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Mob stages blockade after police kill youth

KOH KAEW: About 1,000 people from Koh Kaew blocked Thepkrasattri Rd for four hours in the afternoon of April 18 after a 17-year-old local youth died after being shot by a policeman on the bypass road early that morning. A Phuket City police officer has now been suspended from duty without pay over the shooting.

The protest caused long tail backs with some tourists forced to carry their luggage past the mob and continue their journey in other vehicles.

The protest was sparked by the death of Worawut Samarnmit, who, according to his father K. Yongyuth, was shot by Sgt Prasarn Chuayman of Phuket City Police Station.

One of the victim's friends told the *Gazette* that Worawut and his friends were riding along the bypass road about 1 am when two police officers pulled alongside and asked them to stop so they could inspect their driver's licenses

The youths refused to stop and one of the officers fired a shot, hitting Worawut in the left hip, the friend claimed.

Worawut was rushed to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he died soon after, the friend added.

About noon on the day of the incident, the victim's family and about 100 villagers from Moo 4 Tambon Koh Kaew brought Worawut's body to Phuket City Police Station, where they were assured by Provincial Police Deputy Commander Col Chalit Thintanee that the accused officer would be dealt with to the full extent of the law.

Unsatisfied by the assurances, villagers gathered in front

of Yabunnoon Mosque about 2 pm and set up a blockade, refusing to let traffic pass.

At 3:15 pm, Phuket City Police Station Superintendent Col Nos Sawetalek arrived to negotiate with the protesters. He offered three assurances in return for them disbanding: 1. Police will not allow the suspect to leave the province; 2. The officer will be suspended from duty during the investigation; and 3. Five villagers will be appointed to the investigation committee.

However, the villagers refused to disperse and instead presented a list demanding:

- 1. An officer be named responsible for the case;
- 2. The officer who shot Worawut be discharged from the police force and all police officers assigned to Koh Kaew be assigned to another area;
- 3. The Crime Suppression Bureau or the Central Investiga-

tion Bureau be involved in the investigation;

- 4. The officer who shot Worawut pay compensation to the victim's family.
- 5. Protesters be granted immunity from prosecution for staging the protest.
- 6. All the demands be agreed in writing.

Col Chalit agreed to the demands, saying that he would be responsible for the case.

The crowd dispersed after the victim's father confirmed that police had accepted their demands.

Col Nos told the *Gazette* that Sgt Prasarn has now been suspended from the police force without pay while the investigation is underway. "We have also moved all six police officers who used to be responsible for Koh Kaew out of the area and installed a new team to replace them," he said.

Contradicting results for Patong's one-way surveys

PATONG: The results from two public opinion surveys of Patong's one-way traffic system are in – one says the public is in favor of keeping the system, the other says it is not.

Prince of Songkla University, Phuket campus, surveyed 759 people in Patong, with 60% saying that are satisfied with the one-way system, but 40% saying they are not happy with it.

The survey of 662 people conducted by the Policy and Planning Department (PPD) of Patong Municipality, however, shows that only 41.2% of people are in favor of keeping the system while 47.3% want it scrapped – 11.5% declined to respond.

Nawapol Na Nakhorn, an officer at the PPD, said that the survey asked about improvements that should be made and what respondents believe the benefits and disadvantages of the one-way system are.

"The most popular suggestion was to slow down traffic so pedestrians can cross the street safely," K. Nawapol said.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch said, "Different people have different opinions, so nobody is right or wrong. The one-way system will stay, but we have to make it better than it is now."

He added that the Phuket Governor will hold a meeting to discuss the one-way system and the survey results.

According to Col Teeraphol Thipjaroen, Superintendent of the Kathu Police Station, the meeting to discuss the future of the one-way system will be held soon, as the end of the evaluation period passed on April 14.





Third death in the last hours of Songkran

KATHU: In the fading hours of the government's "seven days of danger" road safety campaign over the Songkran holidays, a 17year-old motorbike rider died after his motorcycle and a Toyota Fortuner collided at the junction of Wichit Songkram Rd and the entrance to Bang Wad Dam.

At a Governor Meets the Press meeting held April 18, the day after the official end of the Songkran holidays, it was explained that Eakasit Khamnoi was driving at 10:35 pm April 17 when his motorcycle and the Fortuner collided. Officials named the driver of the Fortuner as 45year-old Australian John Ian Roberts.

Eakasit was pronounced dead at the scene.

Mr Roberts has been charged with negligence causing death.

Throughout the nation 361 people were killed in road accidents with 4,805 injured from 4,274 accidents during the seven days of Songkran celebrations.

Immigration denies dive shop 'shake down'

PHUKET: Phuket Immigration Office Superintendent Pol Col Ittipon Atchariyapradit has denied that Immigration officers were involved in what seems to have been a shakedown attempt at a Patong dive shop on April 3.

In an email sent to the *Gazette*, it was explained that a dive instructor emerged from the company's dive training pool, where he had just finished teaching a dive class, when two men arrived claiming they were from Phuket Immigration Office.

Crazed taxi driver defends his Jatukam

PHUKET CITY: Realizing that he had lost one of his precious Jatukam images, a motorbike taxi driver went on a rampage April 16, vandalizing a car and threatening residents of a government housing estate with a large knife.

Capt Nikorn Chuthong of Phuket City Police Station identified the man as Aphinan Chanthana, 41.

"He went crazy after leaving one of his five Jatukam images at an amulet stall [at the bus station on Phang Nga Rd].

"He believed that staff at the stall had stolen it, but after nobody there confessed to stealing it, he used a large knife to damage a car belonging to one of the staff," Capt Nikorn said.

"After that, about 11 am, he rode off furiously on his motorbike. But as he was fleeing, he saw someone following him. Thinking it was the owner of the car he had just damaged, he rode his motorbike to the government housing estate on Koh Sireh."

Aphinan parked his motorbike outside the estate then walked inside to where he saw Kornthip Sealai, 23, who lives in Building 4 with her younger brother.

He threatened K. Kornthip with the knife, demanding that she walk back up to her single-room apartment on the second floor, where her younger brother was.

Some time later, Aphinan heard someone calling out to him from the back of the building, and so he went out onto the back balcony where he saw a policeman in a Fire Department cherry picker talking to him through the wire security grate.

"The policeman tried to per-

suade him to surrender, but he insisted that the police should go away," Capt Nikorn said.

"While Aphinan was talking with the policeman, Kornthip and her brother sneaked out of the room. Police then flooded the room with 'fire extinguishing chemicals' to subdue him, but he protected himself by breathing through a piece of cloth.

"Two hours later, he began to feel weak and he walked downstairs and surrendered to police," Capt Nikorn explained.

"Aphinan is currently at Phuket Provincial Prison. He has been charged with destruction of other people's property and trespassing," he added.

Phi Phi ferry sinks after engine catches fire

KOH PHI PHI: More than 100 tourists were rescued by the Krabi Marine Police after a fire broke out on the ferry they were taking from Phuket to Phi Phi Don Island on April 23.

Phuket Marine Police Officer Lt Col Prathueng Srilamontree identified the vessel as Jet Wave 3, which departed from Rassada Harbor in Phuket that morning bound for Phi Phi Don Island.

As the vessel was rounding the Maya Bay area of Koh Phi Phi Lei about 11 am, a fire broke out in the engine room.

Frightened passengers rushed to the bow of the 32-meter vessel, where they waited until a number of speedboats dispatched by the Krabi Marine Police came to their rescue.

All of the tourists were safely transported to Phi Phi Don Island, about 15 minutes away. There were no reports of injury or anyone abandoning ship.

The 85-tonne vessel, one of four owned and operated by the Andaman Wave Master Co, continued to burn and later sunk.

The apparent cause of the blaze was a fuel line leak, Col Prathueng said.

Passengers were later returned to Phuket free of charge if they desired.

Marine Police will likely try to raise and remove the sunken vessel, he added.



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Police shooting sparks mob on Koh Yao Noi

PHANG NGA: Some 100 angry villagers on Koh Yao Noi descended upon the Koh Yao Police Station on April 21 after a youth, who was shot by a police officer the day before, died from his injuries.

The villagers arrived around 1 pm with the body of 20-yearold Theerawut Kumuda, who died 10 am that morning.

Pol Col Jakkarit Srisuwan, Superintendent of the station, told the Gazette, "Around 10:30 pm on April 20 police were informed that about eight youths had refused to pay their restaurant bill. So L/Cpl Surin Muangthip and L/ Cpl Boonlert Borisuth went to investigate.

"While they were on the way to the restaurant, which took about 10 minutes, the youths paid the bill, but our officers were unaware of that. So when they arrived they asked who hadn't paid, and that made the group of youths angry and they began swearing at the police, so the police left.

"But as the officers were leaving a fight broke out in the group, and one man was injured, so the officers intervened and

stopped the fight, which angered tor who treated Theerawut. all the youths.

"The officers then left the restaurant, but they were followed by the youths, who were now carrying a knife and broken bottles.

"About 30 meters from the restaurant one of the officers fired his gun into the air and ordered them not to follow, but Theerawut charged at them. So L/Cpl Boonlert shot him once in the stomach," Col Jakkarit said.

K. Theerawut was rushed to Koh Yao Hospital, then later transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he died.

'We detained the police officer who shot him and charged him with attempted murder, but we changed the charge to murder when we found out that the victim had died," said Col Jakkarit, adding that the officer was charged because he should not have used his gun when defending himself.

About an hour before the protesters arrived, Phang Nga Vice-Governor Titawat Chaowalit met officers at the police station and heard Col Jakkarit's description of events and a report from the Koh Yao Hospital doc-

"We tried to explain to the villagers that we will follow the law and conduct a fair investigation, but the villagers demanded that we fire the policeman," Col Jakkarit said.

There was one point that we couldn't concede - they wanted the officer to apologize directly to Theerawut's body. We knew it was impossible to let him do that because as soon as he would have stepped outside he would have been beaten by the mob," he explained.

Col Jakkarit said that around 5 pm the police agreed with K. Theerawut's parents' following demands:

1. that L/Cpl Boonlert be denied bail and remain in prison.

2. that police conduct a fair investigation.

3. that Col Jakkarit request that the Phang Nga Provincial Police Commander suspend the suspect without pay until the investigation is complete.

The victim's parents also requested that L/Cpl Boonlert pay 500,000 baht restitution.

The mob dispersed after L/ Cpl Boonlert apologized to the body from his jail cell.

Five die in one-car accident

PHUKET CITY: Five Thai tourists from Krabi died after the pick-up truck they were traveling in slammed into a power pole near Super Cheap on Thepkrasattri Rd early on April 18.

The tourists were driving back to Krabi about 5 am when the driver lost control of the car, which careered off the road and into a power pole, Duty Inspector Maj Russada Kluengwong of Phuket City Police Station said.

"The driver was Chumpon Hemphithak, 28. The passengers who died were Theeraphat Tepbud, 21, Tawan Tepbud, 18, Passakorn Pet-awut, 18, and Narin Kundee, 18.

"The only survivor is Anirut Yangkoon, 18," he said.

"We believe the driver did not know the road well or might have dozed off, but from the autopsy we know there was no alcohol in his blood," he added.

B50.6m tin mine museum to open by December

KATHU: Work is complete on the 50.6-million-baht Kathu Mining Museum building, which is expected to open to by December.

Project consultant and local historian Sommai Pinphutthasilp told the *Gazette* that construction of the museum building, located on the Kathu-Koh Kaew Rd, began in September 2005.

Work was completed about six months after the target date of October 2006 because of delays in finding a suitable contractor, said K. Sommai.

"We will announce the

opening date within two months, after appointing a subcontractor to install the exhibition pieces.

"Right now only the building itself is complete," he added. "We have to find a subcontractor, which could take some time, but we expect to open this year."

Funding for exhibitions, about 10 million baht, is from the Governor's discretionary provincial development budget.

The 7,000-square-meter museum will tell the story of Phuket's tin mining history and explain the tin mining process.

NESDB meets Gov over development

PHUKET CITY: A representative from the National Economic and Social Development Board (NESDB) met Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit April 23 to discuss a wide range of development issues facing the island.

Thanin Pa-Em, Director of the Competitive Development Office of the NESDB, explained that he was in Phuket to review and follow up on projects supporting development of the island, such as projects that support development of the Meetings, Incentives, Conventions and Exhibitions (MICE) industry, marinas and transportation systems.

"We are not gathering new ideas, we just want to be sure projects will be followed up, and how the NESDB can assist with local problems," he said.

"Many projects have not K. Thanin added that the been approved by the central government, but that doesn't mean we are not paying attention. It's because there have been changes in the government. Every time they change the ministers, the priorities change," he said.

Local feedback was also a priority during his visit, K. Thanin said. "We want to see if people throughout Phuket want the same things and have the same opinions."

He said that the NESDB understood Phuket's problem of underfunding from the central government, and that the NESDB is ready to address the issue.

"The budget is not enough because the allocation is according to number of people registered [living on the island], which is very small. The budget is not as much as we need, which we will discuss," he said.







Bang Neaw Dum:

trip to the hillside site of the Bang Neaw Dum . Reservoir project reveals why the government had difficulty convincing property owners in the area to sell their land so that a dam and reservoir could be built there.

The valley is a property developer's dream. Cool and breezy, it sits at high enough elevation to afford views of the sea in the distance. Although surrounded by rubber plantation, with virgin forest on the highest peaks, it is just three kilometers to the Heroines Monument.

The valley where the dam is being built is home to a natural watercouse known as Klong Bang Neaw Dum, named after one of the most prominent hill peaks in the area, Khao Bang Neaw Dum.

When the earthen dam is completed by the Irrigation Department in May 2008, it will create Phuket's second major reservoir, with a capacity of 7.3 million cubic meters and total catchment area of more than 5.5 square kilometers.

Bang Neaw Dum is one of two new reservoirs being built by the Irrigation Department, the other being a 5.7-million-cubicmeter basin at Klong Krata in Chalong. Still in the planning and land acquisition phase, the Klong Krata project is tentatively scheduled for completion some time in 2009.

Both reservoirs are intended to expand municipal water supply into areas that currently lack service, while easing the burden on the 7.3-million-cubic-meter capacity Bang Wad Reservoir in Kathu, which, along with the island's many abandoned tin mines, has just barely been able

he seasonal nature of rainfall in Phuket, coupled with a steady increase in demand for water, has left many parts of the island with chronic dry-season water shortages. Thalang, which lies outside the existing provincial water supply network, has suffered the most.

Groundwater wells on which most of Thalang relies for water dry up or become brackish for longer period each year – especially in coastal areas.

Long-suffering residents will be heartened to know that relief is on the way, in the form of a large dam and reservoir project now about 40% complete in the hillsides of Baan Manik, in Tambon Srisoonthorn.

several recent dry seasons.

Like much of Tambon Srisoonthorn, the site of the Bang Neaw Dum reservoir was once mined for tin. Evidence of this can be seen in the two tin mine ponds and an old tin mining sledge abandoned in the area.

Acting Director of the Bang Neaw Dum Reservoir project is Irrigation Department official Pornthep Bunyaphaluek.

He told the *Gazette* that his department, which falls under the Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives, is only tasked with sourcing fresh water. Treatment and distribution of the water they collect is the responsibility of the Phuket Provincial Water Supply (PPWS) office, which will use most of the water to keep up with rapid property development in southern parts of Thalang.

Leftover water could be sent south to Muang District, he said.


The PPWS in 2006 built a 17-kilometer pipeline from the tin mine ponds, also in Tambon


Srisoonthorn. Currently there are about sixteen Irrigation Department officials working at the project site overseeing the work of project contractor Bunchaipanich (1979) Co Ltd, which began work on the 463-million-baht project on May 19, 2006. They have until May 17, 2008, to complete the work.

Adding greatly to the total project cost of 820-million-baht was more than 300-million-baht in expenses to acquire 59 plots of privately-held land covering

632 rai, just over one square kilometer.

Owners of plots along the main road were paid 500,000 baht per rai in compensation, while those holding plots along the soi leading up to the dam were paid 400,000 baht per rai. All others

were paid 300,000 baht per rai.

Also expropriated were three plots of land, totaling more than 14 rai, that were occupied by people without title deeds. The land acquisition process was completed in 2006.

To be similar in appearance and construction to the dam at Bang Wad Reservoir, the dam at Bang Neaw Dum is being made of compacted clay excavated at the site. The dam's outer surface will be inlaid with large boulders to prevent erosion and add stability.

In addition to a supply pipe to send water to a PPWS treatment plant, the dam will also include an effluent pipe to allow flow to continue along the klong's natural watercourse as well as a

Also under construction is a road that will encircle the reservoir once it is completed and filled.

"This will afford nice views and will serve as a public park,"

As there is little or no human activity in the catchment area apart from rubber tapping. The reservoir water should be very high quality, he said.

Despite early rains, which have hampered progress recently, work is slightly ahead of schedule, he said.

"The dam will definitely be finished by the scheduled completion date of May 17, 2008. However, the completion date will depend on how much rain we get,"


Water from the new reser-

voir will be treated at a water treatment plant now under construction by the PPWS on seven rai of land in Ban Bangjo in Cherng Talay. PPWS Manager Sayan Wareearoonroj told the Gazette that work on the plant is now about 65% complete.

A 142.4-million-baht budget is being used to acquire the land and build the plant, he said.

Once treated, the water will be piped to nearby areas in Thalang including tambons Srisoonthorn and Cherng Talay, as well as parts of Kamala in Kathu District, he said.

"As for how many personnel will be required to operate the treatment plant I can't give you an exact number yet. We must wait for construction to finish first," he said.

K. Sombun jumped forward to try and wrest the gun from Phichet before he could get another shot off, causing a fight to break out.

K. Sombun, however, was apparently no match for the enraged Phichet and quickly found himself having his head bashed repeatedly against the counter.

At that point, the supermarket's crack team of security guards somewhat belatedly arrived on the scene and broke up

his escape, but left his shotgun

When police from Trang Muang District Police Station led by Lt Narin Phumsawat arrived on the scene, they found the battered K. Sombun waiting to give a statement.

K. Sombun told police that he was fairly sure that the attack was motivated by jealousy as Phichet had seen him chatting with his girlfriend and may have thought that he was hitting on her. The day before the attack, Phichet had gone to speak to him in the store about the issue, K. Sombun said.

K. Sombun later reported to the police that sometime after the attack, Phichet called him to demand the return of his shotgun and also to tell him that he had "lots of guns".

Police concluded that the motive for the attack was most likely jealousy and said they were still hunting for Phichet. At the time of going to press, they still had no leads as to his whereabouts.

Samui-Penang air service launched

n April 20, the first direct flight took passengers from Koh Samui to Penang in Malaysia. The flight is operated by Malaysian Airlines subsidiary Firefly Airlines and will leave and return from the island city daily.

A test flight from Penang carried passengers to Samui on April 15. These included tourists from Europe, Malaysia and Indonesia, all countries that provide an important source of visitors for Samui.

The plan to introduce a direct flight began when former Samui tourism chief Panu Woramit brought representatives from Malaysia and Indonesia's tourism sector to Samui to exchange ideas and discuss a regional marketing strategy with members of the Tourism Authority of Thailand.

According to Ruengnam Jaikwang, the head of the Thai

Hotels Association in the region, during those meetings the idea to open a new route between Samui and Penang was discussed and an agreement was reached.

Wealthier Malaysian and Indonesian tourists have large budgets and increasingly choose to tour their neighboring countries. K. Ruengnam says the new route will encourage greater exchange between the two destinations and also pro-

vide convenient opportunity for Samui residents to visit one of Malaysia's most attractive, fascinating cities.

Law clinic: The Samui Municipality Office recently opened a public law center to help local people with legal issues and give them advice on civil and criminal cases, mainly between local businesses.

Surinya Yuennan, Samui's assistant municipality chief, says the island's business sector has developed very fast, which

means serious changes are needed, especially in the way some members of the local community deal with problems and disputes.

Unfortunately, few local people are aware of the intrica-

cies of Thai law, which leads to problems, he said.

This project was designed to help local businesspeople reach mutually acceptable agreements based on legal rather than personal criteria. The island authorities also hope the law clinic will help build a better understanding of legal procedures and ethical business practices.

Everyone is welcome at the clinic, where train-

ed public officials are available to answer questions and give their recommendations based on previous cases and legal precedents.

Development holdup: Property developers from the UK and Scandinavia have sold off nearly 6 billion baht worth of projects on Koh Samui because of the the island's new city plan and a lack of clarity in the amended Foreign Business Act.

The new city plan on Koh Samui will mandate that property projects cannot be constructed higher than 150 meters above sea level. As a result, property developers planning projects higher than that must suspend them.

Project land on Koh Samui may be discounted by as much as 10% to 20% from the average price of 5 million baht per rai for seaview locations. Meanwhile, demand for resorts and villas has shown only slight growth since last December because foreign investors are loath to invest-

amended Foreign Business Act will affect their ownership status. Many foreign buyers have delayed decisions about buying new homes on Koh Samui.

Land prices on Koh Samui have been stable this year while seaview land prices on Koh Samui recorded double growth from 2 million baht per rai to 4 million baht per rai.

Bike smash: When the Samui

called to the scene of a serious accident in Taling Ngam sub-district, they found a motorbike had crashed head on into an excavator, which was parked by an area of road works without a light or warning sign to show drivers that the road was under construction.

The body of a man was found at the scene of the collision, together with his badly injured passenger, who is Burmese.

Both were taken to the Samui Hospital, the former submitted for an autopsy while officers tried to discover his identity and contact relatives.

There have been other serious accidents in areas where road repairs are taking place. Along with Taling Ngam, the road through Bang Por is another accident hotspot due to the general lack of warning signs or police to direct traffic through hazardous

Samui's roads are already notoriously dangerous, but many local people say that structural repairs currently taking place in many parts of the island are, in many cases, making the roads even more deadly.

hostage-taker was overpowered by police at a gas station in Phang Nga's Thap Put District on the morning of April 21 after grabbing a woman at knife point in a 7-Eleven in Trang Town and attempting to force a policeman to drive them to Bangkok.

The victim, Nophamas Jirawuth, 23, told police that Rithidet Ratanawong, 42, grabbed her arm and threatened her with a knife as she was shopping in 7-Eleven about 1 am. He then ordered a policeman, Snr Sgt Maj Chanchai Suphpol, who was nearby when the incident occurred, to drive them to Bangkok.

For a number of hours, Snr Sgt Maj Chanchai circled the streets of Trang before Rithidet realized and ordered him to take the route to Bangkok. When they reached a Shell service station in Thap Put around dawn, K. Nophamas and Snr Sgt Maj Chanchai both asked for permission to go the toilet.

When K. Nophamas was safe, officers who had been following Snr Sgt Maj Chanchai's car moved in and charged Rithidet, placing him under arrest.

K. Nophamas told police she was putting her change in her purse when Rithidet grabbed her arm and said to her, "I'm sorry, I'll let you go in the morning."

"I was very shocked and so agreed to do as he ordered," K. Nophamas said, "though the whole time I was a hostage, I didn't feel scared as the man talked sensibly, though he did mumble to himself a bit. But I was sure he wouldn't stab me."

Rithidet told police that he had come to Trang with his wife and six fellow workers two days earlier to work in a construction camp. The evening before the incident he had been drinking with friends in the workers' camp and had argued with a friend as he thought his wife was going to leave him for the friend.

"I thought that my friend

was going to come and shoot me to shut me up so I ran out of the camp. I can't remember how I got to the 7-Eleven. About 1 am as I was standing outside the store, four or five youths walked up to me. I thought they were going to attack me so I ran into the store. Inside I saw knives for sale so picked one up and used it to take K. Nophamas hostage," Rithidet said.

He added that he hadn't intended to create such a big incident, he had just wanted to be safe and to return to his native Sakon Nakhon province and see his seven-year-old daughter who lived with his ex-wife.

K. Nophamas said she did not want to press charges against Rithidet as he had spoken politely to her and had complied when she asked him not to grasp her so hard and not to hold the knife to her throat. Lt Col Nirat Pandam, Deputy Superintendent of Trang Muang District Police Station, however, said that Rithidet will be charged with unlawful detention and attempted murder.

Marooned: Eight fishing boat crew members were found deserted on Satun's Koh Kwiang April 19 claiming that they had been attacked by a group of pirates in a long-tail boat.

The men were discovered by a fellow fisherman who reported their plight to Satun's Marine Police. The men were picked up by a police patrol boat and taken to the Marine Police Office.

One of the crew members, Thanom Sinseng, 60, told police that they were on their way to Perlis in Malaysia when the incident occurred. When they were passing Koh Phi, about half a nautical mile from the shore, a long-tail boat with five men inside pulled up along side them. The men in the long-tail boat then threatened them with a rifle and two pistols and forced them to board the long-tail. All eight crew

members were then dumped on Koh Kwiang, about one nautical mile from Koh Tarutao, K. Thanom said.

Col Lertchai Thinrath, Superintendent of Marine Police Region 9, said that he had ordered three patrol boats to hunt for the stolen vessel.

Patriarch cuts off amulets: His Holiness the Supreme Patriarch will no longer provide materials from Wat Bowon Niwet, his temple in Bangkok, such as ash from incense or powder from bricks, to make the Jatukham Rammathep amulets that have sparked a crime wave in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

The amulets, which are believed to have magical powers and cost up to 600,000 baht apiece, can only be made with the permission of the southern province's Wat Phra Mahathat Woramahawiharn.

The Supreme Patriarch has provided materials to produce amulets to all temples and individuals that request them but will now stop doing so, the office of his secretary announced vesterday. It did not say why.


Interest in the amulets began in the middle of last year and hit fever pitch this year. On April 9, a woman was crushed to death when thousands of people rushed into a school in Nakhon Sri Thammarat to buy coupons they could exchange for the amulets.

The amulets have become the main target of thieves in Nakhon Sri Thammarat, said Colonel Yanaphat Norasing, Superintendent of the province's Muang District Police Station.

Amulet robberies occur daily, local residents say. On April 22, 30 amulets worth 15,000 baht were stolen from the residence of Phra Palad Nikom Kamalo, Abbot of Wat Nam Song in Muang district.

Earlier in the month, a thief broke through the ceiling of an amulet stall in the province and made off with more than 200,000 baht worth of Jatukham Ramathep amulets.

Safety measures at waterfalls

fter 38 holidaymakers at three waterfalls in Trang province were swept to their deaths by fierce torrents during Songkran, all natural tourist attractions vulnerable to flash-floods across the country will get alarm systems or disaster-warning towers.

Towers equipped with sirens and loudspeakers will be built at waterfalls with suitable terrain.

The sirens will have crank handles so that they are not dependent solely on electricity, said Anucha Mokekhawes, Director-General of the Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Department.

The department's local offices and provincial authorities under the Interior Ministry were assigned by Deputy Interior Minister Banyat Chansena to work together to implement the project.

Evacuation drills would be held regularly while safety measures would be tailored for each site. Safe areas should be designated for swimming, while park rangers and lifeguards would be on standby at each location, K. Anucha said.

Taking stock: Police on April 19 arrested a man who has swindled more than 20 women, whom he met initially through online chat

Wutthirat Limson, 21, was arrested at Lat Phrao Soi 122 in Bangkok while allegedly trying to swindle his latest victim. Bang Khen police had been following him because of the many arrest warrants issued against him.

Counter-corruption:

The Justice Ministry will propose draft legislation concerning the retrieval of overseas assets that have been obtained through corruption. The legislation will go before the Cabinet in mid-May.

The ministry will propose laws for retrieving assets in any country, as well as amendment of Article 87 of the Criminal Code to scrap the statute of limitations in cases when those accused have fled the country, K. Tongthong said.

If the Thai court ordered the assets to be seized, officials in the country where the illegal assets were held would be required to place them on the market. The proceeds would then be returned to the Thai authorities, he said.

The legislation's implementation will reportedly be hurried so that it falls within this government's term.

Risky businesses: Companies involved in mining, consumergoods production and the construction industry were the worst offenders last year in terms of breaching worker safety laws, the Labor Protection and Welfare Department announced.

Agency Chief Padungsak Thephasdin na Ayutthaya said the department had inspected safety measures at 19,820 workplaces and found that the vast majority, 86%, observed the labor safety



ost gas stations in Phuket close at about 10 pm, so what do you do if you are out and about after that time, and running low on fuel?

A doctor and his family have brought to Phuket a solution that is decades old in other parts of the world – a self-service coinoperated petrol pump and installed it on Chao Fa West Rd.

Dr Kamol Prinyanusorn, a medical doctor, has started a side business of running a petrol service pump to bring in extra income for him and his wife Wanida "Ae" Patan.

"First he looked on the Internet, then we saw there are many in Krabi. He has been interested in this for a few years. There is another one beside Prince of Songkla University," said K. Ae.

The self-service pumps' "Minipump 51" logo comes from the couple's house number and yellow was chosen so the sign would be easy to see after dark.

"We invested about 200,000 baht when we opened the mini service pump at the beginning of March," said Dr Kamthorn Prinyanusorn, Dr Kamol's father.

The self-service gas pumps are easy to work and will take both coins and bank notes (20 baht, 50 baht or 100 baht) 24 hours a day. The bank note must be flat for the machine to accept it, but otherwise seems to work well.

"Once someone tried to use something like an M100 bottle cap, it made the machine malfunction because it knew that was not the real coin, so we knew something was wrong with it. The machine stopped working until we fixed it, we lost clients during that time, but we did not lose any petrol," said Dr Kamthorn.

"The main client group is young motorbike riders at night time. Sometimes it's like a meeting point here," K. Ae said.

She added that many people have said it's very convenient and they appreciate that they can put just a few baht worth of petrol in their bikes.

"There are cars that use our pump but we have limited length of plastic tube so it is not always long enough to transfer petrol to

the cars," K. Ae said.

The downside of the coinoperated pumps is they do not give change.

"One customer had 100 baht and wanted to fill up only 60 baht. However, I was there at the time, I just gave her 40 baht change from my pocket," said Dr

Kamthorn.

The pump has two tanks, a 400-liter tank and a 200-liter tank, that tell the operators when the tanks are getting low. Dr Kamthorn then buys more petrol to manually refill the tanks. They choose to put 91 petrol in the pump, since that is what most

motorbike users prefer.

"We do worry about someone damaging our pump or even fires because we are not here all the time," K. Ae said.


My husband is dealing with some friends to add another two mini pumps under the 51 logo this year," she added.

From a financial angle, Dr Kamthorn said, "We expect to get the return on our investment in about two years. We usually fill up the petrol tanks every day."

Aside from manually refilling the tanks, there is one other complaint – carrying all the coins to the bank.

"We have to sort out the different type of coins, then take them to the bank. It's heavy for me to carry the coin bags sometimes," said Dr Kamthorn.





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CONTINENTAL COMFORT

ven when the warm, tropical rains lash down I still feel every now and then the need for comfort, and particularly for the comforting, homemade food much like I had during cold harsh winters back in Scotland.

are just steps away from the main area so service never suffers. The rooms give you the option of having your own quarters, or being in your own dining room and are perfect for large groups and families who want to create their own atmosphere as each room has its own sound system.

What really caught my attention, though, was what I could see out on the lake that edges the garden of La Villa. Walking down through the garden we moved

effortlessly across floating pontoons to inspect a quite unworldly sight.

There seemed to be huge lights bursting out of the water and as we took a closer look,

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2007 are my personality, my height and appearance, and my answers to the on-stage questions in the final round," she said.



4x4 that is often overlooked is the Subaru Forester. The Forester features permanent all-wheel drive as well as the unique flat-four, horizontally-opposed two-liter engine.

This unusual engine configuration of having the pistons in a horizontal position, rather than vertical, apparently produces less vibration and a lower center of gravity, while also, of course, contributing to a lower hood line.

The Forester, with its twoliter gasoline engine, produces a reasonable 158bhp (116kW) at 6,400rpm and 186Nm of torque. Not a performance vehicle, but solid enough all the same. Where the car does score, however, is with its sophisticated all-wheel drive (AWD) system that ensures constant stability and even cornering.

The Subaru drive system is symmetrical, eliminating any power losses. Everything from the engine to transmission, transfer to propeller shaft and rear differential is logically arranged in-line without the doglegs or deviations



of other four-wheel-drive setups.

Full-time AWD has distinct advantages over two-wheel drive, particularly in cornering. By transmitting power simultaneously through all four tires, the vehicle steers neutrally and naturally – no running wide or lift-off tuck in. It is inherently safer, while if required the Forester will happily go off road and cope with difficult terrain.

The "boxer" engine is light and compact. Horizontally-opposed pistons are reportedly smoother and more efficient than conventional in-line or V-type configurations. Rotational balance is maintained because the pistons counteract each other

meaning less vibration, while the lower center of gravity also contributes to overall stability.

The Forester is well finished inside and out, with leather trim available on some models. Dual airbags are fitted, along with active headrests to help eliminate whiplash. The front seats can be adjusted for height, while the rear jhc@netvigator.com

seats fold in a 60:40 split, or can be laid flat to accommodate larger loads. The top Forester models have a special rear suspension that maintains an even ride, even when fully laden.


Safety features abound, particularly within the high-strength cab. The ring-ribbed safety "cage" integrates the roof, door, window pillars and the floor into one strong energy-absorbing framework. It encloses the entire passenger compartment, ready to dissipate impact energy no matter which direction it comes from.

Pedestrian safety is another consideration and the low hood line of the Forester aids this. The hood is made of aluminum and there are energy-absorbing front bumpers and breakaway module windshield wipers. The Forester is not listed on the Euro NCAP crash tests, but it is reasonable to assume it would get high marks.

With the Forester, the tiny, by Japanese standards, automaker is contributing to comfort and safety at a reasonable cost.

Prices for the Subaru Forester start at just over two million baht for the entry-level model. The Forester is available from Motor Image Subaru Co Ltd in Thailand. More information is available at www.motorimage. net/th/





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e want our customers to have a good treatment. We can help them relieve their mental and physical tensions, that's the reason we used this name for our spa," Araya Limpanudom, Body & Mind Spa Owner, tells me when I visit her spa at Boat Lagoon.

Body & Mind Spa was first established at Karon Beach three years ago and due to high demand this second branch has been set up as a garden day spa.

K. Araya says her garden spa aims to serve residential customers, unlike the first branch at Karon beach where almost all the customers are tourists. So far, she adds, the response has been excellent.

I sit at the reception lounge sipping the hot bale-fruit drink while listening as K. Araya explains the spa. I look around the spa area, finding that this is another tranquil place where I can seek some relaxation.

The spa sits on about one rai of land, surrounded by lush, green gardens with a lotus pond at the center.

There are three wooden buildings decorated in Thai-Balinese style at the edge of the garden. K. Araya takes me around the area and explains that there are five double treatment rooms and each room is attached to an outdoor bathtub and shower.

There are two private Thai massage rooms, a room with two seats for foot massages, and also a sauna and a steam room.

The spa menu starts with foot massages at 600 baht for 60 minutes and also offers body wraps, scrubs or facial massages starting at 1,000 baht for 60 minutes. There are also many spa

packages to choose from, beginning at 1,600 baht for 90-minute treatments. All treatments include hot herbal tea, fresh fruit and juice. The prices exclude the 10% service charge and 7% government tax.

The Body & Mind Garden Spa also provides "spa cuisine" - they work with Porto to create cuisine packages with low-calorie and delicious entrees and treats to complete a day at the spa.

K. Araya introduces me to the spa's very popular signature treatment, the Secret Jasmine Rice. K. Araya loves this treatment because she saw her grandmother and mother use it when she was young.

"People come to spas in Thailand because they want to experience original Thai treatments with Thai herbs, so that's what we do," says K. Araya.

Another popular treatment at Body & Mind Spa is the coconut scrub. The spa also gives advice to customers concerning their skin, as there are some treatments would be not suitable for certain skin types.

"Our customers can choose the massage oils they want and our menus are flexible because we want them to enjoy themselves and to be as relaxed as possible," K. Araya explains. I opt to have the three-hour Secret Jasmine Rice treatment at 3,300 baht, and I follow therapist Nitiporn "Tom" Saenkhwa, who has five years' spa experience, to a private treatment room.

I am then told to climb on the massage bed for the first step of the Secret Jasmine Rice treatment, a body scrub. K. Tom scrubs all over my body with the jasmine rice scrub paste, and I can smell the scent of the rice throughout the treatment. This step takes one hour, then I am told




to shower off the scrub. I can tell that my skin is more radiant and soft after I dry off.



Men who tied the world together

ou might think that all the stories of the age of exploration — when the Portuguese and Spanish broke oceanic barriers to connect to Asia and discover the New World — have been written before, but when a real scholar tackles the subject, there's always a lot more to learn.

Such is the case with Filipe Fernandez-Armesto, a Spanish historian who has produced a startling new work called *Pathfinders: A Global History of Exploration* (W.W. Norton, New York, 2006, pp428).

His premise is simple: the early history of *Homo sapiens* was one of diffusion and the rise of disparate cultures and languages. Modern history begins with explorers who started knitting the world back together again, culminating eventually in our own age of globalization.

Fernaandez-Armesto starts at the beginning: By 60,000 years ago *Homo sapiens* had migrated from Africa along the Asian littoral as far as Australia. The last great diffusion happened only a few thousand years ago with the spread of the Polynesians throughout the South Pacific.

What's unique in the author's account is its global perspective.

His survey of explorers is not limited to the usual Europeans but includes the ancient Arab and Persian seamen who opened up the trade routes to India, the mighty Asian and African expeditions of Chinese admiral Zheng Ho in the half century before the arrival of the Portuguese,




and the astonishing colonization of Madagascar by Malay voyagers.

While he gives Marco Polo his due, the author also recognizes the Arab traveler Ibn Battuta as among the greatest of the medieval age. And another curious historical nugget: just at the time of Marco Polo's travels, a young Mongol Christian monk named Rabban Sar Sauma embarked upon a journey eastward from Beijing to the kingdoms of Europe.

He made it to Rome and the Holy Land and retired in Persia till his death in 1294. In fact, 900 years earlier, the Chinese Emperor had sent an ambassador to the Roman Empire who turned back at the Black Sea in fear of fierce tribes ahead. Who knows how history might have changed?

These are the sort of questions that arise from a non-Eurocentric perspective on the history of exploration. The author unearths plenty of unsung heroes.

The English colonists in Virginia had



the idea that they inhabited a small strip of land bordering on the Pacific.

In 1673-4, a trader's servant named George Arthur took up with a war party of Tomahitan Indians on the other side of the Appalachian mountains and traveled north to the Ohio Valley and south almost to the Gulf of Mexico. "The vastness of the continent was crushing English hopes of crossing it easily and quickly," Fernandez-Arnesto notes.

Africa served as the stage for the

greatest feats of exploration, beginning with Mungo Park's two excruciating treks to the Niger River in 1795 and 1805. Besides a mysterious immunity to tropical diseases (shared by Henry Morton Stanley), Mungo Park turned out perfect for the job: "restless, vainglorious, irrepressible, penniless, easily biddable, insatiably curious, and indefeasibly tough."

Due to the three epic voyages (1768-1779) of Captain James Cook, the last isolated populations of Australia, New Zealand and islands in the Polynesian Pacific such as Hawaii were brought back into contact with the rest of the world.

But there were still surprises going into the 20th century. In June 1930, a gold prospector named Michael Leahy stumbled into the unknown Goroka river valley in the central highlands of New Guinea.

Here he found a population of 100,000, each of the many tribes happily at war with each other. "In all, there were well over a half a million people living in the highland area unknown before the 1930s," Fernandez-Armesto reports.

The last holdouts now are some 40 Indian tribes in the depths of the Amazon.

The author cautions that they should not be considered failed communities which have missed out on progress: "Really they should be considered the most successful societies in history: they had achieved a conservative nirvana, preserving their culture against change, resisting the convulsive lurches of 'modernity'."

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New flights positive for Phuket but can they make a profit?

Although the reintroduction of flight services between Phuket and Haad Yai next month is wonderful news for Phuket, one has to wonder if there is sufficient demand for the service to support two carriers [see Business, page 32].

Since Phuket's ill-fated namesake carrier Phuket Air abandoned the route in 2005, there has been no flight service between the south's two main tourism hubs. People needing to travel from one to the other have been faced with several dubious options: fly all the way to Bangkok to get a connecting flight; make a circuitous seven-hour drive by car or van; or spend nine hours or longer by "VIP" coach.

Over the past 18 months, Phuket has suffered as a result of its inability to better tap into the Malaysian tourism market, which includes large numbers of affluent ethnic Chinese who enjoy cultural links with their counterparts in Phuket. Others who will benefit include visa runners and international tourists making their way between Singapore and Bangkok.

It should also be remembered that Malaysia annually rates as the number-one source of foreign tourists to Thailand, many of whom cross the border by car or bus to visit Haad Yai and who do not want to add on seven or eight hours to their overland journey to reach our island.

Until the new flights were introduced, the irony of not being able to fly between southern Thailand's two major international airports continued to deepen with the introduction of several direct flights between cities with far less obvious affinity were introduced, most notably Malaysian-based Firefly airlines' direct services from Penang to Phuket and Koh Samui.

When the *Gazette* last covered the glaring lack of flights between Phuket and Haad Yai as a business story, in February 2006, Phuket Airport Director Sq/Ldr Pornchai Eua-aree said he had been told by several carriers that the load factor for the route was too low for it to be run at a profit.

He suggested – quite sensibly – that rather than introduce a dedicated route between the two cities, that one of the many carriers with daily flights from Bangkok to Phuket and Haad Yai consider introducing a Bangkok-Phuket-Haad Yai route. Another logical approach would be to run a 50- or 60-seat fuel-efficient turboprop service as Phuket Air did

Starting in a few weeks time it will be easy and economical to catch flights to Haad Yai. We should appreciate the situation while it lasts – because it might not be for long.

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

t Khao Pra Taew Wildlife Conservation Development and Extension Center we have the duty of promoting and publicizing natural resource conservation, specifically forest and wildlife conservation.

We also provide a learning process, which I think is a very important duty of ours, that can teach people to be more conscientious about conservation and to help them work together in conserving the natural resources of forest and wildlife.

We have a nature education trail called the "Tone Sai Waterfall Nature Trail" for people who want to learn about natural resources and the forest in Khao Pra Taew.

The nature trail is an activity that will encourage people to learn about nature by truly seeing and interacting with it, these are the special things about the center. These activities can make people love nature after learning about it.

We have developed this nature trail project supported by a Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) budget of 900,000 baht. This project will eventually include more trails, a service center and landscaping. Now we are look-

ing for additional funds from government or private sectors to help construct them.

I believe that this project will be good for people who love natural resources and want to conserve them. We hope people will form a group or club for natural conservation. This project can also support ecotourism in Phuket. It will be a different kind of

experience for tourists visiting Phuket.

Once we find enough money for further development, I reckon that we will take no more than two years to finish the project. After this development project is finished, Khao Pra Taew will be one of the best places for nature trail education in the world.

People can help support the center by visiting it and helping to bring it to the public attention. This should create a network of supporters for the center.

We should pay attention to natural conservation anyway, but particularly right now because the world has changed and there are increasing problems with global warming and the greenhouse ef-

fect. This makes the world hotter and is also causing more natural disasters. All these problems are happening because nature is being destroyed, so people should work together to conserve the natural environment. There are easy ways to help such as as not cutting down trees in forests and not supporting people who do.

People should not overlook this area because Khao Pra Taew is the most complete forest in Phuket, with a wide range of flora and fauna. The conservation center has an area of 13,925 rai - about 4% of Phuket - covering parts of Thepkrasattri, Srisoonthorn and Pa Khlok sub-dis-

We have many kinds of plants and wildlife, such as heritage palms, monkeys, gibbons, cynogale bennettis (an otter civit of the Malay peninsula, Borneo and Sumatra) and even waterfall crabs, which are difficult to find - but you can see them here.

Why did I pay an extra B10 to send an airmail letter?

I recently went to the post office at Big C to send a letter to Belgium, which I was told cost 34 baht to send by airmail. I thought it was a little expensive as the letter comprised just two sheets

of paper in an envelope.

When I arrived home, I checked the rates on the Thai Post website, which said the cost should have been 24 baht.

I returned to Big C and asked the girl why I paid 34 baht. She told me that I had to pay a tax. I understand a little bit of Thai but I didn't understand what kind of tax isn't much of that going on

I asked her for a receipt, which she happily issued, stating that I paid 34 baht. So, what kind of tax did I have to pay?

Therawat Thavipongsak, Distribution Officer, Phuket City Post Office replies:

In short, it's not a tax. To explain, any postal service counters at Big C – or in any shopping mall – are authorized to offer Thai Post services, but they are not directly operated by Thai Post.

Such service counters charge a minimum service fee of 10 baht. Perhaps the girl at Big C did not know the correct words to explain this to you.

It would have been better if they had told you in advance about the service charge, or if you had gone to a Thai Post post office and mailed the envelope direct, as you would have been charged just the postal rate without any service fee.

My local veterinarian informed me that they have to be identified with a microchip in order to exit Thailand. They are already identified with a tattoo number that was given in France, is this sufficient for leaving the country under Thai law?

Sutath Ngamkoranatikarn, an officer at Phuket Animal **Quarantine Station, replies:**

In the case of exporting a cat back to the country of origin in which it was born, the following items are required.

The cat's "passport" along with a photocopy, the owner's passport, the cat's vaccination book and the original permit documents that you received when you first brought the cat here from

The items can be brought to the Phuket Animal Quarantine Station, located at the airport, dur-

I will be traveling to France in the ing working hours, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm from Monday to Friday.

We will check all of the documents prior to issuing the certificate for exporting the cat. All items should be given to the station a minimum of three days before the journey to allow for processing.

As to the microchip, there is no problem if your cat doesn't have the microchip because the tattooed ID number is acceptable under Thai law and can be used as the pet's identification reference also.

Boonyaporn Petchanok, Veterinarian from Rak Satt Pet Hospital, Khao Rang replies,

The owner should ask about vaccination requirements from the country that they will export the cat to. Generally in Asia, the biggest concern is rabies.

You can bring your cat with the vaccination book to the pet hospital, and we will check if your cat already has all vaccinations needed or not, if not we will do that and issue the medical certificate for your cat to present at the animal quarantine station.

onventional wisdom, both from web pundits and at Phuket parties, posits that you should wait for Service Pack 1 before installing Windows Vista.

I say poppycock. I've been using pre-release forms of Vista for almost a year now, and aside from an occasional screw-up, it works great.

The relative lack of problems with Vista, in my experience, puts Windows XP Service Pack 2 to shame: Vista's more stable, more secure and marginally more capable than XP SP2. If you're waiting for Vista Service Pack 1, you're going to be disappointed.

From what I've seen the major problems with Vista at this point have more to do with flaky drivers, the programs that control video cards, printers, sound cards and the like than any inherent problem inside Vista.

There's enormous pressure on driver vendors to get their hardware working with Vista. It's PC, you greatly increase the like-

going to take a while to get all the old hardware working with the new operating

system, and in the interim plenty fall through the cracks.

Don't think for one moment that I'm urging you to install Vista on your current Windows XP computer. Far from it. Upgrading operating systems is a monumental pain in the neck.

If you have an up-to-date computer with a hefty video card (at least 128MB of onboard memory, preferably 256MB or more), and a high tolerance for pain, you might want to consider upgrading. But if you have a Windows XP SP2 system that does what you need, upgrading to Vista can be much more hassle than it's worth.

Should you be tempted to upgrade your current PC from XP to Vista, drop by the official Vista upgrade advisor page,

If you lust after Vista, there's no need to wait

www.microsoft.com/windows/products/windowsvista/buyorup-grade/upgradeadvisor.mspx, and make sure your PC has the oomph to pull it off.

In my opinion: don't upgrade your current PC to Vista unless there's a feature in Vista that you absolutely must have. Instead, wait until you buy a new PC – and when you do, get it with Windows Vista Home Premium pre-installed.

Buying a new PC with Windows XP limits its useful life because XP won't be supported forever. If you get Vista Home Premium pre-installed on a new PC, you greatly increase the like-

lihood that the drivers will work. More than that, if you're moving

on to a new PC, you have to go through all of the hassles of transferring programs, data and settings from one PC to another. The pain of migrating to a new operating system at the same time you migrate to a new computer is only slightly greater than the change in machines itself. Don't set yourself up to suffer twice

Vista comes in eight different flavors. For almost all of the people, almost all of the time, the version you want is called Vista Home Premium. You can run through the details, but the bottom line is pretty simple: if you buy Vista Home Basic, you'll want Home Premium within a week.

You could spend a lot of extra money for a little extra benefit with Vista Ultimate. You

could fall for the hype and buy Vista Business. But if you only want to buy Vista once, get Vista Home Premium.

Big screen: While I'm on the topic of buying new computers, permit me to foist one more personal bias on you. No matter what kind of computer you buy, if you're going to use Vista, get a big monitor and back it up with a hefty video card. I've been trying to run Vista on very sharp 17-inch LCD monitors, the same monitors that worked great with XP, and I'm ready to tear my hair out.

Vista screams for more real estate: not only can you get more work done on a bigger screen, you can have more fun, too. Vista's Media Center playing a downloaded high-definition movie on a wide-screen monitor is something you have to see to believe.

I've finally reached the

point where my desktop is screaming for a wide-screen monitor, so I've gone looking all over Asia for decent alternatives. I was more than a little surprised by what I found.

Samsung widescreen monitors look great. Samsung offers a decent, reasonably priced 20-inch widescreen monitor called the 205BW. I found the monitor all over Sim Lim Square in Singapore, and the Mong Kok computer center in Hong Kong. Surprisingly, prices in Singapore were about 15% lower than Hong Kong.

I checked for the same monitor in Bangkok (both at Panthip and IT City) and couldn't find a 205BW anywhere. Apparently Samsung isn't – or at least wasn't – selling that particular model in Thailand.

The monitor I really want? The Dell 3007WFP. It's a gloriously beautiful 30-inch monitor that's only slightly smaller than the QE2 (which is to say, Queen Elizabeth II, the fishing boat). It also costs as much as a first class cruise, so I settled on its smaller, but still elegant sibling, the 24-inch Dell 2407WFP.

I hopped onto Dell's website and found that the 2407WFP goes for US\$611 (about 20,000 baht) in the US. A few quick clicks confirmed that Dell sells the same monitor for HK\$4,888 (about 20,200 baht) in Hong Kong, and S\$999 (about 21,400 baht), including a web cam, in Singapore.

I looked on the Dell Thailand site and found that Dell doesn't even list the monitor as being available for order in Thailand. So I wrote to Dell Thailand and asked for a price. I was a bit miffed to learn that Dell wants 28,000 baht for the 2407WFP in Thailand. That's 42% more than the US price.

Somebody's getting shafted. Make sure it isn't you.



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nvestments that consistently make money without ever losing any are rare and valuable entities. In 2003 a particular investment was featured in this column and it seems timely to feature it again because it has continued to display its ability to increase in value on a monthly

Since December 2003, this investment has become attractive to a broader audience as it became available to investors with base currencies in euros and US dollars as well as the original base currency, pounds sterling.

The fund in question is the Protected Asset TEP Fund. TEPs are Traded Endowment Policies. These are the old-style endowment policies issued by virtually all major insurance companies in the UK. They are not marketrelated in a direct sense but instead give investors guaranteed bonuses.

To avoid UK tax on gains made before a policy is 10 years old, investors have to find someone to buy the policy from them, otherwise early encashment leads to a tax on any gain in value. To find a buyer for an existing policy is easier than it seems; there are daily advertisements in the UK press offering exactly this service.

Even if an investor approaches an insurance company requesting a surrender quote, under the UK Financial Services Act, the insurance company will give the surrender value but will add in large block capital letters that a higher figure will normally be available in the secondary market.

The insurance companies are pleased to comply with this piece of legislation as they do not want to have to surrender policies unless it is necessary. The original investor also benefits in two ways; the policy when sold produces a higher value and because it has been sold and not surrendered the gains are legally

Trading endowment policies Everybody's a winner

The buyers in the secondary market know exactly what they are buying: a second-hand endowment policy that has, embedded in its value, what are referred to as terminal bonuses, which become payable only on the expiry of the original contract.

The secondary-market purchasers are also acutely aware of the investment history of every insurance policy in which they invest. This means that terminal bonuses, because they are vested in each policy, effectively produce a guarantee for future capital profit.

Only policies that are at least eight years old are considered worthy of purchase. The underlying assets of these policies are mainly equities (shares), bonds, commercial property and cash; very similar in fact to what would be held by a typical pension fund. Not all of the assets in fact are in the UK; almost all policies have an international component.

It is a "win-win" situation all around. The original investor sells the policy for more than its surrender value and the gains are tax-free. The insurance company keeps the policy "on its books" and the secondary-market purchaser buys an asset which, if held to maturity, is bought at discount to its true value.

chasers vary, sometimes it is individuals who are seeking to buy a legal tax shelter, or banks wanting to purchase an asset at lower than true market value.

In this instance it is a fund management group, Protected Asset Management, that buys selected policies and places them all into a fund.

For an asset manager, there is very little actual work to do and this is reflected in their fee structure, no entry cost, no exit cost and an annual management charge of only 0.975% per annum.

It has been a very successful investment strategy, the fund has never had a negative month, it simply keeps on rising in value and I know from experience that this is exactly what most inves-

It certainly will never produce huge returns but it consis-

consistent returns that can be achieved via bank deposits or bonds.

fter almost two years with no flights connecting Southern Thailand's two largest international airports, low-cost carriers Nok Air and One-Two-GO will both launch regular services between Phuket Airport and Haad Yai Airport, starting in mid-May.

Service on Nok Air's 150seat Boeing 737-400 will begin on Tuesday, May 15.

Flights will depart Phuket daily at 2:05 pm and reach Haad Yai at 2:45 pm. The return leg will depart Haad Yai at 3:15 pm, landing in Phuket at 3:55 pm.

Average ticket prices for economy class will work out to about 1,500 baht one-way, including all taxes and fees.

Sehapan Chumsai, Nok Air's Executive Vice-President for Marketing, told the *Gazette* that there is demand for flights among businessmen unwilling to make the seven-hour drive from Phuket to Haad Yai, which involves first driving north and then all around Phan Nga Bay before the journey south can even begin. The drive takes even longer, about nine hours, by VIP coach

"We think there is a sufficient demand and we see this route as a good opportunity to help travelers between the two cities save time," he said.

Although the flight schedules announced will only remain officially effective until October 27, just days before the traditional start of the high season for tourism in Phuket, K. Sehapan is confident that the route will be a long-term success.

"Whenever Nok Air launches a new route we try to have patience and develop that route as best as possible. If passenger demand increases in the future, we can add more flights. We are confident that this will be a popular service that will develop and grow over time," he said.

When asked about sharing the route with rival carrier One-Two-GO, K. Sehapan said he was confident because Nok Air has developed itself as the top do-

mestic carrier in terms of market share since its introduction three years ago, having developed a strong sense of customer satisfaction from its services and standards.

"For example, we launched our Bangkok-Phuket service with just two flights daily, but now we have six flights a day," he said.

K. Sehapan said he expects the bulk of passengers using the new service to be people on business or visiting relatives. About 35% are expected to book their flights online, with another 35% booking though the Nok Air Call Center. The remainder will buy their tickets at the airport (25%) or through agents (5%)," he said.

"Actually, the Phuket-Haad Yai route is one that local people have been asking us about for a long time now, ever since Thai Airways stopped its service. People's lifestyles have changed since then; traveling by air has become more routine," he said.

In fact, the last carrier to fly the route was Phuket's namesake carrier Phuket Air, which used an aging 60-seat Japanese NAMC YS-11 turboprop to run the route.

The service was suspended after a bomb planted in the departure lounge by Pattani sepa-

ratists exploded on April 3, 2005, killing one person. The service was scrapped altogether in October of that year. Other carriers who have abandoned the route include the now-defunct Air Andaman, Bangkok Airways and Thai Airways, which had daily flights for many years, some with stopovers in Trang.

Also seeking to profit by reviving the Phuket to Haad Yai route is domestic carrier One-Two-GO Airlines, which will launch the first flight of its Wednesday-Friday-Sunday flight schedule on May 13. At 1,500 baht all inclusive, the 30-minute flights will leave Phuket at 11:30 am, with the return leg leaving Haad Yai at 12:30 pm.

One-Two-GO Executive Director for Commercial Affairs Manassanant Tantiprachai said One-Two-GO expects strong demand from Malaysian tourists flying into Haad Yai who want to continue on to Phuket and don't want to make the journey over land. "This was a popular route for many years when it was run

by THAI," said K. Manassanant, who likewise noted that One-Two-GO was planning on the route's long-term success.

"Our strengths lie in our aircraft, a 172-seat McDonnell Douglas MD-82, plus the fact that we have free snacks and beverages on all flights. We also have a maximum luggage weight of 20 kilos and allow passengers to change flight dates with no charge. We expect Malaysian tourists and Thais to make up the bulk of our passengers," she said.

Most of these, about 50% or 60%, are expected to purchase tickets through agents. The remainder will book through the call center or by Internet," she said.

One-Two-GO is also expanding its services to Nakhon Sri Thammarat and Surat Thani, raising the number of weekly flights between Bangkok and those destinations to 12 and 11, respectively, she added.





lephants are mega-cool. I know that today, of course, having been here in Thailand for a while. The elephant is even one of the many symbols of this country—it's so important here, it used

Apart from being the largest terrestrial animal on earth, second in height only to the giraffe, did you know that elephants have knees, as we do, but on both their front and hind legs. Despite this, they're one of the few animals that can't jump.

Outside elephant trekking, I'm not sure if there any elephants still working in southern Thailand, though there are plenty farther north. Depending on the size of the elephant, they can actually lift 200 to 400 kilograms, believe it or not. That's nearly half a ton. Not bad at all. Isn't it good that you can sound just a little bit like David Attenborough by typing "www.google.com" into a computer.

Oh, and the term "Jumbo" comes from the elephant Jumbo, who after living in Angola, France and England, was sold to PT Barnum of The Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus in the US. Jumbo died on September 15, 1885, crossing railroad tracks in St Thomas, Ontario. The collision derailed the train.

And if you care, September 22 is Elephant Appreciation Day.

While enjoying a cold beer at Cok Chang, an elephant trekking-cum-watering hole with resident gibbons in the hills between Rawai and Kata, I once noticed a male elephant which, as I try to put this in a way that will offend as few people as possible, had


become somewhat "aroused".

Maybe he'd just been flicking through the pages of *Hot Elephants Weekly* or considering unseemly elephantine frolics with Mrs Elephant that night. Those trunks are useful appendages, after all. Whatever the cause of his rising to the occasion, the result was more than a little scary. At least the name of the establishment now makes complete sense.

I heard a pearl of artistic wisdom recently, by the way – how to sculpt an elephant. Apparently it's not particularly difficult. What you do is first get a huge block of marble, then you chip away everything that doesn't look like an elephant.

Elephants aren't exactly lightning fast – although they can run at speeds up to 30 kilometers an hour; I certainly wouldn't want to be running away from an unhappy charging elephant – how often have you seen an elephant creep? They're not known for their stealth or subtlety, and are hardly likely to walk up behind you on tiptoe and shout, "Boo!" In fact anything that refers to elephants and creepers in the same sentence has to be pretty bizarre.

Now we finally get to the point of my inane ramblings -a unique plant known as the elephant creeper. Some people call

it silver morning glory or woolly morning glory. If you are Thai you would call it a *phak-rabaat*.

This native of India and Burma is amazing for one big reason — I've never seen anything grow as quickly. Never ever. It could well be just my imagination, but when I first brought one of these home, I'm sure it extended itself by an inch or two daily. Nearly as impressive as a certain elephant I once witnessed.

But it wasn't always as enthusiastic. I first spotted it at a local garden center and jumped on the motorcycle Thai-style with it precariously gripped under one arm. By the time I got it home, it was looking a little less magnifi-

cent. In fact it looked pathetic; rather like a snake whose backbone had spontaneously turned to jelly. I thought I'd killed it. Shift of location? Wind? I had no idea. It certainly wasn't particularly happy. This lethargic state didn't last long.

By the following morning, I realized that this plant is merciless to all in its path. Tendrils shoot out continuously from the main stem like some kind of Jurassic python, coiling around whatever is in their reach. The jelly backbone had been transformed into something very different.

It is best to try to guide it away from anything you don't want it to throttle to death, as it will strangle and smother anything that gets in its way. Mine decided that the fence it was growing near should become its domain; the fence didn't get the chance to argue. The best surprise comes with the flowers, which appear without warning. When the plant is mature, big, dramatic blueishmauve trumpet flowers bloom

The large leaves, unsurprisingly, are shaped a little like elephant ears (at last we get to the elephant connection). They're green on top, with silvery white hairs below, which grow profusely from low down on the stem. The underside of the leaves feels rather like the velvet in your grandmother's jewelry box.

repeatedly.


The elephant creeper can be grown from a pot or from the ground in rocky, sandy soil. The tendrils can grow up to around 10 meters. It doesn't need that much space – just something to attach itself to. Like its namesake, it's hardy and is quite content in either direct sun or shade. It needs plenty of watering but doesn't like standing in water.

In India, both the seeds and the roots of the elephant creeper are used for their medicinal properties. They are used to aid the nervous system, as a geriatric tonic and a mild aphrodisiac. The plant reportedly also has purifying, antiseptic properties, and is believed to help maintain healthy joints for people suffering from arthritis. If you crush the leaves and mix them with water into a paste, you have a perfect treatment for skin wounds. Or so they say.

There are supposed to be psychoactive ingredients in both the seeds and roots that some claim to have aphrodisiac qualities. I can't say that I've actually tested this theory myself, but if there is anyone that wants to put the theory to the test, then fill your boots. As it were.

Getting beached in Kata

eveloper Phuket Golden Place Property Co Ltd this month began work on two projects: The Beach Center and The Beach Town Home, on nine rai on Patak Rd, opposite Club Med.

The Beach Center, located at the rear of the site, will be six blocks comprising a total of 47 three-story shophouses. Construction is about 10% complete.

The Beach Town Home, three blocks of three-story town-houses totaling 19 units, is also currently about 10% complete.

Karn Prachumphan, Managing Director of Phuket Golden Place Property Co Ltd, told the *Gazette*, "We expect that the Beach Center will be finished and we will be able to transfer ownership of units to buyers by about November this year.

"The Beach Town Home will be finished about February next year," he added.

The Beach Center will feature two types of shophouses. The smaller type of 204 square meters will be 4.5 meters wide and 13m long, and have three bedrooms and three bathrooms. There will be 37 units of this type, with prices starting at 4.5 million baht each.

He added that the townhouses have been designed as "resort houses", with lush gardens and a large shared swimming pool that is 6m by 15m.


