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Candidates call to replace PEC

PHUKET CITY: Candidates from several parties jointly filed a complaint with the Phuket Election Commission (PEC) charging Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) President Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutra with unfairness in using her office to campaign for the Democrat Party, which is fielding her husband Tossaporn Thepabutra as one of its two constituency candidates for Phuket.

The complaint was filed by Chart Thai Party candidate Sgt Sorranun Sane on the morning of December 3 at the PEC offices on Phun Pol Rd, where it was accepted by PEC Director Supap Akkam.

The complaint, filed on behalf of the Chart Thai, People Power, Puea Phan Din and Ruam Jai Thai Chart Pattana parties, was presented with documentary evidence in the form of three editions of a local Thai-language newspaper.

The issues included investigative reports alleging that the OrBorJor organized activities with taxpayer money that were in fact attempts to campaign for the Democrat Party, which has long had a political stranglehold over Phuket and the southern region.

More specifically, one of the reports alleged that the OrBorJor funded a November 29 to December 2 trip to Malaysia for members of a local housewives association that was politically advantageous for the Democrat Party candidates.

K. Supap declined to give further information or comment,

saying only that he had assigned a committee to investigate the allegations, which were the first formal complaints filed with his agency regarding the upcoming national poll.

Earlier, on November 28. six local MP candidates from the same four political parties held a press conference calling for the national Election Commission (EC) to replace members of the Phuket Election Commission (PEC), chaired by Phuket Vice-Governor Tri Augkaradacha and directed by K. Supap.

The six politicians charged that the PEC's joint staging of an anti-vote-buying" activity with the OrBorJor on November 26 demonstrated the panel's bias towards the Democrat Party.

The six candidates at the press conference, held at the Phuket Town Inn, were: People Power Party (PPP) candidates Dr Sriyada Shinawatra and Wisut Santikul; Peua Pandin

Party candidate Wisut Janjira; Chart Thai Party candidates Sgt Sorranun Sane and Somchart Somnam; and Ruamjai Thai Chart Pattana party list candidate Suksan Kasetkala.

The six said that the recent PEC event, during which 200 yellow helmets were distributed to motorcycle taxi drivers, had sparked distrust of the PEC and cast doubt over its ability to conduct a free and fair general election on December 23.

PPP candidate Wisut Suntikul accused the PEC of working together with the Democrat Party, noting that one of the Democrat Party candidates had a "close relationship" with a top OrBorJor officer.

There was little doubt that he was referring to Democrat candidate Tossaporn Thepabutra, husband of OrBorJor President Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutra.

Governor calls for more police officers

PHUKET: After the spate of attacks on foreigners recently, Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Ratthasima, speaking on behalf of Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, asked the commanding officers of Police Region 8 and Phuket Provincial Police to increase security across the whole island.

Speaking at the Phuket Provincial Security committee meeting this morning, V-Gov Worapoj said, "The Central Government ordered us to beef up security in Phuket because of the potential damage to tourism and relationships with foreign countries if such crimes persist.

On September 23, Norwegian Simen Sparra Knudsen was stabbed on the road from the Kata Viewpoint to Rawai.

Mr Knudsen died later in hospital and his killers remain on the loose.

On October 7, Australian Sooz Lomas was robbed at gunpoint in the same area after leaving Icon Bar.

"There have been a lot of cases of tourists being stabbed and robbed, as well as houses being burgled.

"We are only a small province, but we have one of the highest rates of theft in the whole of the South," said Vice-Gov Worapoj.

Vice-Gov Worapoj added that Traffic Police will need to become more efficient to reduce congestion. Road accidents in Phuket must be dealt with swiftly, he added.

Between November 1 and 22, there were 87 reported road accidents with 11 people killed and 69 injured.

as a group to plead for fairness from the EC. Our PPP legal representatives will lodge a formal request to the EC, asking it to change the PEC membership within seven days. If we get no reply we will raise this as a campaign issue directly with the people of Phuket, asking them to see for themselves how the Democrats campaign," K. Wisut

Chart Thai candidate Sgt Sorranan said, "We don't want to shout, but we need fairness from the PEC in this election. Will they give it to us or not?"

Ruamjai Thai Chart Pattana party list candidate Suksan Kasetkala said, "We need the EC to investigate whether the PEC and OrBorJor are working together to support one party or not. We are not getting fair treatment."

A common complaint is that billboards put up by the OrBorJor as part of its publicity campaigns in the past have included images of K. Anchalee and the logo of the Democrat Party, he said.

Of note in the current election campaign is that PPP candidate Dr Sriyada, who used her maiden surname Palimapan in previous runs to win a parliamentary seat, has now chosen to run as Sriyada Shinawatra in the current campaign.

CHERNG TALAY TESCO: Protesters continue attack on legality

THALANG: With construction of the new Laguna Tesco-Lotus Market in Cherng Talay nearing completion, the development continues to be marred in controversy after representatives from Cherng Talay Municipality measured the area of the site on November 26 and declared the construction legal in a subsequent report.

Samarn Krohlek and Apisit Ngarnpresertkit, leaders of a local protest against the store, joined Thalang District Chief Chaiwat Tapee, members of the public and Thalang District Office representatives at Thalang District Office on November 28 to discuss the matter.

According to a 2004 ministerial regulation drawn up by the Ministry of Interior, individual supermarkets must cover a space between 300 square meters and 1,000sqm.

An initial report on the project filed by officers from Cherng Talay Municipality and the Phuket Office of Public

Works and Town and Country namit to rule whether the con-Planning reported that the Laguna Tesco-Lotus Market is spread over 790.93sqm.

However, K. Samarn said that the total area of Laguna Tesco-Lotus Market is 1,278.23 sqm, taking into account motorcycle and car parking areas.

Much of the parking area is covered by a roof, which K. Apisit said means that it should be included in the total area of the supermarket.

When Tesco-Lotus first requested permission to begin construction, an area of 1,152sqm was declared, added K. Apisit.

"K. Chaiwat will take this case to the Governor once more," said K. Apisit.

"I think we are also now ready to file a complaint at the Administrative Court. It will be faster and dealt with fairly. If we are wrong, then somebody should have given an answer on this issue, but nobody can tell us anything," said K. Apisit.

On November 30, Thalang District Chief Chaiwat called on Phuket Governor Niran Kalayastruction violates the ministerial regulation. Gov Niran has yet to issue a statement.

He has also yet to clarify whether the issue falls under the jurisdiction of Cherng Talay Municipality or Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor).

Cherng Talay Municipality originally issued the building permit for the Laguna Tesco-Lotus Market, but ordered a halt to construction after residents staged a protest outside its offices. Meanwhile, building work contin-

The Gazette contacted Tesco-Lotus for their explanation of the confusion.

However, for the second time, the supermarket chain Corporate Affairs Department has declined to comment.

Registered population continues to rise

PHUKET: As of October 31, Phuket's official population stood at 313,835 persons, up 880 from September 30. The rise follows a provincial campaign to increase the registered population of Thais living in Phuket, as officially tallied from household registration forms, or tabien baan.

Phuket Provincial Chief Administrative Officer (Palad) Piya Bharatasilpin reported the increase during the monthly meeting of the Phuket Provincial Security Committee, held November 29 at Katina Hotel in Wichit.

An extra 1,990 residents were added to the provincial scrolls in October, while 1,122 names were removed.

Muang District had the most new registrations (1,066), followed by Thalang (579) and Kathu (332).

Also contributing to the net increase were 92 babies born during the period, compared with 80 deaths.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit's drive to increase the number people registered as living in Phuket received a boost on November 8 with the launch of Thailand's first "mobile registration van".

Three arrested in Chalong dope bust

CHALONG: Chalong Police seized nine kilograms of marijuana on November 30 after a sting operation that resulted in the arrest of three men.

Chalong Police Superintendent Pol Col Samarn Chainarong told a press conference on December 1 that after gathering intelligence from informants, police received information about a group of men who had been selling marijuana in Phuket.

Pol Maj Veerayut Sitthirattakul of Chalong Police Station arranged to meet Mongkol "Tum" Sa-Nguannam, 28, in Chalong on November 30 to buy one kilo of marijuana for 20,000 baht.

About 5:40 pm, police arrested Tum at the rendezvous in possession of the marijuana. He was taken to Chalong Police Station for questioning.

Tum told police that he got the marijuana from Supot "Pued" Mortip, 32, who lived in a rented house at Soi Sookniran 2 on Chao Fa East Rd, behind the new Wichit Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) office.

Police arrived at the given address about 7 pm and arrested Pued and Pichet "Oy" Doungpet, 37, both from Supanburi, after eight packets of marijuana weighing a total of eight kilos were found in the kitchen.

"The marijuana came from Laos and was bought by Pued in Ubon Ratchathani. He transported the drugs by bus to sell in Phuket, mostly to tourists. Pued would buy a kilogram of marijuana for about 10,000 baht and sell it for between 18,000 baht and 20,000 baht, Col Samarn said.

"We will send the case to Phuket Provincial Police to investigate who these men bought the marijuana from in Ubon Ratchathani," he added.

Tum was charged with selling marijuana and Pued and Oy were charged with possession with intent to sell. All three were being held at Chalong Police Station, Col Samarn said.

Dutchman heads home

PHUKET CITY: Thomas De Klerk, 51, the Dutch tourist who ended up in Bangkok Hospital Phuket after being stabbed twice by a knife-wielding thief, has returned home to the Netherlands.

Mr De Klerk had been shopping with his wife at the Downtown Market on Ranong Rd on November 26. The couple were loading goods into a tuk-tuk when a man snatched Mr De Klerk's belt-bag from around his waist.

Mr De Klerk gave chase

and caught up with the man, but was stabbed with a knife, once in his left hand and once in his abdomen, slicing his bladder.

Surgeon Attawut Chuathong told the *Gazette* that Mr De Klerk checked out of Bangkok Hospital Phuket on November 30. He returned for a checkup on December 2 and was given the all-clear to return home.

Mr De Klerk has since returned home, although K. Attawut was unable to verify the exact date.

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Chalong Police nab power cable cutters

CHALONG: Chalong Police have arrested two suspects for late-night thefts of electric cable that left homes in Rawai and Chalong in blackout over the past month.

At a press conference at Chalong Police Station on November 29, police identified the culprits as Mana Sae-Tun and Sansern Klaseuk, both 23-year-old Phuket natives.

The thieves were presented to the media by Chalong Police Investigations Inspector Lt Col Suchart Suwanpirom, who led the investigation and subsequent arrests

Presented on a table before the pair was some of the 44 kilograms of copper wire the two men had stripped from various locations across the island's south end, along with the insulated wirecutters and flashlight they used.

Both men confessed to stealing copper wire for sale to a junk shop on Sakdidet Rd in Phuket City for 180-200 baht/kg, Col Suchart said.

The arrests followed the theft at 3 am on November 22 of the main electric power cable leading to the home of Sommai Damrongkitkarnwong, located opposite the Rising Sun Residence on Soi Sainamyen, off Chao Fa West Rd in Chalong Village 6.

Led by Lt Col Suchart, police rushed to the scene to find a

great deal of stripped copper wire. The thieves barely manged to escape on foot, but left behind a key piece of evidence: a Honda Wave motorbike legally registered to Mana.

A check with the Phuket Transport Office led to the November 28 arrest of Mana at his home in Chalong Village 3.

He confessed to the crime and identified Sansern as his partner, who was arrested shortly thereafter at his girlfriend's home in Rawai Village 6.

After their arrest the pair showed police how they wrapped the handles of the large cablecutters with cloth to avoid electrocution.

They also confessed to carrying out similar crimes, including the theft at about 3 am on October 30 of about 30 kilograms of copper from a location along the the access road to Baan Krating Resort at Ao Sane, Rawai.

That haul netted the pair about 7,000 baht after they sold it at the Kanlaya Secondhand Shop on Sakdidet Rd in Phuket City. The 44 kilograms sold after their November 22 theft netted them about 8,000 baht, they said.

Both men have been charged with vandalism and robbery.

Foreign workers arrested for murder

KOH SIREH: Two foreign laborers have been arrested after the body of a Thai man was discovered in the Tha Chin river near Koh Sireh November 26

The body was initially believed to be that of an Indonesian or Burmese laborer but was later identified as Vitus Sornin, 23, from Surin Province by local residents who saw the corpse.

K. Vitus had been living in Phuket and working at a fishery, said Pol Lt Amporn Musikapan from Phuket City Police Station.

Lt Amporn said, "I got a call on the police radio at 10:05 am that a body had been found floating in the river around Jien Wanich pier. I went straight to the scene.

"When I arrived, I was told that the body had

floated from Jien Wanich pier along the river to Koh Sireh bridge," he added.

Lt Amporn said that there were stab wounds to the neck of the body and that the man may have been dead for about two days.

"After our investigation, we have now arrested two foreign workers [one Cambodian man and one Vietnamese man]. We found a knife at their work camp and the two men confessed to the murder of K. Vitus," said Lt Amporn, who was unable to verify the location of the worker camp or a possible motive for the killing.

The two suspects are being held at Phuket City Police Station.

The victim's relatives have collected the body and returned it to Surin, added Lt Amporn.

Ghostly goings on

NAKHON RATCHASIMA: In the West nowadays, fears over the safety of children have reached the point where many parents are reduced to nervous wrecks at the thought of letting their little ones out of sight.

Predatory priests, pedophiles and high-profile disappearances – notably that of Madeleine McCann just six months ago – have all take their toll on parents' sanity and further restricted the freedom of Western kids.

In Thailand, however, the paranoia does not seem to have yet reached such a peak. Indeed, the freedom enjoyed by Thai tots would be the envy of cooped-up little Westerners. There is one realm, however, where the Thais tend to take more precautions, as illustrated by an eerie tale from Bua Yai district in Nakhon Ratchasima recently ghosts.

A number of villages in the district began ramping up anti-ghost measures after residents had been having dreams that people born on Tuesdays and Wednesdays would be taken by the dreaded *phi pop*.

Despite the fact that their name sounds rather cute in English, phi pop are one of the most terrifying specters in the panoply of Thai folklore. With an insatiable appetite for fresh meat, they enjoy nothing more then disemboweling unfortunate villagers and snacking on still-warm organs. It is believed that phi pop are born when practitioners of the black arts let their magic get out of control, thus allowing themselves to be transformed into ravenous ghouls.

When reporters from the Gazette's Thai-language affiliate newspaper Kom Chad Luek arrived at Baan Khok Sawang Village 9 on November 24, they found villagers sitting pale-faced, discussing

how to deter the ever-hungry ghosts.

Villagers Buntham Pawanna and Yaem Upara explained that spine-chilling dreams of the phi pop had started about a month before. News of impending doom quickly had spread throughout the area, putting everyone in a state of fear – especially children. In a bid to deter the ghouls, many homeowners placed scarecrows in front of their dwellings bearing written messages that no one born on a Tuesday or Wednesday lived therein

Outside one home, reporters found a farang busily engaged in making anti-ghost scarecrows. The man, originally from Switzerland, identified himself as Pius Bierler, 41. He said that he was making the models to protect his young son, Tim, who at the tender age of two would make a tasty appetizer for a ravenous phi pop.

Pius, whose name indicates a willingness to perform religious duties, told the reporters that he had come to the village just a week earlier to visit his wife's family.

At first he had been confused as to why nearly every house appeared to have a scarecrow outside.

After his wife explained what was going on, however, he realized that Isarn held a grave threat to his child, one potentially more terrifying than the most perverted priest.

Pius said that he had never heard about phi pop before and had certainly never seen one. After hearing of their gruesome dining habits, however, he felt compelled to stay on the safe side and make a model to protect his beloved son.

"The villagers say that phi pop are so cruel that they eat the livers of their chosen victims while they are still alive. I fear that one may come and eat my son, who was born on a Wednesday. To keep them at bay, I made this scarecrow to put outside our house," said Pius, showing the sign.

ore than half of the official tally of 2,500 suspects killed in the government's "War on Drugs" in 2003 were not involved in drugs at all, a representative of a fact-finding panel has revealed.

At a brainstorming session in Bangkok on November 27, a representative from the Office of Narcotics Control Board disclosed that some 1,400 people were killed and labeled as drug suspects despite not having any links to drugs.

The fact-finding panel worked under the government-appointed committee, which was tasked with analyzing the Thaksin Shinawatra-led government's drug policy and its implementation that destroyed people's lives, property and reputation.

During the War on Drugs, police attributed many murders to silence killings by fellow drug traffickers. However, the families of the victims have demanded justice, saying that the victims were not involved in the drug trade.

Senior public prosecutor Kunlapon Ponlawan said it was straightforward to investigate extra-judicial killings by police officers as the "trigger-pullers" usually confessed.

It is more difficult to investigate silence-killing cases because of lack of witnesses, he said

The death toll was highest in February, when the policy was first implemented, then came down during the following two months, one representative said.

out to local community leaders for distribution to elderly voters.

He said he had kept two tablets as "evidence" to prove his claim. "What is worrying is the possible side-effects of the drug. We can't be sure if it is properly manufactured," said K. Sayan, chief executive of a local tambon administrative council whose younger brother is a People Power candidate.

Big chill. The Loei Provincial Administration Organization on November 30 announced "coldspell disaster zones" in 14 districts.

Suthep Maneechote, chief of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation in Loei, said the province announced the zones when the temperature stayed below 15°C for three consecutive days.

The announcement allowed the provincial administration to provide urgent help to people affected by the cold by distributing tens of thousands of blankets.

No deaths caused by the low temperatures have been reported.

HIV/Aids outlook. Thai youths were at risk of contracting HIV

as many had their first sexual encounter at 15 and nearly half did not use condoms, the Public Health Ministry has revealed.

At an event held to mark World Aids Day on December 1, Disease Control Department deputy head Dr Somchai Pinyopornpanich said Thailand had seen a steep decline in HIV infections overall.

Some 14,000 new cases were expected this year, down from 140,000 new cases per year during the 1990s.

However, many of the new infections were young women, some 45% of whom were house-

wives. About 20% of new cases were homosexuals, he added.

A worrying trend was that youths faced a high risk of catching HIV and sexually transmitted diseases because some had sex to impress their peers and believed that HIV was spread only via sex workers, he said.

Citing results of a survey last year, he said that less than 50% of youths who had casual sex used condoms and the age they first had sex was about 15 years old. Previously, the average age of was 18.


Uproarious ruling. The Central Administrative Court has rejected a petition from residents living near Bangkok's Suvarnabhumi Airport for a ban on night flights to ease noise pollution.

The court dismissed the request from 359 people who demanded that the year-old airport be closed from 10 pm to 5am.

The court said the sevenhour ban would affect 100,000 passengers and nearly 170 flights on average a day. The court ruled that such a ban would go against the Kingdom's commitment to becoming a major aviation hub and could trigger retaliation from airlines and travelers.

The residents asked the court to have Airports of Thailand suspend all night flights until it implemented measures approved by the National Environment Board in March 2005, including evacuating areas and soundproofing buildings.

Promises, promises

PHUKET'S ELECTION CANDIDATES TALK SHOP

n December 23, Thais will go to the polls nationwide to elect the 400 constituency members of parliament and 80 party list MPs who will make up the 480-seat national assembly.

To see what each of the political parties running for Phuket's two constituency MP seats hope to achieve if elected, the Gazette asked one of the candidates from each of the six parties competing in Phuket three questions:

- What are your party's policies?
- · What do you think are the greatest problems facing Phuket?
- If you win, what is the first thing you will do for the people of Phuket?

When asked what they hoped to achieve for Phuket, none of the six would-be legislators the Gazette interviewed made specific mention of any new bills they hope to put before Parliament.

Also notably absent from all of their replies were new constitutionally-mandated restrictions on MPs from lobbying the Government for projects in their constituencies.

Here's what they did have to say.



The new rules

An extensive overhaul of the electoral rules under the new Constitution brings about two major changes from past elections.

First, under the new system all of Phuket will constitute a single voting district, with the top two vote-getters winning the island's two constituency MP seats in the 480-seat rathaspha, or national assembly. This creates for the first time pairs of candidates from the same party campaigning together

as "running mates", although it is possible that one might be elected and not the other.

The other big change is in the party list system, with voters now casting their ballot for their party of choice based on a list of regional, not national, party-list candidates.

Phuket and the entire south fall into party list voting region 8, which will yield ten of the total 80 party list seats.

Democrat Party candidate Rewat Areerob (pictured), running on the ballot alongside Tossaporn Thepabutr, said, "We will do everything possible to support our party's polices aimed at developing the nation's human resources [through education], saving the economy, restoring peace to the three southernmost provinces and making a full return to democracy.

"In my view, increasing traffic congestion is a major problem facing Phuket.

"We also need to stress the importance of maintaining Phuket's attractiveness as a tourist destination and need to increase environmental awareness and a love of nature among the people in order to achieve this. I don't need to say a lot, except that we will follow party policy."

Although given little chance of winning a seat in Phuket, Chart Thai is tipped to win enough seats nationally to give it a chance to win some key portfolios as part of the next government, expected to emerge from coalition.

"Viewing Phuket as an important international tourism destination, the Chart Thai Party places the safety of visitors and ensuring they have a pleasant stay as a top priority.

"Currently Phuket has both a low and high season for tourism. I want to change that, making every month of the year part of the high season by organizing tourism events such as road shows so that foreigners will know they can have a good time here all year round.

"In my opinion we aren't





really ready to welcome tourists yet because our roads, water supply system and electric power grid do not cover all areas.

"While campaigning doorto-door one of the most common concerns voters raise with me are the roads.

"Even though we are a tourism destination our road network resembles what one would expect in a remote, border province.

"Another problem is garbage. The amount we produce continues to grow and we need to find a way to deal with it. I want to increase people's awareness of waste disposal issues and encourage recycling.

"It is easy for politicians to come up with grandiose campaign promises, but I am a realist who understands that the bottom line depends on getting government budgets to make them a reality," he concluded.

"Our party policy nationwide addresses education, economic and social development issues, all three of which are important throughout Thailand.

"As for Phuket specifically, the tourism industry economy is the main concern and there are many issues involved.

"One of the problems is the failure of recent governments to support Phuket's tourism industry. The result has been uneven development, with the government always lagging behind the private sector.

'Phuket has long requested road repair budgets and more recently the idea to build a tunnel to Patong was revived.

"However, we approved a 4-million-baht study for the same idea back when I was OrBorJor Vice-President and to this day we have never received [central] government support for this project.

"I worry about [the lack of] public transport services such as public buses and taxis too. As we are an international destination, we certainly need improvements in this area to support tourism.

"All of the policies being put forward by all of the candidates are laudable, but there are only two seats available. Whoever wins them needs to be clever and creative in planning Phuket's future as an international island. I really hope to have the chance to serve as the representative of the Phuket people."

Like the Chart Thai Party, the Puea Paendin ("For The Motherland") Party is another midsized party that could play an important role in the next government. Founded on September 11 this year by more than 200 veteran politicians who wanted to stay out of the pro-Thaksin or anti-Thaksin rift dividing the country, the party is fielding as its Phuket candidates Wisut Janjira and Aree Suriya (pictured).

K. Aree told the Gazette, "I'm a Muslim while my running mate is a Thai-Buddhist.

"I think this demonstrates our willingness to work together to create peace, happiness and social harmony in Phuket, the home that we love.

"We plan to hit the campaign trail hard and familiarize the people with our ballot numbers, nine and ten, letting them know that even though our team is new it is made up of experienced people with a strong work ethic.

"The people of Phuket are waiting for the right representative to come along with social initiatives and other plans to help Phuket reach its potential as a perfect tourist destination that is clean, safe and secure.

"To do this will require a deep understanding of what the existing obstacles are. Phuket is an international island. This means we have to be good hosts, both gracious and fair. I worry that local income levels could be a problem in this regard.

"Traffic is another issue that needs to be urgently addressed. Many roads need repairs and widening. It is common knowledge that many of these problems stem from the problem of Phuket's "hidden population" of unregistered migrant workers.

he cost of the recent flooding that inundated Koh Samui could total more than 200 million baht, according to Samui District Chief Adisorn Kamnerdsiri.

Samui was declared a disaster zone after heavy rain earlier this month brought travel around the island to a halt. Bridges were washed away, a major landslide resulted and fish were seen swimming down the streets.

Chief Adisorn said that evaluations of the damage were still being conducted, though Samui Mayor Varakorn Rattanarak estimated the total damage at around 100 million baht.

Although Surat Thani Governor Vinai Baupradit promised to provide 20 million baht to solve the island's recurring flood problems, the Surat Thani Highways Office said that 1.2 billion baht would be needed to fix the flood problems completely.

One local resident whose shop was flooded said, "We have had this problem for years and although the money to fix the problem has been promised, nothing has been done. We need to fix it and do it right – or it will only get worse."

Emergency funds will be allocated to repair the roads, drains and flood-prone areas. It is unclear when the work will begin.

Taxi-fare battle over. After months of disputes, the local Transportation Office has finally devised a fare system for yellow taxis on the island.

A table of fares has been

drawn up to give taxi drivers a wage in line with the high cost of living on samui and giving passengers set rates for transport within defined areas.

The move came after resi-

dents and tourists complained to the local Transportation Office

about taxi drivers not using the meters in the cars, instead opting to charge "unfair" rates.

The new table shows fares for travel to and from each area of the island. The new fare chart must be displayed at the back of all taxis so that they can be clearly seen by passengers.

All passengers are advised to check the chart before THAILAND paying. Drivers have been issued

warnings that they risk punishment if they do not follow the new rules.

Stars on Samui. Koh Samui played host to two big-name stars this past month while scenes of a new film were shot on location on the island.

had inquired about swimming conditions earlier in the day and failed to return.

Staff at the resort reported that they had voiced their concerns of dangerous high waves and strong currents.



Ex-policeman gunned down

former police Sergeant Major was gunned down at a car boot sale in Chumphon's Pathiw District in the early hours of November 30.

Sgt Maj Sathon Saengthawee, 39, was shot four times while he was loading clothes that he and his wife had been selling into the back of his pickup truck.

He was rushed to Pathiw Hospital, where he later died from his injuries.

The victim's wife, K. Yuwadee, 37, said that a man she did not recognize walked up to them and opened fire as they were loading their truck.

She dived for cover and remained hidden until the shooting stopped.

After the shooting, she saw her husband lying on a floor and his assailant making his escape on a Honda motorcycle.

This was the second attempt on Sgt Maj Sathon's life this year. On April 22, he was shot seven times with an 11mm pistol but survived the attack.

Sgt Maj Sathon, formerly a squad leader at Map Ammarit Police Station, was discharged from the police force when he was named prime suspect in the murder of a fellow officer at Map Ammarit Police Station.

The victim, Sgt Maj Wichan Phromthep, was shot dead February 23 this year.

Sgt Maj Sathon was granted bail and prosecutors later decided there was insufficient evidence to bring a case against him.

Police believe a personal dispute was the motive for Sgt Maj Sathon's killing.

Trafficker trouble. A man was arrested in Ranong November 30 for attempting to traffic nine Burmese men to work illegally in Phuket's construction industry.

Prawet Pricha, 32, was seized by a police and army task force at 12:30 am as he was ushering the men into the back of a Toyota pickup truck in Suk Samran district. The driver man-

aged to evade capture and was last seen running off into the surrounding forest. Police also seized a new Chevrolet sedan, still with red license plates, at the scene.

During questioning Prawet admitted that he was taking the men to work on construction sites in Phuket. He was to be paid 2,500 baht for each worker delivered and had made several other worker-smuggling runs, police said.

Prawet would drive ahead of the pickup in the Chevrolet, which he owned. When he came to a police checkpoint, he would SMS the driver of the Toyota pickup, who would instruct the

workers to get out and walk through the forest to avoid the checkpoint. The workers would be picked up further down the road.

Prawet was handed in to Suk Samran District Police to be charged. Police did not say what action would be taken against the workers.

Encroahment beef. Local politicians in Surat Thani province are claiming that a large number of cows have been poisoned by land encroachers in Wiang Sa district.

At least 35 cows have allegedly been poisoned on com-

munal grazing land in the district. Local people are blaming the deaths on businessmen who want to convert the land into a palm plantation.

Kritsaphon Wankaow, a member of Surat Thani Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*), said that the communal land was originally 2,700 rai

Encroachment had reduced the communal area to only around 700 rai, he said.

Surat Thani *OrBorJor* had prepared the land for grazing and run a scheme to provide cows for villagers in the area, K. Kritsaphon said.

Recently, however, people started using pesticide to kill the grass and then planted year-old palm saplings. They then spread poison over the area, killing livestock, he alleged.

K. Kritsaphon claimed that he knew the identity of the man behind the poisoning and has informed police. He will also raise the issue at an *OrBorJor* council meeting on December 13, he said.

Supharak Tiwtong, President of Wiang Sa Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBor-Tor*), said that the communal land was under the jurisdiction of the *OrBorTor*. Encroachment there is a long-standing problem, he said.

He notified the provincial authorities several times and submitted evidence of the encroachment. However, the boundaries of the communal land are not clear so they have been difficult to enforce, he added.

At least 14 people have planted palms on the land, but the *OrBorTor* does not have the authority to remove them, K. Supharak added.


Jeerawat Phetchdang, 34, a resident of Wiang Sa Village 9, said that he used to graze his 15 cows on the land.

Recently, however, four of his cows – worth 10,000-20,000 baht each – have died from poisoning. Many of the surviving animals are still ill, he said.

The government should clearly define the boundary of the grazing land to stop encroachment.

Those who have lost livestock to the attacks should be compensated, he added.

hristmas is coming and although there are an abundance of stores touting handmade oriental ornaments, few offer anything exceptional.



"All of the products are unique because they are handmade – no one item is ever the same and, of course, customers can add their own ideas when they order something," she added.


May has come up with some novel designs for the festive season that would be ideal as Christmas gifts, such as cutlery sleeves in the form of snowmen with long hats and scarves.


Customers can learn how to



ynamic duo from New York, Michelin Star Chef Patrica Yeo and Mixologist Joseph Boroski stopped off in Phuket recently to show off their contemporary culinary skills for a night of fusion entertainment, cocktails and cuisine at Sri Panwa's Baba lounge as part of their continental exploration of what Asia has to offer in the way of new culinary experiences and ingredients.

The first thing Patricia and Joseph did when they arrived in Phuket was to take a trip to the nearest market so they could see what fresh local ingredients would add a new twist to their creative cocktails and cooking.

Innovation through authenticity is the what the pair who worked together in New York's Monkey Bar aspire to when dreaming up their culinary creations. "It's ironic that a lot of the hotels we work with in exotic locations often place importance on importing ingredients, whereas there is usually so much to choose from locally," said Patricia.

"Wherever we go, there is always a traditional way of preparing and cooking local dishes, so I like to take those dishes and adapt them in some way. I love experimenting with the different kinds of legumes you can find in each country," she added.

Joseph has similar views about his cocktail creations. "I often meet people who ask for a cocktail done in a specific way, because that's the way they have been drinking it for years, but I like to suggest improvements or adaptations that can be as simple as adding a pinch of something to spice it up or a squeeze of juice from a different kind of fruit," he said.

Joseph elaborated on the pair's successful working rela-

tionship, which blossomed at Patricia's New York restaurants. "We work well together because I often need fresh ingredients from the kitchen for my cocktails and she is always happy to oblige, unlike some other chefs I have worked with.

"We seem to inspire each other. Patricia will often come up with a new syrup for my cocktails, which helps me create something new," said Joseph.

Thai Bouillabaisse with Blackfish, Mussels, Clams, and Spinach Serves 4

Ingredients

For the broth:

- 4 cups lightly salted shellfish stock, chicken stock, or clam juice
- 2 red onions, sliced
- 1 green apple, peeled, cored, and roughly chopped
- 1 stalk lemongrass, tough ends trimmed off and discarded, smashed in a few places with the handle of a knife
- 1/4 cup of sliced ginger (no need to peel it)
- 2 jalapeno chilies, roughly chopped
- 2 Thai bird chilies
- 4 kaffir lime leaves or 4 teaspoons freshly grated lime zest
- 2 cups cilantro leaves
- 2 cups mint leaves
- 2 cups basil leaves
- 2 tablespoons fish sauce, or more to taste
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice, or more to taste

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

To finish the dish:

4 (4-5 ounce) pieces of blackfish, halibut or cod 12 mussels

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12 small clams, such as Manila or cockles

2 cups spinach leaves

Cooked rice or noodles, for serv-

Cilantro sprigs and finely shredded scallions, for garnish

Method

To make the broth, combine the ingredients for the broth, up to the cilantro, in a large pot and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer 15 minutes. Remove from heat and add the cilantro, mint and basil. Infuse for 15 minutes. Strain the broth into a clean saucepan. Season to taste with fish sauce, lime juice, salt and pepper. The recipe made up to this point can be kept refrigerated for up to two days.

When ready to serve, heat the broth to a simmer over high heat. Add the fish, mussels and clams and cover. Cook for 5 minutes, or until the mussels and clams open. Stir in the spinach just

until it wilts and serve with rice or noodles in a bowl. Pour in the broth, place the shellfish on top of each bowl and garnish with cilantro and scallions.

Cocktail: Blueberry Joe

Ingredients

½ cup of blueberries 1 oz chilled fresh coffee Juice of ½ lemon ½ oz simple syrup 1 oz tequila ¹/₃ oz triple sec

Method

Start by pouring the blueberries into the bottom of a cocktail shaker. Crush them well with a muddler. Add the tequila and triple sec. Squeeze in the lemon juice, add the simple syrup and pour in the coffee. Shake well with ice.

Strain it into a chilled martini glass. Make sure that you don't strain it too well or you'll lose a lot of the blueberry pulp, which adds texture and acts as a garnish for the drink.

On the path to peace

hra Boonchoo first became involved with the Dhammakaya Foundation when he was a young student, but he wasn't ordained as a monk until he was 36.

"I became interested in studying Buddhism when I was a student. I went to the Dhammakaya Foundation and was immediately impressed by the way they train people to become role models of peace for the whole world. From then on it became my goal to become a monk," he said.

Boonchoo's family didn't feel as strongly as he did about following a spiritual path, however.

They refused to support the idea of Boonchoo joining the Dhammakaya Foundation, so he worked in a factory for the years that followed.

After three years at the factory, Boonchoo's brother-in-law, a successful businessman, sent him to Georgia State University in Atlanta to study for an MBA in the hopes that Boonchoo would return and help run the family business.

After completing his MBA, Boonchoo was torn between making others happy by returning to help with the family business as he was "supposed" to do and following a path that would lead him to his own happiness.

Initially, he stayed on in America to work at the Thai Department of Export Promotion in Atlanta, but as the years went ne of nine children in his family, 45-year-old **Phra Boonchoo Ariyadhammo** grew up in Samut Prakarn province. His life's journey has taken him from the factory floor to the United States, where he currently teaches meditation at the Dhammakaya International Meditation Center in Azusa, California.

A science graduate from Kasetsart University in Bangkok, Phra Boonchoo is now studying for his PhD in Buddhism at the University of the West, also in California.

Phra Boonchoo recently visited his homeland and his much larger family of 1,300 Buddhist monks at Wat Phra Dammakaya in Pathum Thani.

Here he explains how meditiation can help one find peace and happiness in a world of chaos and strife.

by his mother passed away, then his father.

With fewer family responsibilites, he started to seriously reconsider his long-standing goal of entering the monkhood.

"I started to think about my goal in life, and realized that my life is mine – not anyone else's. If you think of doing something that is good, that will make you happy, you shouldn't wait. You should go ahead and do it, as long as it doesn't create a problem for society. Eventually I decided to become a monk because it would make me happy and I could make a positive contribution to society, even though my family still didn't agree with it at that point," he

said, with the smile of a man who has won the internal battle for true contentment.

Before one of the weekly meditation sessions at Wang Kung restaurant in Phuket City, Phra Boonchoo asked people what they expected to gain from meditation. The two most common answers were "relaxation" and "happiness".

The following are some of Phra Ariyadhammo's comments on the nature of happiness and how to achieve it:

"Happiness is the language of the experience of independence, of being able to control the situation around you. When things happen that we can't control, the feeling—the 'quality' of the things that we are constantly 'touching' with our minds—does not transfer to ourselves and we become unhappy.

"To find inner peace we have to take control of our thoughts and emotions. There are many methods we can use to gain the power over them in a logical way. When things happen to us, we can observe our thoughts and reactions to situations, examine how we feel about them and try to understand the consequences of our actions that could follow. This will help us make up our minds about what is good and bad.

"If we have a real under-

standing about what is going on in our minds, if we can see through the thought process of what is happening and see the way things really are, then that is how happiness will come to us.

"People generally perceive things with their five senses. They gather all the data here [points to head] and try to understand. What actually happens a lot of the time though is that people don't truly understand something because they don't experience phenomena directly, so they guess 'it should be this way' or 'it should be that way'.

Thinking like this means we come up with a common result and posit it as a theory, like a scientist would. We must consider though, that some scientific theories that have been accepted and passed down from generation to generation are later proved invalid when they are examined in a different way when better testing equipment becomes available.

"This is because the 'human machine', with its five sensory organs, is in fact low quality equipment.

"Consider eyesight and how many of us need to wear glasses because our vision is poor. The same thing is true of all the other senses, yet most people continue to believe only what they have seen or otherwise experienced through the senses. Yet most of what we perceive is, in fact, illusory

"Have you ever noticed the light shining from a light bulb? We think and perceive of it as continuous, permanent brightness when if fact it is fluctuating. It is constantly going on and off, from dark to light, but at a frequency that is too rapid for our low-quality human eyes to detect.

"Because the equipment of the human machine is so poor, we cannot always observe or experience things as they really are. The result is misconception, fear and a constant search for something that is more secure – the next new super-theory that explains everything.

"Some religious groups ask us to take things for granted, telling us 'This is the way it is, not that way' without offering any kind of proof. But how can intelligent people take things for granted, without any proof? This is the problem.

"Those of us who meditate don't trust what our five lowquality sensory organs tell us. Through meditation we learn that the only thing that never lies is our 'sixth sense', our conscious-

"Unfortunately, human consciousness is commonly fragmented, like hundreds of tiny fireflies scattered across the sky.

"Meditation allows us to focus our consciousness, making it more sensitive and better at observing.

"If we meditate regularly and persistently, the scattered fireflies come together as a single light to illuminate our wisdom, allowing us to observe the phenomena inside us.

"Meditation makes the mind soft and gentle, like water. If we know our true nature, we will not hold on to unrealistically high expectations and be constantly disappointed. When we learn to stop disappointing ourselves we can experience happiness all the time."



itch the mascara and eyelash curler, pass on the fake stick-ons and get yourself some waterproof, synthetic eyelash extensions.

The popularity of eyelash extensions is growing among Asian women who seek thicker, longer eyelashes that can stand up to swimming, sleeping or ex-

Each artificial eyelash is applied on a lash-by-lash basis for a natural look. The single synthetic strands are designed with a curve to mimic a natural eyelash and boost the length and thickness of the lashes. This form of eyelid enhancement creates an elegant, natural look.

The process takes about 45 minutes and is painless. Any makeup is removed and a layer of Vaseline is applied to the eyelids, which are then covered with plastic film to protect the eyes from stray glue. The synthetic strands are then bonded to the natural lashes.

When professionally applied, eyelash extensions can last from six to eight weeks. A natural eyelash falls out after 60 to 90 days and is replaced by a new

it, making touch-ups necessary every two to four weeks, although the time varies depending on the individual.

Sirithorn "Tookta" Arksornkul, owner of the Putchayarnon beauty salon on the second floor of Ocean Mall, Phuket, opened her shop about eight months ago.

She said she has received excellent feedback from customers who have tried eyelash exten-

"At least five customers a day come for eyelash extensions," she said. Customers range from young teenage eyebatters to professional women

fighting their fifties," she added. K. Tookta's shop offers three colors – purple, blue and black – with black the most popu-

There are three sizes to choose from: natural (slightly extended), thick and extra thick (one centimeter, 1½cm and 2cm long), said K. Tookta.

Praneed Suthikul, 55, a customer of K. Tookta's shop, said, "I like eyelash extensions because they make my face look more sweet and sharp."

K. Praneed's daughter, K. Poom, 23, said, "I think it's fashionable and I like to have my eyes look more attractive as well."

Extensions are an obvious choice over false eyelashes for many women because they require low maintenance and are semi-permanent.

"Fake eyelashes need to be removed every day and they hurt your eyes, but eyelash extensions last longer, don't require removal and are not damaged by water. They look more natural as well," said K. Tookta.

This form of eyelash enhancement isn't an Asian phenomenon, as Western women are using them too.

"Many foreigners use our services. They typically request the thickest lashes, while Asian or Thai women like them natural," added K. Tookta.

Ratri Saolood, 39, another

customer of K. Tookta's shop, said, "I like eyelash extensions because I party a lot.

"I used to put on the fake ones and would have to remove them after I finished partying before I could go to bed. It was too much hassle.'

However, not everybody has positive experiences with artificial lashes.

Pornapa Sangarun, 26, said her extensions caused her pain when the natural lashes began to fall out.

The lashes didn't last as long as promised and when some fell out they looked horrible, she added.

When K. Pornapa attempted to remove the remaining strands with Vaseline, the natural ones fell out too.


"I had to wait at least two weeks for my eyelashes to grow back," said K. Pornapa.

Most eyelash experiences won't end like this if salt water is avoided and the lashes are gently cleaned with warm water.

It is also recommended to avoid oil-based mascaras and use water-based makeup remover.

Eyelash extensions are priced around 299 baht for natural, 499 for thick and 699 baht for extra thick.

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


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e's been described as the Miles Davis of dance music, and when you look at his credentials you can see why. A resident DJ at Studio 54, he's produced house-music classics alongside Todd Terry, remixed Donna Summer and Janet Jackson, and is one half of the most respected duo in house music – Masters at Work.

It's rare for a musician and DJ of this caliber to pass through Phuket, but with the island's club scene constantly evolving, you'll find "Little" Louie Vega at Seduction discotheque in Patong on December 11.

The son of jazz saxophonist Luis Vager and nephew of singer Hector Lavoe, Louie grew up with music and started his DJ career when he was 13 years old. By the time he was 20, he was rocking nightspots in the Bronx, New York, establishing a devoted fan base as house music first began to take shape.

Louie went on to hold residencies at the likes of Studio 54 and the Palladium in Manhattan. He became renowned for his innovative approach to music, incorporating everything from Latin and jazz to hip hop and new wave.

Meanwhile, in Brooklyn, Kenny Dope was putting on parties under the moniker "Masters at Work". After being introduced to each other by Todd Terry, Louie and Kenny went on to record as Masters at Work – and under various other guises – establishing one of the most successful acts in dance music.

Twenty years later, with countless productions and remixes under his belt, on November 29 Louie embarked on a world tour that will see him play in Switzerland, Belgium, the Philippines, South Africa – the list goes on. "I'm very excited about my Winter world tour. Many interesting countries, lots of great parties," Louie told the *Gazette* in an exclusive interview.

With flights almost every other day, Louie's tour doesn't give him much time to relax. "With my busy schedule, it's hard to stay in one place for days," said Louie, "but on occasions, I get to stay at places such as Ibiza, Mykonos, Japan, South Africa and a few others.

"The traveling really takes its toll on you physically. I will slow down on DJ world traveling within five years. I have lots of artists to produce, soundtracks to create, my own albums and I have a great night in NYC at Cielo called Roots," said Louie.

Before his tour, Louie was working in the studio and on his record label, Vega Records.

"I've been producing Anané's new album Selections, which is now licensed by Vega Records to Tommy Boy Records. It is my new masterpiece, to be released in April 2008. Vega Records is now up to its 50th single and has released five albums, including my albums Elements Of Life and Elements Of Life Extensions. I'm about to start on the new Elements Of Life album, One Dream," Louie said.

While house music has gone through many phases, Louie has been consistent throughout his career, innovating while ignoring trendy sub-genres. "I'm very true to our sound and the most important thing is that I stay creative and keep recording with new artists, concepts, albums and not be afraid to experiment. House music has many forms and that keeps the sound interesting – evolution is natural," said Louie.

Remixing other artists' tracks, particularly pop-music stars such as Madonna, is a lucrative niche explored by many dance-music artists. While remixing is considered an art in its own right, some producers use it as a way to make quick cash, putting out substandard tracks for the clubs. House-music icon Armand

Van Helden once said he could remix a track in less than four hours – on some of his efforts, it shows.

"A good remix is when you give an existing song a new life –

with a new groove and new melodies – and it rocks the clubs worldwide. You usually get an a cappella to work

with these days, so it's hard work to create an entirely new track. Lots of artists who are not in this genre hire remixers to have their jams in the clubs. It's also good to hear a pop artist like, for example, Justin Timberlake in the clubs. He writes wonderful melodies and to hear his voice in the clubs under the right track works."

Traveling the world as a DJ means lugging music around. While DJs traditionally use vinyl, DJ technology has evolved to the point where DJs don't need to take bulky record crates with them. With CD turntables and

digital-music equipment now the norm, Louie has embraced this newfound technology, although he admitted that "illegal file sharing sucks", in response to how illegal music downloads mean that Louie's tracks can be nabbed by anyone.


On the subject of technology, Louie said, "I will always love the analog, warm sound of vinyl, but for a global DJ, with all the traveling, it's convenient to carry CDs or your laptop, a hard drive and, for example, Serato [DJ software that allows users to play digital-music files on vinyl turntables]. The music you carry can be endless. If I had to carry vinyl for all I'm bringing, I'd have over 12 cases to check in. With modern equipment, there is so much you can do."

Speaking about his forthcoming trip to the island, Louie

said, "I've heard good things about the party scene in Phuket. I've been to

Bangkok, but never to Phuket. I'm looking forward to an incredible time and hope to see everyone very soon. Special thanks to all who have supported MAW, Louie Vega, Kenny Dope and the Vega Records family."






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


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Pampering returns to Phuket

few years ago, a firm directive was issued at a weekly editorial meeting. Due to excessive use, the word "pamper" was banned from use by staff writers assigned the grueling task of researching and writing spa reviews.

A quick look at the synonyms listed at thesaurus.com found some that come close, but none that match up perfectly in meaning with the word that has been successfully hijacked by the disposable diaper industry: baby, caress, cater to, coddle, cosset, dandle, fondle, gratify, humor, indulge, mollycoddle, overindulge, pet, please, regale, satisfy, spoil, tickle and yield. Hmm.

Now free to indulge ourselves in use of the "P" word, which, having been banned for so long, now needs to be liberally applied to make up for lost time: pamper, pamper, pamper!

Now that felt good, but not nearly as good as my recent visit to the great pioneer of Phuket Spas: Banyan Tree Spa Phuket.

Launched in 1994, Banyan Tree Spa Phuket is now the flagship of one of the most successful international spa chains in the world, the Banyan Tree Group, with 61 spas in 23 countries.

My visit began with a trip to the Yoga Pavilion, where the cute and flexible Doctor of Naturalopathy (yes, it is a word) Dr Preethi from southern India explained the many health-enhancing activities and services offered: meditation, pilates, Pranayam and Hatha yoga, and even yoga for golfers.

Dr Preethi was undaunted by the challenge of trying to limber up an old and overweight fossil like myself, cheerfully leading me through a number of stretching and breathing exercises.

My favorite new breathing exercise, one that my two-yearold daughter has since taken up with great relish, involves sitting in meditation, inserting the tips of the index fingers firmly into the

ears and humming long and loudly from the back of throat. Try it now. Thus far I have resisted the temptation of using this technique to block out the distractions I face

Although I was initially suspicious of doing something strenuous when my real goal was to be pampered, thanks to Dr Preethi I was suitably loose and relaxed when my spa therapist Thanomis, also known as Nui, arrived to escort me to the Star Anise Villa.

One of four ultra-luxurious, overnight-stay pavilions at the spa, the Star Anise Villa is fitted with a Rainmist Room, steam, sunken bath and a large bed. Like

everything at Banyan Tree, it is immaculately clean and fresh. With high ceilings, light harp

music playing in the background and aromatherapy scents in the air, it is just perfect for – you guessed it – pampering.

At state-of-the-art spas like

At state-of-the-art spas like Banyan Tree, attention to detail is everything. I started in the villa's antechamber with Nui gently washing my feet in water scented with rose petals and sanitized with sprigs of clove.

Normally I don't like any attention paid to my feet, which at size 15 are possibly the largest pair in Phuket.

Thankfully, the large bowl Nui used was big enough to ac-

commodate them – I expected it to be too small, as has happened many times before.

Expecting similar size-re-

lated problems on the clothing front, I had brought my own fisherman's pants as the ones provided at most spas don't fit me. Again, totally unnecessary at Banyan Tree, which uses soft and generouslyproportioned sarongs that can fit anyone.

My complimentary three-hour Tranquility Hydro Mist session (normally US\$240), a signature treatment unique to Banyan Tree, was blissful, with a soothing herbal body scrub with granulated sugar, then fresh milk and honey to moisturize every inch of my body, followed by intervals of

intense mist and rinsing with warm water.

The pseudo-rain fell from one of the most impressive plumbing fixtures I have ever seen: an array of 10 large and flexible shower heads in two parallel columns, the entire apparatus suspended from the ceiling to allow the warm, relaxing water to cover every inch of the body.

True luxury for someone who usually showers using a bowl to scoop cold water out of a plastic trash barrel.

After my Rainmist experience, I was left feeling as fresh as a fern in the mid-canopy of the Amazon rain forest – and my pampering had only just begun. Nui then led me to the massage table, where I opted for a Balinese oil massage.


As with most wonderful experiences, time seemed to slip by swiftly. I had to fight the temptation to drift off into sleep as Nui gracefully rubbed the soothing massage oil into my skin, at my request rubbing hard into the neck and shoulder muscles that were

still tight after a whole week hunched over a keyboard.

With the hot, dry season now upon us, the Rainmist experience is the perfect way to keep relaxed while re-moisturizing the skin in a way that no other spa treatment can

match. It is also a top-notch pampering experience everyone should try at least once.

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ilitary historian Adrian Gilbert takes a comprehensive view of the World War II prison camp experience in POW (John Murray, London, 206, 398p). The prisoners of war he focuses on are British and American. They totaled 295,000 people in camps in Italy and Germany: 95,000 American and the remainder from Britain and every part of its vast Commonwealth.

The POWs lived on scant rations, often in overcrowded and unsanitary conditions, but their captors abided by the Geneva Convention and the prisoners were supervised by the Swiss Protecting Power and enjoyed Red Cross food parcels and YMCA athletic equipment – all to ensure that German and Italian counterparts received equally good treatment.

Russian POWs enjoyed no such privileges: "During the war on the Eastern Front, the Germans captured approximately 5.7 million men and women of the Soviet armed forces, and through a process of shootings, beating, starvation, disease or overwork killed 3.3 million of them. As the Soviet Union was not a signatory to the Geneva Convention (and had little interest in its own captives), Russian prisoners did not receive assistance from a Protecting Power or from the Red Cross or other humanitarian organization."

Regardless, life in the camps was no picnic. Here's the typical daily menu: "A cup of Ersatz coffee, made from acorns in the morning, a bowl of soup, usually Sauerkraut, with a few potatoes at midday, and one fifth of a loaf of black bread with a pat of margarine and a small piece of sausage or cheese in the evening... These rations amounted to barely 800 calories per day, less than half the optimum required for an adult human being. The pangs of hunger were ever present.'

Beyond the hunger was the psycho-

logical torment of living packed together in an ill-smelling, noisy crowd with no sem-

blance of privacy. In Colditz prison, there was competition to be sent to solitary confinement in the "cooler". One inmate recalls, "We had a roster of who was to insult the Germans next so we could get a turn in iail."

Gilbert follows the stories of POWs from capture to release. In the early days there were mass surrenders of infantry in France and North Africa, followed a second wave of British and American airmen captured in the occupied territories of Europe.

In time, the camps organized themselves into small cities with a functioning bureaucracy, language and history classes, libraries, orchestras, theater groups, newspapers, gambling dens, illegal stills and a wide variety of sports: football, baseball, basketball, volleyball, rugby, boxing, table

tennis and even golf. But he greatest form

of entertainment was organizing escapes. As one prisoner wrote, "All schemes involved weeks and sometimes months of furtive planning, decisions on route and disguise, invention of a suitable story for traveling purposes and sometimes even the learning of a new language..."

> The Great Escape of 76 men from Stalag Luft III in March 1944 was the most famous, but there were three other mass breakouts almost as large. A few achieved a "home run" of a return to England, but their recapture tied up thousands of Ger-

> There were other ways of escape, too, as one prisoner relates, "A whole room of 24 men would agree to pretend that they were going on a day's outing, say, to

Bournemouth. One man would be the engine-driver, another the guard and so on. The rest would be trippers. They would make a noise like a train and 'Choo-choochoo!' all round the camp.... The guards would stare in astonishment and grunt to each other 'Alles verruck!' ("All mad!"). But if we were, it was only that sort of madness that kept us sane.'



Gram: Yes, and constant overuse will dilute the force, power and good old-fashioned oomph it aspires to. This "black hole" word will suck in and destroys all synonyms and impoverish the language. Soon, related words such as "force" and "power" will be swept into its in-

satiable maw and vanish from our vocabulary forever.

Interstellar warriors will greet each other with. "May the Impact be with you" and Chuck Norris will star in movies called Delta Impact. We'll have songs

called I've Got the Impact and The Impact of Love.

Tsow: Hmmm. You may have a point.

Gram: Not only that, this word is breeding clones. Not long ago, Leonardo DiCaprio was being interviewed on CNN about the

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movie Blood Diamond and he was asked, "What was the most impactful moment for you in making this movie?" Leo didn't miss a beat. He looked solemn and said, "Well, the most impactful moment was...'

But "impactful" is only the beginning. Soon, "impact" and its myriad clones will hold sway over a desolate linguistic landscape devoid of variety. People will say things like, "Impact-wise, the eight-baht bus fare is impacting my finances very impactfully' and "China is gaining rapidly in world impacthood."

The worst thing you'll be able to say about a weak person will be "He is impactless," and when you're unimpressed by an argument you'll say, "I am unimpacted by your reasoning."

Tsow: Can we say "impactable"?

Gram: I bet you'll soon be able to, although I have no idea what it might mean.

Such a majestic description of the process is bound to make enhanced interrogatees feel much more positive about their situation.

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Phuket politics start in earnest

Fifteen months after the military coup, Thailand takes an important step forward in restoring democracy on December 23, when voters will go to the polls. In Phuket, voters will elect two constituency MPs and a party of choice under the new party list system.

Despite the new Constitution, it seems there will be little real change in the political status quo – locally or nationwide – regardless of which party wins the right to form the next government. Already, political pundits are giving what inevitably will be a coalition government little chance of holding together more than one or two years under the new electoral system, which was carefully devised to make a strong single-party government like that of the former Thai Rak Thai Party more difficult to establish.

As demonstrated in the referendum in August, Thailand remains deeply divided along both class and geographic lines. Thai Rak Thai's self-confessed "nominee party" Palang Prachachon (People Power) is expected to win most of the seats in MP-rich Isarn.

The Democrat Party is expected to maintain its political domination throughout the South - though one of the People Power candidates could pull off an upset win here in Phuket.

It is notable that Phuket's influential Thai-language daily newspaper Siang Tai has come out in full support of the two People Power candidates, running their pictures every day on its front page with messages reading "Phuket's Sweethearts" amidst its normal assemblage of gory photos of road accidents and violent murder scenes.

Despite what appears will be their inevitable victory, Democrat Party candidates Tossaporn Thepabutra and Rewat Areerob will be forced to endure attacks from their political rivals right up until elec-

Several candidates have petitioned the national Election Commission to replace the Phuket Election Commission (PEC) on the grounds of impartiality after the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor), headed by K. Tossaporn's wife, K. Anchalee, took part in a highly publicized motorcycle helmet giveaway organized by the Governor's Office.

The PEC has also accepted a request from the same candidates to investigate Anchalee for taking a group of housewives on a trip to Malaysia, using taxpayer's money for political gain.

Other past events that candidate Tossaporn will also be constantly reminded of by his rivals is his lost legal battle to retain control over land issued to him under the Sor Por Kor land-use program to make state land available for use to the poor.

For these reasons and others, the local Democrats would be well advised to avoid getting into a mud-slinging match with their rivals. - The Editor

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

We then went to Kathu Police Station, where our treatment was about average. We were told to wait for an officer, which wasn't a problem.


There was a Swiss couple there who had come to report that they had lost some money, a watch, a gold bangle and a bracelet. They were staying in the same wing as the Corleys.

Well-known among the staff, Brian was staying at the resort at the time of the incident. Brian is also a long-time friend of Jan and Warren Corley, who were two of the guests at the forefront of complaints against the resort. Here, Brian tells his thoughts about what happened and how guests and the resort can move on from this incident.

his wife to return to the police

Also, I was talking to one of the police officers when one of the other guests from the resort quite stupidly threw a 100baht note at him saying, "You might as well have your share." This would get you locked up in

It was me who actually recommended that the Corleys stay at the Sea Sun Sand Resort instead of their original choice, which was the Patong Resort.

I have stayed at the Sea Sun Sand Resort a number of times. It wasn't uncommon for me to leave between 400 and 1,000 baht in notes in the top drawer, but I have never lost a baht.

Thinking about why it happened, how can you give a reason for theft? Opportunity, greed - it was evidently not an isolated case and yet I was there in May and I had never heard of anything like this. It must have been wellrehearsed.

One thing that I didn't think about at the time was that each of the people who complained about having money and items stolen had been on a day trip that same day. They either went to James Bond Island or Phi Phi. The receptionist must have been aware of this because the pickup area is in plain sight of the front

About the tourists trying to blacken the name of the resort: Imagine you have just lost a couple of hundred dollars and your friend has lost US\$400 and other few guests a few hundred dollars more.

Reception refused to get in touch with the manager or even the day manager, who lives not far away in Phuket City.

These people were told on a Saturday that they would have to wait until Monday to speak

I am a well-liked guest at the resort, but I was totally flattened by the savagery of the person at reception, who kept asking me, as a long-time visitor, why I didn't believe that the guests had ganged up on the staff.

I have no reason to fabricate at my age and I could not believe the way the staff all ganged up together. The only face that was lost was that of the honest staff and also the perpetrators when they found out they had been sprung.

There were thefts and bad manners all around, but that resort needs a hell of a shake up to return to its once-beautiful self and get the confidence of travelers back - and they should not blame the guests who were shortshrifted by the perceived Asian loss of face.

I have known the Corleys for about 40 years and I would stake my life on their honesty.

After being told to their faces by reception that they were liars, I think that would be enough to want not just retribution, but justice and knowledge that these criminals wouldn't strike again and that the management might show some remorse.

Mr Corley is the manager of a large pharmaceutical firm in Western Australia. He is not the sort of person who would indulge in wild fantasies.

The Sea Sun Sand Resort can return to what it used to be, but only if action is taken to get rid of this criminal element.

When will the roadworks in Kathu be completed?

Construction work at the Tung Tong intersection is creating unsafe traffic conditions. The diverted traffic onto Wichit Songkram Rd has made that road so overcrowded that motorists and cyclists are making dangerous moves just to get on the road.

We are doing the best we can. We have put out orange cones and traffic signs and appointed traffic police to supervise traffic during the rush hours, at 8 am and 4 pm.

It is also important that drivers strictly adhere to traffic rules. As this is a residential area, drivers should not be driving faster than 40 kilometers an hour.



Can a spouse of a retiree also be issued a one-year permit to stay?

My husband and I just bought a house for 3 million baht and we are planning to invest more in rebuilding next year.

My husband is 65 years old. He receives a pension of 85,000 baht a month, but I am 50 years old and, as a housewife dependent on him, do not receive a pension. Can I apply for a one-year retirement visa? We are planning to move here next year.

Your husband can apply for

a non-immigrant "O" retirement visa from a Thai embassy or consulate in your home country. When you file that application, also file an application for you to also be issued a non-immigrant "O" visa on the basis of your husband's status.

Once in Thailand, apply for a one-year permit to stay at any Immigration office using the same documents filed with your husband's visa application. You should be issued the same permit to stay as your husband as you

With your application for a one-year permit to stay, you must show your marriage license.

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attaya attracts a wide cross-section of visitors from the four corners of the globe. To better understand the quirks and foibles of this diverse range of visitors, the following is a brief description of the most common arrivals to these shores.

There is nothing wrong with drinking alcohol in moderation; a daily glass of wine has even been linked with improved health. Life, however, is about balance; a combination of regular alcohol consumption and living in a hot climate leaves our bodies in need of other drinks to replace lost body fluids and electrolytes.

It is important to know how much you should be drinking; fluid replacement should replenish what you lose through sweating. For most of us in Phuket, this amount will be substantial.

Poeple who play sport will

ooking for liquid refreshment

require more. Of great importance is the replacement of "electrolytes".

Most people drink only when they are thirsty, but the

need to rehydrate often occurs before you feel thirsty, especially when playing sports in a hot climate. Initial signs of dehydration are fatigue and a dry mouth.

The real danger occurs when the fluid and electrolyte loss brought under control, heat stroke may occur, which can result in death. So back to our problem: have lost about one liter of fluid. lead to a condition know as hywhich drink is best and how much should we drink?

For the inactive, water is normally sufficient. Electrolyte or

sodium replacement will normally be achieved through regular diet. If you experience muscle cramps, eat a banana a day. Another method is to add a

sprinkling of salt to a meal two or three times a week.

If you exercise or play sport, you need to replace up to one liter of fluids an hour. To determine how much fluid you've lost, weigh yourself before and after exercising. A one-kilogram loss of body weight indicates that you This must be replaced with a combination of water and sports

Sports drinks are suitable after exercise because they contain a trace of sugars and electrolytes, such as sodium, potassium and magnesium salts. Sugary drinks, such as Sprite and Fanta, contain way too much sugar (about 14%) and virtually no electrolytes, whereas a drink like Gatorade contains approximately 7% sugar in solution.

The higher the sugar concentration, the slower the digestion of the fluid will be. To stave off dehydration, get fluid into the system as quickly as possible, so don't drink fluids with more than 10% sugar by concentration.

Check with your trainer about which drink is best for you and consume until your body is rehydrated – when your urine is clear or light yellow. Avoid drinking too much, however, as this can

ponatremia, which flushes out all of the body's of electrolyte.


Most importantly, never use energy drinks such as Red Bull and M150 as replacement fluids. These all contain caffeine, which elevates the rate of bodily urine excretion (diuresis) and tends to dehydrate the body.

For a cheap and simple rehydration scheme, do what the top professional tennis players do: drink pure water and have a few bites of a banana.

Alternatively, get a big bottle of water beforehand and add a few tablespoons of sugar and a dash of salt. It's just as effective and a lot cheaper than any of the commercially-touted alternatives.

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year the show featured all of the big names in Thai communications – TOT, TT&T, CAT, True and Hutch – with a handful of government agencies and a small scattering of other related companies.

A few things at the expo surprised me. TOT and TT&T featured expensive exhibits about the future of Internet access in Thailand. Unfortunately, I couldn't find anybody who could or would tell me, definitively, about their companies' plans for Phuket. I guess they don't call us "upcountry" for nothin'.

I have heard rumbles that TOT was about to launch a new initiative to improve Internet access in Phuket homes, but the folks I talked to were short on details and long on hyperbole. Given TOT and TT&T's track records here in Phuket, some skepticism seems in order.

CAT, however, displayed all sorts of maps, facts and figures. As far as I could tell, none had a direct bearing on Internet access in Phuket, but the general trend of more and better seemed evident all over.

The CAT rep I spoke to said that their new wireless broadband EV-DO cards were going to support "Rev A" real soon. Specifically, he said that CAT would start offering the C-motech CCU 680 wireless modem (as opposed to the current CCU 650) and possibly the Sierra Wireless 595U card.

For those of you who haven't been keeping notes, "Rev A" is the next, marginal improvement in wireless Internet service.

If you already have a CCU 650 or Sierra 580 card from CAT, neither will become obsolete overnight. Both use the older but still very capable "Rev 0" (say "rev-zero") technology. Rev A is slightly faster and has less noticeable stutters with Skype, online

games and other Internet access that alternates quickly between upload and download.

To a typical Internet user in Phuket with a strong CAT signal, the current CCU-650 clocks in download speeds of about 400 to 500Kbps, as measured to the west coast of the US. The new CCU-660 may raise the bar to 520Kbps. Maybe. You'll only notice a significant improvement when running Skype or another VoIP service, or if you play interactive games online.

CAT also had a live demo of "video on demand", a technology that many people call IPTV, which allows you to play movies or other video content directly over the Internet. If you decide at 7:23 one evening that you want to watch *The Shining*, you click your remote a few times and the

movie plays on your TV. Want to pause the show to admire Jack Nicholson's 5 o'clock shadow? Rewind to the beginning of the ax scene? No problem. The movie's transmitted over your Internet connection in real time.

IPTV requires an enormous amount of bandwidth. If you live in Hong Kong, Seoul, Singapore or Stockholm, you already have all the bandwidth you need. If you live in Phuket, well, you live in

CAT is seriously talking about stringing fiber-optic cable to homes, at least in some locations in Bangkok. Fiber-optic cables to the home would provide enough bandwidth for IPTV and more, and it's a slam-dunk business proposition for a small, highdemand area like most populated parts of Phuket. I figure it'll happen in Phuket about the same time we see snow in Saphan Hin.

Hutch had an interesting booth. I was surprised to discover that Hutch has no land lines in Thailand. The only service they offer is via the 3G CDMA phone system. Hutch and CAT use the same technology to deliver fast wireless Internet, but Hutch has an exclusive contract for coverage in Bangkok, and CAT has exclusive rights outside Bangkok. As a result, the EV-DO card you buy here won't work in Bangkok and vice-versa.

CAT and KHUN WOODY'S Hutch have been promising to allow customers of one service to use

the other. Although the meld was originally promised for this year, it looks like it'll be 2008 or later before the promise comes true.

Finally, I dropped by the True booth. You probably know True as the company behind UBC television, but you may not know that True is one of the leading Internet Service Providers in Bangkok.

True just opened a coffee shop above the Post Office on the Patong beach road, and it's packed with electronics. I'm very

curious to find out whether or not True has any intentions of offering Internet access here in Phuket. So far, no definitive word - but I'll keep you posted.

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Dying doesn't mean having your assets frozen off

nheritance of money always involves at least two people: the donor and the recipient. But when more people are involved, the situation becomes far more complex because – as in most areas of financial planning – it requires greater attention to the individual situation.

With expatriates in Thailand, often the breadwinner has had two marriages and children from both. Expats have a habit of acquiring assets in various parts of the world and the arrival of the "grim reaper" often leads to a legal nightmare.

When an expat dies, his family does not know where his assets are held. There may be bank accounts, mutual funds, shares and properties held by the deceased during his lifetime, but if there is no documentary proof at hand it may be impossible to track assets. Many governments regularly issue statistics of unclaimed assets and the amounts involved are enormous.

Planning an estate is usually not a lengthy exercise but it is a matter that people often procrastinate about. All of us realize we are mortal, but many of us expect we will live longer than we actually do.

I am currently assisting in one case in which the deceased was in apparent robust good health on going to bed but simply died during the night in his sleep. An exit this easy is hoped for by most people, but because we are human and are subject to all the idiosyncrasies of our species we expect to have at least some warning of our demise.



One of the most common problems that happens after death is that, by announcing the death, the resulting estate becomes "frozen". This often results in widows and the family immediately facing a liquidity crisis.

The deceased may have left a modest or substantial estate, but the widow or widower suddenly does not have access to ready cash to pay day-to-day expenses. This is not just a problem for expats, but a worldwide dilemma.

However, with expats, it is likely to be more difficult to resolve. One simple route that can save much pain is to have insurance policies made payable to the surviving spouse rather than paid into the estate.

Through this route, only a death certificate is required to claim the benefits. It may have to be translated into English or

another language and duly notarized, but this can be done relatively quickly.

Insurance policies are often not simply an accumulation of regular payments by the policyholder that are a guaranteed payout on his death. They are often "vehicles" or platforms that hold a large amount of assets invested regionally, or even globally.

Expats who have been resident outside their home countries for long periods should consider transferring their holdings, such as bank account balances, from their "home" countries to offshore accounts.

For example, when a UK expat has a bank account in the UK, it is more practical to move this account to the Channel Islands or Isle of Man on becoming a non-resident. One benefit is that on death it takes about six weeks to "wind up" the estate.

Death could be just around the corner for any of us, but once you've popped your clogs, will your family know where to find your assets?

The legal process is just as sophisticated as in the UK, but it is faster because there is no interference from the tax au-

thorities. A similar UK e s t a t e

would take on average about one year to wind up.

A question frequently raised by expats with wives and young children is that they are worried that their wives would not be competent in handling the subse-

quent financial matters and continuing to pay school fees. In short, their death would seriously affect the future of their children.

The best way to avoid this problem is to use a trust; ideally, an offshore trust in a well-respected jurisdiction. It is much better to use a large, respectable corporate trustee than to rely on family members with little or no knowledge of these matters.

However, if it is essential

that a family member be involved in the management of an offshore trust, there are established ways for this to be done.

Many people leave large sums of money for their children to receive on their 18th, 21st or 25th birthdays. Should the sum involved be, say, US\$50,000, then probably not too much damage will be done.

However, often large sums of money suddenly given to a young person can send them completely "off the rails".

Often, as well-documented in news reports and surveys of the accounts of people who won


large amounts of money in lotteries, in most cases the sudden windfall had a very negative effect on the "lucky" winner. Many said they wished that they had never received the money.

The main reason for this is that people can place a value on what they have worked, in-

vested and saved for, but windfalls of large sums, instead of adding value to their lives, often have the opposite effect.

Food importers enjoy festive season spike

PHUKET: Phuket's food importers are enjoying the festive season as foreigners fill up their fridges for Christmas and new year feasting while the island's resorts promote their festive menus.

Many of the tourists who have booked stays in Phuket's four- and five-star resorts during the island' peak season have had to pay for their compulsory Christmas meal, ranging from 4,000 to 10,000 baht per head.

Imports of seasonal fruits such as cherries, blueberries and other berries spike at this time of year as do imports of poultry. However, recent restrictions and clampdowns on poultry imports due to the risks involved with avian flu contamination, some suppliers are not importing fresh turkeys.

Regional Sales Manager for Choice Foods Thailand, Daniel Donatelli explained to the *Gazette* that as Choice Foods is a large company specializing in fresh and live products, they now avoid the risk of cross-contamination from poultry with other meat and vegetable products by simply not importing turkeys.

"About 80% of the products we import, such as meats, seafood, vegetables, salmon and lamb, are from Australia, Spain, New Zealand and the

CP Foods, however, are continuing to import poultry. The reason given to the Gazette is that CP's operations are specifically geared to dealing

with poultry and that they have closed systems to ensure poultry remains separated from other live-

"The main difference between our meat products and those you'll find on supermarket shelves is that our products always display a slaughter date, whereas others will often only have a sell by date, which gives no real indication of how long the food has been stored before the customer buys it," Mr Donatelli explained.

"It is important that we understand the market correctly as we deal directly with farms on a

"As well as supplying hotels and restaurants in the area, we also supply some of the island's supermarkets," he added.

"As a wholesaler, we regularly supply about 130 five-star hotels and restaurants in Phuket, Krabi, Khao Lak and on Phi Phi," he added.

"We usually keep about 20 tonnes of stock in our stores with three delivery trucks operating full time in Phuket, but demand for imported food products increases by about four to five times the normal rate during the Christmas and New Year period," he explained.

Sathit Promwieng, Manager of Don's Mall in Rawai, said that they see an increase in orders from hotels and restaurants in December.

"Last year we sold more than 60 turkeys. Customers usually opt for a pre-cooked turkey meal service, which we provide."



Diving into an unconventional life

o why has it become so popular to become a dive professional? What is the allure of being a underpaid dive master? Why do impressionable divers leave their cold countries to come to Phuket and continue their diving education? I remember the turning point for me, when and why I made that fateful decision.

I had just finished an open water course in Dahab, Egypt, and was at the end of a fourmonth solo backpacking trip.

You gain a collection of numbers and addresses of friends from around the world. These are people you will never forget.



Cigana and Blatchford win Laguna triathlon

CHERNG TALAY: Massimo Cigana from Venice and Briton Liz Blatchford ran, swam and cycled their way to the front of a throng of about 700 athletes from 44 countries at this year's Laguna Phuket Triathlon on December 2.

The field comprised the likes of 2007 Hawaii Ironman World Championship winner Chrissie Wellington from the UK, Ford Ironman 70.3 World Championship 2007 winner Mirinda Carfrae from Australia and German Faris Al-Sultan, winner of the 2005 Ford Ironman World Championship, Hawaii.

Cigana secured the title and the US\$3,000 prize money with a winning time of 2:31:46. Cunningham finished second, while Al-Sultan clawed on to






take third place.


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

RAWAI: Work on the 210-millionbaht Valencia at Rawai private pool villa project, located on seven rai about 100 meters north of the Rawai Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) office, is on schedule for completion August next year.

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
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
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A property market named desire

oing by the numbers, the sunny isle of Phuket has seen a flourish of economic growth in 2007. It's been a banner year for tourism with arrivals looking to exceed five million. Hotel occupancies together with average room rates are now pushing past the pre-tsunami boom years.

For the property market, the year has been a mixed bag, given the effects of the military coup, the brouhaha over changes to the Foreign Business Act and now uncertainty over the December 23 general election.

While the political landscape has been uncertain, the investment climate has been buoyant, with high-profile, international-investordriven projects, such as the Shangri La, Taj, Raffles, Marriott Vacation ownership expansion, The Yamu boutique hotel and Jumeirah Private Island Resort.

Major hotel branding has also continued with French chain Accor opening the Mercure in

Patong, Singapore's Millennium soon to open at Jungceylong and the Marriott opening four new managed projects under its core brand Courtyard flag in Surin, Ka-

mala and Patong. Tourism remains a key indicator for property sales in Phuket, but the industry has had its ups and downs throughout

the year.

Tracking performance in the property market in Phuket, however, is not straightforward. The hotel market has hard data on the number of hotel rooms and, to a lesser degree, competitive figures within the branded hotels on occupancy and rates are being traded.

In contrast, transaction data for mid- and upper-level properties is not readily available to the public as in most Western countries. Reasons for this include

many overseas buyers preferring leasehold properties and that some projects' sales are on share-purchase agreements that are signed overseas, together making tracking transactions through the Land Office a daunting task.

During the first half of 2007. there was clear a fall in sales according to most of the larger developers here, which was expected given the political issues and removal of then-Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra. But now, in the fourth quarter, there is an upswing, which is consistent with the arrival of high sea-

Keeping track of trends is important in any business and the property business does track the hotel market in Bangkok. By the numbers, in a market that caters to a good amount of corporate business, the first three quarters of the year saw demand down by 15% to 20%, mainly in the business segment, but the fourth quarter is showing marked recovery

and growth despite new accommodations entering the market.

Supply is increasing, as one can easily see by getting in a car and driv-

> ing around the island and seeing the building sites and billboards. What was once a fledgling market has now become a full-size industry in itself. Other over-

seas markets are keen to use Phuket as a blueprint for success.

One thing for certain is that Phuket, as the "darling" of the resort property market, has become an object of desire for many competing markets in Thailand and elsewhere in Asia. Moving into 2008 and beyond, one key component needed to sustain the momentum is aligning the industry with tourism.

While Phuket property has remained dominated by buyers from Hong Kong, Singapore, the UK and now from Scandinavia; the question is now whether demand can keep pace with supply growth. The burning question is, 'Where will the buyers come from in the next few years?"

As with tourism here, property agents aim to extend real estate sales to new international markets, which requires overseas marketing. The power of Phuket as a brand name seems to have enormous potential. Certainly adding to this is the diversity within the "Greater Phuket" area, which includes Phang Nga, mainland Krabi, Koh Lanta and the Phi Phi Islands, together forming a unique offering compared with any other market in the region.

number of international visitors to the island.

There are examples of efficient destination-marketing initiatives, such as the Singapore Tourist Promotion Board and Hawaii Visitors Bureau, which have played important roles in tourism growth in those locales.

Hopefully, there will be wake-up call for Phuket, which is so dependent on tourism and its offspring industries, including property.

A wake-up call that fills the new hotels under construction, provides visitors to the shopping malls and buyers for the villas and apartments. A wake-up call that results in investment in collective marketing and a focus on developing new markets, which will help retain and develop Phuket's market share in a competitive global economy.

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

like salt. Call me weird, but anything salty is good. So why does salt get such bad press? In the vernacular, salt rocks. I'm not quite sure where the vernacular is exactly, but as some wise scholar once pointed out, "Salt is the only rock we eat.'

With today's fancy "boutique" ingredients and fad diets emerging on a far-too-regular basis, many people forget that salt is actually essential to survival – your body needs it to regulate vital fluids. The weird thing is that our bodies can't produce salt, so we have to consume what we need.

I will grudgingly accept that sometimes we take in a bit too much, sometimes to the point where it might be detrimental to our health, but the experts can't seem to agree on where that point actually lies. The Heart, Lung and Blood Institute in the US urges people to limit their salt intake to about a teaspoonful a day. Fooey.

There are many books about reducing or omitting dietary salt and many others about how we should eat more of the stuff. In centuries past, wars were fought over obtaining the substance.

Apparently, at one time, salt was so valuable that Roman solders received a salt allowance as part of their pay. The Latin term for this allowance was salarium argentum, the origin of the English word "salary" and the French word "argent", meaning silver or money.

There are also a fair few medicinal uses of salt. People learned early on that applying salt to an open or infected wound would draw out the infection and help it heal. Who doesn't remember grandma insisting on a saltwater gargle to cure a sore throat? It made us gag, but it seemed to do the job.

The importance of salt as a culinary ingredient is fairly obvious – it's in just about every recipe nowadays. That wasn't always the case though. In the Stone Age, they didn't need extra salt, be-

cause they hunted most of their food and mainly ate red meat, which has plenty of salt in it already – vegetarians, take note.

Can you still get sea salt? I remember a school science experiment in which we had to extract salt crystals from saltwater. Not a particularly difficult task, but we got to use Bunsen burners and play with flames. The thing I recall most clearly was the edict from the chemistry teacher, who said, "This salt isn't edible don't eat it."

Thirteen-year-old Bert saw this as a personal challenge, of course. I took home the crystalline contents of that little white enamel dish from the school lab and sprinkled the lot on my plate of chips that night – perfectly edible. combined with a little vinegar, it went down very well.

Sea salt is all around us in the Phuket air – just check the film of salt on your sunglasses after half an hour at the beach on a breezy day. This kind of atmosphere is enough to kill off many plants, as salty air isn't something that most forms of plant life are particularly willing to put up with.

A gentleman by the name of Frank contacted me at bert@ bloominbert.com this week, saying that he recently rented a beach house with a garden approximately 25 meters from the sea at Ao Yon. He asked me if I could recommend some small potted plants which would be suitable for the sea air.

Well Frank, you're actually spoiled for choice. Probably the best known plant would be the Madagascar periwinkle. This is one of those plants that you just can't seem to escape from – it's everywhere on the island, from growing as an unprompted weed at the side of the road to huge flower beds of the things.

Your biggest problem will be getting these plants to stop growing. Equally content in sandy soil or potted, they will put up with just about anything. All I can assume is that conditions in Madagascar must be similar to Phuket. These plants love the sun and if potted the only demand they make is for plenty of water. In the ground, they're happy to dig deep and find it themselves.

Although I hate to admit it, the ugly duckling of the Phuket plant world, the *euphorbia milii*, or crown of thorns, is another pot lover that does well here. Few Thai gardeners in Phuket don't have one or two of these dotted around the outside their houses.

These plants may look like monsters on dope, but at least they don't have the audacity to demand anything from you. If you want a pot plant that is pretty much self-sufficient, then these things will do the job.

Another slight oddity, although nowhere near as unsightly, is a potted plant that has a use other than just sitting there looking green – aloe vera. Aloes are easy-going, succulent plants that need very little maintenance. There are only a few basic rules

that need to be followed.

When the rainy season hits, don't water them. An aloe can go for months without water, but they rot easily when they get wet. If you do give them a bit of water in the hot season, make sure that the water goes onto the soil rather than the leaves.

Aloe vera can also be a useful treatment for a range of ailments from inflammation and arthritis, to sunburn and bites. Just cut off a mature leaf and you'll find the inside full of a gel that works wonders. It doesn't help reduce beer guts, unfortunately.

Just enough space for one more: a plant that many people see as a weed, but one that I'm rather partial to – lantana. It's made of clusters of tiny, brightlycolored flowers. They even appear in three colors – yellow, orange and red – in a single cluster. They're resilient plants that thrive in Phuket and bloom pro-


So Frank, thank you for the idea. Not the quickest of replies to an email, but at least I got there in the end.

There's no escaping salt in Phuket. Being an island surrounded by the sea has a lot to do with that, but at least there are plenty of options for pots in gardens that require very little from their owners. Time for a margarita, perhaps – plenty of salt on the glass, of course.
