Immigration launches hospital visa service

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Immigration Office (PPIO) has launched a new free visa extension service for foreigners in hospital.

Pol Capt Krissarat Nusen of the PPIO told the Gazette that the new service, launched a few days ago, covers only genuine inpatients, who must get the hospital to contact the PPIO at least one day in advance of the expiry of their current visa.

'We will check first with the hospital that the patient really cannot visit the PPIO. If that is the case, then the next day officers will go to the hospital.

"We are offering this service because, in the past, when sick people authorized someone else to organize an extension on their behalf, documents or signatures were often missing. If we go to the hospital it will make it easier to complete the procedure," Capt Krissarat said.

"But I want to stress that this is for people who are seriously ill, or who cannot move, for example, after having an opera-

"We served the first such person last week when Mission Hospital Phuket contacted us about a patient who had a bacterial infection and could not walk,"

The latest move to curb street touts' intrusive methods has already upset some shop owners. Patong tailor Niphon Narula explained to the Gazette that municipality officers arrested one of his shop staff for "just standing" in front of his shop on Thaweewong

"We weren't handing out leaflets ... If we annoyed tourists, we would be in the wrong, but he was just standing in front of him?" he said.

K. Niphon said that November 22 was the fourth time his staff member had been arrested. The first time incurred a 500 baht fine, and a 1.000-baht fine followed for each of the two subsequent times.

K. Chairat said, "If [touts] are just standing [in front of the shop], we will not arrest them. But we will be more strict in ensuring that tourists have a good holiday in Phuket." - Editorial, page 26

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Governor cool to idea of twinning with Denpasar

PHUKET: Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura was noncommittal about a proposal by the Indonesian Ambassador to Thailand that Phuket City and the Balinese capital of Denpasar become "sister cities", saying he would first have to solicitic opinions on the idea with local tourism industry associations.

The idea of twinning the two cities was proposed by Indonesian Ambassador Ibrahim Yusuf during a December 2 courtesy call on the Governor at Phuket Provincial Hall.

Amb Yusuf was in Phuket as part of a four-day tour of Southern Thailand.

Although a letter issued by the Indonesian Consulate in Songkhla specifically states that the proposed twinning would be between the two cities (as opposed to the islands on which they are located) the Thai side was represented by Gov Udomsak, to whom the Indonesian letter was addressed, rather than Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwannasuppana – who was notably absent from the meeting.

During the meeting, the possibility of educational and cultural exchanges between Bali and Phuket was raised.

Also discussed was the idea of establishing direct air links between Phuket and points in Indonesia including Jakarta and Medan as well as Bali.

No firm agreements were reached on these issues, however.

In reference to security concerns following terrorist bombings in Bali in October 2002, and again in October this year, Gov Udomsak said that the issue of twinning the two cities at this time remained "sensitive".

Phuket Province and Phuket City are already involved in "sister" relationships Hainan Island in China, the Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Nice in France and Las Vegas, gambling capital of the US.

Gambling tops crime stats again

PHUKET: Figures released by Phuket Provincial Police show that in November gambling once again topped the list of crimes, with 217 people arrested. Forty-two cases involved the sale of underground lottery tickets.

Eighty four people were arrested for illegal possession or use of controlled substances, with precisely 2,189½ *ya bah* (methamphetamine) tablets seized. Fifteen people were arrested for other types of substance abuse.

One murder was recorded and the police reported the case as "solved". Also reported were six cases of attempted murder and 23 cases of bodily harm.

There were 68 reports of theft.

Five cases of rape were reported, with three cases solved. Fifteen people were charged with illegal possession of guns.

Twenty-two people were arrested for prostitution-related offenses.



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Ricky back for Blues Festival

KARON: Ricky Zen Lazenko, a regular entertainer at parties and events around Phuket in the past few years, and famed for his Elvis impressions, is back in Phuket to emcee the Phuket Blues Festival on December 16 and 17.

Ricky dropped out of sight after the tsunami, but told the *Gazette* that he has spent most of

the past year raising funds for victims of the wave and, subsequently, of Hurricane Katrina, an effort he continues to pursue.

The Blues Festival starts at 6:30 pm on December 16, hosted by the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa. It is presented by HotelTravel.Com and the *Phuket Gazette*

Mystery death of Yasothorn woman

RASSADA: Police are investigating the violent death of a woman from Yasothorn Province who was found with her throat slashed on the morning of December 4.

Police identified the victim as Nittaya Weruwanarak, 30, from Tambon Phai, Saimoon District, Yasothorn. Her body was found at about 7:30 am at an unnumbered shack about 500 meters from Soi Kingkaew Uthit 1, in Rassada Village 3.

Her neck had been slashed, and there were also six stab wounds in her chest. A bloody knife with a blade about 38 centimeters long was found next to her body.

K. Nittaya's death was reported by her husband, construction worker Somchai Sae-er.

Police said that K. Nittaya had gone to sleep at the home of a friend, 26-year-old Yupaporn Pohsri, at about 2 am that morning, after an argument with her husband.

K. Yupaporn told police that on the morning of the murder she went to find K. Somchai, who lived about 100 meters away in the couple's small home. She wanted him to take his wife home, she said.

Returning with him less than 10 minutes later, she discovered the body of K. Nittaya lying in a pool of blood on the floor inside the shack.

The police say they are still investigating and have yet to reach a conclusion in the case.

Reality show takes pledge during triathlon

PHUKET: Eighteen of the contestants in this year's Laguna Phuket Triathlon were once far from fit.

Their progress fitness is being documented in a 13-part reality TV show called *The Pladae*

Each of these people, from different walks of life and different nationalities, but all currently living in Singapore, had to overcome major obstacles to become fit enough to take part in the event.

Some were accident victims who had been told by doctors that they would never run again. Others were just plain fat.

But all rose to the challenge of radically improving their lifestyles.

Eighteen "Pledgers" and three Pledge relay teams, made up of contestants who chose to concentrate on their individual disciplines, took part in the triathlon.

Australian Cameron Richards crossed the finish line in 149th place – best of the Pledgers – with a time of 3 hours 30 minutes and 14 seconds.


The show is the brainchild of Lennie Hill, fitness trainer and the main host of the series, which will air on ESPN in March.

World Vision denies 'aid for souls' reports

PHUKET: Tim Costello, Chief Executive Officer of Christian aid group World Vision Australia, has denied a rumor that the group has used tsunami donations and aid in an attempt to entice Thais to convert to Christianity.

World Vision has helped more than 50,000 tsunami-affected people, through food distribution and providing muchneeded items including 300 boats, fishing gear for 2,449 families, and 4,848 school uniforms, among other things, he said.

"It has been a very successful emergency response," he added.

He said that the organization also worked toward filling social needs such as rebuilding houses and helping people to find work.

Mr Costello said he had "absolutely never heard" rumors that people from Baan Nam Khem and Koh Sireh could get a 30,000-baht loan from the organization provided that they attended church on Sunday.

"I don't believe that's true," he said. "If it were true it would be completely against our fundamental principle.

"We believe in absolute nondiscrimination [as regards] age and religion. Buddhist, Muslim or whatever – we treat everyone exactly the same."

Mr Costello noted that there are Christian organizations that go to great efforts to gather souls, but added, "World Vision never tries to convert people."

Luxury yacht grounded in rough seas

PHUKET: The luxury charter yacht *Phayoon 3* was deliberately grounded off the southern coast of Phuket early on December 1 after the vessel began taking on water in heavy seas.

The 130-foot motor yacht, which is operated by Kingfisher Marine, was on the way to pick up passengers from Myanmar.

Kingfisher Marine Director Shoon Giat "Kit" Chotithamaporn told the *Gazette* on December 6, "There were pretty rough seas coming up from the stern. Some hatches at the back of the boat got sucked off by the waves and she started to take on water. The crew decided, 'We have a problem,' and started to turn the boat around and head for shelter in Chalong."

On the way, it became clear that there was too much water on board, and a decision was made to run the boat aground in shallow water near Rawai, rather than risk having her go down.

"It was a good decision," said K. Kit. "At least now the boat is still here. The damage is not that severe. Structurally, the boat is not in bad shape.

"The credit has to go to the crew. They've been working almost [round the clock] since it happened. They have done an amazing job.At the moment we're trying to refloat her. We are making progress, but not enough, so we are sourcing more pumps to try to float her again."

The engines have sustained damage from the water, K. Kit acknowledged, and will require a major rebuild.

Arcadia-Hilton split denied

KARON: A representative of the owners of the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort and Spa has denied rumors that the Hilton brand will be dumped next year.

Hilton International took over management of the Phuket Arcadia Beach Resort on October 1 last year, and the property was rebranded.

The rumors posited that the Arcadia owners were unsatisfied with Hilton's performance, and planned to take over management themselves. However, Maitree Narukatpichai, Owners' Representative, told the *Gazette* that the rumor was not true.

"We have had no thought of canceling Hilton's management contract. Last night many people asked me about the rumors, and I denied them. If they were true, then you would hear so from my mouth," K. Maitree added.

Asked about plans to build another Arcadia resort on 180 rai of beachfront land in Khao Lak, he said that construction work is currently suspended.

"We started to build the resort before the tsunami and, luckily, the damage was light. We decided to stop construction and see how the situation develops.

"I have heard that about 80% of businesses there will be open again next year in time for the [2006-2007] high season. I would like to wait and see."

Property in the spotlight

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Land Office and the Phuket Real Estate Club (PREC) will jointly stage a Phuket International Property Forum on December 17 as part of tsunami anniversary activities – and to assure potential buyers that the property market remains as buoyant as ever.

Tickets, at 400 baht each, will be available in the hotel meeting room on the day of the event.



In the aftermath of last year's tsunami there were persistent rumors of children who had survived the disaster being preyed upon by pedophiles. None was verified but, in emergency situations, when the most immediate effort is focused on rescue attempts and providing relief to the population, children were at increased risk of abuse.

To ensure that measures are put in place both to protect children from further harm and abuse, and to ensure that trauma is minimized, a seminar was arranged recently at the Novotel Phuket Resort in Patong by the End Child Prostitution, Child Pornography and Trafficking of Children for Sexual Purposes (ECPAT) network.

he seminar that's going on here [in Phuket] is looking at child protection in emergency situations, focusing on small local organizations and on how to respond to child protection issues.


We have representatives from Indonesia, Sri Lanka and, of course, Thailand. We're looking at sexual exploitation in general but also at how this gets compounded in emergency situations.

We're using the tsunami experience to see how it differs

from other emergencies, and what similarities there are.

Some of the organizations here do have specific proved cases (of abuse). I feel that it's important, even at the best of times – when all of the law and order situations are operative – to document and prosecute cases of sexual exploitation.

But [even in normal conditions] it's extremely difficult and very few cases lead to prosecution. So, in an emergency when everything else is falling apart, the

likelihood is small that you would have that kind of documentation and the ability to look at a case in a systematic way.

I'm not surprised that there was confusion as to what actually happened and that there was misreporting and false accusations [after the tsunami in Thailand].

One of the common denominators that has run through the countries affected by the tsunami is the absolute lack of focus on child protection within structured or emergency tsunami responses.

As yet, emergency responses don't look specifically at what happens to children in those situations; the tendency is to look at the traditional ways of responding to the emergency – taking care of physical needs and logistical requirements.

What we have seen is that, because there are no systems in place to look directly at the experience of children, there is a tendency to expect the family and community to take care [of them]. Yet we know that even in a regular, non-emergency, situation those systems can fail.

We would recommend... very specific legal frameworks [be devised] to deal specifically with emergency situations. These would require certain structures to be in place to protect children in general.

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The planning of the response would look very specifically at [two questions]: "What are you going to do in relation to children?" and "Who is going to be responsible?'

We would recommend this to all of the agencies that have emergency programs, to governments of course, but also to local organizations because what is clear is that, although you may have an emergency response unit and you may have international relief agencies that come in, usually they're not on the ground when [disasters] happen.

The people who are in a position to be able to tell you [about the children] in the community are the ones who are closest to the initial impact, but [they are also] the least prepared and are untrained.

Is it a case of taking too much for granted? I think so. When it comes to children, one of the things we take for granted is that their adult care-givers are the ones who are going to be there for the child.

But if you have a situation like the tsunami where many of the adult care-givers disappeared, then you don't have a designated back-up to take care of the children.

Local communities have great abilities to respond but they would benefit from heightened awareness and from training and methodology, so that they would know what to do.

I feel people would respond well [to training] because in their everyday lives they know that child rape exists, that child abduction exists, that abuse and neglect exist – so we're not saying anything that they don't already know.

REALITIES

We know that these are realities in everyday life; we're just pointing out that in an emergency situation the same tendencies in human nature [exist] as in nonemergency situations.

We learned from a lot of the organizations here that family members and extended family members picked up children when they saw that the parents were lost and that the child hadn't been claimed.

They'd been waiting to see what had happened to the parents, with the idea of "adopting"

the child. This was true in the case of Indonesia. It was done with all the goodwill that one would like to assume exists, but the problem was that there was no registration of these "adoptions", so there was no real way of knowing what progress had been made.

These families have come under great economic strain; they have suffered a lot of loss because they were also in the same area so, although they may have the goodwill initially, they may not be able to sustain taking on another family member.

The fact that the "adoption" has not been registered means that the authorities cannot follow up, and do not know where the child went. So, it's not necessarily that the original intent is evil but rather that the [social and bureaucratic] structures are weak and don't provide enough protection for children.

We want to support the family unit, not replace it. [Often],

the response [to the potential of abuse] has been to take children to orphanages, to remove them from their community and from their extended family.

What we're saying is that, if you have systems in place, if the families are willing to take in children, that's wonderful – but, unless you have a system to record how that is happening, you can have cases where that child simply becomes the domestic worker for that family.

It's not specifically sexual, but it's any kind of abuse. Our concern, however, is sexual abuse because we know there is quite a lot of it – but obviously, it's not only that. Children are vulnerable in many different ways.





Police warn of threat of 'missed call' explosions

spokesman for the Southern Border Provinces' Peace-building Command (SBPPC) warned residents in the Deep South not to return missed calls from unknown callers – because their mobile phones could be used to trigger devices for bombs planted by insurgents.

The SBPPC's Col Somkhuan Saengprathranet said that after the government tightened control over mobile-phone use by requiring the registration of all prepaid SIM cards, militants were reluctant to use their own phones for triggering bombs because they could be traced.

Phone operators suspended services to unregistered prepaid cell phones in the region on November 15.

A new tactic militants may adopt is to call a number at random and hang up, thereby leaving a missed call message on someone's phone. A returned call would set off the bomb, he explained.

"So please don't rush to return calls immediately after a missed call. If the person who has called you really wants to talk to you, they will call back," Col Somkhuan said.

He did not say if officials believe such a ruse had been employed before to detonate explosives.

Water conservation: The Public Health Ministry is encouraging the public to pay more attention to personal hygiene, after a study it conducted showed that about half of all Thais admit to not washing their hands before touching or eating food.



Farewell to alms?

Although the figure is lower than last year, when it hit 65%, it is still too high, said Public Health Minister Pinij Charusombat.

The ministry did not provide exact details of who was polled or where they lived. A press release announcing the results said only that respondents were aged from six years up.

The survey also revealed that four in 10 people admitted that they did not wash their hands after using the toilet.

Office space: The new Thai Rak Thai (TRT) party headquarters on Petchaburi Rd in Bangkok has been described as having the opulence of a luxury hotel.

The headquarters comprise two buildings, both belonging to PM Thaksin Shinawatra's wife, Pojaman, who spent 800 million baht to buy the property. Building 1 has eight floors, with offices for the Prime Minister and other executives on the top floor.

Facilities include a library and exhibition room, a press room, a multi-purpose room that can accommodate more than 1,000 people, and offices for all TRT MPs.

The most interesting floor is the seventh, which has a fullyequipped gym, basketball court, ping-pong area and a Thai massage and karaoke lounge.

Back to reality: The number of foreign tourist arrivals next year has been revised down from 15.1 million to 13.2 million, Tourism and Sports Minister Pracha Maleenont announced.

"The Tourism Authority of Thailand had set an ambitious tar-

get of 15 million, which is likely to be higher than reality. I want to make it more reasonable," he said.

International tourism is forecast to generate a total of 500 billion baht next year. The projected revenue remains unchanged, as the TAT expects average tourist spending – per head per day – to increase from 3,700 baht this year to more than 4,000 baht next year.

K. Pracha said that tourist arrivals in 2005 were expected to come in lower than projections, at 12 million, due to the effect of last year's tsunami, continuing southern unrest, global economic conditions and outbreaks of bird 'flu.

No head start: Nearly twothirds of Thai children display below-standard intellectual development levels, largely due to their parents' failure to provide them with proper care at a young age, the Social Development and Human Security Minister Watana Muangsook said.

Commenting on the results of a survey, he said, "Many parents just don't know how to raise their children, while others just don't have the time. So children are left at nurseries, where the number of children far outweighs the number of care-givers and there are no proper toys or activities to stimulate the children's brains."

Bad beetlejuice: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) warned of the potentially fatal side-effects of "Spanish Fly", a so-called aphrodisiac made from ground up beetle's wings that is reportedly being used by Chiang Mai youngsters to increase their sexual potency.

FDA Deputy Secretary Manit Arunakul said Spanish Fly was a derivative of the chemical compound cantharides, a drug the FDA is monitoring because no studies guarantee its safety.

"It takes hours for cantharides to become active. It makes the genitals swell and numb when users urinate, thus creating the myth that it stimulates sexual desire.

"It has potentially fatal sideeffects such as a swollen urinary tract, convulsions, coma and heart failure," he warned.

When R&R can also stand for Russian Roulette

SONGKHLA: A 23-year-old volver, which Pte Juthipon Marine private on leave from a posting in Narathiwat apparently misunderstood the meaning of "R&R", by shooting himself in the head during a drunken game of Russian Roulette.

On the evening of November 22, Pte Juthipon Singmanee, posted to the Chulabhorn Army Camp in strife-torn Narathiwat Province, was home during his leave of duty, socializing with four or five friends.

At an unnumbered house in Village 8 of Tambon Khao Roopchang in Songkhla's Muang District, the friends formed a wong lao (drinking circle) as a way of bidding farewell to Pte Juthipon, who was returning to active duty the next day.

One of the friends happened to have a partly loaded .38 rethought would be fun to use in a game of Russian Roulette. Removing all of the bullets but one, he put the pistol to his right temple and pulled the trigger.

Unfortunately for the young serviceman, the chamber holding the bullet happened to be the one set to discharge. With a deafening bang, the .38 slug ripped into his skull. He spun, and fell faceup with a thud into the center of the drinking circle.

Pol Maj Jamlong Suwaluck of Songkhla's Muang District Police, who questioned Juthipon's friends, said that the death was not a suicide relating to the stress of having to serve in the Deep South.

Bangkok balks at flood clean-up bill

he recent floods on Koh Samui caused damage estimated at more than 300 million baht. Houses were washed into rivers, roads subsided, and sand filled the roadside rainwater drains, causing floodwaters more than two meters deep in some areas.

Poor urban planning was cited as the major cause of the flooding, with roads and uncontrolled deforestation causing excessive run-off from hillsides.

The press announced that the Minister of the Interior had pledged large sums to improve the island's infrastructure, but according to Samui Mayor Waragorn Ratanarak, no figure was set during the minister's visit. Instead, the minister ordered a new town plan to be drawn up for the island, with a provisional budget of one billion baht.

Meanwhile, officials were told that the island should deal with infrastructural problems out of the existing municipal budgets.

It will take at least a month to see what funds will be made available to Samui for repairs, said the Mayor. The Surat Thani provincial authority receives all its special budgets from Bangkok,

where it is decided how much will reach Koh Samui. Until then, the local authorities must cope using the limited budgets they have.

The authorities on Koh Samui have long complained that the island's annual budget does not reflect its importance as a tourist destination. Now, with major damage to the main thoroughfares and with public services in disarray, officials are concerned that if public money is not injected swiftly, tourist levels may drop in the coming high season.

Doubtful pier-age: Punplisa Petcharat, a leading figure of the Surat Thani provincial authority, has expressed grave doubts as to the legitimacy of a proposed new public pier in Kanom District.

Three independent consultancy companies were contracted by the Harbor Department to conduct research into the facility, and their brief included recommending a suitable location.

K. Punplisa believes the chosen location, Thong Kweng Tao Bay, is far from ideal, not least because it suffers from extreme high tides ranging from 5 to 8 meters and is also subject to heavy winds for at least three months of the year.

A similar feasibility study carried out by a team from

Bangkok University found that an alternative location in Donsak would better suit the construction of a major new public pier.

K. Punplisa has recommended to the provincial government that Harbor Department reports be shelved in favor of the university study, and that Donsak become the new location for the pier based on its protected location and solid infrastructure.

Tax offensive: The Surat Thani Revenue Office recently announced that it intends to increase tax revenue by more than 11% this governmental budget year.

Thanomsi Lawangun from the Surat Thani tax office said that with businesses expanding in many sectors, his department is keen to make sure that both companies and individuals pay an appropriate share to the province.

Last year, provincial tax revenue increased by some 300 million baht to 27 billion baht, thanks mainly to the widespread collection of VAT on goods and services. This year's target is 30 billion baht.

Call for vigilance: The low tourist season is now in full swing on Samui and the recent floods have added further to the sense of desertion. Police are warning people to be extra-vigilant as during this period criminal gangs from the mainland tend to target empty properties around the island.

With the police overstretched as crime increases, the new village-based security groups have been particularly active in recent weeks. Although they are an effective deterrent, some residents feel the security teams use excessive force, and some members have been accused of being over-zealous in their reaction to the presence of strangers.



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


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Tying the knot the Sa-mer way

Fumiko predicts that Phuket will

become a trendy wedding dest-

ination for the Japanese.

't will come as little surprise that in Japan, the country that invented karaoke and pachinko, weddings can have a specially Japanese flavor, featuring laser shows and smoke ma-

But for some Japanese the price is too high – the cost averages 4 million yen, or about 1.3 million baht – and, in any case, they are looking for something more romantic, less techno-disco.

Which is where Sa-mer scores. Sa-mer, launched five years ago, was the first Phuket-based wedding and travel service catering for the Japanese. The Managing Director is Fumiko Nakayama, who moved here from Yokohama in 1999.

Fumiko started up Sa-Mer - Thai for "forever" well aware of the exorbitant cost of a wedding ceremony in Japan. She also knew that many Japanese are eager to travel to exotic locations for reasonably priced, intimate, non-religious weddings.

"I started from scratch, with an idea inspired by the beauty of the island, one computer and a website in a small office. I saw the potential, but with no means of doing any marketing in Japan, I registered Sa-Mer with Yahoo and Google and then relied on the Internet to develop a customer base," Fumiko says.
"Inquiries began to

trickle in and, since 2001, despite the outbreaks of avian 'flu and Sars in the region, I successfully organized, on average, 65 weddings a year.

That was until December 26, 2004. "Due to the tsunami, interest from Japan plunged to zero for 10 months, and all my staff left.'

But business has returned. Now, Fumiko has a

staff of eight and inquiries are flowing steadily again. Sa-Mer already has six Thai-style weddings booked between now and March, and 10 Western-style weddings confirmed between January and March.

Cost is definitely a factor. Watabe Wedding Co, a long-established Japan-based wedding business with 17 overseas branches, including a new one in Bali, noted in its 2004 annual report statistics that the average cost of a domestic wedding is 4 million yen.

Sa-Mer's full wedding services package, by contrast, averages a mere 150,000 baht. This includes any or all of the following: consulting on and arranging the wedding ceremony and venue; food; venue rental; rental and/or purchase of wedding gowns and tuxedos; photography, video and DVD services; hair and make-up; accommodation, flights and transport in Phuket.

"Hawaii is still the most popular overseas wedding destination for Japanese people," Fumiko admits. "However, the number of Japanese going there for weddings is dropping. On the other hand, the number choosing Bali has risen. In 2004, nearly 2,000 Japanese couples were married in Bali.

"Phuket could quickly become just as popular as Bali, if not more so."

Despite the advantage of Bali's five private wedding chapels and four churches, Fumiko believes that the threat of terrorist outrages is likely to put people off going there. Indeed, the Malaysian national news agency, Bernama, reported on November 30 that travel warnings issued by the Japanese government have caused a significant reduction in the number of its citizens visiting Indo-

"I run my business in co-operation with various dress shops in Phuket City, with a Japanese

photographer who has 30 years' experience in taking wedding pictures and videos, with Thai beauticians whom I train especially to meet my Japanese clients' standards and suit their tastes, with travel agencies, and with local hotels and beachfront restaurants," Fumiko says.

"Outdoor weddings right on the beach or simply under a canopy are not all that popular among Japanese people because of the weather factor, but the theatrical extravaganzas the Japanese once went for are now considered

Fumiko says that the couples who come to Phuket are looking for something they cannot find in Japan. Usually they have done their research and have a very good idea of what they want and where. Sa-Mer also serves couples from countries other than Japan, through collaboration with another wedding organizer -South Pacific Bridal.

"The most important part of my job is to deliver the high quality that an international clientèle expects," Fumiko

"Typically, they bring a small party of family and close friends – about 10 people – for a simple, but very romantic, tropical beachfront or viewpoint wedding.

"About 95% want a Western-style, non-religious ceremony in a chapel, but my clients who selected a Thai-style ceremony have always been thrilled with their colorful and memorable wedding

The Thai-style wedding ceremony involves nine Buddhist monks, a parade of musicians playing traditional Thai music, dancers and an elephant.

The legal aspect of marriage, though, is generally handled in Japan beforehand.

"Couples usually register their marriage in Japan first, though we are willing to assist couples with legal documentation here, if need be. They have to do some paperwork at the embassy in Bangkok in order to legalize a marriage in Thailand."

Fumiko looks forward to business expanding. "Phuket's prospects are good and I feel optimistic about the future. Next year, we'll be hiring professional marketing staff and revamping our website and logo," she says.



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There's a snake in your bathroom. Who you gonna call? Snakeman, of course. Nakhon Sri Thammarat-born Sayan Tammapunt spoke with the Gazette's Natcha Yuttaworawit about his unique vocation rescuing us from the cold-blooded legless reptile we love to hate.

ayan Tammapunt, 37, arrived on Phuket in 1981 planning to make good in the shrimp farming business. It didn't work out.

Then, in 1994 he and his

the field, joined forces to set up the Phuket Ruam Jai Rescue Foundation to help get injured people in remote areas to hospital. Licensed in 1996, the foundation focuses on Tambon Chalong, but serves other areas when called upon.

They are asked to catch snakes about once a month, more often during the dry season and the problem snakes are usually found in houses in heavily wooded locations.

"Most of the foundation's 30 members are volunteers who have willingly sacrificed their free time for this good cause for more than a decade," he says.

"We also help pets that are in trouble. In one case, we freed a dog caught in a nar-

row passageway between two walls. We help animals to safety once we are certain we are not putting any people, including ourselves, in danger by doing so.

"What usually happens is

dation for assistance. A rescue mission normally is dangerous and snakes are among the most common threats we face on Phuket.

"Depending on the situation, brother, who had experience in up to four people may be dis-

patched to deal with one snake. In 1999, we caught our first python. We didn't have any special skills then, but peoples' expectations of us were - and still are – high; we never like to disappoint anyone. Sometimes we are frightened, but in our line of duty, and as men, we try not to show it.

"When people see a snake in their home, their first impulse is to open the doors and windows so it can leave. So by the time we arrive, the snake will have slithered somewhere out of sight and there is no way for us to be sure it is still in the house, or what kind of snake it is.

"The next hurdle is having to

search every nook and cranny in every single room. People worry that in the process we will help ourselves to their belongings," he says. "So I let them follow us, observe our actions and check

it will bite anything that approaches and won't let go. Based on this awareness of snake behavior, K. Sayan has devised a simple technique using some cloth, a wooden pole with a hook on one end and a sack.

"I wrap one hand in thick cloth and reach out toward the snake. Once the snake bites into the cloth, I drag it out. With my other hand, I grab it just behind its head and quickly toss it into the sack. Sometimes I use the pole rather than my hand.

Thus far, some 35 snakes have been caught, cobras and pythons being the ones K. Sayan has most commonly encountered on Phuket.

Usually the snakes are not harmed, and are released at Toh Sae Hill in Phuket

City. However, Malayan pit vipers – even more deadly than cobras – are immediately dispatched.

"The hardest to catch is the King Cobra – the largest venomous snake.

"The King Cobra is longer and wider than a regular cobra and strikes higher.

"Not one of us has ever been bitten by a snake while on a mission because we take every precaution and monitor snake behavior extremely closely.

Snakes show predictable signs when they are ready to strike," he adds.

"Although King Cobras are worth about one or two thousand baht each and sometimes snake farms try to buy them from us, we don't sell them because we want them to continue living wild and free

"Another dangerous animal we deal with is monkeys, which bite people from time to time. Monkeys move really fast; a staff member was bitten once and had to go to hospital for treatment. Other than that we have been very fortunate."

K. Sayan, otherwise known as "Snakeman" loves what he does and plans to continue helping people and animals "forever".







otoring down to the south of island, I arrive at Nai Harn Beach. Nai Harn is known to be one of Phuket's quieter beaches and a major expat magnet, mostly because of its laid-back atmosphere. It's also the location of the Sabana Resort, with its Nhamaya Health Spa Center.

There is no denying the spa's genuine tropical feel, with coconut trees and plants aplenty. I feel as if I really should have worn my grass skirt. The spa has three treatment rooms and features two Thai massage beds, four beds for oil massage and two chairs for foot massage, as well as a Jacuzzi.

I get a warm welcome from Manager Sunanta "Jum" Malee, and she helps me choose the "Secrets of Nhamaya" package, then guides me to reception which doubles as a foot-massage room. There, I'm immediately spoiled rotten with an aromatherapy foot bath with floating hibiscus flowers. Later, I tiptoe on newly resurrected tootsies to the oil-massage room next door for a Thai Herbal Body Scrub.

K. Jum tells me that the treatment uses turmeric, honey, wet tamarind, powdered milk and oats – all mixed together. "This helps to nourish your body," she explains. A sort of exterior muesli without the yogurt, if you will.

The body scrub is enthusiastically applied, from my shoul-

ders right down to my feet in a grand rolling style. After a bath it's time for a Traditional Thai Massage.

This, I really like. My masseuse, K. Prang, is extremely skillful at what she does, and explains that she uses different pressures depending on her guests' weight and size.

K. Jum adds that the most important factor in Thai-style massage is to focus on muscle



areas, where people feel stress and fatigue. K. Prang first does my spine, then shoulders and back and then stretches me a little before turning me over to concentrate on my legs and hands. She then uses pressure techniques.

Afterwards, it is time for the facial treatment using a natural mix of products featuring... you guessed it, yogurt, to cleanse my pores. Later, a mixture of lemon juice, honey, powdered oak, powdered milk and clay rich in alumina is applied for five minutes. Then, tomato slices are pressed to my face.

Whatever next? Worcester Sauce? No matter, it's explained to me that this helps fill any skin cavities in the most natural way possible.

Finally, after a dessert of cucumbers and a layer of smoothing vitamin E cream, my face feels fantastic.

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Staying healthy when putting your back into wine


ubin was a former employee of mine. His hobby was weightlifting and he was a massive guy, twice my weight. One day I was fixing a broken barrel and I asked him to pick up a hammer that was out of my reach from the floor. As he picked it up his back snapped and he collapsed in agony. It was two months before he could walk again.

Back injuries have plagued humans since our ancestors first stood upright, and these are the leading occupational hazards in most countries. Wine lovers and those who work with wine often injure themselves when lifting or carrying wine because they ig-

ubin was a former nore the principles of physics and employee of mine. common sense.

Physics is the science that gives us the understanding needed to guide rockets to Mars, to build tall buildings, and to comprehend why we should not bend over to lift heavy boxes of wine. Remember torque and Newton's Second Condition of Equilibrium from high school physics? They can predict the force acting on the disks that separate the vertebrae in our spine when lifting heavy objects.

A 50-pound box of wine, for example, creates a force of almost 300 pounds on the base of the spine. That's a lot of weight for a few tiny disks to support. To safely lift we must avoid creating torque. We can do this by

keeping the back straight and never twisting or turning while lifting heavy objects.

Bottles of wine are not only heavy, they are also expensive.

Remember, torque affects everything, not just your back, so don't stack wine boxes too high or they may fall. You certainly don't want to be under their weight if they do.

Here is a list of basic rules for carrying and storing wine:

- Never lift with your back; always lift with your legs, keeping your back straight and upright. Let your legs to do the work.
- Never twist your spine or reach with your arms while lifting. Use your legs to turn your body.
- Never lift above the shoulders.
- Don't stack wine more than four boxes high. Alternate the direction of each layer of boxes for added stability.
- Don't allow children or unauthorized persons access to winestorage areas.

- Be sure you are fit enough and stretch before lifting.
- Don't attempt to lift more than you are capable of.
- Ensure employees have been taught safe lifting principles, and that they obey them.

Take good care of your back; it is the only one you have and nothing is more painful and debilitating than a back injury. It is ironic when something as enjoyable and healthful as wine puts one under.




On the menu was bass loud enough to make a mockery of the 15,000 baht you spent on your





he other day, for the first time, I ordered a plate of khao pat Amerikan -American fried rice – in a Thai restaurant.

As an American, I was curious to see what it would look like. Americans don't usually eat rice, so I assumed that Thais had invented this dish to represent the kind of rice they thought we might eat.

I wondered if it would be mixed with hamburger, which is practically our national dish. It might be garnished with peanut butter, which is another national

Maybe it would be decorated with a tiny plastic American flag waving proudly from the ricetop – or a miniature replica of the Statue of Liberty.

Strikeout on all fronts. There was no hamburger, no peanut butter, no flag and no Statue of Liberty. But there was a sachet of ketchup, reflecting keen insight into the American penchant for pouring ketchup on our food.

American fried rice was a letdown. It was nothing but a mound of fried rice garnished with a fried egg, four large raisins and a couple of mini-hotdogs. It was the worst plate of fried rice I've ever eaten.

I wondered what evil spirit had inspired the inventor of this dish to make it so tasteless. I wondered what demon had caused him to imagine that Americans would eat raisins with their rice. And I wondered what fiend had made him slit the ends of the hotdogs.

Yes! The mini-hotdogs had slices cut into each end in an attempt to simulate flower petals. They looked like little stumpy hands with chopped-off fingers.

As I brooded on these mysteries, the answer slowly dawned. Some malicious, anti-American Thai had created American fried rice as an insult to my people. When Giuliani became mayor in 1993, crime was skyrocketing, police morale was low, the welfare rolls bulged (one welfare recipient for every seven workers), the mad and the homeless wandered the streets, and the education system was a shambles: for every 1.7 teachers there was an administrator. Sup porting this system was a partnership of lame white liberals ("the compassion industry" in Giuliani's trenchant phrase) and "race racketeers" like the Reverend Al Sharpton. "In New York," one observer noted, "race isn't part of politics. It is politics."

Squeegee hustlers, aggressive panhandlers, loud drunks, homeless people infesting parks, graffiti gangs, kids packing deafening ghetto blasters – all were vigorously defended by the liberal lawyers of the New York branch of the American Civil Liberties Union in the name of "free

speech". A symbolic act very early in the Giuliani administration showed that there was a new broom in town:

"Bella Abzug, the colorful and lively left-wing former congresswoman and senatorial candidate from Manhattan, was standing on the long wide steps of City Hall announcing her resignation from her unpaid position of chair of the Mayoral Committee on the Status of Women (not to be confused with the Mayor's Commission on Women). Her action, she said, was to protest the new administration's rude and "shocking treatment of her staff." When Giuliani began ascending the steps, she tried to hand her resignation to the new mayor who, barely taking notice of her, replied, 'Why don't you send it in?' A few steps on he added, 'I have a feeling when I get it I'll accept it.' Watching the pas de deux, a bystander quipped, 'in one era and out the other."

One of the new mayor's major talents was to recruit and

retain a highly capable staff, many of them black and Latino. At his regular 8 am meetings, he presided over a committed overhaul of the city's creaking bureaucracy. Police morale soared as crime plummeted. There were noisy protests outside City Hall every day led by outraged liberals, the successors of the old Tammany Hall power brokers.

"The new Tammany was wrapped in a cloth of sanctimony," Siegel writes. "It professed to represent the interests of the poor. Protected in part by civil service and union power, it was immune to elections, and rather than being subject to scrutiny by the press it was mostly treated as a sacred cow."

As American statesman Daniel Patrick Moynihan observed, "Liberalism faltered when it turned out it could not cope with the truth."


Giuliani won his next election by a landslide.

And his results were passed down to his Republican successor Michael Bloomberg, who has presided over a further reduction in the crime rate, concrete gains in education and a soaring economy, helped along by 850,000 industrious new immigrants.

The new order is here to stay, as evidenced by the latest

Let your body do the talking

rin McKean, an American editor of dictionaries, once said, "English is messy, uninhibited, sprawling and sloppy." One instance of such sloppiness is that a surprising number of English speakers don't know the difference between "ravish" and "ravage".

An example: if Ken kidnaps Barbie and takes her away from her evil step-family, then has passionate sex with her (against her will or not), he's ravishing her. If he takes her into the woods and messily mutilates her body, he's ravaging her. Both have an element of violence, but another crucial difference is that Ken can ravage a tree, but not ravish it (or he can try to – if he's slightly insane).

There are so many nuances in the English language, so many different meanings, it's no wonder that people misunderstand each other constantly. A word as simple as "set" has 196 separate definitions

No worries, though – the words we speak only account for 3% of our actual communication. 70% of our communication is through body language, while the rest is through verbal intonation, our facial expressions and written communication. However, it's not simply the spoken language that has infinite possibilities for creating misunderstandings – sometimes our body language can be just as confusing.

Take one of the most basic types of body language as an example: shaking your head from side to side means "no", and

nodding your head up and down means "yes". Or does it?

In Bulgaria, most people do the opposite, which must lead to some grave misunderstandings in cross-cultural dating. Eskimos wink instead of shaking their head for no, and the Dyaks of Borneo raise their eyebrows for a yes, but contract them slightly and squint their eyes for a no.

The Turks shake their head for yes, and say no by tossing their heads back and clucking. Charles Darwin found that English babies shook their heads when refusing their food, but inclined their heads forward for food in a nodding gesture. Did this mean that humans are born with basic body language, or that the babies learned these signs by observing their parents? Darwin wasn't sure.

Another type of body language that causes cross-cultural confusion is a simple thumbs up, which means OK almost everywhere... except in Iran, Iraq, Sardinia and Greece, where it means "screw you". And wouldn't you know it, American troops have interpreted Iraqi thumbs up gestures as symbols of support – but are the ostensibly cheering Iraqis showing their displeasure or have they learned the American meaning of thumbs up? In any case, foreign hitchhikers in these countries must have some pretty lively roadside experiences.

In Western culture, pointing a leg or knee towards a person is a sign that you're interested in them or that you accept them - on the other hand, pointing your feet at someone is unspeakably rude in Thailand, and crossing your foot over your leg in front of an Arab symbolizes a threatening weapon.

Of course, your body sends out messages even when you're not aware of it, especially when you don't want it to. For example, common signs that someone is lying to you include a lack of eye contact, fidgeting, breaking out in a sweat, and a stiffness of their body and facial expression. However, in Asian and African culture it's seen as a sign of respect to avoid making eye contact with a superior.

When it comes to the fine art of flirting, body language is much more effective than cheesy pick-up lines such as, "Was your father a baker? You've got a great set of buns!" However, body language, if not tuned finely enough, can be just as clumsy. One website simply says, "Stand up straight and stick out your assets. That's the kind of body language no man can resist!"

But how do we know if someone is flirting with us? Fortunately, flirting has developed over the centuries and blinking furiously because there's a bit of sand in your eye isn't misconstrued as, "Come hither, I want to ravish you," any more.

Yet the eyes are still incredibly important (but please, no pick-up lines about jewel thieves putting gems in women's eyes.) A dead giveaway is if someone is staring at your lips or breasts, but a subtler the few forms of it truly universal – so wherever you are.

hint is that when a person likes what they see, their pupils dilate.

One problem is that people are very quick to judge others, and on dates we're particularly paranoid creatures. Just relax – if your date has crossed arms, don't automatically assume it is an offensive gesture – he or she might simply feel cold (in which case, offer your jacket!).

Some 55% of the first impressions we gain from people originate in body language, and that's not including the bonecrushing handshake that businessmen like to use. The knowledge that I'm being judged by my posture, the way I fidget, the way my feet are arranged, my gestures, and the set of my shoulders in the first 10 or 20 seconds that I've met someone... is all enough to induce a stress-related tic in my eye. (Of course I'm then perceived as slightly unhinged by the other person, which continues the vicious cycle of insecurity and insane body language.)

Cosmopolitan magazine suggests that to attract someone, you should slowly lick your lips, then dip your little finger in your dessert and slowly suck it off. But I suggest that you simply smile warmly and genuinely – after all, a smile makes you more attractive, more approachable, and makes you feel better as well. It's one of the few forms of body language that is truly universal – so don't hesitate to smile wherever you are.

After all, we are in the Land of Smiles, aren't we?



Dear Stephen,

Dok anjun or "Butterfly Pea" is a creeping type of plant that people love to grow in the garden as a decoration, as well as for herbal purposes. It has a beautiful crimson color. The juice is used for making desserts such as *Khaow Niew Heep*, a typical Phuket *khanom* (sweet). My



Northeastern Thai friend even showed me how to eat it raw with *nam prik* (spicy fish sauce) and it tasted very good.

It is now widely used in making shampoo and hair conditioner because we believe that it is good for our hair. Many Thais rub this flower on children's eyebrows and this is a Thai tradition which I'm told is widely practiced throughout the country.

We believe that by doing this, it will help to thicken our eyebrows (only when young, though). After she showers just rub the petals on your daughter's eyebrows. Don't worry about the purple color because it will quickly fade away. Just do it a few times and don't be serious about it.

I did this to my sons when they were young. For the youngest, I even rubbed it on his bald head. They both have very thick eyebrows and thick hair, although this is probably as a result of their father's genes, in addition to the help of *Dok anjun*. If you follow your neighbor's advice, we believe that your daughter will benefit by having thicker eyebrows so she will not have to use an eyebrow pencil when she's older.

probably shouldn't write anything else about Paul Moorhouse, due to the fact that I've already written more about him, his colleagues and projects than anybody else on the island.

But I have been stuck with writing property stories every week, which has become increasingly difficult.

It had also become increasingly tempting to "forget" to file every so often – so if someone kept coming up with good projects, I would and will write about them.

These days my scope is a bit broader. In addition to property, there are subjects like life on the island, loudspeakers, concrete pigs, GOMs (grumpy old men) and other matters of monumental importance to tackle.

This article is, however, related to property and is about Paul Moorhouse and his latest development, Layan Gardens and more besides.

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Out with loutish touts

High season is here again, and already the complaints about tailors' touts are rolling in. Patong recently had a crackdown on them, hauling a bunch off the streets and fining them under Section 397 of the Penal Code, which appropriately sanctions anyone who "...in a public place... does, by any means whatever to annoy or bully the other person..." That sounds about right.

A reader in Kata recounted the tale of an acquaintance who was stopped in the street by a tout. "I'm sorry, I don't have enough money to buy a suit," the visiting innocent said, thinking this would be a polite way to wriggle out of the situation without being confrontational. "Then f**k off back to your own country," barked the dis-

On the other side of the coin, the Gazette also received a complaint from a merchant in Patong who complained that his "boy" had been hauled off by officials who later poured hot tea over his head.

The "boy", who had already been arrested and fined on a couple of previous occasions, apparently gave the officials a mouthful, at which one of them lost his patience. That case was settled with no legal action on either side.

The owner of one tailor shop, quoted in our news story this week, comments, "If we annoyed tourists, we would be in the wrong." Correct. Perhaps that particular tailor's tout is the model of restrained politeness, but one has to wonder. Certainly, his counterpart in Kata is not.

The trouble with the whole touting system is that it is based on pushing people to the point where they give in, where they bow to pressure. After all, it would not be very effective to employ as a tout someone who gave up as soon as a prospective buyer said, "No

Irritation, confrontation, harassment and bullying – anything to get attention – are what touts do. If they cannot, they are not touts, and there is no point in hiring them.

One of the great mysteries is why so many of them are employed by tailors. One can understand shady businesses, such as some of the timeshare companies and sex show operators, using touts. They don't want or cannot have a real shop window, so they employ people to hit the streets and drag in customers by whatever means possible. But why tailors?

Whatever the reason, the Gazette applauds the crackdown and hopes that it will continue until the aggressive touts and their masters get the point, which is this: nobody likes you and nobody wants you. So go away. - The Editor

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

The "mo-cy" driver told me that he has been getting a lot of passengers to the airport because people wait for the bus at Big C, where no timetable is posted and there's nowhere to sit.

When the bus fails to show up, people are forced to endure an expensive, bone-jarring and hazardous bike ride to the airport. Some, like me, are elderly and have luggage – which makes the ride even more dangerous.

It would be nice to receive an apology, a bus schedule and a refund of my 300 baht. But, like

the bus, this will probably never come.

On November 1, the airport bus schedule changed in order to accommodate the number of flights landing at Phuket International Airport during the high season. There are still 13 daily roundtrip buses to the air-

The first bus leaves the bus terminal in Phuket City for the airport at 5 am and the last bus leaves for the airport at 6:30 pm. People should not have to wait for an overdue bus more than one hour.

Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat sounds off

hen Deputy Prime Minister Suwat Liptapanlop came to Patong recently, some members of his entourage ordered a test of the tsunami warning system here – but without any advance warning to the municipality. For this reason, we were unable to provide adequate warning to the public that it was

The reason for the delay was that the NDWC official they called was not personally authorized to activate the alarm [on a trial basis] because his office had never received a written request for such a testing of the alarm system in Patong. Some of his advisers had requested a test of the new warning siren at Saphan Hin on that day, but not at Patong.

His people decided to switch to Patong because it was more convenient; that day DPM Suwat was to be at the nearby Graceland Resort & Spa for a meeting.

At first, they asked the municipality to activate the alarm using our leased line, but we didn't comply because we didn't want to frighten the public into thinking a real tsunami was imminent. After that, they decided to call the NDWC themselves and order a test sounding.

It is important to understand that it was never really a test of the tsunami evacuation system, but rather a demonstration for DPM Suwat.

In the event of a real test or evacuation drill, Phuket Municipality will send out official notices warning tourists, hotels, businesses, TV and radio stations.

During a visit to Phuket on November 25 to inspect the progress of preparations for the tsunami memorial activities later this month, members of Deputy Prime Minister Suwat Liptapanlop's entourage ordered an impromptu demonstration of the three tsunami warning towers at Patong Beach. The DPM expressed displeasure when a call placed to the Nonthaburi-based National **Disaster Warning Center** (NDWC) resulted in a 10minute delay before the sirens sounded. The DPM then called for better coordination between the



NDWC and local authorities. Here Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukkaban explains why he thinks criticism of the delay was unjustified, and why off-the-cuff tests are a bad idea.

DPM Suwat's group, we could have done this.

But Patong Municipality was given no advance warning whatsoever, and members of the DPM's entourage bypassed us when they ordered the NDWC to activate the siren.

I strongly disagree with what they did. The button to activate the tsunami warning siren is not a toy that anybody can just come up and press whenever they want. In fact, testing of the system is a very sensitive issue that impacts not only on our image among tourists, but also on our preparedness to carry out an actual tsunami evacuation, should one become necessary.

People will stop paying attention to the siren if it is sounded too often with no advance warn-

If the government wants to test the system, we are happy to take part. But the testing should be done at regular intervals, say every three to six months, and then only with advance written notice so that we can prepare the public for it.

The real problem on November 25 stemmed from members of the DPM's entourage switching from Saphan Hin to Patong at the last minute, without informing anyone at the NDWC about the change.

I really don't understand why they went they went to all the trouble of filing a written request for a test of the Saphan Hin warning tower and then canceled the plan without even going to have a look at the warning tower

I think it's very important that when high-ranking government officers come to inspect the tsunami warning system that they send a letter in advance so that the time and date will be known and we can co-ordinate the effort efficiently, using teamwork.

On November 22, Suranand Vejjajiva [Minister Attached to the Prime Minister's Office] announced the scheduled testing on December 16 of all the NDWC warning towers in all five Andaman Coast provinces. [But] Phuket Municipality has still not received any official letter informing us of this upcoming test.

We should be the first ones to be informed since it is our responsibility to warn the public in advance so that they won't be confused or afraid.

Buying land from abroad

My Thai wife is thinking of buying a home in Thailand. Does she have to go to the Land Office in person to register ownership of the land or can this be done by mail, through a lawyer?

Also, are there any other requirements for registering land or property, and can these be handled by mail or through a law-

With both of us thousands of miles away in the UK it is very difficult to schedule trips around Land Office or government requirements and travel costs are expensive.

Please can you tell me what paperwork needs to done in person when one is buying land in Thailand?

Friedrich "Sam" Fauma, Senior Partner of the International Law Office, replies:

To effect a transfer of property at the Land Department neither the buyer nor the seller need appear in person so long as their representatives have been provided with a correctly drawn-up power of attorney, signed by the absent parties.

The power of attorney should be accompanied by signed copies of house registration, ID card or passport.

One situation in which a personal appearance is required, however, is when a Thai citizen married to a foreigner would like to buy land.

In this case the foreign spouse must appear in person at the Land Department.

There, he or she must sign a declaration stating that the funds used for the purchase of the land belong to the Thai spouse from before the marriage.

This is to ensure that the land is not part of any settlement should the couple subsequently divorce.

I always check when walking along the streets, and if I find a tuk-tuk that does not have a list of fares on display, the driver is arrested.

If you find a driver who does not display the fares or who 'traps' you into paying a higher fare, you can call me at 01-8914335 or call 1584, and we will arrest him.

Q: It seems as though everybody is recommending that we download the new Windows Antispyware program (www.tinyurl. com/8e77h).

When I download it, I am asked for a Windows Genuine Advantage (WGA) Software number, which I do not have. I used the online software and it told me that I didn't have a valid copy of Windows.

I purchased my computer system privately. There doesn't appear to be any way to get past the WGA block. I can subscribe to WGA at a cost of 5,885 baht in order to get Windows Antispyware, but is it worth the cost? - FP, Muang Phuket

A: You're running a pirate copy of Windows. If you bought the computer thinking that you had the real thing, you got ripped off. If you didn't have that expectation, this is one of the conse-

WGA examines your computer to see if your copy of Windows is valid, and blocks access to downloads if your copy isn't up to snuff. I don't know of any way to hack Windows Genuine Advantage, but I'm sure a Google search will come up with something.

As for Windows Antispyware, no, it definitely isn't worth 5,885 baht. You're much better off buying an antispyware package like Sunbelt Software's CounterSpy (www.sunbeltsoftware.com/CounterSpy.cfm), which costs about 800 baht.

That said, you might want to consider buying a legitimate copy of Windows anyway, if only to get all the patches and other downloads that are blocked by WGA. Microsoft is slowly tightening the screws, requiring WGA validation before allowing you to download all sorts of things. Keep in mind that you can buy Windows anywhere – if the prices in Thailand give you a nosebleed, a copy of Windows purchased in the US or Europe, Hong Kong or Singapore works just as well.

Q: I have Outlook Express and unfortunately it seems to be a bugger to back up. I tried a file search for Outlook *.* files, and a myriad of entries came up, but nothing indicating a file large enough to hold all my mail. How do I back up my Outlook Express

A: Here's some news from the Cold, Hard Facts Department: people who are serious about email use Outlook or, rarely, Eudora, or one of the many Outlook competitors. If you rely on email, Outlook Express will drive you nuts. (In spite of the similarity in names, Outlook and Outlook Express have absolutely nothing in common.)

Microsoft hasn't updated Outlook Express in six or seven years. There's no money in it. Microsoft sells Outlook as part of the Office package or as the userside program in Exchange Server. Microsoft gives away Outlook Express for free. Given

Pirate copies of Windows



Only a Microsoft marketeer could come up with a name like 'Windows Genuine Advantage' to describe a program that checks your computer to see if it has a pirate copy of Windows

Microsoft's hell-bent focus on profits, I bet you can guess why Outlook Express has long claimed the title of the most frequently used orphan in the PC business.

Rumor has it that the new Outlook Express in the next version of Windows (or, more accurately, the next version of Internet Explorer) may be marginally better than the current version. But I, for one, won't hold my breath.

First, even if Microsoft decides to give away the farm, the next version of Windows and/or IE is many, many months away.

Second, I've never seen Microsoft make a free program that's worth anything unless they're trying to strangle a major competitor. Lately, likely targets include Google and Firefox. In previous years, the victims have included Netware, Netscape and

Adobe (remember Type 1 fonts?). There are no big, free alternatives to Outlook. Not yet,

As for backing up Outlook Express files and settings, it's an

Microsoft has a Knowledge Base article on the subject at support.microsoft.com/kb/ 270670. But Microsoft glosses over the tough parts: if you scan Google for "Outlook Express Backup", you'll find dozens of products offered. That's a fairly plain sign that the job is much more difficult than Microsoft makes it out to be.

When faced with a thorny situation like this one, I usually go to Tucows (www.tucows.com/ search) and see if anybody has put together a shareware program that solves the problem.

In this case, if you search on "Outlook Express Backup" and follow the cows closely, you should come up with a viable backup program.


Speaking of cows, Madison, Wisconsin has joined the list of cities with fast, free, city-wide Wi-Max wireless Internet access. Twenty-six companies (including Google) are currently competing to provide fast, free, city-wide Wi-Max wireless access to all of San Francisco.

Intel announced that it was sponsoring several Wi-Max demonstration projects in provinces around Thailand, but Phuket wasn't on the list.

Meanwhile, Shin Corp has announced that it will invest tens of billions of baht in 3G wireless telephone service over the next few years. 3G offers advanced telephone capabilities as well as fast wireless Internet.

So 3G competes directly with Wi-Max, but at a price set by the 3G company. Are these developments related? What is the effect on our IT Paradise?

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Leading brand names are not untouchable

his year has been interesting from the perspective of global economics and financial markets.

Sharp rises in oil prices were of great concern to countries dependent on imported oil. Many commodity prices also

rose steeply, with fears of inflationary pressures everywhere.

However, the world of 2005 is vastly different to, say, 1975 or even 1990. Globalization has changed the ground rules dramatically, as has the global decline in the influence of trade unions. Competition has never been more intense – and this brings great benefits. China and other truly emerging markets are producing products that actually have a deflationary impact on the developed world. This helped to counter, to a great degree, other inflationary pressures.

Politicians and local manufacturers in developed countries continually complain about cheaper imports. The reality is that consumers want the best value for money available, and we live in an increasingly democratic world. Consumers are merely citizens who are exercising their rights to choose what they want to buy and the price they are prepared to pay.

Brand names are still of great importance and of inestimable value if managed correctly. Brands are susceptible to rises and falls, just as national empires have moved through the same cycle for thousands of years.

General Motors (GM) and Ford are two perfect examples of leading brand names in serious trouble. General Motors is a company that is denying reality. It may be closing manufacturing plants in the US and cutting staff levels, but the credit rating agencies are not impressed. Fitch Ratings has publicly stated that GM's plans are unworkable they are not going to solve its problems. It is simply the old sumer. Manufacturers, such as

story of moving the deck chairs on the Titanic (my words).

GM's share price has fallen by more than 40% this year alone. Its market capitalization is now a mere US\$14 billion. Predators are circling, with only one aim in mind: if they take control it will be to asset-strip the company. Asset

stripping is simply selling off parts of a company to realize a greater figure than the purchase price of the whole entity.

At a glance, GM is sitting on a mountain of cash, US\$19 billion to be exact. However, it is US\$31 billion in debt, and loses money with every car it sells. Quarterly losses now exceed US\$1 billion.

Asset strippers can see only one part of the company with a decent market price, and that is GMAC - General Motors Acceptance Corporation - the finance arm of the business. In GM's core market, the US, the problem is, who would want to buy GM's manufacturing plants?

Japanese manufacturers, especially Toyota, Honda and Nissan, are gaining market share at the expense of GM and Ford. Traditionally, Japanese car manufacturers have declined to buy other companies' plants for several reasons.

First, they are highly sensitive about giving the impression that they are benefiting from the woes of traditional US manufacturers. Second, they do not want to inherit GM's corporate culture, let alone its obsolete and expensive union contracts.

The Economist Intelligence Unit echoed these sentiments on CNBC Europe, and added that Ford is in even greater denial. Pointing out that Ford seems to be operating a revolving door policy with its Chief Executive Officers. Ford shares have fallen even more than GM this year – 43.3% at the time of writing.

The core issue is the con-









Japanese manufacturers, especially Toyota, Honda and Nissan, are gaining market share at the expense of GM and Ford


Toyota and Honda, score highly on domestic independent research in the US for reliability. GM and Ford have recently improved, but image is everything. Politicians can say what they want, but American consumers are voting with their wallets.

Some may feel that this is a tragedy for America. In reality, it is the free market working as it should. The losers are the shareholders and employees of failing companies, but the harsh facts of life are that you cannot make an omelet without breaking eggs.

Many situations can develop in our lives that change the outcomes of events we thought we could predict. New technology is a perfect example. The business rivalry between Toyota and GM is a possible case. Both companies realize that there has to be a better way to provide energy for motor vehicles. Fuel cell technology is one of the most exciting alternatives, as not only is it comparatively simple, it is also pollution-free. To this extent several years ago Toyota and GM created a joint venture with significant funding to develop this technology. The venture is already producing working prototypes.

Should this produce a commercially viable solution, the gas station as we know it today could well become a fuel-cell exchange center. Vehicle manufacturers, perhaps in co-operation, could well become direct competitors to existing oil companies. Certainly, it will dramatically change the situation as we know it today. Oil prices will enter a new bear market, but oil companies are not complacent. Even BP's slogan, "Beyond Petroleum", recognizes the reality of change.

Although all top players have uniquely idiosyncratic backswings, their styles at the golden point of impact are almost identi-

With the lower body leading the downswing, the pull of the hips will – ultimately – force the shoulders to rotate through the impact with a great release of

By allowing the body to unwind fully from its "coil", the momentum, which continues with the arms stretching (Pic 2), will help to carry the player through the impact to a tall finish (*Pic 3*).

Achieving the sound of the sublime

The classic mistake – more often than not made by men with a surfeit of testosterone – is when the player goes at the ball like an express train and hits it from the top.

The hands then lead the way, overtaking the release of the weak slice shot to the right.

Next time you play, try to resist that temptation to hit from the top, and instead let the body unwind naturally and smoothly.

Australia and China came equal second in the national rankings with 109 points, and the US came third with 107 points.




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

ach on a one-rai plot, these two high-quality villas with large living areas of 370 square meters are ideally situated in a quiet location at the heart of the island.



with Bloomin' Bert

Easy pea sea. It's bean a shore thing

m I the only person in the world who thinks that most witticisms containing a pun aren't particularly amusing? Daft stuff like a chocolate shop called "Cocoa-nuts" or the sign above a psychiatrist's couch that says, "I shrink, therefore I am". That kind of thing. It's just not punny.

How about the story of the skeptical anthropologist who was cataloging South American folk remedies with the assistance of a tribal witch doctor, who indicated that the leaves of a particular fern were a sure cure for constipation? When the anthropologist voiced his doubts, the witch doctor looked him in the eye and said, "Let me tell you, with fronds like these, who needs enemas?" All right, I'll admit to a slight snigger there.

I have to be honest – the headlines that appear at the top of this very column are often not my own. Do you really think I could be responsible for the headline "Bauhinian Rhapsody" about the bauhinia or "Cannary Worf" appearing above a story about the canna? No, sorry. Not me.


m I the only person in the world who thinks that most witticisms I just don't have the imagination, I suppose. I leave that to the experts in the field.

pun is defined by Webster as "the humorous use of a word, or words which are formed or sounded alike but have different meanings, in such a way as to play on two or more of the possible applications; a play on words." Certainly not in the least bit amusing when put that way.

No doubt you will be impressed, therefore, that this week's story isn't headlined "a beach of a life" or something similar, as we're having a look at something that seems to thrive on Phuket's beaches. This is a plant that knows the best spots on the island – the sea bean, or *pak bung talay* in Thai.

It does an exceptional job of quietly binding the sand together on most of the island's beaches. More correctly known as *canavalia maritima*, this sturdy, ecologically aware little plant is also known as the beach bean, bay bean, or MacKenzie bean. Whatever its name, it's a member of the pea family, so garden peas and those little purple-flow-

ered plants growing up your fence are both distant cousins.

It's normally a "ground vine", but given half a chance, it will climb up small trees or anything else it can grip. The problem is that the areas in which it thrives tend not to have any trees around, as it loves the sun and does best in wide, exposed areas. The ground cover is usually above around 15 cm in height.

The oval, evergreen leaves are 5cm- to 10cm-long leaflets, rounded at the ends. Small groups of pink to purple flowers appear among these bright green leaves throughout the year. The distinctive flowers are followed by sturdy little woody pods, which give away the plant's pea parentage.

Another use for this versatile plant is on top of a wall. If a number of them are put together, they'll happily cascade and trail down the side of the wall, covering an otherwise bland patch of brick or concrete.

While it's not a particularly showy plant, it requires absolutely no effort to grow. Once planted, it will just sit there and look after itself. It's very accepting of near-drought conditions, doesn't attract any pests to speak of, and grows especially well in sandy soil. All it requires is sunlight. The more the better.

Nobody knows where the sea bean originated. Its seeds are carried well by ocean currents, which is probably how it arrived here in Phuket in the first place. It is now widely distributed on tropical ocean beaches and seaside dunes all over this and many other regions.

The sea bean is actually cultivated as a green manure crop or as a forage crop for cattle in some areas. Its tendency to trail and expand along the ground, along with its soil-binding roots, make it very popular for ocean beach stabilization and seaside dune restoration projects in many parts of the world, though not here.

The seeds are keen to germinate if the seed coat is punctured or nicked to allow water absorption and gas exchange. Seedling growth is fairly quick, producing vines a meter and a half long in two or three weeks.


The seeds of the sea bean can be gathered from parent plants at almost any time of year.

Apparently, young pods of this bean species are eaten cooked. In certain areas of southeast Asia, young seeds reportedly are used to make *aroi maak* – pease porridge – or so I'm told. The downside is that fresh immature seeds contain toxic substances and should not be eaten raw

In Thailand, its crushed leaves are well-known to relieve the pain of jellyfish stings, while in Malaysia, the flowers are used as a flavoring. Yummy...

Given my desperation to avoid anything that could be construed as a play on words, I've managed to avoid describing the sea bean as a "beachin" plant, or suggesting that it has "bean there, done that". Oops.
