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More fires at Jintana Plaza

PATONG: Phuket was rocked last week by two major fires that hit the Jintana Plaza shopping arcade in the space of just four days, causing an estimated 15 million baht in damages. Police strongly suspect the blazes – the fifth and sixth at the arcade since it opened – to be the work of arsonists.

The first fire was reported at about 4 am on Friday February 14. Eight fire engines, including four from Patong Municipality, converged on the center, located on the beach road near Loma Park.

The first blaze, which officials believe was started at different parts of the building, quickly spread through more than 200 stalls. The center was full of clothes, decorations and other tourist-related items that quickly fueled the fast-growing blaze. It took firefighters two hours to quell the inferno. Damage was estimated at about 10 million baht.

The fire also left the stretch of the beach road wrecked and without power, causing some local residents to recall conditions along the road following the tsunami disaster in 2004.

Duty Officer Jongsrame Preecha of Kathu Police said after the first fire this week that it was the fifth suspected case of arson at the Jintana Center.

'Last year alone there

were three cases of arson at the center and Miss Komkai was shot dead," he said, in reference to the mafia-style murder of center heiress Komkai Kositoon in July last year.

The land that the center stands on is highly valuable, with stall rental costs ranging between 20,000 and 30,000 baht per month.

Suspicions of arson were heightened when a second fire broke out just two days later at a different part of the sprawling arcade. The second fire, which broke out at around the same time of day as the first, took firefighters about an hour to put out. About 100 more stalls were destroyed. Damage was estimated at about 5 million baht. No injuries were reported in either blaze.

Police believe the fires could be related to a dispute over the inheritance of center owner Jintana Buringoht's multi-billion baht estate, as she is ill following a stroke.

However, Kathu Police Superintendent Grissak Songmoonark on February 17 said police were not ruling out other possible motives.

In a possibly related development, Phuket City Police on Tuesday February 17 took into custody a village headman from Pattalung province, who is a suspect in the Komkai killing.

The fugitive suspect, 47year-old Wiroj "Plop" Issara, surrendered himself to Police Region 8 Commander Santarn Chayanon on February 17.

One man has already been arrested for the Komkai killing. The hired gunman, 39-year-old Arun Chanma, was arrested in Krabi in December last year, and confessed to carrying out the assassination along with two other men, who also remain at large.

Shortly after Mr Arun's arrest, arrest warrants on charges of conspiracy to commit murder were issued for Mr Wiroj and five other men, all of whom remain at large.

Police urged the press not to jump to conclusions that the murder case and the suspected arson attacks were necessarily directly linked.

Speaking on the state-run MCOT network, Kathu Police Superintendent Grissak Songmoonark on February 17 said the investigation was still ongoing and police were considering all potential motives – including the possibility of an inheritance dispute among family members related to Mrs Jintana.



Karon Beach cables going underground

KARON: The Phuket Office of the Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) has announced plans to lay a new underground electric power cable from Karon Circle to Kata Beach.

Work is scheduled to begin in July and to be completed by the end of the year.

At a joint press conference held on February 12, the PEA and Karon Municipality announced that the 1.9-kilometer conduit will cost around 43.6 million baht.

The project will be jointly funded, with the PEA paying 24.2 million baht and Karon Municipality the remainder.

The work contract is divided into two parts. The construction engineer will sign an agreement with Karon Municipality, while the PEA will enter into a separate contract for provision of new power lines.

The PEA has already researched and designed Phase Two of the project, which will

extend the conduit 600 meters to Kata Noi. Phase Two work is slated to begin in 2010.

The announcement is the second of its type on the island in recent months, following the December 22 signing of a memorandum of understanding between Phuket City and the PEA to bury power lines along a 300-meter stretch of Thalang Road in Old Phuket Town, at a cost of 11 million baht.

Immigration law updated



PHUKET CITY: Phuket Immigration Superintendent Police Colonel Chanatpol Yongbunjerd has confirmed the introduction of a new law requiring foreigners holding Non-Immigrant visas to undertake their 90-day registrations at the Immigration offices in the area that they are registered as living.

The new law came into effect nationwide on February 15. However, Col. Chanatpol said that as many foreigners may not yet be aware of the rule change, Immigration officials would initially forward 90-day registrations to the correct offices for processing, if the visa holder applied at an Immigration office other that the one where he or she is registered as living.

"He or she will still need to return to their district of residence to complete their 90-day registration," he said.

Phuket facing dengue threat

PHUKET CITY: This year could see a severe outbreak of dengue fever in Phuket if action is not taken to eradicate mosquito breeding grounds, the Phuket Provincial Public Health Office has

Comparing the local infection rate in early 2009 with those of the five preceding years shows a higher rate than normal, health office chief Dr Pongsawas Ratanasang said.

Random inspections in every district in January found mosquito larvae in over 10% of residencies, more than had been expected. The larvae were also present in schools, nurseries, temples, mosques and workplaces, he said.

Mosquito larvae were most commonly found in water containers in toilets, saucers under flowerpots, vases and general water storage receptacles.

So far in 2009 there have been 15 dengue cases in the province, with no deaths. But comparing this infection rate with those of the previous five years (2004 2008), this is higher than the norm.

In 2008, there were 769 cases of dengue fever, with two deaths from the disease, or 0.26% of those infected.

Comparing this rate with other provinces, Phuket has the 12th highest infection rate in the country. People in the 10- to 14year-old bracket had the most infections, followed by 15- to 24year-olds. The areas with the highest infection rates were, in descending order: Karon, Kamala, Patong, Koh Kaew and Wichit.

Entertainment venues ordered to conform to new safety standards

PHUKET CITY: Entertainment venues in 14 provinces around the south of Thailand have been put on notice to ensure they measure up to new government safety regulations or face the consequences. Addressing a press conference at the Phuket Merlin Hotel on February 13, Deputy Minister of the Interior Thavorn Senniam announced deadlines for entertainment venues around the region to fall into compliance with the new ministerial regulations.

The new measures were not designed to deter investors, he said, but rather to regain people's confidence and trust in the safety of the venues in ques-

A dedicated inspection team will be set up to monitor compliance with the regulations, while the ministry will publish an "Entertainment venue inspection manual", advising owners and operators of entertainment venues on how to meet the new requirements. The inspection team will pay specific attention to fire safety measures, including the deployment and location of fire extinguishers, fire exits, fire alarms, entrances and exits, and so on. The team will report its findings directly to the Minister of the Interior.

Deputy Minister Thavorn said the ministry will offer advice and guidelines to the entertainment venues. This will help them to make the necessary improvements and upgrades on time. Entertainment venues need to work in cooperation with the government to ensure that an accident like the one that occurred at the Santika pub in Bangkok will never happen again, he said. Once they had regained the trust of the people, their businesses would benefit, he added.

Following an inspection, the owners of entertainment venues would have seven days to carry out the necessary upgrades and improvements demanded by the inspection team. In the event that the changes were not completed within the stipulated seven-day period, the venue would risk having its operating licence revoked.

It is not the government's intention to close down entertainment buildings but simply to check that all venues adhere to the highest standards of safety and security, said the Deputy Minister. The government wants to send a clear message to tourists that they can trust the safety standards of the places they visit. It should not be about inspecting and forcing operators to meet these standards, but instead about advising them, step by step, how to act in their own and everyone's best interests, he added.

The South of Thailand currently has 974 licensed entertainment venues. Within the region, Phuket tops the list with 345. Designated entertainment zones have been set up to group all the venues in one area, ensuring peace and quiet in cultural and residential areas. Additionally, entertainment zones may not be located near schools, universities or temples.

New Ministry of the Interior regulations for entertainment venues, as from February 13 2009

- 1. Entertaining venue to have same name as that specified on license card
- 2. Boundaries of the entertainment venue to be clear.
- 3. Employees present to check ID cards and age of customers on
- 4. License card to be clearly displayed.
- 5. Staff to be registered and copy sent to district/sub-district.
- 6. Staff to be 18 years old and over.
- 7. Customers to be 20 years old and over.
- 8. No sex shows.
- 9. No weapons in the venue other than those of government officers in uniform.
- 10. Venue to open and close according to specified times.
- 11. Enough light to see other people from a distance of 1.5 meters.
- 12. Enough toilets, divided into male and female.
- 13. Venue to be clean.
- 14. Special rooms within the venue to have room numbers. If the door is not see-through, door to have rectangular window, 5 x 20
- 15. No forced or child prostitution.
- 16. Venue to have fire extinguishers, no fewer than one per 1000 square meters of floor space.
- 17. Venue to have suitable fire alarm system.
- 18. Venue to have appropriate fire escapes.
- 19. Venue to have appropriate ventilation.
- 20. Venue to control customer entry to prevent overcrowding
- 21. Venue to display map showing positions of fire extinguishers, fire escapes, entrances, exits and fire doors.
- 22. Venue to include signs showing fire escapes, entrances, exits
- 23. Venues are advised to have accident insurance for custom-
- 24. Venues larger than 200 square meters must arrange inspections to ensure compliance with the law.



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PAD deployed

PHUKET: Approximately 20 of Phuket's People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) supporters traveled to Udon Thani to attend a PAD meeting on February 14.

Udon Thani is a stronghold of the People's Power Party (PPP). The Phuket PAD supporters used Bangkok registered license plates to avoid possible confrontations and returned to Phuket the next day. There were no reported disrup-tions. However, there was resistance from the local police, many of whom served under Thaksin Shinawatra's regime, said a PAD spokesperson, adding that there had been no PAD meetings in Phuket since protesters disbanded after over running Bangkok and Phuket's airports in

Death by dog leash

PATONG, PHUKET: Kathu Police are treating the death of a 36-year-old British man whose body was discovered in a Patong guesthouse as suicide.

Kathu Police reported finding Robert William Hilton hanged by the neck with a red dog leash suspended from the bathroom doorknob in a third-floor room of Baan Siam Guesthouse, Soi Banzaan, on the morning of February 12.

According to Kathu Police, asphyxiation was the cause of Mr Hilton's death and he had been dead for about three hours before police arrived at the scene.

Mr Hilton's death was reported to police at about 4am by 30-year-old Sisaket native Sommai Deejai. Police said there were no signs of foul play. Mr Hilton's body was sent to Patong Hospital by rescue workers.

Ms Sommai told police that she, Mr Hilton and a group of friends had been out enjoying the nightlife on Soi Bangla earlier that evening when Mr Hilton left the group. Ms Sommai told police that she and Mr Hilton's had argued earlier that night, but not violently.

Historic wall demolished by developer

PHUKET CITY: A 105-year-old Sino-Portuguese wall in Phuket's old town was demolished by construction workers on February 3 to make way for commercial buildings.

The wall, on Krabi Road, had formed the perimeter of Prapitak Chinpracha estate, built in 1904.

On February 3, Capt Bunyarit Chaisuwan, an archaeologist at the Fine Arts Region 15 Office in Phuket, received a report that a section of the wall had already been demolished.

He called project owner Wisit Ittiwarapornkul and tried to persuade him to halt the destruction, saying the wall was of historic interest and was protected by law.

Despite this, the wall was completely demolished later that day. Capt Bunyarit reported the incident at Phuket City Police Station, where it was recorded in the daily log.

Mr Wisit had purchased the land on which the wall stood from a senior member of the Tantawanit family at a cost of 28 million baht. Other members of that family were unsuccessful in buying back the land from Mr Wisit at a higher price.

Work on the project, begun last October, is expected to be completed by mid 2009.

Old Phuket Town Foundation President Dr Prasit Koysiripong said the developer had made some concessions to make the appearance of the buildings attractive, such as by reducing them from four stories to just three.

The Foundation will cite the incident in urging the municipality to establish new building

regulations for the old quarter, he said. Mr Wisit told the *Gazette* that he did not think it necessary to respond to concerns about the fate of the wall as he had bought the land legally and, once in possesion, it was up to him how to develop it. Parts of the wall were damaged before construction began, he said.

"I don't understand why people are only now saying I'm a destroyer of archaeological finds when the issue should have been raised when plans for the new building were first announced over a year ago. If it was going to be a problem, I should have been given some kind of official notice," he said.

Mr Wisit added that the municipality had long been aware of the plans to redevelop the site, which were detailed in the design plans posted at the construction site more than a year ago. The plan shows the two commercial buildings – and no wall.

Brit could face life for drug possession charges

KAMALA, PHUKET: A British man is still being held by police and could face life in jail after being arrested at a police checkpoint in Kamala on February 4 for posession of a variety of illegal drugs.

David Kevin Griffin, 49, was driving toward Patong when he was stopped by Kamala Police officers at around 1:45 am at a checkpoint in Nanok Village.

According to police, Mr Griffin was in possession of a total of 16.48 grams of cocaine di-

vided into 11 sealable plastic bags, 10 bags of *yah ice* (crystal meth), weighing 16.3 grams, and three grams of marijuana.

Police said they also discovered drug-taking paraphernalia in a hip bag in the car and 22,470 baht in cash.

Police later searched Mr Griffin's house in Tambon Thepkrassatri and said they found 8.25 grams of dried marijuana and 29.96 grams of marijuana resin.

Mr Griffin confessed to

charges of possession of a Class 5 drug (marijuana). However, he has denied the much more serious charge of possession of two Class 1 drugs (cocaine and *yah ice*) with intent to supply.

If eventually found guilty, Mr Griffen could be sentenced from between five years to life in prison and fined 50,000 baht.

A report in the Manchester Evening News stated that Mr Griffin was a resident of Greater Manchester and had been living in Phuket for four years.





Cockfighting tradition's uncertain future

he bloodsport of cock-fighting dates back over 4,000 years: the concept of pitting two game-cocks against one another was a popular pastime of the Indus Valley Civilization in 2,000 BC. Since its inception, rearing cocks for fighting has become a tradition that has spread across every continent and attracted large crowds, keen to view the spectacle and gamble on its bloody outcome.

Asia has long been a hotbed for the sport, particularly in the Asian subcontinent and Southeast Asia, with Thailand no exception. While a number of countries, particularly in Europe and the US, have banned cockfighting because of animal cruelty, it remains popular in the "Land of Smiles", which reportedly has approximately 500 cockfighting dens.

In general, gambling is prohibited by law in the Kingdom. Cockfighting, however, remains an exception, as decreed in the Gambling Act (*Praratchabanyat Garnpanan*) of 1935, provided it takes place in a sanctioned and licensed venue. The Act stated that governors have the right to legalize cockfighting dens within

their province. The dens must be registered with the state and adhere to strict legislation regarding gambling.

Somkid Kalasuwan, a law assistant in the Investigation and Legal Affairs Bureau of the Department of Provincial Administration under the Ministry of Interior, told the *Gazette*, "Cockfighting gambling dens can obtain permission to operate from the district chief. The decision whether or not to allow people access to cockfighting and gam-

bling ultimately rests with the governor."

Cockfighting (tee kai or chon kai) is illegal in Phuket and has been for the past six years. Former Governor Udomsak Uswarangkura outlawed the practice on the basis that he didn't want the bloodsport tarnishing the image of a tourist-reliant area like Phuket.

It would be naive, however, to think Phuket does not possess its fair share of underground dens. Villagers communicate in secret to

set up clandestine cockfights, risking arrest and prosecution in the pursuit of their beloved pastime.

Although the sport itself is outlawed in Phuket, the rearing and training of gamecocks is not. Banpot "Ko Nguan" Tourrob, 51, runs a gamecock training camp in Kathu that is home to 40 birds. As well as the camp, he owns legal fighting dens in Krabi and Phang Nga, two areas synonymous with cockfighting in Thailand.

He told the *Gazette* that, in addition to buying gamecocks for fighting, he also breeds them. At the camp in Kathu the gamecocks are nurtured until they reach an age of 10 months, at which point they are sent to the dens in Krabi and Phang Nga.

The prime age for a fighting cock is between 10 months and three years old. Once a gamecock is past its prime, it is retained to help train the younger fighters by providing a target for the new cocks to chase. The cocks are fed a diet of cactus pulp soaked in honey and bran to increase their strength and size.

Ko Nguan revealed the motivation behind training the

cocks to fight. "If a cock fights well and is successful, up to 200,000 baht can be wagered on it in a single fight," he said.


He doesn't subscribe to the belief that the sport is cruel. "Cocks are by nature fighting animals, so we allow them to fight. If we don't do what we do, they will be used as food anyway. We are giving the cocks a longer life," he revealed.


In Thailand, cockfighting can be split into two categories: cocks that are armed with fake spurs made from horns – replacing the ones that occur naturally at the backs of their legs – and cocks that fight au naturel.

Ko Nguan believes that the way his cocks fight – with the spurs – is far more humane. "It may appear more brutal because they're wearing spurs. Bouts where the cocks have no spurs last longer and the cocks sustain many injuries, none of which is fatal, meaning it will suffer more," he said.

"With spurs, the fights are much quicker and the loser generally dies so it doesn't suffer for a long time," he added.

Cockfighting forms an inte-

gral part of Thai culture and has done so for many years, but as we move into a more enlightened age, many people are beginning to question the sport's cruelty.

A typical cockfight can last up to two hours; three 20 minute rounds with 20 minutes rest in between or four 15 minute rounds with 15 minutes rest in between. The gamecocks are dressed in colorful garments, making them more visible to their opponents. Often during the course of fights, the cocks are blinded, suffer bru-

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tal injuries and fight until their owner concedes the contest or until they die.

A letter issued by the Ministry of the Interior decreed that cockfighting must do more to reduce the cruelty of the sport. This is a belief that is echoed by a number of animal welfare projects in the Kingdom, namely the Thai Animal Guardians Association (Thai AGA), which is based in Bangkok.

Roger Lohanan, Chairman of the Thai AGA, told the *Ga*-

zette, "Thailand does not have a set of nationwide laws to govern cockfighting. The cockfighting dens are allowed to regulate themselves, which frequently results in inconsistency in animal protection."

Thai AGA have been working alongside the Department of Livestock Development, as well as organizations from abroad, notably from the USA and England, to introduce legislation that will impact upon all animals in the Kingdom, not

just cockfighting birds.

"This legislation is aimed at anybody who keeps animals – be they pets, animals for farming, for sport and so on – to ensure that they adhere to the law with regard to animal welfare. To give an example, this statute will insist that an animal's living space and living conditions are adequate," Lohanan said.

Although drafted to cover all animals, the bill is especially targeted at cockfighting. It regulates the duration of fights and introduces rules to determine when fights should be stopped to reduce blindness, wounding and bleeding.

It is hoped that these regulations will halt the spread of cockfighting dens across the Kingdom, if not reduce their numbers.

The problem facing the animal welfare campaigners is that this legislation has languished in the system for the past eight years, with Thaksin's populist government unwilling to act on the issue and political turbulence preventing further action since the 2006 coup. Despite numerous setbacks, the two organizations are hopeful that under the new Abhisit government the statute will become a reality.

Also impeding Thai AGA's progress is the influence of powerful cockfighting enthusiasts. There are many Thai politicians and celebrities who love the sport and are eager to see it flourish. A major concern is that interest in

the sport will pass onto a new generation, resulting in an increase in the number of new cockfighting dens.

Another worry for Thai AGA is the potential for the spread of disease, particularly bird flu, which was a cause for much concern in Thailand in 2003/2004. Some 60 million chickens died during the epidemic that cost eight people their lives. Cockfighting was seen as a major reason behind the spread of avian influenza.

"We struggled to stop bird flu from spreading because of the number of fighting cocks that were taken to different parts of the country transmitting the disease to each other," Roger Lohanan said.

To counter the disease, the Thaksin government ordered the closure of all cockfighting dens. Ko Nguan, however, believes that closing the dens had an adverse effect. "We had to stop the dens for a year. Meanwhile, illegal dens began to spring up across the south, in places such as Surat Thani, Krabi and Phang Nga, which exacerbated the spread of the disease. The abolition of cockfighting was designed to prevent the spread of avian flu but, on the contrary, it actually made things worse," he said.

For the time being, this centuries old tradition will remain part of Thai culture, but if animal rights campaigners get their way, this brutal bloodsport may soon be consigned to history.

Protesters gather to call for "dry Songkran"

BANGKOK: Some 200 members of the Alcohol Watch Network and its allies rallied outside the Public Health Ministry on February 16, demanding that Health Minister Wittaya Kaewparadai ban alcohol sales on Buddhist holidays and major festivals such as Songkran and the New Year celebration.

Protest leader Kamron Chudecha said the group wanted Mr Wittaya to forward the group's petition to Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva, who chairs the national alcohol control policy

Mr Kamron said the government should pressure the national alcohol control committee and the control policy committee so that tight restrictions on alcohol sales and consumption can be

The protesters agree with a health ministry proposal to put warning pictures and messages on alcohol bottles similar to those on tobacco products, he said.

Mr Wittaya said he would present the group's demands to ban alcohol on Buddhist Days to the national alcohol control policy

Plea to revoke 'hazardous' herbal plant regulation

BANGKOK: The Development of Thai Traditional and Alternative Medicine Department will propose that the public health minister ask the Industry and Agriculture ministries to revoke a regulation that lists 13 plants including chili – as "hazardous substances type 1" under the Hazardous Substances Act of

Department director general Dr Nara Nakwattananukul said that since the regulation took effect on February 3, people had been panicking over the use of the 13 herbs, common ingredients in traditional medicines and many common food dishes. Moreover, farmers and herbal experts have expressed concern over the regulation's impact on growers and manufacturers, who can no longer freely grow, trade or use these plants to make pesticides.

The regulation was imposed by the Industry and Agriculture ministries in a bid to control pesticide production.

ronella grass, turmeric, ginger, Chinese ginger, African marigold, Siam weed or bitter bush, tea seed cake, chili, Chinese celery, ringworn bush, glory lily and

They are widely used by farmers as alternatives to expensive and toxic farm chemicals, pesticides and herbicides.

Under the regulation, growers, manufacturers, importers and exporters of pesticides made from the 13 herbal plants are required to conform to Agriculture Department procedures and follow safety and quality control regulations. Violators are liable to six months in jail and/or a fine of 50,000 baht.

Industry Minister Charnchai Chairungrueng said his ministry would revoke the regulation if the Agriculture Ministry requested it to do so. Meanwhile, a group of organic farmers and alternative agriculture activists plan to submit a petition to the Senate to investigate the members of the hazardous substances committee.

Firms to discount products bought with 2,000 baht stimulus money

BANGKOK: Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva said during his weekly program on the state-run NBT network on February 15 that some private firms offered discounts if workers used their 2,000 baht cheque from the government to buy their products. The discounts would give the cheques added value, he said.

The offer prompted the government to reconsider whether to distribute the money to workers

by issuing cheques or by crediting their accounts.

Government officials will receive the 2,000 baht gift money along with their monthly salary, PM Abhisit said. The government will also consider widening the criteria for handing out the gift money.

Currently, state officials and members of the Social Security Fund are eligible for the 2,000 baht stimulus money.

Mr Abhisit did not mention

if foreign workers contributing to the fund would be included.

He also expressed confidence that the supplementary mid-year budget would be ready to revive the sluggish economy next month and thanked MPs for passing the mid-year budget bill in the final reading last week.

The bill still needs Senate approval before it can be signed into law and the stimulus funding becomes available.

Distance strains parent-child ties: survey

BANGKOK: Nearly a quarter of Thais believe their family ties have worsened during the past two years, according to a recent survey among youths and par-

About one fifth also describe their parent-children relationships as "rather bad".

"Children often disagree with their parents or guardians on their money spending, their outings, their choice of friends and their study," National Institute for Child and Family Development deputy director Sivaporn Pokpong said at an academic seminar on February 12.

Conducted last month, the

survey covered 5,100 respondents. Half of them were youths aged between 11 and 22 years old while the other half were adults who have youths in this age group under their charge.

Of the young respondents, 16% openly remained friends with persons whom their parents disapproved of, while 21% said they did so secretly.

About 30% of the young respondents said their parents make decisions for them, whereas 41% of the parents believe their children have made decisions on their own, regardless of the parental advice.

Only 20% of those polled

said parents and children jointly made decisions.

"To improve family ties, everyone in the family should talk with each other more. Don't just stay in your personal space," Sivaporn said.

Youths and parents together in towns reported better relationships than those with parents in rural areas had.

"Perhaps this is because many youths have come to study and stay in town, while their parents are still working in their home

The distance has reduced their time together, which in turn hurt their ties," she said.

"I have yet to see the list, but I've got a confirmed report that two police major generals' names appear on it," Royal Thai Police spokesman Lt Gen Watcharapol Prasarnratchakij said on February 12.

Fact-finding committees would be established to see how the accused policemen were involved in the copyright violations, he said.

If there is evidence against them, they will face disciplinary as well as legal action, Lt Gen Watcharapol said.





Uproar over transfer of top cop

Residents of Nakhon Sri Thammarat have reacted in anger to news that Provincial Police Commander Sarawuth Phiranon is scheduled to be transferred to an administrative position at Police Region 8 Headquarters.

February 21 - 27, 2009

Since taking command of the province's police force last year, Maj Gen Sarawuth has launched investigations into the involvement of "influential figures", including local politicians, in major crimes, including the slaying of *Matichon* journalist Athiwat Chainurat.

Nakhon Sri Thammarat MPs led by Public Health Minister Witthaya Kaewpharadai discussed the issue at a meeting held at the Twin Lotus Hotel on February 9.

Mr Witthaya said that he had received petitions from citizens' groups and the local press claiming that the transfer of Maj Gen Sarawuth would have a large impact on a number of ongoing cases, and could cause them to collapse.

The public worries stem from reports that Maj Gen Sarawuth is soon to be transferred to be Commander of General Staff at Police Region 8 Headquarters in the upcoming

> A high-level source in the police department said that in the little over four months that Maj Gen Sarawuth has been in charge, there has been a fall in all categories of crime in Nakhon Sri Thammarat.

> The public have been particularly impressed by his willingness to investigate influential local politicians. Late last year he subjected leaders of the Provincial Administration Organization to house searches, in which a large cache of weapons was seized.

> One of the politicians in question is currently bringing defamation charges against Maj Gen Sarawuth over the investigations.

> Maj Gen Sarawuth oversaw the removal of a number of both commissioned and non-commissioned officers from Cha-uat and Ron Phibun districts, including the Superintendent of Cha-uat District Police, when investiga

tions into major cases did not progress as swiftly as expected. He also launched a complaint after authorities in Ron Phibun decided to drop a case against influential figures in the district.

He said he was not worried by the news of his transfer and that he had always carried out his duty directly and according to the rules, with the aim of bringing peace to Nakhon Sri Thammarat. He added that residents of the province had long suffered from the activities of influential people and that police must confront these figures.

"I'm a government officer and my salary is paid for by the taxpayers. I have to work to repay them. I carried out my duties for the common good, not for personal gain. If I was working for myself, wouldn't it have been better to sit back and do nothing?" Maj Gen Sarawuth asked.

He added that he was prepared to work wherever he was transferred, but he had been in Nakhon Sri Thammarat only a little over four months and the work was going very well.

He said that Nakhon Sri Thammarat is no ordinary province and is very difficult to control, every day falling deeper into the grip of influential figures.

8 Headquarters said that a 300page report on the cases Maj Gen Sarawuth was working on has been sent up to the Office of the National Corruption Commission in Bangkok for investigation.

Bloody Valentine

NAKHON SRI THAMMARAT: to take a shower, Mrs Sirorat A woman and her two young children were found shot in their bedroom in the early hours of February 14 in what police believe may have been an attempted murder/ suicide, though some doubts remain.

The two children survived the shooting, but are both in comas. In an unrelated incident a day earlier in the province, a woman was hacked to death by her daughter following an argu-

Police found Sirorat Namdokmai, 40, her daughter Paphatson Namdokmai, 9, and son Aphichai Namdokmai, 3, lying in her bedroom in her father's house in Muang district after being called to the scene by the victims' relatives at around 12:30am.

Mrs Sirorat was dead, but her two children were still alive and were rushed to Maharaj Hospital by rescue volunteers. Sawian Wannawas, 68, Mrs Sirorat's father, told police that his daughter came home from work at around 8 pm on the evening of February 13.

When she entered the house, her children were fighting over a new toy their father had sent them from Bangkok. Mrs Sirorat took the children to her bedroom, but they kept on fighting, Mr Wannawas said, Later, Mrs Sirorat's brother, Phithakphong Wannawas, 35, returned home. After he left his bedroom must have sneaked into his bedroom and taken his gun which he left on his bed, Mr Sawian said.

Two shots then rang out and he and Mr Phithakphong ran up to see what had happened. When they got there the door was locked. They tried to persuade Mrs Sirorat to open the door, but she shouted out "My children and I are going to go and live at the temple," before another shot was fired, Mr Sawian said.

They then broke down the door and found the three lying there, he added.

Mr Sawian and Mr Phithakphong told police that Mrs Sirorat had moved back to live in the house about three years ago after her husband, the son of an

army general, was left disabled following surgery. She had been under a lot of pressure trying to work and bring up the children alone and often complained about her fate.

Nakhon Sri Thammarat City Police Superintendent Phudis Narasing said that from their initial assessment of the scene and witness statements it seems likely that Mrs Sirorat shot her two children and then killed herself in a moment of insanity caused by the pressure she was under, which had been intensified lately by the poor state of the economy.

However, a source in the investigating team said that there were some inconsistencies with the physical evidence that needed to be cleared up before police

could draw any firm conclusions. The source said that the .38 pistol used in the shooting was found lying next to Mrs Sirorat's left hand, despite the fact that Mrs Sirorat was right handed, while the entry wound from the bullet that killed her was on the right side of her head.

The source said that it seemed fairly unlikely that Mrs Sirorat would have used her left hand to shoot herself in the right temple. Police have now called in forensics officers to assist in the investigation.

A day earlier on February 13, in neighboring Pak Phanang district, an elderly woman was hacked to death by her daughter, who police caught leaving the scene clutching a machete covered in blood.

Inside the house in Village 3 Tambon Pak Panang West, police found the body of Tan Kliangklao, 82.

She had been stabbed multiple times and her body was covered with a sheet.

Police said that Mrs Tan's daughter, Somkhane Kliangklao, 47, confessed to killing her mother. Neighbours told police that the pair often argued and the evening before Mrs Tan's body was found, they heard a violent argument between the mother and daughter.

Mrs Somkhane had a history of mental illness, but police said that she was fully aware of what she had done and felt very sorry about it.





Earth Day featured in Phangan film fest



he 2009 Phangan Film Festival is set to take place from February 20-22. The second annual event is being organized by Swiss independent film maker Julien L Balmer and sponsored by a number of businesses from Koh Phangan and Koh Samui.

The festival will feature screenings of six high-quality independent films from a variety of nationalities around the globe.

The program will include live music sessions in between each viewing on Friday and Sat-

urday evenings.

Organizers are hoping that the festival will help raise awareness of a variety of issues that affect the world and its inhabitants.

Kids clean up

KOH SAMUI: Efforts to clean up Koh Samui went into action as members of the community came together on Maenam Beach on Friday, January 30.

The group, which was organized by Simon Lowcock of Bluewater International School, brought together 30 students aged 11 to 16, from a local school and Bluewater school, as well as the staff of Samui International Hospital and volunteers from the Green Island project, to clean a large stretch of beach along the North coast of the island.

The joint effort was an all-day event that began at the Lomprayah ferry port and culminated in an afternoon of beach activities on the newly cleaned area near Moon Hut Bungalows. Kayaking and beach volleyball facilities were donated by local businesses, who were said to have appreciated the endeavor that saw over 100 large rubbish bags of waste collected from the popular tourist beach.

"We were looking for a project that would help preserve the environment and would coexist with what is being taught in the school. We want to show the children and the community the importance of the "reduce, reuse, recycle" principle. What washes up on our beaches is also killing off the vital marine life around the island. We need to be setting an example," commented Mr Lowcock on the reasons behind the cleanup.

The large amount of rubbish, including a lot of glass and polystyrene along with plastic bottles, was loaded onto a vehicle donated by Samui International Hospital and taken to a recycling plant.

Bluewater's students issued the invitation to the Green Island Project to take part and are hoping to work further with the organization on future projects to preserve Koh Samui's natural beauty. Green Island is a non-profit group that has spearheaded a number of green initiatives around the island, playing a big part in the island's Global Mala festival as well as organizing educational awareness programs for the local schools.

"We definitely have plans in the pipeline for future events that will educate and benefit the community in some way. There is so much natural beauty here, we all need to be aware that it is up to us to make sure that it remains. It was a great day and we would all like to do it again," Mr Lowcock concluded.

Two Teens injured in fall from hotel balcony

KOH SAMUI: Two brothers were seriously injured when a balcony railing gave way at the hotel they were staying in on Chaweng Beach. The two boys, Jeremy Webster, 18, and his brother Guy,14, were taken to the hospital after falling some five meters from the balcony. One of the boys suffered a head injury from the fall while the other broke his leg.

The two were rushed to Bangkok Samui Hospital before being airlifted to Bumrungrad Hospital in Bangkok, where they are being treated for their injuries.

They are reported to be recovering well and will be returning to their home country as soon as they are given the all-clear from the medical team.

The family, on holiday from Australia, were said to be all together when the accident occurred.

A representative from the resort has made a formal apology for the terrible accident and has assumed full responsibility, claiming that they would do everything possible to prevent something like this happening again.

The resort was the 13-year-old Baan Samui resort that is located on the popular tourist beach of Chaweng. The three-story hotel is made in part from wood that is suspected to have been damaged by the sun and termites. Following the incident, all of the rooms at the resort were closed and a thorough safety inspection was carried out to ensure safety.

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

Getting to know Phuket's new Honorary British Consul

evon born Martin carpenter recently celebrated 25 years of working abroad, from Qatar to Hong Kong, but it is in Thailand, and more specifically Phuket, that he has decided to put down roots. For 7 years he was the GM at The Blue Canyon Club, and later the Evason resort, before founding his own hospitality service business 'Phuket Concierge'. His courage and organizational skills during and after the 2004 tsunami were recognized with the award of an MBE. Never one to rest idle, he has recently taken on the role of British Honoray Consul for Phuket. The Gazette's Bruce Stanley caught up with the busy man himself.

t is not that easy to get an appointment with Martin Carpenter these days. He was recently appointed as the Honorary British Consul for Phuket and his new duties are keeping him pretty busy.

"Basically I'm responsible to help reduce the stress for British citizens who may have a problem while living in or visiting the Phuket area and to help them organize their personal affairs," he explains. "These problems can include everything from lost passports to assisting if there's a theft, health emergency or liaising with the local authorities such as the Tourist Police and Thai Immigration. And I now have the authority to notarize letters of income for those wanting a one year retirement visa".

Martin is indeed well qualified for his new job. He came to Phuket in December 1992, as General Manager at the then recently opened Blue Canyon Country Club. During his years on the island he has acted as a valuable community leader, providing his volunteer services for many charitable causes. When the tsunami of 2004 devastated much of the western regions of Phuket, Martin was serving as Chairman of the British Business Association of Phuket and he immediately gathered over a hundred volunteers to work in the relief efforts during that tragedy. He coordinated efforts to provide transport to hospitals, handled communication with relatives of victims, made hospital visits and provided counseling for bereaved families. This generosity of spirit was recognized when he was later awarded the prestigious MBE from the Queen of England.

"I applied to become the Honorary Consul when Alan Cooke retired as I felt my character fits the responsibility of the job," Martin continues. "I tend to be very task oriented and don't mind taking on challenges and

solving problems, which is the essential task of the Consul."

Martin was born in Devon, England and completed a course in hospitality at South Devon Technical College. From an early age, he was interested in travel and believed the hospitality industry would provide him with the opportunity to see the world.

He also developed a keen interest in golf. One of his first jobs was at the St. Pierre Golf and Country Club in South Wales, which started his career in golf course management.

"I started golfing at 11 years of age and though I was talented, I realized I would never reach a professional level even though I have kept a single figure handicap."

Martin recently celebrated 25 years working abroad. He began his overseas career in 1984 as the manager of a private sports club in Qatar. After assignments at sports clubs on Jersey in the Channel Islands and in Papua New Guinea, he settled at the Royal Hong Kong Golf Club for five years where he was Club Manager at Deep Water Bay.

His experience and talent at providing his clients with a quality experience made him the successful candidate for Phuket's Blue Canyon Country Club's top position. He remained at the helm of the Blue Canyon for two stints which totaled seven years and was part of the team that brought the prestigious Johnnie Walker Golf Classic to Phuket in 1994.

While Martin was GM at the Blue Canyon, he co-founded the Childwatch Charity Golf Tournament which has raised in excess of 8 million baht over the past ten years; money that has provided shelter and care for many of Phuket's children with great financial need.

Though he has had many offers to manage golf properties around the world, Martin has decided that he wants to stay on Phuket as he values being part

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
of the few three-generation expat families living on the island.

Bill O'Leary

Most people will know Bill on a level of service sometimes difficult to provide so far away Amancruises, a job he's had for twenty years. But I know Bill as an artist, a writer of screenplays, a sometime actor and musician, and as an all around good guy.

He first arrived in Phuket in 1987 as Captain of the famous Stormvogel, a 76 ft ketch which had won the Sydney to Hobart race as well as the Transpac and Whitbread races. He had just finished a movie shoot for 'Dead Calm', with a young Nicole Kidman aboard the boat, when he was asked to deliver Stormvogel to the then recently opened Amanpuri resort.

"I was asked to manage the yachts for the owners of the Amanpuri villas. We started with two boats in 1988 and today we have the largest hotel boat operation in Asia," he says.

"Basically, we crew, operate and maintain the yachts, vessels such as the Maid Marion, a 115 ft Gentlemen's Fantail Motor Yacht built in 1931, and Maha Bhetra, a 90 ft Ed Tuttle designed motor cruiser built in 1993 with three rooms designed like those at the Amanpuri."

Much of the success of Amancruises has been the result of Bill's talent for satisfying some of the world's wealthiest and most demanding celebrities, who insist from the facilities and amenities of the Mediterranean.

"I would say that of the world's top 100 celebrities, most have been sailing with Amancruises. These are guests who appreciate privacy, security and attention to detail.

Bill is a committed family man, with wife Carolyn and four children born in Thailand. His commitment to life in Phuket has prompted him and his son Timothy to become Thai citizens, a process that could stretch the patience of a saint, but he maintains hope that his second passport will become a reality in his lifetime.

He was born in the outback of Queensland, Australia, the son of a flying doctor. After graduating with a diploma in Recreation at the North Brisbane College of Advanced Education, he worked driving catamarans to the Great Barrier Reef. He became a qualified sea captain under the USL Code and began his tenure on the Stormvogel in 1981.

Bill is a talented writer. He worked on four editions of Sail Thailand, a nautical guide to sailing in local waters, and the Andaman Sea Pilot, the local Bible for yachting. He expanded his knowledge and wrote the

Southeast Asia Pilot, a guide to the waters around Brunei, Indonesia and the Philippines.

But he writes not only about the sea. In 2005, he published Tsunami Stories, a compendium of personal experiences drawn from many whose lives were impacted by that tragedy. Proceeds from sales of the book went to assist 13 orphans who lost parents in the disaster at Khao Lak in Phang Nga province.

"I've been writing my whole life. It comes in cycles. I would say I'm creative, but I'm not sure I'm talented," he laughs.

He's appeared in local film productions including the Thai entry to the American Academy Award for Best Foreign Film competition, and during the past two years he's written two screenplays which he's looking to produce in Australia.

He maintains a keen interest in writing about his father's interesting life.

"My latest interest is painting. I'm working with pastels and watercolors. I call what I'm doing 'Outsider Art'. I'm drawn to the use of strong colors and large central images. 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A master at work

uis Fernando Vager – aka "Little" Louie Vega is an internationally renowned DJ who started out on the streets of 1970s New York City, and who has since taken his unique brand of US House to a global audience. In addition to DJing at clubs around the world, Louie forms one half of the legendary remixing duo Masters at Work, alongside Kenny "Dope" Gonzales. Together, the pair have produced countless tracks and remixed some of music's biggest names, including Michael Jackson and Madonna. Away from remixing with Masters at Work, Louie is a prolific producer, having released tracks under both his own name and an assortment of aliases, as well as for other musicians.

Born into a musical family – his father Luis Vager was a jazz saxophonist, while his uncle was legendary salsa singer Hector LaVoe – it was little surprise that little Louie would go on to forge a career in the music industry, especially as he grew up in an era and area where music was so prevalent – 1970s New York.

In anticipation of his forthcoming appearance at Seduction Discotheque in Patong on Wednesday February 25, Louie Phuket Gazette about what helped shape his career.

Cosmopolitan 1970s New York was an exciting place to grow up. Assuming the mantle from Philadelphia, New York emerged as the graffiti capital of the US; break-dancing took its first tentative, groundbreaking steps before becoming a pop culture phenomenon, and different styles of music were being played all over the city. What was it like for a young Louie growing up in such a melting pot of contemporary culture?

'The best music of all time came through in the 70s. There was a lot of experimentation with sounds and styles from many artists. There was a huge range of music going on and you loved lots of it. From folk music, to rock, to disco, to R&B, and jazz,"Louie said.

"I hung out at the block par-

ties in my neighborhood, where I'd check out Afrika Bambaataa, Jazzy Jay, Red Alert, Afrika Islam and many other DJs jammin' the best in street music. Breakdancers were rocking the floors and all the crews were battling through the art of dance. I also was a very good roller-skater and dance skating was the thing to do,

took a moment to talk to the I picked up lots of my R&B influence while skating," he added.

In a career spent DJing alongside legendary contemporaries such as David Morales and Tony Humphries, what influenced Louie's US House style – a genre that was a world leader in the 1980s?

"New York definitely had the biggest influence on my style of music. I grew up at a time when hip-hop was born, street salsa was huge, disco was 'poppin' all over and music was at its all time high. You could find it all in New York," Louie said.

"My uncle was also the greatest salsa singer of all time -Hector LaVoe - so as a kid I grew up watching him perform, creating many of his hits that are classics today. You could go to a jazz club, a disco, a street event, watch all kinds of very talented artists performing; this was my schooling. All this happened in New York City, and is what has made me become who I am today, as a DJ and producer," he added.

Having spent his career playing some of the world's biggest club venues, including the infamous Studio 54 in Manhattan, what brings Louie to Phuket to play at Seduction?



"I'm DJing at Seduction because of Tom Travers. He has a passion for this music and I know he will do his best to make sure I'm DJing at the right places. I'm trusting he will have me in the right space that will comple-

ment my sound. "I'm really looking forward to my second time in Phuket. See ya soon," he said.



Moonlight Chi Gung

elcome to the fourth column in the series of Tai Chi Timeouts.
Each timeout takes you though a single, easy-to-follow *Tai Chi-Chi Gung* exercise.

One of the aims of Tai Chi is to develop the intrinsic energy (*Chi*) within the body through slow, rhythmical breathing exercises known as *Chi Gung*. This ancient martial art exercises the body and natu-

elcome to the rally relieves tension from fourth column in stress as well as aches and the series of Tai pains from stiff limbs.

In this particular exercise, we use the traditional Chinese medicinal concept that universal Chi can be absorbed into the body's energy channels (meridians) through focused intent and breathing.

Specifically, we focus on the soft, healing moonlight available during a full moon and bringing it into the body through the forehead (3rd Eye Center) allowing the Chi to flow down through the body, removing toxins through the soles of the feet into the earth.

To begin, look up at the full moon in the dead of night and with your right foot step forward into a comfortable stance (70%- 30% weight distribution).

Connect with the moon's Chi by raising your hands towards the moon. Slowly inhale

as you imagine scooping the moonlight into the 3rd eye center. Shift your weight into a backward stance (30%-70% weight distribution) and, with a straight back, slowly exhale while bringing your hands down alongside the body.

Feel the moonlight Chi gently energize your meridians and sooth the nervous system.

Allow the Chi to flow through your body to your feet, flushing any negative toxins through the soles of your feet into the ground.

Repeat the cycle by reaching up towards the moon again, shifting into a forward

stance, slowly inhaling and bring the moonlight into your 3rd eye center once more.

From a wellness point of view, the soft moonlight will calm the muscular tension in the face, neck and shoulders giving a more relaxed appearance.

The gentle effect on the body's glandular and nervous systems can only assist in the healing process.

Indeed, the knowledge that you were standing in the garden at 4 am bathing in the moonlight can only bring a smile to your face.

Shine on!

Step 1: Place your feet shoulder-width apart, knees slightly bent, hips tucked gently under the spine (back straight). Relax your shoulders and hold your head up, but keep your neck relaxed. Place your hands over your solar plexus and breathe calmly through your nose.

Step 2: Step forward with your right foot into a forward stance, release any tension in your hands and arms, and slowly raise your hands toward your forehead.

Step 3: Raise your hands until you are looking directly at the full moon between your hands. Begin slowly to inhale while you feel the sensation of scooping the moonlight Chi into your forehead 3rd eye center.

Step 4: Once you have filled your 3rd eye center with the moonlight Chi, shift your weight into a backward stance.

Step 5: Slowly begin to exhale through the nose allowing the moonlight Chi to begin flowing into the body and down the spine.

Step 6: Continue to exhale as you slowly bring your hands down alongside your body allowing the Chi to flow through your body.

Step 7: Bring your hands down alongside your legs, enabling the Chi to carry negative toxins out through the soles of your feet into the ground. Repeat the exercise by shifting into a forward stance again. Inhale as you raise your hands and scoop another handful of moonlight Chi. Continue the exercise for ten minutes with your right foot forward, then change stance and continue for a further ten minutes with your left foot forward. At all times focus your intent on absorbing the full benefits of the Chi.

Step 8: To complete the exercise, cross your hands over your solar plexus (*Tan Tien*) and gather the moonlight Chi within.

Diving without the fear factor

n the last Beneath the Waves feature, I talked about some things to consider before learning to dive. The final point discussed in the column was concerns people may have before learning to dive. In that article I wrote that the best solution was to speak to your instructor, confiding in them any misgivings that you may have. That is absolutely the best course of action that I or indeed any dive professional would recommend because it's true that a problem shared is a problem halved. In this article I'm going to look at some common concerns people have and see if I can put some minds at ease.

Drowning:

Learning to dive takes you away from your natural habitat and places you in an environment where you are unable to breathe without a SCUBA system. Being underwater naturally raises concerns about drowning, particularly when breathing from a limited air supply. A good base for learning to dive is being a competent swimmer – common sense right? You'd be amazed at the number of people who want to learn to dive without being able to swim!

When starting out, the equipment seems particularly heavy, especially when you are given a belt full of lead weights. The first thing that goes through your mind is, "There's no way I'm going to float with all this stuff on," but you'll be surprised. With a fully inflated Buoyancy Control Device (BCD) there is no chance of ever descending below the surface.

Once you deflate your BCD you will slowly begin to sink below the surface and start breathing through your regulator. The mouthpieces are designed to fit snugly in the mouth and to never let water in unless removed. When you learn to dive your in-

structor will teach you about buoyancy control, which enables you to float mid-water and prevents you from sinking towards the bottom, eliminating concerns of not being able to reach the surface.

As an open water diver, your maximum depth limit is 18 meters. As part of your training course you are taught five different ascent techniques should you find yourself in a low-on-air/out-of-air situation. In the unlikely event of this happening – assuming you have stayed within your limits – you should be able to make it to the surface without much difficulty.

It will be drummed into you to constantly check your air supply so you are aware of how much you have. If you remain vigilant, the chances of you running out of air are almost non-existent. If you adhere to the buddy system – which you should at all times – should the unlikely happen your buddy will be on hand to supply you with an alternate air source. Dive right, be safe.

Aquatic Life:

Many people are afraid of things that live in the sea. Jelly-fish are a source of concern but number one on the list are sharks. Sharks, in my opinion, are the best things to witness underwater. Graceful, agile and beautiful, their movement is mesmeric. To witness them underwater is something few forget.

Sharks are not like they are portrayed in Jaws. They are not mindless killing machines; Steven Spielberg has a lot to answer for. In reality, sharks are afraid of divers. They have no idea what

we are, have no interest in us whatsoever and are likely to vanish if we ever go anywhere near them. Rob Stewart, writer, director and star of the brilliant documentary 'Sharkwater' summed it up perfectly when he said, "A six-foot fish could do whatever it wanted to a human, yet it chooses not to." The more you dive with sharks, the more you understand their nature and appreciate how incredible they are and how there is little to be afraid of. Respect them but don't fear them. In Australia, a country with some of the most shark-infested waters, there have been 193 recorded sharkrelated deaths – few of whom are divers – in 200 years. Every year, somewhere in the region of 100 million sharks are killed by humans. In the time it takes you to read this article, almost 200 sharks will have been killed.


Peer Pressure:

Personally, there are few things more enjoyable than donning your kit and going diving with friends. Equally, learning to dive with friends can be just as much fun, if not more so. However, training with close friends or loved ones can occasionally promote anxiety. What often occurs is that one of the group is less eager to learn and won't admit it to their mates for fear of losing face, or you find that a partner is pressuring their significant other into learning

Should this be the case it's important to stand up for yourself. Never allow yourself to be bullied into doing something you don't feel entirely comfortable with. Although incredibly safe,

SCUBA diving has the potential to be dangerous, especially if you're not confident. Speak to your instructor about your true feelings and, if still keen to learn, perhaps suggest starting with a basic Discover Scuba Dive to build confidence and allow your friends or partner to continue the full course.

People also worry about holding back a group. With ev-

erything in life, some peo-ple take to diving faster than others. If you feel this is the case, consult your instructor and the dive shop should be happy to spend more time with you, possibly on a one-on-one basis, to help you pass the course. A visit to the village is an ideal family affair. Kids will love the colorful crepes but when the alcohol begins to take effect on mum and dad and the little ones have had their fill, they can work off excess energy in the restaurant's playground.

The crêpes are also a relatively healthy eating option, according to Frédéric, who explained that the crepe mixtures are low- and non-fat blends and that no oil is used to make the crêpes on the specially imported, top-of-the-range crépière (crêpe hotplate).



he current financial climate is one in which many people would simply prefer to keep their

money in a bank deposit. Unfortunately, there is a

trend which has assumed the expression: "The race to zero", meaning that interest rates worldwide are heading to nil. In reality, it is not likely to be as widespread as that, but most major currencies are certainly close to zero. The base lending rate in sterling is now 1% which is a 300 year low. US Dollars have a base lending rate of 0.0 to 0.25% and the Yen 0.10%. The euro currently has a base lending rate of 2% but most currency analysts expect a 0.5% reduction in March with more to follow.

An increasing number of expats are telling me that exchange rates are now the main topic of conversation at many expat "watering holes" and one professional adviser said that his ambition was to be able to offer a deposit account paying 6%. Obviously, no bank will be that generous with a deposit account; however, 6% is attainable via a registered non-bank financial institution.

One area that has not been hurt by the credit crisis is Student Accommodation. "Money Talks" has covered the Brandeaux Student Accommodation several times over the years and that fund continues to perform well. However, there is a caveat with Brandeaux; they have suspended all dealing with their various funds and they intend to "unlock" their student accommodation fund first. Student Accommodation, as an investment theme, is very much alive and well.

To recap, Student Accommodation is an investment in accommodation at university level. It has become a substantial industry with an ever growing student population. Student numbers might be expected to fall during a recession but the opposite happens for two major reasons: jobs

For school leavers, the prospect of any reasonable future on the employment front is dismal without a university qualification. For existing students there is a realization that again the job market is not exactly attractive and this becomes a time to take an advanced degree.

Obviously, retrenchments cause people to think deeply about their future career prospects and again universities gain from this scenario.

Overseas students from a number of countries are now noting that a "cheaper" pound sterling makes study in the UK significantly more affordable than was the case even one year ago.

There are around twenty different companies involved in the supply of student accommodation; this is generally of a high standard with blocks of accommodation on average varying from 200 to 600 beds. The most common form is in ensuite bedrooms with communal study and dining facilities, although often buildings have 3, 4 and even 5 bedroomed apartments included.

One new entrant to the market is Coral Student Portfolio which has based its investment fund in Luxembourg, automatically making it subject to European Union laws. Three of Coral's directors are in fact former directors of Brandeaux, which means they are highly ex-

perienced in the industry.

The current recession is not having an adverse effect on the industry as demand continues to outstrip supply. Occupancy rates are very high, normally in the region of 95–100%. Students pay in advance and rents increase every year.

Coral predicts a net return of 8%-10% which, when compared to other groups in the industry, is not overly ambitious.

Looking to the future, there is considerable interest in expanding into Western Europe; many believe that student accommodation is the largest untapped sector in the real estate market in this region. At present, it is being compared to the UK of several years ago in development terms.

One of the great attractions of student accommodation as a separate asset class and investment area is its basic predictability. Even in the midst of what is proving to be a very difficult recession with virtually all classes

of commercial and residential property severely impacted, student accommodation continues to thrive.

Coral has as its investment adviser Strutt & Parker Real Estate Financial services – London; the custodian Bank is Deutsche Bank Luxembourg; the auditors are Ernst & Young, Luxembourg.

Investors pay no up-front fees - 100% of funds are invested and the annual management charge is 1.5%.

An income facility exists, where required; otherwise gains simply compound in the fund. In times of great uncertainty, student accommodation is even more attractive; it is one of the few areas that is recession proof.





tion of such a large area into a more than a political history. He single empire had in due course created an economic unit important not only for its size but because it linked together two great sea basins of the civilized world, those of the Mediterranean and the Indian Ocean," Hourani writes. "The movement of armies, merchants, craftsmen, scholars and pilgrims between them became easier and also that of ideas, styles and techniques. Within this vast sphere of interaction it was possible for there to grow up strong governments, large cities, international trade and a flourishing countryside, maintaining the conditions for each other's existence."


While all this was taking place, Europe was in the deep sleep of its Dark Ages. "By the tenth and eleventh centuries, the great cities of the Islamic countries were the largest in the western half of the world," Hourani observes. Cairo, Baghdad and Cordoba each had a population of over one million. Paris, Venice and Florence had a mere 100,000.

Hourani's book is much

ranges widely throughout Arab philosophy, history, literature and religious thought. As Thomas Aquinas sought to reconcile faith and reason in his Summa Theologica, Arab philosophers were working along the same lines and many, like Avicenna and Averroes, came to be strong influences on Thomas.

The wealth of intellectual detail, eventually, becomes too much, at least for this reader, and I yearned for him to get on with the history of the Arabs.

They were largely subdued by the Ottoman Turkish Empire which led in turn to the domination of the western powers. A turning point was reached with Napoleon's invasion of Egypt in 1798. The Arabs were impressed with the retinue of scholars and scientists he brought with them. As the Islamic historian al-Jabarti observed: "If any of the Muslims came to them in order to look around they did not prevent him entering their most cherished places...and if they found in him any appetite or desire for knowl-



edge, they showed their friendship and love for him, and they would bring out all kinds of pictures and maps, and animals and birds and plants and histories of the ancients and of nations and tales of the prophets. I went to them often, and they showed me all that."

After the Napoleonic wars, European power and influence spread even further: trade in manufactured goods, steamships and railways. And it wasn't long, in 1830, before France just decided to grab Algeria for itself, seizing its best land for their own colonists and savagely repressing revolt. Morocco and Tunisia later became protectorates and Italy conquered Libya in 1911. The collapse of the Ottoman Empire brought the Middle East under English and French control.

Only World War II would spell the end for colonialism and a new era of Arab nationalism. In 1964, Egyptian scholar Sayvid Qutb published Ma'alim fi'ltariq (Signposts on the Path) which advocated a return to pure Islam: "The leadership of western man in the human world is coming to an end, not because western civilization is materially bankrupt, or has lost its economic or military strength, but because the western order has played its part and no longer possesses that stock of "values" which gave it its predominance. The turn of Islam has come."

divisions are subjected to this grammatical mistreatment. One never sees or hears that, for instance, something has been 'cut in quarter.' Is this misconstruction now considered acceptable?"

Barbara replies: Surely you've realized that English is full of expressions that are considered correct even though they don't quite make sense. "In half" is one of them. To be honest, I'd never noticed how illogical it is until you pointed it out.

The word "half" is more than a thousand years old, and anything that has been around that long is bound to have developed some quirks. For instance, the original meaning of "half" was "side," and although that meaning has long been obsolete, the phrase "on behalf of," which

grew out of "half," still does mean something like "on the side of" or "on the part of." As for the quirk you don't like, "in half" meaning "into halves" is very well established. It's been with us at least since 1820, when the poet Percy Bysshe Shelley used it in Prometheus Unbound: "Each by lightning riven in half.'

As I thought all of this over, I wondered (on your behalf!) whether the fact that "half" has no etymological relationship to "two" - unlike, say, "one-third" and "three" – might help explain the odd phrase. Then I realized that we say, similarly, "cut it in two" - but not "cut it in three." Evidently, what's special about "half" isn't the word itself but its connection to the very common, basic idea of two.

Q: Kindly explain the difference between the words 'rein'

and 'reign.' In newspapers I continually see phrases such as 'reign in' and 'give him free reign.' I believe those should be 'rein in' and 'free rein.' Am I correct?"

Barbara replies: Yes, you are. "Reining in" and "free rein" are metaphors that have to do with riding horses.

To "rein in" a horse literally is to assert control by pulling on the reins, and to "give it free rein" is to do the opposite.

To "reign" is what God and kings and queens do. And, of course, to "rain" is what cats and dogs do. (Joke!)

However, I've actually seen "free rain" written: "I would hate to give free rain to executors and administrators ..." That mistake is bizarre. I mean, as far as I know, rain is free to everyone.

Q: Years ago, I heard a very interesting lecture in which the professor cited the roots of English, French and German surnames. I have made several unsuccessful attempts to locate the book that he probably used for his information. Do you know of a book that explains the origins of surnames?

Barbara replies: Most books about surnames treat one country or ethnicity's worth; I would suppose your professor used a number of books in his research. These days, websites can be equally helpful.

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A new convention center? Twenty years and counting...

With the locally dominant Democrat Party coming to power after eight years leading the opposition, it was perhaps inevitable that there would be a renewed push to build a world-class international conference and exhibition center in Phuket.

For almost two decades, numerous sites and funding schemes for the project have been proposed, studied and reviewed.

From the outset, the Phuket Chamber of Commerce proposed reclaiming more land off Saphan Hin to site the project and has stuck to this preference over the years, with the support of the Tourism Authority of Thailand during the Thaksin years.

Including a convention center in a larger Ao Phuket development project off Saphan Hin has been a feature of a number of proposals, some of them truly futuristic.

Building a megaproject on reclaimed land would seem to have little to do with "sustainable tourism" development, but the project was nevertheless picked and pushed ahead by the Designated Areas for Sustainable Tourism Administration (DASTA) last year under the government of Samak Sundaravej – which essentially dusted off a previous design put forward by the Interior Ministry's Town and Country Planning Department and gave it a much higher price tag.

Earlier, under the caretaker government of Surayud Chulanont, then Phuket Governor Niran Kalayanamit secured the right to use Treasury Department land in Mai Khao as a site for a center – and also found a willing private sector investor in ING Funds (Thailand) Co Ltd. But once again, a change in Thailand's top management intervened.

In the latest development, Phuket MP Tossaporn Thepabutra is once again pushing to get a 10,000-seat center built at the Mai Khao site.

But despite being on state land and boasting a nice sea view and proximity to the airport, the Mai Khao location otherwise seems a poor choice: it is simply too remote from the island's main population centers.

Most successful convention centers are located in major metropolitan areas, within easy driving distance of tens of millions of people. That is hardly the case anywhere in Phuket – least of all in Mai Khao. The little-used Welcome Gate facility in Mai Khao should serve as a lesson in this regard.

Several resorts on the island already have excellent conference facilities and the professional staff and experience to host meetings for several thousands of people.

Phuket would benefit from having something larger, but it should be in a more central location – such as the perfectly-placed Anupas and Sons extensive landholdings in Wichit.

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

I'm a European who is considering purchasing a boat in Phuket. I was wondering what the regulations are regarding ownership and use in Thailand.

If you buy the boat in Thailand, you can have it registered in your district in Phuket. Take all the boat's documents to the Boat Registration Office (address below) to register it in your name.

However, if you purchase the boat overseas, you will also have to take the Bill of Sale and documents proving ownership.

Once you have all these documents, you can register your boat with the Boat Registration Authority in Thailand.

hat to do with young children when school has finished is an issue for many parents in Phuket, but the newly opened Nai Harn Boxing Gym may provide some of the answers, with a Muay Thai class for young children.

While most parents familiar with the sight of five- or six year-olds slugging it out like adults in professional Muay Thai bouts at various stadiums in Phuket might be horrified at the idea of letting their children even enter a ring, they can rest assured this is not what the kids' Muay Thai class at Nai Harn Boxing Gym is all about.

For a start, this is not your average gym. It has a bar where parents can relax and enjoy a drink while watching the class, or play table tennis or table football. The gym's head instructor, Thanachon "Chon" Ying, is not your average Muay Thai trainer either.

He holds a degree in Busi-

ness and Accountancy, has worked in Dubai and Hong Kong, and speaks fluent English.

Under Chon's careful supervision all the children seem to thoroughly enjoy the class, and remarkably, no tears are shed. The group, comprising mainly foreign children, begin by kicking a ball around to warm up. Then, under the supervision of Chon and a couple of colleagues, they are taken through a thorough warm up routine consisting of stretching exercises.

The children then take it in turns to practise different techniques with the instructors, who remain extremely understanding when the children inevitably decide that punching the instructor is decidedly more fun then punching the pads they are holding

Meanwhile, the parents are able to share a drink at the bar, something which Diane Stoffel is particularly grateful for, "This place is great, there's a bar here so I can chat to the other par-

ents. It's not like I have to sit on my own and wait for an hour."

Diane's daughter Paula, 7, attends the British International School and has been attending the kids Muay Thai classes for three weeks. According to Diane, she loves it. "I was looking for activities and I saw they had Thai boxing for kids here in an advert in a magazine.

The first day she just wanted to watch and then one of the trainers, who are great, started teaching her and after that she said, 'Mum I want to come back.' She normally has a lot of energy but after the class she's really relaxed. I think it's good for a girl to learn self-defense and it's great for her to have something to do besides school."

Paula is equally enthusiastic about the class. "I don't mind being the only girl and I never get beaten up by the boys," she said.

The club's owner, Anthony Spaethe, believes there is much more to the Nai Harn Boxing Club than just Muay Thai, "It's got more of a club atmosphere. People can come here to play chess, backgammon, ping-pong, table football or they can just have a drink at the bar. It's comfortable, spacious and everything is brand new.

"We hold yoga classes here and we are about to start judo classes for both adults and kids. I have kids myself and there is never anything for them to do in Phuket,"he said. So if the phrase "Mummy I'm bored" is a familiar refrain in your household, a trip to the Nai Harn boxing gym might be in order.

he Phuket Holiday Bridge Club season reached its conclusion last week after eight weeks of competition. The players had been meeting twice a week at the 2Gusti Restaurant in Central Festival and Skippers in the Royal Phuket Marina. An array of awards were handed out, with Derek Priest and Adrianne Barber taking the prize for the highest-scoring pair.

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
It'll be all light on the night Installing outdoor flourescent lights




Before beginning, turn off your whole house's AC power at the fusebox! Don't take a chance and just turn off the line or area you're working on, because the circuit-breaker switches here are sometimes poorly (or not even) labeled. Be safe! Shut down the whole house! I've been zapped with both 110 and 220 before. 220 really does hurt twice as bad!

Check all the fixture's connectors before installation, as I've seen some new fixtures' wires connected with the insulation still on the ends! These connectors require a *very* small screwdriver. If you don't have a set of jeweler's screwdrivers, buy a cheap little one and file or grind down the sides to fit, and keep it for just these types of jobs – see how tool collections grow? Avoid over-tightening these little screws, as they strip easily, ruining the connector.

About stripping wires: if you have a light touch, (and sharp tools) you can use a wire cutter. Wrap the wire around the left index finger, grip the wire cutter in the right, close the jaws just enough to score the insulation, then twist in half-circles around the wire.







Next, pressing the knuckles of your hands together, roll and lever your hands apart, gripping the wire just tightly enough to break the insulation and pull it off. This takes practice, and with thin wires, especially twisted-strand ones, (or old, dull wire cutters), it's difficult to avoid breaking them. If using a cutter knife, hold the wire's end against the pad of your thumb, (or, better, a small piece of wood), press gently and cut the insulation while rolling the wire with your fingers. It then can

be pulled off with a thumbnail. A third way is to use a cigarette lighter to slightly melt an area about half-inch from the end, quickly grip the melted area with a rag and gently pull off. Clean the ends before installing into the

First, remove the fixture's flat cover-plate from the base by twisting the two plastic knobs one-quarter turn, and lifting off. You'll see the ballast, the plastic holder for the starter, and a central connector for joining the ACpower line to the fixture's wires. (photos 1,2,3)

The back of the starter's cup-shaped holder lifts up to reveal the attachment points. Insert the starter before attaching the wires, as this stabilizes the holder in its hole.

Make sure the wires' ends are bare and secure, then check for the same at the ballast and central connectors. Now to hang the fixture. Trace the outline of the two elongated screw holes in the base onto the mounting area. To select the right size bit, hold a bit and a screw together, bit closest to you, up to the light.

The bit should be as thick as the shaft of the screw, not the threads. This is especially important if installing the fixture on a metal surface. Use a hammer and punch or sharp nail to make a dimple in the center of the circles you've traced, then drill carefully. If drilling into metal,

work the drill slightly around in a circle after the hole is completed, as this will bevel the holes' edges and help the screws install a little easier, as will a drop of oil on the threads.

Pic 4

Install washers on the screws, (photo 4) to prevent the fixture from ever falling down over the screw's head, as it will flex over time from cleaning, and replacing bulbs. Tighten securely.

Bring the AC-line into the base through the hole provided, and attach to the central connector. (photo 3) Tuck all the wires up out of the way and reinstall the base's cover-plate. Install the bulb and check for operation.

That's it! Have a beer! See you next time!

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Gardening in Eden part II

Looking at the bigger picture

hen you create a garden from scratch, climate and soil are, to all intents and purposes, beyond one's control. But plants, granted the vagaries of the weather, allow you to reveal your individuality, to give expression to your stick palm (crytostachys renda), aesthetic sense.

In Thailand I knew the range of shrubs and flowers was excitingly varied and oh so different from so-called 'temperate' England. So I gave away my old gardening books, and bought some new ones, making sure that the illustrations carried Thai descriptions alongside the English and Latin ones. \overline{W} hy? Pictures clearly helped to

wanted to be able to talk to local nurserymen - most of them women in fact - using Thai names. I also vowed to put this information on tags attached to plants in the hope that I would remember. Some hope! And I have given up for the purposes of this article.

My primary need was for big shrubs and for trees that would grow rapidly, creating oases of green shade for their less hardy brethren. Palms clearly fitted the bill. My first and obvious choice was the areca or golden cane palm (dypsis lutescens) which I placed at intervals around the pool and inside the white boundary walls. Arecas are clumpy and fastgrowing, easy to obtain, relatively inexpensive and can withstand direct sun, in which conditions the fronds assume a golden color.

I also bought three travelers palms (ravenala) – their huge, banana-like leaves combine to create a symmetrical fan-shape – and planted them inside the front wall. Already, one year on, they are four meters tall. I also acquired dwarf coconuts (cocos nucifera) and a couple of kerriodoxias or bismarck palms. These ornamental trees, possessed of strikingly

glaucous leaves, are not rapid growers, but given favorable conditions, will develop into magnificent specimens. In a neighboring garden are two such palms with fronds fully two meters across. I hope for more of the same.

I also bought a mature lip-

having fallen for its sexy red stems. Other rapidly maturing plants were sought. My Thai friends, somewhat scandalized by the thought that I should have to pay for everything, suggested elephant ears (xanthosoma), which could be purloined from the rain forest. They arrived in

identify flowers and foliage, but I the back of a pick-up – no questions asked - and were set between the yellow cane palms around the pool. Frankly it is too hot and dry most of the time for succulents used to dank, jungley conditions. But they struggle on, practising an exercise in conservation during the dry season by reducing to four or five leaves and then expanding to eight or nine in the monsoon.

Other large shrubs were strategically placed to afford more shade. Among the successes have been yellow (tecoma stans) and pink bignonias, three thevetia





peruviana, in both apricot and yellow varieties, and some redflowering hybrids of their relative, the common oleander (nerium). All these easy-going shrubs had done well in my Spanish garden, resistant even to the depredations of goats. But best of all have been the allamandas. Planted against the walls, the single and double yellow varieties as well as the deep lilac-colored species (violacea), have flourished . To me the single allamanda (cathartica) is the quintessential tropical shrub – lush, glossy-green foliage and exotic trumpet-shaped flowers of an incandescent yellow. Moreover it will bloom and bloom, apparently impervious to all that a midday sun can throw at it. If allamandas have a downside it is that, being vines, they sprawl: ideally they need a trellis

The other vinous candidate for stardom is, I suppose, the bougainvillea. If it is, par excellence, the shrub of the Mediterranean, it is just as much at home in Thailand. Now, in the dry season, my bougainvilleas are coming into their own, producing brilliant clusters of bracts in shades of coral, pink, scarlet and white. Soon, suitably supported, they will be providing shade for other plants.

Other vines sited near the walls include a rangoon creeper (quisqualis indica), a heavy but erratic bloomer and beloved of leaf-eating insects, the delicate white-flowering climber known as the nepal trumpet vine (beaumontia murtonii), a chinese desmos and some jasmines including the star variety (jasminium multiflorum).

Dear reader, you may complain that I have not so far mentioned the hibiscus. Fair comment. No Thai garden would be






complete without a shrub sufficiently at home here to be used routinely as a hedge. Moreover, it comes in an eye-catching range of colours and varieties. My garden boasts a number of the popular rosa chinensis, mostly set in borders between the larger shrubs. But this commonest of hibiscus has been surprisingly slow to establish; ideally it thrives on a combination of full sun and moist soil. More successful have been the quick-growing cotton roses (hibiscus mutabilis) whose flowers intriguingly change color – from morning white to evening red; and the coral hibiscus (schizopetalus) whose longstamened, scarlet flowers hang from pendulous stalks.

The other signature shrub of Thailand is the frangipani (plumeria rubra), a shrub that, in the Muslim burial grounds of Phuket for instance, has become a sizable tree. The frangipani is not much of a shade-giver – its form is too open for that – and it is liable to shed its leaves. But it flowers profusely, especially the modern hybrids, it will not crowd out smaller plants, and is possessed of a fragrance that has inspired poetry. Enough said....

This week 'smaller plants' have been crowded out by considerations of space. They will have their day another time.

s the financial crisis overseas continues to deepen, the effects of it are heading toward Phuket in rapid ripples and waves. With tourism and related service industries being a key economic indicator for the province, the importance of a healthy hotel market cannot be underestimated.

The recent labor disruptions at Laguna Phuket have once again reinforced concerns over the apparent take-for-granted tourism dollar attitude toward what is for many, their own personal rice bowl.

For more than 48 hours earlier this month, the island's welcome mat was once again rolled up, in scenes reminiscent of last year's airport takeover by the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) supporters. Tourists were again wheeling their suitcases through blockades and many long-planned holidays were marred by uncertainty and an inhospitable environment.

Having spent much of my

in many countries, one of the universal messages I've heard passed on to new staff over and over again is to always treat each and every guest the same as you would a guest in your own home.

It's hard to imagine asking visitors to your home to scale fences the same way they had to during the airport shut down, or asking those who own property within Laguna to walk instead of drive because they were barred access to public roads.

What on earth is happening in the Land of Smiles to make us turn our backs on those who provide so many of us with a living?

Needless to say, there are two sides to the labor issue, just as there were during the PAD protests, but it is well beyond my knowledge or expertise to comment or report on these. I'd prefer to look at investment in hu-

important as investment in bricks and mortar, technology and aesthetics in hotels. While tourists can choose to go anywhere in the world, it's not always the flash and hardware that brings them back year after year.

For many visitors, the attraction is those small acts of kindness, like a staff member going out of his or her way to help, and other nuances of caring that only humans can provide. It's these kinds of positive experiences with locals and hospitality staff that make visitors want to return.

Unfortunately, in a recession or economic downturn, one of the quickest fixes is to downsize the workforce or reduce staffing levels. It's pure economics, and it is relatively easy to reengineer profit levels on paper to retain bottom-line results.

In hotels, staff and related benefits are the most significant recurring operating cost. In Phuket, tourism is well established with a substantial portion of the workforce now entering longerterm service. In many instances, employees have worked with the same employer for more than ten years. Many of those employees were born here, come from lower-income families and were forced to enter the workplace at a young age, unable to pursue higher education. While retaining employment over the years, they have missed education opportunities that have limited their career growth and kept them in lower-service and less-demanding positions.

In recent years, Thailand has become a world-class destination and as Asia has developed and prospered - growing for much of the 90s and into this decade - an urban-hospitality workforce armed with hospitality qualifications has emerged.

During the economic boom, supply of new hotels flourished and demand continued unabated. On the back of that boom, consumer credit reached every layer of the population and debt was taken on in the form of new cars, homes and consumer goods.

At many of the island's poshest hotels, service charge income for staff was often equal to or even higher than basic salaries. Shopping malls, car dealers, mobile phone shops and other businesses have subsequently grown at a terrific rate.

As we now enter the most challenging economic time of our lives, the crush of job losses, lower benefits and declining income streams is hitting those at the lowest level the hardest. An uncontrolled free market has sold them dreams in print ads, on TV and in movies. But now the carpet has been pulled out from under their feet.

As cuts come, the newer and younger staff working at hotels and resorts are going back to Bangkok or upcountry to look for work. Those left behind are often struggling.

They may have children on the cusp of requiring higher education in order to compete in an increasingly competitive environment. It's a vicious cycle, and no doubt a good amount of the passion fueling the current labor pains on the island is a result of these factors.

And so we come full circle to the point where we started: understanding and appreciating the importance of our tourists, who at the end of the day, are just the same as the people we invite into our own homes.

Clearly, the provincial government and tourism authorities, along with those in the industry who can make a difference, need to address greater education for hospitality staff.

More internationally affiliated hotel schools are required and large-scale investment is required; not in capital projects, but in our very own human capital.

Laguna Phuket has been a quality employer over the years, with its pioneering projects, such as air-conditioned staff transportation, daycare facilities and employee benefits that go far above and beyond those required by labor law.

There are two sides to the coin, however, and while employers and employees work out their respective differences, I sincerely hope that there is a return to treating our own tourists with the same respect, and a return to an unconditional welcome to Phuket.
