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Ban on cement trucks extended after accident

KATA: Following the January 12 protest in Kata Center that left traffic paralyzed for several hours, Chalong Police Superintendent Chinarat Rittakananon held talks with tourist business representatives Tuesday morning and agreed to extend by two hours the time cement trucks are prohibited from local roads.

The protest followed an accident on January 11, when a cement truck, allegedly speeding through the busy Kata Yai - Kata Noi intersection, collided with a parked van and motorcycle, injuring two people.

Previous regulations stipulated that large trucks should not be on the road from 7am to 9am and from 4pm to 7pm. Now the ban will be extended from 4pm to 9pm during the high season, which ends in April.

Big trucks are already prohibited from using Thaina Rd, even during the low season, because the steep incline there increases the likelihood of traffic accidents due to brake failure, Lt Col Chinarat said.

Karon Mayor Thawee Thongchaem said, "From now on there will be police surveillance of the intersection. We are also planning to set up a police box there shortly and erect four large signs warning people about the trucks' operating hours."

Chalong Police Investigator Boonlert Onklang said Chalong Concrete, which owns the cement truck, has agreed pay compensation to the victims.

Van driver Ekachai Choonaan, 22, suffered a badly bruised leg and is asking for 60,000 baht for medical treatment and 250,000 baht for damages to the van.

The injured motorcyclist Pongphan Ruenpha was still in Bangkok Hospital Phuket at the time of going to press, where doctors are trying to save one of his arms from amputation. His treatment charges have exceeded 600,000 baht and he plans

to ask for an additional 300,000 baht in compensation on top of his total treatment fees, Lt Col Boonlert said. The cement truck driver, 28-year-old Karan Wong-

thongthae, was caught by villagers soon after the accident and turned over to police. He will be charged with reckless driving resulting in the injury of others.

PHUKET CITY: A Malaysian firm has agreed to build a second power-producing incineration plant at Saphan Hin.

The announcement came at a press conference by Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwansupana, Phuket Vice Governor Worapoj Ratthasima and Dato Tan Say Jim of PJT Technology Co Ltd on January 8.

Currently the island generates more than 500 metric tonnes of waste daily, an amount that has been rising by 7% annually and is expected to reach 1,000 tonnes per day within 10 years.

All 19 of Phuket local administrative districts are required to send their waste to the municipality's incineration plant

New incinerator planned

at Saphan Hin for disposal. The plant, completed in 1999, was designed to incinerate only 250 tonnes daily – less than half the amount the island currently generates. The remainder is landfilled in a 120 rai area behind the plant.

Already more than 1 million tonnes of trash has collected in the area, which is surrounded by coastal waterways, mangroves and fish farms.

A study commissioned by the city found that using private sector investment to build a second power-producing incineration plant near the existing one was the best solution to the problem.

The provincial administration then authorized the city to seek private-sector investment to build the plant on a nine-rai site of Forest Department land.

Under the contract, the plant will burn a minimum of 300 tonnes of waste daily for a period of 15 years. PJT Technology will be paid 300 baht per tonne, plus income from the sale of electricity generated and sold to the local grid. The company would also be able to request a rate increase not exceeding 7%

in any three-year period.

PJT, which has completed a similar project in Malaysia, submitted technical specifications that would see the trash burned at temperatures exceeding 950 degrees celsius and pollutant emissions kept within government standards.

The plant will produce 5 megawatts of power by burning 600 tonnes of trash a day. The total investment is estimated to be about 1 billion baht. Mayor Somjai said the project will handle the island's waste for at least 15 years with no cost to the state.

The Crown Jellyfish, in contrast to the potentially deadly Box Jellyfish, is quite harmless.

PHUKET: A smack of jellyfish is plaguing a number of beaches on Phuket's west coast, preventing hundreds of holiday makers from entering the sea.

Beaches in Patong, Kata, Karon and Nai Harn have all reported instances of the unwelcome visitors – affectionately known as "snotties" - washing up on their shores.

In 2008, Phuket witnessed an unexpected bloom of the potentially fatal box jellyfish.

This season's visitors however, are quite harmless.

Dr Somchai Bussarawit, speaking on behalf of the Phuket Aquarium, told the Gazette, "We have taken the jellyfish to the aquarium for analysis and have identified it as the Crown jellyfish, which, although not dangerous, could prove uncomfortable to some should they suffer an allergic reaction to a sting."

It is believed that the late rains that fell on Phuket, which resulted in a proliferation of plankton off Thailand's Andaman coast, may have led to mass breeding of the jellyfish. The jellyfish consume zooplankton through filter feeding.

This is the first time that so many iellyfish have been seen on Phuket's beaches.

A meeting has been scheduled for January 21, when officials will decide on the course of action to be taken.

Dr Somchai added, "This is a relatively new problem for Thailand and we need to determine the most appropriate way to inform people how best to deal with potentially poisonous organisms.

The Ministry of Public Health has teamed up with its counterparts in Australia to find out how to best manage the situation. Australia knows the best way to deal with jellyfish but people in Thailand aren't familiar with them and so no one can give us the right answer."

Dr Somchai informed the Gazette that he had been asked by Governor Preecha Ruangjan to give a radio interview at 9 pm on January 13, to reassure people that the jellyfish do not pose a

NAI HARN: A gable apex lifting ceremony was held at Nai Harn Temple at 3pm on January 11.

Public Health Minister Wittaya Kaewparasai, joined Phuket governor Preecha Ruangjan to observe the merit-making ritual in Rawai, which was led by Rawai Mayor Arun Soros.

After being granted permission from the Theravada Buddhist Association, members of the local Buddhist community constructed a large temple hall (Ubosot), which is now about 80% complete.

The raising of the gable carries great symbolic significance in the construction process and signifies the moment when one reaffirms one's Buddhist beliefs.

Another important aspect in the ceremony is the opportunity to make merit

From January 7 to 11, local Buddhists made merit by donating money to the temple to support funding for construction of the temple hall.



Phuket prisons to rehabilitate inmates

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Provincial Prison discharged a total of 360 prisoners in 2008 and the inmate population now stands at 1,100.

Prison Director Paisal Suwanraksa said none of the inmates were released under Royal Pardons. They had simply served out their time or been granted release on parole.

Of the 1,100 inmates, 110 are female and 20 are foreigners, all Europeans. Almost half of the current inmate population were convicted for drug-related

Statistics released by the prison revealed an annual recidivism rate of about 4%.

The ex-cons returned to crime due to a poor education and a lack of job opportunities on the outside, a recent report issued by Mr Paisal concluded.

In the report, Mr Paisal commented that "simply increasing the number of prisoners does not mean that drug-related crime will decrease. We need to educate people so they can secure honest jobs, become self-sufficient and not feel the need to lapse back into a life of crime."

Phuket Provincial Prison has a program to educate offenders in a bid to help them secure gainful employment following release. In 2008, five prisoners obtained their upper secondaryschool equivalency degrees though an outreach and self-study program offered by Srinakharin


Upon release, each ex-convict is assigned a parole officer who observes all aspects of his or her life – job, family and society interactions – to help ensure successful reintegration into so-

In Cherng Talay, a low security prison on 100 rai of land in Baan Bangjo houses 40 prisoners, all male. It serves as a minimum security facility to house prisoners who displayed good behavior and are nearing the end of their sentences. Inmates there receive training in agriculture and livestock management before being released.

In 2002, the Justice Ministry announced plans to close down the the 107-year-old Phuket Provincial Prison and build a more modern facility at Baan Bangjo, but funding for the project has yet to materialize.

Koh Phi Phi island qualifies in search for the new 7 Wonders of Nature

Koh Phi Phi island has qualified to represent Thailand in a global survey to officially name seven new wonders of nature. The results were announced on January 7 by the New7Wonders Foundation after the first phase of voting, in which organizers claim millions of voters took part.

Koh Phi Phi (winner of the national qualifiers), along with the Mekong River (multinational participant shared by Thailand), Khao Yai National Park and Phang Nga Bay were among 441 sites around the globe initially nominated for the campaign.

Koh Phi Phi and the Mekong River have both qualified for the second round of voting, whereas Khao Yai National Park and Phang Nga Bay failed to make it past the first phase, which reduced the nominee sites to 261

Voting in the second phase will continue until July 7, 2009, to select the Top 77 sites. From that pool, 21 official finalists will be chosen by a panel of experts led by former Spanish Director General of UNESCO Dr Federico Mayor Zaragoza.

The finalists will be announced on July 21, which marks the start of the third and final phase of voting. Voters then have approximately two years to cast their votes for the Official New7Wonders of Nature, which are to be revealed in 2011. More than 1 billion votes are forecast, say the organizers.

Other international nominees for the New 7 Wonders of Nature, representing a total of 222 participating countries, include iconic locations such as the Grand Canyon, Loch Ness, Mount Fuji and the Black Forest, along with the Amazon, the Danube, the Dead Sea, the Great Barrier Reef, the Kalahari Desert, Mont Blanc, and Niagara Falls.

Tia Viering, Head of Communications for New7Wonders, said, "We congratulate the successful qualifying locations from Thailand and wish them the best of luck in the second phase of voting. We also at this time highlight the strong and enthusiastic participation of the other national nominees that are not proceeding – many have already benefited from a significant increase in worldwide awareness, which in itself is a recognized important benefit for all involved in the New7Wonders campaigns."

The New7Wonders nonprofit foundation was established in 1999 by Swiss-born Canadian filmmaker, museum curator, aviator and explorer Bernard Weber with the aim of beginning a modern campaign based on the concept of the Seven Ancient Wonders of the World, originally compiled by Philon of Byzantium in 200 BC.

"The ancient and worldfamous list, compiled by an individual was made up of manmade monuments, namely: the Lighthouse of Alexandria, the Temple of Artemis, the Statue of Zeus, the Colossus of Rhodes, the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, the Mausoleum of Halicarnassus and the Great Pyramid of Giza. Today, only the Pyramid remains. Philon's selection of wonders was essentially a travel guide for fellow Athenians, and its stunning sites were all located around the Mediterranean basin, the thenknown world," said Mr Weber.

"The New7Wonders campaign not only recognizes that our modern world is much larger and more diverse than that known to the Greeks 2,200 years ago. This time, the New 7 Wonders of the World will not have been chosen by one man, but rather by millions of people across the globe – from every single country in the world.

"The New 7 Wonders are the people's choices, and they will be drawn from a list of finalists that includes structures from the earliest time that humankind walked upon the earth through the 20th century," he added.

Yacht inferno in Ao Yon

AO YON, PHUKET: A yacht moored in Ao Yon was burnt to cinders yesterday, much to the chagrin of its British owner Jonathan Hare.

The initial value of the yacht, *Felidae*, was estimated by police at around 2 - 3 million baht, but furnishings and diving equipment on board at the time meant the fire caused at least 10 million baht's worth of damage.

The blaze broke out on the 18 meter vessel at around 12.30 pm. It took the combined efforts of Mr Hare, officials from the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Wichit office (DDPM-Wichit), Phuket Marine Police and the Royal Thai Navy two hours to extinguish.

Nobody was injured in the incident. The owner and three friends were having lunch onshore when the inferno broke out.

The fire was discovered by a long-tail boat driver, Aroon Thaodang, who saw flames and smoke coming from the bridge.

Mr Hare, 33, was informed

of the fire and attempted to put it out with the help of DDPM-Wichit officials by spraying sea water over the blaze, but was unable to dampen the flames.

Phuket Marine Police and the Royal Thai Navy Third Fleet brought additional help, but due to the yacht being moored 300-400 meters from land and high winds, the flames quickly spread below deck, setting fire to oxygen tanks, diving equipment and electronics, as well as the passenger room.

Pol Lt Col Prasert Sri-

khunnarat of the Phuket Marine Police said "We'll have to wait for the owner to get over the shock of the loss and for police forensics experts to investigate before we can determine the cause of the fire. But our first guess is a short circuit."

Commander Narong Oraphakdee of the Royal Thai Navy Third Fleet told the *Gazette* he suspected that a problem with the kitchen's gas supply may have been the original cause of the the blaze.

Gazette Online smashes visitor records

PHUKET: With 82,882 visitors to its news pages in the 24 hours ending at midnight on Monday, January 12, the Gazette Online set a record for single-day traffic since the site was launched in September 1997. The statistics are prepared independently and published daily on the home page of the newspaper's website.

In last week's recordbreaking log, the leading contributors to the site's traffic were the United States, with 32,152 visitors; Thailand, with 24,511; France with 9,072; Sweden with 3,669; and Russia with 3,540.

The order of magnitude of visitor contributions by country has remained basically unchanged over the past couple of years, but the statistics for these 'virtual visitors' to Phuket rarely reflect or

anticipate the contributions of real-world visitors as reported by the TAT. The United States is a notable example. Consistently ranked number one on the Gazette Online's daily scoreboard, Uncle Sam ranked 14th as a supplier of real-world tourists to the island in 2008.


Of particular interest in the virtual visitor rankings is Sweden, which, with a population of only nine million people, has been a fixture in fourth place in the Gazette Online's traffic tables. In this case there is a precise correlation with the TAT numbers, which also put Sweden as the fourth highest source of visitors to Phuket last year.

Contributing to the rising traffic on the Gazette Online are the site's robust rankings in

Google under all Phuket newsrelated search terms; the continuing top-level ranking under the term "Phuket"; and a recent surge in the newspaper's presence in the Google Alerts, with one-to-three stories picked up and announced to the world almost every day.

Also likely to have contributed to the increased traffic has been an editorial policy adjustment in which crime, though not swept under the carpet, is now given a lesser weighting in the *Gazette's* story mix, with recreation, sports, property and business assuming a greater role.

Improving fire safety standards at Phuket's entertainment venues

ollowing the fire at Santika nightclub in Bangkok that killed 64 people on New Year's Eve, Phuket Governor Preecha Ruangjan and a number of government inspectors carried out fire safety inspections at several prominent Phuket nightspots on January 9.

Daytime inspections at popular Phuket City nightspots Blue Marina, Timber Hut, Fantasia and T2 revealed a number of serious safety issues. In every pub inspected, fire exits were not sufficiently accessible, with large objects like refrigerators and popcorn dispensers blocking the way out. In one case, the fire exit was locked.

Speaking to reporters after the inspections had been completed, Governor Preecha said, "The [Santika] fire is big news in Thailand and we will repeat our order for every pub to improve fire exits."

Every venue inspected had fire exits, but none were completely up to standard and many

needed to be widened, he said.

Inspections will continue for a week, after which time officials will meet again, he said.

Governor Preecha earlier said nightclub owners would only be given a short period time to comply after the inspectors make their recommendation, and those who fail bring their venues up to standard will face legal action.

Daytime inspections allow officials to examine the premises for structural and design faults, while upcoming nighttime inspections will examine whether fire exit signs, fire alarms and other safety equipment are sufficient should a fire break out during operating hours.

The Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation of-

fice in Phuket (DDPM-Phuket) is responsible for disaster prevention – including fires – throughout five Andaman region provinces: Phuket, Ranong, Phang Nga, Trang and Krabi.

The department, which collects statistical information on disasters and accidents of all types after they occur, uses the information to try and prevent future incidents. Each district has its own disaster prevention office, but if events spiral beyond their control, DDPM-Phuket provides extra assistance.

Udomporn Karn, head of prevention and operations at DDPM-Phuket, told the *Gazette*, "We're setting up the standards and systems to prevent disasters here. We have equipment ready for instant deployment."

"In the cold and dry season, fires can start and burn very fast. We train, prepare fire engines and get fire authorities and volunteers ready, but this is still not the best solution. The best approach is prevention.


"The weather in Phuket has

changed; it can be windy, cold and dry, which can cause fire. People should be careful and check lights, gas and electronics. We also have detailed information on house fire prevention. Please take the time to learn what you need to do to prevent fires," he added.

Discussing the Santika fire, Mr Udomporn said, "Normally when fires break out, if people aren't packed too tightly in a small area we can help them in time. The Santika in Bangkok was too full. According to Thai law, there should be one person per square meter at most, but in Thailand, you often get 1,000 people crammed into 500 square meters

"Government focus is now on improving fire exits and making sure there will be enough space to escape. There are inspections by government officers, construction engineers and the DDPM every year. The governor's office also has plans and the budget to improve fire prevention and training," he added.





Red Cross societies designate Saphan Hin as site for new regional blood bank

joint venture by the Thai and Finnish Red Cross Societies is coordinating the construction of a central blood bank for the Andaman region.

Due to open at the end of 2009, the center will provide services to seven hospitals and a number of smaller facilities in the six Andaman coast provinces of Krabi, Phang Nga, Ranong, Satun and Trang as well as Phuket.

Before completion of the center some time in the middle of this year, a new mobile blood collection program starting out with a single van will begin collecting blood in public areas like shopping malls to provide to regional hospitals.

The Finnish Red Cross is contributing the equivalent of 120 million baht for construction of the center, a two-storey building located near the employment office off Kra Rd in the Saphan Hin area.

The generous funding also covers equipment, expert counseling and the launch of the mobile blood services. In support of the regional blood service system, the Finnish Red Cross has subsidized the employment of six staff members to assist in the recruitment of donors and distribute information.

Thailand currently employs a mixed system, where blood services are controlled by the larger hospitals and the Thai Red Cross. As a result, quality of blood varies across the country and hospitals are often short of needed supplies due to a lack of government legislation and licensing requirements.

One of the goals of the

project is to secure the availability of blood for day-to-day use in local hospitals and to ensure sufficient supplies of each blood type

are obtainable should another disaster akin to the 2004 tsunami strike. Upon completion, the new center at Saphan Hin will be Thailand's first regional full-service blood supply center, providing blood services, collection and production of blood components




as well as performing tests on blood components and delivering supplies to hospitals.

In addition, the center will improve the quality of the blood stored in the region and improve testing of first-time donors for blood-borne diseases, including HIV/Aids.

Currently government hospitals collect and process donated blood, but upon completion of the Red Cross Center the Thai Red Cross Society will assume responsibility for collecting blood and making it available throughout the six provinces.

Project co-ordinator Marko Lahikainen said the center represents considerable progress in the advancement of the Thai Red Cross Blood Services and that new technology will be implemented to improve collection, transport and storage procedures.

The new facility will offer a range of services including patient testing and consultation, as well as training medical staff on the use of blood components and blood transfusion therapies.

Bat-tling the cold, Isam style KALASIN: While temperatures of 10 degrees Celsius may not seem

KALASIN: While temperatures of 10 degrees Celsius may not seem so cold to expats from more northerly climes, for poor Thais living in unheated shacks without warm bedding the cold season is still a real trial.

Every year charity appeals are launched to find warm clothing for poor families in the North and Northeast. Villagers in the Isarn have developed alternative methods to fend off winter chills. Many Isarn people believe certain foods have warming properties — and this year bats are all the rage.

In Kalasian's Yang Talat district, where temperatures can drop as low as eight degrees in the hills and 12 degrees on the plain, markets have begun to fill up with stalls selling live bats and bat-based dishes.

As well as helping to keep the cold at bay, bat meat reportedly does wonders for one's libido if eaten regularly.

Riang Phukhana, 47-year-old resident of tambon Buaban, said that every cold season he and his neighbors arm themselves with nets and head out into the palm and banana plantations to catch the fruit bats that feed there. Once caught, the flying rodents are cooked straight away to ensure the meat is nice and fresh.

Mr Riang explained that as the bats feed only on fresh fruit, all of their meat and organs can be eaten and are an excellent source of nutrition. Some people eat the whole animal, as it is both a traditional medicine and a source of food. Others choose to use the bats as the main ingredient in various dishes which include bat laap, stir-fried bat, bat curry, or crispy bat crackling. However you eat it, bat helps to keep the body in good shape, Mr Riang explained.

Bat fat is especially good for warming the body in cold season, he continued.

Eaten regularly, bat meat will put an extra spring in your step and do wonders for your sex life, Mr Riang added.

PM's Office files B18.8m property damage complaint against PAD

BANGKOK: The chief lawyer of the PM's Office, on January 9 filed a police complaint against the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD), blaming it for the loss and damages of assets worth 18.8

Mongkol Saenghiran, director of the central legal office of the Permanent Secretariat of the PM's Office, filed the compliant at the Dusit Police Station. He handed over evidence and lists of witnesses against the PAD to the police station.

Mr Mongkol said his office checked and found that the assets worth 18.8 million baht had been either lost or damaged during the occupation of Government House by the PAD.

Health Ministry to speed up registration of health volunteers

BANGKOK: The Public Health Ministry will accelerate the approval of a 4 billion baht budget to support the activities of 830,000 health volunteers nationwide.

"I expect health volunteers across the country to receive this money on March 20, in order to celebrate National Health Volunteer Day," Public Health Minister Witthaya Kaewparadai said.

Out of this budget, 498 million baht will be spent each month from March to September to provide each volunteer with a 600baht allowance for personal expenses, including travel costs.

The volunteers have dedicated themselves to providing primary care and looking after people in their areas without receiving any stipend since the project was launched 30 years ago. They have had to use their own money to work with the ministry, Mr Witthaya said.

In a bid to accelerate the process, Mr Witthaya has asked the Health Service Support Department to survey and select eligible health volunteers to register with the ministry, so they can receive the money from the min-

The department should also develop the capacity of health volunteers, instruct primary health units to keep them informed about government policies and listen to their demands so that the ministry can draft regulations to fulfill their needs, said Mr Witthaya.

Such a plan will be put before the Cabinet as soon as pos-

Department director-general Dr Somyos Deerasmee said the volunteers would work with primarycare units to provide services to the public, with each responsible for about 1015 households.

Boonthong Boonprasert, 52, chairman of the Health Volunteers Club in the Northeast, said he was worried the ministry could not meet the March deadline

Only 35% of volunteers across the country had been registered with the ministry so far and the rest are still waiting to register so they can receive the monthly subsidy, he said.

"I don't understand why they have to speed up the process to be finished within two months. They should take a year to register health volunteers Health Service Support around the country," he added.

Stargazer not bullish on Year of the Ox

BANGKOK: Things aren't likely to get better with the Year of the Ox that starts on January 26. In fact, one Thai astrologer has predicted that gloom will cast a shadow over the country during the year.

Political conflict will worsen and the economy will suffer, with recovery being slow, says Paweena Vasanarueng-uk, who recently graduated with a diploma from the Hamburg School of As-

The symbolic planet Admetos, which stands for blocks, death and parting, will "settle in the kingdom" for quite a while, said the stargazer.

"If you think the airport closures and mobs were bad, then next year will be worse," Ms Paweena predicts.

She warns people to be selfsufficient, control their emotions and choose their words carefully. "Everything must be taken into account when anything is said, as small problems or petty arguments could escalate into chaos."

"Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva will face the most exhausting mission in his life.

"There will be things happening to him that he can't possibly control," said the pessimistic prophet. Given the influence of Admetos, special projects will take a long time to develop. And no matter what, the economy will worsen – like a sick tree that can't grow, she predicted.

Tooth decay rife among Thai youngsters

BANGKOK: Over half a million 12-year-olds have skipped school because of toothaches, Public Health Minister Wittaya Kaewparadia revealed on January 8. Recent records show that about 57% of primary school students aged 12 are suffering tooth decay, he said.

The number of primary school students missing classes due to dental caries has increased from 422,000 in 2001 to 515,000 in 2007.

"Rotten teeth threaten our young children's health and disturb their daily lives," he said.

Tooth decay is a disease where bacterial processes damage hard tooth structures. These tissues progressively break down, producing cavities. If left untreated, the disease can lead to pain, tooth loss, infection, and, in severe cases, death. Today, tooth decay remains one of the most common diseases worldwide. Mr Wittaya has instructed the Health Department to work closer with the Education Ministry.





Indict soldiers over imam death: HRW

NARATHIWAT: New Yorkbased Human Rights Watch has urged the Thai government to indict soldiers who tortured an imam to death last year.

After an inquest the Narathiwat Provincial Court ruled on December 25, 2008, that Imam Yapa Kaseng, 56, was tortured and killed by soldiers during interrogation in March 2008 at a military camp in the province.

Prosecuting the soldiers will be a test of the administration of Thai premier Abhisit Vejjajiva, who has vowed to bring justice to the Deep South, Human Rights Watch said in a statement released on January 8.

"The court gave a brave and unprecedented verdict in the inquest, putting its finger on torture and other abuses committed by Thai security forces," said Brad Adams, Asia director at Human Rights Watch.

The inquest determined that the cause of Imam Yapa's death was blunt force trauma, including rib fractures from the front, side and back that punctured his lungs.

The same day, army chief Gen Anupong Paochinda said the proposed new administrative body for the trouble-plagued southernmost provinces would "watch over" the existing agen-

Gen Anupong did not elaborate on the question of whether the army would lose its leading role in the Deep South. He would only say the existing mechanisms would remain in place and that the proposed administrative body would focus on cultural, educational and economic development in the region.

Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva has said past administrations tended to focus too heavily on security and not enough on other issues, such as cultural considerations and the identity of the local community. He promised to return responsibility for the Deep South to civilians.

At present, the government is working on the final details of a comprehensive legal bill for the Deep South.

The news followed another day of violence in the area. On January 6, three people were shot dead in three separate incidents in Narathiwat and Yala provinces. The victims were named as civilians Nukifri Karim, 36, and Muhammed Saisu-sareh, 30. Also slain was Pol Sen Sgt Maj Thanat Kuhamook, 51.

Four youths arrested in rape-murder case

SATUN: Police have arrested four youths for the brutal rape and murder of a woman, whose corpse was found lying next to a shrimp farm on January 5.

A second victim, a 15-yearold, survived the attack and is recovering in hospital.

The arrests were announced on January 7 by Satun Provincial Police Commander Gen Seri Wilailak.

The names of three of the suspects, aged 18, 17 and 16, cannot be released for legal reasons.

The remaining suspect was named as Amdan Yalam, 20.

Maj Gen Seri said that the four had been arrested in a rented house in Satun Town at 6 am that morning. Police believe the four were preparing to go and hide out in Malaysia.

The arrests came following an attack on two young women two days earlier.

Jaruwan Namcharoen, 20, and Tassani Hongwihok, 15, were found lying near a shrimp farm in Tambon Na Khae by a passer by.

Miss Jaruwan was already dead, but the passer by took Miss Tassani to Satun Hospital, where she is now reportedly out of danger.

Both of the women had been raped, beaten and stabbed.

Police said that they believe the four suspects tricked the two women, who were riding on a motorcycle together to Satun Town, into following them to the shrimp farm, where they set upon them.

The four suspects all confessed to the attack and have been charged with murder, attempted murder and rape, Gen Seri said.

He praised Satun Muang District Police, especially Superintendent Col Prasit Chansawang, for quickly arresting the suspects.

He also warned parents not to let their daughters go out alone at night.



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Iconic Lotus returns in the shape of the Evora



otus means different things to different people: the hugely successful Formula One team of the sixties and seventies that took Jim Clark to two world titles; the world's first and so far only posthumous world champion with Jochen Rindt in 1970; Brazilian Emerson Fittipaldi's first drivers' title in 1972; and Graham Hill's second in 1968, following Clark's death.

Mario Andretti also became champion in a Lotus, in 1978, while other luminaries to sit behind the wheel of a Lotus F1 were Nigel Mansell, Mika Hakkinen and the late Ayrton Senna.

Lotus also means iconic sports cars such as the legendary Elan, or the supreme touring car, the Lotus Cortina that was such a formidable foe on the race tracks.

But now there is a new Lotus: the sleek Evora. The first allnew Lotus since the Spartan Elise made its debut in 1995, the Evora enters the sports car market as currently the world's only midengined 2+2.

Powered by a Lotus-tuned 3.5-liter Toyota V6 engine producing 276 bhp (203 kW), and weighing just 1350 kg, the Evora promises breathtaking performance. During preliminary testing around the famous Nürburgring, the Lotus chassis engineers reported that it was exactly what they had set out to produce: extremely agile and great fun to drive.

Beneath the skin, the entire front-end structure is a high-tech aluminum modular unit, attached to the main extruded aluminum tub. This modular unit is designed to deform for maximum safety, and to reduce repair costs in the event of a frontal impact.

We all have an environmental responsibility to future generations and the Evora is another example of where Lotus is seen to make significant steps toward improving the efficiency and sustainability of the motorcar, keeping Britain at the forefront of the high technology motor industry."

Aerodynamic considerations for drag, down force and cooling had significant but posi-

tive influence on the overall form and details such as air intakes.

A desire to create balanced down force, that increases cornering performance, led to the adoption of the now 'signature' top exit radiator vent, the race car inspired diffuser, and the 'floating rear wing'.

Drag limitation drove the dramatic tear-dropped cabin layout and the curvaceous plan view has given the car a more muscular rear shoulder, and conveys a level of sophistication appropriate to the market segment.

The Evora's chassis is an evolution of Lotus's cleverly designed aluminum frame that allows low volume production but advanced levels of stiffness and safety. This chassis improves on the bonded and riveted technology used in the Lotus Elise range. Another advantage of this type of construction is ease - and cheapness – of repairs.

Suspension parts are also in wishbones, while high-performance Bilstein dampers are used all round. There is a switchable traction control system, which is generally active above 8 km/h, but can be deactivated if required. Ventilated and crossdrilled discs are fitted front and rear, along with ABS. This, though, is set with high thresholds and operates so progressively that drivers are often unaware it has

Group Lotus is majority owned by Malaysian conglomerate Proton, for which inevitably the company carries out a great deal of development work, but Lotus Engineering, part of the overall group, aids and assists many other manufacturers in the development of their vehicles.

The Evora, if you like, is something of a showcase for the company's talents. It is not for everybody, but you have to admit it's quite an impressive package.

Cheap Kanom Chine

For those who like it sweet, try this traditional desert *Kao Maak* (rice wine pudding with coconut milk).

he dish *Kanom Chine* is Thailand's version of spaghetti. Here, the thin, white rice-flour noodles are usually sold to gether with a range of savory sauces and curries to choose from. It is one of those dishes that has been enjoyed by people at every level of Thai society for many generations.

They eat Kanom Chine in the North and the South, where it is sold at roadside vendors as a quick and cheap meal, but it can also be dressed up and elegantly flavored to be served as royal cuisine.

Most Bangkokians consider the noodle curry as something for lunch or as a light evening meal but you'll see Phuketians tucking into hot and spicy *Kanom Chine* concoctions much earlier in the day. Different provinces have different Kanom Chine recipes and those of the South are known to be extra potent and spicy.

At the Thong-pan-chang restaurant in Samkong, Phuket Town, *Kanom Chine* is the main dish and is served in a variety of ways. As well as a range of enough curries to try a different one each day of the week, the noodles come in different colors.

The natural colorings of the noodles come from herbal ingredients, such as turmeric (yellow) and sweet pea flower, which gives the noodles a tinge of purple.

Despite the elevated status of these colorful *Kanom Chine*, each serving at the Thong-pan-chang restaurant is just 30 baht for a bowl.

Thong-pan-chang is located behind the local Family Mart near Phuket Villa 1 on Samkong Road.



Getting a taste of Phuket's past






here are six dishes that have their origins in Phuket. Mee Hoon Ba Chang combines traditional Phuket noodles with pork rib soup. Legend has it that Mee Hoon Ba Chang takes its name from a large Chinese woman who used to sell the soup. "Mee Hoon" is the name of the traditional white noodles from Phuket that are used in the dish and "Ba Chang", literally translated, means (comically) 'the big body of a Chinese woman'.

Three hundred meters from the Bangneaw Municipality School, opposite the Por Tor Kong Chinese temple on Soi Tonpho, Phuket City, sits the Mee Hoon Ba Chang restaurant, a small, street corner coffee house. Somjai Khorkittipaiboon, born and raised in Phuket, established her restaurant in 1992, naming it after the popular dish. She inherited the recipe for the soup from her great grandmother who lived in the Xiamen (Hokkien) area of China before emigrating to Phuket.

The dish has six main components: traditional Phuket white noodles, soy sauce, fried garlic, pork ribs, Thai leeks and soup. Making Mee Hoon Ba Chang is a time consuming process. The ribs and the stock need to be boiled for six hours. The noodles are fried in a little oil and soy sauce which gives them a brown hue.

The noodles themselves are quite sweet but when combined with the soup you have a very mellow flavor. It is enhanced with Chinese herbs, which not only make it delicious, but also very healthy. At thirty baht a bowl, it is great value for money. And to truly experience Phuket, it's a must for visitors.



Fundamentally funny



A comedian friend of mine threw an aphorism at me today that's really pertinent to writing comedy: feel deeply but think lightly. I don't know where that comes from but it makes total sense to me.

unchline Comedy Club returns to the island on January 20 for an evening of Anglo-Antipodean stand-up by comics Kitty Flanagan, Roger Monkhouse and John Gordillo. The *Gazette* managed to catch up with Gordillo in advance of the gig and attempted to figure out what sort of comedy Phuket can expect from this self-confessed son of a mouthy, hot-headed Spanish communist.

Gordillo is a successful theater and comedy director in his native UK – he directed, produced and edited Eddie Izzard's "Unrepeatable" and "Live at the Ambassadors" shows and has been nominated for the prestigious Perrier Award – and recently returned to stand-up after a six-year break.

Never having been to Thailand before, Gordillo is yet to mine these shores for comedic potential (though he admits to secretly enjoying saying the word "Phuket"). So what can audiences expect from his upcoming show? "A monk, a punk and a chick in a kick ass flick," he says. Joking aside – or is it? You can never tell with comedians – John continues. "Er, it's all pretty fluid at the moment - writing a lot about my relationship and general inability to relate to my girlfriend and my genuine awe at the way women communicate with each other."

Anything else? "I just wrote some stuff about the Jerry Springer show – which obviously is a horrendously out-of-date subject, but I just saw it again a couple of weeks ago, not having seen it for a few years and my god! I didn't know it'd be possible to watch Jerry Springer and find myself yearning for the discerning editorial standards of old, but there it is. Just when you think there's no more to scrape out of the barrel, they find some more sludge," he says.

As a busy writer/director/comedian, John is of course working on other projects. "I'm currently trying to find out who's responsible for a 250 pound phone bill I received for December. I live with my girlfriend and her 14 year old daughter... wait a minute... I hear a penny dropping."

What are John's biggest comedic influences? "Letterman till 1994/95, a little after he went to CBS, Howard Stern, Richard

Pryor, Louis CK, Dan Kitson, Mort Sahl at one time, Jackie Mason, Woody Allen... in fact all Jews. Especially Ehud Olmert – what a cut-up."

A lot of comedians get their laughs by saying the hitherto unsayable. Is there anything John wouldn't joke about? "No," he says, "I wouldn't want to make jokes that endorsed rape or racism or whatever, but that's a point of view thing. The subjects themselves are legit for comedy, it just depends what angle you come at them from.

"There are certainly subjects I don't know how to make jokes about, like...well... most things, come to think. Most attempts at joke writing end in failure I find. There are very personal things in my life that are messed-up and hilarious to observe if you're not me. But being me, I either don't have that dispassionate eye on myself or seem to know how to make them funny. Yet. You need distance – either temporal or psychological, cause to make a joke about something always undermines the thing somehow.

"It depends on the kind of comic you are I guess – you can deal with *really* dark stuff but it has to be lightly-done, otherwise it's too much to laugh at. A comedian friend of mine threw an aphorism at me today that's really pertinent to writing comedy: Feel deeply but think lightly. I don't know where that comes from but it makes total sense to me. It's hard to make jokes about something when you're actually laboring under the pain of the thing – you have to get over it."

John's last show was "Divide and Conga", a show about "fundamentalism, extremism and being the son of a Spanish communist". If funniness is hereditary, should we be worried? It is, after all, sometimes said that people on the far-left have no sense of humor. John disagrees. "My dad and other communists I've met do have a sense of humor, it just tends not to be about their beliefs. But I don't see that that makes them different from most people," he says

"My dad is a fundamentalist though – which I think is different from being a communist or socialist or whatever. I think the thing with fundamentalists, whether religious or political, is they're explicitly emotionally/psychologically-driven – there's a



need to see their philosophy as the *only* answer to *everything* – including things that barely pertain to the philosophy, but it doesn't matter, it all goes through that one filter. And in dad's case I think it narrows his reaction, it limits what he'll allow in, which is a shame cause he's a very smart, sensitive guy," he says.

John explains that a friend of his committed suicide a little while ago. He told his father, as they had met each other once. "Dad's reaction was to go, 'Please! Don't waste my time with this middle class shit!' Which stunned me because I couldn't see what class has to do with it. So I asked him, what do you mean? And he answered that basically the working class of the world are so busy with their day-to-day struggle, they don't have the luxury of committing suicide.

"Suicide as a luxury is hilarious to me, but obviously he can't see it. But I don't think it's the communism that drives this kind of reaction, I think it's the fundamentalism – i.e. the emotional need in him to see communism as the answer to the problem. I think he was probably having a bad day, felt a bit shitty, maybe even threatened by what I told him about my friend, and hid behind the ideology. It's safe," he explains.

But what does this rabid fundamentalist think of John's material? "To his eternal credit, he's seen a few of the bits I've done about him on tape, where I basically characterize him as the



mouthy hot-headed fundamentalist that he is, and he finds it really funny and has been totally generous and supportive about me doing it. He recognizes there's truth in it and my intentions aren't malignant.

He really didn't have to take it that way, and it's a mark of the man and his love for me that he's been able to see that. And for that and many other fine qualities that I didn't talk about in the show, I love him greatly."

And one final thing. How does John feel about hecklers, many a comedian's bête noire? "As I understand the word, 'hecklers' are people who want to mess with the show or think the night needs their interjection, and they get to show off in front of their mates and this is dull as chives. It's always frustrated ego and people who think they are essential to helping the night, which they're not. Ever. They think having a go at the come-

dian is part of the whole thing of going to comedy. And the audience always finds it tiresome. But [that kind of heckler]'s rare.

"Most of the time, when people in the crowd talk to you, you're not being barracked so much as dealing with their specific reactions to things, or they throw in a tag to your joke which they think is funny (it usually isn't) but to me this is totally legit and fun. Often you can engage people from the stage and you end up having these slightly elevated conversations and I love that. People in the audience who *aren't* trying to show off and are just being funny and honest or random or heartfelt or getting into the spirit of it are great. But I don't think of those people as hecklers.

"So despite where this answer started out, I think I love them." So, a thoughtful and clearly funny comedian who loves hecklers. The *Gazette's* expectations are running high...

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Silk artist weaves her magic

n exhibition entitled "The Tear of the Sea" Thai artist .Kachama K. Perez was launched at the VG21 gallery at Surin Plaza on December 19. Kachama found her inspiration for the collection following a visit to Koh Chang, situated in the Gulf of Thailand.

While visiting a local village, she observed a large number of dark-colored, dirty seashells littering the beach. Taking a trip to a nearby island, she discovered shells that were identical in every way bar one; the shells were a pristine white. Noting that the darker shells were the result of the localized pollution, Kachama felt motivated to encourage others to protect the precious environment we inhabit.

The pieces for this exhibition are all original designs, crafted using traditional Thai weaving techniques. The materials came from Chiang Mai and the shells were collected from the beaches of Thailand.

To produce the artwork, Kachama worked with a team of three to four people, all contributing different skills. Once the designs were finalized, a professional weaver set to work on the pieces, but their creation was carefully monitored by Kachama, who has become so adept at the weaving techniques she can tell when something goes amiss in the process simply by listening.

Kachama was born in Bangkok, but left Thailand to study at the Tokyo Mode College, an institute of art and design in Japan. Upon graduation, she stayed on in Japan securing work as a designer, but remained loyal to her Thai roots, using materials imported from Thailand to create her pieces.

Her work was published in the Japanese design magazine "AN AN" which miscredited her as an American designer whose work was made in the United States. Furious and shocked by such a basic error, she confronted her boss who informed her it was no mistake; to credit her as a Thai national would degrade their product.

Disillusioned by what she heard, Kachama left Japan and traveled to Chiang Mai where she lived with the indigenous hill tribes of northern Thailand.



It was during this time that she came to learn the weaving techniques she employs so successfully in her work today.

Kachama's next project remains a closely guarded secret, but she did profess a desire to increase Thai understanding and appreciation of the arts.

In Europe, she noted, many people took an interest in her creations and understood what she was trying to achieve, but on a local level it has been more difficult to get the message across.

Kachama aims to inspire a new generation of Thai artists by offering her pieces to museums. "The next generation of artists must follow their heart and work from within. Let it be your inspiration. Don't think too much about

elcome to the third in a series of Tai Chi Timeouts. Each timeout takes you through a single, easy-to-follow Tai Chi-Chi Gung exercise.

One of the aims of Tai Chi is to develop the intrinsic energy (*Chi*) within the body through slow, rhythmical breathing exercises known as *Chi Gung*.

The ancient martial art exercises naturally relieve tension from stress, and aches and pains from stiff limbs.

Perform them whenever you want to unwind and loosen up, but they are particularly beneficial in the early morning when the *Chi* is especially clean and light, relaxing and energizing the mind and body for the start of a new day.

In this exercise, inhale through the nostrils with a slow,

even, steady breath, while you raise both hands to chest height. As your exhale, slowly turn the body to the left while raising the right hand and lowering the left hand.

As you inhale again, turn your body back to the center with hands held chest height. Then slowly exhale as you turn your body to the right while raising the left hand and lowering the right hand. Inhale and exhale each time to a slow count of four.

Please note: as you raise one hand with a sense of floating in air, the other hand has a equal and opposite sense of floating on water. Without an experienced instructor to guide you, it's up to you to experiment and to 'feel' the sense of movement within the body.

This exercise has the added benefit, apart from looensing the tension in the neck, shoulders and hands, of exercising the left and right hemispheres of the brain as you counter-cross your body and hands in seemingly opposite directions. Before beginning, release the tension in the neck and shoulders by slowly rolling the shoulders forward and backward. Then roll your head in a circle, keeping your neck loose, first to the right, then the left. Once you've completed five of these rotations, place your hands over your center (*Tan Tien*) and relax into a comfortable, forward-facing posture.

Sequence

Step 1: Place your feet shoulder-width apart, knees slightly bent, hips tucked gently under the spine (back straight). Relax your shoulders and hold up your head, but keep your neck relaxed. Inhale while you bring your hands up to shoulder height; neck and shoulders relaxed.

Step 2: While you slowly exhale, turn your body to the left while raising your right hand and lowering your left hand. Keep your hands soft but with a sense of awareness.

Step 3: Continue to exhale until your left hand is alongside the left-side of your waist and your right hand is in line with your left knee. Pay close attention to a smooth movement of your waist and hands without over-rotating.

Step 4: Inhale as you turn your body back to the forward facing position with your hands held at chest height.

Step 5: Now, slowly exhale and turn your body to the right, while raising your left hand and lowering your right hand. Be aware of any tension in the neck, shoulders and hands.

Step 6: Continue to exhale until your right hand is alongside the right-side of your waist and your left hand is aligned with your right knee.

Step 7: Inhale as you turn your body back to the forward-facing position. Continue the exercise for fifteen minutes while you pay close attention to keeping your neck, shoulders and hands relaxed with a calm, steady raising and lowering of the abdominal breathing technique.

Step 8: To complete the exercise, cross your hands over your *Tan Tien* and gather the *Chi* within.

merican artist Kathy Manthei left California in 1996, and has been living abroad ever since, making Phuket her creative space since 1998. Her work is exhibited internationally, attracting private collectors throughout Asia, Australia, New Zealand, Europe and the United States.

Kathy likes to experiment with different materials and the natural or chemical reactions caused by their interaction. Her unique repertoire of acrylic mixed media paintings on canvas is enhanced by layers of acrylic paint, Chinese ink, metals (especially copper and gold leaf) and paper.

Recently she began working with encaustic (an ancient painting technique using molten beeswax) and acrylic transfers. Full of symbolism, each piece tells its own story of peace, contemplation and beauty in its simplicity.

The collection of work on show at the Boathouse Gallery, all produced in recent years, highlights peaceful natural surroundings as a metaphor for the inner landscapes of the soul and mind.

Using rich, iridescent colors, especially metallic oxides, Kathy starts with an abstract background painted directly on canvas. Images are drawn on sheets of natural rice paper and then layered onto the canvas. Painting over these produces a ground base with a favorable texture to work on.

The imagery is brought out like a photo negative due to layers of

thick dry paint. Applying solutions to reactive metallic paints produces the rich lustrous patina blue and green,

as seen on the bamboo pieces on show. Lately, Kathy has been working with original images from her childhood, creating acrylic transfers directly from them. This has infused her pieces with an appealing whimsy and childlike innocence. Kathy's path as an artist has led her to become involved in various creative projects within her local community, helping others explore their creativity.

A graduate of the University of California at Davis, Kathy taught art to homeless and low income women at the Wisdom Project in the United States.



Through a grant from the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission in 1995, she organized a series of self portrait mas- making workshops for children in California. She has also taught street children in Cambodia as part of a self portrait workshop, combined with an exhibition of her paintings in 2001. Since 2002, Kathy has been the volunteer Arts Program Co-ordinator at the Life Home Project, a shelter for HIV positive women and their children in Phuket.

In 2005, together with the women of the Life Home Project in Phuket, she set up Project Neptune, an expressive arts therapy program for survivors of the 2004 tsunami, throughout Thailand's affected provinces. Currently, Kathy is a teacher of Art as well as a Creative, Action and Service Co-ordinator at the British International School, Phuket.

Kathy's exhibition will be on show at Mom Tri's Boathouse in Kata until February 9.

or many, the founding of Sukhothai as a kingdom marked the start of the Thai nation in history. The city of Sukhothai, which broke off and declared independence from the reigning Khmer kingdom, came into existence as a kingdom early in the 13th century.

Later that century, some southern kingdoms on the peninsula, including Nakhon Sri Thammarat, began sending tributes to King Ramkhamhaeng, ruler of Sukhothai, as a way of showing allegiance to the new kingdom and its sovereign. At this time it was unlikely that Phuket had any significantly large towns or settlements. Early documents referred to Phuket Island as Junk Ceylon.

It is briefly worth discussing the relationship between Nakhon Sri Thammarat and Junk Ceylon. Perhaps as early as the 2nd century Anno Domini (AD), the largest city that grew closest to Junk Ceylon was Nakhon Sri Thammarat, also referred to in ancient maps as Ligor.

Over the centuries, Ligor may have remained independent for a brief period, but fell and became part of many kingdoms in the region that rose and fell over the years. Junk Ceylon, being a territory in its immediate vicinity, would have been claimed by the ruler of Ligor. As a result, whichever kingdom ruled over Ligor would have had jurisdiction over Junk Ceylon. The island, during the period before Sukhothai, was a territory of several ancient empires for many centuries before finally being recognized as part of Siam.

Sukhothai's king managed to invade the peninsula for the first time during the 13th century. Before that, the northern and southern parts of what is now the modern Thai state formed separate kingdoms.

The last great empire of the north was the Khmer empire,

which lasted until the 13th century, while the south, consisting of the Kra Isthmus and the Malay Peninsula, throughout the centuries saw the rise and fall of many successive kingdoms.

The earliest known kingdom, possibly the first civilization that existed in the peninsula, was that of Langkasuka. Malay historical records suggest that the rulers of Langkasuka may have crossed the Bay of Bengal from India, traveling east in search of new land. Remnants of this ancient empire are rarely found anywhere today. A lot of what we know about Langkasuka comes from ancient Chinese texts and records.

Monks from China had

been traveling to Langkasuka from as far back as the 7th century in order to obtain Mahayana Buddhist scriptures. It is possible that the empire may have come into existence as early as the 2nd century, with its capital city blossoming on the west coast of the Malay Peninsula. Moving to Pattani, it flourished in trade and diplomacy with other kingdoms in the region, particularly China.

Langkasuka may have also held the city of Ligor under its authority. However, it is also possible that, during this same period, the city may have flourished by itself as the center of another kingdom. Some archaeologists and historians suggest the existence of a kingdom called Tambralinga, with Ligor as its capital. If this is true, Junk Ceylon may have been part of this ancient kingdom. Unfortunately, scant archaeological evidence remains for us to study these lost kingdoms.

By the 7th century, much of what was Langkasuka had been absorbed by another rising Indo-Buddhist kingdom, Srivijaya. The empire expanded to include most of the Malay Peninsula, Sumatra and Western Java and the kingdom lasted for more than five centuries. Again, very little evidence remains to be studied from the Srivijaya era. We know that the kingdom was administered from the city of Palembang in Sumatra.

The city of Ligor, modern day Nakhon Sri Thammarat, would have certainly been a vassal of Srivijaya. Ruins of an ancient stone temple, built displaying Srivijayan architectural characteristics, still stands today in Chaiya Town in Surat Thani province. Some historians believe Chaiya was a city of great significance to the Srivijaya empire and may have even served as its capital at some point.

Śrivijaya was a maritime empire characterized by long coastlines, estuaries and rivers. Its coastal geography made it an important center of trade and maritime commerce in the region. During the centuries of its existence, the kingdom came into conflict many times with neighboring kingdoms in the region.

During the 10th century, the Chola Dynasty that ruled southern India prepared an invasion force and sailed across the Bay of Bengal to attack Srivijaya. After the Srivijaya kingdom was defeated, the Chola king ordered the sacking of the capital and plundered many other cities in the kingdom.

The reason Srivijaya faced so many conflicts during its time

may have been because of the kingdom's control over one of the most important trade passages in the region. Throughout history, trading vessels from India and Arabia, sailing to eastern countries like China, inevitably had to pass through the Strait of Malacca, where most passing ships would have stopped to gather supplies at one of the major ports along the coastline.

During the few centuries that Srivijaya existed, its splendid geographic position gave it control of the Malacca Straits. Hence, the kingdom benefited enormously from the commerce that passed along this ancient and vital trade route, making it the envy of most regional powers.

Srivijaya's influence faded sometime around the 13th century with the rise of another great power on the peninsula. The kingdom of Mahapahit soon annexed whatever was left of the kingdom.

By this time, the Sukhothai kingdom had already begun to expand under the rule of King Ramkhamhaeng. Some of the territories that belonged to Srivijaya became part of the new Siamese kingdom. Most notably, the rulers of Nakhon Sri Thammarat submitted to the king of Sukhothai. The territories near the city, including Phuket, also became part of the new Siamese kingdom.

The kingdom of Mahapahit continued to exist further south below Nakhon Sri Thammarat and still dominated areas like Songkhla and Pattani for a few centuries later.

Surviving the storm

MONEY TALKS

he year ahead does not, it must be said, promise to be a repeat of 2008. The real question concerning the year ahead is not whether the financial markets will fluctuate but how they will fluctuate.

Starting with Thailand; the good news, for a change, is that we do not find ourselves in the middle of the storm currently raging around the globe. It is, however, impossible for us to avoid the storm completely. In this regard, Thailand remaining politically stable would be extremely beneficial.

Thailand must, naturally, feel the impact of falling motor vehicle exports which, some analysts believe, could drop 50% this year compared with a predicted 10% fall-off in vehicles sold on the domestic front.

The 1997 Asian Financial crisis proved beneficial to Thailand insofar as it served to "toughen up" its economy. For example, unrestricted credit issuance is no longer in evidence, and foreign exchange reserves of around US\$100 billion provide backing to the currency. Foreign liabilities are manageable and Thai government debt, at around 43% of GDP, is well below the recommended maximum of 60% of GDP.

This allows the Thai government leeway to introduce stimulus plans and mega projects. Political instability, however,

could undermine Thailand's fundamentally strong position.

At the other end of the spectrum is the UK, where it really is a case of doom and gloom. A spokesman for the consulting arm of accounting giant KPMG identified the bright spots of the UK economy as being nursing and the health care sector. Appearing on CNBC, he characterized the rest of the economy as disastrous. It doesn't get much more pessimistic than

House prices falling, consumer confidence collapsing, unemployment rising and the constant rumor that the UK is going to require a further bailout in its banking sector, makes one wonder why anyone lives there; it cannot be because of the cli-

The KPMG spokesman also pointed out that, in difficult times, the UK has procedures to slow

the termination surplus staff. Labour party governments have introduced these measures. They all sound very noble; protection of workers and the like, but the reality is that companies are less willing to

hire during economic recovery.

The American system of basic "hire and fire" remains the most efficient, and most analysts believe this will lead to the fastest recovery from the current malaise.

The majority of the world's equity markets (stockmarkets) have behaved better than most analysts predicted. The reasons for this are very simple; stockmarkets are forward looking mechanisms and are buoyed by the thought of all that government money entering their economies. It is very difficult to find any country that is not actively pur-

suing a stimulus/bailout plan.

T h e Obama plan in America is expected to initially entail the expenditure, including tax cuts, of around US\$775 billion. Many analysts believe that, in reality, it will be fortunate if it does not exceed

US\$ 1 trillion. This is, of course, in addition to the current US\$ 700 billion TARP (Troubled Asset Relief Program) that was initiated in the latter days of the Bush administration.

Whilst equity markets are encouraged by all this government money arriving in the various world economies, they continue to fret over many other factors, the main one being falling corporate profits. It is very difficult to sustain a rally in share prices when real profits are falling and unemployment is rising.

Governments can certainly inject money into economies but they are finding it difficult to persuade banks to start lending again. The banking sector, having ignored, for the past few years, all the rules relating to responsible money lending, has changed its behavior.

Now, banks are prepared to lend, providing that applicants, both corporate and private, really qualify for loans. They are seldom prepared to lend to borrowers who have anything less than a pristine record.

It echoes the old adage that "if a bank believes you qualify for a loan, in reality, you don't need the money".

Governments have injected vast sums of capital to stabilize the banking sector, while, via their central banks, also reducing the cost of borrowing. However, despite these measures, they are finding that banks are extremely reluctant to reduce interest rates.

The reality is that banks are lending but the days of aggressive lending are over, at least for a few years, while they try to repair their balance sheets.

Last year, as many of them teetered on the brink of the financial abyss, they did not relish the outlook and naturally are now looking to increase their reserves and profit margins. Additionally, banks have noted a financial environment that has been absent since the 1930s.

The bank-ing sector is also aware that the real economy is becoming steadily worse, which means that many of their customers are going to be in trouble in the coming months.

It is little wonder that we end up with a 'ping-pong' situation - where governments lend banks money and banks take the same money and buy government bonds, effectively lending it back to the same government. The appetite for risk may not have completely disappeared but it remains very muted.

The other problem is that, after governments have finished with all these stimulus plans, there is going to be a mountain of debt. However, there are ways to make money in bad times; next week's article will show three ways that proved profitable in 2008.

Updike hits another out of the park

ohn Updike published his first novel, along with a book of short stories, in 1959. He was 27 years old. Now 76, he has just published his 23rd novel, *The Widows of Eastwick* (Hamish Hamilton, London, 2008, 308pp). This is a sequel to his 11th novel The Witches of Eastwick, published in 1984.

The Witches of Eastwick was about three sexy women, all married and all adulterous, who formed a witches' coven in the old Rhode Island seaside town of Eastwick.

Alexandra is a potter, Jane a cello player and Sukie a writer for the local newspaper. They fall under the spell of a diabolical rich man named Darryl Van Horne who enjoys all of their favors and incites them to such a rage when he takes a young wife that they cast a spell upon her and inflict her with cancer.

Rare among Updike's books, *The Witches of Eastwick* was made into a major movie with Cher as Alexandra, Susan Sarandon as Jane and Michelle Pfeiffer as Sukie. Lording over them all and having the romp of his life is Jack Nicholson as that horny devil Darryl Van Horne.

Now the three women are back. They have all remarried and moved away from Eastwick. Alexandra lives in the desert of New Mexico with her potter husband. Jane has married an old WASP with money and lives in his Brookline, Massachusetts, mansion. Sukie's husband is a computer go-getter in a Connecticut suburb.


Even as a young man, Updike had a preoccupation with death and now that he is 76, even more so. His three women characters are too in their seventies, past the age of desire and confronted with death as their husbands, one by one, pass away.

Alexandra takes a trip to the Canadian Rockies after her husband's death. She joins Jane for a voyage up the Nile after Jane's own widowhood. Finally, Alexandra, Jane and Sukie take a trip to China, the trio of widows finding fun and solace in each others' company. Updike's descriptive ability is given full rein here, bringing Canada, Egypt and China vividly to life. It's odd that of his many volumes of fiction, poetry and essays, he's never written a travel book.

"Pharaohs, broad-faced and bare-shouldered, with high cheekbones and slight feline smiles, were bodied forth in granite... all quarried and carried and carved and painstakingly polished by men whose eyes and hands and even bones had long since evaporated in the cauldron of time. Life's airy spell, asking more, more, was silenced by the solemn ponderosity of death."

Jane now proposes that the three of them return to the scene of their crimes and rent a condo in Eastwick. She rejects out of hand Alexandra's invitation to New Mexico:

"Sweetie, I don't want to



come to New Mexico, I'm sorry. It's all too American, everything from the Hudson west, like something you'd switch off if it were television. But you can't, it's too big to flip off, growing all that boring wheat and corn and cattle, full of fat religious people flying flags on their pickup trucks with their shotgun racks. It's frightening to me. Like a foreign country, only worse, because you can under-

stand the language."

They find Eastwick barely changed, though many of the people they knew are either dead, have moved away or have metamorphosed hugely with the years. Their absence of over thirty years brings about a startling and fresh view on contemporary America.

"Tremember Eastwick as a fun hick place," Jane complained, "but it's gotten homogenized, all smoothed out. And the younger people, the age we were when we were here – so tiresome, just from the look of them, toned-up young mothers driving their overweight boys in overweight SUVs to hockey

practice twenty miles away, the young fathers castrated namby-pampies helping itty-bitty wifey with the housekeeping, spending all Saturday fussing around the lovely home."

Eastwick never knew what hit it as the trio of witches insert themselves back into the life of the town. A wonderful romp with the caveat that you must read the first novel first.

Barbara replies: I'm afraid "gourmet" dog food is already here – along with "gourmet" cat food, bird food and – hamster food. "Gourmet" has become marketers' adjective of choice for edibles that are fancier and costlier than average. Some of them, trying to be extra fancy, use "gourmand" instead. But that's a bad idea, because "gourmand," in addition to being a synonym for "gourmet," can mean "glutton" or "overeater."

Though regular people might use "gourmet" to refer to a person – as in "He's a gourmet cook" – they rarely describe food that way. I mean, when is the last

time someone said to you, "I baked some gourmet cookies – come try one"?

"Gourmet" applied to food is marketing-speak, which is to say, hype. I'll bet that's why it bothers you. If we were talking about, for instance, a terrine of duck with green peppercorn sauce, calling it "gourmet" would be redundant. But since we're talking about dog food, "gourmet" makes an oxymoron, a self-contradictory phrase.

Q: Why do we call someone who rapes a 'rapist,' as though his act involved some skill or talent com-

parable with that of an artist or a therapist? We say 'murderer' and 'robber,' not 'murderist' and 'robbist.' A lyricist referred to them as 'rapers,' and I appreciated that. Is there a reason for this peculiar word?"

Barbara replies: Right you are that the usual word is "rapist," not "raper." Who would ever have thought I'd need to remind anyone of that?

While searching online for the song lyrics you have in mind, though, I found "raper" in various (unpleasant) lyrics. For instance, a song by a band from

Norway has the title Mind

But enough of that. Of course you're right, too, that the relationship between artists and art, and therapists and therapy, involves skill or talent. However, the same is true of painters and painting, teachers and teaching, and many other kinds of "-er" workers and their work. (The "-or" ending of words like "sculptor" and "doctor" is a variant.)

Originally, the difference between an "-ist" person and an "-er" person depended on whether the word for what the person did came from Greek or Latin (in which case the ending was "-ist") or from Old English or a Germanic language (the ending was "-er"). Sure enough, "rape" came from Latin, or at least from a language based on it, and "murder" came from Old English. Let's not read anything cultural into that.

By now the distinction has grown blurry, and we even have a few pairs of words with slightly different meanings in which each word has one of the endings, for example, "copier" and "copyist."

In fact, some dictionaries include "raper" as a synonym of "rapist." But at least the difference between "-ist" and "-er" words isn't completely arbitrary, and there's a reason "rapist" is the traditional form.



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Regular, random fire safety inspections are a necessity

Following the New Year's fire at Bangkok's Santika Pub that has so far claimed 66 lives, it was inevitable that a nationwide crackdown on fire safety code violators would ensue and that Phuket nightclubs would come under scrutiny.

If it is possible that anything good could result from a tragedy that claimed so many young lives, perhaps the increased focus on fire safety could be it – especially if it actually minimizes the risk of similar tragedies taking place in the future.

Although exactly what started the conflagration is still under investigation, there is no doubt that Santika Pub was an accident waiting to happen – a fire trap in gross violation of numerous fire safety standards that apply to buildings in the capital.

Could a similar tragedy have happened here? You bet. Initial daytime investigations by officials at a number of popular nightspots in Phuket City revealed that all had exits that were too difficult to access, some even blocked by equipment or locked.

Knowing that nighttime inspections are coming, most club owners will probably take steps to ensure exit doors are made accessible and unlocked over the next few weeks.

This is why a year-round, regular system of random nighttime checks would go much further to ensure compliance with safety codes, not to mention the dictates of simple common sense.

Random, unannounced safety inspections are standard procedure in developed countries, where disaster prevention strategies are more of a continuous effort – and not part of the depressing cycle of calamity that seems so prevalent here: disaster > crackdown > complacency > disaster.

Anyone in Phuket who regularly visits discos, pubs and other such venues probably has their own list of fire traps that are best avoided.

Of course, not all of them are entertainment venues. Some are large retail outlets, just one of which is an expansive multi-tiered maze filled with a variety of flammable goods, its ceiling supported by irregular lengths of timber from which lightbulbs and other electrical equipment are haphazardly suspended.

The *Gazette* hopes that Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) staff and other officials at the local level across the island will take a more proactive and courageous approach in identifying and dealing with such danger spots, whether they be potential fire traps, dangerous construction projects or even public works that have fallen into a state of disrepair.

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


Sadly, I expect this idea is too simple and practical to ever be implemented here.

I'd like to teach the world to think

Dr Charles Frederickson, international teacher



Dr Charles Frederickson, aka Dr Chanchai Prasertson, is a Swedish/American/Thai international teacher who has what might best be described as a life-long bout of wanderlust. A true veteran of travel, Dr Frederickson has

visited an astounding 206 countries in search of a variety of challenges. A recognized poet and post-doctoral scholar from Columbia University, Dr Frederickson is also a self-styled teacher-trainer and cross-cultural multilingual programming expert, who has devoted the past 10 years of his life to helping others reach beyond self-imposed limits. As Thailand marked Teacher's Day on January 16, Dr Frederickson talked to the Gazette about broadening the horizons of Thailand's civic-minded leaders of the future.

he devastating 2004 tsunami changed my life or, more accurately, offered me the moment to transform my passive existence into one of "just do it!" activism and challenge. Volunteering to do whatever I could do to help ease the pain and suffering, especially of the traumatized homeless orphans, I decided to focus my positive energies on Takua Pa in Phang Nga, the area hardest hit by the destructive impact of the giant waves.

Working in co-operation with school administrators, teachers and guidance counselors, I spent the most rewarding four days of my life meeting oneon-one with more than 150 children, listening to the heartwrenching stories of those who had lost family members, and I will always cherish this uniquely moving experience.

I became so inspired by their honest, heroic accounts that I organized an 'Art & Essay' contest with winning entries, selected by the Bangkok Post, awarded certificates and picture book prizes.

In association with the Kenan Institute Asia, 404 needy secondary school students who had "fallen through the cracks" received financial aid scholarships of 5,000 baht each, deposited into teacher-monitored bank accounts, to help cover educationrelated expenses.

Since then, I have become passionately involved in expanding the horizons of our civicminded leaders of tomorrow, while also encouraging dedicated teachers to develop both creatively and professionally.

A highly successful "English for Eco-Tourism" handson training in Phuket provided a fun-filled experience for 70 agro-conscious eco-planners and 100 junior tour guides, helping them to work together to make their beloved province a greener and cleaner place.

With the generous support of Phang Nga Area Education Office Director, Sommai Chanakul, more than 400 enthusiastic primary school teachers participated in intensive workshops to hone their phonics methodology and reinforce self-confidence, while also improving the five basic skills: listening, speaking, reading, writing and innovative thinking.

A computer-based, individualized learning package entitled "Can do, will do" was field-tested successfully in more than 100 schools in Phang Nga, which now serves as one of the main

areas in an exciting pilot project currently being implemented at selected schools in the Deep

Thanks to a team effort under the astute direction of Dr Somkiat Chobphol, deputy secretary-general of the Office of Basic Education, this trilingual (Thai, English, Rumi) pilot model represents a fresh start at initiating comprehensive educational reform.

What impressed me most about the development training workshop, held in Haad Yai during March, was the collective sense of commitment, positive

energy and common purpose exhibited by everyone involved. The extremely receptive participants included one administrator and one teacher from each of the 27 focus community schools in Narathiwat, Yala, Pattani, Songkla and Satun, who worked together with education area supervisors, Ministry of Education level advisors and experienced facilitators as a unified three R's (respectful rural renaissance) team.

The basic IT components, already field-tested in Phang Nga and subsequently revised by experts, have been combined into a multilingual package entitled "Mahasungsonpatanachonaboat" or All Our Kids (A-OK).

The comprehensive demonstration model starts by constructing a firm foundation with solid building blocks intended to enable each and every one of the 1,327 'Pratom one' participants to learn how to think for themselves.

Evaluations of this innovative "fun" project will be based on individual progress and "Can do, will do" supplementary skill development achievement, with plans to expand its remit to all 13 southern provinces, beginning with the new school year in May.

We will then collect it and transfer it to the Phuket City municipality. It is important that you do not destroy it yourself or dispose of it by burying it in the ground.





Yes, you CAN undelete pictures on your camera

KHUN WOODY'S COMPUTER

ast week a good friend of mine called me in a panic. He had just returned from Italy, where he had shot some fabulous pictures with his fancy Canon. There was just one problem. Somehow, while transferring the pictures from the camera to his computer, everything went haywire. The 200-or-so gorgeous, once-in-a-lifetime shots had disappeared from his camera's memory card and from his computer.

In the past I've written in this column about "undeleting" pictures from a camera – bringing back deleted pictures from the brink when you're sure they're gone forever. Invariably, I get dozens of responses from grateful and relieved Phuketniks who manage to salvage memories that seemed irretrievably lost. In this column, I want to tell you about a tremendous new program that brings back more pictures than ever before – and the best thing: it's absolutely free.

First things first: if you've accidentally deleted pictures on a camera, *don't use the camera*. Don't turn it on. Don't plug it into your computer. If the memory card is already out of the camera, don't put it back in the camera. In short, chill out and read the rest of this column before you try anything.

Of all the Windows tricks I've encountered over the years, this one has saved so many people, so many times, that you should seriously consider cutting out this column and stuffing it in your camera bag.

If you accidentally delete pictures on a digital camera, Windows can help you get them back. The method isn't entirely foolproof, but if you just deleted the shots of the family reunion, and you didn't keep a backup, there is hope yet.

Cameras don't have fancy file systems. They use the plain,

old, simple File Allocation Table (FAT) approach pioneered in the original version of DOS, about a hundred years ago (rumor has it that Bill Gates himself wrote much of the code for FAT). Camera FAT works with memory cards much like DOS FAT worked with floppy disks and, later, those "gigantic" 2 MB hard drives

While FAT has few redeeming social values, one of its great virtues lies in the way that it deletes files. Er sorry, I mean in the way it doesn't delete files. Cameras, via FAT, divide up their memory card space into fixed-size chunks. When you take a picture, the camera grabs enough unused sections of the memory card to hold the picture. It then transfers the picture from the camera's computer to the card, marking the chunks of memory as being "in use". Easy.

When you tell your camera to delete a picture, it doesn't really delete anything. It just

changes the first character of the file name to a reserved character that signifies, in effect, "the next time you need a chunk of memory, you can use all of the pieces that used to belong to this picture." The camera continues to use all of the space on your memory card, but when it runs out of room, goes back and looks for segments that have been marked available for re-use.

That's why you don't want to do anything to your camera, or its memory card, until you're ready to retrieve the "deleted" pictures – the ones that haven't been erased after all. If you mess around with "mother nature", you may over-write parts of good, albeit "deleted", pictures with new images.

File undelete programs take advantage of the fact that the data – your picture – isn't actually deleted until the camera needs to re-use the space on the memory card. With a bit of luck, you can recover pictures that you

took a long, long time ago. Here's how to get the pictures back:

- 1. Don't use the camera! More precisely, don't use the memory card that holds the pictures. Every time you use the memory card on some cameras, every time you stick the memory card back in the camera you stand the chance of overwriting some of your old photos.
- 2. Download Recuva, pronounced "recover", at www. recuva.com. In Windows XP, double-click on the downloaded file to install the program. In Vista, you may need to right-click the file and choose 'Run' as administrator. Be patient, the installer takes a while.
- 3. If you have a card reader attached to your PC, take the card out of the camera, flip the write-protect tab to 'lock', so nothing can be written to the card, and put it in the card reader. If you

don't have a card reader, attach the camera to your PC. In either case, if Windows pops up and offers to do something for you (such as copying the files into your PC), exit ('X') out of the AutoPlay dialogue box.

- 4. Click 'Start', then 'Programs' (in Vista, it's 'All Programs'), and finally 'Recuva', then 'Recuva' again. You'll then get the Recuva Wizard. Click 'Next'.
- 5. Follow the steps in the Wizard to choose the kind of files you want to recover (in this case, 'Pictures'), and point to the media card. On the final Wizard screen, check the box marked 'Enable Deep Scan', and click 'Start'.
- 6. It may take a while, but in the end Recuva presents you with a list of recoverable files. Check the boxes next to the files you want to recover, and click the 'Recover' button. It's that easy.

New race course set for popular sailing regatta



ew race course details have been set for the very popular Phang Nga Bay annual sailing regatta. The event, which is about to enter its 12th year, normally attracts up to 50 yachts and 300 sailors.

Organizing committee member Vicki Gregory said that at least 40 yachts had already registered for the regatta, which runs from

January 26 till January 30, 2009.

"Interest in the regatta is very high, which is fabulous, especially given the state of the world economy. Many of those planning to take part are also from overseas," Ms Gregory said.

The registration and opening party will take place on January 26 at the new Ao Por Grand Marina.

The marina is situated at the north-eastern end of Phuket Island and within easy striking distance of the northern section of Phang Nga Bay.

The regatta proper will begin on January 27 and follow a route north to the top of Phang Nga Bay to the new pier facility at Laem Sak. The first night's party, hosted by Raimon Land, will be at the Laem Sak Seafood Restaurant.

On January 28 the regatta turns south to the secluded island of Koh Yao Noi finishing with a beach party, sponsored by Kingsfisher Beer, at the stunning Paradise Koh Yao. The following day the regatta will head west to the stunning Railay Beach in Krabi. The route takes the fleet either over the top of or through

the magical karsts of the Koh Hong Group. That night's destination will be the lovely Sand-Sea Resort. Day four will see the fleet crossing the open waters of Phang Nga Bay and under Koh Yao Yai to Phuket. The site of the closing party is currently under negotiation.

"The regatta is hugely popular because, unlike other regattas, it follows a course with a different stop-over each night, which has proved very popular with sailors. And then of course, there is the scenery which has made the region famous throughout the world. The night-time parties are almost as famous," said Ms Gregory.

Only 60 yachts are allowed to compete each year. "We have had to put a ceiling on the numbers because the anchorages in certain bays are limited.

It is also much more difficult to cater for a regatta that follows a course over four days taking in four different night stops," she said.


Major sponsors so far include Raimon Land, QBE, Kingfisher Beer, Ao Por Grand Marina, and SEA Yachting.

Lightening strikes twice: two holes-inone in the same round at Blue Canyon

PHUKET: Long-term Phuket resident John Connelly etched his name into Phuket golfing folklore on January 3, defying astronomical odds, by carding two holesin-one in a single round of golf at Phuket's Blue Canyon Country Club.

A *Golf Digest* estimate published several years ago, calculated that the odds of achieving such a feat are about 67 million-to-one. The phenomenon occurred on the 2nd and 17th holes of the Canyon course, both par threes, measuring 218 and 224 yards, respectively. Connelly, an American with a handicap of 13, was playing off the championship





tees in a threesome with friends Jimmy Nixon and David Kelleway, both of whom play off a handicap of six. Remarkably, earlier the same week, the 58-year-old Connelly, who had been playing golf for more than 30 years without even seeing a hole in one, witnessed his first-ever 'ace' when playing partner Greg Hoing nailed one with a 5-iron on the 175-yard 8th hole on Blue Canyon's Lakes Course.

For the superstitious, it should be noted that Jimmy Nixon, present for all three, is a veteran of no less than four holesin-one

Perhaps John Connelly was in good company. But exalted company and supernatural influences cannot solely account for two holes-in-one, by one man, during a single game of golf. Quality of play was also a factor.

John told the *Gazette* that after securing the first ace in his life, his overriding thought was, "great – now you have it; but wouldn't it be nice to post a decent score [as well]? For me, from these [championship] tees I'm thinking sub 90. My best-ever is an 86." After his second hole-in-one on the 17th, he carded an 84 for the day.



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Construction update Kathu

Golfers' residence tees off in Kathu

athu Golf Condo by Kermit Development is a six-storey residential development currently underway in Kathu Valley. Located adjacent to the Phuket Country Club golf course, the resort-style condominium complex will feature a 48 fairway view, and six-pool view from the luxury apartments.

Construction began in November 2008 and is expected to be completed by May 2010. The condominium will be professionally managed and includes an optional rental scheme. The development is being marketed at vacationers on golfing-holidays or business people in need of fully-serviced apartments.

Construction is being carried out by Southern Architects and Construction Co. and covers a total area of one rai. It will comprise 54 condominium units, 40 of which are available for ownership with 49% for foreign freehold ownership. The remaining 51% is, in accordance with Thai law, available for Thai freehold or leasehold ownership. Potential owners have the option of purchasing a unit with one bedroom and one bathroom or two bedrooms and two bathrooms, although a third bedroom can be added. The living areas range from 72.52 to 160.32 square meters, including the balconies. Prices for the units start at 3.9 million baht.

Each unit is positioned to give panoramic views of the golf course and will come with a fully-equipped kitchen, a large master bedroom with en-suite bathroom and balcony access. Other features provided include air conditioning throughout, cable and/or satellite television, IDD telephone (2 lines) and WiFi Internet access.

Apart from the golf course, the development will include communal facilities, such as a gymnasium and fitness center, indoor parking, sauna, swimming pool, and Guy Ritchie's pool-side bar which will serve drinks & snacks. The condominium will also feature 24-hour security and reception. Car hire will also be available, plus a laundry service and private in-room massage.

reetings! This week, we'll discuss installing a bathroom towel rack. Sounds easy, but there are a few little things to remember that will help make it the perfect installation.

You will need: a towel rack, an electric drill with two masonry bits, plastic "anchors", screws, screwdriver, a sharp nail or punch, a very sharp pencil, flashlight, hammer and several cotton swabs (trust me).

First, a word about Thai construction methods. Thai concrete building blocks are smaller, with thinner walls, than those used in the West. More importantly, they are also cast from softer concrete, with less density (more air pockets). This impacts on the installation of anything that requires drilling and installing anchors into them.

Most Thai bathrooms are tiled roughly halfway from the floor to the ceiling. Racks can be installed on the tiled or the concrete portion of the wall. If you install it on the tiled section, try to align the screw holes within the mortar joints between the tiles, or, if possible, at the corners of four tiles. This helps avoid cracking the tiles.

Where to put it: it should not interfere with any doors (bathroom door, cabinets, etc.); it should be out of the way of any shower spray and, for those with little ones, it should be easily accessible.

Take off and examine the

end pieces. Most of the basic models will be made from cast plastic. Now look at the back. There should be reinforcing ribs cast into the plastic, but some brands neglect this.

Notice how little plastic "meat" is around the screw hole. It is important that the screw holes line up perfectly with the holes. If even slightly off, the screws will be on an angle, causing the heads of the screws to transfer more weight on to less than the whole area designed to bear it. This can result in cracking and breaking the end piece. Result: one ruined towel rack.

Next, the screws included with the rack are typically minimal in size. You can usually go up one size, to increase the size of the screw head that will bear the weight against the plastic, but check that size will fit into the holes.

A snug fit is okay, as the threads of the screws will cut slightly into the plastic for a tighter fit. If the next size up is too large, use the screws provided. Larger screws need larger anchors. These are the off-white plastic plugs installed into the drilled holes, which the screws are then threaded into.

The key to this whole installation is to cleanly drill the holes the right size, so that the anchors fit snugly. Too large a hole and they will fit too loosely, turning with the screw when it is installed instead of staying wedged in place. If the hole is too small, they will crush when you attempt to install them, and you will have to extract them and re-drill a larger hole.

Assemble the towel rack, and hold it in the location you've chosen. Take your pencil, and outline the outer corner of each end piece on the wall, then insert the point into the screw holes, marking their location. Trace the whole circle of the screw hole on the wall. If you just make a mark, the pencil point

may mark off-center, making the screw holes vertically misaligned when drilled. Outlining the complete hole allows you to see it when you remove the rack and center the drill's bit within the circles. Before lowering the rack, take the flashlight and peer into the holes to see if you did indeed get the whole circle. See why you need a flashlight?

Now, the drilling. Masonry bits are the types with two "flanges" protruding from the tips. Spend a little extra money and buy good ones imported from the USA, Germany, or Switzerland. They are stronger, stay sharp and last much longer. The correct size is where the width of the flanges (not the shaft) is the same width as the anchor.

Start with a bit about two

sizes smaller than required. New bits are sharper, cut immediately, and thus avoid "skating" away from the intended spot, especially on a smooth, hard surface like tile.

Hold the drill in position, but *not* touching the wall. Trigger it, then bring it up to the wall, centering the bit within the circle, and press gently, but straight in. Smooth and straight is the key here, letting the bit, not your shoulder, do the work. Drill only slightly more than the length of the anchor (about half an inch) then reverse. Work the bit carefully in and out a few times to clear the concrete dust.

Replace the bit with the correctly sized one and repeat the procedure. If drilling into the concrete portion of the wall, or the mortar between tiles, use the hammer and nail to make a slight "dimple" as a good starting point for the bit. Use a swab to clear dust out, as even a little can make a difference in the anchor's fit.

Start the anchors in by hand and then lightly tap it the rest of the way in with the hammer, straight and even so it doesn't bend, until flush with the surface. If you drilled into tiles, hold a scrap of light cardboard (like the back of a notebook) or thin piece of wood over it to avoid chipping the tiles with the hammer head.

Hold your rack up to the corner outlines you've marked, (easier to see than the holes), insert the screws, and tighten. Hang your towels and voila! Another successful job! Have a beer! See you next time!

n spite of recent political is sues in Bangkok and a worsening of global financial downturn, the upscale luxury villa segment outperformed the broader Phuket property market in 2008.

As we move into 2009, take-up rates are expected to soften with a "wait and see" attitude prevailing among many potential buyers.

The following is a compilation of recently completed market research on trends and performance of upscale villa developments, those with units priced at 65 million baht and above.

In this week's column we will examine some general trends in the market.

Next week we will continue with a more in-depth look at some of the factors influencing supply and demand in this important market segment.

Market Outlook & Trends

-The luxury villa sector continues to outperform the property market in general.

-Global financial turmoil and political worries in Thailand have impacted fourth quarter villa sales in 2008 and may also result in a slow start in the first quarter of 2009.

-For purchasers – investors or developers with capital – there will be opportunities to benefit from any temporary softening.

-Our medium term outlook for Phuket's luxury villa market remains positive.

-Branded developments continue to enter the market, with additional product coming on-line.

-Tight credit conditions may cause project delays and a slowing of sales pace in the near term.

-Availability of coastal land in prime west coast areas of Phuket continues to shrink, pushing new developments to the north and east in search of ocean views.

-Luxury villa supply remains strong, with over 300 units priced over 65 million baht in the market. However, new supply is limited.

Forward Outlook

-As availability of prime land continues to shrink, smaller "boutique" developments will become increasingly common.

-The marina market will continue to develop along Phuket's east coast.

-Upcoming luxury supply includes some prestigious branded newcomers to Phuket.

-Evolving sectors in the tourism industry continue to introduce a new set of potential investors to the real estate market.

-Infrastructure development continues to support highend tourism and luxury residential projects.

Destination Overview

Phuket is one of Asia's premier destinations and is well regarded among villa purchasers.

The market has shown steady growth in both visitor arrivals and real estate values over the past decade. This is expected to continue over the upcoming decade as accessibility and hospitality offerings continue to improve.


In economic terms, we expect Phuket to continue to show healthy transaction rates in the 65-million-baht plus range, as the island has the advantage of attracting buyers seeking high-quality villas.

Because so many buyers are from abroad, the vast majority of purchases are cash based, so access to credit or debt servicing are not issues among this group.

Furthermore, current and upcoming supply in the luxury segment is limited and few undeveloped prime sea-front sites remain; factors which will continue to stimulate demand among potential purchasers.

As such, our medium-term outlook on the Phuket market remains positive.

In recent months, Thailand

has been buffeted by the combination of global financial turmoil and local political upheaval, both of which have shaken confidence in the Phuket property market.

No market has immunity from such events and it is likely that we will see some short-term effects in terms of on-going development progress and new launches, as well as a slowdown in sales pace.

Phuket is a premier destination in its own right and, per-

haps arguably, constitutes a distinct residential market in the Thai context as well.

During the recent closure of the two Bangkok airports, Phuket remained open for business and was useful to some as an alternative air transport hub.

This shows the growing significance of the island and reflects a certain measure of separation from issues faced in other parts of the country.

Given the diminishing sup-

ply of west coast land with sea views in southern and central parts of the island, there are new areas to watch in the luxury villa segment. These include the following:

East Coast

Developers seeking out new areas with sea views have moved into locations along Phuket's east coast. With high-profile projects including Jumeirah Private Island, Taj Exotica and The Yamu, the east coast with its unique views of Phang Nga Bay is a developing story in the Phuket property market.

Mai Khao

As beachfront land has become scarce elsewhere on Phuket, Mai Khao has become an attractive location for developers.

The Anantara Phuket recently opened on Mai Khao beach, joining the established JW Marriott and Sala properties. This area is poised to be a significant destination, with increasing critical mass to the hotel pipeline including properties from Holiday Inn, Outrigger and Renaissance.

Greater Phuket

The lack of beachfront real estate on Phuket itself – as well as the availability of larger land parcels for high-end resort development and large mixed-use projects along Natai Beach in Thai Muang and even closer to Phuket in Takua Thung's tambon Khok Kloi – has resulted in a trend towards high-end development and premium hotels in southern Phang Nga. Examples of this include Aleenta and Sava Natai, while the announcement of the Raffles villa project has cemented this area as one to watch.

In next week's column we will look at some of the socioeconomic and political trends influencing supply and demand in the market for luxury villas.


