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'Farang' robs Karon bank

KARON: Despite an intensive manhunt, police have yet to apprehend the Caucasian man who held up the Siam Commercial Bank (SCB) branch on Patak Rd in Karon on June 28, getting away with 420,000 baht in cash.

At the monthly Phuket Provincial Security Committee meeting held at the ST Hotel June 29, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch said he believed the culprit was still in the Karon area.

Soon after the heist, at about 4:30 pm, Chalong Police began checking all guesthouses and motorcycle rental agencies in the area in the hope of tracking down the man, confirmed by Gen Decha as being a "farang".

"I think he has been in Thailand [awhile] because he could speak some Thai. I think he may have tried to copy the Dutchman who held up the office at Phuket Villa California recently [and was apprehended the following day].

"Witnesses said the man waited on his motorbike in front of the bank for about 30 minutes before entering," Gen Decha said.

The motorcycle used in the robbery had a license plate, but witnesses did not notice its number, he added.

In carrying out the heist, the thief wore a face mask, a white long-sleeved shirt and black trousers. He entered the bank quickly and promptly held a gun to the head of Branch Manager Thurdsak Chusap and demanded cash.

masked, I believe he was a foreigner because he spoke both Thai and English. He kept shouting 'ray-o ray-o!' [faster, faster] and 'More, more!' He wasn't a big guy, though. Actually he was shorter than me at about 160 to 165 centimeters," K. Thurdsak told the *Gazette*.

"I was really frightened. Everything happened so fast, it was over in just two minutes and he made off on a Suzuki Step motorbike with the cash, about 420,000 baht. Fortunately, some people outside got a look at his motorbike. That should provide the police with some valuable clues," he said.

The robbery was recorded on the bank's closed-circuit television cameras, but the images were not very clear, he said.

"Our bank is under 24-hour video surveillance and I am not sure if the robber knows that images of him robbing the bank were recorded," he said.

Phuket to have biggest aquarium in SE Asia

BANGKOK (*Nation*, *Gazette*): Ripley Entertainment, operator of Ripley's Believe It or Not Museum, plans to build and open a 2.1-billion-baht aquarium in Phuket within three years.

The firm will enter into a joint venture with Thailand-based conglomerate Minor International Plc, the franchisee of the Ripley museum in Pattaya.

The aquarium project will be Ripley's second property in Thailand and its first aquarium outside the US.

The aquarium is planned to cover 10,000 to 12,000 square meters and would be bigger than Underwater World in Singapore, which claims to be the biggest aquarium in Southeast Asia.

Ripley Entertainment President Robert Masterson said the group intended to hold a major stake in the new project.

Mr Masterson declined to reveal the location and amenities of the project, saying it was too early to go into details.

"The tourist market will be a major target," he said.

Sombat Phuwatchiranond, former chief of the Phuket Marine Biological Office (PMBC), told the *Gazette* that the Phuket aquarium draws an average of 30,000 visitors per month, but he said that it could be difficult for a private aquarium to draw as many guests since the entry fees for the government-run facility are cheap.

"Investing in an aquarium is also very expensive, as is the maintenance, so they have to set a high ticket fee," he said.

"They also may run into problems because when people come to Phuket they want to see the fish under the sea, not in an aquarium."

Farang robber still 'in Phuket' - police



before the bank's 4:30 pm closing time to strike, he noted.

Despite the robbery, the bank was back to business as usual and ready to pay out endof-the-month salaries due that day for many workers on the island, he said.

Chairing the meeting, Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit was clearly exasperated by the second robbery-at-gunpoint by a farang in the same month.

Crime rates were already high enough among Thais and the numerous illegal laborers on the island without tourists getting in on the act, he said.

Gov Niran told the security committee he understood that government officers assigned to Phuket were tired, but nevertheless encouraged them to redouble their efforts to catch the thief in order to protect Phuket's image as a safe tourist destination.

As this edition went to press, Chalong Police investigator Pol Capt Thammasan Boonsong said police had already questioned many foreign tourists whose names were taken from lists supplied by motorcycle rental operators between June 26 and 28.

The suspect was a Caucasian foreigner, aged from 30 to 40, he added.

'None of the people questioned so far matched the bank robber's description," he said.

Capt Thammasan encouraged anyone with useful information or a possible suspect in mind to call him directly at 081-6413007.

OrBorJor closer to buying Phyathai hospital building

PHUKET CITY: After years of failed negotiations, the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) has obtained permission to buy the abandoned Phyathai Phuket Hospital building and re-open it as a hospital with public organization status.

OrBorJor President Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutr met Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit June 27 to discuss buying the building for 327 million baht, with 273 million baht from regular OrBorJor budgets for fiscal 2006 and 2007 and the remainder from an OrBorJor cooperative account.

The building, abandoned in 2000, is under the control of the Thai Asset Management Cooperation (TAMC), a government agency set up after the 1997 financial crisis to remedy non-performing loans.

After the meeting, K. Anchalee said that Gov Niran had "no reservations" about the new plan and that she expects him to grant TAMC.

The plan will be put before the OrBor-Jor members for a vote July 3. K. Anchalee believes the project will find little opposition in the OrBorJor, which she has headed since May, 2004.

"This is a good project for the people and a public opinion survey we conducted of more than 1,000 people showed strong support for it... This project can help Vachira Phuket Hospital, which is now overloaded with patients due to all the foreign laborers who go there for treatment,"

Treatment costs at the new facilities would be lower than at private hospitals, she added.

"The first step is the purchase. After that we will discuss how to administer the hospital in a way that will increase highquality, affordable treatment options for middle income earners. The hospital can

the required approval for the purchase from eventually hold 200 beds, but we expect to start with 50 to 75 beds in the first phase," K. Anchalee said.

Administrative experts will be brought in from Banphaeo Hospital in Samut Sakhon Province, which already enjoys public organization status. Medical staff will be recruited from hospitals outside the province, she explained.

The OrBorJor has a plan to contact Mahidol University in Bangkok about bringing in specialist on weekends, she added.

The OrBorJor plans to recoup its investment in the project within six years.

However, K. Anchalee did not elaborate on whether a management company would be brought in to operate the hospital on the OrBorJor's behalf, as mentioned in earlier proposals.

However, Gov Niran urged the OrBorJor to proceed step by step, concentrating first on buying the building, which he said should be completed by August.

'Slim' survival odds for beached dolphins

PHUKET: Two gravely ill dolphins were taken to the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) after washing ashore in separate incidents, the first at Karon Beach on July 1 and the second in Phang Nga's Tai Muang District the next morning.

PMBC biologist Kongkiat Kittiwattawong told the Gazette that the first, a 40-kilogram female spinner dolphin (S. longirostris), washed ashore at Karon Beach about 7 am.

The spinner, 1.6 meters long and about five years old, was too weak to swim back out into the heavy surf and showed symptoms of a severe lung infection, but otherwise appeared

Officers at the Kata Fire Station tried unsuccessfully to push the animal back out to sea through the heavy surf at Karon Beach, then took the animal by

pickup truck to a section of Kata Beach with smaller waves, but the dolphin was too weak to swim

The second dolphin, in Phang Nga, was a 50-kilogram female striped dolphin (S. coeruleoalba). It also showed signs of respiratory infection and was covered in lesions.

They were being treated in separate tanks at the PMBC.

K. Kongkiat rated the chances of recovery for both animals as very slim.

Blood samples were taken, but it was still too early to determine if the two animals were suffering from the same type of infection, said K. Kongkiat, though he added that was unlikely given that they were of different spe-



Phuket art gallery gutted by fire

PHUKET CITY: Firefighters were called to Phang Nga Rd June 28 after flames engulfed the 111 Phuket Art Gallery building, destroying up to 50 paintings on sale at prices ranging from 10,000 to 50,000 baht each.

A local resident alerted police and fire officers at around 11:30 am, after seeing smoke rising from the building, located behind the Sinthavee Hotel. Five fire trucks arrived within 10 minutes of the call and police closed the road to help the firefighters.

A man and a woman who live nearby braved the heat to rescue a number of paintings from the gallery.

"I helped a girl who lives opposite me to remove four or five large pictures from the shop, but we couldn't move any more

than that. The heat from the second floor eventually became too much," said the man, who declined to give his name.

Around 400 onlookers watched as the fire spread from the second floor of the building to the gallery on the ground floor, causing both the roof and the first floor to collapse.

The second floor of the building, made predominantly of wood, is usually used as living quarters for artists who work for the gallery.

Nobody was present at the time of the fire, said Aree Kongpol, 43, a partner of 111 Phuket Art Gallery business, which opened about one year ago.

Firefighters contained the blaze around midday.

The cost of the damage and the cause of the fire have yet to be determined.

Mixed messages from tsunami drills

PHUKET CITY: Mock tsunami evacuations at Baan Laem Tukkae and Saphan Hin were staged on June 29 and 30, but with voice announcements that could not be understood and firetruck sirens instead of the tsunami warning towers alarms.

However, government officials have insisted that the "quiet" testing was intentional to avoid panic.

The tests, on June 29 in Baan Laem Tukkae and June 30 at Saphan Hin, were held in preparation for a July 25 test throughout the six Andaman provinces.

At Laem Tukkae, about 20 volunteers took part in the mock evacuation, including several who feigned injury to allow rescue crews from the Kusoldharm Foundation to practice helping citizens escape from tsunami strikes.

The tsunami warning towers sounded the alarm, although people taking part in the exercise could not understand the voice warnings.

Despite assurances from the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM-Phuket) Chief Aroon Kerdsom said that the sirens would be triggered from the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) in Bangkok to fully test the system, the sirens were set off from Phuket City Municipality offices.

Somkid Petchkor, head of Phuket City's Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Division, said that some 57 officers had joined the exercise.

The following day at Saphan Hin, about 15 volunteers fled from a mock tsunami as rescue volunteers again practiced retrieving victims.

However, instead of the tsunami warning towers sounding the alarm, a firetruck with a wailing siren cruised the streets.

Referring to reports that wiring had been stolen from tsunami warning towers at Saphan Hin, K. Somkid said that the missing wires had no effect on the sirens since the towers are solar- and battery-powered.

The July 25 tests will be triggered in Bangkok, K. Kerdsom asserted, and will include about 100 towers in the six Andaman coast provinces.

Thai E-passport clinic to come to Phuket

PHUKET: The Thai Consul Department will hold a ent applying with the minor must provide documobile service center at Central Festival Phuket for Thai nationals to apply for "e-passports" from July 27 to August 4.

The center will be open from 11 am to 7 pm. Valid for five years and at a cost of 1,035 baht, the passports must be applied for with an identification card, government officer card or state census card.

Minor applicants (aged under 20 years old) must be accompanied by a parent and must present an identification card or birth certificate, census registration and their parents' identification cards.

If the minor's parents have divorced, the par-

ments proving the parent's right as guardian of the minor.

Applicants will also be required to provide documentation of any changes of name.

E-passports, which were introduced in Thailand in August 2005 to replace standard passports, are combined paper and electronic identity documents that use a computer chip to store information about the passport holder.

Rotting corpse found in Thalang

THALANG: Police made a grim discovery on morning of June 25, when they found the badly decomposed body of an unidentified man lying in a ditch.

A local fisherman alerted police of a sickening odor at Tambon Srisoontorn Village 1, where the body was discovered by Pol Lt Col Kritthana Putluecha and his team around 8:30 am.

The victim, who suffered a fractured skull and multiple lacerations to the chest, had been

dead about two weeks, said Col Kritthana.

Police will interview local businesses to see if the man was employed locally.

Col Kritthana downplayed rumors that black magic may have been involved in the apparent slaying.

The Kusoldharm Foundation, which recovered the man's remains, will keep the body while relatives are sought, he added.

At 8 am June 22, fish farmers south of Saphan Hin smelled a foul odor in the air. By that evening all of their fish - worth more than 6.6 million baht - were dead.

The source of the stench and death has been traced to the Phuket landfill and incinerator, where overflowing trash heaps and heavy rain caused a release of wastewater that, through the help of drainage pipes, flowed directly into the river.

Gazette reporters Pathomporn Kaenkrachang and Sompratch Saowakhon investigate.

canals located about 500 meters behind the incinerator at Saphan Hin grows what looks like a healthy mangrove forest. Birds fly through the trees, mudskippers spar on the banks and tiny fish swim in the river.

However, there are *only* tiny fish... none larger than a toothpick, in fact, since all of the fish, both native and farmed, were killed off by a pollution spill on

Klong Koh Phee flows behind the incinerator, which can burn off up to 250 tonnes of garbage a day. Phuket, however, produces up to 520 tonnes a day, according to Chief of Phuket Provincial Office of Natural Resources and Environment Aongart Chanachanmongkol.

The remainder of the waste is piled behind the incinerator in landfills and, more recently, alongside the retention ponds that are used to treat wastewater from the incinerator.

long the banks of the lowing heavy rains and a high tide, the black, bubbling wastewater from the garbage dump flowed directly into the mangrove forests and the klong – through the drainage pipes leading there.

The toxic plume traveled more than a kilometer downstream, killing marine life as it

"I noticed a bad smell in the air while I was on my fishing boat on the morning of June 22. At that time I didn't know where the smell was coming from, but it was not like anything I had smelled before," said Supat Luenpan, leader of a collective of fish farmers along Klong Koh Phee.

"By 9 pm all my fish were dead and floating in the water."

The fishermen reported that their fish spasmed and splashed about before they died.

The fish farmers also raise green mussels and crabs. A week after the fish died, the mussels were still alive, but very weak, and the fishermen said they expected all their stock to die soon.

were affected, with 396 fish pens covering 3,564 square meters poisoned.

The precise number of fish killed is unkown since each fish farmer buried his stock by the riverbank. However, each pen contained between 100 and 400 fish, which leaves the toll anywhere between about 40,000 and 160,000 fish.

However, fishermen kept samples of their dead fish and the polluted water to give to the provincial authorities.

Scientists from the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) found that the water in Klong Koh Kui and Klong Koh Phee had low dissolved oxygen levels and high concentrations of ammonium and phosphate.

They speculated that the initial pollution did part of the damage, while the rotting fish killed by the runoff further contributed to the low quality of the water.


Among the species in the pens were brown-spotted grouper, sea bass, red snapper, surgeon fish, striped sea catfish, crabs and green mussels, along with other local species.


Praman Hormvong, leader of the Klong Koh Kui fishermen, told the Gazette, "I lost my food and my income all in one day. I have children who must go to school. What can I do now? I don't know what to do."

Phuket City Municipality and the Phuket Provincial Fisheries Department were quick to respond to the fisherman's problems. On June 25, Phuket City Municipality Mayor Somjai Suwannasuppana met the fisherman and the Fisheries Department.

It was decided that each fisherman could submit a bill for compensation and any person claiming up to 400,000 baht would be able to receive the payment almost immediately from the city.

Any larger payments would first have to be approved by the Ministry of the Interior, which K.

Somjai said should not be a problem.

The total compensation is estimated to reach 6.6 million baht.

Of the 25 farmers affected, 21 are owed 400,000 baht or less, so only four will have to await Ministry approval. K. Praman lost the most, according to records, with 1.43 million baht in stock destroyed.

K. Somjai visited the spill site. She said that it was "an accident that nobody wanted to happen" and that she wanted the city to support the fishermen as much as possible.

The poisoning also warranted a visit from Kasem Sanitwong na Ayuthaya, Minister of Natural Resources and Environment, who toured the area on June 30.

"I was told about the overflow of garbage, and I am concerned about it. Phuket has only one incinerator to deal with all of its garbage, but it appears that the low capacity of the incinerator is what caused the poisoned water to flow into Klong Koh Kui.

"I have made recommendations to Phuket City Municipality about how to reduce garbage, such as by separating the trash into different types and upgrading the incinerator to be more efficient. To do this, Phuket needs a larger budget. We will help the city by lending budget from the environment funds of the Ministry," he said.

However, as many islanders know, Phuket has requested the funds for a second incinerator for some time. Most recently, Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Ratthasima, Pollution Control Department (PCD) Deputy Director General Wichian Jungrungreung and K. Aongart met May 29 to request 2.9 billion baht for waste management in Phuket, including 1.3 billion baht to build a restock their pens. The fish will new incinerator.

In the meantime, the outflow from the retention pond nearest the klong now has a makeshift earthen berm, a barrier created after the spill to prevent more overflow from reaching the river. Overflow from the other retention ponds can still flow freely into the klong, however.

In addition to the Municipality's payout, the Fisheries Department has also announced they will help the fish farmers

not be ready to sell for about one year, but the support from the Department was greatly appreciated by the farmers.

"The Fisheries Department and the city have taken very good care of us; we are happy with the results," said K. Supat.

This isn't the first time the fishermen on Klong Koh Phee have received government assistance. The tsunami of 2004 wiped out nearly all of their houses and fishing equipment, leading the

government and other organizations to assist them in the rebuild-


Fishing boats donated by the Rotary International can be seen on the klong.


The provincial governor's budget at the time was also used to pay each family 500,000 baht and wood was donated to help the fish farmers rebuild their farms.

K. Supat said, "My family, leading back through my grandfather and my father, has been rearing fish, crabs and green mussels here for more than 20 years. We live and work here, and we're very happy with the natural environment.

"I lost a lot to the tsunami two years ago, and this feels like another tsunami just hit. This is almost worse than the tsunami because it was quiet and nobody thought it could happen."

So as the farmers await their compensation and new stocks of fish, they dangle their fishing lines in the water hoping to catch some food for dinner.

NAKHON RATCHASIMA: A 22, they found him busy with no man known locally to villagers in Kham Thalay So District as *Mor* Thewada, (which, roughly translated, means 'Angel of Mercy' doctor) is under investigation after a patient claimed that his medicine gave him a nasty case of diarrhea.

The story surfaced after a patient checked into Kham Thalay So Hospital suffering from a bad case of the runs.

After discussing it with the doctor, the most likely source of infection was traced back to a herbal treatment prescribed by one Budtha Namwongsa, 38, who was treating patients for various ailments at Nohn Tan Yai temple.

Budtha had been claiming his herbal potion could cure all diseases, the unnamed patient told doctors. Budtha did not charge for his services, but graciously accepted donations if offered, the patient added.

On hearing of the story, Kham Thalay So Hospital Director Dr Suphakij Iatragulphaibun, working with the District Public Health Office, ordered an investigation into Budtha's activities.

When Public Health officers paid a call on Budtha on June fewer than 10 patients in the temple's sala.

Most of the patients were suffering from cancer.

Budtha was ordered to put an immediate stop to his practice, Dr Suphakij said.

Samples of his "miracle" herb were taken for analysis to see if they were potentially harmful. If they were determined to be the source of the patient's bowel problems, Budtha would face charges, he said.

Budtha claimed that he had never claimed any special powers for his herbal medicine.

Its reputation as a cure-all followed its use in treating the temple abbot, who was treated for injures suffered in a road accident about three months previous, he said.

He did not have a set fee for the treatment.

"I got the herb mixture from my mum, I don't know exactly what herbs are in it," Budtha admitted.

'Patients take one teaspoon of it a day and say that it makes them feel better – or completely cures them. That's why it has become so well known," he added. Source: Kom Chad Luek

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International school opens

new international school has opened its doors on Samui and is preparing to relocate to a new location in September 2007. Bluewater International School hopes to take education to a higher level on an island that has been cursed with multiple closings and empty promises during years of rapid development.

A spokesperson from Bluewater said that new premises have been bought and that the school will be adhering to the National Curriculum for England & Wales while employing only experienced, fully qualified teachers.

School Director Jeremy Lees is keen to promote the learning institution and its teachers as an essential addition to the island for existing family residents as well the future of Samui.

"The island has been troubled by educational issues for many years, and this has been a potential deterrent to any investors or interested parties with children who may be looking to Samui as a possible home," said one island resident.

The island has had other international educational institutions, such as the UK-affiliated Dulwich International College, which began construction on Samui in 2005, and piloted a pre-nursery program.

The project ended without completion due to internal problems and the Dulwich College name was finally revoked.

With plans to accommodate students up to the age of 18, Bluewater school has the community hopeful that quality education will no longer be an issue.

The school will have a full extracurricular schedule, a range of sporting facilities, state-of-the-art design technology labs and a well-stocked library. Classes will be offered in English to students of all nationalities.

Applications are now being accepted for the September term.


Popular real estate broker Justin Freedon said, "It's not as bad as we expected it to be. People are buying and that is because well-priced properties sell and are selling.


The ship, which originated from Singapore with 1,106 passengers, was on a tour of Southeast Asia when people on board began falling ill.

Police found the body of Haron Mukhura, 40, at Banghem restaurant lying next to a table where he had been sitting with

afternoon of June 29.

One other man sitting at the table, Romahn Phaosuphap, 55, was injured after being hit by a bullet in his right arm.

Police established that K. Haron had stopped at the restaurant in Tambon Khao Khram on the way back from a trip to Surat Thani. He was joined at the table by four friends, including the owner of the restaurant.

As the group was waiting for its food, two youths pulled up on a motorcycle and went to look at the curries on offer in the window, about three meters away from where K. Haron was sitting. One of the youths pulled out a pistol and shot K. Haron five times before the pair sped off on their motorcycle.

Col Somphop Kantasri, superintendent of Krabi Muang District Police, said he could not yet say what the motive of the killing was.

Police are now examining bullets removed from K. Haron's head to see if they can provide any clues as to who his killers were, Col Somphop added.

Lucky escape: A Korean tourist told police in Satun that on the night of June 28 a man armed with a knife had broken into her bungalow on Li Peh island and attempted to rape her before making his escape.

Police took a statement from Aum "Kate" Yian and sent her for tests at Satun Hospital.

The prime suspect in the case is a man who was recently released from prison for the rape and murder of a Krung Thai bank employee in 1986.

Councilman gunned down in Krabi

On being shown police file photos of the man, Aum Yian said she could not be sure he was her attacker as the photos were three years old and showed a clean-shaven man with short hair, while the man who attacked her had long hair and a beard.

Police said they would find further evidence before requesting an arrest warrant.

Deadly duel: A Nakhon Sri Thammarat policeman was shot dead while off-duty in a gun battle with unknown assailants on Nakhon Sri Thammarat-Pak Phanang Road on the morning of June 29.

Police led by Lt Col Kittichai Krainara, an investigating inspector from Bang Jahk Tambon Police Station, found the body of Sen Sgt Maj Surin Nutaphong in the driver's seat of his Mitsubishi G-Wagon.

A .357-caliber pistol was found next to the body with six 5.56-millimeter cartridge cases of the kind fired by M16 assault rifles. A short shotgun was also hidden in the car.

A passenger in the car at the time of the attack, Pathom Chaidech, 45, was also injured. He was taken to Maharaj Na-

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khon Sri Thammarat Hospital by the Kamnan (sub-district chief) of Tambon Bang Jahk.

Police established from witnesses that as Sen Sgt Maj Surin was driving to Nakhon Sri Thammarat City, a white or metallic silver pickup truck pulled alongside his car and a man in the back of the truck opened fire with an assault rifle, believed to be an M16.

Sen Sgt Maj Surin returned fire with his own assault rifle but was shot and killed.

Col Kittichai said that from examining the pattern of bullet holes in Sen Sgt Maj Surin's car, police believe the gunman was a professional shooter. He added that as yet police have no solid leads as none of the four witnesses can remember the pickup's license plate number.

Col Kittichai said that the attack was likely connected to one of Sen Sgt Maj Surin's cases.

Sen Sgt Maj Surin had recently returned to the police force after being acquitted of murdering a member of Bang Sala OrBorTor and his wife in June

Golden grab: Two armed men robbed a gold store in Haad Yai on June 28, making off with 100,000 baht in cash and about 50-bahtweight of gold jewelry valued at 600,000 baht.

Chachor Kuchakon, the owner of Tang Seng Heng gold shop in Haad Yai's Tambon Phatong, told police that she was alone in the shop when two men, one wearing a helmet and the other a cap, pulled up outside on a motorbike.


The men then walked into the shop and one of them pointed a shotgun at K. Chahor's chest.

The other man swiped gold from the shop's displays and then went behind the counter to get cash from the till while also acquiring the store owner's pistol.

The robbery lasted less than 10 minutes, she added.

Police deduced from closed-circuit television footage that the robbers drove a black Honda Nova Dash motorcycle, registration 5025 Songkhla.

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Education spending 'being wasted'

he government's annual education budget of 300 billion baht and parents' total spending on tuition fees of about 900 billion baht each year are being wasted because they yield low-quality graduates, a top educator told a seminar on June 30.

Somkiat Pongpaiboon, chairman of the 40 Rajabhat Universities' Lecturers and Officials Council, cited results of Graduate Assessment Tests at the Prathom 6 and Mathayom 3 and 6 levels in which average scores were below 50% in all subjects tested.

At the university level, many schools were too focused on commercial gains and neglected to provide quality teaching. Likening such schools to "hungry tigers", K. Somkiat called for non-profit private organizations to be given state funding to compete with the state schools.

Dr Usanee Anuruthwong, president of Srinakharinwirot University's Center for the Gifted and Talented, said that understanding of brain development and learning process in children was not incorporated into the Thai education system, resulting in 99% of children being unhappy

She called for more understanding of this aspect in drawing up a curriculum and an evaluation system based on children's potential and abilities, rather than on administrative considerations, as at present.

Manhunt for French gunman: A Thai woman and her Italian

former husband were arrested on June 29 for planning the murder of a retired German policeman in Chon Buri's Bang Lamung Dis-

The woman, Rungnapa Sridet, 32, was also previously married to the victim, 63-year-old Heinrich Hermann Friedrich, who was gunned down in front of his house on June 25.

Rungnapa reportedly confessed to police shortly after the murder that she and her ex-husband Fernando Nardini, 49, allegedly had planned the murder for a French gunman and two Thai men to carry out.



UP IN SMOKE: Nearly three tonnes of narcotics worth more than 3.6 billion baht were burned by Thai authorities on June 26 to mark the UN's International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. Foreign diplomats were invited to witness the ceremony, Thailand's 35th, held at Ayudhya's Bang Pa-in industrial estate. The drugs included 833 kilograms of ya bah (methamphetamine), 59 kilograms of heroin, 20 kilograms of opium and 1.8 tonnes of marijuana.

The motive was reportedly Rungnapa's bid to take possession of a five-million-baht house that Friedrich had bought in her name. She had filed a lawsuit to take possession of the house following their separation two years

Police are hunting for a Frenchman alleged to have acted as the gunman.

Nardini reportedly told police that he had planned the murder and offered a Frenchman identified only as Marc, a 53year-old fugitive criminal, one million baht to carry it out.

Peewee ID: The Cabinet has asked the Interior Ministry to review its revised Identification Cards Act, which would require all Thai nationals over one year old to have an ID card.

The ministry was advised that any requirement for young children to obtain an ID card could conflict with other laws that require ID card-holders to carry the cards themselves. Young children would have to leave their cards with their parents, Cabinet mem-

The revised Act stipulated

that Thais aged one-year and up should have ID cards, which would be valid until they were 10 years of age. It also proposed penalties for those revealing ID card information without the card holder's consent, of up to five years in jail and/or a 100,000-baht fine, except if it was needed by a court or deemed necessary by state agencies.

The Council of State, which scrutinized the legislation, agreed that the Act in its current form would be difficult to implement.

Save your breath: Motorists who refuse an alcohol breath test at road checks will be detained for "extensive questioning" and legally regarded as drunk once an amendment approved by Cabinet on June 26 takes effect.

Violators would have their licenses suspended for five years after court convictions, deputy government spokesperson Netpreeya Chumchaiyo said.

Under current regulations, motorists have to pay a fine of up to 1,000 baht fine if they refuse to undergo a breath test, a penalty considered light compared with those given for drunk-driving convictions if alcohol levels in their blood are over the legal limit.

The amendment has been proposed by the Justice Ministry to increase road safety, reduce human casualties and heavy medical costs caused by road accidents each year.

Protest warning over ironworks: Residents of Tambon Deelang in Lop Buri's Phattana Nikhom District have threatened to protest if a polluting ironworks factory is allowed to resume production.

The Namheng ironworks is seeking to restart work after a forced 60-day shutdown for maintenance of emission filters.

The Industrial Works Department ordered the factory closed on June 14, following complaints from residents.

Sanom Potirat, a non-smoker, was diagnosed with emphysema. He blames iron dust emissions from the plant.

Although the factory covered his medical expenses, he said he would still join the other villagers in pushing the factory to prevent more emissions.

According to the Industrial Works Department's Lop Buri office, Namheng on June 29 gave notice of its intent to resume work.

However, Samphan Kositpol, that office's factory-division head, said the factory would not be allowed to resume work until proper dust-control measures were in place.

Flim-flam fuel: Consumers have been cautioned about filling up their tanks from vending machines after some customers were found to have received 10% less fuel than they paid for.

Songklod Ubolsing Deputy Director-General of the Commerce Ministry's Internal Trade Department, said the department's inspection team found many fuel-vending machines in Bangkok and nearby provinces to be substandard.

The random survey found that many of the machines dispensed less fuel than the customer had paid for.

About 5,000 vending machines have been installed at petrol stations nationwide.

The Internal Trade Department is drafting legislation to regulate the operation of fuelvending machines.

The act will be ready next month.

Heavenly aspirations

ork on the colossal Mingmongkol Buddha image, on a 400-meter hilltop in the Nakkerd range in Karon, is due to be completed by the end

Already clearly visible across much of the southern end of the island, and even from the western shores of Koh Lone, the image will, upon completion, be the world's largest marble-covered Buddha image in the Pang Manvichai (meditating) posture, claim its creators.

Officially entitled "Phra Puttamingmongkol Akenakkiri", the image is being built with the cooperation of the Forestry Department, on whose land it sits, together with Wat Kitisangkaraam (Wat Kata) and the Mingmongkol Faith 45 Foundation, which has been soliciting contributions for its construction for years under the slogan, "Enhance your merit value in your mind".

People who have not visited the hilltop may not know that there are two images at the site. The first, also in the Pang Manvichai posture, was completed in early 2005 at a cost of 8.8 million baht. It is a 22-tonne bronze image of the Buddha covered in gold leaf, 5.5 meters wide at its base and reaching a height of 12.5m. HRH Princess Ubol Ratana Rajakanya attended a prayer and dedication ceremony for the image on February 11, 2005.

Despite its grandeur, that image will be dwarfed by the better-known, massive second Mingmongkol Buddha image, work on which is now focused on the head that reaches a height of 45m. Made of reinforced concrete and to be covered with white marble,

the image is 24.5m at its base, which is decorated with enormous concrete lotus leaves.

Suporn Vanitkul, who heads the project committee, said the project is intended to conserve Buddhist art traditions and remind all those who see it to remember the teachings of the Buddha, helping them to be good people. Of paramount importance, he said, is that the image was built as a celebration of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej's 80th birthday, which will be December 5 this year.

K. Suporn said that all works of Buddhist art follow historical trends based on legends. The Pang Manvichai posture was chosen for the image because it was in this pose that the Buddha subdued Mara, the Buddhist equivalent of Satan, the embodiment of Evil.

The Mingmongkol Buddha image will be covered with white marble because white represents purity, while the base is of lotus leaves which represent loving

"Through this Buddha image we want to convey the idea of purity and love to everyone in the world. The entire image is based on the *sattha* (faith) of the many people who contributed to the construction fund, including rich and poor, Thais and foreigners," K. Suporn said.

About 60 million baht in donations have been collected, but even this amount is not enough to complete the project, he said. "We are fortunate to have

received many donations of construction materials, including cement, iron and even 135 tonnes of white marble from Burma," he said.

Knowing that the Buddha image was built in honor of HM The King has made people happy to donate, he said.

"Buddhists believe that building Buddha images is a high form of attaining merit. The minds of those involved in its construction glow with happiness when they reflect upon this. As Buddhists believe in rebirth, we know that this will continue to benefit us not only in this carnation but in future lives," he add-

Finding someone capable of overseeing such an enormous construction is not easy, but in this sense the Faith 45 Foundation is fortunate to have the services of 60-year-old Prasit Lubliam of Nakhon Pathom, who has a lifetime of experience in Buddha image construction.

"K. Prasit is very good at scaling up from the models to the actual size. Although he is a highly experienced Buddha image builder, he still meditates daily in order to keep his mind free of distractions and focused on the construction," he added.

The image, which looks over Phuket City, will be surrounded by a "Buddha-Utthayan" garden covering 42 rai.

"It will be a serene place, appropriate for meditation. We have already planned many kinds of hardwood trees there and there will be public restroom facilities," K. Suporn said.

Devotees, tourists and other visitors will be able to enter what K. Suporn describes as a "museum" constructed inside the image itself, with a floor space of 436 square meters. This room will feature exhibits of the history behind the project with displays of the image under construction and some of the tools used in its construction.

"We will have some areas set aside for meditation in there, too," he added.

'I would like both Thai and foreign tourists to visit and experience our culture. From the park they will be able to pay respect to the Buddha image and enjoy impressive views of Phuket City.

"We hope that after visiting they will know that Thai people seek peace in the world. The image is a symbol of the peace and loving kindness which the Buddha used to overcome every form of vice and attain enlightenment," he concluded.


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
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don't know how you feel, but I am tired of heading into a Thai restaurant with the thought of taking in a nice and spicy pad prik gaeng, a slightly creamy tom kha or a light and almost fluffy pad Thai, only to exit having faced bland, watery and greasy food.

So I was over the moon when a good friend mentioned Tawai Thai restaurant. It's in Cherng Talay, in the group of restaurants and shops that line the entrance to the Laguna complex. My friend had tried Tawai for lunch a few times and had good things to say about it, so I thought I'd join her one day and see for myself.

The restaurant itself is simple and plain, and dotted with various Thai artifacts from a wide range of times. Actually, it seemed like someone had spent the weekend at Chatuchak market and had randomly bought anything they set their eyes on, but it only added to the originality of the place. I was later to learn from K. Noi, the owner of Tawai, that it was a mixture of her family's belongings and items her husband I told her this almost as if she had picked up over

the years. We sat at the table farthest from the serving area as they presented us with comfy double chairs, perfect for lounging and relaxing. A refreshing

cool breeze was also on offer here as the shuttered windows were open on both sides of us, allowing natural air conditioning to keep us cool. By this time, the sound of the gentle wind rustling through the trees were all we could hear.

It all contributed to a feeling of stepping out of the hustle of Phuket, and even more so, a step back in time. It somehow reminded me of a trip to Laos many years ago when I got a hint of how Thailand once was, with

life. I could feel myself relaxing and molding to the shape of the chair. But what of the food? Could it do the same and take me back to a time lost?

We started with cool iced tea, as it seemed to fit the occasion, and it was at this point that K. Noi arrived and introduced herself. Her timing was perfect as we were just about to order and needed to cut down our choices as there was too much I wanted to taste.

K. Noi is from the central Thailand and this explained some of the options on the menu as there were more than a few things I hadn't seen since my days in Bangkok, hence the difficult choice. One of those is a real favorite of mine, which I rarely have the chance to sample nowadays. It's yam tua pu (160 baht) or winged bean salad, and this was like no other I had tried before. K. Noi grinned with delight when

> knew this would be my reaction.

The reason, she explained, was that it was a special family recipe and that all the food in the restaurant was prepared by family members. By now,

my grin matched hers as I almost burst in anticipation of what was to come.

She took time to explain how much attention she paid to the food and how important the preparation of each dish was central to her philosophy of food. All chili pastes were prepared by family members, and ingredients were sourced from all over Thailand, although fish and vegetables were supplied locally.

The yam tua pu was one of our main dishes, but in true

ration between courses. I've always likened eating Thai food to be like sampling from an artist's palette and the combination of tastes is definitely the best way to eat it.

We had started with prawn cakes (tod man kung at 180 baht) and another preference of mine, gai hor bai toey (140 baht) or chicken wrapped in pandanus leaf. Both were excellent, with large chunks of prawn visible in the cakes, which were crispy to

bite, but soft as velvet to eat, and the juicy chicken gently flavored by the pandanus leaf.

A nice touch was the presentation of the rice. It was served in an interesting little rice pot the likes of which I had never seen before, and it served to keep the rice nice, warm and fresh throughout the meal.

As the pastes were made on the premises, we opted for a local curry with shrimppanaeng kung. Although not a Email: toto@phuket.ksc.co.th

dish from K. Noi's home region, the homemade touch gave it a familiar flavor, along with something a little special. The sauce was thick and creamy and had a touch of spice that grew the more you ate. Isn't it amazing how addictive a bit of chili can be?

K. Noi also insisted we have some fish and she suggested pla pad cha (190 baht) as it used Thai herbs that apparently assisted the digestive process. This was probably a good idea in light of all the food we were consum-

The pleasing thing was that the staff at Tawai seemed as knowledgeable about the food as K. Noi, and she told us that she looked after her staff well, as they were good and she didn't want to lose them.

Unfortunately we didn't have a chance to sample some Thai desserts, again homemade, but K. Noi insisted I return as they were worth the effort.

Return? I said, I don't think I'm leaving. Return I will, though, as even without the ambiance, the food filled a void my stomach had been seeking to fill.

LIVING IN QUIET

Phra Nicholas Thanissaro, 41, is not your typical monk. Born in London and a graduate of the University of Manchester, the highly articulate Englishman has devoted his life to teaching others the benefits of meditation. Fluent in Thai, he spent nine years in training before being ordained at Wat Phra Dhammakaya in Pathum Thani.

Although he currently spends about 70% of is time at the Dhammakaya Center for Buddhist meditation in Surrey, England, he was recently in Phuket to give meditation and ethics training to students at British International School.

While here, he also held a meditation session in English at the Wang Gung Phuket Kalyanamitta Center, behind Suan Luang Park. Among the handful of interested foreigners who attended was *Gazette* News Editor **Stephen Fein**.

Stephen Fein: What are your views on the Jatukham Ramathep amulets craze that is going on nowadays?

Phra Nicholas: Well, it's an amulet which seems to be popular with a lot of people. But what is ironic is that it is not an amulet of a Buddha, but of some Hindu deity or god of some sort—I don't know which one—but it seems to have caught on with a lot of Buddhists who seem to prize them.

SF: But they are being made and distributed by Buddhist monks...

Phra Nicholas: Yes, that confuses me. Normally Buddhist monks wouldn't be involved in making things that obviously have nothing to do with Buddhism.

SF: Before I moved to Thailand I took a university course in Buddhism and I found it fascinating. When I moved to Thailand I thought I was coming to a place where people would be meditating a lot, but when I arrived all

the ritual involved reminded me more of the Catholicism I grew up with.

Phra Nicholas: Hopefully without sounding partisan, there seems to have been a downturn in peoples' true understanding of what it actually means to be Buddhist.

Many people have become so removed from what Buddhist practice actually means that there is nothing much left but a superstitious clinging to certain aspects of it. I think that this Jatukham Ramathep craze is just one symptom of that, but there are many other aspects too.

The weakness of Buddhism comes when people think they are Buddhist automatically, without practicing anymore. The main practices of Buddhism are generosity, keeping the five precepts and meditation. You become a proper Buddhist by practicing. But if you are a Buddhist in name only and your whole religious awareness is just superstitions, then you are really only a minimal Buddhist.



But if you look in the right places, you can find a lot of Buddhist scholars in Thailand – a lot more than in many other countries. But often the face of Buddhism you tend to come across in Thailand – your default face of Buddhism in Thailand – is not a scholarly one. It's one of superstitions, for the most part.

You can see beyond that if you know what you are looking for, but many people don't know what they are looking for anymore.

SF: Is the Dhammakaya Foundation part of the mainstream Buddhist Church in Thailand?

Phra Nicholas: It's a movement within mainstream Buddhism to encourage people to get back to

basics – especially meditation and teaching young people the actual teachings of Buddhism. Within Theravada Buddhism in Thailand there are two schools, Mahanikaya and Dhammayuthika, and we are in the Mahanikaya school.

SF: How long did it take you to become ordained?

Phra Nicholas: I lived in the main Dhammakaya temple in Pathum Thani for nine years before I was allowed to become a monk. The policy of the temple is that they like to make sure that the people who they ordain are sure that this is the life for them, rather than making a mess of being a monk. So there is a "probation period", which in my case took nine years. I have been a monk now for 10 years.

SF: How many hours a day do you meditate?

Phra Nicholas: Normally two

hours per day, one hour in the morning and one in the evening.

SF: Usually when I interview people I ask whether the person has any hobbies. Do you have any hobbies, or things you do that aren't really connected with being a monk?

Phra Nicholas: Excuse me? (feigns slight surprise at the question) No, no that's my life, I'm afraid. But I do a lot of traveling, I've been to about 40 countries by now, various things connected with Buddhism...most recently India and Indonesia. There seems to be a demand for meditation teaching in English.


SF: Is it uncommon to be a farang monk in Thailand? Have you ever had any bad experiences or conflicts?

Phra Nicholas: As a Western monk, you are an oddity wherever you go. If you go to the West,

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

you are an oddity because you are a monk. If you come to the East, you are an oddity, not because you are a monk, but because you are a Western monk. But, in general, I find that it attracts people to ask more about Buddhism, so I think it's a positive thing. I have never felt disadvantaged by being a Western

SF: As someone in the media, I wonder what you think about media coverage of scandals involving monks? What do you think the media's role should be?

Phra Nicholas: Well, such stories may have some truth in them because there are a lot of monks and in any population, if you have enough people, you are always going to find some bad charac-

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ters in there.

People tend to overreact when monks get bad press and I think the media needs to have a responsible outlook on the way they report – or maybe decide not to report – incidents concerning behavior of monks. Even if a small minority behaves badly, it tends to undermine the whole livelihood of 99.999% of monks who practice well, help the community and are altruistic... It's a doubleedged sword because while the press should be helping to stamp out bad behavior, it makes life difficult for the rest who are behav-

One likes to report reality, but there is another side that maybe you should know about. I think the gutter press in Thailand may be framing monks to get stories. It is very easy to get a picture of a monk which he maybe didn't intend and then run another headline under it.

Around 1996 and 1997 there seemed to be stories every day of this nature, as if there was a gang of people going around drugging monks, getting a scantily-clad woman to sit on the bed with them, taking a picture and saying "This is reality".

SF: What did you do before you came to Thailand and began studying Buddhism?

Phra Nicholas: I was 23 and I graduated as a teacher, but I never worked as a teacher. I came out here. If I hadn't succeeded I would probably be an English teacher somewhere by now.

I came here as a result of having met a Thai monk studying in England. At that time I was secretary of the Buddhist society of my university and he suggested I spend some time in a temple in Thailand.

SF: You go by your monk name now. What was your given name, and does it matter anymore?

Phra Nicholas: I changed it to my monk's name in my passport.

SF: When you were growing up was your family religious?

Phra Nicholas: I was baptized as an Anglican, I think. I have a certificate somewhere [smiles]. My parents were not really enthusiastic churchgoers, but my grandparents were. Even they are happy that I am a monk now.

SF: How were they about it at first?

Phra Nicholas: They were disappointed that I didn't become a Christian monk. Later they found out that Buddhist monks are okay after all – and that in fact they are very peace-loving, and so on.

My 85-year-old grandmother says it's good and she boasts about it to all her neighbors... My parents came out at one stage to make sure that I hadn't been brainwashed, and they went back satisfied.


They couldn't get their heads around the idea that I had become so interested in Buddhism all of a sudden. But for me it wasn't that sudden, as I had been studying it for 10 years.

Phra Nicholas' last meditation session in Phuket will be at Wang Gung Phuket Kalyanamitta Center, behind Suan Luang Park, on July 22 starting at 1:30 pm. However, the sessions will continue, on the third Sunday of each month, with instruction by English-speaking Thai monks.

To get to the center from the Central Festival intersection, head south on the bypass road and take the first left at the sign to Wat Naka. Go past the temple about one kilometer and make a U-turn when you see the park on your right.

Take the next left into a housing estate and enter the third soi on the left. The meditation session will be held in the building just past the mansion.

olvo's latest S40 inher its a distinct family ap pearance from the topof-the-range S80. "The new, lower and more horizontal appearance radiates power," said Steve Harper, the man responsible for the design of the new S40.

"This impression is reinforced when the car is viewed from the side. At the rear, it is the shape of the new tail lamps and a new bumper that further boost its dynamic appearance."

When the outgoing S40 and its sibling the V40 were introduced in 2003, Volvo had its sights firmly set on a younger generation of motorists who had sporting aspirations but who needed the space and refinement of a sedan.

Space is something the 2008 S40 has in abundance, thanks to zealous scrutiny of the interior design. "The criticism of the current model's limited storage space served as high-octane fuel when the time came to sketch the new interior of the S40," said Harper. "We weren't entirely satisfied until we felt we had exploited every single available cubic centimeter in an efficient way.'

The team concentrated its efforts on two areas: the doors and the center stack. The center console is available in new dé cor versions, such as the Nordic light oak, real wood inlay, while the storage space between the seats has been refined and even the handbrake has been redesigned to free up more space. "We've even utilized the small spaces that are usually covered over when they are not housing controls for options or accessories. Now instead, the space has been converted into a handy compartment, for instance for a mobile phone," explained Harper. "After all, you should not be using your phone while driving, anyway," he added.

Power outputs vary between 100bhp (74kW) and 179 bhp for the normally-aspirated gas engines, and up to 180bhp for the diesels.

It would be futile to list performance aspects of the various models here. Suffice to say that acceleration is brisk and top speeds are more than adequate.

Northern fans of the crazehave been in disarray since authorities in Chiang Mai banned pendant dolls.


"I think it would be better if officers banned modified cars with their loud stereos on the road rather than pendant dolls.

alking around Patong Beach during the day you should not forget your sunglasses. Sure, the bright sun and brighter smiles of the massage parlor girls are enough to warrant some UV protection, but the alarming number of bald men around, with their glinting, shiny pates, mandates that eye protection be worn at all times.

Some of these chrome domes even profess to have chosen this hairstyle without any helpful hints from Mother Nature, and they have grabbed the bull by the horns, the razor by the handle and sheared their fur right off. Others are still struggling to come to terms with the hand dealt to them by the hair gods.

Have you ever wondered what goes on inside the mind underneath that pate, or pondered how to take care of an exposed crown? What's the secret to a shiny scalp? We found some hairless wonders on the beachfront willing to confess all.

Sup, 36, is a watch seller at Patong Beach. Although he isn't completely bald, he has the remainder of his hair cropped as short as possible. His brown dome looks like melted chocolate and reflects the sun so much that it could be used as a beacon to send messages from the beach.

Daniel Imms, 28, from Australia, is a man who faced baldness from an early age. At 21 he started noticing his hair wasn't quite as thick as it should be, and so he chose a cleaner look. "It makes it hard to have a hairstyle, but to be honest, I'd rather look like this than Krusty the Clown. It's pretty low maintenance."

So there you have it. None of our specimens used special treatments on their receding hairlines, and each man said that a hair transplant was an unnecessary luxury. Whether or not the rest of Phuket agree with them remains to be seen, but for these fine gents bald is better.

So what tact should you take when creeping bald spots begin to appear? There are several roads toward baldness, some more effective than others:

The comb-over: There comes a time when most would face up to their inevitable baldness, but the

comb-overs still cling on to those few final strands of hope by covering a bald spot with extra long hair from another area.

The struggling baldy: Spare a thought for those who are caught somewhere between having a full head of hair and being bald. These fine specimens are not yet ready to reject their locks, but they aren't afraid to show off their increasing baldness either.

The people's baldy: Here are men who have done the sensible thing and embraced their balding by removing all signs of hair growth. Hair loss can be a traumatic experience, but the blow can be lessened by using it to your advantage. Just think how many pretty girls will ask, "Can I touch your head?"

transplants," he said. "I'm seeing increasing demand for it in Phuket. While the process itself is not too laborious, it needs a highly skilled team to perform it because it's quite a complicated procedure.

"The cost in Thailand is much lower than in the US, and I would say that within 12 months we will be able to perform it here in Phuket.'

A hair transplant is a painless procedure that can be com-

pleted in a handful of sessions, depending on how much hair a patient is missing. A patch of hair is required for the initial graft which means that if you're completely bald you're out of luck. Those interested in a hair transplant will need to undergo anything from 500 to more than 4,000 grafts over several sessions. The cost of treatments should be between 80 and 150 baht per graft, according to Dr Piyapas, compared with between US\$ 3 and who has no hair."

US\$ 7 (96 and 224 baht) in the

Boots pharmacy in Patong has a number of hair care products aimed at both men and women suffering from baldness. First up in the hair loss solutions range is a Vitamin Boost Masque at 199 baht. It comes in a small jar and looks like hair gel.

In the same range are Nourishing Scalp Serum and Nourishing Root Tonic (both 199 baht). If you fancy a bit of a splurge then maybe a set of 30 vitamin tablets that promises to "increase hair growth" is for you.

The effectiveness of any of these products could not be immediately verified by the pharmacist, but readers should be aware that there is no miracle cure for hair loss.

Is bald sexy? This is the question at the back of every baldy's mind. Will women still find me attractive if all my hair falls out? The good news is that some will, but as with most things in life, not all females are tempted by a bald cranium. We took to the streets of Patong to find out what girls think of guys with less on top.



Chillin' with Zero Cool

ow or why Z ero Cool got his nickname is lost in the annals of history, but a somewhat fluid mystique is part and parcel of Malé, so who better to show you round the capital of a country that's 99.9% water?

So laid-back, it was a wonder he could stand upright. Zero Cool meandered over shortly after I had disembarked at Jetty One, mildly culture shocked at being teleported from the blissful sun, sand and solitude of the Anantara Resort to the biggest metropolis within 500

miles.

Instead of the scary, extrovert persona bubbling with facts and figures adopted by tour guides the world over, Z ero Cool managed to convey, without saying it in quite so many words, that he happened

to be wandering about and if I wanted to tag along too then he had no real objection.

Endlessly informative when asked a question, for the rest of the time he retired behind his reflector shades, comfortingly ignoring the buzzing of his mobile phone, a Maldivian boulevardier to the manner born.

Malé is less than two kilometers square, two

meters above sea level, home to 80,000 souls and refreshingly devoid of must-sees. Rather, the island must be viewed as a whole, floating like Lemuel Gulliver's Leputa in the Maldivian archipelago.

As we strolled its byways and *goalhi* (short, parrow lanes) pobody gawked, pobody hassled.

narrow lanes) nobody gawked, nobody hassled, nobody catcalled and city life simply unfurled much as it must have done when Marco Polo or Ibn Battutah passed by, give or take a few score motor scooters.

Zero Cool did manage to rouse himselfenough to indicate the strict injunction against taking photographs of the National Security Services Headquarters, which we passed hurriedly on the way to the Grand Friday Mosque. We entered shoeless to gaze at its marbled halls.

Across the street, the Sultan's Park is one of the few green spaces in Malé, shrouded by centuries-old rain trees and containing the National Museum. Normally such institutions bristle with high-tech interpretation, audio-visual whatnots and diversionary souvenir shops, but here the expo was contained in three musty stories, the last remnant of the

long-deposed sultan's palace.

Just as interesting as the one-time ruler's cooking utensils and the collection of pre-Islamic carvings dug up by Thor Heyerdahl were the curators, who fairly skittered with glee at the prospect of having their photo taken, and chat-

tered merrily if not entirely accurately about the artifacts on display.

A piece of living history stood just a few hundred meters away in the form of the fish market. The boats, glorious Technicolor affairs with sweeping prows, docked across the road, and sailfish and tuna were humped by the hundreds onto the market floor. No ice, no refrigeration, simply a huddle of buyers who scooped up the catch and bore it off to be eaten that day.

Zero Cool receded into the background after lunch, so I was left to wander Malé without his wraith-like presence, marveling at its other-world-liness and the picaresque names people chose for their houses: Starling, Banana Cabin and Aston Villa.

Overcrowding is the greatest problem here and the government is busily constructing a new city on the nearby atoll called Hulhumalé . I'm sure it's going to be a miracle of modern town planning; but will it embrace the charm that Malé has in spades? Damn progress!

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Believe it or not

It strikes the Gazette as sadly ironic that less than two weeks after the deadly poisoning of fish farms off Saphan Hin that US-based conglomerate Ripley Entertainment announced its ambitious plan to build Southeast Asia's largest aquarium somewhere on the island though they aren't saying exactly where.

If the 2.1-billion-baht "megaquarium" becomes a reality within three years, as Ripley's hopes it will [see News pages], it will likely become one of Phuket's top tourism draws – a must-see attraction ranking alongside the Laem Phromthep, Phuket FantaSea and the Mingmongkol Buddha image now under construction in Karon and expected to open by the end of 2008 [see p10, Around the Island].

Unfortunately, Phuket needs ever more attractions just to keep up with the ongoing expansion in its number of hotel rooms, the official number of which is already around 35,000 – not including all the villas, condos, time-share developments and small, unregistered accommodation establishments that push the actual number of accommodation establishments much higher.

While the aquarium at the Phuket Marine Biological Center is interesting, informative and well-maintained, it is too small to keep a family entertained for more than an hour or two. Other family-oriented attractions that have been long discussed but never built include a world-class water park or other types of amusement parks.

Increasing the number of such attractions is a key development issue for Phuket, which has developed too much of a reputation for more "adult-oriented" activities from golf to bar hopping.

Fortunately, the opening of large, new retail centers such as Central Festival and Jungceylon have improved Phuket's appeal, though the number of baby strollers being pushed up and down Soi Bangla by night continues to speak for itself.

At the same time, Phuket's greatest natural tourism asset, its beaches, continue to suffer through a combination of poor regulation, environmental degradation and outright greed. At Patong, the days when kids could safely swim in the sea, build sandcastles on the sands at dusk or swim safely have been long since passed, having been ended by the activities of jet-ski and parasail operators.

Then again, fewer people are choosing to swim in Patong Bay due to the failure of the municipality to treat its wastewater, resulting in much of it being discharged into the south end of the bay, once home to impressive coral beds and the marine life they sustained.

In this regard, Ripley's might be the perfect match for Phuket. As the fish farm fiasco indicates, the current rate of decline of our island's coastal resources might make Ripley's aquarium the last healthy environment left for fish left in Phuket. - The Editor

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

Boosting the police presence in Phuket

have already sent a request to the Royal Thai Police headquarters asking for Tah Chat Chai Police Station to be upgraded to have a superintendent as its chief commanding officer.

This is important because until that police station has a superintendent, officers at that police station do not have the authority to carry out an investigation.

All investigations from Tah Chat Chai police station are currently assigned to officers in Thalang Police Station, who work with the Tah Chat Chai officers in carrying out investigations.

I believe the time has come for Tah Chat Chai to be upgraded because the population in the Mai Khao area is increasing and officers stationed there will need to have investigative powers in case something happens at Phuket International Airport.

This would be much better than wasting time waiting for officers at Thalang Police Station to be brought up to speed on cases that Tah Chat Chai officers would

set up in Wichit and that it be under the administration of Phuket City Police Station. This new police station will at first have a chief, but later will have a superintendent of its own and officers stationed there, just as at Tah Chat Chai, they will have the authority to conduct investigations.

Similarly, I have requested that Karon Police Station no longer be operated as part of Chalong Police Station. It too should have its own chief and later its own superintendent.

Chalong Police Station has a huge area to respond to, including Chalong, Rawai, Kata and Karon tambons. It would be much better to let officers at Karon Police Station be responsible for the Kata-Karon area.

However, we will not know the exact area that each of the police stations will be responsible for until we receive confirmation from headquarters that the changes have been approved.

Police in Phuket have very heavy work loads. For example, elsewhere in the country each police officer responds to an average of 70 cases per year, but in Phuket each officer on average responds to more than 200 cases per year.

This is one of the main reasons why we have so many unsolved cases. Because of their workload, officers often find it difficult to make progress in an investigation within the threemonth deadline laid down by Royal Thai Police regulations.

If no progress has been made in an investigation after three months, the officer has no choice and must mark the case unsolved and move on to the next case. Of course, if new evidence is found, the officer can re-open the case, but by then he has even more cases to work on.

Just the sheer amount of work slows down progress in each investigation.

We are trying to improve the police service in Phuket and this is another step forward.

We are making progress. We were recently approved to have four Provincial Police Deputy Commanders. In the past, we were allowed to have only two.

Have the Immigration rules changed?

Have there been important changes to the supporting documents required to extend a permit to stay on a non-immigrant B visa?

I have heard that with effect from May 4 Thai Immigration requires:

- A photocopy of the employing company's Affidavit and Shareholders' List certified as a true copy of the original by the Ministry of Commerce.

- A photocopy of the employing company's most recent Annual Financial Statements certified as a true copy of the original by the auditor who audited it.

- A photocopy of the employing company's most recent Personal Income Tax Return (PND1) with the Revenue Department's receipt plus a photocopy of the applicant's most recent Annual Personal Income Tax Return (PND91) – if the person has one – certified as a true copy of the original by the Revenue Department.

- A photocopy of the employing company's most recent Social Security Fund monthly return certified as a true copy of the original by the Social Security Fund Office.

With effect from May 16, Thai Immigration requires the first application to extend a nonimmigrant B visa to be supported by photographs of every employee in the employing company and each photograph is to be taken showing the employee at their place of work, for example sitting at a desk or at a machine or behind the steering wheel of the company vehicle and so on.

I have been told that if a company has many Thai employees then the application should be supported by photographs of several of the employees as long as the number exceeds the minimum requirement of four Thai employees to match each foreign employee.

However, the reason the photographs are required is to enable an Immigration inspection team to match the photographs against actual employees at the workplace if they pay a surprise visit.

The Immigration Bureau has warned that it is now a policy of theirs to conduct surprise visits to newly registered companies that employ expatriates who require work permits.

The aim of the inspections by the Thai Immigration Department would appear to be to determine whether the information supplied by companies employing expatriates is correct insofar as: a. Capitalization;

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b. Business activity and nature;

c. Location of business;

d. Number of Thais employed as a ratio to expatriates; and,

e. Existence of Thai embloyees.

I have been informed that all new companies registered that employ expatriates may be subject to a visit by the Immigration Department.

To avoid breaching the legislation with respect to work permits and visas, companies are advised to adhere as a minimum to the following:

a. Fully paid up registered share capital of 2 million baht per work permit for non-BOI companies:

b. Employ four Thais to every expatriate and those Thais must be current employees of the company, be paid a salary and have written contracts to support

their employment for non-BOI companies;

c. Business operated by the company should comply to the objects in the Articles of Association; and,

d. The place of business should have the appearance of a proper place of business even if it is operated from an expatriate's place of residence.

The Immigration Bureau has also issued a warning that if it is found that the information provided in supporting documentary evidence is not correct then the applicant's visa will be canceled and the applicant will have to leave Thailand.

In addition, the principals of the employing company and the agency handling the application (if one is used) will be reported to the police for further action.

Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen of the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office (PPIO), replies:

We here at the PPIO have not been informed of any changes to the requirements for an extension to a permit to stay for people who entered Thailand on a non-immigrant B visa. I know nothing about these regulations coming into effect on May 4. As

far as I know, these regulations have applied for quite some time.

The Immigration officer processing the application for an extension to stay may ask for *any* or *all* of this information to support the application. The officer always has the right to ask for more documents.

At the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office we require only the same documents as before, which are the same financial documents and other requirements you have mentioned, but not the photographic evidence.

If we believe an applicant has intentionally filed incorrect information in the application – either not disclosed important information or lied to a government officer – then we will report the foreigner to the court, which will decide whether the foreigner should be deported and added to the Immigration blacklist.

Similarly, if we believe a company has intentionally filed incorrect information or not disclosed important information, we will report the company to the police to investigate.

Rabies: Should you worry or not?

here are few, if any, diseases that conjure up more fear than rabies. Visions of people being driven insane by pain followed by certain, inescapable death spring to mind. The word itself comes from the Latin for madness. Thailand is classified as a country where rabies is endemic, but is it something we should be concerned about?

Rabies is a viral disease that causes acute inflammation of the brain in mammals. In nonvaccinated humans, rabies is invariably fatal after symptoms have developed, but prompt treatment will generally prevent the virus from progressing. There are only six recorded cases of a person surviving rabies without treatment.

Most deaths these days are generally in children who fail to report that they have been bitten. The old treatment consisted of extremely painful injections through the stomach wall, but this has long been superseded by a course of normal injections which I can vouch are no more painful than any other type of vaccination.

Most animals can be infected by the virus and transmit the disease to humans. In Thailand ing cause of death. The reality is

the most likely carriers are dogs, cats and bats.

Although the Soi Dog Foundation always recommends volunteers who are working with stray animals to be vaccinated against rabies, I have never in my time here seen a dog or cat suffering from the disease. The last recorded case of rabies in a human in Phuket was more than 20 years ago, and in an animal seven years ago.

Indeed, Phuket Provincial Livestock Chief Dr Sunart Wongchavalit last year went so far as to announce Phuket a rabies-free

In Thailand only 14 rabies deaths were recorded last year, and all of these were in rural areas. Compare this to the risk of Aids: Despite Thailand having one of the best education and prevention programs in Asia, more than one in 100 adults is infected with HIV, and Aids has become a lead-

mouth is the most widely recognized symptom, but I have seen many dogs frothing and foaming at the mouth; in each case it has been the result of poisoning, never rabies.

Other symptoms can be running around wildly, sometimes snapping at things in the air, being weak and meek, partial paralysis of the head, enlargement of neck or leg muscles, or difficulties in swallowing.

Some of these symptoms are similar to canine distemper or canine parvo virus, both of which are very common on the island, but cannot be transmitted to hu-

In humans, the period between infection and the first flulike symptoms is normally two to twelve weeks, but can be as long as two years. Soon after, the symptoms progress to such things as slight or partial paralysis, anxiety, insomnia, confusion, agitation, abnormal behavior, paranoia, hallucinations, and progressing to delirium.

The production of large quantities of saliva and tears coupled with an inability to speak or swallow are typical during the latter stages of the disease. Death almost invariably results two to ten days after the first symptoms.

A friend of mine was recently walking down a street and presumably went too close to a neighbor's house, because the dog ran out and nipped him on the leg, breaking the skin (stray dogs are far more likely to run away when you approach).

He was returning home to Europe that day and phoned me in somewhat of a panic asking what he should do. After putting his mind at rest that the chances of the dog being rabid were practically zero, I did advise him to do the following, which is what I would advise anybody to do if they are bitten by any animal in Thailand:

First, wash the bite area thoroughly with soap and water, which is very effective itself in reducing the number of viral particles. Then go immediately to a local hospital and report that you have been bitten and would like a course of rabies injections. Five are generally given over a 28day period. Although the chances of infection here are tiny, it is better to be safe than sorry.

All pet owners should of course ensure their pets are vaccinated against rabies. The vaccination is cheap and the Livestock Department often has clinics where the vaccinations are carried out for free. The local animal welfare charities routinely vaccinate the stray dogs brought in for sterilization and treatment.

Finally therefore, you cannot totally rule out being infected with rabies in Thailand, or for that matter Phuket.

Even the UK, considered rabies-free for more than a century, had a well publicized death a few years ago when a man was bitten by an infected bat, believed to have flown over the Channel from France.

But the chances of being bitten by a rabid dog here on Phuket are statistically so remote that it is not worth losing sleep over. Now HIV is another matter!



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Technical divers reach new depths in Krabi

huket and its neighboring provinces are home to some of the most popular diving spots in the world. However, it's not just tourists and recreational divers who are flocking to the region. Technical divers have also been coming here to push the boundaries of the sport to its limits.

Technical diving involves going beyond recreational limits. These vary depending on the dive organization, but are typically between 30-40 meters.

Phuket resident Ben Reymenants, a "mixed gas instructor trainer evaluator" and certified hyperbaric technologist working for the SSS Recompression Chamber Network in Thailand, provides a more in-depth – one could say – definition.

"Technical diving is a form of Self-Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus (Scuba) diving where a diver does not have immediate access to the surface, such as when penetrating a wreck or cave, or if there is a (virtual) ceiling above the divers in the form of an obligatory extended decompression [underwater] stop," explained the diver, technically.

"The difference is also in the education and the equipment. A technical diver needs to take two of everything in case of failure: two tanks, two buoyancy devices, two masks, two computers."

Last year, a pool of water in a pristine jungle in Sra Keow, Krabi, frequently used as an elephant watering hole, became a point of interest for two cave divers, Cedric Verdier and Mike Gadd, who did an exploratory dive to 200 meters, yet failed to reach the bottom.

With a passion for exploring uncharted territory, Ben,



What looks like little more than a muddy puddle in Krabi is actually an entrance to an extensive subterranean karst cave system reaching a depth of more than 200 meters – enough to set a record in Thailand.

Cedric and Mike formulated a plan for another exploratory dive that would hopefully take them to the bottom of the cave.

On February 18, Ben and Cedric returned to the Sra Keow cave. With a team of experienced support divers and medical staff on hand, they descended independently of one another. Unlike recreational diving, technical diving is often done solo, as each diver is equipped to be self-sufficient in case of an emergency.

Ben, who at one time held the record for the deepest open ocean dive using Scuba at 202 meters, reached the bottom at 239 meters and set a record for the deepest cave dive in Thailand.

Ben described the dive, saying, "At 12 meters the cave started and because of the fine sediment, the visibility was reduced to one meter. I dropped fast and after just four minutes I passed the 60 meter mark. The visibility got better, the angle steeper, the stalactites disappeared and I could see where the running water had created a genuine piece of art in the limestone.

"Below 150 meters, the cave turned into a giant cathedral, the walls disappeared and my only visual reference was my slowly spinning reel in front of my eyes. One of my dive computers had gone to sleep and I asked myself 'what the hell am I doing here?'

"At 190 meters, high-pressure nervous syndrome kicked in. My hands were shaking and I could feel tremors on my spine. Suddenly I got hit by some-

thing: one of the walls sneaked up on me and I bounced off. I looked up and saw a large cloud of dust following me."

Finally Ben reached the bottom. "The feeling of falling into a giant duvet blanket shot through my head. The bottom was com- For more information you can posed of fine yellow silt, settled over thousands of years. Very knees, coming to a full stop." His deepcult.com

gauge read 239 meters and it was time to start ascending.

The ascent, which needed support divers to come and unload the 25 used tanks, took a total of nine hours. At one point Ben was carrying 11 tanks while at a depth of 55 meters. The last three hours of the dive were spent in a small, homemade underwater habitat.

Constructed by Ben, Mike and Cedric, the habitat is a large water tank inverted and lowered to nine meters. This allowed the divers to eat, unload their diving equipment and read while breathing 80% oxygen from a supply hose. When Ben reached the habitat, Cedric, who had descended first, was already waiting for

Ben's motivation for the dive? "Finding places nowadays where no other human has set foot is very difficult.

"This, combined with the mystery of that cave in the middle of the Thai jungle, made it intriguing to have a look and see how deep it went."

Support, planning, experience and sponsors all helped make the dive a success.

"For an extreme cave dive, a large team is needed to help with the logistics and secure the safety of the divers," says Ben.

"Maurizio Carmini and Laurent Bihler were the safety divers, and on the surface were dive medics Eefje Pattyn from Phuket and Marina Frei from Ao Nang. Dr Luba Matic confirmed the health of all divers before, during and after the dive. Local dive shops Seafun Divers, One Stop Dive Shop, Deep Blue Divers, Ocean Zone and Protech provided tanks and gas. O'Three Drysuits supplied

> the drysuits and Liquivision supplied a custom-made depth gauge."

As for his future plans for more exploratory dives, there seems to be no

In most cases there are no written contracts between the fighter and his promoter and fighters rarely challenge their promoters' and managers' business practices. A fighter calling his own shots is a foreign concept to Thai fighters. Instead, they view themselves as an employee and the promoter as their boss.)

SM: What do you think about Darchinyan as a fighter?

PW: His style is alot like Manny Pacquiao's. He is strong and courageous. Maybe after I finish with my obligations this year we can fight in the United

Krabi Airlines to launch on November 1

Civil Aviation Department Director General Chaisak Angkasuwan said the airline, with four investors, including former Thai Airways International employee Kosol Vongsrisart, plans to fly to Norway, Germany and Australia by the end of the year.

The carrier intends to add flights to cities in the US and Japan within five years, he added.

K. Chaisak said the establishment of the airline, which takes advantage of Krabi Airport's upgraded international status, would be completed very soon.

It will be the first fully scheduled airline using it as a base of operations, he said.



vice two international routes: to Oslo and Munich.

In the second phase, between this year and 2009, the airline plans to fly to Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane in Australia, plus one city in New Z ealand.

K. Chaisak said the airline would use two Boeing 777-200ER aircraft in its first year, increasing the number of aircraft to five within five years and up to 10 by 2013.

The airline, targeting tourists from Europe as its main market, expects to run an average cabin factor of at least 70%, he said

Over the longer term, starting in 2011 the airline plans to expand its routes to Vancouver, Canada; Los Angeles and San Francisco, California; Tokyo and Osaka in Japan; and Seoul.

Meanwhile, Thailand's open-skies policy is key to encouraging investors to start an aviation business.

K. Chaisak added that more than 10 airlines were in the process of being established. Each is required to have a minimum 200 million baht in registered capital

Most are intending to serve Asian markets, he said.

Five major hotels to be re-branded

PHUKET: Three Phuket hotels will be renamed under the Central Group's re-branding of its hotel and resort business, while another two will be taken over by the Marriott chain of hotels.

tral Karon Beach Resort and Central Kata Resort will be renamed Centara Villas, Centara Karon Resort and Centara Kata Resort, respectively.

Centara, Central Group's new hotel brand, comes from the words "Central", the 60-year-old brand name in Thailand, and "tara", Thai for water or river.

Suthikiat Chirathivat, chairman of the executive board of Central Plaza Hotel Plc, said he believes the name "Centara", which marks a separation of the group's hotel and resort business from its retail and food business unit, was more relevant to Thailand than "Central".

Three different sub-brands have been created to re-brand the 11 hotels under Centara: five-star properties will include the word "Grand" in their titles, village properties will be renamed Centara Villas and spas will be renamed Spa Cenvaree.

The move comes as the Central Group prepares to expand both locally and internationally, starting with a new 505-room hotel, the Centara World Hotel, slated to open March 2008 in Bangkok.

The Marriott hotel chain will take over the 399-room Grand Tropicana Hotel Phuket, in Patong, and rename it the Courtyard by Marriott Phuket at Patong Beach. The company will also pick up the 256-room Surin Beach Resort, which will be rebranded as the Courtyard by Marriott Phuket at Surin Beach.

The Marriott management comes through a deal struck between Marriott, which also owns the JW Marriott on Phuket's northern end, and Destination Properties.

Both hotels will undergo significant renovations during the process. They are both expected to be finished by early 2008.

Life after the death of the company pension plan

aving money from comes naturally to some people but not to others. Perhaps for most people it is like dieting, postponed until next month, next year or even later.

Traditionally, employees of companies were automatically part of a firm's pension scheme. The employee would contribute about 7.5% of his salary to the pension fund and the company, in most cases, would match this

After decades of service the employee would be able to retire with a pension of around twothirds his final salary.

This cozy situation has changed for several reasons. Employers have realized that this does not suit their operations for many reasons.

Often a company's largest asset will be its pension fund, but this is not an asset of any real financial value to the company and produces little benefit.

Companies have also found that their financial commitments to the pension fund are, in reality, a blank check for a great sum of money and with pensioners living longer than in the past the pension fund can become a huge

It is not simply a matter of companies being greedy, it's more a matter of survival of the company itself.

Pensions give even the wealthiest governments major problems. After World War II, the British government introduced an old-age pension that, for males, paid benefits from the age of 65. At that time, life expectancy for males was 63 years, now life expectancy is over 70.

Many developed countries



are also finding that birth rates are dropping and consequentially the governments' ability to pay pensions is being challenged. Society has changed dramatically

over the past 50 years, as have attitudes toward family responsibilities. In the past, the family was a close-knit unit and one of the benefits was care of ByRichardGWatson

the elderly. The change, especially in wealthier countries, towards smaller nuclear families has seen a change in attitudes towards the financial care of the elderly. People are now expected to take care of their own finances and with governments increasingly unable to take the burden this is what the

future holds. Governments these days are often telling their citizens that

they must make provisions for their own retirements. Most governments still pay pensions, but the amounts paid are more aimed at staving off starvation than providing a comfortable retirement.

Expatriates now are in a different position; often employers do not even offer pension plans. Many expats are working in various parts of the world on con-

tracts and change employers every few years. Others are running their own businesses, but in many cases the eventual sale proceeds of the business may well result in inadequate

funds for retirement

reality, many businesses fail and if the business operator was relying on the business being the future "nest egg", he

is sorely disappointed. Expats are a diverse group, and are more likely to be more diverse than almost any other group of people. In Phuket, we can see the difference ranging from the extremely wealthy to those who are close to despair.

There are various choices to cover pensions. Offshore insurance companies offer pension plans, and while the lump-sum investment plans, such as mutual funds, stocks and bonds, in this sector are extremely competitive, the pension and savings plans are just the opposite.

Pension plans suffer from high fees and if they have to be cashed in early they are subject to crippling early withdrawal charges. The situation is so bad that since 1990 I have refused to sell pension products because I believe the average person would be better off leaving the money in the bank and investing it only when a reasonable lump sum has been saved.

However, there are usually exceptions to a rule. The pension

plan offered by Close Private Bank is such an exception. The charges are moderate, the plan is flexible and it offers a fair deal to customers.

Close Private Bank was formed in the UK in 1873 and has a top investment grade credit rating. The bank is listed on the London Stock Exchange and its shares are part of the Financial Times Stock Exchange – FTSE 250 Index.

The pension scheme is designed for expats through the bank's Guernsey, Channel Islands, operation; though it also has an office in Singapore.

The pension has several

options and benefits. First, it is portable – a contributor can take the pension to whichever country he moves to.

Also, the pension is held in a trust, so that in the event of the death of the holder, there are no delays in obtaining probate. Having a pension in trust means that in the event of insolvency or divorce, creditors may not seize the

The pension plan can be denominated in UK pounds, euros or US dollars. Contributions can be increased, decreased or, if necessary, stopped without any penalty. At the outset of the plan a retirement age is selected, but can be changed at any time.

The assets of the pension can be borrowed, up to 40%, in a pre-agreed credit facility and the bank supplies a gold Visa card to investors. Pension plan members receive a valuation twice yearly and the value of the pension can be checked at any time online.

Close Private Bank is the largest independent merchant bank in the UK and by using its Guernsey Pension Plan, investors have tax-free returns.

Investment choices, which can be changed, range from "Cautious to Neutral" to "Balanced" to "Growth" and there is another option which simply tracks the Libor - London Interbank Offer Rate in sterling, euros or US dollars.

This is by far the best pension plan I have seen offered to expatriates.

ur first PC Group Therapy session in Patong drew a dozen people. Attendance at the second one grew by almost 50%. At this rate, by the end of the year, we'll need a room the size of Samui to hold everybody.

The folks in attendance ranged from absolute first-time beginners to grizzled Microsoft Certified System Engineers. And one card-carrying dummy.

I'd like to go over some of the things we talked about at the first two sessions. I can only scratch the surface: we covered a lot of territory. As befits the wide-open nature of the Group Therapy sessions, lots of people helped other people, shared their experiences and their expertise, and we solved a lot of problems.

Recent shenanigans by local Internet Service Providers provoked several questions about Domain Name Servers: the ISPs here in Phuket had people change their Domain Name Servers, and several people in, uh, "therapy" wanted to know why. The short answer: the ISPs don't know what they're doing. The longer answer requires a bit of explanation.

You and I work with the Internet by typing in names like phuketgazette.net or smtp.mail. com. Computers on the Internet don't understand names – they need so-called "IP addresses", which are numbers that look like 203.146.21.166 (the IP address for phuketgazette.net).

Whenever you type a Web address into a browser or an email program, your computer has to reach out to a giant telephone book, to translate phuket gazette.net into 203.146.21.166. That telephone book is called a Domain Name Server. Its sole purpose is to translate domain names into IP addresses.

When you pay for an Internet account, the company that provides the Internet service is supposed to give you automatic


access to a telephone book – a Domain Name Server. Your programs are rigged to consult the ISP's telephone book whenever they need to look up a telephone number.

Sadly, some ISPs still haven't figure out how to automatically offer a telephone book for your programs to use – in computer lingo, they don't have a functional default DNS server. Instead of fixing their problem, they force you, the customer, to reach into the bowels of your computer and manually specify the location of a telephone

If you've ever received a notice from your Internet Service Provider –

or if you've ever watched over the shoulder of one of the guys who installs your ADSL line – and you've been instructed to go into the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties dialog and type in a Preferred DNS server number, you should know that the only reason for doing so is to cover up for the mistakes of the Internet Service Provider.

You should also know that if you move your computer somewhere else, or switch to a different Internet Service Provider, having a DNS server number

hard-coded in your computer can cause all sorts of grief.

What can you do? Vote with your feet. If a technician monkeys around with your computer and gives you a manual DNS server number, or if you get instructions from your ISP showing you in great detail how to manually change your DNS, get a different ISP. Life's too short to deal with bozos.

Flushed: In a related DNS question, one of the people at the PC Group Therapy session asked about "flushing the DNS cache". That sounds both mystical and scatological, but in fact it isn't as

interesting as you might think.

As your computer looks up all of these typed-in addresses, translating them into weird-looking numbers, it keeps a small stockpile of numbers that it's already looked up. It's kind of like jotting down phone numbers so you don't need to look them up in the phone book. That stockpile of alreadylooked-up IP addresses is called a "DNS cache".

Unfortunately, from time to time, the stockpile of already-looked-up phone numbers gets messed up: you type in phuket gazette.net and, somehow, you get sent to outermongolia.info.

When the stockpile gets scrambled (in computer lingo, when

your DNS cache becomes corrupted), you throw away all of the

already-lookedup-entries ("flush the cache") and start all over again.

Some people think their computers go faster after they've flushed the cache. In fact, the computer runs just a little bit slower, until it's filled up the cache again. The difference is hardly perceptible.

Well served: Shortly after the second meeting, Paul Spring (Email: admin@thaiservers.com) let me in on a surprise announce-

ment that should be of interest to any companies or individuals who want their own Web server.

Paul runs Thaiservers.com. He hosts both of my websites, and he's done a great job of it for years. For example, one morning I sent Paul an emergency email at 3:04 am about a domain transfer

He got the new server up and running, and sent me back a confirming message at 3:35 am that same day.

Thaiservers works with a very capable "server farm" in the US. That's why my sites stay up so well: Paul provides help here in Phuket, but the servers are in the US.

Paul's worked out a deal with his server farm to provide an exceptional package for folks who want to have their own Internet servers. Mind-boggling, actually.

One of the packages includes a Pentium D930 3.0 GHz with 2 x 2MB cache and 1GB of RAM, 250GB SATA II hard disk, 100mbps direct connection to the Internet, 2,000GB per month bandwidth, Linux, Cpanel and WHM.

Total price: a little over 10,000 baht a month, including round-the-clock support in

Phuket via email, mobile phone and SMS.

Paul runs, maintains and updates your server to make sure it's always in tip-top condition, hardens the server and plugs bugs in the operating system and control panel. You own the server. You can change anything that you like.

If you have a computer question, I would like to invite you to join me on Sunday between 10 am and noon at my Sandwich Shoppe in Patong. Have something to sell – a computer, an Internet service, a hardware repair center? Looking for a job, or freelance work?

Come by on Sunday, and every Sunday for the foreseeable future. No rules. No holds barred. No commitments. No guarantees. Let's just get together and see if we can solve each other's problems.

If you can't make it this week, not to worry. I'll be there next week, too. And the next...

Steel products shine in Phuket's kitchens

omeowners and housekeepers frustrated with inferior kitchen products can find a solution to their woes in locally produced stainless steel items.

The Handmade Shop, owned and managed by Yanisa Somthai, has been importing stainless steel to Phuket from Ayudhaya and Kanchanaburi for two years, and selling products from Thai producers injects income into local communities, she said. It also provides an opportunity for Thai craftsman to exhibit their skills.

Stainless steel, which has become increasingly popular in kitchens due to its high resistance to stains, rust and corrosion, is easier to clean and has a longer lifespan than ordinary steel, although it costs more

The iron-carbon alloy is made from chromium and nickel and is protected by an invisible layer of chromium (III) oxide.

Kitchenware sold at The Handmade Shop, which can be custom-designed, is made from 18/8 stainless steel (18% chromium, 8% stainless steel).

All items are dishwasher-safe and can be cleaned using dish washing liquid, although they should not be scrubbed with dust or sand, said K. Yanisa.

K. Yanisa's store doesn't end with stainless steel, however, and includes a range of tin sculp-

tures made by artisans in Chiang Mai. As with the stainless steel articles, the tin sculptures can be custom-made to fit any design.

K. Yanisa didn't want any prices to be listed in the newspaper, but she assures readers that she is fair to Westerners and maintains a single pricing scheme.

redictability: there's a lot to be said for it. We may as well start close to home; the half-dozen or so regular readers of this column should be prepared for an aimless rant that precedes more ramblings about something green and growing. No surprises there.

There is predictability elsewhere, however. It's quite reassuring to know exactly what will happen in a Thai soap opera even before the opening credits have finished. Some young bloke is going to fall desperately in love with a stunning girl, then get sick and eventually die in a hospital bed.

There will, without doubt, be an older woman knocking around somewhere, with big hair held upright by a gallon of hairspray. She will shout a lot at the pretty girl, and the girl will pout excessively in return.

The older lady will be married to a downtrodden chap who wouldn't say boo to a goose. Have I missed anything?

This predictability thing is everywhere. How many times have you met someone who said that he's got an idea that will make him extremely rich, but he just needs a backer for a little "initial capital outlay"?

You know he's a buffoon,

but he swears you'll both be millionaires in months.

Of course, you do the sensible thing and distance yourself from the madness as swiftly as possible. Your "friend", however, piles every penny he has into this scheme of his. His downward financial spiral is inevitable; as predictable as a Thai policeman's shirt shrinking in the wash.

Us islanders inevitably receive house guests, perhaps staying only a few nights each visit. Your mate's in town, but how does he manage to pick one of the few days of the year when the bars are closed for the night? Totally predictable.

Thai food is predictably spicy. Thais can eat quantities of chili that would make most people cry. So, if a Thai person assures you that what's on your plate is mai phet (not spicy), don't take any chances, just run for cover. If it looks deadly, it probably is.

Most people who know me would probably describe me as a little predictable. I'm the sort that tends to eat at the same restau-

rants on a regular basis, and even orders the same food on arrival. Come to think of it, some of the waitresses don't even bother giving me a menu now.

The plant world enjoys predictability, too. But there's a catch; not all plants are as predictable as others. Plants are known for the particular flowers or fruit that they produce, or the distinctive leaves that set them apart from everything else floral.

The golden dewdrop, or tien thong as it's known in Thai, is one of the most unpredictable plants around in terms of appearance. It doesn't seem to have decided what it should be famed for, so it has a go at everything – growth speed, flowers, berries... the whole lot. It goes by many other names including sky flower, duranta and pigeon berry. It's a fairly fast-growing plant that can reach heights of up to a couple of meters.

A dewdrop, as most of us know, is regarded as a petite, delicate thing. The dewdrops that appear on this specimen, however, aren't the most attractive things of the plant world. Perhaps the golden dewdrop isn't the ideal name for the plant whose fruit bears much more resemblance to

quite cute. The tiny, vivid lilac flowers form in spectacular clusters. They are swiftly followed by loose clusters of bright orange berries that look good enough to eat. That's probably not the most sensible thing to do though, as

they're poisonous (containing hydrocyanic acid). So it's probably a good idea to keep this one away from children's play areas.

Plants in Europe reflect their seasons, with blossoms appearing on fruit-bearing plants in spring. These drop off en masse to be replaced by the fruit when it gets a bit warmer.

Not so in Phuket. Plants here are a little confused, as the seasons here don't tell them what to do in the same way. The golden dewdrop is no exception. The berries and flowers appear in a never-ending cycle. The berries are produced immediately after the flowers and arrive in such quantities that they actually cause the branches to arch down, as if they can't bear the weight.

The dewdrop grows at an enthusiastic pace, and soon becomes a straggly bush if not regularly attacked with a good pair of secateurs. It makes a superb hedge or effective windbreak for the garden, and becomes denser with regular pruning. Trained well with a few bits of wire bent into shape, this plant can grow to any shape you want. It does as it's told. Topiary starts here.

Like so much of the vegetation that thrives in Thailand, it will put up with virtually any kind of treatment. It's happy in full sun or partial shade, although it will produce more flowers and fruit in full sun. It needs fairly moist, well-drained soil, but doesn't demand too much water.


Likely because of its virile nature, in other parts of the world the golden dewdrop has been declared a menace. In the US, it's officially labeled as one of Hawaii's most invasive plants. You don't get a reputation like that by sitting around doing nothing.

Life would probably be fairly dull if everything was totally predictable. Flowers and poisonous berries? Why not? Time for a beer, anyway – my mate's in town. It's not election day, is it?



Pornsawan rises in Phun Phol

iling work is slated to begin mid-August for the Pornsawan Grand Tower & Pornsawan Plaza, the 800-million-baht project on eight rai on Phun Pol Rd, opposite the Bank of Ayudhya's Phun Pol branch. The project is expected to be completed by the end of 2008.

Pornsawan comprises a 10story condominium block and a four-story plaza building that will feature a large water park on the top deck.

The condominium building, called Pornsawan Grand Tower, will house 72 apartments on the fifth to the 10th floor, with the lobby area, management offices, laundry, spa and a convenience store on the ground floor.

The second, third and fourth floors will provide parking space for about 120 cars.

Pornsawan Kongkawai, project developer and managing director of P.N. Land Co Ltd, told the Gazette that about 40% of the apartments have been sold since going on the market on June 1.

Three types of apartments are available: penthouse suite A, which has 100 square meters of usable space; standard suite B, which has 67sqm; and standard suite C, which has 60sqm.

The penthouse will be a twobedroom, two-bathroom apartment with a living area and a three-square-meter balcony. Type B and C units will have one bedroom, one bathroom, living area and also a 3sqm balcony.

There will be 24 units of each condominium type, with prices ranging from 2.9 million baht to 5.2 million baht and all units will include full furniture and decor package.

"In addition to the parking area on the fourth floor, we will have a swimming pool and fitness center for residents. We will also have CCTV security cameras on each floor and the system will be connected to the local police station," K. Pornsawan said.

"The apartments will be on the fifth floor and higher because we have four-story buildings surrounding our location. From the

fifth floor and up, you will be able to see the sea from the balconies. Our residents will have views of Ao Phuket and Saphan Hin," he

In addition to the condominium building, there will be a fourstory plaza building with a water park on the top deck - claimed to be the first of its type in Southern Thailand.

"We decided to build a water park so we would attract children. We believe that any business that can bring in children will be successful because it means that we will be able to attract the entire family," said K. Porn-

The plaza building will be 56 meters wide and 56 meters long, giving a usage area of 3,000 square meters to each floor for retail outlets.

The ground floor will feature an information technology center, while the second floor will have a shopping plaza, banks and event halls. The third floor will have a food center, playground and gaming station.

Parking for 400 cars will be provided on three floors and the area surrounding the building. An 8-meter by 36-meter pond will be installed at the front of the build-

The plaza building will sit on three rai while the condominium building will have a two-rai footprint. Three rai adjacent to the buildings will be used for landscaped grounds and additional parking.

K. Pornsawan said that the condominium market in Phuket City still has potential to grow as he could see from the number of units sold for this project and also from his previous development.

"Our last project was Pornsawan Condotel, located on Chao Fa East Rd, which is nearing completion. It features 72 condominiums including units that are either 36sqm or 72sqm. We have seen how the market has grown quite well for this area, as we sold all of the units in only two weeks.

"We have both Thai and foreign customers purchasing the units. Thai customers have mostly bought the one-bedroom design as an investment property while our foreign customers have tended to buy the two-bedroom design for living purposes.

"The most attractive feature for the Pornsawan Grand Tower & Pornsawan Plaza is that we are the first condominium site in Phuket City that will showcase sea views and we are certainly the only development that will have a water park to attract people as well," he added.
