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# Local Britons honored for their tsunami work

PHUKET: Cynthia Ratcliffe, President of the Phuket International Women's Club (PIWC), Martin Carpenter, Chairman of the British Business Association of Phuket (BBAP), UK Honorary Consul Alan Cooke and Disaster Victim Identification Unit Press Officer Lucy Norton have been made Members of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the UK's New Year Honours List for their efforts in helping tsunami victims.

"I feel quite amazed and it hasn't really sunk in yet. I never expected anything like this to happen to me," said Mrs Ratcliffe, who was awarded for her continuing services to disadvantaged Thai children and victims of the tsunami.

She tended to the injured, volunteered to clean up debris and helped tsunami survivors from overseas by using her linguistic skills in French, Spanish, Portuguese and Dutch.

"Last year so much assistance was needed and it is very nice to have all that hard work acknowledged, but I am happy, also, to be able to continue doing more," she added.

Mr Carpenter said, "I am delighted and honored to have been presented with this MBE. It's very nice to be recognized for what I did. The PIWC and the BBAP presented a variety of fund-raising activities over the past year in aid of tsunami victims. Both organizations also regularly contribute financial assistance for needy children across Phuket, and provide clothing, shelter, food

## One killed and 75 hurt on roads over New Year

PHUKET: One man was killed and 75 people were injured in road accidents in Phuket over the New Year's celebrations.

The fatal accident occurred at 4:30 am in Chalong on December 31, when a motorcycle collided with a pickup truck.

The motorcyclist, Suwit there were 59 accidents on the for not wearing a crash helmet Mumngen, was killed instantly.

Siriporn Sasu, an officer with the Phuket Office of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (ODPM), told the Gazette that most road accidents over the festive season were alcohol-related and occurred largely at night.

According to the ODPM,

Some 2,003 road users were charged with committing traffic violations over the holiday period.

These included 1,333 found to be driving without a valid license; 399 motorcyclists fined and 156 drivers charged for not wearing a seat belt.

There were 74 drunk driving charges and 28 people were fined for driving illegally modified motorcycles.

Thirteen people were charged with breaking the speed limit.



# **ROUND-UP OF STRAY** DOGS TO BEGIN

PHUKET: Representatives from just five of the island's 13 local government bodies attended a meeting to address the island's long-standing stray dog problem. At the December 27 meeting it was also announced that dog owners in two areas can now apply for "passports" for registered pets.

The meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall, and chaired by Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura, was organized by the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO), which was represented by its Chief, Sunart Wongchawalit.

Only four or five people were present at the start of the meeting, including representatives from the Tambon Administration Organizations (*OrBorTor*) of Mai Khao and Sakoo, along with Kata-Karon Municipality. Representatives of Wichit and Rawai OrBorTor arrived later.

Representatives of animal welfare organizations on the island were not invited.

Gov Udomsak stressed the need to control the number of strays at beaches and temples, saying that they pose a threat to tourism.

"I get complaints from many tourists who are afraid of

stray dogs roaming the beaches. It's no laughing matter if a tourist gets bitten, because we have a tourism-based economy and we must ensure that it is safe for tourists here," he said.

"The province will do what it can, but in the end success will come down to the effort of each local government body," he said.

Weekly round-ups of strays will take place on Fridays, starting on January 13 in the Chalong Bay area. There will be 13 roundups altogether.

#### **TEMPLES**

The PPLO expects to remove some 380 strays from 12 beaches (Chalong, Rawai, Nai Harn, Kata, Karon, Patong, Kamala, Surin, Bang Tao, Nai Thorn, Nai Yang and Sai Kaew) and 330 more from Phuket's 11 main temples.

PPLO officials working with local government bodies will use tranquillizer guns to capture strays from beaches, which will then be taken to the Mid-Road Dog Shelter in Thalang for sterilization. Those rounded up at temples will be sterilized on site.

K. Sunart told the Gazette after the meeting that the Governor had limited the number of strays that the shelter could hold

There are currently 420-430 animals housed there, he said.

The shelter had enough resources to care for this number of animals.

K. Sunart denied that any animals would be put down to accommodate new arrivals.

"If the number reaches 500 we'll stop the round-ups," he said.

It is unknown just how many strays there are on the island, but a survey conducted last year by the PPLO estimated the number at about 3,500

Gov Udomsak said that special emphasis would be put on controlling stray dog populations in the north of the island, in Mai Khao and Sakoo Tambons, and that the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint would be monitored closely.

K. Sunart also told the meeting that the Livestock Department has approved Phuket as a pilot province for a "passport project", under which all registered pet dogs would be implanted with microchips and issued with a permit by the Ministry of Agriculture and Co-operatives that would allow the animal to travel internationally with its owners.

He said that Phuket was chosen because it is a small province and an island, which should make it easier to control the stray dog population and to microchip all registered dogs.

#### Tourists hurt in bus crash

PATONG: A tour bus carrying 37 Israelis overturned on Prabaramee Rd in rainy weather at about 5 pm on December 29, while it was en route to Patong from Khao Lak in Phang Nga. Two passengers were seriously injured in the crash.

Theerayuth Prasertphol, Chief Technical Officer of the Phuket Provincial Transportation Office, told the Gazette that as the bus was traveling down the two-lane road, which was slippery from a recent downpour at the time, the driver lost control and was forced to turn into the hillside to avoid crossing into oncoming traffic.



# Bar girl 'added injury to insult'

KARON: Chalong Police are looking for a bar hostess named "Poo" who broke the heart of a Swedish tourist – then added injury to insult by smashing a beer bottle over his head on New Year's Eve.

A report of the incident was made by the victim soon after the attack, which occurred at around 1:30 am on January 1.

Swede Peter Kawe, 43, told police that he came to Phuket as a tourist late last year and had fallen deeply in love with Poo – real name not reported – with the understanding that she was single and childless, he told police.

As patrons of the Seven Beer Bar celebrated the arrival of 2006, one of Poo's friends told the Swede that not only was she already married – but that she also had a child.

When the Swede confronted Poo to ask if this was true, she smashed a beer bottle over his head and hurled the broken remains at him, he said.

Covered with his own blood, the Swede continued to demand an explanation from Poo about why she had lied to him.

He only left the bar after Poo chased him out with a fruit knife, he told police.

Pol Lt Col Anek Mongkol of the Chalong Police Station told the *Gazette* that if Poo could be found she would be arrested and charged with assault.

# Gambling top of the December arrests table

PHUKET: Statistics released by Phuket Provincial Police show that gambling again tops the arrests table, with 256 people arrested from December 1 to 25 for the offense.

Two murders were reported during the month, with one case solved. There were two cases of attempted murder in which no arrests were made.

There were 36 reports of theft, with three people charged with snatch-and-run crimes. Eight people were arrested for possessing firearms without a license.

One hundred and twenty people were arrested for the illegal possession of controlled substances – and 44 were charged with possessing a total of 4,760 *ya bah* (methamphetamine) tablets.

Thirty-four people were arrested for offenses related to prostitution.

# Reward offered for missing yacht

KATA: Yacht owner Chris Sieber is offering a US\$5,000 reward for information directly leading to the recovery of his 46-foot catamaran *Kilo*, which went missing off Kata Beach on December 18.

Mr Sieber told the *Gazette* that *Kilo* was last seen anchored offshore from the Kata Beach Resort on December 17, following the King's Cup Regatta, for which *Kilo* was chartered.

"At first I thought they [the charter crew] may have taken her for a trip, but the next day we realized that the boat was missing," Mr Sieber said.

He reported the boat as missing with Chalong Police and with the Marine Police the following day. Authorities in Ranong, Burma and the Andaman & Nicobar Islands have also been notified.

The Marine Police put out a call for all commercial fishing vessels to report any sightings of a boat matching the description of *Kilo*. However, they did not launch a search, Marine Police Lt Col Pratueng Siramanont told the *Gazette*.

Although theft is a possibility, Mr Sieber has not ruled out that *Kilo* may simply have drifted off her anchor. However, he could not give an estimated search perimeter where the boat, if adrift, might be found.

"If she's adrift she should be somewhere out between Sumatra and the Andaman & Nicobar Islands, but with the shifting winds as well as the currents, it's nearly impossible to tell," he said.

"But if she's been stolen, she could be anywhere."

Two aerial searches by the Phuket-based helicopter charter company HeliThai failed to locate the boat.

The first search, which took place on December 20, was southwest of Phuket, where *Kilo* is expected to be if she is adrift. The second search a few days later covered Phang Nga Bay, including Koh Yao Noi and Krabi.

Mr Sieber explained that *Kilo* had been stripped down for racing in the King's Cup Regatta. There was very little drinking water and no provisions on board.

"And I left only a little diesel," he said.

Kilo can easily be identified by its distinctive Tim Mumby design. "If it has been stolen, then the thieves are not the brightest," he said. "There are only four boats like this in the world. It's not like it's a Toyota or a Mitsubishi."

# UK student found dead on Samui

SAMUI: The policeman in charge of the investigation into the death of British tourist Katherine Horton suspects foul play, but said that a preliminary police examination of the body revealed no signs of assault or rape.

Pol Maj Thanongsak Aksornsom of the Samui District Police told the *Gazette* that Miss Horton's body, in a black dress, was found floating in shallow water off Lamai Beach at about 10 am on January 2 by a jet-ski rental operator.

The Cardiff, Wales, native, a 21-year-old student at the University of Reading, was on holiday on Samui with a friend. The pair arrived in Thailand on December 27 and reached Koh Samui on December 31, in time to celebrate New Year's Eve there.

As her friend returned to their shared bungalow late on the evening of January 1, Miss Horton took a late-night stroll along Lamai Beach.

Her body was found the next morning.

Police are questioning people in the area, but have not identified any suspects, Maj Thanongsak said.

From the shoreline location of the recovered body police assume that death was the result of an accident or an attack on the beach, he added.

Miss Horton's body will be sent to the Royal Thai Police Office of Forensic Science in Bangkok for further examination to try and determine the exact cause of death, he said.

Black garbage bags, the contents of which can only be guessed at...What do these things have in common? All of it – and much, much more – can be found strewn along the shoulder of the Sapam-Samkong road, Phuket's newest garbage tip.

# The roadside eyesore

ot long ago, the Sapam-Samkong road was a quiet byway. A pleasantly winding road with little traffic, it runs north-south between the bypass road and Thepkrasattri Rd. Neglected by motorists who prefer the nearby bypass road just to the west, it is perhaps best known to island residents as the detour route they must follow during blasting work on the bypass road widening project.

The road's central location on the island has not gone unnoticed by property developers, however. Developers love to boast: Five minutes to Tesco-Lotus! Five minutes to the airport! Five minutes to the international school! Five minutes to golf!" While no such place may actually exist, the area from Sapam to Samkong is probably as close as it gets.

Among the new projects along the road are the new Juvenile Court building, a bus depot and two residential developments – Baan Rock Garden and Top Land – both major projects still under construction. With all the shophouse building along Soi Paniang to the south, it appears inevitable that the road will eventually be fully engulfed by the ever-expanding urban sprawl of greater Phuket City.

The use of the Sapam-Samkong road as a convenient – albeit illegal – garbage tip began three or four months ago.

Much of the problem, it seems, stems from confusion between the Tambon Administra-

tion Organizations (*OrBorTor*) of Rassada and Koh Kaew as to which is actually responsible for the area. Both *OrBorTor* have contracts with private companies to provide garbage removal services within their jurisdictions, with all the collected garbage sent to Saphan Hin for incineration.

The Gazette contacted both OrBorTor to try to find out who, if anyone, would take responsibility for Phuket's most unsightly roadside

Rassada *OrBorTor* President Suthat Hongbood told the *Gazette* that it was not clear whether the area in question fell under the responsibility of Rassada *OrBorTor* or Koh Kaew *OrBorTor*.

"I feel that the area with most of the garbage falls under the responsibility of Koh Kaew *OrBorTor*, even though Rassada *OrBorTor* once helped them clear up garbage in that area because Koh Kaew didn't have a loader," he said.

K. Suthat said he plans to meet with Koh Kaew *OrBorTor* soon to devise a joint strategy for dealing with the growing piles of garbage.

As for the source of all the trash, K. Suthat said most of it was dumped under cover of darkness. Although there are no hotels or resorts in the vicinity, K. Suthat suspects that much of the refuse may have its source in the hotel industry.

"We put up a sign forbidding people to dump garbage in the area. It was effective for a short time, but before long people began dumping trash there again," he said.

"I am not sure how much garbage is there right now. Is it really getting worse? If Koh Kaew *OrBorTor* doesn't have the resources to clear it up, they can call us up and ask for help," he added.

Koh Kaew *OrBorTor* President Kuakiat Kitkuar told the *Gazette* that part of the road does lie in Koh Kaew, but that the area in question is not on the normal garbage collection route. Because the population density in the area is so low, the *OrBorTor* has not placed trash receptacles along the roadside.

It is only from areas with such receptacles that the garbage collectors are responsible for making pick-ups, he said.

"This waste is not being generated by the community. Someone is smuggling it in – and we don't know who," he said, although he suspects that its source is from nearby property developments and their workers' camps.

#### SOLUTION

"I ordered *OrBorTor* staff to find out who is doing it, but it's not easy because our staff can't be there all the time. Sometimes it is put there in the morning, sometimes at noon, sometimes at night. If we can find out who is responsible, we will have them arrested and prosecuted for sure," he said.

"The people who are dumping here can be in and out in three minutes. Since the police aren't doing anything about it, the only solution is for the *OrBorTor* to catch the perpetrators."

Like his counterpart across the poorly delineated Tambon line, however, K. Kuakiat does not think the bulk of the garbage is within his Tambon.

"The huge piles of garbage are in Rassada," he said, "especially the mess along the road north of the Baan Rock Garden project."

He showed the *Gazette* a document showing that while the section of road in question falls under the jurisdiction of Koh Kaew *OrBorTor*, Rassada *OrBorTor* is responsible for the roadside.

K. Kuakiat added that he appreciated Rassada *OrBor-Tor*'s past efforts in cleaning up garbage on the Koh Kaew side of the border.

"It would be impossible for our workers to have picked up that much garbage without a loader," he said.

Public reaction to the growing mess has been mixed. Some people react with anger, others with resigned acceptance. Still others are afraid to speak out for fear of retribution.

Amporn Singtilom, a fishmonger, happened to pull his motorcycle and sidecar up along the side of the road while the *Gazette* was photographing the garbage


"It started to mount up along here about three months ago," he told the *Gazette*.

"Last night, after I sold out of fish, I told myself that I would stop by here this morning and collect some wood to use at my home. At the very least I can use it for cooking fuel," he said, rummaging through the debris.

"I think most of the garbage is leftover construction materials. You can see that someone has tried to burn it. I think the people who did that are the same ones who left it here in the first place," he said.

Surveying the roadside, he added, "I don't think this is a good place to leave garbage... it looks dirty, and anybody passing by can see it clearly."

Another local resident unimpressed with the state of the environment in the area is Uthaiwan Sujaritham, a teacher at the nearby Tunkka Boonyakajorn-pracha Asa School, just south of where the Sapam-Samkong road is becoming Phuket's "messy mile".

One of K. Uthaiwan's responsibilities at the school is to raise the students' environmental awareness by getting them to keep the school grounds clean and tidy.

As for the roadside garbage, she said: "I drive past it every day and I can't believe how negligent these people are, dump-

ing their garbage there like that. We are a tourism province... all this garbage is destroying the environment."

The worsening garbage problem in the area is a major setback for the school, which four years ago won a "Magic Eyes" environmental award from the Thai Environment and Community Development Association.

The school teaches its students about the need for conservation and environmental awareness.

It does this through songs, poster-drawing and speeches by the headmaster and teachers as

part of the morning flag-raising ceremony, she said.

There is also a recycling program under which students can get 500 baht each for bringing in target amounts of recyclable waste from their homes.

"The garbage along the road is partly from property development, but it's just part of a wider problem that stems from a lack of environmental awareness," said the educator.

Problems with garbage in the area are not limited to illegal dumping, she said. "Rassada *OrBorTor* used to do thriceweekly garbage collections at the school, but now they only come once a week."

#### 'CRAZY'

"We asked for more, larger, bins to match our growing enrollment, but they still give us only the small ones. When they are full we put them out in front of the school so that it will be easier for them to empty."

As for the mess just up the road, she had her own story to tell.

"One day, I saw some broken glass and nails on the road near where all the garbage is piled up. Seeing that it could cause a puncture to my vehicle, or to that of anyone else who passed by, I pulled over and tried to sweep the debris into a bag and get it off the road. People looked at me as if I was crazy," she said.


Another local resident the *Gazette* asked was the driver of a water truck. Identifying himself only as "Maew", he said, "The amount is increasing daily. It's mostly leftover construction materials. People keep leaving it there and nobody picks it up, so the pile continues to grow."

# Motorcyclemania, live at Baan Anurak

t isn't easy for some people to drive by a house with a big rusty old bike suspended over the doorway and a rickshaw on the front porch. Baan Anurak Motorcycle Museum's owner and manager, Boonseub "Tong" Inmeung, is more magpie than mere motorcycle maniac.

"I want to rescue other people's unwanted items, and I love old things because they have so much character. I am interested in history," he says.

Upon entering his den of antiquity, I am amazed by sundry relics in, on, under, in front of and peeking out from behind ancient-looking cabinets. From clocks and sewing machines to gramophones, tin toys and a vintage dentist's chair, Baan Anurak has something for every collector.

#### **SELF-TAUGHT**

At age 33, K. Tong has already acquired a remarkable miscellany of motorcycles, scooters and their parts. He is self-taught in motorcycle restoration, repair and maintenance, and has proved himself so adept that people now come from across Phuket to have him operate on their favorite motorbikes – as well as to buy and sell them

"I got into motorcycles when I was 14 years old and first set eyes on a book about the history of Honda motorbikes," he explains.

"I never looked back.

"My family moved to Phuket from Bangkok's Yaowarat area – Chinatown –13 years ago,

but it wasn't until about eight years ago that I was finally able to make my dream of establishing a shop specializing in motorcycle maintenance and unique antiques come true.

"Baan Anurak became quite a hit in Saphan Hin where it was launched, so I founded a motorcycle club for enthusiasts like myself to get together. From a group of four friends, it has since grown to more than 50 members from across Phuket," he says.

The Baan Anurak motorcycle club members meet at Wat Chalong and ride together to Laem Phromthep or to Rawai Beach a couple of times a year to picnic with their families. Only occasionally do they take part in motorcyclists' festivals outside Phuket.

Takuapa Rd became home to Baan Anurak two years ago. K. Tong also runs a small bar next to the shop, open every day from noon till late.

"It keeps me happy as well

"It keeps me happy as well as busy," he says. "I hope to remain here for many years to come, because this place is both spacious and convenient."

Every now and then, K. Tong takes time out to travel all around Thailand in search of unusual motorbikes, sometimes buying one or two, bringing them back to Phuket, refurbishing them and selling them to enthusiasts in the local biking community.

"My customers are generally guys 20- to 60-years-old who spend between 7,000 baht and 60,000 baht at a time, depending on what they want. I offer a wide range of services and items, from accessories to vintage motorcycles."

Interest in Baan Anurak has mushroomed.

"People who love motorcycles can't help sharing their zeal," he says.

"That's how I ended up being invited to take part in the Phuket Motor Show that was held in December at Central Festival – word of mouth.

"The organizer contacted me out of the blue and it was a surprising and welcome opportu-

nity to display a couple of my most prized possessions," he says.

K. Tong's passion has broadened recently. "Electric bicycles are my latest favorite thing. I am learning all about them and may even buy one soon.

"Thanks to the people of Phuket, I have been able to build up a business from scratch and to thrive – I can live my dream. And this dream is just beginning."

### Bungled burglary nets bogus bill

three teenagers for passing a counterfeit 1,000-baht note, Pattaya Police were stunned to learn that two of them had just stolen it from a nearby bank.

After a tipoff by a vendor at the To Rung Mae Wilai Market, police arrested two homeless boys, 15-year-old "A" and 14year-old "B" [real names withheld because they are minors], along with a girl, Piyaporn Koonharn, 19.

The vendor became suspicious when the three tried to change a dodgy-looking 1,000baht note for lower denomination bills. When police arrived, a search of the boys turned up the counterfeit 1,000-baht note.

Also found on the boys was an assortment of 50 bank cards issued by the Siam Commercial Bank.

The boys immediately confessed to having stolen all the items during a break-in at a nearby branch of the bank.

The girl had no involvement in the crime and was just someone they met and had lunch with at the market, the boys said.

"A" told police that he was a runaway and had been living on the streets of Pattaya for about a year, sleeping behind a

CHON BURI: After arresting shopping mall and running around with other street kids. He eventually met "B", who had a similar story. The two became friends, every night breaking into homes or stealing motorcycles and selling whatever they could thieve.

"A" said that to break into the bank they first surveyed the area and determined that a wall surrounding the bank was not too high for "B" to scale. Once, inside "B", after breaking a closedcircuit TV camera to avoid detection, unscrewed a metal grate covering a window. Once removed, it was child's play for him to force out the panes from the louvered glass window and gain entry to the poorly fortified bank.

Inside, he searched the drawers and found the 1,000baht banknote and other items, before escaping without notice. The boys then went to the market where they met their friend Piyaporn, and tried to exchange the bill for real money so they could all enjoy a nice breakfast.


That was when the police arrived and arrested all three. The young suspects will remain in custody while their other crimes and the role of Piyaporn in the bank break-in are investigated.

#### FROM THE GULF ()F THAILAND

olice Region 8 Chief Maj Gen Thanawat Boonfieng recently set the ambitious goal of completely eradicating within five years the sale and possession of illegal firearms in all of the provinces that fall under his jurisdiction

Following a series of shootings on the island, the police are particularly keen on reducing violent crime in tourist areas such as Samui. To this end, they have started using specially trained officers to accompany local police in checking patrons of island nightspots to see if they are packing heat.

So far they have focused on areas already known to be hotbeds of violent crime, arresting more than 20 people for possession of illegal weapons since the start of the initiative.

"We have also been following the movements of certain individuals and groups in a number of areas," said Gen Thanawat.

"Such undercover investigation is an important part of a policeman's job – and it works. Another part is conducting regu-

as patrolling areas and watching places that have a high incidence of violent crime," he added.

On Samui, officers have been visiting bars, karaoke clubs and restaurants to search for illegal weapons, drugs and other contraband.

"If local police follow our orders, then these actions will reduce gun crimes significantly."

So expect more police presence than usual when you are out on the town – at least during the initial phases of this latest crackpast two years, Samui has seen a gradual rise in the number of yellow meter taxis on the island. Drivers of these cabs are renowned for never turning on their meters - despite laws requiring them to do so.

Complaints have been pouring in to local transport and government offices and frustration is so high that there have even been punch-ups reported as a result of overcharging. There was even a report of one driver charging US\$300 instead of the expected 300 baht for a single journey.

Largely as a result of customer complaints, an official notification issued by the provincial government will have come into force at the beginning of this year. The document states that drivers who do not turn on their meters when providing services to customers are in violation of the Royal Decree on Motor Vehicles No. 5 (14) of 1979.

Passengers are asked to report drivers who refuse to turn on their meters to the Technical Affairs Division of the Surat Thani Provincial Transport Office, who will impose strict penalties if any violation is proved.

Local businessmen welcomed the notification, as many felt the situation was beginning to damage the island's reputation.

On the beat: As the high season traditionally heralds an increase in such crimes as bagsnatching and petty theft, the Koh Samui Tourist Police recently announced plans to open a new "mobile unit" based at Chaweng Lake. The Municipality office will erect signs in the area directing people to the mobile unit for assistance.

Chief Inspector Thirawat Narisithan said his department

submitted a request for the facility some time ago, but only received permission from the government last year. The center will open from 1 pm to midnight and will be staffed by a Tourist Police officer who will provide advice and file reports for tourists in need of help.

Once they have the funds for more personnel, the Koh Samui Tourist Police hope to keep the center open 24 hours a day.

Bull market: After the recent heavy flooding, Surat Thani Governor Vichit Vijaisarn sent a team to Koh Pha Ngan and Koh Tao to investigate reports of unfair pricing for essential goods.

Despite a warning in late December that small craft should not leave port, larger ferries continued to carry passengers and supplies to the islands. Some shopkeepers, however, allegedly used the weather as an excuse to raise prices, telling shoppers that goods were scarce.

Provincial officials will visit retail outlets on both islands to make sure that not only are their prices fair, but that they are also applying the government's national "Blue Flag" discount scheme, which offers certain essentials at a reduced cost.

Bar humbug: After a recent visit to Samui, Sudarat Keyuraphan, the Agriculture Minister, said that there are too many down-market bars and discos on Samui. The minister, a Samui landowner, actively promotes the island in Bangkok.

She helped to persuade the cabinet to grant more than 200 million baht for water projects, and in her previous role as Health Minister also made Samui a pilot location for her "Clean Food Good Taste" initiative.

K. Sudarat is also keen to promote Thai cultural attractions on the island, as she believes this will create more of a family atmosphere.





# Plan for media rating to shield children

rime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra wants to give Thai children a Westernstyle film rating system, according to Ladda Thangsupachai, Director of the Ministry of Culture's (MoC) Cultural Surveillance Center.

The system will be announced on Children's Day, Janu-

The rating system will apply to films, television dramas and commercials, but not to news.

The rating systems of the US, Australia, the UK and Canada were used as case studies at a recent seminar on the subject, but the Thai system will be different.

"Our culture is different from those of Western countries. We can't just take and use their systems.

"We can take examples from them, but we have to come up with our own system," K. Ladda said.

She said there would be no more butchering of films screened in theaters or released on DVD or VCD once the rating system is implemented.

Instead of deleting scenes with what is deemed to be inappropriate content, each film will be given a rating to indicate the content and appropriate audience.

Censorship of films, once the responsibility of the Royal Thai Police, has now shifted to the MoC. Attempts to enact a rating system go back more than 30 years, but the current administration sees it as imperative to act quickly, she said.

Roi-Et reality TV: A 24-hour live television program is set to show how the Prime Minister is tackling poverty among poor villagers in Roi-Et's At Samat District.

A Government House source said it was PM Thaksin's idea to broadcast the workshop, to be held from January 16 to 21. The Prime Minister, who has promised to end poverty in the area, will sleep in tents among the locals during the filming.

The broadcast will be relayed via iPSTAR satellite, owned by Shin Satellite Plc.

**Perilous playgrounds:** Some 1.5 million children suffered from Thailand's lack of child-friendly and safe environments in 2005, said Dr Adisak Plitponkarnpim, head of the ThaiHealth's Child Safety Promotion and Injury Prevention Research Center.

Throughout 2005 children were hurt as a result of dangerous environments, including playgrounds. Of the total, 150,000 were hospitalized, 30,000 sustained serious injuries that left them permanently maimed and 3,000 died, said Dr Adisak.

Recommending tougher punishment for those at fault, Dr Adisak urged the government to ensure child-friendly environments and conduct a system for health clinics to record the cause of injury and death, in order to use the information to solve the probagainst those responsible.

Fool's gold: Numerous gold shops in Khon Kaen Province have fallen victim to a scam whereby partly-pure gold ornaments are pawned as real gold.

A department store-based branch of the Mae Thongphool Gold Shop chain in the northeastern province – all of whose 15 branches have been conned pawned a partly-fake gold necklace weighing 91 grams for more than 40,000 baht.

Areerat Naononethong, a store clerk, said fake and real gold chains had been expertly mixed in single necklaces, making it difficult for staff to detect.

Inspection of gold to determine its authenticity is usually done by help of a simple chemical test performed on only the hook of each necklace.

Hoppy new beer: Thai Beverage Plc plans to further penetrate the beer market by launching at least three new brews in 2006.

The launch of new products is part of Thai Beverage's multibrand strategy to expand its product portfolio from economy to standard and premium segments of the market.

Chang Light will be launched in the first quarter of this year. Another two new beer products are scheduled to launch later in the year.

Economy beers now account for 85% of the total beer market in Thailand, followed by standard beers with 9%, and premium beers with 6%.


Gamesmanship: Chat Thai Party deputy leader Weerasak Khosurat has questioned the motive behind a draft bill on national gaming, saying the government might be attempting to allow casinos without a public hearing.

"The gaming bill is being sponsored by the government under suspicious circumstances," he said, charging that the government tried to sneak the draft through along with 376 other bills to the House – as if it wanted to avoid attention.


"Even though the draft is about the formation of a national gaming office, I suspect it is a first step to legalizing gambling and establishing casinos," he said.

"I understand that the government wants to regulate the gaming industry in order to boost state revenues, but gambling is a form of vice which should be discouraged," he said.





huket ranks second in southern Thailand in terms of Aids prevalence and fifth nationwide. There are around 6,000 HIV-positive people in Phuket and about 3,700 people with full-blown Aids

Eam-Orn Kittitornkul recalls the early days, 17 years ago, when the first cases emerged on the island.

"Right at the beginning we were dealing with only one or two Aids patients at a time," she said. The numbers climbed in the following 10 years but then, between 1998 and 2000, the rate of new cases reported dropped significantly.

Sadly, the respite did not last. "Today it's like a second wave is coming in," K. Eam-Orn said. "The first wave was caused by prostitution but the latest wave is prevalent amongst teenagers."

It is thought that HIV was brought to Thailand by gay men but then spread to sex workers, then to wives and eventually to children.

"Between Thais the ratio between HIV-positive men and woman used to be 8:1 – that means eight men had the disease for every woman who had it. But now the number of women who suffer from the disease is almost the same as the number of men.

"The reason more women have HIV than ever before is that Thai society has changed over the years. Women have started to have more than one boyfriend. Married women sometimes enjoy a 'toy boy' or take a lover.

"Sometimes they don't care about the danger – they just want to have an extra man. And if that man has a relationship with another woman, the chain of infection is set up. This is how people put themselves more at risk of getting HIV.

"There is still a lot to be said for the old tradition of one-husband-one-wife," she noted.

At first it was very difficult to campaign for safe sex and condom use, she said.

"We offered free condoms and almost forced them on prostitutes. But sometimes they refused to take them. Some said that they were worried they would not be able to have sex any more be-

cause their genitals might react nereal diseases. The PPHO albadly to condoms, or other strange reasons. They also said that men could not maintain an erection when wearing one.

"It's better now because [the sex workers] understand and have greater awareness of HIV and Aids. They insist customers use condoms. Now we have almost run out of condoms!"

The PPHO provides up to 400,000 condoms per year to sex workers in Phuket; distributing more than 30,000 a month.

"We ask the sex workers, 'What will you do for money if you contract HIV? Who will look after your children or your parents if you don't take precautions?' Sometimes it's not easy to explain these things.'

When sex workers go for a check-up or treatment at the PPHO, they also receive free counseling.

K. Eam explains: "If sex workers come in with STDs [sexually-transmitted diseases] it means that they cannot work, so they suffer a loss of income. You have to understand that some nights they can have four to five customers and it means a significant loss of earnings if they cannot work.

"So condoms can preserve their livelihood as well as protect them from [HIV and] other ve-

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ways gives individuals HIV and Aids awareness talks though sometimes health officers have to go to the beer bar, karaoke, massage business or nightspot where the [infected] sex worker has come from, to deliver the mes-

"Most of the women who become prostitutes have done so because they have domestic difficulties such as a violent husband or one who has taken a second

"Sometimes they have been abandoned and left with children and elderly parents to look after."

Nowadays the PPHO has a new target for its Aids awareness campaign – teenagers. Officers go to college campuses and schools, raising Aids awareness by using lighthearted slogans such as "Are you sure? I'm sure."

"Teenagers tell me that the reason they don't want to use condoms is that it doesn't feel natural and that they'd rather feel trust between each other than

tract HIV is precisely that misplaced trust.

And the alternatives? "Masturbation, mutual and solitary, is a safe form of sex with no risk of HIV and there's no need to wear a condom.

"[As to full intercourse] there are three main methods recommended by the WHO, which we pass on to help people avoid the risk of contracting HIV.

"One is abstinence, the second is being faithful to your partner and the third, of course, is wearing a condom.

"If people would only stick to at least one of these methods they would be far less likely to get Aids."

The average time that untreated HIV takes to develop into full blown Aids is usually between six and eight years, depending on the health of the sufferer. With today's "drugs cocktails" that slow down the progress of the disease, people stand a far greater other province and like to party at night, or even if they travel a lot, these women should use condoms when having sex.

"One never knows what the man does once he is away from

"From the information I've gathered from rural housewives, they don't use condoms because they trust their husbands."

"Because of medical progress one marriage partner can have HIV and yet feel healthy enough to carry on normally.

"But this doesn't mean that he or she won't pass the disease on so, again, it's best to wear a condom.

"People still need sex, even when they are HIV-positive.

"What makes life especially difficult for us at the PPHO is infected people having sex outside their relationship without telling anyone.


"We try to explain the dangers to them but it's hard for them to grasp because they consider sex to be their right, and a natural part of life."

In the case of sex workers, K. Eam-Orn says that most use condoms when dealing with customers but often don't when making love with husbands or boyfriends.

"In fact, I don't think men who have sex workers as girlfriends are honest with them often the man may feel that she is not honest with him," she added.

So whether it is a case of too much trust, as in the case of teenagers, or too little, the result can be the same – that partners do not take precautions.

HIV and Aids take a terrible toll on lives. The saddest thing is that this need not be the



# Bass, base and Grace

Music From Two Basses
David Holland / Barre Phillips

ack in 1971, the idea of a set of improvised bass duos did little to ignite the imaginations of the majority of record labels, nor their bean counters. ECM – still run by Manfred Eicher – was not and is not in the majority, thankfully, and has never appeared to be motivated by returns on sales.

Eicher signed up the bassists in question – David Holland and Barre Phillips, arguably two of the jazz scene's most creative bassists – to produce the 11<sup>th</sup> recording, just re-released, for probably the most innovative and daring record label outside of Factory Records.

Three years earlier in 1968, however, Phillips recorded *Journal Violene*, which was the first solo jazz bass recording.

Around the same time, English bassist Holland ended his tenure with Miles Davis, hung up his electric bass, and was exploring the outer reaches of improv jazz with Chick Corea when Eicher suggested that he team up with Phillips in the studio.

On the opening brace of improvised pieces, called *Improvised Piece I* and *Improvised Piece II*, Holland and Phillips both reveal themselves as master players.


After nearly six minutes of playfully aggressive jousting, Phillips picks at a mournful chord while Holland solos; they swap roles, then trail off into



silence. The second piece is more episodic, with sudden shifts from low-end drone to lightning piz-zicato to cascades of harmonics.

This is a fine record by two masters of the instrument. It is also a reminder of how important ECM was to the birth of a creative, Europe-based improvised music.

ECM1011 Rio Funk Colors Various Artists

Colors Music, the musical arm of *Colors Magazine*, presents contemporary music from all points of the compass with a series of sexy and fun compilations.

Rio Funk is a blistering selection of the best funk tracks produced in Rio de Janeiro's 600-

plus favelas last year.

The carioca style comprises raw sexual lyrics and bass lines taken liberally from the Miami and hip-hop sounds of the '80s, as well as more traditional Afro-Brazilian rhythms.

Carioca is the most interesting sound to come out of Brazil in recent years, and is today what samba was before: music produced by the lower class that makes it to the mainstream.

Most tracks on this album were produced by young, novice musicians from one of Rio's largest and toughest favelas, the Cidade de Deus or City of God, which was the setting for Fernando Meirelles' superb 2002 cinematic release of the same name.

Track 1, Retorno de Jedi is a hoot, while Track 9 Sadomasoquista 2 – replete with the sounds of cracking whips and a pleasured-woman in peril – leaves little to the imagination. The standout track, however, must be C.I.D.A.D.E. D.E. D.E.U.S., a song about the sexual delights on offer south of the Equator, so to speak.

Rio Funk Colors Various Artists, IRM 811 Grace

Rachel Z

ne of the best recommendations for Rachel Z is that, despite being a female jazz pianist/vocalist, she is not Norah Jones or Diana Krall, those purveyors of bland, occasionally saccharine but consistently unadventurous mass-market muzak.

A gifted instrumentalist, who took her first singing lessons at age two, Ms Z is an improviser whose spontaneous playing is not eclipsed by the work of reigning luminaries such as Herbie Hancock and McCoy Tyner.

Ms Z – born Rachel Carmel Nicolazzo – isn't afraid to take risks, and makes some challenging choices of others' songs on Grace, her seventh album, as well as her five original pieces.

In this collection, where she covers songs by Björk, Kurt Cobain, U2, Kate Bush and John Lennon, not only is Ms Z's piano virtuosity unhampered, but her voice avoids familiar schmaltz.

One says "unhampered", although she plays more softly than usual, perhaps affected by the acoustics or the sanctity of St Peter's Episcopal Church, NYC, where this beautifully captured recording, as ever with Chesky Records, was made.

Ms Z covers *Joga* by Björk. Her interpretation starts as a gentle cadence against languid bassdrum offbeats, before opening out into romantic chords. It rises into a fast improvisation before easing back lazily, allowing Chris J Luard's bass to whisper the return to the theme.

Chesky Records has done its best to make sure the casual punter doesn't suspect Rachel Z of being a jazz musician.

The sleeve photography is fashion-shoot quality – Ms Z is rather pleasing to the eye, after all – and even sees her half-emulating the iconic Lewis Morley pic of Christine Keeler astride a chair. Why only half-emulating? Because Ms Z keeps her kit on.

The inventive Bobbie Rae's sparse and subtle percussion opens the soulful *Protect This Child*, and more than a touch of Keith Jarrett flickers around Ms Z's piano in the more conventionally romantic ballad *Moon In Your Hair*. Rae's delicately rolling tomtoms introduce U2's *One*, which La Z explores as a minimalist instrumental.

Nirvana's *Come As You Are* is interpreted as a nimble instrumental, while Kate Bush's *This Woman's Work* stands out as Ms Z's best vocal track.

Her hardest task – and therefore her greatest success – is the free interpretation of John Lennon's *Imagine*. Rather than a full reworking, it is more being sung spontaneously, privately almost, perhaps to herself.



It's a fun and cool way to spend 15 minutes, but I guarantee that the novelty wears off soon after swallowing the third flower petal while you disappear underwater desperately grabbing for a handle.

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# Just pull that cork and drink up!

Q: Do plastic corks react with would have to take in order to gain wine? Are they a better choice than real cork for a wine stop-

A: Yes, plastic corks do react with wine. They are made from food-grade polymers and are generally regarded as safe, yet they contain residual oxidants and other compounds that react with ethanol. Little is known about the long-term effects of wine aging with synthetic corks, as they are not generally used with wines meant for aging.

Cork also reacts with wine and the effects are much more variable than plastic corks. In 1995 I wrote a paper on wine closures that was published in the International Journal of Wine Marketing. In the paper I outlined the steps producers market acceptance of screw-top closures on fine wines.

I am still a big believer in screw-top closures as the best choice for wine, and I am heartened by the ever-increasing number of wine-makers who are opting to abandon closures that require corkscrews.

By the way, glass may also

react with wine. Glass is about 70% silica and the rest potash (potassium hydroxide), sodium and various heavy metals and their oxides. Most people think glass is inert but it can be quite reactive with some wines and may even react with minerals in the water or the color pigments in red wine. Many chemical reactions like these occur without our noticing them because of our lim-

water is an example.

the cork in a wine bottle, and then twisted with an upward pulling motion to remove the cork. The device's purpose is to allow the cork to be removed without damage. It can be difficult to use and is not really very practical for most people. The name comes from the remark most people make when they discover for the first time that it is a cork puller.

**Q:** How can I know if a wine is fruity and light or heavy and oaky before I buy it?

**A:** Read the back label, which is where most wines' style is described. Alternatively, ask somebody in the shop where you are buying the wine, assuming somebody there knows something about the products they sell. Or you can look it up on the Internet.

The answer and information on the web may not be accurate, but at least it is available.

Take time to learn about wine. With a little study you can quickly come to know the style favored by major producers and the difference in appellations, for example, that Chablis is generally unoaked unless it is a premier crus.

Finally, just try the wine. Tasting a wine is always the best way to know about it.

# No violins, but lots of sax

t's another hair-raising Saturday night in Patong, and as the car squeezes into the last available parking spot on the beach road, I feel lucky.

With every step toward the new Saxophone Pub & Restaurant, an offshoot of the popular venue of the same name established in Bangkok in the late 1980s, a log-cabin-like building looms larger.

The contingent of staff welcoming me on the veranda look casual, yet serious, all in black amid the neon beacons of the neighborhood, but their smiles let me know that the effervescence of the new year is still in full swing.

As I cross the threshold, my eyes scanning the room for the best table from which to enjoy the live music, I somehow feel I should be wearing suede cowboy boots and bits of fringe in just the right spots.

#### **LAID-BACK**

The place has a country-and-western feel to it, with its light-stained wood floors and walls and enough space for 350 or so people to kick up their heels in a stomping good hoe down. Chunky wooden chairs, tables and benches lend weight to this impression.

But this evening – it's only 9 pm and, judging by the relatively few customers, news of the jazz and blues joint has not yet reached Soi Bangla – I've come early, searching for something different and laid-back to ease me into my night on the town. The giant-sized portrait of Billie Holiday on the wall is reassuring.

Chain, chain, chain, chain, chain of fools... one of the four all-Thai bands that play here, Blues Coin, already on stage and tuned up, launches into the first of many numbers I know and love. The female lead singer's

raspy voice complements the music, played with just a touch of funk.

But humming along and tapping one's feet works up a thirst. The drinks list offers eight "Special Cocktails" but I only have eyes for the Saxophone Dropper

 a potent yet pretty concoction of vodka, brandy, blue curaçao and lemon juice for 210 baht.

The time comes to order from what turns out to be an extensive menu of mainly Thai fare, although there are western dishes available, including burgers, pasta, steak and deep-fried ice-cream for dessert. I tuck into filet of red

snapper meunière, which comes with either vegetable-rice or a baked potato (260 baht), steamed fish with lemon sauce (260 baht), and fried prawns with garlic and pepper (210 baht).


Each is a generous serving – enough for two.

The fish in lemon sauce is so lightly steamed that it reminds me, in parts, of sashimi – not intentional, I'm sure. And, perhaps like the chef, I'm too lazy to bother with shelling the prawns slathered in the delicious peppery sauce. So, the winning dish is, for me, the red snapper meunière, which leaves nothing to be desired.

But, as their logo suggests, Saxophone is really about the music and *Mood Indigo* goes down especially well with a whisky on-the-rocks, late on a starry night in Patong.

Saxophone's New Year's resolution for the "pearl of the Andaman" may very well be to unveil a refreshing variety and rising standard of home-grown entertainment talent.

f ever there was a sedan with a schizophrenic personality, then it has to be the latest Chevrolet Optra.

Originally introduced as a Daewoo Nubira, it is still marketed as a Chevy Nubira in some countries, and in Europe it is known as the Lacetti. In Thailand it's the Optra.

Daewoo was a wounded animal for many years, outclassed by Korean rivals Hyundai and Kia, which itself was to come under the control of Hyundai ultimately. After various incarnations and name changes, Daewoo emerged as Shinjin Motor in 1965 and collaborated closely with Toyota.

The Japanese giant withdrew in 1972, however, and Shinjin began an association with General Motors. Initially, and logically, called General Motors Korea, someone, somewhere, in his or her wisdom changed the name yet again to Saehan Motor.

In 1982, when the Daewoo *chaebol* or conglomerate gained control, it finally became Daewoo Motors.

All Daewoo's models at the time were based on GM models, but following the Asian financial crisis of 1997, Daewoo made the (in retrospect) hasty move to take over 4x4 producer SsangYong, only for SsangYong to run into financial trouble in 1999.





# The Chevrolet Optra – lacking soul but a good Korea move

General Motors came to the rescue in 2001, buying most of Daewoo Motors to form GM Daewoo.

The Nubira – Korean for "go anywhere" – is the four-door sedan, and the Lacetti is a five-door hatchback. In future, both models will be known as the Lacetti. The Optra is based on the original Nubira.

The Optra comes with a choice of 1.6- or 1.8-liter engines, the former sourced from South Korea, the 1.8 from GM Australia. Both feature 16 valves and,

significantly, GM was one of the first automakers in Thailand to fully test its cars for compatibility with the newly introduced gasohol fuel.

In conjunction with the Ministry of Energy and the Thai Automotive Journalists' Association, a successful 300-kilometer test drive was organized from Bangkok to Uthai Thani, via Suphan Buri.

Gasohol is 90% gasoline with a 10% ethanol mix, locally produced in the Kingdom, and is now available throughout Phuket.

Power outputs are modest, as you would expect, but are still perfectly adequate for Phuket's roads: 109bhp (80kW) for the 1.6-liter version, offering a maximum speed of 187kmh, while the larger

engine produces 122bhp, or 90kW – allowing 194kmh.

The 1.8 model was listed as "2004 Car of the Year for Best Sedan" by a leading Bangkok newspaper.

Transmissions are either five-speed manual, or, in the 1.8, a four-speed automatic. Curiously, the Euro-ride suspension originates from England, so no wonder the Optra has something of a confused persona.

Equipment levels are fairly comprehensive, even in the entry-level model, which features power front windows, central locking and electrically adjusted exterior mirrors.

The top-of-the-range Optra offers a five-disc CD player, complete with steering wheel remote

controls. Speed-sensitive power steering is also available, as is a rain sensor for the windshield wipers.

Rear seats can be folded in a 40:60 split for loading bulky objects, while there are standard cupholders in the front center console, oddments bins in all four doors and handy pockets on the outer edge of the front seats.

The Chevrolet Optra may lack a little inspiration in some areas, notably its looks, but as far as safety and comfort are concerned, this is a world-class car.

Owners can become members of the Optra Club Thailand, which organizes various activities "to know your Optra better".

Its president, Sunil Thadani, says, "The Optra Club was initiated as a home for everyone interested in the Chevrolet sedan. People can meet through a dedicated Internet website [in Thai] www.optraclub.pantown.com, exchange knowledge, and pool information about buying, maintenance, accessories, or discuss news and technology."

n modern American literature, Cormac McCarthy is the elephant in the corner of the living room. The Eastern Literary Establishment doesn't know what to make of him. They didn't know what to make of William Faulkner either, of whom Lionel Trilling, the dean of New York literary critics, remarked: "It seems that he never heard of the Enlightenment."

Cormac McCarthy is very much in the Faulkner line. He spent much of his life in Tennessee, the setting for his first three novels. In 1976, he moved to El Paso, Texas, and began work on his epic historical novel Blood Meridian about filibusters who ride into Mexico in search of Indian scalps. One scene, in which the renegade whites suddenly find themselves in the midst of a huge herd of stolen horses being driven northward by wild Comanches, ranks among the greatest bravura passages in English prose, ever.

It was McCarthy's Faulknerian mode at its best.

The two polar opposites of modern American literature are Faulkner with his grand rhetoric, ornate sentences and ceaseless spiraling back into the past, and Ernest Hemingway with his simple words, terse sentences and preoccupation with action in the present. In his Western phase, McCarthy started moving in the simpler Hemingway direction in his Border Trilogy (All the Pretty Horses, The Crossing and Cities of the Plain). In his latest novel, No Country for Old Men (Alfred A. Knopf, New York, 309pp, 2005), he has gone fullbore Hemingway.

# The ultimate literary thriller

Now this is beautiful prose, followed by a typical Hemingway cadence: "He sat and pulled on his boot and picked up the rifle and ejected the spent casing and put it in his shirtpocket and closed the bolt. Then he slung the rifle over his shoulder and set out."

What he finds is three bullet-ridden off-road vehicles, four dead men and one dying, and a huge amount of Mexican brown heroin. Following a blood trail, he finds another corpse and a briefcase containing \$1.2 million in \$100 bills. What does he do? He's a welder living in a trailer home with a 19-year-old wife.

He takes the case.

This makes him the prey of a pathological killer named Anton Chigurh. There is no police record or photograph of Anton Chigurh because he simply kills everyone who gets in his way. He kills people he doesn't even need to kill. Bodies accumulate up and down the Tex-Mex border and spook the hell out of Sheriff Tom Ed Bell.

Bell, who periodically speaks in a colloquial Texan accent to an unnamed interlocutor, is the moral center of the novel. A World War II veteran, he has inherited the moral legacy of his father and uncle and grandfather and ancestors going back to the

settling of Texas. He sees his job as sheriff to protect the people of his county. But he knows he is way out of his league with the unknown mass killer.

"I've always known that you had to be willin' to die to even do this job. That was always true. Not to sound glorious about it or nothin' but you do. If you ain't they'll know it. They'll see it in a heartbeat. I think it is more like what you are willin' to become. And I think a man would have to put his soul at hazard. And I won't do that. I think now that maybe I never would."

The ending is unexpected. This is no conventional thriller.

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### DOWN THE LAW

r A, a foreigner living in Thailand, set up a business through a Thai company in which he invested 49%. His Thai partner did not have the necessary funds to invest in the company and therefore signed over her shares for Mr A to sell to another potential investor.

However, she still worked with him in the company and also became his live-in partner. It took Mr A some time to find another investor, but when he did he had the shares registration with the Company Registration Office amended to reflect the new investor's shareholding.

After some time his personal relationship with the woman came to an end, but not without a legal battle over their shared assets, as well as over company shares and profits that were never distributed to the shareholders as dividends.

The woman checked all legal registrations, including the company documents, and found that Mr. A had changed her shareholding in the company without informing her. She therefore filed criminal charges for theft of shares, and Mr A was invited to the police station to answer her claim.

Even though Mr A could show the share transfer documents as evidence and proof that she had signed the paper, she claimed that it had been signed blank and that she didn't know what it said as it was in English only.

In discussions between the legal representatives of both parties it became clear that the dispute was about compensation for the woman. Mr A's representation claimed that the ex had knowingly signed the share transfer document and that she had done so before witnesses.

The representation added that the shares were still registered with the company, therefore any criminal charge should not be for theft but for misappropriation, and further that she had no right to dividends or mutual gain as an ex-spouse as the couple had not been legally married. As no out-of-court settlement could be reached and as the police did not accept the charges as filed, the woman's lawyers filed the charges directly in court.

Through the court arbitration system it was possible to find a settlement to the satisfaction of both parties and the case was closed.

We therefore should be aware that a signed document can still be disputed, and that any evidence of payment should be made separately and should be clearly mentioned in the agreement.

The new year symbolizes change and new beginnings. In Columbia, "Mr Old Year", a big male doll made of unwanted material, is burned on huge bonfires, effectively symbolizing the forgetting of all the bad happenings of the previous year. In a way, New Year's resolutions are also meant to burn the Mr Old Year in us.

However, it's not so simple to reach into yourself, cut out the parts you don't like, and toss them onto a bonfire. It takes work and commitment – which is why most of us fail.

Those who make rash resolutions are the first to fall off the wagon. A study conducted at the University of Washington found that 65% of their participants reneged by the second week of January; these having made their resolutions between December 28 and New Year's Day.

Janus, January's namesake, was the two-faced Roman god of change, transition and beginnings. One face looked to the past and one to the future, signifying

the importance of balance. Do we fail because we look only forward, when we should be looking back as well? For strong commitment, you need an honest look at your past, to see what you have to change about yourself and why. You must also have hope for the future – the determination and motivation not to give up.

But what would I know about any of this? I don't keep any of my resolutions. In fact, most teenagers don't. Younger teens usually resolve to work harder in school or to get along with their families better, while older teens tackle whatever more intractable bad habits they might have accumulated.

Most teens make between two to 10 resolutions each year, and, according to studies made at the University of Virginia, only one in five keeps all those resolutions for at least half a year.

Almost all teens resolve to be a better person in the New Year. Being so vague, it's a very easy resolution to keep. It's simple to say, "Yes, I was a better person this year because I did not laugh at the crazy man who lives down the road, and I only punched my little brother twice a week."

I asked my friends if they ever keep their resolutions, and the resounding answer was "No!", delivered with a derisive snort. Even before New Year's Eve, when asked how sure they were that they could keep their resolutions, most said that they wouldn't be able to.

So, why bother making resolutions at all, if you know you won't be able to keep them? I wondered. So I did what I always do when in doubt: I Googled it. (Although it's a pity Google hasn't launched some sort of Life Search that could somehow locate that shirt the cat dragged off, or the sock that was lost in the laundry.)

The most touted tip on the Internet was this: Be realistic, and don't be disappointed if you don't see any immediate changes in yourself, or if you fall off the wagon early on. You're not going to change into a sex god/goddess overnight, and you're going to have some difficulties giving up smoking, and so on – but don't let yourself become discouraged.

You need a thorough plan: if you want muscles like Adonis by the end of the year, plan your exercise regime and your diet to every last detail.

But if you really want to change, then don't even bother waiting for the New Year – start now. Right this minute. Put out the cigarette you're smoking, and let your dog eat the rest of the bacon on your plate.

As for me, perhaps my New Year's resolution should be to stop preaching and take my own advice – and I'm going to start right now.

Dear Steve,

The Lord Buddha teaches us to lead our lives by the middle path, neither too much nor too little.

I quite agree with you in not getting distracted by all the ritual aspects associated with mainstream Thai Buddhism, although ritual has its place in helping us to structure our learning and practice, such as by establishing certain times and places for meditation. A "strict" Buddhist, meaning someone who follows all the

rituals, does not necessarily mean that he or she is a good Buddhist.

To my knowledge, there are no Buddhist "Sunday Schools" in Phuket because we introduce our children to Buddhism by taking them with us to the temple or meditation retreats.

I feel that teaching your child at home from an early age would be the best way to learn about the basic teaching of the Buddha. There are many good books in English and Thai which explain the basic philosophy and practice of Buddhism. Also, if you and your wife participate, you will be tremendous role models for your daughter.

For example, you and your wife could teach her three of the basic five rules for laypersons (dealing with killing, stealing and lying).

The other two rules, about adultery and using intoxicants, do not really apply at this stage, but you could introduce the idea. Teach her to chant the various

prayers (in Thai rather than Pali or Sanskrit whenever possible), primarily as preparation for the practice of meditation, when we try to shut off the endless conversations and speculations our brains produce. Children are good copy-cats, and again you are a role model in showing her how to practice Buddhism.

Take her to the temple periodically and listen to the monk's preaching, and also take part in temple ceremonies on auspicious days of the year. Explain to her the meaning of each auspicious religious day in terms of what the Buddha intended – rather than the blind ritual. This would be a good start for the child.

I do not believe in teaching her strict, formal, theoretical Buddhism at this age, because this could turn her off later on. Let it seep into her slowly. Gradually teach her about meditation. Teach her to *tham boon* [make merit] by offering alms to monks and giving money to the poor. This



# Air Andaman launches with flights to Krabi

PHUKET: The new Phuket-based airline, Air Andaman, took to the air on December 11, with a twice-daily service between Phuket and Krabi.

Montri Rattanapiphop, regional sales manager at Air Andaman's Bangkok office, told the Gazette, "The flights from Phuket to Krabi depart at 10.55 am and 5.20 pm.

"The return flights leave Krabi at 11.45 am and 6.15 pm. We intend to introduce one more flight each way if the demand is good," he added.

The aircraft used for the service is a Jetstream 32, a 19-seat turboprop plane.

Tickets cost 800 baht each way.

The airline is awaiting delivery of its second aircraft, which will allow the three flights a day to Krabi and back, and will also

allow Air Andaman to launch a twice-daily flight from Phuket to Nakhon Sri Thammarat, and another, also twice a day, to Surat Thani.

Tickets for these routes will be 1,200 baht each way.



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#### Rubbishing Phuket

The worsening garbage problem along Sapam-Samkong Road is just the latest example of how greed, inadequate law enforcement and a lack of environmental awareness are continuing to despoil what is left of Phuket's greatest asset – its natural beauty. [see Inside Story, pages 4-5].

While the tambon administration organizations [OrBorTor] of Rassada and Koh Kaew dither about who is responsible for cleaning up the mess, the fact remains that the garbage never should have been dumped there in the first place.

The content of the garbage indicates that much of it was initially debris left over from a construction project. Once established as a dumping ground, however, more and more people have been adding to the growing mess. If left unchecked, the area promises to become Phuket's own version of "Smokey Mountain" - now that persons unknown have begun burning it.

The garbage itself constitutes a mountain of evidence that could used to track down those responsible – were the police interested in conducting an investigation. Apparently they are not.

To dispose of garbage in this manner is reprehensible. The polluter, or polluters, should be tracked down, prosecuted, punished – and most important of all – forced to clean up the garbage and dispose of it properly.

Such illegal dumping also threatens the local groundwater table with contamination from a wide variety of toxins, including heavy metals from used batteries. This is of particular concern on the Sapam-Samkong Road, which runs alongside a klong connecting numerous tin mining ponds in the vicinity that serve as water sources.

It seems that no part of the island remains safe from those who would, for a quick profit, sacrifice the environment that sustains us all. Last month, government officials seized an estimated 1.5 million baht in wooden planks that were cut from hardwood trees felled on protected forest land in Koh Kaew. So brazen were the loggers that they even brought in the necessary equipment to process the wood into salable planks right at the site. As with so many other environmental crimes committed on the island, there have still been no arrests in the case.

Garbage collection is among the most important duties entrusted to the 13 local administrations on Phuket; it is time for both OrBorTors to get together and clean up the mess along Sapam-Samkong Rd before it worsens.

It is also time for the police to get serious about bringing to justice those who see fit to use a public road as their own personal garbage dump.

In the next sentence, we were informed that China's economy is at present a command economy. Both statements are woefully inaccurate and require correction.

First, I am not sure where Mr Watson learned his economics, but democratically-free societies are at a distinct economic advantage over command econo-

This is because free peoples are more efficient in allocating scarce resources than economic ministers are.

This efficiency is best reflected in consumer prices which are aligned with consumer demand. In a command economy, such as the former Soviet Union, consumers are forced to pay dearly for defective televisions made in decrepit state-run facto-

Secondly, describing the current Chinese economy as a being of a command variety is entirely misleading.

The Chinese government is indeed run by the Communist Party. However, their economy has long been on a liberal reform path. It is this very reform, giving economic choice back to ordinary people, which is responsible for their exceptional economic growth rate.

What puzzles me most about Mr Watson's comments are that they come from the pen of an investment planner.

Let me remind Mr Watson

that in a command economy there are not any investors other than the state itself.

His comments, as found within the *Phuket Gazette*, would be laughable were it not for the scores of thousands who have died for the sake of freedom and democracy throughout the world.

# Why the bypass project has been delayed

he bypass road project was rescheduled for completion by January 26, but, realistically speaking, I believe it needs about another two months [beyond January] to finish it.

The eight-kilometer-long project is separated into two parts: the first section, from the Baan Bang Ku Intersection [near the Royal Phuket Marina] until the Baan Samkong Intersection [at the Tesco-Lotus Superstore] is a five-kilometer stretch followed by a three-kilometer section from Tesco-Lotus to the the Dara Samut School Intersection [known to many people as the Thainaan intersection].

Basically, the delays are due to slow responses from the Ministry of the Interior (MoI) in granting blasting permission.

It works like this: the contractor, in this case Chiang Rai Harn Charoen Enterprise Limited (CRHC) must make a written request to the MoI, for the dynamite necessary to carry out the blasting.


The policy of making a formal request is mainly due to the volatile situation in the Deep South of Thailand. The MoI is known to be strict regarding this – hence the delays.

[In March 2005, K. Boonyakiat told the Gazette that the contractors waited some 265 days for government approval to commence blasting.]

By the time permission came through, CRHC realized that the project was already behind schedule and that the wheels of the Thai governmental processes move slowly.

The bypass road project has become a byword in Phuket for delay and inconvenience. The 111-millionbaht widening project was due for completion on September 28 last year, yet it still seems a long way from its conclusion with limited lighting, potholes and either





dusty or muddy surfaces, depending on weather conditions.

Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura ordered that the project be completed by December 26 so that dignitaries visiting the tsunami memorial services would have a positive impression of the island, but this was not to be.

Phuket Highways Department Engineer Boonyakiat Kongketyai talks to the Gazette about the project and its problems.

The contract was due to expire on September 28 but CRHC requested – and was granted – an extra 120 days.

However, I still don't think that it will be finished by January 26 because of delays due to the recent heavy rain.

If the project is not completed by January 26, then CRHC will be fined 33,390 baht for each day over the set date. This will be taken out of funds owed to CRHC by the government for the project.

Aside from delays caused by natural phenomena, the project has been held up by staffing problems and malfunctioning machinery, although the biggest problem has undoubtedly been the delay

caused by waiting for permission to commence blasting.

It was originally scheduled to take place in June 2004 but we couldn't even begin until January 2005, so we were eight months late, effectively, before we even started blasting. [The Gazette first reported that blasting had begun in March 2005.] Thankfully, the blasting process has now been terminated.

Normally, we would buy the rocks to be pulverized to make the hardcore for the construction from Phang Nga but a Highways Department engineer suggested that we use ground rock, a byproduct from the blasting process, with which to lay the road.

This method should, at least

theoretically, have saved time and

The Governor insisted that we asphalt the surface of the section from Tesco-Lotus to the Dara Samut School Intersection before December 26, but the asphalt mixer broke down.

He was in a hurry to give a good impression to people using the road during the tsunami memorial services, but even if we had asphalted the surface, it wouldn't have necessarily meant that the project was finished.

However, I can say for sure that the surface of the road will be complete by January 26, although we will still have details, such as road markings and the installation of electrical and drainage infrastructure, to finish.

There is still quite a lot of rain runoff from the higher parts of the project, especially where blasting has taken place, and we shall be constructing artificial waterfalls to handle this.

This project has been a long time in the works, and it's a given that the heavy machinery has seen a lot of wear and tear, but the cost for repairs is shouldered by the contractor, not the govern-

In conclusion, it has to be said that the private and governmental agencies have co-operated wonderfully. People have been using a rough and dirty road for long enough now, and we'd like to apologize for this.

#### Stray dog strut

As a veterinarian and someone who has worked extensively in stray animal control, both in the US and overseas, I am alarmed when I read of the continuing "efforts" of the Phuket authorities to control stray dogs. Simply picking up dogs and incarcerating or killing them has never worked nor will it ever work. Other dogs will simply fill the void in an amazingly short period of

The only effective means of controlling stray dogs is mass sterilization although, certainly, any dangerous dogs should be captured and humanely euthan-

On a visit to Phuket a few weeks ago, I met a volunteer who was picking up stray dogs on Nai Yang Beach to do this very work. He told me that a local animal welfare organization had already sterilized nearly 7,000 dogs and cats and was also vaccinating them all and treating them for any disease or injury.

According to him, virtually all the beach and temple dogs have now been sterilized.

This approach will work, and the authorities, rather than not inviting these organizations to their

meetings, should cooperate with them and leave them to do the job, which would free up resources for other more important

#### When will Rawai have more phone lines?

We are installing new telephone lines all over the country during the first three months of 2006. A total of more than 5,000 new numbers will be available in Phuket through island's 11 telephone exchanges. All the new numbers will be able to provide ADSL highspeed Internet access.

We have already installed 120 new ADSL-capable lines for the Baan Lipon area in Thalang. In Rawai, an exchange is being installed at the entrance of Wat Sawang-arom. It should be completed within six months. The exchange will provide 360 new lines that can support ADSL Internet access.

# KHUN WOODY'S COMPUTER

f you've been around the computer biz in Phuket for a while, then you have probably heard of Sipa, the Software Industry Promotion Agency.

No doubt you also know that Sipa's primary job revolves around turning Phuket into an IT hub for Southeast Asia; that Sipa regulates most of the computer business on the island; that Sipa is in charge of improving the speed of Internet service in Phuket; that Sipa controls visas and work permits for foreign computer workers; and that Sipa has been granted sweeping authority to ensure that Phuket catches up with Singapore and other computer powerhouses in the next two or three years.

At least, that's what I thought I knew about Sipa. It turns out that the reality is somewhat different.

#### WRONG!

Dr Rattana Wetprasit, Sipa Phuket's Branch Manager, recently gave a presentation to the Rotary Club of Patong Beach about Sipa's organization, mission and projects. I had a chance to attend that presentation and talk with Dr Rattana afterwards. Here's what I found.

For starters, almost everything that I thought I knew about Sipa is wrong.

Sipa is a government organization, neither more nor less powerful than any other – and is subject to the same kind of political buffeting that any government body in Thailand encounters.

Sipa, as its name indicates, is charged with improving the software business in Phuket. No, Phuket doesn't have very many companies that develop and sell

software, but Sipa is trying valiantly to change that.

At the same time, Sipa also promotes companies that use specialized software to create custom solutions, including groups that work with various Web tools and Internet "middleware" languages (such as Java/J2EE), and with animation software. Sipa's mission also encompasses education—building a pool of talented software people on Phuket with a wide array of software experience: programming, design, animation, service and the like.

If that sounds like a tall order, well, you haven't heard the half of it yet.

Sipa has been charged with developing an all-encompassing Web-based government portal. Dubbed One Stop Service, the idea is straightforward: create one website where any Phuket resident can go to interact with any branch of the government. That includes services as mundane as paying a phone bill. But it also includes complicated services, such as, oh, changing the *tabien baan* (house registration document).

I have worked on some big, tough projects in my day, but this One Stop Service takes the biscuit. It's huge.

Sipa has deep roots in the academic world – in fact, one of the major challenges facing Sipa in Phuket is halting the brain drain, in which recent, local computer science graduates move to Bangkok to get jobs. Bringing more software work to Phuket helps to keep local talent local. Everybody wins.

better, faster, and more reliable Internet access. Sipa is well aware of that fact, and has been working hard to make things better. But it does not have a magic bullet – or, more to the point, a bandwidth budget

So if Sipa cannot build us bigger data pipes, what can they do to help you and me? Quite a bit, it turns out.

First, if you have ever dreamed of putting together a 3D walk-through of a development project or an existing home, you must take a look at Dr Rattana's "Sipa Phuket 3D Animation Academy" CD, which includes walk-throughs of several Phuket buildings. Sipa's animation stu-

dents are capable of extraordinary work and this CD will knock your socks off, guaranteed – and many of the students who put it together are available to work on your project, right now.

Second, if you are applying for a work permit and you have a background in software, Sipa can help. There is a new program

least, having a certificate won't hurt.

The best news is that you can apply for an ICT Knowledge Worker's Certificate online, by simply going to www.sipa.or.th/knowledgeworker/apply.php

You will need a recent photograph, an address in Thailand, your passport information, details of your experience and education, and contact information for your employer in Thailand. The whole process should take less than five minutes.

Third, if you work in the computer industry, and you have ever thought of starting a business here in Phuket, Sipa can help

I know that many foreign techies on the island prefer to remain anonymous. Some even put up with paying exorbitant income taxes in their home countries. If you live in Thailand and make a living off the Internet, there are some big advantages to setting up a company here. # An interesting year ahead

he biggest story for the world economy and financial markets to appear so far in 2006 has been interest rate levels.

The US Federal Reserve will make a decision on interest rates at the end of January. This will be the last for current "Fed" Chairman Alan Greenspan, who is due to retire.

It is almost certain that interest rates will be raised from 4% to 4.5%. The Fed has already indicated that future moves will be "data-dependant". Until very recently they were simply increasing fates from an "accommodative" stance, but now that rates have reached somewhere approaching "neutral", the policy will naturally adjust. The Fed will monitor economic indicators to direct its interest rate policy.

Alan Greenspan has always avoided a fixed inflation rate target, and has instead relied on an assessment of overall economic activity.

His successor, Ben Bernanke, who takes office on February 1, appears to have a different approach - he seems to favor an inflation target of 1%-2%.

Mr Bernanke, however, will not enjoy the same level of influence with his fellow board members, at least initially. It is probably best to describe his situation as being "first among equals".

The next meeting to set interest rates, under Mr Bernanke's chairmanship, will be held in March.

It is likely that interest rates will again rise by 1/4%, if only to assure financial markets of the new Fed chief's inflation-fighting credentials. However, this will depend on inflationary pressures and overall economic growth.

What seems likely to happen, when realization finally appears that the interest rate tightening cycle has reached its peak, is a strong possibility of US dollar weakness. The attraction of the US dollar at present is the reality of rising interest rates, and when this changes to a flat or even negative outlook, speculation will tend to move money to other currencies.

The US current account deficit will, again, become the foremost issue.

The US corporate sector generally is showing

very healthy balance sheets – with a great deal of cash. Some of this money is virtually certain to fuel mergers and acquisitions (M&A), and this promises to be a very active year in the M&A arena.

Germany, and some of her neighbors, may be seeing the beginnings of an economic recovery. It is unlikely to be dramatic, but perhaps economic growth could reach 1.5%-2% during 2006. The European Central Bank (ECB) increased interest rates by a quarter of a percentage point in late 2005 from 2% to 2.5%, and futures markets reflect the belief that by mid-2006 rates will have risen to 2.75%. The ECB had been widely criticized for moving too quickly on the in-

The government has been forced to trim its estimates, much to the political embarrassment of Chancellor of the Exchequer Gordon Brown. He is also the expected successor to current Prime Minister Tony Blair, even though Mr Blair may not want to

move until 2008.

Slow economic growth in the UK weakens Mr Brown's political position. Despite his having being forced to reduce his assessment of UK economic growth, most economists feel that reality will produce a further official downgrade.

This may well force the Bank of England to reduce interest rates again to 4.25% from their current 4.5%, although this is not expected to happen until May.

Already current markets are reflecting a wariness about UK interest rates, and the Pound Sterling has been weaker against the US dollar, euro and yen. The biggest recent loser, however, has been the New Zealand dollar; in that country, despite interest rates of 7.25%, doubts are being cast about the general economic situ-

In Japan a rising economic outlook forecasts a change in strategy by the central bank, the Bank of Japan. There are currently differences of opinion between politicians and the central bank. It appears that the first move by the Bank of Japan will not be on interest rates but will be a gradual tightening of its present "quantitative easing"

policy. In other words, it will start to reduce the amount of liquidity available to the economy.

The Japanese government, no doubt in an attempt to appease the hawkish elements in the Bank of Japan, has already committed itself to reducing expenditure to its lowest level in eight years in 2006.

The politicians are terrified that any radical moves by the Bank of Japan could derail the current economic recovery.


The Japanese economy has spent almost 15 years in an economic hospital; it is unlikely to be running any marathons in 2006, but perhaps it can begin to jog by the end of this year.

The key to a healthy Japanese economy lies with the domestic sector, as it accounts for around 8.5% of overall economic activity.



# Runners raise money for damaged schools

PHUKET: Some 700 runners saw in the new year by taking part in the 10.5-kilometer "Andaman Mini Marathon" on December 31 to raise money for six tsunami damaged schools, three in Phuket and three in Phang Nga.

They were less than impressed at having been charged 20,000 baht by Tah Chat Chai School to pay for the chicken khao tom prepared by the school and fed to the runners. 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# **BLOWN AWAY**

ANDAMAN COAST: On December 26, Marco Reinard, from Luxembourg, headed off to see Thailand's Andaman Coast in a manner unlike others before him - he set off from near the Thai-Burmese border in Ranong and will windsurf some 600 kilometers to the Thai-Malaysian border in Satun Province.

His journey, which Marco expects will take about three weeks, is being made to highlight the plight of the villages along the Andaman coast that are still suffering from the tsunami.

"Although the devastation was most severe in the region north of Phuket, people along the entire western coast of Thailand were affected.

"This included many Thai and Sea Gypsy coastal fishing villages, in addition to the resort areas that received so much pub-

licity," he said.
"The survivors from the coastal fishing villages still need assistance, especially in the area north of Phuket. There were so

many of them that lost their homes, their boats and all their possessions, in addition to family members and neighbors.

'Many of the smaller relief organizations that are doing so much good, working in direct contact with the people, still depend on direct sources of funding. They have websites that regularly report their progress online and they give an accounting of their expenditure," he added.

Marco will put ashore at the end of each day, though he might land a little before sunset after his first day's adventure.

"The wind has been light and

dropped to nothing just as I found myself between two islands," he told the Gazette. "I folded my sail and started to paddle toward land. The current was running against me as soon as the sun started to

"I pointed toward a green light in the distance, which turned out to be a fisherman. I had no choice then to follow that only light in the distance, which I reached after about a four-hour

"I was happy to hold onto the side of his longtail boat. The friendly fisherman cooked me a nice meal and allowed me to spend the night," he said.

At the time of going to press Marco had reached Koh Kor Tao off Phang Nga Province, and he expected to pass the Phuket coast by January 4.





ow often do we over look the obvious? How many times have you gone shopping in Phuket City, or even to Bangkok for an essential purchase, then discovered that you could have found exactly what you wanted down the road? Maybe it's just me

I've even found myself deciding to take holidays outside my adopted home country of Thailand, and spending a week or two elsewhere. The result is that I'm always rather glad to be home. There are the odd frustrations here, but look at what we get in return. Sometimes that's overlooked.

I know I don't have much to say about anything serious, but I do feel that I, like many others, take a lot of what we enjoy here on Phuket for granted; we overlook things that new visitors gawp at.

Case in point: I was coming home fairly late from an evening of imbibing, and as I was walking up my driveway, I happened to look up into the sky before I turned on the light.

It was like a scene from a hackneyed '30s black-and-white film – the sort of thing they put up at the end of the film with the

words "The End" emblazoned across the middle, in case you weren't sure.

The coconut palm next door looked as it had never before. Before, I had walked past this particular tree daily without giving it a second thought. It was stunning. Even in my somewhat inebriated state, I went into the house and fetched my camera.

Given the limitations of my point-and-press camera, I had no idea how the pictures would come out, but come out they did. The photograph here isn't exactly the typical result of a lads' night out. The other, somewhat brighter picture is exactly the same tree

the following morning, after I'd sobered up.

Everyone reading this is presumably either a current or past visitor to Phuket, or is resident here now. Everywhere you go on the island, there is one common feature, something so common that sometimes we don't see it – the palm tree. If you were asked to name something which represents the island, this could well be it. Somehow, we seem to ignore them though – there are just so many.

There are certainly plenty of varieties – from the inevitable coconut palms which gracefully arch over our numerous beaches,



to the majestic Royal Palm, which prevails alongside the roads of Phuket.

The coconut palm shouldn't be thought of as just another beach bum, though. These things will grow wherever you tell them to on this island. If you find a coconut lying around that has a green shoot poking out of it, stick it in the ground with the shoot pointing up, water it and wait a few weeks. A coconut tree will rise up before your eyes. That's it. Can gardening get any easier than that?

The Royal Palm is also one of the easier palms to grow, either in the ground or in pots. If you do decide on the potted version, make sure that it's the biggest pot you can possibly find. I once had a palm that I had to repot three times, due to the number of pots that were destroyed by the tree, bursting the pot from the inside.

The last pot was so big it had to be ordered from Bangkok, and took three people to put it in

place. Several strong lads were required to lift the tree itself from its shattered former home, into its new spot. It actually took a crane to transfer it to its final home, as I gave up on the pot idea and went for terra firma. It's still there to this day.


There are dozens of other palm species that thrive here. A favorite with the older generation of Thais is the betel nut palm, the fruit of which has a mildly narcotic effect. If you've ever seen an older Thai lady with a huge, red-toothed grin, this could well be the reason. Nowadays, betelnut chewing isn't as popular as it used to be, but the tree is still often planted because it grows so quickly.

Many owners of larger gardens favor the oil palm, which is grown commercially in huge plantations for the oil that comes from its fruit. This tree is massive, and not exactly the ideal candidate for the average balcony. A more suitable addition to a small terrace or similar spot would be the Golden Cane Palm.

This is the one that is usually seen in pots, two to three meters tall, multi-tufted in appearance with yellow-green leaves. It's an ideal big tree for a less-than-motivated gardener, as it's very forgiving and requires little work, just a little water every now and then.

Palms are pretty obvious on the island, but we do seem to overlook them.

They're not the most difficult things in the world to cultivate – let's just hope that not everyone needs to be in a drunken haze to appreciate them.
