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'Aftermath' set gets a reprieve

LAYAN: A "destroyed" building specially constructed at Layan Beach by the team shooting the TV tsunami mini-series *Aftermath*, will not be knocked down.

Instead, it is to be taken over by the Sirinath National Park authorities and converted into a rest area for tourists and park officials.

The crew shooting the miniseries, which will be shown on the BBC and HBO networks, was filming at the beach for around a week and attempted to recreate the chaos of the days after the tsunami hit.

Once filming was completed, tourists and residents were initially left perplexed as to why there was a new "smashed" building in the national park, with Christmas decorations and other garbage strewn around it.

One walker on the beach even reported coming across a fake arm and a fake leg, made of silicon, apparently left behind on the beach by the film crew. The *Gazette* was unable find any such artifacts, however.

On July 1, Veeraphol Ratana, Chief Protection Officer of Layan Beach, which is within Sirinath National Park, cleared up the mystery.

The house was part of the set for the mini-series. We asked the film-makers to leave it because we plan to fix it up so tourists and park officials can use it for relaxing.

"It would have been easy for the film crew to destroy the building and clear the site, but I feel that the foundations will be useful for us. We plan to have it

ready for next high season."

As for the debris lying around, he said, "Much of the rubbish still on the beach consists of trees that were knocked down by the tsunami and debris brought in by the monsoon.

"Unfortunately, at the moment we do not have the budget or the personnel to clear it all up," he added, "but we hope to have the beach completely cleaned by the start of high season."

Gazette reporters were not able to to find the arm and leg, so it appears that they have been picked up, possibly by local children.

K. Veeraphol noted that park officials may legally erect "temporary" structures such as salas in a national park area without prior permission. This is what is planned for the Aftermath structure

About 100 local people joined in the filming and were paid 500 baht a day. Local resident Nares Promdan, 52, said that the production team brought in around 300 dummy corpses for the shooting.

"They brought in wood and dummies from Khao Lak to make the area look like it did in the days after the tsunami. It didn't cause any major problems here, though at one point almost 100 10-wheel trucks were parking along the beach area. The last temporary toilet was removed just this morning," he added.



Mick the Pom murder case is suspended

PHUKET: Phuket Provincial Court has suspended indefinitely its case against British murder suspect Michael John Taylor, after he failed to appear for a scheduled hearing on June 29.

It was the second hearing Taylor had missed. He also failed to turn up in court on April 24, in breach of his bail terms. The case against him is now on hold pending his capture by police.

Taylor, better known as "Mick the Pom", was on trial for the murder of his 28-year-old girl-friend Jantra Weangta, who was stabbed to death on August 17, 2005. He was released on bail from Phuket Provincial Prison on March 7, when the Phuket Provincial Court accepted as bail a *chanote* land title deed valued at 400,000 baht.

After he failed to appear on April 24, the court seized the title deed and issued a warrant for his arrest.

Taylor's lawyer, Somsak "Sam" Chattay, told the *Gazette*, "Mr Taylor did not come today, so the court must suspend his case. If the police can arrest him, the court will summon him again and the case will resume."

But it may be too late for that. The lawyer said he had heard many rumors that his client had already fled the country.

"There are many rumors about him; that he is in England, Bali or Bangladesh. So I'm not sure. Where could he be?" the fugitive's attorney asked.

Finland appoints Pamuke as its Honorary Consul

KATA: Pamuke Achariyachai, Managing Director of the Kata Group of hotels and resorts, has been appointed Honorary Consul-General for Phuket by the Republic of Finland.

The appointment comes partly in recognition for the role played by K. Pamuke and his Kata Group staff in helping Finnish victims of the 2004 tsunami disaster.

Finnish Prime Minister Matti Vanhanen visited the resort during the recovery period to thank staff there.

"I feel most privileged and honored to accept this responsibility, not only because it is a unique experience for me but also because HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej personally signed the document to endorse me," said K. Pamuke, whose wife Thanyarat is Senator-elect for Phuket.

Although the position is mostly honorary, K. Pamuke will help arrange documents for Finnish nationals who want to renew their passports and assist others who encounter problems in Phuket.

K. Pamuke, also a former Phuket Chamber of Commerce President, said he did not think the work would be too demanding.

"As I am already in the hotel business I am used to helping people," he said happily, adding that on July 21 he would open an office at the Kata Beach Resort to conduct his work as Honorary Consul.

The appointment is unusual. Countries generally appoint their own nationals as honorary consuls.

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Woman found murdered on beach

RAWAI: The body of Tada Sanguansuk, a 49-year-old motor-bike taxi driver in Phuket City, was found on the beach near Wichit Bungalow late in the afternoon of June 28.

She had been raped and her throat had been slashed.

Pol Col Chalit Kaewyarat, Superintendent of Chalong Police Station, told the *Gazette* that staff at Wichit Bungalow made the gruesome discovery and reported it to the police.

"We believe she was murdered about three hours before she was found," Col Chalit said.

He explained that K. Tada had recently been released from Phuket Provincial Prison, and had started working as a motorbike taxi driver at a taxi stand in front of the prison.

Col Chalit added that her body was taken at Vachira Phuket Hospital, and that officers were waiting for the results of an autopsy.

"We believe she was raped by [at least one] Burmese working on a nearby rubber plantation," he added.

Duo gun down 'wrong' student

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Rajabhat University student Teerapong "Song" Junsawee, 24, was shot dead on Soi Panieng on June 25 in an apparent case of mistaken identity.

K. Song, who also worked at a Karon hotel, was shot four times while on the way to pick up his girlfriend from university about 9:30 pm. He was hit in the temple, stomach and shoulder.

Pol Lt Col Sien Kaewthong, Duty Inspector at Phuket City Police Station, told the *Gazette* that two men on a motorbike were seen following K. Teerapong. The passenger opened fire.

"All the witnesses we questioned said that K. Song was a good man – patient, hard working and never had any problems with his neighbors," he added.

Col Sien said that earlier the same evening a man with the same nickname and a similar appearance to K. Song was seen arguing with a group of teenagers in a soi near where K. Song lived. — *Jenjira Ruengjarus*

Tsunami warning system one step nearer completion

PHUKET: Thailand will be the first country to be able to alert the recently-founded Asian Disaster Preparedness Center so that other countries in the region can be warned of impending tsunamis, Smith Thammasaroj, Deputy Minister of the Prime Minister's Office, said on June 28.

At a press conference at the Royal Phuket City Hotel, K. Smith explained that Deep-ocean Assessment and Reporting of Tsunamis (DART) buoys donated by the US government will be installed off the Andaman Coast.

The buoys will be able to send tsunami warnings to the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) in Nonthaburi and direct to the warning towers that have been installed along the Andaman Coast.

"Seventy-six tsunami warning towers have been installed along the coast in Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Trang, Satun and Ranong, and in the coming months they will be connected to receive warning signals [direct] from the dart buoys," he said.

The first buoy will be installed at 9°N 89°E in December, and the second buoy at 4°N 89°E

early next year, K. Smith said. They are expected to give just under two hours' warning of an approaching tsunami.

The buoys will be donated by the US, and maintained by the US over the next two years at a cost of 36 million baht. "If Thailand had decided not to use these buoys from America, and instead had chosen to use other buoys, it would cost us 180 million baht a year," K. Smith explained.

The US government will receive the warnings issued by the buoys as well, he added.

"The US chose Thailand because they found that Thailand has a good, professional team to prevent and provide relief from disasters, as was shown [in the aftermath of] the tsunami disaster two years ago," he said.

n June 29 Phuket Provincial Court suspended the trial of Briton Micheal John Taylor after he failed to appear for his second hearing. Taylor, also known as "Mick the Pom", was on trial for the murder of his 28-year-old live-in girlfriend Jantra Weangta, who was stabbed to death on August 17 last year.

The word on the street is that Taylor has fled the country. This latest turn in the "Mick the Pom" case is reminiscent of the case against Sam Van Treeck, a Belgian man accused of the October, 2004, murder of Phuketbased dive instructor Chompoonut "Jeab" Kobram, who was stabbed to death in Pattaya.

Van Treeck remains at large, having fled to his native country after posting a "rented" *chanote* land title deed as bail to the Pattaya Court.

Similarly, Taylor was released on bail from Phuket Provincial Prison on March 7 after the Provincial Court accepted as bail a *chanote* valued at 400,000 baht.

UNLIKELY

Simply because they managed to post bail, even though neither of them had the means to pay for it themselves, it is now very unlikely that either Van Treeck or Taylor will stand trial.

While the debate continues, both here in Thailand and in the West, about whether a person charged with a violent crime should be allowed bail, the fact remains that if a defendant can produce the bail set by the court then he is released from custody, pending the outcome of his trial.

In Thailand, cash, the signed affidavit of a guarantor and property deeds are all accepted as bail. As in the Van Treeck and Taylor cases, property deeds are the most common form of collateral, especially as they are considered by the courts to be substantial enough alone with neither

cash nor a guarantor needed.

However, if a defendant cannot post bail by himself, there is another option: bail insurance. In April 2004, the Court of Justice initiated the Bail Bond Insurance scheme with the aim of giving suspects the chance to be released from remand while a prolonged trial or investigation continues, without the suspects having to come up with the required collateral themselves.

The introduction of bail insurance, now sold through 59 government-vetted insurance companies, also aimed to limit the number of people private bail agents could take advantage of.

Souwakon Wongkongsang, Manager of the Phuket Branch of Viriyah Insurance Co, explained to the *Gazette*, "The main objective of Bail Bond Insurance is to provide some relief to suspects because it's not clear whether they are guilty or not.

"Some people do not have property and their friends may not be able to help them post bail. In cases such as this they may turn to bail agents, who could take advantage of them and only add to their problems. Bail Bond Insurance is one way to help avoid that," she said.

K. Souwakon explained that the law prohibits the sale of bail insurance only to suspects charged with *lèse majesté* or with selling drugs. "It is [also] our policy never to sell this insurance to people charged with rape," she added

There are two types of bail insurance: pre-offense and post-offense. "Pre-offense bail insurance is still new and not well known by people," K. Souwakon said, "or it could be that people don't want to spend money on this

In the past 20 months, two foreigners accused of vicious murders have managed to obtain bail and have then disappeared.

The first, Sam Van Treek, resurfaced in his native Belgium. The other, Briton Michael John Taylor, is still on ther run, surrounded by rumor. Here, **Janyaporn Morel** takes an in-depth look at the business of bail.

policy because they think it's not so useful to them."

"About three or four customers have bought this policy from us. Almost all of them are people who drive cars a lot and don't have first-class insurance that covers bail."

Post-offense bail insurance, however, is proving to be much more popular, she said, mainly because the courts inform defendants that the option is available in the hope that defendants will not turn to private bail agents.

"We started selling this policy two years ago. Many people ask to buy post-offense bail insurance, but we don't sell many of these policies because we have many strict conditions

and we consider each case carefully before selling it to a customer," she said.

A standard precaution is for insurance companies to require a guarantor who can be easily found in case the accused skips bail.

"We need the case details from the police or the court, and we need a local guarantor who can assure us that the suspect will not run away. The guarantor can be a government officer or local person who has a permanent residence here or is involved in a reputable occupation," K. Souwakon said.

"The premium for this policy depends on the bail amount and the seriousness of case, but it's always between 5% and the legal maximum of 20% of the bail amount.

"If the police are continuing their investigation, the premium is between 5% and 10 % of the bail amount, but the premium can be up to 20% of the bail amount, depending on the advice of our lawyer. The law allows us to set the premium ourselves."

Although the number of people taking out this insurance is growing, K. Souwakon said her company does not exploit it for profit. "The number of people who have taken out this insurance with us constitutes about 3% of all our customers. More and more people are taking out this type of insurance, and if we market it well we will get a lot more customers.

"But for us, offering bail bond insurance helps people in need. We offer this policy as a service to society, not for profit," she added.

The top-selling bail bond insurance provider in Thailand is Syn Mun Kong Insurance Plc. Prayat Thitathummakul, Executive Vice-President – Southern Division, explained that of all the Syn Mun Kong customers in Southern Thailand, 40% are in Phuket.

GOOD SALES TEAM

"We have many customers in Phuket but this doesn't mean that Phuket has a high crime rate, it's because we have a good sales team," he said.

"At first people didn't understand how this insurance is useful, but they are learning more about it from the government and from insurance companies, and now this type of policy is becoming more popular," K. Prayat said.

Insurance broker Sutham Sudsanit, whose Bamrung Roong Ruang Law main office is just across the road from Phuket Provincial Prison, explained, "My law office offers services for all aspects of the legal justice process and I started selling bail insurance a little less than a year ago.

"Almost all my customers come to my office and ask for a lawyer, and if they don't have anyone to help them post bail I suggest that they buy bail insurance," he said.

K. Sutham often deals with drugs cases, for which bail insurance is not an option. "Other cases involve theft and gambling, but we sell bail insurance only to people who can find a guarantor. Each insurance company has its own conditions for providing bail insurance, some need only two guarantors, and some need both guarantors and property to be put up," he explained.

All the insurance companies the *Gazette* interviewed agreed that having a customer skip bail was just a risk they took. "Ev-

eryone knows that it's a risk. They don't want to lose money, that's why there are very strict conditions. In some cases, three or four guarantors are needed," K. Sutham said.

K. Souwakon of Viriyah Insurance said, "Our experience has shown that it is best that we check very carefully before we sell a policy to anybody. We need guarantors who we can track down so that we can be compensated if the suspect jumps bail."

In the case of foreigners,

Viriyah Insurance and Syn Mun Kong Insurance said that they have had only a few cases where a foreigner has asked to buy bail insurance.

"We have accepted some foreigners in less serious cases where bail has not been set too high, but usually we deny them because there is a high risk that they will skip bail and go back to their home countries or disappear because they don't have a permanent residence in Thailand," K. Prayat said.

Viriyah Insurance, however, accepts foreigners who have a Thai family and can provide traceable guarantors, "If they can find a guarantor who satisfies our conditions, then we will sell this policy to them," K. Souwakon said.

Despite the Court of Justice's efforts to give more suspects access to bail, the strict conditions the insurance companies impose leaves the door open for suspects to use a private bail agent.

One source who asked to remain anonymous said, "There are many private bail agents [in Phuket] offering 24-hour bail services. The conditions are negotiated between the guarantors and the clients.

"They usually use a land title to post bail and they charge more than an insurance company, which by law can charge a maximum of 20% of the bail amount.

"Some of them take advantage of suspects by buying a bail bond insurance policy themselves

and then selling the policy to the suspect [who is still in jail] at twice the price.

"But usually these independent agents also ask for a guarantor because if the suspect skips bail they can ask the guarantor for their money back. They will not risk losing their [own land titles]," the source said.

Another source said that if the suspect cannot find a guarantor the independent bail agent might charge a fee of up to 100% of the bail amount. "I've even heard that they can bail the client out of jail immediately if the

client agrees to pay them the amount they want."

As Thailand has extradition

treaties with very few countries, foreigners charged with serious crimes who are granted bail and can make it back to their home countries stand a good chance of

never having to face justice at all.

All they have to do is pay the money and run.

Tipple, piddle, topple

t first police thought it might be a case of suicide when local real estate magnate Siri, 52, was found dead in the early hours of the morning on the ground below the balcony of his home.

After searching the man's apartment and finding no signs of a struggle or break-in, police were coming to the conclusion that poor Siri, who lived alone, had taken his own life.

After talking with the man's relatives and the security guard who found the body, however, they reached a rather different conclusion.

The security guard on duty told the police that on the night of his demise, Siri had stumbled back home looking a little worse for wear from drink and, as always, headed up to his favorite peeing platform.

Presumably unwilling to witness the unsightly spectacle for the umpteenth time, the guard did not actually see Siri fall. But he reasoned that the most likely explanation was that while Siri was swaying back and forth struggling with his zip, he lost his balance and fell to his death.

Police accepted this explanation and the ruled the case one of accidental death.



One day after the incident, Pol Col Apichart Jansamret of the Samui Police received a call from a Thai man who admitted to having been the driver of the other jet-ski. The man, whose name has not yet been released, was arrested on a manslaughter cahrge and is now in prison awaiting trial.

Beetle battle: After three years trying to rid the island of the infamously destructive coconut leaf beetle, Samui authorities say that the island's palm trees are finally showing signs of recovery.

An environmental crisis developed when an insect known as *Brontispa Logissima Gestro* began laying its tree-gobbling larvae in the crowns of Samui's most famous symbol.

At the height of the infestation last year, nearly 50% of the island's palm trees were affected over an area of 75,000 rai. After

assessing the situation, government experts asked the Samui Municipality to import several thousand *Den Bien* wasps from Vietnam. While most people are unfavorably disposed toward wasps, this tiny parasitic version, *Asecodes hispinarum*, is a hero, attacking the beetle larvae and limiting the infestation.

When former Minister of Public Health Sudharat Keyuraphan saw the extent of the problem on a visit to Samui, she persuaded the Cabinet to fund the import of the wasps.

The result was that over 130,000 wasp cocoons were placed on infected trees around the island. According to Dr Chalerm Sintusek, Chief of the

Jet-ski tourist killed

Department of Agriculture's Planning and Protection Office, the battle against the beetle is now finally being won.

"Based on the last inspection in June," said the professor, "only around 10% of the island's palm trees are still infected. However, there is still around 1,200 rai that needs attention and for this we may need to release more wasps."

Double dealing: On June 10, Samui Police Deputy Superintendent, Pol Capt Apichart Boonsrirote reported the arrest of a husband-and-wife drug dealing team in Bophut.

After watching the couple's activities for several weeks, undercover officers finally moved in and arrested them at Lam Dinmarket.

A search of their bags uncovered an unspecified quantity of *ya bah* (methamphetamine) tablets wrapped in tissue and sealed in small plastic bags.

Police identified the suspects as 26-year-old Porn Pilai from Nan Province and her husband, identified only as "Pitak", from Phattalung. During questioning they told police they bought the drugs from a woman known as "Ann" from Lop Buri, another Samui resident.

Police traced Ann, also known as Yuwada, to her house in Bophut, where they found 3,000 tablets of *ya bah* wrapped in packs of 10 and ready for sale.

Ann was arrested and taken to the police station for questioning. Capt Apichart told the local press that the three suspects may be part of a larger drug ring.

In another case involving ya bah, Capt Apichart arranged for undercover police to buy the drug from 24-year-old suspect Pongsak Jairangsee. Realizing it was a set-up, the suspect managed to evade arrest, but a subsequent search of his room uncovered 79 ya bah pills and three grams of ya ice crystal (crystal methamphetamine).

Island infrastructure: In an attempt to meet the demands of the island's growing economy, the Samui Municipality has decided to revive a number of previously shelved development plans on the island.

The projects, scheduled for completion by the end of 2007, include: reconstruction of the road from Samui airport to Bophut; land reclamation in Nathon to create a new public recreation and commercial zone; a beachfront park in Bophut, and a small flyover to route traffic

around Samui's busiest tourist area, Chaweng.

The total budget for new projects on Samui? A modest 78.5 billion baht, with an extra 30 million to be requested for the land reclamation plan.

Samui Mayor Warakorn Ratanarak said that the new facilities have been designed to benefit "local people and tourists alike" and admitted that largescale infrastructure projects are also sorely needed if the island is to keep pace with international tourist demand.

New Rotary president: On July 1 the Rotary Club of Koh Samui held its annual installation night at the Samui Palm Beach Resort, where members appointed the club's fourth president, German Rico Stapel.

A businessman who grew up in the former East Germany, Mr Stapel took over the post from Paul Watson of Northern Ireland, owner of Tropical Murphy's, one of the island's most popular tourist pubs.

Having lived in Thailand for several years, Mr Stapel has been a member of the Samui chapter since its inception. The well-attended event included cocktails, canapés and a delicious Thai buffet



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Profs ignoring research, seminar told

nly 2,000 research articles by Thai univer sity lecturers appeared in international academic journals last year, with 98% of those coming from just eight universities, Higher Education Commission Secretary-General Pavich Thongroj told a seminar of university rectors.

When the number of lecturers was divided by the number of published articles, K. Pavich said, it emerged that about 12 lecturers had worked on each paper, even at the eight most productive universities.

"In fact, universities should give priority to research, which widens knowledge. Production of graduates should be a secondary task," he said.

Caretaker Education Minister Chaturon Chaisang disagreed, saying universities should focus on producing graduates in line with the country's needs.

K. Chaturon said he hoped to give the public a role in keeping an eye on universities and had, to that end, instructed the Higher Education Commission to evaluate universities and make the results public.

Garland grief: Ananya "Lee" Meunsuwan, 9, suffered fatal head injuries after being run over by a six-wheel truck at a Bangkok intersection where she was forced by her father to sell garlands to passing motorists.

When police arrived at Teuk Chai intersection in Phya Thai District, they found the victim's parents, Bualoy and Umaporn Meunsuwan, standing beside her weeping.

The truck driver, Chom Hanphum, 30, who waited for police at the scene, was charged with reckless driving causing death.

Witnesses from the neigh-

borhood said Lee was forced to sell flowers to pay for her schooling and get money for her parents, who did not want to work.

Relatives said Bualoy had forced Lee to sell flowers every evening until 8pm and on weekends since she was seven.

She was supposed to meet a sales target or she would face a beating.

Bualoy was often seen assaulting Lee at the intersection because she had asked for a break to play with other children or do homework, they said.

Cracking up: About six in every 100 Thais suffer some form of mental disorder and as many as 600,000 of those are chronic sufferers, Deputy Public Health Minister Anuthin Charnveerakul told a seminar.

Citing a World Health Organization report, K. Anuthin claimed a quarter of the world's population had mental health problems at some time in their lives, while up to 45% of work absences resulted from mental health problems.

The WHO also predicted that within 14 years, economic and social losses from depression and similar disorders would be severe, ranking second only to heart and blood diseases.

In Thailand, about 1% of the population, or 600,000 people, was estimated to be mentally ill.

A further 5% suffered from depression and depressive episodes, he said.

Society continued to misunderstand the mentally ill. Many perceived sufferers as untreatable and dangerous to others. This led to a lack of social acceptance and job opportunities, as well as alienation that sometimes worsened their condition, he added.

Population peak: Experts believe that by reducing infant deaths, road accidents and HIV/ Aids infections, the average life expectancy of Thai people could be increased by 10 years to about 80, bringing the country into line with more developed nations.

Current life expectancy for Thais is about 70 years, said Pramote Prasartkul, a professor of demography at Mahidol University.

Thailand's population is increasing gradually and is expected to peak at 65 million in the next two decades, then begin to fall.

Current estimates are for about 800,000 births a year, compared with about 500,000 deaths, for a net population increase of 300,000 a year.

Births are projected to drop to 700,000 per year and the death rate is forecast to rise to about 700,000 annually, K. Pramote said.

"This means more people are dying while there will be fewer births," he said.

Recommendations made by his institute were aimed at reducing deaths and helping people live longer, he added.

Scared straight: A program that forces convicted drunk drivers to have direct contact with maimed road accident victims is reporting great success in making irresponsible motorists realize the error of their ways.

"We require them to take care of the victims so they can realize the tremendous suffering and difficulties they can cause," Probation Department Director-General Wanchai Rujanawong said of the program it had organized jointly with the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration.

"Of these convicted drivers, fewer than 3% have been caught repeating the offense," K. Wanchai said

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From Bermuda with love

ne of the remarkable things about the aftermath of the tsunami disaster has been the astonishing and continuing outpouring of support from ordinary people around the world to help in the recovery.

One such project, initiated by a girls' school halfway around the world in the Caribbean, raised some US\$25,000 (just under 1 million baht) in direct aid for Baan Koh Phi Phi School.

Shortly after the disaster, the Bermuda High School for Girls (BHS) launched its Tsunami Relief Project and began raising money, mainly through the sale of blue "Bands of Hope" wristbands. These were imprinted with the words for "hope" in six

of the languages of the most devastated regions.

By June this year, the project had raised more than US \$25,000. Wanting to make sure that the funds went directly to those in need, a first group of five teachers and six students from the school made the long journey from the North Atlantic to Koh Phi Phi Don.

The Gazette caught up with the group at the Cape Panwa Hotel in Phuket. BHS teacher Susan Gorbutt said, "When the tsunami hit on December 26, we all wanted to do something because we felt so

hopeless. So we decided to do some fundraising."

She explained that about 10,000 of the blue bands were sold to visiting cruise ship passengers, to family and to friends.

The girls making the trip, all top fundraisers, had no idea they would be given the chance to visit Thailand to help distribute the aid and take part in other projects to help the school on Phi Phi Don.

"Many of the people who gave us money so willingly said, "We want to make sure this money goes to the children, because we've read so many stories about money not going directly to the people who need it most." We promised them all the money would go directly to a school and its children," she said

Paul Crouch from the Regents School in Pattaya, was instrumental in helping select the school, vetting it to make sure that the claimed needs were real and then helping to organize the trip, she added.

Before heading to the school for a 10-day stay "to help

out in any way we can", the girls first paid a visit to Tesco-Lotus and Central Festival Phuket to stock up on supplies for the school. Among the donated items were digital cameras, printers for the cameras, a sound system, life preservers, sports equipment, stationery and art supplies.

"A part of their need is also funding for food to serve breakfast, lunch and dinner to the children. We've supported them already in that, and we will probably continue to support them in that and in other ways," Mrs Gorbutt said.

Other activities included "Fun with English" and instruction in how to make Bermuda kites – a part of Bermuda's national heritage, Mrs Gorbutt said.

Many friendships were formed during the stay on Phi

Phi, and the girls brought with them a list of some 60 students wanting pen-pals, she added.

"I think the biggest message we wanted our girls to feel and understand is that we come here with respect. We know we are not here to save the world, we are just here to help if they want our help. We expect the trip to be lifechanging."

Arriving in Phuket on June 19, the girls stayed for two nights at the Cape Panwa Hotel before leaving for Phi Phi on June 21. They were due

to spend four more nights at the hotel on the return leg before returning to Bermuda.

"The people here are wonderful. I know now why they call [Thailand] the Land of Smiles. They are really helpful and so good with the girls as well. We feel very safe with the girls here. This has been a-year-and-a-half process and we're very excited to be here," Mrs Gorbutt said.

One of the students, 14-year-old Michelle Davis, summed up the feelings of the group before they left for Phi Phi Don.

"I'm very excited that I am going to have this wonderful experience of going to Koh Phi Phi Don," she said.

"I'm also very excited about meeting students from Thailand because I've never met students from another country. I hope to build a relationship with the people who are there."

There will be a forest rally

n 1948, with World War II over, the perimeter road of an airfield on the grounds of an English stately home in rural Sussex became a motor racing track.

The winner in the first race meeting at Goodwood, in the 500cc class, was Stirling Moss. It was also at Goodwood that Moss had the crash that ended his racing career 14 years later.

In 1966 racing stopped at Goodwood and the track lay quiet until 1993, when the Earl of March and Kinrara - whose father, the Duke of Richmond, owns Goodwood - brought the roar of powerful engines back, creating one of the best motoring events in the world – the unique Goodwood Festival of Speed.



This year's Festival of Speed takes place on the weekend of July 7-9 and is dedicated to the memories of former world rally champion Richard Burns, who died from a brain tumor in 2005, and Michael "Beef" Park, Markko Märtin's co-driver who was killed in a crash during the British round of the World Rally Championship last September.

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
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












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

or anyone not familiar with the Italian tongue, 2 Gusti means "two tastes"; the binary palate-teasers in question at 2 Gusti in Central Festival being Italian and Japanese cuisines.

No-one in his right mind would say that these two national treasures are not popular on this

In fact, given their respective popularity, one could go so far as to suggest a perfect marriage between the two, and let me not to the marriage of true minds admit impediments, as my dear friend Will keeps telling me.

"Is this not a marriage of convenience?" I ungallantly challenge Marcella Mocci, 2 Gusti's General Manager.

"No, of course not," comes her characteristically polite response, delivered swifter than the Ariete main battle tank being thrust into one of its four reverse gears. But then, I was playing Devil's advocate.

INTIMATE

The restaurant, on the ground floor of Central with the world wandering by and a rich sunset visible through the windows, is light and decorated in a pleasing, pale egg-yolk yellow.

A pacific color, it is not dissimilar to an early-morning Tuscan sun or the yellow of the Seal of the Chrysanthemum Throne, the Imperial House of Japan. By design or coincidence, it suits the 2 Gusti style well.

It is altogether both casual and intimate in the restaurant, an intimacy that belies the 80 seats available.

Shown to our table after a tour of the 400-plus-bottle wine cellar and Cigar & Wine Lounge, we are grateful that a reservation was made for us.

As the sun is now firmly over the yardarm it is quite definitely martini o'clock. However, we dodge the cocktails and go straight for a glass of house white as we chat. Good music – a little of this, a little of that – plus the drinks, soothe away the stresses and strains of the day.

Food, and plenty of it, begins to arrive. The first is a morsel, a degustation of a fresh spring roll filled with prawn and pinthickness fungi served on rather elegant translucent glass slabs.


Marcella asks if we wish to order from the menu, à la carte,

or leave such weighty decisions up to Italian Executive Chef Pacifici Riccardo from Rome and Japanese Sous Chef Takashi Nakajima from Tokyo.

Gorgeous hunks - steady, ladies – of marinaded tuna and zucchini in a Japanese style and a divine salad of avocado, tomatoes, tofu, peppers and various salad leaves make for a table resplendent with warm, Mediterranean sunshine colors.

Stunning again to both the eye and the palate are the next brace of dishes, orzo - pearl barley - cooked risotto-style in beetroot juice and spaghetti alla chitarra con vongole e zucchini (homemade pasta with courgettes and clams).

The *orzo* – which is served with a spoonful of a fragrant fondue of Parmigiano Reggiano, retains a hint of the taste of beetroot and all the color but is

as rich, warming and scoffable as anything I have ever loved. We hail this dish is the best find we have made in Phuket. Glori-

Ah, now, that's not to say that the pasta – a little of the broth from cooking the clams makes up the sauce – cannot compete; it can, but side by side with the *orzo*, this splendid pasta must come a very close second.

And the wines: a couple of glasses of the silken Cantine Leonardo Da Vinci Chianti got the ball rolling tonight before we move on to a slightly plummy Valpolicella Superiore Sagra-

A plate of delectable tempura – meaty white fish and prawns, and vegetables such as porcini mushrooms and aubergine – keep the two-tastes theme going before the main event arrives.

The carrè di agnello alla menta con cous cous ai pepperoni rossi – lamb cutlets with mint and red peppers on a bed of cous cous – is magnificent; utterly tender, rich yet light, delicate but not without substance. We plow into it with gay abandon. Fabulous.

Old time is a-flying tonight, and we are sad that we have no precious minutes left to sink into the cigar lounge for a Cazadores or a Fundadores.

Double espressos – Illy is the chosen brand – poured over homemade vanilla ice cream sate us sufficiently for now, but we will be back.

Expect to pay around 1,500 baht per couple at 2 Gusti, excluding wine.



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amruen Thompson is, in many ways, one of the paradigms for modern, educated women in Thailand – and beyond. She has made choices about the path of her life that for any 16- or 17-year-old girl of today's world might seem no less than is theirs by right.

But for a girl born in Siam in 1925 – even a very bright girl – her choices verged on radical.

K. Samruen went to a Bangkok high school, her studies including one year spent studying in the US.

After graduation, she said, "I was offered a scholarship to study medicine but I turned it down." Her reason was simple: "I couldn't face the prospect of seeing blood, and not just as a doctor; I didn't even want to do the dissection of rats and frogs, which is a necessary part of the training."

Instead, she requested that she be allowed to use the scholarship to study education or liberal arts.

"But I was not allowed to do so. At that time, a scholarship was for one course only; it was not transferable to any other program of study. You had to go through with it; it was a case of you do or you don't."

Instead, K. Samruen returned from Bangkok to work in her family business, a soda-bottling plant.

"I stayed working with my parents for two years. Then I received another scholarship offer, this time to study at teaching college."

She studied for three years during World War II, graduated, and then took a teaching job in Songkhla. She was just 18.

"The next year I was married and I had my first daughter at age 21 and my second at 23 years old."

K. Samruen explained that she and her family moved around Thailand for a number of years, teaching wherever they lived.

"I taught in Ubon Ratchathani and Bangkok, for example, before my husband was transfered to Phuket. I also received another scholarship, this time to study for a further degree in education."

She said that the period after the war was an exciting time for teachers in Thailand.

"Education in Thailand then was ... well, a little behind many Western countries, and the gov-

Samruen Thompson, 81, enjoys a remarkable life. The fifth of 10 children from a well-to-do Chumphon family, she carved out a career for herself encompassing education – which included meeting Robert Kennedy and working in gang-riddled areas of Los Angeles – and law enforcement in the US as an American citizen. ernment of the day put strong emphasis on the nation 'catching up' with those countries to improve the education of Thai children.

"It was now 1959, and I had a bachelors' degree with honors in secondary education. I continued to teach here and enjoyed it very much; educating the new generation was – is – a very fulfilling job. The responsibilities you have are enormous," she said.

Yet it was not just the pupils under K. Samruen's tutelage who were furthering their education. She, too, maintained a very active interest in raising her abilities at 11 feet.

ities still fur-

"In 1964, I received a further scholarship to study for a master's degree in education at Chulalongkorn University. The university had just opened its faculty of education – the first in the country - and I am honored to say that I was one of the first Thais to obtain

a master's degree in the subject."

She was soon offered a position to teach in the same faculty.

Disillusionment soon set in, however, over territorial battles. "I was upset by this and retired from teaching for a while to stay at home with my family. Around this time, I opened my house to two American Peace Corps

teachers. I still remember their names: Diane and Marie.

"We got to know each other well, and after some time, Diane approached me and suggested that I apply to work in the US, teaching in the Peace Corps education program."

Surmounting her earlier disillusionment with teaching, K. Samruen made a successful application to the Peace Corps.

"I taught Thai language – and, in some ways just as important for the volunteers who would be traveling to Thailand – I taught them about Thai culture and customs, and how to work and live

successfully in this country.

"I taught with the Peace Corps for a year, but decided to not renew my contract. Instead I decided to continue my studies and received government funding to study for an advanced master of education degree at the University of Southern California in

Los Angeles," she said, adding that she wanted to continue her education to doctorate level.

"There were, in the late 1960s, very few foreign students studying in the US. I had to work very hard to keep up with the American students because no special concessions were made to overseas students. Everyone was treated as if they were American.

"I am not saying that it is too easy for foreign students – in any country – to study these days, but my experience there made me very self-reliant. It forced me to study hard."

Her goal was to use her high level of education by returning to her native country and teaching again in a university.

"However, it didn't go as planned, and I remained in the US. I had fieldwork to do for my studies, and told my student counselor that I would focus on the Watts area of South Los Angeles.

"He tried to persuade me to choose another area of Los An-

geles, such as Pasadena or North Hollywood."

K. Samruen admitted that, despite knowing of the rioting that had taken place in the hot August of 1965, she did not grasp just how dangerous the area was. At least 34 people died in the riots, with a further 1,100 injured. More than 600 buildings were damaged or destroyed and 4,000 arrests were made.

K. Samruen paid her first visit to Watts soon after. "I wasn't scared because I simply didn't know anything about the real situation in Watts. I wanted to find out more about the area for myself," said K. Samruen.

Her first encounter gave her a stark lesson in reality.

"On my very first day in the area, as soon as I got off the bus – I remember it as if it were yesterday – seven or eight boys and young men approached me. The oldest – the leader – was around 28 years old while I suppose that the majority were in their early teens. Some, however looked to be no more than eight or nine years of age.

"They stared at me and surrounded me. Perhaps they couldn't tell how old I was; they were not used to Asian faces, and maybe they thought that I was far younger than I was, and a member of a rival gang."

"Their first question was, 'Who did you come with?' I was frightened, I thought I might be killed, but took a deep breath and said, 'Well sir, I will answer: I did not come to Watts by myself, but I came with God because I want to do positive things for the peo-

ple here."

K. Samruen explained more about why she was in Watts and that she was not American – "Or Mexican, which I was once mistaken for" - but Thai.

"The leader of the gang knew, and for the wrong reasons, where Thailand was. He said, 'Hey, that's next to Vietnam. My brother died in the Vietnam War."

The understanding that she posed no threat to them – in fact quite the opposite - made the gang protective towards her.

"Soon, I bought a car and the gang members 'guarded' it for me. If they had not, the wheels, the radio or the whole car might have been stolen," she recalled.

Having been made an American citizen – with approval being given by the then-Governor of California, Ronald Reagan – K. Samruen began working within the US government's "Head Start" program, an initia tive set up under President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty.

"I received funding - subject to finding 16 young children who habitually skipped school – to set up a community education program in a local church. With 16 children, I could have three staff assisting me."

She explained that after long days walking around the area and receiving pledges from parents that they would ensure that their children came to school, on the first day none did.

"I was disappointed, but not put off. Incredibly, some of the gang members encouraged parents to send their children, and little by little, beginning with just four children, the numbers grew.

The program grew to include adult education, with emphasis on learning arts and crafts to produce items to sell.

"It worked well," said K. Samruen, "and I believe it really helped many people.

"Bobby Kennedy visited the project during his 1968 presidential campaign and bought a number of paintings made by the community – they were very good."

She received her advanced master's degree from USC in 1970, and left Head Start to apply to the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD).

"The LAPD wanted more staff with master's degrees, and so I applied and was successful.

"But I didn't last long as a police officer. Even though I had spent a number of years in one of the toughest neighborhoods in the US, I was not used to violence; there was little in Chumphon when I was a child," she

"Using my success in joining the LAPD, I found I could apply for a position in the FBI, but realized early that this job could also be dangerous, and anyway, I wanted to work on a more individual basis with people."

At the time, the LAPD and the Probation Bureau were both run by the County of Los Angeles, and it was quite easy to transfer from the police to the Probation Bureau.

"I became an investigating probation officer, dealing directly with defendants.

"There was a great deal of responsibility in this role. I visited people in prison to find out their side of the story behind their arrest. I wasn't working for them - it wasn't my job to try and have them found innocent – and nor was I working for the victim or the family of the victims.

"Rather, my role was to add balance to the judicial process. I could spend time investigating the defendants' circumstances, such as whether they were mentally unbalanced at the time.

"I am very proud of my work [with the Probation Bureau], and, with my colleagues, took great care to be balanced, impartial and fair to all parties. One thing, however, that I will never forget, was the standard method of ending each report.

"We signed each report, 'Respectfully yours, Samruen etcetera', before presenting it to the judge. I don't really know why, but there was something about those words, the importance of what I was doing, the effect my investigation and recommendations could have on another's life, that made me cry the last time I presented it.

"I was happy doing that work. I felt it," she said, placing her hand on her heart, "here."

K. Samruen worked for the Probation Bureau for 14 years until 1986, when she retired and moved to Louisiana.

She now splits her time between Phuket and Louisiana, and helps charities in both places.

There is a certain symmetry in her tale: through two American Peace Corps volunteers staying with her and helping Thais, K. Samruen then returned the favor, many times over.

Even in a nation where senior citizens are held in high esteem, K. Samruen is deserving of special respect.

By Top Dog

ollowing the news coverage regarding Soi Dog Foundation's (SDF) apparent U-turn on its stance over the Mid Road Dog Shelter, Top Dog spoke with SDF board member Maxine Kent about the foundation's current

Q: *In the past, SDF has strongly* criticized the shelter and the way it was run. Why the apparent change of stance?

A: I think it is important to remember that SDF is now a Thai Foundation run by a board, and its decisions are made by that board.

In the past, the opinions expressed were very much those of individuals. SDF accepts that there is a need for a shelter on the island, but I think everybody appreciates that it is not the solution to the stray dog problem; with a maximum holding capacity of about 400 animals, that is a physical impossibility.

We also have to remember that we are guests here, and it is the view of the current board that it is far preferable to work together with the authorities to improve the situation than to stand back and criticize.

After all, we have the same aim, which is to see an end to the stray dog problem on Phuket.

Q: So what sort of dogs will be housed at the shelter?

A: Mainly dogs that have been abandoned and have nowhere else to go, dogs that are under threat or have been subjected to cruelty, and dogs that are a threat to either people or livestock.

Q: Will euthanasia be carried out at the shelter?

A: Euthanasia is not generally practiced in Thailand and we must respect this.

Having said that, in the case of dogs that are clearly dangerous or suffering, then we have agreed that each case will be looked at on an individual basis.

Q: What changes will SDF make to the shelter?

A: The government has already made some significant improvements. SDF has drawn up plans that will see further improvements to drainage, security and wet weather protection.

All working together to try to solve the problem of stray dogs in Phuket

In addition, a new clinic will be built to enable better medical treatment and provide sterilization facilities for dogs from the out-

The existing staff are excellent but over stretched. Therefore we will provide additional staff, enabling us to work with the dogs on a one-to-one basis and make them suitable for re-homing.

Q: So the plan is that these dogs will be re-homed?

A: Yes. Not all of the dogs are suitable for re-homing, but the vast majority would make exceptional pets. In the West, the fashion for adopting dogs from rescue centers is such that many now have waiting lists.

In Thailand, however, the fashion is currently for exotic pedigrees, but hopefully that will change.

We have already had many dogs adopted from our center this year and hope this will continue.

Q: Will SDF continue with its center in Phuket City?

A: No. That center was never intended to be a shelter and is not suitable for that purpose.

Once improvements have been completed at the Mid Road shelter, any remaining dogs at our center will be moved there and the old center will close. The staff currently working at the center will relocate to the Mid Road shel-

Q: What sort of things can these volunteers do?

A: Everything from walking and exercising the dogs to bathing them and giving basic medical treatment.

Q: Does SDF still see sterilization as the answer to reducing the stray dog population?

A: Definitely. This year, we will sterilize more dogs than ever before, over 5,000.

Welfare Society and the government also sterilizing, our hope is



that by the end of the year the majority of the stray population will be sterilized.

Q: Do you believe that we will ever see an end to stray dogs on Phuket?

A: That depends on a number of things. First, money! By the end of this year, SDF will have sterilized around 14,000 animals since starting work here in late

However, the reason we have been able to do this is primarily because of tsunami-based donations from overseas, particularly from the World Society for the Protection of Animals.

Their sponsorship will finish at the end of this year, however. Unless we are able to raise further income from within Phuket, we will no longer be able to continue sterilizing at anything like the current rate.

If that happens, within a few years we would be back where we started, which would be bad for the island as well as the dogs.

The second factor is education. Too many owners continue to allow their dogs to breed indiscriminately.

Not a week goes by when we don't see unwanted puppies dumped at temples and other locations, adding to the problem.

We need to convince these people that there is nothing wrong with sterilizing their animals.

Third, large numbers of cute and cuddly puppies are being brought on to the island by traders looking to make a fast buck. Many of these puppies are simply dumped once they pass the cute stage.

We, along with the Governor, would like to see more control over animals being brought into Phuket, but whether this can ever be achieved is another ques-

Q: There has been talk of introducing dog licenses in Phuket. Would this help solve the problem?

A: Dog licensing was abandoned a few years ago in Britain because it was unworkable and was actually cost more to administer than it raised in revenue.

I cannot honestly see how a license scheme here would work any better.

The cost of enforcing it would be prohibitive and it could actually add to the stray problem, as I am sure many people would abandon animals rather than pay for licenses.







The nose knows, you know...

s unlikely as it is to happen, were a celebrity punchup ever to take place between two deceased people of my choosing, it would have to be between prolific writer Margaret Hungerford (d 1897) and philosopher David Hume (d 1776).

Fast forward to Phuket, 2004, and the modern twist on the subject, uttered to the writer by a woman of Thai extraction at stupid o'clock in the morning: "Your big nose is beautiful."

Well, my nose is *not* big, but its shape has drawn envious comments in Thailand.

It seems that Asians are just as obsessed about the shape (or perceived shapelessness) of their noses as any *farang*, *gweilo*, *gweipo* or *gaijin*.

Countless is the number of cosmetic surgery clinics that will,

for a price, help the "afflicted" pick the nose they have always wanted. In Asia, the popularity of the Western nose is apparently running at an all-time high.

But why? It is certainly not as if the Asian nose is so ugly that it must be changed, nor is the Western nose so beautiful that it deserves to be copied.

I blame the beauty industry. As Baz Luhrmann pointed out in his 1999 hit *Everybody's Free (To Wear Sunscreen)*, "Do not read beauty magazines; they will only make you feel ugly."

However, for Asian readers who hanker after an occidental nose but do not have the funds for a nose job, help is at hand from that fount of all ingenuity, the People's Republic of China.

The clamp-like device pictured here is called the Jiahe Nose Up. It is, according to the delightful blurb on the package, "ANTI-GERM & STINK-PROOF".

The potential buyer is further enticed with near-poetry: "In order to make your little nose clearer, more beautiful and full of happiness, this product is necessary for your nose!"

Hmm. Clamp your nose shut and, I am told, the chance of being able to have it "full of happiness" – surely a reference to Bolivian marching

powder – is zero.

The blurb on the rear of the package begins:

"Beautiful nose!! When? Where?" before offering handy hints in cartoon form:

Woman 1 (who does not look Asian): "When and where did you use Jiahe"

Woman 2 (who also does not look Asian): "Idle talk, it's not the first time for me to drive!!" with the legend "...too when driving" underneath.

Woman 2, wearing the Jiahe and looking longingly at a Caucasian woman on TV, thinks: "The same as you." The legend reads, "...too when watching TV at home."

In the final frame we see Woman 2 asleep, still wearing the Jiahe and presumably dreaming of her new nose.

The legend reads: "...too when taking a nap after lunch or go to sleep at night."

Does the Jiahe work as a nose-altering product? Well, I'm no doctor, but I doubt it.

All it will do is cost you 65 baht and leave unsightly marks on your nose.

Better by far to ignore what is incorrectly defined as "The Perfect Nose" by those who seem so keen to have us all suffering from body dismorphia.

See your nose, instead, in all its glory, perfect as it is.

Just don't get me started on the subject of skin-whitening creams...

The Jiahe Nose Up is available from Zeen Zone at Central Festival Phuket. Even if it doesn't fix your nose, it may be useful when buying durian (see right). What's that smell on every street corner? It's durian season again.

The *Gazette*'s **Jenjira Ruengjarus** and **Stephen Fein** tell you everything you wanted to know about the King of Fruits – in fact, possibly more than you wanted to know.

hat tastes like heaven, smells like hell – and looks like it belongs in a medieval torture chamber? It's the one and only durian – praised by many as the "king of fruits", but whose regal status does not keep it from being banned from hotels, elevators and public buses thanks to its distinctive odor.

Writing in 1856, the British naturalist Alfred Russel Wallace wrote of its flavor: "A rich custard highly flavoured with almonds gives the best general idea of it, but there are occasional wafts of flavour that call to mind cream-cheese, onion-sauce, sherry-wine, and other incongruous dishes. Then there is a rich glutinous smoothness in the pulp which nothing else possesses, but which adds to its delicacy."

Sound tempting? Before you run out and buy one, consider English novelist Anthony Burgess' famous description: "Dining on durian is like eating vanilla custard in a latrine." Travel and food writer Richard Sterling remarked: "... its odor is best described as pig-shit, turpentine and onions, garnished with a gym sock."

Although durian is thought to have come originally from Borneo, there are an estimated 90,000 durian growers in Thailand, which is a major exporter of the fruit.

Commercially, the eastern seaboard provinces of Chanthaburi, Rayong and Trat are major producers, along _____

with Chumphon in the South.

Although many varieties of the fruit are cultivated, commercial production in Thailand is dominated by just four. Probably the most popular is the *monthong*, or "Golden Pillow" variety, which is also the largest. Also popular is the smaller

chanee, which means "gibbon", because the fruit tends to stick at the end of branches looking like a gibbon hanging on a tree.

The *kanyao* "long stalk" is so named because it is rather longer than other varieties, while the *kradumthong*, or "Golden Button" is named because its buds are relatively small.

Each variety has a distinct taste and its own group of supporters, many of whom will de-



fend their favorite with a fervor verging on religious zealotry.

Chanee devotees tend to brand mon thong as a "sellout" variety, which – like the picture-perfect Washington apple or a blonde cheerleader – looks good, but comes up short in other ar-

eas, such as flavor.

Then there are the durian "purists" who say that all commercially cultivated durians have had the flavor "bred" right out of them, and that durian perfection can only be found in durian baan, or nouse durian which can be found growing in backyards all across southeast Asia.

Cheaper, smaller, more pungent, less yellow inside and with larger seeds, *durian baan* is in many ways comparable with the wild banana that comes with hard seeds inside.

Hardcore durian purists from Malaysia have been known to drive up into Southern Thailand during the June to October durian season in search of the intense flavors they crave.

They also hold as high trea-

son the practice of eating a durian before it has ripened naturally and fallen from the tree under the strain of its own weight.

Any Thai will tell you that mixing alcohol and durian is a recipe for disaster, and that doing so will "heat up" the body or cause the imbiber to wake up with a fever the next day – or worse.


It's a *ying* and *yang* thing, they say. Durian is "hot", so if you eat it you should do so with equal quantities of "cool" mangosteen in order to balance out the potentially harmful imbalance.

The *Gazette* spoke to several doctors and conducted an Internet search, but failed to come up with any medical evidence to back up this widely-held claim – let alone implicate durian in any of those weird reports of spontaneous human combustion.

However, one of the writers of this column – back in his wild and crazy 20s – once bought a large durian *and* a bottle of Jack Daniel's Tennessee whiskey, consuming both together over the course of an evening, with no illeffects – or at least none that he can remember.

Getting back to the everpresent issue of smell, the *Gazette*'s Wanida Hongyok (aka Momma Duck) says that the solution to cleansing one's palate and fingers of durian smell comes not from a bottle of Listerine, but where one might least expect it: from the durian itself.

Here's how to do it: After



gorging oneself on durian, take a section of the leftover husk, which will have a hollow, concave shape to it after the delicious pods and seeds have been removed. Fill the hollow portion with water, wait a minute – then drink it.

Somehow the white surface of the inner lining of the husk comes with its own natural anti-stinkproofing.

After drinking, fill another section with water and wash your hands in it and you will no longer be *persona non grata* among your colleagues or friends.

Locating and buying the perfect durian is a combination of art and science, the complexities of which are beyond the scope of this article.

Suffice it to say that real connoisseurs wouldn't be caught dead buying pre-husked durian from a foam tray wrapped in plastic, as you will sometimes see on sale at the market.

The definitive and highly humorous basics of durian selection are outlined in an article published in by 1989 Dr Alfred Tan, which can be found on the highly comprehensive Durian OnLine website (www.ecst.csuchico.edu/~durian/): "Everything you want to know about the King but was [sic] afraid to ask!"

In summary, look for any holes in the husk, whether they be made by a squirrel, worm or curious buyer hoping to get a sneak preview. Pretend you are a Victorian shopping for a bride, not a fruit, and reject any and all durian that have a compromised husk.

After you have found one, shake it and listen. If you hear too much hollow movement inside it is probably all seed. If there is no movement and it seems heavy,


it may be overripe or even waterlogged. Reject in both cases.

After finding one with slight movement which seems about the right weight, give it the sniff test. If it is overripe, you will be able to smell it easily through the stalk. If there is no smell, it is probably unripe. Pick one that's in between, with just a slight scent from the stalk.

After you have located the right one, do not let the prospects of eating it erode your patience: you will need this for bargaining.

Fortunately, here in Phuket, the durian that will fetch thousands of baht at a supermarket in Tokyo can often be found going right past your front door in a pickup truck for about 30 baht a kilogram, or even cheaper during a durian glut.

Attach your Jiahe Nose Up (see left), approach said pickup, and start your search...

Cottara Spa

he Cottara Spa at the Diamond Cottage Resort & Spa in Karon has been open for two and half years, offering three kinds of treatments: Facial, Body Treatment and Body Massage, and package combinations of the three.

One can spend as little as 50 minutes or up to three hours at the spa and pay anywhere from 1,750 baht for a facial to 4,700 baht for a combination package.

I am welcomed by Sutinan "Jeab" Budsabok, Sales Executive & Acting Spa Manager.

"We have about five customers a day and most of them buy spa packages that take two hours or longer," she says. "Many of our customers book through the Internet. Our spa is popular because we are not expensive and we offer privacy."

K. Jeab leads me on a tour of the spa, which has six massage rooms – two of which have two massage beds apiece. Each room has a fan and air conditioning, so customers can have the room cooled to their preference, and each room is named after a flower – Orchid, Ylang Ylang, Rose, Frangipani, Jasmine and Lotus rooms.

A garland is hung on the

door of a room when it is occupied by a customer receiving treatment.

Every room has a shower and the double-bed massage rooms have two shower heads in the same shower cubicle for the guests who like to shower together

I am alone, but I like the idea of having twice the space in the shower and the room – it makes me feel more relaxed than being in smaller rooms. Sadly, here I am in a beautiful spa, once again with no one to share the shower with. Maybe next time...


The spa is designed in a mix of Thai and Balinese styles, with the furniture made mainly of dark wood. I like the dark wood and the décor throughout the spa, which has a high-class feel.

Both the men's and women's changing rooms have a sauna and Jacuzzi, giving guests the chance to relax and open the pores of their skin before having their spa treatments. The hotel gym is also located at the spa, as is a hair and nail salon.

With the tour over, we get down to business, so to speak. K. Jeab explains that before carrying out any treatment, "We ask each guest for personal details and recommend certain treatments for them because some treatments are unsuitable for certain types of skin."

She explains that the spa uses only manufactured products from Jurlique of Australia because it is a quality brand most customers already know.

"We do not use Thai herbs



to make our own spa products because some guests are allergic to some of the ingredients, which is another reason why the spa uses Jurlique products – they are non-allergenic."

I opt for the Aromatherapy Facial to be followed by the Cottara Massage. K. Muay, who started working at the spa almost a year ago, is the therapist for my facial. She begins by removing my makeup and then uses a cleanser followed by an almond facial scrub to leave my face feeling fresh and clean.

She then applies the Jurlique Floral Water followed by Face Oil, before settling in with my facial massage. K. Muay says that the face needs to be massaged just like any other part of the body, "because we use muscles in our faces to create our expressions every day.

"People should have a facial massage twice a month because massaging the lymphatic glands around the face helps blood circulation to the face and helps to keep the face looking young and fresh," she explains.

After about 20 minutes, K. Muay cleans the mask off with a warm towel and uses the aromatic hydrating concentrate before applying face lotion and eye gel.

After the face massage it is time for the Cottara Massage, the spa's popular trademark massage performed by two therapists at the same time. For me it will be K. Muay along with K. Tiew, who has worked at the spa for more than two years.

The Cottara Massage, which takes about 50 minutes and costs 2,500 bant, is the zenith of massage experience. Four hands instead of two working my body at the same time – that's hard to beat.

The massage begins with one working my back and the other working my legs, though I can't tell who is doing what because I am lying face down and both masseuses are applying exactly the same amount of pressure. It really feels like I am being massaged by a four-handed masseuse.

According to the spa menu, the massage uses "unique combinations of four massage styles – aromatherapy, Swedish, Sport and Thai [to ensure] that every nerve ending is caressed ... hypnotic, exotic and euphoric". That sounds right; after 50 minutes of such a supreme workover, I feel unbelievably relaxed. And the next day my skin feels soft and smooth.

Customers who choose package spa treatments are offered a 30-minute foot massage or may have their fingernails painted free. I opt to have small flowers painted on my nails. This takes only 20 minutes – quick and cute

Back in the reception area, K. Jeab explains, "We are currently offering 40% discount to hotel guests and 30% discount off spa menu prices to the general public

"Our current standard promotion for customers is that if a customer buys two spa treatments we will give them another spa treatment of the same value free."

very so often while on Pulau Ubin you have to stop to remind yourself I that it is actually part of Singapore. You won't find any high-rises here, still less sealed roads. This island is the complete antithesis of the glittering boutiques of Orchard Road, the computerized road-pricing of downtown and the regimented fun of Sentosa Resort.

Two kilometers offshore, tucked up in a lazy backwater of the Johore Strait, Ubin is as uncluttered and disordered as can be imagined.

As soon as you step from Changi Pier into the oily bumboat that belches black smoke as it putters across to Ubin village, you'll get the idea that you're stepping through Singapore's looking glass.

There'll be few other passengers – perhaps a few school kids and a couple of mums who've been shopping.

There's little in the way of scheduled entertainment on Ubin; the shopkeepers seem to be marking time rather than getting on with running their businesses, and the whole place moves at pace of the ancients playing checkers in the brace of cafés near the waterfront.



The thing to do is pick up a mountain bike from one of the two hire shops, return and exchange it for one with brakes that work and a proper set of tires, and head off into the bush. Hand-drawn maps are available from the shops but they are not exactly stunning exemplars of the cartographer's art. It doesn't matter, though. The island is only seven kilometers by two, and on Ubin nothing much matters anyway.

Hornbills and straw-headed bulbuls sing from the trees on either side of the trails that wind back and forth over Ubin, and there is a genuine sense of wilderness.

Both smooth and Oriental small-clawed otters have been spotted on Ubin, and dugongs and pods of dolphin sometimes break the surface offshore. Troops of long-tailed macaques romp about the woods, and red jungle fowl, the ancestor of the domestic chicken, browse the forest floor.







due to the elimination of predators that used to keep their numbers in check. The tapir population has died out, but in 1997 rumors of a tiger swept the island.

Most incredibly, a herd of elephants swam over from Johore in 1990, but found the island too small for their liking and paddled back to the mainland.

Naturally, there are few sign-posts here. With a bit of trial and error, you'll probably end up at the old quarry from which Ubin, which means granite, draws its name. There you'll find a huge excavation partly filled with water that's ideal for a dip.

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


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A seafood joint on the north shore, imaginatively called the "Ubin Restaurant", is usually cited as the best on the island, though the competition is not exactly stiff. ic Dunlop is part of a small group of daring black-and-white photographers I think of as "The Sons of Phil".

Phil Blenkinsop, that is, the Australian photographer who came to Bangkok a decade before them, specializing in gritty and grisly scenes in Cambodia and Burma. Before Blenkinsop, Philip Jones Griffith of the Vietnam war era pioneered the style.

Dunlop's particular obsession was Comrade Duch, the commandant of the infamous Khmer Rouge torture center of S-21 at the Tuol Sleng secondary school in Phnom Penh, where 40,000 victims were savagely tortured before being led to the "killing fields".

"I first became aware of Cambodia from a National Geographic article in the early 1980s," Dunlop writes in his latest book, *The Lost Executioner: A Story of the Khmer Rouge* (Bloomsbury Publishing, London, 2005, 279pp).

"Along with the photographs from ancient temples in the jungle were images of mass graves that had just been exhumed. What struck me was how fertile and vibrant the countryside looked. Amid this emerald landscape clothes and skulls were mixed in the chocolate earth, as though the countryside had melted in the midday sun to reveal a terrible secret."

He watched the movie *The Killing Fields* 15 times in London and began doing serious research. Armed with a Leica, 19-

year-old Nic Dunlop took off for Cambodia in 1989 on a personal mission: to track down Duch, who had disappeared when Phnom Penh fell to the Vietnamese in

"For me, Cambodia had become shorthand for all that was wrong with the world," he writes. "I wanted to understand how a movement that laid claim to a vision of a better world could instead turn people into instruments of overwhelming evil, producing a revolution of unparalleled ferocity ... And I wanted to know what it was that had turned a seemingly ordinary man from one of the poorer parts of Cambodia into one of the worst mass murderers of the twentieth century."

Armed with a photo of Duch, Dunlop scoured the countryside in his search. He interviewed Duch's mother and sisters, his teaching colleagues, his students, the guards and a handful of survivors of S-21.

What emerged was a complex portrait of a gentle child, brilliant student, idealistic teacher, hardened cadre, sadistic torturer. The mystery remained: how did Duch turn into a monster?

By 1999, Dunlop was growing discouraged. Cambodia was

old news. Editors in London turned his photos down. Then one day, after hitching a ride with a mine-clearance team into the former Khmer Rouge district of Samlaut in Cambodia's northeast, he simply came face to face with Duch outside the district office.

"A short, wiry man appeared wearing a white T-shirt emblazoned with the initials ARC (American Refugee Committee). Shaking my hand he politely introduced himself in perfect English as Hang Pin," Dunlop writes.


"He told me that he had been a schoolteacher specializing in mathematics and that he had originally come from Phnom Penh and had recently worked in a refugee camp on the Thai border. He had worked with American aid organizations since 1997 ... Large ears, bad teeth, cropped hair – he had aged a little, but the likeness to the photograph tucked in my back pocket was unmistakable. Hang Pin was Comrade Duch."

Dunlop flew to Bangkok, developed his film of Duch, alerted the *Far Eastern Economic Review*, and returned to Duch's village with Nate Thayer, ace reporter who found Pol Pot three years previously. Confronted by Thayer, Duch confessed.

"It is God's will that you are here," he said. "I have done very bad things before in my life ... The first half of my life I'll remember for ever. Now my future is in God's hands."

He had been converted to Christianity in 1995 and baptized in Battambang by a Cambodian-American pastor. Now he said, "Then I thought that God was very bad, that only bad men prayed to God. My unique fault was that I didn't serve God, I served men. I served communism."

Duch eventually surrendered and has been awaiting trial in a Phnom Penh prison for the past five years. Dunlop never saw him again.

Dear Momma Duck,

The other day I was talking with some Thai friends of mine about getting older and still being single, and the phrase *kheun khahn* popped up. It was explained to me that it was used to describe a single woman who was "left over".

I'm still not sure if my friends simply meant a spinster, which in English might have negative connotations for some people, but there is nothing inherently negative in the phrase's meaning of "a single woman".

Indeed, in my native Australia we have "Bachelor and Spinster balls" – better known as B&S balls – where young single people show they are proud to be single and have a hell of a good time while they're at it.

Singularly unique among the leftovers

Can you please explain to me what *kheun khahn* really means? Is it slang? Can it be used for men as well as women? If it does simply mean "a spinster", then why the negative connotation?

Dear Curious,

The phrase *kheun khahn* or to make it more modern *kheun khahn thorng* is a word that would hurt the feelings of women from any generation. It means a single, older woman who has not found a suitor.

According to Kunvijitmatra, an expert on the Thai language, the word derives from the process of moving a boat into a dry dock for repairs. In cases such as this the boat is unusable.

Apart from *kheun khahn*, the phrase *sao kae* is also used to refer to older single woman. It is strange that both Thai and Western cultures regard older unmarried women in a negative light while older unmarried men seem to be regarded positively. Isn't this chauvinistic?

Nowadays women with a good education are looking for an equal partner. If they can find a suitable person, then of course they will take their chance. Many women may think it is necessary to get married, others, though, are

happy to lead a single life. Women can now have a leading role in the family, they can be both selfsupporting and also take care of the children.

The first edition of *Bang-kok Sunday* newspaper in 2000 featured a survey of the feelings and attitudes of single women in "preparing to live a single life". Of the 285 respondents, 178 said they preferred to be single and many of them felt they did not suffer any stigma from society in general. One in three single women, however, were not happy with remarks made by the others

Those remarks can, often unintentionally, reveal the speaker's true thoughts about single women.

They imply that female singletons tend to have unstable moods or are unable to find any-

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one to support them. Those who have been living independently long enough will find that freedom really exists.

Also, in our culture, there are many ways to help prevent single people from feeling lonely in their old age.

They can, for example, seek shelter in *dhamma* and meditation among those who share the same feelings. This is the best way for all of us.

I don't think the B & S balls would be successful in Thailand because of our culture and way of thinking.

There would be few single women who would dare to attend the balls; it would be too much for them to show their faces and be labeled as single.

A blind date or advertisement in the newspaper or on the Internet would be more acceptable.

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Falling through the cracks

One thing people experienced in the media recognize well is the cyclical nature of events that qualify as "news". To be sure, there are one-off events such as natural disasters, brutal murders, particularly brazen corruption scandals or freak accidents that catch the media's attention and grab headlines.

These, however, tend to be superimposed upon other cycles that are more time-dependent, such as the Olympic Games or World Cup that come around every four years, annual budget deliberations [at least in counties with functioning governments], five-year economic plans, school holiday breaks and seasonal occurrences, such a flooding and drought.

Then there are the government-led crackdowns that more closely follow the time demands of political expediency; these focus more on the type of intractable social vices that help politicians and bureaucrats appear active and in control. Such vices include drunkdriving, teenage violence, drug abuse, land encroachment issues and threats to the national well-being posed by resident foreigners, whether they be Burmese fisherman, European property developers or dive instructors.

There are also, however, smaller issues that affect just about everyone on a day-to-day basis, but which seldom, if ever, generate enough "sex appeal" to make it into the news.

One such issue confronting Phuket is the deplorable state of our public sidewalks, where they exist, and the lack of functioning traffic lights and pedestrian overpasses.

In some countries, lack of facilities for the disabled is deemed newsworthy. Not so in Phuket, where even the most able-bodied will find trying to walk any great distance along a public road a source of stress and a safety challenge that only a "Free Runner" would voluntarily take on.

Pedestrians here are forced to maneuver along public pavements that more closely resemble obstacle courses, strewn as they are with everything from parked and moving motorbikes to vendors' stalls replete with vats of boiling oil.

The entire island suffers in this regard, but one good example can be found near the *Gazette* offices. The entire length of Yaowarat Rd, all the way from where it starts downtown to where it turns and heads left towards Tesco-Lotus in Samkong, has but one functioning pedestrian light – and not a single pedestrian overpass.

It is high time the local authorities cracked down on those who encroach on public walkways, and also provide means for pedestrians to get across streets with heavy traffic without having to resort to the "go halfway and pray" strategy.

Continuing fallout from Aftermath

The *Phuket Gazette* berates the makers of the television mini-series *The Aftermath* [Editorial, issue of June 24] for "a form of patronization bordering on racism in the way that Western extras have been paid far more than their Thai counterparts."

Is that fair comment or an unreasonable criticism bordering on hypocrisy?

It's standard practice in Thailand for Westerners to be paid more for performing similar tasks to Thais. In many cases, the law even ordains that foreigners must be paid more by setting higher rates, even nominating different rates for specific nationalities.

Perhaps, when reporting on, say, a pleasant experience at a spa, the *Gazette* pays its Thai reporters similar rates to its foreign reporters. After all, they are performing similar tasks. However, that would be very unusual.

Most companies in Thailand employing foreigners pay them much more than the Thais. If there is "a form of patronization bordering on racism" being practiced through pay rates, it's widely entrenched and it has the support of all those foreigners who accept higher rates as well as the companies and the government.

Singling out the BBC-HBO production for trenchant criticism is hardly just, given that they are probably obliged to offer more to attract foreign extras.

To lift the pay rate of the Thai extras to match that of the foreigners would be something no profit-driven organization operating in such an market place would attempt.

"Patronization bordering on racism"? If so, there's a lot of it about. And I wonder what the pay rates were for the extras who got to play the Burmese laborers.

Teachers must relate to their pupils to prevent violence

don't know the reasons behind the recent serious violence between girl students that has made headlines. I was not there, but I believe the violence could have been pre-

Even though I am now 60 years old, I still have to adapt to new things and to the behavior of new generations, even learning how they talk. Not all societal change is bad. We older people should change, too.

I have no children so, during my time as a teacher, I have always thought of my students as my children, whom I must love, care for and be responsible for. I give 100% of my heart to the students and I want to see them all become good people.

I was a teacher for more than 30 years before being appointed Director, in charge of managing the Vocational College. From this experience, I know that every teacher must have an understanding of teenage psychology if violence of this nature is to be prevented.

These days, many teachers graduate from university and go straight into teaching without being trained to be teachers first. They have no experience in handling student psychology.

Teenage students want to know everything, see everything and try everything, so it is important to organize activities to keep

We give them a lot of work to do in college so that they do not have much free time. Teenagers are full of energy and if they have too much time on their hands, they may do something that will get out of control.

We have the program of internships at companies, which allows them to use what they are studying and also gives them a taste of real life.

It's good for them to be in a

rightening movies of girl students, in school uniform, beating other girls and captured on mobile videophones, have been in the news recently. The beatings were not isolated incidents – two were recorded at different schools within a couple of weeks. In addition, a schoolgirl in Chiang Mai died recently after her head was smashed repeatedly against the floor at her school.

Somjit Sutthangkul, Director of the Phuket Vocational College, where 90% of the students are girls, argues that it is possible to prevent such incidents. Indeed, she believes, it is one of the gravest responsibilities of teachers to do so.

Here she explains how she has managed to prevent this happening in her college, and suggests remedies for schools that have already experienced such violence.

working environment because they will learn that working life is serious and requires discipline.

We have about 3,000 students at the college and 90% of them are girls between 15 and 18 years old. As we have only 56 teachers, this is a very heavy responsibility for them. Even so, I emphasize that teachers must get close to every single one of their

There are a number of points that teachers should know and understand.

- Girls enjoy talking without thinking. If they blurt out something that's not good, problems may result. So we steer them toward positive subjects by having them stand in front of the class or on the stage and talk about topics we choose, such as "How to be a leader".
 - When teenagers fight and

others are egging them on, they want to show off and so they do it more, so that people will know they are tough.

- Sometime teachers are afraid of aggressive students and don't want to get involved. This is a big problem. Teachers must resolve problems, and quickly. They must find out the real reasons behind conflicts between students.
- Never force teenagers to do anything. Talk with them so that they understand better why they should or should not do something.
- Never criticize students in public. Do it one-on-one.
- The class teacher who is responsible for a class of students – must get to know each of the students in that class individually, and be like a parent. They must know the students'

their family life.

• Know who the "risk" students are – the ones most likely to cause problems. Organize more activities for them to try to soften their behavior. With this group it is even more important to be a "mother"; a good mother can change a child's behavior.

I keep a list of the students in the risk group, with their pictures, and often have them visit my office for a general chat, or to teach them about life by using parables

- Educate the risk group in the potential dangers of their behavior. For example, I arrange for them to visit Aids patients so that they learn the truth. This costs money, but we need to invest to improve students' lives.
- Because I am close to them, the students will tell me their

problems and what they are worried about, and I can listen and help them solve these problems. I make an absolute guarantee that discussions such as this are strictly confidential and will never reach other ears. I don't even tell my husband about them.

- I tell students that it is alright to make mistakes – just don't make the same mistake twice.
- Do not stay aloof; I say "hello" to them, or touch their arm. If they wave to me, I wave back.
- Do not be confrontational. If I see a student wearing earrings in college, which is against the rules, I will ask her, "How old are you?" and then keep quiet until she asks, "Why?" Then I'll say something like, "I was just remembering when I was your age, and whether we

> It is tiring to keep an eye out all the time for details like this, but it is important, in order to stop bigger problems from developing.

• To prevent fighting, ensure that students from different courses frequently mix and work together. I have adapted our system so that students from the Commercial Faculty and the Catering Faculty, say, work together and do not end up feeling antagonistic toward each other.

If other school or colleges that have problems with students fighting, they can change their management style in line with the suggestions I have made. I think it could stop the fighting – and this applies not only to girls' schools but to boys' schools as well.

Yes, there must be regulations and a code of conduct as apply in every other industry. Pragmatism and a modern approach are called for. Open dialog, where people can freely give their opinions without fear of retaliation, is fundamental.

These meetings may include discussions about the work-permit situation. They may also generate more income tax for the government and protect guests in case of any unpleasant situation they may

Everybody [in the dive industry] must, of course, pay taxes and obey the law. The government must help the industry to bring jobs and income to the region and also to stay competitive with the rest of the world as one of the top dive destinations in Asia. It is very unfair to punish the industry collectively because there may be some black sheep.

The authorities should find those who are not following the law but at the same time respect and protect the legal operations. This would clearly benefit Phuket with the promotion, protection and preservation of one of the most beautiful environments on earth.

umans have, for the most part, taken themselves out of the "natural" world. We often overemphasize technological advances at the expense of the environment.

Rapid exploitation of finite natural resources and uncontrolled waste are acceptable in many businesses as the only way to grow.

The price that must be paid for this way of thinking is starting to become plain. Modern hightech lifestyles are competitive instead of cooperative.

One effect of this competition is the human-created deserts in place of once lush forests. We have polluted virtually every corner of the planet. Instead of taking just what the environment can replenish, we tend to take it all.

Most scientific concepts involve breaking down living organisms into parts, labeling those parts, and treating those parts as something somehow separate from the whole organism.

Most people believe, as a result, that the universe comprises boundless building materials from which technological progress can flourish.

But there is a different way of thinking about our universe, a way that is probably more accurate: the Systems Theory, first put forward in the 1950s.

According to the Systems Theory, the basic principle underlying life is processes, not components.

EVERYTHING is connected to everything

In a process, one thing depends on another. If one step in the process doesn't occur, then the subsequent steps cannot occur. The system comes to a halt.

In the Systems Theory approach to nature, the world and tures the weak or old fish. This

its inhabitants are seen to be interdependent. Everything relies on everything else for survival and prosperity. In contrast to many human in-

stitutions, the functioning of ecosystems is to establish cooperative relationships. The relationships promote the harmonious integration of systems.

In a natural setting, the competitive struggle for existence might at first glance appear to be mere brutality – one animal eats another animal.

However, the overall scheme is one of cooperation. Some species of fish, for example, swim in massive schools. This is perhaps a part of the "acceptance" by this species that some fish are sacrificed for the good of the whole species.

The predator usually cap-

may not be of comfort to the individual fish that gets eaten, but if you follow evolutionary theory, it is good for the species as whole, be-

cause it strengthens the species' genetics: the stronger fish will survive and they will produce stronger offspring. This is one of the main themes of evolution.

The Systems Theory is also seen in mangrove forests. Everything depends on everything else for both survival and prosperity.

For example, immature shrimp rely on the decomposing leaves for food. If there is an abundance of leaves, the shrimp



flourish. If there is a shortage of leaves, the shrimp population decreases.

If the shrimp population decreases, it is likely that the other animals that rely on the shrimp for food, such as kingfishers and many species of fish, will also decrease in numbers.

Another example among the mangroves is the relationship between the mud and its many dependents.

The mud is made up of decomposing leaves and bark, as well as other sediment washed into the mangroves by the tides.

The mud is food for bacteria and plankton. The bacteria and plankton are food for immature crabs. The immature crabs are food for small fish. Small fish are food for bigger fish. Humans are at the top of this food chain. They eat the bigger fish.

If there is no mud in the mangrove forest, many species suffer the loss, including crabs, fish and humans.

In sum, everything in the world, no matter what it is, depends on something else for its existence.

If you understand and accept the Systems Theory, you see the need for a balanced ecological view of the world and the need for changes in the way we interact with each other and with the world around us.

It makes plain the need for a general shift in technology toward a more friendly use of the Earth's limited supply of natural resources.



itTorrent, the latest method of downloading movies and music online, is an amazingly simple and innovative method for peer-to-peer file-sharing downloads.

For those of you who have not come across the term "peerto-peer", it's a way to use the Internet to connect directly with another computer that is using a browser in order to share files with other computers on the Internet.

This is different from the more conventional client-toserver network, whereby you (the client) can download files from a single central computer (the server). This is how webhosting in a standard office network works.

The limitation is that the client-to-server architecture on the Internet requires a very powerful server and enormous bandwidth to feed information to hundreds of thousands of clients across the Web. With peer-topeer, however, every client computer is effectively a server unto itself.

What does this have to do with BitTorrent? Imagine this: the full collection of all the seasons of the X-Files or Star Trek or perhaps every song performed by U2 or the top 10 music videos of last month, all available for you to download.

All of this amounts to gigabytes of data, but you simply log onto the BitTorrent network and. voilà! You're connected to hundreds of thousands of other computers just like yours that are sharing these files in a peer-topeer network.

The amazing part is that the huge files are broken down by the software into tens of thousands of little "packets" and you connect to hundreds of thousands of

The end of the peer show? Not at all

Using peer-to-peer technology to download music, games and movies free is illegal. But the fact is that no one has yet been successful in stopping this use or misuse – of technology.

peer computers and download one packet from each file on each

As you download each packet onto your hard disk, it immediately becomes available to users of all other peer computers for them to download from you. All the bits are then re-assembled by the BitTorrent software so, at the end of the process, you have a full DVD collection of any movie, music video or songs you want.

Just for fun, I did a search for TV game shows and got 450,000 matches. Some of them are in Russian or Chinese, but some of the ones I saw date all the way back to my childhood and that was many years ago.

So, is it very cool? Yes. Is it easy? Sure. Is it legal? That de-

In fact, BitTorrent technology itself and peer-to-peer file sharing are both totally legal. It's when they are used to share copyrighted material that they become illegal. Chances are that a torrent pointing to, say, a copy of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs is not there with Disney's permission.

It might not even be *Snow* White - or even a video. It could be some kind of nasty Trojan horse virus.

What? You thought there was some code of honor among illegal file traders?

Some allege that these viruses are actually seeded by entities, such as the Motion Picture Association of America, looking to curb illegal downloads or catch the downloaders. I think that's probably a touch paranoid, but I do know that viral payloads do pop up from time to time.

Illegal it may be, but the fact is that no one has yet been successful in stopping this use - or misuse - of technology. Its popularity is growing so fast that Hollywood has found itself having to jump on the bandwagon.

Warner Brothers (WB) has just invested millions of dollars in BitTorrent technology. Its belief is, apparently, that if you can't beat 'em you should at least try to get them to the negotiating table.

WB is banking on the idea that honest people would gladly pay a small fee to the production company for a legal, clean version of the file. Everyone is hoping that other companies will soon



Phuket rubber planters benefit from rising oil prices

oaring prices have been boosting Thailand's rubber industry over the past few years, and they have rocketed as fuel prices have risen.

Thai rubber planters have benefited from three factors: the rise in fuel prices, rising demand for both natural and synthetic rubber, and natural disasters that hit output in Thailand's main rival in the rubber trade, Indonesia.

In Phuket, which produces about 20,000 tonnes of rubber sheets every year, the situation is no different. Chaiwat Ruengthaweesup, Director of the Rubber Foundation in Phuket, said, "The price of rubber is now 101 baht per kilogram for Grade C smoked rubber. This is higher than last year. In fact prices have been rising since 1998-1999."

He added, however, "I think we are now reaching the peak; the price is hovering around 90 to 100 baht. I don't think it will go above 110."

At 100 baht a kilo, Phuket's rubber production makes a contribution to the province's economy of about 2 billion baht a year.

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The biggest factor driving the increase in prices is the rise in oil prices, K. Chaiwat said. "Without this, the change in the cost of rubber would not be nearly so dramatic. Oil is used in the production of synthetic rubber, which now meets 70% of market demand, so any change in oil prices will have a knock-on effect on rubber prices, both synthetic and natural.

"Another factor is natural disasters in Indonesia. These have decreased rubber production there. The ongoing insurgency in the three southernmost provinces of Thailand, Yala, Pattani and Narathiwat, has also led to a fall in production in Thailand. Prices are also being influenced by the continuing strong demand coming from China," he added. The rising wealth of mainland Chinese has fueled a boom in car sales over the past decade and, with it, a boom in sales of tires

K. Chaiwat said, however, that there is a danger that the price rises may eventually have a negative impact on rubber producers. "I think the high rubber prices are good for plantation workers as it means they can increase their incomes," he explained.

"If prices remain high, however, it may hurt our competitiveness in the export market." He noted that Thailand's most important markets for rubber are the US, Japan and China. "The main competitor in these markets is Indonesia; Malaysia is less of a threat now.

"Rubber prices do vary from country to country, but not by a huge amount. In my opinion, only around 50% to 60% of Thai rubber is of optimum quality.

"Although rubber prices are increasing, the quality remains the same."

Though the soaring prices

may be good news for the planters, they are not so welcome for domestic industries reliant on natural rubber for their output.

Locally, the biggest user of natural rubber is Great Glove (Thailand) Co Ltd in Baan Manik. Wanna Chidcheaw, Manager of the glove factory, told the *Gazette* that the company's head office in Malaysia dictates production levels.

"The rubber price increases ... have led to a decline in the quantity of products that the head

office orders us to produce," she

However, she added, "We are the only exporters in the market here so we are not concerned about competition in Thailand, although we do have to compete with Great Glove factories in other countries."

No staff have been laid off, she said, and no base salaries have been cut, although some workers have been moved, at the same salary, to shifts that in normal times would pay a higher rate.

Best Western to run Phuket resort

AO POR (*Nation, Gazette*): Best Western International (BWI) is to manage the new Supalai Resort and Spa, currently under construction at a cost of around 33 million baht on a site looking out at Phang Nga Bay.

This will make BWI the first international hotel chain to become involved in a hotel on the east coast.

The three-year management contract with the resort's owners, the Supalai Group, takes immediate effect. BWI is the world's largest hotel chain, with more than 4,200 properties in 80 countries.

"This is going to be our first management agreement in Phuket," said Glenn de Souza, BWI's Vice-President of International Operations (Asia).

It is not BWI's first foray into Phuket, however. In September 2003 marketing agreements were signed with two locallyowned properties, one in Karon and one in Bang Tao.

Both properties were rebranded, one as the Best Western Phuket Ocean and the other as the Best Western Premier Bangtao, giving them access to BWI's massive marketing network.

Management, however, remained in the same hands, although BWI demands a minimum set of standards be met.

The Supalai resort is expected to have an occupancy rate of more than 70% in its first year and will focus on international tourists.

The four-star resort is set on 12 rai of land and, when complete, will have 164 guest rooms, eight spa chalets and meeting and banqueting facilities for 300 people.

Prateep Tangmatitham, Chairman and President of the Supalai Group, said the property's location offers a marketing advantage, as it is close to the airport and Phang Nga Bay, while Phuket's west coast side faces an over-development of hotels and resorts.



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recent story in *The Nation* newspaper began, "The Federation of Thai Capital Market Organizations is to propose a series of short- and long-term capital market stimulation measures to the caretaker government in the hope of being able to turn the bearish stock market into a bull run."

The Thai stock market has recently seen 1 trillion baht wiped off its capitalization as foreigners, mainly financial institutions, sold their holdings. The Federation suggested that a state contingency fund be established, to be used to intervene in the market to hold prices up.

I appreciate the Federation's position, especially with a "caretaker government" in place that cannot change legislation.

However, despite the recent sell-off in stock markets, which has had its severest impact in emerging markets, including Thailand, this is a time to review the situation calmly.

The introduction of some form of contingency fund sends all the wrong messages. Stock markets all have their periods of rising prices and periods when prices fall. That is their nature. Participants, especially institutional investors, are very aware of this and live with the situation.

What they never want to see, though, is official intervention in the market; a free market should remain free, regardless of how well-intentioned proposed intervention may be.

Naturally, with the present negative sentiment toward emerging markets and a political vacuum in Bangkok, there are two major negative factors in play. Investors in general detest uncertainty and that is what they face in Thailand. Naturally, they sell.

Thailand has one big advantage; with a price/earnings ratio of around 9, the market is cheap compared with most others. That will eventually attract investors.

The idea of contingency funds to prop up an ailing stock market is not new. Hong Kong tried it in 1998, when it faced continuing fallout from the 1997 Asian financial crisis and uncertainty after the handover from British rule to China, also in 1997.

The Hong Kong government's intervention, using taxpayers' money totaling around 80 billion baht, was met with screams of protest. One institutional man-

ager said that his institution had been considering investing in Hong Kong because prices had become attractive but dropped that plan when the government entered the market.

An even worse ploy to protect the market was de-

vised by Malaysia in 1997; it decided to bar foreigners from taking their money out of the country if they sold shares. One French bank portfolio manager

said his bank would consider fresh investment in Malaysia "some time after Bangladesh became a major investment theme". In other words, "Not in our lifetime".

Improvements that should be considered by Thailand – and which would be met enthusiastically – are tighter corporate governance and greater attention to stamping out insider trading. In stock markets the only people who do not benefit from a level playing field with clear and transparent rules are the "bad guys".

I have written about "carry trades" in this column before, and these are of particular relevance at present. Carry trades are, essentially, a simple concept. Financial institutions, usually on behalf of a fund or in a "proprietary



trading" role, borrow money in one country where interest rates are low and invest it in other countries where anticipated returns from cash, bonds or equities will be greater than the interest that has to be paid on the loans.

When interest rates start to rise in the country where the money was borrowed, or when markets in which investment has been made are expected to fall, the carry trade is "unwound": the investments are sold and the debt repaid.

This scenario looks like being sparked by Japan, up to now a major source of carry trade borrowing. There, interest rates are likely to rise, especially if Bank of Japan Governor Toshihiko Fukui's recommendations are accepted. That will cause carry trades to unwind.

Carry trades may also unwind when interest rates in a major market rise, making investment in that market attractive. The recent rise in US interest rates has increased the attraction of holding cash assets in US dol-

lars as long as rates remain on an upward trajectory.

Thailand needs new foreign investment; recent political uncertainty has caused more than half of all foreign investment

projects to be postponed. There are two main types of foreign investment: investment in financial markets and foreign direct investment (FDI), whereby funds are invested in long-term businesses, factories and so on.

Thailand has concentrated for too long on attracting large-scale FDI by foreign corporations. Certainly, it makes the headlines when XYZ Inc invests in a factory in Thailand and announces it will create 5,000 now jobs. This is good for the economy; often, the employment this new investment eventually cre-

ates indirectly may be double or even triple the total number of directly created ©jobs.

But in the "real" world it is not giant corporations that create the most jobs, it is small businesses. A good example is the US, where 70% of people are employed by firms with fewer than 100 workers.

Sadly, Thailand seems to have gone out of its way to make life difficult for individual foreign entrepreneurs and small investors. Companies must have 51% Thai ownership and at least seven shareholders, a major barrier. Foreign entrepreneurs may not even own land for their own home in Thailand; some welcome mat.

Everybody who has been here for more than 10 minutes knows how the real system works: if in doubt, consult your Thai lawyer or accountant. That's not encouraging; convoluted methods should not be necessary to achieve simple business aims.


The diving industry comes under constant attack from a variety of government departments, most recently accusing dive operators of tax evasion.

Nobody in the halls of power seems willing to accept that the diving industry, driven to a large extent by small-scale foreign investors, brings in plenty of tourist dollars. That is only one example. Xenophobia rules, OK?

Even Mahathir Mohamed – then the Prime Minister of Malaysia and a man with a reputation for being suspicious of foreign intentions – decided six years ago that foreigners could buy up to two properties each, including land.

How much have investment regulations, company laws and other impediments cost Thailand? No one will ever be able to quantify the loss, but it must be many billions of baht. I love Thailand and want to see it progress. It is a pity more politicians and bureaucrats don't share my opinion.

ith speeds of up to 80 kilometers an hour and gravity-defying leaps into the air, kiteboarding is just the thing to liven up a windy day on the island.

Those wanting to get the adrenaline pumping and know how it feels to fly above the waves can learn this new and rapidly developing sport here in Phuket.

Kiteboarding, or kitesurfing as it is sometimes known, doesn't have to be all rushes and adrenaline though; those of a more sedate nature can enjoy being gently pulled along by the breeze.

The vibrantly colored kites sailing above the beach are also a sight to inspire; the increasing popularity of kiteboarding images in advertising is testament to this. "Painting the sky with colors" is how Israeli Eran Forsleger, one of the owners of Thailand-based Kiteboarding Asia, describes the scene.

"Kiteboarding combines all kinds of watersports into one unique sport. You can surf, wakeboard, jump or just skim along the water. You can get large amounts of 'hang time' in the air – the record is 14 seconds.

"It really feels like you're flying. All this without an engine, heavy equipment, pollution or noise. Sometimes I go far out on my own; all you can hear is the swish of the board in the water. It's incredible.

"When the wind gets stronger and you start jumping and doing tricks, the adrenaline starts pumping. It can be a very calm sport but if want to go extreme then you can do that as well.

People of any age can learn to kiteboard, he says. "The youngest student we've had was six years old and the women's world champion is only 13. At first, the athletes in the competitions were mainly in their 30s. Now it's getting younger.



GO FLY A KITE

"Kiteboarding is not hard, you don't need to be strong to do it, and there is equipment to suit all people. You don't need experience in other watersports – kiteboarding is about flying a kite; that's the most important skill.

"Once you have mastered this you can do other forms of kiteboarding too: using threewheeled buggies on the beach; modified skateboards; rollerblades; skies and snowboards," Fran said

He explained that he first became interested in kiteboarding while on a three-month trip to Asia. "I was sitting on the beach on Koh Samui, a bit bored with nothing to do. Suddenly I saw a guy with some kind of parachute. He would launch it and then jump on a small board and ride along. It looked interesting.

"Then I saw him jump into

the air. I was instantly hooked. I ran over and asked him about what he was doing and to let me have a go.

"At that time I didn't even know it was called kiteboarding but I really wanted to give it a proper try. I did some research and found a shop in Hong Kong that sold equipment and then I started learning by myself.

"At that time, around five years ago, the sport was still not too developed. I had to learn the hard way. I loved it and I loved being in Thailand, so I told my business partner in the States to help me sell my apartment, my car and all my stuff, and since then I have been here kiteboarding in Thailand."

Kiteboarding has its own organization, the International Kiteboarding Organization (IKO), which certifies students and sets standards for instructors.

For students there are three levels of achievement. After the three-day introductory course offered by Kiteboarding Asia most students are able to com-

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plete levels 1 and 2: they can ride the board and they can relaunch the kite after it comes down in the water.

Level 3 develops the basic skills and introduces more technical aspects, such as jumping and going upwind. Some countries will not allow people to kiteboard if they do not have an IKO qualification.

Once the basic skills have been learned, budding kiteboarders can rent or buy their own gear and head out by themselves. Here in Thailand a full set comprising kite, board and harness starts at around US\$1,000 (40,000 baht) for new equipment or around half that for secondhand.

"Thailand is an excellent place to start kiteboarding. Much of the equipment is made here, so it is the cheapest place in the world to buy it. The cost of living is cheap and the wind here is not too strong, so it is not intimidating for beginners.

"Kite technology has improved greatly. In the beginning the kite was very unstable and very hard to relaunch from the water. Now there are kites that can be flown in only five knots of breeze, which is very little wind. As a result, kiteboarding is now much easier to teach and to learn – and more enjoyable.

Above, peole of any age can learn kiteboarding, says Eran Forsleger. And if it all gets kinda boring, you can always try doing it upside-down.

"People who are just getting into the sport can be having fun in a really short space of time. After a three-day course most people are able to ride the board. Because of the equipment and the experience of the instructor the progress curve is very steep," Eran explained.

Kiteboarding Asia has centers on Koh Samui, in Phuket and in Hua Hin, and next year will be opening a new center in Chumphon.

"Most of our customers find us through our website and come to Thailand just to kiteboard. For the first three years there were very few Thai people wanting to learn, but now more and more Thais are getting into it.

"The problems we faced in marketing the sport to Thais is that a lot of them cannot swim well and many do not want to be in the sun and get dark skin. But we now have two Thai instructors in Phuket. They are the first Thai instructors qualified by the IKO

"We have other instructors from all over the world – many professionals want to spend a season or two in Thailand," he said.

The Kiteboarding Asia Phuket center is next to the Nai Yang Beach resort.

Courses start at 4,000 baht for the one-day Kiteboarding Discovery course. The recommended three-day complete beginner course is 11,000 baht.

Private one-on-one tuition is also available. The center has all the necessary equipment for sale or rent.

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

STONE AGE

otorists daring to take a sideways glance while driving along the bypass road may have noticed the collection of sandstone sculptures, motifs and bas-reliefs set up by the roadside opposite the Big C supercenter.

The shop is called Phuket Sand Stone and offers a range of carvings varying in style from modern to traditional, Thai to Balinese to Cambodian.

Among the mosaics and sculptures are some depicting scenes from classic Thai literature, such as the 30,000-line epic poem *Phra Aphai Manee*, which the revered poet Sunthorn Phu

took more than two decades to write some 200 years ago.

Most of the pieces at Phuket Sand Stone were made in Buri Ram Province, home of the Cambodian style of carvings that can be seen at historic Phanom Rung castle, and a province where skilled masons today still create bas-reliefs in rock.

Shopowner John Sature, the son of an English father and a Phuket-born mother, shares his love of sandstone with his wife, K. Wanpen, who is originally from Buri Ram. John retired from working as an engineer and his wife gave up working as a nurse to open the store last December.

The cheapest item on site,


at 50 baht, is a colorful starfish, while the most expensive item, at 120,000 baht, is a depiction of a herd of elephants.

Gardening with Bloomin' Bert

hy do some people believe they can predict the future? I'm not talking about weathermen with bad suits and large mustaches who spend their days looking at satellite photos and measurements of wind speeds in Outer Mongolia – at least they have a chance of getting it right.


Even the dreaded marketing consultant – dreaded by anyone working in sales – has the right intentions, basing his predictions on past sales and trends, and attempting to provide "a direction for the way forward" for the unfortunate individuals on the receiving end of his bountiful knowledge. He may be a complete prat, but at least he's basing his theories on facts.

YAK FUR

It's the less scientific side of predicting the future that I don't quite understand.

Ladies, usually in comfortable shoes and hand-kitted shawls made from yak fur, and who probably smell a bit because they use biodegradable soap, are convinced they can predict someone's future by emptying grubby tea leaves out of the victim's cup, or even by doing weird things with a pack of cards with rather depressing pictures.

Astrology is probably one of the most amusing forms of fortune telling. All you need to do is explain that the stars incline but do not compel, and then invent a few lines about how the conjunction of a rising moon in the third house and a setting sun in the fifth is an indication that the customer



has a bright future ahead of her, and that her personality is a

healthy balance between head and heart, mind and spirit, intellect and intuition. Any believer will nod in agreement.

All complete nonsense, of course. In the interests of science, I went to an online palmreading website, which in all likelihood was about as accurate as going through the same process with some aging vegan lady called Brendella who held my hand in hers. These were some of the

a hermaphrodite park ranger; you'll have arguments, but ultimately you'll be friends.

"You will meet a person to whom you are very much attracted but with whom you have little in common. Don't get involved – you'll be sorry.

"You'll have some business dealings with a rehabilitated vegetarian, and will end up in court." As an aside, I'm not even sure that I know any rehabilitated vegetarians.

The best one was toward the end, and was about the only accurate thing they came up with: "Be careful what you wish for. It might not come true."

The only kind of palm reading you can rely on is the kind of palm reading you do every day in Phuket. There is certainly no shortage of trees of this ilk on the

island. Palm trees are everywhere – I'd be surprised if any Phuket resident didn't have at least one of them in his or her garden.

There had to be a tenuous link with palm reading at some stage, so let me start with an admission; an admission from the days before I became involved with this gardening column. I had no idea where those characteristic rings on the trunks of most palm trees came from – how did they appear?

You can buy a 'pre-grown' royal palm around three or four meters tall for less than 1,000 baht, including delivery

It wasn't until I planted my very first palm that I realized they were made by the leaves falling off. I know that sounds a bit dumb, but that's how it works. Each frond, as it grows, emerges from the trunk itself – there are rarely branches as such on palms. The base of the leaf is wrapped all the way around the trunk, and once it's reached the end of its useful life it turns brown and drops off, leaving a circular scar on the trunk.

You can even tell a bit about the tree's past life from the distance between the scars. I bought a few royal palms several years ago when I didn't have a garden to put them in, so they all had to be grown in pots.

The rings for the first few years of their lives were fairly well-spaced. The size of the gaps halved after they were potted; their roots were confined, so their growth slowed. Later, they were replanted in soil, after which the new rings were once more further apart.

In Phuket, royal palms are most commonly seen in the gardens of hotels and government buildings, and along the roadsides. Why are they so common? Because they're cheap. You can buy a "pre-grown" one around three or four meters tall for less than 1,000 baht, including delivery to your door.

The golden cane palm, or maak luang in Thai, is another common sight in Phuket. This one is perfect for gardeners such as myself who would rather sit back and drink a Heineken in the shade of it than tend to it. It needs very little work, and is happy to be left to its own devices. It's tufted, which means that it has several trunks growing from a central root system.

The golden cane also grows differently in pots. For some reason, potted versions are more yellow – sometimes to the point that you might think that they're coming down with something, as my grandmother used to say. But they are not – it's perfectly normal. Put them in the ground and their yellow tendencies fade.

Coconut palms are probably the coolest palm around. Thais know this predictable favorite as the *ma-phrao* or *maak-uun*. The only thing to bear in mind with these trees is where you put them – a fully-grown palm dropping a coconut from 20 meters up will give anyone on the receiving end more than a bit of a headache.

These things are ludicrously easy to grow – it's as easy as sticking a coconut in a hole in the ground and watering it. I've got

a couple in my front garden that were propagated by that same method about three years ago; the highest fronds are now about five meters off the ground.

I wonder what palm readers would make of the coconut palms in my front garden? I'm sure they'd be able to come up with some form of history; they might

even be able to identify my more beery seasons. I should invite some round, though I hope none them is called Brendella.

Municipal office design keeps the public in mind

he Karon Municipality is building a new office block that will also, it is hoped, be a pleasant place for the public to relax.

The building, on one rai of land next to the Kata Beach Resort, will be four stories high with underground parking.

Wanchai Saeton, Director of Karon Municipality's Public Works Division, said that the building will cost about 53 million baht.

The old single-story building, built 20 years ago, has been torn down, he said. "It had deteriorated and there was not enough space for our 50 office staff who were in very cramped conditions," K. Wanchai explained

The bottom three floors of the new building will have offices while on the top floor there will be a large meeting room.

"The building will be open for visitors to see Thai government officials at work. On the ground level there will be a large fish pond and lotus pool in the middle of the building and a visitor information center with information in English on topics such as how to be safe when swimming in the sea, along with other services from the Municipality.



"There will also be toilet facilities for public use, and all signs will be in both Thai and English

"I want people to feel that visiting Karon Municipality office is similar to visiting a department store – they should not feel nervous about coming into a government office. Around the building there will be a nice garden with water features – a place where people can sit and relax," he added.

He said that he believes people will come to the building outside government working hours because it will be an attractive area to relax in.

K. Wanchai said that demolition of the old building started on April 5 and took a month to complete. Currently, the underground parking garage is being built.

"The construction contract specifies that work will be finished on September 6 this year — which is only five months for the entire project. However, I believe that it will be finished earlier than that because we are using a pro-

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construction

fessional contractor, Orakarn Engineering Co of Bangkok, which has many workers," K. Wanchai said.

The most difficult and most expensive part of the building is the underground parking, particularly ensuring that it does not flood, he said, explaining that the Municipality wanted to keep "everything looking orderly by keeping the vehicles underground."

The car park will have space for about 44 cars and some 30 motorcycles.



Computerized graphics show how the building will look when complete.



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
