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Out of harm's way

Tourists still choosing Phuket, despite travel warnings

strongly advising their citizens to avoid traveling to Thailand, Phuket hotel occupancy is up by as much as a fifth on last year and the mood among tourists is

Last week the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office advised against all but essential travel to all parts of Thailand.

The US followed suit, changing its own advice to recommend against all non-essential travel to the country.

Gino, a British 22-year-old holidaying in Phuket, displayed a sentiment typical of European holidaymakers on the island.

"Our government told us not to fly out to Bangkok, but we flew out anyway. I don't care much about the warning because life is short," he said.

"We feel very safe here,"

Izac, a 32-year-old American based in Vietnam, said he didn't feel in danger in Phuket at all.

"I would say it is safe to travel here as long as you don't drink too much, don't bother anybody and mind only your own business. Then you will be

ESPITE 13 countries fine... I have been here before so many times. Every time is a good time."

> While the advisories will put off many, occupancy figures remain surprisingly healthy.

Bhuritt Maswongsa, vice president for marketing of the Phuket Tourist Association (PTA), said the average occupancy rate in Phuket for April 2010 was about 70 percent.

The figure represented about a 15 to 20 percent increase year-on-year, he said.

In comparing the figures it is important to remember that last April the red shirts took over the hotel scheduled to host the Asean summit in Pattaya over Songkran, he said.

Current occupancy is about 50 percent on average for the whole island, but this is normal for May, which is the start of the low season, he said.

The Australian government recently changed its travel advisory status for Thailand from "high degree of caution" to "reconsider your need to travel".

"But still Australians continue flying into Phuket nonstop," Mr Bhuritt said.

Crackdown on passengers without helmets

L take more serious action will face fines. against motorcyclists riding without helmets by fining passengers mander Pekad Tantipong said as well as drivers.

The order was issued by Phuket Police Commander Pekad Tantipong as part of a campaign that started on May 1.

In May and June, 50 officers will crack down more heavily on motorcycle drivers without helmets and issue warnings to

HUKET City Traffic Popassengers. From July, all motorlice have been ordered to cycle passengers without helmets

> Phuket City Police Compolice will enforce the law day and night.

> An often-ignored Thai traffic law states that both drivers and passengers without helmets can be fined up to 500 baht. A driver transporting a passenger not wearing a helmet is subject to a fine of up to 1,000 baht.

The Phuket Land Transport Office has run public service announcements on a local cable months warning motorbike passengers they face fines if caught without a helmet.

As part of a public awareness campaign, Phuket City Police have prepared about 3,000 safety helmets to give away free to offending drivers before the July crackdown.

According to statistics pro-

vided by the Phuket City Traffic Department, which covers parts of five tambons in Muang Phuket television channel in recent District, accidents and fatalities are on the rise.

There were 1,239 accidents resulting in 36 deaths in 2008, while 2009 saw 1,733 accidents with 48 deaths.

Many deaths and serious injuries are the result of motorcyclists not wearing helmets.

Senators to support Wichit's illegal pitch

tentative support to Wichit Municipality in its bid to secure proper permits for a road and football field it built illegally on mangrove forest land.

Murder suspect: 'he abused me'

YOUNG man arrested in Phuket for the murder of Pirasak Pongchoo has confessed to slashing the man's throat after enduring a month of sexual abuse.

The badly decomposing body of the 43-year-old was found at his rented room on Wichit Songkram Road, Soi 1 on April 26.

Surat Thani Police arrested Watcharin Srinin, 22, at his uncle's home in that province on April 29. He was transferred to Phuket and made to carry out a re-enactment of the crime the next morning.

He told police he met Mr Pirasak about a year ago and moved in with him after losing his job a few months ago.

The older man forced him to have sex and verbally abused him when he refused, he claimed.

At about 10pm on the night of April 22, Mr Pirasak once again demanded sex. Mr Watcharin refused and went out to see friends to avoid further abuse, he said.

When he returned at about 3am, the deceased reportedly told him he had sex with another person and yelled at him.

The ensuing stream of ver-

bal abuse infuriated the younger man, so he picked up a heavy wooden rod and hit Mr Pirasak on the head. The blow knocked Mr Pirasak off his mattress.

Mr Watcharin told police he slit Mr Pirasak's throat before dragging the body near the bathroom door and covering it with a blanket. He then fled with his

victim's wallet, using the money to pay for his trip to his uncle's home.

Recovered as evidence during the arrest was a mobile phone registered to the deceased, police said at a re-enactment of the crime this morning.

Mr Watcharin will be charged with murder, police said. – Pimwara Choksakulpan

Treacherous road a constant threat

HE STATE of the Patong-Karon road has gotten worse over the years and accidents are now an everyday occurrence, local residents say.

The name of Route 4233 changes from Sirirat Road on the Patong side to Patak Road after passing into tambon Karon near Le Meridien Phuket Beach Resort.

Three sections are particularly hazardous due to poor road conditions that include potholes, warping and folding.

The first is a 50-meter stretch near the Secret Cliff Resort, about one kilometer south of Le Meridien, where several large patches of asphalt have become dangerously uneven and create a traffic hazard, particularly at night.

Further south are two more treacherous sections, one near the Baan Karon Hill Resort and Spa and another near the Karon Cliff Boutique Bungalows.

A staff member at the Baan Karon Hill Resort said, "I have been working here less than a year, but I have seen many accidents – as many as two a day in the rainy season when the road gets slippery. Most of them are foreigners who aren't familiar with the roads. I haven't seen anyone die yet, but I have seen many sent to hospital for broken bones," he said.

A tuk-tuk driver who plies the route between Patong and Kata-Karon said efforts to repair the danger spots haven't solved the problem in the long term

"We always call the governor's complaint number asking for the Highway Department to come out and make repairs. Sometimes we have to wait up to 10 days. When they do come, they just cover the problem spots with asphalt, so before long the problems re-emerge. It just goes on like this over and over again," he said.

Phuket Highway Department chief Arun Sa-nae admitted the road was in a sorry state, but said in the end all road users have

to assess road conditions and be responsible for their own safety.

"Bad driving and failure to maintain motorbikes properly are also part of the problem. It's not just about whether the road is good or bad. Accidents will always happen if drivers are careless. Accidents occur not only because of the condition of the road surface, but also because the road is curvy and narrow," he said.

Roads in hilly, coastal areas are notoriously difficult to build and maintain and the problems in Phuket are exacerbated by rainy season erosion and poorly regulated roadside development, he said.

Budgeting is also a problem, he admitted.

The cost of sending out a team to do temporary repairs can run as high as 100,000 baht per job, but this is still far less expensive than rebuilding the entire road.

As the department can't afford to fix the entire road, they have to focus on the problem spots, he said.

Bid to save endangered mollusk

N a bid to increase depleted stocks, fisheries workers on May 3 released 12,000 cultured dog conch shells into the sea off Pa Khlok.

The operation was conducted jointly by the Marine and Coastal Resources Conservation Center 5 in Phuket and the Phang Nga Coastal Fishery Research and Development Center, where the dog conches were cultured.

The dog conch (*L. Strombus canarium*) has become increasingly popular in seafood restaurants in Phuket in recent years.

Unfortunately, the mollusk has fallen victim to its own popularity and fishermen are now finding it hard to find large specimens, which fetch up to 100 baht per kilo.

On May 2 the shellfish were released along the seagrass line off the coast, in the same area where 10,000 'effective microorganism' balls were dropped into the sea in December last year.

Marine biologists involved in the project said the decrease in dog conch stocks was nearing crisis level due to high demand from seafood restaurants in Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi.

The two-month-old snails released last week were two to three centimeters across. They are expected to reach a size of about 30 shells per kilo in four months' time.

Thipaporn Traithong of the Phang Nga Coastal Fishery Research and Development Center said the dog conch first became

popular with diners in Krabi, then spread to Phuket and Phang Nga.

"Ten years ago large specimens were abundant in the sea along the Andaman Sea, but now only small ones remain so we have to increase their numbers and encourage fishermen not to take small ones," he said.

Jack, a 47-year-old Australian in Phuket, said, "I know about the government's warning, but I can say it isn't that bad, it's not what you think. In Phuket, there's no protest, no problem... I feel pretty safe here."

Blowy, 45, agreed. "For tourists considering coming here, I would say: 'Come. If you're not in the middle of the protest, you have nothing to fear'."

The tourists who spoke to the *Gazette* generally agreed governments had a responsibility to keep their citizens informed – but wanted to make their own decisions.

Jenny, a 28-year-old from Australia who has visited Thailand several times, said, "I think it's something the government has to do to protect us. It is just a safety precaution to let us know, but it is up to me."

The Bangkok protests have had a more pronounced effect on arrivals from Asian markets, which are generally more sensitive to political unrest than Western ones.

"Some governments, like China, stopped sending people from some parts of the country, but there are still a few regular charter flights from Shanghai and Guangzhou to Phuket," Mr Bhuritt said. "Daily flights by Dragonair from Hong Kong have been suspended 'until further advice'."

In the face of much negative publicity in the international media, the PTA is "trying to paint the picture that life is the same as usual in Phuket," he said.

Patong split over new tunnel

ATONG residents are divided into two camps over the controversial plan to bore a road tunnel under Patong Hill, a recent public hearing revealed.

Around 700 residents, municipal officers from Patong and Kathu, the project development team and other stakeholders attended the meeting on April 27 at the Phuket Graceland resort.

Phuket Governor Wichai Phraisa-ngop, who chaired the hearing, said the tunnel was needed for both infrastructure and safety reasons.

Phuket International Airport will expand to accommodate 12 million tourist arrivals annually and the government is moving forward with plans to build a 2.6-billion-baht convention center in Mai Khao, he said.

The tunnel is a "necessary facility to welcome tourists" that will improve traffic flow between tambons Kathu and Patong and prevent up to 500 road accidents a year, he said.

Governor Wichai instructed Patong Municipality to pay a great deal of attention to the effects the construction would have



on local residents, if approved.

As part of the proceedings, locals residents listened to development plans presented by a project study team made up of members from Epsilon Co Ltd, PlanPro Corp Ltd, and the Energy and Environmental Engineering Center (EEEC).

The team presented a progress report on their feasibility study of six possible routes for the tunnel. Criteria included funding and engineering factors, as well as projected effects on the local economy, traffic flow and environment. Social factors and the level of public participation were also taken into account.

The team's recommendation as the best possible route: two 1.17-kilometer tunnels with elevated roads at both ends.

One tunnel would accommodate two lanes of westbound traffic, while the other would carry two lanes eastbound.

from the Kathu side, traffic would divert near the Go Kart Speedway on Phra Barami Road (Route 4029) onto an elevated road leading up to the tunnel.

Traffic would emerge on the Patong side of the tunnel onto a 204-meter-long elevated road that would pass over Phisit Gorani Road in Baan Mon and connect to Phang Muang Sai Kor Road, near the APK apartment complex.

The audience was split over the proposed route.

Around 300 people, mostly business operators, rallied around a cloth banner that read: "We support the tunnel project."

Patong Entertainment Business Association President Weerawit Kurasombut said the tunnel would support Patong's growth, reduce the number of traffic accidents and improve traffic flow.

Opposed to the proposal were a similar number of Baan Mon residents sporting t-shirts with "The Baan Mon community doesn't want the tunnel" printed on the back.

The tunnel would adversely affect the community, with some families having to give up their land for construction of the elevated roadway that would pass over parts of their village, they said.

"We have lived here for a long time. Our ancestors lived here, stretching back ages. Why should we have to move off this land because of this tunnel?" one Baan Mon representative said.

"Though we would get money for selling the land, it would not be enough to buy a new place somewhere else in Phuket. Everyone knows how expensive Phuket land is. It is not worth changing our lifestyle."

Another bone of contention is the proposed path of the elevated road over the Ratchapathanusorn (the National Memorial of His Majesty The King's Footprint) on Phisit Gorani Road.

The site commemorates HM The King's visit to Patong on March 11, 1959.

Weera Sombat, a Baan Mon representative, said, "This place is important to all Patong residents, especially Baan Mon villagers. There should not be any construction over this site, which we adore and have revered for over 50 years."

Villagers are also concerned about the amount users would have to pay in tolls to cover the construction costs estimated to exceed one billion baht.

"Please cancel plans for this route," Mr Weera pleaded. "Choose another way that has a lesser effect on the lives of the Patong community. We are local residents and Patong is our home. Our situation should be more important than tourists who just visit here for a short time," he said.

Also attending the hearing was Democrat party-list MP Chalermlak Kebsup, who said she would like the project study team to consider alternative routes.

"This route is the best choice in terms of its length, but adding in land acquisition costs the total may be higher than other, longer routes that would have less effect on local residents. Please, pay much more attention to these villagers," she said.

Assistant project manager Siriprapha Ratiwat said that disagreements will be noted in the report.

However the team will continue to study the proposed route and report factual data, she said.


The next step would be to examine possible effects on the local community and hold meetings with villagers, she said.

"In November we will conclude our study and submit our report to Patong Municipality. Then it's up to the people of Patong to decide whether or not they want this project," she said.

Farm worker uncovers 'blast from the past'

driving a tractor accidentally uncovered a water tank full of communist-era explosives at a rubber plantation in Sadao District on April 29.

Chaithat Thongmee was preparing to drag rubber tree logs out of a plantation when his tractor ran over a zinc tank with wires and what appeared to be explosives sticking out.

After taking a closer look at the explosives, Mr Chaithat called

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Gold shop heist a family affair

SONGKHLA: Police have arrested a fellow police officer and his two sons for allegedly robbing a gold shop on April 29. A former police officer was also arrested for the heist.

The four men allegedly stole 600,000 baht's worth of gold jewelry from a shop in Padang Besar, a market town near the Malaysian border.

The shop's CCTV system showed one man pointing a gun at the staff while two others ransacked display cabinets. The men then fled on a motorcycle to a pickup truck allegedly driven by the fourth suspect.

Early the next morning police arrested Sen Sgt Maj Wichien Ratanachot, 47, and Kiatphong Thongkop, 22, as they sat in a pick-up truck hidden in a rubber plantation around 8km from the crime scene. Police found a gold earring on the floor of the truck.

Sgt Maj Cham Thongkop, 49, and his 19-year-old son Suthinai Thongkop were arrested shortly after in a village about 500m from where the truck was found. Police seized a .38 pistol from Sgt Maj Cham. They also found gold jewelry strapped to Mr Suthinai's thigh under his jeans.

Police said Sgt Maj Cham

confessed to robbing the gold shop with his two sons and his former colleague.

He held the staff at gunpoint while his sons grabbed the gold and Sen Sgt Maj Wichien acted as getaway driver, he said.

After hearing that roadblocks had been set up, the four hid their truck in a rubber plantation and tried to hitch a lift out of the area, police said.

Padang Besar Police Chief Inspector Athip Sangwanloi said officers caught the robbers quickly using CCTV footage from the gold shop and other shops in the area.

SAMUT PRAKAN: A woman in Samut Prakan is suing a beauty salon for 100,000 baht in damages over a bad haircut.

On April 24, Naphasason Angkuramaethisak, 49, went to the salon to have her long hair cut into a more fashionable short style she saw in a magazine.

When 29-year-old Narathip Thaiphat finished the cut, Ms Naphasason was shocked at how short her hair had been cropped. She demanded the young hairdresser fix the problem, but nothing could be done.

Ms Naphasason complained to the owner of the salon but was unsatisfied with the amount of compensation offered.

A few days later, Ms

Naphasason reported the 'crime' to Samut Prakan Police.

Although Ms Naphasason's case might appear frivolous, the fact that her partner is a highranking officer at the Royal Thai Police Headquarters was not lost on officers at the station.

They duly placed a phone call to the unfortunate hairdresser, 29-year-old Narathip Thaiphat, in an effort to resolve the dispute.

Miss Narathip told police that she had warned Ms Naphasason that the style she had chosen was not suitable for her.

The model in the picture, a Caucasian woman, had wavy hair. Ms Naphasason's hair, being straight, needed to be cut shorter, she explained.

Ms Naphasason refused to listen to her advice and demanded her hair be cut to look just like that of the model in the picture, Miss Narathip said.

Miss Narathip said she gave 6,000 baht in compensation, but Ms Naphasason demanded 100,000 baht, claiming she needed treatment at a specialist clinic to repair the damage.

Miss Narathip said she had no way of getting the money.

Unable to straighten out the tangle, the police made a record of the incident in the daily log.

Ms Naphasason said she would lodge a lawsuit against the hairdresser in the civil court

Kayakers' 14,000-mile paddle plans refloated

'N A TURN of fortune, two and Mr X's planned voyage, no kayakers who plan to paddle ■ 14,000 miles from Phuket to San Francisco have found the sponsorship money they need to make their voyage possible – a whopping US\$25,000 from a local backer.

American Ryan Doran, 26, and Piya 'Mr X' Sukunthai, 28, originally planned to leave the island on March 10 in a 20-foot wooden kayak, but due to "financial constraints", the trip was put on hold indefinitely.

The duo's 20-month trans-Pacific voyage is back on.

Under a new name, The Five Elements Pacific Rim Team, the pair plan to leave Phuket in October, arriving in Ryan's hometown of San Francisco in June 2012. But not before kayaking through territorial waters of Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan, Japan and Russia and then braving a 217-mile leg one has ever gone the whole way. Today the pair can be found most days in a Nai Harn workshop overseeing the construction of their new vessel, scheduled to be finished by August.

"We are building a 22-foot catamaran. We have joined two Chesapeake kayaks and added a Hobie Cat sail rigging system. We now intend to be sailing and paddling. We are also using kites to help power the boat," Ryan said.

Working with boat-builder Suphan Changsak, an 18-year Phuket sailing veteran, Ryan said the new vessel would be much safer, more durable and have a very comfortable trampoline net for sleeping.

"We are also bringing a tent that we can pitch on the trampoline in cold conditions," he added.

While the pair have been branded overambitious, impractical and downright crazy by some trip. We have assessed all risks involved," he said.

In coming months the pair plan to buy two GPS and marine radios and finalize the visas needed for countries they plan to stop in along the way.

Ryan said the pair have drawn inspiration from two Australian kayakers who made headlines around the world last month.

James Castrission, 25, and Justin Jones, 24, spent 62 days crossing 1,864 miles of the Tasman Sea in their custom-built fiberglass kayak, landing in New Zealand, where thousands turned out to recognize their record breaking paddle

During the trip, strong ocean flows forced the Australians to make huge circular detours to avoid being carried far off course. Ryan and Mr X will have to contend with similar conditions, but say "if anyone can do it, it's us."

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

Generation Underwood to reinvent art scene

HE children of well-known Phuket artist, architect and designer John Underwood are following in their father's footsteps by establishing an art and culture center for the island's creative community.

In little under three months, Underwood's daughter Sommart Chamarot, 33, and her two best friends Nutty Klaimak, 29, and RungRat Yueangyongpisit, 37, will open the doors of their new center, dubbed 'The Three Sisters'.

The venue, being designed by John's 19-year-old son Zach, will be a work of art in its own right.

In keeping with the family's love of recycling, team Underwood have taken one of their father's projects, Hung Fat's restaurant in Kalim, and are stripping it bare to create a chic bar and eatery that doubles as a platform to showcase work by to experiment with. local and international artists.

At present, the split-level restaurant is an empty carcass, having closed for business about three months ago.

Zach's design for the new center will include custom-made sofa beds, a bar made from stacks of magazines and a suspended glass catwalk.

Sommart said the family wanted the new center to host a variety of modern visual and performing arts, including fashion, music and film events.

"We want to exhibit at least one special art event every month, be it a fashion show, product launch, film screening or DJ," she said.

The team believe that incorporating people with art is a niche yet to be tapped on the island and plan to exhibit a range of interactive pieces for patrons

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Sommart said art lovers in Phuket are starving for an establishment that isn't too expensive but bursts with the island's creative talent.

With a white, turquoise and



Khao Sok has many tour options, but exploring the extensive cave system that dots the region's landscape is a unique way to view the park. In the wake of recent park policy changes, local outfitters are making it easier and safer to explore Khao Sok's caverns.


Whether eco-adventurer, cave sport enthusiast or amateur spelunker, it is now Thai law that a guide must be used to navigate the pitches and squeezes in Khao Sok's stone labyrinths.

As reported by international media, eight tourists perished during a flash flood in the park's Namtaloo cave in 2007. Subsequently Khao Sok and five other parks were temporarily closed. Outcry after such a high-profile accident prompted Thai authorities and local businesses to make tourist safety a priority.

Using the most experienced local guides, general manager of Our Jungle House Resort, Eric Limbos, takes cave exploration tours in Khao Sok to a new level. As a master diver and dedicated conservationist, Limbos puts together expedition packages for his guests with safety as priority.

After the new national park cave tour regulations were implemented, Limbos petitioned the Khao Sok authorities for permission to allow regulated cave diving tours. In July 2009, Limbos and Our Jungle House Resort became one of four tour operators to conduct cave diving trips in the park.

Offering cave tours by land and water is a progressive tourism niche, Limbos explains. "Cave tours can be tailored to just about every guest. My

offer trips from beginner to advanced level," he says.

Limbos, who organizes all tours for Our Jungle House guides know this area and Resort, including new cave diving packages, requires participants to be in good physical condition and at least open water PADI certified.

"Cave diving can be dan-

gerous, so you must know what you are doing. We provide all the equipment and know which caves to safely explore," he adds.

With the help of aquatic lamps and flashlights, underwater crags and canyons are illuminated in spectacular color and form. However, "Do not expect to see colorful fish or reefs. Divers enjoy the rock figures and maybe a few catfish. It's a technical dive," explains Limbos.

After a pandemic in 1944 wiped out 80 percent of the three small Khao Sok villages, few locals remained when the valley was flooded in 1982 to create the Cheow Lan Lake. With most original residents gone, discovering Khao Sok's local knowledge and lore is like finding lost treasure. Recently, about 50 meters under the lake's surface, remnants of Khao Sok village were discovered by divers. Limbos with a few other master divers have made the trip to the bottom of Cheow Lan Lake to view the town's submerged temple and other structures. This unique dive trip can be arranged by Limbos, though for master divers only.

One of Limbos' lead jungle guides, 'Tuk', was raised in Khao Sok, and has mapped the area's caves with expert precision for decades. Formerly a game poacher, Tuk employs his skills as a tracker to trek tourists through the park's jungle and subterranean system.

For many, cave tours might not have a big appeal when given the choice between Phuket's pristine beaches or Khao Sok's jungle caverns, but think again.

Once inside, the cave formations and colors are striking and varied. As veteran guide Tuk explains, cave expeditions can include small cliff-side grottoes that open into cathedral-like halls whirling with bats, or deep tunnels dotted with fragile stalagmites and crystallized spires.

Kangkow, Namtaloo and Seeroo caves are the park's most popular, though guided hikes along Highway 401 and the Sok River offer jungle trekking through wild elephant territory and dozens of exploration opportunities.

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Striking beauty out of the blue

ANY people find it easy to believe that first-hand experiences with large sea creatures such as whale sharks, manta rays and turtles can leave you speechless and with memories to last a lifetime, but have a hard time believing that macro life, creatures that can be as small as your thumb, can elicit the same sense of awe.

"How can something so small be as exciting as a ninemeter whale shark cruising past your face, no more than 10cm away?," they ask. Yet, one of my fondest underwater memories – and I have more than a few – is the day I first saw a blueringed octopus.

About the size of a golf ball with blue rings on its body and legs that flash electric blue when hunting or threatened, it is one of the rarest animals to come across when diving – and one of the most deadly. One sting from this tiny creature can result in an excruciatingly painful death.

I was diving off Borneo, home to a trove of underwater gems, approaching 1,500 dives and had seen nearly all that I had wanted to see, but the blue-ringed octopus was a glaring omission, albeit one I wasn't sure I would encounter.

Nearing the end of the dive, my buddy and I finned towards the shallows to search the dead corals and rubble, the most likely environment for catching a glimpse of this lethal creature.

After 10 minutes of painstakingly slow searching, I was about to signal the end of the dive when my buddy went berserk, banging his tank and screaming through his regulator.

Cruising over, I came face to face with a tiny octopus, no more than four or five centimeters in length, slowly moving across the coral, its blue rings flashing brilliantly whenever we came too close.

The two of us hovered qui-

etly, entranced by this tiny octopus as it hunted for food. The only time our mesmerized gaze was broken was when a diver wanted to show how small the octopus was by placing her finger near its poisonous beak.

Cue much frantic arm waving and general alarm from all concerned.

Once our pulses had returned to normal levels after our buddy's dice with death and we had returned to our boat, we all marveled at this tiny creature and smiled all the way back to the dive shop.

A close relative of the blue-ringed octopus is the aptly named flamboyant cuttle-fish. Like its cousin, it is highly poisonous but differs greatly in terms of appearance.

Growing up to eight centimeters long, the body of a flamboyant cuttlefish is usually a mix of white and dark chocolate brown when at rest or when hunting. These colors, however, are not fixed, as the brown may spread down the body when the cuttlefish is at its most sedate.

When a flamboyant cuttlefish is threatened, however, is when its majestic colors truly come to life. Florescent pink and yellow flares brightly across the cuttlefish to warn off predators. When something is bright and colorful beneath the waves, it is a warning to anything that might consider eating it that it is poisonous and likely to kill them.

If there were ever a marine creature that resembled an alien from another planet, aside from those that exist in the deep, dark waters beyond the range of scuba divers, it is the cuttlefish, with the flamboyant as the most spectacular of them all.

Another "must see" on the long list of amazing macro creatures is the harlequin shrimp. Most people associate shrimps

with food, but the harlequin shrimp is too beautiful to think about eating. White with patches of blue scattered over their bodies, harlequin shrimp grow to no more than five centimeters and are incredibly difficult to find, even in areas of the world where they are known to be common.

Their front legs are unusual and feature paddles, giving the harlequin shrimp the impression that it comes with its own armor plating and should you threaten to take away its favorite food – starfish – then it is ready to rumble and will come forward to warn you off, regardless of your size.

These are just three of the thousands of different macro species found beneath the waves. There are many more: seahorses, nudibranches, frogfish, rhinopia, sea moths, crabs and lobsters, to name but a few, many of which can be found in the waters around Thailand.

They are not easy to find and certainly are not common in many areas of the world, but when a chance encounter does come your way, be sure to have your camera ready, because they are something to behold and a sight to be cherished.

A total of 83 new life-guards were deployed on Phuket's beaches on April 26 after a 10-million-baht contract was signed with the provincial government. Surfers in the south, like Luisa, say they are still rescuing many swimmers who continue to venture out to sea in heavy conditions.

Luisa surfs Nai Harn most days. She says that while it is refreshing to see a new team of lifeguards patrolling the beach, she still sees swimmers ignoring red flags, entering the surf and getting into trouble in the water.

"My boyfriend and I have pulled out countless swimmers from the water in the past week alone," she says.

The 32-year-old, who lives in Kata, says the new guards should work on preventative methods of lifesaving, and patrol the beach at the water's edge.

"When the red flags are out,





it should be the lifeguards' responsibility to not allow swimmers to enter the water," she adds.

Volunteer lifeguard, and beach vendor, Song 'Dui' Saingthong says there are now six lifeguards on Nai Harn Beach and also two now stationed on nearby Ya Nui Beach.

"I've seen at least 10

people saved by the new lifeguards so far. Most of those were on the Labor Day public holiday, when a lot of Thai families came to the beach," he recalls. He adds that local surfers

He adds that local surfers are still helping swimmers to safety at Nai Harn Beach.

"They're like a second team of lifeguards," he says.



American DJ Steve Aoki is currently on his Asian tour and stopped over in Phuket for three days.



ATHY Roche has been living and dancing in Phuket for almost 20 years. She founded Katherine's Dance Studio at Land and Houses Park in 1997 and has been in charge of the dance program at British International School since 1999, where she produces two annual dance concerts. After university, Kathy joined the Philadelphia Dance Company. Much of her training centered on the Martha Graham technique. Her role models in the dance world were Mikhail Baryshnikov and Cyd Charisse. She traveled to nearby New York to attend dance concerts and, occasionally, to perform.

In the 1980s, she formed her own business, Fitness Works, a program where she trained other dancers to give fitness workouts in corporate offices around Philadelphia. It was the peak of the aerobics craze and Kathy knew that there would be a large market for business people who were too busy to attend classes, but who could find the time to exercise at their office.

She also implemented the fitness programs at the University of Pennsylvania and Drexel University.

In 1985, she went to the Bahamas for a holiday and fell in love with the island. Within a short time, she finished her life in Philadelphia and moved to work as a dancer and showgirl at the Bahamas Princess Casino.

"I had no problems with moving to a new place. I always knew I could take my passion for dance anywhere I would go and find interesting work. I really loved working with Jerry Jackson choreography, one of the top choreographers known in the business, especially in Las Vegas."

She spent the next few years traveling to a number of destinations to develop her career. While living in California, she danced with the San Francisco Ballet and managed a Gold's Gym where she taught men how to build muscular bodies. She then moved to Guangzhou, China, and taught ballet to young students.


"I was amazed at the strength and flexibility of those little Chinese bodies. I attempted to put together a dance company but had difficulties as a foreigner. After the Tiannamen Square tragedy, I decided to leave China and moved to Bangkok for a year before coming to Phuket."

Kathy has been living at Nai Harn Villas since the early 1990s and has spent a number of those years as the manager there. She worked at Le Meridien Phuket in the early 90s with Charles Brown and his team of dancers.

After opening her dance studio she began to raise awareness of dance within the local community through performance, demonstrations and interactive classes at the local schools and the regional vocational college.

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

iPads on Phuket

ON'T get too excited. You can't go to your favorite Phuket Apple store and buy an iPad – at least, not yet. iPads are available only in the US as of this writing and Apple recently announced that it will not begin selling them outside of the US until May, or maybe June.

Even when Apple starts selling them outside of the US, Thailand will be near the end of a very, very long food chain. Why? Among other things, with a few minor exceptions (which I'll talk about in future computer columns), "3G" isn't available in Thailand.

The early-release iPads are Wi-Fi only, with the 3G versions to ship later. The iPads to come will be able to use fast "3G" Internet connections, one of the gizmo's biggest features, but Thailand is still in the Telecom Dark Ages, mired by politics, vested interests and dueling gazillionaires.

That said, Anantara Phuket Resort & Spa in Mai Khao has just announced that it has iPads available for guests, using a check-out system: you can check out an iPad just like borrowing a book from the resort's library.

Although the resort's iPads originated in the US, they can be used with the Anantara wireless network, so you can get connected and put the iPad through its paces. Yes, you can experience the multitouch feel right here, right now, if you're lucky enough to get to the front of the queue at Anantara.

I had a chance to try the iPad for a couple of hours, and

ON'T get too excited. Although I didn't run away claiming I'd been converted by sorite Phuket Apple store and all his angels, I was duly impressed with the machine.

Multitouch – the ability to use a couple of fingers to slice, dice, rotate and zoom anything on the screen – is starting to grow on me. The iPad's interface will remind you of the iPod Touch, just eight times bigger, and supremely... cool, for lack of a better word.

Apple's been rightfully criticized for a host of iShortcomings: getting stuff into the iPad is difficult (I'd rather sit through another Bangla rendition of Stairway to Heaven than use iTunes again); a separate dock is needed to give the iPad a USB port; you can't expand the memory or use a memory card; there's no Flash; the book format is Apple proprietary.

Also, there's no camera. Audio comes in mono only. No Adobe Flash player. Reading a book is much easier on a Kindle.

But for Apple fans, iPhone junkies, iPod pods and Steve Jobs acolytes, it's a slam-dunk winner. You only need to play with it for a few minutes to see why: there's a whole new breed of computers coming, with the iPad as a worthy harbinger.

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VIP jets taking care of Phuket business

N MAY 2009, Hong Kongbased ASA Group announced plans to develop Thailand's first VIP terminal for private jets at Phuket International Airport (PIA).

While the VIP terminal has yet to emerge, it is timely to quote ASA Chief Executive Simon Wagstaff at the time of the announcement: "We handle so many private flights into Bangkok and Phuket, so the time is right to cater to our growing client base of VIP visitors who have nowhere in the airport to go once they disembark."

The Airports Authority of Thailand (AoT) supports the idea due to the growing number of businessmen and VIPs flying to Phuket aboard private jets. However, it will not proceed until the extension plan for PIA is complete, which makes sense.

There are signs, particularly in the US, that the chartering of business jets is accelerating again after the recession, although this same surge of interest has yet to be realized in Asia-Pacific.



Plans for a VIP terminal at PIA were first announced last year.

The reality is that some companies come to this region overestimating the demand and underestimating the challenges. The reality is, also, that the market is still very small. The Asian charter market is estimated at five percent of the US market. Aircraft are not as readily available for charter in Asia.

That said, there are compelling reasons why VIP jets make sense in Asia-Pacific, such as the distances required to travel to locations where no

practical alternatives may exist; the modern Asia-Pacific businessman's need for privacy, quick access to destinations and the ability to freely use new technologies now available, such as cell phones and the Internet in flight.

Time is money and the business jet offers many opportunities to maximize the valuable time of such people.

And there is room for growth.

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Festival draws international A-list

FTER a one-year hiatus, the much anticipated Phuket Film Festival returns from June 4 -13, bringing together an array of over 30 feature and short films from 11 different countries.

Following the film, the foundation will host a reception at the Thavorn Grand Plaza Hotel in Phuket Town.



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Strength in the face of adversity

While the capital is gripped by political turmoil, the Thai baht remains strong

ANY people are asking why the Thai baht is maintaining its value and even strengthening in the face of current political turmoil. Answering that question requires a look at the fundamentals of the currency.

The Thai economy has moved out of recession (Thailand only moved into recession as a result of the global financial crisis) and is poised to show good economic growth in 2010. Thailand's foreign exchange reserves are in the region of US\$140 billion and rising. The current account is in surplus, and government debt is well within the 60 percent of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) recommended to countries by the International Monetary Fund (IMF). The private sector banking industry is in a healthy state. Thailand's banks did not participate in the reckless lending practices that resulted in the financial crisis in the West.

Thailand, with the rest of South East Asia, learned some valuable lessons after the Asian

financial crisis of 1997 and 1998. Thailand is similar to a company making a profit and its trajectory, certain negative political outcomes notwithstanding, is excellent. The country is in a very different position to, say, Greece, which had been living beyond its means for years and should never have been allowed to adopt the euro. It now seems, after deeper examination by the IMF, that Greece's financial position is even worse than previously believed.

The country's problems were caused by successive national governments spending more than they earned in taxation. This gap has now reached a level of around 120 percent of GDP - twice the IMF's recommended maximum. The Greeks are effectively up to their necks in debt and, tied to the euro, there is no easy escape route.

European politicians, led by Germany, are starting to look at the costs of a Greek bailout early estimates are at least EUR200 billion by 2015. At that level it may be cheaper to give Greece some cash and ask it to revert to its original currency. How Greece is supposed to escape a debt trap by adding even more debt is anyone's guess.

Now let's look at another currency: pound sterling. The UK is running massive deficits and moving over the 60 percent government-debt-to-GDP ratio.

The economy is out of recession, just, though certainly not at the speed of Thailand's recovery or even close. The UK's political outlook is clouded until after the election. The economy is burdened by high consumer and government debt and large parts of the banking system are still in government hands.

It will be some time before

the Bank of England can raise interest rates from their historic low of half a percent. The Bank of England is still concerned by inflation, but most of that has been caused by sterling's depreciation over the past two to three years. As a result of all this, many British expats are finding the combination of a weak pound and strong baht very unpleasant. They remember the days when a pound was worth more than 70 baht, not less than 50 as has been the case recently. The Bank of Thailand has a declared policy of keeping the baht broadly in line with other regional currencies. Unless the political situation deteriorates sharply or the impasse continues for a long time, the Thai baht will remain strong.

Thailand has a broad economy, and benefits greatly from automobile manufacturing, substantial exports and a large

agricultural industry. Tourism is important to Thailand but accounts for less than 7 percent of the country's GDP. The Stock Exchange of Thailand composite has been a victim of the recent political turmoil, although losses or gains have not been significant. There is, however, that old stock market adage that states: "The best time to buy is when there is blood in the streets".

Charnchai Mahantakhun General Manager at BMW Barcelona Auto Phuket said the sales ratio between Thai and foreigners was "almost equal" and that his dealership has also experienced a hike in sales in this year's first quarter.







N the 1960s, "Sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll" was the motto in America, so it is strange that so little has been written from the perspective of a fictional rock musician. Jonathan Lethem has remedied that with You Don't Love Me Yet (Faber & Faber, New York, 2997, 224pp).

Born in 1964, Lethem was raised in Brooklyn and spent 12 years in California before returning home. He wrote several books of science fiction before returning to Brooklyn for the scene of his novels

Motherless Brooklyn, a twisted detective story, and Fortress of Solitude, his bildungsroman of growing up as the son of hipster parents in a mostly black neighborhood.

In You Don't Love Me *Yet*, he goes back to his years in Los Angeles as a budding rock singer. The as-yet-unnamed band consists of Matthew the lead singer, Denise the drummer, Bedwin the lead

guitarist and songwriter, and Lucinda the bass player.

The story, told mostly from Lucinda's point of view, opens with her and Matthew breaking up their romance but determined to keep the band together. Just playing in the band has a sexual element

Bedwin's chords, a bridge across which Matthew's voice could scurry or shamble or cavort... She wasn't the fastest, but she'd been assured by better players that she possessed all anyone needed: She swung. She had feel. Lucinda took solace in these notions without comprehending

> them fully. Bass players were a secret guild, each abiding with the ungainly, disrespected instrument for the thankless benefit of music itself. Lucinda has read somewhere of the argument as to who derived the most pleasure from the sexual act, the male or the female. She felt certain the musical reply would be: the bass player."

> Lucinda has quit her job as a barista in a coffee shop

to take part in a performance art act at the gallery of a former boyfriend. People are invited to call in to voice their complaints about life. Thus Lucinda comes to know "the complainer", whose strange erotic tales she jots down and incorporates as lyrics into the band's growing song list.

She finally meets her mystery caller, a large, slovenly, white-haired genius of a wordsmith named Carl Vogelstock. They embark on an epic night-and-day bout of sex and drinking, which culminates for



Lucinda with her band's first gig where their song Monster Eyes (originating with Carl) blows the audience away. This scene is a tour de force of what it feels like to play in the band and be in the audience.

"The song is 'Monster Eyes,' and it comes set to make an impression. For band and audience alike, the evening finds its watershed, dividing Before from After.

In the audience's case, the watershed divides the perfectly agreeable songs they can no longer quite remember from the one they'll go out humming... For the band, this first public rendition of what's instantly become their hit song is the moment when time stops its hectic flow and earth's atmosphere expands, just a little, to make room for something new, embodied by themselves. It's the moment when they realize that rather than being as good as they'd always hoped, or even better than they'd hoped, they're simply as good as they are, no hope required.'

The band is suddenly besieged by promoters, record producers and a legendary disc jockey named Fancher Autumnbreast. Lucinda is on a glorious high both musically and sexually. "The band has discovered itself onstage like Helen Keller, connecting at last the idea or name for a thing to the thing itself. At the same time another world had uncovered itself to Lucinda when she made herself drunk and uncovered for the complainer. Now they weren't two worlds, but one."

There is a side plot involving Matthew and a sick kangaroo and the domineering zoo director who will become the band's manager. This is too contrived to be convincing. But the main story of how Lucinda gains and loses and regains the world is a triumph.

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Crackdown on cracked heads won't be easy

Phuket Provincial Police Commander Pekad Tantipong's order for a crackdown on riding pillion on motorbikes without helmets is laudable, but won't be easy to enforce.

Under the plan, police will be responsible for ensuring compliance with an existing law that allows them to issue fines of up to 500 baht for anyone caught on a motorbike without a helmet, as well as 1,000 baht for anyone caught transporting a passenger without a helmet. [See page 1]

Thus far the law requiring motorbike passengers to wear crash helmets has been seldom enforced in Phuket, so much so that many people don't even know that the law is on the books. Compliance on the part of riders has been somewhat better, but a glance at any local roadway reveals that it isn't nearly what it should be.

A simple look at the numbers reveals the enormity of the task facing police. There are more than 300,000 motorbikes registered with the Phuket Land Transport Office and probably at least 100,000 more here registered in other provinces. These figures continue to grow daily, and most of the bikes are located in Phuket City Police district, where the crackdown will take place.

While the objective of the crackdown is good, the Gazette finds it difficult to be optimistic about the outcome. With just 50 officers, the 'net' is simply too small for the intended 'catch' and most of those who insist on riding without a helmet will continue to do so, accepting the risk of getting fined – and possibly a cracked skull – as the price of freedom.

A far better strategy would be to hone in on one demographic: children. There is a strong argument that the decision to put on a helmet should rest with the individual, not the state. By the time people reach adulthood they should be capable of making rational choices and ready to accept the consequences of their actions – as dire as they may be.

Unfortunately, it seems that far too many of us have grown up in what could be considered a 'culture of carelessness' that is instilled at a very young age and then passed from generation to generation.

Time has shown that the current system of road checkpoints and random fines is not an effective way to address such a deepseated social problem, although it may be a tidy source of revenue

A better solution would be to arrest all riders caught transporting minors without helmets, thus instilling a sense of caution in our youth and preparing them for a lifetime in which wearing helmets is simply second nature.

transport and taking decisive action over political turmoil in Bangkok can rescue Phuket's ailing economy. Compiled by Kitima Pornmongkhonwat.

ublic transport in Phuket is the most expensive in the world. Limousine taxis at Phuket International Airport have to pay concession fees of about a million baht per month to Airports of Thailand (AoT). This pushes up taxi fares from the airport because their operating costs are high. Because the fare from the airport is high, the fares everywhere else are high too, even the tuk-tuks and motorcycle taxis.

The taxis use about 200-300 meters of road owned by AoT. The rest of the time they use public roads, so I don't know why AoT has to charge them so much. I believe this causes problems for tourists. They all complain about the high fares, but they don't know what to do about it.

I like the Suvarnabhumi Airport system. They only charge 50 baht extra per trip, so the taxis only charge 50 baht more and then follow the meter. It is a fair system. In Phuket I think it's quite exploitative.

I really want to see Phuket have a good public transport system. I especially like the idea of having an 'airport link' service providing access to the airport from places like Chalong and Kata-Karon. Under such a plan, all local administrative bodies like the Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (PPAO), the Municipalities, the Tambon Administration Organizations as well

as the Land Transport Office would change their existing routes so they link up with the airport link.

I believe everybody would see benefits from this and be able to travel around the island conveniently.

The details still need to be worked out. We'll have to figure out how much budget we could raise, then decide how we would put it in place and what kind of vehicles to use. If we have a small budget we might just use buses. If we have enough money we might try and build a light railway, as I've suggested to the province and the PPAO in the past.

My dream is to have a single card that you could buy and use to travel all over Phuket. Everyone would pay the same rate, whether local or tourist. There might be a discount for students and the elderly, however.

I would also like to say something about the political crisis surrounding the red shirt protests. Even though it seems like everything is fine in Phuket now, I'm concerned about what the future holds for us. It is still going on with no solution and soon we all might be in trouble. Bookings are being canceled and new ones aren't being made after several countries warned their nationals against travel to Thailand.

The situation in Bangkok needs to be put to rest, otherwise the economic situation is going to be tight for a long time. It doesn't matter how it ends, but it needs

The problem is not just what's happening now, but also the uncertainty over the future. I don't think foreigners, tourists and especially investors are too worried about the situation, but they need to know what we are going to do about it. They need answers. Just tell them what can and can't be done and make everything clear, rather than all this vagueness.

Before, we forecast that our economy would get better by the end of 2009. But right now things are even worse and it's going to continue until the end of the year and maybe into next year.

The treatments I received at Bangkok Hospital Phuket were completely professional and I would most highly recommend Dr Captain and his staff to anyone needing any of the eye exams or treatments they offer.

We still have to make permanent repairs. We asked for a special budget to repair it as a case of natural disaster, but many many roads have sustained such damage recently so we have to wait.

AFC CUP

Thai Port, Muang Thong through to knock-out stage

OR the second successive week, an AFC Cup match was moved from Bangkok to Phuket. On April 20, Muang Thong Utd's match against South China was moved to Surakul Stadium in Phuket Town.

On April 27, it was Thai Port's turn to play a "home" AFC Cup match in Phuket, this time against main rivals in their group, Tai Po from Hong Kong.

Muang Thong Utd went into their fixture with hopes of qualifying to the knock-out rounds of the competition hanging precariously in the balance.

Surakul Stadium offered little respite for the Bangkok side, who suffered a disappointing defeat to South China.

However, the Thai squad later managed to draw 2-2 away to Indonesian side Persiwa



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Wamena, meaning that they lost top spot in Group G, but still secured progress to the knock-out stages of the competition courtesy of a second-place finish.

A goal finally arrived for Thai Port early in the second half when Issarapong made up for his first-half miss with a sharply taken finish.

Thai Port were starting to pile on the pressure and Jakkrit Bunkham was unfortunate to see

a shot deflected onto the bar. Then the already sedate pace of the game slowed to a virtual standstill, before the monotony was broken by Nirut Camsawat scoring the Thai team's second goal with a superbly placed volley struck from the edge of the penalty area.

As Thai Port and Muang Thong Utd have finished second in their respective groups, they will progress to the next round of the competition but will not have the home-ground advantage.

If they successfully navigate the "Round of 16", they will qualify for the quarter finals, which will be held over two legs, as will the semi-finals.

The next round of matches will take place on May 11 and 12. Assuming either team progresses and the situation in Bangkok remains volatile, Phuket may yet play host to the knock-out rounds of this prestigious competition.

To date, the activities of the Layan golf players in the two raised enough to provide five new scholarships to support those created by the millions of baht the PIWC has raised over the past



Airlift juggernaut hits Samui tourism

Plans to develop Samui Airport could help an island with limited flight capacity

Samui is Thailand's second-most-visited island resort destination. As a rampedup hotel supply reaches 16,069 rooms, the island is experiencing growing pains as part of its emerging journey into the mainstream.

One of the prevailing challenges for Samui is the lack of international flights, with 2009 seeing domestic traffic mainly routed through Bangkok representing 91 percent of all arrivals.

Unlike Phuket, where the airport is operated under the public agency Airports of Thailand (AoT), Samui Airport is privately run by Bangkok Airways. They in turn sub-lease the operation to the Siam City Asset, which operates the airport through its Siam Airport Property Fund. The airline is a major shareholder in the investment vehicle.

Although Bangkok Airways

FTER Phuket, Koh recently announced plans to develop Samui into a "second international hub", its direct international flights to the island are currently limited to Hong Kong and Singapore.

Other direct international connections currently being offered include Malaysia's Firefly and Berjaya Air serving Samui from Kuala Lumpur.

On the domestic front, Thai Airways has been allowed to provide limited domestic services since 2008.

At the root of the demand quandary are environmental controls which limit the hours during which planes can arrive and depart, coupled with a ceiling of 36 flights a day. In simple terms, for hotels this equates to "you can't stay there, if you can't get there."

Looking into Samui's performance rear view mirror for 2009, airport arrivals in the first

half of the year were down 23 percent, mainly due to politicalrelated events. The second half of the year surged, but failed to compensate for the earlier shortfall, with the final tally still falling short of 2008 levels.

the back of a shift to regional markets was felt in similar fashion to Phuket's experience, with rate drops of 13 percent. However, results from the first quarter of this year show that room rates are on the way up.

Viewing international source markets, the list is led by the UK followed by Germany, Australia, Sweden and Russia. It's interesting that the correlation between access and emerging travel-hungry nationalities, with Indonesia topping the rising tide followed by India, Malaysia, Eastern Europe and the Middle East.

What is becoming increasingly apparent is that Thailand is experiencing a growing reliance on short-haul, Asian-based customers. Finding an equilibrium for this type of rate-sensitive business currently looks likely to stretch past 2010.


Regarding regional trade, Discounting room rates on many tour operators are vocal that the profound lack of developed tourism demand generators and attractions could inhibit a shift to more of a mass tourism model. Speaking to property developers and agents on Samui, it is clear that they have suffered greater impact from the global financial crisis than Phuket, and that the number of projects currently on hold or for sale is significant. While some marquee hotel-branded projects have been for sale, the market absorption rates have been muted.

There is a reason for an upbeat outlook, though, as 541 internationally-managed rooms will open in the next 15 months, led by luxury giants W, Conrad, Banyan Tree and Starwood. It is inevitable that a high critical mass of branded properties create benefits, as could be related to, say, taking a shopping expedition to Paragon, Central World or the Emporium.

However, there also exists a danger that the market absorption of new hotels could see supply outpace demand. While talks have been going on for years about a new larger international airport, the constraints of a privatized operation that is financially focused on returning yields to investors does raise concern.

The ongoing question of how Koh Samui and Phuket will be able to cope with the at-times "runaway train" of tourism development is no easy puzzle to solve. Water, traffic, waste disposal, population explosion and crime all somehow become strange bedfellows in the cycle and unfortunately often take a back seat to economic models all geared to year-on-year growth.

Samui remains a stunningly beautiful destination. Its new hotels rival anything Phuket has to offer, and residential property is world-class. While perhaps the growth of the two islands are headed in similar directions, it will be interesting to see how the very different challenges play out in the years ahead.



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You have the right to stay, sometimes

Uncovering the little known "right of habitation"

F THE various rights guaranteed, for Thais and foreigners, under the Thai Civil and Commercial Code (CCC), is the little-known "right of habitation", which is often overlooked for sake of its far more popular counterpart, the lease.

The right of habitation can be granted to a person as a right "to occupy a building as a dwelling place for either certain period provided that such is not in excess of 30 years or for lifetime of the grantee".

If a specific period has been granted, the grantor (such as the building's owner) and grantee (the person wanting to live in the property) may agree on a renewal, which must not exceed 30 years.

The right of hab-

itation, as opposed to a lease, is not subject to payment, such as rent paid by a tenant to a landlord.

In addition, the right of habitation provides the grantee with a right to have his family and household possessions with him, unless of course the parties have agreed expressly that only the grantee is to live in the property.

This, together with the fact that the right of habitation can be granted without payment, makes the right of habitation an interesting alternative to a lease whenever the intention is to provide a right of use and occupation to a property without causing a financial burden on the occupant.

However, such a scenario may apply only in very limited cases, such as

similar relationships.

Important to understand is that the right of habitation must be registered at the local Land Department office.

Also, the right of habitation is not transferable, not even through inheritance. If the grantee dies, the right cannot be passed on to heirs and the

when it involves familial or property must be returned to the grantor.

Further, the fact that the right of habitation can not be transferred means that it does not provide a property with a marketable title that would qualify a property for resale.

Overall, the right of habitation can be an interesting option in cases where a property owner wants to provide a person with a secured right of use and occupation to a building without causing a financial burden on the occupant.

However, the right seems to be very limited and generally will not qualify as basis for a conventional property investment.

Any person considering using this right should consult legal advice before entering into any agreement that aims to exercise this right of habitation.

Panwa gets its sexy back



NYONE who visited Phuket 20 years ago would hardly recognize the island if they returned today. Hotels, resorts and businesses have mushroomed, and what's left of Phuket's natural beauty leaves a lot to be desired, depending on where you look.

NE of the early articles I cobbled together for this column was on the subject of foliage plants. Some of my recommendations were: Jacob's coat [acalypha wilkesiana], the caricature plant [graphtophyllum pictum], the massive families of crotons [cordiaeum variegatum] and ornamental dracaenas, including cordylines, and the pigeon berry [duranta repens]. Both the first and last take the tropical sun in their stride. The rest, true to their jungle origins, will do better in dappled shade where the soil retains some moisture.

Now that my garden, two years on, has more clearly demarcated areas of sun and shade, I can reconfirm those findings. The acalyphas are doing well, despite an initial infestation of white fly, the durantas, now clipped, form a neat yellow-green hedge, and both crotons and dracaenas, in their various manifestations add permanent color to the beds.

I could and should have added polyscias [panax] to my recommendation. In common with duranta, this small shrub is used in Thailand as a hedge, or for formal, background planting. Some cultivars are variegated and have crenulated foliage. Another, the so-called "dinner-plate aralia", has large, distinctive, round green

Like duranta, polyscias is hardy and evergreen, can take plenty of direct sun, and responds to pruning. It tends to become scandent if left to its own devices. A very useful plant to have around.

the only characters for your plot. Like most of these shade plants, There are other plants, especially the ones nurtured under netting in garden centers, which will only thrive in understory conditions. I now have such conditions.

One of my fiddlewood trees is six meters tall, and provides protection from the sun for most of the day. In its shade, I have planted dieffenbachias [dumbcane], and especially the cultivar, tropic snow, which I find more aesthetically pleasing than the mottled, dark-green variety. It has meant adding extra topsoil, since the fiddlewood is shallow-rooting and takes most of the available nutrients and water.

Like alocasias [elephant ears], dieffenbachias will not tolerate high levels of direct sunlight. Placed in its full glare, they will initially respond by pointing their leaves upwards in a protective, sheath-like gesture. With continuous sun the foliage will soon discolor and scorch.

Aglaonemas require similar conditions. After all, they belong to the same family [araceae].

aglaonemas do well in pots, and can even cope with indoor conditions. The most common variety, pictum, is showy enough with its bright green, silver-veined leaves, but Thai growers have been particularly successful at producing new hybrids. I have several specimens, both in shady recesses of the garden and in containers. One aglaonema

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pictum is now four feet tall and is growing so fast that it already needs to be divided up. Another, also in a container, has unusual green and salmon-pink foliage.

Under their netting canopies, most good garden centers carry a range of cultivars. They are expensive, but very arresting. Not only will they grow rapidly in moist, shady conditions, but they can be readily propagated

by planting stem cuttings in compost. This brings me to the subject of books, or to be more precise, one book, called Surath Vanno's Plant Collection, it encompasses the dedicated work of one Bangkok horticulturist, and features a unique collection of shade-loving plants.


Although it is written in Thai, the book has excellent photographs, botanical names for each specimen, and diagrammatic information about requirements. If you are planning a shade garden, I strongly recommend this publication.

It is informative about many families of foliage plants: especially strong on philodendrons – more than forty varieties are illustrated - on anthuriums, spathyphyllums, marantas, calatheas and bromeliads.

Many of these shady characters are available as cultivars in good plant nurseries around Phuket. And if you want a dash of color, neoregelias, and guzmanias (both members of the bromeliad clan) will oblige. Furthermore, since they require little in the way of soil, they can, like orchids, be hung from a tree.
