PHUKET: Rain over the past few weeks has boosted the volume of water in the Bang Wad reservoir to 5.5 million cubic meters, which is enough to meet expected demand until the end of May, water officials believe.

Isara Anukul, Chief of the Water Allocation Division of the Phuket Irrigation Office (PIO), noted, "Normally the rainy season arrives at the beginning of May. I think the rain will arrive in time to meet demand after that date."

In the meantime, the Phuket Office of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (ODPM) has drawn up a plan to locate areas that can be used to collect smaller pockets of water in line with HM the King's *Gaem Ling* (Monkey's Cheek) Project, which calls for the building of small reservoirs and ponds to store water and allow for controlled drainage.

Meanwhile Sayan Wareearoonroj, Manager of the Phuket Provincial Water Supply (PPWS), told the *Gazette* that there is still a problem supplying enough water to Patong.

"Our job is to distribute water. But demand is currently

Property sales taxes topped B1bn in 2005

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Land Office (PPLO) collected 1.1 billion baht in property taxes and fees in 2005.

The tax gathered has soared recently, thanks to booming land prices and sales of homes in property developments. By comparison, PPLO statistics show that the province collected 370 million baht from land and property sales in 2003, and 932 million baht in 2004.

PPLO Chief Suphot Suwannachote told the *Gazette* that Phuket land prices continue to

increase, especially in places that command a sea view in newer development areas such as Pa Khlok and Layan.

He added that 70% of the tax collected came from sales of land and houses in property developments, and 30% from sales of land alone.





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Limo and BMW crash kills one, injures two

KATHU: An airport limousine driver was killed and two Australian tourists were injured when their limousine was in collision with a BMW car on Phra Phuket Kaew Rd on January 5.

Pol Lt Col Passakorn Sontikul of Tung Thong Police Station told the Gazette that driver Surachai Temchuen, 42, died, and the two Australians, Edward Shrink and Rosemary Perkins, both 19, were taken to Bangkok Hospital Phuket after the limousine was in collision with a BMW driven by Ruepob Upatising, 30.

"Ruepob has been charged with careless driving causing injury or death, carrying a penalty of up to 10 years in jail or a fine of up to 20,000 baht, or both," Col Passakorn said.

Thalang man stabbed to death

THALANG: A young Thai man was stabbed to death in the early morning of January 2 in Thalang District.

The police received a phone call at around 1 am from a local citizen saying that a man had been stabbed in front of a shophouse on Baan Li Porn, Tambon Srisoonthorn. Loy Buathong, 26, a resident of the area, was found stabbed once in the chest and with multiple contusions on other parts of his body.

Pol Capt Prakorp Boonkwan, of Thalang District, told the Gazette that eyewitnesses reported the victim had been sitting alone on the sidewalk when a gang of between six and eight teenage men on motorbikes approached him. The victim tried to run away, but one of the men pulled out a knife and stabbed

MEA CULPA, SAYS HIGHWAYS CHIEF

PHUKET: Phuket Provincial Highways Office (PPHO) Chief Thanit Sakiya has accepted responsibility for not delivering on a promise he made to Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura to have the surface of the bypass road completed by last December 26.

On December 20, 2005, Governor Udomsak ordered the road surfacing work finished by the December 26 deadline so as to avoid inconveniencing visitors who were due to arrive for the tsunami memorial ceremonies on Phuket.

It didn't happen.

K. Thanit said, "If I had known on Dec 20 that the mobile stone grinder had had a problem on December 15, I would not have promised the Governor we'd finish the road on time."

He added that he accepted responsibility for not having all the information needed to carry out his promise.

Work to expand the road started on May 7, 2004 and was originally slated to finish by September 28 last year.

However, progress slowed when contractors were forced to wait 250 days for permission to use explosives for blasting work and the original contract had to be extended.

K. Thanyakit said, "In fact, based on what remains to be done at this stage, the entire project is not likely to be completed until the end of March this year."

Highways Department Engineer Boonyakiat Kongketyai blamed the slow progress on the contractor and on the condition of the machinery used.

He explained that the contractor, Chiang Rai Harn Charoen Enterprise Ltd, experienced delays because approval to buy spare parts and for repairs had to be obtained from the company's headquarters in Chiang Rai Province. Some of the equipment had deteriorated, and no longer functioned at optimum levels.

According to the contract, if the job is not completed on time, Chiang Rai Harn Charoen faces penalties of 33,390 baht for each day the project extends past the January 26 deadline.



Police crack Samui murder case

KOH SAMUI (The Nation, Phuket Gazette): DNA evidence and the suspicions of fellow fishermen helped in the swift arrest of two Thai fishermen who raped and murdered Welsh student Katherine

The body of the 21-year-old woman was found floating off Lamai Beach, Koh Samui, in the morning of January 2.

Forensic work established that she had been raped and then beaten to death.

The Central Investigation Bureau Deputy Commissioner, Pol Maj Gen Asavin Kwanmuang, said that investigators zeroed in on the two Thai fishermen, Wichai "Loh" Somkhaoyai, 24 and Bualoi Kosit, 23, after learning from their colleagues that they had suspiciously asked to go out to sea again without taking a break ashore like the other fish-

"Police later went aboard that boat and took 29 crewmen for questioning. Two of them confessed to the crime during interrogation," he said.

The two fishermen confessed that they had got drunk and had been watching a pornographic movie before swimming ashore to find a victim, Deputy Police Commissioner, Region 8, Pol Maj Gen Santhan Chayanon, said January 9, after the

two were arrested.

"They said they intended to find a woman to have sex with after watching the adult movie," Gen Santhan said.

A police officer who asked not to be named told the Gazette that the two were on board a fishing boat. "The captain was not on board, so they got drunk and watched a porno DVD, which got them sexually excited.

"They decided to find somebody to satisfy their lust and swam ashore where they saw Ms Horton strolling along the beach talking on her phone.

"Wichai tried to grab her, but she scratched his face, so he beat her unconscious with a beach umbrella, then raped her. After both finished raping her, they used the same umbrella to beat her to death. Then they dragged her back to the beach and threw her in the water."

The two returned to their fishing boat and then went out on a fishing trip on another boat the next day, Gen Santhan explained.

DNA in blood samples from the duo matched that found in semen recovered from Ms Horton's body, said Deputy Police Commissioner Pol Gen Preowpan Damapong.

Suwat eases Phi Phi ban on construction

PHI PHI ISLANDS: The government has finally allowed construction of tsunami relief homes on Koh Phi Phi Don, along with temporary structures so that locals may conduct business.

Phankam Kitithorakul, Chairman of the Ao Nang Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor), the local authority responsible for the Phi Phi Islands, told the Gazette, "[It is] lucky for us that I had the chance to meet with Deputy Prime Minister Suwat Liptapanlop before the [tsunami] memorial service at Phi Phi.

"I told him about the government ban on any construction and the problems it has caused for people here. He understood, and immediately gave permission for charities to build homes for tsunami victims, and for local people – with the correct paperwork – to erect temporary buildings [for business]," K. Phankam said.

He added that, on January 27, officers from the Organization for Specific Areas Administration for Sustainable Tourism Promotion (OSAASTP) will finally meet with local people on

Koh Phi Phi Don to sound out Ao Nang OrBorTor is perfectly public opinion on development plans that will shape the island's future in tourism.

The meeting is crucial to the island's recovery from the tsunami – all construction, including renovation work, was banned in the middle of 2005, pending approval by Cabinet of the OSA-ASTP's development plans.

K. Phankam said that the OSAASTP should be prepared for criticism of its proposal that Phi Phi be developed to target high-end tourists only.

"We don't want to see Phi Phi being designated a special area [for high-end tourists only], but if they want to change us to a Special Administration, just like Bangkok or Pattaya, then we'd be happy to be that," K. Phankam said.

He argued, however, that

capable of regulating the islands competently. "In fact, the Or-BorTor has managed the islands for a long time. [The government should] just give the OrBorTor the authority to manage [Phi Phi], and not persecute us by not approving budgets.

"Phi Phi could generate a lot of income for Thailand from tourism, and there's no need to cater to high-end tourists only, because I worry that high-end tourism will benefit just one group of people."

It has been rumored that the OSAASTP will propose that islanders move to homes in the hills for their own safety should another tsunami strike the island.

K. Phankam stoutly opposes this idea. "All we need is a good warning system, then everyone would survive [in the case of another tsunami]," he said.

Are nudists itching to invade Thailand?

o discuss the request to establish a nudist retreat in Phuket, Governor Udomsak called a meeting of about 20 senior provincial officials and one member of the press, Radio Thailand's Chaiwut Poungsuwan.

Most of those present had received a notice from the TAT, accompanied by copies of a letter, dated May 20, from Karsten Bech-Andersen, Marketing Director of Goldman & Partners, operator of the Costa Natura "naturist" resort on the Spanish Mediterranean coast.

According to Radio Thailand's K. Chaiwut, Mr Bech-Andersen's letter asked that the TAT help find an "appropriate" Thai investor willing to become Goldman's joint-venture partner locally, so that the latter could "expand its network of Family Naturist Resorts into Thailand".

POTENTIAL

Mr Bech-Andersen noted that his letter had been prompted by a meeting between James Bailey, owner of the Texas travel agent Castaways Travel, which specializes in "clothing optional" tourism, and the TAT Governor during an international travel industry gettogether.

Mr Bailey told Mr Bech-Andersen that the TAT had been studying the possibility of designating some beaches as nudist, and that those on the Andaman Sea held the greatest potential.

Castaways Travel's website states: "The reason Thailand is included in our website is that we believe social nudity and nudist beaches, if not resorts, will happen in the future. Nudity is not yet accepted in Thailand, although topless sunbathing is quite common... Finding a deserted stretch of beach to bask in the sun nude is possible, but you will have to hunt for the spots, since nudity is

not accepted in any public area whatsoever. Nudity is considered rude and thoughtless. Curiously, however, topless sunbathing is seen everywhere in most of the Thai beach destinations and vacation resorts, so it would seem the country is catching up... We

believe Thailand is at about the same developmental stage regarding nudity as Mexico..."

One paragraph repeats the information Bailey gave to Bech-Andersen: "It has been reported that the Thai Department of Tourism [sic] has even studied possible beach areas for nudist development, supposedly up near the Thai/ Burma border facing the Andaman sea to the west near Ranong."

Apparently thinking the time ripe, Bech-Andersen contacted TAT Governor Juthamas Siriwan, and she, evidently

laboring under some misapprehension, asked Gov Udomsak and others to look into the matter.

Bech-Andersen made the following points: his company wants to build a 25-bungalow "Naturist Country Club" with pool, bar and restaurant "serving

food catering to this type of tourist". Legal assurances would have to be forthcoming, both from a creditable lawyer and from officials in the area selected, that authorities would not harass people for going naked in their homes or swimming naked in the propriate services were not offered. Goldman & Partners would handle sales and marketing.

Noting that more than 200

nudist resorts operate in Europe, with many more in other countries, Bech-Andersen, a Dane,

said he expected that construction of the first resort in Thailand would signal a green light to others.

"He wrote that he was sure Thailand would become an important destination for this group of tourists," said K. Chaiwut. "He said an upcoming meeting of the 850-member International Naturist Federation to be hosted by Costa Natura would not be a bad time to let regional naturist federations know that Thailand had opened up."

The reaction to Bech-Andersen's proposal by the senior civil servants and big businessmen gathered

in the Governor's office that day was of barely concealed disdain, however.

"Perhaps at Pattaya in Chon Buri, or Koh Samui in Surat Thani, there are tourists who take off their tops. It's normal," said the Governor. "But never has anyone built accommodations or provided facilities for these tourists called "naturists" or "nudists". I'd like the people proposing this project to get me some information on what it's like in other countries where they've done this."

But more information might not affect his judgment, for in the very next breath the Governor added, "The policy of Thailand and of Phuket is to support the kind of tourism that promotes nature and morality, not the kind that damages our surroundings. This kind of thinking comes from one of those 'free' countries, with neither morality nor religion..."

Echoing the Governor's sentiment was a representative from Phuket's Culture Ministry office, who pointed out that Thailand is predominantly Buddhist and that Phuket also has a sizable Muslim population.

PRINCIPLES

"[Nudism] could lead to fighting," he said.

"I don't think there should be any such resorts or colonies in Phuket or Thailand."

"Thai culture promotes ethics and moral principles: if such businesses are allowed, young people might misunderstand and think that in Thailand they are free to do such things," he added.

He cited weekend newspaper editions, several of which feature scantily clad women on their front pages, as "contributing to the sex problem".

Local TAT office Deputy Director Siripakorn Chiaosamutr said his office was not bound to promote nude tourism, and Phuket Tourist Business Association representative Sarayuth Mullum averred that this kind of tourist "is absolutely inappropriate for Thailand".

Tourism, Sports and Recreation Center Director Phromchot Traiwet argued that nudity would have an ill effect on the nation's youth, and said he was worried that businesses near any proposed resort would also implement a "clothing optional" policy.

K. Phromchot summed up the general feeling when he said nudism is opposed to religion and morality.

If allowed a foothold, it might spread to the general population, he said.

"What that company is demanding amounts to a violation of human rights," he asserted later to K. Chaiwut.

"We should be promoting sea, sun and sand – with no fourth 's'!"



He might be right. Provincial authorities apparently think the issue turns on Buddhism. But Buddhist teachings do not have the force of law, even in Thailand, as an old monk at Wat Lati Wanaram in Chalong was quick to point out.

"The private parts must be covered except when bathing," said the 74-year-old former teacher. "That is central to Buddhist teachings. Even among married couples, some people don't disrobe before each other; in the old days, no one did.

"But Buddhism doesn't force anyone to do anything. It's up to you. Buddhism forbids eating of flesh and killing animals, but people still do it."

The success of European resorts such as Costa Natura suggests that the world's nudist mar-



ad those meeting with Gov Udomsak that day Lbothered to investigate, they would have discovered that the naturist movement is more puritanical than hedonistic. It originated in Germany during the last Kaiser's reign, and its center was Berlin, where "nackt-kultur" ("naked culture") groups flourished.

"They consisted largely of middle-class persons of rather strong nationalistic tendencies," observed Maurice Parmelee, author of *The New Gymnosophy* (1927) and Nudism in Modern Life (1952).

The movement's aims, which have scarcely changed over the last century, were a return to Greek standards of beauty, "air-bathing" for health, and acceptance of the human body in its natural condition "to weaken sex segregation and strengthen human solidarity", in Parmelee's

"Woe betide the man who has not exercised his will power enough to keep his mind above his waist-line and who has not grown in judgment and sanity so that he can concentrate on the beauty, form, healthiness and cleanliness, rather than upon his glandular sex enthusiasms," wrote Kenneth Connor on the subject during the 1930s.

Lewd behavior has always been regarded by nudists as undignified. The Costa Natura website carries no suggestive photos, nor indeed nudity of any sort, only mentioning that it is "a naturist holiday village" and that guests are "free from the constraints of clothing".

A photo caption for the facilities notes: "All principal paths are designed for wheelchairs" hardly the stuff of base desire and certainly not comparable to ads for most Patong entertainment spots, which are decidedly suggestive.

In discussing the nudist resort issue, it is notable that the provincial office consulted mainly its own people.

But how do tour operators feel? Would opening the Andaman coast to nudist resorts be good for business?

Holger Schwab, Managing

of Phuket's oldest dive companies, said he thought having a nudist resort might be good for tourism in general, but he did foresee problems in details of opera-

"This type of tourism needs support from the local community and Buddhism is not the right surrounding for it," he said.

As for nudist diving, Mr Schwab sees no potential: "If you stay [down] longer than 20 to 30 minutes without wetsuit protection you get cold," he said. So the possibility of organizing, say, underwater nudist weddings is probably nil.

River Rovers' Gordon Williams, while likewise wary of the cultural difficulties, is distinctly more upbeat: "As long as it doesn't offend anyone, it's okay," he observed. "There are many, many secluded beaches no one can get to unless by boat; and behind the beaches are mountains

Getting to the bottom of the problem

PRACHUAB KHIRI KHAN: From this peninsular province comes a cautionary tale about the perils of leaving bottles standing on the floor.

Nuy (not his real name) had just finished his ablutions when he slipped on the wet floor of his bathroom and plonked down firmly on his backside.

This is the kind of embarrassment many of us suffer from time to time, but in K. Nuy's case there was an added indignity.

At precisely the spot where he landed was a bottle of (ironically) stomach medicine. It did not break, but slid in its entirety into the poor fellow's back passage.

Unable to extract the bottle, and in considerable pain (the bottle measured 23 centimeters long by 7.5cm in diameter) he was taken by relatives to the main Prachuap Khiri Khan Hospital.

An X-ray confirmed that he did indeed have a large bottle-shaped object lodged in his large intestine, close to the main exit.

It required a surgical procedure under full anesthetic to extract the foreign object, but K. Nuy is now well on the way to recovery.

Plunge in Aids deaths in 2005

reater access to antiretroviral drugs slashed Thailand's Aids death toll in 2005 by two thirds, Disease Control Department (DCD) Director-General Dr Thawat Suntharacharn has reported.

Dr Thawat said the drop in both Aids sickness and deaths was attributed to government provision of anti-retroviral treatments, which was elevated to blanket coverage of the population and now covers 80,000 HIV-positive patients nationwide.

At the end of 2005, the number of deaths associated with HIV/Aids in the year was 1,640 compared with 5,020 reported in 2004, according to the official figures published on the DCD's website.

The number of HIV-positive people developing full-blown Aids was also down – 8,681 compared with 13,364 reported in 2004.

About 18,000 new HIV cases were reported over the past year. The Public Health Ministry aims to cut the number of new infections by 10% this year by providing 24 million condoms to high-risk groups and by expanding its program to prevent mother-to-child transmission, Public Health Minister Pinij Charusombat said.

Skid lids lifted: Grappling with a wave of crash helmet thefts, police in Khon Kaen's Muang District will start loaning helmets to motorcyclists instead of fining people for riding without one.

A motorcyclist arrested for the first time for not wearing a helmet will be loaned one but will have to return it to the police within a few days, said Pol Lt Col Kanit Duangdee.

He called on helmet thieves to stop, even though it was a petty crime.

Helmet snatchers are not career criminals, but mostly wayward teenagers who are easily tempted by attractive designs on helmets, or motorcyclists without helmets who fear being fined by traffic police, he explained.

Not finding Nemo: A recent effort by the Fisheries Department to re-stock Thailand's waters with 1,800 clown fish ended in failure, with just eight of the fish still alive after 24 hours.

Most of the clown fish, which were popularized by the animated film *Finding Nemo*, were eaten by other fish or fouled in sea anemone's tentacles, officers at the department's marinelife breeding center in Krabi said.

Thorn Thamrongnawasawadi, an adviser to the project, said, "Once being released into the sea, they don't know what to do, where to go, which of the other marine critters are their friends and which are the enemy."

Last month was the second time the department released clown fish into the sea in a bid to

increase the species' numbers. Of 4,000 released in 2004, just two survived. While the fish did once occur naturally in Thai waters, there are now none left because they've all been snagged for the aquarium trade, being sold for as little as five baht each.

Finn beaten: A Finnish man filed a complaint with police saying he was badly beaten by a group of at least five Thai clubgoers in Hua Hin, Prachuap Khiri Khan Province.

Dressed in blood-soaked clothes, Jyrki Boris Heiro Nonen told Tourist Police that he and his Thai girlfriend were attacked by the group in a karaoke bar at about 6 am.

Amornrat Bunthidsaksakul, owner of the karaoke venue, told police she had closed by the time the man said he was beaten. Pol Lt Col Rangsiman Vijitthamrongsak, chief of Hua Hin Tourist Police Station, ordered the karaoke bar temporarily shut down, believing it had stayed open late illegally.

Wicked world: Three babies were found abandoned in Thailand within three days. The first was a five-day-old boy found in a garbage container next to a hotel in Lampang Province. The boy had almost suffocated in the garbage bag in which he was found and required breathing apparatus after suffering from a lung infection.

The second was a 15-dayold girl found under a tree next to the wall of a house in Bangkok's Bang Na District. Wearing only a pink diaper and shorts, the newborn was covered in mosquito bites. The third was a four-monthold boy found by a roadside in Rayong Province. He was fine, except for some bruises and insect bites.

The boy had a good temper and smiled constantly, prompting Kamnan Jun of Tambon Nikom Pattana to adopt him.

Haves and have-nots: Poverty-eradication policies will not suc-

ceed if the government fails to collaborate with the people, said Gothom Arya, Chairman of the National Economic and Social Advisory Council.

Land reforms and tax measures are key to reducing the income gap between the wealthiest and the poorest, and giving charity-like aid is missing the point, he added.

"Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra shouldn't use his promise to eradicate poverty in Thailand within three years as propaganda any more.

"The statistics I have studied during the past 20 years reveal that the income gap between the wealthiest 20% of the population and that of the poorest 20% is a ratio of 13:1. The record has been constant and is the highest in Asean," K. Gothom said.

He said the government was not serious about the all-important issue of land reform, saying it had allocated public land to help a few of the poor, but had failed to curb major landlords who have encroached on public land.

Wild life: The Chiang Mai Night Safari welcomed nearly one million visitors in the first 47 days of its promotional free-entry period, Zoo Director Pisal Wasuwanich said.


Taking up the offer, which ends at the end of January, some 988,000 people visited the attraction between November 16 and January 1.

The one-millionth visitor and his family were given life-long free entry passes, said zoo public relations official Onjira Sasanasuk.

he much-fanfared widening of the southern part of Highway 4, also known as Petchkasem Rd, in Khao Lak center has claimed its first victims. The tragic and sadly predictable accident took place in the early morning hours of December 18.

The driver of a pickup truck, speeding at an estimated 120 to 150kmh, lost control of his vehicle and smashed into the front shovel of a huge earth-moving machine parked on the hard shoulder of the highway. The machine had no visible warning signs or parking lights switched on.

The pickup truck, driven by a Thai Bang Niang Beach resident, disintegrated on impact. Some 50 meters further on, the passenger cabin finally hit the road and shattered into pieces. The driver and a passenger died instantly. Another passenger was rushed to the Intensive Care Unit of Thai Muang Hospital in critical condition.

Just a few days before, a small girl was run over by a truck and badly injured while trying to cross the new four-lane highway.

While some locals and visitors praise the road widening as an improvement for Khao Lak, as now everything appears to be clean and organized, many residents find it hard to come to terms with what they see as a Formula 1 race track in the very heart of a tourist destination. And this is a destination that formerly marketed itself as a good example of what an environmentally sensitive community should look like.

The widened highway claims its first victims

No mercy: Talking about ecotourism – or the lack of it – there is another shock in store for Khao Lak lovers. The road-widening scheme will now continue along the previously picturesque part of Highway 4 that runs through the Khao Lak Lamru National Park. "National park or not – here we come!" seems to be the slogan of the enthusiastic road extension

team that happily continues to hack down trees all along the highway to make room for daredevils pushing the speed envelope with their unroadworthy trucks, motorbikes and buses.

Instead of enjoying a dense green tropical forest, drivers on this stretch of road can now enjoy the pleasures of dirt all over the place and the dubious thrill of having to master mud-greased curves in heavy rain.

Is there any good news? Yes, there is! Khao Lak now has four 7/11 shops. During the past

months, they've been popping up like mushrooms all over the place. One is located opposite Stempfer Café, one at its old pre-tsunami location on the Bang Niang Beach-Petchkasem intersection, one near the northern bus station and fresh market, and one at the PTT gas station at Khao Lak's northern end. Before the tsunami, there was only one 7/11 in this area. Many see the influx of the red-and-green-striped shops as a good sign, showing that big franchise companies are willing to invest in this area, yet some mourn the good old times, when Khao Lak had just one small minimart. But in the end tourism dollars only come at a price that we all have to pay.

Media Barbie meets Party Ken: December 26 was a rather controversial day for many who were directly or indirectly affected by the tsunami. The preparations for the proudly announced Khao Lak Tsunami Memorial event began in early November, starting with the laying of pavements all along the Bang Niang main and beach road.

It was evident that something major was about to happen, but nobody was prepared for what was to come next.

Extensive areas of Bang Niang Beach were cleared and later covered by gray gravel to become the parking, showcase, and event areas for the memorial.

Huge trucks carrying soil operated around the clock, covering the whole beach in a cloud of dust for weeks.

Electricians installed temporary street lighting – a rare sight in this part of the world.

In the past year, some Bang Niang residents have had to virtually beg at the electricity office in Takuapa for their muchneeded power meters to be installed, so they could begin their reconstruction efforts.

LIMELIGHT

But it was crystal clear that on Boxing Day truckloads of VIPs would hit the area, so that every one of them could have his Kodak moment in the limelight to be seen on TV worldwide.

I – along with many other tsunami survivors and victims – was sickened by the thought that December 26 should become a major media event instead of a quiet and peaceful ceremony without the hustle and bustle of VIP 'Media Barbie' and 'Party Ken' appearances.

Fortunately, there also were many Thai citizens who made statements to the media, saying they did not approve of the VIP frenzy and that the money spent on staging this spectacle should have better been used for ongoing tsunami relief efforts.

I totally agree with this, and will keep short what I want to say: the only meaningful part of that day was the release of some 5,000 hot-air lanterns into the night sky at around 8:30 pm on Bang Niang Beach — one for each beloved soul lost in Thailand on that terrible day.

It was a beautiful sight that helped many surviving family members to let go, at least for that one night.



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A room with no view

here once was a time when a swimmer in Patong could make his way out into the crystal-clear waters of the bay, lean back and just float – relaxing in calm and gentle tranquillity.

Trying to do such a thing nowadays would be tantamount to a suicide bid. Even if you are not ripped in two by the propeller of a parasail boat, the constant whine of jet skis – and the very real possibility of being hit by one – makes a swim in Patong Bay a source of stress, not relaxation.

But there is one place in Patong where you can float to your heart's content, enjoying benefits that include stress reduction, relief from fatigue and chronic pain.

BUOYANCY

That place is Floathaven, located on the southern end of Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd.

Floathaven has the only "float chamber" of its kind in Thailand. Bought in England and imported for a cost of 1.5 million baht, the float chamber went into operation in Patong at the beginning of December 2004, just a few weeks before the tsunami.

Director Dr Jimmy Stewart, from Scotland, told the Gazette that his chamber differs from traditional "float tanks" because it is larger, therefore eliminating the feeling of claustrophobia that puts many people off the idea of float-

Buoyancy isn't a problem. The 12"-15" deep water in the chamber contains so much epsom salt – about two-thirds of a

ton – that it is as buoyant as the Dead Sea. With such a high salt content, the water is naturally about 98% sterile. Even so, the solution is circulated by a pump through a filter system every 15 minutes, making it 100% hygienic, Dr Stewart said.

One big believer in the benefits of floating is Worida "Da" Nakha, a masseuse and hairdresser at Floathaven – and also a tsunami survivor. The 44-yearold was working in an underground area near the pool of the Cabana Hotel on Phi Phi Island when the waves hit.

She was trapped in the darkness for about three hours, having to twist her head upwards to gasp for breath from an air pocket between the water's surface and the ceiling – until some people managed to rescue her by prying open an extractor fan vent and pulling her to safety.

K. Da spent the rest of the night up in the hills with other survivors. Only one other girl of the six working in the room at the time is known to have survived.

"I thought I was going to die for sure. I think God helped me," she said.

The float room has helped her, too, Da says. It cured her post-traumatic stress disorder, and also put an end to other chronic pain she had been suffering, increasing her flexibility.

Dr Stewart said that the float room is really a sensory deprivation chamber that allows one to divorce oneself from the rest of the world: going internal and ignoring the external. This is a key to helping people to learn to meditate, he said.

"Meditation is putting yourself in a state of nothingness. The

tank does that for you because it's totally silent, there are no lights, and the water is maintained at body temperature. During a float, for the first time, the central nervous system finds it doesn't need to work [so hard]," he said. "It takes some people 10 to 20 years to learn how to meditate. With the float room, I can have you meditating after three one-hour sessions.'

"Once you get over your fears, it's the ultimate relaxation. For pain relief, it's almost like being on opiates, because your body releases copious amounts of endorphins, which are the body's natural painkillers," he said.

After hearing all this, and browsing through a book of testimonials that included a column entitled: I Found God in a Water Closet, I was more than ready to experience my first float.

After a quick shower, I entered the chamber and slowly laid back on my warm, briny support. For the first 10 minutes there is soft Asian-ambient music piped in, which you can still hear through the earplugs they give you to wear. The only other sensory stimulus is dull light that seeps in from around the doorway.

There is a light switch in the chamber you can turn on or off at will. Because of that, and the fact that I could open the door any time I wanted, I didn't feel any claustrophobia whatsoever.

For the first part of the float I was just trying to enjoy the experience. With the water still and at body temperature it is difficult to sense where the water line is on your body. Were my hands above the surface or below?

I slowly clenched and unclenched them to feel the movement of the water. After I realized that it didn't really matter where my hands were, I just relaxed and let my mind wander. What really constitutes sensation: is pleasure just the absence of pain, or is it something more? A float chamber is the perfect distraction-free environment in which to ponder such questions.

After a while, the imagination begins to take over. First I thought of myself as my own lobotomized clone, hanging in suspended animation like a scene from the movie Coma. Then I imagined I was one of the massive stone blocks used to build the Egyptian pyramids, being slowly floated down the Nile on a barge.

As part of my musing I considered all the touts, insane driving and other Patong chaos from which I was now gratefully removed.

After an hour that seemed like about 20 minutes, the music came back on. That was the signal to get out, take a nice long shower to remove all the salt, and prepare for re-entry into the world of sensory stimulation.

At 1,000 baht an hour, I don't know if I could afford to become a regular floater. I may have to continue taking my chances at Karon Beach. But if money were no object, I would get a float chamber installed in my home tomorrow.

few expatriates currently in Phuket suffered from exposure to

war or natural disasters during their childhoods.

But that did not stop some from caring about children in

other, less fortunate countries. One of these is Arabella

Churchill, who founded Children's World, based in

Glastonbury, England, in 1981. Its remit – to provide fun, educational, creative and social benefits for local children,

particularly those with special needs or who are socially

disadvantaged – is as straightforward now as it was then.

Some 18 years later, Arabella, who is the granddaughter of

Sir Winston Churchill, Britain's Prime Minister during World

he school playground in Phuket City is awash with colors; children are spinning plates, juggling beanbags, performing with long ribbons of vivid hues. And not one of them has ever done any of this before.

A beaming Phanthip Dejarern, 10, says, "I will put on a show for my family when I go back home today; I'm very excited that these people came all the way to Thailand to teach us things and to show us how to re-

The kids also play parachute football. For those unfamiliar with the concept, this is more straightforward than one might think.

Take one real parachute the brighter the better – and gather 100 or so children to hold the edge of the 'chute. Roughly divide the children along the diameter of the 'chute into two teams, and throw a football into the center.

Teamwork – and a little practice – will have the teams scoring goals by forcing the ball to roll past the opposing sides' players.

SLAPSTICK

It is very noisy. It is very lively. It looks like a lot of fun. The hundred-or so pupils taking part are being watched by hundreds more craning their necks out of the school's windows.

The show that follows is pure slapstick with juggling and routines that look simple, but are not. The schoolchildren – with an hour's or so practice – are an integral part of the performance.


Plate spinning, although relatively easy to explain as merely a demonstration of gyroscopic inertia, is a test of the nerve and skills of the 10 children who must pass a revolving platter from one stick to another down the line. Hats off to them; they do it.

Hats on, however, for one of juggling routines from Haggis. Aided and abetted – or perhaps

hindered – by Jake, his sidekick, and performing to the strains of Frank Sinatra's I Get a Kick Out Of You, Haggis has the children alternately silently transfixed and roaring with delight.

It's visual, physical humor. Jo, in thick glasses, does a turn with a strangely mobile suitcase that sprouts legs and wan-

ders off when her back is turned. The audience is spellbound.

This is just one of dozens of shows put on recently by Children's World International (CWI), an offshoot of Children's World (CW), which is headed by Arabella Churchill.

CW focuses on the area around Arabella's home in Glastonbury, concentrating on integration and inclusion work, to enable normal children to interact fully and happily with those who have special needs, while, of course, having fun at the same time.

This, it is believed, will help the normal children to grow up with less fear of – and less prejudice against – what is generally termed "disability".

CWI is different. It exists to make children – and in turn, their parents – smile again.

Arabella explains, "CWI all started when we saw the awful images from Kosovo [in 1999], of people fleeing over the mountains to Albania. We decided that once the conflict was over, then Children's World would go over there. But because our geographical remit restricts us to southwest England, we formed a sister organization, CWI."

The Kosovo-Albania tour in October 1999 saw some 5,000 children taking part in activities as diverse as circus skills, facepainting and badge-making workshops.

She points out that CWI is not what is termed a "first response" organization. "We don't go in to bring immediate, life-saving aid to people. We'd simply get in the way of the relief teams.

"Although fun and creative play may sound frivolous," she says, "we believe that they are powerful tools in recreating confidence and inspiring hope for the future, and we hope that our work provides benefits to the children."

The next sortie for CWI was to Northern Ireland in 2004, working with children with special and social needs from both the Catholic and Protestant communities that had been split by years of sectarian violence.

"We don't have a lot of money, so CWI can only do things when Children's World has had a successful year," Arabella explains.

War II, created Children's World International (CWI), and set about taking creative and educational performances to children in Kosovo, who had suffered during the civil war in the former Yugoslavia. Arabella is now in Thailand with CWI and her mission – to bring smiles to children's faces – is as simple as ever. She spoke to the *Gazette*'s **Andy Johnstone**.

> When the tsunami came, she says, "We thought, 'Well, we've got to go.' Simple as that."

> "It's very difficult to set up a tour overseas when you don't know where precisely to go, who you need to talk with to arrange things, or even the cost of living. It makes it hard to budget," she

> She was eventually put in contact with Mohan Samarasinhe, a Sri Lankan who lives in London, who suggested that CWI's queries could best be answered by visiting his country.

> "So Devilstick Peat -CWI's main performer/workshop leader – and I went out to Sri Lanka for a mini-tour and reconnaissance and contact-making tour in March 2005.

MORALE

"It was a completely disorganized tour," she laughs. "We'd roll up to a camp in a tuk-tuk and say, 'Hello, can we do a show now?' Sometimes it was Qur'an reading time or children's homework time, but we did shows at around half the places we went to."

Arabella describes the conditions in many of the camps they visited, barely three months after the tsunami, as "pretty crappy, with people in limbo".

"They weren't too bothered about it then," continues Arabella, "because they were expecting to be helped fairly soon. But when we were there in late December, very few of them had been permanently housed. Morale is, in some ways, worse now than it was [in March], because people now know what it will take to be housed.

"Why do we do it?," asks Arabella. "Workshops, fun and games is not 'the big stuff' like building houses or boats, or rebuilding livelihoods, but it really can help in raising morale in the camps and elsewhere, which is most desperately needed."

CWI returned to Sri Lanka in May and then again in the last two months of the year.

Linda Cruse, Field Director for the Prince of Wales International Business Leaders' Forum, an agency that has set up and run a number of projects and initia-

tives in Phuket and Phang Nga, also saw the therapeutic benefit of entertaining children, and invited a magician to perform for them. This led to Linda contacting CWI, which added Phuket, Phang Nga and Phi Phi Island to its itinerary.

Arriving in mid-December, Arabella and CWI set about planning with Somchai – Linda's right-hand man in Phuket – just where they should go. Sea Gypsy villages, Childwatch Phuket, the Asia Child Foundation and Wat

Kamala School are just a few of the places that have already enjoyed the antics of CWI.

On the mainland, children from Baan Nam Khem, Bang Niang, Laem Ken and Bang Sak, Tap Tawan and the Burmese refugee camps near the Burmese border will also be visited.

According to Haggis Mc Leod, juggler extraordinaire and Arabella's husband, the workshops and games before the show are "well-organized chaos".

CWI relies on sponsors, both individual and corporate, to allow it to bring joy into children's lives.

"Parents have thanked us for making their children smile," says Arabella. "Some have even said that they didn't believe their children would smile again, and of course, cheering up the children cheers up the parents.

"Perhaps, in the long term, CWI's work doesn't mean anything, but I suppose it's therapeutic with a small 't'."

Therapeutic, and priceless.

Dig out the ears

STEPHEN FEIN waxes lyrical about what he discovers is a 'fairly invasive procedure'

ew people in Phuket know the origins of the red-and-white striped barber's pole that is so ubiquitous, not only on our island but also around the world.

In ancient times, barbers did far more than give crew-cuts and trim beards. They also performed a wide range of surgical procedures: dental extractions, enemas, dressing wounds, blood-letting with leeches – you name it.

Early physicians hated to perform surgery, so back in those days, a customer might greet his barber with: "Just a little off the top and sides – and please remove my appendix while you're at it."

The barber pole was originally associated with the leech-assisted blood-letting service. The pole had a brass basin at the top representing the vessel in which leeches were kept – and which also received the blood.

According to Wikipedia, the Internet encyclopedia, the pole represented the staff which the patient gripped during the operation – anesthesiology back then not being what it is today. The red and white stripes portrayed the bandages – red for blood-stained ones and white for the clean ones. Being hung out to dry on the pole after washing, they would often blow and twist together, forming a spiral pattern. This gave rise to the barber's pole painted in red and white stripes we know today.

In the West, surgery is now unknown at barber shops. So it's nice to know that here in Phuket

where is at least one fairly invasive procedure you can still get done there – ear cleaning.

I used to sit in fascination every time I waited for my turn at my local barber shop, watching the steady-handed barbers carefully insert a variety of long, metal objects into the customers' ears.

Looking like damaged Borg drones from *Star Trek* undergoing repair, the customers would just lie back and relax as if they were enjoying themselves. Was I missing out on something fun?

For years I was torn between curiosity and fear, but recently I decided to forget my mom's old warning of "never put anything smaller than your elbows in your ears", and get my hearing equipment professionally cleaned, Thai style.

After my customary beard trim and shave at the Phuen Chai Barber Shop in Samkong, I asked my regular barber Atjima "Att" Wongwanich for the shop's 30-baht *khae hoo* "dig out the ears" service.

As I lay back with a damp towel covering my eyes, she began, explaining what she was doing as she worked.

After soaking all the instruments with alcohol, she carefully began the first step of inserting a metal curette into my ear and using its tiny metal scoop to assess just how dirty it was in there. This produces a pleasant, though somewhat unnerving, sensation – after all, what if she slips and this thing punctures my brain?

Next, a small, flat-bladed instrument is used to scrape inside the ears, and any loosened material is then removed with a very long, thin pair of metal tweezers

After that it's time for swabbing. A do-it-yourself cotton swab is made by wrapping some cotton along a long, thin, threaded curette. This is soaked in a very weak hydrogen peroxide solution and is then inserted into the ear.

SENSATION

It's a weird, cool sensation. You can actually hear the hydrogen peroxide bubbling away, as if you have Rice Krispies soaking in milk inside your head.

After about a minute, the hydrogen peroxide is removed using another homemade cotton swab, this time a dry one. When I looked at these afterwards, I was astonished just how "dirty" my ears had been.

After this, K. Att took what is known as an ear pick, which

she inserted into my ear and began twisting it about. The soft fluffy end of the ear pick, which has a long bamboo handle, feels nice spinning about inside the ear – although I would hate to experience the pain it would cause if pressed in too deeply.

She then took the end of the ear pick and heated it by pressing it against the hot bulb of a high-intensity lamp to make it more brittle, and reinserted it. By quickly twisting the long metal tweezers with her other hand, she caused them to vibrate before placing them against the the bamboo handle. The resulting sound resonated up the bamboo and into my ears as a series of loud "click-click-click-clicks" that are hard to describe, but really do make you feel like a Borg drone.

As K. Att was doing this, my eyes were still covered and I had absolutely no idea what was producing this bizarre metallic clicking – or what its purpose was. It was only afterwards that she described the procedure step-by-step, explaining that this was to "clear out" the ears, not of debris, but of constrictions within.

The ear cleaning ends with a pleasant ear massage, similar to the one that forms part of a standard traditional Thai massage. And then whole procedure is repeated on the other side.

I am not sure what the real benefits of this kind of ear cleaning really are, or if I will ever do it again. I didn't notice any improvement in my hearing, and my ears were a little sore the next day

Doctors frown on this type of thing too, saying it's dangerous to put anything inside your ear – even a Q-tip. Also, much of the material removed is ear wax, which is there for a purpose: it protects your ears from invasion by bacteria, fungi and other nasty things you don't want taking up residence inside your head.

But for people with hearing loss caused by an excess of ear wax (technically known as cerumen), the ear-cleaning procedure as performed by the sure-handed K. Att for just 30 baht might be the solution they are looking for.

Of course the other option would be to leave medical problems in the hands of modern medicine and look for a barber's pole only when you need a haircut or a shave.

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Ford Focus a runaway success worldwide


he Ford Focus has been around for a few years, but has had a face lift for 2006. As one of the most successful, truly global cars to emanate from the Blue Oval, there is clearly no need yet to replace the Focus with an allnew model.

Introduced at the annual Geneva motor show in 1998, the Focus was named European Car of the Year in 1999, the same year it made its debut in North America. It was named North



American Car of the Year in 2000

While the road car needs little in the way of change, Ford's



2006 World Rally Championship (WRC) contender is a significant step forward. Developed in the north of England by team boss Malcolm Wilson and chief designer, Christian Loriaux, the new Focus WRC was given a shakedown on the final event last year in Australia. Both Wilson and Loriaux came away baffled: nothing broke!

Not only did the '06 Focus finish, one of the cars came home in sixth place overall, in the hands of Czech driver Roman Kresta. The second Focus, that of Tony Gardemeister, became the first 2006 WRC car to crash, when the Finn wound up in the trees on one of the early stages of the rally. Despite some damage the Focus continued, only to retire on the penultimate stage with a water pump belt failure.

What was all the more remarkable was that neither Kresta nor Gardemeister had been responsible for any of the initial

mileage on the cars – that had been left to Wilson himself and British rally driver Mark Higgins.

After the Australian event, Wilson said: "It's been a fantastic weekend. We came here to test, and the most important target was to last the full distance with the car so we could learn as much as possible. Toni's car stopped before the end, but the fact that we scored two fastest times [in our class] is remarkable for a car which has been designed and built in such a short period of time. A great effort from the whole team – and we've shown the potential of the car for the future."

Ford is one of only two manufacturers in the running for the 2006 title, which begins in Monte Carlo. Mitsubishi, Skoda, Citroën and Peugeot have all pulled out, leaving just Ford and Subaru to fight it out.

With Ford's early introduction of its WRC car, the company

Meanwhile, at the 22nd International Motor Expo in Bangkok in November, Ford introduced its latest five-door Focus, to complement the already highly successful four-door model.

"Innovation will lead Ford into the 21st century," said John Fink, Ford Thailand's Executive Vice-President. "This is just another Ford innovation reinforcing our commitment to Thailand, the region and our customers."

Priced at 959,000 baht, the five-door Focus Sport with a two-liter motor produces a healthy 143bhp (105kW), while a 1.8-liter Trend model, delivering a more modest 123bhp (90kW), sells for a realistic 769,000 baht.

Both cars come with what Ford describes as "class-leading comfort and safety features", while the Sport version runs on 16-inch alloy wheels and is equipped with side skirts.

The Focus will doubtless continue to be a runaway success worldwide and, indeed, Ford Executive Vice President Mark Fields said recently, at the Los Angeles Auto Show, that "... small is big in America. Small cars are ripe for bold design and innovation."

Expect to see much more of the Focus, whether on the streets of Thailand or on international forest tracks as it mops up the World Rally Championship this year.

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COOL KINABALU

TALES OF A TRAVELER

ota Kinabalu goes under a number of names. It was officially called Jesselton until 1963, but the inhabitants knew it as "Api Api" (fire, fire) as the town was razed to the ground in World War II.

Its current name comes from the 4,100-meter-high Mount Kinabalu, which was itself called after a Chinese (Kina) prince who left his local wife here promising to return, but failed to do so and she was consequently left a balu, or widow.

History apart, nowadays most people speak of "KK", except for some superior peninsular Malaysians who refer to it as the capital of "The Wild East".

WILD

Sabah is pretty wild, and – forest fires notwithstanding – that's the beauty of it. And for anyone not up to clambering to the top of the tallest mountain in Southeast Asia (unless one counts Burma's Hkakabo Razi at 5,881m) or braving the rigors of a longhouse jungle trek, Tunku Abdul Rahman National Park sits 15 minutes offshore covering nearly 50 square kilometers of islands and sea.

Each of the islands has something a little different to offer, although they are all good for a bit of beaching it, snorkeling and sloughing off the exigencies and encrustations of city dwelling.

First up is Pulau Manukan, the most developed of the quintet of islands nudging into the South China Sea, with chalets, squash and tennis courts and even a desalination plant and solarpowered telephones. Eco-friendly is not so much a buzzword here



as a sheer necessity. Manukan is shaped like a boomerang, and a number of pleasant forest trails – usually free of traffic as most visitors cluster by the shore – crisscross its almost 206,000 square meters.

Gaya is by far the largest island in the park, and is distinguished by a stilt village inhabited by Malaysians and Filipinos whose homes are officially outside the national park's boundaries. There are few walkways,

so the convenient way to sightsee here is to hire a boat which – if nothing else – is viewed as fine entertainment by the locals. Police Beach is the best on the island, and despite the proximity of the village, the reefs around the island are in good condition.

Pulau Sapi, or Cow Island, is better known for its troop of monkeys which use the beach for a spot of crab fishing as long as they are left undisturbed. However, as this is the most visited of

all the islands in the park, they tend to appear only at dusk and dawn, when nobody else is around.

Furthest away from KK and relatively undeveloped, Pulau Sulug sees the fewest arrivals, and as such is labeled as a haven for castaways. The shoreline is mostly rocky but the reef is really spectacular off its southern tip, with brilliant blue sea urchins contrasting with coral of many hues that grows in fantastic shapes.

Mamutik, despite its rich marine life, is probably the island to visit last, as it is the smallest and tends to fill up with hordes of KK-ites at weekends and on public holidays; or indeed during the week if the lure of the office palls. Still, it's ringed by good beaches and if there are not too many other people around it is truly idyllic.

But that can be said of just about anywhere in Tunku Abdul Rahman.



I seemed like a miracle when I heard I would be able to study abroad. The thought that I would be able to do so had never crossed my mind. I chose this program because it will help me in my work back home in Thailand.

But I was also apprehensive, because my English is not excellent and the cost of living in Ireland is very high. For the first couple of weeks after I arrived I was a bit worried and confused, mainly because everything was completely new to me and so different from Thailand.

When I first attended class I found I was in a very large group of about 150 students. I was told then that I would have to write a 10,000-word thesis in English, using proper grammar, spelling and a formal writing style. I thought, "Oh God! Am I going to be able to do this?"

My teachers and classmates all speak very quickly, and with very strong Irish accents. It was not easy for me at first. But things are getting easier, now that I have made some friends, and all my teachers are so nice.

I have also done several months' work experience at St Joseph's Childcare Centre in the town. It was a great place to practice because they are very organized and the staff are professional.


The children there are so lovely, but it was tiring working with them – I had to have so much energy.

However, it was a good chance to get to know European children. They were more active, and they have learned to express their feelings more than Thai kids, who are more quiet.

But I think the needs of the children are the same all over, whatever their culture, language or color of skin. They all need love and understanding from older people.

The college is quite big, with three campuses. I'm studying in College Street, about 30 minutes'

walk from the main campus, but the Institute runs a bus service for the students. College Street is old – it used to be a church – while the main campus and the other buildings are modern.

The house where I am staying is called Roncalley. I am on the ground floor with Jom, another Thai girl. We are the first Thais to study here. The first

floor is for architecture students. They are all boys. Close to my room is a nice lady from Slovakia.

I usually cook Thai food at home, mostly omelettes, fried vegetables and noodles. Sometimes I make Thai curry, but the taste is not the same here as in Thailand.

I did have the chance to work in a Thai restaurant for a

month, though, and I took it. I was able to eat delicious Thai food free of charge. But I had to wear traditional Thai dress! It was so funny, because when I was in Thailand I never wore such clothes.

I earned about 35 euros (1,700 baht) per night, working for five or six hours. I am allowed to work 20 hours a week during term-time, and 40 hours a week in the holidays.

Waterford is a bit quiet, but I love it here because it doesn't have lots of cars or so many people [as in Thailand]. But I don't enjoy eating here; the food isn't tasty, is not at all spicy and is very expensive.

To give a couple of examples, for what I pay for a bottle of water here I can buy six bottles

in Thailand. And a sandwich costs between two and four euros – between 100 and 200 baht! Irish food that I can eat includes sausage, potato and chicken wings. It is cheap, and it does not taste that bad.

I like it here, and there are several reasons why, the main one being that they are very serious about the environment and controlling the amount of garbage. I am not surprised this country is so clean. If I go shopping, I need to take my own shopping bag – they don't give out plastic bags.

Another reason I like it is that the traffic laws here are very strict. I have never seen a car go though a red light, and they always stop for people who need to cross the road.

All of the Irish people I have met have been so nice and kind to me, and they genuinely care about people from other countries.

DARK SIDE


However, all countries have a brilliant side and a dark side. People here like to smoke and drink – including the students. Lots of my friends at college smoke, and it is normal to see teenagers with cigarettes in their hands. I have also found many young mothers here, some of them students...


Everything here was completely new to me at the beginning. If I got lost, for example, I couldn't take a motorbike taxi because they don't exist. And the weather is very cold and wet. Umbrellas don't work here because it's very windy.

Now it is winter it is not a good idea to walk from home to college, what with the rain, cold and dark, so I prefer to pay 1.25 euros (60 baht) for the bus.

I will probably return to Thailand in June after I finish my studies, but I might stay here for three months longer so I can travel, be a volunteer or earn more money.

I'm happy to be here, although I am sometimes sad because everything is so different from Thailand. I miss the food, my motorbike, my old friends and the children from Life Home Project. But opportunities like this do not happen often. I am proud and happy to have been given the chance to study here. It is brilliant.

In fact, very large letters are just what are needed for the rear main entrance to Crowne Plaza. From the beach road, it's a doddle to find the hotel, especially at night when the tiki lights of the restaurants that overlook the beach attract one like moths to, well a flame

But round the back it's a different story. It took me three goes – once from the left, once from the right and once straight ahead – before I could find the way in.

However, once safely in the hotel, it's another story. It's a big place – big enough to need a tuktuk to get around. However, the Crowne Plaza has wisely opted for the traditional three-wheeled tuk-tuk, similar to the Piaggio Ape model, once so popular with Neapolitans. It is, to say the least, quite nippy. But what's that? The chef approaching with a sword in his hand?

My first thought is that he wants a fight (Duel in the Crowne). I realize that I need my dress sword (Tool in the chef's - hell, I daren't say "weapon" - thingy has skewered meat on it (Drool in the Crowne). Idiot moi (Fool in the Crowne).

A veritable orgy of meat scoffing follows. Everything, from wee chickens' livers to slabs of rare Antipodean lamb, divine steak to splendid little pork sausages – and all expertly cooked. We become a little atavistic, slightly primal from here on.

The chefs – in true Brazilian churrascarian style – continue to deliver more and more meat. And it is simply too succulent, too aromatic and tender to resist.



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When 'Eat cheap' and 'Patong' is not a contradiction in terms

hen you think of Patong, you probably think beach, nightlife and good food. But when you want good food at a good price, you may need to think a little harder and walk a little farther.

After work, a friend and I went for a stroll along Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd and discovered a number of open-air seafood stalls in front of Andaman Beach Suite. Fresh fish, shrimp, squid and even lobster were all available, priced from 80 baht per dish and up.

We settled on a local dish called kanom jeam (Thai vermicelli) with gaeng (curry). We stopped at K. Ja's stall offering three curries: gaeng kathi (coconut milk curry), gaeng pa (minced fish curry) and gaeng sabnok.

The *gaeng sabnok* – a thin, tasty and not too spicy curry with fish balls and chicken - set me back just 25 baht.

My friend tried the *kanom* jeam and ho mok (steamed fish and curry) for 45 baht and found it nice and spicy. Both dishes were served with fresh vegetables - bean sprouts and cucumber – at no additional charge.

Although we were already nearly full, catching sight of K. Pranom's stall reawakened the taste buds. A variety of Thai salads (yum) was available: yum wunsen ruammit - seafood mixed with vermicelli for 40 baht; and yum hua moo - sliced pork with vermicelli - for 30 baht, among others.

We ordered yum neam klouk - a mix of fried rice with slightly fermented pork – for only 30 baht.

The price range at K. Pranom's stall is 30 baht to 50 baht, which we thought very reasonable. We did have to line up behind about three people before getting to our dishes, but it was worth it.

We ended our movable feast with dessert for just 10 baht per bowl. The dessert stall, run by K. Boy, serves up several popular Thai desserts, hot or cold, including Thai fruits and vegetables in a "soup" of soybean milk, Longan juice, or ginger ale.

I chose cold Tao Tueng (tofu in ginger ale) which is, believe it or not, absolutely delicious.

Other stalls offer other options, such as steamed rice with roasted pork or chicken on top, and a mango with sticky rice dessert, for just 25 baht to 30 baht a

en and Sail (Silkworm Books, Chiang Mai, 2005, 396pp) is a stupendous work of scholarship. Subtitled Literature and History in Early Bangkok, this collection of six seminal essays by Nidhi Eoseewong – considered by many to be Thailand's premier historian – focuses on the social, cultural and economic history of the early Bangkok years.

They were written between 1979 and 1982 and finally have been translated into English by 10 scholars into nearly 400 pages of dense type

K. Nidhi jokes in his preface that if his book were written today it would be no longer than 50 pages. This is because, 30 years ago, he was going against the grain of historiography: the Prince Damrong school (influenced by Thomas Carlyle's "Great Man" theory) in which Thai history read like the biblical *Book of Kings*. K. Nidhi's approach was different, as he writes in his preface:

"Nowadays, the idea that there were major changes in many aspects of Thai society in early Bangkok; that understanding the changes which arise in Thai society (or any society) re-

quires attention to the internal factors in that society more than seeing those changes as only responses to external forces; that literature can be used as one kind of historical source material; and that, conversely, historical change has more effect on literary creativity than was once understood in Thai society – all these ideas have become commonplace things which students of Thai history can accept. But whether they agree with them or not is another matter."

Bourgeois Culture and Early Bangkok Literature is the lead-off essay of the six in the book, the longest (152 pages), the last written and a masterful culmination of themes introduced in earlier essays.

His main theme is that early Bangkok, far from being a continuation of the static and hierarchical culture of Ayudhaya was in fact a dynamic era, characterized by openness, individualism, materialism, irreverence, humor, eagerness for international trade, curiosity about the outside world and a vibrant literature.

The standard version of history views the Bowring Treaty of 1855 as the moment when old Siam opened its doors to the world.

K. Nidhi convincingly argues that the Kingdom had been undergoing dramatic internal change all along, as evidenced by the casual attitude of acceptance shown by the political and economic elite to the treaty itself.

A study of the literature of early Bangkok, K. Nidhi main-

tains, is a fruitful way to understand the mindset of the era.

"Any work of literature has both a writer and a body of readers who, down through the years, have 'consumed' the work in their lives," K. Nidhi writes. "The work does not reflect the worldview, values, feelings, and thoughts of the writer alone; those of the readership are of no less significance. The work presents a particular view, and that view gains currency if the readership appreciates it. In brief, a literary work and the society that produces it are interrelated."

K. Nidhi then goes into a exhaustive discussion of the literature of Ayudhaya. I had always thought that most of it went up in smoke during the 1767 Fall. However, a huge amount was preserved – poetry, plays, historical chronicles, folktales, religious treatises – and K. Nidhi displays an encyclopedic knowledge of the field, classified strictly into folk and court literature.

Moving into the Bangkok era, K. Nidhi observes a new set of literary trends: "These trends




may be described in broad-brush terms as two complementary and interrelated changes: first, adoption of folk literature into upper class literature; second, reduction in the ritual element in court literature to the point the sacredness embedded in Ayudhaya court literature had greatly diminished."

The greatest hero of this new style of literature is the subject of the book's second essay: Sunthorn Phu: Bourgeois Poet Laureate. A great traveler, humorist, drinker and womanizer, (nak laeng, in the argot of the time), Sunthorn Phu embodied the zeitgeist of the time. He despised superstition and the common folk, elevated reason and the pursuit of wealth, and kept a sharp eye out for the ladies. K. Nidhi's close analysis of his poetry is the closest that anyone illiterate in Thai is going to get to the Kingdom's great literary hero.

Chris Baker, a principal editor, closes the book with a bio-





graphical afterword about K. Nidhi and his impact on Thai historiography.



same vendors meet, a shadowy godfather is thought to be sending his minions out to lure bar girls into the casino as customers.



Why feeding wildlife is a VERY BAD idea

ational parks are not zoos. In theory, park animals should lead their natural lives undisturbed by human intervention, roaming free with their families, foraging where they can.

We must understand that wildlife sightings are serendipitous. If you want a guaranteed sighting, go visit a jail for animals - otherwise known as a zoo.

Ecotourists understand the game – they don't always see wildlife, but that's the trade-off for allowing the animals their freedom and a natural lifestyle.

Unfortunately for Thailand's wildlife, business operators with no concept of nature and no interest in training their staff properly often organize "nature tours"

With no natural resources background, these business owners don't even understand the issues – but with money to be made, who cares?

INVITING PROBLEMS

Freelance sea canoeing guides get 150-250 baht per day. Combining low pay and a lack of training is just inviting problems. Unknowing tourists may give a tip worth two days' wages if they can just get to feed a monkey.

This short-term thinking hurts the wildlife and the people of Thailand.

The day I first witnessed monkeys being fed in Phang Nga Bay, a client said he was bitten in Thailand 16 years earlier and hadn't returned since. He came to us because of our reputation for safety – and now other companies were feeding monkeys around us!

We once declined to take a Sierra Club group for a tour in Talin, north of Ao Nang. They were shocked, until I saw them at the next stop. They were whitefaced and still shaking days later.

They hadn't been bitten, but the environmentalists were physically molested and intimidated by monkeys in tight mangrove channels where kayaks offer no escape. That was five years ago and they haven't been back since.

Well-traveled tourists learn from national park experiences worldwide. Feeding bears in Yellowstone Park or primates in Africa is just asking for trouble.

So just what's wrong with feeding wildlife?

Wildlife says it all. Wild animals can be dangerous at any moment, but when exactly is the greatest danger? When they are protecting their young, and guarding "their" food. If you feed wildlife you are automatically increasing the risk of attack.

There are three basic problems with feeding wild animals.


First, when we habituate them with human contact this increases risk for both parties. Animals risk being eaten by the ultimate predator - humans. And increased human contact also means increased attacks on humans – especially when food is involved.

Second, the food we offer is usually unnatural. There are no banana trees on Koh Panak, and frozen peas don't grow for reef fish. Wild diets are often highly specialized, and altered diets are usually harmful.

Third, constant feeding makes animals dependent upon the easy human supply chain. Families forget how to forage. Clever and resourceful species turn into beggars, with negative effects on family culture.

Two more downsides surfaced from observations made in Koh Panak: first, members of formerly close-knit families turn on each other while fighting for

Second, there are now injuries that we've never seen before. One female had an open and infected bite wound on her elbow - a death sentence in the wild. An adolescent had a broken arm incurred in a banana fight.



Here monkey monkey monkey, I got a banana for you... Macaques have canine teeth that can take rip your fingers off, or bits of your face.

Catching or tranquilizing a macaque to get it to a vet is virtually impossible in Panak's sharp limestone environment, so it will die an even slower death.

We've known this family of macaques for 16 years, and these first-ever injuries came as the result of banana feeding. Last year's playful siblings now fight over scraps.

Silence is the price we pay to see our wild relatives. They aren't always there, but when we

work for a sighting, rewards are always greater. My most memorable Panak experience was talking a macaque down a 300-meter cliff to converse with eye contact – the macaque in a tree just above my guests – and no ba-

nanas were involved.

Solutions are easy:

• First, national parks can enforce the law. Rangers tell us that feeding park wildlife carries a 2,000-baht fine, but they are so busy collecting entry fees that there is no manpower to enforce the fines. Handing out a few fines could well stop macaque feeding.

• Licensing guides in national parks is vital, including wildlife and environmental training. Whatever happens now isn't working.

• Signage in all major languages leads to self-enforcement. Generally speaking, when people understand, they care.

• Finally, educate tourists coming to Thailand. In-flight movies and airport signage promote and protect Thailand's wildlife would help. None of these solutions is expensive and can help prevent your child being bitten by those long macaque canines.

Ultimately, simply follow the nature ethic all ecotourists embrace: leave things as they are and move on.

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Naturism market may have to remain untapped

The proposal by foreign businessmen to open a "naturist" or "clothing-optional" retreat somewhere in Phuket (see *Inside Story*) brings into focus a number of misconceptions about Thai culture held by foreigners – and vice versa.

The near-unanimous rejection of the proposal during a September meeting of top-level provincial officials cited "cultural concerns" as the reason why such a resort would be inappropriate for Phuket.

To be sure, Phuket's Thai Buddhist majority is generally quite conservative when it comes to nudity in the context of preserving "Thai values".

For our Muslim friends, nudity is proscribed as a matter of religious belief. Christians, likewise, though to a lesser extent these days, frown upon the exposure of skin to public view.

The resort, as described by its would-be developers, would be completely private and totally in keeping with the aims of the naturist "movement", which has more to do with overcoming one's sexual urges than giving in to them.

Have our leaders missed an opportunity here? The International Naturist Federation has some 200 resorts in Europe alone, and 850 around the world. That seems like a lot of tourism potential.

After all, gays, too, are generally frowned upon by most religions and have also been branded as being in conflict with Thai values, yet this did not stop Phuket from seizing on the commercial opportunities offered by the recent Nation V gay party.

Phuket's tourism business already features a great deal of non-Thai-value, un-Buddhist, un-Islamic and un-Christian activity. Topless sunbathing, prostitution, drinking and meat barbecues are all part of the equation. There have never been serious attempts to ban these.

Still, if a nudist retreat were allowed to be developed here, it is difficult to see where it would be sited. The location would have to provide not only adequate privacy for the "naturists", but it would also have to be isolated enough to keep them from prying eyes and exposure to those who might be offended. In Phuket there are no longer that many places fitting that description.

Even more problematic is that fact that naturist resorts are commonly found along beaches, and it is in just such a location that the developers would like to establish one in Phuket.

In Thailand, however, all beaches are – at least in law – public land. As it is still illegal to go naked in public, it is hard to see how a beachside nudist resort could ever operate here legally under existing legislation. - The Editor

But once that news story was out, many of the reporters seemed to revert to type and we began to see sensational, voyeuristic articles complete with "facts" twisted to fit, and "quotes" from people who later flatly denied saying any such thing or from others who wondered why their words had been twisted so gratuitously.

Patong Beach is, it must be said, a tabloid journalist's dream. Men drinking too much beer, watching football, and generally enjoying themselves.

Women dancing in and on bars, sometimes trying to entice customers in, and the nightly show at the end of Soi Crocodile providing more column-inch opportunities than you can shake a stick at.

recent article in a major British newspaper about pedophilia was seen by some as a gross exaggeration of the sleazier side of Patong's night life. Several people quoted in the article claim to have had their words distorted and others say that the facts were twisted.

Briton Steve Finn, who spends much of the year in Phuket, rises to the island's defense with words about the responsibility of the media to report accurately and sensibly.



But the reality is that our newspapers and their fearless reporters want more than "girls dance on bars; shock horror!" So what we get is "scantily clad teenage girls dancing on bars in sex clubs; shock horror!" Which, of course, sells more newspa-

Not that they check their facts, such as the age of the girls they are writing about, for instance. Nor do they seek the permission of those they write about, or explain what a "sex club" is.

British people are fascinated by Thailand. The country's profile has grown remarkably in recent years and is now high on the list of desirable long-haul holiday destinations. British newspapers know this, and so of course Thailand is now firmly in their sights as well.

When a reporter takes up station in a Soi Bangla bar looking for a story, he will be paid for doing so. Should he write an article about exploitation, be it of the girls working in the bar or the children hawking flowers and gum?

Does he pay the subject for the story? No, he will take some notes, maybe a quote or two, stitch them together and make a saleable piece of work from

The subject, bargirls or flower girls, will never see a penny from the sale of the article written about them. So just who is exploiting whom?

People still trust newspapers and have a ridiculous notion that they will play fair, which should really compel journalists to report raw facts and allow us to make our own minds up.

Yet even our so-called "intelligent" journals routinely trash places and people without any consideration for local businesses or people who already have as many problems as they can

Why can they not under-

stand that with power comes an obligation to be responsible?

People want to know about Thailand; it is exotic and yet accessible. They devour everything written about the place and when some journalist reports that Patong is a haven for pedophiles – as reported in this article – they tend to believe it.

The night life of Patong may not be to everyone's taste, but that does not make it a bad place. Pious reporters may well be offended at the sight of a young Thai girl with an older Western man, but that does not give them the right to paint every man in town as a pedophile waiting to

It seems to me that the typical British journalist is no longer on a mission to bring truth and justice into British living rooms from faraway places. He is on the gravy train and, unfortunately, it stops in Patong these days.

> If you want to extend your home you must get a permit to do so from the Public Works Department of Pa Khlok *OrBor*-

> If you are Thai you should bring copies of the following documents: house registration, ID card and certificate of ownership. These copies should be the same size as the originals.

> If you are foreign, you should bring the company registration of the company that owns the land, your passport and work

permit (if you have one) and the land papers. The person who has the authority to sign and stamp paperwork for the company must also come.

Once the officials have these documents and have checked that they are complete, you will receive permission for the extension.

As to digging a well, Section 23 of the Digging and Filling of Soil Act of 2543 (2001) specifies that the opening of the well may be no more than 4 square meters in area.

There is no need to get permission before digging the well.



very once in a while, I like to share some of the more pertinent questions from readers. This gives me a chance to show which questions are on many users' minds and the best answers that I can come up with. Here are a few recent examples.

Q: My computer just gave me a message that "Windows has Performed an Illegal Operation". Did I do something wrong? Is this the beginning of a full system crash?

A: There are several possible causes of this error: most times it is a simple glitch in how Windows uses your hardware.

For example, there could have been an error when the system was writing to the hard disk or possibly there is a section of your RAM (random access memory) that is beginning to malfunction. This problem usually sorts itself out because Windows is able to avoid doing the same thing that caused the error.

However, if this problem persists, you may need to run the Repair Windows utility which can be found on your original Win-

Illegal Windows? Is this the beginning of a real pain?

Simply put the CD into your computer and select Repair Win-

Q: When I am in my office, I can connect to the Internet and our LAN (local area network) without any difficulties. However, whenever I travel and try to use the Internet provided in a hotel, it just doesn't work. What can I do?

A: There is usually one simple cause of this; your technicians have set up a static IP address for your computer.

Every computer needs an

that it can be identified on your LAN and also to gain access to the Internet.

An analogy is a house, which has an address so that the occupants can receive mail and so that friends or relatives can find it to visit.

If your technicians have set up a fixed IP address for your computer, they can control many things about the LAN including security and access control. However, this IP address will only work on your LAN, so when you try to connect to a public Internet or even another LAN, your IP address is not recognized.

The best way to solve this is to have your technicians set up a dynamic IP address so that wherever you try to connect, you will get an address from that sys-

Q: My children use my computer to surf the Net and to play games; they have even been known to do their homework on it. The problem is that they keep trying to install new programs that either do not work or even worse, crash my computer so that I have to take it to your shop for a rebuild. How can I stop this?

A: Buy them their own computer and make them pay for any repairs? Just kidding. I suggest that you set up a limited log-on account specifically for their use and put a password on your existing user account.

Here's how to do it: click on the Start button, go into the Control Panel and click on Users Accounts. Here you can set up a new account just for them in which they won't be able to install anything when logged on.

Click on Create a New Account, enter the name you want to give it, and click Next. Then select Limited and click on Create Account. It is important to click on Limited because this will restrict their ability to really mess things up.

If you want this new account to have a password, click on Change an Account and then click on the new account you just created. There you will see an option to Create a Password. Click on this and then enter the password you want to give to them. Finally, you must set up a password for your existing account so they cannot log on as someone who has right to install new software.

Click on Change Another Account (top left of the screen), click on your account and enter a new password. Now you are the only one who can create new accounts, install software or change your computer's configu-

Q: Lately, my computer has been running very slowly. I can see the hard disk light blinking like crazy, now that I have a good VP of even when I am not running any programs or touching the keyboard. Is this a virus or is there something wrong with my computer?

A: It could be a virus but more likely, it is caused by an untidy hard disk that is no longer efficiently storing data. I suggest that you first upgrade your anti-virus program with the latest virus definitions. You can do this by starting your anti-virus program and click on Update.

If you do not have any antivirus program installed, shame on you. Contact a good service company and get this done immediately – it is not a safe world out there.

If, after running a full virus scan, you are still experiencing problems, then the problem is most likely the hard disk where your files are inefficiently stored all over.

Try running Defrag, which is a Windows utility that cleans things up and finds better ways to store the files on your hard

First close all open programs including anti-virus, MSN or Yahoo Chat. Now click Start > Programs > Accessories > System Tools > Disk Defragmenter.

Here you can run two utilities – Analyze and Defragment; I suggest running Analyze first because it will let you know if there is a serious problem before actually defragmenting your files. Once the Analyze session is complete, choose Defragment and go and have dinner or go to bed as this can take a long time.




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Gold goes up, buyers give up

PHUKET: Gold shops in Phuket took a heavy blow in 2005 as the price of gold soared to 10,350 baht per baht-weight (15.16 grams) by the end of the year.

According to the Gold Trade Association, the price of gold breached 10,000 baht per baht on November 1 for the first time ever. The highest peak, recorded a decade earlier, had been 6,500 baht.

Over the year, the price of gold rose 24%, from 8,350 baht on January 3 to 10,350 baht on December 30.

Sasiwimon Sakkasemkrit, owner of Benjaporn Jewelry on Montri Road, which has been in business 20 years, told the Gazette, "The impact of the tsunami on our business was a decrease in sales of about 40%. And because the price of gold has been rising steadily, people want to sell rather than buy. Many people are also pawning their gold.

"There are so many gold shops on Phuket and competition is stiff, [though] customers are loyal to a shop that provides good

service and is flexible," she added.

Tippayawan Limthongnoppakoon, Manager of BR Gold Smith, which has four branches in Phuket, agreed that 2005 was not a good year for business.

"At the beginning of the year, business was affected by the tsunami and then by the end of the year the price of gold had increased and people didn't have the money to buy, or found it difficult to decide to buy gold this high season.

"Usually for Chinese New Year [on January 29 this year], business owners will buy gold items for their employees, but this vear no one has started buying here yet. I think they may have decided to buy something other than gold.

'Most of my customers are bringing in gold to pawn because they believe the price of gold will increase [to more than cover the redemption price]. I think the rising price of gold is a trend that will continue in the future."

Benjamas Tanertthanasombat, owner of the Thongthip Gold Shop on Montri Road said, "We opened this shop nearly 10 years

ago. The economy has suffered due to the tsunami and when people have less income, they cannot buy gold. After the tsunami, our sales fell about 35%. Although we used to have regular customers and sold gold to hotel executives for staff parties

or for New Year gifts, now many people have changed their buying habits.

"Actually, I hope that the gold price will not continue to increase, but, who knows? After all, the price in 2006 will depend on the world economy which in turn depends on many influences, such as fuel prices," she added.

"I really want the government to assist the economy of Southern Thailand, and I believe local people should be honest and service-minded so we can attract more customers."







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The advantages and disadvantages of 'command' economies

refer in this article to a letter published in the Phuket Gazette last week by reader Jeffrey Galko, who made some comments about my article of December 31, 2005 headlined "A good outlook for 2006".

Mr Galko assumes that I have a preference for "command" economies and dictatorship over democracy and free markets. Nothing could be further from the truth. He draws his assumptions from my statement: "India's disadvantage - if compared to China – is that it is a democracy".

Perhaps it would have been more accurate to have described China's current economic policy as being a "hybrid command economy". In reality, this is splitting hairs. The Chinese government is still very involved in the economy, to a far greater degree than would be common in a democratic country.

LIMITED

I put "command" economy in inverted commas because its advantage is limited to being able to change situations without lengthy political debate.

Manmohan Singh, the Indian Prime Minister, made the same point in a speech in 2005. He was comparing India and China in this context.

Obviously, democracy and free markets are far preferable to dictatorships with socialist/ communist or any other economic policies.

I mentioned that India started economic liberalization in 1991, 12 years after China had taken this route. Previously, India was a democracy, but its economy was virtually a socialist-type model. It may not have had a Soviet-style approach, but it was so "bogged down" with subsidies, bureaucratic "red tape" and so on as to be ineffective in raising the living standard of its population.

Mr Galko appears to have missed the following sentence: "China also started its economic

liberalization earlier, giving it a 12year lead over India". That is hardly praise for China's previous economic policies. Nowhere did I even mention communism. Please note that my column deals with economics and markets; I try to limit as much as possible any reference to politics.

Looking at China, we see a "communist" government that has been forced to face reality and change its economic policies by 180 degrees. I have stated in previous articles that the Chinese government faces a very difficult historical situation. It still has many old "smokestack" industries, which the government cannot close down immediately as this would cause massive unemployment.

What they are trying to achieve is to allow the creation of a free market which will lead to rapid economic growth, allowing for employment opportunities for job-seekers. This is a mammoth task; not only do they wish to rid the country of the old communist industries which are totally outdated and inefficient, they also have to deal with massive numbers of previously rural inhabitants heading for the cities.

The total amount of labor "on the move" is estimated to be larger than the combined population of Western Europe.

The future path for the Chinese economy, as is the case in the present and has been in the past, is to rely heavily on exportled economic growth which, in turn, enables the domestic economy to expand. The Chinese


government faces some huge challenges – it is in some ways similar to Japan in the 1960s when the latter was referred to as a "bicycle economy". This refers to the need to keep forward momentum (economic growth). If it fails to achieve this... well, we all know what happens to stationary bicycles.

China is also in the process of privatizing its banking sector. The banks in many cases had to "write off" some substantial bad loans forced on them by local and national political figures.

It is no coincidence that many of these now privatized banks will have a substantial foreign shareholding, and that most of the foreign shareholding will be by one acceptable foreign bank for each new privatized en-

The Chinese banking system needs foreign expertise, and the easiest and most efficient way of achieving this result is to have a foreign partner who not only injects capital, but also personnel and advanced banking systems.

However, the Chinese economy is not quite so open as Mr Galko appears to believe. One example is the China National Offshore Oil Corporation (CNOOC), which made a takeover bid in 2005 for US oil company UNOCAL - a subsidiary of Chevron Corporation.

CNOOC is a public company, and its shares are listed on one of the Chinese stock exchanges. The takeover bid met with a hostile political reception in the US for one reason only: the major shareholder in CNOOC is the Chinese government with a 70% stake. The Chinese government controls many "listed public companies".

ourists have never been more welcome on Phuket than nowadays.

And people are coming back in droves.

As a result, the high season is in full swing and the diving industry is flourishing as never before.

The proof of this is that dive operators are scrambling to find qualified instructors whereas, in the past, there was never a shortage.

PADI course directors in Phuket have certified more than 50 new open-water instructors in just one month. And Phuket seems to have one of the highest number of course directors in Asia.

One course director stands out. Mona Fristedt, Managing Director of Oceanic Divecenter, is the only female course director in Phuket, proving that diving is not totally a male domain.

Mona has again begun teaching Instructor Development Courses (IDCs), after a short hiatus last season. (An IDC is necessary for dive masters wishing to graduate to being open-water instructors).

She said, "My next IDC will be in February and I'm really looking forward to teaching again."

She will be doing IDC courses in English and Swedish and may even have a group of hearing-impaired instructor candidates this season.

She added, "Oceanic Dive Center's staff is made up of 75% women, including the driver."

Living the life: Liveaboards are also busy. I have had a few offers to return to the Similans full time, and the *Gazette*'s former diving columnist Chris Cruz can be found in the Similans this season.



Although I have opted to spend my days closer to the purr of an air conditioner rather than to that of an air compressor, I did manage to get to the Similans aboard Moby Dick's new luxury liveaboard, M/V *Nautica*.

The Similans are still my favorite place in the world, and I was happy to see that the diving is still great. I am also happy to report that further north, at Koh Bon, I had one of my best manta dives ever – 45 minutes with a gorgeous manta ray that was completely black on top – something I'd never seen before and a sight I'll never forget.

Swift recovery: Tom Yang is a PADI instructor who has his own California-based diving company and frequently brings groups of divers to Phuket.

He has been diving in Phuket for nearly four years and brought a group with him in March last year.

Tom said, "We came back to support the area and to assess the damage for ourselves." He was very impressed with Phuket's "amazingly fast" recovery. Speaking about the Similans, he added, "The seven divers who had never been here before thought the diving was excellent." He said that there was some noticeable damage, but the diving was still great and he will continue to bring customers for liveaboard trips.

New destinations: Two liveaboard companies have decided to add some variety to their itinerar-

ies. M/Y *Genesis I* from Sea Bees and *Nautica* from Moby Dick have special expeditions planned to Tarutao National Park in the south, also taking in the Butang Islands.

Apart from Koh Lipe, all the islands in this archipelago are uninhabited. Patrick Catellani, Managing Director of Moby Dick, said, "We wanted to try something different and explore a new area." M/V *Nautica* is

doing a seven-day trip, leaving April 11.

Sea Bees also has a six-day trip scheduled to Tarutao in April aboard M/Y *Genesis I*, but this is already sold out. Another is plan-ned, leaving January 24.

Both companies also have regularly scheduled liveaboard

trips to Hin Daeng and Hin Muang, famous for their manta and whaleshark sightings.

Eco-snorkeling: Also new this season from Moby Dick are snorkel tours on the recently launched M/Y Sea Gypsy. Cruise director Lotta Hansson has 10 years' experience in diving around Phuket and has designed two itineraries in the spirit of ecotourism, which she says are the first of their kind in Phuket.

One of the trips is an "ecological adventure combined with knowledge acquisition". In addition to snorkeling in Ao Makham, it includes a guided tour at the recently reopened Phuket Aquarium, a trip to the new Khao Khat viewpoint, which has a 360° view encompassing the Phi Phi Islands and Phang Nga Bay.

Lotta said she is excited about the tours, adding that the snorkeling will be in locations seldom visited by other boats. She declined to reveal the exact location, saying only, "Guests will be able to snorkel at a beach on Phuket that is reachable only by boat."

She added that both tours will include full ecological briefings about marine life and the importance of nature conservation.



PHUKET: Twenty-nine teams have confirmed that they will compete in the 2006 Tour of Siam cycle race from Bangkok to Phuket between January 15 and 21. Among the entries is last year's winner, Shinichi Fukushima of Japan, who will be riding with fellow Japan National Team cyclists Koji Fukushima, Tetsuya Ishida, Takashi Itiyazawa and Tohaya Sano.

This year's race, covering 1,014.8 kilometers, will be divided into seven stages raced on successive days. After the 153-km Stage 6 from Khao Lak to Saphan Hin on January 20, the final day will feature a 120.4-km circuit around Phuket.

Huebschle righted their boat and held on to third place.





Folding screens: separate to decorate

he oriental folding screen originated in China and evolved into more versatile styles in Japan. The oldest surviving Chinese screens date back to the 8th century AD.

Today, folding screens can serve as an elegant backdrop, but are commonly used as a partition to create smaller, more private space within an open living area, or to hide clutter.

Standard folding screens have three hinged panels, but they can range from two to eight leaves.

Phuket Golden offers two styles of folding screen. One, imported from China, features Chinese characters painted on five pine panels for 12,000 baht, while their four-panel screen with







Gardening with Bloomin' Bert

we know what we are talking about. There are so-called experts in just about every field, who will stand up and try to educate us with the depth of their knowledge and experience.

Car mechanics are perhaps the worst culprits. How come so many of these people are complete buffoons who haven't a clue what the problem is with your car? They probably have one or two vague ideas, but in reality will try one of these at a time, while extracting the maximum amount possible from your wallet until they happen to get it right.

Then there are anthropologists on Discovery Channel on TV. They're pretty easy to spot, as they always wear some form of daft hat.

WEIRD

These are people who ensconce themselves in the deepest darkest jungles of the world, attempting to formulate explanations for some of the behavior they witness.

On seeing a tribal dance, they theorize by saying things like, "This is an ancient ritual, in which they're expressing their appreciation of their environment, and asking the gods for good fortune in the coming season." They may well be absolutely right, of course, but then again they might be just having a good dance and nothing more. After all, there's not that much to do in the jungle.

And that's my point – these "experts" are probably just making a lot of it up as they go along. I have never described myself as an expert in anything, and am quite happy to admit that when I first saw this weird, purple-flowered plant appearing, I honestly hadn't the faintest idea what it was – I had to look it up.



That purple thing

It turned out to be the *celosia spicata*, or quailgrass. Thais call this odd little plant the *ngorn kai*.

It seems to have dozens of alternative names: Flamingo feather, cockscomb, feathered amaranth, woolflower, and red fox are a few. It's also known as firegrass, as it often grows on the site of previous fires.

There used to be a row of busy shops and restaurants along the beachfront at Nai Harn before the tsunami. Unfortunately they were all destroyed by the waves. Although a couple of buildings were rebuilt right next to Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club, there is an area where there are some spectacular clusters of these plants. I'm not sure that they were actually planted by anyone there – I rather think that they just "appeared".

Nobody is actually sure where the plant originated. It could well be from China, but again the experts would just be guessing – they don't know.

It's a distinctive plant, with 15cm-long, cylindrical groups of flowers that appear on the end of slender stalks up to about a meter in height. They're unique in that they have a metallic sheen lower down, because the lower flowers are silvery-white at their bases.

If you can be bothered to grow these things for yourself, rather than pinch a few from some wild spot where they're already growing, it's not particularly difficult.

Just put a few seeds in a decent bit of compost, covering the seed with the soil.

After sowing, put the tray inside a polythene bag and park it in a well-lit spot out of direct sunlight until germination, which usually takes 14-21 days.

Keep the soil damp, but not too wet. When the seedlings are

big enough to handle without them falling apart, and when two or three leaves have opened transplant them, putting them about 30cm apart in a sunny, sheltered spot in rich, well-drained soil. *Celosia spicata* is somewhat fussy about having its roots disturbed, so you'll need to be fairly gentle with it.

They really are a bit fickle, this lot. The soft, dense, feathery spikes that are produced in profusion are probably the reason why these plants are also popular with flower-arranging wallahs. Unlike most flowers, they don't dry out when they're cut – they retain their shape and color, and last indefinitely.

Again, if you're into that kind of thing, pick them when the leaves are dry and just before the flowers are fully open.

LUCKY

Tie them in small bunches and hang those bunches upside-down in a dry, well-ventilated place until they're totally dry. This isn't rocket science.

In gardening terms, we don't realize how lucky we are here in Phuket. As I found out more about this plant, I realized that in other parts of the world, they struggle to keep these things alive. I found a picture online, of a smallish group of spicatas in Kentucky, of which the owner was particularly proud. The groups I've seen in Nai Harn put these to shame, and they're growing completely wild.

I'm sure there are experts who will accuse me of spouting nonsense about the *celosia spic-ata*. So sue me. I just hope that none of them is a car mechanic or an anthropologist, as I could throw exactly the same accusation back at them. Let's face it: none of us is an "expert".
