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Hose down on Soi Bangla

PATONG: Public health workers in full anti-contamination gear sprayed and fumigated Soi Bangla on June 14 in a bid to prevent the spread of contagious diseases such as swine flu and chikungunya.

The high-profile initiative followed a single confirmed case of swine flu infection by a staff member at a Patong disco the week before.

Tourists and local businessmen alike were curious about the anti-disease campaign, which involved a number of health officers dressed in Tyvek suits and respirators fumigating sewers with pesticides and spraying an antibacterial solution onto surfaces inside entertainment venues and on the streets.

Leading the campaign was Phuket Vice-Governor Worapoj Ratthasima.

Vice-Governor Worapoj said the "big clean-up" follows a visit to Patong by a tourist who developed flu symptoms and was later diagnosed with infection by the A(H1N1) virus after returning home to his native Hong Kong on June 8.

Since then, about 90 people in five Patong venues have been tested for the A(H1N1) virus that causes swine flu. Of these, one tested positive. She was undergoing a seven-day quarantine and her condition was improving, Vice Governor Worapoj said.

"Soi Bangla is the first cleanup area. We plan to conduct more clean-ups at other public places around the island," he added.

Sompetch Moosophon, president of the Patong Entertainment Business Association, told the Gazette that tourists had a good and realistic understanding of the threat posed by swine flu. "There is no panic," he added.

Bt50,000 reward for clues in Aussie assault case

PHUKET CITY: It has taken a phone call from the Australian diplomatic mission, but Phuket Police are now renewing efforts to catch the man responsible for a horrendous machete attack on a young Australian man several months ago.

In early February this year, 20-year-old Jamie Shackleton was left with facial injuries requiring 48 stitches in Bangkok Hospital after being slashed with a

The attack came during a botched robbery attempt on Naka Road in Tambon Wichit.

Almost five months later, the police have yet to arrest any suspects.

Now, following a phone call from the Australian Embassy to the Royal Thai Police Regional Headquarters in Surat Thani, police are offering a Bt50,000 re-



of the man responsible for the brutal assault.

ward for any information that helps to catch the slasher.

On June 13, Regional Commissioner Santarn Chayanon came to Phuket to personally chair a meeting of local police

about the case.

The meeting was attended by Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pigad Thantipong and investigating officers from all eight police districts in the province.

'We're offering a special Bt50,000 reward for information about this case. We'll get the suspects as soon as possible," Lt Gen Santarn said.

The sheer brutality of the attack may help explain the Australian mission's interest.

At around 8pm on February 1, Mr Shackleton was returning home by motorbike from the Phuket Old Town Festival with Thai friend Weerapan Klinpon, 24, when two men on another bike forced the pair to stop.

"The guy on the back got off and pulled a big samurai knife out from under his T-shirt. Then he came up to my friend and

started to choke him," Mr Shackleton said.

The man ordered the pair in Thai to give him all their money. When Mr Shackleton reached into one of his pockets, the assailant slashed him in the face probably believing the young Australian was reaching for a weapon.

Mr Shackleton's mouth was sliced open several inches from the corner of his left lip up through his cheek, exposing the inside of his mouth. He also lost four teeth.

In a state of shock he ran to a nearby laborers' camp and approached a man smoking outside, saying "help me, help me" in Thai.

"When the worker saw me he was really shocked. I thought it was just a really small cut," he


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autopsies inconclusive

PHI PHI: The Royal Thai Police Institute of Forensic Medicine in Bangkok has concluded its examination of tissue samples takenfrom two young women who died mysteriously on Koh Phi Phi early last month.

The evidence is inconclusive.

Deputy chief of Krabi Public Health Office Dr Buncha Kahkhong said that the autopsies failed to turn up anything that could indicate what caused the deaths of American Jill St Onge and Norwegian Julie Bergheim.

There were no toxic chemicals found in the blood, bodily fluids and other tissues of the women, Dr Buncha said.

The two young women died within hours of each other in Phi Phi Island Hospital after staying in adjacent rooms in the island's Laleena Guesthouse.

Dr Buncha said the tests ruled out food poisoning, contradicting a statement made by Krabi Provincial Police Commander Pasin Nokasul on May 25.

"I can say it definitely wasn't food poisoning," Dr Buncha said. "From the autopsy and blood tests and the questioning of witnesses, it's been established that the women ate different food prior to their deaths.'

Dr Buncha added that if this were a case of food poisoning, more people would likely have fallen ill, too.

The investigation would now need to focus on environmental factors, Dr Buncha said. However, examination of both the air-conditioning unit and the water supply at Laleena Guesthouse had not revealed anything out of the ordinary, he added.

"The investigation will also focus on the personal histories of the women," Dr Buncha said. "Although the autopsies have been inconclusive, we have all the information recorded now and it will be useful going forward."

'This is looking like some freak accident. With cases like this, sometimes you never find the cause. But we're very worried about it because foreign tourists died. Krabi Public Health Office will cooperate with any teams from the US and Norway who want to come and investigate. We'll share all our information with them. It is in our interests to co-operate, because if we find the cause of the deaths we can make sure it never happens again," Dr Buncha added.





Phi Phi tourist deaths: Landfill causing a big stink

PHUKET: Fed up with the stench emanating from a nearby landfill site, residents of Saphan Hin have put up banners and signs and are formally complaining to the city government about the foul odor.

Phuket City Municipality Chief Administration Officer Thawatchai Tongmang has assured residents that the city is well aware of the problem and is working hard to resolve it.

The reason for the stench is that the nearby landfill is being expanded to increase its capacity to accept more waste.

Work has left some of the garbage exposed and rainfall has exacerbated the problem, creating a considerable stench.

"The Municipality is not taking this problem lightly. We are working on solutions including the use of industrial deodorants that should reduce the stench to a more moderate level," Mr Thawatchai said.

The landfill must be expanded to accommodate more waste because the nearby waste incinerator has been out of service for about one month for

maintenance and repairs.

The facility has a design capacity of 250 tons per day, while the island produces about 500 tons per day, all of which must be sent to the incineration plant.

Phuket City Mayor Somjai Suwansupana apologized for the problem and asked residents for patience.

As a long-term solution, the city is working with a private firm to build a second incineration

plant at Saphan Hin in the same area that will be capable of burning up to 600 tons daily. The plant is scheduled to open in October, 2010, she said.

It will be a long wait for nearby residents, however.

A resident of the nearby Saphan Hin villa residential estate located right next to the landfill described the smell as "similar to rotten pineapples in water".

Mr Weerapan had meanwhile managed to make his own escape from the attackers and approached his friend. "I told him I didn't need to go to the hospital," Mr Shackleton said. "But then of course, I did," he added quietly.

He was rushed to Vachira Hospital. "They told me I would have to wait seven hours to get an operation on my face. I really didn't want to lose that much blood," he said.

Mr Shackleton was taken down Yaowarat Road to Bangkok Hospital Phuket where he received 48 stitches in a four-hour operation. Nearly five months after the attack the wound has healed well, though Mr Shackleton has been left with a scar on his face several inches long.

He has also been stung by a bill for Bt170,000 from Bangkok Hospital. With no health insurance, Mr Shackleton had to borrow money from a friend to pay the fees.

"I've been told the Thai government has funds available to help tourists who have accidents," Mr Shackleton said. "I'm hoping they will help me out," he added.

Former Phuket Governor Preecha Ruangjan had seemed sympathetic to his case, but was transferred before he was able to do anything to help, Mr Shackleton said.

He is now hoping for the same kind of assistance from Wichai Phraisa-ngop, the current incumbent.

During the June 13 meeting at Phuket City Police Station police showed a sketch of the slasher. He has short brown hair, a lot of stubble, pimples and a prominent nose. He is believed to be 28-30 years old, well built, and around 180cm tall. He speaks Thai with a Southern accent.

No such sketch exists of his

accomplice, who was wearing a motorcycle helmet at the time of the attack.

Police are appealing for anyone who recognizes the man in the sketch to come forward – and claim their prize.

Meanwhile, Mr Shackleton is planning to leave Thailand. "I've been here for almost a year and a half now. I came here to relax," Mr Shackleton said.

Without relaxing as much as he had perhaps hoped, he plans to return to Australia permanently next month.



Australian expat killed on bike

WICHIT: A young Australian man died just before dawn on June 13 when his motorcycle crashed at high speed on Chao Fa West Road.

Inspector Yongyuth Kongmarai of Phuket City Police identified the deceased as 20-year-old Kain Bonow, an Australian national and long-time resident of Phuket.

Police and rescue workers from the nearby Phuket Ruamjai Kupai Foundation responded to an emergency call reporting the accident at 5:30am.

The crash happened outside the Sala Bua Mansion apartments, not far from the Wang Talang jewelry shop on Chao Fa West Road southbound.

From an examination of the crash scene, it appeared that Mr Bonow was riding his motorcycle at very high speed and was unable to negotiate a curve.

"I don't think Mr Bonow had drunk any alcohol, but he was riding very fast at the time of the crash. Witnesses reported hearing a loud backfire from the tailpipe followed by the sound of the motorbike crashing," said Lt Col Yongyuth.

Based on the fact that the vehicle slid at least 60 meters after the initial impact, Lt Col Yongyuth estimated that Mr Bonow was riding at about 120 kilometers per hour at the time.

It was not raining and police did not find a motorcycle helmet at the scene, he said.

The cause of death appeared not to have been head trauma, but the force of impact of the motorbike's steering column on Mr Bonow's abdomen. Mr Bonow suffered a compound fracture to his hip bone and massive trauma to his internal organs.

Kain's mother, Kim Bonow, later identified her son's body at Vachira Phuket Hospital and was inconsolable from the loss, Lt Col Yongyuth said.

New medical science center opens in Phuket

SRISOONTHORN: The Public Health Ministry commissioned a new front in the war against infectious diseases on June 11 with the opening of the new Phuket Medical Science Center.

Public Health Minister Witthaya Kaewparadai presided over the opening ceremony, which was attended by more than 200 public health volunteers as well as Phuket MPs Tossaporn Thepabutr and Rewat Areerob.

The new center is located in a one-story building on Bangjo Road in Tambon Srisoonthorn, Thalang District. It will be dedicated to preventing the spread of Legionnaires' disease, chikungunya, food poisoning and a host of other preventable medical con-

Mr Witthaya said Phuket is an important tourist destination in Thailand, generating an income of more than 72.5 billion baht each

Despite this, the island is still home to infectious diseases that impact upon the tourism industry.

Such diseases include Legionnaires' disease, which can be caused by bacteria breeding in air conditioning systems, the minister said.

"We have reports that within the last year seven European tourists were infected with Legionnaires' disease while on vacation in Phuket," he said.

One of the Phuket Medical Science Center's responsibilities will be to inspect establishments such as hotels, hospitals and shopping centers to ensure their rooms are free from Legionella bacteria. The center will issue certificates to establishments that reach the required safety standards.

The new center will be dedicated to preventing the spread of

Legionnaires' disease, chikungunya and food poisoning, among others.

Thus far, two establishments in Phuket - Vachira Phuket Hospital and Katathani Phuket Beach Resort - have been issued Public Health Ministry certificates declaring them free of Legionella bacteria, he said.

The Phuket Medical Science Center will also focus on checking the food production systems in hotels according to Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) food safety standards, he added.

"At this time, 22 hotels in Phuket have received GMP certificates. We also took food samples from 22 convenience stores out of the 202 in Phuket. We found that 68 food samples out of 147 failed to comply with GMP standards," he said.

Food sample testing would reduce the risk of poor quality food being served in Phuket and lead to improved health for both residents and tourists, he added.

"The work of the Phuket Medical Science Center will boost tourism in Phuket by reassuring tourists they're visiting a safe place," he predicted.

The minister said that chikungunya fever had spread far and wide across Southern Thailand. More than 20,000 cases have been reported, though many more people will have been infected without seeking medical attention, he said.

"Chikungunya fever doesn't kill people, but the disease will cost the country a lot of money in drug spending," he said.

The Ministry of Public Health has set up a committee to fight the disease. Its priority is a campaign to help people avoid being bitten by the Aedes mosquito that carries the chikungunya virus as well as the virus that causes dengue fever.

"Public health volunteers are the main weapon in the fight to increase public awareness and help eliminate potential mosquito breeding areas," he said.

Dog chases tail at Provincial Hall

PHUKET CITY: Dog bites man down. isn't news, as the old journalistic adage has it. But what about dog bites monkey?

Civil servants were greeted with just such a scene one morning last week, when a pig-tailed macaque from Toh Sae Hill wandered onto the grounds of Phuket Provincial Hall.

A local dog took offense at the macaque's presence and gave chase. When it caught the monkey, the brutal canine bit the macaque's tail off.

The attack happened just as civil servants were arriving at work. One concerned witness called Phuket Provincial Livestock Office (PPLO) for help.

Shortly afterwards livestock office vet Dr Jirayu Niran Wiroj arrived to treat the wou-nded pri-

Terrified, the stricken animal climbed atop the Phuket Provincial Hall roof and refused to come down.

Only after it was knocked out with a tranquilizer dart were officers able to get the animal

Dr Jirayu cleaned and treated the now tail-less monkey's wound before bandaging it

He called Arwach Nitikul of Khao Pra Taew Wildlife Conservation Center to take the animal for further care before releasing it into the wild.

This is certainly not the first time a pig-tailed macaque has found itself in Phuket Provincial Hall. Only two weeks ago, another cheeky monkey made off from a stunned food vendor's stall with a belly full of cucumbers.

'The problem of wild animals getting lost in the city is increasing," Dr Jirayu said.

"Imbalanced ecosystems and human encroachment into the jungle mean the animals are losing their natural habitats and are coming into the city to find food," he said.


Dr Jirayu appealed to the public to refrain from damaging natural ecosystems by hunting or hurting wild animals.

British Navy ports in Phuket

ne of the largest and most revered ships in the British Royal Navy, the *HMS Bulwark* docked at Phuket's deep sea port on Wednesday morning flanked by the *USS Mitscher*, an Arleigh Burke class destroyer.

The 22,000-ton *HMS Bulwark* – made famous for transporting 1,300 British escapees

from Israeli air- strikes in Beruit in 2006 – has been operating in Southeast Asia for the past six weeks. The stopover gave the ship's crew of 540 men and women a chance to disembark for some well-earned R&R on the island until June 22.

The ship is spearheading the TAURUS 09 task force that includes 11 ships and one nuclear

submarine that sailed from Davenport, UK in February.

Since then, *HMS Bulwark* has negotiated the hostile waters of the coast of Somalia, providing protection for civilian vessels as well as executing training operations in the jungles of Brunei with the 40 Commando Royal Marines on board.

Stored below deck in the





ship's well dock is an assortment of amphibious military hardware used to transport an Embarked Military Force (EMF). However, one of the most impressive onboard defense systems is the "Dutch Maid Goalkeeper" Close In Weapon System (CIWS). The auto cannon is equipped with a radar to automatically select and prioritize the most threatening targets, such as incoming missiles, and fires 3,000 20mm rounds a minute to destroy them.

Speaking from the bridge, Captain Wayne Keble said the TAURAS 09 task force relied on co-operation between partners and allies from NATO countries. The task force also remains on alert for anti-piracy, humanitarian and disaster relief missions.

Capt Keble added that

Bangladeshi, Brunei, Indian, New Zealand, Saudi and US forces had been involved in training operations with *HMS Bulwark* prior to her arrival in Phuket.

Accustomed to life at sea, Captian Keble said that he was personally looking forward to some sailing on his down time here in Phuket but added that many of the crew intended to play cricket, rugby and even try bungee jumping while in Phuket.

Captain Keble and TAU-RUS 09 Commodore Phil Waterhouse had a busy first day on Phuket with visits to the Governor's office, a meeting with Royal Thai Navy chiefs and then a cocktail party for local dignitaries and Phuket's elite on the main deck of *HMS Bulwark* that night.

Thailand to sign dugong MoU

fter two years of lobbying by the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC), the government has finally agreed to sign an international memorandum of understanding (MoU) aimed at protecting the endangered dugong population in Thai waters, the Gazette has learned.

Kanjana Adulyanukosol of the PMBC's Endangered Species Unit said the government is now ready to sign the memorandum, introduced by eight member states of the Convention on Migratory Species (CMS) treaty at a meeting in Abu Dhabi in October, 2007.

At a CMS meeting held in Bali in September last year, representatives of three more nations with dugong populations (Comoros, Kenya and the Philippines) signed the agreement, bringing the number of signatories to 11 – but Thailand was not among them.

The dugong's current ran-

of 37 nations.

"I am happy to say that the government has agreed to sign the dugong MoU. We have tried very hard for over two years to get them to sign, but the political situation has been unstable for the past two or three years," she said.

"After we sign the MoU we will take a more regional and global approach to protecting the dugong and the habitat that sustains them," said Miss Kanjana.

Last year the PMBC published a Thai language book entitled Seagrass and Dugong Action Plan in Thailand, she explained.

Seagrass beds, the staple food of the dugong diet, have been negatively affected by coastal development projects in the Andaman Coast region that release accumulations of sediment onto the seabed. This is the most serious long-term threat to the dugong, she said.

Dugong also face more imge includes the territorial waters mediate threats in the form of

moving speedboats and abandoned fish netting, in which they can become entangled and

Although happy with the agreement to sign the MoU, Miss Kanjana reiterated that it is a nonbinding agreement.

She also expects a lack of budget due to the poor economy to limit the number of activities the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMCR) can organize to get all the many relevant agencies on board.

"Next year will probably be the worst in terms of financial support from the government,"

Cabinet unanimously agreed to sign the MoU during a meeting on May 19 this year, though it is still unclear when the document will actually be signed.

The MoU could be signed by Natural Resources and Environment Minister Suwit Khunkitti or one of his deputies at the next CMS meeting, the date of which has not yet been scheduled.

Alternatively, it could be signed earlier through Thailand's CMS secretary in Bangkok.


"I don't know exactly when

PM urges new tactics in South

DEEP SOUTH: Amidst a shift in tactics by insurgents and the changing nature of their violence, Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva on June 13 pointed to a need for the authorities to change policies in tackling problems in the Deep South.

The PM said he would also see to it that funding approved for the Deep South reached those it was intended for.

New legislation is being drafted to create a body that would help administer the three southernmost provinces, he said.

People must understand that the insurgents always sought new tactics and the violence was not due to the failure of existing government policies, PM Abhisit said.

Asked if the killing of a monk while Deputy Prime Minister Suthep Thaugsuban was visiting was "audacious" or not, the PM said insurgents often carried out such attacks when senior figures visited the area.

The disbursement of Bt18 billion in development will be closely monitored, Abhisit vowed.

Emphasis will be placed on

public participation and making sure as much money as possible reaches local people.

PM Abhisit defended the Internal Security Operation Command (Isoc), which receives part of the funding, by saying it was not purely military but included other government agencies as well.

He urged the public not to be duped by the insurgents into hating the government and said the government had no reason to want to see the problem worsen and would bring those responsible

It had been alleged that state security forces were behind the attack on a mosque in Yala on Monday.

Vowing to solve the problem within three years, Mr Suthep urged the public to be as patient as they had been with the redshirt protesters.

On a visit to Narathiwat, Suthep also dismissed the allegation that the state was behind Monday's mosque attack and he said the truth would eventually emerge.

Accompanied by Defence Minister Prawit Wongsuwan and Army chief General Anupong Paochinda, Mr Suthep visited Narathiwat's al-Furgan mosque, in which six gunmen fired on worshippers on June 8, killing 10 and injuring 12.

He later visited a hospital where he met people wounded in the attack. The deputy PM in charge of security affairs was also briefed about the ongoing violence in the region during a meeting with officials of Isoc.

Mr Suthep told journalists prior to his departure that the government was trying to apprehend the mosque attackers so that legal action could be taken against them.

State officials were not behind the attack and the government would use peaceful means along with development programs to resolve the violence in the South and raise the standard of living of local people, he

The number of security personnel patrolling the region could be increased, he added.

Senior policeman denies involvement in murders

police officer has denied involvement in the murder of a lawyer and his passenger who were shot dead in their car in Muang District on June 12.

A suspect in an earlier murder case who was travelling in the car but survived the attack identified Lt Col Thanit Saencharoen. head of the Songkhla Provincial Police Drug Suppression Division, as one of the gunmen.

On June 13, Lt Col Thanit reported to headquarters where he denied any involvement in the killing of 43-year-old Phumidet Pathumas and Safina Uleeju, 23.

Col Thanit presented CCTV footage and witnesses which he said proved he could not have been at the crime scene.

The shooting happened as Mr Phumidet was driving his client Traithep "Odd Member" Mugen back from reporting to Songkhla Provincial Court in

SONGKHLA: A high-ranking Nathawee District, as required under the conditions of Mr Traithep's release on bail on murder charges.

Mr Traithep is the owner of the Member Pub in the border town of Daan Nok ("Outer Limits") in Sadao District. He is a defendant in the murder of a police drug suppression officer who was shot dead in a pub in Daan Nok in April this year (see Gazette issue of May 2).

As they were driving through Tambon Koh Taow, a pickup truck pulled alongside and a passenger opened fire with an M-16 assault rifle.

Mr Phumidet and Miss Safina, who was also in the car, died at the scene.

Songkhla Provincial Police Commander Wirun Iamphaichit said police are not yet certain if Mr Traithep was the intended target.

"Magic cicadas" poison villagers

ROI-ET: A large numbers of villagers in Isarn were hospitalized last week after eating cicada nymphs in the belief that the larvae possessed magical powers.

Villagers reported dizziness and violent attacks of vomiting and diarrhea shortly after eating the grubs. Incidents were reported in Roi-Et, Kalasin and Maha Sarakham provinces.

The president of Si Kaeo Tambon Administration Organization (TAO) in Muang District, Roi-Et told reporters that a TAO member and an assistant village chief had been hospitalized after eating the grubs.

Bunhom Yawarak, a 40year-old member of Si Kaeo TAO, told reporters from his sick bed that he had eaten a number of raw cicada larvae he and fellow villagers had dug up from woods in the area.

Villagers have long believed the larvae bring good luck and anyone possessing them will find success in their business. With this in mind, he and his friends decided to take it one step further and eat the critters, thinking they would have a tonic effect.

It didn't work out as planned. About three hours after eating the bugs, Mr Bunhom began to feel faint and nauseous. He was then violently ill. His wife took him to Roi-Et Hospital, where he stayed until his symptoms subsided.

Mana Khanthirat, Assistant Chief of Village 4, reported similar symptoms to Mr Bunhom and was also taken to Roi Et Hospital.

Dr Phasakon Chaiset of Roi-Et Provincial Public Health Office said some villagers believe the larvae have spiritual powers and can increase virility if eaten.


People should be very careful before eating the nymphs as they stay underground for years and can absorb toxic chemicals from the soil, he said.

It's better if people don't eat them at all, he added.

CHIANG MAI: The baby panda everyone loves to love will come under direct public display at the Chiang Mai Zoo between July 4 and July 6.

The birth of the female cub has fascinated the whole nation. but thus far the public has seen her only in newspapers, TV or on computer screens.

Even visitors to the zoo have to watch the doll-like creature from a screen that relays her movements via a closed-circuit

"We are now planning to let visitors see the cub directly," said Kannikar Nimtrakul, veterinarian in charge of the panda.

The first direct public display of the cub would take place on July 4, she revealed.

Tickets to view the panda were snapped up quickly and there is already a waiting list into

"We will arrange two rounds of viewing each day from July 4 to July 6," Ms Kannikar said, adding that the cub would be inside a glass cage during the display.

Born on May 27, by June 12 she weighed 630 grams and was about 24 centimeters long.

It is healthy and gaining weight quickly, the veterinarian said.

The cub was born to Chuang Chuang and Lin Hui. Also living at the Chiang Mai Zoo,

the giant pandas are on loan from

Meanwhile, panda project chief Prasertsak Boontrakulpoontawee and Zoological Park Organization director Sophon Damnui joined a recent delegation headed by Natural Resources and Environment Minister Suwit Khunkitti on a trip to China.

The delegation was to meet with a Chinese minister to discuss the artificial insemination that led to the birth and on a proposal to establish a permanent panda research centre in Thailand.

If the proposal wins Chinese approval the baby panda as well as its parents would be able to stay in Thailand longer.

According to a agreement with China, the baby panda must head to China within two years of its birth. Coming to Thailand in 2003, Chuang Chuang and Lin Hui are slated to stay in Thailand for 10 years only.

Mr Prasertsak said thousands of names had been submitted to the cub-naming contest ahead of the deadline for suggestions on June 12. They would be narrowed down to four, then the public can vote for their favorite name using specially made postcards, with some of the proceeds going to the Panda Fund. The winning name will be announced on August 12, he said.

NAKHON PATHOM: A politician was punched in the face by an angry member of the public last week. The victim, 52-yearold Samrit Kaowkret, was left with a black eye and busted lip.

Unsatisfied with this response, 49-year-old Somphong Reunamnatsap punched him twice in the face, Mr Samrit told police.

Mr Somphong later admitted punching Mr Samrit for seeming uninterested in the villagers' plight.

TRANG: Police have charged a People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) guard with the rape of a 71-year-old man.

The shocking announcement was made on June 11 by Thian Banthip, deputy superintendent of the Muang District Police in nearby Trang province.

Lt Col Thian identified the alleged rapist as 44-year-old Phuan Thajeen, a member of the PAD's elite guard, the "Srivichai Warriors".

The group played a key role in defending PAD encampments at Government House and Suvarna-bhumi Airport last year after those locations were seized by yellow-shirted PAD demonstrators.

The arrest followed an allegation made by the alleged victim, a 71-year-old man identified only as "Mr Duang" (not his real name).

The senior filed a complaint with police alleging that Mr Phuan raped him following a drinking session at Mr Phuan's home in Tambon Na Yong Tai.

Following his arrest, Mr Phuan admitted that he had sex with Mr Duang, but claimed it was consensual.

Mr Phuan said that as he and Mr Duang were drinking, they began to feel horny and performed oral sex on each other.

After the alleged foreplay, Mr Duang allowed Mr Phuan to perform penetrative sex on him. There was no force involved and the act was consensual, Mr Phuan insisted.

However, Mr Duang claimed that Mr Phuan used force which he, being an old man and not a Srivichai Warrior, was unable to resist.

Mr Phuan has been formally charged with rape.

Inspector Amonrat Suthket, lead officer on the case, said Mr Duang was alleged to be a serial rapist who preyed on male senior citizens in the area.

His latest victim was the first who dared lodge a police complaint against him, police said.

Villagers in the area also alleged that Mr Phuan was fond of having sex with male senior

Mr Duang did not reveal why he went to drink at Mr Phuan's house, given Mr Phuan's reputation.

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Survivors with beaming smiles










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rom the steamy island jungles of Borneo, to the ancient temples and landmarks of China, the Survivor reality TV series has repeatedly tested the skill, intelligence and endurance of its competitors in some of the most exotic and remote destinations on earth.

On June 6, Phuket joined a long list of challenging locations, when nearby Koh Lon hosted its very own "Survivor Phuket" for a group of never-say-die competitors with beaming smiles and rapier like instincts.

The challenges were tough, but then again they had to be, because tackling them head on were two tribes the likes of which have never been seen before: the fearsome Lions and the crafty Monkeys made up of 16 children from the Phuket Has Been Good to Us Foundation.

Given just a few items, both tribes showed tremendous ingenuity and intelligence to build their shelters in just a matter of minutes. The remarkable problem solving aptitude of all 16 kids was evident throughout the entire afternoon as they tackled a total of five tasks - something that was not lost on Stuart, a veteran of corporate team building days.

"We do these activities with corporate groups from big companies; we've had Nokia, Nike, Barclays and indeed all the big banks. The adults don't figure these activities out as quickly as these kids who don't even have English as their first language. They just got on with it, working fantastically well together and were just very, very intelligent," he said.

All the kids that were fortunate enough to be given a chance to go on the trip embraced the opportunity and were polite, enthusiastic and most importantly had permanent smiles etched on their faces throughout the day, much to the delight of Tina Hall, the Phuket Has Been Good to Us Foundation director of operations.

"The kids light up. When you see the children around school they have completely different faces to the huge smiles that you can see today," she said.

The only negative part of the day for Tina was having to disappoint all the other children who had to remain behind at the

"We turned up the school this morning and we had a list with 16 names. The children just ran over as they obviously saw that something was going on and they were all clamoring to see if their name was on the list. But the looks on their faces when their names weren't there was heartbreaking," Tina revealed.

After the final challenge on Koh Lon, the two tribes headed back to Ao Yon where they were rewarded with a bag of goodies to take with them as a memento of a great day and according to Stuart, the first of many.

"I'd like to do a lot more with the foundation. I've already spoken to them about doing something with more of the kids because they have about 100 residential kids at the

The plan is to do a similar event on Kamala Beach – like a mini Olympics half day event – and stay involved with the foundation and Kamala school," he added.

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Tai Chi Timeout

eighth in the series of Tai Chi Timeouts. Each timeout takes you through a single, easy-to-follow Tai Chi-Chi Gung exercise.

One of the aims of Tai Chi is to develop the intrinsic energy (Chi) within the body through slow, rhythmical breathing exercises known as Chi Gung. The ancient martial art exercises naturally relieve tension from stress and aches and pains from stiff limbs.

Perform them whenever you wish to unwind and loosen up. They are particularly beneficial in the early morning when the Chi is especially clean and light, relaxing and energizing the mind and body

Telcome to the for the start of a new day.

In this particular exercise we use our imagination to scoop water from the sea as we look up at the sky. The forward bend strengthens the legs, while opening the arms and looking at the sky opens and relaxes the shoulders and expands the

To begin the exercise, stand with your feet shoulder-width apart, toes pointing forward, your heels firmly planted on the ground and your back straight. Release the tension in your neck and shoulders by slowly rolling your head first to the left, then to the right. Place your hands over your solar plexus (Tan Tien) and with a slow even breath, calm and center yourself.

Shift your weight forward

onto your right leg, bend your body forward and cross your hands in front of the right knee. Begin to inhale.


Continue to inhale as you straighten your body until you bend backwards, your hands raised over your head and your eyes looking at the sky. Begin to exhale as you bend forward once more, slowly bringing your hands down until they cross over the knee again. Repeat this sequence for five minutes with the right leg forward and then for five minutes with the left leg

To complete the exercise, step back with your feet together

Step 2: To begin the exercise shift your weight forward onto your right leg until your knee is directly over your

Lean forward until your hands cross over your right knee, then begin to inhale as you slowly straighten up and slowly raise the hands towards your head.





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Step 3: Continue to inhale while you slowly raise your arms overhead.



Step 4: Bring your hands completely over your head while you bend backward, looking up at the sky.




Step 5: Begin to exhale as you slowly lean forward and bring your hands down alongside your body.



Step 6: Continue to exhale as you slowly shift your weight onto your right leg again, bringing your hands down by your knee.



Step 7: Bring your hands all the way down until they cross over your right knee. Repeat the exercise for five minutes with the right leg forward. Change legs putting the left leg forward and repeat the exercise again for five minutes.



Step 8: To complete the exercise, slowly bring the Chi down to your *Tan Tien* and gather the Chi within.

Eric Smulders

Eric Smulders has brought some of the world's most renowned and collectible art to Phuket for the benefit of his high-net-worth clients who value his taste in contemporary art. He refers to his Soul of Asia gallery as 'almost a museum' due to the high value of its offerings.

Eric grew up in a family in Holland that collected Dutch Old Masters paintings for many generations.

"Holland has an incredible history of enterprising artists in the 17th century. There were at least 10,000 known Dutch painters during that time, who are now referred to as the Old Masters, in addition to the Flemish painters who were then part of the Netherlands."

His early exposure to classical art stayed with him even though he chose to study economics at the Carnegie Institute of Technology where he was awarded a Masters Degree. He went on to enroll in the Senior Management Program at Harvard University.

Eric decided to live and work in Asia and spent ten years as the Managing Director of the largest foreign trading company in Japan. He worked with products from textiles to machinery. After a two-year stint as Managing Director of the upscale Cartier brand in the Far East, he

decided to join a small food trading company in Hong Kong, providing supplies to hotels in mainland China.

"I joined up with Freezeland Foods, as after working for big corporations for 20 years I wanted to make my own footprint in life. I traveled through China and sold our food products to hotels around the country. Eventually, we were handling 300 forty-foot containers every month."

Eric's love of art then resurfaced and he opened his first gallery in Hong Kong which specialized in the Dutch Old Masters. Once he retired from his own business in 2000, he began to visit Phuket.

"I was immediately attracted to the beauty of the island and all the many benefits of living here, such as all the international restaurants and shopping, the opportunities for year around yachting, the wonderful medical care and the pleasure of living in an international community. I think Phuket is the only place to live in Asia."

During one of his early visits to Phuket, he was sailing off Kamala Bay when he spotted an attractive piece of land which he was eventually able to buy. He built his contemporary tropical estate to allow 270 degree views of the Andaman Sea.

"I decided to open Soul of

Asia in Phuket City as I discovered two old Sino-Portuguese buildings that were irresistible. With four meter ceilings, they were the perfect space for my collection of big paintings."

He opened his first Soul of Asia gallery in 2003, offering Asian antiques and furniture, paintings by Vietnamese and Chinese painters, costume jewelry, antique Chinese rugs, and an impressive selection of highly valued Western art by Salvador Dali, Picasso and Andy Warhol.


Of particular interest is his impressive collection of paintings by contemporary Chinese artists.

"Chinese painters have extensive training and are bursting with creativity. I visit the art fairs in China and the galleries in Shanghai and Beijing to find emerging new talent whose work excels at attention to detail and painting skills no longer generally taught in the West."

Eric has expanded Soul of Asia and now there are three galleries, including a recently opened boutique gallery at the fashionable Marriot Resort at Mai Khao Beach.

"I'm adapting my sales strategy to fit the new global economy. For the top pieces, the market is still strong, but the middle income market has dropped considerably. I'm finding buyers to be more discriminating. I think it will take a long time for the art market to return to the enthusiastic spending days before the onset of the current economic downturn."

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Turkish delight

CHEAP CATS

f you've ever dreamed of chowing down on *Izmir kofte* with Jim Morrison, now's your chance – at Phuket Town's Roxy Bar. But what's *Izmir kofte*, I hear you ask? Didn't the Doors' hallowed crooner-philosopher "break on through" forty years ago, you say? And just what and where is Roxy Bar, you wonder? Questions, questions. All will be answered: brace yourself.

First things first. Tucked away on Phang Nga Road just off Soi Pradit, Roxy is a family business owned by brothers Nuno and Josh Isitemiz, all the way from Istanbul, Turkey. You'll know it by the sparkly lights at the doorway – not to mention the loud rock music that often emanates from within. Nuno, fiancée Mimi and barmaid Wan run the place with a slogan in mind: "feel at home". Home's just what it's become for a growing band of Phuket exiles who are as much part of the furniture as the pool table. Still, this is no clique. "When you're strange, no one remembers your name," sang Morrison. long been conspicuous by its absence. Roxy's customers agreed. "Everybody who came here and

And Morrison, how's he fit into all this? Is he alive and well and chugging Chang in a Phuket rock bar? Not exactly, but he's there in spirit. Jim's painted visage gazes haughtily over the pool table – rarely out of use, not least on Friday night, "killer" night (what's killer? No time to explain. Turn up on Friday night and find out). Jules and Vincent from *Pulp Fiction* occupy another wall, brandishing frothing pints rather than guns (it's a peaceful establishment).

Other notable Roxy Bar entertainments include live sport, darts and, new this month, steaming-hot Nintendo Wii action on the big screen.

Oh yes, and Wednesday night's the ever-popular quiz night, led by interrogator-in-chief Eric Haeg.

But isn't this a food column? What's the beef? Well, at Roxy Bar the beef is generally minced, spiced and rolled into meatballs. At least it is since Nuno et al introduced their brand new Turkish menu (though fear not, you can still get a burger).

It's about time Turkish food
– surely one of the world's great
cuisines – made it to Phuket. It's

long been conspicuous by its absence. Roxy's customers agreed. "Everybody who came here and found out we're Turkish said 'Turkish food is great, why don't you serve it?'," Nuno says. So mom whipped up a menu and the rest was history.

"As far as I know, we're the only people serving real Turkish food in Phuket," Nuno adds.

So what's *Izmir kofte*? Why, it's *kofte* – Turkish meatballs – from Izmir, of course. "Every city in Turkey has its own *kofte*," says Nuno. In the case of *Izmir kofte*, they're fried and then baked with potatoes and tomato sauce. They're served with rice and a side salad – complete with red onions spiced with *sumac*, a bright purple spice that lends them a distinct citrus flavor.

Most of the dishes on the Roxy Turkish menu feature meatballs in some shape or form. Spiced with cumin and *kofte bahari* — an allspice mix imported from Turkey — they're served in any number of ways. *Kadinbudu kofte (kadinbudu means "women's legs")* are fried in flour and egg and served with rice and salad. In *Adana durum* — "Turkey's answer to the hamburger" according to Nuno — they're wrapped in tortillas. Other dishes have them suspended in

spicy tomato sauce or just served plain with fries. However they're done, they're rather delicious.

There are kofte-free dishes, of course. *Dolma* (meaning "stuffed") are large red peppers stuffed with rice and minced beef and served with home-made yoghurt. Another dish calls itself karniyarik, meaning "open belly". The open bellies are those of eggplants, which are sliced open and stuffed with spiced minced beef before being baked in the oven. And another favorite, Ali Nazik kebab, is mashed eggplants mixed with fried minced beef, yoghurt, chili sauce and parsley.

For anyone used to the fare generally on offer in Phuket's bars and restaurants, it's interesting stuff. And at 100-120 baht a dish, it won't break the bank. Much like the eggplants in *karniyarik*, you'd do well to "open belly" to Roxy's rather fine line in Turkish comfort food. Even if Jim's only there in spirit.

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
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Combating climate change

The airline industry generally gets a very unfair rap for contributing to CO2 emissions that cause climate change.

Here are some of the most important measures being taken by the industry, which contributes just 2% to CO2 emissions worldwide.

Biofuel technology: Innovative airlines like Air New Zealand have already flown a Boeing 747-400 jumbo jet using a mixture of biofuel extracted from the jatropha plant which grows wild in Africa and A1 jet fuel to power one Rolls Royce RB211 engine. Other airlines are conducting similar tests. It will still be a few years before biofuels can be used commercially, but they could eventually reduce the carbon footprint of airlines by up to 80%, according to the International Air Transport Association [IATA]

Shorter routes: IATA is also urging countries to ease up on airspace restrictions. For example, China only recently agreed to let aircraft fly over its territory on flights from points in Southeast Asia to London. The shorter routes have saved many millions in fuel costs.

Offset programs: Some 30 airlines also have carbon "offset programs" that allow passengers to donate the equivalent cost of the carbon footprint associated with a particular flight to an organization dedicated to environmental sustainability.

Decommissioning: Another initiative that goes largely unnoticed is the rapid retirement of old, fuel-hungry aircraft. In cargo transportation, which contributes 2.3% to global emissions, older aircraft such as DC-10s, the B747-100 and 200 are being phased out quickly.

Improved technology: Aircraft technology over the past 40 years has improved enormously, with a 70% increase over that period and 23% increase in the last decade alone. New generation aircraft, such as the Boeing 787 Dreamliner due for introduction this year, are made of light but very strong carbon fiber materials that will generate an estimated 20% in additional fuel savings.

Industry agenda: The IATA agenda is ambitious: 25% improvement in fuel efficiency by 2020 compared to 2005; use of 10% alternative fuels by 2017 and a 50% absolute reduction in carbon emissions by 2050. Those dates sound a long way off, but given the acceleration of climate change and the very long lead in times to introduce new aviation technology, they are realistic.

Rolling out the red carpet

hat do mega-rich American daytime host Oprah Winfrey and Phuket International Airport (PIA) have in common? They are both part of the exclusive, rarefied world of the VIP business jet industry.

News that PIA is to get VIP private jet facilities is not only good news for Phuket, but it comes at the right time – even though private jet ownership still attracts its fair share of criticism.

Take Ms Winfrey, one of the the most powerful media figures in the US. She has been criticized for using a private jet to attend high profile events in the US because of the impact on the environment. Critics ask: "why not take a regular commercial flight?"

Ms Winfrey – and others like her – have been defensive of their use of private jets. Ms Winfrey has even urged college students to work hard like she has so that they, too, could one day own a private jet.

We are not sure if we will be seeing Ms Winfrey on Phuket, but you can rest assured that the growing private jet traffic into PIA will include

some very wealthy, famous luminaries – the kind who cherish their privacy.

In fact, the private jet industry itself is fighting back against such criticism. Citing its contribution to the global economy, industry players have been banding together to educate politicians and the media.

Some elements of the US media were quick to criticize CEOs of US automakers who flew in on private jets to attend congressional hearings on the multi-billion-baht bailout of their own industry.

The fact is in Europe alone the business jet industry supports around 36,000 highly skilled people and generated 8.8 billion euros in revenue in 2008. It is big

business and high quality, popular tourist and investment destinations like Phuket are showing great foresight in developing specialist VIP facilities.

The timing would ap-

pear to be about right, despite the world recession. Business jet manufacturers are starting to talk with "cautious optimism", saying that the market may have bottomed out.

In the US, industry lobbyists have been working hard to ensure politicians understand the importance of the business jet sector.

Who are the main manufacturers and what do they offer?

The biggest names are Gulfstream Aerospace (US), Dassault (France), Cessna (US), Embraer (Brazil) and Bombardier Business Aircraft of Canada, which makes the famous Learjet.

And what do these companies offer the Oprah Winfreys of the world?

One leasing company offers a range of aircraft, starting with turboprop, then up to light jet, midsized jet, heavy jet and "execuliner". Helicopters are also available.

The execuliner, probably only for filthy rich people like Oprah and Madonna, can be anything from a Boeing business jet to a mainstream B757 (up to 279 seats) or 767 (maximum 255 seats). An execuliner seats only

15-25 passengers, flying up to 7,000 miles at Mach 0.79 with bedrooms, dining rooms, theaters and private baths among other amenities.

M o s t VIP aircraft fall into the


mid-sized jet category. Th-ese include Learjet, Hawker, Falcon, Citation and Astra that seat up to eight passengers. They typically have a range of up to 2,500 miles and an average cruising speed of 460mph.

They can accommodate four golfers and their golf clubs or a family of six and luggage for a week's holiday. That range makes a non-stop flight from Beijing to Phuket quite comfortable.

The heavy jets, such as Gulfstream, Global and Challenger can fly up to 4,500 miles at Mach 0.79, offering in-flight services such as a sit down dinner, plasma TVs and couches that open to beds. The 4,500 mile range is just over the distance from Sydney to Bangkok.

All of this sounds very glamorous, but in reality VIP jets are not all champagne flutes and luxury interiors. In many companies, the corporate jet is just a flying office – with plastic coffee cups and cramped conditions.

Still, if they all want to come to Phuket and use the new facilities, bring it on.

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
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The four sides of investment funds



ll funds, aside from the investor, consist of four segments: the fund manager, the fund administrator, the custodian bank and the auditors.

The fund manager has to be an acceptable financial institution within the jurisdiction that the fund is registered, while the second party – the fund administrator – deals with paperwork related to incoming investments and repayments. Sometimes the fund manager and fund administrator are the same group, but in the majority of cases they are separate. The latest trends are towards a separation of these activities.

Many fund administrators deal with a large number of fund management groups; Custom House in Dublin, Ireland is a good



example.

Custodian banks have an important role to play as they hold the various assets and cash of their respective funds. This is an interesting alternative source of revenue for banks and there are a number of them that have a large part of their operations dedicated to this function. Well known banks in this sector include Northern Trust, State Street, Citigroup and Investec to name a few.

In the event of a custodian bank, say, Citigroup experiencing financial difficulties, the custodian area is not under threat. No creditor or any other party may seize assets, although it would be technically possible for Citigroup to sell its whole custodian operation to a company like JP Morgan Chase & Co.

Realistically, that would only be possible in theory as the government regulator would have a long, hard look at the transaction and individual fund management groups might wish to choose a new custodian.

All funds have auditors and it is their duty to ensure that ev-

erything related to the fund is carried out properly and that the accounts of all funds are completely accurate.

It has been suggested to me that auditors are often subjected to pressure, especially by large groups. This was certainly the case when Enron – a company, not a fund – had its accountants involved in destroying incriminating documents.

This was when there was a "big five" in the world of accounting. The big five ruled over the accounting empire until one of their number – Arthur Andersen – broke the 11th commandment: "Thou shalt not get caught".

Regardless that only a few individuals in California were actually involved in document shredding, Arthur Andersen worldwide was forced to disband. Many fine people had careers ruined by the actions of a few. Attitudes at the remaining "big four" changed; no longer would there be any indulgence to assist a client, regardless of size.

None of the big four are really in competition with the other members of the group. Companies using their services usually use one of the big four as auditors and another member for consultancy work. Fund managers routinely use one of the big four as fund auditors. It must be some years since I have seen any auditing firm that is not a member of this clique being used in this context. The fund management business, far larger in total than the whole of the US economy, continues to make strides and recent years have seen the introduction of hedge funds. It is strange that some people have odd perceptions of what a hedge fund actually is and does and there have been a lot of negative comments made about the hedge fund industry, the vast majority of which is undeserved.

It is, however, easy to understand the negative bias. In America, regulations prohibit investors with less than US\$5 million in assets, using hedge funds and investors must prove they have investment experience. Naturally, they were viewed as elitist. Based internationally and offshore, hedge funds had an easier and more welcoming regulatory environment. This does not mean they escaped close official attention.

The term "hedge fund" is somewhat misleading as it encompasses such a vast range of strategies. Some hedge fund managers saw the looming crisis in the sub prime market and devised strategies to profit from the crisis. Their investors were naturally delighted.

There is a place in the world for hedge funds, although anyone contemplating such an investment would be well advised to read the fund prospectus in full, together with all other related material. To know one hedge fund is not to know them all.

Many hedge funds have closed down, due to low returns or have suffered losses. In these cases the assets were divided among investors after being reduced to cash. This is not new to the fund industry, it happens all the time. The usual reason is that "ABC Group" launch, say, an "emerging markets fund" just before a routine bloodletting in the said category. Even when emerging markets recover, ABC's fund still looks bad compared with its peers. ABC simply closes the fund, liquidates the assets and sends checks to investors.

Tortured by a Hollywood hack

hat do Julie Christie, Brigitte Bardot, Madonna, Cher, Vivien Leigh, Jane Fonda, Catherine Deneuve, Barbra Streisand, Jackie Kennedy Onassis, Goldie Hawn, Diane Keaton, Joan Collins, Maria Callas, Natalie Wood and Britt Ekland have in common?

They all slept with Warren Beatty. When Woody Allen was asked what he would like to come back as in another life, he responded: "Warren Beatty's fingertips."

So this was one motive for picking up Robert Sellers' book *Bad Boy Drive* (Preface, London, 2009, 273pp), subtitled "The Wild Life and Fast Times of Marlon Brando, Dennis Hopper, Warren Beatty and Jack Nicholson". The other motive is that the book is packaged very nicely in a trade paperback format, leading me to think this was something other than the trash work of a Hollywood hack.

How wrong I was. Robert Sellers has published 10 books about the movies and Hollywood stars. His most recent I had vaguely heard of, *Hellraisers*:

The Life and Inebriated Times of Richard Burton, Richard Harris, Peter O'Toole and Oliver Reed.

Sellers has now turned his sights to four Americans. "Bad Boy Drive" was the nickname of the stretch of Mulholland Drive where Brando, Beatty and Nicholson had houses. Dennis Hopper didn't but I guess Sellers needed a fourth.


This is a terrible read which leaves behind a foul taste. Sellers seems to like Nicholson for his raffish sense of humor, but he portrays Brando as a gluttonous slob, Beatty as a self-absorbed snob and Hopper as a drug-crazed loony. They all go through a lot of women which Sellers recounts with a panting leer. His pages are rife with gratuitous obscenities and he leaves no cliché unturned, including the use of "Tinsel Town".

Here he is on one of Beatty's early Hollywood romances with "British sexpot" Joan Collins:

"It was love, addictive love, for Joan, who was twice suspended by 20th Century Fox, with whom she was under contract, for

refusing film roles in order to be with Warren. Considering his sex addiction, which meant they got down to it four or sometimes five times a day, every day, it's no surprise that Joan never wanted to be out of his sight, presumably fearing that he might end up rutting the sideboard or an innocent maid who had only popped in to turn down the beds. Joan had good cause to worry about Warren's roving eye: he'd tried to bed starlet Mamie Van Doren, without success. 'Warren drools a lot,' Mamie would say of him. 'He has such active glands.' Joan observed another habit that Warren talked on the phone during copulation."

There are no notes and no bibliography to this book, just hundreds of press quotations stitched together and pasted over by Sellers' relentlessly obscene voice. It's like being trapped in a bar with a garrulous foul-mouthed drunk with his hand cupped around your neck as he brays his hatred for big Hollywood stars.

In writing about *Burn!*, a Marlon Brando flop that was filmed in the jungles of Colombia, Sellers describes how

Brando fled the set and had to be persuaded to return.

"For months the film was in limbo, until Marlon agreed finally to finish it. He needn't have bothered, *Burn!* was a complete flop, his tenth in a row. Hollywood producers were now better disposed to catching a dose of the clap than to hiring Marlon Brando for a movie"

He is much more sympathetic toward Jack Nicholson and at times even insightful.

"As the seventies drew to a close Jack's huge personality was threatening to swallow the parts he played. Bizarrely, the more famous Jack got, the more difficult his job as an actor became.

Often he found himself having to un-Jack his characters in order to get audiences to separate the public persona from his work; un-Jacking meant toning down the mad eyebrows and cheesy grin and all the other Jackisms. It was a challenge because some directors hired Jack to be, well, Jack."

But despite this, I can't recommend this book, not even for beach reading, not even for bathroom reading.

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Phuket needs pandas

Few images have totally dominated the Thai media as much as those of the still-unnamed panda cub born at the Chiang Mai Zoo late last

Coverage of the cub's every movement has been a constant feature on Thai television for days, while articles on every possible aspect of its development have been addressed in the print media.

Even at two weeks old the cub's "immigration status" is beginning to loom large as a matter of international relations. Its parents are only in Thailand on loan for 10 years and under the agreement that brought them here the cub must be returned to China within two years of birth – an agreement a delegation of Thai officials are now reportedly extremely busy trying to renegotiate.

Even for the typically cynical media it is easy to get wrapped up in all the warm fuzziness that the panda cub story has to offer. This is especially true as it comes at a time when there is so little positive news to report, with the global economic crisis, global flu pandemic and an unprecedented escalation of violence in the Deep South dominating headlines.

From a tourism standpoint, the tiny cub is already an established top earner; tickets to catch a glimpse of the cub have already sold out for the remainder of 2009 and into next year. This surge of enthusiasm has no doubt made some tourism industry experts here in Phuket ask the question: why did Chiang Mai get pandas and not Phuket?

The answer is that the Zoological Park Organization (ZPO) that is now trying to establish a permanent panda research center in Thailand has no presence in Phuket.

Of its five zoos, only one is located in the south – the excellent Songkhla Zoo, which occupies over 900 rai of mountainside land just south of Songkhla Town and has excellent learning facilities for children. Sadly, the only zoos in Phuket are privately-owned facilities that engage in racist double-pricing policies and exist solely as moneymaking operations, not to educate people or raise public awareness about wildlife or environmental issues. The situation in tourist areas like Patong where animals are exploited for profit is even worse.

The ZPO should consider giving the island the kind of zoo it needs and deserves – while there is still land available to build one.

Possible locations to consider for smaller zoo facilities might include some of the SorPorKor agricultural reform land that was formerly reclaimed from Phuket tycoons, including sites in Karon and at Tri Trang Beach in Patong.

Putting a well-designed, environmentally-friendly zoo somewhere in Phuket makes real sense and could also help spare part of the island from current trends that are seeing more and more of the island's remaining forest land covered with asphalt and concrete.

What's in a name? A lot

ince Songkran, more people seem worried that Thailand's extreme socio-economic inequality lies behind the political mess of recent years. Some Democrats justified their new tax proposals as measures to counter inequality. Pramon Suthiwong of the Thai Chamber of Commerce spoke eloquently about the need to moderate the social gap for the sake of political peace. Bowornsak Uwanno pronounced the current conflicts as being "about inequalities of economics and justice".

The big gap in income and wealth between rich and poor is the most noticed aspect of Thailand's inequality. But it is not the only one. Every time people talk to one another or talk about someone else, they arrange everyone in a hierarchy of superiority and inferiority.

The fact that these practices are so pervasive, so deeply ingrained, shows how much some in society value inequality and want to sustain it.

Societies that value equity make a point of using forms of personal address



that erase differences. The extreme examples are post-revolutionary societies. In revolutionary France, everyone was addressed as "citizen" and in communist societies, as "comrade".

This was perhaps trying too hard. But in most democratic societies, there are everyday forms of I, we, you, he, she, they that everyone can use to address anyone else without a thought of the social significance.

In Thailand this is much more difficult. Most pronouns

have an in-built social weight. They don't just say "I", but "I who am bigger than you", or "you who are smaller than me". There are some value-free versions, but using them amounts to a rather showy choice. The value-laden versions are more conventional and easier to choose.

Then there are titles. The old feudal titles were officially abolished after the 1932 revolution.

Since then there has been no formal aristocracy defined by title and name. But some bits of the old system have lingered, and others have been rescued or reinvented, so that titles and names still serve as a claim that some people are different, special, superior.

Curiously, while all the male titles of aristocracy were abolished, the female titles of Khunying and Thanphuying were allowed to remain. Each year, a few women are granted these titles

In some cases, the grant

seems to be in recognition not of the woman's achievements, but those of her husband. And

some of these seem to be almost automatic. For instance, the prime minister's wife is usually elevated (as long as he can stay in office long enough), and also the wives of the top brass in the military hierarchy.

In a parliamentary democracy, the honor granted to the prime minister makes some sense. But why the military chiefs? And why more of them? Why are they chosen and not the wives of the top writers, top scientists, top sportsmen, top enter-

tainers? This automatic elevation seems to say that the military chiefs still amount to an aristocracy.

Another set of titles that has survived into the democratic age are those of Mom Chao, Mom Ratchawong and Mom Luang, which denote distance from the royal line. Thailand may be the only country in the world where such a system remains in use.

In other monarchies, immediate relatives of royal families are still granted titles as prince or princess. In the UK, some more remote relatives are identified as dukes and duchesses. But is there any other country where those three generations removed from the royal line still identify themselves on a daily basis by a prefix to their name?

Other sets of titles in everyday use are those of military and police ranks. This is true in most societies.

But Thailand has one curiosity. People who have acquired an officer rank but then leave the service continue to hold the rank for the rest of their lives – and it is obligatory for the rank to be used in any public mention.

Thus the Thai press still religiously refers to "Police Lieutenant Colonel Thaksin Shinawatra" even though he resigned from the police 22 years ago. There is even a controversy over whether his rank should be withdrawn, even though it is not a distinguished rank. This practice amounts to a claim that a police or military rank is something rather special.

One form of titling that has expanded over the past generation is that associated with learning and education.

Of course the usage of "Dr" by medical practitioners and holders of tertiary degrees is universal.

But Thailand has developed

another level of public academic titling which is again rather unique. "Ajarn" was once a title or form of address bestowed especially on learned monks, but also on other kinds of teachers, particularly in the arts.

While that custom remains, it is now overshadowed to identify anyone with an academic post in graduate institutions.

This titling subsystem is not as powerful as the royal and military ones because there is no standard written form, and no obligation to use the title whenever the holder is mentioned in writing, such as in the press. The usage of "ajarn" is still principally oral.

The fact that there are forms of address which position people as superior and inferior, and titling systems which allow some people to claim they are special, says a lot about society. Naming and addressing practices that elevate some, while debasing others.

Societies that truly believe in the fundamental equality of humanity and value human dignity try to minimize this sort of thing.

Seventy years ago, there was an attempt to reform the Thai language by abolishing many of the practices, which seemed inappropriate for the modern democratic era.

Perhaps that reform was too dogmatic. Certainly it was resisted. Only a few of its innovations now survive.

Some people are beginning to understand the popular demand for a better economic deal. There is also a demand for more respect. That often comes in small everyday forms like the way people are named and addressed.

Dual Pricing at the Laguna Marathon

Regarding the practice of dual pricing (one price for foreigners, one price for locals), the same thing happens at the Phuket Laguna Marathon. Foreigners have to pay 2,700 baht for registration in the 10.5 km event while Thais pay 1,250 baht (This pricing difference is the same for entry into all the races.). I have run every Sunday around Thailand for about five years and it is only at this event that I see double pricing.

Roman Floesser, Event Manager for Laguna Phuket International Marathon (c/o Go Adventure Asia) replies:

Dual pricing is common practice at international running events in Thailand. See the

Bangkok Marathon, Pattaya Marathon, Khon Kaen Marathon and the River Kwai International Half Marathon.

The reason for dual pricing is simply because it is not possible to put on a race of international standards with the entry fees that are normally charged for local running events in Thailand. The international fee we charge represents the real cost of providing the service level and race experience that international runners expect. The Thai entry fee is a discounted to encourage local participation and to prevent the pricing out of these participants. We publish all entry fees on our website, so we are being transparent about this. Out of the 4,000 plus participants that enter our event this year, three have raised concern over this. Two of them said they understood our position after we gave them our reasons for our pricing policy.

Dual pricing is a practice also used by other destination marathons, such as the Honolulu Marathon and the Gold Coast Marathon in Australia. For example, the Honolulu Marathon charges US\$165 to international participants, US\$130 to US participants and US\$85 to Hawaiian participants. The Gold Coast Marathon charges AUS\$100 for local entries and AUS\$120 for international entries.

Moreover, airlines and hotels use dual or multiple pricing, so this practice is neither exclusive to running events nor to Thailand.

Do foreign kids born in Thailand become Thai citizens?

What is the law in Thailand regarding children born to foreign parents in Thailand? Are the children considered Thai citizens en-

abling them to stay here forever?

Police Captain Rassarin Teerapattanakul, Sub Inspector of Phuket Immigration Office replies:

A child being born in Thailand does not automatically make him or her a Thai citizen. However, the child can stay in Thailand without a visa until his or her parents leave the country. When the child leaves, the parents have to present the child's birth certificate and passport to immigration. Should the parents later return to the Kingdom, the child will need a visa just like any other foreigner.

Aussie Paine romps to second Laguna Phuket marathon win

eigning Laguna Phuket International Marathon champion Stephen Paine of Australia defended his crown in style yesterday, leading from start to finish on his way to an impressive win on a record-breaking day at Laguna Phuket.

A record 4,500 runners and walkers from more than 25 countries gathered at the Y junc-

tion area next to Laguna Beach Resort in the early hours of Sunday to contest five separate eve-nts: a 42-kilometer full mar-athon, 21km half marathon, 10.5km

run, 2km "kids run", and a 5km walk for charity.

The first wave of unseeded marathon runners set off at 4am. Among them was world famous "slow runner" Hajime Nishi of Japan, creator of the ecomarathon concept and the first person to complete marathons on all seven continents.

They were followed an hour later by the second wave of seeded runners, which included defending champion Paine.

Coming into the event the Australian said that he felt he wasn't in the same shape he was in 2008, when he set the Laguna Phuket course record.

But Paine

showed few signs of rust when the air horn sounded to start the race, immediately taking the lead as the pack left the start line and never looking back. Paine finished almost 25 minutes ahead of his nearest rival in 2:39:23 – just outside of the time he set in 2008.

In the women's marathon, Katja Fink (pictured) of Switzerland took full advantage of the absence of 2008 champion Angela Louise Stevens, claiming her first Laguna Phuket Marathon title in a time of 3:34:04, just over one

minute ahead of Reesa Simmonds of Canada.

The race of the day came in the 21km half marathon, with Thai running star Patcharee Chaitongsri shattering the previous course record on her way to victory in 1:25:23. Ms Patcharee was pushed all the way to the line by Singapore's Vivian Tang, who finished just 12 seconds later to take second.

In the men's event, Swiss runner Cedric Aspsi Loichart claimed victory in 1:16:47 ahead of the heavily-favored Paul Kisumba Wayoke of Kenya. Wayoke led Loichart by almost 30 seconds at the halfway mark, but began to tire over the second half of the race, allowing Loichart to come through and win.

Jason Mayeroff, winner of the 2002 Bangkok Marathon, opted to run in the 10.5km race. He dominated right from the start, smashing the course record by more than two minutes.

The veteran runner from the United States later revealed that he will compete in the full marathon in 2010 to stop Paine from completing a hat trick of titles.

Elsewhere, 800 people took part in the 5km sponsored walk that saw funds raised for charities both in Phuket and further afield.

Seeing red

eeing red? Certainly. As I write, Phuket is ablaze with dramatic color. In the nurseries along Chao Fa West Road, orange red bougainvilleas are at full throttle; potted cerise euphorbias are turning it on in Thai forecourts; canna lilies of an intense scarlet are exploding into bloom beside way-

side klongs. And there are other red-flowering plants. Less spectacular maybe, but certainly worth a mention in this column.

Take the red cattail or chenille plant (acalypha hispica, see photo). It is a member of the huge acalypha genus, but as

usual it is the everyday names that afford clues to its appearance. Its pendant deep red catkins – up to 18 inches long – consist of hundreds of densely packed florets and literally do look, and feel, like velvety tails.

Some people regard the cattail as a bit de trop, but it is one of the hardiest and most valuable of perennials. Give it oodles of sun and it will stay colorful all year long. Moreover, the crimson catkins contrast nicely with the large acid-green leaves. Take off the unsightly old "tails" before they drop, and you have an attractive plant which has graced Asian "cottage" gardens for centuries. It looks good in a hanging basket too.

Another unusual plant is the costus, a member of the ginger family, and suggestively nicknamed "French kiss" (see photo). As its name implies, it is a bit of a conversation piece, a phalliclooking shrub with long red cones rising from a crown of leaves atop fleshy stems. Neat and upright in habit, it won't take over other plants' territory. Surprisingly, small red flowers will sometimes erupt from these densely packed cones. Speciosus, which has

> likely to happen to the nerium, better

known as the oleander. I have mentioned this evergreen shrub before, but it deserves more space – here as in the garden. Like the bougainvillea, it is closely associated with the Mediterranean littoral, but it grows well in southern Thailand. A genus of only two species, it exists in any number of named cultivars, including my favorites: Algiers (dark red), Delphine (single purple-red) and Madonna (double white). It is the shrub par excellence for difficult conditions: once established, it will tolerate both the sandy soil and the salt-laden winds we experience in coastal areas of Phuket. Its clusters of flowers are long-lasting and showy, its habit tall and erect. Four oleanders around my pool help to form a natural windbreak. In fact, it puzzles me that it is not grown more widely on the island.



The firebush (hamelia patens) is more popular here, in part because it blooms all year round – if given the right conditions. Its small, tubular orange flowers they can be almost red - are hardly spectacular, but they combine with red-veined leaves to form an attractive bush. Moreover, the flowers are rich in nectar: they attract bees during daylight, and oleander hawk-moths in the dusk. In America, the firebush is beloved of humming-birds. Sadly, we have no humming-birds in Asia... Hamelia does best in partial shade with plenty of humus where it will grow into a sizable bush which can be pruned if required: otherwise, it will sulk and

When I moved to Saiyuan, a Thai lady gave me a potted plant which I had never seen before. Nothing unusual in that. I was, and still am, learning something new every day about the magnificent tropical flora of south Thailand. She called it phu lab phu kaam. It had vicious, seaurchin-like spines, and a waxy, cone-shaped yellow fruit. There were no flowers. But the shrub proceeded to grow apace, and soon produced semi-double scarlet, rose-like blooms about three centimeters across.

Yes, informed reader, you have guessed. It was a wax rose (pereskia bleo), a member of the cactus family. That it felt at home in a pot meant that it could tolerate dry conditions. Just like its relative, grandiflora, which produces clusters of reddish-pink flowers and is so spiny, it is often used as a protective barrier. My wax rose is still in a container, but is now two meters tall and in need of a transfer to another sunny situation. For I have seen one in Phuket the size of a small tree...

I confess to some reservations about another border dweller. Jatropha integerrima or peregrine is a woody, open shrub that matures rapidly and produces

terminal clusters (corymbs) of carmine or coral blooms. Like many plant varieties, it has responded to selective breeding; recent cultivars now available in Phuket nurseries sport scarlet flowers of an almost phosphorescent intensity. In my former garden, a jatropha disdained poor soil and a narrow bed to reach three meters within a year. So what's the catch? Unfortunately, the shrub is very disease-prone, its immune system seemingly unable to resist the depredations of mealy bugs and fungal disease. Draconian pruning appears to be the only answer. But I may have been unlucky – or neglectful.

Its relative, the coral plant (jatropha multifida) has very distinctive palmate foliage, deeply divided into nine or eleven blades. The umbels of tiny scarlet flowers are borne on slender red stems held high above the leaves. Certainly unusual – and by no means so easy to find. The Thai name, if it helps, is malako farang.

My final selections are red almost by default. Brunsfelsia hopeana has the everyday, if long-winded, names of "yesterday, today and tomorrow" or "morning, noon and night": its five-petaled flowers change color from purplish-red, to pink and finally to white. The blooms are not spectacular, but their chameleonlike propensities will provide a talking point. It has abundant foliage, and can be grown in pots, provided the soil is kept moist.

A better shrub with which to conclude is the cotton rose (hibiscus mutabilis or phuttan in Thai). Mentioned before in dispatches, it starts the day with white flowers which turn pink; by evening they are dark red. I like it because it is a vigorous grower and has large, double blooms that appear all year. Good against a wall. Phuttan does tend to get "leggy" and shed its leaves; if this happens, it may be better to prune it drastically. I always find that difficult to do.



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How to avoid the possibility of future disputes over access to your land

Scenario: You buy a piece of land that can only be accessed by crossing public or privately-owned land. You have to ensure that you will always have the right to use that land to access your own plot. Crossing public land to access your property should cause few problems but if the land used to access your property is privately owned, then it's important to ensure that correct due dilligence is carried out to ensure you will always have the right to access your own land.

nsuring secured access to a property is often disregarded but to ignore the issue is to risk conflict later on. In order to protect the buyer's interests and avoid the possibility of future disputes, secured access should be verified by a lawyer before going ahead with the purchase.

Ideally, the property you want to buy is accessible via a public road. If, however, access to your property is through privately owned land (third party), it is possible that the privately owned land is sold or transferred to a new owner, who may then decide to restrict entry into

Of course not all properties can be served with secured access via a public road. With most large property developments, access to them is via a road or land owned by the developer and/or affiliates. In such cases, the sales documentation should include a provision under which the developer guarantees secured access to individual properties. Additionally, further protection should be given to a property buyer through registration of an easement right, whenever legally possible, securing unrestricted access to its plot.

Such access right, also called "servitude" or "para jumyom", is described under the Thai Civil and Commercial Code (CCC). This would need to be registered with the relevant land department and mentioned on the title certificate of the servient land (the land used to access the other land) for the benefit of the land that lacks


access (dominant land).

An important point here is that the CCC stipulates that the owner of the servient land can not do anything to the land that will diminish its utitlity or make access to the dominant land less convenient. Furthermore, the CCC states that the owner of the dominant property is entitled, at his own expense, to do all that is necessary to preserve and make use of the servitude. The servitude right always follows the dominant property in the event it is disposed of or made subject to other rights and it cannot be transferred separately.

Enforcing or defending the right to access dominant land is much easier when the easement right has been properly registered. A contractual right may only be binding to the parties directly involved and may not be enforceable against a third-party landowner. Even if an agreement is made with the third-party land owner, problems can arise if that land is transferred through sale or is inherited by someone else.

A duly recorded servitude right is the best defense against any third-party landowner who tries to prevent access to the dominant land.

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of a hot potato by Prime Minister Abhisit Vejajjiva and the coalition government. Top of the agenda must be bringing some sort of equilibrium to an economy which more often than not resembles a drunken sailor on shore leave, zigzagging his way back to ship.

I recently attended the International Hotel Investment Forum (IHIF) in Macau, staged along the Cotai strip at the Venetian Hotel. Having been to the hotel's alter ego in Vegas, I can confirm that most Asian "megahotels" and casinos bear a resemblance to their Las Vegas counterparts but with an Eastmeets-West, Jackie-Chan-meets-Owen-Wilson twist.

The Venetian has over 3,000 rooms and is part of a hotel, entertainment and casino complex that employs around 17,000 staff. Size aside, there is an undeniable cardboard flavor to the Venetian in that it lacks substance. Staying there is somewhat akin to scarfing down a McDonald's and still being hungry for real food.

During the taxi ride from the airport, I mulled over the idea that

sue might be considered too much Macau's newly built"City of Dreams" entertainment hub could have been more aptly branded the "City of Lost Souls". However, I failed to see any biblical figures that had been turned to stone on the short journey that would confirm this.

Meanwhile back to Phuket. In an effort to find the right path again, our sailor has now sobered up thanks to a couple of double espressos and is trying his best to get back to ship unaided by "quick fixes".

Thailand's selling point as a $brand\ is\ its\ ``Thai-ness"-people$ with great hearts, great food and a mystical culture that remains the envy of foreign tourist markets. Well laid plans in Thailand often fall by the wayside, and of course the country has experienced turbulent times of late, but no other destination offers the zest, spice and sanook so widely enjoyed by Thais. In short, we might not always get there, but the journey is full of life and entertainment.

Trying to introduce casinos in Thailand and Phuket seems like an incredibly bad idea. Investing in additional imported labor would strain the already troubled infra-

I am always troubled when I see decapitated heads of the Buddha perched above doorways of guest houses and luxury hotels. If one started cutting the heads off statues of Jesus or those of Mohammed and used them as decor, how would Christians or Muslims react?

Objectively, Singapore seems to be taking more of a tempered approach to gambling and casinos. The upcoming Sands development is not only focusing on gambling but will provide large-scale convention and meeting space with the aim of attracting more groups.


Unlike Macau, there have been no attempts in Singapore to recreate the Vegas Strip. Instead, the developments have formed a small part of a much larger tourism plan. The major difference between Singapore and Thailand is that the former has the regulatory apparatus to apply the brakes at any time and halt any project coupled with a long-term plan. It is doubtful that the same could be applied to the Thai "all or nothing" mindset.

Gambling is not a quick-fix solution and often takes more than it gives back to a community. Lessons can certainly be learned by looking at the financially troubled companies in Las Vegas. Initially embraced by Wall Street, they have now been left out in the cold to fend for themselves, laden with debt and dim short-term prospects.


Leaving Macau, I was able to breathe a deep sigh of relief and come back to the reality of Phuket with its natural environment and strong culture. It's worth noting that all that glitters isn't necessarily gold.

Sustainable tourism is something that needs to be thoughtfully planned and remains a challenge for Phuket if it is to remain pricecompetitive with other destinations.

I'm not going to succumb anytime soon on the issue of gambling here in Thailand. Hopefully the government will continue to see beyond its shiny allure.




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Get your motor runnin'

t would be almost impossible to live in Thailand without electric fans. Most are pretty reliable, especially considering how many hours they actually operate before they start to break down. The main areas where failures can occur are the switches, swing mechanisms and motor bearings. Broken switches or swing mechanisms we'll leave for another column. This week, we'll discuss lubricating the bearings.

If your fan takes a long time to get up to speed when you turn it on or spins slower than when new, it could be that the bearings are getting "dry" inside and need to be lubricated. It's not difficult, but must be done carefully. A little excess oil on the windings could cause smoke or even fire, while a little oil on the commutator contacts will stop the fan from working.

Picture 1 shows a common electric fan motor as well as the separate gearbox and attached "swing arm". Because of the size


of the picture it's perhaps difficult to see where the bearings are, but when you open a real fan up you will see them.

The rotor, the large shaft with coils of wire wrapped in precise shapes around its sides, is the heart of any electric motor. The rotor spins within two bearings held by the cast frame. These bearings can accumulate dust and dirt and become dry, creating drag and slowing down the rotor.

To lubricate them, you must remove the rear portion of the motor's plastic cover. First, remove the pull-up knob that activates the swing control. There are two types of knobs: screw on and clip on. For the screw-type, simply unscrew the center screw and lift the knob straight off. The clip type requires more care, because you can't buy a replacement.

Remember, warm plastic bends and cool plastic breaks. If you have a hairdryer, use it to heat the "tabs" on the sides of the knob's shaft, then pry them both gently outwards at the same time while lifting. If there is no hairdryer available, set the fan in the sun for an hour or so and let the plastic warm up as much as possible. After removing the knob, extract the screw from the center of the cover's rear face. The cover should then simply pull off, allowing you to see the motor.


First, locate the front and rear bearings where the rotor's shaft passes through the frame (tip: flashlights help here, even in daylight). There is very little space between the edges of the



windings and the bearings, so to get the oil in there – without it going all over the windings, brushes or commutator – you will need a slender "oil transfer" tool. Use a cotton swab with the cotton removed from one end, a wooden chopstick or an oil tube with a fine nozzle. Small tubes of light oil, with a long nozzle cap like those on tubes of super glue, are available in hardware stores.

The lubricating process should be done in two steps. First, lube the bearings with light oil and then with a little motor oil. The reasoning behind this is that light oil penetrates better, but doesn't last long, while motor oil is the opposite. The light oil acts as a partial solvent and allows the motor oil to penetrate into the bearing's shell, lasting longer than just light oil alone. A small plastic bottle of motor oil often comes in handy, so always try to keep some around the house.

To begin, lay the fan on its back – blade facing the sky – to lubricate the rear bearing. Don't try to lube bearings when they are in a vertical position as the oil will simply run off. Place the tip of the oil tube's nozzle (or the swab or stick dipped in oil) against the seams where the face of the



bearing meets the inner and outer rims (picture 2).

Apply just a drop or two at a time and spin the blade to work it in. Repeat this process. Then use the tool dipped in motor oil and repeat once again, making sure you don't apply too much. Now, turn the fan so the blade is facing down, and repeat the process with the front bearing. It is better to do this whole procedure twice, with just several drops applied each time, than it is to apply too much and have it flow onto

the windings. Use a fresh swab to wipe up any overflow.

Check to see if the fan works better. If OK, re-attach the rear cover and then the swing knob. If your swing knob is a screw-type, don't tighten the screw too tightly. The knob must be able to rotate easily as the fan swings. If it can't, the mechanism will self-destruct, but that's another story!

That's it! Turn on your fan and enjoy a beer in the breeze! See you next time!
