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# FREE AT LAST! Visa runners released after four nights of fear

RANONG: "The Ranong 12", a group of 12 foreign tourists arrested on the morning of February 8 for overstaying their visas, were finally set free on the morning of Sunday, February 12.

During their five-day ordeal they were forced to spend two nights trying to sleep on dirty police cell floors and two more nights locked up on buses during overnight journeys to and from Bangkok, where they were sent to be processed for deportation.

Among the detainees, who included British, South Korean, German, Vietnamese, French, Italian and Swedish nationals, the maximum overstay was just six days

The detainees were eventually spared deportation from Bangkok following successful negotiations between their embassies and top Immigration officials in the capital. They were then returned, still under detention, to Ranong, from where they were finally allowed to depart the country under expulsion orders.

They then re-entered the country as free men and women on new tourist visas.

Here's a diary of what happened:

DAY 1: WEDNESDAY. The nightmare started when a team of six Highway Police and Tourist Police officers waved over the wellknown "Big Bus", an air-conditioned double-decker bus that makes daily "visa runs" to Ranong.

The bus had reached Kapoe District, just 40 kilometers from the Ranong Immigration office, when it was pulled over and its passengers checked for visas and permit-to-stay stamps.

The 12 passengers who had overstayed were then separated from the other 26 passengers on board, who were allowed to continue on their visa run.

The 12 were forced to squat in the back of a police truck, and taken through the midday heat with sirens blaring to the Immigration office in Ranong. There, the group spent an hour in the parking lot before being returned to Kapoe, where they were locked up together in a single Kapoe District Police Station cell to await a hearing at the Ranong Provincial Courthouse.

#### **DAY 2: THURSDAY.** Jutarat

Payonchart, an employee of Phenpet Co Ltd, which runs the visa run service, informed the *Gazette* of the arrest. Speaking from the Ranong courthouse in the afternoon, she said she felt police had overreacted in incarcerating the visa runners.

"Why did they have to keep them overnight in a cell? These aren't illegal aliens trying to hide out in the country," she said.

Speaking from his prison cell, one of the detainees, 31vear-old Australian Chris Taylor told the Gazette: "On Tuesday I went to [Phuket] Immigration and said, 'This is the last day of my visa, it expires tomorrow,

what should I do?' and they said, 'Do a visa run tomorrow and pay a 200-baht overstay [fine].'

"That's exactly what I [was doing], but then we get pulled over by the Tourist Police and Highway Police and they make a huge problem for us," he said.

Justifying the arrests, Pol Maj Songproad Sirikul, the new head of the Ranong Tourist Police, told the Gazette that his office had received a report that a business was assisting illegal aliens by bringing them to Burma. He said he ordered his men to check into this and, when they did, it turned out to be true.

"The police arrested them because they broke the law," he said, while strenuously denying allegations that the arresting officers asked for 5,000 baht from each tourist in exchange for letting them go.

"I think that's impossible. I can guarantee that Tourist Police officers did not ask for money because we are not in trouble [financially] and I constantly remind them to not do that."

The group spent the night trying to sleep on the floor in a cell at the Ranong Muang District Police Station.

DAY 3: FRIDAY. The Gazette again contacts Chris Taylor, who is still in custody and has just learned he is to be deported.

"I can't believe what has happened. They want to send us to the Bangkok Detention Cen ter, from where they will deport us to our home countries - all because of a one-day overstay [in my case].

It was our second night sleeping on the dirty floor, with mosquitoes. I am black and brown from dirt."

He said the group members had been led to believe they would be released after paying 1,000baht fines at Ranong Court. That didn't happen.

"The public prosecutor told us that if we just admitted to the Court what we did and paid a 1,000-baht fine, they would let us go to Immigration and we could complete our visa trip. We paid, but when we got to Immigration they fingerprinted us and said, 'You're being deported - immediately'.'

The Australian said he felt betrayed. "We sent money for the tsunami problem. We like the Thai people and want to visit – and then we got s\*\*t on. We are part of one of their tours, where everyone makes money. We spend money in Phuket, we want to stay here. It's good for the economy, good for everyone. And now we are just being s\*\*t on.

"We've been treated like animals, sleeping on the ground. I've never been locked up before in all my life. It's absolutely disgusting. You cannot trust the Tourist Police anymore. They are supposed to be on our side, helping us. But now they have gone against us and made a big problem for us."

Pol Capt Weerachai Phugkesorn of the Ranong Immigration Office told the Gazette, "It's true that if people arrive at our office and have overstayed their visas we just fine them 200 baht per day of overstay. But it was [another police division] that arrested them, not us. If they hadn't been arrested, we would have just fined them as usual.

"The case went to court, where the judge rendered a decision. They were sent to us by the police and we are just following the provisions of the Immigra-

tion Act by transferring them to Bangkok for deportation," Capt Weerachai said.

After being kept in the cell for most of the day, in the evening the 12 were locked into two minibuses supplied by Penphet Visa Run Co for the long overnight journey to the Immigration Detention Center in Bangkok. Although exhausted, most find it impossible to sleep.

DAY 4: SATURDAY. The detainees arrive at the Immigration Detention Center, where they spend much of the day in cells, desperately trying to contact their embassies.

Many have still been unable to sleep and find the food they are given inedible.

At about 11 pm, they are again locked up in the minibuses and begin the overnight return journey to Ranong. They will not be deported from Bangkok after all, but from Ranong.

DAY 5: SUNDAY. The buses return to Ranong Immigration, from where the detainees are finally put on a boat and "deported" to Burma around 9 am. After crossing over to Victoria Point (Kaw Thuang) and getting their entry and exits stamps, they return to Ranong Immigration, where they are issued new visas.

On February 14, Janpen Munsa, partner in the Penphet Visa Run Co, told the Gazette that the arrests were unprecedented in the company's sixyear history and had hurt her business, as former customers now feared arrest if they used it.

"The company is registered as a visa run business, but they arrested [our customers] - using rude words and bad behavior," she said, adding that hers is just one of three companies providing the service.

"Why was our vehicle pulled over and our overstayed customers singled out for prosecution?" she asked.

Anchalee Praphut, owner of Angelina Travel and Tour Agency, who arranged the visa tour for one of the overstays, said the whole episode had sullied the reputation for the Tourist Police - adding that they had to plead with the police to allow two of the group who were diabetic to be given insulin shots, which they had to pay for themselves.

Ranong Governor Mekin Methawikul, who was informed of the issue by K. Anchalee, told the Gazette that he had sent a formal request to the head of the Ranong Tourist Police for a report about the incident.

He said that the Tourist Police Chief told him that there had been cases of foreigners using the visa runs to smuggle ya bah (methamphetamine) into the country from Burma, so his staff needed to check foreigners on visa runs carefully.

As Tourist Police do not have the authority to stop moving vehicles, they called on the Highway Police for assistance.

Another bus on a visa run that followed shortly thereafter was allowed to pass by because police did not want to create traffic congestion, the Governor quoted Maj Songproad as saying. The Governor added that, as

the arresting officers were lowlevel police, it was unrealistic to expect them to be able to communicate well in English.

"It should be the tour company staff who speak English who should have explained to the tourists about what was going on," he said.

"I admit this type of thing has never before happened in Ranong and I have told the Tourist Police to prevent this kind of thing from happening [again]. Still, I think the officers did their jobs according to procedure," he said. Editorial: page 24.

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## Patong porn peddlers pinched

PATONG: An undercover team from Kathu Police Station led by Pol Maj Serm Kwannimitra raided two VCD outlets opposite the Patong Tourist Police office on Thaweewong Rd.

They arrested two people and confiscated some 5,000 obscene VCDs.

The alleged offenders were Nattaporn Sornram, 33, and Jirawit Nonthapanthawat, also 33, both Phuket natives.

They were found to be in possession of 2,000 and 3,000 VCDs respectively. Both were nabbed while selling their wares to foreign tourists.

Police said that the offenders both confessed that they had sold risqué movies for years, adding that foreign tourists made up the largest part of their clientèle.

They were charged with possession of obscene material with intent to sell.

## Well-known Phuket figure dies aged 76

PHUKET CITY: Well-known Phuket figure Pracha Tantawanij died on February 6 in Vachira Phuket Hospital after a short illness. He was 76 years old. A funeral was conducted on February 12 at Wat Kosit Wiharn in Phuket City.

K. Pracha was born on September 27, 1929, one of seven children of Yuee and Lucy Tantawanij, in the Chinpracha Mansion on Krabi Rd, the house where he lived his entire life.

He made his money from tin mining, but in recent decades was known in Phuket chiefly for his collection of antiques, which were on display in the Chinpracha Mansion, a classic Sino-Portuguese home.

He welcomed into his home anyone interested in learning about the history and culture of Thai-Chinese people in southern Thailand. The house itself has also served as a place to learn about Sino-Portuguese building techniques and the preservation of antiquities.

K. Pracha is survived by his wife Jaroonrad "Daeng" Tantawanij and two sons, Prajak and Khanej.

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## Promthep wind power project stalled

LAEM PROMTHEP: A ban on structures taller than eight meters at Laem Promthep, Phuket's premier sunset tourist attraction, has stalled construction of three 50m-tall wind turbines, each to cost 40 million baht.

Ong-ad Thanachanmongkol, Chief of the Phuket office of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment, said recently that he must first obtain the go-ahead for the project from his superiors in Bangkok.

"The area where Egat [Electricity Generating Authority of Thailand ] wants to build the new wind turbines is zoned, with buildings restricted to no more than eight meters in height," he said.

Thanat Kunaruk, Chief of the Wind & Solar Development Department at Egat's Alternative Energy Development Division, told the Gazette, "Egat has been studying the effectiveness of wind turbines at Laem Promthep for a long time. This site has strong winds; it is very suitable for wind turbines."

He added that the Rawai Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) was willing to approve the construction of the towers, but only if the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the project is approved.

"Each wind turbine uses land area of only 10m by 10m. It's a small space; it's not [the same as] a building, it's the same as a power py-The big windmill above Nai Harn Beach lon," he said.

## Moves to make Patong Beach 'more orderly'

PATONG: Vice-Governor Worapot Ratthasima has been appointed chairman of a committee charged with cleaning up Patong Beach and ensuring that beach operators are regulated.

Committee member and Patong Municipality Chief Administrative Officer Poonsak Naksena said that the known 55 renters of beach chairs and umbrellas have until by February 24 to tidy up the layout of their 2,300-odd umbrellas and beach chairs so that the beach can be cleared of people quickly in case of another tsunami.

In addition, by February 24, each beach chair and umbrella renter, as well as every masseuse working on the beach, must register with Patong Municipality and obtain a license.

Patong Municipality will allocate a zone for each to operate within. The license will have to be renewed each year.

Kathu Police Superintendent Pol Lt Col Teeraphol Thipjaroen said, "We have been having difficulty controlling the problems at Patong Beach because we cannot continually check the beach, and the operators move back each time after we check."

Col Teeraphol added, "We should also register and limit the number of tuk-tuk drivers in Patong and give them uniforms. Furthermore, I could lecture the drivers on ethical behavior."

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# Jungceylon white knight unmasked

PHUKET CITY: The mystery white knight who has ridden to the rescue of the Jungceylon project was revealed on February 9 as Real Estate Capital Asia Partners (Recap), a private real estate investment fund owned by US and Singaporean interests.

Recap is a Cayman Islands-registered 50:50 joint venture between the Baupost Group of Boston, Massachusetts, and Singapore's City Developments Ltd.

It was set up in 2004 with capital of US\$220 million (8.8 billion baht) to make "investments in real estate-related assets, portfolios and companies in selected markets in Asia".

Recap was an investor in the 2003 revival of the former Sofitel Riverside Hotel, a victim of the 1997 Asian economic crisis. The 32-floor, 550-room hotel reopened late last year as the Millennium Hilton Hotel.

The identity of the investor was revealed at a media conference called by Phuket Provincial Court Chief Judge Samrarn Yothayai, who has led months of mediation to break the deadlock that halted the project.

Tanit Rattana-Kamchai, one of the two original major partners in Jungceylon, confirmed

that the project will get going again now that the other major partner, Manit Udomkunnatum, has sold his 53% share in Jungceylon's operating company, Phuket Square Co.

He declined to say how much of his share K. Manit had sold to Recap, and how much to other investors, but did reveal that the "leading administrator" of the board of Phuket Square will be MR Chatumongkol Sonakul, a former Governor of the Bank of Thailand.

K. Tanit said that construction of Jungceylon is 80% complete and discussions have already reopened with the main contractor, Powerline, with the aim of having the mega-mall open by November this year.


K. Tanit's legal adviser, Sompob Wongchalor, said that 80% of the units in Jungceylon had been booked by tenants. He

had had discussed the future with "20 to 30" of these, and all still want to move in. Their only concern was when they could do so.

He added that Jungceylon is currently valued at 2.9 billion baht, and that a further 1.1 billion baht will be needed to complete the project, making a total of 4 billion baht.

K. Sompob said that the mediation to resolve the Jungceylon deadlock had taken a long time not because the dispute between the partners was difficult to resolve, but because there were many small details to iron out in order to protect the interests of tenants.

K. Tanit thanked Judge Samrarn. "The mediator needs to understand both sides, and to be very patient," he said. Because of Judge Samrarn and his colleagues, he added, Jungceylon would soon be back on track."



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eil Cumming, Managing Director of Asia Web Direct Co and its online hotel booking service Phuket.Com, says that for the limited market segment his service caters to – fully independent travelers (FITs) – business continues to grow.

Asked about advanced booking for the remainder of February through till May, he prefaced his comments by saying, "Our figures reflect a relatively small part of the overall Phuket tourist market. We promote around 200 or so hotels and only produce a very small percentage of their occupancy. All we can see is that our market is growing at around a 40% [annual rate]."

Booking trends by national groups have not changed significantly at Phuket.Com, which continues to target Europeans and Australians, prosperous couples from Southeast Asia and expats based in the region. All of these groups are booking over the Internet in much bigger numbers than before, he said.

"We think we will see around a 75% year-on-year increase for that period compared with 2005, and a 40% to 50% increase compared with 2004," he said.


Mr Cumming does not see the cancelation of so many direct flights to Phuket as a major barMost players in Phuket's tourism industry are pleased with the island's post-tsunami recovery, particularly the return to near-normal hotel occupancy rates this high season. Despite this performance, there have been rumors that bookings figures for the upcoming months are not looking quite so healthy. Here, some leading players in the industry speak with *Gazette* writers about current trends – and what they expect in the months to come.

rier to growth in his market segment.

"It's no problem ... our regional visitors have even more selection with Tiger, AirAsia and other low-cost carriers. Europeans traveling FIT usually go via Bangkok or Singapore. Australians are usually passing through on the way to Europe, so they stopover en-route from the same two hubs," he said.

One trend he has noticed is that more travelers are waiting until the last minute to book – a fact Asia Web Direct has taken advantage of with its second hotel booking site, Latestays.Com "Booking on that site is running at more than 100% up on 2004; our lead-time for normal advance bookings is averaging less than three weeks.

"Secondly, special offers are attracting nearly all the business. Those properties that are maintaining original rates and waiting for business to return are still waiting. Finally, whenever a property that normally quotes "+++" rates, [partial rates that don't include taxes and service charges] also makes an offer quoted in net rates [ie: inclusive of all taxes and service charges], the latter outsells the former by three to one. I think that this is partly due to the fact that there are scores of



The months to come:

Mr Cumming was proud of his company's efforts in restoring confidence in the tsunami-affected region.

"Many hundreds of viewers wrote heart-warming messages of support, often requesting additional shots of specific areas, people and properties – and all promising to return. Over 4,000 images make up our tsunami gallery now and showcase the courage, efforts, hope and eventual triumph of the people of Phuket. They also clearly illustrate our message that 'Phuket is better than ever!'

"Moving on, in partnership with local hotels, we have vigorously promoted special offers, publicized re-openings... and lifted our 'destination' marketing efforts to unprecedented efforts. We first saw a turnaround as early as May and are now seeing increases of more than 40%, year-on-year. We are proud to say that 2005 was our most successful year.

"In practice, the work we did last year produced great results and we see no sign of that diminishing. Indeed, the increase shows every sign of continuing," he said.

Phuket International Airport (PIA) Director Sq Ldr Pornchai Eua-aree told the *Gazette* there was a 100% increase in the number of flights during the Chinese New Year period in 2006, compared with 2005.

"While that's still down 11% compared with the Chinese New Year in 2004, it's still a good performance," he said.

An increase in charter flights was offsetting losses related to the axing of scheduled flights, he said.

"We are happy that there has been an increase in the number of charter flights from Europe, especially Scandinavia – which is sending more boarding students here than ever. We have also been seeing an increase in the number of charter flights from



Hong Kong and [South] Korea since October 2005," he said.

Sq/Ldr Pornchai said the increase in charter flights painted a optimistic picture for the future, "So long as all stakeholders participate in maintaining Phuket as a high-quality destination."

Wolfgang Meusburger, GM of the Holiday Inn Resort in Patong, said that he expects – based on current bookings – occupancy of 85% in February, with a dip to 70% in March before climbing to 80% in April.


"If we look at the current booking trend, the situation is like this: most travel agencies book very late... before, people made bookings six to seven months before they arrived. Now people book only a week or two in advance," he said.

"But Holiday Inn is quite satisfied with our business; it's much better than we thought. What we see is that most of our customers have been here be-

fore. They are all coming back, so we had a very good January, with occupancy at over 90%," he said.

"Anything is better than 2005. It's a little bit less than 2004, but we can't expect business to come back 100% so soon after the tsunami. Still, we are very satisfied; it is much better than we expected," he said, adding that Europe and Australia remained the hotel's main source of guests.

"We have some Asian guests, but this segment is slower ... a part of the problem may be that they have been having difficulty finding flights," he said. Despite Phuket's revival,

security issues continue to be a concern, he said.

"Big international compa-

nies are still worried about the situation in the [Deep] South; there are travel warnings saying that Phuket might be a target.

Let's say you're a big company, like American Express or DHL. If there is an official travel advisory [on a US government website] they will not risk sending tourists to Phuket, because if something happens they will be held responsible. Such travel warnings are very negative.

"But I think the second big problem is the flights situation. Many people want to come, but there are not enough flights available.

"I think the hotel industry was quite angry when Thai Airways said it was canceling its Sydney-Melbourne-Phuket service. We also used to have direct flights from Japan; they are not back and we have no direct flights from Hong Kong. We all feel the national carrier should be doing more to promote Phuket."

"Our business from Hong Kong is down by about 80%. Having to fly here via Bangkok or Singapore increases travel time from three hours to six or seven, causing many Hong Kong residents to choose another destination to which they can fly to direct.

"If we still had direct flights, I think business from Hong Kong would be back to about 80% of the pre-tsunami rates, but now it is only about 20%. The Australian market is less of a problem because a lot of people can still fly to Singapore or to Bangkok. So, it really depends on each market," he said.

Equally varied are the performances of individual hotels in Phuket, he said.

"I think if you talk to 10 hotel managers, you will hear some hotel managers, like me, saying that they are very happy. But you will also hear some hotel managers who says business is very, very bad. At the moment, I think hotels that have been here for many years and have established long-term relationships with travel agencies are doing better. But if you open a completely new hotel this winter, I think it will be very, very hard," he concluded.

Siripakorn Cheawsamoot, Assistant Director of TAT's Region 4 Office in Phuket, said booking information he had received for April looked good, especially from Europe, Australia and Russia.

"Currently [South] Korea is a major source of tourists with both direct and charter flights available, though the number of arrivals was expected to tail off after the number of flights decreases in March," he said.

He added that hotel occupancy in mid-February averaged at about 80% across the island, and the TAT plans to attract incentive groups from India and the Middle East during the "green season" that starts May 1.

**Phuket Tourist Association President Pattanapong Aikwanich** described the February-April outlook as "so-so", with the number of European arrivals expected to taper off after March as spring arrives on that continent.

Advanced booking figures are less reliable now because, with 35,000 rooms to fill, tourists are less worried about finding a room and are not booking as far in advance, he said.

"I hope that from the start of the school break in mid-March, we will see more Thai tourists coming to Phuket – we plan to work together with tourism businesses to come up with packages that will attract them," he said.


Phuket offers better valuefor-money on hotels in the 1,000baht-per-night-and-under range than Chiang Mai, Pattaya or Samui, he added.

He noted that he expects overall occupancy in 2006 to be about 60%, down from about 70% before the tsunami. Peak high-season occupancy rates this year were also down slightly from the 90% average before the tsunami, he added.

"Low season this year will probably be lower than in the past, because we have been left with just the domestic market and some regional markets, like [South] Korea and Singapore after the cut in direct flights by THAI." (See also *First Person*, page 25.)

K. Pattanapong noted that in addition to a drop in arrivals, global economic trends had resulted in many tourists taking shorter holidays and spending less when they do travel.

# Growing pains in the B30 medical scheme

PRACHIN BURI: Admirers of the government's 30-baht medical scheme may wish to consider, after reading the following, whether reform is necessary.

Prachinburi resident Chaluay Pantam, 37, has watched with increasing alarm over the last two years as a ping pong ballsized lump on his right shoulder grew into a Quasimodo-like hump "weighing more than 20 kilograms."

In the meantime, the former milk deliveryman — who lives with his live-in girlfriend, Mantana Pensuri, 49, in a tin shack in Tambon Koolampan — has become nearly incapacitated.

"It's a terrible impediment," he said, "I can no longer work because it's impossible to stand up for more than 15 minutes. The pain is such that I have to take 10 tablets of paracetamol a day."

To take up the slack, K. Mantana, 49, has taken over the daily milk runs. "I earn 120 baht a day," she explained. "It's scarcely enough to pay for hospital expenses each day. Over the past two years we've had to sell everything to pay for treatment. Now we're destitute."

What kind of treatment has K. Chaluay received? According to the couple, they have been to hospitals in Prachin Buri, Chon Buri and Bangkok – all to no avail. "No doctor has been able to answer the question, 'What is this strange growth on my shoulder and how can it be treated?" said K. Chaluay.

The hump has grown ominously and quickly: it is 60 centimeters long – from his shoulder to his waist – and is 40 cm round.

"It's the size of a soccer ball," noted a reporter from the vernacular newspaper, *Kom Chad Luek*.

K. Mantana's desperate written appeals for help, to the newspaper and to TV show *BaanLekTiHa*, finally brought the couple's plight to public notice.

"I just want the relevant government agency, or perhaps some good-hearted person, to help with the cost of treatments," she explained.

A doctor at the prestigious Chulalongkorn medical center was familiar with Chaluay's case: "He came in for treatment and a sample was excised for analysis," a newspaper reporter was told upon inquiry, "but K. Chaluay refused to undergo surgery – why, we don't know.


"But if he'd like to begin treatment anew, Chulalongkorn Hospital is happy to accept him; he's an old patient of ours. However, the condition is now too far gone to treat with surgery."

The issue of how it *will* be treated was not addressed — but, whatever happens, K. Chaluay will probably face it with equanimity; his name means "species of graceful meditators."

## Kamala school tries out tsunami evacuation plan

KAMALA: The Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC) is setting up community evacuation plans in eight provinces of Thailand to prevent loss of life in case of future tsunamis.

The ADPC launched its project with the evacuation of some 415 students during a tsunami drill at Racha Prachanukro 36 School (formerly Baan Kamala School) on February 3.

Dr Bhichit Rattakul, Senior Adviser of the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC), said, "This is an opportunity for the Kamala community, Ratcha Prachanukro 36 School and Kamala *OrBorTor* [Tambon Administration Organization] to work together, especially when evacuating the area.

"The school has its own evacuation plan. At first, students will be moved to a location in front of the school. After that, the community will help to evacuate them, providing first aid and giving instructions, while the police will control traffic."


School Director Preecha Puenrak explained that initially the school will have one drill per semester – or twice a year. "How often we have evacuation drills will depend on factors such as the frequency and severity of earthquakes [in the region]. The more frequent or the more severe they are, the more often we will have drills," he explained.

However, Dr Bhichit had reservations about whether an evacuation would run as smoothly as the drill if the tsunami alarm sounded a genuine warning. "We don't know if police response time would be quick enough in the case of a real tsunami. Today was just a drill and people had warning that the evacuation would take place," he said.

That said, similar evacuation plans are to be set up in Phang Nga, Krabi, Ranong, Satun, Trang, Surat Thani and Nakhon Sri Thammarat, he explained.

"We don't want evacuation plans to be set up by the government alone, because if the villagers have no part in setting up the plan it will not last long. But this time the villagers drew the map themselves and made the plan themselves. And as they are the 'owners' of this plan, it will remain in their minds," he said.

Dr Bhichit added that the Phuket Provincial office of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation will be responsible for ensuring tsunami evacuation drills are held in the future.

S ombat Somwang, head of the Samui Municipality Office's Servicing Unit – the department charged with monitoring industrial waste on the island – has announced that severe fines will be imposed on businesses that allow sewage or dirty water to run into the sea or onto public land.


His team will take samples from public areas and tests them in the lab for BOD (biological oxygen demand) levels.

The safe limit is 20 milligrams per liter of water, and fines on polluters will be levied on a rising scale in accordance with how much over the limit the pollution is, it was announced.

For example, where pollution levels are found to be twice the official limit, businesses will be fined up to 10,000 baht. If the waste levels are between two and four times the limit, the fine will up to 50,000 baht. Up to seven times the limit will incur a fine of up to 100,000 baht, while those companies that produce waste that reaches 10 times the official limit will face fines of up to 200,000 baht.

Pollution of freshwater and seawater is becoming a serious problem in and around Samui, where few hotels treat their wastewater effectively.

The recent introduction of sewage treatment plants in two places has helped the situation, but now the authorities want to make sure that companies use the facilities by disposing of their sewage and wastewater in a responsible way.

# Crackdown on water pollution announced

**Coconut killing:** Police on January 29 were called to a coconut plantation not far from Samui Airport where they discovered the body of Boonhiang Malichim, 45, who was found dead at the wheel of his car.

The victim had suffered a gunshot wound to the right temple, which killed him instantly. His wife, Mol Malichim, 40, was found lying unconscious next to the vehicle.

K. Mol later said that she had been checking harvested coconuts in the back of the vehicle while her husband was waiting in the cab when a man wearing jeans, a checked shirt, a black knitted hat and sunglasses rode up on a motorcycle.

The man called out that he

was lost, but when he reached their vehicle he attacked K. Mol and shot her husband before fleeing the scene.

A man was later caught by police in Chaweng in connection with the shooting, and found to be in possession of an unlicensed weapon and ammunition.

He denied killing K. Boonhiang, but police are keeping him in custody until K. Mol feels up to confronting him and, possibly, identifying him as her husband's murderer.

**Power play:** Samui's Mayor, Warakorn Ratanarak, has slammed those in charge of the island's power supply for failing to provide an adequate service. According to officials, the local Municipality Office has repeatedly requested a budget for the installation of an island-wide village power supply, but the Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) – more accurately, the Electricity Generating Public Company Limited (EGCO), set up as the first independent power producer in Thailand, in 1992 – has never managed to go beyond the survey stage.

Up to 30 locations on Samui are still without a regular electricity supply, and repairs and upgrades to village-level services are infrequent.

K. Warakorn called on Samui's new District Chief to look into the power problem, adding that if the island is serious about improving its infrastructure



and local people's quality of life, the PEA will have to show more commitment to doing its job.

**Loud protest:** A recently completed 2-million-baht project to provide information via public address systems in villages around Koh Samui is running into problems because it clashes with tourists' expectations of what a tropical island paradise should sound like.

The village media service broadcasts daily news and public information through loudspeakers but resort owners in tourist hotspots like Chaweng have already complained that the noise disturbs their guests.

Village leaders in Baan Taling Ngam refused to install the loudspeakers, and the Municipality Office is now saying that the project will have to be monitored for the first few months in order to measure its value.

**Grow up!** Medical services continued to improve and expand on Koh Samui with the recent arrival of psychiatrist Dr Antika Klein at the Samui Bangkok Hospital.

Dr Klein is American-Thai, and therefore able to treat patients in both English and Thai. She is an expert in panic disorders and also provides general therapy.

Asked by a local magazine how she saw the island in terms of its psychological development, Dr Klein likened Samui to a rebellious teenager with delinquent tendencies.

She said it lacked self-control and valued freedom above responsibility, adding that the island was in need of "parental guidance".

Samui's "personality problems" should be dealt with now in order to avoid problems during "adulthood", she said.

**Drug dealers held:** At the end of last month, renowned Royal Thai Police Inspector Bunma Geawlaiyat arrived on Koh Samui with a team of specially trained officers to conduct undercover operations aimed at reducing the drug problem on the island.

The team arrested one heroin dealer and another man supposedly dealing in cannabis and amphetamines.

The first operation involved using one of the heroin dealer's customers, an addict known as "Anan", who was the bait in a fake drug deal set up by phone.

The police followed Anan to the dealer's house where they searched and arrested a known pusher, "Pratuang", for possession and sale of narcotics.

A small amount of heroin was found in the man's pockets, and a police sniffer dog later found larger quantities around the house, much of it packed into drinking straws ready for sale.

In another case, following a similar sting operation, Inspector Bunma and his team apprehended Go Seng Yuso in possession of 20 amphetamine pills and around 1.4 kilograms of marijuana.

The arrest was made after what was described as a "dramatic" escape and road chase.

# Teens can't get enough online porn

Research by the Thai Health Promotion Foundation and Assumption Business Administration College (Abac) revealed that most Thai Internet users start at the ages of 13-15, and that many young users access pornographic websites.

Thai Health Deputy Manager Krissada Ruangareerat said 44.8% of parents do not know what their children do when online.

The research, which polled 1,464 Internet users aged between 15 and 24, found 16% of the teen respondents drank and smoked while watching pornographic pictures online. Another 16% masturbated and 5% had sex.

Among the 85% who said they had used the Internet to chat with strangers. Of these, 28% said they talked about sex and 2% even dated strangers they met in cyberspace.

Sira Satji-janon, 19, of the Thai Webmasters Association, said he had found one girl who had sex chats with a person who eventually persuaded her to install a webcam to see her naked.

"Then the girl started earning money by showing her naked body over the webcam and finally became a sex worker," he said.

**Strong leader:** Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra expressed a willingness to hold a referendum to decide whether to rewrite the Constitution, but refused to succumb to pressure from advocacy groups.

"I am ready to amend the Constitution but will not do it in order to please two or three individuals who are dissatisfied with certain provisions," he said.

The Prime Minister said Thailand had amended its charter more frequently than its laws.

"Thai opinion makers are never satisfied with charter provisions," he said, lamenting that he came to power under existing provisions designed for strong leadership but was attacked for being a strong leader.

**Out of luck:** A special police unit stormed a row of 10 commercial buildings in Bangkok's Pratunam area and arrested 262 gamblers.

Metropolitan Police Commissioner Lt Gen Thavornsak Thepchatri said he led 60 officers in a pre-dawn raid on the den, which reportedly belongs to a man named Paijit Thammarojpinit, known as "Hia Por Pratunam". Suspects were detained at the Crime Suppression Division.

During the raid, police seized 152 million baht worth of

gambling chips, 538,810 baht in cash, 1,000 decks of card, 200 dice, two slot machines, a safe deposit box, four surveillance cameras, five card-shuffling devices, Hi-Lo materials, one baccarat table, one banknotecounting device and nearly 100 mobile phones. Police also seized 46 cars after the raid.

"This is the biggest gambling bust since the Taopoon gambling raid last June, because this den has been around for a long time, has a lot of customers and deals in many millions of baht a day," said Thavornsak, adding that the raid took about a month to plan.

**Week off:** Fearing for their safety, teachers at 250 primary schools in Yala Province refused to go to work for one week fol-

lowing shooting attacks on five of their colleagues.

Yala Teachers Federation adviser Prasit Meksuwan said Education Ministry officials in Yala's Education Region 1 agreed to close all 250 primary schools for one week while the security situation is reassessed.

Four teachers at Baan Lue Mu school were ambushed while waiting for guards to escort them home. A fifth teacher was shot on his way home. All survived. Many teachers in the three southernmost provinces have sought transfers to other areas.

**Snake in the gas:** A snake caused a leak at a Trans Thai Malaysia Ltd (TTM) gas separation plant in Songkhla Province after it crawled into a liquefied

petroleum gas (LPG) pipeline, causing an electrical short-circuit, a company executive said.

The leakage occurred in Chana District, at a station of the Thai-Malay gas pipeline project, and caused a brief scare among motorists traveling along the Asia Highway.

Somchai Kooyai, Senior Executive Vice-President of TTM, said the accident did not cause severe damage to the LPG pipeline, but operations had been suspended so that a temporary system test could be conducted.

The accident did not affect the operations of the plant, he added.

**Teacher tribulations:** A new Education Ministry panel is considering two plans for employing teachers in line with the handover of some schools to local administrative bodies. The ministry's Permanent Secretary Khunying Kasama Varawarn na Ayutthaya said the panel will make a decision on February 27.

The first plan would allow the ministry to employ the teachers for three years, after which they would have to decide whether to leave the ministry.

If they did, they would be able to retain their teaching jobs at their current schools. If not, they would have to move to other schools still under the ministry's control.

The alternative, which has yet to be finalized, would either allow teachers to remain with the ministry indefinitely or give them a five-year grace period after which they would have to renew their employment with the ministry every year.

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obies are fish, and like many of their terrestrial relatives, they like to fight. This makes them interesting to observe, not least because some species, mudskippers for example, do their fighting on land. But that alone doesn't make them easy to fully comprehend. Indeed, as it happens, understanding the goby is a fight in which Man has yet to triumph.

It's a small fish – most species of goby are only a little larger than your index finger – but that's only part of what makes their study such a challenge.

Prof Daniel P Lindstrom, the author of numerous treatises on gobies, has occupied the better part of his adult life in trying to overcome that challenge. To a larger extent than most, he has succeeded, but it hasn't always been easy.

A signal impediment is the simple fact that it's hard to get down and dirty with vastly different species. Their words of love are differently perceived; their psychology apprehended only with difficulty, and the effort frequently unrewarding.

Gobies are tremendously fruitful. They breed in the billions, but they are not a commercial catch. You don't get into goby research for its get-rich-quick potential. Yet Prof Lindstrom, who until last year coordinated the coastal and marine resources graduate program at the University of Hawaii's prestigious Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology, has largely made a career of it.

Pursuit of gobioid demystification has brought him from the famous Marine Biological Laboratory at Woods Hole, Massachusetts, to the Philippines, to the University of Hawaii – and, yes, even to the private lab of the Emperor of Japan.

Along the way he visited Phuket, where he now does consulting, while maintaining research into the goby family of fishes.

Lindstrom, a big barrelchested American of Swedish extraction in his mid-forties, was born in Chicago. "The ocean became my thing," he recalled. "I think ... because of Jacques

Cousteau. My mother came from Nova Scotia, so when we went to visit – my cousin had a home on the water – that's when I learned to sail."

At home he maintained an aquarium, and upon reaching manhood served with the Ocean Research and Education Society in Gloucester, Massachusetts, as bosun's mate on the research vessel Regina Maris.

His duties were varied – data collection, ship maintenance and standing watch – as the boat traveled from the Caribbean Sea to the Davis Strait, above the Arctic Circle off Greenland's west coast, where icebergs are continually discharged.


Later, Lindstrom took his baccalaureate in biology at Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California, where the waters contain goby: one that is blind and cohabits in ocean burrows

with a blind shrimp. There he assisted as curator of the Museum of Natural History's vertebrate collection.

Ironically, the world's smallest vertebrate is a half-inch long goby, but it was not till two years after he had left Westmont, in 1987, while captaining a 53-foot sailing yacht from Singapore to Phuket, that gobies grabbed his attention.

"I was at Koh Racha, watching the mudskippers," he said, "when I decided on the project." Mudskipper society, with its posturing and frequent conflicts over territory, is appealingly dramatic.

But it was some years be-

fore he could get his goby project going. First, he had to deal with another species. "I did my master's thesis on lobsters," he explained. In researching lobsters - research published in the Journal of Experimental Biology and subsequently used by popular science writer Trevor Corson in his surprising book, The Secret Life of Lobsters - Lindstrom developed a unique procedure for collecting lobster urine.

Urine, as it happens, is central to the crustaceans' sex life: "In lobsters," Lindstrom and his fellows observed in a paper, "it is not the male but the female that actively searches for the mating partner. Females choose the dominant male, which usually resides in a secure shelter." It seems that females, of whatever species, all want the same thing from males.

"Following an exchange of

urine-borne signals that probably provides ... the male with information about [her] sex and reproductive state, [she] enters the shelter for a co-habitation period of up to two weeks ... Thereafter the female remains in the mating shelter guarded by the male ... during her vulnerable ... period."

The underlying conundrum was, how do lobsters identify dominance in a male? It is apparently related to the amount of serotonin sulphate, a neurotransmitter, in the urine. Lindstrom's apparatus – two tubes glued over the lobsters' urine vents connected to floating collecting tubes - allowed the lobsters free movement.

"I'm very good at making fish happy," said the professor. Happy lobsters release about 1% of their body weight as urine every 12 hours; two percent after

feeding. Lindstrom was first to figure out a way for the beasts to move freely while urine was collected - thus relieving them of human-induced stress, and ensuring reliable samples.

His work with gobies also involved "making fish happy", and that brought Lindstrom into contact with the Emperor of Japan. It was 1999: he had just completed his doctoral degree in zoology at the University of Hawaii and was at a conference in New Orleans of the American Society of Ichthyologists and Herpetologists, of which he is a lifetime member.

"I gave a talk, and during the break I saw one of my PhD committee members talking to two Japanese gentlemen. He waved me over, and as I got there, I heard him say, 'He's the real expert on that' – meaning me – which could be either good gobies.

The committee member, Dr Robert Kinzie, told him: "They run the emperor's laboratory." Then he asked: "Remember those fish I took from your system and sent to the Japanese emperor?"


"I'd built a big system at the university to keep those species happy and reproducing," Lindstrom recounted.

"No," he answered, he didn't remember Kinzie doing any such thing: the fish were part of a study – and should not have been removed.

"Oh," said Kinzie. "I must have sneaked in when you were gone." Lindstrom had been the first to make gobies spawn in captivity – and that was precisely what the Japanese wanted to know how to do.

"Bob suggested that as I was going to the Philippines that summer: 'You probably have to lay over in Tokyo,' he said. 'Then




Prof Lindstrom: 'I'm very good at making fish happy.'

you have to visit the Imperial Palace,' said the Japanese professors."

The deceased Showa emperor, Hirohito, was a marine biologist. "He did his work on starfish, I think," said Lindstrom. "Akihito did his PhD on the same fishes I'm studying."

When he arrived at the palace, Lindstrom was impressed. "We entered at the south gate, and passed through a 30-40ft door to a wooded area with big birds and



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own water reserves so your supply never changes, unlike small companies that have to buy from others in the dry season. ravens. It's right in the center of Tokyo and like nothing anywhere else – beautiful."

He was a little surprised at the lab, however. "I was thinking, 'He's an emperor. He's got to have great resources. But it wasn't like that; it was functional. If it were me, I'd have the latest gadgets and computers – heck, you're in Japan! But it was just functional."

His hosts met him and showed round the facilities. "Here are our specimens," they said blandly. "Here are the fish of yours that Bob sent. There's the emperor."

The emperor nodded. Akihito wore a charcoal gray suit: "Nothing flashy," said Lindstrom, "not even a necktie, I don't think." His attire fit the surroundings. Since his

first visit, Prof Lindstrom and the Japanese have continued to trade specimens and he has returned twice to the palace laboratory. That communication continues chiefly because gobies are interesting in a number of ways. First, they

are "amphidromous", meaning that they live in both salt- and freshwater. They spend their adult lives upstream, where they lay eggs, which are flushed out to sea by the billion.

"Gobies are 'r-selected'," explained Lindstrom, "which means they lay large numbers of

If it were me, I'd eggs but only a few survive to have the latest adulthood."

After the females finish laying, the males guard the encapsulated oval eggs, which are deposited in crevices and on old shells. Their perilous journey to the sea begins when they are merely "a yolk sac with a tail attached". Although only a few from each hatch survive, the waters teem with them when they return.

"[The shoals of gobies have] an interesting cultural side effect," noted

Lindstrom, "because, right as they return they are quite tasty. Everywhere they occur, the local language has a separate word for each stage in their development. Hawaiians even came up with terms equivalent to "genus" and "species".

Gobies also

have un-fish-like capabilities: "They are amazing climbers," said Lindstrom. "One species lives up a 400-foot vertical drop waterfall – the Akaka Falls – on the Big Island of Hawaii, and they move pretty quick. They're the ultimate rock climbers!" The fish's climbing feats are possible because its fins are united into a "sucking disk" on the belly.

For Lindstrom, the enigma is where they originated. "They're freshwater fish, but five species live on Hawaii, the most isolated archipelago on earth. So how did they get there?

"This project's about 10 years old. I've been collecting animals from 11 genera. By comparing genetic characteristics from specimens in each location we find out a lot about how they get around."

His hunch is they drifted to Hawaii from Japan or the Philippines. "That's where their closest relatives are now. But that changes over time. All you can say is, that's the way it is now."

One thing the professor – an accomplished underwater photographer, advanced research scuba diver, arc welder, diesel mechanic and sailboat racer as well as a biologist – isn't saying,


but obviously worries about, is that time may be running out for research because of reef destruction.

"The tsunami was a drop in the bucket compared with what humans have done to coral reefs. If [a reef] comes back, it will come back as diverse as it can be. The problem is that the tiny corals

start on other – broken – pieces of coral. Those break off and the new coral is destroyed.

"So it isn't as simple as people think – that if you just stop destroying, everything will grow back; because you may have pushed the system so far [over the edge] that it can't recover, at least not in our lifetimes."



Diesel power comes to that icon of American offroad capability, the Jeep – now built by German-dominated DaimlerChrysler, with a motor from Italy.

# Diesel's not a dirty word

he American market has traditionally shunned diesel-powered cars, though times may be achangin' now that Daimler-Chrysler (DCX) has added a diesel motor to its smaller Jeep range: the 2006 Liberty Limited

Diesel. While DCX is not making any firm predictions for the Liberty's success in its native North America, a diesel Jeep is certain to find many admirers in Europe and parts of Asia – if it

eventually gets there. Launched last month at the North American International Auto Show in Detroit, the Liberty Limited Diesel is Chrysler's first mid-range foray into the world of Rudolf Diesel, although in some markets Chrysler's retro-styled PT Cruiser is available with a 2.2liter oil-burner.

The engine in the Liberty is, inevitably, a European-built unit: a 2.8-liter common-rail diesel (CRD). Producing a modest 160bhp (118kW) and a hefty 400Nm of torque at just 1,800rpm, the Liberty drives through a beefed-up five-speed automatic transmission.

According to Chrysler's website, customers in the US are



increasingly expressing interest in diesel products, citing improved fuel economy, a 20% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, extended range between fill-ups and enhanced towing capacity.

The 2006 Jeep Liberty has, among other refinements, an electronic stability program (ESP) as standard, greatly enhancing its capability both on- and off-road.

If there is a discernible difference between what the driver requests of the steering input and the direction the vehicle actually takes, the ESP applies selective braking and throttle to correct the Liberty's course.

The system is calibrated to allow greater control in difficult conditions, while allowing normal driving without being intrusive.

The program integrates the anti-lock braking system, traction control, Brake Assist and an electronic roll-over detection system.



There are two four-wheel drive options: the Command-Trac is a part-time system that allows drivers to shift into high-range 4WD at speeds up to 88kmh, while Select-Trac is a full-time all-wheel drive system.

The Liberty Limited has a chrome grille, chrome side moldings and chrome roof rails. Standard are cloth bucket seats, a powered driver's seat, leather steering wheel and 17-inch aluminum wheels. Options include full-length side air curtains, leather upholstery, sun roof and a premium audio set-up.



The Liberty is the first diesel in the US midsize SUV segment offering, says Chrysler, "...the torque of a V8, performance of a V6 and the fuel economy of a fourcylinder engine". The automaker claims the diesel provides up to 32% better fuel economy compared with gas engines, with an average 20% reduction in CO<sup>2</sup> emissions.

The engine is sourced from Daimler-Chrysler's Italian subsidiary, VM Motori, which also supplies Jeep with a

diesel motor for its larger Grand Cherokee. While the Liberty's diesel is only 2.8 liters, it will propel the 4x4 from rest to 100kmh in under 10 seconds; nothing to be ashamed of considering its excellent off-road capability.

While the Liberty Limited CRD sells for about US\$1,000 more than the gas version in the US, its long-term benefits are obvious in terms of fuel consumption and extended service intervals.

The Italian makers of the engine also offer a five-year warranty which should calm any fears about its longevity.

Although not yet available in Thailand, or for that matter anywhere outside the US – it is produced at Chrysler's Toledo plant in Ohio – the idea of a compact diesel Jeep is extremely appealing. Let's hope Daimler-Chrysler releases it to the rest of the world soon.

## Cajun Rib-eye Caesar Salad For 4 people

are a few recipes for those who

are following the Atkins Diet.

#### Ingredients:

4 220gm rib-eye steaks; 8 fried bacon rashers:

- 8 tablespoons (approx) sunflower oil
- For the salad and dressing: 4 heads Romaine lettuce;
- 1 egg yolk; 100gm finely grated Parmesan
- cheese; 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice;
- 6 garlic cloves;
- 8 anchovy fillets;
- 2-3 cups olive oil;
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste.

For the Cajun seasoning: (This will make much more than you need, but you can store it indefinitely in a tightly sealed jar in a cool place.)

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup paprika powder;

- 6 tablespoons coarse salt; 1/4 cup coarsely ground black pep-
- per; 3 tablespoons dried basil;
- 3 tablespoons garlic powder;
- 2 tablespoons onion powder;
- 2 tablespoons dried oregano;
- 2 tablespoons cayenne pepper;
- 2 tablespoons white pepper;
- 2 tablespoons dried thyme.

#### **Method:**

Season the steaks with salt and cover each steak with sunflower oil in order to have enough oil smeared evenly over both sides of the steaks for the Cajun seasoning to stick to them. Coat the steaks in Cajun seasoning and leave for 10 minutes.

Crush the garlic cloves together with the anchovies and egg yolk. Add 60gm Parmesan cheese and the lemon juice, and blend well. Drizzle the olive oil very slowly into the mixture so that it does not separate. The result should be a thick mayonnaise. Grill the steaks to your pref-

erence. Wash the lettuce and tear

the leaves into large pieces, mix them with the dressing and arrange on plates. The steaks should be sliced thinly and placed on top. Garnish with the remaining Parmesan cheese and bacon rashers.

#### **Gammon Steak Florentine** For 4 people

#### Ingredients: 4 220gm gammon steaks;

8 eggs; 440gm grated cheddar cheese; 120gm finely chopped onion; 20gm finely chopped garlic; 4 large tomatoes, halved; 400gm fresh baby spinach; Salt and freshly ground pepper; Mixed salad of your choice.

**Method:** Season the steaks with salt and

pepper, and sauté in butter. Remove the pulp from the tomato halves and chop it roughly. Mix this with the onion and garlic and fill the tomato skins. Top with a little grated cheese.


Poach the eggs and lightly wilt the spinach in a pan. Put two poached eggs and some spinach on top of each steak, then cover with grated cheese.

Place the steaks under a grill until the cheese has melted. Serve with the stuffed tomatoes and a mixed salad.

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on an adventure to discover the island.

Koh Maphrao – Coconut Island – is just to the east of Phuket, and is easily accessible from Laem Hin, an area deservedly famed for its seafood restaurants. At the adjacent jetty simply hire one of the waiting longtail boats for the three-minute crossing.

Our destination on the island is Camp Belvedere, owned and run by a veteran Swiss expatriate, Bruno Adam.

In the early 1990s, Bruno ran a Patong "empire" that included the French Kiss bars, a guesthouse and speedboat tours. But in early 2001, with his wife pregnant, he decided that a radical lifestyle change was in order and decided to set up a fruit farm on 20 rai of land he had bought on Koh Maphrao. He planted thousands of durian and other fruit trees that still flourish on his land today.

Four years into the farming experiment, Bruno decided to change direction again and set up Camp Belvedere, which opened in November last year.

It is an eco-friendly resort, located on one of the most spectacular spots anywhere in or around Phuket.

The initial drive from the Koh Maphrao's jetty in the island's one and only 4WD vehicle is fascinating.

Driving through the mangrove forests, coconut plantations and passing through the small Muslim fishing village on the north side of the island is a delight. It seems as if time has stood still here for years, which in many ways it has.

It's only when you begin to skirt the east coast and then suddenly head to the hills that you realize just how isolated and natu-

rally "powerful" this location really is.

The driver changes into low ratio and mutters something that sounds like "hang on" and off we go, seemingly vertically. The half-concrete road snakes through the trees, and after a 10minute switchback ride we emerge into a clearing at the top of the ridge and to the camp, which overlooks the sea some 100 meters below.

Camp Belvedere, which has almost been completed, currently comprises six chalets – some of which have two bedrooms, making them ideal for families – and a restaurant-bar-lounge area serving excellent European and Thai food, where Bruno seems to constantly hold court.

On our arrival he was entertaining other Phuket-based Swiss with a combination of local island stories, a little friendly banter and servings of his very

own special – and excellent – Spaghetti Bolognese.

The resort is quite basic, undeniably quirky and definitely fun. It is comfortable in a rustic sort of way and although there is little currently on offer as far as "real" resort facilities go, a swimming pool is due for completion soon.

The walk to the beach below is great - it takes just 10 minutes - as is the swimming, although I advise that you ask the all-purpose Bruno to collect you by truck for the return journey if you want to avoid potential heart attacks on the "challenging" ascent back to Camp Belvedere.

I asked my son for his thoughts after an afternoon of playing chess. "A little boring," he said, "but amazing. At least they have UBC for tonight's game!"

Amazing it certainly is, with some of the best views I have seen in the South. From all areas of the resort – a wonderful 180° view, a real belvedere, or sala, to the east – overlooking Koh Yao Yai, Phi Phi and even the mountains of Krabi and Koh Lanta beyond. The panorama is so vast and grand, it's almost hypnotic, a soul-searching sight.

The rest of the island is not for those looking for the bar scene or usual beach hangouts, but it is Above, all the excitement of the chessboard.

definitely well worth escaping to for a while. It is an island simply waiting for things to happen.

Happen they will. Rumors abound locally about new developments, and The Village villa project, which is soon to start, will bring change to Koh Maphrao. But I'll be back to see Bruno – and the views from Camp Belvedere – soon.

## **Environmental activist** assassinated in forest

#### From the Phuket Gazette, issue of February 15-28, 2001

PA KHLOK: Environmental activist Jurin Rachapol, 50, was shot dead on January 30 while out in a forest collecting cashew nut leaves for salad.

Pol Capt Anan Jengjit of Thalang Police Station said that K. Jurin went into the forest around 9 am with his wife. He was shot three times and died instantly.

A village source who asked not to be named told the *Gazette* that K. Jurin was an activist opposed to mangrove

forest incursion by THE TIME a "big investor" who had set up a prawn farm.

"A week ago,

Κ. Jurin was threatened by staff of the farm, who fired six shots into the air when he went into the forest to find cashew leaves," said the source. "This was the first time since then that he had gone into the forest."

Another activist opposed to the prawn farm, Siripoj Cheechang, was run over by a pickup truck in October. (See also Gazette issue of October 15, 2000.) Though badly injured, K. Siripoj survived.

The man accused of the attempt on K. Siripoj's life, prawn farm worker Buncha Noppawong, was arrested and is currently out on bail awaiting trial.

On February 3, villagers who said they were living in a "climate of fear" following the shooting - appealed to Interior Minister Banyat Banthadtan, who was visiting Phuket at the time, to ensure that swift action was taken to find K. Jurin's killer.

Thalang District Chief Officer Kanthee Silapa said that police know the whereabouts of

> the two main suspects in the murder, and a close watch is being kept on them.

the owner of the Wachara Prawn Farm, Somsak Wongsawanond, 36, surrendered to police at Phuket Town Police Station after a warrant was issued for his arrest.

The warrant was issued after police investigating K. Jurin's murder amassed evidence suggesting that Somsak fired a pistol into the air six times in the same forest where the murder took place.

Police said that Somsak denied both charges. He was released two days later on bail of 500,000 baht.

## Woman eats free – and police get a photograph

# The Ranong 12: overstayers caught in the crossfire?

Here's the law: Stay in Thailand past the end of your permit to stay and you have broken the law. In fact, in any country in the world, that's the case.

But Thailand has long had a relaxed attitude to this law. Certainly, if police raid your Patong hotel and find that you have overstayed your visa, you are in trouble.

On the other hand, if you go to Immigration and, in effect, confess that you have overstayed, then the result has always been a slap-on-the-wrist fine of 200 baht per day of overstay.

In the wake of the arrest of 12 people by Tourist Police and Highway Police on February 8, Ranong Immigration reiterated that its slap-on-the-wrist policy remains unchanged. Anyone making it that far will be fined and allowed to make the hop into Burma and back again.

But anyone doing the run to Ranong should now be aware that, like wildebeest on migration crossing Kenya's Mara River, there are crocodiles waiting for them. Some will get eaten.

This is plainly not a nationwide drive by Immigration to crack down on overstays. Nor is it a nationwide drive by the Tourist Police and Highway Police. It is very much a local affair.

Just what is behind it is a matter for conjecture. The visa run bus company has alleged that the police were soliciting bribes in return for freedom. The police deny this. Indeed, the major in charge of the Tourist Police told the *Gazette*, "I can guarantee that the Tourist Police officers did not ask for money because we are not in trouble [financially] and I constantly remind them to not do that."

Others have theorized that the "Ranong 12 " got caught in a battle between competing "visa run" companies. But no hard evidence has surfaced to support this theory.

There will undoubtedly be those who will argue that "the law is the law". But anyone familiar with Thailand will know that on-theground interpretation of the law is more important than the word of the law.

Although this attitude may often be convenient for those who push the boundaries of Thai law, it also means that there is no consistency. Tomorrow's interpretation may be radically different from today's.

While this particular local interpretation of immigration law pertains, those who find they have overstayed their visas are advised to fly out of the country. Thus far, neither the Tourist Police nor the Highway Police appear to be stopping aircraft. – The Editor

# Phuket: a forgotten destination?

he cancellation of so many direct flights to the island is a big problem, and one I fear will eventually cause Phuket to fall off the tourism map if allowed to continue.

The PTA is planning to attend a TAT roadshow to Sydney and Melbourne from February 11 to16. Now that THAI has canceled its direct flights to Phuket from these two cities, we don't know what we are going to say to the travel agents we will meet there. But this trip was planned long before TG canceled the service, so we still must go though with it.

Even if Australian carriers continue direct flights to Phuket, there is a risk that if they stop, then the only direct flights to Phuket from Australia will be charter flights.

I am really worried that the effect will be disastrous if there are no direct scheduled flights to Phuket from Australia and Japan.

On March 5, we will attend the ITB [world's largest tourism trade show] in Germany and after that we will continue on to Copenhagen and Stockholm to run further promotions there.

We also have plans to go to South Korea, Hong Kong and Russia. These promotional tours will be funded by the Governor's office of the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor).

Even if there are no direct flights to Phuket from some major cities, I don't think we can afford to stop our promotional work in those locations. A case in point is Hong Kong, which used **FIRST PERSON** 

espite taking part in numerous Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) "roadshows" and other tourism promotion schemes, members of the Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) are now beginning to wonder if all of these efforts are in vain.

Thai Airways International (THAI) has dropped many of its direct flights to Phuket from abroad, making it harder and more time-consuming for tourists to reach Phuket. Worsening the situation further is a reduction in THAI'S Phuket-Bangkok flights and government cuts to the TAT budget for overseas advertising of Phuket. With more than 30,000 hotel rooms on the island, PTA president Pattanapong Aikvanich fears for the future of the island's economy should Phuket become a "forgotten" destination.

to be a major year-round source of tourists - when people there could get direct flights.

Hong Kong now has a Disneyland, which is attracting a lot of visitors from [mainland] China and Taiwan. But I think eventually interest in Phuket will return to these markets.


The main sources of tourists to Phuket are South Korea, Australia, Europe and Thailand. We cannot forget Thai tourists, because about 25% of tourists visiting Phuket are from other parts of Thailand.

But we must not stop marketing abroad, either. We received a budget to do roadshows from both the province and OrBorJor, but today the TAT budget from central government was cut. If the central government recognized Phuket's importance as a regional tourism and travel hub, it would not have authorized these budget cuts. There is nothing the TAT office in Phuket can do about the budget cuts, so their policy this year is to stop marketing at conventions.

We discussed the problem with THAI after they cut the Melbourne-Sydney-Phuket route, but they said their load factor, at just 60%, was making them lose about 1-2 million baht per month. We think this is small compared to the number of tourists the flights bring to Phuket and the money they spend here.

In fact, the government should help by giving a marketing budget to the TAT or by providing the airline with a fuel cost subsidy.

We should try and improve our communication, which will be



ing, "It's finished." So far, direct international flights to Phuket that THAI has decided to cancel are from Hong Kong, Sydney-Melbourne, Osaka and some of those from Tokyo. I have heard that THAI plans to stop flights from South Korea in February or March.

I don't understand why THAI has felt it necessary to stop these routes when other airlines can continue to operate them. If THAI cannot run these routes at a profit, they should cede them to a low-cost carrier who can.

My biggest worry is that the Andaman provinces will become a forgotten destination, because when tourists want to travel here - but cannot - they will simply find alternative destinations.

THAI now operates only about 12 to13 flights per day between Bangkok and Phuket; before the tsunami, they flew about 18. The big problem is that people arriving in Bangkok on international flights must then get a connecting flight if their final destination is Phuket.

This creates major problems when there are not enough flights to Phuket. I got a lot of complaints from people who tell me that they need to book too far in advance and that the flights are always full.

I've seen as many as 40-50 people queued up in Bangkok hoping to get a standby ticket to Phuket over long weekends or during holidays. Maybe these people will just give up on coming here altogether.

On some flights, such as the flight from Japan's Narita International Airport to Phuket, they should try to cut down on the number of direct flights – say from seven per week to three – rather than just axing the route completely.

This is better because the route will be kept alive and it won't be necessary to start from scratch with the travel agents and other parts of the tourism industry when demand increases.

It really is very difficult without direct flights. How would you feel about an enforced threehour stopover in Manila every time you flew from Phuket to Tokyo?

I wouldn't like it, you probably wouldn't like it and nor would other tourists, but that is what the situation will be if they do away with the direct route.

## Why is it so difficult to find books and music by HM the King?

Try as I may, I have been unable to find in Phuket's book or music shops any translations or books (apart from Tong Daeng) or music - specifically the jazz compositions of HM King Bhumibol

Adulyadej. I am particularly interested in finding His Majesty's translation of Phyllis Auty's Tito, a biography of Marshal Josip Broz Tito, the former Yugoslavian leader.

I had hoped that my lack of success was simply the result of the staff at B2S in Central Festival Phuket not understanding my English, but when I asked a Thai friend to inquire, she was met with similarly blank - yet still smiling – faces, and ordering a book or a CD seemed, as ever, simply too difficult a task for the staff.



## COMPUTER Q&A Freaking out KHUN WOODY'S Norton Internet Security was included free when I bought my new computer, but I have two problems with it.

First, Norton Firewall keeps bugging me about allowing programs to connect to the Internet. Second, it keeps asking me for money.

Do I really need the firewall? Should I succumb to Norton's demands that I pay for a "free" program?

Norton Internet Security covers several important bases, but there are programs that are just as good, are not nearly as obtrusive, and don't have a habit of demanding filthy lucre every 90 days.

Every Windows computer that's connected to the Internet needs an anti-virus program, an anti-spyware program and a firewall. Period. No exceptions.

For an anti-virus program, I recommend - and use - AVG Free Edition from Grisoft.

As long as you're using AVG Free in your home, and not for a commercial enterprise, it's absolutely free.

Grisoft makes its money with licenses for companies and organizations. Download it from http://free.grisoft.com


For an anti-spyware program, I recommend Microsoft's free (yes, you read that correctly) AntiSpyware, which is currently available at www.microsoft.com/ athome/security/spyware/software/default.mspx.

Microsoft is in the process of developing AntiSpyware into a new product called Windows Defender, and bundling it with (decidedly not free) protection packages. So get it free while you can.

Finally, the firewall built into Windows XP Service Pack 2 (SP2) works fine, as far as it goes. If you have Windows XP and you aren't running SP2, you're playing with fire. Run don't walk – to update.microsoft. com and go through all the steps necessary to get up to date.

The SP2 firewall works only one way: it only keeps the

bad guys out of your system. Advanced firewalls block potentially problematic programs that try to reach out from your machine and get onto the Internet. The SP2 firewall doesn't do that. Windows Vista, the next version of Windows due out late this year, does have a two-way firewall.

You want a two-way firewall so that you'll be warned if a malicious program has already taken hold of your computer. Look for a free solution such as ZoneAlarm (www.zonelabs. com).

Q I just installed a new com-puter, hooked it up to my TOT ADSL line, and it doesn't work.

Actually, I can get to most

websites, but as soon as I try to log on to eBay, Hotmail, Gmail or PayPal, the computer just freezes.

The same thing happens when I try to submit my credit card information to Amazon to buy a book, or to thaiair.com to buy an airplane ticket.

My old computer worked fine. What am I doing wrong?

This bug has been about for nearly a year and TOT still hasn't solved the problem.

Worse still, TOT tech support still won't communicate by email and every time you call them you are put through to a person who is new to your same old problem, and because there is no "client history" record, you get to start all over from scratch each time you call.

Every Internet Service Provider, including TOT, is respon-

sible for setting up a computer called a Domain Name Server (DNS).

The DNS translates Web addresses you and I can understand (say, www.phuketgazette .net) into numbers that the Internet can understand (a socalled "IP Address", in this case, 203.146.21.166).

I don't know why, but the DNS that TOT uses for some of its customers doesn't work with "secure" Web sites, such as Amazon.com or thaiair.com or SCBEasy.com, that need to establish secure connections with your computer.

I had that problem for almost a year – and dozens of phone calls to TOT in Bangkok didn't solve a thing.

I finally found the trick. I called the local TOT installation folks and had them re-install the ADSL line. When they left, I went snooping and was astounded to find that they had over-written the

main DNS setting on my computer.

I changed all the other computers on my network, and voila! suddenly - after months of trying to get the problem solved via TOT tech support in Bangkok – it all worked.

Here's how to tell if you have the same problem. Start your favorite Web browser and go to Hotmail (www.hotmail.com).

If you have a Hotmail account, log in with your ID. If you don't have a Hotmail account, follow the instructions on that page to sign up for one.

If you get all the way through to the main Hotmail page - that is, if you can read and create email messages - breathe a sigh of relief. You don't have this particular problem.

If you can't get through – if your browser just sits there at some point, frozen, lost in space - here's how to fix things. Note, this isn't official TOT advice. It's just a hack that worked for me.

Click Start | Control Panel | Network and Internet Connections | Network Connections. Right-click on either Local Area Connection if you have a hardwired connection, or Wireless Network Connection if you connect to the Internet via wireless.

At the bottom of the middle box you'll see an entry that says Internet Protocol TCP/IP.


Click once on that line, then click Properties. You'll see a dialog box that looks like the one pictured on this page.


Click the button marked Use the Following DNS Server Addresses, then type these four numbers in the box for Preferred DNS Server: 203 121 130 39

Click OK twice. It'll take a while for your computer to digest the new settings, but when you're done, you should be able to get onto any secure site.

Blame the folks at TOT in Bangkok. They're clueless.

## No sign of takeoff for Phuket-Haad Yai air service

PHUKET: Following disastrous losses in 2004 and 2005. Phuket Air laid off over 300 staff between April and end-August 2005. Phuket's namesake carrier also closed its offices in Phuket, Krabi and Haad Yai and, in October, suspended its daily service between the island and Haad Yai.

Phuket Air's abandonment of the Phuket-Haad Yai (HKT-HDY) service, which had used aging 64-seat YS11 aircraft from Japan, was only the latest in a string of such cancelations of the route between the two international airports.

Businessman trying to avoid a six-hour drive between the two cities - or a nine-hour bus journey - now find themselves having to fly all the way to Bangkok and then south to Haad Yai, coming back the same way.

Haad Yai-based travel agent Raju Sharma, who has an office and coordinates visa runs to Penang, where Sharma Travel's main office is located, told the

*Gazette*, "My Phuket customers factor doesn't justify it," she said. are not to happy about there not being a flight here," he said.

He said there have there had been rumors that Thai Air-Asia was negotiating to take over the route and was only waiting for final approval.

The Gazette was unable confirmation this with Thai AirAsia. The legality of that carrier's existing domestic routes came under question recently, when majority control of the carrier fell into foreign hands with the controversial sale of Thai AirAsia's parent company, Shin-Corp, to the Singaporean government's Temasek investment arm

Other airlines appear uninterested in the route.

Kalayapha Panich, Phuketbased District Sales Manager for Upper-Southern Thailand of Thai Airways International (THAI), said that THAI had no plans to resurrect its HDY-HKT service.

"I think the main reason that we stopped it years ago is that it is a short distance and the load

A public relations officer at

Nok Air, the low-cost carrier majority-owned by THAI, said on condition of anonymity that her airline, too, had no plans to take over the route.

Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket Office Region 4 Director, Suwalai Pinpradab, said that restablishing air service between the two cities would support the TAT's strategy of bringing in more low-season tourists from Malaysia and Indonesia.

"Not having this service does make it harder for visitors from Malaysia and even Medan in Indonesia to travel to Haad Yai and then get a connecting flight here.

"Accessibility is a major factor in tourism growth. I think the flight would really support tourism as the number of Malaysian visitors would triple if they were able to fly here via Haad Yai," she said.

Phuket Tourist Association President Pattanapong Aikwanich noted that Malaysians could

still fly direct to Phuket on the existing Kuala Lampur-Phuket flight. The absence of a HKT-HDY route affected business travel more than tourism, he said.

"I won't go on a business trip to Haad Yai unless it's really urgent, because it means I have to drive there. Haad Yai is the major commercial area of lower southern of Thailand, just as Phuket is for the upper South.

"The HKT-HDY flight was one of the first [non-Bangkok] domestic routes in Thailand. It's unbelievable that there is no air service between the two cities," he said.

"We have heard nothing about another carrier taking over this route, but if it happens it will certainly be good," he added.

Phuket Airport Director Sq/ Ldr Pornchai Eua-aree, formerly Director of Haad Yai Airport, told the *Gazette* that he had already checked with many carriers about taking over the route, only to get the same answer: there is not sufficient demand to operate the route at a profit.

"There is demand for flights but not enough to cover costs,' he said. Other airlines that have flown the route [THAI, Bangkok Airways, Andaman Air and Phuket Air] have never managed to make a profit on it. I think they should consider a Bangkok-Phuket-Haad Yai route," he said.

The Aviation Department is keen to see a carrier take over the route and would accept offers from any interested carrier, he added.

One company that would appear to benefit from the lack of a HKT-HDY air link is Sritrang Tour Co, which operates eight air-conditioned coaches daily between the two cities.

However, Sritrang Managing Director Waluree Wiprakasit said she had not noticed any rise in passenger numbers since the cancelation of Phuket Air's HKT-HDY service.

"Almost all our passengers are local people. Some are students studying in Haad Yai and others are patients traveling to the Prince of Songkhla University Hospital. We don't get many businessmen using our service ... for those who do want to travel between the two cities I think it's a lot faster for them to do it by flying via Bangkok," she said.





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# **Coming in from the cold**



o most people, Russia would have no appeal for their investment capital or any part of it. For others in search of outstanding returns, it still offers enormous attractions.

There are various ways that an investor can have a stake in Russia, from diluted versions of the BRIC concept – a fund that invests in Brazil, Russia, India and China – which have been featured in this column before. Previously, I mentioned BRIC in reference to HSBC's fund. However, BRIC is also being used as an investment block by Goldman Sachs and others. It seems that the BRIC concept will soon be featured on many fund managers "available" list.

The other highly profitable approach has been an Eastern European approach, which includes Russia. Investment groups such as Thames River Capital have delivered gains of around 300% over the past five years in their Eastern European funds.

However, for any investor who wants Russia as a direct investment destination for part of a portfolio, there are several choices.

The largest foreign portfolio investor in Russia is Hermitage Capital Management.

Its investment started in 1994, so, in terms of Russian investment history, it was one of the pioneers. Since then, Hermitage Capital has turned every US\$1

into US\$18. Their investment more than doubled in 2005 alone.

At the recent World Economic Forum – held annually in Davos, Switzerland – the CEO of Hermitage Capital, Bill Browder, who was there to address this body on Russian investment, also gave interviews to the media.

He outlined his view of Russia as evolving, from 1994, as a place of absolute and total chaos to one of plain chaos. Much of Browder's audience consisted of the CEOs of large multinationals interested in investing in Russia. He promised that they would succeed in Russia only by "rolling up their sleeves". "Why Russia?" many investors may well ask. There are many reasons for and many against. To start with the latter; the rule of law is not firmly entrenched and the political leadership, despite being labeled as democratic in the media, places limits on personal freedom, and displays tendencies akin to a dictatorship.

On the plus side, Russia has "never had it so good". World commodity prices have, generally, skyrocketed and Russia has a lot more than most in these fields. Gold, diamonds, platinum, bauxite, coal, oil, natural gas and more can be found in profusion in Russia. Russia sits above possibly the greatest treasure trove in the world.

Russia, via its state-controlled Gazprom entity, is negotiating with Norway's state-controlled Statoil to exploit a new oil and natural gas field in the Barents Sea. It is estimated that this area contains at least 40 billion barrels of the stuff.

Russia received negative publicity for its recent handling of the Ukrainian natural gas pipeline, which also reaches through Ukraine to Western Europe.

They insisted that Ukraine would have to pay the normal market price for natural gas. Ukraine's new ruling political party favors closer ties with the European Union at the expense of its historical ties with Russia.

The result was that Russia insisted on market prices for its natural gas as opposed to the 75% discount Ukraine had enjoyed for the previous 15 years. Russia won the contest, but only after bitter animosity.

Russia has forged better ties with some important countries. For decades, relations with China were sour but they have now turned 180 degrees. Both countries have a strong vested interest in trade links; China needs Russia's natural resources and Russia wants the revenue for its own development. The relationship now includes joint military exercises. Russia's offer to enrich Iran's uranium in Russia itself may defuse the tension that currently exists.

On the investment front, the Russian stock market currently trades at a price/earning ratio (PE) of around 11.2; this, by Russian historical standards, is not cheap. Normally, because of political and legal concerns, Russia has has single digit PE ratios. When compared with Europe, with a PE of around 13.5, to the US at 15 and with Japan at 18, it still offers value.

The decision to invest in Russia rests entirely with the individual. But it is an interesting alternative.

ne of the more interesting media interviews at the World Economic Forum was with the Indian Foreign Minister.

This took place against a background where, in 2006, the focus of the forum moved, to a substantial extent, to the effects of Chinese and Indian economic growth on the future of the world.

The Indian Foreign Minister emphasized how manufacturing was to be a substantial part of the Indian economy, in addition to the fact that India is introducing economic reforms on a daily basis.

He also added that India and China have agreed to bid, on a joint basis, for oil and gas concessions around the world. Trade between the two countries has boomed over the past decade and political relationships have improved immeasurably.

India's central bank, the Reserve Bank, expects economic growth of 7.5% to 8% this year. Many economists are predicting that it will reach 10% a year within three years.

The center of economic gravity is changing at an astonishing pace.

ny top golfer will tell you that it's not a perfect golf swing that makes a good player. If the truth be known, many professionals on the PGA Tour have golf swings that are less than textbook.

Colin Montgomerie and Jim Furyk are two names that come to mind. They don't possess great golf swings, yet they remain world-class players.

A big difference between the average golfer and the worldclass player is what goes through their minds when playing golf. Fact: if the average golfer went onto the course with a more positive attitude, then they would play better golf. Most golfers prepare for disaster. Great golfers prepare for success.

#### **STARVATION**

I would say that golf is 80% mental. Sure, you need to grip the golf club correctly - and the way I see some golfers holding the club, I'm surprised they make any contact with the ball. If they held their knife and fork the same way as they grip a golf club, they would starve to death.

So a good grip and a good set up is important. A golf swing which is a "turn back and turn through the ball" will be far more consistent than a swing which is all hands and arms.

A good short game is required; the rest is all in the mind. The way you think on a golf course is what the end result will be. If you go out there thinking

David admits that life on the Tour means that home tends to be a hotel and a suitcase, although he is relatively

settled in Phuket for the next few months as he readies himself for the rigors of the 2006 PGA Tour. In this, the first in a series of articles, David explains how the right mental approach to the game can make all the difference.

you're going to play badly, then nine times out of 10 this is what will happen. It's a self-fulfilling prophecy. If you stand on the tee, and picture your ball landing in the water or going out of bounds, there's a good chance it will.

So how do you go about changing the way you think? The first thing to accept is that this change will not happen overnight. You need to train your mind to having positive thoughts on the golf course.

For example, picture yourself standing on the tee. "That's an out-of-bounds on the right", you think to yourself. Your immediate thought, quite naturally, is, "Don't hit it there." However, doing this focuses the mind on that direction, making it more likely that that is where the ball will go.

What you must do is pick a spot where you want the ball to go, the middle of the fairway for example. Play the shot in your mind just once, visualizing your golf ball flying down the middle of the fairway. Then address your ball, take one more look at the middle of the fairway, and pull the trigger.

Do this with every shot, even when you're around the green. On a pitch or chip shot, look at the spot where you want your ball to land, play the shot in your mind – again, do this just once - and visualize your ball landing on that spot and rolling into the hole, then go up to your ball and go through the same routine.

#### POSITIVE

Using this method on every golf shot will result in you playing golf in a much more positive way. Your scores will improve and you will find it's much more fun playing this way.

Golf really is a game of confidence, and when it's low, your game can be hard work. I have seen golfers in the Top 10 of the world rankings give up the game – all because of a lack of confidence.

One story that comes to



mind is that of Australian pro golfer Ian Baker-Finch. In 1991, he won the British Open Championship shooting 64 and 66 on the final two days. He was a great player - and a gentleman - and was well liked by his fellow competitors on the tour.

After winning the British Open, he started to make a few changes to his golf swing to try and hit the ball a little further. He planned to play on the US Tour, and because the golf courses in the US are longer compared with Europe, he felt he needed that extra length off the tee.

The changes that he made to his swing worked and he started to hit the ball longer, but also a lot wilder. He became very erratic off the tee, which showed in his scores. He then went a straight 32 tournaments without collecting a pay check.

He decided to go back to his old swing, the one that had won him the British Open – and over a million dollars in prize money.

#### NIGHTMARE

But his swing just did not feel right. He started seeing different golf coaches, 12 of them to be precise, and they all told him much the same thing. They agreed that his swing looked good, that he was hitting the ball great on the range, but as soon as he went out onto the golf course, he just didn't know which direction the ball was going to go. The bigger the tournament was, the worse it got.

It was not his swing which was the problem, it was his confidence. More to the point, it was his lack of it. He was having a nightmare out on the course, but he kept battling away, trying somehow to find his game again.

But it just got worse. In the 1997 British Open, Ian Baker-Finch was having one of his worst rounds of golf and was quite literally all over the place. He returned a first round score of 92, which was 20 over par. It was one of the highest scores ever recorded at The Open by a professional.

Ian came off the 18<sup>th</sup> green and headed for the locker room, where he broke down in tears. He later said, "I felt like I was walking naked, like the grass was taller than me. I tried to walk with my head high. [But] It was really hard."

At just 35 years of age and at what should have been the height of his career, he decided to finish playing golf.

The next time you go out for a game of golf, remember that it is just a game, and every minute of it should be enjoyed. As the great Ben Hogan said, "Take time to smell the flowers.<sup>3</sup>

LANGKAWI: The Rebak Champagne Run, the overnight yacht race from Phuket to Langkawi traditionally held on the eve of the annual Royal Langkawi International Regatta (RLIR), was aborted for the first time in its four-year-history.

Tony Knight, of the Ao Chalong Yacht Club (ACYC), which organizes the Champagne Run, explained, "The RLIR was moved forward, not by just a day but by nearly a month [to February 11-17]. which made it very difficult for us to organize the Champagne Run so quickly after the Phang Nga Bay Regatta.

"They [could not have expected] 50 boats to be in the Phang Nga Bay Regatta, now officially recognized as the second-largest regatta in Asia, and then have expected them be down there 10 days later. Their numbers will have been down this year because of it.'

A disappointed Mr Knight also explained that the Champagne Run trophy is a "perpetual cup", on which the name of the winning boat each year is inscribed, and from which the omission of a 2006 winner will remain.

However, he added, "After the

ACYC annual meeting [set for early April] we'll be talking to them and hopefully we can make both events bigger and better."

Mr Knight also announced that the first race of the ACYC Keelboat and Multihull Race Series 2006 will be held on March 5, with the rest of the series to be held on the following dates: March 19, April 2, April 16, June 4, June 18, July 2, July 16, August 13, August 27, October 1, October 15, October 29, November 12 and November 26.

He explained that this year's race series has been organized so as to allow local yachts to compete in other regattas in the region. "For example, there will be no ACYC races in May, so local yachts can race in the Top of the Gulf Regatta and the Koh Samui Regatta," he said.

The presentation night for this year's series will be held on Friday, December 1.

Mr Knight added that on every second Sunday starting March 12, the ACYC will have three Optimist dinghies available to introduce children to sailing.

"We would like to encourage parents to bring their kids out for a day sailing," he said.

anyway. "During the war," my long-departed grandmother used to say, "people in Britain were healthier than they'd ever been" (Unless they had just been blown up by a V-1 doodlebug – Ed.).

And she was right. They didn't have fast food or pretty much anything that was processed or packaged in any way. (Apart from spam - Ed.)

Today, we have a McDonald's or KFC on virtually every street corner – and not just in the west; these insidious establishments have diversified their operations into the rest of the world. How many McDonald's are there in Phuket now? I've already lost count of the KFCs.

I don't think it any coincidence that if you go up to Isarn a quiet, relatively undeveloped area in the northeast of Thailand - that everyone there seems to be the antithesis of my girth; they're all slim. Why? Maybe it's because the KFC mentality hasn't quite made it up there yet. I have the feeling that the residents of Isarn are still eating what they've been eating for centuries - including cats if the popular music video phu bao kin maew is to be believed – and they seem to be doing very well on it.

Back to my World War II ancestors, who were in a similar state of health at the time. They survived, very successfully, by consuming whatever they could find locally; whatever grew around them. There's nothing to stop more of us developing this approach here. Maybe a few more natural foods would do us

# Oddly, it does grow on trees

all good. This is getting scary now - I'm starting to sound like one of those pale-skinned macrobiotic types.

There are dozens of edible plants that grow around us in southern Thailand, both in gardens and tropical forests. Rural villagers still use this bounty, even here in Phuket, so why shouldn't we? In case you feel the urge to do something healthy (hang on, I'll put down my beer), here is a brief selection of some of the many plants available.

**Bauhinia:** The young shoots and leaves of the plant are used in soups and curries. It's dead easy to spot, as the two-lobed leaves look like camel toe, which is why it is also known as the camel's foot tree. The bauhinia is also a medicinal plant – the bark is used to soothe mucus membranes and apparently it's also a "cure" for dysentery. If you're stuck for something to tie things together, the fibrous bark can also be used to make rope.

Colubrina: This insignificantlooking bush grows very happily along coastlines. The seeds are buoyant and they tolerate salt

quite well. Locals cook it on top of steamed fish. This versatile tropical plant can be used for food, medicine and even as a soap substitute. It's sometimes called the latherleaf as it creates a lather when rubbed vigorously. No comment.

Star gooseberry: Though this small evergreen tree probably originated in Madagascar, it is found all over southern Thailand today. The fruit is particularly sour. The seeds make it difficult to eat, yet some villagers make a kind of chutney out of it. The young leaves are also edible. It can even be used as a skin treatment to relieve fever and for treating measles. Allegedly.

Kapok tree: The flowers of this useful tree are edible. They are used in curries for flavor and to

add some color. The roots are used as a diuretic and as a skin softener – certainly an odd combination.


The bark is useful for treating diarrhea and dysentery. The sap that comes from under the bark can stop bleeding (Thai tobacco is also reputed to be very good at stopping bleeding, by the way). The flowers help sooth burns. Most importantly, the cottony contents of the seed pod are excellent stuffing for making mattresses and pillows.

Lotus: Bizarrely, this important plant in Thai religion is also used as a popular snack food. The seeds, hidden in those weirdlooking pods that look like shower heads, are eaten raw, or made into sweets in the form of cakes, candies and syrups. The young leaves are edible, as are the roots.

The young leaves are edible, but it's the seeds that people really go for. They dip them, raw or roasted, in chili paste and cook them in curries; spicy pork curry is a favorite. If you're married, eating this stuff as a couple will make the following day easier for both of you.

Piperaceae: This pepper family leaf grows close to the ground. A popular Thai snack called miang kam uses these leaves. You take a leaf, form it into a sort of bowlshape, then sprinkle with roasted coconut, ginger, small purple onions, a sweet syrup, peanuts and, inevitably, chilies.

Each crunchy bite is an explosion of different flavors. Miang kam is one of the most amazing culinary experiences possible, but you'll definitely need some instruction in how to put these things together.

Apparently, the entire plant helps you "expel gas", whatever that means. I'm not sure that I would choose to consume something that I knew would make me fart (can I say "fart" in a gar-dening column?), but traditional Thais swear by it. If you have a toothache, crush the roots and leaves, sprinkle on some salt, and rub into the offending molar. This plant seems to do everything.

Another plant that deserves a mention is the cashew – a weirdo in itself. More on that one in the coming weeks.

You don't need to go an a healthfood-crazed binge to enjoy the local plant fare. I would go so far as to say that a polite Heineken is a perfect accompaniment to miang kam. In fact, I rather think it's lunchtime.

hey're suddenly evervwhere on Phuket: blueand-white signs with a picture of a wave, stating "tsunami hazard area" or "tsunami evacuation route."

Security is important to people in Phuket, visitors and residents alike. We like to feel secure from thieves, road accidents, falling stars and tsunamis. Especially tsunamis. It did happen here, so it's necessary for one's peace of mind to know that there is a warning system in place.

But wouldn't it be better if the services warning us about tsunamis – such as signs advising us where to go in case of an approaching a tsunami - were placed in areas that would be affected.

It's hardly likely that Ao Por on the northeast coast of Phuket, or Cape Yamu, also on the northeast coast, would face a tsunami – unless a volcano happened to erupt in the middle of Phang Nga Bay or an earthquake occurred in Krabi, in which case the re- the tectonic plates in the Indian

sulting tsunami would be the least of our problems given that Phang Na Bay is only a few metres deep.

If we need to drive up that road to escape a tsunami, we'd better hope that Noah and his Ark are around somewhere. It's a good 10 minutes' drive from the nearest seawater and at least 30 minutes from the nearest beaches seriously affected by the 2004 tsunami.

For residents, the placement of the signs indicates little thought, though they are good for a laugh, if nothing else.

On the other hand, for those who don't know the island, or people who don't have the education or knowledge to understand the cause of the tsunami, the signs may be unnecessarily alarming, apart from being a waste of money.

Clearly, the government has to take responsibility for the safety of people in the event of another such occurrence, but these signs are no help. There is no way any one in a tsunamithreatened area is going to head for Bang Pae waterfall.





#### Construction Update

he heavy equipment is being rolled away and contractor Civil & Interior Co Ltd is adding the finishing touches to the 77-room Thiwa Ratri Resort & Spa, built at a cost of 300 million baht. The resort's soft opening will be on March 9.

Resort owner Varanee Susangrat and General Manager Permsak Yodmit explained to the *Gazette* that construction of the 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-star resort, on 10 rai near Phuket FantaSea, began early in 2004.

The resort is made to a Balinese design, complete with pagodas, and multi-layered roofs with figurines perched on top peering down onto guests.

Three of the 77 units are Deluxe Villas, each with 160 square meters of open-plan space, and each decorated with handmade features including a large indoor water feature.

Honeymoon Villas of 105 sqm, also featuring in-room waterfalls, comprise 12 units, and seven units are Deluxe Pavilions, each of 95sqm.

The bulk of the accommodation is in the 55 Honeymoon Pavilions, each offering 70sqm of space.

Others facilities include a conference room that can accommodate 140 guests seated seminar-style, as well as restaurants, two swimming pools, a spa and a fitness center.

Several architects were employed to make the best use of each architect's individual flair in creating K. Varanee's concept of an ideal relaxing atmosphere.

"We want guests to feel they are in natural surroundings during their stay at the resort. Customers can see we have worked hard to make sure that 90% of the work that went into building the resort was done by hand," K. Varanee said.

To that end bricklayers were brought in from Cambodia and Laos to build the columns as they had the necessary skill in laying the bricks in the classic Asian style.

Adding to the classic style, the 100,000 or so handmade bricks used in the construction of the resort were all imported and had been tempered by 50 years of exposure to the elements.

"The bricks were imported from Myanmar, Cambodia and Laos and 'aged' by more than 50 years. We did not use cement to make the columns; instead we used the ancient style of bricks laid by hand.

"The effort we have put into building the resort will demonstrate to guests that we will give them the same level of service," he added.

K. Permsak explained that the materials used were all topquality and chosen for their handmade, natural looks. The handmade floor tiles were imported from Indonesia, and teak has been used extensively throughout the rooms, for structural support, main features and even furniture, he explained.


"The color scheme makes

The infrastructure supporting the resort includes an on-site well and reserve water tank to ensure supply in the dry season.
