Intarat calls for SorPorKor probe

PHUKET: Gen Intarat Yod-bangtoey, in his capacity as special adviser to Natural Resources and Environment Minister Anongwan Thepsutin, on May 18 led an inspection tour of properties believed to be illegally built on agricultural reform (*SorPorKor*) land in the Kamala, Kalim and Patong hillsides.

The day before, Gen Intarat and his team inspected other building sites in the area, including some on Koh Yao Yai in Phang Nga, which Forest Department surveys also show to be *SorPor-Kor* land (degraded public forest land intended for agricultural use by poor farmers).

The two-day inspection tour followed a meeting chaired by Gen Intarat at Phuket City Municipality offices on May 16.

At that meeting, Gen Intarat proposed a two-prong attack to reclaim public land for the state. "The are two main types of encroachment: people squatting on public forest land to plant rubber trees and cases where land titles have been [improperly] issued for public land," he said.

Gen Intarat proposed that rubber plantation squatters could be charged rent and allowed to continue to farm the land. "They could pay rent to the governor and continue to farm their existing plantation, but they would not be allowed to expand their plantations or cut down any more of the natural forest," he said.

However, for public land on which titles have been issued, Gen Intarat proposed that the government reclaim the land and restore it to its natural state as preserved forest.

"Land that local people have encroached on so that they can farm will be handed back to the Forestry Department and restored to natural forest, but other encroachers could face minimum jail sentences of 10 years," he warned.

While ready to reclaim public land that people may have government-issued titles on in order to restore it as natural forest, Gen Intarat left the door open for some plots to be developed for tourism by government offices and the local administrative bodies where they are located.

"For forestry land that can be used as a public park or a tourist attraction, we are pleased to support and protect our natural resources to support tourism in Phuket," he said.

Aongart Chanachanmongkol, chief of Phuket Provincial Office of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE), reported that of the 339,396 rai that comprises Phuket, 108,581 rai is state forest land.

Some 41,200 rai in Phuket is titled as SorPorKor land. Of this, occupancy rights (Tor Por 4 titles) have been issued for 21,182 rai, he said.

K. Aongart reported that so far this year, the Phuket MNRE office had discovered 23 cases of encroachment on state land: 15 cases in state forest, six cases in protected mangrove forests and two cases of illegal logging.

Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Ratthasima proposed handling encroachment cases locally. "If any local [administration] organizations discover encroachment in their areas, they can report these cases to the governor," he said.

Also at the meeting was Monthon "Palad Rambo" Chartsuwan, the MNRE official responsible for investigating lawenforcement issues throughout the South.

Suspect in 7-Eleven shooting surrenders

PATONG: After meeting Patong Mayor Pian Keesin, the prime suspect in the shooting murder of a motorcycle-taxi driver in a 7-Eleven store handed himself in to police on the night of May 18.

The suspect, Chainart Yuyen, 31, has denied any involvement in the murder.

About 2 am on May 16, motorcycle-taxi driver Satien Wongwai, 35, was shot twice in the back and once in the neck with a 9mm gun inside the 7-Eleven on Nanai Rd near the intersection with Sainamyen Rd.

By the time Kathu Police and rescue workers from the Kusoldharm Foundation arrived, K. Satien was dead.

His body was taken to Patong Hospital for examination.


Witnesses described the shooter as a dark-skinned, short-haired man wearing a white polo shirt and black jeans. After shooting K. Satien, he ran out of the store and fled on a motorbike, they said.

Kathu Police Inspector Lt Col Chalermchai Hernsawas told the *Gazette* that police had an arrest warrant issued for Chainart on May 17.

The suspect met Patong Mayor Pian Keesin early evening on May 18 before turning himself over to Kathu Police Station at about 8 pm. He was accompanied by relatives, who posted bail for him.

Friends of the victim confirmed that both men had been drinking at the same venue in Patong just before the killing.

The victim's friends said they had no idea why K. Satien was murdered.

SorPorKor probe

K. Monton last month filed a police complaint at the Phuket City Police Station charging Land Department Director Chairerk Dissaya-amnaj for dereliction of duty in failing to revoke an illegally issued land-ownership deed on protected mangrove-forest land in Rassada.

"There are many cases of encroachment from Kamala to Kalim and some in the outskirts of Patong," he said.

On May 20, Pongpayome Vasaputi, Permanent Secretary for the Ministry of Interior, met Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, Vice-Governor Tri Augkaradacha and local authorities to discuss encroachment issues.

"Around the nation, about 6 million rai of SorPorKor land has been encroached upon," said K. Pongpayome.

'Since 1997, we have taken legal action against 11 people in Phuket who had claimed 20 plots covering 500

By the end of 2006, the Supreme Court had heard the cases against five of those people - and had decided against all of them, ordering 11 plots covering 300 rai to be returned to the state," he said.

Among those who lost SorPorKor land under the Supreme Court rulings is current Phuket MP Tossaporn Thepabutr.

"Much of the SorPorKor land returned to the state is in Patong and Kamala, which are very beautiful areas. So I have come to Phuket to inspect those areas to protect them against encroachment.

"I received a report from the Phuket governor that many local OrBorTor [tambon administration organizations] are ready to provide funds to develop their areas.

"We can develop the land for public use or allocate it for farming. It depends on what provincial officers decide what to do with it. I will follow up on these issues later," he said.

1,267 ya bah tablets seized in Mai Khao

MAI KHAO: Following a random vehicle inspection, Tah Chat Chai Police on May 11 arrested three people for possession of ya bah (methamphetamine) with intent to sell and seized 1,267 pills.

The arrests were announced at a press conference held May 12 at Phuket City Police Station.

Attending were Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Rattasima, Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch, Phuket City Police Superintendent Col Paween Pongsirin, and Tah Chat Chai Police Superintendent Col Sakchai Limcharoen and his drug investigation unit.

Col Sakchai said that at about 9:30 pm on May 11, officers at a checkpoint in Village 7 pulled over a motorcycle being ridden by 21-year-old Pongdanai Jinirat for a routine inspection.

Under the seat they found a stash of about 300 ya bah pills in six plastic bags.

Pongdanai confessed to possession of the drugs and agreed to call his dealer, 31-yearold Prapate Thayeng, to arrange a sale at the home of Prapate's 18-year-old girlfriend, Saowanee Tonglahorm, in Mai Khao Village 2, Col Sakchai said.

At the home, police found almost 1,000 more pills and ar-

rested Prapate and Saowanee.

A total of 1,267 pills were seized along with 40,000 baht in cash, a Honda Civic sedan, a Honda Click motorcycle, a gold necklace, three bank books, eight ATM cards, four mobile phones, two wallets, a designer handbag, a Giordano watch, a Sony Playstation and a digital camera.

Prapate and his relative Prajak Thayeng were arrested by Tah Chat Chai police last year. Prapate was acquitted, but Prajak was sentenced to life imprisonment, Col Sakchai said.

Following Sunday's arrest,

Prapate confessed to running drugs from Bangkok to Phuket in lots of 2,000 pills in return for payments ranging from 20,000 to 30,000 baht, he added.

Prapate normally sold in bulk. After his planned sale fell through, he was forced to keep the drugs at his girlfriend's home and try to sell them wholesale, it was explained.

Despite the drugs being found in Pongdanai's motorbike, Prapate denied that Pongdanai or Saowanee were involved.

Gen Decha said the case and other recent arrests indicate there is still a high demand for ya bah in Phuket.

There are currently about 40 outstanding warrants to arrest suspected dealers in Phuket, he added.

Jintana Plaza ablaze again

PATONG: Jintana Plaza on Patong's beach road caught fire on May 15, causing an estimated 1 million baht in damages.

It's the third time this year that fire has broken out at the complex.

Lt Naruwat Puthawiro said that Kathu Police Station received a call about 3:15 am reporting that a fire had broken out at the plaza.

"The fire [reportedly] started about 3:15 am and spread through tailors, souvenir shops and other vendor's stalls.

"It spread through 10 shophouses in total. We still don't know how many small stalls inside were damaged," he told the Gazette.

"We are waiting for forensics tests to determine the cause of the fire and we are still not sure how much damage was caused, but we believe it's more than 1 million baht." he said.


Lt Naruwat pointed out that this was the third time that Jintana Plaza had caught fire this

"We are investigating whether the fires were started by short-circuits or by arson. Also, this fire started at night, just like the previous two fires," he

"Most of the shops are insured," Lt Naruwat added.

The last time Jintana Plaza caught fire was April 30.

Customs raids net B2.6m in fake goods

PHUKET: In a week of raids starting on May 7, Phuket Customs seized counterfeit and allegedly smuggled goods valued at 2.6 million baht.

Many of the seized goods were sent to Phuket by parcel delivery services, arriving on the island by bus from Bangkok.

Goods seized included music CDs, movie and game CDs and DVDs, D&G shoulder bags, Levi's wallets, designer-label watches, hands-free sets for mobile phones, plastic air-powered handguns and rifles, and cheap copy Brembo "high-performance" car brake calipers.

Also seized was a Rover car, valued at about 400,000 baht.

Vichak Apirugnunchai, director of the Customs Department's Bangkok-based Investigation and Suppression Division, said, "We received an order to be on the lookout for pirated goods in Phuket, especially goods sent to Phuket by bus.

On May 7, Customs officers seized 250 watches and 148 sets of pirated high-performance brake calipers, with a total value of about 523,000 baht, at SP Express company on Thepkrasattri Rd Soi 7 in Rasada.

The next day, 25 fake plas-

tic guns, valued at about 62,500 baht, were seized at the Central Tour company office on Dibuk Rd, in Phuket City.

On May 9, also in Phuket City, officers seized 5,350 pirated DVDs at Kaochareon Express Delivery Co Ltd on Ong Sim Pai Rd. The DVDs were valued at about 1,337,500 baht.

On May 12, officers seized 260 pirated shoulder bags, valued at 390,000 baht, at the Speed Express office located in Soi Sunthorn Uthit, off Chao Fa West Rd.

On May 13, Customs officers seized a Rover car parked on Komarapat Rd in Phuket City, just one street away from Phuket City Police Station.

"It is possible that the car was smuggled in to be sold without paying import duty," said Chief Inspector Tawal Rodjit, also of the Investigation and Suppres-

Violent muggings return to Rawai

RAWAI: A foreign man was shot in the leg and stabbed in the stomach in a motorbike mugging at about 4 am on May 12.

His attackers made off with his wallet, containing 300 baht.

The man, who asked to be identified only as "Dave", told the Gazette that he was returning from a late night out at a Nai Harn bar when he was attacked.

"I had turned right [onto the road toward Rawai Beach] and rode about 50 meters when I came around the curve and was attacked," he said.

"I had no time to react. I was shot in the [lower] right leg and stabbed in the side; then they robbed me," he explained.

"I was lucky," he added. "I got on my bike and rode about 200 meters when I saw an ambulance already attending to another man who was also attacked, maybe just 10 minutes earlier," he said.

Both men were taken to

Bangkok Hospital Phuket, Dave said.

However, Dave was transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital about six hours later. "I am okay, now. We will have to see if there are complications. The knife 'touched' my liver and my intes-

tines," he said.
"This is stupid – crazy. Just for 300 baht," he added.

The attack was reminiscent of the spate of violent muggings that gripped the Rawai-Nai Harn area last year.

Chalong Police Superintendent Col Samarn Chainarong told the Gazette that, with the arrival of the low season about a month ago, he has ordered his 10 patrol officers to step up surveillance in known risk areas after midnight.

Muggers in Rawai like to use motorcycles to make a quick getaway and often commit more than one attack a night, he said.

To minimize the risk of falling victim, tourists should avoid traveling alone in known risk areas after dark, he said.

Phone ban nets six on first day

PHUKET: Traffic Police on May 20 fined six motorists for driving while using mobile phones on the first day of the ban being enforced on the island.

Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Col Chalit Thintanee said that three car drivers and two motorcycle riders were fined in Phuket City and one car diver was fined in Thalang.

"In Phuket City, we set up a checkpoint at the intersection near Satree Phuket School and Traffic Police on motorcycles were told to keep an eye out while on patrol around the island.

"We also have 48 CCTV cameras around the island, which we will use.

"We will capture the image

of the driver using his phone and send a copy of the photo and the fine to be paid to the registered address of the owner of the car," he explained.

"So far, none of those charged have contested the fine," he added.

ends June 19. Election day is July


Pa Khlok OrBorTor: Term ends July 24. Election day is August 31.

All of the election days fall

on a Sunday. According to Election Commission law, a ban on all alcohol sales will go into effect from 6 pm on the Saturday before the election until midnight on election day.

The Election Commission in Bangkok on May 7 confirmed the results of the Phuket OrBorJor elections, he added.







'n 1981, about 250,000 rai (400 square kilometers) of Phang Nga Bay was designated as a marine national park. Its boundaries stretch from Muang Phang Nga District to the coast at Takua Tung District and contains more than 42 large and small islands.

The park is the largest area of original primary mangrove forest remaining in Thailand and is protected by regulations forbidding any kind of destruction or encroachment of the natural habitat that supports rare species of plants, animals and marine life, which in turn attract hundreds of thousands of tourists each year.

Protection is provided by a team of park rangers authorized to arrest people for encroachment and poaching, along with a system for collecting park fees from tour operators. Despite this, local eco-tour operators are becoming more concerned with the destruction of the natural environment, reporting unrestricted poaching, deforestation and environmentally damaging tourism.

Ao Phang Nga National Park Assistant Chief Worapoi Lomlim told the Gazette that about 200,000 foreign and Thai tourists visit the park each year, adding that there are 33 registered tour companies operating in the bay, the majority of them being large tour companies and about 40% of them local boat operators. About 80 people are employed by the national park, he

Some outspoken eco-tour operators say insufficient government-allocated resources and apathy toward marine park management are allowing incidences of poaching, land encroachment and pollution to continue with little or no enforcement of the regulations meant to protect the marine park.

A Bay on the brink

hang Nga Bay, with its limestone karsts and stunning islands, is touted as a magical place and a must-see site for the region's visitors. But some are warning that a lack of environmental protection is threatening to turn the magic into a disappearing act for much of the area's fragile ecosystems and the wildlife that lives within it. Prompted by the report of a macaque shooting in full view of tourists, the Gazette's Nick Davies and Janyaporn Morel investigate the state of the bay.

An incident of poaching in the bay was recently brought to the Gazette's attention, when a group of tourists who were on an expedition with John Gray's Sea Canoe witnessed the shooting of a macaque, a protected primate, at Koh Panak by a group of three

Witnesses in the group, including children and a pair of Scandinavian journalists, said the trio, one carrying a rifle, arrived at the island's beach in an unmarked longtail boat and proceeded to shoot and bludgeon the primate to death – in full view of the group of tourists who were in a boat about 30 meters from the beach - and carried the macaque's carcass back to their

K. Worapoj told the Gazette that he had been informed of the macaque killing and had requested co-operation from nearby Klong Kian community members in keeping a vigil against poaching in the area.

also brought up at a recent Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) meeting at which K. Worapoj was present. At the meeting he advised people who witness such incidents to collect evidence, ideally photographs, and send them to the national park authorities so they could be properly investigated.

Slash & Burn. Dave Williams, director of Paddle Asia, takes tourists on sea canoe tours in the northeast of Phang Nga Bay. While on paddle tours, his groups have observed large areas of forest on fire on Koh Yao Yai. Mr Williams claims that trees are being cleared through slash-andburn techniques, despite Koh Yao Yai being part of the marine national park.

"There are always fires on Koh Yao Yai. Traveling around the island, you'll see a lot of places that have been completely stripped of trees and vegetation. Much of it has been burned away. I thought it was illegal to clear-cut mountain tops. The top soil will most certainly end up in the bay, and from there, make its way to killing the little-remaining coral," said Mr Williams.

Wichai Praisa-ngob confirmed that about 400 rai of Pru Nai forest on Koh Yao Yai was encroached upon recently and that the names of about 20 people had been listed for involvement in the encroachment. "We are going to charge those people soon. We can't let this incident pass without doing anything; they must be severely punished," he said.

According to John Gray, the volume of marine rubbish and oil pollution from motorboats in the bay, especially around the coves in Koh Penak, is increasing. "Speedboat oils, plastic bags and Styrofoam are pervasive. The higher the tourist count, the uglier these sites become," he said.

In response, K. Worapoj


said, "We are always asking for help from tourists and tour operators to keep the area clean. The larger boats have trash bins on board and they are not allowed to leave trash on the islands. They must take any rubbish back to the


"The real garbage problem is from Koh Panyee as there is a community living there. When the tide rises, the garbage is washed away from the community and into the open water. The central government and the provincial authorities have been made aware of this and the park is working hard to educate locals on how to keep the area clean," he added.

"We run programs to educate students, local people and tour operators in environment conservation. At Koh Panyee, for example, there is a joint project

and the garbage bank to reduce the amount of waste through recycling," he said, adding that local administration organizations collect trash, but only during certain periods.

Speedboats and jet-skis. The Gazette has been unable to establish whether there are any specific zoning laws or marine national park guidelines restricting the use of motorboats or jetskis

which are a source of oil and noise pollution, especially longtail boats that are not fitted with muf-

John Gray said powered boats and even irresponsible kavaking are having damaging effects on the park's environment, along with a lack of carrying capacity restrictions to limit the number of boats or tourists that are allowed to visit areas at

every boat that operates within the national park must be registered with the Marine Office before then being registered and given approval by the park authorities to operate in the area.

When asked whether there are any restrictions on the number of boats allowed to operate at one time or if there are any anti-pollution regulations in place, K. Worapoj said, "We co-operate with the Marine Office in educating all tour operators and boat drivers in proper maintenance of their engines to reduce oil and noise pollution."

He added that people who see boats or jet-skis racing in the area can report what they have seen to the national park authorities if they suspect the boats are causing a disturbance or being operated illegally.

"Speedboats come so close to some of the islands that they have killed all the small fish there," Mr Gray said. "Kingfishers, which thrive on the small fish, are subsequently absent from places such as Koh Penak and

are taken in speedboats.

"Sump holes, or *hong*, created after many years of tidal erosion are accessed through tidal sea caves often contain fragile mangrove trees that can be easily damaged by tourists standing on the roots or pushing them aside when kayaking through them," he explained.

"As far as I know, the mangroves in the *hong* never regenerate and they are dying as more and more tourists are taken to them without being properly guided.

"I don't blame the guides for this, as they are often unaware of the consequences of allowing tourists to climb on the mangroves. It should be the responsibility of the tour operators to ensure that their guides are properly trained in eco-friendly tourism," he added.

Both John Gray and Dave Williams have documented various incidents of animals, such as birds and primates in the park being killed for their meat, sometimes in full view of the rangers or even by the rangers themselves.

It is difficult to assess how widespread or frequent the poaching is and it raises questions as to the severity of the impact this may have on the ecosystem considering that poachers may be taking only what they need to eat.

Also, despite how tourists may feel witnessing this, it is a practice that has probably gone on for generations, long before the area was declared a national


And, according to the people who know the area, the number of primates seen in the park is rapidly diminishing.

With such a large area to patrol, it is also an almost impossible task for even the best-intentioned park rangers to always be in the right place at the right time to prevent or arrest people for committing offenses.

The root of the problem appears to be the sheer number of tourists who visit the park each year and the lack of eco-friendlytourism instruction that they and their guides receive.

It is estimated by some in the region's tourism industry that at least 50% of the 5.5 million tourists came through Phuket International Airport last year had visited Phang Nga Bay Marine National Park at least once – a far higher figure than the 200,000 reported by the park authorities.

When it's not even clear as to the number of people using the park on any given day, law enforcement within and pro-active environmental protection of this natural treasure seem very distant dreams indeed.

Local shooters take aim at park pokers

BANGKOK: The world of Thai clay-pigeon shooting has been rocked by the daily desecration of one of the sport's club head-quarters in Hua Mak.

Coinciding with a group of homosexual patrons using the range for open-air trysts, shooters have had to gingerly tread around a sea of discarded condoms.

While you may think that this reporter is exaggerating what could be a case of one or two discarded johnnies — a common enough sight in many urban areas in this day and age — to beef up a story on a slow news day, photos published in our Thai-language sister paper *Kom Chad Luek* attest to the true extent of the problem. In the interest of protecting the sensibilities of unsuspecting readers — and editors — the *Gazette* has opted to forgo printing the unsavory images.

A reporter from Kom Chad Luek headed to the shooting range, which belongs to the Sports Authority of Thailand (SAT) and serves as the head-quarters for the Skeet and Trap Shooting Association of Thailand, after receiving a tip-off of the nightly rendezvous at the range.

On reaching the range, the reporter was greeted with the sight of fish in a pond next to the range happily nibbling away on the many floating condoms that had been thrown in.

Under a bo tree next to the clay-pigeon trap, there were condoms scattered around with abandon, many of them looking fresh, as if they had only recently been used.

One clay-pigeon enthusiast, who asked for his name not to be revealed, said that every evening when shooting was done for the day, about 10 to 15 gay men would begin to gather around the range. continued. Sometimes, when people are shooting, they step on full used condoms, which really

Some would mess around on the bridge along the edge of the pond, while others would wander to the adjacent park, all the while making noise and bothering others wanting to use the facilities. Park workers tried to chase them away, but the unruly revelers refused to leave, the shooter added.

Every morning, following the nocturnal romps, condoms are strewn around the range, the man continued. Sometimes, when people are shooting, they step on full used condoms, which really puts them off their shots and makes them lose concentration, the interviewee lamented, before calling on authorities to quickly sort out the mess.

Wirawan Phojanwaraphong of SAT said that the shooting range was the responsibility of the Skeet and Trap Shooting Association of Thailand and that sometimes they may not look after it as well as they might. From now on, they will increase security on the range and dig a moat to prevent unauthorized people gaining access.

K. Wirarawan added that the shooting range is not the only SAT venue facing this problem. "Apart from the shooting range, the area around Rajamangala National Stadium is also being used for illicit sex. We are now cracking down on it, though. If any unauthorized people are caught there after 6pm they will immediately be charged with trespassing," she said.

n a survey conducted by the Family Network Foundation, nearly 40% of Bangkok residents said they had lost respect for monks after reading reports about their misbehavior and nearly 6% said they had lost faith in Buddhism altogether.

The survey, carried out from May 7 to 12, questioned 466 people. The study was conducted to see how relevant Buddhism is in Thai families today and to gauge people's reactions to reports of bad behavior by

"Some people say they don't want to undertake religious activities because they've lost faith in monks," said Surin Kijnitchee of the Thai Health Promotion Foundation.

In a survey of 1,233 youths aged 13 to 25 years by the Bangkok University Research Institute, 55.6% didn't know that Visakha Bucha marks Buddha's birthday, enlightenment and nirvana.

However, more than 90% said they thought teaching of Buddhism was important and 84% said they had relied on monks' advice when facing problems.

Yet more than 90% agreed that Thai youths today had drifted away from spirituality and that hanging out with friends, playing games and visiting entertainment venues was more inter-

Greedy guardians. Police in Ang Thong province on May 16 arrested Phlaiwan Chaichana and her husband Sathit Mitmarta for forcing their two daughters to beg for them.

The couple spent the money on a new pickup truck and luxury items.

The girls, 15 and five years old, are now in government care.

Police found the suspects waiting in their pickup near a market after a tip-off by local residents. Coins amounting to 15,000 baht were found hidden in the vehicle.

Sathit told police they once sold balloons at local fairs, but found they could earn much more begging, so he had taken the elder girl out of school and sent her out to beg at local fairs in several Central provinces.

The elder girl told police she had been begging since about age eight and wanted to go back to

Gambling on theft. Police arrested a former insurance-company manager for allegedly embezzling nearly 50 million baht to bet on football matches.

Police arrested suspect Surasak Seutrong, 41, in Bangkok's Bang Khen District on May 15.

His former company complained in November that Surasak had withdrawn 49 million from his bank account and fled.

Police believe the suspect had slowly embezzled the money to bet on football matches until he was so deep in debt he could no longer cover up his crimes. He then fled to live with a relative in Bang Khen.

Coastal Karens. Amid cries of "human zoo", a group of longneck Karen hilltribe women a few weeks ago moved to the coastal province of Chonburi, where they are becoming a popular tourist

A 50-year-old woman with

two daughters are among 13 Karen families who have traveled from the North to live in the new settlement in Sattahip dis-

She said the 3,000 baht her family received monthly for living there was the main reason for the move; otherwise, she prefers the cooler weather in Chiang

Located near a famous temple, the new village welcomes tourists who pay entrance fees: 25 for Thais and 250 baht for foreigners. The long-neck women make extra money by selling handmade souvenirs to tourists.

Despite criticism from activists and the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees, Sattahip District Chief Narong Thirachantarangkoon defended the settlement.

With their highland identification cards, the Karen are allowed to travel freely throughout the country, he said.

"This is not human trafficking. The Karen people voluntarily come here. They also get better pay. The wages are higher here than in Chiang Mai," he

Pattaya plight. In apparently unrelated cases, two British men were arrested in Pattaya for child molestation within a two-day pe-

Michael Terrance, 58, was arrested at 7:30 pm on May 17 at a rented mansion in Banglamung district with eight teenage boys ranging from 14 to 18 years old.

He had already had sex with one of the boys, while the seven others were waiting for him in the living room when the house was raided, police said.

The boys told police that they were delivered to Terrance by Chalee Kengthanyakorn, 45, who works at a pub in Bangkok. Terrance gave Chalee 2,000 for each boy, but Chalee deducted 1,000 baht each, they said.

Terrance declined to talk to police, saying he would consult his lawyer first.

At 7 pm the following day, police arrested 41-year-old Dee Christopher for allegedly buying sex service from an 11-year-old boy found with him at his rented house, also in Banglamung dis-

The boy told police that Christopher picked him up while he was walking in a soi and he was given 500 baht in exchange for sex.

Made to be broken. A recent survey by the Abac Poll Research Center into morals and life found that 87% of respondents admit to breaking laws or social conven-

In all, seven out of every 10 motorists admitted to breaking road rules. The poll discovered the worst road-code violators were teenagers, people aged in their 20s and people aged over

In other areas of life, 37% admitted to queue jumping and 45% to breaking their own resolutions. Some 36% said they needed the law to keep them in

On a more positive note, 60% or respondents said they were responsible. The same number wanted to be better people, while more than half wanted to improve their commu-

The survey was conducted over seven months and quizzed 6,933 people in 18 provinces.

he violence in Yala, Pattani and Narathiwat is giving local people sleepless nights and recurring nightmares, leading to severe mental problems, according to a recent report by the Public Health Ministry.

The chief of Department of Mental Health, Dr Somchai Chakrabhand, said tests had been conducted in the three provinces to monitor the mental health of people living in the area.

The report shows that 36% had recurring nightmares, 25% could not sleep properly and 19% were permanently scarred.

Many were left confused, uncomfortable, had breathing difficulties, felt angry, wanted to hurt other people or commit sui-

Narathiwat residents were reported as those suffering the most, followed by Pattani and Yala provinces. Some 44% of Narathiwat residents suffer from severe mental problems, according to the report.

The Public Health Ministry recently set up mental health rehabilitation centers at 35 community hospitals in the three provinces to help the people.

Heinous crime. An elderly couple and their disabled daughter were stabbed to death in a burglary in Surat Thani's Khian Sa district on May 12.

Rubber planters Pramoon Phuangrat, 72, and his wife Phayong Phuangrat, 71, were found dead in the bedroom of their house in Village 6, Tambon Ban Set, with multiple stab wounds.

In the other bedroom of the two-bedroom house, police found the body of the couple's daughter, Pranee Phuangrat, 33, disabled after suffering from polio as a child. She also had stab wounds.

Police said that the window of the kitchen had been forced open and a bottle of fish sauce was smashed on the floor.

the house in silence, but woke up the sleeping occupants by breaking the fish sauce. When confronted, he then used a kitchen knife to kill them, police believe.

Five bahtweight in gold jewelery was missing from the house, police said.

Col Shinawatra Premsanga, superintendent of Khian Sa Police Station, said that he believes the attacker acted alone and was likely to have known the victims, so had to kill them to silence them. Col Shinawatra added that he believes the motive of the attack to be robbery.

Oil price problems. With the start of the new school year, teachers in the Deep South are concerned that rising oil prices will force cutbacks in the teacher-protection units that shepherded them safely to and from school in the past.

Sa-nguan Intharak, chairman of the Narathiwat Teachers' Association, said that many association members feared for their safety prior to the re-opening of schools on May 16.

"Now the problem I'm hearing most about from my colleagues is high gas prices," K. Sanguan said.

"Some teacher-protection units that used to collect teachers to take them to school are complaining that their budgets no longer cover the price of gasoline for their vehicles.

"I want to call on the Education Department and military authorities to fix this problem before any tragedies occur. They should start with schools that are in the most dangerous areas," he

In the run up to the new term, insurgents had been circulating leaflets saying that they would kill government officers, K. Sa-nguan added.

High gasoline prices and the growing differential between retail prices in Thailand and Malaysia have seen an increase in smuggling in the area.

"Manop", a smuggler in Songkhla's Sathingphra district, said that as diesel is now retailing for 36 to 37 baht a liter in Thailand, many businesses are turning to diesel smuggled in from Malaysia, where it retails at about 15.5 baht a liter.

Manop said that he buys smuggled fuel in loads of 2,000 liters at 28 baht a liter from a large agent in Haad Yai. He then sells it to businesses – mainly trucking companies and shrimp farmers who need diesel to power aerators for their ponds – at 31 to 32 baht a liter.

The fuel-smuggling trade is also adding to official corruption in the region, Manop said.

Every month he must budget 25,000 to 30,000 baht to pay off officials to look the other way, he added.

"Despite government crackdowns, high prices continue to attract people to smuggling. Even though it can be many hundreds of kilometers from the source of the fuel in Malaysia, people still manage to transport it

"To do this, we have to rely on connections and people with influence. With the economy in the area struggling, the income from smuggling is far higher than other businesses," said Manop.

Police rescue 85 pangolins.

Police in Prachuap Khiri Khan on May 16 rescued 85 pangolins being smuggled from Haad Yai to Bangkok.






The trio said they were hired by a man in Haad Yai to deliver the animals to a customer on Rama II Rd in Bangkok.

Old Takuapa fades from tourist map

can't stand the rain... If you live in Khao Lak, you may have had this old Tina Turner song buzzing through your head during the first weeks of May. Torrential rain and strong winds caused flooding and minor damage all over Khao Lak.

There has not been a single day without downpours lasting hours. Occasionally, it even rains throughout the night. On Petch-kasem Rd, an electric pole fell down recently, resulting in a half-day-long blackout.

As usual, there have been several collisions between pickups and SUVs resulting in some upturned vehicles in ditches.

A brand-new black Isuzu pickup truck ended up folded around a tree, with both the driver and the front-seat passenger killed instantly.

Several roads were flooded in Old Takuapa, with homeowners trying in vain to fight off incoming water with sandbags, shovels and brooms.

Most houses in the old town were flooded knee deep. This was nothing new to the residents there, as this part of Takuapa

floods often due to the nearby river and an ineffective drainage system.

No wonder houses are being abandoned, causing this historical area of Phang Nga to wilt away. Many of the old Sino-Portuguese shophouses have already collapsed.

Most of the young residents of Old Takuapa have left to find jobs or open businesses in Khao Lak or Phuket.

Tourists are a rare species here, even though this historical part of Takuapa provides an abundance of inspirational motives for photographers and painters.

Driving through, one senses an atmosphere of sadness. The first settlers came to Takuapa in the 3^{rd} century BC.

Then, centuries later, when the tin-mining business flourished, the town became one of the most important harbors on Thailand's west coast.

Many Khao Lak-based tour

operators have now removed visits to Old Takuapa from their tour programs, although some upmar-

ket resorts, such as the Sarojin at Laem Pakarang, now offer half-day trips to Old Takuapa in an effort to raise public awareness.

It would be a good idea if local authorities invested in preservation and promotion of this

valuable part of Thai history before it disappears forever.

Don't give up. While in past years the high season in Khao Lak extended into May with calm seas and the sun shining into the middle of the month, this year the low-season weather started before the beginning of April.

Tourists disappeared in the first week of April due to the Easter holidays ending early this year

It was an eerie feeling to drive through an almost deserted central Khao Lak in April, a time when the town should have been full of tourists. Khao Lak businesses are facing a seven-month-long low season.

While a few Khao Lakbased operators, such as Richard Doring of www.khaolak.de, took action in creating a special lowseason program, most operators sat back and began complaining.

Lamenting and self-pity seem to be top of the agenda in

Khao Lak at the moment. Many operators are on the verge of giving up and moving away while many businesses are for sale. It's sad and – at least in my opinion – silly to give up now because we have come so far.

Khao Lak has a great future; the ongoing construction of upmarket resorts, private homes and shopping plazas proves this.

Peter Gabriel once sang, In this proud land we grew up strong, we were wanted all along; I was taught to fight, taught to win, I never thought I could fail.

This song reflects the sentiment of present-day Khao Lak.



It will feature an art and craft market starting mid-afternoon with handmade products, followed by musical performances of classical Thai music, jam sessions for budding musicians and performances by Phuket Ska Band and reggae crowd-puller Job 2 Do.

Happily Ever After Floyd now calls Phuket home

fter a more than a year spent flying between Phuket and the UK since opening Floyd's Brasserie in 2007, Keith Floyd has decided to make Phuket his permanent home.

Renowned for his enthusiastic, boisterous approach to introducing international cuisine to the masses through television shows and cookbooks, the legendary British chef has decided to settle in Phuket.

A household name in the UK, Keith has laid his pen to rest after writing 32 cookbooks, many of which have accompanied his string of continental cook

Keith decided to make Phuket his permanent home so that he can continue running Floyd's Brasserie at the Burasari Resort, Patong, and finalize plans for a new Floyd's Brasserie in

"I plan to use Phuket as a base from which to operate. At the moment, we are actively researching the possibility of opening a new Floyd's restaurant in Singapore. Being based here will enable me to easily go back and forth," he said.

At 64 years old, Keith's obsession with food is as fiery as ever, as those who have ever worked with him will attest to. Britons will miss his television shows and books, which began with the program Floyd on Fish way back in 1984.

From then on, Keith's ca-

reer as a celebrity chef took off, leading him to cook on every continent before eventually choosing Phuket in 2007 to establish his first brasserie.

"The new restaurant in Singapore will be very much a Floyd thing, similar to the one in Phuket. Seafood will be one of the main focuses. It's surprising that, even though Singapore is surrounded by sea, there are very few seafood restaurants, so I want the new Floyd's to play a major part in bringing innovative seafood cuisine to the country," he said.

Last year, many Gazette readers were concerned for Keith's wellbeing when he was admitted to hospital after returning to the UK for a series of stage performances.

"I was simply overworked and wasn't eating properly. I was doing stage shows in a different city each night and spending a lot of time traveling on trains. The shows were in the evening, so by the time I'd finished, there was never anywhere open to get a decent meal and I was pretty much on my own. It all became too much," he said.

Keith cites this as one of the main reasons for deciding to make Phuket his home. "The lifestyle is so much easier here and the people I work with here are so attentive, always making sure I'm all right, asking if I've eaten," he added.

His relationship with the British tabloids has always been a point of concern for Keith and speculation about the state of his health was rife with rumors.

"The Sun has always been quite good to me in a cheeky way. One time, I was making a TV commercial and was doing a national book-promotion tour, visiting all the radio stations.

"The Sun wanted to serialize parts of the book so I told them that the only time I could meet them was after a meal with some associates at a Chinese restau-

"We drank mineral water the whole way through the meal - not a drop of alcohol - but when the article came out in the paper, they had put little bottles of wine all over the page.

"Even though the article was inaccurate, it wasn't really scurrilous or vindictive, so I didn't mind," he said.

Other publications have taken a more derogatory approach. "A journalist for the *Daily* Mail once listed me as one of Briton's top 10 worst husbands, asking readers, 'Who in their right mind would marry this bloke?""

Despite making 26 TV series with accompanying books – virtually exhausting the foods that could be tagged on the end of "Floyd on..." – and more than 120 TV commercials, Keith is adamant about being just another ordinary person with a post-war era upbringing in Sommerset, in the Southwest of England.

He recounted a British supermarket incident as typical of the way the public expects TV personalities to always behave the way they do on screen.


"I was waiting at the checkout counter with a can of baked beans, Heinz tomato soup and Marmite in my basket.


"The woman behind me in the queue took a look in my basket, then looked at me and said, indignantly, 'Well, I'm not going to watch you anymore if that's the kind of food you eat,' to which I replied, 'Look, I'm the same as you. I don't eat quails eggs stuffed with lark's tongue every day of the week. Like you, I sometimes enjoy simple things like scrambled eggs on toast."

One of Keith's favorite traditional British foods is faggots, which causes a little confusion when explained to Americans. "When I was young, Wednesday was always faggots-and-peas day. I still love them to this day," he said.

To Brits, faggots are large meatballs in gravy; in France, they are considered a delicacy, rather than the derogatory American term.

"Whenever it was my birthday, my mother would make fag-

gots and mushy peas for me. However old I was on my birthday, my mother would prepare that many faggots, so the older I got, the more faggots I'd have to eat, even when I was in my thirties," he said.

"I was once being interviewed on an American talk show and my birthday was coming up soon. The presenter asked me if I was doing anything special for my birthday and I said, 'Well, I'm going to be 43 years old, so the only thing I know is that I'm going to be having 43 faggots," he added.

Asked if he played the role of cook when he was young, Keith recounted stories of growing up in the countryside, where everyone in the family played a part in preparing meals, leading a traditional hunter-gatherer lifestyle, picking fruits and vegetables, and storing food on marble shelves in a walk-in larder.

"My parents would go to bed at about 10 pm. Once they were asleep, my sister and I would often go down to the kitchen and raid the larder for whatever we could find.

For example, we might find some tomatoes, hollow them out, fill them with bread crumbs and butter and put some cheese on top, then bake them in the oven.

The point is, we were immersed in that kind of lifestyle, where obtaining and preparing food was a big part of the day," said Keith.

As Keith closes the final chapter on his books and cooking shows, he seems glad to be leaving behind the world of TV-chef stardom.

Twenty years ago, *Floyd* on *Fish* spearheaded a revolution in the way cooking shows were shot and produced.

Keith's knowledge of fine foods and his infectious enthusiasm were the magical ingredients for a long-standing career in front of the camera.

Keith thinks that the standard of cook-show hosts has dropped in recent years.

He dislikes the way producers pick chefs whose looks and manic behavior in front of the camera are more important than their experience.

"I am convinced that while many of the people are watching these TV cookery programs, they are sitting there with a microwave meal on their laps.

I'm not at all convinced that these television programs have done anything at all to improve the abilities of the majority of the viewers," he said.

Get your rocks off in Patong

he previous After Dark column generated almost island-wide confusion about the message contained within the words. In the spirit of spring-time clarification, that the review was critical of the DJ and not the venue.

To make it plain, there's nothing wrong with White Box it's one of the hippest nightspots on the island - but Cut Killer didn't do justice to his reputation. He played it safe – and nobody really enjoys playing it safe. For a venue into which so much effort has been put into creating a cutting-edge concept, Cut Killer wasn't able to deliver the goods on a similar level.

Moving on, there have been a few noteworthy rumblings in Phuket's nightlife scene. A quick mention goes to Club Lime, who celebrated their first birthday on May 9. Phuket's socialites and those to be seen at the scene were out in force to see DJ Nakadia, returning with her minimal beats. Either people didn't realize there was a free bar or else Phuket's clubbers actually prefer to pay for

While Club Lime may have been packed, a disappointing crowd of about 80 people showed up for DJ Nakadia's debut gig at club 808 in Bangkok the follow-

Back on Phuket, Rock City recently made the bold move of opening a second venue, this time on Rat-U-Thit

200 Pi Rd, at the end of Soi Bon Jovi and pretty much every Bangla.

For those who have never been to Rock City, the concept is simple. Two Swedish guys, named George and Fred, decided to take Phuket's music scene into their own hands and make the ultimate



rock club. George first visited Phuket about 20 years ago, but it wasn't until about seven years ago that he set up camp here. Whenever his friends would come to visit him, they'd ask George to take them out, but there was nowhere to go. The music scene for rock purists was non-existent.

> And so Rock City, on the beach road in Patong, was born and now the venue features daily bursts of Metallica, AC/DC,

bastion of rock 'n' roll you can imagine – and Bryan Adams.

If you're wondering what gives George the right to moan about the local music scene, it's because he was a member of Swedish big-hair band Nasty

Idols, who had a string of hits across Europe and in Japan. Although George's hair isn't quite as big as it once was, he is still living the rock 'n' roll dream.

Testimony to Rock City's success is the huge tourist following the place has. Travelers in need of a dose of nostalgia usually find their way to Rock City, where much drinking ensues and the more boisterous patrons take their shirts off and shout/scream/ sing along.

Rock City 2 is more of the same. The venue is a near carbon copy of the original. The music is based in one large room, with a stage before a number of tables and a bar at the back right of the club. The main room is about the same size as the original Rock City. From the back of the room, the acoustics sound odd,

so take the plunge and sit as close to the front as your eardrums will

Rock City 2 has yet to achieve the popularity of its bigger brother, but the venue is still busy with a blend of tourists and locals. Perhaps the most interesting aspect of both Rock City venues is the clubs' appeal to Thai girls who love nothing more than rock beats.

The music at Rock City 2 is similar to that at Rock City 1, but the bands have a slightly more youthful appearance. One of the bands in particular looked as if they had come straight from school as they covered Green Day and other contemporary

Stealing the show on the night the Gazette showed up was the tomboy fronting one of the

bands. Many Asian singers try, and fail, to mimic the vocal talent of Amy Lee, frontwoman of Evanesence, usually resulting in some of of karaoke disaster. Not this tomboy, however, who had the vocals locked down.

The atmosphere at Rock City is the same whatever night of the week you go. The only difference is in the number of people there. Perhaps this is why Rock City is so successful; because night in, night out, they deliver a tried and tested formula.

The drinks aren't the cheapest in Patong as Rock City is catering mostly to a holidaying audience, but at about 160 baht and upwards for a pint of beer, it could be worse.


The throwback to the '80s is a consistent theme at Rock City. At times, you'll wonder if you're actually in Thailand or if you've somehow been transported back to your student days. For these reasons, it's difficult to fault Rock City because the club has always been upfront about exactly what it offers. There's no pretense about the place. It's raw, rugged and you can drink shooters out of test tubes.

With such a popular venue, it would be refreshing to see a few more local bands singing their own material.


You can't, however, fault the musicians at Rock City. George handpicks them and selects only musicians in it for the love of rock sellouts need not apply.






And, yes, there are even golden lanterns throughout that evoke the tale of Aladdin, though it's not certain if a genie is lurking inside any of them.

When Chinese met Siamese

he influence of Chinese culture in Phuket is everywhere, from the celebration of the Vegetarian Festival to the numerous shrines and Chinese communities dotted around the island. The Sino-influenced buildings in Phuket City bear testimony to a long history and association with the Chinese, who came to Phuket looking for jobs and business opportunities in the 19th century.

The Chinese first arrived in Phuket in April 1855 when the Bowring Treaty was signed between Siam and Great Britain, opening up the borders of Siam to free trade with British merchants.

The treaty was a breakthrough for the Europeans after similar trade negotiations with other nations had failed.

The Bowring Treaty opened up Siamese ports to foreign trade. Before the treaty, the tin trade was the only means of subsistence for the local population.

The treaty changed that. The Europeans had perfected a technique of coating ferrous metals with tin, in order to prevent corrosion, so global demand for tin was at an all-time high.

British traders gained access to Phuket's tin supply making tin prices in Phuket surge. The island's fledgling tin industry expanded with increased investment and production rates increased to meet export demands.

The expansion of the mining industry brought an influx of foreign migrants

> A large number of immigrants from China were from the South-

ern Chinese province of Hokkien.

Immigration was encouraged by the local Phuket government. Siamese governors had an obligation to send

their provincial taxes to the central government, which often placed heavy demand on funds.

There were often tax-fund targets to be met. It was the responsibility of provincial governors to arrange for the funds to be sent back to Bangkok. Due to the significant increase in trade in Phuket, the demands placed on its annual tax fund increased likewise.

Tin mines run by Siamese entrepreneurs were often small and inefficient.

ernor of Phuket decided that the only way to increase the island's tin production was to pursue an open-door policy with regards to the immigration of foreign laborers.

Increasing the number migrant workers would provide sufficient manpower to operate the tin mines efficiently. Chinese riots. The governor, finding it beyond his

merchants and entrepreneurs from Penang were also invited to invest in Phuket's mining industry.

Potential laborers began to migrate to Phuket en masse. Immigration of Chinese laborers was welcomed by the provincial government. Not only did the laborers provide much-needed

manpower, but the provincial government relied on migrants for additional tax revenue. Taxes were levied on many of the businesses that were popular among migrants, including gambling venues and alcohol vendors.

As the number of Chinese immigrants further increased, migrant organizations were formed, in order to give workers union power and protection.

Doyle returns to comic form

here's a pattern among some writers: they write slim comic novels in their youth and hefty dramatic novels as they grow older. Evelyn Waugh and VS Naipaul are two examples. A third is Roddy Doyle, author of the hilarious Dublin trilogy: The Van, The Commitments and The Snapper.

He followed up with his Booker Prize-winning masterpiece, Paddy Clarke Ha Ha, the story of the dissolution of a marriage as seen by through the eyes of the young son. Then he made a disastrous detour in magic realism with A Star Called Henry about Dublin during the 1916 revolution. A pair of dramatic novels about an abused wife are heartfelt but lack the flash of his earlier work.

Now Doyle is back in comic form with The Deportees (Viking, New York, 2007, 242p), a collection of eight stories focused on the lives of the "new Irish", the Nigerians and Poles and other foreigners who've come to settle in Ireland since its EU boom days. Where Ireland had once been a place to flee from to all quarters of the globe, one in 10 residents is now foreign-born.

The change began in the mid-1990s, Doyle writes in his Forward, "I went to bed in one country and woke up in a different one. That was how it felt, for a while. I'd written a novel, The Van, in 1990, about an unemployed plasterer. Five or six years later, there was no such thing as an unemployed plasterer. A few years on, all the plasterers seemed to be from Eastern Europe."

Doyle's new comic vitality is on glorious display in his first story: "Guess Who's Coming For the Dinner".

It opens: "Larry Linnane liked having daughters. He got great value out of them, great crack... Screaming, roaring, flinging each other down the stairs, tearing each other's hair out. The best of friends in other words."

For a Sunday dinner, Larry sits down with his wife Mona, four daughters Stephanie, Tracy, Vanessa and Nicole and Ben, Stephanie's guest. Ben is Nigerian. He is polite, educated, well-dressed and utterly befuddled by the savage Irish humor around the dinner table, the screaming invective and casual obscenities. It's a tour de force of family dynamics.

The title story "The Deportees" brings us back to Jimmy Rabbitte, the hero of The Commitments. In that novel the young Jimmy puts together an Irish soul

band only to have it fall apart in a silly squabble. Now he's middle-aged, married for nine years, with a pregnant wife and three kids.

He decides to put together another band, The Deportees, this one composed of Nigerians, Poles, Russians and Romanians, with kick-off songs by Woody Guthrie. Again, the dialog is lightning quick, the plot turns deft, the comedy outrageous.

Not all these stories work. "57% Irish" is a science fiction formula story about a young scholar who devises a test of "Irishness" meant to deport foreigners but who sabotages the whole scheme to make sure his Russian girlfriend stays in the country.

But he's back on track in "New Boy", getting inside the head of a Nigerian refugee kid's during his first day in an Irish school, struggling with the language and school bullies. Having watched his schoolteacher father gunned down by soldiers, he's not much fazed by bullies and ends up sharing an outlaw's laugh with them.

In "Black Hoodie", an Irish teenager teams up with a Nigerian girl and a schoolmate in a wheelchair, to pull off shoplifting scams for a school project. While the couple are tailed by security guards, the guy in the wheelchair scoops up every-

The final story, "I Understand", follows an illegal Polish worker as he holds down two jobs while dodging police and extortionists. His life of danger wins him an Irish girlfriend.

The narrative tone throughout the book is warm, genial, sympathetic – a nice antidote to the coldness of middle age.

Fires highlight everyday dangers

The most recent in a long series of late-night fires along the beach road in Patong highlights yet again the need for improved fire-prevention measures in the congested, poorly planned pedestrian market areas fronting the sidewalk along much of the road.

The latest fire at Jintana Plaza was not only the third blaze there this year, but the second within just 15 days (see News pages).

A fire broke out in the same complex in the early morning of April 30, destroying goods worth an estimated 10 million baht, according to one Thai-language newspaper.

Such conflagrations are hardly limited to Jintana Plaza, of course. In September last year, a similar blaze destroyed 10 vendors' shops located inside a shophouse along the beach road between Soi Kebsup and the Holiday Inn Patong.

Like the fire that gutted the nearby Crocodile Disco in 2006, all of these fires along the beach road broke out in the early morning hours, well after they had closed for business. Most of the fires were attributed to "electrical shorts", even though the shops should not have been drawing much, if any, electrical current at the time.

Other similarities include the danger and difficulty firefighters have had to confront when trying to extinguish these fires across the hideous tangles of live power-supply cables that line the beach road.

These dangerous eyesores mar the already-degraded scenery along the beach road, large sections of which offer no sea views at all thanks to post-tsunami "commercial redevelopment" of the area.

Despite numerous requests by Patong Municipality over the years for central government assistance in burying the cables, the golden opportunity was lost when, after the tsunami, no government ministry would help fund the work.

Although Patong Municipality had properly reserved a twometer-wide area along road for the project, the opportunity was overlooked when the Tourism Authority of Thailand in 2005 began its 194.7-million-baht redevelopment along the Patong beachfront.

That project focused far more on cosmetic improvements than safety concerns. This is evidenced not only by the continued dangerous state of the power cables, but also the attractive, but slippery, paving stones that now cover the sidewalk and pose a hazard to pedestrians in the rainy season. Fortunately, these late-night fires in Patong have have not cost any lives – yet.

However, the sad fact remains that the streets of Patong continue to pose multiple hazards to tourists – even those smart enough The Editor to exercise extreme caution.

Mangrove forest buffer zones will save Phuket lives

his month, another natu ral disaster tragically struck the Irrawaddy Delta in Burma. In the wake of the destruction and rising death toll caused by Cyclone Nargis, we at Mangrove Action Project (MAP) are again calling for the re-establishment of mangrove buffer zones to serve as coastal greenbelts along affected coastal zones to mitigate the effects of future disasters.

The force of the cyclone could have been greatly lessened. Loss of life and property damage could have been somewhat averted if healthy mangrove forests had been conserved and restored along the coastline of the Irrawaddy Delta.

I have heard that the Irrawaddy Delta was formerly a lush, biodiverse wetland of extensive inter-tidal forests. Much mangrove loss initially occurred under British colonial rule in order to clear space for rice pro-

The Delta was once called "the rice bowl of the world". Since that time, mangrove loss has continued - during World War II to satisfy military demands and, more recently, for fuel and unsustainable development, such as industrial shrimp-and-fish aquaculture and urban expansion.

The result is that these natural protective buffers have been removed, leaving the areas exposed and vulnerable to the waves and wind.



Ifredo Quarto is the executive director of Mangrove Action Project, a group whose mission is to assist and educate in methods for protecting mangrove forests.

He says that the tsunami in 2004 and Cyclone Nargis in Burma highlight the need to re-establish mangrove forests to act as buffer zones to soften the blow of future large-scale natural disasters.

Alfredo outlines why re-establishment is so important and how Phuket can put the wheels in motion.



Today, nearly half the world's human population is concentrated along coastal areas. These important zones support an array of other life dependent upon healthy coastal wetlands. With climate change affecting the rate of sea-level rise, coastal wetlands, such as mangroves, play a pivotal role in protecting coastlines from erosion and acting as buffers against hurricane winds and storm surges.

83% of the mangroves of the

Irrawaddy were destroyed.

When mangroves are removed or degraded, the coastlines become vulnerable to Nature and are made more so by climate change and the subsequent viru-

Although the tsunami of 2004 resulted from an immense earthquake off the north coast of Sumatra, the high death toll can be partially attributed to a manmade disaster.

This unnatural disaster preceded the tsunami and was created partially by ignorance, yet also by greed and naivety, resulting in the clearing of the natural buffer zones once present along the same coastlines that were hardest hit by the tsunami.

Extensive mangrove forests, coral reefs, seagrass beds, sand dunes, peatlands and other natural features were once effective barriers to wind and waves. These natural protective buffers were removed and the full force of the tsunami lashed the coastline, resulting in the high death tolls in Asia and East Af-

Though no early warnings were issued for the 2004 tsunami or Cyclone Nargis, there had been cries of concern from mangrove ecologists, local communities and non-government organizations about the expansion of shrimp aquaculture, agriculture, tourism, charcoal production and other unsustainable industries along coastlines.

More than half the world's mangrove forests have been destroyed, leaving only about 15 million hectares. It is estimated that 150,000ha are lost each year.

We must re-establish the mangrove buffer zones that previously protected people and property from storms and tsunamis. Much time, effort and money has been spent by planting seedlings in the wrong places at the wrong times.

In many instances, seedlings raised in nurseries to be hand-planted in neat, regularly spaced rows, are often placed in inappropriate locations, such as mud flats or salt flats, where the present hydrology and soil conditions are all wrong and mangroves do not belong.

Such large-scale mangrove plantings are actually afforestation efforts, not restoration, and high failure rates ensue.

Most of these mangrove "restoration" projects are planting only one species, usually the rhizophora, or red mangrove, which is easy to plant and more commercially valuable for wood products. Those few projects that do succeed in establishing mangroves are more of a monoculture, rather than a healthy multi-species mangrove forest as naturally occurs in the tropics.

We at MAP believe that the

most effective method for successful, large-scale mangrove restoration is through ecological mangrove restoration (EMR), a six-step process that considers local hydrology and results in biodiverse, ecologically functioning ecosystems.

In Southeast Asia, there are huge areas of abandoned shrimp ponds that could be returned to mangroves by restoring the natural hydrology.

In promoting EMR, MAP staff, advisors and partners are aware of the importance of a multi-stakeholder approach with full community involvement in the entire process to ensure sustainability.

Six steps to mangrove reforestation success

Work together with communities, organizations and local government to:

- 1. Understand the individual and community species' ecology of the naturally occurring mangrove species at the site, paying particular attention to patterns of reproduction, distribution and successful seedling establishment.
- 2. Understand the normal hydrology that controls the distribution, successful establishment and growth of targeted mangrove
- 3. Assess the modifications of the mangrove environment that occurred and that currently prevent natural secondary suc-
- 4. Select appropriate restoration areas, through application of steps 1 to 3, that are likely to succeed in rehabilitating a forest ecosystem and are cost effective. Consider the available labor to carry out the projects, including adequate monitoring of their progress towards meeting quantitative goals established before restoration. This step includes resolving land-ownership and land-use issues necessary for ensuring long-term access to, and conservation of, the site.
- 5. Design the restoration program at suitable sites, selected in step 4, to restore the appropriate hydrology and use natural volunteer mangrove recruitment for natural plant establishment.
- 6. Use actual planting of propagules or seedlings only after determining through steps 1 to 5 that natural recruitment will not provide the quantity of successfully established seedlings, rate of stabilization or rate of growth as required for project success.

We would like to have a young woman from Myanmar to work for us as a maid in our house in Phuket. Is this legal, and do you know of any agencies that can facilitate this kind of employment? Do I need a business visa to employ her? Or can my Thai girlfriend employ a maid from Myanmar?

Nattaya Anudid, Chief of Phuket Provincial Employment Office, replies:

No employment agencies that we know of offer staff from Myanmar. You will have to find a Burmese person who already has a work permit and is willing to leave her current employer to work for you as a maid.

You will need to bring her to the Phuket Provincial Employ-

ment Office to register her as your employee.

Your Thai girlfriend can hire her. She will need to come to our office with the Burmese person she wants to register as her maid.

She must also provide copies of her Thai ID card and census registration.

The PPEO is currently not allowed to issue any more new work permits for Burmese as our quota has already been filled.

From our mid-30s our muscles begin to slowly decondition and lose density and, therefore, strength.

This slows down our metabolism, which means that even if we consume the same number of calories, we will slowly deposit fat around areas such as our tummies, hips and thighs.

Working on your strength in the gym will slow this process so that you can hang on to your muscle tissue for longer. There are also cosmetic benefits to regular weight

Back to the issue of weights and fe-

males: compared with males, females produce less testosterone and human-growth $hormone - two \ hormones \ that \ allow$ muscles to grow and increase in strength.

I read that TT&T "plans to invest up to 6 billion baht rolling out WiMax services nationwide this year."

That was May 2006. Right now, TT&T is in bankruptcy and just announced that it has to cut its R&D budget from 300 million to 200 million baht.

Its total revenue in 2007 hit 7.3 billion baht. That's revenue, not profit - TT&T hasn't turned a profit in years.

In February this year, I read that United Information Highway, in conjunction with CAT, ran a test from a boat off Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort "with initial downlink speeds of 10 megabits per second and uplink speeds of three megabits per second."

That report spawned some great photos of a sailboat off Phuket, but the speed test seems ephemeral: I've never seen real international download speeds anywhere in Phuket over 2 megabits per second.

Number 2. Fiber to the Home (FTTH, or to the Office) should appear in a limited number of locations late this year or early next year.

I expect the technology to suffer all sorts of teething pains – think of the problems you have now with your copper phone line and multiply by 10 – and it's going to cost a lot.

But Phuket's going to be the poster boy for all of Thailand, so FTTH will work, sooner or later. There's a lot of money riding on the experiment.

FTTH won't eclipse ADSL in the near future, but five years down the road you're going to want fiber, not a phone line.

CASH: The ultimate safe haven

any countries are going to look back at 2008 and 2009 as years of recession, or as years with economic growth so slow that it felt like a recession. Investors are unlikely to escape without a few financial bruises.

However, there are some strategies that are worthy of some consideration. Here are some examples:

There is always cash. The good part of having cash on deposit is that it is unlikely that the investor will make a loss. The bad part is that in real (inflation-adjusted) terms in most countries the investor does not manage to maintain the true buying power of the invested cash.

That feature aside, deposits in cash can be made in different ways. The traditional way is to place money on deposit with a bank for a pre-selected period, but in countries such as Thailand interest rates are so low that it is impossible to make a real return (after inflation) on cash deposits.

Many Thai banks – and this extends to most countries – offer their clients an alternative: Money Market Funds (MMF). These funds are widely used throughout the world and in some places they are the standard place to "park" cash.

In France, for example, a



person wanting to place funds on deposit would simply ask the bank to use the "in-house" MMF. The bank would normally ask what period the depositor was considering, say up to six months or from six to 18 months. Banks usually have a short-term fund and a medium-term MMF.

The concept of a money market fund is simple: the depositor places cash in the fund, which, together with hundreds or thousands of other deposits, adds up to a substantial sum of money.

The combined funds allow the bank access to wholesale money markets where returns are higher than what is available to retail investors.

Basically, it is an economy of scale. Most MMFs do not require more than 24 hours' notice of intention to withdraw.

Many funds will also hold "near cash" investments, which includes the likes of negotiable security depots, certificates of deposits, bankers' acceptances and short-dated bonds.

Recently, during the depths of the credit crisis, there were reports of dubious securities being held in MMFs. The reason this happened is simple: greed. Poorquality holdings usually offer higher returns than high-investment-grade counterparts.

Cash and cash equivalent investments can help ease the pain through times of economic woe.

Fear of the bad publicity of being caught holding "commercial paper" of dubious quality and the possibility that the bank would have had to compensate depositors for any losses together have con-

tributed to higher standards in money market fund assets.

Alternatives to MMFs, such as short-dated bonds, do exist and

are often suitable. However, many investors find that their individual savings are too small to meet the requirements of banks or stockbrokers.

There are types of inflation-linked bonds available, depending on the currency. It is essential for inves-

tors to understand the "fine print" – how these bonds work, who issues them and whether there is a withholding tax.

It is common for governments to withhold 15% to 30% of interest earned. This tax is deducted automatically at source. Almost without exception it is impossible to reclaim this tax.

Moving away from pure cash investments, the alternatives cover a wide spectrum. One of the more adventurous asset classes is commodity funds.

This is an area that can cause painful losses, but some basic ground rules can reduce risks. Investors in commodity funds must know what is actually meant by commodities: in some cases it will include commodities such as oil, gold or wheat, but it may also include foreign exchange, stock market index futures and interest rates.

These are not necessarily bad additions. In fact, by diversification, they can reduce risk. What is critically important is that the fund is able to go "long" and "short".

In other words, the fund can invest hoping to profit from rising prices and from the opposite, falling prices.

Trade in these funds can be either "black box" computer driven, also known as "emotionless trading" or the traditional "hands-on" variety. Sometimes there is a mixture of approaches inside one fund. No particular method is superior or inferior.

One of the best features of this type of fund is that it opens investors to new areas of investment they would normally not consider. In these uncertain times that can be a great advantage. Recent spikes in the prices of en-

ergy and food prices can result in substantial gains without the investor having any detailed knowledge of the rice or oil or related markets.

However, if markets grow tired of ever-increasing prices and huge losses start to be made, investment funds that can ben-


efit from falling prices can certainly boost an investor's profits.

It is not necessary for an investor to know whether prices are going to rise or fall; the fund can make these decisions.

Through the years, this column has mentioned investments in Ground Rents and University Student Accommodation as being worthy of consideration.

Well, how have these two areas reacted to credit crunches and other crises? They have behaved perfectly and are still very profitable.

PHUKET: Since being founded in 1986, Thailand's Siam Winery has become one of the world's wine-making powerhouses. The company's Spy Wine Coolers the top-selling alcoholic beverage among Thai women with more than 90 million bottles sold annually – are ubiquitous in Thailand. The company distributes its products to 20 countries, including the UK, where the Wine Coolers are in a popular niche.

Siam Winery's governing philosophy is, says Kim Wachtveitl, the company's director of business development, to develop

wines that suit Thai tastes. The traditional European paradigm embraces wines of different quality develop wines that and type - dry wines at dinner, sweet wines after, flavored or sparkling wines for any director of business time.

But Thailand is different.

First, Thai food is generally spicy. Second, much of the market is not sophisticated enough to bother with the subtle distinctions that pepper your average wine aficionado's palate. Thai wine-drinkers want a beverage to drink throughout the day, with or without food. Moreover, the Thai market is develop-

ing in its own way and is ready for real wine as a supplement to coolers, which are largely made from fruit other than grapes.

of E & J Gallo's Peter Vella line of Californian wines, for which a ballroom was hired.

Vella himself, Gallo's vice-president of wine making and senior winemaster - for 45 years one of the most influential forces in world wine making – was on hand. The event

was attended by more than 100 people - mostly retailers, nearly all Thais.

'This product is aimed in Thailand at the domestic market," said Mr Wachtveitl. Wine is shipped in bulk to Thailand and bottled by Siam Winery.

Famous for consistency and

technological brilliance, Gallo was for 50 years the world's largest wine maker. It still operates the largest winery in California's Central Valley, the Livingston plant outside Modesto. The plant produces more than 350 million liters annually, second among world wine producers in terms of volume. Gallo remains the most well-known name in the world's largest wine market – the US.

A marketing experiment last year by researchers from Cornell University, Mr Wachtveitl's alma mater, shows name recognition's potent influence. Two groups of diners were presented free glasses of wine with dinner, the bottles of which were placed on each table. Half were labeled "Noah's California Wine", half "Noah's North Dakota Wine".

Labeling was otherwise the same. Despite the differing appellations, the wine was identical. Diners with California labels enjoyed their wine the most. They also said their food was more delicious, from which it was concluded that the popularity of one product rubs off onto others.

In Thailand, neither California wine nor Gallo are potent icons. The partnership with Siam Winery is thus a boon to Gallo, which will benefit from Spy's mass appeal. But Siam Winery won't benefit from Gallo name recognition except by building the brand itself.

The company hopes this will be easy owing to Peter Vella's special style of wine making. His Cabernet Sauvignon blend and Chardonnay-based offering are notably "fruit forward", as Vella says, without the astringency and sourness of most dry wines.

The wine includes apple, which allows a significant reduction in the tax levied on the wine as it includes fruit.

Vella's wines are noted for their soft drinking qualities – exactly what the Thai market demands. Vella holds patents on reduced alcohol technology so it's no surprise he favors lower alcohol levels of about 11%.

He also employs flavor mapping to craft wines. Layers of tasting identify the necessary sweetness, acid, oak and tannins for a given blend. "Then we grow the grapes to do it," he said.

Vella's Classic Red and Classic White - 299 baht each are crafted to suit Thai tastes.

Anecdotal evidence suggests Vella may be onto something. Phuket resident Uli Niepergall encountered a box version of Vella's burgundy while in Langkawi. He liked it, but was surprised by his Thai wife, whose alcohol consumption is limited to an occasional glass of "not too sour" red wine. She liked it, too, and urged him to stop giving it away to visitors.

Off-season seafaring – and keeping your dinner down

huket's divers have seen small glimpses of the destruction caused by Cyclone Nagris, which ravaged parts of Burma recently. Beaches around Phuket have been partially reshaped. Many old trees have died and there have been power cuts, flooded streets and a premature closing of the Similan Islands Marine National Park.

With the last liveaboard coming in, low season has officially begun on the west coast. Most dive operators have pulled their boats out of the water for a full service, compressors are in the workshops for overhaul and scuba tanks are being cleaned and tested, all to prepare for storage and a fresh start in September.

If you are a dive instructor, you are probably on your way to a long-deserved holiday back home, visiting family and friends or checking out other remote places on the globe.

If you are still here, it means you have learned to appreciate the relative calmness of monsoon season. If this is your first off-season in Thailand, strap in for five months of peace, tranquility – and some excellent diving.

I won't romanticize it; there are times when you'll need a strong stomach to go out to the islands, but it is well worth it. With less fishing and less diving, the reefs and fish life are given a chance to repopulate.

Shore diving is usually limited because bad visibility and strong surf making entry and exit

a dangerous and inelegant ballet.

The diving around Phuket, however, is still exciting. Racha Yai and Racha Noi can be visited daily and you may even catch a glimpse of a rare pelagic sea creature. Sightings of marlin, whale shark and manta ray are not uncommon.

There are some great dive spots between Phuket and Phi Phi. The King Cruiser wreck has an abundance of fish life. Anemone Reef and Shark Point are always a good score with their variety of colorful anemones and the occasional leopard shark dozing on a sandy patch.

If the bad weather really hits you on your holiday or day off, your diveboat will be able to find a reasonably cozy shelter behind Koh Dok Mai, where there is an amazing wall full of small creatures.

Diving in the low season is more relaxing. Diveboats are less crowded that usual, crews are more chilled out and there are fewer divers all trying to catch a glimpse of that mantis shrimp.

You may even find special deals on dive packages.

Sensitive stomach? Scared of the boat ride? Here's a few tips when you have a few hours of rough monsoon-season sailing ahead of you:

Eat a solid breakfast that will give you enough carbs until lunch, preferably easy to digest. This means no bacon dripping with oil. Instead, have oatmeal, crusty toast or any other cereal

product that will leave your stomach feeling full.

Hydrate well before you go on board. At least one liter of mineral water will prevent motion sickness.

Taking medicine helps in most cases, but if you're feeling unwell, it is already too late. Medication, such as Dramamine tablets (dimenhydrate), works well, but may make things worse when you're already hanging over the railing. Take them an hour before boarding. Scopolamine patches applied to the skin do a reasonable job as well

If you're not fond of chemicals, try an anti-seasickness wristband. They're elastic armbands with a small plastic

button on the inside, pushing on your medial nerve. This is believed to calm down your central nervous system. Another nonchemical prevention – something I learned from Thai sailors – is ginger. Raw ginger tastes soapy, so you could go for capsules or tea instead.

Try not to take caffeinecontaining drinks such as coffee or cola. They will stimulate your central nervous system and make things even worse. For obvious reasons, avoid alcohol until after you completed your dive.

Make sure all the things you need are packed systematically, so you don't need to turn your dive bag upside down on a dive deck. Try to limit setting up your gear to the periods when you are still navigating out of Chalong Harbor or when you're approaching the dive site and are in the shelter of the island.

The best place on board to for avoiding seasickness is in the center of the boat towards the back, where there movement is least. If you're already feeding the fish with your stomach contents, try to look toward the horizon. Also, make sure you're not in the exhaust fumes of the boat – don't spoil the toilet or dive

deck for the rest of the divers: overboard is best.


If you feel something coming, don't try fight it, it will come out sooner or later. Just make sure you are in the right

place when it does.

If you've arrived at the dive site, the next best thing to do is to jump into the water. Other divers will testify that being submerged is the best cure for seasickness. It is the magic medicine. As soon as you put your head under water, even as a snorkeler, you'll feel great again.

If you do become sick, make sure to stay hydrated. Dehydration is one of the primary causes for decompression sickness in divers.





Phuket fighters win Asian titles

RAWAI: A team of mixed martial arts (MMA) fighters representing Phuket's Tiger Muay Thai took part in the Pan Asian Grappling Games on May 3 and 4, winning 19 individual medals and the allround team trophy, with 81 points, ahead of second-place Team Fabricio, with 62 points.

A 5,000-strong crowd gathered at the Mall of Asia in Bay City, the Philippines, on both days to see 300 of the regions top grapplers in action, with 12 countries represented.

After wining individual and team titles in the Southeast Grappling Games 2007 and 2008, as well as the Singapore Grappling Games 2008, this marked the latest in a string of success stories for Tiger Muay Thai.

Tiger Muay Thai have now won 44 individual medals and three team championships in the past 12 months.

points to PSC's 6.5 to take the title



However, team captain Peter Davies led his team to a deserved victory and ensured that all players managed to return to their hotels in time for each day's play.


PSC will arrive in Phuket in October to try and win the trophy back.





B400m residential project a near sellout

PHUKET CITY: Construction of the the 400-million-baht Supalai City Resort project on Thepkrasattri Rd is set for completion by February next year.

Building of the eight-story condominium is now about 80% complete, with units expected to be ready for transfer of ownership by September.

Also being built are seven three-bedroom, two-story houses and 90 three-bedroom, three-story townhouses. The entire project is spread over 9.5 rai, with access to the house units via a different point to access to the condominium building.

The condominium block will house 168 one-bedroom and two-bedroom units, offering living areas from 27.5 square meters to 59sqm and priced from 900,000 to 2 million baht.

Atip Bijanonda, director and deputy managing director of Bangkok-based developer Supalai PCL, told the *Gazette* that construction of Phase 1 of the project, including the condominium building, two-story houses and 42 of the townhouses, should be completed by the beginning of 2000

The remaining townhouses will be built in Phase 2, slated for completion in February 2009.

"The townhouses and the two-story houses in Phase 1 will be ready for transer to buyers within two months. We aim to have the entire project finished early next year so that buyers can take advantage of the government's policy of reduced property-transfer tax," he said.



The two-story houses are being built on areas of 200sqm to 240sqm and are priced from 3.89 million baht, while the townhouses are being built on 80sqm plots, with prices from 2.39 million baht. "We have been selling units

[off plan] since January and have had a positive response from buyers. All of the two-story houses have been sold, 95% of the condominium units are sold and about 80% of the townhouses have been sold," added K. Atip.

his Thai-style, hillside pool villa with views of Surin and Bang Tao bays is part of a residential development conceived to resemble a boutique resort. A warm welcome, times two

he first impression is often the one that lasts, and a hotel lobby serves as both a welcoming place and a preview of what's to come during a guest's stay.

A lobby design by itself can lift the spirits and soothe weary travelers.

The Millennium Resort Patong Phuket has created two such places of refuge for its guests in its two wings next to the Jungceylon complex in Patong.

While both lobbies match the overall theme of a cool, contemporary urban resort, each one sets a slightly different mood for arriving guests.


The 197-room Beachside wing, which opened in January, welcomes people with a lobby in an earth-tone, modern style. The Lakeside wing, another 224 rooms, features a lobby that is cool, green and elegant.

"For the Lakeside we played with texture, while on the Beachside wing we played with color," said lead designer Somchai Tantipatthanawong of P49 in Bangkok.

As its name suggests, the Beachside wing reflects the colors of the beach, with sand-colored tones and splashes of blue. K. Somchai said that keeping it simple and modern was key, along with emphasis on space and comfort, since this wing often handles the arrival of groups.

The lobby for the Lakeside wing, open for about a year, is more intimate and extravagant, with reflective green tiles evoking the golden age of Sino-Portuguese architecture.

Visitors to the Lakeside wing are more individual travelers, so a large lobby space was

not necessary – however, the "wow factor" was still needed to impress these discerning guests, K. Somchai explained.

Formerly the Burasari resort, the Lakeside wing lobby was upgraded from a jungle style to one infused with peace and calm. "We wanted to make it like a reflective pond," said K. Somchai.

"We applied the concept of open air; the space is designed


openly within the structure with a reflective pond for an airy atmosphere and a relaxing, easy feel. We blended this with a soft Thai style.

"We applied Portuguesestyle elements in the flooring of the lobby with black tiles and materials that are similar to Sino-Portuguese textures," he added. The columns in stacked aquatoned glass add a touch of modern cool to the overall design.

All of the major materials are sourced locally, including the floor tiles made of cement resin.

While each lobby has its own unique style, both are an oasis for Millennium guests. Not simply places to pass through on the way to a guest room, these lobbies are escape hatches from the hustle and bustle of central Patong.





Gardening

oes anyone understand how any government works? I mean really understand? It's obvious to the general populace that the individuals in charge haven't a clue what they're doing. But aren't they supposed to make a bit more sense when they decide on policies and things?

In the West, we're used to baffling government decisions. We're used to inanities, such as spending UK£400,000 (that's 25 million baht) on a logo for the 2012 Olympics in London and ending up with four splodges that make up the word "ZOR".

It has emerged that the British government plans to deny what's supposed to be free healthcare to anyone it deems is not living a government-approved lifestyle. They say that patients will be handed "NHS Health Miles" cards that will earn them reward points for losing weight, giving up smoking, receiving immunizations or attending regular health screenings.

The worst part is that this sort of thing is already happening in the British healthcare system. People are already being denied access to medical procedures because they're smokers or because they're carrying a few extra pounds. I'd be stuffed.

Local governments are even more of a mystery. I don't think it really matters what country you are in – local government decisions just don't make any sense.

The logic applied in Phuket eludes me. It would appear that the powers-that-be on the island have decided that the road-widening projects we've all had to endure over the past few years are enough for now.

The four-lane runway, passed off as a superhighway, that leads to Rawai Beach was clearly necessary and doesn't encourage anyone to travel faster than they should. The old road

just wasn't wide enough.

The brand-new, four-lane dual carriageway from Chao Fa West to Kathu was obviously money well spent. It doesn't matter that four lanes go down to one in the village at the other end, with speed bumps that bring you down to a crawl while you negotiate the bottlenecked traffic.

The trees and vegetation that used to be in middle of the road near the Darasamuth Intersection (by Central Festival Phuket) were unsightly and had

They did exactly the same thing at Nai Harn Lake. What must have been millions of baht was spent on ripping out all the

old plantlife, including some spectacular trees, to be replaced by a sterile-looking path dotted with bargain-basement trees, many of which are now dead.

Nai Harn Lame now looks like a Bournemouth promenade. What were these people thinking? Maybe they just like the idea of bringing Bournemouth to Thai-

Of all the areas they've meddled in, they could have been a lot more imaginative with the trees. A perfect option would have been the sea hibiscus. The official name is hibiscus tiliaceus, but I'll stick to sea hibiscus for now. Australians call it the cottonwood.

The sea hibiscus is native to the shores of the Pacific and Indian oceans, but today appears throughout the tropical and subtropical regions of the world, particularly in coastal areas. It is grown mainly as an ornamental The sea hibiscus is native to the shores of the Pacific and Indian Oceans, but today appears throughout the tropical and subtropical regions of the world.

tree for landscaping. A common tree along the coast, the sea hibiscus is also sometimes found near watercourses, mangrove swamps and estuaries, often forming dense, impenetrable thickets and covering enormous areas. It can grow up to 10

meters tall and just as wide if not pruned.

The sea hibiscus is perfect for sandy and moist soil, although it will also grow well in drier conditions. Tolerant of brackish water and salt spray, this tree is ideal for coastal areas.

The trees have large heartshaped leaves that are "hairy" underneath. These leaves are usually dark green, but there are varieties with variegated or purple foliage. The flowers, which are bright yellow with a crimson center, usually point down on the tree or slightly sideways.

The flowers are about 10 centimeters to 15cm wide when fully open. Like most hibiscus species, they usually last a day before falling off.

The sea hibiscus can be propagated from seeds or cuttings. Since the seeds are normally dispersed via water, they

benefit from soaking in warm, fresh water for 24 hours before planting. Filing the back of the seed with an emery board or sandpaper before soaking is also helpful.

After the soaking period, the seeds can be planted in moist coconut-husk compost. Seedlings will usually emerge in a week or two; give them plenty of light. The seedlings can reach between 60cm and 80cm in their first year and will grow quickly after that if planted in good soil and well hydrated.

Cuttings are the most sensible way to propagate the hibiscus tiliaceus, since plants grown from cuttings usually have the same look as the original plant. Cuttings appear to root faster if two or three leaves are left on.

The fast-growing sea hibiscus is best suited to landscaping, although it can be kept in containers if properly pruned. You could even try growing one as a bonsai.

The sea hibiscus prefers full sun but can be grown inside if placed by a window, although it may be difficult for flowers to bloom indoors.

I don't think I'll ever understand local governments. I do have a suggestion for the esteemed leaders that make decisions for the Nai Harn area. Perhaps they can contact the likeminded folk in Bournemouth and swap ideas. I can see it now on roadsigns at the southern end of the island: "Nai Harn – proudly twinned with Bournemouth".
