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One-Two-Go crash: pilots blamed

BANGKOK: The official investigation into the One-Two-Go crash at Phuket International Airport in September, 2007 has concluded that pilot error was a primary cause of the accident.

The Thai-language investigation summary, released by the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA) on June 1, said the pilot failed to follow standard operating procedure in the face of bad weather and that co-ordination between the pilot and co-pilot broke down.

The crash in September 2007 killed 90 passengers and crew, including the pilot and co-pilot.

The charred and broken hull of the McDonnell Douglas MD-80 aircraft remains under tarpaulin in a field at the end of the runway, though new airport director Pratuang Sornkham has said removing the wreckage soon will be a priority of his administration.

According to the DCA report, there were sudden changes in weather conditions around the airport at the time of the accident.

The pilot attempted to initiate a "go-around" maneuver and abort the landing approach, but failed to

aircraft consequently failed to gain enough speed and height.

The report noted that the pilot had been suffering from stress and was fatigued due to lack of rest.

The report made safety recommendations to three organizations: One-Two-Go and its parent company Orient Thai Airways; Airports of Thailand (AOT); and the Department of Civil Aviation.

One-Two-Go's flight crew

press the go-around button. The needed to receive extra training to ensure they are fully familiar with standard operating procedure (SOP), it found.

> The company also needed to make the procedure for transferring control during a crisis clearer in the SOP; to ensure pilots do not exceed safe flying hours; to develop a safety management system to ensure flight safety; and to build a corporate culture of following company procedures and reporting problems as soon as they appear.

The Gazette attempted to contact One-Two-Go, but no spokesperson was available for comment.

AOT was advised to make runways wider or ensure that airplane landing instruments were appropriate for its runways. It should also implement a safety management system, the report said.

AOT also needed to make it easier and quicker for fire engines to access the runway; to involve the Institute of Emergency Medicine in the emergency plans of the airports under the AOT's control; and to ensure all relevant agencies were involved in its emergency drills.

The DCA needed to ensure One-Two-Go improved safety procedures; to co-ordinate better with air traffic control agency Aeronautical Radio of Thailand [Aerothai] and the Meteorological Department.

It also needed to co-ordinate better with medical organizations in allowing them to treat survivors and collect and examine the remains of the deceased.

PA KHLOK: Resort developers have converted a section of seaside jungle into a 200-meter-long quay at Ao Por without official permission, it has emerged.

The developers used heavy machinery to uproot trees, remove earth from the hillside to create an artificial quay near tambon Pa Khlok, village 6.

Although the work began at the start of 2008, it has somehow only now come to the attention of authorities.

The scale of the project and the length of time it remained "undetected" suggest it may have been carried out in collusion with local government officers.

Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop is now investigating the matter after receiving a complaint from local villagers at the Damrongtham Center at Phuket Provincial Hall, which serves as the provincial ombudsman's office.

The complaint accused Pa Khlok Tambon Administration Organization (Pa Khlok TAO) officers of colluding with the re-

sort developers to allow the construction of the quay without proper permission.

The developers should have obtained permission from Pa Khlok TAO, the Marine Transport Office, Thalang Land Office and Thalang Police in order to carry out the work.

Pa Khlok TAO President Athipong Kong-nam told the Gazette, "They didn't ask for permission to do this from Pa Khlok Muncipality. But we can't blame the landowner until we talk and see their documents. The municipality will follow and investigate the issue."

Gov Wichai visited the site on June 1, following a visit by Phuket Vice-Governor Smith Palawatwichai on May 29.

"The area isn't hidden. I don't know why government officers didn't know about this. We have to investigate those officers and the land owner," Gov Wichai said.

The governor has set up a special committee to investigate the responsible officers. The committee is scheduled to report back to him within seven days.

The governor said his office had yet to determine who the land owner was and whether they possessed title deeds for the area in question.

"Phuket has a lot of problems with encroachment, both on land and sea. We can't let this sort of thing happen anymore," said Gov Wichai.

Entertainment venues are given licenses under six categories, depending on the nature of entertainment and services offered, and are classified as being either inside or outside an entertainment

Type 1. The venue has dancing areas and employs staff to accompany and entertain individual customers.

Opening Hours: 9pm – 2am.

Type 2. The venue serves drinks, including alcohol, and employs staff to accompany and entertain individual customers. Opening Hours: 6pm – midnight.

Type 3. The venue offers sauna and massage services. Opening Hours: 12pm – midnight.

Type 4. The venue serves food and drink, including alcohol, and has one or more of the following:

a) Live music and stage performances. Performers and staff accompany and entertain individual customers.

b) Musical instruments are available for customers to perform. Staff accompany and entertain individual customers.

c) The venue has stage performance and/or dance areas.

d) The venue has a DJ booth.

Opening Hours: 6pm – 1am.

ing hours, saying any extension must come with Interior Ministry approval.

Sompetch Moosophon, president of the Patong Entertainment Business Association, said that local business operators are facing losses resulting in staff lay-offs.

Sharp declines in customer numbers have forced around 30% of some 500 venues, including pubs and beer bars, to close down their businesses, said Mr Sompetch, also the managing director of Dclub Disco on Soi Crocodile off Soi Bangla.

Tourists usually come out late, often just before closing time, so their revenue is cut short, he told reporters during a meeting with local entertainment business operators in Patong on May 28.

Governor Wichai, who also attended the meeting, expressed concern for the club operators' economic hardship.

Nevertheless, he said businesses must strictly observe the law, especially in regard to opening and closing times and allowing admittance to minors.

Gov Wichai, an appointee of the Interior Ministry, told the businesses he would pass on their request to the ministry, but in the meantime they must strictly obey the law.

Violators will face legal action, he said.

Many business operators in Patong had initially expressed hope that the Democrat-led government would push for changes in the entertainment business law.

Powerful Democrat Party figures including party list MP Chalermlak Kebsup, whose family has extensive landholdings and business interests in Patong, have thus far done little to bring about such change.

This may be due in part to the fact that the Interior Ministry portfolio is currently held by Bhumjaithai party leader Chavarat Charnvirakul. The Democrats had to cede the Interior Ministry to Chavarat in order to entice his party to join the coalition government, political analysts have noted.

Phuket's Chief Justice urges more mediation

PHUKET CITY: The new Chief Justice of Phuket Provincial Court held a press conference on June 2 to promote greater use of the court mediation system to settle legal disputes. The backlog of the disputes is overwhelming the provincial court system and leading to long delays between trial dates.

Phuket Provincial Court Chief Justice Varangkana Sujaritku said she will promote the use of the mediation system to reduce the caseload currently burdening the court's 18 judges.

Last year 9,000 cases were filed with Phuket Provincial Court, about 6,000 criminal cases and 3,000 civil suits. Some 20% of the total involved foreigners, she said.

To increase public awareness of the mediation system and promote its use, Chief Justice Varangkana will lead a seminar on the topic at the Royal Phuket City Hotel on June 9. Representatives from various clubs and associations have been invited to attend.

She stressed that the mediation system can be used to settle all legal disputes, with the exception of those involved with national security issues like narcotics, money laundering and human trafficking.

In a related development, Chief Justice Varangkana urged her colleagues who enjoy playing golf not to do so at the Blue Canyon Country Club, which has been at the center of a bitter ownership dispute for five years.

Phuket Provincial Court is still investigating evidence in the case between Singaporean businessman Sia Leng Yuen and former partner Rawat Chindapol and has yet to specify when a ruling will be made, she said.

"It is not good that the judges are playing golf at the course, as they may be seen as taking sides with one party in the dispute," she said.

Unfortunately, neither side in the Blue Canyon dispute is interested in resolving the case through mediation, she said.

Chief Justice Varangkana has been in her current position since April this year.

"I will fulfill my duties to the best of my abilities to serve all the people of Phuket, just as my uncles did before me," she said.

Chief Justice Varangkana represents the third generation of a well-known family of adjudicators, many with experience in Phuket.

Her uncle Piyachart Sujarikul served as Phuket Chief Justice from 1971 to 1973.

Another uncle on her father's side, Pridi Sujaritkul, held the same post from 1980 until 1982, when he was shot and killed. The case, which was never solved, was thought to be in connection with a land dispute.

A Bangkok native, Chief Justice Varangkana was transferred to Phuket Provincial Court after serving as the Chief Justice of Ubon Ratchathani Provincial Court for one year.



Workmen laying cable in historic **Thalang Road**

PHUKET CITY: Work on the project to bury power cables along Thalang Road in Old Phuket Town got underway on the morning of June 1, with workers marking lines near the pavement to mark the trench that will house the conduit.

The narrow trench, about half a meter wide, will run along the right-hand side of the oneway road, once the heart of Phuket's commercial district.

Also included in the project is the replacement of an old PVC water pipe with a newer high-density polyethylene (HDPE) main.

Digging of the trench for this new water pipe has already commenced.

Work is starting at the west end of the road, at the junction with Yaowarat Road.

Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwansupana said the joint project between Phuket City Municipality and TOT Public Company Limited has a total budget of just over Bt19.2 million.

Work is divided into three contract phases, with actual cable installation and electric work to be undertaken by TOT from July 15 onwards.

Under the contract, all of the electrical work should be completed by January 11, 2010.

After that, work on drainage and road improvement in the area is set to begin with the aim of sprucing up the area and increasing its appeal to tourists.

One improvement will be the replacement of the hanging strings of exposed fluorescent light bulbs with more attractive streetlamps.

Phuket City Deputy Mayor Thawatchai Thongmung told the Gazette work on the project was initially scheduled to begin on May 15, but had to be postponed after members of the Thalang Road Community voted to include

the replacement of the old water

main with the new HDPE pipe in

the project. The old PVC pipe is more than 20 years old, he said.

In what could entail some long nights for local residents, work on the project is being carried out after dark, from 6pm to 9am daily.

"During most of the construction we will not close Thalang Road, we will only block off an area about 30 meters long and divert traffic around it. There may be a few times that we will have to close down the road completely," said Mr Thawatchai.

Despite the work, local residents can expect few disruptions to power supply, he said.

"After all the electric work is completely finished there will be a four-hour power cut, after which supply will be restored using the new cable," he said.

"Phuket City Municipality would like to apologize to everyone for the disturbance, but we ask for your patience. After construction is finished, Thalang Road will be more beautiful and will have the first [public] underground electric supply of its kind on the island," Mayor Somjai said.

Phuket beach gets green carpet

PHUKET CITY: The beach at one of Phuket's most popular recreational areas has been inundated with bright green seaweed since the middle of May.

The affected area is at the tip of Saphan Hin park, which juts out into Phuket Bay.

Fisheries specialist Ukkrit Sataphumin of the Phuket Marine Biological Center at Cape Panwa said the seaweed was first reported to his office by people who use the park for their daily morning exercise.

The worst affected stretch of the beach lies in front of the grassy, open area in front of the Chinese Shrine, a popular spot for kite-flying enthusiasts.

Mr Ukkrit said the common Thai name of the seaweed is saaraay phakkaad thalay, which roughly translated means "sea vegetable seawood". He said he did not know the English language name or exact scientific classification.

The seaweed grows quickly on the seabed under the right conditions of strong nutrient loading and lots of sunlight. It is then washed ashore by waves and currents, he explained.

Municipal officials have begun to remove some of the seaweed, but a great deal remains as they have yet to receive an order from park management to keep the beach free of the menace.

The algal bloom at Saphan Hin is the result of dirty water. The site is adjacent to the mouth

of Klong Bangyai, Phuket's largest watercourse, which has a catchment area covering almost all of Phuket City and parts of Kathu extending all the way to the Patong hillsides.

Phuket City operates a water treatment system in the area, but a large amount of untreated water with very low oxygen content is still released there – especially during the rainy season.

Park volunteer Piamsak Tunphalung told the *Gazette* that the first signs of the seaweed began to appear in April, but that the volume had increased significantly last month.

The appearance of the seaweed is an annual event, he said.

Last year they collected all of the seaweed and disposed of it, but this year the park management has not sent an order to do so. Normally the seaweed is piled up and allowed to dry and naturally disintegrate, he said.

The offensive smell in the area is from dirty water and not the seaweed itself, he said.

Similar algal blooms take place every year on Patong Beach from December to February, when sunlight is strong, currents are weak and the seaweed's main nutrient – untreated human waste rich in nitrogen and phosphorus – is discharged into the harbor in great amounts.

As for potential health risks, Mr Ukkrit said the seaweed is non-toxic, but noted that people who eat fish caught in polluted areas run the risk of ingesting toxins which can accumulate up the food chain into fish.

Thai Immigration crackdown on border runners

BANGKOK / PHUKET: In a crackdown on foreigners who "abuse" the tourist exemption rule allowing 15-day visit extensions at border entry points, the Immigration Bureau has confirmed and informed ThaiVisa.Com of the following new regulation, which went into effect on June 1:

A foreigner who has entered the kingdom four consecutive times on 15-day tourist exemption stamps will not be allowed to leave the country and re-enter Thailand by land.

The only option is to exit Thailand and re-enter via an international airport, which will allow a further 30-day extension of stay in the country.

The Phuket Gazette's partner in the Phuket Forum, Thaivisa.Com, has confirmed the new regulation with the Immigration checkpoints at the Cambodian border and with visa run companies, saying the new regulation is effective from June 1, 2009.

Immigration checkpoints bordering Laos, Myanmar (Burma) and Malaysia are expected to enforce the regulation shortly.

Most visa runners in Phuket

make the journey to Kawthaung in Burma via Ranong. There are a handful of companies catering to this market.

The new rules do not affect holders of Thai visas issued abroad.

Foreigners are advised to apply for a tourist or non-immigrant visa at a Royal Thai Embassy or consulate outside Thailand, instead of "abusing" the 15day extension rule.

As usual, holders of Tourist visas will be given a 60-day stay.





sean reaffirms regional confidence in Phuket

KARON: The Asean Senior Officials Meeting held at the Mövenpick Resort and Spa from May 18 to 21 resulted in a number of agreements in addition to the previously reported agreement to hold the twice-postponed Asean Summit in Phuket next October.

Manasvi Srisodapol, deputy director-general of the Foreign Ministry's Department of Asean Affairs, told the *Gazette* that the Phuket meetings also achieved important decisions on key issues in the region and on moving regional co-operation forward in many areas.

"The Asean Senior Officials Meeting is a meeting between senior officials of the 10 Asean member states. They discussed important issues such as recent developments in Myanmar, which subsequently led to the issuance of the Asean Chairman's Statement on May 18," he said.


That statement warned that the "honor and credibility" of the Burmese regime was at stake and called for the immediate release of pro-democracy leader Aung San Suu Kyi, who is now on trial for allegedly violating the

Ms Suu Kyi is accused of greeting an American journalist who swam across a pond outside her compound to speak with her.

The statement also reaffirmed the readiness of Asean members to help Burma with a peaceful transition to democracy. It was subsequently lauded by the US and EU, but lambasted by the Burmese junta, which accused the Thai-written statement as unprecedented meddling in its internal affairs.

'The officials also discussed preparations for the annual meeting of Asean foreign ministers, an event that would take place in Thailand in July 2009 and include meetings with foreign ministers of 10 other countries that we refer to as 'dialogue partners', as well as a meeting of the Asean Regional Forum (ARF) comprising foreign ministers from 27 countries which addresses regional security," Mr Mansvi said.

"The ARF Senior Officials Meeting, comprising 27 countries, also met and exchanged views on important regional and international issues, such as recent developments in Myanmar and the Korean Peninsula, and basically agreed on a draft ARF Vision

Statement prepared by Thailand which would be presented to the ARF Ministerial Meeting in July to commemorate the 15th Anniversary of the ARF.

"This document essentially lays down goals and objectives of the ARF by 2020 to enhance cooperation in addressing and reducing all threats to regional peace and security, including those affecting people's lives such as threats from terrorism, transnational crime, pandemics, natural disasters and so on.

"As you can see the results of the meetings in Phuket underscored support from all countries on Thailand's chairmanship of Asean, as well as the goals, objectives and priorities that Thailand has set for Asean during its chairmanship until the end of this year.

"The meetings were attended by senior officials from all 27 countries, confirming once again the overall confidence these countries have for Thailand as a meeting place and tourist destination," Mr Mansvi concluded.

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Englishman collapses, dies in Rawai pharmacy

Phuket collapsed and died of apparent heart failure at a pharmacy in Rawai on the afternoon of May 27.

According to witnesses, 59year-old John Powell entered the pharmacy to buy some medicine but then collapsed.

Chalong Police were notified of the death at about 3:30pm.

They rushed to the scene, a pharmacy in the Baan Saiyuan residential estate, with rescue workers from the Phuket Ruamjai Kupai Foundation.

There they found Mr Powell's body, lying face up and surrounded by onlookers, both foreigners and Thais.

Mr Powell's body was taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

The British Embassy has been informed of Mr Powell's death.

There were no signs of foul play and police suspect heart failure as the cause of death.

The case is still under investigation, police said.

Mr Powell, a retiree from London, is survived by his wife and one daughter who lives in the UK. His friends on the island paid their last respects to the deceased and attended cremation services at Wat Rawai at 10am on June 2.



German ambassador speaks out on jailed teen

When asked why she was

It has been almost three months since a German teenager – who will not be named to protect his identity – was arrested on child molestation charges and incarcerated in Phuket Juvenile Observation and Protection Center. He is accused of conspiring with 41-year-old Briton Dax Young to abuse schoolboys as young as nine years old in Patong. Some have rushed to condemn the youth, as they would anyone associated with this most heinous of crimes. Yet anyone who has followed the case closely will be aware that this young man, who was just 17 when he was arrested, spent his adolescence in the most deplorable of circumstances. In a recent interview, German Ambassador to Thailand Dr Hanns Schumacher defended the youth and expressed his hope that he would be dealt with sympathetically by the courts. Dan Waites reports.

round one month ago, resulting in hospitalizations in the youth's mother died in Vachira Phuket Hospital on April 23. She was 56 years old.

Though the Gazette has been unable to confirm the exact cause of death, it is known that the woman was seriously ill with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease for several years prior to her passing.

Interviewed in March with her daughter, she appeared to be suffering from anorexia and looked deeply unwell.

In late 2003 she had fled to Phuket with her two children to escape the children's father, who had become abusive and threatened her life after their relationship broke down.

Since then she suffered several severe bouts of the disease. determined not to return to Germany – despite the man's imprisonment - she gave a number of reasons, including the effect of the climate on her condition and "the German mentality". The family remained in

Phuket, supported at least partially by donations from friends and neighbors.

Yet the German diplomatic mission suggests that the youth and his sister - supported their mother financially, and that in the boy's case some of the money came from Dax Young.

The woman denied that she received money from her son or knew the true nature of her son's relationship with Mr Young.

The truth of what she knew of her son's activities may now never be known.

Ambassador speaks

In a recent interview with the Gazette, German Ambassador to Thailand Dr Hanns Schumacher spoke out in defense of the youth.

'This youngster was irresponsibly left on the streets of Phuket at a very young age for years without any adult supervision. It is therefore no surprise that he was introduced to criminal company. This is the main reason we hope that at the end

of the proceedings, [the youth] will be considered a victim, rather than a perpetrator," Dr Schumacher said.

The ambassador said the German mission was doing what it could to help the youth, but stressed that the embassy had to respect Thailand's legal rules and procedures.

"We are in constant contact with all responsible authorities and have contributed our view to the investigation process. It goes without saying that we are closely monitoring [the youth's] situation as well as his correct treatment in prison," he explained.

The youth recently turned 18, begininning his adult life behind bars.

When asked if this affected the boy's legal situation, Dr Schumacher said the embassy had looked into the issue.

"We have the assurance that juvenile law remains applicable to his case. I personally made a very strong point that [the youth] should by no means be transferred to an adult prison. He is okay where he is right now. His legal position has not been affected," he said.

"We care for him and rather admire the manner in which he is mastering a difficult situation. I am sure this will have an impression on the prosecution and judge, as well," he concluded.

A court date for the case has yet to be fixed.

NAKHON PHANOM: While the sight of an old man marrying a young woman is not too unusual in Isarn, when it's the other way round, it manages to raise eyebrows.

Therefore, when word spread that 73-year-old Thongsuk Phutthawan was set to marry 26year-old Somphon Chanthawong, 47 years her junior, it quickly drew the interest of the local press.

The pair finally tied the knot on May 20, after a three-month courtship. The groom paid a bride price of 20,000 baht and gave his betrothed a 1.5 bahtweight gold ring worth approximately Bt22,500.

A Brahmin priest then divided a hard boiled-egg, giving half to the bride and half to the groom to wish them a long and happy marriage.

Mrs Thongsuk told the Khao Sod reporter who attended the wedding that this was Mrs Thongsuk's second marriage.

First falling in love at a military camp at Nakhon Phanom Airport, Mrs Thongsuk first got married at the tender age of 18 and had four children with her first husband. One child died, but the other three now all have families of their own. Her husband died 30 years ago - before her new beau was even conceived.

She said that in the 30 years that she had been single, she had many suitors. These included wealthy businessmen and politicians, but she rejected them all.

She met her new husband one evening in March when she went to have dinner with relatives at a fish restaurant on the bank of the Mekong River. One of the waiters, Mr Somphon, began teasing and flirting with her, before finally plucking up the courage to ask for her number.

The couple chatted all the time, Mrs Thongsuk said. Mr Somphon is a merry soul, a good talker and had what the Thais call a "sweet mouth", she said. He was always concerned about her well-being, asking if she'd eaten dinner or whether she had gone to bed yet.

"Though he's only a child, it was like having a second father," Mrs Thongsuk enthused.

When their love had fully blossomed, Mrs Thongsuk took her relatives to meet her young suitor. She then asked her daughters, all of whom are considerably older than Mr Somphon, for permission to marry. Her daughters said they would not stand in the way of the wedding, but asked only for the ceremony to be fairly small – as they were worried that people would gossip.

Mr Somphon said that he had a girlfriend before but she had broken his heart, adding that he liked Mrs Thongsuk's personality. After knowing her for three months he was sure he was in love and so got his mother to go and ask for Mrs Thongsuk's hand in marriage.

Mrs Thongsuk's elder sister Thongyip Thapket, 80, said that she was glad her little sister had found happiness, especially as this was probably her last chance. She said she had seen lots of old farangs getting married who were clearly on their last legs so she didn't think it was strange that her sister should do likewise.

Woman killed, elephant | Media injured in truck smash

SA KAEW: A woman was killed and an elephant seriously injured in a road accident in Ta Phraya District on May 28.

The elephant, a 10-year-old cow called Phang Kamrai, was being transported in a 10-wheel truck from Surin to Pattaya at the time of the accident.

Phang Kamrai was being taken to Pattaya to be mated.

The elephant's mahout Somsak Salangam, 30, said that as the truck was running downhill at around 11:30pm, the brakes failed, causing the driver to lose

control. The truck overturned, throwing Phang Kamrai onto the road. The truck landed on top of her, pinning her down on the ground

Mr Somsak was unharmed in the crash but all six other passengers were injured. Luea Salangam, a relative of Mr Somsak's, later died from her injuries.

It took rescuers more than 12 hours to find a crane to lift the truck off Phang Kamrai so she could be sent for treatment.

A lot of people can identify who she is, even though the published photos conceal her and her man's eyes.

"I can't accept such news reports. Be the person in the images a celebrity or an ordinary woman, media should have never published them," said Sodsri Phao-inchan, dean of Chiang Mai University's Mass Communications Faculty.

"By publishing the photos and reporting such a story, the media show they lack ethics," the academic said.

Ms Sodsri said the media had better dedicate their attention to economic and social problems.

There are many better ways to investigate politicians, she said.

The academic also called on the Thai Journalist Association and other media professional groups to help stop the propagation of such news reports, saying it was a serious violation of ethics.

Former senator Tuenjai Deetes, who has long fought for women's rights, said the published photos and story of the female politician had hurt both her human dignity and rights.

"This is a form of violence against women. She's hurt emotionally," Ms Tuenjai said.

The former senator suggested that the female politician should defend her rights by suing the offending media and others involved.

Political organisations and women's-right groups should also discuss ways on how to protect female politicians, she added.

"When women climb to the top, some people will want to hurt them," Ms Tuenjai commented.

Excise tax fails to deter smokers

BANGKOK: People continue to cerned about their health and the smoke even though the government has increased the excise tax on cigarettes, the Suan Dusit Poll revealed on May 31 as it marked World No Tobacco Day.

The survey was conducted May 28 to 31 among 1,092 participants, including smokers and non-smokers in Bangkok and nearby provinces.

The poll found that 41% of smokers continued smoking after the cigarette price increase and most said they would continue smoking cigarettes unless it disturbed other people. Some 30%, however, said they were condangers of smoking.

According to the poll, kicking the habit was a top priority of many, but one they could not achieve. Some 42% said they could not give it up because they had smoked for a long time and it had become a habit; while 35% said smoking made them feel relaxed.

Despite World No Tobacco Day on May 31, some 20% of non-smokers said they wanted to try smoking because they had seen others doing it.

Nearly half of those questioned thought the increase in excise tax on cigarettes would not affect their smoking habits, as they knew how much smoking cost them every day, while 21% said the increased prices would reduce the amount they smoked.

Immigrants seized Panda cub expected en route to Phuket

RANONG: Immigration Police in the early hours of May 27 arrested 34 illegal Burmese immigrants and two Thais in a raid on a house in Muang District, Rangong province.

Police also seized a number of notebooks listing the names of members of the security forces who had allegedly been bribed to secure safe passage for the mi-

When the officers arrived, the migrants were already packed into the covered backs of two pickup trucks that were allegedly about to be driven to Phang Nga and Phuket.

At 4am, a team of Ranong immigration police led by Chief Inspector Nachathakrit Pinpak and supported by army soldiers arrived at a house in Tambon Bang Rin.

The home belonged to a man named Khongsak Aduldechakul, reportedly suspected of involvement in a human smuggling ring.

Ranong Immigration Police received intelligence that the house was being used as a waystation for migrants being taken to find work in provinces across

Officers were met by Mr Khongsak's wife, Wilailak Aduldechakul. Outside the house they found two pickup trucks. In the back of one truck, some 21 people were concealed, while the other truck contained 13 people.

Officers also seized drugtaking paraphernalia and a number of notebooks from inside the house.

Mrs Wilailak told police that Lt Chalermphol said. her husband was in a nearby property. At the house, police arrested Mr Khongsak and seized a 9mm pistol with 48 rounds of ammunition, along with more drug-taking paraphernalia.

The couple confessed that they had helped Burmese immigrants to illegally enter Thailand. At the time of their arrest they were preparing to drive the two trucks to Phang Nga and Phuket, police quoted them as saying.

The couple were charged with aiding and abetting illegal immigrants, then sent to Ranong Hospital to be tested for drugs before being handed over to Ranong Muang District Police.

At the time of writing, results of the drug tests were not available.

Lt Chalermphol Thehopakan, commander of the soldiers who allegedly served as backup in the operation, said that Mr Khongsak and Mrs Wilairat were the leaders of a large human smuggling network based in

"In Mr Khongsak's house we found notebooks containing names and contact details for members of the network and schedules for when workers would be smuggled to other provinces. [The notebooks also contained] a list of names of officers that Mr Khongsak had paid to secure safe passage. The list clearly stated the names of officers of all levels, from NCOs to senior officers. The books will be passed onto the relevant authorities for further investigation,"

Ranong Immigration Police have passed the notebooks on to the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) for follow up.

Police Region 8, which covers the Upper South, were contacted for comment on the discovery of the names of police officers in the notebooks.

A police spokesperson said they had not yet received a report of the incident, but would take decisive action if evidence emerged that Region 8 officers had been involved in the smuggling network.

A source in the security forces said that Mr Khongsak's network was the 12th largest of 15 major people-smuggling networks known to be operating out of Ranong.

The network moved around 500 migrants a month to provinces around the South. The network had been operating for more than 10 years and had been able to avoid closure as Mr Khongsak had links with officers at every level of the security forces, the

The source did not reveal what led to Mr Khongsak's arrest.

A migrant who was arrested in the raid, Mu Mo Saw, 25, from Tavoy, said that she was on the way to work in Phuket when she was arrested. She paid 10,000 baht to a Burmese agent in Kawthaung to be taken to Phuket, she said.

The migrants were taken to Ranong to be charged and de-

to boost tourism

CHIANG MAI: The birth of a baby panda on May 27 at the Chiang Mai Zoo is expected to give a big boost to tourism in the northern province.

As the birthplace and current residence of the first offspring of popular giant panda mates Chuang Chuang and Lin Hui, Chiang Mai is preparing to welcome even more visitors wishing to see the cub.

"Thanks to the cub, the number of tourists should rise at least 10% this year," said Chalermsak Suranant, director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) office in Chiang Mai.

Last year, 5 million tourists visited Chiang Mai, generating Bt38 billion in revenue, according to TAT statistics.

Although tourism in Chiang Mai has slumped 5% to 10% during the first five months of the year, an uptrend is now in sight.

"This is good news and we're delighted," said Mr Chalermsak.

On loan from China, parents Chuang Chuang and Lin Hui have lived at the Chiang Mai Zoo

Mr Chalermsak said his of-

fice would consult with the zoo on "panda cub tourism campaigns".

"The cub is cute. Aside from China and Japan, Chiang Mai will be the only place in Asia where tourists can see a baby panda," he pointed out.

Chalermsak said the cub will be put on direct public display only after it grows bigger and stron-

Zoo visitors can now watch the young panda and mother Lin Hui via a television monitor, as closed-circuit television cameras have already been installed inside their cage.

Veterinarians and panda expert Wei Ming have proclaimed the panda cub healthy and said that mother Lin Hui holds her baby all the time.

"The mother's health is fine, too. Her stress has clearly subsided, and she's begun to eat and rest more," said Zoological Park Organization assistant director Dr Boripat Siriaroonrat.

Pandas are difficult to breed in captivity. The cub weighed 200 grams at birth and is the result of artificial insemination.

The 35-year-old victim, identified only as Peter, was taken to Pattaya Memorial Hospital with a five-centimeter long head wound and a broken left arm.






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The times, they are a-changin'



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A powerful force for doing good

ommunity Foundations (CFs) are a powerful force for doing good in society. They are also financial powerhouses. For example, Rotary has total worldwide assets – that is, investments from which Rotary clubs draw an income – of around US\$700 million. In contrast, the Tulsa Community Foundation alone has assets of US\$3.17 billion, and the top 10 in the US have assets totaling around US\$18 billion.

Yet in Thailand, few have heard of CFs or know how they work. CFs are different from conventional charities. In the conventional model, donors give to the charity whose agenda is closest to their heart, and the members of the charity then apply the funds to that agenda.

There are several charities in Phuket that already do very valuable work, such as helping stray animals, assisting with children's education, housing orphans and underprivileged children and preserving culture.

Their contribution can never be overvalued. But there are huge gaps, huge needs, that are not addressed by charities, or by national or local government. It is these needs that the PCF was set up to address.

The foundation has a sweeping remit. Its stated mission is "To help maintain or improve the quality of life in Phuket for everyone – regardless of their origins, their beliefs, or their social or financial status – with particular emphasis on poverty alleviation; preserving the environment; education (of both children and adults); promoting art and culture; preserving the island's architectural and historical heritage; improving public safety; and boosting public health."

How on earth is the PCF going to do all of this? It isn't. To use an analogy, the PCF is to charitable or community work what a bank is to industry. Banks make nothing.

They do not own factories, hire workers or turn steel into cars. What they do instead is support these activities through funding, through expert advice and by

providing transparency.

In much the same way, the PCF, of which the *Phuket Gazette* is a founding sponsor, was established to support community organizations and charities (including those already mentioned) by helping to source funds, by providing expert advice or volunteers and by giving social projects the transparency that is otherwise often lacking.

The PCF does, in fact, have a couple of projects of its own. Although we believe these are valuable to society in general, they are also designed to act as a "shop window", to demonstrate what can happen when a variety of elements of society can be drawn together to achieve an aim.

The first of these projects is the Motorcycle Back Light Project. Anyone who has driven on a dark road at night will know the heart-stopping experience of having a motorcycle with no rear light appear right in front. Rearlight bulbs cost just 20 baht, yet a straw poll suggests that as many as one in four of all motorbikes on Phuket don't have a working rear light.

The PCF has drawn a variety of people and organizations together to address this problem. Motorcycle dealers donated bulbs, the Kusondharm Foundation lent a tent and chairs are borrowed from a nearby temple. Students from the Vocational College give up a couple of days of their free time to change bulbs. The PCF designed and made posters, which bike owners can read while their bulbs are changed, explaining why a rear light can save the rider's life. The total cost to the PCF of the first session, during which we made 150 motorbikes safer, was about

Our other current project is to establish toy libraries in different parts of the island. Toys are an important element in developing children's imaginations and, when with other children, their social skills. Yet many families on the island simply cannot afford them. One toy library, from which children will be able to borrow toys to take home, has already opened at Wat Thepnimit on Chao Fa East Road and another at

Hongyok Bamrung School in Mai Khao. We have earmarked two other schools for action.

Again, the libraries are a demonstration of what can be achieved when different people are brought together. At Hongyok Bamrung School, Bt200,000 was given by the Phuket Direct Fund Association of Zurich to pay for toys and furniture to store them


in. Bamrung Sampaorat, Chairman of the Islamic Committee of Phuket, paid from his own pocket for the painting of the room, which was done in a single morning by sailors and marines from the *USS Boxer* (organized by Brad Kenny of the Patong Rotary). Additional toys came from private donors, including primary students at the British International School. The

library will be run by the school itself. At the opening, the Phuket International Hospital gave free health check-ups, and put on a puppet show.

As can be seen, the PCF is capable of pulling together a variety of good-hearted people to complete a project. But there must be thousands of ideas for projects out there. We can offer help and advice, and ensure financial transparency, but we can't manage them all.

This is why we are now compiling a database of people who have ideas and are willing to put in the time to make them happen; potential donors (in cash or kind); experts willing to give free advice; and volunteers who want to spend time doing something worthwhile.

Standing on the shoulder of giants

ow that the low season—or should that be summer season? — is upon us and the weather, by and large, has gone to the dogs, it's reassuring to know that there are still plenty of things to do out there that don't require the sun to be shining and the weather to be perfect.

Better still, a large number of those activities are outdoors, meaning that folks don't have to spend the rainy season cowering indoors or traipsing around shopping centers and can go outside and get some exercise and some fresh air.

Over the coming months, I hope to look at some of these activities and perhaps discover that summer isn't as big a wash out as was once thought.

It's easy for people who live and work in Phuket to forget just how beautiful the island is and that despite seemingly constant development, there are still parts of the island that remain relatively unspoilt, providing us with glimpses of what Phuket looked like in days gone by.

The Cable Jungle Adventure in Thalang is located in such a place, amidst seemingly untouched jungle. Heading North

from Phuket Town, turn right and head for towards Ton Sai waterfall at the first crossroads after Heroines' Monument.

I was unsure what exactly the Cable Jungle Adventure was and I suspect that you're thinking the same right now. Well, it's a 1,200-meter-long series of elevated cables that allow you to zip along through the jungle at heights more commonly occupied by birds or free-swinging primates. In total there are 15 cables of varying lengths - some no more than 15 or 20 meters, some a whopping 150 meters – all positioned at different gradients, producing varying speeds and thrills. The faster rides get the adrenalin going, while the slower journeys give you time to kick back in your harness and enjoy the majesty of the giant trees around you and the views that go out to sea.

The short walk up to the office gives you a first glimpse of the natural environment that awaits you as you head deeper into the jungle. Thick green vegetation with randomly appointed brightly colored tropical flowers lines the path before you arrive at your destination and are greeted by the friendly staff.

After filling out the neces-

sary paperwork – the usual liability release forms that accompany anything that is remotely fun – and enjoying a complimentary soft drink, you are fitted into your safety harness and provided with a special set of gloves and helmet before heading to the practice ground.

Believe it or not, there is a technique to zipping around the jungle at breakneck speed. With that speed comes the need to be able to brake – that's what the practice is for. Once you have successfully demonstrated your skills it's time to head to the real course.

The sensation of whizzing

over the tops of the trees while virtually horizontal is a curious one. You have the adrenalin commonly associated with height and speed, but a sense of relaxation that can only come from lying down – despite being a considerable distance from the ground.

The views are spectacular, and the pristine jungle that surrounds you is vibrant and full of life. Some of the starting positions are a short walk apart and your guide will take the time to tell you about the surrounding flora and fauna. They'll even take pictures of you and your friends in the trunks of some truly gargantuan trees.

Once the course has been negotiated, the staff will provide you with more soft drinks and some fresh fruit while you relax listening to the jungle's very own soundtrack.

The Cable Jungle Adventure is open every day from 9am to 6pm and costs Bt1,950 per person, which includes soft drinks, seasonal fruits and insurance. A pick up and drop off service is available from most major resorts in Phuket and will cost up to 150 baht. For more information call 076-527054 or 087-8969076.

he Phuket Has Been Good to Us foundation has been working to improve the lives of the island's children since it was founded by the late Tom McNamara four years ago. A roaring success

he Lions Club of Patong

Currently, club members are working with education administrators to determine which of the local schools would benefit from the computers the most. And it doesn't end there.

Incoming Lion President Jean Leon said that there is a growing list of projects being added to the club's list for consideration. With the talents and backgrounds of the members of the Patong Beach club available, there is little doubt that they'll be successful.

Incoming Lion President Leon was also keen to point out that every project requires a certain amount of funding support – something that all of us can get involved in – adding that sometimes even a few hundred baht can make a difference for someone in need and that any contributions made to their charity funds are used as they were intended and are not associated in any way with administrative funds.

Jeroen Deknatel, best known as the founder of Fantasea Divers, worked in the movie business in The Netherlands with the intention of becoming a film director. "I had a great first impression of Phuket. I'm a very organized person and when I saw the orderly lines of rubber trees, I immediately liked the island. I stayed for three months at Patong Beach which, thirty years ago, was peaceful and very beautiful. I decided to take a new direction with my life and move to Phuket. Fortunately, I had an offer to start a diving business to serve the growing number of tourists."

Jeroen had arrived at a good time. By 1980, prices for ore from the island's tin mines had dropped dramatically, which sparked a shift to the development of tourism. He launched Fantasea Divers in late 1979 by

adapting a typical Thai fishing trawler for use as a dive boat in the waters off Patong Beach.

"I spent a lot of time in the early years just enjoying life on Phuket. With my motorbike, I would go through the jungles. At that time there were no roads between Patong and Kamala, so my mates and I would cut a path through the mountains and jungles to get north on the island."

Over the next nearly 30 years, Jeroen developed Fantasea Divers to become the top diving operator on Phuket. Starting with the modest Thai fishing trawler, he expanded in 1983 with a 50ft sailboat that could accommodate 12 divers. His was the first company to offer regular weekly trips to the Similan Islands, and he spent several years developing other new areas for diving.

By the 1990s, he found himself in direct negotiation with the government of Myanmar to open their territorial waters to Fantasea Divers, an area which became known as the Burma Banks.

"During my many years with Fantasea, I was always pushing the ceiling to offer new dive sites and more comfort to each new generation of diver. In 1990, I acquired a big steel Customs patrol boat which I converted into eight cabins and

named *Fantasea*. And in 2000, I built the *Ocean Rover*, a 100ft, 300 ton flagship, the only boat of its size to receive the IMO passenger safety certificate."

"The *Ocean Rover* was like a five star resort experience. Our guests were pampered and provided with the same level of service as at Phuket's best hotels. But these customers are very particular about safety, so I ensured our crew was trained to international standards and I studied to become a professional marine surveyor."


Last year, while taking a group of divers around Sulawesi, Jeroen was approached by an Indonesian dive operator who offered to buy the *Ocean Rover* for an amount Jeroen could not refuse.

The sale of his primary dive boat has enabled him to focus on a second career as an independent marine surveyor with his own company, Waterline Marine.

"Over the past 15 years, I've had to travel abroad three or four times a year to market Fantasea Divers at international trade shows, and I'm always happy to return here. After thirty years, I still love living on Phuket."

"I often read 'complainabout-Thailand' letters in the *Gazette*. Perhaps people forget that the cause of this country's shortcomings, the sometimes undisciplined spirit of its people, is also what makes it such a great place to live. Love it or leave it, but please don't try to change it."

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Greek gastronomy goes on the road

he Greeks invented wine; they did so some 5,000 years ago and they even have a god of wine – Dionysus. Those were the first things the 150 guests at a buffet dinner of traditional Greek cuisine and fine wines learned from their host, Emmanuel Markianos, who is Head of the Economic Mission for the Embassy of Greece in Bangkok.

Mr Markianos' bold statement was made last weekend during a cocktail reception and dinner held in the ballroom of the Hilton Arcadia Resort & Spa in Karon. The introduction to the delights of going Greek was part of a three-province tour (Bangkok, Chiang Mai and Phuket) by Mr Markianos and his team.

Although the Greek tradition of exporting wine dates back to the classical period of Roman emperors, who insisted on Greek wines for their feasts, the wines are only now beginning to be appreciated here. Mr Markianos' tour of Thailand with an entourage of producers of fine Greek food and wines was aimed at creating better awareness of the culinary delights that the Mediterranean islands have to offer and to open up distribution channels to this island.

Another interesting fact learned from Mr Markianos was that Phuket is the number-one holiday destination in South East Asia for Greeks. About 3,000 Greeks take a few months off each year during their low tourist season. The culinary lifestyles of the two nations are similar – dining with friends is a national pass-time in both countries – but their communities have yet to bond.

Perhaps a few bottles of ouzo would help.

Ouzo will be one of the new Greek products available in Phuket soon but for this occasion, three makers of fine Grecian wines flew in with crates of their reds and whites. Traditional Greek winery Domaine Dereskos brought four regional wines from the Trifilia and Messininia regions. They were Cabernet Sauvignons and Chardonnays from vineyards with ecological orientation that produce low but healthy outputs. The vines are fed with natural fertilizers and the winery does not use chemical herbicides or pesticides. Their *Agrilia Carbernt Sauvignon* is stored in oak casks for almost a year and then bottled for another eight.

The Megapanos Winery is a more modern producer of fine wines that was established in 1990 in Pikermi, Attica and uses state-of-the-art vinification methods to produce rich reds, dry whites and a crystal clear rosé in a limited quantity of excellent quality. The *Ameynto Megapanos* comes from the only region in Greece allowed to pro-











duce rosé wine. It goes well with Greek desserts, such as *baklava* (phyllo pastry layers filled with nuts and drenched in syrup), *Kourabiedes* (cookies made with roasted almonds) and bread and butter pudding

Vatistas Winery with vineyards in the Monemvasia, Mesinia and Pelopenese regions brought dry reds and whites to the banquet. The deep ruby Cabernet Sauvignon Agiorgitiko with tones of vanilla and spices works in harmony with meat dishes such as *moussaka* and *Keftede* (fried meatballs with oregano and mint).

Another host of the evening was Elea Greta Extra Virgin Olive Oil, which is cold pressed in the Plora and Heraklin areas of Crete; perfect for creating authentic Greek salads (*Horiatiki*).

"In the past 15 years, Greece has produced quite a number of new varieties of wine. The wines we brought with us are from three wine makers already well known around the world; Canada, the United States, Europe Australia, Japan, Korea, Singapore – demanding markets. All of them [the wine makers] offer unique varieties that you cannot find anywhere else," said Mr Markianos.

"We try to show that wines from smaller countries like us are worth a try. For business people out there, we are not only here for the wines. Greek businessmen are really trying to become a part of Phuket's business community looking for a number of opportunities," he added.

Mr Markianos said that the producers are in talks with importers and they hope to bring Greek products into Phuket's stores, restaurants and resorts soon. The drive will be backed up with promotions such as wine-tasting events, special offers and more public awareness campaigns.



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

TOT strikes back with FTTx

s p e e d o m e t e r crossed over 17,000 K bits per second, I nearly had a heart attack...

I was sitting in a room at the TOT office on Chao Fa East Road, at a briefing put together by Phuket's Software Industry Promotion Agency (SIPA). Mr Suporn, TOT's Marketing Man-

ager for Phuket, had just finished a presentation on TOT's "ICT Paradise" plans for Phuket. I've heard a whole

lot of promises about Phuket ICT City over the years, and it's hard not to feel more than a little jaded about the whole concept.

Before the meeting started, Mr Suporn showed me a fiber optic setup in one corner of the conference room. Coming out of the wall was a thick black cable containing small strands of fiber - like an oversize power cable with a cylindrical black plastic box, about the size of a baseball bat, wrapped around one section of the cable. Inside the box, Mr Suporn showed me the electronic gizmos that split the signal and feed it to four banks of plastic connectors. Each bank of connectors contains eight plugs, each of which aren't a whole lot bigger than the power connector on my mobile phone.

One of the 32 plugs had a cable attached which fed into a small box mounted on the wall. From there, another cable ran from the wall-side box to a router. And the router, like most routers, sported dancing green lights. The whole rig is called FTTx – fiber to the home – or office, or whatever.

Near the end of the PowerPoint presentation, SIPA's

'hen the download Mr Pracha, who's been going through the slides and narrating them in English, flips over to Windows. He plugs a regular LAN cable into the router, and into the back of his laptop. He then cranks up Internet Explorer and goes to the Thaivisa.com speed test site – the one that measures internet speeds to Bangkok. At first I didn't understand what I

was seeing: I've never seen a speed test in Phuket that runs much over 3,000 K bits per second (that's 3

Mbps; some CAT lines go that fast), but right there on the presentation screen, the speedometer ran up to - and beyond -17,000Kbps.

So what's the big deal? If you aren't a dyed-in-the-wool computer geek, why on earth would you care about 17,000Kbps?

Let me tell you why.

If – and I emphasize the word "if" - TOT can reliably deliver 17,000Kbps to your doorstep, you can throw away your satellite TV or cable TV box. If the right companies get hooked into the system, you'll never need to rent or buy a CD or DVD again. 17,000Kbps is twice as much oomph as you need to get full high-definition television, movies that run (and pause and rewind) when you want them and any TV show at any time – even televised college courses.

Within the next year or two, a lot of television broadcasting will be available for free over the internet. Want to watch the local news in Tuscaloosa? Did you miss last week's My Name is Earl? IPTV, as it's called - roughly translated as "television over the internet" - will bring you the latest TV, all in high-definition. We will no longer need to settle for low-res pictures from your satellite provider or lousy sound on cable TV. But, IPTV requires a whole lot of bits per second.

Right now, there is no highdef broadcast television in Phuket. None, nada, zip. Indeed, there's almost no high-def programming of any type. That fancy flat screen TV you bought shows the same scratchy picture that everyone else sees, unless you go to the extreme measure of buying a Blu-Ray DVD player and paying a fortune for Blu-Ray DVDs – if you can find real ones.

Suddenly, with IPTV, everyone who can afford the bill can see high-def media - TV, movies, live broadcasts, you name it.

That's not all. Videoconferencing - even using a webcam to talk with the grandkids - is taken to another level at 4,000 to 5,000Kbps. No herky-jerky pictures or fading sounds. Doctors here in Phuket can communicate directly with specialists in Bangkok, or Bangalore, and show them all the details. Computer aficionados and software companies can download big software packages in minutes, instead of hours or days. Architects can push plans and photos across the ocean. You get the idea...

All of that was rushing through my head when Mr Pracha switched to speedtest.net, and checked the fiber optic line's speed to Singapore. Once again, it pegged over 17,000Kbps. Astounding.

He anticipated my next question, and switched to the speed test that we're running here in Phuket (live-access.com/ PhuketInternet.aspx). He ran a test to San Francisco, and it came up 1,600Kbps. Bummer. That's a good-but-not-great ADSL

speed, as you can quickly confirm by looking at the test results on the live-access site.

But wait, there's a silver

Apparently, TOT expects to connect an IGX – which is to say, a big international switch – in Phuket to one in Haad Yai in July. From Haad Yai, the line will patch into one of the major internet backbones. The IGX is planned to have a 10Gbps capacity (that's 10,000,000Kbps) for ADSL lines, and 9Gbps just for FTTx. That should provide a big shot in the arm for international access speeds. I hope.

TOT currently plans to roll out FTTx service by July, with a maximum of 3,200 customers. Yes, I know, you've heard that one before – back in January 2008, The Nation reported that TOT planned to have 3,200 lines installed by December 2008. But this time it's close. Most of the fiber optic ring has been laid and the IGX is said to be up and running, although not yet connected. Some important details remain outstanding however. TOT hasn't announced its pricing and, of course, no customers have been able to run a real-world test.

I will. Promise.

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





Placing mutual trust in investment funds

ith the introduction of the investment trust in 1868, the idea of a "collective investment scheme" was accepted into the world of investment. In time, this led to another collective investment scheme that would eventually become much larger and more popular: the unit trust, also known as a mutual fund.

The two are one and the same, but the tendency is for the term "mutual fund" to be used in North America and "unit trust" in other parts of the world. Having said that, today, especially in the offshore world, the trend is to simply call them all "funds".

All mutual funds/unit trusts have the following in common: the "unit price" is calculated by taking the total value of any fund and dividing it by the number of units. These funds can have dealing dates that are daily, weekly or monthly and the number of units issued depends on subscriptions and redemptions. Matter may or may not be created or destroyed, but unit balances (numbers) change continually. It is not the number of units that is of importance, but the value of each unit or part thereof. Unit prices are usually quoted to two or four decimal points.

Investors may wonder why there is such a variety of dealing dates or periods. This is usually caused by the types of investment that any fund is involved with. The "money market fund" is the most common fund of assets under management by some margin. These funds seek to offer a slightly better return than cash but at the same time can be withdrawn within 24 hours. The assets of a money market fund usually include cash, cash on deposit in the local "money market", short-dated government bonds and corporate bonds. They may also include such items as bankers acceptances and floating rate notes.


Last year, US money market mutual funds hit the headlines. This was largely because fund managers were investing some of their equity into "toxic assets" such as structured investment vehicles (SIVs). Normally, any investment in the money markets considered by the fund manager would be risk free. These SIVs and related products were the polar opposite. The danger then arose that the unit price could fall below one dollar.

The US has trillions of dollars of individual investors' money held in money market mutual funds. This has become an area of safety where people and institutions can "park" their extra cash without any thought of risk or possible loss. When it became clear that this trust had been breached, it suddenly became a very serious situation.

America was already facing a financial meltdown and under no circumstances could this be allowed to spread to money market mutual funds. The government subsequently intervened and no investors lost any money.

Money market mutual funds have become so popular in many countries that the concept of a fixed deposit does not really exist. A good example of this is France, where the normal tendency is for customers to ask their bank, "What interest does your money market fund pay?"

A French bank will in turn

ask the customer what period of time is being contemplated, for example zero to six months or six to 18 months. The bank will then offer two different money market funds, depending on the period required.

It may surprise some readers that France has such an advanced unit trust/fund industry with huge amounts of assets involved. This was instigated by the government of the day about 40 years ago, which noted that funds were the best course for the French public to follow in terms of investment. To encourage their use, the government offered tax incentives and the French public responded enthusiastically.

The French government also introduced "SICAVs", which are simply open-ended collective investment schemes. However, for the French public the earlier versions had a level of safety incorporated. A SICAV could invest up to 70% of its assets in the stockmarket, but the remaining 30% had to be invested in cash or highly rated bonds, mainly those issued by the government.

This was simply a way of protecting the public from really heavy losses in the event of a major collapse in stockmarkets.

Today, however, with Luxembourg funds effectively being part of the offshore world, their SICAVs are the same as any other mutual fund/unit trust – the 30% rule no longer exists, except in France.

Funds – mutual funds/unit trusts and all the other name variants – are essentially the same the world over. They allow investors the ability to choose what types of investment they want. The list of choices is huge. For example, there are funds that simply invest in one country's stockmarket, say, Australia. This can then be refined into Australian small businesses, Australian natural resource companies and so on. From here, there are regional funds which could, for example, cover Asean, Europe or Latin America. There are also many funds that cover the whole world or have themes, for example technology or health care.

Investors will also soon find

the "managed" sector, which can have a mixture of asset types. A common example is a "cautious managed fund", which would typically hold up to 30% in equities (shares) with the balance being invested in bonds, money market securities and so on. A balanced managed fund may allow 40% - 60% in equities with the balance being held in a similar fashion to the cautious fund.

There are funds which invest solely in bonds, some cover only government bonds, while others specialize in corporate bonds. Again, bonds may be selected on a national basis, for example euro bonds, gilts and US bonds, to name but a few.

bought a copy of John Grogan's Marley and Me (Hodder, London, 2006, 343pp) because I'd seen trailers for the movie with Kate Hudson and Owen Wilson and it looked like fun. Subtitled Life and Love with the World's Worst Dog, this is the tale of a family's 14 years of living with a walking canine disaster.

I was almost finished with the book when I saw the movie on a flight back to Thailand. This prompted some instant reflection upon the differences between print and film.

In the movie, the scene where a leashed Marley yanks away a table at an outdoor restaurant and drags it through startled diners in pursuit of a poodle is a 10 second sight gag. In the book, this merits two pages of description from the point of view of Marley, the author, the

A comically incorrigible dog

author's wife, their kids and the shocked diners. A dozen laugh lines are served up in contrast to the single sight gag. Read how a master humor writer plays out the scene:

"All we knew was that one instant we were sitting at a lovely outdoor table toasting the beautiful day, and the next our table was on the move, crashing its way through the sea of other tables, banging into innocent bystanders, and making a horrible, ear-piercing, industrial-grade shriek as it scraped over the concrete pavers. In that first split second, before either of us had realized exactly what bad fate had befallen us, it seemed distinctly possible that our table was possessed, fleeing our family . . . In the next split second, I saw that it wasn't our table that was haunted, but our dog. Marley was out in front, chugging forward with every ounce of rippling muscle he had, the leash stretched tight as piano wire."

A Labrador retriever tipping the scales at nearly 100 pounds, Marley is a gargantuan eater: toy plastic soldiers, bottle caps, ballpoint pen caps, combs, bath

Kleenix and Handi Wipes. And he wasn't shy about vomiting:

"We would hear him let out a loud gaaaaack! in the next room

there would be another household item, sitting in a puddle of half-digested mangoes and dog chow. Being considerate, Marley never puked on the hardwood floor or even the kitchen linoleum if he could help it. He always aimed for the Persian rug.'

A great comic set piece in the movie comes when Marley flunks out of dog-training school.

towels, sponges, socks, used In the book, eight pages are devoted to the havoc Marley creates. Again there are a lot more laughs than in the movie.

"Before we were fully out and by the time we rushed in, of the car, Marley spotted the other dogs

> gathering with their owners across the tarmac. A party! He leaped over us and out of the car and was off in a tear, his leash dragging behind him. He darted from one dog to the next, sniffing private parts, drib-


bling pee,

and flinging huge wads of spit through the air. For Marley it was a festival of smells – so many genitals, so little time – and he was seizing the moment, being careful to stay just ahead of me as I raced after him."

Notice here how Grogan can enter the mind of his dog, again something no film can do. For all the many advantages of prose over film, there are drawbacks as well. The movies lingers a bit too long on Marley's final illnesses and death. In the book, the death watch seems interminable. And the first traces of maudlin sentimentality begin to creep in, something Grogan has carefully avoided before in favor of broad comedy.

Still, the reader can't help by being affected by the death of a beloved family member. I'll leave you with one last comic image. The family moves from south Florida to Pennsylvania and Marley has his first encounter with snow, skidding off the front porch and somersaulting headfirst into a snow drift:

"When he popped back up a second later, he looked like a giant powdered doughnut. Except for a black nose and two brown eyes, he was completely dusted in white. The Abominable Snowdog.'

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The code of ethics

This week's editorial comes in the form of an open letter to World Boxing Council (WBC) President Jose Sulaiman on the topic of racebased double-pricing policies at the WBC-sanctioned world title fight held at Bangla Boxing Stadium in Patong on May 29.

Dear Mr Sulaiman,

As you are no doubt aware, WBC champion Oleydong Sithsamerchai recently retained his strawweight crown in a title defense against Muhammed Rachman at the new Bangla Boxing Stadium in Patong.

What you might not be aware of, is that the host venue charged foreign spectators a minimum of 2,000 baht (more than US\$58) for seats, while charging Thai nationals a maximum of only 300 baht (US\$8.70) to watch the same contest.

Double-pricing policies based on race or nationality are sadly very common in Thailand, but to our knowledge this is the first time they have been in effect at a WBC-sanctioned event. The Gazette views this as a very negative development that could tarnish the reputation of your council, which has long enjoyed its status as the premier international sanctioning body in the Kingdom.

In the previous two WBC-sanctioned events held in Phuket, including Oleydong's first title defense staged in Phuket City last June, admission was free to all. Thousands turned up to cheer on local favorite Oleydong, who comes from the nearby province of

Free admission has been the case at almost all WBC boxing events in Thailand in the past, ensuring big crowds and the kind of excitement that can only be beneficial to title fights. These contests are also routinely broadcast around the country on free-to-

While the Gazette has no problem with stadiums charging for seats, the practice of adopting a two-tiered pricing structure based on perceived race or nationality is inherently inequitable, backward and – in the end – self-defeating. Is it any wonder there were so many empty seats at this latest fight?

We hope the WBC will consider such double-pricing policies in the context of the WBC Constitution and Code of Ethics, which clearly states that people in the professional boxing industry should "oppose discrimination on the basis of race, nationality, religion, and act forcefully to counteract it, never co-operating with those who practice it".

In view of this, and in order to maintain the fairness and the integrity of the great sport of boxing, we ask that the WBC take steps to apply, as a precondition, fair and equitable ticket pricing structures for events it sanctions in the future.

How can I legally purchase property for a marital partner here in Thailand?

In the country where we were married, the law of the land states that all of the money we have is now "our" money, rather than simply mine or hers.

Given this state of affairs and this apparent new legislation, is it now impossible for us

As your wife is a Thai national, of course she is able to purchase property here in Thailand. If she has her own account, but doesn't have the necessary funds, then you cannot use her as a nominee and use your own money. Such an action would see your land title revoked.

Dates for 23rd annual Phuket King's Cup Regatta announced

he 23rd Phuket King's Cup Regatta – Southeast Asia's premier Regatta – will once again be hotly contested this year off Kata Beach. The event is scheduled to take place from November 28 to December 5.

The regatta is traditionally held during the first week of December each year, and includes the December 5 birthday of HM King Bhumibol Adulyadej, the regatta's patron. This year, the final day of racing and the closing party will fall on His Majesty's birthday.

Kevin Whitcraft, President of the Organizing Committee said, "We are looking forward to the 23rd Regatta. Following a survey of participants at last year's event, and listening to participants during the event, we are taking on board the feedback and looking to improve the Regatta experience for all this year."

The Phuket King's Cup Regatta will be headquartered at Kata Beach Resort and racing will take place in the waters outside Kata Bay.

The closures of Bangkok airports just prior to the 2008 regatta made it difficult for partici-

pants to make their way to Phuket. Despite the difficulties, 93 yachts made it to the start line on day one and the regatta turned out to be a great success with a number of participants saying "it was the best in years".

Entries for the 2009 regatta will soon open for online booking allowing organizers to gauge the anticipated numbers for 2009.

"Last year was unusual. The global economic crises may or may not affect the number of yachts entering this year, but at this stage it is too soon to say," said Simon James, Race Management Director.

"We have already had a good number of entry inquiries, and queries as to dates, race courses and details, so that is positive," he added.

The 2009 Regatta will follow a similar program of sailing and social activities to previous years.

Registration will take place on November 28 and 29, with the practice race scheduled to be held in the afternoon on the 29th. Racing will start on November 30 and sailors will compete every day – with the exception of the lay day on December 3 – until Decem-

ugby players of all shapes and sizes descended on Phuket for the 2009 Overgaard Phuket Rugby 10s over the weekend of May 29 and the 36 teams in attendance contributed to a carnival atmosphere at Surakul Stadium.

Spectators with only a passing interest in rugby flocked to Phuket City to witness the spectacle of grown men painted blue, dressed as sheep, attempting some over ambitious choral arrangements and even finding time to play some rugby.

The first day was devoted to the Coffin Dodgers tournament for players over 35. The first round drew up an intriguing clash between old rivals the Phuket Viagrabonds and the Bangkok Bangers.

Unfortunately for the Viagrabonds they were comprehensively beaten by the Bangers who ran out comfortable 34-0 winners

The main competition got off to an early start on Saturday May 30. Last years' winners, the Kukri badgers, who fielded a contingent of professional rugby players from the UK, lived up to their billing as pre-tournament favorites, comfortably winning all three of their group matches.

Pimp your ride

Adding hinges to your pickup's back seat



drive a 2000 Mitsubishi Strada 4x4, and while I love the truck, there are a few design flaws that irk me somewhat. Some I can't change, but one I could and did. This fix may be of help to others, because from the numbers of "twins" I see on the roads, this seems to be a very popular model of truck.

The bottom section of the back seat was held in position by Velcro strips, which had worn out over time. Each time I'd stop, the seat bottom would come loose and slide forward. When I arrived at my destination, it always bothered me to have to shove it back into position and push down on it to try and reseat the Velcro.

I wanted to be able to lift the seat, allowing access to the small storage spaces beneath, yet still have it anchored securely. With this in mind I installed a pair of regular door-type hinges beneath the front edge of the seat bottom.

Now it can be lifted up, and yet, when down, it is held securely

in place. Photo 1 shows the pin areas of the hinges, all that is visible of them beneath the seat when it is down. Some black magic-marker would render them almost invisible, if desired. Photo 2 shows the hinges as installed.

The seat bottom's base is thin plywood, and the "floor" beneath the seat is thin metal. Anchoring hinges into thin material requires either reinforcing the material – impossible in this instance – or using the thickest screws possible. Since the latter was my only option, I used three inch hinges, both to distribute the stress over a wider area of wood, and also because the larger the hinge, the larger the screw holes and the thicker and stronger the hinge pin. I used bevel-headed, #12 x 3/4 inch screws. The holes were cut for #14s, but 12s fit in, with the larger shafts gripping the floor and seat bottom more se-

The hinges' positions were dictated somewhat by the irregular shape of the metal floor's raised and lowered areas. They had to be attached at a low point where they could contact the seat bottom, yet allow it to rest evenly on the floor when lowered. If the hinges protruded above the floor, and supported the weight of the seat bottom when lowered and especially when sat upon, they would eventually wear through the wood and ruin the seat bottom.

First make a vertical chalk line down the exact center of the



front edge of the seat bottom, continuing across the "crack" between the seat and the floor and onto the front, vertical part of the floor.

This will give you something to measure against. If you can't find chalk, buy some of that ant poison that comes in little white blocks at your local 7Eleven – only 19 baht. It's designed to be rubbed around the legs of furniture, and is sort of chalky. Once you mark out the line, remove the seat bottom.

Next, find the locations for your hinges on the metal floor beneath the seat. Important: Make sure you are installing the hinges with the correct sides against the floor and seat. Hinges can only close fully one way, so when positioning them on the floor, make

sure they are closed flat.

Position them, with the "pins" over the edge, so that they will touch the seat bottom, yet not protrude above the metal of the floor area – lay a piece of scrap plywood, almost as wide as the seat bottom, over the hinges to see if they are too high. If you can't find a proper "sunken" area in which to mount them, you can try pounding a spot for them with a heavy ball-peen hammer, or small sledgehammer, but be careful not to go too deep.

Once you've determined their positions, hold them in place one at a time, and outline them with the chalk. Measure their distance from the vertical chalk mark for transfer to the seat bottom.

Lay the seat bottom down, with some pieces of wood or

bricks under the front edge, to stabilize it as you drill. Measure outwards from the vertical chalk mark to find the hinges' locations. Place them at the right spot, and drill the holes. Remember to use a bit slightly thinner than the screws.

Attach the hinges, but don't tighten the screws all the way yet. Now lift the seat bottom into position with its front edge against the front edge of the floor, position the hinges' other sides within their marks, and drill the holes into the floor. It may help to have someone hold the seat bottom for this.

Install and tighten the screws, then lower the seat making sure that it rests on the metal of the floor and not on the hinges. If all is well, tighten the screws.

That's it! Have a beer! See you next time!



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Bt119mn for new Rajabhat Uni commencement hall

ork is well underway on a Bt119 million conference room and commencement hall complex being built on the grounds of Rajabhat Phuket University.

A contract between the university and Bangkok-based project contractor Kumjornkij Construction Co Ltd was signed in mid-November last year.

The contract completion date is scheduled for December 27, 2010.

The project oversight director is Rajabhat Phuket University Associate Professor Jaroern Boonyom, while Assistant Professor Vorasak Watsoontorn chairs the construction supervision committee.

Kumjornkij Construction is a well-established construction firm that specializes in university projects, including study halls and dormitories. The company is now busy installing the steel lattice support structure for the enormous roofs that will cover the buildings.

As a public works project, the complex was designed by architects from the Interior Ministry's Department of Public Works and Town and Country Planning.

The project site is roughly square in shape, covering about 16,200 square meters.

The main building is a three-storey structure with a total floor area of 7,900sqm. It will comprise parking facilities, offices, a storeroom, an electric power control room and security control booths.

The second storey will house the main 7,000sqm conference hall, along with smaller meeting room facilities and a VIP room for members of the Royal Family presiding over commencement ceremonies.

The top floor, covering 1,300sqm, will house water tanks. The complex will have two elevators.



When completed, the main commencement hall could be among the largest of its kind on the island.

Punpak Punsawad of the Kumjornkij Construction Purchasing Department told the *Gazette* the building must be constructed to the very highest safety stan-

dards, as HRH Crown Prince Maha Vajiralongkorn is expected to attend the graduation ceremonies to be held there and confer degrees upon graduating students.

Mr Punpak said the main hall would have seating for over 1,000 people, making it one of the largest meeting facilities on the island.





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


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

Buying property through an offshore company



OFFSHORE PARADISE: The British Virgin Islands is a haven for offshore companies. Using offshore entities as a holding vehicle is a popular method among property buyers.





t has become hugely popular for property buyers to purchase their dream home through an offshore entity as a holding vehicle. It is likely, therefore, that a property buyer may be offered the offshore company that owns the desired property as part of a resale package.

In such an event, the parties would need to enter into a "share sale and purchase agreement" that stipulates the terms and conditions that apply to the sale and purchase of the entire issued share capital in the company, as well as the change of directorship from seller to buyer or its designee.

While negotiating the terms of such an agreement, a buyer should insist on a share sale and purchase agreement that contains comprehensive warranties and representations given by the seller in the capacity of shareholder and/or director, as well as by the company itself, in order to protect and serve the buyer's best interests.

Such warranties and representations might include: the offshore entity holding the sole and undisputed title to the target property; shares being free of any encumbrance whatsoever or rights of third party; the seller being the sole and undisputed owner of the shares; the offshore entity having no outstanding debts or liabilities; and the company not being involved in or threatened by litigation or other governmental action or investigation.

It is further recommended, if available under the offshore company's home jurisdiction, to request the provision of a so-called "Certificate of Good Standing" – an official document issued by the registrar of corporate affairs – that states the existence and compliance of the company with the relevant legal requirements, ideally dated with the date of the completed share transfer.

However, the above-mentioned should not be used as a substitute for performing an extensive due diligence regarding the company and the property itself, including, but not limited to, a title search and verification of secured access to the property.

It is advisable, serving the interests of both seller and buyer, that the parties agree to use an escrow arrangement when conducting an offshore company sale, offering the advantage that both parties will be protected if the defaulting party fails to perform as it should.

Typically, under an escrow arrangement, the buyer pays the funds required to purchase the shares into an escrow account of an independent third party; the escrow agent.

The agent releases and disburses the funds to the seller upon the seller fulfilling their contractual obligations, namely the transfer of shares to the buyer, the seller's resignation as the company's director, along with the provision of relevant evidence showing proof of both.

In the event of the sale of a British Virgin Islands (BVI) company, a "Certificate of Incumbency", issued by the BVI company's appointed registered agent, may qualify as such evidence, and should also state the name(s) of the current director(s) and shareholder(s).

In summary, a property purchase through the acquisition of an offshore entity that holds the target property is a straightforward and transparent transaction, and one that can be organized by the legal representatives of both buyer and seller to the satisfaction of both parties.

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
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
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Phuket's surreal estate

t was interesting reading comments from a local resident recently published in the Gazette on the issue of property consultants pushing speculative investments in the newspaper [Letters, Phuket Gazette, May 30]. The writer painted the real estate industry as one that takes, rather than contributes to the island on a fairly wide scale. The letter, which contained some facts and a lot of opinion, portrayed those working here in the industry as only after a fast buck and claimed that absent investors don't contribute to the community.

The property industry has grown over the past decade,

mainly fueled by the island's tourism industry. While the full-time expatriate population has skyrocketed, the number of part-time owners and investors in villas, condos and homes has fast outpaced all other transactions. We've moved from a business model that was a very rudimentary framework to a more developed model, which is the logical growth pattern seen the world over, with investors viewing property as a secure long-term investment.

As for what is written about real estate in the *Gazette*, I took the opportunity to actually re-read the most recent columns the writer admonished as not being neutral property assessments. Looking at stories such as the Lersuang verses Joe Cole dispute, Bali outpacing Phuket for investment, and transaction figures from developments such as Andara, The Heights, Kata Rocks and Tawan Views, it seems to me that what's being published is a mix of the good, the bad and the ugly, and certainly no evidence of rose-colored shades on the state of play in property.

As for the claim that absent property owners who don't live full time in their units do not support the economy, well, that's hardly an informed statement. The majority of these types of buyers purchase property at the higher end of the spectrum and employ estate management firms who provide jobs to maids, gardeners, drivers, pool cleaners, maintenance staff and a host of other services. They purchase

furniture and interior decoration from local shops. For those employees who are locals, the salaries pay for schooling and essential goods. All of that money flows back into the local economy. All of these local companies pay VAT as well as municipal and government taxes, which again comes back into the national and local revenue stream.


The industry's contribution on a socio-economic basis is well documented. Laguna Phuket, which has a large core property business, was one of the first businesses to offer air conditioned bus transportation for staff, as opposed to them being herded like livestock in open trucks as hotels had done for a number of years. Laguna Phuket's daycare center for staff, commitment to education and support of local charities amount to one of the largest outlays made by any company on the island.

The Phuket International Women's Club annual events provide scholarships to needy students, among other things. This has been embraced by marquee property firms on an ongoing basis. Look also at the recent "Summer in Phuket" clean up campaign, which brought thousands of people out looking to improve the island's fragile environment. This was instigated by Indigo Real Estate, who are also "property consultants".

Furthermore, the writer's claim that most overseas buyers purchase units offshore, with the money never reaching Thailand, simply does not add up. Construction costs here are some of the highest in the region. Any developer has to pay a local contractor, who again employs many workers on site in the various required trades.

The largest part of a project cost is the actual construction. That money has to come to Thailand in order to get the villas and condos built. These local workers buy food and clothes and support their children's education as a result. All the money flows back into the local economy.

On top of that, add the marketing and legal costs for firms who support a development and employ a significant number of

Thai staff.

A local community is something we all want and strive for. Phuket has attracted investment and full-time residents with its international schools, hospitality, marinas, golf courses, shopping and business opportunities. Certainly a great deal of these see demand generation from real estate development and growth in the property sector. There is an increasing segment of people who first purchased homes in Phuket as holiday homes or investment, and in time, plan to move and live here full time.

There will always be people who view the past more favorably than the present, forever asking "why can't things be how they used to be?" Imagine seeing Thai people live in abject poverty with few career or educational opportunities or the ability to set up their own businesses. While it might be charming for some to see people living in bamboo huts, ploughing fields with

water buffalo and entrusting their food intake to the mercy of the weather, it's questionable in terms of simple human dignity.

All in all, I'd have to say I'm proud to be a good member of the community here and certainly have no plans to go anywhere soon.

There is no question that, as in any business model, there has to be balance and the right fundamentals for investors.

As we have always advised here, investors must make long-term and informed decisions. I believe that's what the *Gazette* and other publications are aiming to facilitate by providing informative commentary and relevant news.

Furthermore, printing comments such as the one we've discussed today shows an enlightened approach. Feedback from readers helps to make us aware of issues we weren't aware of, and lively debate is certainly always interesting.



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
