Chalong appointed new police chief

CHALONG: Following the recent spate of muggings and robberies that have marred the south of the island, former Phuket City Police Deputy Superintendent Col Samarn Chainarong took up the post of Superintendent at Chalong Police Station on November 9.

The move, which saw former Chalong Police Superintendent Col Chalit Kaewyarat transferred to Takuapa District Police Station in Phang Nga, came as part of an annual reshuffle ordered by Royal Thai Police Headquarters in Bangkok.

Col Samarn's jurisdiction covers Chalong, Rawai, Nai Harn and Kata-Karon.

A number of recent crimes in Phuket, including the burglary of Don's Mall in Rawai November 2, have been linked to the shortage of police officers covering the large area that falls under Chalong Police's control.

Phuket Provincial Police Superintendent Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch has continued to request more officers and a new police district at Kata-Karon.

Col Samarn, who in 2004 served as deputy superintendent of Phuket Town Police Station, said that in order to boost security he has ordered an increased number of police patrols throughout his jurisdiction.

A number of checkpoints have also been set up, he added.

Col Samarn Chainarong announced that Chalong Police officers on November 8 had arrested two of four people involved in a series of robberies, recovering 67 stolen items.

Col Samarn said in a press release that Chalong Police had been monitoring the gang and

pulled over Kaewjai Sooksabai, 35, as she was driving along Narisorn Rd in Phuket City. In her car, police found a stolen notebook computer and wireless Internet aircard, he said.

Kaewjai, who works as a parking attendant, was arrested and taken to Chalong Police Station. Police then swooped on known-accomplice Cherdchai Thunchart, 27, at his home at an undisclosed address.

Cherdchai, originally from Trang province, was arrested and at his home police recovered 66 stolen items, including cellphones, cameras, amulets and notebook computers, said Col Samarn.

Kawejai and Cherdchai have been charged with robbery and are being held at Chalong Police Station.

Col Samarn named two accomplices to the robberies: Prasert Nasorn and Piya Thunchart.

"Kawejai sold the stolen items around the island. The other three drove around at night, looking for empty houses to rob," he said.

Patong porn director caught red-handed

PATONG: A Kathu Police investigations unit arrested an Indonesian adult-film producer in his hotel room November 8 after he was caught conducting a photo shoot with a Thai ladyboy.

Pol Sub Lt Nitikorn Rawang, duty officer of Kathu Police Station, said the bust took place at 4:20 am.

After receiving a tip-off that a video shoot was taking place in room 314 of the Sup Inn on Soi Patong Resort, police entered the room to find it had been converted into a makeshift studio.

Police arrested Indonesian Farisa Riyadi, 35, and took 32year-old Thai ladyboy Phinit "Nong Ning" Lakharn, 32, for questioning at Kathu Police headquarters.

Nong Ning, from Yasothorn, who has undergone complete gender "re-assignment" surgery, told police that she agreed to pose for the Indonesian in return for 1,000 baht cash.

Mr Riyadi offered the same payment package to other ladyboys in the Bangla area. Many also had sex with other models for 3,000 baht, she said.

The models had to sign consent forms and all were aware that the images were intended for global distribution, she added.

Evidence seized in the raid included sexual stimulation items, a video camera, a laptop computer with Internet access and VCD packaging sleeves.

The suspect was sent to Phuket Provincial Court and released after paying a fine, Pol Sub Lt Nitikorn said. He was unable to remember the amount of the fine.

Nong Ning was released without charge.





Global pub crawl to tour Phuket

PHUKET: Fun-seeking Australians will be quenching their thirst on the island next year as part of the first Round-the-World Pub Crawl organized by Australian tour company Thirsty Swagman.

The group of 25 drinking travelers will enjoy a month-long party, traveling "Around the World in 60 Pubs", starting from London on March 24, 2008.

They will be draining the kegs in more than 60 pubs and bars across four continents over 25 days in 11 worldwide destinations, including Munich, Prague, Reykjavik, Dusseldorf, Austria, Australia, New Zealand, Honolulu and Cancun.

Phuket was the only Thailand crawl-stop selected by the group due to its "reputation for nightlife and choice of pubs and bars with live music", said Karen Logan, Media and Online Manager at Thirsty Swagman.

The globe-trotting pub crawlers pay AUS\$11,900 for what Thirsty Swagman founder Kenneth Hart hails as, "the ultimate adventure to the finest nightlife destinations on earth, without any boring sightseeing or early wake-ups".

Phuket prepares for national elections

PHUKET CITY: Crowds of supporters turned out to cheer Phuket's national political party representatives as they registered their candidacies and drew lots to be assigned their ballot numbers at Phuket Community Hall on November 12.

Eight candidates representing four of the five political parties running in the December 23 national election turned out on the first day of registration.

Registration closed November 16.

The five parties competing in this year's general election are: The Democrat Party, the Thai Nation Party, Palang Prachachon, Ruamjai Thai Chart Pattana Party and Puea Pandin Party.

Each of the five parties is represented by two candidates in Phuket.

Phuket Representatives for the Democrat Party are Tossaporn Thepabutr and Rewat Areerob, who drew number 1 and 2 ballot numbers, respectively.

Sgt Sorranun Sane and Somchart Somnam, Phuket Rep-

resentatives for the Thai Nation Party, drew ballot numbers 3 and 4 respectively.

Phuket Representatives for the Palang Prachachon, the second to draw lots on the day, are former Thai Rak Thai representatives Dr Sriyada Shinawatra and Wisut Santikul. They drew ballot number 5 and 6, rspectively.

Phuket Representatives for the Ruamjai Thai Chart Pattana Party are Chawit Tungku and Chaipitak Apichitsitthikul, who drew ballot numbers 7 and 8 respectively.

Puea Pandin Party representatives were set to register their candidacy and draw lots for their ballot numbers on November 15.

Gambling tops October crime statistics

PHUKET: Gambling topped the latest crime statistics released by Phuket Provincial Police, with 197 arrests in October.

In second place, 94 people were arrested for drug-related cases, of which 64 involved *ya bah* (methamphetamine) with a total of 7,128 pills seized.

Seventeen people were arrested for the use of cannabis, with 4346.74 grams (4.3 kilograms) confiscated.

There were three arrests for inhalant abuse and six for possession of *krathom* (an indigenous Thai plant that acts as a mild stimulant) with 499 leaves seized.

Nine people were arrested for possession of an "inhalant" with nine bags of contraband seized, while two people were arrested for possession of "ice" (crystal methamphetamine) with four small bags seized.

There were 88 cases of theft reported, seven involving motorcycles, with arrests made in 57 of the cases.

Four attempted murders were reported in October, with three cases "solved". Twelve arrests were made from 20 reports of assault.

Local Health Office issues cholera advisory

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Health Office (PPHO) is advising the public to exercise caution regarding food cleanliness following a surge in the number of cholera cases nationwide.

PPHO Chief Dr Wanchai Sattayawutthipong said Phuket is among 40 provinces with reported cases of cholera. "There have been 62 reported cases of the disease in Phuket, but the situation is under control and less widespread than in other provinces, such as Ranong, where more than 200 cases of cholera have been reported," he said.

Cholera is caused by a bacteria, which can enter the body through contaminated food or water.

"The bacteria that causes cholera was found in raw cockles being consumed in Kon Kaen but cockles from Phuket have turned up negative in recent lab tests," Dr Wanchai said.

He advised that the best way to avoid contracting cholera was to avoid raw meats and unhygienically prepared food, especially seafood such as shrimp, and food that had been left a long

B5m of fake goods seized in Patong

PHUKET CITY: Thai Regional Customs Bureau 4 and the Phuket Customs Office held a press conference November 9 at Phuket Customs House to announce the seizure of counterfeit goods worth 5 million baht from a wholesaler in Patong.

After being arrested and confessing to trading in counterfeit goods, the wholesaler was released November 9 without charge.

Regional Customs Bureau 4 Director Rakop Srisuppa-at and Phuket Customs chief Jakson Kitarmorn showed the media the goods, which comprised 4,326 purses, handbags and pieces of luggage together with more than 10,000 items of clothing bearing the names and logos of wellknown brand names, including Billabong and Polo.

The media was told the counterfeit goods robbed the government of tax revenue and tarnished the nation's image and would soon be destroyed.

The press conference followed the arrest of Manote Srirat at 207 Soi Patong Beachlord, off Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd in Patong, on the morning of November 8.

K. Manote was not at the press conference. His case would be turned over to police for

processing, the press conference was told.

"This case serves to remind those who want to trade in illegal goods in Phuket that they will be arrested," said K. Rakop.

"Manote confessed that he bought the merchandise from a trader with the intent to supply retailers. Phuket Customs will continue to investigate and track down two retailers alleged to have sold goods bought from him," he

K. Manote was released on November 9. He will face no further criminal prosecution, said K. Jaksorn.

The 5-million-baht price tag was Customs' estimated wholesale value. The total retail value would be far higher, K. Jaksorn

The haul was the biggest seizure of counterfeit goods by Phuket Customs in 10 years. Although counterfeit, the goods were of a very high quality, he

However, Customs has to take into account Phuket's image when deciding to conduct raids on small retailers operating in areas popular with tourists, he said.

Tour agent found stabbed, throat slashed

KATHU: Tung Tong Police are investigating the death of Sommai Chumee, 37, a travel agency representative found with his throat slashed in his home at the Irawadee Ketho residential development on November 9.

Tung Tong Police Inspector Lt Col Kittipong Klaikaew confirmed reports that the victim had been stabbed repeatedly in the neck but had sustained no other iniuries.

He said the murder was probably carried out in the early hours of Friday.

Restaurant worker and friend Attiket Chanwongsepaisal found K. Sommai, originally from Phatthalung province, lying face up and naked on his bed about 1

working as a representative for

two local tour agencies, he said.

Col Kittipong denied reports that the victim had been robbed of 800,000 baht in cash, including pounds sterling, and other valuables including a laptop computer.

None of the people police have questioned reported that K. Sommai had that much cash, he said.

However, Col Kittipong added that one Caucasian friend of the deceased said that he had lost a few tens of thousands of baht that had given to K. Sommai for safe keeping.

Police are investigating a wide range of motives for the murder, including jealously and a possible business dispute.

comment on reports that the police have information about a young male suspect from Songkhla's Haad Yai district who was seen with victim before his death and is presumed to have been one of his lovers.

Fearing that making a statement could jeopardize the investigation, Col Kittipong said more information would be disclosed only when an arrest in the case is imminent.


Case closed on Korean's death

PHUKET CITY: The police investigation into the death of Korean tour guide Kim Kyoung Hoon, 39, who fell to his death from the rooftop of The Metropole hotel in downtown Phuket City on November 2, has concluded that Mr Kim's death was the result of suicide.

Phuket City Police Capt Krerkrit Ritnuang told the Gazette that Korean embassy officials initially suspected that Mr Kim's death may not have been suicide but the investigation has revealed no evidence to conclude that he was murdered."

"The case has been closed and our findings will be sent to the Public Prosecutor and the Phuket Governor," Capt Krerkrit added.

Tourists accuse Patong

n October 21, an Internet user started a thread entitled "Hotel in Phuket simply a trap for tourists!" on the Phuket forum of the ThaiVisa. com website.

The user accused staff of the Sea Sun Sand Resort in Patong of robbing himself and other guests of cash stored in their room safes and covering it up by erasing segments of CCTV surveillance tapes.

The issue sparked some 91 blogposts. Here, *Gazette* staff report on the official reaction to some of the accusations.

Holidaymakers on the record

fter a 12-day trip to Phuket in October, I wanted to advise you of our experience at our hotel the Sea Sun Sand in Patong.

After talking to surrounding restaurant and shop workers it seems to be common knowledge to the locals. We had been staying at the hotel nearly a week and had been using the safe in the room for our money, which was in cash.

Our friends had their money in \$1,000 lots and when going to the safe they noticed one of the piles did not have an elastic band around it, so they checked their money.

There was \$200 missing out of two of the piles and \$100 miss-

ing out of the other one. We checked our safe to discover \$350 missing.

We then told our Swiss neighbors and some other people sitting by the pool what had happened and went up to report the theft to the reception.

On our arrival there were two other guests reporting the theft of American dollars out of their two rooms. The reception staff told us that no one could get into the safes and that we were wrong.

Repeated requests to talk to a manager or the owner either in person or on the phone were met with repeated denials. We were basically told to shut up and go back to our rooms.

While at reception, another couple came up to report the theft of money out of the safe. After discussions, the less naive of the victims decided not to waste any more time of their holiday seeking out the police and went back to their rooms.

At the Tourist Police office, there was a note on the door saying they weren't available. It was Friday and they were closed on the weekend, so we went to the local police...

They weren't particularly interested until the two Swiss men came in to report the theft of francs out of both of their rooms.

The policeman admitted that

they have had a lot of problems with this hotel, but had not been able to do much about it because the staff were not very helpful. They would send a detective around to the hotel, he said.

After waiting five hours, the detective came, talked and joked with staff, at one point even caressing the reception man's el-

He then told us that they were not very forthcoming and were calling all of us liars. The detective said he would be back at 2 pm the next day with his captain.

When they eventually came the next day, six of the victims were at the reception and together with the detective. They were shown some video surveillance footage that had a lot of deleted parts.

There was some footage of a cleaner walking into one of the victim's rooms with no cleaning products at all and walking out minutes later with a towel scrunched up in her hand. Surely suspicious, but the staff were all adamant that it was nothing.

They said we were all liars trying to get out of paying our bills, which [in our case] had already paid. The detective then said he would take the girl down for questioning and the police left in their car. The girl, another cleaner and a male from the reception left in another car.

Whether they made it to the police station we don't know, but they came back laughing.

The male from reception just smirked and patted his back pocket.

Again, repeated requests to talk to the manager or owner were met with denials. We were told the owner would be coming from Bangkok after we had all left Thailand and wouldn't come back any earlier and wouldn't talk to us at all.

It appears to be a well-run racket involving most if not all staff and they rely on people not

knowing exactly how much money they have and not noticing the theft of a couple of notes.

Becoming very frustrated by the charade, we bought some drinks and sat in the reception area to warn people not to leave money in their safe and to check if they already had money in it.

This angered the staff. Incredibly, and within minutes, they had police at reception.

After more heated discussions, we were told to pack up our bags and get out or we would be spending the next three days in a Thai jail. After going down on Monday to the tourist police again and finding the same note on the door, we finally said "enough is enough".

We decided that there was no way of stopping them. The only way to help fellow tourists was to use the Internet and spread the word to anyone who would listen. As the victims were Australian, Swiss, German, Japanese and American we figure we can let quite a few know.

We found it very distressing to be treated like criminals for complaining about being victims.


OFFICIAL REACTIONS

The *Gazette* presented printed copies of the initial blog to several top officials to get their reactions. Phuket Tourist Police chief Pol Maj Bundit Khaosutham said he was unaware of the case.

Concerned, he said he asked the hotel in question to submit a police report of the incident with his office. He then faxed a copy of the one-page statement, written on Sea Sun Sand Resort stationery, to the *Gazette*.

The statement issued by resort General Manager Preecha Nuwongsri listed the first two guests' theft claims as follows: Room A201: US\$100 and 50 euros missing; A202: US\$200 missing.

As the guests were unsat-

isfied with the review of the CCTV tapes, they were told then to file a complaint with the police and request an investigation.

The guests replied by asking: "If we do not file a complaint, would the hotel be prepared to let them check out free of charge?" They were told that was impossible, because the police first have to be called in to see if there was in fact any theft.

They were asked why they would be willing to accept such compensation, when the amount of the theft they reported (if any theft did occur) was more than what was owed to the hotel.

After talking with the first two, the occupants of C104 and C105 soon appeared and reported

\$500 and \$350 [currency not specified] missing from their safes two days earlier.

They then spoke to the guests in rooms C106 and C107, who also claimed to have been robbed of similar amounts.

They all went to report it to the police, since they all knew each other. The guests went out and came back a while later with a copy of the police report, saying the police would return between 4 pm and 6 pm.

But at the specified time period the police did not arrive, so they were asked to wait.

As they were waiting, the guest from room C105 went to talk with other guests, telling them that his money had been stolen.

He was told not to say that, as there was no proof and the hotel's reputation was at stake, the statement ended.

GM Preecha, who was on vacation when the incident took place, later told the *Gazette* that the hotel opened five years ago and had numerous security features, including a single access way and CCTV. The hotel has been a hit with tourists, enjoying 100% occupancy even in the low season, he added.

After talking with his front desk manager who was on duty at the time, he said he thought that perhaps the guests wanted to file a false insurance claim, then became embarrassed and reacted angrily in an attempt to save face when confronted with the truth.

It is implausible as none of the room maids were on duty at the time of the alleged theft, K. Preecha said.

"Our staff tried to get more detail from the Thai wife of one of the Australian tourists who checked in at 6 pm that night. They thought it would be easier to communicate with her, but she was evasive.

"That night they were drinking whiskey, making a lot of noise and using bad language in the reception area, giving bad information to other tourists.

"We asked them to drink someplace else, but they wouldn't stop. Finally, the police asked them to check out and I think this caused them to lose face," he said.

Kathu Police Superintendent Col Grissak Songmoonnak recently told the *Gazette* that Thailand is one of the top countries for insurance fraud, with many tourists reporting thefts to police to acquire the police reports.

They then file a claim with their insurer and receive a free vacation, he said. When the police investigate and request evidence such as receipts, many of the tourists are unable to produce them. Many become aggressive, he added.

Asked about this case, he said the tourists who had come to his station were asked to return to his police station for further questioning, but none had.


A police review of the CCTV footage revealed no evidence whatsoever of damage to or theft of their property, he added.

He promised to raise the subject at the monthly Phuket Provincial Security Committee meeting at the Katina Hotel in Phuket City on October 29.

At that meeting, Kathu Police Deputy Superintendent Pol Lt Col Chartchai Nichothanond confirmed what has superior had already told the *Gazette*, "It is very difficult for the staff to open a guest's safe unless they know the combination.

"We asked the victims to come back to the station for further questioning, but not one of them actually did," he said, noting that the tourists showed signs of annoyance when asked to do so.

"Without further questioning it simply isn't possible to determine whether or not their accusations are true," he said.

Friendship ends in deadly debate

NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: Political discussions can get a little heated the world over, but in Thailand few provinces are more renowned for fiery political debate than Nakhon Sri Thammarat, where formerly close friendships have been known to fall to pieces over political disagreement.

In the latest case, however, the debate turned fatal.

In the early hours of November 8, Wichan Santiwarakul, 31, a member of Bang Nop Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) was shot multiple times at the funeral of Khim Meenuan, 70, in Village 4 Tambon Bang Bon Hua Sai District around 1 am. He died on route to Hua Sai hospital.

The cause of his murder? Having the temerity to suggest to fellow mourners that People Power Party (PPP) leader Samak Sundaravej wouldn't dare appear in a televised debate alongside Democrat Party leader Abhisit Vejjajiva.

Witnesses told police that following the funeral rites, guests, including many local politicians, sat down to eat and drink. They also began watching a televised debate among leaders of some of the Kingdom's prominent political parties. Among those taking part was K. Abhisit. Marked by his absence was, K. Samak, self-confessed nominee of ousted former premier Thaksin Shinawatra.

After a fair amount of drinking, the guests began to discuss the performance of the various party leaders. Witnesses reported that K. Wichan, a staunch Democrat, began to taunt his friend Thepnimit "Yai Thep" Khongjan, 31. Yai Thep, Chief of Tambon Bang Nop Village 1 and a PPP supporter, was forced to

endure K. Wichan's charges that K. Samak dared not face K. Abhisit in a live TV debate.

Enraged by the slur on the very man charged with keeping the spirit of Thai Rak Thai alive, Yai Thep pulled out his .38 pistol and unleashed a fusillade of fire at K. Wichan, hitting him in the left temple, neck and shoulder.

An eyewitness, who asked not to be named, told reporters, "After the ceremonies were done, the guests, including many village chiefs and *OrBorTor* members watched the party leaders debate about a number of issues on Modernine TV. As it got late and the guests got drunk, they began to discuss politics. K. Wichan, a big fan of K. Abhisit, mocked K. Samak, saying that he didn't dare come and share his opinions with the leaders of all the other parties.

"This riled Thepnimit, who had been drinking heavily and was

already struggling to control himself. Thepnimit went on the attack, defending K. Samak. He then pulled out a pistol and shot K. Wichan repeatedly until he fell off his chair and collapsed on the floor. Thepnimit then ran to his car and sped away," the witness said.

Col Athip Nakhomnee, Investigating Officer at Bang Nop Tambon Police Station, said that K. Wichan and Thepnimit were close friends who had gone to school together and lived in nearby villages. Before the incident they had been chatting and drinking happily together. The problem started when they turned to discuss politics, Col Athip added.

Police contacted Thepnimit's relatives, asking them to persuade the man to give himself up. If Thepnimit does not surrender voluntarily, a manhunt will be launched, police said.

full moon will light the sky and the glow of thousands of candles will decorate Phuket's waterways on the night of November 24 as Phuket celebrates Loy Krathong, probably one of Thailand's most charming and spectacular traditional festivals, which offers thanks to the water goddess Mae Khongkha.

Loy means to "float" and a krathong is a lotus-shaped vessel made with sliced sections of banana tree stems and decorated with folded banana tree leaves and flowers. A candle, three incense sticks, coins, a few strands of hair and fingernail clippings are placed on the krathong before it is put afloat on the water, to be carried wherever the current will take it.

Loy Krathong is a family event with young and old taking part in the traditional ceremonies that culminate in the evening when the *krathong* are set afloat and wishes are made. It is also a time when young love blossoms in a romantically charged atmosphere.

Traditionally, a courting couple will release a *krathong* together with the strands of the pair's hair and nail clippings in it. The distance the current carries their vessel of love is supposed to predict their fate as a couple. A *krathong* that sinks or one that doesn't get carried away by the current is not a good sign of things to come.

When the candles and incense sticks are lit, a wish is made and thanks are given to the water goddess as the *krathong* is set afloat from the sea shore, the banks of a lake or river or even on a small pond. The *krathong* is believed to carry away the maker's bad karma and make wishes come true for the following year.

Beauty pageants called "Noppamas Queen Contests" are a traditional activity on Loy Krathong, performed in remembrance of Noppamas, a legendary figure from the Sukhothai period. Ancient transcripts refer to her as the chief royal consort

of historical Sukhothai King Lithai. She is said to have made the first decorated *krathong* to float on the river for the occa-

Families spend the day making their *krathong* to float in the evening but many roadside stalls around the island will be selling *krathong*, especially near waterways and beaches.

Here is a roundup of some of the Loy Krathong festivities being held around the island:

Phuket City. Phuket City Municipality is holding Loy Krathong festivities at Saphan Hin from November 22 to 24, with stages and stalls in front of Phuket Community College, at the activity court in front of the gymnasium and, or course, along the waterfront

A Thai country and folk song contest for the city's students will be held during the night fair on November 22. On November 23 there will be a drawing contest during the day and a junior

Noppamas Queen contest will be held in the evening for local students.

During the day of November 24, a miniature garden model contest will be held. In the evening, nine parades will be making their way from Karon City Municipality offices to Saphan Hin from 6:30 pm to 8 pm. The parades will be different themes to honor HM The King, the nation, different faiths, Brahman faith, Mae Khongkha (goddess of water) and the legend of Noppamas as well as more general themes of culture, Loy Krathong and the present-day.

After the parades arrive at Saphan Hin, local fishermen will perform a *Kor Jan* boat ceremony by releasing a decorative boat into the sea from Klong Bang Yai, followed by nine fireworks in honor of HM The King.

Karon. Karon Municipality is holding Loy Krathong Festivities at Karon Park, locally called the *nong harn*, from November 16

to 24. There will be fair stalls, Noppamas Queen Contests, cabaret shows and live music performances over the weeklong festivities.

Noppamas Queen Contest entrants can apply at Phuket Municipality offices during government office hours. Applicants must be over 18 years old and submit their application with a portrait photograph.

First, second and third place contest winners will receive trophies and 20,000 baht, 15,000 baht, 10,000 baht respectively. An additional prize of 10,000 baht, a sash and a trophy will be presented to the contestant voted most popular by the audience.

Cherng Talay. Cherng Talay Municipality is holding Loy

Krathong Festivities at the T-junction entrance to Laguna Beach Resort on November 24, from 7 pm to 10:30 pm, with a highlight pop performance by the popular Thai singer Moss.

There will be fireworks, balloons and lighting decorating the fair as well as a *krathong* five meters wide and 400 lights floating on the lagoon.

Other activities include dancers from Bangkok, with Phuket girl Miss Teen Thailand 2006 Amelia Jacobs live on stage, a Noppamas Queen contest, a *krathong*-arranging contest, a puppet show by Huachiew Chalermprakiet University as well as games booths and lucky draws.

wo Trang men have confessed to the killing of four-year-old Natjaya "Wawa" Sadan, who was found naked and beaten to death under a bridge in Phatthalung earlier this month, police in that province have announced.

The suspects were named by Trang Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Prasert Jansawang as Wichit Yongsata, 45, Wawa's stepfather, and his natural son Aekalak Yongsata, 23.

At a press conference on November 11, Gen Prasert told reporters that Wawa disappeared from a pickup truck at a market in Trang, where she had been left unattended by her mother, Rachana Taraodee, 25, as she went to do her shopping.

Three days later, Wawa's body was found under Khlong Tao Bridge in Phatthalung.

Gen Prasert said that on November 10 police requested an arrest warrant for the pair from Trang Provincial Court. They based their application on witness statements and forensic evidence implicating the two men.

The pair initially denied any involvement in the killing, but after a night of heavy questioning they confessed that they and two other men had murdered Wawa, Gen Prasert said.

Wichit admitted that he had killed Wawa because he was angry that Wawa's maternal grandfather, Mukda Saraodee, 65, had transferred all of his assets to Wawa and not to K. Rachana, who Wichit had married about six months ago, Gen Prasert said.

K. Mukda told reporters that Wichit had always been welcome and respected by the family, which had helped him with his career many times and given him a place to live.

Wichit chose to repay the family's kindness with this brutal act, K. Mukda said.

As a large crowd had gathered outside the police station to catch a glimpse of the suspects, extra officers were called in to

control the crowd and prevent a lynching. The two men wore balaclavas during the announcement.

Student shot. A technical college student was shot dead as he was riding his motorcycle in Songkhla in the evening of November 10.

Witnesses reported that Kasakon Sangkhakon, 18, a first-year student at Songkhla Technology School, was riding home from the market in front of Wachiranukul Songkhla School around 9:30 pm when two youths on a motorcycle began trailing him

Realized that he was being followed, K. Kasakon sped up in an attempt to escape his pursuers. When he slowed down to round a corner near the offices of Ruam Jai Ku Phai volunteer rescue foundation, the youths

caught up and the boy riding pillion drew a 9mm pistol and fired three times.

After K. Kasakon fell off his motorbike, his attackers rode away at high speed. Volunteers from the Ruam Jai Ku Phai Foundation rushed him to Songkhla Hospital, but he died en route. An examination showed the victim had bullet wounds to the back, shoulder and wrist.

Police collected two empty 9mm cartridges from the scene to be used as evidence. Police are questioning friends and relatives of K. Kasakon to try to shed some light on the identity of his killers.

Four times 115. Police in Trang's Na Yong district arrested a father and son and confiscated 115 kilograms of *krathom* leaves on November 9.

Khlaow Thongrot, 31, and his son Songwut Thongrot, 18, both from Waeng district in Narathiwat, were arrested as they were preparing to drive to the Deep South, where the leaves were to be sold, police said.

On searching the suspects'

Opel sedan, police found 115 kilograms of *krathom* leaves, 48 bottles of cough medicine, an 11mm pistol together with magazine and seven bullets and a bankbook showing deposits of more than 40,000 baht.

The two men admitted that they had bought the *krathom* from a relative in Na Yong with the intention of selling it with the cough medicine to youths in the Deep South, police said.

Krathom leaves and cough syrup are the principal ingredients of "Four Times a Hundred", a new drug cocktail sweeping the Deep South.

Another ingredient commonly added to the mix is mosquito repellent.

Tree terrorists. A man was arrested November 8 for illegal logging on National Park land in Surat Thani's Don Sak District.

After receiving information about logging activity in Ban Chong Khao Khan Bet National Park, about 30 police officers set off to the park to investigate.

In the park, they found that *newspapers*.

five trees had been felled and cut into about 350 planks of wood.

Placed under immediate arrested was 40-year-old Ord Khao-on, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat's Khanom District.

The felled trees included White Seraya (Parashorea stellata) and *champaka* (Michelia champaca), both protected species.

Ord told officers that he had been hired only to help transport the wood and had taken no part in cutting the trees down.

He was hired by fellow Khanom district resident Chaliow Damsuk and was working with five other men whose names he didn't know, he added.

Forestry officers said they did not believe Ord's story. They handed him in to Don Sak District Police to be charged with logging protected forest land without permission and possession of wood from a protected species.


Don Sak District Chief Phaisan Trithanya said that he believed there was an "influential figure" funding the operation and that Ord was just a hired worker.

As it is an unspoilt area, Ban Chong Khao Khan Bet National Park is the target of influential businessmen who would like to use the area for agriculture, especially palm and rubber plantations, K. Phaisan said.

District authorities will increase security measures to prevent any recurrences, K. Phaisan said.

He also called for village headmen, tambon chiefs and the public to work together to protect the forest.

Warning issued over 'chat rooms'

hat rooms and socialnetworking websites have opened a new channel for criminals to prey on Thai youths, the Thai Health Promotion Foundation has

Ekkalak Lumchumkhae of the children's rights group Mirror Foundation said that while many major chat rooms had been taken offline, the problem remained because operators linked servers to home phone lines and continued to run the chat rooms illegally.

Such services reportedly charge three baht for 30 minutes, which was cheaper and more convenient for youths to talk with their friends and strangers than by telephone.

At least five girls under 15 went missing after using such chat rooms, K. Ekkalak said.

Many girls under 18 were using chat rooms, so men were drawn to them to buy sex or coax them out to rape them, he added.

Many kids became addicted, chatting at least 10 times a day and many parents had contacted the foundation out of worry about their kids' behavior, such as going out at night with "friends" they did not know, he said.

The government should set up an agency to register and regulate chat room operators so that their services would be appropriate and would show responsibility to society and prevent abuse, he said.

ThaiHealth official Sunit Chettha said that people post personal information in chat rooms, thus putting themselves at risk.

Ill-intentioned people could access information to learn users' routines and behavior and to pretend to make friends with them before persuading them out for sexual dates or physically attack them, he warned.

Reality check. Most people can tolerate a corrupt government as long as their personal wellbeing is cared for, an opinion survey by the Center for the Promotion of

National Strength on Moral Ethics and Values and Abac Poll Research Center has revealed.

Culture Minister Khunying Khaisri Sri-aroon said that the poll indicates that most Thais lack a clear conscience of what is right and wrong.

The mindset could bode poorly for the December 23 general election, she noted.

K. Khaisri called on everyone to exercise caution and look back to see how crooked governments had hurt the country. "Poor people can be ethical. We should embrace sufficiency economics,' she said.

Study tour tragedy. The owner and operator of a longtail boat was charged with recklessness leading to deaths following the drowning of three passengers in Samut Prakan on November 4.

Indonesian postgraduate student Lino Kalady Kiyato and Thais Nongnuch Paiboon and Wiman Vetchakul drowned when the longtail carrying a group of about 40 academics sunk in a canal after striking a submerged electrical power pole.

Boat owner Jamnong Khienjamnong, 40, turned himself in to police the following day. He told police he was taking the group to Klong Ta Perm Pier so that they could take a bus back to Bangkok when he heard a loud scrape under the boat, followed by water flooding in and passengers screaming.

The boat sank before he could reach the shore, so he helped passengers to safety before fleeing the scene to calm down before turning himself in,

The group of 36 scholars from Chulalongkorn University, including postgraduates and researchers from Australia, Japan, Indonesia and Vietnam, were returning from a trip to inspect coastal erosion in Phra Samut Chedi district when the accident happened.

Mammoth mystery. Initial tests on six elephant corpses found in Chanthaburi last month indicate the cause of death as ingested herbicide, but it is not yet clear if deliberate poisoning was in-

Samart Sumanojitraporn, director of the National Parks. Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department's Wildlife Protection Office, said traces of paraquat and pesticide had been detected in the elephants' stomachs, though more detailed testing was needed.

Wild pachyderms and people had clashed in 22 places around the country, he said.

His office will bring residents and local authorities together to talk so they do not harm wild elephants.

The office will propose provincial "disaster-zone" funding to pay compensation to residents whose farms are destroyed by the elephants, he added.

Opting out. Labor Ministry permanent secretary Juthathawas Inthara-suksri expressed dismay at an announcement by 112 private hospitals that they would not renew their contracts with the Social Security Office (SSO) after the current agreements expire on December 31.

Many private hospitals are willing to take over the government subsidy to treat SSO beneficiaries under the deal, he said.

K. Juthathawas called the announcement a one-sided and unprovoked attack on the bureaucratic system. "They did not talk about conditions; all they talked about was how much money they had and how much more money they wanted.

"You can be sure that I am worried about their statement. I am sick of all this. Complaints are being made non-stop, despite our close and constant attention to the matter," he added.

K. Juthathawas also questioned the quality of service at the 112 hospitals, which he said were the subject of many complaints each year.

Free prosthesis. Suphansa Wichanant, who lost her right arm in a vicious attack led by an offduty Saraburi policeman in February, will soon be given a free prosthesis courtesy of the Royal Thai Police.

Suphansa Wichanant was brought to the Police General Hospital in Bangkok for an initial fitting for the prosthesis, which normally costs 57,000 baht.

K. Suphansa, 25, was working as a karaoke hostess at the time of the attack. She now makes a living selling garlands in a market in Pathum Thani, to which she travels from her home province of Angthong every day.

The officer behind the attack, L/Cpl Nirut Thammasap, was dishonorably discharged after being suspended temporarily following the attack.

He and two security volunteers, Nirand Kongtham and Prasan Bundok, are standing trial for attempted murder and assault resulting in severe and permanent injury, police said.

ood news. Bang Niang road is finally getting a drainage system. After years of lamenting about the problems of frequent flooding along this road, there is finally some action.

Bang Niang residents and business people are holding their breath, hoping that this time the drainage system is one that will work. Nothing much to do other than to wait and see.

Hopefully the pavement will be cleaned and repaired at the same time, but my guess is that this is too much to ask for.

Several new shops have opened or are in the process of being completed along Bang Niang Road. This is a good sign, since Bang Niang Rd left a rather abandoned and empty impression with visitors during past high season.

Many happy returns. Many tsunami survivors who lost their businesses in December 2004 have returned, the latest one being the pizzeria "Pinocchio" featuring Khao Lak's first wood-fired pizza oven, opening in the same spot where it was stood in 2004.

Hotels and resorts in Khao Lak announced an occupancy rate of 70% for late October and early November, while most are already fully booked over Christmas and New Year.

Bang Niang, unplugged

Bad news. The damaged section of highway near Khao Lak Lamru national park is still yet to be repaired. Some earth-moving equipment, including an excavator and tractor, has been parked near the site, but there is no machinery in place that would suggest a plan to tackle this serious problem.

We are also wondering why only one set of warning lights is functioning at a time.

Just a few hundred meters further down the highway in the direction of Tab Lamu, several accidents occurred due to heavy rain. Even after seven months of downpours, local drivers still find it an impossible task to drive un-

the curvy highway section leading up to Khao Lak Lamru national park.

The guard rails at the aforementioned curve are being repaired or replaced on an almost monthly basis. Not a week passes by without a serious accident occurring there, yet no measures have been implemented to make this curve safer for unaware or careless drivers.

Reader's proof. While most of the reader's comments I receive in regards to my Andaman Coasting column are positive and sup-

portive, I remember one particular email with very negative and offending content that was sent to me in February.

The reader, who lives in Phuket, claimed that what I wrote about Khao Lak being back in business was all a pack of lies and that there is noth-



he old Portuguese saying "come as a stranger, leave as a friend" seems especially applicable to Skippers restaurant and bar. The location doesn't hurt either, on the Royal Phuket Marina boardwalk, just a mast's length from a few million dollars' worth of gleaming yachts.

Peter Hay – the skipper – is one of those warm, enthusiastic people ideally suited to the hospitality business; he actually likes people.

Peter has been in aviation for 36 years, recently retiring as senior captain after 23 years' service with Cathay Pacific. Why embark on a new career as a restaurateur?

"I've been fascinated with the food and beverage industry all my life. I wanted to open my own restaurant and be able to offer value for money. I'm not into pretentious 'posey' restau-

rants and I object to being ripped off when I go out to dine, particularly when I'm asked to pay unreasonably high prices for average wines," he said.

build an appetite. An example of Skippers' value for money philosophy, it sells for 1,200 baht a bottle. Wine prices range from 990 to 2,300 baht a bottle – most being below 2,000 baht. The

Champagne, a Martin Laurent Reserve Brut, is reasonably priced at 3,900 baht.

Moving into the classic ocean-liner-lounge-style restaurant, we had the pleasure of being joined by Peter and the Marketing Manager for Skippers, Crystal Riedemann. An erstwhile professional ballet dancer turned itinerant restaurateur, Crystal spent 15 years working in restaurants from her South African birthplace to Madison Avenue, New York, and she has cruised three quarters around the world aboard the yacht Minico.

It was a call by the owners of Minico that brought Crystal and her husband to Phuket, initially for two months, but Crystal's talent for public relations and motherhood intervened and they simply never left.

The friendly atmosphere is engendered by the lively and welcoming crew of management and staff, anxious to please and taking obvious enjoyment in seeing customers having a good time.

On Peter's recommendation, we ordered a bottle of Sacred Hill Sauvignon Blanc 2005 from his adopted country of New Zealand. Rich and intense persistence of flavors, aromatic with big fruity characters and exceptional value at 1,200 baht a bottle.

My starter of Skippers Chicken Liver Paté arrived in good time from the kitchen of Head Chef Lee Prothero and Sous Chef Sirasak Tongkhot. Skippers doesn't skimp on portions and this was large enough to be shared, had I been feeling that generous.

Three large scoops of finepaste paté served with bowls of cocktail onions and black olives and a portion of toasted wheatgrain bread from the bakery at Les Anges across the boardwalk. The muted liver flavor, acidity of the onions and nutty taste of fully ripened olives urged me to keep this marvelous dish to myself.

My companion ordered the Andaman Tiger Prawn, pan fried and skewered with a stick of lemon grass to a rice-and-ratatouille base and served with a pesto and balsamic vinegar sauce. Cooked through but still moist, the prawn is a succulent mate for the Provençal mix of courgettes, tomatoes, green and red peppers, onions, garlic and aubergines.


For its Duck a l'Orange, Skippers uses slices of roasted duck in an orange reduction sauce, served on a bed of kale with pommes gratinée and a garnish of orange slivers with green aubergines. The duck cannot be cooked past pink in the middle or it will lose its moisture, but there were no such worries here. The slight bitterness of the kale countered the sweetness of the orange sauce and a balance of flavors was retained.

Next, the Stein's Seared Sea Bass was named after the celebrated British seafood chef Rick Stein from Cornwall, England. A goodly-sized pan-fried fillet of sea bass topped with strands of crisp deep fried turnip, was served with a wedge of pesto infused mashed potato with a covering of ratatouille and a cream sauce. The textures of cream and crunch and the acidic against alkaline flavors yielded a taste bonanza.

For dessert we shared a Trilogy of Crème Brûllée. One Cointreau-infused cream garnished with a fresh orange segment, one Kahlua with a slice of fresh Kiwi fruit and one traditional vanilla flavor cream garnished with a fresh strawberry and star fruit – scrumptious.

We even had an invite to join Peter for his weekend hobby of karting. "The best fun you can have in 10 minutes with your trousers on!" Talk about friendship...

Happily Ever After Beauty's search

any will remember bumbling Screech in "Saved by the Bell" and cute Drew Barrymore in ET. And what about Donny Osmond, the young singer who still hasn't managed to grow up? In 1996, Giulietta modeled baby dresses and appeared in real-estate advertisements.

Stepping back from the limelight, in 1997, five-year-old Giulietta moved to Italy with her family. Rejecting a number of offers for high-profile appearances, Giulietta knuckled down to concentrate on her primary edu-

Growing up in the southern Italian province of Enna in Sicily, Giulietta attended Nunzio Vaccalluzzo primary school in Leonforte before moving on to Dante Alighieri-Giovanni Verga middle school. After a brief stint at A. Lincoln linguistic high school, Giulietta's father moved the family to Phuket in June this year. Before returning to the motherland, however, there was still time to get in a few last-minute adver-

tisements for Innovactiva computer school and, with her younger brother, Notice Tour travel agency.

Although just 15 years old, Giulietta can speak seven languages. She is fluent in English, Italian and Thai, but can also speak some German, French, Spanish and old Latin. But Giulietta's talents don't end with her perfect skin and sharp tongue – she is also a keen sportswoman and enjoys running, water skiing and hip hop dancing.

In 2006, Giulietta won the Nicolas Green award for her painting of a chess board with a hand removing the queen, symbolizing that life is like a game of chess in that death can come at any time. She called the piece *Chessmate to Death*.

"I want to concentrate on my studies and graduate before embarking on a full time career. I enjoy the arts and would like to be a singer or music producer, but I also want to help poor people and do charity work. I want to play a part in helping to solve human problems," says Guilietta.

On one fateful day two months ago, Guilietta was walking with her mother's friend through a shopping center in Phuket. One minute she was window shopping for shoes and bags, the next she found herself signed up for the Miss Teen Thailand contest.

I made many new friends at the Miss Teen contest, I improved my Thai language and I learned a lot of important social skills.

"I just wanted to know how it would feel to be up there on stage and on TV. I thought it would be good to win the 100,000-baht prize so that I could give it to charity. I don't want to participate in beauty contests any more.

If Giulietta wins her heat, she will go forward to the national competition to be held in Bangkok in May next year. Anyone who wants to catch a glimpse of Giulietta in action can see her on stage November 24 at the Loy Krathong event in Saphan Hin where she will be performing with her band Alpha.

Guilietta dedicates most of her free time to striving toward becoming a famous singer. Not content with achieving stardom, she told the *Gazette* that she wants to help disadvantaged people around the world.

Giulietta is keen to finish her studies. Although she says that school in Italy is different to Thailand. She enjoys learning Mandarin and Thai languages here.

"From being in the Miss Teen contest I learned that to be in the entertainment industry you need to be strong in both mind and body. I also learned that it's important to be able to live with different people from different places and cultures," says Giulietta, who is also a certified massage therapist.

Sure to make someone the perfect wife in the future, Giulietta has a talent for cooking Italian food. She also wrote for *La Sicillia* newspaper in Italy about the differences between Thai and Italian cultures, also urging people to be aware of global warming.

And now the question on the tips of the tongues of every schoolboy in Phuket: does Miss Teen have a boyfriend? Giulietta admitted that she's actually more like a boy herself because she is both sporty and adventurous, which means that most boys in Phuket are too scared to approach her.

Giulietta is happy with her current single status, she says. There is hope yet.

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Thailand needs plastic surgery

have watched visitors to Thailand stand stunned, in total bemusement, at the supermarket checkout counter as the smiling till girl wraps a small box of mints in a shiny, new plastic bag that's going to pollute her lovely country for possibly millions of years to come.

If you buy a single apple in Thailand it absolutely has to be wrapped in polythene and then placed in another plastic bag at the checkout. The Thais even hand you sticky drinks from a roadside stall in a plastic bag with a straw protruding.

"Never miss an opportunity to increase the level of plastic in the environment" seems to be the Thai motto and it's followed with a dedication rarely seen in other public activities, such as observing the rules of the road for example. I've been enjoying Thailand's gracious hospitality for almost 20 years and it's been ever thus.

Like so much of our once-lovely earth, Thailand is drowning in its own waste. More than 25 million tonnes of waste a year, much of it plastic, goes into landfills all over this country. Think about the word "landfill" for a moment. It's grimly descriptive, isn't it?

We've all heard about the way developing nations "leapfrog" in the adoption of the latest technology, but not necessarily in their adoption of the basic essentials of civilization. So, too, with the adoption of polluting packaging it seems.

The closer recent forebears were to barely scraping a subsistence living from the earth, the more people seem to revel in the wonders of bright, modern over-



wrapping of every little doo-dad that bought from the latest mega shopping "destination".

This is sad indeed. It is such a small and obvious step for governments and corporations to legislate a "bring your own bag" policy, or charge for a new plastic bag, with the resulting money raised going into toward environmental protection.

Scandinavia and Ireland have been leaders in introducing such policies since 2002, and Ikea in the UK recently instituted a policy of charging for plastic bags with the proceeds donated to the Community Forests environmental organization. But here in Thailand that's unlikely to work.

Thailand's premier residential, retirement and holidaying regions such as the islands of Phuket and Samui are major pollution culprits. Being islands, the prob-

lems are exacerbated by limited availability of land to "fill" and the proximity of the dumps to expensive real estate developments.

It's all well and good adopting a sort of "toilet assumption" attitude to garbage. If you flush and it disappears, why do you have to ever think about it again?

Well, if you happen to live beside one of Thailand's burgeoning island landfills, you do. Nature has an intriguing way of striking back when she is damaged.

Groundwater sources eventually become contaminated Insects and vermin over

taminated. Insects and vermin over-breed and the next thing you know they are

swimming about in your infinity pool, for which you've just paid millions of baht.

We are all interlinked into Mother Nature's rhythms and there's no way of opting out of the vicious cycle of environmental damage.

So, while the frenzy to build property developments to sell to foreigners from all over the world continues, Thailand is storing up a massive pollution problem in which these investors in "paradise" are all going to share. It doesn't matter how many millions you pay for your island villa, when the plastic waste reaches critical mass, it will cause havoc without deference to bank balances.


The sort of highly discriminating international investors who buy into highend property in countries such as Thailand can flee just as quickly as they arrive. These buyers are very selective, and

want to take you higher – that seems to be the motto adopted by shoe designers for the coming winter season 2007/08.

Expect an onslaught of high-heeled boots and booties and even pump wearers will find themselves standing taller than they have done for years.

Pumps and high heels are eternally in fashion in some form in Europe. Such elegant footwear is certainly flattering to wear and that is important since the hottest fashion trends for men and women are all about showing off the feet and legs to the best effect.

Women's pencil skirts, leggings, skinny jeans and wider tops—today's new silhouettes and nofrills clothes designs provide more scope for adding glamor to an outfit by wearing distinctive shoes and bags.

"Accessories can be used to make a statement too and bring some color to an outfit," said Jelena Juric, who works for the Frankfurt-based rag-trade magazine *Textilwirtschaft*.

"More volume is the emphasis for women's tops and blouses while skirts are body-hugging. This is great for shoe fashion since it puts the feet and legs in the spotlight," said Katharina

The sky's the limit

The vogue for geometric design in clothing is reflected in equally clear-cut lines for shoes. According to the GDS international shoe and leather goods show in Dusseldorf, the 2007/08 season will be characterized by almost sculptured, architectural shapes.

"Minimized forms and high quality materials are set to play a prominent role in shoe trends for

the coming winter season, predict the GDS fashion scouts," said Andreas Rose, a stylist from Frankfurt.

"Lavish and high shine finishes are big this winter," said Andreas Rose.

Metallic finishes are also the talk of the town, with silver and discreet mineral hues to the fore. Golden, bronze and coppery tones are expected to dominate for special occasions.

Meanwhile, the color spectrum of the new winter shoe materials is essentially dark, say the experts at the Salamander shoe company in Baden-Wuerttemberg. Highlights are provided by red, purple and ultramarine blue and green.

Quality nappa, suedes and patent leathers exude an air of luxury with the higher heels. Flat, rounded ballerinas will remain popular this winter too and sports boots will have their place on the shelves, yet a mood of extravagance is in the air.

"Elegance is back again and extra-high heels are all the rage," said Jelena Juric, summing up the current direction. The new restrained look bans too many decorative details and so all eyes turn to the shape of heels themselves.

These range from chunky block forms to cone-like tapered versions and massive platform soles. The latter have inspired designers to use their imagination to the full.

"Some of them are virtual works of art," said Stefanie Koehn, a hairdresser and fashion advisor, commenting on the outlandish designs seen, such as asymetrically-stacked plateaus.

There is not only a large selection of different heels to choose from, the types of different shoe on sale for the autumn and winter months have grown considerably in number too.

Pumps, ballet flats and ankle boots are at the forefront of fashion, according to the German Shoe Institute in Offenbach. Alongside them are the so-called dandy slip-ons and lace-ups, which bear a strong resemblance to men's loafers, and knee-high boots with stiletto-like heels.

Ankle boots were "must haves" for dedicated followers of fashion last winter.


"Now they have really taken off," said Stefanie Koehn.

The classic 1980s shoe style has returned with a vengeance with lace-up, slip-on and zip-up versions on offer. Knee-high boots are not being neglected either, although the popularity of the ankle boot has put them in the shade a little.

"From a fashion point of view they are still important though," said Kathy Wenderoth, a buyer with the Goertz shoe company in Hamburg. She sees them as ideally complementing cardigans and straight trousers.

The combination of pumps and platform soles works well this autumn and winter and despite the coming cold, peep toes have also lost none of their allure. Those open-toe Mary Janes – the name given to a shoe style once reserved for children – are available in all sorts of versions too.

Just because it's raining in Phuket, there is no need to hide the toes either, thanks to what was once regarded as a fashion taboo, namely wearing open-toe shoes with thick tights or socks.





he 54th Macau Grand Prix, set to take place from November 15 to 18, will mark 25 years since the first Formula 3 Grand Prix was held there, a race completely dominated by Ayrton Senna (pictured), who secured pole position, wins in both legs and fastest lap.

While Formula 1 has taken the spotlight as the most watched motorsport in the world, the lesser-known Formula 3 has been the test track for many Formula 1 greats.

Among those taking part in that seminal event in 1983 were Gerhard Berger, now team boss of Scuderia Toro Rosso; Martin Brundle, the voice of ITV in England and probably one of the most talented F1 drivers never to win a race; and David Hunt, brother of the late world champion, James.

For 1985 it was again a Teddy Yip car, that of Mauricio Gugelmin, which won at Macau, while in 1986 it was Andy Wallace.

The following year it was Ulsterman Martin Donnelly who claimed victory.

Michael Schumacher was an unremarkable 21-year-old in 1990 when he won the Macau Grand Prix in dubious circumstances that year, but less than a year later he was in a Formula

His Macau victory was tainted by Schumacher putting a following Mika Hakkinen into the wall on the last lap of the second leg of the Grand Prix by "braketesting" the Finn as they headed towards Lisboa Bend.

At the time, everyone presumed it was Hakkinen's overexuberance that had caused him to run into the back of Schumacher's Reynard, but subsequent events over the years have cast doubts on the reality of the situation.

It was in 1991 that David Coulthard came home in the leading position, the 20-year-old Scot demonstrating an innate talent that prevails today.

Of the all drivers in the 1991 Macau Grand Prix, only Coulthard and Rubens Barrichello remain in Formula 1.

"The Macau Grand Prix is recognized as the most prestigious event in the F3 calendar. Winning the Macau event meant a great deal for me at the time," said Coulthard.

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

when I was on pole and again in 1991 when I got pole position, so I thought it was just right that I finally did it," said Rydell.

In 1998, then newlycrowned Japanese F3 champion Peter Dumbreck recorded the closest finish in Macau, crossing the line just 0.003 of a second ahead of second-placed man Ricardo Mauricio.

Dumbreck said, "The Macau win still goes down in my career as my best victory.

"The race was like qualifying every lap. I could see Ricardo Mauricio in front and Enrique Bernoldi behind, but I was in my own space and could only see my position from my pit board as I passed the pits.

"I remember seeing P1 as I passed to go onto the last lap and thought I need to push for one more lap but not too hard that I hit the wall. It was just enough – and even now it makes me shiver how close it was."

Another name that featured in 2000 was Indian driver Narain Karthikeyan who took pole position and led comfortably before crashing out. "It was probably the biggest race I've led in my life and then crashed," said Karthi-

Trevor Carlin, Karthikevan's team boss at the time, said, "Narain had a big lead and he was pushing hard to get away. He braked a little bit late for one corner and just as he braked he caught the throttle pedal with his foot, which made the car accelerate a little earlier than usual. He lost control and hit the wall."

In 2001 Trevor Carlin ran Japan's Takuma Sato, now a Super Aguri driver in Formula One. Sato did not need to enter Macau as he had already signed with Eddie Jordan for 2002 in Formula

Sato, though, was determined to win the Macau Grand

"Macau Formula 3 was my biggest ambition when I was a junior driver. For me the challenging circuit, the history and the prestige of the event made winning Macau a dream come true," said Sato.

Doom-and-gloom merchants are predicting the Macau Grand Prix will not survive. The disruption, the closure of roads and the general distraction from gambling, are all cited as sound reasons why the Macau Grand Prix should be dropped from the calendar.

But if you read the comments of drivers, team owners and private entrants, you will understand that they are unanimous in one aspect: Macau is unique; an event that is so challenging that every driver wants to win here. For that reason alone, the Macau Grand Prix will endure and, hopefully, prosper.


I recently attended a "back to basics" affair in a room above a pub, which was great, and the sentiments were just as moving as those at a big bash.



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onathan Kaplan is an excellent writer with vivid descriptive skills. He's a journalist, teacher and documentary filmmaker. Oh, and he's a surgeon. Following the first volume of his memoirs, The Dressing Station, the second volume is called Contact Wounds (Picador, London, 2006, 276pp) and subtitled "A War Surgeon's Education". He's worked in all the garden spots: Angola, Mozambique, Eritrea, Kurdistan, Shan State in Burma and, most recently, Baghdad. He's a little vague on why.

"Free your mind and your arse will follow,' was the claim of some profound dope-head graffiti near my London flat (along with 'Drugs: Just Say Maybe'), but in all my dreams of travel, of involvement in the world, I had never imagined the range of options that could present themselves by letting that career steering-shudder turn into a swerve," he writes.

He describes filming a documentary about dolphin hunting in Japan and treating war wounded in Burma and adds, "In those places the doubts that stalked my career progression were forgotten, the question of my destiny deferred. Unpredictability is seductive...

"I kept intending to settle back into my professional career – to be a full-time hospital surgeon and make a worthwhile contribution to society - but my work amidst repression and pillage and random death had stolen from me some belief in the endurability of human endeavour."

In his first book, he had written about being an air ambulance doctor in the US,

A surgical vagabond



a ship's medical officer in Asia and a battlefield surgeon in Mozambique. His second book hop-scotches about areas of his life untreated in the first.

Kaplan was born in 1954 in Durban, South Africa, the grandson of Jewish immigrants. His father was a World War II Army surgeon in North Africa and Italy. He then joined the fledgling state of Israel in its first War of Independence, during which he met his wife, also a doctor.

Kaplan caps off an idyllic childhood in South Africa with a summer spent on a kibbutz at the age of 14. He learns a lot but despairs of his fellow South African kids who taunt Arabs as "sand kaffirs" and "bush hogs".

Eventually he despairs of Israel for

He continues with an engrossing account of his love life and medical training in Cape Town, followed by meticulous and

often harrowing tales of his early surgical experiences in London. The highlight of the book is his stint as a battlefield surgeon in the war-torn town of Kuito in western Angola.

The fight here was a Cold War battlefront between the government supported by Russia and Cuba and the UNITA insurgent army supported by the US and South Africa.

Here he is on his arrival at the Kuito airfield in a battered UN transport plane: "We followed the rise of the shadowed highlands

from the coastal plane, climbing and climbing. At maximum altitude, with Kuito visible as a smudge on the dark plateau, the aircraft stood on one wingtip and began a corkscrew dive that pressed us into our seats. Far below, the airfield's oily streak – its runway haloed by zigzag trench lines - whirled like a spinning clock-hand around

building a wall around itself: "I have not a grid of streets that enlarged with each rotation. Columns of smoke slanted above the land to the east where the front line lay.'

Back in London, he veers back to

humor in his recollection of being a technical advisor on a TV medical drama.

"Patients - violin prodigies with brain tumours, last-chance-pregnancy fashion models, epileptic airline pilots – were forever being wheeled to the operating room by the got-the-shakes surgeon, nymphomaniac nurse and alcoholic anaesthetist amidst a welter of barked TLAs (Three-Letter Acronyms) and the portentous symphony of the machines that go beep. lief at such melodramatic overload.'

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We need reinforcements

The transfer of Chalong Police Superintendent Col Chalit Kaewyarat to Takuapa District Police Station in Phang Nga means that Col Samarn Chainarong will now be responsible for fighting crime in Phuket's southernmost areas of Chalong, Rawai and Nai Harn, as well as Kata and Karon.

The transfers, part of the annual reshuffle orders issued by Royal Thai Police Headquarters in Bangkok, should not necessarily be considered as a step downward for Col Chalit. Indeed, his new post is a step up to a district police chief, whereas in Chalong he was chief of a sub-district police station. His new ambit includes the tourist areas Khao Lak and Bang Niang.

A Phuket native who served as deputy chief before being promoted to the big chair in Chalong, Col Chalit was greeted with cheers by local residents when he took over the reins in Chalong back in 2003. Unfortunately, in the four years since then, fast-paced urbanization and rapidly growing population of the district have seen the number of high-profile crimes in the area skyrocket.

While the unreported population problem is island-wide, nowhere are its impacts more dramatic than in Rawai and Chalong. Native residents are so few there that the social networks that are crime's greatest deterrent have been overwhelmed by an unprecedented influx of "outsiders" – thousands of migrant Thai workers, foreign tourists, expatriate residents and foreign laborers, both legal and illegal.

With no commensurate increase in the number of officers, it should come as no surprise that the number of violent crimes in the district has risen.

Even after the still-unsolved slaying of Norwegian expat resident Simen Sparre Knudsen in September, there seemed to be no lull whatsoever in the number of violent nighttime muggings. The recent, well-coordinated robbery of a landmark like Don's Mall in Rawai is yet another indication of how grim the situation has become.

While the installation of Col Samarn has seen a visible increase in the number of patrols in some areas, one can only wonder how long the effort can be sustained over the vast area for which the small station is responsible.

It is high time that the Royal Thai Police top brass in Bangkok honor Phuket Provincial Police Superintendent Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch's requests for more officers and for a new police district to cover Kata-Karon, which is currently under Chalong Police jurisdiction

Failure to do so will only result in continued deterioration of law and order in the south of the island, which in turn will have a long-lasting, negative effect on tourism for the entire island. **– The Editor**

Order in the court

I wrote to the *Gazette* several months ago asking for advice on what to do for non-paying employers. You asked me to keep you posted on the outcome of my research and here it is:

My ex-boss, an Asian foreigner, owed me a large amount in pay, expenses, commissions and so on and hadn't paid in several months.

He then terminated me without severance pay, so I went to the police, Labor Office, Social Security Office, Revenue Office and finally the Provincial Court – who seemed to be the only ones with any power to act.

They do not have any English speakers at these offices, but all their services were free and they were eager to help.

The Provincial Court took my statement and set a trial date for one month later, to which they summoned my ex-boss by mail.

He sent his attorney to the first hearing to "negotiate". One month later he was forced to appear or forfeit, and the public prosecutor led us in negotiations before the trial.

I did not hire an attorney. However, my ex-boss came with two Thai representatives.

The public prosecutor pressured me to take the first offer so that we would not go to trial and therefore "no one would have to be blamed".

I said that I would not accept the first or second offer, which were very low. This frustrated several people as they were clearly uncomfortable with conflict, not to mention that the consequences for a foreigner going to trial and being found guilty are severe.

After the negotiations, we took a five-minute break and met in the court room before three judges.

They asked where we stood... and we each stated our cases. They ruled that my exboss had four months to make two payments totaling the full amount

that was owing to me.

However, they added that he would need to pay all social security payments and income tax owed on my behalf within five days, which was about 26,000 baht in total.

Apparently, he is not allowed to leave the country and he also received a very stern warning, especially since I was without medical insurance.

The court was to receive the payments on my behalf to ensure that he would pay on time. This all took about 20 minutes.

I did not have to pay any fees and the process took four visits, each visit about three hours long, to the Provincial Court over the course of 2½ months.

I would encourage anyone else to do the same. I feel that I received a fair trial.

However, I strongly advise having a convincing Thai speaker with you to plead your case.

UNDER PRESSURE: Phuket faces growing number of suicide attempts

PERSPECTIVES

here are many differences between the cases of men and women who attempt suicide. Females make up most of the cases of suicide that we come

For some reason, women choose to harm themselves more than men, while men normally use more violent methods. More men succeed in suicide attempts than

Most women who attempt to commit suicide do so by overdosing on drugs or medication or else drinking a toxic substance, such as floor cleaner.

Chemical liquids are used because they are found in household products that are easy to get hold of and have a quick effect. Men usually try to hang themselves or use some kind of

In October, we counseled a number of people at Vachira Phuket Hospital whom we were worried might attempt suicide, including 993 who were suffering from mental problems, 275 who were depressed and 238 who were suffering from anxiety.

Those statistics are made up of old and new patients. Many people choose to continue counseling for a long time.

The number of people who come to the hospital for counseling is continuing to grow.

Last month, Vachira Phuket Hospital dealt with six cases of death by suicide – the most in any one month so far this year.

We worry about the unregistered people living here who have moved to Phuket from other provinces.



n November 1, Thalang Police received a call from the village headman of Village 1, tambon Srisoonthorn, saying that a woman had hanged herself at her home.

Another two women attempted to commit suicide on October 31 – one drank bleach; the other, floor cleaner. Both survived the attempts.

Last month, Vachira Phuket Hosital gave counseling to more than 1,500 people whom doctors were worried might attempt suicide.

Here Dr Chanuan Sampatanarak, resident psychiatrist at Vachira Hospital, speaks out on why more and more people have been attempting suicide recently and what the implications are for Phuket as a community.



We should be the first people they come to when they have problems in life.

People in Phuket often don't have time to take care of their own friends and family.

Everybody works long hours and now there are many single-parent families. Values in Thailand are changing and there is less importance placed on extended family than in the past. If people have problems, they should be able to turn to their

Most cases of suicide occur in depressed people who go around looking sad and unhappy. These people like to live alone, in private. They often say negative things about wanting to die and to leave this world.

People like this need to be cared for and should not be left alone because they may end up harming themselves.

Suicide-attempt survivors in Phuket tend to be working people aged between 25 and 35 years

These people have a lot of responsibilities in their lives and so they also have many problems. Most of their problems are about business, family or relation-

Our research has found that about half of all people who suffer from mental problems and attempt suicide are addicted to a substance, usually alcohol.

Research like this can help us to look at the reasons why people attempt suicide. When people become addicted to a substance, it affects their thought processes.

We have found that the three main reasons for people to commit suicide are because they don't have a friend or family member to talk to; because they

feel that they cannot solve their problems; and because they feel that their lives are not worth living. The last thing that most of these people think before they attempt suicide is that they can't escape their problems. In reality, these problems are just a small part of their lives and most people are able to see this.

At Vachira Hospital, we have a three-step plan for all suicide survivors. The first step is to help them by talking to them and finding out what their problems are. Then we find out if there is a key figure in their lives - someone they can talk to and whom they trust. The final step is to work out what they want to do in their lives. If they have positive plans and do not still wish to harm themselves, then we will encourage them to return home.

We usually prescribe medication to help suicide survivors who suffer from anxiety or are emotionally unstable. Then comes something called cognitive behavioral therapy, which involves changing the person's attitude and opinions to reflect posi-

Finally, we have a system of neuro-linguistic programing that involves a suicide survivor remembering positive, happy times in their life.

When people harm themselves, it is their way of saying to the world that they have a problem and that they need help.

Those who survive suicide attempts are trying to say something to the world in their own way. We have to help them by communicating with language and discouraging harmful actions.



Immigration hurdles after moving provinces

My farang wife and I have type-O retirement visas. These were issued on December 17, 2006, at the Immigration office in Phuket

In September, we moved from Phuket, to live permanently in Nakhon Sri Thammarat prov-

On September 5, we visited the Immigration Office in Surat Thani town. There, we each completed a Form 47, where we reported our home address as still being in Phuket because we did not have the necessary paperwork to show a residential address in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

The next Form 47 reporting date is December 5.

Our questions are:

1. Now that we have the paperwork verifying our new address in Nakhon Sri Thammarat, can we go to any Immigration office to report our new residential address?

2. What paperwork is needed to support a change of address on the Form 47? We built our own house and we lease the land from a Thai company. Do we need any papers other than a copy of the lease?

If Immigration does accept the change in our residential address before December 17, the date that we must renew our type-O retirement visas, then:

- 3. Can we apply for type-O visas at the Immigration office either in Surat Thani or Nakhon Sri Thammarat?
- 4. If "yes", what paperwork do we need to present, in addition to the following standard list of documents required by Phuket Immigration:
- bank certificate of funds 800,000 Thai baht each person;
- birth certificate;
- marriage certificate;
- passport;
- health certificate.

The Immigration office in Surat Thani has told us that we must apply for new one-year type-O retirement visas in Phuket.

The officers at Surat Thani also said that while we are there, we should ask for the Phuket Immigration office to change their records of our home address.

Is this correct?

Don & Inge McMahon Nakhon Sri Thammarat Pol Capt Krissarat Nuesen of the Phuket Provincial Immigration Office replies:

You can register your new residential address at the Immigration office in either Surat Thani or Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

You will need to bring your lease for the land, the house registration papers (tabien baan) and you and your wife's pass-

You should check with

whichever office with which you will register your new address whether they require any other paperwork, because some officers ask to see some documents from the landlord or even require that the landlord go to the office with you.

After you have registered your new address, you do not need to travel back to Phuket to renew your permits to stay.

You can do this at the Immigration office in the province where you are registered as residents. The documents required are listed in Order 606/2549 Article 7.21 - see http://www. immigration.go.th/nov2004/ 2notice/rtp606EN.pdf

I suggest you apply to renew your permits to stay at least one month before they expire, and you should call the office where you will apply to confirm which documents are needed as such requirements often change without prior notice.

Tackling Phuket's little pest problem

hen you think about which creatures pose the geatest danger to humans, you're likely to think of tigers, crocodiles and sharks. In reality, such creatures pose little threat.

The most dangerous creature to humans is the humble mosquito, which through its role as a vector of disease probably causes more human misery than any other organism on the planet.

Despite the fact that it is largely preventable, malaria strikes over 300 million people per and is responsible for more than three million deaths per year. Fortunately, cases of malaria are uncommon in Phuket.

Although one of the biggest dangers to any species is man, more animals die from disease than predation. As dogs and cats are particularly susceptible to many of the small creatures here in Phuket, pet owners need to ensure that their animals do not suffer due to these pests.

Diseases prevalent in Phuket can be avoided or treated if prompt action is taken.

Dog heartworm (dirofilaria *immitis*) can be a life-threatening disease for canines. The disease is caused by a roundworm. Dogs and sometimes cats are infected through the bite of a mosquito carrying the larvae of the worm.

The worm is dependent on both the mammal and the mosquito to complete its life cycle. The young worms (called microfilaria) circulate in the bloodstream of the dog.

These microfilaria must infect a mosquito in order to complete their life cycles. Mosquitoes become infected when they feed on the blood of a sick dog. Once inside the mosquito, the microfilaria leave the gut of the mosquito and live in the body of the insect, where they develop for two to three weeks.

After transforming twice inside the tissue of the host mosquito, the third-stage infective larvae move to the mosquito's mouth parts, from where they are able to infect an animal. When the mosquito feeds, the larvae are deposited on the surface of the victim's skin.

The larvae enter the skin through the wound caused by the mosquito bite and burrow in to remain there for three to four months. If the worms have infected an unsuitable host, such as a human, the worms usually die.

The prevalence of the disease in dogs and cats cannot be completely eliminated, but it can be controlled or prevented with pills or injections, or both. Prevention is still the best cure.

The flea is another pest here. Most dogs carry fleas. They usually cause nothing more than an annoying itch, but many dogs are allergic to fleas and can suffer enormous discomfort. Some dogs even develop a condition called "flea-allergy dermatitis", which as its name suggests in an

Dogs can suffer greatly from fleas, ticks, maggots and all manner of nasty parasites. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, Top Dog always says.

By Top Dog

Flea-allergy dermatitis occurs if a dog has an allergic reaction to flea saliva. Symptoms can include scratching, chewing, licking, irritated skin and hair loss, which leads many people to assume their dog is suffering from mange. With flea-allergy dermatitis, however, the hair loss is invariably at the base of the tail and on the lower back.

Your veterinarian can diagnose flea allergies with an intradermal skin test. If your dog is carrying fleas, then it's likely that your home will be infested with flea larvae.

You should continually spray your carpets, rugs and soft furnishings MAKINGTRACKS with a proprietary spray, available from

veterinarians. Think of fleas as tiny vampires; if a dog is infested with them, it can lead to anemia and death.

Ticks are the biggest danger to pets. I have covered them before, but I want to stress the danger they pose. They are notoriously difficult to eradicate and are literally everywhere. Death from tick-borne diseases is the biggest cause of death to dogs in

It appears that some ticks carry diseases while others don't. After blood tests and autopsies carried out by the Soi Dog Founbiggest threat locally. Diagnosis 4222.

is easy: If your dog is weak and depressed, check his gums; if they are pale, then the there is a good chance that the dog has babesia, which lives in the blood.

Prompt action is necessary if your dog is to survive. Treatment involves painful injections, intravenous drips and intensive nursing. Although you cannot prevent your dog from picking up ticks when outside, if you suspect that ticks are in your garden then at least one of the pest-control companies here can spray your garden to eradicate them.

An equally nasty creature is the screw worm. These are, in effect, maggots. If your dog has an open wound, the chances are that one or more flies

will find it and lay eggs therein. Once these eggs hatch, they turn into maggots that will literally eat the host alive if not removed.

The maggots can be killed and removed, but they can inflict severe damage if not dealt with promptly. If your pet suffers an injury causing an open wound, have it treated promptly and monitor it closely until it is healed.

Next month I will take a look at what products are available to tackle these pests.



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'don't dare utter the phrase "Phuket ICT City" to my computer-savvy friends any more because of the reaction I get: eyes invariably roll up to the sky, some folks twitter, others positively guffaw. But I remember vividly, seven years ago, sitting in front of a computer screen in Colorado, discovering a half-baked website that talked about creating a computer nexus in Phuket.

It made a lot of sense to me then - the lure of a Phuket ICT (information and communications technology) Brigadoon figured prominently in my decision to move to Phuket. It makes a lot of sense even now, although I tend to be as skeptical as my

Why so skeptical? Since

June 8, my Internet connection has KHUN WOODY'S gone completely dead at least 30 times. Outages

have lasted from two to 12 hours. When the Internet's up, I've experienced massive slowdowns that leave my ADSL lines acting like dial-up modems - nothing goes through, pages don't look right, sometimes I can send mail, sometimes I can't. I'd estimate that, between June and October, I experienced Internet problems at least once every two or three

Some people need the Internet to keep their businesses running. I'm one of them. When the Internet goes down, I'm dead. My business comes to a grinding halt. I can't update my webpages and I can't research for my books or articles. I lose touch with my publishers and I can't even do any banking.

I suspect that other parts of Thailand have had problems, too. For example, on October 25, I wasn't able to log on to the website of Kasikorn Bank for an entire day. Checking with a couple of friends, I found that they couldn't log on to the websites of Siam Commercial Bank or Krung

Thai Bank, either. Anywhere else in the world, bankers would be jumping out of windows and regulators would be hauling out the whips.

Last month I had an opportunity to vent my frustration in front of the Committee on Science, Information and Communication Technology

Thailand's National Legislative Assembly – parliament's ICT committee.

Several members of the committee, including Chairman Dr Supat Poopaka, ventured to Phuket to ask a straightforward question: What happened to Phuket's ICT City project?



In this column, and several future columns, I would like to answer that question. I would be interested in hearing your views, too, either by email (woody@ khunwoody.com) or at one of the Sunday morning PC Group Therapy sessions.

The main problem facing Phuket in its attempt to become an ICT hub lies in its Internet service. Internet access is faster and more reliable than it was when I moved here seven years ago, but it's still woefully inadequate.

The graph on this page shows how things have become better in some ways, but stayed the same in many others.

In 2003, I had a TOT line that delivered a then-whopping 80 kilobits per second (kbps) download speed. That was about twice typical dial-up speed – well, in the morning.



By afternoon, the line slowed down to 20kbps, but while other people had trouble getting dial-up connections to work, TOT was usually up and bleeping. That line cost 2,300 baht a month.

In 2004, I moved over to a TT&T line. It was considerably faster in the morning – 120kbps - but it, too, slowed down in the afternoons and on weekends. At night, it wasn't any faster than the TOT line. That line cost 2,860 baht per month.

In 2005, the big news was fast, cheap ADSL. I signed up for a 1,000-baht-a-month TT&T line, and the speeds were respectable - about 140kbps. But again, the afternoon and weekend slowdown was noticeable.

In 2006, I installed a 2,600baht per month CAT ADSL line. Through much of the day I now have download speeds between 1,000kbps and 1,600kbps. At peak times it rarely dips below 800kbps. It isn't perfect, it goes down from time to time and sometimes (particularly since early June) it slows to a crawl, but the difference between that line and all the others I've used is like night and day.

Earlier this year, TOT claimed that it had improved its 1Mbps (about 1,000 kbps) ADSL line, so I tried again. The 1,000baht-per-month line delivers 1,000kbps or more in the morning. By mid-afternoon, it's regularly down to dial-up speed.

Why the slowdown? TOT and TT&T are grossly over-subscribed, which means they're selling a "service" they can't deliver. In the afternoons, more customers log on and you suddenly have 20 people trying to suck through a tiny straw.

TOT and TT&T have recently started offering 2Mbps (2,000kbps) lines. A friend of mine in Patong paid to have his 1Mbps TOT line upgraded to 2Mbps. He kept meticulous records, before and after. The result? His 2Mbps line frequently hit 40kbps in the afternoons – not one whit better than the 1Mbps


I read an interview in a local newspaper with a VP of one of the telephone companies. He described the recent spate of Internet outages as a "hiccup". My blood pressure went up as I read his comments. What we're experiencing in Phuket isn't a "hiccup". If a construction worker accidentally digs up a fiber-optic line and the Internet goes down for a couple hours, that's a hiccup. What we're witnessing with the extended, massive, island-wide Internet outages and slowdowns since early June isn't a hiccup.

More than that, the Vshaped graph you see on the page doesn't show a hiccup. It shows a repeated daily cycle of slowdowns during peak hours – that's an overworked system. That's too many subscribers. That's the result of years and years of charging for services that can't be delivered.

Is it any wonder why my friends laugh when I have the temerity to talk about "Phuket ICT City"?



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lobal stock markets enjoyed substantial returns during October and the announcement by the US central bank, the Federal Reserve, of a further cut of 0.25% to the Federal Funds Rate on October 31 was marked by another increase: gross domestic product (GDP) figures for the US economy revealed a higher-than-expected annualized growth rate of 3.9% for the third quarter.

Then, in one day, the stock market soured. At one stage on November 1, the New York Stock Exchange had to introduce trading curbs to slow the descent of the market.

A downgrade from "market performer" to "market underweight" given by a CIBC World Markets analyst to C i t i g r o u p, America's largest bank by total assets, focused attention back on the subprime crisis.

The market suddenly remembered the huge

losses announced by Swiss banking giants Union Bank of Switzerland (UBS) and Credit Suisse, as well as the recent write downs due to exposure to US subprime.

Worries about structured investment vehicles (SIVs), collateralized debt obligations and so on took center stage once again. Memories surfaced of Merrill Lynch's announcement of US\$4.5 billion of losses that somehow rose to US\$8.4 billion in two weeks.

Merrill Lynch chairman and CEO Stan O'Neal then retired, while Citigroup announced third-quarter losses of US\$6.5 billion before tax. Further concerns rest with the reality that Citigroup holds assets in SIVs and related "commercial paper" (unsecured, short-term debt instruments issued by a corporation) of some

Big banks hammered by subprime losses

US\$80 billion in off-balance sheet operations.

Much of this "paper" is likely to end up on the liability side of Citigroup's balance sheet. Citigroup also has the lowest tier-

> one capital ratio of all the major US banks and is therefore the least prepared to absorb these losses.

> Then there are worries that foreign banking groups, such as Barclays and HSBC, being exposed to these problems.

It makes for a remarkable con-

trast when one views the various adverts of these banks about their wealth-management abilities when the reality is that they cannot differentiate between good investments and rubbish.

What they cannot sell to their clients, they will have to absorb as substantial losses. Some banks are prepared to sell any old rubbish as long as it makes a profit. It also brings into question the ability of some banks to assess risk management.

On November 3, it was announced that 166,000 jobs were created in the US during October – well above analysts' expectations. Markets moved upwards just seconds after the release of this information. Within three days, markets had moved from euphoria, to despair, back to euphoria.

On the same day, there was talk of the "Goldilocks" scenario (not too hot, not too cold – low inflation and interest rates, ample liquidity, strong growth). Art Cashin, chief floor trader for UBS operations in the US, remarked that however happy Goldilocks may be, she still might be presented with an eviction notice at any moment.

Repossessions of properties in the US are up 30% from the previous quarter and 100% over a 12-month period.

Worst hit is Nevada, where one out of every 61 houses in the state has been repossessed. You would think that banking creditors in the US would be adept at selling off these houses, but they're not.

The second interest-rate cut announced by the Federal Reserve at the end of October was mainly designed to appease credit markets. One prominent US economist described the US housing markets as having experienced a catastrophe.

We are experiencing only the early part of the problem – worse is yet to come. Banks are yet to admit to even knowing what their losses are going to be. It is as if they were holding warehouses full of fruit they could not sell, most of which is going to rot.

It is to be hoped that Wall Street's problems do not spread to Main Street – in other words, that the problems in the housing market do not move further through the economy.

The problems at Citigroup came to a head in a board meeting on November 4. It was announced that Citigroup CEO Chuck Prince would be "retiring".


Citigroup was going to write off between US\$8 and US\$11 billion as an additional amount for the last quarter of 2007. There will be further provisions for losses that will be necessary in 2008.

Bill Gross of Pacific Investment Management Company, often known as the "bond king", believes that the US will escape recession, but the Fed will be forced to reduce interest rates to 3.5% as unemployment moves to over 5%.

He believes this process will take between 12 and 18 months. He said to investors in a Bloomberg interview in early November that if they have only one investment idea, it should be to invest part of their portfolio internationally.

What's strange is that the broader economy continues as if this problem does not exist.

Muay Thai Thai boxers miss out

his year has been rough for Thailand's boxers. Several challengers failed in their world-title quests, Pongsaklek Wonjongkam lost the championship he held for over six years and multiple upand-coming fighters suffered shocking losses from opponents they should have easily defeated.

However, women's light-flyweight champion Samson Sor Siriporn, a former prison inmate, has turned out to be the shining star of Thailand's sputtering boxing scene. On November 19, she will defend her title for the second time against Japanese fighter Momo Koseki.

In the past two weeks, Narongrit Pirang, better known as "Fahsan 3K Battery" (58-9-1, 35 KOs), dropped a not-so-close decision to IBF Super Bantamweight champion Steve Molitor (25-0, 10 KOs).

Also, Denkaosan Kaovichit came within a point of winning the WBA flyweight title from Takefumi Sakata. Thai fighters have always had difficulties when fighting abroad and it seems the curse is destined to continue.

Narongrit "Fahsan 3K Battery" Pirang v Steve

"The Canadian Kid" Molitor Not many gave Fahsan 3K Battery a chance against The Canadian Kid in his IBF super bantamweight title fight.

Fahsan, rated seventh by the IBF, is a fighter best recognized for being on the wrong end of a Manny Pacquiao KO punch.

In a division rich with talent, Molitor was looking to make a statement against the more experienced Thai, and although not known for his power, most did not expect Fashsan to go the distance.

tative at first, Molitor using his footwork to glide around the ring while popping jabs, Fahsan following the champion. The champion continued to control the fight with a snapping jab, allowing him to close the distance at will.

Fahsan was clearly outgunned and although relentless in his attack, simply did not have the skills or physical attributes to contend with Molitor.

Molitor, 27, looked to be cruising to victory when a little over a minute into round seven Fahsan's overhand left connected squarely.

The champion toppled backwards, falling onto the ropes, visibly shaken - but didn't hit the canvas.

Professional boxing rules state: If the ring ropes prevent a fighter from going down from a blow, the referee shall declare a knockdown. Referee Rocky Zolnierczyk did not apply the rule and the round continued.

With his hands held at his waist, Molitor danced out of danger to survive the momentary scare, but the message was loud and clear: "Wake up, this guy isn't going to quit."

The 60-second break between rounds let Molitor clear his head. The inconsistency of Fahsan's attack provided Molitor additional time to recoup. The "Canadian Kid" stiffened his jab and avoided Fahsan's wild swings with subtle movements to his left; the fight was once again his.

By the tenth, Molitor was sticking and moving, firing out a stiff jab that left the Thai befuddled. Although Molitor was faster, stronger and infinitely more skilled than Fahsan, he could not end the fight. At the end of the bout, all three judges declared Molitor the victor.

Their scores: 119-109, 119-109 and 120-108. The Gazette scored the bout 118-110 in favor of Molitor.

Denkaosan Kaovichit v Takefumi Sakata

zGone in 40 seconds – that should have been the tag-line for the Denkaosan Kaovichit-Take -fumi

Sakata bout. That is all it took to rob Denkaosan of the title he deserved to win. Five years ago, Denkaosan challenged Eric Morel for the WBA flyweight title, losing by an eleventh-round KO. This time around, Denkaosan came within seconds of defeating Takefumi Sakata for the same title, only to have a referee's questionable point deduction cost him the championship.

Denkaosan, 33, bolted out of his corner from the start, eager to bring the title back to Thailand. After controlling the first two minutes of the bout, he landed a perfect straight right to the jaw of Sakata, dropping him with 17 seconds left in the round. Sakata rose shakily from the canvas two seconds later and battled back in the remaining seconds to stave off defeat.


The next few rounds were back-and-forth affairs with neither fighter seizing the advantage. Denkaosan took the middle rounds and by the eighth, Sakata, cut over his left eye, took on the look of a desperate fighter. He picked up the pace, winning rounds nine and ten.

With batteries now running low, they battled in the center of the ring, neither giving an inch. Sakata's eye was bleeding profusely, Denkaosan was being hit with punches he avoided earlier.

The turning point of the fight came in round nine, referee Mark Wilson gave Denkaosan a warning for excessive clinching. With only 40 seconds remaining in the bout, he penalized the Thai one point for the same infraction, effectively costing him the title. The judges scores: 113-113, 115-112 and 112-114 - a draw - Sakata retains his world title. For what it's worth, the Gazette scored the bout 114-112 for Denkaosan.

Although previously warned for the infringement, the point deduction could not have been more ill timed and was by all accounts, unnecessary. So unnecessary that Kaovichit's promoter, Naris Singwancha, is lobbying for a rematch within 90 days.

Mother Nature International rugby returns to Phuket

PHUKET CITY: Back after a one-year hiatus because of the 2006 coup, 80-80 rugby returns to Phuket this week - albeit downsized from what organizers had hoped would be a large-scale, international tournament.

The King's Cup Rugby-80 tournament begins November 16 and will run until November 23 at Sanaam Chai stadium in Phuket City.

Although teams from nations including Wales, England and France had expressed interest in taking part in the tourney, only four teams will compete this year. They are Thailand, Laos, Sri Lanka and Australia.

Pornchai Prachaniyom, chairman of the competition, said, "The Thai national team will be in action against a new team from Laos who have been playing competitively for only five years.

"The Australian side is coming from Canberra and features a number of players who have played rugby in England. The national team of Sri Lanka will also be in action."

Games will be broadcast in Thailand by True Visions.

The matches will be played at Sanaam Chai on a round-robin basis. Play begins November 17 with Thailand facing off against Australia and Laos taking on Sri Lanka.

The tournament will culminate with the third-place playoff and grand final on Friday, Novem-

The final will begin at 7:15 pm with teams battling it out on the pitch for the tournament cup.

Keep an eye out on November 19 for the local derby, as Thailand will square up against neighbors Laos at 5:30 pm.

The tournament is being officially dubbed "In celebration of HM The King's 80th Birthday, International Rugby-80 Tournament 2007".

Rugby 80-80 involves full, 15-a-side matches in which all players must weigh not more than 80 kilograms at the start of the season and 85 kg during the season.

The weight restriction gives nations where players who are of smaller build a better chance of competing against teams who traditionally field bulkier players, such as from Australia and New Zealand.

The downsizing of the tournament from international spectacle to regional battle is to compensate for a last-minute change

The tournament was originally slated to be held at Karon Stadium, but the disrepair of the pitch left the playing surface unsafe for competitive rugby.





tripes just don't do it for me. There's something about them that just reminds me of zebras – possibly the most ridiculously decorated animal on the planet. Have they not realized by now that black-and-white stripes don't help then to blend into the background? It's not surprising that so many of these idiotic animals get eaten.

Yes, I know that if all zebras in a group have black-and-white stripes it means they're more difficult to pick out individually, but I've got an idea: how about making themselves, I don't know, "Savannah" color? Wouldn't that be a little more effective for hiding?

What about tigers then? At least they've got it partly right – their stripes do help a bit, I suppose, but I don't recall seeing many jungles with orange and black striped color schemes.

For me, stripes bring back ghastly memories of children's TV presenters in their scary dungarees and stripy sweaters – what were they on? They traumatized an entire generation of Brits with their "hello children", their pink hippos, zip-mouthed puppets and sexually-ambiguous bears. I can't blame the stripes,

but they were present nonethe-

Back in the 80s, there was actually a more irritating stripe-wearer than Geoffrey from the children's show *Rainbow* – Waldo, star of those giant books with massive pictures in which this ridiculous character happened to be hiding. *Where's Waldo?*, I believe they were called. Who cares where he is? Why didn't they just make him bigger? The whole thing was beyond me.

Wide-screen films in letterbox format? Those massive black lumps at the top and bottom of the screen are seriously irritating stripes. That wide thing is fine for the cinema, but having massive chunks of your TV screen filled with huge, black stripes is a complete waste of time. It's always the artistic films too; you're hardly likely to experience this annoyance with your Shrek DVD.

Scraping the bottom of the annoying-stripes barrel are stripy trousers. We've all seen them: grown men parading around in leg apparel that should be restricted to professions associated with the

circus industry. Gaudy striped trousers are just plain wrong.

This talk of stripes was bound to lead eventually to something green, growing and living in Phuket – the calathea ornata, or prayer plant, (*nok kum* in Thai) fits the bill perfectly. It's one of the stripiest plants on the planet.

Originally, all members of the calathea family are from areas of the tropical Americas, such as Brazil, Guyana, Columbia and Nicaragua, so they are basically jungle plants.

Calathea ornatas have darkgreen, oblong-shaped leaves with distinctly defined white or pinkish stripes going from the midrib to the margin of each leaf. These leaves should be used as television test cards – their stripes really do stand out.

One of the weird things about the leaves is that their undersides are a deep magenta color – quite an odd combination, but probably one of the reasons that makes them popular.

The calathea ornata will grow to between 30 and 60 centimeters high. It is one of those plants that's happy in a pot indoors, but will be even more content in a shaded area of the garden, reasonably well-protected from strong winds.

Calatheas grow by means of a creeping rhizome, but don't appear to be invasive. The calathea ornata doesn't cope well with being moved around, so it's a good idea to plant it as soon as you've got it home from the garden center. Some people suggest putting it in a pot before being thrust into the garden, but I don't see the point – it's got to face the world some time.

If you're planting from a rhizome (the potatoey root bit), about the only thing to remember is not to plant the rhizome too deep, as this will invite fungus (or would that be fungi?) and may cause root rot.

Freshly-planted rhizomes need oxygen to grow new roots and will die if the planting medium is too dense or wet. After planting, water the soil thoroughly, then don't water again until the soil is getting dry. Keep it evenly moist (but not wet) when shoots start to grow and leaves start to unfold.


Should you decide to keep it potted in the house, bear in mind that indoor plants need to be transplanted into a larger container every now and then or they become root-bound and their growth slows down. Water the plant well before starting so the soil will hold the root ball together when you remove it from the pot.

If you have trouble getting the plant out of the pot, you could try running a blade around the edge of the pot, gently hitting the sides to loosen the soil. If that doesn't work, then my personal method involves a large hammer – smash the pot off.

The calathea ornata is everywhere in Phuket and you could take home a reasonable-sized plant for less than 200 baht – it's not going to break the bank.

Despite its stripy appearance, the calathea ornata just doesn't seem to have the irritation factor of its stripy counterparts – it just sits there quietly growing without annoying anyone. The creators of stripy trousers and DVD films could learn a lot from this plant, but I think zebras are probably a lost cause. Lions – go for it.
