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TAT governor vows to push TG to boost flights

LAGUNA PHUKET: Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Governor Juthamas Siriwan on January 19 stepped into the lions' den – a room at the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket filled with hoteliers and property industry figures.

Many of them have in the past been less than impressed with the TAT's support for the tourism industry in the tsunamihit provinces, some vocally so.

But K. Juthamas came out of the meeting in one piece and smelling of roses.

A surprise pledge by K. Juthamas to push for Thai Airways International (THAI) to provide more direct international flights to Phuket, in particular to and from Hong Kong, Australia and Japan, all major sources of tourists for Phuket, eased the delegates' concerns.

"It seems to me from what I have heard here that there are tourists who want to come, but there are no flights. If we see the potential from Australia, say, or from Hong Kong, instead of [using the TAT's] budget for advertising, we [will] support THAI and you [will] do the marketing," she suggested.

Laguna Phuket's Joint Managing Director James Batt, who convened the meeting, described this as "a very good idea", and explained to K. Juthamas, "We are all sitting here with the budgets to go out and do tactical advertising in these [markets].

"The difficulty is getting the flights. If we can give financial

support [to THAI], then the rest of it will follow.

"In a way, [the TAT] is not even spending money within 'Thailand Inc' – the money's going from one pocket [the TAT] into another [THAI]. It's a beautiful solution."

He said that if the TAT would cooperate with THAI, and if the hotels would work together with tour agents overseas, then this could break the current deadlock that sees THAI unwilling to make more seats available without having guarantees that it can fill them – and agents unable to book tourists for holidays because seats are not available.

"I will talk with my partner, Thai International," K. Juthamas said, "to help give you more flights, but you have to tell me which routes you want first or second, and so on... I sit as an adviser to the board of THAI."

Not everyone was as upbeat as K. Juthamas and Mr Batt, however. Maitree Narukatpichai, Owner's Representative of the Hilton Phuket Arcadia, was dubious.

"We have been to a lot of meetings and until now, everything is still the same. I don't see any impact for Phuket," he said.

But the general mood was summed up by Evason General Manager Alasdair Junor, who said, "We're here to move forward. I think that it's a terrific strategy if we formalize it."

Monorail project would cost B20bn – consultant

PHUKET: A consultant to the Phuket Provincial Government said today that his company estimates that a proposed monorail light rail transit (LRT) system linking Phuket International Airport and Phuket City would cost 20 billion baht.

Krai Tungsanga, President of Pyramid Development International Co (PDI), explained that a feasibility study into the LRT proposal began in October last year and will continue until May this year.

In its first report to Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura on November 17 last year, PDI proposed an LRT system that would consist of a loop through the Patong area to Phuket City, and then through Thalang back to the airport.

POWER

However, as K. Krai explained at the Governor's weekly CEO meeting, the part of the route linking with Patong would be extremely difficult to develop because it would require the purchase of large amounts of private land.

A huge amount of power would also be needed to propel the train over hills.

He recommended instead that the LRT route run only between the airport and Phuket City.

He said, "Our study shows that because the 40km distance is already connected by a fourlane road [with median strip], the LRT system could be built down the middle of the road and would

Get your smart card, urges the Mayor

PHUKET CITY: Phuket City Municipality is now offering "smart card" ID cards, providing citizens with a replacement for old identification cards.

Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwannasuppana explained at a press conference, "People who have a valid ID card can request a smart card by submitting their existing ID card and a copy of their house registration.

"A 40-baht fee will cover both a database check and the new card.

"If people don't want a smart card immediately they can keep their old ID card until it expires and then submit it, in which case there will be no fee. Smart cards are valid for six years."

K. Somjai continued, "The

cards can store a lot of personal information. Later, it will also be capable of being used as an ATM card.

The cards have a 13-digit ID number and house registration details from the Department of Local Administration in the Ministry of Interior.

"In the future we plan to have the card linked to other databases with information about



social security and driving license details, but we'll have to wait a bit for that.

"When all the data from other units is ready, we can link them up and have the ideal smart card. Many people have requested this project and it comes as an answer to a great need," she

Blood supplies running low

PHUKET CITY: Stocks of Otype blood – both negative and positive – on the island have dropped to alarming levels, prompting Somchay Chodchasiri, President of the Phuket Blood Donor Club, based at Vachira Phuket Hospital, to put out an urgent call for more donors.

"We have nearly run out of supplies in Phuket," he told the *Gazette*. "Operations are sometimes canceled if stocks are too low, but we cannot predict what emergencies may occur."

K. Somchay invited everyone – Thais and foreigners, residents and tourists – to donate.

"You could save someone's life," he said.

TAT predicts 5m visitors, B80b revenue in 2006

PHUKET: Occupancy rates at four- and five-star hotels have averaged about 80% since the tsunami anniversary, and the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) is now predicting that five million people will visit Phuket in 2006, generating some 80 billion baht in revenue.

Siripakorn Cheawsamoot, Assistant Director of TAT's Region 4 Office in Phuket, told the *Gazette* that occupancy rates had remained "satisfactory" at around 80% since the first anniversary of the tsunami.

With strong demand expected in the meetings, incentives, conventions and exhibition market (the "Mice" market) when the high season begins to wind down after March, the TAT expects an average occupancy rate of 70% in four- and five-star hotels during the coming low season.

K. Siripakorn said the bullish low-season figures could be achieved if hotels and other businesses "add value" to their products

As an example, he said they could offer "stay two nights, and get one night free" packages.

Currently the largest sources of tourists as determined by the frequency of scheduled and charter flights are in Europe, especially Britain, Germany and Sweden. Other important sources are Russia, South Korea and Australia, he said.

In 2004, 4.7 million tourists visited the island, generating approximately 85 billion baht in revenue.

Although the figures plummeted by about 40% in 2005 in the aftermath of the tsunami, the TAT expects a rebound this year, with figures higher than those of 2004.

QUANTITY

Package tourism is predicted to play an important role.

"We can't focus only on 'quality' tourists. We also need to think about quantity," K. Siripakorn said.

"We expect to get about five million tourists in 2006, generating some 80 million baht in revenue."

Helping to bring this about would be a series of TAT roadshows to Australia, Hong Kong and South Korea, he added.

not require the purchase of additional land.

"This route could provide a service to match the standard of any international city."

K. Krai estimated that building the LRT would cost 1 billion baht per kilometer for sloping areas of land and 500 million baht per kilometer for flat land.

These figures include basic infrastructure, LRT stations, and lighting and control systems.

"The one-way LRT ticket price would probably be 100 baht or more. Public hearings to determine whether or not the Phuket public favors an LRT system on the island are planned for March and April this year," K. Krai said.





4 arrested over forged credit cards

The four are Tanapol Detpalit, 45, from Ang Thong Province; Ubonrat Pinket, 47, from Ayudhya; Pornpan Poolpakdee, 25, from Phuket; and Wong Mun Bin, 27, from Malaysia.

At a press conference, Deputy Commissioner of the Central Investigation Bureau Pol Maj Gen Suchat Muankaew explained, "They were arrested at a restaurant in Rassada on charges of possessing forged electronic cards.

"They were also found in possession of 40 credit cards, seven mobile phones, four gold necklaces, a gold bracelet, six gold rings, a locket, five small gilded Buddha images, two car stereo systems, two bankbooks and a new Toyota Vios car.

"All of the property was bought from shops in Phuket, using fake credit cards."

All four admitted to the offenses, and were taken into custody to await trial, he said.

Gen Suchat added, "Owners and salespeople of shops in Phuket must look at credit cards very carefully. The fakes these people had look very much like the real thing."

Also at the press conference were the National Commander of the Tourist Police, Pol Maj Gen Panya Maman, and the Commander of the Phuket Provincial Police, Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth.

Gov orders stray roundup postponed

PHUKET CITY: The Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) has postponed indefinitely its plan to round up hundreds of stray dogs at island beaches and hold them at the Mid Road Dog Shelter in Thalang.

At a meeting chaired by Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura at Phuket Provincial Hall on January 13, the Governor called again for closer co-operation among government agencies and the island's animal welfare groups.

He said he wants everyone to work together to sterilize stray dogs as a way of ultimately reducing their population on the island.

"We are all working toward the same objective, which is to reduce the number of stray dogs," he reminded the gathering.

The meeting was attended by PPLO chief Sunart Wongchawalit and animal activists including Athena Cant and Dr Waraporn Namket of the Phuket Animal Welfare Society (PAWS), Margot Homburg Park of the Soi Dog Foundation (SDF) and Suphaporn Last, Regional Manager of the World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA).

The Governor called the meeting at the request of the SDF and WSPA, following a poorly attended meeting of local government officials last month at which it was announced that strays would be rounded up at popular tourist beaches and taken to the shelter.

The beach round-up plan was later scrapped because the shelter already houses some 430 animals – not far from the 500-dog limit earlier imposed by the Governor.

Whereas the PPLO has the authority to deal with the stray dog problem, its efforts have been hampered by a lack of co-operation from local administrative bodies and by poor funding. The PPLO shelter, which has just a handful of staff, faces a chronic funding problem that makes buying food for the

dogs an ongoing worry.

The SDF representatives told the meeting that the foundation had raised "a lot" of money, and presented a proposal that it either take over operations at the Mid Road Dog Shelter or establish a shelter and clinic of its own.

The group currently employs 15 permanent staff and eight part-time staff, some of whom would be relocated to the Mid Road Dog Shelter if the SDF were given permission to take over the facility, the meeting heard.

At the meeting, K. Sunart said that it was difficult for his officials to join the SDF field clinics because his agency was never told when they would take place. He also stressed that the exact financial obligation of animal welfare groups to the Mid Road Dog Shelter needs to be clearly established before they are allowed to set up operations there.

Before closing the meeting, the Governor announced he would set up and head a panel that would include representatives of the PPLO, WSPA, SDF and other animal welfare groups.

Cabinet okays B253m for Phuket tourism

PHUKET: The Cabinet has allocated a 253-million-baht budget to Phuket for the development of tourism in 2006, the Governor's Office announced on Thursday, January 12.

Dog digs up dead baby at Saphan Hin

PHUKET CITY: A stray dog dug up the body of a baby boy next to the tsunami warning tower at Saphan Hin on January 11.

Pol Lt Col Yongyuth Kongmalai, Inspector at Phuket City Police Station, told the Gazette that he received a phone call from a jogger at Saphan Hin saying that a beach cleaner had stopped her to say that she had discovered the body of baby boy wrapped in a purple soccer shirt.

After the police arrived they ascertained that a stray dog had unearthed the body.

"I took the body for autopsy at Vachira Phuket Hospital and we found that it weighed just 1.5 kilos. It was very small," Lt Col Yongyuth said.

"I'm not sure why the baby was buried there. It could have been the result of an abortion [illegal under normal circumstances in Thailand], or it could have been stillborn, but we will investigate. The shirt we found was from a tambon soccer team in Trang

Krabi received 284 million baht and Phang Nga 252 million for the same purpose.

Phuket had proposed several projects requiring additional funding that were turned down by the central government, including two major efforts: burying power cables along the beachfront in Patong and building a new Sarasin Bridge.


Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukbal explained to the Gazette that the municipality's plan to dig up an area alongside the Thaweewong Rd sidewalk and bury the cables - which would cost 330 million baht – is on hold.

He said, "When you consider how much money Patong rakes in, and how much having the electrical cables underground would benefit tourists and residents, it's disappointing that this project has once again not been supported by the central government."

Phuket Provincial Highways Office (PPHO) Chief Thanit Sakiya said that the PPHO has decided to demolish the existing Sarasin Bridge and build a new one high enough to allow yachts to sail under it.

He explained that the proposal passed an environmental impact assessment in December

K. Thanit said that the Department of Highways in Bangkok approved in principle a 452million-baht budget for the new bridge, but has yet to decide when construction will start.





Could Phuket hotels cope with another tsunami?

r Smith Thammasaroj, head of the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC), appears to court controversy.

He was dismissed as a scaremonger and forced out of his former post as Director-General of the Meteorological Department after he issued tsunami warnings in 1993 and 1998, following strong earthquakes at sea.

In neither case was Thailand affected, although a wave that followed the 1998 'quake killed some 2,000 people in Papua New Guinea.

In March, 2005, he said that Thailand's investigation – were one even to be conducted – into whether the Meteorological Department failed in its duty to warn people about the December 26, 2004, tsunami would never be made public.

"Did Suparerk Thantiratanawong, [the Director-General of the Met Department] know about [the impending tsunami]? I can't tell you the result, because 60 foreigners are eyeing to sue [the government]".

Dr Smith said that the government was in a "Catch-22" situation. If it claimed that the department did not know the tsunami was heading toward Thailand, that could be grounds for a dereliction-of-duty lawsuit. If it were found that officials did know the tsunami was coming, but did not warn the public, that would also lead to a lawsuit, he said.

"Either way, they can sue us. And these *farang* love to sue," he said.

His statements last December 27 about Phuket hotels' preparedness caused one hotel General Manager, who asked to remain anonymous, to question Dr Smith's motives.

"Just what is his agenda?" the GM asked. "Is he being paid by the Thai government or by the Tourism Office of Malaysia?

"His most recent comments are a kick in the teeth for the tourism industry [on Phuket], especially the ones who have laid down plans for what to do in the event of a disaster, of which he seems to be ignorant."

Uttapol Wongtaveewithayakun, the Human Resources Manager of the 41-bedroom Salathai Resort & Spa, Patong Beach, told the *Gazette* of his resort's evacuation plans.

"First, our hotel is close to one of the warning sirens on Patong Beach, and we are confident that, should it sound, all of our guests inside the building could hear, as well as, of course, those outside. However, we won't just rely on that; we'll supplement the siren by first telephoning all the guest rooms and then knocking on the doors."

"Some guests might, after all, have had a few drinks," K. Uttapol added.

He said that the resort's swimming pool will be the muster point before guests are evacuated further inland or, if time does not permit in the case of a tsunami, to the hotel's fourth floor. Emergency boxes containing first aid kits, flashlights and water have been prepared.

Newspapers from Azerbaijan to South Africa to Mexico reported Dr Smith Thammasaroj's recent opinions regarding the preparedness of Phuket hotels in the event of another tsunami. Speaking on December 27, 2005, he said, "At the moment, they (hotels) do not even have a map or instructions to tell the guests what do in a tsunami." The impact of this statement caused concern among tourists and anger among hoteliers on Phuket. The *Gazette*'s **Andy Johnstone** and **Nattamon Ratcharak** conducted an unscientific qualitative survey and asked a number of hoteliers the simple question: are you ready for another tsunami?

"Our staff have been trained – some have undertaken professional training in disaster preparedness – and, day and night, duty staff are assigned roles and responsibilities for any emergency situation."

Rachin Thongmakkun, GM of the Patong Bay Garden Resort, Committee Member of the Patong Hotels Club (PHC) and Vice-President of the Southern Hotels Association, said that his hotel, too, has a raft of plans to deal with emergency situations, including a tsunami.

"Our hotel, which has information, including maps of evacuation routes for different situations, in all of the guest rooms, conducts routine drills and training in conjunction with other hotels in Patong, but the PHC would like to see more hotels joining in," he said.

Further south along the coast, Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort at Karon Noi Beach and its sister hotel, Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club at Nai Harn Beach, have well-laid plans.

Jayne MacDougall, Health & Safety (H&S) Director Thailand Resorts, explained that she has adapted the Meridien emergency procedures to include a tsunami.

"The lower floors of the Beach Resort were devastated

by the tsunami," Ms MacDougall said. "As soon as was practicable after the tsunami, we assessed how to deal with the threat of another tsunami.

"The Beach Resort reopened in August, and one of the issues we knew to be critical to our tsunami preparedness was how we would be advised of an approaching tsunami."

She explained that Karon Noi Beach – also referred to as Relax Bay – is quite isolated and this is part of the resort's attraction

"But, despite two letters to Kata-Karon Municipality requesting that a disaster warning tower be installed here, we have heard nothing. We have installed two towers with sirens ourselves, at both ends of the beach here, which will be sounded if we receive a warning.

"This is a large – 470 bedrooms – hotel, and we knew that we had to take the initiative. We have a lot of lives to take care of."

Ms MacDougall said that she put in a request to the then fledgling NDWC in Nonthaburi to be linked to their fax alert system.

"We receive test transmissions via this medium every week, and someone is on hand around the clock, ready to intercept a warning fax as soon as it comes through, and we also have a reciprocal relationship with two hotels – one in Patong and one in Karon – that are close to the warning towers.

"If the sirens sound, these hotels will contact us. If we get the warning first, then we will contact them, and the Yacht Club, naturally."


The Beach Resort has produced a dedicated booklet detailing in English, Thai, French, German, Italian, Russian, Japanese, Chinese and Korean what a tsunami is, what the early indications of one may be, and what to do in the event of a warning being given.

"The booklet is there if people want to familiarize themselves with it, although it seems that some people just put it to one side. Perhaps they don't want to think about it too much – that's one of the reasons why we don't have the tsunami evacuation signs









"We have to find the balance between making people aware, but not scared."

This *Gazette* investigation is – because it would be almost impossible to discuss in detail the disaster preparedness of every hotel on the island – a snapshot.

Attitudes among hoteliers in some cases err on the side of caution by not wishing to upset guests and staff, while others are far more open about it and rightly pride themselves on their plans, for which many guests are grateful.

It appears that Dr Smith may have made his controversial remarks on December 27 without discussing the topic with either hoteliers on Phuket or the NDWC, which would have been able to advise him of hotels already linked to its fax-alert system.

Had he done so, Phuket might have been spared yet more negative column inches.

The last word goes to the GM who wished to remain anonymous. "The cliché that 'All publicity is good publicity' is a myth. Dr Smith might very well have set [Phuket's] tourism industry recovery back another year with what he said.

"We – all hotels here – must now work even harder to make up for any damage done by his comments. But if it means that our guests, and prospective guests, feel more secure about coming here, then it's worth it."

permanently affixed to the walls.

"We have found that many people are taking the brochure home with them as a souvenir. They might do the same with the signs."

Staff on each shift are assigned duties not only for tsunami warnings, but also for any other type of disaster. Emergency boxes have been prepared and a protocol for evacuating guests and staff away from the resort has been established. Staff drill regularly and are encouraged to undergo specialist disaster-preparedness training.

"The plans for the Yacht Club are not the same, because of the different layout of that hotel and the geography of Nai Harn Beach. There will eventually be two disaster-warning sirens down at that beach, but [Le Meridien] will continue with its own systems both there and at the Beach Resort."

JW Marriott Resort & Spa Phuket on Mai Khao Beach – and the group as a whole – also has well-established policies for dealing with all manner of disasters.

Speaking from Singapore, Lee Sutton, Director of Public Relations Asia/Australia, told the Gazette that the Phuket resort, which is some five kilometers from the nearest disaster warning siren, is soon to be linked to the NDWC fax-alert system. In the interim it is in daily contact with the Thai Meteorological Office and other relevant authorities, as well as with other hotels on the island.

"We have border security patrols on the perimeter of the property, which includes the beach, and a full team on property security specialists," said Ms Sutton, "and we conduct quarterly emergency evacuation drills – not specifically for a tsunami, but for any emergency such as fire or flood.

FEEDBACK

"We have always prepared and practiced for disasters, not just since the tsunami."

The resort advises its guests in advance of any drill, and encourages feedback, which Ms Sutton says is positive.

"Marriott's – in this particular case the Phuket resort's – experience of disaster preparedness was put to the test on December 26, 2004," said Ms Sutton. "The then-GM of Marriott Phuket received many compliments from guests afterward as to how calm, professional, efficient and helpful our staff were."

Thanachok Bunthong, GM of Layan Beach Resort & Spa,

echoes the comment from Ms MacDougall of Le Meridien Resorts that reminders of the prospect of a tsunami may be uncomfortable.

"We have an evacuation plan and used to drill our staff, but not for some time; it's too serious for some people and might jog too many bad memories. We want lives to return to normal."

This concern for the feelings of staff and guests is in many ways entirely natural. The tourism industry is picking itself back up, but the idea of a tsunami – rammed into the collective consciousness so terribly 13 months ago – remains relatively new here.

Phuket and other coastal resort regions have not had the years of exposure to the tsunami threat or reality that, for example, Hawaii has – it even boasts a tsunami museum and resource center next to swish hotels.

There, tsunami warning signs and drills are a part of everyday life, but in Phuket, emotions are perhaps still too raw.

Rolf Opitz, GM of the Amora Beach Resort at Bang Tao Beach, said, "I don't like to talk about our [emergency] system and evacuation plans with staff too much because they all want to forget about [the tsunami]." "Keeping it, or the prospect of another one, in their minds too much and making them worry about it might result in them 'transferring' their fears to our guests," he added.

He said, however, that plans are discussed and practiced with staff "...every three or six months".

"The Amora suffered no loss of life during the tsunami. It is, thankfully, safely above sea level. But one of the problems in the Bang Tao area is that we do not have a disaster warning siren nearby. How can we – and the residents in this area, especially the fishing villages and other re-

Each, they said, was in love with the other two.


The groom followed tradition, paying a bride price of a 10-baht-weight gold necklace, 300,000 baht in cash and a car to each bride's family.

There, the 26-year-old Patong resident was waiting to be operated on by doctors after being shot once in the lower rib cage, but he was able to tell Officer Pairin details surrounding the incident before he went into sur-

Sahat had been at his post outside the Vises Hotel in Patong that afternoon when a Thai man asked to be driven to Ao Makam.

After agreeing to a fare of 300 baht, Sahat took him there and was told to turn into the soi leading to Thai Sarco. They followed the soi to the refinery entrance, then turned into a wooded lane and went another 100 meters.





Airport director removed after taxi driver's slaying

PHUKET: Suthara Huangsuwan, the boss of Phuket International Airport, was abruptly moved to a new post in Chiang Mai late last month.

Lt Cdr Boonchart Prompool, former director of the Airport Authority of Thailand's cargo division in Bangkok, has now replaced K. Suthara.

An airport official denied that the transfer was the result of his inability to solve the problem of "black" taxis at Phuket airport, which came to a head on December 16 when a limousine driver was beaten to death in a fight with an unlicensed driver.

The killing resulted in a protest by limousine drivers, which dispersed after their representa-

tives met with Phuket Governor Pongpayome Vasaputi. Amongst other demands, protestors pushed for the removal of Suthara.

Pracha Janpathrak, who was named acting director of the AAT in Phuket until K. Suthara's replacement arrived, told the Gazette that K. Suthara had been moved to Chiang Mai Airport on the instructions of the AAT Governor in Bangkok.

"He was not removed because of the protest. This was simply the time for him to be reassigned. He was not the only person transferred; about 15 other people from other provinces were also moved," K. Pracha explained.

K. Suthara worked at Phuket International Airport for 10 years. For the past three years, he was Airport Director.



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




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FROM THE GULF OF THAILAND

ollowing the tragic and much-publicized murder of 21-year-old Welsh student Katherine Horton on Lamai beach, the Koh Samui authorities are stepping up security and asking for more personnel to protect the island's visitors.

Pol Capt Thirawat Namsitaan, the Head of Samui Tourist Police, says he needs at least 15 more officers to patrol the island's beaches and streets. He recently asked the government in Bangkok to allocate the funds for such recruitment.


In response to his request, Bangkok said that it would transfer five policemen from Haad Yai immediately, with more officers to follow.

Meanwhile, members of the local government recently met with police and immigration officials to discuss strategies to improve safety for tourists around the island.

Suggestions included stepping up marine security, with ID checks for fishermen and daily boat inspections, building special security booths on the beaches, and working together with volunteers and local village security teams to deter crime.

In addition, the Immigration Department has already been granted funds for CCTV units, which will be installed at various crime "hot spots".

Local police are also conducting regular checks at various locations around the island, such as viewpoints, which are popular gathering places for young people.

Samui beefs up policing after tourist murder

Local government members and many other leading Samui figures have expressed their sympathy for the family of Ms Horton, the tourist who was attacked and killed near her bungalow resort on New Year's Day. On January 12, Samui residents gathered on the beach where the attack happened to pay their respects and to leave offerings.

Waragorn Marakorn, the island's Mayor, said the tragedy had made local people more aware of the importance of security and safety for tourists. He feels confident that the island's police will now be able to work together with local people to build a safer Samui.

Visitors and revenue rise: Tourist numbers, and the annual

revenue from tourism, increased significantly in 2005 on Samui, the latter by a healthy three billion baht.

In 2004, Koh Samui generated 15 billion baht in tourism revenue, while in 2005 the figure rose to 18 billion baht. German and British tourists continued to be largest sources of foreign visitors. There was also an increase in the number of Indian and Chinese tourists, the former up by 7%.

Domestic Thai tourism dropped slightly, and the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) said this was most likely due to rising oil prices as many Thai visitors arrive by car and ferry.

According to figures released by the TAT, around 70,000 visitors arrived on Samui, Koh Pha-ngan and Koh Tao to celebrate the New Year. The figures show that Koh Samui welcomed 40,000 visitors during the four-day period, with hotel occupancy levels around 98% and with a total revenue of 500 million baht.

Koh Pha-ngan also did well, with around 20,000 visitors, 100% occupancy and a revenue of 200 million baht. Koh Tao also boomed with 10-15,000 visitors, hotels fully occupied and revenue of 100 million baht.

Bangkok Airways flights were fully booked throughout the New Year and well into January. The company laid on extra services to cope with demand, and

during peak periods Samui's airport handled 70 flights a day.

Despite unpredictable weather and negative press because of the Horton case, the festive season will no doubt be viewed as an economic success for the southern Gulf of Thailand.

Post-flood projects: Lopburi Yothasiri, of the Samui Harbour Department, recently announced that he intends to launch two new projects to guard against future flooding and pollution.

The first project will involve the renovation of a large drainage canal from the mountains to the sea in north Chaweng. This man-made waterway once provided drainage for the entire area, but lack of maintenance and small dams and barriers erected by local villagers have impeded the canal's flow to the sea. This may have been one of the reasons why the flooding in November was so bad.

The second plan is to build a bridge linking Koh Fan, the island that plays host to the Big Buddha statue, with Samui. K. Lopburi believes that the current causeway creates murky waters and pollution. He has already spoken with local village leaders and will apply for a budget for both projects soon.

Chinese New Year in Nathon:


This month sees the beginning of festivities in Nathon to celebrate a special Chinese New Year.

Baby mix-up revealed 10 years later

earning that they had been switched at birth following a hospital mixup, two 10-year-old classmates in Trang Province were afraid to make eye contact with their biological parents when the two families met.

Chamnan and Prathum Janthong live happily with 10year-old Orawan, the girl they have raised as their own. She is the biological daughter of Somjate and Wandee Bunyoo, who love and care for Jeerawuth, the son of Chamnan and Prathum.

The families are distant relatives living in different villages in Yan Ta Khao District.

The mix-up was confirmed by DNA tests overseen by wellknown forensic scientist Khunying Pornthip Rojanasunand. Now all four parents are torn between their love for the child they have raised and their craving to have their biological children back.

State psychiatrists have been assigned to monitor the children's behavior and recommend ways to heal the psychological wounds. Neither of the two children, who come from very different socio-economic backgrounds, said they wanted to live with their biological parents.

The parents will seek a cash settlement from the hospital.

Mama Mia Noi: A government panel chaired by Deputy Prime Minister Wissanu Krea-ngam has approved legal amendments that would empower wives to demand compensation from women involved in ongoing extramarital affairs with their husbands.

The change redresses an inequality in the current law that allows a man to sue for financial compensation from another man who has sex with his lawfully

However, men seeking shortterm sexual gratification, such as by having sex with prostitutes, would not be held accountable.

Another key amendment approved would expand the definition of rape to include sexual violation of any person by any other, regardless of gender.

The current criminal code defines rape as a crime in which the penis of a man penetrates the vagina of an unwilling woman he is not married to.

Bear bones: Mineral Resources Department (MRD) has announced that fossils unearthed five years ago at the Mae Moh lignite mine in Lampang are unique and belong to a previously unknown species of carnivore that became extinct about 10,000

The species was named Maemohcyon potisati Pigne to mark its place of discovery – and also to honor Mineral Resources Department Director-General Somsak Potisati for his support of the geology research.

The fossil is that of an animal that had a head like a dog, but a bear-like body, said Senior MRD Geologist Dr Yaowlak Chaimanee.

It took five years of research with a French expert to confirm that there was no previous record of the species, she added.

Nowadays, capitalism targets children in upper- and middle-class families who have buying power.


This has left about half of Thailand's youth at risk of being led into alcohol, tobacco, narcotics, pornography, online games, gambling and other addictive vices, he said.


Happily Ever After Recent weddings in Phuket High season off to a great start

hat a great high season Phuket is having so far. The island is packed with Russians who, I am told, are eating and drinking like no other nationality – and they're driving resort profits upward.

Occupancy levels at resorts such as the Dusit Laguna and Aspasia at Kata Beach are continuing to climb nearly a month after the New Year holidays. It seems that Phuket really is Back.

I've been playing tour guide to a number of friends who accepted my invitation to check out the renovations and improvements to the island during 2005. I must admit that it can be a bit of a challenge to explain why the extravagant fountains in the middle of Karon and Chalong Circles have no water, or why it is so difficult to get into or out of Central Festival or Tesco-Lotus.

While chauffeuring a group of Canadians between Patong Beach and Kathu, we became

stranded in a three-hour traffic snarl while police worked to move an overturned tour bus.

The problem, I explained, is that vehicles leak motor oil all over the roads, and when there's a downpour of rain, motorcycles, buses and cars slide sideways because they haven't much tread on their tires. While this may be true, it is not very comforting for those touring our island. There's really no way to explain the chaos on the bypass road, except to say that the authorities had been considering digging a tunnel underneath the whole mess but that fell by the wayside when permission for such a project was denied along with the proposal for a road tunnel from Kathu to Patong.

But there are certainly plenty of new attractions to boast about. Both the Holiday Inn and Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort have renovated upscale resorts with a trendy international minimalist themes. And the new Crowne Plaza on Karon Beach is certainly worth a visit.

Tom McNamara, the godfather of the island's restaurant industry, has opened Joe's Downstairs, between his ever-popular Baan Rim Pa and Da Maurizio restaurants. Tom has put together the dream team of food and beverage experts to make Joe's Downstairs one of the major new must-

in the distant Isarn region, and their parents were working in Phuket or Phang Nga when the disaster happened.

But after the tsunami, she decided she wanted to join the International Labour Organization (ILO) project in the Andaman


region to help train women in new job skills.


The ILO project is just winding up, but K. Wanida says she wants to continue to help disadvantaged women who need to support themselves and their families.





ccording to the 2003
Thailand Human Development Report,
Phuket is firmly in the dunce corner when it comes to national health statistics.

The report, which said that 51% of the island's residents exhibited "unhealthy behavior" such as drinking or smoking, or – heaven forbid – both, might lead some to believe that Phuket's party animals constitute a formidable herd.

Yet, believe it or not, there are still *some* people who look after themselves out there.

Still, on an island that features a veritable A-Z of physical challenges, maybe it's time for some of the 51% of local sinners to pull their socks up... and don a pair of running shoes.

Jogging tops the popularity list of activities that get your heart racing and your lungs working overtime, so it stands to reason that a good pair of running shoes is a must for that elite group who prefer to pound Phuket's pavements and parks.

Leading the field at Super Sports at Central Festival Phuket are the Nike Shox 2:40 – a fine pair of running shoes that crosses the finishing line at 4,500 baht.

Among Super Sports' newer releases are Nike's Air Perseus, costing 3,400 baht. Designed to support and stabilize your center of gravity, you'll soon be challenging cheetahs in these babies. The treads feature what is called "flex groove" in order to give you a smoother run.

Talking of big cats, we shouldn't forget Puma – a company that boasts a huge color range to suit both sexes and a wide range of tastes.

But if you're more than a jogger there's a whole gamut of sports shoes to run, from tennis shoes to golf, aerobic, basketball and just plain casual after-sport loafers.

All the usual suspects are there: Nike, Adidas, Reebok and Puma.

There are even sports sandals with go-faster stripes for those who like to feel active even when they're just lounging around.

So if you're looking for a bit of sole in your life, don't be a heel; have a run in with a good pair of sports shoes and get jogging. You'll soon be on your uppers again.

Managing mozzies: if they won't buzz off, then trap them

s anyone who has ever sat on a veranda or out in the garden at night knows, mosquitoes may be small but they're pretty pesky and can carry dangerous diseases to boot

The ubiquitous mosquito coil is one way of keeping the buzz out of your life, and at 12-16 baht a box they're certainly not going to break anyone's bank.

Still, the resulting odor can be a little overpowering for sensitive types, as coils can sometimes result in stinging eyes and coughing fits because of the esbiothrin pesticide content.

SPRAYS

Only female mosquitoes bite humans, and they're attracted to the carbon dioxide we emit.

We cannot stop breathing in order to escape being bitten, but at least we can conclude that male mosquitoes must be really nice guys.

Seriously, though, if coils are annoying, and sprays or the chemicals in rub-on protection cream are not to our liking, what can we do?

In the old days farmers would burn coconut husks to keep the pesky critters away, but in the million-baht plus granite-and-teak erections that are going up around the island burning husks in the hallway

might seem a little vulgar to some.

Surely there must be a simpler solution?

Thankfully there is, and it comes in the form of what is called a "Korean black hole".

The Black Hole Standard Protection is a machine that lures and then captures mozzies within an area of nine square meters.

Basically, the machine emits carbon dioxide as the result of titanium dioxide being exposed to ultraviolet rays.

The mosquitoes are attracted to it and then sucked into a container where they eventually die.

Titanium dioxide, by the way, has been used as a (harmless) food additive in the

US for the past 39 years, and it's more than likely that you consumed quite a lot of it in all that chocolate you ate over Christmas.

It's also used in air purifiers. By the way, if you have an aquarium, the resulting dead mosquitoes make excellent fish food.

Another option that uses the same method is the Honeywell MA06 Mosquito Indoor Trap.

Like the Black Hole, the machine is silent. All you do is simply plug it in and it'll do the rest for you.

Both models are available at Index Living Mall.

The Black Hole retails at 3,900 baht, and the Honeywell at 3,200 baht.

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Public holidays and notable dates in 2006

January 31:

Muharram (Islamic New Year). Islamic holiday.

February 13:

Makha Bucha Day, Makha Bucha Day, which falls on the full moon of the third lunar month, commemorates the Lord Buddha's ordaining of 1,250 monks who had arrived unannounced from afar only seven months after the Buddha began his teachings, and also the date on which the Buddha delivered his Fundamental Teachings just months before his death.

January 29:

Chinese New Year. Under Chinese astrology, this year – Year 4703 by the Chinese calendar – will be the Year of the Dog.

April 6:

Chakri Day. Commemorates the origins of Thailand's reigning Chakri dynasty, founded by Rama I, who established Bangkok as the nation's capital. HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej is the ninth monarch of the Chakri dynasty.

Events in red are official public holidays for both public and private sectors. Government offices and banks are closed on these days.

April 11:

Mawlid al-Nabi (the Prophet Muhammad's birthday). Islamic holiday.

April 13-15:

Songkran (**Thai New Year**). Public holiday. Also known as the Water Festival, and held during the driest months in Thailand, Songkran is celebrated by Thais throughout the country by pouring – traditionally only a little, but these days more playfully a lot – of water on other people to wish them good luck for the New Year.

May 1:

Labor Day. Holiday for private sector workers; government offices are open.

May 5:

Coronation Day. Coronation Day commemorates the ascension to the throne of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej on May 5, 1950.

May 11:

Royal Ploughing Ceremony Day. This occasion,

which predates Buddhism, marks the beginning of the rice-planting season. The Ploughing Lord – appointed by HM the King – performs ancient rites and attempts to forecast the rainfall for the coming months, to predict whether there will be a bountiful harvest.

May 12:

Visakha Bucha. Held to commemorate the birth, enlightenment and death of the Lord Buddha.

July 10:

confess that Phuket has become my place in the sun, and if not actually the paradise it is often cracked up to be, the search that we misfits, defectors, heiresses and lonely hearts undertake to get here is still worth it.

Work in the morning, a quick swim and then a decent lunch at a beachside restaurant, followed by a round of golf at Blue Canyon Country Club (BCCC) is almost as much fun as one body—anybody—can take in a day.

Well, my body can take a great deal more. And dash it all, I deserve more! Relaxing with a whisky and soda after bashing a small, white dimpled ball from here to eternity, my eyes fall upon enticing photographs of BCCC's spa.

Club – steady ladies – firmly in hand, I stride manfully to the spa, demanding that my weary body be pulled, pressed, pummeled, oiled, stroked, manipulated and caressed back to the state it was in before. Preferably the state it was in about 10 years ago.

TRUSTING

The greeting I receive as I walk into the reception area is as light, refreshing and welcoming as the reception room itself. Scents fill the air as I am ushered to a seat and given a much-needed cup of cool lemongrass infusion and a chilled face towel, as I give the spa menu the once-over.

Being a trusting sort of chap, however, I offer myself up to the delightful Nicole Kochornswasdi, the Assistant Director of Club Operations, and her equally delightful staff.

I sense – correctly – that I am being read. The Gold Room, and a Canyon Royale treatment (3,500 baht) plus facial (1,900 baht), is prescribed. Gold relates to the *manipura* or solar plexus *chakra*, and is associated with mental functioning, power, control, freedom to be oneself and career. Glad to know that I am not in need of orange or *svadhisthana*.

My therapists – yes, plural – K. Priaew and K. Wa, gently guide me to the Gold Room. My

spa bath, replete with unguents, has already been drawn. I disrobe and am cosseted by the gentle bubbles for 15 minutes.

Scanning the room from my two-seater bath, which has a view to the hills, I am taken by the subtlety of the lighting and the swatch of buttermilk-yellow cotton that loops gracefully from one wall and to the ceiling, before cascading down before the window next to my bath.

I have a quick shower before being greeted again by K. Priaew and K. Wa, who bring me a cup of warm ginger infusion. I am now lying down, and K. Priaew whispers in my ear to ask if the temperature is to my liking and if the music is too loud. Such personal attention is intoxicating.

Both are just right, with the music, which at times sounds not unlike *Le Onde* by Ludovico Einaudi, deeply calming.

One therapist begins at my shoulders, the other at my feet. Their strokes, which are in perfect synchronization, are weighted identically. Working in unison, they are like a benign Kali. The scent of the Decléor oils used in this mélange of Thai, Balinese and Swedish aroma-therapy massage is heady.

This is bliss. No, really, I am in a state of spiritual joy. Far from drifting off into the arms of Somnus, I am preternaturally aware of everything. My breathing, the gentle *swish* of the therapists' hands gliding on my body, each stimulated nerve ending ... somehow, even a bird's song from a nearby tree is in harmony with the minimalist piano music.

It is ecstasy, and strangely all rather moving; I want to book myself in for a few astral weeks at this soul asylum.

After an hour or so front and

back, K. Wa retires, leaving K. Priaew to revitalize my tanned face for an hour, her gentle fingers first applying a scented eye mask before delicately scrubbing and toning away the effects of 18 holes of golf in the tropical sun.

A face mask – my first one ever – is followed by another round of exfoliation and toning before final moisturising.

I walk on air to a quick shower, where I am careful not to wash off the emollients, before enjoying another cup of lemongrass tea, grateful to K. Prieaw and K. Wa for their delicate attentions.

BCCC received *SpaAsia* magazine's 2005 Crystal Award for the Best Golf & Spa Destination, and for good reason. By turns tantalizing, stimulating and uplifting, it's a haven when the pleasures of paradise become too much.

he grunge look may still be around, but there is little room for depression and angst in Patong these days. Heading out for a good time with good friends and some musical entertainment for less than the cost of a round-trip taxi ride to the airport, we forgo Soi Bangla in favor of a Gorilla. And I don't mean wading through all three hours of King Kong at the movies, either.

The flaming guitar, a huge gorilla clone and Arnie's bug bear, the Predator – all lurking at Rock City on Patong's Thaweewong Rd, prove irresistible.

Opened in November last year, this scaled-down rock 'n' roll concert hall – which used to be home to a Japanese restaurant – now hosts some of the best tribute bands from Europe. For those of us who are into AC/DC, Bon Jovi, the Stones and Linkin Park, this is the place to go.

RIVETING

The atmospheric interior features zebra-striped bar stools, as comfortable as they look, but, having settled into one of the sofas upstairs with a Heineken in hand (130 baht), only the music could lure me onto my feet. And the bands playing before the headline act were absolutely riveting.

Rock City's musical entertainment for men and women, young and old – a real international crowd – starts at 11 pm. It is already busy by then, although, thank goodness, it hasn't quite reached its capacity of 500

"There is space at the outside bar for an additional 60 people, I believe," says George Svensson, Managing Director of Rock City, and one of the three founding partners.

"Rock City attracts people who enjoy genuine rock 'n' roll. Some of our customers are in





their 40s and they bring along their children to see the show," he says. "Others are in their 20s, here with girlfriends or boyfriends, while still more are in their 50s and 60s, just coming to hang out with friends.

"Our concept is to offer a kind of rock concert four nights a week. That's why we rigged up a big stage right in the center, with a serious lighting system. The food and drink are peripheral."



Peripheral perhaps, and Patong-priced, but when you consider that there's no cover charge for the quality of entertainment, well... dig in. You can't go wrong with the Rock City Snack Plate Combo – tenderloin chunks,

chicken and spring rolls – for 240 baht, and the Metal Heart Entrecôte for 540 baht comes with tomato, coleslaw, creamed mushrooms and a baked potato. The servings are a little larger than average.

The line-up of mighty music is also served with a smile. U-Turn specializes in rock classics and current hits - fantastic drumming, bass and lead vocals. U-Turn even does a turn or two in Thai, which inspires much squealing of delight from the Thai female members of the audience. The AC/DC tribute band that hit the stage at 12:30 was, on occasion, mistaken for the real thing, and next up is the Metallica tribute band, Nostalgica.

Leaving a strong impression, too, is the super-sized rather angry-looking King Kong clone hovering over the stage that George says symbolizes the pure power of rock music. This one was custom-made based on a model in his collection.

MODELS

George is not only a former drummer in a Swedish group of some fame in his homeland, but also a long-time movie buff and a collector of action figures and models from big science-fiction films such as Alien.

Movie madness also inspired him to place a larger-than-lifesize model of the Predator outside Rock City's front entrance.

The model is now attracting many people just to get their picture taken beside it.

Rock City, located at 188/1 Thaweewong Rd, Patong Beach, is poised to become a Patong landmark.

You can't miss the giant guitar outside proclaiming, "Rock 'n' roll never dies".

he four-wheel-drive lurched suddenly to one side as we forded a deep stream. King, my old friend and an excellent driver, laughed quietly as our American clients in the rear became a little alarmed. "Always good to give them a little shock," he chuckled as we began to climb high into the hills.

We were checking out a 4WD rally route for a special adventure day, and King was certainly giving us all a rough ride. This location, 60 kilometers north of Chiang Mai, is the start of the true hill-tribe areas, and the valleys are riddled with off-road tracks that connect the many outlying villages.

It's an ideal location for soft adventure enthusiasts as there is a wide range of options available. There is whitewater rafting (on the Mae Taeng River) and canoeing. Also possible are half-day to six-day trekking programs, and overnight stays are an attractive option in several of the local hill-tribe villages. Mountain-biking tours are popular, as are off-road 4WD safari-style tours.

Alternatively, for the more sedentary and less adventurous, you can head for the hills and stay



at a wonderful little resort we discovered – the Baan Rai Lanna – and simply relax with a book beside their small pool. We found this accommodation purely by accident while scouting earlier in the week for possible new offroad routes.

The resort nestles into the hillside with its gardens bordered by small paddy fields (they grow their own jasmine rice). The six bungalows are simple but very elegant, comfortable and homely. All the typically Lanna-style buildings have been carefully designed to blend in with the natural beauty of the area, and the resort has two small streams running through its gardens. The

small infinity pool offers great views of the surrounding hills.

Opened just a few weeks ago by an adventurous English couple, Scott and Lora, the Baan Rai Lanna really is a wonderful location to use as a base to explore this beautiful region. The resort's manager, Khun Ae, is a wonderful and charming hostess who personally looks after all new arrivals.

The resort also offers a wide range of half-day and full-day tours and activities to explore the area with knowledgeable local guides. Scott also enjoys taking his guests out personally, and he especially enjoys discovering new trekking routes.

This is really one of the most natural resorts I've found in my many years of traveling in the north, and it is a definite must for all true nature lovers. A double room with breakfast in high season will cost 2,700 baht per night. Accommodation is limited, so it is essential to book in advance.

HOW TO GET THERE

For the budget minded: by bus from Chiang Mai Bus Terminal to Mae Malai town which is located approximately 10km south of the resort. Buses run frequently throughout the day (cost from 80 baht, depending on the type of bus). When at Mae Malai, call the resort and staff there will be pleased to collect you.

Alternatively, you can rent a 4WD: two rental companies that I have often used are: North Wheels, Tel: 053-874478 www. northwheels.com and Pop Rent a Car at Tel: 053-276014. Prices start from 1,600 baht a day plus VAT. Please note that it is worth hiring a 4WD just to have the chance of heading into the hills for a while. When taking a self-drive tour, make sure you take a guide or someone who really knows the area. It's easy to get lost or stuck, so beware!



The Golden Fleece

Hello again, dearies. Lis has been busy digging out those juicy cyber truffles from under several Internet trees for your delicate tastes. This week we have those icky jet-skis, what seems to be the national pastime of farang-fleecing, and some straight talk about Patong. As our North American cousins would say: "Enjoy!"

by saying that in \$US terms, prices have not increased that much in the last three years but that is beside the point. US visitors make up a very small percentage of the total number of visitors to Phuket and therefore these figures and constant steep price increases are unjustified. Indeed all of the expenses paid in the running, maintenance and general operation of these hotels are paid in Thai baht so this is just another excuse by Thai businesses to fleece the foreign visitor. In Thai baht terms, a lot of the hotels now charge rates that are two and a half times as much as they did just three years ago which without any corresponding increase in quality or service is quite simply daylight robbery.'

Phuket to get its house in order. But the window is closing fast as the vicissitudes of local interests and politics dwarf the good intentions of the authorities in Bangkok. One can't help but ask how long the sand of Patong beach will remain white, or will the umbrellas and beer bars again swamp the beaches, will the scooters drown out the sound of the sea? And the doubts about favoring small-time vendors over big businesses that tend to favor closing off the beaches will have to be answered. Last but not least, the traffic in Phuket is getting bad because of the number of shopping malls that have been built without proper attention being paid to the need to plan for car routing." (4)

Yes I know that health and safety is not high on the Thais list of priorities but just wondered if anyone had ever tried to bring something to the authorities attention and what result they'd had?... Put it this way, there have been numerous things seen and witnessed in Phuket, which could very simply be corrected. I talked to my missus about these issues, and what could be done. When I suggested that we talk to someone that might be able to do something about it, I was told don't be silly, that would just get your name listed somewhere and possibility draw attention to yourself."

A solid political history of Thailand

The author, Barend Jan Terwiel, is a Dutchman who first came to Thailand in 1962 at the age of 21. He spent a period as a Buddhist monk and taught Thai history at the Australian National University for more than 20 years. He is the author of a dozen noise and show. books on Thai history.

He opens his account with an unfortunate and boring account of the hierarchical lavers of society in the late Ayudhaya period, but then the pace picks up in the second chapter when King Taksin strides onto the scene:

Between 1759 and 1767 the Siamese lost many battles, much manpower, wealth and resources. However, out of the devastation arose a military genius who built up an efficient, hardhitting army, accustomed to bloodshed. This man, usually known by the name of Taksin, occupied the centre of the Siamese stage from 1769 until 1782."

Before the rise of the aggressive King Allaungphaya of Burma, the Siamese had generally been at peace with their neighbor. In any case, battles were often a matter of bluff,

Things changed with the Surmese invasion of 1765. When the Siamese army assembled in great numbers upon the field of battle in Suphan Buri, the Burmese went straight for the jugular.

"The Burmese demonstrated to the Siamese that the new phase evolved over the last century in mainland Southeast Asian warfare was there to stay," Terwiel writes.

"This referred to the direct, fast, and efficient attack where troops were pushed to the limit and men killed indiscriminately in order to gain a victory. At that time the Siamese leaders had

neither the effective command nor the measure of control over the troops to withstand such allout attacks."

They would learn soon enough. Taksin and his military protégés, including the founders of the Chakri dynasty, would lead lightning attacks to wrest back Siamese sovereignty over its heartland.

In general, Terwiel concurs with the assessment of Prince Damrong, "The Father of Thai History", that the first five kings of the Chakri dynasty were extraordinary in their intelligence, energy and effectiveness, along with their advisers in the Bunnag

In a study of his own irces, he differs in some details from the standard schoolbook version of Thai history. He believes that accounts of Taksin's insanity were exaggerated – in his last years, he was eccentric and irascible but certainly not mad and that he was decapitated, not beaten to death in a sack.


His attitude toward Sisuriyawong Bunnag, the prime power in Siam during the early years of King Chulalongkorn's reign, is also more balanced.

He is often portrayed as a reactionary in the face of the young King's early reforms, but he was also a progressive and end of the Bunnag family's fortunes came with Sisuriyawong's son, Won, who "turned out a great disappointment. Won has been described as a man who blatantly used his powerful position for his own private advantage, enriching himself at the cost of his subordinates, and as being 'a man without talent or strength of charac-

The socially awkward son of King Chulalongkorn also proved a disappointment.

Prince Damrong summed up the situation: "The authority of the sovereign had fallen much in respect and confidence, the treasury was on the verge of bankruptcy, and the government was corrupted and the services more or less in confusion."

The Porsche Cayman S: sublime or just girlie?

ritain's Autocar described it as a "brilliant new Porsche", and the Financial Times called the Cayman "the most sublime and capable car Porsche has ever built".

But I don't like it!

While I was strolling past the Porsche stand at last October's Tokyo show with a colleague (also a Phuket resident), he remarked: "It's a girlie car..."

The truth of the matter is that the new Porsche Cayman is basically a Boxster coupé – and it does not work as such. True, it is extremely quick and has the usual Porsche refinement, and because it is mid-engined it handles better – particularly in the wet – than the more twitchy, rear-engined Porsche 911. But it somehow lacks the presence that the 911 has possessed for more than 40 years.

BBC TV's *Top Gear* presenter Jeremy Clarkson remarked, "It has no sense of passion." And that about sums it up: on paper, even on the road, it performs well, handles impeccably and makes all the right noises – but somehow it lacks that indefinable something.

The Porsche people, perhaps understandably, do not refer to the Cayman as a "Boxster Coupé"; they maintain that it is a standalone model. They say its chassis is as much as 150% stiffer than the Boxster, offering improved handling and road-holding, with no loss of comfort.

The engine is perhaps the most interesting aspect of the Cayman S: a 3.4-liter, horizontally



opposed six, developing 295bhp (217kW), the Cayman can accelerate from a standstill to 100kmh in an amazing 5.4 seconds, and it goes on to a top speed of 275kmh.

The six-cylinder block is based on the 3.2-liter unit from the Boxster S, but is fitted with cylinder heads and the VarioCam system from the 911 Carrera. This variable valve management improves mid-range torque, peaking at 340Nm between 4,000rpm and 6,000rpm.

The suspension is stiffer than the Boxster's, with firmer dampers. In addition, Porsche's highly acclaimed stability management system is fitted, which incorporates traction- and skid-control. Active suspension is optional, allowing the driver to select a variety of damper settings according to the conditions.

Also optional are ceramic composite brakes, although the regular discs are cross-drilled and internally vented. The ceramic brakes are a massive 350 millimeters in diameter but are considerably lighter than the normal steel ones.

Six airbags offer maximum passive safety, including head and thorax bags, while there are the

usual seatbelt pre-tensioners and belt force limiters.

Although the Cayman S is larger than the Boxster, it is still strictly a two-seater with the space behind the seats filled with engine; the trunk is behind that. There is also another, smaller, luggage compartment at the front.

Porsche maintains that the styling of the Cayman is reminiscent of the famed Porsche 550 Coupé Le Mans racer of 1953. Ironically, the iconic status of the 550 was confirmed by James Dean's tragic death in one in

The front end is unmistakably Boxster-inspired, although its separate fog lamps set into the air intakes add a touch of distinction, but the rear treatment is unique to the Cayman despite the use of Boxster lights. Inside the car it is 99% Boxster, as is the windshield, although this is set lower.

The performance of the Cayman S is certainly impressive: Porsche claims it can lap the Nordschleif, the northern circuit of the Nurburgring, in just eight minutes 20 seconds – faster than a Boxster and only marginally slower than a 911 Carrera.

It is still the styling that in this critic's view lets the new car down. But whether you love it or hate it, the Cayman is undoubtedly going to be a huge success for Porsche, reinforcing its position as the most profitable automaker in the world.

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Hotels must prepare now for another tsunami

As our Inside Story this week (pages 4 and 5) reports, some hoteliers in Phuket are ambivalent about how to prepare for the possibility of another tsunami.

While they say they recognize the need to be prepared, these hoteliers are also reluctant to scare guests and depress staff who were affected by the tsunami, by reminding them of the 2004 disaster through regular emergency drills, through literature and through signage for tsunami escape routes.

This reluctance is understandable, but misplaced. The world has changed. As much as one may wish to return to pre-tsunami normality, the earth's crust took a severe beating from the earth-quake that gave birth to the tsunami. The quake moved Phuket Island 34 centimeters; sink holes appeared in Satun; and there have been earthquakes – possibly connected, possibly not – as far north as Chiang Mai.

The people of Phuket must learn to live with this changed geology and with the threat of another major quake and tsunami.

Reluctant hoteliers must do the same. They have a moral duty to look after those in their premises – both guests and staff. If this is not enough of an incentive, then they need to consider the potentially serious financial penalties to be paid by hotels that do not prepare thoroughly.

They must consider the possibility that failure to prepare and practice for another tsunami could – if there is another giant wave – lead to them being buried in lawsuits by those who lose family members or who are injured.

As the head of the National Disaster Warning Center, Dr Smith Thammasaroj, noted somewhat unsubtly soon after the tsunami, "...these farang love to sue". People from other parts of the world, even Thailand, might also do likewise.

The reluctant hoteliers should also consider whether insurance companies will pay out again in the event of another disaster if the hotels' management cannot prove that they did everything possible to mitigate injury and loss of life.

Insurance companies took a huge hit last time, and are unlikely to feel too generous toward hotels that are not prepared for next time. Hoteliers who have not yet put their disaster plans in place – and rigorously practiced them – should examine how things are done in Hawaii or Japan.

Sensitivity to people's emotions comes naturally in Thailand, and particularly in the hotel community, but in this case it is misplaced.

y father does not live in the house with us, but every day he comes by to visit. He rents a house in Phuket City because it's too far for him to return to Kamala every day after his work.

I got a scholarship from my school that came from donations made by *farang*, and some from the government. I am not sure how much it is, but most of it was put in the bank. My father gives it to my older sister, and she gives me 20 baht each day for spending money.

The government rebuilt the school and now it has four floors, not two like it did before. We also get special training, such as at a camp they sent us to at the Satree Phuket School. They taught us about the sea, the coral and how to keep an eye on the ocean to tell if another tsunami might be coming. I don't know who organized it, though. The teachers just told us we were going, so we went. That was in December, be-

FIRST PERSON

Namala lost her mother, two younger sisters and her home in the tsunami disaster. A new house was built at the same location by a kind-hearted foreigner.

The badly damaged Baan Kamala school she attends was rebuilt by the Royal Thai Navy and renamed the Ratchaprachanukro 36 School, now under Royal Patronage.

A burning issue at Saphan Hin

She reported to me that she saw no procedures there for removing batteries from the garbage before it is burnt.

Burning batteries will result in heavy metal particles being emitted from the plant to rain down on the surrounding area.

Is it really true that the municipal incinerator has no procedures for disposing of such hazadous materials, or was she just not listening again?

My daughter recently went on a ket, Bandit Jantawut, replies:

At the incinerator we do have procedures to separate garbage.

For example, building materials, fuel tanks and televisions, as well as batteries, cannot be burnt. Food scraps, plastics, wood and paper, however, are. Ash from this waste is then used as material to construct roads.

Metal items are buried in a landfill site, which is lined with PVC sheeting to contain the waste. This waste is then covered by soil, and vented to allow gases to be released. Levels of gas emissions are routinely monitored, as are levels of mercury, to ensure that they remain within safe limits.

Illegally dumping waste

In Soi Nanai 2 in Patong is an area of waste ground that used to lead to the OTOP market. For the past six months the area has been used as an ad hoc garbage dump.

There are signs warning people against illegal dumping but people seem to ignore them. What can be done?

The Director of Public Health and Environmental Science of Patong Municipality, Virat Jinda, replies:

It is our duty to remove any waste dumped in Patong. If someone calls us about illegal dumping, we will come and remove the waste. We will also try to find out who did this and tell them to stop.

If they ignore our request we will fine them although we we prefer cooperation and for people to use their conscience as their guide. This is an increasing problem.

Buying a secondhand car

How can I ensure a secondhand car is what it seems? How can I check that there is no outstanding loan or any financing on the vehicle? Is there a professional organization that can help?

Theerayuth Prasertphol, Chief Technical Officer, Phuket Province Transportation Office (PPTO), replies:

Prospective buyers can verify a car's condition at a garage.

As for financial status, you can find out whether or not a secondhand car has any outstanding payments with any private credit company by checking with the PPTO's Registration Department, because if a person buys a car on finance and uses the car

as collateral for the loan, then the car will remain in the finance company's name until the final payment is made.

As far as I know, there are no professional organizations that check on the financial or mechanical status of a used car.

The Gazette notes:

If the current owner has taken out a private loan with a friend or a local loan shark, using the car as collateral, it is most likely that the lender will hold the log book until the loan is repaid.

Paying for the car will necessitate a three-cornered meeting between buyer, seller and lender.

As to choosing a garage, it's wise to check with friends first, to see which one they would recommend – or not.

Q&A: How to hook up

Week in the *Phuket Gazette* and always learn something new. I wanted to ask your advice on which Internet solution you recommend on Phuket. I live near Surin Beach. Ideally I would like to have a fairly fast connection that's affordable. Reliability is key. I currently have two TOT phone lines and use dial-up with Loxinfo at the moment ... painful.

It is also possible, I understand, to link into the fiber-optic cable running around the island. I read that Pacific Internet now has a direct link into Singapore: any recommendations?

Thanks, KB. John Seebach and I now trade off writing the computer column in the *Gazette* on alternate weeks, so he deserves (at least) half of your praise!

My schedule this past year has been horrendous, and with the arrival of Windows Vista later this year, I have four books that need to be rewritten. So life is going to get more hectic, if that's physically possible.

Most people find dial-up frustrating: at 30Kbps (30,000 bits per second), you can download small amounts of mail or surf in slow motion, but heaven help you if you need to update Windows or look at a large graphic image like a map or house drawing

The bad news is that ADSL (broadband) in Phuket sometimes rivals dial-up speeds. It's not unusual to see 30Kbps to 40Kbps in the afternoon and evening on the government-sponsored 1,000-baht-a-month lines.

The good news is, at least

in my experience, ADSL speeds are not getting any worse, and may slowly be getting better. That's remarkable, considering that we are well into high season and demand should be growing quickly.

Some people swear by GPRS, using a mobile phone, at 30-40Kbps. Most pricing schemes leave you paying by the bit, which is always a bad idea, but you can check out the details at the DTAC shop in the basement of Big C.

By far the majority of fast lines in Phuket use the ADSL service from TOT or TT&T (both of which work with CAT for outbound connections).

ADSL-SAVVY

Check with your phone company to see if you can put ADSL on your existing phone line: the TOT office near Power Buy in Central Festival mall and TT&Ts office near the banks in Central Festival both have ADSL-savvy service people who speak good English.

The main concern is whether your house sits close enough to the phone company's switch, as ADSL has severe distance constraints. Don't worry. You can put ADSL on an existing phone line – the ADSL-enabled line will continue to work for regular telephone connections, faxes and the like.

My experiences with the TOT and TT&T ADSL services have been the subject of many diatribes in this column. As for speed, in the mornings I frequently get 1,200Kbps at my home office in Andaman Hills (TT&T), and 800Kbps at the Sandwich Shoppe in Patong (TOT).

Generally those numbers fall by half around noontime, and usually go into the 100-200 range by late afternoon, with dips down to 30Kbps or 40Kbps not unusual at

Given a choice, I would choose TT&T over TOT, both because of the speed difference, and because TOT still has not figured out how to configure its servers automatically, so you have to manually override the TOT settings – a constant irritant.

At one point, we were all hoping that Phuket would be able to connect to the Internet backbone, which runs fairly close to the island.

I've been told that an economic analysis of the situation proved that it just wasn't worth the expense; it makes far more sense to improve the connection to Bangkok.

It remains to be seen how much effort will be devoted to that worthy cause.

As for Pacific Internet, I have great hopes. John Seebach has written about this and the direct link to Singapore in his col-

umn and promises more details as the service becomes available.

My initial experiences have not been positive: I checked their website, and could find no information about Phuket connections. I sent an email to the address listed on the website, and got no response.

I, for one, would welcome an affordable, reliable, reasonably fast connection.

I have just bought a new computer. I cannot say I am impressed with XP. Windows 98 was easier. One thing that annoys me is that XP assumes that one is always connected to the Internet. I have a dial-up connection, and sometimes I need to connect to the Internet manually, so that certain programs (like anti-virus updates) will work. How can I connect to the Internet in XP? It was easy in 98.

If you want to connect to the Internet directly, click Start | Control Panel | Network and Internet Connections | Network Connections. There should be an icon for your dial-up connection (say, one that says Loxinfo or something similar).

Right-click on the icon and choose Create Shortcut. When Windows offers to put it on the desktop, click Yes.

Go back out to your desktop. You should see a new icon

there that says "Shortcut To" and the name of your dial-up connection. Double-click on that icon any time you want to start the connection manually.

I have the latest version of Windows Media Player. When I try to play a VCD on my computer, I get a message, "Windows Media Player cannot play the file. One or more codecs required to play the file could not be found." Why won't WMP play my VCDs?

WMP needs codecs (coder/decoder programs) in order to translate the data that's on CDs into a form that your computer can handle.

Originally WMP shipped without any codecs except those for Microsofts proprietary WMA and WMV files – if you have the old WMP, you can't even play (or rip or burn) MP3 music files.

NOT ENOUGH CASH

Fortunately, Microsoft saw the error of its ways and decided to stop trying to sell you an MP3 codec. (The fact that Apple shipped MP3 codecs free in its iTunes media player may have had some influence on Microsoft's decision.) Recent versions of Windows Media Player all have free MP3 codecs.

But Microsoft continues to try to sell you codecs for DVD and VCD files. I guess it doesn't have enough money.

The simplest solution: download and install the free trial version of WinDVD (www. intervideo.com/jsp/WinDVD_Download.jsp). When you install WinDVD, the codecs come free and they stay around even if you decide not to buy WinDVD.

Windows Media Player will find the codecs and use them. Or at least try to use them. The simple fact is that WinDVD runs rings around WMP when it comes to playing VCDs and DVDs. You may just find yourself shelling out the 1,600 baht for a registered copy.

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

Open-air food court targets the hungry

PHUKET CITY: Although many Phuket businesses are still, it seems, languishing in the post-tsunami doldrums, shopping and dining will bring in the punters, according to Sujittra Kanokvanichakul, Marketing Manager of the Jatujak-Phuket Co, which opened its Tor Roong open-air food court at JJ Market earlier

Open from 4 pm to midnight daily, the 3,200-square-meter area – part of JJ Market's 16-rai parcel on Phang Nga Rd - of-

fers shoppers the chance to snack on local classics such as pad Thai or noodle soup for between 25 and 35 baht a dish, as well as a selection of beers, at any of the 40-odd food stalls currently occupied.

"Tor Roong will also have a play zone for children and an 'activity zone' for daily live music and promotional events," K. Sujittra told the *Gazette*. "We are focusing on food and shopping first, however," she added.

K. Sujittra said that she expects the remaining 30 or so food stalls to be occupied soon, each paying 6,000 baht a month for a 9-sqm plot or 5,000 baht per month for an 8-sqm site, with electricity included in the rent.

She claimed that JJ Market expects to recoup its 400,000baht investment in developing the food stall site within six months.

"Tor Roong is attracting an 80:20 split between Thais and foreigners at the moment," she claimed. "Although with our marketing strategy of Thai and English-language advertising on several radio stations, billboards and flyers, we expect this to become 50:50 eventually."

Phuket tops in the south for foreign investors

PHUKET: Despite the tsunami on December 26, 2004, the year 2005 saw an increase of 119 in the number of businesses registered in Phuket, compared with 2004.

Veerachai Tantiwathana-vallop, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Business Development Office (BDO), told the Gazette that Phuket ranks as the top province in Southern Thailand in company reg-

Between January 1 and December 30 last year, 1,666 new limited partnerships and limited companies were registered – 119 more than in 2004. Some 321 businesses were deregistered compared with 546 in 2004.

K. Veerachai added that about 70-80% of the newly registered businesses have foreign investors or partners.

He said, "I always ask foreign investors why they are interested in investing in Phuket and they answer that the return on investment is healthy and relatively speedy, that there is good service [from the government] and the paperwork for setting up a business is relatively easy.

"Nowadays in Phuket we have business investors of every nationality because Phuket is so popular with tourists. The situation is different from before; in the past most of the investors came from Germany, Britain, Denmark and the US. Most of last year's investors were involved in the tourist industry, though not so many in service businesses such as resorts or hotels," he added.

He said that, in his view, too many people were opening restaurants and that if a new venture was not outstanding in this field, and was not in a good location, it would almost certainly fail.

Leading registrations last year were spa and fitness centers, followed by luxury property and land developments. Also vibrant was the diving sector, along with swimming pool installation and mainte-

As for the property market, he said, it is moving inland and upwards. Buyers are showing preferences for hillside residences, perhaps as an after-effect of the tsunami, but also perhaps because land nearer the coast has become so expen-

"Even though tourists were slow in returning to Phuket after the tsunami the investors were not – they were back in force just two months after the wave hit," K. Veerachai said.

"I feel that 2006 will be another good year for Phuket. In only the first few days of the year we have had 10 new companies registering. People who own a lot of land can make big profits this year because foreigners like to stay here," he concluded.

As of December 30 last year, there were 10,925 companies registered in Phuket. Registration fees collected by the BDO rose slightly in 2005, from 33.1 million baht the previous year to 33.3 million.







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he rise in the price of gold has grabbed the attention of the media and, if the volume of email I receive from readers of this column is any indication, private investors as well. Many fund managers also share this view.

Gold is a commodity that somehow grips the human imagination. Outside of oil – and to a lesser extent natural gas - minimal attention is given by the public to other commodities. It may come as a surprise to many people that some grades of coal almost quadrupled in price during 2005. Many other commodities such as silver also recorded significant gains.

It seems likely that the price of gold will continue on an upward trend in 2006 - and there are many reasons for this assessment.

They include a rapidly rising number of people in Asia and other regions of the world who have achieved at least a modicum of wealth for the first time in their lives.

RESERVES

The vast majority of these people are not sophisticated investors; their newly acquired wealth, even if it is modest amounts, will be placed in three major areas: property, cash in bank deposits and/

Asian central banks are holding gigantic sums of money in foreign exchange reserves. They have only to invest – collectively – a tiny percentage of these assets in gold to make a significant impact on global demand.

The head of one foreign exchange trading company recently stated that the average daily turnover in the world gold market equates roughly to the daily trading volumes of the Polish zloty.

Additionally, private and institutional investors are seeking alternatives to real estate, stock-

markets and bonds. The introduction of exchange traded funds (ETFs), which trade in an identical manner to shares on stockmarkets, now include, in some countries, gold ETFs, which are actually backed by physical gold.

Why buy the actual metal when you can buy it in paper format at the click of a switch? This makes it simple for pension funds, mutual funds and hedge funds to hold, and is an alternative to buying gold shares.

There is also an increased aversion to risk in the global investment community. This has been spurred by various factors; fears of natural disasters, terrorism, pandemics and substantial global current account imbalances.

There are fears of inflation, but this is almost exclusively confined to the general public. The reason for this dichotomy in thinking between the public and experienced investors is simple. The public note that commodity prices, in general, are rising; the investment community takes a broader view.

Experienced investors note that, in addition to public perception, there are other non-inflationary and deflationary forces at work. Outsourcing to cheaper manufacturing bases such as China and India has a strong deflationary effect. In many firstworld economies, productivity growth exceeds wage increases.

There are two different types of inflation: The first is known as "headline inflation", which includes changes in energy and food prices. The second is "core inflation" which excludes energy and food prices. It is when the former spreads its effects to the latter that problems arise.

Substantial numbers of people have also criticized certain governments for excluding

real estate prices from inflation indicators as they suspect the governments are being deceitful. In fact, what these governments are trying to achieve is a more accurate overall picture.

If we could imagine a scenario in which everything was included in the definition of core inflation – one where real estate prices fell even slightly and commodity and energy prices also fell by coincidence - the impact could well lead to the overall economy showing a deflationary picture.

In this event, central banks would reduce interest rates sharply, increase money supply and the result would end up in a economic boom that would lead to overall inflationary pressures that would derail the whole system. If governments included real estate prices as a component they might as well throw in stock-market prices too.


At the time of writing, most currencies are rising against the US dollar. This started from the first trading day in 2006. The catalyst that provoked this reaction was the release of US nonfarm payroll numbers on Friday, 6 January for December 2005.

The market was expecting 200,000 new jobs to be created, but just 108,000 were. However, the markets ignored the fact that, included in the same statement, was an upward revision. In November non-farm payroll number rose from 215,000 to 305,000. The actual unemployment rate fell from 5% to 4.9%. This, again, was ignored.

The market felt that this would help pressure the "Fed" to pause earlier in its interest rate increase cycle.

Were I managing foreign currency positions, I would have taken the same route, that of easy profit. For investors taking a slightly longer term view, it is worth remembering that currency markets probably have an attention span less than that of the average five-year-old.

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

PHUKET: The organizing committee of the 9th QBE Phang Nga Bay Regatta, which will be held from January 27-31, has put out a final call for entrants to register in an event that has gained a reputation as probably the "most fun regatta on the Phuket yachting calendar".

Battle for places in sepak takraw league

PHUKET: Those wanting to catch some of Thailand's best sepak takraw players in action will want to attend the Sports Authority of Thailand (SAT) "Thailand League Division 2" competition at the Saphan Hin Sports Complex Gymnasium from January 29 to February 2.

Teams from Krabi, Chumphon, Trang, Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Phattalung, Yala, Ranong, Satun, Surat Thani and Phuket will vie for the right to play in the newly established Thailand League Division 1 in Bangkok. The league was set up by the SAT to establish the sport as an international standard event, for possible inclusion in future Olympic Games and other international sports competitions.



They have minds of their own, so if you just let them quietly get on with business of growing in their own way, it gives you that extra time to sit back and enjoy a beer. Let the gardens think they're in charge – it works every time.



The serious business of bonsai







very funny cartoon appeared several years ago in Britain's weekly satirical magazine, *Private Eye*. It showed a man in traditional Japanese dress, a look of abject horror on his face. At the bottom right of the picture was a tiny wisp of smoke. The caption read, "Run, run! It's a bonsai forest fire!"

The cartoon was, of course, making a mockery of the serious business of bonsai – the art of "dwarfing and shaping trees and shrubs in shallow pots by pruning, controlled fertilization," as Webster puts it.

It's an ancient oriental horticultural art form, meaning literally "tree in a pot". These days, the art of bonsai is enjoyed worldwide. As a talking point for inside the home, it has few equals.


Today, bonsai are available from some department stores and from garden centers, although most of these are young cuttings or "starts", and not true bonsai. They are a starting point for the real thing, not the real thing itself.

A tree planted in a small pot is not a bonsai until it has been pruned, shaped and trained into the desired shape. You need to learn as much as you can about bonsai, since information is the key to making a true work of art.

As your knowledge and confidence increase, so will your enjoyment of what you can create by shaping nature – and having trees inside your home, as well as outside.
