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UK warns against travel to Thailand

HILE local tourism officials continue to insist Phuket is safe, the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) has advised against all but essential travel to all parts of Thailand.

The FCO's previous advice focused on Bangkok, where "redshirt" protesters have occupied parts of the city for six weeks.

The FCO said its new advice "reflects our concern that violence could break out during the increasingly volatile political crisis."

"The situation is changing on a daily basis, and we recommend that British nationals living in Thailand or traveling to the country check the travel advice on the Embassy website regularly for details of further developments," the advisory said.

The FCO move came after acts of civil disobedience and disorder spread out of the capital to parts of the North and Northeast over the past week.

Nevertheless, Bangornrat Shinaprayoon, director of the Tourism Authority of Thailand's South Region 4 office in Phuket, insisted the province was safe. "We don't have any political disturbances here," she said.

Phuket Tourist Police Superintendent Ekachai Pramanakul agreed. "In Phuket there's no conflict about politics," he said. "It's only in Bangkok and

other parts of the North and Northeast of Thailand."

Ms Bangornrat said she didn't expect the advisory to have much effect on tourism. "Now is not the season for UK tourists to come to Phuket anyway," she said.

But Wolfgang Meusberger, general manager of the Holiday Inn in Patong, said his hotel was already feeling the effects of the protests in Bangkok.

"I cannot imagine anyone who can claim this situation does not affect their business. Forward bookings are down, cancellations are up, people are not making decisions at the moment to take

a holiday here," he said, adding that the advisory would have its own impact.

"I think it's not surprising," he said. "I think governments are getting extremely concerned and I think they do what they feel is in the best interests of their citizens."

Mr Meusberger said regardless of the situation in Bangkok, many tourists would not want to risk coming to Phuket.

"We can't say 'don't worry, come to Phuket, Phuket is safe.' Even if it is so, that's not how the customer sees it. The customer watches the news and sees a different picture," he said.

"I think all of us who live here need to be worried because this is quite extraordinary," he concluded.

Finance Minister Korn Chatikavanij, in Phuket on April 28 for a meeting with local leaders on shoring up tourism, said the red-shirt protests were having a worse effect on the industry than the closure of Bangkok's airports last year.

"This time more than 10 countries have made announcements warning their people not to come to Thailand," he said.

Mr Korn said the UK announcement was significant as more than 10 million UK citizens visited Thailand every year.

Work on Bt2.6bn conference center to go ahead

FINANCE Minister Korn Chatikavanij has confirmed the government will move ahead with construction of a 2.6-billion-baht international convention and exhibition center on 150 rai in Tah Chat Chai.

The land is currently held by the Treasury Department's State Property Management and Services Office.

The project gained Cabinet approval under the second phase of the government's Thai *Khem*-

kheng (Strong Thailand) fiscal stimulus package.

A Cabinet meeting on April 27 agreed to disburse the funds near the end of the year to allow time to complete the project's environmental impact assessment.

Mr Korn was in Phuket to meet with local officials to discuss the impact of the ongoing red-shirt protests in Bangkok on the local tourism industry.

Phuket Lifeguards back on the beaches

IGHTY-three lifeguards began manning 13 Phuket beaches on April 26, after the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (PPAO) signed a service contract with the Phuket Lifeguard Club.

All lifeguards will work from 9am to 7pm daily for two weeks, then enjoy one day off a week each after that.

Jit Chairat, who mans the lifeguard station at Patong Beach in front of the Graceland Phuket resort, said "We work until late every evening to make sure there's no one left in the sea."

During work hours, all lifeguards must stay within 10 meters of the water and walk the shoreline every hour making thorough inspections.

Flagpoles at each lifeguard station advise swimmers of conditions. Yellow flags indicate that

IGHTY-three lifeguards there are lifeguards on duty and began manning 13 Phuket conditions are safe enough for swimming.

Red flags indicate that it is unsafe to swim or that there are no lifeguards on duty.

The Phuket Lifeguard Club has done away with the green flags that were used in the past to indicate it is safe to swim.

The deployment of the lifeguards comes with the arrival of the monsoon season, when surf conditions worsen and the frequency of drownings increases.

Although the arrival of the monsoon season changes from year to year and dangerous conditions can occur year round, it generally runs from May through October. This is also the period when the Similan and Surin Marine National Parks are closed to tourists.

Finance Minister Korn hears Phuket's woes

Hotel bookings for June plummet to 12%

Pluket on April 28 to hear how gravely Phuket's tourism and the local economy had been affected by the ongoing Bangkok unrest, which has seen hotel bookings for June plummet to 12 percent occupancy.

Finance Minister Korn, accompanied by Revenue Department Director-General Vinai Vittavasgarnvej, was also prepared to take on board any suggestions on how the impact on the economy could be alleviated.

Representing Phuket at the meeting were Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop, Phuket Senator Phummisak Hongsyok, and heads of several local tourism and other industry associations.

The meeting was hosted by the Hilton Phuket Arcadia Resort & Spa in Karon.

Methee Tanmanatrakul, representing the Thai Hotels Association (Southern Chapter) suggested the government fund a campaign promoting tourism to restore tourist confidence in Thailand and the Andaman region in particular.

Mr Methee pointed out that since the red shirts demonstrations began in March, hotel bookings have plunged. Normal occupancy rate of 50 percent for May is currently only 19 percent, he said, adding that bookings for

June stood at 12 percent and that the rate of bookings was expected to continue to fall.

Pisarn Trangsombat of the Phuket Real Estate Club called on the government to provide financial relief through tax breaks, suggesting that business tax be cut from 3.3 percent to 0.11 percent. He also asked that steps be taken to stop construction material prices from escalating.

He called on banks to slash interest rates on business loans by two percent and be less restrictive in the requirements needed by SMEs to qualify for loans.

Looking to the long-term, Mr Pisarn called for the government to support a 30 percent reduction in all domestic air, train, and bus fares within two years to help boost Thai tourism within the kingdom.

He added that he will take the suggestions presented at the meeting back to Bangkok to see what progress could be made, especially with regard to business tax and bank loans.

Police launch firearm crackdown

HUNG Thong Police are hoping to cut violent crime in their district by cracking down on the illegal possession of firearms.

Thung Thong Police Superintendent Kraithong Chanthongbai said there is a particularly high concentration of unauthorized people carrying weapons in tambon Kathu.

Many people living in Kathu work nights in Patong as touts and bar workers and arm themselves for self-protection. Such people tend to rent houses in Kathu as it

is near Patong but has lower living costs.

In addition to searching people, Thung Thong police aim to document all legally-held weapons and wipe out gun crime by getting illegal weapons off the streets

All people found to be holding weapons illegally will be prosecuted, Col Kraithong said.

"We are operating the Thung Thong police checkpoint near Patong Hill early mornings to search people returning from late-night work in Patong. "We will disarm them as part of our crime suppression effort, as crime can easily happen when guns are around," said Col Kraithong

"We have some information about 10-20 people who illegally carry firearms, but we need evidence to press charges. These people are not gunmen. They just have weapons for protection, but we need to act before something bad happens," he said.

Most of those suspected were not from Phuket, but from places like Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Phattalung and Surat Thani, he said.

Most recently, a native of Nakhon Sri Thammarat was gunned down over Songkran after returning from Patong, where he worked as a tout on Soi Seadragon.

The victim appeared to have drawn his own 9mm pistol in an unsuccessful bid to fire back at his assailants.

Kathu Police Duty Officer Attawat Suwanrat said the investigation is still underway. "We need to investigate further and collect more evidence. We hope to get a suspect soon," he said.

Gov lobbies for lower airport taxi fees


N a bid to lower taxi fares on the island, Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop is lobbying to reduce fees for limousines operating out of Phuket International Airport (PIA).

Land Transport Department Director Kanok Siripanichkorn said Gov Wichai sent a letter to Airports of Thailand (AoT) management in Bangkok requesting a meeting with those responsible for setting concession charges.

Gov Wichai is seeking an explanation as to why the rates are so high and wants to discuss the possibility of a reduction.

Two concessionaires currently operate limousines from the airport. Phuket Airport Limousine and Business Cooperative Ltd (PBC) has 150 vehicles and pays 1.3 million baht monthly to AoT, while rival operator Phuket Mai Khao Sakoo has 110 vehicles and pays 900,000 baht monthly.

There are also 62 metered taxis currently operating out of the airport parking lot. All passengers hiring metered taxis there are required to pay an extra 100 baht, pushing the price of a typical journey to Patong to 420 baht.

paid 70,000 baht in monthly concessions to AoT when it started and its fee is still under 100,000 baht, according to an informed source.

Among the many associations seeking a reduction in the concessions is the Phuket Chamber of Commerce (PCC), which wants concession fees at PIA cut in half.

PCC President Dr Sirichai Silapa-archa last month described the current fees as 'excessive' and charged AoT with driving up fares across Phuket.

Speaking at a provincial economic committee meeting at The Meter Taxi Association Phuket Provincial Hall, Dr

Sirichai also said having meters in all hired vehicles in Phuket was essential to boost the local tourism industry. "In Phuket there are no standard fares, so taxi and tuktuk rides are expensive. This makes getting around inconvenient and makes tourists and other passengers feel they are being unfairly treated," he said.

Dr Sirichai said a committee should be established to determine and implement an appropriate fare structure.

The panel should include Land Transport Department officials as well as operators and users, including resorts and other tourism businesses, he said.

Also at the meeting was Phuket Provincial Administration Organization President Paiboon Upatising, who said he agreed with Dr Sirichai on meters and the need for AoT to slash its rates.

"These should be top priorities," he said.

PBC President Chukiat Panyawai said rates in Phuket were far more expensive than at Chiang Mai Airport.

"If the AoT agreed to reduce fees by 50%, that would be great. Then we could talk about lower prices for passengers and everyone would be happy," he said.

Police launch manhunt for victim's gay killer

43-YEAR-OLD man was found murdered in an apartment in Phuket Town on April 26.

Police believe Pirasak Pongchoo, from Phatthalung, may have been killed by his male partner for sleeping with another man.

Mr Pirasak's body was found wrapped in bedsheets in the toilet of his rented room on Wichit Songkram Road Soi 1 around 2:30pm.

His throat had been slit. There was blood on the floor next to the bed and a bloodstained knife on the floor beside a beer bottle.

There were no other signs a violent struggle had taken place.

Police estimated the time of death at about five days earlier.

An investigation revealed Mr Pirasak had been renting the room since April 4.

Witnesses told police that young men often came to drink with him in his room.

A group of men were seen entering and leaving his room the week before he died.

Police suspect Mr Pirasak may have been murdered by his "gik" (casual sex partner) after he slept with another man.

Police are seeking to question Mr Pirasak's partner and the other men in order to bring his killer or killers to justice.

Helmet crackdown

PHUKET Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong has ordered Phuket City Police to take more serious action against motorcyclists riding without helmets by fining passengers as well as drivers.

In May and June, the town's 50 traffic officers will crack down more heavily on motorcycle drivers without helmets and issue warnings to passengers. From July, passengers without helmets will face fines.

Maj Gen Pekad said police will strictly enforce the helmet law day and night, although nighttime checks will be conducted less frequently because of a lack of officers.

The Motorcycle Helmet Law states that both drivers and passengers not wearing helmets can be fined up to 500 baht.

Drivers caught transporting a passenger not wearing a helmet can also be fined 1,000 baht.

Maj Gen Pekad said the police have prepared about 3,000 helmets to give away free to offending drivers before the July crackdown begins.

Jet-ski death families settle

FTER several rounds of negotiations, the families of two young Singaporean men involved in a fatal jet-ski accident in Patong have finally reached a settlement.

The family of Tang Gun Han have agreed to pay \$\$100,000 to the family of Loh Ying Jie, who died in a hospital in Singapore on April 13 as a result of his injuries.

The two men were on holiday together when their jetskis collided off Patong Beach on April 2.

Both families went to the Kathu Police Station on April 21 to sign the agreement.

"Now it's up to the police," said Mr Loh's brother-in-law Tay Wee Chin. "We are not involved anymore."

A police investigation is underway to determine if the collision was an accident or the result of carelessness.

Kathu Police Superintendent Arayapan Pukbuakao said Mr Tang's passport is being held. Once the police investigation concludes the case will be forwarded to the prosecutor.

Should the prosecutor decide it was an accident, the

case will be closed within a month and Mr Tang will be allowed to go home. Otherwise the prosecutor will hold his passport and present the case to the courts, which could take up to a year, said Col Arayapan.

In an interview with the *Gazette*, Mr Loh's family spoke out about the negotiations between the two families, which they said were initiated by Kathu Police.

Mr Loh's family initially asked the Tangs to pay them \$\$500,000 (11.7 million baht).

That figure was based on long-term medical costs should the young man survive, said Mr Tav.

"We estimated around 15 years of medical costs, because we didn't know how long he was going to live. It ran up to be over a million Singapore dollars, but we thought that was quite a large amount. So that's why, in the first negotiations, we kept it at \$\$500,000," said Mr Tay.

Mr Tang's family said they could not afford that amount and made a counter-offer of \$\$100,000.

"At that time, we were still thinking of the long-term medical fees, so \$\$100,000 was definitely not enough. That's why we rejected that and the negotiations stopped and we went back to Singapore to look after my brother-in-law, who was still in the hospital at that time.

"He only managed to survive 10 days before he passed

away. That's why we had to come back here to renegotiate."

Soon after his arrival, doctors in Singapore told the family that Mr Loh was already brain dead and suggested turning off his life support. As it was only his second day there his family wanted to give the young man a chance to recover, said Mr Tay.

"He was still on the lifesupport system when his brain and body started deteriorating. So he died naturally, not because of the life-support system," Mr Tay continued.

"On our way to the hospital, the nurse called to say that his heart had actually stopped. The nurse told him, 'Your mom is coming, so please hang on,' and his heart started beating again. When we arrived, we managed to see the last few minutes of his life. Within five minutes he was gone."

The Loh family then reevaluated their compensation claim and asked the Tang family for \$\$100,000.

Mr Tay said medical expenses had come to S\$74,000, with the rest covering other costs since the accident.

"If you compare that to a life, I mean a life is definitely worth much more than S\$26,000. So they are very kind in saying they just want to claim S\$100,000 from them, close the case and let the boy go home," he said.

After intense negotiations over two days and Mr Loh's family enlisting the help of a Thai MP, Mr Tang's family agreed to pay the S\$100,000.

Phuket City Police Deputy Superintendent Jamroon Playduang said an initial report by bomb disposal experts indicated there was no evidence to suggest a bomb caused the fire.

Police are still awaiting a full report from Forensics Police Unit 44 in Phuket Town before concluding the case, he said.

"The owner said he had been driving the car all day and found it hard to believe that someone could have put something inside the car without his knowledge. He also told me he didn't have any enemies," he said.

The Forensics Police full report would probably take a month to complete, Lt Col Jamroon said.

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Are we ready for another tsunami?



arly last month, Phuket was given its most significant tsunami preparedness test in recent years – and came up lacking.

On April 7, the day an early morning quake struck in Sumatra, a professional in the field of emergency preparedness from the United States, Robert Fogerty, happened to be in Phuket studying the preparations made here since the 2004 tsunami disaster.

The warning was a perfect opportunity for Mr Fogerty to assess just how effective Phuket's system really is. His data reveals a system in vast need of improvement.

After a great deal of confusion regarding the actual status of the government-issued 'warning' on April 7, head of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Regional Center 18 (DDPM-Phuket), Mr Udomporn Karn, has confirmed that Phuket was under an evacuation order.

"There are three levels to warn of a tsunami disaster. Level one is just a warning. The second level calls for an evacuation, but not immediate; there is still time for packing. Level 3 is the highest alert and calls people to move out immediately, without any time to collect things," said Mr Udomporn.

"The [April 7] tsunami warning in Phuket was over level two, nearly reaching level three," he continued.

A surveyed conducted by Mr Fogerty in the following two weeks revealed that only one Patong hotel – the Horizon Beach Resort – actually evacuated its guests.

Mr Fogerty arrived on March 26 to study and compare evacuation preparations made by New Orleans in the five years since Hurricane Katrina to those of Phuket since the 2004 tsunami.

"Five years is a nice number to look back and ask, 'are we more prepared?' That's why I'm here," he said. As founder of the disaster relief organization evacuteer.org, which works with the US government and the City of New Orleans to help prevent a repeat of the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina in 2005, Mr Fogerty's job is to help prepare that city for future natural disasters

Starting the day of the warning, Fogerty began surveying people on Patong Beach to find out if they were evacuated – or even informed – of a potential tsunami. One hundred people staying in 35 different hotels were given a five-question survey.

Of the 100 people surveyed, 37 were in their hotel when the warning was issued on April 7. Of those 37, just three were actually notified of the tsunami warning.

"Two were notified in a common area after the threat had been canceled. One was actually woken up, evacuated and moved to higher ground," he said.

"That to me says we have some work to do with hotel GMs," he said.

Another part of the survey asked, "If there is a tsunami alert, no matter what the level, I want my hotel to notify me."

To this 88 percent strongly agreed, while not a single person disagreed.

Perhaps even more telling is the fact that 61 percent of those questioned first heard that a tsunami warning had been issued from Mr Fogerty as he was conducting the survey.

"In nearly every instance, they felt a bit disappointed that their hotels didn't notify them. I'd even go as far as to suggest that several of people I spoke to might think twice about returning to the hotel because they didn't get even an 'oh, by the way, there was a tsunami alert this morning."

Despite the lack of response during the evacuation, there are aspects of Phuket's warning system that Fogerty was quick to praise. Tsunami warning signs are noted by a fair number of people and the SMS (instant messaging) warning system was highly effective in getting word out to those who were subscribed to it, he said.

But there are still many challenges that need to be addressed if a successful evacuation is to be conducted in the event of an impending disaster, he feels.

One of these is getting around the 'tourist mindset' that seems to prevail in both Phuket and New Orleans and seems to be associated with a relative lack of concern with safety issues and preparedness.

This is something disaster relief programs need to accept and work into emergency planning measures, Mr Fogerty said.

While the majority of people surveyed had noticed evacuation signs, about one in four had not, even when one was in plain view at the time of questioning, Mr Fogerty said.

Another difficulty, and the primary reason hotels are

reluctant to order evacuations, are the consequences if the warning turns out to be a 'false alarm'. The 'better safe than sorry' attitude doesn't typically apply to hotels, which tend to not want to bother guests, he found.

Currently finishing his study in Phuket, Mr Fogerty is creating a list of suggestions for hotels that includes implementing policies that outline what to do in case of an evacuation order.

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
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Exam cheats caught with pants down

SURAT THANI: More than 40 would-be police officers were caught cheating on Police Region 8 entrance exams on April 25.

Most had modified mobile phones stuffed down their underpants.

Acting on a tip-off, officers used hand-held body scanners of the type used in airport security to check people entering examination halls in schools around Surat Thani.

Of 8,409 people checked, police found 44 people with mobile phones hidden on their person. Five were men with phones stuffed into their underpants.

At first, officers couldn't find mobile phones on women identified by the scanner. However, a thorough search by female police officers found many had modified Samsung e250i mobiles stashed away under sanitary pads in their underwear.

The phones had been modified to receive special signals causing them to vibrate.

Under interrogation, most of the would-be cheaters admitted they had gone for special tutoring at a school in Bangkok. While studying, they had been approached by a group offering to sell the mobile phones for 13,000-15,000 baht. If they passed the exams with the help of the signals supplied they had to pay a further 250,000 baht, police said.

Police Region 8 Commissioner Adul Chaimongkalarat said the people found cheating would be banned from taking the exam again and entered into a database of known exam cheaters.

The signals were sent from Bangkok, Gen Adul said. There was a large network behind the cheating ring, he added.

Many colors, many reasons to rally

BANGKOK: People joining 'multicolored' rallies against the red-shirt protests paralysing Bangkok say they want to express how the demonstrations have severely affected their everyday lives.

Most of those joining the multicoloured gatherings at Victory Monument last week said they were not affiliated with any political groups. Some warned of possible violence if the yellow shirts took to the streets.

The multicolored shirts, who include office workers, students and businessmen, gathered at Victory Monument every day from 4-6pm, most waving the Thai flag. Some take turns expressing their thoughts from a makeshift stage on a truck.

At 6pm, the participants sing the national anthem together,

after which they shout "Chaiyo" ("Victory") three times in unison.

Yaowarat Phisoljatupol, a 50-year-old Bangkok resident, said she had taken a passive interest in politics before, but had decided now was the time to express her views in the open.

"I have always followed political news and watched the red-shirt channel. I disagree with the red shirts' methods and their use of violence. I also want to protect our monarchy," she said.

Sermsuk Pakpises, an analyst at Kasikorn Bank, said he wants peace to be restored, as the red shirts' lingering protest at Bangkok's Rajprasong shopping district had adversely affected many businesses and their employees.

"Several offices were closed and their employees laid off. I want to see peace and safety," he said.

He did not think it was a good idea for the yellow-shirted members of the People's Alliance for Democracy (PAD) to join the multicolored rally, however.

"I think they have the right to do so, but there will be a higher risk of clashes between the pro- and anti-government groups. There could be more casualties," he said. Vanchai Narinthavanich said his office near the protest site had been closed over the past three weeks and his company was working from another location.

"We gather here to protect His Majesty. We oppose the use of violence and I call on people to oppose the activities of the red shirts," he said.

DJ Petchy of Awhatup Radio said he believed the 'rainbow shirts' were "doing the right thing for everybody" and "this movement is on the right track".

"We are against mob rule by the red-shirt protesters. I think we should give Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva a chance to continue running the country," he said.

Ann, a junior at Kasetsart University, said she and a friend joined the Victory Monument rally because they deplored the use of violence.

"I don't agree with the red shirts' ideology," she added.

The multicoloured movement was growing with more and more people showing up for its daily gatherings, she said.

She disagreed with yellow shirts attending. "There could be violence," she said.

Dr treats eye disease with magic, meat

PHITSANULOK: A grandmother in this northern province is offering cheap treatment for cataracts and other eye diseases using raw meat and Khmer spells.

Sixty-six-year-old Thin Chanto, know locally as Dr Tik, treats 20 to 30 people on an average day.

Dr Tik has no recognized medical qualifications. She started studying eye treatment at the age of 13 and studied spells from Cambodia for more than 15 years before becoming a truly accomplished healer.

As well as magic, Dr Tik's treatments use strips of raw beef. On an average day she uses around a kilo of beef, which she buys from the market and cuts into strips 3-5cm long. On a Buddhist holiday, she goes through as much as three kilos, treating up to 1,000 people.

Before using the meat she blesses it with a spell, throwing it away after each patient.

She places the strips over her patients' eyes for a couple of minutes and chants Khmer spells. This, apparently, relieves their suffering.

"How much people pay me depends on their faith," Dr Tik said. "Some give 20-30 baht, others 100 baht."

"Once a doctor from Naresuan University sent a nurse to watch my treatment. They didn't have any problems with it, they just told me to make sure everything was clean and to get new meat every day," Dr Tik said.

Dr Tik is also teaching her 13-year-old granddaughter to treat cataracts and glaucoma using a coconut shell and grains of rice. Suphansa Methangsumet, known as Dr Noi or "little doctor", has patients look at the sun through the hole in the coconut shell while she chants spells and chops grains of rice on the shell using a knife.

Pricha Nuchjarat, 56, a regular patient of Dr Tik's, said having his eyes treated with meat was very soothing and didn't sting at all.

The coconut shell treatment was also good and the sun didn't hurt his eyes, he said.

Chatree Pompem, from Phitsanulok Provincial Health Office, was less impressed.

Using meat on the eyes posed a serious risk of infection and staring at the sun through a coconut shell could lead to blindness, he said.

He also ordered Dr Tik to stop her treatments immediately.

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N THE 10th century AD, Phuket was part of an ancient maritime empire called Srivijaya, encompassing most of what is today considered southern Thailand, Malaysia, Sumatra and hundreds of smaller islands in the region.

The strength of the empire came from its control of one of the most important trade routes in world history, the Strait of Malacca. The Srivijaya empire, centered in the southern Sumatran city of Palembang, was able to collect lucrative tolls from

ships moving cargo between China and the west.

Srivijaya had many hostile neighbors because it controlled this important trade route and fiercely protected its interests.

Across the Bay of Bengal, the Tamils, of India's Chola empire, were also largely involved in the east-west trade.

It was an inevitable clash as the two neighboring maritime empires competed for control of the strait and its Far East trade.

In 1902, one of the oldest Tamil rock inscriptions was discovered, along with other priceless artifacts, on Phra Narai hill in Takua Pa district, Phang Nga province, not far from Phuke. The ancient rock inscriptions highlight the theory that Tamils may have operated thriving merchant guilds on the Malay Peninsula during the 8th and 9th centuries.

What is interesting about the Tamil stone writings is a description about a settlement called "Manikkiramam", located somewhere on the west coast of the Malay peninsula.

According to the stone, the settlement was a guild of merchants and traders. Armed guards were stationed to protect the Tamil people, as well as a large tank of fresh water to sustain the colony.

The ancient settlement name, Manikkiramam, in Tamil means "jewel town". Interestingly, local historians have suggested that this settlement may have been located on Phuket at the location of what is present-day Ban Manik in Thalang.

To support this theory is the similarity in the names of both places. Names of villages, districts and towns often evolve through time, but rarely do they completely change. It has been suggested that the name of the village, Manik, may be a truncation of the ancient Tamil name Manikkiramam.

No one is entirely sure about the exact location of the ancient Tamil settlement. Historians have to rely mostly on ancient written texts because of the scarcity of historical evidence dating to this period.

The settlement would have

had a sizeable population of Tamil merchants and traders stationed there from South India. The stone inscriptions discovered in Takua Pa, itself an ancient settlement dating back many centuries, was probably written in the 8th century AD.

The writings pointed to Tamil commercial interests that existed in this region during that period. No one knows for sure what later started the 11th-century war between Srivijaya and the Tamils of southern India, but the fact that the Tamils had much vested commercial interests in Srivijaya could have eventually led to serious conflict, inevitably leading to a war that spelled the end of Srivijaya.

In the year 1025 AD, Srivijaya faced a crisis that threatened its survival. The Tamil King Rajendra I had been preparing to invade the Srivijaya empire. During Rajendra's reign, the Tamil Chola empire was at the height of it's power.

In 1025 AD a Tamil armada crossed the Bay of Bengal and set out to severely weaken Srivijaya. According to historical accounts, one of the invading Tamil fleets landed on the upper western coast of the Malay Peninsula. They fought their way and managed to gain a foothold in the Srivijaya Empire.

Yeamyong Surakijbanharn, an archaeologist and historian on southern Thailand, believes that during the war the Tamil general leading Rajendra's front forces decided to camp out at the Tamil settlement of Manikkiramam. He used it as a military base from which to continue raids and wreak havoc on the rest of Srivijaya.

The Tamil merchants living in Manikkiramam may have offered their help to the invading forces by giving them food, shelter and other resources.


The main source of information about the Tamil-Srivijaya war comes from another ancient Tamil stone inscription. This historical rock was found in the ancient Mahathat temple in modern-day Nakhon Sri Thammarat province, dating back to the 11th century AD.

This stone inscription, although eroded in some parts, tells us a great deal about the Tamil Chola raids on Srivijaya.

The Tamil army conquered land as far south as Kedah, but their victory over the Srivijaya empire was not followed by a prolonged occupation. The purpose of the invasion was to plunder the empire's territories. The Tamil army destroyed cities and weakened Srivijaya, forcing it to accept supremacy of the Chola empire.

True to the Chola cause, the maritime empire of Srivijaya never regained its former glory after the invasion. It later disintegrated into several smaller kingdoms and city states.

Robin Plant & Wally Sudik

ROBIN and Wally both came tunity to work in Southeast Asia, Robin was ready for the challenge. on the construction of the Phuket FantaSea Theme Park at Kamala. Today, they operate AVC Phuket, which designs, installs and services high-tech electronic lighting and sound systems for the most prestigious villas on Phuket and surrounding islands.

They provide the same sense of drama in the private home that they have created on the big stages of the world.

Robin grew up in England and attended the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School on a scholarship. He had a childhood interest in the arts and performed in amateur dramatics. He developed his theater career behind the curtain taking a two-year course in stage management and learning the technical skills to run a production.

He worked as assistant stage manager at the New Vic at Stoke-on-Trent before working on some of the West End's most prestigious productions for over 10 years.

As his career grew, Robin began writing for Children's television, served as an actor on BBC Specials, and won three International Awards for his own film and documentary projects.

When a former mentor and colleague offered him the oppor-

"I came as part of the stage management team at Phuket FantaSea. It was a solid year of hard work. There were almost 200 people in the show, plus an assortment of tigers, chickens, elephants and goats. It was great to be involved in the construction of Asia's largest theater," he says.

Wally grew up on the east coast of the United States with musician parents who produced the Nutcracker at the Danbury Music Center. He studied theater lighting and automation at Carnegie Mellon, where he graduated with a degree in Technical Production. His talents were such that he was recruited immediately by MagiCraft, one of America's leading developers of technical illusions.

Wally worked on theme parks and Las Vegas shows, and built illusions for David Copperfield before being sent to Phuket to create the magic and illusions at Phuket FantaSea.

"I've worked in Vegas, but building the Phuket FantaSea show included 12 illusions and seven lifts, some of the biggest in the world."

At the end of their contracts, Robin and Wally decided to join talents and started producing video and films for the 2000 Millennium, and they opened their

own very successful "art jazz" bar on Surin Beach, "Jazzmatazz".

In 2003, they opened AVC, providing home automation lighting systems. Their client list includes villas at Cape Sol, Nikki Beach, SAVA and Cape Yamu. They have installed light and sound systems in about 150 luxury villas on Phuket and Koh Samui.

When the tsunami struck Phuket in 2004, Robin and Wally quickly came to the aid of their many local Thai friends who had lost their homes.

"All around us, poor local people no longer even had a roof over their heads, so we began to figure out how we could help."

Wally created housing designs and Robin project-managed the construction. They launched their own fundraising campaign and raised enough from Laguna Phuket and Trisara, as well as an Internet appeal, to build 59 family units for 300 homeless people.

For their efforts, they were given a commemorative award from Her Royal Highness Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn.

Looking ahead, this productive team is designing a sustainable farm to be built in Chiang Rai that can be a model for renewable energy and self-sufficiency.

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Learning the science of scents

Phuket's first 'Passion for Perfume' program awakens the senses while relaxing the spirit

IN A HILLTOP pool villa in Cherng Talay, The Pavilions Resort launched the first program in their 'Passion for Perfume' series on April 22.

The three-day olfactory exploration program allowed only a limited number of participants, giving it an intimate atmosphere.

Program instructor Stephen V. Dowthwaite outlined the principles of perfumery to a small group of would-be perfumers, inspiring connections between the senses, evoking emotion, memories and sensuality.

The art and science behind perfume is often described through a musical metaphor, with top, middle and bottom notes layered to create a complex mixture of scents.

As the founder and head instructor of PerfumersWorld, fragrance maestro Mr Dowthwaite has created thousands of perfumery and aromatherapy formulations, sold in over 60 countries worldwide.

He helps create a comfortable atmosphere during the program by eliciting audience feedback, in his classroom there are no silly questions.

Aromas are described by Mr Dowthwaite using common lexicons. For example, green notes are compared to fresh cut grass or cucumber, an herb note denotes lavender and sage, earthy notes typify the odor of yeast and dairy notes mark scents of dark chocolate, butter or cheese.

To simplify the intoxicating complexity of perfumes, a freshly baked muffin is sniffed over to illustrate the basic connections between smell and taste.

According to Mr Dowthwaite, with 26 base notes there are enough variations possible in 20 drop mixtures to make more than one million perfumes.

Of the 26 prime scent classifications, or perfume notes, created by Perfumers World, most consumers would be shocked to discover many popular fragrances have scent classifications such as narcotic, herb, yeast, tar 'n' smoke, x-rated musk, dairy and even urine.

After the three-day Phuket program, guests took away their own signature blend of fragrance, a world of scent knowledge and a greater appreciation for perfume.

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West leans on Asia for recovery

HE old stock market adage "Sell in May, go away, buy again on Michaelmas Day" is often a good strategy, but for the past three years it would have been inappropriate.

In general, global stock markets have enjoyed excellent growth since early March 2009.

Obviously, stock markets are unlikely to continue on a pure upward trend, but there are reasons for continued optimism.

Ben Bernanke, Chairman of the US Federal Reserve, Central Bank, gave testimony to Congress in mid-April this year.

In his testimony, he painted a picture of the US economy continuing to show signs of economic expansion combined with very low inflationary pressures.

These economic conditions are perfect for a stock market rally and it is hardly surprising that stock markets have posted such significant gains.

It is still very likely that this trend will continue. Low inflationary pressures mean there is no haste to raise interest rates.

Ben Bernanke has made it adequately clear that the "Fed" has no intention of derailing the economic recovery. He is more than aware that economic policy must have as its overriding objective, which is the recovery of the US economy.

Therefore, the Fed will keep interest rates at lows not seen in over half a century. There is a very real fear that higher interest rates could derail the recovery, as happened in 1937.

It is an indication of how

serious the recession has been and, for millions of people in the US and other countries, still is. Stock market behavior is one of the more minor concerns of the Fed.

Stock markets tend to be discounting mechanisms and with interest rates at near zero there is little to stop the current "bull market".

In Asia, the situation is somewhat different. The recession did affect all countries but there is growing evidence that economies are starting to grow strongly.

A number of factors are involved: Asia's banks did not take part in any of the irresponsible lending of the West and are naturally in much better shape to meet the recovery. The personal savings rate in Asia tends to be very high, Asians are less likely to be heavily indebted.

Part of the reason is that in most Asian countries, social welfare nets offered by governments are not nearly as generous as is the norm in the West. In Asia, welfare has traditionally been dealt with by families. However, this is rapidly changing.

One of the main factors is birthrate; most Asian countries have seen their birthrate slow

dramatically and this is combined with longer life expectancies. The continuation of the economic miracle in Asia also helps the West.

The last economic downturn of this severity was felt in the 1930s. This time around, the West has a resilient Asia as a market for goods and services.

China surprised most analysts by announcing that economic growth in the first quarter of 2010 reached 11.9 percent annualized.

This was higher than expected, although many economists believe these figures are still being inflated by the Chinese government's stimulus package.

China also announced that its latest trade figures actually reflect a deficit with imports being higher than exports.

This, naturally, means that the Chinese government has a good reason to not allow their currency to appreciate against the US dollar, at least in the short term.

Thailand is a beneficiary of all that is happening and economic growth is expected to reach at least six percent this year. Naturally, the inclusion of Thailand's civil unrest in Bangkok has had a dampening effect and it is expected to trim one to two percent off growth.

Recently, I have made two trips to Malaysia and was surprised at the number of Malaysians who simply could not understand why the people of Thailand did not seem to be concerned about the damage to their economy. Another point frequently raised is how important foreign investment is to the Malaysian economy.

For investors, the current global economic situation has much to commend it. This is a good time to invest – to paraphrase Warren Buffet, "Be brave when others are fearful and fearful when other are brave" and the combination of growth together with low inflation is probably as good as it gets. This is certainly a scenario that will allow further gains to be made. Naturally, these gains may end up with very expensive stock markets. Already very few stock markets could be viewed as "cheap".





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Bogus tsunami alert shows much work to be done

The confusion following the 7.8 magnitude earthquake in northern Sumatra on April 7 highlights the urgent need for better disaster preparedness at every level in Thailand, from the people at the National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC) down to local officials and hotel staff.

The latest false alarm was not the first. The public panic that ensued following the quake was considerably less than on the night of March 28, 2005, when a much more powerful 8.3 magnitude quake off the coast of Sumatra also failed to produce a tsunami.

As for the April 7 false alarm, neither the NDWC nor the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) have yet to issue a definitive statement explaining why an evacuation order was issued via SMS – but without sounding tsunami warning towers in risk areas. [see page 5]

Efforts by the Gazette to clarify what went on that morning have yielded confusing and somewhat contradictory statements. Highranking staff at the NDWC said later that morning that the decision not to sound the sirens was based on a real-time review of seismic data and monitoring of the tsunami direct detection buoy northwest

However, a member of the regional DDPM office here in Phuket later confirmed that an evacuation order had been issued by SMS, although not one for a full 'level three' evacuation that requires 'immediate' evacuation without giving evacuees time to

Obviously, much needs to be done, but a good first step for the NDWC would be to put more effort into the website it launched last year: www.ndwc.go.th

The NDWC site that morning failed to carry any information about an evacuation order, although a brief Thai-language statement was issued later confirming that an evacuation order had been called off.

A quick review of the site shows that upgrading its content has not been a focus of NDWC efforts in 2010. Of course the NDWC is not the only government agency in Thailand with an embarrassing Internet presence. Indeed, the Gazette is aware of webboards on some government sites which are so laxly administered they are filled with little more than spam links to pornography.

Later this year the NDWC hopes to launch two more direct detection buoys off the Andaman coast to improve tsunami detection capabilities.

Let's hope they also invest more resources to ensure the public can access real time information about potential tsunami threats that go beyond the 160 character limit of a standard SMS message.

Government travel warning creates undue fear

As an Aussie living much of every year for the past five years in Phuket, and often traveling to nearby areas, I find myself in very strong disagreement with my government's current blanket assessment that Australians considering visiting Thailand should "reconsider your need to travel."

I know that many Aussie expatriates living and working in Phuket are involved in commercial activities which are impacted negatively, either immediately, or all too soon, by such a sweeping statement encompassing all of Thailand.

Nobody I have any contact with here, Thai or otherwise, harbors any apprehension that the past disastrous blockade of Phuket Airport by protesters will be repeated.

Although state of emergency declarations have been issued for other parts of Thailand, no such declaration refers to Phuket, or anywhere near it.

The Australian travelers who are dissuaded from utilizing their direct flight bookings from Australia to Phuket are also, I believe, suffering unnecessarily as a consequence.

The cancelation of a planned holiday is only part of it.

By canceling as a consequence of the Australian government warning, such travelers face the very real possibility that travel insurance companies may refuse compensation for flights and accommodation reservations canceled (a state of emergency exclusion clause is in most travel insurance policies).

The purpose of this letter is

to make contact with as many Aussie expatriates as possible who read this paper so that together we may seek to influence the decision makers in Canberra, both in the Foreign Affairs Department bureaucracy and at a political level, to ensure that such damaging and inaccurate advice about Phuket is not issued in the

The lifesaving vendor of Nai Harn



FIRST

Two people have drowned so far this year as a result of the rip current at the south end of Nai Harn Beach, which was unmanned by lifeguards from mid-November last year until April 26. In the interim, countless others were rescued by courageous locals and foreigners. Helping to coordinate the volunteer effort was Song 'Dui' Sa-ingthong, a beach vendor from Srisaket. In

the days just before the new lifeguards were scheduled to resume work, Mr Dui told the Gazette about the dangers of the Nai Harn surf. Compiled by Atchaa Khamlo.

efore, when there were lifeguards on the beach, I always assisted them even though I was not officially a paid member of their team.

Now that there are no lifeguards, I have been very busy helping people, and will be until the new lifeguards start work.

On April 13, alone, we helped 30 swimmers who were in trouble. If we hadn't been there, I'd say around 10 of them would have drowned.

There were drownings on both New Year's and Valentine's Days this year. We tried our best to save them, but couldn't.

In the 18 years I've been working on this beach, it is impossible for me to count how many people I have helped.

People seem to ignore the dangers. Even though they don't know anything about the sea, they enter the water. Also, many Thai parents don't know about the risks and they just let their children swim freely.

Warning signs and red flags put out to warn people of dangerous areas are often ignored. When the waters are particularly unsafe we put four red warning flags up, one every 100 meters, but people go swimming anyway.

Most of the time when the surf is heavy, the rip current is dangerous. I can see when the currents are dangerous. For example, after about three or four waves come in succession, the water will then reverse flow,

away from the beach, sometimes creating whirlpools in deep pockets or moving in channels of strong current as the water makes its way back out to sea. If someone is caught in these areas, they won't survive.

In addition to looking for danger spots, we also have the Phuket tide table printed in the Gazette, which helps us a lot.

Nai Harn is a very tough beach to guard, as the rip current can be strong. The new lifeguards coming to this beach also need to be aware of the currents or they too will be in danger of drowning.

In a rip current, the waves come first and then the current pulls swimmers away from the beach, which is very dangerous if they can't swim well.

If someone is swimming in waist-deep water, they can quickly be pulled out by the current to deeper waters where their feet cannot touch the bottom. Then they tend to panic when they cannot swim ashore against the current.

In the case of a strong current, we tend to have more problems with Thai swimmers, as they seem to be less knowledgeable about the dangers.

As there are no lifeguards on the beach, our unofficial team keeps an eye out for people in danger. All of us carry radios, so if something happens we can communicate easily.

people as soon as we see they are in danger, before they start to go under water. It becomes much more difficult to rescue them after they go under.

Sometimes people are upset with us when we help them, as they hadn't gone under water yet and didn't think they were at risk of drowning. However, often they don't know the dangers.

We prefer to help people as soon as possible because we We always try to help don't want to see anyone die.

What visa do I need?

I have a one-year, multiple-entry, non-immigrant 'O' visa. There is no indication that employment is prohibited anywhere on the visa.

I have just set up a company and my lawyer said I can apply for a work permit using this visa. Also, a friend of mine has secured work permits with reputable companies with a non-immigrant 'O' visa which states, "Employment Prohibited."

When my lawyer went to the labor office, the work permit was denied. He was told I must get a non-immigrant 'B' visa. Can you please tell me whether I can get a work permit with this visa?

An officer at the Phuket Department of Employment, work permit section, replies:

If you were issued your non-immigrant 'O' visa in Thailand and it was issued because of a relationship with a Thai citizen (married to a Thai citizen, for example), you can apply for a work permit with that visa. Otherwise you need a non-immigrant 'B' visa.

FC Phuket take it to the top

C PHUKET maintained their perfect home record and returned to the top of the Division Two (southern section) table with a hardfought 2-1 win over local rivals Krabi on April 24.

Krabi and FC Phuket have enjoyed contrasting fortunes this season, with the latter in line for league promotion and the former struggling near the bottom of the table.

Despite their lowly league status, however, Krabi on Saturday provided the sternest test for FC Phuket of any team to visit Surakul Stadium this season.

Manager Arjan Songsamsub reshuffled his home side, mainly playing Nene Bi as the lone striker. Nene Bi had previously only played for the squad as a central defender.

FC Phuket played a 4-3-3 formation which became 4-5-1 when Krabi were in possession, meaning that leading goal scorer Adisak found himself playing wide on the right.

The tactic was not entirely successful, as Krabi had the better of the opening exchanges. However, the closest that either side came to scoring in the early stages was when the visitors hit the goal post with a speculative shot from near the right touchline after a corner had been cleared.

Krabi's keeper appeared less than convincing, under-hitting a couple of early clearances, and was entirely culpable for FC Phuket opening the scoring with a goal against the run of play.

A speculative cross from the left wing prompted the Krabi keeper to come charging off his line, allowing Phuket's Diarra Ali to head the ball into an empty net.

Songsamsub changed the Phuket lineup at half time, moving Diarra Ali back into central defense and pushing Poramut and Adisak up front in a more conventional 4-4-2 formation.

The tactic almost backfired spectacularly with Nene Bi and goalkeeper Jagked getting in a mix up, and Nene Bi fortunate to see the ball bounce harmlessly off the post after he had inadvertently deflected it goalwards.

Nene Bi almost redeemed himself moments later when his curling free kick could only be punched clear by the Krabi keeper.

However, Jagked was then forced into making a smart save with his feet at the other end, but it was to no avail as moments later Krabi grabbed an equalizer with an unstoppable pile driver of a shot from the corner of the penalty area.

The passionate FC Phuket home crowd, who have split into two factions, each sitting at opposite ends of the ground, were undeterred. With the crowd's chants ringing in their ears, FC Phuket started to enjoy increasing possession with the visitors content to settle for a point.

Yet Songsamsub had his heart set on victory, and brought on substitute Chakrit, who made an instant impact. A right-wing cross fell kindly for him and he showed his composure in chesting the ball down before blasting it into the roof of the net.

The win keeps FC Phuket at the top of the table despite having failed to win a single away game.

Speaking after the match, Songsamsub defended his decision to tinker with new tactics. "Krabi's defenders are good in the air, so I played Nene Bi up front because he is stronger than any of my other strikers and can hold the ball up well.

"We were leading 1-0 at half time and had some problems with our defense, so I decided to change things round. I was expecting more of a long ball game from Krabi in the second half and Nene Bi is good in the air so I moved him back to center half," he said.

Speaking of his second-half substitution, Songsamsub said, "Chakrit is a real striker. He is not good in the build-up, but his shooting is very good and I wanted to win the game."

Regarding FC Phuket's immaculate form at home, he added, "The fans make a big difference to the players. I think that is why we are so good at home."

FC Phuket travel to Hat Yai on May 2. The next home game is against Surat Thani on May 8.


The consolation prize went to Katijin Kulsolkitti, Chuchart Suthiosod, Vimonchai Kooktimitre and Somran Atthasuthisin.

Market crossing muddy waters

EAVING without warning is one of the themes for the famous John Hiatt song Crossing Muddy Waters.

The recent outcry over the alleged multi-million-dollar fraud case at Purnavarna Estates – and the resulting half-completed project – hints at a symbolic "crossing muddy waters" for Phuket's property market, of which the direction is neither clear nor direct.

The Purnavarna case looks set to play out in the legal arena. There are indeed two sides to every story and the CEO in question is due his day in court.

Meanwhile, a visit to the incomplete residential luxury estate in Rawai reveals a spot where water buffalo graze and a fresh crew of gardeners battle nature to reclaim the partially completed project. It's certainly not the only incomplete project on the island.

A trip back in time through our brochure files comes up with promotions offering 10 percent annual guaranteed returns to buyers, free airline tickets and the option to sell shared ownership at increasingly low prices, a tactic from when the market was being hit by the global financial crisis.

The acquisition of the Royal Phuket Yacht Club from a thenhealthy Lehman Brothers only increased debt to the project, which in the end saw the estate change to an optimistically named "Summer Palace".

Despite the current scandal, from an analytical perspective, the island's property business has

been let off fairly lightly compared with many developed markets the world over. Estimates in the US financial press say 16 million US home buyers are currently "under water", meaning their debt is higher than the market value of the property they are sitting on.

In Phuket, defaults have been relatively isolated instances of non-delivery (versus delays) in the residential market. Another high-profile case is the ongoing restructuring of Lersuang group's Tamarind Hills project, which is just now seeing units completed.

Truth be known, there will still be blood in the real estate sector, but no different than markets in virtually every corner of the globe.

Perhaps the best case to argue here is that with the dominance of foreign buyers for resort-grade real estate, there exists very limited developer debt.

In the absence of largescale debt, the ability to rehabilitate or restructure failed projects is becoming a significant factor. As seen at Tamarind Hills, Metta Visessombat's Sepco Asia was able to work with banks to assist in moving the development forward.

For the past few years, there has been a defined shift in the profile of developers at the mid-and top tiers from foreigners to Thais. This is no reflection on competence or ability, but

founded mainly on the financial reality that inhibits overseas interests in obtaining local bank financing.

With projects in the past, when supply and demand was favorable, cash flow from presales was able to provide the funding to see the completion of many developments on the island. Once the pendulum swung, then this is when the trouble arose and project defaults came into play.

The good news is that markets have a way of correcting themselves, and we've been seeing that take place. The past 18-24 months has seen resales becoming increasingly prevalent due to buyers seeking mitigated risk and vacuuming up excess supply at low costs.

New project launches have remained generally muted, though a rash of new low-entry condominium units in the range of 1.8 to 3 million baht have hit the island for sale in the first quarter of 2010, aimed primarily at the domestic segment.

Moving forward, liquidity in the Thai development sector remains high and listed property firms continue to have excess cash that needs to be put to work. It's interesting to see Sri Panwa developer Charn Issara now looking to form a property fund using the hotel as an underlying asset in order to recapitalize for expansion.

In my discussions with developers in recent weeks, in both Phuket and Bangkok, the market is seeing an influx of new capital coming to the island, both for longer-term banking and also for developing property.

For stressed and distressed projects, in all likelihood, we may see a number of developments being restructured by listed Thai companies or emerging real estate funds.

The bottom line in all this is: liquidity is much like the flowing waters of a river, for now the hollow sky has been filled with rain clouds and the river is rising. It's a new twist in the ongoing cycle of island property, but the journey goes on.





Heaven on a hillside up for grabs

ENTION the town Patong and a common reaction is, "Nice place to visit, but I wouldn't want to live there." But for those who know where to look, there is a lot more to Patong than bar girls, touts and tailor shops – if one knows where to look.

This week's home is nestled on the hillsides in one of Phuket's most exclusive residential communities, Baan Suan Kamnan, which offers stunning views of Patong.

Entering the home through the covered carport, the first thing one notices is an enormous fish tank built into the wall. More than an aquarium at 10,000 liters, it is one of the world's largest privately owned "aquascaping" tanks and



has featured in magazines in the US and several European countries.

Another striking feature is the large roof that acts as a rainwater catchment, supplying four underground tanks with a total capacity of 160,000 liters. This is treated to drinking quality by a water purification system in the home.

Other outdoor amenities include a swimming pool with whirlpool tub, surrounded by lush tropical gardens.

Access to the villa is through

the basement level, which like the three floors above features a wraparound balcony. The basement living area is fully self-contained with bedroom, kitchen and bathroom, and can be rented out as it has its own entrance from the road.

The ground floor features a living room, dining room, office, guest bathroom, western outdoor kitchen and lots of outdoor space.

The first floor has a TV room, master bedroom, guest room and bathroom, while the second floor has a penthouse with bedroom, bath and large balcony with an impres-

sive view of Patong below.

The land title is *NorSor* 3 *Gor*, which can be upgraded to a full *Chanote*.



OME articles ago, I rashly suggested that Thai gardens are short of genuinely blue flowers. There is red and white aplenty, but not so much blue.

I hold by that assertion, but having made it, must confess that there are certainly a number of shrubs that produce blooms in shades of blue-white, blueish-purple, blue-green, lilac and various shades in between. If Phuket lacks flowers of an intense and pure blue, then the cerulean skies and ultramarine seas more than compensate.

Three vines instantly come to mind as "kind of blue". One is the humble butterfly vine [Clitoria ternatea]. Be careful of this one. Its stems are very slender, but do not be fooled – this vine is rampant. I have one that has already climbed 10 feet up a tree and it seeds everywhere in the vicinity.

For these reasons, it is a good choice if you want rapid cover, and it does have the advantage of sweet-pea like blooms of an intense blue, with just the merest hint of purple. You can buy it at any plant nursery but don't need to; it grows wild on the margins of Phuket's rain-forest

The blue trumpet or Bengal clock vine [Thunbergia grandi-flora], is another vigorous climber with large, heart-shaped, evergreen leaves and long, pendulous clusters of mauve-blue flowers, which may also be white. It will take easily to a trellis or wall, provided it gets plenty of sun.

My blue heaven

Another variety, *Thun-bergia erecta* (or *chong nang lek* in Thai) is relatively slowgrowing with dark, leathery leaves and solitary flowers of a deeper and bluer hue with a yellow or white throat.

This shrub is scandent – a bit straggly if not pruned – but does not need support and survives well in a range of conditions.

I have one against a wall and another free-standing beside a fish-pond. Without plenty of light, however, it will not flower much. But given an open aspect with moisture at the roots, it will reward you by blooming all year round.

In my Andalucian garden, the most vigorous of all the climbers was the morning glory [*Ipomoea*]. A member of the world-

wide 'Convolvulus' family, it flourished in the intense Spanish dry season and daily produced literally hundreds of gentian-blue, purple-ribbed flowers.

As the day wore on, the blue would ebb away, each bloom would gradually turn mauve and then curl up and expire. Hence the name.

Unfortunately, the morning glories I have seen in Thailand lack that distinctive blue coloration, though I would be happy to be proved wrong. In general, they are purple or mauve, as in the *Ipomoea purpurea*. There are also red [horsfalliae] and white [alba] varieties, though my attempt to grow the crimson cultivar from seed came to nought.

Another strain named 'heavenly blue' has not a hint of purple in its striking blooms, but it is grown primarily for the American market.

We oldies know that morning glories became famous for dubious reasons in the 'flower-

power' psychedelic sixties. The seeds contain ergot alkaloids, one of which is ergonovine, a hallucinogenic substance that made the flower a symbol of the 'tune in, turn on' generation. Remember the retrospective Oasis album *What's the Story? Morning Glory?*

I digress. Some readers may be getting confused, for the common morning glory found in Thailand and certainly the one most sought after by Thais is the water convolvulus [*Ipomoea aquatica*], known elsewhere as water spinach. It thrives in marshes and klongs all over Phuket and beyond.

Known as *pak bung*, it is sold in every open-air market. Its hollow stems and narrow leaves are a staple of many Thai pork dishes and soups. Go to any stretch of water in Phuket, and you will likely find Thais gathering bunches of the stuff.

More bluish flowers deserve a mention. One, the pigeon

berry [*Duranta repens*] is normally grown as a hedge or high ground cover, especially in its golden-leaved form.

One cultivar, however, produces showy racemes of deep lilac or purple flowers. I have one against a wall which is more than two meters tall. It blooms continuously and has become a valuable addition to the garden.

Finally, two shrubs I have discussed in the past. The jade vine, [Strongylodon macrobotrys] is a vigorous climber, but its chief glory is its spiked flowers, which hang down in large clusters from woody stems and which are an amazing blue-green, a hue that is perhaps unique in the flower kingdom.

The blue ginger [Dichorisandra thyrsiflora], while not really a ginger at all, possesses characteristics of that large family with impressive clusters of flowers that are the color of Thunbergia erecta: a remarkable dark blue suffused with mauve.

Draft changes target Phuket hillside development

mental laws currently being considered by the Thai government may "substantially affect developments and land values in Phuket", leading legal firm Baker & McKenzie has warned.

A circular issued by Baker & McKenzie said, "Without a doubt, Phuket is one of the fastest-growing cities in Thailand, especially for the real estate development industry. Without proper control, this could adversely affect Phuket's beautiful and fragile environment.

"With this in mind, the Thai authorities have announced that Phuket is to be a 'special preservation area', whereby environment impact assessment reports must be approved before any project can be developed."

The circular cited as example key differences between the current requirements for developments between 40 and 80 meters above sea level (classified as 'Zone 6' areas) and the proposed new requirements proposed under the draft.

The current provision stipulates that buildings in Zone 6 areas not steeper than 35 percent must not be higher than eight meters.

However, while the draft proposes that the eight-meter height limit continue for buildings in Zone 6 areas not steeper than 20 percent, it proposes that only detached houses or single buildings not taller than six meters be allowed in Zone 6 areas with slopes between 20 percent and 50 percent.

The law firm also highlighted that the existing guidelines for Zone 6 areas with inclines of less than 35 percent must have an 'open' area of not less than 40 percent of the total land area.

If implemented, the proposed changes will require open areas of at least 70 percent of the total plot in areas with

slopes of 20 percent to 35 percent, and open areas at least 75 percent of total plot size for areas with slopes of 35-50 percent.

Phuket Gazette Property columnist Bill Barnett has reported on his The Phuket *Insider.com* website that the current guideline, "The Announcement of the Ministry of Natural


Resources and Environment -Specifications of Environment Protection Areas and Measures for Phuket B.E. 2546" will expire on September 30.

"If you are developing or renovating property that has significant slopes, a complete review of the issue and perhaps expediting of build permits prior

to the new regulation coming into effect might be advisable, Mr Barnett said.

The Baker & McKenzie circular also invited readers looking for more details of the full draft to contact the Hotel, Resort and Real Estate Practice Group of Baker & McKenzie in Bangkok.
