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Democrats cruise to victory in Phuket

PHUKET: On a day when over 74% of registered voters in the province made it to the polls, official results from the general election held on December 23 saw Democrat Party candidates Rewat Areerob and Tossaporn Thepabutr winning both of Phuket's two constituency MP seats by huge margins, despite a smear campaign.

K. Rewat told the *Gazette*, "I'm happy with the result because I have a lot of votes from people, which means they believe in me. I will do my best for them. Now, I can't say a lot because I'm not yet in the new government, which must be confirmed with the national election office first."

Two-time constituency MP Chalermlak Kebsup will likely return to parliament as a party list MP, as unconfirmed results in party-list voting indicate, she will be one of eight party list MPs from the Democrat party to represent the southern region under the new proportional representation [party list] system.

In district voting in Phuket, official results confirmed by the Phuket Election Committee showed K. Rewat as the top vote-getter with 93,004, followed by running-mate K. Tossaporn with 87,905 votes.

Somchart Somnam from the Chart Thai party came in a distant third with 17,252 votes.

Despite a vigorous campaign and support from the island's Thai-language daily newspaper *Siangtai*, Palang Prachachon ("People Power") candidates Dr Sriyada Shinawatra and Wisut Santikul were

only able to garner 15,220 and 14,683 votes, respectively, to come in fourth and fifth.

In constituency voting 159,241 (74.3%) of Phuket's 214,329 eligible voters exercised their right, although nearly 10% opted to tick the "No Vote" option. There were also 4,066 (2.6%) spoiled ballots.

In Phuket party-list voting, the Democrats also won in a landslide with 122,038 votes. They were followed by People Power (14,376) and Puea Pandin (2,870).

Turnout for the party-list voting was identical to that in the constituency voting at 74.3%, but there were fewer No Votes cast (6,035 cards or 3.8%) and more spoiled ballots (6,779 cards or 4.3%).

There was a strong voter

turnout in advance polling, with 25,956 voters from around the country making their way to Phuket Community Hall on December 15 and 16 to cast absentee ballots in their home constituencies.

Phuket Election Commission (PEC) Director Supap Akkam told the *Gazette* that the turnout exceeded 85% of the 30,394 out-of-town voters who had registered to cast absentee ballots in Phuket.

Advance voting took place at three polling stations, one in each district: the Kathu Army Petrol Depot in Kathu, the Thalang Pranangsang School in Thalang and Phuket Municipality Meeting Hall

A total of 6,546 voters, or 3% of all eligible voters, took the opportunity to cast ballots in advance. Most were in Muang District (4,717 voters), followed by Thalang (1,068) and Kathu (761).

There were no reports of spoiled ballots or illegal campaigning near polling stations while the voting was underway, said K. Supap.

Nationwide, an unprecedented turnout of 2.9 million absentee and advance votes were cast.

The turnout of absentee voters exceeded 87.5%, amounting to 1.83 million ballots. Some 1.12 million voters cast advance ballots, EC member Prapun Naigowit said.

On the eve of the election, K. Tossaporn and K. Rewat handed a petition to the Phuket Election Commission (PEC) complaining that leaflets attacking them had been distributed around the island.

The pair handed the complaint and a copy of one of the leaflets to PEC Director Supap after a visit to Phuket City Police station, where they filed a criminal complaint earlier that morning.

K. Supap accepted the complaint, noting that the pair would have to return later to complete more paperwork before the complaint could be forwarded to the Election Commission (EC) in Bangkok, which is authorized to suspend or ban from political activity politicians deemed to have violated election law.

K. Supap said that, if the identities of those behind the leaflets could be revealed, the perpetrators could face punishment under election and criminal law, depending on the EC's ruling.



Cherng Talay Tesco-Lotus opens amid controversy

CHERNG TALAY: While local residents continue their fight against the opening of the "Laguna Tesco-Lotus Market Cherng Talay", the store opened just in time for last-minute Christmas shopping.

The opening of the store is mired with controversy, with local residents and shopowners, led by Samarn Krohlek and Apisit Ngarnpresertkit, having filed complaints with Thalang District Chief Chaiwat Tapee and Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit.

K. Samarn and K. Apisit in September led a protest of some 50 locals outside the offices Cherng Talay Municipality, claiming that the new store will destroy the livelihood of locals while increasing their cost of living.

The protest followed an order – signed on July 27 by Samart Sagae, then-president of Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor) - for construction of the store to stop.

On November 26, K. Samarn and K. Apisit on behalf of the protesters filed a complaint with Thalang District Chief Chaiwat, claiming that the store violated a 2004 Ministry of Interior regulation stipulating that individual supermarkets must cover a space between 300 square meters and 1,000sqm.

On November 30, District Chief Chaiwat called on Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit to rule whether the construction violates the ministerial regulation.

At that time, Gov Niran had yet to issue a statement and had yet to clarify whether the issue falls under the jurisdiction of Cherng Talay Municipality or Cherng Talay OrBorTor.

Since the meeting with Governor Niran, K. Apisit has confirmed to the Gazette that a complaint has been filed with the Administrative Court.

Ya bah bust near Heroine's Monument

THALANG: During a sting operation near the Heroines' Monument December 20. Phuket Provincial Police special investigations unit arrested a Thalang man for possession of 400 ya bah (methamphetamine) pills with intent to sell.

Lt Anukul Nukate, of Thalang Police Station, explained to the Gazette that undercover police officers had arranged to meet Surachai Maimad, 29, at 3 pm on Srisoonthorn Rd [Route 4025] to buy the pills for 60,000 baht.

After completing the sale, Surachai was

Anukul said.

Police seized the 400 ya bah pills, 243,900 baht in cash and Surachai's Nissan Sunny sedan, Lt Anukul added.

Surachai was taken to Phuket Provincial Court, where he was charged with possession of a Class I narcotic with intent to sell.

Earlier on December 20, Thalang Police acting on a tip-off arrested two suspects in Phuket City for attempted murder in Kathu earlier this year.

Lt Anukul identified the pair as Jittiporn Sritongkaew, 26, from Nakhon Sri Tham-

arrested and later confessed to the crime, Lt marat, and Pakamas Nakpeng, 33, from Prachuap Khiri Khan.

Although unfamiliar with the details of the attempted murder case, Lt Anukul said the suspects had been arrested in Thalang on October 30 for possession and use of ya bah, two pills of which were seized as evidence at the time.

The arrests in Phuket City followed the suspects being identified by an informant who knew there was a warrant for their arrest, he said.

Although they denied any wrongdoing, the pair were sent to Phuket Provincial Court to answer the warrant, he said.

Phuket welcomes first Estonia charter flight

MAI KHAO: The first charter flight from Tallinn in the Republic of Estonia to Phuket touched down at Phuket International Airport on December 19.

At 8 pm, a group of 220 Finnish and Estonian tourists arrived in Phuket aboard a Boeing 757-200 operated by Air Finland.

The tourists were welcomed by members of the local press, Phuket International Airport Deputy Director Yutthana Jitrob-aree and staff from Tourism Authority of Thailand Southern Region 4 Office, including its director, Suwalai Pinpradub.

Air Finland will operate six Tallinn-Phuket flights a week as part of an initiative to promote Phuket and the Andaman region as a holiday destination for Finnic people in the Baltic Sea region.

Airport post office relocates within terminal

MAI KHAO: The post office at Phuket International Airport has been relocated from the departures terminal to the arrivals terminal on the ground floor of the airport.

Kusol Yamyean, manager of Post Office Region 8, told the *Gazette* that the post office was closed on December 22 so that furniture and equipment could be moved.

The post office keeps the same opening hours at its new location: Monday through Sunday, 9 am to 8 pm, including public holidays.

In addition to serving local residents, the post office at the airport offers tourists heading home a last chance to send postcards or souvenirs to friends and family abroad. Last year, nearly 5 million tourists passed through the airport.

All money raised from sale of donated items will go to the Juvenile Observation and Protection Center (JOPC) in Phuket to pay for various activities and projects.


Donations of items for the sale can be taken to the JOPC on Rattanakosin 200 Pi Rd until the final day of the fair.

Two die in bypass road horror smash

PHUKET CITY: Two people have died after a high-speed collision between a motorbike and a pickup truck at the Tesco-Lotus intersection on the bypass road on December 25.

Patthama Jiewluan, a highschool student at Phuket Wittayalai School in Phuket City, died at the scene.

Jirapan Chanchaivej, the driver of the pickup, died later at hospital.

Lt Theeradet Jiraksa of Phuket City Police Station, who is leading the investigation into the accident, told the Gazette that the collision, which happened about 7 am, was between Patthama, who was riding her motorcycle from Kathu to Phuket City, and a pickup truck driven by Jirapan with his friend Jirasak Samutthikarn as passenger.

The pair were heading southbound through the junction on their way from Koh Kaew to Chalong.

"I received a call from Vachira Phuket Hospital this afternoon informing me that K.

Jirapan has died," Lt Theeradet said. "K. Jirasak is still in a coma," he added.

Lt Theeradet said that police have yet to press charges as they are still investigating the accident.

"We need to check the CCTV camera recording taken at the scene at that time before we can draw any conclusions," he said.

However, he said, "It looks as if one of the drivers failed to stop for a red light. It seems both of them might have been driving through the intersection at high speed.

"I will have to wait for Jirasak to regain consciousness before I can proceed with the investigation." he added.

KAMALA: Police are investigating the murder of a security guard found beaten and shot to death outside a room at an apartment building in Kamala on the afternoon of December 22.

Duty Officer Pol Lt Chaiyapong Thamasurin of the Kamala Police identified the victim as 26-year-old Jirasak Khundamri, who was employed as a security guard by a private firm in Cherng Talay.

He was found outside apartment A1 at an unnamed apartment block on Soi OrBorTor in Bangwan village, tambon Kamala.

The victim died from a single .38-caliber bullet to the left side of his lower ribcage, Lt Chaiyapong said.

Several of the victim's teeth were found on the ground near the body, which together with

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other injuries indicated that he had been badly beaten before he was shot.

Although the murder weapon was not found, police collected at the scene the .38caliber bullet which passed through the victim's body and exited through his back, he said.

Police have already questioned several witnesses in the case, including the owner of the apartment block, 61-year-old Kosol Korkaew, and his daughter Supak, 36.

Lt Chaiyapong declined to say if they had any suspects in the case, although he said a relationship between the victim and K. Supak was thought be a factor in the motive for the killing.

The victim's family, who are Muslims, were required by their faith to bury K. Supak as soon as possible and thus have not yet been questioned, said Lt Chaiyapong.

Phuket is a special place; a place that has a habit of making headline news. Not a year passes without some major incident taking its toll, but each year local residents and even the tourists, who visit but once and take Phuket to their hearts, stride forward for a better future.

Here *Gazette* News Editor **Stephen Fein** looks back at the stories over the past year that have made their mark in Phuket history.

ess than three years after the 2004 Asian tsunami disaster, Phuket once again found itself making international news headlines in 2007 with the crash of One-Two-Go Flight OG269 at Phuket International Airport on September 16 – by far Phuket's biggest news story in 2007.

The cause of the crash, which claimed the lives of 90 people including five crew members, is still under investigation. However, initial indications are that adverse weather conditions, including wind shear, were a major factor. A review of the flight data and eyewitness accounts indicated that Indonesian pilot Areef Mulyadi attempted to land the McDonnell-Douglas MD-82 aircraft and then unsuccessfully tried to abort at the last minute.

Most of the those on board perished after the plane's wing hit an embankment, causing the fuselage to crash into the ground and break in two. Some 40 people managed to scramble to safety after two passengers were able to force open an emergency door, but the majority died in the ensuing fire that left many burned beyond recognition.

One survivor was long-term Phuket resident Robert Borland from Australia, who was pulled from the burning wreckage by a Thai man wearing a yellow shirt. The hero was later identified as Paiboon Phaphan, an air-conditioning mechanic from Pa Khlok who was also seriously injured in the crash. Like many of the survivors, Mr Borland was treated at Bangkok Hospital Phuket, where he underwent 10 skin-graft surgeries before his release on December 23, just in time for Christmas.

On Christmas Day, he told the *Gazette* that he was satisfied with the support of One-Two-Go in covering all his medical bills and expenses for his mother Muriel to come and be with him throughout his recovery.

Mr Borland said he held no grudge toward the airline. "It could have happened to any airline," he said.

He added that he was touched to have received a Christmas card signed by the One-Two-Go chairman and all its Phuket staff, together with an optical computer mouse in the shape of a One-Two-Go aircraft – to replace one lost in the disaster.

2007 was also a year with a high rate of violent attacks on innocent people, among them some foreigners. Perhaps the most horrific of these took place at Loma Park along Patong Beach on February 13, when Sombun Kaewkhaaw, a 43-yearold vagrant and glue addict, doused 21-year-old beach masseuse Saijai Phromdaen with thinner and set her alight.

K. Saijai, who was critically injured and spent months in hospital for treatment of first degree burns to her face and body, will remain scarred for life. The attack appears to have followed an argument that ensued when the victim's two-year-old daughter "Ice" began crying, which outraged the drug-addled sensibilities of Sombun. Onlookers who witnessed

the attack pounced on Sombun and beat him to a pulp before eventually handing him over to authorities. He was later sent to a psychiatric hospital in Surat Thani.

Another high-profile case, one which remains unsolved, was the fatal stabbing of Norwegian sea *captain* Simen Sparre Knudsen, who was stabbed and left for dead at about 1 am on September 23 near the Kata Viewpoint as he was returning by motorbike to his home in Rawai from a night out in Kata.

As Knudsen was a highlyrespected expat resident with a Thai wife and teenage son, his murder sent shockwaves throughout the expat community and raised fears about the safety of visiting Phuket, especially in the victim's home country, where the murder became headline news.

Four young suspects, thought by some to have been scapegoats, were rounded up by Chalong Police. Although the first two reportedly confessed to the killing, they were later cleared and released. The case, later turned over to the Phuket City Police, remains unsolved as 2007 passes into 2008.

The Knudsen murder was one of many violent crimes that put the Chalong Police, whose ambit covers the entire south of the island, in the spotlight in the latter half of 2007. Many cases involved armed attacks on motorcyclists late at night. Another notable crime in the district was the robbery of Don's Mall in Rawai by a gang of teenagers on November 2.

Some hope for better security in the area came on November 8, when Pol Col Samarn Chainarong took over as super-

intendent from Col Chalit Kaewyarat, who was transferred to Takuapa District Police Station in Phang Nga.

2007: the year

The *Gazette* notes that the problems in Chalong are only part of an island-wide problem in law enforcement, much of it due to lack of funding. Phuket's registered population of just over 300,000, on which central government budgets are largely based, remains about half the actual population – not even counting the number of visiting tourists, expat residents and migrant laborers from neighboring countries that continue to move here.

Phuket's actual high-season population at any one time is thought to be around one million, with the Tourism Authority of Thailand predicting the number of visiting tourists to surpass the five-million mark for the first time by year's end.

Recognizing the severity of the "hidden population" problem when he took over as Phuket Governor in late 2005, Niran Kalayanamit promised to launch a registration drive to counter the problem. That initiative took a step

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forward with the launch of Thailand's first "mobile registration van" on November 8.

But while the number of Thais being added to the provincial rolls continues to increase, thanks to the registration effort, so does the number of people flocking to the island – continuing to fuel growth in almost every sector, including the real-estate market, which continues to boom.

Under these circumstances, it came as little surprise when Royal Thai Police Police Region 8 Commander Lt Gen Thanee Tavitcha told the media in September that some 10% of Phuket's current police force have requested transfers out of the province for easier postings elsewhere.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth confirmed this, saying at the time that Phuket had only about 1,050 officers, far fewer than the 1,600 officers needed to provide high-season security. Regardless, Royal Thai Police headquarters, citing inadequate funds, has continued to

deny his requests for reinforcements and the establishment of a new, independent police stations for both Tah Chat Chai and Karon.

However, it was announced in early October that the Police Region 8 command headquarters, currently in Surat Thani, will be moving to Mai Khao, where 150 rai of Treasury Department land had been put aside for the project.

Construction of the new headquarters is scheduled for completion by the end of September 2008 under a 170-million-baht budget from police headquarters in Bangkok. The new headquarters will have training facilities including a shooting range.

Meanwhile, violent crime has continued. Another violent murder, this one apparently triggered by inhalant abuse, was the murder of 31-year-old transsexual Keittirat Longnawa, found beaten and with her throat slashed on January 31 in Rassada. At least six members of a glue-sniffing gang, all but one of them minors, were arrested.

Another unsolved murder involving a transsexual was that of 19-year-old Thanawoot Wiriyananon, whose strangled and beaten body was found near the road to Tri Trang Beach in Patong last month.

Police said the victim had a criminal background including arrests related to *ya bah* (meth-amphetamine) and had been known to scout other transsexuals to work for an Internet pornographer who was arrested earlier in November in a hotel near

Soi Bangla.

On June 22, two youths were arrested for the grisly murder of two-year-old Nitchanart Phueng-rang and her nanny Dang Panthip, 40, during a botched robbery attempt at the victims' home in Rassada the same day. The pair slit the throats of the victims after they broke into the home and the child began crying.

The two teenagers, a 15year-old student at Phuket Technical College and his 17-year-old friend, were caught at Saphan Hin a few hours later and confessed. They were back on the streets by mid-September after their relatives posted bail. The father of the two-year-old, Narisorn Phueng-rang, is a teacher at Phuket Technical College.

There were numerous

other murders in Phuket in 2007, many involving jealousy, business disputes or teenage gang rivalry.

One-Two-Go flight OG269 dominated headlines in Phuket and around the globe after it crashed and burned at Phuket International Airport on September 16. Only 40 passengers survived the disaster.

Phuket, from which he was released just before Christmas after 10 skin-graft surgeries.

In one case, a Phuket City Police officer shot and killed a youth who evaded a police search on the bypass road in Koh Kaew in the early morning hours on April 18.

This led to a four-hour blockade of Thepkrasattri Rd later the same day by the victim's relatives that paralyzed traffic and caused many tourists to miss their departure flights.

The roadblock ended when Phuket City Police Chief Superintendent Col Nos Sawetalek agreed in writing to numerous demands ensuring that a fair investigation be carried and justice served to the responsible officer, Sgt Prasarn Chuayman. Although one of the demands was that the officer be suspended while the investigation was underway, by June the *Gazette* learned that the officer had been transferred to Krabi – and given a promotion.

hile this year-end re view could easily be filled with reports of murder and violent assaults, there were also several cases of theft that deserve mentioning.

The most notable robbery was the successful one-man stick-up of the Siam Commercial Bank branch on Patak Rd in Karon in the late afternoon of June 29 by a Caucasian man who managed to get away with 420,000 baht in cash.

Despite an intensive manhunt using footage obtained from Karon's new 16-camera CCTV surveillance system, the masked man escaped on a Suzuki Step motorbike and his identity and whereabouts remain unknown.

The most profitable heist of the year, however, came on January 27, when a lone gunman entered the Thongroj gold shop on Chao Fa East Rd and emerged three minutes later with gold jewelry valued at more than one million baht.

Police believe the robbery might have been carried out by the same man who pulled off a similar heist in the same area in 2006, but despite offers of reward money totaling 500,000 baht, the bandit is still atlarge.

Less successful at armed robbery was down-on-his-luck

Dutchman Jeroen De Valk, 35, who walked into the management office at the Phuket Villa California residential development on June 15 armed with a replica gun and walked out with 74,000 baht in cash – but not before CCTV cameras recorded his motorcycle license plate number.

After his arrest on June 22, he told police he had lived in Thailand for six months, bought a house on credit, and set up a clothing store with a Thai woman – but the store was not making money. The gun used in the holdup turned out to be of the type used for lighting cigarettes, not for shooting bullets.

D espite being a year marked by tragedy, needless violence and acts of desperation, hope seems

to spring eternal in Phuket, as witnessed by the ongoing property boom and unprecedented number of tourists visiting.

Although the entire year was spent under a militarily-installed government with parsimonious funding outlays, 2007 was definitely the year of the megaproject in Phuket.

Among the ideas put forward to the media this year were:

A pop-up tsunami barrier to protect Patong from future devastation; a cable car project to whisk tourists up the rapidly eroding Patong hillsides; Gulu

Lalvani's idea to build a manmade island off the coast of his Royal Phuket Marina in Koh Kaew as a marina for megayachts; and Asia's largest aquarium, the exact location of which has yet to be announced, to be developed jointly by Ripley's Believe it or Not and Minor International Plc.

Other megaprojects that remain in the conceptual realm after years include the decades-old dream of building an international convention and exhibition center somewhere on the island.

This project got a shove closer to reality when ING Funds (Thailand) showed interest in investing and Governor Niran ran with the idea, getting approval from the Ministry or Tourism and Sports and having plans drawn up.

Also approved was the use of a seaside plot of 350 rai of government land at Tah Chat Chai in Mai Khao. However, the decision to use the government land raised numerous legal and bureaucratic obstacles that will take about two years to resolve, during which time the next government could easily move to change or ax it altogether.

Two other big projects of note for Mai Khao in clude a 1.4-billion-baht sports complex, to be developed on 238 rai of government land by the Phuket Office of Sports and Recreation Development.

The other project, the 50million-baht Welcome Gateway, was finally finished three years after it was conceived by Phuket Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) President Anchalee Vanich-Thepabutra.

The rest stop and information center, which covers 25 rai about 300 meters from the Sarasin Bridge, was officially opened on September 9. It features 29 seven-metertall concrete pillars, each engraved with passages explaining Phuket's history in Thai and English, and a 21.8-meter tall granite sculpture.

Another large project nearing completion further south is the 45-meter-high Mingmongkol Buddha image, an icon-in-the-making that is already visible across much of the southern half of the island from its perch high in the Nakkerd Hills in Karon.

Nine monks have taken up residence at the site, where the cool sea breezes and spectacular views are already drawing a steady stream of visitors – many of whom make merit by making donations for further expansion of the project.

On a more practical note, work on several important infrastructure projects moved forward in 2007, with the 7.2-million-cubic-meter Bang Neaw Dum reservoir project in Srisoonthorn, Thalang, scheduled to open and provide water by September 2008, at the earliest.

It will be be the island's second reservoir. Final funding for all land acquisition for a third reservoir, a 5.7-million-cubic-meter basin at Klong Krata in Chalong, was finally made available and construction work is expected to begin soon after all the land purchases go through.

Finally, despite several stud ies and a memorandum of understanding signed by all of Phuket's local administrative bodies this year to improve the island's waste management, there is still no funding for a second incinerator at Saphan Hin.

A second incinerator is badly needed because the island already generates well over 520 tonnes of waste daily, about twice the amount the current incinerator can burn.

Storing of the excess in landfill around the incinerator has already resulted in one environmental catastrophe.

In mid-June, all of the fish in the 396 fish-farm baskets were found dead after heavy rains caused a toxic plume to flow from waste lagoons around the incinerator into nearby waterway.



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he controversial Internal Security Bill was overwhelmingly endorsed by the National Legislative Assembly on December 20 with no lawmaker opposing it during two hours of deliberation.

The assembly voted 105-8 in favor, with two abstentions.

Chotechuang Chutinatorn, one of the 200 or so protesters outside the parliament while the NLA was in session, said Thailand now had its own "Gestapo" that could curb people's rights, such as freedom of movement and the right to use electronic devices and access the Internet.

The protesters have vowed to gather 10,000 signatures to start a constitutional motion to repeal the law.

At its heart is Article 17, which grants the Internal Security Operations Command (ISOC) the authority to order curfews, restrict citizens' freedom of movement and access to and use of any electronic equipment, place anyone under house arrest, stop vehicles and close down roads or transportation routes, and order any government official to carry out or stop carrying out any duty.

ISOC, headed by the prime minister with the Army chief as his deputy, will have regional and provincial branches. Its upper echelons are filled mostly by generals and senior bureaucrats.

Wildlife corridors planned. The

government plans to expand wildlife forest areas for the animals in them by using corridors to connect 19 protected forests.

Samart Sumanochitraporn, director of the National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Office, said the intention is to boost the size of wildlife habitats by joining adjacent forests with a safe way for the wild animals to come and go between the areas by building tunnels for them, so they can go under the roads rather than across them.

Officials are now surveying animals' movements in order to place the tunnels in appropriate locations, he said.

conference on December 19 that the department also plans to raise wild animals for profit by building tree-houses, from which tourists will be able to pay to observe animals in the wild.

Clean cafes. In a bid to curtail alcohol sales and other vices at Internet cafes, authorities are encouraging entrepreneurs to join their "safe and constructive Internet cafes" project.

The project requires participating Internet cafes to strictly ban access to pornographic or illegal websites, ban smoking and the drinking of alcohol, and not allow anyone younger than 18 years old to stay after 10 pm.

Social Development and Human Security Minister Paiboon Wattanasiritham said that cafes joining the project would receive benefits that include low-cost software.

The project was launched by the Ministry of Social Development and Human Security, Culture Ministry, Interior Ministry, Education Ministry and Royal Thai Police.

The government already prohibits youths aged under 18 years old from staying in Internet cafes after 10 pm, but many have flouted this law, K. Paiboon said. Some cafes sell alcohol and

cigarettes to minors, he added.

Stoned cars. Following a report that a car waiting at an intersection in the capital had stones thrown at it on December 19, Bankok Metropolitan Police Chief Pol Lt Gen Assawin Kwanmuang instructed 88 police stations across the city to be vigilant in the search for stone throwers and said such criminals should be dealt with strictly.

Several rock-throwing incidents have been reported recently in central Thailand, some of which have resulted in deaths.

A truck driver is under the care of HM The Queen after he was blinded in a stone-throwing attack in Ayudhaya in October while driving his six-wheeled truck.

Earlier this month, a cafe singer was killed by a 1.5-kilo-

gram rock thrown at her by two young men on a motorbike after an abusive exchange in Kamphaeng Phet.

In October 2004, Thai comedian "Jo Mokjok" was killed in a stone attack on the Asia Highway in Ayudhaya's Bang Pa-in district by a group of youngsters during an attempted robbery.

Two visas in one. Thailand and Cambodia will sign a single visa agreement that will enable visitors to use only one visa for both countries, the Foreign Ministry has announced.

Foreign Minister Nitya Pibulsonggram was expected to sign the agreement with his Cambodian counterpart Hor Namhong during an official visit to Phnom Penh recently.

The pact is a pilot project under the Ayeyawady-Chao Phya-Mekong Economic Cooperation Strategy (ACMECS).

Set up since 2003, ACMECS is a joint development scheme that includes Cambodia, Laos, Thailand and Vietnam.

Under the slogan of "four countries, one destination", the Single Visa pact is aimed at facilitating tourism in the region.

Foreign ministers of the four countries in August 2005 agreed to allow Thailand and Cambodia to implement the scheme first, the remaining members joining later if the scheme proves successful.

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Attack of the omnipresent shophouses

s Ao Nang becomes more Westernized, with fast-food restau rants and the like, the "Thai-ness" of the area is slowly disappearing, especially in terms of the architecture.

Thai-style wooden structures are being replaced by omnipresent three- and four-story shophouses.

One example highlighting this change was the recent sale of the Krabi Seaview Resort.

This resort, one of the first in Ao Nang, boasted Thai-style bungalows, the Roof Restaurant (named after its traditional Thaistyle roof) and a small lagoon.

This has all been torn down to be replaced with... guess what? Four-story shophouses.

This will certainly change the environment of the beach area as the resort is just a few hundred meters from the beachfront.

From an economic point of view, this high-density style of construction is one of the few alternatives available to recoup the large investment made with land prices at record

highs. But there are more projects like this underway, and the oft-cited aims of the Tourism Authority of Thailand to keep Krabi a green, natural destination are probably out the window.

Give it a handful of years at this rate and you won't know if you are in Ao Nang or Miami Beach.

of tailor shops evoked a large response in the expat community.

Among them, the local Italian population serving genuine Italian fare have always had the opinion that the cheap pizza restaurants run by non-Italians reflect poorly on their efforts to provide an authentic Italian dining experience.

Nearly all expats – and Thais too – said that the large number of tailor shops added little value to the attractiveness of the area as a quality tourist destination.

However, free market forces are at work and those who can pay their rents have the right to open their businesses and operate freely.

As long as no laws are broken, one can conduct his business as he sees fit. As it has been said many times, it is impossible to legislate against bad taste.

Give and take. The anniversary of the tsunami is upon us and it's a time of reflection.

Sadly, however, I urge people to be alert to groups soliciting donations on behalf of tsunami victims.

If you are approached by people asking for money, ask them for identification, their Thai foundation registration number, foundation address and phone number.

Foreign-based foundations are not registered in Thailand and anyone can print letterhead stating they are helping poor orphans on some island.

Verifying that the money has gone to the espoused cause is almost impossible.

It is a shame that people take advantage of such a situation, as there are still far too many children who have lost their families and genuinely need some form of help.

If you want to make a donation, it is best to give to a registered Thai foundation that is required to provide audited financial statements upon request.



Fifty Burmese feared lost at sea

t least 22 Burmese workers were killed when a boat taking them from Kawthaung on the southern-most tip of Myanmar to Ranong capsized December 20.

The remainder of the 50 passengers on the boat are still unaccounted for.

On the morning of December 22, a fisherman reported to 2nd Lt Suwit Jiateuapheua of Bak Nam Police Station in Ranong's Muang district that he had seen bodies floating in the water to the west of Koh Chang.

A Ranong Marine Police patrol boat was sent to investigate and found the bodies of 11 men, seven women and four boys floating in the water.

All the victims were dressed in warm clothing for the journey and had Burmese passports and identification cards.

From their investigations, police discovered that the boat had left Kawthaung in the evening of December 20 carrying 50 passengers.

The boat was overloaded and is thought to have capsized after being hit by a large wave.

A source in the security sources said that Burmese police are hunting for a person named Po Saw, 38, who had brought the workers to a hotel in Kawthaung before taking them to the boat's captain, Kla Mao Mao, 40, who was to deliver them to another agent in Ranong Province.

The fate of Kla Mao Mao is still unknown.

Old junk. Fisherman in Phang Nga have discovered a sunken junk containing five cannons estimated to be hundreds of years old about three miles off shore from Ban Nam Khem in Takuapa district.

Nui Rawee, 52, was fishing for shrimp with seven relatives when he noticed the wreck of a boat at a depth of about six meters.


K. Nui and his relatives dived to examine the wreck and found long strips of metal on board.

The divers hammered at the metal to release them from the wreck and found that they were in fact cannons. The men sal-vaged the guns and found two 1.3-meter-long, six-inch-diameter cannons and three one-meter-long, four-inch-diameter gun. K. Nui took the cannons back to his house.

Word of the find soon spread and crowds gathered to see the guns. Local officials were notified and on December 20 Phang Nga Governor Wichai Phraisangop visited the house.

Gov Wichai said that he could not be certain which era the cannons were from, but estimated that they were hundreds of years old.

Cultural authorities will examine the weapons to determine their age and officials have been

sent to the site of the wreck to prevent it being damaged by people hunting for antiques before it can be salvaged.

School feud stabbing. A 19year-old man was found stabbed to death outside a karaoke bar in Nakhon Sri Thammarat's Phibun district December 21.

Somphon Klaeow had been stabbed multiple times in the head and chest. Friends of the victim told police that the killer was likely to be Jarakrit Lamai, also 19, who had been a known enemy of K. Somphon since they were in school together.

Somphon's friends told police that the previous evening, Somphon and about four friends had gone to an unnamed karaoke bar in Tambon Khao Phra. Jarakrit was also drinking in the bar with a group of his friends.

After some time had passed, Somphon's friends alleged, Jarakrit called Somphon over and said that the two should go outside to discuss their dispute. A short time later, Jarakrit allegedly returned to his bar saying that he had killed Somphon and asked for his friends to dispose of the body. He then fled the scene.

Jarakrit's friends allegedly searched for the body, but could not find it so went home, police said.

Second Thai-Malaysia Bridge

opens. Thai Prime Minister Surayud Chulanont and his Malaysian counterpart Abdullah Badawi on December 21 jointly opened the second Thai-Malaysia bridge linking Narathiwat with Narathiwat's Buketa and Malaysian Kelantan's Bukit Bunga.

The US\$2 million cost bridge connecting Narathiwat's Buketa and Malaysian Kelantan's Bukit Bunga is a part of joint economic cooperation scheme Indonesia-Malaysia-Thailand Growth Triangle (IMTGT) to boost economic growth in Thailand south and Malaysia's northern state.

Cambodians caught. Police in Songkhla arrested 230 illegal im-

migrants from Cambodia on December 17 as they were preparing to return to their motherland.

The arrest was made in Muang district 6 pm December 17, when the Cambodians were waiting for buses to take them home.

Police said the Cambodians had just been laid off by operators of fishing boats, transport boats and tour boats during the high sea season so they were going home. They were handed over to the Sadao Immigration Office pending deportation.

Ditch the clichés: it's D Gallery

Gallery doesn't deal in clichés. They aren't hawking souvenir sunset scenes or acrylic Scarfaces. This new contemporary art gallery at Royal Phuket Marina offers unique works from high-profile Vietnamese and Thai artists, placing sophisticated taste over the commonplace.

The gallery juxtaposes polished concrete floors and exposed ceiling ducts with fine art on titanium white walls, creating a post-modern feel. The work ranges from abstract forms in watercolors on handmade paper to highly detailed oil portraits.

After working at a gallery in Bangkok for more than five years, Managing Director Pornthip "Dashy" Raksapiksu decided to open D Gallery. While visiting Phuket over the past three years, she noticed a lack of what she calls "proper art galleries".

"By 'proper art gallery', I mean we don't mix art with other things, such as furniture and antiques. A proper art gallery supports the artists by holding exhibitions, doing advertising and pro-

moting them," K. Dashy said.

walls. 'The people here, locals and foreigners, are sophisticated and there are more million-dollar houses in Phuket than in Bangkok. So, I think people here need art for their nice homes, not just beautiful things but something more collectible," K. Dashy added.

The gallery exhibits work by six Thai artists and eight Vietnamese artists, many of whom are well established in Asia and internationally.

The majority are young, upand-coming artists in their thirties. They are second-generation artists who have the potential to become masters in the future. Often, the artists produce a limited amount of work per year, insuring their work is quality and enhancing the market value. The Vietnamese artists are different from Thai artists because they have a higher profile and are internationally known, explained K.

in the Singapore Art Museum and the National Art Gallery of Malaysia.

Although equally gifted, the featured Thai artists often lack the same recognition from Asian and global art communities. This leaves K. Dashy with a sense of responsibility to be more than an art vendor – she wants to raise her Thai artists into the art world's spotlight using D Gallery and its stylish website.

"Many people go to Vietnam or China looking to buy a piece of art. In Thailand, people want to go to the beach," she said.

She believes that the small number of Thai art collectors also stunts the growth of Thailand's art scene. "In Thailand, there are not many Thai people who like to buy art and support artists, that's why the art scene is going very slow.

"Thais tend to want or believe in objects. For instance, the Jatukhams they hang around their necks. They will pay a million baht for that because they believe in that object," K. Dashy said.

Another challenge is the subject matter of contemporary artwork, which focuses on the communication of a idea or emotion rather than beauty. Pointing to a portrait of a face, painted

eerie hues of blue, K. Dashy said, "Like that portrait, some people don't want to put that in their home because it's not about beauty and it's not an easy subject.


"But I think people can trust what I'm trying to present and are sophisticated enough to understand what I'm doing. I'm not trying to make a hot sale, I'm doing it because it's my passion," she added.

The gallery's grand opening is slated for late January. Throughout the coming year, the gallery will hold exhibitions for individual artists, who will be flown to Phuket from around Thailand and Vietnam to promote their works and give patrons a chance to meet the artists.

The gallery welcomes the serious and the curious.

"You don't have to want to buy art to walk in the gallery. I just want people to come in, sit down, read a book or ask some questions. I want people to know more about these types of artists," K. Dashy said.



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
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ew to Phuket is Chef Sanya Thotong, originally from Buri Ram, to head the kitchen at Thai Brasserie at Jungceylon, which opened last month.

The latest Blue Elephant eatery to open, Thai Brasserie offers a variety of Thai and Asian dishes, but is better known for its international fusion and vegetarian selections.

Chef Sanya was chosen to open the venue because of his natural flair and creativity. But what sets Chef Sanya apart from most chefs on Phuket is that he has never studied culinary arts at a college. All his education and training has been gleaned from working in kitchens – the rest is just natural flair.

He started work as a chef relatively late, compared with his contemporaries. Chef Sanya began cooking when he was 28 at a small restaurant in Bangkok.

However, after some supportive comments from friends, he soon joined Bussarakam restaurant on Silom Rd, Bangkok, where his passion for cooking began to take hold.

He then moved to Sol Twin restaurant on Rama VI Rd, where he worked as a chef for two years, preparing banquets. After a recommendation from a friend. he joined Blue Elephant on Sathorn Rd in Bangkok in 2002. He then joined Orangery Restaurant, another Blue Elephant affiliate, at Siam Paragon, before moving on to the Blue Elephant's Lemon Cherry noodle cafe at Central World.

However, it was the Blue Elephant at Sathorn where he created some of his first fusion dishes, introducing flavors from dishes. You can even see that

his native Isarn to the menu through his crechoations muang (sweet made from flour

and cassava), *pla krung* (spicy minced shrimp dish similar to larb) and kangkao puak (deep-fried starter of pork and mushroom sealed in mashed taro).

"When I was young, I didn't like cooking much, but I was looking for a job in Bangkok when I was 25. I started working at a small restaurant. Soon after, a friend told me that I was good at it and suggested that I apply for a job at Blue Elephant," Chef Sanya explains.

Noodling some fresh twists on fusion fare



"I have adapted my favorite dishes to the Blue Elephant's style. Before, authentic Thai food was most popular, but now the world has changed and Thai food is evolving to suit the changing tastes of diners," he adds.

"Here, Blue Elephant gives me the freedom to create new dishes and adapt dishes to Blue Elephant-style fusion food. A personal favorite is fried shrimp green curry. This method is used nowhere else – it's our unique style.

"We always create new with the green

dish," he says. Even the Chef's salad being served at Thai Brasserie was developed especially for the restaurant's opening in Patong in November.

Chef Sanya explains that the salad is loaded with sweet basil and the dressing's creamy texture is its main attraction. Any meats, including fish and shrimp, can be substituted for the salad instead of using chicken, salmon or pork.

Similarly, he says that the softer soba noodles gives the green curry noodles dish a different texture and more of an egg flavor.

Chef's Salad Serves 2

Ingredients

40g sliced smoked salmon 40g sliced grilled chicken 40g sliced grilled red pork 2 slices cheddar or parmesan cheese 10 pieces red oak leaves 10 pieces green oak leaves 40 Japanese golden mushrooms 4 sliced tomatoes 2 sliced red and green bell peppers

Any other vegetables to taste

For the salad dressing: 3 tablespoons sweet basil 2g peppermint leaves 1g coriander 2 tablespoons olive oil 80g vinegar 1 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons mayonnaise

Method

Using a blender, blend the sweet basil, peppermint and olive oil

until it has a smooth texture, and season with the vinegar, salt and sugar to taste. Then mix in the mayonnaise until it is a smooth, creamy dressing.

Green Curry Noodles Serves 2

Ingredients

1 piece large shrimp (about 150g) 100g shredded steamed chicken 200g soba noodles 100g concentrated coconut milk 300g plain coconut milk 50g bread crumbs

For the green curry paste: 10g green chilis 10g galangal 10g lemongrass 5g coriander 5g sweet basil

2g garlic 1 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon fish sauce 2 tablespoons sugar

Method

Create a curry paste by blending the galangal, lemon grass, coriander, garlic, sweet basil and chili until it becomes a smooth paste. Save some of the curry paste to baste the shrimp.

To prepare the soup, fry the curry paste in a pan on medium heat until the aroma of the paste emanates from the pan, then add the concentrate coconut milk, stirring it until the oil rises to the surface – then add the plain coconut milk.

Baste or soak the shrimp with the green curry paste for 10 minutes, then cover with shrimp with bread crumbs and pan fry with medium heat.

Boil the soba noodles until its strands can be broken easily with a pinch (just like spaghetti) and place in the curry soup. Sprinkle the shredded chicken on top then place the shrimp on top as a finishing touch.

They lived in Paris for 22 years and became French citizens, then in 1984 they moved to South Africa and started a new company manufacturing advertising materials. Gundeger eventually sold the company to his employees in 2001 before retiring and embarking on the couple's global trek by Land Rover.

"We have always enjoyed travel, but never really went far," said Gundeger.

The couple began their intercontinental safari in April 2002. "We started from Johannesburg and then drove to Mozambique, Malawi, Tanzania, Rwanda, Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia, Sudan, Chad, Cameroon, Niger, Nigeria

and then Chad again. We went to Burkina Faso, Togo, Ghana, Mali, Mauritania, Morocco and then took a ferry to Spain," Gundeger recalled.

Angola and the Congo were not on the itinerary because of civil strife. A few other small countries were also off the list due to concerns with possible traveling difficulties. They also wanted to make sure they saw a lot of Europe as well.

After arriving in Spain by ferry, they drove through Portugal, France, Switzerland, Lichtenstein and Austria. By that time, the couple's passion for travel was in their blood and they soon began planning their next trip and preparing the car.

"We prepared for about three months before starting our second long journey. We traveled around Europe again for about three months, then in June 2004 we went from France to Buenos Aires by container ship. We were the only passengers traveling on the boat, which took three weeks

to get to Buenos Aires," said Gundeger.

Over the next three months Gundeger, Helga and their Land Rover covered 6,000 kilometers through Argentina, Paraguay, Bolivia and Peru, up to Lima and then to the very south of Chile and back to Buenos Aires before heading back to South Africa.

"We came back through Buenos Aires and traveled up to Uruguay and Brazil. We went through Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo and we all through the Amazon on a small trail, always in the Land Rover. We went on to Manaus then to Venezuela, on to Colombia and on a boat again to Panama," said Gundeger.

"Then we traveled to all the South American countries; Panama, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, Guatemala and up to Mexico. Then we went to the US, from the west coast [San Diego] across to New York. From there we went north to Canada, crossing from the east to west coast before going to Alaska," he added. From Alaska, they traveled south to the US, stopping off in

South to the US, stopping off in San Francisco, then onto a cargo ship heading for Malaysian Port Klang before coming to Phuket. Phuket was a destination of

choice, not just because of the island is en route to Bangkok: Gundeger had heard that Phuket was an ideal destination for a medical stopover.

"I was told that the doctors in Thailand are very good and that Bangkok Hospital Phuket would be able to operate on my knee, plus Phuket was a much nicer place to recover after the operation than Bangkok," he said.

"From Bangkok, we went on to Cambodia, visiting Siem Reap and Phnom Penh. Then we went to Vietnam, but we had to leave our car at the border and take a taxi to Ho Chi Minh. Then we came back to Thailand through Cambodia and then to Laos. We saw much of southern Laos with the car before going to Myanmar and then back to Bangkok," he said.

The couple don't have plans for Australia. "It's not really so different from South Africa and it's expensive to get there and travel once you're there," the couple agreed.

"Now we are planning to leave from Port Klang so we can go on to Indonesia. We want to see Bali. Then we will have to put our car on a cargo ship from Port Klang again so that we can get to Bangladesh or India. Once there, we want to visit Nepal and Bhutan and travel across Asia back to Vienna then Paris, where we will catch up with the family again," Gundeger said.

"Once we are back in Paris we will make plans for the next trip," he added.

Asked what they enjoyed best about their travels, Gundeger replied, "I couldn't really say what I love the most about these travels. We have seen so much diversity in the countries we've

passed through. The African, American and Asian people and cultures are so vastly different to our way of life," he said.

"In Africa we experienced the wildlife and deserts. In South America the lakes and landscapes were spectacular, while in Asia we have met lovely people and enjoyed a wonderful climate.

"We also love discovering these countries' histories. Phuket is fantastic and we love Cambodia. Angkor Wat is lovely and Phnom Penh, too. It is very interesting to see Vietnam after the Indochina war that I heard so much about when I was young. The same goes for Laos, too.

"We didn't really know much about Thailand before coming here, but it is an amazing place and it's good to find out about Thailand's history," he added.

Although cross-country is not always the easiest way to travel, they feel that the experience is more worthwhile than traveling as package tourists.

"From Bangkok to Phuket took us four days and we have seen a lot of interesting things along the way which we wouldn't have seen if we just took a plane. Of course, traveling like this is not without its difficulties, but it's well worth it.

"We have discovered some lovely places between here and Bangkok. We had a lovely quiet hotel beside the beach all to ourselves and many of the people we have met have been very kind to us," Gundeger said.

"We have been very lucky not to face any really difficult situations during our travels. Whenever we have had a problem, there have always been very nice people to help us.

"We have not really had any problems with the people, cultures, food or language. In South America, we used Spanish to communicate. Africa was no problem because we could communicate in English or French. Asia isn't so easy but sign language and good will is always easily understood," Gundeger said.

"Not so many people speak English in Thailand so it's been a little more difficult but there is always someone in a group who can speak some English," he added.

Apart from a bout of malaria in Malawi, Africa, where they were sick for about three days but treated with quinine, the couple said that they experienced no other major problems in the vast continent.

"Friends and family were concerned about how we would cope with traveling in Africa, but we didn't have any negative experiences. We slept in the open with no problems.

"We didn't have any problems at the African borders either, although people warned us that immigration and border police in some places would ask us for money or treat us badly. Some were worried that we might be robbed along the way but that has never happened.

"Whenever we got to a border or a road block, we would simply get out of the car and greet officials in a friendly way. I think it depends a lot on how you treat people, although we were still vigilant and wary of what or who we may come across next," Gundeger said.

"We have seen the difference between developed and developing countries; it's so diverse, but wherever you go, there are always nice people.

"Many people stay in places such as Phuket for only one or two weeks, which isn't enough time to experience or really know anything about the way of life here.

"One thing we have learned is that people often have the wrong impression about somewhere we intend to visit and they will sometimes give us misleading advice or information. Some told us that we wouldn't find accommodation in Phuket at this time of year, but we were fine.

"Others said that Sudan would be very dangerous but we didn't experience any problems there either," Gundeger said.

"I think everyone should try traveling like this. There are so many interesting things to see. Some of the young people we have met along the way are surprised at our ages but they say that it's good to know that life is not over after 30," he added.





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

ight, that's it for yet another year. Christmas is over. Just the New Year to go and then we can relax. Oh yeah? Not if you have kids whose birthdays tend to fall at the most inconvenient time of the year –on New Year's eve, to cite a prime example.

Four years ago, I made the heroic decision to organize a kids' bash at the end of the year to coincide, sort of, with my youngest son's birthday. It was a mistake at an extremely busy time of year.

Just tell the assembled party about the first time your kids called you mummy and watch grown women (however bitchy at work) melt – or make a sneering remark about not being ready to give up their careers yet. Who gave up her career? I certainly didn't. I was able to juggle both.

People's reactions can be a tad cynical, but becoming a mother soon eliminates that hardnosed reaction when it comes to all things "kid". I never used to have a problem making some fairly tough decisions at work. Once I was home, though, I would become mush when I had to decide whether to put on Fireman Sam or Bob the Builder.


Danny Donut, as it turned out, was one of the best decisions I made that year. And all for the equivalent of 4,000 baht and a few bottles of beer.

What it did say made me insanely proud, and brought a distinct lump to my throat as I stood in the hallway and waited for our little guests to arrive. It said two words: "Stephanos' Mum".

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Inhaling the vapors and smell of petrol, I looked down. Sure enough, I was paddling in a two-cycle petrol slick – in one of the planet's most beautiful places. Oblivious of their environmental impact, speedboat captains pass within meters of the rocks to let passengers pound mother nature's jewels. They drop this pollution every day, which usually dissipates with the tides.

I paddled away, muttering that chimpanzees are smarter than speedboat operators - at least chimps don't destroy their homes. But what about the sponges, oysters, green shore crabs and monitor lizards that could not escape the slick?

Clearly an environmental crime, a fair penalty for operators and their agents would be to spray their homes with two-cycle mix, close all the windows, turn off the aircon and lock them in for the night.

After 18 years of environmental protection work in Phuket, a Koh Penak oil slick was another lifetime eco-shock. Fortunately, I'm learning how to handle de-

spair. The big question is, "Can we act immediately to avoid the extinction of our species, and the thousands of others we will take with us?" I'm hopeful, but while humans are intelligent enough to destroy the planet, we do not seem smart enough to save it.

I first felt despair in 1953. The Los Angeles Basin was so smoggy I could

see the haze between houses across the street. Breathing deep meant choking.

erly Native American shared an afternoon with me explaining how the Earth became hot in just his

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lifetime. He took global warming back to 1900. I listened and took it back to the industrial revolution.

I felt so strongly that in 1961 I decided not to have kids. I didn't want to add to the population problem, put my children through an obviously ugly future or have grandchildren angry at me for

great sacrifice that most people didn't make.

In the past 46 years, the

world's population more than doubled - from 3 billion to 6.5 billion.

Until last month, my most shattering eco-event was paddling Fiji's Vanua Balavu – a reef so remote it literally has no human contact except with kayaks. I remember giant lobsters didn't move from their coral heads when I snorkeled by. But on the millennium, my kayak floated over a dead, algae-covered reef. The reef was fried for kilometers, the damage irreversible.

Twenty years earlier, I picked up the paddle as a symbol of non-motorized conservation. In Fiji, my kayak was drifting over a dead planet. I cried, knowing that humans won't start defending our planet until it's too late.

Back in Phang Nga, I eventually re-joined our trip - to my second headache. Our guests were buzzing about other companies using the stalactites as bongo drums, laughing and singing as they battered them. A

teary-eyed guest claimed her guide said, "100,000 years to build that stalactite – and one minute to destroy it.' Thank you for educating your staff."

A decade ago, I asked a speedboat operator why he was in my industry. "We just go to the hongs to have a good time." Right, let's take Patong into mother nature's most sacred sites – and bust them up for good fun.

These folks promote themselves as two-activities-in-one companies. Cutting costs to the bone, increasing retail prices to suggest quality and then sacrificing quality to offer outrageous commissions. Travel agents suck it up - making windfall products without leaving their aircon offices. Maybe that's good business for city bus tours, but nature always suffers when mainstream travel kidnaps eco-tourism.

Sea kayaking symbolizes non-motorized alternatives and its popularity has exploded worldwide in the past two decades. It's

much more than motor versus paddle; sea kayaking is about environmental awareness.

I'm frustrated that we use motorboats to access Phang Nga's scattered islands - and even more frustrated by speedboat operators who exploit the environmentally enlightened sea-kayaking industry. With irresponsible behavior at the micro level, our species doesn't have a chance on the macro level.

We are already in the fastest mass extinction since dinosaurs – but many basic organisms will survive.

Following the Nobel Peace Prize announcements, CNN's Jonathan Mann asked Al Gore if he still felt "unsuccessful". Big Al said that creating awareness is great, but that one cannot claim "success" when we still increase greenhouse-gas emissions faster than we cut them back.

Gore's co-winner, Dr Rajendra Pachauri, chairman of the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, drove the point home. "We won't stop global warming until we really want to."

How many energy-efficient light bulbs does Phuket need to offset one two-cycle speedboat tour? Do we even care?

There are a few bright spots. Last week at Koh Hong, I learned that Phuket Adventures lead guide "Woody" also hates monkey feeding and advises his guests not to participate.

Recently, I also found fourcycle speedboats at Phuket Tropical Marine. They discourage snorkelers from feeding monkeys and breaking coral with their fins. 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Land Cruiser rolls on into 2008

B ig, brutish and bold, but certainly not beautiful, the Land Cruiser has seemingly been around for decades, but for 2008, it will receive a number of refinements that will see it through to at least the end of this decade and probably well into the next.

Built on a revised platform with a body-on-frame design, the length of the new model has increased while the wheelbase remains the same.

The biggest difference with the new Land Cruiser is the availability of a 5.7-liter V8 from Toyota's US Tundra pickup, replacing the old 4.7 version. The Tundra engine produces a hefty 381bhp (280kW) and 545Nm of torque, although in some markets the "old" 4.7 is still available.

As well as the Tundra V8, there is a rather more environmentally-responsible 4.5-liter V8 diesel that develops peak torque of 650Nm between 1,600 and 2,800rpm and a maximum power output of 286bhp.

Fuel consumption for the diesel is claimed to be 10.2 liters per kilometer – a 4% improvement versus the outgoing 4.2, inline diesel. Five- or six-speed automatic transmissions are available, depending on the engine.

Advanced technology allows the Land Cruiser to go virtually anywhere, with the world's first "crawl-control" system, which automatically controls the engine and the brakes to maintain a low speed, avoiding spinning or locking.

The driver needs only to steer the vehicle when driving in extreme off-road conditions.



Renowned for being a rugged workhorse, the Land Cruiser is set to receive a face-lift for 2008 to keep it ahead in the 4x4 market.

There is also hill-descent control, pioneered by Land Rover on its Freelander.

The Land Cruiser features four-wheel active height control and adaptive variable suspension, which links all four wheels and provides a new spring-rate control system.

Additionally, front and rear stabilizer bars are operated by hydraulic control cylinders.

Safety features include the newly developed multi-terrain ABS, vehicle-stability control and 14 airbags. Of these airbags, the driver and front passenger get active front bags, knee bags and thorax side airbags, while in the second row, the outer passengers are protected by side bags and all three rows of seats have roll-sensing side curtain bags.

Although equipment in different markets may vary, standard features include automatic climate control with an independent rear system, leather upholstery, a full-length moon roof, garage-door opener, cruise control, rear wiper, defogger and an out-of-this-world 605-watt, 14speaker audio system with a sixdisc auto-changer.

The latest Land Cruiser is an eighth-generation model from Toyota and, says the Japanese

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giant, "Retains all the world-beating, off-road capability of its predecessors, but adds more refinement, comfort and superior driving quality".

Land Cruiser chief engineer Sadayoshi Koyari summed it up,

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
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"Therefore, rather than opting for revolutionary change, we decided to carry on the sense of trust in the new Land Cruiser as the basic concept.

"With the latest generation, we had to recognize the loyalty of Land Cruiser customers by providing a vehicle that will not betray that trust."

The Land Cruiser is far from being a luxury four-by-four, but if off-roading is your intention, there are few peers.

The original Land Rover is probably the master of rough terrain, but the Toyota offers a degree of comfort lacking in the British model.

Disadvantages include its sheer bulk – parking at Tesco-Lotus might present a problem. Despite this, it is a vehicle that has been proved time and time again.

Sales begin in Europe initially, with the rest of the world following early next year.

This Land Cruiser will undoubtedly be as successful as its forebears.

Driving in the wrong direction

At the risk of sounding like a holiday-season Scrooge, the Gazette notes that the distribution of free teddy bears - even ones blessed by a monk believed to be 114 years old – is unlikely have any real impact on the holiday-season road toll in Phuket.

If anything, the Nong Prodpai campaign [see News] only highlights the continuing lack of any effective strategy on the the part of Phuket's traffic police to deal seriously with dangerous drivers.

Over the years, Phuket has been chosen as a site for numerous pilot projects, ranging from the installment of CCTV surveillance technology in public places to high-tech disaster warning systems. Yet the single greatest threat to the safety of island residents and tourists comes not from terrorists or tsunamis, but those among us who are unwilling or unable to drive responsibly.

Apart from the initiative a few years ago encouraging motorcyclists to turn on their headlights during daytime, there have been no serious efforts in Phuket to deal with this lethal issue.

For numerous reasons, Phuket is a particularly dangerous place to drive. One factor is the large and ever-increasing number of outof-towners who take to the roads in rented vehicles. Many of these people are foreigners with no driving experience in Thailand who are unwilling to fall prey to the avarice of the transport syndicates.

Able to rent vehicles by presenting almost any form of identification along with their passports, they take to the unfamiliar roads on the island with almost no knowledge of Thai traffic laws or customs - many quickly concluding from what takes place on our roads that there are none.

Second is Phuket's poor road network, which has failed to keep pace with the ever-rising number of vehicles competing for space on them.

Third is a lack of common sense and civility among many Phuket drivers that manifests itself in a callous disregard for the rights of others they share the roads with.

Throw in a little holiday boozing and the recipe for disaster is complete.

What is needed to improve safety on Phuket's roads is less carrot and more stick. Teddy bears simply will not do the trick, nor will the establishment of easy-to-avoid traffic checkpoints in the same old places, year after year.

Phuket needs is a year-round surge in arresting motorists who commit moving violations, such as running red lights. CCTV technology is now in place at many dangerous intersections around the island, but there are no indications it is being applied to arrest and fine dangerous drivers. - The Editor

We need boat bidding at the parks

It is obvious to all that dive sites in the Similan and Surin national parks are over-crowded. Richelieu Rock is now a place where the fish come to look at the divers, as the local dive guides joke.

No doubt there must be some urgent restriction of divers and boats on those dive sites to avoid further environmental destruction or a complete loss in the future.

The most practical way to implement restrictions of divers and an equally important restriction of dive boats would be a seasonal permit auction.

At the beginning of each season, the authorities could auction off 20 or 30 boat permits to the highest bidders, who would then be allowed to visit Similan or Surin national park dive sites for one season.

This would not only create substantial revenue, but effectively limit both boats and divers and so better preserve the environment.

To wait any longer is simply not an option.

Until last year, you could get a tuk-tuk from Patong to Phuket City for about 300 baht, but now some tuk-tuk drivers have attempted to charge 1,000 baht for the trip.

It appears that no government officials are attempting to stop this. Maybe the Traffic Police should stop tuk-tuks with farang in them and ask what the driver is charging them.

If it is a price gouge, then the Traffic Police office should issue a large fine for doing so – this goes for motorbike taxis as well.

Violence among teenagers: who are the true offenders?

am happy to be back work ing in my hometown, but it is sad to return to see an alarming increase in crimes committed by juveniles, with 607 cases reported from January to the beginning of December this year. This is also an unusually high figure considering that Phuket has just three districts.

In December alone, 49 youths between 13 and 17 years old were arrested in Phuket, four of them females.

The most common crimes that juveniles here are arrested for are theft, robbery and drug abuse, especially sniffing glue and other inhalants. About half of these are repeat offenders.

The statistics show that bad behavior among juveniles can often be attributed to them living in a dysfunctional home environment. 70% of the juveniles arrested for crimes come from broken homes where parents have separated or are having adulterous relationships.

My own policy in dealing with juvenile crime is looking at ways of changing their behavior so they are not getting into trouble in the first place, which will make Phuket a safer place, especially for the tourists who come here and on whom so many people in Phuket rely on for an income.

If we don't make an effort to deal with these issues at their root causes then the crimes will continue and Phuket will become an undesirable holiday destination and we will all lose out.

To achieve this, it is important that parents and adult family members take responsibility for younger family members and pay

Here she explains why, and why she believes the teenagers themselves are victims of today's society.



attention to the kind of care they are giving to children.

Family finances are also a contributing factor. Many of the juveniles arrested for crimes have relatively poor parents who have to work very hard to make ends meet, but they are subsequently not able to spend much time teaching and guiding their children

These children often enter a life of crime when they feel unloved or that family and society has turned its back on them. They feel worthless and criminal acts can often be a way for them to get some kind of recognition or attention from their peers.

Many of them have never known the warmth of a loving family as some may have been orphaned and homeless from an early age, having to take care of ous crimes or are repeat offend-

themselves. Kids in this situation will have had to fight for their own survival for most of their lives, making them fiercely independent, while stealing is the only way they know how to survive or get by when they have no support from anyone else.

In the Juvenile Observation and Protection unit, we try to teach the children to change their outlooks on life and their way of thinking. We give them creative and constructive outlets with opportunities to do something worthwhile and constructive, such as receiving more schooling or learning new job skills, such as learning to fix motorcycles, washing cars or batik-painting; skills that they can apply once they leave the shelter.

Juveniles who commit seri-

ers are treated by the law in the same way as adult offenders, so they will often end up in adult prisons. We try to prevent this by encouraging their parents to become more involved in their children's lives.

If we can see that the parents are willing to take on a more active parenting role with their wayward children, that the youth in question demonstrates remorse for his or her crime, and that they are prepared to make the effort to become a better person, then we can request the judge consider this in his sentencing.

In these cases, the judge may decide that the juvenile serves at least half of his or her sentence at the Surat Thani rehabilitation center for juveniles.

I agree with the provincial policy that juveniles who commit

serious crimes against foreigners should not be granted bail as this could badly affect the number of tourists that come to Phuket. If they are not punished properly then it sets a bad example to other potential criminals.

However, regardless of whether a crime is committed against a local or a tourist, the punishment or rehabilitation for the juvenile offender should be equal.

Although there are provisions in the law for treating juveniles less severely than adult criminals, young criminals can take advantage of the leniency they know they will receive from the criminal justice system. So it is important that we teach them responsibility for their actions in the first place.

Children need time to develop into adults. At 12 to 14 years old, children are testing the boundaries of society and they are very headstrong, still needing a lot of life experience to know the difference between right and wrong and discover how to fit into society.

Today, society is very different from before. Todays youth are engaing in sexual activity at a younger age, which means more babies are born to young, unmarried parents.

Those parents may not have planned how they will cope with having children or how they will have the time and resources to educate them properly.

Many of the youths branded criminals by society are actually victims of a society that is unprepared to help them become responsible adults.

Permits-to-stay for Thais

I am a Thai. I married a foreigner and left Thailand 20 years ago. Now I have returned to my hometown because my mother is ill. I have to stay here and take good care of her. I entered the country with my foreign passport with a tourist visa valid for 90 days

I was told by staff at the Thai Embassy that issued my tourist visa that because I am still a Thai citizen and I still have my Thai ID card and passport, that I did not need to go to Immigration and extend my visa. I was told that I am still Thai and I have a right to stay in my hometown.

But, when I went to the Immigration office in Phuket City, I was treated so bad and no-one there could give me a clear explanation. I need to know whether I am allowed to stay or not. I do not want to have any problems at the airport if one day I want to return to my second home abroad.

> You will be issued a oneyear permit to stay, but you must report to an Immigration office every 90 days.

> When you come to our office, please explain to the officer clearly what your situation is as it's high season and hundreds of people contact us each day.

A walk on the baroque side

ne of the great unsung classics of American literature is Nelson Algren's 1956 novel A Walk on the Wild Side, set in a New Orleans red light district during the Great Depression. I picked up Frederick Turner's novel Redemption (Harcourt, New York, 2006, 348pp) to see how it compares.

This novel of gangsters and whores take places at an earlier time, 1913, and while Algren's book is Depression-era slangy, funny and fast-paced, Turner's tone is Faulknerian, orotund and totally lacking in humor.

At his worst, he shows a tendency toward purple prose and melodrama. But it's still a good

read. Turner is a master of descriptive prose and his plot rushes to a suspenseful climax.

The story opens with Francis "Fast-Mail" Muldoon smoking a cigar on the porch of his cottage to the sounds of his widowed sister Maur-

een making dinner for her kids in the cottage next door. Then he straps on a shoulder-holster, boards a tram car and alights at the cemetery that borders the Storyville district of brothels and

This is one of those weird little artifacts we've inherited from Middle English. "Be-" as a prefix having to do with removing was apparently common until about 500 years ago. But the version of "be-" that has to do with being around or all over something — as in "bedevil" and "bespeckle" — eventually won out.

The only other current word I know of that contains the same kind of "be-" as "behead" is "bereave", "reave" being an old word for "rob, deprive of" and "bereave" meaning "be deprived of".

Why Marie Antoinette's fate wasn't a 'deheading'

elcome to Word Court, where **Barbara Wallraff** unravels some of the mystery that shrouds the English language, debunking confusing usage and clearing away the clutter that stops clear understanding – all by answering reader's questions.

When there is a decimal point that's going to be represented by "and", it's awkward and potentially confusing to throw in another "and". For instance, "Five hundred and five and 32/



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100 dollars." But without a decimal point, the use of "and" becomes a matter of personal preference. It's optional, but not wrong

Hence my eternal indecision when I write checks. At least with "2007" there's a third, hardto-find-fault-with way: Pronounce it "twenty-oh-seven" and the problem is solved.

I would be forever grateful if you would discuss which is correct: "me" or "I (am)" in "a grown woman like me," a phrase that you used in a recent column.

Barbara replies:

I doubt you can ever go wrong using "me" after "like." The same, by the way, applies to the other objective pronouns "him," "her," "us" and "them". That's because in traditional usage, "like" is a preposition.

Other examples of prepositions are "for" in "There's a name for us" and "from" in "Take it from me."

You'd never think of saying "There's a name for we" or "Take it from I," I'm sure. Therefore, say "Write like me" or "a grown woman like me."

Admittedly, people say things like "Write like I do," but it makes traditionalists wince for the reason just stated. If you want to add a verb, like "do" (or "am"), you're supposed to precede it with something besides "like"

Use "as" or "such as" if it pleases you to sound starchily correct: "Write as I do," "a grown woman such as I am." A correct,

early everyone on Phuket has come across the name "Junk Ceylon" in one form or another. Apart from being the name of a shopping mall in Patong, the term is also an ancient reference to Phuket that first appeared in European maps, although the origins of the name are shrouded in mystery behind frequent mispronunciations. Long before the term became synonymous with boutique stores and coffee shops, Junk Ceylon might have referred to sea grass and

trade ships. The earliest known mention of the island in European chronicles dates back to Claudius Ptolemy's Geographia, a collection of all the geographic data of the then-known world compiled in the 2^{nd} century.

A Greek mathematician, astronomer and geographer, Ptolemy lived in the Egyptian city of Alexandria, which at the time was the academic sanctuary of the Roman Empire.

To gather his data, Ptolemy relied upon sources from within the Roman Empire, including records that had survived from the Persian Empire, as well as travelers' accounts.

The *Geographia* contained for navigation. geographic informa-

tion about China and the Far East, including a mention of the island of Junk Ceylon, said to be located near the

Golden Khersonese, known today as the Malay Peninsula.

Junk Ceylon receives only a brief mention in Geographia. It was written that in order to reach Malaya, ships must pass by the "cape" of Junk Ceylon, which is easily noticeable as it juts out into the sea from the mainland,

Sea captains used this information to calculate their bearings in order to enter the Strait of Malacca, past the so-called cape. Instructions based on landmarks were essential at the time as maps and charts were unreliable

In Ptolemy's records, Junk Ceylon LOOKING was described as a cape. This led to the belief that the strip of By Anand Singh sea dividing the island from the mainland was previously solid land,

which may have been true a long, long time ago.

But in the 2nd century, Junk Ceylon was most likely an island. Passing ships were most likely confused by the narrow channel dividing the island from the mainland, causing sailors to mistake

The name Junk Ceylon was often used in European charts and maps to refer to Phuket. Historical records show several variations of the name: Jonsala, Jonsalaon, Gunsalun and Jonsalam.

It's difficult to pinpoint from where Phuket derived its early name. It is possible that Europeans first coined the term when trying to pronounce the Malay name used for the island. As for the original Malay name, that's equally a mystery.

Due to the a lack of references to the original Malay term, a number of interpretations of the origins or Junk Ceylon have surfaced. Historian and former Phuket Governor Sunai Ratchaphantharak wrote an extensive history about Phuket, published in 1984. K. Sunai speculated that

"Junk Ceylon" may have originated from the Malay term "Ujung Salang", which translates as "sea grass cape".

K. Sunai explained that the island may have been given the name "Salang" ("sea grass") because of the abundance of sea grass around the coast. "Ujung", the Malay word for cape, may have come from the island being mistaken for a cape.

When Europeans heard the Malay words, K. Sunai wrote, they mistook them for "Junk Ceylon" and the name stuck in an attempt to pair it with Ceylon, known today as Sri Lanka.

British historian Sir James E Tennent, who wrote definitive historical accounts of life on Ceylon in the mid-1800s, offered another explanation. He wrote that during the 4th century, there was considerable trade between

China and Ceylon in commodities such as ivory, coconuts and sesame.

Phuket was in line with the direction Chinese junks sailed through the Straits of Malacca to reach Ceylon. Chinese traders would stop at Phuket because of its natural harbors. They would wait for favorable wind conditions before setting sail to Ceylon.

The fleets would also stop on their way back. The large number of junks calling in, Tennent wrote, caused the Malay locals to name the island "Ajung Selan" - ajung means "large ships" and Selan is the Malay pronunciation of "Ceylon". Ajung Selan, once again mispronounced by Europeans, became Junk Ceylon.

The various terms for Phuket have their roots in Malay language. Thais were late to arrive on the island. Thai settlers would often adapt foreign names to make them more "Thai". One example of this, as K. Sunai wrote, is the word chalong. Originally, the name may have come from the Malay term "Salang", which was changed because Chalong means "to celebrate" in Thai.

The current name Phuket, believed to have derived from the Malay word *bhukit*, meaning hill or mountain, came much later. But that is another story.

So, the next time you wander around Jungceylon, remember there's more to the name than Starbucks and SFX Cinema.

The pros of Linux mini-distros

leverness, on the face of it, ought to connote something good. Instead, it is often the opposite, associated with devilry – and nowhere is the associaation plainer than in cyberspace. Clever folk from every quarter are trying to fool, foil, track use of or hijack the computers of innocents such as we.

Principal avenue of attack is Microsoft's Windows operating system.

I admit, I used to be a moreor-less-satisfied Windows user, but after experiencing four fatal crashes on my computers in two years, I saw it was time to think outside the box – literally.

That was about one year ago. A number of problems rankled. First, invading viruses, Trojans, spyware, malware and other strings of indigestible or aberrant computer code were a drag on my processing prowess. I hesitated even to turn the thing on. "What new beast, its hour come at last, will hustle through my boot sectors to be born?" I worried.

Then, too, my boxes (computerese for the CPU and associated hardware) never seemed to have enough oomph for Windows, which, like Catherine the Great, grows fatter and fatter apace, requiring steadily faster processors, more RAM and vast tracts of hard-disk space.

What to do? I wondered. What is Windows doing with all those extra gigabytes?

Some say, and various adverse multi-billion-baht court decisions reinforce their suspicions, that the computer boffins in Redmond, Washington, have been up to no good – writing extra strings of code by the millions, the only purpose of which is to preserve Windows proprietary character; secretly updating or chang-

arque Rome has been forced to use computers of varying quality for years just to earn a crust as a writer.

ing the operating systems in users' computers – and thereby trespassing IT administrators' security safeguards.

The latest version, Vista, was beset with adverse publicity before release and news since remains dubious. The program reportedly runs 50% slower than the latest version of Windows XP, requires at least 2GB of RAM to run smoothly, and has an embedded digital rights management program causing untold problems with even simple hardware items such as speakers and monitors that do not have similar programs.

To top it all, Vista suddenly plunges into "reduced functionality" mode should any activity or stray code trigger a program meant to protect Microsoft's intellectual property rights.

The point here may be expressed as a question: Isn't there some alternative available to all this snooping and hectoring and useless code-bloating by the omnipresent Big Brother?

The answer is "yes".

First, you need to understand the problem: it's the hard disk. Windows' underlying problem, indeed, that of any big operating system, including Linux, UNIX and Mac OS (derived from a UNIX-like system called FreeBSD), is that it constantly reads to and writes from the harddisk unit.

This naturally leads to a certain amount of fudging, so that even systems of elegantly written code unexposed to attack via the Internet, eventually become corrupted.

Robert Shingledecker, one of the developers of Damn Small Linux (DSL), a remarkably fullfeatured 50MB operating system, figures some corrupting occurs about once every 39 sessions.

That doesn't mean you should toss out your hard disk. I t's still a great place to save files and applications.

"It seems everybody's mindset is to install to a hard drive," Shingledecker writes. "That is the way it's always been done." But that cannot ensure a reliable system, which is what we want. The solution is to put the OS in readonly memory, that is, on a CD-ROM.

Experienced users will instantly respond witheringly that, CDs are slower than hard disks. But if the OS is small enough – as, for example, DSL, Puppy Linux and the Latvia-based Astrumi are – it will boot entirely into RAM, which is much faster than reading from the hard disk. The operating system thereby remains, as Shingledecker says, in "a pristine state" with every reboot.

Many of these so-called "mini-distros" are available online free. Type "mini-distros" into Wikipedia's search box for a complete list and links. The benchmark size is 50MB.

They include all features you're used to – word processors, text editors, networking programs, consoles, desktop search func-

tions, graphics manipulation apps, CD rippers, music and movie players, telephone and Wi-Fi interfaces.

My version of Australian computer engineer Barry Kauler's brilliantly conceived Puppy Linux, using a Pentium 2.4GHz processor with 128MB of RAM, boots fully in 20 seconds and comes standard with 170 applications and programs. It also shuts down fast, inside five seconds.

Another useful feature of the minis is their tools – something Windows can't or won't match. Most include programs allowing control of remote desktops, that is, of other computers to which you are linked over the 'net, and most are ready for use as servers. Linux, I should add, is derived from Bell Laboratories UNIX OS, and thus designed for networks and parallel programming from the start. The Internet always has been a UNIX-based environment. Let's say, as sometimes happens, Windows won't boot. You might use a rescue disk, but maybe you don't have one – maybe the maid bagged it or the kids used it to play Frisbee. Maybe even when you have a repair disk – as happened to an acquaintance last week – it doesn't work: Windows insists on erasing the whole disk and re-installing. What then?

Grab Puppy or DSL, boot up and lo, all your Windows files are at your command to be saved before you erase the disc and reinstall Windows. As you gain experience, you'll even be able to use utilities available for restoring Windows without re-installing – that's because Linux in "superuser" mode allows you to see and modify every part of your hard disk.

Shops make money off faulty Windows systems, off upgrades and replacements. But users of three- to 10-year-old boxes can work quite happily without upgrades or replacements using Puppy or DSL.

Earlier in the year it was announced that Windows 7, the new OS scheduled for introduction in 2010, will feature a 25MB kernel, the implication being that Windows' troublesome bloat will be a thing of the past.

But you needn't wait till 2010 to find out. You can fight the bloat and get yourself a fast, fullfeatured, Internet-secure, flexible and incorruptible system merely by investing the time to download a mini-distro.

Go ahead, Windows users. Do it. You've nothing to lose but your chains.

markets continue. Switzerland's largest bank, UBS, announced on December 10 that it would have to take a write down of US\$10 billion due to losses in the credit markets.

UBS is not just a bank with Swiss operations. It has become a massive global operator by growth and acquisitions. It also has a substantial presence in the US as a commercial bank, asset manager and investment banker.

UBS's trading and investment-banking operations led to the accumulation of these losses. The Singaporean government, via one of its Sovereign Investment Funds, announced an injection of 11.3 billion Swiss francs and an unnamed Middle Eastern investor provided another 2 billion. These capital injections allowed investors more than a modest shareholding in UBS.

Two days later, America's central bank, the US Federal Reserve, announced a 25-basis-point (0.25%) cut in its Federal Funds Rate and Discount Rate. This disappointed markets. To quote Art Cashin, the chief floor trader for UBS operations in America, speaking in a televised interview

he problems in the credit on CNBC, "Goldilocks had expected a diamond from the Fed for Christmas and instead, on opening her present, found it to be costume jewelry and she threw a fit."

> Markets were not impressed by the Fed cut and, more importantly, some strong language that accompanied the cut. The US Federal Reserve, watching this negative reaction, hinted later the same day that it had some interesting news to release shortly and that it was not going to rely on interest-rate cuts to solve the credit market's problems

> Early the next day, December 12, major US investment banking group Morgan Stanley announced that its favorite "short" for 2008 was America's largest bank Citigroup. When a "short" is used, it is with the expectation that the share price is going to fall. Considering that Citigroup shares had already been the subject of heavy losses in 2007 and its new CEO had held the position for less than 24 hours, this was not good news.

> Short selling is usually achieved by one financial institution borrowing shares of the target company from a long-term

holder, that is, a pension fund. The institution then sells these shares and waits for the price to fall. Assuming that all goes to plan, it later buys back the same amount of shares at a cheaper price and returns them to the pension fund, together with an interest payment.

On the same day, broking house and investment banking group Merrill Lynch announced the downgrading by one "notch" of the shares of JP Morgan Chase & Co, Bank of America and Wachovia Bank. All three are among America's largest banks.

Just to add more seasonal good cheer, Office Depot announced that a downturn in sales in Florida seemed to be spreading to other states.

Then, the US Federal Reserve made an announcement. In conjunction with the central banks of Canada (Bank of Canada), the UK (Bank of England), Switzerland (Swiss National Bank) and the European central bank, substantial amounts of liquidity were to be introduced to the money markets.

The current credit squeeze is a threat to banking and economic stability, not just in North America but in Europe and other parts of the world. Australia's central bank (Reserve Bank of Australia) was also active with substantial cash injections into its domestic money market.

In a televised interview on CNBC US Squawk Box, the guest host was John Snow, who was US Treasury Secretary until 2006. He is currently chairman of Cerberus Capital, a major pri-

company's current projects is the ownership and attempted "turnaround" of Chrysler after its separation from Daimler.

The change in John Snow from a Treasury Secretary to a businessman was

interesting. He bluntly said that By Richard G. Watson going to have to come to terms with most US banks needed to be recapitalized. The source of this money is Sovereign Wealth Funds, also called Sovereign Investment Funds.

Both terms are identical: these "funds" are owned by countries. It is estimated that globally they account for around US\$3 trillion in assets. That figure is expected to rise to US\$15 trillion within the next decade.

Already mentioned is the injection of capital to UBS, while Citigroup received a US\$7.5 billion cash injection from the Sovereign Investment Fund of Abu Dhabi. In every case, Sovereign Funds are taking up equity stakes in the banks they assist.

They make for very good investors. They do not want to take over the banks they are investing in and they are also there as longterm, strategic investors. They make for a natural "fit". Banks, who through what really amounts to enormous mismanagement, need cash: Sovereign Wealth Funds, which have cash, want to make investments.

John Snow went on to say that he believed that the US will avoid recession, although in his estimation economic growth will fall to about 2%. He estimates that it will take around 18 months for the situation to normalize.

nario. He did sav that for the US economy to grow, unemployment must not rise too significantly. However, if unemployment rises rapidly, all bets are off. He is by no means alone in this thinking.

the reality that their banks are going to have to accept billions of dollars in investment capital from Sovereign Wealth Funds.

Some 1.5 million American households will be seeing interest-rate increases in 2008, virtually all linked to the London Interbank offer rate (LIBOR). For this fate to fall, confidence and capital need to be added. Banks must return to normal interbank lending patterns, as the world cannot live happily with a longterm credit crunch.

The alternative could be some major bank failures and economic panic.

PHUKET: Although Phuket's critical tourism-related businesses have enjoyed rapid re-growth of the industry and the best fiscal year since the 2004 tsunami, which saw a massive slump in income from tourist dollars, some key figures in the tourism industry have voiced concerns about the region's ability to manage and sustain the boom.

Maitree Narukatpichai, Phuket Tourist Association (PTA) President and owner representative of the Hilton Arcadia Phuket Resort & Spa, said that the year has been good for tourism with the number of visitors to Phuket reaching nearly 5 million.

"Hotel occupancy this year is about 20% higher than last year, with average occupancy for four- and five-star hotels averaging about 70% for the whole year, although occupancy in some three-star and budget hotels has averaged out at about 60% for the year," K. Maitree said.

However, three-star hotels with the support of big travel operators have also had an occupancy rate on a par with the luxury resorts, he added.

Although Phuket has become a choice destination for tourists from around the world, the PTA, tour operators and the related government agencies are still working hard to improve the industry's performance.

According to K. Maitree, the slogan "Smiling Phuket", part

Tourism operators struggle to keep pace with the boom

of the international branding campaign by the PTA and the Tourism Authority of Thailand used on international road shows, has enticed many visitors to Phuket. "The Phuket Provincial Administration Organization [OrBor-Jor] has also continually reinforced this branding," he said.

"This year's low season has also seen a rise in tourists from the Middle East and India, up about 40% from last year. This is the result of the international roadshows to the region, which have been running for three years now," he said.

"More Europeans, especially Russians, are coming to Phuket during the high season, with more charter flights from Europe directly to Phuket," K. Maitree said.

"The political situation has had little effect on tourism here. The property sector has slowed a bit but tourism still remains strong," he added.

President of the Tourism Council of Thailand, Wichit Na-Ranong, is also pleased with 2007. "Phuket is the most popular tourist destination in Thailand. We can see that Bangkok has seen a drop in the number of tourists while Phuket is receiving more visitors on the new chartered flights, which have increased by about 10%," he said.

'Tourism in other parts of Thailand has been affected by the political situation, violence and economic woes, but Phuket and the neighboring provinces of Phang Nga and Krabi have bounced back after the tsunami," he added.

K. Wichit predicts the boom will continue, with new hotels, marinas and more popular events planned. "However, I am still concerned about maintaining good management of the environment and conservation of Phuket's natural resources. It's important to hold regular ecological activities, such as beach cleanups and employing a sufficient number of the qualified service personnel," he said.

"Another concern is high prices. I don't want business operators to put their prices too high, otherwise tourists will be deterred by unreasonable costs.

"Also, all concerned sectors need to consider infrastructure, waste management and human resources in order to cope effectively with the increase in visitors so that Phuket remains a luxury destination," he added.

Eam Thavornwongwongse, President of the Phuket Cham-

ber of Commerce, saw the development the tourism industries in nearby provinces as a boon. "Even if the number of tourists coming to Phuket drops off, the region's economy will not suffer as the tourists simply go to other destinations in Phang Nga and Krabi," he said.

However, speaking about Phuket's property industry, which is deeply intertwined with tourism in Phuket, K. Eam said, "Foreign investors have been put off by the Thai company nominee laws and the right of ownership or partnership regarding land ownership, which is still unclear as nothing official has been announced.

"The government should support foreign investors. If these investors are confident about their investment, then the Thai people will ultimately benefit. After all, foreigners can't take the land back home with them.

"Neighboring countries Singapore and Malaysia have benefited from making it easier for international investors with tax breaks," he added.

Of the spa industry in Phuket, Chernporn Kanjanasaya, chair of the Phuket Spa Association, said that Phuket's spa industry has grown significantly over the past two years in step with the tourism industry.

However, she voiced concerns about qualified therapists leaving the industry to take up more lucrative offers abroad. "Both European and Asian tourists are attracted to Thailand's spas. The biggest problem for Phuket's spas is the lack of therapists as many qualified therapists leave to work in other countries as Thai spa treatments become more popular abroad," she said.

The day spa industry has undergone a transformation since the tsunami, she added. "Before 2005, the market was monopolized by large spa corporations, but recent years have seen more smaller boutique spas competing in the market," she said.

All-Thai bouts come out swinging into 2008

nother year has come and gone and once again, it is time to scrutinize Thailand's boxing scene. It would be easy to list all of the negatives, but there were indeed a few positives. Probably the best thing to happen this year is the re-occurrence of Thai-versus-Thai matchups.

In the past, bouts between the top Thai fighters were a regular occurrence. Little by little, the number of bouts between Thais dwindled, until finally, the only Thais who did battle in the ring were the greenest and least skilled.

Thanks to the efforts of the Asian Boxing Council and its chairman, General Kovit Bhakdibhumi, Thai-versus-Thai bouts are on the rise once again. All of the bouts were highly competitive and did what they were supposed to do; determine who are the best Thai boxers.

In May, former WBC super featherweight (130lbs) champion Sirimongkol Singwancha dropped down from the junior lightweight (140lbs) division to challenge Tong Por Chokchai for the Asian Boxing Council super featherweight title.

The two fought toe-to-toe for the entirety with a weightdrained Sirimongkol using his vast ring experience to come on strong at the end of the bout and lift the belt from the champion. Sirimongkol immediately relinquished the belt and go on to capture the vacant PABA 140lb belt.

The next battle between Thais involved the WBC numberone ranked super bantamweight Napapol Kittisakchokchai and number-two rated Saenghiran Lookbanyai. Originally scheduled to take place in March, the bout finally came off in September after three cancellations.

For the first half of the fight, Saenghiran put on a boxing clinic, baffling Napapol and tallying up an early lead. By the eighth round, sensing his opponent was tiring, Napapol roared back into the fight. In the 10th, Saenghiran, looking more and more the spent fighter as the seconds ticked by, could do nothing to stave off the relentless attack of his opponent.

Napapol was declared the winner when, with nothing left to give, an exhausted Saenghiran collapsed and was unable to beat the 10-count.

When WBC minimumweight champion Eagle Kyowa returned to Thailand to defend his belt after seven years of living and fighting in Japan, it was intended to be his homecoming party – but challenger Oleydong Sithsamerchai had different ideas.

The bout was back-andforth for the first few rounds, with Oleydong landing counter left and right hooks, then sliding to his right.

Kyowa advanced, relent-

less in his attack, occasionally landing his jab but missing often. By the fourth round, Oleydong looked to be tiring, his face showing signs of wear from the stiff jab of the champion.

By the sixth, Oleydong was landing combinations. He continued with his side-to-side movement, sliding out of range of Kyowa's errant punches, scoring points to pull ahead in the bout.

Realizing victory was within his grasp; Oleydong adhered to his stick-and-move game plan. In the final rounds though, Kyowa managed to bridge the gap and score on the inside. It was too little, too late. Kyowa could do nothing to save his title.





RENTAL MARKET COMES OF AGE

few years ago, you could count on two hands the number of rental villas and resort condominiums-cum-resorts in Phuket. Coming into 2008, the market has developed into a significant market force and guests are benefiting from the variety of options. The expectation for the short- to medium-term future is that this type of accommodation will eat into the market share of traditional hotels.

The Phuket market has historically lagged behind Bali, its key competitor, for a number of years in terms of product offerings for short- and long-term villa rentals. While the emergence of alternative accommodation has been a shot heard around the world in most markets, only now in Asia is this type of product becoming a force to be reckoned with.

Looking at the Bangkok hotel market, there has been a huge shift in serviced-apartment projects in the past few years. Properties that were once catering mainly to long-term travelers are now competing with hotels for leisure and business guests.

International chains such as Ascott (along with its Citadines brand), Oakwood and Marriott have multiple properties in the city. Local products including Centrepoint, Emporium Suites and Lebua have created strong followings in an increasingly crowded playing field.

The trend towards lifestyle investment, along with real-estate speculators looking for ongoing rental yields and usage rights, has driven the movement towards the villa and resort-apartment rental market.

Branded residences at the Banyan Tree, Sheraton and Mövenpick, together with new products including The Yamu, Jumeirah, Shangri-La and Taj offer villas and resort apartments

for sale which will in turn be rented out to guests.

This trend does not stop at hotel projects. The successes of BYD Lofts, Aspasia, Lersuang Club, Baan Chai Nam, Sri Panwa and Katamanda provide a strong case for this type of product shift.

A number of local agents are focusing on this trend with PIP's Phuketvillarentals.com one of the pioneers. Newcomers Phuket Villas & Homes, Phuket Marbella and Shibumi offer niche rental operations for rentals of private villas and condos.

As a selling point for holidaymakers, in many cases it's a great value proposition trading up to a private pool villa or serviced condo, which has greater facilities and amenities, as well as space versus the relative confinement of a single hotel room. In an age of customization in all consumer segments, this is certainly going to be one that will continue to refine and grow in the coming years.

In terms of long-term rentals, the resale and rental markets have not displaced new products in the past but, given the development of critical mass in the marketplace, this is bound to change. The increased supply of rental products will make rental rates more standardized in the market and easier to for potential occupants to compare. The same can be said for the resale market, which up until now has not had a large market presence because buyers have tended to favor new properties. As more products enter the fray, this will no doubt change. In the future, long-term rentals will account for a sizable presence of housing consumers.

Freedom of choice is a great thing and a more developed market means greater options for more people. It will be interesting to see how the holiday rentals affect the hotel products out there in the coming year and if they enhance or displace existing business.

Gardening by Bloomin' Bert Get the name right, guys – it's a clitoria

adies are a curious lot. We gentlemen will never quite understand them. Any bloke who thinks he's got his head around the female psyche is either deluded or drunk. The male of the species can never win – the rules are as simple as that. They should be really, because women wrote them.

Picture the scene: Your wife has whittled down her dress selection to just two. She has decided that you're about to be given the massive responsibility of making the final choice.

"So which one, then?" she asks. You know that you're doomed from this point on. With a resigned sigh, you suggest that the red dress would look gorgeous on her.

"So you hate the blue dress then, do you?" she responds. You then foolishly come back with something like, "No, actually, love..." and realize that trying to defend your criticism of what you now realize is her favorite blue dress is futile.

Try not to call her by the wrong name, too. That never seems to go down particularly well,

for some reason. I'm not known for my tact with ladies or anybody else for that matter, which has turned me into a bit of a coward. Gardening types tend not to write about anything that really matters. I wish I had the gumption to say something that made people listen or that was in some way contentious or controversial.

Gardeners have been this way for centuries. They're content to sit back and watch the world go by, gratified with the fact that little they say is ever going to make a difference.

Gardeners usually give



plants predictable names. Much respect, then, to an 18th-century botanist named Linnaeus. He took one look at a new type of tropical pea plant and named it clitoria. He obviously wasn't bothered in any way at the thought of ruffling a few feathers in the gardening world – the shape of the plant's flower leaves little to the imagination.

There are about 70 species of clitoria in total, the most common in Thailand being the clitoria ternatea, or butterfly pea. Thais know it as the anchan. Some cunning linguists may argue that the ternatea part of the name comes from the ternate leaves that are sometimes in groups of three, as the term is often used to describe a compound leaf that is divided into three more or less equal parts, but no, it actually comes from the fact that it was first discovered on the Indonesian island of Ternate.

The closest thing we have to the butterfly pea in the West is the sweet pea. This one behaves in a similar way – it's an amazing climber. I have one of those dividing walls with a kind of concrete lattice near the top. My next-door neighbor decided to put a few butterfly peas in pots on his side, with bamboo poles for them to climb.

Over one of several beers one night, he asked me if he pushed the tops of the plants through the trellis towards my side of the wall, if I'd be willing to poke them back towards him. As it was his turn to go to the fridge, I agreed. That was a few months ago. Now I can't redirect them towards him quickly enough. The former concrete wall is now peppered with vivid purple flowers on both sides.

They climb by clinging to whatever they can get hold of and wrap their tendrils around anything in their reach, thickening their stems until they're strong enough to climb a little further.

The petals are a kind of deep purple and the flowers are about three centimeters across with yellow stripes in the middle.


Unlike most flowers, the part of the butterfly pea flower that dusts insects with pollen is in the top, rather than underneath. Once the flowers have done their job of attracting insects to fertilize them, they wither away to be replaced a few days later by a seed container – the peas in the pod.

The seeds aren't the most complicated things to grow. You need to wait until the pods have turned a gray-brown color, then crack them open as you would do with regular pea pods and remove the seeds inside. Soak the seeds in water for about four hours before sowing them about 10cm apart in some moist potting compost. The resulting plants will be blooming in as little as six weeks.

The butterfly pea needs full sun to partial shade. In theory, it likes to be shaded from the hot afternoon sun. The plants tend to get leggy quickly, so pinching off over-adventurous tendrils helps keep them bushy.

Linnaeus has a lot to answer for. You really have to admire a gardener who is also a cunning linguist. Oh, and gents – try to get your wife's name right.
