Foreign guides plan comes under attack

PHUKET: Panomphol Thummachartniyom, President of the Phuket Professional Guide Association (PPGA), has blasted a proposal to legalize foreign tour guides.

There are already enough qualified Thai guides, he argued, while slamming the authorities for not cracking down on foreigners working illegally as guides.

"Phuket already has problems with foreigners working as tour guides, especially Koreans and Russians. Thais who have already been trained are being used only as 'sitting guides'.

"This makes the Thai guides feel discouraged about their work and many choose to stop working as guides," he said.

Tour firms that use illegal foreign guides usually also employ "sitting" Thai guides whose job it is to act as window dressing should a tour party encounter the police or other officials.

K. Panomphol's comments came after Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura floated the idea of legalizing foreign guides at a Provincial Hall meeting on February 15, saying that Tourism and Sports Minister Pracha Maleenont had asked him to sound out opinions.

The PPGA President continued, "Foreign guides are still working in Thailand because foreign tour companies still hire them. They work illegally which makes it easy for the companies to control them.

"Everyone – including the police – knows that there are illegal guides working in Phuket, but still there are about 2,000 illegal guides here."

He added angrily, "Minister Pracha says that we don't have enough guides, but we have conducted a nationwide survey and there are more than enough guides covering all [the major tourist] languages."

The 2,000 Thai registered guides working in Phuket were already suffering, he said; about half of them are currently unemployed due to the drop in tourist numbers since the tsunami.

He also reminded the Governor that the PPGA and the Guide Association of Thailand had staged a protest rally against legalizing foreign guides in Bangkok on November 1 last year.

Gov Udomsak replied, "We may have enough guides, but we need to look at whether they are fluent, whether they have been trained to a level that ensures that tourists of all nationalities feel as if they are talking to a guide from their home country."

The Governor did not comment about illegal guides working in Phuket, but Phuket Tourist Police Inspector Maj Bundit Khaosutham told the *Gazette*, "If police discover illegal tour guides, they are obliged to arrest them.

"However, we have only a few officers to go on patrol inspecting tour groups. The Tourist Police have to deal with many problems involving tourists, such as jet-skis, tuk-tuks and drunks fighting.

"We are now focusing on building tourists' confidence in visiting Phuket, so we have even less time to inspect tour groups."

Gov orders study on new Patong-airport highway

PHUKET: Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura on February 15 ordered the Phuket Provincial Highways Office (PPHO) to conduct a study into the feasibility of building a road between Phuket International Airport and Patong.

"Right now, a lot of properties are being developed along the main road from the airport [Route 402], and soon Phuket will have traffic congestion problems," he said.

"The same happened in Lad Prao, in Bangkok. When many properties were developed there, the number of cars and people in the area increased, causing the traffic congestion [that exists] there now."

Gov Udomsak said he would like a more direct route from the airport to Patong, passing the Pearl Village Hotel at Nai Yang, Baan Sakoo, Baan Manik, the British Curriculum International School and Loch Palm Golf Club.

He added that he discussed the proposal with Deputy Prime Minister Somkid Jatusripitak the previous week.

"If we are allowed to do it, the PPHO would build this road to be a 'tourism route' as it will pass old tin mines and forests, and across the lagoons we could build beautiful bridges that would give the feeling that you are driving in an exotic country," Gov Udomsak said.

Talbot murder trial set to start next January

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Provincial Court Judge Yupawan Pirisinsith was briefed on February 20 on defense and prosecution witness lists in the case of Briton Paul Chetwynd-Talbot, accused of murdering his girlfriend, fellow Briton Debra O'Hanlon.

The judge scheduled the next hearing in the case for January 18 next year, to allow the prosecution time to examine eight witnesses.

Judge Yupawan, who will decide at that time what charges may be brought against the accused, instructed the prosecution to focus on forensic evidence given by doctors who examined the body of Ms O'Hanlon.

Kathu Police recommended that Chetwynd-Talbot be tried for murder.

Ms O'Hanlon's body was discovered in the couple's rented room at the Eric Guesthouse on Nanai Rd on July 31, 2005. An examination found that her neck was broken.

Chetwynd-Talbot turned himself in to Kathu Police three days later and confessed to hitting Ms O'Hanlon in the face. He claimed the force of the blow caused her to fall back against the bed head, breaking her neck.

Bound in leg irons and handcuffs, Chetwynd Talbot appeared healthy but dejected during the February 21 hearing, which lasted iust 10 minutes.

Defense attorney Somsak Chattay told the court that because the autopsy report revealed that no weapon was used against Ms O'Hanlon, the charge should be one of inflicting injury resulting in accidental death, punishable by three to 15 years imprison-

The murder charge, in contrast, carries a mandatory sentence of 15 years to capital pun-

K. Somsak also presented the court with an autopsy report from Vachira Hospital that showed the cause of death to be a combination of brain hemorrhage and a complete neck fracture.

"I want this charge changed from murder to inflicting injury resulting in accidental death," he said. "Paul never intended to kill Ms O'Hanlon."

After the hearing Chetwynd-Talbot was returned to Phuket Provincial Prison, where he will stay until the next hearing. No request for bail was made. If he is found guilty, time already served may be deducted from the sentence.

K. Phummisak said that the property industry is showing solid growth. It is in better shape than the tourism industry, he said, because its customers include Thais as well as foreigners.

He noted, however, the link between property and tourism. "We have had good feedback from foreigner investors, both those developing property and those buying homes in Phuket and

"They believe that tourism will return to normal, which gives them the courage to invest."

ow-cost carriers keen on Krabi

KRABI: Low-cost carrier Thai increase its service to Krabi to AirAsia will launch daily direct flights from Bangkok to Krabi on March 1, while Singaporean lowcost carrier Tiger Airways has announced it will extend its Singapore-Krabi service to run throughout the low season.

Thai AirAsia Public Relations Executive Jaqueline Mercader told the Gazette that the new service, designated FD 3165, will depart Bangkok daily at 5:05 pm with return flight FD 3164 departing Krabi at 6:50 pm. The aircraft used will be a 148-seat Boeing 737.

In April, the airline plans to

two flights daily.

In order to mark the launch of the new Krabi service, Thai AirAsia is offering a three-day, two-night package from Bangkok with accommodation at the SriLanta, Krabi Hotels & Resorts, for 6,999 baht, Ms Mercader added.

The no-frills carrier is also planning to launch Bangkok-Surat Thani routes, though the start date for this has yet to be fixed, she

Asked about the Phuket-Haad Yai route, abandoned last October by Phuket Air, she said

that there are still no plans to take over the route.

"We know that some passengers are waiting for this service, but at the moment we are very busy and we have other priorities that must come first," she said.

Addressing questions about the status of Thai AirAsia following the sale of parent company ShinCorp to Singapore's Temasek Group, Ms Mercader said there would be no disruption of domestic routes as a result.

She explained that 51% of Thai AirAsia shares have now been acquired by Thai nationals. As a Thai-owned company, it is allowed to fly domestic routes.

In more good news for the Krabi tourism industry, Singapore's low-cost carrier, Tiger Airways, has announced on plans to extend its four-times-weekly direct Singapore-Krabi service to fly throughout the year.

"With Krabi now a yearround destination, we expect visitor numbers to increase substantially this year," said airline CEO Tony Davis in a press statement.

"There are many tourist attractions and marine activities at this beach paradise for visitors that [will] keep them coming back to Krabi. – Janyaporn Morel

He finally sold his share in Thai Garden. Where it stood is

Dave, who is survived by his wife Clara, daughter Catherine and son Zak, had a busy and varied life, during which he traveled to every continent.

At various times he was a master ma-

chinist, a sailor, a gourmet chef, a motorcycle racer, a stock car racer and a Hell's Angel. Above all he was a very funny guy.

Jet-ski races get go-ahead

PATONG: Phuket Province has given the green light for Patong to host the first round of the 2006 Jet Ski Thailand Championship, on March 4 and 5.

The go-ahead for the event was confirmed at a February 14 meeting between Vice-Governor Niran Kalayanamit and members of the Thai Jet Sports Boating Association (TJSBA), including its President, Dr Santad Sasiwa-

After the meeting, V/Gov Niran explained that allowing the event to take place in Phuket did not indicate a policy shift. Both the Governor's office and the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) considered the TJSBA proposal and agreed that the event's tourism promotion benefits were too good to pass up, he said.

Action from the high-profile event will be broadcast on TV in Thailand and abroad by networks including UBC and ESPN, giving Phuket widespread international exposure, he pointed out.

When Phuket turned down the opportunity to host World King's Cup jet-ski races in December 2005, that event was instead held in Pattaya.

TJSBA officials earlier told the Gazette that that event was not approved because it was not in line with provincial policy. But on February 14 V/Gov Niran said that it was bad timing, not policy, that had triggered the rejection of the 2005 event.

"We will continue our provincial policy to regulate jet-skis and make sure they are not too noisy. As for a sporting event such as this, we can control them," he said.

Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukkaban admitted there was some resistance to holding the event in Patong. He suggested that those seeking a quiet day by the sea on the first weekend in March might consider going to one of Phuket's other beaches.

The jet-ski races will take place inside an area 500 meters long and 400 meters in width, just offshore from the Patong football field. Temporary spectator stands will be erected on the beach.

Prize money totaling 60,000 baht will be up for grabs at the event.

Sondhi 'lights a flame' in Phuket

PHUKET CITY: More than 20,000 people attended a rally at Saphan Hin on the night of February 20, addressed by Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra's nemesis, Sondhi Limthongkul.

K. Sondhi and Sarocha Porn-udomsak, his co-host on the weekly political talk show on the ASTV satellite channel, Muang Thai Rai Sapda (Thailand Weekly), were the main speakers at the rally, holding forth in front of a giant banner reading, "Thaksin Get Out".

"It took me a long time to come to Phuket," K. Sondhi told the assembly. "But I will come to Phuket again and again, even if PM Thaksin resigns.

to spread it. We did not light this flame for ourselves alone. We lit it for our children."

"And I want to curse those who have corrupted the nation so that they and the next 10 generations will go to hell," he added.

K. Sondhi concluded his speech by urging the crowd to join the next anti-Thaksin mass rally, planned for next Sunday at Bangkok's Sanam Luang.

"February 26 will be an important day because it will gather together huge numbers of people from around Thailand who want to save

Prem School study nearly complete

KATA: Architect and developer ML Tridhosyuth "Mom Tri" Devakul, says that a study into the feasibility of building a new private school in Phuket should be complete in about two months.

Mom Tri, owner of Mom Tri's Boathouse hotel in Kata, and developer of top-end projects such as the Trisara resort and the Baan Kata development, is also the owner of the Prem Tinsulanonda International School (Prem Center) in Chiang Mai.

While on a visit to Phuket on February 16 with Prem Center school administrators, he told the Gazette that if the decision is made to go ahead with the proposed school in Phuket, the project will be done in tandem with a residential development.

Speaking at his Villa Royale project in Kata, Mom Tri said, "In terms of education it's certainly worth it to establish an IB [International Baccalaureate] school.

"But we have to look at this

from a business standpoint as well, and consider the return on investment."

It cost about 1 billion baht to build the Prem Center in Chiang Mai, which was not developed as part of a real estate project, he added. That school, established in 2001, now has a student body of 400.

"It's similar to developing a golf club. Green fees alone may not be enough to cover the entire cost, so a real estate project is established along with it."

The feasibility study is looking at the pros and cons of building a school and residential project on 600 rai of land Mom Tri owns near Trisara.

"If the study determines the project is viable, we will move forward by talking to relevant parties, including seeking bank funding. We would certainly use the Prem name," he said.

Initially, the Phuket school would be for students from kindergarten age through to 12 or 13 years old, he added.

OVERSTAY FINE TO RISE TO B500

BANGKOK: The fine for remaining in Thailand past the expiry date of a permit to stay, currently 200 baht a day, will rise to 500 baht a day with effect from

However, the maximum fine payable will remain the same, at 20,000 baht, Pol Lt Gen Suwat Thamrongsrisakul, Commander of the Immigration Bureau, stated in a document posted in Thai on the Bureau's website. The document gave no reason for the increase.





eter Davison, the International Services Manager of Phuket International Hospital (PIH) offers some stark statistics. "Around 0.3% of Thais have 'Rhesus-negative' blood, while among non-Asian foreigners, it's around 17%. Now, whereas those are straight percentages, get this: at any one time there can be

as few as 10 units [a unit is 450 milliliters] or less of negative blood stored in Phuket.

"It could take only a medium-sized car or bus crash for the island's supplies of negative blood to be exhausted," he says. "It might even be just one person requiring all available units, as some trauma cases result in severe hemorrhaging."

The situation is, thankfully, being managed – and managed well – by the collaborative efforts of the Thai Red Cross Society and Phuket's government and private hospitals, with an emergency database of a few hundred foreign donors who can expect to be called upon – sometimes at night and usually at very short notice – when a crisis arrives.

Rupert, a 30-something expatriate living in Phuket, is now on first-name terms with the staff managing the blood bank at Vachira Phuket Hospital.

He should be: during the island's high season he receives a call to donate blood every four weeks, on average.

Rupert belongs to one of Phuket's more exclusive clubs; members all have B Rhesusnegative blood. A BLOODY

It would be a bitter irony indeed were one to go to the extreme measure of having one's blood group tattooed on one's arm – only to lose the arm in an accident.

That scenario is unlikely for a number of reasons, a major one being that surprisingly few people actually know what their blood group is. A straw poll in the *Gazette* offices produced a rash of blank looks and shifty gazes rather than knowledgeable answers. Yet blood is quite simply a matter of life and death, and knowing one's blood group can be crucial to survival; following an accident, precious minutes can be lost while the victim's blood group is ascertained. There is also the issue of the availability of donated blood, with – on occasion – scant supplies to hand. The *Gazette*'s **Andy Johnstone** and **Nattamon Ratcharak** investigate, trying to separate fact from fiction; myth from misunderstanding.

"I am told that only around 2% of people of European descent have my blood group, which means that here, I am considered even more special than back in Britain. Apparently, around 0.9% of people of African descent have

it, but of the non-European, non-African communities – such as in Asia – it's as low as 0.1%."

He has known his blood group for about 20 years, since he first began to give blood in the UK.

"Being 'special' brings its own problems; knowing that so few people in Thailand share my blood group does cause me some concern," he says.

"There are around 10 people on the database here with my blood group. If I need a transfusion, then it means there is one less person who can be called upon to donate."

He describes what he feels is a "shared moral responsibility" to donate. "I suppose I like to think that someone would donate their blood as readily as I will. I will not know who they are, and they won't know for whom they are donating blood – perhaps we should form a real club: Phuket Clots or something and have each others' telephone numbers? But we are, surely, part of a community and with that comes a responsibility to one another."

However, it seems that the idea of forming a club is unnecessary. Mr Davison says that the island-wide database that includes Rupert's name and number is operating well, though he does add, "We could always do with more donors."

Explaining more about the system, he says that the "expat" side of it, managed by PIH in conjunction with the other hospitals, was set up around five years ago by Cindy Ratcliffe, now President of the Phuket International Women's Club (PIWC).

"I arrived in Phuket around three years ago from another province in Thailand and had the experience there of problems with the blood donation system. The database here had around 20 or so names on it, mostly PIWC members or their spouses, and I set about expanding it, with the PIWC's aid, as well as that of the Thai Red Cross.

"We are running this project in consultation with the Thai Red Cross Society because we, as a private international hospital... have more 'marketing influence' to go out there and get people on the database," Mr Davison explains.


"We act as central database compiler and distributor. Anybody can phone us and ask to go on the database, and every couple

of months we send out that list to the island's hospitals: Mission Hospital, Vachira Phuket Hospital, Bangkok Hospital Phuket and [PIH], and the [Thai] Red Cross.

"[This is] on the clear understanding that the list is to be used solely for emergencies: it is not to be used for soliciting, marketing or for any other purpose. They, the hospitals, can then call up the negative-blood donors as and when needed."


The database is used frequently, and not just for people in Phuket. "There was a recent case of Bangkok having run out of negative blood; the database in Phuket was activated so blood was donated here to be sent up there," he explains.

As Mr Davison puts it,

Thais cannot supply the "marketplace" with negative blood, and the system therefore has to rely on foreigners.

"That said, all blood is in demand. Stocks – in Phuket and all over Thailand – are not high. We need more donors.'

Expatriate society is by nature transient. "People come here, add their names to the database, stay for a couple of years and then leave. So every 12 months all the person in the database are called to determine if they still live here."

While attempts are made to call all the names on the list over a period of a few days, when it comes to the rarer negative-blood donors, attempts continue for a number of weeks, he says.

Should people feel obliged to become donors? Mr Davison asks a simple question. "If a person needs blood, would they expect someone to have donated blood for them? If the answer is 'yes', then they should consider putting themselves on the database.

"It might not even be you,

month in Phuket. Above, giving blood is not dangerous. Indeed, it offers time to relax and catch up with friends. but one of your loved ones, who

needs it. It is an ethical dilemma individuals must solve for themselves."

But isn't giving blood risky? Mr Davison's response is strident.

"Look, this is a myth, and one that stems from the erroneous view still held by some that Thailand is a Third-World country. It isn't. The entire process is done as per the regulations of the [International Committee of the Red Cross] and consequently, the procedures for donating blood in Thailand are as stringent as they are in Sydney or London. Updates to procedures are implemented here as quickly as they are elsewhere, that is, immediately.

"Donating blood here is very, very safe," he concludes.

The decision whether to donate or not, is of course, a personal one. Rupert's "shared moral responsibility" and Mr Davison's choice of the phrase "ethical dilemma" underline this. People of certain religions, Jehovah's Witnesses for example, are barred from accepting blood transfusions.

But Phra Samianarwudthammo, Abbot of Wat Paaramradtanaram, says that donating blood is every bit as much an act of tam boon (making merit) as giving alms to monks and is in keeping with the Lord Buddha's teachings on giving and not holding onto that which one has.

"In fact," says Phra Samianarwudthammo, "Donating blood is a superior offering to make. It can, after all, save a person's life. The donor will receive much merit for that."

Dr Kongkiat Kespechara, Acting Director of Bangkok Hospital Phuket, agrees.

Among Thais there is the added incentive that the efforts of the Thai Red Cross Society, including its blood drives, have been under Royal Patronage since its inception as the The Red Unalom Society of Siam 113 years ago.

HM Queen Sirikit is President and HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn is Executive

Vice-President of the Thai Red Cross. At the provincial level, the Governor's wife is usually charged with overseeing operations.

"People who donate blood more than 30 times receive a special award personally from HM the Queen, in recognition of their contribution," Dr Kongkiat notes.

He likens the system for blood collection and distribution in Thailand to that of a monetary bank. "The central blood bank is in the capital and there are regional and provincial branches. Our regional center is Nakhon Sri Thammarat, with Vachira Phuket Hospital as the provincial center.

"One of the main functions of the regional center is not only to store copious supplies, but also to test them for contamination with, for example, HIV or Hepatitis A, B or C.

"Blood is also tested when it arrives at a hospital blood bank. And of course, all donors must answer a questionnaire about their general health and lifestyle before they give blood.


"Donation is safe, and so is receiving transfused blood or blood products."

Dr Kongkiat explains that one unit of blood donated does not equate to one life potentially saved. "In fact, one unit of blood is separated into three components: red blood cells; plasma; and platelets, which means that three lives can be saved from each unit.

"On average, between 1,000 and 1,500 units are donated in Phuket each month and we the Thai Red Cross Society and the government and private hospitals here – all agree that more people need to donate blood.

"The process does not take long and is safe for donors. It causes no ill effects as long as you are well rested and have eaten before you donate. From start to finish, it takes y30 minutes, which is a small sacrifice compared with the good it can do."

Baleful baying brings bureaucratic bungle

PHUKET CITY: The provincial government is so far unable to deal with a middle-aged man – described as "eccentric" – whose antics have the radio jocks and others living in Radio Thailand's staff housing all in a fret.

According to a vernacular report, numerous complaints about the unidentified man have been filed buy neighbors with the police and the Provincial Office of Social Development and Human Security – but all to no avail.

"The man is middle-aged, wears black trousers and no shirt; he sleeps in a flat at Radio Thailand's staff housing," the report explained.

"At night he howls uncontrollably, frightening the women and children, civil servants, and students who live nearby."

Radio Thailand's broadcast facility in Phuket, and its staff housing, lie adjacent to Phuket Rajabhat University, just north of Phuket City; the area is crowded with rental flats for students.

"People can't rest," the report continued. "Moreover, no one knows what he may do; because not only does he howl, he throws bricks and stones and pieces of wood and whatever else he can find inside the flat. He's wrecked it."

When neither the police nor Social Development Office per-

sonnel responded, other agencies were contacted but none seemed able to come up with a solution to the problem.

So another complaint was filed, this time with the Provincial Ombudsman's Office, which reports directly to Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura.

"The complaint requested the Governor order the relevant agency to provide help urgently." As it happens, the "relevant agency" is the Office of Social Development and Human Security, whose chief, Panee Sitikarn, responded by saying that her of-

fice really wants to help, but is unable to act.

"When mentally deranged, mad or eccentric persons cause problems no law punishes them, except in cases of assault or similar trouble.

"Fellow citizens must deal with the problem by watching out for themselves and their families. We particularly urge children be kept away from such people," she

Then the issue of money reared its head.

"As for the person in ques-

tion, there are rules regarding compensation and daily expenses for those taking mentally ill persons to hospital," K. Panee explained.

"The task is normally undertaken by police and Interior Ministry officers ... A provincial governor's meeting in 1953 de-

cided the governing authority is responsible for transportation and attendant expenses.

"Thus [to take care of the 'eccentric'] the provincial government must request a budget from the Interior Ministry to pay police and Ministry officials.

"So," she said, "I am requesting the provincial office cover transportation expenses from the Interior Ministry's 2006 budget, now and for the future."

It seems like a lot of bureaucracy to deal with one rather odd person who, if he read the local news account, is probably now howling more loudly than ever.

Curiously, it appears no one has ever contacted the man.

Perhaps, though, he isn't crazy at all – but only in training to become a deejay.

204 couples exchange vows on Valentine's Day

PHUKET: More than 200 couples on Phuket were married on the most romantic day of the year, Valentine's Day.

Karnjana Hongboonyanurak, the Registration Officer at the Phuket Muang District Office, told the *Gazette* that her office was the busiest on the island, with 142 couples, including five cross-cultural couples, plighting their troths.

"Some couples arrived at the office before it opened in attempts to be the first couple to marry on Valentine's Day," she said.

Couples who registered their marriage at the Phuket City office, K. Karnajana explained, received gifts such as a free voucher for dinner at Thainaan restaurant or a one-night stay at a hotel. Other gifts included treatment for two at one of the many spas on the island.

"No couples turned up to register a divorce," K. Karnjana added. The turnout of brides and grooms in Phuket City this year was down on the number last year, when 199 signed the big book, K. Karnjana said.

Uthai Tabtong, Chief Registration Officer at Thalang District Office, said, "We had 42 couples who registered marriages, and nobody came to file for divorce." There were no special gifts on offer, she added.

In Kathu, 20 couples exchanged vows. Suksan Siangaek, Chief Administrative Office of Kathu District Office, said that his office gave away five pairs of tickets for couples to visit Phuket FantaSea.

"We had 20 couples, including one couple from England, who decided to register their marriage on Valentine's Day," he said.

Although it was possible for people to register divorces at the Kathu office on Valentine's Day, none took the opportunity, he added.

Chat lines pose sex threat to teenagers

ollowing the case of a teenage girl who was reported missing and then found with a boy she met on a telephone chat line, police fear the users of the new, low-cost chat lines such as Chat Sanook may be using the service to lure young girls into wanton behavior.

Mobile phone chat-lines have become more accessible since the previous 1900 numbers, which cost nine baht a minute, were replaced with 02 numbers charged at local call rates within Bangkok.

Chat Sanook became an instant hit with students, who call in and are asked to introduce themselves briefly before being invited to listen to the others' introductions and choose a match.

Those who are not paying members are allowed only five minutes to chat, so participants often exchange mobile phone numbers within that time in order to continue the conversation.

In a trial conducted by *The Nation*, a number of participants used their introductions to invite others to talk about sex.

Police said that they could not press charges in this case as the girls had consented to sex.

Pol Maj Gen Khamronwit Thoopkrajang, commander of the Division for Suppression of Crimes Against Children, Juveniles and Women, said it was difficult for the police to take action against chat-line providers until it can be proved that the lines have been set up with a sexual objective in mind.

Hit and run: The driver of a speeding public bus fled the scene after running down and seriously injuring 64-year-old monk Phra Kru Mongkol Thammayuth of Phraya Yang Temple. The acci-

dent happened in Bangkok's Phya Thai District.

Motorcycle taxi driver Somneuk Saengpanya, 30, said the monk was walking across Rama VI Rd on a morning alms round when the speeding bus took a left turn and hit him, leaving his belongings scattered on the road.

The bus driver quickly parked the bus and fled the scene.

Land scam officials: Senior Royal Forestry Department official Suntorn Watcharadilokkul said his department has evidence that three high-ranking officials conspired to sell more than 1,000 rai in the Khao Soi Dao forest reserve and wildlife sanctuary.

The case was exposed after the Revenue Department demanded tax payment for the land sale from villagers in Pong Nam Ron District. When the villagers insisted that they knew nothing about the deal, an investigation was launched and revealed "irregularities".

The land in question was developed into the Soi Dao Highland project. Started in 1992, the project now features a golf course, four-star hotel and orchards. K. Suntorn did not identify the suspects, but said they

held positions in the Land Department, the National Park, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department and the Royal Forestry Department.

The case has been sent to the National Counter Corruption Commission, he added.

Murder most foul: Police in Chumphon's Sawi District found an infant clinging to his dead mother, who had been shot eight hours earlier by an unknown assailant.

Police found the the body of Kanchana Thongkham, 27, in the front yard of her home in a rub-

ber plantation. Her 30-year-old husband, Pramote Thongkham, was found dead in the back yard.

There was no sign of a robbery, but cartridge cases and footprints left by the gunman were found at the scene.

The couple's infant son had been holding on to his mother's lifeless body and trying to suckle milk.

A trail of blood indicated the boy had been toddling between his parents' bodies before he fell asleep on his mother's body.

K. Pramote died of shotgun wounds to his shoulder and head. Police believe the assailant shot K. Kanchana in the back before fleeing, to make sure she would not identify him.

Politician = bad: A poll conducted by Assumption Business Administration College found that the term "politician" continues to carry a negative connotation. About 32% of those surveyed said the post of Prime Minister should be reserved for a non-politician; only 24% disagreed with this. About 44% held no opinion.


The poll also found that 56% of 4,210 people surveyed want a two-term limit enshrined in any Constitutional amendment.


A clear majority, 62%, said they supported amending the Constitution while about 25% opposed such a move; the rest had no opinion.

About 30% of those polled said MPs should not be required to belong to a party and 26% said they should. The rest had no opinion. A majority, 61%, said the one-term limit for senators should remain: 31% said it should be repealed.

Ah yes, the good old days. The old-timers of Krabi love to reminisce about the days when Ao Nang was just a jungle with thatched-roof huts on the beach. While some wish that nothing had changed since then, most of us are happy that services and infrastructure have improved.

For those residents who had to travel here frequently before the Krabi Airport was built, there was nothing worse than having to leave paradise three hours early to get to Phuket Airport. Days or weeks with no running water was not romantic, to say the least.

So the many improvements have made our life easier, yet we often think back to those old days with fondness. So we spoke with some old timers about the things they missed – some good – some not so good.

A recent survey of local oldtimers' memories turned up the following gems:

- I remember when...
- There were only four tailors in Ao Nang;
- When all five bars would close on New Year's Eve for the infamous Green's Bar Party;
- You had to pick up your own mail from Krabi Post Office in town;
- The first electric light box was put up to advertise bungalows for rent except the sign

read "Bangalows for Rent", so all the other locals changed their wooden handwritten signs from "bungalows" to "bangalows";

- There was no milk or cheese available, and if you ordered a tuna sandwich, you got a fillet of fresh tuna and two pieces of bread;
- There were only 12 long-tail boats;
- 200,000 baht a rai was considered expensive land;
 - You could park on the eachfront;
- There was no McDonald's or 7-Eleven;

- There was no cell phone service;
- Leela Valley was a rice paddy and was under a foot of water every rainy season;
- Your water was delivered to your home or business by truck;
- The bars closed when they wanted to;
- The exchange rate was 25 baht/US\$1;
- The popular places were the Austria Hut, Don's Pizza, Green's Bar, Gift's Bungalows, Corner Bar, Black Cat Bar, Bei Freddy and the Kon Thai Bar;

So what will we be reminiscing about 10 years from now?

- I remember when there were only 40 tailors in Ao Nang;
- I remember when you could buy land for 2 million baht a rai;
- Remember when we had to go to Phuket for shopping/medical care/restaurants?
- Who could forget the tsunami

Preposterous impost: One event that will be remembered is the the Glorious Krabi Fiesta

2005 that was held on Haad Nopparat Thara Beach on December 18. It included sports activities, shows, top entertainment acts from Bangkok and celebrated cooks making Thai food – all for the entrance price of 2,000 baht per person.

Ticket sales were poor right from the start as marketing was weak and foreigners are not familiar with top-name Thai entertainers, nor particularly interested.

In addition, 2,000 baht per person is expensive for foreigners and beyond budget for local Thais. In comparison, one can see the show at Phuket FantaSea for 1,000 baht, so it made for a difficult sell. A rainy night made for few walk-ins and the turnout was poor.

Though the event itself was lackluster, what will be remembered is that as rumors spread of a multi-million-baht budget, and financial losses, local businesses were asked to "donate" money to make up for the deficit.

Bars and small businesses and individuals were asked for 2,000-5,000 baht each, while resorts and larger businesses were hit up for between 20,000 and 60,000 baht.

These demands came at around the first anniversary of the tsunami, with many local businesses still struggling to pay off last year's debts and watching every *satang* to make it through this season.


So the new impost was quite a shock to many business owners, who had no participation in, or benefits from the event.

Owners were asking why were they expected to pay the bill. In fact, in times of poor business conditions, especially in light of the catastrophic events of the tsunami, wouldn't one expect the government to sponsor such programs to benefit and support local businesses?

Why are the local businesses, which are fighting to survive and keeping local people employed, expected to foot the bill for government deficits? Maybe a re-read of Economics and Taxation 101 is in order.

On a brighter note: Just when we were ready to write off this season after a poor December and mediocre January, February has burst onto the scene with an huge influx of tourists – hotels are full, there are waiting lines at the popular restaurants and the bars are busy again.

How long will it last? Nobody knows, but the longer the better



here are numerous ways to enjoy oneself in Patong, but not that many of them can be considered wholesome, family activities.

But one way to have a nice day out with the family is getting professional family photo portraits done – in authentic traditional Thai costumes. The only place to do it in Phuket that I am aware of, the simply-named Thai Studio, is a refreshing change from the hustle-rustle-and-tout tactics that seem to characterize the Patong tourism industry these days.

For a start, the studio owner and photographer, Aussapon "Thong" Kunagonrungsimon is a consummate professional, whose resumé includes work with slinky pop singer, actress and model Pornichita "Benz" na Songkhla, TV personality Nok Booriphan – and many others.

He and his girlfriend, Anne, both from Bangkok, opened their door for business on the less-than-auspicious morning of December 26, 2004. The studio was undamaged by the tsunami, but needless to say business did not get off to a flying start. Now, however, more and more people are starting to use the service.

Thai Studio has a wide range of colorful, handmade costumes based on designs from many different eras of Thailand's past, including Thai Dusit, Rattanakosin and 16th-century costumes familiar to anyone who has seen the movie *Suriyothai*.

Perhaps best of all is that they have costumes for just about everyone, from 105-kilogram dad all the way down to a makeshift outfit using *jonekaben* (calf length Thai wrap-around trousers) and a *sabai* (pleated fabric worn around the chest and midsection) for my five-month-old, five-kilo daughter, Sanda, on her first family outing.

For our "shoot", we chose

costumes based on designs 700 years old from the Lanna Kingdom in the North of Thailand. K. Anne, who knows a lot about the costumes and speaks English well, told us these are among the most popular selections.

She spent 30 minutes putting makeup on my wife, Piya. This is the type of wait that would normally have me climbing the walls and seeking Heineken (am I still allowed to say that?) – but the atmosphere at Thai Studio is relaxing, almost surrealistically un-Patong.

Thai music from a bygone era plays in the background, lemon grass incense burns and there are interesting antiques to look over, including gongs, elaborate alms bowls, a straw safari hat, old radio sets and many more items the studio uses as props.

K. Thong said that he had run a similar studio in Rangsit, near Bangkok, before splitting with his partner there and setting up shop in Patong.

Looking through the studio's guest book, I saw that most customers were couples. K. Thong explained that many were Thai women who lived abroad with their foreign husbands and who wanted a quintessentially Thai souvenir to take back with them when they returned home after their vacations.

Others guests included

same-sex couples, people having single portraits done and some

group and family pictures.

The prices at Thai studio are reasonable, given the quality of the work and the final results. Happily, there is no double-pricing or commissions paid out to taxi drivers for bringing in business.

"People get discouraged when they know they are being taken advantage of," K. Thong said

There are three fixed "sets" of photos to choose from. The most popular – and the one we chose – was Set B. At 3,950 baht, this includes costume selection, makeup, hair preparation and photos for one person, in 18 different poses. There is a 500-baht surcharge for each additional person in the picture, which basically covers the extra cost of makeup and the costumes.

The prints were ready about an hour after the shoot: 12 4" x 6" prints; two 8" x 12" prints and two 12" x 16" prints. The negatives are included, so customers can later have as many prints made, at whatever size they want.

Of the other two options, Set A comprises 12 poses at 2,450 baht and Set C is 25 poses at 5,550 baht.

In the past, I was at a loss when visiting friends people asked me what there was to do in the daytime in Patong – apart from going to the beach.


Now I shall recommend a trip to Thai Studio, which is a pleasant way to spend a few hours and with the fun, attractive portraits to remind you, a visit you won't soon forget.



A recent coup for The Chedi – one of Phuket's most luxurious hotels – as well as a treat for the island's legion of lotus eaters, was the set played at the hotel by José Padilla, 46, the DJ famed for years of creating sets of perfect musical accompaniment for the sunsets viewed from the legendary Café del Mar in Sant Antoni on the Spanish island of Ibiza.

The *Gazette*'s Andy Johnstone caught up with José – recognized as one of the world's finest DJs and lauded as "the spiritual father of chill-out music" – for a rare interview at The Chedi. It wasn't the first time the two had met, however; The *Gazette* staffer once bought one of the earliest Café del Mar cassettes from him in Ibiza's flea market in 1991 and heard his sets at the Café two years later.

osé Padilla grins as he talks about his teenage years growing up in a small town near Barcelona, describing them as "...great days – and nights – catching the bus into Barcelona, running around clubbing and chasing English girls around the Plaça Reial.

"I enjoyed being there, being part of the nightlife, so much that I ended up working as a waiter in the historic Barri Gótic, just off Las Ramblas. The money wasn't much, but it gave me the excuse, as if I needed it, to be out late; I just wanted to be there..." he reminisces.

José soon became entranced by the smooth, simple and sophisticated bossa nova sounds played in the bars of Barca, and he began to wait on the tables closer to the DJ's booth. "I tried to synchronize taking the food to the diners just before the DJ was due to take a break," he says.

"My plan was that I could

say to the DJ, 'Shall I play a record while you're gone? I don't have anything to do right now, you see...' And it worked!"

Lost for a moment in a reverie, José returns to the conversation, saying, "But a few minutes playing tracks here and there wasn't enough to satisfy what I felt was a deep need to play music and, well, to do what I wanted.


"I grew up in what was effectively a ghetto, and really, there was little to do there apart from sit around smoking all day. I suppose that's why the city center of Barcelona attracted me so much. I wanted to get out of a ghetto existence."

So too did his family, who thought the best way for him to achieve that goal was to get a "responsible" job, as an accountant or an office worker.

"But I didn't want to do that; I suppose I was bit of a rebel; a rebel with dreams that didn't involve wearing a suit," he says.

"My dreams made it essential that I had to get out [of the environment I grew up in]. So I did."

José took a boat south from Barcelona's harbor – under the watchful eye of the statue of Christopher Columbus – leaving behind the city of other visionaries such as Picasso, Dali, Miró and Gaudi, and headed for Ibiza.

He says, reservedly, that his leaving Barcelona was "...an escape; I think I was escaping from many things, including myself."

The great escape he made saw him donning a waiter's apron again before the gradual slide into DJ-ing on the famous Balearic island, which at the time – the mid-'70s – was a bohemian blissinfused arrival point for many runaways from civilization.

Somewhat coincidentally, Columbus' statue, atop a tower at the end of Las Ramblas, points east toward his supposed birth-place, Genoa. Ibiza also lays claim to him – and Carthaginian conqueror Hannibal – who, Ibizans claim, was born on their island. Hannibal's family nickname, Barca, is also supposedly the origin of the name Barcelona.

The irony of this is not lost on José, who smiles and says, "Of course I knew the legends and history from school and I had seen Columbus' statue for many years. But if someone had told me that I would end up in a place rich again with fables about these two travelers, I would not have believed them."

José began the rounds on Ibiza playing in bars, hotels and beaches, developing his famously idiosyncratic style of mixing vastly different types of music.

"I see it as light and shade," says José. "I read the feeling of the audience and want to keep them amused, interested, entranced. That's why I mix a clas-

sical Flamenco guitarist like Pac de Lucía's 1973 hit *Entre dos aguas* with *The Look of Love* by Dusty Springfield with Moby's *Whispering Wind*.

"It is change, change of tempo, style, meaning... It is pure communication – spiritual and not relying on chemicals – between me and the audience."

His reputation grew as he honed his talents. This led to him playing at Es Paradis, Ku and Pacha, as well as finding time to open his own bar, Museum.

"But my friend and business partner shot himself in the bar. I lost a few years because of that," he admits, "but I was selling tapes of my mixes, and they eventually found their way to the people at Café del Mar, who took me on as their resident DJ."

Animated, José says, "And the big difference between playing in the clubs on Ibiza and at Café del Mar was the audience.

people. Now, I was playing to the sun as it set. The sun was my audience!

"And the entire set was based around that. People lying on the beach listening to the music actually clapped as the sun finally set. Do they do that here?"

José and Café del Mar parted company, and although reticent to discuss precisely how the relationship ended, he explains that one of his most loved selfpenned compositions – *Adios Ayer* – (Goodbye Yesterday) is his farewell to all that.

"When I left Café del Mar ... well, it didn't end very well, but Café del Mar still means a lot to me, and the song is a tribute to it," he begins.

Thinking, thinking, thinking of tomorrow

With the sunset in your eyes
I feel everything is sorrow
So I have to say goodbye...
If there is new love, new ways,
new faces in our lives
Those times will last forever

Those times will last forever ... adios ayer.

"And you know, I miss ... elements of Café del Mar; I had very good years there, but it isn't the same as it was. It's now a tourist attraction, like the Eiffel Tower, and the the vibe, too, has changed. But good memories."

He is on the road often, and admits that although his enthusiasm for music and playing is undimmed, that his "batteries" occasionally wear down a little. "This business takes a lot out of you, and if you don't take a break once in a while, then you won't be able to keep going," he says.

"But taking a break doesn't mean stopping completely; I just play in different venues or for different reasons. Today I am at his wonderful hotel on this beach; next week I am playing at the Sukothai [hotel] in Bangkok; other times, I just pack a box of records and go to see some good friends in Finland who own a club. It's good to do things simply again."

The intoxicating mix of Phuket's sunsets and sandy beaches mirrors that of Ibiza, arguably the chill-out capital of the world. Add to this the vast influx of visitors looking for sun, sand and ... cerebral stimulation and the parallels become clearer still.

Phuket has what can best be described as a "lively" but rather down-market bar scene. The island also has a number of talented DJs – both foreign and Thai, such as Miguel Kirjon, and visiting ones such as the UK's Lisa Loud, who played at Trisara last year, and American salsa supremo Henry Knowles who played recently at TaiLife.

Phuket also has as a number of more upmarket clubs yet it still does not boast the clubbing kudos of Bangkok or Hong Kong. Perhaps it is the seemingly allpervasive influence of jazz, rock and blues that has kept the clubs and clubbing in abeyance.

A form of snobbery along the lines of, "Dance music is for young people. Young people have little money. People with little money are not welcome in Phuket," seems sadly prevalent.

The vibe at The Chedi shouts, in an ecstatically chilledout way, that the time is right for Phuket to progress a little.

Charlie and Christina, "young" 28-year-old investment bankers both resplendent in baggy white linen trousers, down from Bangkok for the weekend, couldn't agree more.

"A crowd of us have met up just to be here," begins Christina. "We could have gone to José's show in Bangkok, but decided that the beach is the best place to see him and hear his mix. Friends of ours – Amy, Ryan, Adam and Mel – even flew in from Shanghai.

"All it takes for Phuket to become an Asian clubbers' paradise is getting the right artist and the right venue. Do that and it's sorted. Couldn't be easier, in fact.

"That's THE José Padilla mixing there, and we're down on this fantastic beach after a magical sunset. Couldn't be better," she smiles. Glass in hand, she goes off to chill again.

he so-called "whinyassed white rapper" Eminem has released a "greatest hits" album, Curtain Call - The Hits.

Interestingly, the epithet "whiny-assed white rapper" (the Beastie Boys are given the same treatment and worse; they are not only white but also Jewish) tends to be applied by white people who would balk at describing Ghostface Killah as a "whinyassed black rapper".

What is behind this inverse racism? Is it that Marshall Bruce Mathers III (Eminem) has dared to intrude on a musical genre perceived as being outside his ethnicity in the same way that Elvis Presley, Eric Clapton and a host of others did with blues, or countless white jazz musicians have done, or The Clash, who were playing reggae to critical acclaim years before it entered the mainstream?

Reverse the scenario non-whites involved in "white" music, such as the late Phil Lynott or the divas Jessye Norman and Dame Kiri Te Kanawa – and few would even consider suggesting that they are unable to achieve as much as white people.

RESPECT

Suffice it to say that Eminem has respect among his peers; he was, after all discovered by the legendary Dr Dre and has collaborated with the likes of Nate Dogg and

Curtain Call comprises 17 tracks, including three previously unreleased recordings: Fack, Shake That and When I'm

The album features, naturally, what is considered to be his breakthrough single, Stan, featuring a haunting sample from Thank You by Dido. A live version of this track appears at the end of the album, with Elton John substituting for the divine Dido.

Stan is the disturbing story of a fan – Stan – who writes to Eminem, without receiving replies. Already unbalanced, Stan (in the penultimate verse) delivers his third and final verse as he drives his car off a bridge with

his pregnant girlfriend in the trunk. The fourth verse is Eminem responding too late to Stan, only realizing at the last second that he has heard about Stan's death as he was writing to him.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, Eminem has been and continues to be the target of massive amounts of criticism, most commonly accusations of misogyny and homophobia. Although this is of course a subjective matter, it can be argued that Eminem is reporting what he may have experienced.

It isn't beyond the realms of possibility that he is reporting in a first-person narrative style what the dark Slim Shady – a character/alter-ego he has created -"sees".


Few would have credited that David Bowie, despite his multiple personae, really believed that aliens were about to land (Starman), that Bret Easton Ellis, author of American Psycho, is himself sadistically violent, or that Robert Louis Stevenson, author of Treasure Island, was a pirate. The jury is still out on Jagger and Richards over Sympathy for the Devil, however...

Arguments abound about the estheticization of violence – and desensitization to it - just as they have done for many years.

The fundamental question is, "Is the artist producing this work because: he/she wants notoriety/ money; is making a sweeping political or social statement; or because he/she is a screwed-up weirdo?'

Some now see Eminem's lyrics as actually being capable of making the listener more sensitive to violence, homophobia, misogyny and other social ills, arguing that bombarding his audience with extreme verbal imagery may make (some of) them **EAR CANDY**

more aware of it. Yes, just as his black counterparts have been doing for 25 years.

While Eminem is respected by many fellow rappers, he has also had feuds with a number of

Curtain Call features Eminem's *Like Toy Soldiers* – his attempt to smooth over the rifts - which have, in his case, tended to stay on disc rather than end up in fisticuffs or someone being

Sampling the disarmingly haunting chorus from Toy Soldiers - the 1989 hit by Martika itself a song about drug abuse, Eminem speaks of his amazement at inter-rapper warfare:

There used to be a time when you could just say a rhyme/And wouldn't have to worry about one of your people dyin'/But now it's elevated cuz once you put someone's kids in it/The sh*t gets escalated, it ain't just words no more is it?

He ends the track with:

I'm just willin' to be the bigger man/If ya'll can quit poppin' off at your jaws well then I can/Cuz frankly I'm sick of talkin'/I'm not gonna let someone else's coffin rest on my conscience cuz...

Step by step, heart to heart, left right left/We all fall down like toy soldiers/Bit by bit, torn apart, we never win/But the battle wages on for toy soldiers.

The video for the track features, among others, murdered rappers Notorious BIG, Big L, former D12 member Bugz and 2Pac (Tupac Shakur), the only rap artist to have sold more albums than Eminem.

This compilation also features My Name Is, The Way I Am – Eminem's explanation of what success has done to him, the blame he and other controversial singers receive, and a plea for privacy - and When I'm Gone, one of the three new tracks.

He revisits the negative effect of fame on his life and relationships, specifically those with his wife, Kim – they divorced and have remarried – and his daughter, Hailie (the couple have also adopted a child and Kim has a child from when they were divorced) on When I'm Gone.

I hear applause, all this time I couldn't see/How could it be that the curtain is closing on me/I turn around, find a gun on the ground, cock it,/put it to my brain, scream "die Shady!" and pop it.


The chorus is said to Hailie: And when I'm gone, just carry on don't mourn/rejoice every time you hear the sound of my voice/Just know that I'm lookin' down on you smilin'/ And I didn't feel a thing so baby don't feel my pain/Just smile

The casual listener can find much to complain about; obscene lyrics and Eminem's attitudes for example. But – and it's no easy ride – listen a little deeper and read the lyrics, and his intelligence, concern and humanity become abundantly clear.

hen the hot season lies over Phuket, from March until May, temperatures can soar to 40° Celsius. To escape the heat, people seek refuge in air conditioned homes or shopping centers, they lie under ceiling fans, plunge into the nearest swimming pool or take cold showers.

But what to do when none of these options are available or appropriate? The answer is in your hand... or more precisely, can be held in your hand.

Hand fans have been part of cultures worldwide for millennia. No better example can be seen than the Chinesestyle fans, which have inspired highly decorated large versions used as wall ornaments.

Fans, called *pat lom* in Thai, can add a touch of elegance to a woman's appearance – and for those who are properly trained, they can come in handy as a martial arts weapon for defense against a stealthy *ninja* attack in a dark Phuket City alley.

In Phuket, hand-held fans are used to compliment the traditional Chinese costumes used in stage performances or worn by the bride at traditional Chinese weddings, but they can taken – and be used – anywhere

Simple synthetic fans with a floral design can be had for as little as 85 baht, but prices rise according to how elaborate and how well made a fan is.

At the top end of the price range are those with plumes. A goose-plume fan will set you back about 140 to 200 baht, while a peacock fan sells for about 230 baht.

Many more styles of fans can be found around the island, but a good place to start – and where the fans pictured here are available – would be Soonthorn Sungkhaphan, at 104 Thalang Rd, in the heart of the Sino-Portuguese area of Phuket City. Tel. 076-211243.



ong Kong's advertising slogan could be, "Blink and you'll miss it." It's a city where Time's winged chariot doesn't so much hurry near as overtake on the inside lane, and this year it's showcasing a raft of new attractions.

Mickey Mouse and pals are strutting their stuff at the mini-(small pun intended) Disneyland, while, right next to the airport, those who like such things can cavort about a spanking new convention center.

A cable car, swaying up to the dizzy heights of the Big Buddha at Ngong Ping on Lantau Island, should be open by the summer, while, further north, nature lovers can make a bee line for the new Wetland Park at Mai Po.

All of these are well and good, but as anyone with even a passing acquaintance with Hong Kong knows, the former Brit colony's foremost attraction is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year.

For three action-packed days at the end of March, the fun simply never ends, and what's more, there's a bit of rugby to watch thrown into the bargain. The tournament's pulled in a couple of international sponsors, but to aficionados it's simply known as The Sevens.

For the past three decades, fans from all over the world have flocked to Hong Kong's premier stadium every spring. The tournament has grown by leaps and bounds, attracting some of the game's greatest players and worldwide media coverage.

Why? Anyone going to the Hong Kong Sevens does so for the sheer joy of it. You don't even have to know a great deal about the game (seven guys – and gals,

Play is fast, spirited, egged on by roars from a myriad throats and there's always something happening.

The entertainment is by no means confined to the pitch. Fans by the dozen pick a zany outfit to bolster support for their team. Families cluster in the upper reaches of the stadium, the more energetic larrikins make an alcohol-fueled dash to the South Stand, well-padded types in corporate boxes get entertained by bevies of go-go girls, and everyone gets up to dance to their favorite adverts on the mammoth screens that rise high above the bleachers.

Streakers are not quite so high-profile nowadays, with grim-faced security men thronging the perimeters, though, as the day wears on, one or two "wardrobe malfunctions" are not unknown.

And at the end of the day the final whistle actually signals the start of play, as much of the crowd goes off to celebrate in the bars of Wan Chai, Lan Kwai Fong or in the marquee erected immediately outside the stadium.

The fans range from facepainted pre-teens to grizzled pensioners, and could form their own mini-United Nations. Thailand is not playing this year, but favorites England will be battling it out with top teams from Fiji and New Zealand. A total of 19 sides will include participants from nations less well known for their rugby prowess such as Sri Lanka and Madagascar.

Soccer may be the beautiful game but rugby is the bountiful game, generously including everybody in its free-for-all party atmosphere. And there's no better example of this than the Hong Kong Sevens.

he world's No 2 auto maker, Japanese giant Toyota, is set to build its award-winning compact, the Yaris, here in Thailand.

Until now the Yaris has been built only in Europe and Japan; the Thai production line, the first in Southeast Asia, is expected to double Toyota's current output in the Kingdom to almost 500,000 by 2008, when the expanded manufacturing facility in Chachoengsao becomes fully operational.

The first Yaris appeared in 1999 and was almost instantly awarded the accolade "European Car of the Year"; it also became Japan's "Car of the Year", making it the first model to achieve such wide recognition. It has also been named as one of the most reliable cars by an influential German survey.

Although of modest dimensions, the Yaris has achieved a remarkable five-star rating in the influential EuroNCAP crash tests. Dual front airbags and side bags are standard, with side air curtains optional and the "supermini", as the Yaris has been dubbed by the EuroNCAP authorities (www.euroncap.com), was awarded a massive 35 points for adult protection in the tests, the highest ever achieved by any Toyota.

It also scored well in the child protection category and did relatively well in the pedestrian protection listing.

The Yaris will be available in Thailand with a choice of three engines, all powered by gasoline (or gasohol). There are currently no plans to introduce the excellent 1.4-liter diesel, which is available throughout Europe.

The Thai-made Yaris will feature a three-cylinder 1-liter engine producing a modest 68 bhp

(51 kW) and 93 Nm of torque, and a 1.3-liter version delivering 85 bhp (64 kW) and 121 Nm. A 1.5-liter version is also planned.

All engines feature variable valve technology and constantly variable transmission, which radically improves fuel consumption and lowers emissions, will be available as an option. A five-speed manual transmission is standard.

The interior, surprisingly roomy for a car this size, is very well equipped. A CD player is standard while the Yaris is also the first compact to get Toyota's new sound system which is MP3-and WMA-compatible. And if you still want to listen to the radio, the

digital audio tuner reduces interference on AM/FM channels.

A new rear suspension design intrudes less into the trunk than the old one did, while the rear seats split 60:40 and will slide and recline independently. They can also be folded flat to increase luggage space which, says Toyota, is the roomiest in the subcompact class.

Clever design of the front overhang and windshield position increased the Yaris's interior space, making it close to that of many larger vehicles.

In addition, Toyota has carefully designed the passenger compartment to incorporate deformable safety structures, in order to dissipate crash energy, whether generated from the front, rear or side. Noise and vibration have been reduced by the adoption of double sealing on all side doors.

Wind noise is far lower than normal for this class of car, thanks to a low drag coefficient of 0.30 which, Toyota says, is the result of more than 1,000 hours of wind tunnel research.

The Yaris has Brake Assist across the range, a system that detects emergency braking and increases line pressure in conjunction with the ABS; it is a

proven fact that most drivers do not brake hard enough when facing a possible crash.

Large disc brakes all round are standard on the larger engined models, with rear drums fitted to the 1-liter version.

The Yaris may be small in overall dimensions, but it is superbly equipped and when the Thai versions come on stream, it should be available at a very reasonable price.

n the words of Robbie Robertson, from his 1987 song Somewhere Down the Crazy River, "Take a picture of this..."

Sprawling on an antique-red Chesterfield sofa in my club (the Drones Club in London), enjoying the effect of a few glasses of malt whisky and the latest edition of the Morning Star hidden between the pages of The Daily *Telegraph* – or vice versa – for amusement is another.

Phuket's sandy shores and looking forward to what promises to be a most delightful repast.

As the sun is now over the vardarm, it is incumbent upon me to have a bit of a bracer. What could be better than a reviving Pimm's Cup? Well, according to both of tonight's two dining companions, something non-alcoholic appears to be preferable. The list of virgin (on the

ridiculous) cocktails, smoothies and the like is extensive, which is appropriate for the family atmosphere of Casuarina.

However, those of us with cast-iron constitutions also have a splendid range of aperitifs, cocktails and wines from which to choose.

Following its refurbishment, Casuarina is gloriously light and airy, even on a warm evening. It's spacious, too, providing the



rugrats with an ample area to enjoy themselves – well, did you want to sit still for half an hour when you were three years old?

Faced with the difficult decision of just what to have for my appetizer, I defer to the amiable service staff to aid me in my choice.

The goong sarong, is, I am told, delightful and who am I to argue, even if I were an argu-But right now I am on mentative sort of chap? I await

my starter with bated breath.

Casuarina's casual but classy atmosphere creates the climate for equally casual chitchat. Gem – also known as Kanittha Thanthanasap – Dusit Laguna's PR Manager, and my other companion, Lin – who may or may not be a spy, an award-winning movie director or the songwriter behind such chart hits as, well, I really cannot say - are

An added bonus to our evening is the music. No piped muzak tonight, but rather the seriously talented Chris Melchior. It takes me moment to realize where he is, and slightly longer for my brain to realize that this glorious chill-out sound is being made by him, his laptop and a vio-

Large mussels, delectable oysters, fragrant crab, grilled rockfish, squid and oodles more besides is demolished in double-quick time, and let's face it, seafood is the thing to eat on the beach, right?

The dining delights are by no means over, however. I have wisely reserved a smidge of space for one of my favorite desserts: crème brulée.

This being Dusit Laguna, however, it isn't just the simple classic dish but a visually-stunning range of eight spoons with four different flavors - including mango and coconut.

"Simply wonderful," I muse, before realizing that I have - all starry-eyed and non-plussed for a moment – spoken out loud.

March 4-13: Tao Thepkrasattri & Tao Sri Soonthorn Cultural Fair. Held every year to commemorate the role Phuket's heroines played in the victory over a Burmese incursion in 1785, the fair this year will be bigger and better than ever.

Pattama Rujeewong, of the Phuket Provincial Cultural Office (PPCO), said that the celebrations this year would be the biggest yet, to mark HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej's 60 years on the throne.


Festival activities will take place between 8 am and 10 pm each day, at Thalang Chanasuk Memorial Field, in Baan Kian, where the battle took place.

The battlefield covers 96 rai, one kilometer west of the main intersection in Thalang Town, on the road to Cherng Talay.

The fair will start with a head-shaving ceremony at 1 pm on March 4 for men entering monkhood, followed ordainment at 8 am on March 5.

On March 11, 12 and 13, starting at 7 pm, actors will reenact the battle.

On March 13, remembered as the day of the battle, a wreath-laying ceremony will be held at the Heroines' Monument at 8 am.

in Baan Kian, where the heroines' mother is believed to be buried; Wat Muang Komaraphat, near Wat Phra Nang Sang, where Thai warriors massed before the battle; and Nop Nang Dug, where Thais dammed a klong to block the Burmese troops' water supply.

The plaques will be in Thai and English, and are expected to be installed before the fair begins.

Sport competitions, including *takraw*, *Muay Thai*, *Muay Thai talay* (boxing while sitting on a horizontal pole over a pool of water or mud) and greasy pole climbing, will be held as part of the festival.

The main sporting event, on March 12, will be a mountain bike race, with off-road sections, taking in historical sites en-route.

Riders in Category A of the race will cover the full 35-kilometer course, with riders starting at 1:30 pm, while riders in Category B will race over a 25km course, starting at 11:30 am.

Category C, for children under 13 years of age, will cover 10km, starting at 10 am.

The winners of the men's and the women's sections of categories A and B will receive trophies donated by HRH Crown Prince Maha Vajiralongkorn.

All three courses will start and finish at Thalang Chanasuk Memorial Field.

The entry fee for Categories A and B is 300 baht per person, while entry in Category C is free.

Nothing wrong with a gimmick or ten

ou gotta have a gimmick," said that great American literary figure Gypsy Rose Lee.

Novelist Michael Cunningham's gimmick is literary association with a famous writer.

His last novel, *The Hours*, was a great commercial and critical success, made into a movie starring Nicole Kidman, Meryl

Streep and Julianne Moore. The plot had three women at different times and places involved with the plot of the novel *Mrs Dalloway*, including author Virginia Woolf herself (played by Kidman in the film).

The great literary figure of Michael

Cunningham's new novel is Walt

Whitman. Specimen Days (Farrar, Strauss and Giroux, New borg name)

York, 2005, 308pp) links three recurring characters, all obsessed with Whitman's *Leaves of Grass*.

The novel opens in 19th century New York during the lifetime of Walt Whitman, who makes a cameo appearance on Broadway. Lucas is a 14-year-old Irish slum kid in the Lower East

Side, obsessed with *Leaves of Grass*, a copy of which a kindly teacher has given him. He is given to spontaneous quotations of Whitman's poetry rather than ordinary conversation.

His brother Simon has just died in an industrial accident and Lucas's other obsession is the sweatshop seamstress Catherine, Simon's grieving fiancée. Frail and misshapen, Lucas takes over the foundry machine that killed his brother.

The narrative tone is lugubrious, with shades of Charles Dickens, and you wonder where the author is going with all this. Add to this Cunningham's customary academic style – fussy, fastidious, over-elaborate – and I was ready to chuck the book aside.

We have Lucas buying a white bowl as a gift for Catherine with 75 cents of his \$1.03 salary while his parents are starving at home, and later hearing voices from his foundry machine warning him to rescue Catherine from her sweatshop just before, as it happens, a fire burns it down.

But suddenly we're in contemporary New York, some years after 9/11, and in the narrative company of Cat, a 38-year-old black woman with a PhD and a job on the NYPD crisis call line. Cat lives in the same East Fifth Ave tenement that Catherine did.

She's attractive enough to have a handsome rich 32-year old futures manager as her boy-

friend. His name is Simon. Her dead son was named Luke.

Cat's also got a wry, tough sense of humor and draws the reader back into the story again. She gets a call from a kid quoting – surprise! – Walt Whitman and warning of a suicide bombing by another kid. One day, she spies a white bowl in an antique shop and buys it on impulse. See the pattern here?

Bombs go off, Cat chases clues and we've got the making of a damn good detective story with a sharp twist at the end.

Flash forward two hundred years or so. The United States has suffered some kind of nuclear catastrophe and is now dis-

membered. The one with the Whitman obsession now is a cyborg named Simon. In Central

Park he chats up a nanny named Catareen.

Catareen is even weirder: "She was by Earth standards a four-and-half-foot-tall lizard with prominent nostrils and eyes slightly smaller than golf balls...Her skin was emerald."

Catareen is a Nadian, one of thou-

sands brought back after Earth's one and only foray to another inhabited planet. The Nadians wound up taking menial jobs.

Simon and Catareen fall foul of the law and escape to New Jersey after a thrilling chase on a subway and across the George Washington bridge pursued by a laser-firing predator drone.

Simon is programmed to make an appointment in Denver and the two set out on a picaresque westward-bound journey, along the way picking up a young, misshapen, hustler named Luke. The white bowl talisman turns up in Denver along with the startling conclusion to the tale.

Okay, the novel is fraught with gimmicks. But they're good gimmicks and provide a rousing read

The case for a jet-ski race

There will undoubtedly be people who will want to criticize the Phuket authorities for allowing – indeed, inviting – jet-ski racers to Patong next month to compete in the first round of the 2006 Jet Ski Thailand Championship.

After all, they will argue, the Governor has already pledged to phase out all jet-skis by March 1, 2011. So why would he want to bring in dozens of them to race in small circles in the one bay that is most plagued by jet-ski operators and their noisy, dangerous machines?

There is, however, a basic flaw in any argument that puts the two topics together: these are two very different groups of people.

The jet-ski operators on the beach are a notoriously cantanker-

ous group, resistant to all regulation and seemingly happy to allow complete novices to jump on their powerful machines and, in some cases, kill or maim themselves or others.

The racers, on the other hand, are professionals or highly skilled amateurs who will be racing in a restricted area, clearly marked, for just two days – not all the way through the high season.

Arguing that they should not be allowed to do this because of Phuket's perennial problems with jet-ski operators is similar to arguing that the Monaco Grand Prix should be canceled because Monaco has problems with idiots driving dangerously through that city's winding streets.

When the *Gazette* ran a front-page story in October 2004 about plans to bring a round of the Formula 1 Power Boat Grand Prix circuit to Phuket, one angry reader wrote to ask whether we would advocate them driving their boats at full speed across coral reefs and through mangroves.

Of course we would not – just as we have never advocated allowing tourists operate jet-skis in areas where people swim.

But we do support sporting events that have the potential to bring in extra visitors and generate much-needed revenue for island, especially as it continues in its post-tsunami recovery.

As with the Monaco Grand Prix, the chances of an innocent being hurt or killed in the course of the Jet Ski Thailand Championships are small indeed.

There will undoubtedly be those who argue that spectators of the jet-ski event may be inspired afterward to jump on jet-skis themselves and roar around the bay. But is that a good reason to bar an event? If so, all grand prix events should likewise be barred, along with motorcycle racing – and pie-eating contests.

left the employ of the Thepkrasattri Municipality a long time ago, but I still help them with activities such as Children's Day.

I feel that it is important for everyone to continue providing services to our respective com-

Some time ago, many people asked the Thepkrasattri mayor when they would receive a relayed broadcast service in their community.

We eventually found a suitable place to erect speakers, and I had my own stereo equipment

that could be used.

Then the issue of who would foot the electricity bill was raised. For me, the cost of the electricity is not a problem; I have the money to pay for it. In fact, I was happy to pay for it, because it was for the benefit of the community.

I am an early riser, so it was absolutely no trouble for me to be up and ready to begin

relaying the broadcast of [Ministry of Communications] radio station FM.101.5 each day from 7 to 8 am.

I did this for three months and felt it was beneficial to the community on two counts: people could hear the news, and they could tell what time it was because of the broadcasts, and would know when to set off for work or to take the children to school.

here are now probably very few people in Phuket without access to a radio or a television for daily news reports. However, as has been documented in the Gazette by one columnist and a number of readers' letters, as well as submitted Issues & Answers, some areas of the island have the added luxury of news delivered to their homes via community

loudspeakers.

Reactions received by the Gazette to these broadcasts have been negative. However, not everyone is against them. Somchai Wichitbut is a vendor of khao larm (sticky rice roasted in bamboo tubes). He also broadcast news and local affairs by loudspeaker (left) from his home in Thalang until recently, when officials, after receiving complaints about the noise, told him to switch it off. Here he explains why he believes in his mission to relay news to the local masses, whether they want it or not.

However, the relayed broadcast had to stop a few weeks ago because of complaints received by the Municipality. Since then, many people have asked me why it stopped and, to be honest, I have no good answer to give them. The number of people asking me that question is surely proof that the service was regarded as valuable.

Yes, I know that most people within earshot of the broadcast have their own radio or television. But they might not have been able to hear it while they were busy [working or preparing for work]. Anyway, it was good for the entire community to hear the same broadcast.

Now I just let those who want the service revived contact

A public hearing may well give all parties a better understanding and provide some way forward with the complainants.

I really don't understand why those who complained did so; they have prevented the dissemination of knowledge.

The money, however, keeps rolling in.



Beer mania in Phuket

PHUKET TOWN: Phuket Excise Officer Boonchuay Taenjahn told the press that the denizens of Phuket drank 6.8 million liters of beer last year.

He said the trend in alcohol consumption among Thais has been more and more toward beer, and predicted it would continue.

Beer consumption statistics in Phuket broke down as follows: 30- and 50-liter kegs, 176,000 liters; 330cc containers, 3.2 million liters; and 630-cc bottles, 3.2 million liters.

As for liquor produced in Thailand, consumption was divided among the producers of Hong Tong, Mekhong, Sang Thip, Siang Choon, and lao khao. Total consumption in Phuket was 3.4 million liters.

PHUKET TOWN: Four members of a teenage bag-snatching gang were arrested at the end of January after a theft attempt near Wat Chalong went wrong.

Nongyao Ausit, 25, reported to police that she went to the Wat Chalong fair with her husband on the night of January 27.

At around midnight, she reported, they were driving their motorcycle home along Soi Thep-Anusorn.

Three teenage boys on a motorcycle drove up from behind

and pulled alongside the couple. One THE TIME grabbed K. Nongvao's necklace from her neck.

While accelerating to get away, the rider of the mo-

torcycle lost control and bumped into K. Nongyao's bike, causing both machines to fall over.

Two of the boys ran into nearby woods while the driver picked up his bike and rode away.

K. Nongyao and her husband memorized the license number of the teenagers' red Honda Dream and rushed to the Phuket Town Police Station to report the incident.

Acting on this information, police officers went to a house behind Suan Luang park and arrested three 16-year-old boys: "Ton", "Nak" and "Big Samkong" – identified as the gang's

After questioning by police, the three admitted that they belonged to a four-member gang.

They told police that they had committed at least 10 motorcycle snatchings around


Tambon Chalong and Tambon Wichit since being released about a month before from the Juvenile Observation and Protection Cen-

The search for recognition

his week I will review some of the ins and outs of search engine registration. This is the tool that the Internet uses when someone enters a search word or phrase into a search engine such as Yahoo or Google.

These search engines are becoming more and more sophisticated – as are the methods of getting your website noticed by Internet surfers. Here is a recent question I received from one of our clients.

We run two fairly large dive shops in Samui and Phuket. A few years back, we spent quite a lot of money on what I believe is a pretty darn good website.

Over the years, however, it seems that our online business has dropped significantly – even though we update our site often.

My techie friend says we are not well-placed on search engines. What does this really mean? We just want to get more online business.

Like so many others, you have entered into an online marketing can of worms or, depending on how you handle it, a can of opportunities.

With a bit of homework on your part and a relatively small online marketing budget, you can make tremendous improvements to your online business.

What your techie friend is referring to is called search engine optimization. Over the years, this has become nothing less than a technical art form.

The bottom line is that you need to take a shotgun approach, applying many techniques throughout your website and online services.

Start with search Engines. These use sophisticated methods to determine the relevance and general usefulness of the information on your site. One of these methods is the aptly named the "spider", a program that crawls around the web searching for anything and everything - on every site.

Spiders deposit this information in massive databases and then sort, categorize and assign "credit points" to data based on Back then, it seemed that all a complex set of computer algo-

rithms. Herein lies the opportunities – and the keys to your online success.

content and poof ... an instant **Text content.** It's important to use simple, descriptive words and phrases throughout your site. In your case, obvious ones would include: diving, scuba, Phuket, Samui and Thailand.

> Phrases might also include: "underwater sports", "eco-tourism", "reef diving", and even "fish watching".

Guessing at these can be a daunting and frustrating task but there's good news ahead... take a look at www.digitalpoint.com (free) and www.rapidkeyword. com (not free). These two very powerful tools will help you determine the best keywords and

Next, you will need to make liberal use of these keywords throughout your site. Be careful not to overdo it though; spiders are pretty smart and they will fig-



Searchenginewatch.com has thousnds of tricks and tips for boosting your rating on search engines.

ure out if you are just blasting your keywords everywhere.

Here are just a few ways to use your keywords effectively; any webmaster worth his salt will know these.

Page Titles. The part of your site code where you can store the name of every page. Using keywords and phrases that best describe that page content will get you some pretty good "credits". Meta Tags. A hidden area on the top of every web page where you can simply list your keywords.

Alt Image Tags. These are names that you assign to images, logos and photos on your site; giving short descriptive names to these will have a very positive effect.

Here's a trick: act like you are a customer and do your own search on Google, Yahoo or MSN looking for great diving.

Note who comes up on the top and look at their overall design and content. Then, in MS Internet Explorer, click on View | Source. You will be amazed at what you find.

You don't have to be a webmaster to read and understand the top section of these pages. There, you'll find the Page Title, Meta Tags and Descrip-

Now go back to the web page and right-click on any logo, graphic or photo. Choose Properties and you'll see the Alt Image Tag for that image. A great source for good ideas.

Ok, so now you've got your design, content keywords and image tags; what's next? A lot! Remember, this has become a technical art form.

Good placement on search engines requires constant registration with each. I suggest you shop for a good provider of these

Available everywhere, these can be had for a nominal fee – or sometimes a not-so-nominal fee. If you are a do-it-yourself kind of person, then you must try www.searchenginewatch. com. Here you will find literally thousands of tips, tricks and resources for everything to do with getting noticed on the web.

If you have allocated funds for your online marketing budget, another must-see is www. overture.com, one of the most powerful websites for getting into the Top 10 Search Engine listings ... but, it'll cost ya.

Basically, it's an online auction site, where you bid for top placement based on your chosen list of keywords. Be careful, this can get pretty expensive pretty fast because you are paying each

time someone clicks on your site from within a search engine.

Take your time and read the Tips & Tricks section carefully. It's pretty simple but you'll want to be sure about what you're doing here.

Two pointers: First, choose your bid words carefully. "Thailand" may auction for 20 US cents, "Phuket" may go for 10 cents and "underwater sports" could go for as little as .03 cents.

Second, don't bid for the top two spots because everyone, including those who are just kicking tires, clicks on the top two listings. Shoot instead for the third, fourth or fifth placement. In those positions it is more likely that the visitor is really looking for something - and you will pay about 80% less for the same keywords.


Last, but not least, you will want to know how much progress you are making – and probably don't want to wait to see it in your bottom line. This whole thing is about CANI - constant and never-ending improvement. For this, you should check out www.nedstat.com.

This is my favorite web traffic tool because it gives great, easy to understand reports... and it's FREE.

It's a tool your webmaster places into each page that you want to track. The reports tell you how many clicks you have, what country they came from, what keyword was used to find your site – even where the user was before and after they left your page, and how long they stayed.

Care to play "Big Brother" anyone?



Phuket sees boom in fitness industry

PHUKET: With the opening of two large new fitness clubs, Phuket seems to be experiencing a boom in the fitness industry. The two newest clubs are the 36-million-baht Easy Fitness Center and the TaiLife Health & Leisure Spa, built at a cost of more than 50 million baht.

Easy Fitness Center is a 1,100-square-meter club on the bypass road, just south of Thainaan restaurant. Yvon Van Eyseren, CEO and majority investor, told the *Gazette* that since opening two months ago, the club has signed up 120 members.

Yvon, a fitness expert who holds "top trainer" status in Europe, said he expects it will take about six years for the investment, part-financed by a loan from KasikornBank, to pay off.

Easy Fitness has a total of 41 machines by Cybex, Stex and Free Motion. About half of these are for strengthening, the remainder for cardiovascular exercise. Free weights are limited to

dumbells, as Easy Fitness does not see bodybuilders as its target market and does not want to risk members injuring themselves.

The club also offers a variety of dance, aerobics and martial arts classes in two purposebuilt group training rooms, as well as a health-food restaurant, Internet access and a children's play room.

LADYBOYS

Members pay an 8,000-baht "entry fee", currently reduced to 3,000 baht as a promotion, and a minimum three months' membership fee at 1,400 baht per month. Monthly rates are reduced to 1,300 baht and 1,200 baht respectively for members who pay for six months or a year up front.

Various discounts are also available for government bureaucrats, students and other groups. The club also sees ladyboys as a specific market, and has a special changing room to cater to

"Within five years, we would like to see 5% of the population between 14 and 70 years old actively exercising, and we will also motivate ladyboys to join the club. This group is an important market share that happens to be body-aware," Yvon said, adding that the club's goal for the first year is 800 members, followed by an increase in members by 200 a year thereafter.

Easy Fitness' competitive advantages are its central location, individualized service and state-of-the art equipment, he says.

In Patong, which has led the island's boom in fitness clubs, the newest is TaiLife Health & Leisure Spa, which opened in November 2005, and now has 280 members.

Manging Director Brett Taylor and two silent partners funded the 990-sqm TaiLife, which is centrally located on Soi

Day passes start at 200 baht. Memberships are offered on a weekly, monthly, six-monthly or annual basis. These include a Health Pass that allows access to the gym, a Leisure Pass for pool and spa facilities, or a Platinum Pass with access to both.

Soon

There are hefty discounts for Thai women. For them, a onemonth Health Pass is 900 baht, a Leisure Pass 700 baht and a Platinum Pass 1,200 baht. Normal prices for these are 3,000, 2,400 and 4,200 baht a month respectively.

Mr Taylor said TaiLife's main target group is European men aged 31-50 and Thai women between 18 and 35.

TaiLife's competitive advantage, he says, lies in the 990sqm facility's qualified fitness trainers and state-of-the-art machines. These include 11 cardio machines by LifeFitness and 12 Cybex strength training machines. There are also Olympic-standard free weights.

Other facilities include a 25meter swimming pool, sauna, steam room, sports and relaxation massage service with professionally qualified massage therapists, and a health food restaurant.

Mr Taylor expects the business to recoup its original investment within 10 years.

Other top-end fitness centers on the island include Club Asia Fitness on the 3rd floor of the Royal Phuket City Hotel, which opened in 1996. The center, run by Asian Wind, has more than 600 members, 30% of whom are foreigners.

Manager Nongnuch Surin said Asian Wind has a main workout room of 269sqm, equipped with 19 cardio machines and a 140sqm workout studio. Membership is 3,250 baht plus a 1,599baht monthly fee.

Asian Wind, owned by Australian Peter Heppell, also manages the fully-equipped BodyWize Fitness at Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort and the fitness room at the Leelavadee Spa.

PIONEERS CLOSE

Also in Phuket City is the Royal Spa on Yaowarat Rd. The fitness center there has 11 strengthening and 12 cardio machines as well as free weights and other spa facilities. The spa, covering 4,500sqm, was opened in March 2000, the fitness center followed a year later.

Marketing Manager Surachet Chiang-In told the Gazette that investment by partners Narongsak Juthamongkol, Suppakorn Bunyapatson and Singaporean Aung Ko Lin was 35 million baht, excluding land – the spa was built on land leased for 30 years, he said. The Royal Spa fitness center currently has 250 members, 80% of whom are foreigners. Membership is 2,000 baht to join plus 1,495 baht a month.

Two of the pioneer fitness centers have closed down. One was the fitness center at the Holiday Inn Resort, which closed about four years ago when the contractors running it moved to Europe. The other, Fitness R Us at the Boat Lagoon, ceased operations last month after three years. Former partner Pensri Lewis said the club could not attract enough members.


However, in Patong three new fitness centers have opened in recent years. These are Phuket Gym, near Patong Hospital; the Patong Gym, on the dead-end road near the Nanai Rd and Prachanukhro Rd intersection, and Fit Club, on Rat U-Thit-200 Pi Rd, which was recently sold.

tural products, for example, will rise, it is more than a little impractical for him to buy, say, 100 tons of sugar or coffee or whatever and store it while waiting for a price increase.

There is another approach and that is to use the futures markets. But buying and selling futures is not as simple as taking a picnic on the beach. Futures markets are extremely volatile and complex; for the average investor, it would probably be safer to go digging for gold in a minefield.

Individual investors normally confine themselves to leaving money in bank accounts, buying residential property or investing in the stock and bond markets. The one approach that 99% of individual investors make is to invest hoping - sometimes praying – that the investment will rise in value.

However, the investment world is not always an accommodating arena; history tells us that prices of assets may fall as

well as rise. It therefore makes perfect sense to invest in areas that can profit from both rising and falling markets.

It was this philosophy that led to the start of the Hedge Fund industry. The same reasoning caused the creation of futures markets. Today, the world trades enormous amounts of futures, options and a whole range of instruments known as "deriva-

tives". The size of this market in global terms is currently around US\$2 quadrillion.

When one considers that, in 2005, the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of the US was a bit over US\$13 trillion and the world's population was just over 6 billion, US\$2 quadrillion is obviously huge on anybody's scale. To express the number in full, it's US\$2,000,000,000,000,000. That's US\$333,333 for every man, woman and child on earth.

than justified in wondering how the total derivatives market could reach such a stupefying size. The answer is simple: demand.

Thirty years ago, graduates with master's degrees or a PhDs in mathematics were most likely to spend their careers teaching this subject. Today, if they shows signs of brilliance, they are more likely to end up working in the financial world, earning vastly higher remuneration.

One group involved in commodity markets is Amalgamated Metal Corporation PLC of London (AMC). Its origins go back to the formation of the London Metal Exchange in the 19th Century, of which it was a founding member.

The AMC Group now distributes, trades and manufactures metals, metal products and chemicals. It has opera-

tions in 12 countries worldwide and 26 subsidiaries in distribution and processing, manufacturing and trading.

One 100%-owned subsidiary, AMT Futures Ltd, trades in international financial futures and is a commodity broker and fund manager. It operates a number of investment funds that are open to the public and to institutional in-

this has been reduced to US\$

This is not because AMT is exactly desperate for new investors, but more because the whole industry has moved to include the "retail investor".

To return to our topic of commodities investment, AMT runs the IQS Fund, which invests in the futures markets for coffee, cotton, sugar, wheat, soybeans and soybean oil; a variety of currencies; crude oil and natural gas; copper and gold; and interest rates on 30-year US Treasury Bonds.

The fund is volatile but has been extremely profitable. Its worst period was after 9/11, not because of property destruction but because a huge number of American futures traders had their offices in the World Trade Center. After the attack, the exchange had to move to temporary offices in New Jersey, initially trading for only two hours a day, such was the loss of life.

However, normal trading resumed shortly thereafter and the IQS Fund continues to rise. The fund managers have the ability to invest in long or short positions – in other words, to profit from rising or falling situations.

Where a rising trend is believed to be evident, the fund simply stays invested and lives through day-to-day corrections and volatility.

The returns have justified the risk. Over the past 10 years the fund has achieved growth of more than 2,000% for investors, a staggering return. In 2005 alone, it more than doubled investors' holdings. Half of that gain came from Hurricane Katrina – a clear case of clouds with silver linings.

AMT is authorized and regulated by Britain's Financial Services Authority and is accepted by all the leading offshore insurance companies.

It is not for widows, orphans or those of a nervous disposition, but it should form a small percentage of any serious investor's portfolio.

Poor turnout for Langkawi regatta

LANGKAWI: Only 33 yachts, down from an expected 50 boats, turned out for the Royal Langkawi International Regatta 2006 (RLIR), held off the Malaysian island from February 11-17.

"I hope to raise 500,000 baht, and I am working closely with Childlife on how this would be allocated. Any money donated will go to support Childlife," said Mr Bird.





Introducing Laguna Village at Laguna Phuket



Life by the bay

ndrew Howard, Commercial Director of the 2.5-billion-baht development The Village on Coconut Island said that the "self-contained development" on Koh Maphrao will not have a typical housing estate atmosphere.

"Basically, the project will have the feeling of a holiday destination," said Mr Howard, adding, "It will have a lot of amenities in terms of sporting facilities including a tennis court, a fitness center and a spa.

"It will also offer watersports equipment and berths for vessels and 'dry-storage' space for as many as 60 powerboats of up to 10 meters in length."

The development, which comprises 148 villas, as well as shops, a restaurant, bar and a children's club, is being built on a 72-rai site at the northern tip of the tranquil island.

Part of the concept, explained Mr Howard, is that purchasers of the properties – which are split into three styles – will find that the island "offers peace and exclusivity, as well as ready access to Phang Nga Bay, at least for those with their own boat."

There will be 62 Type A units, each with an internal living area of 120 square meters, plus 85sqm of terraces and decking on plots ranging from 300 to 600 sqm. Each will have one or two bedrooms with en-suite bathrooms, a kitchen, living and dining areas as well as a pool. Prices start at US\$350,000 (about 14 million baht).

There will also be 62 Type B units. These properties will have an internal area of 210sqm and external space of 120sqm. These homes will have the same amenities as the Type A, but with two or three bedrooms. Prices start at US\$550,000 (22 million baht).

The internal area of the 24 Type C units will be 310sqm plus external living area of a further 170sqm. These houses will each sit on a plot of between 1,100 and 1,600 sqm (1 rai). They will have four or five bedrooms, and are priced at US\$750,000 (30 million baht) upward.

The design is described as "contemporary Thai" with the roof fashioned to resemble an upturned longtail boat.

Interior design will feature wood prominently – floors, for

example, will be of *maka* – and, Mr Howard added, emphasis has been placed on using traditional materials for a traditional look, but with modern facilities such as European-style bathrooms and granite kitchen surfaces.

The site will have its own well and Koh Kaew Tambon Administration Organization is expected to bring mains power to Koh Maphrao soon, once a budget for this has been finalized.

"Dogs and pigs sold well this year because they look so cute





ermans. You've got to love them. I know many *Gazette* readers happen to be from that delightful country, so I have to be quite careful what I say here.

But I do have a slight problem with Germans: their words are too long. I did a quick search online about this, and it would appear that there isn't a "longest word" in German, as there's literally no limit to how long they can be. This can get a little confusing.

If Germans felt the urge to do something amusing (they are of course renowned for their sense of humor) they could invent words that looked completely insane on paper, and they'd still be grammatically correct. Apparently *Oberammergaueralpenkräuterdelikatessenfrühstückskäse* has something to do with breakfast meats.

The Danube steamship company, once the world's largest riverboat operator, is now no longer afloat. Perhaps this has something to do with the company's tongue-twisting name: Donaudampfschifffahrtsgesell-schaft. With a triple F. Seriously.

Even numbers aren't immune from this fascination with ever-lengthening words in the German language: Neunhundertneunundneunzigtausendneunhundertneunundneunzig is a number just under a million, I'm told. At least, I hope that's what this means, and that I'm not spouting German profanities.

Flower names can be just as confusing – they're not always as easy as they could be. A rose is always a rose, a daisy is a daisy, and an orchid is always an orchid. Well actually, sometimes it's not, and that's the point. Why do things as simple as flowers have to have names that are often so complicated?

The cream-fruit plant, or Indian rubber vine, even has two names in Latin: *Strophanthus gratus* and *Roupellia grata*. For the purposes of this article, let's settle on *Stropanthus*.

I've asked several Thai

friends of mine, who all think they know a bit about gardening in Thailand, and they struggle to provide a definitive name for the plant in Thai.

So far, we've come up with daeg peenang, yaem peenang and nang yeng peenang – the only thing all three have in common is a reference to the Malaysian island somewhere in the dim and distant history of the plant.

This is doing my head in. Are Germans as confused as I am? Originally, the cream-fruit plant is from far afield. Its ancestral home is tropical West Africa, and was brought to this part of the world by early explorers.

Its glossy, evergreen leaves are thick and leathery, and it bears terminal clusters of waxy, bellshaped, purple-and-white flowers that look a bit like begonias but are fragrant at night, with a smell similar to some roses.

This smell kind of reminds me of the rather inexpensive perfume sported by early girlfriends, way back in my teens. Not exactly Chanel No 5, but fragrant enough. Back then it didn't really matter.

The flowers that follow the deep purple buds that initially appear are a particularly weird shape. Five petals surround a big hole in the center about an inch deep, with a long pollen-covered stamen in the middle.

The open central part is surrounded by a dozen or so vertical "spikes", in contrast to the delicate petals around them. Even after they're cut, these flowers last several days and are great for floral displays.

The folk healers of tropical

West Africa have found a number of uses for the cream-fruit plant. They make a rubbing compound from its leaves to reduce fevers; they mash the leaves to treat various skin problems and wounds and make medicines from the leaves to treat various "unmentionable" problems.

The seed of the *Strophanthus* yields a substance known as *ouabain*. The most common use for this in its native land was as a source of arrow poison, both for hunting and for forays against neighboring villages.

It was this use that initially brought the plant to the attention of Western science. In 1861 the explorer David Livingstone observed native people hunting with a poison that had been made from the seed of a closely related plant (a vine called *Strophanthus*

kombe, if you care) and he later reported the substance as an apparent cardiac stimulant.

This led to the investigation of many similar species, of which *Strophanthus gratus* turned out to be the most valuable. Africans who later heard that the English were using the poison from the seeds in a pure state as a medicine concluded that the English were a completely mad race. They may still be right to this day.

As it belongs to the same family as the allamanda, the internal sap of the plant is fairly poisonous. Just before I sat down to write this, I picked a creamfruit flower from my garden (the one in the picture), and it seemed quite keen to secrete as much sap on my skin as it could.

If you do handle this plant, make sure that you wear gloves, or at least avoid touching the sap.

Given the right conditions, *Strophanthus gratus* grows like crazy. The one in my garden started life as a tiny pot plant, but once it became established in a shady corner, it went mental, making its way into the eaves of my house and showing no signs of slowing down.

This plant adores the sun, too. It will be content in the shade, but the more sunlight it gets, the more flowers it will produce. More flowers also appear when it's drier, so it shouldn't be overwatered.

To propagate the creamfruit plant, all you need is to snip off a woody cutting and stick it in some moist compost. It will take root and grow fairly quickly.

The cream-fruit plant is another smelly plant that looks good too. What's it really called though? Never mind. Just be sure to be careful if you decide to use it to treat "unmentionable" problems






