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Officer charged over tsunami funds scandal

BANGKOK: The Royal Thai Police Disciplinary Division has charged a high-ranking officer in the Foreign Affairs Division over alleged improprieties in the use of funds for the Thailand Tsunami Victims Identification (TTVI) center.

Col Chaiyaporn Wannaprapa, deputy commander of the Disciplinary Division of the Royal Thai Police, on February 12 announced that Col Pornprasert Karnjanarin was formally notified of the investigation against him just two days before a resignation letter he had tendered was set to take effect, on February 10.

Col Pornprasert, deputy commander of the Royal Thai Police Foreign Affairs Division, will have his pension benefits seized unless he is able to prove himself innocent, Col Chaiyaporn said.

"The investigating panel has issued Col Pornprasert a two-part summons ordering him to appear and hear the charges against him and also notifying him that if he fails to appear within 15 days a decision will be rendered and punishment imposed based solely on the facts already collected by the panel," Col Chaiyaporn said.

"From our investigation, we believe that Col Pornprasert cannot prove his innocence and had thus been trying to avoid the consequences of his actions by reporting in sick until his resignation took effect," he added.

Col Pornprasert said that it was important that justice be proved in the case because the image of the Royal Thai Police was at stake.

The Disciplinary Division will have one year to conclude the case before the statute of limitations runs out, he said.

It was also reported that since the alleged impropriety, which first came to light in 2006, Col Pornprasert had changed his first name to Paramate.

The case made international headlines after the ambassadors of seven countries that donated funds to the TTVI requested

then-Police Commissioner Kowit Wattana to launch an independent audit of how 88 million baht in donated funds were used.

The TTVI center was based in Chalong until December, 2005, when it was moved to the Police Forensic Science Unit in Bangkok.

Problems began when former TTVI Chief Pol Col Khemmarin Hassiri was transferred to an inactive post in January, 2007, after the scandal broke.

Col Khemmarin has not been implicated in this latest development.

Senatorial race reaches climax

PHUKET: Thais will go to the polls on March 2 to vote for their senatorial candidate of choice, who will then be sworn in as one of 76 senators to be decided in the election.

On the ballot papers will be Adirak Engchuan, a 46-year-old Phuket native who holds a law degree from Ramkhamhaeng University in Bangkok; Cherdchai Wongseree, 47, another local lawyer; and Thanyarat "Gee" Achariyachai, who won the last senatorial election but was unable to take her seat because of the military coup of September 19, 2006.

The 76 seats will be elected to represent individual provinces, in addition to 74 seats already appointed by the Election Commission.

Advance voting held in Phuket on the weekend of February 23 and 24 for the election saw less interest among out-of-town Thais than before the parliamentary election held in December.

PEC Director Supap Akkam said that of 30,291 non-Phuket Thais registered to cast advance ballots in the province, only 7,301 (24.1%) did so. Of those, 2,968 voted on the Saturday and 4,333 on the Sunday.

This was in contrast to December 15 and 16, when 25,956 voters (more than 85%) made their way to Phuket Community Hall to cast absentee ballots for the general election.

K. Supap attributed the low turnout to the fact that canvassing activities of Senate candidates are restricted compared

A hidden oasis in the heart of
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Young love ends in ya bah bust

PHUKET CITY: A Muang District special operations unit arrested a pair of young lovers and seized 697 *ya bah* (methamphetamine) pills in a sting operation early February 22 morning.

The arrests were announced by Phuket Vice Governor Worapoj Rattasima and Muang District Chief Wisit Kurattanavej at a press conference at Muang District Office at 9:30 am on February 22.

The couple were identified as Nakhon Pathom native Natchapong "Ou" Kaewrattanachai, 22, and his 21-year-old

girlfriend Natthanaree Boonsong, from Phitsanuloke.

The arrests followed reports from informants that the pair were selling 10 to 20 *ya bah* pills at a time to clients in and around Phuket City at a price of 300 baht per pill.

The special operations officers arranged to buy 10 pills at a price of 3,000 baht during a rendezvous at Bangneaw Intersection at 2:30 am.

The couple arrived in a dark blue Honda Civic. After the transaction was complete, officers quickly surrounded Natchapong, who was standing outside the vehicle.

A search of the suspect uncovered 587 *ya bah* pills and 63,660 baht in cash. A search of Natthanaree uncovered 100 more pills.

All the seized pills were branded with the "WY" logo, indicating they were produced in Burma.

Also taken as evidence: a homemade shotgun with 12 cartridges, three gold chains, three Nokia mobile phones, four bankbooks recording savings of more than 100,000 baht and two ATM cards.

Both confessed to charges of possessing a Class 1 narcotic with intent to sell and were taken to the Phuket City Police Station.



The arrests in this case were made by Interior Ministry officers, not police.

with those for candidates running for parliamentary seats.

There were no reports of any violations of voting rules during the advance voting, he said.

"I hope at least 60% of registered voters will turn out to vote next Sunday," he added.

There were also 4,186 Phuket residents who cast advance ballots over the weekend: 1,918 on the Saturday and 2,268 on the Sunday. Most were people who will be unavailable to vote on March 2.

For the March 2 senatorial election, a ban on alcohol sales will apply from 6 pm Saturday, March 1, through to midnight Sunday, March 2.

Land holdout halts Rawai road project

RAWAI: The incomplete section of Wiset Rd near Soi Romjai [in Thai, Soi Ruamjai] remains unfinished because the owner of the land refuses to sell, Saroj Suvinchai, director of the Phuket Provincial Highways Office (PPHO) has told the *Gazette*.

Repeated attempts by the PPHO to buy the land, measuring 20 meters by five meters, have failed, K. Saroj said, adding that he knows that the blocked lane has become the site of many accidents.

"We are still trying to reach an agreement with the landowner, Krissana Samart, who refuses to sell the land," he said.

K. Saroj explained that when building or expanding a public road, a royal decree giving the PPHO authority to expropriate land to make way for the road is usually issued.

In this case, however, almost all of the landowners involved agreed to sell their plots for the compensation offered, so a decree was not issued, he said.

"We still don't know how to deal with K. Krissana. We can't

force him to sell. We are willing to pay compensation of up to 400,000 baht for the land, but he wants 5 million baht," K. Saroj said.

He added that Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit had also unsuccessfully attempted to negotiate with K. Krissana.

K. Saroj urged motorists to exercise caution when driving along Wiset Rd and to understand

that the PPHO is not ignoring the problem. "We are trying to find a way to fix this problem as soon as we can," he said.

Local village chief (Phu Yai Baan) Prasert Khumba said that he couldn't understand why K. Krissana refuses to sell.

Despite repeated attempts by the *Gazette* to reach him, K. Krissana has been unavailable for comment.

Revered Abbot passes away

WICHIT: Phra Ratchakiti Soonthorn, Abbot of Wat Thepnimit, died of congestive heart failure at Thalang Hospital on the night of February 24 at the age of 78.

As head of Phuket's provincial monastic council, Phra Ratchakiti Soonthorn was Phuket's highest-ranking Buddhist cleric at the time of his death.

Born as Sommart Kinkaew, the Phuket native was initially ordained at Wat Thepkrasattri at the age of 22.

He was named Abbot of Wat Thepnimit 32 years ago and appointed chairman of the provincial monks' council in 1999.

Hundreds of followers and dignitaries, including Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, paid their respects by attending the funeral bathing of the body ceremony held on February 25.

After the ceremony his body was placed in a coffin, where it will lie in state until March 5.

The cremation will be held after a 100-day mourning period, starting from March 6.

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Runaway truck causes huge Patong Hill pileup

KATHU: Tailbacks several miles long streamed from both sides of Patong Hill on the evening of February 21 after a broken-down truck rolled backwards, setting off a chain reaction smash-up that left five cars and a motorbike damaged.

Maj Passakorn Sonthikun of Tung Tong Police in Kathu said, "About 5 pm, a six-wheeled truck broke down halfway up the hill on its way to Patong. So traffic police from Tung Tong Police Station started directing traffic around it.

"As the truck had broken down in the center lane, police were directing Patong-bound traffic past it in the left lane.

"However, a tour bus driver passed on the right side and scraped along the side of the truck," he explained.

"The truck was dislodged from the rocks that were being used as chocks behind the wheels, and the truck started rolling down the hill.



No injuries were reported in the latest multiple vehicle crash on Patong Hill, in which a motorbike was pinned to the guard rail.

"It rolled into a tuk-tuk that was right behind it, which was pushed into a Toyota Vios, which was pushed into three pickup trucks and a motorcycle," he said.

"The tour company has refused to pay for the damage to the other vehicles, so I have charged the bus driver with careless driving. The damage is esti-

mated at more than 300,000 baht. I think this bus was uninsured."

However, Maj Passakorn declined to name the tour company.

"No people were injured and the bus driver has denied the charge. We are still collecting evidence to present this case in court," he said.

Missing monk found dead in PSU tin mine lagoon

KATHU: Police are treating as a case of accidental drowning the death of a monk whose body was found in a pond at the Phuket campus of Prince of Songkla University on February 24.

Maj Passakorn Sonthikun of the Tung Tong Police identified the monk as Phra Thawat Theerawiniyo.

The body of the 29-year-old monk, originally from Nongkhai province, was discovered by a female university student about 1 pm, he said.

The same student said that she saw a man swimming naked in the pond two days earlier, but was not sure whether the body was that of the same person.

Phra Thawat, known as Thawat Sansup before his ordination, had been a monk at Wat Pa Aram, near Mission Hospital on Thepkasattri Rd, for about two months, he said.

K. Thawat was apparently an itinerant monk who moved from temple to temple, practicing solitary meditation before moving on.

His body was recovered by a Kusoldharm Foundation volunteer and had been sent to Patong Hospital for examination, Maj Passakorn said.

An initial examination failed to find any wounds or other evidence of violence or struggle, he added.

Khun Phummisak appointed to Senate

PHUKET: Former Phuket City Mayor Phummisak Hongsyok has been named by the Election Commission (EC) in Bangkok as one of 74 appointed senators who will serve in the 150-member upper house, the EC announced February 19.

The new Senate will convene after the March 2 election for the other 76 seats. While the elected 76 senators will serve a six-year term, the selected 74 will serve only three years before a new selection takes place, according to the new Constitution.

Many well-wishers stopped by that morning to congratulate K. Phummisak at the head office of his Anuphas & Son Company on Thepkasattri Rd.

K. Phummisak is one of eight former members of the National Legislative Assembly (NLA) appointed to the new Senate, which is empowered to remove ministers, appoint and re-

move members of independent agencies, including the EC and the Constitution Court, and to scrutinize laws passed by the House.

In his capacity as President of the Phuket Real Estate Club, K. Phummisak was one of 15 appointed senators chosen to represent the private sector.

K. Phummisak, 61, thanked the Phuket Chamber of Commerce for nominating him and told reporters he would do his best.

Noting that he served as a member of the NLA's committee on tourism, he said he would continue to represent the needs of Phuket and the Andaman region's tourism industry in the national assembly.

The only other nominee from Phuket was lawyer Sarayuth Mullum, whose name was put before the EC by the Phuket Tourist Association (PTA).

K. Sarayuth, who was not chosen by the seven-member selection panel, is one of five PTA vice-presidents.

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Gloves come

On February 19, Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit chaired a meeting to address the issue of the non-scheduled seaplane shuttle service operated by Destination Air.

The meeting followed a previous request by Gov Niran, made on February 12, for Destination Air to land its aircraft further from the shore.

Somnuek Wijitsarat, chief of Phuket Provincial Information and Communication Office, said after the meeting that Gov Niran had asked those at the meeting to collect evidence in the form of formal complaints, references to laws and regulations that might apply, and previous court rulings involving seaplane operations in Thailand.

Gov Niran also asked for a copy of the valid permits issued by the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA) and the Ministry of Transport that give permission for Destination Air to operate until November 6, 2011, at 31 authorized landing sites in the region, he added.

On February 25, Phuket Vice-Governor Smith Palawatvichai, after a meeting with Destination Air Manager Pat James on February 20, told the *Gazette* that the dispute was still unresolved as the management of the Amari Coral Beach Hotel, which occupies 60 rai onshore from near the Destination Air landing site, continues to receive complaints from guests about noise.

In his meeting with Pat James, he conveyed Gov Niran's request that Destination Air begin using a "boat guard" to clear the landing area before landing, instead of doing a "safety flyover".

Complaints about noise were from guests near the landing site offshore from the Amari Coral Beach and not inshore at the Star Cruise seasonal floating dock, to which the plane taxis disembark their passengers, he said.

Although Destination Air's

permit allows pilots to use their own discretion in choosing appropriate landing sites in the bay, the Phuket Marine Office would like them to establish a fixed location – and has the authority to force them to do so, he said.

K. Somnuek added that if efforts by Gov Niran's office fail to settle the dispute, the case will be handed over to the Transport Ministry.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch, who previously pointed out the shortcomings in the law, about who could be charged if there were any accidents involving a seaplane, mentioned that allowing non-scheduled seaplanes to operate without having to submit passenger lists to local authorities presented security risks.

The service could be taken advantage of by smugglers, he noted.

"I think this is a major issue that cannot be overlooked," he said. "When they are in the sky, the local authorities have no way of knowing where they are coming from or where they might be going," he said.

After meeting with Vice-Gov Smith on the morning of February 20, Mr James told the *Gazette* that he felt "vindicated".

He also admitted that his aircraft were still landing at the same location as before.

"Our landing site really has not changed, as it has always been far enough offshore from a

safety standpoint. The complaint was originally about noise created when we taxi in to the transfer point for passengers, which is the seasonal floating pier used by Star Cruises.

"I think it was a big part of the misunderstanding that the noise was on the takeoff and landing. In fact, no-one even knew we were there until we were about 100 meters offshore [from the Star Cruise pier]."

"Right now, we are only doing about two flights a day in general, sometimes three. One is usually at about 9:30 in the morning and the other is in the afternoon, sometimes at about 3:30 pm. None of them are at night or in the early morning... Even the governor could not understand the noise side of it. We are not waking people up. The governor flew on our plane and saw our standard takeoff and landing locations. Quite truthfully, our noise level cannot compete with that of the longtail boats or the jet-skis," he said.

"These seaplanes... are certified to go into the most pristine national parks in North America, where restrictions on environmental and noise impact are the strongest in the world. For them to come in and say we are leaving an oil trail is so ludicrous that you know there is a motive behind it," he added.

The *Gazette* asked Mr James whether Destination Air is required to use a boat guard to clear the area before takeoffs and

landings, as is described in the company's Initial Environmental Evaluation (IEE) report issued in June 2006.

Mr James said the request was impractical under the circumstances.

"They have asked us to put a warning boat in the landing area, but it is not part of our license requirements. The area is supposed to be assured as safe for landing. The pilots do a non-obtrusive flyover to see the waves, wind and other conditions that could affect flight... They asked us to put a boat there, with a loudspeaker asking everybody to get out of the way. We clear the area before landing. Many times, the pilot will make a low pass to make sure there aren't any sticks or logs in the water," he said.

Noting that Destination Air is licensed to operate as a non-

scheduled carrier, but in fact advertises scheduled flights on printed brochures, the *Gazette* asked Mr James if he was concerned about the possibility of having his permit revoked by the DCA for lack of compliance to the terms under which it was granted.

"We are a non-scheduled carrier: you call and we haul. We do not want to be a scheduled airline. There are many non-scheduled companies in Thailand – GA for example – that are non-scheduled but are flying regularly to places like Chiang Mai and Hua Hin. They have been doing it for a decade now. It is standard practice," he said.

While operations in Patong Bay would cease at the start of the monsoon season, Destination Air is a year-round operation that is here for the long term, he said.

"The monsoon does make

the conditions a little bit more variable and we are not able to fly every day during the monsoon season, but our destinations are mostly islands and these mostly have a leeward side that we can go into and out of. Patong is only operational for about six months of the year. Once they take the pier, we cannot operate there again until November," he said.

He added that Destination Air, which now employs 20 people, has seen business pick up gradually.

"The main thing is the educational process. Everyone has the mentality of boat transfers to the islands at the moment. We are bringing a new dimension to the hotels. We are here to service the resorts primarily, not the individual tourist. Our future will be when the resorts include the cost of seaplane transfers when book-

ing holiday packages. In the Maldives, Greece and Indonesia, that is already the way it is done. It will take three or four years to get everyone to understand the concept," he said.

"I was satisfied with the meeting. The government has always been supportive of what we are doing. There are, of course, some individuals with interests in Patong who have their own agendas for stirring things up.

"We had the environmental people and the marine department with us yesterday – and they all understood our side of it. The Governor and the Vice-Governor seemed to be in total agreement. I feel positive," he added.

As far as the management of the Amari Coral Beach Resort & Spa is concerned, however, the arrival of the Destination Air flights some three months ago has been less positive.

Resort General Manager Warakorn Jarusirikul said he had recently spoken to Gov Niran and intends to send a formal letter of

complaint to him. He estimated the distance to Destination Air's preferred landing site from the hotel grounds to be just 100 meters.

"Since November, at the peak of the high season, they were landing about five times a day – now it is less, about two or three times a day," he said.

"They [Gov Niran's office] have never asked us to attend their meetings, which is strange because we have evidence such as a CD recording of the sounds of the planes landing and taking off. It starts early at 8:30 or 9 in the morning, when the guests are still sleeping.

"The first point of my argument is the noise pollution. Nobody wants to have a runway right in front of their home. The second point is safety. If the plane has an accident and hits my hotel, what is going to happen? Then what about the boatmen, snorkelers, jet-skis and swimmers out there?"

Seaplane debacle rages on

“The pilots have never done flyovers to ensure the landing area is all clear, he added.

“They come straight down, they never circle first. Circling would be dangerous to the people on the beach. They should land and take off in the middle of the bay to avoid the noise disturbance, then taxi in,” he said.

“This has gone on for three months now and they have never changed their landing site [despite Gov Niran’s request]. My owner is willing to sue them. We will never give up on this issue. We are among the top tax-paying hotels in Phuket.

“I don’t want to stop them from flying, because I know they have a license from Bangkok, but they should solve the problems they create for others. We have been here 24 years. How would you feel if you woke up one morning and found your front yard had been turned into a runway?

“They have held three meetings, but they haven’t been able to solve the problem. Even though they have a license, this is a local problem that needs to be dealt with by the local authorities, such as the Kathu District Office,” he said.

Noting that the flights had only a few passengers at a time, he said he thought it was not worth it to inconvenience a large number of people for the benefit of so few.

K. Warakorn added that he had spoken to the managers at a few other resorts nearby and was told that they agreed that the flights were a nuisance and safety risk, but that they still were unsure who to complain to about the matter.

Mischievous monkey meddlers meet their match

SRISAKET: A man was arrested in the early hours of February 21 for kidnapping monkeys from a popular tourist spot in Rasi Salai District. Police believe the monkeys were to be smuggled to Korea, to be eaten for perceived health-giving benefits.

At 3:30 am, Pol Lt Col Wisanu Reuang Sri, an investigating officer at Rasi Salai District Police Station, received a phone call from Rian Phobutr, a resident of Village 5 in Tambon Wan Kham.

K. Rian, 58, said that a gang was catching monkeys at the

nearby Wan Village Monkey Forest, a popular tourist attraction with a thousand-strong population of primates.

Col Wisanu rushed to the scene, where he found three people setting traps for the monkeys.

Also found was a cage containing three monkeys that the gang had already caught. Police arrested one of the gang but the other two managed to escape into the forest.

Police collected as evidence two monkey cages, 20 nets, a selection of various traps, hunt-

ing equipment, nuts and some bananas, which were used as bait. Police also seized a Toyota sedan belonging to the gang.

Arrested gang member Arun Kertphetch was taken to the police station for interrogation. Arun, 38, claimed that he was just the driver and had nothing to do with the monkey poaching.

The other two men had paid him 2,000 baht to drive to the forest and he assumed they were just going there to relax, he claimed.

If he had known what they were up to, he would never have agreed to take them, he said.

The only reason he had been caught was because he didn’t want to run away with the others and abandon his car, he added.

Arun said that when they got to the forest, he overheard the other two men saying that they would catch monkeys and export them to Korea, where they fetched three to five thousand baht. Some Koreans believe that monkey flesh, brain tissue in particular, is a strong tonic.

Police, however, found Arun’s story a little hard to swallow given that the gang had a plethora of professional monkey-catching equipment that Arun must have noticed as they were loading it into the car.

Police charged him with hunting a protected species without permission and being in possession of a protected species without permission.

Police said they would hunt for the other two members of the gang and expand the investigation to bust the entire monkey-to-Korea export ring.

Veterinarian Chitsanu Tiya-charoen, deputy president of the Wild Animal Rescue Foundation of Thailand, said that the belief held by some Koreans that eating monkey brains is good for the body is completely false and that the Korean government is trying to wipe out the practice.

K. Chitsanu has a stern warning for anyone interested in discovering the alleged healing properties of monkey brains: “Eating monkey brains brings nothing but problems,” he said.

“Some people eat them and die soon afterwards because monkeys are very similar to humans and we can catch deadly diseases from them, such as hepatitis B and meningitis.”

From top brass to bogus bobby

BANGKOK: Impersonating a policeman to make a little cash on the side is hardly a new phenomenon in Thailand, where there have been countless stories over the years of opportunists dressing up as officers and setting up roadblocks to collect on-the-spot “fines” from unwitting drivers.

A police impersonator in Bangkok seemed to be aiming a little higher recently, when he walked into the headquarters of the Crime Suppression Bureau wearing the uniform of a police lieutenant general, the second highest of the 16 ranks in the Royal Thai Police system.

Officers became suspicious when they noticed an unfamiliar general dining in the Bureau canteen. They alerted Lt Chaoalit Jindarat, an investigating officer at the Bureau, who came to find

out who the new bigwig might be.

Lt Chaoalit noticed that some of the badges and epaulettes on the new general’s uniform were not positioned in quite the right places, so he approached the man to question him. Apart from the uniform, the man also had a pair of handcuffs, as well as a briefcase marked with the Crime Suppression Bureau insignia.

When challenged to identify himself, the man said his name was Sommat Titathan, 51. He was unable to produce any official police identification. Sommat claimed that he had come to report for duty as the new commander of the Crime Suppression Bureau, which had recently undergone restructuring.

This came as a surprise to Lt Chaoalit, who had not heard of any changes at the top. He again asked Sommat if he had

been ordered to report for duty at the Bureau, to which Sommat, now somewhat less sure of his story, replied, “maybe I should go back to the Metropolitan Police Headquarters and have another look at my orders; they could have changed.”

After speaking to Sommat for a while longer, Lt Chaoalit began to suspect that the “new commander” may in fact be a few satang short of a baht. He therefore instructed Sommat to change out of the general’s uniform and into a safari suit that was conveniently found tucked into his briefcase.

He then called up Phahalayothin Police Station and asked them to send officers to collect Sommat and help find some relatives to come and pick him up.

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
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Samak voices support for new 'war on drugs'

Prime Minister Samak Sundaravej on February 22 defended the government's policy to get tough on drug dealers, while Interior Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung said it would "be natural" if more than 2,700 people were killed during the crackdown.

Asked about the revival of the government's "war on drugs" and the possibility of many more killings, PM Samak said, "Should we do nothing because we are afraid that someone is going to criticize us for silence killings that may occur?"

The war on drugs launched by the Thaksin Shinawatra-led government saw more than 2,800 allegedly drug-related deaths. Police claimed that those murdered were drug traffickers targeted by fellow traffickers to prevent them from speaking up.

However, several reports later showed that many victims were not linked to the drug trade.

Bombing suspect sues police. A man wrongly accused over the 2006 New Year's Eve Bangkok bomb blasts has sued the Royal Thai Police for 50 million baht as compensation.


Pratya Preechawet filed a civil lawsuit in the Phra Khanong Court that names the Royal Thai Police, national police chief Gen Seripisut Temiyavej and his deputy, Gen Patcharawat Wongsuwan, as defendants.

Gen Patcharawat headed the investigation into the six blasts across Bangkok on December 31, 2006.

K. Pratya, a 34-year-old musician, claims sloppy police work led to him and his friend Yutthapong Kiti Sriworaphan being accused of planting a bomb at a shopping mall and that the issuing of a warrant for his arrest had tarnished his reputation, put him out of work for a year and caused his family to break up.

The National Human Rights Commission has already ruled that the police's actions had violated the pair's human rights that the police should compensate the men for the damage done to their reputations.

Nefarious nanny. A Bangkok

court sentenced Boonreung Katasarn, 36, to two years and six months in jail for assaulting a baby in her care, leaving the infant with brain damage.

The court also ordered her to pay 8 million baht in compensation to the infant's father.

During the trial, the court heard that from March 18 to 20 last year Boonreung had bashed the 22-day-old baby's head against hard objects several times, cracking his skull, bruising his brain and causing bleeding.

She also hit the boy's back, chest, stomach and legs, resulting in broken bones.

The boy remained unconscious in Bumrungrad Hospital's intensive-care unit for more than 20 days.

Boonreung at first said the boy's injuries were an accident, but later confessed that she had struck him out of rage when he cried.

The court initially sentenced Boonreung to five years in prison, but halved the sentence after she confessed.

Pattaya pandering. The Criminal Court sentenced a 61-year-old American man to 16 years in jail for luring two underage girls into performing lewd acts, which he videotaped.

Police told the court they had received a tip-off that some tourists were molesting Thai girls in a bungalow in North Pattaya.

They arrested Glen Allen Richard, 61, at his hotel room on February 17 last year.

He was accused of paying two 14-year-old Thai girls 500 baht each to perform oral sex on him while he videotaped them.

The case emerged after police were alerted that four foreigners including the defendant had gathered at Pattaya Beach for lewd acts, with a middle-aged

woman procuring Thai girls for them.

The other three defendants will be put on trial separately at a later date.

Peppy promos. Starting March 25, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will take action against companies that promote caffeine-containing beverages by randomly offering prizes to consumers.

If convicted, offending entrepreneurs face a large fine, a jail term of up to one year, or both.

FDA Secretary Gen Siriwat Tiptaradol encouraged members of the public to call the FDA Hotline 1556 or alert provincial Public Health offices if they found campaigns for the caffeine-containing beverages included lucky draws or any random prize offers.

According to Gen Siriwat, the FDA ban took effect from December 25, but violators were given a three-month grace period to end the practice.

Sex-ed expansion. The Office of Basic Education Commission (Obec) will expand sex education to 5,000 more schools nationwide in an effort to teach children self-esteem and promote sexual abstinence.

The sex-education classes will focus on activities that make children aware of their values and honor, said Obec Secretary-General Khunyong Kasama Varawarn.

Currently, Obec is also holding public hearings to gather opinions on how best to develop its central curriculum.

"We are gathering opinions in the North, the South and the Northeast," she said.

Dengue danger. The Public Health Ministry will impose regulations including fining home-owners whose houses incubate mosquitoes, following four dengue-fever deaths and 2,824 patients in just 40 days already this year.

Disease Control Department chief Thawat Suntrajarn expressed concern over the increase in the number of dengue cases this year, which stands at 2,824 patients compared with 1,700 during the same period last year.

K. Thawat said that the number of dengue patients usually peaked in the rainy season from June to August, thus the authorities must quickly implement measures to control mosquito incubation grounds.

The department might resort to allowing local administrative organizations punishing the owners of homes where mosquitoes incubated, he said.

If they refused to co-operate, homeowners could face a 2,000-baht fine and/or six months in jail, he said.

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
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FROM THE GULF OF THAILAND

Boat operators on Samui have come under fire after a speedboat carrying tourists sank on its return from an excursion to Anghong Marine Park just off Koh Samui.

Surat Thani Governor Winai Buapradit has announced that tighter measures will now be put in place after the accident was kept secret for more than a month.

According to reports, the boat had been traveling at high speed when a large wave caused the bottom to crack and split, sinking the vessel.

The passengers, who were all wearing life preservers, were rescued after the crew made an

emergency call to Anghong Marine Park Headquarters.

There were no reported injuries.

The accident was kept quiet by authorities, who were concerned that the incident would negatively affect tourism.

Marine and Tourist Police, as well as tour operators, have been instructed to follow all safety regulations with regards to passenger limits, safety equipment and keeping a strict log of every journey.

As tourist numbers dwindle

Seni Phuwasethaworn, head of the Koh Samui Tourist Association, said that hotels are reporting a large number of no-shows this high season.

Many hotels claim that only 70% to 80% of bookings are being honored.

Resort managers are putting this decrease in tourist numbers down to the lack of transport available to those trying to get to the island.

K. Seni said that there are 15,000 rooms available on the island, but that the number is set to increase with an additional 2,000 rooms this year.

However, even with the increase in available rooms, the number of visitors remains the same or lower than in previous years.

Phanu Woramit, chief of Tourism Authority of Thailand, said that Koh Samui has to improve its infrastructure to attract more visitors.

He added that complaints about road conditions and drainage systems continue to mar tourism. The agreement between Thai Airways and Bangkok Airways is a welcome one.

The twice-daily flights, which began February 15, should bring in an additional 300 visitors a day, he said.

Eight arrested for drugs. Two drug-related busts took place this month with eight people arrested.

Four people were detained after 0.3 grams of yah ba (methamphetamine) were found in a house near the airport.

Police were tipped off about the residence and raided the premises January 19.

Arrested at the house were Sakorn Jawong, Kamron Phankhao, Thaweesak Khauyphiboon and Somrak Thongmak.

On the same day, four arrests were made in connection with a seized shipment of marijuana weighing

over 49 kilograms, reported to have a street value of more than 980,000 baht.

The four men told police they had brought the shipment into Thailand from Laos. Police were unable to give any further information as they are still investigating the case.

Illegal migrant workers rounded up.

On February 17, officers from Koh Samui Immigration, as well as about 30 officers from the Royal Thai Navy, led boats to block access to and from Koh Tao before raiding the island and arresting all persons suspected of working there illegally.

The round-up led to 140 arrests, mostly of Burmese workers, at construction sites, hotel establishments and restaurants.

Most of the detainees were taken to Koh Pha-ngan Police Station before being deported.

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Chalerm raises possibility of talks with insurgents

After another spate of attacks, Interior Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung said the southern insurgency could not be ended without holding talks with insurgents.

Speaking on February 22, Chalerm said, "I dare to say that the problems in the Deep South will never end unless we hold talks with the insurgents."

Talks would lead to the end of violence and are necessary for changing the attitude of the insurgents, he said.

However, he did not go into detail about any plans for discussions or specify who the government would be prepared to talk with.

The new Interior Minister has previously voiced the possibility of autonomy for the region, but later retracted his remarks after coming under fire from other members of the government, including Prime Minister Samak Sundaravej.

Chalerm's latest suggestion came after another week of violence in the Deep South. That morning, insurgents detonated a bomb planted outside a window of the Science and Agriculture Technology building of Yala Rajabhat University. Two people were killed.

A day earlier, three people were seriously injured when two insurgents opened fire at a wedding party in neighboring Narathiwat province.

PM Samak Sundaravej told a TV audience during his weekly Sunday morning address that he would deploy Army engineers to continue building four-lane roads in Yala and other southern border provinces.

An audience member called Samak's talk show to ask him what he would do now that private construction firms dared not

resume the construction of roads in the region.

Samak said he had talked to the army commander-in-chief, who agreed to deploy army engineers to continue the construction.

"I hereby promise that the four-lane road construction in Yala will be completed," PM Samak said.

Responding to another caller during the same show, he insisted that his government would not establish a special administrative zone for the Deep South.

PM Samak admitted that the idea had been discussed in small groups, but said his government had no policy to set up such a special zone.

30-baht shooting. A man was shot dead at a gas station in Songkhla's Rattaphum district on February 20, after a dispute with the gas station attendant over a payment of 30 baht. The attendant later gave himself up to

the police, claiming the killing was in self-defence.

The victim, 28-year-old Sophon Chuaydam, suffered gunshot wounds to the chest and arm. He was rushed to Rattaphum Hospital, where he later died.

Witnesses reported that Sophon drove into the gas station on a motorcycle with two passengers at about 4 pm that afternoon. He asked pump attendant Forn Khunphetch for 50 bahts' worth of gas, but when asked for the money he said he had only 20 baht. He promised he would come back to pay the rest later.

An argument ensued, with Sophon and his two friends fighting with Forn. Outnumbered and on the receiving end of a beating, Forn then drew a .38-calibre pistol and shot Sophon twice before running away, witnesses reported.

Later the same day, Forn walked into Rattaphum District Police Station and told the duty officer that he had shot Sophon in self-defence. Forn said that it

was about the fifth time that Sophon had filled up his motorcycle and been unable to pay in full. Every time he would promise to pay later, but never did, Forn said.

Forn had the missing money deducted from his own paycheck, he added.

This time, he insisted Sophon pay, which led to his being attacked and forced to use his gun in self-defence, he claimed.

It was not reported what police will charge him with.

Terminal tragedy. A terminally ill man killed his blind son and then himself in Nakhon Sri Thammarat's Chawang District on February 19.

Relatives of the pair called police to a house in Tambon Nakacha Village 5, where they found the body of 12-year-old Jaturon Phonphichai. His throat had been cut.

Relatives told police that the boy's father, 33-year-old Sonthaya Phonphichai, had been taken to Tham Phannara Hospital after he had been found bleeding profusely from a deep cut to the throat. Next to him was found an almost empty bottle of weed killer.

Sonthaya, who had fallen into a coma, was transferred to Maharaj Hospital in Nakhon Sri Thammarat City for further treatment, but doctors were unable to save him.

In the house, police found a letter apparently written by Sonthaya saying that he was in the final stages of terminal cancer and was worried that no-one would look after his blind son once he had died, so it would be better if they died together.

Lt Col Chetarat Chatarak, an investigating officer from Mai Rieng Police Station, said that police believe Sonthaya cut his

son's throat and then drank the weed killer. The pain from the weed killer was too much to bear, however, so he cut his own throat as well, they surmised. Neighbors found him and took him to hospital.

Compensation seeker. Trang Hospital Director Dr Somnuek Chuetong said Tawan Janmud would receive an initial 200,000 baht in compensation under the national healthcare scheme after his 30-year-old wife Uraiwan died under mysterious circumstances. She had been admitted to the hospital after a minor motorcycle accident on February 13.

K. Uraiwan was first admitted to Nayong Hospital and then transferred to Trang Hospital, where she underwent a brain scan.

K. Tawan said a doctor told him his wife was safe but had a blood clot in her brain that needed to be treated with clot-dissolving drugs. The doctor expected his wife's symptoms to improve in three days.

After the initial check-up, the doctor wanted to insert an oxygen tube into the patient's mouth, but decided to conduct a laryngectomy and deliver oxygen through a hole in her throat after she complained of discomfort.

Two days later, K. Tawan said he saw his wife drooling, so he called for a nurse. When he was ignored, he decided to wipe her clean himself. As soon as he came back from washing his hands, he found K. Uraiwan was not breathing.

He believes his wife's death was caused by malpractice and says he will take the hospital to court.

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While many spend their free time relaxing by the pool, organizing their stamp collections or discussing the implications of Kolo Touré's injured calf on Arsenal's chances against Milan, there is one small Phuket group that has found another pastime to fill their precious free hours.

They riffle through sheaves of paper as if searching for the answer to life, screw up their faces and curse, "Damn! I knew all this last night!"

Such is the fate of many who join this cohort – and as daft as they may look while fervidly learning their lines, they're all hoping to be a lot funnier come opening night.

The Green Man has become the de facto base camp for a crazy gang of boys and girls dedicated to treading the boards and creating great theater. Drawn together last year to perform the pantomime *Mother Goose*, the group has now grown slightly, given itself a name – The Andaman Players (TAP) – and is forging ahead with a production of short comedies, set to take to the

For TAP founding member Tony Kelsey-Stead, the formation of the group filled a void in his otherwise contented island life.

A retired school teacher from the UK, Kelsey-Stead was also a serious amateur thespian

and theater devotee back home.

Finding Phuket theatrically barren, he took the initiative to create a group to perform the Christmas pantomime at the Green Man, hoping it would develop into something more.

A trickle of support last

October soon became a small deluge as others with thwarted theatrical ambitions flowed towards the theater behind the Green Man.

"I am so pleased that these guys have all turned up to be part of this drama thing," he said. "They are such a lovely bunch of people. I am very lucky."

Families and loved ones have learned to accept that several evenings a week, their significant others will be leaping around on a stage for no better reason than to enjoy the art of acting.

Come the second weekend of March, audiences can experience this art brought to life in two short comedies – A.R. Gurney's *Scuba Lessons* and an energetic offering set in Phuket entitled *Night in a Bar Room*.

Interspersed between these will be a series of classic comedy skits and songs.

Audiences at the Friday and Saturday shows will also be fed, courtesy of the Green Man's kitchen, while Sunday's matinee performance offers a more traditional theater experience.

So has the power of the panto carried through to this new endeavor? Well, if the crying, screaming, cursing, singing and laughter at the rehearsals are anything to go by, you can be sure it's going to be another energetic and entertaining performance from the Andaman Players.

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Fine Italian dining – minus the ketchup

Who on earth dislikes Italian food? I don't know anyone who would turn down a plate of steaming spaghetti or a hunk of delicious pizza with melted cheese dripping off it. And who could deny that Italians are a warm and friendly people who make their dining experience such a positive, albeit calorie-laden, one? Italian food is a winner.

That is, of course, until you order in a Thai "pizzeria" and receive a sachet of ketchup to spread over the gobs of sweet cream and chunks of squid as a topping. This lends a certain birthday-cake-gone-wrong-with-ketchup experience to pizza consumption. Along with graft and bad driving, one of my pet hates in Thailand is pizza-desecration.

Limoncello, a fine-dining Italian restaurant at the Royal Phuket Marina, is the real deal. It's in a top location, right alongside the motor yachts and aquatic toys of the mega-rich. Inside the restaurant, there are more columns and arches than downtown Florence, but it's all tastefully done with lots of space and light, lending a clean, airy feel. The ambiance is perfect.

At the restaurant with my grandson Darren, who is celebrating his ninth birthday, we sit down and anticipate the meal we are about to eat. "Actually, for me it's my eighth birthday, grandpa. I

don't remember much about the first," says Darren.

For starters, we plump for salmon carpaccio and fresh mozzarella chunks with cherry tomatoes along with green salad and in-house bread. Darren orders a classic spaghetti bolognese.

The wine list is one of the heaviest in Phuket – and I'm not speaking metaphorically. It's about two kilos of pages of Italian labels, with eight red- and seven white-wine

regions listed. Prices range from 1,400 baht to a 20,000-baht Comptes de Champagne Tattinger. We opt for Chianti Colli 2004 by the glass.

The wine list also identifies the grape type, along with its alcoholic content. If you're driving your 1924 Bugatti, best stay off the Amarone 2000, which packs a whopping 15%.

Next up is a dish of tagliatelle. It's almost perfectly al dente and the meat is so lean and of such fine quality that I forget my obsession with fish and tuck in. The wine is spreading a rosy glow through my bones and the surroundings are so agreeable that

it seems impossible that la vita could be anything but bella.

Until ... a distant 80's melody furtively slides out of the sound system, slithers across the floor, climbs up the table leg, jumps onto my shoulder and slips into my ear like a greased eel.

Next thing you know, I'm listening to Simply flipping Red with old Micky boy warbling on about how much he hates Mrs Thatcher.

I consider ordering a couple of bottles of Tattinger, but pragmatism prevails. After all, 40,000 baht for a couple of over-sized earplugs is excessive, even by RPM standards.

We decide to take a look around and discover a VIP room to the side, along with a wine-tasting salon and al fresco dining area overlooking the yachts.

What looked at first like an open kitchen turns out to be a kitchen workspace separated from the eatery by a huge plate-glass window.

In the distance, I glimpse a white-clad figure dancing and frolicking in and out of RPM's central plaza fountain.

So that's where Darren got to when we were getting distracted by the tagliatelle ... and he said he was going to the toilet.

Just how to explain to his parents why their birthday boy has returned home soaked after eating at an Italian restaurant named after a cocktail is a challenge. I'll have to deal with that later.


Limoncello is an elegant, spanking new, ambitious eatery in a romantic setting. The staff are attentive and well trained, complemented by a young and ambitious management team, making the whole experience a decidedly fine Italian one.

Pastas typically go for upwards of 300 baht, mains 500 baht, salads up to 270 baht and desserts upwards of 250 baht. Sachets of ketchup are nowhere to be seen.

Few of us can imagine what it is like to live with a hearing or speech impairment. Speech therapist Juree Kosakul, who works with visually- and speech-impaired children, is one of the few who can. She offers an amazing insight into the world of the deaf.

"It's difficult to teach deaf children to speak," she said. "Force is not the answer. It won't help them learn how to talk. It has to be done with love.

"You have to try and understand them in your soul."

K. Juree, a Phuket native, has taught deaf students for more than 28 years, including the last six years at the Phuket Panyanukul School in Pa Khlok.

She teaches some 70 students, half of whom are completely deaf while the rest are hearing impaired to some degree. "No two cases are the same," she explained. "In order to help them you need to know each individual's background. Where they come from, what their home



life is like. You have to be able to relate to them."

Each student has his or her own story of suffering. Some students are orphaned and live with their grandparents who might be at work for most of the day, so K. Juree often fills the role of both teacher and parent.

"The work is hard and progress can be very slow," she said. "Sometimes I get so disenchanted and frustrated with students because they do not seem to make any progress despite my efforts.

"To succeed you must give it your all, and then some more. In some cases just the tiniest progress is a great victory."

Their inability to hear has not hindered their communications skills, however. "Some students have great difficulty speaking.

"Some can't speak at all. But I can tell what mood they are in or how they are feeling just by looking into their eyes. It's a kind of sixth sense I guess. You develop it after a while.

"These children are special. Often, just by touching them gently or stroking them they know what you are saying," she said.

"The touch tells them something about who you are. They might not be able to hear or see you, but they can feel you. They are brilliant readers of facial expressions, too," she continued.

"The moment you walk into the room they read you. They will know immediately if you are having a bad day. You cannot fake it with these children," she said.

"In the past I was tempera-

mental. I would get angry and frustrated. Working as a speech therapist has made me calmer, more placid. Finding the tolerance needed to do this job is hard for most people," she said.

"You have to have an element of emotional honesty in you – be prepared to share yourself."

"Most people would not like to do my job. When I applied to university I did not tell my dad

which subject I was specializing in. I knew that he wouldn't approve. But I don't regret a thing. I love it. I love helping them – seeing their victories.

"My parents are both teachers so the profession was a natural choice. Before embarking on this path I actually did not know anyone with such disabilities. I just felt an urge help these students."

K. Juree wasn't always so sure of her career choice. In her first job as a speech therapist in Songkhla, in 1980, she said, "I cried myself to sleep every night because I did not know sign language.


"It was very hard and communicating with my students was difficult. But amazingly they, my students, taught me. Though it was not an easy process I kept at it and slowly I learned to speak with my hands."

"You are what you love," the angel of the deaf said.

"When my students learn to say my name – I always feel so incredibly proud. 'Kru Juree'. It feels like when your own child says 'mom' or 'dad' for the first time.

"The parents are happy, too. Often the child speaking is a new thing to them. They are very proud when their child calls them 'mom' and 'dad'."

K. Juree's efforts have not gone unnoticed. She has won several awards from the Ministry of Education, including the provincial "Teacher Award" in 2004. She was also honored by HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn in 2003.

What does the future hold? This month, K. Juree plans to open a speaking club for hearing

and speaking impaired children on weekends. It will be free of charge for anyone wishing to attend. Volunteers are welcome.

Nissan's supercar makes a splash

At the recent 40th Tokyo Motor Show, Nissan unveiled its long-awaited new supercar, the dramatic and meaty GT-R.

The GT-R incorporates the world's first independent 4WD transaxle, which packages the dual-clutch transmission, transfer case and final drive at the rear of the vehicle, enabling the weight to be evenly distributed throughout the car.

Under the hood, the new GT-R features an all-new 3.8-liter, twin turbo V6 with plasma-sprayed cylinder bores and a special free-flow exhaust system.

Delivering almost 480 bhp (353 kW), and maximum torque of 588 Nm between 3,200 and 5,200 rpm, although the manufacturer will not release accurate figures, the new Nissan is expected to be good for more than 290 kmh with acceleration from a standstill to 100 kmh in under four seconds.

Despite its bulk, Nissan engineers have managed to reduce the drag coefficient to an amazing 0.27, combined with high front and rear downforce. Built from a combination of steel, carbon fiber and aluminum, the GT-R's body is highly efficient, giving exceptional levels of grip, thanks to a race car-inspired underbody diffuser, while allowing reason-

traveling at high speeds. A large center-mounted tachometer, with gear display on its upper right, as well as easy-to-read graphics of the display, gives instant detailed information to the driver.

The unique

able fuel economy at "normal" speeds and low wind noise.

Although the engineering of the body is a considerable step forward, the engineers and stylists have managed to retain the aggressive stance of the previous GT-R.

This is the first major change to the model in five years and clearly a great deal of thought and research as gone into it.

Designed by Hiroshi Hasegawa, who was also responsible for the Infiniti sedan and coupe, the GT-R production model is

clearly based on the 2005 concept car exhibited by Nissan.

The interior has received a makeover, designed to balance functionality, comfort and usability.

Sculpted bucket seats give the driver and passenger a comfortable, yet secure ride, while soft padding is used on the dash in front of the passenger for increased safety.

The instrument panel surrounds the driver, with all meters and the multi-function meter at a uniform height, to minimize the driver's head movement when

multi-function meter shows both mechanical and driving information, including accelerator opening, brake pedal pressure and steering angle. It also features an "optimal gearshift map" to emphasize economical driving.

"Adjustability" is the key to the daily-driving mode and a special "set-up" switch, located in the center of the instrument panel,

allows the driver to adjust gear shifts, shock absorbers and the vehicle's dynamic stability control settings: normal, comfort or high performance.

Entertainment is provided by a quality Bose sound system. All speakers are mounted in rigid aluminum, die-cast panels.

To support GT-R owners, Nissan has established special Nissan High Performance Centers, where all certified technicians and advisors have received extensive training.

Support takes the form of engine, transmission and wheel adjustment or alignment every 12 months, free of charge.

The new GT-R went on sale in Japan in December – with the first three months' production

completely taken up. Though not yet officially launched in Thailand, *The Nation* reported that "gray-market" importers began selling the model in January at a sales price of 9.9 million baht. It will be available in Europe and the US

Profits from the event went towards improving local children's education.



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

I decided a spa treatment was in order.



The 90-minute, 2,900-baht treatment was concocted by K. Kung and her team to offer something different from hot-compress massage treatments administered at other spas.

"We wanted to do some-

thing innovative. Lots of spas use herbal compress packs.

"Our idea was that since we are living on an island symbolized by the coconut, why not let that play a part? Our customers like this treatment very much and sometimes request to buy the coconut herbal mix we use. We can't sell it because we make it fresh every day," K. Kung said.

Therapist K. Puk began my treatment by applying hot coconut oil to my back. I had requested the deep tissue massage and felt a

pleasant sensation of pain as her hands made their way down my back, applying pressure to my sore muscles and strained tendons.

K. Puk patted my back and shoulders with two hot herbal ball compresses that gave off a seductive aroma of coconut milk.

The balls used in the treatment are made from mill-roasted sesame seeds and are mixed with fresh coconut flakes.

Though I was in some pain, I closed my eyes and listened to the sound of the wind merging with the noise of crickets.

After 90 minutes of pleasure and pain, I retired to a sofa on the adjacent balcony where I was served hot jasmine tea.



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It was 11 pm at Phuket Airport and my father and I were ready to depart. Our destination: China.

I couldn't believe I was going to China, the country that has predominance over so much of the world. We were going to Guangzhou – a city of more than 11 million people and the third-largest city in China. It is also known as the “City of Flowers”.

In Guangzhou, everything I saw was new. While riding on the bus to our hotel, I kept thinking, “How cool! Chinese houses. Oh! A Chinese shop. Hey, look! A Chinese kid with his Chinese dog!”

When we arrived at our hotel, everything was written in Chinese. The staff were wearing suits and uniforms that I had only seen before in movies.

I was ready to say a sentence in Chinese from notes given to me by my Chinese teacher before departing, but unfortunately I had left them in another purse, so the only word I could say was “nihao”, which means “hello”.

The receptionist answered with a smile. It worked! Immediately I tried to start a conversation, but it was a mess.

The confused receptionist called another member of staff, then another, until four people were standing there trying to understand me asking, “What is your name?”

I never learned the receptionist's name and I thought to myself, “If my Chinese doesn't improve, I will never know the name of anyone during my trip.” Nevermind; it was a good start.

The first two days were nothing special. In the mornings, my father and I spent time in a factory near our hotel. My father

wanted to know more about some machines that he intends to import into Thailand.

One afternoon, we explored the downtown area of the city. Everything was too normal and too quiet to be in this immense city that I had heard so much about.

I was becoming more and more disappointed with the trip. Before leaving Thailand, my father had explained to me his reasons for going to China and the importance of the equipment he wanted to buy.

He told me about geo-exchange, a free and clean type of energy taken from the ground [that can be used to heat or cool a structure], but, to tell the truth, my mind was focused on other things.

On the second day, it was the same: boring. I had heard 100 times the phrases “saving energy”, “renewable energy” and so on. I have always been interested in global warming and am proud to have a father working in the environmental field, but at that particular moment, I was too disappointed in what I had seen: practically nothing.

The following day, my father had to visit another company and I was worried I'd have to

again listen to the same old stories. The only difference this time was the location: closer to the downtown area and the real Guangzhou.

We were picked up from our hotel and when we reached the Denron offices, all my worries disappeared. Green all around, fountains of clean water, oranges used as decorations – a great environment. It is also a technological university.

My mind changed and I started to listen carefully to the words of my father. I began to better understand the meaning of our trip. After starting to listen to all the technical conversations, I was surprised when Denron's boss said, “We must have lunch. To eat and stay healthy is the most important thing.”

He took us to a luxurious

restaurant. I was excited about eating some first-class Chinese specialties, but on the menu I found only Western dishes and so I decided to have spaghetti.

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Gothic melodrama in Vietnam

Denis Johnson is a triple threat: poet, playwright and novelist. The 58-year-old American has written seven novels, six plays, three books of poetry and a book of global reportage. When he won the 2007 National Book Award for his latest novel, *Tree of Smoke* (Farrar, Strauss and Giroux, New York, 2007, 614pp), he sent his wife to attend the ceremony in New York because he was too busy in Iraq.

I confess to having read only Johnson's second novel, *Fiskadoro*: a slender, post-apocalyptic tale set in the Florida Keys, published in 1995. I was impressed by how he can paint visual horror as only a poet can.

Tree of Smoke is his attempt at an epic novel about the Vietnam War. There have been great non-fiction books about Vietnam – Michael Herr's *Dispatches* and Neil Sheehan's *A Bright Shining Lie* spring immediately to mind – but despite a huge number, no great Vietnam novels. The closest might be *The Thirteenth Valley* by John Del Vecchio, writ-

ten about the Ia Drang campaign, but he tried to cram too much in with long historical and philosophical dialogs by exhausted soldiers, who in real life would have craved sleep.

Tree of Smoke takes place in eight sections, year by year from 1963 to 1970, opening with the assassination of John F Kennedy and ending with a coda in 1983.

The center of the action is Vietnam, but the plot also wanders about the Philippines, Hawaii, Arizona, Malaysia and Thailand.

There are two groups of characters: the mystics and the grunts. The grunts are two brothers from Phoenix, Arizona. Bill Houston starts off in the Navy in the Pacific. Younger brother James joins the Marines at 17 and ends up as an LRRP (Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol) scout in South Vietnam. Both brothers wind up in

prison back home. There is an awful lot of drunken, repetitious, obscene dialog at endless cross purposes. Pages and pages of it, in fact, proving how the lives of the

grunts are aimless and meaningless.

The mystics are two CIA agents: Colonel Francis X Sands, a WWII veteran, Flying Tiger pilot and escaped POW from the Japanese; and his nephew Skip Sands, a freshly-minted, idealistic recruit. Here is Saigon's famous Continental Hotel, seen through his eyes:


"In the large, frantic lobby, they sat in rattan chairs under one of the multitude of whirling fans. Around them beggars and urchins crawled at the feet of exiles and campaigners – at last, a wartime capital, a post lobby full of sagas, busy with spies and cheats, people cut loose and no longer accountable to their former selves. Deals struck in a half-dozen languages, sinister rendezvous, false smiles, eyes measuring

the chances. Psychos, wanderers, heroes. Lies, scars, masks, greedy schemes. This was what he wanted."

As a poet and playwright, Johnson's skill with description and dialog is heroic, but as a novelist, he trips up on plot – and it's a long fall for a 600-page novel. The plot moves along in jerks and starts with little interaction among the characters. The only connection among the grunts have with the mystics is James's temporary service at a mountaintop base created by Colonel Sands.

The mystics are augmented by two Catholic priests and Kathy Jones, nurse and widow of Seventh Day Adventist missionary. The two bursts of romance, in the Philippines and Vietnam, between Kathy Jones and Skip Sands form one of the few tenuous emotional connections in the novel.

Other than that, the plot is pure melodrama, punctuated by long, obtuse, mytho-religious dialog among the mystics on subjects like doom, evil, fate, death and the hell that is Vietnam. The country is one long Grand Guignol series of gruesome atrocities. The plot wanders through many nebulous by-paths ending, absurdly enough, with some sort of jungle-tribe sacrificial ritual and a gallows confession. This reader, at least, had tossed away his credulity long before the end.

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Police scandal rocks tsunami victim ID center

In November 2006, the heads of seven diplomatic missions in Thailand sent a letter to then-Royal Thai Police Commissioner General Gen Kowit Wattana requesting a financial audit of the work of the Chalong-based Thailand Tsunami Victims Identification (TTVI) center, which received 88 million baht in foreign-donated funds.

"The issue concerns indications we have received that there may have been some misuse of the funds given by our respective governments to support the disaster-victim identification process. We are sure you would agree that any such misuse would be an especially sensitive and distressing matter for all of us... To ensure that these suspicions are cleared up definitively, we request that the financial records of the TTVI/TDVI be professionally audited by a reputable and qualified private accountancy firm..." the letter read.

Soon after the letter was submitted, six more countries were added to the list.

Thanks to the persistence of a reporter with the *Gazette's* Thai-language affiliate newspaper *Kom Chad Luek* (see News pages), it has come to light that one high-ranking police officer has been found by a fact-finding panel in the Royal Thai Police Disciplinary Division as "likely to have been involved in misappropriation of donated tsunami funds" in the panel's report to current Police Commissioner-General Gen Seripisut Temiyavej.

The officer in question is then-TTVI Joint Chief of Staff Pol Col Pornprasert Kanjanarin.

Col Pornprasert was notified of the panel's findings on February 8, just two days before he was due to retire.

The *Kom Chad Luek* report provides few additional details of the findings of the Disciplinary Division, only that the panel has good reason to believe that Col Pornprasert used donated funds "in a way that did match the objectives of TTVI".

Whether this was the result of bad accounting, poor judgment or out-and-out embezzlement remains unknown - as does any estimate of the amount in question.

The report raises as many questions as answers, but it at least keeps the spotlight on the case; one of many embarrassments suffered by the Royal Thai Police in recent years.

If Col Pornprasert did embezzle any of the funds, his case should be forwarded to the Criminal Court before the statute of limitations runs out in one year so that he can be put on trial and held fully accountable. Simply seizing his pension benefits would hardly be enough.

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

Power plan could be answer to Phuket's waste woes

Garbage will always be a problem for a community when it has no way of disposing of it. Not many months go by without the Thai press reporting some unauthorized 'garbage dumping', be it in Phuket, Bangkok or other cities in the country.

Asking private citizens and visitors to recycle garbage has proved not to be 100% viable and in many cases too costly.

In my native Sweden we have a different approach to garbage, with whole cities using garbage generated power from incinerators to heat houses and supply electricity for general domestic use.

In Phuket this system would be ideal for generating power to run water-heaters and air-conditioning units in residences and resorts around the island.

One incinerator for a single household costs around 100,000 baht, or less if made in Thailand. It has an isolated water tank with a capacity of 3-5 cubic meters, this can be made from any material capable of withstanding water-temperatures of 90 degrees Celsius. The system also has two to four water pumps and a temperature regulator.

A good chimney with quality filters is needed to ensure that

Vivi-Anne Andersson is a Swedish national who has wintered in Phuket for the last 12 years. In Sweden she owns a series of homes that use garbage incinerators to produce power, which is used to heat and cool the residences.

Here she shares some of her ideas about how Phuket's trash problem could be transformed into a trash benefit, by using trash incinerators to heat shower water, gather scrap metal and provide power.



the cleanest possible air is emitted from the incineration process.

Around big plants, for example the Sävenäs in Gothenburg, Sweden, it has been reported that the people living close to the plant experience far less discomfort from odor and pollution from incinerators than people who live next to oil refineries.

I personally heat three houses, approximately 600 square meters combined, with a

combination of solar-power (used only in summer under good conditions), garbage incineration and firewood.

In the summer the sole use of a garbage-incinerator and solar panels is sufficient enough to provide the homes with hot water and electricity.

One large garbage incineration power-plant could supply all of Phuket with electrical power or a series of smaller plants

would be suitable for smaller communities or resorts. One medium-sized incinerator could power a cluster of villas, while a larger one could supply an area the size of Patong with hot water.

The garbage is not sorted before incineration and valuable metal remain in the ashes, which can be sold.

I estimate a city of 500,000 inhabitants can generate a net

profit of 200,000 baht a week from recycled metal sales. This money could be put into Phuket's schools and hospitals.

It would be unrealistic to expect every hotel to acquire its own garbage incineration system. For those who cannot, or will not build their own, hot water could be made available for purchase from local garbage-incineration plants.

It's important to insure water temperatures stay above 75 degrees Celsius to avoid incidents such as the Legionnaires outbreak that happened in Patong in February of 2007.

A few years ago I presented the idea to Phuket-Bangkok Hospital who had complained about the high cost of disposing of medical waste and other garbage.

I suggested that they build an incineration facility on the premises and a reservoir for hot water production. They replied that they do not use hot water.

I want to highlight how all of Phuket's residents and businesses could benefit environmentally and monetarily from something we are currently struggling to get rid of.

Garbage can be a goldmine for all of us. We just need to grab it and start reaping the benefits.

Welcome to the jungle

I have lived on Muean-ngen Rd (the road from the Amari Hotel to Merlin Beach Resort) for 12 years.

During my first years living here, the electricity supply was interrupted only by normal blackouts, but over time the supply improved to a relatively reasonable level.

Since New Year's Eve when there was a three-hour low-voltage "brownout", we have had more than 30 low-voltage brownouts or total blackouts.

Starting at noon one day recently, we had 140-volt supply for one hour followed by 160V supply from 5 pm to 6 pm. From 1 am that morning we had another one-hour brownout, this time with supply at only 110V. After supply had returned to normal, from 4 am that morning supply returned to 110V, after which we gave up and shut off the main supply to the house.

Why has the electricity supply gone down to these levels? And will it be fixed?

Luechai Sarobutr, Operations Chief, Patong Electricity Office, replies:

The electricity-supply problems in that area are caused by many animals touching the power lines, as there are many trees very close to them.

In that area are three-phase lines and when an animal touches a power cable, the current drops and affects all houses that are supplied by the power cable.

We are currently cutting down trees and branches that are close to the power lines.

I cannot guarantee that installing a safeguard box will solve your problem, because it is a mains-supply problem.

You can file a letter of complaint to Patong Electricity Office Manager, preferably in Thai language, at 187 Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd, Patong, Kathu, Phuket 83150.

However, for faster and better service, I suggest you ask us to check your supply each time you have a problem by calling our 24-hour hotline at 076-345574.

Sorting out Soi Axels in Rawai

We are having some problems here in Soi Axels, Rawai, and the adjacent sois where some of the roads between Soi Alingy and Soi Toehinkhao, east of Saiyuan Rd, have become almost unusable due to ruts that are up to 36 centimeters deep.

Access is extremely difficult for normal cars and we have been told that refuse collection vehicles will not collect any trash from homes in these sois because they consider the roads too dangerous. Builders' lorries, however, seem to manage to drive along them every day.

Most of the residents here have taken up the problem with the Rawai Municipality who say that they cannot take any remedial action as the roads are private property. This seems like purely an excuse, however, as I have documentary proof that Soi Axels, at least, is a public road, not private.

Perhaps someone in the rel-

evant authority could please explain why this terrible state continues to exist.

Rawai Municipality Mayor Aroon Solos replies:

The problem with the small sois off Saiyuan Rd is that many of them were constructed by private developers so they could then sell land and homes in their projects.

When they sold all of the homes in their projects, they didn't then pave those roads - they just handed them over to the local authority [formerly the Rawai tambon administration organization, or *OrBorTor*, before it was upgraded to a municipality] and said that they were now public roads, leaving us to find the budget to try and improve and maintain the roads that they had made.

Our policy is to provide all facilities, including water, electric-

ity, roads and garbage collection, to each and every resident in Rawai, but we must do this by priority.

We have put every road in our improvement plan and we are doing them one by one as we get the budget to do so. The same strategy applies to roadside drains, lights and garbage collection.

As for having your trash collected, this service costs 30 baht a month per residential address; businesses must pay more.

If you have paid this fee, call us at 076-288651 and file a complaint that your trash is not being collected.

You will need to give us your exact address and we will make sure that your trash is collected.

If you have not paid this fee, please call the same number and let us know that you want your trash collected and we will organize for it to be done.

Currently in town is Ms Grovella Meek, who has come up with a new concept in self-improvement therapy. I interviewed her at the Dionysus Sybaritica Resort.

Tsow: Ms Meek, welcome to Phuket. Could you please tell me about your new self-improvement program?

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I have a confession to make. I started writing this column with every intention of warning you about the new service packs coming for Windows Vista (Service Pack 1) and Windows XP (Service Pack 3). I figured it was time to stop flogging the nagging Phuket-Internet-access-speed horse and bring in some important news from the outside world.

Then it happened. About 7 pm on February 21, I hopped on the Web to see if I could rustle up definitive word about the details of Windows XP Service Pack 3, when all of a sudden – like a veritable bolt out of the blue – my Internet connection started working normally. I saw international download speeds of 1,400 to 1,500Kbps on a 2Mbps (= 2,048Kbps) line at 7 pm.

I picked my jaw up off the floor and decided to show you how and why some normalcy returned to my Internet connection, even if my state of divine grace only lasts for an hour or two.

If you've been following my column for the past weeks, you know that Internet speeds in Phuket absolutely tank at about 11 am, no matter which Internet service provider or connection package you have or how much you pay. Speeds stay really bad until at least midnight. International access speeds in Phuket took a nosedive on or about December 14, for reasons I don't

begin to understand. They haven't crawled out of the dreck since. Until this night, anyway. Maybe.

As you probably know, your Internet, uh, interactions get routed all over the globe. If you're sitting in Rawai and surf to a Web site in Anchorage, the packets going from your computer to Anchorage may end up winging their way to Bangkok, Hong Kong, Los Angeles, Pittsburgh, Calgary and White Horse before they get to their intended destination. The return trip may or may not travel the same route. At least theoretically, the packets coming back could route through Montreal, London, Milan, Vladivostok and Tashkent.

In practice, packets tend to stick to a well-worn path. The reason's simple: money. When you pay CAT or TOT or TT&T

or Island Technology or Loxinfo or True for your monthly Internet service, part of what you pay goes to rent space on big data pipes. If, say, CAT doesn't have a contract with a particular cable or satellite company, CAT's data won't go down that company's pipes.

Many people think that CAT has a monopoly on international data traffic emanating from Thailand: if your packets go out of the country, some folks think the packets have to go over CAT's lines and are thus funneled into big international data pipes that are completely controlled by CAT. That isn't true and hasn't been for some time.

There's an eye-popping spaghetti chart of Thailand's international Internet connections that you can download and peruse. Go to internet.nectec.or.th/webstats/home.php and click on the button over on the right that says Internet Map.

That map, updated quite frequently, shows all of the major hubs inside Thailand (they're the ovals that are wider than tall) and the international hubs (the ovals that are taller than they are wide). Each of the networks is identified with a unique AS number, which is assigned internationally.

If you look closely – extreme magnification helps – you will see that, for example, True International Gateway in Bangkok (AS38082) has a 1Gbps line direct to UUNET (AS701) in the US, a 1.2Gbps line to ANC (AS10026) in Singapore and a 1.3Gbps line to DACOM (AS3786) in Korea. KSC (AS7693) has a 155Mbps line to VSNL (AS6453) in Singapore. TOT (AS38040) has a 1.244Gbps line to TMNET (AS4788) in Malaysia. And so on.

I count six major international gateways – CAT, TOT, True International Gateway, ADC, TTN TT&T and CS Loxinfo. So much for the myth

place relatively quickly. On a bad (which is to say, normal) night, my 3d Traceroute runs drip so much red the graph looks like an explosion in a paint shop.

If you look at the far-right column, you can see a list of AS numbers. Those are the numbers that appear in the NECTEC map. Follow the AS numbers and you can see how your packets are getting out of Thailand.

In this case, my packets go from my computer (IP address 192.168.1.1) to AS9931 (a CAT access point) to AS4651. Look at the NECTEC map and you can see that AS4651 is the giant CAT international hub: the one in Bangrak, north of Bangkok, that's so notorious for being slow. But tonight it's positively spritely.

What happened? I don't know. All of a sudden the routing on my international packets proceeds at a decent pace. Prior to February 21, they moved like molasses into and around AS9931 and AS4651. Now they're zipping right through.

Is this a momentary lapse? Hard to tell. By the time you read this, it may all be a fond memory.

The way to tell for sure, of course, is to look at our accumulated speed tests from all over the island, at www.live-access.com/PhuketInternet.aspx.

TRACE ROUTES: Want to know how to tell where your packets have been? Run a Tracert and see where and how quickly your network's data traffic is moving.

that CAT is exclusively to blame for slow Internet access.

With the NECTEC map in hand, you're ready to take a look at where your packets are going and why they're so astoundingly slow. You can track your packets by running a report called a Tracert (pronounced "trace route").

My favorite Tracert program (thanks to Heinz for pointing me to it) is a free package called 3d Traceroute. To get 3d Traceroute, go to www.d3tr.de/download.html and download it. There's nothing to install; the program runs all by itself without putting any nasty hooks into your system.

The screen shot on this page shows you a fast run from my computer in Patong to the Thaiairways.com server in Colorado, USA, using 3d Traceroute. Permit me to step you through the details.

When you run 3d Traceroute, you feed it a target location – a Web address to use as a destination for your packets. As soon as you enter a target, 3d Traceroute runs out to the target and keeps track of all of the "hops" – the discrete jumps from location to location – along the

way. It measures the speed of each hop. The green boxes in the screen shot show hops that take less than 170 milliseconds (which is 3d Traceroute's default for a "reasonable amount of time" to take a hop).

The yellow boxes are for hops that take more than 170ms but less than 340ms. Red boxes are for hops that take more time, or ones that have a lot of lost or re-transmitted packets. Notice how this run doesn't show any red boxes.

That's why the Internet connection this time is so fast: Each of the component hops takes

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Outrigger to showcase West Sands

MAI KHAO: Lifestyle-property developer and management company Outrigger Enterprises Group announced on February 21 that it will manage West Sands Resort, Phuket, a new, mixed-use luxury resort and residential development currently under construction by Central & City Developments at Mai Khao Beach.

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Fighting inflation and skirting recessions

We've just celebrated the Year of the Rat. With China developing an inflation problem, it will be interesting to see the average opinion of rats by the time this year comes to an end.

Despite repeated measures taken to reduce inflationary pressures, prices, as measured by China's consumer price index (CPI), rose 7.1% in January.

This was despite a rising currency, which, at least in theory, should be helping to contain inflation. The world has benefited from a weak Chinese yuan in recent years as it has meant that to trade with China is to import deflation.

Central bankers are confronting inflationary pressures in different ways. In the Euro zone, the European Central Bank (ECB) is holding its base lending rate steady at 4%. Inflation has reached 3.2%, which is well above the ECB's maximum target rate of 2%.

The ECB is hesitant to raise interest rates as it is well aware that economic growth is slowing. The ECB is forced by its founding charter to keep inflation below 2% without any reference to economic growth.

This makes life difficult for European central banks, especially when compared with their American and British counterparts who view inflation and economic growth in tandem.

The ECB's stance is understandable. Germany experienced hyperinflation in the 1920s when workers had to be paid twice daily in ever-increasing amounts just to put food on the table. Hyperinflation is a frightening scenario as it can almost instantly wipe out peoples' savings.

In the Euro zone, the European Central Bank (ECB - its headquarters in Berlin pictured here - is holding its base lending rate steady at 4%. Inflation has reached 3.2%, well above the ECB's maximum target rate of 2%.



Any country that has experienced hyperinflation remains vigilant thereafter to ensure that it is never repeated. When the European Union was considering a common currency, the euro of today, containment of inflation was the top priority.

There was another reason for the emphasis on inflation. Southern European countries would become members of the common currency and it was known that their record and attitude to fighting inflation was somewhat dubious.

Global demand for commodities ranging from "soft" com-

modities, such as wheat, to "hard" commodities, such as iron ore, is increasing at a rapid rate. The increase in demand has led to a substantial increase in prices and therefore inflationary pressures.

The US central bank, the Federal Reserve, is faced with two problems: a rapidly-sloding economy and rising inflationary pressures.

In view of its dual mandate to fight inflation while maintaining economic growth, it has chosen the latter as its first priority. Hence the rapid response in cutting interest rates from 5.25% to

3% in a very short period of time.

Many economists and currency-strategists have pointed out that never in history has the Federal Reserve moved so quickly and decisively in difficult times.

It is the speed of the reaction, combined with the Federal stimulus package of around US\$167 billion, that encourages many observers to believe that any US recession will be short and shallow. Others believe that the US will skirt recession with maybe just one quarter of negative economic growth. The accepted definition of a recession is two or more consecutive quarters of negative economic growth (economic contraction).

Here are some examples of views on the US economy expressed on business television channel CNBC. Bob Diamond, president of international banking group Barclays believes that the US economy will grow by the second half of 2008.

Craig Dunn, CEO of major Australian insurance company AMP, expects the US economy to be growing by year end but predicts more bad news in the meantime.

James Shugg, senior economist at Westpac, one of Australia's "big four" banks, believes that, at best, the US economy is "flat", with possibly one-quarter of negative economic growth.

Overall, he believes the US economy will grow at 2% or less in 2008.

He further stated that the

US banking sector is not in good shape. Because it suits their position, though, as bankers are making the situation sound worse than it actually is.

Shugg said he also believes that the US Federal Reserve will cut interest rates twice more in 2008.

Many economists are confident that the US economy will recover in the second half of 2008, or at least by year end. However, there are some who

warn otherwise. CNBC staffer Joe Kernan of CNBC's *US Squawk Box* pointed out that some predict that the US will suffer a much deeper and protracted recession than most expect.

The uncertainty surrounding the duration of the US economic

slowdown is what makes it difficult to judge when the stock market will recover. The stock market acts as a discounting mechanism; reacting to an improving situation about six months before it appears in reality.

In this case though, the "financials" (banks and related companies) are still experiencing problems. Until the financial sector improves, it is unlikely that stock markets can make much headway.

Athletes prepare for Laguna marathon

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
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A race to the finish for sellout housing project

WICHIT: Construction on the 1-billion-baht Chaofa Garden Home Project 5 is underway on 80 rai behind the Wang Talang jewelry showroom on Chao Fa West Rd.

The budget residential project began late last year and should be complete by late 2009, said developer Kasam Sriratt, president of Leelavadee Resort and Spa Co Ltd and also president of Win Pro Engineer Co Ltd.

Even though it is the fourth of such projects by Chaofa Garden Home group, the project is numbered "5" since the number "4" in Thai has a similar pronunciation to the Chinese word meaning "death".

Chaofa Garden Home 1 and 2 in Nabon subdistrict on Chao Fa East Rd were built in 2001 with a total of 700 houses, while Chaofa Garden Home 3 in Koh Kaew subdistrict on Thepkra-sattri Rd is still in development.

It will comprise 700 houses on 206 rai and is expected to be complete by the end of 2010.

Chaofa Garden Home Project 5 will comprise 144 units of single-story townhouses, each seven meters wide on 120-square-meter plots, and 220 single-story twin houses of two types: eight meters wide (92 units) and 10 meters wide (128 units).

Home prices range from 1.56 million baht to 2.76 million baht. All 384 units were sold out within a month after they went on sale in November last year.

"We usually spend about two years to complete a project but because this project sold out very fast, it will need to be completed fast too," K. Kasam explained.

"We expect that we can transfer the titles to customers by about August this year and expect to finish all the transferring

process within the third quarter of the next year," he added.

The infrastructure system including the roads, electricity, and water supply system to each plot is about 80% complete and all infrastructure work is expected to be completed by the middle of this year, he said.

The Chaofa Garden Home Project 5 homes' design is distinct from the other projects, with a Balinese style and roof shingles instead of corrugated roof sheeting, K. Kasam explained. Ceilings will also be higher than usual, about four meters high.

A feature that will appeal to car owners, he said, is that the roads within the project will be wider than required by regulation; 18 meters wide for main roads and 12 meters wide for secondary roads.

DENIED: Building permits rejected for three coastal projects

PHUKET: The Provincial Natural Resources and Environment (PNRE) committee chaired by Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Rattasima has denied building permits for three marine projects, citing Interior Ministry regulations prohibiting such construction in six sub-districts (*tambon*).

The projects denied building permits were an application by Trisara resort developer Three Dolphins Co Ltd to build a wharf in Cherng Talay for boats under 20 tons displacement; a floating pier at Surin Beach planned by Twinpalms Phuket Hotel at Surin Beach and a request submitted by Pla Seafood restaurant, also at Surin Beach, to install a floating dock to serve boats under 10 tons as well as buoys to mark off a safe swimming area.

In denying building permits for the three projects the committee cited Interior Ministry Regulation 20 issued in 1989, which forbids such construction in a designated zone that covers coastal regions in tambons Sakoo, Cherng Talay, Kamala, Patong, Karon and Rawai.

Starting 50 meters inland, the designated zone is 150 meters wide, extending another 100 meters offshore.

The committee also noted that the location of the proposed wharf by the Three Dolphins company fell inside the boundaries of Sirinath Marine National Park.

The committee gave its approval in principle for installation of intake and effluent pipes to a reverse-osmosis water-treatment plant that will serve The Yamu development in Pa Khlok, Thalang.

Although the PNRE committee has yet to receive the application to install the pipes, it was told that the application had already been approved by the Phuket Marine Office, the provincial office of the Natural Resources and Environment Ministry and the local office of the Department of Industry.

The committee asked the developer to submit documents from those agencies before granting final permission.

Other projects considered by the committee were two floating plastic piers to berth boats not over 10 tons gross at Koh Sireh in Rassada and a floating pier at Ao Makham by the Bavana Co Ltd.

The committee said that environmental impact reports of the projects' effects on coral would have to be studied before a decision is made.

The committee comprises representatives from 15 provincial offices, including the Phuket Provincial Marine Office, the Public Works and Planning Office, the Fishery Office, Phuket office of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE), and the Marine and Coastal Resources Office.

I realize that it's not the manufacturers of these products that are to blame, but the nanny state that controls them. It appears that people are content to be patronized in this way; almost as if they need to be told that eating fast food and drinking a gallon of beer may cause weight gain.

I have a message for them: We know – that's why we're fat. We don't need to be reminded. In fact, constantly being told that we shouldn't do something is far more likely to encourage those of us with more childish tendencies to go out and do exactly that.

Britain is one of the worst offenders in the Nanny State stakes. Over the past few years, it has managed to fritter away more than a UK£1 billion (about 61 billion baht) in its pathetic attempt at social engineering; trying to recruit students from "disadvantaged" homes to attend university.

"open" days in their aim for local fire brigade staff to be 15% female and have 3% from ethnic minorities. What about targets for reducing the number of fires?

Some things are so obvious we just don't see them. During all the years that I have been writing this column, I think I have not once mentioned the deferential marigold. An obvious plant in Phuket.

Marigolds are originally native to Central and South America. European explorers took the plant home and marigolds quickly spread across the continent and eventually to Asia.

Marigolds are typically or-

ange, though yellow is also fairly common. Other colors include red, maroon, and ivory. The common varieties at local garden centers reach about 30 centimeters tall, while some African species of marigolds can grow as tall as a meter.

Marigolds have herbal benefits, too. Marigold tea allegedly encourages healthy skin and good circulation. Stir in some honey and drink – fairly quickly, I suspect, as I can't imagine the concoction tasting pleasant. Sprinkle marigold flowers on a salad for extra color and flavor, if nothing else.

Growing marigolds isn't dif-

icult. Plant seeds in about half-a-centimeter of potting soil and keep the soil moist.

Shoots will appear within days. When leaves have fully formed, transplant them to individual containers and thin them out as they get bigger.

When the plants are ready, plant them where they will get plenty of sun. Marigolds will need watering during the dry seasons, but as long as they have lots of

sun and well-drained soil, they will grow.

Pinch off spent blooms to direct the plant's energy to creating new flowers, but allow a few blooms to dry on the plant then harvest the seeds to plant later.

Marigolds are an excellent mosquito repellent. They are also effective in repelling various insects that attack vegetable plants.

Some marigolds have a particular smell that many insects and humans find objectionable. Insects generally prefer not to be around marigold flowers.

The smaller varieties of marigolds make great border plants and the larger strains make good bedding plants.

Marigolds look good in pots and even feature well in gas-station, emergency wife-placation bouquets.

For some reason, marigolds are now considered fairly ordinary and are often overlooked in selecting annuals and designing flowerbeds, but that's a bit unfair.

Marigolds offer a huge variety of plant heights, flower forms and colors. In fact, it's hard to make any general description of them as a group except that they all bloom – and some more prolifically than others.

Marigolds are probably one of the more obvious things you could grow in a Phuket garden. So obvious that I'd missed it. You're best off keeping that to yourself should you visit the UK – somebody with nothing better to do is likely to impose a marigold quota. Time for my pie and chips, I think.

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A view to dine for



Even as day fades into night the soft, modern, relaxed ambiance of this hilltop restaurant remains intact.

All the colors reflect a Zen style that blends with nature. However, it’s not all toned down as the lighting and glass features add sparkle.

The finishing touch comes out in the evening – a candle-lit white lantern is set on each table as the sun goes down, adding an extra glow and a modern touch to the warm and inviting atmosphere.
