Kamala beachfront shops destroyed

KAMALA: In an effort to beautify the beachfront at Kamala, nearly 50 illegally-built commercial structures were bulldozed on October 7.

Santi Atthasap, Vice-President of the Kamala Tambon Administration Organization (Or-BorTor), told the Gazette that the move was in line with a provincial policy to keep beaches tidy and attractive.

The temporary structures, many of them made from bamboo, encroached on pubic land and created an eyesore, he said.

"We are in favor of entrepreneurs, but they need to follow OrBorTor regulations; otherwise the result is no different from a slum. We want to see Kamala's beautiful beach back in its natural state," he said.

"These people were notified of the destruction one month ago, in accordance with the law. They had time to remove their belongings," he added.

"Most of the shops were tour shops, restaurants and bars. The people who ran them knew they were on public property, but insisted on squatting. They took

the opportunity to encroach on public land during the gap between election periods," said Mr

"This beach is public property and belongs to everyone. Some 50 entrepreneurs have no more right to use it than anyone else here – including tourists. Besides, no permission to operate tere was ever granted by the OrBorTor. We have to remove these structures before the situation gets even worse," he said.

The encroacher had built nearly 100 structures along a stretch of beach about four kilometers long, he said.

"Now there is [finally] enough space to walk to the beach without having to pass dining tables," he said.

The newly-cleared area will now be used as a public recreational area for tourists, with a small number of legally-registered souvenir shops allowed to operate there, he said.

Guns seized at Tah Chat Chai checkpoint

TAH CHAT CHAI: Provincial and regional police held a press conference on October 5 to announce the seizure of 10 guns recovered during random checks at the Tah Chat Chai road checkpoint over a three-day period.

The press conference was conducted jointly by Police Region 8 Commander Lt Gen Santarn Chayanon and Phuket Provincial Police Commander Apirak Hongthong.

The seizures followed a handover in authority of the checkpoint from the regional to provincial police, in line with a policy to crack down on hired gunmen and other criminals coming to, and leaving, the island, Maj Gen Apirak said.

The crackdown involves more frequent searches and advanced detection technology to locate contraband items stashed inside vehicles, police said.

Also seized was a variety of other weapons and illegal drugs.

Similar "x-ray" inspections were conducted at checkpoints in Tung Tong and Kathu over the same period, but these failed to recover any weapons.

More CCTV cameras to spy on Patong

PATONG: Philandering husbands be warned: Phuket's premier adult entertainment district is gearing up for a huge expansion in its closed-circuit television (CCTV) coverage, with real-time images of the action along Soi Bangla to be available to the public 24 hours a day by year's end, according to the town's

Kathu Police Superintendent Col Grissak Songmoonnark told the *Gazette* that the existing 16 CCTV cameras in Patong will

be supplemented with 26 more units, 16 of Col Grissak told the *Gazette*. which will be provided by the Savoey Seafood restaurant.

All of the new cameras, to be installed along Soi Bangla and the beach road, will show viewers around the world just how safe and friendly Patong is for tourists, he said.

'CCTV security is a policy of national police chief Patcharawat Wongsuwan. Police Region 8 commander Santarn Chayanon has assigned Phuket Provincial Police Commander Apirak Hongtong to evaluate which parts of Phuket, if any, should have CCTV,'

Maj Gen Apirak thinks that coverage should be extended to other parts of the island, including Chalong and Phuket City, he

Phuket City Municipality will fund 10 more cameras at a cost of 4 million baht, while the Savoey Restaurant is funding 16 cameras sourced from Singapore at a cost of 1 million baht.

All 16 cameras funded by the restaurant will be installed along Soi Bangla, he said.

Patong CCTV to go online

"If there are any criminal activities there, these will help us investigate and catch the culprits. The images will be broadcast via the Internet, which means that the public can also help us watch what is going on.

"Businesses will be able to use the web feeds as public relations tools for their businesses," he said.

"The cameras will not damage the tourism industry at all, because most tourists do not come to buy girls out of the bars. It is perfectly natural for them to have dinner and then go down to the bars for a few drinks and a fun night out with their friends. It is only a very small minority that will pay the bar fine to take a girl out for dinner," said Col Grissak.

"The cameras are not installed in an obtrusive way. They do not create the feeling that one's privacy is being invaded. I have selected all the locations for installation.

Patong Mayor Pian Keesin has set December 15 as the deadline for this project, but we would like to have it in operation earlier than that," he said.

The owner of Savoey Seafood Restaurant, who asked that his name not be published, said, "I am very worried about my businesses here in Patong and have a vested interest in protecting the city, especially now that rebels in the three southern provinces have threatened to expand [their activities] throughout the South, including Phuket.

"The system that I have provided for Soi Bangla includes digital recording that is stored for 30 days.

"Each camera has infrared night vision capability that enables clear-image recording even in total darkness," he added.

Child labor in Phuket shames Burmese junta

PHUKET: Burmese daily newspaper True News was ordered by the Press Scrutiny and Registration Board of Myanmar to suspend publication for two months, following its publication on September 30 of a large image depicting a Burmese child working on a construction site in Phuket.

Mr Yeni, News Editor at The *Irrawaddy*, told the *Gazette*, "An anonymous freelancer in Rangoon told us that the censorship board has ordered True News to suspend publication for two months due to a front page photograph that ran a caption reading: 'A Burmese child working on a construction site in Phuket, Thailand'. Apparently the editors of True News were found guilty of not sending clear draft layouts to the Press Scrutiny Board.

"Another Rangoon source said that True News had submitted the layouts, but the Board failed to censor the picture. Major Tint Swe, head of the censorship board, was then reportedly scolded by Information Minister

Kyaw Hsan for the oversight," said Mr Yeni.

The editors and reporters of True News are now afraid to give interviews with anyone outside Myanmar. We are unable to find out where, exactly, the construction site is in Phuket. We are very interested in covering stories about Burmese migrants in Phuket.

"The Junta are paranoid and strange. The Burmese regime is not like any other government; they focus only on how to control media, especially when they work with journalists outside Myanmar. With the exploitation of child laborers, the Junta feel that they have been exposed for lacking care for their own citizens. Later this year we plan to visit Phuket ourselves," Mr Yeni added.

There will be a lot for them to report on here. The plight of Burmese workers in Phuket is well known to island residents. They are commonly seen huddled into the back of trucks and at squalid workers' camps across the island.

The camps have mushroomed on the back of a real estate boom driven largely by foreign investment in recent years.

The situation made international headlines earlier this year when 54 Burmese workers illegally entering Thailand suffocated in the back of a truck in Ranong while en route to a construction site in Phuket.

A crackdown followed, and on June 11 former Kathu policeman Decho Kaewnabon was gunned down in front of his Patong home in a murder that remains unsolved.

Decho, dismissed from the force for involvement in Burmese labor rings, allegedly continued in the business. His murder is widely seen as a silencing killing ordered by other influential traffickers.

There have also been numerous extortion attempts made against Burmese workers and those who employ them, often by people posing as government officials.

One registered Burmese worker who resisted an extortion attempt was shot in the face and killed in Kathu on March 30. Although there were many witnesses, that case also remains unsolved.





Top doc warns of Veggie Fest viruses

PHUKET CITY: The Vegetarian Festival is ostensibly a period of purity, but the Phuket Provincial Heath Office nevertheless issued a statement warning people about the risks of HIV/ Aids and hepatitis infection during the 10-day event.

Phuket Public Health Office chief Dr Paisan Worrasathit told the Gazette, "We are cautioning people who hurt themselves with puncture wounds from items such as spades, spears, knives, pins. We fear some of them may contract diseases as a result".

Dr Paisan was speaking in reference to the scores of mah song (literally, "entranced horses") spirit mediums, who pierce such objects through their cheeks in acts of ritual self-mutilation, or do so with the assistance of "handlers" who escort them while they are entranced.

All involved should sterilize the instruments before piercing and then take steps to prevent viral and bacterial infection, both to the mah song and others who could come into contact with their

blood, he said.

"Apart from the risks associated with sharp objects, we are also checking to ensure that proper hygiene is being maintained at food stalls by giving advice to vendors," he said.

Pork sales plunged during Veggie Fest

PHUKET CITY: Much has been written about high prices of vegetables during the Vegetarian Festival, especially with recent flooding in other parts of the country destroying crops.

But the 10-day period of vegetable-only consumption also had an impact on meat prices, especially in Phuket City, where the ethnic Chinese who make up the bulk of those taking part are typically enthusiastic consumers of a wide variety of meat products, including pork.

"Tek", who runs pork vending stalls in five different markets (Samkong, Rawai, Koh Sireh Bridge and two in Patong) said his average daily income of 80,000 baht a day is typically reduced by about 30% during the

Tuadaeng, a beef seller at

estimated sales were down about 50% during the festival.

Jiraway, who sells chicken at the same market, said that income was about the same as normal, with the number of rival vendors closing down compensating in large part for the reduced number of buyers.

The relative resiliency of chicken sales in Phuket City during the festival is likely related to the fact that the Muslim population, estimated at about 30% in Phuket, refrains from pork consumption year-round as a matter of religious belief.

Few Muslims choose to take part in the Vegetarian Festival, which this year overlapped with the Ramadan period of fasting that ended on October 1.

In fact, one Muslim woman who sells "Muslim chicken" with sticky rice at a stall on Yaowarat

a single stall in Samkong Market, Rd in Samkong said sales were better during the Vegetarian Festival than at any other time of the year due to the lack of competi-

> The festival also reduces processing rates at local slaughterhouses, of which there are 19 on the island.

Mr Prasit and his team normally butcher about 80 swine per day, but the figure dips to about 25 per day during the festival due to a drop in demand.

Mr Prasit earns 100 baht per pig processed. However, he said he must use the proceeds to pay all of his staff.

Coming soon: '5-Star Slaughterhouse'

PHUKET CITY: While tens of thousands of Phuket residents walked the streets in all-white clothing and abstained from meat during the recent Vegetarian Festival, plans are afoot to build what authorities are describing as a "5star" slaughterhouse capable of butchering up to 100 pigs per hour.

The Phuket Provincial Livestock Office announced the project as part of its plan to designate Phuket as Thailand's first "Food Safety City" in 2009, the Manager on-line news service reported on September 30.

Phuket Provincial Livestock Chief Dr Sunart Wongchawalit was quoted as saying the slaughterhouse will be a joint project between the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (OrBorJor) and Phuket City



Municipality.

The facility will be located on OrBorJor land, the exact location of which was not included in the report.

Construction of the slaughterhouse, to cost somewhere between 60 and 80 million baht, will be completed within a year, Dr Sunart was quoted as saying.

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The project will bring the island into compliance with Natural Resources and Environment Ministry regulations and force the closure of 17 smaller slaughterhouse facilities now operating on the island.

It is hoped the facility will help boost meat exports to Malaysia and Singapore.


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A touch of diplomacy goes a long way.

handful of ambassadors from around the world arrived in Phuket on the final leg of a familiarization tour of the Andaman provinces last week. The diplomats stopped in Phang Nga and Krabi before coming to Phuket to stay at the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa in Karon.

They were also treated to a barbeque, seafood and vegetarian dinner hosted by Tourism and Sports Minister Weerasak Kowsurat at the Holiday Inn Patong.

After the dinner, some of the diplomats went to observe vegetarian festival ceremonies, while others were accompanied on a tour of Bangla Road in Patong by Mr Weerasak, along with Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit, Patong Deputy Mayor Chairat Sukban and Kathu Police Superintendent Col Grissak Songmoonnark.

Other local dignitaries who met the diplomats included Krabi Governor Siwa Sirisaowalak, Phuket senator and Honorary Consul for Austria Phummisak Hongyok, Phuket Senator (elected as chairwoman of the Upper House's Tourism Committee) Tanyarat Atchariyachai, and President of the Phuket Appreciation Organization Paiboon Upatising.

Here, the *Gazette* reports on what the diplomats and other distinguished guests had to say about the state of visitor safety for tourists holidaying in Phuket. Their comments were made during their dinner at the Holiday Inn Patong and following a speech by Minister Weerasak.





Minister of Tourism and Sports Weerasak Kowsurat:

"After the two-day closure of Phuket Airport three weeks ago, and the negative international news coverage that followed it, we thought it would be a good idea to bring down the ambassadors who are available as soon as possible to show them – to let them see with their own eyes – what's really happening in Phuket.

"We think business is picking up and tourists are coming back. I sent out invitations to members of the diplomatic corps to provide them with transportation and accommodation so that they can see for themselves and report back to their own home countries about what's really going on here.

"We have other international events to support here, such as beach volleyball and the King's Cup Regatta. There will also be a large-scale familiarity trip this month with 800 members of the media coming from all over the world. They will go all over the country, including the Andaman provinces.

"Most ambassadors have come with their families. They might have come before, but this time they have had a chance to see some things that they might not normally see.

"The Swiss ambassador has already booked another holiday here later this month. They've had great fun learning about Phuket's charismatic attractions other than the beaches, such as the shrines and Chinese culture here."




Khun Methee Tanmanatragul, President of the Thai Hotel Association:

"You know, after the plane crash at Phuket airport, and when the airport was closed for two days, many strategies were drawn up to regain confidence in tourists. We thought that the best thing to do would be to invite the ambassadors from those countries that have issued travel advisory warnings to take a look for themselves.

"If they come here and feel relaxed and comfortable, then we just hope that they will tell their own governments that everything is back to normal here and that there's nothing to worry about.

"There is nothing to fear, but it's best that when the ambassadors go home they can tell their own governments that Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi are safe places to visit.

"That way is much better than our going abroad to tell them."

"There is no problem about safety in Phuket. There has never been a problem about safety.

"The problem that existed for some time – maybe just a few days – was when there were the strikes (sic) and the airport was closed.

"That was on the television all over the world and it showed some of the hardships faced by tourists.

"That was not, I would say, a problem of safety, but a problem of discomfort for the tourists. Luckily, this is over now, and it's fine. I hope that many tourists will come back here.

"Phuket is an island of natural beauty. The sea is fantastic and there are a lot of activities no matter what your tastes.

"I have been here several times and I enjoy it every time. I always say I will come again."



Honorary Consul for Denmark Mr Kennerth B. R. Carlson:

"Actually I am from Sweden. Although I am Swedish, I am the Danish Consul. Anyway, I think that Phuket is absolutely

safe – no problem at all. Every day I recommend that people come here.

"I had three emails today from Danish citizens on their way here. They asked me if there were any problems here. My reply was 'No. Not at all. It is safe'.

"Phuket is wonderful because the beaches and the people are very nice.

"It is a very international area, so it is easy to communicate with everyone here. I think these are the main reasons that people come here."



Russian Federation Minister-Counselor and Deputy Head of Mission Mr Mikhail V Baranov:

"In Russia we have a proverb that says a bomb never strikes in the same place twice, so I think that after the 2004 tsunami, the possibility of such a large-scale natural catastrophe is not so great; so I think Phuket is quite safe in this respect.

"I dont think anyone can say that Phuket is not safe in any other aspects. The island is very well adapted for international tourism and the locals seem very friendly. The local police are also doing their jobs well.

"We have a constantly rising number of Russian tourists coming to Phuket as well. This year it's going to be 500,000 compared to 300,000 in the previous year. This shows that our people love Thailand and Phuket. They feel quite safe here, and if anything happens – things do happen in life – we have the embassy

and an honorary consul here in Phuket to help them overcome any problems.

"The police are not a problem for tourists unless they commit crimes. I do know of one example where a Russian tourist was falsely accused of a crime. This was not in Phuket though. It was on an island in Phang Nga province. The police carried out a good investigation; our tourist was acquitted and all accusations were dropped.

"We know that some Thai tour guides are concerned about the Russian tour guides and we are communicating with the authorities about that.

"There is a need for native Russian speakers in Thailand and Phuket, just as there is a need for Thai people to work in Russia and Moscow as experts in Thai massage and Thai cuisine, so the problem of people getting jobs in other countries should be solved on a mutually beneficial basis."

Alan Cooke – ex British consul Phuket:

"Phuket has always been safe to visit. The present situation is no different from any other.

"It's important that the message gets back to the respective embassies in Bangkok that they can adjust and revise and give a true representation of the perceived risks of travel in Thailand.

"At the moment, Thailand is unfairly described in these travel advisories. This is not unusual, but embassies will always err on the side of caution.

"Essentially, they are bureaucrats, so that's the way they will operate. They are not commercially motivated; they are not aware of the realities of the commercial world out there; and they make what I think are unfair and unreasonable judgments. Just simply, dare I say it, to protect their own positions."

Drinking session takes tragic turn

SUKHOTHAI: The more dip- was safely tucked in bed. somaniacal among us will most likely have had the unsettling experience of coming round, after a heavy session, not quite sure where we are or how we got

Usually, this can be rectified by stumbling out, flagging down a taxi and demanding to be taken home, hopefully before the full force of the hangover

One unlucky drinker in the early hours of September 5 had a rather more tragic experience.

Regaining consciousness in the back seat of his own moving car after a night on the town, he mistook his friend, who was driving him home, for a robber stealing his vehicle – and emptied all six shots of his revolver into him, killing him at the wheel.

The sorry tale started on the afternoon of September 4, when 54-year-old Surakiat Kaewphet, the chauffeur of the director of Sri Samrong Hospital, drove into Sukhothai town to meet some of his friends in the local law enforcement community.

One drink led to another, and the group soon found themselves having a grand time in the Tor Phu Tao restaurant.

When it was finally time to go home, Surakiat's friend Sub Lt Songsak Jaidee offered to drive his pal, who was so intoxicated he could barely walk, back to his home in Sri Samrong District.

Lt Songsak laid Surakiat down in the back seat of the chauffeur's Honda City and asked one of his underlings, Sgt Maj Songsak Yahjai, to follow in his car so he could take Lt Songsak home when Surakiat

Halfway home, however, Surakiat woke from his inebriated slumber. Realizing that someone else was driving his Honda, he jumped to the conclusion that the driver must be stealing the car.

Driven perhaps by instinct as much as alcohol, he pulled out his .38 revolver and emptied it into the "thief".

After the car came to a halt in the middle of the road, Sgt Maj Songsak, who had been following behind, pulled up alongside to see what was wrong.

On seeing the body of his boss, he shouted at Surakiat, demanding to know why he had shot Lt Songsak.

Realizing his mistake, he joined Sgt Maj Songsak in a desperate bid to resuscitate the lieutenant, but to no avail.

All who knew the tragic pair said that Surakiat and Lt Songsak were good friends and regular drinking partners. Surakiat used to say that he loved Lt Songsak like a younger brother.

Surakiat, a big fan of the police in general, was friends with all the officers in his local station and would often treat them to meals and drinks.

Whenever any policeman was ill, he would use his connections at the hospital to make sure the law enforcement officer got the best rooms.

These strong bonds with the boys in brown, however, were apparently not strong enough to get him out of trouble for his mistake, as he has been charged with murder and carrying a firearm in a public place without

PHUKET CITY: Middle Way Phuket, which has been conducting free monthly meditation training sessions in Phuket for more than a year, is now offering a twice-monthly course on Meditation and Introduction to Buddhism.

Thai Post honors 50 years of Thai-Korean relations

hailand Post this month is marking 50 years of diplo matic relations between Thailand and the Republic of Korea with a special issue of two commemorative stamps.

One stamp features an image of the Chakri Maha Prasat Throne Hall in the Grand Palace, where roval banquets are held in honor of royal guests. Visitors are permitted to tour the hall and take pictures of the exemplary architecture daily from 9 am to

The Chakri Maha Prasat Throne Hall was built in 1876 and originally designed by British architect John Clunish, who was commissioned to draw up the plans by HM King Rama V.

On the ground floor of the three-story hall guard is the center and the weapons which from the east and the south museum in both sides of the floor. The second level is used for state banquets and for receiving foreign ambassadors. On the highest level are the sacred remains of Kings Rama IV, V, VI, VII and VIII and their queens as well as a large Buddha image.

The other stamp in the series features an image of the Juhamnu Pavilion at Changdeokgung Palace ("Palace of Illustrious Virtue") in Seoul. The two-story pavilion once served as a library for Korean kings.



Today, the ground floor is still home to thousands of books and there are reading rooms on the upper floor.

Juhammu Pavilion was built in 1776, adding to the historic Changdeokgung Palace, which was built in 1405. The original palace was completed in 1412, covering 500,000 square meters. Throughout history, the palace has been damaged and restored many times. The last Korean emperor, Sunjong of the Joseon Dynasty, stayed in this palace until his death in 1926.

Both Changdeokgung Palace and the Chakri Maha Prasat Throne Hall in the Grand Palace in Bangkok have been listed as World Heritage Sites by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization

(UNESCO).

In a recent press release marking the 50-year anniversary of official relations between the two democracies, Permanent Secretary for Foreign Affairs Virasakdi Futrakul said that the Republic of Korea is now an economic powerhouse in Asia and a vital strategic partner for Thai trade and investment. Korea ranks as Thailand's 11th largest trading partner, while Thailand is one of the premier holiday destinations for Korean tourists. In 2007, more than one million Koreans visited Thailand. Phuket is the most popular honeymoon destination for Koreans.

Mr Virasakdi pointed out that both Thailand and the Republic of Korea are at important political junctures, as they have recently elected new governments. He believes that both governments will be pro-active and will expand their co-operation in all areas, such as trade, tourism, science and technology, education, cultural exchange, and people-to-people contact.

He explained that the friendship between Thailand and the Republic of Korea predates the official establishment of diplomatic ties. In the late 14th century, Siamese envoys were sent to the Koryo Kingdom, now the Republic of Korea.

However, due to the difficulty of traveling from Siam to Koryo by sea, it was not until November 1950 that official con-



ublic Health Minister Chalerm Yoobamrung on October 2 launched a campaign to ban alcohol sales on public holidays.

Drinking leads to crime and road accidents, resulting in death and injuries, Mr Chalerm said.

He citied a 2006 report that 31%, or 16 million, of the population were drinkers. Nine million of them drink alcohol on a regular basis.

Mr Chalerm assigned the Disease Control Department to consider invoking Article 28 of the Alcohol Beverage Control Act of 2008, which prohibits the sale of alcohol on days designated by ministerial regulations.

The regulation should be issued in one month and include public holidays such as New Year's Day, Songkran and religious holidays, Mr Chalerm said.

Dr Saman Futrakul, head of the department's tobacco and alcohol consumption control group, said the regulation had been drafted and submitted to Deputy Permanent Secretary Paijit Warachit.

After obtaining the National Alcohol Consumption Control Committee's approval, the regulation would need Prime Minister Somchai Wongsawat's signature and be published in the Royal Gazette before it can be introduced.

Violators would face up to six months in jail and/or a fine of up to 10,000 baht.

The regulation would prohibit liquor sales from 11 am to 2 pm and from 5 pm to midnight every day, except by vendors with special permission.

The Alcohol Watch Network and its allies quickly supported the plan, asking that it include major festivals, such as Loy Krathong and the Red Cross Society's annual fair.

Green scheme. Natural Resources and Environment Minister Anongwan Thepsuthin on October 2 floated the idea of giving "green label" status to some national parks as a way of turning them into fully "eco-friendly locations".

The minister plans to estab-

partment, said key officials would report to the minister on how the scheme could be implemented.

The scheme aims to discourage the use of foam containers, plastic bags and loud-engine vehicles in the parks.

"We won't impose a ban, but we will seek tourists' co-operation in protecting the environment," he said.

Mr Upai confirmed that his department would abandon a plan to invite private investors to run accommodation services inside national parks. "The plan is suspended because society doesn't agree with it," he said.

ob-related stress apparently led to a police lieutenant killing a senior police officer and injuring two others in two shooting rampages on September 28.

Before he was shot dead in a gunfight at Muang Yala Police station, Lt Bunchuan Jatharawas, of Bannang Sata Police Station, was being questioned by Lt Col Danai Ratajai for his earlier shooting of a junior special operations officer, who was seriously injured.

While being escorted by Col Danai to a room, Lt Bunchuan, who was not handcuffed, in violation of security regulations, snatched Col Danai's service pistol from his holster and fired four shots at him, killing him instantly.

Lt Bunchuan later ran and fired one shot at Col Chaithat Inthanoojit, a Deputy Yala Provincial Commander, who was also about to question him, but the lone bullet merely grazed his

Col Chaithat survived by jumping out of a window on the second floor, but suffered a shoulder dislocation and other serious injuries.

In the ensuing gunfight, Lt Bunchuan fired three shots at Sr Sgt Maj Piding Jehkoh but all bullets missed. Sgt Piding then returned fire at Lt Bunchuan.

Two bullets hit him in the chest while a third hit him in the head, killing him.

Sr Sgt Maj Decha Chuayiam, the special operations officer, who had been shot in the stomach and a leg by Bunchuan on the morning of September 28 at his home, was last reported to still be in critical condition.

Train track trauma. A woman

was run over by a train in Surat Thani on September 28 after being tied to the tracks. Police are unsure whether she was alive when the train hit her.

The body of Nipharat Thawonphon, 27, from Ban Na Dem District, Surat Thani, was found by police at around 7am, about 3km from Ban Na Dem railway station, after the driver of a Bangkok-Yala train reported seeing a body on the track.

Her ankles and wrists had been tied to the rails.

Relatives of the victim told police that they had not seen her since about 7pm the previous evening and had been unable to contact her.

Police said they are investigating whether a jealous lover could have been behind the killing.

Ungrateful child. Police have arrested a former foster daughter and her boyfriend for the killing of a 62-year-old kindergarten teacher whose body was found dumped on a hill in Trang's Na Yong District on September 28.

Thipsuda Singkharat, 62, a teacher at Anuban Songkhla school, had been tied up and her mouth sealed with duct tape. She had also been beaten and electrocuted with a stun gun.

On September 29, Maj Gen Wirun Eamphaijit, Commander of Songkhla Provincial Police, announced that his men had arrested Waragon Kaowpradit, 22, from Krabi, and her boyfriend Kormarudeen Rakchat, 19. Both had confessed to the crime, Gen Wirun said.

K. Thipsuda had looked after Waragon when she was a child and paid for her to study.

Police said that Waragon, who had moved away from K. Thipsuda 10 years ago, came back to K. Thipsuda's house with her boyfriend to steal money.

The police said that after breaking into K. Thipsuda's house in Muang District, Songkhla, Kormarudeen punched K. Thipsuda in the stomach and Waragon stunned her, leaving her uncon-

They then bound and gagged her. She later died from her injuries. After stealing 4,000 baht in cash and her ATM card, they loaded her into the back of her Toyota Soluna and drove her to Trang, where they dumped her, police said.

Pricey nest egg. The Koh Mak Tambon Administration Organization (*OrBorTor*) in Phatthalung's Pak Phayun District is facing financial difficulties after being ordered to administer two nearby islands where bird's nests are collected.

The order followed an appeal to the court that there were irregularities in the tendering process for the concession to collect

The previous concession expired on September 30. The court ordered OrBorTor Koh Mak to administer bird's nest islands 4 and 5 pending investigations and a review of the new concession contract.

Pradit Jariya, President of OrBorTor Koh Mak, said that he has sent a temporary squad of 10 Volunteer Defense Corp (VDC) officers to watch over the islands before a full team of police, forestry and VDC officers can be assembled.

K. Pradit complained that the OrBorTor would have to pay commissioned police officers 300 baht a day each in bonuses, while NCOs would get 200 baht.

The OrBorTor would also have to spend 3,000 baht a day to hire two boats, and 80 baht per head for meals. All this would come to at least 500,000 baht per month, he said.

K. Pradit said that there had already been reports of people stealing bird's nests from the island, but that he thought the team of VDC officers would solve the problem.

He added that he would have to wait for the order from the Phatthalung Administrative Court before he could award any new concessions.

Village chiefs shot dead. A gunman using an M16 rifle shot dead a village chief in Tambon Kota Baru of Narathiwat's Raman District on September 29, one day after a similar incident took place in Rangae District.

Rosah Isormusorm, 47, was found lying dead on the side of a back road in Tambon Ngernngam of Raman district.

He was heading to a local fresh market on his motorbike at the time of the incident.

The same district on Sunday also witnessed the shooting death of Ahama Lakuning, 33, a former ranger from the area.

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

Nigerian scams just keep on coming

ell there hasn't been a whole lot of good news going around these days with the Thai government squabbles crushing the tourism industry and the Wall Street financial meltdown threatening the global economy, and lots of rain.

So why complain about what we have no control over? Well, we tend to complain anyway. Maybe it makes us feel better, or helps pass the time during these slow periods.

In the midst of all this disconcerting news, I keep receiving scam letters addressed to my resort trying to bilk me out of what little money I have left in my bank

I am sure you have at some time received a "Nigerian" scam letter. They usually originate from Nigeria or the Ivory Coast and refer to a large sum of money, in the millions of dollars, that some organization needs to transfer out of their country.

The writer usually claims to be the relative of the recently deposed head of state or the widow of the recently deceased Minister of Finance.

RESERVATION ENOUIRY

SAMPLE

I am Dr Eric XYZ from the UK, and would like to book reservation for 4 people coming for vacation in your area on the 11th to the 21st of NOV 2008 If you have vacancy for the specified period, give me the total cost for the whole period of 2 single or double rooms for 10 nights for 4 guest.

Also, confirm if you will accept major credit card for your payment. Thank you and looking forward to hearing from you soon.

THE TYPICAL LETTER TO THE HOTEL AFTER CONFIRMING ROOM AVAILABILITY

Thanks for your reply. I am glad to tell you that the cost and conditions are acceptable by us and as such willing to make deposit payment immediately, due to our acceptance and willing detailed to stay in your facility.

A credit card detail would be send to you when I receive your confirmation mail, so that you would charge a part payment of 50% deposit for the booking as agreed by us. This will enable you secure the rooms for the period of time we will stay in your facility

Furthermore, I have made an arrangement for the transportations and other necessary things that we will be needed when we arrive in your country...

> For the security reason and confidentiality concerning my credit cards detail, I have decided that you will handle my credit card detail.

Sequel to this, once you receive the credit card details, you will charge a total sum of £3,800.00GPB Plus 50% deposit from it. Take your 50% deposit cost of your services and send the balance of £3,800.00 to my travel agent to enable him arrange all that would be needed on time.

please confirm this directives and provide me with your

This is a typical example of an email inquiry message from Nigerian scammers, along with the usual follow-up email offering to make payment in advance. The ruse is designed to make the victim think that or she will make a few extra bucks on the deal.

For your troubles in helping to set up a bank account for them, they will pay you the cool sum of a million dollars or so. The catch? They need just \$1,000 for "admin fees" to get the paperwork complete to send you the money.

A thousand dollars to make a million? Sounds like a deal. But surprise, surprise, after you send

the money, they will never be heard from again.

The new, improved Nigerian hotel scam letter works like this. The "customer" contacts the hotel and says he has a big group that needs to stay for a relatively long period – 10 days to two weeks. It's a good booking for the hotel.

After you confirm the room availability to them, they will then advise you that because of some credit card problem, or regulation in their home country, they would like to charge their entire trip, air-

They will then ask you to forward this money to their agent. So instead of them paying you \$3,000 to stay at your hotel, they will send you \$25,000 for all of the expenses of the trip.

They will ask you to pay XYZ travel agent \$20,000, and you get your hotel's \$3,000, and another \$2,000 for your troubles. \$2,000 to make one money wire sounds pretty good.

So here's how it works.

They have a stolen credit card with which they pay you the

It clears through your credit

card machine and is approved as the card hasn't been reported stolen yet.

The "customer" then asks you to send the \$20,000 in cash by Western Union to XYZ Travel Agent Co Ltd. The "customer" and XYZ Travel Co are one and the same.

So you now withdraw the \$20,000 from your bank account, go to Western Union, wire the money and spend the rest of the day thinking about what you will spend your \$2,000 on.

Wrong. Your bank calls the next day and advises you that the credit card transaction from the day before was not valid as it was made with a stolen credit card, and that the charges are unauthorized and will be reversed.

This is called a chargeback. Your bank account will now have \$25,000 deducted from it, even though the day before you already withdrew the \$20,000 cash in order to wire the funds to XYZ Travel Co by Western Union.

Western Union transactions are not reversible and the scam is complete. You are now out the

No shopping trips for you. The original hotel scam letters were hilarious in their ineptitude, still using improbable names and bookings for the Nigerian Oil Ministry.

Now, though, the letters have become more refined, but still share some common characteristics.

They now originate from the UK, which lends them a bit more

The person requesting the rooms is usually a doctor, minister or other authoritative figure.

They seem to always use capital letters, e.g., ROOM RE-QUEST. Don't ask me why.

And they usually ask to pay in full in the first letter and give the impression that they are in a hurry. (In reality, this is because they only have a day or two before the credit card is canceled by its owner).

Pictured on this page is a sample inquiry letter and a second letter after I replied to another "customer".

Note: they are both doctors! I have now prepared a form reply letter asking them to go to our on-line credit card facility to make payment, and so they are never heard from again.

They target small resorts and guesthouses that have a credit card machine, but not on-line credit card facilities.

Recently, I have seen letters to large restaurants for making pre-paid bookings for groups of 30 or more.

So, beware!

The prawn dipped in that sauce was splendid and to find out what the sauce was I tasted some alone and then realized that it was espresso foam.

Only the potato skins are used in the potato soup, and for the health conscious, it looks loaded with anti-oxidants.

I am not going to reveal the other ingredients; all I will say is that the color of the soup is identical to the ruby in the ring that Richard Burton used to win Elizabeth Taylor's heart.

It is delicious beyond description. If you need to impress someone who thinks they have tasted it all, then this is it. Perfect for a romantic dinner.

The black angus steak appeared grilled. It was well done on the outside and rare on the inside – extremely soft and succulent – but it was in fact poached. I won't reveal anymore, though, as it is not the recipe that is being exposed this week.

Method

Melt the butter, sugar, and the chocolate together in Bain-marie (a cooking term for a container, usually a pot that takes heat from a larger pot of hot water), then add the egg whites and mix quickly before mixing in the flour.

Tips

Keep the mix in a container in the fridge overnight.

Use a cake ring (diameter 4-5cm), (height 5-6cm).

Cut a strip of baking paper (15cm long, 7cm wide).

Grease the inside ring with butter and place the baking paper strip around.

Cut a square piece of baking paper (5cm²) and put the ring on it.

Finally, put the mix into 3/4 of the ring (help with spoon or even finger).

Keep in the fridge as long as you want before baking.



Aug 12. Day 2: all-night shoot in Soi Cowboy. Within 24 hours a local newspaper reports: "Looking dangerously shifty in a Hawaiian shirt and black wig, Hollywood superstar Nicolas Cage was, last night, spotted lurking outside the Tilac Bar on Soi Cowboy – the very same Bangkok go-go bar where fellow thespian Hugh Grant famously had his tackle felt."

Aug 23. Oopening scene. Nic's character sits alone quietly eating in a Prague pub. He looks at his watch (counting down: 22 minutes) and leaves. This sets his pattern; it's 22 minutes before the hit.

Nic is amazing. When you see the scene, I defy you to tell there is anything distracting him from his assignment.

Sept 11. Hard to believe it's been five years since 9/11. And hard to believe we are half way

through our shooting. When you work in a position like mine on a foreign production, you immerse yourself in the project. You live it day and night – week in, week out – with the sacrifice of all else in your life.

That is why film making is so seductive. We live in first-class hotels, are driven everywhere. And if you're fortunate enough to be a Production Designer, people think you are doing something important and leave you alone.

What a life.


You get paid to watch an actor of the caliber of Nicolas Cage perform his magic every day. You spend lots of somebody else's money enhancing your own ego (artists love to spend other people's money). And you're with a great group of fellow international gypsies.

Making movies is easy. Real life is hard.

Sept 20. Left the set early last night with food poisoning. Woke up this morning and found I had slept through the war. No CNN, BBC or any other TV coverage. Martial law imposed and Nic Cage, family & Norm G (producer) flew the coup to Korea.

But we'll muster on, I'm sure. You can't stop filming!

Sept 22. Nic is back. Found out that people just wanted to put flowers in the soldiers' gun barrels. But we have a few new problems: we can't fire guns anymore. We were in the midst of a huge four-night gun battle when

the coup happened. Also, our end scene involves the attempted assassination of a politician. This is a huge scene, thousands of extras, police, military, etc.

Sept 23. Nic is nervous... He has been protected by a squad of bodyguards, both his own professionals and Thai secret police. He is probably a choice target for anyone wanting to get in the news — and thus he's insisting we "shoot him out" as quickly as possible.

On the night of the coup (as

described to me): about 10 pm Thai police on our set start getting reports. We were setting up a scene in the middle of a warehouse complex where Nic shoots every guard in an attempt to get to Mr Big. Mr Big flees in his black Mercedes. Nic shoots the car and all in it except Mr Big.

Just as he's about to do Mr Big, a squad of police cars bursts through the gate, red lights flashing. At midnight, after an elaborate lighting set-up and many rehearsals, they were all set to roll, when suddenly Nic was whisked



off the set by his guards, the police cars turned and headed off into the night (they were real police cars; there's a lesson there) and, as a final insult, the black Mercedes was seized (it belonged to an official of the party that had just been deposed) and was also driven away. All within minutes.

The Thai A.D. calls a "wrap".

Sept 28. Snakes. We have been inundated with rain for the past three nights and the major exterior set (the safe house, recreated with landscaping, garage and driveway, in jungle by a canal) is flooded.

We still owe a day's shooting, including the big explosion that destroys the house. All the canals in Bangkok have burst their banks. Our house and its beautiful gardens were flooded. Four feet of water swept in and stayed for three days.

As this was in the middle of acres of scrub and wetland, scores of snakes were swept up in the deluge. Not liking this any more than we did, they sought high ground. Inside the set.

The house was full of snakes when the first crew member braved the flooded roadway and crept inside. Cobras, pythons, vipers, dozens of them were lounging about the stairs and balcony – enjoying the sun and doing what snakes do.

Needless to say, we're not shooting there anytime soon.

Sept 29. Nic Cage finished a day early and left on the first plane out this morning. At his request I gave him a full set of plans for the house and grounds. He has just bought an island in the Caribbean and may build a version of the house I designed. I said I'd consider it an honor and he told me how much he admired my work.

When we started the project I wasn't sure how I felt about Nicolas Cage. I had admired his work in some things (*Leaving Las Vegas, Lord Of War*) and not in others (*Con-Air, National Treasure*). I realize now it was the films that were lousy – not the performance. Nic Cage is a pro. I am a fan.

Oct 8. Winding down. Five days over.

to go. Day 2 of the big parade scene. 1,500 extras. 2 elephants (and a shit-carry boy), marching band, 2 WWII Willys jeeps, 7 cameras... but somehow the edge is missing. Even though this is the biggest production number of the show, we all seem to just be going through the paces. For most – thoughts are on home, family... or the next job.

And there's no Nic. We've lost our star power. Even with this much of a circus, we draw only a couple of hundred onlookers. The second night in Nakon Pathom, we tied up Main Street for three nights and had 5,000 people behind the yellow riot tape.

Even Bruce, my new visual effects friend, and William, my new producer friend, will shortly be off to Prague to film the opening of the movie. Others will go back to the US, Germany, Australia, New Zealand – and the majority, back to their families scattered throughout Thailand.


Oct 12. Final shot. Chinatown. Just like the film of the same name, when we scout the location and add a bit of tin to an alley wall to make it match the next location, three cellphones pop out of three shopkeeper's aprons. The calls are to property owners, partners, husbands—to determine how much extra money this infringement on their life will cost us. The location manager looks at me and shrugs: "It's Chinatown." Cinema often repeats itself.

We shoot from 5:30 pm to 10:30 pm. There is a sense of jubilation, melancholy and relief on the set. We've been shooting a chase scene through Chinatown's backalleys) using a steadicam. But with a steadicam the entire crew is locked out of the set as the camera operator follows the actor, moving 360° around him to get the shot.

The last shot is inside a warehouse with the actor racing from one end to the other. On the last take they leave the camera rolling as it bursts through the door, shooting the entire crew who burst into shouts, screams, applause... and a few tears.

We can't believe it. It's over.

As most people know, Thai is a tonal language and there are eight distinct tones: high, low, middle, rising, falling, guttural, glottal, and staggering.

The Clot takes much of its inspiration from the Japanese Haiku, but due to the tropical nature of Thailand's climate the structure has been modified to concentrate on food rather than the seasons (the feature of

The lines contain an equal number of syllables, arranged in stanzas of four lines each.

line rhymes with the third syllable of the second line; the last of the second with the last of the third and also with the first of the fourth line; and the last syllable of the

fourth line rhymes with the last of the second line of the next succeeding stanza.

This complex structure explains why so many poets became alcoholics or addicted to other mind-altering substances.

A favourite form of verse is called Nitwit poetry in which it is acceptable to use el-

ements of Schlong, Clap, and Clot.



Heaven sent...

f there was one aspect of this year's Phuket Vegetar ian Festival that shone like a heavenly star it was how much the festival had grown on previous years. After the initial days of merit making at Chinese shrines around the island, thousands took to the streets either as part of the street processions or as engaged onlookers.

The processions began and ended according to schedule, keeping traffic delays to a minimum, and street sweepers pootled along behind, sweeping up the shreds of red paper left behind from exploded firecrackers. So diligent were these street sweepers that they even worked the witching hour before midnight on the last night of festivities to make sure the streets were clean before the sun rose the next day.

In short, the festival was so well co-ordinated this year it was nearly professional.

Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit celebrated the first official day of the festival like thousands of other Phuket residents, by dressing up in white and enjoying a meat-free meal at one of the nine participating shrines, in this case Jui Tui Shrine on Soi Phuton in Phuket City.

Gov Niran said he intended to refrain from eating meat and to observe other rituals throughout the festival, which kicked off late afternoon on September 28 with the traditional raising of ko teng poles at the many participating shrines in Phuket City and in Kathu, where the festival has its roots back in the tin mining era in the early 1800s.

Also making an appearance was Phuket Provincial Administration Organization President Paiboon Ubatising, a long-time supporter of Jui Tui Shrine.

The first major procession to draw parts of Phuket City to a standstill came on the fourth day of the festival with the parade from Lim Hu Tai Su Shrine in Samkong to Jui Tui Shrine in the heart of Old Phuket Town.

Crowds lined the streets for the procession, which started at

the auspicious time of 7:19 am after two hours of religious cer-

Visual highlights of the spectacle included dancing dragons and teams of men carrying ornate Chinese palanquins, with the deafening sounds of exploding firecrackers and banging drums throughout to keep evil spirits at bay.

Scores of entranced devotees known as mah song (literally, "entranced horses") were carefully looked after by their handlers as they endured the long walk barefoot through the city.

Most were shaking, their eyes glazed over in a trance state allowing them to endure the pain of sharp objects thrust through their cheeks. Among the piercing objects were swords, shovels, scepters and large metal hoops, to name just a few.

The procession was the second of nine street processions held during the festival, which ended on the evening of October 7 with the lowering of the *ko teng* lantern poles and a farewell food offering to the Warrior Gods.

Although the lowering of the

ko teng poles is considered the "official" end of the Vegetarian festival, most locals know that the festival truly closes after the "running of the gods" at midnight on the last day of festivities at Saphan Hin.

Devotees from each shrine arrive in turn at Saphan Hin just before midnight, and run from the shrine's main gate to a pyre in the center of the grounds while carrying a palanquin with an effigy of their most-respected 'god' seated within.

As they run, other devotees and merit makers throw firecrackers at them. Most firecrackers are aimed at the devotees' feet, though some people aim a little higher, hoping for an auspicious shot to land the mild explosives in the palanquin, which happens to be head high.

The effigies and palanquins are then burned in a huge bonfire. As the gods return to the heavens on plumes of smoke, hundreds of devotees in the crowd set alight prayers written on sacred paper and pray aloud as their wishes are carried on the wind with the gods.



n 2008, the picture is not that different from the 1930s, when the world saw exactly what was meant by the economic term "depression".

This was in the wake of the Wall Street "crash" of October 1929 when a giant speculative bubble suddenly exploded. The ruling thought that went through lawmakers of that period was to essentially bring people to a better standard of behavior that, in turn, would lead to a sustained

economic upturn based on rock solid foundations.

The 1920s had seen a great deal of speculation and credit creation which had come to an abrupt end. Therefore, it seemed that the best way forward was to bring in policies that would encourage Americans to save for

what they wanted and to discourage borrowing and lending.

This, although American lawmakers did not realize it at the time, is called a "credit squeeze" or "credit crisis". The only guaranteed result is a recession and if policy is maintained it leads to "depression". In those days economics was not exactly a science; they were effectively groping around in the dark.

The Depression was relieved to a degree by the "New Deal" policy of then US President Roosevelt, in 1933 onwards. In today's economic terms his policies were actually "pump priming" or government spending.

However, it meant that, with the Federal Government spend-

ing money, it alleviated some of the problems. In reality, it took World War II to bring an end to the economic slump as demand for a huge range of goods and services changed everything.

We are in the second year of a credit crunch, also the result of speculation, and, as this col-

umn is being written, we see US lawmakers in Congress turning down the Paulson plan to "bail out" the economy. Their thinking (lawmakers) was more to do with punishing Wall Street (Business) than helping Main Street (the American public).

The members of Congress

that voted against the bailout are either guilty of stupidity or being totally unscrupulous. The fact that elections are imminent leads one to believe in the latter.

Congress is being assailed by members of the public who are incensed by the thought of up to US\$ 700 billion of taxpayers' money being used to bail out "these rich folks on Wall Street".

In addition, for Republican congressmen, there is a wish to strongly distance themselves from the Bush Administration, and for Democrats there is a perfect opportunity to look after the "little guy"

type recession/depression. We are on very dangerous ground. This can rapidly spiral out of control; credit markets are already frozen. The next stage is for a rise in unemployment, foreclosures and bankruptcies in a speedily increasing cycle. It is important to add that all these events are accompanied by a great deal of human misery. They are not called depressions without justification.

The original Paulson plan has been watered down by politicians to the point that it is not really a US\$ 700 billion bailout. Now it is a down payment of US\$ 250 billion with two separate tranches for the remainder. The first requires presidential approval for US\$ 100 billion, and the bal-

ance requires new congressional authorization.

Stephen Roach, the chairman of Morgan Stanley's Asian operations and former Chief Economist of the group, is extremely critical of the amended bill. "During times of crisis and panic, the policy response should err on the side of overkill. This approach errs on the side of under kill".

One of the main reasons for Congress refusing to pass the original (but amended) bill was the reality that most members are up for re-election in November. Enough of their constituents were loudly protesting about bailing out Wall Street, etc.

These same constituents appeared to be completely un-

aware that frozen credit markets were in the process of destroying the fabric of the American economy. Frozen credit markets mean that companies would have problems financing payrolls; small businesses would collapse.

Louis Alexander, Chief Economist of Citigroup, said the position was getting worse every day and doing more damage to the US economy. The US Senate eventually passed the bill. However, by that stage so many other unrelated measures had been attached as to make the original Paulson plan a bit like a "needle in a haystack".

Many people are watching stockmarket values and, whilst they are important, perhaps the remarks made by Art Cashin, director of floor trading operations for banking giant UBS in America, brings the whole situation into perspective. He noted that equities (stock markets) are currently a sideshow, the real center being the credit markets. He went on to say that on the day of congress refusing to pass the bill the US Federal Reserve, under chairman Ben Bernanke, had injected US\$ 600 billion into American and Global money markets. Cashin stated that Bernanke was scared, and that: "if he is scared, I am scared".

This column stated in the *Phuket Gazette*'s issue of July 16-23, 2005 that: "It is very unlikely that the US housing bubble is just about to "pop". Unfortunately, bubbles, whether they are in such historical areas as tulips, stock markets or real estate, are inclined to go to extremes. It is the nature of markets to go too far in any direction before stability reasserts itself." This was an article on the reckless lending in the US Residential property market.

Last words to Warren Buffet: "The US economy is on its back, having suffered cardiac arrest."







The Return of the Wild Man

homas McGuane was once my hero. Over 30 years ago, I read his masterly third novel, Ninety-two in the Shade, and was entranced by the wild humor and magical clarity of his prose.

In this short, doomed, drug-and-booze fuelled tale of a would-be skiff fisherman in Key West, there are magnificent passages of pure prose-poetry that I've returned to again and again over the years, beginning with the

classic opening line: "Nobody knows, from sea to shining sea, why we are having all this trouble with our republic.'

It was a hard act to follow and McGuane hasn't, though he retains his mastery of the lan-

His fictional territory has ranged from Upper Michigan to Key West to Montana – the old stamping grounds of Hemingway,

with whom he shares a love of fishing and hunting, though it's difficult to imagine a more differ-

The last five of his nine novels take place in his adopted home

of Montana as do most of the 10 stories in his latest collection Gallatin Canyon (Alfred A. Knopf, New York, 2008, 220pp).

McGuane is almost 70 now and his choice of characters reflects his age: wealthy retired men striving, and failing, for a second life with a woman in rural

Montana. These stories show the failings of his writing in later life: arch, mannered, baroque prose that succeeds as physical description but utterly fails as dialog or character development.

That said, he has produced a perfect gem of a short story, so perfect it belongs in the company of oft-anthologized masterworks like Hemingway's "A Clean, Well-Lighted Place", Fitzgerald's "Babylon Revisited" and Faulkner's "A Rose for Emily".

"North Coast" is a mere six pages but packs an enormous emotional wallop wrapped up in precise plot and pacing.

We meet two young wilderness guides, Austin and Ruth, trekking in deep Pacific coastal forest, following a GPS heading to a secret destination. The couple are heroin users, alternating between pure stints in the wild and urban drug excess.

"And they were wise; they never went to Vancouver unless, as a kind of enfranchisement, they were prepared to use.

"To land in that town with empty pockets hoping to improvise your way onto the golden thoroughfare was to risk terrible consequences, and they were too smart for that.

"Hence this trip through a primeval forest known with surprising intimacy by Austin.

"In certain respects, it was a perfect life: you descended from some of the wildest country left on the planet, sunburned and hard muscled after a season of gazing upon creation, straight down into the city of man where

bliss came in a blue Pacific wave and the most beautiful hookers lined up around the cruise-ship terminals and chatted about the future."

The ending is a shocker, a

crude betrayal of all they hold sacred for chemical kicks.

"Miracle Boy" also breaks the mold of the disaffected elderly in the other stories. This is a firstperson, seemingly autobiographical account of a boy's journey from the Midwest in the 1950s to his mother's home

in Rhode Island and her extended Irish Catholic family. The occasion is the deathbed vigil for the boy's grandmother and, perversely enough, all hilarity breaks loose.

But as fine as these two stories are, they pale in the shadow of "The Refugee". Allowing him-

self the 50-age scope of an Alice Munro story, McGuane presents the saga of an alcoholic orange farm manager who sails his ketch across the Gulf of Mexico in search of a long-lost elderly fe-

male seer in Key West. It's McGuane's own "Babylon Revisited" – a refugee from the drug-soaked 1960s returns to his old haunts "where everyone had a gun". Ironically enough, he and his best friend's trade at the time had been smuggling Cuban refugees in their sailboat.

But just when you think you've figured out the arc of the story it expands into another seaborne ordeal and a trial of repentance and absolution.

And just when you've written off McGuane as calcified, he turns as lively and epic and penetrating as Conrad.

A wimp with bad grammar

am writing a story for young adults about bullying. In one scene, the bully tells the bul lied, "You bump heads with someone as big and tough as me and you're going to end up shorter and squatter than you already are." To which the other boy, getting to his feet, says, "'As I.'

To be correct, you should have said, '...as big and tough

I've run this past several people, who think the bully is right.

Which should it be – I or me? Robert Lytle Michigan

I love your idea of having the kid show how plucky he is by correcting the bully's grammar – but not with that sentence.

A phrase like "someone as big and tough as..." might end with either "me" or "I", depending on its grammatical role: is it a subject or an object?

Try mentally replacing the whole phrase with "me" or "I" alone, and that should tell vou which word is right.

You'd say, "you bump heads with me," correct? Therefore you should also say, "you bump heads with someone as big and tough as me."

Then again, if the bully suddenly had a change of heart and was good with grammar, he might say, "Someone as big and tough

as I shouldn't be picking on a little guy like you." At least, that's according to most traditionalists.

There are language commentators who argue in favor of using "as me" no matter what mainly because they think "as I" sounds pretentious.

So, you could have the bully say "as big and tough as I" and have his victim correct him with "As me."

But I wouldn't recommend it, and here's why: people who want to sound educated but don't know the rules for using "me" and "I" tend to use "I" for everything.

No doubt you want your bully to seem ignorant – bullies usually are.

Therefore, he shouldn't know the rules about "me" and "I".

But I doubt he'd be interested in sounding educated (let alone pretentious) - so he probably wouldn't misuse "I".

Why not have him, instead, use a double negative, like "You don't know nothing or you wouldn't be messing with me"? That's definitely, unmistakably ignorant.

Misusing peruse

The verb "peruse" is commonly used when referring to reading something quickly, scanning or skimming, such as "peruse a magazine".

The American Heritage Dictionary defines "peruse" as "to read or examine, typically with great care".

Is "peruse" commonly misused, or is this word a contronym?

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Barbara replies:

No doubt "peruse" will someday be a contronym - a word with two opposite meanings (as in "off" in "The alarm clock is going off – turn it off!"). But it isn't yet, according to the American Heritage Dictionary, the New Oxford American Dictionary and

Merriam-Webster's Collegiate and Webster's New World disagree – but what is the point of having a slightly fancy word that can mean both "read carefully" and "skim"?

If "peruse" can mean both equally, I think we'll almost surely stop using it to mean anything at all.

I hope you'll join me in sticking with the traditional use.

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Turning on the tourists

As the high season approaches, (it officially begins on November 1), more tourists can already be seen around Phuket. This week the Gazette is carrying a number of reports related to recent efforts by authorities to boost security on the island as well as initiatives to reassure tourists of their comfort and safety.

The TAT and provincial authorities have had to work hard to counteract negative international news coverage of the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) protests that forced the closure of Phuket International Airport for two days in August.

One initiative by the Ministry of Tourism to counteract negative media coverage, as well as travel advisory warnings issued in some of the countries that feed Phuket's tourism industry, has been to invite foreign diplomats to experience Phuket's tourist attractions for themselves. (See this issue's 'Inside Story' on pages 4 and 5.)

In addition to visiting some of the region's natural beauty spots, the foreign diplomats experienced Thailand's unique brand of hospitality, with some being escorted along Soi Bangla. This initiative demonstrates that the region's tourism authorities are realistic about the attractions that draw foreign tourists to the island, and is quite possibly a more effective approach than other confidence-rebuilding initiatives, such as TAT roadshows staged abroad, because nothing sounds more attractive to others than a first-hand account. And it is the people who will be relating these first-hand accounts that can make a difference.

On matters of tourist security, one of this week's front-page stories in the Gazette reports on the installation of more CCTV cameras in Patong. Though these devices may or may not offer a solid deterrent against criminal acts, they certainly increase the chance of catching miscreants and demonstrate that tourist security is being taken seriously.

Security has also been beefed up at the Chart Chai checkpoint, (see page 1, this issue), where vehicles enter and leave Phuket. A number of weapons were seized at the checkpoint through the use of high-tech scanning equipment recently deployed there.

The fact that several weapons were found in a short period would suggest that crime is rife on the island. It is undeniable that crime exists in Phuket, as it does in any city; however, the threat of violent crime against tourists seems relatively low for those who take the same kind of preventative measures for personal safety as they would in their own countries

In Chalong and Rawai, police have been seen more frequently and in greater numbers. Some of their arrests have included foreigners who chose to take risks and broke the law of the land they were visiting. We can be thankful to the police for that. - The Editor

The case against Monkey Island

I set up the Wildlife Friends Foundation with the following objectives:

1. To rescue wild animals from places where they are maltreated or neglected, and to help them to spend the rest of their lives in a sanctuary as close to the natural environment as possible with the best possible care. In particular, to provide sanctuary for those animals that no-one else is prepared to care for, such as the sick and disabled.

2. To educate people, particularly children, in preventing cruelty to animals. In particular, to campaign against illegal trade in wild animals for the pet industry, and to discourage the use of animals for entertainment, such as performing animal shows.

3. To prevent hunting of wild animals and to promote conservation of all natural resources, fauna and flora alike; to educate local people, tourists and the international community to appreciate, understand and protect wild animals, their rain forest and mangrove and marine-park habitats. Also to assist the Royal Forestry Department and other organizations concerned with the rescue and conservation of wild animals.

4. To gather knowledge to implement release programs for animals that qualify for re-introduction into the wild.

Phuket is a paradise for people but it can be hell for animals in tourism. Here some examples:

Elephants are still taken out of the wild as babies and trained to perform for tourists. They are later used as taxis for "elephant trekking" and rides. Although people are made to believe that

dwin Wiek is the director and founder of the Wild life Friends Foundation (Thailand). He has lived in Thailand since 1990. Between 1996 and 2000, he spent his weekends watching wildlife in the jungles of Kaengkrachan in Petchaburi province, where he also observed wild animals kept in confinement at people's homes, such as gibbons on chains and bears locked in tiny cages.

In an effort to take action against the hunting and confinement of wild animals, Edwin set up the Wildlife Friends
Foundation in 2001. Here, he talks about his foundation's objectives and his objections to the proposed Monkey Island Project.

all these elephants are born in captivity and would otherwise be out of work due to the logging ban, the truth is different.

Many elephants make too many rides in the high season, walking for hours in the full sun with up to three people and a wooden frame on their backs. Many of the elephants are constantly stressed from spending days and nights near busy roads.

Baby gibbons, eagles and snakes seem to appear all over the island to be used as props in souvenir photos for tourists in and around the bars and beaches. These lovely baby gibbons are taken from the wild after their mothers are shot and can only be used for three to four years, because as they grow older, they become aggressive.

The animals are drugged so that they stay docile with people. Tourists should know better then to pay for a photo to be taken of them with an animal. Our campaign slogan says, "For a picture of you and me, my family got

killed". Shocking but very true.

Zoo animals are often kept in small enclosures, while tigers are kept on short chains and drugged to make it possible for tourists to have pictures taken with them. These animals are being used (read exploited) to the maximum level possible without any concern for their wellbeing.

PHUKET MONKEY ISLAND MADNESS

I have read, with much interest, articles in the *Gazette* about plans for a Monkey Island off the coast of Phuket. This sanctuary has been presented as a "primate conservation project" run by "conservationists". In reality, I believe it is nothing more than a zoo - a collection of exotic animals - with the sole purpose of making money for a few individuals without any concern for wildlife conservation or the environment

The MonkeyLand zoo in South Africa is run by the same

businessmen who are proposing Monkey Island off Phuket. The MonkeyLand zoo has been open since 1998. Visitors are charged an entrance fee and the zoo has never been able to prove where most of the animals kept there originate from.

MonkeyLand has neither a record of successful rehabilitation of any primates to the wild, nor any viable populations in captivity that are living in the (semi) wild. In the meantime, the zoo is constantly looking for new primate species to add in order to attract more visitors and more money.

The Jane Goodall institute suggested in an open letter to the South African government in 2003 that an additional "Chimpanzee conservation project" by MonkeyLand should not be supported, as the conservation issue would nowhere be served, and there would be a negative impact on the local environment. Consequently the new project was not granted permission.

Apart from that, conservation of African and South American primates on a Thai island, as suggested, is an unfortunate idea for a few reasons. Thailand has 14 primate species in the wild; 12 are under serious threats. If any island or any given piece of forest should be used for conservation of wildlife within Thailand, it should be used for Thai wildlife as areas of natural habitat become more and more scarce.

Claims that the islands in question could maintain healthy populations of various species are false. The islands are so small that probably only two different species of primate could co-exist there. Their numbers would reach just a few dozen each, which is never enough for a healthy gene pool, and inbreeding is one of the biggest concerns.

Any research on captive wildlife as suggested will have little or no value to the conservation of the wild populations.

Finally, there is the environmental impact of a monkey island to consider. The partially inhabited islands off the coast of Phuket are some of the last undisturbed breeding grounds for several species of rare birds, fruit bats and other small wildlife.

The introduction of freeroaming primates on these islands will see bird eggs eaten, nests destroyed, and damage to other animals and their habitats – the extent of which cannot yet be seen.

The Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) currently undertaken for the Monkey Island project is paid for by Monkey-Land and can't be called unbiased. A proper EIA should be undertaken through the proper channels, and should take over a year to complete. It seems that MonkeyLand is trying to cut corners for their own benefit and objectives.



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Dili Days... Matt Crook samples the simple life in Timor's capital

he word going around town was that there was going to be a Mexican party somewhere. It's difficult to say whether we were invited to the party, as a friend of a friend had been told not to bring too many people.

The idea of a Mexican party in the middle of Dili was just too good to turn down. I had not even an inkling of what such a party would be like, but if it were anything like the ones I'd seen on television, I could have dug it.

As a city populated by a tight-knit community of expats – aid workers, NGO staff, peace-keeping troops – the Mexican party had a muddled, global feel.

The three of us arrived to a garden full of foreigners. A Timorese security guard opened the gate for us; there would be no unwelcome guests here.

A short man, who I presumed was a real Mexican, went around with a large bag of masks. On several occasions he rolled his head back and howled into the night.

He ambled over to a bell hanging by a rope and began roaring, always with one hand on the bell rope, which he rang to the delight of all.


So this is Mexico, I thought to myself. On the dance floor was some sort of Timorese line dance going on to Macarena.

There weren't many Timorese people at the party. It's uncommon for expats to mingle with the locals in Timor-Leste much beyond work commitments.

There is an enormous social gap between the Timorese and everybody else, which is understandable given that it's only two years since violence erupted and up to 150,000 people fled their homes.

Many have still yet to return; the country is in a constant state of rebuilding.

But these Mexicans: what's the deal? My friend and I snuck

out of the party. We left the Macarena and the man with the masks and sauntered along unlit roads back to the place we call home.

Dili is an eerie place by night. Attacks on foreigners are extremely rare, but when on my own I've been heckled and screamed at and even stalked on the streets.

We were halfway home when we came to the local pool hall: an open-air shack with a single table where bare-chested local youths play for kicks and bucks.

It was past midnight and before we knew it we were hanging out with six Timorese street punks. The stake was \$1.50 and the game was two-ontwo, potting balls in ascending numerical order while playing cards were turned over, we didn't know what for.

Although confused at first, the pool kids were happy to have the company. Soon we all realized that none among us had any skill with a pool cue.

The game went on and on, the cards were turned and turned, and at the end of it all my friend and I had won. We were handed our buck-fifty back. and the stake of our opponents and there came the offer of more games and palm

With an odor and appearance similar to raw eggs, palm wine, the preferred tipple of many Timorese, tastes so acidic and so bitter that your tongue retreats with astonishment with every mouthful. We declined the offer and left feeling content.

These two sides of the city – a Mexican party under lock and key and six kids hanging out just around the corner – is an indication of what travelers can expe-

rience in Dili. Thanks to the incredible presence of the UN, there are dozens of hotels, restaurants, bars and clubs catering to Western tourists.

However, Dili quickly becomes boring if you choose to frequent only these places.

Dili can be expensive and it doesn't have much of a backpacker scene, and the list of "things to see and do in Dili" is short.

Modern conveniences are scarce and life is simple, but what you have is the chance to see a developing country and meet people who until very recently were forced to endure horrors the likes of which most people would not want to imagine.

When I interact with Timorese people, they are excited to see a new face that doesn't come with a logo or a uniform. The people in Dili are rebuilding their lives. The buildings lie in ruins, families are torn apart, and yet every day I meet people with amazing stories who are open and inviting and hopeful for the future.

Life in Dili is inspiring and interesting. To be among and talk to people who have been through so much in such a short time is a somber experience, but it gives you an insight into what life has been like for the Timorese.

Dili is easy to get to, with international airlines flying in and out several times a week. While not an obvious place for a vacation, I would recommend Dili to anyone, even if only to see first-hand what the place is like.

The city needs an influx of people who aren't interested in Mexican parties, but who want to see the place for what it is.

Once you are in Dili and have experienced a slice of Timorese life, there is an entire world waiting to be discovered around Timor-Leste, where few travelers have made the journey. Each of Timor-Leste's 13 districts offers something new and exciting.

Dili is only the gateway and is a very separate entity to the rest of the country.

Many times I've heard travelers talk about how Thailand has changed over the past 20 years, and how too many people now visit Pai, Koh Pha-ngan, Chiang Mai and so on; and yet these very same travelers have an adventure calling out to them, and it's just a few hours away.





Top volleyball teams to return to Phuket

KARON: While doubt lingers over whether Olympic champions Misty May-Treanor and Kerri Walsh will return to Phuket to defend their FIVB champion title, tournament organizers have confirmed that eight of the world's top 10 beach volleyball teams will be in Phuket to vie for the honor.

At the time of going to press, May-Treanor was still recovering from an injury sustained when the duo from the US made sporting history by winning their second consecutive Olympic gold medal in the sport in Beijing earlier this year.

The 3rd Phuket Thailand Open, the penultimate stop on the Swatch-FIVB Women's Beach Volleyball World Tour, will be held on Karon Beach from November 4 to 9.

The tournament, which offers prize money of US\$175,000, has attracted entries from the world's leading professional beach volleyball teams to what is regarded as one of the biggest beach volleyball tournaments in Asia.

More than teams from about 30 countries are expected to take part in the tournament, including Austria, Brazil, Canada, China, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, Great Britain, Israel, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Mexico, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand and the USA.

Thailand as the host country is allocated two teams in the main draw and an additional four teams to participate in the qualifying rounds.

The tournament is sanctioned by the Federation Internationale de Volleyball (FIVB) and the Volleyball Association of Thailand (TVA), and is played over six days of competition. The country quota play-offs will be held on November 4, qualification rounds on November 5 and the main draw between November 6 and 9. Matches will start at 9 am daily, except on finals day, when matches will start at 3 pm.

There will be global TV cov-

More than teams from about puntries are expected to take in the tournament, including ria, Brazil, Canada, China, erage of the semi-finals on November 8, and the final and 3rd and 4th place play-offs on November 9.

The matches will be televised live on Thailand's national TV, on Eurosport and in the US. In addition to the live broadcast, a special highlight show of the tournament will go out to more than 4 million households worldwide

Admission to the tournament is free. The program includes beach volleyball camps, and there will be cheerleaders and many other activities and games in the tent village adjacent to center court.

Local organizations sponsoring the tournament include the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT), the Sports Authority of Thailand, PTT Public Co Ltd, the Kata Group of Hotels, the *Phuket Gazette*, PGTV, Haad Thip, Woraburi Resort, the FBT, the TOT and CS Loxinfo. International sponsors of the event are the Swatch Group, Mikasa and Descente.

ery few villa complexes manage to produce a truly distinctive and unique blend of design styles, but that is what Warayuth "Lek" Horkawe and Jaran Jongcharoenkamol have accomplished with their work at The Baray Villa in Kata.

The stunning result is a combination of Thai and Arabian designs that have been brought together at the complex, which sits on two rai attached to the Sawasdee Village resort. Baray Villa comprises 14 villas, each offering 110 square meters of living space, and a private pool of about 30sqm in front each villa.

"We started drawing up the design for Baray Villa last October. The whole process [to completion of construction] took about 11 months," explained Lek, managing director and owner of the resort.


His partner in the design, Jaran, is an architect who worked in Dubai for years and is also the man responsible for much of the design of Sawasdee Village.

The exterior and gardens at Baray Villa are mostly Thai, but the interior is unmistakably Arabian, Lek explained. The overall design of the villas is characteristically Thai in that individual homes are separated by gardens, but each villa is also encompassed by a fence lined with Arabian *sema*-style design along the top.

Inside the homes, instead of using small doorways as portals to separate chambers, Baray Villa uses very wide open-plan designs. A common feature of traditional Thai homes, these offer long sight lines with extensive use of mixed Thai-Arabic designs in the decor fitted throughout.

All the artifacts in the homes were handmade by the same team of craftsmen in Chiang Mai who made the ornaments dotted throughout Sawasdee Village. But the *kanok* above

the headboards forms only part of the border of the wall piece, encircling an Arabian-style geometric pattern, Lek explained.

There is extensive use of columns throughout the development. "All the columns feature Arabian-style capitals and many are covered with Arabian patterns. They would look too plain without them, so we had our artists create resin panels of intricate Arabic designs and cover the columns with them," Lek said.

Another common Middle Eastern design feature used in the homes are domes, the most prominent of which forms the ceiling of the master bedroom. "We used the same style domes seen in Turkish mosques and adapted them," explained Lek.

There is also a resin dome

above the pool bar that has a perforated design, allowing light to pass through and create an intricate reflective pattern off the water below.

As with the dome at the pool bar, the domes atop the villas can be illuminated at night in different colors to wonderful effect, Lek added.

So extensive is the use of Arabic designs in the resort's new restaurant, it even bears an Arabic name: Al Majlis. This word, which refers to the room in an Arabian house that is used for receiving guests, is consequently synonymous as a tea room, explained Lek.

"The same designer, Jaran, figured out how to make best use of the limited space we had. He came up with the idea of a chill-

out area with large divans. He also came up with the idea of using a canvas roof to represent the desert," Lek said.

Fitted into the walls at Al Majlis are large light fittings with tiny shards of colored glass contained within an Arabian-style frame, while in the villas hang Moroccan-style lanterns.

Using glass fragments to refract light and thus provide a soft glow is more commonly seen in lanterns hung throughout Thai temples.

"Although the lighting is soft, we used many low-intensity light bulbs – more than 100 bulbs in each villa – to create a warm atmosphere," said Lek.

resin recreations of Arabian designs and geometric patterns have been used to create the ornaments that adorn the walls and the panels separating areas throughout the villas.


"The molds, made of copper and aluminum, were created by one of the artists who helped cast the statue of Luang Por Chaem at Wat Chalong. He worked with our team to custommake many other molds, such as for door knobs, door locks and other forms of domestic art," said Leb


"Without close inspection, much of the artwork could easily be mistaken to have been crafted from wood, but actually it's resin," he added. "Resin now has roles in construction and decoration. It's easy to mold and fast to make."

To add to the Arabian ambiance of the resort, Lek and Jaran used the color of golden sand throughout the villas.

In Lek's opinion, even photographs fail to capture the impact on the senses that Baray Villa has.

"There's only one way to see how beautiful it is, and that's to come and visit," he said.

There is also a separate maid's quarters with enough space for two live-in staff.

t seems you cannot turn on the TV, read a newspaper or magazine these days and fail to be confronted by apocalyptic images of ozone depletion, vanishing rainforests and melting polar ice caps.

Recently, I received a call from a large international media outfit that was working on a story about exemplary green real estate and hotel developments. They wanted to know if I could provide them with some local success stories. As my mind became more clouded than London fog, I promptly descended into a listless stupor that very nearly spoiled my lunch.

In the days and weeks that followed, I became increasingly aware of the many environmentally-friendly ways in which Phuket could help to save our planet. One of the Bangkok dailies recently reported that 70% of the world's population live in urban areas, a figure which is expected to rise significantly in the coming years.

Paved areas such as highways, walkways and parking lots account for some 35% of all surface area. If you factor in roofspace the figure jumps by a further 25%. In many parts of the world, the use of white roofing has become common practice in order to lower surface temperature by reflecting heat. Many US states mandate both the building of flat-roofed homes and the use of white in order to reduce energy consumption.

Even simple things like light bulbs have enormous potential for savings. Every time you turn on a normal incandescent bulb a little over 10% of the power is used for light with close to 90% being lost through heat dissipation.

Energy-saving compact fluorescent lights are not only six times more efficient, but they last up to 10 times longer than regular light bulbs. The math is easy. You save electricity, have lower power bills and get better value for money while doing your bit for Mother Earth. It is hard not to "see the light" with this seemingly no-brainer bit of logic.

I recently came across an article about Virgin boss Richard Branson's private Caribbean is-

lands, which share many common energy issues with Phuket. The extensive use of solar panels and wind turbines is being planned there, as is the introduction of new technologies to allow natural airflow to cool dwellings, thus replacing that mother of all energy wasters: the air-conditioner. Transport will be by highly efficient "carts" that will run on biofuels.

While most islands in that part of the world struggle with water problems, the extensive use of flat-roofing and continuous guttering to catch rainfall allows for better storage of this precious resource.

Given Phuket's growing water shortages and its mushrooming population, it is surprising that such simple, cost-effective solutions do not figure more prominently on developers' agen-

As global food shortages

continue and rising gas prices drive up the cost of basic commodities, the future trend will be towards renewed growth in local agriculture and home gardening, both in rural and urban areas.

Crucially, this will depend upon the availability of water. Collecting rainfall and creating large water storage facilities adds synergy to the entire process.

Urban organic farming is becoming a global phenomenon. One example in West Phuket, Sands in Mai

Khao, was a pioneer in community organic gardening in a residential resort setting. With our tourism-based economy and

eating, organic foods are becoming more common on restaurant menus. Local entrepreneurs will no doubt identify and act on these opportunities.

Local gardening is doubly

beneficial because it lowers petrol consumption by reducing the distances that food needs to be transported, while lowering pressure on commodity prices by reducing demand.

Thinking globally but acting locally is neither formidable nor complex. It is about

taking simple steps and making responsible decisions; even small actions can help.

There are bright spots on growing trend towards healthier the horizon, with hotel chains such

as Six Senses sponsoring groupwide initiatives as well as smaller but equally meaningful solutions like the garden plots at West

Phuket is sorely lagging behind when compared with many other leisure destinations, where eco-accommodation, recycling and the harnessing of wind, wave and solar energy are becoming key agenda items.

While our island looks to tourism and property as important economic providers, looking after our planet needs to become more a part of our daily lives.

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
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

Cherng Talay to get new bi-lingual kindergarten

lingual pre-school and kindergarten is cur rently under construction on one rai at 13/3 Sri Soonthorn Road, Cherng Talay.

Construction of the school is set to be completed this month. with the school set to open its doors to students on October 27.

The new school is a sister school of the existing bilingual Kajonkietsuksa School in Wichit.

The new building will be a single-storey school near Laguna. Teaching will be based on the Thai Education Ministry's curriculum, translated into English and supplemented with international materials and teaching

The new school is being built by Vasi Construction Co., Ltd.

"In each air-conditioned classroom there will be a native English teacher, a Filipino teacher and a Thai teacher.'

Mr Permkiat added that teachers at the school will emphasize the importance of morality, kindness and tolerance in a multi-national environment.

"In a school with so many different nationalities, children will learn this automatically and playfully," he said.

The school's co-ordinator Barbara van Oers told the Ga-


"The children will benefit She added that the school from the inclusion of many windows in the new school, allowing natural light and fresh air to fill the classrooms.
