More tsunamiwarning buoys to be deployed

PHUKET CITY: The National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) has received 165 million baht from the central government to install two more tsunami-warning buoys in the Andaman Sea.

They are to be installed by the middle of this year, NDWC Director Dr Smith Dharmasaroja told a conference in Phuket City on January 21. The conference, at the Royal Phuket City Hotel from January 21 to 24, was held to simultaneously update a total of 77 key figures in the region.

At the seminar were Phuket Vice-Governor Tri Augkaradacha, the directors of 24 schools in Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Ranong, Trang and Satun.

Also present were officers from Phuket office of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM – Phuket), the Provincial Fisheries Office, Phuket Provincial Education Office, the NDWC and the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology.

Dr Smith confirmed that the budget was approved the day before the seminar, on January 20.

"The two buoys will be about 250 to 300 kilometers from Phuket, closer to shore than the one already installed, which is about 1,000km from the coast.

"They will give us better and faster information than the old buoy; the Meteorological Department will be responsible for making sure they are function-

ing," explained Dr Smith.

"The buoys will confirm whether a tsunami is approaching, and will be critical in making the decision whether to issue a tsunami warning," he added.

"We must hurry because there have been many earthquakes in the region and foreigners trust our information more than they have before," he said.

"We have to open the bidding for contractors to build and install the buoys soon," he said.

He also expressed concern about the system of warning towers throughout the six tsunamiaffected provinces.

"Many areas still need more warning towers and some islands still do not have any warning towers at all.

"But it's difficult for us to do anything now because we have to ask for more budget from the government, although we have received many requests from Krabi, Phang Nga and Ranong provinces for more warning towers," he said.

"I still worry for villages that are far from high ground. They should have tall buildings for tsunami shelters.

"We now have the budget to build four tsunami shelters this year, but we have yet to begin construction.

"Koh Phi Phi Don has only one tsunami shelter. I think that's not enough because there are many tourists on the island, and don't forget what we owe to tourism," he warned.

"Currently, we have only 79 warning towers in the six Andaman provinces. It's not enough because many danger areas are still isolated.

Chalong Circle under threat

CHALONG: Motorists in the southern end of the island may soon be missing their favorite landmark as the provincial highways office is considering removing Chalong Circle and installing traffic lights in its place.

Saroj Suwinchai, director of the provincial office of the Highways Department, told the *Gazette* that the idea behind the proposal is to relieve traffic congestion at the junction.

"Our plan is to remove the roundabout and install traffic lights on the four main roads at the junction that lead to Kata-Karon [Patak Rd], to the bypass road [Chao Fa East Rd], to Phuket City [Chao Fa West Rd] and to Rawai [Wiset Rd].

"Vehicles entering the junction from Chalong Pier will be forced to turn left onto Wiset Rd. They must do a U-turn and come back and wait at the lights to enter the junction again," he said.

However, before the plan can go ahead, agreement must be reached with the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*) on what is to be done with the fountain that sits in the middle of the roundabout.

"Although the roads are our responsibility, the fountain is the *OrBorJor*'s and we must have their permission to remove it," K. Saroj explained.

Prasong Manokarn, chief of *OrBorJor*'s department of civil works, told the *Gazette*, "I have talked with K. Saroj about the plan twice within the past two months. It's possible because we don't need a large budget to do it and it can been done quickly – and it will reduce the number of serious traffic jams there.

"Also, Patong has only three towers and they are not loud enough. Patong should have at least five

"If we have more towers, we will not have problems with people not hearing the warning. We are also currently improving the language used in the warning," he said.

However, Dr Smith warned, "I'm not satisfied with warning tests. It's not good enough. We should hold tests more often and not warn people that a test will be held.

Key organizations and figures, such as the Ministry of Interior and local leaders, must develop evacuation routes, he added.

"We will inform people of the warning system through TV and through public notices in tour-

"People in risk areas should be warned as soon as possible and be able to react quickly," he said.

Dr Smith repeated his call for the NDWC to be an independent body.

"Our problem is that we have only a few officers and our organization is not an independent entity.

'Some of our executives are from other government sectors. We will appeal to the new government [once one has been established] to pass a law to make us an independent entity.

"The NDWC is already recognized by various nations for our duty, service and ability.

"I want all people in the six Andaman provinces to trust our system and I urge them to follow instructions from officers when we conduct our [tsunami-warning] tests," he said.

2 tonnes of smuggled beef incinerated

PHUKET CITY: Nearly two tonnes of smuggled beef went up in smoke at the Phuket Incinerator in Saphan Hin on January 13. The meat, worth an estimated 153,600 baht, was from cattle infected with foot-and-mouth disease, said Phuket Vice-Govenor Smith Palawatvichai.

Most smuggled meat was from diseased animals and was of low quality, he added.

According to a Department of Livestock Development (DLD) press release, the meat arrived from India and was packaged under the brands Allana, EatCo and ALM.

DLD Director General Sakchai Sriboonsue said that the meat came in 96 packs weighing 20 kilograms each.

through the Tah Chat Chai checkpoint. It was discovered on December 20 in an outdoor freezer on Soi Siangtai, off Thepkrasattri Rd in Phuket City, he said.

Somboon Intharat, the owner of the storage unit, was found to have brought the meat into Thailand without a permit or correct health certification, and without following Customs regulations, he said.

Somboon, who will be fined an as-yet undisclosed amount, has been charged under the Animal Epidemics Act of 1956.

This was the sixth time that smuggled meat had been incinerated in Phuket since November 2007.

"We have a network of 70 animal-quarantine checkpoints across the country. We

The shipment was smuggled into Phuket are strict about enforcing the law against people who import meat without permission from the Department of Livestock Develop-

"We are concerned about the safety and quality of food. It is very important for tourism, business and our people," said K.

Between October 2006 and September 2007, 650 arrests were made nationwide for animal and meat smuggling.

During the same period, Customs seized more than one million ducks, 25,000 chickens and almost 2,000 goats, as well as more than 40,000kg of poultry meat.

The total value of animals and meat seized was estimated at 92.3 million baht, added K. Sakchai.

Patong beach food crackdown launched

PATONG: Patong Municipality has warned Patong beach vendors against cooking and selling food on the beach, saying violators will be arrested.

"If we find any vendors cooking food on the beach we will arrest them. Only drinks can be sold on the beach and all vendors doing so must pay a tax and trashcollection fee to the municipality,' said Chairat Sukkaban, deputy mayor of Patong Municipality.

"Any vendors caught breaking the regulation will have their beach chair and umbrella stand concession revoked. Next week, I am going to file a report asking for help from the District Office and Provincial Office. I will also ask police to monitor the area," he added.

Seri Mekcharoenniwattana, from Narathiwat, who has been a vendor on Patong Beach for more than 15 years, said, "I know

the municipality has talked to us many times [about selling food], but some people are still cooking food on the beach.

"I don't want to blame anyone because I understand that they just want to make money. I always follow the rules, I pay tax every year and pay the fee for trash every six months.

"I think that cleanliness is

the most important aspect of a tourist destination. Cooking is not suitable on the beach. It's a place to relax, not cook. When tourists are hungry they can walk up to the footpath, where there are many vendors," said K. Seri.

"I would like all vendors to respect the rules, because it is good for both us and the government officers," he added.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pol Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth told the Gazette that he hoped the municipality would try to settle the matter before involving the police.

PITO calls voluntary price freeze

PHUKET: The Phuket Provincial Internal Trade Office (PITO) on January 15 called for shops and restaurants to join its Blue Flag, voluntary price-freeze program, aimed at giving consumers some relief from rising prices.

Prices of many everyday necessities have risen in Phuket, reflecting price increases for raw materials, PITO Chief Wassana Utsaharam said.


The strong baht has driven up the cost of imports, including oil, she added.


Under the Blue Flag project, shops and vending stalls are inspected by PITO officers to ensure they comply with all hygiene, quality, price and price-display requirements. Those that pass are given Blue Flags to display.

As part of the project, large retailers including Makro, Big C and Super Cheap have set up "Blue Flag corners", where 20 different consumer goods defined by PITO as "everyday necessities" are available at discounts of 2% to 20%, K. Wassana said.

Among the discounted products are staples such as rice, fish sauce, milk and laundry de-

Restaurants are also being encouraged to join the project, she added.







German caught robbin' the hood

CHALONG: Jannik Norbert Volz, 19, from Germany, was arrested about 2 am on January 20 while he was attempting to steal a motorbike just after he had stolen a hunting bow and arrows from Phuket Shooting Range.

Police arrested Jannik and charged him with "nighttime theft", which in Thailand carries a stiffer penalty than daylight robbery, after he was seen stealing the bow and 13 arrows on closed circuit television (CCTV) installed at the shooting range.

Jannik rode to the shooting range on a black Honda Click motorbike he had rented from a motorcycle rental shop in Patong. After stealing the bow and arrow, he then ditched the rental bike in favor of a red motorcycle of the same make and model that was parked near a stage where monkeys perform shows next to the shooting range, according to police reports.

Chalong Police Superintendent Col Samarn Chainarong said that questioning of the young German revealed that he had originally intended to steal a gun from the shooting range but the bow and arrows were an easier target. Jannik did not say why he decided to steal a weapon, Col Samarn added.

Jannik does not speak any Thai and only a little English. We

have contacted the German Embassy and asked them to contact Jannik's parents so that he can be deported, said Col Samarn.

Jannik was staying in Thailand as a tourist at an unregistered address on Nanai Road in Patong. He had planned to leave the country on February 6, but will now be processed for deportation after he is charged with night time theft, said Col Samarn.

Despite the young tourist's evening of erratic crimes Col Samar said that Jannik did not seem to be intoxicated or on drugs at the time of his arrest.

Jannik said he was operating alone, although we are investigating whether there is anyone else involved, Col Samarn added.

Marine tourism held as cornerstone of provincial 4-year development plan

PHUKET CITY: The provincial government's next four-year development plan aims to establish the island as a world-class marine tourism destination by 2012 while sustaining annual 10% increases in tourism-industry revenue over the four-year period starting in 2009.

The ambitious plan, drawn up by the Governor's Office, was presented to elected local officials and representatives of government agencies at a meeting at the Phuket Merlin Hotel on January 17.

The event was chaired by Phuket Governor's Office Chief Rapeepat Na Nakorn in place of Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, who left Phuket January 17 on a study trip to Spain and Portugal.

During his trip, Gov Niran visited marinas, deep-sea ports and medical facilities in both countries before returning on January 25.

The four-year plan is mandatory for obtaining central-government funding for provincial development projects through the Interior Ministry.

The strategy presented on January 17 listed four objectives:

1. Establishing Phuket as a world-class marine tourism center by development of both natural and man-made tourism resources, including infrastructure, in an effort to attract more visitors from around the globe. Under the plan, success will be defined as increasing tourism-industry revenue by 10% for four successive years, starting in fiscal

2. Raising the standard of living of all Phuket people while maintaining the island's unique identity. The goal calls for equal access to government services, with all government agencies working to help develop citizens into moral and productive members of society with a good sense of their identity as Thais.

3. Implementing more sustainable and better-managed use of natural resources, especially marine and coastal resources, while improving the quality of coastal water.

4. Development of local

government administrative systems to better serve the people, including enforcement of anticorruption measures already in

To achieve this, administrators must improve work procedures and develop staff potential to raise organizations to a high standard.

Listed as key elements in achieving these goals were improvement to the island's road and marine transport networks and services, both in terms of safety and overall standards.

The province must also work to develop Phuket's reputation as a tourist destination by disseminating accurate information about safety and security issues, according to the plan.

During the meeting, local officials were also reminded that a Cabinet resolution made in November earmarks a total budget of 15 billion baht for the central government's Yoo Dee Mee Suk (Good Life and Happiness) grassroots development initiative and that these projects also need budget approval from the Interior Ministry.

Room tax generates B65m

PHUKET: About 65 million baht in tax on hotel rooms was collected in Phuket in 2007, some 5 million baht more than expected, said Anchalee Vanich Tephabutra, president of Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) on January 19.

"Our target was 60 million baht. More tax was collected because we met with a large number of hotel operators and explained to them how the system of hotel-room tax works.

"In the past year, there have been many tourists from Europe, as well as new charter flight tourists from places including India and Dubai," she said.

Hotels in Phuket are required by law to charge a 1% room tax. In the past, however, some hotel operators have defied paying the tax, citing a lack of clear information about what the money is used for.

"For 2008, we have set a target of 65 million baht again. We plan to meet with hotel operators more frequently to help them better understand the tax. Some hotels in Kata-Karon and Patong have yet to start paying the tax," she added.

"The hotels that paid the tax will be invited to join our international road shows. We will take hotel representatives overseas to help promote Phuket as a tourist destination," K. Anchalee said.


She added that the roadshows had generated much interest in Phuket. Through the increased number of tourists and the room tax collected, money has been generated to help develop Chalong Pier and pay for lifeguards, she said.

Income generated in 2007 through tourism in Phuket was between 80 billion baht and 90 billion baht, K. Anchalee added.

TUK-TUK TROUBLES

TRANSPORT SHENANIGANS IN PH

we people are more acutely aware of the fact that Patong's image is suffering from a surfeit of tuk-tuks than Daroon Sooksai, Chairman of the Phuket Tuk-Tuk Co-operative Ltd, based in Phuket City.

He is in complete agreement that there are too many tuktuks operating in Patong.

"We have been together for 21 years now and are the oldest transport co-op on the the island. In the past we had 500 to 600 drivers as members, but now our numbers have fallen to just 173," said K. Daroon.

While all tuk-tuks may look alike to tourists, quite a bit of information can be gleaned from the appearance of each vehicle, K. Daroon explained.

Red tuk-tuks with side doors are usually those of Phuket Tuk-Tuk Co-operative members, who own them outright. Red tuktuks that load from the back belong to the Thavorn Company, which owns about 600 vehicles that are rented to drivers.

They are currently the largest single group of tuk-tuks. In addition, there are also about 600 independent operators, he estimated. Every tuk-tuk painted a color other than red is that of an independent operator, he explained.

"In a situation like this, there is no central control over tuk-tuks. No-one has ever stepped forward to try and get some control over us," said K. Daroon, who suggests getting all the independent drivers to form a single group as a potential first step to finding a solution.

Phuket have a bad image among

or years, one of the single greatest sources of complaints among tourists visiting Phuket has been the island's public transport, especially the teeming hordes of tuk-tuks that clog the one-way streets of Patong nightly in search of fares.

that my co-op uses strict measures to control our drivers and expels any driver found to have taken advantage of or harmed a tourist. Our drivers are not the ones behind all the negative news one hears, but there are many different groups," he said.

Because the Thavorn Company is run as a business, not a collective, its main organizational

objective is to make money through the collection of rental fees - not to control its drivers, K. Daroon said.

K. Daroon thinks the tuk-tuk industry in Phuket should be regulated at the provincial level, as it is in other prov-

"I don't know why the province doesn't take steps to con-

trol all the tuk-tuk chaos that we see nowadays. At the moment, almost all the tuk-tuks converge at Patong and a few other wellknown places.

"The province seems to "I accept that tuk-tuks in have no plan to control tuk-tuks or any other segment of the

limousines and motorcycle taxis. Each of these needs to be regulated, with service areas established to ensure that services are available across the island, not just in a few locations," he said.

"I am a Phuket native and I care about the island's reputation. I would like to see the condition return to what it was five or 10 years ago. I think the responsi-

bility falls with the Phuket Provincial Transport Office. They must take swift action and put rules in place. If they do, I am sure everything would improve quickly," he said.

As for the high fare rates commonly charged by tuktuks, K. Daroon said this was yet another result of years of inad-

equate regulation.

Even if asked to lower rates by the Transport Office, he thinks it would be impossible to do so because the rates have already been in effect for so long.

"There is no point comparing tuk-tuk fares on the island with those in other provinces be-

cause Phuket has become a such a popular destination that prices have gone up across the board and driven up the cost of living," he said.

"I would like to propose to the Transport Office that they make it mandatory for all tuk-tuks to join the Phuket Tuk-Tuk Cooperative. Then, the Transport Office could simply refuse to provide annual registration stamps for any tuk-tuks who have not joined. This would be an easy way to get serious about controlling tuk-tuks," he said.


So dismal are official efforts to regulate the transport sector that the Phuket Tuk-Tuk Co-operative has already met three times with the leaders of the Phuket Limousine and Business Services Co-operative (PBC) and the heads of about eight motorcycle taxi groups in an effort to brainstorm ways of improving their services and image.

"We plan to ask both police and Transport Office officials to join in our discussions, too," he


"I accept that the current situation with three groups is too poorly regulated. We need one government office to step up and get serious about regulating our industry...I think that agency should be the Transport Office because it has the authority to issue the necessary regulations. If the Transport Office issues the needed regulations, we are ready to follow them," he said earnestly.


Jaturong Kaewkasi, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Transport Office Academic Division, told the *Gazette* his agency is well aware of the problems created by the approximately 1,200 tuk-tuks registered with his agency.

The main problem the PPTO faces with regulating tuktuks is the fact that, unlike buses, they do not operate along fixed

routes. Thus, it is impossible to apply a fixed fare structure to them, he said.

The PPTO twice organized meetings between tuk-tuk drivers and a provincial committee in 2000 and again in 2002, asking for their co-operation in adhering to fixed fare structures when operating between locations such as Phuket City and Patong, for example.

Part of the agreement was that tuk-tuks would advertise these fares inside their vehicles as a sort of "bargaining guideline" for passengers. Unfortunately, few continue to post the signs or charge fares at the suggested

Under the agreement, suggested fares "within a district" are just 10 baht; the recommended fare for a trip from Patong Beach to Phuket, set in 2002 and still applicable today, is 210

foreign tourists for short trips within a district are typically 100 baht in Patong, while trips from Patong to Phuket City are at least double the suggested fare.

'There is little the PPTO can do about this," he said.

"Under the law, tuk-tuk fares are agreed to by mutual consent between driver and passenger. Thus, we cannot legally regulate them like buses or vans that run over fixed distances. As with taxis and motorbike taxis. they are intended to serve passengers needing a door-to-door service," he said.

"While there are fixed fares on buses running between destinations such as Phuket City and Patong, these routes do not normally meet tourists requirements," he added.

"Patong is a nightlife entertainment spot and the needs of the tourists who go there are better served by door-to-door forms torcycle taxis," he said.

His office is well aware of the high fares being charged, but has no legal right to intervene. The PPTO can only ask for voluntary co-operation on the part of drivers. The fact that some 80% of tuk-tuks in Phuket are rented by their drivers was another factor keeping fare prices as they are, he said.

K. Jaturon admitted that the level of co-operation among various groups of tuk-tuk drivers in Phuket to maintain high minimum fares was quite unlike the situation in other provinces, where drivers bargained individually and free market forces prevailed.

"In an effort to address the problem, the PPTO once proposed fitting tuk-tuks with meters. However, officials at the Department of Land Transport headquarters in Bangkok failed to understand the situation here and refused to allow it," he said.

"Under the plan we have drawn up, minibuses would run north in a circular route along the beach road, then south along Muang, behind Phang Jungceylon. Fares would be from 15 to 30 baht and passengers would be able to board or get off

wherever they like along the route. Unfortunately, we have been unable to find any investor interested in operating this route. I don't understand why," he said.

K. Jaturon sees increasing

"If there are other, less expensive options tuk-tuk drivers will be forced to lower their fares if they are to remain competitive. But who will come in and do it?" he asked rhetorically.

K. Jaturon said he wanted


For a change of scenery, this month's training will be held indoors at the air-conditioned Middle Way Meditation Center located at Vanich Plaza in Phuket City.

places. When they get back together with the rest of their group they discuss what they were charged by their tuk-tuk drivers. When they realize the differences, bad feelings are created," she said.

I am always thinking about ways to institute a system of fixed, reasonably-priced fares so that tourists will not be overcharged like this," she added.

"It certainly has an effect on tourism overall. I know I would feel fed up if I went abroad and felt like I had been cheated on a taxi fare," she said.

K. Suwalai said she has discussed the issue with the PPTO and encouraged them to better publicize the suggested fare rates among tourists.

She also asked those who overcharge on taxi fares to consider what the long-term effects they might be having on tourism.

"People need to use common sense. I would like to ask them not to act like predators who simply kill and consume, but rather to act like egg collectors who might get less at first but will reap greater benefits in the longterm," she said.

"If they continue to tarnish Phuket's image by taking advantage of tourists, then before long, those tourists will choose alternative destinations such as Vietnam," she added.

Another person on the receiving end of numerous complaints about the prevailing tuktuk chaos is Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukkaban.

"I get many complaints from tourists, both Thai and foreign, who say that Phuket's public transport is among the most expensive in the world," he said.

The overabundance of tuktuks has also created a severe lack of parking spaces for residents and visitors alike, he noted.

"I think only temporary

War on Drugs probe draws a blank

n independent committee probing drug-related killings during Thaksin Shinawatra's first term as prime minister has found no solid evidence linking senior government figures with the murders, a source in the Justice Ministry source said on January 16.

After five months of inquiries, the panel led by former attorney general Khanit na Nakhon has obtained only statistics of the number and nature of the murders – and nothing to implicate police or Thaksin as instigator of a shoot-to-kill policy on drug suspects.

The main content of the panel's report is facts and government records showing how Thaksin's order was carried out from top to bottom through the bureaucracy.

One of the most potent pieces of evidence is that an antinarcotics center under the Interior Ministry was ordered to issue a blacklist naming drug dealers and users nationwide, as well as an appraisal measure to show a "decline" in the number of people blacklisted.

However, the report contained no conclusion that may subject any individual to criminal liability.

The report said that 2,819 people were killed in 2,559 murder cases between February and April in 2003.

Of those killed, 1,370 were related to drug dealing, while 878 of them were not. Another 571 people were killed without apparent reason.

The overall murder rate two years before and two years after the three-month "War on Drugs" was 454 cases a month, or a third of the number killed between February and April 2003.

Phrae for teak. Police in Phrae province on January 15 arrested four men for poisoning a large number of teak trees in Mae Yom National Forest in Phrae.

After running out of fuel, this two-seat Zenair STOL CH 701 aircraft owned by Royal Thai Navy Vice-Admiral Chumpol Sirinawin, crashed landed nose-first into a field in front of a country home about half a kilometer from the landing strip at Lampang Airport on January 13. Of 296 dead teak trees, 19 had been felled and 33 logs were found nearby. The trees were part of the last complete teak tree stand in Mae Yom National Forest

Narung Kardmanee, Theerawat Bunyuen, Kanya Saenkhamlue, and Phajon Khamkhern have reportedly confessed to felling the trees using weed killer and logging equipment.

They said they wanted the logs to renovate homes and to sell for money.

Phrae police later searched sawmills in the province for illegally felled logs and to find out if the mills had bought the logs or hired the suspects to kill the trees in order to secretly fell them later.

Mongkhol Saengrung-arun, the chief of the Mae Yom National Forest, was transferred for failing to protect the teak trees.

Fair hike. Upcountry coach operator Transport Company will

raise fares by three *satang* a kilometer starting February 16.

Company chairman Piyapan Champasut, who is also deputy permanent secretary for transport, said the state enterprise has lost about 60 million baht since the government denied its request on October 15 to raise fares.

Current fares are calculated on a diesel price of 23.84 baht per liter, while diesel is now 29.34 baht a liter, K. Piyapan said.

The Transport Company will hold fares at existing rates for three weeks before the new rates take effect, he said.

The company lost some 50 million baht when it halved fares for several days to encourage voters to travel to their home constituencies to vote in the constitutional referendum and the general election, he added.

Dam tragedy. Seven bodies found floating in the Srinakharin Reservoir on January 17 and 18

might be those of illegal immigrants trying to sneak into the country when their boat accidentally capsized, said Pol Lt-Col Pornpoj Suwansri, head of the Mae Chalaeb border checkpoint in Kanchanaburi

Five bodies – that of a man, three women and a boy – were found on the night of January 18.

The bodies of a man and a boy were found a day earlier, police said.

Cell phone surprise. A snap search of death row at the notorious Klong Prem Central Prison in Nonthaburi unearthed items banned to prisoners, including three mobile phones.

The January 18 search of Area 2, a maximum-security wing housing 300 inmates sentenced to death or life in prison, turned up two knives, two pornographic magazines and dice.

As many as 60 prison guards conducted the one-hour

search. The items were buried in a ditch screened by a concrete cover. Prison staff are continuing to identify the owners.

The Corrections Department said that the search was part of the department's crackdown on drug-dealing by inmates.

Area 2 is home to high-profile criminals, including former police Lt-Gen Chalor Kerdthet, convicted for double murder in the Saudi jewelry scandal, and drug lord Suparb Seedaeng.

Scammers. By paying fines and using surrogate jailbirds, operators of illegal pyramid schemes often get away to start new getrich-quick schemes, Pol Maj Gen Wisut Wanichbutr, who heads the Department of Special Investigations (DSI), Economic and Cyber Crimes (Ecotec) Division, has said.

Maj Gen Wisut explained that most people suspected of running pyramid schemes planned to operate "hit-and-run" businesses from the start.

They also hired "fall guys" who would be sacrificed in return for a huge payout, which they could enjoy after serving a light jail sentence.

According to the DSI, while most of these criminals try hit-and-run businesses just once, or wait until being charged with such a crime expires before trying again, there are also many who plan new schemes soon after the existing operation ends.

DSI spokesman Piyawat Kingket said there were now around 400 suspicious pyramid schemes in operation, with objectives and procedures different from what had been originally declared, under investigation.

The main objective of the DSI-led joint operations was to get as much money as possible back to the innocent investors, he added.

Paton-Smith walks free


inal court proceedings in December put an end to charges against longterm Samui resident Crispin Paton-Smith.

Mr Paton-Smith was cleared of all charges and released on December 27 at 7pm after being incarcerated for more than 18 months in the notorious Klong Prem Prison, Bangkok.

Mr Paton-Smith was arrested in July 2006 in Pattaya amid a media frenzy.

He was arrested along with two other expats living on Samui. The three were accused of offenses including attempted murder, money laundering, extortion, drug trafficking, human trafficking, racketeering, prostitution, bribing government officials, illegal land sales and transfers, rape, fraud, illegal weapons trading and being officers in a secret society.

The court heard several witness accounts leading up to the decision. Mr Paton-Smith's original offenses were cut down to two remaining charges. The first was being an officer in a secret society, which was in relation to Mr Paton-Smith's involvement with the Banditos, a



well-known biker gang.

A charge of extortion came about after the alleged souring of business deals made with other members of the secret society who were also living on Samui. The prosecution was unable to

after a key witness failed to appear in court on a number of occasions.

The verdict went uncontested, Mr Paton-Smith's British passport was returned and he was granted permission to remain FREE AT LAST: Long-time Samui resident Crispin Paton-Smith walked free after the prosecution's case against him fell apart with a lack of key witnesses and evidence.

porters of Mr Paton-Smith celebrated after news of his release.

A website set up for people to show their support for the long-term Samui resident contained many messages sent

from well-wishers to Mr Paton-Smith while he was in prison.

Southern unrest enters fifth year

Muslim man who worked as a military informant was shot dead in Pattani on the morning of January 21, police said.

While he was riding his motorcycle to downtown Pattani at 8:30 am, Abdulloh Toh-adam, 40, was killed by a pillion rider. He was attacked on the Pattani-Yala Road in Tambon Baraho, Muang District.

Police said the man was an informant for military-intelligence officials.

The assassination highlights the increasing importance of intelligence gathering by both sides in the ongoing conflict in the Deep South.

On January 7, three intelligence officers of the Internal Security Operations Command of the southern region and seven policemen were arrested on charges of spying for southern insurgents.

Following the scandal, Prime Minister Surayud Chulanont, Army Commander-in-Chief Gen Anupong Paochinda and Police Commissioner-General Seripisut Temiyavej visited Yala on the morning of January 21 to be briefed on the latest situation in the Deep South.

Gen Anupong previously said that he would listen to officials to see how they have been operating before considering how to improve the system to prevent leakage of official information.

He has also ordered the intelligence agencies to review and screen their personnel.

A few days before his visit, PM Surayud said Muslim insurgents in the Deep South were "inspired" by al-Qaeda, but probably not being supplied by the group in terms of financial or material support.

Analysts have long been divided over whether Thai insurgents are plugging into a broader Islamic movement.

Regardless, the violence

On the morning of January 19, 13 suspects were arrested in three villages for allegedly taking part in an ambush that killed eight soldiers in Narathiwat on January 14.

The attack came as the separatist rebellion entered its fifth year.

Little progress has been made in curbing the violence, despite the presence of nearly 40,000 police and soldiers in the region.

Gunman got. Police in Nakhon Sri Thammarat arrested a suspected hired gunman wanted in connection with a number of cases, including the murder of a policeman in 1991.

Thirty-nine-year-old Mek Srikan, alias "Seu Mek" (Tiger Mek), was arrested outside Karom Cafe in Lan Saka District at 1 am January 19.

The arrest was led by Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police Deputy Commander Col Somchai Ouamthanom.


Police had received intelligence from Lam Thap District Police in Krabi that Mek was seeing a singer who worked at Karom Cafe. Col Somchai travelled to Krabi and waited at the club until closing time, when Mek arrived to pick up his ladyfriend.

Officers then swooped on the suspect and placed him under arrest, despite his protestations of innocence, Col Somchai

Seua Mek was one of Police Region 8's most-wanted men. He had a number of outstanding arrest warrants, including one for the shooting murder of an officer with the Thung Song District Police in 1991.

Other warrants included one for the attempted murder of an on-duty police officer from Lan Saka District Police and one for resisting arrest in Chawang District, also in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

His latest alleged crime is continues to take a heavy toll on the robbery and murder of Pra-

phan Duangnamkaow, the 61year-old owner of a number of rubber and palm plantations in Lam Thap District, Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

K. Praphan was tortured until she revealed where her valuables were concealed, then strangled with an electrical cord in May last year.

The witness to that murder was her grandson.

"Seua Mek has a long history of committing violent crimes, including murder, attempted murder and robbery in Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Krabi and nearby provinces. He was the mostwanted man for many local police forces and was also in the Police Region 8 and national police black book of suspected gunmen," said Lt Col Chaowasin Bunpradit, Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police deputy superintendent for criminal investigation.

Murder most foul. A man in Nakhon Sri Thammarat's Chauat District killed his four-monthold daughter in a fit of rage on the morning of January 19 after she would not stop crying.

Yakop Usaman, 43, confessed that he had first throttled his baby daughter Arauma.

Then, when she continued

crying, he picked her up by her feet and hurled her against the wall, inflicting a fatal head injury.

When police led by Lt Col Pricha Chimphakdee, duty inspector at Cha-uat District Police Station, arrived at the scene, they found a crowd of people outside the house shouting curses at Yakop. As the crowd grew larger, police officers set up a cordon to prevent people getting into the house and lynching the

Inside the house, police were met by the victim's mother, 37-year-old Kanlaya Usaman. She was sitting and weeping, cradling the body of her dead baby. Yakop, who was still in the house, was placed under arrest.

K. Kanlaya told police that the incident occurred while she was out selling meat at Cha-uat Market. Her five-year-old daughter, who witnessed the attack, ran to the market to tell her what had happened. She rushed home, but Arauma was already dead by the time she arrived, police said.


Col Pricha said that Yakop made no attempt to evade arrest and seemed agitated. Yakop told police that he had killed his daughter in a fit of rage as he had been up until the early hours chopping meat for his wife to sell at the market in the morning. At about 6 am, Arauma had woken up and started crying.

Yakop got up to prepare some milk for her, but when she would not stop crying, he threw her against the wall.

Yakop was detained at Chauat District Police Station and charged with murder, Col Pricha added.

Taking a pier into the past

here is a small island off Phuket's east coast with no resorts, go-go bars or tuk-tuks. It's a place where children ride bikes without engines, fish and rubber trees are mainstays of family incomes, and beaches are lined with locals' homes instead of umbrellas. Koh Maphrao remains a little-visited time warp to Phuket's past where quiet prevails.

The only public access to and from Koh Maphrao, or "Coconut Island", is a longtail boat ride from Laem Hin fishing port. Once across the two-kilometer stretch of water, visitors can hire a motorbike or motor-cart ride to take them from to the village center for 15 baht.

This mostly Muslim community remains largely untouched by the booming tourism that has transformed Phuket over the past 30 years.

About 150 families make up the island's population of approximately 500, most of whom work on the rubber plantations or as fishermen. Koh Maphrao is about 2,600 rai, with 80% of this striped with rubber plantations.

Wallop Khamhaeng of Koh Kaew Tambon Administration Organization (OrBorTor), the local authority responsible for the island, said tourist traffic to Koh Maphrao remains low because it lacks basic facilities, such as mains-supplied electricity. Koh Maphrao isn't on the Phuket power grid; most of the islanders' electricity comes from small solar panels provided to families by Koh Kaew OrBorTor over the past three years.

The beaches are not as long as those at Patong or Nai Harn, but are refreshingly empty of

bodies. Crabs strafe across sand still strewn with seashells, yet to be picked clean by mementoseeking tourists.

According to local motortaxi driver Ason Abdulamum, the most beautiful beach on Koh Maphrao is Yao Beach, or "Long beach" – a stretch of unspoilt beauty of only about 30 meters.

'Not many people come to this beach because it is at the back of Koh Maphrao, but some days small tour groups visit. It's a favorite fishing spot for local people because many of the rocks make good seats for fishing," he added.

dishes, but the choices are minimal because most of the islanders cook family meals at home.

Most of the tourists to Koh Maphrao are day-trippers, cycling around the island on a rented pushbike, chatting with residents, taking in the village life or fishing. However, there are two home stays for those wanting to spend a night or two.

Serm Nookhaet, owner of Uncle Serm Home Stay in the middle of the village, has four rooms available at 300 baht a night, but has had no guests at all since New Year.



In the mornings, the breakfast menu offers simple omelet dishes starting at 30 baht. For the diner who has spent the whole night before plowing a field, however, there is the Big Farmer's Breakfast, a fry-up complete with eggs, potatoes, bacon, onion and coffee or tea – a real bargain at 99 baht.

Sandwich lovers are also in for a treat, with club sandwiches, tuna and chicken all for 60 to 70 baht. The perfect accompaniment to these are the soups, such as onion and tomato soup, at just 40 baht per cup.

Main dishes, including several kinds of schnitzel, are served with salad for 99 baht. The most popular is the champignon schnitzel, made from tender fried pork and creamy mushroom sauce as filling a European meal as you will find anywhere on the island.

Other popular selections include wiener schnitzel, and chicken or pork cordon bleu.

For those who miss European-style pasta dishes, The Zürcher has several different pasta dishes – such as spaghetti bolognese, carbonara or seafood – at prices ranging from 60 to 90 baht per dish.

"We can maintain these prices because our overhead is low. We are outside the city cen-


ter in an area where there aren't many foreigners, so our monthly rent is cheap. We also work hard to find the freshest and highestquality ingredients at the most reasonable prices," said K. Ju.

"All of our meat products are from Tops Supermarket at Central Festival. We source our imported ingredients mostly from the Promphan Store on Chao Fa West Rd and stock up of fresh vegetable at Makro," she added.

"We have had a good response so far. Right now, we serve about 60 to 80 people a day, usually Europeans from Switzerland, as well as Belgium, Germany, France and Austria. Some of these are our regular customers. Our year-round average is about 50 customers a day," she

The Zürcher is one of a growing number of restaurants, mostly in and around Phuket Town, featuring authentic, lowcost foreign fare prepared by Thai staff.

will bet twenty thousand pounds that I make a tour of the world in eighty days or less," said Phileas Fogg, protagonist of Jules Verne's 1873 romance Around the World in 80 Days. His wager was prompted by conversation during a game of whist: Someone observed that the earth might be traversed in three months. Fogg corrected him.

"Eighty days," he said.

But another counseled that 80 days was only an estimate. "A well-conceived minimum," replied Fogg, "suffices in every-

Joost Schaefers was not playing cards at the time, but he hit upon more or less the same conclusion about well-conceived minimums just after completing the ground-up restoration of a classic Italian speedboat.

He was in the middle of Holland's Weer Water Lake, when he experienced a moment of epiphany. His boat, a 28-foot, 1,200-kilogram Cranchi Taunus, crafted of wood on the shores of Lake Como in the Lombard Alps 42 years before, had been faithfully, painstakingly restored.

"I liked the classic design, it's like sitting in a car," he re-

"But I knew that, had I designed it myself, I'd do many things differently.'

Thus inspired by the Taunus,

he undertook his own modern "classic", called the Dutch Pike, using the latest computer-aided design (CAD) programs, modern construction techniques, parts and power plant. "But still made of wood," he says.

Like Phileas Fogg's, Schaefers' is a high-stakes undertaking, made possible by advances in technology, communications, banking and travel.

He grew up around boats, but it's not as if Schaefers were born to the business. Now 42 years old, he is the youngest of four brothers. The family grew up in Amstelveen, a suburb of Amsterdam. His father was a seller of natural stones and a con-

"As kids, we were always around water.'

From their father, the Schaefers boys learned early self-reliance. "We built a windpowered electrical generator for my father's factory when we were still young," he says.

While still a teenager, the brothers built an ice boat – a metal frame with runners and a sail for skating across frozen lakes: "They go amazingly fast," he said. The adrenalin rush hooked him, and thereafter he retained an interest in fast boats.

With adulthood came greater independence and more responsibility. Aged 16 years, Joost studied mechanical arts and wood-working in technical school.

Schaefers' ability to adapt, and his skill at carpentry and cabinet work, led him to a career in home renovations and property development.

"After the first Gulf War, my brother and I started buying old houses, renovating, then reselling them," he explains.

A connection in Egypt led the brothers to buy one square kilometer of land overlooking Cairo's ring road. "It's all only

sand, but ... it's a nice location, really."

Plans to develop the property stalled. "Land values are shooting up there and it's more cost-effective just to wait," Schaefers says, which left him free to devote time to creation of the Dutch Pike.

In re-modeling and building homes he had become proficient in the use of CAD programs – or so he thought, until turning to speedboat design.

"I quickly discovered that the boat I wanted to build is all curves," he explains. "Houses are mostly straight lines and corners." Drawing curves with CAD programs "is another level of difficulty.'

Schaefers designed and built two boats before renovating his Cranchi. One was a simple flat-bottomed runabout; the other fanciful - like a Buck Rogers spacecraft on water, with Porsche 928-like retractable headlights. "It planes on the water as soon as it's underway," he explains, "allowing it with as little as 30 horsepower to tow skiers."

He bought his Cranchi Taunus for about US\$5,000 and

color."

But he searched for and found the perfect match, and after seven months work - replacing much of the hull and installing a new Volvo Penta 6-cylinder engine - the Taunus was like new again.

Restoration costs totaled US\$7,500, paid from Schaefers's profits speculating in a booming real estate market. "I'd buy [a government-controlled] home while it was still in blueprints, put it for sale and by the time I got

the key it was sold," he explains. He knew "right away" he would do his own design. He liked the Taunus's car-like character but deprecated its lack of conve-

Also, he wanted "a toilet, places to

sleep, a refrigerator and sink, cup holders for every seat, pockets between inner and outer hull within easy reach, a convenientlyplaced fire extinguisher, dry storage for wet-suits and space to stow life jackets and docking fenders.'

Modern technology was also needed: Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) equipment for easy navigation, autopilot, fishfinder, sealed compartments to prevent sinking and mundane items that make life easier drawers under the back seats, an anchor winch and joystick-operated spotlights that swivel.

He especially wanted a stern-drive propulsion unit: "Old boats' engines stood in the middle with a shaft-drive going down to the rear, and a small rudder," he explains. "I've put on a stern drive with the engine all the way in the back. Stern drives swivel, and so require no rudder; and can be shifted forward or back."

They make turning, docking, trimming and backing up a breeze. They also sit at the appropriate angle in the water (fixed drives are at best a compromise); and can be raised from the water for

propeller de-fouling – which might otherwise require diving under the boat.

The Dutch Pike is born. The Dutch Pike began with Schaefers drawing six lines on his laptop's Auto-CAD program: bow line, beam, profile, descending line from deck to center line, bottom, and hip-line that melds into the hull.

"From these six lines you can tell whether it's going to look nice." A glance at any boat drawings shows the extensive calculations necessary before the final angle for each line was arrived at. It was a mathematical puzzle as well as an art passed from generation to generation.

Auto-CAD simplifies all that. The program creates threedimensional renderings viewable instantly from any angle, always in correct perspective. It further integrates sourcing and pricing information for parts.

Clicking any portion of a completed drawing can expand the view, show internals or externals, provide measurements of stresses and angles, or tell the boat-builder where to order parts from and how much they cost. It's a marvel.

Schaefers spent six months designing, making perhaps a thousand detailed, integrated drawings. The effort proved its worth later not only in construction, but in negotiating with the contractor.

His next step was to make a 1:10 scale model from the plans. "In detail it is just like the real boat, all of wooden strips, but in miniature. It was probably as hard – maybe harder – to build."

In the meantime, he was contacting suppliers in Italy, Australia, Sweden and the United States. Although initially Schaefers wanted to build the Dutch Pike in the Netherlands, prices were forbidding. Using the Internet, he consulted suppliers and boat-builders around the world.

The consensus opinion fa-

vored Rawai's Latitude 8 boatyard, which was building natural wood classic speedboats.

But "there's many a slip," as they say, "'twixt cup and lip."

After more than three years waiting – for the boatyard to recover from the tsunami's destruction, for schedules to free up, for budgets to be met – the end is now in sight – and the first Dutch Pike is a thing of beauty.

With voluptuous haunches and sloping rear deck (think '59 Corvette sports car), narrow waist, wrap-around windscreen, and arresting deep-V bow that promises to cleave hearts as well as waves, the svelte 3,300-pound, 28-footer justifies its creator's concept of mating classic design and modern technology.

Although hand-constructed of epoxy-sealed woods, the Pike proves that wooden boats needn't be heavy – it displaces just 28 inches in water.

Powered by a 320hp Volvo Penta V-8 Aquamatic duoprop gasoline engine with stern drive, it caters to the power-lust of speedboat owners while affording state-of-the-art reliability, flexibility, electronics and safety fea-


Not many years ago, undertaking such a project might have been all but impossible without either bundles of cash or marrying a speedboat builder's daughter.

But just as technology in the time of Jules Verne broadened the possibilities of personal travel, technology in our day - to say nothing of improved travel and electronic wire transfers – has broadened the possibilities available to creative individuals. Dreams are no longer manufactured only in your head.

With a well-conceived minimum, you can now manufacture and market them in the materials of your choice - and get underway, as in the Dutch Pike, behind 320 horsepower.

It's a brave new world of speedboat building we're entering, and the navel may be Phuket.

Hajabá Roman, an organizer of the tour, said, "I have been in Thailand five times before. It's a beautiful place with

many beautiful islands and we will show that on the air with the swimsuit modeling. We would like to present Phuket to the Czech people and to Eastern Europeans."

There were some challenges, however, during the film shoots. "It's not easy for staff to clear the area because everyone wants to take a photo with the girls, especially tourists and Thai boys," said Mr Roman.



decade ago, Phang Nga Bay was home to five species of kingfisher – common, white-collared, black-capped, white-throat and brown-winged.

Now, to the best of my knowledge, only one kingfisher remains, not the species, but a single bird. The largest of Phang Nga's kingfisher species, the brown-winged, competes with egrets for the larger baitfish, often called "fry". Smaller fry are more susceptible to pollution and disappeared from the bay years ago, as did the smaller kingfishers that fed on them.

Seeing these changes reminded me of the finest reef I've known. Gilan'gila Bay in Fiji's restricted Lau group is off-limits to outsiders and far from the nearest village.

In late 1998, I found a half-meter lobster sunbathing on a coral head. Having never known people, it moved only antennae while I lectured it on the dangers of humans.

Two years later, Gilan'gila had been fried by global warming. Floating over the dead reef in my kayak, I felt like an alien in a space-

ship surveying a barren planet. The absence of kingfishers was the first hint of disaster there. Gilan'gila took less than two months to die.

Phang Nga Bay's food chain is also dying, not due to reef bleaching, but because of tourism. The subtle destruction is easy to prevent, but it seems that nobody cares.

In a 1998 Bangkok Post article, I supported national park fee increases, "if it leads to sincere education and enforcement". Unfortunately, it seems the parks' management has been so obsessed with collecting admission fees that they have forgotten all about enforcement and



education. This is peculiar, because the official website for the national park claims that there isn't all that much to count. Phuket tourist arrivals are expected to exceed 5 million this year, but the Park Service website at www.dnp.go.th says that Phang Nga Bay National Park receives only 43,397 visitors a year – an average of almost 119 tourists a day.

Our company is the smallest of our 19 competitors, taking 30 people per day, so those other 89 visitors make a terrible mess jumping from trip to trip.

My favorite villains are

speedboats with two-stroke engines, which now rival "high volume, low quality" sea canoe companies as Phang Nga's environmental destroyers. We've already reported the oil slick ringing north Koh Penak. Aside from giving kayakers headaches, this slick kills small baitfish, which are vital to Phang Nga's



Pacific reef egrets remain though, but it won't be long before this graceful modern pterodactyl follows the kingfishers' disappearing act.

Environmental damage in the caves and *hong* is also significant. True sea kayaking is the ultimate in high-quality, low-volume eco-tourism. Kayaks don't even leave a footprint, but in Thailand, a good idea often finds

its lowest common denominator.

Sea kayaking in Phang Nga Bay is called "sea canoing". I invented the term on my first night in Thailand in January 1989. Surrounded by copycat merchandise, I invented "sea canoe" as a joke on future copycats. It's really "kayaking", but then, it's not.

In South Thailand, "sea canoing" is mass tourism prostitution of an eco-friendly industry. Operating in pristine locations with limited space without standards, sea canoing can cause considerable environmental damage.

What should be a properly planned "high quality, low volume" educational industry is a national disaster. It's the usual downward pricing spiral – make a low-quality copy, start a price war and starve each other into poverty.

Many companies compensate low prices by operating four or five boats with poorly paid, untrained guides, 50% commissions and kickbacks. That may be "culture" on dry land, but it's disastrous for nature.

Responsible planners, governments and operators understand that a "high quality, low volume" policy protects natural sites. Policy is managed via carrying capacities, professional standards, and operators whose primary investment is a lifetime of experience and respect for nature.

We recently took a Phuket environmental club on an educational trip, leaving early to have some caves and *hong* to ourselves. The ambiance was great until we arrived at Bat Cave, where dozens of inflatables waited inside the cave just to enter the *hong* – and daylight.

Of course, the huge lagoon was carpeted with kayaks, loud talking and tourists feeding monkeys with not one park ranger in sight. Why should there be? The park's own website shows only 119 visitors to the park every day.

After Bat Cave, we passed North Bay. Common sense and basic dignity says the cove is too confined for speedboats, but there they were, spewing exhaust into the still waters, fouling quiet air – and breaking the food chain without even knowing it. I explained the dangers of unaware businessmen running tourism in nature to our group. "Forgive them Lord, for they know not what they do."

During my eco-talk, the shocked advisors dropped their heads and the students were in disbelief. When I told them, "This is your country, it is your duty to protect your natural treasures," they became very emotional.

The next day, we took an international student group to Koh Hong, Krabi. Somewhere on the books is a regulation keeping motorboats out of the lagoon, but that was a dozen years ago.

Of course, on this day, the lagoon was packed with speed-boats. It's basic common sense and respect for one's own country that motorboats should not be inside Koh Hong.

Koh Hong receives about 1,000 visitors a day, so it's easy to understand how the impoverished park cannot afford to station a ranger at the lagoon's entrance to enforce a "no motor-boats" policy.

The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) promotes Thailand's nature with a "bull in a china shop" mentality, pouring billions of baht into the national parks and foolishly judging its performance by arrival counts. Their marketing campaigns bring millions of tourists to Thailand, but there is no planning and no consideration of the consequences.

Instead of developing and enforcing proper planning, it's easier to ignore the accidents, monkey bites, environmental degradation and unrestricted abuse of our national treasures.

Phang Nga's natural beauty deserves world heritage status, but its "management" denies that status. The solutions are so simple and inexpensive that one has to wonder why there is no interest in "world heritage".

If you understand the numbers and you understand the trade-off.

he past few decades have seen Phuket Town transformed into what was once a humble, sleepy place from a modern hive of activity. In 2004, Phuket Town was officially given city, or tessaban nakhon, status – even though most islanders still call it "Phuket Town".

By whatever name, the area we know today is markedly different from the way it was for the children of

generations past.

Each of the roads that runs through Phuket

roads that runs through Phuket City marks a legacy to a moment in the history of the old town;

each road name is a story in itself.

Chaising Na Nakhon and his wife, K. Maneerat, are enthusiastic Phuket historians. K. Chaising said that public infrastructure in Phuket City first appeared in the early 20th century. Phuket Governor Phraya Rassada Nupradit, known to locals as Ko Sim Bi, was in charge of constructing the first roads in the old town.

You can see a statue of Ko Sim Bi in the little park at the top of Rang Hill.

The first roads in Phuket were a far cry from the (mostly) smooth concrete we know today. Roads were usually nothing more mud paths forged through cleared land, suitable only for carts, horses and pedestrians.

The first cars arrived in Thailand around the turn of the century. Chao Phraya Surasak Montri was reputedly the first Thai to own a motorcar. The Siamese royal family were known as advocates of technological progress.

All roads lead to Phuket

Shortly after Chao Phraya Surasak had his wheels, Krom Luang Ratchaburi Direkridhi traveled to Paris for medical treatment. While he was there, he bought a car from German manufacturer Daimler-Benz AG.

On his return to the Kingdom, Krom Luang R atchaburi Direkridhi presented the automobile to his father, King Chulalongkorn. By

1904, there were three cars cruising around the streets of Bangkok, and before long the canals there were filled in to accommodate more of them. Cars didn't make their way to Phuket's roads until several years later.

K. Chaising added that the process of using tin mine tailings to pave roads in Phuket became common over time. Thai laborers needed help with mining operations, resulting in an influx of Chinese immigrants to the island.

The Chinese community grew rapidly, with various social classes spread across the town. The buildings on Deebuk Rd today are a throwback to the influence of the Chinese on the area.

The buildings ranged from rows of small houses, to large, detached homes that belonged to the richest families. Deebuk translates as "tin" in English, reflecting the importance of the road to the trade at a time when tin was the island's most precious commodity.

Near Deebuk Rd is a soi



with a racy history. Soi Romanee was once a red-light zone. "Romanee" translates roughly as "fooling around sexually with ladies".

Along the soi, there were numerous brothels that served the Chinese laborers who had come to work in the tin mines. Today, lined with beautiful old buildings as you can see from Thalang Rd, the soi reveals little of its raunchy past.

Close to Deebuk Rd there are numerous roads named af-

ter other districts: Satun Rd, Krabi Rd, Ranong Rd, Takuapa Rd. K. Maneerat offered one explanation, saying that in some cities, such as Trang, roads were named after the districts that they led to.

In Phuket, where only one road leads off the island, this theory is quite debatable.

A more feasible explanation lies in how Thailand was divided at the time. Many of the roads in Phuket were built in the early 1900s. try was divided into administrative regions called *monthon*.

Each monthon comprised many provinces that today are administered separately. Back then, Phuket Town was the administrative capital of Monthon Phuket, which encompassed what are now the provinces of Phang Nga, Krabi and Satun.

K. Maneerat said that naming roads in the capital after other parts of the *monthon* may have been a way by those in power of showing the significance of those regions.

Thalang Rd, believed to be the oldest road in Phuket, was named to honor Thalang Town and its governors, who held authority over Phuket Town in the early 20th century.

So, next time you're driving around Phuket Town, take a minute to think back to the Chinese miners, mud paths and brothels of years gone by.

Public transport the solution to tuk-tuk troubles

Nowhere in Phuket is the practice of collusion more visible than among tuk-tuk operators in Patong, a town where the simple forces of supply and demand seem free to dictate prices of just about every commodity imaginable – except for a ride in a tuk-tuk.

Virtually everyone the *Gazette* spoke with while compiling this week's news feature [see Inside Story, pp 4-6] agrees that the nightly traffic chaos in Patong and the endless complaints from tourists about being overcharged highlight the need for better regulation of the 1,200 drivers who make up Phuket's tuk-tuk industry.

While it is certainly unfair to brand all tuk-tuk drivers as opportunists, there is no doubt that their collective ability to maintain artificially-high fares continues to damage the image of Phuket's all-important tourism industry.

Among those crying out for better regulation of the industry is Daroon Sooksai, chairman of the Phuket Tuk-Tuk Cooperative. Insisting that the local Transportation Office put measures in place to better organize the industry, K. Daroon points the finger of blame at the successive provincial administrations for remaining in "neutral gear" on the issue.

The need for Patong to have a low-cost minibus or "baht bus" service, as used in Pattaya, has been the subject of much futile editorializing in this space over the years, but now the Transport Office has drawn up a plan for such a service. Remarkably, it is only awaiting a private-sector investor to step forward and take advantage of the offer. Thus far, none has.

Speaking on behalf of the Transport Department, Jaturong Kaewkasi said that he doesn't know why no investors are interested in operating the service, which would charge passengers fares in the range of 15 baht to 30 baht.

The Gazette strongly suspects that the reason for this is nothing other than simple fear regarding the reaction of the tuk-tuk drivers who will have if their virtual monopoly jeopardized.

The Gazette notes that back in 1994, the Transport Office offered a concession for a songtaew bus to operate between Patong and Karon. After just three days, the driver was pulled from his vehicle and badly beaten by competitors. The concession remains open to this day, but no person has shown interest in it.

For this reason, it is imperative that an organization such as the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization run these service as it does the green-bus service in Phuket City.

Close support from the police will, of course, be essential.

Let's work together to fight crime

he police are often blamed for increasing crime rates, traffic problems and exploitation of tourists in Phuket. People want to know why we can't stop criminals or haven't solved a case, but it's important to consider how those accidents and crimes occur in the first place.

Crime and social problems should not be seen as the responsibility or result of failure by a single organization, such as the police. It is a responsibility shared among several organizations, such as the Tambon Administration Organizations [OrBorTor], the Tourism Authority of Thailand and local governments.

Phuket continues to attract more tourists every year. Between 2006 and 2007, 4.7 million tourists visited Phuket, and this year we are expecting more than 5 million. This puts a lot of additional pressure on my police force.

Another factor is the growing population of unregistered people living and working in Phuket. They come here to work in the hotels, restaurants and other tourism-related business. This increase in numbers also adds to the traffic problems and crime in Phuket.

The rise in crime can mostly be attributed to this influx of people who come here to work. Out of those people moving here, we don't know which of them has a criminal background.

I believe the governor is trying to solve the problem by en-

couraging people who have moved here to register as residents. There are more than 300,000 unregistered people living in Phuket, which is equal to the number of registered Phuket

Among these are poor families with maybe just one member of the family working, while others may turn to crime to support themselves.

Also, while Phuket welcomes more tourists, the airport and the roads cannot handle the extra load. There are traffic jams to and from the airport in the morning and evening, which becomes an inconvenience that the police have to deal with. Traffic back-ups in Kata-Karon, Patong and Phuket City are not the result of police not doing their jobs,

but the high volume of tourismrelated traffic and local cars using a route that needs to be expanded.

I think the traffic problem will continue to worsen and I don't see any projects to expand the roads and reduce the traffic problems. I know the number of motorbikes that are actually registered in Phuket is much higher than 300,000 bikes.

The amount of work the police have to to is constantly increasing while the number of officers is decreasing.

Some of my officers want to transfer from here to another province because of the pressure of working here. Officers in other provinces never request to be transferred here.

Police would normally work

eight hour shifts and rest for 16 hours, but Phuket police officers often work up to 20 hours a day because there are always special events and special guests who need security. Ideally, Phuket should have 1,500 officers but we have only 1,000 officers to cover the entire island.

I requested many additional officers for the high season, but some were sent to surrounding provinces. Even though we have the help of police volunteers at the police station, we still do not have enough officers to patrol the island effectively.

It is also important for people to help us maintain law and order. People should first look after themselves and make sure they are being a good citizen, while reporting crimes or information about criminals to the police.

When road accidents occur police officers have to leave what they are doing and go to the accident scene, even if they are busy with something else. If everyone on the roads follows some simple rules, such as not parking in the white and red or white and yellow zones, even if it's for a little while, the police would have more time to take care of crime.

As you know, just one car can create a traffic jam. If you commit a traffic violation, a police officer has to spend time writing you a ticket, you have to pay a fine and you're not happy.

If you see someone commit a traffic offense please remind them that they could be fined. This simple action can help us a lot. I know everyone is in a hurry to go somewhere, but if everyone obeys the traffic rules and keeps their speed down, fewer accidents will happen.

I would like to ask tourists to learn and follow some of the laws that are different here. For example, not wearing a shirt when driving or going topless in public is against the law and punishable with a fine. When we go abroad, we have to follow the laws of those countries too, so please follow ours.

Lastly, I'd like to say that we have to help each other solve the crime and traffic problems. I appeal to both locals and tourists to follow the law, and not to support those who break it.

Scary roads and rubbish

I have been living in a house in Cherng Talay for quite some time now and whenever private companies have carried out construction work on or near the road, they have always cleaned it up and repaired the area afterwards.

Registering name changes after a marriage ends

Please correct me if I am wrong. In Thailand, when two Thais are married, it is my understanding that the woman's name is automatically added to the man's house registration document [tabien baan] and the woman must take the man's surname. Then, upon a divorce, the woman's name is automatically removed from the man's house registration document, and her name is restored.

I am asking if all this is automatic. For example, is it possible for a Thai woman to have divorced a Thai man and still be on his house registration document and still have his surname?

Siranee Leelanont, chief of Registration and Census Department of Muang District Office, replies:

In Thailand, a woman has the right to choose if she wants to keep her maiden name or change her surname to that of her husband's when she marries. She must, however, change her title from Miss to Mrs. The name and title changes are not automatic.

They must be registered at a District [amphur] Office by the wife within 60 days of registering her

Adding a wife's name to her husband's tabien baan is also not automatic and is not related to a couple getting married. To register her name on his tabien baan, she must also apply do this at a District Office. Until she does this, her name will remain on the tabien baan she was registered on before the marriage.

This is also the same regarding divorce. Her surname and title must be changed by ap plication to a District Office. As well, a wife's name will not automatically be removed from her husband's tabien baan if the couple divorce. She must register these changes herself, otherwise her name will remain wherever she last registered it.

So, in answer to your question, yes it is possible that a woman can retain the surname of her ex husband and remain on his tabien baan. It is likely that the Thai woman added her name to her husband's tabien baan when she married him but has not taken it off since the divorce.

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, however, gave Woodward an interview as late as July 2006 - four months before he resigned in disgrace in the wake of the disastrous Republican defeat in the mid-term elections. In his replies to Woodward's aggressive questioning, he is flannel-mouthed, evasive, persnickety and a downright liar.

expressions that I think deserve even slightly formal. Dictionary entries for "alright" include words such as "variant" and "disputed", but I think we'd both better start preparing ourselves to give in gracefully in the future.

What your English teacher didn't mention is that "already" and "altogether" are long-accepted words in the same form as "alright". "Already" doesn't mean the same thing as "all ready", "altogether" doesn't mean "all together" — and "all right" doesn't mean that all is right. It has a distinct meaning of its own, so it would make sense for it to have its own spelling.

For now, though, the fact that "alright" is not standard and, depending on your point of view, looks either sloppy or casual is reason enough to avoid it in most writing.

Information and communications technology in Phuket will outstrip that of Singapore within two years, the head of Phuket's newly-established Software Industry Promotion Agency office ambitiously predicted (*Phuket Gazette*, April 17-23, 2004). Was this wishful thinking or just a bold lie? We're still in the IT dark ages here in Phuket. Most of us can access the latest technologies, but Internet access is painfully slow.

Nothing is better for getting to grips with the latest online breakthroughs than thumbing through a good book – or it's digital equivalent. On the Internet, there are countless articles that can be read in place of a book, but the real evolution is the availability of podcasts and videos.

From a podcast, I can get background information from experts, learn about their history and, in many cases, learn how to

pronounce their names for the first time. I bought my first MP3 player so I could listen to podcasts.

Also, there are many easily-accessible vid-

eos of presentations given at information-security conferences. From these, I can get to know the experts on a more personal level, plus I can see demonstrations of software tools.

Many content producers now post their videos on Google Video or You Tube. Podcasts and videos have become invaluable tools in a person's learning arsenal, but an average 30-minute MP3 can be up to 20 megabytes and a 40-minute video can be up to 150MB.

Finding a good Internet connection in Phuket to download any of these, however, is half about getting what you paid for and half about sheer luck.

At home, I have two modes for connecting to the Internet: TOT ADSL and CAT EV-DO. In the past, I used my CAT as backup because the download speeds were three-to-four times slower than my ADSL line. Not any more.

Something happened around mid-December (high season?) and my TOT ADSL connection just plain sucks. It's fine in the mornings until about 11 am. Over the course of a day, it gets progressively worse until it reaches disaster level at 5 pm and then starts to speed up around 7 pm, eventually returning back to normal.

As if a slow connection isn't bad enough, I often cannot

connect to the Internet at all.

I did about 20 hours of research to get to the bottom of my abysmal ADSL line speed. I referenced 10 websites that I frequent: one in Thailand, three in Singapore, two in Europe and four in the US. I used several different tools, including:

- 1. The command line "traceroute" utility.
- 2. IP-address lookup by country (www.ipgeo.com/tools/country.php).
- 3. Pingplotter, a visualization tool that shows packet routes (www.pingplotter.com).
- 4. Domain-name registration lookup for North America (www.network solutions.com/whois/index.jsp), Europe (www.

ripe.net/whois) and Asia (www. wq.apnic.net/ apnic-bin/ whois.pl).

5. Communications in Thailand wiki (www.en.wiki pedia.org/wiki/

Communications_in_Thailand).

6. NECTEC's daily Internet map of Thailand (www.internet. nectec.or.th).

In my opinion, it's not all TOT's fault though they can be blamed for not providing enough bandwidth locally. Most Internet roads out of Thailand pass through CAT's central Internet exchange (reportedly, TOT can go to Singapore directly but my research shows me not often). The main clogging starts at the CAT exchange and extends beyond, especially when oceanhopping.

Watching a video in real time is out of the question with a slow Internet connection, but with many video players embedded in Internet browsers, you can pause

the player just after starting the video and eventually the entire video will download on its own – then you can view it in its entirety without interruption.

The obvious downside is that you have to wait eons for the entire video to download and it is not stored locally so you can't view it at a later date.

Fortunately, there are web-

sites that allow you to enter a video link that produces a downloadable URL. You can then use that address to download the video independently of the video player for offline viewing.

Examples are KeepVid and VideoSnagger. There are others, all easily found with Google. There are free media players for any format, including Flash video.

Next, get a download manager. There's nothing worse than getting a download 95% complete, only to have it cut out. A download manager will keep track of download points, so if your connection drops, it can be resumed at that point. My favorite is Download Accelerator Plus (DAP) from speedbit.com. The basic version is free and by default it's easy to use.

A word of caution: with free software, you have to question why it's free. In DAP's case, they want you to upgrade to a paid version. If you ever have a bad feeling about free software, do an Internet search for negative reports. Also, if you don't have runtime A-V protection, scan the installer file once it has downloaded.

If you have success with this, you'll soon be out of harddisk space and will need to look into increasing your storage capacity.



It was perhaps helpful that the previous week I was at an investment seminar in Hong Kong and had dinner with a regional sales manager of Friends Provident International. During the investment conference, I had ample time to chat with long-term acquaintance John Robertson of Synergy Partnership, the Asian agents for Glanmore Property Fund, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Deutsche Bank.

Commercial property is simply another asset class. It is often ignored by private investors as it requires expert knowledge and huge amounts of capital to offer any hope of diversification.

Commercial property covers everything from office blocks to shopping centers to warehouses to hotels. The only practical way for almost any private investor to have access to this sector is via a property fund or a similar "vehicle", such as a REIT (Real Estate Investment Trust).

Last year saw the emergence of a "credit crunch" that is now affecting many economies around the world. One of the latest casualties is the commercial property market as investors have started to flee this sector in

Friends Provident were one of the first to appreciate the situation and to manage the outflow simply closed their fund for encashment. It is not that these institutions have suddenly become financial casualties themselves, it is that commercial property has one specific disadvantage in times of economic stress: it is a very illiquid investment.

Property funds slam the exit windows shut



Glanmore's holdings, as listed on its website www.glanmore.com. Cashing out of the fund has been restricted due to the difficulty in liquidating property in time to meet the needs of fleeing investors.

When a fund manager is managing a portfolio of equities (shares) or bonds (fixed interest) or even a fund that contains both, such as a "balanced fund", it is generally easy to liquidate assets within seconds, minutes or hours.

The stock markets and bond markets – in any market of substance – are generally so "liquid" that it is easy to sell. Therefore, when investors head for the exit doors en masse, the fund manger is well placed to return their

If there is a panic or a "crash", prices realized may be a disappointment to investors but at least they have their money or, for the cynical, what's left of it.

Commercial property funds are entirely different. It is imposshopping centers at a moment's notice. When property funds fall victim to falling markets, they usually, in the initial stages, simply increase the fund's borrowings and pay out investors.

However, we are living in a ation are ruled by strict govern-

period of economic stress and fund managers facing high redemptions have no alternative but to close the fund.

Glanmore, which manages more than a billion pounds sterling (around 70 billion baht), is a perfect example. After recember became

too large, the board of directors on December 28 closed the fund to immediate redemptions and instead offered payouts to investors after a six-month notice period.

ever the ruling price is six months from now, investors placing redemptions must accept this price. There is no turning back; they cannot change their minds.

Fund managers in this situ-

mental oversight and whatever price is realized will be a fair market price. However, the primary responsibility for the fund manager is to those who want to "go the distance".

This is not new to the commercial property industry. It has happened before and it will happen again. It is all part of the greater economic cycle. However, it is heartening to note that Glanmore, for example, still anticipates returns of 6%-8% during 2008.

Glanmore's Asian agent recommends not taking advantage of the six-month offer unless absolutely necessary. Patience will almost certainly be a virtue in this case.

Friends Provident and Glanmore are just two of many commercial property funds that are in an identical situation. Many of these funds are owned by groups with very deep pockets.

Over the years in this column I have written about Brandeaux and its ground rent, student accommodation and "mixed asset" funds. Fortunately for me, Adrian Perry, who is sales and marketing director for Brandeaux, was having a family holiday in Phuket and kindly set aside time for a meeting.

He has been with Brandeaux for 10 years and previously was head of acquisitions for the company, for both ground rents and student accommodation. His technical knowledge is vast, having spent 25 years in the commercial property sector.

Brandeaux is in a totally different situation than other commercial property managers. Due to the high yielding and specialized niche it occupies, its funds are actually attracting record inflows of cash. It is the old story; one person's bad news is another's good news.

For all those steeped in doom, history shows that these downturns seldom last for long. As interest rates fall, as they will, returns on commercial property will start to appear attractive in comparison.





MAI KHAO: Phuket International Airport (PIA) officially opened its second terminal on January 8 as part of its 20-year plan to expand the airport's facilities and services in order to cope with the growing number of visitors to the island.

The new building, to the north of and joined by a walkway to the old terminal, comprises charter flight check-in counters

All domestic and international arrivals are still processed through the old terminal.

"We originally planned for the new terminal to reduce congestion at the check-in counters in the old terminal by serving all charter flights. The new terminal can support in total two 747s or three Airbus planes, which is about 600 passengers, departing at the same time," said Phuket Airport Director Sq Ldr Pornchai Eua-aree.

He added, however, that by the time the new terminal was complete the number of mid-size charter flights had exceeded expectations. Some charter flight departures, therefore, are still processed through the original terminal.

K. Pornchai said that PIA at its peak can process about 2,000 international flight passengers and about 1,500 domestic flight passengers per hour.

"In the high season we have 20% more flights than in the low season, but the difference

between the peak periods in the high and low seasons is not that great because during the high season there are more night flights.'

In the next stage of expansion, the Immigration counter area will be widened to handle 1,200 to 1,500 passengers an hour, up from its present capacity of 900 passengers an hour.

Airplane docking capacity is also being stretched to the limit. "During the high season there are not enough parking stands for aircraft, especially at night," K. Pornchai said.

"Many Russian airlines, for example, need to park their aircraft for about 10 days at a time, so we have to ask them to park at Ranong or Surat Thani airports to make space at PIA."

The airport needs to add more parking stands as the 23 in operation will not be enough to handle demand within the next five years. Stands for large planes such as 747s each cost about 100 million baht, said K. Pornchai.

The number of vehicles dropping off departing tourists at the airport is another problem, K. Pornchai said. "The second floor of the old terminal [the departures areal gets jammed with passengers and we can't expand there.

"For example, we have 20 flights departing today, with about 300 passengers per flight, so that's 6,000 passengers. If they all arrive by car - even with three people per car – that's 2,000 cars coming to the airport to drop off passengers," he said.

"We are currently talking to construction companies about expanding the car park. We are not looking at expansion just for the immediate future, but enough to cater to what we will need for the next 20 years," he said, adding that airport parking is a source of many complaints.

"We should ask for some help from other related organizations to help solve problems with public transportation to and from the airport," he said.

"As our airport is by the sea, it would be good if we could take tourists directly to their hotels or resorts by sea – that would be lion baht per year. In 2007, that nice, and we could promote it as another tourist attraction," K. Pornchai added.

Plans are afoot to also further develop retail and other commercial outlets at the airport to boost PIA's rental income.

"Most of the airport's income – about 70% – comes from the airlines that use it, while only 30% is revenue from commercial outlets," K. Pornchai said.

From 2004 to 2006, the PIA's income was about 900 milfigure increased to about 1.4 billion baht, about 40% to 45 % of which was derived from airport tax paid by passengers, he explained.

"This is very different to the income earned at larger international airports, such as Suvarnabhumi, Hong Kong International or Changi in Singapore, which receive about 40% of their income from airlines and about 60% from commercial outlets,' K. Pornchai added.

Sharp rise in overseas arrivals

PHUKET: November 2007 statistics released by Phuket International Airport (PIA) show an increase of just over 34 % in the number of international passengers compared with the same period in 2006.

November 2007 saw 650 more domestic flights carrying 27,000 more passengers than in 2006, bringing the total number of domestic passengers passing through PIA to 295,413.

The number of international passengers jumped by 34.06% from 155,328 to 208,225 people arriving on 1,521 international flights an increase of 224 additional flights compared to the 1,297 flights recorded in the same period in 2006.

Domestic cargo increased from 1,340 to 1,341 pieces, while international cargo rose by 38.6%, from 647 to 897 pieces.

Tennis pro serves up | Cebu-City legend trains boxing stars of the future

ebu City is not only the second-largest metropolis in the Philippines, but it is also the country's number-one tourist destination, thanks to sandy beaches and crystal-clear waters.

A natural center for Filipino boxing, Cebu is home to one of the finest and best-equipped gyms in the Philippines – the ALA Boxing Gym.

The gym's current stable includes such names as WBO minimumweight champion Donnie Nietes and Rey "Boom-Boom" Bautista.

Past fighters who have received guidance or trained at the gym include world flyweight champion Nonito Donaire and world bantamweight champion Gerry Penalosa.

Oversized fight programs on the wall of the gym offer links to battles from the past, compelling those in training to look forward to the future while remembering they too will some day become a part of history.

Behind the success of the gym is Tony "Sir Ala" Aldeguer, a 66-year-old entrepreneur who for the past 25 years has done his best to further the growth and quality of Filipino boxing by training, managing and promoting fighters.

The wretched poverty that plagues much of Cebu makes it perfect breeding ground for young men looking for a better

Aldeguer is happy to lend a hand. "My goal is to produce good fighters and even better citizens," he said.

"Almost every day we get guys coming in here who want to take up boxing as their liveli-

hoods. Some of them come with only the clothes on their backs, malnourished, with not even a change of underwear.

"Normally, I will give them a week of training and make a decision on whether or not I think they have what it takes to be a fighter: the right attitude, the willingness to work hard.

"If not, I'll give them a few bucks and send them on their way," he said.

Located in the bustling Talamban area of Cebu City, the gym is set in the back of a compound that serves as headquarters for Aldeguer's numerous businesses ventures.

Not only is the compound the command center for Aldeguer, it is also the domicile of numerous wild animals.

There are five monkeys, a variety of birds, fish and two large crocodiles.

Aldeguer said that they are his secret weapon to motivate boxers.

"When the fighters get lazy in their training, we throw them to the crocs," he said, jokingly.

At an age when many are content with retirement, Aldeguer is a busy man.

The gym is Aldeguer's turf, his home away from home and the place he relies on most to re-

Like an old, battle-scarred lion, he patrols the grounds, searching for weaknesses in his students, correcting them when need be and always trying to better prepare them for their future encounters.

Each afternoon, when Aldeguer makes his way into the gym, his fighters greet him one by one with a "hello" and a kiss on the cheek.

He is highly revered by those around him in boxing and business.

"There are a lot of frustrations in boxing for sure and I've had my share of setbacks, but for me, what I enjoy the most in the sport is the development; seeing a young person grow into a fighter and into a man," he said.

Aldeguer takes no money from his fighters and loses money on the majority of his promotions. He continues to promote his fighters for the love of the sport.

Last year, Cebu was the scene of two world title bouts: Z Gorres-Fernando Montiel and Donnie Nietes-Pornsawan Kratingdaenggym. The ALA camp went 1-1, with Gorres losing a hotly-disputed split decision and Nietes becoming Aldeguer's first world champion.

On February 2, Gorres will vie for a world title in Cebu when he takes on Vic Darchinyan.

Win or lose, Tony Aldeguer will continue to do what he always does, developing fighters and turning them into productive citizens. Boxing could use more people like him.

PHUKET: Thailand's first international windsurfing rally championship, the Puravarna Windsurfing Rally for His Majesty the King, was held over four days from January 16 to 19, with homegrown windsurfer Navin Singsart taking first place.

K. Navin (114 points) narrowly beat Poland's Kamil Lewandowski (113 points) to take the title. Another Thai, Arun Homraruen (106 points), took third place.

Thirty-one windsurfers from 21 countries, including Great Britain, the US and Germany, took part in the rally along with seven Thai entrants.

Scoring for each day of racing was based on the number of surfers in the race, with 30 points going to the winner and zero points to the surfer in last place.

The grueling course took competitors 100 kilometers along the west coast of the island, starting from Nai Yang Beach on January 16 and ending at Nai Harn Beach on January 19.

the closing ceremony held at the Royal Phuket Yacht Club on January 19.

Dr Suwit commended all those involved in the racing as well as the event organizers.





Rassada Municipality moves on up

RASSADA: In the stakes for the most impressive local authority offices on the island, Rassada Municipality has entered the fray with a purpose-built, five-story, Sino-Portuguese-style building costing 24.3 million baht.

The new building, which is 80% complete, ranks third in the budget stakes for the best local municipality offices. Kata-Karon Municipality's new building cost 56 million baht and Wichit Municipality's new home cost 35 million baht.

Construction of the new Rassada Municipality offices, designed by Home One Design Co Ltd, began January last year and is expected to be complete by the end of February, about a month behind schedule.

Rassada Municipality Public Works Chief Nipit Charoenkarn explained to the Gazette that contractor Thippawan Construction suffered labor shortages during construction that delayed completion the project.

"The company has to pay 24,300 baht per day for finishing the work late. However, we expect that the building will be ready by the end of February as now there are only some minor works to complete, such as the installation of sanitary ware and flooring, and painting the outside of the building," K. Nipit said.

When finished, the building will have total usable area of 2,500 square meters, ready for officers to serve the 32,000 residents in Rassada's seven villages, he added.



a storeroom and a meeting room measuring 4.5m by 6 meters that can seat about 10 people.

The third floor will feature the public works and education department offices, while the fourth floor will house an office with a lounge for Mayor Surathin Lain-udom and separate offices with a shared lounge for his deputy mayors.

The fifth floor will comprise the offices of the municipal council president, vice-president, a municipal council office and a air-conditioning system.

"We expect to move into our new offices about October this year, after the interior decoration has been completed and the furniture installed," said K.Nipit.

The new building follows Rassada Municipality being upgraded from a Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*)



his single-story, fourbed-room pool villa sits on pristine beachfront on Koh Maphrao (Coconut Island) off the east coast of Phuket, where the pace of life is relaxed and tranquil.

Gardening by Bloomin' Bert

Talking afoul on composting

like swearing. It's effective. Some people don't, but it sounds ludicrous when some one drops a hammer on their big toe only to blurt out, "Oh fiddlesticks" or "Blinking heck". It just doesn't work.

They're annoyed. In fact, they're angry – several pounds of steel dropping on any part of your anatomy is going to hurt. A lot. Swearing, therefore, provides a release. I'm not sure whether uttering a random expletive physically eases the pain, but I'm convinced that it helps in some way.

Unfortunately, there are those from certain parts of the world who need to learn how to swear properly. The uncomplimentary word that used to refer to a child of unwed parents is a good example. Those from the south of England, please try to get it right. The "a" sound is the same as the start of "apple", not "aardvark". Besides, it's somehow a lot more effective if you at least attempt to utter the word with some variation of a Yorkshire accent.

And a little advice for Americans: don't say "bloody". You just sound silly. While we're on the subject, that also applies to "mate". It's as daft as Brits going round addressing everyone as "buddy".

Anyway, back to swearing. Some swear words are no longer swear words – and that's official. In the late '70s, the rebellious British punk-rock band The Sex Pistols released an album called *Never Mind the Bollocks*. The manager of a shop displaying posters was arrested and charged under the Indecent Advertising Act.

The court case revolved around the alleged indecency of the word "bollocks". The decisive

evidence came from a professor of English and former priest, who successfully argued that the word was accepted slang and had been in use for centuries.

He explained that a bollock was an Anglo-Saxon word meaning "small ball". "Bollocks" was also 18th-century slang for a clergymen, owing to their reputation for talking nonsense, or, in common parlance, a load of old balls. The professor won the day, the shop manager was acquitted and The Sex Pistols' notoriety was assured.

Anyway, back to swearing – again. I'm probably not al-

lowed to use the word "shit" in this column, but this is basically what this week's rambling is all about. Technically, it's not shit, but it's close. I'm talking about manure, properly known as compost in gardening circles. I don't go all tree-hugger very often, but composting really does make

It's easy to make compost. You can do it in your back garden with no experience whatsoever. All you have to do is pile a combination of organic ingredients on top of one another in a way that ensures the air and moisture necessary to develop bacteria permeates the pile. Then, you churn the pile on a regular basis to make sure that the bacteria thrives

The ingredients can be just about any organic material. Coffee beans, banana peels, grass clippings, sawdust, bark, mulched leaves, grass, branches – anything. Any of these are fine, as long as there are no nasty chemicals in them.

Other items that will compost well include scraps of fruit

and vegetables, tea leaves (including tea bags), vegetable-plant remains, cardboard, old flowers, old straw and hay, animal bedding, egg shells, plants and weeds (dead or alive) and even hair (human, dog, cat, guinea pig and so on).

of compost. This

prove them right.

You can create compost in containers specifically designed for composting or simply in piles described above, strangely enough, known as compost piles. Each method has its pros and cons. Piles can be tilled and churned more easily, but a bin would probably look more proper in a garden.

Bins can better provide the moisture and temperature necessary for composting to occur, too. If you begin with a compost pile or pit, it will attract earthworms that will assist in breaking down the ingredients of the pile.

Make sure you select a sunny spot for your project and start by placing a layer of plant waste: straw, hay, leaves, old vegetables and fruits are perfect for starters. Add a layer of manure and bedding about 10-centimeters deep and then add a layer of top soil about 1cm thick.

Sprinkle a small amount of lime on top. You can substitute this with dust or wood ashes to add to the mineral content. Make sure to add water often, continue to add layers and make sure to keep the compost loose and free to breathe.

The heap will begin to shrink and heat up within a few days. Turn the whole lot after about three weeks with a hoe or pitch fork and do the same thing again three weeks after that. Make sure to turn out the entire pile to expose all of the internal juicy bits that require aeration.


Be careful not to turn the pile too much, as heat needs to build in order to facilitate the decaying process. It's surprising how hot a compost pile can get. Keep it moist but don't soak it. Your compost should be ready in about three months.

When it comes to applying compost onto your garden, timing and method have a lot to do with the age of the pile and the degree of composting that has already occurred. If fully matured, this pile will be rich in nutrients and the scent will be musky and earthy.

If it's only half-completed, the smell and look will be far less rich and bits of fiber will still be seen in the pile. You should probably let it finish maturing. You'll want to apply your compost about a month or so before you plant in order to let it properly mix with the soil

Some say, perhaps with justification, that this particular column is always full of compost. This week, I think I've pretty much proved it. I can even say it's bollocks. I'm allowed to.




