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Sea Gypsies fight eviction

threat

PHUKET CITY: On Tuesday November 4, some 300 members of the Rawai Sea Gypsy Community staged a protest, starting at Phuket Provincial Court, in an attempt to continue living on a disputed 12-rai tract of seaside land they say was first settled by their ancestors more than 100 years ago.

The land in question, in Rawai Village, is currently home to over 110 Sea Gypsy families, and is part of a larger 29-rai plot which the entire Rawai Sea Gypsy community calls home.

The court had been petitioned by the inheritor of the chanote title deed for the land to issue an eviction order for Kwanjit Bangjak and Aroon

Khongthong, two of more than 1,000 Sea Gypsies now living on the 12-rai plot. In a show of solidarity and fearing they might be the next to get their marching or-

ders, some 300 other Rawai Sea Gypsies accompanied the pair when they went to acknowledge the court case with their lawyer. At the court, they handed over a petition claiming that the land was rightfully theirs and requesting to continue living on it.

From the courthouse, they marched some 200 meters to Phuket Provincial Hall, carrying a banner that read "Phuket Community Network". Once there, Sea Gypsy Community leaders, including Supat Nunkhao, met with with the new Governor, Preecha Ruangjan.

Governor Preecha listened to their plight and told them he was familiar with the community, but had only driven past it.

He said he would visit the site soon and do his best to work out an equitable solution to the problem.

Sea Gypsy Niran Yangpan, who contacted the *Gazette*, said he suspected that the chanote holder eventually wanted to evict all the Sea Gypsies so that a resort or other tourist business could be built there.

Police to seek arrest warrant following fatal bus crash

Salaeng driver blamed for highway tragedy

MAI KHAO: Police are set to issue an arrest warrant for the driver of the *salaeng* (motorcycle with side-car attached) that caused the bus crash on the night of Sunday November 2 in Mai Khao Village.

Having already questioned four eye-witnesses as well as the victims of the accident, police are convinced that the *salaeng* was primarily to blame for the accident that occurred when a fully-loaded bus, heading for Satun, overturned and crashed at about

9 pm on Sunday, killing two people and injuring over thirty.

Eyewitnesses at the scene told police that the bus was heading north on the outbound lane of Thepkassatri Road when the salaeng approached, driving against the flow of traffic.

The bus driver was forced to swerve to avoid colliding with the oncoming vehicle, but subsequently lost control, careering off the road and crashing into an electric pole on the median strip.

"Police know the identity of

the *salaeng* driver on this road at the time that the accident occurred

We will ask the court for an arrest warrant once the investigation is complete", said Tah Chat Chai Police Superintendent Sakchai Limcharoen.

Sakchai added that the police also planned to bring charges against the bus driver.

Eyewitness reports suggested that the bus driver, Watchara Wangklaew, had been driving well in excess of the legal speed limit at the time of the accident.

The two passengers of the bus who died in the accident were later named as Saowitree Klongyuan, a 23 year-old woman from Krabi, and Ampi Kanom, 29, from Nong-Kai. Police also confirmed that only one passenger remains in hospital, with a broken leg. All the others have already been discharged.

It is illegal to drive in the wrong direction on Thai roads, but the law is rarely enforced.

Community training a big hit in Nai Harn

RAWAI: The Austrian-Phuket Community Center, in association with the Phuket Provincial Office, held a five-day training session late last month to help people from east coast communities develop local products and services to achieve economic self-sustainability.

The training, held from October 25 to 29, was hosted by the All Seasons Naiharn Phuket resort at Nai Harn Beach.


The hotel's management staff gave talks on a variety of community development strategies on topics including product development, marketing and advertising. Guest speakers included Phuket Office of Sports and Recreation Development Director Promchote Traivate.

A total of 66 people from 17 communities attended the training. They came from Rawai (50 participants), Pa Khlock (10) and Rassada (6).

The Austrian-Phuket Community Center, established on Koh Sireh after the 2004 tsunami by international humanitarian aid organization Hilfswerk Austria, has remained active in a number of community development programs on the island since the disaster.

Local manager Kamaewalai Teerasuwannachak opened the training, which ended with a closing ceremony presided over by Phuket Vice Governor Worapot Ratthasima.





Box jellyfish discovered off Phi Phi

PHUKET: The Marine and Coastal Resources Department has warned of box jellyfish attacks after the highly poisonous species was found off Koh Phi Phi in Krabi province.

The box jellyfish is not common in Thai waters but the recent discovery of the species off Phuket's East coast and some beaches in Krabi and PhiPhi has sparked fears for tourists' safety and a possible impact on the tourism industry.

So far, two deaths in Thailand have been attributed to the jellyfish. The first was in 2002 on Koh Phangan in Surat Thani province and the latest in April at Koh Lanta in Krabi.

Earlier this year, the son of an Australian journalist was stung while swimming off Koh Mak in Trat. The jellyfish has most recently been spotted at Loh Sama bay on Koh Phi Phi.

Box jellyfish are known for their powerful venom, which has caused at least 5,567 recorded deaths since 1954. The Phuket Marine Biological Center, has circulated letters to all coastal provinces, urging authorities to set up signs warning of the presence of box jellyfish in swimming areas.

Vinegar is the best solution to reduce the pain from a jellyfish sting before the victim is sent to hospital.

Nakok agog over strange fish

CHALONG: Residents of Ban Nakok in Chalong Village 5 were taken by surprise last Thursday afternoon, when a local fisherman caught a large fish in a local pond quite unlike anything ever seen in the area before. The creature had a mouth and sharp teeth like a crocodile, two sets of strange flippers and scales described as "like those of a cobra".

A local Thai-language newspaper reported that the strange catch was made by 38-year-old Nareupol Sanguannaam, who spotted the large fish while angling for much smaller plaa chon (snake-head fish), a species commonly found in the many tin mining ponds on the island.

Mr Nareupol quickly returned home to get bait and tackle large enough to catch the fish, which had round black eyes, a white underbelly and weighed in at a hefty 25 kilograms. The caught fish was carefully moved



to a water well in the area and the local Fisheries Department office were called in to try and determine what kind of fish it actually was.

The fish was taken to the Fisheries Department office, where it was later identified as an alligator gar (Atractosteus spatula). Native to the southeastern United States, the fish can reach lengths of up to 10 feet long and weigh up to 135 kilograms.

Adapted to brackish, low-oxygen environments, it can breath air and can survive up to two hours out of water. Although an aggressive carnivore, attacks on humans are extremely rare.

The fish was later returned to its original owner, a resident of the Chao Fa Thani housing estate identified as Mr Jamrieng, who said he was raising the fish at home but that it accidentally escaped into the tin mine.

Police catch serial cat burglar red handed in Kathu house

TUNG TONG: A serial cat burglar is behind bars thanks to some good detective work by the Tung Tong Police, the state-run Andaman News service has reported.

The thief, identified as 33-

year-old Sanchai Choophol, was arrested on Saturday night in front of a house in Kathu. Police said Sanchai acted suspiciously after being seen by officers, first going into the house and later emerging to flee on a motorcycle.



After his capture, the native of Phang Nga's Thai Muang District confessed that he broken into the house, using a knife to cut through a mosquito screen.

He also admitted to having committed several thefts in Chalong, Patong, Kamala and Cherng Talay, using the stolen money to gamble on football matches.

Sanchai was previously jailed for two-and-a-half years on theft charges in Nonthaburi. Upon his release in 2006, he moved to Phuket and resumed his career of crime.

At a press conference on Monday morning, he was presented to the media along with numerous stolen items that were recovered. They included computers, motorcycles, gold rings, watches and some cash.



Hearing investigates land encroachment crimes in Phuket

PHUKET CITY: The Justice Ministry's Department of Special Investigation (DSI) arranged a public hearing on Monday to listen to views and suggestions from local community members in Phuket who are affected by natural resources exploitation or encroachment, the state-run Andaman News service reported on the NBT network.

During the open session, held at the Royal Phuket City hotel on November 3, villagers filed complaints about many development projects with DSI Director General Thavee Sodsong.

Among them was the proposed Monkey Island project on two islands in Chalong Bay. Opponents of the project argued that the primates could spread disease among themselves and possibly to humans.

They also noted that both islands are listed as crown land designated for public fishing use under the Fisheries Act of 1947. As such, the project would infringe upon their constitutional rights, they said.

Rawai residents voiced their concerns over a plan for private investors to build a 74room hotel off Soi Ruamjai at Bang Kontee Beach in Rawai Village.

The hotel would restrict public access to the beach and reserve public land for exclusive use by hotel guests. Such a move would deny local residents access to the beachfront, which would impinge upon their livelihoods as

fishermen, they said.

The DSI were also reminded of the case of a long-contested 21-rai plot of alleged mangrove deforestation in tambon Rassada Village.

A chanote title deed for part of the land was issued to a national high-ranking civil servant in 1984. The land was then passed on by his inheritors, who began to develop it, until local residents objected.

In April this year, Monthon "Palad Rambo" Chartsuwan filed a police complaint at the Phuket City Police Station, charging Land Department Director Chairerk Dissaya-amnaj for dereliction of duty in failing to revoke the chanote deed, which he claimed was illegally issued.

Residents of Pa Khlok also complained of mangrove forest encroachment near the Home for the Elderly.

After listening to all the locals' problems and concerns, Pol Col Thavee Sodsong said most of the cases involved encroachment on public land.

Such cases are sometimes difficult for local police, so the DSI would step in by coordinating efforts with relevant agencies and collecting evidence, he said.

The day before the hearing, the DSI team went on a boat tour of coastal areas, including Ao Por, Cape Yamu Koh Raed and Koh Sireh, where permission has been sought to build a marina

Some developers had encroached upon government land in some of these areas, he said.

The venue has also developed into a vibrant entertainment and lifestyle center with open air restaurants and bars overlooking mega-yachts moored in the Mediterranean-style marina.

Facilities include a worldclass health club, flood-lit tennis courts and a French-owned day spa.

The soon-to-be-opened 2,500 sqm Waterfront International Exhibition Center at the Royal Phuket Marina constitutes Phuket's largest single space and will pave the way for a new era of large-scale conferences and expos as well as being the ideal venue for weddings and functions.

As the development of villas and innovative apartments continues, along with plans for a 5-star boutique hotel, Mr Lalvani was hailed at the awards on November 1 for "raising the profile of Thailand's luxury real estate".

The Real Estate Personality of the Year award is for individuals making "a significant contribution to Thailand's property industry".

Mr Lalvani was described as "an individual whose success

in business is matched by his strength of character; someone who mixes charm and sophistication with a good measure of glamor and flamboyance; a relative newcomer to the industry, yet a person whose experience in business is beyond reproach."

Mr Lalvani said he was committed to promoting the island paradise of Phuket as one of the world's premier tourist destinations, as well as somewhere to own a holiday or retirement home and live like a king at a fraction of the cost of Europe or the United States.

"Phuket also has the potential to become a leading international venue for conventions and exhibitions. We are continuing to contribute to the social and economic fabric of the Phuket community in every possible way we can," he added.

Visitors to Phuket exceeded a record five million in 2007, an increase of 11.25 per cent on the previous year.

The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) expects growth of another 20 per cent in 2008 as the number of flights to Phuket reaches 120 per day.







TDA to launch 'Marine Scouts' project

hai Dive Association Technical Committee CEO/President Rainer Gottwald is a very busy man. Recently back from a trip to Libya, where he met with that country's leader Muammar al-Gaddafi to discuss ways of improving Libya's dive tourism industry, he hit the ground running in Phuket, where he's working on several TDA projects.

The projects include the sinking of the Coral Reef Squadron in Bangtao Bay later this month and organizing for Phuket's hosting of a major "monofins" swim-racing competition next year.

Here, he tells Gazette News Editor Stephen Fein about the TDA's "Marine Scouts" project.

t its most basic, the TDA Marine Scout Project is intended to help Thai youngsters gain a better understanding and appreciation of marine ecology so that in the future they will be good stewards of the country's marine and coastal resources.

Although ultimately intended for use at schools in coastal regions throughout the country, the pilot project will soon kick off in Phuket and then move to schools in neighboring provinces Phang Nga and Krabi.

Mr Gottwald explained that the project actually follows on the success of a venture on Koh Lanta in Krabi back in 2006, when the TDA teamed up with the German-based SharkProtect project (SharkProtect.Com) to teach kids there about the vital role sharks play in marine ecosystems.

To accomplish this, they translated into the Thai language the script from the documentary film *The Language of the Sharks* by researcher Dr Erich Ritter, who has pioneered ways of teaching people to avoid shark bites by better understanding shark behavior. Then, with the film-maker's permission, the TDA pressed 3,000 DVDs and distributed them to schools and universities.

In explaining the Marine Scout project and how it is able to integrate international research and multi-media resources to accomplish its goals locally, Mr Gottwald started off by saying that the TDA, as a member of the World Underwater Federation (CMAS), is far more than just an association of dive industry operators in Thailand.

"I think you misunderstand a little bit about TDA. It's not only about diving. The World Underwater Federation [The Confederation Mondiale des Activités Subaquatiques, or CMAS for short] was established in 1959 under Commander Jacques Cousteau. It was built under the umbrella of scientific, sports and technical committees.

"With its main office at the International Olympic Committee (IOC) headquarters in Rome, CMAS currently has 400 associations in 123 countries, all work-

ing together under one umbrella. All this international cooperation is getting better on a range of scientific, environmental and sports projects," he said.

After the TDA received funding for the first 10,000 handbooks for the Marine Scout program, well-known local diver Detlef "Franky" Hewer kindly donated 650,000 baht to cover the costs of printing 50,000 more handbooks.

The new handbooks, which were in the final phases of production as this went to print, include a bilingual Thai-English section entitled: *Corals and Mangroves, All You Have to Know.*

This section was produced with cooperation from UK-based charity Reef World Foundation (Reef-World.Org) and the Bangkok-based United Nations Environment Program (UNEP), which operates its well-known Greenfins Thailand project out of the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) at Cape Panwa.

PMBC reef researcher Dr Niphon Phongsuwan negotiated with Reef World founder Anna Miller to obtain the rights to reprint the book, originally published five years ago by Reef World and UNEP, Mr Gottwald explained.

So how did the idea for Marine Scouts all get started?

"The idea for this project came from Rawat Chindapol, who is the brother of TDA President Ronnachai Chindaphol. He came up with the idea as he was thinking about how difficult it was to teach older people to better take care of the environment, such as by not eating sharks.




When he is not having lunch with Libyan leader Muammar al-Gaddafi or working on one of the many TDA projects, Rainer Gottwald spends much of his time at Naithon Beach.

The name 'Marine Scouts' actually came from him," Mr Gottwald said.

The main project team will be Mr Gottwald, Dr Niphon and his PMBC associate Dr Hansa Changsang, Anna Miller and Ronnachai Chindaphol.

"Once the team was established we decided to move forward quickly with this project. Fortunately, the head of the TDA Sports Committee, Ajarn Wichan Aiyarak, also happens to be the former head of the Phang Nga Teacher's Association. He helped us introduce the project to the educational curriculum. We are making it a one-day course for





children of all ages, but starting with the first year of the secondary school."

The children will get the booklet, which is in English and Thai, from the beginning of the course. It is called TDA Marine Scout Handbook: All You Have to Know.

The laminated booklet contains a complete listing of marina and coastal flora and fauna for both the Andaman Sea and the Gulf coasts, with information about mangroves ecosystems, food chains and environmental conservation.

It includes pictures and descriptions, everything that is necessary – but not too complicated. "The course is designed to be based around a half-day teaching lesson using a Powerpoint presentation in Thai. The presentation basically introduces the book. The material is designed so that teachers without a background in marine biology can still teach it effectively, simply by reading though the material slowly," he explained.

When the more academic first half-day of the project is completed, the students will then watch Language of the Sharks.

"It's a very attractive movie and very nice for the children to see after a half day of Powerpoint presentations. We have translated it into Thai. It's about a twohour movie, covering the essential role that sharks play as the 'policemen' of the sea.

The movie is intended to change the scary image of the shark a little bit, after movies like Jaws 1-3, or whatever," he said.

According to the website at SharkProtect.Com, humans kill sharks 10 million times more often than sharks kill humans.

"After the movie they will take a short test together, and after that they will be certified as TDA Marine Scouts. They will go home with a nice certificate that they can put on the walls and be proud of. They can then take this small, laminated book with them as a reference source whenever they go to the beach, and get tips on how to clean up or take steps to protect the environment," he said.

"Being a TDA Marine Scout will be a precursor to becoming a

future TDA Snorkel Scout or TDA Swim Scout. These will be future programs in the schools, based on curriculua from universities in Germany that are are now in translation," he said.

'We will also establish a Thailand-wide Marine Scout Day every January 3, which is the birthday of our president Mr Ronnachai," he said.

The Gazette also talked to Detlef "Franky" Hewer to ask why he chose to make such a sizable donation to this particular project.

He said he was always happy to provide financial assistance to support good projects.

As a member of the Lion's

Club Phuket Andaman Sea, he also supports the Phuket Sunshine Village project on Koh Sireh.

Established in 2004 after the tsunami, the project, run by ChildWatch Phuket, revolves around the desire to give children who are either orphaned or otherwise no longer able to live with their natural parents, a stable en-

Mr Hewer feels that it's a shame that so many Thai kids now growing up in coastal regions know so little about the sea or coastal ecosystems. He sees the Marine Scouts project as a way to educate all these kids.

"We have to help all the kids here in Thailand. How many kids here in Thailand live right on the sea and yet still cannot even swim?" he asked rhetorically.

Mr Hewer said he hoped the program would teach the Thai kids to love the water, first by swimming and then later, possibly, as snorkelers or divers.

"But diving is very expensive, more than many people can afford," he noted.

"We would like to increase their knowledge about the sea progressively, and with time they will learn to love the sea and protect the marine environment," he said.










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Missing person located

Cobra cocktails and other roadside rat-ions

SUPHANBURI: The sight of counted many regular locals, roadside stalls selling seasonal fruit, diesel-flavored roast chicken or other comestibles is a common one on any road trip in Thailand. Along the roads of Suphanburi, however, the offerings are a bit more exotic, with cobras and field rats the current hits.

On October 27, Sala Phromphim, who owns five stalls selling the unusual delicacies along the Suphanburi-Bangbuathong stretch of Highway 340, said that he has been running his operation for around 10 years.

Recently, the demand for snakes and rats has soared, he was happy to report.

The field rat meat sells for 80-90 baht per kilogram, while whole cobras fetch 500 to 600 baht each, depending on their

These prices are for fresh, live-caught animals, with the price tags significantly lower for prepared meat, Mr Sala said.

Among his customers, he

people just passing through, and a number of snake-meat enthusiasts who travelled a long way to buy at his stalls.

Folks in this last group usually demand live snakes and knew all about the best way to prepare them, he said.

Though he was happy for the extra business, Mr Sala said he was worried the increased interest in rat meat would put a strain on the local population of the rodents, which had already been hit hard by changes in local farming techniques.

Local farmer Phairat Wangdee disagreed, however. He said he was glad to see the rats being caught and sold off because they breed fast, damage crops and can spread disease.

Contrary to popular belief, eating rats is not only for poor people, he said.

The price of rat meat is considerably higher than the price of pork, meaning that only wealthier locals could afford to

Poorer folks had to catch the rats themselves if they wanted to dine on them, he lamented. But not everyone was so pleased with the new-found popularity of the exotic dishes. Dr Surin Prasithiran, from the Suphanburi Public Health Office, said that properlycooked rat meat should pose no health risks.

Cobra consumption presented more of a problem, how-

The practice of drinking freshly-killed cobra blood could lead to parasitic infection and gastrointestinal disease, he said.

Assistant Professor Panthep Ratanakon, Director of the Centre for Wildlife Protection, added that not only did eating cobras pose a health risk, it was also illegal under the 1997 Wildlife Protection Act.

Trade in cobras is punishable with a prison sentence of up to four years and/or a fine of up to 40,000 baht for both seller and buyer, he said.



Grievances include poor services, abuse and theft.

Speaking at an October 30 forum on government policy on how to establish a nursing care system for the elderly, Ubon Limsakul, deputy permanent secretary of the Social Development and Human Security Ministry, said some attendants have been giving sleeping pills to old people under their care, while others have stolen their patients' valuables.

Standards should be set for nursing homes and other nursing services for the elderly, as this business is set to grow in the future, she said.

She estimated that in the next few years, 15.3% of the country's population – about 10.77 million people – will be older than 60 years. With younger people leaving their home provinces for jobs in Bangkok, more elderly people will need paid services.

Dr Siriphan Sasat of the Chulalongkorn University's Faculty of Nursing said that among Thailand's current elderly population, about 25% are too ill to live independently. The number of dependent elderly will reach 742,000 by 2020, she estimated.

Dr Siriphan also called for the establishment of a nationallevel committee to tackle problems relating to the care given to the elderly.

Dr Nonglak Pagaiya, an academic at the Human Resource for Health Research and Development Office, said there were now just 97,972 registered nurses in the country. Of them, less than 25% are taking care of the elderly.

to hire hands to harvest rice on their farm.

Thawatchai Tothaiya, 30, set himself on fire in the middle of a street in Sawad Village of Lerng Noktha District. He succumbed to his burn wounds early the following morning at Ubon Ratchathani's Sappasithprasong Hospital, police said.

His brother-in-law Srisak Netwong, 42, told police that Thawatchai was a hardworking bachelor who used his free time from growing rice to do construction work in Suphan Buri.

War on TB: The World Health Organization (WHO) plans to give the Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) 35.5 million baht to find the best way to control the spread of tuberculosis in the country, the ministry's permanent secretary, Dr Prat Boonyawongvirot, has announced.

Speaking at a conference on MoPH policies for 2009, he said the WHO wanted Thailand to conduct the study because recent reports estimated that the country had 57,236 TB patients, with 90,000 new cases per year.

As a country with a high number of TB patients, WHO believes that Thailand could find a way to control the disease and come up with guidelines for other countries, he said.

The ministry is also planning to sanitize all 141 prisons nationwide after 18,000 inmates were found infected with TB. Conditions within prisons were terrible, with damp cells and filthy bed-clothes, which made prisoners more susceptible to infections, he said

Eggcellent news: Chicken eggs produced in Thailand are safe for consumption and no melamine contamination has been found in them, FDA secretarygeneral Dr Pipat Yingseri has announced.

After Chinese authorities detected melamine contamination in eggs in Hong Kong late last month, Thai FDA inspectors collected seven samples from three local companies. Results from the Medical Science Department found no melamine contamination.

Melamine is a toxic chemical used in the manufacture of plastics and fertilizers. It was previously detected in Chinese milk and dairy products. Milk powder containing melamine was responsible for the deaths of four infants in China, while another 54,000 have fallen ill.

In a bid to prevent adverse effects from melamine contami-

nation in food products, Thailand's FDA has issued regulations allowing no more than 1 milligram per kilogram of melamine in milk products, and no more than 2.5mg/kg in milk-based products.

So far, the FDA has collected 1,123 samples of milk and milk-based products to test for melamine. Of those, only seven have tested positive, 955 have tested negative, and 161 are still being tested.

Mr Pipat urged companies to act responsibly and obtain raw materials only from FDA-accredited suppliers.

If possible, mothers concerned about the safety of powdered infant-milk formulas should breastfeed their babies instead, he said.

Melamine fallout: With consumers in Thailand worried about the impact on health from tainted food products after the melamine contamination in China, the Thai Food and Drug Administration (FDA) should set up an early warning system similar to that of the European Union to immediately warn the public against dangerous consumer products, a consumer rights group has said.

Saree Ongsomwang, Manager of the Foundation for Consumers, said the FDA should take advantage of this opportunity to learn from the EU's Rapid Alert System for non-food products, or "RAPEX".

Smarty pants: Thai students chalked up three golds at the International Mathematics Competition 2008 in Chiang Mai. The event ended on October 30.

Some 800 primary and secondary students from 25 countries participated in the six-day tournament.

The Thai gold medalists in the individual category of the primary level were Jettapol Thepauyporn, a sixth-grader from Anubal Nakhon Ratcha-sima School and Kritameth Lengraksa, a fifth-grader at Bangkok Christian Wittayalai School. Uthaipon Tantipongpipat, a ninth-grader from Bangkok Christian Wittayalai School, won a gold medal in the secondary level.

Second suspect in journo killing comes in

he second suspect wanted for the killing of Matichon journalist Athiwat Chainurat gave himself up to Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Governor Phanu Uthairat on October 31.

Sakchai "Chai" Abdullahree came to Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Hall accompanied by a well-known member of the Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Administration Organization. He was then handed over to police.

Nakhon Sri Thammarat Muang District Police superintendent Phusit Narasing told the media that Mr Sakchai denied any involvement in the killing. However, he said that police had witnesses who could confirm that Mr Sakchai, who knew the victim, walked into Mr Athiwat's kitchen, called out his nickname, and then shot him. Police refused bail to the suspect and said they would recommend that the court do the same, Col Phusit added.

Earlier in the week, on October 26, more than 500 people gathered outside Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police Station to protest the arrest of Lamduan "Kop" Kaowsisot, 25,

another suspect in the case who turned himself in on October 22.

The leaders of the protest accused the police of 'scapegoating' Mr Lamduan in the highprofile case.

The protest was led by the suspect's mother, Prasert Kaowsisot, and Amnuay Jarit-ngam, headman of Village 1 in Tambon Ban Lamnao, Bang Khan Dis-

Prasert also handed the police a petition, signed by the protesters, demanding justice for Mr Lamduan and attesting to his good

The protest leaders also questioned apparent irregularities in the arrest, such as why it took the police almost two months to arrest Mr Lamduan following issuance of the arrest warrant on August 28, despite the fact that the suspect had been at home the whole time and made no attempt to hide from the authorities.

The petition also called for police to reveal what evidence they had against Mr Lamduan.

The crowd dispersed only after Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Sarawut Phiranon came and assured the protesters that Mr Lamduan's case would be dealt with fairly. Maj Gen Sarawut added that he had only recently taken up the post of Nakhon Sri Thammrarat police chief and needed time to do a thorough review of the details of the case.

Police would hunt down everyone involved in Mr Athiwat's killing, including the gunmen and the people who ordered the murder, he promised.

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Drugs bust: Police in Surat Thani have busted a ya bah (methamphetamine) ring, arresting six people, including a police officer, and seizing more than 1,700 ya bah pills.

The arrests were announced by the Surat Thani Provincial Police Commander Thetsa Siriwatho on October 26.

Maj Gen Thetsa named the six suspects as: Surasit "Dam" Phatphuang, 33; Yothika "Yo" Sombun, 23; Bunleu "Den" Wichit, 32; Prasit "Yai" Inthajiat, 46; Nathaphat "Aor" Dechdang, 38; and Pol Cpl Phira Phromsuwan, 28.

Police seized 1,758 ya bah pills, a 9mm pistol with 13 rounds of ammunition, and 162,000 baht in cash in the raids.

Maj Gen Thetsa said the breakthrough came following a sting operation on Mr Surasit. After receiving intelligence that Mr Surasit was dealing ya bah, police arranged to buy some from him. Mr Surasit sent his girlfriend "Yothika" to deliver the drugs, he said.

Police arrested the pair and Mr Surasit admitted that he had bought the drugs from Mr Bunleu, Maj Gen Thetsa said. Mr Surasit then agreed to order another batch of ya bah from Bunleu and a meeting was arranged at a hotel in Surat Thani. When Bunleu arrived along with Prasit, police arrested the pair. The suspects

then implicated Nathaphat and Pol Cpl Phira who were also arrested, Maj Gen Thetsa said.

All six have been charged with possession of Class 1 drugs with intent to supply. Bunleu was also charged with possession a firearm without a permit.

Snitch targeted: A police informant was shot dead as he was riding his motorcycle in Trang on October 28. Manat "Seuamon" Chaiwiset, 49, was found lying dead on his motorcycle in Ban Thung Khuan Village 3 in Muang District. He had been shot twice in the head.

Witnesses reported seeing two youths on a Honda Sonic motorcycle pull up alongside Mr Manat and the pillion passenger shooting him with a pistol.

Manat worked as a pig tender on a farm belonging to a senior sergeant major from the Trang Provincial Police Narcotics Suppression Bureau. He had previously served time in prison for murder, but was released last year. He had also formerly worked for the police as an informant, providing information on local drug dealers.

Police said that Mr Manat may have been killed because of his links with the police. However, he was also known to be involved in the drug trade himself and police are investigating whether the attack could have been motivated by a dispute with rival dealers.

Violence follows visits: Eight people, including three soldiers, were injured when a powerful bomb went off near the entrance to a fresh market in Yala's Muang District on October 29. The attack came one day after Prime Minister Somchai Wongsawat completed his visit to the

Authorities immediately cut off traffic routes leading to and from the market for fear that a second bomb might go off.


Pol Colonel Poompetch Pipatpetpoom, deputy commander of Yala Provincial Police, said the bombing was in response to the authorities' crackdown on insurgent cells in the area.

Police found pieces of a metal box at the crime scene, along with traces of explosive materials and fragments of a mobile phone. This led them to believe that the device was detonated from a remote location.

The bomb was set off just as three security officers entered the immediate area. The soldiers, all of whom are members of the Yala 11th Task Force, were sent to hospital for treatment.

On the day of the blast, a spate of violence had greeted the prime minister and Army chief Gen Anupong Paochinda. PM Somehai told reporters the security situation had been improving and downplayed the need for structural reform in Thailand's Malay-speaking South.

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
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Help and Hope for Tsunami Victims

Between October 22-25, the Sriphong Phukaoluan Foundation (SPF) held a threeday camp for tsunami orphans and their families at the SPF Community Center.

Two days of programs were organized by volunteers from Projects Abroad, a US based organization that sends volunteers worldwide to take part in a variety of projects. Projects Abroad has been in Krabi for several years, active in conservation projects, cleaning the coral reefs and re-planting mangrove trees. In addition, they conduct English language classes for local schools and government officials.

The volunteers ran a well

organized program, which included English language instruction, singing and a field trip to a new art gallery in Krabi. Afterwards, the children took part in art and painting classes. The children were also taught about conservation of the environment and then taken to local areas to plant mangrove trees.

While the children were busy with their projects, the relatives who have been caring for them (usually grandparents or aunts and uncles) were also attending courses. The SPF Community Bank, which provides micro-loans for tsunami families, was giving a course in basic business management and bookkeeping.

The bank has copied the model of Noble Prize winner Mohammed Yunnus, whose banks offer credit to poor families to help them start or expand their businesses. All prospective clients of the SPF Community Bank must take this course and prepare a detailed business plan for the bank's approval.

Certified public accountant Nate-dao Sengate and her team from Krabi Consultants conducted the classes and assisted the prospective borrowers in developing their business plans. The hope is that with this training, their businesses will stand a bet-

ter chance of success. All in all, a job well done by all the volunteers during the camp.

Identity Theft hits Krabi

The lows of the low season seem to have passed now and we are beginning to see tourists trickling into the local hotels, bars and restaurants. With so much negative news around the world, not to mention here in our own capital, there are lots of reasons for people to stay at home this holiday season.

However, the Scandinavian tourist market appears to be holding up well and the introduction of the Krabi Air direct flight from Oslo to Krabi has boosted arrival numbers. Hoteliers and booking agents are guardedly optimistic, pointing to strong peak-season bookings, and hoping the political shenanigans in Bangkok will quieten down sufficiently to entice tourists back during the second half of the high season. Let's hope so.

In my previous article, I highlighted the Nigerian hotel scam letters doing the rounds on the Internet. Since then, I have received more of the same, plus the usual spam that accounts for the vast majority of email these days. But I also received one very special letter from a friend of mine; the general manager of a resort here in Krabi. It appears

he was robbed whilst in London and emailed me to ask me to wire him some money. However, although the email was from his personal email address and the letter bore his name, there were a few inconsistencies that raised a red flag.

First, the spelling and grammar were poor. Second, he requested that I transfer the money via Western Union – widely known as the method of choice for scam artists. Lastly, I was surprised to learn that my friend was in London, since he would typically have informed me if he was leaving the country.

Perplexed, I called my friend, and by the tone of his voice I could tell something was wrong. He had not, as it turned out, been robbed in London. He had been sitting at his computer in Krabi when his Yahoo account was hacked into. He had earlier received an email from Yahoo, or so he thought, asking him to log on and update his account. It was not, however, a genuine Yahoo email, or even a real Yahoo webnage.

I am sure many of you have received similar emails from banks, Ebay, PayPal and the like, requesting that you update your account. When you log on and enter your password or pin number, hackers can then access your account. Within seconds, the hackers can begin misappropri-

ating your personal information, such as bank account numbers and passwords, perpetrating identity theft.

In my friend's case, the hackers broke into his email account, gaining access to all his emails, which included information about his credit card purchases. Later, they sent out the letter asking all the people in his address book to send him money to help him out of his "predicament".

I duly responded to the hackers, telling them I would forward the money. Immediately, they replied, providing details on how to wire the money by Western Union and asking me to provide the Money Transfer Control Number so they could pick up the money from the Western Union office in London.


When I answered that my close friend, who was the chief of security at the US Embassy in London, would be dropping by their hotel to deliver the money in person, their e-mails came to an abrupt halt.

Funny old world. What's next? Hacking your telephone, perhaps?

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Where a rewarding experience awaits

here's something almost mystical about out-of-the-way restaurants. You know, the ones that take some effort and brainpower to find. Somehow the food's more rewarding, the welcome drink that much more appreciated and there's a smug satisfaction of being in the know.

Le Celtique, in Rawai, is such a place. Up a side soi off Soi Samakae 4 and 2, Le Celtique, despite being out of the way, is signposted enough to make it findable, albeit perhaps with the aid of a compass, military map and an SOS flare gun. Oh, don't forget your thigh-high waders and waterproof miner's lamp in the rainy season.

If you're already familiar with Le Celtique and scratching your head while wondering if I've lost my marbles let me explain: This is the same popular Le Celtique that was until recently in Kata.

Apparently, owner Bertrand Plumer and his wife Lek decided that they'd had enough of the astronomical rents there and simply moved over the hill as smoothly as a Google Earth cursor to settle into life in the leafy lanes of Rawai some months ago.

With an eclectic mix of Thai and Breton artifacts, wall hangings, chunky wooden furniture and warm lighting arrangements, the 80-cover new Le Celtique is a cosy and fascinating place.

Even the most jaded eye couldn't help but appreciate the golden kinnarees, the fantastic Buddhist wall frieze, the solid block tables and chairs and the overall spanking cleanliness of the restaurant. On top of all this, Le Celtique exudes a friendly, family business vibe and that's no bad thing at all.

It must be quite different working in such tranquil surroundings after having been years in Krazy old Kata with its swarms of tourists, but Bertrand and Lek seem perfectly happy with the slings and arrows of their particular fate, merci bien.

In the 70's Belgium spawned its own version of al-

ternative rock in the form of a garish 'mec' called Plastic Bertrand. His huge Europeanwide hit "Ca Plane pour Moi" – meaning "Everything's Cool" could be Breton Bertrand's anthem, considering the circumstances. But no – the background music at Le Celtique has no Belgium Punk even though *ca plane pour ce* Bertrand.

A simple 15-label wine list contains enough choices with South American and French labels all at reasonable cost, the most expensive being a Chateau Belle Garde Bordeaux. There's a sizeable bar to prop up too, with a plethora of spirits to keep island imbibers happily working on their biceps and Le Celtique even has Duche de Longueville dry apple cider if you're looking for a real Breton buzz.

Still, it's all about food, isn't it? Here, Bertrand's experience shows as the three-language menu is amazingly extensive with a hefty 18-page, 205-dish selection containing seafood and meats presented European style along with eleven types of pizza before careening head first into Thai culinary territory with pizzazz.

We order the *plat du jour* which on this day happens to be a blanquette of pork (340 baht) with potatoes, carrots, a dash of rice and the most heavenly cream sauce. *Nom d'un nom*, this dish brings it on home in regal style. That, along with a bottle of Argentine red and a sliced baguette, is about the closest I get to paradise after a hard week of slogging away at the computer and dodging motorcycles.

It's raining cats and dogs out in the street, I've got too much work to handle and a worldwide financial crisis threatens to spiral out of control, but here, surrounded by Celtic whorls and Buddha heads, we're safe from outrageous fortune as we tuck into the fantastically yielding blanquette.

Brittany, with its rolling vales, quaint stone-cottage villages, delicious cider and crepe blowouts, is a place definitely worth visiting and Bertrand, from Lorient, brings a Breton dash to the cuisine with Lek no less en-

thusiastic about the Thai segment of the menu. Prices are not bargain basement but neither are they in the silly tourist domain; a chicken fried rice will set you back 90 baht while pizzas are from 250 baht up. For once, the background music is kept to a discreet level and there's also the option of fan, air conditioning or


to keep things cool. The bath-

rooms look as though they've been blitzed with industrial cleansing agents while the kitchen fairly sparkles.


Le Celtique has lots of little touches that make this place a home away from home, such as children's chairs as well as two rocking horses outside. Even though it's brand new, the spirit of the place is pleasingly mature.

To get there, head down to

Rawai from what's left of Chalong Circle, then take a right turn at Soi Sayuan (at the 7-Eleven). Drive down past Don's Mall and take the first right after. Then follow the road to the T-junction at the very end. Opposite is a small soi leading up the hill.Le Celtique is 350 metres up the road on the right.Sayuan Rd., 80/90 Soi Samakae 4, Rawai. he phenomenon that be gan life as a credit crunch has since evolved into a far more complex entity, creating volatility on so many fronts.

A perfect example of this is the Australian dollar, which over a period of around three months has declined from near parity with the US Dollar to around 64 US cents, a drop of around 33%. However, this has more to do with capital flows back to Japan than economic fundamentals. During the current period of massive 'deleveraging', a number of hedge funds and other leveraged investors have become forced sellers of assets. Faced with the need to generate capital, they are confronted with the fact that it is their best assets that are the easiest to sell, especially for a fair price.

The "VIX" index, which tracks levels of market volatility, has been consistently reaching record levels, reflecting the wide-

spread feeling of trepidation. Currently, there are two predominant currencies in the world: the US dollar and the Japanese yen. The Chinese Yuan also holds considerable sway, but its influence is somewhat diminished as the currency is not convertible.

Americans may be surprised to find their currency so strong, but it is largely due to the dollar's remaining a safe haven as well as calls on cash previously held abroad by US entities. This pressure to repatriate capital has, in turn, increased losses in many other foreign markets, particularly the emerging markets.

When forced sellers are abundant, bargains appear, with prices often becoming ridiculously

cheap. The challenge is to identify what a real bargain is, as opposed to what will become cheaper still. "Never try to catch a falling knife," goes a Japanese saying.

The Japanese are certainly not relishing the prospect of an ever-stronger Yen. The Bank of Japan recently intervened to weaken the currency. If this doesn't work, other central banks will move in to assist. However, with around US\$ 1 trillion in foreign exchange reserves, the Bank of Japan has no shortage of ammunition.

The Australian central bank (The Reserve Bank of Australia) has been intervening almost daily to stop the Aussie dollar from falling too rapidly. One surprising area of central bank intervention has been that of the Hong Kong Monetary Authority, which has actively supported the Hong Kong dollar despite it remaining "pegged" within a tight range to the rising US dollar. David Bloom, head of currency strategy for global banking giant HSBC, calls the move into the US Dollar a "flight to quality". He also describes markets worldwide as "disorderly".

The interest rate cut of 50 basis points by the US Federal Reserve at the end of October took the Fed Funds Rate back to 1%. This interest rate was last seen in 2004, and before that in the 1950s. The timing and size of the interest rate cut was widely anticipated by the market and by the end of the day, the main US indices (Dow Jones Industrial and Standard & Poor's 500) had moved into negative territory.

The US Federal Reserve under the previous chairmanship of Alan Greenspan was widely criticized for holding rates for too long at 1%. Many said this was the root cause of the "credit crunch". Whilst most economists would concur that when interest rates are below inflation, problems will occur, it seems something of a stretch to blame this situation for the credit crunch.

In reality, it was the banks that were involved in lending, especially for mortgages, who were mostly to blame. They indiscriminately lent money to borrowers, regardless of the latter's ability to repay. With hindsight, this may seem insane, but when you consider that the lenders were simply packaging these mortgages into 'vehicles' such as collateralized debt obligations, structured investment paper, etc, to sell off to other investors, you begin to understand why the banks in question were not sufficiently interested in the quality of their borrowers.

Without the active participation of the credit ratings agencies who were dishing out AA and AAA investment grade assessments on these 'vehicles', this Pandora's Box might never have been opened. The ultimate responsibility, however, lies with government.


It has suddenly become the concept du jour that government involvement in all areas of the financial system is the panacea for all its ills. For years to come, levels of government intervention in the financial markets will, no doubt, increase markedly.

We have already witnessed vast increases in regulation, especially since 9/11, in global antimoney laundering. This intervention was supposed to reduce the ability of terrorists and of organized crime to move funds. The reality is that if organized crime cannot find its way around the current regulations, then they are not very organized. It is equally doubtful whether terrorists have been inconvenienced either.

The real problems arise for members of the public who now require extensive documentation when opening bank accounts, making investments, and so on. This is what happens when governments interfere.

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





"If not" sows a lot of confusion. For instance, here it is in a recent Wall Street Journal interview with Carlos Ghosn, chief executive of Nissan and Renault: "It's a double impact in terms of profit on most of the car manufacturers, if not

all of them." Did Ghosn mean "or even all of them" or "though not all of them"? "If not" can be used both ways, and not even in context is it clear which meaning he had in mind.

The rule about "if not" is this: Avoid it unless it will be perfectly obvious which of the two opposite meanings you intend.

The phrase, if not the speaker (here it is again — am I being insulting or polite?), is untrustworthy.

On the radio in the US, I often hear the phrase "not available in all states", especially at the end of insurance ads. If it isn't available in all states, where are they selling their product? Canada? Mexico?

When did the phrase "not available in all states" take on the same meaning as "not available in some states"?

Another slippery "not." You might imagine that "not available" and "unavailable" mean the same thing – but "unavailable in all states" is definitely the wrong idea. "Available in not all states" is more like it, but this version sounds impossibly awkward. "Available in some states" or "in many states" is literally right but gets the tone wrong – the copywriters might as well add "though maybe not in yours." Can you learn to live with "not available in all states"?

Today I saw an example of what I think is illogical or incorrect usage: "Ex-Indonesian dictator Suharto dies at 86". To me, this means Mr. Suharto was a dictator, but not in Indonesia recently. That is obviously untrue. What I'd say is "Indonesian ex-dictator Suharto dies at 86." Care to comment?"

Barbara replies:

Dear EZ: You neglected to tell me the town and state where you live. I wouldn't publish that information without your permission (though I rarely publish letters whose writers omit it), but I thought I might find out at least what paper you read by searching online for the phrase "Ex-Indonesian dictator" in news

This search returned 268 results, including an Associated Press story – which tells us it's a fairly conventional way of putting it. In contrast, a search for "Indonesian ex-dictator" got just 21 results.

The problem is that we think of Suharto (that was his complete name) as having been an Indonesian dictator, in much the same way that Bowie Kuhn was the US baseball commissioner and Anna Nicole Smith was once a Playboy centerfold model.

Kuhn, when he died last year, was not a baseball ex-commissioner but an ex-baseball com-



missioner.

Smith was not a Playboy centerfold ex-model or a Playboy ex-centerfold model – she was an ex-Playboy centerfold model.

Take comfort in the fact that "ex-" in phrases like these tends to turn up only in headlines, where space is at a premium. "Former" is almost invariably used where there's room for it.

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High season approacheth

When it comes to administrative power, Thailand is among the most centralized nations in the world. Law enforcement across the entire country falls under a single police force that is administered, just like every government ministry, from Bangkok. Even the post office boxes in Phuket and other provinces have two slots for outgoing mail. They are marked "Bangkok" and "Other".

Just as the whole body suffers paralysis when the brain malfunctions, so too are entire over-centralized nations at risk when that center is disrupted or destabilized. Unfortunately, Thailand is now suffering a sort of administrative paralysis due to events in the capital. While the elected government operates out of a semi-mothballed airport on the outskirts of Bangkok, the the traditional seat of executive power - Government House - remains under an precedented occupation by the People's Alliance for Democracy, now in its third month.

In the meantime, here in low-season Phuket, the tourism industry continues to turn over surprisingly well considering the political mess in the capital, the fragile state of world financial markets and the latest threat to tourism here: the discovery of the deadly box jellyfish in local waters. [See news pages for update.]

Given Phuket's demonstrated resiliency, however, there is no reason to expect the rapidly approaching high season to be anything other than another banner year. Already, climate refugees are starting to trickle in with the addition of several new direct charter routes from Europe. This year's high season will officially kick off November 15 with the Phuket Carnival in Patong. The annual event used to start on November 1, but was sensibly been pushed back two weeks by the Phuket Tourist Association after last year's festivities were considerably dampened by heavy rains that often extend into early November.

Another private sector group that deserves credit for taking initiative where government efforts have fallen short is the Thai Dive Association, which will soon oversee the sinking of the Coral Reef Squadron artificial reef project off Bangtao Bay.

Other commendable TDA efforts include its Marine Scout Project [see Inside Story, pp 4-5] and the announcement that the Confédération Mondiale des Activités Subaquatiques (CMAS, or World Underwater Federation) general assembly will take place here next May 2-9, bringing in hundreds of delegates from all over the world during the low season and giving a huge promotional boost to Thailand's dive tourism industry.

New Governor Preecha Ruangjan's enthusiastic support for these activities is also encouraging, especially given the unreasonably confrontational stance some past provincial administrations have taken against this very important segment of our economy.

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

Jellyfish in Bangtao

Regarding the article on box jellyfish being found in Phuket waters, I can attest that some form of jellyfish are present on the western side of the island and not just on the east coast as the article implied.

Two weeks ago, while swimming on Bangtao Beach, I was stung by a jellyfish on both feet. The stings were very painful and rashes appeared on both of my feet and legs. While obviously not fatal, the stings were severe and the pain lasted for about two hours.

I would suggest that the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) test the waters on the western side of the island, not just the eastern side while assuming that the waters on the western side are too salty for box jellyfish. Something is 'out there'. Let's find out what.

I was dragged from the water unconscious after a diving accident about three weeks ago. As a result, I got to meet a lot of very professional people working under extreme circumstances.

The people on the dive boat – John, Bee, Liam and the rest of the crew - had to make an unexpected dash for the emergency clinic on the island of Koh Tao. The doctor and nurses received me on a backboard where I was monitored, stabilized and prepared for a long speedboat trip back to Koh Samui, 70 kilometers away. I was fading in and out of consciousness, looking up

from the bottom of the boat into beautiful smiling eyes, and could hear the words of a nurse: "You're alright...."

The ambulance transferred me to the Thai International Hospital where Doctor M. Goong assessed me. I was numb from the shoulders down and could barely move. After more tests, the decision was made to move me to the decompression chamber which I now call the "Bubble Hotel".

The real reason for me writing this letter is to thank all the people who helped me.

As large as I am, I felt sorry for the 20 odd people that had to handle me from the boat, ambulance, trolley and chamber. They got me to safety within eight hours.

To Doctor M. Goong, the invisible Doctor Lupa and the staff of the Thai International Hospital: I cannot thank you enough. I have always had a love for Thailand and its people, but more so now than ever.

After 15 visits and 62 hours of treatment in the "Bubble Hotel", I got to know six of the nicest people in what is now my "new life". I thank you with all my heart: Kylie, Mike, Gui, Alex, Paul and Ian. I will never forget you. I'm walking again.

Traffic crackdown a good idea

I am glad to see that the police in Phuket are going to try to do something about the extremely bad driving one encounters here ["Police to launch traffic law crackdown", Gazette, October

I am a retired aerospace manager with extensive safety and accident prevention training and experience. There are two main causes of accidents. Unsafe conditions and unsafe actions. Most accidents are caused by unsafe actions, or people doing dumb and/or illegal things. In my five-year residence in Phuket, I have never seen police stopping anyone for committing an unsafe or illegal act.

The police can spend their time stopping non-helmeted motorbike riders or drivers without seat belts, but the lack of a helmet or a seat belt never stopped an accident from happening.

Don't get me wrong: helmets and seat belts are important if an accident should occur. But the root cause of most accidents, injuries and deaths is unsafe or illegal acts.

Start cracking down on speeding, illegal merging into traffic, failing to stop or yield, driving the wrong way against the traffic, failure to signal, illegal or unsafe passing, going too slow or impeding traffic.

I commend the police for finally doing something about this concern. But why finish the exercise in July? It should be ongoing. Why punish offenders with a "slap on the wrist" fine? Make the fine a real deterrent by impounding offenders' vehicles, taking away driving privileges (it is a privilege, not a right).

Education is important, but don't all licensed drivers have to pass a written exam? They have been taught the rules but just choose to ignore them. I have seen written here in the Gazette that the cost is too great to put police on the roads to attack this problem. But, what is the cost of the hundreds of deaths that occur here yearly? Jack H.

The election prospects of the Democrat Party

o its credit, the Democrat Party is pushing for a dissolution of Parliament and a new election as a way forward from the current deadlock. What do the 2007 election results tell us about their prospects?

At the December 23, 2007 polls, the Democrats lost decisively to the People Power Party (PPP), yet they still scored their second-best results ever, taking 164 of the 480 seats.

Only in 1976 did they win a larger proportion (114 of 279). At the 1992 poll, the last time an election led to a Democrat-headed government, they won less than a quarter.

How did the Democrats do so well in 2007?

Perhaps the most startling result was on the party list, the 80 seats decided on a vote by party. Nationwide, the Democrats trailed the PPP by only 190,399 votes, and won only one less seat (33 against 34). At the 2001 and 2005 polls, the Democrats had won only a little over 7 million each time, and had trailed the TRT by a mile. This time, both parties gained a little over 12 million votes. How did the Democrats do so much better?

Several voters picked a mi-

nor party on the constituency vote, but then plumped for one of the two big parties (Democrats or PPP) on the party list. Possibly they made their constituency choice for "local" reasons (they liked the candidate) but their party list choice for "national" reasons – for or against Thaksin.

The same thing had happened at the 2001 and 2005 polls. But this time many more people (around 15% of the voters) switched from small parties at the constituency vote to the two big parties at the party-list. And two out of three of these shifters moved to the Democrats, only one to PPP. That was what gave the Democrats their superior showing on the party-list poll.

This shift has a clear implication: if the Democrats had some better candidates, they should do better in the constituencies.

But where?

The two main parties now have an electoral heartland. The TRT/PPP has the upper north and the core northeast. The Democrats have the south, excluding the predominantly Malay-Muslim deep south. Over the last three polls, this geographical division has become clearer and deeper. In these heartlands, the opponent is nowhere. In the northeast, the Democrats gained

a pitiful 8% of the votes in the constituency polls.

By contrast to these heartlands, the lower north and central regions have become an electoral checkerboard. Several 3-member constituencies returned MPs from two or three parties. Neighboring areas voted in completely different ways. In the Chao Phya plain from the hill fringe down to the sea, voters

have reverted to the old pattern of selecting candidates on local grounds, with less attention to party. This is where the Democrats have to fish for opportunities.

The return to multi-member voting has produced many more close contests. At the 2001 and 2005 polls, most winners won by a mile. The multi-member format with more parties has fragmented the vote. In several constituencies, the winners gained only about 30%, and rivals were hot on their heels.

If only 1% of voters voted differently, 11 seats could change hands. A 5% shift could change

a total of 60 seats, and a 10% shift could change 104.

Many of these "marginal" seats are in the checkerboard region of the center and lower north. These have to be the Democrats' targets at the next poll.

What chance do they have? Let's suppose that all the seats that are vulnerable to small shifts by the voters do indeed change hands.

If there is a 1% shift, the Democrats end up with three more seats, two won from PPP and one from a small party. If there is a 5% shift, the PPP loses 23 seats, and the Democrats gain 18. That would be enough to give the Democrats a chance to head a coalition.

But it's not that simple. There are also seats where the Democrats won narrowly in 2007 and are vulnerable to a slight shift in voting. They would gain 18 seats but lose 14 elsewhere. The net result would be that the PPP lose 9 seats while the Democrats gain 4 and other parties gain the other 5. If there is a 10% shift in voting, the result is even more ambiguous. PPP loses 20 seats, but the Democrats gain only 3.

This is just a statistical exercise with not much bearing on reality. But what it shows is that small shifts in voting could change


the result in contradictory ways. The Democrats have a good chance of winning some. But in others, especially in Bangkok and the east where the Democrats gained ground in 2007, the Democrats themselves are vulnerable.

Consider Chonburi and Rayong, the political fiefdom of Kamnan Poh. In 2005, Kamnan Poh delivered all the seats to TRT. But by 2007, Kamnan Poh had fled the country to avoid sentencing – and the Democrats won all the seats. Local opinion reckons there were two factors behind this astonishing swing: Poh's sons did not pay enough attention, and the large number of army and navy personnel in the area were mobilized to oust the PPP.

At provincial and municipal elections only a few months later, the Poh family candidates won by a mile. The family was paying attention and the military was not a factor.

The Democrats have a chance to win at the polls rather than by another "accident". But it won't be easy. At the 2007 poll, a lot of public money and resources were mobilized behind the attempt to prevent a PPP victory. How much this benefited the Democrats is impossible to gauge – and how far it will be a factor at the next poll is unknown.

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Getting tooled up for DIY

elcome to our new home-improvement DIY column. The term DIY is probably familiar to most of you, but for the uninitiated, it simply means "Do-It-Yourself".

This column is dedicated to folks who, like myself, are living and working (or retired) here, and who enjoy handyman-type tasks and small home-improvement construction projects. We will try to provide some helpful tips on what to buy, and what to avoid, as far as tools and materials go, and that includes getting the most for your money by buying affordable tools and making the best of

Of course, if finances allow, purchasing top-of-the line tools is always recommended, as their reliability, quality, and the availability of replacement parts (bearings, brushes, etc) will save you money in the long run.

The column will address mainly small jobs around the house, basic repairs to the house itself, installation of easy items (shelves, lights, fans, etc), maintenance of small electrical and hardware items, plumbing repairs,

furniture repairs/construction and perhaps a few things for the garden and patio. Working around the house can often turn into a 'blue-vocabulary' session, but with deference to our wives' and children's sensitive ears, and our but are usually not as roomy and

blood pressure, we'll try to provide shortcuts and tips that may help avoid problems ahead of time. Suggestions about future repair topics or projects would also be most welcome.

In this, our first column, we'll start with the most

basic tools. In the next article, we'll discuss some additional tools and some basic supplies. Most of you will be familiar with all the basic tools, but to be safe, I'll define some of them for those out there who may be newcomers to the manual crafts.

Toolbox. The place to start is, obviously, the toolbox. The most practical is the metal type having a top with two cover-flaps, hinged on the outside edges, which lift up to reveal trays, which also then lift up and out, like a tackle box. These are available at Big C or Tesco-Lotus for around 300 baht.

Plastic toolboxes are okay,

the catches break frequently. You will discover that, over time – as the box accommodates an assortment of extra tools, odd parts, screws and nuts 'n' bolts – the extra space helps. The two trays are divided into compartments; good

for keeping small items organized.

Hammers: Ah yes... Get in touch with your caveman roots. After all, our hands were made for blunt impact devices. Get the fiberglass-handled, claw-type (carpenter's hammer).

I recommend getting one standard and one smaller size, for different size nails, and nails in tight places, (corners, close to other items, etc). Lighter nails require a lighter touch, and the

smaller size is easier to control for these occasions. If you do a lot of furniture repair, get a tackhammer, too. These have smaller, tapered-cylinder shaped heads.

Wrenches: Get two sets of wrenches, as often the head of a bolt must be held while the nut is tightened, and many times, (especially on bicycles) the head and the nut will be the same size.

Try to get one set of wrenches that are open at each end, and one set with a boxed end. In addition, buy a few more loose wrenches of the most popular sizes (for bicycles, 10mm and

Check for straight, accurate-looking machining on the openings, and thick shafts for strength. Look for forged sets, as the cheaper, chrome-plated ones are cast from cheaper metal, and can break with hard use.

Screwdrivers: Look for screwdrivers with carbide-steel tips, usually black in color.

Avoid those with cheap chrome plating, which flakes off easily, leaving the metal susceptible to rust, and ones with machining-marks visible beneath the plating. Get ones with plastic handles, not wood, with throughhandle shafts ending in a cap over

the end of the handle. These are much stronger, and can withstand harder use, and the occasional dropping onto concrete, better than those without.

Pliers: One of the handiest tools ever invented! You should have at least one of the "standard" type, plus one pair of the heavier style, with more squared jaws, called "dykes" (I've no idea!), with a wire-cutter on the side.

Pliers with plastic, insulated handles are nice, but unless the handles flare at the bottom, the plastic has an annoying tendency to slip off during use. Needlenose pliers are also quite handy, as are a pair of sturdy wire-cutters. Get several sizes of each.

Locking pliers: These are extremely handy tools to have. I'm spoiled by having grown up with "Vise-Grips", the original (and best) locking pliers, which are made in my home state, back in the US.

The ones available here, with the folded-metal handles, are adequate, but beware: sometimes the toothed jaw-inserts can break loose with heavy use. Grease the threaded shaft inside the handle for easier operation, and put a drop of oil in all the pivots. Get several sizes.

Brains, Planes & Automobiles

he ancient city of Ayudhaya, Thailand's former capital, is rightly famous for its many magnificent temples; around 200 of them to be precise.

It is also home to the Honda Automobile (Thailand) plant, the country's second largest manufacturer and exporter of passenger vehicles.

Recently, Honda opened a second plant in Ayutthaya, investing around 6.2 billion baht and employing an additional 2,000 workers.

This plant doubles Honda's annual capacity to 240,000 vehicles. The investment in the plant was driven by the growing demand, even in these troubled economic times, for Honda vehicles in the Asian region.

The new plant will build or assemble the Accord, the Civic, the popular sports utility CR-V, the compact Jazz and the unique-to-Thailand Honda City.

The City is loosely based on an outgoing Civic model and is designed with value-for-money in

Five-speed automatic transmission, column-mounted paddle shift levers, active headrests, dual airbags and an advanced audio system, including CD player all come as standard.

The entry-level City comes with a manual gearbox, but most people would probably opt for the comfort and ease of operation of the automatic. The throttle is a drive-by-wire electronic arrangement.

Power is supplied by Honda's latest i-VTEC 1.5 liter engine, packing a robust 120 bhp at 6,600 rpm.

Honda introduced the VTEC engine in 1989, the first power unit to provide variable valve timing with lift electronic control.

This system uses two camshaft profiles and electronically selects between them. It was invented by Honda R&D engineer Ikuo Kajitani and produces more

power, lower emissions and improved fuel economy.

Other manufacturers, including Mitsubishi, Toyota, Porsche and Nissan, have all subsequently developed systems similar to the one pioneered by Honda.

It is a little-known fact that Honda builds more engines than any other company in the world.

In addition to cars and motorbikes, Honda also manufacturers lawnmowers, diggers, earth movers, generators and even aircraft, which are currently being developing in conjunction with the GE Corporation of the US.

The GE Honda HF120 engine was formally launched in late 2006 when it was selected to power the HondaJet advanced light jet, as well as the Spectrum Aeronautical business jet.

Certification of the HF120 is expected early next year, with entry into service on both aircraft in 2010.

Initially, production of the Honda engine will be concentrated at GE's Lynn facility in Massachusetts, but recently Honda Aero Inc. announced plans to build an engine production facility in Burlington,

North Carolina.

Honda claims that the key cost-of-ownership of the engine will be its ability to operate in service for an industry-best 5,000 hours before its first major overhaul, with no need to open the engine for interim hot-section inspections.

Back to earth and the altogether more terrestrial, not to say mundane Honda City.

This is a no-nonsense family car with one or two unexpected features. Seating four or five, it is well appointed with plenty of room inside.

A number of accessories are available as options on the City, most of them essentially cosmetic.

At 564,000 baht for the entry-level model, this compact Honda is unquestionably excellent value for money.

Phuket sailors to represent Thailand in NZ Keelboat championships

PHUKET: Phuket's Scott Duncanson and his crew of Trent Pederson, Jerry Chase and Kevin Scott have been selected by the Royal Akarana Yacht Club to represent Thailand in the 2008 New Zealand Keelboat championships, to be held November 12 to 16.

Duncanson gained selection after a convincing overall victory in the Raimon Land Platu Championship 2008, which consisted of five regattas: The Platu Open, the Coronation Cup, the Hua Hin Regatta, the Platu Nationals, and the Royal Varuna Cup, finishing 1st, 1st, 2nd and 1st respectively.

For the first time, the New Zealand Keelboat championships will be contested in the Bruce Farr designed Platu 25 Class, which has seen a resurgence in popularity over the last few years after gaining International One

Design status from sailing's governing body, the International Sailing Federation (ISAF). European regattas are now attracting fleets nearing one hundred boats, and with a new manufacturer based in Indonesia, fleets are expected to grow rapidly throughout the Asia Pacific region.

Invitations to challenge for the title were issued only to New Zealand recognized, class champions and selected international Platu crews of recognized world standard.

With confirmed entries from America's Cup helmsman Dean Barker (Emirates, Team New Zealand), Andrew Wills, Farr 1020 / Young 88 champion, Richard Pagani (the current title holder), and a yet-to-be-named Kiwi yacht racing 'legend', the competition will no doubt be of the highest level.

Speaking to the *Gazette*, Duncanson said, "We've had an intensive seven months of racing in the Platu, competing in seven regattas, which means over fifty races.

A lot of time and effort has been put into rig tuning, sail design and development, but ultimately it has been the training and dedication of the crew that has secured us the opportunity to compete.

"Unfortunately, due to the lack of a suitable Marina in Phuket, the bulk of the Thai Platu fleet is now based at Ocean Marina, Pattaya, and this has made attending all the regattas a little difficult, not to mention costly," he added.

"Indeed, it is only because of the generous support of our sponsors Raimon Land and my employer PCS, for allowing me the time off, that we are able to compete internationally.

The team, sailing under the name The Lofts Southshore, has recruited New Zealand Olympic medalist and coach Bruce Kendall as strategist and tactician. "We've been very successful racing in the warm and usually peaceful waters of Thailand," said Duncanson, who added that he expected the racing in New Zealand to be much tougher and certainly a lot colder.

"Having some local knowledge and expertise on board will hopefully ensure that we're a little more competitive in such a high-class fleet," he observed.

When asked about his chances of winning in New Zealand, Duncanson was realistic

"As our crew are mostly amateur sailors, we don't expect to be at the same level as the professionals; but since the Platu class is still quite new to New Zealand, we do have experience and 'time on the water' on our side."

He concluded, "Of course we hope to do well, but, more importantly, we view our selection as a very fortunate opportunity to represent Thailand abroad, and to race against the world's best sailors."





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



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Vines & Vindaloo

I'm rather partial to a good curry. It's in my blood. After all, I am a Yorkshireman, and the centre of the curry universe in the UK (many would argue the world), is only a few miles from my former home in sunny England – the glorious city of Bradford. There are few things I miss from that corner of the planet, but curry is definitely one of them.

Bradford rarely gets a mention in gastronomic circles, even though it's probably solely responsible for one of the greatest culinary inventions in the history of mankind; a creation rarely uttered in the hushed, hallowed halls of whatever clubs those executive chef types probably belong to. Bradford invented curry and chips.

There are those who will maintain that the only appropriate accompaniments to a curry would be rice or *chapattis*, but these people are missing out on an incredibly pleasurable dining experience. They have never experienced the culinary delight of dunking a big fat chip into a



bowl of curry, and munching on the combination... Heavenly.

By the way, for any Americans who may be a little confused at this stage, the chips to which I refer are what you bizarrely call French fries, or even freedom fries more recently, I'm led to believe. If you could please refer to your so-called 'chips' as 'crisps', as they are obviously more correctly known, this would avoid any confusion in this regard. Thank you.

Anyway, getting back to curries. What's on offer? The options generally available start off with the *korma*, which to be honest, is a bit of a girls-blouse curry. It can be quite tasty, but there isn't a great deal of bite to it. The kids and girlies will love it, as it's fairly innocuous.

Then there's the inevitable chicken tikka massala, which for some reason seems to have taken over from roast beef and Yorkshire pudding as Britain's national dish. Again, it's a curry for wimps – flavorsome and pleasant enough, but not really one for the lads.

Then we get on to the more serious stuff, moving up to the Madras stage. This is where things get interesting, as these curries start to bite back. They aren't *phet* in the same way as Thai food; they somehow hurt more. This is especially true when you move on to the more serious vindaloo, which, if the chef puts his mind to it, can cause serious pain.

Unfortunately, many of my compatriots only think about indulging in a curry when they leave the pub after a few pints, and think it will be a good idea to hurl a bit of abuse at the waiter, and ask for "the hottest thing on the menu". A hint, gentlemen. Don't upset the waiting staff. The word gets back to the bloke cooking the stuff, and he will inevitably make you hurt, the degree of pain wholly dependent on the scale of the insult.

Once consumed, even strapping chaps are crying from

the strength of the curry's punishment, but all remain adamant that they can handle it, even though what has been created is hotter than the next step up from a vindaloo; a pahl. This is an evil concoction, designed, I would suspect, only to satisfy the certainly justified lust for revenge from Indian restaurant staff.

The term vindaloo, I am led to believe, actually derives from the fact that for centuries, the meat for these curries was marinated in vinegar, which comes from wine, which is of course made from the fruit of vines. At last, we get to something which is vaguely connected to something green and growing.

Vines are technically "plants that grow horizontally over the ground or climb by twining or attaching appendages to a support." There are many different types here in Phuket; woody and herbaceous, and evergreen and deciduous. Around these parts, people mostly grow them for their flowers, as many vines have longer and more frequent blooming cycles than many other plant forms.

There are vines in bloom every month of the year. Most of these vines are evergreen, making them do their job year-round. Many vines which grow in this part of the world have unusual and striking foliage and flowers; it doesn't seem to matter whether they are growing wild or if someone has deliberately put them there – they're everywhere, in one form or another.

Vines can be used in a variety of ways in your garden. Posts and poles, and even ugly trees you can't bear to get rid of can be transformed using vines to alter their form, texture and color. Species of vines exist that cling or climb on wood, stone, brick, or even sheet metal, so you can choose vines to give character to boring walls or fences. Closely clinging vines can also be used to accentuate architectural lines of buildings, or larger, branching vines can soften lines you'd rather not see.

They're not particularly independent, so vines often need some type of support if you grow them upright. To choose the proper support for a particular species of vine, it's important to understand how the vine is going to climb. They can be separated into three basic types of climbers: clingers, twiners, and winders.

Clingers are vines which grab hold of rough surfaces by means of rootlets or sticky disk things. I'm sure 'sticky disk things' aren't the official term but you know what I mean. Examples of these are the ivy you see in more temperate climates, the climbing fig, and the philoden-

These types of vines are often used to cover solid upright surfaces such as trees, fences or walls. You shouldn't grow them on wood-covered walls because they prevent the wood surface from drying, which increases the chance of decay. Clinging vines may also loosen mortar between bricks in masonry walls and can sometimes be hard to remove.

Twining vines get around by encircling anything they can. They are often used on poles, vertical wires, or lattice structures. Most of these vines will spiral in only one direction that is characteristic to the species. If you attempt to train one to spiral in the opposite direction, it probably won't co-operate, and you might even damage it. Checking out the spirals that are already there is probably the best way to avoid upsetting it. Twining vines include mandevilla, silver morning glory, confederate jasmine allamanda, and the inevitable bougainvillea.


Winders climb by means of tendrils, which come in many forms and sizes. It's the tendrils that wind themselves around some kind of support, rather than the stems themselves. You can use these to cover lattice, wire mesh, or other supports when you want them to spread horizontally. Examples of tendril vines include the glory lily (the spectacular *gloriosa superba*), many members of the pea family, and the passion flower.

If you watch many of these at work, you'll see tendrils almost visibly moving – give them a push in the right direction and their tendrils will be well and truly locked around whatever they can find in just a few hours.

Vines and vindaloo? Yes, I know – tenuous doesn't even begin to describe it. So whinge to the *Gazette* editor.

Alternatively, do yourself a favor. The next time you're in the mood for a curry, say no to the rice or *chapattis*. Order a plate of chips instead. You'll be glad you did. Oh, and be careful not to upset the chef.







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
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

Plans for a prestigious port of call
