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National park chief wants out

SAKOO: Charuay Inchan, the beleaguered chief of Sirinath Marine National Park, has written to National Park Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department Director Upai Wayupat requesting a transfer to another post.

The move ended a three-day protest by some 100 local residents who roadblocked the entrance to the park and demanded the abolition of increased park fees, the resignation of Mr Charuay, and free entry for children on the upcoming Children's Day

The protesters called off their campaign at 4 pm on January 6 and the park is now open as usual.

Increased park entrance fees, which the protesters claimed were keeping tourists away and hurting their businesses, will now be reduced and entrance to the park will be free for children on Children's Day.

Mr Charuay told the *Gazette* that the new prices will take effect only after the director of the National Park Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department gives the order, which is expected to come no later than January 9, the day before Children's Day. The present fee structure will apply until that time.

The settlement came after negotiations between the protesters, Mr Charuay and Saran Chaisa-ard, head of Environment Conservation Office Division 5 and representing Mr Upai.

The additional fees that prompted the protesters' campaign took effect about two months ago. They have made access to the park much more expensive – prohibitively so for many tourists who used to visit the park regularly.

The park previously charged 40 baht per vehicle, regardless of the number of passengers. However, under the new fee structure, vehicle access was still 40 baht, but there was an additional fee for each passenger: 40 baht per adult and 20 baht per child for Thai nationals.

Now, the additional fees will be reduced to 20 baht for Thai adults and 10 baht for Thai children, with variable fees for vehicles.

Fees for foreigners will remain the same, at 200 baht per adult and 100 baht per child. However, foreigners presenting a work permit will be allowed in at the Thai rate.

The new prices had sparked complaints from tourists, whose numbers dropped sharply after the new policy took effect and kept the park quiet over the recent long holiday period.

Some of the protesters were among the group of vendors operating businesses inside the park who last November refused orders from the park to remove their operations from the Nai Yang beachfront and relocate

to a food center built for them further inland.


Park chief Mr Charuay had held talks with the villagers, but was unsuccessful in trying to persuade them to end the blockade.

The protesters said Mr Charuay earlier told them the entrance fee structure was beyond his control because he was bound to abide by rules and regulations issued by the National Park, Wildlife and Plant Conservation Department.

Mr Charuay explained that the new fees were earmarked for improving the national park by cleaning the beach, building toilets and protecting coral reefs. The protesters had caused serious problems at the park, prompting the climbdown and his subsequent transfer request.

Speaking about his decision to request the transfer, Mr Charuay told the *Gazette* he had already sent his request to the director and was awaiting a decision

Regarding free entry to the park on Children's Day, he said that it was standard practice in Thailand to grant such concessions and there would be no problem doing so in this case.



Thailand Open returns

PHUKET: This year's Children's Day falls on January 10, when fun activities for the whole family will be taking place all around the island.

At the Phuket Deep Sea Port in tambon Wichit, the Royal Thai Navy Third Fleet will welcome the public aboard the vessels Chao Phraya and the Songkhla. There will also be helicopter and parachuting displays.

Holiday death toll down 50%

PHUKET CITY: The province has declared its "Seven Days of Danger" road safety campaign a success, with just three dead and a significant drop in the number of accidents and injuries compared to last year.

Vice Governor Smith Palawatwichai led a press conference on Monday to release the final figures at Phuket Provincial

According to statistics tallied by the Road Safety Center set up by the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM-Phuket), there were a total of 58 road accidents over the period. These resulted in three deaths and 58 injuries requiring admittance to a hospital.

Overall, the number of accidents recorded was down 19.5% year-on-year, while the number of injured people requiring admittance to a hospital was down 23.7%.

The majority of accidents were in Muang District (43), followed by Thalang (10) and Kathu

(5). Nearly 80% of the accidents tion of traffic law. involved motorbikes, with drunk driving a leading risk factor, Vice Governor Smith said.

Santharn Sanguan-ngarm, head of the Kusoldharm Foundation that provides emergency rescue services for most of the island, attributed the reductions to good co-operation among all the agencies and organizations involved and the many road checkpoints set up around the island.

According to Kusoldharm's independent statistics, there were 62 accidents. Of these, car-onmotorbike accidents accounted for the majority (24), followed by motorbikes crashing or falling on their own (22), motorbike-onmotorbike collisions (15) and cars going off the road, overturning or crashing into utility poles or other barriers (5).

Three pedestrians were hit, one by a car and two by motor-

The final DDPM-Phuket figures for the December 30 to January 5 period showed that of 59,763 people inspected at checkpoints 6,414 were found in viola-

Of these, the most common offense was driving without a license (2,872), followed by failure to wear a crash helmet (1,239 cases), not wearing a seatbelt (1,170) and operating unsafe vehicles (427 cases).

Of about 12,500 people checked for driving under the influence of alcohol, 807 were charged. Not a single case of speeding was recorded throughout the entire period in Phuket.

Regionally, there were eight deaths reported over the period in the five Andaman Coast provinces, down 42.9% year-on-year. The most were in Trang (4), followed by Phuket (3) and Phang Nga (1). The total number of accidents (235) and injuries (306) were down 18.8% and 23.2% respectively, year-on-year.

Nationally, 367 people were killed and 4,107 others injured in 3,824 road accidents

Interior Minister Chaovarat Chanweerakul said the death toll was lower than last year, when 401 people were killed in 4,475

Sea claims German tourist, Thais cheat death

RAWAI: An elderly German tourist went into shock and died in the sea off Koh Racha on January 4. The deceased, identified as 69-year-old Harald Winfrid Petpalkau, was swimming in the sea with friends when the tragedy occurred. Rescue workers could find no traces of external injury.

Mr Petpalkau's remains were delivered to Vachira Hospital Phuket, where doctors were not immediately able to confirm if drowning was the cause of

Chalong Police Inspector Chana Sitthimat told the Gazette that Mr Petpalkau suffered from diabetes, high blood pressure and other cardiac problems and one of these may have caused him to go into circulatory shock.

However, Mr Petpalkau's wife told police she suspected that her husband's death was caused by a case of cramp, Lt Col Chana Sitthimat said.

Three days earlier, a New Year family holiday almost ended in tragedy when three Thai tourists nearly drowned off Nai Harn Beach on New Year's Day.

At around 2 pm Kraisorn Petchkong, 32, his niece Krisana Petchkong, 12, and Metika Sintuwongsanon, 12, were playing in the water when two large waves crashed over them, the undertow dragging them out to sea. All three were saved following the heroic efforts of beach guards, foreign tourists and local people, who immediately rushed into the water and were able to rescue all three.

James Eden, a 33-year-old tourist from London, said he was swimming in the sea with a friend, Liam LeRoux, 29, when they heard screaming.

"We swam towards the noise and found two teenage Thai girls drowning in a rip tide. One was completely lifeless. The other still had a bit of strength left and was bravely clinging onto her friend," he said.

James and Liam tried to pull them to safety as a group, but the current was too strong so they separated, each taking one of the girls."We were still struggling to make progress and were getting tired from the effort of swimming while keeping (the girls') heads above water. We were very grateful when help arrived in the form of a number of guys with surf boards," he said.

"I felt privileged to be in a position to help – it is certainly the best thing I've ever done in my life," he added.

The three victims were sent to Vachira Hospital and discharged the following day without any serious injuries.


Rawai deputy mayor Theeraphong Thaodaeng said that the municipality had arranged for a six-member beach guard to work at Nai Harn over the busy holiday period.

"Because it's not monsoon season now, it's not necessary to put red flags at the edge of the beach," he said.





Blackout plunges Phuket into darkness

PHUKET: On December 30, Phuket was plunged into darkness for more than two hours, from 6.30 pm until nearly 9 pm. Some parts of the island were without electricity until around 11 pm due to problems in restoring power from the South Electric Power System Controlling Center in Trang.

Somchai Chairojnipat, an engineer speaking on behalf of

the center, said that a transformer malfunction had occurred, delaying the restoration of power to Krabi, Phang Nga, Trang and Phuket.

"We were already working on a plan to improve the electricity supply in the southwest region, including an upgrade of the power system in the area from Krabi to Phang Nga," he

told the *Gazette*. Mr Somchai added that plans were in place to install a new transformer at Ratchaprapa Dam, which could supply Phuket with electricity for the next 10 years. "However, we are now focusing all our efforts on resolving the current problem to ensure that such a situation does not happen again," he said.

Fire safety crackdown ordered

PHUKET CITY: In the wake of the deadly Santika nightclub blaze that claimed 64 lives in Bangkok, Phuket Governor Preecha Ruangjan has ordered stricter enforcement of fire safety regulations at entertainment venues across the island.

The measures are designed to pre-empt a similar tragedy occurring in Phuket, not only in terms of loss of life and property damage, but also because of the impact such a tragedy would have on the island's tourism industry, Governor Preecha said.

"After the fires in Bangkok I ordered administrators and re-

lated agencies to get out and conduct thorough inspections of entertainment venues, especially in terms of having adequate emergency exits and firefighting equipment," he said.

The inspections will be conducted both day and night for comparative purposes and owners will then be informed about any changes they need to make to bring their venues into compliance.

Owners who fail to comply will face prosecution, he said.

This does not apply to just nightclubs, but also to other large public buildings including hotels,

resorts and factories, which will also be subject to inspection, Governor Preecha added.

An initial round of inspections, carried out under the direction of the Muang and Kathu districts chiefs, found a number of breaches of fire safety regulations, including exits that were too narrow and a lack of firefighting equipment.

Owners would be given a short period of time to comply before facing legal action, he said.

Asked about nightspots staying open past authorized times, he said any owners found guilty of this will face prosecution.

Baby elephant born in Rawai brings hope

RAWAI: A baby elephant born on Sunday January 4 is attracting hundreds of visitors and is being seen as an omen of good fortune and improved prosperity for the island's struggling tourism industry in the new year.

Not long after its birth, the healthy 60-kilogram male calf was given the name *Plai Pimai*, meaning "Mr New Year", by his owners at the Kinnaree Elephant Safari Trekking camp in Rawai Village 2.

Kinnaree Elephant Trekking director Paichet "Apu" Kompaiper said, "*Plai Pimai* has brought a lot of happiness to us and we will take care of him as if he were our own child."

Plai Pimai, the first elephant born in Phuket in five years, is also a great achievement

for the camp, he said.

Although still exhausted from the delivery following 21 months of gestation, *Plai Pimai's* 12-year-old mother *Phang Milk* is already very protective of the calf, which sleeps beneath her just like a human child would its own mother.

Phang Milk is obviously happy having her first calf around, Mr Paichet said.

Mr Paichet hopes the cute calf will spark greater interest in elephant trekking on the island and help support the 23 mahouts employed at the trekking camp.

Kinnaree Elephant Trekking's managing director Jaroon Thaojun said business was down this high season, from about 400 customers a day to 300 on average, because of the political instability and global economic problems.





Access all areas?

With uneven pavements, high curbs and obstacles such as telegraph poles blocking the sidewalks, it's no surprise that wheelchair users are a rare sight on the streets of Phuket. To compound the issue, many public buildings remain difficult for wheelchair users to access, and accessible public toilets are few and far between. But while these issues mean some Thai disabled people are virtually confined to their homes, others are able to get out and make a living, despite the difficulties. And there are indeed wheelchair-bound tourists coming here to enjoy the island's charms. Why isn't Phuket more wheelchair accessible? And how do the problems above affect disabled residents and tourists alike? The Gazette's Dan Waites and Atchaa Khamlo report.

ccording to the Phuket Society of Disabled Persons (PSDP), there are currently 2,077 registered disabled people in Phuket, though it estimates that 5% of the total number of disabled people have not registered because their relatives have not taken them to do so and they are unable to go by themselves. Of the total, there are around 100 wheelchair users, 20 of whom have electrically powered vehicles. The majority have

people at home to assist them with relatively few living independently, according to the PSDP.

Nalinee Bunthawadchai, 38, has been working as a finance officer at Vachira Hospital Phuket for eight years. She lost her hand in a bus crash in 1985 and five years later became confined to a wheelchair, following a motoring accident in 1990 that left her paralysed her from the waist down.

Despite what she has been

through, Nalinee says, "I feel lucky I have so many friends and family always around helping me – for example, my family take me to work every day."

When asked what difficulties she faces as a wheelchair user, she complains that many government buildings such as municipal offices and police stations have no ramp or elevator, and she often needs someone to lift her up steps.

She adds, "When I want to go somewhere I have to ensure

there'll be someone able to come along and help me, which means I'm always losing my chance to go places."

As the head of the PSDP, Sawai Promjinda knows more than most about the problems faced by wheelchair users on the island.

He says that the problem stems from the fact that while Thai law has all the necessary provisions in place to ensure disabled access to the public sphere, the regulations are not enforced.

"Most new buildings don't follow the rules," he says, adding that he fights constantly to have the authorities make public government buildings more accessible.

He says that when government buildings are fitted with ramps or other measures supposed to improve accessibility, they're often not done properly, with the slope being too steep or without safety rails, for example.

He stresses how little he is listened to and cites numerous examples of buildings where accessibility regulations aren't being adhered to.

In fact, the right of disabled people to access public facilities and to receive other assistance from the State, as well as the State's duty to ensure a good quality of life for the disabled, are enshrined in the Constitution of





the Kingdom of Thailand.

The Rehabilitation of Disabled Persons Act of 1991 provides for the right of the disabled to receive medical treatment, rehabilitation and employment support, while the Ministry of Interior (MoI) Building Regulation of 2005 states that all new government buildings containing a certain amount of space devoted to public use, as well as certain privately owned buildings accessible to the public, such as stadiums, convention centers, department stores and hotels, have to comply with various design specifications intended to allow access for disabled persons.

Kert Stavorn is a partner at Siam Legal, a Thai firm that specialises in property law, among other areas.

He argues that despite the compulsory nature of the Ministry of Interior Building Regulation, it does not provide for penalty clauses in the event of non-compliance.

"Its regulatory force is limited only to requiring developers to incorporate the required specifications into the building plan for purposes of the Building Permit.

No post-construction exami-

nation or investigation is conducted to ensure compliance. Thus, the force of this Regula-tion's implementation is ineffective if not totally inexistent," he says.

Consequently, most developers in Thailand fail to comply with accessibility regulations, Kert says, although he adds that property development in Thailand is mostly concentrated on the construction of condominium buildings, which include two to three buildings in one project, and that as long as each building does not exceed 2000 square meters, the development is excluded from the 2005 MoI Building Regulation.

Despite what might seem like a daunting travel environment, many wheelchair-bound tourists do visit Phuket, and those that the *Gazette* spoke to were generally positive about their experience.

The major international hotel chains tend to understand the need for accessibility standards better than local developers.

One wheelchair user interviewed by the *Gazette* spent six weeks on the island every year from 2003 to 2006, staying at the Dusit Thani, the Hilton, Le Me-

ridian and Friendship Beach, reporting that every hotel had wheel-in showers and perfectly accessible rooms.

Walt Balenovich, a wheel-chair user with polio-induced paralysis who describes himself as "North America's Disabled Adventurer" stayed at the YHA backpackers' hostel in Chalong in 2002.

He was pleased to report he was able to get around the island because "a guy whose sister worked there drove me around everywhere, at first as a taxi, then for free".

He says that one thing that could make things easier is "a modern bus with wheelchair access, stopping at all the beaches and towns like Chalong, even if only running a few times a day".

Walt says that the only places he would have liked to visit but couldn't were temples.

Englishman Simon Luttrell decided to take accessibility issues seriously when he built his hotel, the Phuket Airport Hotel, in 2006.

"I realised, well hang on, it's not going to cost us anything extra to make it accessible for people in wheelchairs if we do it now," he says. Having obtained the American Disability Association (ADA)'s guidelines on accessible buildings, he set about building what he believes is Thailand's only hotel in which every room is accessible to wheelchair users.

Many of the features that make the Phuket Airport Hotel wheelchair accessible are down to common sense – doorways wide enough for wheelchair access, sliding doors, no large steps, and lights activated by pull strings hanging low enough for wheelchair users to reach.

However, building the hotel according to the ADA's specifications created some problems Simon had not foreseen.

Before the builders poured the concrete for the first bath-

room floor, Simon laid out the positions of the bathroom furniture himself, since the guidelines meant the basin, the shower and the toilet needed to be in specific positions.

"The first problem I met was that when they saw where the toilet was going to be located, they said 'you can't do that, it's unlucky for a toilet to face west', which threw me completely."

Simon had to have a Buddhist monk adjudicate over the issue, who decided that the inauspicious configuration could be permitted.

When the builders had twice laid the concrete with the furniture in slightly different places from those he had specified, Simon realised that he would have to show the builders exactly why the positioning needed to be so exact.

He tried to do so with the aid of a wheelchair, but "when I sat in the wheelchair they all shouted and said that was extremely unlucky and I'd be disabled if I continued to sit in it".

As someone who has had much contact with disabled tourists in Phuket over the years, Simon has some ideas about what could be done to improve the situation.

One problem is that tourists don't know in advance where they are going to be able to go and where there will be obstacles.

"A good idea would be to produce a tourist map for wheelchair users to show where there is access, where there are ramps," he says.


He summarises the situation, saying, "Phuket could be a great place for disabled people if there were a little effort on the part of hotels and local government in terms of pavement construction, street furniture, lights, everything like that. A little bit of thought before they were placed in position would be a great help to people in wheelchairs."

The TAT will bring in performers from mainland China for participants to appreciate and to foster ties, especially with Phuket City's sister city of Yantai, in China's Shandong province.


Colorful street processions and vibrant celebrations will fill the streets of Old Phuket Town,

Drug disco monk defrocked

NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: In an interesting story that until now has not been reported in the English language press, a monk was arrested on November 17 after police discovered he had converted his cell at the temple into a mini disco and was having drug parties.

After receiving a tip off that a monk at Wat Mukhathara, in Tambon Pak Nakhon, Muang District, was using drugs in his cell, plainclothed police went to investigate.

At the temple the officers heard music and loud chatting coming from one of the cells. When they got close, they could smell cigarette smoke and krathom (a prohibited indigenous plant with a mild stimulant effect) wafting from under the door.

The officers knocked on the door. When the monk opened it, they saw five youths all in a state of advanced inebriation. The youths tried to make a dash for the exit, but were all collared by the officers. Police released the names of the monk and two laymen as Phra Chokdee Sukkaow, 29, Jakraphan Laichaphit, 21, and Kittichai Bualuang, 23.

Two other youths were also arrested, but as they were under 18, their names were not released. According to police, Phra Chokdee's cell was decorated "like a discotheque", but they did not elaborate on the set up.

Police took Phra Chokdee to the temple abbot to be defrocked and contacted the parents and guardians of the youths, telling them to come and pick them up. After the defrocking, Phra Chokdee – or just Mr Chokdee as he is now known – was taken to Nakhon Sri Thammarat Provincial Police Station.

There he complained bitterly to Deputy Commander Col Somchai Uamthong that he should not have been defrocked as he had committed only pahjittee (a minor offence under the rules of the Buddhist Sangha), not pahrahchik (a grave offence)

The colonel, however, had little time for Mr Chokdee's protestations, asking of him why he wanted to stay in the monkhood when he was only bringing the religion into disrepute. Col Somchai added that many undisciplined monks like Mr Chokdee had already been defrocked, including abbots, and that he should accept his fate graciously.

He was then sent down to the cells to wait to be charged with possession and use of a Category 5 narcotic.

BANGKOK: A series of fires starting with the blaze on January 1 during New Year celebrations at Santika nightclub in Bangkok have put fire safety in the capital back in the spotlight.

A Japanese reveler succumbed to death from severe burns from the inferno at the club late on January 4, bringing the death toll to 64.

Keiichi Wada, 25, was pronounced dead at 9 pm at Chulalongkorn Hospital, four days after the fire at the drinking and dancing venue on Ekamai Road.

Sixty-eight of the injured victims were still receiving treatment in various hospitals as of January 5 with more than half in intensive care units.

Jongrak Jutanont, Deputy National Police Commissioner, said investigators had interviewed survivors to establish the cause of the blaze, but had yet to come to a conclusion.

The fire started on the top floor and spread quickly, one club worker said. The smoke caused panic, sending people scrambling to the front door where they had come in. Most were unaware there were three other exits.

Up to 1,000 people could have been inside when the fire broke out, the worker said.

Police did not rule out the possibility that the fire could have been caused by either stage effects used by the club, or fireworks lit by a customer, Gen Jongrak said.

The owner of the pub will face charges of recklessly causing other people's deaths and allowing customers aged under 20 into the club, after a 17-year-old high school student was found among the dead, he added.

Many, if not most of the dead were foreigners, but it was hard to know for sure as many were burned beyond recognition, he added.

The following day another fire broke out at the Raw Hyde Pub on Soi Cowboy, just off Sukhumvit Road.

Police said firefighters took about 15 minutes to put out the blaze, which broke out at about 2:30 am. Nobody was injured.

On January 5, rescuers using extension ladders and helicopters managed to save 50 people from the top floors of the Sua Pa Plaza building in Bangkok's Chinatown area.

Others were safely evacuated from inside the burning building.

The fire broke out at 8:30 pm in a mobile phone store on one of the lower floors of the building, causing residents and sauna guests on higher floors to climb to the top of the 10-storey building.

The body of Sanguan Saenkaew, 45, was found on the seventh floor after the blaze was put out

Forty-seven people were injured and the entire building was gutted, causing fear that it would collapse.

Thai Muslims stage protests outside Israeli Embassy in Bangkok

BANGKOK: Some 800 Thai Muslims who demonstrated for two hours in front of the Israeli Embassy warned of "unexpected" incidents around the world unless Israel ceased its "Operation Cast Lead against Palestine".

The protesters wore T-shirts with message reading: "Stop Gaza Slaughter" and waved banners with the messages "Boycott Israel" and "Israel is the Real Terrorist". They were the second group to call a protest against Israel after a smaller group rallied at the embassy the day before.

Some 30,000 Thai workers in Israel were safe so far from the military operation against Hamas in the Gaza Strip, where Palestinian casualties went beyond 500, Israeli Ambassador to Thailand Yael Rubinstein said on January 6.

Ms Rubinstein was confident that authorities here could provide sufficient security for the embassy staff and Israeli citizens in Thailand. She urged Thailand

and the international community to understand the situation as well as the suffering of the Israeli people. Some one million Israeli civilians living in the southern part of that country have been suffering from the Hamas's on and off rocket attacks for seven years, she said.

The strike focused only on

the Gaza Strip, where no Thais were working, she said.

Most of the Thai workers were in the eastern part of the country, far from the war zone. The Thai Foreign Ministry said earlier that some 3,000 Thai workers are in the risky area of Eshkol, near the Gaza Strip along Israel's southern border.

PM's phone hell

BANGKOK: Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva has been receiving over 100 intimidating phone calls a day since his election, his aide revealed on January 4.

Sirichoke Sopha, an aide to the premier, said hate calls were made to PM Abhisit's mobile phone about 100 times a day since the House elected him prime min-

Mr. Sirichoke said PM Abhisit mostly answered the calls himself and tried his best to explain his election to the callers.

Once the prime minister became busy with his work, Mr Sirichoke answered the calls on his behalf.

Most callers used rude and abusive language. The callers claimed they knew PM Abhisit's mobile phone number from the taxi drivers' community radio station.

Democrats prioritize push for educational reform

BANGKOK: Education Minister Jurin Laksanawisit has promised to push for implementation of the 15-year free education policy in the new academic year, promising that education reform would take top priority under his helmsmanship.

Mr Jurin has assigned the Basic Education Commission to calculate the budget required to provide 15 years of free schooling, including tuition, textbooks, stationery, uniforms and other student expenses.

The ministry should prepare for this project to take off because the government wanted it to begin in the next school year, he said.

Education development to meet the country's needs would

give opportunities to the private sector to participate in making education the core of economic development, by producing manpower that met demand from business, industry and other sectors, he said.

He would meet with industrial councils, chambers of commerce and all sectors to brainstorm a plan to produce workers with skills sought by the labor market. Higher education should produce more graduates in science rather than social science, he said.

In reality, social science graduates outnumber science graduates and this mix did not match the needs of employers and the economic development process, the minister added.

Fake bills found in the South

SONGKHLA, NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: The reported spread of counterfeit money has reached the South, with four arrests in the lead-up to the New Year.

On December 28, a couple were arrested in Haad Yai after allegedly trying to buy plane tickets with five fake 1,000 baht notes.

Arisa Noksing, 31 and her boyfriend Suthep Kriuklai, 38, were arrested after the owner of Lovely Tour travel agency on Niphat-Uthit Road in Haad Yai told police that the pair had paid for plane tickets to Bangkok with the fake bills.

Police arrested the pair when they returned to the travel agency.

Miss Arisa told police that the money was given to her by a friend. Police searched the suspects' house on Ratana-Uthit Road, but found no more of the fake notes. Police said that they were not satisfied with the suspects' explanation of how they came into possession of the bills and would detain them while the investigation continues.

Two days later on December 30, two youths were arrested after allegedly paying for gasoline with six fake 20 baht notes on December 27.

Police reported that Suriya Kaowklapphech, 22, and Khongthon Phutthachu, 23, told them they had found the money in the market. However, police suspect the pair were involved in making the counterfeit bills.

Father and daughter drown

NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: A seven-year-old girl drowned after being swept out to sea while playing in a channel on a beach in Sichon District on December 29. The girl's father, a policeman, died trying to rescue her in heavy seas but her uncle, who also went to her aid, was saved by rescue volunteers.

Eyewitnesses told police that Panatda Chanthong was playing with two or three other children in a channel leading from the hills behind the beach down to the sea. Suddenly a large body of water came down from the hills, knocking over Miss Panatda and sweeping her out to sea.

Her father Mr Charin Chanthong and her uncle Kriangkrai Thongsri, rushed into the sea after her, but got into difficulties in the large waves. Rescue workers pulled the men from the water, but were unable to resuscitate Mr Charin.

The unconcious Mr Kriangkrai was taken to Sichon Hospital, where he made a full recovery.

The body of Miss Panatda was found floating off the coast of neighbouring Khanom District the following day.

Mr Kraingkrai said that he and Mr Charin were able to find Miss Panatda and hold her above water for a while, but were out of their depths and were soon overpowered by waves. The next thing he remembers is waking up in Sichon Hospital, he said.

"After talking to witnesses and hospital staff, I found out that the channel that Miss Panatda was playing in runs down from Thong Yang Waterfall. Periodically, the authorities open a sluice gate to allow water from the waterfall to run down to the sea. I now know that while the children were playing in the channel, the gate was opened. That is why all the water rushed down the channel. I also heard that similar incidents have happened a number of times before. I don't know why the authorities responsible don't put up warning signs or sound a siren before the gate is opened," Mr Kriangkrai said.

Sen Sgt Maj Charin was stationed at Ron Phibun Police Station in Nakhon Sri Thammarat Province. He leaves a wife, Pratheep Chanthong and one surviving daughter.

Wife killer arrested

TRANG: Police have arrested the husband of a rubber tapper who was found stabbed to death in a plantation in Muang District on December 30. Police had to step in to rescue the man from a lynching by a group of around 20 villagers and civil defence volunteers.

The body of Phamon Duanghoi, 39, was found lying in a rubber plantation in Tambon Nam Phut at around 4:30 am. She

had been stabbed in the head and chest. Next to her body, police found a blood-stained knife and a pair of shoes which they believe belong to her husband, 42year-old Saroj Buakhiat.

Later that morning, Muang Trang Police Deputy Superintendent Thian Balathip led a search party including the local village chief, tambon chief and some 20 volunteers to Mr Saroj's house.

At the house, officers shouted for Mr Saroj to open the door. When he refused, they broke the door down. Mr Saroj came out of the house armed with a large knife and began lunging at the assembled crowd. Villagers and volunteers armed with knives and lengths of wood then set on Mr Saroj, beating and slicing him until police stepped in. Police took Mr Saroj to Trang Hospital, where he was treated for cuts to his head, face and hands.


After Mr Saroj was discharged from hospital, police took him to Muang Trang Police Station for questioning. The suspect admitted to killing his wife after she disobeyed his order not to go out rubber tapping in the plantation she owned, police said.

Mr Saroj told police that he had previously warned his wife that if she went out rubber tapping again, he would beat her to death. He reportedly claimed that he killed his wife with a length of wood, which he then burned. Due to the nature of the victim's injuries and the bloody knife found at the scene, police did not accept his version of events.

Mr Saroj did not seem worried by the murder charges brought against him and seemed pleased that his wife was dead, police noted.

Relatives of Mr Saroj told the police that he has a history of drug abuse and mental illness, for which he had been admitted to a psychiatric hospital three times.

He regularly beat his wife, who had moved out of their house and taken their two children to live at her sister's house in Nah Yong District. However, she would come and stay with Mr Saroj when she wanted to tap rubber, relatives said.






Oil exploration plan meets strong opposition

civic group of residents, business owners and environmentalists were up in arms at a public hearing in Koh Tao recently to oppose off-shore drilling that could threaten marine life and livelihoods around the holiday

The group of objectors displayed strong opposition to the plan by Soco Exploration Co Ltd to explore an area near the island for potential oil sources, voicing concern for the effects of oil exploration surveys on the environment and the welfare of the islanders.

The exploration company already has permission from the government to go ahead with plans to conduct surveys in the sea about 65 kilometers from Koh Tao, but only on the condition that the project is endorsed by the people who will be directly affected by it.

During the hearing, which was presided over by Somnuek Much-Chika of the Energy Department, attendees heard of the potential hazards to marine life

The company outlined its plans to compensate those whose livelihoods are directly affected by the displacement and destruction of fish stocks.

Diving establishments are also actively opposing the project and are highly concerned that the equipment used to conduct the surveys will not only destroy coral but will deter visitors who usually come to the island solely for diving.

At the end of the hearing, Soco Exploration agreed to conduct further analysis in order to prevent any damage, and to demonstrate how compensation measures are to be equated after surveys are complete.

Soco Exploration plans to begin conducting the surveys by February.

Drug shipment destined for Koh Phangan Full Moon Party seized at road block

SURAT THANI: Two men were arrested at a police roadblock in Chumphon province recently when police found them in possession of a large quantity of marijuana.

Police said that the two men, Phokin Untiamson, 33, and Saenguthaen Muangwong, 33, were caught with 199 kilograms of marijuana as they were transporting it to a man on Koh Phangan island, where it was intended to be distributed among Full Moon and New Year party revelers, who are mostly tourists.

Police said a roadblock had been set up intercept the traffickers after a tip off that a large quantity of drugs was being transported from Laos to Koh Phangan in Surat Thani.

After searching the suspects' car, police found the marijuana, which they estimate, has a street value of about 5 million baht.

Following their arrests, the two suspects admitted they had been hired to smuggle the drugs from Laos, taking the shipment along the Mekong River and through Thailand. They also told police that they were paid 50,000 for their part in transporting the drugs, which they admitted to having done several times before.

They also told police that the marijuana was scheduled to reach the island for the New Year celebrations, which draws the highest attendance of party goers for the year.

The men, both from Nakhon Phanom province, are being held in Surat Thani before formal charges are brought against them. Police are hoping that the arrests will lead to further sting operations to bring down dealers and leaders of the drug trafficking ring.

KOH SAMUI: A Belgian fugitive wanted in his homeland was tracked down and arrested by Thai police last Saturday following an alert from the Belgian Embassy that 35-yearold Pascal Quirynen had entered the country.

Quirynen had been on the run for more than a year after

gium where he had been sentenced to 25 years imprisonment for attempted murder. He was arrested at his home on Koh Samui after police received reports that the fugitive was living on the island.

According to Dutch news reports, the maximum penalty of 30 years had been sought for Quirynen after he shot a 43-yearold man in the head following a

Antwerp, Belgium in 2001. Although his victim survived the execution-style shooting, Belgian courts considered Quirynen "a danger to society, which must be protected from individuals who will shoot someone for the slightest reason".

Representatives from Thai Tourist Police said that Quirynen was sent back to Belgium where he will stand trial.

Daylight robbery at gold shop in busy mall

SURAT THANI: On December 16, police received reports of a robbery at a jewelry shop in downtown Surat Thani.

Police rushed to the Burapa Gold Shop on the ground floor of the town center's Tesco hypermarket to hear from the shop's staff that over a million baht-worth of gold had been stolen by a man who threatened them with a gun.

The Tesco hypermarket is

one of the province's largest and busiest shopping centers

Shopkeepers told police that a man behaving suspiciously had entered the shop and pointed a gun at them. The thief took 20 gold chains before fleeing on foot through the Lian Muang supermarket and into a wooded area near the Por Khun Thalay Road.

Witnesses told police that the man was dressed in black and

that he was wearing a hat with "police" written on the front. He was approximately 170 cm tall and had dark skin.

The robbery is the second of its kind on gold shops in the district, while several other retailers have also reported holdups.

Police are requesting people to come forward if they have any information on the gold shop

or a good many 16year-old boys, New Year's Eve would have entailed a frantic effort to gain unlawful entry to their local pub or nightclub in anticipation of ringing in the New Year with an illicit brew in one hand and a fake I.D in the other. Sixteen yearold Dutch youngster Bowy,on the other hand, no longer needs to be smuggled through security to get into his club of choice since he's usually there by special invitation. But then again, Bowy is not your average 16-year-old.

Only three years into his teens, Bowy is fast emerging as an internationally acclaimed DJ, having already made a name for himself back in his native Holland. While many of his tender age would be content with the mere promise of domestic celebrity, Bowy already has one eye fixed on rivalling world renowned Dutch spinners Armin van Buren and DJ Tiesto.

'Many people know of me in Holland, but I am hoping that my name will become more internationally recognized. When I come to Thailand and people see my name on a flyer they'll say, 'There's Bowy; lets go to that party.' Today I come here for the people, but in the future I hope people will come for me."

Such teenage dreams would ordinarily be dismissed as 'adolescent fantasy', but for someone who has already

Bowy began his quest to become a DJ at the tender age of 12, when he saw DJ Tiesto on the television in his home in Holland. "I saw Tiesto on TV, I heard his music, saw the audience going crazy. I went to my Dad and said, 'Poppa, I want to be a DJ."

Seeing the determination in their son, Bowy's parents bought techno/house hybrid style after observing fellow DJs in clubs around the country. Despite his evident maturity, Bowy still offers glimpses that he is a teenager. Full of youthful exuberance, his comments reveal a spirit that has yet to be dampened by age and his words still resonate with the innocence of youth.

"When you follow your heart, it's the most important thing there is. If you want to be a house DJ, follow your heart and I'm sure you'll be a house DJ," he proclaims.

When asked about his popularity with girls, he first appears shy to broach the subject, but quickly recovers and explains that although he understands that being a DJ is going to make you popular with the opposite sex, he is under no illusions, "It's nice to talk with girls. When you are a DJ some people see you as a God, but I'm just a human being,"

Bowy with other problems. In Holland, you have to be 18 years old to drive a car. For the time being he is chauffeured to gigs by his father.

His dad is often on hand to offer him advice about his tune selection and Bowy is mindful of the sacrifices his family makes saying, "It's hard for them because sometimes I have to play from four o'clock until seven in morning. I really appreciate what they do for me."

US Navy and Rotary Club team up for charity

he Rotary Club of Patong teamed up with some 35 United States Navy sailors for a two-in-one charity event on January 3 that saw the sailors give the walls of the Thalang National Museum a fresh coat of paint – and make some kids from the Home & Life project in Phang Nga very happy.

The day began with about 35 volunteer crew members from the *USS Milius* spending several hours painting walls and pillars at the museum. The sailors, a small contingent of the guided missile destroyer's 300 crew members, were on their last day of shore leave on their way out to active duty from their home port of San Diego.

Rotary Club Patong public relations manager Jeroen Deknatel explained that the navy visit by the sailors was part of the US Navy's ComRel program, where volunteers from the navy come out and do something good for the community.

Fellow Rotarian Jim Domville, one of about 10 Rotarians who made it to the event, said, "They are painting the national museum because the exterior of the building has fallen into disuse. They bring in the

paint, the equipment and the manpower and do everything themselves. They have also brought in several crates of food and gifts, and that's where the ComRel project meets the Home & Life project," he explained.

The Home & Life project, in Phang Nga's Thai Muang District, was set up by mechanical engineer Bhudit "Root" Manejak and his wife Rosa after the 2004 tsunami, he said.

"Root was a mechanical engineer in Bangkok, doing very well and leading a middle-class life. The tsunami came and he volunteered, coming down with his wife. They discovered there was a whole bunch of orphans who were too young to know where they came from. They came from Isarn, but nobody could locate their grandparents and their parents had disappeared in the tsunami. So from that grew a fantastic project that they succeeded in finding sponsors for at the time – because of the tsunami – but now the larder has run bare and we are trying to help them,"

"They have 23 kids in their care. They are not all tsunami orphans, although a large percentage are. They are also kids who were at risk for a variety of reasons who were up in the Khao

Lak area. Woody Leonhard is helping them with baking so they can make muffins and cupcakes and whatever, so they can sell them as an income source. They are making floating Chinese lanterns that they are selling in Phuket. Mr Root has been doing all of this without much outside assistance," he said, adding that the Rotary Club had only recently found out about their need for assistance.

For entertainment, the Patong Rotary service committee chairman Brad Kenny served as the master of ceremonies and introduced the Home & Life dancers, four young girls who have obviously spent a great deal of time practicing. They skillfully executed four dances, each in a different style and with matching outfits in traditional Thai designs.

After the show it was time for chow. Woody Leonhard, computer guru and president-elect of the Patong chapter, together with his wife Add, put on a great feed for all present, with Thai food and Western fare, including delicious chili dogs.

After lunch there was a small ceremony with the US Navy's DC-1 Trevor Williams officially presenting the gifts to Mr Root. Valued at thousands of US dollars, the supplies included

food and other provisions as well as some fantastic toys such as skateboards and roller blades for the kids.

After receiving the gifts, the kids piled into two pickups while the sailors boarded a big air-conditioned bus bound for their vessel, possibly contemplating what their orders would be when they shipped out the next day.

Need a post-Christmas Detox?

In recent years, Thailand has emerged as a major world center for cosmetic surgery and so called "medical tourism", as people increasingly appreciate the expertise and affordability that the Kingdom has to offer. The principle of colon hydrotherapy is that water entering the body removes the built-up faeces from the wall of the large intestine, which if left within the body will putrefy and produce toxins that attack the immune system. The process involves using an enema to propel water, often mixed with herbs, into the colon where, it breaks down any intestinal build-up, flushing it from the body, cleansing the system and preventing any toxins from spreading within the host.

A new treatment available from Phuket Detox, is a technique designed to remove fat cells from the body without invasive surgery. The procedure is known as "Carbonize Plus" which involves the injection of carbon dioxide into subcutaneous tissue through a minute needle, just 0.3mm in diameter. The carbon dioxide dissolves fat cells into a fluid and dilates the blood vessels. Wider blood vessels results in increased blood flow and more oxygen being transported around the body. The increased oxygen removes the built-up fatty fluid between the cells and it is removed from the body through the kidneys and urination.

In addition to cleansing and purification programs, Phuket Detox offers a comprehensive range of health and beautification treatments, including face masks, freckle removal, face massage and Botox treatments. 

Yacht share venture drops anchor off Phuket

uying a yacht is probably not something that figures too prominently on your list of New Year's resolutions. Costing around 1.2 million baht a month to maintain, plus around five million baht a year for a half decent crew, not to mention fees for berthing and the various licenses required, it is no surprise that yacht ownership remains the preserve of the truly opulent.

Or does it? Jens Reichert, the vice president of Dubai-based IFA Leisure would beg to differ. Mr Reichert recently weighed anchor in Phuket to introduce the IFA Yacht Ownership Club and talk about his brand of 'fractional ownership'.

The *Phuket Gazette* sent along land-lubbing reporter Tipwarintron Tanaakarachod to quiz Mr Reichert about the high life on the high seas and why owning one's own yacht is just not the done thing these days.

IFA Hotels and Resorts has been around for about six years and has become one of the leading developers in the Middle East, attaining prominence for audacious projects such as the Palm Jumeirah, an artificial island created through land reclamation in the Persian Gulf. IFA's yacht business was established around three years ago with a view to complementing its existing range of high-end hotel products, which includes the Fairmont and Four Seasons Hotels. The Yacht Ownership Club's philosophy can be summed up by its slogan "Living a la Carte". "What better luxury choice than staying in our hotels and using our yachts," says Mr Reichert.

Back in Phuket, Mr Reichert sets about his task. "The first thing to understand," he ex-






plains, "is that the Yacht Ownership Club is not a charter business. You cannot just show up and rent a yacht for a day or two. You have to buy membership. In this way, the business operates along the lines of fractional ownership."

The rules of the game are pretty simple. There are three levels or 'tiers' of membership: Silver, Gold and Platinum. When you subscribe you are accorded 'credits': 20, 40 and 80 for Silver, Gold and Platinum respectively. You can then exchange these credits for use of any one of the company's yachts, anywhere in the world. With 80 credits, costing in the region of 110,000 euros, you get to spend around four weeks on one of the company's

luxury yachts. Those taking out the top-level Platinum membership are further guaranteed the 'jewel in the crown' slot of a week in Cannes between the end of July through September.

The cost of chartering a yacht in Cannes, at around 50,000 euros, makes the cost efficiency of club membership self-evident, says Mr Reichert. "You don't have to buy a boat, there are no maintenance costs, no staffing costs, no mooring costs, and none of the risks associated with having a boat." In a nutshell, argues Mr Reichert, membership offers the benefits of owning your own boat without the stress of actual ownership and at a tiny fraction of the cost.





Another advantage is one of choice. Let's say, for example, that you own a yacht in Phuket. Having shelled out all that cash to buy it, register it, moor it, maintain it, staff it and fuel it, you can cruise around the Andaman sea and, if it's large enough, other places of interest around the wider region. But what if you fancied a foray to the Bahamas, or perhaps the South of France? Only the biggest yachts are able to relocate such distances, and even then at huge expense, guzzling, as they do, between 500-600 dollars per hour in gasoline alone. Membership of the Yacht Ownership Club, on the other hand, allows you to indulge your

any part of the world you choose, says Mr Reichert.

Fractional ownership is not an entirely new concept in the world of big boats. Indeed, there are already two such operations here in Phuket. But, as Mr Reichert is at pains to point out, the difference between these and IFA's Yacht Ownership Club is in the number of boats available for use by its members; the local clubs have only one vessel at their disposal, while IFA has four boats located around the world for its members' use. IFA is continuing to add boats to its portfolio. In addition to the boat now available in Phuket, Mr Reichert says that IFA is planning to add a large sail-








based in the Caribbean.

Clients of services such as those offered by IFA can be notoriously demanding. "Our members are considered as part-owners. We don't treat them like normal charter customers," explained Mr Reichert. "They demand much higher service levels. This is why we like to stress our levels of service, as well as our uncompromising commitment to maintenance and safety issues," he added.

Asked why IFA had chosen Phuket as the newest addition to its global portfolio of yacht locations, Mr Reichert explained that the company had asked its current membership where they would most like to go. With the South of France, Spain, the Middle East and the Bahamas already offered, it was South East Asia that was cited as the destination of choice. Thailand's friendly people, its excellent waters and beautiful scenery made it a natural choice, he said. Also the favorable weather conditions in the region made good business sense. In the Caribbean, it is only possible to operate for about four to five months a year, whereas Phuket's strategic location allows the company to operate nearly all year round, providing greater availability for its membership. Underlining Phuket's status as an emerging yachting hub, Mr Reichert added, "There is currently a lot of talk in the yachting industry about Phuket. A lot of our members consider Phuket a prime location," he said.

While IFA is not specifically looking at Phuket to recruit new members, Mr Reichert does expect to pick up around 10 or so. As the current global economic crisis sees a good many yacht owners looking to offload their assets, Mr Reichert sees opportunities for his business. "That's a lot of people who used to own their own boat," he remarks. "For these people, we are a great opportunity". To offer such potential customers a sample of the Yacht Club Ownership experience, IFA has devised what it calls an "Emerald Membership", which allows a prospective customer, for a fee, a once-only chance to spend a week aboard one of the company's yachts.

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Volvo powers ahead with flexifuel cars



olvo offers two ethanol-gasoline models in Thailand: the locally produced S80 2.5 and the compact C30. At a recent ceremony held at the Bangkok Racing Circuit, Volvo Car Thailand unveiled the Volvo C30 1.8F and the Volvo S80 2.5FT. The Minister of Energy, Dr. Wannarat Charnnukul, and the CEOs of PTT, BCP, Mitr Phol, Petro Green and the Ethanol Producers Association were amongst the many VIP guests in attendance.

The event marked an important step in Thailand's development towards a more secure energy future, through the promotion and use of less polluting and more importantly, renewable biofuels made from home-grown agricultural produce.

Embraced by the Thai people, businesses and the government, renewable local bio-fuels will save more money for motorists, says Volvo. It will also reduce the Kingdom's dependency on foreign oil imports, which last year accounted for some 9 percent of GDP.

The C30 1.8F will unquestionably become a best-seller for Volvo Thailand. Powered by a 1.8 liter in-line four engine, running on E85 'flexifuel', the C30 produces a healthy 125 bhp (92 kW) with a torque output of 165 Nm. The 0-100 km/h sprint time is a respectable 10.8 seconds with a top speed of 200 km/h.

Paul Stokes, President of Volvo Car Thailand, said "For Volvo, the environment has been a core value of our brand for decades and so we have, from the very beginning, fully supported the efforts of the Thai government, and particularly the Ministry of Energy, in advancing renewable bio-fuels with the aim of promoting energy security for Thailand.

"Volvo announces yet another milestone in this journey, as we will be the first car company to produce E85-compatible flexifuel cars locally here in Thailand," he added.

Dr. Wannarat Charnnukul, Minister of Energy, commented, "The government holds a central policy to promote the use of alternative energy, no matter what changes occur with the price of oil. The higher mixture of ethanol in gasoline would reduce the country's reliance on crude oil imports and cut the cost of living. It would also strengthen the country's long-term energy security and economy."

The S80 is the second generation of Volvo's large prestige sedan, brimming with world-class safety features. The 2009 S80 is no exception, adding Volvo's Blindspot Information System (BLIS), Lane Departure Warning (LDW) and driver alert technology to the locally made versions. And now the bio-ethanol 2.5 FT flexifuel engine has been added to the line-up.

A 'bio-fuel' is essentially any fuel which has been produced from organic materials, or biomass. Unlike fossil fuels, which are produced from decaying and compressed organic materials dating back millions of years, the bio-fuels of today are made from plants, including crops, organic waste or animal waste. Examples include biodiesel, derived from palm oil and methane (natural gas), which comes from manure.

In some Western countries there has been a backlash of public opinion against bio-fuels, as it has been noted that some farmers have switched from growing crops for food to producing crops for fuel production. This has raised questions as to whether the use of bio-fuels can offer a long term alternative to fossil fuels. In







countries such as Brazil and Thailand, the crops which are at the center of the current debate are either not used in bio-fuel production (corn or maize), or are already produced in a sufficient surplus, providing more enough for domestic food consumption.

"It really is time for the critics of the E85 project to open their eyes and see that this is, right

now, the correct choice for Thailand. With fuel stations being opened by both PTT and Bangchak, and with both large and small imported and locally produced cars available, businesses and consumers can make the intelligent and responsible choice for both the environment and the Kingdom," added Volvo's Paul Stokes.



Corporate bonds - A cautious route to wealth

ith the markets currently in such turmoil, a good vehicle for investment now is corporate bonds.

So, what is a corporate bond? With companies frequently needing to borrow money, two of the primary sources of capital are equity, through the issuing of shares, and bonds, which are fixed interest borrowings.

Corporate bonds are typically of 5–10 years' duration and normally guarantee the payment of interest relative to the ruling rate of interest applicable to the time frame involved. One other major factor which impacts on the interest rate payable is the credit rating of the borrowing company.

credit rating will be required to pay a significantly higher rate of interest than a company that has a top flight credit rating.

Credit ratings are set by independent credit-rating assessment companies such as Standard & Poors and Moody's. Cynical readers will no doubt point out that in many cases over recent years, banks issued dubious "commercial paper" with high-quality credit ratings. These readers are indeed correct; abuses of the system did take place. However, these instances have served to make the creditrating agencies even more mindful of their fiduciary responsibilities. Other major parties that use bonds to raise funds are governments, and these bonds can be up to 50 years in duration, although two, five and 10 years are more common.

Most bonds, be they government or corporate, are seldom held to maturity; they can and are frequently traded during their lifetime. The capital value on maturity is always known in advance and if, for any reason, the issuer is unable to repay the capital the bond is deemed as being in de-

A company with a mediocre fault. Bond markets are subject to all the emotional fluctuations of other markets (currencies, stockmarkets, commodities, etc).

The reason in favor of investing in corporate bond funds is down to the general behaviour of credit markets over the last 18 months. When panic set into credit markets, investors rushed towards what they perceived as total safety, namely government bonds – especially those of governments that were regarded as being ultra safe.

The US Government is traditionally looked upon as being the safest place to "hide".

For most of 2008 corporate bonds were considered out of fashion; markets, when in panic mode, often become totally illogical. Yields on corporate bonds soared just as prices of the same bonds slumped.

When markets move to extremes it is often, after research, that the best bargains are to be found. These bonds offer investors high yields combined with the potential for significant capital gains. It is not a strategy for a long period of time, more a medium-term investment.

It is wise to want to invest in a corporate bond fund rather than trying to purchase the bonds of one or a small number of companies. Any reasonably competent bond fund manager knows when one or more of the holdings in a bond portfolio is coming under stress - normally subject to a credit downgrade - which will impact on the value of the relranging research and diversification. These are ideal investments for income purposes.

There are ramifications that must be fully understood to make use of the proposed strategy. A large number of offshore funds is deemed to be suitable only for professional and/or experienced investors. Simply by me or my company having a contract with a group in this category does not magically mean that any client of mine becomes an experienced or professional investor. There is a simple solution, which is to use "wrappers" or "platforms" which are issued by a wide variety of offshore insurance companies.

This is not an expensive process; there are no upfront charges levied by an insurance company. Insurance companies have contracts with virtually every fund manager and in addition, negotiate very substantial discounts on entry costs to funds. In many cases this results in no entry costs at all. This is often called a "no load" fund. Unfortunately, people often have a habit of searching for funds that are "no load" and performance becomes secondary. The insurance company approach means that nearly every fund becomes "no load" or a miniscule load.

Insurance companies also offer entry into funds that normally will not deal with the public or require very substantial entry amounts. The world, post 9/11, requires that each fund manager should be satisfied regarding proof of an investor's source of

vidual investors to negotiate these areas. In addition, all fund managers accept that insurance companies are both professional and/ or experienced investors, which opens up so many more opportunities for individual investors. The most an insurance company will ask for is a signed form for their own compliance purposes.

Most areas of investment in corporate bonds, high yield bonds or any combination, including equities, hedge funds and commodities, are subject to change. Therefore, investors need to be able to switch their investment strategies from time to time.

With compliance issues being a factor when investors change strategies, it is much more convenient to have a "wrapper" where the choices run, literally, into thousands. The alternative is to stick with the previous company.

In reality, it is extremely unlikely that any one company, regardless of size, is the best in every area. A wrapper gives investors the ability, at little or no cost, and the flexibility to move and change portfolio composition and strategy without facing compliance issues and delays.

In addition, in the event of death, it is simple to deal with. The alternatives for beneficiaries can be an additional nightmare with substantial expense.

It simply makes life so much easier.

When colleagues in the press room discover that I lived in Thailand for 30 years, they invariably ask, "Do you speak Thai?" To which I respond, "I learned Thai the hard way. I married one. Then I had four kids who reinforced the lesson."

Carleton Cole learned Thai the hard way too, working as the first foreign busboy in a Thai restaurant in St Louis, Missouri.

He would go on to live in

Thailand, marry a Thai, land a job English as a Foreign Language at The Nation newspaper and roam around 10 countries in Asia writing travel stories.

Destination Asia (Bangkok Books, Bangkok, 2008) is his first

I was Cole's colleague at The Nation, even sharing a desk for some time.

I read his book in manuscript form and contributed this blurb, "[The author] romps through Thailand, Cambodia, India, Ladakh, Sikkim, Nepal, Japan, South Korea, Brunei and Laos. This reader happily traipsed along. Cole's sharp eye and gentle humour make for travel writing at its

I've read a lot of Asian travel books, but Cole's has a unique feature: he tells you from childhood how he developed his fascination with Asia.

He used to hang out with two Indian brothers who gave him his first taste of Asia through its food, art and music.

As a high school student, he took vacations by train through China and Russia.

He collected a Teaching

(TEFL) degree in San Francisco and then took a temporary job as an English teacher in Bangkok. At this point, he had read everything he could about Thailand.

"More than anything I could have done to have found Thailand, it seemed that the country had found me," he writes. "Somewhere along the line, Thailand simply struck me as the most intriguing and most practical option for indefinitely enjoying a taste of classical Asia, while still featuring an air of mystery, and offering modernity too."

He got his first passport in 1995. "Little did I know that a decade later, the pages in my passport would be filled with the standards of Thai bureaucracy: non-immigrant visas, police reports on the passport holder's address as registered with the police, and re-entry stamps, which I used in travelling to a dozen or so countries, as well as the colourful entrance stamps and visas for several countries."

Through his reading about and working with Thai people Cole felt, "I had come to feel at


ease with the hat trick of mai pen rai (never mind), jai yen (cool heart), and kwam sanuk (fun)."

In Bangkok, he had fun right from the start. Formerly a teetotaler, he relaxed with beer and gin and tonics with his fellow teachers after class.

His rich students were attracted to him and soon he was patrolling around the streets in their BMWs. Here he met his future wife Sutamon "Mai" Lertmanorat.

"We shared an Asian-style outlook on accepting things that can't be changed, and rejoicing in our time together, appreciating each moment to the fullest," he writes. "At all times, she had a Buddhist air about her, respect for the religion and philosophy instilled in her at a young age. As in the case with many Asians, she put her family first when making important decisions in life. She did not take her frustrations out on others, and instead soldiered on as best she could. For this, I greatly admired her."

Their romance survived a two-year absence at graduate school back in the US and Mai



would prove to be an ideal companion in his travels around Asia.

After publishing three stories about Cambodian culture in The Nation, Cole was offered a job in 2000.

The last sixty pages form the meat of the book, namely, his travels through Asia.

Cole takes a long time to reach this point with some aimless meandering and the occasional clumsy turn of phrase, but overall, his love for Asia shines through and you're happy to take the journey with him.


Mali replies:

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Phuket could do more for wheelchair users

The Thai Constitution clearly stipulates that the state shall ensure a good quality of life for people with disabilities and work to improve their ability to live independently.

To this end, a comprehensive set of regulations require that government and private buildings such as stadiums, convention centers, department stores and hotels be accessible to people with disabilities. These form a fine regulatory framework, but it is questionable to what extent these measures are implemented in reality.

Sidewalks in many areas of Phuket are a hotchpotch of uneven surfaces, high curbs and open manholes, with obstacles such as signs and utility poles blocking the way. These are an annoyance for the able-bodied, but for wheelchair users it means Phuket sidewalks are mostly unnavigable. With no alternative, many users are forced to try their luck on the open road, the dangers of which are well known.

Furthermore, there are no buses with wheelchair-access and very few accessible public toilets. Many government buildings make little provision for wheelchair access and when they do, they do so half-heartedly, providing ramps that are too steep or lacking handrails. This is to say nothing of the countless small stores that bar wheelchair access with steps or narrow doorways.

Residents are not the only people affected. Phuket's tourism industry is crucial to its prosperity, and in these difficult economic times the island needs every visitor it can get. But while there are many disabled tourists visiting the island each year and enjoying their stay every bit as much as the average visitor, many are doubtless put off by the reputation of Thailand's streets and lack of accessible facilities.

All of this is not to suggest that Thais have no compassion for people with disabilities. Disabled travelers generally report the attitude and help they receive from their Thai hosts in glowing terms. Still, the fact that residents are so willing to help disabled tourists overcome the challenging environment in Phuket is not a reason to retain the status quo.

Part of the blame for the situation rests with Thai law: although the regulations clearly state what is required, few provisions are made for enforcement of the rules. Public officials and developers who are ignorant of the regulations remain so; those who are not know that there will be no penalties if they ignore them.

These problems cannot be solved overnight, and gradual progress is being made. But the Gazette would welcome signs that the authorities on the island are taking these issues seriously.

Planning for the year ahead



Governor's

Letter

While many took holidays or returned to their home towns over the New Year break, Phuket Governor Preecha Ruangjan remained in Phuket to oversee the province during what is usually the island's peak tourist season. Despite the tourism industry coming under pressure

from the impact of a string of national and international crises, Governor Preecha is upbeat about the future of Phuket as a popular tourist destination. In this week's Governor's Letter – the first of the New Year – Govenor Preecha looks back at how Phuket coped with the issues faced in 2008 and outlines some of his plans to shape the province in 2009.

Ithough Phuket tourism last year didn't reach the peak recorded in 2007, Phuket managed to pull through satisfactorily despite the impacts of the flagging world economy and Thailand's ongoing political crises. Phuket was listed as the Number 1 province for tourism compared to other popular tourist destinations around Thailand, such as Chiang Mai, Chonburi, Petchburi, Hua Hin and Koh Samui.

Economic and political crises don't have such a huge impact on tourism, but tourism immediately suffers whenever there are issues of public security. People simply stop coming if they don't feel safe, whereas a destination experiencing an economic slowdown is a plus in the eyes of its foreign visitors.

Every country is affected by its own crises, but what matters in regaining the trust and confidence of visitors is how quickly and efficiently the issues can be dealt with and cleared up.

During the festive season at the end of 2008 and leading into 2009, there were campaigns to reduce accidents and deaths on the roads, which helped improve that aspect of public safety. With a new government in place, the outlook for the future of Phuket is good. As long as the political situation remains stable for the next three to six months, I am confident that the province and central government will be able to work well together toward mutually beneficial goals.

Working together, we can gradually raise the province's status. Improvements won't be immediate but we will tackle issues on a step-by-step basis.

It's a good sign that most Phuket-based businesses have not had to downsize or lay off any employees recently. Some smaller business may be suffering temporarily, but overall it looks as if business will continue relatively unhindered in the new year.

Weekly tourist arrivals went up considerably during the Christmas and New Year period. Based on those figures, it would seem that—if all goes well—tourist numbers in 2009 will at least be an improvement on those of 2008.

Phuket will be offering more international facilities and activities in the coming year. Plans for 2009 include promoting Phuket as a world-class diving destination and the expansion of sports facilities in the province.

Divers from around the world will be convening here in May to firmly establish Phuket as a favored destination with the global diving community. Divers are generally wealthy so they represent a good source of income for Phuket.

Phuket is also in a position to host sports such as beach volleyball, which went very well last year, so we need to bring more international beach and water sports events to the province.

We also continue to promote Phuket as a tourist destination that is rich in history and culture. To this end, the Tin Mining Museum is nearing completion now and will give visitors a better understanding of the island's past and how tin mining initially brought wealth to the province. Surprisingly, Phuket also has a well-established farming industry, including harvesting rice crops, which is also being made more accessible for tourists to experience hands-on.

Other grass roots experiences for tourists to be promoted include traditional lifestyles on and near the water, such as fishing and ecological tours of the mangrove forests. Basically, tourists will be offered a greater choice of adventurous activities that will give

them more intimate and memorable experiences and will help to establish more repeat tourism.

In collaboration with the Airport Authority of Thailand (AOT), there are plans to increase the number of direct flights to Phuket. The first flight of XLAirways, France's direct shuttle service from Paris, touched down at Phuket International Airport on December 22. It was carrying 367 passengers. We aim to encourage more direct flights from European and Australian cities in the near future.

Summing up, it's important to be positive when faced with crises and to view them as opportunities that can be turned to our advantage, rather than letting them get you down. The year ahead is a good opportunity to start afresh and build on the good things we already have.

Teamwork among departments is key to achieving these goals, with each department being responsible for specific areas that when combined effectively bring about positive development. The Tourism Authority (TAT) is out there targeting specific markets with promotions of the various activities on offer in Phuket, and the Ministry of Sports & Tourism is playing its part in es-

tablishing more sporting events and facilities on the island.

To establish Phuket as a diving province we are working on a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Thai Diving Association (TDA) and Confédération Mondiale des Activités Subaquatiques (CMAS), otherwise known as the World Underwater Federation.

I will also focus on each locality in turn with the aim of helping each to establish their own direction vis-a-vis tourism, and I hope the island's resorts will continue to play their vital roles in supporting these efforts with event sponsorship, promotions and discounts. Resorts in Kata were heavily involved in organizing the Beach Volleyball last year and I am happy to discuss other similar projects proposed by the island's hotels and resorts.

In parting, I'd like to wish *Gazette* readers a happy and prosperous New Year, and to join me in considering the real meaning of happiness, which comes from the heart and is achieved by knowing one's limitations. If we all strive for happiness derived from living within our means, then collectively we can look forward to a successful new year.

Please explain the mystery of the fuel grades here in Thailand and tell me what I can safely use without damaging either the engine or the warranty.

Jeff Heselwood, motoring columnist of the Phuket Gazette replies:

Dear Graham, Most late model cars, like your 2007 Yaris, will run happily on 91 octane or gasohol. Gasohol contains around 15% ethanol or a similar compound.

Performance will not be enhanced by running 95 octane, so save your baht and run on 91 or, if it is available where you are, gasohol.

I cannot give a definitive answer regarding the Yamaha as I do not know enough about bikes, but my instinct is that it is probably not E15-capable (gasohol) as it is a relatively unsophisticated design, i.e. not particularly modern. I would stick to 91 octane.

Why such a high customs fee?

recently went to Singapore to have a family ring repaired as it couldn't be fixed here in Thailand. Following the repair, the ring was sent back to me in Thailand by Federal Express courier.

I subsequently received a call from Customs, who demanded a 15,000 baht customs fee. Why would I have to pay 500 dollars for my own ring, which is thirty years old, having paid for repair and freight costs from Singapore? Who's pocket is this going in? Just one more thing to annoy expats in Thailand.

Khun Phinij Kijjaroenkha, Inspector at Thai Customs Replies:

In this case, Thai Customs deemed it to be an imported ring from Singapore. This occurred because you did not notify Customs that you were taking the ring out of Thailand to have it repaired. If you had registered your ring with Customs upon leaving, when you had your ring sent back to Thailand our inspection staff would have have known not to charge any tax. Rings and accessories are taxable at a rate of 20% of the price of the item (including VAT).

Our suggestion is that the next time you want to take something out for such a purpose, you should register it at the airport or with Thai Customs. They will then take a photograph of your product and forward the registration to the Thai Customs system.



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Buying a new computer have very reliable hardware, but problems do occur and having a local service center can be a major help.

re you considering buying a computer? If so, it's worth giving the purchase a good deal of thought beforehand as this can save you a lot of money – as well as much regret later. Most people overbuy, choosing a computer system with more features than they require, while at the same time not getting what they need for a good computing experience.

Define your needs

What will you use the system for? Will it be for home or office use, where a desktop system is most useful? Or will it be for travel, requiring a portable? Be aware that while a powerful laptop may seem the best "one size fits all" solution, there may be options that better satisfy your individual needs.

Most home computer jobs require very little computing power. Common tasks such as writing a note or word processing document, working with spreadsheets, sending email and accessing the internet (including Skype-based telephone calls) require only a fraction of the power of just about any modern com-

Watching a DVD will use more, but still not very much. On the other hand, video editing and authoring will use all the processing power available, and 3D gaming requires serious computer power and a very capable graphics processor (GPU), features not provided by mainstream systems on display at local vendors.

So, think about what you plan to use your system for and what software you will need. With this list in hand, you're ready to go shopping.

What to buy?

The decision is a branching process. The first question is: desktop or laptop? Laptops are an allin-one solution and they are portable, although some of them stretch the limits of portability. Desktop computers win on just about all other counts, notably cost, selection of components, comfort during extended use, and service/upgrading.

Sitting in a comfortable position with a sturdy keyboard and a large, high-resolution screen makes it easy to focus on the work at hand – I am typing this on a portable on a rocking boat heading for Singapore, wishing I was sitting in front of my desktop. You may well need a portable, either as your primary computer or as a travel unit. How much are you going to use your system?

The amount of usage for a typical "road warrior" business traveler is still very much the same as for the average home user. Weight and bulk should also be a major consideration. For a



low-cost, lightweight solution, the new "netbooks" are the obvious choice: good keyboard, 10-inch screen, wireless access and Bluetooth – what's not to like? They don't include CD/DVD read/write devices but will play good quality audio and even movies if they are stored as video files on the internal drive or a USB

Some travelers will need a larger laptop, particularly if their work requires visual presentation of a slide show or video demo. Laptops with screens up to 17 inches in size are readily available. These are very effective in booth and hotel room presentations, obviating the earlier alternative of searching for a local TV set to attach to the laptop to serve as a monitor.

This external monitor approach is unreliable and resulted in unconvincing pitches for many a traveling salesperson. A largescreen laptop can be bulky but will be effective and reliable.

What software to use?

Just about every computer sold will come with a "free" package of software. The operating system (OS) is the foundation, and will most likely be Microsoft's Windows (good old WinXP, the dreaded Vista, or the upcoming - any day now, for sure - Win 7), Apple's highly-touted OSX (currently Leopard version, with Snow Leopard lurking in the wings), or the very capable Linux (Ubuntu, Red Hat, as well as many other flavors).

Set aside quasi-religious discussions about which OS is best; let's accept they will all do the job – just about any job – for almost every user. Windows costs about US\$130-200 for retail versions (the computer maker pays maybe one-third of retail price). Apple OSX is about US\$130 with upgrades (typically annual and semi-mandatory) at the same price. Linux OS, on the other



hand, is free and you can spend the savings on extra toys.

Application software (apps) is needed for non-trivial computing tasks. Some apps are free, while others come at a very high price. The "free" apps preloaded on the computer are there

- 1. They are truly free and useful (not many fall into this cat-
- 2. They are limited-time promotions there in the hope that you will pay for extended versions
- 3. The apps maker paid the computer maker to include them
- 4. Few (none?) of the free apps included with Windows computer systems are worth keeping. Some are outright nuisances, others just useless space-wasters. The following is a list of the apps you're going to need (with some truly free options):
- 1. Security software: firewall, antivirus (AV) and antimalware software. Windows Defender (by MS) is a good firewall; Avira is recommended for AV; Comodo for anti-malware
- 2. Internet browser: Firefox is highly recommended
- 3. Email client: try one of the web-based versions (Gmail, Yahoo, etc); Thunderbird (from the makers of Firefox) is highly recommended

- 4. Audio/visual: Windows Media Player is excellent, but needs some additional codecs to play some video formats, eg. AVI. An internet search will find many good codec packages
- 5. Office apps: MS Office jumps to mind, but so does the price (US\$200-500). Don't get the "unofficial" black-hat versions, but do try Open Office v.3, supported by Sun and thousands of geeks. Totally compatible with the MS product and free
- 6. Graphics: Adobe's Photo shop is well known and very pricey. Try the free alternative: **GIMP**
- 7. Note that Open Office, Firefox and many others are available in Apple and Linux versions. Avoid pirate versions of proprietary software – aside from the legal and ethical implications they're more trouble than they're

Viruses and other malware are common issues and the installed versions cannot be registered and updated with the maker's improvements and bugfixes. Your data is the most valuable thing on the computer and keeping it protected will simply make your life easier.

Where to buy? It is advisable to buy your computer at a store near your home. A USA or European warranty may be of little use in Thailand.

The first week of use is the most critical – weak components will fail very quickly. You may well have opted for a custom build by a local shop, which often provides better support than a major company with a service center in Bangkok.

Be aware of local practices different from those in your home country. Getting your money back for a defective product is very, very difficult; an exchange for same or similar product will generally have to do. For special orders, cost-free changes will be very difficult. Keep the receipt and be sure the warranty is dated and stamped by the shop.

I have found that PowerBuy (several branches in Phuket) and IT City offer good choice, price and service. The price of almost any electronic item will be the same across Thailand, and if you saw a system in a shop in Bangkok you will most likely be able to get it in Phuket, on special order if needs be. You may have to pay shipment costs, which are rarely more than 100 baht for computer items sent by overnight delivery.

Informed buyer

Consider your own computer usage, and buy on that basis, not what the salesman is pushing. Use good free software for your applications and computer security. Buy near to where you live and keep the receipts. Smile while buying, this is Thailand.

cuba diving is one of the main reasons why many tourists visit Thailand, and with Phuket being one of the gateways to the world famous Similan Islands, many people head to the island in search of topclass diving. Hot spots Patong and Chalong host a huge number of dive shops, while many of the smaller, less dive-oriented resorts have schools that offer instruction and dive guiding in a wide variety of languages. The options available to novice and experienced divers alike are abundant and can be sampled through day trips, liveaboards, recreational diving education or technical diving. Over the coming weeks in "Beneath the Waves" we will explore some of the pleasures and practicalities of the wonderful underwater world of scuba diving.

Learning to dive still ranks as one of the best decisions I ever made. As a boy, I often dreamed of being able to breathe underwater; taking my open water diving course offered me the opportunity to fulfill that childhood desire. Descending into an alien iridescent world, inhabited by an array of weird and wonderful species and historic wrecks is a supremely exhilarating experience that little else can rival. The feeling of weightlessness and freedom is one that only an astronaut could know. My first experiences were so captivating and inspiring I felt compelled to go further, becoming a qualified instructor to help share my experiences with others.

Learning to dive can be a nerve-wracking experience. The concept of breathing underwater

is totally foreign to the brain as we consciously place ourselves in an environment that we don't belong to. Yet, despite this, it is, in fact, a relatively simple thing

When starting out, there are a number of factors that one should consider before taking the plunge.

The first consideration is which dive organization to learn with. The Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI) is the most well known of all certifying agencies and often the one that people feel most comfortable with. I've spoken to many potential students about other organizations only to be told, "I want to do my PADI." Or, "I've heard that certain countries will only accept PADI certifications, so that's the one I want to do."

The latter, of course, is false; any certifying organization

recognized by the Recreational Scuba Training Council (RSTC) is acceptable worldwide. However, people often feel reassured with what is familiar and this is one reason why PADI continues to be so successful. There are, however, a number of other organizations to choose from, including, Scuba Schools International (SSI) and the Confederation Mondiale des Activites Subaquatique (CMAS), to name but two. The two most frequently chosen around the world are PADI and SSI and realistically there are only a few subtle differences between their entry level courses. All agencies ensure thorough training before certification. Research each agency and choose the one you feel comfortable with.

Next up, you need to choose a dive school to train with. This is where things can become a bit tricky, as there are so many outfits to choose from. Both PADI and SSI have schools that proudly advertise their 'Five Star' center or 'Platinum' facilities. These should not concern a nov-


ice diver as they relate to the professional training sections of the school. A new diver can receive as good if not better training from a school that doesn't offer instructor courses as one that does; much depends on the individual instructor.

When choosing a shop, appearance counts for a lot. If the shop is well presented with smart, attentive and enthusiastic staff, chances are they will be as professional under the water as they are above it. Ideally, it is best to learn with an instructor-to-student ratio of 1:1. However, since this is often not possible, aim for no more than four students to one instructor and ask if your instructor will have a certified assistant present; the added presence of another professional can only be reassuring to a new diver.

Ask to see the equipment you will use on your course. As with shop and staff appearance, good equipment is a reassurance. Equipment that looks well maintained and well looked after is another sign that the school is being run professionally.

Individual anxieties are often the final troublesome areas. Beginner divers often have problems regarding a host of issues. Common points of concern revolve around fears and phobias, physical concerns or peer pressure. A simple way to confront these issues is to speak to your instructor and tell them what is troubling you. You will often discover that your instructor has taught many people who had similar worries or, in a number of cases, suffered the same anxieties in the past that you do now. Your instructor should be approachable, friendly and understanding. If they are sympathetic to your plight, you know you're in safe hands.

Armed with some useful insights into entry level diving, you can make an informed decision regarding which organization to train under, which school to take your course with and should you have any doubts, who to ask for help. Remember, it's normal to feel nervous before learning to dive; just don't let it stop you from taking that first step.





Phuket to see its first-ever Fly-in

he current state of the world economy notwithstanding, Phuket continues to develop facilities and amenities to rival those of just about any other major tourist destination in the world. This month, flying enthusiasts and those who just like to watch can celebrate the opening of the island's new airport for private planes, a 500 meter grass strip at Phuket Airpark in Pa Khlok.

The event will be marked by a three-day Fly-in that is expected to generate a great deal of interest as it's the first such event ever to be staged here. Friday, January 16, will see the arrival of about a dozen single-engine aircraft from Thailand, Singapore and the Philippines.

On Saturday, when the public is more than welcome to attend and there is no admission charge, the schedule is chock full of events. The day starts at 0830 with a Muslim blessing ceremony followed by a breakfast of goat curry with nan. At 1000 there will be a Buddhist ceremony, and then comes a real treat for local kids: a brief flight in a microlight – free of charge!

In the afternoon, there will be live music and a series of exciting aerial games. The first of these will be a 'spot landing contest' in which each participating pilot makes three landings aimed at the runway number, with the overall score determined by the accuracy of each attempt.

But the organizers have

saved the best for last. In the finalé, each pilot carries a passenger armed with a small bag of bakery flour. They pass low over the airstrip, whereupon the passenger aims and releases the 'flour bomb' on a trajectory for a well defined target. That target will be none other than local real estate practitioner and Airpark promoter Wayne 'Red' Graham in the flesh! The queue for wannabe (passenger) bombers is expected to be long.

Saturday ends with a BBQ dinner that may or may not offer, additionally, Roast Red Graham.

In the words of the airport's prime mover, Robert Suchard, an owner of multiple aircraft, "Flying is *sanook* [fun], and we hope that this event will prove it to the Phuket public at large, particularly to those who may never have attended a Fly-in before."

Sunday is slated to be an open day for anyone who might like to simply stop in, chat with the pilots, including the legendary Tom Claytor, and generally get acquainted with Phuket's latest and most welcome amenity.

To get to the Fly-in, simply drive to the Heroines Monument, take highway 4027 east (toward Cape Yamu) for 6.3 kilometers, and turn right into the airport.

The event is organized by Phuket Airpark and sponsored by the *Phuket Gazette*.
