Mom Tri plans to open school

College to be similar to Chiang Mai's Prem Center

KATA: Famed architect and developer ML Tridhosyuth Devakul has unveiled plans to establish a new International Baccalaureate (IB) school in Phuket.

Mom Tri, as he is widely known, was speaking at the groundbreaking ceremony on October 6 for the Villas Grand Cru, a new residential project in the Kata Hills.

In 2001, Mom Tri founded the Prem Tinsulanonda International School (Prem Center) in Chiang Mai, an IB school with a student body of around 400.

Various sites are being looked at in Phuket for the school, planning of which Mom Tri described as being "in the early stages" and subject to a feasibility study. He did suggest, however, that a 600-rai parcel of land near the Trisara resort in Cherng Talay is a likely contender.

APPROACHED

Mom Tri said that when Dulwich International College – now the **British Curriculum International** School (BCIS) – was experiencing difficulties earlier this year, a number of parents of pupils approached him to suggest that he develop an IB school in Phuket along the lines of the Prem Cen-

He said that negotiations are currently taking place with Pamela Kelly-Wetzell, the Director of Phuket's Horizons Learning Center.

Mrs Wetzell confirmed to the Gazette that "active discussions" are taking place, and added that the results of the negoti-

ations could involve a merger between Horizons and the Prem Center, with current Horizons pupils studying at the proposed

She said that although they are very much on the drawing board, initial plans for the school – which would eventually take as many as 680 students – include an "integrated community" with the school as its heart, as well as a residential development, sports facilities and a library.

Mrs Wetzell said, "It is my plan to offer a full IB program and school, which means the [IB]

Primary, Middle and Diploma Programs for children from three to 18 years old.

The IB is the cutting-edge international curriculum these days, and it's also the one that's in place at Mom Tri's Prem Center in Chiang Mai, so I think it would be a good 'fit' for our two schools to get together in some

"These things are very fluid, but both parties are discussing possible development plans and designs for, hopefully, [construction to start] late next year," she said.

Bar busted for underage male prostitution

PATONG: Kathu Police raided the Uncle Charlie's Boys nightclub on Soi Paradise on the night of October 8 and arrested two employees on charges of procuring, including arranging the provision of sexual services by boys under 15 years of age.

The bar owners, a fatherand-son team, were later arrested on six charges, including violations of the Penal Code and Labor Act.

Police have also requested the Governor to close down the club permanently.

Pol Lt Pratuang Pholmana of the Kathu Police said the raid began with an operation by undercover female officers who entered the bar posing as customers seeking to buy sex.

SEXUAL SERVICES

In the bar they found some 20 alleged male prostitutes, some lined up on a dancing stage wearing only white shorts affixed with employee numbers.

Using banknotes with prerecorded serial numbers, the officers paid for sexual services from six boys under 18 years of age, including two 14-year-olds, and then made the arrests.


Police arrested Ritt Tangsab, 40, and Direk Jongchareon, 23, on procuring charges as defined in Section 282 of the penal code. When it involves prostitutes not over the age of 15, this is punishable by up to 20 years in jail; and fine of up to 40,000 baht.

The fact that the boys willingy engaged in prostitution has little bearing on the charges, including such Labor Act violations as employing service staff under 18 years of age and failing to keep personnel files, he said.

Briton, 33, jailed for dealing in Ecstasy pills

PHUKET: Briton Jason Crosby pleaded guilty to charges of possession of 50 *ya E* (Ecstasy) tablets with intent to sell and was sentenced to nearly seven years in jail and fined 390,000 baht by Phuket Provincial Court on October 5.

The court initially sentenced him to 13 years and eight months in prison and a 780,000-baht fine but, in accordance with standard practice, Judge Somsak Laksanasomboon halved the sentence because Crosby had pleaded guilty.

Crosby, 33, was arrested on April 22 last year at the Scott Bar in Patong by Pol Capt Pongsak Petchnongkhum, Deputy Inspector of Investigation of Police Region 8.

Capt Pongsak, who testified in the case, told the *Gazette* after the sentencing that he had arrested Crosby in a sting operation at the bar.

After Crosby sold 30 hits of ya E for 800 baht apiece to a man the police had pose as a buyer, Capt Pongsak, who was working undercover, moved in and made the arrest.

"He admitted that the drugs belonged to him and that he had smuggled them into the country from Britain.

"When we searched his room on Nanai Rd we found 20 more tablets in a large bottle.

"Based on the large size of the bottle, I actually think he smuggled in about 1,000 pills. We also found a lot of other drug paraphernalia in his room," said the officer.

Crosby immediately began serving his sentence at Phuket Provincial Prison, where he has been in custody since his arrest, the court having denied his attempts to get bail.

The time already served since his arrest more than 17 months ago will not be deducted from his sentence.



New banknote issued to commemorate the abolition of slavery

BANGKOK: The Bank of Thailand will launch a new 100-baht banknote on October 21 to commemorate the abolition of slavery in Thailand 100 years ago.

The side of the banknote featuring HIVI King Bhumibol Adulyadej will remain unchanged. The reverse side, however, will feature a picture of HM King Chulalongkorn Rama V, who reigned from 1868 to 1910, standing above the slaves he freed.

The launch will come two days before Chulalongkorn Memorial Day, on October 23.

Businesswoman murder probe draws a blank

PATONG: Police say that so far there has been a lack of concrete results in their hunt for the killer of Nilasnuch Tongnun.

K. Nilasnuch, 27, was gunned down while chatting with her uncle and neighbors outside the Ericsson Guesthouse on Patong's Nanai Road on the evening of July 8.

Pol Lt Col Boonlert Onklang, of Kathu Police Station, told the *Gazette*, "We have conducted a search of our files but have not come up with matching fingerprints. We have also investigated the cellphone number [the suspected gunman] used to speak to one of the guesthouse maids. It turns out that the suspect used a non-registered SIM card. We have written to AIS [the telephone company] asking them for information on the number, but they have not replied."

He said that he could not estimate how long it might take to track down the murderer.

K. Nilasnuch, from Udon Thani, was shot four times by a gunman wearing a full-face motorcycle helmet. She was hit in the chest, in the left shoulder and twice in the back. The killer was then driven away by an accomplice, also wearing a full-face helmet, on a blue Honda Wave motorbike.

After the murder, Pol Lt Col Boonlert Onklang, of Kathu Police Station, told the *Gazette* the victim had been planning to open a spa and silk shop in the new Jungceylon shopping complex in Patong. – *Athiga Jundee*

ernment's "bail insurance" and were released on bonds of 200,000 baht.

Police later arrested bar owner Tawee Kingjampa, 59, and his son Tiwa, 35, who were not in the venue at the time of the raid. They were charged with one violation of the Penal Code, for procuring, and five violations of the Labor Act. After an initial court hearing on October 10, both were released on bail, the amount of which was not disclosed.

Lt Pratuang said that the pair denied the charges and refused to comment further, saying they would speak on the matter only in court.

One of the arresting officers, Pol Maj Serm Kwannimit, said the arrest came as part of a government crackdown on bars that provide child prostitutes to customers.

Kathu Police Superintendent Pol Col Teeraphol Thipjaroen said an inspection of bars in Kathu revealed Uncle Charlie's Boys was the only one offering the services of underage male prostitutes.

Kathu Police have filed a request that the bar be closed permanently. The decision as to whether to close, and for how long, rests with the Governor, who has yet to inform Kathu Police of his decision.

SCAM ARTIST SPARKS KAMALA ALERT

KAMALA: Police are warning people to beware of a scam artist posing as an electrician after one foreign resident was bilked out of 1,000 baht by the man.

Pol Capt Pongnarin Sutin of Kamala Police Sub-District told the *Gazette* that a man posing as an electrician went to the home of a foreign resident and told the man's Thai wife that he was there to inspect the wiring in the house.

Capt Pongnarin said the couple, who live in a rented house, may have believed the con man had been hired by their landlord, which is why they allowed him to enter the premises.

After the cursory "inspection", the man demanded 200

baht for his services. After being given a 1,000 baht note, he departed swiftly on a motorbike without giving change.

The victims described the con artist as probably Thai, overweight, bearded, short-haired and wearing a red shirt. Police said that many Kamala residents had fallen for the same scam.

He warned residents to ask workmen for identification before allowing them to enter their homes and also to check with their landlords to confirm whether any work had been contracted and who was required to pay for it.

"In this case they lost only 1,000 baht – but they could have lost their lives," he said, reiterating that it was unwise to allow strangers to enter one's home.

When asked by the *Gazette* if there had been any progress in the investigation, Capt Pongnarin said, "We have notified both the Kathu Police and the Kamala Sub-District, but have been unsuccessful so far in our efforts to track down the culprit."

Cheaper landing fees for charters

PHUKET: In an effort to attract more flights to the island, Airports of Thailand (AOT) has halved landing fees for all international charter flights arriving at Phuket until December 31. The reduction lowers the cost for a Boeing

747 to a maximum of 25,000 baht per landing.

About 40 charter flights are expected to land in Phuket during the three-month period.

Most will be from Russia, South Korea and Scandinavia.




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Mystery surrounds bizarre death

PATONG: Bizarre theories surround the fate of Rassamee Pholrat, 22, from Udon Thani, who was found dead on the morning of October 5 at the Safari Elephant Camp on Siriraj Rd, between Karon and Patong.

Police have speculated that she may have been assaulted by unknown assailants who tried to rape her, and was then crushed to death by one of the elephants.

K. Rassamee was found with the right side of her chest and rib cage crushed and a blunttrauma injury above her right eye.

There were also injuries to her back and legs, consistent, police said, with her having been dragged along the ground.

Her body was found at 7 am by Sompong Pinthong, 28, and Sutin Pheta-wut, 37, both mahouts at the camp. Six elephants live at the camp, which closes at 5:30 pm every day.

She was clothed only in a brown singlet and one shoe. A pair of trousers, underpants and another shoe, all of which police believe belonged to her, were found near her body.

A small silk purse, also found near her body, was empty apart from four one-baht coins and two condoms.

Pol Lt Pratuang Pholmana, of Kathu Police Station, said that she may have been injured or killed before being dumped at the elephant camp. He added that the cause of death had not yet been established, nor whether K. Rassamee had been raped.

However, he added that K. Rassamee's parents refused to allow her body to be sent to Bangkok for more extensive tests, and had their daughter cremated on October 9.

Gov halts work on 80-house project

RASSADA: Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura and Muang District Chief Wirawat Janpen on October 5 went to Soi Siang Tai to order a halt to the construction of an 80-unit residential housing project on Toh Sae Hill, citing seven different building code violations.

Gov Udomsak said his inspection of the site followed complaints by Soi Siang Tai residents, lodged with the Damrongtham Center, which serves as the provincial ombudsman's office.

The complaints alleged that inadequate safeguards had caused flash-flooding and mudslides to the densely-settled area below the project during the heavy rains of September 18 and 19.

The mudslide passed though the homes of some residents, and floodwater blocked one of the two inbound lanes on Thepkrasattri Rd, onto which the narrow soi empties.

"A subsequent inspection found the project in violation of seven building codes aimed at environmental protection," the

Governor informed a project engineer, who agreed to halt work without argument.

The violations found were: • Failure to terrace the hill to accommodate building foundations;

- Failure to carry out piling work;
- Failure to construct a barrier wall to prevent mudslides;
- Failure to include a sediment collection pool for surface runoff;
- Failure to install zinc fencing;
- Failure to place metal plates over the gap at the project entrance to divert runoff away from the soi below.

The Governor added that the project had never been approved by the Rassada Tambon Administration Organization.

Despite the damage caused, and the Governor's own strong statements about cracking down on illegal developments, he said the project would be allowed to go ahead once the developer, **IN BRIEF**

Sales of gasohol soar in Phuket


PHUKET: Vichitpong Cheanthongsub, Petroleum Authority of Thailand (PTT) Phuket Depot Manager, told the Gazette that since September 16, when Phuket PTT gas stations launched gasohol on the island, some 80% of 95-octane gas users have switched to the new fuel.

He was speaking during a visit to the island on October 9 by Energy Minister Viset Jupiban, who stressed that gasohol saves users money and also reduces pollution. Gasohol is made up of pure ethyl alcohol derived from sugar cane, blended with gasoline in a 1:9 ratio.




In the room, investigators found evidence of used Viagra and stomach medicine in a bin.

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Much of the attention on Phuket's rehabilitation since the tsunami has focused on Patong and Kamala, but other parts of the island were damaged – though much less severely – and these, too, are well along with plans for improvements. **Sangkhae Leelanapaporn** looks at two of these areas: Chalong and Rawai-Nai Harn.

halong and Rawai are about to become more attractive for tourists thanks to new plans by the two areas' Tambon Administration Organizations (*OrBor-Tor*).

Although Chalong and Rawai are relatively quiet, many tourists go to Chalong Bay to board transport to outlying islands such as Koh Hei (Coral Island) or Koh Racha, or pass by Rawai Beach en route to Laem Phromthep, prompting plans to raise the profiles of these two areas.

In Phuket, the sea may beckon, but Chalong Bay's shallow water is not good for swimming and conceals dead coral below. It is seen, however, as a suitable place for a new yacht marina and a fishing pier.

Dechakanee Leelanont, Chief Administration Officer of the Chalong *OrBorTor*, explained that the proposed 300-berth Chalong Bay Marina, financed by the central government, will be built over an area of about 15 to 20 rai near the Kan Eang Restaurant

He said the main target market for the new marina will be boat owners who already favor Chalong Bay as an anchorage.

"I believe yachties will be happy to use the planned marina because it will be more comfortable than mooring out in Chalong Bay and it will be easier for them to come ashore than by dinghy. We plan to build fuel and water supply facilities there, too," he added.

"This is a long-term project. Although we requested a 70 million-baht budget, the central government allocated just 45 million baht.

"We are now developing the master plan and looking for a company to design it.

Expert Property Advice

"It will be less expensive than other marinas in Phuket because it will be governmentowned. We will send the master plan, expected to be completed in the coming three months, to the Budget Office in Bangkok, and request a budget increase.

"The government favors a state-owned marina in the Chalong area, even if there are already many private marinas around," K. Dechakanee said.

While the marina plan seems to find favor with Bangkok, this is not the case with the fishing pier. "We got 3 million baht from the government's tsunami recovery budget for a new pier in the Soi Palai area, near a mangrove forest, to replace one that

Chalong and Rawai to get a 45m-baht boost

Lake public park, improvements to the beachfront, a new 300-meter pier to replace one that was smashed by the tsunami and, biggest of all, a massive botanical garden, bigger than any in Asia.

The total cost for these projects, should they all be realized, will be well over a billion baht.

lion baht. A further 11 million baht has been allocated to develop the Rawai beachfront. This plan will include making a special area for food stalls at the south end of the beach, a promenade and a parking lot.

"We used to get a lot of complaints from tourists and residents about the number of vendors selling food on the beach, Sea Gypsy village at the north end of Rawai Beach. This will replace the old cement-and-wood pier, which was built some 30 years earlier. Over time it had deteriorated, and it finally disappeared with the tsunami.

"The cost of the new pier, about 300m long and 3m wide, is covered by a central government budget of 37.9 million baht. We received another 11 million baht from Governor Udomsak [Uswarangkura, which was given while he was visiting] Japan last month.

"The donated money was to be allocated as he saw fit and he chose to put it toward this project," K. Aroon explained.

A mooring will be created next to the pier for fishing boats and tour boats.

"We plan to have all the fishing boats and speed- boats moor over there because we would like to see the beach clear.

"The ropes that tie the boats to the shore at the moment make it difficult for tourists to enjoy a stroll on the sand," K. Aroon explained.

"There will be benches on the pier, where people can relax or fish," he said, "and near the pier, there will be shops where tourists will be able to buy souvenirs. That is expected to generate income for the locals."

At the end of this year, the *OrBorTor* will sign up a private contractor and the pier should be finished before high season next year, he said.

"We are looking for a contractor now, but it is difficult to find one because of the low budget," he said. Twice already, the *OrBorTor* has called for tenders, without any takers.

"We are considering whether to increase the budget or reduce the planned length of the pier because the cost of construction is so high now," K. Dechakanee added.

While the Chalong *OrBor-Tor* has proposed two projects, Rawai is pitching in with four – the nearly complete Nai Harn

Soros, President of the Rawai *OrBorTor*, told the *Gazette*, "The Rawai population, based on registration, is 12,000 people, but counting the number of expatriates and other Thai people who have recently moved to the area but have not registered, the population is probably about 40,000 people."

K. Aroon said the Nai Harn Lake park is nearly complete. It includes a playground and a jogging track around the lake. "Construction is already about 70% complete. I see that place as a hub for Rawai people to relax and exercise." Once complete, the park is expected to cost 40 mil-

"In the near future we can start to improve the beachfront," he added. "We plan to move all the vendors from their current temporary location and, later, develop a parking lot there. By far the biggest and most ambitious plan for the Rawai area, however, is a proposal for a horticultural garden similar to Singapore's Botanic Gardens, but much larger – as conceived by HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn.

The *OrBorTor* is seeking a budget of a billion baht for this project, to be constructed on 271 rai atop the promontory at the south end of Nai Harn Beach, where the three white powergenerating windmills now stand.

The biggest hurdle to this project is likely to be obtaining the necessary funds from central government which, in recent months, has been taking a scythe to just about every budget proposed by Phuket.

A handful of lead-tree leaves was found nearby. The neighbors said they had been used to lure the pig out of its sty.



Govt to scrap medical malpractice law

arliament has approved in principle an amendment to the National Health Security Act that would free doctors from medical malpractice liability.

The Act in its current form states that victims of malpractice should receive compensation from a fund earmarked for that purpose, the fund having the right to demand repayment from doctors proven to have been responsible for damage to a patient's health.

Even before it became law, doctors protested the Act and threatened to begin practicing "defensive medicine" if it wasn't removed from the statutes. They said the article left them professionally insecure and under constant risk of litigation.

Consumer rights advocates worry that the removal of the article will adversely affect patients' rights. They also point out that the proposed changes would free doctors at private hospitals from any liability for malpractice or professional negligence.

The Cabinet has long favored scrapping the liability statutes. Parliament is now finalizing details of the changes to the Act.

Pilot plan sinks: A pilot project to replace diesel oil with natural gas in fishing boats has failed, the Southern Fishery Association (SFA) said.

SFA Secretary-General Suraphol Seeprasert said an indicator of the project's failure was that the state oil and gas company PTT was unable to supply natural gas to two boats taking part in the project, intended to keep Thai fisherman at sea in the face of rising oil prices.

Another major obstacle the project faced was that it required considerable investment to replace oil tanks with gas tanks, and that most fishermen were not prepared to make the switch without financial support.

Brutal assault: After his arrest in Petchabun Province, a construction contractor who confessed to sexually assaulting a 14year-old schoolgirl in Lop Buri province and leaving her unconscious by the roadside said he felt no remorse.

Wirat Rakseenil, 37, said he became overcome with lust at seeing her cycling to school and forced her into the woods, where he hit her over the head with a stick "more times than he could count" until she fell unconscious.

Dr Supoj Samritwanicha, Director of Yanhee Hospital, said the girl would survive the injuries, which included a broken jaw and smashed cheekbones.

"The attacker probably tried to rape her but could not," he said, adding that no seminal fluid was found in her vagina despite bruising to her pubic area.

A police re-enactment of the crime had to be canceled when some of the 1.000 angry

onlookers began hurling rocks and bottles at the accused.

Domestic front: On "World Habitat Day" some 2,000 Thai slum-dwellers converged on the UN Building in Bangkok to protest forced evictions of 33 slum communities to make way for large infrastructure projects.

At a seminar held in the building the same day, Deputy Prime Minister Surakiart Sathirathai said Thailand had set a goal of building one million houses for slum people within three years, in line with Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's pledge to rid the kingdom of slums by 2008.

Anna Tubaijuka, Director of the UN's Habitat agency, praised Thailand's solution to the slum problem, saying it would transform slums into urban communities. She also praised the government for its non-violent practices.

During the protest, a scuffle broke out between the protesters and security forces outside the building; no injuries were reported.

Toy store: US retailing giant Toys 'R' Us will open its first Thai branch in the Central Bang Na shopping mall in Bangkok, a company official said.

The store will become one of the US\$11-billion New Jerseybased company's 1,500 outlets worldwide. The company is market leader in both the United States and Japan.

Store operator Toys Retailing (Thailand) was established last November with registered capital of four million baht. Thai shareholders hold a 70% stake in the local company, with foreigners owning the remainder.

Diving for justice: The Pattaya Court acquitted British diving instructor Paul Cryne on charges of murdering compatriot Robert Henry, whose bullet-ridden body was found in a ditch outside Pattaya in October 2003.

Henry's girlfriend Wilai Chiewcharn, a 26-year-old former bar hostess, had claimed Cryne killed Henry because he was jealous and wanted her for himself. Police said they found Henry's blood in Cryne's car, which he had suspiciously sent to a garage to be re-upholstered shortly after the murder.

Neither Wilai nor a foren-

sic expert appeared to testify at the trial, the last day of which the public prosecutor also failed to attend.

Cryne, who is listed in the Guinness Book of Records for becoming the first person to ever complete a 24-hour underwater swim, was sent back to prison to

await a decision as to whether to appeal the verdict.


Ambitious plan: Ministry of **Education Permanent Secretary** Kasama Varawarn na Ayudhya said a new strategy to promote Mandarin and improve the teaching of the language would soon be submitted to Education Minister Chaturon Chaisang for approval.

The plan calls for each educational district in the country to have at least one high school with a Mandarin class by 2007, and for all high schools to offer classes in the language by 2008.

K. Kasama said the government would help the schools with regard to Mandarin teachers and teaching materials during the first three years. After that, she said they would have to start running the Mandarin classes on their

On the weekend of October 7-9, there were demonstrations of the island's traditional professions – fishing, tin mining and agriculture.


From October 14-16, visitors get the chance to sample a huge variety of local cuisine from street-side food stalls, as well as in the restaurants along these three sister roads.

he second Koh Samui Music Festival (KSMF) took place from September 23 to October 2, with artists arriving from all over the globe to play at the largest public event ever held on the island.

Big Thai names like Sek Loso and Modern Dog flew the musical flag for Thailand, entertaining audiences with their home-grown talents.



to enjoy the sound of two of the genre's legendary bands.

Staging KSMF 2005 required a serious feat of planning and organization, combined with sizeable investment and co-sponsorship from the likes of Bangkok Airways and the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT).

As a well-received international event, it has placed Samui firmly on the musical map, and will hopefully also establish the island as a venue for other worldclass performances in the years to come.

Island casino near Samui? During recent discussions with the Mayor of Samui, the Minister for Tourism and Sports raised

the idea of an entertainment complex and casino that would be located in the Gulf of Thailand, not far from Koh Samui.

Originally, the government had proposed to build three such centers, one in Pattaya, one in Phuket and one on Samui, but because of Samui's size and stage of development, the Minister now feels a nearby island should be chosen.

Both the mayor and the head of the TAT office on Samui, Panuk Woramit, agree in principle with the proposal.

They feel that illegal gambling is already a huge problem, with many people traveling to Myanmar and Laos to play with lady luck.

Legalizing it would, it is thought, remove some of the hidden dangers, as well as generate tax revenue for the region.

A casino would not deal with the gambling problem at a local level, but once an appropriate island is chosen it seems certain to transform the archipelago still further into a mainstream international tourist destination.

CD copyright arrests: Officers from the Criminal Investigation Department in Bangkok conducted a series of checks for copyright infringement on Koh Samui on September 15.

From a total of 11 locations, four establishments in Chaweng were found to be selling illegal or pirated CDs and DVDs. The police confiscated 7,000 discs worth around 100,000 baht and also arrested three people.

At one CD stall where police found pirated discs, local shop owners challenged the officers' right to confiscate CDs while the owner was absent.

As a small crowd gathered, neighboring stallholders tried to block the officers and a confrontation ensued when police refused to stop the search.

During the scuffle, a police captain apparently drew his pistol and fired warning shots into the air. This later prompted accusations of excessive force, from two women who were standing close to the officer and who claimed that he had threatened them with his handgun.

The officer denied the allegations and said he had all the correct identification papers and a search warrant, which gave him every right to prevent the situation from becoming more serious.

Samui's Chief of Police is conducting an inquiry into the incident. Meanwhile, the police say they will continue with the clampdown.



FLOYD ON ON FORM

t was John Donne who, in his *Meditation XVII*, said, "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent."

Some 400 years later, "Will Freeman" (free man, geddit?) in the novel *About a Boy* – by Britpack writer and chronicler of male obsessions Nick Hornby – riposted by saying, "I am an island. I am bloody Ibiza!"

Whether one considers this to be utter Balearics or not, it isn't easy to say which island Keith Floyd – known generally as "Floyd" – would be.

In fact, Floyd, who was born in Somerset, southwest England, in 1943, would not be an island, but, rather, an archipelago.

Ireland would also be part of the chain, as of course would the British Isles. A few of the islands dotted around the Norwegian fjords would be thrown in for good measure. Madagascar would be there too, as would a whole host of Greek and Mediterranean islands.

Going further east, one can add Koh Samui, Malaysian islands and Hong Kong, for all of these destinations have featured

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Keith Floyd is one of those people traditionally introduced as "...a man who needs no introduction". This can be quite helpful to a writer, as Floyd – to give him his usual appellation – tends to avoid pigeonholing himself as a chef or a restaurateur, and woe betide anyone who calls him a "TV celebrity chef". Eschewing this tradition is the *Gazette*'s **Andy Johnstone**, who met him over lunch and a pleasant bottle of wine recently at the Burasari Resort in Patong, when the cook and traveler visited Phuket to see how the development of his brasserie in the Burasari Jungceylon was progressing.

in Floyd's books and TV series on the subject close to many people's hearts – food.

Floyd explains that his first foray into the creative side of food, after a brief stint as a journalist in Bristol, was when he joined the British Army on a Short Service Commission.

He was not, however, doling out the ubiquitous "mystery fish" as a "cabbage mechanic" – as members of the the esteemed Army Catering Corps are occasionally known – but was, in fact, "canned veg", another way of saying he was in tanks.

"I was actually a 2nd Lieutenant in the 3rd Tank Regiment, deployed in West Germany and equipped with Conquerors [the contemporary British Army main battle tank].


"Joining the Army just seemed the right thing at the time," says Floyd. "Although I became bored of the food that was served up in the Officers' Mess, there's no truth in the rumor that I used to dive behind a stove in the Mess kitchen and rustle up gourmet dishes."

"All I did was to suggest to the cooks that instead of serving 'lamb and two veg', that they experiment a bit and produce Gigot d'agneau Romarin. And it worked."

Anything to prevent a Compo Anaconda, after all.

Floyd acknowledges that his progression from armored vehicles to AGA cookers was not a typical one, especially 40 years

"Back in the middle '60s, England didn't have a lot to offer in terms of food. Many people didn't have the opportunity to travel abroad a great deal, but when I was posted in Germany, I was able to quite comfortably go



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to France, Holland or wherever and discover a variety of foods that didn't exist in the UK.

"I said to myself, 'This is what I want to be involved in when I get out [of the Army].""

The well-traveled Floyd, dapper in – among other things – a bow-tie and a pair of ostrichskin shoes, says that after he completed his commission, he set out on an enforced apprenticeship of work in any kind of hotel, restaurant and bar.

"I forced myself to be a short-order cook, bottle-washer, barman... anything, until little by little I built up my skills and was able to open my first restaurant in Bristol, around 1969 or '70," he says. "And I've been involved in food and its allied subjects ever

Floyd is happy to see that in the 35-odd years since his first restaurant, Britain has diversified its appreciation and enjoyment of food from around the world.

STYLE

He attributes much of this to Britain's multi-ethnic society, the relative ease that more people have to travel abroad, and the popularity of cookery programs on television. "But I have no time for the cult of the celebrity TV chef," he warns.

At first hearing, this may sound hypocritical – even a case of biting the hand that feeds coming from a man whose popularity and fame has been spread around the world via that medium, as well as through books, for 21

Floyd's style, however, remains different to that of the celebrity chef. At one and the same time, he takes his food seriously while not taking himself too seriously.

His style of cooking in TV shows may appear to be haphazard, similar in a way to the broad-

is cooking on a beach in India – before he appears again looking calmer.

This is the result of him deciding that the ingredients were not quite so good after all, and that a minion needed to be dispatched to buy better ones.

The camera, more often than not operated by "Clive", occasionally gets in the way, usually as Floyd is throwing something into an already-steaming wok, resulting in the lens steaming up. Floyd often has a glass of something refreshing and alcoholic close to hand, too.

Once, while cooking ostrich stew in the Drakensberg, South Africa, he was besieged by what else? – a depilation, as AA Gill calls it, of ostriches.

Through 19 TV series and 22 books, Floyd's casual style has won him fans around the world, whether he has made a TV show in a particular country or not.

From Latvia to Israel and from Hungary to, of course, Thailand, his shows garner viewers as much for his ready wit as well as his appreciation and respect for the places where he is cooking, the ingredients and the people he meets.

The opening of Floyd's Brasserie, which will be in the mammoth Jungceylon developnow scheduled for next February.

"It will be an immensely exciting project, my first one outside the UK," Floyd says.

"It was first due to open in February this year, then, of course, was sadly delayed by the terrible event that took place here, and all the havoc that created," he

He foresees that the mixture Jungceylon will bring to Phuket, and Patong specifically, of a self-contained mini-metropolis amid the hustle and bustle of the island's nightlife playground, can only be a good thing.

No stranger to Phuket and Thailand – he has been visiting the country for at least 15 years - he says, "I've just returned from Beijing, where they have such centers, which can be centers of excellence if developed properly, where the major beneficiaries are not just visitors or shoppers or diners but the local people, who will gain from a huge number of job opportunities.

"I visited [Jungceylon] yesterday, and in my view – not as a retailer but as a restaurateur or cook – I can see it happening here."

Floyd says that Phuket was chosen as the site for his brasserie "...because we love it here".

"My wife Tess and I now have the valid excuse to come here even more, not just sitting on the beach but actually contributing something [to Phuket]."

The energetic Floyd's enthusiasm for cooking seems not to have diminished in the two decades of hosting his television shows, nor in the nigh-on four decades of being involved in

In addition to the brasserie in Phuket, two new books, Floyd's China and Floyd's Thailand, are set for release in November 2005 and 2006 respectively. A new TV series, Floyd Around Pakistan, will be broadcast in the UK in the Spring of 2006.

Although he has tackled Scandinavia with Floyd's Fjord Fiesta – "The old jokes are the best ones," he says... "And it worked," adds Tess - the suggestion is made to him that another series could be filmed in, say, Antarctica.

The title is even presented to him, Floyd on Freezing. He raises an eyebrow and says, "Now that's an idea..."

Summing up Floyd – and his style – is perhaps best left to Marcel Boulestin, reputedly the first TV cook, who had a show entitled Cook's Night Out on the BBC back as far back as the 1930s.

Boulestin, who died the year Floyd was born, once said, "Cooking is not chemistry. It is an art. It requires instinct and taste rather than exact measurements."

That is Flovd's inimitable style down to a "T".

Back pain:

nyone who has ever experienced severe lower back pain knows the meaning of the word misery. I suffered from chronic back pain for most of my adult life, from my university days all the way into my late 30s.

The pain ranged from periods of stiffness to complete incapacitation. I remember having to lie on the floor – sometimes for up to a week – dreading the agonizing knife-in-the-back shooting pain that would accompany a sneeze or any other sudden movement.

No medication, no matter how strong, came close to alleviating the pain, which was turning me into a cranky old man before my time.

Even when the pain was less severe, I knew it could flare up at any time. It was like being stalked by the Grim Reaper. When the back pain was at its worst, I even wondered what the point of living was.

Desperate, I tried everything to try and make it go away: Thai and Western chiropractors, hydrotherapy, even yoga. But even as my flexibility improved to the best it had been in years, the back pain remained.

SAVIOR

My savior came in the form of a traditional Thai masseuse – but not in the way you might think. Noticing that it took me about a minute to work my way down into a prone position on the massage bed, she asked what the problem was.

"It's back pain," I snapped, "and I am not here expecting you to cure it. So you don't need to crack my back or do anything else that will add to the misery."

It was then that she uttered

the magic, if comically direct, words "Phrao waa mai mee toot, ka" (It's because you have no ass). As she started rubbing my feet and toes, relaxation set in and I began to consider what she had said.

It was true. I had no ass, or at least I had a pathetically small one for my 189-centimeter height. I started thinking of the people I knew who also suffered from back pain. Most of them had small butts, too.

My thoughts then shifted to the people I knew with big posteriors – and here I mean naturally big, as opposed to just lardbottomed. None of them ever seemed to complain about back pain. It was then that it hit me: it was time to get some ass.

It dawned on me that this was to be the type of ass-acquisition exercise that couldn't be as easily accomplished as making a trip down to Soi Bangla.



the bottom line



As the muscles strengthen you may reach a point where you need to put your hands behind your head.

It was going to involve a well-researched effort. But, determined to get this evil monkey off my back, I eventually discovered the one exercise that strengthens the lower back, butt and hamstrings like none other: hyperextensions.

Most gyms have some kind of hyperextension apparatus, most commonly a set of two pads included as part of a universal bench from around the navel.

If you suffer from back pain, avoid these like the plague. The hyperextensions I describe here need to be performed on a flat bench, one which you can brace your legs around so that your feet and legs can firmly support your upper body, which should be suspended off the also suitable for a wide range of

Most flat benches in hotel gyms or sold in department stores are unsuitable. They are too low, not long enough, and do not have the bottom legs positioned in such a way as to allow for the correct grip. (see photos)

I designed my own bench to do hyperextensions, but it is

other free-weight exercises. It cost 1,200 baht and was built by a company in Songkhla that turns pickups into *songtaew* buses, as they had both the welding capability and their own cushion-making team.

I consider it the best investment I have ever made in my

Hyperextensions are as simple as they are effective provided that they are performed correctly. It is good to cushion the two bench legs against which your feet will be braced, as otherwise it can be painful.

I did this by simply duct-taping some old sport socks around them.

First, lie face-down on the bench. Just put your hands on the floor as if you are doing a pushup and do a controlled fall, until your head is hanging down at about a 90° angle.

Then, using your back, butt, hamstrings – and arms as necessary – try to raise your upper torso back up to the horizontal po-

Don't try to be Superman. Think of this as a strengthening and stretching exercise at first. Make sure you feel some tension in your lower back and butt, but not too much.

Over time, as you get used to it and as your back strengthens, you can start to experiment with your leg grip, thus shifting emphasis onto your upper hamstrings, which also need to be kept strong if you want to keep back pain at bay.

Later, when you can do 12 repetitions (reps) comfortably, with no arm assistance, try crossing your hands behind your butt and do as many reps as you can before going back to the push-up position.

Given practice – and as the muscles strengthen – you may even reach a point where you need to put your hands behind your head in order to get the correct tension in your back.

When you get to this point it may be time to start thinking about other back-strengthening exercises, such as deadlifts and lunges. You might want to consult a professional fitness instructor for these, however, because they can cause more problems than they solve if they are performed incorrectly.

CAUTION

One note of caution. hyperextensions are really a misnamed exercise. You do not want to overextend past the position that your spine would be in were you standing normally. Your goal is to do away with back pain, not join a Chinese acrobat troupe, right?

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

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
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ot so many years ago holiday visitors to Phuket who wanted a great meal or bottle of wine had to cook it themselves or bring it with them. A defining moment for the island came when the Amanpuri opened and early quality restaurants, such as The Boathouse and Baan Rim Pa, opened their doors.

Today, Phuket's wine and dining scene bears little resemblance to its past. Many exciting new restaurants and wine purveyors have enhanced the dining scene; the gourmand society Chaîne des Rôtisseurs now has a local chapter, top winemakers fly to Phuket to present their latest vintages, and enormous wine cellars stocked with the best vintages grace many villas.

Still, there is a lingering feeling among many that the island's food and wine scene should be better than it is, and that Phuket's reputation as a sophisticated destination might be unwarranted when it comes to dining.


Many insiders acknowledge – off the record – that the public lack food knowledge or interest in cuisine, and that perceptions are often based on price rather than quality.

The challenge, the insiders claim, has always been for restaurateurs to motivate themselves to improve, despite being able to get along doing less.

Those with a more optimistic view point to an accelerating

rate of change in the past few years.

Robert Falls, General Manager of Silk Restaurant & Bar, says, "Phuket used to be a backwater wine and food destination, where the chance of getting a decent glass of wine was remote. That's changing now with the arrival of more affluent expatriates from Asia, Europe and the United States.

"Expectations are increasing, and guests don't mind paying more for quality."

Long-time resident and wine connoisseur Neil Cumming, founder of Phuket Dot Com, says he is happy to live in Phuket where "...the food offers quality and tremendous value at every level, from five-star gourmet of-

ferings to local favorites. Sure, wine isn't cheap — unless you compare it with dining out in Europe, the UK, Singapore, Hong Kong or Japan.

"We are totally spoiled. Thailand is tops for wine and dining," he adds.

Not everyone is so flattering. David Hamilton, Executive Chef at Trisara, says forcefully that many Phuket restaurants, whether Western or Thai, disappoint by turning out "average-to-terrible food".

According to David, "Many Phuket restaurants provide great seaside settings to dine in, but would fail in an instant in Western countries due to their poor service, quality and badly thoughtout menus. "These places are usually run by people who are in it for the money."

Critics of Phuket's dining scene also point a finger at advertising's role in influencing restaurant reviews.

David is to the point: "The fact that a restaurant critique is determined by how much advertising you do is damaging Phuket because it does not help to improve the general quality of the food here, nor does it hold any weight with expatriates.

"They, like me, have read the reviews and know better."

Theera Kanjana, Director of Food & Beverage at JW Marriott Phuket Resort & Spa, is more sanguine.

"I believe we are on the way to becoming a destination for serious food and wine lovers. Some of our resorts and restaurants can compare with any in the world.

"Winning international awards such as the *Wine Spectator*'s Award of Excellence proves we can get the attention of people who otherwise might

never think of Phuket as a food and wine destination."

Stuart Bird, General Manager of Watermark Restaurant, echoes K. Theera's sentiments.

"It was once common knowledge that much of the wine coming to Phuket was undesirable or discarded vintages. Thankfully, that has changed and we now see better-informed and more discerning wine drinkers and suppliers.


"The influx of more 'international' people – who have an international view and who are cosmopolitan, more worldly and aware – has helped to improve the wine and dine scene in Phuket, as well."

Stuart, perhaps, sums it up best: "Most people want to be in the mainstream, content to get by making a few quid selling the bare minimum.

"Those who dare to aspire to higher standards will inevitably shift the conventional way of the past, and credit should be given to those who are pushing the boundaries, daring to bring in a new cutting edge."

he night air is humid and there's nary a breeze stirring as we park and head toward the center of town. A bare-chested, sun-reddened tourist walks by, shirt in hand. A few steps on, an Indian tailor offers his hand, calling me "Chief" in a pseudo-cockney ac-

We pass hookers and hawkers, good lookers and gawkers, then head down a soi where there are several men in dresses on a pedestal strutting their two-year-old implanted silicone hooters. A swirl of tourists takes in the spectacle – the women amused, the men confused.

In this Aladdin's cave of trinkets, baubles and pirated goods it's hard to believe that anything along this street can be genuine.

Patong on a Friday night or on any night, for that matter isn't exactly the place to take the vicar out for tea and crumpets. He'd more than likely be distracted by a certain other sort of crumpet, much of which is wobbling by in skin-tight shorts and platform shoes.

FIDDLING

Still, like the vicar, there are oodles of "normal-looking" couples ambling around looking as though girly bars and peep shows are the last thing on their nocturnal itinerary. So where do they all go?

Seconds later we find out. A peal of laughter followed by a burst of applause, then the sound of manic fiddle-playing drifts out onto Soi Bangla and like ants to honey, we are drawn in through the doors of Scruffy Murphy's.

It's another world in here. Outside, the pace had been languid; inside the music is fast and furious. I feel as though I've walked through CS Lewis's wardrobe not into Narnia but Barnia and accordingly I order a lion-sized Beernai.

Looking around I'm suddenly inspired to explain to my partner that there's no need to go to the expense and time of visiting Britain any more. "It's all here, tee-rak." What with the

Europeans, Scruffy Murphy's is a cosmopolitan watering hole. is smiling and having a whale of

Japanese office girls, Spanish eyes, Middle Easterners, hefty

upturned beer barrels, exposed brick walls, HP Sauce bottles and the occasional bottle blonde, it not only looks like an upmarket British boozer, it sounds like one too, with a hundred different conversations going at full tilt, all at the same time.

Up on stage the fiddler is now playing a guitar and belting out pub standards – U2, Police, Beatles – and all at a fair rate of knots at that. He's accompanied by a nifty drummer and it's obvious what the pair do most afternoons – they must practice like Billy-o because they're as tight

Not in the alcoholic sense, mind you, although the singer – I later learn he's Neil from Wigan – is not averse to a pint or two during the course of what must be a very thirsty evening.

The other main feature that Scruffy Murphy's shares with its counterparts back in Britain is that there's every color and race under the sun in here, and the place is as cosmopolitan as a Saturday lunchtime Finchley Road

Hefty Europeans converse loudly next to a couple of shylooking Middle Easterners. A group of young Spanish lads eyes up a giggling trio of Japanese office girls.

Next to them, a gaggle of buxom British lasses is howling along with Neil and – I'm serious here – absolutely everyone

Forgive me for stating the obvious, but I don't see this particular brand of down-home jocularity in many other bars around Bangla. The main difference between Scruffy Murphy's and most other Patong watering holes is that both male and female punters are magically released from the cut-the-air-with-a-knife sexual cauldron that pervades "out there" on the mean streets.

A well-known Patong luminary once commented, "The Irish pubs in Patong are there for us to escape to for a sense of normality.'

And still the party goes on while Neil takes a well-earned break. "It's a full-on job, this," he laughs, and explains that he had his own band for a while and writes his own material.

But pub standards and evergreens are the order of the day with such a broad swathe of humanity to entertain. A musical gilded cage, if you will.

Scruffy Murphy's also does great pub grub and English breakfasts. You won't be able to order strained tomato soup with golden trout roe and crab meat here, but that doesn't complement the Guinness in quite the same way as bangers, mash and beans do, so who cares?

The best and the worst of political prose



litical commentary, even though I mean every word. It is vitriolic, over the top, strident and blatantly partisan. The art of political commentary works best behind a cool facade leavened with irony and

Henrik Hertzberg is a master of the genre. During the 2004 presidential campaign, he wrote the lead column in the "Talk of the Town" section of *The New* Yorker. Each week, he would artfully demolish Bush. Not in the clownish way of Michael Moore and Al Franken, but with high seriousness and deadly wit. Among all the news sources that fed my addiction, The New Yorker was pure Colombian cocaine. At 350 baht an issue, it wasn't cheap either.

Besides being a long-time contributor to The New Yorker, Hertzberg was a former chief speech writer for Jimmy Carter and Chief Editor of the liberal weekly journal, The New Repub-



lic. Now he has put together his first book – a collection of columns, features and profiles that stretch back over nearly 40 years. *Politics* is its unabashed title (The Penguin Press, New York, 2004, 683pp).

Hertzberg approached polidown a well-trodden path. If he is not exactly a red-diaper baby, he is certainly a pink one. His father was Jewish, his mother a Ouaker: both were socialists. of the anti-Stalinist persuasion. Hertzberg grew up in New York and went to Harvard, and he has made a long career out of spouting his liberal political opinions. In any discussion of religion, he finds it difficult not to sneer.

And he certainly covers the waterfront. In terms of the 1960s, he was there at the creation, covering the Haight-Ashbury scene, Woodstock and the Weathermen: "Unlike the Stalinists, the Weathermen do not take orders from anyone. They do their own unthinking." He even interviewed John Lennon and Yoko Ono about their love of New York for - what else? - The New Yorker.

He follows this with incisive and sympathetic profiles of Jimmy Carter and Robert Kennedy, and a corrosive one of Ronald Reagan.

In a section on speech-making, he is much fairer to his conservative colleagues like William Safire and Peggy Noonan, whom he openly admires.

There is an unfortunate 100page section on the 1988 Bush-Dukakis campaign, which he covered for The New Republic. He admits up-front that this was a mostly dull affair and, except for a ferocious pummeling of Vice President Dan Quayle ("Roboflop"), these columns lack the punch and sparkle of his others.

In fact, many of his New Republic columns are just liberal boilerplate. It's in his New Yorker pieces and a half dozen Esquire stories that he truly comes into

Ten pieces on the media are worth the price of the book, the apotheosis being "Topless Tabloids of Gotham" about the war between the New York Daily *News* and the *New York Post*:

"They're fighting it out today and everyday, for the hearts and minds of readers - the kind of readers who like to read fast or have to read slow," he writes. "Their war may be fought in an eternal present, but it has been going on for along time, on a battlefield soaked with the ink of newspapers living and dead. The casualties have been heavy. The contestants carry old scars and new wounds...

"The front page looks like the top half of an eye chart... The back page is a front page, too, but about sports. Inside is a version of what appears in other daily newspapers, but with bigger headlines, shorter paragraphs, tough-guy columnists, and heavy emphasis on sensation, sports and entertainment. The writing, at its best, is as direct and riveting as a ransom note."

And so is the writing of Henrik Hertzberg — about half the time.



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loathe small talk with every fiber of my being, and even with some extra fibers that aren't technically of my being but are just lying around. Let's face it; I *gather* fibers for the express purpose of loathing small talk.

But that might just be because I'm terrible at it.

It's been raining a great deal lately, but the local reservoirs haven't been alone in benefiting from the precipitation. After several months of dry weather, people finally have something new to chat about.

I've heard dozens of people go on about how it's raining cats, dogs, men, or three-toed sloths.

Sociologists conducted a study at the Stanford University School of Business, tracking down holders of an MBA some 10 years after their graduation.

It turned out that it wasn't their grades that mattered – it was their ability to converse, in other words how good they were at small talk.

Being able to communicate with others is crucial in the work-place. According to the researchers, small talk is an acquired skill.

"Well, I'm not a lost cause then," I thought, as I began researching the subject. "The first

step," claims one website, is to "cultivate contacts".

I must admit that the first image that flew into my head was that of growing people in greenhouses – as the website's method of cultivating these contacts differed very little from growing particularly stubborn plants.

I decided to find another source. Writer Susan RoAne advises, "Be bright. Be brief. Be gone," which is very succinct advice, but it doesn't explain exactly how to be "bright".

Another writer, Deborah Fine, suggests throwing the "conversational ball" leading to images of playing verbal monkey-in-the-middle.

She also suggests treating small talk as a diet – perhaps people will begin counting their conversations the way they count their calories.

After the $20^{\rm th}$ website (which told me to talk to myself in the mirror every morning) I decided to ask other teenagers.

One fact that bothers many teenagers is the artificiality of small talk. When people say, "Hi, how are you?" do they truly want to know how you feel? In most cases, they don't even bother waiting for the answer and simple give you a terse smile, when you say, "I'm fine, thanks, and you?"

I use the phrase, "I'm fine, thanks, and you?" so often, that I sometimes wonder why an acronym hasn't been developed in its honor yet.

It would be so much simpler to say "IFTAY?" – particularly in today's time-efficient culture

Teenagers who despise small talk see it as superficial and trivial, and are disappointed at the lack of sincerity shown when they meet new people.

You are often forgotten after a brief conversation because the other person makes no effort to listen to you and merely follows the steps listed on so many websites:

1. Have a (mental) list of questions ready;

2. Ask them;

3. Cut off the conversation with a firm handshake and smile;

4. Circulate and find someone else to cultivate; there are people whose shallowness is so thorough, it's actually quite deep.

The teenagers who were more forgiving of small talk pointed out that it was a great way to get rid of those darned awkward silences.

While it's amusing to see how long it takes for someone to start fidgeting, it's tiring and uncomfortable to sit with someone and look around for a "conversation ball" to chuck around with them.

As with "IFTAY?" perhaps "awkward silence" deserves a word of its own, if only for the fact that there are so many of them.

Perhaps there's a word for it in German – after all words like *zeitgeist* and *weltschmerz* perfectly sum up complex emotions and feelings.

In fact, one could even make up a specific word for "The chocolate that gets stuck in your teeth when eating glazed donuts."

There must be a specific term for the horror that is the Awkward Silence.

In defense of small talk, it is a safe way to get to know someone, if you truly find that person interesting.

Although it might be fake, saying, "Hi, I'm Ella. Beautiful weather, don't you think?" it's a much better conversation starter than, "Hi, I'm Ella. I've lost my job and my boyfriend has been doing naughty things with a goat," which will surely lead to an awkward silence of nuclear proportions

On the other hand, "Hi, I'm Ella. What are your opinions on the imagery versus proposition debate in cognitive psychology?" will either scare off the person because they haven't a clue

what you're saying, or because you sound like an annoying knowit-all.

Either way, you can't win. An alternative to small talk is witty banter. Of course, if you haven't the wit or the speedy comebacks, don't attempt it.

Your best shot is to appear honest, sincere, and interested.

Don't waste your time having meaningless conversations. Don't simply cultivate contacts to gloat at your colleagues, "I cultivated *four* yesterday. How many did *you* get?"

The positive-thinking guru Leo Buscaglia once said, "Too often do we underestimate the power of a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around."

Try to gain something from every conversation you have: whether it's a new friend, or an amusing story that brightens your day.

And even if there *is* a dreadful awkward silence, be comforted by the thought that the other person is probably as inept as you are at small talk.

Dear Momma Duck,

I am interested in English words which have been adopted by the Thai language and, in some cases, changed.

One example is the word "serious", which Thais seem to use to indicate a grave psychological state. Another is *rot mae* (bus), which, from the Thai spelling, one can see actually comes from the English word "mail" (with the final "l" not pronounced), presumably because buses were often used as mail trucks in the past.

Where do these Thai words come from?

Do you know of any other interesting words that I may not be aware of? Also, how long has the word "freshy" (obviously from the word "freshman") been in use?

Also, I read in a news report about the hazing problem in Thai schools where the ringleaders are referred to as "wagger". All Thai university graduates are familiar with this word, and I assume that it must be derived from

an English word as well (perhaps one starting with a "v"), but neither I nor any of my languagemaven friends seem capable of figuring out the etymology.

Can you help us out?

Dear Word Wonderer,

There are many English words which we use in Thai, technical words in particular, such as "computer" and "generator". There are often proper Thai terms (such as *khreung pan fai* for generator—literally: a machine which makes electricity) but the English versions are in much wider spoken use.

Somewhere in government or academia (I don't know where), the official Thai vocabulary is created, but the vast majority of people use the Anglicized version.

In my home town of Phuket, my generation commonly uses English words, such as *rot van* (a van), *sa-pare* (spare part), *too safe* (safety deposit box) and *lorry* ("truck" in American). I have not found anyone who could substantiate your contention that

rot mae comes from the English word "mail", and I rather doubt it because, in my experience, mail has always been delivered by hand, bicycle or motorcycle and not by four-wheeled vehicles.

You are right about "freshy" (from the American word "freshman", meaning a first-year student at university) and it has been in use here for at least 35 years.

Every time there is a welcoming hazing for freshies at the universities, there seems to be a spate of front page headlines on how badly some waggers (upperclassmen) treat their juniors. Hazing apparently was invented by the English, and has a long and not-so-glorious history in their public (i.e. private) schools.

The word "wagger" is interesting because it is an Anglicized version of a Thai word wag, which means to abruptly order somebody to do something, shouting at the top of your voice (such as military drill sergeants training cadets). The word has been given the English ending "-er", turning it from a verb to a noun.

Wag is written (a) in Thai. The "C" can be written in English

as v or w because the true pronunciation is between the two English consonants. I used to spell my name "Vanida", but was advised that the sound of my name is closer to being pronounced as W in English, so I changed it to Wanida instead.

I hope this response helps. Thank you: I enjoyed trying to find out about the various words. Perhaps other readers have some interesting information about the use of English words in Thai or adaptations which have occurred.

Protests cause park fee increase to be postponed

PHUKET: The Royal Forestry Department (RFD) has announced that the planned increase in entrance fees to Thailand's national parks will be postponed to October 1, 2001.

A dramatic increase in park fees, which would apply only to foreigners, was announced by the RFD in late August, and was due to come into effect on September 13

The plan raises the fee for foreign adults visiting Phuket's Sirinart National Marine Park, for example, from 10 baht to 200 baht, and for foreign children from 5 baht to 100 baht. Fees for Thais are to remain at 10 baht and 5 baht. At Koh Lanta the fees are currently 20 baht for adults and 10 baht for children.

Announcing the postponement, the RFD said it was delaying implementation for a year in order to "encourage tourism" and give tour operators and travel agents time to adjust their rates.

The increase in park fees sparked complaints from tour operators nationwide, mainly because it was announced only two weeks before it was due to be applied.

"We will have hundreds of

guests coming to Khao Lak and Lanta Island this season," said Stefan Lindh, Thailand co-ordinator and destination manager of the Scandinavian tour company, Apollo Resor.

"Yes, the guests can afford the fee, but it's not right to ask for it when they've already paid for their package before coming here," he said.

Foreign residents, who work and pay taxes in Thailand, have complained about the plan to apply the new rates to all foreigners.

"The Government and Private Organizations Committee and the Phuket Provincial Forestry Office (PPFO) sent a letter to the RFD to ask that it reconsider the decision in the case of foreign residents," said PPFO deputy chief Phol Pitprakij.

The RFD has not yet announced whether foreign residents will have to pay the higher fee when it comes into effect next year.

AO CHALONG: As the result of some misguided bragging on the part of gang leader Sujih Puksawad, 23, of Tai Muang in Phang Nga Province, a motorcycleborne group of young bandits, whose activities at Chalong were reported in last month's *Gazette*, have been captured by the police.

Sujih was boasting of his exploits in a working-class pub when one of his listeners decided that what he was hearing might just be a matter of interest to the police.

He duly informed the men in the brown uniforms and they seized Sujih at his home without a struggle.

He confessed his part in holding up the minimart in Rawai, Somboon's House; a mom-and-pop grocery store in Chalong where a gun was used to club the owner into unconsciousness; and others.

He also named his accomplices and co-operated with law enforcement officers in their efforts to bring the thugs to justice.

Police then located the gun, as well as one of Sujih's cohorts, at the boy's residence in Phang Nga. Another member of the group was rounded up at a rooming house near the pub in Phuket where Sujih first surfaced. A fourth suspect remains at large.





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Time for more serious action against uncaring developers

The one high-profile sector of Phuket's economy that seems to have suffered little or no damage from last year's tsunami is the property industry. Sales are still booming, and prices at the very top end of the market have already surpassed US\$5 million, or 200 million baht, per

Many developers take great care over environmental matters. Particularly at the top end of the market, they are aware that homebuyers are usually concerned about the environment, and would not want to live in homes the construction of which has caused environmental degradation.

But there are still far too many examples of developers who plainly do not understand – or simply do not care – about the damage they are doing, so great is their desire to make big money fast.

The 80-home development above Soi Siang Tai on the edge of Phuket City – to which the Governor recently called a halt – is only the latest example.

This project violated just about every rule devised to mitigate environmental damage, and with predictable results; when it rained, homes in the soi downhill from the project were inundated with muddy water.

Not only that, but the project apparently had not even received a building permit from the local Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor). How work could have started and continued on a site of that size without the *OrBorTor* noticing is indeed a mystery.

The saddest fact is that probably nothing would have been done about the violations had they been perpetrated on a site that was not directly uphill from where people lived.

There have been dozens of examples of housing projects in Phuket where everything green on the site was expunged in order to make construction easier and cheaper, resulting in serious ecological damage – the property industry's equivalent of strip mining.

Large scars have appeared on hillsides, reefs have been smothered and killed by mud, and water catchment areas - vital on an island with a chronic shortage of water – have been destroyed.

The Governor ordered a halt to construction on the Soi Siang Tai site until the developers obtain all the required paperwork, but no further penalties have, as yet, been imposed. This is unlikely to deter others from taking similarly disastrous short-cuts to riches.

If this form of rape of Phuket's countryside is to be prevented, OrBorTors must wake up, and serious penalties must be imposed upon offenders. - The Editor

Free rooms a big opportunity

t is, of course, quite common for people who have suffered the loss of a loved one to revisit the place where they died, particularly on the anniversary of that loss.

This December 26 will be no exception, and I agree completely with the proposal from the government to offer hotels rooms in Phuket to the relatives of those who died.

This event will necessitate some sacrifices being made by those in the region's hotel industry, but these sacrifices will reap benefits: it will ensure that the hotel rooms are full. In addition, after the tsunami, the government helped [local] hotels so it is only right and proper that [hoteliers] should agree to support this scheme.

Many dignitaries – royalty, heads of state and other VIPs, around 64 in all – visited Phuket and the region in the aftermath of the tsunami, and the government is inviting these people back for the first anniversary of the Indian Ocean tsunami.

Even if only half of this number return, it will still be more than worth it, because Thailand will not have to spend billions of baht promoting the region. The international media – who will be following the VIPs – will promote Phuket for us.

The media – and in fact world attention – will focus on Phuket, rather than Sri Lanka or Indonesia, for example. Although those countries have tourist ar-

he government has promised to provide a free return flight and two nights' accommodation in a 3- to 5-star hotel in the region for one immediate family member of every victim of the tsunami, including those who were injured (although it is unclear if Burmese, for example, will be included).

Some hoteliers have questioned the wisdom and the worth of the proposal, which could see as many as 11,000 rooms being appropriated by the government and paid for at rate yet to be disclosed, right in the middle of the high season.

Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) Vice-President **Kitti Phatanachinda**, however, takes a broader view.

eas, they are not what I would call "real" tourist destinations in the way that Phuket, Krabi and Phang Nga are.

The media may have published or broadcast headline news about the tsunami [when it happened], but CNN and others have been slow to show what is happening here now.

We must make the most of this – our only opportunity on the only date that matters, the first anniversary of the tsunami – to get the attention of the media.

I estimate that Phuket has around 35,000 hotel rooms of which approximately 20,000 fall in to the 3- to 5-star category.

However, I do not believe that the full 10,000 rooms requested will be available; the PTA's projections for the Christmas period suggest that hotels in Phuket will be up to 90% full [around 31,000 rooms occupied] with regular tourists.

The government's scheme to invite guests here for the anniversary will be good for – and

welcomed by — most hoteliers because it will, one hopes, fill any vacant rooms, even if the hotels have to offer the rooms at a special rate to the government. It is better to have a room occupied at 500 baht a night than have it remain empty.

Again, any hotel that has a VIP staying in it, for example former US President Bill Clinton, will benefit by being able to say that a dignitary has stayed there.

This will be good not only for the image of the hotel, but also

- by extension - the island's hotel industry as a whole.

The Thais and foreigners who will be invited here for the anniversary commemorations will receive free return flights and two nights' full-board accommodation on December 26 and 27, which will be paid for by the government.

But, of course, it is unlikely that they will stay for just those two nights; they will probably stay for longer than that, and the additional nights' accommodation will be paid for by the guest, not the government.

It is also unlikely that these people will want to travel here alone for the anniversary. Those who accompany a guest of the Thai government must pay for their flights and accommodation in full.

This will help to circulate more revenue through the local economy, and not just for this year, because the government's scheme should have positive knock-on effects for the future.

If the guests of the government who come here [to commemorate the first anniversary of the December 26 tsunami] are treated well by the hotels, then it is certain that they will come back as "regular" tourists in the future.

I urge all hoteliers and other businesses in the hospitality sector to work together to make this project a success, because we can all benefit.

Why do I repeatedly get power cuts?

I live in a modern condominium at Karon Beach. We have had power cuts every three or four days, on average, over the past three months.

They usually last from a few minutes to an hour or two, although one recently lasted about five hours and another was about ten hours long. Is this the normal level of service in Thailand?

K. Pheera Pruksanan, Manager of the Phuket Provincial Electricity Authority (PPEA) replies:

Often, three different buildings have their own electrical fuse boxes connecting overhead wires to their underground supply, but the power is also routed through one shared, main, public fuse box.

As a result, whenever one of those buildings has a problem with its fuse box – usually due to water penetrating it – all three buildings are affected.

These fuse boxes normally need to be replaced every year.

If a building's private fuse box malfunctions, its repair or re-

placement must be paid for by the owners of the building.

The two other buildings that share the main fuse box with your condominium paid to have their own fuse boxes replaced.

The PPEA was contacted by your building's management, but we never heard back from them after we told them the cost of replacing their fuse box – 14,104.74 baht. This is probably the reason for the blackouts you have been having.

How do I get rid of fire ants?

It seems the fire ants are worse this year than in the past and have forced us to be very careful if we walk in the grass or near flower beds. How can I deal with this?

Songwat Tiew-tae of the Phuket Agriculture and Cooperatives Office, replies:

Azadirachtin is a non-toxic chemical that is available in bottles. Spread this around your home in the evening, as exposure

to sunlight can make it less effective.

Cabaril is a toxic liquid. It as ingesting it can cause vomiting, stomach ache and diarrhea, inhaling it can result in a headache, and contact with your eyes can damage your eyesight, so wear gloves, a mask and goggles.

Carbosulfan is another chemical often used by pest control companies to poison ants. This is put into small holes dug around the home. Carbosulfan is also toxic.

More common traditional methods that are not hazardous to use include spreading crushed citronella mixed with water around your home, or calcium hydroxide, which is made by mixing lime—the mineral, not the fruit—with water. In Thai this is called *Poon Kao*.

All these are available at Ko Wit Karn Kaset on Mae Luan Rd, in Phuket City, and at Phuket Kaset Kemiphan near Supercheap, on Thepkrasattri Rd, on the north side of Phuket City.

Aftermath of a traffic accident

While driving I hit two people and both died. My insurance will pay 200,000 baht per person and I am willing to add a further 100,000 baht per person. One family has agreed, but the other wants more. How can I settle this problem?

Sam Fauma of Phuket International Law Office replies:

In the case of an accident in which a person dies, the police must arrest the party accused of reckless driving causing death.

A case like this cannot be settled at the police station because the charge is not "compoundable" – that is, it cannot be withdrawn by the complainant.

Although the settlement is a civil (not criminal) matter, it is important to show the court that agreement has been reached.

If the family of the deceased is asking for too much, you should lodge a guarantee for payment with the court to show that you are willing to reach a settlement. This also can help to obtain a reduction in sentence.

Process re-engineering: how to go with the flow

ur company is currently involved in a very interesting project with a multinational here in Phuket. I will not mention the company's name in order to respect its privacy, but I would like to share some of the details of this project, since it represents one of our most interesting MIS (Management Information Systems) disciplines known as "process re-engineering".

The information that follows is a cursory introduction to this sort of work. I hope you find it interesting and helpful; please feel free to send me emails with any questions or comments.

This will be the first in a three-part series dedicated to a subject that is not only a new area of consulting, but is also one of the most productive uses of MIS. It applies to production, accounting, sales, marketing, quality control and finance.

The basics: Every company, whether it is a mom-and-pop store or a multinational, has business processes to manage, infor-

mation to track and a business model to enact. Some of the terms that follow may sound somewhat lofty, but I believe that if you back them up with hard facts and applicable examples they are no longer the generic intangibles that many consultants like to use to impress their clients.

The project we are working on is especially exciting because it involves their entire operation, and the task is to re-engineer their entire business process including production, operations, sales, accounting, quality control and also to redesign their computer systems and information tracking systems. We expect this project will be completed within six months, which, in the scope of things, is very quick.

Understanding the business process: This is an obvious first step that requires hours of painstakingly detailed analysis. The clients spend a lot of energy showing us how their markets work, how the business operates, what information is important to them, and how they currently track it. The first step in this part of the project is to assemble top managers and key employees into a work session that can last bethat we put up on a poster board everything that is not optimal about the business, including its market, business procedures, internal policies and daily job tasks. This may sound simple, but when you really get into it, everyone is amazed at how many small, yet cumbersome, things affect their everyday jobs, not to mention productivity and profitability.

There are several benefits to this exercise, including a general sharing of each person's experience in his or her daily job and how this affects other people and

pressed with the fact that upper management has very little understanding of what middle management and the rest of the workforce must deal with every day. This exercise alone is the beginning of a process that educates the company on its own procedures and inefficiencies and, most importantly, the redundancy of work in its business pro-

ning of the actual work that will be done, but it is the first step in the business process re-engineering exercise. Together with the client, we begin to identify how certain influences, both inside and outside the company, either af-

fect or cause UDEs. It is an entertaining experience, and very productive. The number of "ahas" that occurs is a clear indication of the usefulness of this series of exercises.

"Ahas" happen when one person mentions something about his job, a process or a policy and another, usually an upper manager, smacks his forehead and says "aha", usually followed by some sort of new idea or revelation of how to better the process under evaluation. It is extremely productive when the group begins to identify specifically where and when varying business processes and inefficiencies collide, and how best to smooth the flow of work while eliminating excess tasks and redundancies.


Mapping the work flow: This is one of the most difficult and tedious parts of the overall consulting process, because it requires a 100% clear understanding of every aspect of the company's business processes. This is the deliverable part of the first round of work sessions mentioned at the beginning of this article, and it is usually represented as a flow

We carefully break down every process from every department, and then create a comprehensive flow-chart consisting of a series of boxes, if/thens, arrows, decisions and conditional responses.

The level of clarity that this brings to the overall business process is amazing. It is the map by which we begin to redesign and/ or confirm existing procedures within and between each department. It is also the beginning of the re-engineering of MIS, specifically what information they generate, how it is used, how it flows from the source to the end user, and what systems and software best accomplish this.

Oil costs pump up price of building materials

PHUKET: The Provincial Office of Public Works and Town & Country Planning has revised its list of standardized prices for building materials used in supplying government contracts, and expects Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura to approve the price increases by the end of November.

Natthawat Buaphut, of the provincial Public Works office, told the Gazette that the set prices of about one third of the 400 building materials listed have been increased by up to 1.5%.

The prices were last revised in 2000, he said, and added that the current revision comes after an order from the Ministry of Commerce to consider the knockon effect of the ongoing oil price hikes on building materials.

"The prices of building materials are terials more expensive, and I have yet to

very volatile right now, and the prices see any signs that prices of building mateneeded revising because the cost of construction materials has risen so much over the past few months that the existing standard prices are jeopardizing the number of contractors willing to tender for government contracts," K. Nattawat said.

However, he added, "We're being realistic. With government projects we factor in all calculations, and we set our prices in line with real market prices."

Thada Pitchayaporn, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Commercial Office, which is charged with setting prices for government contract supplies in Phuket, said, "Prices of construction materials in Phuket are increasing, especially 6-millimeter, 9mm and 12mm steel concrete-reinforcing rods and cement.

"The rises in the price of oil affect transportation costs, making building marials will drop," he added.

As examples, he said that 6mm steel rods now cost 22,408.88 baht a ton, 7cm x 16cm x 3.5cm bricks cost 2.52 baht apiece, and Elephant-brand 33cm x 42cm roofing tiles cost 12.85 each.

However, local construction contractors are saying that the price increases are not enough. Prapasri Lapsuangsong, Chief Accountant of Leefong Co, said, "The prices of construction materials are erratic, so how could a contractor get a supplier to commit to selling at government-standard prices? It is impossible, even if the prices are set by the provincial Commercial Office.

Sometimes we contact suppliers for a quotation, and three days later the price has changed. As a contractor, we need to accept this. If the materials were for a private project, we could change our quotation to reflect the price rise, but we cannot do so with government projects.

"Every time we take on a government project, we either break even or lose. The set government prices remain fixed while prices in the market do not," she said.

Chartchai Kanlayanamit, manager of local construction material supplier Jenkit Enterprises Co, agrees.

'It works in theory, but not in practice," he said. "The price of materials goes up or down, depending on who you buy the materials from and how that company sets its profit margins. Each brand sets its own prices, so we cannot use one standard price.'

What set prices encourage, K. Chartchai explained, is contractors to select materials according to what is available at the set price. "The fact is that the price comes first, the quality comes after," he said.

Time to reconsider investments in India, Japan and Spain

time this column has featured India as a favored investment destination and, for investors who are erecting factories and so on, it still has longterm attraction. However, for the individual investor merely interested

in the Indian stock market, now is perhaps a good time for a portfolio review.

The Mumbai market has performed well, and 2005 has seen a series of record highs achieved. However, everything in this world has a price and perhaps the Mumbai stock market has become, in market terminology, "overbought". Many fund managers have long since announced that the market has reached target levels for the year, but the market has still risen substantially. This is a period that often happens in stock markets when a market keeps rising above its fundamentals.

Where involvement in India by an investor is through a fund that covers a number of countries,

manager simply to take profits on much of the Indian exposure and use the capital to invest in other markets. Where the investor has used an Indian Fund to invest in that market, then the decision can no longer be left to a third party.

It is in the nature of stock

markets, and any other market for that matter, to overreact both on the upside and the opposite. Investors should be aware of this phenomenon and not let greed or fear dominate their emotions. This is not to say that the Indian stock market will not rise further even in the short term, but investors are beginning to "skate on thin ice". Perhaps the wisest strategy is to take profits and wait for a correction in the market before considering a re-entry.

However, history shows that this is precisely the time when individual investors enter a stock market. They have watched from the sidelines and seen a market continue to rise and rise – this gives them a false sense of security, combined with the feel-

moving in the opposite direction Hedge Fund managers do have and pocketing the profits.

The "Tankan" survey, which measures business confidence and the state of the Japanese economy, was released in early October and the various television business channels described it as "disappointing". However, Seijiro Takeshita, a director of Mizuho International and its strategist, had another opinion. He said that if one read the report in detail it was actually very encouraging; the Japanese economy was starting to fire on all cylinders and the outlook for corporate profits was good. He also pointed out that most Japanese exporters were basing their currency figures on an exchange rate of 105 yen to the US dollar - it is now at 113/114 – and this would give profits an extra boost.

Anais Faraj, of Nomura, is also enthusiastic about Japan as an investment destination. Cynics may say that these gentlemen work for large Japanese financial institutions and are naturally biased. However, until recently neither of them waxed enthusiastic about Japan.

Even Hedge Fund managers are very interested in Japanese investment now; Hugh Hendry, who runs Eclectica, is a

one great advantage – if they like an investment regardless of the asset class they can invest, that is "go long". If they dislike an investment they can sell it "short". Hendry sees the Japanese market trebling in value over the next 10 years.

I strongly favor Japan; it has seen years of deflation, falling asset prices and a host of other bad news. It is in situations such as this that substantial profits are made when the situation turns around.

Similar profits were made in the aftermath of the 1997 Asian financial crises. In Thailand, by mid-1998 the SET index fell to 208 from over 1400 the previous year. There is an old market adage that "the best time to buy is when there is blood on the streets", but that should be tempered by adding the old Japanese saying "never try to catch a falling knife".

The Spanish economy looks set to produce the best growth figures of the larger economies in the Euro zone, probably growing in the 2.5% to 3% range. Spain had a problem common to most Euro zone members – labor markets that were inflexible and highly regulated.

It also had unemployment rates higher than 20%. More than a decade ago they came to a very simple solution: don't change any of the laws, as this would have met with enormous opposition from the unions; allow companies to hire temporary workers. Problem solved, and with it a large percentage of unemployment.



A CHAIR WITH FLAIR

esides the obvious comfort factor involved in deciding what to buy to park your posterior on, the style and design of the chairs chosen for a home can add that extra flair to create just the right ambience in a room.

Art One in Phuket City has a range of different chair designs that break away from traditional styles. Perhaps the most intriguing to the eye is the loopy "Infinity" design, invoking thoughts of the perplexing Möbius strip. Being made of durable rattan, it can be used both indoors and out. In red, it costs 24,000 baht, and 21,000 baht in white.

Art One also has a seat that can be used for either sitting or







Laguna branches out

CHERNG TALAY: Laguna Resorts & Hotels Co Ltd has announced plans to build a new development, called Laguna Village, comprising 300 units on 300 rainear Layan Beach, separated from the main resort plot.

Stuart Reading, Assistant Vice President Finance & Administration, Allamanda Vacation Club Limited and Property Division, at Laguna Phuket, told the *Gazette*, "We are currently finalizing infrastructure design and applying for development approvals for the initial phase, which comprises over 100 rai."

Construction is expected to begin in the second quarter of 2006. "It will include our new product, semi-detached villas, as well as our popular Townhomes and Residences," he said.

The Townhome designs, the 450-square-meter Baan Anchana and the 438sqm Baan Bangtao, each comprise three bedrooms, three bathrooms, maid's quarters and a 24sqm private pool, and are available at prices starting at 16 million baht.

The two-story Residences are available in the 430sqm Chaba design or the 529sqm Banburi style. The single-level Chaba layout offers three bedrooms, two bathrooms, maid's quarters, 181sqm of patio and deck areas and a living area of 201sqm. The two-story Banburi has three bedrooms, three bathrooms, maid's quarters, 204sqm of patio and deck areas, and 277sqm of living area. Both designs include a 48sqm private swimming pool. Prices for these start at 21 million baht.

Mr Reading said that a new design of semi-detached villa with a shared pool will be available at Laguna Village, in the 10- to 15-







million-baht price range. The name of the style has yet to be announced.

He expects to sell and build 70 units a year, with the 300 units completed within five years.

Mr Reading said that most buyers at Laguna are Westerners based in Asia or Europe, though, he added, "In future we will be actively seeking to penetrate into other markets, such as the Middle East, Australasia and the Americas.

"Most buyers purchase property as a vacation home with a view to renting them out when they are not staying in them, or to retire in them in the future. However, there is an increasing number of permanent residents.

"People recognize and trust the Laguna brand. We have a dedicated estate services department which oversees maintenance of project common areas and can arrange property management services for individual homeowners," he said.

Benefits attracting buyers, Mr Reading said, were that each property has its individual land title that can be sold as leasehold or freehold, and extended warranties and deferred payment terms are available.

In addition, early investors have seen a 30-40% increase in property values during the past couple of years, he said.

He explained that the current project under construction,

located by a lagoon near the entrance to Laguna Phuket, is expected to be complete by mid-2006. Eighty units have already been completed and 20 are currently under construction.

"Currently, Allamanda and Banyan Tree properties are proving very popular, Allamanda as an entry level into the Laguna Phuket lifestyle, as they are free-hold condos with golf membership. Banyan Tree units are for the more discerning buyer who wants a luxurious holiday property and strong rental yields," Mr Reading said.

Prices for the condos start at 4.5 million baht, and at 32 million baht for Banyan Tree properties.

Also under construction at the resort complex is the 79-room Laguna Holiday Club, which is expected to be complete by mid-2006, and caters to families. It will have its own pool with waterslide.

Mr Reading said that Laguna, a listed company on the Thai Stock Exchange, entered the property development market three years ago.

"The core business of Laguna Resorts and Hotels is hotels, but property development is now also an area of focus with excellent growth prospects. A lot of people who have been in Laguna Phuket return year after year, and many of those people buy a property because they enjoy Laguna," he said.

Looking to expand operations, Laguna also has plans for future resorts in China and Thailand, he added.

The A to almost Z of Gardening (Part 2)

must start this week with an apology. Last week's ramblings involving things green and growing involved having a go at our transatlantic friends, for which I apologize. I will even spell that with a "zee" for them. I was only trying to say that I can never understand a word they say. Why can't they talk normally?

A week ago, I attempted to unearth some of the vagaries of the gardening world and tried to list just a few of those terms that proper gardeners like to use on a regular basis.

I cheated a bit by calling it the "A to Z of gardening". Cheated because I could not come up with a word for some of the letters, and because I ran out of steam at G. Hopefully, I will be able to get all the way through to the end of the alphabet this week.

Heading back: Cutting an older branch or stem back to a stub or twig.

Humus: The brown or black organic part of the soil resulting from the partial decay of leaves and other matter. Not to be confused with chickpea dip.

Hybrid: The offspring of two plants of different species or varieties of plants. Hybrids are created when the pollen from one kind of plant is used to pollinate an entirely different variety, resulting in a new plant.

Layering: A method of propagation, by which a branch is rooted – while still attached to the plant – by securing it to the soil with a piece of wire.

Leaching: The removal or loss of excess salts or nutrients from soil. The soil around over-fertilized plants can be leached clean by large quantities of fresh water. This has happened naturally in some tsunami-affected areas of Phuket where greenery is returning.

Loam: A rich soil composed of clay, sand and organic matter.

Manure: Organic matter, excreted by animals, which is used as fertilizer. I believe more colorful names for this stuff may exist.



Layering in action: escaping from the pot to take root in the ground.

Mulch: Any loose material placed over the soil to control weeds and conserve soil moisture. Usually this is something coarse, such as coconut husks, clippings or bark.

Native plant: Any plant that grows naturally in a specific region or locality. A rare beast in this part of the world.

Naturalize: To plant randomly, without a pattern. The idea is to create the effect that man is not involved, as you would find wild flowers growing. A particular favorite of mine, as absolutely no effort is required. A great excuse for doing nothing. **Node:** The part of a stem from which a leaf or new branch starts to grow.

Parasitic plant: A plant which lives on, and acquires its nutrients from, another plant. This often results in declined vigor or death of the host plant.

Perennial: A non-woody plant that grows and lives for more than two years.

Photosynthesis: The internal process by which a plant turns sunlight into growing energy. The formation of carbohydrates

in plants from water and carbon dioxide, by the action of sunlight on the chlorophyll within the leaves. Scientific stuff which is totally beyond me.

Pinching back: Using the thumb and fore-finger to nip back the very tip of a branch or stem. Pinching promotes branching, and a bushier, fuller plant.

Pollination: The transfer of pollen from the stamen (the male part of the flower) to the pistil (the female part of the flower), which results in the formation of a seed. This happens when the mummy and daddy flower parts love each other very much. **Potting soil:** A soil mixture designed for

use in container gardens and potted plants. **Propagation:** Various methods of starting new plants ranging from starting seeds to identical clones created by cuttings or layering.

Pruning: The cutting and trimming of plants to remove dead or injured wood, or to control and direct the new growth of a plant.

Runner: A slender stem growing out from

the base of some plants, which terminates with a new offset plant. Spider plants have these. The new plant may be severed from the parent after it has developed sufficient roots.

Secateurs: Small pruning shears, often spring-loaded, where a curved blade slides against a straight blade.

Spore: The reproductive cell of ferns, fungi and mosses. These plants do not produce seeds, by the way.

Sucker: A growth originating from the rootstock of a grafted plant, rather than the desired part of the plant. Sucker growth should be removed, so it does not draw energy from the plant.

Tap root: The main, thick root growing straight down from many plants.

Tendril: The twisting, clinging, slender part of many vines, which allows the plant to attach themselves to a support or trellis.

Thinning: Removing excess seedlings, to allow sufficient room for the remaining plants to grow. Thinning also refers to removing entire branches from a tree or shrub, to give the plant a more open structure, and what should happen to the waistlines of certain gardeners.

Topiary: A method of pruning and training certain plants into interesting shapes such as animals. From the Latin for "too much time on your hands".

Topsoil: The healthy, top layer of native soil. It may also apply to good quality soil sold at nurseries and garden centers.

Transpiration: The release of moisture through the leaves of a plant.

Transplanting: The process of digging up a plant and moving it to another location. Duh

Tuber: A flat underground stem which stores food and plant energy and from which a plant grows. Heliconias or potatoes, for example.

Variegated leaves: Leaves which have multiple colors.
