Gov helps search for little Solitaire

PHUKET: Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura has assigned a team to help Sascha and Patchara "Riem" Meissmer investigate the identity and whereabouts of a Eurasian-looking girl in a photograph posted on the Internet.

The Meissmers believe the girl in the picture may be their daughter, Solitaire, who was identified as having died in last year's tsunami.

The Governor said on December 13, "The girl in the photo does resemble their daughter. We are not sure who she is, but I want to help the Meissmers find answers to their questions.

"The Royal Thai Police and Phuket Province will co-ordinate efforts to help them. With the local police we are now trying to investigate when and where the photo was taken, and what happened to the girl in the picture.

"We need to gather information on the children processed at the *OrBorJor* on December 27 and 28. We will check the list of passengers [evacuated by air] with the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office and the Thammasat center on relevant dates to see if there were girls of [Solitaire's] age on one of those flights. If there were, the next step will be to find out where they

later cremated] was 99.99%. Nonetheless, the Thai Tsunami Victim Identification (TTVI) unit will set up a team to re-examine the case."

TTVI Joint Chief of Staff Pol Col Pornprasert Kanjanarin said, "To reassure the family, we will look into the case again. However, we have full confidence in our [DNA matching] process."

Asked whether the original

DNA match might have been from a family other than the Meissmers, he responded, "In all cases, we have what is called a 'chain of custody' at every point in the process and we have documented everything. We know what samples were sent to the lab when and by whom, so we have confidence in the results.

"We can take a DNA sample again [from the Meissmers] Continued on page 2

Immigration aiming to beef up staff at airport

PHUKET: Pol Col Chirdchai Rattanametanon, the new Superintendent of the Immigration Office at Phuket International Airport, has applied for more officers in order to reduce tiresome delays in processing tourists.

Col Chirdchai told the *Gazette*, "I understand that there are not enough Immigration officers at the airport to process the volume of tourists, but I have already applied to my superior officer to have more officers stationed there."

He said that there are currently about 50 officers manning immigration counters at the airport, but added that half of them worked the day shift and the other half worked the night shift.

"We have officers standing by at both the arrival and the departure counters, but inbound and outbound passenger traffic totals around 7,000 people a day at the moment. We have nine arrival and six departure counters, but sometimes there are too many people at the same time. We are trying to solve that problem," Col Chirdchai said.

"We always serve children and elderly people first," he added.

The move to speed up Immigration clearance at the airport follows criticism from tourists.





Task force to blitz illegal labor

PHUKET: A task force of about 50 officers has been set up to crack down on illegal labor in Phuket.


Phuket Provincial Employment Services Office (PESO) Chief Boonchock Maneechot announced the crackdown following a closed meeting on December 8 with Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura and new the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office (PPIO) Superintendent, Pol Col Prayut Chommalee.

K. Boonchock cited poor sanitary conditions at workers' camps and the increasing violence among illegal workers as the two main reasons for the crackdown.

"When officers have visited the camps where foreign laborers live, they have seen that the workers live in poor sanitary conditions," he said.

"We are looking at issuing warnings to employers if conditions at workers' camps are not satisfactory."

K. Boonchock said that Phuket has 23,308 registered

alien workers, but he estimated that about 30,000 illegal aliens are working on the island. He explained that the huge number of illegal laborers was mainly the result of employers bringing them

in from other provinces, chiefly Ranong.

To help solve the problems, K. Boonchock explained, the Ministry of Labor in Bangkok is considering introducing another amnesty for illegal laborers to register – a period of amnesty was offered last year – and making health checks on foreign laborers arriving from other provinces mandatory.

"Phuket has many problems with Burmese. For example, there are Ya Khai Burmese minority group workers from Phang Nga who are now in Phuket. The Ya Khai in particular are violent, and often kill each other over disputes," K. Boonchock said.

He warned that some employers registered laborers in one province but then moved them to another province without registering the movement. This automatically – and immediately – meant the laborers were working illegally.

"If employers need to move laborers to another province, they must tell the PESO in their province and ask permission to do so," he said.

In response to the Governor's request for a solution to the problems, K. Boonchock told the *Gazette*, he will suggest using the Governors Act of 1914, which gives provincial governors the power to arrest, control and punish in matters concerning illegal labor.

To use this power, a Governor must first obtain permission from the Ministry of Interior.

Home stay project aims to aid tsunami relief

PHUKET: The Employers' Confederation of Thailand (ECOT) will launch a "home stay" pilot project this month in a bid to help tsunami sufferers long-term.

"The project will be launched on Koh Lone and at Cape Panwa, Ao Makham, Khao Khat and Baan Bo Rae. The idea is that local people will welcome foreigners into their homes so the visitors can learn about the local culture and lifestyle. The locals will derive income for themselves and their communities," ECOT Executive Director Siriwan Romchatthong explained.

She said that the project is intended to complement the Tourism Authority of Thailand's "Be My Guest" home-stay campaign for tourists to enjoy home stays in Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi from December 23 to 29.

Koh Lone will be the first place to receive guests, with the other sites being promoted after surroundings have been improved and local people have been trained, K. Siriwan explained.

Kemchitra Chatraporn, National Consultant to the International Labour Organization (ILO) Post-Tsunami Livelihood Recov-

ery in the Tourism Sector project, said that the project has been funded by US\$20,000 (about 827,000 baht) from the United Nations Development Program.

K. Kemchitra added that the ILO has launched several projects to support long-term recovery in tsunami-hit areas, including a course that started in July that trained jobless hospitality and tourism staff, so that they will remain attractive potential employees.

but not from the victim's body, which has already been cremated."

Mr Meissmer commented, "I am pleased that the Governor and the TTVI are willing to look into the matter; 99.99% is still not 100%, and I can't help wondering if there may have been a DNA mix-up of some kind."


K. Riem said, "On December 26, I held onto Solitaire as tightly as I could, but the second wave ripped her out of my arms. A friend later told me he saw my daughter being rescued. I have long sensed that my daughter is still alive somewhere, and when I saw the picture [on the Inter-

net], I felt more sure. We may yet find her.

"I can't get the photo out of my mind," Mr Meissmer told the Gazette earlier. "We cannot stop looking for Solitaire now. If we did, one day I might look at her photo and ask myself, 'Why didn't I look deeper into this?""

"It is just possible that the girl in that photo is our daughter," Mr Meissmer said. "We have to do whatever we can to find out. I don't want to reach age 50 or 60 thinking I could have found my daughter years ago if only I had tried harder."



Layan Marina construction to start next month

PHUKET: Construction of the 1.7-billion baht Layan Marina project will begin next month.

The Managing Director of Layan Marina Co, Nathaphut Na Pathalung, confirmed on December 12 that the project, on 51 rai of land at the north end of Bang Tao Beach, is going ahead.

He noted, however, that the start date has been put back in light of developments on neighboring pieces of land, most notably the parcel sold recently by Hongkong & Shanghai Hotels to Indonesian interests.

These developments have mandated design changes, he explained

He said, "We have not yet asked for a construction permit from Mai Khao Tambon Administration Organization because we are now about to embark on co-branding talks with Grand Hyatt, so the house and condominium style has changed from our original designs."

K. Nathaput added that there had been one more significant change to the plan – berths in the marina will be available only to those buying or renting homes in the project. This, he explained, is "because we would like to preserve the privacy and security of residents"

PIMEX show rated a success: 12 boats sold

KOH KAEW: As the Phuket International Marine Exhibition (PIMEX) 2005 closed on December 11, exhibitors were in buoyant mood. At least 12 boats were sold during the show at the Boat Lagoon, and initial estimates of solid sales achieved amount to approximately US\$4 million (160 million baht).

Dealers and brokers all reported new contacts made and strong leads to follow up from serious buyers. "I have not stopped talking to serious visitors since the show opened on Thursday," said a weary but elated Craig Murphy of Sunseeker dealers Max Marine Asia, at the show's closing party.

Nor was the upbeat mood restricted to vacht sales. "We have made better contacts here than we have at other shows in Asia," said Jim Scott, General Manager, West Australia, of Sea Slip Marinas, adding that he believed Phuket was the best venue for a regional show.

Along with every exhibitor in the Australian group, Mr Scott confirmed that he will be back for PIMEX 2006. Australia's Boating's Leading Accessories (BLA) also plans to return, with double the booth space next time.

PIMEX also provided an opportunity for local companies and overseas exhibitors to network in Asia's fastest-growing

marine leisure market. During PIMEX eight new dealerships or agencies were established.

Among local marine product exhibitors, Gareth Twist of Yacht Solutions said, "We are marketing new products and have had a very good response during PIMEX. We will be back next year."

"We didn't close a sale during PIMEX," said Jeanette Skelton of Royal Phuket Marina, "but we met many people who were planning to move to Phuket and we were able to take them next door to show them around." Ms Skelton said she is confident that sales will result.

"PIMEX has developed a reputation as a serious boating and lifestyle show," said Grenville Fordham of Image Asia, adding, "While we are able to put more boats in the water than any other regional show, we are not renowned for surface gloss.

Just over 4,000 visitors attended the show during four days, 2,300 of whom were registered as trade visitors. "We are disappointed that we did not reach our target of 6,000 visitors," said Image Asia's Andy Dowden during his farewell party speech.

"However, we will keep working on our marketing program, targeted at Bangkok. This is a long-term approach, and we ally bring results."

The Phuket Excise Office said that the price of cigarettes in the province will not rise until old stock is sold out, but the Gazette has learned that several local retailers have already implemented the rises.

German, 25, stabbed to death

PATONG: A 25-year-old German man died early on December 11 of stab wounds received in a furious argument with his Thai girlfriend in their rented room on Nanai Rd.

Pol Lt Col Chawalit Niamwadee, of Kathu Police Station, told the Gazette, "I received a call from Patong Hospital at 4 am that a man had been brought into the emergency room, where he had died of his wounds."

The dead man was identified as Anders Ochner. "He had been stabbed once in his right side and once in his upper chest, and he had knife wounds to his right hand," said Col Chawalit.

"At the scene of the stabbing, I found Uthairat Poonchan, 21, from Nakhon Sawan, still holding a knife. There was blood on the floor.


'She told me that she and Mr Ochner frequently had arguments about the victim's relationships with other women.

"She had used the knife to protect herself, she said, because he had hit and hurt her on previous occasions. She herself had cuts to her fingers and her right arm."

Uthairat, he said, had been arrested on a charge of man-

n Phuket, the "veil of silence" fell on November 25, when Phuket Provincial Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth ordered officers at all levels, including station superintendents, to stop releasing case-specific information to the media.

Gen Decha told the Gazette that not only does he intend to uphold the order, but that he also agrees with the new policy. News conferences during which suspects are paraded before the press will be stopped and police press conferences about criminal cases will be a thing of the past in Phuket, he said.

Not only were the suspects' constitutionally protected rights violated in such cases, but their statements – either to the police or directly to the media – often changed once their cases reached the court system. This could effect the outcome of their court trials, he said.

Gen Decha blames inaccurate and unethical reporting by both the media and the police. The maturity of individual police officers, and thus their ability to release accurate and appropriate information, varies from officer

"The same applies to members of the press, some of whom lack the education or experience to report accurately and without bias," he said.

Evidence of biased and inaccurate reporting can be seen daily – in differing accounts of the same story by different media, he added.

Gen Decha also thinks that in the past the police have been

Following a directive by national police chief Pol Gen Kowit Wattana, police nationwide have been instructed to stop releasing details about cases still under investigation and parading suspects and victims at news conferences, or allowing their photos to be published by the press.

The media blackout has been lauded by activists as a long-overdue step to protect the rights of victims and suspects who have yet to be found guilty by the courts, but the press and television are finding it more difficult than ever to do their jobs.

who play up front-page news stories that reveal the police in a bad light – but relegate police achievements to the back pages. Such treatment has tended to reinforce a stereotype among the public that the entire police force is bad, he maintains.

Limiting media access to the police will better enable police to conduct successful investigations,

"Criminal suspects these days are very smart - they folthe police and cull other information from other sources, such as by interviewing victims, their relatives and other witnesses.

From now on, the police would also release [only] general information about cases, he said.

"You will not hear any detailed information coming from policemen's mouths. I may release some information, but that doesn't mean I will tell you everything."

He also asked the *Gazette*, rhetorically, why journalists continued to badger law enforcement officials for follow-up information on criminal cases still under investigation, but didn't have the courage to ask the courts for updates once these cases reached the legal system.

made aware of those people and what they are alleged to have done. But is it really fair if those people have yet to be convicted of any crime?"

In future, the decision on whether or not to re-enact crimes would be considered on a caseby-case basis, and then only with the permission of the suspect, he

arayuth Mullam, a lawyer with the SM International Law firm in Kamala and a law lecturer at the Prince of Songkla University's Phuket Campus, told the Gazette that he agreed "about 50%" with the new police regulations.

In a perfect world, the time to present defendants in criminal cases before the public is not after their arrest, but after they have been convicted by a court of law, he said.

"They shouldn't arrange press conferences after the arrests, because in some cases the court judge will throw out the case for lack of evidence. There have been cases in which it has taken the court up to three years before a case is thrown out for lack of evidence. If that happens, how can the family ever get their good name back?" he asked, adding that suspects could sue for defamation in such cases.

K. Sarayuth thinks press conferences should be allowed to proceed only when there is ironclad evidence against the suspects, such as when they are caught red-handed committing a crime – and even then only when the chances of the case being thrown out are virtually nil.

He added that many of the news conferences and re-enactments in the past had occurred because suspects were unaware of their constitutional rights, and that most police didn't bother to inform them of these.

Among these rights are that of a suspect to confer with a lawyer before undergoing police questioning, he said.

"Sometimes the media report statements made by a suspect only to find that these contradict their testimony before the court. This can have a bearing on the outcome of the case," he said.

K. Sarayuth added that allowing suspects to speak to the media can sometimes help a suspect's case, however – such as drawing attention to their case by claiming to the public that a confession was made under du-

"Sometimes the police want to use the media to let their superiors, PM Thaksin or other politicians know that they are doing a good job – even if it violates a suspect's rights," he explained.

"Reporters sometimes don't take suspects' rights into consid-

low events by reading the newspapers and watching TV. If information about investigations is released, this may help them know what the police plan to do with them [and they therefore evade

arrest]," he said. He noted that the media will also see the freedom of their work curtailed in order to protect the rights of victims and suspects,

"Many times the press publishes photos of people who have been involved in road accidents. In fact, those victims have the right to sue if the pictures are published without consent," he


From now on, the press would have to ask for permission from the victims to run such pho-

When the Gazette asked about the practice of some newspapers of writing reports based on information contained in the daily police logs, Gen Decha said this too was an illegal practice,

Gen Decha does not see greatly curtailed media access to police information as a threat to the public's "right to know", because police actions are monitored by the bureaucracy under the direction of elected officials.

"We don't need to inform the public through the media, because we already have to issue reports on every case directly to the Governor, Police Region 8, the Ministry of Interior and to the Prime Minister's Office," he said.

As for police re-enactments, he said these would happen when necessary. "There are two sides to every coin. If we present suspects before a press conference, most people agree that it's good that the public be





eration in their rush to sell newspapers. Some reporters don't know about suspects' rights in the first place. I would encourage them to pretend that one of their own relatives was arrested by police on false charges and paraded before a press conference. How would they feel about it then?" he asked.

ne of Phuket's most highly visible suspects this year has been Apichart Nooprod, Chief of the Finance Division of the Phuket Provincial Financial Office.

He was charged with conspiracy to steal 2.05 million baht in government tsunami relief funds that went missing from Phuket Provincial Hall on February 15.

The case is still under investigation, and K. Apichart has yet to be charged with any crime.

Thought by many to be a scapegoat, K. Apichart said he disagrees with the new police directive that would restrict media access to suspects who, like himself, have yet to be charged with

a crime – let alone found guilty of one.

"If there is no check on police work, how can they ever be held accountable? Left to their own devices, they will be able to do whatever they want. That's why I think the media should have the right to follow up on police investigations," he said.

he Phuket Reporters' Club Chairman, Perapong Pholpramu, told the *Gazette* he doesn't agree with the new policy, which he feels undermines the media's role in reporting the truth accurately to the public.

He said restricting media access to the police has only led to less accurate reporting, as journalists now have to rely on other witnesses and guesswork.

This also increases the likelihood of newspapers making mistakes and "getting into trouble" as a result.

He admitted, however, that it has always been up to the police what information they want to reveal: "I understand that they have the right to give us what-

ever information they want to give us," he said.

K. Perapong noted that the police were hardly alone among government agencies that restrict media access to information.

"Currently, many other government officials take the same approach, denying us the information we ask for. They should accept that government officials and the media need to work together."

K. Perapong said he found it unreasonable for government agencies to expect the media to do public relations work for them, but then to deny media requests for information by using the excuse that they need "to get approval at the regional level" first.

"Reporters have a duty to keep people informed about what is going on in society... The constitution states that the people have the right to information, so if they deny us access to the news, they are denying the public of a constitutional right," he said. Although times are tough, reporters will persevere, he said.

"It is now more difficult to get accurate news for our readers, but we will continue to do our best to present the public with the facts," he said.

irst-time visitors to the Kingdom are often shocked by the graphic images of violence con-

tained on the front pages of many Thai-language newspapers.

One of Phuket's most experienced reporters is Thongtuan Sukmuang, Andaman beat reporter and photojournalist for Thailand's best-selling Thai-language daily paper, *Thai Rath*.

K. Thongtuan also sees the new policy as a way to restrict public access to information.

"I've been in the media for 30 years, and I have never experienced a time when the police have denied access to the extent that they do now."

He said that presenting suspects before the media does not automatically imply their guilt – only a court of law can do that. The media have a duty to inform the public about who has been arrested, and on what charges, he maintains.


Likewise, he doesn't see why media reports about cases under investigation should affect the outcome of those cases.

"Investigation is police work. We don't try to interfere with the course of an investigation, only to report about it accurately," he said.

He added that achieving balanced and accurate reporting depends not only on information given by the police, but also from other sources.

Defending the use of gory accident and crime scene photographs, he said it should be up to the press itself to decide what is ethically acceptable.

"Pictures showing the dead? Don't we have right to publish them? I think we do. However, in cases where minors are involved, we choose not to. It should be up to the media itself, and should be done on a case-by-case basis, with ethical considerations," he said.

HOW TO GET TANKED

MUKDAHARN: With prices at the pumps rising ever higher, some people tend to forget that even at 25 baht a liter gasoline is one of the cheapest liquids available on sale anywhere – and is still a good deal cheaper than even the lowest-priced beers.

Perhaps that is why 31-year-old farmer Sa-ngiam Janlong of Tambon Baan Khoke in Mukdaharn has taken to drinking gasoline, rather than allowing it to be uselessly burned in an internal combustion engine.

A TV crew from the *Mun Plaek Dee* (That's Delightfully Strange) show tracked down Sangiam to ask if they could film a segment about his daily routine. Sa-ngiam said he was glad to oblige, asking them to go to a nearby vendor for a bottle of gasoline so he could demonstrate.

The owner told the reporter that he had stopped selling gasoline to Sa-ngiam after learning he had been drinking it. Undeterred, Sa-ngiam simply took his business elsewhere.

Bottle of gasoline in hand, the reporters returned to Sangiam's home, where he poured a tumbler of the stuff and prepared to drink up for the camera.

Asked why he enjoyed gasoline so much, Sa-ngiam said that he had been drinking it for two years. His normal daily consumption is about half a liter.

He said he drank gasoline because he likes the strong taste. Sometimes he mixed it with alcohol to get an extra kick. Sangiam said he had suffered no illeffects from drinking gasoline.

With the TV crew looking on, he downed its contents. "Saep!" (delicious), he said.

Dr Somsak Amornwiwat of Samitiwech Hospital said that Sangiam's habit put him at risk of a number of life-threatening conditions, including bone marrow cancer and leukemia.

"If he doesn't stop drinking right now he'll be dead in five years," he warned.

Students shot in bus ambush

ne student was killed and four others injured when an unknown number of assailants opened fire on a six-wheel truck used as a school bus in Kanchanaburi's Lao Khwan District, police said.

Krisada Phothong, 14, died in hospital from six gunshot wounds. He was one of some 40 students on the bus, which was heading to schools in neighboring Suphan Buri.

A school director said that a group of boys who usually hang off the back of the truck were hiding inside the truck on this occasion, which made him suspect they were anticipating the attack.

Police investigating the case said the shooting may have been in reprisal for an earlier fight between some students who took the bus and a rival group of teenagers.

Market blaze: A fire raged through an old market in Nongthong's Wiset Chai Chan District, destroying more than 150 traditional shophouses at the riverside community there.


Angthong Governor Wiboon Sanguanpong said, "The damage is beyond estimation, as this is an old community with great historical value."

No casualties were reported in the fire, which destroyed more than 150 wooden houses. Those left homeless sheltered at a local temple.

The blaze began in a shop at around 2 am and took more than six hours to extinguish because none of the dozens of fire engines that responded to the alarm was able to squeeze into the small lanes at the heart of the market.

Mr Dengue Fever: More than 40,000 people have contracted dengue fever and 76 have died from the disease so far this year, Public Health Minister Pinij Charusombat said.

The South had the highest

age of 128 patients per 100,000 people. At least 10,789 southerners contracted the disease and 17 people in the region died from it. The province of Nakhon Sri Thammarat was worst hit, with a ratio of 292 victims per 100,000 people.

Health officials in the region have been ordered to conduct weekly operations to destroy mosquito larvae and assign a "Mr Dengue Fever" to educate villagers about the disease.

The ministry hopes to halve the number of dengue cases next year, even though 1.2 billion baht has been cut from the ministry's budget for 2006, he said.

port Department will offer a 50% discount on fares for people using its transport services between December 21 and 27.

Piyapan Champasut, the department's Director-General, said the department would offer tickets at half price because many low-paid migrant workers and their families will travel home between December 21 and 27.

Estimates by the department indicate that some 300,000 people would be on their way home on December 29 and 30, and that the number of travelers should reach one million a day in the first days of the New Year.

In co-operation with private bus operators, the department will buses along with its regular fleet to accommodate the larger number of expected passengers.

Shopper's paradise: Youngsters and shoppers will soon be able to seek peace through the Buddha's teachings at Siam Discovery Shopping Mall in Bangkok, where a pilot project will take place, Culture Minister Uraiwan Thienthong said.

Presiding over the "Moom Sangob Pob Phra Dhamma" ("A Peaceful Corner to Encoun-

ter the Lord Buddha's Teachings") project meeting, K. Uraiwan emphasized that the idea was not to draw people away from temples – but to provide easy access to Lord Buddha's teachings within shopping malls.

"It's not about building a temple in a shopping mall," she said.

"This will just be a 200square-meter space with a room in which to pray and practice meditation, a reading and listening room and a library with books of the Lord Buddha's teachings."

Coughing it up: Smokers will have to pay a further five to eight baht per pack of cigarettes, as the government has decided to impose a higher excise tax as part of its anti-smoking campaign.

The excise tax, raised from 75% to 79% with immediate effect, will raise up to three billion baht in additional annual tax revenue for the country, Director General of the Revenue Department Utid Tamvatin said.

The tax hike will raise locally-made cigarettes by five to six baht per pack, while imported cigarettes may rise by seven to eight baht.


Among imported cigarettes, Mild Sevens now quotes the highest retail price at 60 baht.

"The tax hike, including other health-promotion measures, might reduce sales of the Thailand Tobacco Monopoly by 10 to 12%," K.Utid said.

The increase will be lauded as another victory for anti-smokers following the Public Health Ministry's recent push to get cigarettes removed from sight at retail outlets.

y topic is a difficult one, as it concerns religion. I want to make crystal clear that it is absolutely not my intention to start a witch hunt, hurt anyone's religious beliefs and feelings, or damage the reputation of any of the many tsunami relief organizations in Khao Lak.

I signed off Christianity when I was 19 and very much sympathize with Buddhism, which I see as a philosophy of life rather than a strict religion.

I was outraged when I heard rumors from local people that some tsunami relief organizations would help local Thais only if they converted to Christianity, and that some of the baptism ceremonies would require the convert to step on a Buddha image to prove his or her change of religion.

Having lived in Thailand for 14 years, I know how scrupulous Thais are about anything that involves Buddha statues and images, especially where and how high to place them.

I therefore found it hard to believe that a baptism ceremony in Thailand could involve such ugly practices without causing outrage within the Buddhist community.

It made me feel sick just thinking about it, so I determined to discover the truth behind the tales.

One Thai woman, who asked that her name be withheld and that I not reveal her type of business, told me that a Baptist

relief organization in Khao Lak helped her with money to replace her business, lost in the tsunami, after converting her to Christianity. Part of the "deal" was that she would attend church on Sundays.

In an effort to get her business back on its feet again and to repay loans from other sources, she missed church a couple of times.

"It was not a lack of interest or a lack of belief in Christ,

but simply a lack of time," she told me. "I needed to work Sundays to keep my family alive."

What happened next was like a scene from a horror film. According to the woman, members of the Baptist relief foundation came a number of times to her business premises and shouted at her, threatening to take the donated business away if she did not go to church on Sundays.

These were no idle threats. When she missed one more time, they came back and stripped her of her business, including bits and pieces of equipment she had bought herself from money earned during previous weeks.

She attempted suicide and is now receiving psychiatric help.

Today, there are more than 36 tsunami relief organizations active in Khao Lak, many of them with Christian backgrounds. During my interviews with representatives of some of these organizations, the story I heard was completely different.

The overall message from all those I spoke with was that they would help unconditionally, regardless of race and religion. Each and every victim asking for help would receive aid in equal measure.

The gist was, "We can't force anyone to become a Christian, as his or her heart must be ready and open to receive Jesus. If we were to put pressure on people to convert them, they would never become true Christians, and most likely would sooner or later return to their former religion anyway.

"So it would do no good; only harm."

Some Christian organizations have built houses for Muslim people, who are still Muslims today. The same goes for local Buddhists.

At Pakping Church, located at Khao Lak's northern end, opposite the fresh market and bus station, I saw a dozen local children playing and having a good time at the church's daycare center. Not one of their parents had converted to Christianity.

Asked about the baptism ceremony, all the NGO representatives I spoke with said it would include only a ceremonial rebirth in the pool of a nearby waterfall, along with recitations from the Bible.

Questioned about the desecration of Buddha images, every representative denied that this would be included in a baptism ceremony.

One, however, did tell me, "Yes, this was the practice of one organization. I can't remember their name, but they are not in Khao Lak any more."

DREAM

It is plain to me that most of the tsunami relief foundations really do good and help people. Without their support Khao Lak would not be where it is today.

Yet I still had my doubts regarding the conversions. I had a dream recently that seems to have cleared the fog a bit, for me at least:

A Thai woman was sitting next to me on a wooden bench, near a stream in the forest.

She said to me, "When I needed help the most, when I was broken, the Jesus people came and made me feel I was being taken care of, and was loved. They gave me shelter, they rebuilt my house and they fed my family. Who would blame me for following their spiritual path today?"

She then disappeared. I awoke shortly afterward, and was able to remember the dream.

But I leave it to the reader to make up his or her own mind about the conversion controversy.

Whatever the truth, I would strongly advise against pointing fingers at people who came here to help, and who evidently did bring relief.

Black sheep can be found everywhere. Unfortunately, it takes only one to mess up the reputation of the entire flock.





Taking a ride on a Squirrel

hat Phuket's vistas are beautiful is beyond doubt, but wouldn't it be nice to see the island from a fresh perspective? A new company, HeliThai, is now offering sightseeing trips that give a bird's-eye view of Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi – from a helicop-

Andre Salti, a former Eurocopter Chief Inspector Pilot and one of HeliThai's three partners, told the *Gazette*, "The idea came to me years ago, when I was delivering helicopters to a government agency in Thailand. Flying over Phang Nga Bay and Phuket, I thought the views were among the best I'd ever seen and I wanted to share the spectacle with others.

"HeliThai aims to bring a dimension to Phuket's tourist industry. Guests in the island's many four- and five-star hotels expect to experience something here that can also be found elsewhere in the world. Phuket warrants international-level services."

The helicopter, an air-conditioned Eurocopter Squirrel, has a maximum speed of 120 knots or 222kmh, a range of 700km and can carry five passengers in addition to the pilot.

The company employs three full-time pilots, who are qualified and experienced, trained by Eurocopter and certified by the

Thai Department of Aviation. Mr Salti said, "The pilots work on a rotation basis because there's a limit to how many hours they may fly in a day."

Mr Salti loves being up there in a helicopter: "Flying in a helicopter is the best feeling in the world. I suspect our customers will enjoy it as much as I do, too. When you see something from the water or from the ground and then you see it from the sky, it's completely different. From above, in a helicopter, flying slowly, you get a gorgeous 180-degree pan-

PHOTOGRAPHY

The company was founded in April this year by three partners: Thidei Maithai, Managing Director of Thai Flying Service and Thai Flying Helicopter Service; Nigel Watson, a helicopter consultant; and Andre Salti. It offers aerial photography and filming, aerial reconnaissance for real estate, medical evacuation, and hotel-airport transfers in addition to sightseeing tours.

HeliThai's Marketing Manager, Frederique Salti, said, "We have had photographers fly with us. We were able to fly very low - at about 100 feet - so they could take very clear photos. A helicopter flight is very flexible compared with that of [fixed-wing aircraft]."

About the medical evacuation service, Ms Salti said, "For insurance reasons, we must collect a doctor from the Bangkok Phuket Hospital before flying out to a location to rescue anyone.


"Our Phi Phi tour is especially interesting," she added, "because, as it departs from Phuket International Airport, it covers a little bit of Phuket and Phang Nga Bay as well as the Phi Phi Islands."

HeliThai currently runs three tour packages, each for a minimum of four people:

- Phuket (Airport, Bang Tao, Patong, Kata-Karon, Surin, Nai Harn, Chalong). Duration: 20 minutes. Price: US\$135 per person (about 5,570 baht).
- Phang Nga (Airport, "James Bond Island", Koh Yao Yai and Koh Yao Noi). Duration: 30 minutes. Price: US\$200 per person (about 8,249 baht).
- Phi Phi (Airport, Chalong Bay, Koh Kai. Phi Phi, Koh Yao Yai and Koh Yao Noi). Duration: 45 minutes. Price: US\$300 per person (about 12,374 baht).

Flights are available between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm, seven days a week. The helicopter may also be chartered for US\$1,600 an hour or US\$4,800 a





TO THE BEACH















he new Audi Q7 luxury 4x4 is an extremely smart piece of kit, although for how long it will remain badged as a Q7 is currently in dispute.

Apparently Nissan, which lays claim to the Q-prefix, notably in North America with its highly successful luxury Q45 sedan, has filed suit against the German manufacturer. Industry insiders anticipate an out-of-court settlement from Audi, which could run to many thousands of dollars.

Based, inevitably, on the same platform as the Volkswagen Touareg and Porsche Cayenne, the Q7 offers just a little more comfort and refinement than the VW, yet it is not as pricy as the Porsche.

Configured to accommodate either five or seven passengers, the Q7 is extremely versatile; in the five-seater mode, it can boast a load of a huge 775 liters – the best in its class.

Although in some markets a 4.2 V8 FSI is available, it is the 3.0 TDI that will find favor in Asia. This common rail diesel offers adequate power and impressive torque: 233bhp (174Kw) and 500Nm respectively. Audi claims a 0-100kmh sprint time of just 9.1 seconds – not bad for a luxury SUV – while the top speed



is a healthy 216kmh. A diesel particulate filter is standard and the Q7 comfortably meets the stringent Euro 4 emission regulations

Much of the suspension is aluminum for improved wheel control, particularly off-road, while adaptive air suspension is an option. The combination of air suspension and electronic damper control gives the best of both worlds, on- or off-road. Using this combination, the ride height can be varied from 165mm to a massive 240mm, while a knob on the dash selects the desired mode, be it sports or comfort.

As you would expect in a 4x4 of this quality, the very latest electronic gizmos are fitted, including ABS with brake-force distribution and brake assist, traction control, an electronic stabilization program (ESP) and an electronic differential lock. The ESP incorporates a system whereby if the driver brakes hard it suddenly it switches on the hazard flashers to warn following traffic.

There is also a hill-descent control which prevents the vehicle running away on steep declines and a roll-over sensor that applies the brakes if a critical point is reached during tight maneuvers.

Vehicles such as the Audi are often used to tow trailers, and the ESP incorporates a trailer stabilizer to prevent the trailer or box swaying at speed. Anyone who has experienced the high-speed

trailer-taking-over sensation will know just how frightening this can be, and any system that takes care of the problem is to be thoroughly welcomed.

Further electronic intervention comes in the form of an adaptive cruise control with a radarassisted distance reader. This can now control distance and speed anywhere between zero and 200kmh and will brake the vehicle to a stop if necessary. The sensor, located behind the front license plate, takes continuous measurements determining whether the distance and speed in relation to the car ahead have changed. It will then adjust the speed accordingly, either accelerating or braking as is deemed necessary.

The collision warning system built into the cruise control has a range of up to 180 meters and will warn the driver of an


impending shunt, first by sounding a warning signal, together with a visual display on the dashboard, and secondly – if the driver has not reacted – by triggering a noticeable warning jolt and applying the brakes. The jolt is to alert the driver to an imminent problem


Safety, as you would expect, is of paramount importance within a vehicle like the Q7; Audi has provided two-stage front airbags, front side bags and a fullength air curtain that covers the entire side window area including the third row of seats. Belt tensioners and force limiters are fitted to the front seatbelts.

Although the Audi Q7 will not come cheap, it appears to offer everything you would require in a luxury off-roader and more. Launched earlier this year at the Frankfurt show, deliveries should begin in early 2006.

Around northern Laos on a bike

n need of adventure and fresh air? What better than a mountain-bike trip to north ern Laos? Joining an organized tour with a back-up vehicle and plush accommodation was one option, however the timing did not suit. Instead, with safety issues in mind, I arranged for a local guide to take me on a 10+day mountain circuit no tourist had cycled, carrying my own gear and sleeping in guesthouses.

Day 1: Flew direct from Bangkok to Luang Prabang. Assembled my bike and met my two humorous 24-year-old Lao cycling companions, T and Kamlet, and two trekking guides, Khamu and Hmong. I was "Papa" from Day 1 – fair enough since I'm 55, but more on this later. The language of Laos is very similar to Thai and the Lao people all watch Thai TV.

Day 2: Endured an eight-hour bus ride to Phonsavan, crossing three mountain ranges in cloud. At 1,500m – cold! I made my first mistake of riding the 5km from bus station to guesthouse on the wrong side of the road, forgetting we were in a former French colony.

Day 3: Covered 85km. Undulating partly off-road, ride to the Plain of Jars, visiting the three fascinating 2,000-year-old stone jar sites. Evidence of US bombing everywhere. This plain is vast – filled with cattle and horses, and reminding me of my younger days



on a farm in the Scottish Borders. **Day 4:** Rode 65km. A gentle, road trip to Muang Kham – a Hmong village – and beyond, to visit hot springs and one of the many foreign aid-funded irrigation projects servicing glutinous rice production. Sticky rice is the staple food in Laos.

Day 5: 87km. Up and up nonstop for more than 35km, followed by ups and downs and then a glorious descent of 20km to a guesthouse in Nam Nuan with no hot water and lousy food. T fell off his bike at about 40kmh during the descent and miraculously escaped with only a grazed thigh and a broken pedal. That night our knees were stiff and my "counterpain" was put to good use by all. Beer Lao had a better effect, though.

Day 6: Did 66km. Up and down on a picturesque rough track lined with wild flowers, to Vieng Thong. Following the source of the Kham River, we passed through many Blue Hmong and Khamu villages, always accompanied by idyllic background sounds of cow and goat bells – very like the Swiss Alps. Out of the blue, in contrast, a huge, new

articulated truck passed us on its way to Vietnam to bring back modern goods.

Day 7: 25km. A rest day, spent visiting hot springs and villages and drinking Beer Lao.

Day 8: Another 74 km completed. An easier day through a National Park, mainly down a steep-sided valley to a little guesthouse at Meuang Sup Huang where we bathed in the river. Day 9: 51km. Passed through about 20 more villages to a guesthouse in Vieng Kham overlooking the River Ou. By this time

I was getting a little bored of eating rancid vegetable soup with sticky rice three times a day, so I ate Maggi noodles instead. By this time my faeces were turning green!

Day10: 48km done. Another easier day in hot sunshine and beautiful mountain scenery, when suddenly, on rounding a corner, instead of another Hmong village we found ourselves in the small town of Nong Kiaw, surrounded by backpackers. Stayed in a comfortable guesthouse and visited the huge limestone cave nearby which had sheltered locals from US bombing.

Day 11: 148km. A long and mildly undulating trip back to a comfortable colonial villa-turned-guesthouse in Luang Prabang, with a hot shower. By this time

all the "counterpain" was finished and "Papa" was in front of the pack waiting for T and Kamlet!

Day 12: Cycled round the fascinating UNESCO World Heritage Site of Luang Prabang with something to see at every turn. UNESCO is funding the restoration of French colonial buildings here, which mix elegantly with the King's Palace, and the many colorful temples and gardens.

Our overall speed on this cycling trip varied from 6kmh uphill to 55kmh downhill. We travelled from 9kmh per day on hilly areas up to 16kmh on the last long day, allowing for lunch and phototaking stops.

More than an adventure in clean mountain air, I experienced the beauty of Laos and its equally impressive people first-hand.

Getting to the bottom of wine's sex appeal

recently told me he wanted to change from one of his Chardonnays in preference for another. In his words, the wine he plans to discontinue is "too angular and non-integrated"; he said he prefers the other wine because "it is much more refined and generous".

After hearing his reasons for the change, I found myself reflecting on how wine lovers tend to attribute human form or personality to wine in describing them.

With the restaurant manager's words fresh in my mind, I pored over some reviews in a popular wine magazine.

The magazine's critics reviewed and described wines using words such as vibrant, elegant, fat, focused, riveting, delicate, classy, rich, well-defined,

restaurant manager graceful, understated, austere and lean.

> Some of the writers' descriptors were overtly sexual: racy, tight, yielding, penetrating, and "keeps you coming back for more". Some descriptors seemed poetic: "an iron fist in a velvet glove".

> Others, however, seemed silly: "on the plump side, yet filigreed, but a breath of freshness sweeps in on the finish". One writer seemed to have run out of ideas and simply wrote "tons of

> I suppose it is wine's power to evoke emotion that prompts wine lovers to speak about wines as if they were people rather than beverages.

> The perplexing thing about these anthropomorphized wine descriptors is, even though they tell you nothing about what wine actually tastes like, they convey

a complete and immediate impression.

In contrast, winemakers and food scientists are taught from day one to avoid anthropomorphizing and instead speak of wine solely in quantitative terms.

A winemaker would never say a wine tastes "vibrant" or "racy" but rather would say "has a high degree of citrus flavor, especially lemon".

The reason professionals don't anthropomorphize is they need quantifiable and reproducible descriptors.

You can train someone to accurately recognize and quantify the taste sensation of, say, raspberry, in a wine, but you cannot teach them to do the same for elegance.

As a result, the wine descriptors of professionals can be boring and don't translate well to the consumer.

Looking at my own notes from a recent wine dinner, I described a wine as: "Brilliant ruby color, medium body and alcohol, high acidity, a strong primary taste and aroma of blackberry, with secondary flavors of black cherry and crushed dried violet. Short finish and soft tannin." My notes exactly describe the wine, but might put someone to sleep when compared with the imaginative and inspired descriptors found in magazines.

Wine creates feelings in the heart, as well as tastes on the tongue, so it is perhaps no wonder people want to give a human essence to wine by describing it in human terms.

To all wine lovers I say this, go ahead and tell it like it is - if a wine seems racy and naughty, it's more fun if you say so, and everyone will under-

nd lo, it came to pass that in the run-up to the "festive season", Din-Ling Out visited Phuket's very own Bethlehem - or should that be Bedlam? – Patong.

The parallels are there, if one looks closely enough: hordes of people making a migration although for their hols rather than a census; some accommodation is little better than a stable; lowing cattle run amok – and there are more than a few asses.

The chances of finding a virgin, or indeed three wise men, are somewhat reduced from all those years ago.

I also wonder what the gifts of the 21st century Magi would be in Patong. A bargirl, Viagra and a bottle of Happy Endings massage oil?

Patong has more than just the one star, but one of the brightest in its dining and accommodation firmament is Holiday Inn Resort Phuket.

The Holiday Inn, which reopened its refurbished main wing on November 1, staggered the opening of its restaurants between then and now.

One of the more recent to reopen is Sam's Steaks & Grill,

the redevelopment of the hotel - particularly the ground floor has been extensive.

Accompanied by not one but two dining companions, one of them F&B Director Sakda Vareeporn, we dine at Sam's, which is something of a landmark on Phuket.

Polite and courteous – but never, thankfully, obsequious – the staff pull open the vast glass and brass door and guide us towards comfy seats. My companions get the sofa, I an easy

We have already had a drink aforehand; The Bar is spacious, hip in a traditional way, and graced with black-andwhite prints of Phuket old and new on the walls and ceiling. A Thai Elvis does his thang on

K. Sakda selects a couple of glasses of Anakena Sauvignon Blanc, which has hints of passion fruit and herbs, to accompany our entrées. An excellent array of homemade breads and herb butter whets the appetite.

We plump for a platter of Sam's choices (420 baht), which includes confit of duck,

Zealand salmon, which is smoked in the hotel. I have yet to hear of anyone else on Phuket doing that. Splendid fish, with barely a trace of fat between the flakes – the sign of a good salmon.

In fact, the starters are all delightful. The confit, such sweet meat, yields to the gentlest of pressure from the cutlery, which itself will warrant a Mention in Dispatches later.

As we pause between courses - soup next - the restaurant begins to fill. It has 36 covers, including 10 in a private dining room for groups, separated from the main floor. Tonight that means a man of some advanced years and two ladies, no doubt his daughters, one of whom is feeding a baby. Did I mention the lovely pair of chandeliers?

Sam's benefits from a superb selection of jazz standards and new classics played at discreet but still-audible levels; such music matches perfectly the ambiance of the restaurant.

The soups – lobster bisque and a broth of white leeks (185

baht) are superb. Some high degree of care has obviously gone into these, and all credit to the chefs – Thais to a man – for their

Back to the cutlery. K. Sakda obviously knows a thing or two about the paraphernalia of dining, for the cutlery, and the crockery for that matter, are practical works of art.

The table knife has the width, not the depth, of the handle as its widest axis. Ergo, the widest part rests flat against the palm of the hand, resulting in less wobble and generally a more comfortable use of the eating

The steak knives, made by Twin Fish, are solid with a fulllength tang and a rounded, ergonomic handle and a clip-point blade. Sharp? Yes, though as we soon discover, the steaks require

very little effort to cut them.

K. Sakda chooses a sirloin, my companion opts for panroasted strips of beef with tarragon, garlic and tomatoes, and I choose a rare 300-gram porterhouse. Our choices come in at, respectively, 600 baht, 650 baht and 700 baht, with a choice of vegetables. Skillet-fried fingerlings of potatoes and crispy onions, and garlic spinach for me.


My steak is tender enough for a sharp tongue to cut through, and although K. Sakda exhorts me to try the Béarnaise, mushroom and pepper sauces, which I do and declare mightily good, my properly aged Australian steak is splendid as it is.

The bottle of Banrock Station Shiraz – we taste first blackberries, then smoky wood – goes with the meat exceptionally well.


For dessert, pavlova with mango in a lime dressing and locally made vanilla ice-cream, is my choice. The suggestion is made to pour a little of the chilled 2001 Anakena late harvest Muscat over the ice-cream. It accentuates the taste of the dessert and reveals tiny slabs of white chocolate nestling within the meringue.

And then it's back out into the night, vowing to return to Sam's for another rendezvous. A second coming is starred.

It's Soho delectable

ow upon row of shophouses on the bypass road cannot conceal the hungry hordes flocking to a certain corner restaurant – Soho, where duck, barbecued or roasted, rules the roost.

Soho opened 18 months ago, and word-of-mouth advertising draws people from Patong and Rawai to dine there on a regular basis. After all, where else on the island can you find tasty and tender barbecued duck on a bed of rice for as little as 30 baht?

For big spenders ready to shell out 50 baht, in addition to an even more satisfying portion of duck and rice, you get some soup and cucumber to make a healthy lunch set.

And you can order a whole barbecued duck for 350 baht to 470 baht, depending on size. A

take-out service is also available.


K. Num, 47, Soho's owner, and his team of nine full-time staff – including two chefs specially trained over a period of three months – serve an average of 100 people a day at the restaurant.

They not only prepare 25 ducks a day for Soho, but also supply another nine to a restaurant near Chalong Circle.

It takes a full 12 hours to barbecue a day's supply of ducks to K. Num's standard. "The secret of my success is quality," he says. "Maintaining a high quality of service and taste at a reasonable price is my mission."

K. Num's quest for the perfect duck dish began a decade ago, when he traveled to London to study art but ended up working in the restaurant industry.

"I worked for hotels and restaurants, in kitchens that ranged from Greek to Chinese.





That's when I got hooked on barbecued duck."



But after running a Thai restaurant in London for more than a year he returned to the Kingdom and found himself shrimp farming in Phang Nga province for the next seven long years.

"Every time I went to Bangkok, I scoured the restaurants for the taste of barbecued duck I missed from my time in England. Meanwhile, I was fortunate enough to make friends with a retired Thai chef who gave me some pointers for cooking duck.

"The shrimp farming business wasn't too good and I needed to rethink what I was doing with my life.

"With my English-speaking skills, I felt I'd do better in a place popular with tourists, so I came to Phuket three years ago and I am happy here, although my wife, Sujitra, who is a nurse, and my six-year-old daughter Jinchutaa continue to live in Phang Nga for the time being," says K. Num.

"From the various restaurants where I had sampled duck in London and Bangkok, I have

managed to put together the best ideas and created my original recipe for Soho.

"Maybe some day my dream of supplying deluxe duck dishes to hotels and catering for weddings and parties will come true.

"For now, I just think about how to expand our kitchen, because barbecuing and roasting so much duck requires a lot of ventilation."

K. Num's Soho, named after the popular West End area of London, is a local favorite where the decor may be spare, but the fine fare is worth every baht.

Also on offer: barbecued duck and crispy pork on rice for 40 baht; stewed chicken wings for 40 baht; and steamed duck with noodles in soup, large size, for 50 baht.





nglishman Toby Young worked on the staff of Vanity Fair magazine for two and a half years, but he basically screwed up in an obnoxiously drunken way, and found himself limited to photo captions and little squibs in the "Vanities" section.

His insider memoir about the magazine is aptly named: How to Lose Friends & Alienate People (Abacus, London, 2002, 342pp). Ultimately it's a sad book masquerading as a funny one.

The son of a famous socialist journalist who coined the term "meritocracy", Young attended Oxford, Harvard and Cambridge. He was appalled by the lock-step political correctness of Harvard as opposed to the spirit of openminded inquiry that characterized the British universities. But he did have one experience there that galvanized him: a course on 1930s screwball comedies, taught by philosophy professor Stanley

reporters portrayed by Clark Gable, James Stewart and Cary Grant. They inspired him to found a British magazine called Modern Review. The only American magazine that he admired for its cheeky tone was Spy, co-edited by one Graydon Carter, who was later to succeed Tina Brown as editor-in-chief of Vanity Fair.

Carter and Young met for drinks several times in London. After six years, Young abruptly terminated Modern Review after he began to suspect that his partner in the venture, Julie Burchill, was conspiring to replace him as editor with her lesbian lover. Carter called Young and invited him to "hang out for a month" at Vanity Fair, with a kicker of \$10,000. Young flew off to New York in search of the American Dream.

He made his first mistake on his first day at the Condé Nast Building when he turned up in jeans and a T-shirt illustrated with a Modern Review cover shot of Keanu Reeves that is captioned: "Young, Dumb and Full of Come". He was shown by security to the service elevator.

Young produces some very funny bits as he compares American and British journalists. British journalists, for example, despise PR flacks while their American counterparts are enslaved to them. Of British journalists he writes: "We all accept 'freebies', of course, but it's considered bad form to write something gushing and complimentary in return. As far as most of us are concerned, the relationship between hacks and flacks is essentially adver-sarial."

He adds in footnote: "Admittedly, I've occasionally said something nice in return of a MASSIVE bribe, but at least I've felt guilty about it. Really, really

He is also scathing about the New York career women he dates and invariably fails to bed.

"I always marveled at how unselfconscious they were about sizing me up. They invariably had a checklist of questions that they shamelessly ran through over the course of the evening. What did I do for a living? What part of town was my apartment in? What kind of car did I drive? It was less like a romantic encounter than an extremely tough job interview. By the time the check arrived I was surprised they hadn't asked for a urine sample."

In the end, as he turns increasingly morose, dilatory and drunk, Graydon Carter fires him, in slow stages. "Toby's like a piece of gum," he comments. "He lingers on the bottom of your

Eventually Young quits drinking and wins back the affection of Caroline, a fresh young English girl he had originally driven away.

He returns to London with this lesson learned:

"I was particularly disappointed by the spinelessness of New York hacks given how lively they used to be. I had arrived with tales of the legendary bad behaviour of Ben Hecht, Herman J. Mankiewisz and Dorothy Parker swimming in my head, expecting to find their modern day equivalents in the offices of Vanity Fair. I imagined this zany,

one stood on ceremony and everyone had a wisecrack at the ready.

"But that devil-may-care attitude, that sense of fun was nowhere to be found. Instead I was confronted with a regiment of pinched and hidebound careerists who never got drunk and were safely tucked up in bed by 10 p.m. ... In London, I'd seen chartered accountants behave with more abandon."

Immie Hoover recently bought a property in Phuket, although he lives in Seattle. He flew to Phuket to play in the annual British Business Association Phuket Charity Golf Tournament, held in November at Blue Canyon Country Club.

Jimmie spent nine years with McDonnell Douglas, his father's old company, then a further 25 years at Northrop Grumman where where they produced 747 fuselages, tail structures and other major components.

He is the Chairman of Primus International, which manufactures components, kits and assemblies for commercial jet aircraft. "Our products are typically found in the most critical structures and aircraft systems, such as the engines, doors, wings, vertical and horizontal stabilizers and actuation systems."

Doven: What attracted you to Thailand?

Jimmie: I have traveled extensively in Asia for 24 years. Of all of the countries that I have visited, I have found the combination of weather, food, people, culture and recreation in Thailand to be the best.

Phuket has the unique quality of being a thriving resort yet with a population of expats similar to myself involved in business. I have found this a good place to settle. I love to fish, to be on the water and to play golf, and all of these are abundant in Phuket.

The case for evolution grows stronger with every decade

here has been a plethora of articles in the past vear or two arguing for various creationist hypotheses. The most recent of these has been "intelligent design".


The proponents of this faith argue that life is too complex to have arisen and developed, that is to say evolved, without the supervision and direction of a god.

This idea is fine as a religion, but it is entirely without scientific merit; there is not a single fact that supports intelligent design.

You cannot go out in the field, grow anything in a laboratory, or see anything through a microscope or telescope that supports this hypothesis.

Evolution is a theory that is supported by evidence. Theory in this sense does not mean an unproven hypothesis. Scientific facts are provable.

The forebears of most plants and animals are well represented in the fossil record. Only the very naïve could believe that God "planted" fossils in the earth to confuse us.





believe that the earth and the life upon it is only a few thousand years old, in spite of the overwhelming evidence that our planet has supported life for billions of years.

I remember as a child hearing creationists argue that each species was placed here on earth in its current form, including man, who was given the shape of God. They argued then as they do now that evolution is fic-

Charles Darwin, Alfred Russel Wallace and most great biologists

believed in God, but accepted the proof of evolution found both in the fossil record and in contemporary observation.

When Darwin first published his evolution theory, there were only a couple of hominid species in the fossil record. Critics asked where the missing link was.

Now we have uncovered a dozen close relatives to man. The latest find is Homo floresiensis, a small cousin from what is now Flores Island in Indonesia, who lived there between 10,000 and 80,000 years ago. The most ancient representaSahelanthropus tchadensis, who lived between six million and 17 million years ago in what we now call Chad.

Many other missing links have been uncovered. For example, the links between dinosaurs and birds have become well established. More than 100 years ago Archaeopteryx was discovered in Solnofen, Bavaria in fossil beds about 150 million years old. It could fly or at least glide. It had teeth, unlike younger fossil species such as Confuciusornis, which had a toothless beak.

Sinornis, 140 million years ago, could fold its wings and Iberomesornis, which lived in what is now the Iberian Peninsula some 130 million years ago, had a large keeled breastbone to which powerful flight muscles were attached.

Before there were birds, there were several species of terrestrial dinosaurs with feathers. The feathers functioned as insulation. The carnivorous dinosaur *Sinorni*thosaurus millennia, uncovered in northeastern China, had feathers and could flap its wings – but could not fly.

Creationists have long argued that the absence of transitional fossils from land mammals to whales supported creationism. Whales still retain vestigial hip and thigh bones buried in musculature. There is now plenty of evidence, including DNA, showing that whales descended from

These same folks tive of the human family found so far is even-toed, hoofed mammals and are closely related to the hippopotamus.

> Ambulocetus natans, the "walking whale that swims", was carnivorous; it lived in present-day Pakistan about 49 million years ago. It was the size of a big sea lion; its feet were webbed with tiny hooves on its toes and could both walk on land and swim. Pakicetus lived a few million years previously, in the early Eocene epoch. It lived on land but had a skull and teeth like the earliest family of whales.

> Today we have more than a dozen transitional fossil forms that connect whales with terrestrial mammals.

> The case for evolution grows stronger with every decade as fossil evidence, DNA and observation of species in transition expand. In addition, there is the continuing analysis of developing embryos which continue to demonstrate that "ontogeny recapitulates phylogeny". In other words, the development of an embryo illustrates the evolution of that species.

> And, believe what you like, there continues to be no evidence at all to support creationism in any form, including intelligent design.

Four held after attempt to rob currency exchange firm

PHUKET TOWN: Four men

decided on November 11 to take an even bigger gamble – they held up a currency exchange com-

But their luck was still bad. who had lost money gambling They came away empty-handed and were nabbed soon afterwards by police.

The four, identified by police as Jaroen Sakjapitak, 42, from Sakhon Nakhon, Jantai Singkam, 34, from Loei, Yodchat Chanwerat, 27, and Narin Ujaroenpong, 28, both from Bangkok, held up the Yanisa Travel Service Partnership on Chana Jaroen Rd near the Ocean Robinson Department Store at 4

Pol Maj Amnuan Kriwutthianant of the Phuket Town Police Station said that Somjai Junapichart, 33, the owner of Yanisa Travel, was behind the counter at the exchange company with her sister Somjit when the attempted robbery took place. There was also one customer, a woman, in the office at the time.

News from the past Two men walked in. One of

them, later identified as Jaroen, pointed a pistol at the staff. He herded the customer behind the counter and ordered K. Somjai to open the safe.

The other, later identified as Jantai, who was carrying a knife, climbed on the desk and smashed the security camera.

The robbers' luck began to turn sour when K. Somjai managed to press a button to raise the alarm at the police station.

Then, while she was opening the safe at gunpoint, a male customer walked in, took one look

at the situation and ran out to phone the police.

The two robbers, worried that the police might arrive at any moment, left the office emptyhanded, leapt on a motorbike and roared off.

Acting swiftly, officers arrested the pair outside Wat Sansook, about 800 meters from Yanisa Travel. They had dumped the motorbike and were climbing into a pick-up truck driven by their two accomplices.

The four admitted their roles in the attempt to rob the exchange company.

Police gag will not serve transparency in justice system

Crime reporting in Phuket has always been difficult. The initial part, when the police cars rush to the scene of a crime, is the easiest. Some newspapers even have "stringers" sitting full-time at police stations, ready to leap in their cars and follow.

But following up on cases in subsequent weeks and months, whether suspects are arrested or not, has never been easy. With the latest orders from Bangkok (see Inside Story, page 5 of this issue) that police must not discuss cases in detail, it has become all but

The Gazette has never carried lurid photographs of dead bodies, in the belief that such pictures serve no purpose other than to feed a nasty kind of voyeurism. No one will suffer if newspapers are barred from carrying such material.

Nor does the *Gazette* regret a great reduction in the number of crime "re-enactments", which at best served very little purpose and at worst descended into anarchy, with mobs of local people trying to mete out on-the-spot justice to the alleged perpetrator – despite the fact that he or she had not yet been tried.

Equally, an end to police press conferences, during which suspects are presented to news photographers, will be no great loss – and will certainly help support fairer trials.

What is troubling, however, is the reduction in transparency of the justice system. The fact that police officers in charge of investigating cases have effectively been gagged means that following cases through to their conclusions becomes more difficult than ever.

The suggestion by Phuket Provincial Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth that journalists should follow cases through the courts is a good one. However, Thai courts are not obliged by law to allow journalists to report on hearings - they may allow it or they may not – so publishing details of hearings is not always possible.

The difficulty with the new rules is that police involved in cases may worry that they will be stepping out of line if they say anything at all, and will therefore adopt a blanket "no comment" policy.

Any justice system needs to protect the rights of those accused of crimes, especially their right to a fair trial. Splashing their photographs all over newspapers may be prejudicial to that right, as may be quotes from officers asserting that the suspect is indeed guilty.

But the individual's rights must also be weighed against the need for transparency. Justice must be seen to be done. This is essential for public trust in the system. For the police to simply shut up will not serve this end. - The Editor



It's time to end the carnage on the roads

Every month around 20 people are killed on Phuket's roads. The lives of 20 fathers, mothers, brothers or lovers end pointlessly.

Every month more than 1,000 people are injured in traffic accidents, many so seriously that they will never walk again.

Most residents know someone who has been killed or seriously injured on the roads. Despite this fact, people still drive far too fast and regularly take unnecessary risks.

In many countries the police play an important role in reducing traffic accidents, enforcing traffic rules and speed limits, but here this does not seem to be the case.

I have seen police in front of schools allowing underage children to leave the school premises, often three to a motorcycle and none wearing helmets; or watching motorcycles race in and out of traffic on both sides of vehicles without doing anything.

It seems to me that at least part of the solution to reducing this carnage would be through a massive public relations campaign, which should include:

- Large posters on all the main roads updated every month with the numbers of dead and injured.
- Just before all the major danger spots, such as Kata Hill, large warning posters listing the numbers of accidents, deaths and injuries should be erected.
- Every hour every public radio station serving Phuket should broadcast road safety messages, and every time someone dies in an accident they should announce who it was, with the slogan "Speed kills. Slow down, don't let the next death be you."

These measures should be taken immediately; each day wasted is another life wasted.

The TAT has not ignored Khao Lak

riticisms of the seemingly indifferent attitude of the Tourism Authority of Thai land (TAT) toward battered Khao Lak, including that it was doing little or nothing to help the area recover, came soon after the tsunami.

Many people felt that an added insult to the injury was the TAT decision to remove – until just two months ago – all mention of the battered resort from its website, effectively the official portal for those considering Thailand as a holiday destination.

The *Gazette* has long questioned this action, and the perceived general inaction of the TAT regarding the region. Businesspeople in the

devastated area and expatriates who love Khao Lak have also sought answers and explanations from the TAT. None, apart from fudged responses, came.

Phang Nga Province itself features in the "Destinations" section of the TAT website, yet only the briefest of mentions is made of Khao Lak. Just eight resorts and guesthouses, and only four restaurants are listed for the entire province.

The TAT, it appears, has more power at its disposal than Mother Nature, for while the tsunami failed to wipe Khao Lak off the map, the area is not even named on the TAT's website map of Phang Nga – despite the province being one of the so-called "Happiness Destinations".

Vunsadej Thavarasukha, Executive Director, Advertising and Public Relations Department of the TAT in Bangkok, addresses the criticism.



t is a fact that the hotel- and tourism-related businesses in Khao Lak were severely damaged by the tsunami, and damaged to such an extent that they were not in an operable condition.

[The TAT] removed Khao Lak from its website – temporarily – because the product, Khao Lak, had not recovered from the tsunami and was not therefore ready to sell.

Had we, the TAT, kept Khao Lak on the website, then people might have tried to book into hotels that were no longer in operation.

Putting anything other than up-to-date information on our website would have wasted the time and energy of tourists [looking for holiday information].

ASSISTANCE

However, we tried and still try hard to promote every area in country, especially those affected by the tsunami – when and only when those areas have enough facilities for customers.

You may ask why I said that the TAT has tried hard to assist and promote areas, and want examples of what we have instigated.

Well, the TAT has achieved a great deal, including sending staff to assist in the evacuation of tourists from the affected areas.

We also organized training

in tourism-related subjects for people – and not only those previously employed in the tourism sector – who lost their jobs because of the tsunami to improve their opportunities for employment.

In addition to this, the TAT provided representatives of business operators in the Andaman area with air tickets and space to present their businesses at the ITB (Internationale Tourismusburse Berlin).

FEES WAIVED

The TAT also waived the fees for private-sector business from the six affected Andaman provinces that participated in [our] tourism promotion events, both internationally and domestically.

The TAT has organized various other campaigns aimed at encouraging Thais to travel within their own country.

These campaigns were bolstered by offering holidays at discount prices, and with the added incentive of duty-free shopping for Thais, a scheme initiated by the Ministry of Finance.

[The duty-free scheme was branded a flop by businesses involved in it. See Phuket Gazette, issue of December 3, 2005.]

The TAT was instrumental in organizing and co-ordinating events to commemorate 50 days after the tsunami, and we are currently assisting in the organization of the first anniversary

We have provided assistance and information to media organizations, students, researchers and travel agencies on visiting the area. Khao Lak also hosted a regional Cabinet meeting. This assistance, these events, have [helped] and will help the area to recover, and many people have visited the area as a direct result of our promotions and activities

So, you see, the TAT has been helping all the tsunami-affected areas in terms of international marketing and public relations to restore the confidence of tourists. [As proof of this] hotel bookings for the Christmas period are reportedly averaging around 70-80%.

If you look at the TAT website, then you will see that Khao Lak is listed, and has been since October. We will add more details, more hotel and other listings, as and when the businesses begin to reopen – and when they inform us of this.

We know what we are doing. It is not true that the TAT is focusing its efforts on the areas of Thailand unaffected by the tsunami; we have a duty to promote all of Thailand and have succeeded in bringing people to, for example, Phang Nga, as explained earlier.

That said, if an area of the Kingdom experiences a problem of some kind and is not suitable

for tourists, then we must adjust our efforts to ensure that vacationers continue to visit [other parts of] Thailand.

The TAT has been given the task of redeveloping the infrastructure of Kamala and Patong – with extraordinary budgets of 96.74 million and 194.74 million baht respectively – but not Khao Lak

DUTY

That responsibility, and for the redevelopment of the Phi Phi Islands, falls to DASTA, the Designated Areas for Sustainable Tourism Administration agency, and the redevelopment of Khao Lak is now nearly 70% complete.

The TAT also has many other recovery projects in progress [in the affected areas] at the moment and has not yet summarized the total budget.

The redevelopment plans cannot yet be implemented in all of the affected areas because there are many organizations involved in the projects, [so people should not] focus only on the TAT; redevelopment of, and sustainable tourism for, the affected areas requires the cooperation of [central and local] government and the private sector.

To repeat, the TAT has not ignored Khao Lak or other areas, but our duty is to promote tourism in Thailand as a whole.

ITISSUES

ecently I attended the Phuket & Samui Property Show in Hong Kong where I had the chance to meet several prospective home-buyers. I was quite impressed with the selection of villas, apartments, condominiums and land available.

The level of quality services being touted was also impressive, as were many of the Western amenities being offered. Some included lighting control, central audio and electric garage door openers, while others included home security systems and broadband Internet connections.

This week I'd like to share my observations about what people from the "real world" expect when it comes to broadband Internet, and how it compares with what you can get here in Phyket

The first is price. I discovered that there are basically two choices for broadband in Hong Kong; the first is ADSL, and the second is Corporate Leased Line. This is very much as it is in Phuket, except for the fact that a 1Mbps (megabytes per second) ADSL connection over there delivers about 800Kbps (kilobytes per second) speed, while here it delivers about 180Kbps speed.

The price works out at pretty much the same, but when you look at what you actually get, for example trying to get the same


What do others consider to be good broadband?

speed as in Hong Kong, it would translate to about 30,000 baht per month, which for most mortals is far over-budget. When it comes to corporate leased lines, the speeds are similar, but again the costs are more than 400% higher in Phuket.

In addition, Hong Kong and many other parts of Asia enjoy online gaming, pay-per-view movies, streaming video and online conferencing that eclipse any Internet call you can make here in Thailand – and all for the monthly price of an average bottle of wine.

I went to see a demonstration of such services at one of the major suppliers' retail centers, and I was both impressed and envious, to say the least. They have such reliable, dedicated speed that they are able to play an online movie, stream music from my favorite radio station in San Francisco, carry on a Skype international telephone call, chat on MSN and download the latest Microsoft Windows update – and all at blazing speed on a 2,500baht-per-month ADSL connection. Wow!

So you can imagine some of the responses of would-be home

buyers in Hong Kong when they find out about broadband pricing and performance in Phuket. This is actually a *very* big deal, and does affect their decision whether to buy a home in Phuket or Samui.

I spoke to several prospects, and they all pretty much said the same: it is going to be difficult to justify high costs just to stay connected to the outside world.

Let's face it; many people looking to buy a home in Phuket are doing so as a second property away from home; they will still need to be connected to their business and personal interests when they are on the island.

We often install Internet systems for these people that allow them to connect directly to

their home office while staying here. The challenges we face are not so much technological but arise from Internet speed, reliability and price. The average connection for this sort of use is around 10,000 baht a month, while in Hong Kong it costs about 1,500 baht a month for the same performance.

The next question is where we go from here. The Thai government has initiated subsidized ADSL at a very affordable price, but its performance is only slightly better than a good dial-up connection. Other Internet Service Providers (ISPs) such as Loxinfo and Ji-Net are doing their best to compete, but if you need real performance, the price is still quite high

There is one shining light at the end of the tunnel, however. A new ISP from Singapore has just opened shop in Phuket – Pacific Internet. Its service is potentially much better because it has a direct link to Singapore

which does not go through the CAT Telecom system in Bang-

Hopefully, this is the beginning of the end for high-priced, low-performing broadband in Phuket. At present, the price is still the same as other ISPs, because the government controls the costs, but performance and reliability are far better and, with time, the costs will become more in line with the rest of the world.

In a future article, I will explore the ins and outs of this new service from Singapore, and what it really means to us broadband wannabes in Phuket.



Predicting the future means avoiding bandwagons

nvestors always have to look to the future, and predicting the future is seldom an easy task. The only way to have any reasonable chance of success without relying on intuition is to assemble the present and move it forward.

This entails, from a global perspective, continually absorbing economic data and making projections of how it will impact on future events.

The director of one UK fund management group once said to me, "You know where a party is going to start, the biggest difficulty is knowing when.'

He was referring to future events that would lead to a major rally in any asset class.

Investors must always avoid "jumping on bandwagons". It is easy to join in investing in an asset class that is very popular and in which everybody seems to be making gains.

The "Tech" bubble of the 1990s is a perfect example of this situation. The old stockmarket adage of "always leave some profit for the next guy" is sound thinking.

However, human beings are a social species; we virtually all follow trends – habitually. The fashion industry could hardly exist if it were otherwise.

Trends exist throughout our lifetime, but they change and so does the thinking of society.

In the situation facing the investor, it can be expensive to follow current views.

The global situation for 2006 is looking attractive from an overall perspective.

Certainly, there will be problems and challenges, but notwith-

standing any major natural disaster or man-made event, the situation is good.

Global economic growth is set to continue for 2006. China may slow somewhat, from its current expansion of 9.5% to the Chinese government's prediction of 8.5%.

The biggest threats are probably to be found in some emerging markets where gains have been excessive and where a substantial correction appears

Many fund managers, especially hedge fund managers, are aggressively pursuing various markets, not only stockmarkets but also currency and bond mar-

Various currencies tipped to be danger zones for 2006 are the Brazilian real, Turkish lira and Hungarian florint.

For hedge fund managers, it is very tempting to borrow cheaply in Japanese yen and invest their own investors' cash, plus the borrowed money, and leverage the returns in the pro-

areas and exiting at or near the peak. The types of hedge funds that indulge in these activities watch each others' strategies like hawks.

Nobody wants to be the last to exit.

The Japanese Central Bank, the Bank of Japan and the Japanese Ministry of Finance, in separate statements on December 5, made their attitude to the value of the yen abundantly clear. These statements were made after the expiry of huge option and derivate positions on December 2.

Until that time, it was virtually impossible for the yen to fall below 120 to the US dollar. Now they are perfectly content to let the yen drop in value; it can find its own level. Perhaps they will change their stance if it becomes excessive. Even this is by no means certain.

A cheaper yen means a more competitive yen for Japan's exporters, and that means corporate profits in Japan when converted back into yen are going to be impressive.

The Bank of Japan spent around US\$500 billion (in yen) in the first four months of 2004 to try to arrest the yen breaking upwards of 104 to the US dollar.

The Bank of Japan is not just allowing its currency to depreciate against the US dollar but, for example, the Chinese yuan is also still effectively tied to the US unit, and it favorably impacts on their trading situation with Asia and many other countries.

Japanese exporters have a history of repatriating cash back into Japan during March, as they approach their financial year end. Exporters want to be able to book profits and currency gains back onto their balance sheets.

Figures released in early December reveal that Japanese companies increased capital spending by 9.6% in the third quarter of 2005 – well above expectations. This is a vital sign of real confidence.

There may well be some turbulence in the Japanese stockmarket and currency, but they are most likely buying opportunities, not a time to sell.

Investment houses with a good track record in Japanese investment include GAM, a unit of UBS which was recently sold to fellow Swiss banking group Julius Baer; Schroder's; and JPMorgan Chase's unit JF Asset Management, previously known as Jardine Fleming.

My personal favorite remains Orbis Japan Equity. There are no entry or exit costs, and the investor can choose between the US dollar or yen as the base currency, allowing the separation of investment and currency if desired.

Switches between the currency classes of the fund are free of charge, and Orbis will allow direct investment by the public with a minimum of US\$50,000 or equivalent.

Returning to hedge funds, especially the US variety, the hedge funds that performed the best in 2005 were those that specialize in distressed securities. Well, somebody had to make a profit with Ford, GM and other companies that "fell off a cliff".

For 2006, mergers and acquisitions appear very attractive in the US and elsewhere. Many companies are holding huge amounts of cash on their balance

Personally, I will stick to Japan and place most of my money in ground rents and student accommodation Funds. Sleeping soundly is always good.

Drumstick beat rules the regatta

PHUKET: In a King's Cup Regatta dominated by strong winds, Ray Roberts' *Drumstick Quantum Racing* proved too quick, beating Neil Pryde's *Hi Fi* by nearly three minutes to win the final race of the Racing class to take top honors in this year's regatta, from December 3 to 10.

Drumstick's consistent good sailing allowed it to amass 7 points – four first and three second places – in the series, two points clear of *Hi Fi*.

Nick Burns' *Mandrake*, despite finishing sixth in the final race, came third in the class.

Some short-spell doldrums hampered racing in the first two days, but winds picked up to a healthy 14 knots on most of the remaining days. On Day 4, the danger factor went up a notch for the 85 competing boats as gusts blew more than 20 knots, and there were two collisions.

Yachtpro 106 was forced to retire from Race 4 after it sustained a broken boom and a hole in the deck and hull in a collision with Master Blaster, and 100-year-old Eveline had her stern clipped by 104-foot superyacht Lady M.

Happily, no one was injured in either incident.

With everything to win in IRC 1 class, *Octopussy* staved off persistent pressure in the fi-

nal race to finish just 12 seconds ahead of *Switchblade*, with *Ruby Tuesday* coming third.

The win saw *Octopussy* leap-frog into first place for the series, testament to the tight competition throughout the regatta. Although *Octopussy* and *Ruby Tuesday* wrapped up the series on 12 points apiece, top honors went to *Octopussy* as she had finished first in three races. Despite a hearty effort, *Switchblade* ranked third overall with 14 points.

La Samudra's win in the final IRC 2 race was not enough to stop Royal Thai Navy 1 from winning the class with an impressive tally of just 5 points for the series. La Samudra placed second overall in the class with 6 points, with Royal Thai Navy 2 coming third on 14 points.

The final race in IRC 3 belonged to *Sumatra*, with *Patrice III* coming second and *Minx* finishing third.

Patrice III took top honors in the series with six points, while Minx (8 points) ranked second and Sumatra (9) came third.

In the Sports Boats class, Morten Jakobsen on *Emma Mathilde XX* amassed an unbeatable 13 points before the final race, and allowed the Finnish crew of *Yachtpro 106* to complete the series using his boat.

ome do it in the privacy of their own homes, while others venture to the gym. Some do it in public parks or in full view of everyone on the beach – and Forrest Gump did it for years. Read on, this story will run and run...

According to Noël Coward, only mad dogs and Englishmen go out in the midday sun. 












Gardening with Bloomin' Bert

ome names mystify me. Not just in the plant world, but elsewhere too. For example, why would anyone want to call a motorcycle a "Smash"? Did a group of Suzuki marketing types get together in a 63rd-floor office at Suzuki headquarters and dream this one up?

You can picture the scene, brainstorming an appropriate design name for their newest basket bike. "The Suzuki Imagine," says one of them. "That Honda lot have got the 'Dream', after all." "No," say the others, "they'll think we're copying." "How about the 'Bobcat'?" asks another. "Isn't that already a bull-dozer thing?" one of them retorts.

By now, they're getting a bit tired – this naming bikes job is seriously hard work. They're reaching the stage when they're ready to put down their clipboards and head for the nearest bar for a well-earned beer. "Can't you lot think of anything, then?" asks the boss in desperation, also gagging for a pint.

"I know," says the newest member of the team, eager to impress. "How about something which encapsulates the bike; a name which will inevitably apply to whoever drives it?" "This had better be good," growls the boss. "The Suzuki Smash," he says, beaming. "Fantastic!" comes the response. Within minutes, they're in the pub getting "Smashed".

There are a number of plant

names around that are equally mysterious. Moses-in-aboat and mother-inlaw's tongue are a couple whose origins escape me. One that I really have a hard time fathoming, though, is the Madagascar periwinkle. Its geographical derivation is self-explanatory, but "periwinkle"? Please.

The Madagascar periwinkle (pung puay in Thai) commonly resides in

sand, even if it isn't quite as conspicuous as other sand-dwellers such as the sea bean, or our old friend, the casuarina.

The shrubby little plant is seen just about everywhere on the island, and is particularly well-suited to the Phuket climate. If left to grow wild, it will propagate effortlessly, and will reach about half a meter in height.

In just about every Phuket garden and beach resort, you're bound to see these small, fivelobed flowers all over the place. They're about three centimeters wide on the end of green shinyleafed stalks. They seem to re-



produce effortlessly and, once planted outside the confines of a garden, it's often difficult to stop their spread without uprooting swathes of them. So much so that you rarely see a lone plant – they're social little things.

The Madagascar periwinkle, like many of the flowers we see every day, is in fact poisonous. I can't say that I've tested the poison theory myself, but apparently the taste is extremely bitter, and even cattle won't eat it. It's a member of Frangipani family. You know the Frangipani [featured in the *Gazette of* December 3] – it's a

decorative, sweetsmelling tree found all over Thailand. Not one to eat, though.

Anyway, back to the focus of this, the Madagascar periwinkle. That name really is hard work surely there must be a more user-friendly moniker? It has fairly thick leaves with a glossy, almost polished appearance. It would seem that any plant that has these shiny leaves is probably harmful in some way, and there are

plenty of them once you start looking.

Unlike many other plants that produce flowers at selected times of the day, or only at certain times of the year, the flowers on the Madagascar periwinkle appear almost non-stop. They only come in two colors – white and purple. No other choices, and no shades in between. That's your lot.

Some think that as its name suggests, that it is in fact a native of Madagascar, while others believe it originates from the Caribbean. Wherever it's from, as long as it gets plenty of sun, it will tolerate fairly harsh conditions and will be perfectly content in the sandiest soil.

But there's a downside to this one. Unlike most of the plants that thrive on the island, despite my best efforts, Madagascar periwinkles seem, on occasion, to enjoy teasing me by giving up their will to live.


I don't get it. I try to look after my plants and do my best for them, I really do. But this one seems to have somewhat vindictive tendencies – I'm beginning to get the feeling it's personal. For no particular reason, some plants spontaneously decide that their time has come.

Firstly, the leaves wither up and generally look pathetic, almost as if it hasn't been watered or attended to. Despite my protestations and reassurances that I have actually been looking after it, its next move is for the flowers to reduce in size and then curl up, and for the whole plant to depart quietly.

Why? Maybe it's just had a bad day or is feeling depressed. Perhaps it has "guilt issues" as the Americans would say, over its poisonous tendencies. In any case, everything else next to the departed one is quite content. In fact I rather think that they're a bit miffed that their neighbor has decided on suicide. So much so that they respond by blooming and spreading as vigorously as they ever have.

The Madagascar periwinkle is an enigma. It has one of the more inexplicable names in the plant world, and it's one of the few that spreads like rabbits on speed at the same time as committing selective *hara-kiri*.

I wonder if it was a team of "experts" that came up with the original name? If so, at least they got something right about the process – I'm off to the pub.
