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Six young lives lost in one day

Six young people, including one foreign tourist, were killed in motorbike accidents in Phuket in a single day this week.

British Muay Thai fighter Adam Menagh, 22, and Chai-narong Wathana, 24, died instantly in a head-on bike collision in Chalong on the morning of February 22.

Mr Menagh crossed lanes, hitting Mr Chai-narong's bike on Chao Fa West Road opposite Soi Thanoothep in Chalong around 5:30am, an initial police investigation revealed.

When Chalong Police arrived they found the two lying dead on the road, their bikes smashed. When found, neither were wearing helmets.

A 47-year-old Danish national John Bjerg, 47, is believed to have been riding pillion on Mr Menagh's bike.

He was taken to Phuket International Hospital with serious abdominal injuries. At the time of writing he remains in intensive care.

Mr Menagh's family have already arrived from his native Epsom, England to arrange funeral services, which will likely take place at Rawai Temple this weekend.

Friends paid tribute to Mr Menagh, who trained at a number of Muay Thai camps on Phuket and was preparing for a fight in Patong.

Taizo Hughes, an Australian fighter who knew Mr Menagh for two months, said, "He was the nicest guy. He was great to have around and even though he was a bit younger than me he always made me feel good about myself."

Mr Menagh spent the night before his death at a club in Rawai, Mr Hughes said.

Earlier the same morning a Thai was killed in Kathu when his motorcycle collided with a jeep driven by a German tourist.

According to a local Thai language newspaper, 19-year-old Ronnawee Sukkasem of Ranong drove out of Soi Kuanyang straight into the tourist's vehicle at the bottom of Patong Hill at around 2:30am.

In a similar incident, another young man died the same day when he collided with a car driven by an English tourist on Chao Fa West Road near the TOT offices in Chalong.

The driver of the bike, Preecha Nuancharern, was reportedly not wearing a helmet when he hit 63-year-old Morris Allen's car. He died at the scene.

His wife Mullika Klinchan, who was riding pillion, was fighting for her life in the intensive care unit at Vachira Phuket

Hospital on Monday.

At around 9:30am the same day, a 15-year-old Thai student was killed in front of Bang Tao Temple in Cherng Talay.

Nitipong Kuchanan was heading home after taking a test at school in Kamala when he lost balance and collided with a pickup truck.

When police arrived they found Mr Nitipong lying dead on the road in his school uniform, surrounded by weeping relatives.

Another student was seriously injured in the accident.

Then at 10:30am, 27-year-old Phang Nga native Preeyanut Preedaphon was killed on her bike when a 10-wheeled truck hit her at the Tesco Lotus Intersection.

Both Ms Preeyanut and the truck were turning left onto the bypass road from Yaowarat Road when they collided. Ms Preeyanut died instantly when her head was crushed by the truck.

Masseuses at war in Bang Tao

INDEPENDENT masseuses are rubbing the locals the wrong way at Bang Tao Beach and 300 members of the local masseuses' club are demanding government action to stop the newcomers from stealing their customers.

Cherng Talay deputy district chief Siripong Leeprasitwas chaired a meeting at the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Office (TAO) on February 23 to discuss the problem.

Cherng Talay Traditional Thai Massage Club representatives told the TAO the problem dates back about two years, but recently worsened because the TAO officer who formerly oversaw the beach massage industry was no longer doing so.

This allowed some 30 rogue masseuses to colonize key positions on the beachfront and get their hands on customers that rightfully belonged to club members.

Club president Prattana Saejew said members pay 100 baht per year to the TAO for the right to operate massage tents in 13 locations along Bang Tao and Surin Beaches.

"Members need to have good qualifications and take turns with customers... All members are local people; the others are outsiders," she said.

As a result of the newcomers about 20 percent of the club's members no longer have any locations to work, she said.

The independent masseuses also lure away clients by charging less than the standard 300 baht per hour, she added.

Mr Siripong said the TAO would try to reimpose order at the beach by registering the newcomers in the club.

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Island's week of wildfires

PHUKET firefighters have been battling wildfires along the bypass road in recent days.

The first broke out in a field opposite Tesco-Lotus in Rassada at about noon on February 21.

Rassada Municipality dispatched four firetrucks and 20 firefighters to try to douse the flames, which were fueled by thick, dried out vegetation.

"As we arrived there to put it out we saw one guy who had been burning trash in the area fleeing the scene," one firefighter said.

Assisting firefighters were about 20 officers from the Phuket Provincial Wildfire Prevention Unit and some 10 local volunteers.

Fortunately the flames did not spread to structures on nearby Songkhla Road, which is separated from the lot by a two-meter-high concrete wall. A recycling warehouse on the road nearby is filled to capacity with paper, plastic and other flammable materials.

Firefighters thought they had the fire under control later that day, but it reignited three more times: the next morning, at about 8:30pm that evening, and

again at around noon on February 23.

Over 100,000 liters of water were used in the operation: 60,000 liters for the first fire, 20,000 for the second and 30,000 liters for the third.

"It is very difficult to stop the fire because we can't see it smoldering beneath the surface, and this is why it continues to reignite... The best method is to spray the entire area to ensure everything is saturated," one firefighter told the *Gazette*.

An even larger fire broke out at about noon on February 23 opposite the Chevrolet showroom on the bypass road northbound, also in Rassada.

Firefighters continued to battle the blaze all afternoon, finally extinguishing it at about 4pm. About 30 rai of forest and underbrush was destroyed.

There have been 15 fires in Rassada this month alone.

"This year is worse than last year because the weather is very hot and dry. When people burn their trash, it is very easy for the fire to spread and become uncontrollable," the firefighter said.

Earlier this month, there was a fire at a recycling plant in Wichit.

Rain needed or supplies gone in May



The Bang Wad Reservoir will run out of water in May if there is no rain.

THE Phuket Provincial Irrigation Office (PPIO) has reported that the Bang Wad Reservoir in Kathu will run out of water in May if not replenished with rainfall.

Mr Issara Anukool, who heads the PPIO's water management department, said the reservoir currently holds 5.3 million cubic meters of water, about 73% of total capacity.

The PPIO supplies water to both the Phuket Provincial Waterworks Authority (PPWA) and the Phuket City Waterworks Authority, the island's two main municipal supply systems.

He spoke during a meeting of the Phuket Provincial Water Strategy Committee held at the PPIO's meeting room on February 17.

The meeting was chaired by Phuket Vice Governor Teerayut Eimtrakul.

Mr Issara said the PPIO currently has the capacity to collect, treat and transmit about 47 million cubic meters of water annually, which is less than the 51 million cubic meters needed to meet predicted requirements in 2010.

To make up the shortfall, four projects are planned.

Work on the long-awaited third reservoir at Klong Krata in Chalong will get underway 'very soon'.

The PPIO has already signed a project contract worth over 460 million baht to the project contractor, he said.

The organization plans to build a new 2 million cubic meter reservoir at Ao Yon, with work to begin next year.

The agency also plans to increase capacity at the Bang Wad Reservoir by 3.3 million cubic meters annually and implement a 'monkey cheeks' storage project at the 7.2-million-cubic-meter Bang Neaw Dum Reservoir in Srisoothorn to increase production there by 6 million cubic meters.

PPWA Manager Sayan Wareearoonroj said his agency continues to survey private water resources and is prepared to spend over 50 million baht to private suppliers if they can provide water of a high enough standard.

Indian Navy sailors ship in, ship out

SOME 900 Indian Navy midshipmen shipped out from Phuket on February 24 after taking part in training exercises aboard three visiting Indian warships: the *INS TIR*, the *INS Krishna* and the *ICGS Varuna*.

Arriving from Burma, the ships began their four-day training exercise on February 21.

The Indian vessels left the island from Ao Makham for the

Nicobar Islands. From there, their next stop will be Cochin City in India's Kerala State.

In addition to the training, the sailors also had some fun when a team of Indian midshipmen played a friendly football match on terra firma against a Royal Thai Navy team at Rajabhat Phuket University. The Thai sailors won the match 3-1.

Royal Thai Navy Area

Three commanding officer V/Adm Choomnoom Ardwong said the Thai and Indian navies enjoy a strong and positive relationship.

The Indian visit follows a similar training exercise by the Thai Navy in India, he said.

India and Thailand are jointly responsible for preventing terrorism, piracy and securing maritime safety at the north end of the Malacca Strait, which starts off Phuket and runs between the Malay peninsula and the Indonesian island of Sumatra. Half of the world's shipped oil moves through this strait.

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Province aims to reduce bad debt

MORE than 4,000 Phuket residents owe a total of 432 million baht to loan sharks, it emerged earlier this month.

The figures were revealed at a recent meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall attended by government officials, police officers and bank representatives, all members of a new provincial committee set up to deal with the problem of usury and indebtedness.

The 432 million baht estimate is the result of a recent nationwide survey ordered by the Ministry of the Interior to estimate the scale of the usury problem in Thailand, where ads for 'off system' loans cover telephone booths and power polls in every province.

The Phuket committee hopes to reduce the debt burden as much as 25% within one month by having banks take over the loans.

The province estimates there are 4,120 people indebted to unofficial lenders, owing around 432 million baht.

Of those, 2,545 debtors owe more than 50,000 baht.

At the February 17 meeting, chaired by Phuket Deputy Governor Chaiwat Tepee, it was decided that banking representatives would hold talks on taking on the debt with representatives from Phuket's district offices: Muang, Kathu and Thalung.

The debt reduction initiative started officially on February 16.

Officials hope one quarter of the debt can be passed on to banks by March 16.

The problem of debt to loan sharks is particularly acute in some of Phuket's sea gypsy communities.

Poor fishermen tend to borrow money when sea conditions make it impossible for them to catch fish.

Police earlier estimated there are at least 40 loan shark gangs operating on the island.

Brick thief nets just 360 baht

A DOWN-AND-OUT man who robbed a 7-Eleven store by threatening the shop assistant with a brick on February 19 got off with just 360 baht in coins – and was arrested soon after.

Mongkhon Pintajan, 33, told police he robbed the store because he had no money.

Police said Mr Mongkhon walked into the 7-Eleven on Wiset Road in Rawai at 4am.

Brick in hand, he told the frightened shop attendant to give him all the store's cash, police said.

The attendant gave him 360 baht in 10 baht coins.

After police received the crime report they rushed to the store, where they examined CCTV footage of the incident.

Later in the morning they caught Mr Mongkhon on his motorcycle on the Kata-Saiyuan Road in Rawai.

At a press conference on February 19, Chalong Police Deputy Superintendent Narong Laksanawimon warned the public to expect more robberies because of the poor state of the economy.

He also warned the public not to hang bags from motorbike handlebars, as this made them easy pickings for thieves.

"Keep valuables in the seat of your bike," he advised.

Police also used the conference to announce the

arrests of several other men for possession of small quantities of *ya bah* (methamphetamine).

Col Wichit Inthasorn, the new Superintendent of Chalong Police, was also present.

Col Wichit said he ordered his men to crack down on all types of crimes, particularly those involving drugs.

His officers were going to crank up the pressure on targeted drug networks, he said.

Bt200,000 snatched in Phuket bag heist

TWO men on a motorcycle snatched and rode off with a bag containing 200,000 baht in cash outside a rice shop in Chalong on February 18.

Sompon Famangkorn, an employee of Namsaeng Rice Company, was getting out of his pickup outside the Nam Riab Rice Shop on Chao Fa West Road when the heist happened at around 3:30pm.

Mr Sompon, 26, was at the shop to collect payment for a delivery.

Two men around 20 years of age pulled up on a motorcycle. One, wearing a long sleeved shirt and black cap, got off the bike and jerked the bag out of Mr Sompon's hands. He got back on the bike and the two sped off.

Meanwhile, Phuket City Police are reportedly hunting a gang of four youths wanted for assaulting and robbing an Italian expat and a Thai woman in separate attacks on the morning of February 15.

The Italian told police the youths, riding two motorcycles, kicked him off his bike on Wirat Hongyok Road in Tambon Wichit.

They stole 1,500 baht, credit cards and a mobile telephone from him.

Around 25 minutes later, a 20-year-old Thai woman was assaulted in a similar incident involving four youths on Wichit Songkhram Road.

The youths reportedly stole 2,000 baht and a camera before fleeing.

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Phuket Pineapple makes the list

THE iconic 'Phuket Pineapple' has been registered on a list of 20 'geographical identity' products by the Department of Intellectual Property.

News of the listing, made in November, was announced by Phuket Provincial Commercial Affairs Office Director Sompong Onprasert during a meeting of provincial office chiefs at Phuket Provincial Hall.

Also included on the list from around the region were Trang Grilled Pork and Surat Thani Oyster.

Mr Sompong said the application for the Phuket

Pineapple listing was made two years ago.

The office also hopes to get a similar listing for the 'Phuket Pearl,' he said.

Registration will allow consumers around the country to know when they are getting authentic Phuket Pineapples and will be good for local farmers, he said.

Farmers in Thalang, where the pineapples are grown between rows of rubber trees, are now trying to set up a system of rules to standardize and improve the quality of their fruit, he said.

Apart from their appeal as

a food, Phuket Pineapples are also valued for their appearance.

Miniature versions are common sights at spirit houses and on offering tables at Chinese shrines around the country. Ethnic Chinese Thais believe the many eyes on the husk's exterior represent vision and wisdom.

Songwat Tuetow, a specialist with the Phuket office of the Ministry of Agriculture and Co-operatives, said all cultivation in Phuket takes place at 55 farms in Thalang covering 1,555 rai.

Despite the latest registration, the Phuket Pineapple is actually an import. It is thought to have first been brought to the island by Portuguese traders over a hundred years ago. In the South, the pineapple is also cultivated in parts of Phang Nga, Krabi and Surat Thani, Mr Songwat said.

It is also grown in parts of the Isarn region, but soil conditions tend to make it less sweet than those grown locally, he added.

Its biggest rivals in the Thai pineapple market are the Pattavia, grown mostly in the Central Plains, and the 'Nanglae Pineapple', grown in the Chiang Rai district of the same name.

Deputy Gov: arrest more encroachers

THE deputy governor tasked with putting an end to encroachment on the island is calling for more arrests.

A provincial anti-encroachment panel chaired by Vice Governor Teerayut Eimtrakul met for the first time this year at Phuket Provincial Hall on February 17.

Statistics compiled by the panel showed a disturbing increase in the number of reported encroachment cases on the island.

So far this fiscal year, which started in October 2009, there have been 22 cases involving 28 suspects who encroached on 130 rai of state forest land and two rai of mangrove forest.

Noting that the number of cases continues to rise, Mr Teerayut told representatives from agencies at the panel that he wanted to see more encroachers arrested and charged.

All too often, officials turn up at encroachment sites only to find them empty.

Tools and heavy machinery are commonly seized as evidence, yet the perpetrators are seldom caught, he said.

In addition to arresting and charging encroachers, Mr Teerayut also encouraged officials to develop better methods

to detect encroachment and prevent it from happening in the first place.

Doing this would require better delineation of who is responsible for which areas, as well as getting local people involved in reporting cases, he said.

The encroachment problem at the Bang Khanoon forest reserve in Tambon Thepkasattri is now under control, but agencies continue to request land inside the park for projects.

These include requests by the Public Health Ministry to build a new hospital on 50 rai, as well as a request by the Thepkasattri Tambon Administration Organization to site an Islamic cemetery on 30 rai.

The area is already home to the Mid-Road Dog shelter as well as a low-security prison run by the Department of Corrections.

Another area of concern for the panel was the Klong Mudong mangrove forest reserve in Tambon Wichit, where more than 100 households have been established on state land.

Of the forest's 1,500 rai, about 900 rai have been encroached upon by some 100 families. Only 600 rai of mangroves remain there.

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Islamic panel demands retrials for 'insurgents'

BANGKOK: An adviser to a prominent Thai Islamic committee has called for retrials of insurgents or sympathizers in the South whose convictions were based on screenings by the discredited GT200 explosives scanner.

Central Islamic Committee of Thailand adviser Assoc Prof Jaral Maluleem said a scientific test proving the failings of the controversial device meant all prosecutions and convictions relying on GT200 verification were in violation of human rights. He

called on the military and the authorities to offer compensatory damages.

The Cross Cultural Foundation (CCF), a human rights NGO based in the deep South, said more than 4,000 people had been classified as sympathizers since 2007 as a result of GT200 scan results.

The device was widely used in searches and raids on local communities by security officials, the CCF said.

Most detainees were held

automatically for a 37-day period or underwent four-month forced 'rehabilitation' courses.

Foundation director Phornphen Khongkajornkiat called on the government to set up an independent committee to investigate complaints lodged by the wrongfully detained or convicted, in order to pay them compensation.

"There are also 500 inmates convicted and imprisoned for security-related incidents who could also be innocent," she added.

National Human Rights Commission member Wanchai Srinualnat said he welcomed requests for investigation from those convicted on GT200 evidence.

From now on its use would be regarded as a violation of human rights after scientific tests had proved it ineffective, he said.

Military personnel who used the device had no intention of violating human rights, he said.

"They had used it in the belief it worked efficiently – but it's a different story if they still use the GT200, after the test result showing its inefficacy," he said.

Rabies kills dog breeder

BANGKOK: A dog breeder at Chatuchak Market died of rabies on February 14 after being bitten by a Rottweiler that later died. The death prompted officials to search for others who might have been infected.

Deputy Bangkok Governor Dr Malinee Sukavejworakit said she had ordered officials to find out who had visited the 'Take Care Pet Shop' so they can be vaccinated against the disease.

Officials are also investigating the origins of dogs at the shop, she said. The city would also ar-

range vaccinations for people in a five-kilometer radius of the shop and have officials inspect the market itself, she said.

Dr Malinee said city officials would have the Food and Drug Administration test the rabies vaccine that the victim had bought to inject the dogs with. Eight other dogs at the shop also reportedly died of the disease.

The incident had prompted the city to alert related agencies to keep an eye on pet shops both at Chatuchak Market and several shopping malls, she added.

Cop treats house spirit to Bt50,000 sports bike

RAYONG: A police officer worried about keeping up with today's criminals gave his guardian spirit a boost by donating a high-powered motorbike to his spirit house.

Sen Sgt Maj Adisak Buphachat, who serves at Rayong Provincial Police Headquarters, spent more than 50,000 baht on a 400cc Honda CBR 400 sports bike to offer the spirit house at his home. He spray-painted the bike black and mounted it next to the shrine.

Mr Adisak said he bought the motorbike instead of the usual offerings of statues of elephants, horses or buffalo. Giving models of animals was old fashioned and not suitable for the digital age, he said.

The motorbike meant his house spirit would be able to help him much more quickly than in the past, he said. This is particularly important as he is a police officer and has to catch criminals every day, which is a dangerous business, he added.

Since making the offering, he has felt a lot more self-confident, Mr Adisak said. He also said he would let others copy the idea if they wanted to give their own house spirits a two-wheeled speed boost.

The spirit house has turned into something of a local attraction, with neighbors visiting in the hope of getting help from the speedy spirit.

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Not your average German sausage

After spending a few weeks in Thailand, a westerner's palate often starts to crave the savory tastes of home. Even amid the plethora of exotically flavored foods offered in Phuket's restaurants, sometimes nothing beats a big, meaty sausage.

At the Bavarian Sausage Company in the Jee Teng Complex in Phuket Town, they understand all the nuances of perfect meat products; their 'farm to table' philosophy celebrates the traditions of Germany.

Most of the company's pork and beef comes from Surin, however, in their Bavarian style sausages they only use herbs imported from Germany to maintain the traditional taste.

Smoked bacon is the top-

selling overall meat product, but they manage to produce 100 varieties of sausages and cold cuts, all made fresh in their new, state-of-the-art facility.

Impressively, the factory's equipment was imported from Germany, which augments the sausages' authentic quality. Both the factory and retail shop's facades replicate old world Bavarian style with rich red and black colors.

Inside the meticulously stocked retail space, they offer everything a meat lover could

desire. Shelves are stocked with imported crackers, mustards and other premium dry goods. The refrigerated cases display a large variety of meats and cheeses, including frankfurters, bologna, salami and a myriad of sausages.

Gerd boasts the famous white Munich sausage – or Weisswurst – as the best seller, made with finely minced pork, parsley and other secret German spices. Due to its delicate flavors, the Weisswurst is boiled and eaten without the skin and "best served with sweet mustard and

a Bavarian beer," adds Gerd.

Master butcher and operation's manager Rene Lehmann understands the science behind quality meat cuts with skills similar to that of a surgeon. He trained for years in a German culinary school near Bavaria to master the art of butchery and food preparation.

When he landed in Phuket six years ago, he had only planned a short vacation, but noticing the lack of German meat purveyors, he decided to stay and open a his own shop to fill the island's meaty

needs. He has since partnered with Gerd in a joint sausage venture with both food craftsmen, sharing a passion for traditional German foods.

The Bavarian Sausage Company's retail shop is open everyday to offer their specialty sausages, cured meats and cold cuts to the general public, as well as to island restaurants.

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Suggestions for sun seekers



Modern Skin

Sunlight contains ultraviolet rays (UV), which expedite skin aging. Two types of UV light (UVA and UVB) give us that lovely tan and the appearance of being fit and healthy.

While UVA gives skin an immediate tan, UVB is responsible for a delayed tanning effect and sunburn. Both UVA and UVB break down collagen under skin and cause wrinkles. They also cause freckles, melasma (skin discoloration) and, the worst of them all, skin cancers. Because the rays can pass through glass, hiding in the room with glass windows does not protect one from them.

Most of us encounter sun rays everyday, so protecting our vulnerable skin from sun damage should be a routine priority from an early age.

Nowadays, most gentle sunscreen lotions can be used on infants. I recommend formulas containing zinc or titanium oxide, which are hypoallergenic (do not create allergic reactions) and effectively reflect UV. As a dermatologist, I feel obliged to promote UV protection habits. I think it should be a part of our daily routine like taking bath, brushing our teeth or wearing clothes in public.

Adults should take one further step to regularly check their bodies for any signs of skin damage or change.

Here are some tips from the American Association of Dermatologists' guidelines to being 'sun smart':

1. Routinely apply a broad spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen with a sun protection factor of 30 or more.
2. Wear protective clothing when going out in the strong sun, such as a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
3. Avoid direct exposure to sun rays when they are strongest, between 10am and 4pm. If your shadow appears to be shorter than you are, seek shade.
4. Use extra caution near water, snow and sand because the sun's rays are reflected from these and doubles their intensity.
5. Don't risk skin cancer by sunbathing to get vitamin D. You can get vitamin D safely through a healthy diet and vitamin supplements.
6. Avoid tanning beds, as these give you an unnecessary extra doses of UV.
7. Check your entire body often to detect signs of change. Skin cancer is treatable when caught early.

Jewelry maker braids pearls of wisdom

During one of my tours around Phuket, I came across Chaiporn 'Lek' Srilee, an island character who's story deserves to be shared. Lek sells earthy *Bijouterie* (gems or jewelry in French) and various fashion trinkets which he designs, but the pieces are manufactured by an outside source.

Upon meeting him a year ago, I was taken by his kindness, cordiality and jokes, so I wanted to return and listen his interesting stories about life.

He is a quiet guy who likes peace and order. He is proud to share information about his personal history, as well as that of the island's history. Lek also likes to boast that he inherited his strong work ethic from his grandfather and a sense of courage from his mother.

Lek hails from a Cape Promthep family of 12 children, with four sisters and eight brothers, and suffered in deep poverty throughout his boyhood. In his childhood he walked the

island's southern tip with his dog; it is the same place where today, Lek sells jewelry on a mat under his favorite tree.

Lek did not attend school, so he speaks very little English,

but has used his creative gifts as a jewelry designer to rise out of the poverty that once saddened his childhood.

On the spot where his makeshift jewelry store stands,

comprised of his truck and some carpets for displaying jewelry, Lek feels a strong connection to the earth. In his youth he would often visit this area, voluntarily cleaning the streets of trash left

by tourists.

He told me that it was a filthy place, full of condoms and human excrement. A look of disgust appeared on his face when he described the area's previous condition, saying that pigs could not create more dirt.

Lek believes that because he patiently cleaned every day his efforts have been rewarded by the tourists who come to buy his jewelry.

Over the years, Lek embraced different religions, but ultimately became a Muslim after contemplating ending it all several times. However, he came to believe that God didn't want him dead, because he hasn't completed his mission on earth.

Many tourists take a liking to him and stop by his makeshift shop to exchange a few words on Lek's the carpet.

It is nice to know the personal stories of the humble people who populate Phuket; their stories add to the island's folklore and charm.

When in Cape Promthep pay a visit to Lek, to view his unique jewelry, hear his stories about Phuket's history, or swap theories about philosophy.

The new Ford Focus was launched at the North American International Auto Show (NAIAS) in Detroit this year.

The car will be the Focus for the European market in the future, but such is its importance to Ford, the decision was taken to introduce it at NAIAS in January. Ford is the only one of the 'Big Three' automakers — General Motors, Ford and Chrysler — in the US that did not file for Chapter 11 in 2009, and as such, it must demonstrate to its lenders that it is moving forward with imaginative new products.

The new Focus will be nearly identical in all markets with 80 percent parts commonality around the world.

Speaking at NAIAS, Ford's president and CEO Alan Mulally, said the new Ford Focus was a clear demonstration that 'our One Ford strategy is providing global consumers with great products that harness the best of Ford Motor Company.'

"The efficiencies generated by our new global C-car platform will enable us to provide Ford Focus customers with an afford-

able product offering quality, fuel efficiency, safety and technology beyond their expectations," he said.

Safety has been firmly addressed with this new Focus. As well as the usual ABS, all models now feature electronic stability control, two-stage front airbags, side-impact bags and air curtains, and a tire pressure monitoring system.

On the top-of-the-range versions, there is a sophisticated perimeter alarm system, designed to discourage vehicle theft or tampering. The brakes are ventilated discs up front and drums at the rear.

There are two body styles: a two-door coupé or a four-door sedan. Both are powered by a two-liter aluminum engine, producing 140bhp (103 kW) at 6,000 rpm; torque peaks at 185Nm, delivered at 4,250rpm.

The motor is mated to either a four-speed manual or five-speed automatic transmission driving the front wheels.

The entry-level model offers a rather tacky plastic interior, although move up the price range, and you will find sumptuous leather upholstery and a decent audio system.

The audio system has an interesting feature. It remains mute until the seat belt is buckled; a simple but effective safety device.

The coupé offers marginally more power at 143bhp, thanks to a sports muffler, while there is a range of wheel options, from 15-inch alloys to 16- or 17-inch sports

wheels.

The new Focus was developed by a global team, led from Ford's European small and medium vehicle center of excellence in Merkenich, near Cologne, Germany, with powertrain development led by a similar team at Ford's technical center in Dunton, England.

The vehicle has been engineered without compromise to meet all customer and legislative requirements of the major world-wide markets.

In developing the vehicle for global markets, the product team in Europe was able to call on the

experience acquired from recent programs like the much-acclaimed new Ford Fiesta, and was supported by the expertise of vehicle and powertrain technology specialists located in Ford's engineering center in Dearborn, Michigan.

Introduced in 1998, the original Ford Focus brought new levels of agility and responsiveness to this segment.

The makers of the latest Focus plan to raise the benchmark once more, targeting improved driving quality, outstanding steering precision and road feedback with significantly improved

refinement and ride control.

Ford engineers have updated the innovative suspension from earlier models, developing optimized new designs for the multilink rear suspension and the semi-isolated front and rear sub frames.

The chassis design is complemented by a completely new electric power steering system, which has been carefully tuned to deliver precise responses at high speed while remaining light and maneuverable for easy parking.

The new Focus will go on sale in the USA late this year and in Europe in the first quarter of 2011.

It is currently priced at around US\$16,000 but no prices for the rest of the world have been announced yet.

Bart Duykers

Bart Duykers brought a fresh new standard of hospitality to Phuket when he took over operations at the venerable Mom Tri's Boathouse in 1993.

"When Mom Tri interviewed me, he only asked one question. 'How would you manage the Boathouse?' It took me two hours to answer as I saw the potential for the boutique resort and felt that activities such as wine dinners, an art gallery and literary meetings would attract interest and better business."

It was a formula for success. Besides gaining recognition for an award winning wine cellar, many of the region's top writers and artists had shows at the Boathouse during Bart's three year tenure as GM.

He left to become Executive Director of Mom Tri's Three Generation School outside Chiangmai.

"I loved working with Mom Tri Devakul. He's a fantastic leader and gifted artist. He stimulated my work and motivated my creativity."

The school venture was sidelined by the Asian financial crisis in 1997 and Bart returned to Phuket to develop Baan Kata, eleven elegant villas next to Mom Tri's home on the headland overlooking Kata Noi Beach.

Bart was born in southeast Holland and took a four year course at De Rooi Pannen Hotel

School where he learned practical hotel operations. He worked for Crest Hotels and the American Hotel, part of the Inter-Continental, before becoming Front Office Manager at the Chateau Marquette, a restored 68 room property with origins dating back to the 13th century. It was here that Bart learned about putting on a show that would capture the imagination of his guests.

"The Castle had coats of arms from owners dating back 700 years. We did themed medieval dinners for important groups such as NATO and an EC conference with the Ministers of Foreign Affairs in Europe. We had authentic horse carriages taking the guests from their rooms to a medieval market in the courtyard. It was where I learned that I love theater and putting on a show."

In 1988, Bart came to Phuket on holiday and stayed at the Chedi at Pansea Beach.

"It was fantastic. I almost never left the property. It was my first time in Asia and I knew that I wanted to return to work."

He was approached by the Amari Resorts who needed Resident Managers for three properties in Thailand.

"I told Kurt Rufli, the Managing Director, to give me the most challenging. He sent me to the Amari Coral Beach at Patong

where I spent the next year organizing the accounts."

He was then asked to take over the construction and development of a new property, The Residence, on Kalim Beach.

"I've never walked away from an interesting challenge. I became the contractor and learned to speak construction Thai. I set up the rental program and prepared the design for the interiors. Most importantly, I learned about direct marketing."

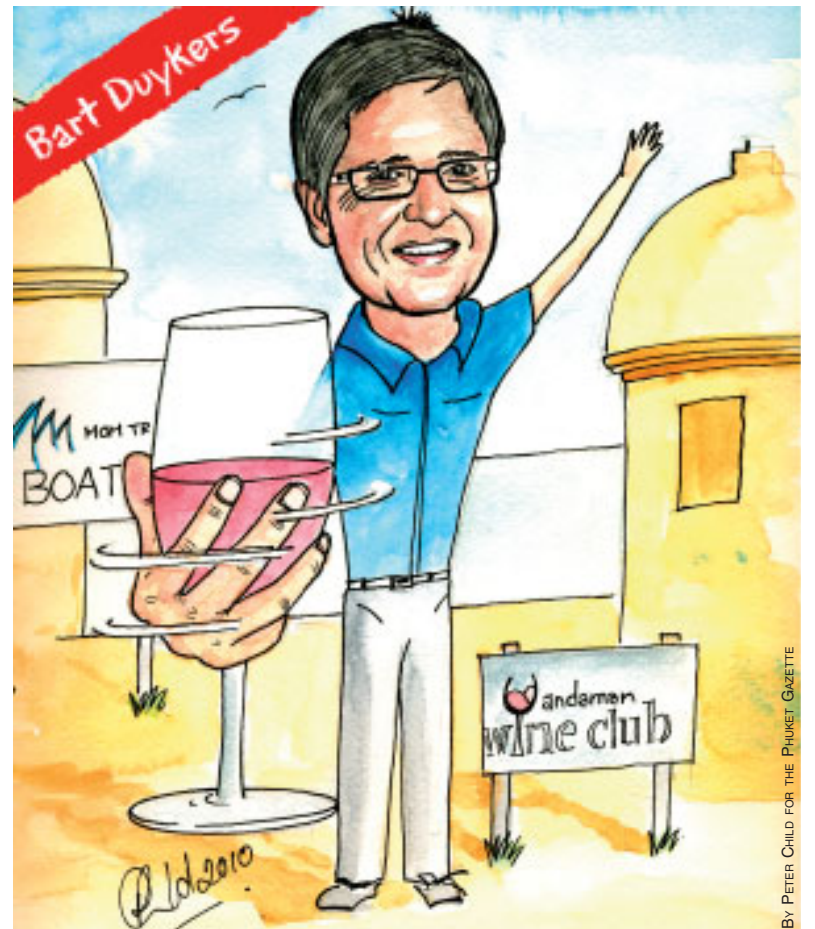
He stayed at The Residence until recruited by the Boathouse.

In the past ten years, Bart has worked as the General Manager for a Sheraton property in Tianjin, China and developed Villa Santi, a mixed use development, (now known as Indochine Resort and Villas) overlooking Patong Bay. He also developed the high end villa project Djinnah Santi.

When the distributorship for a distinctive new wine group, BB&B, became available, Bart decided to take on the opportunity. He has created the Andaman Wine Club which allows him to present wine tastings and dinners that return him to his natural position as Phuket's luxury hospitality impresario.

Bart is turning 50 this year and has already established an impressive legacy of resort development and hospitality events. He sees Phuket as his permanent home and we can look forward to enjoying his promotions and projects for many more years.

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Looking Back

In the late 19th century, Siam as a country began to change rapidly. Much of the reforms were initiated by King Chulalongkorn (Rama V) and his government, which consisted mostly of princes and members of the royal household.

The king saw an emergent need to modernize the kingdom and strengthen the core of the government. One of the reforms undertaken during that time completely changed Siam's archaic administrative system, which had prevailed for centuries.

The new system broke down and redefined the country's administrative regions into provinces, Tambons and Amphurs that still survive to this day.

In 1897, the Local Administration Act came into effect. Previously, Siam consisted of semi-independent towns and small principalities headed by local hereditary princes and governors, but the new act aimed to abolish any other centers of influence outside Bangkok.

Several cities and smaller kingdoms that used to be regional centers of influence were subsequently annexed and brought under direct control of the capital. The governors and sometimes princes that had ruled in their territories for centuries were removed from power and replaced by officials directly appointed by the government in Bangkok. The newly created administrative regions were called 'Monthon'.

The south was divided into four Monthons: Chumphon, Nakhon Si Thammarat, Tsaburi (created out of the Malay sultanate of Kedah, a vassal state of

Siam) and Monthon Phuket.

The man who was chosen to become the first High Commissioner of Monthon Phuket was a distinguished statesman of Chinese origin: The youngest son of the famed Hokkien governor of Ranong, Khaw Soo Cheang.

In 1900 Khaw Sim Bee was appointed to one of the most powerful state positions outside Bangkok. In the years before his appointment, Sim Bee had served initially as governor of Kraburi.

Then, in 1890, he was appointed governor of Trang. His family had come to Siam as immigrants many years earlier, and they were immensely successful in their business dealings.

After managing to thoroughly change the face of Ranong into a thriving town, Sim Bee's father was appointed the town's governor.

Monthon Phuket, created in 1897, was a union of six towns on the Andaman coast: Ranong, Trang, Krabi, Phang-Nga, Phuket Island and Takua-Pa. In 1907, in a move to consolidate and legitimize its territories in the south, Siam was compelled to cede most of Monthon Tsaburi to British Malaya.

Satun, the only province of Tsaburi that remained in Siam, was added to Monthon Phuket that year. When Khaw Sim Bee became High Commissioner of Phuket in 1900, he was granted the title of 'Phraya'. From then on he became known by his noble title as Phraya Ratsadanupradit Mahisorn Phakdi.

It is widely believed that one of the reasons Khaw Sim Bee was favored to become High Commissioner was because the ruling aristocrats in Bangkok believed his business influence could be used to thwart British business expansion into southern Siam.

Prince Damrong, a brother of King Chulalongkorn and Minister of the Interior during that period, was deeply suspicious of the British. Many treaties Siam had been coerced to sign with the British allowed Britain to become the dominant partner in Siamese commercial affairs, often to the kingdom's disadvantage.

After 1897, Siam was constantly under pressure from Britain to open up the southern provinces to western enterprise. However, Prince Damrong's ongoing policy was to promote Thai enterprises on Thai soil and prevent foreign business influence.

The government was anxious to find a suitable candidate who could deal with the perceived British threat. Khaw Sim Bee inherited a business empire that spanned all along the west coast of Siam and he was widely recognized as a shrewd businessman. Most importantly, his family had continuously proven their loyalty to the Siamese king.

Ironically, the British also strongly supported the appointment of Khaw Sim Bee to Phuket's top job. They believed that an able administrator, with strong connections in Penang, would do well to further British interests in the Andaman provinces.

What assured the British even more was that in fact Khaw Sim Bee was himself a British subject. One British official even went as far as remarking that "interests of British subjects in Trang may safely be entrusted to Mr Khaw Sim Bee, who is himself a British subject".

The British could not have been more wrong. As High Commissioner, Khaw Sim Bee played his dual role with great skill. On one side he was a great administrator and governor of the south-

western provinces.

On the other hand he did all he could in his authority to advance his own business interests at the expense of the British. This was not a problem for the Thai authorities, as Sim Bee's enterprises were considered 'Thai', and for them Sim Bee's gain was more desirable than British gains in Thai territory.

Among the many cases involving Khaw Sim Bee's conflicting business interests against the British, is the case of the Strait Trading Company; a British tin smelting firm based in Penang.

In 1902, the company applied for permission from the Thai authorities to set up an agency in Phuket. This right was granted in the spirit of trade fairness, so long as their trade activities were not prejudiced towards Siamese

businesses. But when the new office was opened on the island, the reception it got was less than welcome. Frank Adam, the agency's manager, was housed in a fortress-style house with guards watching his moves. The company began buying local tin in 1904 but it suffered many setbacks. Property leases were refused. There were complaints that the Phuket treasury was unco-operative in currency transactions and the rules of business applied only when it suited the officials.

Four years later, the manager of the company in Singapore was driven to observe that: "The present game (at Phuket), seems to be one in which we are the ball, while a selected circle of well-informed and powerful Chinese are the players".

From these sources it seemed likely that Khaw Sim Bee did everything in his power to protect the monopoly he held in the region's tin trade, even sometimes using painful bureaucracy to frustrate his opponents. Throughout his time in power, he always had Prince Damrong's support in obstructing British enterprise in Phuket and the southwest coast.

In 1906, British Consul General Sir John Anderson wrote: "So far as Phuket is concerned no enterprise will ever get a fair chance so long as it is run by the present High Commissioner who has his finger in every pie, and by himself or his family levies toll on everything".

Risky business in global currency markets

The speed that currencies can change direction in value often takes people by surprise. The global financial crisis which peaked in late 2008 saw the US Dollar as the most popular haven of last resort.

Last year saw the dollar fall as perceptions favored other currencies such as the Yen and the Euro. The latter currency became the favorite of many people for a number of sound reasons or at least they appeared to many as sound reasons at the time. These reasons included the "perception" that continental European currencies were not so exposed in general to the "credit meltdown" which was more of a US and UK problem.

We move then into the philosophy of "risk"; one of the areas we now know to contain some risk is among the sixteen

member states of the Euro Currency Zone.

Greece, although only accounting in Gross Domestic Product (GDP) for less than 2% of the Euro Currency Zone, has budget deficits and debt at dangerously high levels. Unfortunately, details of 'swaps' conducted in partnership with at least two major US investment banks were entered into in the 1991-1992 period were now emerging. This was solely designed to window dress Greece's national economy into appearing stronger than it actually was; to meet the requirements of Euro currency membership.

Unfortunately, when Italy showed its own statistical economic data to gain Euro admittance, one analyst compared Italy's accounting to that of Enron.

This is what is really worrying central bankers, investors and all other interested parties. How bad can this become with Portugal, Spain and everybody shuddering when the Italy word is used? Using 'Italy' and 'default' in the same sentence is considered poor taste.

However, Euro Zone politicians are ever more happy to announce that recent falls of the Euro against the US Dollar is good news. They are right; Euro Zone exports have suddenly become cheaper and more competitive in key global markets: North America, Latin America, and Asia. This will assist many European (Euro Zone) countries who are in need of all the help

they can receive.

All this commotion and uncertainty over component countries in the Euro will have lasting effects on the currency unless the future holds even worse news for the US Dollar. Markets hate uncertainty and doubts about the Euro will probably persist.

When countries such as Greece come onto credit rating agency screens with downgrades to sovereign credit ratings this is no simple event.

That means that the Greek Government has been selling Greek National Bonds denominated in Euros to many investors. These investors are naturally alarmed and yields on Greek Government's debt are much higher than on, say, German Government debt, known as Bunds. The debt of Spain and Portugal has also shown losses, as worries mount.

The European Union is very upset about the Greek situation. For once they seem prepared to take an erring country to task. There has been a conference of Financial Ministers, referred to as the ECOFIN group, and they have set Greece a timetable to enact more economic policies to rectify their problems. The deadline is March 16, 2010.

Already, Greece is facing internal opposition, with strikes in both the private and public sectors protesting against measures that the government is already trying to implement. The public reaction in Greece to even more stringent economic discipline is obviously

going to be even more extreme.

It is simply impossible to introduce a full range of economic measures to rectify the situation by March 16, but on the other hand, the present situation is out of control.

Analysts believe that 30 percent of the adult population is actually paying no tax at all. Tax evasion is a national sport, and it is going to be a lengthy period before this can be solved, especially as members of the Revenue Department have joined the strikers. The March 16 deadline imposed on Greece is to be backed up by sanctions and fines if the Greek Government does not meet its commitments

in full. Greece also needs to issue bonds by April, and in the current circumstances, this may well prove impossible; a failed bond auction will simply add to Greece's woes.

The Euro Zone may have escaped most of the credit crisis, but with some member states having dubious 'balance sheets', they have not escaped sovereign debt traps. The Euro Zone investors in national 'sub prime' bonds include many private investors, pension funds, banks and other parties.

One suggestion of how to quickly help rectify the situation – at least temporarily – comes from an American source. Boston University Economics Professor Kojlikoff has been described by Bloomberg as the guru to Britain's central bank governor Mervyn King. Kojlikoff recommends that all Greek wages and prices be reduced by 10 percent.

It may work if implemented, but it does sound very similar to the prices and incomes policy that was tried more than 40 years ago in Britain, and that was not a success.

One thing is certain, the Greek and other weak members of the Euro Zone have a story that is going to continue to make headlines.

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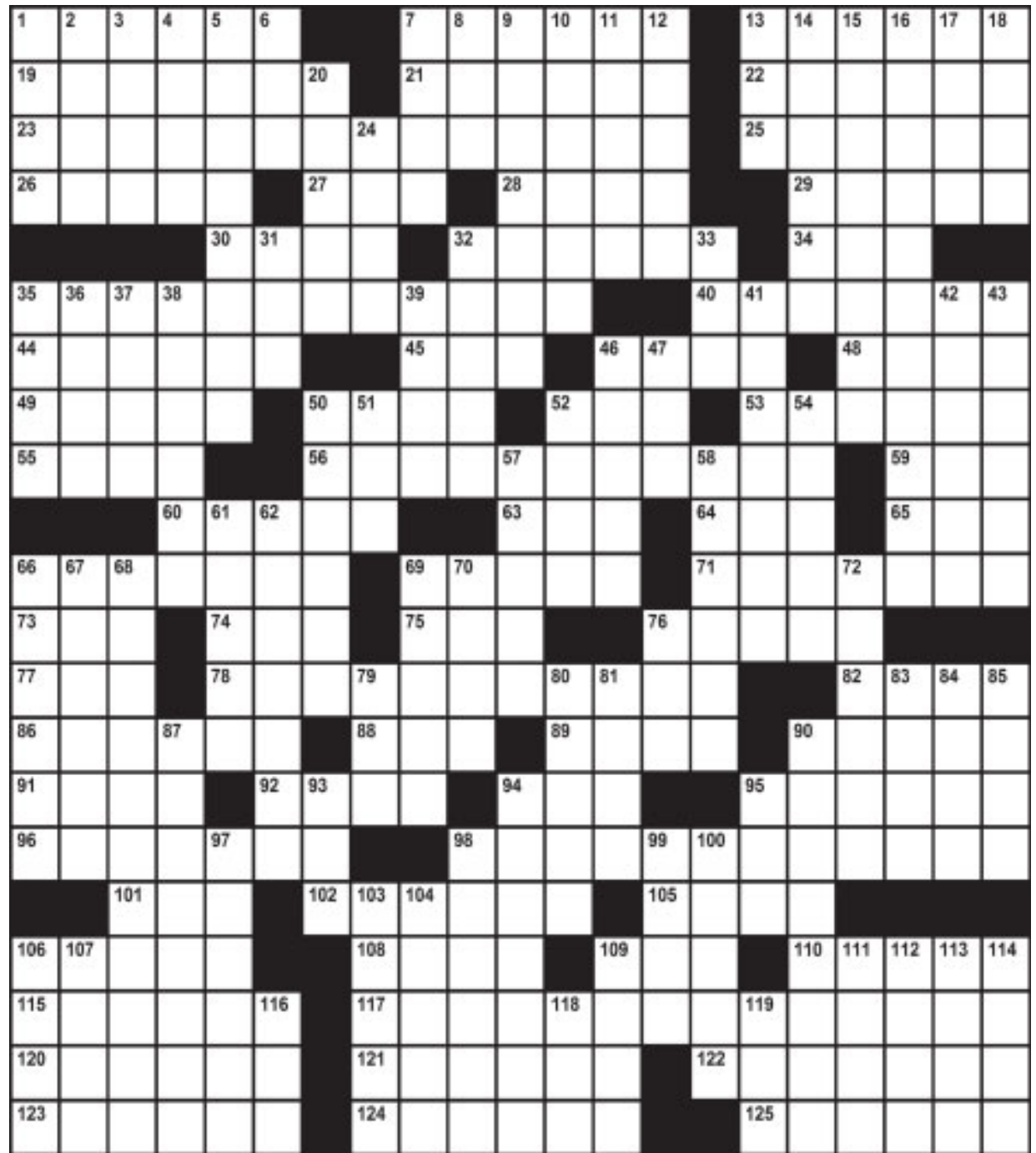

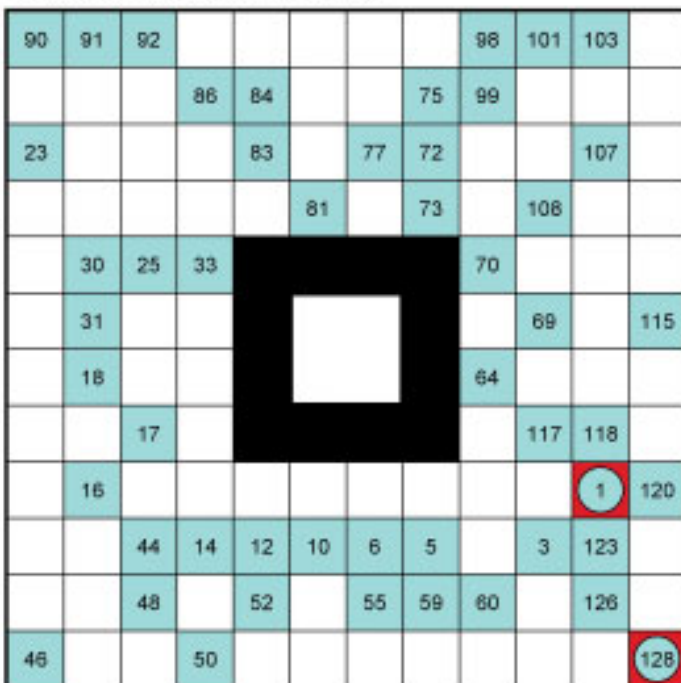

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Off the SHELF

Robert Harris is a 53-year-old former British journalist who turned to writing books. The last two of his novels are the first in a thrilling trilogy about the Roman statesman Cicero.

I remember Cicero well, having translated his magnificent diatribe against Cataline during my junior year in high school. A more towering example of prolonged invective is not to be found in any literature in the world.

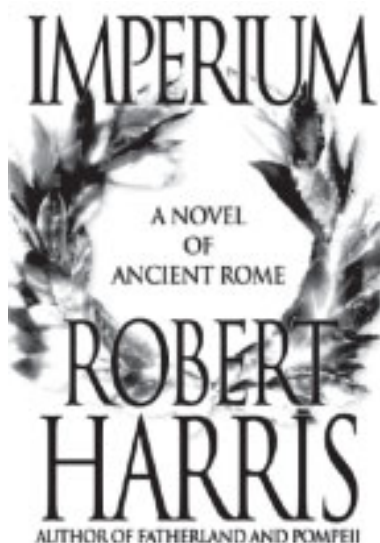
"How long, O Cataline, will you try our patience?" Cicero opened his oration at the Roman Senate in the classic historical speeches. By the time he had finished, all of Cataline's unsavory gang of supporters had quietly moved away from him until he

was sitting alone in disgrace.

The first book of the trilogy is *Imperium* (Arrow Books, Hutchinson, London, 2006). The story is narrated by 100-year-old Tiro, Cicero's slave and private secretary. Historically, Tiro had indeed penned a biography of Cicero which was lost in the fall of the Roman Empire.

Tiro first accompanies the sickly 27-year-old Cicero on a tour of Athens, Egypt and Asia Minor to learn the arts of oratory. When he returns to Rome, Cicero is on the road to becoming the robust, crafty, towering statesman of history. Cicero had neither wealth nor a glorious family name but he persevered over the aristocrats in championing the common man. Tiro observes him in action among the "new men", the first in their families to win election to the Senate:

"These were his people, and observing him treading his way among them that afternoon was like watching a master-craftsman



in his studio, a sculptor with his stone... He would seem to have all the hours of the day to listen to [a man's] dreary story but then you would see his hand flicker out and catch some passer-by, and he would spin as gracefully as a dancer, with the tenderest backward glance of apology and regret, to work on someone else."

Cicero's biggest challenge is taking up the case against Verres, the corrupt and violent former governor of Sicily. Among his many witticisms is: "The fellow gives corruption a bad name." When the ambitious Crassus, the wealthiest man in Rome, summons Cicero to a meeting, he laments to Tiro: "So Crassus will pose the question: 'Are you with me or against me?' and then I shall face the politician's worst nightmare: the requirement to give a straight answer."

Arrayed against him is the wealth of Crassus and the power of Pompey the Great and the full force of the aristocracy. At the trial of Verres, supposedly a foregone conclusion given all the bribes spread around, Cicero beats them all with his cunning and surprise oratory and ascends at the climax of the novel to the consulship, the highest office of Rome.

Watching the election by the tribes in voting pens on the Field of Mars, Tiro is moved to reflect:

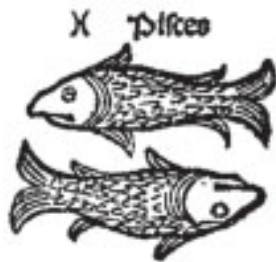
"This was the old republic in action, the men all voting in their allotted centuries, just as they had in ancient times when as soldiers they had elected their commander. Now that the ritual has become meaningless, it is hard to convey how moving a spectacle it was even for a slave such as I, who did not have the franchise. It embodied something marvelous – some impulse of the human spirit that had sparked into life half a millennium before among that indomitable race who dwelled amid the hard rocks and soft marshland of the Seven Hills towards the light of dignity and freedom, and away from the darkness of brute subservience."

The second book of the trilogy, *Lustrum*, will carry the story forward for five more years after Cicero is elected consul. As he struggles to prevent his beloved republic from sliding into an empire, he will face a far more formidable opponent than Cataline: Julius Caesar.

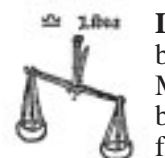

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Cause for change from two-wheeled casualties

Apart from the obvious need to fit all taxis and tuk-tuks on the island with meters, another pressing topic emerged during last month's meeting between Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop and Phuket's 16 honorary consuls: the need to improve the island's vehicle rental industry, especially for motorcycles.

Casualty figures alone justify the need to keep inexperienced, unlicensed and often inebriated motorcyclists off Phuket roads. In a single day last week, six people perished in motorbike accidents in Phuket, most of them while still in their youth. [See page 1]

According to police statistics for January, 18 people died in Phuket in 362 accidents, 219 involving motorbikes. There were also 321 people injured and property damages estimated at over 2.1 million baht.

Nurses in the West refer to the two-wheeled conveyances not as motorcycles but as 'donorcycles' because so many of the dead are young, healthy people killed instantly from head trauma, making them perfect candidates for organ donation.

As in so many other areas regarding tourist safety in Phuket, an instant improvement could be realized by simply enforcing existing laws. Anyone operating a motorbike in Thailand is legally required to be in possession of a valid Thai motorcycle license. Yet this law is seldom enforced, and when it is the riders simply pay a fine before driving off.

Scores of motorbike rental companies in Phuket rent out bikes to anyone willing to turn over their passport as surety. Many of these outfits, including some run by policemen, fail to warn foreign customers that they could face fines. Problems worsen when it turns out they don't have their passports when stopped at a police checkpoint or – even worse – when they are involved in an accident.

The rental companies are also happy to rent out motorbikes to fellow Thais, provided they hand over a Thai ID card. At as little as 150 baht a day, rental motorbikes are the vehicles of choice among criminals, who use them to carry out snatch-and-run crimes and other forms of thievery and thuggery.

As it is unlikely that police will ever crack down on companies that hold riders' passports or rent out bikes to people without Thai licenses, perhaps the law should be changed to allow foreign motorbike riders to ride legally in Thailand on foreign motorcycle licenses.

An even better approach to keeping foreign tourists off motorbikes would be to provide them with the kind of safe, reasonably priced transport options that exist in Thailand's 75 other provinces.

The ad depicted a man of African descent wearing a butler's uniform. The products this smiling 'negro' was advertising? Mops, brushes, dustpans and sponges.

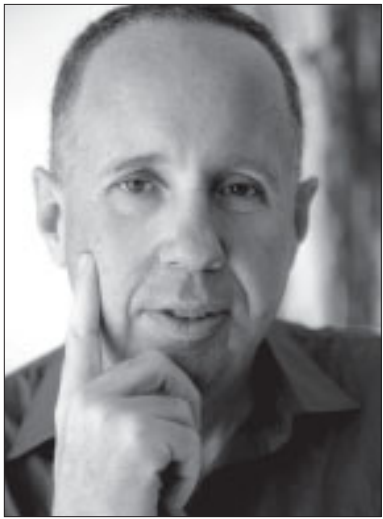
I am utterly shocked at this racist and thoroughly offensive association between black people and menial labor.

The imperialism behind travel advice

He has a lifetime of experience in hotel and asset management and has lived in Asia for 25 years in at least 12 different countries. In 1991, he was the first American hotel executive to manage a property in post-war Vietnam and is now a regular commentator on CNBC, BBC, CNN, regional news and financial publications.

It's been a very long time since the phrase 'the sun never sets on the British Empire' was in vogue, but news that Britain has issued an advisory for travelers to Thailand brings the phrase to mind.

The advisory, issued from Bangkok by British Ambassador Quinton Quayle, advised UK citizens living in the Kingdom as follows: "The political situation in Thailand is tense and uncertain... British citizens should exercise great caution throughout Thailand."

It furthermore urged UK nationals to "stay indoors and monitor the media and this website" on February 26, when the Supreme Court will rule on the fate of 76 billion baht in assets seized from companies linked to former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra.

In a country like Thailand that has struggled to recover from both the political events and economic crises of the past two years, the alarmist mentality of foreign missions abroad could be conceived as careless, with the potential to inflict unnecessary damage to a recovering tourism industry.

As I write this, overseas news headlines tell the tale of a deranged man in the US who has 'gone postal' and crashed an

airplane into a US tax office building in Texas. The report notes that while Air Force fighter jets were scrambled, this 'clearly was not a terrorist attack'. Western news media were clearly careful not to create panic or perceptions that the incident was anything more than a domestic crime.

The web is full of crime statistics covering every blood-stained corner of the globe. A read of the 'United Nations Survey on Crime Trends' shows that in terms of number of crimes per 1,000 population, the United Kingdom ranked sixth, with 85.5 per 1,000 people. The United States, which has also issued an advisory, came in eighth at 80.0 per 1,000. Thailand, by comparison, was ranked 45th, with just 8.8 crimes per 1,000 citizens.

Perhaps danger is in the eye of the beholder. For the British man stabbed a few weeks ago during an Aston Villa FA Cup Clash, this was clearly just a case of over enthusiastic fan support. Roll back to the 1985 tragedy where 39 fans were crushed to death in Brussels in a match between Liverpool and Juventus. Danger unfortunately comes in many guises in this world, but the question remains: was the same high level warning issued to footie fans in the UK and Europe

asking them to stay home and not travel to matches?

The staid colonial ambitions of the developed West, with its xenophobic and dubious double-standard of protecting unfortunate third-world countries for democracy, unfortunately still seem to apply to Asia today.

Despite Asia leading the world recovery after the recent global economic crisis, it still remains an uninvited guest at the elite cocktail parties attended by those who fancy themselves the world's true rulers.

There is no need to go into detail over how the miserable attempts – by those who consider themselves answerable only to a higher calling – to save Iraq and Afghanistan have played out. Clearly the perceived God-given right to meddle with lives of people in countries far from their own borders, together with some sort of outdated manifest destiny, remain at play even in today's world.

As I type this, I can see a new email has arrived from the US Embassy in Thailand. Written in a similar tone to its British counterpart, it also warns my fellow Americans of impending disaster.

In reality, probably the Bangkok diplomatic corps most pressing danger is getting a bad

oyster while attending a cocktail party in one of the capital's luxury hotels. Americans might recall the three days it took to evacuate 20,000 people trapped inside the New Orleans Superdome in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina; this despite perceptions that some sort of warm protective blanket of safety and security cover us all when we are safe inside our national borders.

In days past travel advisories were reserved for countries in the midst of civil war, famine or plague. While in today's age of instant media gratification, breaking news and, yes, TMZ, at the blink of an eye we become almost anesthetized to a world of suffering and bleak prospects. Western countries' increasing propensity to issue warnings all too often equate to the little boy who cried wolf. While you can accept this in children, accountability and respect for a nation's sovereign rights and self determination seem to be missing from the equation.

There is little doubt about the grave nature of the current situation in Thai politics, and indeed the fate of the current government of Abhisit Vejjajiva remains precarious. But anyone can see the new rash of warnings merely play into the hands of Thaksin Shinawatra. In the age old story, the

West's do-gooders have become strange bedfellows of the deposed prime minister and his media-driven frenzy to regain power.

Perhaps it's time for developed nations to abandon these attempts to regain lost glory. Time to stand aside and let events and the democratic process take their course, instead of using influence to pursue an agenda wildly different from that of the citizens of this country.

Having lived in Asia for 25 years in at least 12 countries, I can't point to a single instance when I felt more threatened than when walking around certain parts of East Los Angeles or London. I've never received a travel advisory when landing at LAX or Heathrow, though statistically the chances of becoming a victim of crime are far greater in those places than here.

My only advice to those sending out these clumsy messages while claiming 'I'm from your country and I'm here to help' is to apply such thinking to your own backyard. Those who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones. Unlike the days of old, the sun does set in Thailand, but one thing for sure is that unlike the gladly forgotten fallen empires, it's going to come up again tomorrow. I'm sure of that.

I want to buy a house and live in Thailand. Can I do so legally?

I live in Iran and like Thailand very much. I would like to buy a house in your country. I plan to spend part of the year in Thailand and the rest in Iran.

Under the law, am I allowed to buy a house in Thailand? If so, how do I do it?

An officer at Phuket Provincial Land Office replies:

Under the Condominium Act, foreigners are permitted to buy condominium apartment units freehold in their own name in Thailand. However, not more than 49 percent of the total unit floor space of all units in a condominium complex can be foreign-owned. In addition, foreigners can not own land in Thailand unless they own a Thai company and buy the house in the company's name.

Can I sue my employer?

My employer released me from work without a written or verbal termination in order to bypass labor laws and the provisions of my employment contract. Then he canceled my work permit without notifying me, although I still possess the document. What is my legal situation with regards to my visa and compensation? Is this still the responsibility of the labor department?

An officer at Phuket Provincial Labor Protection and Welfare Office replies:

Normally to cancel a work permit, both employer and employee must be present. As your employer has already canceled your work permit without telling you, you cannot work for another company until you go to the Labor Department and cancel the work permit yourself. If you want to sue the company you must obtain verbal or written proof that the company has terminated your employment. You can launch proceedings at our office. The case will take around 60 working days from when we get the order to proceed. You must bring a translator when you come to see us.

BENEATH THE WAVES

There's been something that I've been meaning to get off my chest for some time, but I've always been a bit embarrassed to admit it.

As a dive instructor who has spent a large part of his diving life in Thailand, training and working, as well as living in Phuket for the past year or so, what I'm about to tell you might come as a bit of a shock.

Here goes. Until last month, I had never, ever, been to the Similan Islands.

There, I said it.

I can imagine the sharp intakes of breath all round the island as people come to terms with such a shocking revelation... Or perhaps not.

It is, however, quite shameful that I had never been to the best dive location in Thailand until the last remaining days of the previous decade, especially given how much I love diving and the amount of time I've been in the area.

As the remaining days of 2009 dwindled, I decided that something must be done to rectify this glaring omission from my diving CV and sought the aid of some close friends to accompany me on my journey.

Before we knew it, we were heading out on a five-day, five-night trip around Thailand's premier dive destination.

First, a bit of background knowledge for those of you who aren't familiar with the Similan Islands.

The Similans are a group of nine islands in the Andaman Sea off the coast of Phang Nga. The name 'Similan' is derived from Yawi, a dialect of the Malay language spoken in the southernmost provinces of Thailand along the border with Malaysia, and means 'nine', reflecting the number of islands in the archipelago.

In a bid to protect the precious underwater habitats, the islands were given national park status in 1982; divers must pay a national park fee for the privilege of diving there.

On the east side of the islands, scuba enthusiasts get to enjoy gentle sloping coral reefs with sandy patches, while the topog-

raphy alters dramatically on the west side and divers cruise past colossal, towering monolithic boulders. The positioning of the rocks provides ample opportunities for divers to discover narrow swim

throughs – an exciting aspect of recreational diving.

As well as being home to two types of topography, the Similans is known for its variety of marine life. Fans of pelagic species, otherwise known as 'the big stuff' – sharks, rays, tuna, barracuda and more – will be in for a treat if a trip to the Similans is planned at the right time of year.

Of all the pelagics, manta rays and whale sharks are best known to get hearts racing more than any other species.

Manta rays tend to treat the islands as their personal playground from December until mid-April.

On our trip, we were treated to some acrobatic fly-bys by a couple of these magnificent creatures.

Encounters with the world's largest fish, whale sharks, are thought to be most common in

this part of the world in April and May, although sightings are possible in the early months of the year.

Divers who prefer the smaller things in life – macro – will also be kept happy. The reefs and pinnacles are also home to some of the sea's weird and wonderful creatures, including frogfish, harlequin shrimps, seahorses and nudibranches, to name but a few.

In between these two extremes, thousands of colorful reef fish, as well as a handful of turtles, mill around the hard and soft corals, gargantuan gorgonian fans and colossal boulders, creating a sensational kaleidoscope of color.

Given that we had five days and five nights, we were able to cover all of the best sites the Similan Islands has to offer. Dive sites included the magnificently named 'Elephant Head Rock', 'Deep Six', 'East and West of Eden', Koh Bon, the Boonsong wreck, which has sat on the seafloor for no less than 25 years, and Koh Tachai.

But no dive trip to the Similans would be complete without an excursion to Richelieu Rock, the undisputed number one dive site in these waters. Named after the only foreign commander of the Thai Navy, Richelieu Rock isn't actually part of the Similans, but instead belongs to the Surin Islands.

Its reputation as a world-class dive site precedes itself and it doesn't disappoint. Coated in soft corals, Richelieu Rock rises up from a depth of 35m to just below the surface at high tide. The site is home to a huge amount of life and is well known for reasonably frequent visitations by whale sharks and manta rays.

Unfortunately, neither of the two turned up and the site was packed with divers, but despite these setbacks it still made for a memorable dive.

On the 18 dives that I did, I was able to see the aforementioned manta rays, a leopard shark, turtles, barracuda, tunas, false stonefish, frogfish, seahorses, ornate ghost pipefish and nudibranches among other things during the day, as well as some interesting crabs, squat lobsters, octopi and more on the night dives.

My personal highlight was witnessing the courting of a female octopus by a male in an attempt to mate. As if to prove that life below the surface rarely differs from life above, his advances were rebuffed and the female scarpered.

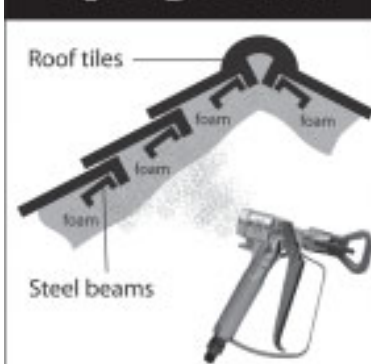
After not diving very frequently in 2009, the opportunity to get some nitrogen flowing through my veins was greatly received.

The weather was good; the diving was great and the trip to the Similans made for a fantastic mini-break.

It took me 28 and a half years to get to the Similans; I guarantee I'll return much sooner than that.

In keeping with the tradition of one of Phuket's most recognizable trademarks – the Hua Tong boat, commonly used as the body for longtail boats – the 6th annual Hua Tong's Boat Paddling competition brought out the best in the area's boatsmen for a weekend of competitive racing on February 5 and 6. The competition was held at Ao Por Pier in Pa Khlok.

Pa Khlok co-ordinated the race with nine villages whose residents commonly use Hua Tong boats for fishery and traveling. They are commonly used in the Andaman Sea and are found in most parts of Krabi, Phuket, and the islands throughout the area.

The opening ceremony was presided by Vice Governor Smith Palawatwichai on the morning of the February 5, with racing beginning shortly after. Eighteen teams, each with ten male paddlers, participated in the competition. Two additional teams of women competed, also with 10 paddlers each.

Team Sam Chong was the first place winner, which earned them 6,000 baht and a trophy presented by H.E. Mayor General Privy Pijit Kullavanij. Team Sea Food Laem Lang Restaurant came in second place and received 4,000 baht and a trophy from Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngob, while third place went to Krua Chumchon Bang

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Tin mining traditions cast in bronze

Bill Bensley is a legend in design circles around Southeast Asia. Trained as a landscape architect with a graduate degree in Architecture and Landscape Design from Harvard University, he moved to Southeast Asia to work with noted Thai architect Lek Bunnag, who had been his primary design influence while studying at Harvard.

"I was fortunate to win a full scholarship to Harvard in 1981 based on my proposal to build a completely self sufficient green community. It won a nationwide design competition."

Bill and Lek Bunnag have worked together on projects in Thailand, Indonesia and China, ranging from five-star resorts to private residences but today, he works out of his own compound, Bensley Design Studios, which employs 65 Thai architects, 30 interior designers and 20 landscape architects. His work is in demand around the world.

"We get at least one proposal a day for our work. It is very gratifying to see the interest in what we do."

On Phuket, Bill was the creative hand that transformed the Pearl Village into the stylish, award-winning Indigo Pearl Resort at Nai Yang Beach. Though the property has been opened for a few years, Bill keeps an active interest in the resort. Currently, he has been donating his talents to raise funds for the Phuket Sunshine Village, a local project which provides a home for local children, many affected by the 2004 tsunami.

"I've fashioned ten different bronze sculptures which pay homage to the tin mining industry. I spent four years researching the tin mining business while designing the Indigo Pearl and these bronze figures represent many of the activities of the workers."

Bill has used art deco design to fashion the figures. It's a design period he admires and the results are dynamic action figures that would suit large installations around Phuket.

He has fashioned three sets of the ten sculptures which are being held in a silent auction. A top bid of 45,000 baht assures the bidder their choice of sculpture but lower bids are accepted and the highest bid received by February 28 will be accepted. The project is expected to raise one million baht.

Bill designed the iconic Hotel de la Paix in Siem Reap, Cambodia, which gave the small town an international presence. He established his own charity, the Shintamani Foundation, which is building a hotel training school to help raise local workers out of poverty. He fashioned Khmer themed sculptures based on historic figures and auctioned them to support his foundation.

His work blends historic with modern influences. He has designed the landscape for Phuket's Moevenpick, the Marriott Resort and Spa and most recently, created a water village at the Anantara Resort at Mai Khao Beach.

Now Bill is spreading his creative influence far from Asia. He has his first project in Turkey and is designing a resort village in Puerto Rico. But his home is here in Thailand and we can expect to see a lot more of his work around Phuket in the years to come.

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Femme fatales and lethal lovelies

A look at the world of poisonous plants

Recently a reader from New Zealand wrote a letter to the Phuket Gazette about the poisonous propensities of *Nerium oleander* [yeeto]. I had spoken of its toxicity in an earlier piece, saying how goats near my Spanish garden – and goats will eat almost anything – refused to touch my oleander hedge.

But I had not reiterated these concerns in the article she had read. Quite properly, she wanted readers to know just how toxic the oleander can be, citing the case of a family who became seriously ill after inhaling smoke from a bonfire containing oleander clippings. Highly poisonous. Even the sap can give you a nasty rash.

Of course, when you are stocking a garden, one of many decisions facing you will be whether or not to include poisonous shrubs. It is, of course, a personal choice and may well depend on whether or not you have young children. But one of the extraordinary things about tropical plants is that they are, for the most part, either toxic or edible.

Some plants here – cassava for example – have it both ways: they are both poisonous when raw, and safe to eat when

cooked. While those of us who hail from temperate climes know that little gathered on a European nature ramble will be edible – apart from blackberries and a range of autumnal nuts – we also know that almost nothing we encounter will be seriously poisonous, apart from the glossy purple berries of the deadly nightshade [*Atropa belladonna*].

A few toxic plants such as the foxglove [genus *Digitalis*], hemlock or dogbane, and deadly fungi such as the fly agaric do exist, but Europeans know well enough not to sample them. When the Greek philosopher Socrates was ordered to eat hemlock seeds, he did so in the certain knowledge that they were going to do him in.

Not so in Thailand. Lost in a rainforest, you would hardly die of starvation: many of the hybrid plants that are cultivated here also exist as species in tropical jungles – bananas, mangoes, sator, durian. You could even survive on emerging shoots of bamboo. But you might very well die, and not just from a cobra or krait bite, but from ignorance, from ingesting the wrong bits of the wrong plant.

To return to the oleander: It is only one of a whole family of toxic shrubs to be found in Thailand. Indeed, most of the *apocynaceae* or dogbane genus come into play here, including two of my favorites: *Allamanda cathartica* or yellow trumpet, and *Thevetia peruviana*, an even closer relative of the *Nerium oleander*. Both contain indoid lactone, a potentially fatal cathartic.

If you do decide to grow them – as I have – remember to avoid contact with the milky latex when pruning the shrub's excesses, and also try to refrain from burning any branches you have lopped off.

Another plant to be careful of is the genus *Alocasia* [elephant ear], the monstrous member of the

philodendron clan that grows everywhere in Thailand where there is moisture and filtered protection from the sun. Literally thousands line the mountain road between Kata and Rawai.

I planted a number in my garden in an endeavor to create patches of shade – a tactic that has only partly succeeded, since their natural habitat is marshy jungle. But elephant ear is also extremely poisonous and if you cut off those dramatic, sail-like leaves, remember to wash your hands, lest you come out in a rash.

Alocasia is sometimes kept as a house plant in Europe and America because its natural environment is dark and cool. It is for this reason that many other understory plants from tropical forests are grown commercially, both in European hothouses and under plastic netting in Thai garden centers.

I am thinking, for example, of the spectacular *Brugmansia* or *Datura* with their magnificent pendulous trumpets, the large genus of *Philodendrons* such as the heart's leaf cultivar popular in homes, and the variegated *Dieffenbachia* [dumbcane]. Interestingly, all are poisonous: the heart's leaf philodendron contains calcium oxalate; most of the others, potent alkaloids. If eaten, all can prove fatal. The reason why *Dieffenbachia* has the popular name of dumbcane is because it can cause swelling of parts of the mouth, loss of speech and asphyxiation.

The Madagascar Periwinkle [*Catharanthus roseus*] is a charming little

flower related to the indigo blue vinca that lights up European hedgerows. Its pink or white flowers are a familiar presence here: the plant flourishes everywhere in the most unlikely sandy and saline soils.

Grown mainly as a herbaceous or border sub-shrub, it looks harmless enough, but its glossy leaves contain those same alkaloids that are present in so many other dangerous plants. Odd then that the oleander hawk moth caterpillars in my garden will eat nothing else. Only periwinkles and a bunch of oleander.

But toxic plants are not without their attractions to humanoids as well as caterpillars. As well as looking splendid, a significant number – and I am not suggesting for a moment that you sample them – produce hallucinogenic effects when ingested in substantial quantities: morning glory, the aforementioned *Datura*, and a lot more I had probably better not mention by name.

But significantly – much more significantly – the chemicals in most of these poisonous plants also provide a range of treatments for all sorts of ailments, for various forms of cancer and heart disease, for diabetes and more mundanely for intestinal upsets and infections.

A final thought: It is always worth remembering that that our gardens are much more dangerous than we think...

Forget the serpents in Eden: they're unlikely to come and talk to us. Just make sure your children don't get too friendly with these plants.

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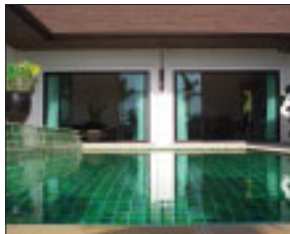

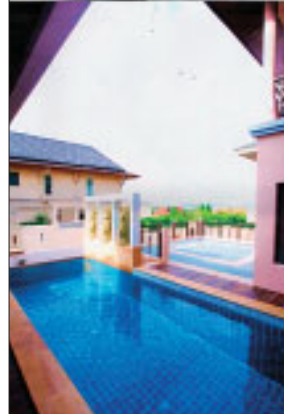

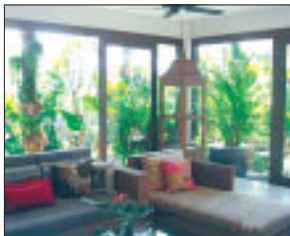
