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

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Bike Week breaks records

PHUKET: Organizers of the 15th Annual Phuket Bike Week reported record-breaking attendance at this year's event, announcing approximately 24,000 bikers and enthusiasts making their way to the island to take part in a variety of activities that were held between April 10 and 12.

According to Phuket Bike Week's main organizer and Managing Director of Ride Thailand Magazine, Wittaya (Sumon) Singkalah, a total of 3,800 motorcycles registered for the event. However, organizers said that many other bikes participated that were unregistered.

"We have recorded a total of 24,000 people attending the event. About 15,000 of them were Thais," he said.

Events over the three days, under the theme "Global Warming, Riding for Peace", included custom bike exhibitions, charity donations, tree planting, safety demonstrations, a Miss Bike Week beauty contest at Jungceylon and a music festival at Loma Park on Patong Beach.

According to estimates by the organizers, the event generated tens of millions of baht for the country, with each participant spending, on average, about 10,000 baht on transport, accommodation and food.

Some participants flew their bikes in from Europe and Saudi Arabia, while others rode their metal steeds from Kuala Lumpur and other parts of Malaysia.

Leader of the Big Bike Club in Ubon Ratchathani Province and one of Phuket Bike Week's organizers, Prachya "Tangmo" Sritanyarath, put the event's success down to three months of planning and collaboration with provincial and municipal authorities, including Patong Mayor Pian Keesin, police chiefs and Mr Sumon's "unwavering commitment" to the cause.

"There are about 350 big bike clubs throughout Thailand comprising about 20,000 members. Bike weeks are held nationwide throughout the year, but

Phuket Bike Week is considered the best of them all because most of the week's events take place near the beach," said Mr Tan-

"The proximity to Patong Beach is Phuket Bike Week's best selling point. None of the other big bike events in the region can boast such a venue," he added. - Gazette reporters

Tourist market reacts to red-shirt riots

PHUKET: Initial assessments made by the Thai Hotels Association (THA) at the height of the red-shirt protests in Bangkok and Phuket hotel room bookings made prior to the Songkran holiday period had been canceled.

According to the THA, which counts over 100 of the island's 600 accommodation establishments among its membership, the cancellations were made after the Thai government declared a state of emergency in the nation's capital on April 12.

Most of those cancellations were made by Japanese and Chinese tourists following the issu-Pattaya reported that 20% of ance of travel advisories by their respective governments.

TAT Phuket Office spokesperson, Settaphan Buddha-ni, explained that the Chinese and Japanese tourist markets are the most sensitive to incidents of political unrest in Thailand.

However, more Thais were now visiting Phuket and most Patong hotel operators were

happy with current occupancy rates averaging between 70% and 80%, he said.

Mr Settaphan also expressed confidence that the drop in tourist numbers would only be temporary.

"The number of Japanese tourists visiting Phuket is currently about 20,000 a month, but at the time of the People's Alliance for Democracy (yellowshirt) protests in November last year, Japanese arrivals fell to zero," Mr Settaphan added.

Resorts questioned independently reported losing between 400 and 1,700 room nights through cancellations from the red-shirt protests.

The majority of those can cellations were made by tour groups from Hong Kong, South Korea and Russia.

A spokesperson for a resort in Karon said that bookings had dropped as a direct result of the political turmoil in the capital – losing about 2% of total occupancy in April and 0.6% in May.

Murder: There were 7 reports of murder (+17% year-on-year) with arrests made in 6 cases (86% arrest rate).

Attempted Murder: There were 4 reports of attempted murder (-33% year-on-year) with arrests made in 1 case (25% arrest rate). **Manslaughter:** There was 1 report of manslaughter (no reports in March 2008) with arrests made in 1 case (100% arrest rate). Rape: There were 3 cases of rape (-25% year-on-year) with arrests made in 2 cases (67% arrest rate).

Drugs: There were 183 drugs cases (+79% year-on-year) and 197 people arrested for drugs offenses.

Songkran road safety figures released

PHUKET: The first five days of trict, six in Kathu District and this year's Songkran period saw 43 road accidents, with 44 injuries and two deaths, according to the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation's Songkran road safety center.

Ekkachai Jantuang, 18, died in Vachira Phuket Hospital on April 11 after his motorcycle smashed into a pick-up truck in Thalang District the previous night. Mr Ekkachai was not wearing a helmet and was drunk at the time of the accident, according to the DDPM.

On April 13, 26-year-old Suparuk Phoget was killed in a motorcycle crash at the entrance to Soi Suksan in tambon Wichit.

The figures showed there were 31 injuries in Muang Disseven in Thalang District.

A total of 34 of the accidents were caused by motorcycles, one by a large truck and the rest by other vehicles or pedestrians.

The center also released figures on checkpoint inspections at nine locations around the island.

Between April 10 and April 14 there were 52,415 inspections, with 4,636 people charged with offenses. Of those, 1,332 were charged with not wearing a safety helmet, 322 with riding an unsafe motorcycle, 723 with not wearing a seatbelt, 428 with drink driving and 1,831 with driving without a license. There were no charges for speeding.

Purchase of contraband detection technology in the pipeline

PHUKET CITY: Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop has approved the purchase of two stateof-the-art detection devices, one for explosives and the other for contraband. The devices will be used at Tah Chat Chai check-

The Alpha 6 devices, which cost around 500,000 baht each, are said to use 'molecular resonance' technology to detect the presence of drugs and explosives. The manufacturer claims the Alpha 6 can detect substances from up to 200 meters away.

Phuket Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation officer Suthee Sirianun said that procurement procedures meant it would take around one month to acquire the devices.

ASLM Trading Co Ltd demonstrated the Alpha 6 to former Phuket Governor Preecha Ruangjan and Phuket Provincial Police Commander

Apirak Hongtong at Phuket Provincial Police Station around two months ago. The demonstration apparently showed that the devices were able to locate hidden

drugs around 70% of the time.


"At Tah Chat Chai checkpoint, we will also be using sniffer dogs to search for drugs," Mr Suthee said.

Villa Market opens its doors in Chalong

CHALONG: Villa Market finally opened its doors at the HomePro shopping complex in Chalong on Friday, April 10. Following almost four years of preparation – and efforts to secure the right location – the new store represents Bangkok-based Villa Supermarket's first foray on the island.

Chief operating officer Pisit Poosanakhom said the new Villa Market will stock close to 30,000 items, many of them imported. The focus is very much on fresh and healthy, with the "Healthy Living" section containing around 2,000 items alone.

"Regarding price, luxury and healthy items do not have to be expensive. That is not to say that we are the cheapest, but we believe that we are offering the best value for the customer. The price for some items may be a little bit more expensive, but the quality is there.

"For example, we sell organic vegetables flown in from Chiang Mai, so the price may be a little bit more expensive than for locally grown produce but the quality is the best. Similarly, our meats, whether it be chicken,

pork or beef, are all hormone-free," said Mr Pisit.

As for the competition, Mr Pisit sees a place in the market for Villa's offerings.

"We don't feel that we are competing with anybody, whether it be TOPS or Lotus or Carrefour. We believe that the market is big enough and there is enough room for everybody. For us, we want to fill in the space that has been left by the others, namely healthy living and variety," he said.

Variety is certainly on offer in abundance at the new Villa; the bakery section alone stocks more than 300 varieties of bread flown in fresh from all over the world.

"All of our imported produce is flown in to guarantee freshness. Nothing is frozen or even imported by sea. We do this to guarantee freshness for the customer," said Mr Pisit.

And don't worry about finishing work early to pick up your Dutch tomatoes or Scottish salmon, Villa will be open until 10pm every night.

The Phuket branch is the 15th for the Villa chain, which started in Bangkok back in 1974.

EU blacklisting irrelevant, says One-Two-Go chairman

PHUKET: The chairman of One-Two-Go says the recent addition of the carrier to a European Union blacklist will have no effect on the company, which has never flown to Europe.

One-Two-Go's addition to the updated blacklist was announced in a press release on April 8.

The airline's chairman Udom Tantiprasongchai told the *Gazette* on April 9 that the listing was irrelevant because, as a domestic Thai carrier, One-Two-Go has never flown to Europe.

Furthermore, One-Two-Go's parent company, Orient Thai, had already discontinued all passenger and cargo flights to the continent, he added.

Orient Thai is not included on the updated blacklist.

Speaking by phone from a train platform in Tokyo, Mr Udom said he didn't think the listing was related to safety issues, but rather due to the fact that the EU commonly blacklists carriers who don't own their own aircraft, even though operating leased air-



craft is common in Asia.

As for One-Two-Go's regular service to Phuket from Bangkok's Don Muang Airport, Mr Udom said load factors on the 14 flights weekly have been strong at 80% to 90%.

The Bangkok to Phuket route was resumed in December last year after the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA) finally lifted a series of three suspension orders on the carrier following the crash of One-Two-Go flight OG269 at Phuket Airport in September 2007.

The suspension followed a pubic outcry after the crash that

claimed the lives of 90 of the 123 passengers aboard. The cause of the crash was later determined to be flight crew error caused by systemic failures, both at the airline and within the DCA.

One-Two-Go's resumption of service came just at the start of the tourist high season, which this year was marred by the takeover of both civilian airports in Bangkok by People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) protesters.

One-Two-Go is also adding new flights to the northern province of Phitsanuloke, Mr Udom said. -Stephen Fein

Phuket's new top cop takes the reins

PHUKET: As outgoing Phuket Provincial Police Commander Apirak Hongtong prepares to leave for Surat Thani to take up his new position as Commander of Region 8 General Staff, Phuket's new top cop arrived on the island on April 12.

Maj Gen Pigad Thantipong, 57, was originally scheduled to begin his new assignment on April 1. However, his appointment was delayed by the recent political turmoil.

An official handover ceremony is scheduled to take place at Phuket Provincial Police Station on April 20.

Maj Gen Pigad, a 1977 graduate of the Royal Thai Police Cadet Academy, began his career in Nakhorn Sri Thammarat.

His career to date has kept him in the southern provinces, with successive positions in Songkhla, Yala and Surat Thani.

Prior to his appointment in Phuket, Gen Pigad served as Deputy Commander of the Surat Thani Police.

The floating menace?

he discovery in July 2008 of almost 40 box jellyfish in a fish trap in Nambor Bay, followed by a further 18, found at the same location just three months later, heralded a new threat to Phuket's battered and bruised tourist industry. In January of this year, Phuket's beaches were again invaded by a smack of "snotties", while more box jellyfish were discovered as recently as March.

Although stings from box jellyfish are rare, there have been a few recorded incidents in the waters around Thailand. In 2007, while swimming off Koh Mak in Trad, four-year-old Lewis Jones - on a family holiday from Australia – was badly stung by a box jellyfish. His father Andrew Jones recalled the events of that traumatic day.

"We had been on Koh Mak for just a few hours and went down to the beach for a swim. I got out of the water and then heard my son let out a scream that still chills me to the bone. I realized that something was terribly wrong.

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"He had been stung by a large multi-tentacled box jellyfish and within a matter of seconds he was unconscious. He had suffered cardiac and respiratory arrest, was starting to turn blue and was basically lying dead on the beach. It was by some miracle that he survived because looking at his wounds and lesions, he should be dead," Andrew said.

Lewis was lucky, Moa Bergman was not. Swimming in the Andaman Sea while on holiday in Koh Lanta, 10-year-old Moa was fatally stung by a box jellyfish. At the time, it was reported that she had suffered an allergic reaction to being stung and had died from anaphylactic shock. The chances of that were slim; there have only been two recorded deaths from anaphylactic shocks caused by a sting. One was the wife of a former Greek prime minister, the other was a dog. What killed Moa was a box jellyfish.

Last week, almost one year to the day after Moa's death, a seminar headed by Dr Lisa-Ann Gershwin – one of the world's foremost jellyfish experts - was

held in Phuket to educate Thai scientists, medical personnel and public about the threat of box and irukandji jellyfish, first aid treatment and precautionary measures

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that can be taken to reduce the chances of further stings.

Most people in Phuket are now aware of box jellyfish, yet few actually know much about them except that they are potentially fatal. Few people know about their habitats, genetic makeup and how their venom works.

The box jellyfish has the unfortunate distinction of being the most venomous creature on earth. The best-known box jellyfish and incidentally the most deadly is the Chironex fleckeri, but is only one of 19 species that are found around the globe.

"They're called box jellyfish, because of their box shape. They've got four corners and each of the corners has a single tentacle or a cluster of tentacles that can grow up to three meters in length.


"They're very transparent and very hard to see because they're practically invisible. They're also very simple organisms. They have no brain, no heart. They're just a glob of jelly with 'stingy bits'," explained Dr Gershwin.

A jellyfish's stinging cells – nematocysts - are all located within the tentacles, with the exception of the irukandji jellyfish, which can also sting with its bell. The nematocysts have a 'harpoon' that is coiled within a capsule and has a hair trigger. Once in contact with another object they discharge with a force of 40,000 Gs – the fastest biological transfer on earth.

There are a number of myths with regard to jellyfish. A common misconception is how the toxin works.

"The toxin from the box jel-





lyfish is a cardio-toxin, it affects the heart. The toxin floods the heart with calcium and it stops the heart in a contracted state – the heart is in effect locked. The box jellyfish is the only organism in the natural world that locks the heart. That's why Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is so important," she added.

Following a severe sting, death most commonly occurs within four minutes. Just 1.2 meters of tentacles are enough to kill a child in about three minutes, 3-5 meter tentacles can kill an adult in the same time. A fully developed multi-tentacled box jellyfish has enough venom to kill approximately 50 people.

Currently, three species of box jellyfish have been discovered in Thai waters, the multi-tentacled *Chiropsoide buitendejki* and *Tripedalia cystophora*, and the single-tentacled *Morbakka sp*. The stings that have been recorded, however, are not consistent with these jellyfish, leading scientists to wonder if there are other boxes lurking in Thai waters.

The box isn't the only potentially fatal jellyfish to be found in Thailand. The kingdom is home to irukandji, taken from the Aboriginal word meaning "to sting". Although often only as small as a finger nail, the irukandji is capable of causing immense pain despite its diminutive size. The specimens found in Thai waters are still awaiting classification.

Mangrove areas around Thailand are prime breeding grounds for box jellyfish, which are more likely to be encountered at beaches that are surrounded by mangroves. There are, however, a number of factors that could explain why numbers are increasing. It has been clear for some time that sea temperatures are rising, threatening coral reefs across the globe. Dr Gershwin, however, revealed that jellyfish are much more resistant to changing conditions.

"There has been a lot of research on jellyfish of many types – although not box and irukandji – that shows that jellyfish are responding well to increasing temperatures. In areas where there is over-fishing and increased urban development, jel-

lyfish numbers are also increasing and it's reasonable to suppose that box jellyfish and irukandjis will increase, too.

"When other species don't respond well to changing conditions, jellyfish are basically the last men standing," she said.

Over-fishing and development are two major issues that exist in Thailand and Phuket in particular. It is not beyond the realms of possibility that the rapid development of the island has led to an increase in the number of potentially fatal jellyfish.

However, it is not all doom and gloom. Australia has a far more severe jellyfish problem. Through correct management, however, coastal tourism has not only survived, it has thrived. Since implementing measures to reduce the risk of being stung in the Whitsunday region of Queensland, the number of hospitalizations has fallen from 38 per year to just three in the past four years.


Australia has set the standard and Thailand needs to follow its lead.

"The most important thing is awareness that the jellyfish problem exists. It's also important to have accurate messages so that local people are informed and are all singing from the same song sheet. There's nothing more disturbing for a tourist than asking five separate people 'What's up with the jellyfish?' and getting five different answers. If you get the same answer, then you know that people are dealing with it," Dr Gershwin said.

In a bid to reduce the chance of stings, experts in Australia have had tremendous success with vinegar stations and stinger nets at the beach and encouraging the use of full-body stinger suits.

Vinegar is the key to the treatment of box jellyfish stings. Although unable to prevent initial stings from occurring, the acidic nature of vinegar neutralizes any remaining venom contained within the tentacles stopping additional toxins from entering the body.

Before nets were employed in northern Queensland, there was on average one box jellyfishrelated death every four years between 1884 and 1981. After



nets were introduced, the average has fell one death every 10 years. Compare this with the Northern Territories where nets aren't used and where the average has actually risen.

The nets and the service they require are expensive, costing A\$50,000 per year. However, given the amount of people that use the beaches in Phuket, their lifesaving potential cannot be underestimated. Kim Moss, the manager of Uninet in Cairns, Australia has been working with stinger nets for over 20 years.

"The nets are similar to the trawl nets that fishermen use and are very simple. They have a float at the top and a chain to hold them down at the bottom. The nets are set up to be highly portable and once the fittings are in place, the nets can be pulled in an out in about an hour. Nothing can ever be 100% successful, but there's never been a fatality using our nets," Kim said.

The full body "stinger suit" is another effective tool successfully employed in the Whitsundays. The suit drastically reduces the potential for stings simply by covering the skin. It was calculated that 75% of stings treated at a Cairns hospital in 2002 could have been prevented had the victims worn protective clothing.

With intelligent management, Phuket can follow the example set

by Australia and successfully attract tourists despite the presence of venomous jellyfish. There are many important lessons to be learned. If Phuket is serious about maintaining its reputation as one of the world's premier resort destinations, this issue needs to be tackled head on.

"It is of the utmost importance to make people aware of the situation because these creatures can kill in a matter of minutes. People need to know what to do should a sting occur," concluded Andrew Jones – someone who knows only too well what is at stake.



FIRST AID STEPS FOR BOX JELLYFISH STINGS

- 1. Call the emergency services: It is very difficult to maintain CPR alone. Ensure that professional assistance is called for immediately.
- 2. Treat the person:Monitor the ABC's (Airway, Breathing, Circulation) and give Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation if required.
- 3.Treat the sting:Douse the affected area with vinegar and carefully remove tentacles. DO NOT under any circumstances use fresh water, hot water or sand.
- 4. Seek medical attention.



Death of monks prompts temple smoking ban

BANGKOK: The Public Health dhists to give up smoking," said Mekong River Monk Network Ministry will issue a total ban on smoking in temples nationwide, following the discovery that over 18,000 monks were suffering or had died from chronic diseases such as cancer, tuberculosis, and pulmonary emphysema.

Dr Prakit Vathesatogkit, who heads the Action On Smoking And Health Foundation, said the new ministerial issuance to ban smoking in temples as well as in schools and hospitals, will be announced by the Disease Control Department.

The proposed ban was not only to reduce the number of monks who smoke, "but also because we want the monks to be role models encouraging Bud-

Injection drive against influenza

BANGKOK: Flu affects 70,000 -900,000 Thais a year, and 12,000-75,000 of them are hospitalized with complications such as lung disease and pneumonia, the Public Health Ministry said on April 4.

Noting that the elderly were 11 times more prone to lung disease from flu than others, Deputy Public Health Minister Manit Nopamornbodi said flu shots would reduce prevalence among the elderly by 50% and among those with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease fourfold.

He told a vaccine-campaign launch in Buri Ram's Lahan Sai District that the ministry and the National Health Security Office had prepared 1.79 million doses of flu vaccine this year for those with any one of seven chronic illDr Prakit.

A 2003-2004 study conducted by the Priest Hospital found that cancer, tuberculosis, and pulmonary emphysema were the most common chronic diseases affecting some 18,000 monks with nicotine habits.

Another study conducted in 2004 by Mahidol University's Faculty of Public Health showed that 91% of monks nationwide supported a ban on monks smoking, while 80% agreed to prohibit devotees from giving cigarettes to monks.

"We have seen that over the past few years most monks suffered from smoking or exposure to second hand smoke," said the

Secretary General Abbot Maha Worawuth Panyawuttho.

Giving monks cigarettes is a bad reflection on Buddhist society, he added.

Many studies revealed that a number of social problems are caused by gambling, smoking and drinking alcohol. Such behaviour could also lead to drug addiction in children. The Northeastern region alone is home to over 35 million smokers.

In a bid to fight smoking in temples, the foundation has collaborated with the Mekong River Monk Network in a pilot program creating smoke-free zones in 180 temples in five provinces in the north of the country, he added.

nesses. Vaccinations will be given from July 1 to August 31.

The entitled are those suffering from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, asthma, heart disease, stroke, liver failure, diabetes as well as cancer patients on chemotherapy, he said

The vaccines would also be given to the health officials deemed at high exposure to flu virus. Another 400,000 doses of vaccine to prevent bird flu in fowl have also been prepared,

Mr Manit added.

Disease Control Department deputy chief Prapa Tangsrikiatkul said that the flu strains common in Thailand have not yet been found to mutate, so the vaccine could prevent an estimated 70% to 90% of people catching the three strains.

The ministry vaccinated 520,000 at-risk people last year and the shots were so effective that only four deaths from flu complications were reported.

Feisty fish, painful problem

PHICHIT: Doctors in Phichit tum ever recorded in Thailand – Hospital were presented with a medical conundrum on March 25, when an eight-year-old boy was brought in with a climbing perch stuck up his bottom.

The boy, whose name was given in media reports but is omitted here, was carried into the hospital by his 60-year-old grand-

The boy told doctors that on the way home from school he and some friends saw a great number of climbing perch splashing in the mud of a drying-out pond.

Seizing the rare opportunity, the boys stripped off and jumped in to catch the fish.

As the boy was grabbing perch, he felt something push into his bottom. Using his hands to feel what was causing the odd sensation, he felt the tail fins of a wriggling fish sticking out his anus.

Before he could do anything, however, the little fish lived up to its name and climbed all the way into his bottom.

The boy shouted for his friends to go and get help, and his grandmother rushed him to hospital.

At the hospital doctors Xrayed the boy, who was in considerable pain from the sharp spines and fins of the little fish that was still thrashing around inside him.

On the X-ray, doctors saw a fish between two and three centimetres long lodged in the entrance to his lower intestine.

Led by Deputy Hospital Director Dr Suchat Thepharak, a team of three doctors held a brainstorming session to decide how to proceed with the delicate removal operation, which was much complicated by the sharp spines of climbing perch.

With the perch facing forward, extracting it tail first would risk the spines or fins puncturing the boy's intestinal wall. The situation was further exacerbated by the fact that the hardy little fish continued unabated its wriggling struggle for existence.

A frantic search for research papers on similar cases proved fruitless: apparently this was the first case of a climbing perch climbing up someone's recand possibly the world.

Doctors first considered pumping anaesthetic gas up the boy's bottom to knock out the fish, making its retrieval easier.

After this plan was dismissed for safety reasons, Dr Bussakon Wangphayon suggested injecting the fish with anaesthetic by sticking a needle up the boy's rectum, then extracting the spiny intruder with forceps.

If this plan failed, open surgery would be the only remaining option, the doctors concluded.

Deciding to go ahead with the injection, the doctors managed to knock the fish out. Then, in a delicate two-hour procedure, they extracted the fish with forceps while continually pushing the spines inward to prevent them from lodging inside the boy.

At the end of the operation the boy was in a stable condition but required extended observation owing to the risk of infection.

Asked about the experience, the boy said he would never go fishing again.

Ministry of Public Health Spokesperson Dr Suphan Srithamma advised that when swimming in bodies of water that have small animals like fish and leeches capable of entering through an orifice – especially the anus – people should be sure to wear tight-fitting underwear.

If something unexpected should happen – such as a fish climbing up one's anus – try to keep as still as possible to prevent it from climbing further up the alimentary canal; then get to hospital as fast as possible.

If the animal has sharp spines there is a risk that it could rupture the intestinal wall and move into the abdominal cavity, which would be very dangerous, Dr Suphan said.

Climbing perch, also known as climbing gouramies, are able to climb out of water and travel short distances on land using their gill plates, fins and tail. Their ability to survive on atmospheric oxygen allows them to survive out of water – or even up an anus – for some time in search of a new aquatic home.

"Traffy" to the rescue for savvy commuters

BANGKOK: In a few months' time, commuters in Bangkok and upcountry will be able to report traffic conditions real-time via a http:// website: traffy.nectec.or.th

Wasan Pattara-atikom, senior researcher of National Electronics and Computer Technology Center (Nectec) said that a research team is developing the prototype of Intelligent Transport System (ITS) version II.

Named "Traffy version II", the site will be aimed at creating a social network for Internet-enabled motorists to exchange information about road conditions.

The Traffy new version will allow commuters and people to more easily access, input, and archive traffic information in real-time via the Internet, iPhone, as well as smart phones that run on Windows Mobile, Java and Symbian environments.

The new Traffy, to be based in part on Google Maps, will allow commuters to access traffic conditions in real-time from the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA)'s intelligent traffic signboards at 850 intersections as well as closed-circuit television images from the Expressway Authority of Thailand (EAT).

The system will provide route suggestions and "tool boxes" enabling commuters to receive predictions of traffic conditions "with a 90% accuracy rate", according to Mr Wasan.

In Bangkok alone there are two million people who commute by cars and public transport, with another 8 million who get around by motorbike. With an estimated average of four million trips a day, even a one minute reduction per trip would significantly help save energy costs and limit pollution, he said.

First payment as govt gets ready for "elderly society"

demonstrators clogged the streets of the capital, Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva on National Elderly Day presided over a ceremony at Muang Thong Thani Stadium in Nonthaburi to transfer the Bt500 monthly government allowance to eligible elderly people.

Thailand is entering an "elderly society" state, with the population ratio of elderly citizens predicted to rise from 10% to 20% in the next 20 years. To ease the transition, the government will speed up the national pension system to let seniors earn income from their savings during their older years, he said.

PM Abhisit said the allowance, to benefit people over 60 years of age who were not employees or civil servants, should reach them by the end of this month

Although Bt500 was insufficient to meet living costs, it was at least a start and a reflection of senior citizens. The government is also establishing criteria to extend the Elderly Fund's loan ceiling from Bt15,000 to Bt30,000 so that seniors with potential could borrow money to start businesses, he said.

Government agencies were promoting more activities involving the elderly and the Education Ministry was asked to draw up a curriculum, allowing students to visit senior citizens for 12 hours per week, he added.

Besides presenting the symbolic Bt500 allowance to five representatives, PM Abhisit conferred the outstanding senior citizen award 2009 on Thanphuying Phulsab Noppawong, awarded sponsorship and loan certificates to seniors' vocational projects, and trophies for elderly athletes.

Social Development and Human Security Minister Issara Somchai said the Senior Citizen

BANGKOK: While red-shirted society's gratitude towards its Act had been amended so Thai governments could continue providing the monthly allowance to all entitled elderly people.

Public Health Department chief Dr Narongsak Unkasuwapala said the current ratio of elderly Thais, now at 10%, is expected to rise to 16% in 10 years.

Thanks to better access to medical care and improved education promoting healthy lifestyles, the average longevity of Thais is currently 71 years; 75 for women and 68 years for men.

Dr Narongsak said discussions on elderly issues agreed senior citizens suffered three main problems: firstly, illnesses from physical deterioration and ageing, lowered income from limited physical capacity and lack of supporting children; and thirdly, psychological problems of loneliness and abandonment by their children.

Average student test scores on an upward curve: Obec

BANGKOK: Students' academic performance has not dropped across the board in recent years as has been reported in some media, said the Office of Basic Education Commission (Obec).

Average scores in some subjects have even improved, Obec secretary general Khunying Kasama Varawarn said on April 8.

According to national tests, Grade 3 students' average scores in Thai language have climbed from 48.26 in 2007 to 51.59 in 2008.

In the Ordinary National Educational Test (Onet), average scores in science for Grade 6 students rose from 43.17 in 2006 to 49.57 and 51.68 in the subsequent two years.

For students studying English language, average scores have improved from 34.51 (2006) to 36.68 (2007) and again to 37.62 (2008), she revealed.

Grade 9 students' average scores in Onet have also increased in mathematics, up from 21.15 in 2006 to 34.56 in 2008.

Khunying Kasama reckons that students' academic performances did not show any clear improvement, as average Onet scores for Grade 12 students have fluctuated slightly in all subjects.

Obec was going to analyze the scores from Onet and national tests in a bid to identify factors affecting academic performances, she said.

"We will also check which of our improvement projects are effective and which ones are not, so that we can improve the quality of educational services further," she said.

Lack of teaching materials, failure by some schools to provide quality instruction and a shortage of capable teachers were among the reasons why the average scores have not shown significant improvement, she said.

Flederer Ralf, 39, also known as "Becki", was shot once in the hip when intruders broke into his house in the early hours of March 30.

Mr Ralf is a website designer and has been living in the more than a decade.

He is well known among members of the area's Thai community and among foreigners around the world, due to the popularity of his website dedicated to covering the island and its events.

Mr Ralf had been openly pursuing a push towards eradicating late-night parties in the area as the noise was said to be disturbing residents.

Mr Ralf told police that the attackers came to his home armed with a baseball bat and a large piece of wood.

Mr Ralf woke to find the two men on his balcony and surprised them when he approached them.

There was a struggle between the three, during which one of the intruders took out a gun and fired it several times, injuring Mr Ralf. The intruders then fled on a motorbike.

Police were called by neighbors after they heard the shots and went to Mr Ralf's home to find him injured from the attack.

The neighbors later told police that the attackers had returned to the scene some time after the first incident but fled again after realizing that other people had gone to Mr Ralf's aid.

Police are still searching for the attackers, who are said to be young Thai males in their early Ban Tai area of the island for twenties, and around 160cm tall.

BANGKOK: Two Algerian nationals were arrested at Suvarnabhumi Airport in Bangkok after disembarking from an aircraft that had flown in to Bangkok from Koh Samui.

The Tourist Police made an announcement of the pair's arrest after learning that the men had been traveling with false passports. They are suspected of being involved in about 30 robberies on Koh Samui as well as an unknown number of crimes at several other tourist destinations around Thailand.

Koh Samui police had been tracking the two suspects and had spotted them on CCTV camera footage when they attempted to purchases goods at the Big C supermarket in Bophut.

The credit cards used by the suspects belonged to tourists who had filed reports with police of theft from the room at the resort where they had been staying.

From their investigations, police learned that the suspects had been checking in to resort rooms, posing as tourists. The suspects would then duplicate the keys in order to enter the rooms when they were later occupied by other guests.


According to police, the pair would then sell the items they had stolen and make purchases with cash and stolen credit cards.


Police at Suvarnabhumi Airport seized several items from the suspects, including, three laptop computers, a video camera, seven digital cameras, five mobile phones, three iPods, three mp3 players, seven watches and a lady's handbag.

The items were said to have a combined value of at least 500,000 baht. Many of the items were new and believed to have been bought by the suspects using the stolen credit cards.

Police believe the pair had been operating in this way in Phuket, Pattaya and Samui for about two years. Several of the pair's victims have been contacted so their belongings can be returned to them upon proper verification.

Police are still trying to determine how the pair managed to avoid detection after entering the country on false passports.





Keeping tradition alive

rom April 13 to 15 each year, many Thais return to their homes to celebrate the end of one year and to welcome the next. Here in Phuket, tourists congregate in their thousands to take part in one of the most enjoyable festivals in the Kingdom.

Songkran is traditionally a time to visit and pay respect to elders, namely family members, friends and neighbors. In days gone by, people would pour a little water onto the hands or the shoulders of the elders to pay respect. Today, Songkran has become a giant water fight where people roam the streets with water pistols, bottles, hoses and any container they can get their hands on, often preying on unsuspecting tourists.

Aside from the throwing of water, many Thais visit the local wat (Buddhist temples) during the festival to make merit (tumboon) through prayer, giving alms to the monks and cleansing images of Buddha. It is believed that this will bring good fortune and prosperity for the coming year.

In the build up to the festival, elderly Thais gathered in Sripuwanat Park in tambon Wichit to celebrate the National Day of the Elderly. Those who attended received gifts from a number of organizations around the island, before enjoying a free check up from Phuket International Hospital

The event was then officially opened by Mr Kreetar Saetan, mayor of Wichit Municipality,

who, along with other attending dignitaries, presented each of the attendees with a flower garland before everyone sat back to enjoy performances by groups of local children and elderly Phuketians.

When the entertainment was brought to a close, the elders took part in a blessing ceremony in which water was poured onto their hands to show respect.

Elsewhere, Phuket City Municipality arranged the ordination of a group of young monks at Wichitsangkaram Temple (*Wat Kuan*) in honor of HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn. The annual ceremony is held in summertime before Songkran in the hope of encouraging the youngsters to lead good lives.











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The land of the long white wine

in Australia for almost two years – sampling many of their delicious red and white wines in the process – I was convinced that the undisputed King of New World wine was the "Land down un-

der". My opinion never wavered, even in the face of fierce criticism from others. By Dan Ogunshakin Never wa-

vered, that is, until I visited New Zealand.

Rare -

After spending a month in Aoteroa – a Maori name meaning "the land of the long white cloud"- I was hooked by the country, the rugby and the wines. To this day, the Sauvignon Blancs from the Marlborough region remain my favorite whites, while their reds are more than adequate.

While I would never claim to be a connoisseur – more of a lush, to be perfectly honest – I believe I know enough about wine to spot a good one when I quaff it.

So, when offered the opportunity to enjoy "An evening of extraordinary wines with Kai Schubert" from Schubert Winery, New Zealand, held at La Trattoria restaurant at Dusit Thani Laguna Phuket, I jumped at the chance.

The award-winning Schubert Winery was established in 1998 by Kai Schubert and his partner Marion Deimling. While looking for the ideal spot to establish their vineyard, the partners came across Martinborough in the

aving previously lived Wairarapa Valley. Impressed as they were by the wines they sampled there, they decided nevertheless to continue their search, which took them to parts of Australia, Europe and the US. Ultimately, however, the appeal of Martinborough proved decisive.

Schubert and offered Crosstini a la Felix with olive tapenade and a crisp 2008 Pinot Noir Rosé.

The saltiness of the tapenade was countered by the pale rosé, with its delicate hint of

wild berries. A couple of glasses together with the delicious crosstini whetted the palette nicely in anticipation of the fourcourse meal to follow – each dish carefully selected by Chef Felix

Bamert to complement the wine. Before each course was

served, those in attendance were treated to an explanation of each wine by Mr Schubert, with regard to how it was produced and things to look out for - cue furious note taking.

The meal commenced with a pea ravioli with a menthe vanilla butter accompanied by a 2007 Schubert Sauvignon Blanc. Pale and reasonably dry - although not as dry as some -

it had a fruity roundness with a grapefruit finish. The menthe vanilla butter that accompanied the al dente raviolli was an excellent bedfellow for the zesty white.

The first red wine of the evening was a 2007 Cabernet Merlot, which accompanied a date soup with chilli and almond brick. An avowed fan of Cabernet Sauvignon, I was nevertheless utterly enchanted by the fabulous, full-bodied Schubert Cabernet Merlot.

Deep ruby in color, with a spiced cherry bouquet and a long smooth finish, the soft gamy notes of the wine were a match made in heaven for the thick, brown, spicy soup that was sweet to the point that bordered on a delicious sickliness.

> While we took the time to cleanse the palette with water between courses, Mr Schubert took the opportunity to describe the final two wines that we would enjoy that evening.

The third course entailed white prawns with panchetta and ratatouille served with a 2005 Schubert Tri-bianco. Of all the wines tasted that evening, the Tribianco was by far the most unusual.

As the name suggests, the Tribianco is made from three different varieties of grape - Chardonnay, Pinot Gris and Müller-Thurgau. The result is a wine the color of light honey with a taste to match. Along with the honey flavor, the Tribianco contained elements of mandarin, vanilla and a smoky finish from toasty oak that, like the Pinot Noir Rosé, complemented the salty element of the food, in this case the

The final wine of the evening was a 2006 Marion Pinot Noir served with lamb cutlets on jus de fig and parsnip purée. The Pinot Noir was dry and acidic with a deep color, not

unlike the Cabernet Merlot. This fruity red was silky smooth with notes of cherry and raspberry. It was undeniably drinkable, although, it must be said, not as good as the fabulous Cabernet Merlot.

The lamb was the culinary highlight of the repast, particularly for those starved of it here in Thailand. No true New Zealand wine dinner would have been complete without a taste of its most populous inhabitant.

I consider myself a true carnivore, and while others may have blanched at how rare the lamb was served, it was cooked perfectly for my vampiric tastes; seasoned well, deliciously complementing the jus de fig.

Sadly, the wine was now at an end, but there was still dessert to enjoy. The blinis, candied fruits and berries on sour ice cream brought the meal to a wonderful close.

Reflecting back, each dish was the perfect partner for each of the wines brought over by the Schubert Winery, while the stand-out performers on the night were undoubtedly the Cabernet Merlot and the lamb

Hearty congrats to both Felix and Kai. My only gripe was that the food and wine ran out and that I had to go home. Still, time eno-ugh to pick up a bottle of wine on the way home – a lush until the very end.





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Once, twice, three times a baby

hile becoming a mother can undoubtedly be a joyous experience, there is no doubt that it can also be tough – particularly if you are a single mum. Spare a thought then for Melissa Matchapato who, abandoned by the father, gave birth to not one, not two, but three children.

That was almost three years ago and since then, friend Tony Pope has been helping support the triplets through his charity, Helpline (formerly Thaitanic).

"How Melissa copes is a mystery. She sells Isarn food from her motorbike, which I converted to hold the triplets, but she does not make a huge amount of money," he told the Gazette.

While other aid agencies or individuals have each helped to support Melissa for brief periods of time, the main burden of responsibility continues to fall on Tony Pope and Helpline.

"We've had other people help out, in particular CoCo de Mer fund manager Barry Cager, who helped out for six months, as well as a couple from Sweden, the Ekhems. However people and agencies tend to help for only a few months at a time, after which it is back to Help-line," he said.

Other avenues have been explored, including attempting to locate the triplets' German father, who was adamant that Melissa should go ahead with the birth, citing his family's strong religious beliefs as a major factor.

Unfortunately, these beliefs did not extend towards actually supporting the family himself and he abandoned Melissa and the triplets and fled, never to be seen again.

Tony has attempted to trace the man, hoping that if he came and saw the triplets, he would instantly fall in love with them, but to no avail.

Now Pimpika, Petcharat and Pattapong are two years and six months old. In a few months time, they should be starting preschool which, at a cost of Bt2,000 per child, per term, will cost Bt12,000 per year.

Financial help is desperately needed but Tony is eager to take a back seat in the process. "I

don't take donations. I prefer money is going," he explained. people to give money directly. If people want to give money they can contact me and I will introduce them to the triplets. Then they can decide what they want to give the money for and they will be able to see where that

Melissa herself is struggling to control the triplets. With no one else to take care of them she is forced to take them everywhere she goes.

"Now they are getting older, they are fighting all the time.

When I am working I have to keep them all on a leash in my motorbike because it is the only way I can control them. I need someone else to help me take care of them so I can get some rest," she said.

Taking care of triplets is

clearly not a one-woman job and Melissa is in urgent need of help in looking after Pimpika, Petcharat and Pattapong.

Woody Leonhard

Woody Leonhard is feeling a inside information about bugs or other issues. He's writing another book for the popular 'Dummies' series to help the world understand the operating principles behind the latest version of Microsoft Windows 7. He says he can't remember how many books he's authored, but he guesses it's over 40.

"Writing computer books is high pressure as they have to be ready by the time the computer program is put on the market. Currently, I have just a few weeks to get the Windows 7 book completed to coincide with the launch next month," Woody explains.

His books are no small projects. His larger manuals are around 750 pages. To learn about Woody's career as a technical writer for the computer industry, one has to go on the Internet to discover more about this nice man who offers what he calls "computer therapy" most Sundays to Phuket's army of residents who have questions about anything to do with computers.

One learns that he is considered to be provocative in the computer industry as he has made a career of exposing many of the problems in programs developed by Microsoft. Many of the tips on the problems with these programs come from Microsoft's own staff, who send Woody the

Woody did not plan to become a global guru for the computer industry. He planned to study theoretical physics in university. Like Albert Einstein. But he also wanted to make money and retire early, and he discovered that theoretical physics did not promise a lucrative career, so he turned to math.

He graduated from Whitman College in the United States with his Bachelor's Degree in Math, Summa Cum Laude, and was then granted a Master's in Computer Science from the University of Colorado. He was then ready to make his desired fortune and accepted a job planning the deployment of computer systems for Saudi Arabia's oil conglomerate, Aramco. During this five year stint, Woody visited Thailand for the first time, in 1983, and was delighted with much the country had to offer.


By 1985, Woody had made his money and he returned to Colorado where he bought a house on top of a mountain and settled into early retirement. While writing a book about his experience with Aramco, he used Word for Windows and discovered hundreds of bugs and wrote a 200 page book about how to get around those problems. It was the beginning of his new career.

He spent the next sixteen years becoming one of the world's leading experts on how to navigate through successive computer programs. He has received eight Computer Press Awards from the Computer Press Association and two Neal Awards from the American Business Press for his contributions.

In 2000, Woody moved to Thailand. He chose Phuket, he says, because he could get a good cup of coffee here.

"I chose Phuket because I liked the then recently opened Starbucks on the beach road in Patong. It's where I met my wife, Khun Add, who was the manager," he says. "Back then, the coffee was great but the pastries were terrible. One day, Khun Add made me a cheesecake that was delicious and we thought we could open a bakery providing Starbucks with the pastries they now sell."

While Woody continued writing computer manuals, his wife expanded their bakery. By 2004, they figured Phuket needed a good sandwich shop and opened their first such restaurant in Aroonsom Plaza in Patong. They've since added two more locations on the island, Chalong and Cherngtalay. It is in these stores that Woody offers his immensely popular Sunday morning "computer therapy" sessions for local residents, whom he regularly asks: "Is your computer driving you nuts?" - Bruce Stanley

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

ollowing the establishment of the Fine Arts Department of the Ministry of Palace Affairs – now called Silpakorn University – and its Faculty of Fine Art by Italian-born Professor Silpa Bhirasri, contemporary art in Thailand blossomed.

Professor Silpa is widely regarded as the father of modern art in Thailand, and his contribution to Thai culture is celebrated each year on the day of his birth, now known as Silpa Bhirasri Day.

The professor's influence invigorated the development of Thai art, with traditional styles fused with Western art to create works that are still valued today.

Many of the works put on show at that time were the work of young artists, whose exhibits were termed "failed" pieces. They would be used as part of an exhibition simply as a means of highlighting the craftsmanship of the so-called "masterpieces" on display; once the exhibition was over, these "disposable" works of art were simply tossed away.

Kritsana Chaikitwattana is an alumnus of Silapakorn University. Born in Haad Yai in 1977, he is now regarded as one of Thailand's most talented young artists.

In the second of D Gallery's Absolutely Aesthetics series,

which features the work of emerging Thai artists, Kritsana presents the aesthetic contrasts between those "classic" and "failed" works and poses the question, "What is the true value behind them?"

Kritsana creates his pieces by carving on vinyl tile or plywood and then painting with oil. For the artist, the scratches and patches that appear on his richly colored and textured creations symbolize the passing of time.

His compassion for today's society and his homage to Thai women provided the inspiration for his earlier exhibition back in February entitled "Venuses of Bangkok", in which he focused on the enduring strength of Thai women and their changing roles in society. A number of his other paintings dramatize the contrast and disparity between the middle class and the poorer segments of Thai society.

Kritsana has had his work exhibited a number of times in Thailand, as well as putting on shows in Korea in 2003, Spain in 2005, and Taiwan in 2006.

The exhibition of Kritsana's work will be on show at D Gallery at the Royal Phuket Marina from May 29 to June 30, 2009. For more information visit the D Gallery website at www.dgallery.co.th.

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

Exploring the jewel of Africa

ear the tip of South Africa and spreading from the foot of Table Mountain, nestles a city known as the Jewel of Africa: Cape Town. The city is surrounded by glorious landscapes, unique vegetation, beautiful mountains and stunning beaches, Cape Town is considered by many to be one of the most beautiful cities in the world. The city is the most popular tourist destination in South Africa, attracting millions of visitors every year. As the saying goes, 'Once people have seen Table Mountain, they always come back'.

Many wellknown performers either reside in the city or visit frequently to attend events such as the popular International Jazz Festival, which attracts an audience of over 30,000 annually.

The city's architecture blends a variety of influences, the most famous being the beautiful Cape Dutch Architectural style, which is unique to the area. The city also boasts a large number of beautifully preserved historical buildings, including the Castle of Good Hope and the Houses of Parliament, both of which are open to the public.

Food and wine lovers visiting Cape Town – and particularly the Cape Winelands of Stellenboach, Paarl and Franschhoek -

South African wines are widely ranked as among the best in the world and there is a marvelous variety of fine restaurants and vineyards in which to indulge your passion. The food quality is usually very good and one can find almost anything the heart desires, from African, Asian, and Italian to Cape Malay, a unique cuisine of Malaysian origin. Fresh fish and seafood is offered on most menus daily. South Africans also love their meat and it is said that you will find some of the best

steaks in this part of the world.

Outdoor life is a big thing in Cape Town. In the summer months between November and March, the beaches around the city are packed with people. As Cape Town is lo-

cated between the Indian and Atlantic Oceans, the enthusiastic swimmer who finds the frigid waters of the Atlantic a little too cold for comfort will have the enviable option of a short hop over to the Indian Ocean beaches in False Bay.

South Africans are fiercely passionate about their sport. Just about every kind of sporting activity is on offer in Cape Town – from diving to paragliding. A number of the main yearly events revolve around sports activities,

such as the Cape Argus Cycle Tour, the Two Oceans Marathon or the Met Horseracing event. Hikers can explore the region on umpteen mountain hiking trails and observe the area's spectacular flora, fauna and wildlife. Golf lovers can choose from no fewer than 11 golf courses in Cape Town alone. Some of the world's

best kitesurfers regularly make the pilgrimage to Cape Town, attracted by its ideal sea and wind conditions.

The wind is a much discussed topic in the city -especially in the early summer months of November and De-

cember. The South-Easter, also known as the Cape Doctor, can blow fiercely for days on end, usually outstaying its welcome. The fresh Summer breeze, blowing in off the sea, can mask the 35 degrees Celsius temperatures, while the sun can be fiercely hot.

Although summers are generally pleasant and winters mild – with moderate rain throughout the year – the weather can be unpre-

restaurants and hotels, it is a must-see for every visitor to Cape Town.

The Mouillie, Sea and Green Point areas, which house many of the city's high-rise apartment blocks, play host to Cape Town's vibrant nightlife scene. Green Point will also be one of the focal points for the forthcoming 2010 FIFA World

Beautiful beaches line the shore along the Atlantic Seaboard via Clifton to the young and trendy Camps Bay. Imposing private homes and apartment buildings are perched on the hills behind the coastal road where property prices are among some of the area's most expensive.

Driving further along the Atlantic Seaboard towards Cape Point, visitors will arrive at Hout Bay. This fishing town sits picturesquely in a sheltered bay, bordered to the west by Karbonkel Mountain and the famous Mount Sentinel, and to the east, by the Constantia Mountains and Chapman's Peak. North of Cape Town, along the Atlantic Seaboard, Table Bay and Blouberg are famous for their wide, sandy beaches, surfers and kitesurfers, and the spectacular sunsets over Table Mountain. One of Africa's biggest shopping malls, Canal Walk, is located in the Northern areas, within easy reach of the motorway.

The magical city of Cape Town continues to captivate visitors for a variety of reasons. However, many first-time visitors to the city are apprehensive about crime, poverty and class differences between blacks and whites. It is recommended that visitors seek guidance from someone with local knowledge about the "dos" and "don'ts" but common sense will make the visit an enjoyable one.

The country is working hard in these areas and there have been major improvements recently. As with anywhere else in the world, criminals are in the minority and it would be a shame to let apprehension and prejudice spoil a visit to such a beautiful place. Cape Town will welcome you.




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or many, the idea of producing an open-top luxury sporting sedan would seem obvious, yet it has been a long time in the making. At the Geneva Salon in early March, Lexus finally unveiled the IS250C, an open-top version of its highly successful IS range.

The IS250C has the same proven engine as the sedan, producing 204 bhp (153 kW) from its 2.5 liters, coupled with a six-speed automatic transmission. The Lexus also boasts the world's fastest three-part aluminum roof, opening and closing in just 20 seconds.

Although the convertible is clearly based on the IS sedan, it shares only the hood, headlamps and door handles with the closed car.

Longer overhangs – both front and rear – improve the aero-dynamics with the roof down, new fog lamps are incorporated into the front air dam, while there are new combination tail-lamp clusters as well as a high-mounted LED stop lamp on the upper lip of the trunk.

The interior, as you would expect from the luxury arm of Toyota, is sumptuously appointed. The audio system is a top quality, 12-speaker Mark Levinson Surround System, with equalizer tuning to ensure consistent sound quality whether the roof is up or down, automatically adapting to the loss of bass when the roof is stowed.

There is a slightly less impressive 8-speaker 246 Watt stereo if your budget will not run to the amazing US-built Levinson,



but both systems are fully iPodcompatible and also accept Bluetooth mobile phone connection with an audio/video streaming function.

The front seats feature integral seat belts, while the full-size rear seats are set a little further inboard than in the closed sedan, optimizing headroom.

The doors also open wider than those of the closed car, allowing easy access to the rear. A one-touch walk-in button offers high-speed automatic front seat fold-and-slide activation.

The instrument panel and ancillary components, as well as the steering wheel, are copied from the IS sedan, although the driver's instrument binnacle has been extensively revised to increase roof-down visibility.

The color of the dials has been changed, LED contrast increased, and the glass light transmission reduced from 30% to 20%. The dial needle shape has been revised and the dials them-

selves feature metal-tone ring surrounds. The central multifunction display has a hard-top status indicator – just in case you are unsure whether the roof is up or down!

The climate control system has been specially configured for top-down motoring with the addition of speed-sensitive control that automatically increases air flow in roof-down mode, upping the flow further as the speed increases.

Safety is a high priority with any Lexus and the IS250C has been engineered with the aim of achieving a top rating in both the Euro and US NCAP crash testing, thereby offering world-class safety in either coupé or convertible configuration. Both active and passive safety has been adapted to the open car, which includes Lexus's state-of-the-art vehicle dynamics integrated management (VDIM), combining shorter stopping distances on split-surface highways and a re-

vised pre-crash safety system. It also operates seatbelt pretensioners and the pre-crash brake assist functions, as well as integrating the world's first SRS twin-chamber passenger airbag.

Further improving the Lexus's safety characteristics are larger, newly designed side airbags, providing increased head protection in the event of a side impact. The coupé-convertible bodyshell has also been equipped with additional energy-absorbing impact pads for both front and rear seat occupants.

The new Lexus IS250C is undoubtedly a welcome addition to the Lexus line-up and offers a luxury alternative to the competing BMW 3-series convertible and the similar Audi. For more details—the IS250C is not yet on Lexus's Thai site—go to www.lexus.com.

MONEY TALKS By Richard Watson

ast week's article covered some background information on Personal Portfolio Bonds (PPBs) and their use for expats. This week's article rounds off the subject. Naturally, it can only skim the surface, since it touches on other related matters which, in

themselves, are often complex.

An increasing number of insurance companies are allowing clients with PPBs to sign a "nomination of beneficiary" form, which allows all the assets of the PPB to be paid out immediately on the death of the PPB holder. This form can be updated at any time if a change of beneficiary is required.

Naturally, certified copies of the death certificate will be required and insurance companies may ask more questions, simply to satisfy "reasonable doubt". This is a free service, as are income payments. When insurance companies give anything away free of charge, grab it! Seriously,

this is a great advantage for many people and it is so simple.

In more complicated cases, a trust may be required to protect the assets for future generations. The most common are Discretionary Offshore Trusts but there are many other types of trust, most of which can be held by a PPB.

Insurance companies generally avoid offering trust services themselves but will normally give specimen wording for various types of trusts. This is another free service and is often combined with tax, domicile and other related areas. All insurance companies have technical departments that are staffed by experts in matters relating to expats. This is a really useful service for clients, where relevant.

Although insurance companies will normally not manage trust companies, there is at least one exception that manages a full trust service. The advantage to clients is simplicity plus very low fees, when compared with the overwhelming number of offshore trustees available. It seems that where an insurance company has a trust company, they are not looking to make a profit, but simply to minimize the costs entailed.

PPBs can also be owned by companies. For example, an Isle of Man PPB can be owned by a British Virgin Island (BVI) com-

pany or a Bermuda or Jersey company, and so on.

Partnerships can also hold PPBs and some insurance companies will even insure a PPB; this can be very useful if a breadwinner's death would impact negatively on surviving family members. It may seem strange that offshore insurance companies don't sell insurance but it is nevertheless a fact. Life assurance is a low margin business. No company will even pay commission on any insurance sold with a PPB.

Many people have heard of QROPS in the last year or two. It simply means that it is a Qualified Recognized Overseas Pensions Scheme. This is a UK Pension/Self-Invested Personal Pension (SIPP) that is able to be transferred offshore to an acceptable recipient. What happens - after a mountain of paperwork has been created - is that the money almost always goes into a PPB and a trustee holds it as an asset. The trustee has to be fully acceptable to the UK authorities. I normally use Guernsey (Channel Islands) and Hong Kong for trustees.

Most people would hesitate to be called investors but, short

of living pay-cheque to paycheque, we all become investors. My wife simply refers to me – tongue in cheek – as the ATM.

Good tax havens are very useful for expats. As long as an individual has made out a will – signed in ink and dated, preferably, with two witnesses – it can be taken over, after minimal formalities, by an offshore legal firm acting as executors.

Tax havens will take about six weeks, on average, to obtain probate through their court system. This is so much faster and cheaper than winding up estates in more well-known countries. The difference is quite simple. If an Australian tax resident dies in Australia or an American in America, before an estate can be "wound up", the tax authorities want to make 100% sure that they have collected their money.

Obviously, estates anywhere that own properties and other relatively illiquid assets can have delays simply because of the nature of these assets, especially if the market for them is weak. For an expat living in Thailand, a local will is essential and the nature of any foreign assets dictates the estate planning required.

Estate planning – if the assets are in a PPB even without a beneficiary nomination form – is simple. They will glide through offshore probate, unless of course there are other assets or circumstances causing delays. However, some people have very complicated scenarios, such as having one family overseas and another family in Thailand, for example.

Unfortunately, it is all too human to procrastinate with financial and estate planning. Many expats find these subjects either boring or distasteful. However, it is often not only the expat who will be impacted but others and the consequences of poor or non- existent planning are often irreversible.

ny book that deals sensitively with the issue of conservation is to be welcomed with open arms. Especially if the country is Thailand and its twin ecological concerns are destruction of the mangrove swamps and the overfishing brought about by trawlers. But Killer Karma (Silkworm Books, Chiang Mai, 2008, 224pp) is not an essay or article, but an imaginative work, a thriller that addresses these issues within the framework of a detective mystery. An unusual amalgam.

Nick Wilgus, the author, offers an early justification of his title through one of his spokesmen, the environmentally minded monk, Brother Dhammo: "It's Killer Karma... Because of the greed, anger, and delusion, the trawlers are destroying the mangroves. Because the mangroves have been destroyed, the villages are being destroyed. Because the villages are being destroyed, the community is being destroyed. It's all a circle. It's Karma - one thing leads to the next thing. We've tolerated the abuse of the trawlers;

now we're paying the price."

The narrative is told in the first person by Father Ananda. Our protagonist is an ex-policeman, long since transmogrified into Buddhist monk, who together with his teenage novice Jak, is summoned from his Bangkok monastery. Why? To unravel the shocking mystery of the Phi Krasue; ghostly apparitions which appear every full moon as grisly bobbing heads in the waters off Wat Phloi, a temple in Chantaburi province in central Thailand.


Ananda thus describes his first encounter: "I was flabbergasted. Three heads bobbed on the surface of the dark waters ugly deformed heads. Menacing in appearance, their black eyes seemed to be staring at us, challenging us, daring us to defy them or deny their existence".

Unsurprisingly, these gruesome horrors attract enormous interest among the superstitious locals. But the floating heads soon drift away from the center of the novel's attention, as the writing focuses on tensions within the community, which are being exacerbated by changing values. As the abbot explains to Ananda: "We're divided right down the middle... Some of the men in the community want to continue with the old ways - fishing and such. Others have gone off to work on the boats or to work at the pier. They're making big money. The others aren't." In this divided world, greed begets violence – from which not even unworldly monks are immune: first Brother Dhammo and then the outspoken female activist Malinee, are murdered, the latter in a motorbike drive-by shooting that sounds all too depressingly familiar to readers of Thailand's daily news-

By now, Brother Ananda's investigations are well under way. After a series of threats and counter protests by the local populace, the dramatic climax and denouement rapidly follow. In a harrowing scene worthy of a Gothic novel, which is played out in caverns overlooking the ocean, the sadistic villain of the piece is unmasked and gets his comeuppance. But not before our detective is forced to witness a third murder in extraordinary and humiliating circumstances. Thanks to his novice, Jak, he narrowly escapes with his own life.

It is to Nick Wilgus's credit that he manages to combine a believable whodunit with a considered appraisal of Thailand's marine dilemma. We should not be surprised. He is the editor of Outlook, a section of the Bangkok Post that comments on the natural world of Thailand in an informed and sensitive way. In fact he dedicates the book to the 'Outlook team'. And he does more than alert our sensibilities to these issues. There are lively portrayals of teenagers and their quarrels – no easy thing to do – and perceptive insights into the lifestyles and habits of Buddhist monks, which are the obvious product of careful research.

I have a few cavils. The writing can be a bit one-paced. When I wanted the author to change gear and wax eloquent or poetic, I was usually left wanting. The passage quoted above of the first *phi krasue* sighting is a case in point. It should have raised the hairs on the back of my head – but it did not. In general the author handles dialogue well, though in places it becomes a bit too predictable and labored. Real conversations often consist of disconnected exchanges with replies consisting of a non sequitur or irrelevancy. And are the italicized "thoughts" necessary? The writer creates a consistent picture of the inner turmoil of Father Ananda, though I confess, I found some of his gnomic reflections about life - and death a bit too trite to be worth making. For example: "Death frightened me. Death was an abyss that opened up at my feet, a fall into nothingness, an abrupt uprooting, a rude awakening." I wondered too about the dream sequences. Was there some deeper Freudian significance which escaped me? True, they add to the sense of threat surrounding Jak, but only once is he seriously at risk in the narrative. The mafia bosses are, in such scenarios, rarely seen or heard – except by their hit-men.



Nonetheless, it was a pity that Anusorn, the owner of the pier, should have such a small walkon part, combining showy "generosity" - a publicly donated cheque for one million baht, with a whispered threat to Ananda "They say revenge is a dish best served up cold... If it's the last thing I do, I'll make sure you find that out for yourself." Chilling...

Sadly the conclusion is inevitably inconclusive. The reader is left with a series of rhetorical questions to ponder: "Would the saplings take root and grow? Would the marine life return? Would the fishermen go out in boats once more to earn a living by the labor of their hands as their fathers had done in ages past...? Questions for us all. Thank you, Nick Wilgus, for giving them imaginative embodiment in an eminently readable thriller.

Good spelling is easier than ever

Welcome to Word Court, where Barbara Wallraff unravels some of the mystery that shrouds the English language, debunking confusing usage and clearing away the clutter that prevents clear understanding – all by answering readers' questions.

Barbara replies: I know very well that a person doesn't have to be good at spelling to be competent and intelligent and otherwise admirable. I learned that from a guy named Ken Gray, who was the art director at the graphic-design studio that gave me one of my first jobs.

When Ken was hand-drawing ad prototypes for our biggest client, Eastern Mountain Sports, he needed to be carefully watched. As a visually oriented person, he disliked the way "E" and "A" looked next to each other. The company's logo was in all caps, and Ken could spend hours lovingly rendering "ESTERN MOUNTAIN SPORTS."

But Jeffrey? I'm not making fun of Ken, and I wasn't making fun of you. My point was that spelling matters, for very practical reasons. Obviously, you and I are in agreement about that. It's easier now than ever before to spell things right. Spell-checking helps. Dictionaries are available online. And you can always ask a good speller to look over anything important before it's final.

Back in the day when I worked with Ken, if he misspelled the logo, he had to redraw the whole ad. Now, with computer graphics, he'd only have to type in the missing letter and it would be good to go.

Q: I doubt if a human being has ever used the verb "shutter" in a sentence. But I see it in newspapers a lot. Please tell me why papers use such language.

Barbara replies: Do you mean uses like this one, in a recent headline in The Daily Sound, of Santa Barbara, California: "Oil field north of SB officially shuttered"?

That is awfully peculiar, inasmuch as oil fields don't have shutters. I don't see how even figuratively they could have shutters. The mental image the headline conjures up is absurd.

"Shuttered" means "closed," and "closed" would have been a much better word there. But I have no objection to this headline from the San Jose Mercury News: "San Francisco garden show may be shuttered." (At least, I don't object to the way it's worded. How sad if there are no future San Francisco garden shows!) "Closed" would be unclear here. An un-shuttered show closes every night. I can't think of any ordinary word that would be clearer than "shuttered."

The language of newspapers in general and headlines in particular has all sorts of idiosyncratic conventions. These are mainly La Jolla, California the result of a need to cram as much meaning into as few words as possible. That's the explanation for "shutter" - and a good one it seems to me.

William Peter, Esquyers.") But "Mr." was in use at the same time. (From Sir Thomas More, circa 1524: "All the lettres of Mr. Secretary sent unto your Grace.")

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Sanook stolen from Songkran

Having a good time (sanook) is synonymous with most traditional activities in Thailand, especially Songkran - Thai New Year. However, with blood on the streets of Bangkok and Pattaya after the redshirt riots and many essential services shutting down for longer than usual during the extended break, sanook was the last thing on many people's minds.

The Songkran break usually lasts just three days but this year, three extra days were unceremoniously added due to the unrest. With weekends on either side of the official holidays, much of the country was effectively at a standstill for ten days.

Most of those ten days were a nightmare for many of the nation's citizens and foreign visitors, who couldn't travel or gain access to essential government and banking services, including currency exchange and immigration facilities.

Exacerbating the negative impact on tourism were travel advisories issued by foreign governments along with international news reports of the unrest showing dramatic images of a city under siege.

The hotheadedness, selfishness and immaturity of the red-shirt protesters reflect a developing nation still in a state of undisciplined adolescence.

That lack of maturity also extends on to the roads. The number of accidents and deaths on the nation's highways during this year's Songkran is roughly the same high number as in previous years. Despite nine police checkpoints set up around Phuket with the announcement that they were to be manned around the clock throughout the "seven days of danger", the roadblocks were often left deserted allowing helmet-less motorbike riders and drunken or dangerous drivers to pass through unhindered.

On the upside, Phuket last week welcomed thousands of leatherclad bikers and big-bike enthusiasts who gave a brief boost to the island's economy. Their appearance on thunderous machines and their association with morbid symbolism often give the impression of anarchists on wheels, but the so-called protesters and a good many drivers could benefit greatly by aspiring to the bikers' collective mission of unity, good will, charity and responsible conduct on the roads.

Not one accident was reported among the thousands of Phuket Bike Week participants.

These contrasts highlight a severe deficiency in the most significant area of a country's passage from adolescence to adulthood in the developing world – education. Educate people not to sign away their nation's future for a few hundred baht. Educate people to drive sober, sensibly and safely – not just to avoid fines. Educate people to feel responsible for their actions, and to recognize that each individual is unique – not just another homogenous pawn on someone else's chess board. Perhaps then Thailand will enjoy the admiration of its peers as an adult and as an equal. - The Editor

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

Vinegar, not hot water for box jellyfish stings

Regarding "Jellyfish stings", [Letters, Phuket Gazette, April 11]. Thank you for attempting to put the record straight about treating jellyfish stings. However, in this case, Dr Somchai was spot on and you were not.

With all due respect, just because you have seen something in several articles does not make it so. Sometimes the press and internet enthusiasts simply get it wrong.

The current recommendation from the Australian Resuscitation Council is:

- 1. For any known or suspected box jellyfish or Irukandji sting, use vinegar.
- 2. For any TROPICAL sting of unknown origin, use vinegar.
- 3. For CONFIRMED bluebottle stings OUTSIDE THE TROPICS, rinse well with seawater, then immerse in 45 degree C water for 20 minutes; if 45 degree C water for 20 minutes is unavailable or the temperature cannot be safely regulated, rinse well with seawater then use ice for the pain.
- 4. For unknown stings OUTSIDE THE TROPICS. rinse well with seawater then use ice for the pain.

Sea wall was never built to last

Regarding "Rawai Beach seawall crumbles" [News, Phuket Gazette, April 11]. The wall at Rawai was clearly of an inappropriate design from the very beginning.

Constant repairs have been made over the last year or so, and if it is repaired using the same design, I am sure it will end with the same result.

The wall, being constructed of cement panels, allows the seawater to get inside and wash the sand out, causing the collapse of the paved area above (which has to be constantly refilled).

The wall, at the point where it collapsed, received the full force of the waves. Surely the 90 degree angle between the wall and the beach makes it unable to take the force.

Some cement blocks or rocks to disperse the thrust of the sea – as there is in front of Mama Klong restaurant – would help, providing they were big enough not to be washed away.

Also, some steps down to the beach would help tourists get down from the wall onto the beach.

All in all, some careful research should be done before the wall is reconstructed. It was lucky that no-one was injured by this event.

Modern but not accessible



FIRST

Until eight years ago, Nicholas Bennett lived a very active life working for UN agencies all over the developing world, including

nine years in Thailand in the 1970s.

He walked around Africa when he was 17. and one of his posts in the 1980s involved living and working in a village three days from the nearest road. It was thus some shock to rapidly lose the use of the muscles in his legs through hereditary muscular dystrophy.

He decided to retire in Phuket. With children and grandchildren living in Australia, the USA and Portugal, he has seen how facilities for the disabled are gradually improving in these countries. Yet he was surprised to find that the same was not happening here.

huket rightly prides itself catering to the wide range of different interests and needs of the several million visitors a year drawn here from countries all over the

One group, however, that has always been poorly served, and for whom the situation is worsening, is the physically disabled.

To the best of my knowledge, for an island that prides itself on the beauty of its beaches there is no wheelchair-accessible walkway onto any beach.

Most restaurants have one or more major steps to climb, and any convenient parking for a disabled person is usually occupied by some vicious taxi or tuk-tuk driver.

Around 5% of the global population is physically disabled. To cater to this huge group, in Europe every new restaurant, shop or government office has to have disabled access.

There are reserved parking spaces for the disabled in most places, and in seaside resorts there not only have to be ramps onto the beach but also beach bars and restaurants have to have a special wheelchair to take the disabled into the sea.

I have been living with my wife in Phuket for the past six years on an O/A Retirement Visa.

I am wheelchair-bound and cannot walk (with a walking frame) for more than 30 meters on a flat and smooth pathway, and have noticed that most new developments make my life more difficult rather than easier.

For five years, the Phuket Immigration services such as visa renewal and 90-days reporting were on the ground floor, and I had relative easy access.

A brand new immigration building was completed last year, and all these services are now on the top floor up a long and beautiful stairway.

Totally inaccessible to any disabled person and difficult for any old person with arthritis or a heart condition. Now my wife has to run up and down the steps while I wait for her in the car

A brand new government building that is less accessible than the old one!

For years I would go in my wheelchair to my favorite restau-

Unfortunately, those responsible for the work, forgot to put any slipways to allow wheeled vehicles onto the pavement. Now, along with mothers and small children, I have to

A brand new severalstarred hotel claimed to have disabled access. This "access" involved me being wheeled down the service ramp, through the bowels of the hotel and laundry, and then up a service elevator to the required floor.

Each of these might seem small by themselves but they do show a systematic disregard for the needs of the disabled.

We have of course found kindness in many of the places we go, especially the older hotels, restaurants and the airport.

But I do feel that it is time that officials and tourist authorities make a greater effort to cater for the disabled so that we do not need to look at each new development with fear.

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Making hay while the sun shines

he phrase "Making hay while the sun shines" is an expression the origin of which is perhaps not lost – at least insofar as lexicographers are concerned.

Probably in modern usage it is mostly a literary phrase. Yet its agricultural motif belies its origin in a period long separated from our largely metropolitan modes of life. Evidently born of some farmer's observation, the phrase is today used to suggest a time of opportunity, ease and plenty.

Even cursory analysis, however, reveals that, for most of us, ease and plenty are in no ways synonymous with making hay whether sunny out or not.

Personally, though I use the phrase often enough, the idea of actually making hay has never entered my head. I wouldn't know the first step; and I would have very little to do with the stuff even if I finally succeeded in making some.


Here I must confess a little nervousness around barnyard animals (even those frequenting my favorite bar). I don't understand them; they're education is, shall we say, rather different from mine.

I don't, for example, swat flies with my tail; I spray them with toxic chemicals – the composition of which I understand even less than hay-making. I am told that chewing food over and over as does an ox promotes digestion; but the sad truth is that I am not a patient eater - and I devour carrots more like a ravening wolf than a horse. In this, moreover, I assume I am no different than the generality of male city-dwellers. Women – who, like birds, peck at food in public, but in private disdain not to pick at their feed – are another

So, having little comprehension either of hay-making or of hay-eaters – indeed without any feeling (beyond a little gardening) for the agricultural experience – it really should be a conundrum why I and other citified members of the Fourth Estate have recourse to hay-related metaphor. But of course it isn't.

Our language retains in colloguy and dialect the experience of England's rural past. In formal use, on the other hand, English often retains the wrong-headedness of half-educated but rarefied 16th Century pedants and their still less prepossessing scholars - a passion for Greek, Latin and French; and who vied with each other as "wits" in introducing to our own language foreign words that they little apprehended, but that provided them the bewildering "illustrated, giltedged, tree calf, hand-tooled, seven-dollar Friendship Offering" kind of talk - in Mark Twain's phrase – they longed for.

We see, or rather hear, the same process underway in Thai,

But "history" in the original Greek means "inquiry"; it does not mean "truth about the past" (although nearly every English speaker takes it to mean just that). History may, in fact, be openly biased (as Shirer's work is) – which doesn't make it a false history

Shirer himself sub-titled his work an inquiry into the fall of France in 1940, suggesting perhaps a subtle emphasis on the real meaning of the word. Maybe readers have met with some such sentence as, "Historically, Thais like to smile" - meaning really "Thais like to smile inquiringly".

Ridiculous! English is veritably replete with these tortured linguistic waifs.

You might smile if I aver that their use is apocalyptic, thinking it indeed not so serious – unless you know that "apocalypse" is not synonymous with "gloom" and "doom", to which it is often associated, but means in Greek "revealing" (in which case you might agree).

Thus, someone who finds nothing wrong with "an apocalyptic gloom spreading its tentacles across the land" is all mixed up (and that is to say nothing of the adjective "apocryphal", which is precisely opposite in meaning to its Greek root – a usage that doubtless reveals how our forebears viewed the New Testament Apocalypse [today's 'Revelation] of St. John from which the word

Philologists tell us gaily that inventing new meanings for old words, whatever their origin, is healthy; but I'm not so sure. Most modern speech and literature strike me as debased.

The French often are castigated for refusing to learn English, as if guilty of unwarranted conceit. Can you blame them?

Who, knowing French, can listen to English without laughing? Take "journey", "voyage" and "travel", three words denoting kinds of movement for which in English substitutions are ugly ("trip" after all comes from "traipse" and means in old German or Dutch simply "walking"; "sea trips" are therefore impossible except for Jesus). In old French they meant, respectively, "a day", "travel", and "work" or "torture".

Perhaps the French unwillingness to speak English results less from conceit than puzzlement at how to use their own words in this, our mixed up ton-

I suppose what we can learn from all this is that – rather than mocking the Thais for abusing English, or berating the French for ignoring it – we should take a look at ourselves.

Our words are more mixedup than we think and our thinking mixed-up by our words.



Phuket FC searches for foreign talent



Phuket FC is currently competing in the Regional League Division Two, the third tier of the Thai national football league.

n the opening fixture of the new Thai national league, newly formed Phuket FC failed to get off to a winning start, suffering a 4-1 home drubbing at the hands of Satun "Witch Doctors".

Despite the setback, the "Crabs"bounced back to record a 1-0 win over Krabi in their second game, highlighting the potential, both on and off the field, for Phuket to become a major force in Thai football.

There is no shortage of interest in football in Phuket, demonstrated by the capacity crowd that witnessed Thailand's King's Cup final against Denmark.

There also appears to be no shortage of talent on the island, judging from the glimpses of quality shown by the side in their opening two fixtures.

Currently competing in the Regional League Division Two, the third tier of the Thai national football league, promotion would see Phuket reach the Thai Division One League. Subsequent promotion would see Phuket FC compete in the top flight of Thai football, the Premier League.

The size of Phuket and the huge appetite for playing and watching football on the island warrants the presence of a topclass football team. However, the lack of foreign playing talent in the Phuket squad is all too evident. You would be hard pushed to find a top level club in world football that relies solely on local players.

If Phuket FC is to have an impact on the Regional League Division Two, on the road to establishing itself as one of Thailand's top sides, it will need to tap into the reservoir of footballing talent that must surely exist among the sizable foreign community here in Phuket.

With this in mind, Phuket FC manager Suratin Lianudom is planning to hold a "farang football trial".

Phuket FC is looking for a maximum of five top-class farang footballers to add to the existing squad of players.

While the club is currently financially unable to pay players, it is a professional league. Accordingly, a work permit will be required to play, which the club itself should be able to arrange.

Matches are played on Saturdays and Sundays against the other teams in the division, which are: Krabi, Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Phatthalung, Satun, Pattani, Yala and Narathiwat – all from the South of Thailand.

In order to qualify for a work permit, players are required to be a member of a foreign football club - something that shouldn't present an insurmountable obstacle. However, as anyone familiar with Thai bureaucracy will tell you, the process is unlikely to be straightforward.

As a consequence attendance was poor, but Phuket's next home fixture is scheduled to kick off at 5pm on Saturday, April 25, which should prove far more convenient for spectators. A much larger crowd is expected.

The next visitors to the Surakul Stadium will be high-flying Nakhon Sri Thammarat, who have won both their opening fixtures and should provide a stern test for the fledgling Phuket side.

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Losing your edge?

Sharpening kitchen knives and cleavers

into Thai culture will eventually hear that old Thai saying that a man who is afraid of his wife doesn't keep sharp knives at home. So, I hope you're all on good terms with your wives, as this week we'll discuss sharpening knives and cleavers. Outdoor implements, like axes and machetes, we'll leave for another time.

Steel is just iron with carbon added to harden it. Knives used by professional chefs and butchers aren't made of the stain-

less variety, but of high-carbon steel that can take a sharper edge but rusts quickly, requiring constant care. Most kitchen knives and cleavers sold here are less expensive and made of stainless steel, perfectly ad-

equate for the home. Stainless steel is steel with nickel added, softening the steel slightly but helping to prevent corrosion. However, even stainless steel will rust, given enough time and moisture. Never use a rusted blade (or anything else) on food. Rust is poisonous, and rust-particles can be carcinogenic. If a blade begins to rust, use fine steel wool or a wire brush to remove the rust, and then apply a light coat of cooking oil.

Most sharpening stones have one side slightly coarser than the other. The coarser side re-

with axes and machetes), while the smoother side is used to "hone" or finish the edge, creating a higher degree of sharpness.


The best way to sharpen is with the stone secured in some way. If not secured, it must be held with one hand while the other works the knife. Not too difficult for knives, but tricky with cleavers. It is also best because it is safest to finish a sharpening stroke with the tip still on the stone.

Let's start with a kitchen knife. Have the stone in the "six

o'clock" position and smear a generous tablespoon of cooking oil on the stone's smoother side. Grip the knife's handle firmly, and lay the blade flat on the stone, cutting-edge towards you, at the far end, angled slightly from two

to 11 o'clock. The short, unsharpened part between the handle and the cutting edge should just be touching the edge of the stone.

Now lift the back of the blade (the spine) about 1/4" and draw the knife towards you, pressing firmly, moving it slightly to the right (for right-handers) as you pull it forward. Co-ordinate the forward and sideways motion so that when the knife reaches the stone's end closest to you, the blade's tip is about halfway across the stone. Don't draw the blade all the way off the stone!



Most sharpening stones have one side slightly coarser than the other.

Keeping the tip on the stone is safer. The tip can be finish-sharpened later. Do about five or six strokes this way, trying to keep the spine's height above the stone exactly the same on each stroke.

Now flip the knife over. Start at the end closest to you, the cutting-edge facing away, angled from four to seven o'clock, and repeat the process. Finish with the tip still on the stone, halfway across at the far end. Wipe the edge and test it on a piece of potato, or something similar. If it seems sharp enough to you, it's ready to finish.

Finishing strokes move more horizontally, and less vertically. Start at the far end again, cutting-edge facing you. Draw the blade so that the tip is in the middle when you're just a third of the way down the stone. Use a slightly lighter pressure on these strokes. Repeat. Flip over and repeat. Keep the height consistent! Test the blade again. It should be ready for use.

Cleavers are sharpened the same way, but hold the spine slightly higher than when sharpening a knife, as cleavers need a sharper angle on the blade's edge for chopping. Use a two-handed grip, one on the handle and one on the top left corner of the blade, for a smooth, steady stroke. Remember, the most important thing is not the pressure, but keeping

the height the same throughout the stroke and consistent from stroke to stroke.

Knives and cleavers that are used frequently should be "touched-up" frequently. Just a few finishing strokes will restore their sharpness each time. You can also use a "sharpening-steel" – a steel rod mounted in a handle - used to stroke lightly along the edge to restore its keenness. Always wash and dry a blade carefully after sharpening.

If the blade is not stainlesssteel, wipe it with a very thin coat of cooking oil.

That's it! Go slice some veggies for the missus, then have a beer! See you next time!

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

Predatory females



oday, a large mantis came to the margins of the swimming pool to sip water. In Europe, this impressive insect is generally known as a praying mantis [mantis religiosa] on account of its habit, when threatened, of raising itself up on its hind legs and putting its forelimbs together in a prayer-like gesture. Only it ain't praying: it is preparing to attack. But one can see why its Greek name of mantis means fortune teller or prophet. When adopting this pose, they look remarkably humanoid.

There are many varieties in Thailand, of which the most beautiful is the orchid mantis: it actually bears a strong resemblance to a pink orchid bloom – a fine example of insect mimicry. Less exotic but much larger, this particular visitor was a giant green mantis (see photo). Utterly fearless, she refused to stand up and 'pray', or even to fly away. So I moved her to a palm tree where her vivid green coloration matched the fronds and rendered her almost invisible.

You may ask why I am using the female pronoun. In truth, female mantids are much larger than their male counterparts, and this one was huge – about three inches long, with the characteristic triangular-shaped head, and enormous, compound green eyes.

They are much bigger for a reason. During mating, the female often devours the smaller male, beginning with his head, just as he is in the act of injecting sperm into her abdomen. An insectivorous angle on the Shakespearean expression: "to die upon



a kiss". Bizarrely, the predatory female continues to chomp, and the decapitated male continues to bonk, until most of him has disappeared. Good animal protein for the newly fertilized eggs which are later deposited in a frothy mass, and subsequently hardens into a protective capsule.

I was happy to see a mantis in the garden – you can even buy the egg pouches in some garden nurseries – since they prey on pestivorous insects. Big ones such as yours truly's can even manage a small gecko or lizard. Their victims are impaled on pincer-like forelegs which are capable of piercing the hard exoskeletons of beetles and grasshoppers. Good to have around – provided you are not a sex-crazed male mantis. Maybe there's a moral somewhere.

A bee in my bonnet.

Another visitor this week has been the bee-eater. There are bee-eating insects, but this one is a striking bird, the blue-tailed beeeater. For many people it is a special favorite. One can see why. It is brilliantly hued, with a red and yellow throat, green wings, a yellow tail and black eye-shadow (see photo). One of the most

beautiful birds in the kingdom, it is slumming it down here in Phuket only as a winter migrant, far from its usual haunts in the northern rainforests of Thailand and beyond. They are gregarious creatures, and sit together on the telephone ca-

bles, uttering a pleasant trilling sound, and occasionally darting off to ensnare a passing insect.

I recognized them from my years in Andalucia, where the European variety [merops apiaster] nested in deep holes in the banks of the Guadalquivir river. Only marginally different in appearance from their Thai cousins, the

Spanish birds were very unpopular with the locals because, as the name implies, their favorite food is the honey bee. Bee keepers used to shoot them on sight. Say

it softly here in Phuket – where there is a colony of bee-hives less than a kilometer away from the house but these birds will consume up to 250 bees a day, which they catch on the wing. They have a novel way of removing the venom: they hold the

insects in their long black bills, and bang them against their perch until the sting has come away.

Of course, nature remains, as Tennyson said 150 years ago, "red in tooth and claw". I cannot lament the passing of so many local bees or, for that matter, the dragonflies that used to quarter the swimming pool, which have

all disappeared down the gullet of these blue-tailed bee-eaters.

But if we were better at respecting our environment, we would not be short of honey bees in the first place.

The world desperately needs bees. They are the principal pollinators of 90 major crops – everything from fruits to nuts – not to mention flowers. It has been estimated that honey bees contribute 15 billion dollars to the US economy every year.

That the world is losing these crucial insects – and at an unprecedented rate – has nothing to do with bee-eaters and everything to do with us. And while no one is clear about the root cause of what has been called "colony collapse disorder"; changes in farming practice, loss of floral habitat, even climate change, all these factors may have contributed to the shrinking bee population.

Do I have a bee in my bonnet? Of course I do. Come on, folks. We need our bee-eaters and our honey bees.








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Land leases in Thailand

Legal consultant Michael Greth looks into some of the pros and cons of land leases as a means of acquiring property for foreigners in Thailand.

ne of the most viable options for foreigners wishing to purchase property in Thailand is the land lease. Under current Thai law, a residential lease is limited to a maximum 30-year term (commercial purposes up to 50 years). However, renewal options, providing additional 30-year extensions to the initial 30-year term, are widely used in Thailand.

Recent announcements by the government stating that longer lease periods of as much as 90 years will come into effect as part of a whole package to pre-empt the anticipated property investment slowdown have further focused attention on land leases.

Additionally, a purchase option (under a separate agreement) can be agreed between the lessor and lessee, providing the lessee with the right to demand title transfer upon change of the applicable laws, allowing foreign nationals to hold land freehold titles.

Whenever entering into a lease agreement, the utmost attention should be paid to proper registration of the lease against the land. Every long-term lease (more than three years) needs to be recorded with the relevant land department in order to be enforceable against a third party in the event of land transfer through inheritance or sale by your landlord.

It is important to note that there is nothing guaranteed or automatic with regard to the renewal of a lease. A landowner may refuse to register a new lease agreement for the lease extension when the previous lease period expires. The default provision under your lease should therefore be carefully examined to protect your interests.

It is also worth noting that such a renewal option may not be honored by the beneficiaries of the lessor who have not signed the lease. With this in mind, some more sophisticated developers have implemented legal structures that allow land lessees to acquire a share interest in the company that owns the land that includes your individual plot. Under these structures, the holder of a land lease, together with the other lessees in the project, are, in effect, joint-lessors of themselves and can assure renewal of the lease term for an additional 30-year period upon expiry of the initial term.

Every investment, especially a lease investment, should be carefully scrutinized in terms of its capability for re-sale. Therefore, a long-term lease that is subject to advanced rental payments should be checked for the following provisions: fair termination clauses, unrestricted assignment and transfer rights for the lessee, protected right of renewal and inheritance of lease rights.







Careful attention should also be paid to ensuring the correct application and submission of the documentation that is to be provided to the relevant land department as evidence of actual payment of rent. This is essential in the event that any kind of (lease) interest is registered against the land.

Simply put, a land lease may be an interesting means of acquiring interest in land in Thailand. It is, however, always advisable to examine lease agreements thoroughly and obtain legal advice from a qualified legal representative to ensure that your interests and rights are protected.
