Dane on bail after road rage

CHALONG: Lars Anders Olov Persson, 45, from Denmark, has been released on bail after being charged with auto theft, reckless driving and destruction of government and private property caused during a road rampage in a stolen a pickup truck on December 13.

Persson hit more than a dozen motorcycles, a number of pedestrians and caused extensive damage to other vehicles.

He was finally caught after ramming a fire truck being used as a roadblock.

Pol Lt Col Pheerapan Meemak of Chalong Police Station told the *Gazette* that police received a report that a silver Isuzu D-MAX had been stolen from in front of Pae Leng restaurant at 11:20 am.

Col Pheerapan stationed police at key traffic locations in the area to catch the thief.

Persson was spotted by police as he sped past them as he turned from Wiset Rd onto Saiyuan Rd in Rawai.

On Soi Yanui, he hit six parked motorcycles and clipped 68-year-old Prasert Tamchu, then went on to hit two more motorbikes and an SMI Travel minivan parked by the side of the road.

Persson then proceeded to Kata Viewpoint, hitting four more parked motorcycles and five villagers along the way. None of the victims were seriously injured.

He then sped on to Kata Noi, racking up four more motorbikes en route.

By that time police had commandeered a fire engine from Karon Municipality and used it to block the intersection at the bottom of the hill at the Orchidacea Resort.

Undeterred, Persson rammed the D-MAX into the truck at speed, bursting its right front tire in the process.

Despite having several bloody wounds, he then attempted to flee on foot, but was apprehended by police officers, Col Pheeraphan said.

Col Pheeraphan added that earlier in the week, Chalong Police had had to intercede in a fracas at a beer bar in Karon in which Mr Persson was involved.

A date has yet to be set for Persson's appearance in court.

Rawai footballer beaten to death

RAWAI: Fisherman and promising amateur footballer Santi Naunyai, 21, was beaten to death by a gang of young men while he was on his way home from a party in Rawai early on December 13.

Pol Lt Col Sirisak Wasasiri, Deputy Superintendent of Chalong Police Station, said, "On the night of his death, the victim had been to a friend's birthday party in Rawai.

"On his way home he was attacked by five young men who dragged him onto Rawai Beach and beat him with an iron pipe."

Later that morning police arrested Jalan Rerngkij, Banrae Rerngsamooth, Somkiat Panthip and Theerapat Apdulraman, all from Baan Maphrao. All had blood stains on their clothing but denied the charges, Col Sirisak said.

A fifth suspect, whose name has not yet been released by police, later gave himself up at Chalong Police Station. He also denied any involvement in the attack.

Col Sirisak said that Santi and his friends had fought with the gang earlier in the week and that revenge was the assumed motive for the killing.

Police trace DNA in Friendship Beach murder

CHALONG: The case originally described by police as a daylight rape-murder at Friendship Beach is being re-examined, as police found no trace of a struggle near the body of motorbike taxi driver Tada Sa-nunsak.

Police now report that they are testing DNA found at the scene against potential suspects, but two suspects have already been cleared.

K. Tada, 45, was found dead on Friendship Beach in Rawai on June 28. Forensic tests show she had sex with a man not long before her throat was slit, but since there was no struggle police believe she knew her attacker.

Pol Col Chalit Kaewyarat, Superintendent of Chalong Police Station, told the Gazette, "We have sent DNA samples from many suspects to the forensic science lab in Bangkok. The first two suspects have been cleared, and we are now awaiting the results from the sample of the last man she is known to have been with."

Previous police reports said that K. Tada had served time in Phuket Provincial Prison for drug offenses, then worked as a motorbike taxi driver upon her release.

"We didn't find any traces of a struggle at the scene, but the autopsy revealed that she had sex just before she died on the beach.

'We don't believe this is a rape-murder case, but we are still investigating", Col Chalit said.

Tsunami victim centers open in Phuket and Phang Nga

KOH SIREH: The Austria-Phuket Community Center on Koh Sireh – which aims to help tsunami victims in their daily lives and long-term development in terms of income, occupation, education and health – was officially opened December 15.

The 23-million-baht center consists of three buildings and includes a library, kindergarten, training center, health center and a community park, and is a joint effort between Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) and the Hilswerk Foundation.

At the opening were Austrian Ambassador to Thailand Dr Arno Riedl, Democrat Party leader Abhisit Vejjajiva, Phuket OrBorJor President Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutr, Dr Heidi Burkhart of the Hilswerk Foundation, and Dr Walter Koren, Commercial Advisor to the Austrian Embassy in Bangkok.

K. Abhisit, said, "Two years on [from the tsunami] we can now say that we have almost fully recovered.

"In no small part that recovery has been due to the friendship and cooperation of friends like the Hilswerk Austria Foundation as well as the hard work done by the local authorities.

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Immigration delays mar tourist arrivals

MAI KHAO: Despite having 60 Immigration officers stationed at Phuket International Airport (PIA), travelers landing on the island are having to suffer lengthy delays in being cleared through Immigration.

Pol Col Surasak Authapanyawanich, Superintendent of Immigration at PIA, explained to the *Gazette* that the long delays are the result of a surge in the number of passengers from 3,000 a day this time last year to more than 7,000 a day this year.

Adding to the problem, he said, was that renovations at the airport had forced the closure of two Immigration clearance counters

"Renovations that started in September have forced closure of three out of eight counters," he said.

Police hunt for Kamala rapist

KAMALA: Police are searching for a Thai man accused of raping a 23-year-old French tourist early on December 7. Police declined to release the name of the suspect.

Pol Maj Monsak Srisuwan of Kamala Police Station, said that the woman, a waitress in France who was in Phuket on holiday, told police that about 2:30 am as she was walking back from a bar to her rented house, she was grabbed by a man, dragged into a car repair garage and raped.

After reporting the attack, the woman was taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital to be examined. Police are still waiting on the results of the tests, he added.

The victim returned to France on December 13 after testifying in court.

"We know the identity of the attacker and have issued a warrant for his arrest. He is a local man, but he has managed to elude the police," Maj Monsak added.

New Year road-safety campaign sets target for 3 dead, 39 injured

PHUKET: Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit held a meeting of provincial office chiefs on December 18 to launch the provincial government's road-safety campaign for the New Year holiday period from December 28 to January 3.

As part of the campaign, the Phuket Provincial Office of Disaster and Mitigation (ODPM) has set a target of no more than three deaths and 39 people injured in road accidents on Phuket during the traditionally dangerous period on the roads.

The ODPM has also set a target of less than 34 road accidents on the island during that time.

Last year, two people died and 90 people were injured in Phuket road accidents between December 29 and January 4.

On December 16, three checkpoints were set up in each district where officers are on the lookout for drunk drivers, speeding, motorbike riders not wearing helmets, car drivers not wearing seat belts, illegally modified motorbikes and unlicensed drivers until December 27.

Each checkpoint is giving away free chewing gum to drivers in a bid to to reduce sleepiness while behind the wheel.

In addition, the ODPM will hold a road-safety fair in front of the Phuket City Municipality offices on Narisorn Rd, Phuket City, on December 27. Exhibitions showing how safety can prevent accidents, and demonstrations of how to assist people injured in road accidents will be on display.



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

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Poor way

huket's world-renowned status as a paradise isle is a magnet for tourists and hopeful workers alike, but the rapid influx is stretching the limited space and resources of the island beyond capacity.

Phuket has 290,000 registered residents, but its economic growth has attracted a vast body of unregistered migrant workers from around the nation and abroad, all looking to cash in on the tourism bonanza.

Estimates by government officials claim that up to 500,000 actual residents are on the island. The provincial government, however, bases its budget allocation on the official figure of 290,000 residents.

Adding in the almost 5 million tourists that come to this 543square-kilometer isle each year, one starts to get an idea of the extent and nature of the problem.

This is the local context for the national Thai Poverty Registration Project, which was started in 2003 and aims to identify, quantify and rectify the major issues associated with poverty throughout the country.

As of September 2006, the project database indicated that there were 7.5 million people in Thailand living below the poverty line – earning less than US\$2, or about 69 baht, per day.

In Phuket, that includes 23,314 people registered as financially distressed, and 12,016 listed as homeless.

ACTION

Two key government agencies attempting to reduce the number of people living in poverty are the Bureau of Community Development (BCD) and the Skill Development Center (SDC).

The former is responsible for the Mai Khao mussel farm project, in which the province provided 53,100 baht for 300 pods (at 55 baht each) of sea mussel breeding stock and three cages, to be shared by nine farms.

Patcharee Klomsayna, 27, is running one of the farms on behalf of her sick father. She is also the leader of a mussel-breeding co-operative in Mai Khao.

"We started raising shellfish long before the tsunami, and my father has been a fisherman since before I was born. We have been living here all our lives, and raising shellfish is what we do for a living," she said.

K. Patcharee told the *Gazette* that after the tsunami they heard that the government wanted poor people to register their names so that they could be provided with recovery assistance.

In 2004, K. Patcharee and her family registered twice, once

at the mosque near their village and later at Phuket City Hall, in hopes of getting help to restore their sea mussel farm.

The village received 500,000 baht from the Department of Fisheries (DOF) for disaster relief soon after the tsunami and put it to use buying nets, lumber and other necessities for restoring their farms. The assistance from the BCD only arrived about three months ago, but it too has been put to use buying mussel stock for the farms.

"We just put the mussels in the water about two months ago, now we have to wait and see how they grow and what kind of shape they are in by April of next year," K. Patcharee said.

"In the past it took the shells only about four months to grow, but because the sea has been polluted by the nearby shrimp farms, and because more people are farming in the same area – which means there is less food in the water – it now takes seven months for them to grow big enough for sale. We are selling sea mussels to the distributor for 13 baht a kilo," she explained.

"What we need most right now is money to upgrade our farm, to repair our mussel cages and to meet criteria to qualify for a loan from the bank. We can then use that money to expand our farm," K. Patcharee said. "We would also like govern-

"We would also like government funding to start breeding sea bass along with the mussels, as they complement each other, making for more efficient use of fodder.

"Also, bass are very popular, and it only takes four months for them to grow. They are now selling at 150 baht a kilo, and each fish weighs about 500 grams to one kilo. So it will be a good way to start something new and supplement income from the mussels," she explained.

K. Patcharee collects 50 baht in monthly dues from each of the 46 members of her co-op-

erative, which is put into a fund reserved for interest-free loans.

She added that the co-operative, together with the DOF, has plans to turn their sea mussel farm into a tourist attraction where visitors are educated about shellfish breeding and the way of life of coastal Thai villagers.

The Mai Khao project, backed by the DOF and BCD, seems to be succeeding, but not all projects take hold. For example, a jewelry-making training program in Rawai has left villagers frustrated and no better off than before, they say.

Yajai Kongtuk and Somsri Prameangkit were two of the 10 women who went through a jewelry-making class for five days in September of this year, and said the skills they learned were not enough to set up a business or become financially independent.

They explained that the BCD was supposed to provide all the tools and supplies for the class to make jewelry, but there were not enough to go around, so the trainees had to share glass beads and implements, and buy some implements, such as scissors, for themselves.

They were taught during the day and left with the tools and glass beads to practice at night, but they were only given enough to make two necklaces a day.

After the training was over, they were left the tools and glass beads from the classes, with which they made some necklaces and earrings. They sold these pieces at festivals and temple fairs organized by the province, but managed to make only 960 baht among all 10 women.

They added that they appreciated what the BCD had done for them, but what they really needed was the capital to buy enough materials to work full time.

The initial costs for stones or pearls was too high for them to put up themselves, and it was too much money to risk borrowing, since such expensive items might be difficult to sell, they said.

K. Yajai and K. Somsri went on to say that loans were available from some people in the village, but they entailed 20% interest on top of the monthly 100baht installments.

So now the women are filling orders on demand, part-time, and helping their husbands sell the fish and shellfish the men catch.

Marasri Pramungkit is the only one of the 10 trainees still working full time making jewelry, using a loan her family received from the village reserve fund during the Thaksin government's administration. She said her sales were increasing due to the onset of high season, and that she regularly supplied retailers at shopping centers including Central Festival Phuket.

Sejthachai Saisang, an officer at the BCD, said that attitude was key in any project. Willingness to learn new things and adapt, and a belief in their own ability to rise out of poverty was essential, he added.

However, it is obvious that positive attitude alone isn't enough, as indicated by K. Sejthachai's request to Phuket Municipality for a 200% increase in his budget in 2007.

Thavicha Chaitong, Phuket Administrative Secretary, said the government has mapped out a poverty alleviation strategy with incremental phases, aimed at bringing 40% of the people in poverty above the poverty line by the end of this year, 30% in 2007 and a final 30% in 2008.

If the goals were not reached, he said, the problem would be referred back to Bangkok for further help.


He said that there were several issues contributing to poverty on the island, including sky-rocketing land values, rapid influx of migrant labor, and those who were beyond help due to self-destructive habits.

One important measure was taking an accurate door-to-door census, which K. Thavicha said would be done imminently. This would enable much more realistic budget allocation, he said.

People need to learn to be self-sufficient, K. Thavicha concluded, the government can provide education and inspiration, but financial aid should not be expected.







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Queer News Monkey biz

when, in the early hours of December 9 Pol Maj Narongwet Ohnsungnen, an Inspector with the Amnat Charoen Highway Police, received a tip-off that a pickup truck with a cargo of illegally obtained wildlife was heading his way, he acted swiftly.

He ordered road blocks to be set up and at 3:30 am an old bronze Mazda pickup – exactly matching the description given by the informant – turned up at one of them.

The game was not up so easily, however. Instead of stopping, the driver sped through the checkpoint. All units were mobilized to give chase and eventually the suspects were caught near Baan Kai Kham.

Crammed in the back of the truck, police found 85 long-tailed macaques, all in a pitiful condition.

The driver of the truck, Pramot Seupsing, 30, and his accomplice, Sompot Phlaphon, also 30, possibly realizing that claiming the monkeys climbed in by themselves wouldn't fool the fine minds of the Highway Police, promptly confessed that they had snatched the animals from nearby Don Pu Ta wildlife sanctuary.

This in itself is not so uncommon a story; the smuggling of protected wildlife for food, fur or the pet trade is a worldwide problem.

However, according to the two suspects, the monkeys in question were not destined for a Chinese or Korean banquet, but had been ordered by monks in Central Thailand.

The men admitted that this was not the first time they had been involved in monkey rustling and that the

hen, in the early hours of December 9 Pol Maj Narongwet Ohnsungnen, an Inspector nat Charoen Highway ed a tip-off that a pickup rgo of illegally obtained animals were highly valued at temples as they are popular among villagers and encourage locals to come to temple fairs and donate generously. They also cast the temples in a good light as they are seen to be caring for wild animals, the rustlers claimed.

A few days later this seemingly wild allegation was given substance by no less a person than Phra Khru Kittiphachakhun, the Lord Abbot of Chondaen District, Phetchabun, who admitted that a monk in his district had previously been accused of receiving stolen monkeys and might well be involved in this case.

The Lord Abbot explained that in previous cases, the monk in question had managed to retain his position due to lack of evidence. He urged police to check the monk's bank account for any suspicious transactions.


"If we can prove that this monk is involved in monkey smuggling then we will discipline him to the full extent of the rules of the Buddhist clergy before turning him over to the police," the Lord Abbot said.

As for the police, their glory quickly turned to shame when it was revealed that 37 of the seized monkeys died in their care.

Wisanu Ratanaphan, from the Amnat Charoen Natural Resources and Environment Office, blasted the police saying, "Had the police cooperated with us earlier then the monkeys would not have died like this."

He added that two months earlier, police had come to the assistance of villagers who had found a large python, but had then let the animal starve to death "in their care".

Migrant workers 'deserve fewer rights'

study of migrant labor in Thailand has reported that 50% of employers nationwide believe imported workers do not deserve the same rights as Thais.

The study published December 13 said employers restricted movement of their migrant staff, including locking them up at night.

These and other troubling findings are included in the report The Mekong Challenge – Underpaid, Overworked and Overlooked: The realities of young migrant workers in Thailand.

It was conducted by the Institute for Population and Social Research at Mahidol University with the support of the International Labor Organization (ILO).

The report said that 60% of domestic workers were forbidden from leaving their workplaces.

Restriction of movement was imposed on 43% of workers in the agriculture, fishing and manufacturing sectors. Employers guaranteed their migrant staff could not go anywhere by confiscating identity cards.

Most migrant workers involved were Burmese. There were a small number of laborers from Laos and Cambodia. The survey was conducted between February and October last year.

"Some 70% of employers said migrant workers should not leave the workplace," ILO consultant and research director Elaine Pearson said.

About half the employers in all sectors agreed "migrants should be locked up at night to ensure they do not escape," the report said.

However, the report noted that mobile telephones had allowed migrants, especially domestic workers, a means of communication.

Between 7% and 9% of fishing, manufacturing and domestic workers reported physical abuse by employers.

Forty-one percent of migrant domestic helpers earned 1,000 baht or less a month.

Ms Pearson said that "50% of employers believe migrant workers should not have the same rights as Thai workers".

Compromised convictions? Almost 600 convicted criminals are to have their cases re-investigated because the Corrections Department believes they may be innocent.

The department said that 561 convicted criminals could have been wrongly convicted. It added that 7,206 convicted people had submitted claims of wrongful conviction.

"Our crosschecks are intended to help the innocent and not to find fault with the justice system," Justice Ministry Deputy Permanent Secretary Kittipong





Montha, agreed to look after the boy until his parents could be located.

Moon Party two years ago, 17 people died.

More recently, a longtail boat sank 50 miles west of Koh Pha-ngan while out on a sightseeing tour of the neighboring National Marine Park.

Four tourists from Germany and Japan were stranded for 17 hours before they were finally rescued.

Lopburi Yothasiri, Chief of the Samui Marine Department office, said that he hopes to prevent such accidents in the coming months by patrolling the waters around Samui and the neighboring islands.

He added that his officers would also monitor safety procedures closely and check passenger numbers on boats traveling in the area.

Fewer Thai tourists: Kit "Steven" Pharaphuti, Manager of Lompraya, one of Samui's largest sea transport firms, said that during major Thai holidays the number of Thai passengers has dropped from 90% to less than 10% on the company's highspeed catamarans to popular locations such as Koh Pha-ngan and Koh Tao.

K. Kit believes that many tourist businesses on Koh Samui are so focused on the European market that they neglect to cater to domestic travelers.

He added that the Andaman coast is becoming increasingly popular with Thai tourists, who appreciate its natural beauty and can take advantage of low cost airfares for long weekends and public holidays.

Lompraya offers membership cards with special benefits to Thai passengers, but has found that, on routes from Koh Samui, its business comes almost entirely from foreign passengers. **Brit stabbed in robbery:** Late last month Englishman Kevin Smith, 36, was attacked and robbed while riding his motorbike on Samui's main island ring road.

According to an eyewitness who called the police, three Thai men on a scooter pulled up alongside Mr Smith and demanded that he stop the vehicle.

When he did, they attacked him, stabbing him in the side and taking his wallet, which contained 1,000 baht.

Pol Col Chaiyut Nirawong, Superintendent of Samui District Police Station, and an investigation team led by Pol Lt Boonma Geawlaiyat worked quickly to catch the man's attackers.


Officers quickly apprehended three male suspects who then confessed to the robbery and were taken into custody pending prosecution.

Mr Smith was taken to Koh Samui Hospital and treated for serious injuries including stab wounds to the chest. **Immigration fraud:** The Samui Immigration Office recently issued a warning to tourists regarding fraudsters on the island pretending to be officials and demanding money from foreigners.

A spokesperson for the island's immigration office said that a group of men masquerading as Immigration Police were demanding to see tourists' papers and then imposing on-thespot fines if foreigners could not produce a valid passport or showed a visa that was out of date.

Immigration officials occasionally organize spot checks on Samui for security reasons, but these are rarely random and the officers always use an Immigration Department vehicle, making it easier to identify them as genuine Immigration officers.

Samui Immigration urges anyone who suspects they have been approached by bogus officers to immediately report the incident.





he Patani United Liberation Organisation (Pulo), a long-standing separatist organization fighting for autonomy in the Malay-speaking South, has accused security forces and village defense volunteers of carrying out targeted killings in the restive region.

In a statement to The Nation newspaper on December 14, Pulo said that they and local Malay Muslim villagers were aware that government informants had been planted in their communities and pledged "all forms of uprisings".

Thai security units in the Deep South had been quietly assisting units of village defense volunteers in killing "innocent" local Malay Muslim residents, the statement said. Pulo claimed to have dispatched its own investigation team, known as Black Diamond, to investigate the killings.

Pulo accused security officials of discriminating against ethnic Malay villagers by arming their Buddhist neighbors.

Malay Muslim villagers did not trust the security forces to be unbiased arbiters, and thus there was a growing call for them to pull out of their villages, the statement said.

Pol Capt Chaisit Thongmee, ter police found them naked in Deputy Inspector of Investigation at Thung Song District Police Station, said that in room 214 police found four boys and one girl, all of whom were in a state of undress, as well as two empty beer bottles and "a number" of condoms.

All of the five boys and three girls arrested were between 14 and 16 years old and were students at a local high school and a technical college.

taken to Thung Song District Police Station, where they tested negative for the presence of illegal substances, Capt Chaisit said.

The Provincial Student Inspector was notified and the students' guardians and teachers were called to collect them.

Arousing suspicion: In the early hours of December 12, three youths in Nakhon Sri Thammarat were detained by volunteer officers from the Sriwichai Special Taskforce after they were discovered brewing a mixture of *krathom*, an indigenous Thai plant that has a stimulant effect when ingested and which is a controlled substance, with mosquito repellent and other ingredients.

The team, led by District Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) Phemsak Luensunthon, raided a house in Tambon Pho Sadet, Nakhon Sri Thammarat City after receiving information that illegal substances were being prepared in the building.

Inside the house, the team found four youths sitting around a large electric rice cooker. On seeing the officers, the youths attempted to flee but the volunteers grabbed three of them.

Two suspects, aged 15 and 17, were students of a well-

The eight students were known school in the city. Police named the third suspect as 21vear-old Naret Bunthongjan.

The rice cooker contained fresh krathom leaves, which were being boiled as the officers arrived. Officers also found more than two kilograms of krathom leaves, a bottle of soft drink, a box of mosquito repellent as well as cough medicine and pain killers.


Police also found a bottle of the finished product, which was handed to Nakhon Sri Thammarat City police as evidence.

The 15-year-old suspect confessed that the four were in the process of making a new drug that had recently become popular in the province as it reportedly stimulates sexual desire.

The recipe originally came from the three insurgent provinces in the south, the boy said.

Dr Nophaphon Cheunklin, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat Province Public Health Office, warned against taking the concoction, saying that ingesting mosquito repellent can cause lethargy, hallucinations and memory loss. If consumed regularly it could lead to brain damage.

China's art explosion

here was a time in China when artistic expression was limited strictly to supporting political ideology.

Chinese artists were pointedly dissuaded from creating anything that wasn't politically favorable toward the Communist party, but as the free market ideology gradually took hold in the 1980s, these limits ended, and a new art scene exploded.


Phuket Islanders have a chance not just to see some of the results of the cultural boom, but also to purchase them.

Soul of Asia art gallery has procured about 30 oil paintings and authentic lithographs, numbered and signed by some of the most famous contemporary Chinese artists, and is displaying them at its gallery in the Plaza Surin until January 15.

Schoeni Art Gallery in Hong Kong was among the first to pick up on the promising artists, and auction houses Sotheby's and Christie's quickly followed, making contemporary Chinese art the new "must-own" pieces.

Eric Smulders, owner of Soul of Asia, said of the paintings, "The pictures reflect the times and cultural history, which is not a very happy one. This we often find in the unhappy faces of the paintings."

Many of the paintings convey painful emotion and express sorrow and hurt and often depict gruesome scenes that are simul-




There is a sadness to many of the modern Chinese paintings, such as those of Zhong Xiao Gang (above) and Wang Yi Dong, below.


taneously hard to look at and hard to turn away from. Some of the paintings are on individualistic themes that were new to Chinese art at the time, such as money and love. But every painting is mesmerizing and intense.


Looking at Zhong Xiao Gang's "My Memory No. 1", Mr Smulders points out the mark on the face and explains, "To me this means that all Chinese are marked and connected by their mutual past."

Zhong Xiao Gang's most famous painting is perhaps "The Big Family No. 2" from his

the impression is haunting and unforgettable," Mr. Smulders remarked.

The paintings are created by artists who lived during Mao's Cultural Revolution – a time of great confusion and fear in China.

"There's often a lot of pain or sadness in Chinese art that I presume has something to do

with their horrible past of the Cultural Revolution," explained Mr Smulders.

But it's not just the powerful subject matter that lends these paintings to popularity, it is also the rigorous training the artists go through. Art schools in China require that most painters do nothing but paint for eight to 10 hours every day. They learn the techniques and how to paint properly before they begin to paint artistically.

As a result, the paintings are exact and precise, each brush stroke carefully thought out based on what came before and what goes next. The abstract pieces have the same cleanliness as the still life paintings.

Artists to be featured at the Soul of Asia exhibition include Wang Guang Yi, who is often called "The Chinese Andy Warhol" as his pictures have a popart effect to them, and Wang Yi Dong, who is one of China's most famous portrait painters.

"Chinese contemporary art is very fresh and creative. It brings in new ideas with the Orientalism and the Chinese-ness of the paintings, expressing the culture with the extraordinary technical refinement," said Mr Smulders.




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


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he planners and marketing men over at Mercedes-Benz must be running out of ideas. Is there any segment in which the automaker is not yet represented? Well, until recently, it was the seven-seat luxury off-roader sector, but with the introduction of the superb GL-Class the range appears to be complete.

The GL is a fairly conventional people-carrier, but unlike many of its rivals, is comprehensively equipped and offered certainly in other markets – with a variety of engines. There are two diesel and two gasoline units, the former conforming to the latest European emission standards, undercutting the EU4 limits and featuring standard particulate filters.

The two gasoline units available are the 5.5 liter 388 bhp (285 kW) model in the GL 500, and the 4.6l version in the GL 450, developing 340 bhp, or 250 kW. Both these engines also meet the stringent EU4 standards.


The GL was voted SUV of the year 2007 by the influential US magazine Motor Trend, fighting off a field of 22 competitors.

Motor Trend Editor-in-Chief Angus MacKenzie summed up the GL-Class, "The first full-size sport utility from Mercedes has astonishing technology, and will be available in a version that runs on the new lowsulfur diesel fuel for greater gas mileage."

All GL-Class engines are mated to Mercedes's unique seven-speed automatic transmission that also has manual operation using the steering wheel shift buttons. The use of a seven-speed auto transmission offers excellent performance coupled with low fuel consumption and reduced emissions.

While the new Lexus 460 has trumped this with an eightspeed transmission, Mercedes-Benz was the first to develop the unit fitted to the GL- and S-Class models.

It is a proven fact that few

road and in recent years the move has been away from rugged, highground clearance machines that can perform anywhere to vehicles that are more sedan-like in both their handling and comfort.

The GL-Class, while retaining an ability to cover difficult terrain, leans more toward the latter, offering a beautifully controlled ride.

Permanent four-wheel drive offers controlled handling in all conditions, while the standard air suspension maintains a smooth and level attitude, particularly when partially laden.

The GL is also fitted with

cope with load variations.

If a driver does want to go off-road, the type of driving demands different settings and, for the first time in this kind of vehicle, a special off-road ABS is fitted, which shortens braking distances on poor surfaces or particularly steep descents by allowing the wheels to lock under certain circumstances.

In addition, there is a downhill speed regulation device (DSR) that permits the driver to select various maximum speeds, which the GL will then not exceed.

Conversely, a hill-start assist system prevents the vehicle

off-roaders actually venture off an adaptive damper system to rolling backward on an uphill slope.



With the addition of this third model, production capacity of the Tuscaloosa plant is now around 160,000 units a year. Ten years ago it was barely underway as a production facility.



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

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

ith Christmas upon us and New Year just a week away, it dawns on me that the year has passed by so quickly.

Thinking about the many things I have done during the year, I think I deserve a reward – a day at Anumba Spa at The Racha resort on Koh Racha Yai seems just the ticket.

It is a beautiful day as I leave from Chalong Pier on a luxury speedboat that takes about 35 minutes to travel the 12 miles south to the resort. The sea is so blue it adds to my excitement, even though I have to leave my beloved Phuket behind.

The Racha has been open for two years, with the exception of the 10 months following the tsunami when it was closed for renovation. Anumba Spa opened in August 2005.

As I arrive on the island I see the resort in front of me – white villas nestled on the white sand with beautiful green gardens. It is so beautiful that I forget my seasickness on the boat. The sand is soft almost as if someone had covered the beaches in a fine powder. I can imagine this is the Maldives in Thailand.

Doing Anumba on Koh Racha

Spa Manager Phijitree "Joy" Thongsuk has eight years of spa experience at Banyan Tree Spa and Mandara Spa at the JW Marriott Phuket Resort and Spa.

K. Joy explains that *anumba* means "magic box" in which a person can find everything they want.

"We have decorated in Zen style, using mainly white and large, open windows to take in the sea view," she says.

The spa area is large and consists of nine buildings, including a reception and spa consultant area, day spa for foot massage and nail painting, four double-bed rooms, four *sala* with double beds for Thai massages, fitness room, yoga room, souvenir shop, in-room service and coming soon Sunset Massages on the beach.

K. Joy explains that Anumba has seven women therapists, and one male therapist to massage guests who need a stronger massage. "We have about 25 to 30 guests a day, most of them are resort guests and divers. Many divers come here asking for a strong massage. So what each person needs depends on the customer. We also welcome customers who are not hotel guests, but they should book in advance.

"We have many guests from Switzerland and Germany this month. Most of our guests have spa treatment here, including the walk-in guests who on diving day trips to the island. They have lunch and a spa treatment before leaving the island," she says.

K. Joy adds that only about 2% of Anumba's guests have never been to a spa before.

The spa menu lists Therapeutic Massages, Massage Extras, Body Scrubs, Body Wraps, Deluxe Facials and Signature Packages. The prices, excluding 10% service charge and 7% tax, range from 1,200 baht for an hour of Foot Fantasy to 7,400 baht for the four-hour Thai Flower Ritual package, which includes scrub, body massage, face massage and aromatic bath.

The products used are from different countries, such as OPI

nail care and nail polishes from the US, Rose Berry Oil from France and locally-sourced fresh Thai herbs.

I try the Body Scrub for Natural Body Glow and an Oriental Oil Massage. This scrub is suitable for all skin types and costs 2,200 baht for 50 minutes of treatment, and with a massage it takes 80 minutes and costs 2,800 baht.

K. Joy schedules my treatment in the Diamond Room – a villa complete with steam room, double bed, dressing room, toilet room, outdoor shower in the garden, big bath area and lounge area, all decorated in minimalist white.

I start with 10 minutes in the steam room. K. Pink, my therapist, then cleanses my skin for 50 minutes with scrubs made from natural honey, fresh walnut, plain yogurt, tomato and crushed rice. Next I rinse off the scrub in the *al fresco* shower. My skin feels soft and silky smooth.

After the scrub I continue with the Oriental Oil Massage, a popular signature treatment using palms, thumbs, fingertips and hand heels to draw upon the best fusion of Eastern and Western techniques.

This massage takes about 80 minutes, but I have limited time of just 35 minutes. It was still enough to let me really relax.


Time passes so fast that I have to rush to catch the 4 pm boat back to Phuket, but I take the time to enjoy the hot ginger tea served in the reception area after my massage. I also take the time to fill out a summary of my spa experience here, and the only box I check is "Excellent".

HAMBURG (dpa): Nobody would ever buy a pair of shoes that do not fit. But many men wear suits that do anything but fit properly.

Shoulders are often too narrow, jackets are too short and trouser legs are just too long.

Although Phuket is certainly not short of tailors who in theory should be able to leap this hurdle for you, are you sure you can rely on their judgment?

And is a cheaply-tailored suit from a Patong backstreet really better than a similarly priced one from a department store?

"The problem does not lie with the selection on the racks," says the Cologne-based style expert Bernhard Roetzel, adding, "You don't need an expensive tailored suit, as long as you are of normal build."

Many men are better off with a ready-made suit as they can see in the dressing room whether the jacket and trousers fit properly and whether the fabric and the cut is to their liking.

Joerg Staben, the owner of a men's clothing shop beside Hamburg's City Hall says "An off-the-rack suit is usually fine. Budget so that you can buy accessories like a good shirt, a nice tie and proper shoes."

tailoring and a timeless, classic cut should cost around US\$650 (23,000 baht), say both Mr Roetzel and Mr Staben.

To get a custom-made suit in an individual style, go for a handmade suit, says Petra Claessens, President of the German Fashion Institute (DMI) in Krefeld. Experts can tell a handmade suit from afar because it fits perfectly. Up close they can see details like jacket sleeves

A suit of good fabric, good with buttonholes that actually button up.

> Handmade suits are more costly and time consuming. Just taking the measurements can last from 30 minutes to a full hour and then it might be another three months until delivery.

Many tailors in Phuket make promises of delivery within a much shorter time frame than this, though hurrying the process could well impact on the quality and precision of the cut.

Made-to-measure clothing is another option.


"This involves a business that offers suits based on standard cuts

"There are factories where the suits are then cut to fit an individual," says Roetzel.

These "hybrids" sell for as little as US\$460 (16,000 baht). A good made-to-measure piece can sell for more than US\$1,300 (46,000 baht) he adds.

Regardless of where the suit comes from, fitting remains the most important step.

If you do not trust yourself or do not have a good friend to judge whether the suit fits well,

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put yourself in the hands of an has spent years working with fabrics and cuts. Ask around," Claessens advises. With the huge numbers of tailor shops here in Phuket, it really is worth heading this advice and trying to find a shop that comes with a reliable recommendation. Remember that what may appear the height of fashion to a Burmese tailor, may not quite cut such a fine figure in the streets of Berlin, London or Stockholm.

> A standard mistake is buying a jacket which is too small, according to Staben. Undersized jackets pinch the arms or stretch along the shoulders.

> "This has nothing to do with figure conscious fashion, it's just uncomfortable and destroys the line."

> Roetzel says people routinely buy trousers that are too long. "As a rule, the front of the trousers should fold in slightly and in the back cover half of the shoe's heel at the most.'

> Overly-long jacket arms look awful. "Then the entire jacket looks too big." Arms should hang loosely along the torso, long enough to just let a wristwatch peek out.

> Different brands of suits are cut differently and switching brands may work wonders.

On Phuket, the Pearl Factory on Thepkrasattri Rd cultures its own pearls by selecting quality oysters and adding a small bead with a piece of mantle tissue to each oyster, which then begins secreting layers of a crystaline substance, nacre, to create the pearl.


Up to 400 pearls are harvested within 12 to 20 months, depending on the size and type of pearls desired.

With its own pearl farm, this company produces pearls of many sizes and colors for its unique-design jewelry, which is created by in-house and freelance designers.

The smooth gifts from the sea are fashioned into necklaces, bracelets, earrings and rings, and the lining from the oyster shell – called mother of pearl – is used to adorn silverware, key chains,

decorative plates and other items.

"People who buy pearls are those who really love them, and the price doesn't matter. Most of these people buy pearls because they are fascinated with them," says Amorn Intorncharoen of the Pearl Factory.

"Pearls keep their value. The luster of each pearl determines its value and quality – the shinier it is, the greater its value. To us, beauty must come first: our pearls must shine, have a good shape and be colorful. The best pearls must sparkle with many colors, like a rainbow," he adds.

In caring for pearls, he advises to keep them away from perfume, cosmetics and perspiration. Each time after the pearls have been worn, wipe them carefully with a soft cloth and keep them separate from other jewelry.

K. Amorn adds that the silk thread of a pearl necklace will wear over time, so he recommends checking the thread regularly and replace it if necessary.

This third-generation family business has grown and now exports its pearls and jewelry, with most of its products now bound for Europe.

K. Amorn says that pearls will keep their popularity because they can be added to nearly all forms of jewelry, and that designers at the Pearl Factory stay in touch with fashion trends.



n the seemingly-saturated club and bar scene in Phuket, there are a few obvious choices of where to park your bottle on an idle Thursday night. Patong is perennially popular, with the widest variety of establishments, followed by some quieter bars sprinkled through Kata and Karon.

Much underrated Phuket City, however, has a wide variety of clubs rivaling the music and crowds of Patong, without as many working girls underfoot. In town are some genuinely good places to see – and be seen – by trendy young urbanites.

Barzah, tucked away at the back of the Phoon Phol shophouse development, is a refreshing change from the shiny veneers of other clubs on the island and has a "raw" edge, as General Manager Jakkapong Sukjai calls it.

Adding to the club's image are the spray-paint motifs inside and outside the club that look like they belong on subway cars in New York circa 1980.

The club, which opened in April, fills up after midnight when

crowds from other bars begin to trickle in for a last late-night drink, and perhaps another chance to score a date, before heading home. The DJ spins the typical tracks, but the band, with lead singer Andy, livens up the crowd with a big stage presence and lots of hair gel.

The Phoon Phol area is often regarded as the wrong side of the klong and is largely overlooked by farang on the island, and on this Thursday evening the *Gazette*'s intrepid barhoppers were the only non-Thais in the house. But this is not a cause for concern; quite the opposite, in fact. The doormen are always welcoming and "Heineken" and "gin tonic" easily translate to a glass in hand. "Singha" was once translated into "Singha Light", but that's a small price to pay for the in-house entertainment.

As a good club should,

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
Barzah leaves creating the atmosphere to the patrons, which they do well and often. A small, oneperson stage with rails is positioned among the high tables for any girl with enough inspiration, liquid or otherwise, to gyrate into the limelight. If she is even moderately deserving she is well-rewarded by cheers and sips of drinks from nearby admirers.

That trend will be broken from December 28 for five days when a group of 'coyotes' will come from Bangkok to help ring in the new year in Phuket.

To liven the liver there is currently a promotion of a bottle of 100 Pipers whiskey with five mixers and a pile of popcorn for 500 baht, if ordered before midnight. Other prices include 120 baht for a small Heineken and 100 baht for a small Singha.

If you're still looking for that little bit more after Barzah kicks out, there are a number of nearby options to satisfy your late-night cravings. Noodles before bedtime is almost a tradition in town, or across Phoonphol Rd is Soi 11, where halfway up the concrete gauntlet is a laid-back tiki bar of bamboo and thatch that offers a curbside view of the passing latenight traffic.

After that? Well, if you are still up when Soi 11 closes, the sun will be rising and you probably should be somewhere else.



Backwater bliss

n my previous trip to Chiang Mai, my old business partner and frequent traveling companion Alex suggested a short, new trekking and river trip.

"Two hours drive north, then a 30-kilometer drive off the main road, followed by a short hour's trek. Camp overnight near a small Karen village then, the next day, an easy six-hour paddle downriver in a whitewater raft," was the suggested itinerary discussed over a few too many beers.

"Why not? Let's go!" came my reply. I was either going mad or that was the Heineken talking.

So the next morning, packed and ready to go, we headed north out of town and along the highway to Chiang Dao. Famed for its caves and Thailand's most famous and oldest elephant camp, and especially for its magnificent photo oppor-

tunities of elephant caravans trekking through the river.

The drive to Chiang Dao was easy, despite rather heavy Saturday morning traffic, mainly trucks packed high with vegetables or camping gear.

The first part of the drive was along the flat plains to the north of the city – a little boring at first, but after 50km or so the road begins to wind into the foothills and the scenery changes dramatically as the road follows the Ping River.

dominated by the sight of Doi Luang, which, at a towering 2,225 meters high, is Thailand's third

The area near the town was



tallest mountain. Turning west at the center of town, we followed the signs to the caves and after typically long and relaxing Northern Thai lunch we decided a short side trip into the caves was a must.

It's not possible to go through the whole cave system, which is made up of five interconnected caves believed to stretch more than 12km deep into the mountains. Being the type of intrepid travelers that we were, we managed to explore only two of the outer caves, Tham Phra Nawn (360m) and Tham Seua Dao (540m), which, thankfully, were lit by electric lights. Great stalagmite and stalactite formations abounded, and were well worth the short side trip.

A short afternoon walk and several stops later we realized we were too late to venture further, and it was time to find some place to stay the night. As luck had it, there were some excellent, small and inexpensive bungalows in the area. One resort especially caught the eye - The Chiang Dao Nest, run by Stewart, a friendly English guy, and his Thai wife, Khun Wicha, who is also an excellent cook.

The couple has been there for years and have built up quite a reputation for outstanding food, basic yet comfortable accommodation and for being a gold mine of information on what to do in and around the region.

K. Wicha's menu in their "fusion" restaurant was a real treat and worth an overnight stop



for the meal alone.

The next morning, slightly hungover and a little worse for wear, we decided to simply relax and take it easy as we explored the very natural, peaceful area.

To the east of the town we found great locations for easy trekking and mountain biking. To the west, Doi Luang offered the possibility of a two-day, one-night trek to the top, with views reputedly all the way to Chiang Mai on clear days. Check with the local authorities and national park officers for full details as trekkers through the national park must be escorted by rangers.

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For less physically active entertainment, there were birdwatching tours - more than 300 species can be seen locally – a meditation center in Chiang Dao Cave Village, and hill tribe tours. For more adventurous types, river rafting, elephant trekking and mountain biking were all nearby.

If none of that appeals to you, the area's natural serenity is ideal for those who want to just sit and read a book, or jump into a hammock and drink a beer.

So much for our ever-intrepid travel plans, but in such a beautiful place doing nothing is always an option.

How to get there

By bus – From Chang Puak Bus Station in Chiang Mai – take the bus to Tha Ton or Fang (bus leaves every 30 minutes until 5 pm). Ask to be dropped off at Chiang Dao, outside Alien bar. From there, walk to the accommodation in town or get a taxi to Chiang Dao Cave Village. Accommodation is also available just outside of town for about 80 baht per person, 100 baht for two people.

By car or motorcycle – Take highway 107 north from Chiang Mai towards Fang. At 77km you arrive in Chiang Dao town. Turn left at the town to go to Chiang Dao Cave Village. The caves are about 5km down this road.

been more misleading. Bangkok Kiss (Bangkok Books, Bangkok, 2006, 318pp) is illustrated with a lush pair of lips in garish red lipstick. The idea is that you're reading another F&B novel – farang and bargirl.

This couldn't be further from the truth. This is David Thompson's first person account of his experiences mostly in the boonies of Thailand, North, South and Northeast. Bangkok Kiss is not billed as a novel and it does indeed have the clumsy ring of truth.

As a writer, Thompson **By James Eckardt** is an obvious amateur. His

sentences are liberally studded with unnecessary first-word locutions such as luckily, fortunately, unfortunately, happily, thankfully.

He uses way too many exclamation points to jazz up tired sentences. And the word is "expatriate" not "ex-patriot".

A 42-year-old electrical engineer from England, he travels for the first time to Thailand on a three-week vacation.

He opens his book like so many others: arrival at Don Muang airport, ripped off by an un-metered taxi, first impressions of searing heat and chaotic traffic. He gets

ever has a book title or cover a guided tour of the usual tourist attractions.


He is taken under the wing of an old Aussie expat for a tour of Soi Cowboy but, drunk as he gets, he wakes up alone. He learns from his tour guide the next

> day that "not all girls in Thailand were available for sex and that the majority frowned upon such behavior ... So what I had learned the previous night was not the whole truth. Prostitution did flourish in certain areas, but they seemed to be only those place that the farangs visited. Places like Bangkok, Pattaya, Chiang Mai and Phuket! All the places I was going to visit! I began to think about my behavior the

previous night. Was I just another farang with money who had no respect for Thailand and was only looking for cheap and easy sex?"

He is disgusted by the go-go bars in Pattaya. He goes on an elephant tour in Chiang Mai, a diving trip in Phuket. Why would anyone be remotely interested in this mundane tourist stuff?

He meets the inevitable hooker, Wan, not in a bar but in a disco. A former assistant hotel manager who speaks good English, she has had to go on the game for the usual reasons: divorced with a son,

Thompson doesn't sleep with her but keeps in phone contact throughout his travels and when he's back in England, he sends her 20,000 baht a month to support her family while she goes to university in Udon Thani. Now where have we heard this before?

But if this tale is to be believed, Wan marks for sincerity.

is there in Phuket when he arrives for his second vacation. They consummate their love at last. Thompson flies back to England to sell everything he owns.

He returns to Phuket to take a diving instructor's course and then decides to see Wan at her home village in Udon Thani. He does this aboard a 110cc Yamaha Spark.

The 80 pages he devotes to this trip form the core of the book as he constantly bumbles into trouble and is rescued by kind Thais. He is indeed off the beaten tourist track and revels in it.

Reunited with Wan in her village, he helps the family repair long-disused farm machinery and decides to become a sugar cane farmer.

"This was what I had always dreamed about! Well, not exactly this, not sugar cane farming obviously, but the excitement, the thrill of doing something completely different, something adventurous! The risk of losing it all! The challenge to succeed! To confront the unknown and meet head-on the obstacles of life! To forego the safety net! To stand up and face the possibility of failure! The ability to change one's destiny! I felt as though I was defying whatever the gods had chosen for me!"

The events of December 26, 2004, drew an eternal line through the history of the island. Since that date, heroic effort has been made to commemorate and dignify those killed by the tsunami, while helping those left behind.

However, some perspective on the disaster is needed. As coldhearted as it may sound, and despite reports in the global media, Phuket was not devastated by the great wave. Khao Lak to the north, for example, suffered much greater damage. Areas outside Thailand bore the brunt of the wave - Aceh, Indonesia, was badly hit, and affected families have still not been returned to permanent housing. Sri Lanka is similarly still far from full recovery.

But in Phuket, just two years later, everyone who has helped the island recover should take a well-deserved bow. The complaint this week that airport Immigration cannot handle the record number of tourists is more good news than bad – although still not to be overlooked as an issue that needs addressing.

Other good work goes on. The Inside Story in the Gazette last week highlighted that even as the remaining unidentified bodies were being laid to rest, the tireless work of the Thai Tsunami Victim Identification Center (TTVI) had led to the identification of one more victim.

As a result, the family of 21-year-old Turkish tourist Yasemin Seda Tekoz regained their daughter's body, and at least some measure of closure.

Aware that the job of victim identification may never be finished, Pol Col Khemmarin Hassiri, head of the TTVI, keeps his mobile phone on 24 hours a day, just in case he gets that one call that will make a difference.

The number of long-term projects to assist tsunami victims and survivors is also heartening. The tsunami victim shelter at Koh Sireh opened through the Austrian government's assistance. In Phang Nga, the Swiss Ambassador to Thailand made a tour highlighting his government's assistance to fishing villages (see news pages).

Another such effort, the Tsunami Day Appeal (see page 17), focuses on direct assistance, but also recognizes that world-renowned Phuket has the potential to attract more donations than it might need; opening the door for Phuket to become a donations center to assist tsunami victims outside Thailand.

What is particularly commendable is that these Phuket-based projects all offer direct assistance to those in need.

The Gazette knows that many less-publicized relief efforts have gone unreported in these pages. To all those who have helped - and are still helping – Phuket recover from that dark day two years ago, the Gazette thanks you. The Editor

Are top priorities given a back seat?

Perhaps the first three pages of the *Gazette* should have been written in blood, as they were full of deaths, from reckless driving to shootings to stabbings and so on. I do recall two Thai fishermen who got fueled up on Sang Som and pornography before rowing ashore to beat, rape and drown a young European girl.

Now a Welsh tourist gets stabbed – for a disagreement over a tuk tuk fare?

A friend of mine recently had a nasty experience with a tuk tuk driver. The driver showed my friend a rather large knife and insisted that he pay double the agreed fare because he had stopped off at a 7-Eleven for a couple of minutes.

I would welcome any comments, as in my opinion the only help given to tourists by the police is to empty one's wallet through silly traffic fines for not wearing helmets and the like, rather than any form of protection from villains. Is it that traffic violations generate more revenue and therefore are given priority over tackling real crime?

As a *farang* I can only warn my peers to travel in company, agree to fees and fares beforehand, watch each other's backs and wallets, and on the whole be very, very careful in Phuket.

Put an end to the 'tourist tax'

My wife and I came to Phuket hoping to contribute to the economy after the tsunami. Let me say the Tourism Authority of Thailand and the hotel owners have done a great job with package deals to get the tourists back.

But once tourists get here, they are stopped up to five times a day to see if they are carrying their foreign drivers' licenses with them. If they are not, they are fined 300 baht. What are the police thinking? Didn't Phuket just have a whole year of no business?

The tsunami was a temporary business interruption, but this tourist tax will have a much longer effect because everyone who gets a ticket is going back to their

home country and spreading the word that Phuket is a rip-off. The rental companies don't tell you that you need to keep your foreign license in your bathing suit.

People come to the beach to have a positive experience after a long year of working. They want to be treated well because it's their money they are bringing, and they can easily take it elsewhere.

Rather than going to a police station to pay the fine, most tourists pay the fine on the spot in cash. But then you plainly see the policeman stick the money in his pocket and tear the ticket out of his book. What an image for Phuket to send around the world.

If the different governing groups, business groups, the TAT and large hotels don't put a stop to this practice you will see in the not-too-distant future what effect it will have.

My wife and I have been stopped at least 20 times in one month. Once three times in one day. We have been stopped at 10:30 pm at the corner of Nanai Rd and at the southern end of Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd. We have been stopped going to Central. They're everywhere.

I read about two 11-yearolds killed on a motorbike, and last week a 12-year-old boy died in an accident. The police need to be out policing the road for speeders, reckless drivers, underage drivers and people driving on the wrong side of the road – not tourists who have traveled far and saved their hard-earned money to spend it here.

Someone needs to take action and soon: we want to come back.

here are 1,687 handi capped people who have joined the PHA. They are from all over Thailand, but they live here in Phuket.

Even though we have that many registered members, I would guess that about 10% of the handicapped population in Phuket is still unregistered.

Our association accepts every handicapped person who wants to register, but some of them are already well cared for and do not need our help.

Our association has been running for six years. We have two full-time staff, and we work with the Phuket Deaf Club, Phuket Blind Club, Physically Handicapped Club, a club for parents of mentally handicapped children, and the Autistic Club.

Our organization focuses on studying and working, and all of the handicapped associations we work with provide work training, including courses in sewing, traditional massage and computers.

We also promote the association to handicapped people in Phuket, so they understand that if they don't have food or money, they can ask us for help – they don't need to beg on the street. The work we do often has

great results for handicapped people.

One man was a beggar on the street, but after I saw him, I brought him to the association and



or the past six years The Phuket Handicapped Association (PHA) has been dedicated to improving the lives of handicapped people on Phuket. They provide scholarships, cash assistance, job training and placement.

However, as the PHA president Sawai Promchinda explains, it comes at a

price. This year the association has received just 5,000 baht in direct donations, and government money from Bangkok is in short supply.

organized for him to work as a singer in a restaurant. Now he is a professional singer and he has released his own album.

We also helped another man who used to beg for food and money. We took him in and gave him some money to study at Phuket Polytechnic College. Now he is the owner of a radio repair shop.

Obviously we need some money to achieve results like these, and I ask for help from any organization I can to raise money to help handicapped people so they can study and work.

The association provides scholarships of 2,000 baht a year to handicapped students, and we already have eight graduates with bachelor's degrees.

Also, if a member dies, we help the family by providing 2,000 baht.

But our biggest problem is that this year we simply do not have enough money because we have received no government assistance. The central govern-

ment gives money to the national organizations such as the Thailand Handicapped Association or the Thai Deaf Association, but it's up to those organizations how they distribute the money.

The money we receive is provided by the Lions Clubs on Phuket and other private donations. Some years we receive 30,000 to 40,000 baht in donations from individuals, but this year we have received only 5,000 baht.

We are always looking for funding for our annual meeting, and I don't want to constantly ask for money from the local businesses because I don't want to annoy them too much. Although we are handicapped, I understand that companies and other organizations need to spend their money on other things, not just donate it to a handicapped association.

It seems that every time we run out of money we need to turn to the Lions Clubs on Phuket for help.

I would like to ask people who have enough money to give to the association or any of the clubs that assist the handicapped so they can continue their work.

Shanti Lodge or Koyao Island Resort.

In the case of Koyao Island Resort, its first obvious asset is that it can't be seen from the sea - wonderful! It's also elegant, open-air, expansive yet low volume, serves reasonably-priced quality food, and blends in with the local environment and culture. In contrast to the expat-ridden operations so common in Thailand, this 15-bungalow hotel em-

ploys 33 locals, creates off-property jobs for another 30, runs a children's community center and buys locally.

General Manager (GM) Gavin Pereira says, "The locals enjoy us because we sincerely care about Koh Yao." He adds that, as a foreign GM, his work permit requires him to help his Thai staff improve their skills and knowledge; and he tries to live up to that obligation, unlike many other GMs, who he feels exploit their staff for their own benefit.

The resort isn't a bamboo bungalow or something like the rustic Sabai Corner. A vanguard

> of things to come, Koyao Resort is an upscale ecoretreat frequented by professionals and millionaires looking for an alternative to tasteless modernity. Elegant yet inexpensive, this jewel is ideal for travelers who are affluent yet environmentally-aware and cerebral. This is about natural beauty over tacky theme parties and noisy bars, traditional longtails

over speedboats. It's about lowimpact, sustainable use.

Pereira says, "Our open-air ambiance without AC is a great marketing point...It's all about innovation. Sometimes it's best to look back so you know where you are going. My family gets along just fine in our wooden Thai house, shaded by a jungle canopy. I have lived in modern concrete 'heat sink' homes without air con, and I thought I would die."



Responsible Resorts

The Koyao Resort has natural air conditioning only.

Unfortunately, despite the eco-resort's example, quiet Koh Yao Noi is going mainstream, and Gavin Pereira is worried. The resort is only six years old and recovering from 70% tsunami damage, yet now it also has to cope with noisy construction next door. Gavin is worried that encroachment by modern hotels will eventually bastardize Koh Yao into another Phuket or Samui.

Developers see virgin territory such as Koh Yao as a morsel too good to be missed, but many observers are outraged by the lack of judgment and denial of downstream impacts associated with coastal development, be it luxury hotels or sewage treatment plants. It's a fine balance between preserving natural

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beauty through sustainable use and trampling the garden into the ground and sucking its resources dry.

Koh Yao Noi isn't Ao Nang or Phuket, and doesn't have their carrying capacity and infrastructure. The conservative Muslim culture is in for a big surprise when wall-to-wall beer bars form behind the hotels and topless Euro-tourists line the few beaches. The east bay islands that form such a magical view have only two small beaches, and Koh Bele was over-run by Krabi tourists years ago.

TV crews are already exploiting the pristine beauty of the area to promote the new developments.

There are an estimated 24

to 38 new Koh Yao Noi hotel plots, so we can expect a few thousand guests looking off their balconies, yearning to visit the two beautiful islands before them, each with beaches capable of holding only a couple of dozen tourists each.

Yet to be seen is how power and water will be supplied to thirsty, electricity-greedy mainstream hotels. Even without swimming pools and thousands of hotel showers, locals complain about water shortages.

Will hotels be required by law to provide solar hot water? Will solar cell panels be used, or Koh Yao's little power station upgraded, or will inefficient underwater cables be installed? Whatever the case, it will be expensive, and the taxpayer will bear the brunt of the bill.

It is to be hoped that the hotel developers who have bought land on the island take a cue from the Koh Yao Resort's universallyappealing combination of minimalist aesthetics, open air comfort and responsible management of the isle's natural resources.

In Phuket, Shanti Lodge is the market leader and local role model for natural style, ambience and ecological balance.

For investors, eco-tourism is the way of the future, with the market increasing each year. And as shown by such disasters as Class 5 tropical cyclone Durian, which killed 1,000 in the Philippines this month, the blow-back from irresponsible mismanagement of our cosmos can be devastating.

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

The lowdown on high speed

For two years now I've sub-scribed to Internet access through Jasmine Internet at 2,600 baht a month for a 512Kbps line, but most of the time I can get only 32Kbps or 64Kbps, or I can't connect at all.

I live on the old airport road, Route 4031, leading to Nai Yang Beach, about five kilometers from the intersection. As I do not speak Thai, I have a problem getting information and support, and since I'm also not a computer specialist, I sent a Thai friend to the TOT office near the airport to ask if they could offer me something more reliable.

They said that they cannot give me a high-speed connection because they do not have any more telephone numbers available, but they could give me broadband access through an IPStar satellite connection. This would cost 2,000 baht for the installation and a monthly fee of 2,200 baht for a speed of 512 Kbps, or 2,600 baht for 1,024 Kbps.

Does this connection work on a laptop or on a PC?

What is the difference between high-speed connections through a telephone line and TOT's system? Which system is more reliable?

I also don't understand why my telephone number starts with 205-XXX, but TOT says that it's a TT&T number, but my bill is from TOT.

Is CAT connected to TT&T? Is its system better? Do I also have to install a satellite dish

as with TOT? Is its system compatible with an ordinary computer?

Is ADSL not the same as High Speed?

Let me start with your last A question first. In most parts of the world, "high-speed Internet" usually implies reliable download speeds of 2Mbps or more (1Mbps = 1 million bits persecond = 1,024Kbps). In the US and Europe you can routinely get lines offering 4Mbps to 8Mbps.

In Hong Kong, South Korea, Sweden, parts of the UK, because they can't get phone

Japan and Singapore, a 2 Mbps line is considered a tad slow. If you routinely visit sites such as Flickr or YouTube, or watch news video snippets on the

Web, you need at least 500Kbps. Otherwise you'll spend more time twiddling your thumbs than clicking your mouse.

ADSL should be synonymous with "high speed". Unfortunately, in Phuket, it isn't. I have a TOT ADSL line that on weekday afternoons and weekends routinely runs about 60Kbps, which is just slightly faster than a typical dial-up modem in North America or Europe.

I just tested the line with the DSLReports website, using their server in Seattle, www.dslreports. com/stest?loc=97, at 8 pm on a Saturday night. I clocked in at 16Kbps. I'm being billed for 1Mbps, so at that moment I was getting about 1/64th of the speed I'm paying for. Many times I feel like paying 1/64th of the monthly bill they send.

I know several people who use mobile phone GPRS connections. They get Internet service through their mobile phone provider, and connect their mobile phones to their computers. I don't know any of them who routinely get more than 40Kbps.

I also know people with IP-Star satellite systems. Generally, they're happy with their systems

lines. But they rarely see sustained speeds in the afternoons above 300Kbps to 400Kbps. Often it is much less. The only people I know in

Phuket who are happy with their Internet speeds are people who have direct telephone line connections to a CATADSL service, and people who use CAT EV-DO cards. I have a direct line CAT ADSL connection at my Sandwich Shoppe in Patong, and I routinely clock it at 1,400Kbps to 1,800Kbps.

I've tested CAT's AirCard all over the island, and found speeds ranging from 400Kbps to 600Kbps-quite respectable, given the alternatives.

For many people, speed isn't important. For me, it's crucial. In the past six months I downloaded beta test versions of Windows Vista and Office 2007 more than a dozen times. When I tried to download the 3.7GB Vista file on my TOT ADSL line, the download took more than two days. At the shop, it took six hours.

The interrelationship between TOT, TT&T and CAT continues to baffle me. I have lines with all three, and get bills from all three, but it's hard to tell which bill goes with which line, and I get more bills than I have lines.

My current advice for getting high-speed Internet in Phuket is:

• Go to your CAT office. If you live in Patong or nearby, CAT is located just outside Andaman Beach Suites on Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd. If you live anywhere else, go to the main CAT office on Phang Nga Rd in Phuket City.

Take your passport, work permit (if you have one) and a good map showing your location. It helps if you take a computersavvy friend who speaks Thai, but that's becoming less and less necessary; the CAT computer staff generally speak good English.

• Ask CAT if they can run a line to your location. You don't want a TOT or a TT&T line. You want a CAT line. You can't use your CAT line for telephone service - there's no phone number. But you can use it for CAT's ADSL. The CAT ADSL service costs 2,600 baht a month, and it's worth every satang. That's what I have at the Sandwich Shoppe,

and I'm about to switch my home line over to CAT ADSL.

• If CAT can't run a line to your location, and you have a laptop or some other computer that can take a PCMCIA card, sign up for EV-DO service. CAT will sell you a Sierra Wireless 580 AirCard, which I've described before in many of these columns. It isn't a great card – in fact, Sierra Wireless has discontinued it. But it works very well with CAT's DO service.

Sierra assures me that drivers for Windows Vista will be available soon, so you're covered if you upgrade your computer.

The Sierra Wireless card costs a pricey 16,000 baht. CAT's DO service costs 1,300 baht a month for unlimited use. Supposedly the card will work in most parts of Thailand.

• If you don't have a PC with a PCMCIA card, or CAT won't sell you an AirCard because you're out of their service area, you're hosed. You have to start shopping for ADSL service - if you can get a TOT or TT&T phone line – or IPStar service if no phone line is available.

Alternative #1: Tell CAT that you live in the middle of downtown Patong and get your AirCard installed that way. Then take it to your home and see if it really works. I've actually recommended one reader to do precisely that, because CAT keeps telling him that EV-DO service isn't available where he lives. I tested the AirCard right in front of his house and it works great.


But be aware of the fact that EV-DO service is not available everywhere in Phuket. CAT is building more towers, but it's anybody's guess where they'll go and how well they'll work.


Alternative #2: You can schlep your laptop to a free wireless hotspot. I run lists of free hotspots in this column regularly. That's a decent alternative if you don't spend hours in front of your computer - particularly if you find a fast connection for downloading and uploading email.

That's the best I know, and the best advice I have. I invite Phuket's Internet Service Providers to show me a better way. If any of you folks can show me a reasonably-priced, widely available Internet service that can deliver, say, 500Kbps or more all day, I want to hear from you!

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Black hole of pension obligations

in the past, many companies Many large companies, as well provided their employees with defined-benefit pension plans. Under this arrangement the employee could expect, for example, 2% of their final salary as a pension multiplied by the number of years of service. Therefore, employees with 30 years' service received 60% of final salary.

However, in reality, the situation of employee pensions has been different. People changed jobs, companies went bankrupt and so on.

Today, most employers are reluctant to join any pension plan that gives a defined benefit. The reason for this is simple: it means the firm has entered a contract whereby the future cost is unknown but likely to be enormous.

They would have effectively entered into a contract that depends on their investments being able to provide pensions for a large number of people; pensions that rely on financial markets pro-

ducing consistently high returns. This, combined with pension fund retirees living longer than ever before, creates a situation that is financially frightening.

The single largest cause of company takeovers and acquisitions failing to transpire is pension

fund liabilities. For example, company A wants to sell its operations to company B. The latter looks at company A's balance sheet and all looks good, but when they start to look at company A's pension fund obligations they realize they are looking at a black hole.

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equipment, lamps, lightbulbs air conditioners, communication systems, closed-circuit television [octv]security alarms, fire alarms, motors, generators, water pumps, washing machines, water filter tanks, hot as their smaller counterparts, have massive pension fund deficits. General Motors has often been described as a pension fund that happens to manufacture motor vehicles.

Companies are avoiding this problem by offering "money purchase options", whereby they contribute a certain amount to the employee's pension fund but refuse to guarantee the final result.

Many governments have found themselves in identical situations. Advanced countries with falling birthrates and longer life expectancies are in this position. However, governments are officially in denial. They simply will not admit the extent of the problem as its solution would cost them votes at the next election. They do their best to leave this nightmare to the next politicians to be voted in, a trend that has been going on for decades. Many people have taken

out private pensions or money purchase pension agreements. A number of expats have approached me with their individual situations. To assist them, I have made a formal relationship with a firm of independent financial advisers in the UK that is authorized, under the Financial Servic-

es Act in Britain, to legally deal with these matters. The process is straightfor-

Each case has been completely different. In some cases, the relevant government has allowed contribution to a private pension in lieu of a government scheme. This entails what is known as protected rights and leads to a different set of options being available. In nearly all cases, the individual has been allowed to take an initial cash amount of 25% tax free with the balance dealt with via an enormous range

The UK government has promised to try and sort out the complexities of the whole issue of personal pensions in March and April 2007, but we all know

Many people have contacted me, explaining that they are, not surprisingly, confused about interest rates and returns over longer periods of time.

Many years ago I was employed by a large Australian finance company and they were experts at manipulating interest rates. Fortunately for the public, the government of New South Wales had anticipated their financial sectors ability to confound the public and had enacted legislation to stop this practice.

However, when I was promoted to Assistant Manager of their leasing department, I found there was no protection afforded to this sector. They charged

what they liked to call effective interest rates that were a formula this group had created themselves that gave the impression to the borrower that the interest rate charged on the contract was significantly lower than the real rate.

It is not just on borrowing money that people are purposefully misled but also in the investment world. I recently had an individual call me to promote a real estate investment in North America and I found that they were trying to use the same tactics.

For example, an investment would have been described as having yielded a profit of 17% a year over the previous 10 years. Due to my experiences in both lending and the investment of money, I asked for an explanation.

For example, US\$10,000 invested 10 years ago would have given a profit of US\$17,000 and was being described as a 17% annual return.

This is a total return of 170%, when divided by the term of 10 years, equates to 17% per annum. This in reality is called a "level annual yield" and is used to confuse rather than inform investors. The true annualized rate compounded annually is around 10%, a vast difference.

There is a very successful absolute return fund that has given investors a profit of a staggering 2,806% since early 1996. The managers are honest and, while giving the correct return, this also equates to a compounded return of just more than 35% per annum.

However, if they had been trying to express this return as a level annual yield, it would have been around 270% per annum. A truly vast difference.

Gas stations not keen to return to 24-hour service

PHUKET: Last month the cabinet issued an order rescinding the limitations on gas station opening hours which kept pumps closed between 10 pm and 5 am. Despite this, most local gas stations will continue to close by 10 pm.

Roya Jantarattana, Acting Director of the Region 11 Energy Office explained that the order for early closing was repealed in order to help truck drivers and other night workers but that discretion as to opening hours has been left to businesses.

Gas station operators, however, are reluctant to go back to 24-hour service. Difficulty in securing graveyard-shift workers, robberies, thieving employees, and electricity costs have all been given as reasons for the continuation of the reduced hours.

Promsit Suppokeekul, Manager of the Shell station on Phang Nga Road, delineated the local opening hours for each station in the Shell chain, "In Samkong, next to Bangkok Hospital Phuket, we are open from 6.30 am to 9 pm everyday. On Phang Nga Rd and on Thepkasattri Rd, we used to be open 24 hours, but ... now both are closed by 10 pm."

Although he spoke in favor of all-night opening, citing the benefits to late night truckers, for example, he gave electricity costs and a lack of employees as the major reason for the continued short shift.

Managers of other gas stations on the island echoed K.



Promsit's opinions, Chantra Duangrat, Manager of PTT on Thepkasatri Rd. said, "We don't want to be burdened with the large increase in electricity consumption and the larger workforce that would be needed to stay open 24 hours a day, therefore we have decided to stick to the 10pm closing time.

"Being open all night would also put us at a higher risk of robbery as well as pilfering by our own employees."

The experiences of Ampol Manpanawongsin, Manager of the Caltex station at the Kathu intersection, show that the oil companies' concerns are not unfounded. "We've been open 24 hours a day since December 1 but have been spending more on electricity than we've been taking in from sales," he said.

"People have got used to filling up before 10, so it may take

a while for them to go back to nocturnal habits; but we want to be there to help motorists in need of fuel at night. However, if the number of users doesn't increase soon, at least enough to outweigh power costs, we will go back to 10pm closing," he added.

Not surprisingly, perhaps, given the island's gas stations' reluctance to increase their service hours, fuel consumption has remained largely unaffected by the change in the law. Wichitpong Chuenthongsurp, Manager of the PTT Phuket Oil Terminal said, "The quantity of fuel transfered to gas stations hasn't really been affected by the change in opening hours, just by the shift from low to high season."

He added that, in his opinion, 24 hour service was unnecessary, as consumers had altered their behavior to conform to shorter opening hours.








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Phang Nga Bay Regatta dates set

Neramit win Volunteer cup





Construction Update

ollowing the success of their previous developments, Palm Garden housing development in Pa Khlok and Palm Spring Condominiums in Patong, SG One Co Ltd have begun their 500-millionbaht Palm Breeze Resort condominium project on Saiyuan Rd in Nai Harn.

The project, on six rai two kilometers from Nai Harn Beach, will comprise five buildings in contemporary Thai style, each with its own private entrance and elevator to all floors.

The buildings will be set in lush tropical landscaping, with a putting green 30 meters by 40m, an 8m-by-12m tennis court, a 10m-by-20m pool with a large sunbathing deck, a fully-equipped gymnasium and spa, and a restaurant-coffee shop and bar. There will also be a reception that will be manned 24 hours to provide all services, and private, secure parking.

Sucheep Akrasanee, Managing Director of SG One, told the *Gazette* that the company is offering 80 freehold condominium apartments fully fitted with Western kitchens and bathrooms.

The apartments are available in four types: 102 square meters with one bedroom; 115 sqm with two bedrooms; 218sqm with three bedrooms; and luxury penthouse units of more than 400sqm with Jacuzzi, private terrace, plunge pool and rooftop garden.

'The project will be built in two phases. Buildings A and B are part of the first phase, along with the shared swimming pool, reception, gymnasium and spa, restaurant and bar, and the car parking spaces.

Work on the first phase started at the beginning of this month and is expected to be completed by February 2008. The first phase is already about 10% complete," K. Sucheep said.

"The second phase will be is completed," he added.

The first, second and third floor of each building will comprise two one-bedroom units and two two-bedroom units. The fourth floor will have two threebedroom units, and the fifth floor will have two three-bedroom penthouses.

"We have studied the current market and have found that, regardless of whether the property is for permanent or shortterm use, buyers of tropical property look at certain criteria when making a purchase: location, quality, design, value for money, investment and potential capital appreciation.

"Short-, medium- and longterm rental returns top the list, along with obvious factors, such as on-site facilities, quality on-site management, security and safety," K. Sucheep said.

"During construction we are offering low-deposit terms and easy repayment plans, which can be tailor-made to each buyer," K. Sucheep said

"Foreign freehold ownership is available, which means that foreigners can hold the freehold titles in their names under current Thai law.

"Financing is also available to foreign buyers but only on selected units. The finance plans can also be tailor-made to suit individual circumstances," he added.

The off-plan launch prices, which range from 3.5 million baht to 9.9 million baht, provide an opportunity to buy a unit with the potential for large capital appreciation during the construction period, K. Sucheep said, adding that early off-plan buying gives buyers a wider choice of units.




Nuts over coconuts

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

here are many things that are predictable in this world: *The Sound of*

Music appearing on TV at Christmas, Air Asia flights being late all year, getting wet at Songkran whether you want to join in or not, and totally gratuitous digs at citizens of South Canadia in the gardening column of the *Phuket Gazette*. The list goes on. And on.

Christmas has its own predictability in the West. You can guarantee that the number of pointless Christmas cards you send out will be pretty much in line with the number you receive every year; many from people you hardly know. Probably just as many from distant relatives you'd rather not meet up with ever again. The easy way out is to take my line of thinking on this one – just don't bother.

And what is it with the obsession with turkey that the Brits seem to have? It's not an especially aroi meat in the first place – a drier, tougher version of chicken, I suppose. So why do we insist on cooking a bird the size of Belgium every Christmas day? We end up eating the re-

mains of the thing for the next week. Turkey casseroles, turkey soup, turkey salad and turkey sandwiches. Post-Christmas turkey binges are just one of life's certain facts in the UK. All this not particularly pleasant meat from one of the ugliest birds on the planet. I think I'll just stick to tom yam kung this year, as I usually do.

TV programming takes a nosedive during the Christmas season, too (sorry – I just can't bring myself to use that awful American "holidays" thing). They seem to take the very worst TV programs that have regularly appeared all year, chuck a bit of holly in the background and give everyone a Santa hat, and call it the "Christmas edition". Excruciating stuff.

The Christmas season seems to get longer every year there. There are shops in the UK that are breaking out the Christmas decorations at the beginning

of October – nearly three months ahead of the day itself. Why not just leave them up all year, and have a 365-day Christmas, from Boxing Day to Christmas Day, every year? Just a thought.

Christmas in Thailand is more than a little strange to us Westerners, but at least doesn't go on for too long. Hearing *Santa Claus is Coming to Town* blaring out of the speakers at Big C and Tesco Lotus isn't what I would expect, but is as predictable as the baubles hanging from the lights and the Christmas tree in the lobby. All of this covered in fake snow in a country where snow hasn't fallen for several million years and Christmas isn't even a holiday.

I suppose I should be predictable myself, and get onto something vaguely Christmassy. Every year at around this time, one plant in particular makes a regular appearance *en masse* at the various garden centers around Phuket – the poinsettia.

As far as the plant world is concerned, it's about the closest we can get to Christmas in this region of the planet. It's also known as the Christmas plant, or completely predictably, "kissemass" in Thai. In many other areas, this is one of the most popular plants in many homes over the Christmas holiday season.

For those who care, it got its name after it was first introduced to the United States in 1825 by the first US ambassador to Mexico, Joel Robert Poinsett. He took cuttings from a shrub he found growing next to a road in

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the wilds of southern Mexico and brought them back to his greenhouse in South Carolina.

The poinsettia's official species name, pulcherrima, means "most beautiful". It actually really is, with its huge display of rich foliage. It probably became known as the Christmas plant purely because of its coloring – vivid red and green – being long associated with the Christmas season.

The showy, colored part of poinsettias that most people think are the flowers (bright scarlet) are actually colored bracts, or modified leaves. The actual flowers or cyathia of the poinsettia are in the center of the colorful bracts, and in reality are a little disappointing. They're tiny. Any gardening center in Phuket will happily part with a 40centimeter-high example of the Christmas plant for around 150 baht. Unlike most floral purchases in Thailand, it's one of those plants that needs little translation – just ask for "kissemas" and you'll get what you're after. There is certainly no shortage of "kissemas" vendors at present.

To check the poinsettia's maturity examine the true flowers, which are located at the base of the colored bracts. If the flowers are green- or red-tipped and fresh looking, the bloom will last longer than if yellow pollen is covering the flowers. A fresh poinsettia is one on which little or no yellow pollen is showing on the flower clusters in the center of the bracts.

Poinsettias prefer moderately moist soil, so when the soil begins to feel dry to the touch, add enough water so the excess drips out the drain holes if they're in pots, but never allow the plant to sit in water. Ideally, they should be fed every couple of weeks with a fertilizer when the plant is growing. Do this and they'll thank you forever – even after Christmas.

Poinsettias are perennials, so it is theoretically possible to

keep them growing from year to year, and doing their thing at Christmas. In theory (I've never tried this here myself), to get them to produce their flower bracts again next December, they must be kept in a cool spot and in total darkness for 14 hours per day beginning in mid-September.

Any light, even turning on a light bulb for a few seconds will delay the bloom. I have to say that this advice is designed for more temperate climates, so I'm not honestly sure that it would work here. "A cool spot"? Yeah, right.

One word of caution with the Christmas plant. Poinsettia sap may irritate your skin, so perhaps rubber gloves would be a good idea whenever you are doing any pruning, pinching or cutting of these plants.

Christmas in Phuket? It may not be celebrated here in the traditional sense, but at least there are one or two ways we can be reminded of the festive season here. And we don't even need to put up with Julie Andrews wailing about lonely goat herds or endure turkey sandwiches for weeks to come.

Merry Christmas. I'll see you at the beach.

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

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


