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

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Bars raided over copyright furore

PHUKET: Entertainment venues around the island were raided last week in a clampdown on copyright violations. Several bar operators were fined for illegally playing copyrighted music in their bars and ordered to obtain licenses allowing them to play music at their establishments.

The raids were instigated by a team of about 20 representatives from RPK Publishing.

Some bar owners were ordered to pay fines or given the option to buy a license, while others were arrested and taken to police stations.

On condition of anonymity, several Rawai bar owners told the *Gazette* that the amounts they were fined depended on various factors, including negotiation skills. Some bars were tipped off about the raids and managed to hide their computers before being searched.

According to bar owners' reports, that RPK representatives initially visited venues without police being present and later called police when they discovered that their clients' music was being played illegally.

Police then accompanied the RPK representatives on subsequent raids to other venues.

When the *Gazette* called Samarn Chainarong, superintendent of Chalong Police Station, several days later, he said he knew very little about the crackdown and was unable to say who bar owners should contact in order to obtain a license.

Many of the bar owners who had bought official-looking licenses issued by RPK Publishing following the raids told the *Gazette* they were unaware that

those licenses applied only to the artists that RPK represents.

Sutthisak Prasatkrarukarn, Secretary of the Prevention and Suppression of Intellectual Property Infringement Committee (Private Sector), explained that people who buy CDs legally are entitled to use them for private entertainment.

"If the CD is to be used in a pub or restaurant, then one must ask the copyright owner – that is, the company that produced the CDs or their representative – for the right to use the CD in public," he added.

An RPK employee at the company's head office in Bangkok explained that RPK was trying to be reasonable. The official fine is anywhere between 40,000 and 200,000 baht. However, she added, many bars escaped the fines by agreeing to buy a 12-month license to make public playing of the music legal.

One bar owner who was arrested, however, had to pay

several thousand baht extra so that she could be released from detention and return to her restaurant.

RPK employee Khun Sayan, who led the raids, told the *Gazette*, "5,000 baht buys a license to play the music of our clients publicly for one year.

"A lot of pubs, bars and clubs use music that we are supposed to protect. Karaoke bars, however, usually do not have the kind of music that we look after."

The RPK employee in Bangkok explained that although there are presently 15 agencies in Thailand that sell copyright licenses on behalf of copyright holders, only five are actively pursuing violators.

The other four that are expected to visit Phuket soon are copyright agents Likisit Center and Likisit Pleng and the recording companies GMM Grammy and RS Promotions, who carry out their own inspections.

Phuket protesters join Bangkok siege

PHUKET: As the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) on August 26 made its final drive to oust Prime Minister Samak Sundaravej and lay siege to government offices, media in Bangkok reported that NBT broadcast stations were being raided around the nation.

However, NBT reporter Chaiwut Poungsuwan told the *Gazette* that the NBT station in Phuket was safe and sound. "NBT in Phuket is located in a peaceful location and the staff are friends with ASTV, the station that belongs to the PAD leader," Khun Chaiwut said.

"NBT will suffer only in areas where they support the Samak regime," he added.

Phuket PAD leader Natjarong Ekpermsup said that some 4,000 PAD members from Phuket were protesting in Bangkok, rallying at NBT headquarters, the Ministry of Finance and the Ministry of Transport.

The protesters from Phuket were moving to government house to demand Samak's resignation, he added late afternoon on August 26.

The local contribution to national anti-government protests continued to gain momentum over the weekend, with flights from Phuket to Bangkok on all airlines fully booked as PAD members flocked to the capital.

On August 22, a Patong resident and PAD supporter known as "Loong Pim" took to the PAD stage in Bangkok to

Thousands take part in alms ceremony

PHUKET CITY: A mega merit-making ceremony was held in downtown Phuket City early on August 23, with thousands of Buddhist devotees offering alms to 1,000 monks.

Items collected during the two-hour event, non-perishable food items such as canned goods and instant noodles, are to be redistributed to needy monks, soldiers, teachers and laypeople living in the Deep South who have been affected by the violence there.

The event was organized by the Phuket Meditation Center and White Media Club of Phuket in conjunction with Phuket Provincial Office, Phuket Municipality and the Dhammkaya Foundation. It was part of the Dhammkaya Foundation's nationwide World Ethics Recuperation Program, which aimed to see a massive almsgiving to 500,000 monks in events in all 76 provinces.



deliver 100,000 baht that he had collected to support PAD efforts to drive out the current administration.

The next day, Phuket PAD leader Natjarong Ekpermsup went up to Bangkok and told the *Gazette*, "We are going up to Bangkok for the endgame. We are going to drive Samak from power. I will be back next week, but in the meantime I have to look after the Phuket chapter in Bangkok. A lot of us will fly back to Phuket, too, so return flights will probably also be fully booked."

On August 24, two days before the siege of government offices, the first group of more than 5,000 Phuket-based PAD supporters joined the Bangkok protest after arriving in a convoy of cars, buses and vans.

Speed, guns and ganja seized in crackdown

PHUKET CITY: Following his order of a crack-down on crime, Phuket's top cop has announced that several drug- and gun-related arrests were made recently in different parts of the island.

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Apirak Hongthong said that recent swoops in various locations had included the seizure of 390 *ya bah* (methamphetamine) pills that had been stashed in a hole in the ground, two homemade 12-gauge shotguns, a .38 pistol and a small bag of marijuana.

Two men have been charged with possession of a Class 1 narcotic with intent to sell following the seizure of the 390 *ya bah* pills after Tung Tong Police officers had monitored the pair closely fol-

lowing reports that they were selling the drug to students in the area.

The guns were found by police when they searched three men near the Bang Kon Tee Mosque on Wiset Rd in Rawai. Two of the men arrested were Phuket natives, who said they carried the unregistered weapons only for self defense but confessed to charges of carrying unregistered firearms in public. All three guns were loaded.

On the same night, Chalong Police arrested two men for being in possession of a small bag of dried, compressed marijuana, the weight of which was not disclosed. Both suspects confessed to possession of a Class 5 narcotic for personal consumption, police said.

Man charged for shotgun murder

RASSADA: Phuket City Police on August 20 announced the arrest of a man who confessed to the murder of his former boss at Supercheap on the bypass road on the night of August 19.

Most of the details of the arrest were read out to the press in a statement by Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit.

The body of the victim, 34-year-old Supercheap employee Kanya Boonprajong, was found just after 8 pm lying next to her motorcycle along the northbound lane of the road, north of Tesco-Lotus and not far from the Phuket Namsaeng Rice Company.

She had died of a single shotgun blast to the chest.

K. Kanya's husband, an employee of Mission Hospital who was driving past at the time, recognized his wife's motorcycle and stopped. He cried as he hugged her lifeless body, which was later taken by Kusoldharm Foundation rescue workers to Vachira Phuket Hospital.

Using eyewitness accounts, police at about 11 pm tracked down the alleged shooter, 31-year-old Korapat "Gus" Winnawat, to a rented home on Songkhla Rd, near the intersection with Yaowarat Rd in Samkong, where he was living with his in-laws.

At the August 20 conference at Phuket City Police Station, Phuket Provincial Police

Commander Apirak Hongthong and Phuket City Police Superintendent Nos Svettalekha presented the suspect together with his relative, 19-year-old Tanongsak "Gate" Thongsong.

Police said Gate confessed to helping Korapat dispose of the murder weapon, a homemade pistol designed to fire a single shotgun cartridge, in a shallow drainage ditch behind their home.

He has been charged with one firearms violation and for hindering a police investigation.

Police collected as evidence from the home a single 12-gauge shotgun cartridge, the clothes the suspect was wearing at the time of the murder and the Honda Wave motorcycle believed to be used in the killing.

Korapat planned the murder in advance and called the victim to ask her to meet him where the shooting took place, saying he wanted to "clear the air" over a previous dispute, police said.


Witnesses saw the couple meet, get off their motorbikes and begin arguing. Korapat then kicked Kanya to the pavement and stomped on her several times before drawing his weapon, firing it at close range and fleeing on the motorbike, police said.

Korapat answered "no" when asked if there had been any romantic involvement with the victim, as was reported by one Thai language newspaper.

He was motivated to kill Kanya out of revenge for incidents that took place several months ago while he was working under her as an employee at Supercheap, a position he eventually had to resign from, he told police.

Korapat has been charged with premeditated murder and one charge related to illegal possession and use of a firearm.

He also admitted that he was drunk at the time of the attack, police said.



tional hotel school to be opened on the island.

Representing Orion Hotel Schools, Swiss national Lothar Schudt of Jasmin Consulting Property Management on August 26 met Governor Niran at Provincial Hall to seek support and clear the way for plans to be drawn up and investors sought for the new school.

Orion Hotel Schools is a consortium of six hotel schools around the globe, including the Australian International Hotel School in Canberra, Australia, and the Academia Euregio Bodensee in Switzerland.

The schools offer hospitality and tourism industry education from diploma level up to and including postgraduate and master's degrees in fields including business management, hotel and resort management, spa and golf management, culinary arts, food and beverage management as well as eco-tourism, nature and adventure tourism management.

Students can also transfer between different courses and campuses among member schools.

Mr Schudt, an honoree member of the Swiss Hotel Association, said he is approaching strong Thai partners for the project because he foresees bureaucratic problems, such as obtaining work permits for foreign management and lecturers.

"The school would accept both Thais with acceptable English skills as well as foreign students. We cannot give our children much, but we can give them

an education. Tourist numbers are continually increasing, which may sound positive, but we have to look at other concerns," Mr Schudt said.

"Many foreigners and locals on the island have 'tunnel vision' and are missing this important point. Thailand does not have any international hotel schools. In Switzerland, we have two. We need approval from the government now, at an early stage," he added.

However, Mr Schudt, who has lived on Phuket for 15 years, said that he would have to wait a week or so before moving ahead with any further commitments as the directors of the Orion Hotel Schools in Australia were coming to Phuket to discuss the

Gov Niran said that he would organize a meeting with all the relevant agencies so that project planning could start quickly.

Hanna Backlund murderer given life sentence

PHUKET CITY: The Phuket Provincial Court today sentenced Akkaradej "Chon" Tankae to life imprisonment for the murder of Swedish tourist Hanna Backlund, who was stabbed to death at Mai Khao Beach in broad daylight on March 15.

The sentence was commuted from death to life imprisonment because Chon made a full confession, said the judge, who made reference to the negative impact the case had on the island's tourism industry.

CAPE PANWA: Royal Thai Navy Commander-in-Chief Adm Sathiraphan Keyanon on August 21 visited the Third Naval Area Command, where he announced the Third Fleet will on October 1 begin joint patrol missions in the Malacca Strait with strategic partners Singapore and Malaysia.

The patrols, which will have air and land-based radar support, are intended to boost security in regional waters.

The last reported act of piracy involving a Thai vessel was on April 28, when six armed men wearing balaclavas used a speedboat to board Thai fuel tanker Patara Varin 2 as it was about to enter the Singapore Strait. The pirates handcuffed the 13 crewmen at gunpoint before making off with an estimated 13 million baht in cash and stolen goods.

Adm Sathirapan said the Navy will continue to arrest and repatriate poor Rohingya immigrants from Burma who enter Thai waters, most on their way to Malaysia in desperate searches for work.

The visit was also part of Adm Sathiraphan's farewell tour, as he is set for mandatory retirement on September 30. He was formally greeted by Rear Admiral Supot Pruksa, Commanding Officer of the Third Naval Area

Adm Sathirapan was promoted to Navy Chief on October 1, 2005. As he commanded the Navy in a time of peace, he will

perhaps be best remembered as the first deputy chief of the Council for Democratic Reform, which overthrew the elected government of fugitive former Prime Minister Thaksin Shanawatra in September 2006.

The Phuket visit was the last stop on his farewell tour, following a visit to the Songkhla-based Second Naval Area Command the day before.

Apirak defends slow progress in catching killers

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Provincial Police Commander Apirak Hongthong has assured the public that investigators are working hard to bring to justice those responsible for a slew of unsolved murders that have shocked the island in recent months.

Speaking after a press conference on August 20, Gen Apirak said provincial police investigators and specialists from Bangkok were working hard on three unsolved shooting murder cases: the June 11 execution of former Kathu Police officer Decho Kaewnabon, who was involved in the smuggling of unregistered Burmese workers; the June 17 slaying of 99 Seafood Restaurant owner Siricahi "Yod" Chaikoo near the Tung Tong Police checkpoint, and the July 18 mafia-style murder of Jintana Shopping Plaza heiress Komkai Kositkoon.

All three victims' business interests were centered in Patong.

Investigators are also working hard to find the shooter of 57-year-old Dr Benjapol Thongton, owner of the Karon Center Clinic who survived a single gunshot to the upper torso as he was driving in front of Sengho Bookstore on Suthat Rd at 8 am on August 4, Gen Apriak added.

A family squabble over inheritance has been rumored as a possible motive in that attack.

The Thongton clan is said to be one of the richest families in Phuket and the victim was scheduled to appear in court the day of the shooting in an inheritance case against a relative, according to one local media report.

Gen Apirak said that his officers were "x-raying" several gunmen in the province and working closely with regional police to monitor the movements of suspects thought to be hiding in other prov-



South Africans confident of 'Monkey Island' plan

wo South African conservationists who hope to open a "Monkey Island" primate sanctuary off Phuket's southeast coast recently paid a visit to Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, but their goal to open the center as a new tourist attraction by the end of next year still has a lot of red tape to clear before becoming a reality. The *Gazette*'s Janyaporn Morel and Akbar Khan report.

ambian-born Tony Blignaut, CEO of Primates Resort Limited, and his partner Ronald Derek Taurog of the Touch a Monkey's Heart Foundation met with Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit on the morning of August 20 to follow up on an interesting application: one seeking the right to develop a "community-based" primate conservation project on two small islands located off Phuket's southeast coast: Koh Aew in Rawai and Koh Tanan in neighboring

In describing his company's approach, Mr Blignaut said, "We

are a non-profit company, but we are not a run-around-with-our-hats-in-our-hands company – we are tourism and community based."


The project's primary goal is conservation of primate species and other wildlife, increasing environmental awareness and supporting Phuket's tourism industry, he added.

The pair hope to open an attraction similar to their Monkeyland and Birds on Eden sanctuaries in South Africa's Plettenberg Bay, both of which have become major tourist attractions since they opened in 1998

The investors envision setting up Koh Aew as a world-class primate-research facility, where access would be restricted to primate academics, placing Thailand at the forefront of primate conservation.

Only academics from top research institutions such as Oxford University would be allowed on the island, he said.

"This project will put the island on the forefront – no buildings, only primates and their food. There will also be a Thai university involved, but we have not decided which one yet. Researching monkeys where people are hunting them, killing them and

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eating them is not ideal for [our work]," he said.

The deserted Koh Aew has some natural advantages in this regard, he said.

"Koh Aew is beachless and

no hotels or resorts have taken any interest. Monkeys, however, do not like beaches. The lack of beaches will also make it difficult for poachers to get on and off the island," he said.

Funding the research would be tourists, who would would have access to view the primates only at tiny Koh Tanan in

Chalong Bay, where a pier 60 meters long would serve as a sort of "shopfront" for the main sanctuary.

For a fee, tourists could view some 30 primates on display there or enjoy a meal or visit any of 40 stalls to be run by local people.

"Forty Thai families will have 40 little businesses on the

pier off Koh Tanan. This will help them, because the units will be free. The government would select which families would get them," he said.

The local community in

Chalong has expressed strong initial support for the project, which would be of particular benefit to longtail boatmen in Chalong Bay, Mr Blignaut said.

"This is an add-on for the boating community in Chalong. As they will have another stop for tourists, they can say, 'Hey we can go to the Monkey Is-

land.' We don't have any boats; the only boat we will have is to cart sewage. The longtail boats are going to bring people to the sanctuary."

Mr Blignaut said he hoped to develop Koh Aew as a world leader in primate conservation and maintain healthy populations of various species there until such time as they can be successfully

reintroduced into the wild – a process that could take hundreds of, or even 1,000, years, he said.

"Since our application last year, the governor has appointed a working committee to consider the project. The committee has already considered the environmental impacts of the project. We also have a top team from Prince of Songkla University in Haad Yai helping us study the environmental impact, both on land and in the sea," he said.

The researchers, who need to conclude two more surveys, are expected to submit their findings in September, he said.

"If we can get permission by October, then the island should be ready by April the following year," he said.

Strict environmental controls, similar to those that apply to the existing park in South Africa, would be put in place on both islands, he said.

"We have done extensive coral surveys. There will be minimal impact as we will only put non-destructive monkeys on the island. We try to make it as environmentally friendly as possible.

"People said to us, 'You've got to treat your sewage really well before you put it into the sea.' I said, "What do you mean? We don't put sewage in the sea – treated or untreated. All the sewage effluent will be taken back to the mainland to be put into the municipal waste treatment system," he said.

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cans' vision become a reality, Mr Blignaut said there would be about 30 species of new- and oldworld monkeys.

"We would probably have a few capuchins and other primates such as lemurs and persimmons. The goldenlegged tamarind would be the smallest, as any smaller and they

could get picked off by an eagle, apes or other animals," he said.

The pair have learned a great deal about such matters

from their existing projects.

"In South Africa we have Monkeyland and also bird sanctuary called Birds of Eden that has miniature monkeys. Three little monkeys can fit in a teacup. The miniature monkeys are kept in a 22-story-tall cage so that they are safe from predators.

"For the lemurs, there would be two males of each species so they can hang out together and not cross-pollinate. It is supposed to be a natural environment; we don't want to be breeding mongrel monkeys there. The research island is more for breeding – so that the primatologists can study them. This research would be some of the best in the world as the primates would be in a safe environment," he said.

Strict quarantine procedures would be maintained to prevent the spread of simian diseases and guards with a patrol boat would be on duty around the clock to prevent poaching, he added.

To move forward, the project will need the support and permission of Wichit and Rawai municipalities as well as a host of other government agencies.

Another matter that would have to be worked out would be whether the islands would be rented or the government would allow them to be used under a public-private investment

Despite the obstacles, Mr Blignaut is confident of success.

"We expect that the project will be ready to open sometime between April and December next year," he said.

"We estimate the total investment at about US\$3 million. We are a non-profit organization, but we realize that conservation has to pay for itself. Our main goal is preserving primates, not return on investment, but whatever the cost is, we will find a way to come up with the money," he said.

However, speaking with reporters a short time later, Gov Niran said that completing all the bureaucratic hurdles would be a long and arduous process.

The South Africans might have become unduly optimistic of success after the committee to study their proposal was formed, he added.

Both Wichit and Rawai municipalities already have their own plans to beautify the two islands and develop them into tourist attractions, he said.

"In my opinion, tourism promotion and development is always a positive thing, but the Thai government's administrative system can cause many difficulties for potential investors," he said.





reporter and a rescue worker were killed and 18 other people injured in a double bombing in Sungai Kolok, Narathiwat, on August 21.

Police said insurgents detonated a homemade bomb hidden inside a motorcycle about 500 meters from a night market in Sungai Kolok District, near the Malaysian border, at about 9 pm.

No one was injured in the first blast, but when reporters, police and other onlookers converged on the scene a second bomb hidden inside a car exploded.

Channel 9 reporter Phadung Wannaluck, the assistant district chief of Sungai Kolok and several police officers were among the injured.

The *Thai Rath* reporter, Chalee Boonsawat, had survived several bomb blasts in the past.

Rescue volunteer Chakrit Chaladthanakij died in hospital the following day.

Following a review of CCTV footage and searches involving more than 200 security personnel, eight people were detained for questioning.

Also in Narathiwat, six soldiers were slightly injured on the morning of August 25, when insurgents detonated a bomb near the Ban Bang Khunthong School in Tak Bai district.

Police said the bomb exploded shortly after the soldiers, who escorted teachers to the school, stopped to rest at a corner inside the school compound.

The bomb, buried near the corner, was detonated with a mobile phone.

Road trip. Police arrested three men in possession of more than 5,000 pills of *ya bah* (methamphetamine) after searching their car at a checkpoint in Surat Thani's Ban Nasan district August 20.

The men were identified as Sanit "Ung" Phlaichum, Thanetphong "Bao" Phuchitanon and

The men were stopped at a checkpoint on the Asia Highway in Village 2, Tambon Khuan Sri. In their car, police found 5,330 *ya bah* pills, a .22 pistol with six rounds of ammunition and 0.61 grams of cannabis.

Sanit admitted that he had got the car and the drugs from a man named Aekaphon, or "Aek", who lived in a flat in Bangkok's Huay Kwang district. He said he did not know the man's surname.

Sanit said that he was paid 4,700 baht to take the drugs from

Bangkok to a buyer in Phuket and that this was the third time he had made the trip, police said.

Thanetphong denied knowing anything about the *ya bah*, but admitted to possession of the cannabis while Pvt Phichanut denied any involvement with the drugs.

All three have been charged with drug and firearms offenses.

Dangerous business. Following the death of a 16-year-old schoolgirl in Krabi, a man and his daughter have been arrested for performing illegal abortions.

The girl, whose name was not released by police, died in Krabi Hospital at the beginning of August following a botched abortion. Public health officers notified police of the incident and a hunt for the practitioners of the abortion was launched.

The investigation led police to Samran Siriphan, 54, and his daughter Satha Siriphan, 32. After requesting arrest warrants for the pair, police on August 21 arrested them outside Rainbow Hotel in Muang Krabi's Tambon Pak Nam, where they were allegedly on their way to perform another abortion.

Police also seized a selection of equipment used to perform abortions including lengths of wire, rubber gloves and birth control pills.

After the arrest, police searched the home of Samran's estranged wife, Phuangphaka, where they found more equipment used for performing abortions. Phuangphaka, who split up with Samran about a year ago, denied any involvement in the operations, but police are continuing to treat her as a suspect.

Samran confessed that he had been carrying out abortions for about 20 years and had probably performed more than 10,000 operations over the years.

He said that he was educated only up to Prathom 4, but taught himself how to perform the procedure, police said.

Samran said that most of his customers were in Krabi, but he also traveled to perform abortions in other provinces in the South including Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Phang Nga, Trang and Phuket. His patients' ages ranged from 12 up to 47, but that most were teenagers, many of them Muslim.

He usually performed the procedures in hotel rooms, often taking no more than five minutes. He charged women 1,000 baht for each month they were pregnant. Most women found him by recommendations from former patients, he added.

Lt Col Chertphong Chiupricha, Inspector at Muang Krabi Police Station, said that Samran and Satha have been charged with causing death through performing an abortion.

Despite police appeals, no women who had abortions performed by the pair have come forward to testify or press charges.

Pricey pint. A monk in Surat Thani was sentenced to two months in prison for drinking in a temple on a holy day.

His drinking companion, a layman, was given a one-month prison term for his role.

Phrakhru Samuphanwisit Panyalo and Prasit Thaithong were arrested on July 17, Asarnha Bucha Day, a Buddhist festival commemorating the Buddha's first sermon, after villagers told police that the pair were drinking beer on the grounds of a temple in Phunphin district.

In delivering the verdict, the Surat Thani Civil Court judge said Phrakhru Samuphanwisit had been a monk for more than 10 years and had studied Buddhist theology to a high level.

As such, he should have been fully aware that drinking in a temple was a grave sin and in contravention of the Fifth Precept to abstain from intoxicants that cause heedlessness.

articipants at a recent seminar in Haad Yai on child prostitution and human trafficking pointed their fingers at police inefficiency and corruption.

leaders Student Songkhla's Haad Yai and Sadao districts asked police how it was possible that they were unable to locate brothels and karaoke bars offering prostitution, when such establishments were easily found by members of the public.

Both districts are used by traffickers to "rest" girls and women before they are smuggled into Malaysia.

The girls provide sex services to locals and foreigners during their brief stays.

The women and girls, who are either forced into or willing to enter the sex business, are from Burma, Laos, Vietnam, Cambodia and China, the seminar heard.

Chinese women are popular among Malaysian or Singaporean clients.

Willing local women are smuggled into Malaysia or Singapore through these channels.

Between 2004 and 2008, 532 cases of trafficking were reported to Malaysian authorities. Of these, 490 involved girls from

Police occasionally receive complaints from trafficked women who escape from brothels, but in almost every case the women, instead of receiving help, are charged with illegal entry.

A woman official said she always had to be careful about "which police officers" she approached for help.

"We are never certain about police officers we deal with. Are they on the traffickers' side? But we have no choice. We need the police to make arrests," she told the seminar.

Anant Dissara, chief of the provincial Human Development And Human Security Office, said more and more women were voluntarily entering the sex business, hoping to find a foreign tourist who would keep them as a mis-

Occupational hazard. More than 1,200 Thai workers seeking overseas jobs have fallen victim to placement scams in the past nine months, losing around 69 million baht, the Employment Department said.

Police corruption allows prostitution to flourish

In the past five years, South Korea has been the top labor importer, with more than 149,300 Thai workers going there. Other big importers of Thai labor are Japan and Qatar.

Prehistoric prints. Experts have confirmed the discovery of 210-million-year-old dinosaur footprints in the Northeastern province of Chaiyaphum.

Speaking at a press conference, Nakhon Ratchasima Rajabhat University rector Saowanit Saonanon said the discovery was significant because some of the prints were likely to be the oldest ever found for sauropod dinosaurs and carnosaurs.

ously unknown species," she said.

The ancient footprints, spread over a 50-square-meter area, were found early last month in Ban None Toom in Chaiyaphum's Nong Bua Daeng district.

A team of experts from the university's Petrified Wood and Mineral Resource Museum inspected the ancient footprints on July 26 and 27, she said.

The team classified the new prints after consulting with Dr Yoichi Azuma from Japan and Prof Dong Zhiming from China.

Khun Saowanit said her team would work with local authorities and the Mineral Resources Department to conserve the ancient footprints.

A dinosaur footprint exhibition will be held in Chaiyaphum from October 29.

Domestic debits. Low-income people with monthly salaries not exceeding 20,000 baht are the hardest-hit segment of society, with mounting debt as their incomes cannot cover rising expenses, according to a survey by the University of the Thai Chamber of Commerce.

The university's August poll found that the level of household debts hit a record high of 2.46 trillion baht, up 16.6% year-on-year.

"The figure clearly indicates that people are having serious cash-flow problems mainly due to the fact that their incomes do not cover the rising costs of living," said Thanavath Phonvichai, director of the university's Economic and Business Forecasting Center.

The findings came from a survey of 1,232 respondents from August 8 to 17 nationwide.

The poll found people have borrowed more this year for daily living expenses, transport costs, household expenses, healthcare and investment.

Total household debt accounts for 26% of the total gross domestic product. Debt per household rose to 135,166 baht this year from 116,681 baht last

Yajai Chuwicha, head of the Chamber Business Poll, said that more people have started to take on debt this year compared with last year, with 45% of total respondents saying they had a debt burden, compared with 21.8%

More people had also resorted to underground loans, 35% compared with 32% last year, he

Mothers' helper. A national guideline on the women's right to have children is being worked out to regulate specific public medical services for various groups of women, including those with disabilities or HIV/Aids.

Under the guideline, disabled women will be guaranteed technical advice from state hospitals to determine whether their unborn children are at risk of genetic disabilities. They will also get special government-provided care and support during preg-

Dr Sophon Mekthon, a deputy chief at the Department of Health helping to draft the guideline, cited a successful case under his supervision in which a healthy baby was born to parents with Aids after the mother was given intensive anti-Aids medication during the latter months of her pregnancy.

"The guideline will serve as an assurance such successes are possible over the long term," he said.


The 13-point guideline covers maternity care, birth control, prevention of venereal diseases, teen pregnancy, family planning, sex education and abortion.

It is being developed by officials from the Public Health, Education, Social Development And Human Security ministries and police. The guideline is expected to be approved by Cabinet by December.

ow upon row of overpriced concrete blocks are shooting up like mushrooms all over the place here in Khao Lak.

While at least 50 or so shophouses in the area are still unoccupied, it appears to be trendy for local businesspeople to erect even more of them.

Several old shops and restaurants near Khao Lak center were demolished and are now replaced by either shophouses or, worse, so-called "plazas".

Plazas are being erected with the aim of squeezing maximum income out of as little space as possible. These plazas are usually designed in a U-shape, with a square block of shops in the center. The space is then broken up into tiny squares of approximately two-by-two meters, which are then rented out for a ridiculously overpriced fee that has to be paid for six months or one year in advance.

Some plaza owners even ask tenants for "key money", a lump sum to be paid in cash at the beginning of the rental period.

Key money is usually paid if one rents a rewarding walk-in location where a lot of business is to be expected. Looking at the location of some of these plazas, one wonders how anyone could even consider renting a shop there to sell T-shirts or souvenirs while paying at least 100,000 baht per year plus key money.

Obviously the plaza owners have not learned anything from the past. History has taught that usually the rows closest to the main road will be occupied, while the shops located further away will stay empty forever.

Making just half of the earnings expected, the plaza owners will then raise the rent for the frontage shops in the years to follow, causing even more tenants to leave. Once the plaza is empty, it is then demolished to be replaced by shophouses — an-


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

s the number 9 is considered auspicious in Thailand, most provinces have some kind of nine-temple tour. Although these tours are very popular in Ayudhaya and Bangkok, Phuket has yet to have an official ninetemple tour.

What it does have, though, is a nine-sacred-sites tour, which makes for an informative trip around the island that introduces many aspects of the island's history to those who undertake it.

This week the Gazette looks at the first on the list of Phuket's nine sacred sites, Wat Pra Tong and will follow with more in later editions. Before we get into the story, just a reminder that when visiting temples one should dress appropriately, meaning that it's best to cover up with long-sleeve shirts and long pants.

Wat Pra Tong can be accessed via Soi Nanai or Soi Wat Pra Tong off Thepkrasattri Rd. Coming from Sarasin Bridge, the soi to enter is about 300 meters past Thalang Hospital.

Wat Pra Tong has many curios to entertain visitors, some of them ironic choices to adorn temple grounds, such as the giant metal ball at the main entrance to the temple. Take a closer look at this and you'll discover that it is a World War II anti-submarine bomb.

The botanical gardens of the temple have interesting signs that explain the medicinal properties of each species of plant. Having a Thai person accompany you might be a good idea if you cannot read Thai and would like to understand all the explanations given.

There are several buildings in the temple grounds and two of them are particularly interesting: the main chapel with its bizarre half Buddha image and a quaint museum. If the museum appears to be closed, find the steps at the

side of the building and enter from the second floor. If the door is locked, you can just go and ask one of the monks to have it

Dotted around the temple grounds are many other interesting things to see, such as ancient canons, the image of a cemetery guardian and Malaysian bantams strutting around.

The museum and temple are both free to visit. There is a souvenir shop in the main chapel where you can buy beautiful trinkets. A pendant for the day of the week that you were born on costs 10 baht for a small one or 20 baht for a larger one.

Apart from the main Buddha images, there is also a series of Buddha images in poses, each representing a different day of the week. Visitors who know which day of the week they were born on pray to the Buddha image that represents their birthday.

The temple was originally built by a Hokkien man called Kong Leng who discovered tin in Thalang and traveled overland to Surat Thani and then by boat to Ayudhaya to bestow gifts before the king. He received the royal title Orkyasurintaraja and was appointed Lord of Thalang. He then acquired rights to a tax-free tin monopoly in Takuapa.

the Chao Praya River and out to sea, he took slaves with him to work in the mines.

He thought that another area nearby had fung shui suitable for accommodation for his workers and so he built Wat Pra Tong as a center for Theravada Buddhists and another Sarn Jao shrine for Tao Buddhists.

A half-Buddha image that locals call Phra Put is a local legend, which has it that a boy tied his buffalo to a mud-covered stone while out one day.

The next morning the boy died and then the buffalo died. His father dreamed that his son had tied the buffalo somewhere inappropriately and had a vision of a golden Buddha.

The next day he went to dig When he sailed back down in the spot he'd dreamed about

and discovered a half-Buddha

Another legend has it that when the Burmese looted Thalang they could not carry the Buddha image, so then put it in gold before taking it to Wat Pra Tong. Any person who tried to remove the Buddha image was attacked by ants, hornets, wasps and bees.

It is believed that the original gold Buddha came from Tibet 2,000 years ago. After the son of King Rama VII came to Phuket, the golden image was encased in a larger image by the Department of Fine Arts to further protect it from would-be thieves.

There are some initials inscribed on the chapel. These are an abbreviated signature signed by King Rama IX when he visited the temple on March 11, 1959.

The Gazette will be covering the other sacred sites in forthcoming issues. Many tourists like to spend considerable time in the tranquil surroundings of these sites just soaking up the serenity, history and culture, rather than trying to race around all nine in one day. Amazin' Arabian

his week's guest chef is the female half of the husbandand-wife team, Israeli expat Shicartzy Ovadia and his Thai wife Benjama, or Ben, as she prefers to be called. The couple lay claim to opening one of the first restaurants to serve Israeli dishes on the island when they established The Family Mediterranean Restaurant in Chalong about eight years ago.

Since then it has become well known for its wide variety of Mediterranean dishes, such as falafel, hummus and Greek salads.

Over the years, Khun Ben has worked hard to learn how to cook a wide variety of Mediterranean dishes and to recreate them as authentically as possible.

Ovadia said that this hasn't been easy to do because in Israel, dishes such as hummus are made fresh every day and never kept more than a few hours.

Whatever is left over is given away because it will soon begin to go off.

He explained that The Family are able to ensure the freshness of their dishes – even in the tropics – not by using additives or preser-



vatives, but by making batches of hummus that are frozen straight away then transferred to a fridge that was specially made for the restaurant that keeps the food cool enough to be scooped and served when ordered.

More recently, Khun Ben has been learning how to cook what Ovadia calls "pure Arabic" dishes, such as couscous, moussaka, stuffed vegetables and salads, such as tabbouleh and *laban*, which are made from cheeses and yogurts.

Their new specialty dish, however, and the recipe for which they have gracefully allowed the *Gazette* to publish, is Arabian kebabs, which are shaped like fat sausages and served on long sticks accompanied by a simple salad.

K. Ben said that most of the ingredients are readily available in Phuket, except for Arabic spices.

"We get our spices by asking friends to bring some with them when they visit us as we've never been able to find it anywhere else. People who can't find Arabic spices can try using other blends of mixed spice instead," she said.

Arabian Kebabs Serves 4

200g Minced beef
Chopped parsley
A pinch of cumin
Chopped garlic
¹/₄ Onion
¹/₂ an egg (beaten)
Roast cashew nuts (crushed)
Bread crumbs
Mixed Arabian spices
Black pepper (ground)
Chili (crushed)

Method

Simply mix all the kebab ingredients together in a bowl until the mixture can be shaped into individual kebabs and grill them on medium heat until cooked.

The garlic, pepper and chili do not have to be exact measurements. Anything from a pinch to a spoonful of each, depending on one's taste.

Arabic Salad Ingredients

1-2 large cucumbers (finely chopped) 1 onion (finely chopped) 1 tomato (finely chopped) 1 green bell pepper (finely chopped)

Gazette: Aren't government workers supposed to retire when they reach 60?

Khun Prapan: I cannot stop working in the mortuary and forensic laboratory of Vachira Phuket Hospital. I continue to help the doctors carry out autopsies because I love my job and also because I do not want to burden my sons, forcing them to take care of me. Even though I officially retired two years ago, I'm still working so that I can support myself. I think I will keep doing this job until I run out of energy or maybe when my wife retires in a few year's time.

Gazette: When did you start working at Vachira Phuket

Khun Prapan: I began in 1970. I started off in the operating room. They were shortstaffed at the time, so I had to help out in the mortuary. I now have a lot more responsibility. I have to inject formalin into the corpses [to stop them from decomposing] and also dress and make up the bodies to try and make them look as presentable

Gazette: Do you ever feel scared doing this job?

Khun Prapan: I have seen many corpses of people who have all died in many different ways, such as in accidents, by suicide or from disease. I'm not afraid of the corpses, however, because they used to be alive just like us and nobody can avoid death – we are all mortals.

I think that if I make them look good, or at least look better, then they will find the stairway to heaven. I believe that the living can be more horrible than the dead anyway; the dead are just dead bodies and they don't hurt

I start work at about 7:30 am and finish at 4:30 pm. Sometimes I like to be on night duty [until midnight] and work alone

akhon Sri Thammarat native Prapan Sriharan, 62, graduated from high school in 1966 and came to work Phuket. His first job was as an embroiderer, but when he heard that Vachira Phuket Hospital was recruiting, he put his name forward and got himself a new job.

Instead of stitching cloth, however, his new career saw him stitching bodies back together so they would look as good as possible when relatives came to claim them. The Gazette's Natcha Yuttaworawit talks to Vachira Phuket Hospital's mortician.

because I have no fear and I have never seen anything

I have never seen a corpse wake up. If someone dies in a hospital then the body must stay there for at least two hours before it can be taken to the morgue. This is for two reasons. First, the relatives may wish to be with the dead body. Second is to remove any doubt as to whether the person is really dead.

Gazette: What if no-one comes to pick up a body?

Khun Prapan: There are many corpses that aren't collected by friends or relatives, so we just wash the body and wait for two weeks before we send it to the [Kusoldharm] Foundation. All of the corpses that are uncollected are now kept at the cem-

Gazette: How many staff work in the morgue?

Khun Prapan: Now we have four staff, including myself and a doctor. Sometimes we have to work on one corpse at the same time, because there's so much to do if the person was in a serious accident.

We have Dr Somchai Yinprasert, a new forensic scientist at the hospital, who was trained by Thailand's famous Dr Pornthip. He just arrived this month and hopefully he can help minimize the time that bodies

must stay in the morgue.

Today there are more people dying from accidents, disease and murder, so we need to perform more autopsies. Although we might be overworked sometimes, there are actually some days when we have nothing to do.

Gazette: Are there any difficulties associated with your

Khun Prapan: Not really. We can always improvise and compromise. We only have 10 fridges here, each built to hold one body each. If we have more than 10 corpses then I have to make bunks for the bodies so that they can share a fridge together. We always make sure that they are in their own fridge if we know that someone is coming to pick up the body.

Bodies often come in from road accidents, cut in half, dismembered or decapitated, and so I must do my best to stitch the body parts back together. If a brain or heart is popping out then I try to put it back in again.

Sometimes people bring me a skeleton for autopsy. The clothes of the deceased are the best clue as to who they may be and sometimes relatives recognize the clothes.

Doing autopsies is not easy. If someone has been shot, for example, then we need to consult with police, doctors and rela-

tives before removing the bullets, as this could be a way of tampering with a murder case investigation.

Gazette: Are the corpses you deal with mostly Thai?

Khun Prapan: Not at all. We have all nationalities here. Originally this was the only morgue on the island. There is another one now, but this is still the main morgue. The large private hospitals usually send their corpses here too.

I pity not only the Thais, but all nationalities who die in Thailand. Some of them are alone with no relatives to claim the body, so that's when I really feel sad.

Cambodian and Burmese bodies are the most common foreign fatalities on the island. Most of them were laborers and usually they were murdered or were in a drunken brawl.

A lot of the time nobody asks for the bodies, so we just wash them and cover the corpses with white handwoven cloth before sending them to the [Kusoldharm] foundation. I feel depressed whenever some poor relatives say they don't have enough money to pay for the formalin, but at least I have my own private stash of formalin that I can donate to them.

If they are Buddhists then I can dress the corpse, but usually if they are Christians or Muslims we call a priest or mullah to perform these services. The methods of cleaning, dressing and placing the hands on the body are different for each religion.

After the tsunami, all four staff were working hard with so many corpses being sent to the hospital. Luckily there were national foundations that sent officers to help us. There were no problems with the limited area because there were containers for most of the bodies.

Some of the dead were decaying and could not be clothed, so we just laid the clothes on the bodies to cover them.

I don't get stressed with my work, even though there are conflicts. Sometimes we have problems talking to relatives of the deceased.

I have a lot of experience dealing with people and know about many races, nationalities and religions. In the end it's all the same, regardless of creed or color


Gazette: Any advice for foreigners coming to pick up a corpse?

Khun Prapan: There are only two places that I know of here in Phuket that sell coffins. One is opposite Wat Saen Suk and the other is *here*, opposite the mortuary.

There are many old foreigners who pass away in their retirement homes and the relatives are often frustrated that they need the correct documentation before I can release a body from the morgue.

To collect the body of a foreigner the following documents should be brought to me: a death certificate, passport of the deceased, passport of the person collecting the body and a document from the appropriate embassy certifying that they are the correct person to be picking up the body.

Also, don't forget the nominal fees made for the formalin injections and cleaning of the body.

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Phuket gets hauled into global aviation crisis

he airline industry is experiencing one of its worst tailspins since the 9/11 attacks and Phuket will not escape the fallout.

This doomsday scenario is shared by many in the industry because of the ongoing impact of rising oil prices. Airlines pay a lot more for refined jet fuel than the standard price per barrel quoted in the media.

The International Air Transport Association (IATA), which represents about 290 airlines, said that in Asia-Pacific, international passenger traffic growth fell to 3.2% from 4.5% in June. In cargo the situation is worse: Asia-Pacific led the world with a 4.8% drop year-on-year.

Giovanni Bisignani, IATA's Director General and CEO commented: "The airline sector is in trouble. Losses this year could reach US\$6.1 billion, more than wiping out the US\$5.6 billion airlines made in 2007. Falling demand and rising costs are shaping the industry." Airlines including British Airways and American are talking merger to ensure long term survival and there have been a string of loss announcements, especially by US carriers.

To give you an idea of how much fuel has risen since 2003, here are some statistics. In 2003, fuel was 14% of an airline's operating costs, the average price per barrel of crude oil was US\$28.8 and the total fuel cost for the airline industry was US\$44 billion. Fast forward to 2008 (based on June figures) and fuel is 36% of operating costs, the average price of a barrel of crude oil is US\$122 (since reduced) and the total fuel bill is US\$189 billion.

The good news for Phuket could be that demand in the Middle East-Asia market remains strong compared with the rest of the world. Global economy travel continues to grow at 3.4% in June compared with the previous year, but the IATA said demands appears to be slowing.

From a Phuket perspective, while the overall global situation is depressing, with Phuket developers and hoteliers targeting the Middle East and lucrative Asian markets such as Hong Kong, Japan, Singapore and China, the trends within Middle East-Asia are more encouraging.

So how is this affecting Phuket? The Nok Air grounding of six aircraft because of rising fuel costs was a typical example of what is happening worldwide. It had an immediate effect on passengers transiting through Suvarnabhumi Airport to Phuket, with many not being able to obtain flights for days, thus ruining their holidays. Nok Air's subsequent decision to fly on weekends helps a bit, but it is only a sticking plaster.

Nok Air's dilemma underscores a deeper problem with the Thailand aviation environment. The airline opted, indeed pushed, to fly out of the old Don Mueang Airport to keep landing fees and other costs down as Suvarnabhumi was too expensive for its form of low-cost model. As a result, Nok Air was not picking up many of the hundreds of thousands of transit passengers coming through Suvarnabhumi and on

such as Phuket.

There is now consideration being given to the airline going back to Suvarnabhumi so it can pick up this traffic in co operation with its nominal

"parent", THAI Airways.

Even better than transit passengers through Bangkok would be an increase in direct flights to Phuket. With direct flights from Japan, Singapore, China, Hong Kong and Australia, and more than a dozen charter flights out of the far northern hemisphere, Phuket is well served. But if the continued growth in hotel rooms is to be profitably served, we need more. THAI has resumed Narita-Phuket flights, but with its current financial difficulties, its options to expand operations are limited in the short term.

Michael Ayling, managing director of Laguna Phuket Resorts and Hotels, the island's biggest hotel group, made the pertinent comment in a recent *Phuket Gazette* "First Person" column that Phuket must not allow itself to be lured into a false sense of security as a destination.

Mr Ayling wants to see more attractions built, such as theme parks and water parks, to lure visitors. These and other destination-marketing ideas are very good, but they will mean very little if air services to Phuket are reduced or seriously disrupted by

the current aviation global crisis.

At this stage the most optimistic scenario for Phuket would be:

• One-Two-Go, grounded by the Department of Civil Aviation for

safety and legal reasons, meets all requirements and receives its operating certificate back. One-Two-Go and Nok Air's groundings have put unprecedented, but profitable, pressure on Thai Air Asia and THAI Airways to meet demand with existing capacity.

• One-Two-Go re-emerges as a "unique" budget carrier with more full-service benefits. This is something the company is said to be working on.

• Nok Air continues its weekend flights and, in the meantime, undergoes a substan-

tial restructuring of the business by moving to Suvarnabhumi and adjusting its schedule and route network to co-ordinate with THAI Airways and to pick up more international transit passengers.

• THAI Airways increases capacity to cover the Nok Air shortfall, assuming One-Two-Go resumes flights. If it does not, THAI would have to look at increasing capacity through more flights or larger aircraft on some flights to cover the shortfall.

• Thai Air Asia is in a similar position to THAI. It would need to look at increasing capacity to get its share of a larger market created by the absence, or reduced services, of the other airlines. However, as a low-cost carrier it has more constraints on it to increase capacity quickly on such a short-haul route.

• The charter businesses in places such as Scandinavia and around Asia continue to come to Phuket despite the oil prices. Many hotels and short-stay condominium complexes are geared to this market, mainly from Russia and Scandinavia.

These scenarios, apart from the last one, are contingent on One-Two-Go getting airborne again – a 50-50. The results of the investigation into the crash are ex-

pected to be delivered to a highpowered committee in Thailand at the end of September.


So far, the Thai-based airlines have resisted taking the drastic action some US airlines have taken, or are considering, such as removing in-flight entertainment, charging for IFE headphones, virtually eliminating food on domestic flights and applying extra charges for baggage.

Even these airlines cannot escape the safety issue. Two of the biggest – Southwest Airlines and United Airlines – face stiff fines for allegedly breaching safety regulations.

It would be fair to say that this current fuel crisis and its impact on the aviation industry, including in Thailand, has been much more severe and long lasting than many other crises.

We can only hope that, coupled with a slowdown in world demand, the forces causing the oil crisis will pull back and we can get on with building Phuket, through aviation, as one of the world's premier tourist destinations.

In science, oxygen has an affiliation with the number 8. It is the element with atomic number 8 and makes up 88.8% of the mass of water. In music, scales are divided into eight notes – an octave.

abound in the theater, but the one everybody remembers is about not wishing someone "Good luck", but that they "Break a leg" instead.

Now, I'm not a terribly superstitious chap, but, after accidentally mumbling "Good luck" before the Andaman Players took to the stage at the Playhouse in Patong, I thought I had better look into how to lay any possible curse I may have brought upon us. I vaguely remembered that it had something to do with spinning around three times, pinching my nose and throwing a cat over my

shoulder... or something like that.

Not wishing to upset one of my cats unduly, I thought it best to do a bit of serious in-depth research first (translation: at least to the second page of a Google search)

and what I found out left me staggered. There are almost as many web pages about theatrical superstitions as there are about Britney Spears, which makes me wonder if people are taking both subjects a little too seriously.

Most of these sites, akin to the ones about Little Miss Toxic, are annoyingly repetitious, basically spouting the same old superstitions and their histories and offering little in the way of curseremoval solutions. Worst of all, it left me wondering just how many superstitions we'd broken since we first took to the stage last December.

For instance, did you know that wearing green on stage is considered incredibly bad luck (apparently Moliere died wearing a green night shirt), unless you're in Italy where purple is the colore sformato, while Spanish actors refuse to wear yellow (anyone know why?).

Fresh flowers on stage are also considered unlucky, but – as one sharp director pointed out this is probably because fresh flowers need replacing daily and that's very bad luck for the producer's wallet.

My cats were relieved to find out that I wouldn't be lobbing them about anytime soon, because cats in theaters are considered very good luck... unless you kick one, which is very bad luck. Apparently this superstition dates back to the Pharaohs – and we all know what happened to them, don't we.

Then I remembered that Tony Kelsey-Stead's costume in the play Adjoined – in which he plays a drunken Italian hotelier – includes a pair of Garfield slip-

rcane superstitions pers. Does standing on fluffy representations of cats count as a theatrical curse? Eek!

Still, only two more performances of that play and Night in a Bar Room to go – Royal Phuket Marina on August 30 and then our final show of these two comedies will be back at the Green Man on September 6. Extra milk rations for Tibbles between now and then should keep that curse

According to some sources, giving the director a bunch of flowers on opening night is very good luck for the actors, but the flowers need to be stolen from a newly filled grave. Ugh! And why

is this good luck? Because it saves those skin-flint actors from having to pay out for winning the director's favor.

But what about "Break a leg"? Well, there are so many ridiculous reasons for this saying

that I don't know where to begin. Some of the weirdest of these include a reference to John Wilkes Booth, who, having just shot Lincoln, broke his leg leaping onto the stage (yeah, that'll teach him to go around shooting presidents); Shakespearean audiences throwing the furniture about if they enjoyed the show (breaking many chair legs in the process?); and opining understudies wishing ill to their on-stage counterparts and thus causing the opposite.

Still, just to be on the safe side, I'll curb my desire to slip the name of the Scottish play into my next script ("I've finished laying the tarmac, Beth.") because I've just read about a theater company that called itself Defying Macbeth in an attempt to reveal the theatrical folly behind not mentioning that name. Terrible performances and poor audiences proved otherwise.





Most of the guests currently booked in to stay at the spa are Taiwanese, though the target nationalities for the spa also include Chinese, Japanese and Korean.

HomePro to expand with new Phuket branch

CHALONG: Despite gloomy economic forecasts in property markets around the world, home products chain Home Product Center Plc (HomePro) is seeing rising profits across Thailand and is now expanding its presence in Phuket.

Under construction on five rai on Chao Fa West Rd near Chalong circle, on the former site of an open-air night market, is a 10,000-square-meter HomePro retail center.

The project is expected to open in December, giving the island a second HomePro in addition to the existing branch at the Tesco-Lotus supercenter.

The project, which is valued at 500 million baht, will have a display area of 6,500sqm for HomePro household products and 3,500sqm of rental space for other businesses.

Financial results for Home Product Center Plc for the second quarter of 2008 (April to June) show net profits of 386.85 million baht, a 26.57% increase

on the same period last year.

The company showed second-quarter revenue of 8.668 billion baht throughout the country, a 14.59% rise over the previous year's performance.

HomePro Managing Director Khunawut Thampromkul said that HomePro's growth, despite operating under poor economic conditions, is coming from continued strong sales from its existing branches.

The expansion of new branches and the operation of HomePro Expo events have also contributed to the company's bottom line.

HomePro's profits from rental and service fees are also on the rise. In 2007, revenue in this area was 300.39 million baht, an increase of 21.55 million baht or 7.73% from 2006. Rental and service fees are earned from business operators who rent shop space at HomePro branches throughout the country and include income from Home Pro Expo events.

Other income, from non-retail areas including sales promotions and other services, was 259.78 million baht in 2007, an increase of 50.88 million baht or 24.36% from the previous year.

Khun Khunawut added that rising costs are expected to cut into profits during the second half of this year. Sales and management system costs for HomePro in the second quarter this year were 1.96 billion baht, a rise of 240.9 million baht or 14% over the same period in 2007.

Despite the rising costs, K. Khunawut said he expects sales revenue to grow by 15% this

he credit crunch is now more than a year old and, presumably, many people suppose that it is an old story. Unfortunately, it is not as simple as it seems.

Not only is the credit crunch spreading globally, but it appears that what America has feared for so long is taking place: a Wall Street problem is turning into a Main Street problem. In other words, there has been a transition from a purely "remote" financial crisis to one that affects most people's lives.

The oft-quoted Art Cashin, the director of floor trading operations for UBS in the United States, has offered a new look at the situation on the television business channel CNBC.

His latest concern is the effect that poor-quality car loans and credit card debt problems are going to add to a badly stressed financial sector. He believes that it will be approximate to a "minor tsunami". This is basically credit crunch: part two – and it should not be assumed that it will be over any time soon.

One major US banking group reported to clients that it expects the Chinese government to shortly introduce a stimulus package of up to US\$58 billion. This may seem to be somewhere between improbable and ridiculous. The Chinese economy's latest growth figures reflect 10.1% growth, which is simply enormous and so rapid as to be almost out of control. And there have been rumors that the Chinese government will stimulate

it further. Should there be any truth in this rumor, and certainly the Shanghai stock market index rose 7.48% in a single day, then we can only assume that China is feeling the first effects of the slowdown in global growth.

We live in such a competitive society and it seems that if you don't fit a certain stereotype then you can't be accepted by others at school or work, in your family, among friends and so on.







The perfect existential surf tale

ritics have called Tim Winton, born in 1960, the best Australian novelist of his generation and they are absolutely right. His main turf is the coastal villages of Western Australia.

His nine novels are replete with amazing physical detail, vivid characters and crisp, realistic dialog. His only weakness, sometimes, is plot, in which invariably tortured characters move about aim-

But his ninth novel, a slender gem called *Breath* (Farrar, Straus and Giroux, New York, 2008, 218pp), is sheer perfection. It's also, as far as I know, the first prose masterpiece about surfing.

Once again we're in a small coastal village named Sawyer in Western Australia. The time is the early 1970s and the narrator Pikley recalls a humdrum life enlivened only by surfing. When he's 13, he and a daredevil named Loonie team up to surf with young men who alternatively ignore and taunt them. They in turn idolize Sando, a 35-year-old masterful surfer who ignores them.

A middle-aged Pikley, reflecting on his youth, recalls the fascination that surfing held for him:

"How strange it was to see men do something beautiful. Something pointless and elegant, as though nobody saw or



cared. In Sawyer, a town of millers and loggers and dairy farmers, men did solid, practical things, mostly with their hands... There wasn't much room for beauty in the lives of our men."

The lyrical descriptions of surfing are stupendous, almost hallucinogenic. Here Pikley is, shivering with fear, addled and breathless, describing his first 10-foot

"The third wave began its slow left turn towards me. It looked as big as the pub and as it began to break the sound rattled my ribs. I turned my little stubby Hawke around and paddled. I paddled, I must add, without vigour, and in a moment the wave was upon me, its mass overtaking me so fast that it felt as though I was travelling backwards. All about was seething vapour. I hung right up in the boiling nest of foam at its very peak, suspended in noise and unbelief, before I began to

fall out and down in a welter of blinding spray. I only got to my feet from instinct, but there I suddenly was, upright and alive, skittering in front of all that jawing mess with my little board chattering underfoot. It was hard to credit the speed, the way the wave hauled itself upright in my path as it found shallower water. All I could do was squat and aim in hope."

Pikley and Loonie are surfing alone when they meet Sando on the beach, who offers to let them store their boards at

his house rather than bicycle with them all the way back to Sawyer. Sando is a huge muscular man with long hair, beard and

And his house is of outlandish size too, a "hippie house" of mostly one big room, up on tree trunks and surrounded by hammock-strung verandas. Living with Sando is his wife Eva, a peevish American blonde with a mysterious limp.

Sando becomes a mystic guru to his two young disciples, teaching a life of overcoming fear for a life of extraordinary ex-

> perience and leading them further up the coast to secret bays with 20-foot waves and murderous reefs. A wipe-out on one of these can mean death.

> "For a half second I saw the shadow of the reef far below. The heavy board fell from under me like a leaf and I sprawled down the hard, unyielding face without it, bouncing from hip to hip, unable to break the skin of the water. I was falling down a staircase – one that never seemed to end, which collapsed on me and shot me skyward before snatching

me down again so its rubble-spill might drive me headlong across the reef, rattling and wracking me all the way. I bounced and pinged and shot, winded and half blind, across the shoal.'

These glorious descriptions are eventually overshadowed by the doom that lurks over the little cult of Sando and Eva and Pikley and Loonie. I'll leave you to discover the gripping plot.

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How to get from Koh Aew to Koh Ling

Plans by two South African conservationists to create an island primate sanctuary in Phuket is one of the more novel ideas put forward in recent years for the area, which attracts its fair share of tourismbased investment schemes. [See Inside Story, page 5.]

The would-be developers first park, Monkeyland, opened in South Africa's Plettenberg Bay a decade ago. Since then, it has become an important eco-attraction; raising public awareness about the destruction of primates' natural habitats.

After meeting with the South Africans, however, Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit told reporters the pair may have had their hopes raised a bit too high by the fact that a committee was studying the plan. In fact, a huge number of bureaucratic hurdles would need to be overcome to transform Koh Aew into "Koh Ling", he warned.

For a start, the project would require permission and support from not only two municipalities, Rawai and Wichit, but also co-operation from Chalong and the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization, which runs the pier that would be the main jumping-off point for visitors. The Customs, Livestock, Quarantine and the Forestry Departments and CITES Office would all have to be involved in the import of primates, while gaining permission to build a pier anywhere in Phuket is always problematic.

Given the daunting bureaucratic issues involved, the Gazette would like to suggest that the developers approach the Bangkokbased Designated Areas for Sustainable Tourism Administration (Dasta). This is a public organization under the Tourism and Sports Ministry that has the authority to fast track community-based sustainable tourism projects.

The Monkey Island project seems far more practical and better suited to Dasta's mandate than the 100-billion-baht Ao Phuket project that it expressed interest in administering earlier this year.

In contrast, the would-be developers of Monkey Island say they could have the island up and running some time next year for just over 100 million baht – if they can cut through all the red tape.

If the project ever does move forward, some of the design aspects as put forward by the developers in their Initial Environmental Evaluation briefing might need to be modified.

For example, despite the developer's commitment to conservation, it is hard to believe that 40 Thai stall operators confined to a single pier would meticulously collect and cart off all of their sewage and waste to the mainland for proper disposal. If it did happen, it would certainly be a first for Thailand. - The Editor

Back road bottleneck blues

PIA taking action on airport taxi and tour touts

FIRST PERSON

Narong Julasevok, Director of the Security Division at Phuket International Airport (PIA), has had enough of the long string of problems with the taxi service outside PIA. Pushy touts and transport agents have long topped the list of grievances brought up by tour-



ists arriving to Phuket by airplane. The Service and Security Center has been called to action and Khun Narong has vowed to stamp out any problems.

he Service and Security Center is not a new project. Actually, we began it a long time ago to offer guests convenience and safety and deal with any problems associated with the taxi service. We will have one large desk that will seat three staff. It will be in front of the taxi area. Our plan is to have it there so that if we see anything that isn't right, we can deal with it right away and charge the people responsible.

On September 1, we will initiate a fresh plan of action for using the center.

We are committed to doing the best job possible and if any staff do not uphold our high standards then they will be disciplined. This order to shape up the system came from the director of Phuket International Airport.

However, we have a limited number of security guards who can work there now. We will increase the number soon to offer an efficient and effective security service for all visitors to

Come September 1, we will address eight major topics that we believe need our attention:

- 1. There must not be any thieves, "black" taxis or rented cars in the taxi area.
- 2. All visitors to the airport must be provided safety by PIA.
- 3. Hotel staff and travel agency staff waiting out in the taxi area should be there only if their services have been reserved by incoming guests.
- 4. All hotel staff and travel agency staff must show a name

badge and wear their company uniform.

5. The curbside parking area is to be used only by VIP cars for PIA and hotel staff. Permission is only granted to drop off people catching a place.

6. Only two staff from each hotel or travel agency can be in the taxi area at any one

7. Hotel and travel agency staff are not permitted to solicit business from people waiting in the indoor seating area.

8. Hotel and travel agency staff are not permitted to pick up any guests other than their own customers.

We have already outlined the charges to fine anyone who does not follow these rules. Airport Act 1979 states that anyone a fine of between 50 and 2,000

I don't want to fine anyone, but I want everyone to follow the rules. We need to keep the area nice and tidy. The taxi area should only be filled with guests who have arrived here by flight, nobody else.

PIA has already sent letters to the Thai Hotel Association, TAT region 4 Office, the Phuket Tourist Association, Tah Chat Chai Police Station and the Phuket Tourist Police to inform them of the current situation and our plans of action.

We also have some problems with the car park area. Some drivers like to park in the no-parking zones, which makes a problem for traffic moving

through the airport grounds. We will introduce measures to deal with this soon.

On September 1, we will start to strictly fine people who violate the rules of the taxi area. We have an operations center inside the airport building. Every day, officers from Tah Chat Chai Police Station and the Phuket Tourist Police will work with CCTV-camera operators and PIA security staff to deal with the problems.

Everybody will act quickly to inform the security guards at the taxi area whenever there is anything that looks suspicious. If a person commits an offense then we will be able to charge them in a matter of minutes.

I am considering buying a new boat with three other people as equal-share owners, all foreigners. The vessel will be Thai registered from new.

I have been advised that a new vessel can be registered in the name of only one person.

Once the boat has been registered, we would then have to apply for an alteration to the registration document at additional

Is this correct? If so, please provide a summary of the additional costs.

There is no regulation saying that the boat's registration must be registered in only one person's name. You can register the owners all together, but to do that all of the owners must have the names on all relevant documents involved in buying the boat.

When you come to register the boat, you must bring all of the owners' documents together for the registration progress.

Often, when a single boat has more than two owners, it is

I can't give any figures of the registration fees for you now as there are many different fees for boat registration, depending on the boat's size, engine, purchasing details, whether it was imported or built here and so on.

or any social anthropologist worth his clipboard, the streets of Pattaya would surely be akin to studying a human-sized Petri dish when it comes to the mating habits of homosapiens.

Yet, to the best of my limited knowledge, no reputable (or disreputable) seat of learning has ever bothered to descend en masse to conduct the kind of research for which foundations and think-tank agencies hand over fistfuls of dollars.

Instead, mating studies, be they of humans, zoological specimens, poultry or woolly mammoths, tend to take place in areas like Vermont in the United States or Cornwall in England.

The findings in these studies seem to surprise the majority of the researchers. Yet I can't help thinking if they had spent just two weeks in the maelstrom of evenings on Walking Street, getting a little inebriated in the company of scantily clad ladies of easy virtue and poorly attired foreign men of equally easy virtue, the results would have been arrived at in a far speedier fash-

The cost of the research, even allowing for such unusual items as lady drinks and bar fines,

The age-old old-age question

would have been so economically efficient that the same group of researchers would be able to find an excuse to come back year on year for further "confirmation" of their original findings.

The above preamble was brought on by the findings of an overseas-conducted study, this time by a pair of boffins from the eminent Stanford University, who discovered that men tend to marry down in age no matter whether they're wealthy or poor, educated or possess the IQ of a

The research showed that the older a man is when he marries after 40, no matter if he's successful in terms of monetary wealth or educational level, the greater the chance of his bride being significantly younger.

"If you look at guys who do marry, the poor guys marry down in age just as much as the rich guys do," said Paula England, a



Stanford University sociologist and co-author of the study. "That was kind of surprising to us." (What she really meant: surprising to her.)

Men in their 40s tend to marry women who are an average of seven years younger; men in their 50s are marrying brides an average 11 years younger; men in their 60s go even further in tending to marry women who are 13 years younger.

Men in Pattaya marry women who are anywhere between their milk teeth and the final year of high school. That's not really true, but if the age difference of anywhere between a quarter and half a century – the average in Fun Town – is taken into account then it may as well be.

England and her research partner, Elizabeth McClintock of Stanford, said the male ideal of beauty is found in women in their early 20s. Did I hear a "Here, here!" from the Pattaya Old Fat Bastards' Collective? That ideal remains fixed for men (and advertising industry executives, Hollywood, Bollywood, Thai movie makers, clothes designers and... need I go on?), even while they are growing older.

More people are marrying later in life, often for the second or third time, and with older and younger men chasing younger women, the law of supply and demand has made the marriage market a tough place for middleaged people of both genders, according to England.

For middle-aged men, the marriage market is tougher because they must compete with younger men for the same pool of younger brides. Therein lies one of the keys to success of Pattaya. Less clear from the data is how lower-income, less educated older men are successfully marrying younger women. Easily explained in Fun Town: bulging wallets.

"We do find that money helps men's chances of getting married," England said. "But if we take youth as our crude measure of beauty, it doesn't seem like men are being able to exchange their money for younger women, so we don't know what's differentiating which older guys are able to marry very young women."

t the end of September, the City State of Singapore will play host to its first Formu-

Considered by many enthusiasts to be the pinnacle of sport when it comes to showcasing technology, 10 Grand Prix teams, who spend millions of dollars on R&D and testing each season, will arrive in Singapore for Formula One's first ever night race.

Discussions had been held with regard to a pre-race night test but it was eventually ruled out on the grounds of cost. Earlier this year the MotoGP series held a night race at the Losail International Circuit in Qatar and the most serious problem was not visibility but that of getting the tires up to temperature.

It is a known fact that desert climates tend to be extremely hot during the day, rapidly cooling at night. It is not expected to be the case in Singapore, which has a pretty stable climate.

The race will be held on the streets of Singapore in the business district, about 2km from the renowned shopping center of Orchard Road. It is an anti-clockwise circuit, taking in Shenton Way, the Convention Center and City Hall.

A state-of-the-art lighting system and the introduction of socalled DigiFlags are just two of the innovations to be unveiled that will make Singapore possibly one of the most technologically advanced F1 circuits in the world. The lights, which will illuminate the Grand Prix, will be generated by a system specially created for the race by Italian lighting expert Valerio Maioli.

Lighting System: Designing and implementing a lighting system for a street circuit involves a number of challenges. The system must deliver optimum visibility; minimal glare and reflections from a wet surface or spray from cars; and must ensure the safety of drivers, marshals and spectators. The height of the lights must be lower than the trees lining the track to prevent the unnecessary uprooting of shrubbery.

It also calls for a system that can be set up and dismantled in the shortest possible time in order to minimize disruption to

the city's business. Aluminium trusses – similar to light fittings at a concert – will be used to house the power cables.

The lighting system will be placed on only one side of the circuit to reduce glare during television broadcasts. Many factors have been considered in determining the location of the pylons, including the location of the grandstands, camera positions, and infrastructure around the track.

DigiFlags: The DigiFlag technology seeks to revolutionize one of the most traditional areas of the sport. Since the 1950s when the world championship began, marshals have communicated with drivers using a series of colored flags.

Each flag represents a par ticular warning or instruction to drivers such as a yellow flag to slow down and not overtake, a blue flag to let the leaders pass

and a white flag to indicate the presence of the Safety Car. Along with the traditional cloth flags that marshals will use, Singapore will see the debut of Digi-

This system, which uses technology similar to that which helps guide pilots to runways at major airports, has been tested at the Monza, Imola and Barcelona circuits over the past decade to ensure it meets with the stringent FIA requirements.

Changes to the designation of corner numbers will mean that the Marina Bay circuit is officially reduced from 24 to 23 corners for the Grand Prix. The change in designation reflects amendments to turn 10, at the end of St Andrew's Road that passes City Hall and The Padang.

"Previously, what was turn 10 and 11 was actually three corners close together in a chicane configuration, created to provide the right geometry and corner speeds, due to the lack of straight ahead run-off," said Singapore GP Director-Technical & Race Operations, Michael Mc-Donough.

The Singapore Grand Prix will take place over the weekend of September 26-28. For further information see www.singapore

hailand fell short of its three-gold-medal expectations, the US saw their once-powerful boxing team suffer its worst defeat ever and Cuba failed to net gold but picked up four silver medals and four bronze medals.

Mongolia picked up a gold and a silver and Kazakhstan garnered a gold and a bronze, causing some fans in attendance to break down in tears. China and Russia were as strong as ever, winning seven medals between the two countries.

Thailand ended the Olympics with two gold medals (Somjit Jongjohor and weightlifter Prapawadee Jaroenrattanatarakoon) and two silver medals (Manus Boonjumnong and taekwondo stylist Buttree Pued-

Somjit Jongjohor blasted his way through the boxing flyweight division, easily defeating Cuba's Andris Laffita Hernandez in the final by 8-2 to fulfill his dream of winning gold. "I waited patiently for this for 12 years and I finally did it," said 33-year-old Somjit. The Buriram native will receive government and corporate bonuses of approximately 20 million baht.

Felix Diaz of the Dominican Republic soundly defeated Manus Boonjumnong 12-4, denying the Thai the opportunity to become the first Thai fighter to defend an Olympic title. "Even though I would like to have had the gold medal, the silver is satisfactory," Manus said. "I am the first Thai to win medals in consecutive [Olympic] Games. It wasn't such a surprise [to lose]. My opponent fought very well today and I accept it."

Manus seemed to lose focus midway through the first round when Diaz scored with a series of short punches to the face while in close. "Frankly, I lost concentration," he said, "especially when my score did not go up after three clear punches."

As always, boxing had its share of controversies, mainly dealing with one facet of amateur boxing that sets it apart from the professional game: the pushbutton scoring.

Three of five judges are required to push a button within one second of each other in order for a point to register, supposedly guaranteeing fair decisions, but

the system isn't always success-

Single points are tallied for combination punches, body punches are often disregarded, points are sometimes added for punches never thrown, and judges are sometimes not quick enough to punch the buttons in unison. Expectedly, it is the losers doing the complaining. Winners are more likely to overlook minor discrepancies, at least until they lose.

Also, as with professional boxing, judges are always under close scrutiny and often accused of favoritism. The International Boxing Association suspended a Romanian official over "possible attempts of manipulation" at the Beijing Olympic Games.

These factors have contributed to more than one amateur boxing fan calling for major changes in Olympic boxing.

It is doubtful the push-button system will be eradicated any time soon. Despite the problems, push-button scoring holds judges accountable and provides concrete evidence of their actions. The London Olympics are four years away, giving ample time to work out the bugs in boxing's scoring system.

Over the years, the Olympics have been a proving ground for American boxers, spawning such greats as Muhammad Ali, George Foreman, Sugar Ray Leonard, Roy Jones and Evander Holyfield. This year, the US was full of hope with all forecasts promising gold. Instead, there was chaos, tension, drama and a team that refused to listen when it needed to most.

Six of nine fighters came close to quitting the team and one fighter, Luis Yanez, went AWOL just two months before the games. All but one of America's fighters were unceremoniously eliminated before reaching the medal rounds.

When America's last hope for a medal, 23-year-old Deontay Wilder, stepped in the ring, it demonstrated just how far the mighty have fallen.

Wilder, who hails from Tuscaloosa, Alabama, is a likable sort who took up boxing less than three years ago in order to provide for a daughter who suffers from spina bifida.

He came 33rd in last year's amateur world championships, but somehow managed to squeak into the Olympics.

Wilder won a bronze medal, but in the next bout, silver medalist Russo Clemente of Italy scored at will, easily defeating him, ending his dream of Olympic gold. All but one of Wilder's nine teammates elected to leave Beijing instead of remaining behind to watch him fight.

With just seconds remaining in his first-round bout against Lee Ok-sung, world amateur champion and US gold medal favorite Rau'Shee Warren danced around the ring confidently, thinking he was ahead in the bout.

Instead of listening to his coaches, who were screaming for him to get another point to tie the score, he listened to someone in the stands yelling "Move! Move!" meaning he should run the clock out while avoiding Oksung's punches. By the time he realized he was behind and not ahead, it was too late and Warren and the US team were dealt a crushing defeat.

Warren had turned down several offers to turn pro in order to win a gold medal to present his mother.

At the 1976 Montreal Olympics, US boxers won one

silver and five gold medals. In Beijing, the team won a single bronze medal – the worst performance ever turned in by an American squad. How does a boxing superpower fall to a level where a heavyweight with mediocre skills is the only hope for a medal? It's easy to blame it on the coach, but America's boxing program is in dire need of an overhaul.

Swatch volleyball set to return

KARON: If the Beijing Olympics has whetted your mer Olympics – their second Olympic title as a appetite for beach volleyball, get ready for this year's Phuket Thailand Open, set to take place at Karon Beach from November 4 to 9 as part of the women's Swatch FIVB World Tour 2008.

Forty teams of beach babes from 20 countries have already signed up for the tournament, with the world's best players from the likes of Austria, Brazil, Denmark, Sweden and, of course, Thailand all set to compete.

It's good to talk tennis

iving and teaching tennis in Phuket has a number of challenges, but the main one is the lack of communication - and I don't mean with the language.

There is a distinct lack of communication between coaches, players and parents all around Phuket.

With there being only a few structured places where tennis is played, you'd think it would be easy to have ongoing dialog between the different groups discussing ideas, tournaments and events. Not a chance.

I personally have more frequent and structured feedback about the players from Cyprus, Japan and Dubai than I do from Phuket.

Learning to communicate for teaching is vitally important, but it doesn't end between the

coach and the student. As players progress, discussions with parents and federations become more frequent and development paths must be made clear.

Without a clear path to follow, aren't we all just following the blind leader?

I am not saying everyone can or should be groomed to be a champion, but I believe that there should be some direction and goals, even if those target nothing more than enjoyment and fun. If there are misunderstandings, major resentment can come later.

If everyone spoke up about what their goals and targets should be, we would have some very surprised and enlightened people on our hands. Or is everything already above board and clear between coaches, students and parents?

I think there should be discussion and clarity about objectives so people don't just amble along hoping for, or expecting, something to happen.

As a coach, I have always set a personal goal that all my students will play attractive, flowing tennis (to be able to be competitive), be friendly, polite and courteous (a good addition to any future club), and have a good understanding of the game (can advise someone correctly).

I always encourage my students to have contact cards so they can give them out if they see a player who would be a good match for them. This simple act can go a long way to help the lack of structured match play in Phuket.


Over the years, wherever I have taught, I have always tried to have good communication

> with all the tennis groups around me, whether I agree with their philosophies or not. I wish the tennis groups here in Phuket would realize that individually we are

comparatively weak, but together with structure, we can push each other to much higher standards. It all starts with communication.

I believe the most successful players and athletes are the ones who have a close, trusted personal support group, but have an open mind to discuss ideas and are always looking at ways to improve.

Construction Update

Dewa set for high-season opening

he Dewa Phuket boutique resort and residential project being developed in the Nai Yang Beach area by R&B Partners Co Ltd is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

Under construction since early 2007, Dewa is a combination of resort-style pool villas and apartments constructed on 10 rai of land located about 75 meters away from the beach, next to Sirinath National Park.

Dewa, which is an ancient Sanskrit word meaning "angel", will comprise 34 pool villas, each with an indoor and outdoor living space of at least 130 square meters. Villas will each have landscaped gardens and a plunge pool and will be managed as a hotel with a starting rate of 18,000 baht a day.

Also under development are 62 residential apartments comprising 24 two-bedroom units with a minimum 115sqm of living space and 38 one-bedroom units with 67sqm of living space.

The apartments, called Dewa Residence, are designed in a blend of contemporary and Thai styles and are centered around a 25-meter lap pool. All apartments will be equipped with Westernstyle kitchens and balconies, with the apartments on the top floor having access to their own roof terrace complete with a lounging sala.

The selling price for a onebedroom apartment starts at 7 million baht while the two-bedroom apartments start at 12 million baht. An on-site rental pool will be available for owners who wish to earn rental income on their properties.

"We are now in the completion stage for the residential apartments and expect to start the

handover process to owners in November this year," said R&B Partners Managing Director Lars Ydmark. "As for the Dewa Pool Villas and the rest of the resort, we are on schedule and expect to be completed by the end of November, in time for the opening on December 15."

Dewa Phuket's facilities include fine dining venues called The Dining Room and The Lounge, a spa, a delicatessen counter, a library, a kids' club, two fitness rooms, a convenience store, retail outlets and a free-form swimming pool along with a lap pool. The entire property

will also have wireless Internet access.

"For most of our home owners, who are opting to rent out their units when they are not here, we offer an option of a guaranteed rental income with some conditions attached or a more casual rental pool with fewer conditions," said Mr Ydmark.

"We offer 6% guaranteed return, net of operating costs, annually," Mr Ydmark added.

Mr Ydmark is a wellknown player in the Phuket hospitality and property market, having been involved in several projects including the ownership and operation of the Jiva Resort & Spa, Deva Patong Resort, Bread & Butter and Grove Gardens on Yamu.

Mr Ydmark comes from a hotel background and has worked in management positions for the Sheraton, Shangri-La and Accor hotel groups.

Mr Ydmark has partnered with Thierry De Borde of Tropical Plan Co Ltd to handle the site construction management, while design is being carried out by the architecture firm Design by Design Co Ltd and the construction contractor is A/C Construction Co Ltd.

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

Setting the scene for living in happiness

tephen Paine, managing director of Malaiwana, is not interested in talking about the design features of the luxury estate he's developing at Nai Thon Beach. For him, design is not about the elements that go into a home. It's about how people live in a space, and how they feel when they're in it

Selecting the right location was the basis of creating the right atmosphere for this project of 19 luxury villas, 13 apartments and a beach club, which is set to be completed in 2010. Nai Thon was the ideal spot, Stephen explained, because it offered a coveted west coast location, yet one that remained quiet and peaceful.

The apartments and villas were designed by two architects, but both parts of the development maintain the distinctive look and feel of tropical architecture. The villas are set on plots of one to two rai and have about 1,000 square meters of construction area.

A major consideration in Malaiwana's design, Stephen said, was to make people happy.

What he learned from his work with Surin Heights luxury villas was to maximize the use of covered outdoor space, which best suits the way people live in Phuket. People prefer to spend most of their time outdoors and the covered areas, together with the cooler breezes offered on the hillside location, keep the outdoor space cool and comfortable.

The villa layout was carefully designed to divide the home into social areas for entertaining and relaxing and private areas for the home's residents to retreat into. The pool, pavilions and lounging areas are all on the upper floor, taking the most advantage of the sea views and ample outdoor space. Bedrooms are tucked away on the lower floor.

Stephen said, "I think the challenge for architects and for developers is that you have to look at how people want to live, which depends on the person and their culture." In designing Malaiwana, a long time was spent trying to figure out how people would use the space and move around the property. "When you understand all of that,

you try to put together a building and creation that meets all these requirements," he explained.

"The most important thing about the architecture is not a specific design – and yes, we have all these elements such as automatic lighting, a beautiful kitchen and so on. We all have this picture of a high-end villa, but the most important thing when you walk into the space is how it makes you feel. If it doesn't make you feel great when you're in the space then, to me, the architect has failed.

"If it doesn't make if you feel sensational when you walk into the room, then what's the point?" he added.

The tactile experience of living in a home is also an important element, as Stephen explained the extensive use of natural materials such as wood and stone.

"We had quite a compli-

cated process to make the floor look and feel different," he said. "When you walk on it you will feel the beautiful touch of a real wood floor. Many people think that when you have a wooden floor, you get some nice planks of wood, sand them, polish them, cover with polyurethane and make it look all shiny."

Using polyurethane defeats the purpose of having a wood floor, he explained, causing the beautiful look and feel of the natural material to be lost.


For the same reason, natural stone is used instead of ceramic flooring in all areas apart from the showers. "Again, it's about the feeling when you walk on a piece of natural stone," he said. "You feel very different than when you are walking on ceramic [tiles]."

In the swimming pool, too, local Thai marble is used instead

of ceramic or other tiles. "It gives a more luxurious feel and the water looks more beautiful," he said. "I think many pools are beautiful and a lot of them have expensive ceramic titles, but if you take the water out from the pool, it looks like a toilet."

For all the elements of Malaiwana's design, Stephen said that it will succeed if the design takes a back seat to the experience of living in the villa. No matter how much time and money goes into the architecture, interiors, furnishings, lighting and other details, the only important thing is that living there is a joyful experience, he explained.

"So, for example, if you walk around the bedroom with your eyes closed, how does that feel on your feet?" It's not enough to have a beautiful view, he said. Beauty should be felt throughout the home as well.

A great impostor of the plant world

rauds abound. I don't mean the dodgy blokes who knock on old ladies' doors and con them out of their life savings, or "businessmen" who suck hapless individuals in with promises of vast returns on "just a token sum" then disappearing without trace.

I'm not even referring to those gentlemen from a large African nation who would be far happier if as much of my money as possible was in their bank accounts. All administration fees paid for, of course.

These obvious frauds are simply contemptible lowlifes, and fairly easy to categorize and avoid. But it's those who insist on pretending to be something that they're not who irk me. Take wine snobs, for example. What is it with their "malolactic fermentation", "nicely structured, lightly acidic nose" and their "obsequious, with a cheeky aftertaste" when none of us have the faintest idea what they're on about?

I have to wonder if they know either – I'm convinced that all they do is rattle out a few meaningless stock phrases on cue. My system for judging wine involves only two ratings: good (1) or bad (0). How difficult can that be?

Other frauds? How about those blokes in tiny Japanese cars and lowered-suspension pickups with the big exhausts and Gigawatt-powered stereos? Are they perhaps trying a little too hard to over-compensate for something? There are those who argue that the dimensions of these are inversely proportional to the size of a rather specific facet of a gent's anatomy.

It's not just the youngsters, though – old ladies with the sort of wrinkled leathery skin who would be more at home covering an elephant are equally fraudulent, if that's the right word to use here. We've all seem them. Sadly, they attempt to recoup their youth (or perhaps deny that it expired several decades ago) with miniskirts and bright red lipstick. It really doesn't work.

In a similar vein, there are the equally ancient gentlemen who fervently continue to wear Speedos and seem convinced that they still look like a Baywatch lifeguard. They don't. Frauds.

It's fairly clear that at some stage I would get around to the tenuous link to the fraud of the plant word, so let's get it over with. The mock orange. In Thai, it's known as the som get lah.

This plant is a member of the orange family. The mock orange is all over Phuket. The glossy, green foliage comes with strongly-scented flowers that are followed by tiny little oranges.

By the way, does anyone know why oranges in Thailand aren't actually orange? Isn't that one of the things that makes an orange an orange – it's orange? They're more likely to be green

Mock orange plants are festooned with these miniature oranges/greens that you can't eat. At least I can't - they're horribly bitter. If my mum was here, she'd probably spout some blurb about how they give you stomach ache in the same way as cooking apples straight from the tree supposedly did, though they probably didn't.

Also known as the orange jasmine, or Murraya paniculata if you want to get technical, it's not a plant that's likely to stand out at the garden center as a fruit tree, since at first glance it looks like just another jasmine plant. Which is what it is, I suppose.



These sneaky fruits hang around pretending to be oranges, when it's clear that they are, in fact, green.

It appears as a large multitrunked shrub or small tree. Also known as the "China box" (for reasons that escape me), it belongs to the Rutaceae or Rue family. The fragrant "orange blossom" flowers stand out against the evergreen dark green leaves, which consist of three to nine

This evergreen shrub flowers regularly throughout the year, and produces fragrant jasminescented flowers and those fake fruit. It makes an excellent hedge, since it thrives on close trimming. I have to say that I do believe in a closely trimmed bush.

It also does well as a decorative container plant because of its compact habit and dense glossy green foliage. It can be propagated from seed, but as ever here in Phuket, you're much better off going down to the nearest garden center and picking one up.

Orange jasmine has a few medicinal qualities, too. Indians have traditionally used its bark for making cosmetics and the leaves as a stimulant and decongestant. The shrub's astringent qualities have also been used to treat bleeding wounds and dysentery, joint pain and body aches. In some parts of Asia, the twigs are chewed and used as a sort of bizarre natural toothbrush.

The plant is everywhere in this corner of the planet, from India and China through Southeast Asia to Northern Australia. A fairly hardy shrub, needing light to moderate watering.

New growth should be pruned to a few leaves, after the shoots have six or seven leaves while propagation can be done by seeds or cuttings.

The tree does best in a container that is glazed and not too shallow, with moderately fertile, well-drained soil. It's easy to care for as it tolerates most conditions and grows well in partial shade.


Mock oranges are still frauds whichever way you look at them. Perhaps not as brazen as wine snobs or Speedo-sporting pensioners, but frauds nonetheless.

I have to admit that the trees would be a lot more welcome in my back garden than either of these, though.

Perhaps it's about time for a 1-rating glass of red wine, come to think of it. Cheers.
