PHUKET CITY: Incumbent Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwannasuppana was re-elected by a comfortable margin on May 11, garnering 10,657 votes (57.4%) to just 7,910 (42.6%) votes for her rival Ayuth Tansiriroj, leader of the Chao Baan Sarng San (Creative Village People) party.

In a remarkable outcome in voting for regular council seats, it was a clean sweep for members of Somjai's Khon Noom (Young Turks) party, who won all 24 seats – six in each of the four voting precincts. It will be the second four-year term for K. Somjai, also known as Jae E, who became the city's first directly elected Mayor in April, 2004 following the municipality's upgrade to full city status.

When the voting was completed and the scale of the Young Turks' victory began to emerge, some female candidates of the Creative Village People party were in tears and had to be consoled by their party leader Ayuth Tansiriroj.

K. Ayuth, whose family owns Bangkok Phuket Hospital, was one of three deputy mayors dismissed by K. Somjai one year into her first term as Mayor.

Campaigning was fierce in the final days leading up to the polls, with both mayoral candidates distributing thousands of multi-page newsletters attacking the other and defending themselves.

One of the many issues raised in K. Ayuth's phom yaak phuut bang ("I want my say") newsletter was that K. Somjai's team was standing by idly as resi-

dents near the trash incineration plant in Saphan Hin faced health risks from dioxin emissions from the plant.

K. Somjai had the last word in that debate by issuing 7,000 copies of her own newsletter, The Truth About Ayuth that Every Phuket Resident Must Know, in the final days before voters went to the polls.

In addition to allegations of impropriety by Ayuth during his tenure as Deputy mayor, the newsletter also contained a copy of lab results from inspection, testing, certification & verification firm SGS (Thailand) Co Ltd.

The results showed that concentrations of three contaminant classes taken from six sampling sites over a 3-day period in March were all well below safe standard levels set by the government

A source at the Phuket City

Administration Office said that overall turnout was lower than expected, with just 20,262 of 44,637 eligible voters (45%) casting ballots. Of these, there were 833 "no" votes and 862 were spoiled ballots.

Wet monsoon conditions are thought to have kept turnout low at the 69 polling stations, most located in schools in the city's two tambons: Talad Yai and Talad Neua.

The winners in each precinct were:

Precinct 1: Wutthichai Saekam (2,179 votes); Songwut Hongyok (2,151); Likit Thaneerat (2,063); Prathana Tahnthiwit (2,032); Kanoksiri Prachumpan (2,007); and Worapop Rattachothipong (1,981).

The top vote-getter among the six Creative Village People candidates was Pornyamon Khanlkaikul, with 1,905 votes.

DSI reaches out to scammed rubber investors

PHUKET: The Department of Special Investigation (DSI) has set up a desk at Phuket City Police Station to accept complaints from victims of an "investment company" thought to have defrauded some 5,000 southerners of more than 151 million baht.

Thanin Prempri, head of the DSI Phuket investigation team, told the Gazette that Amorn-ake Petluechai and two associates of his Khon Kaen-based Thaninanan Co Ltd were charged in early-March with multiple counts of conspiracy to commit fraud. They were sent to a Bangkok jail without possibility of parole.

The arrests followed a DSI investigation after numerous complaints that the company had promised 6% to 8% monthly interest payments to people investing in its "rubber share" fund.

A search of the company's offices uncovered a list of 712 people who invested a total of 217,540,500 baht in the scheme. Many were from Phuket.

The DSI estimates that some 5,000 investors nationwide fell for the scheme, suffering total losses of more 151 million baht.

Fifty cases have already been filed against the company in Khon Kaen court and many more are expected.

A complaint desk set up in Krabi last month has already accepted complaints from 959 victims, he said.

"The Phuket complaint desk we set up on May 9 has already had more than 70 people come forward to report losses of 13 million baht," he said.

The desk will continue to accept complaints until May 22.

The top Creative Village People candidate was Wittaya Tantisuthiwej, who scored 1,808 votes.

Cellphone ban starts May 19

PHUKET: Phuket Provincial Police Chief Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch has warned motorists that they have until May 19 to break the habit of talking on a mobile phone without using a hands-free set while driving - or face being fined.

However, Gen Decha said that local police will not fine motorists for breaking the law until May 19.

"After that, they face a fine of 400 to 1,000 baht," he said.

"The new law will apply to car and motorbike drivers," Gen Decha said.

Phuket Senators not short of spare change

BANGKOK: Phuket Senator Thanyarat Atchariyachai and her husband K. Pamuke have combined assets totaling just under 1.7 billion baht, according to asset declaration statements posted by the National Counter Corruption Commission (NCCC) on its website on May 8.

K. Thanyarat declared assets totaling more than 684 million baht, while her husband K. Pamuke, managing director of the Kata Group, declared assets of just over 1 billion baht.

The bulk of their combined total comprised landholding assets worth about 1.1 billion baht.

K. Thanyarat also had debts totaling 29 million baht.

Former Phuket City Mayor Phummisak Hongsyok, one of 74 appointed senators, was listed as having 224 million baht in assets and 21 million baht in debts. His wife, K. Sasinee, executive secretary at Anuphas and Son Co Ltd, declared assets of 1.4 million baht.

The biggest component of his assets was landholdings, with 137.6 million baht in land title deeds. Most of it, over 200 contiguous rai in Wichit and Kathu, is still undeveloped. K. Phummisak also listed 72.4 million baht in bank savings and 12.8 million baht in stocks.

According to Sections 259 and 260 of the new Constitution, all 150 members of the upper house are required to submit to the

NCCC an account showing assets and liabilities and those of their spouses and children who have not yet reached the legal age of 18 within 30 days of being sworn in.

Asset statements are also required of the Prime Minister, his Cabinet and all members of parliament.

When the asset declarations of Phuket's three MPs were announced in March, Tossaporn Tephabutra was listed as the second-richest member of the Thai parliament, with combined family assets of more than 963 million baht.

Fellow Democrat MP Chalermlak Kepsap declared more than 140 million baht in assets while Rawat Areerob had some 60 million baht in declared holdings.

Eight nabbed in local drug bust

PHUKET: Cherng Talay Police have arrested eight people on drugs charges, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampeth announced on May 6.

Cherng Talay Police arrested Prasit Waharak, 31, from Phang Nga, in possession of ya bah (methamphetamine) in a sting operation at the Bang Tao weekend market, he explained.

After questioning Prasit, the officers arrested Thanongsak Phromdech, 32, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat; Somchai Nitaram, 32, from Nakhon Ratchasima; and Yuthana Khantikul, 32, and Isahak Hayeewaeyuso, 23, both from Bangkok.

All have been charged with possessing ya bah, Gen Decha said, adding that Isahak has been charged with possession with intent to sell or distribute the drug.

While questioning the five suspects, police learned that Yuthana ordered 400 pills from a dealer in Bangkok and had transferred payment to the dealer's bank account. The dealer sent

Phuket, Gen Decha said.

The interrogations also led to the arrest of Cherng Talay residents Saknarin Proksakul, 19, Atthachai Maneesri, 21, and Marina Prabpet, 19.

All three were charged with possessing and selling ya Ice (crystal methamphetamine).

In total, 457 ya bah pills, four packages of ya Ice with a total weight of 210 grams and a

Isahak to deliver the pills in white Honda Jazz car and four mobile phones were seized.

> Police have been issued an arrest warrant for the dealer in Bangkok, a Thai, and will seize the money in that person's account, Gen Decha said.

> He added that police were now investigating leads of foreigners buying ya Ice and of one foreigner in Cherng Talay selling the drug.

> "We can't give the name of the foreigner involved in selling the drug, but police are keeping an eye on that person and are collecting evidence before moving to make an arrest," Maj Gen Decha said.

Tour guide, 31, dies of 'heart attack'

RASSADA: Police have cited heart failure as the probable cause of death of a man found dead in his Rassada apartment on May 2.

Phuket City Police duty officer Lt Salan Reedeng said his station was alerted after security staff at Building 3 of the Rassada National Housing Authority apartment complex reported a foul odor coming from a fifth-floor apartment.

Arriving about 7:30 pm, officers discovered in the apartment the corpse of Boonlert Tengvanich, 31, who worked in Phuket as a tour guide, said Lt Salan


"We found him lying on his bed in his underwear. We believe that he had been dead for about seven days [before his body was discovered]," he said.

K. Boonlert had visited a doctor at Vachira Phuket Hospital and complained of chest pains on April 29, he added.


K. Boonlert, who was registered as a resident of Phang Nga's Muang District, most likely died of heart failure, he said.

Doctors at Vachira Phuket Hospital examined the body and took samples before releasing it to relatives. Confident that heart trouble was the cause, the relatives cremated the body.

However, police are still awaiting the final autopsy report.

Plodprasop criticizes NDWC's effectiveness

CAPE PANWA: Dr Plodprasop Surasawadee, assistant minister of the Prime Minister's Office, on May 7 likened the status of Thailand's National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) to that of an "abandoned toilet".

His scathing remark was made at the Phuket Aquarium at the opening of a three-day convention on coral reef research and management.

As a former director of the NDWC, he said he would use his current position to lobby Cabinet for the NDWC to be an independent agency.

The NDWC, established by the Thaksin administration after the tsunami, was placed under the Thai Meteorological Department by the government of Surayud Chulanont.

That move has harmed the NDWC's effectiveness to the extent that Dr Plodprasop compared the agency's current status with that of an "abandoned toilet". Formerly, the NDWC could

issue warnings independently, but now all alerts must first be approved by both the Meteorological Department and Prime Minister's Office. Resulting delays could cost many lives if another disaster strikes suddenly, he said.

fice of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) issued a landslide warning on May 10.

'We have officers on 24-hour standby, manning phones and radios, ready to deal with any problems," said Chotenarin Kerdsom, chief of the DDPM – Phuket office.

"Because of the southwest monsoon wind, Southern Thailand can expect to have more hard rain, hard wind and waves of up to two meters high in the Andaman Sea. Small boats should not leave the shore," he added.

K. Chotenarin named 14 landslide risk areas: Baan Mai Reab, Baan Nua and Baan Kalim in Kathu; Baan Kanan, Baan Kuan, Baan Pak Cheed, Baan Lipornbangkok and Baan Tha Rua in Thalang; and Baan Kata, Baan Bangla, Baan Kokchang, Baan Watmai, Baan Laem Promthep and Baan Chidcheaw in Muang district.

"Luckily, we have not yet had any landslides in any of the risk areas, but we are worried about areas with construction sites because in the past many landslides have occurred near work sites," he said.

urmese migrants form the backbone of Phuket's construction industry. They are also found largely in the fishing industry and on rubber plantations. Over the past 20 years, their labor has been indispensable to Phuket's development.

Yet Burmese are the subject of almost daily abuse and recrimination in the Thai press and suffer manifold depredations at the hands of corrupt officials.

Many live in poor conditions in crowded work camps and are denied basic human rights. Even Burmese legally registered under Thailand's guest-worker program suffer restrictions shocking in a civilized society.

"They are not allowed out of their camps at night," said a Phuket woman who has long driven much of her trade with Burmese labor.

"They cannot leave the worksite without written authorization from their employers. Police sometimes demand that they be accompanied by a Thai. They are forbidden to ride motorcycles or possess cellphones... Anything forbidden is forfeit to the police if they can find it," she explained, "so they're targets of frequent searches.'


ers, were first suggested by former Phuket Governor Pongpayome Vasaputi.

He was reacting to an incident in which three drunken Burmese raided a Phuket City slum house and tried to rape a woman. In the event, no-one was hurt.

Several years ago, the fishing port area saw a continuing spate of violent stabbing deaths, so many that the area was nicknamed by Thais as the "Burmese cemetery". Yet, then as now, migrant Burmese have little record of violent crime or theft within the greater community. "They are terrified of being arrested and deported," said a Phuket City contractor, "so they behave themselves. You never need worry about theft of tools or materials; they're punctual, work harder and are more responsible than my Thai workers – all because they're afraid."

Once a flourishing and powerful empire, Burma has suffered almost continual warfare, both external and internal, since the 1820s. Economic development has languished, prompting an exodus of job seekers to Thailand over the past two decades that shows no sign of abating. Human Rights Watch, an international advocacy group, estimated last January the total number of Burmese nationals in Thailand at more than two million.

Their plight in relativelyprosperous Thailand was cast sharply into international focus last month when 54 suffocated in a container lorry en route to Phuket. Human rights organizations have argued since the early '90s that many foreign laborers mostly Burmese – work under conditions best described as "slavery". But the country's 1955 anti-slavery law has been used



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only once, in 2006, against a mother-of-four convicted of cruelty to her maid. The mother was forced to pay 200,000 baht in compensation.

As for human trafficking – the government reported 88 arrests for human trafficking from September 2005 through February 2007.

None of those arrested were government officials. Only small fish are caught. On April 22, for example, 35-year-old Panchalee Chusook, wanted in connection with the suffocation tragedy, handed herself in to police. She told police she was paid 30 baht per head to supply packaged lunches to the victims. "Our only job was to supply lunch... My task was to count them as they entered the container."

Most advocacy groups suggest, diplomatically, that trafficking in laborers has proceeded with official connivance. After the most recent incident, officials vowed they would "track down the perpetrators and bring them to justice". Cynicism about such claims, even among officials, was open.

On April 30, Saisuree Jutikul, chair of the Co-ordinating Sub-Committee on Solving the Problem of Trafficking in Women able to capture the ringleaders. If they do, it will be the first time we have discovered any.

"I've been thinking we should invite police from Scotland Yard to Thailand to exchange views on investigation methods for tracking down the trafficking gang suspects... if acting national police commander Gen Pacharawat Wongsuwan agrees, I'm sure it will be a plan that gets results. Personally, I find it discouraging, after more than 20 years in this field, never to have been able to capture the head of even one gang.'

The day after the April 9 suffocation tragedy, Interior Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung said, "I fear we are going to be attacked for human rights violations because of this... The border is long, however, and detecting all who sneak across - difficult - [so] I don't want to hear accusations of official involvement..."

But the question of official involvement is indeed uppermost. Twenty-one organizations representing immigrant laborers, private development groups and Thai labor unions led by Wilaiwan Sae-Tia, who chairs the Thai United Labor Committee, protested on April 21 outside Parliament.

Special Investigations (DSI) spokesman Gen Narat Sawetnant repeated the official opinion that the case "is merely one of illegal immigration. We cannot prosecute... under provisions of the Trafficking in Women and Children Act because no-one was coerced or tricked."

Suspicion of officials' motives is almost a knee-jerk reaction among Thais. Phuket police have been caught in compromising circumstances before: a senior officer at the Chalong station was videotaped by television news allegedly trying to extort money from a large local contracting firm in return for allowing employment of illegal foreign laborers. In the resulting scandal, he was transferred, but returned

to his post in a few months after the hubbub died out.

In another incident, a caravan of pickup trucks hauling Burmese was stopped in Phang Nga one night. One driver somehow escaped – forgetting his Patong Police ID and service revolver. It was reported that investigators suspected the ring involved others at Kathu Police Station. The ring, if there was one, was never cracked.

In recent months there have been three reported cases of people apparently posing as police in order to try and extort Burmese workers.

A Chalong contractor employing Burmese told this reporter confidentially that it costs 5,000 baht to obtain a Burmese worker and 500 baht per month per head in payoffs to keep authorities at bay.

Owing to centuries of conflict with the Burmese, there is suspicion of Burmese among many Thais. So what makes them stay in Thailand and keep coming in droves, according to some accounts, paying 6,000 baht each for the privilege?

Ong, a skilled carpenter who is registered with the Labor Office and has worked in Phuket for 10 years, said, "In Thailand, we have few rights, but in Burma the military forms a separate group with interests differing from those of the public," he said.

"Jobs are scarce. Those who have them hang on to them. Teachers have learned to tell students what the military wants them to hear. Opposition doesn't pay; the military is ruthless.

"Schooling, even for primary education, is expensive. Most people can't afford the fees. The government does nothing to develop the people; they work only for themselves and big investors.

"Any boy who lacks opportunity for education is happy to join the soldiers; when his officers order him to shoot – even at protesting Buddhist monks – he fires.

"For others, the only hope is finding work outside. Educated people get good jobs overseas. Ordinary people come to Thailand.

"Smuggling operations typically have two principals – one Thai, one Burmese; both are officials or persons connected with the government. To pay the smuggling fees, emigrants sell their crops or, failing that, their land. After that, officials always seem to have their hands in your pockets. It's especially bad for illegals," he explained.

"But Burmese don't complain. This is our only avenue of hope," he added.

Even the word "Burmese", a catch-all term, is deceptive. Probably fewer than two-thirds of the "Burmese" workers in Phuket are ethnic Burman. In fact, there are many minorities. Thais are generally less wary of Mons who also live in Thailand.

Many ethnic Nepalese from Burma work as maids. "They speak English, are pretty and have fine skin. The men often work as tailors in Patong," she added.

According to Thailand's Migrant Assistance Program, at the end of 2007, there were 367,834 migrant workers from Burma registered to work in Thailand. But that is probably "only a fraction", as Human Rights Watch insists, of the total.

Annual registration of foreign laborers starts in June. The number registered has remained nearly static for six years. The Phuket Provincial Labor Office shows 35,116 registrants. The Office estimates the number of unregistered workers at about 50,000 – but it may be twice that; possibly much more.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit recently admitted there could be as many as 100,000 migrant workers from neighboring countries in Phuket.

Labor Office chief Nattaya Anudit noted on May 1, Labor Day, "Last high season, there were 20,000 unfilled positions in the hotel and tourism business." Now she is urging registra-

tion of an additional 20,000 foreign workers to take up the slack.

Plenty more will remain illegal. In a camp with 100 workers, "perhaps 70 will have cards", this reporter was told. If a construction site is isolated, "maybe only those working near the street are registered – for show. Inside they're all illegal".

According to this source, some police have opened a sideline facilitating registration: "At Keha [National Housing Authority project in Rassada] is a cop who has done it for a long time. New registrants are charged something over 8,000 baht; old ones, about 6,000 baht."

The real price, including registration and medical certificate, is 4,500 baht.

Employers charge workers for all expenses – official and unofficial. Said Ong, "Employers charge 500 baht per head for transportation to the hospital for medical checkups."

Immigrant laborers are relentlessly preyed upon: "If a Burmese works for someone powerful," said a source, "cops lay off. So they ask first, 'Where do you work?"

"But look out on the 5th of the month in the morning: they have food supplies set up for the long day to make arrests. Those days everyone in the 'buses' is Burmese."

ended up containing nothing more than an old pestle and a few rocks.

On the afternoon of May 8. Phongsakon Niamhom walked into Haad Yai Police Station and told a tale of woe to duty officer Pol Lt Somchai Hatkhaja.

Phongsakon, 28, told the officer that he had long wanted to own his very own gun; he did not tell the policeman why he wanted a firearm, however.

Not knowing how to go about getting hold of such a weapon, he mentioned it to a motorcycle-taxi driver on Sriphuwanat Rd Soi 10, whose service he often used.

Motorcycle drivers tend to play the same role in Thai society as The Yellow Pages do in the West, so it comes as no sur-

prise that the driver, later identified as 30-year-old Wichian Rakkhlai, knew just the person to fix his customer with a gun.

Before long, Wichian came back with a young woman called Saow, who identified herself as an Army Ranger.

A bit short of cash, Saow said she would sell him a pistol complete with license and registration for 20,000 baht.

Phongsakon agreed to the price and Wichian drove Saow off to go and buy the 'gun".

A little while later, Wichian and Saow returned with a little black bag that Sow claimed contained the gun. Somehow, she made Phongsakon promise not to look in it until she had left.

When Phongsakon asked to see the paperwork, Saow said that she hadn't brought it with her, but would return with it the next day. A little put off at this,

Phongsakon said that he would give her 15,000 baht for the gun alone and hand over the 5,000baht balance when she gave him the license.

Happily agreeing to this, Saow took the cash and then rushed off with Wichian again.

Phongsakon felt it was safe to

take a peek at his purchase. When he opened the bag, however, he found not a shiny pistol, but a pestle and five or six stones, all wrapped in two T-shirts.

Filled with anger, Phongsakon rushed to the police station to report the fraud. Officers accompanied him back to the taxi stand to hunt for Wichian. After a short wait, Wichian came back to his spot and was duly arrested.

Wichian claimed he was merely the driver and said he knew nothing of the scam. Police charged him with fraud. As this went to press, they were still hunting for the elusive Saow.

It had not been reported whether any action would be taken against Phongsakon for attempting to buy a firearm.

Thailand Post launches enlightened stamp

PHUKET: Thailand Post will on May 19 release a stamp to honor Visakha Bucha Day. The day commemorates three important incidents in Buddhism: the birth, the enlightenment and the passing away of the Buddha. Not only did these events fall in the same month, but on the same day in the Buddhist era.

The day is also recognized by UNESCO as World Heritage Day.

The stamp has two parts. On the left is the Mahabodhi temple in Bodhgaya, an ancient and revered building located in the Gaya district in the Indian state of Bihar, on the banks of the Niranjana River.

The building is a tall, pyramid-shaped tower with a flat top that supports a stupa. The temple has two levels. On the first, there is a Pang Marnvichai-style seated Buddha image, sat cross-



legged with his right hand on his lap. The second level, located right at the top, is where the stupa is.

On the right side of the stamp, Buddha is shown in a seated position beneath a bodhi tree, also known as bo. This represents the tree under which Buddha spent much of his time meditating on the path to Enlightenment. After Buddha decided to follow this path, he would meditate and fast for long periods.

Discovering that he could endure much hardship during his meditation, Buddha decided to start eating and regain his strength. As his struggle along The Path ended, he achieved Supreme Wisdom, experiencing this moment of clarity while seated beneath the tree.

The stamp measures 72 millimeters by 30mm and will be available from May 19 at a cost of three baht each, or 10 baht with a commemorative envelope. All 10 of Phuket's post offices will carry the stamp, of which only 700,000 will be produced.

Sex-game shop clampdown

he Culture Ministry is threatening to close Internet cafes that allow children to play video games with sexually explicit themes. Ministry permanent secretary Vira Rojpojchanarat said the National Culture Commission is looking into reports that children are playing sex games at Internet cafes.

Offending venues will have their licenses revoked and then be prosecuted, he said.

Culture Watch Center chief Ladda Tangsupachai is discussing with other government agencies ways to prevent children from being exposed to this type of material.

Recently, child rights activists and groups promoting the family institution suggested children be limited to no more than three hours a day in such cafes.

Those aged under 15 should be barred after 8 pm and children under 18 should be barred before 2 pm on weekdays, they said.

In a related development, the Chiang Rai Culture Office has reported the spread of pornographic games and books. Office Director Mongkol Sittilor said the materials are being smuggled in from Burma.

Many children and monks had been found attempting to smuggle in these items, K. Mongkol added.

Proboscis peril. The Public Health Ministry is warning that people allergic to anesthetics are at risk when having cosmetic rhinoplasty procedures performed at private clinics.

The alert follows the 19year-old Chamaiporn Kaewkue becoming infected with encephalitis after having nose surgery at a clinic.

Medical Services Department Deputy Director-General Dr Boonruang Trirungworawat urged people considering surgery to ensure they do not suffer from allergies or hemophilia.

Nose surgery is generally safe, but not for sufferers of certain conditions, he said.

Lab results later showed that the encephalitis was caused by a pre-existing case of herpes

he Culture Ministry is simplex, not because of the nose threatening to close surgery.

Medical Registration Division chief Dr Tara Chinakarn said Chamaiporn is recovering well after receiving treatment for encephalitis.

Dog's best friend. Four dog lovers have lodged a complaint with the Administrative Court against Bangkok Governor Apirak Kosayodhin and his administration, challenging their authority in issuing a regulation that requires all dogs in the capital to be embedded with microchips.

Promulgated last July, the regulation is set to come into effect July 5. Dog owners must register their animals and pay for the microchip, while those regularly feeding strays must do the same.

Failure to do so is punishable by a maximum fine of 5,000 baht.

Lawyer Prayat Senvirach said the regulation is illegitimate and unfair to animal lovers.

The Administrative Court agreed to rule on the case.


Blood on the tracks. The Food and Drug Administration has warned that some brands of cheap but fashionable dental braces are contaminated with toxic chemical elements such as lead, selenium, chromium and arsenic.

If the dangerous substances accumulate in the body, they can cause kidney failure and even death, said Deputy Public Health Minister Chaovarat Chanweerakul.

Some braces available outside dental clinics and hospitals are made with substandard materials and can cause an accumulation of toxins, K. Chaovarat said.

Such braces are worn mostly by young people as a fashion accessory, not to correct dental problems, he added.

Low-down larceny. Metal signs have been stolen from more than 100 temples and historic sites in Ayudhaya, prompting police and Fine Arts Department agents to launch an anti-theft campaign. are now targeting such signs because they are made of more expensive metal than government-owned infrastructure items, such as manhole covers and rail guards, and fetch more when sold as scrap.

Fine Arts Department Deputy Director Prarob Laowanich said temple signs are also in demand because of a belief that they can be remade into amulets or holy items.

K. Prarob called on communities to work with police to prevent thefts and for a crackdown on scrap-metal shops buying stolen property.

Bad practice. A young mother has relodged a complaint with police accusing surgeons at Bangkok's Navaminthra Hospital of leaving a piece of gauze in her womb after a recent Cesarean delivery.

Waraphorn Weerawong has not filed any criminal charges against the unnamed surgeons, but is complaining that they and the hospital ignored her complaint and responded improperly.

Police say they will inter-

view her and hospital staff to determine if there has been any criminal act.

The woman, 23, says she suffered stomachaches, infection, dizziness and severe discomfort after giving birth at the private hospital last October. She passed the gauze a few weeks later.

She filed a similar complaint with Min Buri police last November. Waraphorn says she wants an apology from the hospital and compensation for medical costs incurred.

The police have asked the woman to renegotiate with hospital staff.

Rich reps, poor reps. The National Counter Corruption Commission on May 8 released the asset statements filed by 149 senators upon assuming office.

Senator MR Priyananthana Rangsit had a highest net worth of 1.2 billion baht, while her colleague Singchai Thunthong was 5 million baht in the red.

Senate Speaker Prasopsuk Boondet has a family fortune of 32 million baht. His two deputies boast bigger fortunes: Nikom Wairatpanit with 194 million baht and Thasana Boonthong with 45 million baht.

Bangkok Bolly. Bangkok has been chosen as the venue for this year's star-studded International Indian Film Academy (IIFA) Awards, to be held at Siam Niramit Theater from June 6-8.

The IIFA Weekend Bangkok 2008 extravaganza will be held over three days and include business forums, film premieres, media briefings, a glitzy awards ceremony complete with Indian stars striding down the red carpet, and charity fund-raising events.

The event is expected to boost tourism in Thailand and attract visitors from all over the world.

The event, to be broadcast three weeks after it takes place, is expected to draw 600 million viewers around the globe.

Nakorn Ruengrot was found dead in his home from injuries sustained from gunshot wounds on April 13.

The victim's son, 15, told investigating police that K. Nakorn, 47, had been sitting outside his residence in Baan Sri Thanu when two men approached and inquired about buying land from him.

Soon after, one of the men pulled out a gun and began to fire at him.

K. Nakorn ran for cover inside the house, where he was then shot three times in front of his son.

K. Nakorn was involved in politics on the island for many

years and it was known that he had received awards for his role as *kamnan* some years ago.

He ran for re-election in October, but lost in a disputed result with only 90 votes' difference.

Accusations of election fraud were made in the months after the elections and police are looking into the possibility of rising political tensions.

Police investigating the crime believe that the men involved may have been hired hitmen who were acting on the behalf of others.

Songkran death toll. Only three deaths were recorded in Surat

Thani province over the Songkran festivities from April 13 to 15.

Two of the deaths were reported on Koh Samui, while 43 people were listed as injured on the island.

Thawaikit Phetsud, hospital communications liaison officer for the police, said that 109 people were involved in accidents over the week of Songkran holidays, but only two people had died from their injuries.

Of the many people injured during this time, 20 were foreigners.

Reports, consistent with previous years, claim that most injuries were related to road accidents involving people driving motorbikes or other vehicles while impaired.

Top golfers coming to Samui. (*Daily Xpress*) A strong field of local challengers will feature in the US\$300,000 Bangkok Airways Open which will be held at the Santiburi Samui Country Club from June 5 to 8.

K. Hama was a member of Songkhla OrBorJor representing Saba Yoi until last month, when he lost his seat in the election.

All's not well. A worker suffocated in a brick factory in Satun May 7 after a pile of earth trapped him in a well he was digging.

Somphan Rachasong, 30, and two other workers were digging a well at the Satun Cement company when the accident happened. K. Somphan was trapped at the bottom of the eight-meterdeep well when piles of excavated earth soaked by heavy rain suddenly slid back into the well.

By the time rescuers reached him, K. Somphan was dead.

A doctor from Satun Hospital said that K. Somphan died of suffocation and there were no signs of foul play.

Chief killed. A former assistant village chief was shot dead in front of his wife in Songkhla's Sathingphra district on May 7.

The body of Wichai Jansuk, 59, was found in a field in Village 3 Tambon Jathingphra.

His wife, who police did not name, was waiting by his side.

She told police they were driving home on their motorcycle, when two men on another motorcycle pulled up alongside and the man riding pillion opened fire with a pistol.

After K. Wichai lost control of the bike, the pair fell off and fled into a nearby field. The gunman gave chase, shooting K. Wichai three times in the head and body before running back to where his accomplice was waiting on the motorcycle and fleeing the scene.

K. Wichai's wife told the police that she did not know of anyone who would have a grudge against her husband. Police, however, said that a personal dispute was the most likely explanation for the killing.

Blackout. Five districts in southernmost Narathiwat province were left without electricity for three days after militants sabotaged power poles and cut power lines.

People in Tak Bai, Sungai Kolok, Sungai Padi, Waeng and Sukhirin were in the dark from May 5 after insurgents cut power lines in the areas and loosened screws at the base of electricity poles, causing them to collapse.

Saying they had lost millions of baht due to the power failure, the local business community urged officials to speed up the repairs.

Power supply resumed on May 8, according to Narathiwat Vice-Governor Niphon Narapitakkul.

A dozen people were injured, including three teenage girls who were attending the annual Red Cross fair being held nearby.

At 6 pm that evening, a gunman on a motorbike wounded two people in Yaring district, Pattani. An unknown number of militants in a pickup then launched a gun attack and injured a local resident in Kapho district about 6:45 pm.

Some 20 minutes later another group injured a government official in Thung Yang Daeng district.

Family attacked. A former member of Songkhla Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) was shot dead and his two sons seriously injured on May 9.

The body of Hama Dorloh, 48, was found in his pickup truck by the side of the road in Village 11, Tambon Lamplai, Theppha district. The vehicle was riddled with bullet holes.

Hama's two sons, Faisol, 18, and Ruissan, 12, were still alive but suffered serious wounds.

They were rushed to Haad Yai Hospital for treatment.

Police said that as K. Hama was driving from Haad Yai to his home in Saba Yoi district, a pickup truck pulled alongside him and a man in the back opened fire with an M16 assault rifle, causing K. Hama to lose control of his vehicle. Police collected 10 spent M16 bullet cartridges from the scene.

Police believe the killing was motivated by a personal dispute,


The stylists who decorated and run the guesthouse are interior designers Apisith "Ou" Jangjaiyen, Anan "Boy" Thanomsak and photographer Bandit "Toh" Namprosit.

K. Ou said they wanted to transform the shophouse into a trendy guesthouse using a limited budget.

"When we looked at other budget accommodations in Phuket, we noticed that they were all decorated in more or less the same drab and depressing style. We wanted to create a vibrant environment as an interesting alternative for guests; one that shows we are still young and still want to have some fun," he said.

"We added a lot of color and decorated the place with things from K. Boy's collection of antique items. In fact, K. Boy's collection has some valuable items in it worth trading and we'd eventually like to turn the place into an art gallery," he added.

"Each of the rooms has been decorated in a particular color to give guests a choice depending on their mood and character.





"Red, for example, is a hot color, to which I've added illustrations in gold to give it a warm, northern-Thai feel," said K Ou.

"Another room is decorated with a seaside theme. It's mainly green with trees painted on the walls and framed pictures of the sea.

Simply painting the rooms in an artistic way transforms them greatly, then we just add a few more decorative concepts to complete the theme," he said.

One of the rooms has a floral theme with oversized flowers hand painted on the walls. K. Ou said that the trio of visionaries painted the walls themselves, relying on their own feelings, rather than specifically planned designs. As such, the place has a very easygoing, free-spirited ambiance.

"Each room is decorated with the work of many hands. We have noticed, however, that longterm guests prefer the room on the ground floor, which has a familyhome atmosphere. This room is filled with handmade furniture, some of which we bought second hand to mix up with the other fur-



niture," he added.

The collection of old toys, such as model cars and other intriguing items, really sets this guesthouse apart from run-of-themill accommodation. If guests are interested in the collectibles, they can inquire about buying them.

There are also stacks of books, which K. Ou aims to even-

To fit the nine rooms out with beds priced within their low budget, the innovative trio came up with a design that uses wood placed across four cement blocks. "This was a cheap solution to making sturdy beds that can be easily taken apart and moved if necessary," explained K. Ou.

The ceilings have their share of artistic makeovers with lively reds and blues. Summing it all up, staying at Forty-Three@Talang Rd is like sleeping at an art gallery. A night there costs between 300 and 600 baht.

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et's face it, having a barbecue has been popular ever since man first speared a buffalo, dragged it onto a fire and called his friends round to share the spoils. In Phuket, Don Battles has been continuing the tradition with his famous Saturday night barbecues at Don's Café in Rawai.

Don remembers the heyday of American barbecues. "In the mid-1950s to early '60s, backyard barbecues became popular even [US President] Lyndon B Johnson used barbecues for political meetings," he says.

"I came to Phuket in 1997, during the economic crisis. There was no work for my daughter and I was an aerospace engineer before. We had no work to do and I had a holiday home here, so we opened a minimart with a small barbecue grill and I cooked.

"We had one barbecue and one concrete table. A year later, we started our Saturday night traditional southern American style barbecues. We cooked over charcoal and served it with a buffet, and it's still going nine years later. We serve steak, pork ribs, sausages - and we always have Thai food," says Don.

The best barbecues, he says, use charcoal, not gas. "It gives a natural smoky flavor, just like what cowboys ate when they burned wood," he says.

Don keeps the lid on his secret sauce

Don Battles has plenty of tips for barbecuing meat to succulent perfection – but he's keeping mum on his tasty, 17-ingredient sauce.

The weekly chow down attracts more Thais than foreigners, says Don. "We get families and couples - boyfriends and girlfriends, husbands and wives. They don't have to spend much money for tasty Thai food and traditional barbecue."

But it's his secret family recipe for the sauce that keeps them coming back, he says. "We use a traditional technique from the South [southern US states] that my father taught me. The barbecue sauce takes four hours

to make and has 17 different ingredients," says Don. Although he does not want to spill the beans on his secret recipe, Don is willing to say, "We use Mexican Jalepeno peppers grown in Chiang Rai."

Barbecue sauce typically has tomato ketchup or – even better - homemade tomato puree as the base, with anything or everything added to create that lip smackin' taste. A simple example would include: onion, garlic, chilies, Tabasco sauce, fresh

squeezed lime juice, soy sauce, mustard, salt and pepper.

Making the sauce is simple. Melt about a tablespoon of butter in a large sauce pan, fry the "solid" sauce ingredients until they start changing color, then add all the remaining ingredients. Bring to a boil while occa-

sionally stirring and simmer for Thai products, which are supeabout 15 minutes, then continue to simmer until the sauce is the preferred consistency.

For starters, with any steak, add salt and pepper before placing it on the grill. "This helps to bring out the flavor of the steak," he says.

Also, sear the steak on high heat for no more than two minutes on each side before moving it to a cooler part of the grill where the steak can be cooked under more controlled heat. "If you don't do this, the juice is not sealed inside the steak, then the meat can be very dry," says Don.

With sirloin steak, pepper both sides of the steak before placing on the grill. After searing the steak,. cook on a medium heat for five minutes on each side for a medium-to-well done steak.

As for his famed pork ribs, boil the ribs for two hours then soak them in the barbecue sauce for two hours before cooking.

When the ribs are placed on the grill, cook them for only three minutes on each side. When it

comes to buying steaks, Don says don't be shy of buying local produce. "About 75% of our beef is from Ratchaburi province," he says.

"Everything we use for our barbecue are all

rior to what you can buy imported from overseas – and they're easier to source.

"There is not so much magic about the food, it's just making sure that it is prepared properly and consistently," says Don.

Another pearl of wisdom he unveils to restaurateurs is, "The food to offer to people is what they want to eat, not what you would like to have them to eat."

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Phuket star reaches

n the night of April 27, Phuket teenager Witchayanee "Nong Kam" Peagrin became the first female to win The Star contest, the popular Thai TV equivalent of American Idol. The 18-year-old beat 16,000 other contestants nationwide and will record her own album under the GMM Grammy label.

Sangkhae Leelanapaporn recently spent an afternoon with Nong Kam and her mother Yada as they traveled around the island thanking everyone for their support and gave a mini-concert at Saphan Hin.

Gazette: Tell me a little bit about but whenever I saw singers peryour background.

Nong Kam: I'm 18 and I have a younger sister, Sujimon or "Nong Kate", who is 16. I went to Samkong School during my primary years, then Satree Phuket for high school. While at Satree Phuket, I took a lot of English language and mathematics classes.

I started singing when I was about three years old at Samkong School, where I later performed as a member of the school's "Super Dance" team, which mostly did Thai country numbers. I entered my first competition, at a Loy Krathong fair in Phuket, when I was about 10.

So far I have entered about 100 singing competitions across the country and have won a lot of awards and prizes.

Not including The Star, the result I am proudest of was finishing third in the 2007 One Tambon One Product OTOP singing contest, which was a nationwide contest with the finals in Bangkok.

Gazette: Why do you love singing so much?

Nong Kam: I don't know,

K. Yada: When they were young, Nong Kam and Nong Kate used to spend a lot of time watching TV because I was always busy with housework and my job at Bangkok Hospital Phuket, where I worked day and night shifts. They loved music programs and were always singing and dancing in front of the TV.

After Kam formed the Super Dance team at Samkong School, I always watched her perform in shows and contests. I felt like it was my duty as a mother, taking care of my kids. Eventually she asked me if she could learn more about music at the Siam Kolakarn Music School. She studied piano and learned a great deal about music and singing there.

Actually, I planned to enter last year's contest, but the auditions for the southern region were in Haad Yai.


I had heard that they had problems with floods and it wasn't easy to travel there, so I didn't go.

This year I was lucky because they moved the regional auditions to Phuket.

K. Yada: If they held the auditions in another province, I don't think that Kam could have entered the contest. I don't think I could have found the time to take here there.

Gazette: Who are your singing idols, both Thai and international?

Nong Kam: For Thai singers it is Jennifer Kim, while Beyoncé is my favorite international performer. I started singing in English about three years ago and I find Beyoncé inspirational because she is so smart, whether she is singing or acting. She is so perfect in my eyes –



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and we have the same skin color. [laughs].

Gazette: What did you do in Bangkok for three months during the competition?

Nong Kam: All eight finalists had to live together in the same house on Rama V Rd. Every day we did singing, acting and dance rehearsals. I had no free time to talk with friends while I was there. There were no distractions – no television, Internet or newspapers. Everyone was focused solely on music.

Gazette: How has winning The Star changed your life?

Nong Kam: It has been a sudden change. Before, nobody

knew me, now everyone does. People congratulate me, want my autograph and ask to have their photo taken with me. It makes me feel good. It has also given me a chance to do many new things, such as appear in magazines. I have also been contacted about appearing on television and radio shows.

Gazette: [to Yada] What advice have you given Kam on how to react to her new-found fame? How are you coping with it?

K. Yada: I have always taught her to respect her elders, take responsibility for her own actions and always be on time. I have tried to instill a positive outlook, because that brings the best results.

As for how she will fare in the entertainment business, I think if she continues to be a good girl she will be okay.

As for myself, I don't have any plan to quit my job in order to help her. It is unnecessary because Kam is not a superstar yet and she has a good team to take care of her in Bangkok. She is a bit busy at the moment, but her life will return to normal soon. She will have to go to university and find a job after she graduates.

Gazette: When do you expect your first album to be launched?

Nong Kam: I just signed a six-year contract with GMM Grammy. They have already prepared the songs for me and the album should be out by year's end.

However, I have already recorded a few songs for other



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projects and appear on The Star compilation album that has already been released.

It didn't take long for my managers to order me to lose weight! [laughs]. I am 171 centimeters tall and my weight right now is 68 kilograms. I would like to get down to 55 kilograms, as I think that would be good for my image and make it easier to find costumes that fit my figure as well.

Gazette: I heard that you were

seen crying at one stage of the competition. Did you ever feel like giving up?

Nong Kam: Yes, I did cry once. It was a Friday and I had to do a mini-concert the next day. My lines, dance routine and other things were still not complete and I was getting complaints about my accent when

practicing the song I was going to perform, which was Listen by Beyoncé.

I was under so much pressure. I didn't think I would make it that far into the contest and it was the first time I had to plan out the song performance on my own. But in the end I just told myself just to relax and do my best, because I owed that to all the people who cheered me on and voted for me by SMS. I felt like I had to do my best for them.

Gazette: What are your favorite things and pastimes?

There's something in the air

There is a MISTIGRI card for each kind of perfume that has a simple combination of color code and symbols to represent the fragrant elements of the scent.

The clever sales tool leads customers to reach a quick decision based on the six primary olfactory families. Depending on your gender, you might be a Citrus, a Floral or a Woody person. Then a suitable sub-olfactory family is decided and narrows the choice down considerably. Then it's a question of which bottle tickles your fancy the most and how much you are prepared to spend.

One of the dearer brands you won't find at the Mist 1000 Phuket branch is Bugatti's dramatic show-piece perfume created especially for the kind of people who can afford their cars. The 200,000-baht gold-plated sculptured bottle is only available at Mist 1000's Central Plaza branch in Bangkok.

Mist 1000 lists four primary olfactory families each for men and women. Unique to the feminine fragrances are Chypre and Floral, while Aromatic and Woody are primary olfactory families for men. Citrus and Oriental are primary olfactory families for both sexes.

The Chypre family is based on a woody, mossy floral accord with a rich, lingering scent. They include leathery or fruity notes.

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

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



The boxes of sample bottles make great gifts as they come with a gift voucher that entitles the holder to one 50ml bottle of the perfume they like best in the set.

Other fragrance families include Fougere, Marine, Lavender and Leather. The subtle qualities of Fougere - French for "fern" - means it has no noticeable scent, yet the members of the family depict a woodland scent, such as lavender, oak moss and geranium.

Marine scents are relatively new to the world of fragrances. They are designed to evoke a feeling of the freshness of sea air. An ingredient called calone is used to give the marine scent. Lavender is among the oldest scents used in the world as a perfume ingredient.

The Yardly brand built much of its success on the scent of lavender, which is used in Yardley's Old English Lavender for men. Leather fragrances are created from cade oil, which is extracted from juniper and birch trees and has a pungent, sweet and smoky scent.

ears ago, when British socialite Tara Palmer-Tomkinson admitted to being a shopaholic, it was hard to muster much in the way of sympathy. But apparently they are not so hard-hearted in America.

In 2002, a woman called Karyn Bosnak spent more than \$20,000 on clothes and beauty products and then, finding herself on the verge of bankruptcy, simply set up a website and pleaded for help from strangers.

People responded in their thousands and the cash rolled in. She then wrote a book about the experience – *Save Karyn: a True-Life Shopaholic's Journey to Debt and Back.* It was even translated into Thai (Pearl Publishing Co, 350 baht).

So far, not very surprising.

Ten years ago we would have been appalled that someone had shopped willy-nilly, bought a lot of things she could not afford and then discovered that there was a discrepancy between her lust for new things wrapped in tissue paper and her ability to pay for them.

These days, Bosnak's story seems like an extreme example of the way many people live, hardly worth a raised eyebrow. But there is one line in her book that has the capacity to shock: "I don't know what it is," she writes, "but several of my former boyfriends have turned gay after going out with me."

Ah yes. This is the other

detrimental effect of shopping, the one we women never talk about.

Ask the boyfriend of the woman who shops too much and he will tell you that it feels as if there are three of them in the relationship – him, her and Harrods.

Have you ever hidden purchases from your boyfriend or friends? You must have done. That's just the way women shop – guiltily, regularly and usually

when we haven't got the money.

To us women, it is perfectly normal and unremarkable. But look closer and it does seem like the behavior of a full-blown addict. And as far as the man in your life is concerned, the compulsive behavior is only







Proton adds its weight to Thai market



alaysia's Proton, originally a statefunded automaker, but now in private hands, has finally launched in Thailand – with unusually competitive prices.

The first car to be built by Proton, in 1985, was based on a Mitsubishi Lancer and was offered with either a 1.3-liter or 1.5-liter engine. Production, by global automotive standards, was tiny, reaching only 24,000 cars in 1987 and just 80,000 two years on. Compare this with Toyota, which expects to produce almost two million vehicles this year in the US alone.

Despite overtures to Volkswagen in recent years, Proton remains relatively isolated as a motor manufacturer, but this new foray into international markets may be the beginning of a period of significant expansion.

The VW saga began in 2004 when it was announced



that a "strategic partnership" had been established, which ended in early 2006 when Volkswagen declared that the partnership had failed because its desires "clashed with the terms and conditions offered" by Proton.

On a more positive note, in 1996, Proton acquired a 63.75% holding in Lotus, the British engineering consultancy and sportscar manufacturer.

In addition, in 2004, Proton bought a majority share in the ailing motorcycle company MV Agusta, only to sell it on a year later because of heavy losses.

At a press conference late last year, Thailand's Phranakorn Auto Sales Co Ltd announced plans to open 20 outlets to market Proton cars, with an initial target of 3,000 cars in the first year. General Manager Apichart Wangsatorntanakhun said that eight outlets would be located in and around Bangkok with the rest in major provinces.

Although K. Apichart was unwilling to specify which models will be available in Thailand, he indicated that it could be as many as 25 different cars. One of these will almost certainly be the popular Gen-2, a 1.6-liter sedan with modest aspirations. Its twin overhead-cam motor delivers 110bhp (82kW) in the entrylevel model, 125bhp in the luxury version thanks to variable cam timing.

Power windows are standard, as is a reversing sensor and a driver's airbag. The upper model provides an airbag for the front-seat passenger, as well as ABS and EBD (electronic brakeforce distribution). Brakes are ventilated discs up front, solid ones at the rear. Performance figures are equally modest with a maximum speed of 190kmh with manual transmission, slightly less on the automatic, while the 0-100kmh sprint time is between 10 and 13 seconds, depending on the power plant and transmission.

Pranakorn Auto Sales is expecting to capture a significant segment of the market, based mainly on low prices. K. Apichart anticipates being able to sell the Protons at prices starting from 400,000 baht, making them the cheapest sedans available in Thailand.

Proton believes its exports will reach almost 100,000 cars by the end of this year, although last year they exported only 23,000. Dato Haji Syed Zainal Abidin Bin Syed Mohamed Tahir, managing director of Proton Holdings Bhd, said that China will contribute significantly to the company's progress.

Thailand is an experimental export market, but if Pranakorn Autos can provide the backup and after-sales service, there is no reason why Proton cannot prosper. It depends on the models offered and whether the manufacturer intends to support the dealers.

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The revisionist explorer revised

he great African explorer Henry Morton Stanley was idolized during the Victorian era, but later pilloried by revisionist historians for being a violent, racist, greedy imperialist. That's not true, argues Tim Jeal in

Stanley (Faber and Faber, London, 2007, 570pp), subtitled "The Impossible Life of Africa's Greatest Explorer".

Author of an acclaimed 1972 biography of David Livingstone, another legendary African explorer, Tim Jeal is in a position to know. He deftly refutes all the charges against the misunderstood Stanley and the portrait that emerges is of an inspiring leader, an admirer of Africans and a passionate crusader against the Arab-Swahili slave trade that was ravaging Central Africa in the late 19th century. The toll was 2 million lives.

His introduction is titled "How I came to write the life of Africa's least understood explorer" and it concludes:

"Now, with the poverty of Africa still being blamed on colonialism... it is inevitable that many skeptics will be unconvinced that Stanley's beliefs about the benefits of 'European civilization' deserve a fresh hearing, even in the light of copious new evidence about what he really



did and thought. Yet to shirk looking again at Stanley's life simply because many minds are made up already would be to deny another post-colonial generation the chance of gaining new insights into a unique phase of world history and the story of an astonishing man, who has scarcely been acknowledged as British, let alone as Africa's greatest explorer."

Stanley was actually Welsh, but for his entire adult life passed himself off as American. He was born John Pembroke in the lowliest of circumstances: a bastard son disowned by his mother and confined in a country workhouse from the age of six to 16. After a series of menial jobs, he took ship as a cabin boy to America and

landed penniless in New Orleans in 1859. Pretending to be adopted by a wealthy cotton broker, he took the name Henry Morton Stanley.

He was working as a storekeeper in a riverside village in Missouri when the Civil War broke out. He joined the Confederate army, deserted, joined the Union army, deserted, joined the Union navy, deserted, then set out on an aborted trading trip to Turkey.

He found his calling as a journalist working for James Gorden Bennett of the *New York Herald*, covering colonial wars in Gold Coast and Abyssinia. His greatest scoop, of course, came in 1871: finding Scottish explorer David Livingstone in the heart of Africa.

I had always thought of Stanley spending months in a blind search through jungle and swamp. Actually, he knew where Livingstone was all along. When he reached Zanzibar, the British Consul Dr John Kirk told him that the explorer was somewhere up the Lualaba River, but would eventually return to the trading camp of Ujiji on the eastern banks of Lake Tanganyika. Sure enough, that's where he was when Stanley finally arrived.

The two got on famously, exploring the more remarkable for that."

the northern reaches of the lake. A father figure to Stanley, Livingstone inspired him on his life's mission: the eradication of the slave trade in Central Africa. The area needed to be explored and then steamships sent up its rivers and railroads across its plains to bring peaceful trade to supplant the slavers. His white companions died on Stanley's first and second expeditions and the people who helped him through were a core group of 20 Wangwana, the Swahilispeaking traders of East Africa. These were his closest comrades during 20 years of exploration.

Stanley's second expedition was an epic four-year, 7,000-mile trek that took him from a circumnavigation of Lake Victoria, down to Lake Tanganika, all the way up the Lualaba River to the main trunk of the Congo and down to the Atlantic Ocean.

In later years, King Leopold of Belgium fooled Stanley into opening up the Congo as his own personal fiefdom.

Jeal concludes with the observation that the great African explorers were "inspired, fearless, obsessed, able to frighten, able to suffer, but also able to command love and obedience...

"They are an extinct species, and all

n the previous installment of this column, I observed that learning to speak Thai means learning to make some new sounds. Today we'll start to tackle the nitty gritty.

From here on, I'll be using Thai script in addition to the phonetic system used by the AUA language school, which is based closely on the International Phonetic Alphabet. For the moment,

don't worry if you are unfamiliar with the AUA system. I will talk about it more later. In fact, I don't want to rely on it any more than necessary. The key is to get you reading the

Thai script as soon as possible. To put it simply, sounds we make can be divided into two groups: Those we're conscious of and those we're not.

The sounds we're most conscious or attuned to are the ones that play key roles in the language we speak. Two sounds that are similar but distinct to the attuned ear are called contrasting sounds. If you mix them up, it can change the meaning of the word - sometimes with a humorous or embarrassing result.

In English, B and P are contrasting. Take the words bat and pat. These are the same in every way except the initial consonant, but have completely different meanings. To the speaker of a language where B and P are not contrasting, however, they would probably sound the same.

Every language has its own set of contrasting and non-contrasting sounds. The contrasting sounds of English are different

from the contrasting sounds of Thai. This is why Thais and many other Asians mix up R and L. It is also why when we're just beginning to learn Thai we receive such quizzical looks – it's

> Take the English letter P. It is only one letter, but it is actually pronounced two different ways. At the beginning of a word,

such as pat, pin, or pay, the P has a puff of air. This is called an aspirated P. In the AUA system, it is invariably written as ph.

Compare this with P in words like spin, spit or spy - listen closely and the puff of air is gone. In this case, it's an unaspirated P. Sure there's still some air coming out, because we're always exhaling when we're speaking, but it's significantly less. If you're not convinced, try holding your hand up to your mouth as you say these words.

In English, an unaspirated P is found only when it follows S as part of a "consonant cluster, as in spin, spot or spy.

To be understood in Thai, however, you must produce the unaspirated P sound on its own at the beginning of many words. Thus, in Thai, pai means "go", and *phai* means "danger". Don't forget, that letter H represents the puff of air.

There are other unaspirated and aspirated pairs in Thai, too: t/ th and k/kh. So the same is true for tai (kidney) versus thai (Thai) and kai (chicken) versus khai

The table (right) gives you a few examples and shows you which Thai letters correspond to which sounds. Remember that in Thai, more than one letter can often be used to make the same sound.

And finally, here are a couple of classic Thai tongue twisters that you can use to test your new skills:

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

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Time for a humane charter

Few places on the planet have a starker contrast between the rich and the poor than here in Phuket. At the top end of the spectrum are wealthy landowners, whose declared family fortunes reach into the billions of baht - as recently revealed by the constitutionally mandated asset declaration statements required of national-level elected officials (see News pages).

The island is also a preferred destination among many jet-setting foreigners. Some like it so much they decide to buy a second home here, while others visit on their megayachts.

At the other end of the spectrum are scores of poor migrant workers from neighboring countries, especially Burma, who come here not for sea, sun, sand - or even sex - but out of sheer desperation. One can only imagine the deplorable conditions and humanrights abuses that have made them want to work as unskilled laborers in a place such as Phuket, where even those who are legally registered are treated as part of a de-facto criminal underclass, not allowed to travel freely or even use mobile phones.

Migration has been a feature of the human race since the dawn of record keeping. Last year, at least 200 million persons lived outside their homelands, most looking for better work or sustainable livelihoods.

Thailand's labor-smuggling operations differ only in detail from what are officially described as "human trafficking" operations. Though most Burmese are victimized neither by kidnapping nor deception, as is commonly the case with teenage prostitutes, they are nonetheless victims - of economic and political conditions.

Burmese know before coming to Thailand that they will encounter hostility, racist indifference and exploitation; they know they risk employers fleecing them and turning them over to police.

Their plight surely merits application of international laws against human trafficking. But these are narrowly interpreted by the UN and the Thai government. In practice, they apply only to young women sold into prostitution. Burmese are described as "economic migrants". It is a false distinction. Whether kidnapped, sold into prostitution or forced by their legal status into economic peonage, the result is very much the same.

Unfortunately, while numerous well-funded NGOs exist solely to aid prostitutes, exploited workers are treated almost without exception as criminals - though most have committed no violence against person or property.

It is time to amend our labor laws and regulations so they comply with all international human-rights agreements to which Thailand is a member. The Editor

This project most certainly is not an example of sustainable development. It's a project that will likely have a negative impact on the immediate surrounding environment both initially (during construction) and thereafter, with pollutants generated by the superyachts and the marina itself. It will also require a massive amount of energy to operate.

I hope I'm wrong.

How much of the 100 billion baht is going towards renewable energy sources such as solar- or wind-powered generators? Are the MICE facilities going to be air conditioned? If it's going to be supplied with electricity from the regular Phuket power system, it hardly qualifies as sustainable.

What sort of waste-management system is planned? What is the plan for sewage disposal? Is any of the 100 billion baht going towards a carbon offset? How are carbon emissions from the superyachts going to be kept under control?

This project will definitely have some degree of a negative impact on both the environment and the locals in the immediate area. Labor will likely be from migrant workers instead of from the local communities, since migrant workers are cheaper.

I would prefer an honest approach to such a large-scale project when trying to sell the idea to the public. It's a massive project that will use an enormous amount of natural resources.

Paint it with a brush of truth instead of coloring it over with a mural of stories, please.

An appalling loss of life stemming from a natural disaster in an undeveloped country. Thousands drowned, thousands more missing, God knows how many thousands homeless, short of food and at risk from starvation.

Fast-forward 44 months from the tsunami of December 26, 2004, and it's a similarly dreadful situation in the Irrawaddy Delta, a few hours flight from here.

But these are only Burmese people, right? All they do is murder each other in the "Burmese Cemetery", catch most of the fish available in the resorts and restaurants here, work as maids and gardeners and build our houses using, often, illegally logged Burmese teak.

They also selfishly suffocate en route to Phuket, causing a few days' hand wringing in the local, national and world media, and at the overloaded dinner tables of what passes for Phuket's chattering classes before slipping into obscurity again, just as when the political problems there came to an ugly head recently.

Until, that is, they die en masse.

But we, the businesspeople, expats and lotus eaters of Phuket, have no hotels in the Irrawaddy Delta, no business interests, no extended families, no reason to claim millions of dollars from well-meaning, but gullible – where did all that money go? – tourists and others to aid them, no collections of food, clothing and shelter on their collective behalf.

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Phuket guide flies flag of responsible tourism

obtained my tour-guide li cense in 1983 and began working for John Gray's Sea Canoe, which taught me a lot about the marine life we were taking people to see.

In 2000 I helped set up a tour company with some friends at Kao Lak, but it was washed away by the tsunami.

Since then, I've continued to work as an independent tour guide, taking tourist groups of about 30 people to various snorkel and dive sites in the region.

In that time, I've watched coral disappear at an alarming rate, mostly due to the effects of tourism.

I'd say that nearly 20% of the coral around the Phi Phi islands and off Krabi has disappeared in the last decade or more. The tsunami destroyed some coral, but I'd say that irresponsible tourism accounts for about 80% of the destruction.

Ten years ago, the coral and marine life around Krabi and the Phi Phi Islands was the most diverse and beautiful in the region, but some species of fish can no longer be seen around there; their habitat is gone.

The reason for the coral's destruction is a combination of a lack of care or knowledge on the part of the tour operators and

guides, who are just looking at the short-term financial benefits, and uneducated tourists.

With no official guidelines to go by, tour companies are left to set their own policies about educating tour guides and tourists on how to conduct themselves at reef sites.

There are at least 500 registered tour guides based in Phuket who take tourists on boat trips to various snorkeling spots.

The majority of these allow tourists to take coral from dive sites or encourage them to feed the fish there. Only about 30% of these guides act responsibly, educating tourists supervising them while they are in the water.

It annoys me when I see groups of tourists feeding fish with bread.

It disrupts the natural food chain. When you see this, you know that the guides are not being responsible.

The tourists probably don't understand the implications of what they are doing. If people in my group do ask to feed fish, I will give them some fruit to throw in. It's normal for fish to occasionally eat fruit – but bread? No.

It is important no to disturb the natural cycle of any marine habitat. Coral is the most impor-

tant element. Different types of coral support particular species of marine creatures. If a kind of coral disappears, so does the other marine life that depends on it.

Whenever I take a group of tourists to see coral, I talk to the group while we are on the way. First I make sure they can swim and are familiar with the equipment.

Then I introduce them to the kinds of marine life they can expect to see and explain why it is important not to break or remove anything.

When you explain to people that some kinds of coral can take over 200 years to grow just a few centimeters, they are less inclined to damage it.

Many guides do not take the time to educate tourists or supervise them in the water.

They say, "Okay, swimming here 20 minutes," and wait on board.

Many tourists, never having seen such natural beauty, want to take something back as a souvenir.

It might be a piece of coral, some shellfish or even a bottle of sand. To them it's just a little bit, but this is the attitude that has destroyed so much already.

Some tourists are conscientious enough to ask if it's alright before taking something, but others will try to sneak something aboard.

I always tell them that they can't take anything back. If I see that someone has taken coral I tell them to put it back where they found it.

I recently took a group of tourists on a snorkeling trip and gave them the usual pep talk, but as we were boarding the boat after the dive, I noticed that one of the tourists had brought up some coral.

I asked him to put it back, but he refused so I took it from him and swam to where I knew that type of coral was and put it back.

In the end I had to go through this three times, as he had more coral hidden away.

The other tourists in the group clapped their approval at my actions and the coral thief felt pretty uncomfortable for the rest of the trip. He did actually apologize in the end.

I have no qualms about speaking up and taking action when tourists in my groups take something because I know that stopping them and educating them is the right thing to do.

If they take it with them, there will be nothing left for their children and grandchildren to see.

Coral is also destroyed when tour boats are anchored to pieces of coral. Artificial anchor points should be created at dive sites instead.

At one of the sites where I regularly take tourists, I have made an anchor point in the seabed that we attach a line from the boat to. It's a simple way of avoiding coral damage.

Coral is disappearing at the quickest rate in the popular snorkeling spots near Krabi and Phi Phi islands.

As well as having clear sustainable tourism guidelines for all tour companies, boat captains and guides to follow, there should be facilities in place to educate tourists.

The new artificial reef to be made from decommissioned aircraft is a good thing. It will take the pressure off other dive sites.

Another 10 sites like this off Krabi would be great, because that is the kind of effort needed to return the marine habitat to its former glory – as well as stopping the current destruction.

It's a shame that the artificial reef wasn't sunk before the season turned as it is now the breeding season for many fish, so they would have had somewhere to lay their eggs and the site would already be inhabited with marine life by the time the high season comes again.

I would like to see a collective effort by all those who work in the marine-tourism industry to educate each other and every one of the tourists under their care.

This would be the best way for all to benefit from the natural diversity of the region without destroying it.

What are the penalties for foreigners working illegally?

I worked at a German-owned call center in Rawai for eight months. I have now quit that job because the company would not provide a work permit for me. I do not like breaking the law as I am married to a Thai and would like to continue living in Thailand.

When I started working at the call center, they told me that they would make a work permit for me only after I had worked there for one month and with good performance. I worked hard and sealed many contracts for the company. Compared with the 10 other employees, I was one of the top three.

I discovered that most of the other employees had work permits, but they were not provided by the call center. Some employees used work permits issued on behalf of their own businesses, bars, guesthouses, or real estate agencies.

I understand that Thai law states that work permits for employees must be applied for by the company they are working for Issues & ANSWERS

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and that work permits must be applied for before starting to work anywhere.

Knowing this, and the fact that my employer did not make a work permit for me, I quit.

My question is, what can happen to a company and staff if Immigration or other government officers find out that foreigners are working there without work permits, or, with work permits issued for a company other than the one where they are actually employed?

Janya Yingyong, Chief of Work Permit Department, Phuket Provincial Employment Office, replies:

If Immigration officers discover foreigners working without a work permit, both the employer and the employee will be prosecuted, regardless of the contract between employer and employee.

The employer will be fined between 10,000 and 100,000 baht. The employee will also be fined and deported within 30 days. The Employment Office

does not have the power to close companies illegally employing foreigners. However, the employee will be blacklisted, a record of which is kept at the Immigration Office.

The Employment Office has only three auditors, which are not enough to comprehensively check all illegal workers. However, cases can be reported to the Employment Office by calling 076-219660-1 between 8.30 am and 4.30 pm Monday to Friday.

Riding the waves of technology

han and Leons, the owners of the luxury yacht *S/Y Siren* came to one of our computer grouptherapy meetings with a challenge: to help them install a topnotch computer network to match their liveaboard yacht's luxury and reliability standards.

The *Siren* is a 34-meter, commercial, wooden Pinisi schooner with eight en-suite cabins; not your ordinary dive boat. She is designed for sail-and-dive expeditions to the Andaman regions, Burma Banks and Indonesia.

On board are the cabins, an expansive saloon and broad deck space. The computer network was to be a key part of the total experience, delivering to a computer unit in each cabin:

-On-demand videos, to be

viewed in the cabins.

-On-demand music.

-The ability to upload photos for display on the 42-inch TV in the saloon.

-On-demand display of realtime mapping showing the GPS location of the boat.

All this had to be done taking into account the added demands of unpredictable blue-water sailing. Most times, the heavy boat is stable as a rock, but the ship can be subject to violent roll,

pitch and yaw when the weather turns.____ **THE**

T h e boat electronics had to face the harsh de-

mands of motion, salt water and rough handling. No problem, said our enterprising boffins, Leons and Shanman. In 10 days, they had the solution in hand and it was ready to install. Leons and Shanman have done similar work before and also have extensive blue-water cruising experience, as well as hundreds of hours under water as PADI instructors.

The final system was simple, with proven reliable components. The client computers are linked in a gigabyte Ethernet centered on a Linksys 16-port switch. The heart of the system is the twin servers, custom-built by our boffins.

Each server – one primary, one backup – is a mini-tower comprising an Asus motherboard, Intel CPU, 2x1GB memory, dual Seagate 500GB HDDs (hard disk drives) and an Antec 450W power supply.

The HDs are set in RAID-1 (mirror images for system reliability) and the main server's data is copied every night to the backup server, which remains offline the rest of the day. This duplicate server can be replugged into the online position in the event of failure of the online unit.

The servers are mounted in a well-ventilated cabinet that is braced and padded for protection from shock and movement. Each

This is an important feature because many divers are photography enthusiasts and take great delight in showing their photos, seeing their shipmates' pics and talking about the day's diving and photography.

> In the cabins, the eight Dell workstations have Vista Business Premium pre-installed.

> There were some problems using Vista on the server so it was decided that Windows XP Pro SP2, a proven operating system, would be used for the servers. Some problems did surface, notably with Windows XP accessing Vista clients, so perhaps installing Windows XP on all the PCs would have been best.

> Security is a strong point for Vista and it was ensured that the users would have limited privileges by disallowing program installation and only allowing guests to put files in specific folders.

> The servers make two shared folders available to the cabin units. The shared folder "Music + Video" has two subfolders: "Music" and "Videos", each with several subfolders and many files.

> > The other shared folder is

"Photos", which contains eight folders – one for each cabin. Each cabin is allowed read and write access only to the folder assigned to that cabin. Guests can store images and display them on the screen in the saloon.

Windows Media Player proved inadequate for the desired applications, notably streaming videos. Shan and Leons replaced it with VLC (www.videolan.org/ vlc)a free, powerful, flexible and easy-to-use multimedia player.

Stress tests were performed to check that the network bandwidth and the server were adequate. The tests included downloading large files to two separate computers while simultaneously streaming videos to two other computers.

The tests went smoothly with no jitters noted.

The most interesting part of the project was the on-demand nautical map image showing the real-time GPS position of the boat. The location map and position were achieved using a

The only significant problem during the project was with the boat's power supply. The main generator (a 50KW diesel-powered unit) did not supply anything near 220V. Voltages were consistently below 190V.

Such voltage was inadequate to activate the APC UPS units – thus, no power for the computers. The boat engineer had to call the shore electricians to repair the unit until Leons and Shan could get the volts and subsequent faultless operations.

Perhaps worse, occasional power surges hit 330V. If not for the highly recommended APCbrand UPSes, the PCs would have fried.


The galley's electronics weren't protected by UPSes, so while Shan explained the problem and the crew hurriedly unplugged the kitchen appliances, one cappuccino machine entered Valhalla the hard way.

The crew hurriedly installed a more reliable generator and these problems were solved.

The full sea-trials of the system will include Shanman enjoying the waves and checking the units in operation. This should ensure the system integrity and give direct feedback on the service.

The moral of this story is that anything is possible. Trust the geeks and always use a UPS.

Land & Houses launches star bank in Phuket

RASSADA: After 28 months in operation, Land and Houses Retail Bank PCL (LH Bank) on May 9 opened its first branch in Phuket, opposite the Proton Showroom on Thepkrasattri Rd.

The Phuket branch is one of 17 nationwide, 11 of which are in Bangkok.

Formed as a joint-venture between property giants Land and Houses PCL and Quality Houses PCL on December 19, 2005, LH Bank offers a wide range of bank services, including deposit accounts, loans and payment transaction services.

The bank has experienced phenomenal growth. LH Bank President Sasitorn Phongsathorn said that in 2007, the bank posted a net profit of 101 million baht and expects to post 262 million baht for 2008.

"Although our bank is only 29 months old, our business is growing quickly. Our loans have grown more than 68% since the start. In assets, we have had 40% growth each year. In our first 24 months, our net profit was about 100 million baht. It seemed small compared with other big banks, but for a bank that was only 24 months old, we had quite a good start," K. Sasitorn said.

Total asset growth for 2006-2007 was 45.3 %, bringing total assets to 32.9 billion baht. Growth

at the bank is expected to continue at about 48.5% throughout 2008 to bring its total asset worth to 48.8 billion baht.

Total bank incomes for 2006 and 2007 were 887 million and 1.592 billion baht, respectively. The total income for 2008 is expected to be 2.3 billion baht nationwide.

"Our main income is from interest. In 2007, we accrued 1.5 billion baht in total interest, which was 92% of our total income. We expect this to rise to 2.2 billion baht, or 96% of total income, for 2008," K. Sasitorn said.

"Other revenues were 55 million baht in 2007 for operating fees and 72 million baht for other transactions. We expect these incomes to rise by no less than 50% in 2008," she added.

In 2007, LH Bank provided 26.6 billion baht in loans, up from 10.4 billion baht in 2006. K. Sasitorn said that loans for the first quarter of 2008 totaled 26.7 billion baht and were likely to reach the bank's target of 40.5 billion baht for 2008.

About 80% of the loans by LH Bank are mortgages, which are not restricted to people buying Land and House PCL or Quality Houses PCL properties. The bank provided 20 billion baht in mortgages in 2007 and estimates that figure to grow to 33.2 billion baht for 2008.

"To attract retail customers, we offer competetive rates. For example, our current accounts pay 1.5% interest, a rate other banks don't give. Interest paid on savings account deposits are 2.5%," K. Sasitorn said.

Chutamas Sombunyaviroj, first executive vice-president of Commercial Bank Group of LH Bank, said that LH Bank has been well received in Phuket, with about 50 customers making deposits totaling 10 million baht on the branch's first day of trading.

"Actually, we still don't have an ATM of our own on the island, but our ATM cards can be used at any Krung Thai bank ATM with no fee," K. Chutamas said. K. Sasitorn said that perfor-

mance targets for the Phuket branch for its first year stand at 500 million baht in deposits, 120 million baht in property loans, with no limit set for SME loans.

Keeping your money out of the taxman's pockets

ne of Britain's big four banks, Lloyds TSB, conducted a survey of their client base to assess attitudes towards where today's Brits wanted to spend their retirement. More than 91% of respondents stated that they wished to move abroad.

A UK Life Assurer, Scottish Widows, found through its research that two-thirds of higherrate taxpayers in the UK intended to leave the UK and live somewhere with a sunnier climate. Sound familiar?

The statistics show that while most stay at home, that is perhaps not where they leave their hearts.

About 400,000 actually leave each year with the intention of staying abroad permanently. In recent decades, more individuals have switched from being dependent on company pension schemes to Self-Invested Pension Plans (SIPPs).

However, SIPPs are taxable in the UK and the investment choices are limited. To add insult to injury, by age 75 holders of SIPPs must convert them to an annuity.

The rules and regulations of SIPPs are so complicated that

we commonly use lawyers who specialize in this area. And with the UK government changing the rules frequently, they end up as a minefield, especially when combined with questions of domicile and liability to inheritance tax.

While an individual was tied to their SIPPs for life, a new escape route has been discovered; that of simply transferring a SIPP to an overseas pension scheme that qualifies as such in the eyes of the "taxman".

The number of QROPS is increasing all the time, the most attractive are probably those based in the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

However, it all depends on circumstances. In cases where Brits want to live in countries such as Thailand or Malaysia, it is simple in the extreme. Neither of these countries seeks to tax for-

eigners on foreign pension earnings. This makes QROPS very attractive.

However, it is common for people to want to live, say, six months a year in Thailand and the balance in France or Italy. This complicates matters greatly and why the service is called "Personal Financial Planning" - one size certainly does not fit all.

Once the tax authorities in

the UK have accepted another country's pension scheme as meeting their standards, the transfer can take place. The "new" pension fund is required to report to the UK authorities for the next five years only. There are


able: QROPS, which stands for selected for retirement. These advantages include pension income becoming tax-free. The choice of investments is also increased and can include residential property.

> After five years, the whole pension may be taken in cash and there is no requirement to ever buy an annuity. QROPS are exempt from inheritance tax.

Obviously, a standard British SIPP does have one advantage: for those who are not capable of budgeting, it ensures that there will be an income for life.

QROPS require that holders are capable of planning into the future, and not buying a house for that oh-so-friendly-and-honest bargirl.

"taxman" and, as we all know, governments do not like to have income streams stopped.

Considering that 400,000 people leave the UK every year and many of them have SIPPs, the cost to the British HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) department must, over the years, add up to a substantial sum.

It would seem logical to transfer any SIPP to QROPS as quickly as possible. Once the transfer has taken place the money is, legitimately, out of the taxman's hands.

Also, it is a long-established practice that when a taxpayer enters into a legitimate tax-avoidance scheme, HMRC will not interfere on a back-dated basis. However, they may well seek to stop new cases at any time.

Taking the tax consequences into account, it is amazing that they ever allowed this major "loophole" to have their blessing in the first place.

Duncanson retains platu title

CHONBURI: *The Lofts* Southshore, helmed by Phuket's Scott Duncanson and his crew of Trent Pederson, Scott Venes, Kevin Scott and SEA Games gold-medalist Weerasit Puangnak, has won the 2008 edition of the prestigious Coronation Cup.

Held in conjunction with the annual Top Of The Gulf Regatta, 14 teams from Australia, China, Singapore and Thailand contested the seven-race event in Platu One Design Yachts in a wide range of conditions from five to a blustery 22 knots from May 2 to May 5.

Second place by just three points was taken by Thailand's SEA Games crew on *Naiad*, helmed by Wiwat Toontat. Third position went to the all-Australian team on *Gulf Charters*, sailed by Platu-newcomer Ray Waldron.

The first leg of the first race set the scene for the regatta with *The Lofts* and *Naiad* tussling for the lead and the remainder of the fleet close behind.

About two-thirds up the first leg, *Naiad*, sailing on port tack, attempted to cross *The Lofts*, which was on the "right of way" starboard tack and declined to give way.

Duncanson quickly raised the protest flag and both skippers spent the evening in "the room" with America's Cup jury chairman Bryan Willis and the protest

committee. Unfortunately for *Naiad*, they were found at fault and disqualified in that race.

The decision lifted *The Weasel* (Nick Henley) into first place, *Pine Pacific*, sailed by Jaray Tipsuk, into second and *The Lofts* into third.

The second race of the day was a long race around Monkey Island and back to the finish in front of the Ocean Marina complex. *The Lofts* won the start and easily led the fleet upwind and around the island with Ray Waldron on *Gulf Charters* in pursuit.

With an amazing show of

close-reaching speed and wellcoordinated crew work, *Gulf Charters* out-paced *The Lofts* to take first place, with *The Lofts* in second and *Emma Matihilde XX*, sailed by Morten Jakobsen, third.

Freshening winds of up to 22 knots on day two favored the crew of *The Lofts* and they led race three from start to finish with *Naiad* in second and *Gulf Charters* in third. Race four became one of controversy after nine of the 14 boats sailed the wrong course and were disqualified.

Naiad sailed the correct course to record her first win for the regatta and close the gap on

the leaders. *Platu 114*, sailed by Vladimir Borstnar, finished in second with the Singaporean youth team skippered by Koh Seng Leong in third.

Day three was the long race and after a light-air start, conditions quickly freshened. *Naiad* took an early lead and was barely challenged on the two-sail reaching course. What appeared to be a very boring race with minimal overtaking opportunities soon became one of contro-

versy when a safety rail broke on the Singaporean *Platu* 122 and two crew members fell overboard.

Morten Jakobsen and the *Emma Mathilde XX* was the nearest yacht and quickly returned to assist in the recovery

of the two young crew members. Naiad sailed on to win, with The Lofts in second and Lee Marine Express in a well-deserved third spot. Morten Jakobsen was awarded equal first place after seeking and winning redress from the international jury.

On the morning of the final day, *The Lofts* were two points ahead of *Naiad* and five points ahead *Gulf Charters*. *The Lofts* won the start of race six and despite colliding with a cruisingclass yacht at the windward mark, sailed a near-perfect race to lead from start to finish.

The Singaporean youth team on *Platu 122* sailed very well to finish second and *The Weasel* in third. *Naiad* finished fifth, all but handing the regatta to *The Lofts*, or so it seemed.

With only one race left, *The Lofts* needed only a sixth-place finish to win the regatta. After a

John Travolta and Kelly Preston's daughter's name is Ella Bleu, while their son's name is Jett. Jett as a name is a tad odd, but John Travolta has a passion for flying, so he has an

Gwyneth Paltrow was criticized for naming her first child Apple. Although it is fairly unusual (though not so much in Thailand), it is rather cute, I suppose. Her husband, Chris Martin from Coldplay, tired of the controversy over the name at the time and was adamant that their second child, whether male or female, would be named Banana. Their son was eventually christened Moses. Wuss.

Mr and Mrs Frank Zappa probably take top prize for wacky kids' names: Dweezil, Moon Unit, Ahmed Emuukha Rodan and Diva Muffin. While folk legend has it that that Dweezil is the lad's given name, his birth name was originally Ian Donald Calvin Euclid Zappa, as the hospital refused to register the name Dweezil. The weird part is that he was always known as Dweezil as a child, so he wanted to make the name official and his parents took him to have it changed legally. Very odd.

So what's in a name, anyway? How much does it really tell you about somebody? I can certainly commiserate with the Gertrudes, Everards, Ethels and Gervaises of this world. Waiting until later on in life to pick a name for yourself somehow makes complete sense. "Gilbey" or "Gordon" certainly works for me personally, for example. It's a shame I couldn't become "Heineken". That would just be silly.



The human version of an often-seen plant in Thailand would probably be fond of a drop of the amber nectar every now and then - the lagerstroemia indica, to give it its full botanical name. Considering it to be named after a style of beer may be a little fanciful, but I like the idea.

The common name of this plant is crape myrtle. Specifically, "crape" myrtle, rather than "crepe" myrtle. It's apparently called this because the flowers have crinkly petals which look a bit like the material called crepe. According to my dictionary, crepe is "a light fine fabric with a crinkled surface", but for some unknown reason you're supposed to spell it "crape" when it's in front of myrtle. It's all crape as far as I'm concerned.

At any rate, it's a common enough name and since there's no central authority that manages common names for plants you can spell – or call it – whatever you want. Call it "Derek" or "Clive" if you want – it doesn't

matter. At least I know what the Thais call it – *vi-kheng*.

The deciduous crape myrtle is one of the longest blooming trees in existence, with flowering periods lasting from 60 to 120 days. Crapes

The fruits that follow are brown or black, and look a little like peas. When they mature, they dry up and split, releasing diskshaped seeds. Depending on the variety, crapes can grow as large shrubs or as trees either upright or spreading. Larger varieties can grow quickly.

Many types have bark that peels off in thin flakes, exposing a cinnamon-colored or gray inner bark. Crapes tend to produce a number of suckers (growths originating from the rootstock of a grafted plant,

and come in white and different it will grow quickly, but it can survive in dry conditions once it's established. Prune it only to remove dense branches and crossing limbs. Otherwise, just let it grow.

> One hint is that you should "deadhead" after the first flush of growth to encourage the plant to re-bloom more quickly. Deadheading is pinching off used or spent blooms to keep the plants

well groomed and to prevent them from setting seed.

Crape myrtles are a magnet for aphids, upon whose, erm, "deposits" sooty mold grows. This can give the leaves a gray, sooty coating that isn't harmful to the plant, but doesn't look pretty. Crapes are often used at commercial nurseries to attract aphids away from other plants – that's how much the bugs love them. You can control aphids with a soapy-water solution.

Originally from this neck of the woods, the crape myrtle was first introduced to England and the US in the 18th century and is now widely cultivated throughout the world. In fact, Texans took to the plant so much that they named it their state shrub. A classic Asian export.

To plant it, choose a sunny site with well-drained soil, making sure there is enough room for the shrub to reach its mature spread. Dig a hole twice as wide as the container or root ball. Set the plant at the same depth or slightly higher than it was in the pot.

Fill in the hole around the plant with soil and mound the soil to form a 5-cm-high ridge around the perimeter of the hole to act as a catch-basin for the water. Water it generously, filling the basin and allowing water to settle several times. Easy.

I'm probably a bit jealous of the lagerstroemia indica deep down. It's the only thing I know of that isn't beer that has a type of beer in its name, apart from a particularly dodgy clothes designer. Time for a change then. "Bloomin' Leo" perhaps? I'll have a chat with the editor. Over a beer. of course.

espite living in Phuket for six years, I rarely venture past Phuket City towards Cape Panwa. Over the past few years, I can count on one hand the times I've journeyed there.

A few days ago, despite taking a few wrong turns, I went out to look at what's happening with the area's property and hotel projects. I was astonished at the changes marking the landscape. The area is quickly playing catchup to boomtown Phuket City.

As often noted in my column, tourism and property go hand in hand and Panwa was one of the first areas developed during the infancy of the island's tourism economy.

One of the highest-profile hotel-development stories is that of the renovation and upgrading of the former Panwaburi resort into a luxury enclave managed by the Conrad chain. While this project was delayed over a number of years, things are back on track and the property is now set to open under the Regent brand. Construction Update



Jumeirah marina clears phase one

KOH RAET: Phase 1 of the private marina being built as part of the Jumeirah Private Island Resort is now complete, with the basin dredged and now reflooded.

Anthony Franklin of developer TGR Asia told the Gazette that it took seven months to dredge the basin of the marina, which covers approximately 40 rai.

The construction crew is now ready to plow into Phase 2, with pilings to start within the month and installation of floating pontoons during the fourth quarter of 2008, Mr Franklin said on May 12.

"In construction terms, we will be looking for the marina to start accepting yachts at the end of this year," he added.

Designed to international specifications, the fully inclusive marina is being built in a sheltered lagoon on the east coast of the island and will offer a range of facilities, including 101 berths ranging in length from 10 to 70 meters, capable of accommodating supervachts up to 70m long.

Once complete, the marina will include a fuel dock with pump-out facility, a five-meter depth at the marina entrance to accommodate larger berths (3.5m depth for the rest of the basin), power pedestals, wireless Internet access, electric vehicle pickup and yacht maintenance and repair services.

The invitation-only Jumeirah Private Island Phuket Yacht Club will feature a clubhouse with accommodation, spa, gym and restaurants. Jumeirah Private Island Resort owners will have full access to the marina and yacht club.

"Our first homes are due for completion in the first quarter of 2009, with a total of eight homes at various stages of construction," Mr Franklin explained.

"Construction of the Jumeirah Resort is due to start later this year with the soft opening scheduled for October 10, 2010." Regarding submarine infra-

structure, including the laying of electricity, fiber-optic and water pipes to supply the island, Mr Franklin said, "The Phuket Provincial committee has given verbal approval to proceed and written confirmation is expected this week. Construction is scheduled to begin early June."

The project will cover about 25% of the 200-rai island.

Mr Franklin said, "As you can imagine, during the development of the island, respect for the environment has been at the forefront of our design planning. To this, we continue to support the Phuket Marine Biological Center in the preservation and restoration of Phuket's coral and mangrove areas," said Mr Franklin.

Ecological design elements include an integrated rainwater collection system, thermal insulation installed in all roof structures to reduce air-conditioning energy consumption, doubleblock cavity walls and doubleglazed windows and patio doors for thermal efficiency.



PHUKET CITY: Construction of the Phuket@Town project on 10 rai of land on Surin Rd is about 20% complete. Work on the 500million-baht project, developed by Bangkok-based Sittarom Property Co Ltd, is expected to be finished by May 2009.

Although the original plan was for work to be done in two vears, construction, which began in March, is now slated for completion within about one year so that buyers can take advantage of the government's decision to reduce property transfer fees from 2% to 0.01% of the registered value of a property.

Phuket@Town will comprise 14 three-story commercial buildings, 33 three-bedroom home-office units, 13 three-bedroom, three-story townhouses and 51 two-bedroom, two-story townhouses, all between 162 square meters and 264sqm. Each unit is five meters wide.

The project has only 12 three-story home-office units and four three-story townhouses still available for sale. Prices start at 3.49 million baht for the threestory townhouses and 4.39 million baht for the home-office units. Until the end of June, the prices are reduced to 3.39 million baht for the townhouses and

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from 4.19 million baht for the home-office units.

Surasak Borisuti, Phuket@Town manager, told the Gazette that although this is Sittarom Property's debut project in Phuket, the company has previously developed five housing projects in Bangkok and one in Udon Thani.

The project has been split into four zones: commercial buildings, home-office units and two accommodation zones.

Once the project is complete, a range of different businesses will operate out of Phuket@Town, including clinics, accountants, law firms and convenience stores. Full facilities are available at the project, including car parking and 24-hour security, he said.

"We created separate zones so that customers can chose a location to suit their purposes," he added. "Our pre-sales launched at

the end of February. The commercial buildings, which face the main road, were sold within three days of going on the market," said K. Surasak.

The construction contractors for the project are Porntisan Co Ltd and DTP Construction Co Ltd.
