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Phuket votes 'yes' to new constitution

PHUKET: In the August 19 national referendum of the draft constitution, Phuket residents overwhelmingly accepted the new charter with 88.9% of all those voting in favor compared with just 9.6% opposed.

The remaining ballots, just under 1.5% of the total cast, were deemed as spoiled.

The official results were posted by the Phuket Election Commission (PEC) on a board outside the PEC counting center at Saphan Hin Gymnasium 3 about 7:30 pm on the evening of August 19.

Turnout for the referendum, the first of its kind in Thailand's history, was slightly below the target figure 60%.

Some 57.6% of the island's 215,433 registered voters found their way to the polls, despite heavy rains throughout much of the day and the fact that the island's many entertainment establishments were operating as

Island-wide figures had 109,493 in favor of the new charter and just 11,878 opposed, with 1,812 spoiled ballots.

In Muang district, 73,519 of the 130,805 registered voters (56.2%) cast ballots, with 65,044

voters in favor and 7,468 opposed. There were also 1,007 spoiled ballots.

In Kathu district, 17,272 of the 30,556 registered voters (56.5%) cast ballots, with 15,254 in favor and 1,797 opposed. There were 221 spoiled ballots.

In Thalang district, 32,392 of the 54,072 registered voters (59.9%) cast ballots, with 29,195 voters in favor and 2,613 opposed. There were 584 spoiled

The results were hardly surprising after the Democrat Party, which has long held sway in Phuket and most other southern provinces, came out in favor of a "yes" vote in the run-up to the polling.

Nationwide, the charter passed with 57.6% in favor and 42.1% opposed.

A total of 25,978,954 voters (57.6%) of the kingdom's 45,093,055 eligible voters exercised their right.

Opposition was highest in Isarn and the North, where voters in some provinces opposed the constitution by a wide margin.

Murray released on bail

PHUKET: Six weeks after Englishman David Murray was charged with the murder without intent in the death of his eightyear-old stepson, Narid "Curry" Budtharai, he is out on bail with a court date yet to be set.

Angered by the slow response, Curry's natural father Pissanu Badtharai asked for support from the Bangkok-based Pavena Foundation for abused women and children. The foundation has sent a letter supporting K. Pissanu to the Provincial Police Region 8 Commander Lt Gen Thanee Thawichsee.

The officer in charge of the case, Tung Tong Police investigator Lt Col Passakorn Sonthikul, told the Gazette on August 21 that a court date had yet to be set for Murray.

"The court has allowed David out on bail, but I'm still investigating the case and still questioning Ramida Murray [Curry's mother]."

It was K. Ramida who first told the police that her husband had killed Curry. In the police report she said that Murray kicked the boy in the chest, knocking him to fall to the floor. He lost consciousness when his head hit the floor and later died.

Mr Budtharai, an ethnic Nepali, said that he has taken his second son, who is autistic and shows scars and bruises allegedly caused by Murray's beatings, to another province to live with his grandmother.

Mr Budtharai said that one of his concerns was that the charges against Murray would be dropped because he is an English citizen. Because of that, the Pavena Foundation and Mr Budtharai also sent a letter to the British Embassy requesting support and fairness.

Dengue fever claims two lives in Phuket

PHUKET CITY: Dr Wanchai Sattayawutthipong, chief of Phuket Provincial Health Office, told the Gazette that there has been an outbreak of dengue fever in Thailand, with two confirmed deaths in Phuket this year. Both victims were adults aged between 25 to 35, he said.

Last year there were no deaths associated with dengue, although 136 people contracted the disease. As of mid-August this year, more than 200 people had come down with the viral disease.

"We have officers from the agency going around Phuket publicizing the dangers. We will also teach people about ways to protect themselves and their families from dengue fever.

"As the main carrier of this disease is a common mosquito, families must take care to disrupt their breeding cycles and protect themselves from being bitten in order to prevent this deadly disease from spreading," Dr Wanchai said.

Thousands affected by flooding and landslides

PHANG NGA, SURAT THANI: Residents of Phang Nga and Surat Thani provinces were evacuated from their homes as days of continuous heavy rains and flash floods from August 16 to 19 caused extensive damage and prompted flood warnings in other provinces.

According to reports from the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Office in Phang Nga, there have been no deaths in the province from the rising waters.

However, five of eight of the province's districts have suffered substantial damage.

More than 1,500 houses were flooded in Phang Nga province between August 16 to 19 with heavy winds and flash floods inundating Takuapa, Kuraburi, Koh Yao, Thap Put and Tai Muang districts.

In Kuraburi, 600 homes were damaged and 2,500 people affected when landslides blocked roads. Three schools in Takuapa were closed as a safety precau-

Flooding inundated 152 homes in Koh Yao, displacing 570 people. Damage there is estimated at 500,000 baht.

Officials assessing the damage and related costs in other districts expect it to run into millions of baht.

In Takuapa, Tambon Tham Nam Phud Administration Organization President Don Pattanapichai and mitigation officials waded through two-meter-deep floodwater on the morning of August 21 to help evacuate over 300 residents.

Continuous rainfall and forest runoff from Nang Hong, Kratha Kwam, and Toy mountain ranges converged at Klong Phang Nga causing floods inundating people's homes, he said...

Loans offered for hard-hit shrimp farmers

PHUKET: With shrimp prices still on the skids, the Phuket Internal Trade Office (PITO) announced August 15 that they will now accept shrimp as collateral for loans requested by registered shrimp farmers in Phuket.

During a Governor Meets the Press meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall, PITO Chief Somphot Sangkhapong said that the office will accept Pacific white shrimp, also known as white vannamei shrimp, for any farmer who wants a loan.

Deposited stock must consist of 40 to 60 shrimp per kilogram, priced between 105 and 140 baht per kilogram, with a total value

period will extend until October of this year, and farmers have four months to withdraw their stock after deposit.

The nationwide program will have shrimp stored in one of seven cold storage units around the country, but Phuket farmers must travel to the nearest unit, in Songkhla, to receive the loan.

K. Somphot said that about 109 tons of shrimp, valued at 15.3 million baht, have already been deposited from nine farmers in Phuket.

This is the latest scheme, following the Blue Flag Shrimp Festival, to help farmers hard-hit by lower prices this year.

K. Somphot said the shrimp festival,

not exceeding two million baht. The deposit which has been running for two months with three locations in Phuket, will continue until the prices rise. On average, the shrimp festival has sales of 1.5 tons per day, at an average price of 140 baht per kilogram.

The locations for the shrimp festival are:

- The Esso service station on Thepkrasattri Rd, near Supercheap, open daily from 8 am to 1 pm.
- The Phuket Provincial Commercial Affair Office, opposite Seng Ho Bookstore on Montri Rd in Phuket City, open Monday to Friday, 3 pm to 6 pm.
- The Moom Muang Market on Chao Fa East Rd, daily from 8 am to 6 pm, or until stock runs out.

US donates bomb blanket to Phuket

PATONG: A US Embassy official on August 15 presented a "bomb blanket" to Kathu Police Station in a ceremony attended by Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch.

Scott Bernat, Chief of the Naval Security Force Protection Detachment at the US Embassy in Bangkok, told the Gazette that the blanket – technically known as a "bomb suppression blanket" - is made of Kevlar and light enough to be carried and deployed by a single officer.

A bomb blanket is designed to be used by first responders if there is a report of a suspicious package.

"It's a device that is used when your not sure if an object is a bomb or not. The police can take it with them and spread it out over the top of the object.

If an explosion happens underneath before explosive ordnance people arrive to disarm or take it away, then it minimizes the damage that could be caused by the shrapnel from the bomb to people in the area," he said.

Bombs in Thailand are of-

ten packed with nails or other metal objects to maximize carnage, he said.

The 66,000-baht blanket is the third given by the US Embassy to police in Phuket, who have also received training in their deployment.

The other two blankets are large enough to be placed over motorcycles but are too heavy to be carried by a single person, he

Mr Bernat, who coordinates security efforts during port visits to Phuket and Pattaya by US Navy and Marine personnel, said there are currently no US Navy ships scheduled to come to port in Thailand.

Interest in bomb blankets has increased following the violence in the Deep South, where bomb attacks have become com-

In April, Narathiwat Provincial Police Deputy Commissioner Col Napadol Phueksomol lost his left leg while leading a bomb disposal unit to defuse a roadside bomb. He was unprotected at the time.



80-80 rugby to return to Phuket

PHUKET CITY: Adisak Hemyoo, honorary secretary of Thai Rugby Union (TRU), confirmed on August 16 that 80-80 rugby will return to Phuket with an international tournament on the island from November 16 to 23.

Teams from Japan, Korea, Chinese Taipei and Sri Lanka, as well as from big guns Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, have all confirmed to take part, along with hosts, the Thai national rugby squad.

The world's first international 80-80 rugby tournament, in which all players must each not weigh more than 85 kilograms, was held in Phuket in 2005. Last year, the tournament in Phuket was canceled due to international concerns over the coup; a smaller

tournament was held in Bangkok instead.

"Teams from Wales, England and France have also expressed serious interest in joining the event," said Don McBain, one of the key organizers of the event, adding that a team from Indonesia is also considering taking part.

Indonesia recently beat Brunei to win the Borneo Cup and the Asian Nations Series Competition.

"The quality of rugby is expected to be very high," said K. Adisak.

Although a venue has yet to be confirmed for the tournament, officially dubbed "In celebration of HM The King's 80th Birthday, International Rugby-80 Tournament 2007", the preferred site is Karon Stadium, where K. Adisak inspected the pitch and facilities on August 16.

Concern was expressed over the condition the pitch at Karon will be in at the time of the tournament.

Karon Stadium is heavily used for local soccer competitions, but unlike in soccer, a poorquality rugby pitch is likely to result in serious injuries.

K. Adisak said, "The 80-80 rugby tournament is not like other events where the pitch is used all day, every day of the competition. We will be playing only a few games on it a day. The pitch will get a rest on the lay days."

The unconfirmed schedule currently has teams playing on the Saturday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday of the event.

"In the competitions being held there now, they use the ground every day. If they do not allow the ground to be used before the event, the grass will grow back within two weeks," said K. Adiesk

K. Adisak will meet his counterparts in Japan and Korea next week to discuss details of teams from those countries taking part in the event.

The 80-80 rugby games will be televised in Thailand on True Visions, but broadcasts outside Thailand are still being brokered, K. Adisak added.



AOT cuts number of limos at airport

PHUKET: The Phuket Limousine and Business service Cooperative (PBC) is seeking support from the province after Airports of Thailand Public Co Ltd (AOT) slashed the number of vehicles allowed to operate at the airport from 150 to just 90.

At an August 15 meeting with Phuket Vice-Governor Tri Augkaradacha, PBC President Manode Chupak said the reduction would cause many PBC members to lose their livelihoods.

The PBC applied for a renewal of the concession so it could continue working at the airport after its existing contract expired on June 30. It is currently operating 150 vehicles at the airport, comprising 110 cars and 40 vans. All are allowed to continue operating there under a verbal agreement with AOT until the new contract has been signed, he said.

PBC pays 820,000 baht per month in concession fees to AOT, a rate which increases 10% annually, he said.

"After our contract ended, AOT asked us to submit a set of documents that included registration papers of all the PBC vehicles that we intend to operate at the airport. I sent a first batch of 90 registration papers, followed by the remaining 60 about a week later.

"The reason for the delay for those vehicles was that the registration papers were needed for insurance renewal procedures. The delay caused us to miss the due date," he explained.

Of the 60 vehicles that would no longer be able to continue service under the terms now being offered by AOT, 40 are vans and the other 20 are limousine taxis.

It is not yet clear whether the drastic reduction represents

a simple bureaucratic oversight by AOT, an attempt by that agency to force the PBC to improve its services – or some other cause.

"We received a reply from AOT stating that they agreed to renew the concession for 90 cars, but this letter does not represent a final decision on their part. We still can appeal. When we do, we will also submit a Memorandum of Understanding [MOU] signed by both the PBC and the Phuket provincial government promising to improve our services," he said.

PBC drivers have for years been a constant source of tourist complaints, especially against drivers operating its van service. Passengers have been routinely left to wait long periods at a location on the bypass road, where they were hounded by touts selling tours and other unwanted services.

To put an end to that, the PBC on August 12 launched a new 100-baht van service direct to Phuket City and threatened harsh disciplinary action against any drivers found continuing to allow tourists to be inconvenienced.

At the August 15 meeting, V/Gov Tri reiterated the need for the PBC to improve its service and invited local officials from the Tourism Authority of Thailand, AOT and Phuket Provincial Transportation Office (PPTO) to help find a solution.

Before petitioning the AOT to allow the 60 vehicles to continue operating, the PBC should first sign an MOU promising to upgrade its service, he said.

However, the decision whether to allow the 60 vehicles under the new concession would remain at the discretion of AOT management in Bangkok, he said.

Rubber vendor killed in mystery shooting

THALANG: In a crime that police have no suspect and no motive for, Chaiyawat Poonma, 31, died after being shot in the back while riding his motorcycle on Srisoonthorn Rd on August 19.

About 3 pm, a local villager alerted police of a man lying on the sidewalk near the Heroines Monument. Police rushed to the scene and found the man still alive but barely breathing, next to a toppled black and red Honda Wave motorcycle.

He was rushed to Thalang Hospital, but died of his injuries on the way. K. Chaiyawat, a resident of Thalang, was a self-employed liquid-rubber salesman.

Capt Sanit Nukong of Thalang Police told the *Gazette* that doctors at Thalang Hospital found two bullets in K. Chaiyawat's body and two additional bullet wounds.

Capt Sanit said that police had no leads as to why Chaiyawat was killed, but the deceased's friends would be questioned to find out if he had any enemies.

No witnesses to the shooting have been found at this time, he added.



luttered and messy was how one lecturer de scribed Phuket Rajabhat University (PRU) Phuket campus.

"Nothing falls into place," he said, declining to be named. "There are advertisements made of fabric that people have hung up all over the place, particularly around the main entrance.

"There are no enforced regulations as to what should be where. They look so messy and are horrible to look at when you're around the university's main gate."

The bad first impressions visitors to PRU receive are only the beginning of the problems. As well as layers upon layers of banners hanging around the entrance, the lecturer said that there are many problems with parking areas reserved for students.

"The parking spaces behind the science faculty have been reserved for large vehicles," he said. "But big vehicles are not parking in their designated spaces; they are instead parking in front of building number three, which has very little space. People park where they are not supposed to. Even the motorbikes are becoming a big problem because there are so many of them and they have no designated place to park."

Inside the university faculties, many of the buildings are filled with obsolete equipment, said the lecturer. "In the newest building at the university, building number 11, the projector screen is already broken and cannot be retracted. We have to just leave it that way. This is supposed to be the newest and most up-to-date facility in the university; poor equipment interferes with our teaching."

The lecturer went on to say that a number of projectors at the university are faulty. Lecturers sometimes have to resort to swapping the faulty projectors with working ones from other rooms when there is nobody teaching in them. As a result, lecturers often arrive at their class-

Rajabhat shamed

huket Rajabhat University has come under fire for poor standards of facilities, with students and lecturers complaining of foul odors, broken toilets, poor parking and outdated equipment.

The Phuket campus, founded in 1971 as a teachers' college and subsequently upgraded to institute and then full university status, sits on 354 rai in Rassada, just north of Phuket City.

Gazette reporters find out what has given students and lecturers cause for complaint.

rooms to find that the projectors they intended to use have been swapped for faulty ones. The lecturers then have to wait for other classes to finish before getting a projector that works.

"The classroom chairs are also a problem," said the lecturer. "We use folding chairs and many of them are old and battered, so they tend to be unstable. Students have to sit on these chairs while in lectures. It's very uncomfortable for them. Even the air conditioning units are faulty and have never been fixed or replaced."

In the canteen, where students take their meals every day, bird excrement can be found in

many places because of the large sparrow population that has made the canteen its home, said the lecturer. The toilets are similarly grim in places, with the toilets located in the building closest to the Dean's Office in building number one being the cleanest.

In stark contrast, the toilets of building number nine are extremely dirty, with out-of-order stalls, ineffective cleaning systems, foul smells, fungi on the walls and leaking pipes.

"Due to the leaks, some of the doors have got so wet that they have become swollen and can no longer be closed," said the lecturer.

"People have been constantly complaining about the toilets in building nine," he continued. "Sometimes the cleaners find it impossible to get rid of all the excrement because the cleaning

systems don't work, so the cleaners just leave it there for days. The smell is unbearable. There are good facilities on campus, such as in the library, but many still need to be improved."

Pharnutchacorn Yukhoonthon, 25, a second-year undergraduate student who studies on Saturdays and Sundays, told the *Gazette*, "Students in building number seven don't use all of the bathrooms. The problem is that the waterworks system is not working and women don't like to only use tissue when they go to the bathroom. There is always a bad smell and urine and feces stuck in the toilet. It makes me crazy."

"Most of the toilets still look new," added K. Pharnutchacorn, "but they just aren't clean."

"I would like to see the university improve the quality of the facilities," said the lecturer, who also called for better signposting as many parents and newcomers to the campus have been getting lost.


Praewwan Kitrungwattanakorn, a second-year Rajabhat

student, said, "There is a bad smell coming from the canal behind buildings number three, eight and 11. The toilets are clean, but on the forth floor of building number three there are large cracks in the walls. There are many areas of the university that are still dirty and that make the university look old."

Not everything at Rajabhat is bad, according to K. Praewwan. The computer room houses 80 computers and is open to all students until 10 pm, whereas up until 2005 there were only 40 computers and the computer room closed at 6 pm.

"On Saturdays and Sundays we have a market at the university. This gives the students a chance to make money for themselves without having to go to the weekend market, which is too far for us to go. There is some trash after the market closes, but it's not too much because all the students help each other clean up," said Praewwan.


Pharnutchacorn said that she has difficulty finding some-

where to park her car. "Many of the students use a car. It's really hard to find parking spaces though; sometimes I have to park my car in an area near a forest. When the university holds events or activities there are a lot of students who bring their cars. You have to drive around about five times before you can find somewhere to park."

"I know the university has its own rules, but they don't work. Nobody wants to solve this problem; I really don't understand that," she added.

PRU Director Dr Chirawat Nitchanet said, "We have many ongoing projects to develop our university, such as the market for students to do business, which has a budget of five million baht from the Commission of Higher Education. We invite local lecturers and business owners to teach the students about running their own businesses. This project has been going on for two years.

"I always remind students to clean up their areas and to not make traffic jams because there are many undergraduate students who come to study on Saturdays and Sundays. At the moment, we have a construction project going on in front of the university for 16 two-story shophouses which we will rent out as restaurants and shops to raise more money," Dr Chirawat continued.

"We have 12,000 students here, and there are 2,000 new students each year," said Dr Chirawat. "I asked for a budget for a new nine-story building and 2,500-seat meeting hall; we got a

budget of 120 million baht. We also have a project to paint the old buildings and we have a sixmillion-baht budget to improve the scenery, including walkways and toilets. Our university is 35 years old and some parts of it are worn out.

One of the assistant directors of campus management, who declined to be named, told the Gazette that there are plans to construct a new signboard on campus to better accommodate advertisement needs. The plan is to ban advertising signs in all other areas.

With regards to parking, the assistant director said, "We have designated parking areas for students, but they are far from the university faculties. Because of this, students do not always use

the designated parking spaces, but instead choose to park in other places. It is understandable, because when it rains or when students are running late for lectures, they will park anywhere.

At the moment, we are conducting a feasibility study for the construction of a new, threestory parking facility, to be built on campus close to the faculties."

Addressing the state of the toilet facilities, the assistant director told the Gazette that the drainage systems are old and were laid when the university buildings were first built. During the dry season, when there is less water, the valves fill up with debris, causing them to break. Water supply systems have not been updated because that would require the entire system in each building to be replaced, which would be very expensive.

"Every time we propose this to the university's management committee it is rejected," added the assistant director.

"The university has just passed a budget to improve all of the teaching facilities. The main problem the university faces at the moment is that there are a lot of students and not enough buildings to accommodate them all. We are improving every year, however," she concluded.

"When I visited other universities," said K. Pharnutchacorn, "and saw that their facilities are clean, so different from ours, it makes me think that Rajabhat is just a big-name university that doesn't have the quality of the oth-

Stamps to mark 120 years of Thai-Japanese relations

THAILAND: To commemorate the 120th anniversary of Thai-Japanese diplomatic relations, Thailand Post has released a set of stamps depicting Thai and Japanese cultural themes.

Sharing similarities in their affection for their respective patriarchs, heritage and social values, Thailand and Japan officially sealed diplomatic relations with a declaration of Amity and Commerce on September 26, 1887.

In addition to the colorful stamps, which cost three baht each, special events and street festivals are being held simultaneously in each country this year with a Thai Festival in Tokyo held in May and a Japanese Festival to be held in Bangkok in December.

The anniversary set of stamps contains four pairs of stamps, each one measuring 22.5 millimeters by 33mm. The pairs feature well-known national icons from each of the countries and include famous architectural works, traditional symbols of wisdom and strength; the elephant and dragon, famous flora, and the fourth pair features opera performers from both countries.

Unlike the rogue ladyboys who prey on foreign tourist through drink-drugging, pick-pocketing and other means, this ladyboy targeted temples in and around metropolitan Bangkok.

Her actions were brought to light when officers at Sam Rong Tai Police Station in Samut Prakan were tipped off that Sirisak "Tom" Ngamphanit, 22, was a drug user who had obtained

by deception a large amount of religious artifacts from local temples.

Police arrested Sirisak in Sam Rong Tai and took her to the station for drug testing. Sirisak's urine tested positive for the presence of illegal drugs, police reported.

Officers then set off to search Sirisak's room in Bangkok's Lat Krabang area. There they found brass gongs, meditation rugs for monks and many other articles from various temples – all still inscribed with the temples' names.

Under questioning, Sirisak admitted that the paraphernalia had come from more than 20 temples, most of which she could not remember the names.

Sirisak told monks at these temples that she wanted to hold a religious ceremony in her house and asked to borrow the necessary equipment from the temple. To demonstrate her good faith, she gave the holy men a false name, address and telephone number. She then sold the items in secondhand shops in Bangkok's Prawet area and spent the proceeds on drugs – as well as saving up for her sex change operation.

Ten monks representing 10 temples came to the police station to claim the goods seized.


Phrakhru Sangkhalak, 53, Assistant Abbot at Wat Laem in Samut Prakan's Phrapradaeng District, said that Sirisak had come to the temple and told monks that she wanted to hold a ceremony at a house in Tambon Sam Rong Tai. As is the custom, she invited a full complement of nine monks to come and pray at the ceremony. She also asked to borrow equipment from the temple. Phrakhru Sangkhalak, impressed by Sirisak's faith, agreed to her request, asking only that she leave contact details.

"When it came to the day of the ceremony, the temple arranged a car to take the monks to the prayer site, following a map given to us by Sirisak. When we got there, however, we couldn't find the house indicated on the map. We tried to call Sirisak, but we couldn't get through.

"A few days later, Sirisak had still not come to return the implements she borrowed. We then realized that we had probably been scammed, so the temple management committee filed a report with Sam Rong Tai police," Phrakhru Sangkhalak said.

Police said that Sirisak has been charged with both drug use and fraud. Police also called for representative of other temples who think they may have been victims of Sirisak's deceptions to come and look at the evidence seized from the home.

Discrimination against gays 'rife'

hai Queer Resources secretary Centre Prempreeda Pramote na Ayudhya has published his research into discrimination against transvestites and transsexuals. Along with his findings, K. Prempreeda told the "Political Economy of Gender" meeting at Thammasat University's Tha Prachan campus Faculty of Economics he was out of pocket 200,000 baht because a bank teller refused to cancel an ATM card because of the discrepancy between his female appearance and identification documents identifying him as a male.

K. Prempreeda added that insurance companies did not allow homosexuals to take out policies, citing homosexual lifestyles as "risky".

"As for government solutions, I don't know whether we will get a final answer because, personally, I think it hasn't even begun to address the problems," said Prempreeda, who also charged past governments of destroying information about homosexual lifestyles.

Hole in the law. Despite concerns that the demand for the services of surrogate mothers will create a "wombs-for-rent" phenomenon, the government has yet to enact a controversial bill that would require surrogate mothers to agree to become pregnant for the purpose of gestating and giving birth to a child – not for financial gain.

Without legal conditions foreign couples may flock to Thailand to hunt for a surrogate mother, said Nandana Indananda, a judge at the Central Intellectual Property and International Trade Court who heads a study project.

K. Nandana believes there are about 20 or 30 surrogacy cases each year in Thailand, but admits there are no official statistics on the issue.

Current laws recognize a woman who gives birth to a child as the mother of that child. Because the surrogate mother is usually a married woman, the child born from surrogacy is registered as the child of the surrogate mother and her husband.

Life sentence. A man was sentenced to life imprisonment on August 15 for stabbing a 12-year-old girl to death during a robbery in her home late last year.

The Criminal Court also ordered Natthasit Kamolsaard to pay 720,000 baht in compensation to the mother of the victim, Naruenart Phoprasert.

The judges initially sentenced Natthasit to death, but later commuted the sentence to life imprisonment citing his confession during the trial and his cooperation with police during the investigation.

According to facts verified in the verdict, Natthasit, 27, knew the victim well. He entered the girl's home on November 8 and

told her to take a shower while he began searching for valuables.

He later knifed the girl and slashed her throat after she came out of the shower early and discovered him in the act of stealing

Natthasit, who fled with stolen belongings worth around 10,000, was arrested a few days later.

Manure mob. About 100 farmers rallied in front of Government House at noon on August 16 to protest against a bill that would increase taxes on chemical fertilizers.

The farmers said they disagree with the bill to set up a fund to promote and develop sustainable agricultural systems because the bill would impose taxes on chemical fertilizers ranging from 5% to 30%.

No formula for success. According to a survey by the Health Department last year, only 20% of babies nationwide received breast milk as their sole means of nourishment until the age of four months.

Those who were breast-fed until they turned six months accounted for only 14%.

"Breast milk is the best food for babies. It also bonds the tie between mothers and children," said K. Vallop during a ceremony at Wiang Pa Pao Hospital in Chiang Rai.

The hospital received an award for its outstanding motherand-child healthcare services, which include promoting breastfeeding over the use of formula for newborns.

Deputy Public Health Minister Vallop Thaineua said his ministry had instructed more than 800,000 health volunteers across the country to promote breast-feeding.

Cash cows. The Cabinet has approved a new project to support farmers in raising Thai-bred cows and buffaloes, replacing the previous administration's suspended "Cows for One Million Families" project.

Deputy Social Development and Human Security Minister Poldej Pinpratheep said the scheme would be voluntary and would allow farmers to own the animals.

A pilot scheme will be run first, with the Budget Bureau analyzing budget details.

The Cabinet ordered the old project to be evaluated and terminated. The project, begun in 2005, has been criticized for having unrealistic goals and operational issues that did not respond to farmers' needs.

The farmers wanted female animals so that farmers could breed calves, but the project provided them with males instead, said government spokesman Yongyuth Mayalarp.

Power in numbers. To inspire collaboration among Thai communities around the use of high-performance computing (HPC), a group of Thai professors has been working to establish formal co-operation in the form of the Thai HPC Consortium.


HPC is the use of parallel processing to run advanced application programs efficiently, reliably and quickly.

The consortium was initiated by Chokchai Leangsuksun, director of Extreme Computing Research Group and associate professor of computer science at Louisiana Tech University.

Asst Prof Chokchai said the consortium was expected to be the basis for the collaboration of professors in universities throughout the country as well as having links to global universities.

The consortium, to be officially launched in the next few months, is intended to help academic communities take advantage of the use of high-performance computing technology and to encourage Thai researchers to share not only knowledge but also resources, both in research efforts and technologies.

It is such a pity that after decades of road carnage in Thailand there is no road safety education being conducted. It would be so easy to do through TV.

Instead, it seems that most drivers believe that putting the ever-so-popular rescue bumper sticker – depicting a rescuer carrying an accident victim in form of an unconscious woman – is the magical cure to prevent accidents.

Switching on headlights in times of poor visibility would do the trick and costs nothing, but obviously this is not very hip in Thailand right now.



Several dive shops will also return to Bang Niang Beach for the coming high season, since there are now enough resorts to accommodate a sufficient number of guests to make an investment at Bang Niang profitable.

the mighty owners of those fivestar resorts along Bang Niang Beach who invest billions of baht in trying to attract wealthy guests from overseas obviously lack the power to pressure local officials into installing drains.

The inevitable flooding along Bang Niang Rd always makes me sit and wonder in awe.

Refugee haven: It appears that Phuket's tourism boom is finally taking its toll as more and more Phuket expats are giving a move to Khao Lak serious consideration.



physical education teacher was shot dead while trying to protect his girlfriend from two armed men in a restaurant he owned in Trang Town. The girlfriend and the restaurant head waiter also both suffered

bullet wounds in the attack.

Police received reports of a shooting at Deuan Khiang Dao restaurant at 11 pm on August 13. Arriving at the scene, officers led by Trang Muang District Police Superintendent Col Nukun Kraithong found the body of Aekachai Khwanklap, 24, lying near a service counter amid scattered chairs and tables.

A preliminary examination of the body showed that K. Aekachai, a teacher at Wat Khuanwiset Muniti High School, was killed when a .38 caliber bullet entered the back of his head.

Staff at the restaurant told police that two other victims, both with gunshot wounds to the chest, had already been rushed to Trang Hospital for treatment. They were identified as K. Aekachai's girlfriend Chuliphon Chu-en, 20, and the restaurant head waiter Anuphon Thongraman, 21.

Eyewitnesses reported seeing two men, one wearing a motorcycle helmet, walk into the restaurant and order beers. Staff said they recognized the pair, who had been in the restaurant before.

After drinking for a short while, one of the men grabbed K. Chuliphon with one arm and drew a gun to threaten bystanders who might come to her aid. He then attempted to drag her out of the restaurant, eyewitnesses told police.

K. Aekachai and K. Anuphon rushed to help her but were shot down by the man's accomplice. In the confusion, K. Chuliphon freed herself and ran. Her assailant gave chase and shot her once in the chest outside the restaurant. Both men then sped away on a motorcycle.

Later that night, police received reports of a man lying injured by the side of the road in nearby Tambon Nam Phut. At the scene they found Somphon Chuayphan, 44. He had been shot in the right arm with a .38 caliber pistol.

Police took him to Trang Hospital for treatment. Somphon initially denied any involvement in the murder of K. Aekachai, but after witnesses identified him he confessed to being one of the gunmen.

Somphon said that during the fracas, he had been hit by a stray bullet from his accomplice's gun. He refused to give any indication of the motive for the attack. Somphon has been charged with murder.

Doctors at Trang Hospital said that K. Chuliphon is out of danger but that K. Anuphon was still being treated in intensive care.

fessed to running a brothel disguised as a karaoke bar.

At 2 pm on August 17, police led by Lt Col Sakda Charoenkul, an Investigating Inspector at Haad Yai District Police Station, led a team of officers to search Mermaid Karaoke on Chaiyakul Uthit Rd after being tipped off that sexual services were being offered.

In the bar they found 17 women aged between 16 and 25. Of these, 16 were from Burma and one from Cambodia.

The officers arrested the bar's owners, Pol Sgt Maj Jongrak Phrom-anumat, 34, a Squad Leader at Police Region 9 Investigations Center, and his wife, Chutiya Khamwisai, 30.

They were both charged with procuring women for prostitution

The couple admitted to using the karaoke bar as a front for a brothel. They had also requested work permits for a total of 125 women, telling the Labor Department that the women would be working as laborers.

As well as offering services at the bar, Sgt Maj Jongrak would also take women on calls to customers around the city. His commanding officer has been informed of the charges and police disciplinary action will be brought, police said.

Pandering in Thailand is punishable by one to 10 years imprisonment and a fine of 2,000 baht to 20,000 baht.

Na Thawi under watch: The Army has placed Songkhla's Na Thawi District under close security watch following an increase of violence in the area, a senior army officer said on August 13.

Na Thawi District neigh-

bors Saba Yoi District and has been the scene of frequent insurgency attacks, Lt Gen Chamlong Kungsong, a Chief of Staff at the Internal Security Operation Command, said.

The army will continue offensive operations in Saba Yoi while closely monitoring activity Na Thawi, which they expect insurgents will use as a base for attacks against authorities and local people, he said.

Part of the successful operations against the insurgents had resulted from the cooperation of local villagers, he added.

The violence in Na Thawi was a "show of strength" by the insurgents, Gen Chamlong said.

Militants nabbed: Two suspected militants were seized August 15 when more than 200 troops and police raided a village in Narathiwat's Tak Bai district.

Police said an insurgent leader also present narrowly escaped.

Skipli Yamiti, 37, and Adinant Maiseng, 17, were taken into custody after armed officers searched six locations in Ban Padohmati in an operation lasting from about 4 am until 9 am.

The officials believe the two men are members of the Runda Kumpulan Kecil (RKK), an insurgent group blamed for violence and attacks in the predominantly Muslim region since the beginning of 2004.

However, the group's leader, Saman Yamiti, escaped, officials said.

Troops also confiscated some items found with their belongings, including PVC pipes – used for bombshells – two walkie-talkies and a cell phone.

A day earlier, a key militant was shot dead in Narathiwat province in what police believe

was a killing aimed at silencing

Marohpee Itae, 26, was found dead in front of his house in Rangae District. His body was riddled with AK-47 bullets. He had been granted bail while on trial in a provincial court in connection with violence in the region

Lt Col Suthipong Sophonsukkul, deputy superintendent at Rangae District Police Station, said militants in the same cell as Marohpee might have wanted to silence him so that they would not be incriminated in court.

Violent night: Suspected militants killed three people in a series of attacks throughout the Deep South August 14.

A civilian was killed and another injured another in a gun attack in Narathiwat's Si Sakhon District.

Elsewhere the same night, insurgents staged attacks in about 20 locations in Songkhla and Pattani, police said. In the first attack, militants set fire to a school in Village 1 of Tambon Piano in Saba Yoi district, damaging three classrooms.

Suspected insurgents also set fire to the signal tower of a cellphone station in front of the Thepha District Hospital.

A mobile phone signal tower in Chanae district and two in Namom district were also set ablaze.

The five attacks took place almost simultaneously at 9:45 pm.

In Pattani, insurgents cut down trees in several locations to block the road between Pattani and Yala.

In another incident in Narathiwat, one person died and three police were injured when a motorbike bomb exploded outside a drug store in Sungai Padi district.

Police said the blast, ignited by remote control, also damaged a pickup truck and a sedan.

In Yala's Muang District, fruit merchant Muhama Sudee was shot dead while riding a motorbike.

Power to Phuket people

ost of us can think of charitable causes or worthwhile community projects in need of funding or awaiting someone with the time, recourses and inclination to get in-

The people of Phuket are a generous bunch, donating to the island's numerous government foundations and independent charities; some for animal lovers, some for environmentalists and others run by good souls who wish to feed and educate the poor.

There are still many local challenges, however, which are not addressed, because either the government does not have the funds and people power to become involved or there is no charity organization set up to meet these challenges.

This is where the newly launched Phuket Community Foundation (PCF) comes in, which has been established to raise funds and make grants to those in need with community contribution in mind. nity. It brings all layers of society together with a common goal to improve Phuket for locals and visitors alike," he said.

"We are confident in the community's ability to know itself and the problems that exist within it, and is therefore best suited to decide on the issues and challenges that need to be addressed. The PCF is but a small cog in the clockwork of the community, and all of us working in unison with ideas and donations is the the only way we will achieve success in improving Phuket," he added.

K. Niyom also stressed that the PCF welcomes support from anyone in the community, as the foundation is not only built on monetary support but local organizations and members of the

community can become involved by putting forward ideas, offering expertise, knowledge and skills, and by donating time to the various projects.

Although still in its infancy, public confidence in the foundation's transparent and independent objectives is high, already receiving a great deal of support from organizations and members of the community with numerous ideas, donations and pledges contributed to help improve Phuket.

With clear objectives and unbiased approach to charitable funding of community projects, international philanthropic organizations including the Synergos Institute, an independent nonprofit organization which tackles the causes of poverty, and the Bernard Van Leer Foundation for children's rights and development are backing the PCF.



ith a boyish face, an impish grin and a Michelin star, Alfredo Russo is every inch the celebrity chef. Born in Turin, Italy, in 1968, his determination to succeed in the culinary world soon became ob-

At 13 years old he decided that the life of a chef awaited and by the age of 22 he had opened his own restaurant. Three years later he won that a dollop of fresh cream with coveted Michelin star.

More accolades followed, including the 2004 Espresso

Guide's Best Chef of the Year. His restaurant in Cirie, the Dolce Stil Novo (which translates as "Sweet New Style", with a tip of the hat to Dante and fellow poets), is famous throughout Italy for putting the "wow" back into classical Italian cuisine.

This was Alfredo's third trip to Thailand, a country that he much admires. We



hinking back to your days as a student, there were probably a few times when some madcap idea for world domination popped into your head. You thought you could change the world, and if given the right circumstances and opportunities you might have been able to.

Hiroyuki "Hiro" Nobuto is one such student; a man on a mission, looking to do his bit to make an impact and be remembered. Whether an art project in Phuket can lead to world domination remains to be seen, but given the 10 years he has set aside to complete his goal, anything is possible.

Hailing from Osaka, 24-year-old Hiro first came to Phuket in September 2003 as an exchange student. He fell in love with the place, the people, the proximity to nature and the parties – nothing out of the ordinary there.

It wasn't until 2004 when he began studying hotel and tourism management at Prince of Songkla University, Phuket campus, that Hiro's moment of inspiration came. After the tsunami struck, Hiro saw his favorite island in turmoil, awash with grief, sadness and despair.

As he walked around the areas affected by the disaster, devoid of tourists and filled with debris and destroyed scenery, Hiro asked himself, "What can I do to bring happiness back to this island?"

Feeling overwhelmed by the amount of destruction and distraught that his beloved Phuket had been so ravaged by nature, it wasn't until August last year that Hiro found a medium through which to channel his good will.

On a night out with close friend Hirofumi Tanigami, the idea of a decade-long art project was conceived.

"People don't smile so much in Japan," said Hiro, "but in Phuket, people smile a lot more. When there was the tsunami, people stopped smiling, and I wanted to do something that could make people on the island happy again.

"I want the people in Phuket to wake up to art. I want to give them something new; something they can do; something that will be interesting to both locals and tourists. With this project, I want to create and increase the artistic potential of this city," he added.

With a madcap idea must

ow do you bring more art to Phuket? This interest ing conundrum is now being tackled by an unlikely art-project curator – a student from Japan studying hotel management in Phuket.

come a madcap name: Platr (pronounced "platter") means both a large plate and the part of a turntable that spins a record. Not an obvious connection to Phuket until you find out that the aim of the project is to "spin" life with art and culture.

Platr also stands for "Phuket life access tracking", which refers to the mini-projects of Platr that will be used to track the success of the project and how it affects people's lives.

The first project served up by Platr is ndl, pronounced "needle". In keeping with the theme, ndl is also an acronym for "nesting diaries in the loop".

Unfazed by reactions to his liberal usage of terminology, Hiro explained that ndl is an artist-inresidence program that started in December last year.

Through nld he aims to bring a number of Japanese artists to Phuket to contribute to the community.

By giving the artists the chance to live in Phuket and enhance their creativity, the artists will in turn be able to share their experiences with the community through exhibitions, talks and workshops.

Central to the project, each artist who visits Phuket is required to keep a diary of his or her trip, an idea that Hiro and Hirofumi came up with. Hiro hopes that these diaries will record the artists' inner thoughts during their stays in Phuket. The diaries will double as pieces of art, as each artist tackles the task in his or her own way.

While Hiro is evidently proud of his concept, the future of the diaries remains uncertain.

"We're planning to display them around April at the Japan Foundation in Bangkok. The diaries will also be displayed on our website. They will be printed in hard copy if we can raise the money," said Hiro.

On the subject of money, Hiro said that most of the project is funded by individual donations totaling more than half a million baht.

Other sources of income are the artists themselves (who pay a required contribution), the Royal Thai Consulate in Osaka, and a special government fund for activities marking the 120th Anniversary of Japan-Thailand Diplomatic Relations. Unfortunately, the budget for this year is still 150,000 baht short of planned spending.

One might assume that for such an artistic project, the man behind it would be an artist, but not so in Hiro's case. An avid fan of art? Not quite. A vague interest? Almost. "I don't really have much interest in art itself, but the project is not just for art. It's created by art, but it's for the people," revealed Hiro.

"I don't have an artistic background," said Hiro, "but a lot of my friends are artists and I have seen that art can be something constructive that can motivate people.

"Like I said, this project is for the people. I do want to learn about art, and I have set myself the goal of learning about it through this project. Every artist who comes here for the ndl project gives a number of talks."

The first artists who Hiro arranged to visit Phuket were photographer and videographer Shunsuke Takawo, who was on the island December 21 to 29, and

videographer Shigeo Arikawa, who visited from January 17 to February 10. Filmmaker Noriyuki Kimura was here in April, while more recently, contemporary dance artist Mika Arashiki gave a talk and workshop at Bo(ok)hemian Arthouse in Phuket City on August 4.

The talk was largely attended by Japanese people, with one Caucasian girl and a few Thais also present. Mika gave a talk in Japanese that was translated into Thai, much to the dismay of the farang girl.

In presenting videos of her work, Mika gave the audience a visual display that needed no translation. Though considered dance, Mika's shows would perhaps be better described as "ar-

tistic movement", as they are often performed without music.

During the workshop segment, Mika invited the 30 or so people in attendance to engage in some artistic moving. The language barrier proved too much for some of the Thais in attendance, who were left confused about what they were being asked to do.

The Japanese contingent were more forthcoming, pairing off with enthusiasm. At one point, Hiro joined Mika and the two stood side by side, performing variations of a *wai*; Hiro's face remained a picture of astonishment and bemusement.

The latest artist to come to Phuket is videographer and poet Takaki Sudo, who arrived August 7 and will be on the island until August 31. Takaki told the *Gazette* that he hadn't yet had time to think about what form his work on Phuket was going to take. "I don't want to hurry," he said.

Takaki said that people will see the end product of his time in Phuket in two to three months. He plans to make a video of interviews with Phuket people, although at this stage he still needs time to think about what questions he wants to ask those people.

After he returns to Japan the video will then be edited and distributed – although Takaki was uncertain by what means.

Such uncertainty is a strong theme throughout the Platr project. Hiro said that at some point there will be an exhibition of the work of all the artists who visit Phuket, but he hadn't been able to find a place on the island suitable to hold such an event.

The exhibition will likely happen in Bangkok, he added.

Ndl is just the first installment of Hiro's 10-year project, and he hopes to have brought up to 10 artists to Phuket before the end of 2007. Without much interest in art, Hiro finally revealed that Platr is part of his thesis for his masters' degree in hotel and tourism management and his PhD in community management.

Traveling back and forth between Thailand and Osaka, where he studies at Osaka City Univeristy, Hiro said that he may eventually move to Bangkok to study at the research center at Chulalongkorn University.

Despite having set aside 10 years to complete Platr, like most visionaries, Hiro has his sights set upon multiple goals.


"When I finish my studies I want to go and work for the UN," he said. "If I stop doing Platr then the project will probably stop too. The future is uncertain really."

Before Hiro decides to call it a day on his project, Phuket residents have a visit from the Dowding Club to look forward to in October.

On their website, the Dowding Club say they have "no conception of music", "no idea of music" and "make sweet songs sometimes".

Sound enticing? In characteristic fashion, the venue and format of this musical extravaganza is yet to be decided, but when it happens, expect improvised music played on self-made electronics. Whatever the results, it will be unique.

"I'm not so keen on interesting things," concluded Hiro. "I wish to highlight Phuket through the eyes of various artists and to have the world know another Phuket; it isn't just an Asian resort."

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he Fiat Cinquecento was created in 1957 as an affordable Italian city car. Designed by Dante Giacosa, it was a tiny, cramped machine with an equally tiny two-cylinder engine of just 479cc. Mounted in the rear it was air-cooled and produced just 13bhp (under 10kW).

The little 500 was certainly never going to set the world alight and despite its humble origins and low price, the little Fiat was not initially a great success. But over the years – it lasted until 1975 – it became a popular runabout in almost every European country.

It played a role in the 1968 Michael Caine movie *The Italian Job*, which was set in Fiat's home city of Turin, but director Peter Collinson's preference for the Mini meant the British-made compact stole the limelight in the numerous exotic stunts.

Now there is a new Fiat 500 – launched July 4 this year, exactly 50 years after the original. The new 500 is already available in Europe, although a decision has



yet to be made about the car being released in Thailand or other Asian markets.

Designed by the Fiat Style Centre in Turin and built at Fiat's Poland plant in Tychy, the new 500 retains similarly compact dimensions to the original. Although it now features three doors, it is just 355 centimeters long, 163cm wide and 149cm tall.

Despite the 500's minuscule size, Fiat claims it offers "class-beating safety". It can be fitted with up to seven airbags: dual front bags, curtain bags and side

bags and one for the driver's knees; a record for a vehicle in this segment.

A host of electronic aids contribute to occupant safety, including ABS, EBD, stability program, anti-slip and a hill-start program to assist the driver with steep takeoffs. There is also hydraulic brake assist that steps in for emergency stops.

There is a choice of three "green" engines: 1.2 or 1.4-liter gasoline units or a 1.3L 16-valve turbo-diesel; one of the best small engines available with more than

two million produced to date.

The gasoline models produce 69bhp and 100bhp respectively, and comply with Euro 4 emissions standards, while the diesel delivers 75bhp and is fitted with a particulate trap.

Fiat claims that with the range of engines, transmissions, wheel options and choice of 12 body colors, there are no less than 500,000 possible combinations in order for a buyer to personalize his or her 500.

The new car also introduces numerous novelties for its seg-

ment by making features available to everyone that were previously exclusively reserved for more upmarket motors.

Other high-tech additions include a hands-free function with Bluetooth interface and voice recognition is available, while the latest sat-nav system is also on offer.

The latest incarnation of the 500 has been developed from the concept car displayed at the 2004 Geneva show.

The enthusiasm and interest from the public convinced Fiat, and in particular its dynamic Group CEO Sergio Marchione, that the original shape created by Dante Giacosa had not exhausted its unique appeal.

This time round, Fiat involved the public in the design of the new 500 by launching a communications project called "500 wants you", but it was on the web at www.fiat500.com that the project really came into its own.

The website, which is available in several languages, is proving to be hugely popular and has received more than 3.7 million hits so far.

It is widely expected that Fiat will launch the new 500 in all thriving auto markets in the near future, including Hong Kong, China and Thailand. Add your weight to the ongoing campaign by registering at the website.

erhaps I am getting a little cantankerous in my old age and I've always con sidered myself a bit selfish, but whatever the reason, whenever there is any annoying sound emanating from an entity, my earplugs are inserted within 15 seconds. After about 20 seconds they have fully expanded in my ears and I am in total, soundless bliss.

You are probably al-ready laughing, but please, hear me out. I carry a set of earplugs wherever I go, inside the house or out. They're not for safety, but for sanity.

Why would you ever want to use earplugs? Well, can you recall during the last week or two at least a few situations where sounds irritated you? Of course you can.

For me, here are some examples: screaming kids; loud, villainous women in Thai soaps; bars that endlessly blast the sound of a certain sport that everyone else seems to enjoy, but that I'm am not fond of; bars that play music too loud, especially Thai-style, battle-of-the-bars decibel levels; and bars that play crappy music – for the rest of my life I don't want to hear *You're Beautiful* or *Mambo No. 5* again:

Earplugs are also useful for travel, especially by air. On early-morning flights, you can get a window seat, pop in the plugs and fall fast asleep in minutes.

The plugs provide long-term protection on international flights, when the chirpy stewardesses spend half the flight saying everything in four different languages through the speaker directly above your head.

Screaming kids aboard aircraft are another nightmare that you don't have to endure if you have your plugs.

Pop 'em in, sit back and enjoy in silence, the cringing of the other passengers. This is par-

ticularly satisfying if the screaming kids happen to be your own.

On the domestic front, you can enjoy uninterrupted slumber right through to the night, blissfully ignorant of the neighborhood dogs' mindless barking at anything that moves and howling at every passing vehicle.

Now for some tips.

Go for sponge. Not all earplugs are created equal; get the "sponge" ones with the string attached. I have used only orange ones, but I've also seen them in yellow. Simply twist the sponge earplugs into a thin rod slightly smaller than the thickness of a pen and put them into your ears, where they magically unfurl into a crescendo of silence.

Forget about other kinds of earplugs. Most hardware stores sell hard rubber ones with concentric circles that come in a yellow box. These don't do the job

because they can't expand to totally block out noise.

However, crappy earplugs are better than nothing. By using them you'll still gain experience and get into the habit of carrying them around – in preparation for that glorious moment when you get the real thing.

Cut those strings. Cut off the strings about ¼ of an inch to ½ an inch from the earplug. This makes it easy to pull them out. It took me about two years to discover this. Without the string, the earplugs can become embedded so deeply in your ears that you can't get them out with your fingers and have to use tweezers.

Never has an earplug been in so deep that I couldn't get it out. After insertion, the earplugs might be a little uncomfortable at first, but you will get used to them. Just make sure you don't push them in too deep.

The longer the string, the easier it is to get them out – but it also makes it easier for others to recognize that you have earplugs in, which might take the fun factor out of it.

Once you gain the experience, you can go with a shorter string.

Storage. Put the earplugs in a small pocket or an infrequently-used pocket, or else you will lose them. This will take some

practice and you'll probably lose an earplug here and there until you get this down. Since the sponge earplugs are light and a bit sticky, if you mix them with almost anything else in your pockets they might get pulled out by mistake without you noticing.

This eliminates the two back pockets and the two front pockets – or for you guys out there, the two "pocket pool" pockets. Did you ever wonder what that little pocket on your blue jeans is for; the little one that's inside the front right pocket? Well, as far as I'm concerned, the only conceivable use is for earplugs – it's perfect.

Other options include auxiliary pockets or the front pocket on a shirt, or shorts that have either a lower-right or lower-left front pocket or even a cutesy mod condom pocket.

Although the rule of thumb is to always have a dedicated pocket solely for your plugs, there is one exception: pills. As pills are valuable and something that you have to be careful about taking out of your pockets, they can be mixed safely in the same pocket with earplugs.

The "one in, one out" strategy. If you are in an "in-between" sonic situation and find yourself repeatedly pulling the plugs in and out, it's acceptable

etiquette to leave one earplug in at a time, only having to pop one in and out.

Better safe than sorry. Have at least one backup pair of earplugs handy at all times. If I am carrying a computer bag or a backpack, I always bring along an extra pair.

Maintenance. The earplugs can get pretty grotty, so once a month, leave them in the same pants pocket when the pants are being washed.

This will probably occur several times by accident in any case. After they have been washed, pull them out, let them dry and *voila!* – just like new. Your ears will get itchy when you pull them out following prolonged use, so it's best to have some Qtips handy; there's nothing worse than an itch you can't scratch.

Other benefits. Obviously the main benefits are peace of mind and increased productivity, which are also themes of my "Pushing Buttons" series. But there are a few other benefits:

Social statement. When loudmouthed, idiotic people think you want to hear what they have to say, you can, for dramatic effect, look them in the eye as you slowly put in your earplugs to show them what you think.

Concentration. If you are immersed in something that requires 100% attention – as I find myself with IT projects – or you are a little loony and talk to yourself out loud, you can actually hear yourself louder and clearer – try it.

Lip-reading. When your better/other half is nagging you, see how long you can keep the conversation going with your earplugs in. You'll eventually pick up lip-reading skills that really come in handy. For example, when you are watching a sporting event and you can make out the coach yelling at an official, "That's bullsh*t! Who's paying you?"

The downside. The big downside of regularly using earplugs is that if you can't find any when you need them, you might start to freak out.

I reiterate: it's best to always have a pair handy. At first you'll often forget them and each time within an hour or so you'll wish you had them.

Availability. I've searched five hardware stores in Phuket and have yet to find them. After extolling the virtues of earplugs I would hate to let you down if they can't be found on the island.

I get mine in Singapore at a conveniently-located hardware store on the ground floor of the building behind Orchard Towers on Orchard Rd. It's within spitting distance of Harry's and the ATMs. Please email me if you find earplugs in Phuket and I'll mention it in my next Pushing Buttons column.



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Paradise lost, or never found?

oes paradise make you happy? The short answer to this question is, of course, no.

Paradise doesn't make you happy any more than Ferraris and multiple orgasms make you happy.

Although these fine things have been known to give people a great deal of pleasure, that is a different thing entirely. Only you can make you happy, if that's not too much of a hippy-dippy type statement for the start of the 21st century.

In our affluent times "paradise" has become the most overused cliché in the English language in describing anything to do with resorts, retirement villas, tropical homes and marinas around Phuket.

If, by some strange inversion of reality, Thailand were to develop a cliché police who banned the use of the word "paradise" advertisement copy would fall by around 20%.

And because we are all media-overloaded consumers with the attention spans of gnats, we have to be shown what is meant by "paradise". The word itself is not adequate; we need to have paradise defined for us visually, so that we all know what we are talking about.

In paradise, as it's visualized in the media, there is always a picture of something called a horizon, or infinity pool, the idea being that the water bleeds off into some distant realm where annoying ring tones and emails can't permeate.

In paradise, there are occasionally people placed amid the clean, stark, uncluttered architecture. But these people, all with impossibly-beautiful bodies and hair, are always looking away from us into the far distance. We



get no eye contact or engagement from the models, for as we all know, other people can often be heaven — but they can just as often be hell.

In paradise, there is no place for such vexing contradictions of reality.

Paradise is where we want to live, so the media tells us, and they show us what it looks like.

But once you have bought your slice of this paradise and moved to live in your new tropical island home, what does paradise really feel like – especially after the initial novelty has worn off?

When paradise is your everyday reality, what does it actually do for your state of mind?

We asked a selection of punters who had actually bought their slice of "paradise" in Phuket how it was working out for them. Had they become magically happier by moving here?

Unsurprisingly, they hadn't.

The same sort of problems – everything from personal relationships to plumbing and electricity supply, to the state of the roads – still made them just about as grumpy as they used to be elsewhere.

Paradise is clearly an illusion, or at the very least, a personal

idea which only occasionally coincides with the mass media's depiction of what it's supposed to be like. Life is much more complex than the typical adman's pitch – and paradise is more difficult to attain than the way it is portrayed to potential property buyers. Money alone can't buy happiness, so nowadays governments are increasingly looking at exactly this paradox of modern affluence. For a long time, raw economic measures of a society's health and happiness, such as

gross domestic product, were the yardsticks by which we measured success. But we now know that increasing economic growth not only comes with an increasing environmental cost, but also with a growing impact on the mental physical health of

human populations.

The first index of "gross national happiness" originated about 30 years ago in the Buddhist Kingdom of Bhutan, of all places. King Jigme Singye Wangchuk (who is probably extremely happy whenever a journalist actually spells his name correctly)

had a group of experts devise a list of factors that affected the happiness of his subjects.

Items such as the state of the environment, personal safety, relationships with family and friends and good governance came out on top.

Unsurprisingly, infinity pools and teeth whitening services finished well down the list.


Although you may feel that you have little in common with the average Bhutanese goat herder, when it comes to what makes us happy the factors prove to be pretty universal to all human beings – regardless of culture, education or location.


Once a fairly low threshold of economic certainty is achieved, it's mental and physical health, personal relationships, a good environment, a sense of purpose and personal passions, and a belief in a higher being or spirituality. These are universals that have been proven to be the staple requirements for human happiness.

Just for the record, at the time of writing Thailand was rated as the 32nd-happiest country out of a total of 178 nations in the world, as compiled by the New Economic Foundation.

The Pacific Ocean archipelago of Vanuatu topped the list, while Zimbabwe takes the gong for hell on earth. One of the world's most affluent and powerful countries, the United States, finished up as one of the unhappiest, in 150th place – incrementally happier than the Ivory Coast, but not quite as happy as Burkina Faso.

There's more to achieving happiness than affluence alone and certainly a lot more to it than the facile depictions of paradise the media and advertising try to tempt us with every day.

attacks all known grime. "If it's raining, I'll bung on a full-length DVD – something like *Lord of The Rings* or *Harry Potter* – which gives me a couple of hours to knock the house into shape. If I get the timing just right, the kids don't have a chance to wreck it again before my par-

ents show up."

Not that her children are still ogling the screen when the grand-parents glide in. "Nope, the TV's off in good time. I'm aiming to portray myself as a perfect mother, remember? So out come the felt-tip pens and coloring books."

Both sexes appear to be blighted by this trait. On the first night my best mate's boyfriend stayed at her place, he was up with the lark, yanking on his jeans and whipping out

his car keys. This was not the wake-up call she had hoped for.

live James shot to fame as the author of a slim and very funny book, Unreliable Memoirs, about his childhood and young adulthood in Australia. He followed this up with Falling Toward England, about his university days at Cambridge where he ran around with the likes of Eric Idle and Germaine Greer. He's also well known as a TV presenter and documentary film

Now he's swinging for the stands with a 876-page masterwork to set the capstone on his career: Cultural Amnesia (WW Norton, New York, 2007, 876 pp), subtitled Necessary Memories from History and the Arts.

The sprinter is now trying to run a marathon. His theme is nothing less than the triumph of liberal democracy over the two great totalitarian ideologies of the 20th century: Nazism and Communism. Showing how things turned out that way, liberal democracy's supporters and antagonists – 106 of them to be precise – are profiled

The only order imposed is alphabetical. Thus American TV director Michael Mann, creator of Miami Vice, bumps up against German literary giant Thomas Mann, who bumps up in turn with Mao Zedong. Louis Armstrong precedes French political theorist Raymond Aron; Albert Camus, Dick Cavitt; WC Fields, F Scott Fitzgerald; Charles De Gaulle, Edward



Gibbon; Heinrich Heine, Adolf Hitler; Tacitus, Margaret Thatcher; and Evelyn Waugh, Ludwig Wittgenstein.

Each profile sticks to a formula: a photo, followed by a biographical sketch, a quote and a meditation upon the quote – much like a preacher would take a biblical text as the basis for his sermon.

It took Clive James three years to write the text but it still reads like a random collection of magazine articles. For this he is unapologetic: his theme is the protean nature of liberal democracy against the lockstep thinking of totalitarian



New charter may herald new era for Phuket

After years of fiscal neglect by the Thai Rak Thai (TRT) government, followed by almost another full year of bare-bones funding by the military-appointed government of Prime Minister Gen Surayud Chulanont, Phuket can finally start to look forward with the passing of the draft constitution by nationwide referendum on August 19.

With the passing of the new charter, it appears that a general election will be held by year's end and a new, democratically-elected government could be in power by early 2008.

It couldn't come any sooner for Phuket, where some of the most basic infrastructure requirements have long been ignored – most notably the need for a second incinerator at Saphan Hin to deal with the huge and ever-increasing gap between the amount of trash and garbage produced on the island every month and our ability to dispose of it.

While it is unwise to speculate too far into the future about the course of political events in this country, the current divided political situation coupled with the terms of the new charter make it unlikely that there will be a return to single-party rule any time in the foreseeable future.

Much more likely is a return to the kind of horse-trading, coalition politics that was the norm before the well-intentioned but now-abrogated 1997 "People's Constitution", which allowed Thaksin and associates to move in with vast financial resources and considerable political skills to dominate almost every arm of the government — including those intended to serve as checks on executive power.

While Phuket stands to get more of its fair share of funding if the Democrats return to power to lead a coalition government – and that's still a big "if" – there remains much work to be done at the local level to make Phuket a cleaner, safer and better place to live, both for residents and tourists, whose annual numbers are soon expected to breach the five-million mark.

In this context comes a few promising developments with the launch of the Phuket Community Foundation (PCF), an independent charity sponsored by the *Gazette* that aims to bring about positive change on the island by encouraging all island residents to contribute what they can – whether in the form of financial donations, volunteer time and effort, or just a good idea.

Such a foundation is long overdue in Phuket, where so many people find themselves feeling marginalized with no voice or power to effect change in the communities they inhabit. — The Editor

Time to separate and recycle

ur team has worked in Phuket since 2002. We have been studying the rubbish problems, including the different rates of waste production and the nature of the waste products.

We also study the different ways that the local agencies have been using to deal with the waste problems. From this we have acquired significant knowledge and understanding of the waste problems this island is facing.

In 2004 we started working with the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*Or-BorJor*). We told them that Phuket needs to treat the rubbish issue more seriously. We warned that this could become a major problem for the island if it was not dealt with properly.

We advised the government that the local population must begin to routinely separate their waste. This idea was first proposed to the *OrBorJor* in 2004. Next, government officials and agencies must improve their administration methods. They have been working in the same manner for decades without change or improvement.

In some cases, when people take time to actually separate their rubbish, trash collectors don't know any better and mix it together again. Everyone needs to be well informed of the problems in order to deal with them effectively.

The *OrBorJor* also needs to have clear knowledge of their own administration, such as operating costs and important statistics and data, in order to function more effectively.

Over the years the nature of the problem has changed, yet the policies remain the same.

The rate of rubbish production in Phuket has increased greatly, exceeding the capacity of


The piles of trash are growing, the waterways are becoming polluted and there is no end in sight for the continuing waste management problems.

Local officials have repeatedly pressed for a budget to build a second incinerator, but when Natural Resources and Environment Minister Kasem Sanitwong na Ayuthaya toured Saphan Hin on June 30, he suggested that the answer may lie instead in more recycling programs.

Here **Pireeyutma Vanapruk**, president of Development of Environment and Energy Foundation, puts forward his argument why

another incinerator will not solve Phuket's trash problem in the long run.

The only way to curb the growing problem may be to separate and recycle our rubbish.

food or used as compost.

Only the west coast areas of Phuket saw a sharp rise in development, where it was predicted that the volume of waste would rise.

Recently, however, parts of the east coast have been developing just as fast with many projects springing up.

This has greatly aggravated the problem since nobody was prepared for it.

Initially the government had plans to increase the incineration capacity of the island to 500 tons of garbage a day, but today our waste production has surpassed

even that, with 520 tons a day on average.

The problem is that when we plan to solve a particular problem, the plan usually becomes outdated even before it is put to practice.

Even if another incinerator were approved today, which would boost our capacity to 500 tons a day, it would take two years to complete and by that time we would have between 600 and 700 tons of garbage to burn each day. The problem is growing very fast, and another incinerator is only a short-term solution.

Instead of trying to increase our incineration capacity, I think we should change our approach and recycle our waste, since a lot of our waste can still be used again.

About 70% of Phuket's ho-

tels have some sort of waste separation system. Most of the large hotels are situated along the west coast.

If we can start a waste collection system, perhaps a rubbish truck collecting along the west coast, from Mai Khao and south to Patong, collecting only organic rubbish from all the large hotels, we would probably be able to collect about 70 tons of organic rubbish a day.

This would not be difficult since there is a long road running past all the western beaches. Using proper technology, we can make compost out of the organic waste or even ferment it to create a type of bio-gas to produce electricity.

Collecting the food separately would also make the rest of the rubbish less moist and easier to burn. This would make the incineration system more efficient. We call this idea the "Green Route Project", since it would benefit the environment in many ways.

If the Green Route is to become a reality in Phuket, we need maximum involvement and cooperation from the local population as they separate their household rubbish.

There is potential for such a system to be set up and widely used in Phuket. Many trial projects have been set up on the island already and we have learned a lot from those.

If such a system is set up permanently it would benefit the island greatly. We wouldn't need another incinerator at all.

Royal Paradise buses are hurting local businesses

Funding critical for dog shelter

he recent news story "Island dog shelter begging for attention" (August 4 issue of the Gazette) raised as many questions as answers. The shelter was originally the idea of a previous governor, a dog lover himself, who foresaw the shelter as just that: a shelter where unwanted and abused dogs could be housed and cared for.

With changes in administration, the shelter's role changed to that of a place where all the island's stray dogs could be housed in an attempt to solve that particular problem.

Many dogs were rounded up by local Tambon Administration Organizations (*OrBorTor*) and sent to the shelter, and this continues to this day.

However, it has proved unworkable and the dogs rounded up off the streets by the OrBor-Tor are soon replaced by other dogs.

Although the Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) was already fully stretched in ensuring that Phuket did not suffer from an outbreak of bird flu, checking the quality of fresh meat and the myriad of other tasks they perform, the office was given the job of managing the shelter.

With a limited budget, the PPLO was given a difficult job and it is a credit to PPLO chief Dr Sunart Wongvorachart that he was able to do as much as he

Limited resources, however, meant that dogs received minimal amounts of food and staff numbers were insufficient to run the shelter effectively or provide adequate veterinary treatment.

With reports that the amount of money available was falling and that the facilities badly needed improving, The Soi Dog Foundation, under pressure from supporters, proposed a move into the shelter to assist with both finance and staffing.

The Soi Dog Foundation, however, was set up to sterilize

the island's dog population, not to house all of it.

More than two million baht (enough to have sterilized 4,000 dogs) was spent upgrading the facility, on improving security for example, as many dogs were escaping and finding their way back to their original homes or becoming involved in traffic accidents on the main road outside the fa-

A drainage system was installed to prevent the compound flooding. The existing compound was divided into smaller, more manageable areas and better and larger bad-weather shelters were added.

In addition, a purpose-built clinic paid for by The World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA) was built and better quarantine and treatment areas were introduced.

Additional staff were brought in to assist and volunteers, both Thai and foreign, helped train and socialize the dogs with the aim that the dogs could be found proper homes. Additional facilities, such as an agility area and a socializing room for the dogs, were paid for by the

The financial figures quoted in the Gazette article, while correct, do not take into account the large amount of money the Soi Dog Foundation spends each year sterilizing and treating dogs not in the shelter.

The Soi Dog Foundation received a substantial donation from WSPA spread over two years following the tsunami, but this was purely for sterilizing dogs and the final payment was made

The foundation estimates that running the shelter – maintaining acceptable standards, food, staff, a full-time vet, drugs, utilities, building maintenance – costs about 300,000 baht per month.

However, the foundation's current income from donations, most of which comes from overseas, is about 200,000 baht per month, with much of this required to cover the costs of ongoing sterilization and treatment programs, which have had to be cut back.

With most OrBorTor no longer contributing funds and the PPLO being overstretched, there is clearly a problem.

To provide conditions similar to those found in the West would cost considerably more, and require substantial further investment.

It is a sad state of affairs when some of the wealthiest businesses on the island regularly call on the Soi Dog Foundation, OrBorTor or the PPLO to remove dogs from their premises but are unwilling to contribute to keeping them at the shelter.

With annual costs of 3.6 million baht and a population of around 400 dogs at any one time, it costs an average of 9,000 baht per year to keep a dog there.

Stray dogs are still a problem in Phuket and they undoubtedly have an impact on the island's tourism. Some tourists do not like dogs, others are dog lovers and are upset by some of the things they see.

There are no figures available on how many injuries are caused by dogs MAKINGTRACKS needs to be as on the roads. I know several local people who

have been in motorcycle accidents after collisions with dogs.

Ideally, a budget should be provided by the central government to cover the costs of the shelter and a committee should be established under the guidance of the PPLO to manage the facility properly.

An increasing number of tourists are now visiting the facility and there is no reason why the shelter cannot become a showpiece.

The Soi Dog Foundation website (www.soidog.org) receives nearly 250,000 hits a month and many overseas supporters

are now visiting the island specifically to visit the dogs they sponsor.

With the money saved, the Soi Dog Foundation could spend more on sterilization, which has already had a major impact on number of stray dogs here.

The *OrBorTor* on the island could focus on improving the island's garbage problem, which would have an effect on the number of stray dogs that could survive here.

In addition, I have no idea whether it is possible to introduce a local law banning the import of dogs for sale, but the number of puppies pouring onto the island by air and land to be sold at markets and temple fairs is fueling the

problem.

With the new Tah Chat Chai checkpoint in operation, this high a priority as the restrictions on bird move-

ments and weapons being brought on to the island.

Phuket could easily become the first province in Thailand to be a virtual stray-dog free zone - a blueprint for other areas - but it would take investment to complete the exercise, just as it would take investment to solve the garbage problem. Without funding, expect to see the number of stray dogs rise again.

After six-plus years, K. Add is finally making an honest man of me – we're getting married on August 26.

The following Sunday, September 2, the PC Group Therapy sessions return in full swing, from 10 am to noon. I expect we'll be running sessions every Sunday from then on.

People stop me in the street and ask about PC Group Therapy. Here's the *Reader's Digest* version. The sessions draw quite a mix of people, from rank beginners to true gurus.

There's no charge at all. You can ask about any computer thing that's bugging you. We even talk about Macs and Linux – all political affiliations are respected. "Newbie" questions don't bother anybody.

We spend a lot of time talking about Internet connections – that seems to be the #1 topic on everyone's mind – but we also cover a lot of other ground, too. If you have a laptop with a problem, please bring it by and we'll see if somebody can fix it.

I actively encourage Internet service providers to come by, people with computer businesses, individuals with equipment to sell, people looking for jobs, business owners who want to build a website, hapless folks who aren't sure about the difference between left-click and right-click. You name it.

Everyone's welcome. We don't solve all of the problems, but we sure tackle a big chunk of 'em.

One recent session covered installing a new monitor. A PC user in Laguna just bought a Samsung 226BW – a gorgeous 22-inch widescreen flat-panel monitor – but he had a, uh, little problem. Every time he used it, he came down with an Excedrin-

size headache. He was ready to throw it out the window. I urged him to throw it in my direction


If you buy a fancy new flat screen monitor – prices have fallen to the point that they're everywhere – you should plan on spending some time getting it set up properly. While it's true that you can simply plug the monitor into your computer and run with it, you may end up missing out on much of what you've paid for.

In the worst case, if the monitor gets an extreme case of the fuzzies, you may end up wondering why you ever gave up on that classic 15-inch TV tube with the Windows logo permanently etched onto its screen and smoke occasionally belching from its side.

Here's the full drill for installing a new flat panel monitor.

First, throw away the CD that came with the monitor. Keep the instructions booklet (you'll see why in a second) but don't follow the directions in the booklet. Instead, take the flat panel bull by the horns and do things right the first time.

Start by installing the latest drivers for your video card. No, *not* your monitor, your *video* card. To a first approximation, a "driver" is a program that allows Windows to work with a particular piece of hardware – in this case, your video card – and a misbehaving video driver can cause no end of grief.



If you buy a new flat monitor, take a few minutes to make sure it's set up right. It could be the difference between happiness and a headache.

To find out what card you're using, right-click on an empty spot on your desktop and choose Properties (in Vista, click Personalize). Click the Settings tab (in Vista, click Display Settings).

The Display Settings dialog box (see screenshot) should list your video card chip – in this case, I have an NVIDIA GeForce 7800 GS. The name of the video card manufacturer isn't important. The name of the company that makes the video chip – probably NVIDIA, ATI, Intel or

one of a handful of smaller manufacturers – and the model number of the video chip will lead you

to the correct driver.

Don't use Google to find your video driver. You'll end up at one of a zillion independent sites that may or may not have the best driver for your video card and may or may not include "extras" with the driver download. Instead, go straight for the manufacturer's website.

If you have an NVIDIA chip, start at www.nvidia.com/page/drivers.html.

If you have an ATI chip, go to ati.amd.com/support/driver.html. Don't be confused: AMD (the computer chip manufacturer) recently bought ATI (the video chip manufacturer), but this particular site only covers ATI video chips.

If you have an Intel video chip, start at www.intel.com/de-

sign/intarch/swsup/graphics_drivers.htm. Matrox is at www.matrox.com/graphics/en/corpo/support/drivers/home.php. SiS's drivers are at www.sis.com/download/agreement.php?url=/download/. VIA's at www.via arena.com/?PageID=2.

In all cases, follow the manufacturer's instructions to download and install the latest video driver.

With your video card up to date, download and install the latest driver for your monitor. Perhaps surprisingly, many of the lat-

> est monitors have their own drivers – the fancier the monitor, the bigger the driver. Installing a monitor

driver is an important step that many people miss, but your monitor needs its driver. For Samsung, start at www.samsung.com/support/index.asp; for Viewsonic, www.viewsonic.com/support/drivers/; Philips, www.consumer.philips.com/lcdmonitors/; Benq www.benq.us/support/down loads/index.cfm?productline=5; Acer, www.acersupport.com.au; Sony, esupport.sony.com. When you have the video card driver installed, re-boot your computer.

Next, you need to find the "native resolution" for your monitor. Every flat computer screen has one preferred resolution setting, which reflects how many individual dots appear on the screen; 17-inch and 19-inch monitors may run at 1024 x 768 or 1280 x 1024.

The Samsung 22-inch widescreen 226BW runs at 1680 x 1050, which means it can show many more dots from left-to-right than a 19-inch 1280 x 1024 monitor, but only a few more from top-to-bottom.

My main monitor, a Dell 2707WFP, runs at 1920 x 1200. If the instruction manual that came with your monitor doesn't mention the native resolution, you're in for a bit of Googling. Sooner or later, you'll find the size.

To tell your video card to run at your monitor's native resolution, follow the instructions above to bring up the Display Settings dialog box. Move the Resolution slider at the bottom of the screen so it matches your monitor's native resolution. In the Colors drop-down box, pick "Highest (32 bit)" then click OK.

Once your video card is hooked up right, it's time to find the button on the monitor that says "Auto". Push it and wait a few seconds while all of the calibration takes effect. You

should end up with a monitor that's quite usable. For people like me, it's a awe-inspiring experience.

If you use Windows XP and you work with text – email, word processing, web publishing, whatever – you should also download and run Microsoft's free ClearType Tuner PowerToy.

ClearType is a Microsoft "sub pixel rendering" technology that almost always makes text look better on flat panel monitors. If you decide you don't like ClearType, the PowerToy makes it easy to turn off.

I have detailed descriptions of ClearType in my books Windows Vista Timesaving Techniques For Dummies and Windows XP Timesaving Techniques For Dummies, along with lots of tips for using and tweaking ClearType, but the basics are pretty easy. Start at www.microsoft.com/windowsxp/downloads/powertoys/xppowertoys.mspx and follow the instructions to download and run the ClearType Tuner PowerToy.

By the time you're done, I bet you end up wondering why it took so long to spring for that new flat monitor.

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

central bank – The Federal Reserve – reduced interest rates (the discount rate) to a 50-year low of 1%. Its chairman at the time, Alan Greenspan, made a comment to the effect that this would have repercussions, he just did not know exactly what they would be.

Well, now the effect has been revealed; low interest rates created a US housing boom, which went to extremes. It was not only in terms of prices but the quality of the credit worthiness of many buyers that became ques-

tionable, to say the

Many people have complained to me over the years that they have a poor opinion of banks. This usually revolves around a personal experience where a bank refused them a loan when they had no money and now, when they are

wealthy, banks keep on offering to lend them money they don't need to borrow. Banks and finance companies unfortunately do not have crystal balls; they can only assess risk as it is at present on the details of the borrower.

In too many US cases related to house mortgages, any concept of risk disappeared. This was exacerbated by the fact that some lenders were immediately selling the loans to third parties who, in turn, "securitized" these loans by selling them onwards again to asset-backed funds and hedge funds, who immediately

arlier this decade, the US sold them to investors. However, the eventual buyers of these "investments" were not just individuals, even Harvard University is estimated to be nursing losses of between US\$350 million to US\$550 million (11.2 billion to 16 billion baht) in losses on their own portfolio.



The Mortgage Asset Research Institute in reviewing "no doc" loans that merely relied on borrowers statements of income found that almost all borrowers inflated their income, with almost 60% inflating their income by over

One case in New York found that stolen identities, invented purchasers and inflated appraisals allowed a syndicate to obtain subprime loans on more than US\$200 million of property.

Even the storied Harvard University has felt the impact from the subprime fallout, with losses reportedly totaling US\$350 million to US\$550 million (11.2 billion to 16 billion baht).

The FBI has charged 26 people in this case. In another case, in Ohio, 49% of the loans routed through a single mortgage broker failed to even make the first repayment.

Ben Bernanke, current chairman of the US Federal Reserve, said: "The recent rapid expansion of the subprime market was clearly accompanied by deterioration in underwriting standards and, in some cases, by abusive lending practices and outright fraud.'

What is of concern to financial markets is the extent of the contagion. American lenders sold these securities, i.e. packaged subprime mortgages, to other parties, often to banks in various parts of the world. Already, American, French, German, Australian, Thai and Dutch banks have been found to be holding these "assets". More will follow.

The biggest problem in the "subprime debacle" is the uncertainty of the total amount and who is holding it. Uncertainty is the greatest enemy of financial markets. This has already led to central banks injecting liquidity into their financial systems via the banking sector. The biggest injections by far have been by the European Central Bank (ECB) but even the Bank of Japan and the Reserve Bank of Australia have been active together with limited involvement in liquidity creation by the US Federal Reserve.

Simply, central banks are injecting funds into the market to provide ample liquidly, every one of these is trying its best to avoid the label of suffering from a "credit crunch".

Not every central banker is sympathetic to the situation; this is well "summed up" by a statement from William Poole of Federal Reserve of St. Louis, USA. "The punishment has been meted out to those who have done misdeeds and made bad judgments. We are getting good evidence that the companies and hedge funds that are being hit are the ones that deserve it."

US investment bank Bear Stearns must be wishing that they had never heard of the term "subprime". The credit-rating agencies are downgrading their credit rating, their share price has been hammered, their credibility impaired and lawyers are preparing class-action suits.

The key word at the moment is "contagion"; the central banks of Malaysia and Taiwan have already stepped in to stop any falls in the value of their currencies. Considering that both these countries have huge current account surpluses and foreignexchange reserves, this is a considerable policy decision. Indonesia and the Philippines have taken similar steps, but that is not surprising.

The effects of these problems are being exacerbated by the time of the year. During the summer months in the Northern Hemisphere when many market participants are on holiday, trading volumes are low. In more thinly-traded markets, volatility is often the norm.

Confidence can be a very frail commodity; it is good to see that all over the world measures are being taken to regain confidence. The real question eventually is: What is going to happen to the US economy?

VAT seminar set for September \mathbf{T}

VAT, which was implemented in Thailand in 1992 to replace "business tax", is an indirect tax imposed on the value of a product, added at each

stage of production and distribution.

The seminar will be held at the Royal Phuket City Hotel from 9 am until 4:30 pm. Tickets are priced at 2,675 baht per person. Book before September 5 and reserve an early-bird ticket for 2,033 baht. Anybody who has attended a previous NAT tax seminar, which have covered topics like the Foreign Business Act, will receive a further 10% discount.

Phuket drink wins place at Olympics

PHUKET: Locally-produced cashew juice drinks Cashewy and Casheway have been chosen to be served to athletes and officials at the Olympics in China next year.

Supphaluck Suhirunyawanich, executive director of Sri Supphaluck Orchid Co Ltd and The Cashewy Phuket (Thailand) Co Ltd, which produces the cashew fruit juice concentrate Cashewy and the canned, diluted version called Casheway, announced the export deal at the Governor Meets Press meeting at Provincial Hall on August 15.

The export deal is still in the planning stages and volume to be exported and price per unit have yet to be negotiated, but the terms should be reached before year's end, K. Supphaluck explained.

She is also looking to use the opportunity as a springboard to enter the enormous Chinese market through the contacts she is making in brokering the Olympic Games deal.

The drinks won top prize in the "Thai fruit to Olympics 2008" competition held by the Marketing Organization for Farmers, Ministry of Agriculture and Cooperatives (MOAC) in Bangkok on August 6.

The MOAC was chosen by the Chinese Forestry Ministry as a fresh fruit and fresh fruit produce provider for the Games.

Cashewy and Casheway were chosen as they are rich in vitamins, including vitamin C, calcium, phosphorus, iron, beta carotine, riboflavin and thiamine. Citing results from her own research, Prof Jintanaporn Wattanathorn of the Faculty of Medicine at Khon Kaen University asserted that cashew fruit juice can alleviate depression.

The company produces two flavors – plain cashew fruit juice and cashew fruit juice blended with mixed fruit juice – from fresh cashew fruit grown in Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi.

The fruit is processed into a concentrate at the company's factory on Thepkrasattri Rd in

Tambon Srisoonthorn in Thalang, which can currently process about 60 tonnes of cashew fruit a year and produces about 40,000 liters of the cashew juice concentrate annually.

Some 20% of current production is exported to Australia, while 40% is sold direct to markets in Phuket and Bangkok.

The remaining 40% of the concentrate produced is outsourced to Merit Thailand Co Ltd, which dilutes and cans the juice to produce the Casheway drink at its Chon Buri factory.

In Phuket, about 200 cans of Casheway are currently sold each day at various outlets incluiding Big One stores, where it retails at 30 baht per 300-milliliter can.

The drink is also popular with tourists at the Thalang factory and the company's original locale on Kwang Rd in Tambon Wichit, both well-known tourist attractions on the island.

Casheway is also sold at all seven branches of Lemon Farm shops, as well as the Doi Kham and Phak Doi shops.

The company began producing cashew fruit juice in 2000 after a suggestion from an Israeli university professor on holiday in Phuket.

"The man said that he had found a tasty cashew fruit juice drink in Kenya, and that he had walked into our shop hoping to find it there," K. Supphaluck explained.

K. Supphaluck found the idea enticing as at that time market prices for raw cashew nuts, then the company's sole product, were soaring. However, she realized that, like other cashew nut producers, her company only used the cashew nuts, throwing the surrounding fruit away.

She then devised a palatable recipe for cashew fruit juice and in March 2000 gave it to a local taxi driver to taste.

The driver approved of the flavor and suggested that she make the drink commercially, she

The company launched its cashew fruit juice later that year, entering the market with an annual production capacity of 20 tonnes.





Phuket golf tourism now in full swing


Participants will compete in sports such as table tennis, volley-ball, badminton and bowling, with a non-competitive swimming carnival marking the opening of the games.

Fighting pays off for two Phuket youth

PHUKET: Two Phuket youth boxed their way to medals in the Thailand Youth Boxing Championship 2007 in Bangkok. More than 400 fighters took part in the competition, held August 5 to 10 at the Mall Ngamwongwan.

Pinyo Kadamduan, 16, won a silver medal in the 75-kilogram division while Manas Yingwittayakhun, 18, brought home the bronze in the 54kg matchup. The fighters received 3,000 and 1,000 baht, respectively, for their efforts.

From here the two youth have been admitted to the National Youth Boxing team, beginning their training next year in Nakhon Ratchasima. There they will train and travel with the national team to competitions in the region.

Phuket sent a total of nine boxers to the competition, ranging in age from 14 to 19, all under the guidance of Master Jay from the Surakit Gym.

Master Jay told the *Gazette*, "We are very happy with two medals from our boxers. All of them are native Phuket and they had trained in Muay Thai before I called them to train with me."

The other fighters in the 14

to 16 age bracket included Assaree Romin, 40kg; Danai Pongthong, 42kg; Vichai Khuadkaew, 45kg; and Tiwakorn Kamdam, 51kg.

In the 17 to 19 age bracket was Mana Seesuksai, 45kg; Manas Yingwittayakhun, 54kg; Jatupong Kaewkongtun, 60kg; Sarawuth Pansawang 69kg; and Pinyo Kadamduan, 75kg.

Master Jay said that Danai nearly clinched a bronze in his weight division but lost by a few points.

In Pinyo's final round, Master Jay had to call for an end to the fight because he felt Pinyo, while a good fighter, was overmatched by an older competitor.

"I asked the referee to stop the fight because Pinyo is just 16, but he was up against a 19-yearold because of his weight class," he explained.

"He is a big guy, but we didn't want him fighting the older guy. So we are very happy that he got the silver medal and this will be his first time training with the National Youth Boxing team."

The teams were supported by Tossaporn Thepabutr of the Phuket Sports Association and Joseph Mercer of West Sands Hotel, who made the trip to Bangkok possible.

Thais dominate to win Platu nationals

Although defending national Platu champion skipper Scott Duncanson and his crew on The Ferret managed to take a quick lead by winning the first race in the Platu 25 Thailand National Championships, the Thai South East Asian Games crew sailing on Naiad dominated the three-day, eight-race event to become the new champions.

From there Lorenzo will organize teams to play in monthly tournaments. He hopes to eventually create school teams to play other schools from Phuket.


Each tournament will include prizes and awards and students do not need to be enrolled in the lessons to participate in tournaments, which will be free of charge.

Perhaps my schoolboy level of humor is best illustrated by the simple fart. I still find them funny. Even their euphemisms are hilarious, as listed in great detail in the renowned Roger's Profanisaurus.

That pull my finger thing infantile, but superb. Few people appreciate that the volume and intensity of a botty burp can actually be measured in braps, according to the Profanisaurus.

immediately burying the wife's head under the covers while screaming "dutch oven" is the epitome of sophisticated humor.

There are many other infantile things that just seem to scream out for salacious remarks. Just about any mention of leathergoods in any context is usually enough to elicit a childish giggle. Is it possible to mention the word "rubber" without getting the same inevitable reaction from those of a childish ilk?

As it happens, rubber is a pretty regular sight here on the island. I'm not thinking of what this stuff is eventually turned into, but where it comes from. Rubber trees are everywhere; many of us pass them every day without giving them a second thought.

The humble rubber tree, or Hevea brasiliensis as it's more correctly known, is perhaps one of the most common trees in Thailand, yet very few of us have them in our gardens.

These things are all over the place, forming huge plantations around the island – plantations that are dwindling in number daily. They haven't been in Phuket very long in comparative terms, yet they have an amazing history.

Brazil actually provided the world with the rubber tree. History time (I promise not to do this at parties, by the way): In 1876, Henry Wickham, a local planter representing the British government, exported a few from the lower Amazon area of Brazil to London.

The seeds were germinated at the Tropical Herbarium in Kew Gardens in London later that year. From there, some of the resulting seedlings were exported to Ceylon (now called Sri Lanka). The next year, 22 seedlings were sent from Ceylon to Singapore, where they grew enthusiastically and the technique of rubber tapping was developed. Before this, the trees had to be felled before the latex could be extracted, which wasn't profitable long-

By 1900, most of the agricultural techniques for establishing large plantations had been developed. One particularly useful technique was bud grafting. This technique ensures that genetically identical trees can be produced in unlimited numbers.

Over the next 40 years or so, the British chaps in Malaya (now called Malaysia) and the Dutch in Indonesia cleared large areas of rainforest to create rub-

ber plantations. At the same time, local farmers planted small groves of rubber trees to supplement their income.

This gave rise to two main types of rubber plantations: large plantations and smallholdings. In Phuket we have smallholdings, which produce those sheets of rubber looking like grubby white towels on a washing line.

All natural rubber originates from the hevea tree. It starts its journey when the tree is tapped, which is usually once every couple of days. A tapper starts his hike around the plantation before dawn. At each tree, he uses a sharp knife to shave off the thinnest possible layer from the intact section of bark.

The cut must be neither too deep nor too thick, as either will reduce the productive life of the tree. The cut gets the latex flowing and the tapper leaves a small cup underneath the cut to catch it. The tapper returns a few hours later and collects the latex. This double round trip usually finishes about 2 pm.

Surprisingly, the latex that rubber comes from isn't actually made from sap. The sap runs deeper inside the tree, beneath the cambium, which is the slightly harder part of the tree beneath the bark that does all the growing. Latex runs in the latex ducts, which are in a layer immediately outside the cambium.

This shows how highlyskilled the tappers really are. If the cambium is cut, then the tree is damaged, because the cambium is where all the growth takes place. Too much damage to the cambium, and the tree stops growing and stops making latex.

Well I've somehow managed to get through a whole story about something itching for a lewd comment without making a single inane schoolboy-style remark about what rubber can be turned into. I think I've done rather well, to be honest. Rub-

"Each color has its own






meaning, but if you turn them all on at the same time you can have a rainbow show in your bathroom," K. Varunchai said.


"They are based on the primary colors that we mix to make different shades."





New shooting range takes shape

KATHU: A three-story building under construction on the eastern side of Patong Hill will be Phuket's third shooting range, the Gazette has learned.

Work on the 45-million-baht Patong Shooting Range, is about 70% complete, said project owner Somchit Sucharitjiravongse.

Honorary Secretary of the Trang Chamber of Commerce, K. Somehit is a shooting enthusiast who has represented in Thailand in international competitions. His aim is for the shooting range to help support recreational shooting in Phuket and become the new headquarters of the Phuket Shooting Association.

Construction at the conspicuous 4.5-rai hillside site next to the "Potable Water" station began in April and should be complete within a few months, K. Somehit said.

Although the venue is located in Tambon Kathu, not Patong, K. Somchit confirmed that the range would definitely be named Patong Shooting Range.

The 45-million-baht price tag does not include the land purchase cost, which K. Somchit declined to divulge.

Patong Shooting Range is K. Somchit's first business venture in Phuket, although he already owns the Sirinthorn Shooting Range in Trang and the Krabi Shooting Range in Ao Nang, Krabi. He also owns two branches of the Grand Suite Inn hotel in Trang.

K. Somehit said that foreign tourists seeking "adventure activities" during their stays in Phuket would be a large part of the target market, which already has access to the Phuket Shooting Range in Chalong and the Kathu Shooting Range next to Lock Palm Golf Course.

Patong Shooting Range will comprise a three-story building with three shooting ranges on the ground floor. Each range, nine meters wide and 50 meters long, will be used for shooting over distances of 25 to 50 meters, K. Somehit said.

The site can accommodate additional ranges if demand arises for them, he added.

The second floor, which will be air conditioned, will house a single shooting range designed to meet the training needs of competitive marksmen, of which there are currently only six in Phuket competing at national level, he

The third floor will have an office, meeting room and living quarters for K. Somchit.

Patong Shooting Range will be open to the general public, including walk-in customers. Trainers will be available for first time

"We expect to open about mid-November, in time to host the southern regional competition for sportsmen hoping to qualify for the next National Games," said K. Somchit.

"Many foreign tourists coming to Phuket are interested in adventure sports such as diving and rock climbing. Having this shooting range will provide additional activities for them, so they might decided to stay in Phuket longer. This can help promote tourism," he said.

Number crunching pays off

eciding what to spendon sales and market ing for a new development can be a daunting task. Taking a big picture approach of key financial numbers for the project and then working through the details makes considerably more sense than putting together a wish list of an advertising and promotion plan that may overshoot budget.

It's important to work from a holistic, number-driven approach and set up spending limits and performance measures for gauging results.

First, look at revenue or sales projections and break these down into realistic assumptions, such as the pace of sales – that is, how many units

you expect to sell each month. It's wise to compare your per-squaremeter selling prices with a competitive set of properties already in the market.

Also, verify whether your projection is realistic by comparing the sales rate of competing products and factor in other considerations, such as seasons, that can affect sales over the course of a year.

There are more visitors during the tourist season, but property sales are highest when a certain profile of visitors are on the island, including higher networth individuals and strong representation from Hong Kong and the UK. Historically, more than 70% of annualized sales are from October to April, though this trend varies for upper-tier luxury properties.

penses include commissions paid in-house and to outside agents, as well as sales staff costs and all advertising, promotions and marketing of the project. While there is no industry standard percentage of sales and marketing expenses, expenses are most often expressed as a percentage of total sales.

Local trends in medium to high-end condominium, townhouse and villa developments aimed at overseas buyers show that sales and marketing expenses are usually about 10% of

Having sales and marketing expenses pegged at about 3% of total sales was once the norm for the local market. However, the percentage is moving upwards significantly, so budgets need to cater to this and may see the com-

bination of internal and external commissions reach about 5% of total sales, and incentive schemes with higher rates paid according to a progressive

> scale are more common among the larger agents.


Significant components of the expenses budget will be print advertising; e-marketing, including

Website, on-line banners, "pay per click" and direct email; tradeshows and exhibitions; point-of-sale material; billboards; entertainment and sales office expenses; and public relations.

These costs should be broken into line items and match up with expense items in the monthly and annual profit and loss statements, in order to monitor costs against the initial budgets.

Back up the items with specific-detailed assumptions such as ad placements in particular news-

portant is tracking the source of sales leads, which leads to a "conversion factor" showing how many potential customers who walk in the door finally buy the product.

Have sales staff set up a daily-traffic record of customer contacts via agents, direct contact, Internet, phone and to also ask direct customers how they came to visit the property. Each month when you review expenses, also analyze sales data. Cumulate the results for the month and see what is producing the most sales.

Two critical exercises are reviewing how effective your spending is and where are the most sales generated. Marketing plans are not set in stone. You need to rework strategies, create new ideas and constantly improve to meet a changing market. Often you see projects that have 70% of their sales from outside agents but spend 80% of their marketing on stand-alone advertising. A more logical approach would be to adjust the spending to co-op advertising or using greater incentives to encourage more sales from that venue.

In most cases, marketing is one of the most liked parts of property development. It allows you to use your creative juices, experiment and create both image and product.

Equally important, though, is that any development is a business and the same rules apply to cost management as they do to construction.

Measuring results throughout the sales cycle, adapting and moving to the market and not letting your ego get in the way of solid business judgment is key to getting the payday you want at the project's end.
