Sirens sound but tourists stay put

PATONG: Tourists in Patong opted to soak up the sun and enjoy the beach rather than run for their lives during the July 7 tsunami drill held across the six Andaman provinces, which included the sounding of all 79 tsunami warning towers operated by the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC).

At Patong Beach, a female English tourist told the Gazette, "I heard the siren and knew what it was, but when I looked out and could see that there was no tsunami coming, I just sat here."

When questioned what she would have done had a real wave been hurtling towards the beach, the English tourist gave no reply.

One male Kuwaiti tourist said, "The hotel told me about the drill and they gave me brochures, so I knew that there was no real danger. I am staying on the ninth floor of my hotel so I feel very safe while on holiday in Patong."

Another male tourist said, "I knew there was a drill, but I couldn't hear the siren."

The drill, which was coordinated from a command center in Saphan Hin, in Phuket City, began at 9:30 am and finished at 11:30 am, with all 19 of Phuket's warning towers tested.

At the Saphan Hin drill, residents of Rassada and Wichit joined students from Phuket Vocational College, Phuket Technical College and Phuket Polytechnic College in the drill, along with emergency personnel.

Meanwhile, tambon administration organizations and local municipalities conducted their own drills around the island.

Phuket Vice-Governor Smith Palawatvichai said that he was satisfied with Phuket's part in the Andaman-wide tsunami

PATONG ELECTION: Mayor Pian runs for re-election

PATONG: Pian Keesin on July 3 announced he will defend his seat as Patong Mayor at least one more time in the Patong Municipality election to be held on July 27.

Khun Pian will be leading the charge for the Rak Patong (Love Patong) party, contesting the mayoral election against Somkiet Kuru of the Patong Gao Na (Patong Progress) party.

Campaigning began in earnest on July 3 after both parties announced their 18 candidates – six for each of the three electorates in Patong.

Patong Municipality council requires 18 members, comprising six councilors from each of three voting districts in the resort town, and an independently elected mayor.

Contesting for Patong Gao Na are:

Voting district 1: Boonrod Tiengnoi, Charoen Kwanyuen, Prasarn Nuchate, Narong Chueyuan, Mana Panchalad and Prasert Pattakor.

OrBorJor hospital suffers minor setback

RASSADA: In the latest snag in the saga of the re-opening of the old Phya Thai Hospital, Wibool Tiramongkol, special instructor at the Faculty of Decorative Arts at Silpakorn University – Thailand's premier institution for studying the arts – on June 30 presented interior-design plans for the entire five-story shophouse building at the site, but only floors one, two, three, seven, eight and nine of the main building.

The new hospital, which is to be renamed the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) Hospital, aims to relieve overcrowding that has become an issue at Phuket's main government hospital, Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket City.

"A contractor has won the bid to install the electricity, water and air conditioning with an offer of completing the work for about 170 million

"However, we haven't signed the contract yet because the plans provided by the contractor do not match our existing plans, so we have to recheck the design and the work again," said OrBorJor President Paiboon Upatising.

to re-open by the end of 2009.

PHUKET: HRH Princess Ubol Ratana Rajakanya will be in Phuket July 26 to 29 as part of her "To Be Number One" project to steer Thai youngsters away from drugs.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit made the announcement at Phuket Provincial Hall on June 30 at the monthly meeting of provincial office chiefs.

She will attend the opening of the To Be Number One Friend Corner – a youth center where troubled teens can discuss their problems - at Muang Thalang School on July 28, at 5 pm.

The Princess will then be at Jungceylon in Patong for the To Be Number One Concert at 7

She will return to Bangkok on July 29.

Gov Niran also announced that Phuket has been selected as Thailand's model province for the To Be Number One project – the second time that Phuket has won this accolade.

Nok Air slashes Bangkok-Krabi flights

BANGKOK (The Nation): Nok Air's daily Bangkok to Krabi flight was one of three routes dropped by the domestic airline on July 1 in an effort to reduce costs. Services from Bangkok to Chiang Mai and to Ubol Ratchathani were also terminated.

Bottle bank tanks as residents cash in

CHERNG TALAY: A joint project by the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) and bottle-recycling company Bangkok Glass Co launched in January seems to have hit a snag, a Gazette investigation has found.

Since collection efforts have begun, the estimated 190-240 tons of glass waste that the OrBorTor was anticipating to collect from 7-Eleven shops and other businesses has shrunk to a volume of almost nothing.

When the Gazette checked into the project in March, the OrBorTor was dumping the bottles it had collected on a site beside its office, stating that once sufficient volume had built up, Bangkok Glass would transport it to its recycling facility in Bangkok.

As of last June 27, this small pile remained uncollected, and much of the glass in the pile was of quality lower than required for recycling.

OrBorTor Vice-President Ma-an Sumraan explained his theory of the non-appearing glass.

After the project was announced in late January, the OrBorTor set out to co-ordinate its collection effort with local hotels, shops, bars and property developments.

K. Ma-an said that they soon discovered that these companies' lower-paid staff, such as maids,

cooks, waitresses and security guards, were already collecting all the used bottles themselves and selling them to local buyers of recyclable materials.

Business owners opted to continue with this informal recycling method as a way for their staff to earn extra income, said K. Ma-an. As a result, no companies signed up to the *OrBorTor* program in Cherng Talay.

Despite the lower-than-expected volume coming from Cherng Talay, the glass recycling project is continuing throughout

In the deal signed with all 16 of Phuket's subdistricts, Bangkok Glass was offering to pay 70 satang per kilogram for the glass, and proceeds from the waste were intended to fund the development of schools on the island.

Currently, Bangkok Glass is transporting 50 tons a month on average from Phuket to its recycling center in Bangkok, using broker Kaew Na Ka to co-ordinate with the local authorities, said the company's PR manager Pantida Wittayaparlert.

According to OrBorTor figures, Cherng Talay generates 950 tons of trash a month, with glass accounting for 20-25% of the weight. The fast-growing subdistrict's garbage volume has nearly tripled over the past five years.

Busted 'Ice Boy' spills the beans

PATONG: Kathu Police Superintendent Col Grissak Songmoonnak and four Drug Suppression officers from Kathu Police Station arrested four ya bah (methamphetamine) and ya ice (crystal methamphetamine) dealers on the night of July 1.

Krisada "Boy" Seangrot, 19, from Nakhon Sri Thammarat, was arrested at 8:30 pm at the fountain in front of Jungceylon shopping center on Rat-U-Thit 200 Pi Rd in a sting operation in which police arranged to buy 200 pills for 38,000 baht.

After a little persuasion, Boy agreed to call three dealers to join him in the dragnet, Col Grissak told the Gazette.

Boy was escorted from the shopping mall to Chalermpornlert House, where police arrested Thidawan "Gay" Bongben, her brother Saharat, and female colleague Phanomwan Sunma – all from Bangkok - for possession of 23 ya bah pills and three bags of high-grade ya ice.

Dolphins rescued from receding tide

CAPE PANWA: Three roughtoothed dolphins were rescued after they were found stranded on mud flats created by the receding tide at Ao Makham on July 5.

The rescue came one week after the carcass of a female striped dolphin was discovered washed ashore at Baan Dan in Thalang and nine days after a pod of false killer whales beached at Koh Racha.

The dolphins – two females and one male – were found by fishermen who, together with local villagers, helped keep the dolphins' heads and skin wet.

They also informed the nearby Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC), whose marine biologists came to give basic treatment to the dolphins before taking them by boat back to the sea.

According to PMBC experts who rushed to the scene, the dolphins were more than 20 years old, weighed more than 100 kilograms and were more than two meters in length.

However, they were puzzled as to why the dolphins were found in the mangrove as they were in good health and this species of dolphin is rare in Phuket waters.

One theory put forward

was that they were fleeing a disturbance, possibly something man-made.

On June 28, the carcass of a female striped dolphin was discovered at Baan Dan. PMBC staff retrieved the dead animal and moved it to the PMBC at Cape Panwa after being notified by a villager at about 7 am.

An autopsy performed by PMBC staff on June 30 revealed that the dolphin had sustained five broken bones around her neck area, likely caused by some kind of collision, which ultimately led to the animal's death.

PMBC veterinarian Sontaya Manawattana said, "She died two or three days before she was found. She had many injuries from fishing nets... Her lungs were infected by parasites and she probably had no energy left to swim, so maybe a boat hit her and she died.

"The carcass weighs 50 kilograms and is 1.9 meters long. She was three to five years old, which makes her a teenager for a dolphin," he added.

Less than 10 striped dolphins (*stenella coeruleoalba*) met their fate around Phuket's coast in 2007. This latest incident marks the first reported death this year, K. Sontaya said.

Chalerm routed by local protestors

KRABI (*The Nation*): Ongoing protests by the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) took Interior Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung by surprise in Phuket and Krabi, forcing him to cancel official duties on July 1 and 2.

Chalerm was to meet Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit on July 1, along with high-ranking police and local government officials. Heeding warnings of the mob at Phuket International Airport, said to have numbered about 1,000 people, he ordered his flight to land at Krabi instead. But protesters awaited him there, too, so he escaped through a rear exit.

He checked in to the Krabi Maritime Park and Spa Resort, owned by Democrat MP Pichet Panwichatkul, where he faced heckling over loudspeakers from a contingent of about 200 local residents.

Krabi Governor Siva Sirisaowalak arrived in the morning and told the group that Chalerm had left for Bangkok, reportedly at around 3 am.

Krabi PAD member Abisit Techwarodom said Chalerm lied when he accused demonstrators of being drunk and having been hired from other provinces.



Protesters chanted throughout the night outside the hotel where Chalerm was staying. The following morning he went back to Bangkok.

Chalerm told television news that politicians were behind the protests and that he had canceled the visit simply because he did not want a confrontation. "I don't understand why they wanted me out when I went there to help them," he said.

People Power Party partylist MP Chatuporn Prompan said the 14 southern provinces may discover they have funding problems if other government ministers face similar treatment. Chatuporn said forest trespassers will benefit because that was one of Chalerm's missions following the no-confidence debate.

Chatuporn questioned the governor's booking of a hotel owned by an opposition member and why the protesters were allowed to gather outside it. Panya Daenmatam, secretary-general of the Phuket PAD, denied accusations politicians were behind the protest.

Health chief warns of dengue

PHUKET: Provincial Health Office chief Dr Paisan Worrasathit has issued a warning for people in Phuket to protect themselves against contracting dengue fever, which sees a spike each year in the number of people contracting the disease during the rainy season.

Currently, 200 islanders are suffering from the disease and one recently died, Dr Paisarn said.

He added that dengue fever was most often contracted by people near freshwater pools and that most victims are elderly.

However, Dr Paisarn played down the warning, saying that the type of dengue found in Phuket is relatively mild and likely to be fatal only to the very weak, the very young or the elderly.

He added that the incidence of dengue in Phuket seems to be falling. "In the past, Phuket ranked ninth of all 76 provinces in Thailand [for the number of people who had contracted dengue]; to-day we're ranked 20th.

"Of the 200 people in Phuket currently infected, only three were admitted to hospital for treatment," he added.

The PPHO has launched a campaign to educate local people in risk areas in how to better protect themselves from contracting the disease.

The main defense is the same as for malaria – ridding their homes of potential mosquito breeding sites, usually pools or puddles of stagant water.

hen former Phuket Immigration Super intendent Gen Apirak Hongtong returned to Phuket on June 8, he picked up where his predecessor as Phuket Provincial Police Commander, Maj Gen Decha Budnampetch, left off in the latest "war on drugs".

In May, under Gen Decha, there were 178 arrests in Phuket involving drugs, an increase of 61% on the same month last year. Looking to improve on that, police under Gen Apirak have been moving up the ladder and targeting dealers, with 10 minor dealers arrested in the two most recent drug raids.

One man who welcomes the initiative is Dr Paisarn Worrasathit, chief of Phuket Provincial Public Health Office and the man behind the government's voluntary rehabilitation program for drug addicts.

Between October 1, 2007, and June 1, 98 drug addicts – 87 males and 11 females – took the plunge and enrolled in Dr Paisarn's rehab program. Since June 1, another 13 addicts have signed up, most of them learning about the program through leaflet and billboard campaigns.

Dr Paisarn told the *Gazette* that it is difficult to estimate the number of drug addicts in Phuket as most addicts are unwilling to

n returning to Phuket as Provincial Police Commander, Gen Apirak Hongtong vowed to rid the island of crime within 90 days. His ambitious goal includes wiping out drug crime. With the number of drugs arrests on the island increasing in recent months, steps towards solving Phuket's drug woes have been taken.

discuss their problems, or even admit they have a problem, though he aims to have 130 addicts successfully complete the program by October – a goal he is already three quarters towards achieving.

A patient is credited with successfully completing the program if he can stay clean for one year after leaving the treatment center.

The program is conducted at three government treatment centers on the island, each with their own target number of addicts to treat and each with varying degrees of success. In Thalang, 16 drug users have successfully completed the program, close to the target of 25. In Kathu, 25 of a target of 28 users have been successfully treated. In Phuket City, only seven of a target 40 drug users have successful competed the program.

Drug users in the program attend rehab sessions three times a week and their urine is tested for drugs regularly. Treatment involves what Dr Paisarn calls the "body-mind-social" system and

lasts for periods of 120 days, six months or one year.

"Body" refers to the medication aspect of the treatment, which is decided on a case-by-case basis. Although methadone is sometimes used to treat addicts for withdraw symptoms, addicts entering the program are not told whether or not they will receive methadone during their treatment in order to avoid junkies from signing up just to get free "hits".

"Mind" refers to the side of the treatment that involves talks with a psychologist in order to get to the root of a drug user's problems and help drug users to de-

velop a more positive outlook on life, he said.

The "social" element refers to support from families and loved ones, which is essential for recovery as drug addicts need to be in a safe and friendly environment after they have undergone rehab, said Dr Paisarn.

Once an addict has been physically weaned off a drug, one of the most important factors for staying clean is the addict avoiding people, places and situations in which he or so is likely to use again.

Sessions are tailored to meet the requirements of each patient. Some drug users will experience severe withdraw symptoms as they attempt to come off a drug. In such cases, other drugs may be administered in a controlled manner to prevent the symptoms of withdraw. Methadone being administered to heroin addicts is one example.

After enrollment, drug users are placed into one of six categories based on the type of drug they are using.

Of those who have signed up for the treatment, 63 were using *ya bah*, a drug known to give users short, sharp energy boosts, making it popular among individuals who work for prolonged periods, particularly at night. Small, colored pills, usually pink, are heated on tin foil and the resultant smoke is then inhaled by a user


Ya bah plays a significant role in crime across Thailand and is often attributed by police as the instigator for petty crimes turn-

ing horribly violent. On May 15, a foreign man was shot and stabbed in a violent motorbike mugging in Rawai, which saw the perpetrators make off with just 300 baht. The attack was a return to violent petty crime in the area after a series of violent muggings a year earlier.

On July 4, a 23-year-old government officer was found shot dead in an apartment near his home in Rassada. Next to his body were a number of *ya bah* pills and smoking paraphernalia.

The next largest group of users are those looking to kick a marijuana habit. In May, 32 people were arrested for using cannabis, with 30.84 grams of the drug seized by police. In April, there were 21 cannabis-related arrests.

Six people who enrolled in the rehab program were self-confessed users of *krathom* (an indigenous plant that acts as a mild

stimulant). *Krathom* leaves are chewed to produce a stimulating effect that can lead to hallucinations

Krathom is special in that it grows naturally in Phuket and has been used by locals since time forgotten. Some users say that the effects can make a user feel cooler during warm weather, while others chew the leaves to help them sleep better.

The leaves are sometimes chewed by people looking to wean themselves off harder drugs. Long-term *krathom* addicts are often easy to spot as there skin turns black in patches that gradually spread until the

entire epidermis is darkened.

Solvent addicts accounted for six of the treatment's participants. Glue sniffing is the most common form of solvent abuse. Users pour glue into a bag to breathe in the fumes.

The penalties for sniffing glue are mild compared with those for using harder drugs. Solvents are not classified as illegal drugs, but their use as mind-affecting substance are prohibited under Thailand's "Solvent Law", with punishments similar to those for possession of marijuana or krathom

ice, also know as crystal meth, is a pure form of methyl amphetamine.

Thirteen people were arrested in May for possession of *ya ice* with 22.15g of the drug confiscated. This was up from April, when seven people were arrested for possession.

Ya ice causes euphoria and raised awareness, but the long-term effects include severe weight loss, drug cravings, rapid tooth decay and psychosis.

There was a solitary heroin user who checked into the program. During the 1970s, a program initiated by HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej saw the beginning of large numbers of Northern Thailand's opium fields being replaced by crops such as strawberries.

As a result, the supply of heroin decreased significantly, making it an expensive and unpopular drug locally. In May, there were five arrests made for possession of heroin, with 1.42g seized

The remaining six drug users checked themselves into an additional "miscellaneous" category, believing themselves to have a problem with drugs in general, rather than with one specific substance.

Although undergoing a rehabilitation program is strongly advised for people looking to stop self-destructive habits, some people do manage to break their addiction by themselves.

A Chalong resident, who asked not to be identified, told the *Gazette* about his long affair with a drug called *ya maa* (horse drug). "When I was a teenager, amphetamines were sold in pharmacies. They were sold in pill form as energy boosters," he said.

However, *ya maa* was made illegal more than 20 yeas ago and a range of caffeine drinks

and pills were released commercially to fill the void, he explained.

Illegal versions of *ya maa* then surfaced, in bright colors such as pink and orange, he said.

But then he discovered that he stood to lose something he valued more than his dependency on the drug. "The most frightening thing for a family man is losing money. You don't want your wife to ever suspect that you are unfaithful due to missing cash when your only disloyalty is sleeping with this 'horse'," he said.

"It is one of those drugs that makes people do things that they would never normally do."

Clams and fish move to new digs

CHALONG: A group of Chalong villagers and Erawan Group staff on July 3 released more than 1,000 rare marine creatures into the sea at Baan Bangkontee, Chalong Bay, as part of an initiative to support marine populations off the coast of Phuket.

Sutha Prateep Na Thalang, leader of a Chalong fishermen's group, said, "There aren't many of these animals left in the water because of all the sewage released into the sea that has killed the coral reefs and, subsequently, the fish."

About 100 people attended the releasing ceremony at Baan Bangkontee, Chalong Bay, where 500 damselfish and 1,000 fingerfish, all of which were bred at Phang Nga Coastal Aquaculture Research Center, were released into the water at about 10 am. There were three species of damselfish among the 500: the three-bar dascyllus damsel, yellowtail

damsel, and sergeant major damsel.

At about 1 pm, 50 giant clams, which had been bred at the Surat Thani Coastal Aquaculture Research Center, were released near Koh Tanan, off the coast of Chalong Bay. The clams are about 10 years old and 20 to 30 centimeters long.

Giant clams are listed as having "Vulnerable" conservation status according to the Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources

About 200,000 young giant clams have been transfered from Surat Thani to the Phuket Marine Biological Center where they will be nurtured until they are large enough to be released into the sea.

"We need to save marine animals so that they can live long lives with us. Those that become extinct have a knock-on impact on humans," said Khun Sutha.

Superlover meets sticky end

NAKON PATHOM: Many a wife would be happy that her aging husband can still "go all night" without the aid of those little blue pills.

As the saying goes, however, you can have too much of a good thing – and a high sex drive can be troublesome, even fatal, as one even unfortunate lothario found out at the end of last month after he pushed his wife for one all-night session too many.

At about 11 pm on June 25, Lt Bunsak Tipma, an investigating office at Muang Nakhon Pathom Police Station, had an unusual call from a tearful woman saying that she had accidentally killed her husband.

At the scene – a motorcycle repair shop with a bedroom at the back – police found Yuphin Juprasert, 42, sitting weeping hysterically on the bed next to the body of her husband, Chaiwat Juprasert, 52. Chaiwat was still fully clothed, but had a pair of woman's knickers wrapped round his arm.

When she had calmed down enough to talk, Yuphin told police that she hadn't meant her husband any harm, but she couldn't take any more of his nocturnal advances as she had to work hard and needed sleep.

Chaiwat, despite being well into middle age, had phenomenal staying power and an enormous sex drive. Every night he would demand sex five or six times and each time would last for no less than half an hour, leaving little time for sleep, Yuphin explained. If she said she wasn't in the mood, Chaiwat would become angry and accuse her of cheating on him.

The night of his death, Chaiwat had been drinking with friends and came home as insatiable as ever. Yuphin, by this point, had been fast asleep for some time and in no mood to be woken for a multi-hour sexathon. She told her husband as much.

Chaiwat, as always, refused to take no for an answer and became angry. When he tried to force himself on her, Yuphin fought back, grabbing at his throat and holding on until he let her go, she tearfully told police.

When Yuphin removed her hands from his neck, she found that she had done more than just resist his amorous advances – Chaiwat was dead.

Police, unmoved by Yuphin's tearful confession and tales of bedtime woe, charged her with murder.

Jumping on the Jatukham bandwagon

hailand Post in March launched a set of Jatukham Rammathep stamps to encourage Thai people to collect stamps in their spare time.

Jatukham Rammathep amulets became unusually popular in 2006 after the death of Phantharak Rajjadej, the Thai policeman who created the original amulet.

Amulets have taken on many different forms and are sold at Buddhist temples around Thailand.

The Jatukham Rammathep amulet is named after two princes of the Srivijaya Kingdom of Southern Thailand. Amulets are believed to provide protection and good fortune to the bearer.

Some legends hold that the name "Jatukham Rammathep" actually refers to an incarnation of Bodhisattva Avalokitesvara, whose reverence spread throughout the south due to the presence of Mahayana Buddhism.

The Jatukham Rammathep stamp set consists of 12 different designs.

The first design shows a bas

relief of Prince Jatukham on the gated entrance way to the Pra Brom That Chedi pagoda in the Pra Mahathat Worawihan temple grounds, Nakhon Sri Thammarat province.

The second design is of a Pra Pong Suriyan amulet. The first of these gold-plated amulets were created in 1987 and bestowed to HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej.

A Prince Rammathep bas relief from the gated entrance way to Pra Brom That Chedi pagoda in the Pra Mahathat Worawihan grounds adorns the third stamp.

On the fourth, fifth and sixth stamps are images of the Pra Pong Suriyan amulet, first made in 1987, in white and gold, white and silver, and white and copper, respectively.

The seventh design shows the Prince Jatukham bas relief at the entrance to Pra Brom That Chedi pagoda, again in the Pra Mahathat Worawihan grounds.

The Pra Pong Jantra amulet, first made in 1987, makes an appearance on the eighth stamp.

On the ninth, Prince Rammathep's image appears as another bas relief at the gated entrance to the Pra Brom That Chedi pagoda in the Pra Mahathat Worawihan grounds.

Further Pra Pong Jantra amulets are shown on the 10th, 11th and 12th stamps, in white and copper, black, and red, respectively.

The stamps were designed by Thailand Post's Adisorn Pradit and printed using a multicolor lithography technique by Gather Security Printing in France.

Stamps are limited to 500,000 for each design, priced at 9 baht a piece or 130 baht for a collector's set of 12. The stamps measure 3 by 4.8 centimeters.

All 10 of Phuket's post offices stock the stamps.

Disputed Preah Vihear listed as world heritage site

he World Heritage Com mittee agreed on July 8 to list the Hindu temple of Preah Vihear as a world heritage site amid political pressure in Thailand mounting on the government over the failure to object.

"I did my job to express our objection, observation and reservation in the line with former foreign minister Thanat Khoman, following the decision of the International Court of Justice in 1962," said Foreign Minister Noppadon Pattana.

"In addition to the unresolved border disputes of the areas surrounding the temple of Preah Vihear, Thailand cannot support the decision," he said in the session of the world heritage committee meeting in Quebec.

The minister needed to make such statements because the Constitution Court ruled that the joint communique he had signed with Cambodia's Deputy Prime Minister Sok An to support Phnom Penh's application was unconstitutional.

Senators and the members of the Opposition lodged the petition with the court as they were concerned that listing the temple might overrule Thai sovereignty.

Pongpol Adireksarn, head of Thailand's world heritage committee, said that Thai people should not be sad over Cambodia's success to list the site

"We also plan to list our part in the surrounding area of Preah Vihear in the future." he said.

Vihear in the future," he said.

Lt Gen Niphat Thonglek of the Border Affairs Department, who also joined the Thai delegation in Quebec, said that Thailand did not compete with Cambodia to list the temple, but that Cambodia had prepared itself for the world heritage committee's examination.

"As the site passed criteria set by the committee, it received approval. There is nothing to jeopardize relations between the two countries," he said.

Col Noppadon Chotsiri of the Royal Thai Survey Department guaranteed that Cambodia did not take any of overlapping area claimed by both sides into its proposal.

"Through examining by mapping technique, we found that Cambodia's plan claimed nothing beyond the territory the Thai Cabinet in 1962 had relinquished," he said.

Dirty money. A former executive of Nishimatsu Construction has told Japanese prosecutors that the Japanese firm had paid 400 million yen (about 125 million baht) to Thai government officials in return for "favors" connected to the award of a 2-billion-baht tunnel project in 2003.

Bangkok Governor Apirak Kosayodhin said that Town Clerk Pongsak Semsan would ask the Japanese Embassy in Bangkok to forward a document related to the allegation to the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA).

It was reported that a

former executive of Nishimatsu Construction was being investigated by the Tokyo District Public Prosecutors Office on suspicion of violating the Foreign Exchange and Foreign Trade Act for bringing in 100 million yen from abroad without reporting it to cus-

The consortium of Italian-Thai and Nishimatsu won the 2billion-baht contract from BMA in 2003, when Samak Sundaravej, who is now prime minister, was governor of Bangkok.

The project included construction of large tunnels along the San Saeb and Lat Phrao canals as part of a BMA flood-management system for the city

Besides the consortium of Italian-Thai and Nishimatsu, the BMA project attracted other bidders, including Naowarat Pattanakarn, Si Saeng Construction and Ch Karnchang.

Citing sources, Kyodo News reported that local staff of Nishimatsu in Thailand had prepared bribes after consulting executives of Nishimatsu's Thai partner.

The payments were apparently made to Thai government officials and officials in charge of overseeing bids for the project immediately before and after the project was awarded.

The former Nishimatsu executive said he was not directly involved in bribing the officials but that "In return for favors to secure the tunnel-construction project, the company paid a total of more than 400 million yen to Thai government officials", the sources said.

"Such operational funds

were necessary in order to be awarded public-works projects in Thailand," he was quoted as saying

The prosecutors searched Nishimatsu's head office in Tokyo's Minato Ward early last month in connection with the former executive's suspected violation of the foreign-exchange law.

The prosecutor suspected the 100 yen million he brought into Japan was part of a slush fund

The prosecutors are also

conducting investigations into Pacific Consultants International, a major Japanese construction consultancy, in connection with a case of suspected bribery in Vietnam related to a project funded by official development assistance from the Japanese government.

PAD takes a knock. The Civil Court on July 7 ordered the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) to clear roads near its rally site for four hours more each day than the court had ruled earlier.


Following the order, PAD supporters on the night of July 7 moved to Makkawan Bridge, their original protest site, where no court orders have been issued against the activities of the pro-democracy group.

After hearing testimonies from senior police officers and the protest leaders, the court ordered the PAD leaders to keep all lanes of Rama V and Phitsanulok roads open to traffic between 5 am and 6 pm on weekdays. It had earlier ordered the roads to be cleared of any structures and objects related to the rally from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm.

The court said its order banning the use of loudspeakers at the Nang Loeng horse racecourse between 7:30am and 4:30pm from Mondays to Fridays remained unchanged.

More than 1,000 people were present at the PAD's rally site on the 44th day of its anti-government protest on July 7.

Death of Imam 'a test for Army chief's credibility'

ew York-based Human Rights Watch (HRW) on June 4 said the Royal Thai Army may be covering up the torture and killing of Muslim religious leader Imam Yapa Koseng, 56, saying the judicial inquiry into his death has been blocked by army stonewalling.

HRW said that Army Commander-in-Chief Gen Anupong Paochinda's credibility was on the line because he had stated publicly in late-March that the Army would bring justice to the imam's case.

"Imam Yapa's case is a test for the Thai Army on whether it can hold abusers in its ranks accountable," said Brad Adams, HRW's Asia director.

"Gen Anupong has put his credibility on the line. Will he allow a cover-up or will he ensure that murderers in the ranks will be brought to justice?" he added.

HRW said the commanding officer of Narathiwat's Task Force 39 has refused to implicate abusive soldiers behind the killing of Imam Yapa, who was beaten to death just meters from where one of his two sons was being detained.

HRW quoted Imam Yapa's son as saying, "Soldiers took my father away at about 8 pm on March 20. That was the first interrogation. I saw them take him behind the camp clinic – not far from where I was being detained.

"I could hear everything that happened to my father. I heard punching and kicking noises. I heard my father scream in pain."

TV comes to Tarutao. Satun Vice-Governor Chuangchai Paoin has defended the decision to allow the filming of reality show *Survivor* in Tarutao National Park, saying that shooting on location in the protected area would not affect the environment there

Filming in the park is planned from July 21 to August 29.

V/Gov Chuangchai said the producer of the show has signed a contract not to damage the environment on the island.

The production crew has started building a Thai-style pavilion at the pier at Talohwow Bay as the center of the show, he added.

V/Gov Chuangchai said the show would promote tourism in Satun province.

Revenge rampage. Surat Thani Police are searching for a soldier after his girlfriend and her lover

were found shot dead in her room on June 2.

Police led by Col Bunthawee Toraksa, Superintendent of Muang Surat Thani Police Station found the bodies of Rasri Jittrong, 31, and Songsak Nujunjit, 21, in Rasri's bedsit behind Rasri Nuat Phaen Boran massage parlor, which she owned.

They had both been shot several times with a 9mm pistol.

Witnesses reported seeing Rasri's boyfriend, a soldier identified only by his nickname "Moo", who had been serving in the Deep South, enter the building before about 10 gunshots were fired.

According to witnesses, Moo was then seen running from the scene.

Acquaintances of Rasri said that after Moo had been sent to the Deep South, she started seeing Songsak. After returning to Surat Thani, Moo was allegedly enraged when he found out about Rasri's new relationship.

Private problem. Two Army privates and one civilian were arrested in Trang for possession of

45 kilograms of *krathom* leaves while waiting for a coach to Sungai Kolok on June 29.

Police were called to the bus stop in Tambon Thap Thiang in Trang's Muang district after a member of the public reported seeing a group of youths with a suspicious-looking black sack.

A police patrol truck found the group and asked them what was in the sack. The men replied in heavy Deep South accents that it was clothes, police said.

Police opened the sack and found it to be full of bundles of fresh *krathom* leaves. Police also found one .22 caliber bullet in one of the men's bags.

The three men, Pte Bukaree Sulong, Pte Phaisan Samohsa, 23, and Phendee Johhoh, 22, were arrested and taken to Muang Trang Police Station.

Police said that under questioning, the men admitted that they had bought the *krathom* in Thung Song district in Nakhon Sri Thammarat and that at the time of their arrest they were waiting for the Phuket-Sungai Kolok bus.

The men said that they planned to sell the leaves whole-

sale in Songkhla's Sabah Yoi district and use the money to help their families pay off debts.

Lucky escape. Sadao Immigration Police are hunting a group of suspected human traffickers after a 14-year-old Lao girl on June 29 claimed that she had been tricked into going to Malaysia to work as a prostitute.

The girl told police that she and two other Lao girls had been brought from Laos to Haad Yai by a Lao woman who she knew only as "Noi".

In Haad Yai, the girls were met by Noi's Malaysian husband, who took them to Sadao on the Thai-Malaysian border, police said

Noi allegedly told the girl's parents that she would earn 6,000 baht a month working in Malaysia.

Malaysian border guards, however, refused to let the girl enter the country, so Noi took her back to a hotel.

While they were staying at the hotel, a man came to the room and she overheard him discussing the price to sleep with her, she told police.

While the visitor was talking with Noi and her husband, the girl managed to sneak out of the room and find her way to the immigration office, she said.

Immigration police searched for the girl's traffickers on the border checkpoint's CCTV tapes and found footage of the girl's two Lao friends being taken into Malaysia.

Police are now hunting for Noi and her husband.

Teatime trauma. Two gunmen opened fire at a teashop in Yala on July 5, killing three civilians and injuring five others, police said.

The shooting occurred at 7:15 am in Bango Puloh village in Tambon Noenngam of Yala's Raman district.

Police blamed Muslim insurgents for the attack.


Police found many spent shells suitable for M-16 and AK-47 rifles at the scene.

Two of the civilians killed were identified as Sulkiflee Siyadee, 32, and Da-oh Sohwumae, 52. At the time of going to press, the remaining victim had yet to be unidentified.

Owner of the teashop, 53-year-old Arong Yama, told police that he saw at least four men in a white pickup truck arrive and park in front of the shop.

Two men on the back stood up and opened fire at the shop and the truck sped away, he said.

urat Thani authorities are considering building a sea wall to contain coastal erosion that has seen large sections of the shore washed away by constantly battering waves.

Waves had advanced 100 meters inland and washed a twokilometer section of coastal road into the sea at Baan Pod Beach in Village 1, Chonlakram subdistrict in Donsak district, Surat Thani Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) told the press on July 5.

Former Surat Thani OrBor-Jor council member Preecha Petcharat, who is still very active in the community, said that from 2006 to 2007, the fishing port and large fresh market on the Baan Pod beach road had been washed

"In the past, people's houses were located far from the beach, but now the waves are very close to them because more and more of the coast is being washed away.

"In the rainy season, people have to leave their homes and stay elsewhere because of the encroaching sea," he said.

However, Khun Preecha

explained that the problem is not new to Donsak.

"The same problem has happened at Ao Nang Kam Beach and Baan Tong Ao Beach, both in Donsak district. The provincial government and the OrBorJor built a sea wall to protect against coastal erosion there," he said.

Confidence booster: Koh Samui's property sector was given a confidence boost at a recent seminar after several property experts expressed their optimism for the local market.

The seminar, which was organized by Raimon Land and held at the Centara Hotel in Chaweng, took place during the final day of this year's Koh Samui Regatta on June 7. Many of the attendees at the seminar were also involved in the regatta.



From next term, all classes



Members of the Mor 3 Be

4 production team said that Phuket's beaches, natural surroundings and Sino-Portuguese architecture were reasons for scripting Phuket as the movie's main location. About 70% of the movie is based in Phuket, the rest in Bangkok, said one of the crew members.

Phuket and surrounding islands have helped give several international movies the tropical scenery needed for dramatic backdrops, some of which Thai audiences are not always familiar with.

One of the most outstanding movies made on the island so far, but little known by Thai audiences, is Tom Waller's erotic adventure of a confused Englishman who falls in love with a masseuse. Butterfly Man was filmed in 2002 entirely on Phuket and surrounding islands. It won the "Best Cinematography" award in 2003's Slamdunk Film Festival.

The lead actress is Thailand's Napakpapha "Mamee" Nakprasitte, whose brilliant portrayal of a young woman trapped in the sex trade is credited with much of the movie's success, winning her "Best Actress" at the Slamdunk Film Festival. Despite the movie's award and international following, very few local cinemas have shown "Butterfly Man".

Hollywood's The Beach, starring Leonardo DiCaprio, was filmed on Koh Phi phi. The main character is a chain-smoking backpacker looking for a secluded beach that fulfills his hedonistic fantasies. Following a mysterious map, he discovers a

commune of foreigners who pass the time fishing, singing, playing Gameboys and smoking marijuana. The movie was controversial, not for the drug-taking scenes, but because the shooting was done in a national park, which sparked protests from conservation activists.

The movie that gave birth to Phuket as a popular tourist destination is The Man with the Golden Gun. Scenes of the villan Scaramanga's hideout were shot

at Koh Khao Phing Kan and Koh Tapu. Starring Roger Moore, it was the ninth film in the James Bond series and was released in 1974. Within a year of the movie's release, Phuket and the Phang Nga Bay area saw an influx of international tourists, something locals had never experienced before.

Filming of Mor 3 Be 4 will continue for the next few weeks. The movie is on schedule for release on February 14, 2009.

Top Secret: The Tikka Tapes

his week's Guest Chef is Shahid Saleem, proprietor of the Indian Halal Food outlet in the food court on the top floor of Central Festival.

His award-winning dishes have earned him recognition from American Express – listing his Bangkok restaurant, Tandoor, as one of the best Indian restaurants in the Big Mango – and ex-Prime Minister MR Kukrit Pramoj, who is said to have dined there weekly.

Chef Shahid's recipes for dishes such as dahl, samosas, chicken tikka and nan bread are based on the traditional homestyle cooking he grew up with.

"Cooking is my hobby. I love it. I was taught by my brother, who has run an Indian restaurant in Tokyo for almost 20 years," Chef Shahid said.

Chef Shahid decided to open the food court outlet when he realized that there are few restaurants in Phuket offering Indian food. Plans are in the pipeline for another outlet in Pattaya.

Chef Shahid shares his recipes for vegetarian samosa – a centuries-old traditional snack made of thin triangular pillows of pastry filled with potato, herbs and spices – and chicken tikka – a lip-smacking offering of baked chicken marinated in spices.

SAMOSAS - 40 PIECES

Pastry ingredients

1 cup of all-purpose flour (maida)
Water to make the dough
2 tablespoons of cooking oil
A pinch of salt
½ teaspoon of ajwain (optional)

Stuffing ingredients

3-4kg of potatoes (peeled, boiled and mashed)
½ cup of green peas (boiled)
1-2 green chilies (finely chopped)

Pastry: Mix all the ingredients together and then add water a little at a time to make a dough. Knead the dough until it is soft and pliable. Cover the dough with moist muslin cloth and leave for 15 minutes.

Stuffing: In a bowl, blend the mashed potatoes and the dry masalas (salt, chili powder, mango powder, garam masala), along with the green chilies and ginger. Once this is well mixed, add the green peas, cashews and raisins. Add the coriander and put the mixture aside.

Now break the dough into small pieces to be rolled out into circles about four to five inches in diameter. Cut the circles in half and fold them into cones.

Use a little water on the fingers to seal the edges where they join, but leave one side open so they can be filled with the stuffing.

Use a spoon to place scoops of the stuffing into the pastry pillows and seal the third side using a drop of water.

To cook them, heat oil in a *kadhai* (frying pan) on a medium heat setting and deep fry the samosas until they are golden brown. Serve hot with hari or tamarind chutney.

CHICKEN TIKKA

There are many variations of this dish. Fish and other meats can be used instead of chicken.

Ingredients

1kg of boneless chicken, cut into pieces

1 teaspoon of salt Cooking oil

2 large onions (chopped)

4 cloves of garlic

1 table spoon of ginger

1 teaspoon of chili powder

1 teaspoon of turmeric

5 tomatoes (chopped)

1 teaspoon cumin seed powder 1 teaspoon of coriander powder

Method

Fry the chicken in the cooking oil on a medium heat and add salt.

For the masala sauce, fry the onion, ginger and garlic in the cooking oil on medium heat until the mixture is light brown, then add the chili powder, salt and turmeric. This will turn the mixture yellow.

Continue frying until the chili starts to burn, then add a little water and the chopped tomatoes.

Continue cooking until the oil in the mixture separates and rises to the top, then add the fried chicken to the sauce along with the common seed powder and coriander power.

wo young girls from Wittaya Sathid School in Phuket City, Chanoksuda "Tonhom" Polying and Laksamee "Lily" Jutasripanit, are counting the days until they receive an award from the hand of HRH Princess Siriwannawari Nariratana.

The girls were part of a Phuket junior Electone band competing in the annual Yamaha Thailand Music Festival (YTMF), which was held at the Thai Cultural Center in Bangkok in May. The contest is organized by the renowned Siam Kolkarn Music School.

Although the Hammond organ became a household name, greatly influencing Western music when it was invented in the 1960s and continuing to be one of the most popular instruments for Western musicians looking for new sounds for decades after, in Thailand it is the Yamaha Electone electronic keyboard that has since become popular.

Nine-year-old Tonhom is the daughter of Suthat and Watcharin Polying, who run a restaurant in Cherng Talay. Tonhom started playing the keyboard when she was five years old, purely out of her own interest.

Although she also learns the piano and violin, Tonhom said she likes playing the keyboard best because it can sound different from other musical instruments. "We can use our feet to make the rhythm while playing and the keyboard has two layers of music that we can adjust to any tone," she explained.

Lily, the daughter of Boonyong Jutasripanit and Chutikarn Thongkam, a brewery distributor in Phuket City, also started playing the keyboard when she was five.

Eight-year-old Lily originally wanted to learn piano, but with her small body and short legs, the piano was too big for her, so her father suggested she play the keyboard instead. She started taking lessons at the Siam Kolkarn Music School at the Big C shopping center.

Both girls study and practice the keyboard after class as

part of Wittaya Sathid School's extracurricular program. School Director Somjit Sinlapasart explained, "Our school has 980 students, from kindergarten through to Pratom 6 [final-year primary level].

"We encourage students to play sport and to study music or Thai performance arts in addition to the standard curriculum.

"We would like them to have both a good education and to have developed a special talent by the time they graduate from our school," she said.

But it was at the Siam Kolkarn Music School where the girls practice most and where they joined the Magic Junior band along with six other piano and keyboard players all aged nine or younger. The band comprises four boys and four girls. The other six band members are from Plookpanya, Anubaan Phuket, Darasamuth and Phuket Thai Hua schools.

Lily's teacher at Wittaya

Sathid School, Jinipha Suphapburut, said that Tonhom and Lily practiced especially hard before entering the contest, as did the other children in rehearsals at the music school.

"To make the national finals, the children had to win their regional round first.

"This year, the contest was held at the Thavorn Grand Plaza Hotel in Phuket and the band won, which meant they would represent the entire southern region at the national finals," explained Sasawat Limpanith, the Siam Kolkarn music instructor who led the band throughout the competition.

Although it was Lily's first time in the contest, it was not Tonhom's first try for a major prize. She came second in the Southern region finals in Surat Thani last year, although that was not good enough to compete in the national finals in Bangkok.

"In the final, we played played a song called *Magic*

Dream, which is eight minutes long, but with each member of the band playing different a different part of the tune. It starts with simple, easy notes and becomes progressively complex," Tonhom explained.

"There were nine bands from all over the country in our level. Each band played a different song. We had been practicing our song since May last year. It was the same song we played in the Southern regional round in December, but we improved it by adding more notes for the final in Bangkok," Lily added.

"We were the last band to play in the final. I was very worried that we wouldn't win because while we were waiting, we had to listen to the other bands playing and all of them were very good," said Tonhom.

In the 2008 event, other Siam Kolkarn students who won the first prize are Hitoshi Miyata for the under-17s classic guitar, Nalinda Divis and Nathry Divis won the under-15s Clavinova with Vocals, and Anthony Tong won the under-22s singing con-

test

The Magic Junior band won the under-9s Electone Ensemble contest. The children have just received their certificates and are waiting for a date to be set to receive the trophy from HRH Princess Siriwannawari Nariratana.

Tonhom said that the reason her band won was not only because they were the best players, but also because they showed that they enjoyed playing the song.

"I was scared of one band from Bangkok because they played a difficult song. I wondered why they came only second, but K. Sasawat said that it was because they didn't show any feeling or dance when they were playing," she said.

Lily added, "They just sat on their chairs and moved their heads a bit, not like us – we showed our feelings for the music."

"K. Sasawat said that he wants us to join the contest in Japan, but we are still not ready because we still don't know how and what kind of songs they are using for contest. We are not confident," said Tonhom.

"And we cannot play at junior level because we have already won that level. We must enter a higher level," Lily added.

Waiting on tables or serving in a bar is the default occupation of many students, as well as writers, actors, musicians and would-be showbiz personalities still searching for their big break while needing to put bread on the table and keep the landlady at bay.

It's unpleasant, but is that any excuse for the annoying types of service behavior that one so often runs into when out for a jolly evening with a group of friends in a local bar or restaurant?

In Phuket, dehumanized table service is reaching the level of a new art form in certain establishments. Now I don't for one moment mean to suggest that this is universal or even common.

Sid has enjoyed many a fine meal around the Andaman region served by smiling and accommodating staff. Such displays are rewarded with the handsome tips they deserve.

If you've ever been there yourself, I mean, working at the service end of the evening-out equation, you'll know how impor-


> "Erm, yes, I suppose so."

Ah, happy days.

Mostly the service in Phuket is exemplary, but there's a modern trend of technology that's creeping into the equation, threatening to make it stink.

We've all been in that strangely Thai situation of buying an item for, say, 80 baht, handing over a 100-baht note and, instead of being handed back the requisite 20 in change, watching the admittedly lovely assistant turn to her calculator for about five minutes of frenzied computation to work out what she should give you. Even if you say "Yi-sip baht" as a bit of a prompt to help



out, you are roundly ignored.

Lord knows what they teach the kids in Thai schools, but it certainly ain't 80 plus 20 equals

This local idiosyncrasy becomes almost charming as you adapt to Phuket and so you wait for it to happen and point it out to visiting friends with fond amusement.

However, the latest sinister trend that is upsetting Sid is the introduction of technology into the serving equation in order to make things more "efficient". This often cuts down on the human interaction that normally makes dining out in Phuket so charming.

Your waitress will have her eyes focused on a little electronic

notepad in her palm with its trusty electro-pen.

She takes your order by applying the said electro-pen to the screen, which doesn't allow her to actually interface with her customer in any way. In addition, the fact that you can order only what is actually encoded into the notepad's memory leads you quickly into a Jack Nicholson Five Easy Pieces type of situation

"I'll have the full English breakfast with my eggs scrambled, tea not coffee and brown toast, but no sausages, please."

Waitress, frowning at electro-note pad and definitely not looking at you: "You have to have the sausages with the English breakfast, they come together, it says here."

"Yes, I know that, but I want you to take them off my plate and give them to the kitchen's cat."

Waitress, starting to panic: "There's no mention of the kitchen cat on my notepad."

"It doesn't matter, just tell the cook to leave the sausages off, the kitchen cat thing was just a joke."

Waitress, calls fellow waitress then supervisor to come over

and they all glare at electronotepad: "Serving staff are not allowed to talk directly to the cook, we just download the electro notepad into the main computer and that's relayed to the cook's computer in the kitchen."

At which point you decide to go down the soi to Khun Noodle's low-tech food stall and enjoy a perfectly excellent plate of *somtam* for your breakfast

This trend to technologize the service equation is not only annoying, but in the case of Thailand, pretty dumb.

One of the great draws of this country for foreign tourists and residents alike is the charming, smiling service one generally receives.

That uniquely attractive part of Thailand is being thrown away – and for what? The chance of hopping on a technological bandwagon in the name of the great God of Efficiency?

Well, give Sid the old-fashioned, charmingly inefficient, warmly human style of Thai service that is so much a part of this endearing country.

I suspect I'm not the only one who feels this way.

t's not sweet, sour, salty or bitter. It's "umami." That's the word used to describe the so-called fifth taste – the taste of monosodium glutamate (MSG). Umami is a Japanese word, meaning "savory", that is used to describe a dish's deliciousness. The *aroy* factor.

The word came about after research by the Japanese to isolate the taste, which is detected by the tongue when it comes across glutamic acid, or glutamates. These occur naturally in meats, cheeses, broth, stock and other protein-heavy foods.

Today, MSG is used in most of the world's fast food, snacks, cooking ingredients and restaurant food to give dishes extra flavor. It's commonly used to make soy and fish sauce, and you'll often see the sugar-like MSG granules used by food vendors as one of the additives in their dishes.

Monosodium glutamate is a sodium salt and is a non-essential amino acid (glutamic acid). It was first patented by the Japanese Ajinomoto Corporation almost 100 years ago in 1909. The name Ajinomoto means "essence of taste", and was introduced to the US by the Japanese as "Ac'cent flavor enhancer" in 1947 – a decade before Japan's cars were introduced to the states.

MSG is prepared by fermenting starchy foods, such as sugar beet, sugarcane or molasses. About two million tons of MSG is produced each year for use as a flavor enhancer.

Some of the foods MSG can be found in include canned soups, stock cubes, condiment sauces such as tomato and barbecue sauce, frozen seafood, potato chips, flavored tortilla chips and instant noodles.

So what happens when we eat foods laced with MSG and why is it used? For a start, MSG is one of the most profitable ingredients manufactured for the food industry because of its appetite-stimulating properties, making customers want more, while keeping down the production costs of food containing it.

MSG tricks you into believing that you're eating something highly nutritious and full of protein, stimulating the appetite by releasing insulin to take up the glucose contained within carbohydrates (sugars). If you're not eating as much carbohydrate as your tongue thinks, then the result of high insulin concentrations makes blood-sugar levels drop, making you hungry again a few hours later.

Adding MSG to beef burgers gives them the same savory taste of real beef. For fast food manufacturers, this means



there's no need to use 100% beef, helping to reduce costs.

Another reason MSG is favored as a flavor enhancer is because it is very soluble in water, making it work very quickly the moment the chemical compound touches the tongue. Most, if not all, fast food contains MSG. The compound makes you thirsty, so you drink all those fizzy drinks with your buffalo wings. By the way, how do they catch flying buffaloes? More to the point, how does a buffalo ever get off the ground with such a tiny pair of wings?

Fermented products, such as soy sauce and Worcestershire sauce naturally contain glutamate in levels comparable with foods with MSG added. Even so, many sauce manufacturers still feel the need to add artificial glutamate in the form of MSG.

Controversy surrounds the use of MSG in foods. Many people suffer from Chinese Restaurant Syndrome when they eat foods containing MSG. Symptoms can range from strange sensations in the mouth and thirst to headaches, migraines and swollen limbs. Most sufferers will find that these symptoms will disappear soon after cutting

MSG-laden foods from their diets

More alarmingly, MSG consumption has also been connected to Autism, Alzheimer's and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD, formerly known as ADD), which affects academic performance in youngsters and is also known to affect social behavior among adults.

Extensive research with tests conducted in US and UK schools has shown that academic performance increased and disciplinary problems decreased among students when artificial ingredients, including colors and flavors, were eliminated from school food programs.

In 1982, the US National Institute of Health (NIH) determined that about 5% of children with ADHD could be helped significantly by removing additives from their diet and that 90% reacted in some way to food containing artificial additives.

It's difficult to find scientific studies examining the actual biological effects on the body from consuming MSG, but there is enough concern among consumers that it is regulated by food and drug administrations (FDAs) in many developed countries.

But surely a calmer disposition, a more peaceful household, better school reports and less accidents and forgetfulness are probably worth it.

Even when shoppers are selective about the food products they pick up off the supermarket shelves, turning them over to check whether the tin of beans or bag of potato chips contains MSG, it's not the easiest additive to spot. Most packaged foods will contain MSG, but it may be labeled as HS code 29224220 or as E621. It may also be labeled under a trade name, such as Aiinomoto, Vetsin and Accent.


Under current US, European, New Zealand and Australian FDA regulations, food labels must inform customers of whether the product contains MSG. This is not always made clear, especially if the food contains a sauce of flavoring from another manufacturer. In these cases, the label may simply state that "flavorings" or "spices" make up some of the ingredients.


Other additives that MSG is used to make include hydrolyzed vegetable proteins, autolyzed yeast, hydrolyzed yeast, yeast extract, soy extracts and protein isolate.

You can also check for additives such as disodium inosinate and disodium guanylate, because they are used only in conjunction with MSG in food production, though labels can state that the food contains "No MSG" or "No added MSG".

Studies in China by the INTERMAP Co-operative Research Group found that MSG intake is directly related to weight gain – Body Mass Index (BMI).

Knowing this, it may be worth taking the extra time to examine food labels more closely,

NEW AMG MERCEDES IS ALL THAT AND MORE

n paper it is relatively simple: take a volumeproduction family saloon, slot in a massive V8 from further up the range and create a high-performance tourer at minimal cost.

The problem arises when other aspects of the vehicle have to be taken into account: brakes, transmission, traction control, stability control and so on. All of these become more important due to the extra power and speed of the new car.

The latest Mercedes-Benz AMG C63 bears testimony to the care and attention expended by the engineers in Stuttgart and at AMG's headquarters in Affalterbach.

Powering the C63 is a 6.2liter V8 delivering 457bhp (336 kW) at 6,800rpm, while peak torque is a tooth-pulling 600Nm at 5,000rpm. While these figures give the game away in terms of the C63's potential performance, when driven "normally" it is a docile, well-mannered animal that demonstrates no vices. When pushed, though, it makes a delightful growl and accelerates into the distance effortlessly.

The powerplant is full of technical highlights that have been adopted from the world of



motor racing, such as bucket tappets to control valve timing and a closed lower crankcase and magnesium dual-length intake manifold with two internal butterfly valves for optimized airflow. This configuration exists only in this particular AMG engine and ensures optimum agility plus incredible response.

The V8 is mated to Mercedes-Benz's award-winning 7G automatic transmission, which can be operated manually by steering-wheel mounted paddles.

The C63 accelerates from a standstill to 100kmh in 4.5 seconds, while the maximum speed is electronically limited to 250 kmh. To control this immense output, 360-millimeter brake discs with six-piston calipers are fitted up front, while 330mm discs are at the rear with four-pot calipers.

AMG sports seats with integral head restraints and embossed AMG lettering feature adjustable side bolsters and lumbar supports, allowing them to be adapted to individual requirements. The seats provide perfect lateral support and outstanding ergonomics. Hip-hugging they may be, but the large beams could be a little tight for some people.

The seats are upholstered in leather and fabric, while the multi-function steering wheel is leather covered with a flattened bottom part to allow more clearance. White dials record the actions of the C63, while a centermounted satellite-navigation system directs the driver and doubles as an audio readout when required.

The similarities between the C63 AMG and its DTM racing counterpart are clearly apparent. For example, at the rear, the impressive diffuser-look AMG When pushed, the new AMG C63 Merc makes a delightful growl and accelerates into the distance effortlessly. Below, the chromed twin tailpipes of the AMG sports exhaust hint at the car's power.



apron with its three distinctive Motoring Journalists voted the diffuser fins. On the right and left, the chromed twin tailpipes of the AMG sports exhaust hint at the car's tremendous power, while the lip spoiler on the rear increases downforce.

Distinctive alloy wheels finish off the sporting look of the C63 AMG, which sits lower to the ground than a regular C-class. Speed-sensitive power steering, a new three-stage electronic-stability program and sports suspension are standard. Visually, the car is total excitement with power domes on the bonnet, side skirts and flared front fenders.



The family lineage of the C63 goes back to the C36 of 1993 – the first vehicle to emerge from the co-operation between Mercedes-Benz and AMG. The 190E AMG, which was unveiled in 1987, marked the beginning of the tuning efforts in Affalterbach.

UK bank bailout sets costly precedent

he crisis at the UK's Northern Rock that resulted in the government having to nationalize this home lender raises many issues. One of them is the whole outlook on risk. Traditionally, big banks with strong balance sheets were able to pay less interest, on average, than their smaller and weaker peers.

The credit crisis is in full flow and financial intuitions are still reluctant to transact substantial interbank lending. This is reflected in still-elevated London Inter-Bank Offer Rates (LI-BOR), akin to a "fear premium".

Lending practices by banks, credit card companies and others have become more selective. In the previous credit boom, lenders in far too many cases were unoncerned about the quality of their loan book. It was volume that counted, followed by packaging these loans as structured investment vehicles (SIVs) or collateralized debt obligations (CDOs). Basically, packages of negligently lent money.

Some of these financial packages contained different types of loans, including housing loans, aircraft leases and consumer credit card and other debt.

Depending on who you take as an ultimate authority on the size, this problem seems to range from US\$900 billion to more than US\$1.3 trillion. So far, only around US\$400 billion has surfaced.

Henry "Hank" Paulson, the US Treasury Secretary, on a visit to Europe earlier this month commented on the need to establish new rules in the financial industry. This, obviously, will re-

ment oversight, but usually this just incurs more bureaucracy and little effective oversight.

Meanwhile, in the real world, the economic situation continues to deteriorate in many countries. Economists and central bankers commonly use the terms "headline inflation" and "core inflation". The former is simply inflation as measured by a basket of items; the latter is the same but excludes energy and food prices.

The explanation for the use of core inflation is that by using this measurement it does not distort overall figures because food and energy prices are inclined to be more volatile than other items. This is useful in normal times, but when massive spikes in prices occur, as happened in 2007 and 2008, core inflation becomes little more than academic.

It becomes virtually irrelevant, except to those who do not eat, travel or use energy.

The last time global economies were subjected to such price shocks was in the 1970s. This time around, there is one major advantage: trade unions cover, in general, a much smaller percentage of the workforce in most countries.

This is helping to contain wage increases to a substantial degree, which, in turn, is acting as a brake on inflation.

France currently holds the rotating presidency of the European Union. Nicholas Sarkozy, the French president, claims that the euro is now 30% overvalued against the US dollar. Sarkozy is obviously determined to use his six-month period as European Union head to press the European Central Bank to introduce policies to reduce the value of the

The strong euro is hindering exports, but it does have one advantage. This alone means tighter monetary policy and inflation figures are more muted than would otherwise be the case.

CNBC, the television business channel, asked one of its guests, Thannos Papasavvas, head of currency analysis at banking group, Investec, what his view was on euro and US dollar values.

He said that the euro is 10% to 15% overvalued against from the current US\$1.58/euro to US\$1.50 or even the high US\$1.40s.

He also believes that when the US economy can achieve some "traction", economic recovery will be more rapid than in the euro zone.

Bus operators to get gas price reprieve

PHUKET: Following a request by the companies operating public buses within the province, the Land Transportation Department (LTD) will increase bus fares on the island to bring them in line with rising gas prices.

Public buses in Phuket are operated under concessions granted by the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (*OrBorJor*).

Chalchawal Ngarmthap of the Phuket Land Transportation Office (PLTO) explained that the current fares were set in 2004, when petrol was 23 baht per liter compared with the current price of 43 baht per liter.

Currently, a fleet of 16 buses, including the small, air-conditioned green buses introduced a few years ago, serves two routes in and around Phuket City.

There are 228 buses, mainly songtaew (open-air buses with bench seats) and older non-air-conditioned buses, serving the out-of-town routes, which connect Phuket City with Tah Chat Chai, Pa Khlok, Kamala, Patong, Rawai and Nai Harn, Ao Makham, Kata, Karon and Kata Noi, Chalong and the airport.

Included under this concession is an intra-city route between Samkong and the interprovincial bus terminus off Phang Nga Rd in Phuket City.

Fares on these routes, however, are charged according to the distance traveled, currently about 1 baht a kilometer, a rate that was also set in 2004.

"The bus operators have been absorbing the higher petrol prices since then," said Khun Chalchawal.

However, he added that the PLTO had yet to decide how much to increase fares by. "In setting the new fares, we will consider increases in labor costs and the price of diesel as well as other factors set out in Land Transport Department guidelines, but the new fares must be fair to the bus operators and to the passengers," K. Chalchawal said.

Bus operator Phuket Mahanakorn has asked for permsion to raise fares on the Phuket City-airport route by as much as 30%. "We have lost 2 million baht over the past six months [on the airport route]," he said

However, he added that the two popular metropolitan routes, which Phuket Mahanakorn also operates, are still profitable, but only just and only because the routes are very popular.

In setting the new fares, LTD officers will use a computerized financial projection system to foresee who will benefit and by how much under the new fares, K. Chalchawal said, adding that the new fares are expected to be announced by July 28.

PHUKET: By increasing its shareholdings from 20% to 50% in three internationally branded five-star hotels in Thailand, Bahrain-based Acacia Real Estate has acquired the Evason Phuket & Six Senses Spa, Evason Hua Hin & Six Senses Spa and Evason Hua Hin Hideaway & Six Senses Spa.

According to Acacia, the deal is projected to generate a rate of return for investors in excess of 20% a year over a five-year holding period.

The fall of the great dynasties

t took Thailand only a couple years to recover from the 1997 crisis, but many leading Sino-Thai capitalist families took a body blow from which they have yet to recover. Awash with dollar-denominated debt, they were forced to sell off huge chunks of their family holdings, mostly to foreign corporations, but also to a new breed of self-made Thai tycoons, such as Charoen Sirivadhana-bhakdi.

Their story is told in *Thai Capital After the 1997 Crisis* (Silkworm Books, Chiang Mai, 2008, 309pp), a collection of 10 essays by Thai academics, edited by Pasuk Phongpaichai and Chris Baker.

"The 1997 crisis caused the decapitation of Thailand's capitalist class," eminent economist Ammar Siamwalla writes in his forward. "Certainly the crisis caused great suffering among the poor. But it devastated the rich, too. In retrospect the crisis seems to have left a mark on Thai entrepreneurship that threatens to become permanent."

Of course, it was their own damn fault to begin with: "They rushed off like a pack of lemmings to borrow too much overseas."

But, over the past decade, the pendulum has swung in the opposite direction, with the old families left so spooked that they have become risk-adverse.

"Look at the younger generation of our prominent old business families," Ammar notes. "They seem to prefer ventures in entertainment, media or other ser-



vice sectors like fashion and restaurants. They do not seem interested in the industrial backbone of the economy."

Traumatized by 1997, they are afraid of the risks entailed by a truly developing economy.

In their introduction, Pasuk and Baker note that after the crisis, foreign capital moved from a subsidiary role in the Thai economy to the center. "Over the crisis and aftermath, domestic

capital had become of peripheral importance in the key activity driving growth in the national economy," they write.

"Domestic capital had been moved from the center to the sidelines. How that

happened, and what it may mean, is the subject of this book"

The first, and longest, chapter is Companies in Crisis by Natenapha Wailerdsak. In 40 pages replete with charts, she traces the rise and fall of the great Chinese immigrant families. Twenty years ago, 100 families owned 1,337 companies with combined revenue equal to 30% of

GDP. "Even within this list, business concentration was marked. The top 30 firms accounted for 81% of the total revenues, equivalent to over a quarter of GDP, and 90% of total assets."

Their approach to the stock market was cautious. Stockholding was structured according to the *kongsi* system in which the family patriarch maintained control. The 1997 crisis forced a great shakeup. The weaker players were

killed off, especially in manufacturing and finance. "Yet three-quarters of the business groups survived. The family firm was still the dominant form," K. Natenapha observes, adding that they were forced to



shift from *kongsi* to more professional management.

In the next chapter, Sakkarin Niyomsilpa shows how international corporations took control of the automotive sector after the 1997 crisis. Similarly, in Services, Servility and Survival, Veerayooth Kanchoochat traces the history of the megastores in Thailand and how they slipped from Thai control. The irony is that these retail giants were

within this list, business concentration was marked. The top 30 firms ac-introduced by companies such as Central and CP, who should bear the brunt of small shopkeepers' ire.

Ukrist Pathmanand and Chris Baker examine the mobile phone sector and how Thai firms simply gave up the ghost when faced by global competitors. There is the shameless matter of former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra lowering foreign ownership to 25% when rivals to his Shin Corp wanted to take on foreign partners and then yanking the bar up to 49% the day before he sold out to Singapore's Temasak Holdings.

You might not think that economic history can be hugely entertaining, but Chaiyon Praditsil and Olarn Thinbangtieo tell a rip-roaring tale of epic skulduggery in Rayong, where three semi-mafia families fought tooth and nail for political supremacy after 1997. Murder, bribery, backstabbing – this is Thai family entertainment at its very best.

am currently a high school principal, but I was previously a high school English teacher, so I realize I am sticking my neck out by asking a grammar question. In one of your columns, you wrote, "If you want to know whether a word is offensive... it's important to use the most recent dictionary you can find." Where's the "or not"? Did I simply invent a rule?

Barbara replies:

I've heard other people say the same thing, so you didn't invent the rule. Then again, I've heard yet other people argue that "whether" should *never* be followed by "or not," because it's a waste of words. So much for simple rules.

If "whether" means "no matter whether" then the "or not" is required – as in "This is what I think, whether or not you agree with me". By the way, "or not" should ordinarily come right after "whether" – as opposed to "whether you agree with me or not" – because this word order is easier to follow.

When "whether" means "if", though, the "or not" is generally unnecessary and better left out – as in "I wonder whether you agree with me".

Your example sentence about going to the beach is on this

The way to get it right is amazingly easy and you'll find you already know which word to use, as long as you have time to think it through.

Let's do another one. "I'll bet this won't bother you and... I? me? ...anymore." You'd say, "This won't bother me", so say, "This won't bother you and me anymore" – and I hope it's true!

Getting the message across about tsunami drills

Considering the response to the July 7 tsunami-evacuation drill, it is difficult to imagine that the disaster that claimed more than 250,000 lives was less than four years ago. Have visitors to Phuket banished the thoughts of the tsunami from their minds already after being so stunned by the disaster in 2004?

When the alarms sounded on Patong Beach on July 7, many of the tourists there chose to ignore them and continued to enjoy their sunbathing and playing in the sea. The tourists the *Gazette* spoke to said that staff at the hotels where they were staying had forewarned them that the drill would take place and knowing this, they chose to ignore the alarm.

What good is an evacuation drill if only select groups of people take part and how can emergency-response teams assess their performance if there are people still on the beach?

One tourist, when asked how she knew that the sirens sounding in the background were just a test, had no answer. If a real wave had been descending upon her, would she have batted an eyelid before it were too late?

Somewhat ironic is that the people who were not told that the sirens sounding would be just a drill had exactly the appropriate response. At a construction site in Mai Khao, workers immediately downed tools, picked up their bags and headed for higher ground.

The government conducting an annual tsunami-evacuation drill is highly commended. Perhaps better would be if this were extended to fire drills for major centers where people congregate, such as cinemas and shopping malls. Imagine if a fire were to break out at the Coliseum Paradise cinema complex or at Robinson department store in Phuket City.

However, allowing local authorities to organize their own tsunami drills has advantages and disadvantages. Exemplary examples are Kamala and Bang Tao schools, which didn't even wait for the national testing to stage their own evacuation drills.

However, it does allow lax authorities to slip through the cracks and place the population in their respective areas in potential danger.

Even if a tsunami never again strikes the shores of Phuket, complacency in being prepared for such a disaster is just not acceptable. Surely the large number of tourists who died in the tsunami is reason enough for the authorities to cajole holidaymakers to take half an hour out of their busy schedules to join in an evacuation drill.

Dolphins dying for black gold

It has been distressing to read about the stories of whales and dolphins becoming stranded or lost around Phuket. I've never known this to happen so frequently. Knowing that whales and dolphins rely on sound and the earth's natural magnetic fields, something man-made must be

Whales and dolphins have turned up stranded on American shores following US military sonar testing. They often die before they can be helped. In May, the Petroleum Authority of Thailand (PTT) announced that it would begin petroleum exploration surveys off the shores of Ranong, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Trang and Satun.

These surveys use methods such as seismic reflection, in which seismic waves are created artificially as a "control" so they can be compared with the survey results. Other techniques involve generating strong sound and magnetic waves to work out what might be buried under the seabed.

We hope that better political awareness will prepare people for fairer elections by educating the working class so that they follow self-sufficiency principles rather than giving in to vote buying. This should not be so difficult because the working class in Phuket have better opportunities and higher incomes than their counterparts in other parts of Thailand.

Although the largest-vote buying problem is in Isarn there are also a fair number of people from Isarn living in Phuket who are learning about democracy.

the show runs until the early hours of the morning, attracting an interesting array of people from government officials and business people to motorcycle drivers and fishermen.

I also organize the Collection of donations and selling of Tshirts. There are also CDs by rock star Rang Rockestra available. These are given away free of charge to anyone who would like one as we have permission from Rang to create copies of them ourselves.

There is also a case of votebuying in Chiang Mai by old TRT executives who are accused of lobbying votes for the People's Power Party (PPP) – the present government.

Three years ago, I realized that Thaksin really is very evil but felt powerless to do anything. I was afraid that if I protested against Thaksin's actions, people might think I was politically motivated or radical in my thinking. When the PAD was formed, I saw a legitimate group of likeminded people who sincerely feel that educating people about choosing their future rather than accepting payment for votes, is

the way to create a more honest and transparent system of governance.

The idea was never to teach people to drive out governments in power but to teach people how to pressurize the government into being more fair and just.

When Chalerm Yoobumrung came to Phuket, the local people did not stop him coming on the island because he is Interior Minister. They still feel bad that his son Wanchalerm came down to Phuket in 1997, was involved in a shooting in Alien Pub near The Metropole hotel and was not punished for the crime.

We had received a call from PAD in Bangkok tipping us off that Chalerm would be coming to Phuket, so we went straight to the airport. We have no power to prevent him from coming to the island. It was his choice to stay away. We want wrongdoers to understand that the public knows what they are doing and are not happy with it.

I am not so much against certain people but more against the wrong things that they do. When the PAD has accomplished its goals, I will continue to find ways to educate the working class on the island, so that they can have a society that treats them fairly and provides justice when deserved.

A restaurant owner should provide a smoking area for customers. This area must be separated from the eating space and must be used only for smoking. You cannot have an area where people can eat and smoke.

An owner must also ensure that the smoke from the smoking area does not disturb the people who are eating in the res-

You must have a sign tell-

ing your customers that the main area of the restaurant is a smoking-free zone and that there is a designated smoking area.

If you don't provide an area for smokers and you allow customers to smoke inside your restaurant, you could be fined up to 20,000 baht.

If you have the sign and provide a smoking area for your customers, but a customer still smokes in your restaurant, then that person could be fined up to 2,000 baht.

The Internet times they are a-changin' Part I: Wireless

COMPUTER

uch has been happening locally in the fast-changing world of "broadband" fast Internet connections. This week I'd like to talk about wireless connections, specifically the EV-DO "AirCard" technology you can buy today and tomorrow's stillelusive HSPA "3.5G" wireless.

Next week, I'll discuss the amazing – and, to me, inscrutable – changes currently evident in wired ADSL connections all over the island. It's a jungle out there.

A few weeks ago, CAT rolled out its latest and greatest wireless Internet card, a small evolution in the AirCard/EV-DO line. The new C-motech CCU-680 incorporates "Rev A" fast wireless technology, which is marginally faster than the "Rev 0" EV-DO Sierra 580 and CCU-650 technology that CAT has offered for more than a year.

Rev A improves upon Rev 0 by reducing the latency – the stutter, if you will – when your computer is sending data. The bottom line: if you already have a CAT Sierra 580 or C-motech CCU-650, the CCU-680 may reduce the stutter in Skype conversations and it may make interactive games more responsive. Other than that, though, there's no reason for 680 envy. Most people won't notice any difference.

The CCU-680 has an innovative design: it's just a little bit bigger than a thumb drive, and the USB head swivels so you can stow your 680 up against your computer case. All of the drivers, as well as the documentation, are on the drive. The reports I've heard about installation have all been positive, on Windows, Linux and Macs.





CAT has just started selling the C-motech CCU-680, seen heer on the C-otech website. The CCU-680 is a "Rev A" wireless adapter that plugs into any USB port.

CAT charges 10,990 baht for the CCU-680. "Rev A" monthly service is the same prices as "Rev 0" service – 835 baht a month for unlimited access.

I should repeat three admonitions that pertain to the CAT EV-DO "AirCard" service.

First, at this point in time, you can get a "fast" wireless Internet connection only from CAT. If you buy a fancy, expensive AirCard from any company but CAT, you'll spend a lot for a shiny card with mobile phone (GPRS or EDGE) speeds – at most one-fifth as fast as a CAT EV-DO connection.

Second, when you're shopping at CAT (there are two branches, one on Phang Nga Rd in Phuket City, the other on Soi Tun near the "third road" in Patong), you have to be sure that you get the CCU-680. CAT has other products that use so-called "CDMA 1X" technology. They run at only a fraction of the speed of a CCU-680.

Third, if you want to buy a secondhand CAT Sierra 580, CCU-650 or CCU-680, both you and the seller have to go to a CAT office to transfer ownership. If you try to finesse the phone firm, you'll likely end up with a large bill and a dead card.

If you aren't up to getting a CCU-680, keep in mind that your laptop's built-in Wi-Fi card works in more and more places every day. Both pay-for and for-free wireless hotspots dot the land-scape in all of the more developed parts of the island.

If you can get a telephone line, setting up a Wi-Fi network in your home is as easy asking the phone company to put in a "wireless router" when they install ADSL.

The signal from your home system will reach only 100 meters or so – less through concrete walls – but Wi-Fi is a nobrainer for any household with two or more computers. Talk to your neighbors.

At one point it appeared as if WiMax – a completely different technology that delivers fast city-wide wireless access – might be rolled out in Phuket. A few limited pilot projects, including one in Phuket, have brought mixed results. In spite of what you may have read in the papers, or in certain phone companies' press releases, WiMax doesn't appear to be imminent.

HSPA (High Speed Packet Access), on the other hand, seems to be the way of the future, in Thailand in general and Phuket in particular.

HSPA and its kissin' cousin HSDPA realistically offer download speeds four times greater than the current generation of CAT "AirCards," and further development of the HSDPA technique promises to bring substantially faster speeds.

By the end of the year, Phuket should see at least one trial HSPA offering – if somebody in Bangkok starts making decisions.

Therein lies the rub.

Several mobile phone companies are pushing to get HSPA working, but they're running into regulatory problems. One group approves the use of the airwaves, while another refuses to issue import permits.

Some people think that one particular government organization is in charge, while others dispute jurisdiction. Billions of baht hang in the balance and it isn't at all clear which skids need to be greased or, indeed, if today's skids will even be around tomorrow. I think of it as governance by vacuum.

Next week, I'll delve into the intricacies of the current – nay, bizarre – state of wired ADSL connections in Phuket, and take a glimpse into our fuzzy fiber future.

Thai Tyson KOs Jimrex

PATTAYA: It was an actionpacked give-and-take bout while it lasted, but in the end, former WBA super-featherweight champion Yodsanan "The Thai Tyson" Sor Nanthachai of Thailand proved too talented and too strong for Jimrex Jaca, stopping the Filipino in Round 6 of the scheduled 12-round contest on June 27.

The Thai Tyson lived up to his name, scoring with thunderous blows. Jimrex stood bravely with Yodsanan, trading punches and connecting sporadically in rounds one through three, but Yodsanan refused to let Jimrex gain control of the bout, keeping him off balance with a mixture of stiff jabs and overhand lefts.

Jimrex had his best round in the fourth, but Yodsanan quickly squelched the attack, landing with crunching right hooks to the temple that rapidly depleted the power of the Filipino. In Round 5, Jimrex, his face swollen and bloodied, threw left hook after left hook, but the Thai marched forward and matched his punches.

Yodsanan picked up the pace in the next round until he scored with a hard right that knocked his opponent backwards. Sensing Jimrex was hurt, he moved quickly to the Filipino, pressing him against the ropes and unloading with a barrage of

punches. Jimrex attempted to move out of danger, but Yodsanan knew the end was near. He let go another volley of punches, scoring with right hand after right hand until Jimrex slumped over and turned his body away from the attack, no longer capable of responding. The stoppage came at 1:36 of Round 6.

Yodsanan plans to fight in the US next. The fight will be brings Yodsanan's record to 56-3-1 with 45 KOs. Jimrex drops to 28-5-3 with 13 stoppages.

On the undercard, Thailand's Saddam Kietyongyuth displayed devastating speed and power in demonstrating why he is one of Thailand's top prospects, stopping JR Sollano of the Philippines in Round 1 of a scheduled 12-round fight.

JR began the round popping broadcast on ESPN. The win out his jab, moving side-to-side.

Saddam advanced, throwing jabs and overhand rights. Slightly over a minute into the round, the two traded punches in the center of the ring, with Saddam landing a left hook that smacked the point of the chin. Seconds later, JR turned away, suffering a delayed reaction from the effect of the punch, and dropped to the canvas. He took nine before springing up to beat the count.

The two traded punches and once more Saddam's punch found the mark first. Saddam went on to land a massive left hook that put JR down. The referee did not bother to count.

On to Vegas where, without a doubt, the fight of the week took place on June 28 in a WBC lightweight championship bout between Manny "Pac Man" Pacquiao (47-3-2, 35 KOs) and champion David Diaz (34-2-1, 17 KOs). Pacquiao, boxing's poundfor-pound champion, was moving up from super featherweight (130 lbs) to fight as a lightweight (135 lbs) for the first time. The Filipino has jumped up eight weight divisions from the minimum weight division (105 lbs) since beginning his career. In choosing Diaz, Pacquiao knew exactly what he was in for: a fight with a tough but relatively limited opponent who could help showcase Pacquiao's considerable talents.

Before the bout, there was an abundance of questions. Would Pacquiao's punches have the same effect on his larger opponent? Could he cope with his opponent's strength and punching power?

The Filipino made it clear right from the start of the bout that he was the boss, controlling the ring, pressing forward aggressively and landing hard hooks and crosses to the face of his opponent. Diaz fought gamely but his offense never took hold and by the end of the fourth round, the Chicago native's face was a bloody mess.

Round after round, Pacquiao dominated the action. Before the bout, Diaz was heard saying, "This is going to be fun."

It didn't look particularly fun for Diaz. By Round 9, he was losing steam, but still attacking. After one combination, Diaz shuffled out of range. He immediately moved forward to throw a punch, but Pacquiao beat him to it, landing a picture-perfect left to the point of the chin. Diaz dropped face first to the canvas, out cold, and referee Vic Drakulich immediately called a halt to the bout.

After the bout, promoter Bob Arum said, "There is a possibility we could fight Ricky Hatton next year."

Painting porcelain delights

ye-catching and endearing are the first words that come to mind when describing the collection of hand-painted porcelain ornaments and other creatively colored decor items at Hobby Corner, a small folk-art shop at Baan Suan Place, on the road behind the Big C supercenter on the bypass road.

The assorted plates, coasters, vases, jewelry boxes, tissue holders, wall mirror frames and other knickknacks have an endearing uniqueness created by the floral images that have been skillfully applied on them by hand.

The everyday items have been transformed into works of art by Hobby Corner's owner, Noppamas "Moo" Limpanonda, who describes the work as "folk art". She began creating her collection of pretty porcelain after taking early retirement – opting out of the high-pressure demands of a career in finance – to indulge her flair for creativity.

The ceramic creations are reminiscent of European and American homes of yesteryear, when decorative plates and handpainted picture frames lined the walls.

American and English ceramic painting styles differ in that they use different brush-stroke techniques. She uses both styles to transform plain household objects into works of art and adds a little flair of her own.

The items in the shop range in price from about 300 baht for a hand-painted table-top ornament up to 5,000 baht for a wall mirror with a flowery frame. Even the flowers standing in handpainted vases have been made by hand. They are so well crafted that they look entirely authentic until you inspect them very

Also on display are watercolor landscapes by reputed Bangkok artists for sale at prices between 5,000 and 6,000 baht.

For those tempted to learn the art, K. Moo offers porcelain painting courses at the shop. However, as space in the current shop is limited, she is moving into a larger unit behind the shop where groups can learn and practice making their own folk

K. Moo's 15-hour courses cost 3,000 baht. The courses are divided into three-hour morning and afternoon sessions with two Khun Moo explained that brushes, 10 tubes of different-





colored paints and five items for painting provided.

Customers are also welcome to bring their own ornaments to be transformed or even commission K. Moo to create a work of art out of an everyday object, such as a decorative name and address placard to hang outside the house or an ornamental box as a souvenir gift.

Asked how long it takes to create a piece of art out of a plate, for example, K. Moo explained that a lot depends on one's skills as a painter. "There are several stages to porcelain painting before the end product. You start

by applying base colors, then by outlining the pattern and filling it

"There are shading techniques to learn which give depth to the images, too. The plate would also have to be kilned several times before it is eventually ready for display," she added.

"Folk art can be any kind of handiwork," K. Moo explained. "My idea in opening Hobby Corner and offering porcelain painting classes was to have somewhere for people with a creative flair to meet. Anyone who wants to try their hand at folk art can come. We can exchange ideas and create new things."







ne of the region's emerging tigers, Viet nam, is learning the hard way on the journey to a free market economy. With its currency, the dong, currently trading above 16,000 to the US dollar, all signs point to possible devaluation in the near fu-

Also, inflation has breached 25% and the national trade deficit is approaching US\$15 billion. How fast the tide turns in what has been hailed as one of Asia's fastest growing economies in the past year.

In its accelerated march to attract overseas investment and open its doors to trade, the country adopted a much more aggressive liberalization program over the past decade than, for example, China.

China has repeatedly initiated measures to cool down its overheated economy over the years and taken considerably more pragmatic steps on the road from a bleak communist machine to liberalization.

Despite some historic benchmarks to learn from China, Vietnam is now poised on the edge of an economic situation that may have serious consequences for its neighboring Asian economies.

Not since the 1997 regional currency crisis has there been a large-scale devaluation. Already, over the past month, the baht has depreciated against major currencies.

A downturn in the Vietnamese economy would certainly create a larger downturn not only in Thailand but ripples would be felt throughout the Asia.

On a global level, inflation combined with the subprime problem and rising oil prices is resulting in a slowdown in economic growth with the cost of living everywhere continually on the rise.

For businessmen and property developers in Vietnam, there has been an abundance of US-dollar-denominated debt over the past 12 to 18 months. Now, all of a sudden, in cases where loans have been based in US dollars, say at 7.5% interest, banks are converting loans to Vietnamese dong denominations and quoting interest at hyper-inflationary rates of 15% to 16%.

For any business, this creates a sudden vacuum as the cost of investment is doubled overnight and the possibility of currency de-

valuation adds further downside risk on interest rates.

In Thailand, while local banks do not have substantial exposure to Vietnamese investment, there are troubling signs of large-scale inflation. Counties such as Indonesia, Malaysia and the Philippines are seeing signs of this worsening.

Vietnam as of today is a stand-alone issue, but certainly the impact of the economic uncertainty will see knock-on effects here and aboard. Lessons learned from 1997 are that the property market was one of the worst-hit sectors and that recovery took several years.

Meanwhile, in Vietnam, sev-

eral high-profile projects have been launched in markets such as Danang. The mixed-use Laguna Hu with its mix of high-end luxury resorts, golf course and residential development has created considerable interest in the emerging market.

Middle East group Kingdom Hotel Investments, which owns the Mövenpick Resort & Spa in Karon, are launching the uppertier Raffles Resort and Residences, which are aimed directly at the lifestyle-investment market in which Phuket has dominated for the past few years.

Along Danang's China Beach coastline are no fewer then 15 large international hotels under development. While it's yet to be seen what fallout the current investment climate will create, in the long term this type of investor bodes well for longer-term development success.

It's been said that no man is an island, and though Phuket indeed is one, it's not immune to the market ups and downs of Asia. In a real estate industry that thrives on overseas buyers, a moderate depreciation of the baht creates significant buyer interest and opportunities here.

For the growing overseas retirement market, it also leads to a lower cost of living, hence attracting more part- and full-time residents that favorably impacts a service economy such as ours.

In a nutshell, with risk comes reward and with threats come opportunity. The impact of Vietnam's worsening problems will no doubt be felt on these shores, but for the moment it seems that we are continuing to follow global issues more closely then ever before.

Gardening by Bloomin' Bert

Not quite a total lettuce

have very few skills. In fact there really isn't much that I'm any good at. This is proved weekly in a certain Southern Thailand newspaper; this particular page of drivel is certainly not about to win any literary awards. To be honest, I don't have a creative bone in my body.

I can't draw to save my life. Anyone who has heard me sing will confirm that the only thing that seems to make me stop (and believe me, they do sincerely want me to stop) is thrusting another beer in my hand. It usually works very effectively.

But there's one thing in life at which I've found that I do indeed excel – I am rather good at insulting people. It's a skill; one that's taken many years of honing. It's a shame that hurling abuse hasn't become an Olympic sport (most other things have, after all), because I rather feel that I could have represented my country.

There are some crackers that you can throw around. Try calling an American (a nation known for their astute awareness, of course) a "pillock" with a big smile on your face. When they ask you what it means, which they inevitably will with some inanity like "Gee, that's a cute word", you just tell them it's somebody who enjoys the sun or something. They'll love it.

It appears that the good ole US of A has even produced a book to explain British slang and insults. For each example, it ranks the slang, with a short description of each rating at the beginning of the book. There's "vulgar", which means the slang is fine to use in every day conver-

sation, but not in, as they put it blimey, guvnor". Those classics "proper" company.

Then there's "offensive", which should only be used in certain company with whom you are familiar. Surely these things really don't need spelling out to them. The crowning glory is "taboo"; the book essentially says "Do not, under any circumstances, use this". Bless them - these words actually do need explain-

By the way – while we're on the subject, most Brits tend not to say things like "crikey" or "cor are reserved for Mary Poppins.

Back to the insults, then. Allow me to help you out. If you call someone a "minger", you are of course referring to their exquisite taste in fine arts (certainly not implying that they whiff a bit), particularly with references to Chinese vases from the Ming dynasty, in the same way that a "plonker" is known for their flower-arranging abilities, ie, how skillfully they plonk.

We have some even weirder words. One, which describes two very similar parts of a gentleman's anatomy, on its own indicates total nonsense – hardly a positive use of the word. Precede that with the word "dog's", and suddenly it becomes something exceptional. I'm not sure that anyone quite gets that one.

A "right lettuce" could be one of many things; none of them particularly complimentary. At last – a mention of a plant. Specifically, the sea lettuce, a common sight in many areas of Phuket's shores.

Nobody seems to know where the sea lettuce, or bongbong in Thai, originally came from. The so-called experts' answer is a bit of a cop out. They say that it is native to the coasts of the Pacific and Indian oceans you hardly need to be a professor of tropical botany to figure that one out. What a bunch of wazzocks.

The sea lettuce isn't a particularly exciting plant. It just kind of sits there and grows, quietly minding its own business. Kind of the filing clerk of the plant world – nobody really notices its existence; its human counterpart would probably be called Clive.

This large shrub or even a small tree is a predictable but useful enough addition to any garden near the sea, since it tolerates sandy soil (it even grows in 100% sand) and laps up strong, salty winds. It's freely branching, and will sprawl like crazy if you let it, and has fleshy, pale green leaves. It has small, five-lobed white flowers, which appear on only one side, leading to another popular name: "half flower".

The sea lettuce thrives in full sun and tolerates very dry conditions. Once you plant this thing in your garden and get it going, you can totally ignore it, as it's perfectly capable of looking after itself. It's propagated by seeds or by terminal cuttings; the oval berries of the sea lettuce float for long periods, which means that it spreads all over the place.

For the DIY enthusiast, seeds soaked in saltwater are said to germinate better and large branches for cuttings should be kept moist until rooted. I wouldn't bother though – just go and pinch a huge clump from Karon beach – tell them I sent you, if anyone bothers to ask.

It can get quite large and bushy, up to about five meters tall, often forming dense hemispherical mounds. The leaves are fairly thick, presumably because of the water that the plant stores inside them. They're a shiny green, wider near the tips, around 20 cm long and a bit hairy on both sides.

Because of the way they thrive in beach areas and bind sands together, the sea lettuce was promoted in the early 1980s for use in beach stabilization projects in some parts of the world. This practice is now very much discouraged, as it can totally take over in areas that it shouldn't be, doing all sorts of damage to the local ecosystem. We're fine in Thailand – it came here naturally and seems to be behaving itself so far.

The fruits of the sea lettuce are buoyant, with a corky outer layer, which helps ocean currents to do the dispersing act. They are also eaten by pigeons and sea birds, and moved by crabs and other animals. This plant doesn't mess about when it comes to dispersing its seed, as it were. Although these seeds can last in sea water up to a year or more, they will germinate only with fresh water, when they're washed ashore on a rainy day.

The sea lettuce is hardly the life and soul of the party as far as plants are concerned. It's certainly no heloconia or hibiscus. I'd go so far as to say it's somewhat banal; all it seems to do is look green and hold beaches together in its own dull way. Am I insulting plants now?

At least I managed to get through this diatribe without saying anything derogatory about people (except perhaps Americans a tiny bit). Hang on, I did call botanists who couldn't be bothered to find out where this plant originated a bunch of wazzocks. I'm not even sure that I can define a wazzock. It's the same as a prat; a total lettuce. Does that help?






