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Police furious over 'stolen' aid claims

PHUKET CITY: Deputy Commissioner General of the Royal Thai Police Pol Gen Achilawit Subarnbhesaj blasted a front page story in the December 25 edition of *The Nation* newspaper that quoted allegations by "informed sources" that money donated from abroad to the Thailand Tsunami Victim Identification (TTVI) project had been wasted and stolen.

Speaking at the Phuket City Police Station on the same day the story was published, Gen Achilawit admitted that the Royal Thai Police had indeed received a letter from diplomats representing Finland, Germany, the Netherlands, Sweden, the UK, the US and France. The letter requested an investigation into how more than 61 million baht donated by a total of 11 countries had been spent.

However, Gen Achilawit insisted that control of the money had always been under foreign supervision and Thai police had nothing to hide.

According to a police press release dated December 25, all withdrawals of over 50,000 baht from the TTVI account had to be approved by the TTVI administrative committee, which comprised 12 members representing both Thailand and donor countries. Withdrawal amounts greater than 10,000 baht required approval by at least two out of the four TTVI Joint Chiefs of Staff. These controls were in place from May 1, 2005, when the money was pledged, until June 1, 2006.

From June 1, 2006 onwards, control of the TTVI's

Hundreds remember

PATONG: More than 700 mourners joined local dignitaries for the tsunami memorial ceremony held at Loma Park on the morning of December 26, two years after the tsunami struck the beach there.

The ceremony, led by 99 monks from nearby Laem Petch Temple, was mostly conducted in silence, with only the sounds of the monks praying and the waves on the beach to be heard.

Memorial services continued in the evening on Patong Beach, as well as at Kamala and Khao Lak.

operational fund was transferred to a team of high-ranking Thai police officers comprising Pol Lt Gen Ammarin Neimsakul, Pol Maj Gen Sangchai Suwuttanapakdee and Pol Col Khemmarin Hassiri. During this period, all withdrawals also had to be approved by a foreign Financial Officer, Gen Achilawit explained. At the time the handover of financial control was made, about 31 million baht remained. Any funds left after the project is finished will be handed back to the donors, he explained.

"For the accounts from June, 1, 2006, I can say that we are ready to be investigated. We still have 24 million baht left, and we still have a representative from the international community controlling the accounts.

"Therefore the investigation that the diplomats requested, which asks 'Where did our tsunami cash go?', is not just an investigation of the money given to Thailand to use. It is also requires an investigation of their people, the ones who came and spent money in Thailand.

"The Nation should be fair, considering that news like this will be broadcast abroad. If they were aware of all the facts, they would have known that before June 1 foreigners controlled everything. Thais didn't just take the money and manage things themselves...therefore for matters before [June 1] we are the ones calling for an investigation," Gen Achilawit said angrily.

"The technical terms used in the meeting may be misreported, therefore I'd like to say the *farang* controlled all the money, not us. I want the people to understand that we weren't the people in charge of the money, the *farang* controlled it all themselves," Gen Achilawit reiterated.

The Royal Thai Police have already appointed members to an investigation panel and are coordinating with the US Embassy to send representatives to join the probe, he added.

Woman hires teen to kill ex-lover

CHERNG TALAY: A woman has been charged with conspiracy to murder after allegedly hiring a 16-year-old boy to kill her exlover for 3,000 baht.

Krietiphum Saotan, 41, was blasted with a shotgun December 16 near the construction site where he worked, Pol Col Jessada Sangsuree, Investigating Inspector at Cherng Talay Police Station, told the *Gazette*.

K. Krietiphum was rushed to Thalang Hospital, but died of his injuries en route.


Before he died, K. Krietiphum told his wife that he suspected that his ex-lover Somyong Kaew-art was behind the attack, Col Jessada explained.

Police later arrested Somyong, he said, adding that she had confessed to hiring K. Krietiphum's killer.

K. Krietiphum had been seeing Somyong for several years, by her account, but had refused to separate from his wife, although, she alleged, she already had his unborn child aborted.

Angry, she hired a 16-yearold construction worker at another site to shoot him.

"We have issued a warrant for the boy's arrest. We believe he is from Suphan Buri province. Our officers are now looking for him," said Col Jessada.



Nivit transfers out of Phuket

PHUKET: Phuket Provincial Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) Nivit Aroonrat left Phuket on December 22 to take the position of Palad of Samut Sakhon Province. His new duties officially began on December 25.

Palad Nivit told the *Gazette* that he had applied for a transfer from Phuket after a stay of little more than a year because he is very tired of the hard work the job in Phuket entails.

"I'm not moving from Phuket to avoid problems here, I'm moving to be closer to my family in Bangkok as I don't want my family to have to relocate here," he added.

Palad Nivit was in charge of many fractious disputes on the island.

He bore responsibility for

the ongoing eviction of squatters from Soi Phra Barami 8 in Patong and the eviction of the vendors in front of Laguna on Bang Tao Beach. He also led the investigation into Narin Dangtakote's orphanage for tsunami victims, and was heavily involved in the introduction of the currently stalled new regulations for dive businesses.

"I'm proud that the work I did was understood by the people and the press. I'm particularly proud of the work I did in resolving the [airport] limousine problem, which was a very difficult situation before my involvement," Palad Nivit said.

"I have transfered my current duties to Vice-Governor Tri Augkaradacha to continue," he added.

K. Nivit's replacement as Provincial Palad is Piya Pharatasinlapin, who was Muang District Chief in Nakhon Sri Thammarat

"The farang will have to investigate the farang as well. It won't be just the Thai side under investigation. It was the farang who used most of the money, so they'll have to be investigated, too," Gen Achilawit explained.

He said that the ambassadors' letter had asked for the investigeation to be conducted as quickly as possible.

The scandal is not the first involving misappropriation of tsunami aid funds in Phuket. A police investigation into 2.04 million baht in funds stolen at Phuket Provincial Hall in February 2005 appears to have stalled in the criminal justice system.

In another case, Phuket provincial government is investigating allegations of financial impropriety at the Thai-Swedish Children's Foundation in Thalang, which was set up to help tsunami orphans and other needy children.

Too early to gauge impact of 'Black Tuesday', say experts

PHUKET: While the stock market took the brunt of the "Black Tuesday" sell-off triggered by the capital controls to stem speculation against the rising Thai baht, experts say that it is too early to gauge the long-term impact on Phuket's property market.

Although the 30% withholding requirement on foreign capital inflows was quickly rescinded for certain transactions, including direct foreign investment and stock market transactions, at press time the rule still applied to other forms of foreign investment, including property funds.

The measures, adopted by the Bank of Thailand (BOT) on December 18, initially affected all capital inflows of US\$20,000 (about 700,000 baht) or greater.

Foreigners were required to

make a 30% withholding deposit with the BOT. Where it still applies, the measure effectively freezes up investment capital without earning interest for at least a year, after which the depositor can apply for a refund.

Phummisak Hongsyok, Phuket's representative to the National Legislative Assembly, said that the BOT's methods were strong but effective in stemming the baht's rise against the American currency.

He agreed with the BOT's decision to relax the measure for stock market investment, saying it was too strict.

The long-term fallout on direct investment and the real estate market can be assessed only after January 4, when the holiday period has ended and further BOT adjustments may be announced, he added.

The currency control mea-

sures were the second government announcement to have a major impact on foreign investment in the property sector this year

The first was a Ministry of Interior order issued last May instructing provincial governors to crack down on foreigners using Thais as "nominees" to set up real estate investment firms, he noted

Investor confidence would improve if the BOT had issued an advance statement of how the currency control measures were intended to affect foreign property investment, he said.

"The government has to make a clear-cut decision as to what extent they want to open up Phuket, and Thailand, to foreigners wishing to stay and invest here. This would include revising visa regulations to support long-stay tourism as well as currency controls," he said.

Graham Bibby, Managing Director of the Richmond Group and also an experienced currency analyst, views the BOT's latest actions as misdirected. "The whole problem is not about the Thai baht going up. It's about the US dollar going down. The BOT is focusing on the wrong thing ... The BOT needs to educate its exporters.


"They worry about the exporters, but in most countries exporters know how to hedge the the currency – to lock in the currency rate...

"This is not a Thai baht problem, it is a US dollar problem. In my view, the Thai baht is going to go to 30 to the US dollar in the next six to eight months," he predicted.

"For property investment, in some respects it is not so bad. The only problem is that it was on the front page of every newspaper, which portrays Thailand in a negative way.

"What I have been telling clients is that this proves my point that Thailand is too international now. In the old days, 15 or 20 years ago, they could do this.

But now they can't do this even they want to because the international community will not accept it," he said.







Jungceylon opens with That's Siam

PATONG: The Jungceylon complex officially kicked its doors open with the grand launch of That's Siam, the largest of the shopping zones in the complex.

Early-bird shoppers were treated to performances by traditional Thai dancers, street performers, a giant indoor Christmas display and a light and water show.

That's Siam comprises 10,000 square meters of floor space, of which about 50% is occupied by businesses that are now open.

Among the shops now trading are outlets of major chains, including Starbucks and Carrefour, as well as branches of Siam Commercial Bank and Kasikorn-Bank. The zone is divided into five sections: Thai fabrics, Thai art

and handicrafts, beauty and spa, Thai food, and a Thai art exhibition and craft demonstration area.

Other zones in the complex are slated to open next year.

Prawich Janyasittikul, Vice-CEO of Jungceylon Phuket, said that 90% of floor space in That's Siam is devoted to shops selling Thai handicrafts.

The remaining 10% is occupied by shops selling imported items such as carpets, cashmere, metalwork and household goods.

About 40,000 people a day were expected to visit the complex in the week after it opened, rising to about 50,000 a day in early 2007, K. Prawich said.

The opening of That's Siam also marks another milestone for the beach resort town – underneath the center is parking space for some 2,000 cars that is now available to shoppers.

Blue Canyon to host Johnnie Walker Classic

PHUKET (*The Nation*): The US\$2.4-million Johnnie Walker Classic will return to Phuket in March, silencing rumors it could be moved to another country due to the government's attempt to ban alcohol advertising and sponsorship.

Organizers Riche Monde, distributor of the drink, insisted on keeping the tournament at Phuket's Blue Canyon Country Club from March 1 to 4.

"There will be no problem if we have to refrain from advertising," said Riche Monde President Vorathep Rangchaikul.

Earlier this year, the company considered relocating the event to another Asian nation if it was not allowed to use its logo and the brand name.

The government's proposed legislation to ban liquor advertising and sponsorship has been indefinitely postponed as the Ministry of Health failed to introduce it in the National Legislative Assembly.

Tri-sanctioned by the European, Asian and Australian Tours, the 16th Johnnie Walker Classic will be staged in Thailand for the sixth time since the tournament started in 1990.

This year three top 10 marquee names – Adam Scott of Australia, and Retief Goosen and Ernie Els of South Africa – have confirmed their participation.

Goosen will make his second visit to the Blue Canyon where he shared the Tiger Skins title with Thomas Bjorn in 2005.

Former Kathu Deputy killed in accident

BANGKOK (*Kom Chad Luek*, *Gazette*): Pol Lt Col Yuthathawee Nakhonkhorn, a former Deputy Superintendent of Kathu District Police Station, was killed in a traffic accident in Bangkok early on December 19.

As Col Yuthathawee was on his way home from a business meeting, his black Ford Escape sports utility vehicle was involved in a collision with a 10-wheel truck.

The accident occurred about 2 am on the Rachawipha Bridge. By the time police arrived at the scene, the driver of the truck had already fled.

Col Yuthathawee, originally from Bangkok, was Deputy Superintendent responsible for criminal investigations at Kathu District Police Station from 2001 to 2003.

After resigning from the police force he started his own travel company, Global Imex.

He leaves behind a wife and two sons.

Leatherback nest marks turtle return

KARON: A giant leatherback turtle on December 25 laid a nest of 103 eggs on Karon Beach, where a sea turtle has not been sighted laying eggs for more than 10 years.

Karon Municipality officials had the task of recovering the eggs as local villagers had taken them all in hopes of selling them as a delicacy. All but two broken eggs were recovered and taken

to incubate at the Phuket Marine Biology Center (PMBC).

Karon Deputy Mayor Ittipol Sangkaew explained that the eggs sell for about 60 baht each. "But after we explained to the villagers that we should let the eggs hatch so that the next generation can see real, live sea turtles – not just pictures of them – they agreed to give them back," he said.

"I haven't seen this kind of turtle for 10 years," K. Ittipol said. "The turtle will likely return within the next 10 days to lay another clutch of eggs.

"Female turtles lay 500 to 600 eggs at different times over the breeding season, so we have posted security guards along the beachfront to protect the eggs and the turtle, and to allow people to watch from a safe distance as she lays her eggs," he added.

PMBC Biologist Kanjana Adulyanukosol said that the eggs should hatch in about 60 days.

"After the eggs hatch we will take care of the hatchlings for about a month before we release them back to sea, which should be at Karon Beach because it is near the open sea," she said.

"I'm not sure if all of these eggs are healthy, however, because they were moved by people and may not hatch," she added. K. Kanjana said that turtles are known to lay eggs at only three beaches in Phuket: Mai Khao Beach, Nai Harn Beach and Karon Beach.

Death in childbirth rife in South

he rate of women dying during childbirth in the three southernmost provinces is the highest in Thailand – and even higher than in Ethiopia, a top doctor from the Red Cross has said.

Dr Manoj Mukati, Assistant Director of the Relief and Community Health Bureau at the Thai Red Cross Society, said one of the critical unnoticed crises in Thailand was the ratio of women dying in childbirth in the Deep South.

Speaking at the launch of the World Disasters Report 2006 - Focus on neglected crises, Dr Manoj said that at present nine in every 100 women giving birth in Pattani, Yala and Narathiwat provinces die during or as a result of the delivery – a much higher percentage than in other regions of Thailand.

The ratio was similar to that in Nepal and even higher than that of famine-plagued Ethiopia, one of the least-developed countries in the world, he said.

Dr Manop said that a major factor was that many Muslim women in the region use midwives because they do not want to be treated by male doctors and there are few female doctors working at hospitals in those provinces.

Telewise: The Superintendent at Tha Sala District Police Station, Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Pol Col Wisit Reutthiplaeng, has been charged with corruption after allegedly receiving a television for his involvement in keeping a shooting from going to court while he was Superintendent of nearby Phibun District Police Station.

The charges were brought by Phibun District Chief Somphot Sotichuchuang, who said that he had received a complaint that Col Wisit had accepted a Samsung television for his part in negotiat-

ing a deal to clear a shooting incident at Phibun market.

According to the complaint filed by K. Somphot, 90,000 baht changed hands between the parties involved in the incident.

Col Wisit denied the charges, saying that the duty officer had dealt with the shooting case and told him that the injured party would not press charges.

He then had to go to a meeting at Police Region 8 headquarters and did not return to Phibun for two to three days, Col Wisit said. When he returned, the television in question was sitting in his office, he added.

A senior sergeant-major at the station then told him that the television had been given to him as a present by a local kamnan (subdistrict chief) who had recently profited well on some contracting deals, Col Wisit said.

The *kamnan* did not expect anything in return for the gift, he added.

Tambon terror: A member of a Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) in Thung Song District, Nakhon Sri Thammarat, was shot dead in his pickup truck as he went to photocopy documents in a shop outside Thung Song Technical College on December 22.

The crime was reported to Thung Song District Police Station at 9:15 am. Officers rushed to the scene to find the body of Manee Siriphanphong, 47, the Khuan Krod OrBorTor council member for Village 3, slumped in the driver's seat of his Toyota pickup. He had been shot eight times - in the head, neck and

college who witnessed the attack told police that the gunman was male and appeared to be in his early twenties.

The man waited outside the photocopy shop for Manee to arrive. After Manee had parked his truck, the gunman walked up and opened fire before escaping on a 110cc Honda Wave motorcycle driven by an accomplice, the students reported.

Pol Lt Col Bunmee Siripalaka, Deputy Superintendent at Thung Song District Police Station, said that on December 3 Manee had an argument with a local man named Prasert (last name not given) and had beaten him over the head with a piece of wood.

Prasert had filed charges about the incident and the case was being investigated at the time of Manee's death. After the inci-

dent, Manee went to Prasert's house and ordered him not to extract sand to sell in the village, Col Bunmee said.

Manee's son, Piyawat, told police that Prasert was the only person his father was in dispute with, Col Bunmee added.

At the time of going to press police were in the process of questioning witnesses and preparing sketches of the killer and his accomplice.

Two days earlier in neighboring Trang province, the Deputy President of Natham Neua OrBorTor was shot dead in his pickup on the way back from taking local children to

Police reported that Manop Khongkaew, 33, was shot three times. He was hit in the throat, shoulder and chest.

Witnesses reported seeing two men on a motorcycle pull up alongside Manop's car and the masked pillion passenger open fire. Police said they believe the motive for the killing to be a personal dispute.

Col Yutapong Phromkhwanthong, President of Natham Neua OrBorTor, said that he had no idea why his deputy was killed, as there had never been politically-motivated violence in the tambon before.

Manop worked as a freelance woodcutter and drove local children to school, and did not have any disputes over business, he said.

Surly surf: Raging surf stirred up by a typhoon in the Gulf of Thailand destroyed 30 coastal homes in Songkhla's Ranot District and 15 houses in Surat Thani's Tha Chana District on December 21.

The impact of the rough seas was felt all the way up the southern gulf coast. Nakhon Sri Thammarat declared a 54-kilometer coastal stretch from Hua Sai to Pak Phanang District a disaster zone. Ferry services were suspended and residents were forced to move to higher ground.


Tambon Bor Thru Mayor Kamol Pinyo said that 30 houses in Bor Thru, in Songkhla's Ranot District, were flooded. District Chief Thanee Kamolchino urged coastal residents to be cautious and to erect sandbag barriers.

Songkhla disaster relief chief Wichit Chanthornpan warned parts of Chana and Ranot Districts of strong winds and high waves. He urged small craft to stay off the water and beachfront residents to move inland as a precaution.

In Surat Thani's Tha Chana district, four-meter waves flooded 15 homes along beaches in Tha Krajai, prompting local ground.

he Justice Ministry is pushing for traffic law amendments that would force drivers suspected of being drunk to take a bloodalcohol test. The law would also empower police to detain those who refuse to be tested.

At the launch of the "Young People Against Drink Driving' campaign, Justice Ministry Permanent Secretary Charan Phakdithanakul said the ministry had drafted two amendments to the Land Transportation Act of

The first would force suspected drunk drivers to take a breath or a blood-alcohol test. Anyone who refused could be automatically regarded as drunk by officers and would face punishment of up to three months in jail and a fine of up to 10,000 baht.

Currently, refusal to take a sobriety test draws the lighter penalty of obstructing police, punishable by a fine of 1,000 baht.

The second amendment would make it mandatory for anyone involved in motor vehicle accidents to submit to sobriety tests, instead of leaving the matter up to an individual police officer's assessment, Charan said.

The proposals should be approved and in effect for the Songkran Festival in April, he

migrant workers a bigger priority in a bid to prevent the spread of diseases, including Aids and tuberculosis (TB).

The ministry estimates that more than one million legal and illegal migrants living in Thailand do not undergo formal or regular health checks, mainly because they have not registered with relevant authorities.

The number of registered foreign workers stands at 668,576. Of those, 419,428 have to recent figures released by the MoPH.

In a related story, the Cabinet has given the green light for registered migrant workers to stay and work in the country for one more year.

The government's Deputy Spokesperson, Natpreeya Chumchaiyo, said immigrant workers with permits due to expire on February 28 and June 30 next year will be allowed to stay one year longer in the King-

Foreign workers must pay 600 baht for a medical check-up and 1,300 baht for health insurance, she added.

Casualties of war: The Department of Special Investigation (DSI) is going to establish four teams to investigate four cases of murder and the disappearance of a woman during the Thaksin government's notorious "War on

DSI Deputy Director General Tharit Pengdit said the teams would comprise from six to 10 members, mainly made up of civil servants or military officers.

This was due to public suspicion that police might have been involved in these cases.

Tharit said ousted premier Thaksin Shinawatra's speeches about his policy to launch a war on drugs would also be included in the investigative report.

Human-rights activists have blamed Thaksin for spurring the spate of killings during the war on drugs.

Ministry targets website: The Ministry of Culture sought the blocking of the overseas-based website Camfrog.com for allegedly showing live lewd acts by webcam users that are being widely accessed in Thailand.

The site has been available in Thailand for three years through AsiaNet Thailand, which holds an ICT Ministry conces-

Culture Ministry Permanent Secretary Weera Rojphojjanarat said his ministry would seek police and ICT Ministry help to have the site blocked.

The showing of a lewd act in public carries a maximum punishment of three years in jail and a 3,000 baht fine, he said.

Poramet Minsiri, Director of the White Internet for Thai Youths and Thai Webmasters Association, revealed that users in Thailand were the site's third most frequent visitors, behind the United States and China.

While many used the site in constructive ways, some broadcast lewd acts, he said.

These include young people and students who undress for web cameras, unaware that recordings of their actions can be sold and distributed.

iving life as a "woman of the second kind" is bound to hone a man's skills of impersonation. To make the act convincing, many effeminate men walk, talk and act like a lady to fill their preferred gender role.

After being fired from his job as an assistant nurse at Khon Kaen Central Hospital for pilfering medical equipment, aging ladyboy Somsap Buraphat, 58, decided to put his impersonation skills to the test... by deceiving monks, drugging them and then making off with their possessions.

Somsap's story came to light after the 68-year-old Deputy Abbot of Wat Wae-luwan Forest in Udon Thani province reported to police December 18 that he had been robbed by a such a "woman", who claimed to be a doctor.

The crafty *katoey*, as such "women" are called in the Kingdom, struck up a conversation with the abbot. When he had won the Deputy Abbot's trust, the fake doc offered to give him a health-boosting injection.

However, he injected the hapless clergyman with a tranquilizer, waited for him to lose consciousness and then made off with 4,000 baht the Deputy Abbot had in his shoulder bag.

By noon the following day, police had identified the suspect and arrested Somsap in his house in Phon Thon District, Roi-Et.

They also seized tranquilizer, high blood pressure medicine, antiseptic, vitamin tablets and medical equipment as evidence.

Somsap later confessed to police, telling them how after he was fired from the hospital he used his medical experience to trick monks throughout Isarn.

He would go to a *wat* and start a conversation, and, after a little while, would say to the monk that he looked a little sickly.

He would then reveal that he was actually a doctor and, luckily for the monk, Somsap had just the miracle cure the monk needed to get him back to full health.

He would then persuade his victim to take him back to his cell where he would tranquilize him before making off with his possessions.

Why Somsap chose to target only monks was not re-



FLUSHED WITH PRIDE

Ithough a trip to the toilet of a Thai fresh market usually requires a biohazard suit and shots, that is certainly not the case at Banzaan market in Patong.

As part of the World Toilet Expo and Forum 2006, held last November at Muang Thong Thani Impact Arena in Nonthaburi Province, Banzaan won for best toilet in the "market" category for the entire southern region.

At a ceremony held at the Thavorn Grand Plaza on November 29, Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanimit awarded a representative of Banzaan market 3,000 baht.

There was also a 2,000-baht prize for Baan Yai Marketing, the contractor responsible for daily lavatory upkeep at Banzaan, a tourist-oriented market located next to the newly-opened Jungceylon shopping center.

The award for Baan Yai is perhaps unique, given that marketing companies are more often noted for creating effluent rather than cleaning it up.

The Phuket-based company employs 25 cleaning staff, who work diligently from 6 am until 9 pm daily.

One member of the staff is charged with the all-important task of inspecting the state of the

toilets. This is done every five minutes, thus ensuring that any hygiene threats are dealt with swiftly – before they degenerate into the kind of woeful mess that all-too-often characterizes the state of public restrooms in this country.

Award-winning hygiene comes at a price, however. Wattana Silapawutikul, assistant accountant of Banzaan market, told the *Gazette* that janitorial and maintenance fees paid to Baan Yai reach as high as 250,000 baht per month.

"We have to take special care of the toilets, because our customers have to use them, and that is where we have to be very careful with the smell," K. Watana explained.

Somsaing Boonma, supervisor of Baan Yai Marketing, said, "We service many big sites, including Jungceylon and Prince of Songkla University...We train our staff for three months before they start work, then we babysit them for their first three days on the job.

"The workers have to take turns, learning how to clean up in a variety of different situations."

Just what those situations might include will be left to the imagination of the reader.

But rest assured that if you are shopping at Banzaan when you hear the call of nature, your experience in the bathroom is more likely to one of pleasure than peril

2006: The year of

rom post-tsunami rebuilding, the coup and southern violence to tailor touts baffling Immigration rules – here **Somchai Huasaikul** looks back over the past year and reflects on the issues that have affected Phuket.

espite being a year marked with intense political turmoil and almost daily acts of violence in the Deep South, 2006 marked the resurgence of Phuket's all-important tourism industry, with the number of tourist arrivals reaching pre-tsunami levels – about 4.7 million visitors were expected by year's end.

By far the year's top story was the bloodless military coup in Bangkok on September 19. Combined with the six coordinated bombings of tourist destinations in Haad Yai just three days earlier, this appeared to be a double-whammy for tourism in Phuket. With just six weeks to go before the start of the tourist high season, industry leaders were left thinking, "Oh no, here we go again!"

As it turned out, neither the coup, continuing violence in the Deep South nor travel alerts issued by some foreign governments seemed to have any impact on tourism here. In fact, there was little discernible difference to life in post-coup Phuket, apart from gas stations and shopping centers being allowed to stay open later.

While the words "military coup" might conjure up images of deserted streets after dark, that certainly wasn't the case this time around, especially in Phuket. Police on the island actually

seemed to lighten up on the early closing times imposed on bars during the previous government's "better social order" campaign.

In fact, despite the official imposition of martial law in the province after the coup, the only place in Phuket with any discernible military presence was at the airport, where some soldiers were briefly stationed immediately after the coup.

But now at the airport, the only disturbance seems to be from the hordes of irritable foreign tourists, who on arrival are forced to queue up and suffer lengthy delays waiting to clear Immigration.

The near-complete recovery was due in part to successful efforts by the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT), Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) and Phuket Provincial Administration Organization in tapping new markets, most notably "green season" arrivals from the Middle East.

Tourists from that arid part of the world find nothing more exotic than a torrential downpour or pushing a stroller up Soi Bangla, dodging flamboyant ladyboys festooned in fake peacock feathers and high heels. And why not? You don't get that in Dubai or Damascus.

Another important factor was that it became easier for tourists to get here as 2006 progressed. The year began with

tourism industry representatives begging the TAT to do something about the lack of direct flights to Phuket, many of which were canceled due to lack of demand after the tsunami.

Also cut back during those dark days were the number of flights from Bangkok by national carrier Thai Airways International (THAI). But by the end of 2006, the number of carriers using Phuket Airport had increased to a new high of 39. These included newcomers such as Australia's Jetstar as well as a resumption of direct flights from Hong Kong by DragonAir. With the arrival of high season, so many charter flights began to ar-

rive that finding parking for them all became a problem.

To ensure this year's high season got off with a bang, the PTA dumped some three million baht into this year's Phuket Carnival, which was better than ever with a "bikini runway" featuring more than 100 slinky models traipsing along the beach road and great entertainment, including a concert by Modern Dog.

Other high-profile events in 2006 included jet-ski racing in Patong, an FIVB women's beach volleyball tournament in Karon and the Rubson Raid Turquoise, as well as the usual big annual events, such as the King's Cup Regatta and the Laguna Triathlon,

which was unfortunately marred this year by the death of one competitor from a heart attack.

In Patong, a 195-million-baht project overseen by the TAT to redevelop the beachfront was finally finished, as was a similar project in Kamala, where a tsunami memorial sculpture was dedicated. In another tsunami-related development, the island's system of warning towers was completed and the first tsunami detection buoy was deployed in the Indian Ocean, courtesy of the US government.

Entering 2007, the Patong beachfront looks better than it did before the tsunami, with lots of smart new establishments along

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bouncing back

the beach road north of Sawatdirak Rd.

But all of these shopping facilities put together are still dwarfed by Jungceylon, which finally opened in full on December 20, after lengthy delays and legal battles.

Jungceylon is expected to finally transform central Patong, between Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd and Nanai Rd, into a familyfriendly tourist attraction rather than the muddy, garbage strewn wasteland much of the project has replaced.

Other positive developments in Patong included the continued success of Soi Bangla's nightly transformation into a pedestrian's thoroughfare.

The idea started on a trial basis in 2005 out of concerns that Bangla might be a nice target for terrorists, especially when the US Navy is in town.

But the result has been that with a much wider walking space on Soi Bangla, all the annoying touts operating there are easier to avoid.

Unfortunately, 2006 marked yet another year of no discernible progress on ridding the island of foreign touts. While almost all the touts work illegally, their inyour-face antics somehow continue to go unnoticed by local police, immigration and the labor department - though not by annoyed tourists, who consistently name them as one of the main reasons they won't be returning to Phuket.

However, 2006 was a miserable year for their low-income earning brethren: foreign laborers working in Phuket, registered and otherwise.



Adding to the list of Patong's attractions this year was Jungceylon, though the island's most popular beachside resort has aggressive tailor touts and violent tuk-tuk drivers to contend with.

After a year full of news stories chronicling the fate of poor Burmese eking out a living here, a tell-tale report came out near year's end; when the province announced its intention to impose an 8 pm curfew on their movements and restrict them from such activities as riding motorbikes and visiting shopping malls.

Another major development for Patong came in November, with the announcement that a one-way traffic system will go into effect on a three-month trial basis, starting January 15.

Proponents of the one-way system say it will bring some order to the traffic chaos that pre-

vails in the area. Opponents say it will transform the town's streets into impossible-to-cross drag strips, forcing all northbound traffic into an unenviable choice between Nanai Rd or the beach road.

Meanwhile, the new Phang Muang Rd, intended to serve as a new north-south artery, remains unfinished.

Unfortunately, there has also been no progress in cleaning up the huge, illegal dump site in the wasteland at the end of Patong's Soi Nanai 2. In fact, 2006 marked the year when the Gazette began inviting readers to send in photos of illegal garbage dumping in a section of the paper known as "Trashing Phuket".

While there has been no lack of contributions, not many of the sites have been cleaned up as a result of the exposure. Unfortunately, plans to add a second burner at the island's only incinerator at Saphan Hin remain on hold, although a glimmer of hope emerged with the opening of a small factory in Tambon Thepkrasatti to transform organic waste into fertilizer.

Also on a positive environmental note, Patong saw the the opening in October of a new 13million-baht "natural" wastewater treatment plant. Officials hope

the facility, which relies on terrestrial plant life to absorb organic waste, will help keep Patong free of the seaweed that has plagued it the past few high seasons.


Buoyed by its resurgent tourism economy, fears that posttsunami Phuket would fall off the global tourism map began to fade in 2006. As such, all the post-tsunami "lure-them-back-at-allcost" promotions have faded into memory; it is back to business as usual, which in Phuket sometimes means price gouging.

No part of the Phuket economy is better at it than the transport sector. In late November, a Welshman ended up in the hospital after he refused to pay 200 baht for a ride in a tuk-tuk from Soi Bangla to a hotel on Nanai Rd, just a few kilometers distance. The tuk-tuk driver stabbed him before heading back to Soi Bangla to look for another

Despite altercations between tuk-tuk drivers and passengers being common in Patong, the local municipality has continued to pass over the chance to introduce a public transport system of any kind in 2006, thus demonstrating its continued commitment to the needs of local taxi syndicates over those of visiting tourists.

Among many government officers departed in 2006 was former Phuket Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura, who must still be scratching his head about the fate of over 2 million baht in tsunami aid money stolen by persons unknown from Phuket Provincial Hall back in February 2005 – a matter over which he is still being held nominally responsible, at



he Indian Ocean's farflung and best-known holiday archipelago is no farther than suppertime. Nip down to Singapore, change planes, and you can be sitting down to a late evening meal in Malé, the capital of the Maldives, a tad north of the Equator, or – better still – at a resort on one of the atolls.

Even so, why go all that way? The Maldives are renowned for their pristine beaches, dive spots and resorts, but Phuket residents can find similar attractions closer to home. The answer lies in the islands' approach to tourism, which has been to develop upscale facilities to keep the hoi polloi at arms' length.

This makes sound ecological as well as economic sense. Send an armada of glass-bottomed boats out over the coral reefs, and very soon there won't be anything left to look at.

And there is no point in encouraging backpacking islandhoppers when just about everything they are going to need, from food to furniture, has to be im-

So what's known as the "Robinson Crusoe factor" remains one of the Maldives' prime lures, even if the legendary castaway needs to pack a credit card or two in his back pocket.



The Maldives' approach to tourism has set the benchmark for the 'Robinson Crusoe factor' – it's as natural as possible or it's not there.

Equally important, the Maldives remain stunningly pristine, with scarcely anything washed up on the beaches other than driftwood, and water that's as clear as gin and equally enticing.

There are some 1,200 islands in the archipelago, but only 200 are inhabited; tourist resorts occupy around half of these, most of which feature swish spas and top dining to go with superlative design. Wherever you stay, at least part of your vacation should be spent underwater, whether you are a fully-qualified diver or firsttime snorkeler.

There are myriad recognized and named dive sites, many of which are a short hop from resorts, while the rest can be reached by boat on diving trips.

Anyone who can don a mask and snorkel will see butterfly fish, angel fish, parrot fish, rock cod, unicorn fish, trumpet fish, blue-stripe snapper, Moorish idols, oriental sweet-lips and more.

Scuba divers will encounter larger life forms, such as sharks, stingrays, manta rays, turtles, moray eels, whales and dolphins, while just off Hulule International Airport, the remains of the Maldive Victory is rated as one of the best wreck dives in the world.

While it's very easy to sequester yourself away for the whole of your stay, the capital, Malé, makes for a good day's exploration. The National Museum, Islamic Center and accompanying Grand Mosque are all worth seeing, if not exactly worth

going to see, and the museum – three floors of musty artifacts contained in the only surviving portion of the deposed sultan's palace – is endearingly quaint.

The real attraction of the capital is the maze of small streets and the odd shops and boutiques, selling an assortment of handicrafts and general merchandise for locals. Anyone in search of pulsating nightlife in this Muslim stronghold is a couple of thousand miles off course.


Bearing in mind the old music hall song What did Robinson Crusoe do with Friday on Saturday night?, the Maldives are a tropical island getaway for couples rather than singles on the prowl, ideally couples with something to celebrate. Book accordingly.

ussara and Thanaree knew their journey to Ireland would be a long series of firsts, even starting before they left Thailand, with their flight to Bangkok. "I had learned some English here [in Thailand], and I have tried to learn more by teaching myself. Fortunately for me, they gave me a lot of support, asking me to look words up in the dictionary when I didn't understand something," she said.

However, one thing Nussara had in common with her new family was a love of Thai food. "They provided all the ingredients and seasonings and even bought a new rice cooker. They liked my fried rice very much and asked me to make it

very often.

"I also made other meals, but their favorites were grilled chicken and fried rice. Their daughter really liked the noodles I made. Sometimes she didn't want anything else, she just wanted to eat my noodles," she laughed.

Thanaree lived with Jim and Karen Wood and their five children. Her time in Ireland, she said, was a pleasure and an experience that she will never forget. "When I arrived I was very excited, because everything was new and I had never been abroad before," she said.


However, she soon felt homesick, missing her close connection with her family.

"I felt lonely and afraid because it was the first time in my life that I had stayed far from home and my family," she said.

"They were very good to me. At first I told only K. Barry about it, but later when they knew what was worrying me they told me to tell them every problem I had. They said that because I was living with them, it was their responsibility," she said.

While in Dublin, the girls studied English at the Linguaviva Center. The language course started a week after they arrived. Thanaree was selected for the intermediate class while Nussara was in the pre-intermediate class. However, Thanaree had difficulty keeping pace with the intermediate class. "I think maybe because I was so stressed and nervous I couldn't keep up in the intermediate class," she explained.

"So I attended the intermediate classes for a month, then I

ioined the pre-intermediate classes. In my class, there were many foreigners, including people from Spain, Portugal, Korea and Italy," Thanaree said.

But it was the learning experiences outside the classroom that Thanaree says she will never forget. "The first thing I learned from traveling to Ireland was that it expanded my horizons. It gave me a different perspective; I can see other people's points of view

"I learned much about English, too," she said. "I learned to speak better English, but I also discovered that there are many different dialects of English. Before I thought that people who spoke English all spoke the same dialect."

After they returned to Phuket, Thanaree and Nussara related their experiences to other students at Phuket Vocational College. "I would like to tell the next scholarship students that they don't have to worry about homesickness or feel overwhelmed by the prospect of living in a foreign country," Thanaree said. "They should learn as much as they can from their time abroad, because when they get back, they will see that it's a very good experience.

"I keep in contact with the





Wood family. They said that they will visit Thailand, and they keep telling me to go back and visit them again. And if I have a chance to work in Ireland, I will take it," she said.

Nussara has also benefitted well from the experience. Since her return, Nussara was invited to be a presenter for a tourism promotion video in which she introduced tourist places in English.

"In Ireland, we studied about five to six hours a day, all in English. And we went on short trips in our free time," she said.

Her only regret, she said, was not being able to travel more and to visit England while she was

"I feel that I was very lucky to get this chance. In my classes now my English is improving very quickly. I know a lot more than my friends, so I help to teach them," she said.


"Many students ask me how they could get the same chance I had. I suggest to them that they have to study hard and be good students," she added.




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
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Yeeeee-hah!

en clinging on to their bucking rides amid a sea of cushions with one hand in the air and shouting at the top of their lungs is probably not new on Soi Bangla, but at the Raging Bull Bar the ride is a little differ-

A mechanical bull dominates the center of the bar at the end of Soi Seadragon, where wannabe cowboys and cowgirls can pay 100 baht to test their wrangling prowess.

If they can stay on the jerking, bucking faux-buffalo for a minute, they will receive 1,000baht credit at the bar.

Dennis Morgan and David Nicholson opened the bar a month ago. David designed the Thai-style building himself, using bamboo from Chiang Mai for the awning and bar coving.

The bar was built on an empty plot of land near the reg-



gae bar at the end of the soi, and Dave and Dennis have avoided the typical bar decorations in favor of a more rustic "Thai" ambiance.

"It can be a place for families in the afternoon, too," said Dennis, adding that the bar opens at 4 pm. The owners are easygoing with the rides as well, and if it's not busy you're likely to get several rides for your money.

They also have a promotion to introduce the bull to Patong: buy two beers, get a free ride.

It's unclear how many times that offer is valid in one evening or if the bull can be hosed off in cases of motion or beer sickness.

A Heineken costs 80 baht, a gin and tonic 120 baht. Cowboy hats to wear while riding the bull, however, are free.







s it just my imagination, or would some people out there agree with me when I some times feel as if everyone's in charge of me except myself? Family, boss, friends, partner... the list goes on. So what can we do about it?

The past few months have had me rushing around like a lunatic trying to juggle a thousand and one things at the same time, but then I have thrived on that kind of multi-tasking behavior all my life, and I usually work well under pressure. But there comes a time in your life, as I have recently discovered, when you have to slow down and give yourself some "me" time.

The other day, for example, I did half dozen things I didn't want to: taking my mum shopping; collecting my friend's kids from school because she was working overtime (I, being freelance, am apparently never working); hosting three of my son's friends for a sleepover; accepting a commission for work I don't really want to do; not getting angry with my friend who rearranged our night out at the last minute (for the third time); and sitting on the sofa watching a ridiculous sci-fi movie with my eldest son when I really wanted to watch a DVD in-

None of these was a particularly big deal on its own, but combined they gave me a feeling I've had many times before – of

feeling put out, taken for granted and borderline resentful. I could have said "no" to any of them, but I didn't. Was I some kind of mug?

According to Dr Petra Boynton, a psychologist at University College, London, my situation is "typical of many – maybe most – women".

"Being aware of other people's needs and responding to them is something women do. We're good at it. We do it at the expense of our own needs and without even noticing much of the time, until we are hit by the feeling of anger and resentment or just not knowing how we got ourselves into this situation."

So how do we get ourselves into this state? There has long been a debate about the role of nature versus nurture, and according to psychologist Anne Dickson – author of *A Woman in Your Own Right* – "it's probably a bit of both. What it adds up to is that most women see the world differently to most men: they are more co-operative, empathetic, and flexible.

"The result is that women tend to see things in the longer term, and aren't focused on only short-term goals. They're more aware of consequences and feelings, less inclined to confrontation



and more inclined to consensus."

I suppose that flexibility and compromise are essential tools in any relationship or situation. But they also make us vulnerable to taking on too much responsibility for other people.

The "good" compromise too easily mutates into the "bad" surrender. In our relationships we make more compromises and still do more of the domestic work – and according to recent research, women still do 75% of domestic chores and childcare.

In our jobs we try endlessly to please, when that's not really how the system works. "The world of work is still largely based on traditional male values of competition, long hours, networking and single-minded self-interest," says Ms Dickson. "We never feel entirely comfortable in that culture, which contributes to our sense of feeling out of control, and at the mercy of someone else's rules in general."

The typical female response is to avoid the politics and work extra hard, hoping that someone will notice, which in turn makes us feel resentful. Or we go all out to be as tough and self-serving as possible — and then end up feeling guilty about it.

Oh yes, the Big G. Guilt. I'd rather not get started on the reasons for guilt. But I think it's enough to say that most women have too much of it. I have only ever met a few men in my lifetime who fit into this category.

Take my friend Chrissie, who complained that she spent half her life desperately taking on extra projects and staying on at the office in an effort to please her boss.

"[The boss is] one of those cool women who don't say much," explained Chrissie. "I was convinced that she was disappointed in me."

Finally her appraisal came up – and it went well. Although her boss had never complained about her work, she hadn't praised her either – so into the


vacuum of her silence Chrissie now poured disapproval and disappointment.

"As a rule, if your boss isn't complaining, you can take it you're doing fine. If you are concerned, ask for an appraisal, and have proper meetings to clarify what your responsibilities are and discuss your performance. Second-guessing what someone else wants often backfires," writes Dr Boynton.


A while ago I wrote a column that poked fun at my obsession with self-help books, but joking aside, there really are some good books out there that will help you regain control and make your life your own again if you feel you're starting to lose it.

There will always be obligations to fulfill, and wanting to make those we love happy is not a failing. But as the experts point out, life should be a balance between what we owe to others and what we owe to ourselves.

s a backpacker more than 30 years ago, Australian John Borthwick arrived in Bangkok from Calcutta to find that the diamonds he had brought with him were worthless zircons.

"That was my auspicious introduction to the Land of Smiles – and of wats, guns, coups, tolerance, somtam, songtaews, ravishing beauty, ravished beauty (think Koh Samui), long-tails, short-times, order, anarchy, Buddhist austerity, shameless avarice, 14 million annual visitors, heat and lust, and still more smiles."

Borthwick turned travel writer and his Summer in Siam (Bangkok Books, Bangkok, 2006, 231pp) is a collection of his Asian travel pieces: 17 in Thailand and 18 in the Philippines, Indonesia, Vietnam, Pakistan, Laos, India, Nepal, Sikkim and China. He combines an offbeat itinerary with shrewd observations and laid-back Australian humor. Summer in Siam is a hoot.

In Thailand he attends a three-day Yao wedding in a tiny village in Chiang Mai, catches the fire boats on the Mekong in Nakhon Phanom, watches a spirit possession ceremony among the Hmong in Lampang, and strokes the tame tigers at a wat in Kanchanaburi. This is followed by two hilarious tales of fiction set in the bars

Then he's off on a tour of the grand old hotels of Southeast Asia: Bangkok's Oriental, Penang's E&O, Singapore's


Raffles, and Saigon's Majestic. Next he's a traveling guest on the Eastern & Oriental Express train. These stories are slick airline-magazine type, though enlivened by irreverent humor.

He hits the jumbo jackpot with elephant stories: one about learning to ride one, another about elephant polo. A trio of Andaman Sea stories By James Eckardt follow: Similan and Surin islands, the rise of Phuket from the 2004 tsunami, and a Star Flyer luxury sailing trip from Patong to Georgetown. Travel writing of this type is always happy, happy, happy, but he manages to sound a sour note on modern Koh Samui: a million visitors, 9,000 aircraft arrivals, 40 7-Eleven stores.

"Self-driving around Samui is a breeze, but the taxis

have a meter, though none work . . . If vou rent a motorcycle, helmets are mandatory. So, of course, no one wears one. Young tourists ride barefoot and bare-





brained, confident that on cool Samui nothing could ever include them or the boxes they sometimes go home in among the island's road statistics. In fact, Samui has one of the worst accident records in Thailand."

Next he's off on a walkabout in the Philippines: to the coral island of Dimakya with its collection of African animals, the Banaue rice terraces, the old Spanish town of Vigan, the long island of Palawan.

Of Vietnam he observes: "The French left Peugeots, berets, bread and good coffee. The Americans left junked F-111s, old Dodges and a craving for Ca-Li-Pho-Nia Ham-Bu-Go culture. The Russians left a language that everyone learned and no one can

are pure banditry," he writes. "All taxis use, plus a school of architecture characterized as Early Soviet Misunderstanding Treaty. . . half-finished ergonomic disasters that ask, 'Is this building falling up or down?"

He paints a lyrical portrait of Sarawak and a historical one of Kuching and its line of White Rajahs. In Kuta, on Bali, he swings back in time to a funny tale of his backpacking days in the late 1970s. Of Laos he writes: "Laos is a calligraphy of rivers. The Mekong and its monsoonal permutations doodle across a ground of forest chaos and paddy geom-

The highlight of this book – travel writing of the highest order, right up there with old masters – is a long, stirring account of a camel trip he and a group of 10 hardy idiots take across Rajasthan's Great Thar Desert. After an arduous trek of 10 days, they reach their destination of Jaisalmer.

"In the midday heat miasma, the golden stones of its 12th century castle wobble like a fairytale trapped in aspic," he concludes. "No doubt it's full of mustache-tusked 20th century rug hustlers but who cares? For us, Jaisalmer's spired, desert Camelot beckons like a mirage. It whispers across the wastes, 'Water. Hot water.'"

There are more epic trips: by truck on the Karokoram Highway, by bicycle in Xinjiang. You'll be glad you went along.

least by some accounts.

The investigation into that case joins the long list of murder investigations that seem to have been consigned to the "cold case files" in 2006.

The onset of the high season saw the cost of renting a plastic beach chair and umbrella at most island beaches double, from 50 baht to 100 baht. The government has also been jacking up prices, doubling entrance fees at national parks.

For Thais, this entails an increase from 20 baht to 40 baht, but for foreigners the jump is from 200 baht to 400 baht.

While the TAT still hopes to attract 20 million foreign tourists to Thailand by 2008, doubling the 2003 figure, foreigners already living here found 2006 to be yet another year of baffling changes to immigration policy, work permit application procedures and the overall business investment climate.

Resident expats who had been making monthly runs learned that as of October 1 Immigration would begin limiting to 90 days over any 180-day period the length of time foreigners could spend in the country on free "visas-on-arrival".

After fears that families would be broken up and the Earth

would stop spinning as a result of the new policy, it was later clarified that once one's 180 days were up, all that was needed was to make a trip to a Thai consulate or embassy abroad to apply for a regular tourist visa, for which a fee is charged.

At about the same time, however, most Thai embassies and consulates in the region stopped issuing multiple-entry non-immigrant visas to most applicants.

This made life yet a bit more difficult for foreign residents who want to live here long-term, but can't afford to become members of the Thailand Elite Card, which offers a five-year, multiple-entry visa and other privileges for bargain price of one million baht.

some consulates were new requirements that non-immigrant visa applicants submit WP-3 forms from the Labor Department and letters from the Royal Thai Police confirming they are free of any Thai criminal

Foreigners seeking a lucrative career in the teaching industry also faced increased obstacles in 2006 with the announcement by the Education Ministry that all foreign teachers would be required to hold a minimum bachelor's degree and undergo strict background checks before they are allowed to enter the classroom.

> Work on the second project, the OrBorJor's controversial 46.7 million baht "Gateway", at the island's northern tip, is scheduled to open sometime in the first half of 2007.

> Other fanciful projects, such as a massive sports complex and a monorail from Phuket City to the airport, remain in the theoretical realm, as does the Phuket Bay Development

project and the decades-old plan to build a large international convention center somewhere on the island.

Going into 2007, the island continues to grapple with keeping infrastructure apace with development and the rising population, of both humans and cars.

A desalination plant is almost finished in Karon to turn seawater into potable water, but its operation will likely be delayed for lack of a permit to release the briny wastewater it produces back into the sea.

Along with ever-rising demand for water and slow progress on building two new reservoirs in the province, this increases the likelihood of widespread water shortages in 2007.



Maintaining the momentum

With tourism by far Phuket's most important industry, people here are understandably happy – and relieved – that this high season has gone off without a hitch, at least so far.

Among the smiling faces must be Patong Beach Hoteliers' Club President Krisada Tansakul, who was recently quoted on the staterun Thai News Agency website as saying that rooms in Patong and Kata-Karon were fully booked through mid-January, with more than 1 billion baht in tourism expected to flow into the province during the New Year's celebration period alone.

With the island's 35,000 hotel rooms now mostly filled, however, now is also a good time to keep in mind the stresses that can result from having to support such a large number of visitors.

For decades, "sustainability" was the buzzword in the global tourism industry. While various definitions exist, most people would agree that "sustainable tourism" entails conserving a destination's economic, environmental and socio-cultural balances.

Given that general definition, a quick look at Phuket's demographics indicates that the era of sustainable tourism has long since passed in Phuket, quite possibly even before the term "sustainability" became common currency.

Phuket's registered population is somewhere around 250,000, while the number of tourists that arrived in 2006 is expected to top out around 5 million – that's about 20 tourists for every person with a legitimate claim to be a true son or daughter of the land. In sociocultural terms, this is hardly sustainable.

Every day the island produces some 450 tonnes of garbage, far exceeding the sole incinerator's capacity of 250 tonnes a day. This, coupled with an ever-increasing demand on Phuket's dwindling water supplies, will likely prove to be among the greatest challenges to face local and provincial governmental bodies in 2007.

Remarkably, the government seems oblivious to the challenges facing Phuket and the rest of Thailand. In an official release earlier this year, the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) trumpeted a report by an international consulting firm that named Thailand "Best Country Brand" for tourism in terms of value for money.

A later report posted on the TAT website after the coup announced that Thai tourism would adopt a philosophy of "self-sufficiency economy" tourism, favoring "quality over quantity". However there was no mention of revising down TAT's tourist arrival targets, which plan to see 20 million foreign visitors annually by 2008 – double the number that visited the country in 2003.

If Phuket is to do its part, that will mean hosting about 7 million visitors annually. If we are to do that successfully, we need to start getting our house in order – and fast.

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

Stopping encroachment is a public responsibility

ur biggest problem is that our office does not have enough money, which makes it difficult for us to do our job. Because of this, forest land in Phuket is decreasing every year, and it's fair to say that Phuket has failed to protect its forested areas prop-

There are 12 officers in my team. We are in charge of taking care of all the forested area in Phuket. That's an impossible task with so few workers, but we continue to try. Our duties are to protect the forest and suppress illegal developments.

We also try to remind every villager to value their forests. We explain to them that forests are not for private use, but are there for everyone to use, so we must stop people from using it for themselves.

Now we are joining forces with villagers and using their numbers to help us take care of the forests. If anyone is building illegally, the villagers should tell us quickly because they should understand it is their duty to protect forest land, too. Our team can suppress deforestation, but we cannot protect the forest all the

To define our terms: to protect means that we keep forested areas safe before development happens; to suppress means that we arrest anyone who uses the land illegally after development has begun. To do this and to find problem areas, we have volunteers who live around the protected forest and who know what buildings are legal and illegal.

and encroachment by developers onto Phuket's protected forest land has been an on-going problem for decades, despite the work of forest officers from Phuket Provincial Office Of Natural Resources and Environment.

Here Vichat Punkong, Head of the Phuket's Interdepartmental Forest Conservation and Protection Unit, explains that the problem is bigger than his office can handle, and that he wants people to realize that the disappearing forests on Phuket are everyone's problem.



They are good lookouts, but we do not have enough of them because they are afraid it is dangerous. That doesn't mean that it's the villagers fault every time someone builds on public land, however, because it's very difficult for them to check to see if the builders have the right per-

Another problem that we have is that land in Phuket is very expensive, making it attractive for rich investors. Sometimes when I check to see whether they have the correct documents, I can't tell whether the documents are genuine or not, and it takes a long time for land officials to check.

Often, when we go to suppress development, we don't meet the owner of the land and we end up arresting only the lower workers. Arresting only the lower-level workers makes it a perpetual problem, and very difficult for us to stop a project completely, so we have changed tactics and now focus more on protecting the land from encroach-

We also have problems with the alien laborers who live in the forested areas. They are poor so they are willing to work for any employers. What little money they make is very important to them, and they don't care about the forests. Almost all of the people who employ them are Thai. It's very hard for the lower officers like me to warn them because the higher levels of government need to be serious about the problem first. Otherwise, in the near future, we won't have any forests at all.

Many government officers in Phuket are very busy because Phuket is such a popular tourism destination. They are more concerned about improving infrastructure such as the roads, but don't care much about the hill areas, and this is to be expected.

If we protect our forests first, this will in turn attract tourism from around the world because the tourists want to see our natural beauty, they don't want to see a new road.

Some top-level officials don't understand why lower officers like us have problems. They want us to use the laws to stop development projects, which we do, but once we look away for a minute they are building it again. We try to make them understand that it is our Thai duty to protect the forest and remember that we should stop illegal development for the public good, not for the private sector.

The former government allowed some building in forested areas and now everyone else wants to build there, too. Sometimes we have to explain to new developers that we don't know how these people were allowed to build there when they aren't. Where did their documents come from? We don't really know.

Is it safe to be a Good Samaritan in Phuket?

I am a first aid instructor and former fire-rescue worker now law? Where would I stand legally living in Phuket. I often see in giving help? people injured in road accidents I am hesitant to stop and give help for fear of possible consequences.

I have heard that as a foreigner who is not in any way involved in the accident but who stops to give medical aid, I could actually be liable to pay the medical bills of the victim I aid. Or that the police may try to involve me in the actual accident.

In Western countries, lay persons giving aid are legally covered by the "Good Samaritan Law", which prevents any legal or financial responsibility resulting from the aid you give provided it is within the scope of your qualifications.

It pains me to not help a when driving around Phuket, but person in need but if it will result in legal problems for me I fear I cannot help.

In Thailand there is no law against helping victims of road accidents. On the contrary, we really appreciate this kind of aid.

However, police or medical staff will ask you questions, such as whether you saw the crash.

You won't be arrested or given any legal problems if you are a good person and not a wrongdoer.



Phuket software companies receive TQS certification

PHUKET: Four software companies in Phuket – Blue Design Co Ltd, Open Source Technology Co Ltd, International Medical Software Co Ltd and Phuket Programmers Co Ltd - have received Thai Quality Software (TQS) Level 1 certification.

The TQS ratification is the result of a project by the Phuket branch of the Software Industry Promotion Agency (Sipa) and the Association of Thai Software Industry (ATSI), which administers and regulates TQS certification.

Consultants and assessors were brought in to help prepare the local companies for TQS evaluation, with Sipa Phuket paying for half of the consultants and assessors' fees.

Each of the local companies met with the consultants three times over a five month period. During the meetings the consultants would assess the company and identify points to improve. At the following meeting the company must have had those improvements made.

TQS complies with the software engineering international standard ISO/IEC 12207. It focuses on ensuring appropriate helps raise the standard of soft-

policies and procedures are in ware produced in Thailand." place, and a mechanism to check traceability of documents, to ensure that specific quality standards are adhered to.

TQS was developed with the objectives of raising the quality and capability Of software developed in the public sector, creating more opportunities in government software development projects and increasing Thai software manufacturers' capability to compete in foreign markets.

The four Phuket software houses were certified as TQS Level 1 compliant, meaning that basic procedures were in place. There are five levels of TQS compliance, with Level 5 the most comprehensive in continuous improvement.

Sipa Phuket branch manager Dr Ratana Wetprasit said, "This project is successful in helping to develop the software industry in Phuket to be standards compliant and to compete in the international software market. I'm very pleased that all four software companies passed the TQS assessment. This is an important step for the companies and it

ATSI President Anukul Tamprasert said that TQS aims to make software companies more aware of the quality standards in the software industry. "Software companies should emphasize quality and process, not just circulation," K. Anukul

Patima Khunpromkessara, Assistant Managing Director of Blue Design Co Ltd, said that before learning the TQS procedures her company went back and forth with a customer several times and did not keep detailed records of the meetings or work procedure.

Now, K. Patima said, the company keep better records of meetings with customers so that they can keep track of customers' requirements and to show customers the work procedure to ensure quality.

"The TQS procedures focus on developing software company quality. Because we export work abroad we have to develop quality standards that can compete with foreign companies. So one benefit that we will get from TQS certification that is we can use TQS to improve our products," she said.

Rungsuri Thirawittayanon, developer at Phuket Medical Software Co Ltd, said, "Our company already used these processes but we wanted to be verified by TQS to assure our company standard.

"The benefits that we will get from TQS are the TQS standard stamp, which we can show to potential clients. This will make it easier to get new customers, and more income. Another benefit is that we now have a more open work process."

I have a desktop computer and the aircard required is available only as a PCMCIA card. Where can I buy a PCMCIA card adapter for my home PC?

The saga of connecting a 3G card to a desktop continues. You can find nothing in Phuket. Even in Bangkok or Singapore it is not easy.

A Thai computer engineer I know went to Bangkok and could find nothing there, then a foreign computer engineer was going to Singapore. He assured me that he could buy one there.

He returned saying that "they had these things at one time, but the technology was so old that nobody stocked them any more."

Then I found a CAT website, it was all in Thai, but I could understand enough to see that they were advertising a PCMCIA card reader that fitted into a slot at the rear of a desktop.

I took a copy of this to the CAT shop in Patong and asked for one.

After calls to Bangkok it transpired that they had had 1,000 of them but had sold them all and were awaiting more stock.

Finally I found on the Internet a supplier in Bangkok. I went there and I am now the proud owner of a PCMCIA adapter.

I bought the adapter at Surf 'n' Shop at 36/25-26 Rama III Rd (www.surfnshop.biz), Tel: 081-8255885.

It is not really a shop, but more of an office and storeroom. The Manager, Vicrom Trongkamoltham, is very helpful and speaks English well. I bought two cards at 1,100 baht each.

I also had to move my computer tower from under the desk to on top. Under the desk I was getting less than 200 kbps, on top it is more than double that.

I must say that the staff at CAT have always been very helpful so do contact them for any information.

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




Demand for Jetstar Oz-Phuket flights exceeds predictions

PHUKET: Demand for Jetstar's direct Sydney-Phuket flights is exceeding initial predictions and the company is already looking to boost its number of passengers on the return flights in the near future, Jetstar Group General Manager of Commercial Operations Bruce Buchanan has told the *Gazette*.

"Our inaugural services into Phuket from Sydney had 250 passengers...The existing and forward bookings on Phuket from Australia are meeting, and in fact beating our expectations," he

The initial Sydney-Phuket flight on November 24 was also the airline's inaugural international flight.

Mr Buchanan told the *Gazette* that the company is excited by the response, and this is reflected by the strong introductory schedule. "Jetstar is most satis-

fied with the existing market response. We are also keen to attract a greater number of international travelers out of Phuket to fly direct to Sydney and we are enhancing our promotions for our three-times-weekly direct services to Australia over the coming weeks and months.

"Any future [expansion] for the route is subject to market performance," he said.

At the time of going to press, the Sydney-Phuket service was to be joined by other new services from Sydney to Ho Chi Minh City and Bali, and subject to regulatory approval to Honolulu from December 27 and direct to Osaka from March 25, 2007.

The Sydney-Phuket flights depart Sydney each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, with return flights the same day. The route is served by Airbus A330-200 aircraft with a seating configuration to carry 303 passengers

in two classes: 38 Star Class seats and 265 economy class.

Fares start from 8,400 baht for a one-way trip in either direction. With all the relevant fees and


taxes, it works out at just under 25,000 baht for a return Phuket to Sydney trip if the cheapest seats are available.

Base ticket prices do not include food and drink, blanket and pillow or in-flight entertainment, which are available for an extra 700, 200 and 300 baht, respectively, on each flight.


Mr Buchanan explained that Thai Airways is viewed as Jetstar's main competitor on direct services between Thailand and Australia, and the company will offer periodical promotional fares to entice travelers to use their service.

Jetstar currently has no intention to follow its Singapore-based rival Tiger Airways in serving other local destinations, such as Krabi, and will instead concentrate on the existing level of services and growth in international services to their two existing destinations, Bangkok and Phuket, said Mr Buchanan.

Jetstar Airways' Australian operations are wholly owned by Qantas, but its Asian operations, based in Singapore, which serves the Phuket-Singapore leg, are 51% Singaporean owned.







BoT receives crash course in handling foreign investment

urrency markets are on the move, creating both concern and opportunity. The central Bank of Thailand has been issuing almost daily statements regarding the ever-appreciating baht. Thai exporters are finding the strength of the currency is impeding their competitiveness in world markets and reducing, in Thai baht terms, the value of their exports.

Unfortunately, on December 19, the Bank of Thailand instituted capital controls to stop the rise of the currency. This sent an entirely wrong message to financial markets; governments that interfere with the value of their currency do so at their own peril. The currency fell 1.5% after the news - the Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) index fell 14.84%. It is worthwhile to remember that most of the funds invested in the Thai stock market are from domestic capital, including local pension funds.

A strong currency may present problems for exporters, but for importers it is a very different situation; Thai consumers also benefit from the lower cost of imported items, such as oil and gasoline.

Currency speculators are always moving vast sums around the world seeking profits, and the weakening US dollar has increased such speculation; regardless of the future movement of the dollar, there will always be movement through currency markets.

The list of participants is almost endless - of course it includes hedge funds, but also many major financial institutions, currency funds, proprietary traders for global banks, absolute return funds, even insurance companies and pension funds are involved.

The Bank of Thailand complains that the nation's foreign exchange reserves, around US\$ 64 billion, are too small to strongly counter the prevailing market trends. However, there is a simple solution – encourage more foreign investment. Thailand is a lucky country in that it can easily attract more long-term outside investment.

Ireland is a perfect example of what can be achieved by throwing out the welcome mat to foreign investment. It took only a few decades to transform the country from Poor Paddy to Celtic Tiger. Longterm fixed foreign investment also causes a significant increase in foreign

exchange reserves; which in Thailand would translate into millions of Thais seeing their standard of living rise significantly.

The US dollar is still a cause for concern, as the massive deficit the US is running is too large not to have consequences. With the US economy slowing; already many institutions are warning that short-term interest rates are likely to fall in the first half of 2007. Stephen Roach, chief economist for Morgan Stanley, has predicted that the US Federal Reserve will start to reduce rates from March 2007, while others think it could be as late as June. Falling interest rates make it less attractive to invest in the dollar, and foreign exchange markets have already anticipated future trends.


Alan Greenspan, former

Chairman of the US Federal Reserve, recently made a speech predicting that the dollar would weaken over the next four years. He also correctly said that to assess the value of a currency over the short term, the most reliable indicator is to toss a coin.

In any bear market, as in this case with the dollar, there are

> likely to be sharp rebounds, counter-trends, referred to as "bear traps". The US dollar may well continue its decline, but it is worth bearing in mind that when the consensus expects a certain outcome, markets frequently do the opposite.


The concept of this fund is extremely simple; it invests primarily in the company's Global Equity Fund, but also continually buys "put" options, which make profits in a falling market.

The overall effect is that the fund generally makes money in a rising market but actually prefers (in terms of returns) for a market to move downward. Orbis refers to this fund as the lowest risk fund in their range; unfortunately, they are closed to new investment, although existing clients are able to switch internally or inject new capital.

This category of fund is often known as "long/short funds", although there are so many variearlier this year, but limits its distribution to UK-based investors.

The basic attraction of this type of fund is that it enables investors to make hay whether the sun shines or it rains. It is definitely the route that many investment funds are going to use in coming years, as history shows the folly of putting one's faith in the rise of a particular asset without hedging one's bets. Pension funds around the globe are increasingly of this view and are allocating assets accordingly.

To use another analogy, the sun may be shining upon embarkation, but it is the unhappy captain who expects it to last for the duration of the voyage and is un-





t is the domain of gladiators, the site of countless battles between some of the best Muay Thai fighters in the world.

Much like the Roman Colosseum, Bangkok's Lumpinee Stadium is filled with ghosts from the past – the prowling spirits of gloved warriors who fought for fame and fortune in the dimly lit arena in days gone by.

Only Rajdamnern Stadium, also in Bangkok, rivals the prestige of Lumpinee. Achieving the title of Muay Thai Champion of one of these stadiums is the apex of achievement for the sport in Thailand; simply fighting in Lumpinee is an honor in itself.

The blood of decades of fighters and the heat and roar of the four-thousand strong crowd combine to nourish the old stadium and propel its fighters; one can feel the thrum of a perpetual energy in the stands.

"O-way! O-way!" chants the crowd, as each punishing blow hits home. The Thais sing in unison, a brotherhood of blood lust, and it isn't long before foreigners join in as well.

Farangs normally fill the pricey ringside seats; prices for all the seats have nearly doubled over the past 10 years, due to shrewd marketing and increased international interest in the sport. Most Thai fans are content to sit in the outer region of the stadium — behind a chain link fence.

While gambling in Thailand is technically illegal, it isn't in Lumpinee Stadium. Any visitor stepping in to the circular arena will immediately notice the frenzied betting around the ring — for Thais, the gambling is one of the main attractions of going to the stadium.

Muay Thai fights take place at Lumpinee Stadium four times per week. Occasionally there are Western-style boxing matches as well, but the vast majority of the bouts allow not only punches, but

also kicks, knees and elbows. Those who enter the ring are generally most fearful of the elbow because one well-placed blow can end a fight and scar a fighter forever

The stadium is a perpetual meat grinder, sucking in and churning out fighter and spectator alike, and it rarely sleeps. During the downtimes, food vendors, equipment merchants, ticket scalpers and a host of other colorful characters surround the dingy building, preparing for the night's vigorous activities, or recuperating from the previous evening.

Lumpinee Stadium opened for action on December 8, 1956. Operated by Thailand's Army Welfare Department of the Royal Thai Army, all proceeds from the fights go toward supporting the Thai Army. The initial reason for opening the venue was to promote Thai boxing throughout Thailand and the world, and it has been very successful, achieving

world-renowned status as a tourism magnet. More than just a stadium to fans, it is, along with Rajdamnern, the home of muay Thai.

There are approximately a dozen promoters with the responsibility of supplying fighters for the stadium. Women, however, are not allowed to fight or even enter the ring. Boxers must be male, over 15, weigh more than 100 pounds, and have no more than a five-pound weight difference with their opponent.

Earlier this year, there was talk of moving the fabled stadium to the Suan Plu area of Bangkok in order to make way for a proposed tower, meant to be the world's tallest building. But the plan to build the skyscraper, at least for now, has been scrapped and the stadium will stay put.

Fights are on Tuesdays and Fridays at 6:30 pm and Saturdays at 4:30 pm and 8:30 pm. Tickets are 2000 baht, 1500 baht or 1000 baht.



he owners of Deevana Patong Resort & Spa are building their second hotel, which will become the first hotel in Southern Thailand to be managed by international chain Accor Hotels, under its Mercure brand.

The 249-room hotel, being built on six rai on the southern side of the OTOP market on Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd, will be named Mercure Patong Phuket.

Construction has been underway since May, 2006, and is expected to be finished by July of 2007. The soft opening is scheduled for August.

Jariyawadee Suvunditkul, Managing Director of Mercure Patong Phuket, told the *Gazette*, "Our existing hotel, Deevana Patong Resort & Spa, is now overbooked and tourism in Phuket is continuing to grow, so we decided to expand our capacity.

"We brought in Mercure Accor as the hotel business is very competitive now and we felt that we could benefit from the assistance of an internationallyknown chain," she said.

The exterior of the hotel will be modern but the interior will incorporate aspects of traditional Thai design.

The complex will comprise four buildings. The first will be a facilities building five stories high, while the other three buildings will have six floors and will house the guest rooms.

The first floor of the facilities building will include the lobby and reception area as well as Thai and fusion-food restaurants,

a kids' club and a mini-mart.

Above, a mezzanine level will house the hotel's administration offices and leave the lobby with an airy, high ceiling. The third floor will have a 545-squaremeter grand ballroom, a pantry and a storage room.

The third floor will have a

high ceiling, leaving no room for a fourth floor, K. Jariyawadee explained.

The fifth floor will house three 100-sqm meeting rooms and a fitness center. On the roof deck there will be a pool with bar and sun deck.

"The lobby building will also

have some guest accommodation too. We will have 10 family suites in a wing on the third floor. In the three guest buildings we will have four suites, each with an area of 70sqm, and 235 superior rooms of 35sqm each. One of the guest buildings will have a spa attached," K. Jariyawadee said.

In the courtyard between the buildings will be a large pool terrace. parking will be around the outside of the buildings.


"Patong Beach is the most famous resort area in Phuket and we think that the Mercure brand will help us to market the resort, especially in the international market. Most of our guests at Deevana Resort & Spa are European, mainly Scandinavian.

"We will be focusing on the Japanese and Korean markets, and the wider Asian market, as well as Europeans. We will also target the MICE (meetings, incentives, conventions and exhibitions) market," said K. Jariyawadee.

"We intend to have soft opening in the low season so that we have time to prepare our service staff as we don't want to have any problems when high season arrives," she concluded.

The contractor for the project is Phuket Design Construction Co Ltd.


Mr Gorton added, "The combination produces a cool contemporary ambiance that nestles in the landscape. It is neither brash nor subservient."



Gardening

y Latin isn't exactly fluent. In fact, the only Latin terms with which I'm even vaguely familiar are NB (nota bene) and AD (anno domini). Do abbreviations count as Latin phrases? I don't have a clue, to be honest, and I'm not even sure why we use them.

Why Latin is used today is rather odd. It seems to exist for no other reason than to let people try to sound a lot more intelligent than they really are. What possible alternative rationale could there be for someone to say "ergo" instead of "therefore"? As far as I'm concerned the only thing these people succeed in doing is making themselves sound like total prats.

It does have its uses though. Pub fights can be averted with a bit of Latin thrown in. A book called *Latin for All Occasions (Lingua Latina Occasionibus Omnibus)* by a gentleman by the name of Henry Beard suggests that fighting words are a lot safer in Latin:

Quid me appellavisti? (What did you call me?)

Ita, *te adloquor*. (Yes, I'm talking to you.)

Visne illud iterare? (You want to repeat that?)

Visne aliquid de illo facere? (You want to make something of it?)

I don't know why inane violence is amusing in Latin, but it is. Even threats carry more weight in Latin, somehow: In tempore praeterito plus quam perfecto de te mox dicent. (People will soon be referring to you in

the past pluperfect tense.) Or the classic Latin curse: *Utinam modo subiunctivo semper male utaris!* (May you always misuse the subjunctive!)

You might want to be careful with these though. Walk into a pub in Yorkshire and start ranting in Latin, and they'll soon bring you back down to earth. You'll deserve a slap purely because you sound like a complete pillock.

Latin has no good reason to be uttered anywhere in Northern England, or elsewhere for that matter. What's the point?

Even universities try to milk the Latin thing, for no particular reason. What are they on about, with their *magna cum laude* and *summa cum laude* nonsense? Are the words "honors" and "distinction" just too easy? It worked just fine in my day.

Apparently, one American university came up with one of their own: *egregia cum laude*.

It wasn't until some academic type actually looked it up in his big Latin dictionary and realized that it translated as "with hysterical praise", that the university decided that it probably wasn't a particularly good idea after all.

The world of botany is awash with Latin. As I mentioned, my Latin skills are limited




Sonasi Latine loqueris (Honk if you speak Latin): the pandanus pygmaeus, dwarfish cousin of the screw pine.

to say the least, but it doesn't take a mastermind to figure out what a *pandanus pygmaeus* looks like. It's called *bai toey* in Thai, whatever that means. Even though my knowledge of Thai slightly exceeds my Latin, I still haven't a clue.

Predictably, it's a small pandanus. I'm actually surprised that some politically correct do-gooder hasn't petitioned various agencies to have the name changed, citing the stereotypical generalization of a group of vertically-challenged African people.

Anyway, the *pandanus pygmaeus* it is. Some books say that it's also known as the screw pine, but I would say that epithet should be reserved for the bigger pandanus trees that line many of Phuket's beaches; the ones with the weird, 45-degree roots.





The pandanus pygmaeus is one of the more popular landscape plants in this part of the world. It grows to about 30 centimeters tall, and spreads by sending out runners from the base of the plant.

It's variegated (has more than one color on its leaves), with a bright margin of cream or yellow with yellow stripes in the center of the leaf. There are soft spines along the edges of the leaves, but not soft enough to avoid scratches if you scrape against them.

It's perfect for a border that you just can't be bothered with, as it doesn't need that much attention and will grow to a specific height. Put a row of these at the front, about 20cm apart, and you can put the bigger plants behind, using the pandanus pygmaeus to cover the lower spindly bits of its neighbor. They're also quite happy in a rockgarden.

The flowers are a complete letdown, if you can spot them. They're tiny and petal-less – I'm not even sure why they bother. The whole point of flowers is to attract insects to help the reproductive process along. It would seem that this plant decided to go down the celibate path; probably why it mostly reproduces itself via suckers. Enough said.

Anyway, propagating them is easily done – just cut a bit of it off and stick your new cutting in some moist compost. Hardly rocket science.

It likes light, so try to give it a home in one of the sunnier parts of the garden. The *pandanus pygmaeus* is perfect as a house plant, as long as it gets at least four hours of direct sunlight a day.

Be fairly generous with water, too, but if it's in a pot and not in the ground, don't let it stand in water as it will complain bitterly. Allow the soil to dry slightly between waterings.

It will never be the biggest plant in the world, and it's not in any particular rush to reach its maximum size – it will quietly take its time. At least it grows mostly upright and won't droop. It may not be the F-16 of the plant world, but it behaves itself.

Like most plants, the pandanus pygmaeus will benefit from a bit of pruning every now and then, to make it a bit stronger. It's weird how cutting bits of plants off increases their Charles Atlas tendencies.

If I were one of those academic types, I would be able to come up with a neat, intelligent-sounding Latin link from Charles Atlas to the botanical world. But I'm not. So I won't.

Ergo, Latin speakers should *fac ut vivas* (get a life). Sorry for sounding like a total prat. What's "beer" in Latin?

For entertainment, the property boasts many facilities, including a games room with pool table as well as large plasma-screen TVs that are at the end of each


