Reservoir down to last few drops

KATHU: The water level in Phuket's sole public reservoir, the Bang Wad Reservoir, is down to just 400,000 cubic meters and falling – lower than at this time of year in any of the past 21 years. Water officials blame the shortage of rain.

Phuket Irrigation Office (PIO) Project Director Watchara Arepornsiri has warned that if there is not enough rain by the end of September or early October, the reservoir will effectively be empty and Phuket will have to rely entirely on supplies from privately-owned tin lagoons.

But even the tin lagoons are running low. Sawong Sri-In, director of Phuket City Municipal Water Department, told the *Ga*- zette that two of the four lagoons the city normally relies upon are also low on water. One, on Soi Paniang, just to the northeast of Phuket City, is at 25% of capacity. Another, in Suan Luang Park, on Chao Fa Rd, is down to just 10% of capacity.

Attempts by the Royal Rainmaking Project to seed clouds and produce rain have had little success.

Since August 20, pilots from the project have been flying missions over Phuket in an effort to get the clouds to shed their bounty, said Thanatsanee Sawatdirak, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Agriculture and Cooperatives Office.

Part of the time they have been unable to fly because of strong winds. In other cases, the planes were grounded because tourism-boosting activities, such as the Tourism Authority of Thailand's "mega-fam trips" for thousands of foreign tour agents, were taking place at the time – and rain was definitely not required.

Sometimes the pilots did succeed in producing rain, but it fell on Phang Nga instead of Phuket. In the end, the amount of water they were able to add to the reservoir totaled just 81,000 cubic meters, an amount K. Thanatsanee described as insignificant.

The rainmakers will, however, keep trying until November if necessary.

In a normal year the PIO is contracted to supply – from its Bang Wad Reservoir – 2 million cubic meters of water to Phuket City Municipality and 4 million to the Phuket Provincial Water Sup-

Bangkok resurrects casino plan

BANGKOK (*The Nation*): The government has revived its plan to introduce casinos to Thailand as a way to boost the sagging tourism industry amid increased competition from rival Asian destinations, the Minister of Tourism and Sports, Pracha Maleenont, said on September 8.

K. Pracha said the "one region one casino" initiative was proposed in response to the opening of Hong Kong Disneyland this month and the expected opening of two casinos in Singapore in the next few years.

"Thailand needs a new tourism magnet to lure more international tourists and local travelers," he said.

The Disneyland theme park is expected to divert potential travelers to Hong Kong, especially travelers from China, one of the Tourism Authority of Thailand's main targets.

K. Pracha said Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra had assigned the Government Lottery Office to conduct a feasibility study that should be completed by the end of this year.

The government wants to build at least four casinos in the Kingdom, he said, one each in four of Thailand's six regions. Two of the casinos would be located in existing tourism hotspots such as Phuket or Pattaya, and two would be built in less popular locations.

"If we want more tourism income we must start putting this thing on our tourism map. The casinos will also help the economy to recover," K. Pracha said.

PM Thaksin first unveiled his casino plan a year ago, but he was strongly criticized by devout Buddhists who said the casinos would promote gambling and spark social problems. In Phuket, the plan appeared to be opposed by most local people.





ply Department (PPWS), which is responsible for the southern half of the island apart from Phuket City.

K. Wachara said that the PPWS had used an average of 10,000 cubic meters a day from the reservoir, which was within its quota. The city, however, had used 3.3 million cubic meters up to the beginning of September and had therefore been cut off.

K. Wachara complained that neither organization was making full use of resources. "They just keep using water from the dam. We warned them four months ago of the possibility of a water shortage, but they have done nothing.

Meanwhile, the Municipality, which warned at the end of March that it might have to begin rationing supplies, has yet to do so, although water pressure has been reduced since May 1, K. Sawong said.

Rise in spirits tax begins to hit shop shelves

PHUKET: The Excise Department's tax increase on distilled spirits, which went into effect September 6, is gradually being reflected on store shelves across the island as retailers replace old stock with new.

The increase, which ostensibly has the twofold goal of cutting down on alcohol consumption and boosting government revenue, applies to all distilled alcohol products, including brandy, whisky, "special blends", rum, gin and vodka.

Distilled spirits are now subject to a tax of 40-50% of the market price, or 400 baht per liter of pure alcohol content whichever is higher. Formerly the tax was 35-50% based on market price or 240 baht per liter of pure alcohol content.

The tax rise does not apply to beer and wine.

The announcement came after the recent Cabinet meeting in Phang Nga and was prompted

by data listed on a United Nations website which showed Thailand ranking fifth in the world in terms of per capita alcohol consumption, behind South Korea, the Bahamas, Taiwan and Bermuda.

Wichan Meesen, Manager of the Market Place supermarket in Central Festival Phuket, said he did not believe the increase would have much effect on buying patterns.

"Even if they raised it to 500 baht per liter of pure alcohol, I think most of our customers would still have the spending power to continue buying what they want.

Ticket scam suspect gets bail

PATONG: British national Jonathan Duncan, charged with selling fraudulently obtained air tickets to tourists, has been released on bail of 50,000 baht after spending five days locked up following his arrest.

Duncan, 24, was arrested August 30 on charges of fraud, following complaints by people who had bought cheap air tickets from him.

It is alleged that he bought them by fraudulently using other people's credit cards.

When the card owners discovered the fraudulent charges, they ordered that the payments be stopped, and the airlines therefore invalidated the tickets.

The offense of fraud carries a maximum punishment of three years in jail.

Pol Lt Col Boonlert Onklang of Kathu Police Station said that the police investigation is continuing as more victims of Duncan's alleged scamming come forward.

He added, however, that police will put their evidence before the court by the end of September. - Anongnat Sartpisut

Phuket FantaSea back in action

PHUKET: Phuket FantaSea will be open six days a week from October 1. The "ultimate nighttime cultural theme park" attracted 3,000 to 6,000 visitors daily before last year's tsunami, but opened only intermittently in the following months. In July it shut its doors two days a week in order to save costs.

Sirikul Amaramorn, Fanta-Sea's Public Relations Director, told the Gazette that a significant drop in the number of tourists had forced FantaSea to reduce its opening hours, but, by doing so, it had managed to retain its 1,100 employees.

Passport 'clinic' for Surat Thani

SURAT THANI: The passport division of the Department of Consular Affairs in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoF), will send officials to Surat Thani between September 19 and 26 to allow Thai nationals to apply for passports or to extend or renew existing ones.

Applications will be accepted between 8:30 am to 3:30 pm in the Provincial Meeting Hall in Surat Thani Town.

Those interested in the passport services may book an appointment by calling the Surat Thani Provincial Office at Tel: 077-272926.

Officers of the Passport Division in Bangkok could not confirm to the Gazette whether a mobile passport services clinic will be coming to Phuket in the near future – as has been the case in recent years.

Instead, they advised Thais wanting passport services to look for announcements posted on the ministry website at www.mfa. go.th.

Don't forget us: Phi Phi

PHI PHI ISLANDS: Phankam Kitithorakul, the Chairman of the Ao Nang Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor), which is responsible for the Phi Phi Islands, has called for greater government support, saying the islands are being overlooked.

K. Phankam said that eight months after the tsunami the central government had still to help boost tourism to the islands. "It seems that everyone has forgotten Phi Phi; they are focusing only on Khao Lak and Phuket,' he said.

"We have many rooms available on Phi Phi for tourists who want to travel here, especially [on the hillside to the east of Ton Sai Bay], which suffered little damage from the tsunami.

'Many people think that all of Phi Phi was damaged, but it was not," K. Phankam said, adding that the islands were currently attracting about half the usual

number of day trippers for this time of year.

"The government is taking too long to choose which organization will rebuild Phi Phi, and now it is as if we are still at the very first step," he added.

However, K. Phankam did concede that since the tsunami some progress had been made: "At the Cabinet meeting in Khao Lak [September 5-6] they decided that the Organization for Specific Areas Administration for Sustainable Tourism Promotion

(OSAASTP), under the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment, will rebuild Phi Phi."

He said the OSAASTP will be responsible for maintaining and improving main infrastructure on the islands, including supplying electricity and freshwater, and installing footpaths.

However, he complained that this move was long overdue, and that the decision came only after residents had pressed the central government for years to provide such services instead of private companies, which were considerably more expensive.

In the government's defense, Suwalai Pinpradab, Director of Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket office, told the Gazette, "They [the Cabinet] are still waiting for the new redevelopment plans, just as Patong and Kamala Beaches are."

She agreed, however, that the islands are open for business. "Many hotels and guesthouses have been repaired and are ready to receive tourists. I think there are more than 1,000 rooms available there now. I have just been there and it is more beautiful than before, especially at Maya Bay," K. Suwalai said.

She added that the TAT was promoting the islands abroad. "Many tourists from Australia and the Middle East are visiting there now.

"I think that in the coming high season the number of tourists there will be about 90% of last year's figure."

Phuket Air cuts routes after crash

BANGKOK (Gazette, Nation): A Phuket Air plane from Bangkok skidded off the runway at Tak Airport shortly after 9 am on September 11, during landing. None of the 30 passengers on board was injured.

The decades-old Japanese YS-11 twin-turboprop aircraft, which can carry 64 passengers, barreled into the airport's perimeter fence, damaging the starboard wing and propeller. The airline has now withdrawn its four YS-11s from service and canceled two domestic routes.

Capt Chawanit Chiamcharoenvut, Executive Vice-President of Phuket Air, said, "The rain might have affected the plane's braking system.

"The aircraft stopped 10 meters farther from where it should have stopped."

But one passenger told a different version of events: "The plane should have touched down at the beginning of the runway rather than around the middle," Senator Udon Tantisunthorn, who was aboard the flight, said.

Capt Chawanit denied reports that the licenses of the two pilots involved have been suspended as a result of a Department of Aviation inquiry.

"The pilots are expected to remain flying until after the investigation process is complete," he told the Gazette.

But he also confirmed that none of the carrier's YS-11 aircraft is now in use, and also said Phuket Air has "finally decided to cancel Bangkok-Mae Sot and Bangkok-Buri Ram operations from September 12," citing financial losses.

Phuket Air also has three Boeing 737s and six 747s.

Singers sought after tourist 'rape'

Lt Weerapong said that Anna and her sister Linda, 25, told the police that they had come to Phuket on vacation.

Linda said that they went to Sera Hut pub at Patong Hill, where Anna and a male singer identified only by the name of "Pla" were on friendly terms.

Linda told police that after the pub closed, Pla persuaded Anna to go with him to his room

For years they lay neglected outside Phuket City Police Station: two old bronze artillery pieces. Now they sit proudly atop new replica gun carriages, after being restored in a project that also unearthed fascinating details about the island's past. The *Gazette*'s **Anongnat Sartpisut** and **Stephen Fein** investigate.

ne of the first things visitors to the Phuket City Police Station no tice is the two old cannons flanking the flagpole on the front lawn – and pointing towards the nearby Merlin Hotel.

Guests at that hotel needn't worry – the two recently restored artillery pieces are purely for show, as part of a 350,000-baht project initiated by Superintendent Pol Col Paween Pongsirint to spruce up the grounds outside the station, which consistently ranks as among the best-equipped and well-run in southern Thailand.

The cannons are hardly new to the station – but interest in them is. For years they sat atop ugly concrete slabs in front of the building, neglected and covered in verdigris – the green patina that forms on bronze that has been exposed to air or water for too long.

HISTORY

Nobody at the station seemed to know how long the cannons had been there, or where they had come from. Nobody seemed to care much, either, until Col Paween turned his sights on them.

"Phuket actually has a lot of cannons," Col Paween told the *Gazette*. "There are two at the Provincial Court, two more in front of the police barracks, and more in other locations."

"Since not every police station is lucky enough to have cannons, I thought we should do something with them, rather than just let them sit there. Besides, I am interested in history because it can be a valuable guide for the present."

"Developing the workplace as something the police can be proud of is also a good way of building morale," he added. "It can serve as a reminder of the officers' duties and their obligations to society."

It was not until the station received the 350,000-baht budget, mostly from private donations, that it began to look for someone who could build replicas of the carriages originally used to transport the two cannons.

Much of the money came from major contributor Chin Anusathitporn, and another large amount came from funds left over from last year's "Somdej 76" project, which saw soil_from all 76 provinces mixed together at the base of a Buddha image during a ceremony to show national solidarity for police efforts in the restive Deep South.

The Superintendent was quick to point out that all of the donated funds were used properly.

"None of the money found its way into people's pockets. It was donated in good faith by people who placed their trust in us – and we didn't get any help from any other government agencies," he said.

Once the idea to restore the cannons was set in motion, some obvious questions were raised: How old were they? Where did they come from? How long have they been in Phuket? More needed to be learned about the guns, especially if they were to have accurate carriage replicas made for them.

When Col Paween asked former Superintendent Pol Maj Gen Kongpon Suwannarat, who ran the station back in the mid1970s, all the retired policeman

could say about the cannons was

that they were a Royal Gift to the

Intrigued, Col Paween then asked Pol Maj Cherdpong Chupreecha to contact the Thalang National Museum, which sent staff to inspect the guns on April 1 last year. Col Poween was surprised when they informed him later that the cannons were not only authentic, but that they had been cast at the famous Gjethuset foundry in Frederiksværk City in Denmark in 1768 and 1769 respectively, a short time after the fall of Ayudhaya in 1767.

It is quite likely that the artillery pieces, now positively dated as being 236 and 237 years old, are the oldest man-made objects on the island. That their origins were unknown to anybody in Phuket for so long is quite

A blast from

That the guns could be so accurately identified is largely thanks to several Danes who helped in the research effort. First there was the Danish-language website www.roennebech.dk, which is a mine of information about Danish artillery pieces of that period.

Col Paween also gives big thanks to Phuket-based Dane Henrik Darie, who provided and translated sections of the book *Dansk Artilleri i Napoleonstiden*. This scholarly text, written by Egon Eriksen og Ole L. Frantzen and published in 1989, was another important source of information, especially the all-important scale drawings of the original gun carriages from different perspectives.

Thanks to these useful sources, it was also learned that the cannon were just two of 208 bronze cannons produced by Henrik Hornhaver at the Gjethuset foundry in Fredericksværk

City between 1769 and 1799. Made of a bronze alloy consisting of 87% copper and 13% tin, the guns were designed by EG Meehlenburg, and belong to the "1766 weapon system", also known as the "Prince Carl of Hessen System" after the head of Danish artillery during that period.

They also bear the distinctive "C7" monogram of their original owner, King Christian VII.

Almost two meters long and weighing in at 275 kilograms each, the cannons must have been the weapons of mass destruction of their day.

According to the Danish researchers, when loaded with about 1.5 kilos of gunpowder they were capable of propelling a 92-kilo grapeshot canister shell, or "kardesk", up to 1,000 meters – perfect for thinning out enemy lines or firing on an opposing ship.

When in service, the cannons were well-attended, requiring a team of four strong horses to pull each one and a crew of eight men to set up and fire. As we can now see from the carriage replica, the wheels were large enough to allow them to be transported over difficult terrain.

The quality of the colonial-

in the fact that the guns still exist at all. Many cannons of that era exploded in the faces of their crews, causing horrific casualties.

Less certain than their origins is the question of when and why the cannon ended up in Phuket, or if they were ever actually used in battle here.

One theory is that they were brought here from Ayudhya during the days of Thao Thepkrasatree and Thao Srisoonthorn.

Under this scenario, Phuket's two beloved heroines might even have used them in defending the island against Burmese slavers in the late 1700s and early 1800s.

Researchers at Thalang National Museum, who registered the cannons as national antiquities under the care of the Phuket City Police Station last year, have



ent theory that sees the weapons making their way here around the turn of the 20th century – some 130 years after they were cast.

Based on records kept by Herbert Warington Smyth, who served as Chief of the Bureau of Siam Mining from 1891 to 1896, the cannons were likely shipped here by Andre du Plesis Richelleu, a Dane who was in the employ of the Siamese Crown as Director-General of the Royal Thai Navy at the time.

A report by the researchers reads, in part: "Although records available from that period are not decisively clear, it is thought that the cannons probably arrived here around 1900 to help put down a rebellion by 'Ang Yee' Chinese."

The Ang Yee were poor Chinese immigrants who worked

"First we contacted a specialist carriage craftsman in Ayudhaya, but he wanted 300,000 baht," Col Paween said. "We thought that was very exup there and we wouldn't have been able to oversee it - so we passed on that offer.'

Buri native Chart Chalamthong, a woodworker and mechanic, who came to the station to pay a fine one day and saw the cannons. "I can build proper carriages for those," he said.

Other local craftsmen pitched in, including K. Dang from Mook Pradit shop, K. Chuan who built the platform, and an electrician who rigged the station on August 6.

Sourcing the right wood was an effort in itself. They eventually decided to use "Takien pensive. Also, the work would have been done Thong" wood, which they reckoned could withstand the elements for 30 to 40 years.

"It wasn't easy to find. Work on the carriage replicas began in April, and the cannon finally went on display in front of

I'm not going out there

SURIN: An 81-year-old woman has discovered that she has been carrying the body of her unborn son for 58 years.

A doctor monitoring Soon Maithong's case said the woman had experienced an extra-uterine pregnancy, in which the fetus grows outside the womb. The baby was found fully developed, suggesting that it had survived the full nine-month gestation period.

Dr Siwamate Khaengphenkhae said he recommended that at this stage it would be risky for an octogenarian like K. Soon to undergo an operation to remove the fetus, which has effectively become part of her body.

K. Soon was admitted to the hospital on September 3 suffering from severe pains in her stomach. Doctors first thought she had developed a large tumor, but X-rays subsequently revealed the fully developed foetus.

K. Soon explained that she had expected to give birth to the baby in 1947 when she was 23, and that she had experienced four miscarriages before giving birth to her only daughter, Jua, four years after becoming pregnant with the unborn child.

Her daughter said that K. Soon believed that her failure to deliver the baby boy was because of some kind of "evil spell", and that she had undergone two exorcisms. *Source: The Nation*

The "7 weeks of Phuket City's Cultural Roads" festival will have shows from a variety of countries, Minister of Culture Uraiwan Thienthong announced.

"Not only Southern Thai culture will be represented; there will also be performances from China, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Iran, Portugal, the Netherlands and Britain," she said.

Also among the festival's events will be 48 traditional *Baba* (Straits Chinese-style) weddings, and a photo studio with a backdrop of Sino-Portuguese architecture will be set up for anyone who wants a souvenir picture taken.

K. Uraiwan noted, "All local residents will be encouraged to give their evaluation of the event so that it becomes a model for future cultural festivals."

Early closing of gas stations mooted

he Ministry of Energy has proposed that Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra order petrol stations to close at 8 pm or 9 pm as part of nationwide measures to save energy, (instead of the current 10 pm). The plan also proposes that the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration designate parking zones for taxis, and for new government cars to be able to use natural gas.

In addition, vehicles with large engines would be subject to higher taxes, while natural-gas vehicles would enjoy lower taxes – an extension of the tiered sales tax on cars introduced earlier this year. Also, monitoring cameras would be installed along roads to detect and punish drivers who speed above 100kmh.

Meanwhile, Shell Co of Thailand, the local unit of Royal Dutch Shell, has asked Energy Minister Viset Choopiban for assistance in coping with its losses from retail gas sales following recent surges in global prices. Company chairman Tiraphot Vajrabhaya told reporters he wanted the government to ask oil refineries to cut their profit margins by as much as US\$5 (205 baht) a barrel by reducing wholesale prices, claiming that oil retailers were losing 3.47 baht a liter on petrol sales and 40 satang a liter on diesel sales.

"If the government doesn't help us, we may need to raise [retail] prices sharply to cover our losses," he said.

Following Hurricane Katrina's devastation in the southern US Gulf states, oil retailers have raised their prices each week by 40 *satang* a liter, not enough to catch up with the sharp rise in global oil prices.

PTT raised its retail oil prices 40 satang per liter for both petrol and diesel on September 4, after the other nine retailers raised their prices the day before.

Toy boys: Young male prostitutes in Pattaya find nothing wrong with the flesh trade, which allows them to earn enough for a comfortable lifestyle without having to work hard, according to research by a graduate student from Srinakharintharawirot University.

Uamfa Banchuen conducted in-depth interviews with 12 young male prostitutes aged between 13 and 18 in her home town of Pattaya, as part of research for her master's degree at the university's Faculty of Education last year.

"The children approved of working as prostitutes. They found nothing wrong with it and viewed prostitution as commonplace," her report said.

The teenagers said they were happy with their work because it enabled them to earn a comfortable wage. They also believed that the government should be more open to the ideas of prostitution and same-sex affairs.

"The children said they sometimes responded to their own sexual needs when sleeping with clients. They showed a preference for foreign clients over locals," the research said.

According to the report, the teenagers between 16 and 18 years old earned about 20,000 baht a month working in gay bars. Younger prostitutes earned be-

tween 5,000 baht and 10,000 baht a month because pimps demanded commissions.

Unintentionally innocent:

Panpat "Ton Lako" Na Songkhla, 23, has been acquitted by the Criminal Court after a year-long trial because the prosecution failed to prove its case of narcotics possession.

Pantap, son of Constitution Court Judge Chumpol Na Song-khla, tried to get himself arrested on purpose for possession of a single *ya bah* (methamphetamine) pill. The court heard that he walked up to a policeman on patrol in August last year and presented him with a tablet in the hope that he would be arrested, thus escaping personal problems at home.

Prosecutors decided to press charges, even though Panpat had been acquitted of exactly the same thing in March, 2003, when the Thon Buri Criminal Court threw the case out because he had surrendered to police.

The court said Pantap had the tablet in his possession be-

cause he specifically wanted to be arrested, not because he had illicit intentions as prescribed by anti-drugs laws.

The defense presented records that confirmed the suspect's troubled relationship with his parents.

After the verdict, Judge Chumpol said his son had suffered from convulsions when he was a young child. "My son is not a drug addict and he should not have been prosecuted in the first place," he said.

He added that ill-intentioned people might have wanted to publicize his son's plight in order to discredit his position in the judiciary.

Playing the odds: The authority to issue border passes has been transferred from Aranya-prathet District Officer Paktorn Tianchai to Sa Kaew provincial officials, possibly "cutting the blood line" of the casinos across the border in Cambodia's Poipet.

K. Paktorn said the decision was an attempt to prevent Thais from crossing the border to

gamble in Poipet. The authority to issue border passes now rests with the Deputy Governor or another official acting on behalf of the Governor.

Bamrung Lawjaroenwatana-chai, chairman of the Sa Kaew Chamber of Commerce, said the move could cost the jobs of some 1,000 Thais employed by Poipet casinos.

Ridden roughshod: The father of five-year-old Chuthaporn Paengthai, who is almost completely paralyzed and only able to move her eyes and hands after a road accident, is now being sued for 550,000 baht to cover her medical costs.

Muang Loei Ram Co, Ltd, which operates a private hospital in Loei Town, has filed a lawsuit against the girl's father, K. Rungnirand, demanding that he foot the bill for a brain operation and other medical treatment.

The total cost of treatment was originally 650,000 baht, but the pickup driver blamed for the crash agreed to pay 100,000 baht in compensation.

Following the accident, in which the pickup ploughed into the motorbike on which Chuthaporn was riding pillion, her mother, K. Nam, stopped working so she could care for her daughter full-time. The family of nine has since been solely dependent on K. Rungnirand, who works a seasonal job at a rubber plantation, making around 1,500 baht a month.

K. Nam said that in addition to the 100,000 baht in compensation to the family, the pickup driver also paid to fix the damaged motorcycle.

Yet he refused to cover the entire cost of medical treatment for the girl, even though he had promised to do so in a statement he made to police after the accident.

Another may put a surfboard on the back of his or her pickup truck, and, although the board may never taste seawater, the owner becomes The Surfer Dude

To this list can now be added those with a penchant for police uniforms, specifically The SWAT Team Guys.

SWAT, for anyone who is unsure, stands for Special Weapons and Tactics.

Originally, however, it stood for Special Weapons Attack Team. The first SWAT unit was formed in the era of the Summer of Love in – where else? – the hippy habitat of California.

Obviously such a belligerent title became out of place in the '70s, hence the name change, with an emphasis on tactics.

SWAT seemed to catch the public imagination, and spawned S. W.A.T., a TV series, in the mid-'70s, that begat a rather unimaginative film a couple of years ago. Between these, in the 1980s, there was a Hanna-Barbera cartoon series called SWAT Kats. Memorable? Obviously for some, as it has its own website.

But now any Tom, Dick or Harry can toddle along to SWAT Home, one of the island's more specialized boutiques, and deck themselves out in the full regalia, in colors ranging from DPM (Disruptive Pattern Material) to several shades of black, including Henry Ford, Hole of Calcutta and Property Developers' Soul.

Ballistic and tactical vests for 8,000 baht, torches for 4,300 baht, holsters as well as a range of Smith & Wesson knives, Hi-Tech Magnum boots and even a SWAT PASGT can be bought



stands for Personal Armor System for Ground Troops, the helmet being just part of the System.



ritish citizen Irene Ferdy, 55, fell ill while visiting Samui last year. The landlord at her bungalow resort took her to the Samui Public Hospital, where she was given emergency treatment for liver problems, breathing difficulties and symptoms associated with Alzheimer's Disease. Fourteen months later, Irene is still there – and she wants to go home.

Hospital staff say her son visited Irene shortly after her treatment began, and asked the doctors and nurses to take care of her while he went home to raise the funds to take her back to the UK.

Several months then passed before he contacted his mother again, telephoning on her 55th birthday eight months ago to promise he would be back soon. Since then there has been no contact from him, so the hospital staff got in touch with the British Embassy which provided the family address but was unable to offer any other assistance.

PRESSURE

The cost of Irene's treatment to date has now reached around 1.5 million baht. Although the hospital director says that her care remains a priority, he is under pressure to find the resources to provide Irene with the care she

Irene is unable to feed herself or get out of bed, and she is prone to bouts of delirium, spending much of the time in a confused state. Nurses say she could live a long and happy life with the right support from her family, but they are so overstretched dealing with daily admissions that they simply do not have the time to attend to her needs fully.

Full Moon Party to shine: Local officials say that recent reports in the national press that the government plans to end the monthly Full Moon Party on Koh Pha-ngan are "exaggerated".

Janjok Piriya Sathit, head of the Tourism Authority of Thailand on Koh Pha-ngan, said that comments made by the Minister of the Interior after a visit to the party were simply among a number of suggestions that also in-

cluded creating entertainment zones and introducing protected environment areas on the island.

"Local business people have worked hard for many years to promote this island internationally," he said. "That work cannot be destroyed by a single opinion. The world has changed, and we have to understand this and come up with ideas that suit the situation. The Full Moon Party is a truly international gathering that greatly benefits not only these islands, but Thailand as a whole."

Piphit Ratanarak, of the Surat Thani Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor), echoed K. Janjok's sentiments. He told the *community maga*zine that it would be difficult to cancel something that has been both popular and successful for so long. He also suggested that the opinions and ideas of local people should be considered before any changes are made as to how the party is run.

K. Piphit's comments were based largely on the Full Moon Party's reputation as a drug-fueled event and on reported damage to the local environment. He says local people are more sensible than to allow such issues to

"The people of Koh Phangan know what's best for their island," he said.

"If the problems were as serious as some people claim, they wouldn't let the party go ahead. The financial benefits for Thai tourism are considerable here. We have to consider the issue carefully, and consult people who rely on the party for their

"Closing the party down would be like throwing a rock into a pool. It would send ripples throughout the Thai tourism industry."

Out with drought: The Surat Thani Provincial Waterworks Authority recently received a budget of 905 million baht in government money to spend on projects to ensure that Samui, Koh Pha-ngan and Koh Tao do not experience water shortages.

Five projects are planned for the three islands, with 300 million baht of the budget earmarked for Samui. The largest slice, 420 million baht, has been allocated to Koh Pha-ngan, which is currently experiencing a drought – the islanders currently have access to the public supply for only short periods each day.

The rest of the money will

Teenage convicts: Surat Thani Prison has more teenage inmates than any other provincial jail. Most of them have been incarcerated for underage drinking, illegal drug use or fighting.

Preeda Ilasuwan, Director of Surat Thani Prison, says that the government's War on Drugs campaign is committed to solving the teenage problem in Surat Thani.

Wayward teenagers are now being sent to Vivathpolmuang Army School, where they undergo intensive behavioral and discipline training.

Their attendance will help to reduce the prison population, and 90% of teenagers who attend the school show an improvement in both attitude and life skills.

They also leave the facility with a greater sense of community spirit.

K. Preeda added that although the school is proving effective, better family care would significantly reduce the number of inmates in the Surat Thani jail.

South African-born Rory Byrne has what many people would consider to be A Very Nice Job; he is the Chief Designer for Scuderia Ferrari Marlboro, the Italian legend's Formula One racing team. The *Gazette*'s **Andy Johnstone** (left) managed to catch up with the great designer before he left his Phuket home and returned to the

Ferrari stable in Maranello to prepare for the Grand Prix of Belgium at the Circuit de Spa-Francorchamps – one of Mr Byrne's favorite circuits.

ndy Johnstone: You've been involved in motorsport for more than 30 years. Had you planned it that way?

Rory Byrne: Well, it was not what I had in mind when I was at university – reading chemistry and mathematics. After graduating, I was chief chemist at Kolchem until 1968 although I had always had an interest in motorsport.

We used to enter a Ford Anglia in races and were quite successful. I was more interested in the mechanical side of things, though. A few of us set up a specialist motorsport equipment supply company, importing performance parts.

AJ: The Ford Anglia again. Ian Mitchell, who lives here and competes in endurance car racing, began with an Anglia. What was it about them?

RB: They were tough little cars and although slow by today's standards, with their 997cc engine and four-speed gearbox, were quite quick back then, even in unmodified form.

Another advantage to racing Anglias - in fact, all Fords was that Ford was very keen to offer support in the way of parts, for example. I suppose that racing road cars has always been one of the best advertisements for a manufacturer.

And of course I would visit Kyalami, the venue for so many great Grand Prix.

AJ: But you moved to the UK to become professionally involved in motor racing around 1972, a couple of years after your fellow countryman Jody Scheckter. Why?

RB: Britain was – still is, in fact – just the place for anyone involved in motorsport to go. Six of the top 10 F1 teams are based there.

The UK has such a diversity of motorsport, which is not to say that Europe doesn't, but in the UK, there is everything from karting to hillclimb, world-class rallying to touring car races and of course Formula Ford, Formula 3000 [which replaced Formula 2 in 1984] and F1.

The country is still a magnet for motor racing, and these disciplines are still the proving ground for successful F1 drivers, although I don't think that a Formula Two or a 3000 champion ever won the Formula One Championship.

AJ: You were designing racing cars by this time.

RB: Drawing on my knowledge as a mathematician I became chief designer for Royale Formula Ford around 1973 or

And then in 1977, I met Ted Toleman, the owner of Toleman F2 team, and joined his team as designer. We did quite well for the next few seasons - coming second in the 1980 F2 championships – and made the switch to F1 in the 1981 season, running the







Da Crims reach for da sky

mooth as a freshly tailored Shantung silk suit and as slick as a sea of oil – or a South American cocaine baron – the Fun Lovin' Criminals are the epitome of New York cool.

Bag of Hits: 15 Inter-global Chartstoppers is what could be the coolest cut of the year, Da Criminals' greatest hits performed by Huey and the boys from their first faltering, pennyloafered steps with The Fun Lovin' Criminal to their supermodel swooshes of Bump and Big Night Out.

Big Night Out – and those readers of a sensitive disposition should look away now – deals with the vacuity and hypocrisy of fashionistas who go straight from sipping green tea to a line of Bolivian marching powder: "Face like a saint, sucking like a sinner. Cocaine makes you thinner."

The boys are not what one could term politically correct; every other word rhymes with "duck" and the "Parental Advisory: Explicit Content" sticker is firmly stuck to the cover. Mind



you, it is emblazoned across a photo of an ample bosom.

They sound misogynistic, violent and drug-crazed, but it's pure theater; their blend of Latino rhythms, hip-hop, rock and blues is laden with satire and wit, and has its tongue very firmly stuck in its cheek.

Huey, Fast and Steve tackle drugs, homophobia, ambition and sex dreams in their music, and even organized crime with *The King Of New York*, a rap about the late John Gotti of the Gambino er... syndicate.

"He losing his grip, man, like Pesci, he'd flip, And you talk to his brother he says he always planned this trip... La-di da-di, free John Gotti." Yes, that's a reference to Joe Pesci, the actor famed for his portrayals of psychotic mafiosi.

Glamorizing crime?

Any such criticism should be directed toward a certain US (where else?) TV company that is currently screening a "reality" show called *Growing Up Gotti* (you can also catch it on Star World), about the late Dapper Don's bling bling family.

Da Crims are nothing more than a Vegas house band come good, a repeat joke that's begun to drag a bit, though in fairness, they have stayed funnier and cooler than most one-trick ponies.

Bag Of Hits shows the waning of the laughter and smoothness.

Yet Scooby Snacks, about robbing a bank, still sounds as fresh, fantastic and festooned with four-letter words as it did on its release nine years ago.

Witness: "I walked up to the teller, I gave her the letter. She gave me the loot with puckered up lips and a wink that I found cute, and I said, 'Baby, baby, baby. Is this some karmic-chi love

thing happening here baby or what?""

But newer material, such as Run Daddy Run and Swash-bucklin' In Brooklyn, are instantly forgettable and actually sound dated.

There is, however, no disputing Huey's brand of class and style. Keen-memoried readers may recall his appearance in the BBC Children In Need charity single, a cover of Lou Reed's *Perfect Day*.

Some 29 major performers, including Reed, each sang a phrase or two from the song.

Robert Cray sings, "I thought I was someone else, someone good."

Huey, looking for all the world as if he has just doubletapped somebody, follows this with a skeptical "Yeah."

Some of the tracks may feel a little tired, but *Korean Bodega* is as raucous as ever, *Love Unlimited* is still a sexy piece of weirdness, and the opener *The Fun Lovin' Criminal* still places you firmly in a Brooklyn bar after hours, no matter where in the world you happen to be.

True jazz classics that snap, crackle and pop

he second selection for this review is *About Jazz IV Various Artists*, from Nova Records. *About Jazz I, II* and *III* were good, but Nova has pulled the stops out on this album, filling it with as good a collection of jazz standards and related genres.

From Glenn Miller & His Orchestra's *Moonlight Serenade* to Perry Como singing *As Time Goes By*, this is an uplifting album that demonstrates true classics can be as alive today as when first recorded 60 or more years ago.

Those who want the crystal-clear sound of DDD recording can look elsewhere. Although the tracks have been remastered, some of them have more snap, crackle and pop than a bowl of Rice Krispies. They are all in glorious mono, too.

But so what? This is all part of the attraction. Yes, Mr Waters, we do remember Vera Lynn, and "The Forces' Sweetheart" delivers *Over The Rainbow* on this 18-track compilation.

Dame Vera's rendition remains a delight despite – or perhaps because of – the background noise, because that is how it would have been heard. It is an authentic, not a clinical, sound.

One of the highlights is Nina Simone's definitive and heartwrenching 1959 version of *I Loves You Porgy*, from George and Ira Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess*, the first and perhaps only truly great American folk opera.

This was to be Dr Nina's only US Top 40 hit. A combination of her strident outspokenness on civil rights issues and her op-



position to the war in Vietnam led to her falling from favor in her home country until the 1980s. As Ms Simone said, "Jazz is a white term to define black people. My music is black classical music."

Another iconic figure, Marilyn Monroe, also features on About Jazz IV. Although the song in question, My Heart My Belongs To Daddy – younger readers may have heard ex-Spice Girl Geri Halliwell murder the song recently or the frankly sinister rendition by Marilyn Manson – from Let's Make Love is not one of the best she recorded, she sounds as coquettish as ever.

"My name is Lolita, and er... I'm not supposed to play... with boys! Moi?" she teases.

Another female icon on this

album is Marlene Dietrich, who enjoyed adulation from both Allied and Axis forces in World War II, with Cole Porter's *Easy To Love*. The charismatic German chanteuse huskily breathes her rendition, conjuring up images of decadence and femmes fatales.

About Jazz IV is a timeless snapshot of a classic era, and as

eople motoring from Kata to Nai Harn or vice versa are bound to notice two adjoined roadside bars straddling the hill directly above Kata Noi Beach.

They're wooden affairs, rather ad hoc, and bear all the markings of that most ubiquitous of nocturnal sights in Thailand – the dreaded (in more ways than one) Reggae Bar.

Incredibly, Small View Point and After Beach have been up there in the clouds for seven and 10 years respectively, and are something of an institution for west coast folks as *the* places to stop off for an early brew or five before carrying on to Sin City.

We arrive at 5:30 pm and settle in for a beer at the left-hand side bar, Small View Point.

Punters sit in a long line on the sea view side along wooden benches. Silhouetted against the evening sun, they gaze out at the ocean, occasionally peeking down at the steep drop beneath their feet.

With a ready-made hangover like that, it's best to go easy on the Chang beer and to drink lots of water.

There's a distinct "couples" feel to the place, with lots of cuddling, giggling and whispering going on. Although when I try the romantic angle with my *ti-rak* I get the "not-in-public" hiss and a quick but merciless series of rabbit punches to the kidneys.

After I've wiped the dust

off my chinos I struggle to my feet and have a look around. Reggae bar it most certainly is, with the obligatory Jamaican-hued handpainted surfboard sign, two clunky guitars and a set of bongos in the corner.

Oh, and there's Bob Marley galore both here and next door, so much so that after we finish our beers we Get Up, Stand up for our Rights, asking ourselves Could we be Loved.

At the After Beach bar I Shot the Sheriff on the way in but there was No Woman Crying as I Did not Kill the Deputy.

It's a far cry from the world of Dickens up here on Kata Hill, yet it would appear that Marley's ghost is alive and well. As the sun sinks into the ocean, hundreds of feet below a gentle swell laps up on the beach, neon-lit fishing boats head out to work, and parallel to us a lone brahminy kite rides the thermals on its way back to the nest.

To the north, Koh Pu stands in the hazy distance like an overgrown

tropical castle guarding Kata Beach, while in the bar all eyes and roughly 500,000 baht worth of Samsung, Canon and Nikon





hardware face westward to where the orange disk is slipping into the metal gray briny.

You don't get many spectacles to rival Phuket's greatest free show – the sunset.

This is the real Phuket. No catastrophic concrete carbuncles, no schmaltzy shopping malls, no sleazy signage, no

corny showbiz – just Mother Nature at her best, with a Caribbean twist.

The lights start to flip on as 01-8943750.

The drinks are inexpensive and the romantic sunset is free.

we order another round and some simple bites. Is this Love, Is this Love I am Feelin' as I Stir it Up? (my drink, that is.)

Khun Jinda of the After Beach bar says that her clientèle comprises 35% Thai and 65% *farang*: after a stroll around the large bar I'd say that a fair slice of that 65% is made up of bewildered-looking visiting males taken up Kata Hill by ladies of a very friendly persuasion indeed.

The other *farang* contingent consists of young, trendy and tanned people who all have one thing in common: they just *lurve* a cocktail at sunset.

As for us, we're having a fab time enjoying the breeze, the chatter and the welcome change from Bob Marley to Wyclef Jean, even though he's growling *No Woman No Cry*—is there really no rest for the wicked?—when all of a sudden I take a look around and ... everyone's gone.

After Beach bar and Small View Point are one kilometer from Kata on the hill to Nai Harn and are open from 10 am until late, seven days a week. Prices at the two bars are 50-70 baht for beers, 140-160 baht for cocktails and 60 baht a pop for fruit shakes. Small View Point Tel: 01-3972329; After Beach Tel: 01-8943750



Terroir-ists are missing the point

hen used directly pertaining to wine, terroir is a French word that roughly means, "The contribution of soil, climate and environment to the unique taste of locally produced wine, as distinct from that produced elsewhere."

This is my definition. There is no direct translation of *terroir* into Thai or English, although any French usage will always refer to soil or land: think *terre* (earth) or *terrain* (soil).

Terroir and its relevance to wine quality is the subject of much debate among wine professionals and critics. Some argue that where a wine is made is the most essential factor in its quality; others claim it is the skill of the winemaker or the individuality of the grape variety that is paramount.

The etymology of terroir is interesting. Even today one rarely encounters the word in French dictionaries, and many French people are unfamiliar with the term. The earliest usage I can find dates from the late 1940s. From then until the 1970s, terroir referred exclusively to the quality of soil. Given that the French traditionally used soil classifications as a way to rank wine quality, this is understandable.

However, in the 1970s scientists began to demonstrate conclusively that climate in a vine-yard and its soil's ability to retain rainfall had a greater effect on wine quality than soil alone. Once science had dispelled the notion of soil alone determining wine quality, the definition of terroir was gradually expanded to include just about everything – from the compass direction of

wind in a vineyard to the types of insect that float through the air there.

Yet, after decades of further research there still is no conclusive evidence that the chemical composition of soil directly contributes to a wine's quality. Nevertheless, it is still true that wines made from grapes grown in certain places can be distinctive, so critics continue to argue over terroir's role in accounting for inherent quality.

I believe that the argument should not be about the role of terroir, but whether such a thing as terroir actually exists. Having worked in winemaking and studied wine most of my adult life, I know that the direction of wind in a vineyard and the types of insect that waft through the air are important to a wine's quality.

Seemingly inconsequential matters, such as how many leaves are on each shoot on a grapevine, have profound effects on wine style and quality. Moreover, all these matters interact, and their many possible outcomes are so numerous as to be incomprehensible.

The "unknowability" of wine is its great mystery, and is also the reason why the more people learn about wine the more they realize how little they understand. Wine is unknowable because everything matters.

In some far distant time, wine may ultimately prove to be knowable, but not by the habitual and unenlightened mind.

The concept of terroir misses this point entirely, and therefore ultimately fails to honor the mystique of wine by trivializing it in a way that is quite unintended.

Goodwood Marches on

he Earl of March – Charles to his friends – owns the sprawling Goodwood Estate in southern England. Goodwood has a popular horse-racing track which holds around 22 highly profitable meetings a year; the historic Goodwood House, which is open to visitors and features many works of art and interesting antiques; and the new Rolls-Royce greenfield assembly plant, all within his vast 12,500-acre grounds.

But it also has a fully restored race track, Goodwood Cir-

Last used in anger back in the 60s (Stirling Moss had his career-ending accident at Goodwood in 1962), the circuit now hosts the Goodwood Revival meeting every September, where motor racing celebrities are encouraged to adopt period dress and bring along a fine selection of historic race cars.

DREAM

The Revival meeting is the only event that places motor racing into a carefully choreographed historical backdrop, and came about after the tremendous initial success of the Goodwood Festival of Speed, generally held each June, immediately after the Le Mans 24-Hours.

The first Revival was in 1998 and was described at the time as "a dream come true" for Charles March, whose grandfather, the 9th Duke of Richmond, first opened the circuit at Goodwood in 1948.

The circuit was active until 1966, hosting such classic events as the Goodwood Nine Hours race and the celebrated Tourist Trophy sports car challenge, although it remained a testing venue for some years afterwards. New

"The Revival is theatre," says Charles March. "The circuit is dressed up like a huge film set, and that includes the competitors and spectators. At the inaugural event people were not quite sure

about dressing up in period costume, but now almost everybody is dressed in some 1950s creation."

Stars expected at this year's Revival include former Le Mans winner Jackie Oliver, Sir Stirling Moss, 1996 world champion Damon Hill, recent Indy Racing League winner Dario Franchitti, Sir Jack Brabham, Finland's '60s rally star Rauno Aaltonen, and former Grand Prix driver Gerhard Berger.

Alan Jones, the 1980 Australian F1 world champion, is down to drive a Ford Galaxie 500, while diminutive French former Formula 1 driver René Arnoux will drive an Alfa Romeo GTA. Should be good viewing.

Those spectators who are star-spotting will no doubt be on the look-out for rubber-faced comedian Rowan Atkinson, who will be behind the wheel of a Mercedes-Benz 300SE in the St Mary's trophy race.

Classic aircraft also make a welcome appearance.

As well as cars and classic bikes, aircraft make a welcome appearance at Goodwood during the weekend.

Nearby Tangmere was an RAF airfield during World War II, and visitors can also expect Spitfires, Hurricanes and P51 Mustangs to be buzzing the cir-

Mind over massage

t's not easy to run a successful spa business without a captive audience of hotel guests to bolster business but Body & Mind Day Spa has managed to do very well by building up its clientèle through good old-fashioned word of mouth and by making sure its service is of the highest quality.

Body & Mind opened about a year ago in Phuket Heritage

Plaza at Karon Beach, not far from the Karon Circle. It has proved to be every bit as popular as the spas at five-star hotels, yet Body & Mind delivers the spa and treatment goods at a fraction of its larger rivals' cost.

Stepping inside, the decor is deceptively

simple but a closer look reveals that a great deal of thought has gone into making sure the spa is color-coordinated and the textiles match perfectly. The furniture and decor lend a warm feel to the place and the natural "woody" touch is cleverly exploited.

There are four treatment rooms with eight beds, 10 Thai massage beds and 12 foot massage seats with 13 therapists available everyday. Body & Mind



has fully trained therapists whose skills are updated regularly.

The products here are all natural-based formulae made from local fruits, herbs and plants, all designed to help attain and maintain a balanced, healthy skin.

In order to accommodate clients' needs, the spa has recently added more treatment rooms as well as a sauna, a steam room and a salon.

Araya Limpanudom, the

spa's owner, explained that although she has done no advertising, her business has grown because of positive reports on the grapevine.

Almost all of the spa's customers are tourists or expatriates, with figures dividing equally between Western and Asian tourists and, I must say, the place seemed busy during my visit.

Body & Mind offers free transport for customers in Patong, Kata and Karon.

The cost of spa treatment here starts from 400 baht for a foot massage to 3,450 baht for a top-end package.

K. Araya suggested I indulge in the "Secret Jasmine Rice" package which takes three hours and costs 3,000 baht. The package included a body scrub with organic jasmine rice, an aromatherapy massage and a jasmine rice extract facial.

The treatment room featured two beds and a bathroom and was possibly the cleanest place on earth. Everything was spic and span and what wasn't being used was wrapped up safely in plastic.

After I had taken a shower, K. Thom, my therapist for the next three hours, applied a warm towel to my feet and went for the pressure points before she started the scrub treatment.

And what a treatment! She used crushed rice for an hour to scrub the whole of my body. The delicate aroma of jasmine filled the air and made me feel at one with nature.

After the scrub I took another shower and yes, my skin was much softer and smelled of jasmine. I usually prefer a medium-strength massage – otherwise I feel tired afterward – but I was surprised at this one as the smell of jasmine along with a good massage made me feel totally relaxed for the entire hour.

The last hour consisted of facial therapy. I especially enjoyed the 20-minute face massage. K. Thom is a naturally gifted therapist; her two hands worked together like a machine and I could tell that she was very experienced at this. After the massage she applied a toner followed by a milk powder mask for another 15 minutes.

After five minutes, when the mask started to harden, my cell phone rang and believe me, it's extremely hard to hold a conversation in a face mask that's as hard as rock.

However, after K. Thom cleaned off the mask I could feel that my skin was much softer than before.

And it didn't end there – she applied eye gel and a little make up, which I appreciated as I didn't feel "naked" going out into the sunshine, totally unprotected from UV rays.

After finishing the whole package I was served fresh orange juice and fruit.

he American detective novel is a thing of beauty with an honorable tradition going back to the 1930s West Coast, with Dashiell Hammet's Sam Spade and Raymond Chandler's Philip Marlowe, and moving into the 1960s with John D MacDonald's Travis McGee in Florida and Robert B Parker's Spenser in Boston.

MacDonald is my own particular favorite, his battered hero living aboard a houseboat in Fort Lauderdale with various lovers but always one constant friend – the eccentric economist Meyers aboard the houseboat next door. Over two decades, 1964-1984, the series ran for 21

novels and I happily read them all.

and features, your parents, and even your child. It could all happen and you would never even know it. And then one hot summer's night you just erupt and go burning and shooting and nobody seems to know why."





hey're everywhere these days – roads that don't go anywhere: new concrete roads, heading off into rubber plantations, only to come to a dead end with no apparent destination in sight.

I wonder if this trend could start a new approach to finding new pieces of land for sale. Take a lazy drive one afternoon and look for signs of old motorbike tracks through rubber plantations being widened.

It could be fun and profitable, spending a day driving on the road to nowhere.

Statistics show business booming

From the Phuket Gazette, issue of September 15-30, 2000

PHUKET: Business in Phuket is booming this year, if the latest figures from the Provincial Revenue Office and the Commercial Registration Office are any guide.

Statistics covering the tax collected in the first 10 months of the 1999/ 2000 tax year show that the number of businesses paying tax has risen by 10.91% and that they are making money - the total tax paid by these businesses has soared by a spectacular 55.14%, from 317 million baht to 492

At the end of July this year, there were 5,991 registered businesses in the province, a 13% increase on the same time last year. In the first seven months alone, 474 new businesses were registered at the Phuket Commercial Registration Office, a 20% increase on the 395 registered in the same period last year.

Offsetting the taxman's gains in company profit taxes was a drop of 22.34% in personal income tax collected, from 559 million baht to 434 million baht. This is despite the fact that the number of people paying income tax was almost the same as last year. Possibly, this indicates that higher-paid

employees have been leaving to set up their own businesses, and are being replaced by lower-paid staff.

Veerachai Tantiwathanavallop, director of the Phuket Commercial Registration Office, says there is a continuing boom in the property sector, with some 60 real estate companies being registered in the first six months of this year.

"Property always tops the list of

business registrations, and most of these new companies are created by foreign investors, to allow foreigners to buy property."

He added, "This boom in real estate businesses is to fulfill foreigners' demand for homes in Phuket."

Major growth was also seen, predictably, in the tourism sector, with a continuing spate of registrations of hotels, travel agencies, dive shops, bars and restaurants.

Internet and computer companies also registered a hefty increase, with 35 new companies registered in the first half, up by 50% on the 22 registered in the same period in 1999.

Armed Robberies Plague Chalong

CHALONG: Police efforts to crack down on rising crime in Phuket Town have been nullified by an agile gang of teenage thugs who, faced with higher police numbers in the city, have simply moved their operations to the sparsely patrolled areas out of town.

While police have called in forces from outlying areas in a show of manpower, three violent attacks on small markets in the Chalong-Rawai precincts early last month have left them scrambling for a plan of action.

Manus was alone in his shop at about 8 pm on August 5. Three young men on a motorcycle pulled

into the small grocery on Chao Fah Rd near Phuket Country Home, a quiet rural neighborhood three kilometers from Chalong Circle. Mr Prasopmit, who assumed they were there to take shelter from a heavy rain, described them as "lanky and aged not more than 20." He says that they all wore blue jackets of the type that mechanics wear.

"They just looked like regular kids to me," says Prasopmit. "I invited them to sit down at a table and wait out the rain, but they said they would just as soon stand. Since they didn't want anything, and since it was about closing time for me, I started to put away the small cakes and sweets that were on the table."

Suddenly, according to Prasopmit, one of the hoodlums seized him from behind and put a gun to his temple. A struggle ensued and Mr Prasopmit was struck violently on Prasopmit, 50, the head. The gun shattered, apparently a toy, but the shop owner was dazed and ceased to put up a fight. He was later hospitalized for two days and his wounds required stitches.

"I wanted to keep fighting with those punks, but after they hit me with the pistol, my eyesight was fuzzy and I saw stars," he says. While one of the attackers continued to hold the shop owner, another raided the cash drawer, removing a little over 1,000 baht. They took nothing else from the store.

"They were very cool, these kids," he says. "They waited for about five minutes before they got around to robbing me." Mr Prasopmit estimates the whole incident did not last longer than about 10 minutes.

About three hours after the events at Mr Prasopmit's shop, Somboon's House Minimart at Rawai, across from the Sea Gypsy Village, was hit. Four teenagers on two motorcycles arrived there and two of them went inside.

"Have you closed yet?" one of them asked. When the shopowner replied "No", one of the thugs put a knife to his throat while the other levelled a pistoi at nim. There was no one else in the store and the victim didn't try to resist. The robbers made off with cash, a gold necklace and a bracelet – altogether worth an estimated 30,000 baht.

At press time, police said they had no leads. In an attempt to put the area's shopkeepers on guard, however, they called a meeting and advised participants to take precautions against the bandits. They were told to close up shop earlier than usual, and to avoid being alone in the shop around closing time.

Legal casino could bring social disaster

Yet again Bangkok has resurrected the idea of allowing a legal casino in Phuket (as opposed to the five illegal ones allegedly already thriving on the island).

The idea is not new; this particular kite has been flown – and shot down – a couple of times since Thai Rak Thai came to power. Now, however, it is being fitted with new wings.

In today's CEO Paradise, where decisions are weighed according to their perceived economic merit, the decision initially seems a no-brainer, especially when the country's business rivals, Hong Kong and Singapore, are adding new attractions for tourists - the newlyopened Disneyland in the former and, sometime in the near future, two legal casinos in the latter.

Thais, instead of throwing away their money in Cambodia or Myanmar could do so at home. Their money would stay in Thailand.

Casinos would also be an extra attraction for vacationers with a yen to turn fat wallets into slim ones. Indeed, people who have never before considered taking a vacation in Phuket might do so if they knew gaming was on offer.

The local economy would receive a boost, both in terms of the amount of money circulating and jobs created. National and local governments would benefit from another source of tax revenue.

The trouble with this view is that it takes no cognizance of the social costs of gambling. There can be few people in Phuket who do not know someone who has ruined his or her family through gambling, which is one of Thailand's most common addictions.

The government already legitimizes and benefits from two other addictions - tobacco and alcohol. Tobacco use causes huge health problems, while alcohol – in the wrong hands – can ruin lives and destroy families.

The Thai government, like those of countries worldwide, is "addicted" to revenue from the sale of these two dangerous products.

Perhaps, then, it should also legalize and tax the use of another great bane of Thai society, methamphetamine (ya bah, or the "mad drug"). As with casinos, this would make economic sense.

There are many other possibilities: brothels, pornography, gunrunning and human trafficking, to name just a few. All of these highly lucrative underground businesses, if legalized, would accrue major economic benefits to the government.

Potential economic benefits aside, the government would be presiding over a social disaster by legalizing gambling. Thailand should not be swayed by what its neighbors are doing, and simply copy - The Editor

Mortgages for foreigners may be the top of a slippery slope

et's start with my understanding of the situation. I think that banks are in the position of looking for new customers who have spending power, and this is why they have targeted foreigners who want to buy condominiums


They say that foreigners can borrow only 50% of the purchase price, and have to repay the loan within 10 years. This means there is a low risk to the bank yet the mortgages boost the number of potential customers.

Bangkok Bank stands to profit from this new initiative, and the bank says that it will bring in hard foreign currency, which is better than lending Thai baht.

I believe it will be difficult for Thai people who want to buy condominiums, because banks will naturally trust foreigners more than Thais. This is because banks grant mortgages to foreigners on easier conditions than they do to Thais. In order for Thais to obtain a loan they must present collateral.

I also believe it will affect the price of condominiums in that they will get more expensive, just as land on Phuket became dearer when foreigners grabbed it. Wherever foreigners buy land costs rise, and if we compare the US dollar to the Thai baht, you can see that our money is weak against theirs.

Even right now foreigners are buying land in Thailand, but in the name of anonymous Thai partners – and this creates problems. I think in the future they'll



angkok-born Dr Sirichai Silapa-archa has Dlived in Phuket for almost 20 years. He is Secretary of the Phuket Chamber of Commerce and a doctor of urology at Wachira Phuket Hospital. He is well-known for being outspoken and for airing his opinions publicly. In 2002, along with the former chairman of the Parliamentary Committee on Labor, Khon Kaen MP Premsak Pearyura, he attended a meeting held to voice support for the notion of limiting the number of foreigners in Thailand by raising the initial work permit fee from 300 baht to as much as 300,000 baht. The Gazette interviewed him on the topic of the Bangkok Bank offering mortgages to foreigners who want to buy property in Thailand. We asked Dr Sirichai what he thinks might happen as a result of this development.

be able to buy anything they want to, such as privately owned condominiums, in their own names while owning the land in the name of their Thai partner or company.

There is one thing I'm scared of. Even though the banks say they use overseas money for loans, they sometimes use Thai baht to lend to foreigners. This could be damaging as no one is the wiser as to which currency they're lending.

If foreigners can own large properties or land in the name of their Thai company, they will have the same rights as Thais, and there will be no limit on the length of time a foreigner can lease a property. There will be a lot of legal difficulties, and it may even jeopardize the security of the country.

We have seen that some Caribbean islands have become dominated by foreigners because of tax breaks and lax laws. I also feel that when foreigners doing business in Thailand own property or land they will not take the same care of it as they would in their home country. It's possible that they might invest in a business or factory that could pollute the environment or dabble in genetic food modification.

However, I believe we still have many good foreigners in Thailand, and there are those who truly love this country. I'm not saying that all foreigners are bad.

Thailand is a very free country, but it will lose out a lot if we allow foreigners to own land. If we want to let foreigners have similar rights as Thai people they

should pay premium rates for the privilege. That means that, as a foreigner, if you want to own something you should have to pay more than Thai people, and that would be fair. If foreigners bought everything at "Thai prices" then we simply could not compete with them, and Thailand would be bought out from under our feet.

For example, if foreign companies were allowed to invest in local businesses and go into direct competition with Thai companies, the Thai firms simply could not compete and would lose out. There isn't anywhere in the world that allows this to happen. We ourselves have to go through difficulties if we invest abroad, but Thailand seems to favor foreign businesses and foreigners are granted special rights by the government. I think we should help Thais first, because if Thai people can't do business in Thailand it means the country will be taken over by foreigners.

Many times we complain about roads being so narrow, and there's sometimes not enough water and electricity, but I think the local administration should rethink the tax system to collect a "staying fee" from foreigners living here.

We could use that money to develop our infrastructure, and foreigners would benefit from this, too. I believe they should accept this because the money will be used to improve everything. Some foreigners argue back, saying that they're working in Thailand and are taxpayers, but they don't have Thai ID cards.

Why do they leave roads unfinished?

Earlier this year workers installed storm drains on both sides of my street, which is off Chao Fa West Rd, in Moo 10, in Chalong.

Now the work is finished but the middle of the street is still very muddy, and when it rains it's like a swamp.

I expected the workers to seal the street surface with asphalt, but they didn't.

I called the construction company and they told me that the work is complete. They also said that the local authority, the Chalong *OrBorTor* (Chalong Tambon Administration Organization) does not have any plans, or the budget, to seal the street with asphalt.

I think this situation is not acceptable – every time it rains I have muddy shoes, dirty clothes and mud all over my car. I would like to know how and when the situation can be resolved, and I no longer have to battle with mud. Andrea Kotas Chalong

Opas Chobdee, Assistant to the Deputy President of Chaiong *OrBorTor*, replies:

The budget for this project came from local taxes levied on Chalong residents. This money is spent on projects throughout the district, some of which are more important and must completed first.

This year, the budget that was approved for fixing and installing drains was not enough. Next year, we will ask for 900,000 baht to fix that section of road.

In the meantime, we have laid down stones so there is no dust if it is not raining and it's not muddy when it is raining.

The road will certainly be fixed. Please be patient.



Hotels brace for the great comeback

PHUKET: The island's hotels are recruiting more staff as the high season approaches in a move that shows faith in a strong comeback for the local tourism industry.

Boonchock Maneechot, head of the Phuket Provincial Employment Service Office (PESO), told a recent employment fair that hotels around the island are looking for more than 6,500 staff.

"After the tsunami, many hotel employees found new jobs [in other sectors]," K. Boonchock said. "However, there is room once again for more hotel and tourism staff during the coming high season."

Morakot Sudtar, Director of Human Resources at Evason Phuket Resort & Six Senses Spa, told the Gazette that the resort advertised 17 jobs at the PESO-organized employment fair and that 10 people applied during the two-day event.

'We choose [to employ] those with natural qualifications best suited for the relevant position. Some positions need spe-

cific skills, some need extensive experience, while others need the ability to supervise. Some need English-language skills and a suitable attitude for a more personal touch with a service mindset, such as waiting staff and guest relations officers," K. Morakot said.

'We don't mind too much about academic degrees: we try to put the right applicant in the right position. Educational background shows that that person can learn the job or is a fast learner, but attitude is the most important requirement for us. We don't mind whether they're graduates or not because when they come to us, we train them in our methods."

Phurida Intrachai, soon-to-be Human Resources Director at Evason, pointed out that even though the resort had not been affected by the tsunami in terms of structural damage, it suffered in much the same way as other resorts islandwide when the number of visitors to Phuket plummeted.

'We didn't lay off any staff after the tsunami; in fact we have still been hiring, and since the beginning of this year we've our hotel occupancy is 50% and this coming high season we already have bookings of up to 70%. I believe that Phuket is getting back on track," K. Phurida said.

Many hotel and resorts in Patong were so badly damaged by the tsunami that they had to close, with the result that staff found themselves without work.

Vipas Nimmanee, Human Resources Director at Holiday Inn Patong, said, "Some of our positions needed new staff because people had found new jobs during the renovation period, but most of our staff returned when we reopened. For a while the hotel was operating with only 140 rooms, but now we are announcing more [staff] vacancies to anticipate full reopening in November with 405 rooms."

He said there are 20 vacant positions: in food & beverage, housekeeping, front office and in the technical sector. Most jobs need one to two years' experience with good English skills.

Yet, as at the Evason, the Holiday Inn does not specifically seek out gradu-

taken on more than 30. At the moment ates, but rather recruits those able to respond successfully to in-house training.

> "The hotel's occupancy this month is 85% and we have advance bookings of 60% for November," K. Vipas said. "Of course we're hoping for more. I think many Phuket hotels will be back to normal."

> Somsak Phetpradapsakun, Personnel Manager of Patong Resort, said that the resort reopened on April 1 and that current occupancy is 60%, with up to 80% advance bookings for the high season.

> "I think that many hotels and resorts in the Patong area also need more staff because of the tsumani's long-term effects. It's really not surprising that the PESO fair showed more than 6,500 staff are needed," K. Somsak said.

> Frances Dileva, Director of Personnel Development at Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa, was at the PESO fair.

> "We advertised 27 jobs, and many people were interested," she said. "As for qualifications, it depends on each position. For example we do need people with good English for guest contact positions."

An ill wind blows through the Federal Reserve

urricane Katrina, the storm that caused such damage to New Orleans and surrounding areas, was obviously a major disaster and has led to many financial observers and economists predicting that its aftermath will play a major role in causing the US Federal Reserve (Central Bank) to pause in its cycle of interest rate increases when it next meets on September 20.

But while the Fed may pause for thought, it is extremely unlikely that it will not announce a 0.25% increase in base lending rates. There are several reasons. Economic growth is still strong, and the Fed is concerned that inflationary pressures are still in evidence. It also does not want to give the impression that it has some knowledge about the future prospects for the economy that are highly negative.

Fed, Alan Greenspan, was almost flippant about there being a bubble in the housing market three months ago, but his recent comments show that he is now tak-

ing this issue more seriously. It is estimated that Hurricane Katrina has caused around US\$100 billion (about 4.1 trillion baht) in damage. This figure, being a broad estimate, will obviously be subject to future revisions. Washington has already set aside US\$10.5 billion to help in rebuilding, and other substantial sums will follow.

Insurance and re-insurance companies from many countries will probably have to face claims in excess of US\$25 billion.

There will also be an in-The Fed is also worried crease in unemployment claims from the affected areas, at least temporarily.

> However, there is no doubt that this will shortly lead to a rapid rise in construction and related industries, and that this will cause

an increase in regional economic activity from the fourth quarter of 2005 onwards.

The reality is that the area hit hardest by the storm is not the economic heartland of the US, and the greatest impact on the overall national economy will be from interruption of some oil and natural gas supplies and of river transportation along the Mississippi.

Regional tourism will suffer for a considerable period, but from a national perspective this is of marginal importance.

Old Mutual targets Skandia: A number of readers have investments and policies with the Skandia group, including Skandia UK and its direct subsidiary, Royal Skandia. Many will be aware of rumors that have received wide coverage in the media over the past few months of Skandia targeted for takeover by South Africa's largest assurer, Old Mutual (OM).

The formal offer by OM for the whole Skandia group came at the beginning of September. The amount involved is US\$6.1 billion (about 250 billion baht). The managing director of Skandia UK has said this offer has yet to be considered by Skandia's board of directors.

The business television channel CNBC has reported that OM – although it now has a stockmarket listing on the London Stock Exchange, where it is a member of the FTSE 100 Index – is "desperate" to increase its international income since 78% of current revenue originates from South African operations.

Large South African companies, although they will never admit to this fact, are all keen to expand their operations outside the country.

It makes business sense for them to do so, but there is another factor involved: hard-headed business managers realize that in the coming decades there is a good chance that South Africa could follow in the footsteps of the rest of Africa – to economic oblivion.

Reports suggest that, although OM has made a bid for the Skandia group, it is not interested in Skandia's Scandinavian operations. Nordea, the Norwegian banking group, has been cited as a party that might be interested in acquiring these assets.

What OM really wants is Skandia UK; OM itself already operates in Britain, and is the fastest-growing company in its sector. Skandia UK, however, probably has little interest in being bought out by OM, and this has led to speculation that Skandia UK may attempt a management buy-

OM's intentions towards Royal Skandia, the Isle of Manbased international group, are also uncertain. OM has had extensive experience in the offshore arena. In 1986 it acquired a small, Guernsey assurer called Providence Capital International, which it later re-badged as Old Mutual International.

For the next 18 years it tried to make a success of this company, and failed. It finally stopped

end of this spectrum. It is not only profitable but is also the largest of the tax-haven-based assursituation has led to speculation that if the OM bid is successful it may then wish to sell Royal Skandia.

The second largest company in this market is Friends Provident International, a wholly owned subsidiary of Friends Provident, a UK-based assurer, which is being tipped as the most likely buyer.

However, the offshore market contains some very wellknown assurance groups with deep pockets.

Policy holders and investors with the Skandia group need have no fear for the future, no matter how this scenario plays out. The reason the Skandia group is a target is its success.



Saphan Hin to host martial art world championship

PHUKET CITY: The International Pencak Silat Federation (Persilat) will stage the 13th World Championship of the Malay martial art at the Saphan Hin sports complex from December 10-18 next year. Up to 500 athletes from 25 countries are expected to take part.

The competition will be split into four categories: Tunggal [singles], Regu [doubles], Ganda [teams of three to five competitors] - all of which are self-defense bouts - and Ulara Daga, in which two fighters attack one

The top three in each category will receive trophies and medals.

Persilat President Eddie M Nalapraya met with Vice-Governor Niran Kanlayanamit on September 6 to ask for permission to stage the competition here, following a decision by the Persilat congress on August 2.

"We are pleased that this event is being held in Phuket," V/ Gov Niran said. "The province has experience in staging many

international events, and this tournament will be one of many sports events [that help] to promote Phuket.'

Thailand hosted the 8th Pencak Silat World Championship in Songkhla in 1994, with more than 20 countries represented. Indonesia came first with five gold medals. Thailand was second with four.

Aussies to defend their Laguna triathlon titles

CHERNG TALAY: Australians Craig Alexander and Nicole Hackett will return to defend their men's and women's champion titles in the 12th THAI Airways Laguna Phuket Triathlon on December 4.

The two Aussie pros are among the 250 athletes who have already registered for the event, compared with about 150 at this time last year, said Debbie Dionysius of organizer Laguna Phuket.

"Last year was the biggest [Laguna] triathlon to date with 600 entrants.

"This year we are looking at limiting the number of entrants to 700 by keeping the number of three-person relay teams to about 35, in order to preserve the quality of the event," she said.

"When there are too many entrants, the starting line gets very crowded."

Ms Dionysius said that the past year has seen an explosion in the popularity of triathlons in Southeast Asia – especially in Singapore, where the number of athletes competing in major triathlons has jumped from hundreds to thousands.

This year the triathlon,

which will start at 8 am, will be held on a Sunday instead of the traditional Saturday because the following day, December 5, is a national holiday to celebrate HM The King's birthday.

Entry to the event costs US\$120 (about 4,900 baht) and includes entry to the pre-race Pasta Party and the awards banquet, as well as a competitor's Tshirt and race kit.

Race registration will be held from 10 am to 4 pm on December 3, in the Andaman Ballroom at the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket. Athlete attendance is compulsory, and entrants must bring identification to claim a race kit with timing chip, race category and number, swim cap, T-shirt, and other items.

A mandatory course briefing in English, Thai and Japanese will follow at 5 pm, also in the Andaman Ballroom.

The closing date for entries is November 13.

Top finishers will be offered one of the 25 guaranteed entries to the 2006 Ironman Australia, the highly coveted spots going to the highest-placed finishers in each age group who declare their intention to accept them.

Entries will be allocated based on the number of entries per age group, and there are no Ironman Australia qualifying spots for pro athletes. The allocation procedure for the 2006 Ironman Australia will be finalized during race week and posted at the race office.

In addition to the main event, a fun run will be held while the triathletes are completing the cycling course.

Some 200 people have already registered to take part in the fun run. As runners must complete one lap of the six-kilometer course before the tri-athletes return, competitors must be aged 12 or older and the number of entrants is limited to 400.

The fun run will start at about 9 am, and all competitors must register in advance.

Golf holes that are unintentionally heroic

Jon Morrow's article on Heroic Golf Holes (*Gazette*, September see any heroic holes on Phuket. 10) was very good. I think he captured the essence about what is right and what is wrong with golf holes on Phuket.

I, for one, believe a "heroic" hole should have the risk and reward he mentions, but that it should also have a safe path whereby anyone can make par. It is not a heroic hole if the safe player has to fight the challenge on every shot while the hero only has to face it once.

This, as he stated, gives much too great an advantage to the longer-hitting player. In addition, as he also said, the landing area should be free of all hazards (the golfer already has to take an extra shot).

this letter. In defense of these bad the case of Tiger Woods, only an holes, I believe that they were designed as three-shot holes but became heroic holes because of advances in equipment design and manufacture.

Jon mentioned the 13th at Augusta, a very simple par five. Anything off the tee, lay-up to 80-100 yards, and sand wedge to the green. No problems until you reach the short flip shot and the creek is not wide.

They went back to Baltusrol and gave a young member, with a one handicap, a club similar to the one Nicklaus used. He averaged only 180 yards. This suggests that the heroic holes were not designed to be heroic: it is equipment that is changing the game.

This change is being driven and not by the game itself.

if anyone believes that equipment has not changed the game, I have a Persimmon driver (with a "silver" shaft which I think is steel), an original Taylor Made driver and what was called a deep-faced graphite head (almost 210cc, with a graphite shaft in it that weighs almost as much as the steel thing).

Jon is welcome to try and see if he thinks these holes are heroic or just difficult three-shot holes. We can probably dig up some 25-year-old irons, too.

have never been much of a fan of lurkers. I'll concede that the LA Lurkers is a damn fine basketball team, expert that I am, but I'm not aware of any of them lying in wait outside nightclubs and famous restaurants waiting for personalities to emerge.

All most celebrities really want to do is to be able to go home anonymously without being hassled, and then quietly get on with their lives. Or maybe they don't. Many must secretly crave someone to take their picture, thereby making them more famous and

helping them to make even more dosh in the long run.

But the last thing they really want, I mean *really* want, is for someone to pounce from the bushes and snap them when they're least expecting it. Celebs lead hard lives. Some days they even have to invent ways of spending all that money, but I seriously sympathize with them on the lurkers front.

FURTIVE

My dictionary defines a lurker as being someone or something that moves or waits furtively, or waits in a concealed position or a shadowy corner, especially with the intention of doing something wrong. I can't argue with that.

I'm not sure if there are that many plants in the world that have similar sinister intent, but there are a few that nestle themselves in the corner of your garden, keeping to themselves, just waiting for the right time to pounce.

The Jacob's Coat plant, or huu-krataai in Thai, is one of them. It will lie in wait enthusiastically, then spring up without warning.

Outside my house some time ago, a gang of workers descended unannounced, and built a concrete road on a dirt track, laying waste to all plant life in their path — or so it appeared. Just about the only survivors beyond my garden wall several weeks later were a few Jacob's Coat plants which sprouted from nowhere, stubbornly refusing to be swallowed up by the all-consuming concrete. Some time later, and they were back in full stride.

One of the downsides to this particular plant is the speed at

which it grows. It's mental. Leave it a few days and it will inevitably become straggly. Leave it a few weeks, and it can take over whole sections of your garden. Once it's bored with lurking, it needs to be kept in check, and regular amputations and uprootings of whole plants are the only answer.

Jacob's Coat, also known as fire dragon, copper leaf or beefsteak plant, comes in a great variety of colors, but frankly, the flowers are rather uninspiring.

They are tiny and somewhat insignificant in comparison to the rich, colorful array of leaves, and seem to have been included in the package as a bit of an afterthought.

This is a particularly colorful tropical shrub which is usually grown for its attractive leaves, but also because it has so many variations, and is by no means predictable.

Its amazing foliage comprises shades of purple, red, crimson, pink and colors that could almost pass as bronze or copper. Perhaps this could be "the plant with the copper-colored top"?

These colors can even change according to how much direct sunlight they get.

Some plants will complain bitterly if they don't get exactly the right amount of sunlight, but not the Jacob's Coat – it is far more sophisticated than that. It changes color. Some leaves are orange or red in the full sun, yet often more subdued tones of green in the shade. Generally, the more sun they get, the more striking the color of the leaves.

The evenness of the leaves can also vary from plant to plant. Some are completely flat, albeit with weird colors. Others look a bit like Pringles, the potato chips you get in those tubes. Then there's another type that are folded like Chinese fortune cookies. These things really don't like to conform.

Originally a native of the East Indies and the Pacific, Jacob's Coat is one of the most striking shrubs around and is widely used by tropical gardeners – not just here in Phuket, but all over the region.

Some grow as tall as a couple of meters, but most are quite happy just to sit there on the ground, covering what would be a tedious little patch


otherwise be a tedious little patch of soil.

With well-drained earth and plenty of sun, the Jacob's Coat will cover any corner of the garden you're not sure what to do with, but give it an inch and it will take a mile. It needs discipline.

Never have I seen the Jacob's Coat pounce on an unsuspecting celebrity, camera dangling from its stalk. On reflection, it probably isn't a lurker in the truest sense of the word – this one has principles.
