KARON: After an investigation by Chalong Police into the bizarre killing, apparently in self-defense, of a man in a dive suit who attacked a Swiss yacht owner and a Thai woman on the night of January 9, police finally identified the attacker as 35-year-old German national Peter Michael Schmid.

The investigation by Chalong Police included showing pictures of the dead man to hotel employees in Kata-Karon and Rawai.

On January 15, Chalong Police Superintendent Col Saman Chainarong told the Gazette that from the evidence gathered the attack appears to have been a botched robbery attempt.

Details of the incident, as provided to the media at a press conference on January 10 by Col Saman, were based solely on the eyewitness account of 25-yearold Trat native Porntip Pradit.

Also present at the press conference were Police Region 8 Deputy Commissioner Maj Gen Tavat Boonfueng and Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Col Paween Pongsirin.

Col Samarn told the media that K. Porntip called police about 11:30 pm on January 9 from aboard the 10-meter sailboat Maria, anchored several hundred meters offshore from the Club Med Resort at Kata.

Speaking in a panicked voice, the woman told police that Swiss national Pierre-Alain Oberson, 50, had been shot in his left shoulder and was in urgent need of medical assistance, Col Samarn said.

Chalong Police and volunteer rescue workers responded to the distress call by arranging

Under questioning, K. Porntip told police that she and Mr Oberson were aboard the yacht that night when they noticed a man with a bag swimming toward the vessel.

Intrigued, they began to talk with the man and then invited him aboard. The man said he enjoyed swimming and diving at night, she told police.

The group drank beer and coffee together and the man inspected the vessel.

"He stayed about one hour and then said, 'I have to go.' Then he said goodbye," Col Samarn quoted the woman as saying.

But rather than leave, the man reached into his bag and pulled out a homemade gun and Continued on page 2

Holiday season sees **B2bn boon** for tourism industry

PHUKET: Businesses in Phuket's tourism industry enjoyed a prosperous holiday season, with many hotels fully booked and more than 2 billion baht generated by the industry during the period December 24 through January 2.

Runjuan Tongrut, assistant director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand Southern Region 4 Office in Phuket City, made the announcement at a press conference on January 2.

A large number of Thai and foreign tourists came to Phuket to celebrate Christmas and the New Year, with many Europeans choosing to stay on the island beyond the New Year, K. Runjuan said.

An estimated 5 million people visited Phuket last year, which generated an estimated 95 billion baht for the tourism industry in Phuket, she added.

"The numbers could be even higher; we aren't certain yet. Many hotels and scheduled flights have been and are completely booked from October through to March," she said.

Since October, 220 domestic and 287 international flights have been landing in Phuket weekly. Of the international flights, 90 have been charter flights, compared with only 35 weekly charter flights in 2006, K. Runjuan said.

"We have a lot of new charter flights arriving from Russia and other Eastern European countries," she added, including the first charter flight from Tallinn in Estonia, which touched down in Phuket on December 19.

WICHIT: Police are still searching for two men who robbed a gold shop on Chao Fa East Rd on January 9, escaping with jewelry valued at more than a million baht.

Phuket City Police Duty Officer Lt Theeradet Jiraksa told the Gazette that the robbery took place about 11 am at Srithong Gold Shop, by the Moom Muang Market.

Armed with what appeared to be a short-barrel shotgun, a long-haired man entered the shop while his accomplice waited outside on a motorbike, its engine still running.

The bandit ordered the lone employee to lie on the floor, then walked around the counter to the display case, where he smashed the glass with the butt of the gun and removed the gold jewelry.

He quickly placed the loot in a black bag then fled the scene riding pillion on the motorbike, Lt Theeradet said.

As the pair were making their getaway, 27-year-old shopkeeper Petchthamrong Longthong, a relative of the owner, fired two shots at the fleeing thieves. Both shots missed and hit parked cars.

On January 14, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth told the Gazette that the two suspects were still at large, but that police had a good description of the men

Speaking at a press confer-

ence on January 10, Police Region 8 Deputy Commissioner Pol Maj Gen Tavat Boonfueng said that immediately after the heist, the shopkeeper dialed 191 and Traffic Police officers nearby were alerted. Although they were unable to catch the pair, the officers were able to provide enough information for composite sketches to be drawn, which Maj Gen Tavat described as "about 70% accurate".

Physical evidence in the case includes fingerprints dusted from one of the robber's motorcycle helmets, found lying by the side of Soi Ta-iad in Wichit, he said.



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ordered K. Porntip to tie up Mr Oberson with rope and gag him with black electrical tape, said Col Samarn.

As she began to do so, both she and Mr Oberson exchanged knowing glances before simultaneously charging the man. In the ensuing struggle, the man was hit twice by Mr Oberson with a gaff, he added.

The man then fired his gun once, hitting Mr Oberson in his left shoulder, before jumping overboard.

"As a matter of procedure, we must charge Mr Oberson because he killed another man, but if he did it in self-defence the charges will likely be dropped," said Col Samarn, who added that Schmid was suffering from stomach cancer at his time of death.

"We must still question Mr Oberson about exactly what happened on his boat," he added.

Col Samarn also confirmed reports that Schmid had completed a dive course at Dive Asia.

A spokesperson for the company later confirmed that a man named Peter Michael Schmid had completed a dive course there within the past three years.

Mr Oberson came to Thailand with his wife and two young children. All three were staying at a resort on Koh Racha Yai when the incident took place, Col Samarn said.



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Banphaeo Hospital to staff 'Phya Thai'

PHUKET CITY: Banphaeo Hospital in Samut Sakhon will next month sign a management contract agreeing to help the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) reopen the long-abandoned Phya Thai Hospital as a public organization, to be run independently of the Public Health Ministry.

OrBorJor President Anchalee Vanich Tephabutra said that when the new facility opens, hopefully by the end of the year, it will serve as a reasonablypriced medical center for people in Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi.

The hospital, located on Sri Sena Rd, was bought by the *OrBorJor* from the Thai Asset Management Corporation for 327 million baht in August.

OrBorJor officials recently met Banphaeo Hospital executives to discuss plans for the new hospital, which will start using some medical staff and services from Banphaeo Hospital, currently the only hospital in Thailand run as a "public organization".

Although still operated under the supervision of government ministries, public organizations are expected to operate quickly and efficiently without being hindered by the complex procedures required by the traditional bureaucracy.

"Potential hospital staffers will be interviewed in the second quarter of this year and hiring will begin around October with the aim to commencing operations by the end of the year," said K. Anchalee.

Banphaeo Hospital Director Dr Surapong Boonprasert said, "We will help the *OrBorJor* find medical staff and other personnel needed to bring the hospital up to the standards demanded by local people. Treatment fees will be kept low, but without compromising standards."

The *OrBorJor* will be responsible for acquiring medical equipment, while Banphaeo Hospital will initially deal with hospital operations. The long-term goal is to have the *OrBorJor* run all hospital operations, said K. Anchalee.

"Within four to five years, we would expect to be managing the entire facility system by ourselves," she added.

There will be three phases in the hospital's re-development, she said.

The first phase, already underway, involves an assessment of the building to determine where repairs and improvements are needed. The second phase will consist of restoring utilities such as electric supply, air conditioning, IT facilities, phone lines and so on. The final phase will involve staffing.

K. Anchalee acknowledged that the hospital must recoup its investment costs, but said that the project is not intended as a profitmaking venture.

However, the project came under fire in October by Health Ministry officials who claimed it could lure doctors away from state-run hospitals that are already facing staffing problems.

Also, in 2004, public organizations suffered severe criticism after some were accused of abusing their greater autonomy. The Assets Capitalization Bureau (ACB), for example, paid each of its directors up to 450,000 baht a month.

"Handicapped and elderly patients will receive special benefits at the new hospital, added K. Anchalee.

"The hospital will be renamed in the near future," she added.

Full booze ban for Senatorial election

PHUKET: The Election Commission (EC) has confirmed that that voting for the Senatorial election will take place on March 2. The Phuket Election Committee (PEC) has confirmed that it is ready to conduct the polls – and the same restrictions on alcohol sales will be in force during both the advance and general polling.

Under the current Constitution, Thailand's new-look upper house will comprise 150 members.

Of these, 76 will be elected, while the remainder will be appointed by a special panel. Under the 1997 constitution,

the entire Senate was elected. Candidates must register with the PEC between January 21 and 25 at Phuket Community Hall on Palien Rd in Phuket City. Voters registered in other provinces but residing in Phuket can cast advance votes on February 23 and 24 at Phuket Community Hall, provided they register to do so at any of Phuket's three District Offices (Muang, Thalang, Kathu) or Phuket City Municipality Offices by January 31.

There are currently 214,329 eligible voters in Phuket, the same number registered for the previous general election.

Phuket residents who are still not eligible to vote can register at any District Office or Phuket City Municipality Office before February 20.

Unless changes are announced, a ban on alcohol sales will apply from 6 pm on Friday, February 22, to midnight the following Sunday; then again from 6 pm on Saturday, March 1, to midnight the following Sunday.

Man suspected of kidnapping ex-wife, killing her new husband

CHERNG TALAY: A jealous ex-husband allegedly stabbed his former wife's new husband to death just before dawn on January 5, then fled the scene with the woman.

Cherng Talay Police Duty Inspector Pol Lt Col Jessada Sangsuree identified the victim as Rungnapa Sriburam, 31, a native of Kalasin Province who was staying on Soi Layan in Cherng Talay Village 6 at the time of his death.

The victim's blood-covered body, dressed in a white vest and black shorts, was found at about 5:30 am, lying face up in his quarters at the Wasi Construction Company temporary workers' camp.

There was a stab wound to the base of his left ear, two more to the left side of his chest and multiple wounds to his left arm. His belongings were scattered around the room, suggesting a violent struggle, Lt Col Jessada said.


The victim and his wife, identified only as "Noy", had been married in a ceremony held on New Year's Day.

According to witnesses, the murder was carried out by Noy's estranged husband. Police are now investigating to try and learn his name and current whereabouts, Lt Col Jessada said.

"Witnesses said they heard loud noises consistent with a fight, then saw Noy leaving with her ex-husband. When they went to check on Rungnapa, they found him dead and reported the murder to the police," he said.

"We believe that the man abducted his wife after killing her new husband," he added.

Col Jessada was unavailable for further comment on January 15.

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Getting crabby

n a bid to increase dwindling crab stocks in local waters, the Phuket Provincial Fisheries Office together with other government and non-government organizations on the morning of January 10 held a ceremony to launch the island's first "crab bank", off Laem Nga in Rassada Village 3.

As part of the same ceremony, nine monks blessed 250 saffron ribbons, which were then tied around mangrove trees lining the perimeter of the Soi Kingkaew Community Mangrove Forest. It is hoped that having the trees blessed will ward off the on-going work of encroachers who continue to bulldoze and build on what remains of the last major mangrove stands near Phuket City.

xcitement filled the air at the end of Soi Kingkaew 3 in Rassada on the morning of January 10. Several tents were set up on the muddy ground, some with sofas for local dignitaries and government officials attending.

An MC addressed the crowd of hundreds over a public address system. Nine monks sat in a row under another tent, while yellow-shirted local children, happy to be out of school that morning, ran about with mangrove tree saplings they had helped grow and were preparing to plant.

An early-morning alms-giving ceremony was followed by speeches from Phuket Vice-Governor Worapot Ratthasima, Phuket Provincial Fisheries Chief Phairoh Suttaporn and project organizer Jaran Than-Udon of local association the NGO Rassada December 26 Group, a coalition of various NGOs, including tsunami victims and local fishermen.

A press release explained that the 151,160-baht Rassada Crab Bank project was funded by the Governor's Office last year as part of the central government's "Yoo Dee Mee Suk" (*Good Life and Happiness*) Project. It is also supported by Hilfswerk Austria as one of the Austrian Development Co-operation's community-based, posttsunami rehabilitation projects.

The crab bank itself comprises four pens and a small hut,

all floating about one kilometer offshore, in a location that is passed by the crab fisherman each day as they head back from deeper water.

The pens, which are suspended from sealed plastic drums, are anchored to the sea bed at a depth that ensures a minimum of one meter depth between the bottom of the pens and the sea bed at low tide. At high tide, the bottom of the pens will float about 4 meters above the sea bed. The nylon netting has a mesh size of 2.5 inches to keep the crabs in – and predators out.

The target species is Por-

tunus pelagicus, poo mah (or 'horse crab') in the vernacular. A good swimmer adapted to life in the open ocean, its numbers have fallen locally in recent years to levels that have driven many crab fishermen out of business.

The first horse crab "deposit" consisted of about 100 eggladen females delivered in aerated tanks sent from Phang Nga.

K. Jaran told the *Gazette* that local crab fishermen, with their fleet of about 20 boats, have agreed to deposit any egg-laden female horse crab they catch in the bank, to allow them to reproduce. After the crabs have re-

the bank, to allow them to reproduce. After the crabs have released their larval offspring, they will be recollected by the same fisherman who put them there and sold off as usual.

Trust plays a key role in the project. The fishermen will mark their crabs with permanent, waterproof makers and remove them from the pens only after they have released their eggs. However, most of the time the bank will be left unattended – with nothing to stop outsiders from stopping by under the cover of darkness to make unexpected "withdrawals".

Based on the frequency of

fishing trips, the organizers hope that the fishermen will deposit about 10 female crabs per boat, per day – or about 50 crabs per day in total. There is no real accounting system to quantify whether the project is a success or not, but the organizers hope that an increase in local crab stocks will indicate success.

On average, a female horse crab produces about 750,000 eggs, but only about 10% of these will become larvae.

Despite the crab's reproductive strategy being wellknown, until the start of the crab bank local fishermen made no effort to assist egg-laden females

in reaching the end of their reproductive stage before selling them off, he explained.

"Currently, fresh horse crabs sell at about 280 baht per kilo, but even at this price fewer and fewer Rassada fishermen have found it worthwhile trying to catch them because of dwindling catches in recent years," K. Jaran said.

Also attending the event on a visit from Bangkok was Weerawat Paphussaro, Deputy-Director of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment's Department of Environmental Quality Protection (DEQP), which co-ordinates joint efforts

between the government and a crossing. nationwide network of 56 NGOs working on environment-related issues in the country.

"The key environmental protection efforts in general revolve around increasing public awareness and getting local administrative bodies, such as tambon administration organizations to take a leadership role, said K. Weerawat.

When asked if the continued deterioration of the marine environment would doom the crab bank project to the same fate that Phuket's sea turtle breeding-and-release programs have met, he said he was optimistic that the crabs' much shorter lifestyle and reproductive cycle would result in a better outcome.

One of the key NGOs working on the crab bank and other environmental projects in Phuket is the local branch of the TorSorMor Network, a volunteer group committed to environmental protection and natural resource conservation that will likely be the first to blow the whistle if any bulldozers are spotted in the area.

Its president Pornpimol Pothisuwanawat said her group was working with the DEQP, Rassada December 26 Group and many other agencies and groups to try and get the Soi Kingkaew Community to report any further encroachment.

The group is advised by former Phuket Senator Paiboon Upatising.

K. Pornpimol agreed with K. Weerawat that encroachment was still going on in the area, but said she hoped that the "ordination" of some 2,500 trees in the Soi Kingkaew Community Forest would help to draw "a line in the sand" across which encroachers would have to think twice about

The hope is that would-be encroachers will equate the cutting down an "ordinated" mangrove tree to committing a sin.

"Our activities can't guarantee 100% protection, but we feel it is much better than doing nothing," she said.

K. Jaran agrees. He said that his group also intends to make the local community the "driving force" behind the battle to conserve what is left of Rassada's once bountiful mangrove forests, which due to on-going encroachment have now been reduced to only about 500 rai.

"At about 300 rai, the Soi Kingkaew Community Forest is the last major mangrove stand near Phuket City," he said.

"The other 200 rai are found along the banks of Klong Tha Chin," he added.

In his speech, K. Jaran pointed out that in addition to sustaining important local resources, reforestation work in the area also helped in a small way to alleviating global environmental problems such as global warming.

He estimated, however, that only about 10% of Rassada residents see protection of the mangroves from further encroachment as a priority issue. Most see the mangroves as a resource to be exploited, he said.

"The presence of so many dignitaries, including the vice governor, was a good sign that the effort has high-level support," he added.

His group hope that delineating a clear boundary for the community forest behind a klong and ordinating its trees will protect what is left from further encroachment, he added.

"Any society needs clear guidelines and boundaries to function effectively," he commented.

Rogue monks defrocked after temple-'tech raid

NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: Places of worship are not generally considered the best places to swig booze and get down to some bangin' dance tracks.

However, three young monks in Nakhon's Wat Suan Pan turned their dormitory cell into a makeshift disco.

News of the temple 'tech came when neighbors told police that they had seen some monks leading a number of young girls into the wat in the early hours of January 7.

Pol Lt Col Somchai Muaydee, a Crime Suppression Inspector at Nakhon Sri Thammarat Muang District Police Station, took the call and made for the temple accompanied by the local truancy officer.

The inspectors found that a funeral was being held at Wat Suan Pan that night. However, about 20 meters from the main hall of the temple, thumping techno music was coming from behind a closed door in the monks' sleeping quarters.

Peering through a crack in the door frame, one of the inspectors espied three young monks, one tough-looking layman and three young girls.

The inspectors knocked on the door and the partygoers, thinking more of their gang had come to join the fun, let them in. Seeing the officers, the three girls dived onto the bed in a vain bid to hide while the men stumbled around, clearly drunk.

The cell was set up like a mini-karaoke bar with a multi-colored lighting rig, a sound system, a VCD player with microphone, a computer and eight X-rated movies. The officers counted 13 beer bottles, two wine coolers and a two-foot-long "Sparta" knife.

After notifying the abbot, all seven were taken to the police station for questioning. The three monks, one aged 21 and the other two 18, were defrocked immediately.

All seven were then released because their actions did not break any laws.

Two of the young temptresses, aged 15 and 18, were students at a well-known private school in Nakhon Sri Thammarat. Police called their guardians to come and collect them and the truancy officer said that their school would be notified of their actions. The third girl, 20, was released after being photographed for police records.

As for the seventh raver, Sonkrai "Tanong" Charoensap, 27, Col Somchai recognized him as a fugitive with six outstanding arrest warrants in connection with 10 robberies during the previous month.

Col Somchai said that although police could bring no charges against the three monks and three girls, he was very happy to escort Sonkrai from temple cell to jail cell.


The Saturday night will see The Shari Puorto Experience, another top US blues act from Southern California, take to the stage.

which falls under the jurisdiction of Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor). This lovely pile is just 300 meters from the beach, at the entrance to the access road that leads to Babylon Beach Club on Bang Tao Beach, probably to give beachgoers something to look forward to.



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Pub-smoking ban to start next month

moking tobacco anywhere in air-conditioned entertainment establishments and many parts of outdoor public venues will be banned as of February 17.

For open-air food courts or markets, smoking will be allowed only in designated corners, said Dr Hatai Chitanondh, chairman of the Thailand Health Promotion Institute on January 10.

Offenders will be subject to fines of 2,000 baht for smokers and 20,000 baht for venue operators.

Smoking is already prohibited in air-conditioned restaurants, but the Public Health Ministry's regulation to include air-conditioned pubs, discos and bars will take effect 45 days after it is published in the Royal Gazette.

Dr Hatai admitted that some owners of pubs and nighttime hangouts might resist, as they believe a smoking ban will hurt their trade.

"Our research has found that the businesses might suffer some impacts only in the beginning. After a while, pubs and entertainment places will not only get their old customers back, but will also attract new, non-smoking patrons," he said.

Among the many markets that stand to be affected by the ban is the famous Chatuchak Weekend Market in Bangkok, he said.

Alien worker rules. The Labor Ministry will soon implement a new law that will allow immigrant workers pending repatriation to work temporarily.

Employment Department Director-General Manoon Punyakiriyakorn said the draft bill, which has been approved by the National Legislative Assembly, would also tackle the problem of employers exaggerating the number of workers needed.

The new law requires employers to pay a per-head fee for employing immigrant workers. If they ask for more workers than they need, they will have to pay hefty fees, he said.

The draft bill would also allow alien workers to apply for a temporary work permits. It also includes the setting up of an immigrant workers' repatriation fund; employers would be required to withhold a certain amount from each immigrant worker's monthly salary to contribute to the fund.

The draft law also authorizes labor officials to arrest immigrant workers who break the law, without having to obtain court orders or help from the police, but only if an immigrant's wrongdoing takes place in front of officials, Manoon said.

Youth suicides increasing. The suicide rate among persons

under the age of 25 is increasing, with most young people who take their own lives doing so because of stress and psychological difficulties, according to a study by Child Watch.

Child Watch conducted a behavioral study of 140,000

young people during 2006 and 2007.

It found 7,363, or about 20 a day, had attempted to kill themselves in 2007. Of these, 659 were successful.

Smoking among young people fell from 17% in 2006 to 16% in 2007, while alcohol consumption increased from 36% to 38%.

A record 40% said they watched pornographic films, while 18% admitted to gambling on football games or buying lottery tickets.

Sexually active vocational students increased from 30% in 2006 to 36% in 2007, according to Child Watch.

Prime real estate. Pending approval by the new House of Representatives, the new Parliament may be built on a plot of the Royal Thai Army's Ordnance Department in Nonthaburi.

Pithoon Poomhiran, secretary-general of the House of Rep-

ayons Innan

resentatives, said his committee, which has been assigned to consider a new location for Parliament, has chosen the 265-rai plot in Nonthaburi.

If the new House approves the plan, the government will have to pay one billion baht in compensation to the Army.

Nurseries upgrade. The Ministry of Interior (MoI) is planning to improve all 17,000 of its nurseries countrywide by turning them into "child-development centers" that provide quality care and enhance learning skills.

Somporn Chaibaiyang, director-general of the MoI's Department of Local Administration, said the centers will sharpen children's ability to learn and will play a key role in meeting Thailand's future manpower and productivity needs.

Among the experts that will work at the centers will be some 14,000 people now studying with MoI support at universities and colleges in fields of medicine, public health and pre-school education.

Big plans for small tech. Thailand has set an ambitious six-year plan that would see nanotechnololgy-related products accounting for 1% of gross domestic product (GDP), or around 100 billion baht annually, by the year 2013.

The target is part of the National Nanotechnology Master Plan for 2007 to 2013, which was approved by Cabinet last year.

The plan was developed as a framework for local nanotechnology development to improve the country's international competitiveness.

Wiwut Tanthapanichakoon, director of the National Nanotechnology Center (Nanotec), said Thailand will move towards nanotechnology to serve seven strategic industries: food and agriculture, automotive, electronics, textiles and petrochemicals, one tambon one product, energy and environment, and medical and healthcare.

As nanotechnology is new to Thailand, a key to the plan's success will be training more researchers, Wiwat said.

Elderly educators. An amendment to extend the retirement age of government teachers to 65 is ready for the next government, Education Minister Wichit Srisaan said on January 10.

The planned extension was expected to be one of the first issues before the next education minister. Under the new project, selected government teachers will be required to undergo performance evaluations every three years. They will be paid extra for their additional skills acquired through training programs, said K. Wichit.

Those who fail the appraisal will not receive the extra fee until they pass it, he said.

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etween Christmas and New Year, Khao Lak was packed with tourists. While one would expect that all businesses in Khao Lak would do well at this time, many business owners were complaining about a fall in sales compared with last high season.

Several businesses that did well in the 2006-2007 high season reported that most customers in December 2007 and early January 2008 were looking for bargains instead of the quality of products or services on offer. They would run around for days just comparing prices.

Since most Khao Lak visitors during this time of the year come from Germany, it appears that the bad economic policy and unjustified tax increases Germans have had to bear over the past years have finally taken their toll on Khao Lak's economy as well.

Businesses suffering most from this German-bred Geiz ist geil (greed is sexy) mentality were local dive centers, especially those catering to the German-speaking market.

One dive shop owner said he had never received so many email inquiries starting straight out with a request for a discount or "send me your best package offer" as the main content.

A restaurant owner on Bang Niang Beach reported that

tourists would flock into the local 7-Eleven stores to buy bread, butter, vacuum-packed sausages, canned drinks and other supplies to get them through the day in the cheapest way possible so they wouldn't have to eat in local restaurants.

This is happening in a country were cheap, healthy and tasty food has always been one of the main attractions for tourists. Alarm bells should be ringing, or am I alone in my panic?

There are two possible explanations. First is travel operators and airlines offering ridiculously cheap accommodation with flight packages.

This attempt to make Khao Lak attractive in the low season has backfired as the cheap offers have extended far into the high season, eventually attracting the wrong clientèle at the wrong time of the year.

The second explanation is that Khao Lak could be becoming too expensive.

Local business owners Holiday Service Khao Lak, has

equally supported both these theories. With school holidays ending in Europe, Khao Lak experienced a brief decline in visitors at the beginning of January, a second blow for businesses that had already been hurt by this unforeseen decline of sales.

Peter Stiller, director of

a more positive outlook on the latest developments. "I believe that Khao Lak is on the verge of becoming an upmarket destination.

Right now, business and upmarket clientèle are overlapping and you can see big differences in consumer demographics.

"Some are simply not buying or are not able to buy at all. They are here on a tight budget, perhaps being lured to

Khao Lak by false information on the Internet, where Khao Lak is still promoted as a backpacker's paradise," he said.

"However, a high percentage of visitors are willing and able to pay for high-quality services. Hence, our company now invests in high-quality transportation rather than ordinary minibuses,

and we focus solely on providing a high quality of service at affordable prices."

The forgotten beach: Despite rumors that big Bangkok-based resort operators have bought large pieces of land in the part of Bang Niang Beach that sits north of the lagoon, no construction efforts are underway.

Today, this part of Bang Niang, with its picturesque lagoon, is how the southern half of Bang Niang looked in 2001, shortly before Khao Lak boomed.

Apart from the Mangold Residence, a bungalow resort still under construction, no other developments are yet apparent.

Investors should look closely into this area as land prices there are only about half that of land in southern Bang Niang.

Psychic flop: A Brazilian psychic predicted an earthquake in Indonesia for December 23, 2007, that would result in yet another devastating tsunami in Southeast Asia. Unfortunately, many local restaurant and hotel staff believed the psychic and did

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Army Chief to tour Deep South

rmy Commander-in-Chief Gen Anupong Paochinda on January 11 said that he will visit the Deep South to review the intelligence-gathering system in place there.

During his visit, the army chief will listen to officials to learn how they have been operating. He will then consider improvements to prevent leakage of official information, he said.

Gen Anupong said that he ordered intelligence agencies to review and screen their personnel.

His call for better internal security measures follows the arrest of three intelligence officers of the Internal Security Operations Command and seven policemen, all charged with spying for southern insurgents.

On January 10, the day before Gen Anupong's announcement, it was reported that Baan Pase School in Narathiwat's Rangae district had been closed indefinitely after insurgents detonated a bomb on school grounds, injuring two soldiers and terrifying about 140 students.

Police said the insurgents hid a homemade bomb by a tree near a school building and detonated it at 9:45 am, while two soldiers were nearby.

As all students were in classes at that time, none were injured, but the young students, terrified by the sound of explosion, screamed and cried.

Following the explosion, school management closed the school indefinitely because teachers feared for their safety.

Suspected smuggler seized. Officers from Police Region 8 Investigation Center on January 11 arrested a suspected ya bah (methamphetamine) trafficker wanted by Nong Khai police.

Prasongsak Thanomphao, 41, a native of Chumphon's Tha Sae district, was arrested at 6:30 am in a house in Ranong.

Police seized as evidence a mobile phone, 51,960 baht in cash,

In addition to his Thung Khai OrBorTor duties, K. Liap worked as a canvasser for a Phu Yai Baan (village chief) who was elected recently in Tambon Thung Khai.

However, the village chief in question told police that he did not believe the attack was connected to K. Liap's canvassing.

Harbor bound. More than 95% of small and medium-sized fishing boats in Songkhla province have gone out of business because of rising diesel oil prices, Songkhla Fishery Association Vice-President Sawai Jeyakhom said on January 10.

K. Sawai said that since diesel oil rose to 30 baht per liter, only about 200 of 2,000 small and medium-sized fishing boats in the province have remained in operation.

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Villagers struggle to revive turtle power

n times past, between November and February, villagers in Mai Khao would see leatherback turtles laying thousands of eggs along the beach, but it has been years since the villagers have seen a leatherback and they want the turtles to come back.

Manoch Saythong, Phu Yai Baan (village chief) of Moo 4, Mai Khao, told the *Gazette*, "The last time villagers saw a leatherback turtle was about a month after the tsunami. That turtle came and laid eggs, but unfortunately none of the eggs hatched."

Knowing that the turtles at Mai Khao were on the verge of being wiped out, a few years ago villagers formed a "turtle walk" group. Volunteers went on turtle patrol along the beach to ensure the area was safe for the mother turtles. With the rapid depletion of the number of leatherbacks, Mai Khao villagers were working hard to protect the remaining turtles' egg-laying habitat.

The villagers maintained the group by themselves until in 2002, JW Marriott Phuket Resort and Spa pledged its support and formed the the Mai Khao Marine

Turtle Foundation, donating 2 million baht to the cause.

Michelle Mouille, Mai Khao Marine Turtle Foundation Coordinator, told the *Gazette*, "About two months ago, people found leatherback tracks in the sand and started looking for the nest, but no one found it."

Leatherback turtles (*der-mochelys coriacea*) are special in that they are the largest living turtle. Fully-grown adults can

grow to 2.6 meters long and weigh as much as 800 kilograms. Mother leatherbacks can remember exactly where they were born, and even after 25 to 30 years they return to the same place to lay eggs of their own – if they still can.

"The main problem," said said Ms Mouille, "is the fishing boats. We have seen turtles get stuck in the fishing nets. The second problem is that there are not

"I think the third problem is the effect of global warming."

While the Phuket Marine Biological Center at Cape Panwa has much experience in raising turtle hatchlings, the main aim of the Mai Khao foundation is for turtles to breed in their natural surroundings.

Leatherbacks in particular are a difficult species to raise in captivity because their skin-shells are prone to infection.

They also succumb to marine pollution and commercial fisheries. Leatherbacks occasionally mistake plastic bags, Styrofoam and balloons for jellyfish and eat them, and they often become entangled in anchor lines and trapped by fishing trawlers.

In April 2003, JW Marriott was presented by Pacific Asia Travel Association (PATA) with the Grand Award for Best Environmental-Education Program for the Mai Khao Marine Turtle Foundation. Since 2003, the foundation has disbursed funds to a number of organizations and projects, including Phuket Marine Biology Center and WWF Thailand, to support turtle conservation.

Other projects the foundation has been involved in include school workshops, beach and reef cleanups and recycling projects – all in the hope of returning Mai Khao to its once turtle-flush state. Many involve local communities and schools.

In February 2007, the foundation launched a project called "Clean Beach, White Sand".

A contractor was employed to clean the eight kilometers of Mai Khao Beach daily.

Thirty rubbish bins were placed along the beachfront and 30 more will be placed in other areas of the beach.

Wooden signboards outlining how long rubbish takes to decompose will be placed at strategic points

This January, the foundation launched a new project called "Environmental Awareness and Solutions". A series of collaborations with Phuket Rajabhat University will take place every two months, starting this month.

The events will comprise education and action in the form of workshops, management projects and clean-ups.

A total of 120 students will attend each two-day workshop, which will be held at Marinate National Park in Thachattchai. The first workshop was held January 17-18, with a beach and reef clean-up slated for January 19.

Ms Mouille explained that although the foundation is based on Mai Khao Beach, it may soon start projects at nearby Nai Yang Beach, working together with the local administration and Sirinath National Park officers.


"We are inviting the national park chief to join our cleanup program," she said.

"We think the turtles will come back soon. We saw one turtle swimming around the Marriott resort a month ago, but it was not coming to lay eggs and we haven't seen it since," said K. Manoch.

"We are keeping the beach clean – we want to see them back," he added.



Last year, a record 16.7 million people visited Macau. This year, tourism officials are forecasting close to 20 million visitors. In 2010, the figure could be 35 million. Fifty percent of Macau's GDP and 70% of the Macau government's budget stem from gambling revenues.



Sweden's best perform a great gig in the sky

igh on a Patong hillside among the luxury surroundings of Villa Santi while a wind-swept stage is being prepared, Cotton Club lead singer Richard Hägar is composed, relaxed and looks much younger than many musicians who have been doing the circuit for as long as he and his band have.

On stage though, Richard's subdued demeanor is cast away as he blasts out a high-energy performance and interacts with the audience as if they are old friends.

Richard is an accomplished jazz musician with solo albums to his credit and has led the Cotton Club band for nearly 25 years. Although they are often hailed as a jazz band, Richard is quick to point out that they are more like a "big band" lineup.

"Our music isn't just jazz. It's a blend of soul, disco and jazz spiced with Las Vegas-style glamor," he said as he sipped ne of Sweden's best-known entertainment institutions the Cotton Club blasted out classic and contemporary hits with a big band lineup when they passed through Phuket for a New Year's concert at Indochine's Villa Santi.

Gazette Editor **Nick Davies** caught up with the band before they made their way onto the stage to entertain an eager, mostly blond-haired crowd on the hillside overlooking Patong.

black coffee and gestured at the older looking band members, who made me feel like I was backstage at a Pink Floyd revival concert.

Although no stranger to being on tour, Richard explained that the concert at Villa Santi was the final leg of their first proper Asian tour as a band, which had been a unique experience.

"We travel a lot but most of our gigs are in Sweden and around Scandinavia, where we mainly do club performances.

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I've heard that there are many Swedes living here though and I think we'll be playing to about 300 of them tonight," he said.

As well as giving energetic performances on stage, Richard is also the band's frontman for arranging gigs and managing the band. "I do most of the organizing myself. I've been doing it for so many years that I have a long list of contacts and I haven't really found a manager who does it better than I do," he said.

Even though the band isn't

signed to a label or tied to a producer, they have the discovered a recipe for endurance and become a permanent fixture on the Scandinavian music scene with regular stage performances.

Richard is modest about the band's "greatness" and is far from pretentious about what they have become.

"We are not superstars. I mean, we'll never make a load of money, but we do make great music.

"We have a big band attitude. We all like

Frank Sinatra and Sammy Davis classics and take that kind of approach to the music we play, but we spice it up with elements of soul, funk and disco," he added.

Over the past 25 years the Cotton Club has performed all kinds of concerts, released a number of CDs and entertained at corporate events, festivals, TV shows and private parties.

For future musical adventures Richard

wants to pursue the old school theme with an entertainment orchestra, writing music as well as playing it.

"Bands like us do mainly cover songs. The record business has turned into something very different from before. With DJs sitting in their basements and one girl doing some vocals to produce today's hits, it's much more difficult for real musicians to maneuver in the music industry," Richard lamented.

"Some of the guys in the band write music for other artists. I see the Cotton Club as a bearer of tradition. We're classical musicians like the Philharmonic Orchestra. I see us as much more akin to them in the way we make and play our music than anything related to the techno generation of musicians," he said.

Part of the group's secret to success is Richard's stable influence as a band leader and a level head for business. When the band is on tour, he spends much of his time managing things rather than becoming a party animal.

"Some of the guys had a night out in Patong last night and came back with some wild stories. I stayed in though. Some of them get by with just a few hours sleep a week but I just can't do it

any more," he said.

Kayo calls herself a guest artist and good friend of the band who takes any chance she can to join them on tour.

"We've known each other for a very long time, so we work very well together," she said. These guys are so experienced and we've performed together so often that it's very easy to make quick changes in a song lineup and improvise if needed."

Kayo is one of Sweden's most versatile celebrity entertainers. She was born to a Swedish mother and Nigerian jazz musician father who gave Kayo her name, which translates as "future happiness". She's certainly found happiness in a life dedicated to live entertainment.

She started out at six years old as a ballet dancer and became

a professional at 16, traveling Europe with dance troupes and Swedish celebrities. By then, Kayo was also becoming a teenage pop star, joining the band Freestyle at age 14 to produce a string of hits in the early 90s.

This encouraged Kayo to embark on a full-time singing career with record company Swemix, showing off her versatility with swinging pop reggae, disco, rap, hip hop, and, of course, some soul. Her second album *Kärleksland* (Loveland) was sung in Swedish and reached No. 4 in the Swedish charts.

After changing direction to act on the big screen and present TV shows and news, she became a household name in Sweden. Then it was back to the real love of her life, music. She teamed up with two other divas to form Afrodite.

The female trio were close contestants in the Eurovision Song Contest and released a funky album with their Eurovision Song Contest entry *Never Let it Go*.

Kayo and the Cotton Club were certainly a powerful combination of talent, pulling out all the stops on their hilltop stage to treat the audience to glamorous performance that began with Kayo decked out in a silver sequined dress belting out Shirley Bassey's *Diamonds are Forever*.

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A mother's choice

here are an estimated 6.5 billion people on the planet. Most of us were born as nature intended, but the past three decades have seen many changes in how, when and where mothers give birth.

After playing an active role in delivering his daughter at home, Gazette editor Nick Davies looks at the options available for mothers-to-be and compares childbirth trends in Thailand, the UK and the US.

n Thailand, the tradition of a mother giving birth at home in the village surrounded by friends and family is now almost a thing of the past. These days, most mothers-to-be are booked into a hospital and a delivery date is predicted soon after they become pregnant.

Although most Thai mothers now give birth in hospital, many still recover from childbirth in the traditional way: by spending the first week or so after giving birth in a homemade herbal sauna, drinking only hot herbal tea. This traditional post-natal care called yoo fai (staying with fire) is believed to help the womb return to its normal state after the strain of pregnancy and birth.

When the time comes to give birth, many Thai mothers now often choose having a cesarean section operation rather than giving birth naturally, even though some of those mothers, especially if they are from rural areas, may themselves have been born in basic surroundings, receiving traditional pre- and postnatal care.

In the UK, delivering babies by cesarean is considered a last resort, mostly performed in cases when the mother is seriously ill during labor, such as having dangerously high blood pressure or blood poisoning.

Caesarean sections are also considered for births of very large babies, breech births (baby's head up instead of down – that is, feet first), or when there are complications with twins.

Even when a baby is overdue, UK doctors often wait up to 10 days after the baby's due date before artificially inducing labor by breaking the waters and injecting the mother with labor-inducing hormones.

Dr Kittipan Tanthivej said that about half the mothers who give birth at Mission Hospital Phuket do so by cesarean operation, many choosing to have the operation due to traditional beliefs.

"Some mothers may want to make sure they avoid giving birth on days considered unlucky by them or their family.

"They may have visited a Buddhist monk and told that a particular day will be auspicious to give birth, so they ask the doctor to deliver the baby on that day, even if it means having a cesarean operation," he explained.

"Wednesday is generally considered an unlucky day to give birth, whereas in 2006, the year of the pig, many mothers wanted to give birth on a Friday," he added.

"Another reason women choose to give birth by cesarean is because they are worried about the pain they may feel if they give birth naturally, but, in fact, the pain following surgery is much worse than giving birth naturally.

"Although mothers can request to give birth by cesarean, we do not encourage or recommend this kind of birth-day planning. It is much better for mother and baby if the baby is born naturally, when he or she is ready," Dr Kittipan said.

Childbirth specialist Dr Rujirek Leelanapapat said that about half the babies born at Bangkok Hospital Phuket are delivered by cesarean. "We have a mixture of Thai and international patients giving birth here. Most foreigners prefer to give birth naturally, but overall about 50% of the mothers who give birth here choose to have a cesarean, often because they see it as a convenient option," she said.

"Many expectant mothers choose a cesarean because they are worried about the pain of natural childbirth and they want to avoid giving birth on a Wednesday or Sunday, as they believe these are not as auspicious as other days," she added.

In the UK, however, by the 1990s the British National Health Service (NHS) was giving



women more choice as to how and where they gave birth. Only about 10% of babies were delivered by cesarean section.

Women could have their baby at home with a team of midwives present and were encouraged to find which position made them most comfortable for delivery, meaning less need for anesthetics and stitches.

The past 30 years has seen a growing choice in methods of pain relief for mothers in labor, from gas and injections to acupuncture or simply finding a comfortable birthing position.

In the 1970s, women just had to cope the best they could with whatever pain relief was recommended. The most common anesthetics then were pethidine and entonox (gas and air), which relax and numb the whole body.

In the 1980s, epidurals (anesthetic injected into the spine) became popular, giving the woman more control of her body. However, she could not move around easily and the numbness caused some women to lose the urge to push effectively, sometimes meaning that forceps had to be used on the baby's head.

In the UK, a currently

> popular pain-relief device, which can be bought in pharmacies or even rented from the NHS, is a **TENS** (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation) machine. This is a small battery-operated device strapped to the lower back that encourages the body to produce endorphins by a hand-held control, allowing the woman to easily move around and control her own pain relief.

> Giving birth in a tub of warm water is becoming an increasingly popular method of childbirth, as it is said to lessen the need for any kind of pain killer. Free from the confines of a bed, mother is lighter in the water and she can assume any birthing position she likes.

> Water births have been popular in the US and the UK since the early '90s with more than three-quarters of the UK's NHS hospitals and more than 300 US hospitals offering water births to mothers.

> None of Phuket's hospitals offer water births, though Samitivej and Bumrungrad hospitals in Bangkok do.

> Being present to daughter's birth was comeing present for my pletely unintentional – as was my wife's pregnancy – but I'm very glad it worked out the way it did.

I feel privileged that I was there for my daughter's birth. It was just the three of us: me, my wife and our impatient daughter in our one-room Bangkok apartment on a Monday morning.

My daughter was so impatient that by the time we had realized that my wife was in fullblown labor with her contractions coming hard and fast, there was no way she could get out of our room, down the stairs and into a taxi.


I just had to stand by the bed like an anxious goalkeeper ready to catch my daughter while my wife went on with her contractions. When our daughter arrived, the first thing she received was a cold shower as there were no hot towels or warm water in our apartment. This was after I'd turned the room upside down looking for some string and a pair of scissors to tie and cut the umbilical cord.

We eventually made it to the hospital once we'd both changed our clothes and wrapped our baby in hers.

The hospital staff were very confused when we arrived with baby in arm rather than still in tummy, and it took quite a bit of explaining before the situation became clear.

My wife spent the next few days in hospital under observation but both mother and baby were fine. In fact, my wife seemed to be in better shape than other mums in the ward, who were all bed-ridden because of the scalpel cuts they'd received to speed things along during labor.

We were lucky that there



Ideally, we should have been in the company of experienced medical professionals, but, back then, I would not have been allowed in the delivery room had we gone to hospital.

My wife was glad that I was with her and that she wasn't surrounded by strangers and scary equipment in a strange room. Free from the confines of a hospital bed and without worrying about looking silly, she was able to try different birthing positions and didn't feel the need for pain killers.

Government hospitals in Thailand still operate with a policy of not allowing friends or relatives to accompany the laboring mother during birth, but in the UK it has been common practice for many years to get the father involved as much as possible, accompanying his wife to pre-natal classes and allowing him to be present and offer support during the birth.

"At Mission Hospital we allow a family member to be present during birth and they are allowed to take photographs and record a video if they like," said Dr Kittipan.

Bangkok Hospital Phuket has a similar policy. "We allow the husband or a relative to be in the operation room and they can take pictures, but we don't recommend taking video as births are usually quite messy, " said Dr Rujirek.

My wife's theory regarding the fears that many mothers-tobe have about giving birth is that many women grow up these days without ever seeing an actual birth before they have children themselves.


"If I hadn't seen other women giving birth in the traditional way without ever needing pain killers or an operation, I may have been scared about giving birth and considered a cesarean, but I knew from what I'd seen that it's something most women go through without any problems," she said.

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

n his previous column, Soapbox Sid described what the terrifying vehicles people drive on Phuket's chaotic roads tell us about the drivers within.


But this is a broad and complex subject, so in part two, Sid identifies a further set of road warriors to whom a wide berth is the least you can offer.


Shopping for a feminine perspective

ff the bat, there are two good things to say about *Bangkok* Blondes (Bangkok Books, Bangkok, 2007, 234pp). One is that the book has a beautiful cover; two is that it is a collection of stories by Western women living in Bangkok. This makes for a refreshing change from the stacks of books penned by expat men who write bargirl novels, detective novels or, occasionally, bargirl-detective novels.

Most of these women represent the upper echelons of expat society. They are ladies who lunch at Central Chidlom, shop at the Emporium and pamper themselves at luxury spas. They live in grand apartments and have maids and drivers who address them as "madame'. A few are struggling English teachers married to Thai men. None of them are Bangkok's answer to Alice Munro, the world's greatest shortstory writer.

But that is holding them to excessively high standards. The 14 women writers represented in this book are members of the Bangkok Women's Writers Group, founded in 2000. Except for two tales in this book, they are not writing traditional short stories, but rather, first-person anecdotes about life in the Big Mango.

It took me a while to figure this out. Thus, I was vastly annoyed by the first two stories. "Me, Myself and the Thai



Girl" is a fluffy piece about a Western woman getting a Thai hair extension; "The Last of the Great White Lovers" is a va-

pid paean to a boyfriend. By the third and fourth stories, things began to click. "Ghostbusters" is the comical tale of a farang woman having lunch with her Thai girlfriends at the Emporium's Greyhound Cafe. She confesses to having repeated nightmares at her apartment. This is because it is an old apartment and haunted by ghosts, her girlfriends say knowingly before convincing her to perform an exorcism on her balcony.

This is followed by "No Horns, Please. We're Thai", which is a wonderfully-precise and colorful description of driving from an Ekamai soi down Sukhumvit to Rama IX to the expressway, then to a school in Chang Wattana and back again. The author, Martha Scherzer, tells the tale of her trip in vivid, humorous prose. This is someone who loves Bangkok and revels in its sights, sounds and smells.

The best of these stories are sharp insights into the everyday life of expatri-

ate women. Three stories by Chloe Trindall on "Love Bangkok Style" tell the story of her romance with a Thai man on Khao San Rd that eventually leads to marriage and emigration to Australia. Two stories by the lone Thai member of the group, Jess Tansutat, address the romantic dilemma faced by her farang women friends in Bangkok.

"The choices for decent men are limited here," she writes. "There are several possible fac-

tors. Although Thai and Asian men are generally sweet and gentle, they can also be a bit immature and too feminine. The ones who are good looking, dress well and smart can turn out to be the 'sorry, lady, I'm gay' type. There's also the challenge of finding someone who can cross the linguistic and cultural barriers."

Then of course there's the competition. "For me, the 'city of the angels' seems to have just too many angels. Thai women are getting more and more beautiful, chic and daring – just like the women in other dynamic and trendy cities, such as Shanghai, Hong Kong and Singapore."



from the convenience store had followed him back to his hotel and explained to the reception staff that the amount he had given them did not cover the total cost of the items he had taken, even though Mr A was not informed of this at the time.

Police filed charges of theft against Mr A under the Thai Penal Code, section 335(1), which states that:

"Whoever commits theft in any of the following situations: "(1) At night

"That person shall be punished with imprisonment of one to five years and a fine of between 2,000 and 10,000 baht."

Mr A made bail and was free to leave the police station. However, he had to surrender his passport, which meant that he missed his flight and couldn't return home. His girlfriend decided to also delay her return home and wait until the case was resolved.

The case was dealt with relatively quickly thanks to the help of a police officer, along with the embassy and the representative consul on Phuket of Mr A's home country. The case was brought before the court and Mr A pleaded guilty to the charge, saying that he was drunk and became confused with his Thai banknotes.

He admitted that he may have not paid for his goods in full, but he was not made aware of this in the store and left without knowing he had committed any offense.

As the case was of an unintentional crime, Mr A was originally given a sentence of oneyear imprisonment and a fine of 5,000 baht. This was reduced to a 2,500 baht fine and a suspended sentence with two years on probation because Mr A had pleaded guilty.

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Collective effort in conservation deserves credit

Co-ordinated efforts by the Phuket Provincial Fisheries Office, Rassada Tambon Administration Organization and other government agencies and private-sector groups to save the remaining 500 rai of mangrove forest in that subdistrict are a positive development that should serve as an example to other communities on the island trying to protect coastal resources from encroachment (see Inside Story, pp 4-5).

One of the very few positive results of the December 2004 tsunami disaster was that it put in motion steps to redress the decades of gross injustice perpetrated by corrupt Land Office officials and wealthy investors against poor coastal communities, many of which have occupied land for generations yet still lack even the most basic land use documents, let alone title deeds.

Some communities along the Andaman Coast, especially in Phang Nga, found themselves being evicted from land that should rightfully be theirs even while they faced the overwhelming challenge of recovering from the tsunami disaster.

Fortunately, new legislation finally gives these communities some say in coastal development that will affect their lives – even if it usually falls short of granting them property rights.

The first notable case in the region came last year at Klong Son Beach on Phang Nga's Koh Yao Yai, where a small marina to service a luxury real estate development was being built. Local residents with the help of the Human Rights Commission managed to have the plan scrapped, even after it had been fully approved by all the relevant agencies.

The same commission is now involved in ironing out disputes related the controversial second phase of the Chalong Bay Marina expansion and a private-sector development planned at Cape Yamu.

Of course, the issues involved in such cases are far more complex and far-reaching than the simplistic David and Goliath scenario, which is how many self-styled "environmentalists" like to portray them.

In many cases, corrupt local politicians are quick to take on the mantle of environmentalist when their real goal is nothing more than to line their own pockets by intentionally delaying good projects – or threatening to do so.

In the long run, however, Phuket needs to develop its marine tourism infrastructure. The key is developing these projects with minimal environmental impact and in a way that maximizes benefits to the local communities where they are located. – The Editor

Phuket's traffic woes must end

ix people were killed in accidents during the "Seven Days of Danger" from December 28 to January 3.

Based on the average number of road deaths in previous years and the population of Phuket, the goal of the campaign in Phuket was for no more than three fatalities on the roads, but in the end, there were double that number.

Although these figures may look as if we have failed to reduce the danger on the roads during the holiday season, the reality is that these accidents could have happened at any time.

Some accidents are just impossible to prevent.

Policy handed to me by the central government says that we should not look into these numbers too much, but, rather, we should concentrate on better protection of the people on the roads.

The number of deaths and injuries on the roads has been increasing overall on the island and can be partly attributed to the increasing number of tourists, both Thais and foreigners, coming to Phuket.

The number of flights arriving in Phuket has increased dramatically since 2004.

This high season, we have about 90 flights a day landing in Phuket, excluding charter flights. More than five million tourists visited the island in 2007.

The island is growing quickly because of all the development that is going on.

seems too small to cope with this growth, even if more buildings are added.

Many accidents occur after tourists arrive and head to hotels or beaches by car or motorcycle.

Some tourists say that they enjoy the freedom of Phuket, feeling that they can do whatever they want.

They can end up breaking the law when they drive and do things they would not do in their own countries.

We are constantly working to reduce the number of road accidents and we will continue to do so throughout the year.

Part of our on-going campaigning includes educating hirisk groups, such as students.

The Kusoldharm Foundation and other rescue groups also organize regular first-aid training sessions. **Violence at Saphan Hin**. I usually receive crime reports directly from the commander of Phuket Provincial Police. The latest incident involving teenagers in a shootout at Saphan Hin left one person dead and four injured in the second week of January.

Saphan Hin is a focal point of the island, where fairs, parades and community events are held. There is, however, a lot of crime by people who have moved from other provinces to work in Phuket. Some of these people are teenagers.

I have asked police to clamp down on teenage crime, arresting the teenagers and punishing the parents according to the Youth Act.

Also, parents should not let their children out on motorcycles late at night.



We have co-ordinated with the courts that such offenders will not be able to post bail.

If cases involve drugs or repeat offenses, the criminals will be blacklisted, which can mean stiffer punishments.

Critical bypass. I have heard about plans for three major developments along the bypass road.

The first is opposite Tesco-Lotus. The Boon Thavorn Group is building a department store and conference facilities.

A mall outlet will supposedly be built next to Hill Hut restaurant, near the motocross racing area, although I haven't seen any details or government documents supporting this yet.

The third project is opposite Central Festival Phuket. This is the construction of a homeWorks

store, which is part of the Central Group.

With three more major outlets, the traffic on the bypass road will be greatly affected. There will also be problems with wastewater and precautions will need to be taken to protect against flooding.

Desalination plant woes. I receive updates about the desalination plant from Phuket Provincial Water Supply. However, I haven't heard anything about the plant for a while.

According to the contract drawn up, the plant is supposed to produce 12,000 cubic meters of water a day, although the plant is currently producing only about 8,000m3 of water.

The reason for this lower than expected production is because strong winds and large waves during the monsoon season caused problems with the underwater piping.

Another persistent problem has been electrical blackouts at the plant.

The contract with REQ Water Services Co Ltd [the company contracted to build and run the plant] will need to be rewritten to address these problems.

It may be that the province will request compensation from REQ Water Services because they have been unable to fulfill the terms of their contract.

About 600 million baht was put into this project. I will lean on Phuket Provincial Water Supply to provide updates of the situation.

Mobile unit breakdown. We are still working on the mobile registration unit. We recently launched the service in community areas.

At the moment, though, there are some problems with the computer conneciton that needs to be fixed, so the service has been put no hold until further notice.

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
For those who rely on the Internet to eke out a living, the persistent lack of service makes it impossible to get any work done.

Mid-December, I started hearing grumbles about truly lousy Internet access from people using all sorts of different Internet services all over the island. I attributed the complaints to yet another aberration in specific providers' offerings, much like the "temporary hiccup" described by a senior phone company executive in November.

Then I started monitoring my lines in Patong, Laguna and Chalong. I'm here to tell ya it ain't a hiccup. It's a meltdown – and it's persisted for nearly a month.

People who pay for 2 Mbps lines are getting only 40 to 60 Kbps to international destinations, consistently, every afternoon. They're receiving 2% to 3% of what they're paying for and they're paying through the nose.

Instead of marginal "broadband" speeds of 1,200 to 1,400 Kbps, they're seeing speeds in the dial-up range. I have six different broadband lines, all of which are supposed to deliver 2 Mbps: two CAT ADSL lines in Patong, one TOT and one TT&T line in Patong, a G.SDSL line in Laguna and another CAT ADSL line in Chalong. Every one of them suffers the same malaise.



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None of them delivers more than 150 Kbps in the afternoons. A note about the exceptions: a friend of mine in Rawai insists that he's still seeing 600 to 700 Kbps on his TT&T MaxNet

line, even in the afternoon - it's possible that he's connecting to a server inside Thailand without realizing it. I checked at the latest PC Group Therapy meeting and couldn't find anyone else who's happy with his or her Internet access.

The part that hurts the most: even my beloved CAT ADSL lines, each of which cost a whopping 2,600 baht per month, are sluggish, slowly deteriorating from around 10 am and not returning to normal until 8 pm or 9 pm.

I've pushed CAT ADSL on these pages for almost a year: that particular service has consistently provided the fastest, most-reliable Internet connection on the island. Not any more. My CAT ADSL line in Chalong goes up and down like a... well, like a Phuket Internet connection.

From a consumer's point of view, the problem's simple: the phone companies have put a lot of effort into selling a service, then it seems they have done very

little to provide the "plumbing" that's necessary to keep the service going. In the industry, that's called "oversubscribing". Some places it's called "fraud".

A few months ago, when TOT and TT&T started offering 2 Mbps ADSL lines at 1,000 baht a month - the same price as the old 1 Mbps lines

- consumers believed they were getting a bargain. While TOT and

TT&T sold tons of 2 Mbps lines, they obviously didn't bother to put up the infrastructure necessary to support the ensuing traffic – and they didn't stop selling the service when it became apparent that they couldn't keep up. Instead, we were told, "It's a hiccup," accompanied by unfulfilled promises to provide decent service.

CAT, however, has been very careful to avoid oversubscribing their ADSL service. That's why CAT ADSL lines were reliable and fast – and ex-

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checking email can put a big load on the system. But CAT should have anticipated the demand spike and moved quickly to fix the

Internet speeds start cratering around 10 am, when kids are in school. The Internet cafés are suffering the same slowdowns we're all experiencing.

From a technical point of view, it's hard to tell exactly where the problem lies. My guess is that the phone companies do not have the capacity to handle the increase in demand at all

slower for everybody else. What malarkey.


Demonstrably, the old one did not. As things stand, when it comes Phuket is far behind almost all of the rest of Asia. At the rate we're going, I fear we'll never catch up.


True customers in Bangkok who use websites outside of Thailand connect through TIG's lines. Thus, more than half of the consumer international bandwidth in Bangkok goes through TIG.

Last month I read a newspaper report that explains how TIG is expanding its international capacity significantly, from 17.3 Gbps in 2007 to 30Gbps by the end of 2008.

When I read that report, my jaw dropped. More than half the consumer Internet traffic in Bangkok headed to the outside world is getting squeezed through a 17.3Gbps connection.

To put it in perspective, HKBN, the Hong Kong Broadband Network, currently offers a 1Gbps Internet connection for 6,800 baht per month. Hanaro Telecom in South Korea offers a 37Mbps line for 1,000 baht a month (see the website www. telecommagazine.com/article.

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Jaguar roars back in style

he XF, Jaguar's replacement of the S-Type, has been doing the rounds at motor shows before its official launch later this year. Judging by the acclaim it has been receiving, Jaguar is onto a winner with this new car.

Ian Callum, design director of Jaguar, said, "The XF is a stage in a personal journey for me. It has always been my career goal to return Jaguar to its

rightful place as leader in automotive design. Cars like the original XJ6 left a lasting legacy and my ambition has been to create something as seminal. The XF is that car."

The XF is a

four-door, five-seat sports car efficiency, excellent performance with strong coupe overtones. Jaguar's new design language, which debuted with the new XK sports model, is applied to the sedan for the first time in the XF.

Jaguar claims that the XF has a class-leading interior size and is longer and wider than its nearest "dimensional" competitor - the Audi A6 - with even greater advantages over the BMW 5-series, Lexus GS300 and the Mercedes-Benz E-Class.

As well as a magnificent interior, the body styling and design was developed using computational fluid dynamics (CFD) before the car had even been in a wind tunnel.

Every surface area from the outer skin to the lightweight, composite undertray and the cooling airflow was optimized using CFD.

The higher, squarer tail is more aerodynamic than a lower, rounded one. The XF's coupelike roofline and raised trunk lip

improve airflow over the rear of the car. The drag coefficient is 0.29 and the front-to-rear lift balance is zero.

The XF will be available with a choice of four engines: a 2.7-liter V6 turbo-diesel, 3L V6 gasoline, 4.2L normally-aspirated gas V8 and a supercharged V8 gasoline version, depending on the market.

Mick Mohan, XF chief program engineer, said, "The XF's

The 2.7 diesel is likely to be the most popular model in most mar-By Jeff Heselwood kets, offering high

and superb fuel economy. Producing in excess of 200bhp (152kW) and 435Nm of torque, the compact graphite-iron cylinder block and aluminum heads

make it the lightest diesel engine of its type and size. This makes a significant contribution to the XF's overall power-toweight ratio, performance and economy.

Performance is impressive. The 2.7 diesel offers a 0-100kmh time of a little over eight seconds and a top speed of 230kmh. The gasoline models are slightly superior, but not dramatically so. The supercharged model, however, storms to 100kmh from rest in 5.4 seconds.

cally to a maximum of 250kmh. Emissions are controlled in the diesel by twin variable-geometry turbochargers with electronic





control, exhaust-gas recirculation and a variable-swirl intake system.

Two small turbochargers, with drive-by-wire throttle control, gives a quicker, smoother response than using one larger unit.

A six-speed automatic transmission is standard on all versions of the XF. There is no manual gearbox option, which may upset some purists. However, the transmission is a key element to the XF's sporting character, with adaptive gear-shift strategies that respond to road conditions and the way the car is being driven.

Nok Air quietly grounds Phuket-Haad Yai route

PHUKET: Nok Air has quietly suspended its loss-ridden Phuket-Haad Yai service, once again making it impossible to fly between Southern Thailand's two busiest airports, the Gazette has learned.

Nok Air Executive Vice-President for Marketing Sehapan Chumsai on January 3 told the Gazette there were not enough passengers to continue the service, which began June 6 last year using 150-seat Boeing 737-400 aircraft.

The service was terminated on November 15 after it became apparent that the service was no longer profitable even after the start of the tourism high season, he said.

Flights were typically only half full and the service showed no increase in passenger traffic

during its initial six months, convincing the airline to discontinue it, K. Šehapan added.

"About 80% of passengers were local Thais.

"Even after the start of high season there was no increase in the number of foreign tourists [using the service]," he said.

Rival carrier One-Two-Go did not book any passengers on the flight despite a code-sharing agreement between the two airlines after they were both granted approval to launch the service about the same time last year, K. Sehapan said.

An aircraft of about 70 seats was suitable for the route, but Nok Air has no plans to buy smaller aircraft in order to service the route, he said.

Before Nok Air, Phuket Air serviced the route with a 64-seat Japanese-built NAMC YS-11 turboprop aircraft.

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NAI HARN: Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club, the bestknown resort in Nai Harn dominating the north end of the beach, has officially been rebranded as The Royal Phuket Yacht Club, now owned and operated by Puravarna Hotels & Resorts.

Although news of the takeover has circulated around the island for more than a year, the quiet, official launch was on December 1, with the official release still to come. "We're still setting up our own branch offices and the formal release [of the official rebranding] will be within the next month," a spokesperson at the resort told the Gazette on January 15.

For more than a decade the landmark resort was operated under Starwood's Le Meridien brand, which has maintained its Le Meridien Phuket Resort between Patong and Karon.

"There will be no major or dramatic changes to the estate or design, just the regular improvements and enhancements that any good operator would do to any property it takes over," the spokesperson said.

"We will be maintaining the same high standards and marketing to the same high-end clientele, and we hope to continue the fine performance of the resort," the spokesperson added.



Le Royal Meridien Phuket Yacht Club in Nai Harn has officially been rebranded as The Royal Phuket Yacht Club.

The resort is known to be the first on the island to be bestowed "five-star" status.

Although declining to provide financial details of the takeover of the resort, the spokesperson was clear that Puravarna Hotels & Resorts owns and manage the resort independent of the umbrella company, Puravarna Holdings plc.

Puravarna Holdings reportedly bought the hotel from US investment bank Lehman Bros for 1.3 billion baht and is developing a "six-star" project adjacent to the resort, currently refered to

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simply as Puravarna.

According to the Puravarna website, the project comprises "a total of approximately 100 luxury villas sold with 90-year fully transferable leasehold rights" as well as a "total of 60 Suites sold with leasehold and freehold" and "110 Hotel Ocean Suites".

The suites and villas of the first phase have sold out, with next phase of 25 two-bedroom pool villas to be launched in May. Registrations of interest will open March 15. The two-bedroom pool villas will be priced at US\$1.5 million.

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he latest reports issued on the state of the British residential housing market have all been negative, but national prices have fallen by only small percentages.

When any market starts to move in a negative direction, it is important to recognize the underlying factors. An important point was made in a recent report issued by the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS). There is still a housing shortage and the picture is being distorted by the "credit crunch". Banks, building societies, credit card is-

suers and others involved in financing the consumer have raised their credit standards sharply. Northern

Rock, a UK building society with a small capital base, used the wholesale money markets as a funding vehicle to turn itself into the fifth largest mortgage lender. It was a quick way to be-

come a major player without having to increase the retail side of the business.

Northern Rock borrowed large sums of money in the wholesale money markets, usually for short periods of time such as 90 days, and lent this onwards to finance mortgages. It broke all the fundamental rules of banking, including, "You never borrow

allows its banks to collapse. The British Central Bank (Bank of England) had to intervene. It announced that all depositors' funds were covered by a 100% unconditional government guarantee.

short to lend long." In normal times, Northern Rock would have probably "gotten away" with this shaky business model – but times are not normal.

Late July-early August 2007 saw the realization that

there was a credit crunch based on dubious lending and a host of other factors.

Northern Rock's business model was exposed to the risk. To quote the legendary Warren Buffet, "It is only when the tide goes out that you learn who's been swim-

naked." ming

No well-managed economy

Several players in financial markets looked at Northern Rock with interest, but to date have backed off. This situation is subject to European Union (EU) regulations. EU governments are allowed to lend to companies if absolutely necessary, but there are strict time limits. These regulations are in place to stop situations in which member states, to curry favor, may end up subsidizing "national champions".

Unless a suitor can be found for Northern Rock, the British government's only option is nationalization. The UK government does not want to be involved in a building society. It may well be that Northern Rock will soon be sold to some acceptable party. The taxpayer may bear the brunt of the loss.

Banks and other lenders have simply lost that long-held trust that they held in each other. It will return, but it will take some time and substantial central bank involvement.

A prime example is the Euro zone Central Bank (ECB) involvement in a multi-centralbank strategy to weaken the impact of the credit crunch. In December, the ECB effectively injected the Euro equivalent of US\$501 billion into money markets. This amount shows how seriously central banks view this problem.

This year is going to be a difficult year to assess. There are many counter-currents moving simultaneously. For example, in the US, there is evidence of a slowdown in the employment market. Unemployment rose from 4.7% in November to 5% in December.

Most economists agree that if the US can keep its unemployment rate at reasonably low levels a recession can be avoided. The logic behind this is basic: lower unemployment means a larger number of people earning an income, which they will spend, keeping the economy afloat.

It appears as if the US Federal Reserve (central bank) will have to continue reducing interest rates to stimulate the economy. However, inflationary pressures are rising - oil at record prices is only one example, while food prices and many commodities are contributing to this increased pressure.

The increase in gold prices to record levels is indicative of fears of inflation and US dollar weakness.

The US, EU members and other countries have been highly vocal about the level at which the Chinese government is keeping the yuan. The Chinese are gradually allowing their currency to appreciate in value. The weak yuan had one redeeming factor: it caused deflationary pressures to its trading partners.

Markets are having difficulty in assessing prices. This covers a wide range of investment vehicles including currencies, long-term interest rates, stock markets and commodities, in almost every market. This, in turn, is leading to wide-ranging volatility, as the true picture unfolds. And there is one certainty: markets hate uncertainty.

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Foreign fighter takes on the Thais

any Westerners come to Thailand for an easy life. For one American, though, life here is anything but easy. For 28-year-old Phuket resident Aaron Fisher (pictured), getting kneed and elbowed is part of his everyday life as a professional Muay Thai fighter.

Aaron has been living and fighting on the island for almost two years. For those who are new to the martial art, Muay Thai is the national sport of Thailand. Sometimes referred to as "the art of the eight limbs", as competitors are allowed to use their hands, elbows, shins and knees to inflict pain during the course of five three-minute rounds.

Spending his days as a Muay Thai fighter is a far cry from Aaron's previous life as a machinist in Toledo, Ohio. Aaron said, "I was training with Sean Douglas in America and he was already living and fighting in Thailand. I came here because I wanted to train with him and to better myself in Muay Thai. It's hard because you have to train for eight hours a day, but it's



worth it.

Being a pro Muay Thai fighter is an unconventional way for a Westerner to make a living. There are numerous foreign Muay Thai fighters in Phuket, but only a handful actually live here permanently. According to Aaron, "The Thais have an advantage because they start fighting so young. I think they look at me and they underestimate me because I'm a farang, but once the fight starts, it doesn't matter who you are."

In Thailand, children start training for Muay Thai at a young age. It is common to see seven-year-old children engaging in full-contact bouts. This puts Westerners at an immediate disadvantage. At seven years old, the closest most Western boys get to real combat is pulling girls' hair in a school playground. Aaron said, "For Thai people it's normal, but a lot of tourists are surprised by how young children start fighting here."

Aaron's first fight in Thailand was against an opponent with over 100 fights' experience. He survived five grueling rounds only to lose by decision – and he has not looked back since. Visitors to the island are understandably shocked when Aaron reveals that he is a professional Muay Thai fighter. "They are amazed. They

don't believe that anyone from America would actually come here and do that."

The Chalong Chi camp, sometimes referred to as the TigerPitt, where Aaron is based, is co-owned by Sean Douglas, Sean's wife Paweena Sripan and Cameron Mackenzie. The Sripan family has been involved in Muay Thai for over 200 years and Paweena's father and uncles have fought at the legendary Lumpini Stadium in Bangkok, as has her husband Sean. Paweena knows a thing or two about Muay Thai

Paweena said, "When [Aaron] first came here, I could see that he was a good fighter, but what refight on the Burmese ally impresses me about him is that whenever I offer him a fight, he takes it. He fights all the time and has never turned down a fight."

Dee Suk Da, a veteran of more than 200 Muay Thai bouts, shed some light on how seasoned Thai fighters have taken to Aaron. "Opinion is divided. Personally, I have nothing against them," he said.

Confirming Aaron's earlier suspicion, Dee Suk Da added, "I like to fight [farang] because I regard it as an easier fight. However, farangs like to punch, whereas traditional Muay Thai is all about kicks and knees."

As if living and fighting in Thailand were not enough, Aaron has an even greater challenge ahead of him. He is planning to fight on the Burmese border during the Songkran festival in April this year.

Every year in Mae Sot, an event is held to commemorate the history of conflict between Thailand and Myanmar. Fighters from both nations compete against each other using a style known as muay kad cheuk – a combination of Muay Thai and its Burmese equivalent, lethwei.

Bouts have less rules than conventional Muay Thai and fighters wrap their hands with a mix of gauze and hemp rope instead of using boxing gloves. Unlike traditional boxing gloves, which are designed to soften the impact of blows and protect the knuckle, this wrapping serves to increase the severity of a fighter's punches. Head butts and groin strikes are also encouraged

and the only way to win is by knockout.

"I'm really looking forward to it. It's something I've always wanted to do and something most people just wouldn't dream

of doing," said Aaron.




April this year.

About his daily routine, Aaron said, "I live and train at the Chalong Chi camp in Chalong. On weekdays, I wake up at 6:30 am, then at 7 am I go on a 10.5kilometer road run. After that, I will skip for 20 minutes and then jump tire [jumping up and down on a large tire] for 20 minutes. Then it's bag and pad work, sparring, sit-ups and push-ups, normally finishing at 10 am.

"I try and get a few hours sleep in the afternoon and then at 4 pm I start all over again with another road run," he added.

THALANG: January 13 marked the first day of football play in the Phuket Fair Play Junior League, which is being organized by Youth Football Home (YFH), a registered children's charity in tambon Thepkrasattri, Thalang.

The LLL batted out their 35 overs to record a total of 208 runs for seven wickets.


Stuart Reading made a quick 29 runs from 22 deliveries. For the bowling side, the day was not so rosy.



ow that 2008 has arrived and a blank page sits on my desk, it's a good time to reflect on what's needed for the property industry to prosper in the coming year. Phuket is experiencing population and economic booms. Such growth has positive and negative impacts.

While it's important to view the cup half full, there will not be improvements in Phuket without serious discussion about what isn't working on our island.

The island's infrastructure lags behind the times in key areas such as public transport, roadways, and electricity and water supply. Take a drive along the coast and the multiplying mazes of cables have taken on a life of their own.

The precious commodity of seaside views now looks like an electrician's nightmare. Regionally and internationally, resort destinations look to develop underground cabling and present a pristine natural environment. In Phuket, there is no evidence of such an initiative.

Parking is a growing concern. Trying to park at the airport or finding a space in Patong or Surin is troublesome. There is a lack of public parking or expansion of existing fa-

cilities.

While tourist numbers rise, street vendors and taxi drivers stake themselves permanently in areas that were once used for parking. Economic prosperity has seen an increase in the number of vehicles in Phuket. Ample

street parking, larger-scale public parking in high-traffic areas and multi-level parking structures are urgently needed.

Coming into this high season, congestion on the island is reaching new levels. Whereas

There are problems with water supplies, law and order, deforestation, garbage collection, drainage and the ability of the local educational system to provide skilled graduates to work in Phuket's rocketing economy.

This island is reliant on tourism; offshoots, such as property, transport and the service industries, remain dependent on stability and growth.

It is important to provoke dialog and advocate change. Phuket is a great place to live – it's my home and my future – but it's not perfect. Here's to the new year and working towards a better island, tackling each issue, one day at a time.

Construction Update

Kho En roadwork complete by March



MAI KHAO: Roadwork to make the notorious Kho En "death bend" on Thepkrasattri Rd safer is about 40% complete; the section of road should be ready by the end of February, Saroj Suwinchai, director of the provincial office of the Highways Department, has told the Gazette.

The Kho En curve is a notorious stretch of Thepkrasattri Rd that in July 2006 was blocked by angry protestors, despite being part of the only thoroughfare on and off the island.

"The new curve will be about 440 meters long. We are reducing the sharpness of the curve to make it easier for drivers to navigate," said K. Saroj.

"In the contract between our office and private company Chaiyakorn Co Ltd, it was agreed that construction would start June 28 and be completed by December 24, 2007 – 180 days.

"However, a new contract had to be drawn up, extending the date of completion by 60 days, because there was a delay in acquiring the land," he added.

The roadwork will cost a total of 15.1 million baht, he said. While the work is underway, northbound motorists will be

detoured to the southbound lanes. The detour will ensure worker safely, he said.



Sexing up a small space

The wanted a problem. He wanted a house that was spacious, but he didn't have much space to work with on his plot of land near Laem Hin. He also wanted a home that was both a private retreat and a place for friends to gather. Together with his architect, Santi Tantangtrong, they came up with a new design that solved these problems: the "sexy home".

K. Santi said, "Arun gave me the idea that he wanted an airy Thai house and that the house should be in modern Thai style. So the design has a large, open terrace on the second floor, and a lot of space in the middle." The home, an L-shape with an area of 350 square meters, has three bedrooms, a dining room, living room and two spare rooms.

Modern Thai style, to K. Santi, is airy, clear and clean. "Modern in my idea is something that looks easy," he said. Locallymade, modern materials including cement and steel were substituted for the wood used in traditional Thai homes to save costs and maintenance headaches. The floor is polished concrete in a natural earth tone.

The "sexy" elements, K. Santi says, are in the small details such as the windows and lighting, as well as the blend of open and private spaces. There are places that are seen clearly, but other parts remain a mystery

- just like a new lover, it might be said. "It's not a showy home, yet

it's not secretive either," said K. Santi.

The second-floor master bedroom and en suite bathroom are the home owner's refuge. A large window spanning the length of the bathtub provides views to the greenery outside, while the high ceilings, white tile and glass

shower doors create a more spacious, light ambiance to the room.

"I spend most of the time in bathroom," said K. Arun, "as I feel like I'm living among nature when I look outside – the green field view makes me feel very relaxed."

The upstairs roof terrace, accessible by an outdoor spiral staircase, is the main social area, offering sea views and lots of space to mix and mingle. It was left uncovered to give a more open feel, said K. Santi.

For the living and dining areas on the main floor, K. Santi says that the design is a contrast of modern and "back to nature". He says it's a "normal Thai house" that is easy, not luxurious, designed to suit the owner's lifestyle.

Reflecting the home's dual purpose – private and social – the walls are painted in a bold blend




of pastels, earth tones and strong colors. K. Santi explains that he selected his favorite simple and natural colors, such as soft purple and pink. K. Arun adds that the earthy orange used in the bathroom is selectively applied to look "hot" and to give contrast to the room.

Overall, the home looks smart, soft and smooth, K. Arun explained. And just as a mysterious new woman in the picture might cause some chatter among friends, the home's design has created a buzz.

Right, history time. In 1768, when Admiral Louis de Bougainvillea traveled around the Pa-

vine that now bears his name, it was the botanical highlight of the voyage.

Through the ensuing years, this distinctive Brazilian beauty has become a popular tropical plant.

Now that it's been crossbred to produce hundreds of variations, the mix of colors is amazing.

From pale green and white, to orange, purple and crimson. Some plants have two colors on one stalk.

Surprisingly, the brightest parts of the plant aren't flowers - they're just bracts (leaves of a different color) clustered together. It does have flowers, but the flowers are a bit pathetic and insignificant – tiny white tubular things that get lost among the brightly-colored leaves.

Given the right conditions, a bougainvillea will grow like a bat out of hell.

worshiper that isn't fussy about soil; even poor, sandy soil will do the job.

I've got one at home that, despite constant pruning, is growing so fast that I'm going to have to put in a cage – literally.

I've seen these cages – the plants are trained to grow straight up. At a certain height, they are allowed to spread out like an umbrella.

They look a little strange in the early stages, but later on, when they start cascading down over the umbrella-frames edges, the results are awesome.

These plants can grow into handsome trees. Bougainvilleas can be truly spectacular – and all this from virtually zero human help. What could be better -aplant that thrives on neglect.

As well as accepting being generally uncared for, they can handle being attacked mercilessly with pruning shears and will come back with even more color. Larger bits that have been pruned off can then be stuck in the ground. With a little patience, they will start the cycle all over again.

The bougainvillea would be the last plant on the planet to moan - French, British and Swedish complainers could learn a lot from it. In fact, Charles Dickens' line should be posted above every bar stool in Britain, but then people would starting whinging about Charles Dickens. Come to think of it – stay where you are. I'm going out for a beer I can enjoy.
