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Transport Office sets plans for new bus station

RASSADA: The Phuket Provincial Transport Office (PPTO) has agreed to buy 10 rai of land near Supercheap on Thepkrasattri Rd to build a new inter-provincial bus station.

The existing bus station, on Phang Nga Rd in Phuket City, will be used for only local buses, vans and *songtaew*, most of which now leave from Ranong Rd.

PPTO chief Chatchawarn Ngarmtup told the *Gazette* that his office has a verbal agreement to buy the 10 rai at 80 million baht from local businessman Sin Wongcharoen.

The site, now vacant, is next to the Ford warehouse on the inbound side of Thepkrasattri Rd, a few hundred meters south of Supercheap.

The Department of Land Transport has ordered K. Chatchawan to complete the purchase by the end of this month, but he fears this may not be achieved as the PPTO is awaiting final approval from higher levels of the Ministry of Transport, K. Chatchawarn explained.

"In the meantime, the best I can do is finalize the sale contract and wait for final approval from the ministry," he said.

The location for the new bus station is appropriate because it is centrally located on a main road on the outskirts of the city, K. Chatchawarn said.

He added that Phuket City Municipality will be asked to move local transport routes from their current terminus near the

fresh market on Ranong Rd to the existing bus station.

Moving the main bus terminal has been discussed for years as a way of reducing traffic congestion in town caused by the large buses needing to navigate the narrow streets of the city center.

One tour operator, who did not want to give her name, said she has seen the number of buses and pollution steadily increase over the past few years, but the number of tourists using the buses has remained stable.

She said that she would certainly move to the new bus station, but hopes that more amenities will be provided for tourists, such as ATMs or a bank service that the tourists often need to access once they reach Phuket.

Kanokporn Petchmuang, a tourist arriving in Phuket from Roi-Et, said she wasn't particularly pleased with the current bus station, but was concerned that the new station is further from the city center.

She makes three trips annually to Phuket and said she wants to be near downtown when she arrives.

"I don't want to have to spend even more on transportation once I'm here," she said.

All-English radio station launches in Phuket

PHUKET CITY: Phuket now has its first all-English radio station, 90.5 Phuket Gold FM, broadcasting from the Radio Thailand office near Phuket Rajabhat University.

The launch was announced at a press conference at the China Inn restaurant in downtown Phuket City July 18.

90.5 Phuket Gold FM is managed jointly by Bangkokbased KOOL...EST Co Ltd and monthly lifestyle magazine *Phuket Bulletin*.

A press release distributed at the launch announced that programming would be positioned as a "touristainment radio", also targeting the local expatriate community.

Music segments will feature Western music hits from the 1970s, '80s and '90s, along with local tourism industry news and national news by Radio Thailand.

Listeners can expect to hear songs by such artists as Eric Clapton, Elton John and The Eagles.


Speaking at the launch were MR Rujayapa Abhakorn, Managing Director of Bangkokbased KOOL...EST, *Phuket Bulletin* Managing Director Chaiyot Pinpradab and Radio Thailand acting Director Weerapong Waitayawongsakul.

While other radio stations on the island have had limited segments in English, 90.5 Phuket Gold FM will be the island's first all-English radio service, broadcasting daily from 8 am until midnight.

Listeners in parts of Krabi and Phang Nga will also be able to receive broadcasts.

The service will start with a music-only format, with other features to be added gradually over the next two months.

Rawai resident drowns at Nai Harn

NAI HARN: John Chatteris, founder of Atsumi Healing Center in Rawai, drowned while swimming at Nai Harn Beach July 18.

Ian Lenton, who works at the center, told the *Gazette* that Mr Chatteris, 61, went to the beach with his family at about 5 pm.

Although red flags were posted at the beach, indicating that the surf was unsafe for swimming, Mr Chatteris entered the water and soon began having difficulty swimming in the strong waves.

He was pulled from the surf and rushed to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

No other members of Mr Chatteris' family were injured.

An author, teacher and natural therapist for 20 years, Mr Chatteris was a master shiatsu therapist. He cofounded the Shiatsu Centre in South Australia and opened the Atsumi Center five years ago.

Mr Chatteris, an Englishborn Australian, was also an accomplished musician.

His funeral service was held at Wat Chalong July 25.

Locals 'uninformed' of Ao Phuket project

PHUKET CITY: A public opinion survey conducted by researchers from the Prince of Songkla University (PSU) found that 86% of people who stand to be affected by the proposed Ao Phuket development plan said they knew little or nothing about the project, drawn up by the Office of the National Economic and Social Development Board (NESDB).

After being brought up to date by researchers about the details, however, some 55% of those surveyed said they would prefer to scrap the plan, which involves reclaiming land in Phuket Bay to build facilities including a hotel, marina, shopping complex, trade exhibition center and 10.000-seat arena.

The research team, led by Dr Aree Tirasatayapitak and Kamontorn Prompitak of the PSU Phuket Campus Faculty of Service Industries, presented their findings to Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Ratthasima at a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall on July 13.

The study of the potential social impact of the 70-billion-baht project, commissioned and paid for by the province, will be presented to the NESDB along with other impact studies required by the agency before it can put the project before Cabinet for funding approval.

The NESDB will commission its own environmental impact study of the project, which would comprise two islands, one for a marina and the other for meetings, incentives, conventions and exhibitions, or MICE, facilities.

The two islands would be connected by three short bridges to the mainland, one to the north at Rassada Harbor, one to the south onto what is now protected mangrove forest at Laem Nambor and the third off Saphan Hin.

The researchers surveyed 1,500 people from three prov-

inces whom they thought would be affected by the project: 900 in Phuket and 300 each from Phang Nga and Krabi.

Target groups included government officials, local politicians, tourism industry operators and members of the general public.

The survey canvassed opinion on possible social impacts of the project, including job creation, economic development, and the effect on local culture, education, public health, safety and security.

Researcher K. Kamontorn reported that 86% of those surveyed didn't know enough about the plan to make an informed decision about it.

After being given an overview of the plan, however, most of those interviewed thought the project could provide jobs, but many were concerned about the possibility of low-season unemployment.

Other concerns about the project's potential negative social impacts included a possible increase in the cost of living, deterioration of the local culture, insufficient public health services and public utilities, and increases in traffic congestion, crime and other social problems.

ICEC site proposals fail to hit pay dirt

PHUKET: Three sites have been proposed for Phuket's International Convention and Exhibition Center (ICEC), but none afford the sea views long considered a 'must' for the project.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, who heads the committee that will decide the project site, heard the proposals on July 23.

Phummisak Hongsyok said his firm Anuphas & Sons Co Ltd was prepared to allot 165 rai of its 1,600-rai Chao Fa City project off Chao Fa West Rd. The area, which is already home to the company's Honda dealership showroom, was offered as a site for the ICEC in July 2003.

K. Phummisak, a former Phuket City mayor and current member of the National Legislative Assembly, pointed out that the site is centrally located near Central Festival Phuket.

The newly-paved Muang Chao Fa Rd ensures quick access to Kathu and the site is in a "yellow zone", which allows structures up to 23 meters tall, said K. Phummisak.

Anuphas & Sons is prepared to invest about 2 billion baht to build the center and allow other firms to invest, either by renting or through a joint venture, he said.

Bangkok-based Chonthicha Property Co Ltd offered 150 rai on Luck Kongsri Rd in Rassada, near the Phuket Provincial Juvenile and Family Court.

The site is accessible from Thepkrasattri Rd and the Sapam-Samkong road.

The company is prepared to accept all government conditions and develop the land under a sale or rental agreement, said its representatives.

Chonthicha is prepared to invest in the project's construction, either alone or in a joint venture. The company has 250 rai in the area and is prepared to offer more land if needed, they said.

Tri Eagles Co Ltd, a subsidiary of Three Dolphins Group, whose holdings include Mom Tri's Boathouse and the Trisara resort, proposed a 30-year lease of 155 rai near Thalang Chanasuk Memorial Field in Thepkrasattri.

The site offers easy access to the airport and luxury hotels, and independent water supply from tin mines, the representative

The flat terrain would make it easy to install infrastructure and utilities, she added.

Tri Eagles did not specify whether the firm is prepared to invest in construction.

In closing the meeting, Gov Niran said that two plots of government land at Mai Khao were still being considered.

However, while both plots offer impressive views and easy access to the airport, critics have argued that the sites are too far from the island's major population centers.

As it has been ING Funds' willingness to fund the project in Mai Khao that has sparked the latest surge of interest in the project, Gov Niran asked ING Funds' representatives at the meeting to discuss with landholders the possible joint development of the project and to submit detailed plans within 30 days.

Police bust Patong extortion racket

PATONG: Kathu Police arrested four men on July 18 for allegedly attempting to extort 100,000 baht from the Thai-Nepalese owner of a tailor shop.

The four suspects were presented to the media at a press conference at Kathu Police Station the following day.

They were identified as 40year-old Burmese national Chom "Johnnie Lek" Bunyawej, the ringleader, and his three accomplices: Pansak "Bow" Poon-Noo, 24; Jareon "Chang" Pedthong, 29; and Udon "Don" Jaiwang, 36.

All were listed as residents of Nakhon Sri Thammarat Province except Udon, who is a resident of Phuket's Wichit District.

According to a press release and statements by the intended victim, the extortion began when Pansak called Jiwan "Jim" Raithai, Managing Director of the "G Armani" tailor shop on Soi Kebsup, on July 14 and threatened to kill him if he did not pay 100,000 baht – or if he talked to police.

Rather than give in to the extortionist, K. Jiwan notified Kathu Police after the first phone call and a plan was laid to snare them.

Police Region 8 Deputy Commissioner Maj Gen Santhan Chayanon and Kathu Police Superintendent Col Grissak Songmoonnark told the press that in the first telephone call Pansak told K. Jiwan that he had been hired by a third party to shoot and kill

200,000 baht, half of which he had already collected as a down pay-

In subsequent calls K. Jiwan was told that if he paid the 100,000 baht remaining on the contract he would not be killed.

On July 17, the extortionist instructed K. Jiwan to provide him with a new debit card that he could use to withdraw 100,000

At 1 pm on July 18, K. Jiwan and his wife deposited 3,000 baht in the Siam Commercial Bank branch at Jungceylon, where the new debit card was issued.

About 5 pm, he was instructed to drop the card with a security guard near the entrance to the parking lot at Supercheap and to tell the guard that someone would be by soon to pick it

Chom waited at a distance under a tree in front of the nearby Godzilla restaurant while Pansak and Udon went to pick up the debit

After Pansak put the card in his pocket, police moved in and arrested all four men without incident.

After the press conference, attended by some 50 members of the ethnic Nepalese community in Phuket, K. Jiwan told the Gazette he was certain that all the threats were issued by the same man, K. Pansak.

K. Jiwan also told police that since the arrest of the four men he has received more threatening phone calls warning him not to speak to police about the case.


"I'm still afraid of this gang because I'm still getting threatening calls even after they were arrested. Police told me that if I need help I can call them any time," he said.

Pol Lt Col Boonlert Onklang told the Gazette that all four suspects were charged with extor-

Chom and Udon have denied all charges. Pansak admitted making threatening phone calls to K. Jiwan, while Jareon admitted only that he had earlier traveled with the other three from Khao Lak to Phuket, but denied knowledge of any extortion racket.

Jareon and Udon were released on bail, but Pansak and Chom were also charged with using a fake ID and remain in custody.


It was too early to say how alleged extortion was related to the results of the July 7 meeting, he added.



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CHALONG: Plans for the second phase of construction of the Chalong Marina Project may be revised by the Marine Department's Technical and Planning division after a bitter dispute with local residents and workers.

The first phase of construction of the controversial marina, which involves building 44 of the originally-planned 210 yacht slips, will be completed by September 30 at a cost of 70 million baht, said Kitipong Waksukri from the Marine Department.

Three different construction plans for Phase 2 were proposed at a public hearing at Muang Phuket School.

The 130 attendees reacted coldly to the fivehour explanations delivered by consulting engineers, with great choruses of approval erupting whenever someone attacked the proposals.

Concerns raised about the marina were that it will damage the environment, will not be able to accommodate large yachts and will not benefit small operators.





ince June 25, three tourists have drowned at Patong Beach, one at Bang Tao Beach, and on July 18, John Chatteris, founder of Atsumi Healing Center in Rawai, drowned at Nai Harn Beach. Despite red flags, warning signs and close surveillance by lifeguards, swimmers continue to get into trouble when braving the currents along Phuket's west coast beaches.

Many of Phuket's beaches have temporary warning signs to alert tourists of dangerous rip currents. A rip current is a stream of water moving under the surface from the shoreline out to sea that forms when incoming waves push water towards the shore and the backwash is pushed sideways until it can find a channel back

The dangers to foreign tourists are usually a result of overconfidence. When beachgoers see waves smaller than those they may have come across in places like Hawaii and Miami, they underestimate the power of the water. Although the waves in Phuket may be small, the beaches are prone to rip currents, said Panu Maswongsa, Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) vice president and executive assistant general manager of Patong Resort

"The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) should be involved when it comes to warning tourists of the dangers of Phuket's beaches," he added.

Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) has taken steps to increase beach safety by funding a year-round beach guard project. Pairoj Chandang, 34, is one of the beach guards from the OrBorJor project. He is responsible for the south end of Kata Beach.

K. Pairoj told the *Gazette* that in his 10 years working at Kata Beach, he has rescued nearly 300 people and seen three swimmers drown.

Recent drownings

Water safety has become a major talking point in Phuket after a spate of four drownings over the past five weeks. Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit insists that authorities are doing the best they can, but Phuket Lifeguard Club President Prathaiyut Chuayuan says many members of the local beach guard are insufficiently trained. Gazette Chief Reporter Sangkhae Leelanapaporn and trainee Anand Singh report on the dangers of Phuket's waves and the lifequards who are charged with keeping swimmers safe in the low season.

every day, K. Pairoj arranges the warning signs that tell swimmers how far they can safely swim out to sea and which areas are considered "risk areas", as denoted by red flags. During the monsoon season, tourists need to be rescued almost every day, said K.

K. Pairoj's job is demanding and he risks his life daily. "My family has asked me many times to quit this job, but I still keep doing it because I was born here and I love to rescue people. The salary of 8,000 baht a month is not much at all for such a dangerous job, but doing it makes me

The three most dangerous beaches in Phuket during monsoon season, said K. Pairoj, are Kata, Karon and Nai Harn.

"At Nai Harn Beach the hotels help with their own lifeguards to look after the guests as well as the beach guards arranged by OrBorJor," he added.

A bigger sign at Kata Beach warning tourists about the dangers of rip currents would make K. Pairoj's job a lot easier because the small sign currently in place does not convey the message effectively enough, he said.

"We use whistles if we see tourists swimming in a rip current. At the beach, we help those who have nearly drowned, but when they are out at sea we can't get too close because they are still in shock and will often hug us and we might drown together. We use the rescue equipment and and try to pull them back to shore," said K. Pairoj.


"If hotels and media were to help together by announcing to their guests about how dangerous Phuket's beaches can be, then that would help us and could save many lives. Local residents don't swim during monsoon season because they know that it is so dangerous," he added.

Phuket Lifeguard Club is an NGO that was established in 2003

to provide information and material about beach and water safety to the public. Prathaiyut Chuayuan, club president and sports manager at Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort, said, "We have a duty to inform people about lifesaving techniques. We receive most of our material from beach guard associations in Australia.

"We have around 20 highly qualified beach guards all over Phuket. These individuals are the elite of trained beach guards. They have trained other beach guards in Phuket, Krabi, Phi Phi Islands and Phang Nga. We do not receive government funding, so we have to find sponsorship,' he added.

"We want to work with government agencies to help train beach guards. We sent the government department responsible [OrBorJor] a letter offering to

train their beach guards in a fourweek program. We even offered to pay for all the expenses, but we did not receive any response so we had to drop the request," said K. Prathaiyut.

"Phuket's beach guards have no recognizable standards and are not properly trained in lifesaving techniques. We were ready to provide them with recognized international qualifications, but they would not accept it. After that, most of our training programs were concentrated around Krabi and Phang Nga," he added.

K. Prathaiyut said that the PTA should print pamphlets in different languages for placement in every hotel in Phuket.

Sometimes tourists are to blame when they do not pay attention to safety warnings, but often it is the responsibility of the beach guards to prohibit tourists from going swimming if they know the water is dangerous. Beach guards have to be stern in order to uphold public safety, he added.

K. Prathaiyut also said that there have been no cases of drowning-related deaths at Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort's beach.

K. Panu of the PTA believes that the recent drownings could have a negative impact on tourism in Phuket.

"We can put up all the signs and warnings we want, but if the tourists choose to ignore them and not follow the safety rules there will inevitably be some losses. With the arrival of the annual monsoon season, all businesses and hotels in Phuket traditionally assist in warning tourists of the dangers of Phuket's beaches and informing them about the signs and flags and what they mean," said K. Panu.

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"For example, if there are red flags up on beaches then it is strongly recommended that people avoid swimming in the sea. We also advise tour operators to take extra care when using sea transport during the monsoon season and to check whether all the safety procedures have been followed," he said.

Hotels and tour operators have been very helpful in looking after the safety of tourists, he added.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit told the *Gazette* that authorities have all the necessary precautions and warning systems in place.

"We are not being lax with safety standards. Tourists who

drown at beaches go swimming despite warnings against it, and in the most recent cases they were swimming outside the swim zones. We have beach guards on duty all the time, but during the monsoon season the sea is very rough. The authorities have asked hotels to help inform their guests about beach safety," said the governor.

On July 11 to 13, the Rotary Club of Laguna Phuket teamed up with Avoca Beach Surf Life Saving Club from Australia for a free one-day course of lifesaving training at Bang Tao Beach, near the Dusit Laguna

The event was conducted by six experienced Australian train-

ers and attended by local beach guards, hotel operators, government agencies and other organizations concerned with beach and water safety in Phuket.

Trainees learned basic first aid, how to deal with different types of injuries and dangerous currents in surf zones, such as rip currents. They also learned how to escape from a rip current.

In the event of a swimmer becoming caught in a rip current, lifeguards advise against fighting it, as the powerful currents will easily exhaust even the strongest swimmer. Instead, lifeguards advise that a swimmer should try and conserve energy by trying to float and waving for help if possible.

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Rather than swimming back

to shore against the current, swimmers in trouble should swim out of a rip current in a direction parallel to the shoreline. When out of the current, they can then swim at an angle back to the shore.

Rip currents often appear as calm water, thus luring unsuspecting swimmers into them. The relative calmness on the surface is the result of a fast moving flow beneath. The color of the sea may also be different than surrounding water, often appearing light brown and muddy from the sand that has been churned up from the sea floor.

"The sea in Phuket is beautiful, but what is underwater is what scares me," said K. Pairoj.

Conman captured at cockfight

KAMALA: After a two-month rendezvous with the supposed buyer search, a local trickster who conned a 55-year-old woman out of a million baht in a land scam was finally arrested – at an illegal cockfight in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

Lt Col Monsak Srisuwan from Kamala Police Station said that Phuket City Resident Benja Wongdara had been trying to sell a plot of

K. Benja told police that on May 13 a man introducing himself as Sitthipong went to her house, saying that he had a client interested in buying the property for 5 million baht.

K. Benja accepted the offer and on May 18 received a call from Sitthipong asking her to prepare one million baht, which he said was to cover the transaction fee for the sale of the land, said Col Monsak.

On the same day, Sitthipong drove K. Benja, her friend Chutharat Sae-Tan and the million baht in cash to a hotel in Kamala, where a

had been arranged.

The buyer, however, was nowhere to be seen. Instead, K. Benja was told to wait in a room where a group of five men and women were gambling. The group lured K. Benja into gambling with them and she lost all her money, she told police.

Police did not reveal what game K. Benja had been duped with.

Annoyed at being swindled, K. Benja went to Kamala Police Station where she explained her ordeal. A warrant was issued for Sitthipong's arrest and the 40-year-old schemer was eventually caught by police at a cockfight in Nakhon Sri Thammarat Police and taken to Kamala Police Station on July 13.

Col Monsak warned that there are other tricksters out there waiting to prey on unsuspecting victims. Citizens should report any suspicious behavior to their local police station, he Source: Nation Channel said.

There are more tourists in Khao Lak this low season than in previous years. Visitors from Germany, Austria, Switzerland and Scandinavia still make up the highest number of visitors to Khao Lak, followed by Asian, British and American Khao Lak

Although many of Khao Lak's businessmen hope for a Phuket-like "Russian wave" to arrive in Khao Lak, I believe they are hoping in vain as Khao Lak's rudimentary nightlife simply does not match their demands.

Blowing through: Strong winds and heavy rains caused minor damage and flooding in Khao Lak during the first two weeks of July. On Petchkasem Rd, close to the Khao Lak Sunset Resort, a broken tree damaged a main power line. Thankfully, it was re-




paired as soon as the storm sub-

The extension enables security officials to contain violence in the region, said Deputy Government Spokesman Natthawat Sutthiyothin.

The emergency law, in force since 2005, allows officials to detain suspects without charge for up to 30 days. About 350 suspects have been rounded up and detained under the law during the past few weeks.

Double trouble: A bomb at an intersection in Yala on July 17 killed one police officer and wounded at least 20 people, including three journalists who were at the scene to report a blast about 30 minutes earlier, police reported.

The second blast ripped through shophouses and convenience stores at a major intersection outside the train station. The bomb also destroyed several motorbikes that were parked next to a taxi stand for passengers traveling on the Yala-Betong route.

The second bomb was believed to have been targeted at police and forensic officers who were called to the scene after the earlier, much smaller bomb.

Reporters said that authorities were ill prepared as they checked the scene. No firefighters or medical personnel were on hand. The blaze from the bomb set one officer from an ordinance unit on fire.

The use of the "second bomb" tactic by insurgents has become common in the violence-plagued region, where more than 2,300 people have been murdered since January 2004. Insurgents often use one bomb to lure the authorities to a scene, where they then trigger a second blast, police said.

Govt extends emergency rule in the Deep South



More than 100 widows have joined the Rotanbatu Project, a handicraft scheme set up in Narathiwat to help them financially after the deaths of their husbands in the Deep South.

The first bomb was hidden inside a crash helmet and placed in a motorbike basket. The second, much more powerful bomb appeared to have been set off remotely after officers arrived at the scene.

Pol Sgt Subin Pruekmongkol, who was caught in the blast, later died at Yala Hospital.

Two other police officers suffered serious injuries, while three local reporters suffered minor injuries. Some 13 passersby also suffered minor injuries.

The double bomb attack shattered the upbeat mood of officials in Yala after there had been no bomb attacks during the previous three weeks. A month-long sweep in two violence-prone districts had resulted in the detention of more than 350 suspected insurgents and sympathizers.

Critics say the sweep was largely for public consumption as all insurgents fled Banang Sata and Krong Pinang districts on the first day of the operation.

Waterfall warnings: Warning systems that can detect flash floods have been installed at two popular waterfalls in Trang province where flash floods claimed 38 lives earlier this year.

Banthad Wildlife Sanctuary Chief Sanit Ongsadara said warning towers and a 45-meter central tower had been built at Sairung (Rainbow) and Prai Sawan (Heaven Wilderness) waterfalls.

Other devices will send warnings if groundwater levels rise more than 30 centimeters above average, K. Sanit said.

Meanwhile, relief teams

and doctors were brought in July 20 to assist six villages affected by flash floods in Surat Thani's Phanom district.

Moo 8 villager Sanong Eiadphol, 43, said she had never witnessed floods like it in her 10 years there. "Before the flood, it rained cats and dogs for three hours," she said. "Luckily, my husband and I took electrical appliances off the floor and we managed to shut down the electricity.

"Thank goodness the flood lasted only 10 minutes. We decided to stay in our house because it was a strong flow – and we were right."

Phang Nga province was also hit by flooding July 20.

Senior Meteorological Department officer Mon Chaimoonsuk asked villagers to observe run-offs. If the run-off becomes reddish it could mean flash flooding from the hills.

Lucky find: Police in Satun investigating the murder of a contractor found shot dead in his car early on July 21 made an unexpected discovery when they found another body from

an unrelated case in a passing car.

Thung Wa District Police received a report of a body in a car by the side of the road in Tambon Pa Kae Ba Hin. Police, led by Duty Officer Lt Pairot Wijitbanjong, rushed to the scene and found the body of Thonsak Onsrikaew, 46. He had been shot twice in the neck in what police believe was a business-motivated killing.

As they were taping off the scene, officers directing traffic noticed that the driver of a black Mitsubishi car was acting suspiciously. An officer, thinking the car may be stolen, indicated for the driver to pull over.

The office questioned the driver and passengers and noticed that the passengers spoke Thai with a foreign accent so he asked to search the car. The driver was reluctant to open the car boot, but finally complied. In the boot officers found the body of a man bound hand and foot and stuffed into a fertilizer sack.

Police arrested the driver, Jatuphong Ngusatun, 45, and his three Burmese passengers; Ong, 40, Tek, 22 and Mong, 20. All four were then charged with murder and concealing a body.

Police said that the body was that of another Burmese man, Bo, 40. He had been shot five times in the back.

Lt Pairot said that one of the officers just happened to notice Ong acting nervous as he slowed down to pass the crime scene.

All four men confessed that they killed Bo after he got drunk and tried to rape a local divorcee, Lt Pairot said.

They were on the way to hide the body when they were stopped, he added.

Bad Joke: A man in Nakhon Sri Thammarat's Chaweng district was found shot dead early on July 15


Duty Inspector Lt Col Surachai Prasopjan from Chaweng District Police Station found the body of Jaray Rungreuang at the side of the road outside a house near Chaweng train station.

He had been shot three times, in the head, chest and stomach, with a .38-caliber pistol.

Police reported that before the shooting, K. Jaray had been talking with a friend known as "Joke" after they had returned from work. Witnesses reported hearing a violent argument followed by three shots.

Police are now hunting for Joke.

new law effective from July 18 allows police officers or government inspectors to seize computers on private premises suspected of containing pornographic material or evidence in connection with either general criminal activities or cyber crimes.

The 2007 Computer-related Crimes Act also prevents unauthorized applications and access to other people's computers, as well as alteration, deletion or destruction of the information of

Impostors using others' identities to send slanderous messages, or those who flood information on discussion forums, are also subject to criminal penalties under the law, proposed and drafted by the National Electronics and Computer Technology Center (Nectec) and enforced by the Information and Communications Technology Ministry.

The Act subjects those circulating pornographic material or libelous content through emails to heavy fines.

It also requires Internet service providers (ISPs) to keep log files of bandwidth consumption and Internet traffic and records of individual users for 90 days

Nectec Director Pansak Siriruchatapong said the Act, in theory, would provide benefits to the country as a whole.

However, he expressed concern about the capability of officials, who are required to have knowledge of computers.

Cheating teachers: State school teachers who have extramarital affairs will face increased disciplinary punishments, Education Permanent Secretary Jaruayporn Thoranin has announced.

Current disciplinary punishment is a salary cut, but the new ruling would set up a fact-finding panel to look into alleged wrongdoings. If an allegation had grounds, a disciplinary investigation would be carried out, K. Jaruayporn said.

If the inquiry deemed a teacher guilty, punishment could vary from dismissal from the service – with or without pension –

to the revoking of the offender's teaching license, she said.

The Committee for Teachers and Education Personnel agreed in principle to the tough new measures, but asked that they be compared with other agencies' regulations before being re-submitted for final approval.

Prime time: Most people support the government's plan to ensure that television programs containing sex and violence are broadcast after children have gone to bed.

The Abac Poll Research Center found a little more than 43% of Bangkok residents felt the move was appropriate, but almost 24% opposed it, saying parents should be the arbiters of their children's viewing behavior. The other 33% responded "no comment".

The survey asked 1,141 people aged between 18 and 60 about the 8 pm starting time for adult programs.

'Most respondents want television dramas before 8 pm to

deliver positive content by promoting good deeds, generosity, family ties, children's abilities and relaxation," poll director Dr Noppadon Kannika said.

Bus crash: A German tourist was killed when a Bangkokbound bus from Phetchabun overturned in Ayudhya's Wang Noi District at 5 am July 17.

Police said the bus driver, Sanan Pongsiang, 35, told police that he dozed off, leaving the bus out of control.

The German tourist died at the scene and 23 other passengers were injured, police said.

Epidemic proportions: A total of 23,653 people have contracted dengue fever so far this year with 21 of them killed by the disease, the Public Health Ministry has announced.

Deputy Public Health Minister Morakot Kornkasem said the 23,653 cases had been recorded before July 7.

Of the cases, 8,177 were in central provinces, 6,816 in northeastern provinces, 5,282 in

southern provinces and 3,378 in northern provinces.

Bilingual blues: Culture Minister Khunying Khaisri Sri-aroon said the government is preparing a national plan that would have teachers advise students on correct language usage.

According to Association of Thai-Language Teachers President Kanchana Naksakul, speaking Thai with a foreign accent is a fashion, known as ab baew, or "abnormal and cute".

K. Kanchana is concerned that with the ab baew phenomenon some children will embrace Western values so much that they ignore Thai culture.

Some bilingual courses now put too much emphasis on English and students do not care much about Thai, she said.

Death of an NGO: The Wildlife

Fund Thailand under the Royal Patronage of HM the Oueen announced its closure because the fund set aside to administrate the organization has dried up.

Wildlife Fund Thailand Acting Secretary-General Sirajit Waramontri informed the 40 nationwide officials that the Wildlife Fund Thailand board on July 9 agreed to terminate the fund's operations and the officials' employment effective July 27.

Schoolroom scourge: A total of 1,141 children have caught hand, foot and mouth disease during the first six months this year, the Public Health Ministry has announced.

Dr Prat Boonyawongwiroj, permanent secretary for Public Health, said the number of dengue victims was nearly twice that of the same period last year.

Of the victims, 399 were in southern provinces, 371 in central provinces, 187 in northeastern provinces and 184 in northern provinces.


The number included 191 children in Bangkok, where one school in Lad Prao was closed on July 10 after the disease was discovered there, he said.

Sugar surcharge: Public Health Minister Dr Mongkol na Songkhla urged the government to increase taxes for fast food, carbonated soft drinks and sweets according to their sugar ratio.

Following a meeting to plan a campaign against coronary heart disease to mark World Heart Day on September 30, Dr Mongkol said about 38 million Thais are at risk of coronary heart disease if this situation remains unchanged.

p with People, a US-based NGO with roots back in the flower-power days of the '60s, has over the years brought together some 20,000 people from nearly 90 different countries in its enduring mission: to spread good will and strengthen bonds between people in their communities.

Despite its long history, Up with People first came to Thailand in an official capacity only last year.

Having successfully completed several community projects in Bangkok, Chiang Mai and Lampang, the organization has now begun operating in Phuket and is currently meeting with some of the island's charitable organizations to establish projects for the team of volunteers who will be arriving next month.

Up with People's main aim is to conduct community service projects around the world, giving both volunteers and participants valuable leadership experience and the chance to discover and develop skills that will help them later in life.

The group plans to be involved in several community projects in Phuket and members are currently meeting with local community project leaders, such as the Lion's Club of Phuket Pearl, to organize activities for the group of young adults from around the world.

The volunteers, who will arrive on the island mid-August, will be assigned to work with the various charities.

Up with People will be focusing its charitable efforts on helping disadvantaged children on the island.

Two groups they plan to collaborate with are the Phuket Sunshine Village Foundation, which provides a home and education for orphans, and Child Watch, a charity that aims to prevent child abuse and raise aware-

ness of children's rights by providing child welfare and basic education.

The NGO will also be working with Life Home Project, the shelter for mothers with HIV that offers a safe and supportive community for the women and their children.

While in Bangkok, Up with People worked with World Vision, which focuses on helping impoverished families. Another project on the agenda is to work with

children whose parents are in prison.

Satree Phuket School, where Up with People's Phuket office is located, will welcome some 70odd participants arriving by bus from Bangkok.

Preparing things ahead of the main group's arrival is a small team of volunteers who have already taken part in one or more previous projects.

Margaux Hovine, 19, a graduate from Sacre Coeur High School in Amiens, France, is the youngest on the team, but she already has a great deal of experience having, traveled around the world with the NGO for the last six months.

She has been a vocal intern and admissions assistant and volunteered at a hospital in France for a year, singing for sick children. She has also done some volunteer work with handicapped children and after spending time in Phuket she will be working for three months as part of a Philip-

skills, but everyone has been so supportive," said Margaux.

"Soon after arriving, I was asked to go into classrooms and teach something, which was very daunting, but being thrown in the deep end like this has been a very rewarding and positive experience," she added.

Renée Rogers, 20, a student at the University of Arizo-

na in the US, has spent the past six months traveling with Up with People. Her responsibilities have included being an alumni relations/external relations intern.

"I've taken time out from my studies to volunteer here and I think it's the best thing I could have done.

"I've learned so much about myself and other people from so many different cultures and the experience will really help me with my studies and my career," said Renée.

Leading this team of enthusiastic volunteers as community relations coordinator, with a de-

cade's worth of experience on the younger team members, is Brazillian Luis Petzhold.

Luis initially joined Up with People in 2006 and traveled for six months with the organization, while also making a video documentary about his experience.

Before coming to Phuket, Luis helped with operations in Japan and Bangkok. Commenting on what the participants gain from the Up with People experience, Luis emphasizes the diversity of the benefits gained from working with people from so many different cultures.

"Each individual will develop life skills which they will certainly use at some point in the future. Although everyone's experience is unique, things like responsibility, leadership, organization and flexibility are skills they will all learn and add to their career toolbox," he said.

Last year Renée found herself sloshing about in mud, sawing and laying floorboards to help reconstruct facilities after the Katrina hurricane devastated much of New Orleans.

In six months Margaux has gone from being a shy girl with limited English vocabulary to being able to comfortably and enthusiastically converse with the media.

Once the students and graduates arrive, they need orientation for their temporary home, somewhere to stay and projects assigned to them.

Unlike many home-stay programs where students may spend several months with a single family, Up with People participants enjoy a travel itinerary that most Lonely Plant-toting backpackers would drool over, visiting several different countries and staying with up to 20 different families over a six-month period

Phuket is just a brief stop on the volunteers' global itinerary, but while they are here they hope to make a difference to those less fortunate than themselves.

While helping out on their various assignments in the community, they'll also be co-ordinating and practicing for a stage performance put on for the families they will stay with.


The song-and-dance show will focus on international participation, global traditions and community service. Whether the participants are experienced thespians or have never been backstage, everyone will have a role.

With the main party of volunteers arriving between the August 17 and 25, many are still in need of homes to stay at while they are here.

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


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A way with the chicks

huket is certainly known for its good food and variety of restaurants, but it's not on every street corner that you meet a chef preparing gourmet fusion English and Italian food.

Thus the Phukana restaurant fills a niche that Phuket may not even have known it was miss-

Nattawut Kamenkij, 43, from Ayudhaya worked as a chef in the hospitality industry for more than 20 years before he began working at Phukana restaurant in Phuket City.

"I started my career in Northern Thailand, where I worked with a Thai chef specializing in Chinese cuisine.

"In 1989, I started working at the Amari Don Muang Airport Hotel in Bangkok. During the eight years I spent there, I gained an extensive knowledge of both English and Italian cuisines," said Nattawut.

"After taking the chef position at Phukana in April this year, I chose to enhance the menu by creating dishes that were a fusion of the two types of cuisines that are my specialty.

"One such dish that I enjoy preparing is Chicken Valdostana, a delicious entrée rarely seen on menus in Phuket. The dish features a pan-fried, lightly breaded chicken breast topped with delicately sliced prosciutto and a rich blend of cheeses.

"It is complemented with a side of pasta and drizzled with a flavorful pesto sauce," he said.

Chicken Valdostana

Ingredients

200g chicken breast 1 teaspoon plain flour 1/2oz white wine

1/2cup seeded and chopped tomatoes (tomato concassé) 30g pasta of your choice

Bread crumbs, one egg, salt and pepper, prosciutto slices, Parmesan cheese, mozzarella cheese

Method

Trim any excess fat, skin and cartilage from the chicken breasts. Tenderize the meat by gently beating it with a tenderizer or the flat edge of a knife until it has a soil texture.

Mix the white wine with a pinch or two of salt and pepper, and pour over the tenderized chicken breasts. Dredge the chicken breasts in the all-purpose flour, then soak in a scrambled egg and coat with bread crumbs.

Lightly oil a pan over medium heat and place the breaded chicken breast in the pan. Fry each side for approximately 3-4 minutes or until lightly golden brown.

Remove from pan and slice horizontally into two pieces. Top one piece with a slice of prosciut-

to and tomato concasse. Place the other piece on top and dress the layers with the cheese sauce and mozzarella cheese. Serve with a portion of pasta. Lightly drizzle pesto sauce and sprinkle Parmesan cheese over the entire dish.

Cheese sauce

150g milk 30g all-purpose flour 100g mozzarella cheese

Method

Heat the milk over low heat and gradually add in the flour and the mozzarella cheese while stirring frequently. Continue stirring until the cheese has melted and all ingredients have become a thick, creamy sauce.

Pesto sauce

200g chopped sweet basil 100g parsley 50g garlic 100g parmesan cheese 550g virgin or extra-virgin olive

Method

Blend all ingredients until pureed into a fine consistency. Portions for each ingredient can be altered to suit your taste.

Ingredients

6 chicken wings 1 tablespoon white soy sauce 50g red Thai chilies 2 teaspoons paprika powder

Method

Crush the fresh chilies and blend with the white soy sauce and the paprika powder. Let the mixture sit at room temperature for 10 minutes to thicken.

After that, lightly coat the chicken wings with the seasoning sauce and then pan fry in cooking oil for about 10 minutes on medium heat.

Serve immediately after cooking and garnish the dish with lettuce and tomatoes.


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

Do Not Drink Tap Water!

It's a life bordering on the glamorous, brushing shoulders with the super-rich, but always on the sidelines. Being a butler allows people to glimpse and live alongside the upper crust, but also demands hard work and a sharp attention to detail to keep clients happy. For a good butler that can mean having everything ready before the client asks.

Gazette chief reporter Sangkhae Leelanapaporn spoke to Ekalak 'Aey' Banthap, a butler in Phuket, about the life and trials of being an attendant to the rich and, sometimes, famous.

he key to being a good butler is a form of mindreading, according to Ekalak "Aey" Banthap, a butler at the Banyan Tree Double Pool Villas in Phuket.

To effectively cater to the needs of the wealthy clients that stay in the villa he manages, he must watch them closely and prepare whatever they may need before they can open their mouths.

Ordering food with their favorite seasonings, preparing the table and hotel room to their liking and overseeing the house staff is no easy task for one man. In fact, as Aey discovered, it can change a butler's life.

Aey began his service industry experience during his time at Rajabhat University Petchaburi where he studied management and worked as a front office trainee at the Sheraton Grande Laguna Phuket.

"I was lucky that they gave me the chance to work there. I started as a villa attendant looking after VIP guests at the swimming pool for six months and was promoted to be a guest service agent for a year, and then promoted to be the guest service manager, which I did for three years," Aey said.

After four years, he was starting to feel bored and applied

to be a butler, a role in which he could do a bit of everything, from housekeeping and food and beverage, to front office work and much more. "Butlers have to do everything and work hard to give guests that 'Wow!' feeling. Guests should not have to request anything," he said.

Many people want to work as a butler, Aey said, because it is an interesting job and and the guests often tip very well. But it is not a job just anyone can do.

"You don't just apply to be a butler and start working – butlers are chosen after training and attitude is the most important factor. Qualifications for the job include good English skills, an exceptional attitude, a service mind – and you have be willing to keep learning," he added.

Aey's most prestigious training came after he transferred to the Banyan Tree. There he trained in a six-month course, including time with Josephine Ive, founder of Magnum Butlers.

Ms Ive is a world-renowned butler trainer and worked for Britain's royal family before taking her training on the road, teaching butlers at famous super-luxury yachts and Asia's most prestigious hotels.

"We got a lot of great training from K. Josephine. She had so many things to teach us because she had experience work-

ing in Buckingham Palace and many other extraordinary settings.

"She taught us how far away from a guest one should stand, how to present and serve wine, how to conduct a proper tea service, how to fold napkins and many other skills," Aey said.

"I can't say that being a butler is an easy or difficult job, but it is challenging because I want to give the guests a favorable impression so they will return and stay with us again."

"I learned how to serve food to guests and even to arrange flowers, but in my experience the most difficult part of the job is being a babysitter. I don't always understand children's emotions, but I guess I do okay because guests keep sending emails from their kids once they are back in their home countries," he said.

Aey said that everyday he must carefully check that his fingernails, hands, ears and breath are clean and that his shoes and clothing are perfect.

"Right now I have to use lip balm, hair gel and face foam, and make sure I look 100% clean. If a butler looks good and is clean that means guests can feel comfortable that their villa and food are kept clean too," he said.

"I think being a butler is interesting as you are always learning the habits and behavior of each guest. I have to know what a guest likes or doesn't like. Some like to be treated very formally and others like a more relaxed relationship."

Aey added that the first day new guests arrive at the villa is the day he begins learning and noticing their behavior. "I have to remember even what food they like or dislike as I will order their food the next day.

"If guests talk about a golf match, I search the Internet to see if there is a tournament in Phuket, so I can let them know.

"On average I take care of about four or five families per month and most of them stay about five to seven days at a time."

Butlers care for one one villa, but they don't work alone, Aey said. Each villa has a maid, gardener, a swimming pool maintenance person and an engineer to make sure everything is working correctly. The butler oversees it all to make sure the guests get exactly what they want.

"If guests order a meal, it is

prepared at the villa's dining facility and I have to make sure it gets to the villa and is transferred to the villa's dishes, that the table

the guests.

"When guests are away from the villa, I call the maid to clean and if I have nothing to do I help out. I also double check the work before guests return," he added.

Aey relates an experience where a guest once called him at 4 am to order a pool table because he felt like playing a few games.

"I had to order it from Bangkok and get a fast delivery for

him. He was very surprised that we could get it done."

One of Aey's favorite experiences was looking after a famous international musician. Discretion is an important part of a butler's job – so he won't tell exactly who it was – but he said he was impressed by the person's lifestyle.

"He lived simply, ate salads and even dressed simply. At the beginning I was nervous because he is so famous, but after I was assigned to the villa, I had to do my best.

"I was very impressed with him because I took him to the lobby in the buggy once and he introduced himself to me in Thai and even praised the King in Thai."

Butlers have to look after little things that are very important, Aey says. "I have to remember guests' birthdays and anniversaries. Once I know, I let all the other staff know and when the guest walks on the grounds everyone will say "Happy Birthday" to them. We even have the staff line up in the lobby and sing "Happy Birthday".

Aey's work life is not easy as he has to arrive at the villa before the guests wake up and doesn't leave until after they are asleep.

Time passes so quickly. A butler must think ahead and anticipate what the guests want so that it will be ready and they don't have to ask," he added.

The job has also affected Aey away from work. "I now have the habit when I answer the telephone at home of saying, 'Sawasdee krap, Aey speaking. May I help you?' My friends laugh when I do that, but it is all in good humor.

"After my training I went

home and put everything in order. I dusted, got rid of fingermarks, put everything exactly where it should be," he laughed

"The best benefit of the job is that I now have friends all over the world," Aey said. "Some of the guests have offered me a plane ticket, car and even accommodation in the event that I have a chance to visit their countries

Guests even send me pictures of their kids who I cared for while they were here."

So far Aey hasn't taken any of his former guests up on their offers, but he's not discounting the possibility of becoming a world-wide butler.

e've been wrapping and strapping leather around our bodies since our cavedwelling days when we hunted for food with clubs and sticks, turning what was left over from the kill into clothes and shoes.

Although there is fierce debate among experts on when man "came down from the trees", or even whether we were in the trees in the first place, archeologists and anthropologists rarely debate on when we actually evolved into fashion conscious citizens sporting the latest leather accessories.

Leather is probably the

world's most enduring natural textile. It has gone from necessity to fashion accessory the long life of anything made from it, plus its versatility, has been proved again and again over the millennia it has been used.

An example of leather's endurance was found with "Tollund Man", a 2,000-year old body discovered in 1950 by peat cutters in Denmark. The remains were amazingly well-preserved in the bog, along with a hide belt, skin cap and two leather thongs.

At Jungceylong in Patong you'll find a wide range of leather accessories from bracelets, bangles and bags to necklaces and rings, some with colored stones and shells intertwined with the leather, making each piece naturally unique. Turquoise stones are a favorite for that Wild West, Native American look with pieces ranging from 59 to 259 baht.

At the viewpoint between Nai Harn and Nui Beach, you can sometimes find local islander "Mack" draped in long dreadlocks and some of the jewelry he's selling from the back of his beaten up pickup truck, which looks as if it's been around as long as Jack's hair has been growing.

When he's not welcoming newcomers like old friends, Mack hunts for and collects unique stones and shells to use in making his leather-bound jewelry. His jewelry is a little more expensive than some of the mass-produced leather accessories but each piece is unique and as Mack prides himself on knowing the different kinds of semi-precious stones by touch and sight, any stones used should be genuine.

Leather accessories are not just for fashion-conscious hippies though; whatever your age, it's easy enough to choose a leather design or color that suits your needs and personality, whether you are young or old, or of classical or modern taste.

If you're looking for luxurious leather accessories in a more classic style, such as key ring fobs, coin bags or bangles, then you need something Italian. Italian leather accessories by Ragazze, also in Jungceylon, come in many styles and colors with a high-class look and feel. Hip flask holders, thermos sleeves and mobile phone cases are just a few of the protective leather coverings on sale.

Other leather products that don't spring to mind but help add a touch of style are card tags, eyeshades and even a leather cooler bag. For a really posh leather product, how about a leather wine bottle bag?

Veuve Clicquot Champagne recently brought out a striking and stylish zip-up leather wine bottle sleeve that hugs the bottle in the company's familiar bold orange, but for a price that matches their expensive brand. There are much cheaper leather bottle sleeves around, but if you can afford the Champagne, you can probably afford the bag, too.

If your leather is to last a long time, it needs a little care and attention. Most leather shops will be able to sell you special leather-care cream, but other things can be done to ensure the leather lasts longer.


Simple bracelets, necklaces or rings made from untreated leather need to be kept away from water, but if you do get this kind of leather wet, you can dry it off in the sun or with a hair dryer on a gentle heat setting.

If you're going to be getting your leather wet frequently, then it's better to waterproof it with a protective spray.

Cleaning your leather items can be done by using a soft brush, clearing any dirt or dust off, then applying leather-cleaning cream.

Leather waxing cream can also be used to revive colors and keep the leather supple. Keeping leather in a dry place and not creasing it will also help it last.

hile the strong waves around Phuket spell danger for swimmers, the curls and whitecaps mean excitement and allure for the surfing crowd.

From the northern edges of Nai Yang down to the tip of Nai Harn, the waves crashing over Phuket's beaches aren't as large as at surfing hotspots around the world, but they do have a devoted following of local surfers.

From August 31 to September 2 the Phuket Surfing Contest will be held off Kata Beach and some 120 amateur surfers are expected to take part in the event.

There are several places along the western shores of Phuket to practice or to learn surfing.

Nopphasit "Kho" Bunchuai, a 27-year-old surf instructor, has been surfing for seven years in Phuket.


There are about 80 surfers in Phuket. We find great waves to surf every day together, especially our group, the Kata Krew. We always surf for about two hours if there are normal waves and three to four hours if we get two-meter waves," he

The Kata Krew, a group of friends who meet at Kata Beach, surf together for the company and to watch each other's backs. They said the best time to surf is from May to November, but any time of year can be good.

"For safe surfing, you have to wait for a suitable time and paddle through the water with friends, because friends will always watch closely and be ready to help if needed," K. Kho explained.

The Kata Krew hook up with other surfers for parties and even plan traveling surfing adventures together. "We plan to surf outside of Phuket, so we are going to the Philippines or Bali next year. We always drive around Phuket to find the best waves and stop to surf wherever we see them," K. Kho said.

K. Kho also works as a in-

shop, where new surfers or tourists can rent boards for 150 baht an hour.

Phuket's waves, he said, don't attract many professional surfers because they're not very challenging, but the small waves are good to teach beginners.

To begin, the most obvious piece of equipment is the board. "There are three kinds of surf boards," Kho explains. "There are short boards, about five to eight feet long, that are used for style; 'minimal' boards, about seven to eight feet long; and long boards, eight to 10 feet long and used for smoother surfing.'

The board, however, is not the only thing surfers have to worry about. Surfers should also use leashes or leg ropes - long flexible ties that are attached to the surfer's ankle and the board - so the board isn't lost and doesn't fly into unsuspecting swimmers.

Rash guard shirts are also structor at the Phuketsurf.com recommended apparel. These lightweight lycra shirts are designed to reflect UV rays while keeping surfers safe from jellyfish stings and coral scratches.

Photographer Caleb Henderson regularly comes down from Bangkok to surf in Phuket. He said the dangers are apparent, but nowhere near enough to stop them from surfing.

"We realize how dangerous it is but we never surf alone. There many different kinds of surfing dangers, like at Kalim Beach there are great waves, but there's also sharp coral.

"Even rash guards, the thin T-shirts with inside-out seams that keep us safe from jellyfish and board scrapes, can't quite keep us safe from that," he explained.

Boy, 24, another member of Kata Krew, said Phuket surfers are easy to identify by their Quicksilver, Billabong and Rip Curl board shorts, which, along with boards, can be bought in Jungceylon, Central Festival Phuket and sports equipment stores on

The best equipment and advice, however, can be found at the surf shops on beaches along the west coast, including Cobra near Chalong Pier and Kata Beach Surf Shop.

Wallop Nadon, the 32-yearold owner of Kata Beach Surf Shop, told the Gazette, "We have bodyboards, shortboards, 'minimal' boards and longboards for rent. Sale prices range from 16,000 to 26,000 baht, depending on the size, composition and brand."

Boards were originally very large, heavy affairs made from solid wood, but more recent technology has allowed board weight to drop as they are made with foam coated with fiberglass. "NSP and Watercooled are the

most durable surfboard brands," he said, while tropical-style surfboard wax is best for Phuket's warm temperatures.

K. Kho, who won third place in last year's surf competition in Kamala, said he is preparing for this year's competition and is busy practicing with his friends.

The competition has already attracted surfers from Japan, South Africa, Sweden, Singapore, Australia and Malaysia registered for the event. Registration closes August 31.

Despite the stiff competition, K. Kho said he will not miss out, because, as he says, "The wave is like a pretty girl that I will go meet, and it's the same feeling as getting to know her."

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
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he state of the environment has been very much on my mind. A recent news article in the *Nation* referred to it simply as "the global environmental crisis".

The cover of that album pretty much sums it up: some self-pleased chap happily sunning himself under a parasol in his backyard amidst smoke-belching mounds and industrial waste.

So is all this talk about global warming really anything new? Has the "global environmental crisis" finally arrived – or was it already here back in 1975 when that album was released?

One of the movies currently playing on local cable networks is the 2006 science fiction comedy *Idiocracy* by Mike Judge, the same man who gave the world the animated series *Beavis and Butthead* and *King of the Hill*, as well as the excellent film *Office Space*.

As in his previous works, the target of Judge's dark comedy is American society – more precisely, a dumbed-down version 500 years in the future, after intelligence levels have taken a terrible turn for the worse over numerous generations when only the feeble-minded bothered to procreate

Not surprisingly, the English language has also been dumbed down, to hilarious effect, and the most popular TV show is *Ass*, a full-feature film that consists of nothing more than a close-up view of man's buttocks farting.

Remarkably, the antecedents of some of the events that transpire in Judge's cynical vision of the future bear some resemblance to Phuket in 2007.

For a start, just about everyone in 2505 – including the US President – is decked out in round oversized pendants hanging by a chains from their necks. While it was more likely intended as a shot

at rappers like Public Enemy hype-man Flavor Flav, the style isn't too far from what is being seen a lot in these parts recently with the explosion in the trade of Jatukarm Ramathep amulets.

A major historical event referred to in *Idiocracy* is the Great Garbage Avalanche of 2505. Given the continual pile-up of garbage around the hopelessly overburdened incinerator at

Saphan Hin – and the failure of the government to take any steps to fund a second burner – one wonders how long we will have to wait for the same type of thing to happen here. Then again if you are someone trying to make a living raising fish down that way, perhaps it already has.

Yet another problem confronting humanity 500 years down the road is that energy drinks – instead of water – are being used to irrigate crops, with predictable results. It may be a bit of a stretch, but the ludicrous

inefficiency of doing that reminds me of the desalination plant in Karon that is designed to use millions of baht of electricity to pump water up out of the

sea, up a hill, treat it to drinking water quality – and then mix it in with non-potable water from tin mines before piping it to the public for consumptions. And all this is during the monsoon season, when hundreds of thousands of cubic meters of naturally purified water falls on the island every day and into the sea.

Of course, at last report the people running the desal plant hadn't figured out how to keep the plant running continuously enough to produce all the seawater they were contracted to treat. It seems to me that if they are going to go through all that effort

why stop with just pure water. Maybe they should open up a brewery there as well. The mind boggles.

El Tel afloat: With tourism, the sole key industry in Phuket there are still lots of places where you can get back to nature. Terry, former owner of UK Bar on Patong's Soi Dongtal, has fully refurbished a 38-foot fiberglass SEAT speedboat, equipped it with twin 225-hp Honda outboards and launched the El Tel's charter boat operation out of Ao Por.

Charter rates are reasonable, the crew is courte-ous and capable, and we had a pleasant afternoon trip out to Kor Kai Nai in Phang Nga Bay,

where a buffet spread was set up on the tiny beach.

The scene was such that I almost expected to see Herve Villechaize (aka Nick Nack) walk around the corner of the tiny island with a bottle of champagne on a serving tray and a towel on his arm, as he did in the *Man with the Golden Gun*.

Fortunately, the El Tel speedboat has an enormous cooler filled with drinks of every description, including Heineken for me, Spy for the ladies and soft drinks for the kids. Prices are very reasonable, at 70 baht for all small beers and 130 baht for a

can of Strongbow cider.

As I snorkeled around tiny Kor Kai Nai, a small bird kept diving down on me, threatening to peck me – maybe he thought I was Moby Dick, the great white whale. After a few swoops he would retreat to his tree back on the island. What the hell is his problem? I wondered. I thought menacing birds only appeared in Alfred Hitchcock movies, not real life.

Later I realized it was probably a swiftlet, sick of people clamoring up the rock and stealing its nest to make bird's nest soup – can't say I blame him

El Tel's service is well set up with life preservers and it is ideal for everything from family outings to booze cruises. Prices for a full day out – 9:30 am to about 5:30 pm – start somewhere in the vicinity of 25,000 baht, though the actual cost depends on where you want to go and how much fuel it will take to get there.

The El Tel boat has enough fuel capacity and fresh water (200 liters) to go all the way out to the Similan Islands for a full day of snorkeling, though at this time of year it might be best to stick to Phang Nga Bay.

A tale of lightning-fast heroism

ampton Sides has produced a cleverly plotted, deeply researched, brilliantly written account of a once-famous raid during World War II that has long been

Ghost Soldiers (Anchor Books, New York, 2002, 344pp) is the story of a January 1945 rescue mission by 121 Army Rangers of 513 American prisoners of war in the Philippines, emaciated survivors of the Bataan Death March who were snatched to freedom from right under the noses of thousands of Japanese troops.

A prologue tells of the grim fate of another group of prisoners of war, 150 slave laborers on an airstrip in Palawan who were herded by their Japanese captors into air raid shelters, doused with gasoline and set alight.

Survivors were hunted down and shot but a few managed to escape to American lines. Fears that another massacre would happen at Cabanatuan Camp in Luzon led to the launch of the commando raid to free them.

Based on a host of interviews, Sides alternates the accounts of the three-year ordeal of the prisoners of war with the preparations and flawless execution of the rescue mission by the Rangers and their Filipino guerrilla allies.

The Filipinos were essential to the success of the mission, providing food, transport, intelligence and firepower.

While the Americans entered the camp to free the prisoners, the guerrillas blocked Japanese reinforcements from




coming from both approaches of a nearby highway. They killed hundreds. Despite the "Asia for Asians" propaganda, they had suffered bitterly under Japanese occupation and entered the battle against the Imperial Army with vengeful glee.

"They fired with a hatred and a vengeance that had steeped in three years of mostly unexceptional resentments," Sides writes.

"For the Rangers, the killing was a necessary and perhaps momentarily enjoyable but not especially gratifying aspect of the mission; for the Filipinos it was personal, tribal, national; they considered it a blessing of fate, long overdue, to strike back at the invaders with all they could bring to bear."

On the other side of the wire, Sides carefully chronicles the boredom, starvation, disease, random killings and psychological torment of the POWs.

"Rumormongering was an assiduously practised sport around camp," he



reports. "The rumors spread even faster than disease. At times it seemed that Cabanatuan was composed of 50 percent pathological liars and 50 percent naifs who'd believe anything. People made stuff up for the fun of it – just to see what would happen, just to track the stories and marvel at how they would warp and twist and

Many prisoners owed their lives to an unlikely savior. Code-named "High Pockets", American Claire Philips passed herself off as a Filipina of Italian extraction named Dorothy Clara Fluentes.

She ran a racy Manila nightclub for

Japanese officers called the Tsubaki Club. Here she ran a Mata Hari-type spy ring and smuggled lifesaving medicine and other supplies to the POW camp. Even though she was captured and tortured by the Japanese secret police, she managed to survive the war.

The plot rises in suspense to the moment the Rangers open fire on the Japanese barracks, pillboxes and guard towers of Cabanatuan Camp. Sides describes the moment brilliantly:

"If the slaughter could have been viewed without sound, one might have been disposed to call it beautiful. In an instant, the entire fence line lit up in a corona of frenetic glitters soon numbering in the thousands, each burst crisp and discrete against the black night. The orange flashes came in pleasingly random and inscrutable patterns like the semaphore of fireflies in a dense forest. Occasionally gold stars streaked across the field and ended abruptly in warm blooms of yellow and vermilion, leaving the sky trails of

"Yet the sounds, shrill and fulminant, were at odds with the majestic visuals – splintering bamboo, the whine of stray slugs, glass fracturing into shards, splatters of pulversized dirt. The blunt sound bullets make when they enter flesh, sending up aerosol clouds of blood."

And the prisoners were suddenly off on a Life March rather than a Death March, 30 miles to the American lines and freedom. This is a rousing tale of heroism gone right.



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New bus station offers opportunity

The announcement from the Phuket Provincial Transport Office (PPTO) that the agency is one step closer to moving Phuket's main bus terminal outside Phuket City is long-overdue good news for the island's public transport network.

While Phuket's tourism and real estate sectors have surged ahead in recent decades and swelled the island's population, retarded development in public transport over the same period has left the public bus system woefully inadequate to meet the needs of Phuket residents – let alone the millions of tourists who travel here from around the globe.

Thai and foreign tourists consistently name the island's transport syndicates and the unsafe, overpriced services they offer as chief complaints about their holidays in Phuket. Some tourists become so fed up with the situation that they end their holidays here vowing never to return. This hurts the island's image and its entire tourism industry, including the transport sector itself.

Local residents also suffer. With no other option, they are forced to buy motorcycles or cars, thus creating traffic, noise and road dangers. Our collective failure to establish a good public transport system also results in a waste of fuel and unnecessarily high greenhouse gas emissions for the size of the population.

If the PPTO gets the required funding from the Transport Ministry – a big *if* given the current political situation – the provincial government should take the opportunity to help break the strangle-hold these syndicates continue to have on public transport.

This needs to be done even though it will fly in the face of the speculators who are no doubt rubbing their palms together in greedy anticipation of how they will use the new station to their own benefit, legally or otherwise.

It is clear that although the plan to retain the old bus station as the main depot for local buses, vans and *songtaew* will no doubt benefit many Phuket City residents, it will do nothing for people who want to reach west coast destinations by public transport from other parts of the island.

The new station needs a bus service linking it to the west coast from the outset, before the syndicates have a chance to muscle their way in and prevent it from happening.

Thailand's economy depends on tourism and it is obvious that as the baht rises, many potential visitors will decide to go elsewhere.

Expats retired here on fixed incomes will also be hurt and many will have to cut back on purchases, while some will not be able to meet the retirement visa fees and be forced to leave.

I have been coming to Thailand for six years now, staying for periods of five to eight months. It is costing me 20% more to stay in Thailand now and I cannot afford it.

I had plans to buy a condo or house, plans that I have now been forced to abandon. In the six months I will stay this year I will contribute 500,000 baht to the Thai economy.

If the baht keeps rising I will not be back next year and there are many like myself considering the same.

All of these factors are going to pull money out of Thailand's economy. Prices in Thailand have not gone down relative to the rising baht. My rent remains the same; the price of food remains the same; and the motorcycle I was going to purchase has remained at the same price too.

All these factors, along with the import/export problems, will begin to have detrimental effects on Thailand as a whole. Of course some individuals will benefit, but Thailand will see its economy slip away.

Thailand cannot survive on the few wealthy tourists or expats who come here. Adjustments have to be made in visa and commodity pricing and baht controls need to be implemented.

After reading the story about Frank Witzel (*Gazette*, p. 1, July 14), I felt compelled to write this letter. Frank is a good person, and so say many Thai people who know him.

After I retired, he hired Thai architect Pytoon Tongcheed, who had previously worked for me, and gave the engineering work to K. Pytoon's brother, K. Bantherng. They worked from his sketches and drew the plans and signed for the building permit.

Frank did provide sketches of the project, but every client provides the architect with sketches of some sort, otherwise the architect would not have a clue what to design. Every architect and engineer must sign the plans he draws up, and this is forbidden to a foreigner – but Frank did not sign off on the plans, so he is not the architect.

When he was arrested the authorities said he was "working" because he was showing where to lay PVC pipes, but as an investor, surely he is allowed to point where he wants the pipes. Otherwise not a single investor would be able to even visit the site of their investment – because this would be called *work*.

I wonder how the officers knew exactly when and where Frank would be at the site? I had a work permit for five years and I was never visited at work.

Frank's work permit was revoked because the accountant was late in filing the renewal application, which was due on the Friday because the Labor Office was closed on the bank holiday Monday.

I visited Frank in jail. My wife and I brought him some decent food. Frank told me that his lawyer suggested pleading guilty so he could get out of prison quickly and that the fine would be about 3,000 baht. I told Frank not to do so, but he said that he would reach out for any straw to climb out of that prison hole.

When I visited him again two days later, three lawyers, each from a different firm, were there for Frank to sign over what money he had left in Thailand – and to pay lawyers' bills. It must have been the most humiliating experience of his life.

Please tell the press to print this in Thai as well. Many Thais know Frank is a nice guy.

ne of the main reasons for our visit to Japan was to promote tourism to Phuket. This time we visited Fukuoka, Tokyo and Osaka.

We are trying to open a direct flight route between Fukuoka and Phuket. Thai Airways had been asked to serve this route, but after the tsunami the plan was put

At the moment, Thai Airways is not ready to serve this route because of a shortage of aircraft, so we have suggested that Bangkok Airways take up this route instead and they will start from May next year.

This new development will prove very beneficial to tourism because Japanese tourists have very high purchasing power – one of the top five by nationality among tourists who visit Phuket.

What they need is for us to make it easy for them to come here. There have never been direct flights from Japanese cities to Phuket before.

Despite the fact that they want to come to Phuket, the transits make it inconvenient with them. Usually Japanese people are very efficient with their time, so this development has been very satisfactory.

The overall number of tourists coming to Phuket is projected to rise at the end of this year and again next year. From what I have heard from hotel owners, bookings for this coming high season have been quite good, so if we do not have any unforeseen negative developments, this high season should be very good.

We got some very positive feedbacks from the road shows. We held them in the big cities in Japan and in each city the turnout was very good. Fukuoka, being the smallest of the three cit-

During the road show we presented the Japanese audience with the image of Phuket, including all the developments currently underway and planned, along with facts and figures. After each seminar, we opened the forum for questions and discussion.

Apart from the Phuket government officials who attended, there were a number of private companies who sent representatives to travel with us to promote their companies.

These included many golf clubs in Phuket, as well as in Phang Nga, Krabi and even Chiang Mai. Many large hotels in Bangkok also sent representatives, so there were a lot of people out there doing good, professional marketing work.

Another reason we had for visiting Japan this time was to

strengthen Thai-Japanese relations. As we had a lot of generous donations from Japan after the tsunami, one purpose was to show them how their aid money had been spent.

We distributed copies of videos documenting the success of post-tsunami reconstruction and development projects.

Trash incinerator at Saphan **Hin:** Initially we were waiting for the central government to authorize a budget to build a new incinerator to serve Phuket. We have been waiting for some time, since the previous government.

The situation has changed significantly since this government stepped in because there has been no clear assignment of the state budget and the political situation is still somewhat unclear.

We are not sure whether there will be an election soon or not. At this point, I can clearly state that there is no budget available to carry out this project or any other megaprojects, so we have to help ourselves for the moment. One way to solve this may be to invite the private sector to invest in this project.

There were recently some representatives from a British company that expressed interest in investing in an incinerator in

Instead of building something like what we already have here in Phuket, they are prepared to invest in an incinerator with newer, more advanced British technology that could turn some of the rubbish into useful products – such as tiles and fertilizer – while at the same time generating electricity.

This is among the most recent plans that I have received from investors and is a possible way forward. We asked him the company to present their ideas to local municipality authorities so that they can assess the feasibility of the project.

The advantage of this type

of incinerator is that it does not cost much and requires very little space to build, yet has a large incineration capacity. It could be very helpful in curbing the growing waste disposal problem on this island, which is already on the verge of crisis.

Convention center saga: We have been discussing plans for an international convention facility in Phuket for a long time. We should soon be able to finalize the location where this facility will be built. We have two options concerning the land to be used: government-owned land or private land. Most of our choices are in the northern part of the island, near Mai Khao Beach.

I think there is a good possibility that we will be using government-owned land because it provides everything we need and the size of the plot is also just right. The sea views from the plot are also very impressive.

The reason we are planning to build this center in the northern part of the island is so that it will be easier for people from neighboring provinces such as Krabi and Phang Nga to reach the facility.

There are also plans that are underway for a TAT-managed sports complex built on 300 rai of land situated very close to the convention center, so all these facilities will be very closely linked to each other for convenience.

The location we have planned at the moment is quite good, but we still must hold a meeting with the private sector to see if they can come up with a better plan or location. We will give them a chance to present alternative locations and then we will make a comparison.

After we have all the suggestions at hand, we will invite private investors to come and invest in this project. If they would like to use government-owned land we are more than happy to provide them with it, however if

they want to use private land that is fine as well.

Using private land plots may increase the overall cost of this project because land prices in Phuket are very high, but it is up to the private investors to decide. This may not be a problem.

For example, one of the private enterprises that have shown interest in investing in this facility is ING Funds. Being a multinational corporation, it will not be a problem for them to raise the funds necessary for the project.

Other investment plans: There are other investors that I have met who want to invest in projects across Phuket. For example, Ripley Entertainment, Inc., have made plans to build an aquarium here. There have also been plans from foreign investors to build cable cars, perhaps linking Karon to Patong.

Most investment projects are directed towards tourism. however sometimes I have to inform investors who come to me with their plans that environmental protection laws here are quite complicated and stringent.

It may be hard to realize many of the projects here because there are many laws in place and many government agencies involved. There are laws protecting forests and national parks, even those governing how cities need to be planned, including height limitations for buildings.

They may have to gather all their information and resources and present their projects to the central government and see if they will accept it.


Beach safety: This morning [July 16] I attended a press conference on the recent spate of drownings. The department in charge say that they have all the necessary precautions and warning systems in place. We are not being lax on our safety standards.

Tourists who drown at beaches go swimming despite warnings against it and in the most recent cases, they were swimming outside designated swim zones as well.

We also have beach guards on duty all the time, but during the monsoon season the sea is very rough and accidents happen.

The authorities have asked hotels to help inform their guests about beach safety and the rules and regulations as well.

It is not just safety on beaches that we are worried about. Phuket's roads are also quite dangerous with accidents happening on a regular basis. Most accidents are related to motorbikes. Law enforcement has to be tightened here.



Can I drive a minibus in Thailand?

A group of 10 friends will visit Phuket in September and we would

like to rent an 11-seater minibus to tour around in. Is it legal for a foreigner to drive a rental minibus? Or must they hire a Thai driver?

I asked a well-known rental company and they said that a foreigner is allowed to drive a rental minibus, but I remember reading a few years ago about a European



being fined by police when he tried to drive off Phuket in similar circumstances.

Chatchawarn Ngarmtup, chief of the Phuket Provincial Transport Office, replies:

Foreigners are allowed to drive rental minibuses in Thailand, if they have the appropriate driving license, which is different from a normal car license.

The PPTO will not issue a foreigner a full Thai bus driving license, but we will issue a permit that will allow them temporarily to drive a rental minibus if they can prove to us that they have been issued a bus driving license in their home country.

To receive the permit the foreigner must bring a current, homecountry bus-driving license to the PPTO office in Saphan Hin. If no one in the group has such a license, you will have to hire a driver.

Why killing dogs is a bad idea

couple of weeks ago I received an inquiry from a Taiwan-based Reuters reporter about stray dog control practices in different parts of Asia.

His question was why, despite Taiwan capturing scores of strays and euthanizing them after seven days (often by methods such as electrocution and drowning), there were still as many, if not more, dogs than ever.

He wanted to know what other methods were used in Asia and whether any were success-

The fact is that until the dogs are recognized as an ecological phenomenon, and the relevant ecological principles are understood, no eradication effort of the type used in Taiwan will ever succeed.

First of all, the term "stray" is incorrect. A "stray" dog is a dog that once had a home but strayed, or was dumped.

Most of the dogs at large in Asian cities are street dogs. They were born on the streets and will live their whole lives on the streets. They may not have had an ancestor who was a pet in 4,000 years.

They often interbreed with the pet population and cast-off ex-pets augment their gene pool, but the basic population reservoir are well-habituated, quasi-feral animals, who mostly understand how to live among humans, yet were never and will never be part of a human household.

Second, street dogs have a role as the largest scavenger and opportunistic predator that can coexist with humans in an urban habitat. Predators larger than street dogs might eat people. Street dogs are just big enough to eat rats, chase monkeys and be major consumers of human food waste.

Rival species include pigs, monkeys and feral cats. Dogs usually win out because pigs don't do well on paved streets, monkeys are afraid of dogs and feral



cats tend to thrive in places where the habitat no longer supports dogs, but can support smaller, more agile rodent predators in equivalent biomass.

Remove dogs from an urban habitat without changing the habitat to support fewer animals and you get feral cats replacing the dogs at a ratio of about three cats to one dog, as happened in the US and Hong Kong; or incursions of monkeys, as has routinely occurred in India and Costa Rica, parts of Malaysia, and even Phuket, among other places; or pigs, if the roads are mostly dirt.

On the whole, dogs are the easiest species for humans to live

Dogs breed at about half the

rate of feral cats and pigs, albeit faster than monkeys. They will also breed back up to the carrying capacity of the habitat (like most mammals) within a single reproductive cycle if at least a third of the population remain to breed, which is why the traditional methods of "control" don't work.

Thailand has tried many methods in the past and all have failed. Poisoning used to be widespread in Bangkok before HM The King requested that the practice cease, though it still goes on unofficially in some areas, including parts of Phuket.

Large dog pounds were set up around Bangkok and other places including here. No official euthanasia policy exists at these pounds, though with little food and no medical treatment the dogs still die through injury and disease.

Despite all this, the number of street dogs never changes.

India is the only country in Asia to have achieved success at street dog control through its ABC program, which is basically the same "capture, neuter, release" that is used here in Phuket by the Soi Dog Foundation.

Not every Indian city has an ABC program, but those that do, such as Chennai, Jaipur, Visakhapatnam and Ahmedabad, are achieving excellent results.

Phuket too is starting to see the results of the Soi Dog Foundation's program. Censuses in some parts of the island indicate that the street dog population has fallen by more than half, and anybody who has lived here for three years or more should be able to notice that there are fewer dogs

around, and those that are here are in better condition.

The reason is quite simply that more than 16,000 have now been sterilized by the Soi Dog Foundation alone.

The only way to effectively reduce a dog population is there-

1) Reduce the reproductive capacity of the dogs by sterilizing at least 70% of them. You won't see any reduction whatsoever until you cross the 70% threshold. Then you will see the numbers suddenly start falling, and falling ever faster as your sterilization percentage rises to 80%. That is what is happening

Hardly anyone ever goes beyond 80%, not because it isn't

possible, but because people begin to realize that they'd much rastreet dogs than have pigs, feral cats and mon-

keys, or worse – a plague of rats.

If the habitat is changed enough to eliminate the food sources, the dogs disappear anyway, typically receding to just the market areas before disappearing altogether.

2) Reduce the carrying capacity of the habitat, through better refuse containment and removal. You don't need to read the "Trashing Phuket" column of the Gazette to know that Phuket has a waste problem. Not that many years ago Phuket had no garbage removal and many rural areas of Thailand still don't.

EUTHANASIA IS NOT AN OPTION: These young dogs in Phuket's dog pound, if they do not find new homes, will live out their lives in relatively comfortable captivity. Since all of them are sterilized as a matter of policy, none will add to the island's dog population.

It is normal for people to dump garbage in unauthorized piles if they are living somewhere where there is no garbage removal. Even where it is organized, the majority of Thai dustbins are open containers that make it even easier for scavengers to raid.

Barely a week goes by without me get-

ting at least one call from a resident or hotel complaining about street dogs in their area and asking for someone to remove them.

What they fail to realize, is that if that dog is removed another will simply take its place as long as a food source exists to sustain it.

What they need to do is clean up their street or hotel so that there is no food for the animals, which will then go away.

Some areas of Phuket still round up dogs, but surveys show that the number of street dogs in any area does not change. It is far better to leave them there, sterilized, so they can protect their

large effect.

The markets and temple fairs are full of cute puppies that have been brought here to sell.

If they don't sell they are simply dumped at the nearest wat, and many that are sold are allowed to breed or dumped when the owner realizes that puppies don't stay cute and small for long.

Phuket has the opportunity to set an example for the rest of Asia in dog control, but has left it to the charities to carry out the operation. Financially they cannot carry on forever.

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hen Bill Gates first coined the term 'information at your fingertips" at the Comdex computer expo in 1990, he was talking about document exchange and embedded objects.

I recently looked up the text of his prezo (that's "presentation" in Microspeak) and now wonder what the hell he was talking about.

With the proliferation of the Internet and the excellent search engines available, we can truly say that we have information at our fingertips – with little thanks to the hundreds of millions of US dollars that Microsoft has invested on search-related technologies.

I'm going to give some very basic tips on using search engines like Google. The point I want to pound into your head is to get into the habit of using them; Internet search is an incredible problemsolving and productivity-enhanc-

When I mentor junior software developers in Southeast Asia, I am continuously blown away by how so few of them instinctively use Internet search engines as their primary problemsolving tool, preferring instead to annoy the guy sitting in the next cubicle.

If there's a problem or query, there is a 99.9% chance that someone has encountered the same problem, come up with a solution and made it available for others on the Internet. All you have to do is look for it.

Here are a few examples from the past week in which I used a search engine to get information I wanted:

1. A friend forwarded me an email message sent to him and asked me if it was legit. Within minutes using Internet search I found out that it was a malicious Trojan horse program that would install itself on his computer and take it over if he clicked on the link.

2. I talked to a friend who

was at hospital with his child who was diagnosed with a certain illness. Within minutes I determined that the illness was contagious and that he needed to contact the daycare center and noti-

- 3. Watching a sporting event, I wondered "who is this dude?" and within minutes I had the take on his entire sporting career and life history.
- 4. My new mobile phone didn't function exactly the same as the last one I had of the same model; within five minutes I had downloaded the user manual and I had my answer.
- 5. Some Thai history: the 1992 military coup and the 1997
- 6. Lyrics to a song playing in my head; in this case, "Daydream Believer" by the Monkees (for you Gen-Yers and on-thecusp Gen-Xers who don't know who the Monkees were, I was in Baghdad when you were in Dad's bag).
- 7. I found out who did the voices for the Little Mermaid movie that my kids were watch-
- 8. When I'm watching a movie on TV I often miss the title screen. If I'm curious about the movie's name I enter in the character names, an actor's names or even a particularly memorable line from the movie to get results, usually from the Internet Movie Database (IMDB.com). On that website you can also search for movies that two actors appeared in together, further

limiting your search.

9. Wondering the origin of the phrase "dead ringer", which is worthy of an explanation

Ingesting lead from pewter caused a lengthy, unconscious state that was often mistaken for death... A bell above ground was attached to a string which ran down into the coffin and was attached to the wrist of the deceased.

Someone was hired to keep watch on the bell to quickly dig up the person if the bell rang. The "dead ringer" was "saved by the bell" by someone working the "graveyard shift" (http://www. suite101.com/article.cfm/history_ bizarre_mysterious/66394).

Of course, you can't believe everything you read on the Internet and you have to get a second and third opinion when appropriate.

I use Google to search instead of the other search engines only because when I started using search engines Google was head and heels above the others.

Now there are other excellent search engines like Yahoo and Altavista and even "supersearch engines" like www. dogpile.com that incorporate all of the top search engines into

The examples I am going to use are for Google search, but if you think that Google is the new Evil Empire or for some other reason don't want to use it, these tips can generally be applied to any of the other popular search engines.

Google Search Thailand (www.google.co. th) is the home page for all of my Web browsers; if I want information specific to Thailand, then I click on the

button to search "Pages from Thailand" instead of "The Web" to narrow the focus and improve the quality of the search results.

First, configure your Preferences. The important ones are

speed things up I use 100 instead of the default number of 10. Another important option is "Language preference". I am semi-fluent in a

few languages, so I choose English and those languages; if your better half is Thai and you are searching together and searching for information in Thailand, then choosing English and Thai would be your best bet.

Words entered in the search engine subject box are case insensitive, meaning that "PHU-KET", "Phuket" and "pHuKeT" are all the same.

In math terms, the default is "logical AND", meaning that if you enter "phuket gold shops", it will return documents with all of those words in them.

Google and other search algorithms place the most importance on the first word you enter. Those that follow are taken to be of decreasing importance. So "phuket gold shops" will give you different results than "gold shops phuket".

Plus, there's another factor: how close together the words you've entered: the closer the words are together in the document, the higher the search result.

Common prepositions and pronouns such as "the", "then", "with", "a", "you" and "me" are disregarded by default.

Words that you include toward the end of your entry might not be included in the search results, so if you want to force Google to include a term, you need to use the plus sign before that word: "phuket gold shops +kar-

If you want a logical "OR", "phuket town OR city gold shops" will give you results that include both "Phuket Town" and "Phuket City".

One of my oft-used tactics is to exclude terms by using the minus sign. Suppose I want gold shops on Phuket Island but not in Phuket City (or Town): "phuket gold shops -town -city".

To force a search for an exact phrase, put double quotes around it: "Manchester City Football Club". This will help to exclude websites about the city of Manchester.

For all of the hints, tips and uses of such operators, check out http://www.google.co.th/intl/en/ help/basics.html and the links from there.

Google also caches its pages. This means that for a certain amount of time – I am guessing it's in months or years – it keeps a copy of the Web sites that it has crawled through and cataloged.

So, if you click on a link that is a search result and you get a "Page not found" message or something like that, check the search result for the underlined word "Cached".

Click on that and if it's your lucky day you'll still find what you are looking for.

This feature is particularly "Search results per page". To useful if a company has screwed

up and posted content that they later pulled from their website. If you want to retrieve that information many times it will have been cached and

thus still available.

Google also has a section for image searches that use the same search functionality, only it returns - duh – images and photographs instead of words. As they say, a picture can be worth a thousand words.


For example, do you know what a "gable" is? An online dictionary might tell you it's "the generally triangular section of wall at the end of a pitched roof".

Confused? Just enter the word "gable" into the subject box at www.images.google.co.th and see for yourself.

As I said at the beginning of this column, the biggest trick by far is getting into the habit of using Internet search engines if you aren't doing so already.

If you have the Internet at your fingertips, there's really no excuse for not finding the answer to any query less cosmic than, "What is the meaning of life?"

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Fed plays a waiting game

he current weakness of the US dollar was expected – it was really just a case of when, not if. The US currency is at a 16year low against the Australian dollar, a 26-year low against the pound sterling and a record low against the euro. The euro, having been introduced only in 1999, is still a relative newcomer.


All these currencies have one thing in common – their domestic interest rates are expected to rise further, whereas current US interest rates are firmly on hold.

The US Central Bank (the Federal Reserve) is currently in a position where it cannot raise interest rates without risking future economic growth, and it cannot reduce them without running into the possibility of fueling inflation. Instead, the US Central Bank is taking the sensible route and holding steady, waiting for further economic data to give an indication as to which direction the economy is heading. This hold on interest rate movements may last for a long time.

Thailand and many other Asian countries found out in 1997 that when current account deficits eventually become too large for too long, a day of reckoning is imminent.

The US, however, is in an entirely different situation from the emerging Asian economies of the late '90s. The current account deficits are impacting the value of the dollar and it is likely that the dollar will fall further. That is the nature of markets – they have a natural tendency to exaggerate price movements both when rising and falling.

Speculators will play these currency movements to the absolute limits; they are in the busi-



ness of making profits. This is neither evil nor a conspiracy – it is the free enterprise system at work. The same speculators are just as happy to profit from a rising dollar. In reality, the majority of currency-trading systems are computer-driven and use emotionless trading techniques.

The US dollar situation differs from the Asian predicament in 1997 in several other respects. The US is still the largest economy in the world and commodities are almost all priced in US dollars. This means that regardless of normal currency, supply and demand, the world uses the US dollar as a pricing mechanism and trading currency for everything from oil to gold, lumber to corn.

Another important factor is that the average American is completely unconcerned about the value of his currency, and to a great extent this applies to every US administration.

For global investors, this is a good example of the importance of relating to a base currency. For US dollar "thinking" investors, 2007 has been a very pleasant year, especially if they've had exposure to international assets. There was profit to be made in most US assets and international assets but the latter has given an added bonus in the shape of currency gains. The reverse was true where international investors had exposure to US assets. However, as with all generalizations, there are always exceptions and sometimes they come from unexpected sources.

Earlier this year, this column featured the AMT Futures IQS fund, which is denominated in US dollars. This fund has had an outstanding, if volatile, track record. Earlier in 2007, the fund experienced losses. Its targeted areas of investment, ranging from soft commodities to hard commodities and currencies, created a total of 14 investment choices.

In June, the benefits of moving-currency markets saw the fund gain 30.33% in a single month followed by further gains in July. This was one of those rare

funds that produces returns for investors in any currency. But regardless of their "home" currency, investors have to be patient and able to live with the volatility.

Although the fund is denominated in US dollars, the majority of the profits in 2007 were achieved by selling the US dollar short. In 2006, the majority of the profits were derived from falling oil prices in the second half of the year. Being an emotionless and computer-driventrading absolute-return fund, the only things that are unprofitable are static or trendless markets.

There is often speculation on what would happen if the main foreign holders of the US dollar – China, Japan, and so on – were to suddenly shift their holdings to other currencies. The answer is twofold: The value of the dollar would drop and long-term interest rates in the US would rise. The latter would certainly lead to a slowdown in the US economy and could even cause a recession.

Short of an extremely serious diplomatic spat between the US and China or Japan, however, this is unlikely to happen. A slowing US economy and, even worse, a US recession, would see a marked slowdown in China and Japan's primary export

primary export
markets. China has no vested interest in hurting its largest customer; rather the reverse.

This does not mean that there will be a cessation of verbal sparring between the US and China, and the American politicians saying that China is holding its currency at artificially low levels have a valid point. China has the world's largest foreign exchange reverse which, when combined with rising interest rates, should make its currency rise substantially in value.

Since implementing a "managed float" of its currency from a fixed rate of 8.28 yuan/US dollar in August 2005 to the current range of around 7.55 yuan/US dollar, China has been moving in the right direction, albeit at a slow pace. This is even more important when you take into account that the yuan was believed to be 40% undervalued against the US dollar in 2005.

China – playing a domestic balancing act – needs to keep its currency competitive to maintain the strong levels of economic growth necessary to create tens of millions of new jobs every year to cater for the host of new laborers moving from cities to rural areas. The currency is still not convertible and Beijing lacks the confidence to move faster on this issue. This creates distortions in the Chinese economy, with vast amounts of liquidity sloshing around, leading to massive assetprice inflation in the stock mar-

ket and real estate.


The Chinese government is aware that it needs to cater to the economic aspirations of its population to avoid civil unrest because the country does not have the pressure valve of a democracy. Japan, on the other hand, is the beneficiary of the yen "carry trade", which

is keeping the value of the currency at much lower levels than would otherwise be the case.

Sluggish-to-low economic growth allows the Bank of Japan (Central Bank) to maintain low interest rates. This gives the export sector of Japan a much more pleasant trading environment than would otherwise be the case.

The yen "carry trade" has another benefit in that it stops trading partners from being able to criticize Japan for currency manipulation. The first-world economies – the US, Europe, and so on – are also beneficiaries of the Chinese currency because they are importing deflation. Without the effect of cheap Chinese goods, their domestic inflation levels would be significantly higher than they are. Sometimes benefits come from unexpected places!

Lehman **Bros backs B2** billion resort in Rawai

RAWAI: Hotel Properties Ltd (HPL), which is listed on the Singapore stock exchange, through a wholly-owned subsidiary has entered into a joint-venture agreement with Lehman Brothers Pan Asian Investments to form a 50:50 joint hotel property venture in order to develop and construct a luxury hotel on freehold land in Rawai.

The exact location of the site was not disclosed, though the Gazette has learned that negotiations are underway with the Four Seasons hotel chain to manage the resort after it is built.

HPL and Lehman Bros intend to acquire the land for a total consideration of approximately 2 billion baht, according to a media release on the company's

Through Four Seasons' Bangkok office, Four Seasons Senior Vice-President (Operations) for Pacific-Asia region, Neil Jacobs, confirmed that Four Seasons is in conversations with both groups regarding a possible management contract.

The HPL website stipulates that the project is still subject to receipt of the necessary approvals from the relevant authorities in Thailand.

On February 1, Four Seasons opened its fourth property in Thailand at Laem Yai on Koh Samui. The resort features 60 villas built on stilts set among a former orchard.

"Thailand has always been such a draw for tourists from all over the world," said Jacobs.

"Guests to our other properties in Thailand have been asking for a beach resort, so this new property in Koh Samui will broaden the experience we can offer our guests in this part of the world."

Land Office expert offers tips on leases for foreigners

PHUKET CITY: Foreigners and locals confused by Thai property laws were given an insight into key issues when the Phuket Real Estate Club (PREC) and Delice Thai Co Ltd hosted a forum titled "Problems and Solutions in the Phuket Real Estate Market" at Royal Phuket City Hotel on July

Among the speakers at the event was Thawan Thimasarn, director of the Subdivision of the Bureau of Standard Land Document Issuance.

K. Thawan said that while foreigners may not buy land in Thailand, they may lease it legally for up to 30 years.

If the lessor or the lessee dies, however, the lease is rendered void and the Thai inheritor of the land is not obliged to sign a new lease.

Speaking to the *Gazette* on July 20 about some of the problems foreign lessees may come across in Thailand, K. Thawan said that foreigners are able to safeguard their investments by

lease.

The clause should state that the lessor must add a clause into his will stating that if he dies, then the designated heir of the land must honor the agreement of the current lease in writing or forfeit his inheritance rights.

adding a rider clause into a however, are reluctant to put money into projects on land they lease in Phuket because there is

no guarantee that subsequent 30-

year "rollover" leases will be granted, he added.

K. Thawan said that the solution to this predicament is to draw up a separate contract stating that successive leases not exceeding 30 years each will be granted.

A rider clause could be added to the contract so that in the event of death of the Thai lessor, the current lease and successive leases would be hon-

Leases and their clauses expire after a given period of time, which is why separate contracts are sometimes needed, added K. Thawan.

Other notable speakers at the July 14 forum included PREC President Phummisak Hongsyok, Eric Tomlin, secretary to the Association of Phuket Property Agents, and John Magee, publisher of the *Phuket Gazette*.





Paddling with a purpose

RAWAI: Tired but triumphant, seafaring adventurer Marco Reinard arrived at Rawai Pier, the point he'd started from 36 hours earlier, just after 5 pm July 19.

Marco, originally from Luxembourg, had just completed a 200-kilometer paddle around Phuket Island in an 18-foot kayak, clocking an average speed of 10kmh.

A crowd of excited youngsters, well-wishers, friends and media turned out to greet a sunburned Marco as he arrived at the pier and raised his oars above his head in a victorious salute before hauling his kayak up the steps.

Tired and dehydrated from his arduous mission, Marco sat next to his kayak, removed his sunglasses and took off his gloves to check the blisters on his hands. His lower back had been rubbed raw by the lengthy stint in the single seat of his kayak, but Marco was keen to tell reporters why he had taken on the challenge.

"I do this kind of thing because I want people to realize that we have to stop using our lakes, rivers and oceans as trash cans. This is not just a local issue; it is an international problem as tides and currents take pollution everywhere and it affects every single one of us," said Marco.

Talking about the children gathered around him, Marco added, "My main concern is whether kids like these will still have clean waters to make a livelihood when they reach my age. If we don't act now, then it may be too late to help them in the future."

Apart from Marco's modern, five-meter kayak *Sequel*, made by New Zealand company Challenge, the only high tech equipment he took with him was

his mobile phone, kept in a waterproof pouch. For navigation, Marco said he just "kept Phuket on the left".

After heading northeast from Rawai in calm waters at 5 am on Wednesday morning, treacherous conditions along the west coast forced Marco to head for land and rest for the night at a small bay just past Surin Beach as darkness, fatigue and unpredictable waves made it too dangerous to continue.

"By around 8 pm on Wednesday evening, the waves were perilously high. With no light from the shore, it was so dark that I couldn't see the waves coming and I really didn't know where I was, so I made the decision to stop for the night."

Continuing south the next day, Marco had to contend with even more powerful waves until he reached calmer, shallower waters around Patong. He said the final stretch of his paddle-pow-

ered marathon was the most tiring as he had to fight strong currents around Nai Harn before finally reaching Rawai.

Marco said his secret was to drink a lot of water, while he ate just one dish of pasta and some yogurt during his journey.

For Marco, this relatively short human-powered voyage is just the latest in a continuous environmental awareness campaign, one that he plans to eventually make into a video documentary.

As an active environmentalist and documentary filmmaker for the last 30 years, Marco said, "My ultimate goal is to make a video documentary highlighting the plight of indigenous people and how they are forced to cope with the encroachment of modern civilization."

He is also a part of Green International Productions South-east Asia (Gipsea), a group of film-makers who raise funds for education and the support of indigenous people's rights throughout the world.

Marco is planning a trip in November from Mergui, Burma, to Taiwan in a Hobie Cat – a small cabinless catamaran – that he estimates will take him about 100 days, including stops in Pattaya and Phuket.

Marco won't be alone this time, however, as a Sea Gypsy friend from Koh Phi Phi will share the helm with him.

Local tour operator Hotel Travel is sponsoring Marco's campaign.

Fredy Muenger, chief information officer for Hotel Travel, was also at the pier to welcome Marco and spoke admirably of Marco's commitment to raising awareness of global environmental issues.

"Marco is dedicated to a worthwhile cause and we are proud to be helping him achieve more international recognition in this and future adventures," said Fredy.

PCU went on to win with an over to spare after some valuable runs from David Ogden (12 not out) and Mark Whetton (17 not out).



Staying power

We live on a fairly big island, and we drive on big roads – roads that seem to be getting bigger on a daily basis, for no particular reason.

Does every carriageway in Phuket need to become a four-lane superhighway?

This is supposed to be a tropical island paradise, not a paradise for those who want to drive faster or find even more lanes to drive in.

It's the sides of the roads that make me agitated at the people who have decided to hack away whatever was there before and lay down more tarmac. They always cut back more than they need to, rather than thinking about what should be there.

Wiset Rd, south of Chalong Circle, has been upgraded and in places the road widening has left its mark – chunks of the verges have disappeared where the "drains" have been "improved".

But much worse is north of Patong, as you climb the hill to-

wards Kamala. Construction is underway there, and in places there are no plants to hold the soil in place. I have the sneaking suspicion that the proud owner of the land will be chasing his real estate down the hill before he knows it.

Plants do much more than make the place look tropical – in many areas they literally hold the island together. If they are removed, the ground where they once stood would simply wash away.

There's a simple answer to this problem – plant trees. A perfect tree for this is the Macaranga

denticulata, or pada tree (tong-tao kalo in Thai). It's not the most beautiful plant in the world. In fact, it's rather ugly. On the plus side, it's incredibly effective at laying down roots very quickly that spread over a wide area and bind the soil together.

Clever road planners use them all the time. Rather than cover roadside banks with plastic netting or acres of concrete, they just plunk a few hundred of these things in the ground and the verge stays put, with absolutely no maintenance.

Getting back to big things, this is where the pada tree comes in. Its leaves are huge, about 25 centimeters to 30cm long, and they look similar to elephant's ears. Unlike another big-leaved plant, the alocasia, the pada tree grows into a proper tree; a far more testosterone-oozing affair. It does the job well, too.

A research project at a university in Chiang Mai a few years ago focused on deforestation in the area. They needed to encourage regrowth of plants and plant trees that developed and matured as quickly as possible. They also wanted to attract seed-dispersing animals back into the area, so that once everything was in place, they could leave the area to look after itself.

In the first 18 months of the project, the pada trees they planted grew about four meters. That's some serious growth.


Normally I ramble on about how plants brighten up corners or provide shade or generally look good. Not the pada tree. It's the ugly duckling of the plant world, but it's a worker.

All we need in Phuket is to plant a few more of these around the place. If we do that, then there's a chance that some of the soil that's uncovered by island "improvements" will stay where it's supposed to.

In the meantime, I'll work on my size issues. Make mine a Large, thanks.

hen you walk into Wii Light on Chao Fa West Rd you are greeted by all manner of peculiar shapes, interesting objects and soothing tones, with occasional splashes of lumi-

"My products are made from natural materials, such as wood with Japanese lawn thread, betel palm leaf and creeping plant, used together with modern pat-


terns and designs. The products we make are based on harmonic designs and tones so that the lights do not disturb your relaxation," he added.

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Construction Update

New police checkpoint set to open by December

he 38.9-million-baht Tah Chat Chai checkpoint, which has been under construction since mid-February, is now 37% complete and should be fully operational by the beginning of December, Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit announced recently.

The checkpoint, one kilometer south of Sarasin Bridge, will be an inspection station where vehicles coming in or out of Phuket is checked for illegal items, such as controlled plants, animals and substances, said the governor.

About three million people pass through the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint every year, which prompted authorities to upgrade the checkpoint, he added.

The two-lane, 15-meterwide entrance road will lead drivers from Thepkrasattri Rd to a checkpoint and back out to the main road.

All vehicles arriving on the island will eventually be monitored by CCTV cameras, although the current budget does not cover their installation.

An additional two-lane road will take drivers leaving Phuket to a second checkpoint and back out to Thepkrasattri Road, again past CCTV cameras once they are installed.

The project, which is being built by SCG 1995 Co Ltd, will comprise an 800-squaremeter office building between the two checkpoints, housing a 150sqm hall area and five rooms for police officers, Phuket Provincial Livestock officers and Animal and Plant Quarantine offices.

On the second floor of the office building will be an 80sqm meeting room and two storage

Tah Chat Chai checkpoint, designed by Phuket Provincial Public Works and Town & Country Planning, will replace the current temporary checkpoint 300m

The new facilities will provide officers with the resources they need to check all vehicles, instead of only being able to make random checks as they do now, the governor said.

points-based usage systems while others offer floating periods or fixed weeks. It's important to note that you may not be able to use the unit exactly when you want, as timeshare usage might be subject to availability.

This is a major issue for overseas exchanges at high-demand destinations such as Disneyworld, so there needs to be some flexibility – either in terms of one's holiday time or the locations one wants to visit.

In the end, you might not be able to visit where you want – or when you want to go.



there is a system of recourse for consumer complaints.

Both timeshare and vacation ownership have come a long way. What was once regarded a bit skeptically by consumers has now been embraced by large international institutions and brands and become very big business.

New products continue to be offered, such as residential clubs, fractional ownership terms, cruise lines, private yachts and frequent flier programs.

Lifestyle investment is a growing segment and looks set to become a by-product of the worldwide property market and a permanent fixture on the real estate scene.
