun, sand and sea. "They come here

for the nature and the beauty of the area, not to see big buildings or for modern technology such as already exists in their country. Look at Patong 30 years ago, it was nice and clean. Right now, however, Patong is no different from Pattaya."

The TAT source explained that since the

budget was cut in May, the TAT has had to revise the plan several times.

cal people and local organizations. They need to give relevant information to the architects and contractors.

"The TAT is only a small organization that supports tourism in Phuket the way it should be. We play a supporting role as promoters. This is how we can best be of help."

Karoon Sreeden, Deputy Mayor of Kamala, told the *Gazette*, "I know about the projects and that the TAT wants to develop Kamala, but some projects have already been covered by the Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) and the Phuket Provincial Highways Office.

"The TAT has a budget of 65 million baht for the *OrBorTor*. This money is to improve the road in front of Kamala Beach as well as for the landscaping of the Chalerm Prakiet 100 Pi Park, which is opposite the Kamala Public

Health Center. It is also to cover the cost of the proposed Tsunami Monument where the relatives of the dead can pay their respects."

Surin Isalam, Village Chief of Moo 5, Kamala, the area around Phuket FantaSea, said, "Nothing much has happened in this area since December 26, especially to the land next to the beach. In fact, Kamala needs a fast recovery, but everyone concentrated on [rebuilding] Patong, while Kamala was forgotten."

He said that he had attended a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall in April between the TAT, the Governor, community leaders and the two municipalities. "That was the only time we met to discuss the TAT's plan and it seemed good. But at the moment, everything is completely silent and we simply don't know what's going on."

As for the upcoming high season, K. Surin put it lightly when he said that tourism in the area would be affected "a little bit". He added, "Kamala needs urgent recovery, it doesn't matter if construction continues into the high season as long as we recover. But it is our right to know what the plans are."

Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukbal agreed that things need to be speeded up. He said, "The TAT budget, even though reduced, will improve Patong. We have to hurry to get these improvements done. If we don't start today it won't get done by the high season. I will be meeting the Governor soon about this."

Sompong Jiamtua, Patong's Sai Yuan Village Chief, agrees, "I would like [the TAT] to show their plans to local people. We need to know what they're doing. I protested against the last one, as they proposed a dam on the beach. And the architects outlined their plans in an air-conditioned room – they should go and see the real thing, on site, on the beach.

"I agree with the TAT about the development of the landscape. After the tsunami, some areas of Patong have already been rebuilt. But I strongly recommend that we keep things as natural as possible; tourists prefer natural to man-made scenery.

"If at all possible, I would prefer the redevelopment to be done during the low season but this is urgent, so I think the TAT should go ahead whether it's high or low season."



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# Celebrating Phuket in song

huket native Chaisit Khorsantiwichai is the son of a roadside coffee vendor. Learning to play music at an early age, he quickly developed a passion for it.

After working his way through university as a musician,

he returned to Phuket and amassed a fortune in the island's property market, and developed a successful commodities brokerage.

Financially secure, K. Chaisit decided to kick back and enjoy life by indulging in his passion for music once again.

The result, some six years in the making, is a 15-track charity CD entitled *Phuket Memory Songs*, which features the

vocal talents of some of the island's top politicians and opinion leaders: Phuket Senator Paiboon Upatising, Phuket Tourist Association Pattanapong Aikwanich and former Phuket Chamber of Commerce Chairman Pamuke Archariyachai, to name just a few.

Adding some governmentcertified heavyweight talent to the list of singers are three Thai National Artists: Suthep Wongkamheang, Saowalee Pakapan and Daojai Paijit. The singers are backed up by a team of eight traditional Thai musicians, most of whom are local businessmen who share K. Chaisit's passion for Thai marches and ballads.

K. Chaisit told the *Gazette* that most of the musicians and singers on the album came together to play at the 1999 Walk-

ing Street Fair on Thalang Rd.

"We got real good feedback from the crowd then, and that's when the idea for *Phuket Memory Songs* was born," he said.

"I began to choose the songs after that, and then spent two years recording them in the studio. I tried to use all the best Phuket oldies, that's why they are called 'memory songs'."

K. Chaisit, who spent almost

500,000 baht producing the album, told the *Gazette* that all proceeds will go to charity.

The primary recipient, getting 80%, will be the Mingmong-kol 48 Foundation, which is building a huge Buddha image atop Nakkerd Hill in Karon.

The remaining 20% of proceeds will be donated to the Thep-kasattri-Srisoonthorn Foundation to help its work with tsunami victims, he said. He expects the first batch of 10,000 CDs, released last

month, to sell out in about five months' time.

K. Chaisit said he has known all of the singers on the album for a long time.

"Each was carefully chosen because his or her vocal style matched what we needed for the song, not because he or she might happen to have high social standing. You can listen to their voices and hear for yourself just how talented they are," he said. One of his favorite tracks, simply named *Phuket*, is one of two English-language tracks on the album. Sung by his daughter Janjira, it is described by the artist as being a "pure" but funky blend of Latin and soul styles – with a Thai twist, of course.

The lyrics are simple: "Phuket is my hometown, my love, my life I'm proud ...Just come and see how beautiful Phuket can be ... beaches and sand, a won-

derful land ... it's like a dream, a beautiful dream."

Do we have the next Tourism Authority of Thailand jingle here, perhaps?

On the song *Haad Rawai* (Rawai Beach), sung by National Artist Saowalee Pakapan, the producer explained how he used a tenor sax with a back-up orchestra to try to recreate the feel of refreshing breezes and gentle rhythms of the sea.

Another personal favorite of the producer/arranger is the album's first track, *Yod Naree Sri Thalang*, a musical tribute to Phuket's legendary heroines, Thao Thepkasattri and Thao Srisoonthorn.

With its flute and horn flourishes, the song is a classic Thaistyle military march sung by a chorus – think of a Mao-era Chinese propaganda song with a bit of *Yankee Doodle Dandy* thrown in and you start to get the picture.

K. Chaisit is pleased with the end product and thinks the CD will help introduce the classic songs to a new generation of listeners.

"When you listen to new albums these days, you get bored with them in a few months' time, but these songs are classics that have already shown they can stand the test of time.

"I hope all Phuket people will listen to them," he said.

# Revamp of English curriculum ordered

ew Education Minister Chaturon Chaisang ordered a revamp of the country's Englishteaching practices, after average scores on standard tests suggested Thai students' English is among the poorest in Southeast Asia.

"When we teach English, our children should be able to communicate in English. What we teach should also be in line with the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)," K. Chaturon said.

On August 8, the English Language Development Center disclosed how local students fared in the TOEFL between July last year and June this year, compared with their peers in Southeast Asia.

Thais lagged behind seven Southeast Asian nations, including Burma, Vietnam and Laos.

In the wake of the findings, K. Chaturon said the country needed to place more emphasis on real communication and that the current curriculum still focuses too heavily on grammar and rote learning.

Aside from English, K. Chaturon said schools must also prioritize the teaching of Mandarin – another increasingly important international language.

**Tactical retreat:** After weeks of uproar over the emergency decree imposed on the restive South, Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra made a tactical retreat, saying that Parliament could tone down measures it deemed too heavy-handed.

"We will submit the decree to Parliament. If they are still concerned ... then we will take steps to make adjustments," said the PM.

The decree, aimed at restoring law and order in the three southernmost provinces, permits authorities to detain suspects for up to 30 days without charge, conduct searches and make arrests without warrants, and tap phone lines. It also provides impunity for officials in the line of duty.

**University affairs:** A drug-trafficking gang in the North has been using dozens of university

students as couriers, police said following the arrest in Lampang of four students with 48 kilograms of heroin.

Police said the arrests cracked a drug-trafficking gang that had more than 100 members, mostly students, whose movements had been monitored over six months. The students said they were offered 1 million baht for each delivery.

Hilltribe people were hired to smuggle drugs from Burma into Thailand via Mae Hong Son. From there, university students were used to transport the drugs to Bangkok, where they were shipped abroad, police said.

**Tsunami museum:** The Culture Ministry will soon announce an international competition to design a tsunami memorial museum to be located in the Khao Lak-Lamru National Park in Phang Nga's Takuapa district.

Apinan Poshyananda, Director of the Office of Contemporary Art and Culture, said architects from more than 30 countries would be invited next month to bid for the project. The competition budget alone will be around 50 million baht; the construction budget has yet to be confirmed.

Authorities plan to lay a foundation stone for the museum

on December 26, the first anniversary of the disaster. Construction will take another year, K. Apinan said.

Critics have slammed the project as insensitive and wasteful, pointing out that many tsunami victims have yet to receive

any government compensation following the disaster.

**E-driving test:** The Land Transport Department launched a 32-million-baht computerized test for people seeking driver's licenses in Bangkok.

Deputy Transport Minister Chaiyanan Charoensiri said the computerized theory test would ensure that a credible marking system was in place and would pave the way for an efficient database system.

The test is available at five Land Transport offices in Bangkok. Applicants must score at least 23 out of 30 points to qualify for the practical driving test.

"If it works well, we will request a further budget to provide computerized tests across the country," said K. Chaiyanan.

**Thai copyright:** A Cambodian tourist was arrested in Bangkok's Phya Thai District cinema for recording a two-and-a-half minute segment of the hit martial arts movie *Tom Yum Goong* with his digital camera.

Dos Sop Heak told officers that he and some friends had been visiting Thailand for six weeks and had come to see the film. He said the movie was so good that he couldn't help himself and recorded parts of it to watch again later.

He said it he did not know he had broken the law by capturing footage.





# Police probe illegal passport trade

Samui have been ordered to keep a careful eye on certain foreign-

caught at Bangkok's Don Muang Airport in possession of more than 400 foreign passports.

The passports came from Belgium, France and Portugal, and the man is believed to have bought them from suppliers on Koh Samui.

The Immigration Police have launched an investigation into gangs that run such illegal activities, which could potentially harm Thailand's reputation, espe-

cially with concern about terrorism at an all-time high.

Undercover operations will follow, and the Royal Thai Police are confident that they will swiftly apprehend those responsible.

concern to the island's dwellers since a recent spate of break-ins, which are believed to be the work of gangs of professional thieves.

The burglars targeted houses in search of expensive items that are easy to sell on the black market, such as laptop computers, MP3 players and digital cam-

The local council in Baan Bang Rak, for example, has reacted by forming secu-

rity details to patrol the streets at night. These groups will apprehend and hold criminals until the police arrive. They can also be called on their mobile phones to assist in emergencies.

Likit Ruangsi, the Bang Rak village headman, organized 14 volunteers into small teams, who drive around the area stopping

suspicious characters and jotting down number plates.

"We have no budget for this," he said. "We are supported [in our actions] by local people and as long as there are thieves in the neighborhood, we will continue to patrol every night.

"If necessary, we are even prepared to bring criminals before the village so that people can deal with them the 'local way', but up until now we have scared away the thieves before we can catch them."

Sakchai Chaithawat, the vil-

lage chief of Baan Harn near Lamai Beach has recruited 15 local men to check the identity cards of anyone who is not known in the area.

His team also reports on the activities of migrant laborers in the area, and the patrol members are keen for people to see them as a public service.

Most local people, he said, have welcomed this new community security service, which is expected to spread rapidly to almost every village on Koh Samui.

The ethics of vigilante-style

policing may appear suspect to some, but those involved claim they are simply protecting their rights as islanders.

Power to the people: The Koh Samui Electricity Office recently put in a request to the Surat Thani Provincial Electricity Authority (STPEA) for the installation of higher-voltage power cables to serve the island.

Several months ago, the head of the STPEA, Phemphol Thaweesuwan, charged his team with the task of upgrading overhead power lines in preparation for the completion of a new submarine cable from the island's closest mainland port, Kanom, situated 24.5 kilometers away.

The cable that runs to Samui carries just 33,000 volts which, following the boom in tourist arrivals that followed the tsunami, proved to be insufficient, he said. The new cable will have a capacity of 115,000 volts.

K. Phemphol also explained that improvements to overhead power lines are also being made. Previously, electricity cables criss-crossed roads, and this is considered both hazardous and inefficient.

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

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The latest occupant of the recentlyand frequently-vacated hotseat as Chief of the Phuket Office of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (ODPM) is

Boonchai Somjai, 42.

He is the fourth to hold the job, which has naturally taken on far greater significance since the tsunami

After two months in the public eye, he speaks here with the Gazette's Athiga Jundee about the challenges he faces.

ith such a high turnover among Phuket ODPM chiefs, it is not surprising that some consider the length of time Boonchai Somjai will stay in his post as more interesting than the man or the role itself.

However, such speculation, at a time when the events of December 26, 2004, are still so fresh in many minds, detracts from the importance of the office.

"I know all too well that this position is very much in the public eye and [because of

the turnover of ODPM chiefs] is regarded quite poorly by the public," said K. Boonchai.

"Despite - or perhaps because of – this, I am proud to have been given this challenge because I want to solve problems that concern Phuket, which is where I was born."

K. Boonchai, who holds a master's degree in administration as well as a law degree, has worked in local government since 1988.

One of his earlier positions was as Chief District Officer (CDO) of Kraburi District, Ranong Province, and it was in that role that he had his first experience of working to minimize the effects of disasters.

"Back then, before the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation came into being, provincial governors, CDOs and municipal officers shared the responsibility for preventing and minimizing disasters on a more ad-hoc basis," he explained.

"In 1995, I took my experience to Krabi, where I was Assistant Head of the Krabi Provincial Disaster Prevention Office, as well as CDO. This was some seven years before the Ministry

of Interior formally developed the structure of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) in 2002.'

K. Boonchai was also a CDO in Phang Nga Province before taking up a similar position in Phuket in 2004.

"I was given my current appointment on June 16 this year, having been recommended to Suntorn Riewluang, the Director of the DDPM, by Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura and Vice-Governor Niran Kalayanamit," he said.

"I had made a presentation to Gov Udomsak stating my interest in the post and detailing why I thought I was qualified to do it," he said. "My hands-on experience of the role and my organizational skills impressed him," he added.

While K. Boonchai did not wish to dwell on the potential disasters that Phuket faces, he explained that bitter experience

has shown that natural phenomena such as earthquakes, floods, landslides and freak meteorological conditions must be prepared for.

"We must also be aware

that we could have fires, either in large buildings or in the countryside, [and we should understand that] buildings collapse, that chemicals can be spilled and that aircraft do crash.

"There is also the risk of terrorist activity, and the ODPM must plan to counter all risks to the island,

whether natural, accidental or deliberate," he said.

He added that creating and maintaining public confidence in the ODPM, its abilities and the safety of the island as a whole is one of his main priorities. Raising the profile of the ODPM and explaining to the public and other government bodies how the nine-

man ODPM team functions are therefore crucial.

He acknowledged that the public has, perhaps, lost some confidence in the ODPM because of the frequent changes at

the top.

'I'm a coordinator and organizer, and the demonstrable organizational skills I have are vital to getting the different departments such as health, police, the tambon administration organizations and the municipalities – working together," he said.

"From my experience, it is essential for the three provinces of Phuket, Krabi and Phang Nga to have more-orless the same disaster preparedness plans and to work in a triprovincial way."

He reasoned that, as the provinces share many of the same geographical features and follow a similar tourism-marketing plan, it is the only sensible course of action.

"The duties and responsibilities of ODPMs throughout the country, were set down in a 10point plan by the Ministry of Interior. From these all local prevention and mitigation plans are formulated.

"The 10 points range from the practical – such as arranging training exercises and dry-runs for disaster preparedness – to the more academic pursuits of research and analysis into warning and mitigation systems.

"I also have my '5M system' that I apply to my work: Materials, Management, Manpower, Money and Marketing.

"At this time, so soon after the tsunami and at the beginning of my tenure as ODPM chief, my first concerns are marketing, that is, public relations, and management," said K. Boonchai.

"I have eight staff under my control, and our team of nine seems quite small when compared with the wide remit of our work and responsibilities, but I'm not complaining.

"I have been given the task of making sure that Phuket remains safe, and I shall do that, although I admit that sometimes I become very weary and do have to face problems at work," he said.

But, he notes philosophically, "People face challenges and problems in every job.

"By facing and solving these problems - and even facing disasters - we garner more experience which in turn prepares us better for future challenges."

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# Wearing the Penang connection

he parallels between Phuket and Penang run surprisingly deep. Captain Sir Francis Light of the British East India Company founded one – Penang – in 1786 and in the other he set up home with his Thai-Portuguese wife.

Penang is often referred to as "The Pearl of the Orient" while Phuket has the equally charming sobriquet of "The Pearl of the Andaman".

There is also a sartorial connection between the two islands in the traditional dress worn by refined ladies of – generally – Chinese ancestry.

Called the *nya yah* in Thai and the *nyonya kebaya* in Baba Malay, the Straits Settlements costume is at once simple but elegant

Nya yah, incidentally, is the term used for the daughter of ethnically Chinese Thais, while nyonya is used in Penang and other Straits Settlements.

The *nya yah* costume comprises a brightly-patterned cotton sarong, traditionally called a *pa tae* when worn as part of the



Phuketian dress with a blouse, the *seua look mai*, made from an intricately-embroidered fabric.

Essential for the costume – and to preserve the modesty of the wearer – is a bandeau made usually from a fabric that either mirrors or complements the *seua look mai*. Even the buttons of the blouse, called *kosang*, are unique to this costume.


Slippers decorated with sequins are the required footwear, while diamonds or gold jewelry – an anklet is essential – almost complete the ensemble.

The crowning glory to this understated and still-popular outfit is the lady's hair, traditionally worn in a classic bun secured with a hairpin.

# Poo's peace of paradise



f you were around Chalong way seven years ago you'd no doubt have frequented or at the very least noticed a shophouse bar called "Poo's Beach".

The unique selling point of this popular watering hole was that the floor was under several inches of sand, giving customers the authentic feel of drinking a seaside brew but without the sand flies, sunburn, temporary tattoo hawkers and bright red men in tight Speedos calling their dogs in Tirol Deutsch.

Poo has since moved a kilometer further south to Soi Suksan (also known as the Chalong bypass) off Vichit Road and opened a sauna and massage called – you've guessed it – Poo's Palm Sauna and Massage.

As in Poo's Beach, the triumverate of Poo, Kik and Lee, sisters all, still run the show. Cousins and children abound, giving the place a comfortable family feel.

More than a sauna, more than a massage parlor, Poo's is a gathering place for those seeking a bit of peace and quiet on their own terms.

Some people arrive at 10 in the morning and leave at 6 in the evening and on weekends families come to hang out, occasionally nipping in for a quick herbal

facial scrub (100 baht). The relaxed atmosphere is evident once you stroll past the communal massage beds into the wide open spaces of the back garden.

sauna (50 baht) or a 20-minute

There, you'll find changing rooms, a sauna, individual massage "bungalows", a bar and a very friendly dog called Bongo.

After the sometimes clunky corporate angle of hotel spas, this is sheer heaven.

I mean, can you imagine ordering an ice cold beer or a plate of curry in a top-notch hotel health establishment?

The therapists would go into shock, the poor darlings.

> Poo's is probably the only sauna and massage location on the island that features parties. There was even a wedding celebrated there – it must have been a hot and slippy one, with essential oils and a lot of wet sarongs – and it is the preferred hangout for many a Kata professional eager to get away from the pressures of wheeling and dealing in the tourism industry.

With that much going for it, you'd think that the place would cost a whole lot more than average, but no - prices are incredibly reasonable with a one-hour Thai massage for 250 baht, a body scrub for 380 baht and an oil massage for only 300 baht.

Poo herself points out that she purposely keeps her prices low to keep her regulars, a mutually beneficial strategy that works


And it gets better. There are absolutely no tour buses allowed; an arrangement that attracts and adheres regular customers like ants to honey.

If you want to have your hair braided (not much of an option for guys over 40, admittedly) Lee will handle that, and if you're not a long-distance sauna freak you can nip in and out of the herbal steam – as we did – while all the time maintaining a conversation with your friends or, if you don't have any, with Bongo the

If you want isolation, choose one of the bungalows for your massage or scrub. Or simply have a beer, a fruit shake and a chat.






Also still there are gentlemen of dubious character inviting perplexed punters to womenonly table tennis tournaments, or something or other to do with girls and ping pong balls. Now that the street is traffic-free at night, it's marginally quieter, too.

People say it's a zoo on Bangla, so it's fitting that in the many bars along the strip tourists slurp Tiger, Chang and Singha beers and that the three biggest crowd pleasers in the neighborhood are the Tiger, Tai Pan and Crocodile discos.

We wander into Crocodile to chat with the manager, Robin Lee. Robin's Singaporean and an ex-military man; an unlikely combination in this libertine neck of the woods, but it's obvious that he loves his work and that he's a bit of a liberal himself.

Crocodile is at the end of a beer bar stretch that leaves one

congratulating oneself on actually making it, there are that many sultry temptresses on the way in.

"No firearms allowed" seems to be the most stringent rule at the door where security is friendly, but firm. In fact they

were all smiles as we emptied our bags and pockets of a variety of semi-automatics, a Winchester rifle and a couple of AK-47s (I left the RPG at home) so that we

The first thing to say about Crocodile is that its cavernous size works for it. There are stalactites hanging from the ceiling

> and croc motifs abound. Upstairs is a good vantage point to catch the twice-monthly live music and there is plenty of room to duck and dive on the sidelines if you don't want in-yourface action on the dance floor.

The next thing to say is that it's cheap. At the moment there's a three-beers-for-100-baht promotion if you bring a printout of the offer found on the Crocodile

website. There's not a nightspot within miles that can come near that deal, so the place is pumping while others languish in the early evening.

Local deejays Lek and Wing keep the party moving along with a happy blend of hip-hop, Thai pop and remixed oldies. At one point we were shuffling along to Vanilla Ice's *Ice Ice Baby* (surely you remember...). I wonder how Queen and Bowie felt about that obvious – what they call nowadays - "sample"? At the very least, it must have put them under pressure.

Apparently, the boys play the type of music that floats the girls' boats and yes, there were lots of lovelies on the dance floor, all shaking their thang.

Crocodile doesn't have an anti-katoey policy so among all

those pretty faces there are a few late-night surprises and, guess what? It's up to you to tell the difference, but be warned, in the semi-darkness things can get risky for those who like to party with their beer goggles firmly on.

It has to be said though, that the volume is cardiac-adjusting so breaking any conversational ground other than "Wannanuther beer?" or maybe "Excuse me but did you know that your hair is on fire?" can be a little difficult. Still, if you fancy a "quiet" game of pool you can always head up-

Things begin to get going between 10 pm and 11 pm and are roaring by one o'clock. Mostly, Crocodile is frequented by the 20-30 age group but in Patong, as everyone knows, there are no hard and fast rules and the Peter Pan syndrome is alive and well.

Basing his strategy on the "people don't want to go into an empty place so let's drop the prices and pack 'em in' school, Robin is succeeding in his quest for dominance over his feline and reptilian Patong rivals.

# Mapmaker's wife gets lost in book

fter reading The Mapmaker's Wife (Basic Books, New York, 2004, 352pp), I felt like the victim of a literary bait-and-switch scam. I thought I would be reading an account of an 18th century Peruvian woman's epic 3,000-mile trek

through the Amazon to be reunited with her French husband in French Guiana whom she hadn't seen in 20 years. The portrait of Isabel Godin adorns the front cover and the subtitle reads: "A True Tale of Love, Murder, and Survival in the Amazon".

called "A Sunday in

1769" and describes Isabel's departure from her hometown of Riobamba along with a party of 42: two brothers and a nephew, various family retainers, and 21 Indian porters.

"She had stepped from her house that morning looking as through she were planning an evening at a lively dance," writes author Robert Whitaker. "She wore a light-colored dress that billowed out from her waist, dainty cotton shoes, several silver bracelets, and two gold necklaces. Her appearance reflected who she was: a Riobamban woman who had lived all of her adult life in this village, rarely travelling far from home and enjoying the luxuries that came with being part of the élite class in colonial Peru. She was forty-two years old, a little plump, and the

first streaks of white could be seen in her coal-black hair. She, like the other women of Riobamba, had simply dressed up for the occasion.

"... She was carried aloft in a sedan chair, the Indian porters having been given orders to jostle Chapter One is By James Eckardt her as little as possible."

The next time we return to Isabel and her journey into the Amazon is 225 pages later. The tale of the trip itself takes up only the concluding 64 pages.

What's in between? Well, an awful lot of filler.

Suddenly we're back 35 years before Isabel's journey amid a raging scientific debate about the nature of gravity between followers of René Descartes and Isaac Newton. The proof would be that Newton's estimation of the earth's shape,

flattened at the poles and fattened at the equator, is correct. To find out, an expedition of

French scientists is dispatched to the Peruvian Andes in 1735 to take measurements at the equator.

Most of the book follows the journal written by one of the leaders, Charles-Marie de La Condamine. The French team suffers incredible hardships in the mountains over the

course of its arduous six-year expedition, but emerges triumphant with the right Newtonian

"La Condamine and the others may have been deeply flawed human beings - often vain, fractious, and petty - but they have proven themselves to be men of resolve and courage, Enlightenment scientists through and through," Whitaker writes.

When the eminent scientists return home to France to great acclaim, their assistants are left in Peru to fend for themselves. La Condamine's assistant, Jean Godin, married Isabel Grameson in 1741 and pursued a rather unsuccessful business career in partnership with Isabel's eminent

Following colonial custom, Isabel was cloistered in a convent school at the age of six. She

emerged at 13 to marry Jean Godin.

It wasn't the wisest of choices. Godin comes across as hopelessly feckless. When he finally decides to return to France, he picks the Amazon route followed by his master La Condamine.

But he decides to do it alone to test

the waters and then come all the way back and fetch Isabel. He winds up stranded in French Guiana for two decades, dabbling in business and imperial intrigue. He never seems to have thought of fetching his wife via the overland route through Co-

Finally we're back at the point of Isabel's departure. Deserted by its Indian guides, the party is marooned on a sandbar. A few set out for help and when they return everyone is dead. Isabel is the sole survivor.

After wandering the jungle for nearly two months, she is rescued, barely alive, by two Indian couples who happen to stop by on the riverbank.

These final 60 pages are truly a thrilling read, ending with Isabel reunited with her husband and boarding a ship for France.



wonder why the Immigration Bureau of the Royal Thai Police bears that particular name? It's a bureau to be sure, and a fine one at that – after all, it has enough forms, rubber stamps, ink blotters and the other paraphernalia of bureaucracy to make its paper-pushing peers from the Interior Ministry green with envy.

What makes me wonder is the term "Immigration", defined by my dictionary as "migration into a place, especially migration to a country of which you are not a native in order to settle there."

One would think that, with the name Immigration Bureau, the agency would be in the business of facilitating immigration, or at least dealing with it in a sensible fash-

Instead, the agency's regulations make it virtually impossible for any work-

ing-age, law-abiding foreigner (ie, one unwilling to pay bribes) to settle here and be given residency status or, God forbid, Thai nationality. This is why I think the agency would more accurately be called the "Anti-Immigration Bureau".

I was considering all the regulatory roadblocks on my last visa run, during which I was nearly decapitated when our small Suzuki jeep, traveling at high speed through the darkness, hit a tree that had fallen across the road in the middle of the night.

Why do I have to go through all this, I wondered, and just who benefits from the fact that I do?

North American and European countries have four seasons in a year, or one every three months. Isn't it strange that, thanks to Immigration, foreigners from those countries who "settle" here can just

as easily measure the passage of time in three-month increments?

Time in Thailand for a foreigner is measured not by the falling of leaves, a blanket of snow, or by the arrival of spring flowers – but rather by an endless series of expensive, dangerous and time-consum-

tated by unscrupulous officials.



# Booze rules a pretty rum do

attaya Mayor Nibblemy Watchamacallit recently issued a press release informing local media of a memo sent to his office by Interior Minister Be-bop-alula Shesmybaby.

The memo noted that the government of Fearless Leader has decided to introduce further sweeping reforms designed to curb underage drinking, drug taking and motorbike racing.

The aim is to funnel the energies of Thai youth toward more wholesome and morally uplifting activities such as macramé and animal husbandry.

Because of its reputation as a den of iniquity, and because of the desire of Fearless Leader and his cronies to annoy low-quality tourists – also known as the local expat population – Pattaya has been chosen as the first center for social engineering.

As a first step the strict regulation of the hours businesses are able to sell alcohol to the public wilol be introduced. The rules for the selling of alcoholic substances over the counter in supermarkets, corner stores, 7-Elevens and Family Marts are:

• No alcohol may be biught by anyone, other than extremely influential persons, between the hours of midday and 2 pm and from 5 pm until 7 pm.

Outside of those hours, alcohol may be bought only by persons who fit the following pro-

 Males more than 175 centimeters in height and weighing between 65 and 84 kilograms and

females less than 160cm in height and weighing from 42 to 58.5kg are permitted to buy a maximum of three bottles of beer and two bottles of whisky (but not Black Label) between 8 am and 11:55 am. Weight machines must be installed in all places selling al-Approved machines

• Males over 160cm in height but less than 175cm and weighing between 50 and 64kg and females over 160cm in height but less than 175cm and weighing between 59 and 88kg may buy two bottles of imported beer and a bottle of gin between 8 am and 11:55 am.

• At any time between 2:01 pm and 4:59 pm, a maximum of six bottles of beer, two bottles of vodka and a can of paint stripper may be bought by people suffering male-pattern baldness or able to show they have recently had either a hair transplant or own more than six pairs of Bermuda shorts. This includes females.

• From 7:01 pm until 9 pm no alcohol may be bought by persons dressed in mini-skirts shorter than 6cm above the knee (or 8cm if the person is male or of indeterminate gender) or by people with beards, mustaches or ponytails. This includes females.

night purchases of

alcohol are restricted to amputees (although they must not have lost more than one limb) who can prove ownership of a late-model pickup truck registered either in Nong Khai or Lopburi and who have not been resident in Pattaya for more than six months and can show they have been married at least three times. Anybody suspected of deliberately losing a limb in order to obtain these benefits is liable to prosecution.

• No Catholics, Hispanics, gypsies or shoe-shine boys are permitted to buy more than one small bottle of Singha at any one time and then only if they are wearing the appropriate badge issued by the Department of Alien Registration.

Any of the above found outside of their registered place of residence and not wearing their badge will have their alcohol confiscated and a mark will be made in their passport.

The government feels these measures will be sufficient to

achieve a number of aims. First and foremost, by wrapping this bureaucratic red tape in an even more Kafkaesque package than normal it will annoy almost every foreigner living in Pattaya and may well encourage many of these lesser forms of life to leave for greener pastures. Cambodia is welcome to them (although the pastures aren't greener because of rapacious logging - but that's another story).

Second, the amount of paperwork involved in maintaining this new system will be enormous and therefore government investments in new plantations will reap wonderful profits for those canny investors who saw the financial benefits of investing with Fearless Leader Corp and its subsidiary, the Chopitdown Management Collective Co (Pty) all those years ago.

Third, the bureaucracy needed to administer these new regulations will be cumbersome and open to full-blown corruption. This will mean the government will need to employ thousands of

personnel to oversee the management of the system and these people will be so grateful for their jobs they will vote for the Thais Love Toxins party for the rest of their lives.

Of course, the rules are applicable only to the ordinary public and foreigners. People with special Thais Love Toxins Party ID cards (distributed to influential persons as well as big party donors and relatives of Fearless

Leader) are exempt from the rules. Besides, few of them ever wear mini-skirts shorter than 6cm above the knee.

n recent years safety has become more of a consideration for car manufacturers, a selling point even. This is partly to do with the determined efforts of the European New Car Assessment Program (EuroNCAP) which is run independently under the auspices of the Fédération International de l'Automobile (FIA), the body that governs motor racing.

EuroNCAP was the creation of FIA president Max Mosley, and its current chairman is Professor Claes Tingvall, one of the world's leading experts on accident investigations. The Swedish professor said late last year, in an impassioned speech at the Bernabeu Stadium in Madrid, "The killing has got to stop!"

He was referring to the fact that, in Europe, five people a day die and 115 are seriously injured in motor accidents. He went on, "Car manufacturers have had the ability to save this pain and suffering for years – but have chosen not to do so."

Despite these assertions, it is comforting to know that cars are becoming safer for their occupants. It has long been an industry adage that a small car is never as safe as a larger one, but with improvements in materials and the addition of greater built-in safety features, small cars such as the Ford Focus and the Mazda3 are now achieving respectable scores in many of the EuroNCAP tests.

The Audi A6, a mid-sized executive car, recently achieved top scores in its tests, with a five-star rating – the maximum awarded – in occupant protection crash tests. In the US, the Audi was awarded the highest rating of "double best pick" by the authoritative Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS).


The side impact test is a particularly challenging part of the IIHS tests, with vehicles striking a moving barrier at a speed of 50kmh. The barrier is shaped to resemble the front end of a pick-up or SUV.

Following the tests, frontaland side-impact damage, structural deformation, as well as the kinematics and biomechanical stresses to which occupants would have been subjected, are carefully evaluated.

The similar side-impact test in Europe is of particular significance in Germany, where more than half of the major injuries in road accidents occur where a car hits a pole or a tree.

The A6 is a particularly stylish auto that, for some reason, has never achieved the sales success it deserves.

There is a wide choice of engines, both gasoline and diesel, but the most popular is the two-

liter TDI, an economical and ecologically-efficient four-cylinder diesel. All diesel motors are now fitted with highly competent particulate filters, making them among the cleanest engines in the world

Although the Audi scored the maximum five stars in the EuroNCAP frontal- and side-impact tests, it was rated less highly in terms of pedestrian safety, as is often the case with larger vehicles.

It is unfortunate that cars that achieve high ratings in frontal- and side-impact tests rarely score well in the pedestrian safety scores.

This is particularly true of luxury SUVs, such as the Volvo XC90 and BMW's X5. Both scored high (five stars each) in impact tests, yet because of their

height and bulk achieved relatively poor ratings in pedestrian safety – the BMW getting only one star, the Volvo two.

In terms of assessing the ratings, research demonstrates that cars with a three- or four-star impact score are up to 30% safer for their occupants than a car with only two stars. Regrettably, no vehicle to date has achieved the maximum four stars in pedestrian safety.

At the same 2004 conference at the Bernabeu Stadium, a British authority on road safety, former Transport Minister David Jamieson, said, "It is encouraging that we are seeing more cars achieving three stars for pedestrian protection, although the majority are still only receiving one star.

"I would urge manufactur-

ers to implement improvements in pedestrian protection ahead of the European Standards which will soon take effect."

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### Tailor-made solution

Karon Municipality is correct to take action against tailor shops that continue to employ aggressive touts, many of whom are known to be illegal aliens from India and Nepal (see news section).

The Gazette regularly receives letters of complaint from exasperated tourists about the high-pressure tactics and unfair practices used by such touts in Kata-Karon; the problem is even worse in Patong, where there are far more touts than in the 144 shops registered in Karon.

While there is no law that specifically makes it illegal to solicit business in public places, officials wanting to put an end to this very real threat to tourism have a number of options at their disposal. The most obvious method, and the one that Karon Municipality has correctly chosen to employ, is to enforce existing labor and immigration laws.

While there are hundreds – if not thousands – of people involved in tailoring businesses on the island, one hardly ever meets them on the organized to-the-border "visa runs" that most law-abiding foreign residents have to undertake in order to remain in the country legally.

This would seem to indicate that many of these touts are not only flouting immigration laws, but doing so in the most blatant way possible. Simple passport inspections would probably be enough to clear the streets of illegal touts overnight, but reports of such checks are few – perhaps indicating that powerful influences are involved in their protection.

Even if these touts are in the country legally, they must be working illegally if they are involved in either garment making or "hawking", both listed among the occupations restricted to Thais under the Alien Occupation Act of 1973.

The fact that Tambon Karon alone has 144 tailor shops is worrying, even if many of the shops are only sales outlets and the actual tailoring work is done by a third party. One has to wonder how, with so much competition, any of them can make a profit.

Most touts are not bad people – considering how many of them there are, few seem to be implicated in serious crimes. It is also unfair to portray the entire tailoring industry in a negative way based on the sales tactics employed by some shops.

However, the threat posed to tourism by aggressive touts is real and needs to be dealt with.

Karon Municipality is giving its tailor shops plenty of advance warning and a more-than-generous chance to reform.

Let us hope that other local administrations on the island, particularly Patong, choose to follow their lead.

# Redevelopment confusion reigns

fter the tsunami, we heard that we would get some 600 million baht to redevelop Patong, building up our hopes that the area would enjoy a new, luxurious image - that the polluted Patong would be cleaned up. We thought our bad luck would be followed by good.

With the TAT's original budget of 600 million baht for the landscape redevelopment project, a lot could have been done to make Patong beautiful.

In the end, the budget was cut to 194.7 million baht. We still see this as a good opportunity it is better than nothing. That amount of money is still enough to beautify the beach, the public areas and the surrounding roads.

We do not want any more buildings. We need to develop what Patong already has, and organize it better.

First, we need more systematic ways of using the beach area: for example, the same color of umbrellas and the registration of entrepreneurs in the beach area, such as the masseuses, manicurists and so on. And we need bus stops and a public park for people to bring children to play or relax in.

I have heard from a member of Parliament that the TAT has plans for public toilets, towers, and a security office. We don't need all that.

We need to develop a panoramic landscape, pleasing to the eye. Under the present budget, the TAT could do it well and make Patong beautiful. However, if they focus on constructing new buildings, not even 200 million or 300 million baht will be enough.

Second, on the roadside and sidewalks now, we have unlicensed kiosks and touts. We need those areas cleared and revamped so people can walk along them free of obstructions and harassment.

More car parking spaces would be good – they would be convenient for tourists.



While Patong Municipality has its own, albeit small, budget for the redevelopment of Patong after the tsunami, officials say that, in order to avoid duplication of effort, there is no point in beginning any work before the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) gets started on its own major refurbishment of the shoreline.

Now, nearly eight months after the tsunami, no construction has been started. Krisada Tansakul, President of the Patong Hotel Society and Head of the Patong Beach Community, explains how the Patong community feels about this situation – and what they want done about it.

Thirdly, we need to improve garbage collection and water systems and we still need to have the power cables moved underground. Whatever agency might handle that, it would be good for Patong.

ernment nor the TAT has held formal information sessions with local residents. We have tried and tried to voice our opinions and tell them what the Patong community needs, but it has made no difference. They do not inform us. If they do not keep us updated, we will have to chase them to find out how

their development plans are progressing.

We may have to continue to turn to the media for help.

Sometimes other villages complain that Patong seems to be doing comparatively well after the tsunami, but I would like to point out that the source of our socalled success is not the government. Even the tsunami warning system is thanks to donations from abroad.

If the TAT starts construction in March, it will be too late to help us this high season. The TAT should start with our fundamental needs: cleanliness and reorga-

> nization of the beach area, which might take a couple of months in itself.

> If they focus on building, starting in September, this will be bad for Patong's image. In any case, how can they build in areas where there will be activities for visitors [such as tsunami commemoration events]?

With their present limited budget the TAT may not be able to accomplish all they originally set out to do, and now they need to decide their priorities; it will not benefit Patong if they start work during the high season.

I am still not clear about what the Municipality plans to do. When we request that they work

on it, they always say they need to wait for the TAT to finalize their budget. Meanwhile, they do nothing for the Patong landscape.

The wreckage of trees and broken playground equipment needs to be cleaned up – and not with the TAT budget. We are asking for the local administration to help organize this first. If they did, it could be cleared in a week, regardless of the TAT's budget.

It would be quite simple to brighten up the town. For example, when a tree on the sidewalk dies, the Municipality should replace it. Even this would help in redeveloping the town's land-

Patong will still be a tourist attraction, but if we had been able to get something done in terms of landscape development, then tourists would have been more impressed. Even if we don't know how the final plan will turn out, I believe the TAT will do a more professional job by listening to the locals and considering how to benefit us most, while at the same time making Patong beautiful and convenient for tour-

# Wonderful world of wireless

ver the past several years, Internet and LANs (local area networks) have been moving toward wireless connectivity. This trend has been hit by many setbacks and pitfalls but, for the most part, wireless technology has been accepted by computer users.

Wi-Fi, which stands for wireless fidelity, is the grandchild the sky is relatively weak and

**Local area hotspots:** There are many types of hotspots and no, were not talking about Thailand under an April sun. "Hotspot" is a common term used to describe the signal coverage area of the wireless signal.

There are many types of hotspots which many of us take for granted. Take UBC, for example; it has a satellite that receives a signal from the ground then bounces it back over an area that includes Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia and parts of India – a from the CAT (Communication

very large hotspot indeed.

Another example is radio stations that broadcast their signals over mountains and (with luck) valleys. Don't forget your mobile phone - it accesses cellular notspots all over the island (or most of it, anyway).

Last but not least are the new Apple IPod Mini music jukeboxes that attach to a

small transmitter, which, in turn, gets picked up by your car radio, acting like a private radio station. More on IPods and personal jukeboxes in an upcoming article.

The technology that powers these systems, although producing similar results, can be very different.

**Satellite wireless:** Back to the UBC example. UBC takes a very strong laser beam containing the TV signal and sends it off into space where it is deflected back to the ground in a much weaker yet broader hotspot signal that is then re-condensed by your home dish and sent over a short cable to your TV.

The signal that comes from

quite prone to interference from mountains, buildings and moisture, which is your UBC signal usually cuts

out just before a big rain storm.

Its reach is very wide but its strength is rather limited. That is also why you have a UBC dish - it collects as much signal as it can and, through its concave shape, focuses the signal onto a single receiver mounted in front of the dish which then sends the signal to your TV.

Cellular wireless: This technology combines both satellite and microwave signals to create hotspots blanketing several smaller areas.

International calls come in

Authority of Thailand) satellite, as do calls from Bangkok and Chiang Mai.

These signals are picked up by a ground station near the airport and are then sent up the many tall red antenna towers you see everywhere. These antennae are connected through a direct microwave signal which requires a visual route (call-

ed line-of-sight) between each tower.

From there, each tower also has a cellular phone signal transmitter that blankets the area around each one thus creating mobile phone hotspots all over the island.

**Internet & LAN hotspots:** The newest wireless solutions are for LANs and Internet access. These produce both good and notso-good results, the reason being that they broadcast on 2.4 GHz, which is a pretty low-powered

more than five wireless systems are operating independently. The signals tend to interfere with each other, causing slow speed and intermittent disconnections.

One solution is to change the "channel" on your network to avoid interference from your neighbors.

Outdoor wireless is quite handy but again, trees, buildings and rain can cause performance problems. There is a good solution to the coverage limitations of Wi-Fi, which includes using a stronger transmitter (or access point) operating at 3.2 GHz – a much stronger signal.

The only problem is that this signal is currently reserved for the Thai government so it is not totally legal to use it.

The best solution is to use CAT5 or CAT6 cabling wherever possible and then place your access points carefully in order to create maximum coverage. A good rule of thumb is "the more the merrier" and at 5,500 baht each you can create yourself a boiling hot spot if you like.

Keep in mind that setting up these systems can require a bit of experience so ask your systems provider for input before deciding on your design ... and, of course, you can contact me if

# Property boom attracts legal eagles

PHUKET: Big-name law firms such as Johnson Stokes & Master (JSM) and Tilleke & Gibbins are opening offices in Phuket to capitalize on the island's booming property market.

Gary Biesty, Managing Partner of JSM (Thailand) Ltd, said the Phuket office will focus principally on property-related matters but will be staffed by lawyers able to respond to all of the firm's clients' needs, as and when they arise.

"Our clients are primarily foreigners who would like to invest in property. However, we advise both locals and foreigners, not only on property issues but also on general corporate commercial matters," Mr Biesty added.

He explained, "As Phuket is experiencing a huge property boom, we would like to be there in order to provide a seamless service ... With the property boom, other businesses will follow in order to satisfy the needs of the new inhabitants. We would like to assist locals and foreigners in setting up new companies for every kind of commercial business needed in Phuket."

When it comes to property, he noted that a confusing variety of legal structures are employed by developers.

"This is historical rather than inten-

tional. It need not be confusing, but the reality is that developers have chosen different structures to launch their developments. One of the things we plan to do when we officially launch in Phuket is to produce a summary of these variations on the theme so that people have a clear understanding of what they're investing in.

"A clear message to potential investors is that property law in Thailand is not simple and commoditized, as in other jurisdictions, and they should adjust their expectations accordingly.

Tilleke & Gibbins International Ltd (T&G), Thailand's oldest international law firm, will open an office in the Laguna area at the end of this month.

T&G's target market includes real estate developers who want to buy or sell property, David Lyman, Chairman and Chief Values Officer, told the *Gazette*.

The firm will also have an eye on a number of other tourism-related business opportunities on Phuket.

One of the earlier international law firms to move into Phuket, some three years ago, was McEvily & Collins (M&C).

Senior Partner Matthew McEvily, explained that the firm has been providing legal and business advisory services in Thailand since 1992. With other branches in Bangkok and, since August 1, Koh Samui, M&C, he says, caters to Thai and international clients across the entire business spectrum, with a focus on real estate, corporate/commercial law and dispute resolution.

The arrival of major law firms does not worry him, he said. The recent growth of the Phuket property sector is fueling the growth of the legal services market. "There is simply more work to go around. Also, the added expense of sending lawyers from Bangkok to handle Phuket matters makes using a Bangkok-based firm unappealing to clients.

"Our Phuket and Samui clients are primarily high-net-worth individuals, high-end home buyers and experienced property developers, but we handle many other legal issues facing both foreigners and Thais. We are not too concerned about the firms that are moving to Phuket now ... our position in the market is strong and we have a very loyal client base.

Another legal eagle who believes the expansion of property development on Phuket is the main attraction for the big names, is Friedrich "Sam" Fauma, Senior Partner, Director and Adviser of the International Law Office (ILO), the island's longest-standing international law company.

"Business investments in Phuket, especially real estate investments, are in-

creasing and therefore the business opportunity for law firms, international law firms in particular, is, likewise, increasing."

In Mr Fauma's view, it is not too difficult for a foreigner to open a business here. It is what happens afterwards that is dangerous. "I believe it is easy, sometimes even too easy, to open a business without being aware of the possible pitfalls," he said.

He welcomes the arrival of big law firms on Phuket. "Naturally, they will bring their clients with them as the firms have an international presence. They will also acquire clients from the local market and the increase in competition will benefit clients and will improve the overall quality of the services offered," he said.

A Thai law firm that opened its doors on January 1 this year, Phuket Land Law Co, was also established, as its name suggests, to meet demand from property buyers for legal services.

"There weren't enough legal services available here for property buyers," Director and Senior Counsel Suphawan Tukwun said. "So I decided to fill the gap.

"Since the Phuket property market is booming, we get high returns and a lot of clients every day.

"It is good to see the well-known international law firms expanding to Phuket – it means our economy is growing."

# Why good news is sometimes bad news

inancial markets are often difficult to satisfy. An excellent example was the reaction of the US stockmarket to the July non-form payroll numbers (new jobs created)

The market had been expecting an increase of 180,000 jobs. Instead 207,000 jobs was the official estimate and, in addition, new jobs for June were also revised upwards. Good news surely for the US economy.

To add to this upbeat development, average incomes rose 0.4% in July, the highest rise for some time

Stockmarkets, instead of reacting positively, moved downwards. The glass was three-quarters full but investors were more concentrated on the fact that it was still a quarter empty.

Reasons given for this reaction included the fact that this will make the US Federal Reserve keep on increasing short-term interest rates for a longer period to higher levels, and increases in wages will hurt corporate profits.

Amid all this comment it seemed to be completely forgotten that the market was disappointed that only days before there was gloom as second-quarter Gross Domestic Product (GDP) came out at 3.4% instead of an anticipated 3.6%.

The reality is that corporate profits are unlikely to be severely tested by current rises in incomes. Employees in America have experienced low income growth for the past few years, and some reasonable increase will give a boost

to both consumer expenditure and savings.

Probably the main reason for poor stockmarket performance has more to do with the fact that this is the summer vacation season. It seems probable that, after the holidays, if the good economic news continues, that will be reflected by a rising stockmarket.

Corporate profits are strong and rising. Increasing interest rates are unlikely to have much effect on companies as balance sheets are, in general, in excellent shape. Many companies have substantial cash in hand and have no need to borrow, while for those that must increase their debt, interest rates are very low.

The reality is that the fundamentals are in place for a "bull" market. It is comforting that there are so many "bears" out there, for history tells us that when too many people become optimists, trouble is on the way.

**Mailman bites Koizumi:** The issue surrounding the attempted

privatization of Japan Post may seem irrelevant to most investors; how can a postal service be of any great importance?

Certainly, where mail delivery is concerned, it is not so vital: it is the other operations of Japan Post that are critical.

The "post office" savings bank and its affiliated insurance company have assets of around US\$3 trillion (about 125 trillion baht). The savings bank is the world's largest financial institution by a substantial margin, and the insurance arm is Japan's largest insurance company.

The current Japanese Prime Minister, Junichiro Koizumi, came to power in 2001 promising economic reform, and at the top of the list was the privatization of Japan Post.

The privatization measure successfully passed through the lower house of parliament, but was defeated on August 8 in the upper house by a vote of 125 to 108.

Koizumi had staked his political future on a positive outcome, and immediately after the defeat he called a general election for September 11. His political defeat was not caused solely by opposition parties, but also by members of his own Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) voting against him.

There were no noble motives for the rebels' action. They had two reasons.

First, the substantial funds of the Post Office Savings Bank had been used by politicians to finance favored projects while enabling the fact to be hidden from the public. This usually involved construction projects, often of dubious virtue. It is no coincidence that the construction industry is the largest donor to LDP coffers.

The second reason was that, in many rural areas, postmasters have significant political influence, and privatization was not welcomed among this group.

Japan Post may have the biggest assets of any entity under state control, but there are nine others with combined loans exceeding US\$500 trillion (about 20,000 trillion baht) which would have been next in line.

This is a major setback for Japan; and it will leave a bitter taste, especially among foreign investors. Sadly, Japan was just starting to look attractive and, for the first time in 14 years, land prices in Tokyo had slowly started to rise.

It will probably not derail economic recovery, but it is a very negative development.

There is considerable speculation that this could lead to a major split in the ruling LDP, which has held power for more than 50 years with only a 10-month period in opposition in the early 1990s.

Japanese politics are a labyrinth: it is impossible to be sure what the political future holds. What is certain is that Koizumi was the best Prime Minister Japan has had in decades; it is just a pity that so many of his political associates are of much smaller caliber.

# Why golfers should do more lines

t is of paramount importance in golf to aim correctly and consistently. One tried-and-tested method is to visualize La railway track – two parallel lines – from you to the target.

A visual aid, as in the picture, is to use two golf clubs. The club on the right represents the intended direction of the club face and ball, and is pointing directly at the target. The club on the left represents the golfer's "body lines", that is the feet, knees, hips and shoulders, and points slightly to the left of the target – assuming you are right-

Most club golfers tend to aim their body at the target or, even worse, don't take aim at all. Try aiming the club face first at



an intermediate target and then lining your body up in a parallel line.

Next time you practice, check your alignment by laying down a club on the ground first, pointing from the ball to your target. You can then test your body alignment by dropping another club down after you have "set up", pointing from the line of your toes. It should be parallel to the first.

Following a routine to find good alignment is a must if you want to play a top

# NSW crown

PHUKET CITY: New South Wales Rugby Union (NSW) beat Auckland Rugby Union 14-12 in extra time in a classic nailbiter of a final in the 1st International 80-80 Rugby Tournament at Surakul Stadium on August 14.

NSW opened the scoring five minutes into the first half through full back David Kehoe, who received the ball after several busting runs up the center by the Aussie forwards. Kehoe beat three tackles to score, and then converted his own try to give his side a 7-0 lead.

Perturbed by the lack of time they had been spending attacking the Aussie try line, the Kiwis worked their way to NSW's 22, only to see Kehoe send his side back into attack with a 50-meter kick.

The Kiwis responded by going on the charge and, just before half-time, spun the ball wide to the right wing, where three Kiwis were marked man-forman by the Aussie defense.

A jolting run followed by blistering pace saw Auckland No 8 Reuben Hardie score a try to the right of the goal. Fly half Matt Ryan converted the try to level the score 7-7.

Auckland went on the attack from the start of the second half with huge kicks testing the Aussie backs, and upped the physical element of the match with tough charges and slamming tackles.

More than a few wayward fists were thrown in the rucks. NSW's loose head prop found himself on the receiving end of one, and spent five minutes off the field recovering.

More and more players on both sides were being felled in back-play, until ref Ben Skeen finally stamped his authority on the match and sent Auckland's Terry Kimiangatan to the sin bin for 10 minutes for a heavy tackle on an Aussie without the ball.

Throughout the rest of the half both sides tested each other with quick kick-and-chase and wing-to-wing tactics, providing some excellent rugby for the small crowd.

A late dash nearly put NSW right winger Caleb Hardie in the corner for a try, but a great tackle by Auckland right flanker Craig Thomas rammed Hardie into touch.

The Aussies had the last scoring opportunity in normal time, with a penalty kick only seven meters from goal - but again missed.

Auckland scored again in the opening minutes of extra time after a well-placed kick forced a line-out 10 meters from NSW's goal. The Kiwi's won the line-out

Kehoe, who had an outstanding match, converted the try to take the score to NSW 14, Auckland 12.



### Phuket parents do not want condoms in schools

PHUKET: Phuket is trying to bolster its defense against AIDS by increasing education and stepping up the distribution of condoms. But the province faces stiff resistance from local people.

According to Dr Boonrieng Chuchaisangrat, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Public Health Office, the reason Phuket has the second-highest rate of AIDS infection in southern Thailand is that both the disease and the use of condoms are misunderstood.

He said that when people listen to the news about those afflicted with AIDS, or hear that the AIDS population in Phuket is increasing, they all point their fin-

gers at the doctors and the prostitutes. But they don't seem to realize that, without proper protection, they or their loved ones can become victims.

Every other province in Thailand seems to accept the condom policy as a means of protection, but Phuket residents view condoms as a sex incentive, Dr Boonrieng told the Gazette. He emphasized that Phuket needs to change this point of view.

Several schools outside of Phuket now teach modern sex education to help students understand the use of condoms.

But, Dr Boonrieng told the Gazette, if such modern practices were to be introduced in the schools here, the parents would begin rioting in the streets.



# Antidotes to rainy day blues

The monsoon season is well entrenched and showers are the order of the day most days. As the Carpenters sang, "Rainy days and Mondays always get me down." So it's time, then, for my wine and food tips to ward off gloomy rainy-day blues.

Lack of sunshine, some scientists assert, can cause insomnia. So, begin your morning by staring at the light inside your refrigerator while rummaging around for something to eat. The luminosity will stimulate the production of melatonin, the hormone that regulates good sleep.

If you are lucky you will find something delicious, like smoked salmon. Try it with fresh brown bread and a Riesling with mineral notes from Alsace or Germany. Riesling is the perfect daytime wine for lounging around the house: it's relatively low in alcohol, its crisp acidity is invigorating and the bright citrus flavors contrast nicely with the richness of smoked salmon.

Relax with a glass of wine and good novel. Wine inexplicably arouses the mind's capacity to explore hidden connotations contained in the written word. The ideal wine should be as unfathomable as the twists and turns of the novel it accompanies.

The uncommon nuance con-

tained in varietal wines like Roero Arneis, Grecco di Tuffo, Rousanne, Petite Verdot, or Durif are spot on, as are many of the top blended wines such as California's Conundrum and Cain Five, with their fine distinction and subtle intricacy.

Probably the most pleasing way to enjoy wine when trapped indoors by monsoon rains is while cooking. Put on your favorite music, open a bottle of wine, pour a glass and pretend you are a great chef. Unless, of course, you already are a great chef, in which case this might seem like working on your day off, so call your spouse to the kitchen.

Most of us prefer drinking the same wine we would use to and consultant. make a sauce and instinctively

associate a wine choice with the meal. Try Zinfandel when cooking Italian, or Rhône reds when making a casserole and you will see what I mean.

At this time of year it is a good idea to avoid saturated fats, choosing instead fresh fruits and vegetables, skinless chicken or other lean meat. Olive oil is generally thought to be a healthier choice than butter and my lower the risk of heart disease.

When spending long periods in an air-conditioned environment, remember to drink adequate amounts of water - at least six glasses each day – and get enough exercise.

Pulling the corks out of wine bottles does not count as exercise, so take a walk after dinner. Never mind if you get wet, good food and wine may help you stay healthy and happy during the monsoon season.

Adding physical and mental exercise to indulging in fine wine and delicious food is an uplifting way to bring balance to our enjoyable life here in paradise.

welcome addition to the choice of restaurants serving Western cuisine in the Rawai and Nai Harn areas is Los Amigos Cantina, overlooking the still somewhat ravaged looking Nai Harn Lake.

Owners Jimmy Pearson of Jimmy's Lighthouse Chalong fame – and Terry Reynolds met 20 years ago. They both have been involved in the marine leisure industry for a long time and are lovers of good Mexican food.

# The lager connection

hat's in a name? How much does it really tell you about somebody? I have a theory about this – wait until a little later on in life, and decide on a name for yourself. At about

"Gilbey" or "Gordon" certainly works for me, for example. Perhaps "Vladivar" might be pushing it a bit. It's a shame I couldn't become "Heineken", but that would just be silly.

Judging by the first two syllables of its botanical name, there is one often-seen plant in Thailand that would probably be fond of a drop of the amber nectar every now and then - the lagerstroemia indica. Fanciful, perhaps, but I like the idea anyway.

Bizarrely, though, the common name of this plant is crape myrtle. Specifically, "crape" myrtle not "crepe" myrtle.

It's apparently called this because the flowers have crinkly petals which look a bit like the material crepe. According to my dictionary, crepe is "a light fine fabric with a crinkled surface", but for some unknown reason you're supposed to spell it "crape" when it's in front of myrtle. Confused? Me too. Sounds like a lot of crape.

At any rate, it's a common enough name, and since there's no central authority that manages common names for plants you can spell (or call it) whatever you want. Refer to the plant as "Derek" if you wish – it really doesn't matter. The Thais call it yii-kheng.

The deciduous crape myrtle is among the longest-blooming trees in the world, (and I don't mean bloomin' long), with flowering periods lasting from 60 to 120 days. Crapes come in heights as short as around 50 centimeters or as tall as 12 meters. Leaves are alternate and smooth, and are around 6 to 8cm long. Flowers are borne in big showy clusters and come in white and a number of different shades of pink, purple, lavender and red.

The fruits that follow are brown or black, and look a little like peas next to the flowers.

When they mature, they dry up and split, releasing disk-shaped seeds. Depending on the variety, crapes can grow as large shrubs, or as trees that may be either upright or spreading. Larger varieties are particularly enthusiastic in their speed of growth.

Many types have interesting bark that peels off in thin flakes, exposing a cinnamon-colored or gray inner bark. Crapes tend to produce a number of suckers (growths originating from the rootstock of a grafted plant, rather than the desired part of the plant) that should be removed as they appear, if you want them to stay as trees with distinct trunks.

The crape myrtle likes moist soil, where it will grow quickly, but it tolerates dry conditions once it's established. You would only want to prune it to remove overly dense branches and crossing limbs. Otherwise, just let it grow.

One hint is that you should "deadhead" after the first flush of growth to encourage it to rebloom more quickly. Deadheading is the process of pinching off used or spent blooms to keep the have a word with the editor.

plants well-groomed and to prevent them from setting seed.

Crape myrtles are a magnet for aphids, upon whose excrement (it's not often I use that word) a sooty mold grows. This can give the leaves a gray, sooty coating that isn't harmful to the plant, but doesn't look particularly

Crapes are actually used around some commercial nurseries to attract aphids away from other plants - that's how much the aphids love them. If you don't want your crapes, er, craped on, then you can control the aphids with a soapy water solution.

Originally from this part of the world, the crape myrtle was introduced into England and the US in the 18th century, and is now cultivated worldwide. In fact, Texans took to the plant so much that they chose it as their state shrub. A true Asian export.


To plant it, choose a sunny site with well-drained soil, making sure there is enough room for the shrub to reach its mature spread.

Dig a hole twice as wide as the container or root ball. Set the plant at the same depth or slightly higher than it was in the pot. Fill in the hole around the plant with soil, and mound the soil to form a 5-cm-high ridge around the perimeter of the hole to act as a catch-basin for the water. Water it generously, filling the basin and allowing water to settle several times. Easy!
