Phuket calm after coup

PHUKET: Top government and tourism industry officials in Phuket have largely adopted a wait-and-see attitude following the military coup staged in Bangkok on September 19.

Phuket International Airport Director Sq/Ldr Pornchai Eua-aree, told the *Gazette* on the morning after the coup that the situation at the airport was normal, with no reports of canceled flights.

However, a group of about 100 military personnel stationed in Krabi arrived at the airport at around 2 am on September 20 to maintain security, he said. Their presence there had not disrupted

activity or created any unease among people using the airport, he said.

"They are just there to provide security and will continue to conduct security checks, especially at the departure hall entrance. I would like to inform the public that there are no problems whatsoever flying in or out of Phuket," he said.

"I think the tourism situation in Phuket will quiet down for about a week, given that some tourists may be alarmed by the turn of events. But when travel agents explain to them that this type of thing is fairly common in Thailand and that the situation here remains peaceful, they will begin to return," he said.

Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) Vice-President Panu Maswongsa was less optimistic.

Speaking sarcastically the day after the coup, he said that it would not affect prospects for the upcoming high-season for tourism much – the terrorist bombings in Haad Yai had ruined the outlook already.

"If you were a tourist, would you still want to come to Thailand?" he asked.

Like most tourism industry experts the *Gazette* talked to, K. Panu declined to speculate further, saying that it was still too early.

"With the bombs in Haad Yai and now this coup, I am not Continued on Page 2

Popular Bang Tao business owner murdered

THALANG: Well-known local property developer Suriya "Aud" Chaowanich, 49, was shot dead in his Cherng Talay home on September 12.

K. Suriya was the Managing Director of Phutawan Residence & Spa and owner of Phuket Laguna Riding Club.

Thalang Police Superintendent Pol Col Chinnarat Ritta-kananond told the *Gazette* that the victim was shot in the house where he lived with his *mia noi* (mistress).

"We think that the victim was making tea, about 8pm, when he was shot at close range, and therefore we assume that he knew the murderer well.

"Apparently, there was no one else present at the time except his *mia noi*, who said she doesn't know anything and didn't see who was coming and going from the house. This makes our investigation very difficult," he said

"We are focusing our investigation on his land business at Layan to find out whether a business dispute could have been the motive. We have already questioned K. Suriya's *mia noi* and his [K. Suriya's] secretary. We will question his *mia noi* further to determine why she does not know who came to the house before the killing," he said.

"We collected bullet fragments at the scene. We think the weapon used was a .357. It appears that the victim was shot three times in the head, but we have to wait for the autopsy results to be sure," he added.

really sure about the tourism situation in Phuket at the moment...There might be a short-term downturn in occupancy rates, but if the situation remains non-violent then we might start to see the situation return to normal in a week to 10 days."

The man charged with maintaining security on the island, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch, said the situation in Phuket remains normal and calm.

In his view, the coup was little more than an administrative overhaul at the national level.

Phuket Provincial Police had already heightened security measures following the terrorist bombings in Haad Yai last weekend and were therefore prepared for any additional threat that might arise, he said.

His department was ready to deal with any mob action that might arise, whether they be celebrating the coup or protesting against it – but at the time of going to press there had been none.

Under the martial law imposed last night, police are authorized to break up assemblies of more than five people, he said. The press would be subject to increased censorship, he added.

"This morning I had to report to the Governor and sign my name at Phuket Provincial Hall to confirm my presence here. After all the officials reported in, the Governor took the list to the Army Region 4 Command in Krabi." he said.

Local hotel operators remain guardedly optimistic that the coup will have a limited impact on Phuket's tourism industry, provided that events do not turn violent

Bill Barnett, Managing Director of C9 Hotelworks, said that it was business as usual at his firm, which is overseeing development of several mixed-use residential and hotel projects on the island for overseas investors, including LaSalle Investment Management and Kingdom Hotel Investments out of Dubai.

"We've spoken to all our overseas clients today, and they are all staying the course. These guys are used to this – they understand the climate and see the big picture. We have a number of projects that are at critical decision-making stages and there have been no glitches so far. Some of them have even said that what is going on might be a good thing. For business it's a bit of a non-event, but it's a media feeding-frenzy."

As for the residential real estate market, he said, "Most people who are buying residential property in Phuket are Asiafriendly...I think the basic attitude is that the situation is one of short-term pain for long-term gain," Mr Barnett said.

"The only question people raise, and rightly so, is that if there is a change in government, what will the new government's policy be towards foreign investment? Is it going to be pro-business or not? But it's still early," he added

Police seize assault rifle

TAH CHAT CHAI: Police conducting a routine vehicle inspection at the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint on September 17 arrested a man for having an automatic rifle, ammunition and five *ya bah* (methamphetamine) tablets.

Police identified the driver as 38-year-old Chatchay Nilata, from Trang Province. He was alone when he was stopped, at about 8 am, after crossing onto the island over the Tao Thepkrasattri Bridge.

Police said the suspect acted suspiciously at the check-

point, where round-the-clock security checks have been in effect since the September 16 terrorist bombings in Haad Yai.

His vehicle, an extendedcab pickup with Trang license plates, was impounded as evidence after police found a Heckler & Koch assault rifle and 133 bullets on the rear seat.

They also found 10.45-caliber bullets, five *ya bah* pills and legal documents relating to a land dispute between the suspect and the president of the Trang Provincial Administration Organization. The suspect was taken into custody.



Police boost island security

PHUKET: Following the terrorist bombings that rocked central Haad Yai on September 16, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Butnampetch urged for public support in keeping the island free of acts of terrorism that could threaten the island's tourism industry.

Gen Decha called for the support at a seminar at Patong Hospital on September 18.

The meeting followed the six bombings in Haad Yai on the night of September 16. The blasts, which signify a significant escalation of the on-going violence in the Deep South, are expected to have a major negative impact on tourism to that city, the most popular destination among Malaysian tourists after Singapore. Malaysia is Thailand's single largest source of foreign tourists.

Gen Decha noted that the Haad Yai blasts had cleared that city of tourists practically overnight. It would take a minimum of at least six months before the situation there would begin to return to normal, he said.

In order to prevent Phuket from suffering a similar fate, he called on the public to keep a sharp eye out and report to police any suspicious activities or occurrences.

"Protecting Phuket depends in large part on the people who live here ... because 1,010

police officers are not enough to fully protect the 600,000 to 700,000 people who live here," he said.

"The public can help the authorities in many ways. The main methods are: abiding by the law, not supporting or assisting criminals and keeping an eye out for any criminal activity, which should be reported as soon as possible. It's not as hard as one might think," he said.

Police have stepped up security at police checkpoints around the island, including the Tung Tong checkpoint on the way to Patong Hill, at Chalong Circle and at Tah Chat Chai.

Runjuan Tongrut, Assistant Director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Southern Region 4 office in Phuket City, told the *Gazette*, "The bombs in Haad Yai may have frightened people from visiting the South, but I think the impact on Phuket will be limited because Phuket and Haad Yai are 500 to 600 kilometers apart.

"Also, I am confident in the work of the government, including the police," she said.

"Since the violence in Haad Yai, we have yet to receive any reports of canceled flights to

Beach vendors get eviction reprieve

CHERNG TALAY: The stall operators on Bang Tao Beach were not forced to clear the beach on September 15, as had been threatened by eviction notices issued earlier this month. Instead, they have been allowed to stay until a new site is found for them, after progress in talks between the vendors and the authorities.

The news follows a meeting of local and provincial government officers and beach vendors on September 13.

At the meeting, beach vendor Prajim Plodphai said, "I have lived here since it was a tin mine. We earn our living here, which was allowed by the local *tambon* [subdistrict administration] office 14 years ago, and the Cherng Talay *OrBorTor* [Tambon Administration Organization] also allowed it.

"We don't want to move, but the government said we have to. They stuck the eviction notices on our doors, saying that we had to move out before September 15, – but we won't. We will fight this until the end of our days. We would be very happy if the government did the same as they did at Patong Beach, and we are not asking them to give us the land titles for the land," he added.

Santi Korkarvee, Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) member for Cherng Talay, said, "The government should clear the beach and allocate areas [for vendors], and create a walkway about a meter wide [along the beach]."

Wiwat Dorktien, a Vice-President of Cherng Talay *Or-BorTor*, suggested that at least some of the operators may be able to relocate to a nearby plot belonging to Laguna Phuket Resorts & Hotels. "Government officers should talk to Laguna Phuket and survey the recommended sites," he said.

A representative of Laguna Phuket said the request to have the vendors relocate to the resort's plot would be brought to his superior's attention.

New visa rules confirmed

PHUKET: New rules limiting stays in Thailand on "visas on arrival" to 90 days over any sixmonth period were confirmed at a September 15 meeting of Immigration Department Chiefs in Bangkok.

The new policy will go into effect on October 1. In a related development, the Royal Thai Consulate in Penang, Malaysia, has stopped issuing double-entry tourist visas.

Pol Lt Col Pipat Pongpan, an Inspector at Phuket Immigration Office, told the Gazette, "Anyone who has already stayed 90 days on visa-on-arrival permit does not need to worry. We will start counting the days from October 1.

"[Foreigners from countries qualifying for visas on arrival] can come in and out of the country as many times as they like with a

visa on arrival, but can stay for a ing countries. The Royal Thai maximum of 90 days in any six month period. If they stay 90 days then they must leave for 90 days before they are entitled to another visa on arrival.

"They can, however, go and request a tourist visa from a Royal Thai Embassy or Consulate abroad and come back into the country," he said.

"Extensions above the 90day limit may be granted in exceptional cases, such as if the tourist is suffering from an illness or involved in a lawsuit," he added.

"No new investment visas will be issued after October 1. However, existing visas in this category may be extended if the holder still has funds of 3 million baht and is still doing business in Thailand," Col Pipat said.

Tourist visas are still available, for a fee, at Thai embassies and consulates in neighbor-

Consulate in Penang, however, will now issue only single-entry 60-day tourist visas. An official at the consulate said that an order had been sent down from Consul Pramote Pramoonsab to cease issuance of double-entry tourist visas, which allow a total stay of up to 120 days.

However, double-entry tourist visas are at present still available from the Thai Consulate in Kota Bharu and Thai Embassy in Kuala Lumpur.

A source in the Visa and Travel Document Division, Department of Consular Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA), said that the move by the consulate in Penang is not due to any changes in MFA policy.

The decision whether or not to issue double-entry tourist visas rests solely at the discretion of each diplomatic mission, the source explained.

New dive rules stand – Governor

PHUKET: The new regulations affecting Phuket's dive industry will be adhered to until the rules are reviewed and any changes agreed to, Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura has

The Governor affirmed his resolve in seeing the new rules being applied at a meeting with Chatupol Chindapol, President of the Diving Sport Association of the Thai Diving Association (TDA), on September 14.

K. Chatupol met Governor Udomsak to submit proposed ideas from local dive operators regarding new dive regulations signed into effect August 25.

According to the new regulations, all dive operators are required to register their businesses with the Phuket Marine Office by September 30, and then to submit monthly reports with extensive details.

K. Chatupol said that the TDA agrees with the department's environmental conservation goals, but had suggested some changes and recommended that the regulations should be enforced nationwide.

"Dive operators must submit some private information and some foreign operators do not understand the aim of the regulations. The TDA members requested for the provincial authority to review or revise some of the regulations and – to achieve the main goal of environment conservation - they should be reviewed point-by-point at a meeting of all agencies and businesses involved," he said.

Governor Udomsak said that the ideas proposed will be reviewed by the committee, and some points might be revised.

"Dive operators have complained that some reports required too much information or were required too often, so the committee will review the regulations and see if they need to be changed.

"We might change for some reports to be filed every six months, but it depends on the details and the related laws," he

However, he added that the regulations will be enforced as is, and reviewed and any changes made only if "problems occur".

"Phuket provincial authorities are implementing the regulations as they are supposed to be, and it's normal that new rules might make some people feel uncomfortable. But if we don't start, we can't say what the problems are, and that's not right," he

t about 9:30 pm, two jolting bangs – no more than 30 seconds apart – ripped through the night above the traffic noise of a bustling Saturday night in Haad Yai.

I rushed to the hotel window to check if there was a fireworks display going on. There wasn't. The sound of the explosions was different from fireworks as well, deeper.

All I could see from my ninth floor window were wisps of smoke beginning to rise up over the buildings. As the reality of what had happened began to dawn on me, I felt the first twinges of adrenaline in my stomach.

I had only just gone back to my room to use the bathroom, after having eaten a bad prawn earlier in the day. Had I not, I would likely have been in the area where the bombs went off, drinking with friends.

Running down to the hotel lobby, I was met by a hotel security guard and a friend who was waiting for me there.

Agreeing that it had to have been bomb blasts, we headed out of the hotel. After a brief pause to discuss where the sound had come from, we rushed along the street.

At the corner we saw others gathering and heading towards the flames, rising near Ocean Shopping Mall, in the very heart of the city's commercial and tourist district.

As we entered the street where the first explosions had come from, a shout went out

warning that another bomb was about to go off. The shout was passed down the line and the advancing crowd retreated en mass.

About a minute later, a third explosion rang out. Whether the bomb had been discovered in the nick of time or whether it was just a rumor that happened to be true is unclear. Either way, that warning must have saved many casualties.

From a safe distance round the corner, away from any unattended motorcycles that could have been wired with explosives, we stopped to explain what had happened to two men emerging from a shop.

Cigarettes were nervously distributed as the men lamented that the Southern insurgency had now spread to Haad Yai.

When our nerves had calm-

ed somewhat, my friend went back to the hotel with the guard to fetch a camera.

I went back to the scene to ask police about what was happening and whether there was anything that could be done to help. A Westerner in a bloodsoaked white T-shirt walked away from the scene as fire engines rushed in to get the blaze under control.

The crowd of onlookers began to reconvene. Police hastily taped off the area and tried in vain to get the crowd to disperse.

Warnings about the militants' tactic of waiting for people to be drawn to the scene before detonating more explosives seemed to fall on deaf ears. Very few people were dissuaded from trying to get a look.

When the camera arrived we went in under the police lines to where the firemen had finished extinguishing the flames. Frantic shouts went up periodically as the street was cleared to allow emergency vehicles to pass.

All that was left was the smoldering carcass of a tuk-tuk and a mangled motorcycle, the casualties having already been evacuated.

Although the fear of further attacks was still very real, I felt compelled to stay and resisted the nagging desire to retreat to the relative safety of my hotel room, high above the uncertainty on the streets.

It was then the rumors started. Everyone seemed to

agree that there had been three blasts in the immediate vicinity but news was filtering in of other attacks.

Word went round of a bomb at the Big-C Supercenter. Estimates of casualties ranged from 50 to 100, with at least two dead. Despite this, the immediate atmosphere was more one of nervous excitement than sorrow.

Police and Special Operations Unit volunteers pushed back the cordon and tried to account for all the remaining motorcycles on the scene. Adding to the tension, a policeman said that he had heard that 10 or so more devices were hidden around the city, waiting to go off.

When the area had been cleared, police began to allow shop owners back in to retrieve their goods.

Advancing soldiers, armed with assault rifles, crossed paths with merchants scurrying past the debris, carrying mannequins and bundles of clothes.

When the situation seemed

to be under control we decided to leave. After walking for maybe five minutes we came to the scene of another blast.

Again, crowds were pushing at the cordon. After discussing with an officer, I was allowed under the line.

The atmosphere here was more somber than at the shopping center. The forms of two bodies could be seen under bloodied white sheets; the crowd control was far stricter.

Police shouted aggressive-

ly for people not directly involved to leave the area.

Outside the cordon, a woman knelt, in tears. Inside, shop owners were herded back behind the metal grills of their premises.

The bodies – one a Caucasian male, the other an Asian female – were briefly uncovered before being lifted into rescue foundation trucks.

The adrenaline faded, replaced by a heavy feeling something like fatigue. My thoughts went to the victims' family; I had

just spoken to mine and had felt the worry in their voices.

After watching forensics police examine the scene, I left to find my friend. He was talking with two Filipino tourists who were staying in the Indra hotel, just next to the blast.

Hampered by the language barrier, they seemed at a loss for what to do. Police would not let them return to the hotel. They were keen to leave the city and get back home.

We walked back to the hotel, gingerly avoiding unattended rows of motorbikes.

In the reception area we met up with the guard and swapped news.

The number of blasts was now up to five by his count. The bombs were in areas frequented mainly by tourists – both Thai and foreign – and had clearly been aimed at causing maximum carnage in the busy streets.

We all agreed that the event was a terrible tragedy for the whole city.

Transgender trauma

hile some tourists jet in from around the globe specifically to enjoy the androgynous charms of Patong's legion of ladyboy prostitutes, there are still cases cases where off-guard male tourists end up with a ladyboy under the misunderstanding that he is a real woman.

Such misunderstandings can – and often do – result in disaster, as two recent reports in the local press have shown.

Green season: The first case happened on September 9, at about 3:30 am, when Pol Col Prasit Yodthong received a report from staff at the Thara Patong Hotel that outside the hotel a group of enraged ladyboys were beating senseless two Saudi tourists.

Col Prasit and eight motorcycle patrol policemen were soon at the scene, pulling the furious ladyboys off the Saudi men and taking them into custody.

Off to Kathu Police Station went the ladyboys, while their victims, with gashes on their heads and wrists from being slashed with knives, were rushed to Patong Hospital, conveniently located right across the street from the scene of the fight.

From their investigation, police learned that the group of five ladyboys had been prowling for customers in front of Tiger Entertainment Complex, on Soi Bangla, when they happened upon two drunken young Saudis, both named Mohamad, aged 24 and 25.

As is the common practice along the walking street around bar-closing time, the boys-turned-girls used a series of somewhat-less-than-coy gestures to attract the attention of the two Arab travelers.

The heaving breasts having led them into thinking their accosters were actually

attractive young females, the Saudis negotiated a price of 2,000 baht each for the two ladyboys, named Nong Suzee and Nong Som-O, from Nong Khai and Chiang Rai Provinces, respectively.

Taking the ladyboys back to their room at the Thara Patong Hotel, however, they soon learned the truth: down below they were still wholly male.

Thinking they had been tricked, the two men refused to pay and contacted the hotel staff for help to get rid of Suzee and

But as they were doing so, the two "girls" called their friends by mobile phone for back-up and a melée ensued outside the hotel.

Police arrested the five ladyboys to charge them with assault, but the two Saudis decided not to press charges, flying back to the relative sanity and tranquility of their home country the following day.

Faux pas: In the second case, at about 5 am on September 12, a 23-year-old Frenchman named Simon freaked out in the rented room of 24-year-old Nong Ple, a ladyboy who had not yet undergone the final step in gender-reassignment surgery.

When he learned that the bargirl he had gone home with was really a barboy, Monsieur Simon frantically tried to grab his clothes and bid the ladyboy adieu.

But the crafty Nong Ple locked the door to his room, blocking the Frenchman's most logical route of escape. In his desperate bid for freedom, Simon went to the third-floor balcony – and jumped.

He was last reported to be in a grave condition at Patong Hospital, where he was being treated for a head wound requiring 50 stitches and a fractured vertebra.



isenchantment towards the Thai Buddhist clergy has reached a level where many monks return to their temples from their morning alms rounds with nearly empty bowls, media researcher Kitima Surasonthi of Thammasat University's Faculty of Journalism and Mass Communications told a seminar at a Bangkok hotel.

The phenomenon becomes particularly noticeable when a monk becomes embroiled in a scandal that gains widespread media coverage, she told the seminar, organized by her faculty in conjunction with the Culture Ministry.

"At some temples, monks now have to cook their own food because of diminishing faith in Buddhism among members of the public," she said, reporting on findings from a study of monks' views on news reports concerning Buddhism.

Some monks have commented that they wish newspapers and television stations would report less on scandals about bad monks because it rebounds on the good monks, she said.

Most of the adverse news reports centered on amulet sales, black magic, gambling, pornography, lottery predictions, brawling and sex.

According to a survey of 400 respondents in Bangkok, 51.5% said their faith in Buddhism had dropped because of scandals about monks having sexual relations with women. Only 18% said the negative news reports did not affect their faith.

Royal rescue: HM Queen Sirikit has accepted an infant with severe skin disease who lives in Nakhon Ratchasima's Chum Phuang District to be placed under her care.

Two-year-old Thitikorn Wilai, or Nong Dong, is suffering from ichthyosis, a rare condition that leaves sufferers with skin that vaguely resemble fish scales.

He will soon be transferred from the provincial hospital in the northeastern province to either Chulalongkorn or Siriraj hospitals, said Dr Samrerng Yaengkrathoke, the Head of the Provincial Public Health Office.

The Royal Household Bureau has coordinated with the provincial authorities to have the boy transferred to one of the two Bangkok-based hospitals.

Depressing statistics: Overall national sentiment has slumped, and Bangkok residents are the most unhappy in the country, according to the latest survey on "gross domestic happiness" conducted by the Assumption Business Administration College (Abac) Poll Research Center.

The survey, of 4,864 people in 25 provinces, focused on their happiness over the past month. Out of a possible 10 points, Bangkok residents' happiness was rated at just 5.54. In Isarn, where the happiness index rating has consistently been the highest since the center began keep-

The country's happiness index slipped to just 6.34 points in August, down from 7.29 in July.

In June, when the country celebrated the 60th anniversary of His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej's accession to the throne, the index soared to 9.21 points.

According to the survey, a higher income does not necessarily mean more happiness. When divided into groups based on incomes, 19% of those earning less than 5,000 baht a month said they were happy, while only 9% of those earning more than 30,000 baht monthly said they were happy.

Viagra falls: Eight in every 10 Thai women are not "fully satisfied" with their male partners' erection hardness compared to the global average of six in 10, according to the "Global Better Sex Survey 2006" carried out by by pharmaceutical company Pfizer, which produces the popular anti-erectile-dysfunction drug Viagra.

The latest survey results from the company indicate a strong correlation between erec-

tion hardness and satisfaction with one's sex life, love, romance and overall health.

The survey was carried out in 27 countries, including Thailand, from October 2005 to March 2006.

In the survey, about 12,500 men and women were asked a series of questions and asked to rate their satisfaction regarding the hardness of men's erections and how often they had sex.

The survey also found that Thais had sex less frequently – about four times in a period of four weeks – than the global average of about six times over the same period.

However, unlike the association between erection hardness and satisfaction, the survey found no link between sexual frequency and the levels of satisfaction either in men or women.


After completion, the TNC will be available to researchers either via the Internet or in a CD-ROM format.

Only the National Electronics and Computer Technology Center's 400,000-word corpus is open to the public, but its data is mostly derived from academic papers and some news articles.

Thus, it does not represent the entire field of Thai language, said project manager Kachain Tansiri.

ANDAMAN COASTING By Franky Gun

hao Lak residents in mid-August most likely thought they had seen the worst weather this low season had to offer when strong winds caused minor damage all over the area. The worst was, however, yet to come.

Rainfalls of biblical proportions pounded Khao Lak and neighboring areas in the first week of September, causing severe flooding along highway Number 4, known as Petchkasem Rd, through the center of Khao Lak and – as usual – all along Bang Niang Rd. One of the highway's lanes had to be closed to traffic for several hours as the water stood up to one meter deep at times.

Mudslides and erosion in the serpentine road section of Lamru National Park contributed to at least two car crashes.


At a curved section of highway the supporting soil had partially been washed away from under the road, making this curve probably the most dangerous one in all of Khao Lak.

Although provisional attempts have been made to fix it, it is just a matter of time until a truck with a load heavy enough to crack the road surface passes by – or over – the faulty section. Since the curve borders a steep cliff, it is quite likely that a fatal accident will occur here in the near future.

Yet, nobody seems to care, and why should they? The road surface is still there, even though there is no foundation left to support it.

Smashing time in Khao Lak

Heavy reconstruction all along Chong Fah Beach gives support to Khao Lak residents' high hopes that Khao Lak will be back to pre-tsunami status within two years.

Yet there is reason for concern. Khao Lak has been widely known by tourists as a beach resort dominated by single-story beach bungalows with no high-rise development.

Now, more and more threestory apartment buildings are being erected all along Khao Lak's coastline.

This is most likely a result of resort owners trying to compensate for the losses caused by the December 2004 tsunami.

It seems logical that three apartments will result in bigger profits than a single bungalow. Yet tourist numbers in the season to come will show whether foreign Khao Lak lovers are in tune with this rather drastic change of the landscape.

Despite more than 90% of the shophouses in Khao Lak's northern half still being unoccupied since December 26, 2004, investors are obviously convinced that they are smartly targeting a niche market by building even more of these rather unappealing two- or three-story elongated boxes along Petchkasem Rd with the plan to rent them out.

The mind-boggling question however is: "Who will be the tenants?" Perhaps the investment will pay off in the long run, as some shophouse owners in Khao Lak's southern half recently began to ask ridiculous amounts of key money from would-be tenants for their simple two-story shop houses just because they are located near the center of Khao

Lak. As long as shophouse owners in the Bang Niang area are not joining in the key-money nonsense, there is a good chance that all of these shop houses will be occupied by say... 2012.

Well, how's that for a topnotch niche investment?

Another change to the fabric of Khao Lak should have been the tsunami memorial, which is planned to be erected in a select area of the Lamru National Park that overlooks the Andaman Sea. Many Khao Lak residents be-

lieved that the memorial would be ready by this high season, but construction has not yet started and there are no signs that it soon will

Nobody seems to be concerned about this delay though, since the unofficial tsunami memorial site of Khao Lak has always been the beached police patrol boat, which can still be seen on the left hand side of Petchkasem Rd near Bang Niang Beach when driving in the direction of Phuket.

Learning through the camera's lens

he newly-established Fah Diow Foundation (One Sky Foundation) has teamed up with the European Union and Thailand's Coastal Habitats and Aquatic Resources Management (Charm) project to launch an environmental education campaign in schools in Southern Thailand. The project will use storyboards and video shot by students to increase awareness of local environments.

Fah Diow aims to bring together people of diverse backgrounds to share their skills, experiences and abilities, as well as their ideas and dreams for the future.

Special attention will be given to children, the elderly, women and people from marginal groups including ethnic minorities.

Twelve schools in Ranong, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Trang and Surat Thani will use video cameras and video editing, with special training for teachers to help the project along.

Children have prepared storyboards on the theme "Changes in Coastal Resources from Past to Present". The video documentaries will be presented for judging in Phuket on October 29.

At the same time, an open storyboard competition has been launched in all schools in the 14 southern provinces so that students can learn more about their local environment, especially the changes that have affected this environment since their grandparents were children.

It is hoped that the competitions will stimulate discussion

about changes in how coastal resources are used and conserved, and what can be expected for the future.

Although originally developed by Walt Disney for animation preparation, storyboards are now used in the production of most film, including documentaries.

Storyboards, like cartoons, show action "shot-by-shot". They help with planning and visualization of the video, and show details including locations, lighting, participants, actions and camera angles.

The use of video documentaries and storyboards supports in-depth research on local issues, while also being fun and creative for children who may be more familiar with movies and cartoons than with libraries, Fah Diow organizers said.

The storyboards produced by the 12 schools that have received cameras have shown a very high level of preparation, and have given the Fah Diow team new insights into the lives of local people in coastal areas, organizers said.

Prizes for the top-of-theirclass winners of the storyboard and video competition include participation in a seven-day video documentary-making camp to be held next April and May, giving budding film-makers the chance to improve their skills.

The deadline for the open storyboard competition throughout Southern Thailand is September 30. It is open to children from grade 4 to grade 12. More details of the competition are available in Thai and English on the Fah Diow Foundation website at www.fahdiow.net





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oung mother Thatsanee Namrop, while still clutching her baby, shot dead a robber who was holding her husband at gunpoint in the Thung Song District of Nakhon Sri Thammarat on September 10.

The robber's accomplice returned fire, wounding both Thatsanee and her husband, before attempting to flee the scene.

The woman's husband, Thaweep Nuankhao, despite having been shot in the chest, gave chase and shot the man dead before passing out.

The incident was reported to Thung Song District Police around 9 pm.

When officers arrived at the scene they found Thatsanee sitting with her 14-month-old daughter in her lap and a 9mm pistol in her right hand. She had been wounded in her left arm. Police rushed her and Thaweep to hospital.

Police also found the bodies of the two robbers, Nathawut Phunphanang, 30, and Somsak Eamkamlang, 37. They had both been shot in the head. Next to Nathawut's body was a 9mm pistol, while Somsak's hand was still grasping a .357 pistol.

Pol Maj Suraphon Phakdee, Duty Inspector at Thung Song District Police Station, then led a team to interview Thatsanee at the hospital. Maj Suraphon reported that Thatsanee told police that the incident had begun while her husband was outside sweeping up rubbish and she was preparing milk for their child.

She said that after hearing her husband shout out, she got to the front door where she saw two men wearing balaclavas threatening him with guns.

She then ran to the bedroom where she grabbed her husband's pistol, hiding it behind her back.

The robbers then marched her husband into the bedroom and demanded that she hand over her gold necklace.

One of the men ordered her

husband to lie on the floor. Thatsanee seized the opportunity to draw the pistol and shoot the robber closest to her in the head. The other bandit opened fire, shooting her and her husband before turning to run away, Maj Suraphon reported Thatsanee as saying.

Thaweep grabbed the gun from his wife and went after the robber, shooting him just as he was leaving the house. Thatsanee then shouted for the neighbors to call the police.

"I decided to shoot the robber as I thought that whatever happened he was bound to harm my family. I didn't expect that I would kill him though," Thatsanee told reporters at the hospital.

She added, however, that she was pleased that both of the robbers were dead as if they had escaped alive she would be scared of revenge attacks.

Pol Maj Gen Sutjai Yanrat, Commander of Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police, said, "We know that the two robbers were part of a gang of about 10 people.

"They always prepared thoroughly before their attacks by wearing gloves so the forensics department could not identify them.

"Police will investigate the

incident and make sure that the husband and wife are treated fairly. From the evidence it looks as if it's a clear case of self defense.

"We will have a ceremony and present a shield to the couple for assisting the authorities in their work," Gen Sutjai said.

"Having a gun is a good thing if you use it in a positive way, as in the case of K. Thaweep's family. But if you use a gun inappropriately or to do harm to people then it will be a danger to yourself," he added.

Kamnan assassinated: A well-known *kamnan* (tambon chief) was gunned down in Songkhla on the morning of September 8 while he was returning from driving his son to school.

Kesom Jantawee, 46, *Kamnan* of Baan Han in Bang Klam District, was shot 10 times – in the head, torso and right arm. According to an officer at Haad Yai Hospital, where Kesom was taken after the shooting, his left arm was almost severed from bullet wounds. He died at the hospital.

Pol Lt Col Chalemchai Bunsiri, Investigating Inspector at Bang Klam District Police Station, said that Kesom was on his way home after taking his son to primary school when a white Toyota Mighty-X pickup pulled up alongside.

Two men in the back of the pickup opened fire, one with an M-16 and the other with an 11mm pistol. After hitting Kesom with a fusillade of gunfire in full view of crowds of shoppers at a nearby market, they sped away.

Bystanders took Kesom to hospital. It was later discovered that Kesom had a pistol at his waist, Col Chalemchai said.

Col Sakhon Thongmunee, Deputy Commander of Songkhla Provincial Police, said that Kesom had previously been accused of being involved in the double slaying of former Songkhla Provincial Council Member Manit Wilairat and his elder brother Manat, as well as the 2005 assassination of the President of Baan Han Tambon Administration Organization

Not a leg to stand on: Police in Trang have arrested a crippled man for stealing metal plates and stakes from railway tracks after he was abandoned by his two nephews, who fled the scene as police arrived.

Police were alerted to the crime by locals who reported that a gang of men were behaving suspiciously by the railway tracks.

Around 1:30 am on September 10, Pol Capt Pirasin Retthaphiphat, Duty Officer at Khlong Teng Sub-District Police Station, led a team out to investigate.

At the scene, police detained Surasak Jantalet, 30, along with a bag containing 84 rail stakes, 12 metal plates and a metal bar used for prying out the stakes.

They also found a Honda Nova motorcycle fitted with a sidecar in which there was a wheelchair.

Police reported that Surasak confessed to stealing the railway stakes and plates and also admitted to having more stashed at his house. Police searched his home and seized a further 50 stakes and five plates


Surasak, according to police, said that he collected scrap metal to provide for himself, his younger sister and two nephews.

Before his arrest, he had gone to look for scrap but could not find any, so, as he had run out of money to feed his family, he decided to steal it from the railway track instead.

He said would select railway ties that were rotten and then use a metal bar to lever out the stakes. When the police arrived, his two nephews fled into the night, leaving him helpless, he said.

Trang Provincial Public Works Inspector Aekachai Nunkaew said that the metal stakes have a market value of 20 baht per kilogram, while metal plates sell for 200 baht a kilo.

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

he reason for going to the so-called Democratic People's Republic of North Korea (DPRK) is much the same as the classic explanation for climbing Mount Everest: because it's there.

This is no easy trip. It's practically an excursion to another planet, where normal rules do not apply.

"The past is a foreign country, they do things differently there," wrote LP Hartley, and indeed North Korea is stuck firmly in the Stalinist 1950s and does things as differently as it's possible to imagine.

Burdened with an economic system that would be laughable if it wasn't so tragic, and a political legacy that is indistinguishable from a state religion, the apparatchiks who run North Korea insist that all foreign tourists (usually in the tender care of Koryo Tours – www.koryogroup.com) are kept under strict supervision.

REVERENCE

Top of the nigh-compulsory list of Must-Visits is the statue of the country's founder, Kim Il Sung, where visitors may be presented with a bunch of flowers to lay reverently by its plinth. Cameras whir, recording foreigners paying tribute to the "Great Leader".

All in all, you can pretty much rule out nightlife, being allowed to wander round on your own, making friends with the locals or anything else which smacks of freelance gallivanting.

Hotel accommodation can border on the bizarre – endless mirrors but no guarantee of a waste paper bin – and meals can be a touch maudlin at best.

However, along the carefully strictured way there is a great deal of amusement to be had in reading between the lines, imagining what the inhabitants really think and posing the odd innocent question to your minder to make him or her squirm.

Most trips to the DPRK start in Pyongyang and follow a course as predictable as a tram's, accompanied by a forced cheerfulness without the merest hint of irony.

The 140-meter Tower of the Juche Idea, topped with a 20meter torch, is a monument to the country's self reliance.

The Grand People's Study House can hold up to 30 million volumes, but don't expect to find anything authored outside North Korea's borders.

The song and dance performance put on by youngsters at the School Children's Palace is superbly choreographed – so much so that you might think it was put on by automatons.

And the Fatherland Liberation War Museum stages a marvelously one-sided account of the country's struggle for its own version of independence.

There is some respite from the propaganda, although not for long, during a hike in the Myohyangsan Mountains. This is followed by a tour of the Friendship Exhibition, filled with gifts donated from abroad to the Great Leader. It's pardonable to think they might have been clearing out their at-

The DPRK comes into its sharpest focus at Panmunjom, the border with South Korea where talks are still held in a building whose conference table straddles two nations.

Enormous flags snap in the wind on either side of the heavilyguarded boundary, and the commentary from the ever-present guides becomes if anything more

Everyone in the south is a miserable puppet of the American Imperialists, bowed down by the yoke of a fascist government and yearning for liberation from the peace-loving north. Ahem.

North Korea. It's less of a country than a state of unreality.



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ALL IN A NIGHT'S

he radio crackles into life – the words are garbled, but the message is clear. Ten men stationed at the Jui Tui Shrine in Phuket Town run toward an ambulance and a few converted pickups, barely waiting for for the stragglers to pile in to the back before the vehicles speed out of the parking lot, lights flashing, sirens wailing.

Details begin to emerge. Someone has been stabbed at the Koh Sireh fishing pier.

Police, as usual, have radioed the Kusoldharm Foundation, Phuket's non-profit ambulance service, to send an emergency response team.

Jeff Craig is driving the first pickup, methodically switching between the tones on his new FBI-issue sirens while Led Zeppelin plays on the CD player.

Jeff's blond-brown hair, tan features and good looks betray his day job as a golf pro at Blue Canyon Country Club, but his aggressive driving and slightly black sense of humor show a different side – the Emergency Medical Technician, or EMT, from America who spends his free evenings as a volunteer paramedic in Phuket.

We arrive after 12 fast minutes to find a crowd surrounding a shirtless man laying near the edge of the pier loading area.

Jeff jumps from the pickup, but once he arrives at the body he realizes it's too late.

The man is laying in a puddle of blood that covers his neck and flows down past his head into a nearby sewage drain.

Jeff checks the pulse, then pulls open the man's eyelids and shines his flashlight to check for pupil dilation. He's been dead at least 20 minutes, the victim of multiple stab wounds.

"Oh, he may pull out of it yet," Jeff would later joke with the young journalists who hadn't seen a violent death scene before.

By day, Jeff Craig is a golf pro at Blue Canyon but at night his role is very different, as he hurtles around town with the 'ghostbusters' – the volunteers of the Kusoldharm Foundation picking up the peices after fights and road accidents. Two Gazette staffers went out with him recently. Here is their report. Words by Zach Fridell, Photos by Dominic Earnshaw.

dead guy, but he had actually just fallen on a bottle of ketchup. He's up and around and laughing about it now."

Jeff moved to Thailand 11 years ago to work as a golf pro and toured from 1992 to 2000, but after spending two years in Phuket he realized there was a need for emergency medical training.

Pickup trucks would race around the city to motorcycle accident sites, hastily loading the victims into a cloth stretcher and throwing them in the back of the truck before speeding to the hospital.

This earned them such nicknames as "The Body Snatchers" "You thought you saw a and "Ghostbusters", as their work

is seen by ethnic Chinese as a way of keeping the island from being overrun by disembodied

The approach was the best available option at the time, but it was also very dangerous for vic-

Any one with a spinal injury could be permanently disabled or even killed – by the manhandling and bouncing ride.

After being trained as a paramedic in his native North Carolina, Jeff knew the importance of stabilization and backboards.

Just a few extra seconds to brace the victim's neck and spine could mean a world of difference to their survival odds.

Now the Kusoldharm Foundation boasts several converted pickups and two ambulances one in Phuket City and one in Thalang – fitted out with backboards and rudimentary medical supplies such as breathing bags and a suction device.

Jeff rides with the Phuket City crew once every few months, and operates from his house near Blue Canyon, where he lives with his wife and sevenyear-old daughter, every night through radio contact with the small dispatch office at the Jui Tui shrine.

After the tsunami there was

Almost all the money for the foundation comes from small donations made to the shrine.

More supplies and training are still required, however. That's

a brief flood of donations when the Kusoldharm workers were featured on CNN, allowing the foundation to buy the backboards and ambulances.

Jeff teamed up with Mike Dougherty, a friend from the States, in 1996 to woo big donors in the US. So far the non-profit corporation has raised US\$15,000, with another US\$7,000 on the way. But

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

each ambulance costs US\$35,000, a full set of gear US\$50,000, and the Jaws of Life, a car-wreck extraction tool, runs about US\$70,000.

"If only these really rich guys could donate something they could really help things,' Jeff said.

The biggest benefit the Rescue Corp has been able to promise thus far is a flight paramedic, originally from Phuket and trained in the US, who will arrive in Phu-

ket within the year to help train the ambulance workers further.

Most of the Kusoldharm staff are still in their 20s. The turnover rate is high because the low salary can often be topped by other

OrBorJor ambulance service.

A few of the more experienced workers, like Jeff, donate their time or receive small stipends for the long hours they

Of the 32 members on staff, Jeff is the only one with any training in first response or medi-

He has done several training sessions with the first responders, but he explains that since his Thai isn't perfect (though it is very good) it makes him nervous to instruct the workers on the delicate procedures. He explains that with medical terms, precision is key and any misunderstanding could injure a patient.

"They (the Kusoldharm workers) all have a basic understanding, like to protect the neck, but they'll see a grotesque arm and focus on that when the guy also has massive head trauma,' he said.

The responders almost never get called to medical emergencies such as heart attacks, Jeff said, but have a steady string of accidents and fights.

Back at the crime scene, the police still haven't arrived after 15 minutes.

Jeff has changed roles to become an investigator, following a partial bloody footprint and a

trail of blood droplets that lead away from the body across the loading area.

Concerned that there might be another victim, Jeff shines his flashlight behind barrels and supports until the trail

jobs or by working with the fades away near the boats moored for the night.

He returns to the body, inspects the wounds and follows the signs of a struggle – a torn, bloody shirt and droplets – across the area to re-enact the attack.

The man had no defensive wounds, which could likely mean he was drunk when attacked. He was also stabbed several times in the back before the fatal blows to the neck.

Eventually the police arrive and document the scene with more photos before the body is loaded into a white plastic bag to be transported to the morgue. The next day the police will fingerprint the body in an attempt to identify the man.

As Jeff pulls off his rubber gloves and gets back in his truck, the radio crackles again. Lights, sirens and action. That was only the first call of the night.

KEPING **FOCUSED**

he seasoned hack that's me – knows just the right time to throw in a cultural reference to kick start (or in some cases to perform CPR on) an article.

This piece is about various types of optical devices - field glasses, binoculars and spotting scopes, but not opera glasses; they don't fall into my aria of ex-

Swiftly back to the cultural reference and, from an episode of Father Ted:

Father Ted: "Now concentrate this time, Father Dougal. These [Ted points to some plastic cows on a table] are very small; those [Ted points at some cows out of the window] are far away."

Why traipse across a muddy field to see up close and personal an old tumbledown building – particularly one occupied by members of, for argument's sake, an opposing army – when, from





the comfort of one's FV107 Scimitar, a decent pair of binos will bring the place into sharp relief, just before a couple of HM Government's 30mm HE shells hit the place? Most definitely an essential piece of kit.

Myth-busting time: a decent pair of binoculars, that is, a wellcollimated (correctly-aligned) pair, will produce a single, circular image that appears to be three dimensional.

The "figure-of-eight" frame around the image being viewed, so beloved of Hollywood, Bollywood, Trollywood, Dollywood and Stoliwood, just isn't true.

By the way, the cause of the 3D-effect granted by binos over monocular devices stems from the fact that the two views – seen, of course, through the two tubes – are presented from different viewpoints. These two images

"merge" to produce the perception of a single perceived view with a sensation of depth (stereopsis), thus allowing a distance to be estimated.

Binoculars and other optical aids tend to have rather confusing numbers on them. Some of these numbers are known among the cognoscenti as price tags.

Others, 8x50, for example, are seemingly more arcane in their meaning. It's quite simple, really. The larger number refers to the diameter in millimeters of the big lens (the objective lens) at the front, whereas the smaller number refers to the magnification power, that is, it "brings" the object viewed eight times closer.

Therefore, a pair of 8x50 binos have 50mm-diameter objective lenses and a magnification power of eight.

However, don't rush out to by a pair of, say, 50x300 field glasses, before considering that – generally – the larger the magnification power and objective lenses, then the more glass is used, and, consequently, the heavier the binos are. Heavier binos are, of course, far less easy to keep steady, unless one buys binoculars with a gyroscopic image-stabilization device.

Try, if possible, to buy a pair that are nitrogen-filled. These will be hermetically sealed and, therefore, more resilient to fogging and a build-up of mildew.

Happy viewing, and don't forget to play a trick on an unsuspecting friend by smearing boot polish around the rims of the eyepieces for that classic "raccoon" look.

Coffee affects different people in different ways – and much depends on how the beans are prepared.

ome people sit in the office and drink 10 cups of coffee a day. Others feel their hearts racing after one espresso. Everyone has their own tolerance for caffeine. Some experts say that particularly sensitive people are probably reacting to the coffee's tannin. People who suffer adversely from coffee should pay close attention to their body and its signals.

"Caffeine affects the central nervous system ... the metabolism," says Antje Gahl of the German Nutritional Association (DGE).

Depending on the amount ingested, it can excite the heart and circulation, but also the stomach, intestines and kidneys. That's because caffeine blocks receptors that are responsible for picking up adenosine, which is produced by the body and promotes relaxation.

Thus, coffee usually has a desired effect when people drink it in the mornings and afternoon. "They wake up, can concentrate and can make decisions faster," says Hans Biesalski, a professor at the Institute for Biology, Chemistry and Nutritional Science at Stuttgart's Hohenheim University.

THE SHAKES

Some people get the shakes after drinking coffee. In such cases, some quick exercise can help. It lets the body work off the energy that comes from the coffee.

Different people filter caffeine out at different speeds, says Gisela Olias of the German Institute for Nutritional Research in Potsdam. "For some people, it takes three to five hours. For others, it can take up to 12," says Gahl.

Biesalski says this is the reason for the different tolerances. "We're all individuals," he says, adding that he can easily stomach coffee after his evening dinner and has no problem falling asleep, but becomes ill after drinking tea.

According to the DGE, a 125-milliliter cup of green or black tea contains 20 to 50 milligrams of caffeine – sometimes called theine (derived from the French for tea – $th\acute{e}$ – and pronounced "tay-een") in tea. The same size cup of coffee contains 80mg, while a 50ml cup of espresso only contains 50mg. The amount of caffeine in a cup of coffee depends on the preparation and roasting of the beans.

Espresso contains less caffeine because the beans are roasted more strongly. Additionally, the tannin, which causes so many problems for some people, is destroyed in the process. Finally, the water used for espresso is under more pressure and pushed through the coffee grounds faster. "That

means less dissolved tannin," says Biesalski.

These factors can make regular coffee more palatable if it's prepared in an espresso machine, says Biesalski. "Anyone who doesn't like coffee after dinner because it keeps them from sleeping is well-advised to try espresso."

People with sensitive stomachs should also check out these miniature Italian coffees. "Chlorogenic acid is the strongest acid in coffee. It's broken down only 30% during normal roasting, but up to 70% in stronger roasting processes," says Olias.

That means extremely roasted espresso beans have smaller concentrations of this acid, which encourages te stomach to produce hydrochloric acid. But Biesalski says the jury is still out on what role chlorogenic acid plays in causing problems.

Analysis is still pending on almost 100 different coffee elements. But any of these could be responsible for making coffee unpalatable to some. "Even today, we still don't know why some people can't handle filtered machine-brewed coffee," says Biesalski.

He advises sensitive coffee drinkers to only consume as much as "feels and tastes good". Anyone who notices themselves becoming agitated should cut consumption. On the other hand, the researcher notes, "as far as I know, there are no studies that show coffee has negative effects

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
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on healthy people. That means you can drink as much coffee as you want." Still, people with heart

problems and blood pressure problems should be careful.

Breakfast in the afternoon

huket people have an odd affection for *kanom jeen*, those Chinese noodles served cold and topped with curry and vegetables to taste.

The island's residents, especially those in Phuket City, have gained a reputation for eating this staple for breakfast – a culinary aspect that usually draws a wry smile from Thais from other provinces

But when most *kanom jeen* eateries on the island are calling it a day, Baan Liphon villager Pornchanok "Gai" Preechakarn is kicking the doors open at her restaurant Kanom Jeen Bai 3 – literally "Chinese noodles 3 pm".

The restaurant, located on the west side of the main road to the Sarasin Bridge, about four kilometers north of the Heroines' Monument, is easily spotted as you approach from the south by the rooster and the number "3" painted on the side, and by the growing number of diners waiting for the restaurant to open.

"I named my restaurant Kanom Jeen Bai 3 because it opens at 3 pm, when most people are nearly finished work and students are heading home from school. So at that time they are hungry and drop in here before they go home," K. Gai explains.

"There are always many people out front waiting for us to open, and people keep coming in when we're serving," she adds.

K. Gai, 40, as well as her teenage son and her daughter K. Taeng, welcome diners with a smile, just as her parents did when they sold *kanom jeen*.

"My parents started selling *kanom jeen* when I was 14 years old," explains K. Gai. "They used their own recipes and ran a stall in front of Wat Srisoontorn in Thalang Town.

"They were open on Saturdays and Sundays, and whenever there was a fair at the wat."

K. Gai opened the restaurant three years ago, on the same site where she and her husband used to sell cuts of beef. "I do this because I like eating *kanom jeen* and selling it has become a family business," she says.

On offer are four curries – gaeng kiew waan gai (chicken green curry), nam ya pla (fish paste curry), gaeng tai pla (fish maw curry) and gaeng neua

(beef curry) – all cooked by K. Taeng, who has learned the recipes as handed down through her family.

K. Taeng intentionally does not make the curries very spicy, as roasted chilies and chili powder are provided free for diners to spice their meals to their own preference.

A plate of *kanom jeen* noodles with curry costs 12 baht. People can also create a blend of curries for their noodles, a popular choice among children who cannot eat spicy food.

Vegetables, including bean sprouts, pickled lettuce, cucumber, long beans, eggplant, winged beans and other local vegetables, as well as iced water are all in the price.

A boiled egg costs five baht, as does an extra serving of noodles without curry, which K. Gai says is popular with frugal students.

So if you suffer a snack attack while in Thalang, drop by K. Gai's place and enjoy Phuket's favorite breakfast at the time of day that the rest of the country eats it.

have been writing newspaper columns for nearly six years, and I regularly get emails of all sorts, both good and bad, from readers. I received one recently which had a PS that read: "Why do you have to use a ridiculously obvious made-up name like Ambrosia? Own up your real names (sic) Tracy isn't it?" There was a time when I wished it was.

The emailer assumed that Ambrosia was a pseudonym. And why shouldn't she? Who in their right mind would name their daughter after a British brand of rice pudding?

The message was not from Phuket, by the way. This one came from Cyprus – where 'Ambrosia' is also a trade name for olive oil and vegetable oil.

When I was at school or university it never crossed my mind to use an alias. The off-spring of celebrities may have been given names such as Romeo, Phoenix Chi or River, but my link with celebrity ends there – unless you count my winning a singing competition when I was six.

My parents – actually my father – saw fit that I should be named after my grandfather Ambrose, and also that I should be given an unusual name. "An unusual name for an unusual child," he used to say. Quite.

In case you're wondering whether I got a lot of stick about my name at school, well for the first 12 years of my life, yes, I did. Ambrosia creamed rice. Tapioca. Semolina. And when I developed my bazoombas, "Ambrassiere". Anything but Ambrosia

At school, surrounded by girls called Sue and Fiona, my first name was such a source of shame that for a while I refused to use it. Instead, I insisted on being called by the shortened version of Sia. My real name marked me out as different – and even worse in my case, foreign – which was not what I wanted at my snobby girls' school in the London suburbs.

Sometimes I despaired. Why hadn't my father given me a sensible name like other children in my own family? All my

female first cousins were either Helens or Natashas (changed from Eleni and Anastasia for the benefit of the non-Greek community). What could you change Ambrosia into?

It was only later in life when I went to art school and decided, as one does, to reinvent myself that I realized I had the most wonderfully artistic name already – and all I had to do was use it.

All the associations with my first name – the Greek food of the gods, passionate Greek Goddesses, and even creamy milk puddings – suddenly became a glamorous bonus rather than a source of mortification. And did my personality change with a

new label? You bet your sweet ass it did.

Now, years later, I find myself in the bizarre position of having a downright cool name. I was quite flattered when I was dubbed the Greek "it" girl with the fashionable name at London Fashion Week one year. The pregnant fashion editor of a well-known glossy UK monthly even said she'd name her child after me. I never heard back from her, but I do hope she had a girl, not a boy.

I've found having an unusual name can be both a blessing and a curse. It's a blessing because everyone remembers it – and I'm the type who auto-

erases the name of the person I've literally just met.

Having children of my own posed an interesting dilemma. In the end, I decided against the exotic. Not because I'm deeply scarred by my own experience (believe me, it made me stick up for myself at school), nor because I didn't fancy something unusual (I did toy with Salvador or Alessandro for my first born, but Him Indoors put his size 44s firmly down).

No, it was simply because, finding myself with an unpronounceable Greek married name, I could envisage the hours they would spend spelling both names on the phone to electricity or gas board officials if they ever moved to England, and I couldn't put them through that.

Unlike in my early years, unusual names are the current vogue, and are no longer the sole domain of celebrity parents. So offspring bestowed with more unusual monickers will, I hope, never have to go through the emotional hoop-la that I did.





A genuine Bangkok gumshoe

ictional *farang* detectives abound in Bangkok - in novels ranging from the competent to the Godawful – but this is the first memoir from a real one.

Confessions of a Bangkok Private Eye (Monsoon Books, Singapore, 2006, 272pp) is the true tale of Warren Olson, as told to writer Stephen Leather, about his decade-long career as a private investigator in the Big Mango.

As he relates in his first chapter, Olson started out as a horse trainer in his native New Zealand, then fetched up as a marketing manager in a hotel in Surin where he learned Thai, Lao and Khmer, languages that would stand him in good stead in the bars of Bangkok when he set himself as a gumshoe. His bread and butter cases were, of course, bargirls and his clients their evergullible johns.

In The Case of the Double-Crossed Dutchman, the book starts off with a bang: "There are a whole host of things I love about living in Thailand: the gorgeous women, the climate, the food, the beaches.

"But right at the top of the list of things I hate is being pursued at high speed by two motorcyclists with gun-toting pillion passengers."



This is in the course of an investigation of the lovely Thai wife of a fat Dutchman.

She arrives in Thailand for the Songkran holidays and instead of joining her family in Chiang Mai, she promptly shacks up with a young waiter she'd met in a Thai restaurant in Holland.

Olson gets the photographs and a wad of euros from the furious husband.

Most of his cases are of a similar ilk, though sometimes the lover is a lesbian or the potential bride a katoey. Olson tells his tales with cynical relish.

The general plot goes that old, fat, ugly farang becomes besotted by beautiful young longhaired bargirl who – surprise! – doesn't really love him and is craftily emptying his bankbook using a wonderful range of schemes. To the bitter end, the punter ardently believes that his

love is not an ordinary bargirl, that money's been transferred I go she is "different".

"At that point part of me wants to say that they're all the same, that they are all just hookers hooking, and that the best way to see if a bargirl is lying is to check if her lips are moving.

Rule number two: If a bargirl's lips aren't moving, she's preparing her next lie. But I don't tell the clients that, of course. I tell them how much I charge and I give them the number of my bank account and once the through the motions."

Other cases are more rewarding: a middle-aged Thai magazine editor, a devout Christian, is hustled out of her life savings by a Canadian con-man pretending to be a Protestant minis-

Olson tracked him down, had him thrown in Thonglor jail and then shook him down for all of his ill-gotten gains. This was actually his first case and he concludes: "I'd made money and I'd helped someone; a private eye couldn't ask for a better result."

Olson is hardly a paragon of virtue. Whoremongering was originally his prime motivation for moving to Thailand and he's not above sleeping with the target of one marital investigation when he concludes that she hasn't gone back on the game, but is simply out for a night's fun. Of course, he doesn't tell the client.

The book itself is competently written but badly flawed with multiple duplications. He describes the Thai custom of bridal price over and over again. At least a half dozen times, he repeats his professional creed, "The client is always right even if he's wrong." And in hearing the initial stories of his duped clients, he overuses the phrase, "Alarms bells rung in my head."

Still, this is a worthy addition to the voluminous literature on bar girls in that the stories are based on true cases told in just the right cynical world-weary tone. In the end, Olson is jailed for a trumped-up car-theft offense but escapes back to New Zealand with his Thai wife and daughter. We're not given the story behind his marriage but his detective agency is still in business. If you want to contact him, buy the book.

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Adding insult to injury

With little more than a month to go before the onset of what was cautiously forecast to be a banner high season, Phuket has yet again been dealt a blow – this time a double-whammy that will certainly damage our vital tourism and property industries.

First came confirmation that the Immigration Bureau of the Royal Thai Police would go ahead with its enigmatic plan to limit to 90 days the maximum stays of visitors entering Thailand on free "visas-on-arrival". The following day saw the horrific bombings in Haad Yai, an unprecedented escalation of the conflict in the Deep South that resulted in tourists being killed.

The reason stated for the change in Immigration policy was two-fold: to stop foreigners from working illegally in the country and to keep out undesirables.

The new policy effectively ends any hope that the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) might have held for achieving the marketing organization's targets of 15 million visitors in 2007 and 20 million in 2008.

Worst of all, it will keep out a few hundred thousand good tourists, just the kind of long-stay visitors that the TAT, schools and hospitals have been working so hard to attract: free-spending, law-abiding people whose presence in Phuket has turned the island into a truly international destination – something so much more than just your basic, pre-packaged beach resort.

Phuket alone is home to thousands of such tourists, many of whom support Thai partners and children. Their presence here also attracts countless visits from friends and relatives overseas, further boosting tourism revenue and the country's foreign exchange reserves.

To appreciate the full extent of the impending damage, one must consider how tourist arrival figures are tallied. The typical long-stay tourist who spends most of the year in Phuket and does multiple "visa runs" accounts for 12 tourist visits to the country – not one. It's not difficult to understand, then, that limiting such tourists to half this number – or driving them away completely – will spark a sharp reduction in arrival figures, long used as a bellwether indicator of the country's progress in reaching "developed" status.

Thai Immigration will never stop the problem of illegal foreign workers through ill-conceived, broad-brush policies such as this. If truly serious, the police could start solving the problem tomorrow morning by simply rounding up and deporting all the foreign touts working illegally on the streets of Patong alone. To mis-identify as felons and effectively "deport" thousands of law-abiding contributors to the economic health and social texture of Thailand seems a reckless move indeed. One cannot help but wonder what, really, might - The Editor have motivated it.

Visa provisions for part-time residents?

Has anybody from the Immigration Department thought about the implications [of the new visa rules] to visitors in Phuket who have homes here on the island? These people often arrive on a simple tourist visa and intend to stay for the winter, and some

Many of these guests are not eligible for one-year visas or work permits because they don't have businesses, and most are not eligible for retirement visas because they are too young

This group of guests is here to enjoy their homes and the graciousness of Thai people. Do the current changes by the Immigration Department have provisions for these guests, or are they only allowed to spend time in their homes six months of the year?

It seems right for the Immigration Department to have checks in place to try to control those who visit Thailand from abusing Thai hospitality, but I think the restrictions need to be relaxed so those guests who do invest in the local economies have more latitude on entry.

Why doesn't the Gazette publish a story about how Thailand is built from foreign money, especially that spent by foreigners here after the tsunami?

My Thai wife fears that if I must stay 90 days in Malaysia, for example, that I will need to spend my money there and she

will have nothing to live on. There are, after all, many Thai women who live on their farang partner's money.

For me there is no problem, but I know that most expats who live here will tell their friends that they should not visit Thailand, and that they should go to other countries like the Philippines and Vietnam where there aren't so many visa problems.

I have loved Thailand for 20 years, but the next time I have to do a visa run and stay 90 days in another country, I may just stay there for good.

The Immigration office should send police to bars and dive schools to control the problem. They should throw out any bosses who don't give work permits to their staff.

I know many workers who would like work permits, but the Thai companies won't give them the paperwork. It's not just a problem connected to foreign bosses, either.

Thailand should look at its Immigration regulations and compare it to places like the Philippines, where you pay 10,000 baht for a one-year visa.

Mega-retailers have not hurt Mom 'n Pop stores

t is lucky that Phuket does not have a problem of small retail stores "versus" the mega-retailers. For the past two years, however, the owners of small retail outfits have voiced their concerns with the Chamber of Commerce. We are ready to help find solutions and offer advice, as appropriate.

Although [the Chamber of Commerce], has never received a complaint about the effects of megastores on independent, small retail outfits, it once took action by conducting a survey to determine what, if any, effects there

However, the Chamber of Commerce didn't get very much information and has not determined what the effect really is.

In my opinion the megastores that have opened in Thailand – if they were legally registered - should be allowed to conduct their business because Thailand is a country that prides itself on free trade.

I agreed to an idea that some people suggested to zone this kind of business in areas that are far away from town. I have friends who live in Ireland, and that country does not allow this kind of business to operate in their country at all; it's enshrined

To circumvent this, the megastores opened small shops that are open 24 hours. Tesco Express is one example. These stores, incidentally, are actually worse than the megastores, which at least are forced to close at some time of the day.

Investors who open businesses here will have a large effect because, for example, the cost of goods at a convenience store is, and will always be, more expensive than at megastores, which buy in bulk and therefore enjoy economies of scale.

I want to be fair when I talk about megastores. The first good thing to say about them is that the

After the success of mega retail stores that invested in Thailand, smaller stores began to complain that the hypermarkets were taking away their livelihoods. In response, a number of owners of smaller, independent retail outlets, as part of the Small Retailers' Association, handed a letter to the Ministry of Commerce on September 13 lobbying for a law to limit the expansion of the megastores in Thailand (see News this edition).



The latest news is that 15 megastore chains refused to sign a MOU agreeing to to halt the expansion of their businesses, and they held another meeting on September 20 to discuss their plans.

Here, Eam Thavornwongwongse, President of Phuket Chamber of Commerce, discusses the pros and cons of megastores.

consumer benefits from them because items bought there are cheaper than at small retail

The second is that people benefit from being employed by these retailers, even if they are managed by foreigners.

Really, there is no difference between a a megastore employing possibly hundreds of Thais in low-paid positions and a chain hotel employing equal numbers of Thais in similar posts. A job is a job.

The third benefit is that most of the goods sold by megastores here are produced in Thailand, rather than imported. I think megastores are better than the duty-free stores at the airport because all of the products for sale at duty-free stores are im-

Also, by virtue of the fact that megastores have large stocks of staple goods – such as rice and water – when, for example, the tsunami occurred, it was easy to find these items. If Phuket had been hit a few years before the arrival of the megastores, then supplies of these essentials may have begun to run down.

Yet megastores are not all good news.

The small retailers might lose out to the megastores, although – and somewhat ironically I might add – small retailers are often seen buying their stocks at megastores simply because the

prices there are cheaper than from other suppliers.

Phuket is much luckier than other provinces, because the traders who went out of business here were able to adjust to survive.

You can see most of the shophouses on Yaowarat Rd and Thalang Rd, which used to be retail shops, have been adapted by their owners to conduct other businesses, ones that support tourism, such as guesthouses, souvenir shops or restaurants.

We are a free-trade country, so it not strange at all if good businesses want to expand. If they are legal, then they cannot be forced to stop trading.

I sometimes feel that it is as if we – in Thailand – are living in a village that has only one shop that belongs to a villager and sells many goods. However, as the economy has improved, people now have cars or motorcycles and have started to buy goods from other villagers.

The village shop's owner cannot tell the villagers that they are forbidden to shop elsewhere. It is the same with the problems that we face now.

The thing that we are most worried about is that the megastores do not pay local taxes. The megastores pay taxes through their main offices, which are registered in Bangkok. It would be better if that money were collected and used locally.

For example, garbage produced at megastores is collected by the municipality for the area where the store is. Yet the municipality does not receive tax from them to pay for garbage collection; it all goes to Bangkok.

But it isn't just garbage collection. No local municipality receive funding from taxes collected from megastores in Phuket. As the Pattaya Chamber of Commerce said when they were angry about a similar situation, "If there is a fire in a Pattaya megastore, please call the *Bangkok* fire brigade to put it out."

I really think that we should not force megastores to open small chain stores because if they do, their small stores will be open 24 hours a day, and that might effect the independent cornershops. Or the megastores might change their marketing to offer free delivery to attract more customers, or offer Internet ordering. What then would the government do?

We have not seen this type of "anti-expansion" campaign against other industries. Phuket has never attempted to stop international chain hotels from opening or expanding existing properties here. Phuket is like a convenience store, really; it is open for free trade.

Goo and blow

here's exciting news for Thailand from the wonderful world of toilets. Soon the World Toilet Organization will sponsor its second World Toilet Expo and Forum in Bangkok. This heady event will be capped by celebrating World Toilet Day on November 19.

Together with the Public Health Ministry's Master Plan for Public Toilet Development, this will put Thailand in the forefront of the race to become the Toilet Hub of Southeast Asia.


But "hub" is not quite the right word for a toilet center. I favor a more toilet-oriented word like "seat". As the Toilet Seat of Southeast Asia, Thailand will be poised to blaze new trails in the realm of toiletdom. Our motto will be "The Nation That 'Can Do' in the Loo."

As an ardent toiletophile, I applaud the Public Health Ministry's campaign to develop Thailand's toilets. In a future column I will propose a radical new design for a super toilet that will be uniquely and quintessentially

But there's a problem: many existing Thai toilets have a serious defect that requires immediate corrective action. I first noticed this when I was teaching at a local university. The men's







bathroom didn't have soap or towels. After doing our business, we men could rinse off our hands, but we couldn't wash them properly nor dry them afterwards. Always we would emerge from the bathroom flapping our hands to dry them off.

I recently visited a Bangkok hospital, where I was stunned to see that there was no soap in the bathroom to wash with after pro-

viding stool and urine samples. For a hospital not to have soap in its bathrooms is a major offense against public hy-

The doctor said, "Oh, if we put soap in the

bathrooms, people will steal it." I was shocked. Presumably this was also the rationale for not putting soap or towels in the men's room at the university.

Is it conceivable that Thailand's toilets are a hub for soap and towel theft? Behind the smiles, are the lovely and charming Thai people petty thieves who stoop so low as to filch soap and towels from public bathrooms? [Why not? The rest of us are – Ed]

If so, I have stern news. Before Thailand can become the Toilet Seat of Southeast Asia, it is going to have to put an end to such shameless behavior and start putting soap and towels in its bathrooms.

Fortunately, the big hotels and shopping malls have found a solution to this problem. Their topof-the-line bathrooms don't feature actual soap and towels, but they do provide goo dispensers and electric hand-blowers.

The goo dispenser is a met-

al box attached to the bathroom wall. When you press a button, it excretes into your hand a slimy substance so lacking in aesthetic appeal that nobody in his right mind would try to steal it. Even if you did, how would you get it home? You can't put a gob of goo in your pocket without getting your pocket all greasy and making passers-by wonder about the origin of that growing stain on the front of your pants.

I'm not a goo fan. I prefer something less icky, something more solid and traditional to wash my hands with, like soap [because it's easier to steal - Ed]. But if soap theft is a problem, goo dispensers are a possible solution.

The managers of top-ofthe-line bathrooms have solved the towel-theft problem by shrewdly installing electric handblowers. These are very high-

tech; they thrill Yuppies and teenagers with their inherent trendiness.

After washing and rinsing your hands, you stick them under the hand-blower. A sensor detects

them and blows out a blast of warm air to dry them off. Unfortunately, if the sensor is sluggish, you might have to stand there for three or four minutes before it

And if you have very wet hands, you may have to activate the blower three or four times to get them really dry. You could end up spending 10 to 15 minutes just getting your hands dry. That could inspire fellow toilet-users to jeer at your incompetence. Oh, the shame.

Despite their shortcomings, the goo dispenser and the electric hand-blower are the way to go for bathroom managers who fear soap and towel theft, and I recommend them to the Ministry of Public Health.

ew Phuket residents realize that the island is right in the middle of sea crocodile territory. That's right, *Crocodylus porosus*, that fearsome modern-day dinosaur so famous in Australia, actually ranges through Burma, Bangladesh, India and all the way to Sri Lanka

Seen any on your beachfront lately? Even in that nearby mangrove estuary?

I doubt it. Until recently, the last confirmed *C porosus* sighting in Phang Nga Bay was 1971, and Phang Nga Bay is lined with mangrove swamps – or was until shrimp farms came along.

Then in November 2002, Miranda, a four-meter-long "saltie" was caught in deep mangroves near Phang Nga National Park headquarters. She is now at the Wildlife Breeding Center.

Thailand's sea croc extinction year is generally regarded as 1950. Since then, there have been two sightings. In 56 years, that's only two specimens of a predator so fearsome that their "ultimate reptile" image makes them appear invincible. What's scary is that these last two specimens may not even be native, but probably strayed down from Burma - sea crocs are noted long-distance, open-ocean swimmers. So for all intents and purposes, C. porosus is extinct in Thailand. That may seem like a good thing, but the saltie is a top predator that, when spotted, can indicate a healthy ecosystem.

So what happened?

We did. Humans hunted *C* porosus for their skins and meat, and we eventually drove them out of the region.

ELIMINATED

We destroyed coastal habitats so completely, especially mangroves, that no self-respecting croc would make its home here anyway. We've also eliminated their prey, replacing mouse deer and wild pigs with shrimp farms and marine rubbish.

Don't like salties? When is the last time you saw a sea turtle or gibbon in the wild? Perhaps you've spotted some natural wonders in a shark fin soup restaurant, but I run deep nature trips and I've had only three gibbon sightings in 17 years. Although I have swum with sea turtles in densely-developed Hawaii, I've never seen a wild sea turtle in Thailand.

There are several reasons that this ecosystem has deteriorated. Certainly, hunting crocs for their meat and skins takes its toll, but loss of habitat is the real silent villain.

I learned about habitat loss before I was 10 years old. I'm from Southern California, where we made our eco-mistakes in the 1950s. Every new Los Angeles freeway took its toll on burrowing owls, and the lucky (or unlucky) ones that survived made it to my living room.

It's no secret that habitat loss is a major contributor to extinction. However, it is mystifying when we ignore the lessons

Time to learn the lessons of Western mistakes

of history. America leveled its forests, allowing spring floods to overrun the Mississippi Valley. So what? Let's cut down some more jungle.

I recently saw a fashionable custom-built subdivision rising out of a fresh dirt hillside that looked distinctly similar to the California hills that turned into mudslides during my youth, showing that humans are another species that fall prey to clumsy human intervention.

We watched TV coverage of people losing their homes, and even their lives, in those mudslides. So let's cut down all our trees and cap our mountains. In 10 years we may wonder why Phuket has mudslides just like the ones we used to see on CNN.

After turning Phuket into rubber plantations, we should now turn that land into subdivisions. The damage done to that land occurred decades ago when we took out the jungle for agriculture. Now, we have plenty of rubber-tree flatlands slated for development. Let's use those open areas first, even if they may not have sea or hill views, instead of taking out more jungle.

Today's issue is encroachment into what little is left of Phuket's remaining jungle and forest. Don't think that all the animals are gone. Far from it –

owls, huge constrictors, cobras, colugos, serpent eagles and other rare birds still frequent Phuket's forests. We should protect this habitat from the constant pressures of development not only for the animals, but also for ourselves

That doesn't mean we should be anti-development, but we can be pro-planning. As long as we continue to over-populate the planet, we need to build. However, we can minimize the environmental damage with proper planning. Phuket is doing a fair job, but we can do a lot better.

Millionaire's Row is a spectacular spot with stunning homes, but should we have built on the point in the first place? Most responsible planners who don't work for developers would probably say "no", the point should have remained "greenbelt", to the

benefit of plants, animals and humans. But what's done is done, so we might as well enjoy the stunning homes.

That doesn't mean we should let it happen again. Let's habitate the open, level space on the island before we take out any more forests. Let's remind our landowners that *farang* spend more money on land with big trees than we do for plain dirt.

A governor's job is to be

pro-development, but Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura is doing a great job of striking the middle ground between conservation and business. All land officials should follow his balanced-growth example, especially when it comes to protecting our few remaining forests. Mudslides start where trees are absent.


We shouldn't be too quick to malign developers. It's easy to lay all the blame in one place, but at the end of the day, we buy their buildings. There are some tacky monstrosities popping up in the most inappropriate locations, but for every "take-the-money-and-run" walk-up, another developer builds a work of art.

And we can't blame it all on the Thais. Asians don't hold the monopoly on eco-disasters or extinction. Western examples including the Tasmanian Tiger, American Passenger Pigeon and thousands more species are rampant examples of Western irresponsibility.

Only this year, some arrogant bonehead German bureaucrat turned a comedy into a tragedy by ordering the shooting of Bruno the Bear, a bear that had been introduced into the Italian Alps and had unwittingly wandered into hostile German territory. Why did they not tranquilize Bruno, give him a radio collar and turn him into an environmental example?

We don't have to repeat Western mistakes in Thailand. Those mistakes are ours to learn from – and to eventually do better than the West.

Can that happen? Yes. Will it? Place your bets.





Recovering deleted digital photographs is a snap

f all the Windows tricks I've encountered over the years, this one has saved so many people, so many times, that you should consider cutting out this column and stuffing it in your camera bag.

Believe it or not, if you accidentally delete pictures on a digital camera, there are Windows programs that can help you get them back. The method isn't entirely foolproof, but if you just deleted the shots of the company outing to Ao Nang, and you didn't keep a backup, there is hope. Best of all, the photo undelete utility I like best doesn't cost a penny.

First, some perspective. Tell me if any of these things has ever happened to you:

- You were looking through the pictures on your camera, probably trying to zoom or rotate one of them, when you accidentally hit the wrong key and deleted the picture. Oops.
- You had to adjust a few camera settings, the phone rang, you dove to pick it up, and in the process you somehow managed to re-format the disk. Even bigger oops.
- You transferred all of the pictures from your camera to your computer, and the computer's hard drive conveniently turned belly-up. Time for a swear fest.

Don't tell anybody, but I've blown away pics all three ways. In the course of a week.

Luckily, cameras don't have fancy file systems. They use plain, old, simple FAT – the File Allocation Table approach pioneered in the original version of DOS, about 30 years ago. Bill Gates himself wrote much of the code for FAT in the days before Windows. Camera FAT works with memory cards much like DOS FAT worked with floppy

disks and, later, those "gigantic" 2 MB hard drives.

While FAT has few redeeming values, one of its great virtues lies in the way that it deletes files. Or, actually, in the way

it doesn't delete files. Cameras (via FAT) divvy up their memory card space into COMPUTER fixed-size

chunks. When you take a picture, the camera grabs enough unused chunks of the memory card to hold the picture, transfers the picture from the camera's computer to the card, and marks the

chunks of memory as being "in use". Easy.

When you tell your camera to delete a picture, it doesn't really delete anything. It just changes the first character of the file

> name to a reserved character that signifies, in effect, "the next time you need a chunk of memo-

ry, you can use all of the chunks that used to belong to this pic-

File undelete programs take advantage of the fact that the data - your picture - isn't actually deleted until the camera needs to re-use the space on the memory card. With a bit of luck, you can recover pictures that you took a long, long time ago.

Here's how to get the pics

- 1. Don't use the camera! More precisely, don't use the memory card that holds the pictures. Every time you use the memory card – or on some cameras, every time you stick the memory card back in the camera – you stand the chance of overwriting some of your old pic-
- 2. Go to www.snapfiles. com/get/restoration.html and get the latest version of the program called Restoration.

While Restoration isn't the fanciest file undelete program on the block, it works very well, and it's 100% free thanks to creator Brian Kato.

Restoration doesn't have an installer – it's a simple zipped ".exe" program. If you have a thumb drive, it's well worth schlepping Restoration around as part of your emergency bag of

3. If the card is still in the camera, connect the camera to your PC in the usual way – probably through a USB port. If the card is out of the camera, buy or borrow a card reader, stick the card in the reader and connect the reader to your PC. You can pick up good quality multi-format card readers for much less than 500 baht at any computer store.

4. Double-click on the downloaded file REST2514.ZIP. Restoration asks for a location to place the folder REST2514, which will contain all of the program files. In the Extract To dialog box, click Reference and choose a good location (such as C:\Program Files). Then click

5. Find the folder you extracted, then double-click on Restoration.exe. For example, if you extracted to C:\Program Files, you need to run C:\Program Files\REST2514\Resoration.exe.

6. Follow the on-screen instructions to find and recover the deleted files.

Restoration restores only one file at a time – which can be terribly time-consuming if you deleted all the pictures on that fancy new 2 GB card. Restoration can also be a bit snarly to work with, particularly because of its bare-bones interface. I know of two good alternatives to Restoration, but they're both pricey:

File Scavenger from Que-Tek (www.quetek.com/prod02. htm) has a vastly superior user interface, although there's no way to view files before undeleting them. That's particularly vexing because cameras have such clever methods for naming files – it's hard to choose between, say, IMG000213.JPG and IMG 000214.JPG when you don't know which picture is which. The free demo version of File Scavenger will recover only files up to 64 KB in size, which is much too small for testing with camera photos. The paid Personal Use version costs US\$49 (about 1,800 baht).

Recover My Files Data Recovery from GetData Software (www.getdata.com) clearly takes the top spot on the undelete heap. With a fully-fledged user interface, including previews, Recover My Files even lets you burn recovered files directly to CD or DVD. The demo version lets you see your pictures, but doesn't let you save them. The full Recover My Files costs US\$69.95 (about 2,600 baht). It'll undelete files on just about any imaginable kind of storage medium. If you want the camera-only Recover My Photos version, it's just US\$39.95, (1,500 baht).

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
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Sauce maker decides hotel biz looks tasty

Minimum wage to rise?

PHUKET: Decha Pruekpatanarak, Chief of Phuket Provincial Labor Office, has applied to the caretaker Cabinet for the minimum wage in Phuket to rise by three baht – from 181 baht a day to 184 baht –with effect from October 1.

K. Decha told the *Gazette*, "Currently the minimum wage in Phuket is 181 baht, which was set January 1 this year, but the cost of living in Phuket has risen due to many factors, including the rising price of fuel, inflation and economic expansion."

However, K. Decha admit-

ted that he was concerned that the higher minimum wage would contribute to inflation on the is-

"I am worried that once the minimum wage has been increased, prices will increase too. The new wage rate will affect everyone from unskilled labor to government officers," he said.

Only Bangkok has a higher minimum wage than Phuket; there it is 184 baht a day.

Chon Buri province has the third-highest minimum wage rate in the country, a long way behind Phuket at 166 baht a day.

The joys of inflation – Japanese style

entral bankers frequently talk about the risks of inflation, but only occasionally do they refer to the opposite: deflation. This is not surprising when one considers the economic history of the world; during the past 60 years cases of inflation far outnumber deflation.

Japan, for several years in the late 1990s and early 2000s, felt the effects of deflation and it was an ugly situation. When people believe that prices will fall in the near future, they naturally postpone decisions relating to making purchases. Why buy today what can be bought cheaper next year?

The consequences of this situation are, ultimately, extremely damaging. Everything starts to contract instead of expand. Real estate prices and stock market

values fall, and companies move into survival mode. The Japanese central bank, the Bank of Japan, had to move to a zero-interestrate policy and commercial banks started to charge customers for depositing their cash, providing them with no more than a securi- By Richard Watson ty service.



Thankfully, times have changed. Real inflation appears to exist in Japan, although it is difficult to assess because the method of calculation has recently been altered. The Governor of the Bank of Japan, Toshihiko Fukui, assures everyone that inflation is real, albeit muted.

Economic growth is evident and companies operating railway networks are, suddenly, becoming the rumored target for takeovers. It is not that Japanese railways have become the new frontier for investment; it is the value of the real estate they own that is making them attractive. Real estate prices are on the move upward – a significant change after a decade or so of falling

When people think of Japan as a possible investment destination it is usually in terms of wellknown Japanese companies such as Toyota, Honda, Mitsubishi, Canon, Toshiba and so on. The reality is that Japan is much more than an exporting nation – it is the world's second-largest economy.

Investors usually refer to Japanese stock markets in terms of the Nikkei Dow, which is still a superficial approach. Japan is

also home to the second-largest stock market and has almost 4,000 companies. The Nikkei Dow simply tracks the largest 225 of them. A far better index is the TOPIX, which covers more than 1,600 companies and gives access to firms that are virtually unknown outside Japan but are, nevertheless, important to the overall wealth of Japan Inc.

September saw the release of capital investment spending figures by Japanese companies in the second quarter of 2006 and they are spectacular - an increase of 16.6% on the same period in 2005. This reflects, unless it is statistical aberration, a very definite sign of growing confidence. These are the highest figures recorded in 20 years.

Orbis Investment Management, one of my favorite mutual fund management companies,

some months ago said that they had moved positions in their Japan Equity Fund in favor of the domestic market at the expense of export-oriented com-

The fund's managers were concerned that they had perhaps moved too early, and the economic figures

appear to support their concern. This frequently happens in the investment world; you know a party is going to start, but you arrive early and just have to wait. It is far better and more profitable than investing at a peak which is much more common, unfortunately, for most retail investors.

While on the subject of Orbis, I should mention that their funds are closed to new investors and have been since March 17. I tried to draw their investor relations department in Bermuda into telling me when they will reopen. Their response was, "We

After pressing the issue I was told to contact their "in house legal counsel", which I did by email. The response, in a nutshell, was the same. Apparently there are too many factors involved, and they quoted their president's statement, "Orbis view this as a marathon and not a sprint."

Existing investors are welcome to invest new money and can deal normally, only new clients are currently barred. One of the biggest problems they face is complying with anti-money-laundering regulations. Orbis, unfortunately for them, deal directly

with the public as well as financial institutions. Dealing with the former, in this new world of bureaucracy since 9/11, creates headaches for any financial busi-

ness. Swiss banks, for example, now estimate that 5.1% of their total expenditure is on regulation compliance.

To recap, for the very few

who are not yet aware of the new world of compliance, this is effectively a result of 9/11. The US government formed the FATF (Financial Action Task Force) to cooperate with governments around the world to, supposedly, enforce strict anti-money-laundering regulations with the goal of stopping terrorist and organized crime syndicates from using financial and banking systems.

Naturally, terrorist groups now use other routes and anything remotely worthy of the name "organized crime" are sophisticated enough to run circles around the system. That leaves the general public having to leap through hoops to meet all the requirements of these new regulations.

These regulations have spawned a whole new industry in the private sector for countless bureaucrats, and are a sure-fire way to reduce unemployment. Should you be under the impression that these new "compliance officers" are not serious about their business, you are not well informed. The sales department of one financial institution told me that they refer to their own compliance department as the "business resistance unit".

What governments are really trying to catch is not related to terrorism or organized crime, but everyday tax that their longsuffering public tries to avoid.



n his 10 years in Bangkok and two years in Phuket working as an interior design consultant, Kosol Sermboonyasuk of Art One Co Ltd, on Suthat Rd in Phuket City, has seen home trends come and go – and people's top choice nowadays, he says, is minimalism.

Lotus Gardens bloom

he 26 contemporary condominium units being built on 7.5 rai at Lotus Gardens, about 200 meters from Layan Beach, are on target for completion in Novem-

Tony Nixon, a development partner of Lotus Gardens, explained that work on Lotus Gardens began in June 2005, adding to Yaowalak Sangiemkul's already extensive list of development projects on the island, including Surin Heights, Nakatani Village, Baan Chai Lei and Palm Beach Club.

"The project now is about 80% complete. All of the building structures are complete and all the electrical and plumbing systems have been installed," Mr Nixon added.

Lotus Gardens will comprise six blocks, with the two blocks atop steps and facing Layan Beach called Sunset Residences and the other four, facing the garden areas, called Garden Residences.

The Sunset Residence blocks will each contain four single-level, two-bedroom condominiums stepped up from the garden and a three-bedroom penthouses occupying the two top levels of the block. Each Sunset Residence unit will have a private 3.8 x 2.5 meter plunge pool, a sala on the deck area and a private courtyard that can be accessed from the bedrooms.

Each of the two-bedroom condos will have an equipped kitchen, living and dining area, ensuite bathrooms adjoining the bedrooms, a toilet and a study totaling 203square meters of internal

space. The plunge pool, courtyards and outside deck are set on an external area of 110sqm.

"The study can be used as

a third bedroom if the buyer and comwants, and we have included a toilet nearby so guests will not need to enter your bedrooms," Mr Nixon said.

Each Sunset penthouse will include one bedroom with ensuite bathroom, kitchen, a living and dining area on the lower level and two bedrooms on the upper level. The total internal area will be 337sqm, and the external area 146sqm.

The Garden Residence will comprise four buildings set to face extensive landscaping featuring swimming pools, massage salas

munal areas for social events

that feature a bar deck, party lawn and moon pool.

Each Garden Residence block will house two two-bedroom condominiums on the ground floor, and two duplex three-bedroom penthouses on the two top floors.

The two-bedroom units will have an internal area of 137sqm, including two bedrooms with ensuite bathrooms, kitchen, living and dining areas. The external area will cover 75sqm, and include a sala and a courtyard.

The Garden penthouses will feature three bedrooms on the lower level, each with an en-suite bathroom and walk-in wardrobe. The kitchen, living area and dining room will be on the upper level, and open onto outdoor areas.

"We set aside 40% of the area to be the gardens, because the whole idea of the development is that no one looks directly in on anyone else. So everyone has their own private residence with 50 or 60 meters' width of garden at the front of them," Mr

Sunset condominiums cost 17.9 million baht each, while Sunset penthouses cost 19.9 million baht apiece. Garden Residence condominiums each cost 13.75 million baht, while the Garden penthouses cost 19.9 million baht a unit.

"We have customers from Scandinavia, England, Singapore, Hong Kong and other markets.

Our project is located in the north of Bang Tao. We want to offer customers the beach, a relaxing lifestyle and low-density

living," he said.



hat is it with pink? We in the West have a lot to an swer for. It would seem that many consider the color to be perfect for anything vaguely feminine. I'm not even sure that it's the females that have made this decision – perhaps the red-blooded macho blokes from my end of the world have decided to associate all sorts of ideas with something as simple and uncomplicated as a color.

It's probably the fault of parents in the West, to be honest. They bear a child who happens to be of the female gender. What's the first thing that dad does as soon as the little darling arrives home, if not before? Paint the bedroom walls pink. There are even stories of parents who have had an ultrasound done (does anyone really recognize babies in those black splodges?), and the doctor has missed the image of the rather important part of the anatomy that identifies a son.

Panic ensues. The bedroom was painted months ago. The father can't possibly put his future son and heir in a room painted pink – he might be scarred for life, perish the thought. A quick visit to the Western equivalent of HomePro later, and he's armed with a few gallons of blue to splash on the walls, to keep his son on the straight and narrow. I'm surprised the more radical types haven't accused these parents of being discriminatory.

So why on earth is it blue for boys and pink for girls? Who decided that pink was a bit limp-wristed in the first place? What about orange? Or purple? Thais have got it absolutely right in this regard – they simply don't care. You see strapping lads the size of brick outhouses wearing the brightest gayest pinkest shirts you could ever imagine in this neck of the woods - try going up to one of them and telling him his shirt's a bit dodgy. I dare you.

I went past a school the other day whose students had a particularly distinctive uniform purple nylon sports trousers with bright pink shirts. And why not. I used to think I was hugely daring when I bucked society's rules in deepest darkest Yorkshire by occasionally wearing pink socks in my youth, as we all did. After all, were hip and cool.

Now I have a pink shirt here in Phuket (it actually leans towards peach) which sits at the bottom of my clothes pile. Every time I go out wearing it, merciless jibes are the inevitable result. I should be a little more willing to wear pink, I suppose, but then again blue is my favorite – it's a boy's color. Some things just never change.

Back to the pink thing, and something gardeningesque in subject matter. I wanted to call this one the pink spider lily, but it's actually the Crinum amabile, also known as giant spider lily, or

swamp lily. This particular epithet is perhaps a little unfair, given its particularly un-swamp-dwelling looks; it would be more at home in Kew Gardens, or in the grounds of a royal palace somewhere. In Thai it's known as a phlap phleung.

The giant spider lily is what the scientific types refer to as a "herbaceous perennial". All that means in more normal language is that it doesn't have any woody parts to it (it's mainly water) and it lasts for more than two growing seasons.

Those so-called "experts" in the botanical field are thrown into disarray when it comes to this plant. The Crinum amabile has a confusing and hard-to-sort-out history. It's likely to have been confused in the past with other similar plants. As far as most of them are concerned now, it's a

by many to be a hybrid between a couple of other Crinum species that are too boring to list.

The linear, sword-like leathery leaves grow in a kind of rosette shape. These glossy leaves are a deep, greenish-red and reach a length of around one meter. Now this is where the pink connection comes in – you knew there had to be one somewhere. Pink, fragrant flowers with small, red stripes sit on top of a succulent, cylindrical flower stalk, which is up to about a

A 15-centimeter-long floral tube bears six petals and sepals, and rosy stamens appear from the throat of the tube. These dramatically striking, fragrant flowers appear during most seasons of the year. The fruits of the swamp lily (or whatever you want to call it) are lobed seed capsules that are 3 or 4 cm thick. The mechanics

of growing are fairly unusual, too – it appears from large bulbs that protrude above the soil line.

They may well need a little attention once in a while. The flowering stalks can grow a bit too enthusiastically for their own good and become top-heavy, so they might need a little extra support in the form of stakes to keep them from falling over. Also, as the blossoms fade, the stalks should be removed back

to the bulb. The only other thing you'll need to do is remove yellowing leaves throughout the growing season. They like it like

Propagation of the *Crinum* amabile is dead easy: All you need to start new plants is to divide older clumps. Literally grab bunches of the things, with their bulbs, and move them to their new home. They'll start producing clones of themselves in no time.

This lily is happiest in soils that are moderately moist. Irrigation during the dry season is a good idea, although any additional water at this time of the year would be a bit of a pointless exercise, assuming it's in the line of fire for rain.

If you plant it in full sun to partial shade, it will give you maximum growth and flowering. The giant spider lily is fairly tolerant of salt spray and grows well in coastal communities (Phuket being no exception), but you'll need to make sure it's kept away from direct salt spray. It's not one for the beach.


Apart from planting these things, it's good to see that Phuket is doing its bit to change the image of the color pink, anyway. Besides the odd Crinum amabile dotted around, some businesses are trying hard too.

I've heard tell that the Pink Lady, an entertainment establishment in the center of Phuket City, is hardly the sort of place that's associated with anything even remotely "light in the loafers" as they say. Laudable. Perhaps I'll pop in for a pink gin. Cheers.
